FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 20, 1993

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable James Aki, Temporary Chairman of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Ponoi" led by Mrs. Mary Ellen Ululani Alfapada and Mr. Craig Darryle Hauole Alfapada of Nanakuli.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Father Thomas Killackey, M.M., Pastor, Waianae Sacred Heart Parish, who was escorted to the rostrum by Senators Tungpalan, Solomon and Koki.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Holt nominated T. David Woo Jr., seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator Chang moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Mizuguchi and carried.

The Chair declared T. David Woo Jr. as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Matsuura then moved that a committee of three Senators be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator George and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Iwase, Tungpalan and Reed to serve on such committee.

At 10:19 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:22 o'clock a.m.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Senator Iwase, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) as follows:

Senator Matsuura moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Senator George and carried.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair, at this time, appointed Senators Levin, Graulty and Fukunaga to escort Chief Justice Herman Lum of the Hawaii State Supreme Court to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

The Senators escorted Chief Justice Lum to the rostrum and were thereupon discharged with thanks.

Chief Justice Lum administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Nakasato placed in nomination the name of Senator James Aki for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Iwase moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Matsunaga.

At this time, Senator Mizuguchi rose to remark as follows:

"Mr. President, the vote on this motion should not be misinterpreted but rather interpreted as a call for leadership in the Senate to provide a structure and process that will enable all of us to find the solutions and to address the dire needs of the people of our state. This is not a time for dissension merely to make this point, but a time to call upon members to put aside their need for titles and look instead to the needs of the people. Only by working together, under a structure which represents all constituencies, will we be able to achieve the results we must achieve for the people's sake."

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Aki as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator James Aki was declared unanimously elected President of the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993.

At this time, the President addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Lieutenant Governor Ben Cayetano, Chief Justice Herman Lum, Mayor Frank Fasi, Mayor Stephen Yamashiro and Della, Mayor Linda Crockett Lingle, honored guests, friends, and people of Hawaii -- Aloha!

"I would also like to extend Aloha to the newest members of this honorable body, Senator Carol Fukunaga, Senator Rey Graulty, Senator Brian Kanno, Senator Matt Matsunaga and Senator Joe Tanaka.

"Please bear with me a little longer as I take a few moments to give thanks to all my constituents who have put their trust in me all these years by electing me to be their senator. I will continue to do my best for you and the wonderful state in which we live. And to my

colleagues, I say mahalo for the opportunity you have given me to be your leader. And finally to my family who stood by me all these years and gave me the support I needed, thank you very much. Faye, Mom, thank you very much.

"I rose early today and as I looked at the morning skies I was reminded that on this new day dawns an era of enormous change, not only here in Hawaii, but for our nation and the rest of the world as well. Just look at what's happening in our nation's economy and again in Iraq. Our immediate future is filled with apprehension and uncertainties.

"We meet here today at a time of great challenges and great opportunity for Hawaii. Through all of our present travail, and we know them well -- the deficit, the homeless, the unemployed, the loss of spirit and belief. For all these, I believe that we are wise enough to address our deficit without taxing ourselves into bankruptcy, strong enough to reconcile order with justice, brave enough to bring opportunity and hope to those who have neither.

"We must be the family of Hawaii. Feeling one another's pain, sharing one another's blessings, equitably, honestly, fairly, without respect to geography or race or political affiliation.

"Our ancestors taught us to work hard to give our children something better. That I pledge, as I begin my term. This will be a hardworking and realistic Senate, fully cognizant of those thousands of families and businesses struggling to survive an economy that is distressed at the moment. I have no illusion about how difficult this will be. It will require that we pass a fierce test of our resolve.

"We begin to meet our obligation today, all of us together.

"I have been deeply troubled by the negativism that has surrounded us and by the widespread distrust in government that has accompanied feelings of anger and frustration among our constituents. Today, let us pledge our efforts to wiping out this gloomy 'attitudinal virus' and to replace it with a 'can-do' attitude. Let us pledge to do what we can to restore public confidence in government and to build a positive, more vital climate along with an openness to new ideas and solutions to old problems. Let us encourage and welcome change for the betterment of our community and let us seek to make decisions by collaboration and consensus rather than Let us dispense with confrontation and controversy. labels and negativism and replace these with a renewed spirit of cooperation. Michael Jackson sings, 'Heal the world, -- make it a better place for you and for me.' Let's 'heal Hawaii' and 'make this a better place for you and for me.'

"As an unshakable team we can heal our battered economy, win back our alienated youth and heal the broken dreams of our less fortunate citizens. To achieve the dreams we have for our children, to build that better world, we, in government must be willing to admit our mistakes and learn from them. We must be willing to put our egos aside, and make tough personal sacrifices. We need to remember that we are here to serve the people. The people also have a role in our efforts. Each person must be willing to ask himself, 'What can I do,' and then, 'Do it.'

"Here are a few of my ideas on what government can do. In order to maintain full employment, we must diversify and expand our economic growth. In the coming days, we will be looking for ways to assure a balanced approach to economic growth by working closely with the private sector. Environmental scare tactics cannot be used as screens. Instead, by enhancing our environment, by complementing our wealth of natural resources and by preserving our cultural and historical ties to the land, we should be able to develop a balanced growth program that will benefit Hawaii's people.

"I envision Hawaii as becoming the business center of the Pacific. With the interest of the Asian market and the questionable outlook of Hong Kong, we have an unprecedented opportunity to establish ourselves as the key to business in the Pacific. This means working with our private sector and developing rules that will encourage businesses to stay in Hawaii instead of looking for more ways to hamper their progress with governmental bureaucracy and higher taxes.

"Tourism is our bread and butter. Without tourism, thousands of jobs would be gone and our economy and people would suffer. Given the fiscal constraints of these times, we need to look at tourism and its marketing in creative and fiscally prudent ways that include reviewing the counties' share of the transient accommodation tax. The state will have to find another way to finance itself. Furthermore, whenever Hawaii residents travel out of state, they can serve as 'ambassadors of Aloha,' spreading the good word about Hawaii and its people. Even our students can become wonderful ambassadors as they travel the world spreading the message of Aloha with their bright smiles, sparkling eyes and generous spirits worthy of our island heritage.

"It is clear that government cannot solve the many issues surrounding housing alone. The public and private sector must work closely together to find innovative ways to approach the need for affordable housing, and more specifically, rental housing. Perhaps we have focused too long on the need to purchase homes. Why not look at how we can best house our families by providing affordable rental housing as well?

"And why can't we in government just make available finished lots and let the people build their own homes?

"As a former teacher, I believe that we have a responsibility to create a learning climate where our youngsters can reach their full potential. That means back to basics and paying teachers a wage commensurate to their role as fostering our most precious resource. We should also actively recruit local people interested in teaching as a career. We can start by supporting the responsibility of our teachers in the classroom. Teaching is a respected profession that should pay a fair wage.

"In these modern times, stress and pressure are common personal experiences. Each one of us has occasionally felt the need to re-group, even recuperate, from the strain and responsibility of modern living. Because of the stress-filled world in which we live, we must look toward securing a modern day 'city of refuge' that can offer to those in need an escape from the stresses of the day and to re-energize.

"Last, I would like to talk about a concern of special importance to me. It is clear and unquestionable that a wrong has been done to our native Hawaiians. How these wrongs will be redressed by the state and federal government is of the utmost importance to all of us. Some say we cannot turn back the hands of time. To them, I say time has stopped for many native Hawaiians and we in government must act to help restore to this proud race some of the dignity stolen from them. I encourage the state to continue its work regarding Hawaiian home lands and support legal action against the

federal government for breaches of the Hawaiian Home Land Trust.

"Like many of you, I come from an immigrant family. I know what it is to struggle to belong, to work to build a strong foundation for the family, to prepare ourselves for the future. I come from a strong and proud region of Oahu that has too often been a scapegoat in the past. It is populated by people who have faced and tackled tough problems and who have been willing to accept new ideas for the betterment of the community. From the people of Waianae, I have learned the true meaning of the 'ganbare' spirit, a Japanese word that means the courage and determination to keep on trying, to 'hang in there tough' with every ounce of energy to get the job done. In Hawaiian we say 'imua.' With positive attitudes and the willingness to resolve the issues of our society, we can begin knocking down the walls to the problems of our society and take the first steps toward the accomplishment of our many worthy goals. The longest of journeys begins with but one small step.

"So great and complex are the problems facing Hawaii today, that I believe nothing less than our best is good enough to solve them.

"I call on all members of the Senate to seize this opportunity to help shape a special place for our keiki o ka aina. With a spirit of cooperation, the desire to work by consensus, and with a commitment to work together for the people of Hawaii, we can face the tough challenges ahead of us and openly seek workable solutions and alternatives to the problems and issues brought before this Legislature. Let's do it -- let's do it now. Thank you."

Senator George, Minority Leader of the Senate, then responded as follows:

"Mr. President, colleagues, distinguished friends:

"I think it's safe to say that longevity is one topic on which no one here would question my credentials.

"Today I'd like to consider two aspects of longevity in office. The first is memory -- recollections of political history, of the approaches, the emotions and the political considerations that went into the solutions chosen then to solve the problems of that day.

"The other aspect of longevity is perspective. Nobody appreciates Monday morning quarterbacks, but occasionally we ought to revisit yesterday from the vantage point of today's experience and knowledge.

"Deja vu time. For as long as I can remember, the problems of this state have been virtually the same. And, sadly, not only have we not dealt with any of the problems to a degree where we can file them as solved, it's pretty safe to say that many of them have just gotten worse.

"You have reminded us of the long list of today's problems, Mr. President, but I can testify that pretty much this same sorry litany was before government a quarter-century ago. I know, because that, Mr. President, is when I first joined government. (Along with the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, a quarter-century ago.)

"It has always cost more to live here than on the Mainland. The biggest change I see is that many of the people who used to just talk about looking for better pay or a cheaper community are really going -- or gone.

"Our people have always been protective of their neighborhoods. It's only recently that we started to call

this NIMBY. We have always worried about environmental assaults on our water quality.

"For a long time people in this state have been critical of our educational system. Remember how we used to change superintendents of education? About as often as we changed our underwear.

"Juvenile crime. Not enough prison space. Persistent drug use, changing only the choice of which drug to abuse.

"Today's catalog of problems keeps on reading like yesterday's. Expensive and inadequate housing. Discrimination and racism. Overdependence on government money and jobs. A moribund two-party system (only the party has changed over the decades). An all-eggs-in-one-basket economy. Mistrust of government itself. Low voter participation.

"Quite a few of these problems are here and worse simply because there are more of us. And some resist solution by their very nature -- they're human problems, always complex and ever elusive.

"Yes, Mr. President. In spite of our best efforts, through some kind of inevitable social inertia, these problems persist -- tumbling out of our political closet like some skeletal apparitions we thought we'd buried long ago.

"This year, let's particularly look at those problems that government's own actions may have made worse. Could our well-meant intervention, for instance, be partly responsible for the scanty supply of affordable housing? Would we be better advised to back off and let market forces go to work?

"Enlarging government certainly hasn't provided solutions for our persisting problems. Nor has collecting and spending more money made them go away.

"Who was it that said 'the faster I go, the behinder I get?'

"As we have less and less money to work with, our partisan and personal differences grow smaller. I don't agree with those who say that we can't do much because the cupboard is bare. I would point out that if necessity is the mother of invention, financial crisis is surely the mother of innovation.

"Our constituencies have spoken. Vox Pop. The voice of the people -- the foundation of our nation and the wisdom of our democratic system. With all my perspective and despite an extensive memory bank, I can't remember a year of greater citizen unrest than the past one. And I know we all made promises based on what our public told us -- they sent us here to do the public good.

"To do that, we'd better stop thinking of the public out there as consumers. Our citizens aren't the customers of government -- they are the owners. Customers look at a range of products and decide what to buy. Citizens, through representative government, decide which things are so important that government will do them at public expense.

"The people want us to do our job -- to set priorities. Politics will get us by when there's plenty of money. Now that the well is going dry, what we've got to have is leadership.

"Opening day is a time for commitments, and promises, and ideals. Let's make the promises and speak

brightly of tomorrow. Ideals are like stars after all. We cannot reach them, but we are graced by their presence.

"But may I also suggest that when the speeches are pau we remember the simple reason why we're here: that this is a government of the people and that the people of this state rightly expect that we will do all we can to lessen their burdens, improve their communities, and provide a better future for their children.

"I know we agree on that, Mr President. In fact, we agree on a lot more than we disagree on. So I suggest we put partisan labels aside and get on with the business before us.

"In that spirit, we, the 'numerically challenged,' are ready to roll up our sleeves and work hard, with you, to respond to the voice of the people.

"Mr. President, your minority looks forward to a productive session.

"Thank you."

At 10:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:56 o'clock a.m.

The President, at this time, introduced to the members of the Senate Dr. Kenneth Mortimer, the newly-appointed President of the University of Hawaii, and Mr. Rockne Freitas, Vice President for University Relations, University of Hawaii, seated on the floor of the Senate.

The President then announced that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President of the Senate.

Senator Ikeda placed in nomination the name of Senator Milton Holt for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator B. Kobayashi.

Senator McCartney moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kanno.

The motion to close the nominations was put by the Chair and carried unanimously and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Holt as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Milton Holt was declared unanimously elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993.

SENATE RESOLUTION

The following resolution (S.R. No. 1) was read by the Temporary Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

S.R. No. 1, providing for the election of T. David Woo Jr. for Clerk of the Senate, George Amimoto for Assistant Clerk of the Senate, and Bienvenido C. Villaflor for Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate, Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, was offered by Senators Matsuura and George.

On motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Tanaka and carried, S.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The President thereupon administered the oath of office to the newly elected Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate.

At 10:59 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:18 o'clock a.m.

The President thanked Frank and Katherine Kawelo and Wally and Polei Palmeira, all of whom are from Kauai, for providing the entertainment during the recess.

In closing, the members of the Senate and guests joined hands and sang "Hawaii Aloha."

"Mr. President and members of the Senate, it's indeed a very moving and stirring time to be able to accept that very gracious statement from the Senator from Kohala. "I want to extend to all of you my heartfelt gratitude for your assistance throughout the years and especially for the funding that we were able to match with the private donations that we garnered. Indeed, it was perhaps the most momentous occasion for our Hawaiian people and we are hopeful that it will lead to the preservation of our race and our beloved heritage. Thank you."

Love to our Queen Liliuokalani Long live the children all of them of Hawaii nei Love to all the people of Hawaii nei

Mahalo a nui loa for these treasured moments to share with you my mana'o in honor of our nā ali'i, nā kupuna, nā makua, a me nā kamali'i o Hawai'i nei. Imua nā pua o Hawai'i.

My fellow Hawaiians, this week can mark the Dawn of a new Hawaiian Nation. But it will only be so if we — the Hawaiians — fully realize that the new day is in our hearts and minds. We must reorient our thinking. Our commitment must be to unity among ourselves and we must learn to focus our full and unified energies.

For a century — 100 years — we have allowed others to interpret our history, set our agenda and determine our priorities. We have allowed others to encourage competition among us, to pit one group against another, to institutionalize division. We must all realize this and stop it now. We are not Democrats. We are not Republicans. We are Hawaiians. It must always be our combined goal to seek and identify those facts and principles about which we can all agree and upon which we can all act. We've allowed non-Hawaiians to write the story of 1893. That story must be rewritten by us in our hearts.

Queen Liliuokalani was not overthrown because of any actions of hers which were upsetting to the ha'ole leadership in Hawaii. She was overthrown because the U.S. Government responding to the siren call of Manifest Destiny wanted her and her Hawaiian supporters out of the way. But for the actions of the U.S. Secretaries of State and Navy and the U.S. Minister there would have been no overthrow in 1893 and no annexation in 1898. Remember it was President Cleveland who after extensive review of the facts informed Congress and the U.S. Nation that the Kingdom of Hawaii was overthrown by an Act of War committed by a diplomatic representative of the United States. It was the U.S. Minister who ordered the landing of troops even before any action by the disgruntled

ha'oles and it was that same Minister who lowered the Hawaiian Flag from 'Iolani Palace and raised the American Flag.

Remember, also that the Queen surrendered her authority in order to avoid bloodshed and referred the matter to the U.S. Government in order the actions of its Minister be undone. Her dependence on the U.S. Government was misplaced and so to has ours been so far. For since those black days we Hawaiians have been torn between the Federal Government and that of the Territory of Hawaii, or that of the State of Hawaii as the buck has been passed back and forth. We have been fragmented and rendered ineffective by their artificial and arbitrary determinations concerning blood quantum, and status. We have seen how the political establishment by encouraging the organization of all too numerous points of view — by supporting diversity of opinion — has rendered us divided.

In this new Hawaiian Day we must set out those facts and those courses of action about which none of us will argue.

Thus, as we all fully accept that it was the United States Government which overthrew our Monarchy, we can focus all our spirit and energy toward causing that Government to redress the wrongs done. We all can accept that that Government incurred obligations as trustee for the Hawaiian people concerning the 1.8 million acres of lands ceded to it on Annexation. We must be assured that those trust obligations are in fact met. None of us would argue about this.

We cannot allow the Federal Government to say it is the State's responsibility and then the State to refer us back to the Federal Government. The responsibility lies with the United States Government agent which overthrew our Kingdom. All obligations of the State Government derive from that Federal Act.

The 1992 Democratic Platform takes the position "that the United States Government respects its trustee obligations to the inhabitants of Hawaii generally and to native Hawaiians in particular." This position is paramount to an acknowledgement of both the existence of a trust relationship and liability for breaches of that relationship.

Our task is set. For the first time since the overthrow the United States is governed by a Political Party formally committed to meeting its trust obligations to our people. We must in unity see those obligations met.

Our claims are based on: (1) using our lands for defense purposes without compensation or land exchange; (2) using our lands for public purposes without compensation; (3) using our lands for long-term leases at unrealisticly low rents (a case in point is the use of Pohakuloa: The United States uses 26,000 acres for military training purposes at the rate of \$1 dollar a year for a term of 50 years); and (4) for leasing our lands to private parties without compensation or land exchange. Because of these wrongdoings we must be deeply committed to a better future and we must have within in our hearts and minds a burning desire to take up the task and move forward and regain what is rightfully ours.

We want only what is ours — no more, no less. Make no mistake it will not be an easy task. The question is how do we proceed? By following the plan laid down 100 years ago by our Queen Liliuokalani, "Onipa'a", stand steadfast.

This was her hope, her pledge. Let us "onipa'a" and go foward today to fulfil her mandate. We have nothing to lose, nothing to fear, and everything to gain.

At this time, Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, it was with a cautious sigh of relief that the people of Kauai received the news that payments to policyholders of HIG would commence shortly. Since the overwhelming destruction of Iniki, Kauaians have been heartened by heroic efforts of rescue agencies, immediate expressions of concern by state officials including our chair of Consumer Protection, and most recently the election of their former Senator Aki to the Senate presidency. However, their attitude is cautious because prior to Commissioner Takayama's announcement yesterday, people on Kauai were generally under the impression that the state would take the full 90 days to resume payments on their claims, and a surprising number of Kauaians had given up hope of ever receiving any payments on their HIG claims. Now that the dreaded word 'bankruptcy' is being uttered officially, desperation and panic could become widespread among Kauai's homeowners and businessowners, unless fast positive action is taken by our Legislature and state officials on all fronts.

"I personally am made uneasy by what has been done (and more often not done) to date, by the insurance commissioner's office. For example, although toll-free hot line numbers were set up by the state soon after its ill considered summary closure of HIG's offices on Kauai, neither the hot line numbers nor information explaining these actions were clearly and repeatedly disseminated to the Kauai public and press.

"Thus, confusion, rumors and totally unnecessary additional trauma were suffered by hundreds of HIG policyholders. I trust this will not happen again, and that additional time will be taken in the near future to make it absolutely clear to the people of Kauai what they can expect from the state regarding their HIG policies in the months to come.

"Time permits me to mention here only a few of the questions which my constituents desperately need to have answered. For example, how long will those insured whose policies were unfortunately written with the insolvent subsidiaries UNICO or HUI have to wait before they receive their payments? Will those policyholders also receive 100 cents on the dollar, just as all the HIG policyholders have been assured of? Will all post-Iniki damage to hurricane damaged structures caused by the almost daily winter rain and wind be 100% covered as it has been by other insurance companies?

"Now is an appropriate time for my fellow colleagues to review and more importantly, carefully monitor this entire HIG crisis in their respective committees. The ramifications of the HIG debacle will affect not only the people on Kauai but property owners and renters throughout the state. The question of the parent company's propriety in diversification, which was raised last session in this body, must be carefully scrutinized by the PUC. There is no question that its subsidiary, Young Brothers, has been making 'windfall' profits from its shipment of goods to Kauai. Can some of those additional profits, which can be directly attributable to Hurricane Iniki, be used to offset the losses in the homeowners insurance field? Let us hope also that HECO's subsidiary, American Savings Bank, is profitable and financially secure. And if so, can low interest loans

be made available to HIG policyholders? Perhaps they can assist unfortunate UNICO, HUI, and HIG homeowner policyholders in some way, and especially with the substantial premium increases which the insurance commissioner stated can be expected in order to purchase a new homeowners policy. At the very least, those Kauai HIG policyholders should be given higher priority in retaining and regaining a homeowners insurance policy and at reasonable and not significantly higher rates. These are questions which this body must show some leadership in pursuing -- for the good of all the people of our state."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, as you know, there was an article that appeared in The Honolulu Advertiser on October 22, 1992, entitled 'HEI and Iniki.' The article said, 'Let's clarify accountability. Has the diversification of Hawaiian Electric into banking, insurance, real estate development and interisland shipping had any adverse effects on customers who pay for electricity?'

"This question as you know, Mr. President, was raised last session in S.C.R. No. 48 which was, incidentally, defeated in the Committee on Energy chaired by a Senator from the Big Island. In this resolution, those questions were posed so that we in this honorable body could get to the bottom of what exactly is going on.

"The article further emphasized that in 1983 Hawaiian Electric Industries as the holding company, acquired enterprises such as American Savings Bank, Hawaiian Insurance Group (HIG) and Hawaiian Tug and Barge. Legislators and regulators want to know, and I'm hoping, Mr. President, that we can get some specific answers—did this diversification distract the electric companies from planning and budgeting for continuing reliable delivery of electricity? This question was prompted by blackouts on Oahu, as well as the Big Island. Could costs incurred by non-utility subsidiaries or HEI itself somehow show up in our electric bills? Mr. President, I do not think this is something unreasonable to ask on the part of the consumer. Regulators say they haven't been able to sort out who's paying for what.

"Now Hurricane Iniki damage claims have left HIG temporarily awash in red ink. Despite improved utility and bank profits, HEI was forced to report a \$37 million loss in the third quarter. HEI said that it furnishes all the information, as required by the PUC, to show the separation of utility costs from those of the other businesses.

"In the SCR (No. 48) that we considered last year, these are some of the questions that we had asked to be resolved but, unfortunately, the resolution was not passed out of committee.

"Mr. President, these are not unreasonable questions and I think my colleagues would agree that these are not Does any profit from HIG, unreasonable questions. American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd. go into Hawaiian Electric Company? Are HIG, American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd. making any profit or are they a liability to HEI or drain of money from Hawaiian Electric Company? Does any money from Hawaiian Electric Company go into HIG, American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd. to finance their operations? Did the purchase of HIG, American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd. have any effect on the ability of Hawaiian Electric Company to upgrade its equipment and facilities in order to provide better service? Why did HEI purchase HIG, American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd.? Is there continued justification in it? And if HEI were to sell HIG, American Savings Bank or Young Brothers Ltd. would this result in more money going into Hawaiian Electric Company? Why or why not? How could this affect electric rates? In addition, we could ask how was HEI able to finance the purchase of HIG, American Savings Bank and Young Brothers Ltd. Did HEI use money that was taken from Hawaiian Electric Company?

"And, Mr. President, to this day, we have not received answers to these questions. With regard to the previous speaker's remarks, I think that it is just deplorable that this body is in this situation today, that we cannot even answer our constituencies or that we have any idea as to what is going on. I'm hoping, Mr. President, under your leadership and as a former Senator representing the people of Kauai, you will encourage a committee investigation to these questions and, perhaps, to reconsider the passage of the resolution which will be introduced as a bill this session. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then rose to state:

"Mr. President, since there was a mention of the Senator from the Big Island chairing the committee, I don't want my colleagues to think that I killed the bill and resolution without any good cause or explanation. Last year, we had a hearing on a bill and a resolution relating to a legislative audit of HEI"

Senator Solomon interjected:

"Excuse me, Mr. President, on a point of order.

"Is this a point of personal privilege? It should be clarified as such by the previous speaker. Thank you."

The Chair asked:

"Senator Matsuura, for what purpose do you rise to speak?"

Senator Matsuura answered:

"On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President."

The Chair recognized Senator Matsuura on a point of personal privilege and Senator Matsuura proceeded as follows:

"Mr. President, since the previous speaker spoke of a bill being killed in a committee which I chaired, I want to assure you that the testimonies that were given at those hearings made it very clear that the utility companies were not impacted by the other HEI subsidiary companies. In other words, HECO's activities are stringently monitored and audited by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC).

"There are conditions that the PUC placed on HEI before HEI was authorized to get into the insurance, the banking and barge business. Money from HECO is not moving into the insurance, the banking business. I can assure you of that. If PUC feels HEI has failed to live up to the conditions, PUC can order HEI to divest itself of HECO

"Hurricane Iniki's impact on the insurance companies has been felt not only by the insurance company of HEI but by others too. It's one of those natural disasters that the actuaries don't look forward to or can predict. This is one of the problems that all of the insurance companies are facing. A major earthquake would have just as devastating an impact on the insurance companies. We cannot blame anyone because these are acts of God that we have not prepared for or have found resolutions to."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, these are tough times and we have difficult problems ahead of us. The issue that was brought out by the Senator from Kohala and the Senator from Hilo highlights the importance that we all work together to find solutions. It is something we have discussed many times in the past and we've tried to find solutions and, hopefully, this session we will be able to do so. Certainly, we are going to put our efforts in trying to find the solutions to the problems at hand. Thank you for alerting us to this problem which is current. It has a serious, serious impact on our economy and our residents in the state."

Senator Reed rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise on a point of personal privilege.

"As you are aware, I have received the honor, due to reapportionment, of replacing you in representing the North Shore of Kauai and I would like to add my voice to the two members of the Senate who are urging a thorough investigation of this matter. I am receiving phone calls from residents of Kauai that you, Mr. President, would probably be receiving had the reapportionment commission not changed things. People there are greatly distressed and deserve the attention and the focus that this body can bring to resolving the problems.

"I would also like to shift gears for a second.

"I had not intended to address the Dan Inouye sex scandal. The media and establishment rush to defend Inouye, the orchestrated distortion of my role in the publicizing of the allegations and the voter support of Inouye despite the fact that most people believed Inouye's victim -- have combined to make it a subject I don't care to think about much less discuss publicly.

"But there is an Advertiser editorial this morning that leaves me no choice.

"In an editorial entitled 'Sexual harassment -- Amaral's apology is welcome,' the Advertiser's editorial writers continue their effort to protect Inouye by understating the allegations against him and by distorting my role.

"The editorial makes the point that although ten women made some effort to let it be known that they, too, were victims of Inouye's sexual advances, no one came forward to file a formal complaint.

"The writer writes, 'Only one woman's name surfaced, and it was under the most detestable circumstances. Inouye's former hairstylist, Lenore Kwock, was secretly taped describing what she says was an unwelcome sexual incident with Inouye years ago.'

"In that paragraph, Mr. President, the Advertiser once again publishes an inaccurate, incomplete statement that it repeatedly made during the last weeks of the campaign. In the first place, the 'unwelcome sexual incident' alleged by Ms. Kwock was forced sexual intercourse. Regardless of our political allegiances, somewhere in the back of our minds everyone knows that forced sexual intercourse is rape -- not an unwelcome sexual incident.

"Further, the Advertiser is fond of saying that Ms. Kwock's allegations have to do with an incident with Inouye several years ago. The Advertiser news and editorial writers have repeated that lie so often that many people have said, 'Why drag out something that happened

17 years ago?' The truth is that Ms. Kwock did not accuse Inouye of one isolated incident 17 years ago. Anyone who listened to her knows that she accuses Inouye of sexual assault, molestation and harassment not once but several times over a 17-year period -- with the most recent incident occurring just a few weeks before the election.

"Today's Advertiser editorial goes on to say, 'The taping was done by a woman who turned out to be a former campaign worker for Inouye's election opponent, Republican Senator Rick Reed. Reed then aired the tapes and Kwock's name in campaign ads.'

"Mr. President, this is an absolutely libelous and malicious statement both in its omissions and in its outright lies. What the Advertiser omits is that the tapes were released publicly -- to all the media statewide -- by the woman who did the taping. That same evening, KGMB TV aired portions of the tapes and made the allegations public. The number of people who saw KGMB news that night was far greater than the number who saw my use of those tapes in campaign ads that ran for only one day four days after KGMB broadcast the tape excerpts on its 6 o'clock News.

"In order to support its editorial assertion that 'Only one woman's name surfaced, and it was under the most detestable circumstances...', the Advertiser claims that I aired the tapes and Kwock's name in campaign ads. That is completely false and the Advertiser and its editorial writers know it is false. I did not air or use Kwock's name in my campaign ads. Throughout the campaign, I did not refer to Inouye's victim by name even once.

"The Inouye sex scandal has given the Advertiser another opportunity to prove that it is not a bona fide news organization -- that its primary purpose is to perpetuate the status quo and enhance its standing therein -- and the Advertiser has made the most of the opportunity. When the primary newspaper of our state is willing to lie to protect and help rehabilitate those in power -- when it is willing to consciously accuse me of doing something it knows I did not do -- we have a problem that undermines our very democracy. For without accurate, unbiased news, we are unable to make informed decisions.

"Finally, Mr. President, since I'm on the subject, I would like to briefly respond to what the Advertiser refers to as Amaral's 'welcome apology.'

"Representative Amaral has nothing to apologize to Inouye for. She received information from nine women who said they were, like Ms. Kwock, sexually victimized by Inouye. Amaral, a former police officer, believed these women. That being the case, she would have been negligent as an elected official had she not gone public with their allegations. Amaral handled the allegations perfectly because she managed to air them without causing the identity of the victims to become known. She owes no one an apology.

"At this point, the only apologies due are from the Advertiser for this morning's libelous editorial -- and unfortunately also from the women who have been victimized by Inouye but refuse to come forward.

"I spent five and a half years in the Honolulu Prosecutor's Office and saw first-hand the pain and suffering of victims of rape and sexual assault. I have people who are family to me who have been victims of sexual assault. My heart goes out to any victim -- particularly one of a sex crime.

"But, as tough as it might sound, a victim of a sex crime is more than a victim -- she or he is a citizen of this community. A victim of a sex crime has a social responsibility to report that crime. The reason is obvious -- if someone is into sexually assaulting or harassing women, the people of this community deserve to be warned. The criminal behavior must be stopped before others become victims.

"Many women are naturally and understandably reluctant to come forward with allegations of sexual assault or harassment. Their foremost fear is that they won't be believed. Unfortunately this fear has been exacerbated in our community by the Advertiser and others in the media whose reaction to the allegations against Inouye has made women even less willing to come forward. In this morning's editorial, for example, the Advertiser wrote, 'Sexual harassment is an important concern in the workplace, and accusations of victims must be taken seriously. By the same token, victims must be sure that their complaints will stand up to scrutiny. What the pompous editorial writer chose not to mention is that Inouye's accuser took and passed a lie detector test. Her complaint stood up to scrutiny while Inouve refused to take a lie detector test on the ground that such would be beneath his dignity.

"It is understandable, Mr. President, that victims of sex crimes are reluctant to come forward because they fear they won't be believed -- especially in this case where the accused is the state's senior U.S. Senator. But that fear is unwarranted here -- by their sheer numbers, the women who say they have been sexually assaulted or harassed by Inouye would be believed.

"I realize that there are other legitimate fears harbored by the women who have privately indicated that they have been sexually victimized by Inouye. But I suggest that those personal fears must take a back seat to the social obligation to report such crimes -- an obligation heightened by the fact that the accused is an elected official."

Senator Blair, in response to Senator Reed, stated:

"Mr. President, I cannot fail to respond to that speech for a number of reasons. First, because we are reviewing the rules (of the Senate) and Senator Reed's speech is a good example of why it is important that we take a serious look at imposing a more restrictive rule on personal privilege. We have just been held hostage to a press conference disguised as a speech on a point of personal privilege. There is no reason why something completely extraneous to any matter before this body should become the basis for a press conference that we are forced to attend. I hope that the new rules will reflect a narrower scope for rising on a point of personal privilege, so that this doesn't recur in the future.

"Second, I cannot help but smile when Senator Reed champions lie detector tests. A few years ago, in response to his suggestion that all legislators take urinalysis exams to see how many of us were on drugs, I suggested that Senator Reed and I have a 'meet the press' with lie detectors attached. At that time, he was quoted in the Maui News as saying that lie detectors were not reliable. I suggest that if lie detectors are not sufficiently reliable when Senator Reed is attached to them that they become no more reliable when anyone else is attached to them.

"The third point I would like to make has to do with jurisprudence. Even a person accused of criminal conduct is entitled to a presumption of innocence. The same presumption should certainly attach to a man who, for four decades, has served this community with all of

his ability and has served his country for a great deal longer ... sacrificing both his time and his body in the process.

"Finally, I would just like to close by responding to Senator Reed's assertion that many people don't believe Senator Inouye. I have no difficulty standing up and saying that the opinion of people who don't know Senator Inouye and who have not worked with Senator Inouye is not important to me. I do know Senator Inouye personally and many of his current and former staff members. I have no difficulty saying to the people of Hawaii that, if you disbelieve Senator Inouye, you are wrong and you do him an injustice. He is a man worthy of our every confidence and I stand before the members of the Senate and say I do believe and support him.

"Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to respond to the article that appeared in The Honolulu Advertiser editorial section by Mr. Twigg-Smith on his defense of his family's participation in the overthrow. Needless to say, Mr. President, I think Mr. Twigg-Smith should take a course at the University of Hawaii in Hawaiian history and, perhaps, maybe he would become more aware as to what happened during those black days in Hawaiian history.

"The overthrow must be understood in the context not of the local concerns of a group of sugar planters about their continued economic well-being but in the total world scheme of U.S. Manifest Destiny and Hawaii's place in that scheme, The interest of U.S. officials in the acquisition of complete political dominance over Hawaii in some form or another has been well documented. In 1873, the Commander of the U.S. Army, Pacific, General John Schofield and General B.S. Alexander of the U.S. Corps of Engineers conducted a secret spy mission and filed their report concerning the military significance of various areas of Hawaii particularly Pearl Harbor and discussed the means of making it available for naval and commercial purposes.' The first Reciprocity Treaty signed in 1876 secured for the U.S. a right of first refusal to all ports, harbors or other territory. As Senator John T. Morgan of Alabama later explained the 1876 Treaty 'was negotiated for the purpose of securing political control of those Islands, making them industrially and commercially a part of the United States.' Thus was King Kalakaua compelled to execute a treaty granting the U.S. exclusive use of Pearl Harbor.

"In 1881 Secretary of State James Blaine set out in confidential correspondence what must be considered U.S.

policy vis-a-vis Hawaiian annexation. He advocated a specific policy of colonization by American citizens and stated the view that Hawaii was a member of the American system of states in fact 'an outlying district of the State of California.' It must be clearly recalled that it was the same James Blaine who as Secretary of State in 1889 appointed his friend and business associate, John Stevens, as U.S. Minister to Hawaii. Most certainly, Secretary Blaine knew of Stevens' zealous commitment of Manifest Destiny and his past involvement in attempts to overthrow other governments. Rather than being a negative factor this background undoubtedly made Stevens a more desirable choice as the diplomatic representative to the Kingdom of Hawaii. It is known that Stevens met often with members of the Annexation Club and openly encouraged annexation. Thurston in his memoirs admitted that Stevens shared the contents of diplomatic correspondence. It is reasonable that Stevens was fully apprised of the plans and activities of the Annexation State Department documents establish that in meeting with and encouraging the annexationists, Stevens was acting under general orders from Senator Blaine and Navy Secretary Benjamin Tracy. He was not on an adventure of his own. Significantly, it was on the order of Minister Stevens that the Hawaiian flag was lowered from Iolani Palace and the U.S. flag raised.

"The involvement of President Harrison and Secretaries Blaine and Tracy were direct and conscious. Minister Stevens was the means to their ends. But for the actions of Minister Stevens in the landing and stationing of belligerent troops as means to coerce conclusive action by the Committee of Safety as well as to intimidate the Queen, there would have been no overthrow. And certainly there would have been no overthrow in 1893, there would have been no annexation in 1898. Thurston and the others were in actuality merely instruments in the hands of the committed U.S. officials.

"The message of President Grover Cleveland to Congress in 1893 should be required reading by our school children and their parents. (And, incidentally, I will be sending a copy of this to Mr. Twigg-Smith.) The President made clear to Congress that the annexationists were compelled to action by Stevens' landing of troops without the consent of the Government of Hawaii and that his recognition of the provisional government was wrongful. The President informed Congress that the Kingdom of Hawaii was overthrown by an act of war committed by a diplomatic representative of the United States. He made the following specific findings which bear quoting:

'The lawful Government of Hawaii was overthrown without the drawing of a sword or the firing of a shot by a process every step of which, it may safely be asserted, is directly traceable to and dependent for its success upon the agency of the United States acting through its diplomatic and naval representatives.

'But for the landing of the United States forces upon false pretexts respecting the danger to life and property, the Committee would never have exposed themselves to the pains and penalties of treason by undertaking the subversion of the Queen's Government.

'But for the presence of the United States forces in the immediate vicinity and in position to afford all needed protection and support, the Committee would never have proclaimed the provisional government from the steps of the Government building.

'And finally, but for the lawless occupation of Honolulu under false pretexts by the United States forces, and but for Minister Steven's recognition of the provisional government when the United States forces were its sole support and constituted its only military strength, the Queen and her Government would never have yielded to the provisional government, even for a time and for the sole purpose of submitting her case to the enlightened justice of the United States.'

"Upon annexation in 1898, 1.8 million acres, approximately one-third of the land of Hawaii, was acquired by the U.S. Government 'for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Hawaiian Islands for educational and other public purposes.' Since that time every administration has accepted and acknowledged there existed a special relationship between the U.S. Government and the people of Hawaii as to those public lands.

"In January of 1992, during congressional hearings attended by Governor Waihee, the Bush Administration stated that the position of the government was that no trust obligation existed or in fact ever existed to the people of Hawaii concerning those lands. Upon his return to Hawaii the governor established an Ad Hoc Committee on Hawaiian Public Lands composed of members of both houses of the Legislature on a nonpartisan basis. I was honored to serve as chairman of that committee. One of the committee's first acts was to secure the services of one of the largest law firms in Washington, D.C., Arent Fox Kintner Plotkin & Kahn, who currently represents the Government of Puerto Rico and a number of Indian tribes, to analyze the legal and political implications of the Bush Administration's position and to recommend a course of action. Thereafter, working with the law firm, the committee was successful in causing the National Democratic Party Platform Committee to accept a plank in the 1992 Democratic Platform specifically stating that 'the U.S. Government respects its trustee obligations to the inhabitants of Hawaii generally and to Native Hawaiians Hawaii thus became the only state in particular.' mentioned by name in the Democratic Platform. Republican Party was sent the same document, however, remained silent although we urged the inclusion of a similar commitment by the Republican Party.

"The success of the democratic presidential candidate presents a real opportunity to pursue the claims of Hawaii concerning those lands taken almost 100 years ago. The Democratic Platform established by implication an acknowledgement of both the existence of a trust relationship and of liability for breaches of that relationship. We can expect the Clinton Administration to support Hawaii's claims covering that liability.

"Mr. President, I am hoping that our newspapers here in Hawaii would adamantly support our Democratic Party as we pursue these claims to help us create the basis for legitimate action and legal action.

"Mr. President, I just wanted to express my sadness when I read in the paper: 'Overthrow - No Apology Needed.' I think that in the State of Hawaii we are beyond this kind of opala - rubbish - (Senator Solomon displays newspaper article). Thank you very much."

HOUSE COMMUNICATION

On motion by Senator Iwase, seconded by Senator Reed and carried unanimously, the Clerk was authorized to receive the House communication transmitting the House bill relating to the authorization of funds for the expenses of the Legislature prior to 12:00 o'clock midnight. In consequence thereof and subsequent to its recessing at 11:56 o'clock a.m., the Senate took the following action:

Hse. Com. No. 2, transmitting H.B. No. 1, H.D. 1, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on January 25, 1993, was placed on file.

On motion by Senator Iwase, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, H.B. No. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed First Reading by title and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

No. 3 "Senate resolution relating to the adoption of the rules of the senate." $\,$

Offered by: Senators Matsuura, George.

Senator Matsuura then moved that S.R. No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator George.

Senator Mizuguchi then rose to speak in support of the resolution with reservations and stated:

"Mr. President, I support the progress that has been made in updating the rules of the Senate. But it is just that, a measure of progress, and more needs to be done.

"Nine members of this body proposed to you last December 1st an agenda of 23 reforms, including changes to the rules, to make the Senate more responsive, accessible, and accountable to the people.

"Some of our proposals are reflected in the new rules. Others are not, but they should not be foreclosed.

"As the session proceeds to mid-passage, the public will begin to perceive the differences in how the Senate operates and how the House of Representatives operates. If the House lives up to its rules, its new procedures for committee decision-making will be viewed by the public as being more open and accountable than those of the Senate.

"We should hold ourselves open to further changes in committee procedures.

"And you, Mr. President, can make the Senate floor the forum of debate and exchange of ideas that it is in the United States Senate and the senates of many other states.

"We previously brought to your attention that the practice of decking most bills at the deadline has the effect of precluding floor amendments. Senators are cut off from the traditional process of offering proposals on the floor on Third Reading. Consequently, the Senate is weakened as a deliberative body.

"In reviewing the Legislative timetable, amendments may be offered during the first crossover. However, to avoid any misunderstanding, Mr. President, we urge you to secure agreement with the House of Representatives that bills which are amended on the floor do not need to meet the crossover deadlines. This change would strengthen both houses.

"Mr. President, if you move forward on this and other reforms, we will support you in your efforts."

Senator Mizuguchi then asked:

"As a matter of record, Mr. President, may we submit into the Senate Journal the letter to you dated December 1, 1992, that outlines our reform proposals?"

The Chair so ordered and identified the attachment of the letter to Senate President Aki from Senators Blair, Chang, Fernandes Salling, Fukunaga, Graulty, Hagino, Mizuguchi, Solomon and Tanaka, dated December 1, 1992, as Exhibit "I."

Senator Ikeda, in support of the resolution, then said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution.

"Mr. President, I think that when you appointed the Majority Leader and Senator Kobayashi and myself to work on the revisions to the rules we did so in a very deliberative manner. We took into consideration the suggestions from the nine people and most of those suggestions have been incorporated into the rules, where

they were workable. We have agreed to amendments, even up to the last minute. I believe that we have been very open and accommodating. I think that this is a very sound document and one that we can be proud of. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda requested the inclusion of the "Senate Reform Announcement" into the Senate Journal.

The Chair so ordered and identified the attachment as Exhibit "II."

Senator Solomon then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I would like to go on record in support of Senator Mizuguchi's remarks and I want to reassure you that the nine of us stand ready to work towards openness and fairness during the coming days here in the Senate.

"We want to assure you, Mr. President, that we are now ready to move ahead, in all hopes that we can continue dialogue and we can continue to reassure ourselves as well as our constituencies, that by our actions there is indeed openness and fairness here in the Senate. Thank you."

At 5:22 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 5:24 o'clock p.m.

Senator Matsuura, in support of the resolution, stated:

"Mr. President, the changes in Senate rule 21, rule 22 and rule 85, a copy of which is on each Senator's desk, will be substituted for those in the printed copy of the Rules of the Senate that is before us. Therefore, we will be voting on the corrected Rules of the Senate."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, in our rush to provide a copy of the just agreed Senate rules, the changes are attached. For the benefit of all members, the changes will be made and incorporated into the Rules of the Senate. Unless there are strong objections by members of the Senate, the Chair would like to request the adoption of the resolution providing for the adoption of the Senate rules with the changes before us."

Senator Solomon on a point of information inquired:

"Mr. President, as you indicate, you are talking about the changes to the Senate rules, copies of which have been furnished to us, that are going to be incorporated into the document that is before us entitled 'Rules of the Senate'? That is what we are voting on?"

The Chair responded in the affirmative.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, and S.R. No. 3, entitled: "SENATE RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE ADOPTION OF THE RULES OF THE SENATE," was adopted.

At 5:25 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 5:26 o'clock p.m.

Senator Solomon on another point of information inquired:

"Mr. President, could you please inform us as to the members serving on the Ways and Means Committee? It is my understanding that membership on committees are still under negotiation. Could you please read the names of those that are on the Ways and Means Committee? Thank you."

At 5:28 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 5:30 o'clock p.m.

Dear Mr. President:

The people have spoken, and their message is that they want from their government, not business as usual, but change for the better. As a new national administration prepares to take office and redirect the country's course, the time is also propitious for Senate the Hawaii State to make itself responsive, accessible, and accountable to the people we serve.

We have conducted a searching self-examination of the Senate's organization and practices for the purpose of recommending changes to make the Senate a more effective body. In conducting the examination and developing proposals for reform, we have been guided by the following principles:

- The organization and procedures of the Senate should provide for and promote increased meaningful participation by all of its members.
- The process of deliberation on legislative measures should be clearly defined and structured to encourage cooperation and consensus.
- The Senate's business is the public's business, and therefor, its deliberations and processes should be open to full public view and scrutiny.



- . Members of the Senate should be held accountable to high standards of personal conduct.
- Economies and savings in legislative expenses should be sought and realized wherever possible.

Our examination of the Senate's organization and practices against the preceding guiding principles persuade us that the Senate should undertake a number of needed reforms. These reforms are outlined here for your immediate consideration and for subsequent action by the full Senate. The proposals are grouped according to whether they require legislation, change to a Senate rule, agreement between the House and Senate, or can be implemented without formal action.

I. Reforming Requiring Legislation

1. Reduction of Senate budget. The appropriations for the expenses of the Senate in the next fiscal period should be reduced by at least 5% from the current fiscal period.

Such a reduction could save at least \$240,000 and demonstrate that the Senate is willing to share in the burden of budgetary constraints affecting the programs and operations of State government.

II. Amendment of Senate Rules

2. Open committee decision-making and recorded votes. No measure should be recommended for passage unless such action shall have been approved by a majority of the committee in a public meeting. The committee should keep a record of each member's attendance and vote. Such records should be public.

These changes are intended to promote greater accountability of committee chairs and members. Decisions on legislative measures will be made through a formal, open process, and each individual's decisions will be a matter of record.

3. Open caucuses. Party caucuses should be open to the public to the same extent that meetings are open under Chapter 92, HRS, "Public Agency Meetings and Records."

The removal of the veil of secrecy surrounding party caucuses would allay the public's suspicion and apprehension that shady deals are cut behind closed doors. Openness would instill greater public trust in the Senate's deliberations and greater confidence in its actions.

4. Appeals process for referral of bills. There should be a formal appeals process for disagreements regarding referrals of bills to committees. A member disagreeing with the referral of a bill should express the disagreement in writing to the President, setting forth the reasons for the disagreement and the that the member believes would be more referral appropriate. Unless the requested referral is made, the President should respond in writing within four calendar days, excluding holidays and weekends. Copies of both the initial communication and the response should be sent to all affected committee chairs and filed with the Clerk of the Senate. communications should be noted on the calendar and be available to the public. Appeals from the decision of the President may be made to the full Senate any time after the four days have elapsed.

A formal appeals process would bring into the open all disagreements concerning the referral of measures and provide a reasonable process for resolving the disagreements. There would be greater accountability in making referrals and raising objections.

5. Prior concurrence on committee amendments. If a measure is referred consecutively to two or more committees, the committee first named should be the primary committee whose prior concurrence must be obtained as a prerequisite to amendments by subsequent committees. When the chair of a primary committee objects to the consideration of a measure on the grounds that amendments have been made without the primary committee's prior concurrence, the measure should be recommitted for further consideration and resolution by the respective chairs.

The requirement for prior concurrence and its enforcement would reduce the conflict and divisiveness which occur when a committee rewrites, sometimes completely, the first committee's draft. Together with an emphasis on concurrent referral of measures (discussed in a subsequent section), prior concurrence would encourage legislation to be developed by consultation, cooperation and consensus rather than through happenstance and the exercise of expedient political authority.

Appropriation recommendations of subject matter committees. The recommendations of the subject matter committees concerning appropriations in the Bill and Supplemental Appropriations Appropriations Bill for programs under their scope of responsibility should be made in a formal written report signed by members of the committee. Provided that the subject matter committee has observed the expenditure ceiling specified by the Committee on Ways Means, amendments the and to subject committee's appropriation recommendations should be made only with its prior concurrence.

The subject matter committees are in the best position to know what level of funding is needed for the specific programs under their jurisdiction. the other hand, the Committee on Ways and Means has the responsibility to ensure that proposed expenditure line with anticipated resources. levels are in Requiring the subject matter committees to report their budget recommendations on a formal basis and applying prior concurrence for any subsequent amendments would broaden effective participation and advance accountability in the appropriations process.

7. Reporting of Senate expenditures. On a quarterly basis, the Legislative Management Committee should issue a report that identifies expenditures with reasonable particularity, naming the vendors and the products or services being purchased and, where applicable, the office or offices incurring the expenditures. A schedule should be included listing all expenditures for out-of-state travel with information as to the specific senators incurring the expenditures, the purpose and costs of each trip, and identification of reports and supporting information on the public purpose of the trip.

Timely public reports on Senate expenditures would establish a continuing means by which the public can hold the Senate accountable for the use of taxpayer resources and alert members and the public to possible inappropriate or marginal use of funds. Just as Senate business is the people's business, Senate spending should be accountable as the people's money.

8. Notice of hearings and meetings. There should be a requirement of 72-hours notice, excluding weekends and holidays, for committee hearings or decision making sessions.

There have been complaints that interested parties receive notices of hearings and meetings after they are held, thereby depriving them of the opportunity to participate in deliberations. With a modicum of planning by committees, sufficient notice should be provided to the public for all committee deliberations, thereby encouraging full and timely involvement by our citizens.

9. Attendance at sessions. Members of the Senate who are not present for a session should be listed as absent, unless they have contacted the office of the President and explained the reasons for their absence. The reason for a member being excused should be made a part of the record. Members should be permitted to explain an absence at the next session that they attend.

Citizens have a reasonable expectation that the legislators they elect should be on the job all or most of the time. A formal record of session attendance (and reasons for non-attendance) by Senate members would promote individual participation and accountability.

10. High standards of personal conduct. The Legislative Management Committee and the Judiciary Committee should develop a code of conduct to promote and enforce high standards of personal conduct. The code should include safeguards and enforcement against sexual harassment. The membership of the same two committees should convene, as a Senate Ethics Committee, as necessary to investigate complaints filed by members of the general public, legislative staff, or legislators.

The Senate at present has no code of conduct and no established standing mechanism to investigate complaints. We believe that public trust in the Senate will be enhanced by the adoption of high standards of personal conduct and establishing procedures to enforce those standards.

11. Term limits of the President. The term of the President of the Senate should be limited to four consecutive years.

The President of the Senate is the full-time political leader, chief executive officer, operations manager of a major institution of These responsibilities require government. exercise of a large concentration of power authority. To safeguard against abuse which longevity might invite, it would be reasonable to limit the consecutive years that a member can serve as President.

While we recognize the constitutional limitation on our ability to adopt rules which bind a future legislature, we believe that the adoption of a statement of the principle will improve the chance of adherence by future legislatures.

12. <u>Limitation on number of bills and resolutions</u>. To effect economies and reduce the burden on the legislative process, the Senate should limit each member to the introduction of 50 bills and 25 resolutions in the odd-numbered year and 35 bills and 20 resolutions in the even-numbered year.

The President would be exempt from this limitation inasmuch as by longstanding practice, the President introduces legislative measures at the request of the administration. The overall effect of limiting legislative measures would be to reduce the amount of paper work and persuade each member to consider more carefully each measure that the member introduces or offers.

III. Agreement Between the House and Senate

13. Floor amendment of bills. Senators should have the opportunity to offer amendments to bills on the Senate floor for discussion and decision. Senate Rule 51 provides for such amendments, but the practice of decking most bills at the deadline has effectively precluded floor amendments. To resolve this situation, the Senate and House should agree that bills which are amended on the floor do not need to meet the crossover deadlines.

The development of legislation would be improved by allowing every legislator the opportunity to offer amendments to measures before each respective body. Consideration and debate on legislative measures would be vitalized by floor amendments, and every member would have equal standing and stature to shape legislation.

14. <u>Joint interim committees</u>. The Senate and House should convene joint interim committees on major issues which are not resolved at the end of the regular session.

Such joint interim committees would be established pursuant to concurrent resolutions or through agreement by the presiding officers in response to their members. Joint interim committees offer the opportunity to resolve issues and develop legislation in an atmosphere of cooperation and coordination. The result should be consensus and better legislation.

15. The mandatory recess during sessions. There should be no committee hearings during the recess of not less than five days mandated by the State Constitution for each regular session.

The 1978 Constitutional Convention proposed the mandatory recess as a hiatus from normal legislative business, in order for the public to review bills that were introduced and for legislators to be in contact with their constituencies and prepare for the remainder of the session. This intention has been frustrated by the practice of conducting committee business during the recess. The planning of schedules should enable committees to conduct their work without intruding into the recess.

16. <u>Unified print shop</u>. The Senate and House should form an ad hoc committee to examine the feasibility of establishing a unified print shop when the Legislature returns to the permanent Capitol.

The cost effectiveness of the operation of separate print shops would be analyzed to determine whether consolidation and modernization would meet the Legislature's needs at a lower cost.

17. <u>Public outreach</u>. The Senate and House legislative management committees should work jointly in the interim, as well as during the sessions, to increase public access and participation in the legislative process.

Among the outreach measures the committee should consider are broader access to the Legislature's ACCESS systems, televised legislative sessions and committee hearings, use of radio and television callin programs to highlight legislative issues and community workshops and speakers on the legislative process.

IV. Reforms Not Requiring Formal Action

18. Concurrent referrals. Where more than one committee is deemed to have jurisdiction over a legislative measure, the President should refer the measure concurrently, rather than consecutively, to the committees.

Concurrent referrals to the committees involved would require the committees to work cooperatively and simultaneously to develop the legislation. The result should be more harmonious deliberations and broader consensus.

19. <u>News media relations</u>. The President should schedule regular, at least weekly, press conferences.

For those conferences, members of the Senate should submit suggestions of subjects for the President to discuss, and at the President's discretion, members may be invited to participate in the conferences. The aim is to bring to the public matters of importance which might otherwise be overlooked and to enable the news media to raise questions on matters which might otherwise be avoided.

20. <u>Staff training.</u> There should be regular, ongoing training for the staff both before and during session.

Current staff training is not adequate. Confidence in the understanding of legislative routine and performance of basic and necessary tasks would be enhanced through more systematic staff orientation and training. Staff support can also be buttressed by developing a list of volunteer experts who are available to discuss issues and answer questions on a variety of topics.

21. <u>Improvements to the Legislature's data</u>
systems. The Legislative Management Committee should increase public and internal access to information accessible through the Senate's technology resources.

The growing use of computer and telecommunications technology provides for timely, relevant access to legislative information and national or international databases that can enhance the quality of legislation and research developed by the Senate.

22. <u>Budget conference</u>. The chairs of the Committees on Ways and Means and Finance and their staffs should make the budget conferences more accessible and understandable to the public and legislators.

Steps to enlighten budget conference proceedings should include such improvements as the following: (1) all members of the Legislature should have their own copies of the budget worksheets prior to the convening of the budget conference; (2) copies of the worksheets should be available to the news and public throughout the conference; and (3) an overhead display should be employed to allow members of the public to follow the progress on the reconciliation of the respective positions of the House and Senate.

23. <u>Neighbor island liaison offices.</u> The Legislative Management Committee should work with the neighbor island senators to determine the feasibility of assigning a portion of the staffing allocation to operate a liaison office on the senators' home islands for the benefit of their constituents.

Such liaison offices could operate out of available state office space or in conjunction with satellite state office facilities, during such times as the Legislature is in session. Personal contact with the senator's liaison would likely encourage and facilitate the participation of neighbor islands in the legislative process.

We propose the foregoing reforms with the objectives of strengthening the Senate, promoting trust in the Legislature, and advancing the public's interest. We are prepared to cooperate with you and our colleagues to implement these reforms and to make the Senate a better institution to serve the people of Hawaii.

SENATE REFORM ANNOUNCEMENT

By Senate President James Aki

Fourteen years ago, former Senate President Richard Wong changed the operational structure of the Senate by delegating to committee chairs much of the control that had previously been consolidated in the Office of the President. At the time, this was a welcome change that had the effect of opening up the process. Over the years, however, many of us have come to recognize that a system which vests control in committee chairs is itself flawed and must be improved.

Today I am pleased to announce a number of sweeping policy and procedural changes that will make the Senate more publicly responsible, open, and democratic than ever before. Among these changes are:

- (1) A policy that favors public hearings on controversial issues. No longer can a committee chair unilaterally prevent a bill from having a public hearing. Under our new rules, a majority of committee members will be able to appeal to the majority caucus any decision by a chair to hold a bill in committee;
- (2) Substantial strengthening of the policy of prior concurrence under the rules, so that prior referral committee chairs will have meaningful authority as to the contents of bills that have gone on to a second or third committee;
- (3) A two-level process by means of which referrals of bills may be appealed to the President initially, then to a committee comprised of the Senate leadership;
- (4) A sexual harassment policy addressed to Senators and Senate employees;
- (5) A policy discouraging nepotism;
- (6) An out of state travel policy that generally prohibits first class flying and personal use of frequent flyer mileage credits; and
- (7) Opportunity for greater public access to information about Senate business, including a contemplated agreement with Olelo cable television to televise certain proceedings, the inclusion of helpful information on public hearing agendas, and timely feedback on the disposition of bills.

It is my personal pledge to do everything within my power to ensure that the Senate will operate as an open and democratic

body in which consensus and majority rule will prevail. "Business as usual" is not my style and it will not be the Senate's style.

I urge the people of Hawaii to take this opportunity to participate with me in building a more responsive and responsible Senate. Without public participation, the reforms we have made can have no meaningful effect. After all, these reforms were made only because we believe that they will serve the best interests of the people of this State.

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, was called to order at 10:08 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Joseph Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then presented the Honorable John Waihee, Governor of Hawaii, to the members of the Seventeenth Legislature.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"President Aki, Speaker Souki, members of the Seventeenth Legislature, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen:

"I am honored to be here today for my seventh state of the state address. While the years have passed quickly, I can't help but think that January 1987 was a long time ago.

"Gone are the days of huge budget surpluses, of picking and choosing from a generous menu of government services, and of an economy that seemed to expand without end.

"My friends, we have entered a new era.

"We saw it during the presidential campaign, as the electorate -- the generation 'who hated politics' -- resolved to once again claim ownership of the American political process.

"We saw it here at home where our people's call for reform and change was reflected in the words of President Aki and Speaker Souki on opening day.

"And we saw it in the quest for sovereignty by native Hawaiians in their efforts to assume greater responsibility over their own future.

"The changes are evident all around us.

"But so are the opportunities for re-inventing, reshaping and re-focusing government.

"That's why I have to chuckle when political pundits talk about 1994 and about this administration closing up shop.

"The truth is, we cannot afford to talk about 'closure' and wrapping things up, because the business of

government is never finished. And we have got business at hand.

"That's what these changes, this current revolution in American politics, are all about: The desire to break the mold and to grab the future with our own hands and to shape it to conform to our dreams and our hopes.

"One of our first jobs is to stimulate our economy. With the cumulative impact of the national recession, the deterioration of the sugar industry, and the devastation of Hurricane Iniki, our response must be courageous and extraordinary.

"Last year, I announced the start of an accelerated capital improvement program. By expediting 1.9 billion dollars worth of projects authorized by you, we blunted and stabilized the downturn in our construction industry.

"This year, we've got to get tourism, our most powerful economic engine, up and running again.

"Travel from Asia and Europe is up, while our Mainland traffic is down -- by nearly 13 percent. Of all of our new markets, Europe offers bright potential. There is no reason why we should not be able to double the number of European visitors by 1994.

"We need to promote and promote aggressively -- to tap these new markets and to re-introduce Hawaii to markets that have traditionally been strong for us.

"Therefore, I'm asking for your continued support of our tourism marketing efforts, through an increase in the annual budget from 21 to 30.5 million dollars.

"The lack of a convention center is not helping our efforts.

"The Convention Center Authority has submitted a list of sites to you for your consideration. I strongly encourage you to immediately address the issues in this session so that construction can begin as early as 1994.

"Though tourism often dominates the spotlight, Hawaii pulsates with economic vitality. And you and I have worked hard together to foster this diversification.

"This year, we will break ground for the Sand Island Marine Education and Training Center, part of our overall Honolulu Waterfront Master Plan.

"We've fostered business development in film production, travel industry management, ocean sciences, Hawaii-grown or manufactured products, and nationally televised sporting events.

"Our renewed five-year Pro Bowl commitment and the recently announced Hawaii Sumo Tournament add to an important economic niche for world-class sports and exhibitions.

"By the way, how about Chad Rowan -- the first 'yokozuna' from Waimanalo in the history of the world.

"It's no secret that in tough times, the demand for government services escalates.

"But just as every family in Hawaii struggles to live within its means, our state government must do the same. We must create new ways to do more with less.

"Last fall, every state department was directed to streamline.

"That means planning better, working smarter, and delivering greater results from committed resources.

"In December, I submitted a budget and indicated that four major issues -- health, education, tourism and Hawaiian affairs -- warranted further discussion and funding.

"I am also submitting a package of program adjustments and revenue enhancements -- things not normally included in the budget. Here's the bottom line: If you accept our package in its entirety, we should be able to do it all and have a 70 million dollar balance at the end.

"We must also initiate action to cut government waste. Sometimes in pursuit of lofty goals, it seems unglamorous to concentrate on tidying up the shop. But when we are increasing government services on a fixed, zero-growth budget, cutting waste is a necessity.

"In fact, why not give our own workers and citizens a chance to tell us where it exists.

"One idea, which I stole from my fellow governor, Ann Richards, is a successful program, where citizens call in -- anonymously if desired -- to report on government waste.

"In Texas, the 'hotline' generated suggestions saving more than 200 million dollars just in the first few days. Ultimately, the program saved 1.9 billion dollars.

"Of course, Texas has a much larger budget and deficit than we do, but if they can accomplish such a feat, we can make it work in Hawaii. Therefore, we are implementing our own 'Project Hotline' and it will be operational by mid-February.

"No one in or out of government is happy with our current procurement setup.

"Therefore, I will be sending to you a proposal to substantially overhaul major provisions of the state's procurement law with two basic goals.

"First, we need to make the process open, accountable and fair. That's why we will be asking you to enact reforms in policy, implementation, and enforcement:

- -- Our policy must be consistent for every level and every branch of government.
- -- We must match the levels of expenditures with the kind of controls and guidelines they warrant.
- We must insist on uniform standards of enforcement utilizing a new office of an inspector general.

"Second, these reforms must allow our government employees to do their jobs more efficiently. Many are struggling within today's system.

"Let me give you an example. Not long ago, I was at the Kona Hospital to see how renovations of the facilities were going.

"While visiting the new operating room, one of the doctors noted that the use of the room was delayed for seven months after its completion because of the complex bidding process to purchase lighting.

"The doctor turned to me and said, 'You know, if I did it myself, we would have been using the operating room seven months earlier.' "More compassion, not profit, is the bottom line for government when it needs to fulfill its responsibilities, and this we need to do, with understanding and fairness.

"In my first State of the State, education was a top priority, and you and I have been consistent ever since.

"Last summer, we created an ad hoc committee cochaired by Senator Mike McCartney and Representative David Ige. And what this committee discovered is that great things have and are being done in our schools. In fact, we are currently undergoing some of the most extensive educational reforms in the country.

"Yet four things appear to be missing to make these reforms truly work.

"First, we discovered that despite a lot of activity, most people were unable to relate these activities to our educational and reform goals. If we are going to succeed with educational reform, we need more than a catalog of objectives. We need a united crusade.

"Therefore, Mike, David and I along with our DOE and private sector partners are inviting the leaders of Hawaii back -- back to the classroom for a day in February -- to learn what contemporary education is all about.

"Second, we must develop a comprehensive, coordinated system of early childhood education and care by the year 2000. That's why the ongoing work of the Early Childhood Project is so important.

"The third missing ingredient is the lack of a results-driven system. The Commission on Performance Standards is critical to the overall success of our reforms. Ultimately, it will be the yardstick by which we measure the success of educational reform.

"Fourth, we must have the right facilities. To do so, we must: spend wiser, leverage existing dollars, and explore alternate sources of funding.

"To get this started, I propose we lift the drop-dead date on the facilities special fund, to ensure a permanent, open-ended commitment to the quality of our school facilities.

"Hawaii's health care system is a role model for much of the nation. But it is not yet the seamless garment that will protect all of our citizens at reasonable costs. Our limitations are clearly presented by the report of the Blue Ribbon Panel jointly commissioned by you and me.

"The panel's report presents a wealth of sound and bold ideas, and we will be submitting to you a number of initiatives.

"One of the most important of these is the creation of a Hawaii Health Care Commission which will be a joint public/private task force designed:

- to control health care costs while maintaining high quality and attaining universal access; and
- -- to guarantee the community rating on health care coverage for all of Hawaii's small businesses.

"The need to meet our long-term care challenge is still facing us -- and so is the problem we confronted last year: How can we work out the federal relationship that penalizes Hawaii for taking the lead?

"We have a classical 'Catch-22' here. Federal approval is necessary to reallocate Medicaid funds to help finance our program. But we are also told that we can't get such approval unless we set up the program first.

"I propose that we move forward by putting a structure in place, whose authority would be activated when you vote to fund it. In this way, we can go after the federal assurances that we need, while preparing for a wellcoordinated startup.

"Last year, I spoke of the Medicaid, 'Pacman' that was devouring our resources. One reason is that Hawaii is on the short end of an unfair federal compensation system.

"On one hand, the current federal formula, which sets eligibility for Medicaid, takes into account our higher cost of living. On the other hand, the formula that establishes the amount of federal matching funds does not.

"In other words, while more of our families rightfully qualify, we are not receiving federal dollars to support that added burden.

"We are seeking federal legislation to correct this inequity. If successful, we will be able to adjust our share of federal funds from 50 percent to more than 60 percent.

"Increasing federal support is precisely the goal of our proposal to implement a provider tax on hospitals and long-term care facilities. The revenue generated from the provider tax will enable the Medicaid program to earn a larger share of federal matching funds without causing undue hardships on our providers.

"At the same time, we propose to move on two other fronts:

"First, we intend to combine Medicaid, the State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) and the state's general assistance programs. This will provide a standardized benefits package, a fairer allocation to our Medicaid users, and expand coverage for SHIP.

"Second, we will incorporate a managed care system, which will move closer to ensuring equitable, quality health care, at less cost, to a greater number of people.

"To move us in this new direction, we are proposing a federal waiver to begin by July 1, 1993, as a national demonstration project.

"The physical health of Hawaii's people is important, but so is their emotional health. On any given day, approximately 1,400 of Hawaii's kids are in the state's care. These are children who could be home if their families had a little help.

"That's why I am so pleased to announced the start of the 'Families Together Initiative' program. It was developed with the help of the National Governors' Association, nine of our executive agencies, the Family Court and the private sector. It is truly a model of cooperation.

"These agencies will pool resources and leverage federal dollars to make intensive, home-based services available to families at risk of losing their children.

"I also want to thank all of you for your continued support of Hawaii's mental health system. Our new State Hospital is a serene and supportive place. new psychiatric units at Hilo Hospital and at Maui Memorial Hospital.

"But we cannot let up. We must continue toward full accreditation of our psychiatric hospitals and community mental health centers. To do this, I ask your support for an additional 6.6 million dollars for care and treatment of children and adolescents who are at risk.

"Finally, I am recommending an additional 1.1 million dollars for each year of the biennium to help victims of domestic violence.

"Housing for our families has and will continue to be a high priority. In the last few years, we together jumpstarted housing production in Hawaii with numerous innovative programs.

"The action taken has paid off. Together with private sector partners, we've completed more than 17,000 units over the last four years.

"That is why we must keep our initiatives on track. To do that, I will be asking you to extend Act 15 -- to expedite the development approval process for affordable housing.

"I'm gratified by President Aki's and Speaker Souki's commitment to help create affordable rental housing. Fifty percent of a proposed increase in the conveyance tax, if approved by you, will add both momentum and additional money for rental units.

"Through HFDC, we have provided land, zoning, and infrastructure -- the foundations for the private sector to move in and begin to produce affordable homes. We should accelerate these public/private transactions, selling state lands designated for housing directly to the private sector.

"This will not only stimulate the private sector to develop many more affordable units, but it will free up resources to launch new developments.

"In the same spirit of partnership, we are proposing to develop a state office building at Kapolei. Campbell Estate would build it, and the state would lease it.

"This will propel Kapolei closer toward its destiny as a true second city. And it will support our continuing efforts to decentralize government offices from the Capitol District, bringing both jobs and government services closer to where our people live.

"One of the biggest potential obstacles facing our families' ability to purchase homes is the availability of homeowner's insurance.

"The future of homeowner's insurance in our state has become cloudier for two reasons:

"First, in the eyes of the insurance industry, Hawaii is not the same risk environment it was before Iniki. We are now placed in the category of areas prone to violent storms.

"Second, insurance companies, themselves, are faced with severe shortage of re-insurance, that is, the kind of insurance an insurance company buys to reduce its risk.

"This shortfall in the supply of insurance is national in scope. It will affect some 70,000 homeowners in Hawaii who will seek to renew policies over the course of the next 12 months. I am told we can all expect substantial increases in what we pay for insurance.

"Resolving the property insurance problem will, in some ways, be like reducing the nation's budget deficit: it will take time, it will hurt, but it must be done.

"Consequently, we are taking the following actions:

- We are providing short-term relief by expanding the Hawaii Property Insurance Association coverage to include all islands.
- We have triggered the mechanism for payment of all HIG subsidiary claims and are working to put the surviving HIG back into the market.
- -- We are working with financial institutions and the lending industry to implement short- and long-term solutions to minimize the impact on lenders and on the mortgage market.
- We are communicating directly with the international re-insurance market to re-kindle their interest in Hawaii.
- -- We are working with other state, federal and industry officials to create a natural disaster insurance program on the federal level, similar to the flood insurance program.

"And the Insurance Commissioner has appointed a task force to seek long-term solutions, including the creation of a windstorm pool to cover future hurricane damage.

"As we proceed to work through these very complex issues, we will do so with an eye to minimizing the burden on each individual rate payer, insisting that past obligations be honored, and working toward sound long-term solutions.

"In recent years, we have made great progress toward improving conditions at the Oahu Community Correctional Center and the Women's Community Correctional Center.

"One of the most persistent concerns has been overcrowding. Therefore, I will be submitting a bill to establish a Corrections Population Management Commission.

"This commission will recommend initiatives relating to sentencing policies and practices; pre-trial services and bail programs; probation, parole and intermediate punishment programs; case management strategies; prison construction; and setting population caps.

"It costs us over 100,000 dollars to build each medium security bed, and approximately 80 dollars per day to keep one prisoner there. While those who are violent or repeat offenders require secure incarceration, for many offenders a secure prison is not necessary. We will more aggressively pursue alternatives to incarceration.

"One of our most sacred trusts is the stewardship of our environment. Our job is two-fold:

"First, we must provide a means for people to learn about it, experience it, without destroying or abusing it.

"Last November, proud of its beauty, we opened the first 30 acres of the Kakaako Waterfront Park. With your support, we will add an additional 40 acres, including an array of cultural and educational centers.

"Second, we must protect our environmental resources from exploitation and neglect.

"Two years ago, we took action to make it possible for private landholders and the state to jointly manage important private and public reserves. "To secure permanent funding for these programs, I propose that we dedicate the remaining 50 percent of the increase in the conveyance tax I mentioned earlier.

"In addition to our conservation efforts, we are focusing resources on real rather than perceived risks to our environment. Too frequently Congress mandates programs with little or no money. Too often budgets are shaped more by the last opinion poll than by scientific assessment of risk.

"So I have requested the Department of Health to develop a strategic plan to identify problems which pose the greatest environmental or public health threats, and then to implement a program to address those risks.

"At the same time, I am proposing new funding mechanisms based on the principle that the 'polluter pays.' The funds generated will be used to support recycling, water quality monitoring, environmental education, and pollution prevention programs.

"A few years ago, I stood at the Bishop Museum, reacquainting myself with the depiction of the struggles of plantation contract workers. But in the midst of rare photographs, what took my breath away was a chart.

"There, marching across the wall, black lines followed the growth of the various ethnic groups in Hawaii. Black lines that increased as more Caucasians, Japanese, Filipinos, Chinese and others came to our islands, and flourished.

"A single red line represented Hawaiians. And this red line, so high on the chart in the early years, diminished, grew smaller, until it almost disappeared.

"As I followed the red line, the black lines, I thought of the changes that had occurred: of the economic upheavals, the imported diseases and the thousands that died; of the political chicanery that stole a nation.

"More than any history book, those lines made time stand still. My eyes filled first with sadness -- then surged with pride. For in spite all of the trauma that had been inflicted on the Hawaiian people, we had endured.

"And so in 1993, we celebrate the strength of the Hawaiian people, who have endured for 100 years, against all odds.

"1993 is a year of recognition, commemoration, and renewal of the longstanding quest for sovereignty.

"It is also a year that will test the foundation and our commitment to justice, tolerance and change. Having overcome disease, politics and greed, we -- Hawaiians and non-Hawaiians alike -- could still lose the battle to intolerance, ignorance and prejudice.

"In 1917, Queen Lili'uokalani wrote:

'I could not turn back the time for the political change, but there is still time to save our heritage. You must remember never to cease to act because you fear you may fail. The way to lose any earthly kingdom is to be inflexible, intolerant and prejudicial. Another way is to be too flexible, tolerant of too many wrongs and without judgement at all. It is a razor's edge. It is the width of pili grass.'

"My friends, we are on a razor's edge. We are an island community, and it is impossible to turn our backs on the injustices visited to our host culture, who are now one in five among us.

"As citizens of Hawaii and of the United States of America, it is only right that we expect the injustices to be corrected and reparations made.

"The challenge before all of us, is how to right the wrong and re-create sovereignty in our contemporary multicultural, island society.

"I call your attention to the Focus section of last Sunday's paper. The headline reads: 'Overthrow: No apology needed.'

"Well, you can own a newspaper but you cannot own history, and an apology is the least that needs to be done.

"Having said that, I would also add that I agree with Mr. Twigg-Smith on one important point, and that is that history is not as important as what we do today.

"Therefore, I am asking you today to move beyond the discussion.

"First, I ask you to join me in aggressively seeking political recognition from the federal government for Hawaiians as a native people, just as all other native people throughout America are so recognized.

"Second, the state must continue to cleanup, uphold, and transition our own trust responsibilities.

"We have made significant progress in recognizing past breaches and fulfilling broken promises. Last year, you authorized payment for the public's past use of Hawaiian Home Lands. This year, we commit to resolving other claims, especially illegal alienations of home lands. We will vigorously press our charges of federal breaches -- this time, with a more sympathetic federal administration.

"We also have a proposal to pay our debt to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs for its share of the ceded land revenues, bringing to closure 12 years of dispute.

"Both the federal and state governments have a rare second chance to do what is right for Kaho'olawe --which will soon be returned to us. I propose we set aside Kaho'olawe as a cultural reserve, to be healed and used only for those purposes that are consistent with the island's history and well-being. In this endeavor, I call upon the Protect Kaho'olawe Ohana to continue their role as stewards. I further ask that we declare our intention to transfer Kaho'olawe to the Hawaiian nation, once it is formed.

"Third, we can and must take the step and support the sovereignty of native Hawaiians, without imposing a particular form or body.

"Across America, native governments and states govern side-by-side. But too often in the past, these native governments were imposed upon states by the federal government, engendering hundreds of years of distrust and separation.

"We are island people. Our many cultures, histories and common geography cry for a different solution. Why not take that first step?

"In this state, we have six sovereign entities -- the federal government, the state, and the four counties coexist, side-by-side. We govern in partnership, by law, and by social agreement.

"We are a state, not a national government. We cannot confer sovereignty. But we can embrace self-determination.

"To what entity should the state turn over management of Hawaiian Home Lands? How do we separate the Office of Hawaiian Affairs from the state? Who should choose the leader, or leaders that will guide this entity? How do we remove the divisiveness of the blood quantum while protecting the rights of native Hawaiians? These and a host of other questions should be answered by the people who are most affected. That is the essence of self-determination.

"So I call upon you to support a proposal by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs to convene a Hawaiian congress. For all Hawaiians to elect their representatives, and to meet in convention.

"To talk, argue, deliberate and ask and answer the hard questions. And upon conclusion and ratification by Hawaiian voters, to petition me and you, the Legislature, who will in turn petition the citizens of Hawaii thru passage of laws and constitutional amendments.

"My friends, we have an opportunity to improve our entire society. By making Hawaiians whole, we make our entire society whole -- we enrich the life of the land for all of us.

"In conclusion, let us reflect on the words of the Inaugural Poet Maya Angelou:

'History, despite its wrenching pain, Cannot be unlived, But if faced with courage, Need not be lived again.

Lift up your eyes upon this day breaking for you. Give birth again
To the dream.'

"Thank you."

Senate President Aki then rose to state:

"Governor Waihee, thank you very much for your very inspiring State of the State address this morning. You have given us your thoughts and ideas on the important issues that we are faced with today. We all know that this is a time of great challenge and great opportunity for Hawaii. This Legislature will be hard-working and realistic. We are fully cognizant of the difficult and complex issues before us and the thousands of families and businesses struggling to survive an economy that is distressed at the moment.

"We have no illusions about how difficult our task will be. It will require that we pass a fierce test of our resolve.

"Governor, all the members of this legislative body stand ready to help shape a special place for the people of Hawaii. With a spirit of cooperation, the desire to work by consensus, and with a commitment to working together, we can face the tough challenges before us and openly seek workable solutions to the problems and issues brought before the Legislature.

"Governor, let's do it! Let's give Hawaii the leadership it deserves and let's do it now.

"Governor, again, thank you. And to all of you here today, thank you very much for coming and God Bless You All!

At 10:53 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

EIGHTH DAY

Friday, January 29, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Hannah Mary Carter, Daughters of St. Paul, Catholic Diocese, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Seventh Day.

ORDER OF THE DAY

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that H.B. No. 1, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator B. Kobayashi.

Senator Hagino rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

"First of all, I would like to commend the chair of the Ways and Means Committee for her part in assuring a very sound budget on the part of the Senate. In previous years, when I served as chair of the Legislative Management Committee, the easiest thing was to go along with the House and I apologize for that effort. I say it because I know it is not easy to hold a zero line budget when another House is saying that it needs the money for staff, so, I would really like to commend the chair of Ways and Means for her part in the budget.

"Mr. President, I support the bill with the assurance that we will seek additional savings, if possible, and the result in savings will lapse into the general fund to meet other public and urgent statewide program needs. During our legislative hearings, the legislative agencies came to us and stated that they are holding a zero line budget. They are not seeking any increases in their budgets so I, again, commend the chair of Ways and Means for also doing it for the Senate.

"In previous years, we have returned hundreds of thousands of dollars back and, I understand, in the last fiscal year that just ended, we have returned over \$335,000.00. I am hoping that we will continue this frugality and also look for other means to save our money. In this respect, Mr. President, I will be supporting the bill."

Senator Blair also rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the passage of the bill but only out of necessity. The staff has been hired and must be paid, if we are to discharge our constitutional responsibility. The sixty-day clock is running and, in fact, almost 15 percent of the session is over. As the session progresses, however, we will be reminded of this bill when we increase the tax burden on our citizens while reducing the services that we provide to them. We will probably be called hypocrites for asking others to make sacrifices after isolating ourselves from inconveniences. And hypocrites we are, for we begin this session with generosity towards ourselves. Admittedly,

more generosity towards the House than towards the Senate.

"Although our zero growth budget on the Senate side looks good in relative terms, we can do so painlessly because we've run a surplus in previous years. We are really not engaging in any sacrifice, even on the Senate side, and I concur with the previous speaker that we should lapse funds as we lapsed the \$335,000.00 in Act 1 of 1991.

"And while I don't wish to appear to be too selfrighteous with respect to the House budget, after a dozen years in the House and six in the Senate, I believe that the House is even more in need of fiscal restraint than we are. It defies my sense of logic to say that the House needs to spend so much more than the Senate. Each half of the bicameral legislature represents the same number of constituents; each half works on the same issues; each legislative product moves through both houses. The only logical difference that I can see between the appropriate funding of the House and of the Senate is the additional salary for 26 members of the House. In terms of staffing, there should be parity between the House and Senate. An analogy would be an assembly line for cars. They're one half of the assembly line; we're the other half. They need the same number of staff, it would seem to me, that we do, since the same number of cars are going to go all the way through the system.

"Sadly, however, our historical response to the House's profligacy has been to seek parity which, in fact, has only compounded the problem and given us the surpluses which we rollover or give back depending on circumstances.

"I am thankful that this year we have taken the first step by not asking for parity. I think that's wonderful. Hopefully, we will take a second step, which is to establish accountability. We can do so by opening our books to public scrutiny and demanding that the House do the same, because sunlight is a wonderful disinfectant for what ails this body and the House.

"I will be voting 'yes' with reluctance, Mr. President. In doing so, I ask you and Senator Bert Kobayashi, the chair of the Legislative Management Committee, to commit yourselves to producing and publishing a monthly report of spending. Parenthetically, I believe the House has been doing that for years. The report should be adequately detailed so as to be truly informative and not merely summary. For example, it should allow office-byoffice comparisons. The underlying documentation, the invoices, the cancelled checks must also be freely available. I think once the sunlight falls on the situation, corrective action is inevitable. If you do that, Mr. President, you will have my gratitude. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this measure.

"As one of the newest members who have come to the Senate from the House, I feel that I must rise to speak somewhat in defense of the House and also to commend the Senate for the position it has taken on maintaining a zero percent growth budget. I hope that the House's recent adoption of the administrative and financial manual, which was contained and attached to House Resolution 6, will serve as some assurance to the Senate that the House is ready to adopt prudent fiscal

management and that combined with the sound prudent fiscal policies adopted by the Senate that both houses will be able to go forward with a very solid financial plan for the biennium before us.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator A. Kobayashi added her support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill. I would like to thank the Senator from Wahiawa-Waialua for his remarks and would like to thank all my colleagues who gave advice and moral support while we were negotiating with the House. I would like to assure the Senator from Maui that we will try to achieve parity. We are in discussion and will be certainly working on better guidelines, better accountability, parity for all the staff, all of whom are hardworking and put in a lot of overtime, and the words 'overtime pay' is missing from this building. No one ever gets overtime pay -- none of us. The least we can do is pay everyone in a timely fashion and that's why I urge a quick and positive response to this bill. Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"Members of the Senate, the one day delay was worthwhile. We did talk to members of the House leadership. For the Senators who did raise questions about the legislative budget, we do intend to pursue your concerns. The House has indicated that they are willing to meet with their leadership to discuss our concerns so that we can achieve some kind of accountability in both the House and the Senate."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Solomon then rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, the editorial page of the Star-Bulletin on February 3, Wednesday, advanced the idea of Representative Ron Menor to kill two birds with one stone, i.e., build a prison in Hamakua which would improve the problem of unemployment caused by the decline of sugar production and fulfill the need for additional prison facilities.

"I sincerely thank Representative Menor for sympathizing with the plight of the Hamakua residents.

"Public Safety Director George Sumner said that he liked Rep. Menor's idea and pointed out that instead of expanding Kulani Correctional Facility, which is isolated, it would be better to have a prison as part of a community such as in Hamakua.

"However, Mr. President, the important point here is to find a location where the neighbors would accept such a facility and that considerable input from the residents is imperative in site selection. A prison is a permanent structure and although it will help the unemployment situation immediately, we must also think of the long term social and economic impact on the community, presently there in Hamakua.

"I feel that any solution that will help the Hamakua Coast should be considered as long as it is agreeable with the local residents.

"At this time, Mr. President, I urge our Public Safety and Corrections Committee chair to be sure that if he does consider such a program that he also include the input of the community there on the Hamakua Coast. Thank you."

Senator Koki responded as follows:

"Mr. President, on the same topic as the previous speaker, I went to the Big Island yesterday and toured all of their facilities. One of the things that Director Sumner was very clear on was to be sure to bring about the collective input of the community. We also invited some of the Hawaii council people to tour the facilities. I think we are going to have a type of input that is going to be beneficial to the community as a whole. Thank you."

Senator Solomon then said:

"Mr. President, again on a point of personal privilege, although I realize that a point of personal privilege is not to be used as a forum for debate, I feel compelled to make a response. First, I want to thank the chairman for taking collective input into consideration, however, Mr. President, I think it's equally important that the chairman should at least have the courtesy to notify the Senator representing the district, which is myself, before any decisions are made. I'm hoping that this courtesy will be extended as we proceed with our deliberations here this session. I'm not a member of the Corrections Committee, I feel that an issue such as this magnitude and the kind of long term impact on the existing communities need to be further discussed not only in regards to myself but should include all of the Big Island legislators, both the House and the Senate. Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"Senator Solomon, the Chair would like to encourage all members of the Senate, especially the respective committee chairs, to consult with members of districts that are affected. Whenever you are proposing any kind of hearings or meetings, it would be best if the chairs would make it a point to consult with members of the districts that are affected. That is a good point, Senator Solomon."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege.

"In the interest of good communication within this body, it might be wise for all Senators to reconsider decisions relative to not sitting on committees chaired by Republicans."

At 11:41 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:43 o'clock a.m.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"In this morning's paper I was very happy to see that the family leave bill passed and thanks to many here that worked hard for that, among them Senator Tungpalan and Senator Mizuguchi.

"However, when I turned to the back of Section A, there was a very disturbing article and it says, 'Equality for women? In 1,000 years, U.N. says. It will take nearly 1,000 years for women to gain the same economic and political clout as men if current trends continue, a U.N. report predicted yesterday.'

"This is just so depressing and so upsetting. I'm glad that here in Hawaii we're slowly moving forward and I look forward to the day, which will be soon, that there will be three women on the supreme court. I look forward to the day, which will be soon, that the men in the Legislature will be scrambling around trying to form a men's caucus just to get their ideas across. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, as a follow-up to the previous speaker, I look forward to the day, which may be soon, that we have a woman who is president of the Senate." (Laughter!)

Senator Matsuura interjected:

"Mr. President, do you know the song 'That'll be the Day?'" (More laughter!)

Senator Chang added:

"Mr. President, I remember the urging of the Senator from Kahaluu that Friday should be a happy day, so to make the distaff members of the Senate happy, may I, accordingly, scramble to form a men's caucus, starting today?"

Senator Tungpalan then said:

"I'm happy, Mr. President, that at least we have one assistant majority leader who is a woman and if the majority leader persists in his comments about women, perhaps, one day we will be able to share the position that he now has." (More laughter!)

Senator Chang added:

"Mr. President, I have to announce an emergency meeting of the newly formed men's caucus immediately after the session." (More laughter!)

The Chair then said:

"I wish to announce to all of the members that I am very happy being the president."

Senator Solomon then rose to state:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege and putting all laughing matters aside, I think that the comments that were made previously by the Ways and Means chair should be taken seriously. I think it's a very sad state of affairs when a country such as ours that has its rudiments in the spirit of democracy, civil justice as well as human rights issues, that when a newspaper has the audacity to print an article that puts down women ... when the female population in this country outnumbers the male population as well as majority of the votes ... I know in this state -- 60 percent of the voting population here are females. I think it behooves the leadership in this body to take the matter seriously and to take the remarks of female senators to heart. Being a native Hawaiian, in our culture men and women were treated equally. So I have a difficult time understanding these kinds of Western-Euro-American-Asian concepts. bottom line is that we serve in the Legislature here in Hawaii and that we have respect for diverse cultural backgrounds and ethnicity ... the respect for native rights and, definitely, the respect for women's rights. So I'd like to encourage you, Mr. President, to consider and to take all of these matters into very serious consideration, and as we move forward during our deliberations this session that in the back of our minds that we always have

a sense of equality. It should go beyond gender ... it really is a civil rights and human rights issue.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I concur with the previous speakers in terms of the quality of life that the women of our nation and of the world have accomplished. I, myself, am a recipient of that kind of help. As a fifth-grader I could not read and write, and it was a woman who taught me how to read and write keeping me after school everyday. That same teacher also taught Dr. Joyce Tsunoda to learn to read and write and she was also kept after school everyday. I have very great respect and gratitude for all the women including my mother who have played major roles in my life. I can't remember too many men making very significant contributions to my life but I can recall many women who have.

"I remember a woman from Tibet named Mrs. Taring who took care of orphaned Tibetian children who had moved to India. She corralled these orphans, fed, housed and educated them. Needless to say, I have very great respect for the women who have played major roles in the peace and harmony of this world. Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would also like to remind all members that in a speech just the other evening the Chair dedicated this session to the memory of Thurgood Marshall who exemplifies all of the civil rights issues we've achieved in the past few years. I certainly hope that the members of the Senate will support the Chair in my efforts to make our Senate more open and more cooperative by having all of us working together. Thank you very much."

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Ikeda, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Monday, February 8, 1993.

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator Levin rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"About a dozen years ago, the people of Hawaii were informed that a new, clean source of energy was about to bless our state. Geothermal energy had proven itself around the world and we were now going to tap our resource under the Puna District and meet the electricity needs of Puna, the whole Big Island, the whole state. We would not have to depend on foreign oil. Our electric rates would surely go down. The power source was pollution-free. And probably we would be able to find an article or two that claimed that it would cure cancer and prevent warts. That last item is meant to be something of a joke, but actually there are claims that there are medicinal powers from the steam vents and hot springs and there was talk at one time about creating a health spa.

"At any rate, now it is 1993 and the people of my district are hurting. One developer after another has proven that it cannot control the resource. My constituents are being driven out of their homes by noise and by fumes, and when they object they are somehow deemed to be the bad guys.

"Seven people were arrested in the last couple of days trying to get their government to pay attention to their plight. Ironically, according to this morning's paper, it took one of those protestors to notify the government personnel who were supposed to be monitoring the well that the operation had started up, and he had to climb a barbed wire fence in order to do so. Those who lived through the '60s will know what I mean when I say that we may need to put out a new bumper sticker 'Free the Puna-7'

"The reason I'm taking your time today and the time of all the members of the Senate is to ask you to please be

open to the pleas of the people affected. The notion of a cable serving Oahu's needs has long since been put on hold. The promise that electric rates would drop was never true. The notion that geothermal was pollution free was strictly a pipe dream. Pacific Resources tells us that we won't even be able to reduce the need for imported oil. And yet still we continue to allow drilling within a few yards of the nearest residence. I ask you, what is the great prize that makes all this sacrifice worthwhile?

"Our geothermal resource is different. Saying that geothermal works elsewhere in the world is not relevant. Our resource is hotter; it's more toxic and it's under more pressure. Most importantly, and this comes from the scientists, there is only one other geothermal development that is geologically comparable to ours and that is in Krafla in Iceland, and it too is having terrible problems.

"Our developers obviously cannot handle our problems. Either they are incompetent or the resource is too difficult to handle with modern technology. In either case, the conclusion has to be the same. We have got to protect our people.

"I don't know that we have to stop geothermal altogether. Maybe we need to wait for the development of better technology. But at the very least, we must say 'no' to development that has no buffer zone protecting residents. The reason we're reluctant to admit that is that is thould be a multi-million dollar proposition to create the buffer and eliminate the problem, and nobody wants to spend that money.

"PGV's permit allows it to release hydrogen sulfide up to 25 parts per billion over an hour average. On Monday, two days ago, after saying that there would be no release of hydrogen sulfide, they hit a peak of 672 parts per billion, an average of 150 per hour: That's 672 peak, 150 average -- the permit says 25. And the response from PGV was, and I quote: 'It's not a major technical problem,' according to Steve Morris, PGV vice president. And those numbers are the numbers that have been publicly printed in the paper. I am told by reliable sources that PGV's monitors picked up not 672 but 250,000 parts per billion on site. This is where one of their workers was felled and had to be treated with oxygen.

"Now, this all occurs when the company knows it is under the greatest scrutiny. Can you imagine what it's going to be like when people aren't paying close attention? It cannot go on. Government must not let this go on. It isn't fair. It isn't decent. Even the Department of Health seems to be at the end of its rope. But the Department of Health does not run government. The governor and this Legislature do.

"Our Civil Defense Director Harry Kim says that this is another in a series of examples of how government has failed to insure and protect the health and welfare of the residents of the area. It is totally unacceptable and totally irresponsible. I agree with him.

"I ask you to understand the magnitude of what has happened. We have police officers who had to evacuate their positions on Monday because they could not stand the furnes, and they're saying they will not respond to future incidents. We have Civil Defense saying that it cannot assure the health and safety of the community. And we have Civil Defense telling us that Monday was the worst situation, ever, respecting hazards to the people that they have ever encountered.

"I've asked the chair of our Science Technology Committee to call for a briefing by the state Department of Health, Department of Land and Natural Resources,

and Hawaii County Civil Defense. I'm also going to ask for a meeting on the Big Island in which all the various county and state agencies can get together to evaluate and review what has happened. In the meantime, I ask you to understand what people are going through. I ask that you be open to their pleas, and I ask you to help in finding a solution.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Chang also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, in response to the concerns expressed by my colleague from Puna, let me say, as chairman of the Senate Committee on Environmental Protection, I have travelled to the district on behalf of the committee and solicited facts and information about the situation that our colleague's constituents face; I will again direct the committee to do so, the specifics of which will be announced within the coming week. Thank you."

Senator Matsunaga also on a point of personal privilege stated:

"Mr. President, also in response to my Senate colleague from the Big Island on Puna's concerns, I would be happy to arrange for such an informational briefing as requested. I do think that would serve the public's interest. I will also make every effort to visit the Puna site and go there with an open mind."

Senator Levin then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank both chairmen who have indicated their support. I did not intend to leave out the Environmental Protection Committee. I look forward to their actions."

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 o'clock p.m.

Senator Fernandes Salling then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, would the chair of the Judiciary Committee yield to a question, please, regarding Hurricane Iniki?"

The President posed the question to the Judiciary Committee chair, and the chair having responded in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling stated and asked:

"Senator Levin, it was brought to my attention about two days ago that on Kauai what we are now seeing is people who are trying to purchase automobile insurance having to wait six to seven months just to get an appointment to see these carriers to see if they can even purchase the insurance. In the meantime, if they are stopped by a police officer and are taken to court, the courts are saying that they have no choice -- no alternative but to enforce the law, which is the mandatory \$1,000 fine for not carrying insurance.

"My question to the chair is, what, if anything, has the chair done or is proposing to do to help resolve this problem, which is not just going to affect Kauai but I think is happening also here on Oahu? I think what people are saying is some may have to wait as long as a month. But we're looking at six to seven months on Kauai, just to get an appointment now, to see if one can purchase automobile insurance."

Senator Levin responded:

"Mr. President, the good Senator from Kauai raised this issue with me a couple of days ago and I've asked my staff to look for a vehicle (no pun intended) that we could use to try to resolve the problem by perhaps giving the courts discretion with respect to those who have made genuine effort to get insurance and have not been able to. I think it is not only a problem on Kauai. I think it is at least a problem on the Big Island and, perhaps, statewide, where insurance carriers are putting people off and telling them that appointments to simply apply for insurance cannot be scheduled for a substantial period of time. So we will be looking into it. Nothing has been resolved as yet but we are going to try to deal with the issue."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"Mr. President, along the same line, a question regarding Hurricane Iniki. Would the chairman of the Health Committee answer a question?"

The President posed the question to the chair of the Health Committee, and the chair having replied in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling asked:

"Mr. President, it came to my attention about a week ago that the Office of Emergency Permitting on Kauai was running into problems and that we had a 4- to 6-week delay in getting out those permits, although we had been assured that these permits were to be expedited immediately so that people could get on with the repair of their homes. It was brought to my attention then that the problem was not on the county level but with the Department of Health in that they only had one state worker assigned to that job of essentially rubberstamping those permits. Is the chair aware of this problem, and if so what will the chair be doing to resolve this problem?"

Senator B. Kobayashi, chair of the Health Committee, answered:

"Mr. President, I am aware of the problem. We took action asking the Department of Health to temporarily reassign some of their people to emergency duty for Department of Health permits regarding ventilation and air-conditioning. That has already been done, I believe, as of this week, if not late last week. These individuals are on temporary assignment only and the department is now looking for a more permanent solution."

Senator Fernandes Salling then said:

"Okay, thank you. Mr. Chairman, also a second question.

"Yesterday, in Ways and Means, Dr. Lewin was before us and a question was posed to him about another problem that is occurring on Kauai because of Hurricane Iniki. One pediatrician, at least, has said that he has seen an increase by 30 percent of children at his office. Our emergency doctors are saying that they are seeing things in the emergency room that they've never ever seen before due to stress and related injuries on the job, drug, alcohol abuse type problems. At any rate, the doctors that are seeing these patients (whose parents, or the patients themselves, are on unemployment insurance) are not getting paid. The question was asked whether or not the state has anything in the Department of Health to help with the medical payments because this is a problem that is not going to get better. It's on an increase. We're seeing it happening with the children, with people in general and, I'm sure, with the elderly, and we're trying to track this down too and get you more figures, but, have you had a chance to look into this to see what kind of solution that the state can provide for these people who are on unemployment and do not qualify for medical benefits?"

Senator B. Kobayashi responded:

"We did investigate the issue of the SHIP, the State Health Insurance Program, increase. Those monies have been requested by the governor to the tune of approximately 4.5 million dollars per year for the next two years. Some of that money will be possibly used in a, how would you say, retroactive sense because that program, as you know, has been using roll-over money from previous years. So they are spending more than their appropriation of \$10 million during the current fiscal year, and probably will be spending approximately, at least \$12 million. Those extra funds are available to enroll people on Kauai and other areas because of lack of prepaid health care insurance."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"And what would that cost the individual or the families, Mr. Chair?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"That's on a sliding fee schedule. I don't know quite what the schedule is. There is differential between adult and children."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"The question as to affordability has not been determined yet, then?"

Senator B. Kobayashi answered:

"No. There is a fee schedule. I don't know what it is."

Senator Fernandes Salling then said:

"Because one that was quoted to me was as high as \$220 a month, and as low as \$60 a month, for your information.

"Mr. President, I bring these points to the members' attention because it illustrates to you and others how inefficient this method is by trying to take care of the problems that are occurring on Kauai. As you know, I had suggested to you as the President of the Senate to exercise your leadership by appointing a special committee on Hurricane Iniki so that I can gather this kind of information and pass it on to the committees that have jurisdiction to take care of the problem, either through legislation as is being done in the Judiciary Committee or to take care of the problem by simply contacting various people in the agencies or also to take care of the problem by submitting it to the coordinator who is now on board and operating out of the Office of State Planning. We have already started a survey on Kauai under the guise of the Office of State Planning to get a handle and grip on what are some of the major problems ranging from problems with contractors charging outrageous and unconscienable prices just to repair roofs, the primary major damage on that island, all the way to the insurance problems which by the way I've been getting conflicting reports from people back home as to what our Insurance Commissioner had announced with regard to the payment schedule and what in fact is really happening. And that has to be looked into.

"These problems are going to grow and so we have already on board a survey that is going to be conducted by phone and also in the newspaper which will give us some idea along those lines. There is a hot line that the governor is setting up in his office and his liaison office on Kauai to accept all complaints. These complaints are to be logged down and what the governor's liaison is able to take care of, he will handle. What he cannot handle he is to pass on up to the coordinator in the Office of State Planning. Along with that plan, Mr. President, I had proposed that we on the legislative branch would establish a special committee on Hurricane Iniki whose purpose is simply to gather this kind of information, to flush out the problems that are impeding and delaying the restoration efforts and the recovery of the Island of Kauai. But it appears that this is a matter that you and the leadership may want to discuss further. I think that if you have to handle it this way on the floor every day by my bringing it to the members' attention so that it will get the kind of focus that it needs that it will be very inefficient, but if that is the will of the leadership and of your leadership of how to deal with this very serious problem on Kauai, then so be it, Mr. President. Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"Senator, your concerns are very commendable and expected as Senator from Kauai. I want to assure you and the people of Kauai that the concerns and the problems that you have brought forward will be addressed by the appropriate committees and public hearings are being scheduled in the various committees. Also, the Chair will appoint a Senator to coordinate all of these hearings and bills. I will be announcing the appointment of a standing committee chairman to coordinate all Kauai Iniki bills and resolutions."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege. I find that totally unacceptable. As one of the Senators from Kauai who has been dealing with this problem now for well over two months, to have your leadership appoint another Senator not familiar with the problems of the district on the island from which we will be seeing more work needing to be done, is not an acceptable solution. I think the people of Kauai are going to be watching all of us this session, and that they expect a lot more from the Democrats. And I urge you to reconsider what you just stated to this body and to look at the benefits of forming a special committee and having it chaired by myself and whoever else you may want to appoint that can contribute because of not being burdened by, for example, chairing dual committees or in a leadership position. Thank you."

Senator Solomon then rose to state:

"Mr. President, also on a point of personal privilege. Just to clear the record, Mr. President, I want to assure the Senator from Kauai that I, as part of the leadership, was never consulted on this issue. I would like to reassure the Senator that this decision was made by the President in consultation with whom I do not know. I feel that a situation of this magnitude should have been brought to the leadership of the Senate for consideration and I think that we should have been consulted as to how we felt the Senator's request from Kauai should have been handled. There is no doubt in my mind that the fact-finding mission as to the traumatic devastation on the Island of Kauai could be no better served than by the Senator from Kauai.

"Mr. President, as a follow-up and in support of the previous speaker's remarks as to what issue this body should take into consideration and deliberation, I'd like to ask the chair of Consumer Protection if she would yield to a question?"

The President posed the question to the committee chair of Consumer Protection and the committee chair responded:

"No, I will not, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Thank you very much, Mr. President. That is the chair's prerogative. However, Mr. President, I would like to remind the Consumer Protection chair that we have a devastating insurance problem triggered by HIG's inability to pay claims for damages caused by Iniki. Now in accordance to an article which appeared in today's Honolulu Advertiser, Standard & Poor has lowered credit ratings of Hawaiian Electric Co. and its parent company, Hawaiian Electric Industries, citing such factors as HECO's massive planned construction program, reliance on outside power producers, and fallout from the Hawaiian Insurance Group problem.

"All of these negatives will be used as an excuse for rate hikes which must be approved by state regulators.

"I'm hoping that as hearings progress, the Consumer Protection Committee chair would solicit the information from the Insurance Commissioner and monitor this problem. Our situation on the Big Island has always been a negative one, in terms of HELCO being unable to deliver the proper services required by Big Island consumers. I think that these and other issues need our immediate attention and I'm hoping that the chair would see her way clear as to making sure that we here in the Senate will be provided sufficient information so we will know how to deal with the situation realistically.

"Again, Mr. President, I think that it is imperative that the public realizes, as well as my fellow colleagues, and the Senator from Kauai, that we in the leadership were not advised or given the prerogative to address this concern and I think perhaps the President should look to his own rules on openness and fairness and how we are dealing with the issues which were also the promises that were made in your speech on opening day.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Reed then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I would like to also follow on a point of personal privilege. As one of the Senators who represents a portion of Kauai, I'd like to speak on behalf of the other Senator from Kauai who spoke earlier.

"One of the problems with Hurricane Iniki is that it did not affect most of us. It did not affect 85-90 percent of the state and certainly it did not affect most people who are sitting in this room who are dealing with the myriad of problems that come before the Legislature. As a result, it is easy to get caught up with concerns about Mala wharf or health care or education or whatever the issue might be. And the reality is that while life is normal for us and we go home to a home with a roof on it and four walls up, if you go to Kauai you'll see what appears to be a war zone.

"I've run into people at the airport on Kauai who are desperately trying to get off the island to go to try to find some normalcy for a few days, to go find hot water and a comfortable bed and to get away from the cold -- it's wintertime. And just day in and day out having to live with a house that's in shambles and dealing with the bureaucrats and the layers of government attempting to respond is frustrating. There is an increase in the crime rate on Kauai. These are frustrations that are normal, given the disaster. But it's natural for most people in this

Legislature to forget about it because we have other concerns and we are not reminded of it on a daily basis. And with all due respect for the chairmen of Judiciary and of Health who are dealing conscientiously with a wide range of problems, there's no way that the problems on Kauai could be dealt with in a sophisticated, efficient way unless that is the only problem being dealt with.

"I think it is short-sighted and irresponsible of this body not to have created an emergency committee to deal with the devastation wrought by Hurricane Iniki, and surely there could not be a better person to place in charge of that committee than Senator Fernandes Salling from Kauai. She knows the problems, she's been dealing with people on a daily basis on Kauai. I believe it is time in the face of a disaster such as Hurricane Iniki to set aside not only partisanship but also factionalism and immediately create a committee that deals with nothing but helping the people of Kauai and others who have been hurt by Hurricane Iniki, and appoint the Senator from Kauai to chair that committee. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Ikeda then rose to remark:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege."

"Mr. President, I think all of us feel for the people of Kauai and we certainly are reminded everyday of the devastation of Iniki. We are all concerned about the hurricane's impact on the future of that island as well as on the rest of the state. However, Mr. President, we do have a process we follow, which is reflected in the rules of this body and I believe that these procedures are adequate. To deviate from that process in order to accommodate one situation seems to be a rather peculiar request. We have a number of committees chaired by competent people who obviously have a great deal to do. But everything has to fall in its place and certainly the concerns of Kauai have been given priority and will continue to be given priority and will continue to be given priority and will continue to be given priority when these committees meet and deliberate on the issues."

"To set up a special committee, Mr. President, for one concern means that we are again setting a precedent to set up special committees for all future or current concerns. If we are going to deviate to that degree, then we should just do away with the committee system. I think to infer that people who chair committees cannot have concern and feel for the needs of others because they do not happen to represent a particular island or place is totally ridiculous. If that were true, Mr. President, none of us would be here as elected officials. Our concerns have to take into consideration the needs of the entire state and all of its people. Granted there are times when certain areas will need more help which means that we will have to focus even more closely on those needs and, perhaps give a greater share of our resources in order to solve their problems. We do do that."

"Mr. President, I think your earlier commendation of your committee chairs was most appropriate. I think that we are proceeding as best we can. I believe that the concerns of Kauai and its people will be brought to the attention of the Ways and Means Committee of which the Senator from Kauai is a member. And at that time those concerns can be voiced by that Senator. It's part of the process and is the orderly way to proceed. May I suggest that we get on with the business of the people of this state. Thank you."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, on a point of inquiry. I believe I'm a member of a special committee on procurement. Although I'm not actually sure when it was formed or why procurement is a matter which requires a special committee if Hurricane Iniki does not. From your perspective, can you enlighten me as to why the procurement committee is appropriate or even if, in fact, it exists? Although, if I am a member, it must exist. Also, if procurement is important, why is it more important than responding to Iniki? What is the framework within which special committees will be created? When are they appropriate or inappropriate? Frankly, I'd also like to see a special committee on the Puna geothermal problems. Thank you."

The President then said:

"Senator Blair, that committee was formed prior to this session. It was formed a year and a half ago during the last legislative session because of the serious problems concerning state purchase of services in various areas."

Senator Blair then continued:

"Thank you. Perhaps I'm reading too much into your response. If the procurement committee was formed in the 16th Legislature, then I assume it no longer exists. We create new committees with each new Legislature. I appreciate your clarification that I'm not, in fact, a member of such a special committee on procurement.

"However, when it was created by the 16th Legislature, you indicated that it was created because the issue was important. That's a subjective assessment and I would urge that the Senate leadership determine whether or not the Hurricane Iniki situation this year is as serious as the procurement issue was last year. I personally think that it is. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling, on a point of personal privilege, then said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to set the record straight on this request for a special committee. I brought this to your attention exactly a week and a half ago. And about a week ago the indication that I got from you was that you had no problem with setting up a special committee. So what I am hearing today, and by the way it was pointed out and we did discuss it, that the rules allow for you, Mr. President, on your own, to appoint such a special committee when you see fit and with a minimum of three members. And so it's really news to me today that you changed your mind and I ask that you reconsider this in light of what others have been saying to you today and may say in the future."

Senator Chang, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, in response to the concerns expressed by the Majority Floor Leader and the Minority Floor Leader and my colleague from Kauai, let me just say that Operations, your Committee on Government Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Programs will take some specific steps to address and respond to those We may not adequately address all of the concerns that our colleague from Kauai expresses but there will be a response. And with respect to the matter of procurement, your committee will likewise have some specifics that will be announced in the coming week. Thank you."

Senator Iwase then remarked:

"Mr. President, I would like to announce that on the 16th of February, which is next week, your Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management will be holding a hearing on numerous Iniki bills which have

been introduced in the Senate. It is the intent, subject of course to presentation of testimony at the hearing, to pass those bills over to the Ways and Means Committee, particularly the money bills.

"I understand, perhaps, the Senator from Kauai's concern that I do not live on the Island of Kauai. But I want to assure the Senator from Kauai that the fact that I do not live on that island does not mean that I or other members in this body do not care about the plight of the people of Kauai; do not understand the damage which was wrecked by Hurricane Iniki; that we do not understand that help is needed and that we do not understand that help must be forthcoming. We will proceed with the hearing with those kinds of issues and with the understanding that Kauai is hurting; that it must be helped; that the people must be helped. Thank you, Mr. President."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:27 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Ikeda, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, February 11, 1993.

At 11:49 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:53 o'clock a.m.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Ikeda introduced Mr. Glenn Minami, Hawaii's Teacher of the Year for 1992-1993, as follows:

"Mr. President, we are very privileged to have with us Hawaii's Teacher of the Year for 1992-1993, Mr. Glenn Minami. Mr. Minami has a very long and distinguished career. He is an industrial arts teacher at Kaiser High School and he was awarded the Superior Teaching Award by the faculty and students of Kaiser High School in recognition of his students always winning the State Plymouth Triple AAA Trouble Shooting contest. In fact, I think Kaiser has consistently dominated in this area, thanks to Mr. Minami.

"In 1986, he was named the outstanding teacher of industrial arts from the Institute of Technical Education Association and in 1987 he was awarded a letter of commendation for teaching excellence from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. His students took top honors at both the State and National Science Fairs. Derek Dunn-Rankin was the national winner in 1975 and in 1978, Natalie Ching won the State Science Fair Award.

"Glenn Minami has definitely been a positive role model for his students and is one of the most dedicated teachers. He is the type of professional that we really need in the field of education.

"It gives me great honor, Mr. President, to introduce Hawaii's Teacher of the Year, Mr. Glenn Minami."

Mr. Minami rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator McCartney and lei by Senator Tungpalan. Mr. Minami was accompanied by his wife Kathy, Mrs. Kay Zukeran, communications, art and technology teacher at Kaiser High School, and students, Andy Wang and Kim Park.

Senator Chang then introduced Representative Les Ihara Jr. who was seated in the gallery.

At 11:56 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

Senator Koki then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I'm very concerned about a bill introduced by the Lieutenant Governor's Office. This bill will empower the chief elections officer and clerk of any county to require any precinct, district or county to vote absentee. There are possibilities of abuse of mandatory absentee voting. I can just see families being sent absentee ballots and one person would instruct everyone who to vote for and then mail it in. This could be expanded to a group of people, say, churches or clubs, or ethnic groups.

"Suppose an elected office becomes a target of the director of elections for whatever reason. Several of his weakest precincts could be declared absentee voter precincts and a major push by the opposition could yield votes against the official who is out of favor with the director of elections.

"A much more sinister scenario comes to my mind when I combine mandatory absentee voting and a bounty program. A bounty program to register voters is being initiated by the Lieutenant Governor's Office.

"The Lieutenant Governor's Office could easily target certain areas for voter registration. In this age of political correctness he could target low income areas or minority areas or whatever, and get away with targeting. Groups can be influenced by a common entity, say racial groups, church groups, employment groups, etc., and vote as a block. They can be visited by representatives of these groups and be instructed about who to vote for.

"The idea of giving bounty for registering voters is a novel idea. But non-profit groups for whatever reason -- be it their own agenda or given incentives or instructions by the Lieutenant Governor's Office -- can target certain geographic areas or groups of people and, consequently, skew the election in favor of the one directing the targeting.

"With the lieutenant governor obviously running for governor in 1994, I'm very concerned about these two ideas generating from his office. Thank you."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege also.

"I speak on behalf of one of my colleagues, Senator Bert Kobayashi, who is too much of a 'samurai' to complain. He's apparently being overworked as the vice chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, chair of the Legislative Management Committee and the Health Committee in addition to his responsibilities as a member of the Senate Leadership and several committees.

"I know he is overworked because, last month, I requested that he hold hearings on two bills involving legislators' allowances. My oral request was reinforced by a written request. As yet I've had no response, other than that he's not had an opportunity to speak with the many people that apparently are involved in scheduling a hearing of the Legislative Management Committee. So my request, Mr. President, is that you consider reducing the burden on Senator Kobayashi, so that the Legislative Management Committee can go forward with hearings on the bills that are referred to it. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"For your information, Senator Blair, Senator Kobayashi did bring this matter up to the leadership and the Chair. He was told that a hearing on bills be scheduled. Senator Kobayashi is in the process of scheduling a hearing on all bills before his committee."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, on the same point, I appreciate your clarification. When I spoke with Senator Kobayashi, just prior to the session today, he was not able to give me a hearing date. The two bills, SB 198 and SB 199, are double referred. I hope that the scheduling is handled on a timely basis and not merely with promises of future

action. Sometimes bills have a way of getting lost in the shuffle. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"When my colleague, the Senator from the Puna District, mentioned about the plight of his constituents in Puna yesterday, I must confess that I was very upset with the developers. I went back to my office and I called Steve Morris and Dr. Bruce Anderson.

"As was stated, I am a strong supporter of geothermal development. The only personal interest I have in this development is that someday we are going to have electric cars on the Big Island; we are going to move the water, the 15 billion gallons of rainfall that we will get daily around the island; we're going to have electric trains, etc.

"However, we are at a critical point. If the \$120 million power plant and the well field cannot be made to perform as we have been promised, it will be shut down and I will be the first to call for this.

"I'm here today, after talking to both Steve Morris and Bruce Anderson to reassure this body and the Senator from Puna and his constituents, that what happened at PGV in Pohiki on Monday will not be tolerated over the long term. I'm not here to defend PGV. There were spikes far beyond the 25 PPB level of the hydrogen sulfide for a period of about 10 minutes. PGV has violated the permits and did cause several families, several policemen, and two workers to experience alarm and temporary discomfort. It did happen!

"What we need to understand is that in the development of the geothermal resource one must understand that there are risks. I'm not here to say that there will not be any nuisance or mishaps because there will be. The reason why nuisances occur is that in the development of the geothermal well one must vent. That's one of the bad aspects of developing the geothermal wells. You've got to vent the well to take the loose particles out. You've got to vent to get the water out and clean out the well. Even if you have a well that is operational and is closed down for maintenance, the well has to be vented. There are going to be nuisances associated with geothermal development. The good news is that once the geothermal wells are drilled and operational, the nuisance level is minimal.

"When I compare geothermal development and the plight of people in the Hawaiian people that live right next to the Hilo airport in Keaukaha, and the city sewage plant, there is no comparison. I live about four miles from the airport and I am awakened in the night by airplanes taking off and landing. The Hawaiians in Keaukaha must tolerate the planes taking off and landing right next to them for a long time. The noise level from an airplane is ten times more than from a drilling rig. The hydrogen sulfide from the sewage plant in Keaukaha is a major nuisance. The Hawaiian people of Keaukaha have very good reasons to raise a big ruckus.

"There are risks in developing the geothermal resource but I'm asking that we give these developers a chance. Communication may not have been good, but, a lot of the people knew PGV was going to vent. Instead of getting away from the area, many people from other areas come to the PGV fence line, and that's crazy! Because of the fence line, the policemen had to be there. We must give the developers a chance to develop this resource in the most safest way possible. Once the drillings are done and

the wells are connected up to the power plant, you're going to be surprised. You'll go over there and you're going to wonder what was all this big fuss about.

"Developing this geothermal resource has great economic advantages to the Big Island. It will provide the energy self-sufficiency and independence. There will be nuisance, but let's try to understand the resource and give these developers a helping hand and let them finish the job because they do have a fairly large investment in their project. Once the geothermal resource is harnessed, a lot of good things will happen and the nuisance objections will cease. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, in all due respect to my colleague from the Big Island and on his position on geothermal energy, I'd like to reiterate for the record that I think the Big Island as a whole has agreed that geothermal energy would bring economic benefits to the community. I think that the 'pilikia' is, is it at the risk of peoples' personal health as well as the environment?

"Mr. President, this kind of leads into my point of personal privilege today in which I wish to make some comments on what was discussed yesterday by our Majority Floor Leader. I think that this problem became serious when in 1982 we created single-member districts for the Senate. And as you know, my other colleague from the Big Island represents a large constituency that does in fact have to put up with the noise, the smell, blow-outs, and everything else related to geothermal energy activities. So for the Senator from Puna to take that position, I think, is what we should expect here in this body.

"As a follow-up, Mr. President, I feel that the Majority Floor Leader should be reminded that the reapportionment plan of 1982 is a political reality that each and everyone of us must live with. For me, I have been able to remain pretty neutral on the geothermal issue. But unfortunately we have two of the other senatorial districts on the Big Island that have been, literally, debating the issue for the past ten years.

"So, I think that maybe it would behoove this body to have the leadership reconsider its position on the establishment of special committees, such as an investigative committee on geothermal energy, so this body can be apprised on the facts of what we're looking at when it comes to the whole development of geothermal energy on the Big Island. And maybe this would give some kind of relief to the Senators of those senatorial districts that represent a different ideology on how that development should proceed.

"And, Mr. President, this leads me into my concern about the article that appeared in the newspaper this morning, 'Democrats stalled by Iniki aftermath; Latest division arises over review committee for victims.' I have to agree with the title of the article but I have to disagree in that I do not consider myself a 'dissident' in this body. I'm not just disagreeing to disagree because I am with the faction of nine.

"The situation that the Senator from Kauai is in is real. The Senator represents a single-member district and that Senator is going to be accountable for whatever happens and whatever this body may deliberate on concerning that district. I think that we can all appreciate that as we all sit here today. I don't think it's a matter of whether a Senator from Oahu can feel for the victim, or whether a Senator from Maui can identify with the problem. I think the bottom line is accountability. And this is what this

state expects from each and everyone of us. In a singlemember situation you are accountable to constituency, you have to provide these answers. people vote for you, they put you in office, they expect you to have some kind of hand on the issues. Whether we're in a factional fight or whatever it may be, that's irrelevant at this point in time. We should seriously look at where we're at in the State of Hawaii and in terms of our own organization here. We should look at our Constitution and think of the constituencies we're representing. And I think that the aforementioned We should look at our requests are legitimate and, I'm hoping, Mr. President, that the leadership reconsider its positions, not only on the Kauai matter, but on the geothermal energy situation where we have Senators from the Big Island that are divided on the issue, simply because we cannot come to an agreement on the facts. I think that the situation is the same with Kauai. There is no doubt in my mind, each of us sitting here want to assist that island. In all good conscience how could we not do otherwise. we're here for and why we're here is because we have a constituency that we have to take care of and this is what the Senator from Kauai has requested to be able to do.

"The Senator did not request for an overview in terms of decision-making; she simply wanted to put a committee together that could review the facts that would cut right-across-the-board.

"Interestingly enough, Mr. President, that did come up when I was a member of the Ways and Means Committee when we did discuss the geothermal energy situation. And this is why the quality of the clean air ended up in the courts. The community felt that this body could not make an unbiased, objective decision. They no longer trusted the legislative process and they decided to go to the court for some kind of relief on the geothermal energy situation. Why are we in that situation, Mr. President? Simply because we have Senators from the Big Island that do not agree on the development of geothermal energy.

"Mr. President, I re-read the Senate Rules last night and the rules say that the leadership can make the decision. I'm appealing for reconsideration, on behalf of my colleague from Kauai, to form a special committee for Kauai Iniki disaster. We should also take into consideration a special investigative committee on geothermal energy so that opposing Senators from the Big Island can come to a solution that both can agree on. Perhaps we can resolve that issue this session and maybe, Mr. President, we should also form a special investigative committee into HEI. I think these are the three critical issues facing us and perhaps under the present committee structure we cannot accommodate those concerns. Thank you very much."

Senator Fernandes Salling then stated:

"Mr. President, I too rise on a point of personal privilege and I want to thank my colleague from Kohala for the remarks that she has made today because I believe that, perhaps, one of the things that was missing from yesterday's discussion was essentially what the Senator said that the notion that as long as I have been in the Senate we've always listened to those Senators from the district when it came to specific problems confronting our constituents. You've heard me speak on this and you've heard other Senators speak on this besides Senator Solomon. This has been part of the custom and courtesy which are inherent in the position to which we have been elected, and which I believe are now in jeopardy.

"So what really prompts me to rise again is to speak on the issue of a special committee to address the recovery efforts of Hurricane Iniki, Mr. President, and the memorandums that I received from you yesterday relating to certain privileges that are accredited me now with being a Senator. These memos tell me that as a result of representing the people of Kauai in the Senate I now have golfing privileges at the Waialae Country Club and the Honolulu Country Club.

"Perhaps, Mr. President, this is your way of treating us all equally by securing us these privileges. But for myself, I would like to be treated in a way that would allow me to represent my constituents to the fullest, and what I expect out of our Senate president is to provide me and other Senators the opportunity to do so.

"Instead of working to secure us these privileges, I would rather have our Senate president show me the leadership, conviction and vision which will help me and the people of Kauai, whom you once represented, Mr. President, to be able to rebuild and restore their lives.

"To that end, I feel that it's necessary for me to ask your permission to insert into the Journal a six-page outline of what the special committee was about to do -- the kinds of groups, agencies, problems that we have prioritized that need to have immediate attention in order to expedite the recovery efforts on Kauai."

Senator Fernandes Salling then requested leave to insert additional remarks into the Journal, which request was denied by the Chair.

Senator Fernandes Salling then requested a recess for the purpose of having the Chair review the proffered remarks.

The request for a recess was denied for the reason that the Chair chose to defer his review of the documents to a later time.

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"The subject of a special committee on procurement has been mentioned yesterday and today. I want to assure my colleagues why this special procurement committee is being requested by me.

"I've been working on the procurement issue for over a year. Just a few days ago, I finally got from the auditor's office, the state people who worked on the Selex contract. It took the auditors over two weeks to give me the names of those who were involved in the development of the state Selex contract. I also got the names of those who negotiated for the state. I tried to get that same information for months. I've asked B&F to give me working documents of the sole source \$9 million Selex contract. Can you imagine B&F telling me that they had none! The administrative assistant of B&F told me that he has no documentation of the development of that contract. I can't imagine any contract of that magnitude having no working papers! If you read the Selex contract you're going to be shocked as to how anyone in the state would let a contract like that get finalized!

"We have indications that vendors were included in the preparation of the bid specifications in other contracts. There are many abuses! We need the special investigating committee to examine some of the contracts and to get the documentation. Unlike the request from the Senator from Kauai, there is enough evidence to justify an investigating committee on state procurement. If this body doesn't want an investigating committee on procurement, then I will say to cover it all up -- let it all go -- let 'em amend all the contracts -- a \$150,000

contract; sole source going up to \$53 million -- that's okay. Unfortunately, we will never, ever find out what went on within the past few years. We've talked about certain vendors. How is it that all of a sudden all the sole source contracts dealing with computers are going to one company? We also looked at the public relations contracts. All of a sudden it also goes to one company. Why sole source, non-bid? Why? We'll never find out about these contracts unless we can at least look at the documents, ask these people why is it that they got all of these sole source contracts? I have cited some of the reasons why we requested for the special committee. There is a need for that investigating committee on state procurement.

"I sympathize with the Senator from Kauai, but, there is a committee structure to address her concerns. I have confidence in the committee chairmen to get the information that is requested.

"I don't want special committees covering every area of concern because I don't think there is a need for it. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon then rose on a point of information, then subsequently appealed the ruling of the Chair's prior denial of Senator Fernandes Salling's request for a recess.

Senator Chang then rose to state and inquire:

"Mr. President, with due respect to my colleagues, I have to say that in my many years of teaching parliamentary procedure to teenagers in the youth and government program at the YMCA, I find the present dilemma somewhat puzzling. Given the vagueness of the situation, I'm dwelling in the area of a point of parliamentary inquiry as to whether there is a motion that has been denied which then can be appealed. I'm not entirely sure that there is an appealable action that has taken place, so that is my inquiry. Perhaps my colleague to my right can enlighten me."

Clarification on the question before the body having been requested, Senator Blair responded as follows:

"Paragraph 9 of Rule 3 of the Rules of the Senate provides that the Senate President shall determine questions of order and that his ruling is subject to an appeal to the full Senate. I think we are presented with a question of order. The way I understand it, you have ruled that a recess is not in order. Your ruling that we continue without a recess is subject to a vote of the full Senate. The vote however would not be on whether or not the practice in the Senate will be to recess whenever a member requests, but whether the specific ruling not to have a recess at this time will be sustained. We are not voting as to what any future rulings will be in the Senate, but merely the present question of whether or not the Senate should now recess. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan then requested a recess.

The Chair declared a short recess.

At 12:44 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:53 o'clock p.m.

Senator Solomon then said:

"Mr. President, thank you for the short recess. I think that it was necessary since it gave us an opportunity to at least be able to discuss the dilemma. I consider this as a dilemma that we're presently in. And I think the motion I did make is a valid one. I think it is something that we

definitely need clarification on and, in conjunction with that, Mr. President, I think we have to also make a ruling on what can be inserted into the Journal and what cannot be inserted into the Journal. Up to now we've never had problems with that. Also, I think the request to have something inserted into the Journal and the request for a recess which was denied are interrelated, and I'm hoping that we can work that out within a reasonable time.

"Since we had a recess, Mr. President, I think the motion is now moot. I now move that the motion be withdrawn at this time."

Senator Graulty seconded the withdrawal of the motion; the motion was put by the Chair and carried by voice vote.

Senator Fernandes Salling again requested leave to insert written remarks into the Journal, which request was again denied.

Senator Fernandes Salling then again requested a recess, which was also denied by the Chair.

Senator Fernandes Salling then said:

"I then make a motion appealing that ruling of the Chair."

Senator Blair seconded the motion.

The motion was clarified by Senator Blair, as follows:

"Mr. President, the motion appeals the ruling of the Chair, that ruling being a denial of a request by a member that the Senate recess briefly. An 'aye' vote would not sustain the Chair, and that a 'nay' vote would sustain the Chair on the voting. If there's any disagreement with my understanding in that regard, it needs to be clarified before the vote is taken. Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"At this point, the Chair would like to call for the vote. An 'aye' vote would be to overrule the ruling of the Chair; a 'nay' vote would be sustaining the ruling of the Chair."

The motion was then put by the Chair and, by voice vote, denied.

Senator Iwase, after his announcement of scheduled committee hearings, added:

"Mr. President, I inadvertently failed to mention this yesterday. Despite the fact that there has been no discussion of the damage caused by Iniki on this island, in your district, Mr. President, Maile, Nanakuli and Waianae, your Committee on Planning will be sensitive to the plight of those people as well."

Senator Blair then rose to state:

"The Senator from Hilo expressed a justification for a committee on procurement. I want to clarify the difference between a special committee and an investigative committee. The Senator from Hilo wants an investigative committee on procurement, apparently, because of difficulty in getting information from the administration. The investigative committee is required in order, apparently, to have subpoena powers and otherwise coerce information out of an apparently reluctant administration. That's a matter which will be addressed in a resolution, which may not yet have been introduced.

"We have to keep in mind that there is distinction between that resolution and a request for a special The investigative committee must be committee. established by a resolution. A special committee can be established by the presiding officer of the Senate. special committee has no subpoena power. The reason for the special committee is, thus, entirely different. Its justification has to do with the fact that the matters affecting Kauai, and to a lesser degree the far leeward portions of Oahu, cut across many subject matter committees' jurisdictions. In order to deal efficiently with concerns that cut across many committees' jurisdictions and in order that all proceedings can be harmonized and that there can be continuity and follow-up, a special committee has been requested. I hope that you will give serious consideration to that. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling then said:

"Mr. President, yes, perhaps to further illustrate the differences that have been brought up by the Senator from Maui, Molokai and Lanai.

"The purpose of this special committee on Hurricane Iniki is a narrow one and that is to provide the vitally necessary focus to surface problems resulting from the vast devastation wrought by Hurricane Iniki to the Island of Kauai. Specifically, those which are impeding its recovery efforts. The committee will target general and specific problems that can be rectified this session through legislation, legislative appropriations or other appropriate legislative action."

The President interjected:

"Senator Fernandes Salling, may I interrupt?"

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"Mr. President, I have the floor I believe and I would just like to conclude by highlighting four different points "

The President interjected:

"Senator Fernandes Salling, I must interrupt. You are reading from the paper that you had asked me to insert into the journal and I made an earlier decision that I would like to see that paper before I"

Senator Fernandes Salling asserted:

"Mr. President, I will not read from the paper then. I will just simply paraphrase what is down here as to what are the differences between a special committee and an investigative committee.

"The special committee that we were discussing previously with respect to Hurricane Iniki was, (1) to simply go out and collect the different kinds of data and information from private, county, state and federal agencies and private groups that may be impeding in the recovery of the restoration of Kauai. It was to identify areas that where, maybe, we needed interagency coordination; it was to suggest or propose some kinds of solutions that would help in the recovery effort and hear some of the concerns of the constituents

Senator Ikeda interjected:

"Mr. President, I request a recess."

Senator Fernandes Salling continued:

"Mr. President, I have the floor and I intend to finish my statement and"

Senator Ikeda interjected:

"Point of order, Mr. President."

The Chair recognized Senator Ikeda.

At 1:02 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:11 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then having recognized Senator Fernandes Salling, the Senator continued as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to conclude these remarks which I want to remind everyone here are stated merely to illustrate the differences between a special committee and an investigatory committee and the discussions that we heard here today brought up by the Senator from Hilo and the Senator from the three canoe districts.

"My concluding remarks would be, with I hope your keeping in mind what I said previously, that a special committee as I see it would gather the information and facts that would assist government agencies, legislative committees and the Legislature in their efforts to aid in and expedite the restoration of Kauai. Thank you.

Senator Blair then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I would like to make clear, for the record, my understanding of what transpired, and comment on it.

"The Senator from Kauai requested that certain remarks be inserted into the Journal and her request was denied. Apparently, the denial was to allow the Senate President's office to review the remarks and make a determination as to whether or not the remarks would be allowed to be inserted into the Journal.

"I find the denial of her request very troubling. Whether we insert the remarks in the Journal in written form or whether we speak them on the floor of the Senate is a matter of slight consequence. In both cases, we are expressing ourselves on a point of personal privilege. To say that we must have the remarks reviewed by the Senate President's office prior to inserting them into the Journal is tantamount to saying that our free speech on the floor of the Senate, not in the First Amendment sense but in contrast to the practice which up to now has allowed us to speak freely on a point of personal privilege, is now subject to a review of the Senate President's office. If that in fact is the intent, Mr. President, it would be better for us to review the rule of personal privilege which allows people to speak on matters not pending before the Senate. Such a review is something I've been advocating since my first arrival in the Senate. That is better than embarking on the path of subjective restraint of speech.

"Today has been a classic example of how the broad rule of personal privilege is a snake waiting to strike. I hope that we will do that. But, if we are free to speak on the floor of the Senate under the rule of personal privilege, we should also be allowed to express ourselves by submitting our words in written form. verbalized speech differently than written speech is not logical. I'm terribly concerned when the Senate President's office appears to desire ... I'm not sure that I'm using the precisely correct word ... but would appear to want to review our speech before we are permitted to express ourselves on the floor. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 1:15 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Ikeda, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, February 12, 1993.

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Franklin Chun, Canon, St. Andrew's Cathedral, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Seventeenth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Nakasato recognized and introduced Ozeki Salevaa "Konishiki" Atisanoe and his stablemaster, Kitanoumi Oyataka, a former yokozuna, seated on the floor of the Senate, and quoted from the Senate certificate expressing support for the Grand Sumo Tournament in Hawaii 1993, as follows:

"Whereas, the sport of sumo is said to have begun more than 1500 years ago with a match between the gods to determine the fate of the Japanese race; and

"Whereas, sumo has always been central to the cultural tradition and sense of pride of the people of Japan; and

"Whereas, sumo was first seen by the people of Hawaii in 1885, when an exhibition was put on for King David Kalakaua at the immigration depot in Honolulu; and

"Whereas, the popularity of the sport in Hawaii has grown steadily due to the achievements of local athletes such as Jesse 'Takamiyama' Kuhaulua, and more recently, Chad 'Akebono' Rowan, Salevaa 'Konishiki' Atisanoe, and Fiamalu 'Musashimaru' Penitani; and

"Whereas, Chad 'Akebono' Rowan was recently promoted to the rank of Yokozuna, or Grand Champion, thereby becoming the first foreigner to be accorded that special honor in more than 200 years of recorded sumo history; and

"Whereas, the sport of sumo has strengthened the ties between the people of Hawaii and the people of Japan; and

"Whereas, for the first time in nine years, professional sumo is returning to Hawaii in the form of the Grand Sumo Tournament in Hawaii 1993, scheduled for June 9 and 10, 1993 at the Neal Blaisdell Arena in Honolulu; and

"Whereas, the tournament will feature forty of Japan's top sumotori, including Hawaii's own Akebono, Konishiki, and Musashimaru; and

"Whereas, the event is expected to bring many Japanese citizens to Hawaii, and with them a needed boost to Hawaii's visitor industry; now, therefore

"The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, expresses its strong support for the Grand Sumo Tournament in Hawaii 1993 and, on behalf of the people of Hawaii, thanks the promoters and participants for their efforts in bringing this great event to the state."

Senator Nakasato continued:

"Mr. President and members of the Senate, visiting us today is Konishiki, Hawaii's goodwill ambassador, not only to Japan but to the entire world.

"From a humble Nanakuli boy who attended University High School, Salevaa Atisanoe went to Japan to train in the Japanese sport of sumo wrestling. He withstood a very different culture, language and food. He learned the tough and sacred traditions of sumo and became only the second foreigner to achieve the second-highest rank of sozeki. He is credited for opening the doors for the first foreigner to the rank of yokozuna or grand champion. Konishiki is poised to become the next grand champion of sumo, only the second foreigner.

"To Konishiki, all the people of Hawaii are behind you in your quest for grand champion. The next time you come back to Hawaii you will be a yokozuna. Thank you." (Konishiki stood to be recognized and was presented a lei by Senator A. Kobayashi.)

Senator Matsuura then introduced Kitanoumi Oyakata, Japan's 55th yokozuna, and Mr. Toshio Hagiwara, director general of the sports department of Nippon TV Network. (The gentlemen stood to be recognized; Kitanoumi was presented a lei by Senator Ikeda.)

The Chair then added:

"Members of the Senate, when I was a teacher at Nanaikapono Elementary School many years ago, Salevaa Atisanoe was only a 'small' student of mine and I did spank him a few times, but, now, I am intimidated by his size. Seriously, Sale, we are very proud of you and thank you very much for all you've done for us in Hawaii."

Senator A. Kobayashi then introduced Mr. Moriyoshi Saito and Mr. Kunihiro Mitamura, also seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, I have the pleasure this morning of introducing some very important visitors to Hawaii. They are no strangers to our beautiful islands, and have been ardent supporters of Hawaii as a worldwide sports center and premier visitor destination.

"These gentlemen bring to Hawaii the very prestigious LPGA Golf Open, a world class tournament for 144 professional women golfers, including 12 members of the Japan Ladies Professional Golf Association. The tournament was played at the Turtle Bay Country Club from 1987 to 1989, and has been headquartered at the Ko Olina Country Club since 1990.

"First to be introduced is Mr. Moriyoshi Saito, President of Mainichi Broadcasting System of Osaka, Japan. Mr. Saito has been the driving force to help sponsor and televise the Itoki Hawaiian Ladies LPGA Open to a worldwide audience. (Mr. Saito stood to be recognized. He was presented a lei by Senator Tungpalan.)

"Seated next to him is Mr. Kunihiro Mitamura, President of Itoki Company of Tokyo, Japan. Mr. Mitamura is a generous provider of humanitarian assistance in various fields, and is also the proud sponsor of the Itoki Hawaiian Ladies LPGA Open. (Mr. Mitamura stood to be recognized. He was presented a lei by Senator George.)

"Accompanying the two presidents are staff members Mr. Yoichi Akasaka of Mainichi Broadcasting System and Mr. Nobuyoshi Mori of Itoki Company." (The gentlemen stood to be recognized.)

Senator Nakasato also introduced former Governor George Ariyoshi who was seated on the floor of the Senate accompanying Konishiki and Kitanoumi.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

Senator Hagino then introduced Mr. Bruce Swartz, seated in the gallery, and said, "Bruce is a young and energetic person working in my office. He also has an Eastern flavor. Bruce spent the last year teaching English in Japan."

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend John Brough, International Order of St. Luke the Physician, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Matsunaga recognized and introduced Dr. Donald Kanemaru, Ms. Sandra Takahata, Ms. Mary Beth Wong and Ms. Allicyn Hikida, and said:

"Mr. President, fellow Senators, ladies and gentlemen: Fifty-one years ago, today, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066, resulting in the evacuation, relocation and internment of over 120,000 citizens and resident aliens of Japanese ancestry. Among those evacuated were 2,000 persons in the Territory of Hawaii. This incident, brought about by wartime hysteria which singled out Americans because of their race, was a sad event in our history. We must always be on our guard to ensure that events like this never ever occur again.

"I would like to take this opportunity to introduce and recognize our guests on the floor this morning. Our guests today are Dr. Donald Kanemaru, whose family in Lualualei was affected by the evacuation order (Mr. President, I understand your family was also evacuated); Ms. Sandra Takahata, who was interned in Jerome, Arkansas; Ms. Mary Beth Wong, legal counsel for persons affected by the evacuation order who sought and are seeking redress; and Ms. Allicyn Hikida, president of the Japanese American Citizens League of Honolulu. (All rose to be recognized and were welcomed with a warm round of applause. Senators Fukunaga, Iwase, Kanno and Koki presented the leis.)

"Mr. President, I would like to read from the commemorative certificate being presented today to our guests, as follows:

'Recognizing "A Day of Remembrance" for Persons of Japanese Ancestry Interned during World War II.

'Under the authority of Executive Order 9066, signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt on February 19, 1942, the United States government unlawfully interned 2,000 persons of Japanese ancestry in detention camps at Sand Island, Honouliuli, Hawaii. Many were later relocated to internment camps on the Mainland. In all, over 120,000 Japanese Americans were relocated and interned in detention camps on the Mainland.

'In the early 1980s the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians found that a grave injustice was done to citizens and resident aliens during World War II. On August 10, 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed the Civil Liberties Act, which affirmed the finding of the commission and extended an apology by Congress on behalf of the people of the United States to those affected by Executive Order 9066.

'On February 21, 1993, the Japanese American Citizens League of Honolulu will sponsor "A Day of Remembrance," a program to acknowledge Japanese Americans who were interned during World War II and to remind us that without constant vigilance such an injustice could occur again.

'The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii joins the Japanese American Citizens League in recognizing those interned during World War II and their contributions to the people of Hawaii and the United States of America, and commends the Japanese American Citizens League of Honolulu for serving to increase civil awareness.'

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator George, on behalf of Senator Kobayashi, introduced a group of 5th and 6th grade students from Noelani Elementary School and their teachers, Laurie Mikami and Shannon Lowrey, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator McCartney rose to thank Senator Matsunaga for the introduction of our guests on the floor today. He then recognized Mr. Bill Kaneko, former president of the Japanese American Citizens League of Honolulu, who was seated in the gallery. Senator McCartney said: "Bill Kaneko has been instrumental in educating the people of Hawaii on what happened 51 years ago. He is someone I respect very much."

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Second Day.

At this time, pursuant to Rule 39 of the Rules of the Senate, Senator Ikeda moved that Governor's Message No. 154, the nomination of RONALD TAI YOUNG MOON for Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, and Governor's Message No. 155, the nomination of SHARON ROBYN HIMENO for Associate Justice of the

State Supreme Court, be made a special order of business to be taken up immediately, seconded by Senator Reed.

The Chair then said:

"The motion to withdraw Governor's Message Nos. 154 and 155 from the Committee on Executive Appointments having been made and seconded, is there any discussion?"

Senator Blair rose to state:

"Mr. President, I think it important, with this substantial departure from normal operating procedure, that a clear record be made as to why we are so departing, so that it will not become common practice. If this is for an extraordinary reason that reason should be clearly stated, so that departures from the standard procedure do not occur too frequently. Thank you.

The Chair responded:

"This is the proper time to bring this matter up under Messages from the Governor. The messages did come from the Governor and therefore the Chair feels that this is the proper time to bring this matter to the floor."

Senator Blair continued:

"Mr. President, I need a clarification. Do you mean to say that any Governor's Message on any appointment may be subject to the Committee of the Whole jurisdiction, rather than the Executive Appointment Committee jurisdiction, or are you simply pointing out that now is the appropriate time on the order of business to take that up? I don't think you really addressed the issue of why the committee structure is being bypassed. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then said:

"Mr. President, it's my understanding and I'm trying to find the proper rule.

"It's my understanding that the Rules of the Senate provide for the nomination of judicial appointees to be taken up according to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution. At the discretion of the Chair, I believe those nominations were sent to the Committee on Executive Appointments, but I do believe that the Chair does also have the authority to take them up at this time."

The Chair answered:

"That is correct. That is what the Chair would have mentioned at this point."

Senator Blair then continued:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I must not be making myself clear. I'm not contesting the legality of the procedure being adopted. I'm just wondering why there is special treatment. The matter was referred to the Executive Appointments Committee. It presumably ... I saw on television that they had a public hearing and I've been awaiting the report of that committee. I assume, based on the procedures being adopted, that we will not have a report from that committee and I'm wondering if the committee is still functioning and why we're not getting a report from the committee. Fundamentally, those of us who are not members of the committee really don't know what's going on. I know there's been a lot

going on behind the scenes. I would just like to have it on the record. Thank you."

At 11:57 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I know how difficult it is for all of us to take this procedure because we all respect the committee process; we all respect the role of the chairs

At 12:00 o'clock noon, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 o'clock p.m.

Senator Chang rose on a point of information and said:

"Mr. President, on a point of information, I don't believe Senator Blair's question has been answered."

Senator Ikeda responded:

"Mr. President, the motion was to make Governor's Messages a special order of business, and that's all we're doing at this point in time."

The Chair answered:

"That is correct. All in favor of"

Senator Blair interjected:

"Mr. President, before we take the vote on the motion to essentially withdraw a matter out of the jurisdiction of the Executive Appointments Committee, I was wondering if the chairman of the Executive Appointments Committee would yield to a question?"

The President responded:

"The chair of the Executive Appointments Committee is not present, Senator Blair."

Senator Blair then said:

"I'm sorry, then the vice chairman would suffice."

Senator Ikeda, on a point of order, said:

"Mr. President. I don't believe that the request is proper to the motion before us. The motion before us is to make these messages, Governor's Message Nos. 154 and 155, a special order of business to be taken up immediately. The messages are not before us until after the motion is passed."

At 12:02 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

Senator Blair then remarked:

"Mr. President, it's been explained to me that there'll be a further motion to withdraw the measure from committee, also procedural in nature. So, I will withdraw."

The Chair then said:

"Thank you very much. To make it very clear, this procedure is just to take these matters up for business. This was not originally scheduled to be on the calendar so we are merely trying to place this matter on the agenda at this time."

The motion for a special order of business to be taken up immediately was then put by the Chair and unanimously carried.

Senator Ikeda then moved to withdraw Governor's Message No. 154, the nomination of RONALD TAI YOUNG MOON for Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, and Governor's Message No. 155, the nomination of SHARON ROBYN HIMENO for Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court, from the Committee on Executive Appointments, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Blair then stated:

"Mr. President, I suppose I could succinctly sum up my query with a single word, 'Why?' Thank you."

The Chair recognized Senator Blair, again, and Senator Blair continued:

"Mr. President, apparently, that was taken to be a rhetorical question. (Laughter!) I actually did want an answer. Perhaps, I should direct the question to the appropriate person. I would direct it to you since I'm not sure who the appropriate person is. If you would like to deflect it to another member of the body, I would be happy with that. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"The reason why we are taking this matter up now is because we are under a time constraint. This matter was brought before this body 27 days ago and we just have two more days to act on this matter and, therefore, the Chair feels this is the time to take this matter up.

Senator Blair continued:

"Has the chairman of the subject matter committee been consulted on the process that's being utilized?"

The Chair answered:

"The Chair has tried to be in touch with the chair of the subject matter committee. I have not personally talked to the chair of the subject matter committee."

Senator Blair further inquired:

"Is the whereabouts of the subject matter committee chairman known to the Senate President?"

The Chair responded that he was not aware.

Senator Blair continued:

"And that, then, is the reason we're going forward? Because we cannot be assured the matter will be taken up during the 30 days in which the Senate is required to ...?"

The Chair answered:

"That's correct."

Senator A. Kobayashi then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I'd just like to say that I know how difficult it is for all of us to go through this process because we all respect the committee process. We all respect the role of the chair. And it's unfortunate that we cannot wait for the chair of the subject matter committee to be present. We all realize his value; we all respect his leadership. However, the public is crying for a quick resolution to this problem. We've all received countless phone calls asking for a vote as soon as possible. Because of the recess in between I can understand why the need to vote today.

"All I can say is, I know this is an unusual process. I would not like to see it continue as far as other committees, the role of the chair, and other procedures. I know that we will respect that process in the future. Thank you."

Senator Blair then rose to speak in support of the motion, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the motion. I'm not sure quite how to say this because one always hesitates to speak ill of one's colleagues, particularly when they're not here to defend themselves, but I think it's now incumbent upon the chairman of the Legislative Management Committee, at such time as he returns, to explain his action because it appears to me that he has abdicated his responsibility to the system and to his colleagues and to his constituents and to the people of the State of Hawaii.

"I am personally aggrieved, if in fact what appears to be the case, what appears to have been said this morning is true that the chairman has simply absented himself from the process at a critical time when the Judiciary ... who will be seated on the highest court, turns on a decision of that person's committee. For that person to then not make himself available or even his location known to the President of the Senate is inexplicable. I wonder has he been kidnapped? I wonder has the police department been notified? This is so extraordinary that we are abandoning all normal process and procedures. I hope Mr. President, that this will be reviewed by leadership and if he has, in fact, abdicated his responsibilities as chairman of the committee, I hope that the leadership will consider whether or not he's fit to serve in that capacity hereafter. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, I would note that the previous speaker had used the title 'chair of the Legislative Management Committee.' I believe he was referring to the chair of the Executive Appointments Committee. Thank you."

Senator Blair answered:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I picked up the wrong speech this morning. Sorry. I accept the correction from my esteemed colleague, Senator Bert Kobayashi."

Senator A. Kobayashi then stated:

"Mr. President, although we are deviating from our usual process and our usual committee procedure, I hope we will not deviate from our usual cordial manner and our withholding of sharp criticism of our colleagues, and I hope we will not resort to that on the floor of the Senate. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair would like to reassure all committee chairmen that we will try our best to uphold the chairmanship of the committees. However, the Chair

would also like to point out that we are now in a different mode. I think each committee chairman must be responsible to all of us in the Senate and this is the significance of what is happening here today."

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in support of the motion, as follows:

"Mr. President, I think it's easy to find a whipping boy anytime anyone feels the need to do so. However, I believe that the reason for the urgency of this matter is the fact that we are, first, under a 30-day deadline to act; we have a 7-day recess coming up before us. And it has been made extremely clear, at least to me, as to how the public feels about this appointment or appointments. To delay any action any further, I think, would just exacerbate this situation and we certainly do not want to allow for any extraordinary circumstances to happen whereby the 30 days would lapse and the appointments would then become automatically approved without action by the Senate. Thank you."

Senator Blair then said:

"As I sat here listening, it occurred to me that even in the absence of the chairman there's nothing that prevents the committee from operating; since, in the absence of the chairman, the vice chairman can report the matter. I believe we have not yet run out the 30 days and perhaps I spoke too quickly in support of the motion. It would seem to me that if we are in fact interested in upholding the committee structure that perhaps we should be expecting that, in the absence of the chair, that the vice chair would perform the responsibilities of the chair and report the matter from committee. I was wondering if the vice chair of the Executive Appointments Committee would explain to me why that procedure was not followed?"

The President posed the question to the vice chair of the Executive Appointments Committee and the vice chair declined to respond.

The motion to withdraw Governor's Message Nos. 154 and 155 from the Committee on Executive Appointments was then put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 16. Noes, 8 (Blair, Chang, Fernandes Salling, Fukunaga, Hagino, Mizuguchi, Solomon, Tanaka). Excused, 1 (Holt).

At 12:13 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:14 o'clock p.m.

Senator Ikeda then moved that the one day notice requirement of Rule 36(1) of the Rules of the Senate be suspended, seconded by Senator Reed.

The motion was put by the Chair and unanimously carried.

Senator Ikeda then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of RONALD TAI YOUNG MOON for Chief Justice, State Supreme Court, in accordance with Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Solomon then rose to inquire:

"Mr. President, on a point of information, is it necessary that once the matter has been referred to the Committee of the Whole that a hearing be held so that all

members may have an opportunity to question the nominee?"

Senator Ikeda, on a point of order, stated:

"Mr. President, there has not been a referral to the Committee of the Whole. The motion was to withdraw the governor's messages from the Committee on Executive Appointments."

Senator Solomon then withdrew her point of information.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

24 Ayes. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Holt).

At this time, Senator A. Kobayashi recognized and introduced to the members of the Senate Chief Justice Moon who was present in the gallery with Mrs. Moon.

Senator Ikeda then moved that the nomination made in Governor's Message No. 155 of SHARON ROBYN HIMENO for Associate Justice, State Supreme Court, for a term to expire in ten years, be rejected, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator McCartney spoke in support of the motion, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the motion.

"Mr. President, I remember very clearly the opening day prayer that was given by Father Killackey. In his prayer he said, 'Strive to serve, not to be served.' Mr. President, I'd like to thank you for serving the people, for having the flexibility and leadership to hear the people and hear their voices.

"This vote that we're taking today is not about me, it's not about us, it's not about personal attacks, it's not about personalities. It's about the people; it's about the conscience of the people; and it's about the responsibility we have as Senators to the people. This is their government and they want it back. My heart says that this issue is an issue of integrity, and my heart says I have to do the right thing.

"The question that I asked myself in deciding on where I stand on this was, did the candidate avoid the appearance of impropriety? I cannot support that question and meet that threshold and I say 'no.'

"The other question I asked myself, this is the people's court and in order to serve on the people's court the individual should have the confidence of the people, and I think that's clear.

"This is not an easy decision for any of us. It's not a personal attack but it's our job; it's our responsibility. We all need to take a stand. And Mr. President, I'd just like to go on record that my stand reflects my conscience that this is in the best interest of the people of Hawaii, and therefore I support the motion on the floor. Thank you."

Senator Iwase rose to speak in support of the motion and stated:

"Mr. President, today we are voting on a nominee to the highest court in our state. Our Supreme Court is the last stop -- it is the judicial body which renders final decisions on our constitution and our statutes. These decisions have broad and far-reaching implications for all of our people.

"Our laws are mere words on paper. The law is therefore only as powerful as the people's willingness to abide by those words and by the writings of those who interpret our laws.

"Each one of us, I am sure, has a definition of what the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii should be. The justices of the court must have the respect of the people, the institution of the Supreme Court must be above reproach if our laws -- which are so important in guiding our society -- are to be obeyed.

"The integrity of the highest court in our state must not be impugned. The trust of the people in the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii must not be broken.

"Over the past few days many of us have been deluged with phone calls, letters, and petitions opposing this nomination. My own view is that the responses cut across all lines. We are hearing, in short, the voice of a broad cross-section of our community. And by overwhelming numbers the people are saying to us that something is wrong. As a woman said to me over the weekend - 'it just doesn't seem right.'

"Controversy still swirls around this nomination. I will be voting for the motion to reject the nomination because the people's continued faith and confidence and trust in our court system is paramount and must be preserved."

Senator Blair then rose to speak against the motion and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against the motion and in favor of the confirmation. But, before getting into that aspect of it, I would like to thank you for assuring that this process was followed, although the particular process that was used is not the one that I would have preferred. As evidenced by my previous statements, and I feel that it's important that the reasons be clearly stated on the record. I think it's also important that I express my approval for your not allowing this matter to be decided by the clock running out. I think you preserved the integrity of the process and I do thank you for that. I want the record to reflect that.

"Like most of you, the calls against the confirmation of Sharon Himeno to my office have been running something like 50 to 1 against her confirmation. That, of course, is something that no politician is going to take lightly and I do not. However, the public's perception of the candidate for the high office is more a reflection, I think, of the newspaper coverage than anything else. While I hesitate to say that I discount the input from the public, I have spoken with a number of individuals who called and I have to weight their position according to the amount of clear information that they were able to muster in support of their position.

"I may also be at somewhat of an advantage over the Senators who are not members of the bar, in that I have heard from many of my fellow attorneys on this matter. Both in favor and against the nominee. There have been many who feel that she should be on the Supreme Court and there have been many who feel that she should not be on the Supreme Court. The reason I will be voting against the motion and thereby voting against denying confirmation is because the attorneys who spoke with the most personal knowledge of her, that is to say even in the bar ... I don't know how many attorneys there are in Honolulu now, 3500 probably, actively practicing ... even within the bar there are people who know her better than others. It seems to me, based on my exposure to this issue, that those who have the most intimate relationship, in terms of having worked with her or worked across the

table from her, seem to be the ones who have the highest regard for her. I therefore cannot shake the belief that somehow the controversy that surrounds her and may cause some people to vote against her because, like Caesar's wife, a nominee must be above even any remote appearance of impropriety, that in point of fact, she should not be held accountable for the fact that her father might be an extremely good businessperson or for whatever irrelevant reasons may cause people to have concerns about her. Nor would I vote against her because she served on boards of the state, because I don't think that that public service should be held against her. If we send a message out that having served the State of Hawaii in an unpaid capacity, as she has done, somehow taints one; then I think we're sending the wrong message to all of the people who serve on boards and commissions in the state.

"I just wanted to state, for the record, that I will be voting against the motion and in favor of her confirmation because those who have spoken to me with the most personal knowledge of her character and attributes have not been swayed by media coverage. They have told me that, just as I think in retrospect many people feel that the Senate made a mistake in not confirming Betty Vitousek, if we do not confirm Sharon Himeno time will prove us to have erred. Thank you."

Senator Reed rose in support of the motion and said:

"Mr. President, I rise in favor of the motion and in opposition to the nomination. I take issue slightly with the previous speaker to the extent that I don't think that this public reaction is a creature of the media coverage. I believe that this is one more indication that the people are a lot smarter than politicians tend to give them credit for.

"I think that in retrospect, this will be seen as an extremely positive experience, obviously, not for the nominee nor her family nor her supporters. And I know that every member of this body empathizes with her and her family and supporters. But I believe that in a larger aspect this has been a positive experience for the people of Hawaii. The people have expressed their sentiment and they are to be congratulated for the effort they put forth and their expressions of that heartfelt sentiment. I also am proud of this body for having echoed that public sentiment and for having taken a courageous stand.

"We all know, regardless of our partisan affiliation to the extent to which one even has such an attitude, what happens in a community when one political machine is too dominant. We know it from personal experiences and I know that many people in the audience and in this body have read 'Land and Power' (in Hawaii) which is simply one source of documentation of what can happen in a small community when those in power tend to gather together and watch out for one another, where cronyism overlaps government and the private sector.

"The public and Senate rejection of this nomination makes a statement that there is a line over which this kind of cronyism cannot cross, will not be accepted. I believe that this body's action today, in opposition to this nomination, will send a clear message to this governor and future governors who remember this action today that when it comes to the Supreme Court that is a body that deserves an independent justice and the State Senate had taken a stand on behalf of that independence. Thank you very much."

Senator Koki also supported the motion and stated:

"Mr. President, I too speak in favor of the motion. However, I'd like to take a little exception to the Senator from Maui when he made a statement that the people who are part of the bar may have an advantage over those who do not. I don't think it is possible to have an advantage by being a member of the bar to make good, sound, reasonable judgments.

"Mr. President, I want to thank you and the leadership in making me proud to be a part of this body. We are declaring that we are not going to be led by the hand, by the powers to be on where we should go. Thank you."

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, for the record, I would like to indicate that I do not think that Senator Koki's facilities are in any way impaired. If I gave such an indication I would like it withdrawn. What I meant to indicate is that there is additional data that is available because of intimate contact that attorneys have with each other and the internal knowledge of reputations. That is a disadvantage, only in a very limited sense. In other senses it may be a grave disadvantage to be an attorney, but, in this case I think it is an advantage. I'm acting in substantial part based upon information that I've gotten privately from my colleagues in the bar.

"I'd also like to address another point and that is Senator Reed's point that what is afoot here is a decision by the members of the Senate that we are going to depoliticize the process of nominating and appointing people to the Supreme Court. If that's the thrust of this vote and it's not, in fact, a vote against the nominee, I'm pleased to hear that and I trust that will be reflected in changes to the process of judicial selection because we all operate under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii. For better or for worse, and I may very well agree with the previous speaker that we can do better and I might very well support him in changes to the Constitution and perhaps de-politicize the process, as it now stands and as it was designed, there is a substantial political element built into the system. Before we abandon that, we should reflect upon whether or not that's not also healthy. The role of the governor in naming people to the Judicial Selection Commission and in choosing the person from the list was not something that was suddenly discovered with the nomination of Sharon Himeno. There's a very long history of having the executive branch involved in the appointment of the members of the Supreme Court, which is the head of the judicial branch, and having the legislative branch acting in advise and consent capacity. There is in fact a balance here between three co-equal branches of the government. Before we denigrate the role of the executive in that process we should reflect upon the balance that has withstood the test of time. calling it political and thereby disparaging it does not take away from the fact that there is in operation here a balancing of three co-equal branches of government. And before we disrupt that balance, I hope we will give it a great deal of thought. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan supported the motion and remarked:

Senator Tungpalan rose to speak in support of the motion and stated:

"After full consideration of all the facts pertaining to the nomination to the state Supreme Court of Sharon Himeno, I rise to speak in favor of the motion.

"Mr. President, while this confirmation process has been arduous it has aroused the sentiment of the citizens of our state. The people accepted the challenge to participate in our government through their numerous calls, faxes, petitions and letters. I've not seen, in the entire thirteen years I've served here in the Legislature, anything of this nature. I hope it continues as this is the

people's government and certainly one shouldn't forget that we are their servants.

"I do want to note here that I hope future prospects, for the judiciary or for that matter anyone in public service, will recognize that we should be knowledgeable about those organizations or corporations that we participate in as directors or officers, and we should not look askance or feel that ignorance of those internal matters would absolve us of any wrongdoings or any improprieties. That certainly bothered me about this nominee, with respect to her involvement as a director and as an officer of SS 168.

"It's very hard for me to confirm someone to the Supreme Court who feels that it was alright to have \$3 million in profit made in a one-day transaction, by a company that was half-owned by her father, and she was a director and an officer of.

"It really bothered me because people who work for the state and for the city and county get only 4.5% interest on the monies that they invest in their Employees' Retirement System. They got their money through hard work. What was really unappreciated was the fact that over the past 17 years we, ourselves, have been participating in taking from that system by not allowing the monies, over 8%, to be retained by the Employees' Retirement System. means that \$1 billion has funneled out of the Retirement System and into our state revenue. Considering that our state Retirement System is not fully funded, it is only 73% funded, and recognizing that in the future our children may have to pay for what we fail to do today, really It became apparent that this nominee bothers me. thought it was alright to have her father make \$3 million, together with other associates, in this SS 168, I just simply couldn't vote for this nomination.

"I think that if there's any line that is going to be drawn in the future for prospects to this judiciary, I hope it is that one of fairness and one of obligation to all the citizens of this state. We are not asking that every judicial prospect be advocates for the poor or for those who are not represented in the powers that be in the halls of this Legislature. What we are asking is that the nominee be an individual who has served admirably, has done what was best for the citizens of this beloved state. And if that's too much to ask, they should not serve on the highest court in our land.

"This is why I support the motion of our Floor Leader and I speak against the nomination of Sharon Himeno."

Senator B. Kobayashi also supported the motion and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the motion to reject the nominee.

"A prior speaker had mentioned that he had received information in a privileged capacity as a member of the bar, persuaded him to support the nominee. I too have received some information from members of the bar. Bar members have written to us expressing their disapproval of the nominee and, also, individuals who have not gone on public record in written form to express their disapproval of the nominee. Several of the individuals who contacted me indicated that they had worked with the nominee and that they had dealt with her in a professional capacity and on that basis they had suggested that the nominee should be rejected and that the nominee, while perhaps minimally qualified, did not reflect the highest standards that should be due our state Supreme

"Further, I would state that this whole process has broadened the question of our entire judicial selection

procedure. The rigor with which candidates for the Supreme Court and other courts go through is quite an arduous one and I think that we will have to look at what we do with the process and try to improve the caliber of the nominees that come before us.

"Back to the question of the nominee. I believe that we have before us a matter that is of both public as well as political interest. We have before us a nominee who seems to have crossed the threshold between public support and nonpublic support. And while we do not generally use public support as any kind of absolute gauge by which to make policy in government, we have to understand that in a democracy all agencies of government, including the Supreme Court, ultimately, must be supported by public trust and confidence.

"On Monday, I received approximately 70 phone calls at my office. Although 70 phone calls, there was, I believe, one phone call in support. So I would urge that we consider our roles as legislators representing the branch of government most closely connected to the people and be mindful that, especially in our roles, we have the responsibility of carrying through with that notion of democracy of government of the people, by the people and for the people.

"In conclusion, I would say that we have many grounds for not supporting the nominee. Among others, I believe we have an unprecedented testimony of over 240 members of the bar not supportive of the nominee and they have expressed this to us in writing. In addition to that, there are other members of the bar who have expressed their nonsupport of the nominee, though not in writing. And, also, I believe, we have gotten a very demonstrable public rejection of the nominee. Thank you."

Senator Graulty spoke in support of the motion and said:

"Mr. President, $\hat{\Gamma}$ speak in favor of the motion to reject the nomination.

"It is with heavy heart that I speak against the nomination of Sharon Himeno because I know Sharon Himeno; we practice law together. In fact, her office is next to mine. I've had many conversations with Sharon Himeno; I've had many conversations with her father Stan Himeno; I know her husband Warren Price. But I do so because my constituents have spoken. Over the last few days there have been many, many phone calls to me as there have been many phone calls to each member of this body, and I tried to listen to what the people were What they were saying in so many words, in so many different ways is that Sharon's appointment to the Supreme Court was a political move. It smelled of politics; it reeked of politics. That is not what they wanted to see in the Supreme Court and it is to that that I respond to.

"Secondly, Mr. President, I vote against the nomination of Sharon for the sake of the members of the bar. I am a member of the bar, I'm proud to be an attorney, and for the most part the members of the bar are hard-working and caring individuals and they would like to see someone on the Supreme Court that they could look to as an indication or as an expression of the fact that someone who has distinguished himself or herself is in the highest decision-making body in the system as we know it to be. And many have expressed that while Ms. Himeno, Sharon, is a good and competent attorney, that her level of experience and her scholarship is not of such a caliber to warrant an appointment to the state Supreme Court.

"Thirdly, Mr. President, I oppose the nomination for the sake of the court, the Judiciary, because if there is one place where it should not matter who is coming before it, it is the court — that's why the symbol of the Judiciary is the lady with the blindfold. This is the place where big and small, powerless and powerful come before it, and the appointment of Sharon was a symbol that this was no longer to be the case. And I think it was for these reasons that so much opposition was expressed to all of us here with regard to the nomination.

"Mr. President, I would hope that our efforts do not stop at the nomination of Sharon Himeno. As some of the Senators who have spoken before me have said, we need to look at the judicial selection process to try to remove as much of politics from that process as is possible. The fact that this appointment could result from such a process is an indication that the process is flawed and is need of repair.

"Additionally, Mr. President, I would hope that we would take a good look at how trustees are appointed to the Bishop Estate because that is part and parcel of what the public is objecting to. And I would hope that we also look at how the trustees to the Bishop Estate are appointed by the Supreme Court and I would challenge each member of this body to try to do something to make that process less political than it presently is.

"For those reasons, Mr. President, I oppose the nomination of Ms. Himeno and support the motion to reject her nomination."

Senator Ikeda also spoke for the motion, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the motion, not as Floor Leader but as one who was at the hearing and able to question the nominee.

"At the hearing, the nominee made it very clear that she wanted us to focus on her qualifications. She wanted to be judged on her own merit and not be compared with others who might have been candidates. And this is what I tried to do as I sat there and deliberated during that hearing.

"I was troubled by the problems or the lack of response regarding dealings with the Retirement System and SS 168. However, even after putting that aside and focusing on the nominee's qualifications, I have to say that I found them to be lacking. There is no doubt that she is competent; she's bright; she's articulate; she's charming. But, what I wanted to know was, what kind of experience a person nominated to sit on the highest court in this state would possess. She cited 11 years of experience in litigation but when asked about her three most memorable cases, three cases that she would be most proud of in her accomplishments, she cited three that were of really little consequence and, of those three, I believe only one went to actual trial and in that one situation, she was second chair.

"People talked about her extensive involvement in the community and her charitable work and working with the underprivileged. I specifically asked about her community involvement because her resume cited only two organizations, the Hawaii Bar Association and the Young Lawyers' Association. It was clear by her response that her involvement has been primarily within those organizations and not really a 'hand's on' type of involvement, working with people one-on-one -- actually helping real people in the community. And therefore I believe that those who consider themselves in the minority, less powerful or underprivileged, have a legitimate concern as to whether the nominee can relate to their problems.

"I think that another component for a good justice would be life experiences. It doesn't bother me that the nominee is young because I think there are many people, despite their ages, who can accomplish a great deal and who have accomplished a great deal. But the fact that there was nothing in the way of extensive experience working with people in the community showed me that life experience was quite lacking.

"There is no doubt that she meets the minimum qualifications and, certainly, those minimal qualifications got her selected as one of the six nominees presented to the governor. But I don't believe that that's enough. It's certainly not enough to serve on the highest court in this state.

"Mr. President, I know this is difficult for everyone, particularly difficult for me because there is nothing that would make me happier than to be able to vote in favor of the confirmation of a woman to the state Supreme Court

"However, I must agree with Elizabeth Fujiwara, an attorney, when she wrote in her testimony, which I received after the hearing. I'm going to quote from it: 'Appointing an unqualified woman to the highest judicial position in the state is not the answer. It would make a mockery of the concept of affirmative action. And, indeed, this nomination is an insult to women attorneys; it is tokenism as well as sexism in its highest form.'

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I cannot support this nomination and I will be voting in favor of the motion."

The motion to reject the nomination made in Governor's Message No. 155 was then put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, the nomination was rejected on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Although acknowledging that there was nothing illegal about the meeting, the editorial speculated that the closed work session might somehow undermine public confidence in whatever came out of it.

"As the editorial points out, my intent in structuring that meeting as I did was to encourage openness and honesty on the part of the participants. In earlier meetings, it was clear to me that the atmosphere was not conducive to the kind of candor necessary to resolve the very difficult problems we are facing. Those of us who have legislative experience know that the presence of the media, with its lights and microphones and cameras and reporters, often inhibits the fact-finding process. I don't know how the rest of you feel, but I want to know the whole truth, not just what someone is willing to say on

"May I note that this was not a meeting by invitation only. People came to the public hearing held on this bill saying that they agreed with the concept but did not have the time to study the content and react to specifics because it was first made available on that day.

"I invited them to sit down with me and discuss the commissioner's proposal and also explore alternatives.

"We are not dealing with an ordinary problem here -it is a crisis in every sense of the word. We are about half way through this legislative session and still a long way from any comprehensive solution -- I am not sure at this point whether there is a comprehensive solution. But we are trying our best and working as quickly as we can. I do not want the public to be misled as to the availability or nonavailability of a solution by edited media coverage of what are still preliminary discussions.

"If having meetings of this kind is what it takes to get the job done, then I am willing to do it even at the expense of criticism from the Advertiser. While the media wants to be there because it has to have something to print in its papers and show during its news telecasts, I have learned that what the public really wants in the end is results, and I will ultimately be judged by that standard, open meetings or not.

"I might add, Mr. President, that if there was any intent to keep this discussion secret, I certainly would not have had two dozen people present nor would I have held it in this building. Thank you."

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL

The President announced that he had now read and approved the Journal of the Senate of the Twenty-Third Day, February 24, 1993.

The President, in approving the Journal of the Twenty-Third Day, said:

"Members of the Senate, in so doing, the Chair would like to include remarks into the Journal to clarify earlier remarks made by the Chair. You have a copy of my remarks in front of you."

There being no objections, the remarks of the Chair follow:

"I want to clarify my remarks in response to a question raised by the Senator from Maui. The question asked was whether I was in contact with the chair of the Committee on Executive Appointments. My answer on the floor was that I was not in touch with him 'personally.'

"I did not discuss the matter with the Chair face to face at any time before the vote and therefore felt that there was no 'personal' dialogue on the issue. I would have liked our brief conversation over the phone at the eleventh hour to have been more extensive.

"For me, a life-long resident of the Leeward Coast, a conversation by way of telephone is most impersonal. It

was in that sense that I felt that I did not have a 'personal' talk with the Chair.

"I wish to point out also that I did bring the chairman's request to delay the nomination until he gets back to Hawaii to the attention of the Senators in support of my leadership. After lengthy discussion, I made a decision to bring this matter for a vote.

"I will not include the additions that I had intended to make

"I hope that this clarifies my statement and apologize for any problem it may have caused."

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 502 (Gov. Msg. No. 161):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 502 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this motion and the nominee Riki May Amano.

"As the chairman of the Committee on Executive Appointments, I would like to inform this body that all of the testimonies received on behalf of Judge Amano were both complimentary and very positive. I would also like to note, the common theme which echoed throughout the hearing was Judge Amano's exemplary sense of fairness, her impeccable integrity, and her strong character.

"In the words of one of the testifiers: 'Her elevation to the Third Circuit Court bench will reflect a true commitment to the ideal of appointing the legal community's best and brightest to the judiciary.'

"I wholeheartedly agree with this assessment, Mr. President, and I therefore urge my colleagues to vote in support of Governor's Message No. 161."

Senator Matsuura also spoke in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I think I'm the only person in this room that has appeared before Judge Amano. This was regarding a geothermal trespass trial.

"In her court room, there were people who were progeothermal as well as anti-geothermal. Everyone came out of the trial saying that Judge Amano was a fair judge, a most responsible judge, and an honorable judge. She is definitely a professional judge and I wholeheartedly ask for your support for her confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also spoke in support of the nomination and said:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I also speak in support of the nominee and in support of the two previous speakers.

"I would like to add, Mr. President, that the nominee exemplifies the spirit of 'keiki o ka aina' in the State of Hawaii and I am very happy to be in support of her nomination."

Senator Chang, also in support of the nominee, stated:

"Mr. President, I have not had the opportunity to be a schoolmate of the judge as my colleague from Kohala has, but, I have had the opportunity to observe Judge Amano through her undergraduate years, law school program and beyond. I'm very, very touched by this appointment. She is well-qualified. She brought life to her family, brought life to her college program, brought life to the Richardson School of Law, and will bring life, new life, to the Judiciary of the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Matsunaga added his remarks, as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"I rise to to speak in favor of Judge Amano. I think it is appropriate, in light of the fact that a few days ago we were visited by some of the members of the UH football team, to also bring to light that Judge Amano has not only displayed judicious wisdom but is a member of the 'Ete Bowl' (UH Law School annual women's touch football game) hall of fame. Thank you."

Senator Graulty also supported the appointment of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, 17 years ago I had the honor and privilege of attending the University of Hawaii William Richardson School of Law, and Riki Amano was one of the members of the Class of '79 to which I belong. And I can say from personal experience that Riki was one of the outstanding members of the class in terms of her scholarship, and in terms of the difficulty she had going through law school with two young children. She has really demonstrated, I think, to all of us in the class and the rest of the law school her great ability, and I am greatly thrilled that she is now elevated to the circuit court. And I speak in favor of her nomination. Thank you."

"Mr. President, very briefly, I rise to speak in support of this measure.

"We all know that the issue of 'high three' has been a controversial issue in the Legislature and in the public arena. And what this bill does is stop the incentive that 'high three' gives to our Retirement System. It stops the windfall from participating in a system that rewards people who move from the legislative branch to the executive branch.

"For example, Mr. President, if you are in service in the Legislature for 16 years and then you took a 'high three' job that pays \$70,000 a year, your annual retirement would come up to \$48,575. If this bill passes, Mr. President, the same situation, that individual would not be precluded from serving in the executive branch, but it just says that that individual will have his or her retirement based upon legislative service and if they move to the executive branch there's a separate retirement formula that will be calculated there, and that is \$26,175. So there is a significant difference.

"And what this bill does, in my eyes, Mr. President, is restore the balance of power between the two branches of government and it prevents possible incentives or windfalls that would be leveraged on this branch.

"I think that this is a good move to show that the Legislature has some independence in taking a stand that we do believe legislators should be entitled to retirement but there should not be a windfall for serving in the executive branch.

"I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes.' Thank you, Mr. President."

This is our attempt to follow up on that and this bill is a very important bill because it changes two important things. One, it allows schools to carry money over from one fiscal year to the next. No longer will schools be penalized for making good budgetary decisions and be forced to spend money at the end of the fiscal year. And second, this excludes schools from the quarterly allotment system. We all know that the quarterly allotment system does not support the way schools spend money.

"In the effort of putting this bill together, I'd like to thank the Budget and Finance director for being open-minded and looking at government in a new way and working with us to try and re-invent government and not having a budget system that supports bureaucracies but really support schools.

"This is a bill, I think, the Senate can be very proud of and is moving forward to change the nature of schooling and the way we support schools to make the school the focal point of the system, rather than the bureaucracy. Thank you, Mr. President."

"Mr. President, we are all aware of the dilemma we face on the Hamakua Coast with the closure of Hamakua Sugar Co. and the impending closure of C. Brewer and Co. sugar operations. Perhaps we are not apprised of the real seriousness of the situation so, at this time, I would like to insert in the Senate Journal some information pertaining to Hamakua.

"Testimony presented by Yoshito Takamine of the Hamakua Development Council at the Human Services Committee informational hearing in Hamakua stated that a Legislative Reference Bureau study revealed that every dollar of sugar income generates \$1.15 of personal income in Hawaii. Thus, a direct payroll for the entire sugar industry \$71 million in 1990 equated to \$81.7 million to Hawaii's income stream.

"According to formula developed by economists, closure of Hamakua Sugar and C. Brewer could conceivably impact nearly 4,000 workers, triple the number of unemployed on the Island of Hawaii, and represent a 27% increase in unemployment statewide.

"Based on average monthly figures for individuals and families of four, closures in the Hamakua Coast would result in costs ranging from \$38.9 million to \$93.1 million in state and federal aid -- on a worst case scenario the costs would represent approximately 21% increase in state and federal assistance per year.

"In view of these findings, drastic and immediate steps must be taken to alleviate the effects of sugar plantation closures. We need help in Hamakua. As a matter of fact the whole state would be significantly affected by Hamakua's closures.

"Mahalo."

Senator Matsuura spoke in support of the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"This bill is perhaps one of the most significant measures that will be discussed this session. What it does is that it creates a telecommunications free trade zone on Oahu, the Big Island, Maui and Kauai.

"The telecommunication industry is moving and expanding so rapidly that the innovations taking place in this industry are so dramatic that any delay would put us back significantly.

"This measure, if passed, would give Hawaii an opportunity to compete for the world telecommunication hub in the Pacific. We are very fortunate in that Hawaii is located geographically in the middle of the East and the West. We can work both time zones from this geographic location.

"The other important aspect is that the trans-Pacific fiber-optic cables passes through Hawaii. By July of this year, there will be a telecommunication satellite above Hawaii. Having this telecommunication fiber-optic cables and the satellite would put Hawaii into a very favorable position where many of the multi-national companies would want to come to Hawaii to put their headquarters here in Hawaii. This measure would be make all of that possible!

"Some of you may wonder, would Hawaiian Tel revenues be affected? Hawaiian Tel can compete in this zone like anybody else. Right now in the United States there are about 53 million enhanced ISDN lines available to all the business customers. Hawaii has zero. There are companies that are willing to come to Hawaii to put

these ISDN facilities in the State of Hawaii at their cost. I have written to almost 200 of the 'Fortune 500' companies if they would open an office in Hawaii. I'm sure we'll get some favorable response. Should we have a telecommunication free zone, a lot of these large companies will come and base their Pacific headquarters here in Hawaii.

"I want to urge all of my colleagues to vote up on this measure because it will have a tremendous economic development prospect for Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in opposition to this measure. I would like to point out that ISDN, which is a very advanced technology as Senator Matsuura has stated, can be achieved in a number of different ways that a number of states are adopting across the country. About half of the 50 states have already revised their regulations to try and spur advance telecommunications through rate-of-return price structuring, in which modernization investment can be recouped through a higher percentage of revenue coming back to the company as a profit. Other governments are turning to price cap regulations, locking in prices for various services to force firms to innovate, to reduce costs and to improve efficiency.

"I'd just like to cite a few examples of some of the things that other state PUCs are doing to achieve results similar to those that are stated as the purpose of this bill. For example, the Vermont PUC grants greater pricing flexibility to the local phone company in return for its commitment to upgrade technology and provide basic levels of service to every community.

"In Nebraska, deregulated rates, except for basic phone service, have resulted in wide ranging technology improvements. The state also requires the telephone companies to file a plan for their disposition of revenues resulting from tax law changes.

"And in Michigan, Governor Blanchard's vision of the country's finest infrastructure is now coming to fruition, where the state has provided grants and incentives for development of a variety of telecommunication devices. Michigan Bell Telephone now receives a range of rates of return depending on how much profit the company generates and how much it invests in capital equipment, particularly in the deployment of fiber-optic technology to towns and rural upper peninsulas.

"In conclusion, Mr. President, I would like to urge the members to consider whether we might be able to achieve the same type of results by giving our local PUC greater flexibility in rate-of-return types of pricing. Thank you."

Senator Matsunaga rose to support the measure and

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"This measure would be a great step in making Hawaii more competitive in the telecommunications industry. I'm hopeful that, with the passage of this measure, Hawaii will be known not only for its sun, surf and sand but also for its systems, and that's digital systems. Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, I just want to reiterate our advantage. The sugar company in Hamakua is going down, and we are in some economic crisis. I can assure you that Oahu

Sugar may not be operating in the year 1996. The telecommunication free zone will provide a lot of jobs, a lot of high paying jobs. It's a clean non-polluting industry. I just want to make it very clear that this ISDN technology that is being promoted into this free zone has nothing to do with the regular telephone service. Hawaiian Tel has a total monopoly of that. The simplest way I can explain ISDN to you is that, if a fax message comes from Hong Kong to Hawaii, one page of the fax can come to Hawaii in one second. Today, it will take 20 seconds to produce one page of fax. If we had an ISDN line, the whole page will come out in one second!

"These are some of the technologies that are available in Hong Kong, Tokyo, New Zealand, Singapore, Guam, etc. It's not important what the other states do or don't have. The important thing is that we don't have any ISDN lines. We have the geographic advantage right here in the State of Hawaii because we have the fiber-optic trans-Pacific line coming right straight through Hawaii. The VSAT satellites are going to be launched this July and will be operational by the end of this year.

"I can guarantee that if these bills pass, it'll open up a tremendous business opportunity for the State of Hawaii. We cannot miss this window of opportunity!

"It is true the other states have initiated and moved ahead of us. If you look at New Zealand, the whole country is a telecommunication free-zone. We're not the first in terms of initiating some of these kinds of ideas; nevertheless, what is important is that we still have a window of opportunity for six months because the State of Hawaii is at the right place at the right time. Thank you!"

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill relating to Hawaiian Sovereignty.

"Our Hawaiian people have kept Queen Liliuokalani's plea for steadfastness or to 'onipa'a' for the past 100 years. We began our journey this past January 17th when tens of thousands of Hawaiians came together with dignity and solemnity to observe the Centennial of the Overthrow of our Queen's Kingdom.

"Another major step on the honored path to sovereignty is being taken with this measure. It has the broad support of the Hawaiian community because it allows them to chart and decide their own destiny. This bill provides hope that our beloved Hawaiian people and heritage will survive and flourish after having waited a 100 years for justice.

"Before Queen Liliuokalani's death in 1917, she left us with the following thoughts which ring true today, tomorrow and for all times:

'I could not turn back the time for the political change, but there is still time to save our heritage. You must remember never to cease to act because you fear you may fail. The way to lose any earthly kingdom is to be inflexible, intolerant and prejudicial. Another way is to be too flexible, tolerant of too many wrongs and without judgment at all. It is a razor's edge. It is the width of a blade of pili grass. To gain the kingdom of heaven is to hear what is not said, to see what cannot be seen, and to know the unknowable -- that, is Aloha! All things in this world are two; in heaven there is but One.'"

Senator Chang also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Government Operations, Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Programs held hearings on several proposals relating to this subject. They included proposals from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Ka La Hui, the Hou Hawaiians, and the Pele Defense Fund. Ultimately, after a hearing that exceeded ten hours and several other work sessions that were conducted by our colleague, Senator Malama Solomon, your committee utilized a vehicle that had been submitted by both the majority and the minority and combined the proposals that had been submitted by the aforementioned groups, and included the prefatory language that had been drafted by Senator Eloise Tungpalan in Senate Bill 1139. We utilized that language guided by the foundational work that she had earlier described and put it all into this vehicle, Senate bill 1028. It is truly a work of 'laulima,' many hands.

"We look forward to further refinement of these proposals and establishing a framework which will incorporate all of the different elements of the Hawaiian community, and look forward to the next two months in resolving the different issues that still remain.

"I want to thank, at this time, our colleagues, Senator Eloise Tungpalan and Senator Malama Solomon, for their fine work and efforts in crafting this bill. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, in support of the bill, stated:

 $^{\prime\prime}$ Mr. President, I would like your permission to submit some remarks into the Journal in support of the bill. $^{\prime\prime}$

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon's remarks follow:

"Mr. President, a most important step in the pursuit of sovereignty is to achieve Hawaiian Home Lands Trust claim against the federal government.

"Arent Fox Kintner Plotkin & Kahn, who has had extensive experience in successfully advocating the interests of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and several Native American governments recommends that the State of Hawaii initially pursue a legislative solution that would, first, to the extent possible, provide a simple administrative mechanism for fair settlement of outstanding claims as to lands currently occupied and used by the federal government; and second, create the basis for litigation in federal courts of remaining claims.

"To pursue legislative remedies, first, a legislative package will be developed. This will lead to education of members and staff of key congressional committees. In order for a successful result, there will be a need to

recruit allies outside of Hawaii for the purpose of establishing a coalition of support for Hawaii's goals.

"If we are to follow the recommendations of Arent Fox, the input of native Hawaiians would be all important.

"This bill will work toward the creation of a common and rightful voice for native Hawaiians that would guide any effort toward the goal of sovereignty."

Senator Tungpalan then added:

"Mr. President, I would also like to thank the chair of the Government Operations, Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Programs Committee. He certainly was a good chef in putting together this wonderful bill. Thank you."

"(3) Prisoner's plan and participation. Each prisoner shall be given reasonable notice of his parole hearing and shall prepare a parole plan, setting forth the manner of life he intends to lead if released on parole, including specific information as to where and with whom he will reside and what occupation or employment he will follow. The prisoner shall be paroled in the county of original commitment or to a location outside the state, unless the prisoner can establish to the satisfaction of the Hawaii paroling authority that a permanent residence and occupation or employment in a county having a population greater than 500,000 has been established prior to the prisoner's release. By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 833, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PAROLE," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 11, 1993.

S.B. No. 15, S.D. 1:

Senator Ikeda moved that S.B. No. 15, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Levin then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 2) to S.B. No. 15, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. S.B. 15, S.D. 1, section 2, number 16, is amended as follows

(1) By amending lines 11 to 20 on page 32, to read:

"(d) [This section shall not apply to elected officials or candidates who failed to be nominated or elected."] Candidates who fail to be nominated or elected and do not become a candidate for nomination or election to office within four years thereafter and elected officials who resign their office before the end of their term or who do not file to become a candidate for reelection within four years after their resignation or the end of the term for which they did not seek reelection, shall surrender all consumer goods, vehicles, and equipment for which fifty per cent or more of the purchase price was paid with campaign funds to the commission, or pay into the election fund an amount equal to the campaign funds used. All goods surrendered shall become the property of the State."

Senator Levin then moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Senator Blair and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 15, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 11, 1993.

S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 1:

Senator Ikeda moved that S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Matsuura then offered the amendment (Floor Amendment No. 4 - See EXHIBIT "A" <u>infra</u>)) to S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 1.

Senator Matsuura, in support of the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, there've been several key changes made on S.B. 1126, S.D. 1.

"In Section 411A, the number of exemptions from competitive bidding have been cut from 14 to 5. In order to achieve competitive pricing and accountability, the number of blanket exemptions has been strictly limited. The bill contains a provision for emergency procurement so the elimination of these exemptions will not hinder officials in responding to any threat of public health, welfare, or safety.

"In Part II, the composition of the policy board has been changed from 13 to 5 members who will not be full time employees. Because the function of the policy board is to assist the chief procurement officer in the initial transition to a centralized procurement system, it is important that the board not be so large to prevent it from reaching a consensus. The board should be composed of members whose position does not conflict with the goal of centralization. To avoid creating a permanent bureaucracy, a board of five members will expire in three years, unless reauthorized.

"Penalty provisions have been added to Part I (we put it back in) and sections 805 and 806, strong penalty provisions are necessary to guarantee that the procurement code is followed and to prevent the state from being victimized by overpriced and improper purchases.

"Provisions for independent auditing have been added to Part I and Part X. Independent oversight will insure that the proper procedures are being utilized.

"Part XII on Product Preferences has been added. This part provides for geographic bidding, that means people on the neighbor islands, the businesses, can bid on some of these contracts.

"Finally, the amended version of the bill is substantially longer because the provisions of existing law which would be repealed or amended have been included.

"Those are the major changes that have been suggested in the amendment. Thank you."

Senator Chang offered the following amendment to Floor Amendment No. 4 and said:

"Mr. President, I would first like to thank the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and the Committee on Ways and Means for advancing the draft to the floor of the Senate, which this floor amendment proposes to amend. By advancing that version to the floor the Committee on Ways and Means and its chairman permitted further discussion on the various issues which revolve around the need to reform our procurement system; a need that has been perceived for several sessions.

"I state, on behalf of the Committee on Government Operations, our appreciation for the work performed by the Majority Leader in examining that draft and attempting to reconcile the differences between the original Senate Bill 1126 and Senate Draft 1 of 1126. In his attempt to reconcile the differences, he has come up with proposed Senate Draft 2.

"Upon examination of this draft, we think that, all in all, it represents a good vehicle to advance to the House for further discussion by both chambers. It represents a step forward, progress in reconciling the different issues; there remains just one fundamental issue that needs to be solved. It is necessary to solve that issue, Mr. President, because we have previously attempted to reform the procurement process and the previous attempt was vetoed by the executive.

"As we go forward in this area, therefore, we need to always be aware that the proposal we advance needs to conform to the constitutional and statutory framework of laws in our nation and our state. This one remaining area of concern, Mr. President, has to do with the language found on page 2 of the amendment. It's Subsection 2(b), the section that talks about the creation and membership of the procurement policy office, at the top of the second page of the floor amendment. The amendment provides that 'The speaker of the house of representatives shall submit a list of nominees for two of the members, one of which shall be from the business community and the other from the general community. The president of the senate shall submit a list of nominees for two of the members, one of which shall be from the business community and the other from the general community.

"The difficulty we foresee with this provision, Mr. President, is that this kind of appointment structure is not found anywhere in the laws of the nation, and nowhere in the laws of the State of Hawaii, which relate to the appointment of administrative officers by the Executive. And the reason that we do not find this kind of appointment structure, Mr. President, is because it violates the principle of the separation of powers. I'd like to go on for just a little bit about this principle.

"In 1992, the Legislature requested in H.C.R. No. 72 that the state auditor study the fiscal relationship between Hawaii's legislative and executive branches. The report stated: 'The separation of powers among the executive,

legislative, and judicial branches of government is a basic principle of the political system in the United States.' When we examine this principle, Mr. President, by looking into American Jurisprudence, that tome states:

'It has been said that the principle of the separation of the powers of government is fundamental to the very existence of constitutional government as established in the United States. The principle has also been referred to as one of the chief merits of the American system of written constitutions. It has been declared that the division of governmental powers into executive, legislative, and judicial represents probably the most important principle of government declaring and guaranteeing the liberties of the people, and preventing the exercise of autocratic power, and that it is a matter of fundamental necessity, and is essential to the maintenance of a republican form of government. It has been stated that no maxim has been more universally received and cherished as a vital principle of freedom.'

"American Jurisprudence goes on to say, 'The principle of separation of the powers of government operates in a broad manner to confine legislative powers to the legislature, executive powers to the executive department, and those which are judicial in character to the judiciary. The principle is not new; it certainly antedates the Federal Constitution, and indeed, has been traced back to Cicero, Aristotle, Locke, and Montesquieu.'

"Mr. Arthur T. Vanderbilt, in discussing the doctrine of the separation of powers and its present day significance, said, 'Washington, in his Farewell Address, warned: "The spirit of encroachment" (This is back in 1700s, Mr. President.) "The spirit of encroachment tends to consolidate the powers of all the departments in one, and thus to create, whatever the form of government, a real despotism."

"James Sundquist, in his treatise entitled 'Constitutional Reform and Effective Government,' noted that 'The men who made up the Federal Convention of 1787 wavered during the course of their deliberations on most of the specific features of the constitutional structure they evolved, but they never vacillated on its central principle. That was the doctrine that the powers of government must be separated into independent branches-legislative, executive, and judicial. Nearly all the delegates arrived in Philadelphia clearly committed to that objective.

"'And so, clearly, were the constituents of the delegates. In the <u>Federalist</u> papers that explained the new Constitution to the country, James Madison of Virginia referred to the separation of powers as "the sacred maxim of free government,".'

"Turning then to the Federalist papers, Mr. President, beginning at No. 47, Mr. Madison exclaims that 'the political maxim' is 'that the legislative, executive, and judiciary departments ought to be separate and distinct.' You will notice, Mr. President, that he uses the term 'department' for branches. He goes on to say that 'this accumulation of power, or ... a mixture of powers,' has 'a dangerous tendency to such an accumulation,' and that 'the preservation of liberty requires that the three great departments of power should be separate and distinct.'

"He notes in Paper No. 47 that 'As to the appointment to offices, particularly executive offices, is in its nature an executive function, ...'

"Then he goes on to say, 'The legislative department derives a superiority in our governments from other circumstances. Its consitutional powers being at once

more extensive, and less susceptible of precise limits, it can, with greater facility, mask, under complicated and indirect measures, the encroachments which it makes on the co-ordinate departments. ... 'the legislative department alone has access to the pockets of the people, and has in some constitutions full discretion, and in all a prevailing influence over the pecuniary rewards of those who fill the other departments, a dependence is thus created in the latter, which gives still greater facility to encroachments of the former.'

"Finally, Mr. President, in Paper No. 51, Mr. Madison asks, 'To what expedient, then, shall we finally resort, for maintaining in practice the necessary partition of power among the several departments as laid down in the Constitution? The only answer that can be given is ... by so contriving the interior structure of the government as that its several constituent parts may, by their mutual relations, be the means of keeping each other in their proper places. ... each department should have a will of its own; and consequently should be so constituted that the members of each should have as little agency as possible in the appointment of the members of the others.'

"Thus, Mr. President, when the Legislature of North Carolina sought to control the appointment of members to their Environmental Management Commission, in the case of State of North Carolina, Baarkalow and Armstrong, Thomas, Bone and Nash, examined the doctrines and principles which I just summarized and states that 'There should be no doubt that the principle of separation of powers is a cornerstone of our state and federal governments.'

"Numerous decisions from sister states show strict adherence to the separation of powers principle and do not tolerate legislative encroachment or control over the function and power of the executive branch.

"With these statements in mind, Mr. President, your committee is very concerned that the arrangement proposed on page 2 of the floor amendment does not meet with the requirements of these principles, and invites disapproval by the executive -- the last thing that we would want in this session.

"To that end, Mr. President, I move to delete the language found in the floor amendment on page 2 beginning with the words 'The speaker of the house of representatives' and ending with the words 'and the other from the general community.'"

Senator Blair rose to second the motion.

At 5:53 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 6:08 o'clock p.m.

The motion was then put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to be adopted on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Chang then rose to state:

"Mr. President, recognizing the practicalities of the situation, I'm sure that with the concerns having been expressed, the Senate will find a way to nevertheless fully investigate the issues and come up with a workable and practical and effective position. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then moved that the Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Matsunaga.

Senator Blair then rose to speak against Floor Amendment No. 4, as follows:

"Mr. President, the Constitution overrides our policy preferences. Therefore, despite the fact that there are some good things in the amendment, I will vote 'no' on the amendment, in order to preserve the separation of powers, and urge my colleagues to do likewise. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"Mr. President, I know the hour is late but I would like to rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I was very surprised to read the Lieutenant Governor's remarks this morning in the Advertiser concerning the nomination of Mario Ramil to the Supreme Court. It appears to me that the Lieutenant Governor has taken it upon himself to personally evaluate and judge the merits of each Supreme Court nominee. In so doing, Mr. President, he has questioned the character and integrity of at least two candidates and the judicial selection process as set forth in our State Constitution. In his defense, he has justified his actions with the following

public statement which he made in a speech to the Rotary Club of Maui:

'The public deserves to have the most capable legal talent sitting on the State Supreme Court. It is not just a matter of finding people who are intelligent. Intelligent people holding degrees are a dime a dozen. It is a matter of finding individuals who demonstrate they possess wisdom and fairness, strength of character, depth of experience, maturity and compassion.'

"I would like to remind the Lieutenant Governor that those who are bound by the Constitution to make the selection of judges, which are the Judicial Selection Commission, the Governor, and this Senate, are in complete agreement with him. I am certain that this was uppermost in the mind of the Judicial Selection Commission when they developed a list of potential candidates, and the Governor when he made the selection of nominees. It will also be a principal consideration for me and the members of your Committee on Executive Appointments, next Tuesday.

"I'd like to take this opportunity, Mr. President, to assure the Lieutenant Governor that the Senate will carry out its constitutional responsibilities to the best of its ability. If it was the intent of the Lieutenant Governor to remind the Senate of these responsibilities, then I would like to thank him for his consideration. If it was not, then I would like to invite him to participate in the public hearing on the nomination of Mario Ramil to the Supreme Court, next Tuesday. Thank you."

Senator Chang, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. President, as we approach adjournment, one could argue that there was sufficient time to have printed the amendment to the amendment to Senate Bill 1126 had it successfully passed. I would like to encourage leadership to examine the new process which we have instituted, which permits floor amendments to bills on third or final reading, and perhaps institute a procedure whereby these amendments to the bill can be thoughtfully considered and possibly amended and not compel the members of this body to accept concepts which they may not entertain in their hearts, merely because of the logistical problems that are presented by either printing or reproducing the text of the amendment to the amendment.

"I did note that there seemed to be a quiver of interest on the part of the assembly. There was one 'kanalua' and two muftled 'noes,' so we were very close to agreement on this one. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you. Your comments are very good and we will take them into consideration."

SECTION 1. S.B. No 1126, S.D. 1, section 2, is amended as follows:

- (1) By amending lines 15 to 22 on page 3, and lines 1 to 5 on page 4, to read:
- "\$ -105 Application of this code. (a) This Act applies only to contracts solicited or entered into after the effective date of this Act, unless the parties agree to its application to a contract solicited or entered into before the effective date of this Act.
- (b) This Act shall apply to every expenditure of public funds irrespective of their source, including federal assistance money, except as otherwise specified in section -403 of this Act, acting through a governmental body under any contract. However, this Act does not apply to either grants or contracts between the State and its political subdivisions or other governmental bodies, except as provided by part X. This Act also applies to the disposal of equipment and supplies of the State."
- (2) By amending lines 4 to 22 on page 12 and lines 1 to 20 on page 13, to read:
- "\$ -201 Creation and membership of the procurement policy office. (a) There is hereby created in the department of accounting and general services an autonomous state procurement policy office.

- (b) The policy office shall consist of a board of five members appointed by the governor pursuant to section 26-34, who shall not otherwise be full-time employees of the State of Hawaii. Each appointed member shall have demonstrated sufficient business or professional experience to discharge the functions of the policy office. The speaker of the house of representatives shall submit a list of nominees for two of the members, one of which shall be from the business community and the other from the general community. The president of the senate shall submit a list of nominees for two of the members, one of which shall be from the business community and the other from the general community.
- (c) The policy office shall function for three years from the effective date of this Act and shall be terminated unless reauthorized by new legislation.
- (d) The members of the policy office shall devote such time to their duties as may be necessary for the proper discharge thereof.
- (e) The department of accounting and general services shall provide at least one full time support staff and funding necessary to support the policy office, or as the policy office may request. The funding shall include, but is not limited to, salaries and wages, fringe benefits, supplies and materials, equipment, office space, member per diem, and travel.
- S -202 Authority and duties of the policy office. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the policy board shall have the authority and responsibility to assist the chief procurement officer in the centralization of the State of Hawaii's procurement activities. The policy office shall consider and decide matters of policy within the scope of this Act including those referred to it by the chief procurement officer. The policy office shall have the power to review, monitor and audit the implementation of the rules and requirements of this Act, but shall not exercise authority over the award or administration of any particular contract, or any other dispute, claim or litigation pertaining to a contract.
- (b) Members shall be allowed compensation at the rate of \$100 per day for each day's actual attendance at meetings; transportation fares between islands and abroad; and personal expenses at a rate established for civil service employees while attending board meetings or while on official business as authorized by the chairperson."
 - (3) By amending lines 7 to 20 on page 31 to read:
- "\$ -411A Exemptions. Expenditures may be made for the following supplies, equipment, services, and construction without using competitive sealed bidding or any other source selection method provided for in this chapter:
 - (1) Grants;
 - (2) Works of art for museum and public display;

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- (3) Supplies, equipment, services, or construction obtained from another governmental body or the federal government;
- (4) Meats and foodstuffs for the Kalaupapa settlement when the department of health does not receive or receives only one bid; and
- (5) Supplies purchased by the University of Hawaii bookstore for resale."
- (4) By adding a new sentence to page 35, line 2, to read as follows:

"For compliance audit purposes, a file of all working papers, to include but not limited to staff notes shall be retained in a central file."

- (5) By amending lines 13 to 22 on page 43 to read:
- "\$ -805 Disclosure requirements. The state ethics commission shall adopt rules to implement disclosure requirements, and shall inform all employees and prospective employees of those procedures and the rules governing conflict of interest. Any person who violates this part shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.
- § -806 Penalty. Findings of employee violation of this part shall require appropriate disciplinary action by the appointing authority which may range from a written reprimand to dismissal in accordance with rules adopted by the chief procurement officer. This part does not impair any other remedies against employees which are in existence on its effective date.

In addition, any individual who violates any material provision of this chapter or makes, or causes to be made any excessive expenditure or incurs or causes to be incurred any excessive obligation shall be deemed in violation of this part, and shall be subject to pay all excess expenditures or obligation and shall be guilty of a felony, and shall be subject to a fine no greater than \$15,000 and shall be imprisoned for not more than five years. Acts of misfeasance, malfeasance or gross nonfeasance done in connection with this chapter shall also be considered a violation of this part."

(6) By adding the definitions of "office of purchasing" and "policy office" to page 9, to read as follows:

"Office of purchasing" means the office of the chief procurement officer.

"Policy office" means the state procurement policy office created by part III of this Act."

(7) By adding the definition of "State" to read as follows:

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"State" means the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of the State; all public elementary, intermediate, and high schools; the University of Hawaii; all state-funded hospitals; and each county of the State; provided that this term shall not include the public libraries."

- (8) By amending lines 22 to 23 on page 13, and lines 1 to 15 on page 14 to read:
- "\$ -301 Appointment and qualifications of initial chief procurement officer. (a) The policy office shall appoint the initial chief procurement officer. The chief procurement officer shall have a minimum of eight years experience, at least five years of which shall have been in public procurement within twelve years preceding the date of appointment in a large-scale procurement of supplies, equipment, services, or construction, and shall be a person who has demonstrated executive and organizational ability. Appointments of the policy office shall require the advice and consent of the senate.
- (b) The chief procurement officer shall be a full-time public official of the State appointed to serve a term of ten years and may be removed from office upon a showing of just cause. The chief procurement officer shall serve without regard to chapters 76 and 77.
- (c) The subsequent appointment or reappointment of the chief procurement officer shall be made by the comptroller of the department of accounting and general services, if the policy office is not reauthorized by the legislature."
- (9) By adding three new sections to page 12, designated and to read as follows:
- "\$ -110 Criminal penalties. Any person, employee, or officer who intentionally violates this chapter or any rule shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- **\$** -111 Legislative auditing. The auditor shall, in accordance with generally accepted auditing principles, conduct compliance audits of the State's procurement activities. Copies of the audit shall be provided to the comptroller, the legislature and the chief procurement officer.
- § -112 Applicability of chapter 103. The provisions of chapter 103 not inconsistent with this chapter shall apply to the procurement of all goods and services under this chapter.
- (6) By adding three new sections to page 56, designated and to read as follows:
- "\$ -1012 Compliance audit unit; establishment and purpose. There is hereby established a compliance audit unit within the office of the legislative auditor. The purpose of this unit shall be to periodically review and audit procurement practices within government to ensure compliance with this chapter and all applicable rules.

- § -1013 Compliance audit unit; duties and responsibilities. When this unit has discovered noncompliance to provisions of this chapter or applicable rules, the unit shall make a report to the appropriate agency and the chief procurement officer stating the areas of noncompliance and recommendations for remedial action. This report shall be a matter of public record. This unit shall utilize as part of the review process, a review of records and activities specifically for trends and patterns of occurrence.
- § -1014 Compliance audit unit; government officer and employees to cooperate. The officers and employees of the State and of each county shall cooperate with this unit and furnish to them such information related to procurement activities as may be called for in connection with the research activities of this unit. The information shall be provided in a timely manner and shall be free of charge."
- (7) By adding the following new material to page 60 line 22:

"PART XII. PREFERRED PRODUCTS

- § -1201 Preference for American products. In all expenditures of public money for any public work or in the purchase of materials or supplies preference shall be given to American products, materials, and supplies.
- § -1202 Geographic bidding. The chief procurement officer shall, to the extent possible utilize geographic bidding in providing goods, services, and construction to best meet the needs of the State.
- § -1203 Reciprocity. (a) To ensure fair and open competition for Hawaii businesses engaged in contracting with other States, reciprocal action shall be imposed on bidders from those States applying preferences.
- (b) A bidder shall qualify as a Hawaii business under this section if, during the twelve months prior to filing a bid, the bidder:
 - (1) Filed for business status with the State as a Hawaii business;
 - (2) Filed a business tax return with the department of taxation indicating gross receipts;
 - (3) Filed quarterly payments for unemployment compensation with the department of labor and industrial relations.
- (c) The filing or withholding under subsection (b) shall be indicative of a substantial business presence in the State, considering the size and the nature of the activities of the business.
- (d) Any bidder submitting a bid under this chapter shall indicate the bidder's principal place of business for the purpose of determining the bidder's business status.
- (e) If the lowest bid in a procurement transaction exceeds \$100,000, the department shall apply preference to Hawaii

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business in the same manner the out-of-state bidder would receive in the bidder's principal state of business.

- (f) The chief procurement officer shall compile a list of States that provide preference to in-state businesses on an annual basis. An agency may rely on this compilation in implementing the provisions of this Act without incurring liability to any bidder.
- (g) A bidder waives any entitlement to claim a preference under this Act if the bidder has not authorized the release of information to verify entitlement.
- (h) A bidder shall not fradulently certify that it is a Hawaii business under this Act or falsely indicate the State in which the bidder is principally based for the purpose of avoiding this section.
- (i) Any person or business that purposefully or willfully misrepresents its principal place of business shall be guilty of a felony, punishable by a fine of not less than \$25,000.
- (j) The department shall assess the costs and consequences of implementing this section two years after the effective date of this chapter. The department shall solicit input from state agencies and the business community and shall submit findings and recommendations to the legislature with respect to the feasibility of continuing this section.
- (k) This section shall not apply to any transaction if the provisions of the section conflict with any federal laws."

SECTION 3. Section 103-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

- "\$103-3 Employment of attorneys. (a) No department of the State, other than the attorney general, shall make any expenditure of public funds for the employment or retention by contract or otherwise of any attorney for the purpose of representing the State or such department in any litigation, rendering legal counsel to the department, or drafting legal documents for the department; provided that the foregoing provision shall not apply:
 - (1) To the housing finance and development corporation or the public utilities commission;
 - (2) To any court or judicial or legislative officer of the State;
 - (3) To the legislative reference bureau;
 - (4) To such compilation commission as may be constituted from time to time;
 - (5) To the real estate commission in any action involving the real estate recovery fund, the contractors license board in any action involving the contractors recovery fund, and the trustees in any action involving the travel agency recovery fund;
 - (6) To grand jury counsel;
 - (7) To the office of Hawaiian affairs;

(8) To the department of commerce and consumer affairs; provided that its attorney shall be responsible for the prosecution of consumer complaints;

(9) To the employees retirement system;

(10) To the Hawaiian home lands trust individual claims review panel; or

(11) In the event the attorney general, for reasons deemed by the attorney general good and sufficient, declines representation or counsel, or approves a department's expenditures; provided that the governor thereupon waives the provision of this section.

For the purpose of this section the term "department of the State" means any department, board, commission, agency, bureau, or officer of the State.

Every attorney employed by any department on a full-time basis, except an attorney employed as a grand jury counsel, the department of commerce and consumer affairs in prosecution of consumer complaints, or the Hawaiian home lands trust individual claims review panel, shall become a deputy attorney general.

(b) Attorney services shall be procured in accordance with the source selection and contract formation provisions of part IV of chapter . The attorney general, in consultation with the chief procurement officer, shall adopt rules governing the competitive procurement of attorneys. No department or agency of the State, including those enumerated in subsection (a), shall procure attorney services without complying with the competitive procedures delineated in rules adopted by the attorney general."

SECTION 4. Section 201-82, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]§201-82[]] Powers of the department. The department, subject to the approval of the director of budget and finance, shall have the following general powers to operate out-of-state offices established:

- (1) To enter into contracts, leases, or cooperative agreements, or perform other transactions with any person, firm, partnership, association, company, corporation, or foreign nation, as may be necessary in the conduct of its business and on such terms as the department may deem appropriate, [notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 103;] using competitive procurement practices, to the extent practicable, in accordance with rules adopted by the chief procurement officer;
- (2) To establish operational bank accounts in out-of-state locations, including foreign denomination accounts, as may be necessary in the conduct of its business, notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 38;
- (3) To receive by gifts, grants, devises, bequests, or otherwise from private sources or a foreign nation, any property, real, personal, or mixed, intangible or tangible, absolutely or in trust, to be used and

disposed of, either the principal or the income therefrom, in accordance with the conditions under which it was received;

- To sell, lease, rent, hold, maintain, use, and operate (4)any property, real, personal, or mixed, tangible or intangible, in accordance with the conditions under which it was received;
- To hire such personnel as may be necessary in the (5) conduct of its business and on such terms as the department may deem appropriate; and
- To do any or all other acts reasonably necessary to (6) carry out the objects and purposes of this part, provided that the department shall not obligate any funds of the state not appropriated to the department."

Section 201-85, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is SECTION 5. amended to read as follows:

"[[]\$201-85 Exemptions.[]] The department is authorized to hire employees necessary to staff its out-of-state offices subject to chapters 76 and 77 and legislative appropriations.

The department may also appoint such other employees exempt from chapters 76 and 77 as may be necessary to administer the affairs of its out-of-state offices. The initial appointment shall not exceed three years, during which time the department shall submit to the legislature a request for approval prior to continuation of the position. The department shall set the duties, responsibilities, salaries, holidays, vacations, leaves, hours of work, and working conditions for these employees.

Subject to the approval of the director of budget and finance, the department may be exempted from the following state laws only to the extent necessary for the conduct of its business in operating out-of-state offices:

- Sections 36-27 and 36-30, relating to special fund transfers and reimbursements to the general fund;
- [Chapter 103, relating to advertising for bids and (2) purchases to be made in Hawaii whenever public moneys , relating to advertising for are expended;] Chapter bids and purchases made in Hawaii whenever public moneys are expended;
- Chapter 36, relating to management of state funds; (3)
- Chapter 38, relating to deposits of public funds; (4)
- Chapter 40, relating to audit and accounting, except (5) that the department shall comply with section 40-81;
- Chapter 76, relating to civil service; (6)
- (7)
- Chapter 77, relating to compensation; Section 78-1, relating to public employment, except (8) when expressly hiring personnel subject to section 78-1: and
- Section 171-30, relating to acquisition of real (9) property.

Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the department may establish a special fund for the deposit of moneys

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received from the legislature for the purpose of establishing and operating its out-of-state offices and for the deposit of other sources of income or revenue."

SECTION 6. Section 41D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"§41D-2 Responsibilities of the comptroller. (a) The comptroller, through the risk manager, shall:

- (1) Have discretion to purchase casualty insurance for the State or state agencies, including those employees of the State who, in the comptroller's discretion, may be at risk and shall be responsible for the acquisition of all casualty insurance;
- (2) Have discretion to purchase property insurance for the State or state agencies and shall acquire all property insurance;
- (3) Direct and manage all risk management and insurance programs of the State, except for employee benefits insurance and workers' compensation insurance programs or as otherwise provided in chapters 87, 88, 383 to 386A, 392, and 393;
- (4) Consult with state agencies to determine what property, casualty, and other insurance policies are presently in force or are sought by the state agencies and to make determinations about whether to continue subscribing to insurance policies. In the event that the risk manager's determination is not satisfactory to the state agency, the state agency may have the risk manager's decision reviewed by the comptroller. In this case, the comptroller's decision shall be final;
- (5) Consolidate and combine state insurance coverages, and purchase excess insurance when, in the comptroller's discretion, it is appropriate to do so;
- (6) Acquire risk management, investigative, claims adjustment, actuarial, and other services, except attorney's services, as may be required for the sound administration of this chapter;
- (7) Gather from all state agencies and maintain data regarding the State's risks and casualty, property, and fidelity losses;
- (8) In conjunction with the attorney general and as otherwise provided by this chapter, compromise or settle claims cognizable under chapter 662;
- (9) Provide technical services in risk management and insurance to state agencies; and
- (10) Do all other things appropriate to the development of sound risk management practices and policies for the State.
- (b) [The requirements of chapter 103 shall not apply to the acquisition of insurance by or for state agencies.
- (c)] Any provision in this section to the contrary notwithstanding, the University of Hawaii (as to casualty

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insurance risks only), the Research Corporation of the University of Hawaii (as to casualty insurance risks only), and the public health facilities of the department of health (with respect to medical malpractice risks only) shall be exempt from the requirements of this chapter."

SECTION 7. Section 102-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$102-6 Deposits of legal tender, etc., to accompany bid. All bids shall be accompanied by a deposit of legal tender or by a certificate of deposit, share certificate, cashier's check, treasurer's check, teller's check, or official check drawn by, or a certified check accepted by, a bank, savings institution, or credit union insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Administration, in a sum not less than five per cent of the amount bid, payable at sight or unconditionally assigned to the officer advertising for tenders; provided that when the amount bid exceeds \$50,000, the deposit shall be in a sum not less than \$2,500 plus two per cent of the amount in excess of \$50,000.

A bid deposit for a bid requiring a deposit may be in the form of a surety bond [conforming to the requirements of section 103-31.] executed to the officer calling for bids by the bidder as principal and by any corporation organized for the purpose of becoming surety on bonds, authorized under the laws of the United States or of the State to act as surety, and doing business in the State under the laws of the United States or the State, if a foreign corporation; and under the laws of the State, if a Hawaii corporation as surety, in a penal sum of equal amount, conditioned upon the bidder entering into contract and furnishing satisfactory security within ten days after the award or within any further time as the officer may allow, if the bidder is awarded the contract."

SECTION 8. Section 103-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) Any person who renders a proper statement for goods delivered or services performed, pursuant to contract, to any agency of the State or any county, shall be paid no later than thirty calendar days following receipt of the statement or satisfactory delivery of the goods or performance of the services. In the event circumstances prevent the paying agency from complying with this section, the person shall be entitled to interest from the paying agency on the principal amount remaining unpaid at the effective rate of [twelve per cent] the prime rate as established from time to time by the Bank of Hawaii and First Hawaiian Bank, averaging any difference simple interest per year commencing on the thirtieth day following receipt of the statement or satisfactory delivery of the goods or performance of the services, whichever is later, and ending on the date of the warrant."

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SECTION 9. Section 206-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$206-8 Development of lands acquired. Where lands are acquired by the board of land and natural resources with its own funds, it shall subdivide and develop the lands into residence lots, or dwellings and lots in a manner best designed to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

The board may contract with any private developer to provide for the financing of the acquisition of lands, the subdivision and development of acquired lands, and the disposition of residence lots, or the construction of dwellings on the lots and the disposition of both. The contracts may be entered into after published advertisement for sealed tenders, setting forth the terms of the proposed contract, including necessary plans, specifications, and time schedules. The contract shall provide for the establishment of such sale prices of the residence lots, or dwellings and lots as will repay to the developer the amount of the actual cost or expense incurred in the acquisition and development of the land together with a reasonable developer's profit computed thereon as determined by the board. The contract shall also provide for the sale of residence lots, or dwellings and lots only to persons entitled to purchase from the board, upon the terms and conditions provided in sections 206-9 to 206-12 with respect to sales by the board. Every contract shall be made with the responsible bidder whose proposal complies with the requirements of the call for tenders and states the lowest rate of developer's profits; provided that the board may reject all tenders if it deems that the lowest rate of developer's profit is unreasonable. Publication of the call for tenders shall be made [as required by section 103-26,] by publishing a call for tenders not less than three times in a newspaper of general circulation in the State. No more than one publication shall be made on any one day or on two consecutive days and the time for opening of the tenders shall be not less than thirty days after the last publication."

SECTION 10. Section 264-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

- "(b) The work of the removal, relocation, replacement, or reconstruction may be performed in the following manner, subject to the following conditions:
 - The work shall be performed in accordance with standards of construction currently used by the utility; and
 - (2) Such work may be performed by contract as provided in [section 103-22 and 103-25; or after first calling for bids under such sections,] section , or after calling for bids under section . the director of transportation or other officer having power to award such contract, may contract with the public utility owning the utility facility to have the work performed

by it, with the use of its own employees and equipment at not to exceed actual cost or in the amount of the lowest responsible bid (if such bids have been submitted), whichever is the lowest amount, with the adjustments hereinafter provided for."

SECTION 11. Section 201E-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]\$201E-33[]] Public works contracts. The corporation may make, execute, and carry out contracts for, or in connection with, any housing project in the manner provided in sections [103-26 to 103-38 and 103-53; and, with regard to such contracts, the term "officers", as used in sections 103-26 to 103-38, shall mean the authority of such officer authorized by the corporation to act as its contracting officer.] chapter. Unless made and executed in the name of the State, each contract made and executed as authorized in this section shall state therein that it is so made and executed."

SECTION 12. Section 206-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$206-21 Contracts. The board of land and natural resources, in addition to its other powers, may make, execute, and carry out contracts for, or in connection with, any project in the name of the State, in the manner provided in [sections 103-26 to 103-38 and 103-53; and, with regard to such contracts, the term "officers", as used in sections 103-26 to 103-38, means the board or such officer as is authorized by the board to act as its contracting officer.] Chapter ____ Each contract authorized in this section shall state that it is made and executed in the name of the State."

SECTION 13. Section 356-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$356-22 Public works contracts. The authority may make, execute, and carry out contracts for, or in connection with, any housing project in the manner provided in [sections 103-26 to 103-38 and 103-53; and, with regard to such contracts, the term "officers", as used in sections 103-26 to 103-38, shall mean the authority or such officer authorized by the authority to act as its contracting officer.] chapter . Unless made and executed in the name of the State, each contract made and executed as authorized in this section shall state therein that it is so made and executed."

SECTION 14. Section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:

"(d) The [comptroller] chief procurement officer and the state foundation on culture and the arts shall decide on the

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specific art objects to acquire, giving first consideration to placing appropriate pieces of art at the locations of the original appropriation.

The selection of, commissioning artists for, reviewing of design, execution, and placement of, and the acceptance of works of art shall be the responsibility of the [comptroller] chief procurement officer and the state foundation on culture and the arts in consultation with the affected agency or department.

Expenditures from the works of art special fund shall be made by the comptroller."

SECTION 15. Section 103-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

"(c) All payments for goods delivered or services performed to a state agency which are less than \$25 shall be made from the petty cash funds of the agency; provided that the [comptroller] chief procurement officer may establish a higher threshold for petty cash payments and may grant exceptions to this requirement."

SECTION 16. Section 103-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-11 Rules of comptroller regulating expenditures; violations, penalty. Subject to chapter 91 the [comptroller] chief procurement officer may adopt rules, not inconsistent with law, further controlling and regulating the expenditure of state moneys. The rules shall have the force of law. Any violation of the rules shall be subject to the penalties prescribed in section 103-9."

SECTION 17. Section 103-22.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-22.1 Services of the handicapped. When a governmental agency contracts for or purchases services, five per cent preference shall be given to services to be performed by nonprofit corporations or public agencies operating sheltered workshops servicing the handicapped in conformance with criteria established by the department of labor and industrial relations pursuant to chapter 91; provided that service contracts awarded under this section shall be exempt from the wages provision of section 103-55. The [state comptroller] chief procurement officer shall adopt rules under chapter 91 to establish the preference for the services to be performed by nonprofit corporations or public agencies operating sheltered workshops consistent with this section."

SECTION 18. Section 103-24.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

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"(c) The [department] chief procurement officer shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 appropriate to carry out the purposes of this section."

SECTION 19. Section 103-32.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]\$103-32.1[]] Contract provision for retainage. Any public contract issued under this chapter may include a provision for the retainage of a portion of the amount due under the contract to the contractor to insure the proper performance of the contract; provided that the sum withheld by the contracting officer from the contractor shall not exceed [five] ten per cent of the amount due the contractor and that after fifty per cent of the contract is completed and progress is satisfactory, no additional sum shall be withheld; provided further that if progress is not satisfactory, the contracting officer may continue to withhold as retainage, sums not exceeding five per cent of the amount due the contractor."

SECTION 20. Section 103-40, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-40 Federal-aid highway contracts. Anything in section [103-39] -403 to the contrary notwithstanding, any federal-aid highway contract shall be binding and of force if the director of finance certifies that the director anticipates the accrual of an amount in the highway fund sufficient to pay the State's share of the contract before the performance contracted for is completed."

SECTION 21. Section 103-42, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"§103-42 Hawaii products list, bidding and [advertisements.] public notice. The [state comptroller] chief procurement officer shall make rules and regulations for the establishment and administration of a Hawaii products list, including the various classifications of Hawaii products; for necessary procedures for qualifying and registering products for such list; for the annual revision of the list; and for such other purposes as may be necessary to carry out the intent of the preferences provided for in section 103-43.

The [comptroller] <u>chief procurement officer</u> shall distribute copies of the list to the purchasing departments of the various governmental agencies.

The [comptroller] chief procurement officer shall have the authority to examine and review the financial statements and such other reports as may be necessary, of any person, who desires to have the person's products on the Hawaii products list, to determine whether the products meet the qualifications. All persons whose products are on the Hawaii products list shall be responsible for informing the [comptroller] chief procurement

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officer of any change in the classifications of their products which have been originally registered with the Hawaii products list within two months of the change. In any event, such persons shall file annually with the [comptroller] chief procurement officer such documents or information as may be required in determining any change in the classification of a Hawaii product under the rules and regulations to be established by the [comptroller,] chief procurement officer, within two months from the closing of their books, whether on a fiscal or calendar year.

[Advertisement for bids] Public notice of invitations for bids and requests for proposals by a governmental agency shall contain, if applicable, a notice referring to the preferences for Hawaii products and to section 103-43, and shall also contain a notice referring to the place where the Hawaii products list may be examined."

SECTION 22. Section 103-42, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-43 Mandatory purchase of Hawaii products. In any expenditure of public funds, a governmental agency shall review purchase and design specifications of public works contracts including repair and maintenance requirements for products and purchase any required product from the Hawaii products list established under section 103-42 where such products are available, provided the products meet the minimum specifications and the selling price f.o.b. jobsite; unloaded including applicable general excise tax and use tax does not exceed the lowest delivered price in Hawaii f.o.b. jobsite; unloaded including applicable general excise tax and use tax of a similar non-Hawaii product by more than three per cent, where Class I Hawaii products are involved, or five per cent where Class II Hawaii products are involved, or ten per cent where Class III Hawaii products are involved.

Where a package bid or purchase contains both Hawaii and non-Hawaii products, then for the purpose of selecting the lowest bid or purchase price only, the price bid or offered for a non-Hawaii product item shall be increased by adding thereto three per cent, five per cent, or ten per cent where similar Class I, Class II, or Class III Hawaii product items have been bid or offered by another party pursuant to the preferences stated above. The lowest total bid, taking into consideration the above preferences, shall be awarded the contract but the contract amount of any contract awarded, however, shall be the amount of the bid or price offered, exclusive of such preferences.

Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding paragraphs, an additional five per cent preference shall be applicable to Hawaii products manufactured by nonprofit corporations and public agencies operating sheltered workshops as certified by the department of labor and industrial relations for physically or mentally handicapped persons. The [state comptroller] chief procurement officer shall adopt rules under chapter 91 to require

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a governmental agency to give an additional five per cent preference to the purchase of products manufactured by nonprofit corporations or public agencies operating sheltered workshops consistent with this section."

SECTION 23. Section 103-48, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-48 Penalty. Any officer of the State or of any municipality, county, or other political subdivision thereof, or any person acting under or for such officer, or any other person who violates any provisions of [sections 103-22,] section 103-22.1, [103-23, 103-29, and 103-33] shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

Any officer or employee of any governmental agency who violates any provisions of sections 103-41 through 103-47 shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

Any person, or any officer or employee of any person, who violates any provisions of sections 103-41 through 103-47 shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both; and any person who is awarded a contract or given an order for purchase as a result of misrepresentation in the person's bid or makes a claim in the person's bid that the person will purchase Hawaii products, but fails to do so shall, in addition, be fined the difference between the price of the products actually used or supplied and the price the person would have paid for Hawaii products and shall not be awarded any contract or be given any order for purchase or be eligible for bidding until one year after the date when such person pays the fines levied under this section."

SECTION 24. Section 103-49, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-49 Value engineering clauses; rules and regulations. The State and each of the respective counties shall insert clauses providing for value engineering incentives in all public works contracts for amounts in excess of \$100,000. The clauses shall provide:

- (1) That cost reduction proposals submitted by contractors:
 - A) Must require, in order to be applied to the contract, a change order thereto; and
 - (B) Must result in savings to the State or county, as the case may be, by providing less costly items than those specified in the contract without impairing any of their essential functions and characteristics such as service life, reliability, economy of operation, ease of maintenance, and necessary standardized features.
- (2) That accepted cost reduction proposals shall result in an equitable adjustment of the contract price so that

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the contractor will share a portion of the realized cost reduction.

The [comptroller of the State or the treasurer or director of finance of each of the counties, as the case may be,] chief procurement officer shall promulgate, pursuant to chapter 91, such rules and regulations as may be necessary and proper to implement this section, provide adequate incentives to contractors, realize savings for the State or counties, and to otherwise carry out the purposes of this section."

SECTION 25. Section 103-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-51 Printing, binding, and stationery work. All printing, binding, and stationery work for the State or any county, or other political subdivision thereof shall be performed within the State, including all preparatory work, presswork, bindery work, and any other production-related work, and all requests for bids or contracts for such work shall so stipulate; provided that whenever it is established that any such work cannot be performed within the State or that the lowest price for which such work can be procured within the State exceeds the bid or charge of a mainland manufacturer of such item by fifteen per cent, the work or any part thereof so affected may be performed outside the State.

No payment shall be made by the State or any county, or other political subdivision thereof for printing, binding, or stationery work unless it appears that the work was done within the State or was authorized to be done outside the State pursuant to this section. In addition, any manufacturer violating a stipulation in a bid or contract that all work will be performed within the State shall be subject to a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed the bid or contract price to be collected by a civil action filed by the attorney general on behalf of the State.

[Every manufacturer responding to the requests for bids or contracts shall submit an affidavit stating that the manufacturer's employees engaged in the performance of the contract will be paid the prevailing wages, which shall include the cost to the manufacturer of the fringe benefits, and will work under the prevailing hours of work. The prevailing wages and hours of work shall be for the locality in the State of Hawaii where the work is to be performed and shall be determined by the director of labor and industrial relations of the State. Any bid or proposal shall not be considered or accepted unless the affidavit is submitted.]"

SECTION 26. Section 103-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"\$103-52 Inapplicable to printing, binding, or publishing by the University of Hawaii press. Sections [103-28, 103-30, 103-31,] 103-34 to 103-38 shall not be applicable to contracts of

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the University of Hawaii for any printing, binding or publishing of publications."

SECTION 27. Section 103-81, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by deleting the definition of "fair market price".

- "[[]\$103-81[]] Definitions. For the purpose of this part:
 (1) "Direct labor" means all work required for preparation, processing, or packing of goods or performance of services, but not work relating to supervision, administration, inspection, or shipping;
- ["Fair market price" means the price of a product or (2) service paid by a willing buyer to a willing seller, which price is reasonably comparable to prices on the open market:
- (3)] "Handicapped individual" means any person who is so severely incapacitated by any physical or mental disability that the person cannot engage in normal competitive employment because of the disability;
- [(4)](3)"Public agency" means any agency of the state or county governments; and
- [(5)](4)"Qualified rehabilitation facility" means a nonprofit rehabilitation facility for the handicapped which:
 - (A) Is organized and incorporated under the laws of the United States or this State, and located in the State;
 - Is operated in the interest of and employs (B) handicapped individuals;
 - (C) Does not inure any part of its net income to any shareholder or other individual;
 - (D) Complies with all applicable occupational health and safety standards required by the federal, state, and county governments; and
 - Is certified as a sheltered workshop or work (E) activity center by the United States Department of Labor, and abides by the state department of labor and industrial relations' rules relating to the employment of handicapped individuals."

SECTION 28. Section 103-82, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]\$103-82[]] Purchase by public agency. (a) Any public [agency without advertising or calling for bids] body may purchase products and services provided by qualified rehabilitation facilities serving the handicapped which have [indicated] an interest in supplying such goods and services, [and on an equitable basis may apportion the business among the interested facilities; provided that such goods and services meet the specifications and needs of the purchasing agency and are purchased at a fair market price as determined by the appropriate

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public agency; and provided further that such facilities | if they comply with the following:

(1) Meet all of the requirements as a qualified rehabilitation facility [under section 103-81(5);] as defined in section 103-81; and

(2) Maintain a handicapped-to-nonhandicapped employee ratio equal to or in excess of three-to-one for work hours of direct labor at all times on the work contracted.

[(b) The purchasing department or agent of a public agency shall:

(1) Receive and review proposals submitted by qualified rehabilitation facilities to sell products and services, and determine if they are suitable for purchase by the agency;

(2) Negotiate the conditions and terms for the purchase, including the price of the product or service, between the agency and the qualified rehabilitation facility; provided that the price of the product or service shall not exceed the fair market price and there is assurance that the qualified rehabilitation facility proposal is in compliance with all of the public agency's rules related to purchasing; and

(3) Ensure that any product or service purchased from a qualified rehabilitation facility shall not be placed on the Hawaii products list under section 103-42.]"

SECTION 29. Section 103-83, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]§103-83[] Qualified rehabilitation facility; proposal to sell products and services. A qualified rehabilitation facility interested in selling products or services to a public agency, may submit a proposal to the agency containing the following information:

(1) A description of the product or service;

(2) The price of the product or service; and

(3) Documents and information necessary to qualify as a qualified rehabilitation facility under section 103-81(5).] Preference for qualified rehabilitation facilities. Qualified rehabilitation facilities shall be provided a five per cent price preference in competing with the private business sector for providing products and services to the State."

SECTION 30. Section 103-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-5 Emergency expenditures from general appropriations. No expenditure shall be made under any general appropriation for emergencies except for urgent causes arising when the legislature is not in session, or without the approval of the governor."]

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SECTION 31. Section 103-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-22 Advertisement for bids required; exceptions. expenditure of public money, except salaries or pay of officers or employees, or permanent settlements, subsidies or other claims or objects for which a fixed sum must be paid by law, or for other purposes which do not admit of competition, or for the purchase of materials or supplies from any other department, bureau, organization, or municipal or political subdivision of the federal, state, municipal or county governments, other than University of Hawaii bookstores, or for the performance of public work or contracts by any other such department, bureau, organization, or municipal or political subdivision of the federal, state, municipal or county governments, where the sum to be expended is \$8,000 or more shall be made except under contract let after public advertisement for sealed tenders, in the manner provided by law. In all cases of expenditures of public money that is more than \$4,000 but less than \$8,000, a call for informal bids shall be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published within the State; provided that in the case of public works or repairs and maintenance of buildings, roads and other site improvements where the expenditure is more than \$4,000 but less than \$15,000, a call for informal bids shall be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published within the State. No expenditures for public purposes shall be so divided or parceled as to defeat or evade this section."]

SECTION 32. Section 103-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-23 Additional exceptions. (a) Expenditures in excess of such sum without so contracting may be made, with the approval of the legislative body, in the case of a county, or of the governor, in the case of the State, or of the board of regents, in the case of the University of Hawaii, or of the board of education, in the case of the department of education, or of its board or other governing authority in the case of any independent board or agency, when the expenditures are for repairs of roads, waterworks, and buildings, or, with such approval, expenditures not in excess of \$15,000 for alterations of buildings, or when the work to be done is of such a nature that its extent and character cannot be known or specified beforehand with reasonable certainty, or when no tender is received in response to an advertisement, or, with such approval, expenditures not in excess of \$15,000 for new roads, waterworks, and buildings, either on behalf of the expending division of government or for the federal or state government or any department thereof may be made, without contract, advertisement, or sealed tenders; and, in the case of such new roads, waterworks, and buildings, expenditures in excess of \$15,000 may be made, with the same approval; provided that the expending

division of government shall first advertise for sealed tenders and shall keep a full and true account of the cost of the work, if done by itself, without awarding a contract therefor, and shall, upon the completion of the work, publish a full and true statement of its cost and of the amounts of rejected tenders, if any; and provided further that any governmental agency actually performing the work shall in no case receive more than the actual cost thereof.

- (b) Nothing provided in section 103-22 shall prevent the department of health, if, after publication of a call for tenders, it receives no bids from any responsible bidder or only one bid therefrom, from purchasing at regular market prices, meats, on the hoof or otherwise, and foodstuffs, as may from time to time be required for the Kalaupapa settlement.
- (c) Special contracts or subcontracts by any governmental agency for materials or supplies or purchases of materials or supplies made in furtherance of the contract referred to in this section shall be subject to the requirement of public advertisement for sealed tenders in the manner provided by law.
- (d) Nothing provided in subsection (a) above or in section 103-22 shall prevent the department of education from expending funds from school-level minor repairs and maintenance accounts as established by section 296-41, for the purpose of acquiring repair and maintenance services to address immediate needs of the public schools."

SECTION 33. Section 103-23.2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["[\$103-23.2] University of Hawaii bookstores; exception. Notwithstanding any other provision, purchases of materials, supplies, and books by University of Hawaii bookstores for resale shall be exempt from public bidding requirements of this chapter."]

SECTION 34. Section 103-23.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["[§103-23.5] Hawaii public broadcasting authority; exception. Any other provision to the contrary notwithstanding, purchases by the Hawaii public broadcasting authority which must be made on an expedited basis and which are essential to maintaining transmission or production services shall be exempt from the public bidding requirements of this chapter with the approval of the governor."]

SECTION 35. Section 103-24, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-24 Preference for American products. In all expenditures of public money for any public work or in the purchase of materials or supplies, preference shall be given to American products, materials and supplies."]

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SECTION 36. Section 103-25, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-25 Qualifications of bidders. Before any prospective bidder shall be entitled to submit any bid for the performance of any contract with the State, or any county, or with any independent board or agency of the State or any county, for the construction of any public building or other public work (not including contracts between government agencies or political subdivisions) he shall, not less than six calendar days prior to the day designated for opening bids, give written notice to the officer charged with letting such contract of his intention to bid and such officer shall satisfy himself of the prospective bidder's financial ability to perform the work intended and of his experience and competence in performing similar work. this purpose, the officer may, in his discretion, require any prospective bidder to submit answers, under oath, to questions contained in a standard form of questionnaire to be prepared by the comptroller by and with the approval of the governor, setting forth a complete statement of the experience of the prospective bidder and his organization in performing similar work and a statement of the equipment proposed to be used, together with adequate proof of the availability of the equipment. appears to the officer, from answers to the questionnaire or otherwise, that the prospective bidder is not fully qualified and able to perform the intended work, the officer shall, after affording the prospective bidder an opportunity to be heard and if still of the opinion that the bidder is not fully qualified to perform the work, refuse to receive or consider any bid offered by the prospective bidder. All information contained in the answers to the questionnaire shall be and remain confidential, and any government officer or employee who knowingly divulges or permits to be divulged any such information to any person not lawfully entitled thereto shall be fined not more than \$250. Questionnaires so submitted shall be returned to the bidders after having served their purpose."]

SECTION 37. Section 103-26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-26 Advertisement for bids. Publication of a call for tenders shall be made not less than three times in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published within the State. No more than one of these publications shall be made on any one day or on two consecutive days."]

SECTION 38. Section 103-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-27 Bids; opening; rejection. The time of opening of such tenders shall be not less than five days after the last publication. All bids shall be sealed and delivered to the officer advertising therefor and shall be opened by the officer

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at the hour and place to be stated in the call for tenders in the presence of all bidders who attend, and may be inspected by any bidder. All bids which do not comply with the requirements of the call for tenders shall be rejected. The officer calling for bids may reject any or all bids and waive any defects when in the officer's opinion such rejection or waiver will be for the best interest of the public."]

SECTION 39. Section 103-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-28 Deposits of legal tender, etc., to accompany bid. The comptroller shall determine on a case-by-case basis which bids shall be accompanied by a deposit of legal tender or by a certificate of deposit, share certificate, cashier's check, treasurer's check, teller's check, or official check drawn by, or a certified check accepted by, a bank, a savings institution, or credit union insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Administration, in a sum not less than five per cent of the amount bid, payable at sight or unconditionally assigned to the officer advertising for tenders; provided that when the amount bid exceeds \$50,000, the deposit shall be in a sum not less than \$2,500, plus two per cent of the amount in excess of \$50,000. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in solicitations for price-term, open-end, and requirements contracts a maximum deposit of \$2,500 shall apply; provided that a standing deposit of \$2,500 may be furnished to the comptroller and held for a period convenient to the bidder. During the period held by the comptroller, the standing deposit shall be sufficient for all bids submitted by the bidder for price-term, open-end, or requirements contracts. A certificate of deposit, share certificate, cashier's check, treasurer's check, teller's check, official check, or certified check may be utilized only to a maximum of \$100,000.

A bid deposit for a bid requiring a deposit in excess of \$100,000 shall be in the form of legal tender or a surety bond conforming to the requirements of section 103-31."]

SECTION 40. Section 103-29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-29 Bids to include certain information. In addition to meeting other requirements of bidders for public works construction contracts each such bid shall include the name of each person or firm to be engaged by the bidder as a joint contractor or subcontractor in the performance of the public works construction contract. The bid shall also indicate the nature and scope of the work to be performed by such joint contractor or subcontractors. All bids which do not comply with this requirement shall be rejected."]

SECTION 41. Section 103-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-30 Forfeiture of deposits, etc.; return thereof. the bidder to whom the contract is awarded fails or neglects to enter into the contract and furnish satisfactory security, as required by sections 103-34 to 103-37 within ten days after the award or within the time as the officer awarding the contract may allow, the officer shall pay the amount of the deposit into the treasury as a realization of the State, county, or other governmental agency, as the case may be. Deposit forfeiture for price-term, open-end, and requirements contracts shall be for five per cent of the amount bid, up to a maximum of \$2,500 regardless of the amount bid. If the contract is entered into and the security furnished within the required time, the deposit, certificate, or check shall be returned to the successful bidder. The deposits made by the unsuccessful bidders shall be returned to them after the contract is entered into or, if the contract is not awarded or entered into, after the officer's determination to publish another call for tenders; provided that inactive standing deposits shall be retained or returned at the option of the bidder."

SECTION 42. Section 103-31, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-31 Bond may be substituted for deposits, etc. In lieu of the deposits prescribed by section 103-28, a bid may be accompanied by a surety bond executed to the officer calling for bids by the bidder as principal and by any corporation organized for the purpose of becoming surety on bonds, authorized under the laws of the United States or of the State to act as surety, and doing business in the State under the laws of the United States or of the State, if a foreign corporation, and under the laws of the State, if a Hawaii corporation, as surety, in a penal sum of equal amount, conditioned upon the bidder entering into the contract and furnishing satisfactory security within ten days after the award or within any further time as the officer may allow, if the bidder is awarded the contract."]

SECTION 43. Section 103-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-32 Contracts to be in writing; lowest responsible bidder. All contracts shall be in writing and shall be executed in the name of the State, county, or the board, bureau, or commission thereof authorized to let contracts in its own name, as the case may be, by the officer letting the contracts, and shall be made with the lowest responsible bidder, except as provided for in section 103-43 and section 103-53.5, if the bidder qualifies by providing the security required by sections 103-34 to 103-37. If the lowest bid or any other bid is rejected, or if the bidder to whom the contract was awarded fails to enter into the contract and furnish satisfactory security, the officer may, in the officer's discretion, award the contract to the lowest remaining responsible bidder or may publish another

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call for tenders as provided in section 103-26; provided that at the officer's discretion the officer, after determining the lowest responsible bidder, may negotiate with such bidder to reduce the scope of work and to award the contract at a price which reflects the reduction in the scope of work, or may, in the case of only one bidder and when the bid exceeds available funds for the contract, negotiate with such bidder to reduce the price and award the contract at the reduced price."]

SECTION 44. Section 103-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

Termination of contract by contracting agency. ["\$103-33 The contracting officer for any contract executed in accordance with this chapter may terminate the contract at any time or bar the contractor from bidding on any project let to bid pursuant to this chapter, for a period not to exceed one year when, in the opinion of the contracting officer, the contractor has made unjustifiable and substantive changes from the condition set forth in the contractor's original itemized bid; provided that the changes which are due directly to the failure, refusal, or inability of a subcontractor named in the contractor's original itemized bid in accordance with section 103-29 to enter into the subcontract or because of the subcontractor's insolvency, inability to furnish a reasonable performance bond, suspension or revocation of the subcontractor's license, or failure or inability to comply with other requirements of the law applicable to contractors, subcontractors, and public works projects shall not be deemed to be unjustifiable and substantive changes warranting termination of the contract by the contracting officer or for barring the contractor from bidding on future projects. Upon termination, the contracting officer shall limit payment to the contractor to that part of the contract satisfactorily completed at the time of termination. In the case of barring contractors from bidding on future contracts, each contracting officer taking that action shall notify other contracting agencies of the action."]

SECTION 45. Section 103-33.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["[\$103-33.5] Substandard work, disqualification of contractors. The director of any department or the chairperson of any board or commission which lets state contracts may issue a written notice to any contractor, banning the contractor from receiving any state contracts for two years following the issuance of the notice if the director or chairperson determines in a hearing that the contractor has performed substandard work, including consistent failure to meet contract completion schedules, that disqualifies the contractor in advance as a responsible bidder for any state contract. The notice shall set forth the reasons for the director's or chairperson's decision and shall also inform the contractor that the contractor has a

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right to appeal the decision to the circuit courts for judicial review under the standard set forth in section 91-14(g) for contested cases. The appeal shall not act as a stay of the director's or chairperson's decision."

SECTION 46. Section 103-39, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-39 Contract not binding unless appropriation available. (a) No such contract shall be binding or of any force unless the comptroller of the State, the director of finance of the county, or the chief financial officers of the University of Hawaii and the department of education, as the case may be, indorses thereon a certificate that there is an available unexpended appropriation or balance of an appropriation over and above all outstanding contracts sufficient to cover the amount required by the contract; provided that this section shall not apply to any price-term, open-end, or requirements contract under which the total amount to be paid to the contractor cannot be accurately estimated at the time the contract is to be awarded.

Notwithstanding the requirement for certification set forth above, certification of a portion of the total funds required for a contract may be permitted in the following instances:

- (1) When an immediate call for tenders will result in significantly more favorable contract terms and conditions to the state or county agency than a call for tenders made at a later date; or
- (2) When an extension of the contract period beyond the period permitted by currently available funds will (i) significantly reduce the amounts of the periodic payments to be made by a state or county agency, or (ii) result in significantly more favorable contract terms and conditions to the state or county agency, or (iii) promote competition among qualified bidders and attract qualified bidders who otherwise may be precluded from bidding;

provided that certification for partial funding shall be permitted only if the comptroller of the State, the director of finance of a county, or the chief financial officers of the University of Hawaii and the department of education, as the case may be, certifies either that there exists substantial assurance that the necessary funds will be available for the payments set forth in the contract or that special fund revenues will be sufficient to cover the cost of the contract.

(b) In all cases of certification for partial funding, the contract and the certificate shall state that availability of funds in excess of the amount certified as available shall be contingent upon future appropriations or special fund revenues. All contracts partially funded shall be enforceable only to the extent to which funds have been certified as available.

In any contract involving not only local funds but supplemental funds from the federal government, this section shall be applicable only to that portion of the contract price

involved in the contract as is payable out of local funds. As to such portion of the contract price as is expressed in the contract to be payable out of federal funds, the contract shall be construed to be an agreement to pay the portion to the contractor, only out of federal funds to be received from the federal government when the federal funds are so received, and shall not be construed as a general agreement to pay the portion at all events out of any funds other than those which are received from the federal government. This paragraph shall be liberally construed so as not to hinder or impede the State or any county in contracting for any project involving financial aid from the federal government."]

SECTION 47. Section 103-54, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-54 Wages of certain laborers paid weekly; penalty. All contracts executed pursuant to this chapter involving the employment of laborers shall provide for weekly payment of wages to all laborers whose rate of compensation is \$5 or less per day. Every laborer employed by the contractor or any subcontractor under any such contract whose rate of compensation is \$5 or less per day shall be paid the laborer's wages weekly by the laborer's employer, whether or not the requirement is set forth in the contract. Every contractor or subcontractor who violates this section shall be fined not more than \$500."]

SECTION 48. Section 103-56, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

["\$103-56 Pay days. Except as provided in section 103-54 the fifteenth and last days in each month shall be the pay days of all employees engaged in constructing or repairing roads, bridges, or streets for the State."]

SECTION 49. Sections 36-41, 42D-1, 46-56, 53-9, 104-7, 106-15, 206E-11, 206J-9, 266-2, 268-1.5, 299-3, 329-58, 354D-4, 354D-8, and 507-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended by substituting the chapter designation for the Hawaii Procurement Code enacted in section 1 of this Act for the term "chapter 103" as it appears in those sections and the context requires.

SECTION 50. Sections 128-10(10), 128-13(3), and 382-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended by inserting a reference to the new chapter enacted in section 1 of this Act with the term "sections 103-21 to 103-57" as it appears in those sections and the context requires.

SECTION 51. Sections 39A-32, 39A-72, 39A-112, 39A-152, 39A-192, 201E-202, 227D-7, 261-52, 266-52, 304-8.94, 307-4, and 356-15.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended by substituting a reference to the new chapter enacted in section 1 of this Act for

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the term "section 103-22" as it appears in those sections and the context requires.

SECTION 52. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 1993-1994, and the sum of \$400,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 1994-1995, to be expended for the purposes of this Act. Of the sums appropriated, \$250,000 in fiscal year 1993-1994 and 1994-1995, shall be expended by the office of the auditor. Of the sums appropriated, \$250,000 in fiscal year 1993-1994, and \$150,000 in fiscal year 1994-1995, shall be expended by the office of purchasing.

SECTION 53. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed. New statutory material in underscored.

SECTION 54. This Act shall take effect upon approval.

TWENTY-SEVENTH DAY

Thursday, March 11, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend William Kaina, Kawaiahao Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions of guests seated in the gallery were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Levin introduced Marie Brinkman, Teruo Higuchi, Dorothy Silva and Norman Zimmerman, participants of the Big Island Silver Legislature, escorted by the "venerable '76 member of this Legislature, former Representative Joe Garcia." (All rose to be recognized.)

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Nakasato, Senator Koki and himself, introduced a group of exchange students and their teachers from Okinawa and extended a warm welcome to the group. The exchange students are hosted by students from Aiea, Moanalua, Radford, Campbell, Waipahu and Kahuku High Schools. (The group rose to be recognized.)

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

S.B. No. 15, S.D. 2:

On motion by Senator Levin, seconded by Senator Blair and carried, S.B. No. 15, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 1604, S.D. 3:

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that S.B. No. 1604, S.D. 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator B. Kobayashi.

Senator McCartney rose to speak for the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this measure.

"First of all, I'd like to thank the Ways and Means chairman for moving this bill out and looking at this issue very comprehensively.

"You know, Mr. President, I'm tired of being the 'emperor without clothes' and standing before groups of people in my community and in schools all across the state, and as chair of the Education Committee I have been able to go all over the state and meet with parents and educators everywhere. They are frustrated. They feel that there's a lot of rhetoric on education; there's a lot of talk, but there's not a lot of action. And no matter what I do and no matter how much I stand in front of them, they tell me you don't have clothes on.

"And then, Mr. President, if we're going to make a transformation from the industrial-based school model that we presently have, to the information-based school model that we dream of, it doesn't make sense that the new school buildings that we build and the facilities that we repair are not equipped with the latest technology to provide the resources and tools for our students to learn in the 21st century. The classrooms that we're designing today do not even have phone jacks in them to allow classrooms to communicate with the neighborhood next door to them or even the rest of the world. We cannot tolerate this, Mr. President.

"The computer ratio for students to computers is 17 to 1 in the Department of Education right now. So we need to make sure that when we build new school facilities or repair them that they are equipped with the proper technology to meet the needs of the students in the 21st century. So that need is another \$500 million, Mr. President.

"The total facilities and equipment needs for the system in the next 10 years is \$2.75 billion, \$2.75 billion. We have a big need. There's been a lot of talk.

"The way this bill proposes to resolve that need is threefold. Number one, it calls for leveraging of existing resources. Instead of just committing \$90 million of cash a year to build school facilities, why not leverage that \$90 million and earmark 7 percent of the general excise tax revenue to a special fund that can earn interest, and with that fund we can float off revenue bonds. And instead of doing \$90 million a year, we can do \$200 million a year to build new school construction.

"The bill also has a provision that talks about maximizing existing resources. How do we streamline the school construction process? How do we spend money more efficiently and effectively? And it calls us to adopt a plan next year to change the way DAGS, DOE and B&F do business as related to school facilities.

"Finally, Mr. President, it also takes another step, a very bold step. That is, in 1995, after we go through the streamlining process, we are talking about a possible, a possible increase in the general excise tax of possibly 1/10 of 1 percent to take care of that \$750 million need that hasn't been taken care of in the leveraging. That money will go into a special fund for maybe six years. What it will cost the Hawaii taxpayer, Mr. President, is a nickel a

day. A nickel a day, in my mind, is a small sacrifice for a big return that needs to be made.

"We know a tax is a last resort and a mechanism is in this bill. If we can do all we can to spend money efficiently and effectively, look internally, we don't need the tax. But we need to leave the tax in there as a mechanism right now. Some people are raising a concern in the public about a tax, but I feel it's more important to take care of our children's needs in the future than to look at the cost of a nickel a day.

"So, Mr. President, this is how the Senate is addressing the public's concern and the people's concern out there that we just have a lot of rhetoric in education. If this bill passes, that rhetoric will become reality and this bill is something that we can be proud of and that we've met one of the cornerstones of our educational system, which is, taking care of that \$2.75 billion facility needs. I urge my colleagues to support the bill."

Senator B. Kobayashi, also in support of the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"For most of us, an educational facility is something we take for granted. But over the years I've had the sad experience of going around the state and finding the following kinds of problems.

"Situations where a converted bathroom is being used as a part-time classroom.

"A situation in which a former janitor's closet was being used as a counselor's office, a room that was so small only two chairs could be fit into it -- one for the counselor and one for whomever the counselor was speaking to. Unfortunately, the door got into the way of the second chair, so whenever the counselor had to invite somebody into his office, he had to remove the chair, put it behind the door, invite the person in, move the chair back to its original position, and then ask the person if he wanted something to be discussed.

"I've been in a situation in which a bathroom which had never been used before with beautiful white ceramic tiles was being used as a storage room and as a counselor's office.

"I've been in a school in which the school had 23 portable classrooms, more classrooms amongst those 23 portables than most schools have classrooms.

"I've been in a situation in which the library of a school consists of approximately three quarters of one portable classroom. I've been in a first-year school in which the library consisted of less bookshelf space than I have in my office.

"I've been in a school in which the school stage was being used as a part-time classroom because of lack of space elsewhere.

"I've been in a school in which students from the ag classes met in a partially covered area exposed to rain when the wind and the rain occurred at the same time.

"It's these kinds of educational facility needs that have to be met by something. I'm not sure what, but the situation is simply getting worse.

"We have a situation in which we have, unfortunately, started a downhill slide as of last year when we were unable to provide enrollment increase money. Because of our school population increase of approximately 2,700

students per year, we have to provide 'x' number of dollars just to meet those enrollment increases. We weren't able to meet that increase last year. We are further unable to meet it this year, so the downward decline has now become steeper. I'm afraid that unless we meet those needs, the decline will be so steep we will not be able to reverse ourselves and go upwards.

"In school facilities, our growth areas are at places unfortunately more difficult for the DOE to build We have had situations where new schools, because of their remote locations, have required up to \$10 million of infrastructure needs before a single classroom could be built; that is, we're talking about roads, about sewers, about water, about electrical lines, and county permits, before a single classroom can be built. We have been met with situations where the county has imposed standards upon us and the state has imposed its own standards so that we had on the Big Island a situation in which a four-classroom building in rural South Kona had a projected cost per classroom of \$750,000 per classroom. The project included over a million dollars of improvements for fire protection, a part of which was a separate reservoir system to provide water pressure for that fire protection system.

"Our schools right now are in terrible shape on a statewide average. We have the blessings of having some facilities that are in good shape, but overall, I think, we have a problem that is almost getting out of hand and unless we pass something like this we will be so far into the downward slope that recovery will be well nigh impossible. Thank you."

Senator Solomon supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for this bill with reservations.

"Mr. President, I just would like to say this for the record. I hope that, we as the majority party, are not looking only at raising taxes as a means to raise revenue for needed programs such as in education, in health, and in unemployment. I think that no matter what, whether it is a nickel a day or whatever, we should be looking at some creative means to cut government spending. As you know, we in Hawaii, compared nationwide, are way up there in terms of paying the highest taxes in the country.

"I'm hoping that this isn't going to be the pattern of action that we will pursue every time we need dollars to address old problems. The capital improvement projects in reference to education is not a new issue. It has been with us as long as I've been in the Legislature, as well as, many of you sitting here. And yet we haven't come up with creative means as to how to cut back on spending—to come up with plans to streamline processes, to come up with plans for negotiating with the counties on differences in the requirements to develop infrastructure surrounding proposed schools, come up with creative ways in which the private sector can become more involved in funding of construction.

"These are issues that we have discussed with the committee and we should continue to look at ways to curb spending and not just look at raising taxes to solve these kinds of educational and health kinds of problems that we have in the State of Hawaii. Thank you very much."

Senator McCartney then said:

"Mr. President, I'd just like to thank the Senator from Kohala for those remarks. Yes, I embraced all of those thoroughly, and the bill in my estimation does that. The tax takes place in 1995, 'if and only if.' We have to resolve those issues first. And yes, the tax is the last

resort. And doing all those steps that she mentioned are outlined not specifically in the bill, but, in the bill that we have to go through that streamlining process, and those points by the Senator from Kohala are very well taken. I want to assure my colleagues that we are going to be taking that course of action first, before the latter. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1604, S.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FINANCING OF PUBLIC EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 2:

Senator Chang moved that S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Tungpalan rose in support of the measure and said:

"I rise to speak in favor of this bill, Mr. President.

"I'll be voting for this measure as I hope this will curb the waste and abuses that currently plague our contract bidding system. Perhaps the passage of this measure and the gubernatorial signature will allow us to fund many of the educational projects that were so eloquently spoken of earlier when we voted on the previous measure.

"It no longer is enough for us to sit by and allow contracts to rise from hundreds of thousands of dollars to millions, without having even gone through a bidding process. I think it's about time that we stand up and be counted, and I for one will be counted as one who wants to see this stopped. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also supported the measure and remarked:

"I rise to speak in support of this bill.

"I would have voted for the bill amended or unamended. I don't really care what form this bill goes over to the House in. I don't care how members of the board are selected. What I care about is that we clean up our whole procurement process. I vote for this bill just out of anger and disgust because when I see millions of dollars being spent on non-bid contracts and then I look and see women and children's programs being underfunded and we don't have enough spouse abuse shelters and we don't have enough child protective services and, yet, there are people making millions of dollars off government contracts.

"And when I see contracts increasing in funds without a bidding process, without a change in scope, and then I see people lined up at the Kalihi-Palama clinic waiting to get an appointment for just a common ailment, and I see women standing in line at the Waimanalo clinic waiting for an appointment and they hardly get to see an ob-gyn until their seventh month and, yet, there are people making millions of dollars off government contracts.

"That is why I'm voting for this bill. I don't care what form it ends up in, we have to clean up our process. I urge all to support this bill. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the bill and said:

"Mr. President, very briefly, I rise to speak in support of this measure.

"Mr. President, there is a cancer in the system. This is the chemotherapy that the system needs to get rid of the cancer. And this bill, in my mind, what it does, first and foremost, is it separates politics from procurement. It puts procurement back where it's supposed to be -- in the public service and in the public good, spending taxpayer dollars efficiently and effectively. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Chang added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Again, I want to thank the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and members of the committee for permitting us to extend the examination of this proposal. I want to thank the Majority Leader for taking the time and making the effort to reconcile the different points of view on various issues presented by this bill. As we discussed in our previous session, there are some remaining details to be either inserted or corrected but, all in all, this is a vehicle that is much needed.

"I agree that there are severe problems in the present procurement system. I want to point out to the previous speaker that chemotherapy is a rather radical therapy. Sometimes it is necessary and sometimes it is best left to less drastic measures to cure various diseases. All in all, though, we have several weeks to continue our examination in this area and formulate the appropriate response. Thank you."

Senator Iwase, also in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of the bill.

"I'd like to join in the comments of all of the previous speakers and just leave, as a strong reason for my vote, the comment made in a series done in the Star-Bulletin by Mr. Smyser looking at the system and how it's performed over the past two years, and why there's such great public anger over what has occurred. And if I can recall the quote, talking about how things were done in the past and how things are done today, his quote was, if my recollection serves me correctly: 'Back then, all things being equal, we helped our friends; today, we just help our friends.'

"That cannot continue and I think that is the reason why there is such anger, such disgust, as the Senator from Manoa pointed out, in what has happened and why there is such a loss of confidence in how government operates and why we must take action to restore that confidence. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Holt spoke in support of the nominee, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of nominee Kevin Chang to the First Circuit Court bench.

"Your Committee on Executive Appointments has found the nominee to be a remarkable individual, exemplifying all the qualities which should be characteristic of judges -intelligence, appropriate judicial temperament, sound judgment and dedication. He brings with him to the Judiciary, not only an awareness and sensitivity to the people of this community but, more importantly, the courage to make tough decisions and the foresight necessary to follow through. His deep commitment to the ideals of the profession, combined with his moral strength and integrity, makes this nominee a fair, independent and compassionate decision-maker. In addition, the testimonies we received indicate that the nominee has a special gift to discern right from wrong and good from bad, regardless of what side of the issue he was on.

"Mr. President, I first met Kevin Chang several years ago through my good friend Don Carroll of Oceanic Cablevision. Since that time, I have been extremely impressed with Kevin as a person and as a professional. I was even more impressed at Tuesday's confirmation hearing where I learned that Kevin has been the pro bono legal adviser for the Sex Abuse Treatment Center for the past six years.

"Mr. President, Kevin Chang's dedication to public service is inspiring. As Don Carroll testified, 'He is an excellent choice for the court and I believe strongly that his appointment will benefit the people of Hawaii.'

"For these reasons, Mr. President, Kevin Chang richly deserves our advise and consent and I therefore urge my colleagues to vote in support of Governor's Message 194. Thank you."

Senator Reed also supported the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of the nomination.

"It's a pleasure to see former deputy prosecutors appointed to the Circuit Court and, in this instance with regard to Kevin Chang, it is a particular pleasure because I had the opportunity to work alongside Kevin Chang while we were both at the prosecutor's office in the early '80s. I found Kevin to be a person with intelligence and exceptional integrity. I am confident that he will make a major contribution and be an exceptional addition to the Circuit Court.

"I urge his unanimous support."

"This year's Young Woman of the Year second runnerup is Gloria-Alberta del Rosario Bradbury. A senior at Punahou School, Gloria is an accomplished jazz and ballet dancer who hopes to continue her interests in the areas of performing arts and international relations at Columbia University.

Tuesday, March 16, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Alan Mark, Kilohana United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Blair who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney recognized McDonald's of Hawaii for its education programs, introduced the following representatives who were seated on the floor of the Senate, and remarked:

"Mr. President, it's my pleasure today to make an introduction on the floor and, as chair of the Education and Labor Committee, it's my honor to have some representatives here from the business community. You know how we always talk about our need for more partnerships in education and many times we only hear concerns and complaints from the business community on what's not happening in the educational system and what needs to be done.

"Mr. President, I was really pleased to find out that there's a company in Hawaii that has been doing a lot and not just talking about it. They have been making a lot of things happen, and that's the McDonald's Corporation of Hawaii. Over one-third of their employees are high school and college students and they have a very special and important program called 'Making the Grade.' This program provides for one hour of study time for students employed during school evenings. They pay them for the hour and encourage them to do their homework. And for students who have a 2.0 GPA or higher, they have monetary awards that they give those individuals, based upon their academic achievement.

"Through its 'Ambassador Education' program, speakers are sent to elementary and high schools to promote vocational, nutritional and environmental education.

"And the 'Ray Kroc Youth Achievement Award' program honors a high school senior who exemplifies the characteristics of McDonald's founder, Ray Kroc. By displaying persistence, determination, hard work and excellence, nearly \$50,000 have been awarded Hawaii students since the program started.

"Today, we have with us Mr. Victor Lim, president of McDonald's of Hawaii Advertising Association, and Mr. Glenn Waki, its vice president; Ms. Donna Abreu, director of operations, McDonald's of Hawaii; and Mr. Miles Ichinose, owner of McDonald's Windward Mall, Ewa Beach and Waipahu, and a former Jefferson Award winner. (All rose to be recognized.)

"On behalf of the Senate, thank you for coming and thank you for your outstanding work in the community and for supporting our public schools and our school system."

The honored guests were presented leis by Senators A. Kobayashi, Ikeda, McCartney and George.

The Chair then said:

"Members of the Senate, this morning, I attended the grand opening of the temporary Waianae Library and learned that the McDonald's people are also involved in a very important 'Read to Me' program, and they're doing it at their business location."

Senator Reed then recognized former Colonel Vo Dai Ton, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'm very honored to be able to make this introduction today. I know that all of us remember the American involvement in the war in Vietnam. For many of us, our awareness of what was going on there more or less ended with the U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam. Not often are we reminded of the fact that very brave men and women remain involved in the fight to free Vietnam from communist influence.

"Today, I am very honored to introduce a man who is internationally known for his role in this effort. He is a very humble leader who is here today accepting our acknowledgment on behalf of the thousands of men and women who continue this fight and I would like to, with your indulgence, read this brief certificate:

'Whereas, former Colonel Vo Dai Ton, aka Hoang Phong Linh (the Poet) is deserving of special honors and the highest commendations for the many personal sacrifices that he has made in the cause for freedom and for his fine works as a poet; and

'Whereas, born in 1936 in central Vietnam, Colonel Vo Dai Ton was assigned to the South Vietnamese Army Special Forces; and

'Whereas, following the fall of South Vietnam in April 1975 he was sent to re-education camp; in 1976 he escaped from jail and made his way to Sidney, Australia: and

'Whereas, in 1981 he returned to Vietnam via Laos to organize with others to regain freedom and human rights for his countrymen; he was ambushed and arrested by the Vietnamese government; (and as a sidenote, Mr. President, the colonel was arrested by the communists in Vietnam and for ten years was locked in a five-square-foot solitary cell in total darkness for ten years, and everyday given a small ration of rice, salt and water; for ten years in darkness, with his family not knowing whether he was alive or dead.)

'Whereas, even though he was beaten and tortured 96 times during the 10 years, one month and 17 days, he reaffirmed that he would not betray his friends and would continue to fight for a free Vietnam; and

'Whereas, even after Colonel Vo Dai Ton's release in December 1991 under pressure from the free world, there remains many more brave men and women, other heroes, who are continuing the fight to set their countrymen free and restore a nation of honorable people to a life of dignity; now, therefore,

'Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, that Colonel Vo Dai Ton and the countless other resistance fighters be congratulated and commended for their efforts in fighting to regain freedom and human rights for their countrymen; and

'Be It Further Resolved that the Senate supports the causes of these Freedom Fighters in their constant and immeasurable personal dedication to the cause of freedom and liberty in Vietnam.'"

Senator Reed then introduced Colonel Vo Dai Ton, Mrs. Vo, and Mr. Timon Tran, Hawaii Vietnamese community coordinator. Also, in the audience, several members of the Hawaii Vietnamese community.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of JAMES RICHARD AIONA, JR., for judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, 14th Division, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the appointment of James 'Duke' Aiona to the First Circuit Court bench.

"Your Committee on Executive Appointments has held several public hearings thus far on gubernatorial nominees for the Circuit Court bench. To date, all of the candidates have appeared to be extremely well-qualified and a credit to their profession. James 'Duke' Aiona is no exception, Mr. President. He possesses the ability, professional experience, temperament and, most importantly, the motivation and sincere desire to serve the public in the capacity of a Circuit Court judge.

"There are two things in particular about Duke Aiona which greatly impressed me, and I would like to share them with the rest of the Senate. The first is his goal to 'humanize' the Judiciary by taking the time to explain his decisions to those who appear before him. In his own words, it is his intent to portray judges as 'members of the general community who put on their pants in the morning the same as everybody else.' The second is his supporters' description of him as a role model for the young people of this state. This assessment was made by several individuals who witnessed his strong and positive influence on the many youngsters he has worked with as a volunteer coach for organized sports.

"In my mind, Mr. President, this is a clear indication that Duke Aiona will continue to reflect the finest tradition and ideals of his alma mater, St. Louis High School, on the Circuit Court bench.

"On a more personal note, Mr. President, I know Duke Aiona as an athlete with exceptional skill and talent on the basketball court. I know that he is more than familiar with the importance of the referees who enforce the rules and make important decisions during the game. I am therefore certain that he will carry this sense of importance with him to the bench and it will help to guide him as he makes those important decisions for the people of this state in the larger game of life.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I would like to strongly urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 193. Thank you."

Senator Reed added his support and said:

"Mr. President, Duke Aiona is one of those deputy prosecutors who was in the Prosecutor's Office when I was there. I have a lot of respect for good prosecutors because to be one you have to be a fighter, and Duke Aiona is that. He is an honest person who will be a credit to the Circuit Court and I urge his support."

Senator Matsuura also supported the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, Judge Aiona gives legislators a lot of credit because when I asked him what law he would change if he was made 'King for a day,' he answered,

"... all the laws of the State of Hawaii are good today ... may be different tomorrow."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Holt introduced Judge James Aiona who was accompanied by his family: wife Vivian, mother Frances, children - Kaimilani, Kulia, Makana and Ohulani, sister-in-law Wendy, sister Roberta Richards, brother-in-law Fuzzy Richards, sister Jamie Omori, nephew Reid Richards, and niece Wendy Richards.

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 882 (Gov. Msg. No. 191):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 882 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of MICHAEL ANTHONY TOWN for judge of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, 19th Division, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, for a term of ten years, seconded by A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the appointment of Michael A. Town to the First Circuit Court bench.

"As I stated earlier, the gubernatorial nominees to the Circuit Court have been nothing short of outstanding. As was the case of the previous nominee, Michael Town is no exception to this trend. He has demonstrated to the committee the knowledge, experience, motivation and desire to serve the public in the capacity of a Circuit Court judge.

"One of the more impressive aspects of this nominee is his background in the Peace Corps. According to Judge Town this experience helped strengthen his belief that one man can make a difference,' and he continues to be guided by this principle. As an example, Judge Town was a leading drafter of the Child Protective Act and is currently a nationally recognized leader and spokesman for children's protective services.

"In addition, Judge Town also devotes a fair amount of his time to civic activities. As a director of the Boys and Girls Club of Honolulu, he has been instrumental in providing guidance to troubled youth.

"I was most impressed, Mr. President, as well as the rest of the members, that Dwayne Neves, a former career criminal, currently one of the Boys and Girls Club's more successful street counselors, was at the hearing to support Judge Town's confirmation. I think Dwayne Neves' appearance at the hearing is indicative of the requisite compassion that distinguishes a judge. More specifically, the type of compassion that generates honor and respect.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I would like to strongly urge my colleagues to join me in support of Governor's Message 191. Thank you."

Senator Reed added his support, as follows:

"Mr. President, in the seven years I've been in the State Senate, as we considered gubernatorial nominations to the Circuit Court, I've often wondered why Mike

Town's name never comes up? So I'm delighted to see that we are about to confirm his nomination.

"When I was in the Prosecutor's Office, we created a 'Crime is for Losers' program. We went around the entire island speaking to 7th and 8th graders every Friday and Judge Town was one of those Family Court judges who participated. I think what struck me the most is how deeply and sincerely he really cares about young people. He's the kind of judge who works on his off-hours with young people. The only negative thing I can think about his appointment to the Circuit Court is that he'll be so sorely missed in the Family Court. I'm happy to see his nomination and I urge his support."

Senator Graulty also spoke in support of Judge Town and said:

"Mr. President, it is with personal pleasure and pride that I speak on behalf of Judge Town. I have appeared before Judge Town on numerous occasions as an attorney, and I can say without any question whatsoever that he is a great judge and very deserving of this nomination.

"I also want to inform my fellow Senators that Judge Town has been actively involved in drafting legislation and it was Judge Town who, together with members of the House Committee on Human Services about ten years ago, drafted the legislation for the Children's Advocacy Center. And it is just an indication of Judge Town's commitment to children, as the previous speaker has just explained, and his great desire to be of help to those who are victims of crime, as well as to those who come before him and his court.

"I am in great support of this nomination and I am very pleased to see Judge Town appointed to the Circuit Court. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, like Judge Aiona, Judge Town had glowing testimonies from the clergy which was quite unusual. The clergy said everything nice about these two judges. It was very impressive. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi added:

"Mr. President, Judge Town has been involved in several pieces of legislation as has been commented on this floor.

"I'd like to tell this body of an incident that occurred, I believe in 1977 when I was a member of the Ombudsman's staff. Judge Town, at that time, advocated increasing the number of long distance Watts lines from the neighbor islands to Honolulu because he felt that certain individuals on the neighbor islands lacked prompt response on the part of state agencies because those state agencies did not have adequate telephone connections to Honolulu. It was a case that I believe was in the Ombudsman's Office for over a year. We went through many difficulties in trying to establish more telephone lines between the neighbor islands and Honolulu. Finally, we were able to get improved services.

"I would say that this is an illustration of Judge Town's off-the-bench activities that benefit the public welfare. Thank you."

Senator Levin also added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I didn't also speak in support of Judge Town.

"In a prior life he was also a legal aid lawyer and in that capacity he did a great deal of research on Hawaiian trails. There is now a trail open between Spencer Park in Kawaihae through the Mauna Kea Beach Hotel to Hapuna Beach. The opening of that trail, that old Hawaiian trail, came about because of a lawsuit that was brought almost entirely based on the research and work done by Judge Town. I think the entire state should recognize that and be grateful to him for the work that he did to make that possible. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi added her remarks:

"Very briefly, Mr. President, I speak in support of the confirmation.

"The chair of the committee said everything I would have liked to say about Judge Town. He is just a wonderful man. I hope that another circuit judgeship could be created within the Family Court so that we can keep him there because the youth of our state really depend on someone like Judge Town being in Family Court.

"I'm glad that he will continue to serve as the director of the Boys and Girls Club of Honolulu. He is just invaluable there also. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Blair, Chang, Nakasato).

Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, this morning I represented the Senate at the ground-breaking ceremony of the closed-cycle OTEC plant in Kona. This ground-breaking may appear insignificant but this project is a landmark somewhat similar to McCormick developing the wheat combine. Some day this development will become the template for energy and water development in all the Pacific island governments. The closed-cycle OTEC plant will be operational about a year from now. However, in about a month from now you are going to see the operation of the OTEC open-cycle. The operation of the closed-cycle and open-cycle OTEC plants will become a landmark in ocean technology history.

"Some of you may wonder how this technology all came about. Governor Burns was governor of the State of Hawaii and he was dying of cancer. He met with Dr. John Craven and he told Dr. Craven, 'John, you know we gotta get this NELH started.' Dr. Craven told the governor, 'We have a little problem here. We're at the last week of the session. The bill has not been drafted! How are we going to introduce the bill?' The governor told Dr. Craven, 'Don't worry about that. I'll take care of that. You just write the bill.' John did and, miraculously, the bill got the two required hearings on an amendment in one day and it passed, and that was the start of NELH!

"When the history of NELH is someday written, Governor Burns will be remembered for making the right decision at the right time. Thank you."

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

"Tamar's creative, perceptive achievements in environmental education has earned her this international recognition. So it is my great pleasure now to introduce to this honorable body Ms. Tamar Chotzen. (Ms. Chotzen stood to be recognized.)

"I would also like to introduce Tamar's husband, Mr. Barney Tsuruda, parents Walter and Carla Chotzen, and trustees of the Hawaii Nature Center, Don Carroll, Oswell

Stender, and Kenneth Kupchak." (All, seated in the gallery, stood to be recognized.)

Senator Fukunaga, in recognition of Ms. Chotzen, said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not join my colleague Senator Matsuura in saying a few things about Ms. Chotzen and her outstanding work in the community.

"I think she is perhaps one of the best examples of that old axiom, 'Think locally, but act globally.' Starting from a very, very small beginning at the Hawaii Nature Center, Tamar has grown and developed this particular center into something that is truly a world treasure. So, on behalf of us all in Makiki Valley and all of the rest of the world who we hope will benefit through her leadership, I'd like to join in extending our congratulations to Tamar. Thank you."

Senator Blair added:

"On behalf of the Maui delegation and myself, in particular, it is a pleasure to be able to congratulate Tamar for her award. In the last reapportionment, I lost the Makiki-Tantalus area and gained Iao Valley. Tamar was kind enough to open a nature center in my new district to make up for the one I lost. I thank her for that."

Senator Chang then said:

"Mr. President, I'm often remiss, but today I'll make an exception. I was a member of the board of the Hawaii Nature Center when Ms. Chotzen was considered for the position that she now occupies and it is in my estimation that it was the best decision that the board of directors ever made when she was brought on board. Of course, in those days, we encouraged her to think globally and act locally, but we'll take both versions. Thank you."

Ms. Chotzen was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator A. Kobayashi. Senators Matsunaga and Fukunaga presented her leis.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, as you know there was an article in today's Advertiser that says, 'Senate panel approves customer surcharges to rebuild Kauai utilities.'

"At this time I would like to thank the chair of the Senate Planning, Land and Water Use Management Committee for giving the preliminary approval yesterday to the plan that would impose surcharges on the state utility customers to help cover the cost of rebuilding Kauai's telephone and electrical systems. But, Mr. President, I must express my disappointment on the Hawaiian Electric Company's opposition to the proposal. And I want to make an inquiry, Mr. President, and remind you and my fellow colleagues that the Senator from Kauai and I offered Senate Resolution 30, which would establish a Senate investigating committee to investigate the insolvencies of insurance companies after Hurricane Iniki. I cannot help but believe that I think that all of these problems that we are experiencing in the recovering of Kauai is directly related to many of the insolvency questions relating to the insurance companies.

"As you know, Mr. President, and for those of you that did have an opportunity to read the resolution, that in the

resolve clause it says, '... that a Senate investigative committee is established to investigate the roles, responsibilities, and performance of companies found to be insolvent after Hurricane Iniki, namely, the United National Insurance Company and Hawaiian Underwriters Insurance Company of the Hawaiian Insurance Group, and their parent company, Hawaiian Electric Industries, Inc.'

"I'm hoping, Mr. President, that the Senate will consider this resolution and try to get to the bottom of what the situation is and what is causing all of these problems out there, as opposed to just merely increasing everybody's surcharge on utilities. We have an opportunity to be able to perform that task and I'm using this point of personal privilege to urge the chairman to whom this resolution was referred to.

"Will you please take this into consideration and perhaps this will educate us on what exactly is out there, what exactly the problems are, and how we, representing the general public, can help in resolving the problems as well as helping to rebuild the economy of Kauai. Thank you."

Senator Reed also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I'd like to also rise on a point of personal privilege. It's related.

"I'd like to voice my support for the chairs of the respective committees dealing with this insurance problem. We are well aware of the impact this has had with regard to Iniki and the people of Kauai and the effect it has had statewide with regard to homeowners insurance coverage. And there is a third area that's perhaps not as clear yet that will soon become clear.

"I received a phone call last night from a friend who is a small businessperson. This person has a gross income exceeding a million dollars; he employs 10 to 15 people. He has been without insurance since March 6th. His insurance agent has been looking, since February 6, attempting to get coverage for him and has not been able to find insurance for him. He had insurance through HIG. He paid his annual premium in November of last year, and two months later was notified that his insurance coverage is going to be cancelled. He is presently operating without insurance coverage.

"I called Small Business Hawaii this morning to find out if this was an aberration or, if indeed, this was beginning to impact small businesses generally and was told that this is impacting small businesses generally. So we have a problem that is going to touch everybody in the state when it begins putting small businesspeople out of business. I would lend my support to and encouragement to those subject committees dealing with this, with the thought in mind that this is indeed expanding throughout our community and threatens to devastate small business in our state."

Senator Solomon, again, rose on a point of personal and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege on another matter which is the article that appeared in today's paper about 'Hamakua employees vent anger. Take verbal chops at the governor and firm's attorney.'

"Mr. President, I speak in support of Harold Masumoto and what the Office of State Planning has done and how they've assisted the Hamakua Coast. For the record, I would like to state that it is my understanding that it is because the attorney, representing Hamakua Sugar in the

federal bankruptcy proceedings, who favors closing the 35,000-acre plantation on March 31st that we are having many, many problems in trying to negotiate the extension.

"I think it's very unfair that the ILWU has used this opportunity to get their employees to vent their feelings at Harold Masumoto and the Office of State Planning as well as the governor's representative because I feel that as a Senator from that district, the governor and the Legislature have done everything to help insure that Hamakua Sugar Company remain solvent. Unfortunately, I feel that they are the ones that are impeding the progress.

"I recommended, at a meeting with the governor on Monday, for Mr. Morgan to fire that attorney and get an attorney that's going to be more cooperative so that the state, together with the sugar company and the ILWU, can proceed to negotiate for an extension of 18 more months to harvest \$15 million worth of sugar that's in those fields, thus, keeping the sugar employees working while a transition program attempts to help to place the employees in other types of jobs.

"At this time, Mr. President, I would like to restate my stand that I do agree with Harold Masumoto's position, that it really is a problem with Hamakua's attorney and they should really get their act together so that we can help and resolve these problems. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Hagino also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, this morning I received the March 15th edition of 'Newsweek' and as I was reading it there were two articles in the magazine that relate to Hawaii. I would like to share it with my fellow colleagues. This being Wednesday, there's good news and bad news in the middle of the week.

"The good news is an article that talks about a good deal for university students that would soon be embarking on their spring break. Under 'Peri Picks' of Newsweek, and there are six picks, Hawaii is listed as a 'Port of call for gobs of California students. No nonsense hoteliers keep them laid back. (Best deal: \$500 Honolulu packages.)' So, that's the good news. We're getting free publicity about Hawaii in Newsweek.

"On the very same page, is the bad news. There is an article about pogs. It says, 'Some 2,400 miles from mainland pop trends, Hawaiian kids have to invent their own mindless fads. Like collecting pogs'

"Mr. President, whenever we go to conventions, I think all of us try to convince conventioneers to come to Hawaii for their convention the next year. And they unanimously say that they love to come to Hawaii but they have negative connotation as it being just a place for recreation and not for doing business. And I resent the two negatives in these Newsweek articles; one, being 2,000 miles away from mainland America, that we're isolated from them and we don't know what's going on on the mainland; second, that they're calling our kids simpletons, really, by saying the only thing they have to do is play pogs all day and invent minor things."

Senator McCartney, also on a point of personal privilege, added:

"Mr. President, I want to echo the remarks of my colleague and also say that I guess it's better to play pogs

and use your mind than to sit in front of a TV all day and watch television. Your points are very well taken.

"I just want to say that there was a card and collector's show a few weeks ago, all of the national collectors, and nobody was making any money because all of the Hawaii pogs were being sold and all the pogs are now going to the mainland. So, it's going to start there too."

Thursday, March 18, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Dale Burke, Christ Lutheran Church of Mililani, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

Senator Fukunaga, in recognition of Social Work Month in Hawaii, made the following presentation and introduction:

"Mr. President, it is with a lot of respect and thanks that I would like to introduce to this honorable body a group of social workers who are here with us this morning to help celebrate the month of March as Professional Social Work Month in Hawaii.

"I think that as we begin looking at the many ways in which we are going to have to cut costs and reform government operations, and look for ways to become a lot more cost-effective in what we spend taxpayer dollars on, it's an especially appropriate time for us to recognize the many health care professionals who make up the front line forces in many of the most difficult kinds of problems that face our society -- whether it's in the area of domestic violence, child abuse, or the many types of diseases that social workers, a critical part of the team, are helping to address.

"With us this morning on the floor are a number of representatives of our social work profession. I would like to introduce very briefly: Mr. John Tomoso, president, National Association of Social Workers (NASW), Hawaii Chapter; Dr. Patricia Ewalt, dean, School of Social Work, University of Hawaii at Manoa; and Ms. Debbie Shimizu, executive director, NASW, Hawaii Chapter. (All stood to be recognized.)

"Joining me in the presentation of the certificate this morning are Senator Bert Kobayashi and Senator Rey Graulty. I'd like to defer to both both of the Senators for some of their remarks regarding today's presentation. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, social workers have long been a respected part of the professional social network that provides innumerable services throughout the community. Social workers, as you know, have long been involved in a legislative battle for licensing. The battle, in part, has to do with the comprehensiveness of services provided by social workers in many different fields. And it is, regardless of whether they have licensure, that we recognize their contributions today in the areas of health and human services. Thank you."

Senator Graulty added:

"Mr. President, coincidentally, this afternoon the Committee on Human Services will be hearing the bill on the licensing of social workers and as you can well imagine, Mr. President, we've been barraged with information from both sides of the issue. It's a very difficult issue because people often ask what really is a social worker? What does that person really do? And it's

very difficult to define and sometimes that's the cause of the problem.

"I guess a social worker is a person who helps people who need help in so many ways, and while it might be difficult to precisely define, I think people know when they are helped by a social worker.

"And regardless of what the committee may do this afternoon on the bill, I think we are here today to recognize and to say thank you for all that the social workers have done in our community for, certainly, without their help and their support, so many of our citizens would be in worse shape than they are today.

"I join my two colleagues in honoring these three outstanding individuals, and also join in offering our sincere thanks to all those in the field of social work who do so much for so many of our people. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga also introduced and recognized the following persons and said:

"Mr. President, I would also like to recognize a number of visitors that we have in the audience with us. I'd like to ask those who are here for this presentation also to rise and be recognized, especially Mr. Ah Nee Leong, who is a member of NASW.

"I would also like to mention that Dr. Jean Waldron, who is not with us this morning, is the Social Worker of the Year for 1993 in Hawaii. She is the director of the AIDS education project through the University of Hawaii Department of Psychiatry."

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 886 (Gov. Msg. Nos. 229):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 886 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of MARIO R. RAMIL for Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt spoke in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Governor's Message 229.

"Mr. President, it's my pleasure today to speak in support of nominee Mario Ramil and to recommend the advise and consent of the Senate for his appointment to the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court.

"Since this is a rare opportunity as chairman of your Committee on Executive Appointments to speak on behalf of the Supreme Court nominee, I hope that the members will bear with me if I seem nervous.

President, your Committee on Executive Appointments held a public hearing on this nominee on Tuesday, March 16th. During this hearing, I had the opportunity to learn more about Mario Ramil's character, life experiences and qualifications. As a result, I am pleased to report that he is ably qualified and deserving of the Senate's advise and consent for appointment to the Supreme Court. Beyond this, however, is my firm belief that Mario Ramil will contribute greatly to the diversity of He is a unique candidate of unquestioned integrity with a background that has enriched him with the ideals, traditions and cultural values of a large segment of our community. In other words, Mr. President, the appointment of Mario Ramil will send a clear message to the community that the Senate is strongly committed to the goal of achieving diversity in our Judiciary.

"For the record, Mr. President, I've always believed that diversity in our courts is essential to the achievement of justice. For this reason, I strongly support the appointment of a woman to fill the remaining vacancy on the Supreme Court.

"If I may, Mr. President, I would also like to repeat some of the remarks that I made at Mr. Ramil's hearing regarding the role of the Executive Appointments Committee in the confirmation process for judicial appointments. By the media reports that I have read and the comments that I have heard so far, there seem to be a variety of interpretations concerning the duties of this committee and of the Senate in general with regard to the judicial appointment process. I would like to make it clear at this time that it is my firm intent to abide by the process as prescribed by our State Constitution.

"As I see it, the Constitution restricts the Senate's consideration for advise and consent to a single nominee appointed by the governor. This is an extremely important point because it essentially precludes us from making comparisons with other potential candidates. In essence, our duty is to assess the merits and qualifications of the nominee strictly on an individual basis.

"Unfortunately, however, there are a few critics out there who are not bound by the Constitution and are free to make this type of comparison. Personally, I do not find anything wrong with this because it is a natural thing to do. I would strongly object, however, to those who would attempt to use these comparisons in an effort to influence the advise and consent process as set forth in the Constitution.

"It is abundantly clear that the Constitution only conveys this authority to the governor who has the option to select a nominee from a list of not less than six. The Senate, therefore, is strictly limited to the advise and consent of the governor's nominee.

"Rule 19 of the Rules of the Senate is consistent with this interpretation and specifies that the scope of the Executive Appointments Committee '... shall be to review the background, character, experience and qualifications of nominees for executive and judicial offices submitted by the governor, and make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.' As I understand it, the review function in Rule 19 applies to each nominee on an individual basis. As the chairman, this is precisely what I intend to do. Each nominee will be afforded the opportunity to participate in a fair and open public hearing and, in accordance with Rule 19, the committee will make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I intend to submit a committee report for every appointment that is referred to committee with appropriate recommendations as required by Rule 19. By so doing, Mr. President, the entire Senate will decide on advise and consent, in accordance with our Rules and the State Constitution.

"Mr. President, again, with your permission, I would like to give a short response to those critics who have tried to use the public hearings on certain Supreme Court nominees as a platform to call for the reform of the judicial selection process. I would like to remind them that these hearings are not the appropriate forum and that the governor's messages are not the appropriate vehicle for reform of the process.

"In closing, Mr. President, I would like to reiterate my support for the appointment of Mario Ramil to the Supreme Court bench and I urge my colleagues to vote in support of Governor's Message 229. Thank you."

Senator Iwase also rose to support the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination of Mario Ramil to the Supreme Court.

"Mr. President, with our consideration over the various Supreme Court nominees, questions have been asked about what should be considered in determining one's qualification to sit on our highest court.

"Some argue that one's ability to present evidence is important -- and it is.

"Some have argued that one's ability to write is important -- and it is.

"Others argue that one's analytical ability is important -- and it is.

"However, Mr. President, we are not choosing a lawyer for just any court. We are confirming a nominee to our highest court which renders final judgment affecting all of our people.

"And so I believe that the nominee should have a background and a breadth of life experience to make such all encompassing decisions which affect the policies of this state and which impact on the history of our state.

"Oliver Wendell Holmes once said that 'The life of the law has not been logic, it has been experience.'

"Mr. Ramil, born in the Philippines, whose father was an attorney but who could not find employment in that field when he came to this land of opportunity; who never forgot his roots and humble beginnings; who dedicated his career to public service to help people; who rose from the ranks of deputy attorney general to insurance commissioner, to director of labor; who performed at each stage of his career with distinction -- Mr. President, Mr. Ramil is the best qualified nominee for the Supreme Court.

"And with his background, he will use his life experience to give life to the law.

"Mr. Ramil will be a justice who will bring heart, soul and compassion to our highest court.

"And I am so proud to support this nomination today."

Senator Mizuguchi added his support, as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak in support of the nomination of Mario Ramil as an Associate Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

"Those of us who have worked with Mario know that he possesses the capabilities necessary to master all of the aspects required of an associate justice. His intelligent, quick grasp of the issues, analytical aptitude and his experience in a broad range of issues can only serve to enhance the State Supreme Court.

"From his humble beginnings, he has worked to advance himself in his chosen field. He has made a lifelong commitment to achieving the highest standards of excellence in all aspects of his professional and personal life

"I speak with conviction on behalf of Mario Ramil. I know him to be a man who's dedicated to serving the public with compassion and honesty. I believe that it is in the best interest of the people of this state that Mario

Ramil be confirmed as an Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also supported the nomination and said:

"I rise to speak in favor of this nomination, basically, because many people have wondered whether or not the individual who is before us today could have possibly had enough experience with litigation or in the courts to be able to receive this nomination. This concern has led me to rise to speak on this matter.

"I certainly hope that our confirmation of Mr. Ramil will convey a message to all that an honest, capable, hard-working and qualified individual who wants to dedicate, and indeed Mario has, his life to public service can also rise to become a member of the Supreme Court. If this were not the case, Mr. President and my colleagues, I shudder to think of the number of individuals who would not want to serve as our directors, as our insurance commissioner or in any capacity or any agency that would be of benefit to the people of this state. I'm so happy that Mr. Ramil chose to do so.

"In my years as chairman of the Labor Committee in the House I worked very closely with him, he was an insurance commissioner, and in the Department of Labor, and I found him to be competent to the point where our rates in worker's compensation were the only ones that were lowered during the period when it was receiving double digit escalation throughout the nation.

"Thank you, Mr. Ramil, and thank you, Judy, for allowing your husband to serve the State of Hawaii so ably. And it's, indeed, with a lot of honor and pride that I stand and ask my fellow colleagues and you, Mr. President, to vote overwhelmingly in favor of this nominee. Thank you."

Senator Chang added his support and stated:

"Mr. President, when my colleague from Mililani quoted Oliver Wendell Holmes, I could not resist the opportunity to bring another jurist to bear on this worthwhile appointment.

"I also rise and stand in support of Mr. Ramil's appointment to the Supreme Court.

"Mr. President, the Supreme Court is an ensemble of jurists that must reflect the many permutations of social values that exist in our community. With Mr. Ramil's appointment, in paraphrase of Justice Cardozo, 'The symphony of justice plays on; it's harmony to many, fuller than before.' Thank you."

Senator Graulty also rose to speak in support of Mr. Ramil and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination.

"Mr. President, 46 years ago, in the town of Novaliches in the province of Rizal, in the Philippines, Mario Ramil was born. Now, if I remember Novaliches correctly, it's about 30 minutes outside Metro Manila by car. It's a small town, much like Hauula or Kaaawa on the windward side of the island, or Waialua. It's country — and there are many hills in Novaliches, many rice fields and carabaos, and one of our nominee's childhood memories is washing down the carabao at the end of the day in the 'bukid,' which literally translated means 'hills' or 'hill country.'

"Shortly after Mario Ramil was born, he moved with his family to Hawaii; one of seven children born to a U.S. Navyman and his wife. Four years later, upon his father's retirement from the Navy, Mario returned to the Philippines with his family. And Mario's father, a college graduate, pursued his lifelong dream of becoming a lawyer.

"As you may be aware, Mr. President, 40 years ago, opportunities for Filipinos in the U.S. Navy were limited. They could only serve as mess stewards on ships. This was a blatant and flagrant form of discrimination. It was racial discrimination, pure and simple. It was in this environment and under these circumstances that our nominee was born and raised. It was in this environment that our nominee's father was challenged and, undaunted, reached for the stars.

"His son Mario, as we read in the papers last week, was not the favored son. He was not the one he hoped would be the doctor or the lawyer in the family, and wanting to follow in his father's footsteps, I understand, the nominee joined the Navy and tried to seek and reach for his star.

"And so here we are today, Mr. President, on the threshold of voting for a new Justice of our Supreme Court and there sits our nominee, the lawyer's son, a man for whom racial discrimination was real and personal. There he sits awaiting our verdict.

"Mr. President, only in America, could such a thing happen. Only in America, can the boy from the 'bukid' go as far as his talents and dream can take him and become a justice of our highest court.

"Mr. President, it makes me proud to live in a state where this can happen. And it makes me proud to be part of a process that makes this dream come true, because it's my dream, and I know it's your dream and the dream of every Senator here, not only for ourselves but for our children and our children's children. And so it is with great pride that I urge my colleagues to proudly join in voting 'aye' on this nomination. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney then said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in favor of the nomination and I'd like to thank my colleague from Salt Lake for those eloquent remarks. I come from the hills too and it prompted me to stand up and talk about this. Before I do, I'd like to thank the chair of the Executive Appointments Committee for those remarks that he made earlier. I embrace them and I think that they were in order.

"Mr. President, the Supreme Court is the people's court and, today, like in all votes that we take, we are voting our conscience and I feel very firm and very secure that we are voting our conscience that this is a vote to represent the people. I feel the nominee will represent the people with fairness, integrity and a strong content of character. And he truly represents 'The American Dream.'

"Mr. President, today is a proud day for the Senate and a proud day for the people of Hawaii in that we can support a nominee with those characteristics."

Senator Matsuura remarked:

"Mr. President, I also speak in favor of the nominee, and I want the remarks of the Senator from Salt Lake to be mine also. He has eloquently portrayed the character

and personality of a man who will serve the people of Hawaii.

"As I sit on the Executive Appointments Committee, there's nothing but lawyers that come to testify for the confirmation of judges, but in Mr. Ramil's case there was an unusual number of just ordinary people coming to testify for him. I'm not saying that he is perfect. I have to tell you that there is one imperfection. He can certainly improve on his storytelling ability to write children's stories. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Holt then introduced the newly confirmed Supreme Court Justice Mario Ramil to the honorable body. Mr. Ramil was accompanied by his wife Judy, sons Jonathan and Bradley, brother-in-law Carlos Matro, other family members and friends. (Mario Ramil, his family and friends, seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.)

THIRTY-FOURTH DAY

Tuesday, March 23, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Patria Agustin, Aldersgate United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Graulty, Holt, McCartney, Mizuguchi and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Fukunaga presented and introduced a delegation of veterans from the 442nd Regimental Combat Team on the celebration of its 50th anniversary, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is a rare privilege this morning to introduce to this distinguished body our guests who represent the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and its veterans, their regional chapters, and 'sons and daughters' affiliates. Senator Matsunaga and I are honored to be among their sons and daughters, as well as their beneficiaries.

"Today marks the beginning of the 442nd Regimental Combat Teams's 50th Golden Anniversary Reunion, between March 24th and March 28th, a memory-packed five days in which we can reflect upon the enormous impact that their wartime exploits have had upon the State of Hawaii, on each of us, and upon the rest of our country.

"The story of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team is a stirring saga of Nisei soldiers who rose above the pain of discrimination from their own people and government to prove their loyalty on the battlefields and to gain the respect and acceptance of the American people.

"They put that same courage to work in building the Hawaii of the 20th century. Their fervent dedication to equality and justice have helped propel Japanese Americans, Chinese Americans and native Hawaiians into positions of national influence -- and the truth is that most of us here in the Seventeenth Legislature would not have the opportunity to represent the people of the State of Hawaii if not for them.

"On this occasion, we can thank them and honor their legacy by rededicating ourselves to the struggle to improve Hawaii -- to deal with today's issues over Hawaiian sovereignty, treatment of new immigrants, balancing between educational reforms or long-term health care -- all in the spirit of 'go for broke.'

"At this time, I'd like to present some of our 442nd Regimental Combat Team guests. Seated on the floor are: Mr. Henry Kuniyuki, the vice president and president-elect of the 442nd Veterans Club; Mr. George Nakasato, chairman of the 50th Anniversary Reunion Committee, and a long-time aide to Senator Matsuura; Mr. Paul Takeguchi, vice president of the 442nd Veterans Club; Mr. Sam Hironaka, treasurer; and Mr. Harold Fukunaga, immediate past president and my father.

"I would now like to defer to Senator Matt Matsunaga to introduce the rest of our guests."

The gentlemen stood to be recognized. Mr. Kuniyuki was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Matsunaga. Senators A. Kobayashi, Solomon, Fernandes Salling, Ikeda and Fukunaga presented the leis

Senator Matsunaga then introduced the following persons and stated:

"Mr. President, it is indeed an honor and privilege for me to introduce the following individuals: Mr. Shiro Kashino from the Seattle Nisei Vets; Mr. Ray Nosaka, president of the 100th Battalion (Club 100); Mr. Guy Koga, president of the Sons and Daughters of the 442nd; Mr. Leonard Oka, the founder of the Maui Sons and Daughters organization; Mrs. Debbra McQuilken, founder of the Seattle Sansei Vets; and Mrs. Janice Sakoda, member of the Sons and Daughters of the 100th; Mr. Cary Miyashiro of the Legacy Foundation; Mr. Arnold Hiura, 442nd media coordinator; and, finally, the wife of Mr. Shiro Kashino, Mrs. Louise Kashino."

The ladies and gentlemen, present in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, today brings back some sad memories. I'm one of the older members of the Senate and I remember the war years. I know George has been working on this anniversary for a long, long time. But I want to share with you my personal loss of a friend who volunteered for the 442nd (Infantry) Regiment.

"Our neighbor, the Kameda family, had a whole bunch of boys, and one of them, Yoshito, who was about 12 years older than I, was like an older brother to me. Yoshito took me fishing and we were very close. When this friend of mine Yoshito got inducted into the Army, I was at the elementary school. After being inducted at the fire station in Haleiwa, the Army truck stopped right in front of the elementary school. I ran out of the class looking for my friend. After finding my friend, he gave me his only paper lei and told me to be a good boy.

"On June 26, 1944, Yoshito was killed in action; he was only 21 years of age. Today brings back some sad memories for me, but I want to congratulate all of you. It was a job well done. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to state:

"Mr. President, also in the spirit of this wonderful day in honoring the veterans of the 442 Regimental Combat Team that are with us today, I would like to mention that my administrative assistant and aide, who does everything for me in my office, Dr. Ryoji Namba, is also a veteran of the 442nd.

"I want to inform all of my colleagues that I'm very, very proud of 'Doc' and happy that he has been with me for eight years. He is also present in the gallery. Mahalo!"

Dr. Namba also stood to be recognized.

Senator B. Kobayashi then introduced a group of Boy Scouts from Troop 216 of Kaneohe, seated in the gallery: Travis Hong, Cory Ida, Gregory Ida and Gavin Ida, accompanied by Scout Leader Glenn Ida Jr. and Mrs. Phyllis Ida.

At this time, the Chair remarked:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair is very proud to have been a member of the 442nd Infantry -- Company I in Waianae. I served for a period of 10 years and those were very, very memorable years for me."

At 11:49 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"We have with us on the floor Mr. Stanley Kazuo Ida, his wife Doris, son Kevin and daughter-in-law Marian."

The honoree and members of his family stood to be recognized. Senator B. Kobayashi presented the

congratulatory Senate certificate and Senators A. Kobayashi, Ikeda, Holt and Mizuguchi presented the leis.

Senator B. Kobayashi also introduced other members of the Ida family who were seated in the audience: Glenn Ida and wife Phyllis, and the future group of judo black belts - Gregory Ida, Gavin Ida, Cory Ida, Garrett Ida and Glenn Ida Jr.

Senator Chang then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, tomorrow we celebrate Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole Day. I have here prepared remarks that I would like to insert into the record. If I may, I'd like to read excerpts from those remarks, inasmuch as it is late in the session.

"Prince Kuhio revived the Royal Order of Kamehameha the First, and in 1904 as Alii Aimoku officiated at the first modern day program in observance of the birth of The Great Kamehameha. The founding of the order is the pattern for the revival of many Hawaiian societies, including Hale O Na Alii, the Daughters and Sons of Hawaiian Warriors, the Kaahumanu Society, and others.

"In 1918, Kuhio and others drew up a constitution and the bylaws for the Hawaiian Civic Club.

"Kuhio was one of the first to speak up for women's suffrage and was successful in obtaining enabling legislation to give women in Hawaii the right to vote.

"He organized congressional visits to the islands and brought out groups of legislators in 1907, 1909, 1915 and 1917.

"With help from President Teddy Roosevelt, he succeeded in making Pearl Harbor an important part of the Pacific defense of the United States.

"He was able to persuade Congress to appropriate funds for the Honolulu Federal Building, Hilo Post Office, and harbor improvements at Honolulu, Hilo, Kahului and Nawiliwili.

"He was also known as the father of Hawaii's national park system.

"In 1940, a bronze plaque was placed near where Kuhio's Waikiki home once stood. The inscription reads: 'Prince by the Grace of God, Statesman by Accomplishment, Delegate to Congress by Popular Choice, Father of the Hawaiian Rehabilitation Act, Dedicated by His People.' I think it is a fitting tribute.

"Thank you for the honor of allowing me to honor one of Hawaii's greatest 'keiki oka aina.'"

The Chair then so ordered and identified Senator Chang's written remarks as Attachment "A."

Senator Graulty, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, some of the members and voters in my district apparently had received prior notice of Senator's Chang's remarks, and they were so taken by the remarks that they've asked me to ask that my name be added to the list and I ask that Senator Chang's words also be included as my own."

The Chair so ordered.

Senator Tungpalan, also on a point of personal privilege, remarked:

"Mr. President, the same individuals visited me this morning and also asked me to support Senator Chang's remarks. I would also like to have my name inserted in the Journal as though Senator Chang's words were mine. Thank you."

The Chair so ordered.

Senator Solomon added her point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, also on a point of personal privilege and speaking on the commemoration of Prince Kuhio Kalanianaole, I would like to remind all of my colleagues that, in his spirit, we have a unique opportunity in this legislative session to see through the sovereignty bill for the Hawaiian nation so that we may fulfill Prince Kuhio's vision for the Hawaiian people, i.e., to decide on their own destiny.

"With that in mind, Mr. President, I would like to thank the previous speaker for his remarks and to remind all of us here that the legacy still continues and now it's up to us. Thank you."

REMARKS OF SENATOR ANTHONY CHANG ON THE COMMEMORATION OF PRINCE JONAH KUHIO KALANIANAOLE FRIDAY, MARCH 26, 1993

"Mr. President, I would like to begin my remarks with the greeting used by Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalanianaole during his many successful campaigns for delegate to Congress.

"Aloha, Aloha Kamaaina!

"In preparing my remarks for today's commemoration, I gained a new respect for the ability, wisdom, charm and great vision of the man who represented Hawaii in the rough and tumble world of Congress for nearly 20 years.

"Kuhio was a man who felt strongly about the importance of restoring awareness and pride in the past achievements of our people. But he also was a man who realized the necessity of dealing with contemporary problems and conditions. Kuhio urged his people to take pride in their American citizenship and to adjust to change. Hard work, he said, was the way for Hawaiians to compete with other races and Kuhio himself provided a perfect role model for Hawaiians to follow.

"Although he actively participated in the 1895 attempt to restore Liliuokalani to the throne and spent almost a year in prison for his activities, Kuhio eventually came to accept the new form of government called democracy. In later years, this man who would have succeeded the queen had the monarch endured, often said 'The monarchy has accomplished a useful means. Democracy arises to carry on the work.' Kuhio favored statehood for Hawaii and in 1919 introduced the first of a long series of bills asking that Hawaii be admitted to statehood.

"A dynamic and captivating speaker, Kuhio used his patriotism to good effect in overcoming congressional reluctance to provide funds for island projects. During a debate on a special appropriation for Honolulu harbor improvements in 1905 Kuhio told his colleagues 'No thoughtful man, either in Hawaii or here on the mainland believes that the stars and stripes will ever cease to float over those sunny islands. Do not make it possible for my people to reproach me because in this great national family, injustice is done to its youngest and weakest child. Do not leave it possible for any Hawaiian to say that, either politically or economically he was better off under the old monarchy than he may be today under the American flag.'

"We are told that the House reacted in stunned silence, followed by spontaneous and thunderous applause. Kuhio got his appropriation.

"Kuhio truly was 'ke alii maka'ainana,' the citizen Prince. But he was Prince of all the people of Hawaii. The motto embroidered on his silk campaign handkerchief read: 'No ka Pono Kaulike o ka Lehulehu,' meaning: 'For the Equal Justice of the Populace.'

"From the time he was a small boy, Kuhio was known for both his fairness and fearlessness. He refused to tolerate the bullying of his smaller weaker playmates and was quick to rush to their defense. He grew into a man who, although famous for his charm and friendliness, disdained any kind of sham, pretense, deceit or bigotry. Kuhio was a superb athlete and was not afraid to use his fists in defense of his principles.

"Kuhio was equally quick to use the power of the pen in defense of the Hawaiian race. In 1904, in reply to a slur published in the Washington Evening Star, the Prince wrote '...you published a letter from Hawaii, which I think does injustice to the territory which I have the honor to represent and to the race to which I belong. For more than 20 years, elementary education has been general in the Hawaiian Islands. For 64 years it has been compulsory and the law is strictly enforced. The percentage of Hawaiians who cannot read and write is almost exactly the same as that of the American born citizen of the State of Massachusetts, and far smaller than in almost any other of the United States. Until annexation, it was the general custom in the City of Honolulu and elsewhere throughout the islands to leave the doors unlocked at all times. It is only since annexation that the thief has been abroad in the land, and he is rarely of the Hawaiian race.'

"By the way, in that same letter, Kuhio made a comment about the news media ... a comment which many of us in public life can relate to very well. He said: 'The worst that can be said is always told. The good never gets into print.'

"Kuhio had a way with the written and printed word which influenced large numbers of people. But he also realized the importance of establishing friendly personal relationships with his colleagues. He and his lovely Kahanu entertained frequently and lavishly in Washington. He also invited selected congressmen to visit him at Pualeilani, his Waikiki home, and later initiated a series of congressional visits to Hawaii with invitations going to every member of the House and Senate. The visits were extremely successful and won many friends for Hawaii in Congress.

"Kuhio's reputation in the nation's capitol extended to the highest circles. One day the Prince was feeding the birds from a park bench when he became aware of an older man reading the newspaper next to him. The man looked at him for a moment, then grasped Kuhio's hand and shook it vigorously. 'Delighted,' said the man ... 'So you're the Republican delegate to Congress they call Prince Cupid.' The man was Teddy Roosevelt and that incident was the beginning of a long and productive relationship between the Prince of Hawaii and the President of the United States.

"You know, after going back into the history books, it was a little easier for me to understand how this extraordinary man was able to accomplish so much during his lifetime.

"The list is staggering.

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"I need not remind you that he revived The Royal Order of Kamehameha The First, and in 1904 as Alii Aimoku officiated at the first modern day program in observance of the birth of The Great Kamehameha. The founding of the order set the pattern for the revival of many Hawaiian societies including Hale O Na Alii, The Daughters and Sons of Hawaiian Warriors, The Kaahumanu Society and others.

"In 1918, Kuhio and others drew up a constitution and by-laws for the Hawaii Civic Club.

"Kuhio was one of the first to speak out for women's suffrage and was successful in obtaining enabling legislation to give women in Hawaii the right to vote.

"As I mentioned earlier, Kuhio organized congressional visits to the islands and brought out groups of legislators in 1907, 1909, 1915 and 1917.

"He encouraged the development of Pearl Harbor and, with help from President Teddy Roosevelt, succeeded in making it an important part of the Pacific defense of the United States.

"He was able to persuade Congress to appropriate funds for the Honolulu Federal Building, the Hilo Post Office, and harbor improvements at Honolulu, Hilo, Kahului and Nawiliwili.

"Kuhio is known as the Father of Hawaii's National Park System.

"Early in his congressional career he struck a blow for home rule by preventing a federal takeover of Kalaupapa. Kuhio was able to obtain a federal appropriation to build the hospital there for the treatment of leprosy.

"He obtained an amendment to the Organic Act which authorized creation of county governments in Hawaii with elected officials.

"Of course, the achievement for which Kuhio is best remembered is passage of the Hawaii Homes Commission Act, an accomplishment which involved years of battles and an unbelievable amount of hard work.

"In 1920, Kuhio argued before Congress that the common people of Hawaii for the most part had been excluded from the mahele, but that foreigners were able to gain control of tens of thousands of acres of valuable land.

"Kuhio said: 'The shrewd newcomer, who saw far ahead in the industrial possibilities of the islands, outwitted the Hawaiians, who for generations had looked only upon the land as a means of producing his sustenance. Gradually the land passed away from him and in many cases the land went without hardly any return. Hence today the great majority of the Hawaiian people own no land. The Hawaiian race is passing. And if conditions continue to exist as they do today, this splendid race of people, my people, will pass from the face of the earth.'

"When the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was finally passed its benefits were restricted to individuals of not less than 50% Hawaiian blood. But that's not the definition proposed by Kuhio and territorial Senator John Wise. They wanted the legislation to benefit all Hawaiians regardless of the amount of Hawaiian blood which flowed in their veins. Later Kuhio accepted a blood quantum of 1/32nd, and this definition of native Hawaiian was passed by the full United States House of Representatives in 1920.

"Back home though, opposition developed from sugar, ranching and newspaper interests, who wanted a higher blood quantum requirement. As a result, passage of the Hawaiian Homes Act was delayed until Kuhio agreed to a 50% blood quantum limitation. Kuhio did so very reluctantly because he foresaw that the requirement would divide the Hawaiian community, split families, and eventually result in homestead lands reverting to the government as intermarriage depleted the number of 50% Hawaiians.

"Congress today recognizes two definitions of native Hawaiian. One is the 50% Hawaiian Homes Act definition. But for federal programs, a native Hawaiian is anyone with even a drop of Hawaiian blood.

"The Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs and the Hawaiian members of the Native Hawaiians Study Commission are among the groups asking Congress to make this second definition the only one which applies when the words native Hawaiian are used. Under this proposal, adequate protection is insured for 50% Hawaiians who currently are waiting for Hawaiian Homes benefits.

"In 1940, a bronze plaque was placed near where Kuhio's Waikiki home once stood. The inscription reads:

'Prince by the Grace of God.
Statesman by Accomplishment.
Delegate to Congress by Popular Choice.
Father of the Hawaiian Rehabilitation Act.

Dedicated by His People.'

"I think it is a fitting tribute.

"Thank you for the honor of allowing me to participate in this ceremony honoring one of Hawaii's greatest keiki o ka 'aina."

THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY

Monday, March 29, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Elder Paul Martin, Afro-American Ministerial Alliance, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Blair and McCartney who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of the President, introduced Virginia State Senator Joseph V. Gartlan Jr. and wife Fedonna Gartlan.

Senator Matsunaga recognized members of the Kaimuki High School basketball team as follows:

"Mr. President, we have with us on the floor of the Senate members of the best high school basketball team in the State of Hawaii this year. I would like to ask the Senator from Kaimuki to introduce the principal and coach from Kaimuki High School."

Senator B. Kobayashi responded:

"Mr. President, today, we have with us on the floor head coach for the Kaimuki High School 'Bulldogs' basketball team, Raymond Fujino.

"Coach Fujino led the Bulldogs to a season record of 16 wins and 2 losses in this his fourth year as head coach and his 14th year with the Kaimuki High School basketball association. Coach, congratulations on the announcement that you are the 'Coach of the Year for 1993'

"Also, we have the principal of Kaimuki High School, Mrs. Thelma Nip who herself was 'Principal of the Year' several years ago." (Mrs. Nip, seated in the gallery, stood to be recognized.)

Senator Matsunaga then continued:

"Mr. President, it is a pleasure for me to introduce some of Coach Ray Fujino's players, here today. I have had the privilege of playing basketball with Coach Fujino on a CPA league team.

"Here on the floor today, we have point guard Shannon Lee, one of three team captains. He was Kaimuki's top scorer in the championship game with 14 points, and he was named one of the two tournament most valuable players. He was named to the 1993 Hawaii All-State First Team as player of the year. Shannon Lee is the best all-around player in the state; he's the Magic Johnson of the

"We also have on the floor another of the three cocaptains, guard Jason Nakamoto. Jason helped lead Kaimuki to its first State Boys Basketball championship. Jason was the first guard off the bench for the team.

"Also on the floor, we have the third of the team's cocaptains, Junior Faitau. Junior was the team's first big man off the bench and is nicknamed 'Stigma.'" The co-captains and Coach Fujino stood to be recognized and were presented leis by various Senators.

Senator Chang then introduced Master Ching Hai, as follows:

"Mr. President, it is my privilege and honor to introduce this morning Master Ching Hai. Master Ching Hai has been an inspiration to thousands of people throughout the world with her teachings of the Quan Yin Method of Obtaining Enlightenment in One Lifetime.

"Master Ching Hai arrived in Honolulu on Wednesday, March 24, for several teaching engagements, and is scheduled to leave this afternoon for Mexico to continue her worldwide teaching tour. We wish to express our appreciation for having Master Ching Hai adjust her schedule so that she can be here today. We are honored with her presence.

"May I introduce, at this time, Master Ching Hai."

Master Ching Hai stood to be recognized and was presented a lei by Senator Chang.

Senator Ikeda then introduced a group of students, the principal and a teacher from Niu Valley Intermediate School, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce a very distinguished group of students - the Niu Valley Intermediate School math team. Let me tell you what they have accomplished.

"The students won the recent MathCounts competition. MathCounts is sponsored by the Hawaii Society of Professional Engineers and it brings together the state's brightest 7th and 8th grade mathematicians. After years of domination by private schools, Niu Valley, with their 'can-win' attitude and fierce determination scored a stunning upset victory in the final round of the statewide 1993 MathCounts competition. They toppled seven other math giants, capturing the team, individual, countdown and coach honors. And it gives me great pleasure, Mr. President, to present these youngsters and their coach today.

"First of all, I would like you to meet Mr. Joel Mochida who is their coach.

"First place winner in the contest and also on the statewide team is Daishi Fujita. Second place winner is Mildred Park. With the students is Mr. Eric Heu, principal of Niu Valley Intermediate School. Daishi and Mildred, along with Shawn Lee of Punahou School and Travis Choo of Mauiwaena Intermediate School, will represent the state at the national tournament in Washington, D.C., on April 30.

"Also, in the audience, are team members, Reyna Furuya, Yuko Okada, Aimee Sze, Jennifer Saito and Dylan O'Connor."

Daishi Fujita, Mildred Park, Mr. Mochida, Mr. Heu and the students seated in the audience stood to be recognized. Senator Ikeda presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and various Senators presented leis.

Senator Ikeda also introduced representatives from Occidental Underwriters of Hawaii and said:

"Mr. President, today we are also honoring Occidental Underwriters of Hawaii on the occasion of their 60th

anniversary. Occidental was established by Lawrence Takeo Kagawa on February 1, 1933, and three generations of Kagawas have quietly and successfully served the people of Hawaii for 60 years.

"This island company was the first in America to abolish racial discrimination in establishing premium rates for life insurance. And the courage and leadership exhibited by Mr. Lawrence Kagawa led to the abolition of discriminatory factors across the nation, giving all Americans the opportunity to obtain life insurance at a fair price.

"Mr. President, it is a great honor to present to this body this morning, Mr. Gordon Kagawa who is Mr. Sigiried Kagawa's son, and Mr. Herbert Nishida, president of Occidental."

The honorees rose to be recognized. Senator Ikeda presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and various Senators presented leis.

The Chair, at this time, recognized and introduced former State Senator Mason Altiery who was seated in the audience.

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then invited Master Ching Hai to the rostrum to address the members of the Senate.

Master Ching Hai addressed the members, as follows:

"Thank you for giving this honor to me, my distinguished national leaders. I'm honored to be here and very happy to see good people at work. It's my first time to have such a privilege and I have to thank the President for allowing this to happen, also, Senator Chang for his kindness and his kind introduction.

"You see, actually, I don't have a place here. I don't know if I can talk politics. I hope you can hear something new for a change from (your) everyday occupations. Maybe you'll get tired.

"So you want some quick enlightenment? Why not? Maybe if you blink your eyes, then you can get it.

"In the Orient, as well as in the Occident, I guess we have a saying that the officers, the ones who are in government offices, are the parents of the people. This is so because you look after the welfare of the citizens of our nation. I have seen today that you have done it ... just a small part I have seen, but in a very democratic way.

"I have been so welcome in Hawaii that I thought I was born here, or I might be the president of Hawaii, the governor, even. I have no intention to be in that position so please don't worry, Mr. President. You stay right there. I have to go around the world. I am a little bit out of place here.

"If you want enlightenment, maybe you should come to my room. I still have it -- before the airplane takes off. So if you can take off for ten minutes to go there I give you quick enlightenment. Anyhow, it's very simple.

"Enlightenment, we all have it inside. (Please tell me when I run out of time.) We say immediate enlightenment, but it takes some time because in the introduction, not the enlightenment, it's just like you put something in your pocket, and your pocket is buttoned up so I have to tell you, 'Please unbutton your shirt,' and

then the inside is the thing that belongs to you that you have forgotten. You have put it there in the beginning, but being so busy with many other tasks outside, you have forgotten. Some of us have this very great wisdom inside, and when we recognize it, the moment we recognize it, that is the moment of enlightenment. And we already have it, therefore, it doesn't take very long; it just takes time to sit down and tell you where it is. And after that, you just blink your eyes and you have seen it.

"Many of the Hawaiian good citizens have been with us these few days and they have the so-called immediate enlightenment revealed to them, and it is not discriminated between races, religions, color or nationalities, or any occupations at all.

"We have many great leaders in the world. They also join us to find their own greatness in order to serve the nations better, including the United Nations personnel.

"Now, why we wanted to find enlightenment, just because we want to find our greatest reservoir of wisdom in order that we can do things in a clearer way, and that we know what God's will is. I mean the universal intention, the plan for the universal order, if you don't want to call that God. Because, in the universe, we have a plan, a definite plan, but sometimes it doesn't come into reality because some of us obscure this plan and do not see it clearly and try to do things in the other way. Therefore, we have a lot of trouble in our world even though many distinguished leaders of the world try their best to look after the affairs of this world. It is because we are not always cooperated. I don't mean you here, but the people, the citizens of the world, because many of us, the citizens of the world are not completely aware of their greatness -- the greatest wisdom we have inside all the time, since the time we're born, before we're born, and after we leave this world. Therefore, it is very pity we don't use it to enhance our affairs of the world or in any affair, maybe in political field, maybe in business, maybe in educational programs.

"It's like Jesus great can make us great because Jesus say, 'What I do, you can do.' Buddha also say, 'I am the Buddha, you be the Buddha, and all beings are equally having Buddha nature.' And what is that we couldn't find? Why we couldn't find it -- because we have forgotten. We're too busy working outside and forgot what we have inside. That's all very simple.

"I'm run out of time because you have to do some more important work. Thank you very much, and I wish maybe we have more other chance. Okay?

"Thank you, wish you all the best."

The Chair then thanked Master Ching Hai.

Tuesday, March 30, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Roy Sasaki, Hope United Methodist Church, Kaaawa, and Kahuku Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Mizuguchi who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Seventh Day.

The date March 30th was selected because it was the first day anesthesia was used during surgery in 1842. Today, we would like to mark this day by recognizing a number of physicians who, together with their colleagues, have made invaluable contributions to the State of Hawaii and to individuals for whom they provide medical care.

"We have on the floor today, Dr. Jeannette Chang, president of HMA; seated next to her Dr. Carl Lehman, president, Honolulu County Medical Society; then Dr. Richard De Journett, president of the Hawaii Federation of Physicians and Dentists; next is Dr. Steve Wallach, former president of HMA and, currently, its legislative committee chairman; then we have Mrs. Lillian Nishi, vice president of the Auxiliary of Honolulu County Medical Society; and then we have Dr. Ramon Sy, who has been recognized by HMA as the Physician of the Year."

The honorees rose to be recognized. Senator B. Kobayashi presented the Senate certificate of recognition to Dr. Chang and Senators Matsunaga, Tungpalan, Solomon, George, A. Kobayashi and Graulty presented leis to each the honorees.

Senator B. Kobayashi then continued:

"Mr. President, in the gallery, we have a number of friends and supporters of HMA and the various county medical associations. In particular, we have Ms. Jan Estioko, executive director of HMA." (All rose to be recognized.)

Senator Matsuura then introduced Ms. June Motokawa and said:

"Mr. President, as an elected legislator, I always look for somebody that someday can take my place, and I have one such potential person in the gallery. Her name is June Motokawa and she is the vice president of HSTA." (Ms. Motokawa stood to be recognized.)

Senator Matsunaga introduced Mr. Mark Nakashima, as follows:

"Mr. President, we have another member of HSTA here with us in the gallery and he is Mr. Mark Nakashima, HSTA legislative specialist from Honokaa. I know Mark from the time when he used to drive my father around when my father would return home to the islands from Washington, D.C." (Mr. Nakashima rose to be recognized.)

Senator Chang then said:

"Mr. President, I note that the good Senator from Hilo did not indicate which place would be taken by Ms. Motokawa. I don't know whether it's the best Senate basketball player, the best Senate singer or all of these positions.

"In any case, Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not extend greetings to Dr. Jeannette Chang on behalf of the members of her clan here today, that is, Senator Graulty and myself. Dr. Chang's family and my family, come from the same cluster of villages in China. Greetings!"

Senator Graulty then added:

"Mr. President, in addition to giving my personal greetings to Dr. Jeannette Chang, I'd also like to extend my personal greetings to Dr. Ramon Sy who has been the president of the 'Aloha Medical Mission' for many years now.

"If there is a local equivalent to Dr. Tom Dooley, it is Ramon Sy. It is a real privilege for us to have him here this morning as the Physician of the Year. I wish to extend my personal congratulations to Dr. Sy for all the work that he's done to make Hawaii and the physicians in Hawaii known throughout the Far East. Thank you, Dr. Sy."

"Her melding of East and West cultures through 'kimono' couture has been featured in 'Hawaiian Moving Company' of KGMB Channel 9, 'Working Women' of a TV station in Washington, D.C., and 'Frontrunners' of a TV station in Seattle, Washington. In all the programs, it was always mentioned that her fashions exemplified the racial harmony of Hawaii.

"At this time, Mr. President, I would like to read the certificate:

'Anne Yuri Namba was born and raised in Hawaii, attended the University of Hawaii, graduated from the Fashion Institute of Technology, and entered the highly competitive fashion industry in New York and Los Angeles. Traveling throughout the world observing native apparel of many lands, Anne found herself especially attracted by the infinite variety of patterns and colors associated with the Japanese kimono, and chose for her professional signature the application of traditional kimono material in Western designs.

'Today, the kimono couture of Anne Namba is nationally and internationally recognized - her original designs are even featured in the White House closet - and in 1992 she won Best of Show and Best of Category in the Governor's Fashion and Award Show.

'The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii congratulates Anne Yuri Namba for her distinctive creations, her contributions to the perception of Hawaii as a multicultural melting pot, and for demonstrating to Hawaii's youth that hard work and perseverance can pay off, even in the highly charged competitive world of high couture.'

"To show off the multiracial beauties of Hawaii, Anne has brought along two of her favorite models who are wearing her creations. One is Pam Kimura, Miss Hawaii 1993. Some of you may know her father, the former State Representative Robert Kimura. The other is Michelle Wong, a former Narcissus queen. (The young ladies modeled Ms. Namba's creations on the floor of the Senate.) Mahalo nui."

Ms. Namba stood to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator Solomon.

Senator Tanaka presented her with a lei. Senators Blair and Hagino presented leis to Miss Kimura and Miss Wong.

Senator Solomon also introduced Mr. Dave Cassidy, husband of Anne Namba, who was seated in the audience with Dr. Ryoji Namba, Anne's father. (Both rose to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, I was honored to be a judge at the first Miss Hawaii Teen pageant, and we are very privileged this morning to have the winner, Miss 1993 Hawaii Teen, as well as two members of her court. I would like to tell you a little bit about them.

"One of the requirements that the contestants had to meet was to write an essay on what they felt were important issues and/or problems, that a young teen faces today. And in tandem with that essay came an interview by the judges and I must tell you that I was quite impressed with the depth and thought that was given to a lot of these issues. And I learned a lot about young teens today and the kinds of problems that they face in school.

"It gives me great pleasure this morning to present to you Tiffany Joy Boyles who is Miss Hawaii Teen of 1993. She is a student at Punahou who describes herself as a carefree and outgoing teenager whose ambition is to become a child psychologist. Tiffany was selected Bandperson of the Year by her peers in 1990 and also holds the title of Miss Island Teen of 1991-1992.

"Tiffany will represent Hawaii in the National Miss 1993 Teen World pageant. (Miss Boyles stood to be recognized.)

"Two of the young ladies who also placed in the pageant are not with us today but we also have with us this morning, Kira Weber. Kira is a third year student at Kaimuki High School. She enjoys music, performing arts, sports and aspires to be a good role model for today's teenage girls. She describes herself as being a people person, and I think I can vouch for that. She's a peer counselor at her school and a facilitator volunteer at the Coalition for Drug-Free Hawaii -- Kira Weber. (Miss Weber stood to be recognized.)

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Mizuguchi introduced and acknowledged the presence of two young scholars from Dole Intermediate School, Machelle Caliedo and Lenore Antonio. The students are part of the shadow program. (The students rose to be recognized.)

Senator Solomon recognized the Hawaii Amateur Boxing Association and introduced Mr. Eiichi Jumawan, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, earlier this session, we had a group of individuals who came from throughout the State of Hawaii who were interested in amateur boxing and one of them was Wayne Easley from Kona. Wayne had consulted me and asked me how we could help promote amateur boxing in the State of Hawaii because they had just started their own Kona boxing club. As a result of this, I had advised Wayne that perhaps we should do a Senate certificate. We agreed on that and because of that, today, I am very honored to make this presentation to the Senate.

"Amateur boxing has been a prominent sport in Hawaii for decades. It has provided thousands of Hawaii's youth with opportunities to better themselves.

"Amateur boxing is rigorously regulated, with all participants including the boxers, coaches, trainers, and administrators required to be registered with the governing body. Under such regulations, amateur boxing according to the National Injury Information Clearinghouse, has a better safety ranking than such sports as bicycling, track and field, baseball, football, golf, bowling, and tennis, etc.

"We are very fortunate that in amateur boxing there are numerous adults who have volunteered to work with the youth. Their only compensation being the satisfaction of serving the youth of Hawaii. Our Sergeant-at-Arms Ben Villaflor is one of them.

"Hawaii has produced nine U.S. National Champions and one National Golden Gloves Champion. I wish to present this Senate certificate to Mr. Eiichi Jumawan, two-time U.S. National Champion and currently president of both the U.S.A. Boxing Hawaii Association and the Golden Gloves.

"Mr. President, I would like to yield the floor to Senator Hagino to read the certificate."

Senator Hagino then stated:

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, the certificate reads: 'The State of Hawaii commends the state Senate boxing team. Amateur boxing has been revived in the

state Senate and, as I understand it, there is going to be a heavyweight bout tonight at Dole Cannery between our heavyweights, Senator Tony Chang and Senator Richard Matsuura. This certificate is offered by our boxing commissioners, Senator Malama Solomon and President James Aki.'

"Mr. President, I hope you realize what day it is today (April Fool's Day) -- it is given in that spirit. (Laughter!)

"Seriously, Mr. President, the certificate commends the Hawaii amateur boxing program and reads:

'Amateur boxing has long been a favorite participation and spectator sport in Hawaii and over the years has provided an opportunity for thousands of Hawaii's youth, from all walks of life and from every social and economic background, to develop courage, self-confidence and self-esteem, disciplined bodies and minds, and maturity.

'Through a well organized system of 32 boxing clubs employing the volunteer services of more than 150 trainers, coaches. officials, and registered administrators, the Hawaii Amateur Boxing Association, an affiliate of the United States Amateur Boxing Association, currently provides opportunities to 300 athletes and boasts several U.S. National and Golden Glove champions among its alumni.

'The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, commends and congratulates the Hawaii Amateur Boxing Association on its excellent program, and extends its warm aloha to the many volunteers who make amateur boxing in Hawaii an exciting and rewarding sport for participants and spectators alike.'"

Senator Levin moved that H.B. No. 783, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Blair.

Senator Matsunaga rose to speak against the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this measure.

"A Deferred Acceptance of a Guilty Plea or a DAG plea was established in 1976 by the Legislature. It originally was intended to allow first time, accidental or situational offenders relief from having the stigma of a criminal record for the rest of his or her life. This billi, however, will change the law to extend the DAG plea to violent offenses involving the intentional, knowing, or reckless bodily injury or serious bodily injury of another person. This is an unacceptable change in the law.

"In 1987 a female classmate of mine in law school was driving through Waikiki. She unintentionally cut off another driver. That driver became incensed and angry. He drove up beside her and screamed obscenities at her. And when the light turned green, he rushed his car in front of her and blocked her in. He jumped out of his car and then jumped on top of the hood of her car and pounded on her windshield. Then slid off her hood and she was frozen with fear. She couldn't raise the window in time. He reached in the car; he grabbed her by the front of her blouse and repeatedly slammed her up against the steering wheel. No bones were broken, Mr. President, no physical scars were incurred, no protracted injury occurred. This did not rise to the level of a felony. This was a misdemeanor.

"My classmate, Pam, remained deeply shaken and fearful because of this incident for many years. She was afraid to drive alone; she was afraid to enter Waikiki.

"This bill would allow that defendant, cleaned up, wearing his nicest suit, accompanied by his mother, his auntie, and his minister or whomever, to come into court and explain how he is going into the Army, the Navy, the CIA, or the priesthood, or whatever, and so he should be treated differently than others. He should be given better treatment. He should be given a DAG plea.

"Mr. President, maybe a judge wouldn't give him a DAG plea; maybe he would. The Legislature should not give the judge that choice.

"I don't want to change the law. I think that we, as a society, are becoming desensitized to brutality. You know, it would have been unheard of 50 years that movies like 'The Texas Chain Saw Massacre' or 'Friday the 13th' would have been considered entertainment. Now, however, we live in a world in which Orlando Ganal allegedly wipes out five innocent people in one night. Fifty years ago the phrase a 'drive by shooting' had no meaning. Now, however, it does. The question is this -- if violence is becoming more prevalent in our society, then why should we become more tolerant of it in our laws? This honorable body must declare zero tolerance for intentional, knowing or reckless violence.

"A DAG plea would allow violent episodes to go undocumented. We need to document, in the form of a criminal conviction, violent behavior. Hurting another human being is entirely different from stealing a candy bar from Longs'. Harming another person is more serious than any property crime, and undeserving to be considered for a DAG plea.

"Mr. President, I've heard the arguments about giving the judges more discretion. But we are the body that sets public policy. Passing this bill means changing our public policy by accepting a new level of violence in Hawaii. Mr. President, I cannot condone that.

"I've also heard the arguments about not burdening the first time offender with the stigma of a criminal record. But intentional, knowing, or reckless violence deserves a criminal record. If a prosecutor can prove a case beyond a reasonable doubt, then the violence deserves to be documented. It is, after all, the truth. It happened. And what is so wrong with documenting the truth?

"Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to vote against this measure."

Senator Levin rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I very much respect the comments made by the previous speaker, but I rise to speak in favor of this bill and urge my colleagues to vote for it. Allow me to point out a few things.

"The bill came over from the House. The House Judiciary Committee, which is chaired by a former prosecutor and is very much concerned about criminal law, sent over a bill that was far more lenient than the bill that we have before us to vote on today.

"The bill before us does not guarantee anyone a deferred acceptance of guilty plea. All it would do is give judges, in whom we have so much faith, about whom we go through so much trouble to advise and consent as to their confirmation, to give them the discretion in light of the totality of the case in front of them to decide on that particular case whether or not a deferred acceptance of guilty plea is appropriate.

"There is no way we, in this body, sitting here today, can predict what situation might come before a judge that would warrant acceptance of such a request. It should be in the judge's discretion, knowing the circumstances of that particular case, to make that decision.

"I would also point out the limitations in the bill. If the offense charged is a felony, the court does not have discretion; the person is not entitled to a deferred acceptance of guilty plea. Neither if the case is a misdemeanor or even a petty misdemeanor, which carries a mandatory minimum sentence. We are not giving the court any greater discretion in domestic abuse cases. It's in lesser cases than that where the judge would have discretion, could still not accept the request, but would have the opportunity to consider the facts.

"We think that it is in the interest of justice, that justice requires consideration of the particular facts in a particular case, and therefore this bill is warranted."

Senator Iwase spoke against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I signed the committee report with reservations and, for the reasons eloquently expressed by Senator Matsunaga, I will also be voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

"It is always possible, when discretion is given, to imagine scenarios under which that discretion might be inappropriately exercised. However, to speculate that discretion might be abused is an argument against having any discretion in the system. The judicial system would break down, if we followed that logic. When the Legislature enacts penal provisions, we do so without knowing the facts of all future cases. In order to be sufficiently inclusive so as not to leave out cases where the punishment would be appropriate, we are almost invariably overly inclusive. If we are under-inclusive, obviously, we do not achieve what we set out to achieve.

"Therefore, we frame penal provisions in language that we are comfortable will cover all of the cases we would like it to cover, and we understand that there will be cases covered by that broad language in which discretion could be appropriately exercised. The first speaker on this measure can imagine a case under which he would like the judge not to apply that discretion, and I may well agree with him. I would suggest two things. First, if we have judges of the caliber that I think we have, in the case that he had indicated, the judge would not have exercised the discretion to grant the DAG plea. Secondly, although I won't prolong the discussion by giving examples, it would be just as easy for me to give examples where society would benefit by having the judge exercise the proposed discretion under the facts of the particular case.

"I ask my colleagues to have confidence in the judges. I hope we will be advising and consenting, with respect to district court judges in the foreseeable future, and ask that we give the system a little flexibility so that justice can be achieved. We are overly inclusive at the legislative level and must give the system the ability to make adjustments that are necessary in order to do what is best in the individual case, based on the particular facts. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against the bill.

"I just want to share with you an experience that happened this morning. I was having breakfast in a restaurant and a guy comes walking up to me and threatens my life. I just want to say that I concur with the chairman of the Science, Technology and Economic Development Committee about things being kind of rough nowadays. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan, also against the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak against this measure for one reason and one reason alone, and that is that we should not tolerate violence at any level. Those

found guilty for so doing should have it on their record because such behavior leads to higher levels and forms of assault and violence."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I have introduced a resolution regarding the possible name change for McKinley High School. I want to thank Tom Kaser for his article which

appeared in today's Advertiser explaining the purpose of the resolution. However, I feel compelled to reiterate my purpose in offering this resolution.

- "Mr. President, it was to provide an impetus and forum for further education and debate on the facts surrounding the overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom by the government of the United States. No two prominent United States officials better personify the opposite poles of public opinion in the United States toward Hawaii and United States imperialism than Presidents McKinley and Cleveland. It is clear that there is a woeful lack of knowledge regarding the history of the Overthrow. As proof of this, let me repeat some phone calls received by my office from persons who it would appear might benefit from public debate concerning that era.
- "l. 'Ask the Senator when does she plan to renounce her citizenship;'
- "2. 'The "stupid Hawaiians" we shouldn't listen to them; they should go back to their homelands;'
- "3. 'Tell the Senator that we should rename "Kamehameha Schools" to "Kinipopo High."'
- "Hopefully, by engaging our students in intelligent and focused debate on this important area, regarding this important era, the next generation will have a realistic and unprejudiced understanding on the history of Hawaii and the role of United States imperialism.
- "I must reiterate here that the resolution calls for debates on the question, 'Should McKinley High School be renamed?' and after the debates the student body votes on the issue.
- "A debate such as this would require thorough research and it would be a tremendous educational experience for the students. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator George rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I read with considerable interest a commentary in this morning's newspaper, authored by the chairman of our new Special Investigative Committee. The reason that I'm interested is that it lays out in very clear language the reason for our needing such a committee and it begs for the sort of information I believe that all of us ought to be useful in providing to the committee as we come across it. In order to start what I hope will be an avalanche of such, I'd like to offer one that I came across in the subject matter of Housing Committee. This is an HFDC contract which was let originally in the amount of \$45,000 for a specific engineering chore and after seven change orders the amount was swelled by \$1,751,015.

"Mr. President, I hope that the chairman will be graced with this sort of specific information because I think it will help the committee and the Senate to achieve what we need to have, which is information as to what is

really going on. I hope my colleagues will join me in providing this sort of stuff."

Senator Matsuura, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, I hate to be the bearer of bad news, but this is a summary of a document that my staff gave me just before coming up to the session. This is in regards to the Department of Transportation, Airports Division. The breakdown of contracts over \$4,000 for fiscal year 1990-91 is as follows: The total amount expended that year was \$69,824. Sixty percent of that contract amount was for non-bid exempt contracts -- 60 percent! The more interesting item is that only one percent of that 60 percent had the approval of the state comptroller. The rest of the 59 percent had no approval from the comptroller's office.

"But, today, Mr. President, I have good news! I have an article here that quotes our good Senator Blair. It says, 'It was one of those moments you raise your eyes to the heavens and say thank you, there is a future, Blair said.'

"Now, I know you all want to know what this is all about. This is good news since it involves education. I'm going to let the chairman of the Education Committee fill you in as to why Senator Blair made the historic quote."

Senator McCartney then responded:

"Mr. President, it involves a procurement situation and maybe Senator Matsuura can explain it also because he's going to help with the procurement situation in our schools, right?

"Mr. President, you know that we have a lot of downs in education this year, but I think this is a real highlight and I'd like Senator Blair to share the story.

"We went to Kilohana School on Molokai on Monday for a visit and we happened to walk into a 6th grade class. It was a real touching experience that has restored our faith in our children in our public education system.

"Why don't you just share it, Senator Blair, to make Friday a good day."

Senator Blair answered:

"The principal of Kilohana School, which is towards the east end of Molokai, contacted my office in February. Like Waihee School, the School/Community-Based Management Council, parents and students wanted to implement a year-round school schedule and needed \$145,000 to pay for inter-session programs. I told the principal, Stephen Petro, that I would check it out and I went to see Senator McCartney. On bended knees, I pleaded with him to find the money to provide this opportunity for these students.

"The content of the inter-session programs will be enrichment oriented. Themes of interest to the children will be used to develop the love for learning, apply their prior academic learning, enhance individual skills and creativity and increase the childrens' appreciation for the cultural and environmental resources of their community. When you think about the East Molokai community, you recognize that they have opportunities for inter-session enrichment programs dealing with, for example, the operation of fish ponds which are prevalent on Molokai.

"Talking to Senator McCartney, I was happy in two regards. First, because Senator McCartney clearly

understood the potential benefits and was favorably disposed, within budgetary constraints, towards the concept of year-round schooling and inter-session programs. Second, because he expressed a willingness to go to Molokai and visit the school. We did that on Monday of this week, which is why he and I were absent on that legislative day of the session.

"We were given a tour of the school and met with the staff and students in different classes. When we visited Vicky Newberry's 6th grade class, Senator McCartney asked the students what they were doing. They told us that they were studying for the SAT exams, which they took.

"We encouraged them to do their very best and, if I recall correctly, Senator McCartney suggested that perhaps the Senator from Molokai should offer them a tangible inducement to further encourage them to do their very best. I accepted the challenge in general terms, whereupon, one of the students, who I presume is on his way to the University of Hawaii Law School, asked for the specifics of the inducement. I stumbled, while trying to mentally compute how many pogs this was going to involve. Senator McCartney, ever helpful, suggested that I ask the students what would be a sufficient inducement from their perspective. So I asked, 'What would you like?'

"A student, Tapuilima Hanapi, who had previously talked to us about certain instructional materials that were particularly useful, raised her hand. When called on, she said that what the students would really like is to have their own copy of this instructional program because the copy discussed earlier had been borrowed from a school on the Big Island. The other students in Ms. Newberry's class supported her recommendation. That's when I raised my eyes to the heavens. After imagining that pogs would motivate a 6th grader, to discover that what they really wanted was more and better educational material was an uplifting and heartwarming moment. It was worth mentioning that the beneficiaries will be future 6th grade classes. It was a selfless request.

"It was also a wallet lightening moment, because the TAI instructional program retails for \$840. Fortunately, my campaign account is healthy at the moment, so a check for a thousand dollars is on its way to Molokai. They deserve their own TAI program, irrespective of how they score on the SAT exams. I know they did their best and are certainly deserving of the best materials.

"I'm happy to have the opportunity to share this story with the Senate for two reasons. First, because it shows that the students in our state are receptive to our efforts. If we find the money to give them adequate supplies and good instructional materials, they are hungry for learning. They want a good education. Second, I appreciate this opportunity to lobby for one of the schools in my district.

"I subsequently learned, and perhaps I can lateral the ball back to Senator McCartney, that there is a further Big Island connection, and a Senate connection, to this story. So, if I may, I'd like to yield the floor to Senator McCartney."

Senator McCartney responded:

"I want to thank Senator Blair, and say that the TAI program was started by Senator Yamasaki and it goes through the Labor budget. I found out today that it is through Senator Graulty's budget. I was in Hilo this morning, University of Hawaii-Hilo, and this woman came up to me and said, 'We're the ones that started this in Hilo and Senator Yamasaki helped us in the early '80s.' She wanted to make sure that the program got

returned to Hilo and she didn't want to set a precedent. I told her, no, Senator Blair is buying it. And so we were cleared with Senator Matsuura on the procurement process, if that's okay. So, we'll put the ball back to Senator Matsuura and ask for approval on the procurement side."

Senator Matsuura answered:

"You may go sole source on this." (Laughter!)

Senator Solomon, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. President, in support of all of the previous speakers' remarks, I just want to report that as far as the all-year-round school concept goes, Kealakehe School, as well as Waimea School, through their own school/community-based management organization, have opted to seriously look at an all-year-round school.

"I think that what was once just an idea is coming to fruition. I want to thank all of our legislators here because it was the Senate that took the initiative in providing these options and including them as part of the school reform package. I'm hoping that the school on Molokai comes on aboard -- I think that this would be the wave of the future. Thank you very much."

Senator B. Kobayashi, also on a point of personal privilege, remarked:

"Mr. President, in this light maybe the good Senator from Molokai would like to know that about three years ago, when I was Education chairman, I visited Kilohana School, specifically because Kilohana School was one of the less than a handful of schools in the whole state that had one class level scoring so well on the SAT exams that they had no individuals in the bottom-three stanines in reading. I was especially struck that they achieved the score in reading and so I went to visit the school and tried to find out what they were doing at that school that was so special that they were equal to, shall we say, some of the customarily good schools in the state. Actually, my recollection is that Kahala Elementary School that year did not score with no individuals in the bottom-three stanines although their average was higher.

"At any rate, Kilohana School, to finish the story, said that they had not done anything particularly special except try extra hard, and so if they're trying extra hard for this year's test, I think that Senator Blair's wallet will indeed be lightened. They also, interestingly enough, had done especially well in improving their math scores at that time and indicated that this was again because of the concerted effort at the school to strengthen their math program. And so it seems that when you know what you want to do and you try hard at it and focus in on improvement efforts, you can achieve very good results. Thank you."

Senator Blair then added:

"One last word, if I may. The Kilohana School is fortunate in one other respect. They've had the same principal for 15 years. The long tenure of Stephen Petro seems to have facilitated a positive and cooperative relationship between the school and the community. As a result, 90 percent of the parents participated in the decision to have year-round schooling. Of that 90 percent participation, after a very complete discussion process, 90 percent of the participants were supportive of going to year-round schooling. It's really a remarkable community consensus for year-round schooling. I'm told that even the 10 percent who didn't support year-round schooling, because the process was so thorough, are comfortable

with the decision-making process and comfortable with the result. The community is virtually 100 percent behind it. So I really hope that we can find \$145,000 for them. Thank you."

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL

The President then made the following clarification:

"Members of the Senate, at this time, the Chair wishes to make an announcement relating to a correction in the Journal of the 40th day.

"Yesterday, the Senate voted on House Bill No. 783, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, relating to criminal procedure. The Clerk announced the vote as 12 ayes, 10 noes, and 3 excused. Senators Chang, Iwase, Kanno, Ann Kobayashi, Bert Kobayashi, Koki, Matsuura, Matsunaga, McCartney, and Tungpalan were counted as 'no' votes, myself, Senator Ikeda, Senator McCartney were counted excused, and all other Senators were counted as voting in the affirmative.

"There was an obvious error in the announcement of the vote. Senator McCartney should not have been marked excused because he was in fact present and had voted 'no.' Only two Senators were excused, not three. Thus, there were actually 13 ayes, rather than $\overline{12}$; these being Senators Blair, Fernandes Salling, Fukunaga, George, Graulty, Hagino, Holt, Levin, Mizuguchi, Nakasato, Reed, Solomon, and Tanaka.

"Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure provides that a legislative body always has authority to correct its records to make them state the truth. The truth in this case is that House Bill No. 783, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, passed third reading on a vote of 13 ayes, 10 noes, and 2 excused. The Chair therefore orders that the record be corrected to reflect this vote and result."

There being no objections, the Chair then approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Monday, April 5, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Bishop Tokunun Ishihara, Jodo Mission of Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators A. Kobayashi, B. Kobayashi, Mizuguchi and Solomon who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Ikeda presented and introduced the Honolulu Japanese Junior Chamber of Commerce 1993 Cherry Blossom Festival queen and her court, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to help celebrate the Cherry Blossom Festival this year. The 1993 theme is, 'Building Strength Through Cultural Diversity.' And, of course, the highlight of the festival is the selection of the queen and her court who are present with us today. The queen and her court will serve as goodwill ambassadors for the Japanese community.

"Mr. President, I would like to have some of the Senators participate in introducing them to this honorable body, so I will yield to Senator Matsunaga."

Senator Matsunaga introduced Princess Tammie Masako Omoto, as follows:

"It is my pleasure to introduce before this honorable body one of the members of the Cherry Blossom Festival court, Tammie Masako Omoto.

Dori is a proud product of the public school system, having graduated from Kalani High School and the University of Hawaii. Mr. Hirata is retired from the state Department of Agriculture and Mrs. Hirata is with Bank of America.

"Ladies and gentlemen, the 1993 Cherry Blossom Queen, Dori Lyn Yoko Hirata. (Miss Hirata stood to be recognized.)

RE-REFERRAL OF HOUSE BILL

No. 1988, H.D. 1 Jointly to the Committee on Judiciary and the Committee on Ways and Means

Senator Matsunaga rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"The Honolulu Advertiser April 4th editorial entitled '"DAG" Pleas' is proof that even good newspapers like The Honolulu Advertiser occasionally make mistakes. The editorial reasoned that we should give judges more discretion in accepting deferred acceptance of guilty (DAG) pleas so that judges will have needed flexibility in sentencing. This, arguably, would provide relief to our overflowing prisons. The Advertiser argument confuses a judge's discretion in accepting a DAG plea with a judge's discretion in sentencing a guilty person. The two are entirely different issues.

"A DAG plea simply allows a person to erase a criminal conviction from his/her record as if the crime never happened. A judge's acceptance of a person's DAG

plea has nothing to do with a judge's sentencing of that person. Acceptance of a DAG plea is basically telling a person, 'Yes, you committed a crime. Yes, you will be appropriately punished. But, no, this crime will not be reflected on your record.' In fact, in accepting a person's DAG plea, a judge may still sentence that person to jail as a condition of the DAG plea.

"Under current law, a violent criminal is not eligible for a DAG plea. House Bill 783 would allow judges to accept DAG pleas for certain violent crimes, that is, violent assaults except certain felonies and except misdemeanors which carry a minimum sentence. For example, if H.B. 783 passed, a person who intentionally 'beats the heck out of' another person, but fails to break any bones, cause any scars or cause a protracted injury, may be eligible for a DAG plea.

"I am opposed to allowing violent criminals the privilege of seeking a DAG plea. Not because, as The Advertiser insinuated, I do not have faith in our judges exercising discretion. Indeed, I agree with your statement that judges need flexibility when it comes to sentencing. My opposition to H.B. 783 is because intentional, knowing, or reckless violence should be documented on a person's record. Violence against human beings is different and more serious than property crimes and, as a matter of public policy, should not go undocumented.

"Thank you for the opportunity to clarify this commonly misunderstood issue."

Senator McCartney, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. President, on a very quick point of personal privilege I'd like to thank the Senator from St. Louis Heights for clarifying the Advertiser editorial. I agree with the statements that were made by the Senator."

Senator Blair on a point of personal privilege then remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I concur with the remarks of the previous speaker on the bill. The bill will have minimal, probably zero, impact on incarceration at state correctional facilities for the simple reason that it covers only petty misdemeanors and misdemeanors. The judges, when they exercise discretion, will only do so in cases where there would be no incarceration. So I think that Senator Matsunaga is correct in assessing that the Advertiser misunderstood the bill.

"It must be mentioned, despite any confusion outside of this body, that those of us who spoke in favor of the bill, and I presume still support the bill, had sound reasons for supporting it. My remarks in support of the bill were not premised on any reduction in the number or duration of incarcerations.

"Having said that, I would reiterate that the editorial seems to erroneously assume that those who spoke against the bill and voted against the bill, did not wish judges to have discretion with respect to sentencing. That is an erroneous leap. Hopefully, there will be a correction from the Advertiser. Senator Matsunaga is correct in stating that his opposition was misconstrued. Thank you."

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

"Individually and as a team, the 'Divine Nine' are not only a credit to the University, but they are ambassadors for the State of Hawaii. These young women are wonderful role models and are examples for our youth to emulate. Hawaii is richer because of their dedication.

"On the floor today, we have Coaches Vince Goo, George Wolfe and Serenda Valdez, Women's Athletic Director Marilyn Moniz-Kaho'ohanahano and team members -- Valerie Agee and Jennifer Hurt. (All stood to be recognized.)

"Members of the 'Divine Nine' who are not able to be with us today are: Kaui Wakita, Melanie Azama, Alison Golnick, Jody Davis, Evin Schmeneck, Rebecca Horst and Stephanie Bull.

"Let's give them all a round of applause for their exemplary behavior to the people of Hawaii. We hope in the future that we'll never have to face another problem as we did this year because we know that you certainly emulate what is the very best, not only in athletics but in your poise off the field. Times are such that we have to take the hard-knocks together with the good, but let us always remember that the people love you and we will always remember what you did and thank you from the bottom of our hearts."

Senator McCartney added:

"Mr. President, I join in on the remarks by the Senator from Pearl City and would like to say that our University of Hawaii Wahine Basketball Team may not be the NCAA champions but are the champions in the hearts of the people of Hawaii. We are very proud of the na wahine who touched all of us and we are proud to have them here.

"On a personal note, and as chair of the Education Committee, I want to say that athletics play an important role in the total education of a person and sometimes that doesn't get translated into GPAs or test scores, but it makes you a better person. When I was a student at Castle High School, Coach Goo was there and he was my cross-country coach. I learned a lot of from him. One of the most important lessons I learned from him: in life you cannot take any shortcuts. I remember, one day on a cross-country outing he drove us to Kailua Beach Park, nine miles from Castle High, dropped us off and we had to run back to the school and we were all grumbling. I was a sprinter and I was just running cross-country to stay in shape, so I told my friends, 'Hey, we go hitchhike.' We caught a ride back to the school. But then, one of my friends, Linda Kinney, a runner, saw us and told Coach Goo that McCartney and some other guys hitchhiked. Coach Goo pulled me aside and said, know, McCartney, we can't tolerate this so I'm going to have to kick you off the team.' Coach Goo taught me an important lesson, that you can't take shortcuts in life. Two weeks later, he asked me to come back on the team.

"Coach Goo, sincerely, you taught me a good lesson. And those are some of the things students learn in sports that you cannot translate into academics and test scores, but it teaches you a lot of values.

"I know why he's such a successful coach and why his team is so good. It's because of those values that he instills in his players. I wanted to share that story with you.

"Thank you, Coach Goo and congratulations!"

Senator Matsuura also added:

"Coach Goo, my vintage is Archie Goo. You may be related to him. I want you and the team members to know that the State of Hawaii is the only state that is authorized to have a navy and this is because of the monarchy. We're the only state that is allowed to have its own navy! When your team was not invited to the NCAA Basketball Tournament, we were going to mobilize a navy and attack the NCAA. I want you to know that you had 100 percent support of this Senate body. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal

"Mr. President, in recent days, there have been some news articles about economic diversification plans for Hamakua Coast. One is titled, 'State to study new Hamakua business uses' and another, 'State looking at alternatives for Hamakua.'

"According to the most recent news, DBEDT has obtained \$3.5 million in federal grant to boost the Big Island economy and \$75,000 for economic analysis of the Hamakua area.

"I wish to remind my colleagues that the Legislature has not been negligent in efforts to improve the economic conditions of the Hamakua Coast. A few years ago, it appropriated funds to make studies of the region.

"In September 1990, when Senator Donna Ikeda chaired the committee and I vice-chaired the committee, we had included an appropriation to do a report which was submitted entitled 'Agriculture and Economic Diversification for the Hamakua Coast,' and in November 1990, another report entitled 'Hamakua Regional Plan from Keiakea to Waipio.' All these were done in anticipation of drastic decreases in sugar activities for the Hamakua region.

"In the 1990 session, Mr. President, I'd like to remind my colleagues that I introduced Senate Bill 343 calling for an action plan for diversification of the economy of Unfortunately, the bill did not pass. Hamakua Coast. Now that the demise of sugar on the Hamakua Coast is near reality, let us be bold and come up with a definite project to help Hamakua. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I rise also on a point of personal privilege.

"Students presently dorming at the University of Hawaii Their attention and focus on their education are upset. has been diverted because of a memorandum that was drafted in the '70s. It appears that this memorandum will not allow them to have priority in the dorms and, as result of that, we may be faced with future parking problems; we may we faced with redistribution of students that we would have ordinarily seen matriculate at community college systems who will now be drawn to the University campus. And this is because of this memorandum which seeks to give first preference to freshmen. Freshmen across the state will be lured to the University of Hawaii, thinking that they will be assured of a four-year education without any problems.

"Unfortunately, what I think will happen is that we will draw these students from across the state. They will indeed come to the University campus, but those who are now sophomores, juniors and seniors will be forced to find housing outside of the University campus, thereby, bringing all of those students in on their cars. Now, if the Manoa residents think they have a problem right now, just wait till this happens.

"I'm concerned because students already have enough on their minds. Education is supposed to be foremost. We have done our best as legislators to provide for their needs and yet we find them now having to deal with this cost-of-living expense, and we find them having to increase it by having to obtain cars so that they can come and finish their education at the University of Hawaii.

"Tonight there's going to be a meeting on campus, and we expect to hear from the students, and we also expect to hear from the administration and, eventually, from the Board of Regents. This is uppermost on our minds and we will be dealing with this in the future ... this problem so as not to have the attempt to redistribute kids across the state on our Manoa campus. I think that is

not what Dr. Mortimore spoke to us about yesterday. He had articulated that he wanted to have the children of the State of Hawaii at campuses throughout the system and yet with this policy I see a diversion to the campus of Manoa. So I think this is a policy that needs to be revised by the Board of Regents and we certainly will have a hand in it. Thank you."

Senator Iwase also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to join in the comments of the Senator from Pearl City. I received some calls yesterday.

"Just to add to what she said, what the present situation is for the students is that they have apparently received or had received assurances that they would get their dorms; they had sent in their fees; they have received the guarantee, and apparently that has now been broken, based upon what I understand might be some memorandum.

"I would suggest that the Board of Regents and the Housing Director look at the question, the legal liabilities that the University of Hawaii may in fact face at this point in time -- one for breach of contract which may be resulting in a lawsuit; and secondly, whether or not they've complied with Chapter 91 and the Hawaii Housing Authority vs. Aguilar case in which they must promulgate rules to set forth standards for housing. And if they have not done either, I would strongly recommend that they not only rethink this policy or this proposed action, but that they rescind it and pursue appropriate procedures which should be followed, if they are going to, in fact, change the policy which has been in effect for a very long time and which will impact, by next semester, a number of students who had expected to dorm at the University of Hawaii.

"The University should not be allowed to act in such an arbitrary and capricious and arrogant manner."

FORTY-FOURTH DAY

Wednesday, April 7, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Eijo Ikenaga, Nichiren Mission of Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon introduced Mr. Herbert Watanabe, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Big Island Senators, it gives me great pleasure to present a Senate certificate to Mr. Herbert Watanabe.

"Herbert Watanabe has an outstanding record of service to the state and the community.

"He is a Registered School Business Specialist, the only person in the Department of Education (DOE) with this certification. In his 39 years in the DOE, he has been a teacher, principal and a district business specialist.

"He has been a 35-year member of the Lions Club, a leader in the Boy Scouts of America and the Church of the Holy Cross.

"Among his awards are: the Sustained Superior Performance Award by the DOE; Silver Beaver Award by the Boy Scouts of America; five Lions Club International President's Awards; and the Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of Wisconsin.

"He is indeed a distinguished servant to the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I would like to briefly cite from the Senate certificate.

"Mr. Watanabe was educated at Lanai High School, the University of Wisconsin, Indiana University, Stanford University and the University of Hawaii. He began his career in education as a teacher at Pahala High School on the Big Island. He is a former principal of Hawaii Technical School and Hoomana Vocational School, and the Hawaii Community Correctional Center where he established the first vocational program.

"Mr. Watanabe is retiring as Hawaii District Business Specialist with the DOE, after a distinguished career spanning nearly four decades.

"Mr. President, I present and introduce Mr. Herbert Watanabe."

Mr. Watanabe stood to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate by Senator Solomon and a lei by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Solomon also introduced Mr. Watanabe's wife Ellen, son Mark and wife Emily, son Colin and wife Cherie, seated in the gallery. (All rose to be recognized.) Senator Solomon then introduced Ms. Debra Sutton of Interisland Coffe, Tea, and Spice Company, also seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, again on behalf of the Big Island Senators, it is my pleasure to present a Senate certificate to the Interisland Coffee, Tea, and Spice Company.

"From the time I was chair of the Senate Agriculture Committee, we have put much effort into the encouragement and promotion of local products. We came up with the island fresh label which is used on many products in Hawaii today.

"The Interisland Coffee, Tea, and Spice Company opened only 2 years ago, but already has more than 20 distribution points in the state. They are currently promoting aggressively in the national and international levels. They provided coffee for the Clinton-Yeltsin Summit Conference and are actively seeking markets in the Far East.

"The coffee, packaged by this company under the 'Bad Ass Coffee Company' label, is pure Kona coffee. Incidentally, 'Bad Ass' refers to our famous 'Kona nightingale.'

"As a note of information, the 'Bad Ass' Kona coffee was served at the inauguration of President Clinton and is featured on the White House menu.

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce Ms. Debra Sutton, vice president of the Interisland Coffee, Tea, and Spice Company, and Mr. Weldon Schooler, director of the company."

Ms. Sutton stood to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate and lei by Senator Solomon. Mr. Schooler, seated in the gallery, stood to be recognized.

Senator McCartney then added:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the comments of the Senator from Kohala on Mr. Herbert Watanabe.

"As chair of the Education Committee, members of my committee and I have visited your schools, and everywhere we have gone across the state, we heard, 'How come the Big Island schools look so good?' And there is only one answer, every single time -- Herb Watanabe.

"We hope we can clone you and send you across the state, now that you are retired, to help us get the other schools in line. We really appreciate your hard work and contributions to the state. Thank you."

Senator McCartney then recognized the achievements of Mr. Stan Sheriff, as follows:

"Mr. President, yesterday, we honored the Rainbow Na Wahine Basketball Team and made them the heartfelt champions of the State of Hawaii. Today, we would like to honor a man who has left a legacy for all of us in the athletics program at the University of Hawaii and the State of Hawaii. That man was Mr. Stan Sheriff.

"We all know the importance of athletics to the people of Hawaii and Stan was able to weave the importance of athletics with the importance of education. He always put the student athletes first and fought for the program.

"Stan Sheriff was born in Hawaii, attended Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo where he won 'Little All-American' honors. After a stint in the Army, he played professional football for the San Francisco 49ers, the Pittsburg Steelers and the Los Angeles Rams. While living on the Mainland, he served 23 years as head football coach at Northern Iowa, the last 12 as both head football coach and athletics director. He returned to Hawaii in 1983 to serve as our athletics director.

"Some of his major accomplishments at the University were, not only a strong financial commitment to women's sports, but, equal opportunity for student athletes, and elevating head coaches to full time status. Another impressive accomplishment was the improvement in graduation rates of the athletes. For the last six years, Hawaii's graduation rate has topped the Western Athletic Conference. And if you look at the front page article of today's Advertiser, I think it's real appropriate that it talks about Stan Sheriff's legacy where we rank number 7 in the nation for graduation rates of football athletes. That is a testament to his commitment to the student athlete.

"Stan also worked very hard in bringing Rainbow sports across the state and helped to secure a six-year contract with KHNL-TV for \$7.5 million. He was also a leader in fighting for the 10,000-seat campus arena which is now under construction.

"You all know which side I was on on that arena. The first time I met Stan Sheriff was when I went to his office. He wasn't too happy with me and he gave me a good speech about why the arena was so important to the athletics program and to the University. At that time, DAGS was projecting the cost to be \$50 million when we had already appropriated \$32 million. Stan opened his dome stadium at Baylor University and said, 'Why don't we do this? This will save some money.' From there, we took that idea to the governor and DAGS, and Senator Kobayashi and I went to Waco, Texas, to look at the dome. Because of his initiative, we are going to have the arena and we were able to build it for \$32 million. Because of Stan Sheriff's vision, foresight and commitment, and for giving us the idea, our sports arena is under construction.

"In closing, I would like to share a few comments by some of his very good friends.

"Jim Leahey said, 'Stan is the finest athletics director University of Hawaii ever had.'

"Dave Shoji said, 'Stan always went out of his way to make me feel good. Whenever he introduced us to someone, I was always the "best volleyball coach in the country" or the "best" motivator, or whatever the subject was at the moment. I'm sure he introduced all our coaches the same way -- not just me.'

"Les Murakami said, 'He was very supportive of the baseball program. He was a personal friend. We always knew where we stood with Stan and we kept reminding him that he should go away when he took a vacation, instead of hanging around the athletics office.'

"Hugh Yoshida our acting athletics director said, 'He cared for the student athlete; he put them first. I will always remember his big, warm smile, his positive attitude and his compassionate nature.'

"A message from Bob Nash, our assistant basketball coach, reads:

'On behalf of the U.H. Men's Basketball Staff, we express our deepest appreciation to the Sheriff family for the gift of their husband and father. We say gift because Stan had the ability to be a boss, a coach, a friend, a family man, a guy to have a cold one with but the biggest gift of all was the ability to give of himself for the betterment of others. There is not a single program within the Athletics Department that has not grown. This is the direct result of his visionary leadership. We will always be indebted to him for the challenges he inspired in us and for the lasting impression he made upon us.

With deepest appreciation, Coach Bob Nash.'

"Coach Wallace wanted to be here today but he is out of state on a recruiting trip. He told me, on a personal note, 'I loved the man and I respected him.'

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce the family of Stan Sheriff -- Mrs. Jane Sheriff, sons Paul, Michael and Richard "

Mrs. Sheriff and her sons rose to be recognized. Senator Holt presented Mrs. Sheriff the Senate certificate of recognition and Senators Ikeda, McCartney, George and A. Kobayashi presented leis to each of them.

Senator McCartney also introduced members of the athletics department staff who were seated in the gallery, Adam, Marge and acting athletics director Hugh Yoshida. (All stood to be recognized.)

Senator Solomon added remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, when I had the privilege of chairing the Higher Education Committee, I remember when I first met Stan Sheriff. I was very impressed with him and the comments he made in terms of his commitment not only to his job and the program but his commitment to Hawaii.

"I am very sad that the Senate certificate is presented when he is not here to receive our gratitude and our appreciation but I'm sure that his loving family will appreciate and accept it for him. Thank you."

Senator Holt also added his remarks and said:

"Mr. President, also as a former chairman of the Higher Education Committee, I had the opportunity to work with Stan Sheriff some years ago. We accomplished a lot during that time and we've accomplished a lot since.

"One of the items I remember getting into arguments with Stan a lot about was trying to make sure that he kept the reserve fund, a special fund which we are dealing with this year of at least a million dollars for a rainy day, that he wanted to dip into all the time and was told that he had to keep a minimum balance. Fortunately, he was able to do that, even though we had to convert a lot of the special funds into the general fund to help out the women's program.

"One of my fondest memories is going to his office on campus when he had just computerized the athletics department. I went into his office and he didn't even know how to turn on the computer and, finally, when Terry Willum, I think, Rockne's assistant at that time, came in and turned it on for him and there was a computer game on the screen and he said, 'That's all we do around here, sit and play games on the computer.' Stan didn't know how to play games on the computer.

"We've come a long way with Stan Sheriff. We have a weight room which was developed during his time. We got the campus arena moving, got the women's softball field, and we are just finishing the baseball stadium. One of things that most impressed me, during my tenure as chairman, the one thing that we can look back on and be proud of and a legacy that we will all remember, is the fact that Stan Sheriff pushed for academic counselling in athletics, and that's when Shoemaker and Marks were looking for permanent positions, and it was a high priority on his budget list. We got it through the regents' budget but he came down and fought hard for it and today we have one of the best academic counselling programs in the nation and it's because of Stan. We are proud of it and the result is in this morning's paper. Thank you."

Senator McCartney then introduced Coach Bob Nash who had just appeared in the gallery. (Coach Nash stood to be recognized.)

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, we are at this point in session where our major committees, Ways and Means and Judiciary, are working very hard to try to get the bills in proper forms to make the amendments that are needed and to deck them in time tomorrow. It's a time when we are more vulnerable to confusion and to being fooled about what may be going on.

"Yesterday afternoon, I was informed that one of the bills that I consider, and I think many of us here share that same view in this body and also publicly, vital to helping the people of Kauai was running into a bit of problem. It seems that Hawaiian Electric Industries (HEI), taking advantage of this period where we are most susceptible to being confused, had made a couple of different proposals on how to deal with the problem we have of how to equitably share the cost of the restoration of our utility companies on the island.

"Hawaiian Electric, it seems, had initially thrown out at the very last minute a proposal that would have said, instead of passing the bill that had come over from the House allowing for the surcharge to be assessed upon approval by the PUC, to set up some sort of voluntary contribution. Set it up in such a manner that it would only be paid by the residents of Oahu, and this approach was not in addition to the bill that we received from the House that is before us which would assess a surcharge to help in paying for the cost but, instead of that bill. Fortunately, our Ways and Means chairperson had the good sense to see through this and advised them that she would not go along with this proposal.

"HEI didn't stop at that point. HEI went one step further and proposed a second bill and, if it wasn't for the careful scrutiny on the part of the Senator Iwase, perhaps, they would have succeeded in getting a bill such as what they proposed through at this critical time in the session.

"The bill, essentially, would have denied Kauai residents the kind of relief that they desperately need to pay for the high utility cost.

"Why I am bringing this to your attention is because I firmly believe that HEI will not stop its efforts to try to derail such a piece of legislation that is so critical as one step to restoring people's lives on our island. And I think only by bringing it to your attention, all of you here, my fellow colleagues, and to the public's attention, that we

will be on our toes, on guard so to speak, when HEI comes to us with proposals that I'm sure they will in the future with respect to this and maybe other issues before us.

"Hasn't HEI done enough damage to not just Kauai but to the state with respect to HIG? Coming in and trying to persuade us that they are acting in good faith and for and in the interest of the people of Kauai, let's not be fooled. The actions speak for themselves. What we have here is really just 'a wolf in sheep's clothing.'

"I ask all of you to take into consideration what has occurred and to keep in mind that, as I mentioned earlier, I don't believe there is one chance that HEI is going to stop and desist in this kind of practice, and we need to keep on our toes when dealing with them throughout the rest of the session.

"Thank you."

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1151 (Gov. Msg. Nos. 277):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1151 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of PAULA AIKO NAKAYAMA for Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the appointment of Paula A. Nakayama to the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court.

"Mr. President, as chairman of your Committee on Executive Appointments, I am extremely proud and honored today to speak on behalf of the first woman nominee to the Supreme Court bench in 25 years.

"Mr. President, your Committee on Executive Appointments held a public hearing on this appointment on Tuesday, April 6th. During this hearing, the background, character, experience and qualifications of the nominee were thoroughly examined in a fair and open manner. As a result, I'm very pleased to report that the qualifications and record of this candidate are without question, her reputation outstanding, and her integrity above reproach. On these matters alone, the silence of many judicial critics is almost deafening on this particular appointment. I find it difficult to understand, Mr. President, the reason for this silence.

"The only item of controversy concerning this nominee, Mr. President, was her level of intelligence. Some of the testifiers were of the opinion that Judge Nakayama was only highly intelligent; whereas, others felt that she was highly, highly intelligent. In any case, Mr. President, the consensus was that Judge Nakayama is in fact extremely intelligent.

"Several weeks ago, I rose to speak in support of the nomination of Mario Ramil to the Supreme Court. In that speech, I spoke about the need and the importance of expanding the perspective of the Judiciary by creating diversity within its membership. Within this context I also strongly supported the appointment of a woman to the Supreme Court. With the advise and consent of this appointment, I believe that history will recognize the actions of this Senate as being a turning point in the perspective of the Judiciary.

"At no other time in the history of this state has the membership of our Judiciary been more representative of the general population. The people of Hawaii can now, more than ever, expect their judges to understand and share their ideals, values and mores. This is an extremely important concept, Mr. President, because in the eyes of the public it is imperative to justice.

"Mr. President, at this time, I would like to say a few words about the rich background that this nominee will bring to the court. While there are many strong attributes that I could talk about, I will confine my remarks to two in particular which greatly impressed me.

"During the public hearing, it was disclosed that the nominee's father, Mr. Harry Nakayama, is from Haiku and went to Maui High School. The nominee's mother, Harriet is from Puunene and went to Baldwin High School. They currently reside in California. Mr. Nakayama is a veteran of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and was here for the unit's 50th anniversary celebration. Upon further questioning at the hearing, Judge Nakayama revealed that it was the occasion of this anniversary that marked the first time in her life that she learned of her father's and his comrades' faith and devotion for this country and the many sacrifices they have made.

"In this arena, Mr. President, we often speak of the honor and duty that comes with public service. There are not very many, however, who have learned like Judge Nakayama on a deep and personal level the profound meaning of sacrifice and service for the sake of your country and your fellow citizens. I am sure, Mr. President, that Judge Nakayama will be guided by these lessons in making those important decisions that affect the freedom, welfare, and quality of life of the people of this state.

"The second point that I would like to make concerns Judge Nakayama's assessment of a 'woman's point of view' or woman's perspective. In this regard, she was able to articulate one of the best and most meaningful descriptions that I've heard to date. Using her husband as an example, she had this to say: 'I consider my husband to be enlightened, but sometimes he just doesn't get it.' I can relate to this, Mr. President, and so can almost any other male. For the sake of women of this state, who comprise approximately half of our population, this is extremely important. If Judge Nakayama can somehow help us males to 'get it,' then our society is that much closer to achieving true justice and equality, not only in our courts but in our society as well. This is the message that I have heard from the women of our state and I strongly believe in it.

"In closing, Mr. President, I would like to point out that Paula Nakayama will serve as a unique role model for the women of this state. The advise and consent of the Senate, therefore, will take on new meaning because it will send a clear message to the community that we endorse and welcome the participation of women in the highest levels of government. It is my sincere hope, Mr. President, that the young women of this state will recognize this and share the pride in Paula Nakayama's achievements, that her daughter Elizabeth probably feels at this moment, and also know that the same opportunity exists for them.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I strongly urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 277. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also spoke in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, the only blemish in Judge Nakayama's résume is that she did not graduate from Waialua High School, my alma mater. She has a perfect high school, college and post-graduate record. She is a person who doesn't get upset!

"The chairman of the Executive Appointments Committee misstated her qualifications because the words that were used to describe her were 'extremely, extremely, intelligent.' Judge Nakayama knows that when I'm 90 years old, she'll be retiring. She will be receiving all kinds of accolades at that time. I want to tell my great, great grandchildren that I voted for her. I'm also going to tell my great, great grandchildren that I not only voted for her, but I spoke in favor of her nomination. Thank you very much."

Senator Chang added his support of the nomination as follows:

"Mr. President, the chairman of the Executive Appointments Committee talked about the example and the precedent that this appointment would represent. As the Hawaii liaison for the Asian-Pacific Women's Network, I believe that this appointment has regional and international ramifications and I look forward to spreading the news to our membership. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this confirmation.

"Finally, we have the opportunity to confirm a woman to the Supreme Court. Women, as you know, make up about 51 percent of the population, and we will now have representation on the State Supreme Court.

"If I said Paula Nakayama is an intelligent woman that would be redundant. Paula Nakayama is exceptionally intelligent; she's compassionate, and I could go on and on, but her record and her actions are the proof. Paula Nakayama is so exceptional that we're all very pleased that she will be the woman on the Supreme Court. Although we now have one woman on the Supreme Court, the fight has just begun, because we need four more members. Thank you."

Senator Solomon added her support as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of the nominee and in support of the previous speakers.

"Mr. President, I don't know why it is such a shock to my male colleagues that women are intelligent and extremely intelligent. I find my male colleagues' remissness surprising. I thought that women being intelligent was the norm as opposed to being out of the ordinary. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Fukunaga also in support said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to add a few words in support of this nomination.

"I think it's very, very exciting to note the many roles that Paula Nakayama fulfills and I believe that she will bring a true mark of excellence in fulfilling all of these roles upon the Supreme Court bench. She is a devoted daughter, an exemplary wife and equal partner with her husband Charles Totto, a completely professional and dedicated career woman, juggling the demands of a busy working mother, and now taking on the mantle of a Supreme Court judge. Thank you."

Senator Matsunaga added his support as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"Mr. President, how appropriate it is to have Judge Paula Nakayama before us today, just several days after a visit by the U.H. Wahine Basketball Team. What many people know about Judge Nakayama is that she has shined on the Circuit Court bench for the past year, but what some people don't realize is that Judge Nakayama was also voted the most outstanding basketball player on her junior high school team. Mr. President, this just proves that there is room not only on the Supreme Court but also on the basketball court for a 4-foot-11, very, very intelligent player. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Graulty added his remarks in support of Judge Nakayama and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nomination.

"Mr. President, yesterday, I asked for a meeting with Judge Nakayama because I had some doubts about whether I should support her appointment to the Supreme Court, and I hope she doesn't mind my sharing my doubts with members of the Senate.

"My first doubt was her age. She is under 40; being a woman I'm not going to disclose exactly her age, but she is under 40. And that raised in my mind whether she has the sufficient breadth and depth of experience to warrant an appointment to the highest court in our state.

"Secondly, I know that we have some brilliant people on the Supreme Court in the persons of Justice Klein, Justice Levinson, Justice Moon, and I wanted to know from her and find out from her whether she was in that same category, because I would like to look at the Supreme Court as the place where people who have distinguished themselves in the practice of law as a profession have ascended to. There was some doubt in my mind as to whether she was in that very select group of lawyers or members of the bar.

"Mr. President, I was convinced beyond the shadow of doubt that she is worthy of appointment to the Supreme Court for several reasons. First, it's my understanding that both members of the defense bar and the prosecution bar spoke in support of her nomination and that's unusual. I understand, also, from talking to many lawyers in the community that she is one judge that both plaintiffs and defense can agree upon when it comes to settlement conferences. I've also been told that she is one judge that both defense and prosecution, in criminal

sentencing, have chosen to serve or to provide the sentencing, which I think is an indication of Judge Nakayama's great ability to be fair and to look at all sides of an issue.

"I think the greatest compliment paid on Judge Nakayama's appointment or nomination was the fact that many lawyers were going to miss her being on the Circuit Court bench. That indicated to me that she was worthy of appointment. Any time you can get plaintiff and defense, prosecution and defense, to agree that you would be a fair person, either to render sentence or to try to settle the case, I think that says something for the nominee.

"Judge Nakayama being an exceptionally intelligent person also reminded me ... I guess I'm getting old, but, way back 12 years ago she and I had a case together. As a member of the defense bar I was representing the defendant and Judge Nakayama was representing the prosecution, and I'm happy to report to you that she squashed me completely on the case. She completely obliterated all my defenses and I should have remembered that that was the same Paula that is before us today for confirmation to the Supreme Court. But I kind of lost track of her and she had a different name back then and that's the reason.

"But just to show you how even more brilliant she is, she reminded me that her uncle, Jimmie Shiramizu, lives in the Moanalua community and anybody who knows Moanalua knows that Jimmie Shiramizu is one of the key leaders in the community. And his brother Hiromi, whom she referred to as Uncle 'Mousey,' but I don't dare refer to Hiromi Shiramizu as Uncle 'Mousey' because he's one of the leaders in our community.

"All in all, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I think despite her age, despite the fact that we may not have read about her in the newspapers like some other lawyers or judges, Judge Nakayama is worthy and qualified to serve as the new Justice of the Supreme Court. And it is with a great deal of enthusiasm that I think we should support her nomination. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Blair also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I can't let the last statements go unrebutted. I want the record to reflect the true reason why Senator Graulty tried to delay the confirmation of Paula Nakayama to the Supreme Court. His good buddy Mario Ramil called him up and said, 'Rey, I'm having trouble winding up my law practice. If things don't slow down over there at the Senate, they're going to swear Paula in before they swear me in. That means I'll have to make the coffee and I'll be the one that comes in last and have to be sure the door is closed. Could you slow her down?' And he said, 'Sure, sure, Mario, no problem.' Then political pressure was brought to bear on him and he collapsed. (Laughter!) Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, I just want to make one last comment.

"I did offer Judge Nakayama to be that extremely intelligent State Senator from Hilo to take my place. Just to tell you how smart she is, she refused!"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Tungpalan).

At this time, Senator Holt rose to introduce Judge Paula Nakayama and said:

"Mr. President, noting the historic significance of this occasion and the appropriateness therefor, I defer to my vice chairman to make the introduction."

Senator A. Kobayashi responded:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the chairman of the Executive Appointments Committee for he is truly a fair person.

"Mr. President, I would like to present our new Associate Justice to the Supreme Court, Paula Nakayama, and ask her to please stand to be recognized.

"Sitting beside Paula is her husband Charles Totto and daughter Elizabeth. Their son Alec is only 21 months old and at day care. Also present, her father Harry Nakayama, her mother Harriet Nakayama, Auntie Mildred Watanabe, and Paula's staff -- Lois Umemura, Karen Huben and Gary Sing."

Justice Nakayama, her family and staff rose to be recognized.

At 12:02 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr.. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege

"Mr. President, a recent editorial in the Star-Bulletin concerning the Senate resolution directed toward the question of renaming McKinley High School by honoring Grover Cleveland entitled 'Keep it McKinley' set out no credible reasons for its position.

"Mr. President, as I have informed my colleagues previously that the purpose in introducing the resolution was to call for a debate by the school's students, to foster dialogue within our community which could shed some light on the obscure and little appreciated role of the U.S. Government in the overthrow of a sovereign nation of

Hawaii. Unfortunately, the Star Bulletin editors have not contributed to that dialogue with an editorial which trivializes the role of President McKinley in the overthrow. Our resolution is not concerned with 'political correctness' -- whatever that is -- but with historical accuracy.

"President McKinley was directly and intimately concerned with annexing Hawaii in 1893. It was his Secretary of State and Navy who directed Minister Stevens and it was McKinley himself who tried to run annexation through congress before Cleveland could take office.

"Although I'm very happy, Mr. President, that the paper is involved in the debate, I only wish that it could be a more responsible participant.

"Furthermore, Mr. President, I'm very concerned about the public reaction to the resolution. It reminds me of a similar situation I had experienced in high school in the early '60s. We could not debate the issues of the Vietnam War. We could not debate whether the war was illegal, whether or not the President of the United States should have been impeached, etc. This was because of Hawaii's direct involvement and economic dependance on the military.

"It worries me, Mr. President, that we are experiencing similar circumstances today looking at issues regarding the overthrow and the illegal activities which led to the overthrow of the Hawaiian nation. Instructors, principals, and teachers are calling me to abandon the resolution. I have asked them, 'Would you like to see a copy of the resolution?' and they have declined, they are not interested in receiving a copy of the resolution, let alone read it.

"As the introducer of the resolution, I'm concerned about continuing the public debate on the issue. I think it's warranted. I think that we have to only look at our own history in America when the public educational system denied these kinds of forums and discussions to occur. When they ignored historical facts pertinent to the Vietnam War, and what we ended up with in the '60s were the killings at Kent State University. This had to occur before the government, including the educational system would allow the issues of Vietnam to be discussed openly on college campuses as well as in the high school classroom.

"Mr. President, I would regret to see this happen in Hawaii due to our similar circumstances involving the issues of Hawaiian sovereignty; because these issues and differences of opinion can become volatile. In fact, people have begun to polarize themselves on the issue. Sad to say, without open debate, how will the next generation deal with the issues in an unprejudiced manner? How will the issues be dealt with and not repeat the prejudicial manner in which the Democratic Party has isolated Hawaiian issues from the general public for 33 years?

"So, in concluding, Mr. President, I want to inform my colleagues that if you have received calls pertaining to this issue, please have them contact my office. We'll send them a copy of the resolution. I feel that once they have taken the time to read the resolution and understand the impetus of the resolution, which is to compel debate on the issues, perhaps they would have a change of mind. If they, the students, decide they want to 'keep it McKinley,' that's fine too. The resolution does not offer a specific name as a replacement.

"So with that, Mr. President, I feel compelled to make these remarks because I feel that the situation has gone

from the sublime to the ridiculous. Thank you very much."

Senator Iwase also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

Mr. President, I'd like to follow up on a subject touched upon by Senator Fernandes Salling yesterday regarding amendments proposed by HECO to the surcharge bill. The bill provides relief for Kauai ratepayers. I'd like to note for the record what I consider to be an inconsistency in the position taken by Hawaiian Electric.

"Ongoing now before the Public Utilities Commission is the issue of whether or not 138 KV lines should be located underground in order to protect the public health and safety of the residents who live in the Leeward district. Senator Kanno has been actively involved in that. We have a resolution on this issue and I don't want to debate the merits of that resolution because it is still in committee.

"I do want to point this out, however. In opposing the undergrounding KV lines, Hawaiian Electric has stated that it's going to cost too much money; that it's going to cost the ratepayers of this island too much money. However, in the amendment that they proposed today or the day before yesterday to the surcharge bill, they had no problem with limiting the application of the surcharge only to residents of Oahu, and not apply it to ratepayers across the state. I think that it's inconsistent that, on the one hand they would say to us that surcharges for the cost of repair on Kauai of \$40 million should be limited only to the ratepayers of the island of Oahu, while the issue of public health and safety in undergrounding KV lines on Oahu, they oppose on the basis of costing the ratepayers of Oahu too much money. I think that perhaps at some point in time they've got to stop exalting money. They kind of remind me of Richie Rich, the poor little rich boy, and Uncle Scrooge in a Donald Duck comic book -without their heart. Perhaps, one day they will stop acting like cartoon characters."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I hadn't intended to speak, but I want to say a few words in support of the Senator from Kohala.

"I hope that the faculty at McKinley will convey to the students the importance of confronting history and not just burying their heads in the sand. It was a little surprising yesterday, perhaps not surprising because they are not yet adults, but to hear a student say that he was offended that students weren't consulted. If the student had read the resolution, he would have known that the whole point of the resolution was to gain the input of the students. I think that a lot of the negative reaction to the resolution unfortunately, is not a reaction to the resolution itself but a reaction to media coverage; cryptic, under-inclusive, misdirected and misguiding coverage.

"Anyone who takes the time to read it will see that the intent is to have the community debate the issue, particularly the students; to confront history and to resolve the unresolved issues that history has presented to us. There's nothing wrong with that. There's no reason why anyone should find that offensive or why anyone should become apoplectic or run 'amok,' if you will, when confronted with a request that students study history. When the students at McKinley High School study the history of President McKinley's role, they may

discover that their instinctive reaction precipitated by the press coverage was not appropriate. Thank you."

Senator Blair rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill, the purpose of which is to authorize the Housing Finance and Development Corporation to issue bonds to purchase existing housing inventory which was financed partially by the federal government through tax incentives and possibly direct appropriations in some cases.

"My objection to the bill obviously is not to the preservation of low income and moderate income housing which is in extremely short supply in this jurisdiction. My concern is that we are foregoing a much greater opportunity, the opportunity to increase the inventory of housing. If we use our bonding powers to buy existing units, we don't increase the supply. Everybody who understands economics has told us, time and time again over the years, that we have a housing problem because we don't have a sufficient supply of housing to meet the demand.

"We'll be using our limited bonding authority without increasing the housing supply by even one unit. It would be so much better, instead of buying these existing units, to use the same bonds to build new units. Just using round figures, why buy 100 units, moving out the tenants currently in those buildings who don't qualify under whatever criteria are applied, for the purpose of moving somebody else in. For the same money we can buy a hundred new units, increasing the inventory by that number of units and providing those new units for people who meet the qualifications. This leaves the existing units in the market for other people. There are an awful lot of people out there who are feeling the housing pinch, but don't qualify for government assistance programs. Rather than hurting them, which I'm afraid this bill actually does if they don't qualify for government housing, let's try and help everybody by increasing the inventory.

"For that reason, I urge the members to oppose this bill. I believe this bill is well intentioned, the alternative which I hope is not the case, is that this is a political decision and that there are constituencies in these buildings to whom we are trying to pander, perhaps a harsh word, but whose good graces we wish to be in or to remain in, so that rather than looking at the real needs of the community we're looking at the political need of trying to take care of constituencies. I trust that this isn't the case and that this is merely a misdirected effort at being big-hearted. However, I hope that even at this late hour some people will consider the ramifications and will vote against the bill. Thank you."

Senator George spoke in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this particular measure.

"This is to enable us to retain housing which was constructed under HUD strictures and with HUD money; to retain them as low-income housing. It isn't a question of displacing existing tenants but rather preserving the inventory of low-income housing. This would presumably revert to market housing were we not to acquire it and keep restrictions on the housing.

"I urge the members' support of this measure."

Senator Blair then added:

"Mr. President, we are told that this bill will preserve housing, but these buildings will not disappear. They will still be there. They will still be filled with residents of our state who need that housing desperately.

"If what we're really interested in doing is providing low-income housing, let's build low-income housing. The same money that will buy these units, which we will be purchasing at fair market value and some of which will be very expensive at fair market value, can be used to buildings new units. We don't need to preserve these buildings, because they will not disappear, and we can use these bonds for new buildings that will increase the inventory.

"I urge the members to vote 'no.'"

Senator Koki in support of Senator Blair, said:

"Mr. President, I find myself torn. I certainly agree with the philosophy espoused by Senator Blair and sort of don't know what to do when we have a Republican in support of this. But I think I'm going to cast my vote with Senator Blair because what he says is really correct. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi spoke in support of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, a prior speaker spoke of having a hundred buildings and then casting out the people living in those buildings and then filling them with someone else. This bill will do just the opposite. It will allow people in those hundred buildings to remain in those hundred buildings because those hundred buildings will stay low-income buildings.

"We're talking about two different things -- preserving housing units, number one; and number two, preserving low-income housing units.

"This bill enables us to preserve low-income housing units. It does so by allowing us to buy existing units at lower than market replacement cost. With that savings, we could build additional housing, and the program right now allows us to do that. And so, I think that if we focus on preserving low-income housing units we will put the bill in its proper perspective. Thank you."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, three points in rebuttal.

"First is that the previous speaker had indicated that this would be lower than replacement cost and there is no evidence that he is correct. The second point is that he indicates that current occupants will necessarily meet the criteria for low-income housing. My understanding is that, in many of these units, there are tenants who would not qualify under state housing programs. When these are converted from the federal program to the state program, some tenants will not qualify.

"The fundamental point that we need to keep in mind is that when we build the new units we can apply whatever criteria we want and nobody is displaced then and that is how we preserve low-income housing units and, at the same time, increase the inventory. Thank you."

Senator Chang in support of the measure then stated:

"Mr. President, like the Senator from Kaneohe, I find myself intrigued by the situation and the novelty presented by the Housing chairman, advocating this proposal. On that basis, I'm inclined to vote 'yes.'"

Senator Fernandes Salling rose to inquire if the chair of the Committee on Housing would yield to a question.

The President posed the question to the chair and the chair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling asked:

"Madam Chair, is the federal government proposing to give up these units and to get out of the business of managing these units, and is that the necessity for the state to step in and purchase them?"

Senator George answered:

"I don't have the precise details because they vary from building to building, but the HUD strictures apply only for a limited period of time and these are due to expire. As these expire, we would be undertaking to take ownership and management back from HUD in order to preserve them in the existing use."

Senator Fernandes Salling further inquired:

"If the state chose not to take it from HUD, would ownership remain with the federal government?"

Senator George answered:

"No, it would not. One presumes they would be purchased and put into market housing. No one would purchase them, I believe, as a good investment. And they will be available for purchase. It would be unlikely that anyone would purchase them to retain them in low-income housing. They would be purchased, presumably, and rehabbed and put into market housing."

Senator Fernandes Salling thanked the chair of the Committee on Housing.

"A related concern is the separation of powers issue. This program belongs in the Judiciary rather than the Executive Branch, in order to preserve the appropriate functions of the executive and legislative branches..

"I'm hopeful that between now and 1995 the program will develop in such a way that it can be readily transferred to the Judiciary. It is in anticipation of such a transfer and because the results of the program will be beneficial that I am supporting it. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also supported the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I too would like to vote 'yes, with reservation.'

"I would like to note for the record, the previous speaker's remarks as though they were my own. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I will be voting 'yes' on this bill with reservation.

"The reasons have been discussed in length with the chairman of the Government Operations, Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Affairs Committee. I feel strongly that the proper agencies for these Hawaiian homestead groups to obtain grants should be either Alu Like or the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. I do not think it appropriate that the Legislature set precedent dictating as to how the Hawaiian Homes Commission should spend their dollars. I know that over the past five years, the Hawaiian Homestead Associations have done a tremendous job networking within the Homestead areas. I support their causes. However, I feel that the DHHL budget is not the appropriate funding source to serve these kinds of grant requests.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

"Mr. President, my reservation is that currently we do have a group of people who are doing this, from Waimea Bay to Sunset Beach, my area. They have purchased a sampling kit with their own money, so if this bill goes to conference I would appreciate the possibility of having it looked at further.

"I would appreciate the chairman looking at it and reducing the amount from \$65,000 to \$45,000, and I would hope that they would continue to look at this amount and see if it could be further reduced. As I stated earlier, the volunteers in my area have purchased a sampling kit with their own money. And if the money is deemed necessary, then they should also include the residents in the North Shore area who are currently doing this. I hope these people will be included. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon also in support of the measure then stated:

"Mr. President, in support of the previous speaker, I too will be voting 'yes' with reservations for the same reason. The Puako community on the Big Island, through their own efforts and working with the Department of Health, is in the process of conducting their own water quality sampling and water quality study.

"When this bill goes to conference, I would appreciate the chairman's consideration to include the Puako Community Association. Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose to speak in support of the bill, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"First of all, I would like to commend the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and especially the staff for working so closely with the subject matter chairs. As we all know, putting the budget together is a very difficult task. The needs always exceed the resources we have available and we know how difficult those budget decisions are this year.

"What I'd like to speak on, Mr. President, and what I'm so proud about is what the Ways and Means Committee did on the Education budget. In these tight budget years we've made a decision to make education a priority. We not only included the \$5 million requested in the governor's message; we also put in an additional \$10 million and another \$1 million in the innovative fund. The budget is truly a lump sum budget which empowers schools and creates school-based budgets.

"There are some interesting provisos in the budget which insure that the money will go to the students rather than to the bureaucracy. For example, there's a proviso which states that no more than 7 percent of the money we appropriate to the DOE can be used for administrative purposes in the state or district offices. The provisos in the budget are very productive in insuring that the money will get to the students.

"This is a budget that we all worked hard on and that we can be very proud of in taking to conference. Thank you."

Senator Mizuguchi also rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the budget bill but with some reservations and some concerns about this bill.

"I agree with the Education Committee chair that the staff and the Senators in charge have worked very hard in putting together a very responsive budget in these times of budgetary constraints.

"But, as you well know, Mr. President, I have been a proponent for many years of the concept of encouraging and permitting the making of key education decisions by and at the individual school. One major set of those

decisions is the creation and implementation of a school's budget. In the 1977 and 1978 sessions, I was able to shepherd a change in the way the budget for regular education was displayed in the budget -- in a school-by-school format. For the first time, the cost of operating each school was shown in the General and Supplemental Appropriations Acts. While the allocation of those funds remained a top-down decision, and while each school had not truly had a chance to create its budget, at least the Legislature and the people of Hawaii had the opportunity to know what it was costing to operate each school.

"The lump sum budgeting that is currently being advocated remains, even on this 46th day of this session, something of a mystery. Whether it will shed some light on what is being spent in the schools, whether it will reveal to us and to the people of this state what kinds of emphases the schools are placing, whether a school's budget is truly a creature of principals, teachers, and parents -- all these remain mysterious. I see no indications that we will know, as we did in 1977 and 1978, what is being spent for each school. Can we truly approve a budget that contains, in a single sum of several hundred million dollars, and know what it means?

"Unfortunately, I come here today with a sense of 'deja vu.' In the late 1960s, the same kind of lump sum budgeting was granted to the Department of Education (DOE). The argument then was that an elected Board of Education should have the discretion to spend as it decided. The DOE was even given no position count ceiling. After four years, the innovation was abolished because DOE could not account for its funds or demonstrate students' progress. The advocates of lump sum budgeting swallowed hard and admitted that the experiment failed.

"The DOE and other advocates today argue that this is a different Board of Education and a different Department of Education. But I have seen no evidence that the schools are ready for lump sum budgeting. In fact, the recent state auditor's update report on DOE's Financial Management System, or FMS, revealed that FMS has not delivered on its promises. It has been a major source of frustration and demoralization at the schools. To blunt the criticism, DOE is changing its configuration and now claims that the system is still under development. In the meantime, school personnel are left to struggle and cope as best they can. I have been hearing from school personnel that they can hardly wait for an early retirement bill to be passed so they can get out from under intolerable working conditions at the schools. Is lump sum budgeting going to be imposed on this situation?

"Once again, DOE is testing a concept by subjecting the entire system to it. And where is the accountability going to lie? Ultimately, the buck will stop here. How will we answer the students, the parents, the taxpayers who ask, 'What learning did lump sum money buy?'

"As you vote on this bill, ask yourselves this question: 'What learning will lump sum budgeting buy?'

"Thank you, Mr. President, for this opportunity to speak."

Senator Solomon also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I too will be voting for this bill but with reservations. Many of my reservations were expressed by the previous speaker.

"I would like to reiterate for the record; I too have chaired the committee on lower and higher education. In lower education, we had lump sum budgeting; especially in EDN 105 and it was very, very difficult for me as the

chair to make sense out of the budget. The unfortunate situation is that the schools that suffer are the rural district schools, primarily those located on the neighbor islands, especially those schools that include elementary, intermediate and high school levels on one campus. Lump sum budgeting confuses the issues because we cannot make sense of what dollars are going for what programs. I would like to caution the chairmen of the Committee on Education and on Ways and Means as they continue their deliberations.

"In reality, lump sum budgeting does not work. I have not seen any fiscal documents that will convince me otherwise.

"As we move into conference, we should consider these issues very, very seriously. Mr. President, unfortunately, the schools in the rural district, the farther away you are from the central district office, the less you get in lump sum budgeting. I leave you with that caution to my colleagues.

"Thank you very much."

Senator B. Kobayashi added his support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, on the subject of lump sum budgeting, I note that in the budget on page 98, section 46, which speaks to the topic of school-based budgeting, says in part that the Department of Education during the fiscal biennium of 1993, upcoming, shall 'develop and implement a new operating budget preparation and allocation process which shall hereinafter be referred to as "school based budgeting", provided that the intent of school based budgeting is to simplify the budgeting process and ensure the maximum flexibility is extended to individual schools in the preparation and execution of their operating budgets;'

"Mr. President, as you know, there was last year a gubernatorial proposal that some sort of lump sum budgeting should begin. At that time when it was initiated by the governor, the Department of Education was unable to tell us how that goal might be achieved and told us privately that if they were forced to try to implement such a school by school budgeting effort that they could not do it, given the shortfalls of the current accounting system. In fact they could give us only an approximation, but the approximation would not be a very clear representation of what happened in the individual schools.

"And so, given that the department was not able to produce something last year, the attempt here is during the upcoming fiscal biennium to move toward that goal of a school based budgeting system. The department thinks that they can improve upon the current accounting and financial system and, hopefully, given time and the opportunity to systematically review how their current budget is put together, they can approach this long term goal of a better school based budgeting system. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then rose to support the measure and said:

"Mr. President, although I don't sit on the education committee I'm sure that the chairman of that committee has done a lot of research in deciding the direction for this body to move.

"I don't think lump sum budgeting is the key factor in education ... I want to refocus that. The major factor in education begins at home at an early age. The student must want to learn; parents must encourage them to want

to learn; teachers must instill in the student optimism, enthusiasm and a commitment that they'll never give up. These are basic things that make students want to learn. I remember my days in India, a teacher teaching the students under the banyan tree. There was no building, just a chalkboard. But he was able to infuse into the students the challenge of the future. I have confidence in the Department of Education to do the right thing. Sometimes it only takes one person to move a country like Mahatma Gandhi did; like Martin Luther King did. Give the Department of Education the chance and I think that they will be able to improve things. Let's give them the flexibility! Thank you."

Senator Solomon then responded:

"Mr. President, if the previous speaker's remarks were accurate, I might feel comfortable with the concept of lump sum budgeting. Unfortunately, the bureaucratic administration cannot be compared to the philosophical commitment of Mahatma Gandhi.

"In response to the Senator from Kapahulu-Kaimuki concerning his remarks on school based budgeting, my thoughts include the following problems: first, school based budgeting is based on allocation formulas; secondly, allocations are based on student enrollment. These formulas serve to our disadvantage in the rural district areas. Many of our students are short-changed. It is through the acts of the Legislature that we in rural districts have been able to get our fair share.

"I'm hoping that during the committee deliberations language can be inserted so as to protect the educational delivery of services to the rural communities.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney then responded:

"Mr. President, I'd like to thank all of the previous speakers for their remarks, especially the remarks from the Senator from Kohala and the Senator from Pearl City-Aiea. Those are very, very important concerns that are taken under consideration and will continue to be taken under consideration in conference. I think that's the essence of the debate on this whole issue of lump sum budgeting and I can assure you that the position of the Education Committee, and I assume and believe, the Ways and Means Committee, is that we want to get money out of the control of the Legislature, out of the control of the bureaucracy, out of the control of the board and directly to the schools with fewest strings attached and that is the goal to empower the school community.

"We also need to make sure that if we are going to give up control of prescribing methods and means in order to achieve greater policy results, we in the Legislature constitutionally are held responsible for raising revenue and we're held accountable for how it is spent. In this budget and in the education omnibus bill, we are making that affirmation but we're also saying that we want accountability in two forms. One is the fiscal one like the Senator from Aiea and Pearl City talked about -- where is the money going? We want a reporting system that comes back to us on where the money is actually being spent.

"Another area which I think is equally or even more important is educational outcome. What is actually happening and are schools improving and are our students' performance getting better? Those are provisos that we have in this bill and also within the educational omnibus bill -- very, very important. We need to become more outcome oriented and less process oriented and stop micro-managing.

"As the Senator from Hilo said this is not the end that is going to suddenly solve the problem; it's just the means to get to somewhere. But still what happens in the classroom is the most important and what this bill is all about is making sure that the money gets there and the schools are empowered to make sure that that happens.

"I want to also assure the Senator from Kohala that we are working with the DOE and the community on a formula to come up with a better formula than the one we have because I think nobody is comfortable with the existing allocation formula and we're asking them in a budget proviso to make a new proposal and weight the pupil average. We're saying that being equitable doesn't necessarily mean giving equal funding because it's got to be based on educational needs not just numbers and that's very, very important.

"I think the debate today was very good and all the concerns are going to be taken into consideration. The real key is how do we start empowering school communities so that they can identify and meet their needs rather than have the bureaucracy control them. I think that's where we're all headed in this educational revolution. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"I would like to thank the staff for the tremendous job of putting this budget together. It's been a very difficult year. The staff was asked to justify all the expenditures in the budget. We were tight on money and so we wanted to make sure that dollars were spent wisely. Also the members of the committee were always available for signature. I'd like to thank them.

"We tried to run Ways and Means very openly, having open decision-making and even decision-making on the committee report. All members of the Senate have been truly wonderful. They've understood the tight economic times and everyone had needs and wishes in their district. We know the needs of Hamakua, of Kauai, of Kilohana School, of schools on this island. We've been aware of those needs and wishes and no one was really insistent; no one really pushed because they understood that times are hard, that dollars were short, and that we were doing the best we could.

"As we go into conference, I look forward to that same amount of cooperation. We're one body and we should work together and move together. I look forward to the budget being a true reflection of our hopes and goals for Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Holt, also in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill and thank the chairman and staff and the rest of the members for their work on the bill.

"Following up on the discussion on education, I think it's good to have a discussion on how schools are funded but let's not forget that our schools are governed. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I request a ruling by the Chair on a potential conflict. I am a member of the board of directors."

The Chair ruled that Senator Fukunaga was not in conflict.

Senator Ikeda then rose to speak in support of the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but I do have some reservations.

"Mr. President, as far as I am concerned, the main reason why I would vote for this bill is because it would help the employees of Hawaiian Airlines. During discussions and committee hearings, management has said that they intend to eventually have the airlines owned by the employees through a stock option plan. Unfortunately, Mr. President, neither the committee report nor the bill reflects this intent and I would feel a lot more comfortable if some reference could be included in either the committee report or, preferably, the bill during conference. I will be voting in favor of this bill, however, to keep it alive."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I concur with the previous speaker and I'm going to be voting for this bill, but with reservations.

"We have set a policy in this body when we loaned \$10 million to the Hamakua Sugar Company. However, at that time, Hamakua Sugar had collateral that was in excess of that \$10 million loan.

"In making this guarantee to Hawaiian Airlines, we must be assured that there is sufficient collateral to cover the loan. We will be setting a bad policy if we guarantee a loan in excess of the collateral. The airline industry worldwide is in trouble so we have to be extra careful in extending this loan guarantee. We will have to set aside \$20 million to assure the guarantee. So there is monies involved. I don't know where the money is going to come from.

"I think that in guaranteeing this loan, the officers and the board of directors of Hawaiian Airlines should also guarantee 50 percent of the loan. The state should have priority on the collaterals before the officers and board of directors. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1297 was adopted and H.B. No. 173, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

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Senator Ikeda moved that H.B. No. 690, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for the bill with reservations.

"Currently the bill is much modified and some of the more onerous aspects of the bill have been eliminated. However, co-ops which represent only a small sector of the multi-unit housing community in the islands represent a form of governance quite different from that of condos. There are approximately 52 cooperatives on this Island of Oahu. Most of them are older units. They have certain kinds of memberships as well as buildings and governance patterns that make them very different animals from the condominiums.

"In particular, I think the bill attempts to bring the cooperatives into an operating mode similar to that of condos. However, one of the awkward aspects of the cooperation is that the cooperatives exist like a single company and one of the provisions in the bill has that all members of the board of directors of cooperatives shall be shareholders. In some instances, former shareholders have given up their shares and put their shares in the name of family members or in trust, and are not shareholders in the ordinary sense, but they serve as valuable members of board of directors. In a sense they have beneficial interest in the building and care as much about what happens with the cooperative as any other member who may be a shareholder.

"For these people there might be some extra special consideration or change in the bill. We would note that the bill itself has been in the works for approximately two years, having first gotten discussion during the Housing Congress of two years ago. However, members of the cooperative community have not been involved in this discussion until very, very recently and they feel that they have been left out of the process. In this regard, I would hope that efforts could be made to bring them in to the discussion at least at this late date and perhaps consideration might be made to pass a minimal bill that will have all points in agreement and have the more controversial elements of the bill held till next year. Thank you."

Senator Matsunaga also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I too will be voting for this bill with reservations, for the reasons stated so eloquently by the Senator from Kaimuki. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 690, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COOPERATIVE HOUSING CORPORATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

H.B. No. 1890, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Ikeda moved that H.B. No. 1890, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Ikeda, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 1890, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, which embodies the Senate's efforts to deal with the problem of hurricane coverage for Hawaii's people.

"Mr. President, before I explain what this bill proposes to do and why the Senate has taken this particular position, I want to make one point very clear to everyone. If another hurricane the magnitude of Hurricane Iniki ever strikes this State, or even just the Island of Oahu, we will never recover all of our losses without the help of the federal government.

"What we are trying to accomplish with this bill is to afford bottom line protection to homeowners in Hawaii. The House sent us its proposal which would establish a State hurricane pool to provide hurricane coverage. We had serious concerns about this concept from the outset because the State would be assuming full liability for all hurricane losses and totally relieving the private sector from any liability. This is tantamount to a bail out of the insurance industry and, therefore, totally unacceptable.

"Mr. President, after several meetings with the private sector, I could not get firm assurances that the insurance companies would continue to write homeowners policies even if the hurricane pool was established. It was only when passage of the House version was in question, that one company said it would be willing to keep premiums at existing rates for one year and continue to renew policies.

"Mr. President, Our original Senate proposal sought to ensure that the State would not have to directly assume responsibility for hurricane losses, and would instead provide reinsurance for insurance companies. However, the insurance companies were unwilling to use this proposed reinsurance facility, a facility that would have been a partnership between the State and the industry. We searched for other proposals and I think we are close to what we want to accomplish. Once again I want to emphasize that we are not trying to provide full coverage, but protection that is fair, practical, and realistic under the circumstances.

"As this bill was being considered, the City and County of Honolulu proposed to provide basic homeowners and hurricane coverage to its residents through the assessment of real property taxes and/or a fee for insurance premiums. I commend the City and County for its efforts.

"I feel that hurricane coverage is an appropriate undertaking for the counties because it is within the scope of services that they are already authorized to provide. The counties are given broad power to protect the health, welfare, and property of their people. Providing hurricane coverage is consistent with this power because it protects residents from massive and irrecoverable losses. Additionally, the counties are almost totally dependent on real property taxes for the revenue that pays for the services they provide and therefore, they must be able to safeguard their revenue base.

"Our bill includes enabling legislation to allow the counties to provide homeowners insurance. We have also made the language sufficiently broad to permit captive insurance companies to sell homeowners insurance in the event that they may desire to assume the responsibility that some carriers have seen fit to abandon.

"Mr. President, the bill before you proposes among other things to ensure that the counties are able to provide homeowners insurance. If a county like the City and County of Honolulu wishes to provide its own insurance program, it should be given the freedom to do so. However, the Senate version also contemplates the

provision of homeowners insurance through a State and county partnership.

"First, the counties will have to choose whether to provide their own insurance program or become a part of the State program. If a county chooses the latter, the state program would require the county to establish two separate trusts, one trust to provide regular homeowners' policies, and the other trust to provide only hurricane coverage. The county would contract the Hawaii Reinsurance Assistance Corporation, which is established by the Senate's version of the bill for insurance coverage. Premiums collected through fees or real property taxes would be used to purchase this coverage.

"The Hawaii Reinsurance Assistance Corporation would be a non-profit corporation within the Department of Budget and Finance. The Corporation would have two major components, the first component being a reinsurance pool. This reinsurance pool would involve the State in a partnership with the private sector to provide reinsurance for regular homeowners coverage, excluding hurricane coverage. The second component would establish a hurricane trust which would provide funds for hurricane losses.

"Mr. President, the bill your Committee approved still needs to be worked on and discussed, but I think its essential components are workable. The State will now be filling the gap left by the private sector by providing reinsurance to the counties, since as I mentioned earlier, the private sector was not interested in participating in our reinsurance facility. Second, the City and County of Honolulu will be given clear authorization to enter into the insurance business. Third, we intend to leave areas open for private sector participation such as coverage for contents within a home or additional coverage beyond a specified amount.

"Mr. President, I want to emphasize once again that only through a federal program will we feel fully protected against losses from another Hurricane Iniki. In view of this, I think that the Senate's version has gone about as as it can go in reaching a fair and realistic solution to the homeowner's insurance problem and I urge my colleagues to support it."

Senator Fernandes Salling also rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"With approximately 70,000 homeowners statewide and a good number of them on the Island of Kauai facing non-renewal or cancellation of their homeowner's policy, I believe this bill is a viable solution to the problems before us. Some people have said that the insurance companies are badly over-reacting to Iniki, that they shouldn't be surprised when there's a hurricane in Hawaii. After all, knowing hurricanes do hit our state, insurance companies set their prices based on this expectation, and they collect for an estimated catastrophe based on long term averages spread over the years and between states.

"The business of insurance is rooted in taking risks and what insurance companies sell us is their promise to pay -- their promise to pay when such a risk occurs. Yet, people pay premiums for years and years, then along comes a hurricane and some insurance companies such as HIG, First Insurance, Pacific Insurance 'run like a dog with its tail between its legs.'

"Hurricanes can happen in places like Hawaii, but you just don't abandon the market after one such event. And you don't increase your rates by 55 percent to almost immediately recoup your losses. On March 28 of this

year the Hawaii Insurance Bureau announced that in November of this year the industry would be seeking a 55 percent increase in premiums.

"The insurance industry's losses should be spread out over a longer period of time so that, for example, if Hurricane Iniki was forecasted as a 30- to 50-year hurricane the losses should be spread out that long. And let us not forget the reserves the industry sets aside for risk, and the income earned on those reserves.

"According to data from the National Insurance Consumer Advocate's office in Washington, D.C., nationwide, property casualty insurance companies collected \$223 billion of premiums in 1991, and held monies beyond reserve for claims in unearned premiums of \$159 billion at the end of 1991.

"It's not surprising then for this body to insist on something better for the people of Hawaii than a 55 percent increase in premium and difficulty in renewing and securing homeowner's insurance. The bill before us proposes to offer homeowner's insurance to all resident homeowners of this state and, we hope, at pre-Iniki rate levels. We shouldn't settle for less for the people of Hawaii."

Senator Graulty also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of this bill.

Mr. President, I wish to commend the chairman of the Senate Committee on Consumer Protection for coming up with such a 'gutsy' bill as this to take on the insurance industry in the State of Hawaii as it relates to homeowner's insurance. It's always been my feeling, Mr. President, from the beginning, that the homeowner's insurance crisis in our state is a manufactured crisis and I think that this bill confronts the insurance industry headon. For that, I wish to congratulate the chairperson of the committee and the members of the committee.

"My only concern is that if we are to have a mandatory program, knowing that the insurance coverage is going to be purchased by property taxes, that we need to be concerned about those on fixed incomes who are going to be paying a 40 percent increase, if we are to believe what we read in the papers. My concern is that it may impact disproportionately upon senior citizens and others who are on fixed incomes. What we would want to see would be some way of relieving this additional burden that we are going to be placing on these populations, if this program is to be a mandatory one.

"The other side of the coin, Mr. President, as I am well aware, is that if we don't make it a mandatory program then we will probably experience a greater than 40 percent increase in property taxes. So I understand that there is a balancing that the committee, particularly those that are going to be on conference, are going to have to undertake to try to come up with the best possible solution for the most number of people in our state. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Ikeda then added her support and stated:

"Mr. President, in response to the previous speaker's remarks, his points are very well taken. I believe that it's a policy decision; however, it's a policy decision that would have to be made by the counties.

"And I would like to emphasize the fact that this bill is an enabling legislation to allow the counties to address the homeowners' problem. It does not dictate to them, however, how to address the problem. It enables them to set up a trust or get into insurance, whichever way they prefer, and it also allows or permits the state to be a partner in and assist in providing this coverage. In essence, it provides an umbrella for the counties under which the counties can operate. It also does expand the ability for captive insurance companies to also provide personal line coverages.

"It's far from perfect. There's still a lot of work that we need to do, but certainly the message from the members of this body is clear to this chair. We will continue to take this issue head-on and our primary purpose in developing any legislation is that it benefits the people of this state and not private interest."

"Mr. President, I rise for the same purpose as the previous speaker, and to allow the committee chair, who's done a very able job, to continue to work through with the House on this measure and, hopefully, we can come up with a measure that we can all vote for. Thank you."

Senator McCartney, in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I would like to assure my colleagues in the Senate that we will work hard to put together a bill that everybody can live with. The whole purpose of the bill is to look at down-sizing government, reducing costs, and coming up with innovative mechanisms for us to get over this budget crisis. And we want that to be the overriding public policy and not to give people special

breaks or consideration. We will work hard in conference to try and address all the needs. Thank you."

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1340 was adopted and H.B. No. 759, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Matsuura rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, this is another bill that I will be voting for but with reservations.

I think that we all know that companies that are under the Public Utilities Commission are allowed to take up to 12 percent profit on their invested capital. I don't want the utility companies to think that they can be assured of a profit but when a disaster strikes that they can rely on all the ratepayers to pick up the cost of all the risk that was involved in their business, such as the telephone We have one segment of the telephone company that is regulated and we have another segment of the telephone company that is non-regulated. you purchase a telephone instrument, the profit goes to the non-regulated side. Before all the ratepayers are assessed a surcharge for that cost of the repair on Kauai, the PUC should examine the regulated and unregulated activities of the company including the parent company, to make sure, before they assess all the surcharges to the rest of the people, that the PUC completes an audit of the companies. In the case of GTE Hawaiian Tel, it has not been audited for eight years!

"I can understand the plight of the residents of Kauai. We do have people in the Kona district and the Puna district with telephone services that are perhaps worse off than those being experienced on Kauai.

"In the case of Kauai Electric Company, we do have a different problem. Kauai Electric is an independent utility company providing electricity. They have no affiliation with the rest of the HEI utility companies that are servicing the other islands. However, we are asking those people to share in the cost of the repairs. We should make sure that the PUC examines Citizens Electric and their parent company's profit to see that their contribution can also be assessed before the surcharge is passed on to the rest of the residents that live in the State of Hawaii. Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I read the morning Advertiser with great interest. The disagreement was between the Senator who represents Nuuanu and the Senator who represents part of Maui. It appears that the disagreement is based on the constitutionality of giving procurement contracts to local vendors, provided that the difference does not exceed five percent. In regard to the procurement bill that the Senate passed over to the House, this problem is being addressed as follows:

'The Department of Accounting and General Services shall implement a small business opportunity program to insure that at least 15 percent of the state annual purchasing expenditures are awarded to small businesses.'

"We also specify the geographics too. In other words, we can say that some of these contracts can be given to the vendors on the Big Island.

"This concept has already stood constitutional muster because this is being done in other states. They use this same language to get around the constitutionality of being unfair.

"I have another point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

"Today I had a telephone call from Washington, D.C., that could change Hawaii. It wasn't from President Clinton, but from the American Petroleum Institute. As you know, I've been corresponding with 284 largest multinational companies in the U.S. concerning their interest in telecom free-trade zones in Hawaii. Each of these multi-national companies has annual revenue in excess of one billion dollars and has affiliates in the Asia/Pacific Region.

"Today's call was in response to my letters, to tell me that the premises of the Senate telecom free-trade zone bill are correct, that it's exactly what the largest oil companies in the world are looking for as they make their decisions to locate telecom-intensive operations. chief executive officers of the countries' largest oil companies had referred my letter to their trade association, the American Petroleum Institute. Today, American Petroleum Institute members in Washington and Houston called to learn more about Hawaii's telecom freetrade zone legislation so that they may develop a formal response. Senators, these experts confirmed what Senator Matsunaga, your Science, Technology and Economic Development Committee chairman has been saying: multinationals will immediately consider Hawaii as a site for telecom intensive operations, but only if we meet their minimum criteria: competitive digital networks with advanced digital services that connect to international satellite and fiber optic circuits. They told me how they could see telecom operations in Hawaii fitting in with their operations in China and Indonesia. With hotel occupancy at record lows, with military and agriculture revenues disappearing, can Hawaii afford to ignore the new jobs and businesses that the telecom free-trade zones will bring?

"Mr. President, I cite these examples because many people know that Oahu Sugar, maybe Waialua Sugar, may be closing after 1996. If you don't want another Hamakua experience these are the kinds of bills we must pass now! If S.B. 1595 passes we will be in the forefront of telecommunication in the Pacific rim.

"Coincidentally, I have received phone calls from DuPont Corporation and Johnson and Johnson Company expressing a somewhat similar view. I got a letter today and another group will be coming to Hawaii to evaluate the possibilities of a telecom facility being established in Hawaii.

"I took the liberty of writing to these companies because Hawaiian Tel was telling me that they don't have the customers for ISDN and in the short period of two days, I've gotten four companies to respond. So far, the response has been very good. I have received one negative response but other than that one, I had four that were on the positive side.

"I want to make sure that the House members understand that they have a bill that will open up economic development for the entire state!

"Thank you very much."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege.

"I had intended to request a ruling from the chair regarding a possible conflict of interest on Standing Committee Report 1245 (House Bill No. 1370, S.D. 2). Since there is a zero dollar figure in the bill, it really doesn't matter at this stage. It's hard to have a conflict of interest when there is no money involved. But I want the record to reflect that, should the matter come out of the conference, I will ask for a ruling on the issue of a possible conflict. My wife is a partner in the law firm that represents the current owner of the property, which the firm's client is willing to sell to the state for preservation."

FORTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, April 14, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Minister Diava Das, ISKCON Hawaii, Inc., Hare Krishna, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Mizuguchi, Nakasato and Tanaka who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Sixth Day.

Senator Tungpalan presented members of the Pearl City High School soccer team, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

They have won not once, not twice, but three times! Their excellence is probably due to the fine coaching and the fine support that our Pearl City High School team has.

"We have with us the following: coaches Archie Chun and Al Watanabe; players -- Nicole Arakawa, Dayle Liu, Cherise Mishima, Stacey Nakagawa, Jerlene Shimizu, and Karri Watanabe."

The team members and their coaches rose to be recognized. Senator Tungpalan presented the Senate certificate of recognition and leis were presented to each of them by various Senators.

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senators Chang and Tungpalan, then presented members of the Hawaii Pacific University (HPU) Sea Warriors Basketball Team, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my privilege and honor to make this introduction. You know, over the summer we had the Olympics and the 'Dream Team.' In Hawaii, we also have a dream team -- the HPU Sea Warriors. We all know how well they did by becoming the NAIA champions this year.

"I'd like to share a little story with you. I had the opportunity to work with Hawaii Loa College, and you all know that Hawaii Loa merged with HPU and at some point there was a little controversy about the merger and people weren't comfortable with it. Two great basketball teams, Hawaii Loa and HPU, merged and, under the leadership of Coach Sellitto, became one great team. They were rivals at one time, competing against each other for the NAIA Division 29 championship. In one year, they became one team under Coach Sellitto. It exemplifies Coach Sellitto's leadership ability to bring players together who are on opposing sides and create a dream team which went all the way to Kansas City to win the NAIA championship.

"I had the privilege of coaching two of the individuals, Roger Huggins and Andy Gardiner, who are here today. (I want to ask Roger, 'You know when I asked you to run laps around the school, did you really run the whole lap, or did you take a short cut? Now you can tell me, after all you are a national champ.' You did, okay.)

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senate, I would like to extend our congratulations to the HPU Sea Warriors on winning the NAIA 1993 Basketball Championship.

"At this time, I would like to introduce the coach and some of the players sitting on the floor of the Senate: The person who exercises leadership and who has brought the team together and made their dream come true, Coach Tony Sellitto; captain and first team all-American and future NBA star, Roger Huggins; guard and MVP for the tournament, who came in at a very tough time and did a good job, Le Mar Young; the first player ever recruited by HPU and Coach Sellitto, James Williams, a great player; and a real gentleman who came all the way from London with Roger, and they were recruited a few years ago, a great man, Andy Gardiner."

The coach and players rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis by several members of the Senate.

Senator McCartney also introduced Russell Dung, assistant coach, and other members of the HPU team who were seated in the gallery.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1377 (Gov. Msg. No. 236):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1377 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of MULIUFI F. HANNEMANN for Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Governor's Message 236.

"Mr. President, it gives me a great deal of pleasure today to speak in support of the appointment of Muliufi F. Hannemann to the position of Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism.

"Contrary to what many believe, Mufi Hannemann was not born in Samoa but right here in Hawaii. In fact he went to Fern School with me and he used to live up Kam IV Road up the street from me. He's a graduate of Iolani School, where Senator Blair graduated from, and Harvard University where I graduated from, where he earned a degree in government with honors -- cum laude. Upon his graduation from Harvard, he was a recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship and pursued an interest in Pacific Island studies at Victoria University in Wellington, New Zealand.

"Since then Mufi has held a number of high level positions which has helped to make him uniquely qualified for this job. As some of the members may know, he has been a vice president for C. Brewer & Co., a White House Fellow in the Office of the Vice President of the United States, a special assistant in the Office of Territorial and International Affairs, U.S. Department of Commerce, and before becoming the acting director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, he was the director of the Office of International Relations in the Office of the Governor. This diversity and range of experience, Mr. President, has seasoned Mufi Hannemann, strengthened his abilities, and made him a strong candidate for this job.

"At this time I would like to briefly restate a few major points regarding this position and the candidate who, by the way, is sitting in the audience behind me. The director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism is, among other things, the chief officer of the state for the implementation of various economic development programs. During these rough times, the economic health and vitality of this state will, to a large degree, be dependent on the performance of the director. For these reasons, Mr. President, the job requires innovative leadership, initiative and creativity. And the person in the job will need the proper vision and motivation to make it work. By his deeds and actions, Mr. President, I believe Mufi Hannemann is that person.

"In closing, Mr. President, I would like to reiterate my support for the appointment of Muliufi F. Hannemann as our next director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 236. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, also speaking in support of the nominee and in support of the previous speaker's

remarks, I too would like to encourage my colleagues to vote 'yes.'

"I have worked with Mufi during the political campaign, in his capacity as a corporate leader in C. Brewer on the Big Island and the most recent Hamakua Sugar crisis.

"I can speak for the man's integrity. I think he's done a tremendous job for the Big Island and for the state. Mufi is culturally sensitive to community needs and desires and, in my mind, these are desirable characteristics, especially for those in government administration.

"The Pacific is getting smaller as we move towards a global economy. With Mufi's expertise, not only in local affairs but in the affairs of the Pacific, he can bring a new direction to Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I urge all my colleagues for a 'yes' vote. Thank you."

Senator McCartney added his support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"I would like to share two things that stood out in my mind during Mufi Hannemann's confirmation hearing. First, during the hearing he said that he would challenge the status quo to make government work for the people. And then the question that's always asked all the nominees is why do you want this job? What impressed me the most is, he stood right up there and said he's committed to public service, that he wants to make a difference and he wants to serve the people of Hawaii. I think that that truly is the essence of what being in government is all about.

"Mufi told the committee about his mother telling him that there were two things that can make a difference in his life -- going into the clergy or serving in government -- and he chose government. His commitment to the people and making a difference really came forward in that confirmation hearing.

"Mr. President, I wholeheartedly support Mufi Hannemann's nomination and believe he will do a great job for the people of Hawaii."

Senator Chang added his support of Mr. Hannemann and said:

"Mr. President, I'm not going to be speaking for the candidate because my daughter happens to be named after a member of his extended family, but, instead rise to speak because the Chinese business community has urged me to issue a strong statement of support.

"Mr. Hannemann has taken the trouble to extend the state's presence to all sectors of our business community, be it the Filipino Chamber of Commerce, the Japanese Chamber of Commerce, the Chinese and the like. It's his ability to design a spectrum of programs and services that has pleased the members of the business community. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose to support the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"When Mr. Hannemann was appointed, he went through his department like a cyclone and landed here, landed there, found ways to cut, found ways to streamline, questioned the effectiveness of different programs, and although DBEDT has many responsibilities he did not come to Ways and Means and ask for more money. Instead, he gave back -- he gave back to the treasury over \$3 million. And for that we're very thankful.

"We know he's going to do a great job. He already is doing a great job as director because he's working for effectiveness and quality within his department. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan added her remarks in support, as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"I had an opportunity to work with him during our Onipa'a Centennial observance events, and he wholeheartedly allowed his staff to help us with many of the chores that would have gone undone, had his help not been there. I also have been able to work with him on a recent project which we hope will extend our aloha to France and to Japan.

"I know that this nominee will surge ahead and bring this state into the limelight that we certainly need and tourism will rebound as we all hope it will. Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Levin, Mizuguchi, Nakasato, Tanaka).

Senator Holt then introduced Mr. Muliufi Hannemann, as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senate, it's an honor and privilege to introduce Mufi Hannemann, our new Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism.

"He is accompanied here by his wife Gail, father Gustaf, sisters Faiaso and Nua, brothers Gus and Nephi, sister-in-law Lydia, nieces Ata and Noel, and cousin Pinemua."

Mr. Hannemann stood to be recognized, together with his wife and members of the Hannemann family.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

Senator Koki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"I've been getting calls from constituents supporting the Aloha Motors site for the convention center. When I ask them who asked them to call, they say a firm has been calling them, giving them a little information regarding the site and patching them to my office. When I asked them why they are in favor of the Aloha Motors site, they say that it's the fastest and everything is all ready. When I asked them if they realize that it's a leasehold interest, they say they didn't know that. When I asked them more

questions, they began to see that they really did not know as in depth as they need to know on the site. In fact, it gives a false perception of public support.

"You know, this is a very significant project, probably the most significant project we're going to be facing this decade. It is not only in terms of dollars but also dollars being brought into the state. This is a huge jobs bill. It's much better than a large construction project like the transit system because construction projects produce jobs only as long as that project lasts and that money is only recirculating tax dollars.

"A convention center will bring in more money as time goes on and it's fresh money; it's real money; it's not recirculated tax dollars. We need to decide on the convention center site on the merits of the site, not on a public relations effort. The decision is difficult enough to make and I object to what the developers of the Aloha Motors site is doing. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, on the same subject, on a point of personal privilege.

"Calls that are being made for the Aloha Motors site are being made by individuals who are not only being patched through to the Senate, but it seems that there is a conference call being made to our offices without our knowledge. One of the office staff started asking questions of the callers and, the callers not knowing too much about the site, seem to diminish their advocacy for the Aloha Motors site as the questions were asked by the Senate staffer, at which point, in two different instances, it seems the telephone calls were disconnected. So the speculation was that this was a three-party conference call, and the conference call was being disconnected as the callers started changing position from support of the Aloha Motors site to less support for the Aloha Motors site.

"At any rate, we do not know who has been making the phone calls, but we do know that it seems that the individuals who are calling our offices are being put through to our offices somehow in a conference call fashion or a patching-through fashion. I think that this is a new form of telephone democracy but not one that I would suggest is either effective for the advocates of the Aloha Motors site nor one that I would support as part of a free-flowing discussion of the merits and demerits of the convention center. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I have distributed to my colleagues a recent article from a most respected magazine on current events in the world -- The London Economist -- entitled 'Hawaii-Paradise Lost' together with my letter to the editor of the magazine concerning that article. Often it takes observers from afar to show us most clearly our situation. Surely this is the case with the Economist. We are on the brink of a political revolution of which we must all be aware of and participate in.

"Attached also is my letter to the editor referring to the article 'Another royal scandal!'

"In regard to Hawaiian entitlements arising from the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian nation the magazine correctly identifies the challenge of making that issue one

which concerns <u>all</u> of our population -- not merely those of us of Hawaiian blood.

"This session we are considering a critical bill on Hawaiian sovereignty. As one of its authors, the bill politically separates the Hawaiian issues from the general public involvement. The illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian nation and the issues of Hawaiian sovereignty, are not simple -- nor are the solutions. These issues and solutions are too important to the welfare of our state; to make them a Hawaiian racial issue would be short-sighted and self-defeating. We must involve every single person who calls Hawaii their home or calls the United States of America their country. This article has brought this challenge to light and we should accept.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Hagino, at this time, presented Marianita Lopez to the members of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, earlier today, we had the privilege and honor of welcoming two champions -- the state girl's soccer team and the HPU NAIA basketball champions. Now we have a third, Marianita Lopez, who is truly a champion of the people.

"Mr. President, in April 1991 the Hawaii State Bar Association adopted a voluntary program designed to encourage attorneys to provide at least 24 hours of legal services on a no-fee or pro bono basis to indigent people or community organizations. Hawaii Lawyers Care (HLC) is a non-profit organization that refers poverty level people who need legal expertise to attorneys, legal assistants and other advocates who are willing to provide their time and services without charge.

"Marianita Lopez, a partner in the Haleiwa law firm of Saccoccio & Lopez, was one of those volunteers who distinguished herself by accepting every pro bono case referred to her by HLC, sharing the goals set by them to provide the best legal services possible to those in need. She has dedicated her time to more pro bono cases than anyone in the State of Hawaii. I remember reading an article in one of the local newspapers about the many hours she has devoted, a tremendous amount, and I think if she charged for those hours she probably could retire today and live comfortably.

"As a result of her unselfish and deep commitment to the ideals of her profession, Ms. Lopez received the 1992 Hawaii Lawyers Care President's Award for outstanding individual pro bono legal services.

"Mr. President, in this day and age when everyone labors long and hard to earn a decent wage, it is indeed refreshing to acknowledge an individual such as Marianita whose humanitarian nature takes precedence over materialistic acquisition.

"It is my privilege and honor, Mr. President, to present to you and my fellow Senators Marianita Lopez, a distinguished resident of the North Shore."

Ms. Lopez stood to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of recognition from Senator Hagino. Senator Graulty presented a lei.

Senator Hagino also introduced Mr. Paul Saccoccio, husband and law partner of Ms. Lopez, and Hawaii Lawyers Care president Cheryl Nicholson and president-elect Tom Sterling, who were seated in the gallery.

At 12:25 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:29 o'clock p.m.

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Lonnie B. Barker, Captain, United States Air Force, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Fernandes Salling, Ikeda, Koki, McCartney and Reed who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

FORTY-NINTH DAY

Friday, April 16, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:44 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Brother James Kealoha, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Kaneohe, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Matsuura, Mizuguchi and Tanaka who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Eighth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan presented Professor Rubellite Kawena Kinney Johnson, Mrs. Harriet Awana O'Sullivan, Professor Abraham Pi'ianai'a and Mr. Jack Yama, seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my pleasure to introduce to my colleagues and to you four distinguished kupuna, dedicated scholars and exemplars of the best in our community.

"The Hawaiian people revere their kupuna as keepers of the flame of cultural wisdom. By the example of their lives and the caliber of their teaching, our elders perpetuate the rich, multifaceted culture of our people and act as living links between the past and present.

"Although these four kupuna being honored here today have each contributed to their people and to our state as a whole, they all share the honor of being recent recipients of OHA's Ke Kukui Malamalama Award, presented for excellence in Hawaiian education.

"I would like to have the Senator from Kohala introduce the first two and I will do the next two."

Senator Solomon introduced Professor Rubellite Johnson and Mrs. Harriet O'Sullivan and said:

"Mr. President, it is my privilege and honor today to introduce two esteemed scholars from the Hawaiian community.

"First, the Senate would like to commend Rubellite Kawena Kinney Johnson for her outstanding scholarship, teaching record and contribution to Hawaiian education. Mrs. Rubellite Johnson is currently a professor of Hawaiian language at the University of Hawaii, Manoa campus. She has extensive scholarship in Hawaiian and Polynesian culture as a researcher at the Bishop Pauahi Museum, a field researcher in ten different Polynesian island communities, a guest lecturer for the University of Hawaii lyceum series for over 16 years, consultant on Hawaiian culture, religion, language and literature for over 28 years, a frequent keynote speaker, panelist and convener for over 30 years, and has been an internationally recognized native Hawaiian scholar since 1980. Please stand to be recognized by the Senate. Mahalo nui! (Professor Johnson stood to be recognized.)

"Also, it is my pleasure to introduce this morning Mrs. Harriet Awana O'Sullivan, also for her excellence in Hawaiian education. The foundation of Mrs. O'Sullivan's work with Hokulea Pre-school and the Queen Liliuokalani Children's Center has been her philosophy that Hawaiians are a group oriented culture reaching out

to each other to create their own understanding, different ways of resolving issues, and unique ways of thinking and expanding creativity, and that her work has provided special impetus and concern with at-risk Hawaiian children. Mrs. O'Sullivan, mahalo nui for all your good work. (Mrs. O'Sullivan stood to be recognized.)

"Just as a note, Mrs. O'Sullivan's daughter Rachel, a dear friend of mine, is a medal winner in diving for the State of Hawaii, so, good work manifests from one generation to the next. She is seated in the audience."

Senator Tungpalan then introduced Mr. Jack Yama and Professor Abraham Pi'ianai'a and said:

"Mr. President, we also have with us Mr. Jack Yama, an educator from Fern School, who has through his untiring commitment to community affairs, volunteer work, and group activities unselfishly provided love, compassion and respect to all the people of Hawaii. Just glancing at his certificate, I see that Mr. Yama has been involved with the Okinawan Club, Samoan Club, Chinese Culture Club, the Korean Culture Club and the Portuguese Culture Club. No wonder he has so much aloha. Mr. Yama, please stand to be recognized. (Mr. Yama stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, the last honoree is Professor Abraham Pi'ianai'a. Professor Pi'ianai'a is a geographer with the University of Hawaii at Manoa and past director of the Hawaiian Studies Program, whose life has been dedicated to the preservation of Hawaiian and Polynesian languages, culture and history. It is indeed a pleasure to honor and recognize Mr. Pi'ianai'a. Aloha!" (Mr. Pi'ianai'a stood to be recognized.)

The honorees were each presented a Senate certificate of recognition and lei by Senators Tungpalan, Solomon, A. Kobayashi and Holt.

Senator McCartney introduced a group of students and teachers from King Intermediate School, seated in the gallery.

Senator B. Kobayashi recognized the managements of the Kahala Mall and the Windward Mall, as follows:

"Mr. President, today we have on the floor with us some people that we would like to recognize for their voluntary efforts in creating a smoke-free environment.

"The managements of the Kahala Mall and the Windward Mall are to be congratulated for their efforts in helping make Hawaii the health state.

"Mr. President, cigarette smoking is the single most preventable cause of death in Hawaii, as well as in the nation, and has been called the nation's 'number one' public health problem. In Hawaii 1,118 people died in 1991 as a result of tobacco related illnesses, accounting for approximately 16 percent of all resident deaths in the state in that year.

"The Surgeon General has concluded that nonsmokers who inhale tobacco smoke greatly increase their risk of contracting heart disease, lung and other cancers and respiratory diseases. The EPA, Environmental Protection Agency, has classified environmental tobacco smoke as a class A carcinogen.

"Therefore, Mr. President, in a sincere desire to enhance the comfort, safety and health of its patrons and businesses and to set a positive example of its concern for the people of Hawaii, the managements of the Kahala Mall and the Windward Mall have banned tobacco use in the malls beginning in 1992.

"Representing the Kahala Mall on the floor with us today is Ms. Donna L. Byers. She is from Pennsylvania and a graduate of Penn State University. She has two children and has been employed by Kahala Mall since 1972. The mall was completed in August 1970 and consists of 22 acres with a gross leasable area of 386,000 square feet.

"Representing the Windward Mall is Mr. Richard G. Chang. Mr. Chang is a graduate of Punahou School and the University of Southern California. Mr. Chang completed three years of naval service as a line officer with a tour of duty in Vietnam. As general manager, he oversees a mall that consists of 530,000 square feet with approximately 2,300 parking stalls.

"Accompanying these two people is someone whom we all know, the director of the Department of Health, Dr. Jack Lewin."

Ms. Byers, Mr. Chang and Dr. Lewin rose to be recognized. Senator B. Kobayashi presented a Senate certificate of recognition to Ms. Byers and Mr. Chang; leis were presented by Senators Hagino, Tungpalan and George.

campaign chairman. He did not quite get me elected that first time but did manage to get me elected the second, and while I continued on in politics he went on to bigger and better things, including becoming a sheriff for the State of Hawaii. I'm very hopeful that S.B. 1616 will become law, will be signed by the governor, and I'll be very proud to be able to call him sheriff once again. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

"We just voted and adopted Standing Committee Report 1430 and S.R. No. 50. This is a Senate Resolution requesting transfer of the U.S. Coast Guard loran station site to the original owner, Bishop Estate. The site is located in the Kohala area.

"Over the Easter weekend, commencing on April 9th, 28 Hawaiian families have occupied the loran station to protest the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian nation, and to request that the land be returned back to the Kingdom of Hawaii, as reported by an article yesterday, in the Honolulu Advertiser.

"Being that the Bishop Estate is the direct legacy of Bernice Pauahi, the last direct descendant of the Kamehameha line, I'm hoping that the estate will meet with the families and include them in their discussions and their negotiations with the federal government.

"Presently, we have approximately 14 families who are still occupying the site. As an addendum, Mr. President, I spoke to the chairman during recess regarding the title of the resolution as to the return of the U.S. Coast Guard loran site to its previous owners. I asked, 'Does this include the sovereign nation of the Hawaiian Kingdom?' The chairman smiled and said, 'Well, who knows.'

"Thank you very much."

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Ikeda, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Monday, April 19, 1993.

FIFTIETH DAY

Monday, April 19, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Captain Glen McFarland, Chaplain, United States Army Support Command, Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions of guests seated on the floor of the Senate were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senators Matsuura, Tungpalan, George, McCartney, Matsunaga, A. Kobayashi and Holt presented the recipients of the 1993 Distinguished Alumni Award of the University of Hawaii Alumni Association, as follows:

Senator Matsuura presented and introduced Mr. Robert M. Fujimoto and said:

"Mr. President, each year the University of Hawaii Alumni Association recognizes outstanding former students of the University of Hawaii system, awarding such persons the Distinguished Alumni Award. This morning we have seven of the eight 1993 Distinguished Alumni recipients.

"Mr. President, it is my privilege to introduce Mr. Bob Fujimoto of Hilo. Bob Fujimoto has done a lot of things, and I'm not going to read all his accomplishments because that will take a long time. I can only say that I have one thing that I'm very, very grateful to him. He gave me the most wonderful, wonderful woman to be my daughter-in-law. For that I am eternally grateful to him. His daughter is married to my son. I'm very lucky and for that I want to thank you, Bob. Will you please stand up and take the recognition for being one of the recipients of the 1993 University of Hawaii Distinguished Alumni Award." (Mr. Fujimoto stood to be recognized.)

Senator Tungpalan then presented and introduced Mr. William Hiraoka, as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce a friend of mine. We all know him because of his extensive knowledge of insurance. He was practically my shadow at one point in 1985 when we were attempting to reform the workmen's compensation law.

"I have grown to admire him over the years and it is indeed a pleasure to introduce to this honorable body our friend, Bill Hiraoka." (Mr. Hiraoka stood to be recognized.)

Senator George presented and introduced Mr. Edward Y. Hirata, as follows:

"Mr. President, I have a particular treat. It's a real privilege to introduce an old friend whose paths have crossed with mine on many occasions -- Ed Hirata. I can say a lot of things about him because he's had a long career. I think probably the easiest thing to say is that he can't hold a job. They talk about triple threat people. I guess Ed is quadruple threat because his current endeavor is in the business-

civilian community. He's also, as we all know, been involved with government administration. He's also had a distinguished career in the military. We may all call him 'general' when we feel like it. And in addition to that, he has still, somehow, found time for community service.

"Ed Hirata, please let us greet you this morning." (Mr. Hirata stood to be recognized.)

Senator McCartney then presented and introduced Professor Satoru Izutsu, and stated:

"Mr. President, it's also my pleasure to introduce an outstanding individual, somebody who's given a lot to the community and who cares about the University system very dearly. He's now Professor of Public Health and Psychiatry and Associate Dean of the John A. Burns School of Medicine. He's also been very involved in international public health and is known around the world for his work in the Pacific Basin, Yugoslavia and Romania.

"He has also served the community well as superintendent of the Waimano Training School and Hospital, vice president for Geriatric Care Services of the Kuakini Health System, member of the boards of Homeless Aloha, Inc., the Alzheimer's Association and the Lanakila Rehabilitation Center. I'm speaking about our honoree today, Satoru Izutsu. Please stand to be recognized. Thank you for being here." (Professor Izutsu stood to be recognized.)

Senator Matsunaga, then presented and introduced Mr. Larry Johnson, president of Bancorp, Hawaii, and stated

"Mr. President, it's my honor, indeed, to introduce another distinguished UH alumnus today. We all know Mr. Larry Johnson has been president of Bancorp, Hawaii, Inc. and its principal subsidiary, Bank of Hawaii, since 1989. And I'm sure we all know that he became the youngest vice president in the bank's history in 1970.

"Mr. Johnson was also the 1992 Aloha United Way chairman, past chairman of the Hawaii Visitors Bureau and the Hawaii Heart Association and past president of the Waikiki Improvement Association.

"But the real reason why I want to introduce Mr. Johnson here today is because Mr. Johnson is also a fellow Sigma Chi. Mr. Johnson, please rise and be recognized." (Mr. Johnson stood to be recognized.)

Senator A. Kobayashi then presented Mr. Kent M. Keith, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's a great honor and privilege for me to introduce Kent Keith. Kent Keith has done so many things. He was selected as a Rhodes Scholar, named one of the Ten Outstanding Young Men of America by the United States Jaycees, was a former director of the state Department of Planning and Economic Development, and is now president of Chaminade University. He has done so many talented things. Best of all, he lives in the 11th Senatorial District and he's also good at singing opera and jazz too. Mr. President and fellow colleagues, Mr. Kent Keith." (Mr. Keith stood to be recognized.)

Senator Holt then presented Professor Alexander Malahoff and said:

"Mr. President, last and not least of the distinguished alumni, it's an honor and privilege to introduce another 1993 Distinguished Alumni of the University of Hawaii -- Professor Alexander Malahoff. He is well-known to those here who take a special interest in ocean science.

"Professor Malahoff is a professor of Oceanography at the University of Hawaii and enjoys the distinction of having received in 1965 the first Ph.D. in Earth and Ocean Science ever bestowed by the University. I'm very privileged to introduce Professor Alexander Malahoff." (Professor Malahoff stood to be recognized.)

Senator Matsuura then rose to inform the members of the Senate that Mr. Walter A. Dods Jr., who was absent on the floor, is also a recipient of the 1993 Distinguished Alumni Award.

The distinguished alumni were each presented congratulatory Senate certificates and leis by various Senators.

Senator Graulty then presented and introduced Aliamanu Intermediate student Annalisa de la Cruz, the 1993 state champion speller, as follows:

"Mr. President, the beauty of our islands is embodied in the spirit of our people, especially our young people. And it's my pleasure this morning to introduce to the members of the Senate the 1993 State Spelling Bee winner, Annalisa de la Cruz. Annalisa spelled 'A-n-n-a-li-s-a.' She is 13 years old and an 8th grader from Aliamanu Intermediate School. May I ask Annalisa to please rise and be recognized. (Annalisa stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, Annalisa's accomplishment is made even more remarkable by the fact that English was not her first language. She learned to speak English at the age of 5 and only two years ago came to our islands to live here and join her father and her mother. By practicing three hours a day with her parents and brothers and sisters, and five to six hours on weekends plus hours after school with her coach, she achieved the goal that she set for herself last year, that of winning the State Spelling Bee championship. Proving again, Mr. President, that it is determination and hard work that gets you to the top.

"It's also my privilege and honor to introduce to the members of the Senate Annalisa's parents, Antonio and Madonna de la Cruz, who are in the audience this morning. (Mr. and Mrs. de la Cruz rose to be recognized.)

"On a personal note, Mr. President, Mr. de la Cruz and Mrs. de la Cruz are from Cotabato in the Philippines where I have an uncle who is the dentist with Dole and my uncle used to work on their teeth.

"Also present with Mr. and Mrs. de la Cruz is Annalisa's coach, Mr. Clifford Fukuda, from Aliamanu Intermediate School. (Mr. Fukuda stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, it took 18 nerve-racking rounds for Annalisa to emerge as the winner, starting with words like 'prowess,' 'zenith,' 'glycogen,' 'podiatrist,' 'resiliency,' 'drogue,' 'syllogize,' 'coalescence,' 'foreclosable,' 'stratocirrus,' 'lexigraphy,' 'anaconda,' 'hematoma,' 'diligently,' for Annalisa to finally emerge as the champion. And as Annalisa prepares for the National Spelling Bee contest in Washington, D.C., next month it is important for all of us to remember what Annalisa said

moments after taking her trophy. She said, 'You had to think you were going to win and not think negative. And you had to study hard.' Those are words of a winner, Mr. President, and winner is spelled 'A-n-n-a-l-i-s-a.' Thank you, Mr. President."

Annalisa de la Cruz was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator Graulty.

Senator Levin then introduced a group of students from Hookena School in South Kona, accompanied by teachers Shirley McCoy and Kelly Luzon.

Senator Morgan was an annexationist and objected to the report of James Blount, who was sent to Hawaii by President Cleveland to investigate the overthrow of the Queen.

"Senator Morgan's committee held hearings on the Hawaiian issues for 2 months in Washington, D.C., at which time many annexationists from Hawaii and Washington testified. The committee's hearings were highly prejudiced and when the 809 page report was published, Senator Morgan was the only one to sign the report. Other members of the committee, 4 Democrats and 4 Republicans refused to sign. The Morgan Report called for no action and the Senate lulled on Hawaiian matters. In spite of its flawed nature people even today cite the Morgan Report to justify what happened in 1893"

"Mrs. Gladys Brandt is very deserving of this honor and I fully support this resolution."

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"I rise to speak in support of Gov. Msg. 235.

"Mr. President, today, I am pleased to speak on behalf of Robert P. Takushi and to recommend the Senate's confirmation of his appointment to the position of Comptroller in the Department of Accounting and General Services. Mr. Takushi is a product of our public school system. He is a graduate of Kaimuki High School and the University of Hawaii at Manoa where he earned a baccalaureate degree in business administration.

"Upon his graduation from the University he worked as a budget analyst for the Department of Budget and Finance. A few years later, like many of us, he joined the staff of the Senate Ways and Means Committee in the Legislature which was then chaired by former Senator Nadao Yoshinaga. As some of the more senior members of this body may remember, Bob quickly advanced to chief clerk of the Ways and Means Committee, administrator of the Senate Majority Office and, finally, special assistant to the Senate President. During his tenure in the Senate, Bob was admitted to the William S. Richardson School of Law and earned his J.D. degree in He entered the private practice of law shortly thereafter, but the attraction of public service, which was instilled in him by his experience in the Senate, was too strong to resist. He returned to government service in the capacity of deputy director of B&F and later deputy director of DAGS. Since September of last year he has been acting state comptroller.

"Bob Takushi's strong background and sincere desire to serve the people of this state make him an exceptional candidate for this position. In addition, I was particularly impressed by the short but ambitious agenda that he has set for himself and the department. As you know he only has 20 months to go.

"For the benefit of the members, I would like to repeat his three-part agenda because it is indicative of his character and his ability as an administrator. First and foremost on the list is the need to restore the public's trust and confidence in the state's purchasing and contracting procedures. Second is the completion of major capital improvement projects, particularly educational facilities. Last but not least is the rededication of efforts to improve services to other state departments. It will be extremely difficult, Mr. President, to develop a better agenda for action as Mr. Takushi has done.

"For these reasons, I strongly support the advise and consent of the Senate of the appointment of Robert P. Takushi and urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Gov. Msg. 235. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I also would also like to support this nomination.

"I concur with the previous speaker that Mr. Takushi has addressed some of the major procurement loopholes in the procurement process. I trust Mr. Takushi to do his very best to make sure that whatever abuse that is occurring in the procurement process that he will also address all those abuses. With those comments, Mr. President, my support is for Mr. Takushi's confirmation."

Senator Solomon also supported the nominee and stated:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of Bob Takushi.

"Mr. President, in 1982 I had the privilege of chairing the Committee on Education and Bob served as my budget analyst. I appreciated his commitment and dedication in expediting the committee needs. Those days, Mr. President, the budget was, literally, done manually because Senate offices were not computerized. On a lighter note, I remember asking him, 'Gee, Bob, why isn't this budget item working out?' I had my little calculator in hand and he said, 'Because, Senator, your calculator only goes up to the millions and this is billions.' And I said, 'Oh, that's right.'

"I will always have those fond memories of Bob Takushi, and appreciate his great sense of humor. I urge all my colleagues to vote 'yes.'"

Senator McCartney also spoke in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"I had the privilege of working with Bob on many projects when we were working hard to revamp the whole school construction process. I can say that he's a hard worker; he's dedicated and he truly cares about doing a good job for the public. He has a big task ahead of him.

"I want to wish Bob Takushi well because he is committed to restoring the public confidence in the system and I think that he will do an excellent job. We need to give him our support and work with him very closely in the next years to come."

Senator Mizuguchi rose to support the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, I, too, speak in favor of Governor's Message 235.

"Bob Takushi is certainly an outstanding choice to become comptroller of the Department of Accounting and General Services. He has a keen mind, sound judgment, is fair and has a tremendous commitment to the people of the State of Hawaii.

"As the Executive Appointments chair has stated, Bob brings a wealth of experience to the position, having served as deputy director of Budget and Finance and as deputy comptroller of DAGS. He has also served in the state Senate as a staffer and I know that he can empathize with us and work with us in resolving some of the current problems that face us in the area of government operations and building and maintenance programs. I'm certain that he will create an environment of professionalism at DAGS.

"But what I admire most about Bob Takushi is his strong commitment to his family. Mr. President, as you are well aware, Bob has been very busy and occupied in his pursuits at DAGS, but he has always given some time to his family. He always adjusts his schedule to attend his daughter's musical concerts and his son's little league games. And for that we have truly an outstanding person as the next Comptroller of the DAGS. I ask my colleagues to support his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Koki added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in support of the nominee.

"I've worked with Bob in the past and have always found him to have time to respond to requests that we've made. It's been said that in order to really measure a man, you need to look at his wife. I can say that his wife is of the highest caliber. Thank you."

Someday the OTEC plants are going to be generating the electricity and water for a lot of the island territories. The OTEC plant in Keahole was the first commercial plant to go into operation.

"I want to congratulate the Matsunaga family because the idea actually started with the late Senator Spark Matsunaga and now his son who is the chair of the Science and Technology has finished the project. I give all the credit to your father, Matt. Thank you very much."

Senator Blair then asked if the previous speaker would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question to the previous speaker and Senator Matsuura having answered in the affirmative, Senator Blair inquired:

"If OTEC will deliver all this energy, does that mean you are withdrawing your support for geothermal?"

Senator Matsuura answered:

"No, I expect that when the oil disappears from this earth we are going to need all the electricity produced by OTEC and also by geothermal. The Big Island is going to be the best place to live because we will not be short of electricity on that island. You can see that people are already riding electric vehicles around Honolulu. That's going to be one of the modes of transportation on the Big Island."

FIFTY-FIRST DAY

Tuesday, April 20, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Pastor Rob Lloyd, Kailua Adventist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fernandes Salling and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fiftieth Day.

Senator Chang presented and introduced Mr. Thomas K. Kaulukukui Sr. to the members of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, Thomas K. Kaulukukui was born in Kalihi and raised on the Big Island where he graduated from Hilo High School. He attended the University of Hawaii at Manoa where he received his bachelors degree in education. While at the University he was an exceptionally talented athlete; he gained a record number of 15 letters for football, basketball, baseball and track, and was the first Rainbow football player to achieve All-America honors from the All-America Board in football.

"Professionally, he has served as the United States marshal of the Hawaii District, assistant professor of health and physical education at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and as the vice president of an insurance company. He has been recognized for his diverse involvement in various organizations and his service to the community.

"Thomas Kaulukukui also served in the Office of Hawaiian Affairs with a career that began with his election in 1980 and spans over a decade, during which time he has been chairman of the board, chairman of the committee on housing, and vice chair of education and culture.

"It is an honor for the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii to present a certificate recognizing Thomas K. Kaulukukui Sr. as he retires from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, to thank him for his immeasurable contributions to the betterment of our community and wish him many more years of happiness and prosperity.

"At this time, Mr. President, it is my honor and privilege to present to this honorable body Thomas K. Kaulukukui Sr.

"Accompanying Mr. Kaulukukui on the floor is Clayton Hee, chairman of the OHA Board of Trustees, and Trustee Abraham Aiona. And, Mr. President, the people who make all things possible, his wife Felice and daughter Carol, seated in the audience." (All stood to be recognized.)

Senator Solomon then added:

"Mr. President, I would like to extend my personal congratulations to Tommy Kaulukukui. I would like the record to note that I had the honor of serving as a trustee with Uncle Tommy on the first Board of Trustees for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. I have to say, Mr. President, that I always admired his tenacity, his commitment especially to young people, his commitment to Hawaiian values -- the Hawaiian way and perception of what is

considered being a whole person, mentally, physically and spiritually. Uncle Tommy has always advocated that strong philosophy and it really has been through his good work as a trustee that we have been able to expand this goodwill throughout the Pacific. And with his work with the Mormon Church, he has done a tremendous job in espousing this philosophy.

"Mr. President, I would like to say that the people of the Big Island are very proud of Tommy Kaulukukui and it gives me a special feeling of aloha that I am able join in this recognition to him. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to add her remarks:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak with aloha of our beloved tutu.

"You know, it's really precious to be able to have people like Thomas Kaulukukui who were the pioneers of people like me and Clayton Hee and others of our generation. There were times when it was very hard to be a Hawaiian and you made it possible for us to be proud, not only today but throughout your years, and you gave so willingly to whatever organization you belonged to.

"You certainly are a star and you will forever be shining. May God bless you and your lovely family and may you live out your years in peace. Aloha!"

Mr. Kaulukukui was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator Chang and Senator Solomon presented him a lei. Mr. Hee and Mr. Aiona were presented leis by Senators A. Kobayashi and Tungpalan.

Senator Graulty then introduced Ms. Barbara Wright, as follows:

"This morning the staff members in the House and the Senate had an opportunity to participate in a workshop that was presented by someone who has given the same workshop to over 80,000 people in the State of Hawaii. This particular person is a consultant with Hawaiian Telephone Company and, out of the goodness of her heart, no charge, she came this morning to help our staff members present a good image of the Legislature by way of their telephone manners.

FIFTY-SECOND DAY

Wednesday, April 21, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Robert Fraser, First Unitarian Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-First Day.

Senator Graulty introduced the Senate Ways and Means Committee staff, as follows:

"Mr. President, as you know, we started the budget conference at 4:00 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Everyone knows what a critical time that is during our session. But there's a group of individuals who, despite the criticalness of the time, took the time to think of others, i.e., the people who go hungry in our state, and it's my real pleasure to introduce to all the Senators this morning, about 15 members of the Senate Ways and Means staff, who yesterday afternoon trooped to my office with 25 bags of rice and other assorted canned goods in support of our Senate campaign for the 1993 Food Bank Drive. I'm really proud of them and I'm thankful to them for their efforts and their generosity and I'd like the Senators to acknowledge their contribution to the Food Bank Drive.

"Mr. President, 1300 pounds of food so far have been contributed on the Senate side. This now puts us over the 1500-pound mark. So, thank you very much to the Senate Ways and Means staff and thank you Senator Kobayashi."

The staff of the Ways and Means Committee, in the audience, raised their hands to be recognized.

Senator B. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator McCartney, recognized members of the Hawaii State PTSA: Ms. Linda Hodge, president, and Ms. Cindy Yocom, seated in the audience. Senator Kobayashi said, "This afternoon, the Capitol grounds will be the scene of a rally supporting education. The members of the Hawaii State PTSA urge the members of the Senate to attend. Thank you."

Senator Hagino then introduced Vern Call and Rose Albert and members of the Work Hawaii Hoala program, as follows:

"Mr. President, with us this morning are members of the Work Hawaii Hoala program. The Hoala program is a federally-funded program for low-income single parent families. It offers employment training for youth and adults. The leaders are Vern Call and Rose Albert." (The leaders and members, seated in the audience, stood to be recognized.)

Senator McCartney, in recognition of "Hawaii Week of the Young Child" and "Worth Wage Day" presented Ms. Leanne Errett of Rainbow School, Ms. Stephanie Osurman of Hokulea Schools, Ms. Jayne Miyasato of Seagull Schools, and Mr. Chuck Larson, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my privilege to introduce today some people who are here to represent Hawaii's child care providers. Last week was 'Hawaii Week for the Young Child' and today is 'Worthy Wage Day.' We all know

how important our children are in our future and how they are the foundation of our future and early childhood education is very, very important in the success of children. In fact, research indicates that for every dollar invested in comprehensive early childhood education, we will save approximately \$7.00 later on in remediation, social services and institutionalization.

"With that in mind, Mr. President, we all know how expensive child care is and the actual cost of providing child care in this state far exceeds the wages paid to child care workers. And what that means is actually the people subsidizing the system of our child care providers are more specifically the baby-sitters, like the one I have in Nuuanu, or the teachers in the system. Today, they would like to present us with a check and I'd like to tell the Ways and Means chairman that we finally found some They would like to present us with a check for \$146,347,120.00 which is the difference between the cost of child care and the amount paid out to workers, and that's the subsidy that they're giving us. Mr. President, that's the check we can use to balance the budget in budget conference. Mr. President, Mr. Chuck Larson would like to present you with that check. (President Aki accepted the check with thanks.)

"The check will help some of the programs Senator Kobayashi is trying to push through for women and children. We'll put that first on the agenda.

"Mr. President, it is my honor and privilege to introduce Ms. Leanne Errett of Rainbow School, Ms. Stephanie Osurman of Hokulea Schools, Ms. Jayne Miyasato of Seagull Schools, and Mr. Chuck Larson. Thank you for being here today."

The group rose to be recognized. Senator Kanno presented the Senate certificate of recognition and Senators Iwase, Ikeda, McCartney and Kanno presented the leis.

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Please note, Mr. President, that these achievements were accomplished over a period of only eight years.

"In addition, the large volume of testimony received by your Committee on Executive Appointments was remarkably consistent in its praise of Mr. Marks' strong legal skills and exceptional ability to assist various state agencies with a variety of legal matters. I believe Robert Marks is an exceptional candidate for state Attorney General.

"For those reasons, I strongly support the advise and consent of the Senate for his appointment, and urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 234. Thank you."

Senator Graulty added his support of Mr. Marks and said:

"Mr. President, just a few brief words in support of the nomination and nominee.

"Mr. President, when Bob Marks was in private practice I had not just one case but many cases with Bob, and it was always a pleasure dealing with Bob because I always knew that I was dealing with a real gentleman. "Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of all the Governor's Messages included in Standing Committee Report 1638.

"Your Committee on Executive Appointments had a confirmation hearing on all the nominees. All the testimony was in unanimous support of the nominees and I urge my colleagues to vote in support of the Governor's Messages as designated in Standing Committee Report 1638. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, yesterday I mentioned about the major breakthrough in the field of energy (the open-cycle OTEC). Today I have another good news. The geothermal well has been vented with no adverse effect. The H2S level has been in the realm of about 3 parts per billion. In about an hour they'll pass the steam through the power plant and, hopefully, by Friday we will have electricity on the line on the Big Island. I cite all these things because I want to give credit to the late Sparky Matsunaga because he was instrumental in getting this alternative energy started in Hawaii. Matt, again, thank you for your father's vision.

"Mr. President, there is a fact sheet from the Pacific International Center for High Technology Research, regarding the 210 kWe open-cycle ocean thermal energy

conversion experimental facility, which I would like to have inserted into the Journal. Thank you."

The Chair approved the inclusion of the fact sheet and it states:

"The 210 kWe(gross) Open-Cycle Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion (OTEC) Experimental Facility

There are, basically, two approaches to the extraction of thermal energy from the oceans, one referred to as 'closed-cycle' and the other 'open-cycle.' In the closed-cycle, warm surface seawater and cold deep seawater are used to vaporize and condense a working fluid, such as ammonia, which drives a turbine-generator in a closed loop producing electricity. In the open-cycle, surface seawater is flash-evaporated in a vacuum chamber at pressures of approximately 3% atmospheric. The resulting low-pressure steam is used to drive a turbine-generator. Cold seawater is used to condense the steam after it has passed through the turbine. The open-cycle can, therefore, be configured to produce fresh water as well as electricity.

Several small proof-of-concept facilities have been operated for up to six months, but unfortunately, minimal operational data has been obtained. These projects demonstrated that both cycles are technically feasible and limited only by the large diameters required for the cold water pipes to sizes of no more than about 100 MW gross. In the case of the open-cycle, due to the low-pressure steam the turbine is presently limited to sizes of no more than 3 MW gross.

As the next step towards answering some of the questions related to the operation of OTEC plants, realizable with the minimal funding available, a small OC-OTEC landbased experimental facility has been installed and will be operated until 1995 at the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii (NELH), Kailua-Kona, Hawaii. The offshore and inland seawater piping system (1 m cold water pipe) already installed at NELH is utilized. The power block is built around a single, vertical-axis, mixed-flow turbine supported by a concrete vacuum vessel, 7.6 m in diameter and 9.5 m high. The electrical generator is located above the turbine assembly and outside the vacuum enclosure. Steam is produced in an annular flash evaporator at the periphery of the vacuum vessel. The steam flows up from the evaporator and enters the turbine radially inward. The steam exits the turbine axially in the center of the vessel. A conical exhaust diffuser is used for pressure recovery. The condenser is a direct-contact, structuredpacking condenser composed of two coaxial stages. The non-condensible gases liberated from the seawater streams, at pressures of 1% to 3% atmospheric, and a small amount of uncondensed steam are compressed and exhausted using a multiple-stage vacuum compression system. All subsystems have been instrumented to measure the parameters required to assess performance.

This experimental facility will demonstrate the feasibility of the low pressure open-cycle turbine and the high efficiency vacuum compression subsystems. Additionally, the production of net power will be demonstrated; therefore, the system is also referred to as the Net Power Producing Experiment, or NPPE. The turbine-generator nominal gross output is 210 kWe for a surface temperature of 26°C and a deep water temperature of 6°C. Given the infrastructure already available at NELH, only 40 to 50 kWe net will be obtained. As of March 1993, the highest surface temperature available was 25°C (the range at the side is from 24°C to 28°C) and 190 kWe (gross) has been produced. This is a world record for OTEC."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, will the chairman of the Education, Labor and Employment Committee yield to a question?"

The President posed the question to the chairman and Senator McCartney having responded in the affirmative, Senator Holt inquired:

"Mr. President, as I recall, at last year's Democratic Convention, the Democratic Party adopted a provision calling for the dedication of 30 percent of the state's revenue for education. We all know that the chairman strongly supported this concept. Can he tell us if we have reached this level of funding in the Senate's version of the budget?"

Senator McCartney answered:

"Mr. President, it's questionable whether I supported the 30 percent or 35 percent but, no, the Senate budget doesn't reach that level but what we can be proud of in the Senate budget is that we are \$11.9 million above the governor's budget recommendation; we are significantly above the House recommendation. I believe the conferees of the Senate and the House are working very hard to improve the quality of education in the budget recommendations, including restructuring the way we fund schools."

Senator Holt continued:

"Mr. President, the reason for my question was to check on our progress toward one of the more important goals that we as a majority party adopted. I hope that in the few remaining days of the session, we will be able to do more for education than what we have now. I'm making these remarks because I think it should be one of our top priorities. If anything, the welfare of our educational system, both the DOE and UH, should be our most important priority. In my mind, and I must agree with the Advertiser's editorial, I believe it was yesterday, that it's even more important than selecting a site for the convention center. Thank you."

Senator Holt, for the Committee on Executive Appointments, presented a report (Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1641) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CLIFFORD K. HIGA for Director of

Commerce and Consumer Affairs, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 237.

In accordance with Senate Rule 36(1), action on Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1641 and Gov. Msg. No. 237 was deferred until Friday, April 23, 1993.

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1639 (Gov. Msg. No. 239):

Senator Holt moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1639 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KEITH W. AHUE for Chairperson, Board of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire December 31, 1994, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Governor's Message 239.

"Mr. President, I'm pleased today to speak on behalf of Keith W. Ahue and to recommend the advise and consent of the Senate for his appointment to the position of Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

"Keith Ahue is a former classmate of mine at the Kamehameha Schools. (Actually, he is one year older. He is Senator Solomon's classmate; she's the same age as me but he's older. Most of you don't know it but in high school Keith was an outstanding athlete. He was an all-state swimmer and water polo player.) He is also a graduate of the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

"As a result of his long tenure with the Hawaii Government Employees Association, where he rose to the level of deputy director, Keith developed a strong background in labor relations and administration. In 1990 his exceptional talents and abilities were recognized by the governor and he was, subsequently, appointed as deputy director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. In 1991 when the the position of the director of Labor and Industrial Relations became vacant, the governor again tapped Keith Ahue to fill the vacancy. The governor must be truly impressed with Mr. Ahue's talents, Mr. President, because just two years later we are now acting on his latest appointment as chairman of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

"On a personal note, Mr. President, I have had the opportunity to work with Mr. Ahue on numerous occasions during his short but highly successful tenure in state government. I can, therefore, verify that the high praise which consistently echoed throughout the testimonies received by your Committee on Executive Appointments during the hearing are indeed well-deserved and accurate. Coupled with the fact that this nominee was confirmed by the Senate as labor director last year, I have no reservations in recommending the advise and urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 239. Thank you."

Senator Solomon stood to speak in support of Keith Ahue and said:

"Mr. President, as you know, land-use issues are very critical in the State of Hawaii and being that 48 percent

of all of the aina in the County of Hawaii comes under the jurisdiction of the Department of Land and Natural Resources it is very important that we select the right leader for DLNR. I feel very confident that with the appointment of Mr. Ahue many of these conflict of landuse issues will be resolved for the Island of Hawaii.

"As you know, environmental issues are paramount on the Big Island. We are the only county where a Green Party candidate was very successful in the last election. It's quite obvious that, in terms of DLNR's leadership position, this person has to be a person of sensitivity, a person of cultural awareness, a person that is willing to work with all of the diverse groups.

"I was very much impressed with Mr. Ahue when I attended a few meetings called by Senator Tungpalan in trying to resolve the Waipio Valley issue. Mr. Ahue was articulate on the issues. He tried to bring all of the community groups together and bringing together of the community groups will be the norm in the future of Hawaii and we need a person who can in fact do that. This is why I'm urging all of my colleagues to vote 'yes.' Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Holt then introduced Mr. Ahue, as follows:

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY

Friday, April 23, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Harrison; and a very special guest, the former Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court and the person for whom the Law School is named, William S. Richardson. (All stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, our Law School Moot Court Team recently competed in the Philip Jessup International Law Moot Court competition before the International Court of Justice. More than 55 teams representing over 35 countries participated in this national/international competition held in Washington, D.C. The UH team was one of 12 teams from the United States who earned the right to participate by winning regional competitions.

"Not only did our team capture the national title but it also earned the 'World's Champion Runner Up' Cup by finishing second in the international competition, losing only to the University of Melbourne in the final round. Honors earned along the way included the Rutgers Award for the best memorial among the 12 United States regional winners, the Hardy C. Dillard Award for best memorial among the the international regional winners, and the Top Oralist Award went to team captain David McCauley.

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Senate, I am proud to present the members of our 1993 Moot Court Team: David McCauley, David Forman, Karla Winter, Andrew Bunn, and Professor Jon Van Dyke, their coach. Seated with the team, Dean Jeremy Harrison and, our very special friend, William S. Richardson." (All stood to be recognized. A Senate certificate of recognition and lei was presented to each of them by various Senators.)

Senator Graulty then said:

"Mr. President, as a proud graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law, I want to add my own personal congratulations to the team and, also, to acknowledge my Constitutional law professor Jon Van Dyke, and the person who taught me Wills and Trusts, Dean Jeremy Harrison and, of course, the Father of the Law School, William S. Richardson. Welcome! Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga added:

"Mr. President, I would also like to offer my congratulations to the Law School. For many of us who had an opportunity to go to the Law School and to actually be beneficiaries of former Chief Justice Richardson's remarkable vision for what Hawaii could offer and produce, it is truly a significant moment to know that we have now produced world class leaders. Thank you."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, I wish Senator Chang were here. On his behalf, I wish to make a request of Professor Van Dyke; that he give the Senate a refresher course in the privileges and immunities clause, the commerce clause, and the equal protection clause. We have a bill before us that's causing some difficulty. Thank you."

Senator Holt then remarked:

"Mr. President, a couple of things. First, I see my exboss up there and want to thank him for all his years of service at Bishop Estate and for his support of Hawaii's children. Thank you, 'CJ.'

"Secondly, I want to be sure that this is the same David Forman that I know. (Yes!) I don't want to speak about the wrong person. On his behalf, I want this body to know that he is a local boy that did good here in Hawaii; went on to my alma mater, Harvard. As a fellow alumnus, he played ball there and graduated with honors. I just want to extend my personal congratulations to David. Thank you."

Senator Graulty then introduced the parents of David Forman, Michael and Sheila Forman, and the parents of Andrew Bunn, Mr. and Mrs. Bunn, who were all seated in the gallery.

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Holt, for the Committee on Executive Appointments, presented a report (Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1642) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DAYTON N. NAKANELUA for Director of Labor and Industrial Relations, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 238.

In accordance with Senate Rule 36(1), action on Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1642 and Gov. Msg. No. 238 was deferred until Monday, April 26, 1993.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1641 (Gov. Msg. Nos. 237):

Senator Holt moved that Ldr. Com. Rep. No. 1641 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried.

Senator Holt then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CLIFFORD K. HIGA for Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, term to expire December 5, 1994, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Holt rose to speak in support of the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Governor's Message 237.

"Mr. President, I'm pleased to speak on behalf of Clifford K. Higa and to recommend the advise and consent of the Senate for his appointment to the position of Director of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs.

"By way of background, Mr. Higa is a graduate of Baldwin High School and the University of Hawaii where he earned an undergraduate degree in political science and a juris doctor from the William S. Richardson School of Law. Shortly thereafter, he was employed as a law

clerk for both the State Intermediate Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court.

"In 1982 he applied for a position with the Attorney General's office and was subjected to a thorough and rigorous review by the supervising attorney. It is my understanding, Mr. President, that the supervising attorney who hired Mr. Higa did so with reservations. Much to my surprise, however, the former supervising attorney now proudly claims to have hired Mr. Higa off the street and taught him everything he knows. If I'm mistaken about this matter, Mr. President, I'm sure that the Senator from the 18th District will be more than In any case, Mr. Higa's pleased to respond. administrative ability and strong legal aptitude are well known. As a result, he was selected to fill the position of Commissioner of Financial Institutions in DCCA in 1987. He has been with DCCA since then and over the last few months he has been serving as its acting director.

"On a personal note, Mr. President, I think that Mr. Higa exemplifies the many unsung public servants in the state whose accomplishments and achievements, while vitally important, are largely unrecognized by the general public. In this light, Mr. President, I was particularly impressed by the unusually large amount of supportive testimony that we received from the financial institutions that Mr. Higa is in charge of regulating. What was most striking was the obvious respect that the financial industry has developed for Mr. Higa. Even though he is often required to take a strong adversarial position against them, they found him to be fair and sensitive to their concerns.

"As evidenced in testimony, Mr. Higa is also well regarded by his staff at DCCA. It was noted several times that he was primarily responsible for upgrading the professionalism of his staff by requiring and obtaining national accreditation for the Financial Institutions Division.

"In closing, I would like the members to note that Mr. Higa has turned down a number of substantial offers from the private sector during his tenure at DCCA in order to remain in public service. I think that this speaks well of him and is indicative of his strong commitment and desire to serve the public.

"For the reasons cited, Mr. President, I will be voting in support of Governor's Message 237 and urge my colleagues to join me. Thank you."

Senator Chang also spoke in support of Mr. Higa and

"Mr. President, I also served as an assistant to the Senator from the 18th District when he was with the Department of the Attorney General, and I know full well the kinds of false claims that a supervising attorney can make. Thus, I'm not believing for one minute the story that the chairman of Appointments Committee told about the candidate. I am positive, however, that anyone who could have endured any length of time working with that supervising attorney must be a good candidate for the position and for that reason I'm voting in full support of the nominee. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda also added her support and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the nomination of Clifford Higa.

"As chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection I've had the opportunity to work with Mr. Higa over a number of years and as the Commissioner of Financial Institutions a lot of credit has to go to him for the

recodification of the laws governing financial institutions. It was not an easy task. It's taken three years. It didn't happen without a lot of kicking and screaming on the part of people involved, but I think that he's been firm and fair. We now have a good document before us which also has the support of the people within the industry. So I think that he's shown that he can do a very good job despite his beginnings under the tutelage of our Senator from the 18th District, and notwithstanding that, I recommend his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Blair also spoke in support of the nominee and remarked:

"Mr. President, very briefly, on behalf of the many citizens from County of Maui, I wish to add some remarks.

"I worked with Clifford Higa when I chaired the Consumer Protection Committee and was fully prepared to confirm him because I know from personal experience that he is well qualified. But I want the record to also reflect that I've gotten quite a few comments from people in my new district who know the Higa family. They wanted to be sure that I didn't inadvertently fail to support a son of the Garden Island (sic). The Higa family is very well regarded and the community has expressed its aloha for the work that Clifford and his father have done over the years. It's great to see the son continuing in the family tradition and achieving as much as he has.

"On behalf of the Maui delegation, I'd like the Journal to reflect the pride that Maui County feels on the occasion of Clifford Higa being confirmed by the Senate. Thank you."

Senator Chang then said:

"Mr. President, if the Senator from Maui spent more time on geography and less on the commerce clause, he would know that Maui is the Valley Isle, not the Garden Isle." (Laughter.)

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, I normally take the position that the Senate Journal should not be corrected, but in this instance I must be seech you on bended knees to have the Journal reflect my reference as being to the Valley Island. Thank you."

The Chair then asked: "Who is this Senator from the 18th District?" (Laughter.)

Senator Iwase responded:

"Mr. President, in deference to Mr. Higa, today I'm from the 17th District. Thank you." (Laughter.)

Senator Tungpalan also added her support of the nominee, as follows:

"Mr. President, I also rise to speak in favor of the nominee.

"Mr. President, I found Clifford Higa to be very knowledgeable, especially while I was chair of the Labor Committee in the House during those tumultuous years when we were reworking the statutes. He was fair, honest, above board and always ready to answer any questions with respect to DCCA and the insurance companies that they regulated. I find him to be of the highest caliber and it is indeed an honor that I ask all of our colleagues to vote in favor of him. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator George rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I rise to comment on a piece on resolutions which appeared in the Star-Bulletin I believe a couple of days ago, and I'd like to quote from my old friend Dan Boylan. He is quoted as saying, "Resolutions don't mean much. They're a way for legislators to get out of passing something some people may be bothered by," Boylan said. "The fundamental fact of politics is risk aversion. Lawmakers don't want to be held accountable. When you pass a law, something happens. When you pass a resolution, nothing necessarily happens."

"I would like to call the members' attention to a further article which appeared in the Advertiser on the 21st of April, announcing 'French firm to license abortion pill to

U.S. group,' and remind the Senators of a resolution which was introduced by the Women's Caucus and passed to a great deal of acclaim last year. The title of it indicated that it was 'Urging the President and Congress' and a whole lot of other people 'to support the availability of the antiprogesterone steroid known as RU-486'

"This resolution was directed to, among others, the manufacturers of RU-486, the French firm and the German firm, and while it may have been only a small item in the final result, we think it assisted in the availability of RU-486 to the women of this country. Resolutions can indeed be important and effective."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, in this morning Advertiser editorial page, the late Randy Kalahiki is honored. He is called a 'Bridge-building activist' and I quote,

'All too often, we tend to categorize "activist" and "establishment" as opposites, meeting only at times of confrontation.

'It doesn't have to be that way. Randy Heano Kalahiki, who died this week at the age of 60, was a resolute illustration why.'

"Mr. President, Mr. Kalahiki was a man and an individual who endeavored to solve social issues by bringing together all groups involved. I had the honor of working with Mr. Kalahiki for over 25 years involving Hawaiian issues and education of troubled youths. Mr. Kalahiki was a dedicated unselfish worker and very committed to the causes he believed in.

"It is very sad that Mr. Kalahiki, Randy, is not present to witness the resolution of the Kaho'olawe Island issue, the issues of Hawaiian sovereignty, the furtherance and development of Hawaiian Studies program throughout higher and lower education, which he worked very hard on during his lifetime and which is now on the threshold of realization.

"Hawaii has lost a truly dedicated citizen. Mr. President, in a Hawaiian saying 'Ua halaia eolanapua o'Hawaii' -- although time passes for all of us one's good work is perpetuated by future generations.

"Mr. President, I respectfully request a moment of silence on a rising vote by this body as a manifestation of our respect and honor of the passing of one of Hawaii's great Hawaiians. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then stated:

"Mr. President, as promised, I'm going to share some good news. Finally after many years, the geothermal well has produced some electricity. We have 5 megawatts of electricity on line as of today. The KS-9 well, I'm told, has the resource to produce as high as 25 megawatts from that one geothermal well. They do have a gusher, in terms of an oil well. That's the good news for today. Thank you."

Senator Graulty then said:

"I too have some good news, and bad news, with regard to the Food Bank Drive.

"As we all know, today is the last day. We have till 4:30 this afternoon to finalize all our efforts for Hawaii's hungry. I'd like to thank all the members of the Senate. Everyone participated, even Senator Levin got his 'Top Banana' award this morning and fulfilled his quota.

"It's truly remarkable, Mr. President, that the suggested donation of five pounds was far exceeded by the Senate. We averaged two-and-a-half times that amount. Our goal was 1,560 pounds and thus far, as of 1:00 o'clock this afternoon, we have 3,800 pounds of food that we have donated for our team.

"I would like to thank all the Senators and staff for all the support that has been given to this drive.

"The bad news, Mr. President. I received a phone call from security just at the start of the session that the House had 30 bags of rice downstairs and that there was more coming and as of the moment, as of the last break, there was a total of 140 bags of rice that the House has come up with. I cannot say for sure whether we are going to prevail at this point because this sudden last minute surge on the part of the House has put our lead in great jeopardy. So I would like to ask ... I've been involved in other campaigns before where there is a last minute surge by the opposition, and what I would like to ask is that we continue our style of 'grassroots' and try to get everybody who has not yet donated to donate their suggested donation. We still have four hours.

"I also understand that the House called a recess at 12:30 so that they could all be seen on TV loading their bags of rice on to the truck. Mr. President, we will not stoop that low, we don't need that kind of publicity. Besides, we've already gotten a lot of publicity, courtesy of the Star Bulletin. I hope that the TV cameras will be here on Monday when we claim the plaque that the Food Bank is going to give the winning team."

The Chair thanked Senator Graulty for a job well done on the Senate Food Bank Drive.

Senator McCartney also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I want to thank the Senator from Kohala for speaking about Randy Kalahiki because he really was a great man. He did a lot all over the state and I happened to have the privilege of knowing him. So thank you for making those remarks and thank you for closing the session on that note."

Senator Chang also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, before we adjourn I would like to note that Mr. Kalahiki has been an influential presence in the Richardson School of Law. When we opened the school in 1973, 20 years ago, our introductory exercise involved the construction of a flood control project in Kahaluu and Senators Blair, Fukunaga and myself made a trek out to Kahaluu and learned all about land-use regulation and community struggle from Mr. Kalahiki and the Hui Malama O Aina O Koolau. He was literally our first law school instructor.

"I also join the Senator from Kohala in sharing his memory. Thank you."

FIFTY-FIFTH DAY

Monday, April 26, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Major James A. Greaser, Chaplain, United States Army Support Command, Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Mizuguchi and Tungpalan who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fourth Day.

Senator Graulty presented and introduced Mr. John White of the Hawaii Food Bank, as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my great honor to introduce to the Senators this morning someone who's been involved in community activities for many, many years. I believe he mentioned, when he met with you earlier, that he was first involved in community activities at the Waianae Model Cities Program, and at that time you were not even in politics. This particular person has taken his community involvement one step higher, so to speak, by becoming involved in the drive to stamp out hunger in our state and, at the present time, he is the president of the Hawaii Food Bank.

"In 1982, Mr. President, a Representative by the name of John Waihee initiated a study on the 'Good Samaritan' law which formed the basis of the food bank and we have seen, in our own participation over the past several days, the wisdom of that particular law.

"It's my great pleasure this morning to introduce to the members of the Senate someone who is here to in turn give us some recognition, and may I introduce to this body none other than Mr. John White, the president of the Hawaii Food Bank. (Mr. White, seated on the floor of the Senate, stood to be recognized.)

"Mr. President, I believe he has something in his hand that he would like to present to you and to all of us for the efforts that we have undertaken over the last two weeks. (Mr. White presented Senate President Aki a plaque from the Hawaii Food Bank.)

"Mr. President, may I add that the total amount of pounds collected for the Senate was 9,160 pounds, and I understand from Mr. White that it is a legislative record. There was a total of 15,000 pounds collected by the House and the Senate and with the per capita, Mr. President, we each donated, each of us Senators and staff, 29.3 pounds, far in excess of the suggested 5-pound donation, so it was a tremendously successful campaign. I wish to thank Mr. White for having this campaign, and all the Senators for their support.

"Also present in the audience, this morning, is his administrative assistant, Ms. Mandy McGee." (Ms. McGee, seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.)

The Chair thanked Senator Graulty for a job well done and thanked Mr. White for the plaque of recognition.

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"By way of background, Mr. Nakanelua graduated from St. Louis High School in 1962. Upon his graduation he served in the United States Air Force and was honorably discharged in 1968. He then enrolled at the University of Hawaii and earned a B.B.A. degree in personnel and industrial relations.

"His employment history since then includes a variety of labor related positions. He began his career as a job developer for Vietnam era veterans and shortly thereafter joined the State of Hawaii Organization of Police Officers as a supervising agent. In 1979 he entered the civil service system as a personnel management specialist at the State Department of Personnel Services, and in 1982 he left to become executive assistant to the director of the United Public Workers.

"During the public hearing on his nomination, your Committee on Executive Appointments received testimony from a wide variety of people. Despite the variety, however, the consensus was unanimous that Dayton Nakanelua is a widely respected, highly skilled and very successful labor leader who is well qualified to serve as the director of DLIR. As a result, Mr. President, the obvious question that came to mind was: why would such a person want to accept this position for only 20 months? While the question may have been obvious, the answer was not, so I asked him at the hearing. His response, Mr. President, was eloquent in its simplicity and forthright honesty. He spontaneously replied that he had always had a desire to serve the public and that he was confident of his ability to make a contribution in this position within the short tenure.

"Dayton Nakanelua's strong desire to serve the public and his well documented background makes him an excellent candidate for Director of DLIR.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to join me in voting in support of Governor's Message 238. Thank you."

Senator McCartney added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of the nomination.

"As chair of the Education, Labor and Employment Committee I want to say that I wholeheartedly support the nominee. I had the opportunity to meet Dayton when I too used to work for a public employees' union and got to interact with him. I can say that he truly will bring a good management style to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. He truly believes in the workers at the department and will empower them to do the best job possible.

"We had some discussions about what he saw the role of the DLIR to be. I think that he shares the new vision that the cold war between labor and business is over, that business and labor need to work together for Hawaii's future, not only for their own future. I really embrace that attitude and think that he'll do a good job in the months to come and wholeheartedly support his confirmation. Thank you, Mr. President."

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY

Tuesday, April 27, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Pastor Bob Coggins, Diamond Head Seventh-Day Adventist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Tanaka who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fifth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Chang introduced a group of Punahou School students, as follows:

"Mr. President, this morning we have with us visiting students from Punahou School. They are members of the 7th and 8th grade student council. They are officers and class representatives. For the members of the Senate Women's Caucus I want to make the observation that all of the officers of the student council are women this year—a very interesting event. The students are accompanied by Mr. John Saperito, their teacher and guide." (The students and their teacher, seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.)

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mr. Gregg Chong and said, "Gregg is from the beautiful city of Hilo. He is the president of the students' association at the University of Hawaii, Hilo Campus." (Gregg Chong, also seated in the gallery, stood to be recognized.)

Senator B. Kobayashi then presented Mrs. Joan Kanemori, the 1993 Search for Excellence Awardee of the Hawaii Nurses' Association, and Mr. Mark O'Donnell, executive director of the Hawaii Mental Health Association, as follows:

"Mr. President, today I have the honor to introduce a number of people who have distinguished themselves in the field of health.

"On the floor we have with us the American Nurses Association awardee for the Search of Excellence Award for 1993. This award is given this year to Mrs. Joan Kanemori, a clinical nurse at the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at the Kapiolani Children's Hospital. She is being honored by the American Nurses Association and the Hawaii Nurses Association for her outstanding leadership as a practitioner, as a teacher, and as a professional. Jane Kanemori graduated from the University of Hawaii with a B.S.N. in nursing and has practiced in a number of places, largely in Hawaii. Joan Kanemori, please stand to be recognized. (Mrs. Kanemori stood to be recognized.)

"I think that many of us who have visited the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit can attest to the extraordinary skill, dedication and human emotion involved in that unit. I've been in that unit and seen babies, literally a pound-and-ahalf babies, that would never have lived just 15 years ago. I myself have had several cousins who never lived beyond a few hours and few days and those babies today would now lead healthy lives.

"With Mrs. Kanemori is her husband Walter, Ms. Jennifer Hamada, R.N. at Kapiolani, and her parents,

Mrs. June Harizumi and Mr. Naoshi Harizumi." (All stood to be recognized.)

Senator B. Kobayashi presented Mrs. Kanemori with the Senate certificate of recognition and Senator Holt presented a lei. The Kanemori family and friend were presented leis by various Senators.

Senator B. Kobayashi also introduced the honoree's little daughter Michelle Kanemori, Nancy McGuckin-Smith of the Hawaii Nurses Association and two colleagues of the honoree, Kitha Scherbinske and Adele Auyong.

Senator B. Kobayashi then continued:

"Mr. President, also with us today is Mr. Mark O'Donnell, executive director of the Hawaii Mental Health Association.

"May is Mental Health Month. It is being recognized as such by the governor, the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu and the Honolulu City Council with a theme 'Ring Out Hope for Mental Health.'

"Mental health is the most prevalent health problem in Hawaii, more common than cancer, lung disease, heart disease, combined. It affects, at one time or another, approximately one out of every five people during their lifetime. Mental health is a disease, not a stigma to be avoided. It is curable; it reaches all phases of society --young, old, rich, poor, male and female; it is characterized at very low levels by anxieties, by insecurities; another level with alcohol and drug abuse, depression, schizophrenia, even alzheimer's disease.

"Mark O'Donnell is recognized as a supporter for mental health awareness in Hawaii and for his good work at the Mental Health Association. Mark, please stand to be recognized." (Mr. O'Donnell stood to be recognized.)

Mr. O'Donnell was presented the Senate certificate of recognition by Senator B. Kobayashi. Senator Tungpalan presented him a lei.

Senator Chang then presented Ms. Pat Tadaki of AD 2 Honolulu, and Mr. Bob Loy of Earthtrust, as follows:

"Mr. President, we have always admired business people who have given their time to others. Ad 2 Honolulu is a group of young professionals in advertising, public relations and related fields. Each year they provide a full scale public awareness campaign for a selected non-profit organization. Most of the time, talent and media are donated, thanks to these dedicated individuals. Their efforts have won six national awards.

"This year their campaign focuses on Earthtrust, an environmental organization dedicated to preserving endangered wild life. You may have seen or heard some of their advertisements, which are already running in the media.

"Today, we'd like to give long overdue recognition to Ad 2 Honolulu for their award-winning public service campaigns.

"With us in the chamber this morning are: Pat Tadaki, public service co-chairman, Ad 2 Honolulu; and Bob Loy, Earthtrust representative. Accompanying the representatives of Ad 2 and Earthtrust, in the gallery, are: Ruth Acadamia, government relations chair for Ad 2 National; Celinda Ayers, president of Ad 2 Honolulu; and

Melissa Chang, government relations director for Ad 2 Honolulu.

"Mr. President, accompanying Melissa Chang is her niece, Ahnya Chang, who was presented to this honorable body ten years ago when she won her first competition. Ahnya, please rise and be recognized. (Ahnya, seated with her classmates from Punahou School, rose to be recognized.)

Senator Chang presented the Senate certificate of recognition to Ms. Tadaki and Mr. Loy. Senators Fukunaga and Blair presented the leis.

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO SENATE BILL NO. 1641

Honorable Members Seventeenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1641, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Capitol.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1641 is to allocate office space in the State Capitol for the exclusive use of the legislative branch or of the executive branch, and to require the Department of Accounting and General Services to provide operational and maintenance services for the space to be occupied by the Legislature. However, various vital services necessary for efficient building operations and maintenance are not addressed in that exclusive allocation. No space for building operations and office functions of essential services, such as security, informational services, and custodial storage, Those building operations and office functions are not within the control of the Legislature. Lack of space within the building will preclude efficacious operations and maintenance. Further, operational flexibility and organizational needs are hampered since statutory revision will be required whenever space allocations need to be addressed. Assignment of office space through legislation is impractical.

In addition, while provisional space for the executive branch on the fourth floor may be designated by the Legislature, the bill effectively causes the Department of Budget and Finance to be relocated, creating operational difficulties and potential disruptions in integral daily services and activities of the executive branch.

Furthermore, whenever an agency, other than the Department of Accounting and General Services, controls a building, that agency both budgets and provides for its own operational and maintenance services. That methodology is generally the most efficient. However, under this bill, no budget for operations and maintenance is provided.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1641 without my approval.

ORDER OF THE DAY

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 1164, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 1164, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES HEALTH FUND," was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

S.B. No. 1538, S.D. 1, H.D. 2:

Senator B. Kobayashi moved that S.B. No. 1538, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"I've been working on the procurement bill for about two years now, and this bill is not an emergency medical service bill. If you closely examine the language of the bill, it is truly a procurement bill. This bill should have amended Chapter 103 which have all the provisions of the procurement process. This bill appears to be trying to do a special procurement law for a specific service.

"One of my main concerns is that DAGS has already issued an invitation for bid document that has been prepared, after many months of work, by the Attorney General's office, Department of Health, and the Department of Accounting and General Services. The last day to submit a bid is this Friday. Why are we passing this bill which I think may nullify this bill. Why not just wait and leave it alone and let the procurement process take its place. The lowest responsible bidder gets the contract.

"I've examined this contract and I've examined a lot of other contracts within the last two years of my committee investigation. I've never seen a contract more detailed than this ambulance service contract. This contract is very fair contract for everyone to bid. I am told that the Department of Health is worried that somebody might sue because of this contract. I called the attorney general who wrote this contract. She said, 'One of the objections is the multiple step bidding process in awarding the contract.' I asked, 'Is this the problem?' And the attorney general's response was, 'No, we have done several multi-step bidding process contracts already, and that is not a problem. So you don't have to worry, if somebody sues, we can defend this invitation for bid contract.'

"It is true that many of the employees who are presently working for the existing ambulance company are worried about their jobs. This is one contract that takes care of that. Let me read a portion of this contract. It reads:

'List of employees. In step 3, the bidder submitting the lowest evaluated total bid price in step 2 shall be required to submit within 15 working days, from the date of the letter from DAGS, a complete list of all employees proposed to work under this contract. This list shall include the names and qualifications of the physician, key manager, and ambulance crew as described in the specifications, Section 2-d, personnel, parts 1, 2 and 3, and in special provision evaluation step 3. At this stage of the procurement process, the bidder is required to make all reasonable effort to recruit and hire TNTs and MICTs from the incumbent labor force. Proof of this effort must be presented to Reasonable effort is defined as having the state. accomplished the following at the minimum.' goes on.

"This is exactly why one of the bidders has already started to advertise in the Maui and Molokai newspaper for the existing labor force, that should they, a new company, get the contract they can be hired. They're asking them to work for them because they're going to have to submit the work force within 15 days of the signing of the contract. They'll be given the same wages, pretty much the same benefits, seniority and so on.

"The present company has had this sole source contract for the past seven years. The question is, has this been good for the taxpayers? Would the people of Maui or Molokai be treated any differently if the contract went out for a bid? My contention is that, looking at all the specs, the quality of service that is going to be rendered on Maui and Molokai will be equal to what is happening today. That's the reason why I'm saying passage of this bill is really not necessary. When I examine the present contract, there is no performance bond. There's never been a performance bond on this contract. Why? I found out, that they're using the sole source contract process to avoid the performance bond. This is against the law for this type of emergency service.

"These are the kind of things that I have been picking up in my procurement investigation. It's time that we pass a good procurement bill, and we don't start endrunning some of the procurement process by passing this type of special interest bill. We should continue with the procurement process which they have initiated. The departments worked on this bid for over a year and they used a lot of specialists from the working force to draft this contract bid proposal. I'm asking to let this procurement process continue. This Friday is the deadline. So why are we passing this bill now? Let the people bid, and then evaluate and select the best bid proposal with the least cost.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

"I've been assured, yesterday and previously, that there is no conflict between the bill and the bid specifications that are currently out. The bid specifications that were originally out were revised and in one instance, having to do with the evaluation team or the evaluation committee, changes were made, so the bill and the bid specs coincide.

"I'd like to state that the Department of Health wants this bill. They have said that to myself. They have said that to the prior speaker. They feel that they will have an additional comfort level for possible lawsuits should this bill pass. The reason for passing the bill is not so much the Maui bid specs which are out, but rather, that the Kauai bid specs will be out, perhaps nine months from now in January or February of next year when the Kauai emergency medical service ambulance contract is opened. We will not be able, I believe, in January or February to pass a bill next session in time to affect the Kauai contract.

"I would note that it is the Department of Health, not the Attorney General working for the Department of Accounting and General Services, that is the program manager. The prior speaker had said that he had spoken to the Attorney General and that the Attorney General feels comfortable with the current process. Albeit that the Attorney General feels comfortable with the current process since the Attorney General had shepherded the bid process through, in the end the Attorney General gives advice to the program administrators, the people in

the Department of Health. And on two levels of administration in the Department of Health the people specifically responsible for the emergency service program have said to me they would like the bill. So on this basis, I have persisted in support of the bill.

"I should note further that the question of performance bond is irrelevant to the bill itself. I think that we should have performance bonds and, to the extent necessary, they should be tough performance bonds. But at the risk of perhaps sounding like Betty Tatum of NFIB, I note that every time you have a performance bond you have a cost which is passed on to the taxpayers. Performance bonds in and of themselves don't always help you; they add to cost and, number two, they only protect you if there is failure to perform. If you fail to perform in a service like emergency medical service, no amount of performance bond will solve the problems and the human grief and suffering that may occur. So what you need is a system which will speak to quality early on in the bidding process. And this is what the department has attempted to do in their most recent invitation for bid, and the bill attempts to do this by laying out at least the glimmer of a multi-step process in which, at an early step, qualifications for potential contractors are reviewed. And upon that review they pass on to a second step. Thank

Senator Blair also rose to speak on the measure and said:

"Mr. President, on behalf of my constituents from the Valley Isle, I thank the previous speaker for his words.

"This bill will help to assure that the Department of Health has the flexibility necessary to assure that quality emergency medical service will continue to be provided to the people of Kauai and Maui.

"We've heard a suggestion that the location of this bill, in a particular section of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, is an argument against it. This is nonsense. It was also suggested that Friday is a critical date and that we're rushing this through because there will be a different legal effect from passing today instead of after the date of the responses to the bid proposal. That is equally nonsense. The effective date of the bill is on the signature of the governor. Whether we do it today or a week from today will have no impact on that. Attempts to infer that there is something nefarious about this bill are wholly without merit.

"The important point was made by the Senator from Kaimuki. There is no conflict between the bid specifications, which the Senator from Hilo thinks are excellent, and the bill, which he opposes. Both the community that is going to be served and the agency that is administering the program want the bill.

"It is certainly possible that the taxpayers' economic interest could be better served by providing less appropriate medical service to the people of Maui and Kauai. I have no doubt that we could devise a way of providing cheaper services and that those taxpayers who will not suffer from the diminished service may even applaud us for saving their money. But we must also recognize that in the tradeoff between cost and quality there is not just a benefit to the taxpayers who will save money. There is also a detriment to the people who need emergency medical services of the quality that they are currently getting. The fact that Senator Matsuura may personally believe that, without this bill, the people of Maui and Kauai will continue to get good emergency medical service, and this is not in derogation of the Senator from Hilo, does not make it a fact. He is not, by

experience or otherwise, qualified to predict the future of emergency medical services under various scenarios.

"All that this bill does is give the department the flexibility that it needs to provide the communities with adequate emergency medical service. For that reason, on behalf of my constituents and the citizens on Kauai, I would urge all of the members to vote 'no.'

"As an aside, I'd like to touch on the performance issue that was also addressed by Senator Kobayashi. We need a performance bond when the only criteria is who was the lowest bidder. But once you have a complex process of negotiating a contract the issue of whether the performance bond adds more in cost than it adds in assurance of performance is a very real question. This bill does not purport to dispose of that issue. If Senator Matsuura wants to take that up in the broader context, I would certainly encourage him to do so. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, we've been arguing this issue for a few days and have deferred the bill twice. As a compromise, since some want the bill and some worry about the Friday deadline, could we possibly vote on this bill on Monday? And that would avoid the conflict of the deadline on Friday and the bill will still be passed.

"We can deal with it on Monday so that there would not be any cloud. I feel that this could be a compromise if we could vote on it on Monday."

At 12:48 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:57 o'clock p.m.

Senator B. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, during the recess I believe we have agreed to the following procedure: The bill before us will be debated on the floor today. I've agreed to defer the actual vote on the bill till Monday. On Monday, debate having occurred today, we will vote up or down on the bill. I believe that is the understanding that we currently have on the bill."

Senator Blair then rose to state:

"Mr. President, I have a demonstrated propensity to misstate what I intend. Earlier in this session I referred to the Legislative Management Committee when I meant to refer to the Executive Appointments Committee. I even referred, on one occasion, to Maui as the Garden Isle. Similarly, I previously suggested that members vote against this bill. I want the record to reflect that, in doing so, I once again stuck my foot into my mouth. I'd like to now extract it. I urge the members to vote in favor of the bill."

Senator Matsuura, in support of the measure, then added:

"I guess I gotta say my side of the agreement because we'll vote on it on Monday with no discussion. I'm agreeable to that. However, I just want to get an assurance also that the department also realizes that the date of submittal of the bid continues at 10:00 a.m. on April 30, 1993; just to make sure that this occurs.

"As the last discussion here, I have no problem in terms of the agreement that we have come to and I will agree to no discussion. We will vote up or down on Monday. Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, I just want to make sure that the department gets the message that the bid is made on Friday at 10:00 a.m. or whatever, and because we delayed the bill that we would be very suspect if the date of the bid was also delayed or changed. Thank you."

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 1538, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES," was deferred until Monday, May 3, 1993.

Wednesday, April 28, 1993

The Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 11:43 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend Dr. John Norris, First Christian Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki, Iwase, Matsuura, Nakasato, Solomon and Tungpalan who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Matsunaga presented and introduced the 1993 Miss Hawaii International Beauty Pageant court and semifinalists, as follows:

"Mr. President, the Miss International Beauty Pageant has recognized young women of talent for more than three decades. More than 1,500 young women representing 50 countries have participated in this event, sharing their goodwill with people from other countries.

"Mr. President, it's my pleasure today to introduce the 1993 Miss Hawaii International Beauty Pageant court and semifinalists. I've had the pleasure of working with these young women and I'm happy to say that each of them will be fine ambassadors of goodwill for Hawaii.

"Theresa Tilley is the 1993 Miss Hawaii International. She is from Ewa Beach and attends the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She was also named Miss Friendship. As Hawaii's representative in the Miss International Pageant to be held in Kita-Kyushu, Japan, in October, she will be sharing her aloha for us. Theresa, please stand to be be recognized by the Senate. (Miss Tilley rose to be recognized.)

"Maria Mejias is the 1993 Miss Hawaii International First Runner-Up. She hails from Mililani and attends Mililani High School. Maria, will you please be recognized. (Miss Mejias stood to be recognized.)

"Tami Crawley is the 1993 Miss Hawaii International Second Runner-Up. She is from Hawaii Kai and attends Kapiolani Community College. She was also named Miss Popularity. Tami, will you please be recognized. (Miss Crawley rose to be recognized.)

"I would also like to recognize a 1993 semifinalist who is with us today in the gallery, and that's Tammy Onaha -- will you please stand and be recognized, Tammy. I would also like to recognize Mr. Ron Nishiki, president and co-chairman of the Miss Hawaii International Beauty Pageant. Ron, will you please stand. (Both rose to be recognized.)

"And finally, I'd also like to recognize Ms. Jennifer Kang, the co-chairperson of the Miss Hawaii International Beauty Pageant." (Ms. Kang rose to be recognized.)

Senator Matsunaga presented the congratulatory Senate certificates to the young ladies and Senators Kanno, Matsunaga and Hagino presented the leis.

Senator B. Kobayashi then presented and introduced Mr. Raymond Seto and Mr. Don Anderson of the YMCA of Honolulu, as follows:

"Mr. President, today we have with us on the floor two gentlemen representing the YMCA, the Young Men's Christian Association. In particular, they are here on behalf of the Y's Men Club. Y's men spelled capital 'Y' apostrophe, 's.' This club, of course, is also known to be wise, spelled w-i-s-e.

"Hawaii has the distinct honor of having Mr. Raymond Seto as president-elect of the U.S. Area of the International Association of the Y's Men's Clubs. Mr. Seto will be installed as the U.S. Area president in July in Monterey, California. Ray Seto has been active in the YMCA for over 30 years. He is a charter member of the Kaimuki-Waialae Y's Men Club and has done virtually everything within the Y at sometime or another. He's held every manner of office imaginable. He's raised many thousands of dollars per year. He has volunteered to do everything from painting to bottle-washing, and he has been an invaluable member of the YMCA community, in particular, the Kaimuki-Waialae Branch. (Mr. Seto stood to be recognized.)

"As U.S. Area president of the International Association of Y's Men's Clubs, Ray will be able to lend his special gift of volunteering others to help in good causes.

"Also with us is Don Anderson, president and chief executive officer of the YMCA of Honolulu. Thank you, Don." (Mr. Anderson stood to be recognized.)

Senator B. Kobayashi presented the Senate certificate of recognition and Senators Tungpalan and Mizuguchi presented the leis.

Senator McCartney presented and introduced Mr. Don Doser and Mr. Joseph Trehern, as follows:

"Mr. President, as Labor and Employment chair, it is my pleasure today to introduce one of our outstanding leaders in the labor field. We all know the role labor plays in our community. It's more than just representing workers. It's about giving back something to the people and to their communities and that's why labor unions were founded and that's why they exist -- to give something back and to get people to work together to make this world a better place.

"Today we have the honor of having the president of the Operating Engineers Local 3, which represent Northern California, Nevada, Utah and Hawaii, with over 35,000 members -- Mr. Don Doser.

"Mr. President, the Senate certificate reads:

'Don Doser began his career in the construction industry as a laborer, and worked his way up through the ranks as a journeyman heavy equipment operator, foreman, and superintendent. Taking an active interest in Local 3, Don served as a business agent before becoming president in June 1988. Most notable of his many contributions as president, was providing Hawaii's operating engineers their first opportunity to freely choose union leadership through the secret ballot process.

'More recently, Don exhibited his leadership skills by assisting Kauai residents following Hurricane Iniki. Don was instrumental in setting up a disaster relief office on Kauai for their membership, spearheading a statewide fundraising drive that raised approximately \$10,000 for Kauai members, and securing an additional donation of \$50,000 from the Operating Engineers Local Union 3 for the Hurricane Iniki relief effort.'

"In that light, Mr. President, we'd like to recognize Don Doser for his contributions to the communities of Hawaii, especially Kauai. Will you please stand to be recognized by the Senate. (Mr. Doser rose to be recognized.)

"Accompanying Don today is their district representative, somebody we are very familiar with, Joseph Trehern."

As the Senator who represents many of the major ranches in the State of Hawaii and, in fact, my family has been in the ranching business for three generations, I cannot help but to agree with the remarks of the previous speaker.

"The qualities of being a rodeo queen is not just being beautiful and good-looking, but you must also be competent and acquire the skills of horsemanship. This demands a lot of work and dedication on the parts of both the participant and their families. The art of rodeo is a family sport in Hawaii.

"We have seen many bills come past our desks as to whether or not rodeo violates animal rights. I've always been a very strong supporter of rodeo and I'm hoping that rodeo will continue in the State of Hawaii.

APPOINTMENT OF CONFEREE

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege. This is in reference to an article in the newspaper about tourism funding for Kauai because of Hurricane Iniki.

"Before I proceed, Mr. President, would the good Senator who chairs the Ways and Means Committee answer a question?"

The Chair posed the question to the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and Senator A. Kobayashi having answered in the affirmative, Senator Fernandes Salling asked:

"Senator, could you tell us how much money has been budgeted for Kauai's tourism package for this fiscal year and the next fiscal year?"

Senator A. Kobayashi answered:

"Yes. All funding for Kauai projects were lumped together into a Kauai package, decided upon by a committee of Kauai appointees. As far as I know, funding for the first year is \$2 million with another million of federal funds coming in. The second year will be \$1 million, for a total of \$4 million."

Senator Fernandes Salling then continued:

"Thank you, Senator.

"Mr. President, I'm rising on a point of personal privilege to object publicly that Kauai will not be getting a fair shake after this Legislature adjourns.

"Despite what we've been hearing from the media about the millions of dollars the people of Kauai will

receive this year, the reality is that Kauai is only going to get a drop in the bucket.

"After you, Mr. President, ignored the need for a special Senate committee to oversee the needs of Kauai, you selected another Senator from another district to act I objected then: how can you as your facilitator. effectively solve anything unless we take a more attentive in depth approach to a complex situation involving numerous problems? Regardless of our earlier discussion on this matter (and we even kicked around who should sit on this committee) you backed out and announced a 'regional coordinator' to oversee legislation on behalf of Kauai's people. I strongly disagreed with your decision, and many of my constituents felt the same way, but I deferred to you with the sad hope that my constituents would still get the attention they deserve. I have dutifully fulfilled my role as watchful bystander while being ignored for the most part.

"And at this point, Mr. President, I would like to say that I commend the legislators from Kauai in the House of Representatives for the hard work that they have done in trying to secure what funds they were able to secure to help restore Kauai from the catastrophe of Hurricane Iniki.

"Mr. President, I can't be quiet any longer about some of the other needs that were not addressed. I and others were reassured many times this session that our various needs would be addressed. Yet, if that were true, how can you justify \$750,000 for a race car when the Kauai visitor industry will be lucky to get perhaps two million to three million from the state within the first fiscal year and needing to get an additional three million in the second fiscal year in order to provide the kind of promotional marketing effort that this county needs?

"Mr. President, this industry, the economic lifeline of an entire island community, simply cannot begin to get back on its feet with this small show of support, and it is a far, far cry from the six million we've been reading about in the papers and which amount was stated in the House committee report as the sum that the House intended to fully fund for Kauai for their tourism recovery effort.

"I'd like to thank the Senator of the Ways and Means Committee for, along with the one million that the governor provided in the base, for providing the additional two million, but I again reiterate that it does fall short of the bare-bones six million minimum that Kauai people were asking to begin a marketing project for the island to get back on its feet. And especially in the second year, how can you provide for any type of marketing plan when you have no idea what kind of funds will be available, when perhaps you are told that this is just an amount that will be looked at again next year and perhaps additional funds will be provided again then. I submit to you that it is impossible for people to develop any type of comprehensive marketing program with that kind of approach.

"The three million dollars or so funds we've heard about which was to be used to promote tourism -- to let people know that the Garden Island has recovered and that she opens her arms to visitors -- represent the hope of many back home who know that unless the hotels are back on line and unless the residents get to work the island's economy will go down the tube and everyone will continue to suffer.

"Unless normal life returns at a faster and more acceptable pace, I'm afraid, Mr. President, for the well-being of Kauai. Regardless of the early media and government attention, the people want their stories told

and retold simply because too many feel awfully neglected still and overlooked now that the immediate danger is out of the way. I am angry to say that I think they are right. They're being neglected, they are being overlooked, and they have every right to be more than disappointed when their public officials, including the so-called 'regional coordinator,' do not demonstrate through their actions and decisions the foresight, compassion or understanding of the depths of the anxiety, panic, scared and powerless feelings that still plague the people, the community and our island to this very day.

"The reality is that Kauai is still in a state of emergency as it struggles to recover and all is definitely not well.

"Heroin has reared its ugly head on the Garden Island. Abuse of alcohol and other substances is already high, not to mention the lesser violence and acts symptomatic of a society in distress. I find it a tragedy that people, including our youth, are so depressed or in despair that some are resorting to suicide over problems that most of us would normally be able to handle. I only hope that the budget provides for enough resources for Kauai to cope with what professional experts back home tell me is a real tidal wave of woe and social ills to come.

"Things are not normal despite what others tell you. The stress of not being able to live normal lives is affecting the very fiber of the Kauai community. From make-shift roofs, leaky toilets, repossessed cars, unemployment, severe overcrowding, questionable evictions to circumvent the rent freeze imposed by the governor, crippled infrastructure, damaged schools, cancelled insurance policies, a serious crime rate, rising costs ... virtually everyone has undergone a major change in lifestyle and quality of life. Nearly everything that the rest of the state enjoys and takes for granted is just a distant memory for the majority of Kauaians.

"Are we doing something about all this? From what I can see -- aside from the bill to assess a statewide utility surcharge, money to repair our seriously damaged schools, perhaps 3 to 5 million to the county to help cover loss in services due to loss in real property tax collections, money to the county to deal with their refuse problem and some TAT relief to our hotels -- it appears though that we have eliminated positions from the courts and the Department of Human Services that are vitally necessary to deal with the human tidal wave of woe. With very little prior notice, about two days ago in fact, the Kauai satellite information office, a lifeline for people to access help from state government agencies, is in the way of virtually being eliminated. And unless there is a miracle, we won't even see a mere \$250,000 request, a small sum, but nevertheless identified by the Governor's Task Force as critical to their plan to expedite the repair and replacement of homes on Kauai. Moreover, our Department of Water has asked us for \$400,000 to upgrade the system damaged by the hurricane.

"Are these amounts so huge that it warrants remarks that Kauai is getting too much money? Are these requests so unreasonable that it warrants this body to ignore them?

"But more importantly, when the health and welfare of an entire island is on the line, is this how we should be responding to its cries for help by nickle and diming its every request with the bottom line strictly in terms of dollars instead of honestly assessing what is needed? What kind of message do we send to Kauai by approving a budget that does not properly address and assess the needs of our people?"

Senator Iwase also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege to briefly respond to the remarks made by the Senator from Kauai, if this is appropriate.

"First of all, I think we can fully understand the concerns expressed by the Senator from Kauai. She has, throughout this session, been a strong advocate for the needs of the residents of Kauai. Secondly, Mr. President, I know that you fully recognize the problems faced by the Kauai residents and I want to take this opportunity to thank you for the privilege and for the honor of leading the coordinating efforts in the Senate to address the needs of Kauai.

"I agree with the statements made by the Senator from Kauai that we should and must recognize the hard work of the House members from Kauai with whom I have worked closely to develop the programs which will be before this body in House Bills 1124, 1126, 1120, 1154 and others.

"We have done all that we can, within the budgetary constraints facing the state, to provide the relief that is needed for Kauai. And just to recite some of these things, Mr. President, we are talking about \$13 million from the general fund to provide relief for Kauai. We are talking about \$3.5 million in CIP bond relief, specifically for damages to Iniki. Neither of these include other fundings provided by the Ways and Means Committee for schools on Kauai, for example, that will be forthcoming.

"I also am rather saddened that the bill to impose a statewide utility surcharge is dismissed by the Senator from Kauai as being minimal help to Kauai. The surcharge, Mr. President, demonstrates just how much the people of this state care about helping Kauai. We are asking, and I'm sure some of us here have heard protests from some of our ratepayers, but we are asking the people of Oahu, the people of Maui and the people of the Big Island to add a cost to their electric bills, and to their phone bills, to assist the people of Kauai. I would hope that the sacrifice we are asking of them will be recognized by all of us. We have done the best that we can, Mr. President.

"With respect to my working with the Kauai House delegation, Mr. President, what I am most impressed by and what I am most thankful for in my interaction with Representatives Kawakami, Kanoho and Ishii-Morikami is that they share a deep concern about the needs of Kauai, but they were also very sensitive to the fact that we have a budget shortfall; that we have problems elsewhere in the state; that some of these problems rise in severity to the level of those being faced by the residents of Kauai. They said to me, 'We will get what we have to get, but we know that you must provide for other areas of this state, for example Hawaiian Airlines, and the Hamakua issue.' I want to thank them for that. I want to thank them for their understanding. I want to thank them for their support. I want to thank them for their help and their input.

"This is the best job that we can do, Mr. President. I am proud of it. I want to thank you for the opportunity to serve as your Senate coordinator for the Iniki relief package. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator A. Kobayashi also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, the Ways and Means Committee struggled to provide the funding that we could for Kauai. As you know, we are in a recession. Our tax revenues are down. Whenever we spent money in one place, we had to move it from another. And everyone made sacrifices to make sure that monies went to Kauai.

"When we put our CIP budget together, the first thing we gave money to were the schools and libraries on Kauai. Those had first preference. Everyone sacrificed monies for schools that were badly needing repair in their district to make sure that the Kauai schools were repaired, their libraries were taken care of, books were provided.

"In the area of health, we gave more money to the SHIP program just to go to Kauai, also employment training.

"And we worried also not only about the physical part that needed to be fixed, there were also the human services programs. And so the Office of Youth Services flew to Kauai, the Boys and Girls Club went there on their own expense to set up programs that will be ready by summer. We were able to get federal funding to match the money the state will be providing for these youth programs. We are providing money for the elderly. We even increased POS money specifically for Kauai.

"I feel that we've done what we can. We would like to do more and I think everyone in the state would like to do more, but there are so many needs also in other areas. Waianae was also hit by the hurricane. And there are certain basic needs of other people in the state that we also have to take care of. So although we all made sacrifices, there were also other needs we had to take care of, and we felt that we provided as much as we can. There's still next year. We can't solve everything in one year, and there's still next year. We hope that the economy gets better and we can provide more money.

"I'd like to thank the chair of the Committee on Kauai for the work that he did. He worked very hard with the legislators from Kauai to provide the best package possible. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, also on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, as an addendum to the Senator from Kauai's remarks, in March 1993, there was a questionnaire sent to the residents of Kauai. The results have been tabulated with a total of 970 responses. The information received supports the Senator of Kauai's remarks. Respondents of this survey indicated residents still feel a great sense of loss -- they feel more could be done to help them in terms of their employment and economic losses. Coming from a similar economic situation as it relates to the Hamakua crisis of the Big Island, I can identify with those sentiments.

"Many Kauai residents are unable to recuperate from the major economic and emotional damages that they have personally suffered.

"The survey questions relating to 'FINANCIAL CIRCUMSTANCES' follows:

- 1. Were you here when Hurricane Iniki hit? Yes -- 782
- 2. Are you or your spouse unemployed? Yes -- 469
- 3. Were you working before Iniki? Yes -- 454
- 4. When do you or your spouse expect to go back to work? Don't know -- 73
- 5. Are you or your spouse retired? Yes -- 291

Is Social Security your only income? Yes -- 229

- Were you getting public or private financial aid of any kind before Iniki? No -- 501
- 7. Did you apply for FEMA aid? Yes -- 571

Did you receive it? Yes -- 369

Did you apply for food stamps? Yes -- 549

8. Is your family's income between:

\$0-\$15,000 646 \$15,000-\$24,000 192 \$24,000-\$33,000 77.

"One question asked them to summarize their financial circumstances: many responded negatively -- they feel neglected, and believed the bureaucracy and/or the administration has not been responsive in providing immediate relief to help them recover.

"These feelings of hopelessness disturb me. I want to thank the previous speakers for clarifying their position, however, I am hoping that during the last moments of the legislative session that we will take this survey to heart and see what can be done so that we can expedite the kinds of services that are definitely needed on the island and mediate those feelings of frustration, powerlessness and hopelessness. Thank you very much."

At 12:59 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:01 o'clock p.m.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 604

Honorable Members Seventeenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without

my approval, House Bill No. 604, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Unclaimed Property.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 604 is to exempt certain gift certificates and credit memos from the Uniform Unclaimed Property Act. Under this bill, certificates or credit memos without an expiration date would be exempt from reporting as unclaimed property. In effect, the issuer of such a certificate or memo could evade the objectives and purposes of the Uniform Unclaimed Property Act and create a private escheat law, simply by eliminating an expiration date.

Through the Uniform Unclaimed Property Act, the State becomes the custodian of unclaimed property for the benefit of the owners. The Uniform Unclaimed Property Act both preserves property for its owner and prevents the unjust enrichment of persons acquiring property they do not own. Additionally, the State is given the use of the property until reclaimed by the owner. Presently, any gift certificate or credit memo which remains outstanding live years after becoming payable or distributable is presumed abandoned and subject to reporting. The Uniform Unclaimed Property Act assures that consumers will be able to recover the value of the gift certificate or credit memo despite the staleness of any claim or the continuing existence of the issuer. Yet, House Bill No. 604 would defeat those objectives, injecting unwarranted exception in a uniform act and creating a precedent which may undermine the effectiveness of the Unclaimed Property Program.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 604 without my approval.

The Senate reconvened at 1:15 o'clock p.m.

Senator Chang then noted:

"Mr. President, this has to do with revising an act established last year with respect to limiting the liability of those who would provide clean-up for oil spills. This bill merely clarifies that the federal on-scene coordinator will be the lead agent in such matters."

The motion to reconsider the action was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Chang, seconded by Senator Fukunaga and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 728, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 728, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OIL SPILLS," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, May 3, 1993.

Senator Levin then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"I would like to comment on two measures which the State House of Representatives now has under its control and within its power to approve. One is the confirmation of district judges; the other is the extension of tort reforms which were first instituted in 1986.

"First, briefly, with respect to confirmation of district judges. This would require a constitutional amendment which this Senate approved several weeks ago and which has been pending in the House ever since. All legal formalities of giving notice to the governor have been complied with so the House could move to agree to the Senate bill today and vote on it on Monday. It would place on the ballot a constitutional amendment which would enable the Senate to advise and consent on such judges.

"It seems to me that this bill is a simple matter of good government. Without casting aspersions on the quality of any appointee, I think it has become obvious over the past months that there is a very clear benefit to be derived from public hearings prior to an individual taking a seat on the bench. Under our present system of a seat on the bench. appointing district judges, there is no public announcement prior to a person being hired as a judge, and no opportunity for the public to comment on any information that might come to light after the appointment. This is why we have public hearings on confirmations for so many other appointees including all other judges other than district judges. It is a shame that the same procedure and same opportunity for public input does not apply to the district court, and the House of Representatives can correct that oversight. I am not optimistic that they will because they have refused to enact similar legislation in past years and because they have indicated this year that the bill is in big trouble.

"Nevertheless, it is possible for them to move the process forward today with a simple motion to agree, and I would hope that for the good of the community and for the sake of openness in government they would take such a step.

"The other issue that must be dealt with today is the issue of tort reform. If the House takes no action today to agree to the Senate amendments made to House Bill 928, then incredibly the House will allow the reforms passed in 1986 and renewed in 1989, and renewed again in 1991, will all be repealed on October 1st of this year. All they need to do to prevent that from happening is to move to reconsider and then move to agree, just as we have done with many bills over the past days. They know this option is available. They were reminded as recently as this morning by you, Mr. President, as recently as last night by me. They have been asked to do so by the Attorney General and others, and one would hope that reason would prevail and they will keep existing tort reform alive.

"The reason we have reached the brink on this issue is that the House wanted to go much further in changing the statutes, and the Senate also was willing to make changes but we could not agree on what was best for the general public. We worked on it till the very last minute last night. The chair of the House Judiciary Committee and I exchanged drafts all day. I was on the phone with Senator Ikeda concerning the bill at 11:40 last night. I was on the phone with Senator Iwase until the midnight deadline passed, talking about the legislation and how it might affect the public. We made a sincere effort but in truth we probably were not close to agreement.

"The Senate was not willing to throw out hundreds of years of tort law and seven years of reform without making sure that all ramifications of change were understood and beneficial and fair. The main focus of the debate was on joint and several liability, the so-called deep-pockets problem. The state is often that entity that is on the losing end of a deep-pockets case, and yet our attorney general advised against accepting the House version of the bill because he realized that it was not fair nor in the best interest of the people. In fact, at one point the House suggested that we should pass the bill and let the governor veto it. Surely that would not have been a responsible course of action to take.

"We made a good faith effort and we will continue to do so in trying to improve our tort law, but we must not let the slogan of tort reform stampede us into passing bad laws. We will look at joint and several liability again during the interim and hopefully during next session. The bill which I hope the House will agree to today would not only extend existing reforms but would also call for a study to evaluate the effect that the reforms have already had and to give us what would be an objective evaluation of what additional changes should be made. Such a study would be extremely helpful not to justify delay, but to give us the data to make intelligent decisions. The state and counties have testified at this Legislature that the present law has been working and that deep-pockets cases are down.

"Some believe that there is still a problem, but we should not legislate based on anecdotes, especially when we are talking about a broad brush that would be so damaging to hundreds or thousands of our citizens who may be victims of negligence or intentional wrongdoing and who would be denied the opportunity to recover for their damages, if we institute so-called reforms that are not well thought out and properly balanced.

"I have heard the existing law called an abomination. It is so convoluted, it has so many categories and exemptions and exceptions, that it must have been written by lawyers. And it surely is a law that only the lawyers could love. But it was also a hard fought compromise to balance interests and to try to be fair to both injured people and to people who injure them.

"We all know that undoing a compromise bit by bit can lead to imbalance and to unfairness. It has to be done logically, carefully and with full understanding of the consequences.

"We made a good faith effort over the past weeks, right up to midnight last night. We will continue to do so, but we will not let that slogan of tort reform lead to bad law.

"The House strategy has been to play a game of chicken, to take us to the brink and threaten that current tort reform will be lost. If that happens the blood is on their hands because the bill is on their desks and it can be positioned to pass by a simple motion to agree.

"I sent my counterpart a memo telling him the bill number and the procedure that needed to be followed, just as a reminder. I explained the situation to you, Mr. President, so that you could make sure the Speaker of the House was aware of what needs to be done.

"Mr. President, you were on top of the issue all last night as the deadline neared and I thank you for your interest and help. I acknowledge too the interest of Senator Ikeda, Senator Iwase and Senator Blair, all of whom were here well past midnight. I know that they were working on other bills as well, but joint and several liability was important to them. If cool heads prevail, the reforms that are presently in place will continue and we will come back next year with proposals that would benefit all of the people of our state, proposals that will be well thought out, fully understood, and above all achieve fairness. Thank you, Mr. President."

FINAL READING

There being no objections, the Senate took the following action out of the Order of the Day in the sequence printed:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 225 (H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 225 be adopted and H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator B. Kobayashi.

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, just briefly, in support of the budget.

"I would like to thank all the committee members who were always available for decision-making and for bill signing. And, of course, the staff for just putting hours and hours and hours of work. They will finally be able to go home tonight or maybe tomorrow; we don't let them escape easily.

"Mr. President, all I can say, very briefly, is that we tried our best with the limited resources. The agencies all had zero-growth budgets. We were at the point of moving money around. We gave more to Education, more to Human Services, and a total of about \$80 million went to Kauai. Although we did want to do more, I think we did the best we could.

"I urge support of the budget. Thank you.

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the budget.

"I'd like to start off by speaking about the health area for which I am chair. I guess the winner in the health area is the hospital system of the State of Hawaii. A very hard working and underpaid Ways and Means staffer is responsible for a major change in the hospital budget. This budget adds \$10.5 million in general funds to the hospital system. Monies will allow the state to take advantage of federal Medicaid's disproportionate share. Disproportionate share is a very obscure and changing concept within our governmental reimbursement system. It allows hospitals to receive federal reimbursement on a lump sum basis for certain designated hospitals under federal Medicaid rules. The addition of state monies of over \$10.5 million allows the state to be reimbursed similarly, and actually provides the state with more overall resources and more federal reimbursements than if we had cut the general fund appropriations to state hospitals. So, to the Ways and Means chair and to one very hard working staffer we have much to be thankful

"The other area that was a big winner in the health budget was adolescent mental health. Approximately \$6.7 million was added to this area. As you know, adolescent mental health has been a neglected area for many years. and \$6.7 million will go a long way to help improve our mental health system. Originally, the proponents in support of child and adolescent mental health wanted as much as \$20 million. So the job is not yet done. I would note that even if the department had gotten a \$20 million increase, that would not have taken care of most of the population. \$6.7 million and even the \$20 million would have been focused in the most severely disturbed and difficult cases within our child and adolescent mental health system. Beyond that we have a great many other people who have lesser problems, but who need help, nonetheless.

"A third area that was helped significantly was SHIP, the State Health Insurance Program. That was increased \$3 million in the first year of the biennium and an additional \$1 million in the second year of the biennium. Tragically, we need SHIP. SHIP is the gap group insurance program that will help out certain of our more beleaguered areas of the state, not to mention Kauai and Hamakua. So this would at least be some respite to them.

"Another area that was a winner in the budget was the Big Island. Two of the biggest CIP projects in the health budget go to Big Island hospitals. Specifically, \$7 million for the Kona Hospital and \$6.7 million for the Honokaa Hospital. In addition to that, there is support for the emergency room at Honokaa to the tune of \$110,000 and also support for the Hamakua Medical Center to the tune of \$140,000.

"Overall, most of the programs in the Department of Health lost money. It is because of financial necessity and very difficult times. Needless to say, these cuts in the health budget will hurt greatly and I think that next year we will see the Department of Health trying to regroup to see how their resources can be reprioritized and an attempt to make whole some of the programs that this year were cut.

"I would note that we even had cuts in the adult mental health area, an area under which we are under very close scrutiny by the federal government, the U.S. Department of Justice. There may be some federal oversight imposed upon the state.

"In short, Mr. President, the health budget comes out well in certain areas but overall is taking a cut in most of the programs. It is an area that I think has been dealt fairly in the budget. I would like to thank the Ways and Means staff, Ways and Means chair, and our counterparts in the House for a job well done. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I too rise to speak in favor of the budget.

"First of all, I'd like to thank the chair of the Senate Ways and Means Committee. I think she did an excellent job along with all the committee members. Also, Mr. President, I think we need to recognize for the education budget two people that helped tremendously and without their help we wouldn't have been able to transform the education budget from 17 EDN program areas to 5, and that's Darlene Fujimoto and Kevin Kuroda. They really helped a lot, along with Joe, on the House Finance Committee side. Without their help we would never have been able to put this budget together.

"On the education side, Mr. President, it's more than just adding new additional money and resources to the budget. In total, if you take the zero growth budget that was presented to us very early on in the year by the governor, we have an additional \$22 million in available money for the Department of Education if you count the appropriations bill and the budget act. I think that in this tough fiscal year that is a commitment to education.

"But equally and even more important, what we did was transform the budget and this budget is a good budget because it focuses on the schools, it focuses on student outcomes and student learning, and doesn't just appropriate money to the Department of Education or the Board of Education, but it begins to put into place a school-based budgeting system that's not perfect but will be perfect one day, Mr. President, where money gets to the school and spent at the school, not in the bureaucracy. That's what I think the conferees can be most proud of. We started down that path and the provisos in the budget set a clear direction, a policy direction, that we want money to get to the students and we want the money to be focused on student outcomes and student learning. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura added his support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I too support the budget, but I just want to express to the Senate body's appreciation and gratitude to the staff of the Ways and Means Committee. Any person who wants to work in that committee must be, I shouldn't say, crazy but if you want to really work, be pressured, that's the committee to work for. We owe our gratitude to the staff because they truly always work very hard to get the budget decked on time. Thank you very much."

Senator Iwase also supported the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the budget. At this time, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the chairperson of the Ways and Means Committee, Senator Kobayashi, for her concern, interest and cooperation in dealing with the major issues facing our state, in particular two of them. I had the privilege of dealing with the Iniki package and also with legislation to provide relief to Hamakua by creating a development district. I want to thank her very much for her help with these issues. She was always most cooperative, always most interested and always displayed a sense of compassion. I would also like to thank the members of the Ways and Means Committee, the conferees on the budget, and the staff of the Ways and Means Committee for developing a budget that prioritizes the education of our children as one of the top priorities for the state. Thank you, Mr. President.'

Senator Graulty added his remarks in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not stand this morning and also provide acknowledgements to the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and to the members of her committee for the work that they have done in the human services area. I think their efforts have been nothing short of heroic and I wish to extend to them my great appreciation for all the support that they've given to all the various programs in human services and all the dollars that they have provided in a very difficult situation. So thank you very much to Senator Ann Kobayashi and members of her committee. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator A. Kobayashi then responded:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank everyone for their kind words. It's not only thanks to the committee members, to the hard working staff, and everyone in this room, I'd also like to thank the House conferees. The chair of the Finance Committee was most cooperative. We both had the same goals; we both wanted to provide for the people of this state, and I think the House conferees also deserve a vote of thanks. Thank you."

Senator George then added:

"Mr. President, with all the gratitude being passed out, I would be delinquent if I didn't add the thanks of the minority to the chair of the Ways and Means Committee. We've had a fair shake. We had an interesting time with the budget -- limitation of funds but no limitation on effort, and I do thank the chair and everyone else responsible. Thank you."

Senator Holt also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the budget.

"First off, let me extend my heartfelt thanks to the chairman of Ways and Means. I haven't been a member of Ways and Means for some years and this year I was

rather apprehensive about the hours I would have to put in. My family thanks the chairman because I was able to get home at reasonable hours and spend time with my boys. In addition, I'd like to thank Kevin Kuroda and his staff for doing an outstanding job. I've been around here for 15 years, Mr. President, and it's the first time we've ever finished the budget on a Wednesday before closing. So I think the chair and the staff deserve a lot of credit for that.

"Specifically, Mr. President, I'm very proud of this budget because it includes a number of items, despite the fact that the budget amounts are fairly large. As you know I am always pushing for substantial amounts for CIP for the state and for the taxpayers. There were some items that did come through in the budget that the chair held on to but are included in this which are very important to the state. Just to list a couple of them: Senator Blair's park down in Kakaako will continue to grow and, in fact, for the whole Kakaako district improvement and infrastructure, we have about \$25 million in the budget. There was accord reached on the McKinley faculty housing project finally after much deliberation. The faculty housing project will go ahead and we also will be able to take care of McKinley's Building A with \$17 million in the budget, which I think is a reasonable and really good compromise. In addition, on a personal note, we are finally going to get to move ahead with our marine education and training center down at Sand Island to provide a new industry for the

"Thank you again, Senator."

Senator Levin also added his support and said:

"Mr. President, I want to join in too.

"Two brief points. One, I think there was an openness that was unprecedented in terms of how the Ways and Means Committee operated, and that was clearly thanks to the chairperson. Second, I think that the budget that was finally arrived at despite of the limited dollars, is very much people oriented, trying to take care of those who need to be taken care of and, again, it reflects the interest and concern of the chairperson and all the others who were involved in putting it together."

In response to your recent letter of April 28, 1993, to Dr. Sybinsky, the Department has received three bids (Med Trans, International Life Support and Mercy) for ambulance service for Maui. We will not be calling for extension of the bidding period nor do we intend to withdraw, cancel or amend the IFB F-93-260-M or any contract let thereunder if SB 1538 is enacted into law.

It was never the intent of the Department to support passage of SB 1538 and then withdraw, cancel or amend the IFB. Since SB 1538 in its current form is consistent with the current procedure, we believe that, in fact, we are, under Chapter 103, carrying out the basic intent of the measure. In conjunction with the Department of Accounting and General Services, we intend to proceed with the IFB, including notice to proceed and award of the contract to the lowest qualified bidder, pursuant to Chapter 103, H.R.S. and not pursuant to SB 1538 if it is enacted into law.

"This is a new era in government -- government was founded to serve the people and we must be accountable to the public. This bill is a step in that direction, and I urge my colleagues to support it. Mahalo."

"However, on policy grounds, this bill deserves a 'no' vote. I would remind members of the days when some of us were trying to inhibit the free flow of capital into the State of Hawaii, in the interest of keeping the price of homes reasonable. We were told that Hawaii could not cut itself off from the other states and from the international marketplace and that should be the crossroads of the Pacific. We were told that it was not appropriate policy for us to pull up the drawbridge. I submit that, when the contractors want the money flowing in, the drawbridge stay down; but, when the contractors want the money to be spent only on local contractors, then the drawbridge goes up. We should not Balkanize the United States for the benefit of local economic interest. There's a lack of consistency here, which needs to be recorded. Thank you."

"Mr. President, the Department of Environmental Protection passed in 1991 as Act 293. Part of the act was to set up a task force to evaluate possible duties and authority of the department. They were supposed to submit an organizational and functional plan for the '92 legislative session as part of the Executive Supplemental Budget request. It is now 1993 and we have no plan.

"This bill does not even put us back at square one. We are below sea level. It asks the Legislative Reference Bureau to update a previous report and the feasibility of environmental reorganization. The 1991 Legislature said, 'Do it.' We don't need another report asking if it is feasible. Perhaps the unkindest cut is that this bill asks for an interim report in '94 with the final report in '95.

"I first introduced the bill to create a Department of Environmental Protection in 1989. If the executive and the legislative branches are not serious, then kill this bill and repeal Act 293. Killing this bill will save a forest. The reports are not worth destroying a forest for. The creation of a Department of Environmental Protection seems as though it will follow the same fate as attempts to save prime agricultural land.

"The people in 1978 adopted a constitutional amendment that requires the state to conserve and protect agricultural land and the Legislature was to provide standards and criteria to accomplish it. It is 1993 and we have yet to provide these standards and criteria. Special interest groups have succeeded in blocking attempts to create these standards.

"I guess a case can be made that we don't have the resources or the will to create a Department of Environmental Protection. If that's the reason, so be it. I accept it. Vote 'no' on this bill and let's move on. Thank you."

If we believe, as I do, that the problem of alcohol abuse by the users of our public highways is a serious one which merits careful study and decisive action by lawmakers, then clearly this legislation, which I believe improperly intrudes into the arena of the courts in attempting a 'quick fix,' is inadequate and

counter productive. Because of the false impression which this legislation creates in the minds of the public (and indeed, in our own minds as well) that something has been accomplished during this session to address these persistent and complex problems, it decreases the chances of our really coming to grips with them during the next legislative session, and in the coming years."

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

Gov. Msg. No. 379, dated May 3, 1993, transmitting his statement of objections to Senate Bill No. 1616 which he has returned to the Senate without his approval and which reads as follows:

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO SENATE BILL NO. 1616

Honorable Members Seventeenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1616, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Department of Public Safety.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1616 is to reassign the titles of 'sheriff' and 'deputy sheriff' to the Special Service Deputies of the Department of Public Safety. However, Senate Bill No. 1616 conflicts with the sound personnel management strategy set out in Act 211, Session Laws of Hawaii 1989. By Act 211 the Legislature consolidated most of the law enforcement and security functions and employees of the State into a Department of Public Safety to include the functions and employees of the Department of Corrections, the Office of Sheriff and security personnel in the Judiciary, the State Law Enforcement Office (except for executive security functions and employees) and the narcotics enforcement division of

the Department of the Attorney General, and the law enforcement and security functions and employees of the Department of Transportation. One of the stated goals of Act 211 was to 'establish a "career ladder" for public safety employees.' Consistent with that purpose, the Legislature also provided in Section 1 of Act 211 that position description for the transferred employees be reworked, that their position classification be reviewed, and that an organizational structure be developed.

Pursuant to Act 211, the Department of Personnel Services has created a 'Deputy Sheriff' series which includes the work performed by the Marine Patrol Officers, State Security Guards and Special Services Deputies. This action goes beyond the purpose of the bill which was to give the title of deputy sheriff to only one group of law enforcement personnel. Allowing law enforcement personnel from several areas to be within the same series provides for greater promotional opportunities within the Department, and grants the Director flexibility to rotate employees in the various areas. Thus, the goal of creating a career ladder has been realized. To the extent that a major purpose of this bill is to return the title of deputy sheriff to a certain group of employees, that has been accomplished administratively and this bill is unnecessary. However, to the extent that this bill limits the group that may have the title of deputy sheriff, the bill undermines the goal of creating a career ladder for law enforcement personnel.

Also, section 26-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, delegates to the Department of Personnel Services the responsibility to administer the State personnel program, including, among other things, position classification. In addition, the State Civil Service Law provides in section 76-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, that 'it is the purpose of this chapter to establish in the State and each of the counties a system of personnel administration based on merit and scientific methods governing principles classification of positions and the employment, conduct, movement, and separation of public officers and employees.' Because matters of position classification and their relationship to other classified positions impact not only the position classification, but also the compensation plans under chapter 77, Hawaii Revised Statutes, it appears inadvisable to pluck out a classified position and to rename, by law, the classification without consulting with the personnel directors of the State and the counties.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1616 without my approval.

"Last session, at the urging of Governor Waihee, an ad hoc committee was established on Hawaiian sovereignty. We appropriated \$350,000 to retain legal counsel in Washington, specifically to pursue Hawaii's entitlements arising from the overthrow and annexation. That committee with the assistance of Washington legal counsel persuaded the Democratic Party to specifically recognize the existence of the United States government's obligation as trustees for native Hawaiians.

"Mr. President, it's one thing for the federal government to acknowledge in part trust obligations and quite another for it to permit any group to claim sovereign status within its jurisdiction. This matter must be left for resolution by negotiations of the Hawaiian people directly with our federal government. I see this legislation as the first step.

"The most we as state officials and as private citizens can do is to assist our Hawaiian population in enforcing their legitimate claims against the United States government. We as officials and as individuals cannot without violating our oath of office and our duty as citizens of the United States be involved in the attempts of any group to separate itself from the union of the United States unless our acts are done with federal approval and consent.

"Mr. President, if I may deviate a moment from this There was an article which appeared in this Sunday's paper, May 2, in which Congressman Neil Abercrombie wrote an article referring to the future of Bellows, where by right the land belongs to the Hawaiians. In this article the Congressman acknowledges that 'the most important point to remember is that Bellows is ceded land which by law must be returned to the State of Hawaii when it is no longer required for military purposes. By right its use should serve the interest of Hawaiian people from whom it was illegally taken away a century ago. Senior officers argue that Bellows is needed for amphibious exercises by the Marine Brigade based at Kaneohe. Amphibious exercises, however, could continue at Bellows Beach after its return to the sovereign Hawaiian nation.'

"The reason I read this for the record is because the Congressman is making reference to the sovereign Hawaiian nation.

"To reiterate again, Mr. President, the sovereign Hawaiian nation is in its infancy stage and I'm hoping that the federal government will recognize the Hawaiian nation as being sovereign. This issue has not been resolved. It continues to read, 'and\or the State of Hawaii. The simpler solution would be to leave the use of Bellows Beach and change amphibious exercises to week days and civilian recreation use for weekends and holidays.'

"The reason I bring this up is that I'm very appreciative and I'm hoping that all my colleagues will vote 'yes.' It's just the realistic understanding that we are far from achieving our goal. I think that the manner in which we can participate in this momentous occasion is

by supporting this legislation which, in essence, will give us the referendum to allow the Hawaiian people to call themselves into being, but I feel that it's not our place to dictate what that may or should be. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to support the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"It will offer our Hawaiian people an opportunity to chart their destiny with respect to how they choose to be governed. Many, many hands, minds, and hearts have gone into bringing this measure before us, and I would like to thank the chairman who so ably worked with the Senator from the Big Island and with myself in fashioning this compromise measure.

"In the legislative process nobody ever gets everything they want but this is surely a very good attempt to get us close to what our Hawaiian people have been asking for.

"I also would like to thank the conferees on the House side as well as their chair. I know he has sustained a lot of brutal attacks at times and that's unfortunate. I think it's all worth it because for the past 100 years our people in Hawaii have been crying for this redress to what had happened 100 years ago to their Queen. And it really makes me happy that I was able to be a part of that. Thank you."

Senator Reed spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I will be voting against this measure and very briefly for the record to be clear as to my reasons.

"While I'm 100 percent in favor of sovereignty for native Hawaiian people, I also share the concerns of Kalahui and other organizations and individuals who are very concerned about the role that government plays in that process. Therefore, I will be casting a 'no' vote on this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 97 was adopted and S.B. No. 1028, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN SOVEREIGNTY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Reed).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 99 (S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to request that the measure be recommitted and said:

"Mr. President, with a great deal of reluctance and a great deal of regret that I have to ask that we recommit this bill.

"The House bargained in good faith. The House conferees and the Senate conferees, were honest and diligent and had a lot of commitment to reform the procurement system. I know that the governor himself was anxious that a bill pass this year. However, we find that there are many flaws in the bill and it's not due to any work of the House staff. They've always done very good work on drafts of bills and committee reports. The Senate staff was not to blame, neither the LRB.

"There is reference to campaign spending rules in the bill, and there's no section in the bill on those rules. Also, a key section dealing with rule making, which would make it possible to start rule making now, that key part was left out. There are several other flaws, so we felt that rather than pass the bill with all these flaws in it that we would work on it again in the interim and try to pass a bill next year.

"We don't want to give the public a false sense of security, also, that reforms have been made, although there was a commitment on everyone's part that we should fix the system. The public has to be aware that the same system is still in place, that the opportunity for abuse is still there.

"Because of the different inconsistencies in our law that have been brought forth, I am hopeful that those involved will try to implement some of these reforms anyway, and hopeful that dollars that need to go to Human Services will still be there and the dollars we need for Education will still be there, and that no more dollars will go into the pockets of those who have been abusing the system. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then added:

"Mr. President, I would like to say a few words in regard to the procurement bill. The public was expecting a procurement bill to pass this year because a similar procurement bill was vetoed last year.

"I'll try to walk you through what happened on Saturday. We initiated our conference on Thursday by going page by page of the Senate bill. Tentative agreements between the House and Senate conferees were reached. Several sections of the House bill were agreed to be inserted into the conference draft. When we reconvened on Friday, that's when the House chairman said they decided not to go along with the Senate bill. The Senate was given a new House version of the procurement bill. Needless to say, it was a great surprise!

"When we were given a 69-page House draft, we just went through it as best as we could trying to find if there were major flaws in this draft. An hour later, I got another House draft. We scrapped the first draft they gave us and worked on the second draft.

"The thing that bothers me is that their first and second draft, had we adopted it, would have done nothing. There would have been no improvement in the present procurement process for professional services. The two key places in which most of the abuses that are taking place today were not addressed in the draft that they had given us. Fortunately, we caught those omissions so when conferees met we said these are the items that must be put in. I won't go into details but they were on page 26 and page 29.

"Just to give you an example of their omission, I'll read an example. The draft reads: 'Procurement of professional services. Professional services including attorneys, architects, engineers, physicians, dentists, and accountants shall be procured in accordance with this section except as authorized under Sections 407, 410 and 411.' Not too many of us are going to start looking 407, 410, 411 and all that, but what was missing from the draft was Section 406. If we did not put Section 406 in as a means to procure professional services this bill would have been nothing.

"This House draft given to the Senate covered only 66 pages. The entire bill is 119 pages. There were 50 pages missing. The House said that they'll take the Senate

version for the last 50 pages, so we said, 'Sure, that's fine.' So, we left it at that, hoping that they will be including on some of the conference items that we had previously agreed to, such as the bill will take effect two years from the passage of this bill but as far as the policies, the rules and regulations, that was to start immediately upon the passage.

"We signed the committee report but we never saw the bill. None of us in the Senate saw the last 50 pages before the bill was decked at midnight. When I came back on Saturday, I wanted to make sure that everything was proper and that's when I started to pick up some of the inclusions that the Senator from Manoa mentioned. The last 50 pages were not the Senate version, and worse, included matters which had not been discussed in conference, such as campaign contributions, etc.

"Mr. President, the public is going to be totally confused as to why we can't pass a procurement bill that everybody says is needed. We blame the procurement law for the procurement abuses. It is true, we need a better procurement law. However, one must remember it is not the existing statute that created the abuses. These abuses were caused by human beings. That is the problem! Examine the procurement abuses! A CPA firm uses professional service contracts to buy IBM machines and furnitures. We have a procurement contract that has been amended 22 times, etc.

"In summary, Mr. President, the Senate bill recommended centralized control of purchasing and a limitation of sole source wished to be more liberal. Both of these issues are at the heart of procurement abuses. In both instances the House favored a loose administration sponsored bill; whereas, the Senate bill was modeled on guidelines promulgated by the American Bar Association after years of research and experience.

"I hope the investigation, recently initiated by the Senate Special Committee, into the state government procurement practices, and scheduled to continue over several months, will bring sufficient public attention to the issue to assure that a sincere effort will be made to produce a realistic bill in the 1994 session.

"We brought two procurement specialists from the Mainland to help draft the Senate procurement bill. These specialists were the ones that drafted the ABA model procurement code.

"I think that the Senate has done a good job and I hope that next session we will come up and pass a good procurement bill. That is a commitment! Although this bill will be recommitted, we are going to continue to work on the policies and the rules and regulations, based on the Senate version. Thank you very much!"

By unanimous consent, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 99 and S.B. No. 1126, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," were recommitted to the Committee on Conference.

"Mr. President, I would like to request a ruling on a conflict. My law firm does legal work for Citizens Utilities."

The Chair answered: "The Chair rules that you have no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 110 was adopted and H.B. No. 1376, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST UTILITIES SERVING THE GENERAL PUBLIC," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Aves, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 121 (H.B. No. 2028, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Chang moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 121 be adopted and H.B. No. 2028, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Fukunaga.

Senator Chang rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to commend Senator Carol Fukunaga, vice-chair of the Committee on Government Operations, Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Programs, who served as chairman for several of the sub-committees within the committee, and in that capacity negotiated most of the bills related to recycling and many of the bills relating to fees. I appreciate the contributions she has made to the work of the committee. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 121 was adopted and H.B. No. 2028, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE TIRE RECOVERY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124 (H.B. No. 775, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Ikeda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124 be adopted and H.B. No. 775, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in support of the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Mr. President, one of the things that deters the insurance companies from coming into this state to do business is the fact that we have in our laws a 'take all comers' provision, which means that if you sell property-casualty insurance in this state, you must sell no-fault policies to anyone who walks in and requests it.

"As you know, Mr. President, this provision hasn't been working. Artificial barriers have been created to prevent people from getting policies. This bill repeals the 'take all comers' provision and puts in place a limitation on non-renewals and cancellations instead.

"This change signals a major change in the way that this state regulates insurance companies. It is telling them that the state is lessening its restrictions and welcoming them into the state. We need to do this in order to encourage more business which, in turn, will act to resolve some of the current problems that we face. Without further competition it appears that we will continue to have problems in the areas of homeowners insurance and other property, casualty lines.

"Another provision in this bill will take care of some of the people who find themselves in the quandary of having their policy cancelled or non-renewed and, in trying to get a new policy, run into problems. Some are also unfortunate enough to be stopped by the police and cited for not having a no-fault policy or a no-fault card. And when this happens the courts have no alternative but to fine these people a thousand dollars even though these are mitigating circumstances and it may be the person's first offense.

"This bill will permit judges to exercise discretion in these kinds of cases so that these circumstances can be taken into consideration. It also lowers the fine from a thousand dollars on the first offense to \$500, and \$1500 rather than \$3,000 on a subsequent offense.

"I think these provisions are fair, Mr. President, and I request that my colleagues support this bill."

Senator Ikeda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 134 be adopted and H.B. No. 1624, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Holt rose to request a ruling of the Chair, as follows:

"Mr. President, potential conflict. I'm employed by Kamehameha Schools - Bishop Estate."

The Chair ruled: "You are excused from voting on this matter."

Senator McCartney, in support of the measure, then rose to inquire if the chair of the Conference Committee would yield to a question? The President posed the question to the chair, and Senator Ikeda having answered in the affirmative, Senator McCartney asked:

"Mr. President, there's been some concern about the impact of this bill on pending litigation as it relates to 514-C and I'd just like to ask the chair if it is the position of the conferees that this bill will impact on that pending litigation?"

Senator Ikeda answered:

"Mr. President, that was brought to my attention at the time that the conference committee first met and I raised the question at that meeting and asked if there was any pending litigation and if anyone knew whether or not this bill would have such an effect. The answer given to me was that the concern did not revolve around the fact that there was pending litigation, rather that the Hawaii Bar Association didn't have time to review the matter or the proposed amendment. With that in mind, we proceeded to develop this bill and I am aware of the fact that many people have been sent faxes asking them to oppose this bill.

"My understanding, and I am not an attorney, but my understanding of this legislation is that it would apply prospectively and not retroactively. It also will not apply to any current transactions.

"These faxes have asked that we not vote for this bill; that it be held because of the potential impact on pending cases. There is only one case that I know of and my understanding is that in that case, the judge ruled in favor of the lessor and that the decision is currently being appealed."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 134 was adopted and H.B. No. 1624, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL LEASEHOLDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141 (H.B. No. 1473, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1);

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141 be adopted and H.B. No. 1473, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Iwase.

Senator Matsuura rose to speak in support of the measure, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting for this bill but I just want to express a few concerns and some reservations.

"When this bill came up for public hearing, the Public Utilities Commission testified against this bill, and I was kind of curious as to why they would testify against this bill. However, before I explain my concern, I want to make absolutely certain ... to the residents of Kauai that I am totally in favor of helping the residents of Kauai, both in their electricity rates and also in the telephone rates. I don't want to be misunderstood that I'm not trying to help the residents of Kauai at a time of disaster, that's absolutely not true.

"My concern is that when a company like GTE Hawaiian Tel, a public utility company that is self-insured comes in for a surcharge, I want to make sure that the surcharge is fair and warranted. I have been trying for the past seven years to have the PUC examine GTE Hawaiian Tel financial books. The reason why GTE Hawaiian Tel has never had their financial books examined for the past eight years is that they were making enough money and didn't need a rate increase.

"PUC don't know the profit margin of GTE Hawaiian Tel. When we initiated a service for the hearing impaired, there was a surcharge; 911, another surcharge; Iniki, still another surcharge. The best way to have done this is what the PUC recommended, go for a rate increase. It is a legitimate way to get a rate increase. We don't need these surcharges! The only problem is that GTE Hawaiian Tel will have to open up their financial books. This is what I have wanted GTE Hawaiian Tel to do for the past six years. It appears that GTE Hawaiian Tel don't want their financial books to be examined.

"The Legislature put in the budget last year monies to force PUC to have an audit done on the state Selex system. It is yet to be done. We have to examine what GTE Hawaiian Tel is making before assessing all the ratepayers in Hawaii additional. The reason is this: GTE Hawaiian Tel operation is divided into two business entities; one is regulated and the other is unregulated. When the state bought the telephone instruments for twice the bid price, that was through the unregulated operation. I just received my personal telephone bill and in the telephone billing was this advertisement. It's called MURATEC M850. The postage that was paid to get this billing to me is under the regulated operation. bought MURATEC M850, it comes under the unregulated section. I don't know how much money GTE Hawaiian Tel is making. I am sure the revenues are substantial because GTE Hawaiian Tel has not asked for a rate increase for over eight years.

"Maybe I am a little sensitive but when I look at my telephone bill which I have here, touch-call service cost me \$1.65 a month. Other states don't charge for this service. If the ratepayers want to jam up Hawaiian Tel,

buy and use rotary dial telephone instead of touch-call service. It will create a chaos for Hawaiian Tel. Why should GTE Hawaiian Tel charge \$1.65? It would be more appropriate to charge \$1.65 for the ratepayers who are using rotary telephones because the technology is moving to digital. Touch-tone is something all the telephone companies want to achieve, yet, we get charged for this service in Hawaii. Why? I don't mind giving to Kauai to reduce the Kauai ratepayers' cost. However, all I'm asking is that GTE Hawaiian Tel open up their financial books so that I can tell my constituents in Hilo, 'It's okay to pay for Kauai ratepayers' bills because PUC examined GTE financial books and they're not making that much money.' My suspicion is that GTE Hawaiian Tel has made a lot of monies the past eight years. I wouldn't go open my financial book if I'm making a whole bunch of money too. If GTE Hawaiian Tel has made a lot of monies, they shouldn't let the ratepayers pay for the Iniki damage through a surcharge.

"Now, relating to Kauai Electric, my constituents in Hilo are going to pay to a company that they have no relationship at all, but that's okay. Well, maybe that's not okay. I don't know. However, there is one positive At least Kauai Electric financial books were audited last year. They opened up their books last year and the PUC at least had a chance to examine their financial books to judge whether or not Kauai Electric deserved the help of all the ratepayers. Hawaiian Tel, Kauai Electric was self-insured. If they were self-insured they saved a lot of money. In other words, should GTE Hawaiian Tel and Kauai Electric have taken hurricane damage insurance? My only concern is that let's examine their financial books first, after which, I will feel more comfortable in telling everybody in Hilo it's okay, pay the surcharges.

"I'm voting for the bill. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill, with a couple of reservations.

"One is the 90-day requirement imposed on the Public Utilities Commission to respond to a filing. I think that may be unrealistic. As I read it, however, there's no penalty imposed, and the filing would not be granted automatically at the end of that 90 days. In fact, it might well be that it would be deemed to be denied after 90 days, if no action was taken. That's a concern that can be addressed next year, as I doubt this matter will be before the Public Utilities Commission prior to 1994.

"The second point, and again I only ask that it be considered in the 1994 session, has to do with what I perceive to be a regressive taxation effect. If there are ratepayer charges for Kauai that need to be addressed on a statewide basis, they should be covered by a progressing taxing mechanism. I have grave reservations about using utility charges to take care of those problems, because everyone uses utility services and a surcharge with their utility bill amounts to regressive taxation. I don't think that's good policy.

"With those reservations, and in hopes that we will revisit the issue next year, I will be voting in the affirmative."

Senator Koki rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"There were a number of Hawaiian Airlines employees that came to my office to ask that I vote for this bill and I told them that I would vote for it if it just contained the loan guarantee language. However, if it included deregulation language, I would be voting against it.

"The Senate has not heard any testimony about the effects on regulation. Regulation means price regulation. This will mean price increase. Carriers who want to come in with low prices will not be able to do so. If Hawaiian can't make it, the regulators simply increase fares. This means that the cost of living for inter-island travelers goes up, particularly for neighbor islanders.

"People are afraid that if Hawaiian goes under, United or other large airlines will come in and drive Aloha under by flying below cost and raising prices when they have a monopoly. But what is preventing United from doing it now? Airlines are in no position to run at a loss purposely. We can enact regulation when we see monopoly happening, not on speculation. Regulation will increase fares and allow inefficiency to continue.

"We cannot compare inter-island travel with other remote areas on the Mainland that have high air fares. The reason that we have low fares now is because we have high travel demand. You can't drive so you must fly. The argument that we can't drive to the neighbor islands is not an argument for regulation, but for deregulation. Not being able to drive makes travel to the three major islands high traffic destinations.

"Regulation is poor policy at this time. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga then requested a conflict of interest ruling, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to request a ruling on a potential conflict. I am a member of the board of directors of Hawaiian Airlines."

The Chair asked: "Do you receive any compensation?"

Senator Fukunaga responded in the negative and the Chair ruled that Senator Fukunaga was not in conflict.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in support of the bill, as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"Mr. President, in all the years I've been in this Legislature I think this has been one of the hardest problems we've had to resolve. We were faced with an insurance crisis as we began this session and the situation seemed to escalate over time. There was no time to do any research, to gather information as we did on no-fault and yet we had to find a solution. And I think we have done just that with this bill.

"I believe this bill will make homeowners insurance policies available. The prices will be higher, but nevertheless they will be affordable. The companies will participate, however, their liability is capped which means that their situation will now be predictable, which

means that they should be able to price their policies accordingly.

"Mr. President, the one thing that bothered me the most was that the initial solution to fund this program called for an assessment of all property lines which meant that you and I would be paying more by way of a surcharge on our car insurance and other policies. Although automobile policies make up about 60 percent of the total number of property and casualty policies sold in this state, this bill will not surcharge auto policies. So the work that we did over the last few years to try to reduce and stabilize auto insurance premiums will remain intact.

"I think it's a workable plan, but certainly not without flaws. We can come back and fine tune it in the future, if it need be. However, there's one comment that I would like to make in recommending that this bill be passed.

"I am still bothered by the fact that insurance companies claim to be doing the responsible thing by not continuing to sell and renew homeowners policies in this state. As far as I am concerned, Mr. President, I strongly disagree. These companies have large parent companies, who over the previous years, enjoyed profits made in this state but when times got tough, some of them decided to pull out rather than do the responsible thing and assist this community during difficult times.

"The provisions in this bill will allow the board of directors of the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund to look for ways to reward companies by providing incentives, first, for those companies willing to cover all liabilities, including hurricane coverage and, second, for companies who have been good corporate citizens in this time of need and who continued to take care of their customers, rather than 'tucking their tails and running.'

"Mr. President, I believe that this bill will stabilize the current situation. I ask all to vote for it. However, if it does not, and insurance companies do not continue to sell insurance, then I think we should seriously consider legislation to set up a state fund next year. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then requested that the letter she received from First Insurance Company dated March 10, 1993, be included with her remarks.

Dear Senator Ikeda:

Re: HB 1890

At yesterday's hearing, you asked me to put into writing the commitment we made with regard to reentry in the homeowner's market and our pricing plans.

If HB 1890 is enacted with the requirement that regular property insurance policies cover the first \$2,000 of a hurricane loss, First Insurance Company will resume renewal of our homeowner's policies. We will make a market at approximate the same volume as we had last

year. We will maintain our rates for homeowners insurance at the present level for at least a year.

I enclose nine (9) suggested amendments to HB 1890. They clarify some of the language in the Bill and include provisions for insurers to absorb the first \$2,000 of each hurricane loss. I would be happy to work with your committee staff in drafting these or other amendments you may want to consider.

Your comments on the issue of assessments to hold down premium costs were very much on target. We support the idea of a broad based assessment to help ease the transition to separate hurricane policies, but we agree with you it is a redistribution of cost -- not a genuine savings. I believe that the assessment will be helpful for a few years. If the fund grows as I expect it will, assessments could be dropped after a few years as the investment income on accumulated assets becomes significant. The resolution of this issue will not affect our commitment to the market.

Senator Iwase also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the bill.

"At this time, also, I'd like to commend the work of the chair, Senator Ikeda. There were a lot of things on the plate of the Consumer Protection Committee in the beginning of the year, including the recodification of financial institutions -- a whole new chapter, and the continuing initiative on no-fault.

"There is, and Senator Kanno did not know the exact phrase, but there is a biblical phrase, something to the effect that 'in the beginning there was light; in the beginning there was God.' And on the issue of homeowners insurance, in the beginning there was the destruction wrought by Hurricane Iniki and insurance companies who performed their definition of public service by running from the market, leaving the homeowner insurance crisis. In the beginning there was much difficulty, there was much confusion, and through the hard work of Senator Ikeda and her counterpart in the House, some light was brought to this issue. We have before us a package which seeks to address this crisis. Hopefully, it will work; hopefully, we will continue to pursue the insurance companies who have gone under or parent companies who have failed to live up to their public responsibilities. But this is a good bill and this is a good start. Thank you, Mr. President."

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge my House counterpart, my conferees and the insurance division for their assistance with this legislation. Thank you."

Senator Graulty, in support of the measure, stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this bill.

"Mr. President, this bill represents a ten year effort on the part of many people concerned about child abuse and neglect prevention in our state. Child abuse is a problem in all 50 states and all 50 states really need to devote more resources and develop more programs in child abuse prevention if we are to stop the large increase in cases nationwide. I applaud the federal government's participation in this area and hope that our state will take advantage of the federal government's commitment by passing this bill.

"Senate Bill 1453 represents a new approach to child abuse prevention in our state. This bill will allow the private sector to join forces with the state in combatting this difficult problem. The appropriation contained in the bill will allow federal challenge grant monies to match the state and the private sector's contributions.

"Under the leadership of the Children's Trust Fund Coalition, many of the public and private agencies involved in child abuse and neglect have joined together. From my perspective as chairman of the Committee on Human Services, the coalition's efforts to move this bill through the Legislature would not have been successful without the key participation of the Hawaii Community Foundation.

"Mr. President, I am personally familiar with the Hawaii Community Foundation. I know the resources they can bring to the child abuse and neglect prevention effort in our state. I know the impact they can have on our families. It is a big step for them to be involved in this type of human services effort. Rather than decrying

the lack of resources in this area, especially in these difficult budgetary times, they have instead made the commitment to participate in this effort. Mr. President, I look forward to seeing this private-public partnership achieve many successes in child abuse and neglect prevention. I believe it will be a tremendously effective and tremendously worthwhile partnership. I ask all of my colleagues to vote 'aye.' Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this bill.

"Mr. President, educational reform is not an event -it's a long journey. It's a journey we have all made a commitment to take this year.

"This year's educational reform bill continues us on the journey we started when we worked hard to transform the public school system; to transform it from the old industrial age model to meet the needs of the new information age.

"This bill challenges the status quo by not focusing on administrators and administering, by not focusing on teachers and teaching, but by focusing on students and learning. Both the House and the Senate had a common theme this year called 'children first.' And in the conference there were no Senate positions and there were no House positions -- just the children's position.

"Mr. President, this bill was drafted over four days with all groups participating at the conference table. Also, Mr. President, this bill would not be possible without the House and its great leader Chairman David Ige, and I truly embrace his vision, his idealism and his commitment to the children of Hawaii. It was truly a privilege to work with him. We also had the opportunity of having the support of Chairman Ann Kobayashi of the Ways and Means Committee and Chairman Calvin Say of the House Finance Committee. They helped create the collaborative environment that all conferees could work together.

"Chairman Ige and I worked well together as we are both graduates of the public school system. As a student, he was always the one with the pens in his pocket and glasses in the Pan Am bag and ranked in the top two stanines. I was always the one with folder paper in my pocket, never carried any books around and in the bottom two stanines. So I guess we covered the whole spectrum, and that's why we could come together to work on a bill that we're very proud of.

"Mr. President, this bill has four important areas and I will highlight them briefly. The first area is budget and funding reforms and the most significant thing in there, Mr. President, is that schools will now be allowed to

carry money over from one fiscal year to the next. And, really, the message is, who's the budget system created for -- bureaucrats, politicians and policy makers or for the schools? This provision puts the focus on the schools.

"In Section 2, assessment and accountability. What we've done is that we're saying that we're giving up control of prescribing methods and means in order to achieve greater policy results. We're saying that we want accountability, both fiscal and educational, and the Board of Education will be responsible for reporting that to us. The other important measure in the assessment and accountability section is that it links the budget process with student outcomes and student performance. And now schools will have the opportunity to link the planning process with the budgeting process which they so importantly need.

"The third section is innovation, incentives and leadership. We have some changes to the collective bargaining law which allows for a longer school day, a longer school year. We also have some sections that call for a performance base pay, retention pay, and differentiated pay, and there's some good changes to Chapter 89 in there.

"We also have a provision that facilitates the department's restructuring and reorganization efforts to make the school the focal point by allowing the DOE to be cleared up of some of the red tape with Budget and Finance in reallocating positions. The superintendent will have the opportunity to be awarded a four-year contract by the Board of Education to promote some stability.

"We're proud to announce that the educational officers along with the board came to a collaborative agreement on stability bonuses for high school principals and public school employees. They're going to be rewarded and recognized in schools where they have outstanding student performance and stay there for longer than five years and in our bill, they will be given a \$4,000 bonus.

"Also in the bill we have an incentive, an innovative grant program that separates educational merit from political merits. It makes funding programs more objective and sets up a review on our add-ons.

"Finally, in Section 4 on facilities, Mr. President, we have a \$2.5 billion facility need that we need to work on. This year your conferees made a commitment that we're not going to raise taxes; that we're going to work hard to spend money better, and with the money that we have, to do a better job of spending that money. So in the bill we came up with a 'design-build' program for the Department of Education, departing from the traditional program where we hire architects and engineers and have them design a cafeteria in one district and hire another architect and engineer and design it and build the same in another district. The 'design-build' process will not only save money but also streamline the process and make building faster.

"We also have a public/private partnership provision which allows the school system to get into a lease-to-purchase provision, which means that the private sector will put the money up, rather than the public, initially. Hopefully, this would save us some money on bonds. Also, we have a facilities master plan which the DOE is going to be working on to maximize use of existing facilities.

"And, finally, we have a provision in there to allow room cleaners, for schools to deviate from the traditional room cleaning process. What we're saying is that no collective bargaining agreement can infringe upon a school's right or ability to keep classrooms clean. It's not for teachers and teaching; it's not for any other group; it's just for the children, and we have that provision in there.

"Mr. President, as our children look back to what we have done today, it is my hope that they say 'Thank you; thank you for putting us first and for giving us hope in the future.' This bill is not for us but it is for them, Mr. President, and I thank you for the opportunity to work on the bill and I hope that our colleagues support it. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak for the bill.

"It would be difficult not to give too much credit to the previous speaker and his counterpart in the House for their tremendous work on this bill. This is an omnibus bill that follows last year's omnibus bill, but this is a greater, more constructive attempt to change and reform the school system than last year's attempt.

"We cannot discount the tremendous advance in this bill that, I believe, will be brought about by the incentive and innovation fund. Every year innovations are brought to this body for scrutiny and budget passage. The Legislature is not the proper place to decide school methodology and classroom innovations. Those decisions should belong to the Board of Education and to the Department of Education. This incentive and innovation fund allows that decision to be made in the proper place. Education on the school level should be handled as much as possible on the school level and this is a good step in that direction.

"Also in this bill, the bureaucracy will now have to be focused on the school level. The SCBM effort in assessment to allow schools to develop their own assessment mechanisms allow individual schools to decide how they would like to proceed in such important areas as testing, evaluation and report cards. Previously this was not possible because of a small obscure statute that many people in the Board of Education and the Department of Education were not aware of. This bill changes that.

"I should note that along with SCBM we have in the previous bill, the budget bill, passed a small proviso that limits the size of the bureaucracy at the district and state levels to 7 percent. I think this 7 percent limitation, although obscure, is a very important aspect which complements the SCBM efforts of this particular bill.

"Lastly, I would say that this bill, in changing the fiscal structure of the school year, allowing schools to retain 5 percent of their budget for the second year of the biennium is a major step in flexibility and school responsibility. Schools now can use this retention of monies to more adequately plan over a long term stretch and in their own planning reflect their own needs and desires, and of course be accountable for that. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda also supported the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this bill and in doing so I'd like to commend the chairman.

"Fifteen years ago, I tried to get carry-over funds passed and was rebuffed. When my children were in school I worked really hard on the Education Committee trying to get changes and reforms made, and with very limited success.

"Mr. President, it takes courage to promote reforms because people are so resistant to change and I think that the chairman of the Education Committee deserves our thanks and our admiration for his tenacity and his ability to come up with this legislation on behalf of the children of the state."

Senator A. Kobayashi added her support and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this measure.

"I too would like to add my congratulations and thanks to the Education chairman. I was just amazed at his dedication, his energy and his commitment to the children of the schools. He put them first, and that's why this whole program will be successful. Thank you."

"This morning I revisited the January agenda. Mr. President, when I looked at the list we began with I felt constrained once again to borrow a phrase from the Episcopal prayerbook: 'We have left undone those things which we ought to have done, and we have done those things which we ought not to have done.'

"As the member of this chamber with the longest perspective on our accomplishments and our misdeeds -- now the senior member of this Senate -- I can assure you that this has been the usual verdict at our adjournments sine die. Have we ever been able to conclude saying that we have dealt with our problems and they are solved?

"Mr. President, it's a long time until next January. Let's use the intervening time thoughtfully and well. I'd especially like to see us come back with ideas for change in the process that fosters the kind of last-minute chaos we saw last Friday night.

"Let's start in 1994 determined to put a good finish on the biennial agenda of the 17th Legislature. As always, the Republican senators will be here ready to roll up our sleeves, committed to work on the issues Hawaii's people sent us here to tackle."

Senate President Aki then delivered his closing remarks, as follows:

"Distinguished members of the Senate, fellow citizens of our great State of Hawaii, someone once said: 'Excellence can be attained if you:

care more than others think is wise,

- * risk more than others think is safe,
- * dream more than others think is practical, and accomplish more than others think is possible.'

"Fellow Senators, you have cared, risked, dreamed, and accomplished. In my eyes, you have all achieved excellence during this session. At the beginning of this session. I called on all of you to 'seize this opportunity to help shape a special place for our "Keiki O Ka Aina". This session which we are about to conclude, holds special expectation of a fresh start. Despite how easy it can be to lapse into cynicism, to question whether our rhetoric will become reality, despite the change in leadership in the House and Senate, and despite our poor economy; together we have given our best efforts and we have come out farther than expected. If there is anything to learn from this past session, it is the recurring theme that the status quo is no longer acceptable and we share its responsibility to make things better. This session more than ever, we were called to rejuvenate our spirit of compromise and cooperation, and indeed each one of you did very well. Mahalo for your untiring efforts, your worthwhile contributions, and your cooperation. Thank you chairs and committee members for a job well done. And a special mahalo to the chairperson of the Ways and Means Committee, its members and staff for finishing the work on the budget way ahead of schedule.

"Under the present tight economic conditions, we had to make tough choices among many worthwhile programs. We have provided the funds to continue our Educational Programs and Human Service Programs. We did not forget the victims of Hurricane Iniki and the sugar cane We have taken a major step workers of Hamakua. forward in Insurance Reform. These are but a few of our many accomplishments. Obviously, much good has been done, much of the good has gone un-noticed and much remains to be done. I will establish during the interim, a special committee on futures to work on the development of draft policies on certain issues that are of importance to the future of the state. It is my intent that these draft policies serve as 'working papers' for the Senate on those matters which will need to be addressed by the 1994 session. I will appoint the Vice President, Senator Holt, to chair this committee. Membership on the committee will be determined at a later time.

"This 1993 legislative session will be over in a few minutes, but our efforts to solve a number of unresolved issues will continue. Our work is never done.

"In closing I'd like to thank all of our hard working Senate staffers who really don't get the full recognition they deserve.

"Also, I'd like to thank the many government officials and concerned citizens who provided testimony and other valuable information.

"Fellow Senators, I just want to say mahalo for the wonderful opportunity you have given me to be your leader. This new experience has helped me see problems from different perspectives, and helped me grow personally and intellectually.

"Thank you and aloha for now."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1629, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Mutual Benefit Societies.'

The purpose of this bill is to restrict the activities of mutual benefit societies by limiting their insurance business to medical and hospital benefits and prohibiting the operation of medical or health services clinics except for clinics already in existence or clinics in certain medically underserved areas. This bill also establishes certain reporting requirements regarding the financial affairs of mutual benefit societies.

This bill may have an adverse effect on the delivery of health care services to the people of this State by limiting the ability of mutual benefit societies to respond to changes in demand for such services from their clientele or the market or to adapt to new health care initiatives that may be developed on a national level. This bill would also constrain the Department of Health from requesting a mutual benefit society to provide services in certain areas or to certain populations. Although the bill medically underserved areas prohibitions, the process to obtain this exemption could delay the provision of health care services. Moreover, the exemption ignores the needs of medically underserved populations who reside in areas where the number of doctors places the area above the standard required for designation as a medically underserved area.

In addition, this bill may result in extensive litigation to clarify the authorized activities of mutual benefit societies. To the extent that health care providers other than mutual benefit societies may obtain tax-free status, this bill would be subject to a challenge on equal protection grounds. Moreover, there are ambiguities concerning the interaction between mutual benefit societies and other entities, whether for profit or non-profit, and these ambiguities may generate equal protection challenges as well as regulatory confusion in the enforcement of this bill. The resources of health care providers and the State are better expended on health care services than on such litigation.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1629 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to direct an examination of the telecommunication infrastructure in the State, as well as the tariffs needed to meet the demands of consumers, businesses, education, and government. Specifically, this bill directs that the following occur within the specified time frames:

(1) Within 30 days of the effective date of the bill, the Public Utilities Commission ('PUC') shall initiate proceedings to identify the types of telecommunication infrastructure and tariffs needed to provide services to various end-users and to support economic development activities within the State;

- (2) Within 120 days of the effective date of the bill, the PUC shall take action in such proceedings; and
- (3) Not later than 20 days prior to the start of the 1994 regular session of the Hawaii State Legislature, the PUC shall submit a progress report on the results of the proceedings.

The telecommunication infrastructure and array of telecommunication services available in the State are unquestionably important to the economy, education, health, safety, leisure, and general welfare and prosperity of the State and its people. In recognition of this importance and the growing demand to accelerate the availability of new and developing communications, technologies, and services. the PUC has initiated a proceeding that includes an investigation of the State's telecommunication infrastructure. Consequently, the provisions in this bill requiring the PUC to initiate proceedings are unnecessary.

The PUC is anticipating that a number of telecommunication service providers, as well as governmental agencies, will participate in the proceedings. The PUC is hopeful that the input received will provide valuable insight and assistance to the PUC in its effort to address the complex issues. The complexity and scope of the pending proceeding require that the PUC take a systematic approach in its investigation and conduct a proper review and analysis of the record. In view of the complexity of the infrastructure issues, the number of participants in the proceeding, and the procedural rules that must be followed, the 120-day time limit to complete the proceeding is unrealistic.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 81, which addresses the same concerns addressed by this bill, was adopted by the Legislature. Since the PUC intends to submit a progress report to the Legislature as requested by the resolution, the reporting requirement in this bill is also unnecessary.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 250 is to appropriate \$1 for fiscal year 1993-1994 to establish the Pacific Mapping Center ('PMC') in the College of Engineering at the University of Hawaii. However, the establishment of the PMC through this bill would circumvent the formalized process adopted by the University of Hawaii to review and approve new academic programs. Pursuant to the Board of Regent's Executive Policy E5.201, entitled 'Approval of New Academic Programs and Review of Provisional Academic Programs,' programs such as the PMC would be reviewed to ensure that the academic and fiscal soundness of the programs are appropriate with respect to the University system and its missions. By establishing the PMC through this bill, the University of Hawaii would have to 'fit' the PMC into its system regardless of any review process and regardless if the University deemed the program unwarranted.

In addition, although there is a concern that approximately two years might elapse after the University Faculty Senate, Board of Regents, and other committees were convened to review the establishment of the PMC pursuant to Executive Policy E5.201, there is no substantive reason to expedite the establishment of the PMC into the University curriculum. Moreover, there is currently no indication that existing federal funding of the Pacific Mapping Program will cease.

Finally, since current funding scenarios, such as federal funding and joint agreements with other countries, are subject to change, future general fund requirements for the PMC must also be considered.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 250 without my approval.

Moreover, no funds have been appropriated to establish the advisory committee or to fund the promotion program. funds, the DOT will not, with its present staffing level, be able to provide support to the advisory committee and carry out the promotion program.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 241, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Adult Residential Care Homes.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 241 is to create a special fund to be administered by the Department of Health (DOH) for the purpose of developing respite care services for persons operating adult residential care homes (ARCHs) and maintaining a pool of qualified operators to provide services to ARCH residents on a temporary basis.

While I recognize the value of services provided by operators of ARCH facilities, there are several problems with the bill, including the following:

- (1) Although the provisions of this bill were intended only for operators of Type I facilities with five or fewer medicaid patients, this intention is not reflected in the bill. Accordingly, the bill would include Type II facilities with six or more patients and all non-medicaid patients in ARCH facilities.
- (2) The bill does not define 'respite care services.' In addition, during legislative hearings there was discussion that respite care services would allow four days per year of paid time off to ARCH operators. This intention is also not reflected in the bill.
- (3) ARCH operators voluntarily elect to enter into this business knowing the stressful demands of providing these services to the public and they are compensated for this. Respite expenses would be more effectively managed if they were treated as a business expense of the operator and were included as part of the charges for services provided.
- (4) Since there are similar health-care services provided by other caregivers (e.g., services provided by operators in intermediate care facilities and adult foster homes), statutory respite care services for ARCHs would set a precedent for other private caregivers to seek Statesubsidized respite care.
- (5) In light of the State's economy, the estimated costs of implementing the provisions of this bill appear to be prohibitive. Currently, there are approximately 511 ARCH facilities with a total of 1,974 medicaid patients and 624 non-medicaid patients. According to the DOH. estimated costs for respite care by nurse aides range from \$200 to \$300 per day per patient which would result in annual costs for respite care on a per patient basis from \$1,579,200 to \$2,368,800 for medicaid patients. annual costs for respite care on a per patient basis for non-medicaid patients would range from \$499,200 to \$748,800. DOH estimates that respite care by nurse aides would cost approximately \$300 per day per facility. Therefore, estimated costs for annual respite care on a per facility basis would be \$613,200 for the approximately 511 ARCH facilities.
- (6) Additional administrative expenses would be incurred by the DOH to meet the increased work imposed by the statute. DOH estimates that at least three additional full-time professional level positions would be required to recruit and maintain a pool of respite care providers. Additional funds will also be needed for community colleges to train the providers. However, no moneys are provided for these expenses.
- (7) Although special funds are used to dedicate or set aside by law certain moneys for a specified purpose, the special fund to be established by this bill will rely primarily on moneys appropriated by the Legislature to

the special fund. No moneys were appropriated for deposit in this special fund. Consequently, this special fund cannot be used for respite care services at this time.

It is also unclear where the dialysis equipment would be located. Although Honokaa Hospital is a state medical facility located in the North Hawaii area. Honokaa Hospital is a long-term care facility and is not equipped or staffed either to provide the dialysis treatment services or to handle acute care services if complications should The other facility in the area, the Lucy Henriques Medical Center, could house the machine itself. but would be unable to underwrite the ancillary costs associated with dialysis treatment services. Furthermore, a possible alternative exists in portable dialysis machines. These would be more cost effective, because they would be rented, as opposed to purchased, for in-home treatment and, additionally, a portion of the cost might be subsidized under Medicare.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 1538 is to establish interim requirements which the Department of Health must follow when soliciting proposals for emergency ambulance services from private companies.

The requirements in the bill are already provided in the procurement provisions of chapter 103, Hawaii Revised Statutes (H.R.S.), and may be incorporated into bid documents with prospective contractors as well. The following are examples of redundant or unnecessary provisions in the bill:

- Section 2(1) of the bill requires a public notice for bids. Sections 103-22 and 103-26, H.R.S., already have provisions requiring public notice for bids.
- 2. Under section 2(1) of the bill, a written request for proposals may include, but not be limited to, a list of the managers and trained and duly certified personnel who would perform the services. This requirement is already provided for in section 103-25, H.R.S., which requires that the contracting officer be satisfied as to the prospective bidder's experience and competence in performing similar work.
- 3. Section 2(2) requires an evaluation team, consisting of the emergency medical services advisory committee, to review personnel, qualifications, capabilities, and experience to assure high quality emergency medical services for the state's needs. These provisions can be incorporated into a bid document under a bid evaluation provision.
- 4. Section 2(3) requires the Department to review the price component of proposals deemed to meet or exceed the needs of the county. Section 103-32, H.R.S., addresses this requirement by requiring the contracting officer to award the contract to the lowest responsible bidder. This requirement can also be incorporated in the method of award provision of a bid contract.
- Section 2(4) requires an award of a contract to the qualified bidder who submits the lowest responsive and responsible bid. This is consistent with section 103-25, H.R.S., which requires contracts to be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.
- 6. Section 2(4) of the bill provides that, if there is only one qualified emergency medical services company, the Department may negotiate with that company before awarding it the contract. Section 103-32, H.R.S., contains a more comprehensive and less ambiguous provision regarding the scope of negotiation under similar circumstances.

Accordingly, there is no need for a separate statute governing the procurement of emergency medical services.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 775, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to No-Fault Insurance.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 775 is to revise the laws governing no-fault insurance. Among the key elements of this bill are the provisions repealing the requirement that insurers take all comers; establishing limits on the number of policies for which renewal can be denied or conditioned; and prohibiting, as to services or treatment obtained under the no-fault law, fee-splitting between health care providers and referral of patients by health care providers to another provider without disclosing any significant financial interest the referring provider has in the provider to which the referral is made.

The repeal of the 'take all comers' requirement is an idea whose time has come and would lead to a healthier and more competitive insurance climate in this State. Unfortunately, there are flaws in the way this repeal will be phased in under the bill. The bill sets forth the grounds for nonrenewal or cancellation of no-fault

policies. It is unclear from the bill (and its legislative history) whether this bill should be interpreted to allow insurers to cancel policies up to the stated formula for the maximum number of cancellations in addition to those cancelled or not renewed for nonpayment of premiums or for failure of the insured to be properly licensed or whether the formula limit applies only if not exceeded by cancellations or nonrenewals for other reasons. Moreover, the bill is not clear on the grounds for rejecting initial applications, because the provisions allowing rejection for nonpayment of premiums or failure to be properly licensed will be repealed.

The bill contains other provisions which regrettably contain serious technical flaws that would harm both consumers and health care providers.

One provision of this bill unfairly limits consumer choice in the purchase of insurance, upsetting a balanced approach contained in legislation adopted in 1992. insurance code was amended in 1992 to prohibit automatic stacking of both uninsured and underinsured motorist coverages, but allowed consumers to obtain either optional stacking coverage, or optional higher limits, or both, by paying additional premiums. arrangement balanced the needs of insurers by eliminating automatic coverage and of consumers by allowing them to select the extent of coverage they wished to purchase. This bill leaves to insurance companies, not consumers, the decision whether a policy would be issued to allow stacking or higher limits. Thus, it is unfair to consumers and deprives them of an important choice they ought to be able to make.

Furthermore, this bill prohibits certain referrals between health care providers where certain financial interests are present, but provides no guidance or criteria for measuring the extent of any financial interest. Therefore, providers are not adequately given notice as to their obligations. Moreover, these prohibitions, and the requirement that patients be referring provider's financial interest in the provider to which the patient is being referred, would pose insurmountable obstacles and risk of serious sanctions to health maintenance organizations and ilicensed health care providers employed by such organizations. Indeed, a licensed physician who runs afoul of these provisions risks the suspension or revocation of his or her license to practice medicine.

These provisions eliminating consumer choice in the purchase of additional uninsured and underinsured motorist coverage and restricting the delivery of health care services, on balance, are so seriously flawed as to outweigh the benefits of repealing the 'take all comers' requirement. However, repeal of that requirement is a high priority and thus will be contained in legislation prepared by my administration for the next legislative session.

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RULES OF THE SENATE

of the

SEVENTEENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1. Organization

When the Senate convenes, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order and appoint a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the Senate shall proceed to organize and shall appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. Such proceedings need not be on the day of convening in the Senate. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Senate may elect a temporary Presiding Officer by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

Rule 2. Officers and Employees

- (1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.
- (2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.
 - (3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3. The President

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair and calling for the invocation.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, present them to the Senate and refer all bills and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
 - (7) To appoint all committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
 - (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the summoning of witnesses, or other orders of the Senate.
 - (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To promulgate an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.
 - (17) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

Rule 4. The Vice-President

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5. President Pro Tempore

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or other instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6. The Clerk

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day, immediately after the invocation. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of _____." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
 - (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
 - (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.
- (10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.
- (11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7. Assistant Clerk

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8. Invocation

Each day's sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation.

Rule 9. Sergeant-at-Arms

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; and generally to execute all of the requirements of the President of the Senate.

Rule 10. Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 11. Responsibility of Officers and Employees

The employees shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President, and shall obey and perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate. If required by the President, any officer or employee shall give a bond for the faithful performance of duties.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer.

Rule 12. Pay of Members, Officers and Employees

- (1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.
- (2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13. Committees: Types and Composition

- (1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee and the respective Chair and Vice-Chair thereof shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall be represented on all Standing Committees on such basis as prescribed by the Senate; provided that such basis be at least that of proportional representation. The nomination of the minority party members to all Standing Committees shall be made by the minority party.
 - (2) Leadership Committees shall consist of members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.
- (3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.
- (4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred.
 - (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14. Committee Chair and Vice-Chair

The first person named on the Committee shall be Chair; the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair shall call meetings and preside.

Rule 15. Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16. Standing Committees

Standing Committees shall be appointed for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Seventeenth Legislature. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therefor shall be as follows:

EDUCATION, CULTURE, AND EMPLOYMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote the intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community together with those programs relating to labor and employment. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (1) Committee on Higher Education, Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the University of Hawaii and the community college system, culture, arts, and historic site development and protection.
- (2) Committee on Education, Labor and Employment, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, continuing education, the public libraries, public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities, labor-management relations, and collective bargaining.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to improve the physical and mental health of the people, and to promote social welfare services. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (3) Committee on Health, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation, and hospitals.
- (4) Committee on Human Services, whose scope shall be those programs relating to financial assistance, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth and elderly population, vocational rehabilitation, and social welfare services.

DEVELOPMENT AND GROWTH

This major subject matter area covers those programs which relate to the economy, including economic development, transportation, tourism, and adequate and affordable housing. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (5) Committee on Science, Technology and Economic Development, whose scope shall be those programs relating to new industry development, capital attraction, financial and technical assistance to business, ocean resources, ocean mining, high technology, telecommunications, and the regulation of public utilities and carriers under the Public Utilities Commission.
- (6) Committee on Tourism, Recreation and Transportation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism, outdoor recreation, sports and athletics, state parks and beaches, recreational boating, Aloha Stadium, and air, water, and surface transportation.
- (7) Committee on Housing, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing development and the landlord tenant code.

PLANNING, NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to provide for prudent planning and use of land, water, and other valuable natural resources. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (8) Committee on Agriculture, whose scope shall be those programs relating to agriculture, including aquaculture, fisheries, mariculture, and agricultural water use.
- (9) Committee on Planning, Land and Water Use Management, whose scope shall be issues relating to state planning, urban renewal, community development, the utilization of land and water resources, zoning and land use, coastal zone management, and land reclamation.
- (10) Committee on Government Operations, Environmental Protection and Hawaiian Programs, whose scope shall be those programs relating to government efficiency, public records, public purchasing and contracts, relations between the State and foreign, federal, and county governments, interstate relations, matters of primary concern to the counties or to particular counties, the development and promotion of Hawaii's relations with the Pacific region, waste water, sewage, water pollution, environmental control, protection and health, Hawaiian Homes, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and issues relating to the Hawaiian community.

JUSTICE, INDIVIDUAL AND PROPERTY RIGHTS, CIVIL LAW

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (11) Committee on Judiciary, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revisions, statutory revision, judicial and legal questions, campaigns and elections, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General, Public Defender and Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.
- (12) Committee on Consumer Protection, whose scope shall be those programs relating to business regulation, occupational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.
- (13) Committee on Public Safety and Corrections, whose scope shall be those programs relating to public safety. corrections, and military and civil defense.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(14) Committee on Ways and Means, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including taxation and other revenues, cash and debt management, and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation, government structure and finance.

Rule 17. Standing Committees: General Responsibility

On the bills referred to it by the President, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. On bills that have been referred by the President to more than one committee, subsequent referral committees shall make no substantive change without prior written notice of such change to the first referral committee and consultation and coordination with that committee, via its chair, prior to the transmittal of the amended bill and committee report to the Clerk of the Senate for floor action. On bills referred by the President to one or more committees and then to the Committee on Judiciary, the Committee on Judiciary shall make no substantive change, except changes relating to constitutional matters or judicial or legal questions, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate. On bills referred by the President to one or more committees and then to the Committee on Ways and Means, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make no substantive non-fiscal change without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18. Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19. Leadership Committees

Leadership Committees shall be appointed at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Seventeenth Legislature. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall be drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues. The Leadership Committees of the Senate shall be as follows:

- (1) <u>Leadership Committee on Legislative Management</u>, whose scope shall be the operations of the legislative branch of government, the rules of the Senate, and those programs relating to the establishment and operations of legislative support agencies such as the Office of the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman, and the Legislative Reference Bureau. In the event of an electoral contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members.
- (2) <u>Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments</u>, whose scope shall be to review the background, character, experience, and qualifications of nominees for executive and judicial offices submitted by the Governor, and make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.

Rule 20. Leadership Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility

The Leadership Committee on Legislative Management shall:

- (1) Make recommendations to the President on the procedures and manner in which the administrative and personnel operations of the Senate should be conducted.
- (2) Make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriations bills providing for the expenses of the Legislature and procedures to ensure that the expenses of the Senate are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

For administrative purposes, the committee may authorize the chair to perform such duties on its behalf as it may deem appropriate.

Rule 21. Meetings of Committees

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of Leadership and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings and decision-making sessions shall be publicly posted by first referral committees at least 72 hours before their meetings and by subsequent referral committees at least 48 hours before their meetings, provided that these notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees which may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22. Public Hearings on Bills

- (1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.
- (2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.
- (3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

Rule 23. Committee Reports

- (1) The Leadership and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.
- (2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.
- (3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members appointed by the President have concurred in the report.

Rule 24. Committees: Factfinding and Content of Reports

- (1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.
- (2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter.
- (3) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.
- (4) Whenever a committee fails to agree, the majority shall report and it shall be the report of the committee. The minority may report or simply write upon the report of the majority the words "I (or we) do not concur," signing the

same. The final vote of each member of a committee upon any matter referred to it shall be recorded in the records of the committee.

(5) Any decision by a committee chair to hold a bill in committee may be appealed to the majority caucus upon written notice to the President signed by a majority of the members of the committee.

Rule 25. Committee of the Whole

- (1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.
- (2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.
 - (3) The committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.
- (4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.
- (5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 26. Meetings

- (1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.
- (2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 27. Attendance

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 28. Extension of Session

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate	and of the	Legislature of the	State of Hawaii,
respectfully request an extension of	days of the	session of	of the
Legislature of the State of Hawaii."			

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 29. Recessed Session

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 30. Special Sessions

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate	and of the	House of Re	presentatives o	of the
Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respec	tfully request	that a spec	cial session of	the
Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened		,		

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners,	members of the	Senate of the	Legislature of the State of Hawa	aii,
respectfully reques	st that a special	session of the Senate	of the State of Hawaii be convened	at

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 31. Adjournments

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 32. Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 33. Quorum

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 34. Executive Session

- (1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.
- (2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 35. Clearing of the Senate

- (1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.
- (2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.
- (3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 36. Nominations; Appointments

(1) When nominations, except those of justices and judges, shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, unless otherwise ordered, they shall be referred to the Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments within 5 legislative days of receipt of such nominations from the Governor. The final question on every nomination shall be: "Will the Senate

advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent. Public hearings shall be held for all nominees prior to confirmation.

- (2) The fact of a nomination, or its rejection or confirmation, need not be kept secret, but when the Senate or any committee thereof shall deem it necessary for good cause, all remarks, proceedings and votes thereon shall be kept secret.
- (3) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

Rule 37. Meeting at Place Other than Capitol

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 38. Order of Business: General

After invocation, roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Petitions, memorials and miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 39. Order of Business: Special

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 40. Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 41. Order of Business: Order of the Day

After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 38, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 42. Order of Business: Unfinished Business

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 43. Order of Business: Questions on Priority

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS; RESOLUTIONS

Rule 44. Bills: Introduction

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority party leader and the minority party leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

All bills shall be introduced under the order of resolutions.

Bills which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 45. Bills: Referral to Committee

- (1) Upon introduction all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.
- (2) Each such bill shall be referred by the President to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.
- (3) Any printed referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair aggrieved made within forty-eight hours of the referral. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time. The President's decision on a request for reconsideration may be appealed by any chair aggrieved by that decision to a leadership committee comprised of the Vice-President, Majority Leader, Majority Floor Leader, Majority Policy Leader, Majority Caucus Leader, and Majority Whip by writing to the Majority Leader. No request for reconsideration or appeal shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.
 - (4) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 46. Bills: Required Readings

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 47. Bills: First Reading

- (1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.
 - (2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 48. Bills: Second Reading

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 49. Bills: Third Reading

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only, and the President then shall ask the Senate: "Shall this bill pass its third reading?" or "Shall this bill pass its final reading?" as the case may be. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

Rule 50. Bills: Property of Senate

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 51. Bills: Recall from Committee

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 52. Matters Tabled

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 53. Bills: Amendments

- (1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.
- (2) No floor amendment to a bill shall be voted upon unless a copy of the amendment, together with a copy of the complete bill in a form that incorporates the floor amendment, shall have been presented to the Clerk no later than 9:00 o'clock a.m. on the day of the session at which the amendment is to be offered. The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of the floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.
- (3) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.
- (4) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.
- (5) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 54. Bills: Certification

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage at the bottom of the last page of the bill.

Rule 55. Bills: Received from House of Representatives

Whenever a bill which has finally passed the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 56. Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 57. Bills: Correction of Errors

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the House last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 58. Bills: Order of Consideration

(1) The Clerk shall send bills that have passed first reading to be printed immediately. When they have been printed and circulated to the members of the Senate, the President shall refer them to the various committees. When the committees have considered them and reported on them, the committees shall return them to the Clerk, and the Clerk

shall place them in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider them in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 59. Bills: Special Order of Consideration

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 60. Resolutions and Motions: Form

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 61. Motions: Second Required

No motion shall be received and considered by the Senate until the motion is seconded.

Rule 62. Motions: Disposition

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the movant at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63. Motions Applicable to Pending Matters

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit, and
- (5) To amend,

which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64. Matters Postponed Indefinitely

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65. Motion for Previous Question

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66. Motion for Reconsideration

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

- (2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.
- (3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 67. Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications

- (1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 60, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.
- (2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.
 - (3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.
- (4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.
- (5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 68. Questions of Order

- (1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.
 - (2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69. Debate: General Limitation

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the movant of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70. Voting: Methods

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

- (1) First, by voice or raising of hands; Second, by rising; Third, by ballot; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.
- (2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.
- (3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, and the result again shall be announced.
- (4) The method of voting by ballot shall be as customary. The President shall appoint one or more tellers, or direct the Messengers to collect the ballots, which shall be counted by the Clerk. On motion, the Senate may vote upon any question by ballot.
- (5) Whenever one-fifth of the members present shall request, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.
- (6) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71. Voting: Rights of Members

- (1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."
- (2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.
 - (3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.
 - (4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PUNISHMENT

Rule 72. Punishment of Members

The Senate may punish a member for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty by censure, or upon a twothirds vote of all the members of the Senate, by suspension or expulsion of such member.

The President may appoint a Special Committee to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of any member charged by the Senate for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged by the Senate shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense. Following its investigation and hearing the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

In the event the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The Senate, by a majority vote, may censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

Rule 73. Decorum: Transgression of Rules

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74. Decorum: Address

Rule 75. Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76. Decorum: Presence in Senate

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77. Decorum: Conduct in Session

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

Rule 78. Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Article III. Section 18 of the Constitution shall govern.

Rule 79. Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80. Decorum: Smoking

No member or other officer shall smoke within the Senate Chamber during any of the meetings of the Senate unless authorized by the President.

Rule 81. Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 82. Disclosures

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 83. Violating Confidence

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS

Rule 84. Questions to State Officers

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES

Rule 85. Amendments; Suspension; Violations

- (1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.
 - (2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.
 - (3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 86. Parliamentary Procedure

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 1989 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.
