Senator Baker rose on a point of personal privilege and

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, for the past week or so, the people of Hawai'i have been inundated by an almost daily barrage of accusations and counteraccusations being fired between the administration and members of this body. Although all of us are extremely sensitive to the seriousness of the legal and legislative issues involved in this controversy, it obviously does no one any good to continue the

"Mr. President, through it all, the work of the people continues. And it behooves us to demonstrate to the public our resolve to address the issues before this Legislature. For indeed, we are in the midst of one of the most challenging legislative sessions in recent memory.

"To this end, Mr. President, I wish to acknowledge your role in mediating this thorny issue. Cool heads and common sense must prevail if substantive progress is to be made in this year's pressure cooker session. stepping into the fray to talk to the governor to assure him that his nominees will indeed receive a fair and timely hearing, then working with our Senate colleagues to develop a reasonable timetable to review the executive appointments, you have gotten the process back on track. Your actions, I believe, will put this unseemly issue to

"Mr. President, as you reminded us all, it is time to turn our full attention to the work at hand. Mahalo."

Senator Solomon also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, over the last week we have seen attempts by the governor to strong-arm the Senate in performing its confirmation duties.

"I remind my colleagues that the Senate's power of confirmation, a power that has its genesis with the beginnings of the United States Constitution, is a power that must be zealously safeguarded.

"I believe, Mr. President, it was Alexander Hamilton, one of the Founding Fathers, writing in the Federalists who said of the United States Senate's confirmation powers on April 1, 1788:

'To what purpose then require the cooperation of I answer, that the necessity of their concurrence would have a powerful, though, in general, a silent operation. It would be an excellent check upon ... the president, and would tend greatly to prevent the appointment of unfit characters

"Hamilton went on to write:

'It will readily be comprehended, that a man who had himself the sole disposition of offices, would be governed much more by his private inclination and interests, than when he was bound to submit the of his choice to the discussion and determination of a different and independent body, and that body an entire branch of the legislature. possibility of rejection would be a strong motive to care in proposing.

"What we have before us, Mr. President, is an issue that runs to the heart of the American system of government, after which our state government is patterned. It runs to the heart of our system of separation of powers and checks-and-balances, of which the Senate -- through its confirmation powers -- is such an important part.

"Attempts to stampede the Senate's deliberative process by calling for hastened decisions to allow the directors to get on with the process of running the departments ignores the fundamental requirements of the confirmation process. It is our duty -- not right -- but duty, to hold hearings to inquire into the ability of these individuals to manage their departments. I quote Rule 17 of the Senate Rules: 'Committee on Executive and Judicial Appointments, whose scope shall be to review the background, character, experience, and qualifications of nominees ..., and make appropriate recommendations to the Senate.' And that is what we are trying to do in our hearings. Many of them have little, if any, managerial background, and yet the Governor says we are asking 'nit questions regarding their management capabilities. Mr. President, departments do not come with training wheels.

"As a result of our so-called 'nit picking,' three out of the four possible directors have serious questions they need to answer to the committee's satisfaction.

"Ms. Kathryn Matayoshi came to us with a known conflict with the Hawaiian Electric Company. She states she will handle that conflict by not participating in proceedings that involve the Hawaiian Electric Company, and in fact, will let her deputy cover this area. As far as the committee could glean, the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs would not know how the deputy would handle a problem in this area, and yet your committee does not confirm the deputy. Something is wrong here, Mr. President.

"Ms. Lorraine Akiba tells us in the hearing that the workers' compensation law is okay and does not require much change. She tells us that there is a lot of agreement among the parties. Mr. President, one of the most important pieces of legislation we are working on this session will be workers' compensation reform, and I might add there is little agreement among the parties on many of the important issues. More and more people in business are coming to me and saying that Ms. Akiba does not want to hear their side of the story -- that they can't get a fair hearing.

"Mr. Seiji Naya was unable to appropriately answer questions regarding the Auditor's findings concerning the acceptance of gifts by people whom he will supervise.

"Mr. President, these are not 'nit picking' issues; these questions are the heart of the confirmation process.

"To quote Federalists Paper No. 76 again, confirmation 'would be an excellent check upon a spirit of favoritism in the President, and would tend greatly to prevent the appointment of unfit characters from State prejudice, from family connection, from personal attachment, or from a view to popularity. And, in addition to this, it would be an efficacious source of stability in the administration.'

"It is apparent, from what my staff gather, that there is little understanding of our confirmation process. Starting this year, unlike previous years, all Senate committees have publicly posted decision-making sessions at which time any legislative matter (including confirmations) handled by the committee is voted on. There are official tally sheets on which each committee member present shall be tallied as aye, aye with reservation, nay, or excused. This record of votes is to be attached to the committee report of each hearing. Therefore, insofar as

my committee is concerned, we have no recommendations to make to this body on the nominees because we had not had any decision-making sessions as yet. The process is not completed.

"Mr. President, I wish to make another point. To get away from the rubber stamp and old boy cronyism syndrome, my staff and I have tried to make my committee more meaningful. From last December we began our work. To have more public input we compiled a mailing list of interested parties for each nominee and sent them hearing notices. This amounted to, in some cases, 200 letters per nominee.

"We also reviewed the Legislative Auditor's Reports of the past few years on each nominee's department. In most cases the Auditor presented recommendations and our committee questioned the nominees on the recommendations.

"Early on, I sent memos to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to ask for input from the respective bodies for any matter concerning the nominees. Also, my staff provided each member of the EJA Committee the plan of organization and the main functions of each department.

"Furthermore, we included parts of our Constitution and the Senate Rules relating to duties of my committee.

"Mr. President, my staff and I worked very diligently to make the confirmation process meaningful. Let's not make our hard work go to waste. Let's go forward.

"To quote the Governor when he was a Senator in 1985, regarding the Mike Lilly appointment, 'The executive has no business interfering with ours.' Let us get on with the process, Mr. President. Thank you."

At 11:47 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:50 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Senator Solomon, chair of the Committee on Executive and Judicial Appointments, requested a waiver of the 72-hour Notice of a Public Hearing on Gov. Msg. No. 127, Gov. Msg. No. 131, Gov. Msg. No. 136, Gov. Msg. No. 137, Gov. Msg. No. 142 and Gov. Msg. No. 144, and the Chair granted the waiver.

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Ihara, seconded by Senator Anderson and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, March 22, 1995.
