At 9:43 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Ihara, seconded by Senator Liu and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor's state of the state address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Eighteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1996, was called to order at 10:09 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Joseph Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Eighteenth Legislature:

Ms. Samantha Cayetano, daughter of Governor Cayetano;

The Honorable Mazie Hirono, Lieutenant Governor of Hawaii. She was presented leis by Senator Les Ihara, Jr., and Representative Dennis Arakaki;

The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice, Hawaii State Supreme Court. He was presented a lei by Senator Malama Solomon;

The Honorable Jeremy Harris, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, and Mrs. Harris;

The Honorable Stephen Yamashiro, Mayor of the County of Hawaii;

The Honorable Keiko Bonk-Abramson, Hawaii County Council Chair;

The Honorable Ron Kouchi, Kauai County Council Chair: and

Major General Jan Wepster, Deputy Commander, Army National Guard, USARPAC.

The Speaker then appointed Senators Rosalyn Baker, Mike McCartney and Michael Liu, on behalf of the Senate, and Representatives Paul Oshiro, Tom Okamura and Gene Ward, on behalf of the House of Representatives, to escort the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senator Donna Ikeda and Representative Annelle Amaral presented Governor Cayetano with maile and ilima leis.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Eighteenth Legislature and guests the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, Governor of the State of Hawaii.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I was wondering if Earl Anzai is here. Some of you may have noticed his new hair style. I just wanted to say that the rumor that we are shipping him off to Texas is untrue. (Laughter.)

"Good morning and aloha!

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the State Legislature, Lt. Governor Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, Mayor Harris, Mayor Yamashiro, members of the City and County Councils, members of the Consular Corps, our friends from the military, honored guests, my fellow citizens:

"Before I begin my second State of the State address, I want to thank my family, my friends, my cabinet, my hardworking cabinet, for the support they gave me over the past year. They were there when I needed them and I will never forget it. In my first State of the State address, I focused almost entirely on the State's budget crisis. This morning, I ask for your indulgence as my address will be a bit longer than last year's. I intend to cover a bit more.

"My administration took office in the midst of the longest economic slump in Hawaii's history. We found ourselves facing the worst fiscal crisis in our State's history.

"After only 45 days in office, we were forced to take action, and we did. First, we cut spending. I gave education the highest priority. The Department of Education was cut only 3.1 percent, the University of Hawaii 8.9 percent, while most other departments experienced cuts ranging from 10 to 22 percent.

"Second, fourteen programs were eliminated and many others were downsized.

"Third, we abolished nearly 1,200 jobs, including 600 warm bodies.

"It was not easy. It was painful. It had to be done, and we did it. Today, there are 2,750 fewer employees in the Executive Branch of the State government than there were one year ago.

"State spending has fallen for the first time in years. Today, the State spends less than it did in 1993.

"We have made good progress toward restructuring. I want to give you some examples.

- The Department of Accounting and General Services has cut the average building time for a classroom by one-third. We think we can do better with your help.
- The Department of Health, with Transportation and Land and Natural Resources, developed a team approach to permit approvals. In four months, they cleared up a \$400 million backlog in federal Clean Water permits for construction. One of these projects was the \$78 million Ford Island Causeway. Two weeks ago, ground for this project was broken.
- We cut sick leave and overtime abuse at the prisons, and at Halawa alone, we saved \$1 million in overtime costs.
- Our Tax Department has been innovative, streamlining the filing process with a one-page individual income tax form. Tax information is now on the Internet. Electronic filing of a tax return is now being developed.
- Our libraries -- also innovative. Using technology, our libraries have increased by more than seven times the newspapers and magazines local readers can access. There are some wonderful stories at the library. It tells you a little bit about what the human spirit can do when called upon. The Kailua Library, for example, used the innovative self-directed work team approach. This is the approach where the janitor will help the person at the counter, and the person at the counter will help the janitor when time permits. And using that approach, with less people, the Kailua Library increased its reader output from one thousand to two thousand books a day. Today, library hours have been restored to what they were before the fiscal crisis.
- We have also just implemented a pilot program to put all State bid notices, requests for proposals, and other legal notices on the Internet. When fully implemented, it will save the taxpayers millions of dollars in newspaper advertising costs.

"Now, let me turn to our current efforts to deal with the budget crisis.

- We propose to consolidate or eliminate State boards, commissions and other bodies which we believe are unnecessary or outmoded.
- We propose to abolish the Hawaii Labor Relations Board, the old HPERB, the Board of Human Services, the Fisheries Coordinating Council, and other outmoded bodies.
- We propose to abolish the State Office of Planning and the Office of Children and Youth, moving their necessary functions to appropriate departments.
- We propose to phase out the Land Court.
- We propose a single Office of Housing. This will consolidate the Hawaii Housing Authority, the Housing Finance Development Corporation, and the Rental Housing Trust Fund.
- We propose that the Hawaii Labor and Industrial Relation Appeals Board be restructured so that each

- member of the three-member panel can hear cases singularly. This is to reduce their backlog of cases.
- We propose to reform our Civil Service System.

"No other event demonstrated the need for reform more than the recent layoffs of 600 State employees last year. The specter of mostly young and oftentimes excellent State workers being dumped solely on the basis of seniority could be defended, I suppose, thirty years ago when the individual worker had few legal rights to defend him or herself from ruthless employers. Then, seniority was a useful and much needed right. It makes little sense for us today to let this practice continue.

"If we want to make government better, we must reform the Civil Service System to include merit along with seniority as a factor in determining an employee's rights. In this connection, I am truly pleased to know that the Hawaii State Teachers Association and the University of Hawaii Professional Assembly have publicly expressed their support for a merit-based system. To the unions, I say, we are ready and willing to work with you and the Legislature in considering these reforms.

"I cannot tell you today that our fiscal crisis is over. But we are in a better position than we were one year ago. Working together, I think we will do better again next year. We have submitted our financial plan. It has been carefully constructed. If you disagree with our recommendations, we are open to your ideas.

"But in order to avoid massive layoffs, you must replace spending cuts or revenue increases, dollar for dollar. For example, our proposal to save \$47 million through a one-time payroll lag has been criticized. That \$47 million represents approximately 1,300 State jobs.

"We will join and we applaud both the House and Senate in your effort to establish a 'rainy day' fund. This is something that is long overdue and we're happy to join you. We have a constitutional duty to balance the budget. Working together, I know we can do it.

"Let me now turn to discuss some of the priorities of my administration.

"Our ability to fulfill our dreams and meet our responsibilities -- for social services, to protect the environment, to offer each child a quality education -- are all tied in to the strength of our economy. That is why restoring economic momentum is my top priority. I will be releasing a report entitled, Restoring Hawaii's Economic Momentum, prepared by Dr. Seiji Naya. This report covers comprehensively our economic development plan. I urge you to read it because my address today, although extensive, will not be able to cover everything.

"State government cannot spend itself into early recovery. That is a lesson that we have learned. Our hope for economic recovery must come from the private sector. It is the private sector which must be the primary stimulus to the economy, providing jobs and income to our people.

"There are some good signs. Presently, tourism seems to be rebounding. Japanese visitors are returning in greater numbers. And the economic recovery on the mainland should give us yet another boost.

"But much more must be done. Our challenge is to adjust government policies to allow the private sector to recapture its momentum. The first major change is one of attitude toward business. The State government must be a facilitator for the economy and not just a regulator. This requires a major change in the historical 'us against

them' attitude. Government, business, and labor must develop a new attitude of partnership and cooperation. We have begun that process.

"Let me talk about some of our industries.

"Construction. To help the construction industry, we have increased our efficiency in processing permits. In some areas, we have reduced delays for public building projects by at least one-third. These reforms have allowed me to release nearly \$600 million in State capital improvements for schools and other infrastructure by the end of this fiscal year. These reforms will also reduce project costs in the private sector and provide more jobs.

"Housing. We will redefine our housing policy to get the State out of the business of competing with the private sector. The State's main housing responsibility must be to increase rental housing and shelter for the disadvantaged, those whose housing needs are not being met by the private sector.

"In addition to restructuring our housing policy, we will provide incentives to private developers to build rental housing in joint developments with counties, mutual housing associations and non-profit organizations. And we will end the State's well-intended but failed so-called 60-40 affordable housing rule and leave it to the counties to negotiate such details with each developer.

"Workers' Compensation. We will press our efforts to bring down the cost of workers' compensation. We propose setting up a non-profit domestic mutual insurance company, owned and run by the business now in the assigned risk pool. This concept has been successfully used in other states to lower the cost of workers' compensation. We believe it can work in Hawaii.

"Automobile Insurance. One of the hot topics last year, I hope it's not too hot this year. Changes in our workers' compensation medical fee schedule are already reducing automobile insurance premiums. Recently, AIG, a major automobile insurance company, announced it would reduce premiums by 25 percent. We have our own proposal, and I hope to work with Senator Holt and Representative Menor in developing a package that's agreed to by everyone. We will propose automobile insurance reform that preserves the right of injured persons to seek just redress while reducing premiums by 35 to 40 percent.

"Telecommunications. Hawaii cannot be a major player in the global economy without first-rate telecommunications. When I took office one year ago, Hawaii had one wire-based telecommunications company. It was a monopoly. You (Representative Herkes I believe it was, and I want to congratulate him) introduced a bill to start the process of deregulation. We agreed and we supported that. You passed that bill, and today, one year later, Hawaii has three wire-based and three wireless telecommunications companies. As a result, our local banks have financed approximately \$1 billion -- we think it's more -- but \$1 billion for telecommunications infrastructure development.

"Next year, we expect to have a choice of telephone carriers and potentially experience 30 percent lower consumer costs. Within three years, we expect to have complete statewide telecommunications service with satellite and fiber-optic links across the Pacific to Asia. This will give Hawaii the capability of being part of the global economy and becoming a major player in the Asia-Pacific region. All of this was accomplished without spending one State dollar. We, the Executive Branch and you the Legislature, did it by simply changing our State

law to free up competition. It's a great example of what we can do even when we do not have money.

"Export of Goods and Service. Last month, two dozen small Hawaii companies were able to sell nearly \$1 million worth of made-in-Hawaii products in just two hours through the cable telemarketer QVC. The QVC officials said it was the most successful sale of products ever. This experience tells us that there is a high demand for made-in-Hawaii products on the mainland United States. We will help market these products.

"But even more promising for Hawaii products and Hawaii's professional services is the huge and rapidly growing Asia-Pacific market. We talk about this a lot, but few truly understand its magnitude and potential. Let's talk about the biggest nation and that economy -- China, 1.2 billion people, huge Guandong Province. I had never heard of Guandong Province until last year, believe it or not. That Province alone has 71 million people -- more than France or Italy or England. And yet, most of us know more about France, Italy and England than we do about Guandong Province. It has been estimated that China needs to spend \$800 billion over the next decade to build an infrastructure to support a developed economy.

"China is a huge market but it is only a part of the Asian-Pacific market. American companies are there. Motorola, for example, expects that one-half to two-thirds of its future business will be from this market alone. We in Hawaii need to prepare ourselves to find our niches in this huge Asia-Pacific market, and we can do it for our products and for our professional people, and we are already there.

"GTE Hawaiian Telephone, Hawaiian Electric, Bank of Hawaii are already doing business in the Philippines. Our architects, our engineers, our resort developers are being solicited to help develop infrastructure in several provinces in China. Our people are doing things all over the world and we in government don't know too much about it. Well, we need to help them. To encourage our local firms to go after this business, to expand the opportunities in the Asia-Pacific market, we are introducing legislation which we hope you will support to eliminate the general excise tax for certain exporters of professional services.

"Let's take the private sector investment. We need private sector creativity and investment if we are to increase our capacity for future growth. The State simply does not have the resources or the ability to do it all alone. We must create the appropriate business climate to make this happen.

"Therefore, we intend to come to you to change the Enterprise Zone law, to enhance the Enterprise Zone program by modifying the restrictive rules to create high-value jobs in knowledge-based industries such as health care and technology.

"Tourism. Of course, the engine that drives our economy is tourism, and we must continue to assist the private sector to market Hawaii as a world-class destination resort. In this connection, the State's \$350 million investment in the Convention Center will play a critical role in attracting professional and business visitors. It will fix Hawaii as a world-class business destination beyond the turn of the century. More importantly, it will provide a vast array of benefits, including more jobs, investment, and trade. As Governor, I will take every step to ensure that the Convention Center will open on time, as planned.

"Honolulu's waterfront from Kewalo Basin to Keehi Lagoon has long been acknowledged as Oahu's premier untapped asset. Progress by past administrations has been made on the waterfront, including the Aloha Tower Marketplace and the Kakaako Waterfront Park. I want to see the day when Hawaii's people can walk from end to end along the waterfront. As they stroll along, they would pass green grass with tree-shaded benches, glistening beaches, and inviting shops and restaurants. At Honolulu Harbor, they could stop to watch a bustling commercial harbor. Adjoining the Kakaako Waterfront, they could visit a world-class aquarium. At Keehi Lagoon, they would see a water sports center with world championships Development of in kayaking, sculling and canoeing. Honolulu's waterfront is an important part of our efforts to restore economic momentum and we would like you to support us.

"Health Care. I believe Hawaii can be the health care center of the Pacific. As you know, we recently hosted the Mayo Clinic in an effort to get them to establish a presence in Hawaii. We will continue our efforts to develop a health industry which services the people of Hawaii and the Pacific Rim. But the private sector is already ahead of us and we must help them. Private hospitals such as Straub, Queens and Kuakini have already launched similar initiatives. They understand what the market is like out there. Straub, for example, has brought in the world renowned Joslin Diabetes Center of Boston. We will support their efforts and we will launch our own initiatives.

"Science and Technology. Another promising area of economic growth for the State of Hawaii. Many don't realize it but we already have substantial assets:

- The leading center for astronomy in the Northern Hemisphere is on Mauna Kea.
- The most powerful super computer in the U.S. for imaging is at the Maui High Performance Computing Center.
- The Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kauai is the most advanced high-tech center in the world for surface, air, and underwater naval training.
- The University of Hawaii houses one of the leading ocean research programs in the world.
- Next month, we will dedicate the Pacific Disaster Center in Kihei. It will be the first link in a world network of disaster centers.

"We must build on these assets to develop high-tech programs and businesses. To develop a strategy for the best use of our resources, I am forming a Governor's Task Force on Science and Technology, and I have asked Lt. Governor Hirono to chair that task force.

"Kapolei, the Second City. I am committed to making the Second City of Kapolei a vibrant center to live, to work, to learn. The development of Kapolei will improve the quality of life for all Oahu residents. Housing in Kapolei is affordable and will continue to be affordable. When jobs go to Kapolei, traffic congestion in Honolulu will be reduced and people will be able to live close to where they work.

"The University of Hawaii at West Oahu is an integral part of the dream of Kapolei. As you know, we recently completed a land exchange agreement with the Campbell Estate for a site in Kapolei. In exchange for 58 acres at the Hawaii Raceway Park, the State will receive 950 acres for the new campus. This exchange will make it possible for the State to build the West Oahu campus without

draining funding from other UH campuses. West Oahu will serve not only the people of Leeward/Central Oahu -- the fastest growing area in the State -- but our entire State and the people of the Pacific Rim. With your approval of the land exchange and with your approval of the funding mechanism that we will be submitting to you, we will build this campus without any general fund appropriation.

"Let me turn now to the neighbor islands.

"Clearly in our push for economic development, we recognize the overriding importance of our neighbor islands. I have begun discussions with the mayors of the counties to deal with important issues which affect their respective counties. We are taking steps to ease the pain of structural dislocations caused by the phase-out of sugar and pineapple, and to encourage the transition to new We are encouraging investment in economic bases. forestry, diversified agriculture and cultivation of energyproducing crops, and perhaps the building, by the private sector, of a minimum security prison on the Big Island. Already, several private firms have expressed interest not only in commercial forestry, but also in building the prison. And I am engaged with Mayor Yamashiro in discussing these matters to the fullest and finding out ways in which the State and the County of Hawaii can work together.

"While I am on the business of prisons, let me digress for a minute. It is not in my prepared text. But we (and I know you are concerned about prisons) will expand the facilities at Waiawa. We will put people who have drug addiction problems in Waiawa, expanding the current program from 37 people to 200. Mayor Harris of the City and County of Honolulu graciously offered to help us build this facility and, Mr. Mayor, I accept your offer.

"One last thought on the neighbor islands, and there are so many issues which affect the neighbor islands, of course, but we know that we need to promote tourism -- the visitor industry -- on the neighbor islands, and we will do all we can to help by building airport facilities which will allow direct international flights to those islands, and we will work with the counties in doing this.

"Environment. Let me now touch briefly on other important issues -- the environment. When I got elected, I appointed a member of the Sierra Club to head the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Everybody was a little worried ... he turned out okay. He has convinced me that part of our challenge is to protect our natural resources, our endangered species, our land and water. The other is to manage and improve renewable resources -- our forests, oceans, parks and beaches -- for the long-term access, enjoyment and public benefit.

"He has developed, and I agree and I support this project, a 'string of pearls,' a state park system with at least one major wilderness park on each island -- Na Pali on Kauai, Kaena and Ka Iwi on Oahu, Makena on Maui, and the Kona Coast on the Big Island. We ask for your support in making this string of pearls state park system a reality.

"Welfare Reform. One of the most troubling issues that has faced us, a very difficult and complex issue, is welfare reform. We will submit to you a welfare reform package that insists on individual and family responsibility and that provides opportunities to build self-reliance and self-sufficiency. Last year, we instituted a work requirement for the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) Program. It generated some controversy. We had no choice because the dollars were scarce. But as a result of this program, the number of those employed has increased more than four times, and the number of those who have

gotten off AFDC is twice what it was last year. It seems to me that we are on the right tract.

"Last year, we also began a new Public-Private Employment Partnership that asks private sector employers to participate with the State in expanding job training programs. We will build on this effort which provides employers with motivated workers who can, with some help, exit the welfare rolls.

"Hawaiian Home Lands. A tragedy a few days ago on Kauai focused on the Department of Hawaiian Homes. Let me state that as Governor I believe that it is important that we do everything we can to provide native Hawaiians with homestead lots and lands. Last year we proposed, and you agreed, a \$600 million settlement of the Hawaiian Home Lands claims. This means that for each of the next 20 years, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands will receive \$30 million to develop their lands for the Hawaiian people. In order to speed up the process even further, we propose making available lands in Hawaii Finance and Development Corporation projects in Kapolei, Leialii, Lahama and Kealakehe in Kailua-Kona to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. The good thing about this proposal is that we accomplished two things: First, we provided land with infrastructure to a department which is hungry for such land, which has a waiting list that is too long. Second, we addressed the problem of the \$30 million a year payment. We feel that this is very, very promising and we hope that when we come down with our package to make these transitions, you will support us.

"Education. Education has always been my highest priority. Our young people are our future. And we should do all we can to provide them with quality education. For that reason, with the authority that I have vested in me, I spared the public schools from any budget cuts. In my version of the budget, I did not cut one cent from the \$631 million school instructional budget. The cuts were supposed to come out of administration.

"A few years ago, I chaired the Legislature's Task Force on Educational Governance. The Task Force made many recommendations. The Legislature adopted some of them when it passed the Education Omnibus Bill three sessions ago. The thrust of the Task Force's work and the Education Omnibus Bill was to give the Department of Education and the public schools greater autonomy. That has been done. Two years ago, you gave the DOE lump-sum budgeting. Since then, more schools have established School Community Based Management Councils, involving parents and community members in individual school decision-making.

"Now is the time to give our educators some space, to give them the opportunity to implement some of the reforms we have established, to let them teach without us -- you and me -- burdening them with new laws and new demands. Over and over again, I hear from teachers that they are unable to keep up with the laws and the rules and regulations that we crank out of this particular building. So, let's give them some space. Let's hold them accountable; let's see what the results are. But in the meantime, let's do all that we can to provide them with the resources that they need to do the job.

"Building a better future is not simply about economic survival. It is also about fulfilling our most cherished dreams and aspirations for our children while being compassionate to those who need our help.

"Not a day goes by that I do not ask myself, 'How can Hawaii fulfill its destiny and reach its full potential?'

"Hawaii is a wonderful place. We have so much to offer others. Not just scenery and climate, but a rich diversity of people and cultures. The Aloha Spirit. Unique skills, knowledge and experience that come from our unusual location and history.

"Most people now understand that we live in a fast-changing global economy. We cannot let Hawaii get lost in the shuffle. In order for Hawaii to take its rightful place, Hawaii's economy must be strong and our people prepared. That means we must diversify and grow.

"In the forceful words of Robert Reich, President Clinton's Secretary of Labor, in his book, The Work of Nations, the value of a nation can be measured in the skill of its workforce. And so the State and so the individual. This means that our people must be made relevant to our economy during this period of highly charged change.

"How will we do this? In four distinct, yet interlinked, ways.

"First, we must create the proper technological infrastructure to eliminate the disadvantage of distance that we face. Last year, we took a giant step in eliminating that disadvantage.

"Second, we must help our young people acquire the skills, the knowledge and the attitudes that enable them to compete on a global basis. We must support education.

"Third, we must create a positive business climate. Not just lip service to that idea, but an environment in which our government -- and let me say that again -- our government is a facilitator, not an obstacle to healthy business growth.

"Fourth, and most importantly, we need to believe in ourselves again. We need to believe that we can go out into the world and accomplish anything we set out to do. We need to believe that -- given the proper tools, including education -- our children can go anywhere they want, compete with anyone -- and win. We need to believe that we can achieve all that we dream of right here in Hawaii Nei. I believe this economic downturn is coming to an end, but the Hawaii that emerges when it does end will not be the one we remember from the 1970s or 1980s.

"Good fortune will not simply fall on us as it has in the past. We are going to have to face the problems that confront us, make tough decisions, and push forward aggressively for what we believe is right.

"We will all be judged, all of us here this morning, by what we accomplish together in the next few months and years.

"I do believe that times are getting better. I believe that the economy will improve. Certainly, I am going to do everything in my power to do so.

"I truly believe, however, that if we all work together and we set aside our personal agendas, our egos, that we can turn this crisis, this very, very serious fiscal crisis, the worst crisis in our State's history, into a great opportunity to build a better Hawaii.

"Thank you very much and aloha."

Senate President Mizuguchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor, for your thoughts.

"The Legislature appreciates your insight on the issues we face in putting our fiscal house in order and laying the foundation for a stronger financial future.

"The House and Senate stand ready to work with your administration on the budget, executive branch reorganization and economic initiatives.

"We want to assure you that our doors will be open to you for consultation and discussion on matters of mutual concern. Let us both move forward with optimism and resolve.

"Having no further business, I hereby declare the Joint Session of the Eighteenth Legislature adjourned."

At 10:52 o'clock a.m., President Mizuguchi declared the Joint Session adjourned.
