Senator Anderson rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I'm a little confused so I'd like to stand on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I think we all received the communication on the report on contractors' licensing. What I am confused about is, as I started to read this they were saying that they were given a short period of time, yet they were able to give this report. When I look at this, who is a contractor? So I looked at a definition they have in Section 444-1, HRS: '...any person who by oneself or through others offers to undertake, or holds oneself out as being able to undertake, or does undertake to alter, add to, subtract from, improve, enhance, or beautify any realty or construct, alter, repair' It goes on and on, Mr. President. Now, I looked in the Webster's Dictionary because I'm not very bright at times, and it says: 'Contractor ... one that contracts to perform work or provide supplies; one that contracts to recet buildings; something (as a muscle) that contracts or shortens.' I know we don't use the muscle, so I would have added in there demolition.

"What I am wondering is, are we here to make sure that these laws are going to be put out for the public, where we understand as individuals, or are we going to start giving people the HRS so that they will know exactly what the law is, how it pertains to them and if they can abide by that, well and good; and if they can't, they'll have to change. That's what I'd like to know.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."
