FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 19, 2011

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, was called to order at 10:06 a.m., by the Honorable Malama Solomon, Temporary Chair of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i," led by Mr. Danny Kaleikini.

Senators Shimabukuro and Green presented Governor Neil Abercrombie and his wife Dr. Nancie Caraway with lei.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Kim nominated Carol Taniguchi, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Green moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kahele and carried.

The Chair declared Carol Taniguchi as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Fukunaga then moved that a Committee of three Senators be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator Nishihara and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Galuteria, Kidani, and Slom to serve on such committee.

MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 501 and 502) were read by the Temporary Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

Gov. Msg. No. 501, letter dated December 23, 2010, informing the Senate that the Governor appointed Malama Solomon to fill the vacancy as the member from the First Senatorial District, and Maile Shimabukuro to fill the vacancy as the member from the Twenty-First Senatorial District, with both terms expiring November 6, 2012, was referred to the Committee on Credentials.

Senator Galuteria moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Senator Taniguchi and carried.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair called upon Chief Justice Mark Recktenwald of the Hawai'i Supreme Court to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

Chief Justice Recktenwald administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Baker placed in nomination the name of Senator Shan S. Tsutsui for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator English moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Ryan.

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Shan S. Tsutsui as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Shan S. Tsutsui was declared unanimously elected President of the Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011.

The Chair then appointed Senators Kim and Ige to escort the President to the rostrum, and the President addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Governor Abercrombie, Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Schatz, Chief Justice Recktenwald, United States Senator Inouye, United States Senator Akaka, Mayor Arakawa, Former Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Former Governor and Mrs. Waihe'e, Former Governor and Mrs. Cayetano, Former Governor Lingle, esteemed colleagues, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen, good morning and aloha.

"Today, as we have gathered here to start the 2011 session, I open with this assertion—that 'Better Days Are Ahead.' Together, we have weathered the worst of an economic storm that has battered us not only locally but globally. While our State continues to suffer from a sagging real estate market and high unemployment rates, we also see signs that we may be on the slow and arduous path to recovery, a journey in which we must concentrate all of our collective efforts to secure a better future, not just for us, but for our children and for the future generations to come.

"Today, all 25 State Senators come before you, humbled and privileged to lead our State into a new legislative session and to begin a new chapter in Hawai'i's history. In cooperation and collaboration with the Abercrombie administration, the House of Representatives, county officials, and most importantly, the people of Hawai'i, we can begin a time of healing and rebuilding for our great State.

"As we begin this new journey in 2011, it is true that we face many of the same challenges and issues from last year. We must once again address significant budget shortfalls, while continuing to provide necessary programs and services for our community.

"Balancing the needs of today with one eye on the future will be critical. We know refusing to fund social programs may save a few dollars today, but ends up costing us more in the long run. We know that burdening our residents and businesses with excessive taxes and fees may fulfill our immediate need for cash, but could slow economic recovery. We know that depending on tourism as our sole economic driver may provide benefits today, but does not satisfy the need for the diversified economy that will support generations to come. And, we know that by focusing on today's energy comforts over building our sustainable future in energy and agriculture robs our State and our counties of their full potential.

"The recent report on the Council on Revenues and other economic forecasts indicate that our state may have begun to turn the corner. With an increased revenue forecast of an additional one percent, an Administration that is committed to getting people back to work, the promising fact the State has also experienced a recent improvement in tourism in both visitor arrivals and spending, your Senate is hopeful that better days are ahead.

"While these examples indicate that hope is on the horizon, we must remember to be cautiously optimistic, but optimistic nonetheless.

"Teamwork and working together will be the key to moving us forward. Each of us here today, elected, appointed, and members of the public alike, play a crucial role for Team Hawai'i. The beauty of teamwork is that it allows each of us as individuals to accomplish something far greater than ourselves. It allows us to shoulder a shared burden and rely on the talents and skills of others, which together are far greater than our own.

"Perhaps one of the greatest examples of teamwork and what can be accomplished when committed individuals work

together is the remarkable story of the 33 Chilean miners who were trapped half a mile underground, yet emerged alive 70 days later. While you're all familiar with their story, there are two principles that struck me as instrumental in the survival and ultimate rescue of the miners, and they are hope and teamwork.

"Hope lived in each of the miners and their families and friends, especially for each of the first 17 days that passed before the miners made contact with those on the surface. Hope lived in the belief that they would eventually be rescued, even though the earliest estimations projected nearly five months before drilling would reach the miners' location.

"Teamwork was also paramount. The miners benefitted from the leadership of one man, Luis Urzua, who not only rationed the provisions, organized the miners and their work, and assisted with the rescue plan, but also recognized and maximized the strengths and talents of his fellow miners and remained open to input from his team to ensure their collective survival and rescue. Of course, teamwork did not stop there. Up on the surface, experts from all around the world rallied together to devise and successfully execute a plan for the miners' rescue, which ultimately came ahead of schedule.

"With all that could have gone terribly wrong, their story showed us that with hope and teamwork the most impossible goals are in fact possible. And while our journey here will require hope and teamwork, we must also have a plan to reach those 'better days.'

"To jump start our economy, the Senate will propose an aggressive plan to improve our infrastructure throughout the State and deal with the years and years of deferred repair and maintenance projects. We will ensure that our schools provide a safe and proper learning environment, our roads are maintained for everyday travel, our hospitals are safe and operational, and many of our state programs and services are properly housed and administered. We also will continue to modernize our harbors to create greater efficiency for commerce and the businesses that use them, and provide for our airports the re-modernization necessary to ensure safety, efficiency, and viability to help sustain our tourism industry and residential needs.

"Secondly, the only way that our State can prosper is to prepare an educated workforce that maintains high standards for our students, teachers, and administrators. Therefore, the Senate will not only make sure that public school furloughs are a thing of the past, but we will also provide for the overall advancement of our public education system. To do so, the Senate will continue to focus on providing our State with accountability and leadership in education. We will do that by working together with education leaders and stakeholders to increase the time that our children spend with highly qualified teachers. In addition, the Senate sees the University of Hawai'i System as a critical component in our P-20 educational effort and will continue to direct resources toward strategic objectives with the goal of building upon each of the strengths of our 10 campuses statewide.

"This Senate also realizes that strengthening our economy and moving toward sustainability go hand in hand. Today, Hawai'i still imports nearly 90 percent of its food from the mainland and from foreign countries. However, locally grown products can be less expensive, more nutritious, and, as we all know, way more one than imported food. An increased investment in local agriculture will help us build a more diversified economy that is enhanced by industries such as tourism and other trades throughout our State. The Senate will continue to work with agricultural leaders to increase its effort to promote the sale of local products not only here, but to the U.S. mainland and throughout the Pacific.

"Equally important will be the advancements in energy sustainability therefore the Senate will continue to work toward reducing Hawai'i's dependency on foreign oil and maximize alternative energy options that will help us save money and help us save our 'āina.

"While the Senate is focused on the budget, education, and sustainability, we will not lose sight of our obligation to provide resources for our human service programs. The Senate will continue to provide support for our keiki, kūpuna, families, and individuals who are in the greatest need. And, as one of my favorite nonprofits on Maui would say, let's work with individuals to provide a hand up and not a hand out and help people in need restore their hope, reach their full potentials, and enrich their lives.

"In addition, let us not forget our commitment to the Hawaiian people. With seven members of Hawaiian heritage, the Senate will look to them to lead us in dealing with issues that affect the Hawaiian community. Let us work with stakeholders and move forward on a Ceded Lands Settlement to fulfill our responsibility to the Native Hawaiian community.

"And these are just a few of the many initiatives that the Senate will undertake this year all leading us to better days ahead.

"Speaking of better days ahead, we are fortunate for the selection of Hawai'i as the location for the upcoming meeting for the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation, better known as APEC. The meeting will be held this November where President Obama will host APEC leaders who will focus on the development of widespread initiatives to help accelerate growth and create jobs across the Asia-Pacific region. This opportunity to host such a prestigious event provides our State with increased exposure and increased recognition as a formidable business destination. Let us use this opportunity to showcase our State and our culture to the rest of the world. This is an opportunity for us to plant investment ideas and capital that will have a positive economic impact for the years to come.

"Finally, we will remain undeterred from our mission.

"To succeed, it will require compassion for those who are most in need, sacrifice from all of us, and a desire, an unshakable desire, to make things better.

"This is a tough challenge that we face. At times, we will need to agree to disagree, but I believe we will rise to meet this challenge. And we will do so, by not pitting one person against another or by creating a society of haves and have-nots, but by coming together as one 'ohana.

"We have to be responsible and we all have to be part of the solution and that commitment begins today as we prepare for better days ahead.

"Mahalo and aloha."

At this time, the Chair called on Senate Minority Leader Sam Slom.

Senator Slom rose to make the following remarks:

"Senate President Tsutsui, thank you for your inspiring words. Governor Abercrombie and Lieutenant Governor Schatz, former Governors Linda Lingle, John Waihe'e, Ben Cayetano, and George Ariyoshi, and our two distinguished United States Senators Daniel Inouye and Daniel Akaka, and our Chief Justice of our Supreme Court, Mark Recktenwald. On behalf of the entire Senate minority, Aloha!

"Ladies and gentlemen, some people have referred to me as 'The Lone Ranger' because, apparently, throughout the entire United States I am the only single party Senator in a State legislature. The Ranger may have been 'lone' but he was a good

guy; he was unafraid of the odds against him, and he was able to inspire the townspeople to join together and act in their common defense. I will strive to live up to that reputation. However, the Lone Ranger wasn't alone. Even many of my majority party colleagues have been most accommodating and helpful; and for that, I thank them. They understand the need for two parties in the Legislature. My role—as I see it—is to ensure that Hawai'i's Legislature leads in creating a strong and independent Hawai'i for our future, and to make sure that we're doing the best that we can, with the least that we can, for the benefit of all of Hawai'i's citizens.

"Hawai'i still enjoys two competitive philosophies and this is not dependent on the number of Republican Senators. Our philosophy emphasizes individual risk and accomplishment, lower taxes on families and small businesses, transparency in government, and more economic choices for everyone. One of the primary differences in our political philosophy is that the party that I represent believes in the ability of each individual to achieve greatness without the yoke of government. Nationally, and in Hawai'i, we have encouraged an entire generation to shelve their self-reliance and become government dependent. The result has been more people, even some businesses and organizations, clamoring for government subsidy. They have gone to the taxpayer well too often. Now, that well is nearly dry.

"The big issues we face during this session clearly are The Budget, The Budget, and The Budget. We continue to be aware of our state's severe economic challenges—many of which have been created by our own state government—and we know that there has been some positive recovery, notably in the visitor industry—for which we are grateful—but we've not really turned the corner for small businesses, retailing, manufacturing, or most households. We are not inviting new investment or major private job creation to the extent that we need.

"Without systemic changes, we cannot improve Hawai'i's economy. Without holding ourselves to the same laws we pass, we cannot hope to make more transparent what we often do behind closed doors in this building. Expenses can be cut back; they must be cut back in the legislature, and just as individuals, families, and small business have been doing for years. The era of government free spending is over, though some people in Hawai'i's government remain still in denial.

"Our state Employees Retirement System (the ERS) is deemed, 'the 5th worst in the nation'; it's in trouble and underfunded by more than \$7 billion. The ERS must be changed for future beneficiaries. Our state EUTF (the Employees Health Trust Fund) is likewise fiscally challenged due to decades of overgenerous benefits.

"Our state hospital system needs annual 'emergency' subsidies, as does our Medicaid programs. Our Human Services Department revealed the other day it will now operate on a \$2.3 billion budget. That cost is second only to education, which it will surpass in a few years.

"Homelessness grows at an alarming rate without an answer to the financial and human problems. We continue to create more poverty through increased taxes, fees and regulations, and then we subsidize the result of legislative excess.

"Hawai'i continues to suffer from unfunded federal mandates that are quickly draining our treasury, while diminishing our 10th Amendment sovereignty rights. It's time to take back the inherent state rights granted in our Constitution, and that's the pledge we all took this morning.

"Government has allowed our basic infrastructure to deteriorate, including our roads, airports, harbors, parks, sewers, and water systems, no matter how much taxpayer money we spend, but this is not just about money; it's about leadership and

discipline. It's about setting the bar higher for our citizens to follow. It's about the future that we will leave for our children.

"Lessons were learned in most other states in the 2010 elections, and the change in political climate outside of Hawai'i is real and lasting. Change will come to Hawai'i.

"This session, we must focus on the primary issues important to our residents: jobs, a positive business climate, the budget, meaningful education reforms and infrastructure, and not be dissuaded or out of focus with other issues that are not important to these economic priorities. We believe that instead of just offering an opposition to ill-conceived bills, or poorly drafted bills, we need to offer real alternatives. We hope to work closely with the majority, and in the days ahead we will detail specifics, including: an alternative budget, an operating balanced budget, showing where cuts could and must be made while keeping our pledge for 'NO NEW TAXES'; public education incentives that challenge students and reward meritorious teachers without further restrictions in instructional days. But throwing more dollars—\$2.7 billion now—while enrollment, classroom teachers, instructional days and results decline, is not good business, it's not good education, and it MUST be changed.

"Our University of Hawai'i, my alma mater, needs to be more independent of government micromanagement so it can be truly a great university. Voluntary, reasonable energy alternatives, including authorizing new, micronuclear facilities for Hawai'i must be explored. Passage of measures to restore political power to all the people including initiative, referendum, recall, and term limits; and the ability for all of Hawai'i's Native Hawaiians to join legislators to identify what we all need together here in Hawai'i, as opposed to behind closed doors in Washington, D.C. Hawaiians need to be full partners and equal economic beneficiaries in an improved Hawai'i.

"Hawai'i needs an economic jump-start, not from more government stimulus debt, but from the ideas and experience of those who create jobs. They have offered to help us; we need to listen to them and to act. We CAN do this. We must listen to the farmers, the restaurateurs, those in the hospitality industry, technology innovators, and the medical professionals when they specifically tell us what they need to succeed.

"We also celebrate and honor all of our men and women in uniform and are grateful for the military's many contributions—not just financial—to our community.

"The adversity of the current economic slowdown actually is a real opportunity for us to 'right-size.' Our state government has been growing exponentially faster than the private sector and the taxpayers are called upon to support it. Through public workforce attrition and smart deployment of our limited resources, we can bring government to the size we can afford while still protecting core services.

"Our professed belief in sustainability should not be solely related to energy. We need to allow families and small businesses to sustain their standard of living by not overburdening them with more taxes and fees.

"We also know that we need to have both a viable economy and a pristine environment. Medical waste and other toxins in our oceans is outrageous and unacceptable. This is a failure of government despite massive tax dollars.

"Not surprisingly, there is public discontent with our State Legislature. Many believe we spend too much time on increasing our own salaries and benefits, exempting ourselves from the laws that we pass for others, and covering up questionable ethics. The good news is we have several new, fresh faces, and the tools and resources, if we have the political

will to change.

“We are compassionate people, but not at the expense of complacency of our fiscal responsibilities. Your minority stands for the enforcement of existing laws rather than more laws. We approach this Session with enthusiasm for the opportunities that these tough times present and we believe in Hawai‘i’s people. We celebrate our individual God-given liberty and our ability to change for the better. This is not a partisan issue. We can navigate a different course. We can make that happen with the vision of what Hawai‘i can be. Let’s start today.

“Mahalo, God Bless Hawai‘i, and Aloha.”

Former Rule 8 said that each day’s sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation. We traditionally have done that. I noticed that we did not do that today, although we did have an invocation yesterday on the first day of the session. I was part of a three-member Senate committee during the interim to examine possible guidelines for invocation. We had input from community sources, we had input from two deputy attorneys general, and I thought that we had come away from that with the idea that, in fact, we would have some voluntary guidelines and that possibly even the invocation would be prior to the official start of the daily session and would not appear on the Order of the Day, but in fact, would still be a voluntary part of this legislative session, as it has been traditionally, for many decades.

“We know, Mr. President, that the Supreme Court has ruled definitively in the past that the use of invocations by legislative bodies is legal, constitutional, and appropriate. We took note that yesterday Mr. Danny Kaleikini gave us the invocation where the deity’s name was invoked. We had wonderful entertainment by the chorus from Kamehameha Schools, and their songs and their lyrics invoked the deity. I think that we have had no problem in the past with stressing that our invocation is both traditional, customary, but it’s also voluntary. We’ve had members of the Senate body that have chosen not to be present on the Senate floor when the invocation was given; and that, of course, is their right. We’ve also had the opportunity for all senators to give an invocation of their choice or to select a staff member or to invite someone from the community.

“I don’t know of any problems that we have encountered, save two. One from an organization in the community that nationally has had as its, I guess, overall objective, to get rid of all prayer and invocation in all public bodies. They threatened the Honolulu City Council and they were successful; the city council backed away from them. Then we have an individual that represents an organization, and he has for many years taken up the cause of not allowing us to have an invocation. But from the general public, Mr. President, I think that we have very strong support. I think that many people were very gratified yesterday at the presentations that were made here and that they feel that something would be missing, and that the Senate must stand for something and not back away when there are challenges by individuals or by organizations, as I say, that make it their point nationally to have this as an objective.

“I think that it’s important that we stress the need that, as smart as we may be, as intelligent as we may be, that we can still call on someone higher to help us and guide us. And again I stress that it’s fine that this is voluntary. I’m also in full concurrence that we don’t have to have this as part of the Order of the Day, if that’s what the colleagues and members want, but I think for us to take this out of our rules and also to, by omission, tell the community that we no longer think that this is important, I think that this is a mistake. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Galuteria rose in response and said:

“Thank you, Mr. President; we appreciate the comments of our colleague from Hawai’i Kai. For the purpose of clarity, indeed the Senate Rules as proposed do not include a mandate for daily invocations. These proposed Senate Rules are not, and have never been all encompassing of every instance of legislation procedure possible; therefore, the rule allows us, as a body, to use our discretion and flexibility to conduct invocations when we so determine. The Senate will continue to explore the issue and develop a policy for the proper implementation of invocations that is constitutionally sound. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

“Thank you, Mr. President; just a brief rebuttal. I would say that, first of all, the constitutionality issue is not an issue here; that’s been resolved previously. Secondly, I certainly think that it would be appropriate if you want to use the word mandate, and you know that I don’t like mandates, and I don’t like bans, if we would adopt the previous Rule 8 and amend the wording to say each day’s sitting of the Senate may open with an invocation. I think that still would get the message across, it still would allow us the flexibility, but I think that by taking it out of the rules completely and saying that we’re going to look at it at sometime later, I think that this gives the wrong message to the public, that in fact we are unwilling to stand by some principles. So, if you did that, if you reintroduced that as a rule

with the change in word from ‘shall’ to ‘may’ I think that still would accomplish what you want, but be flexible. Thank you.”

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, S.R. No. 2 was adopted.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Blake K. Oshiro and Gene Ward on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Brickwood Galuteria and Sam Slom on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Senate Vice President Donna Mercado Kim and Representative Marilyn Lee presented Governor Abercrombie with lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Abercrombie presented the State of the State Address as follows:

"Thank you. Mahalo nui. Thank you, so very much. Thank you, so very much. Mahalo nui. Aloha. Please forgive me for a moment or two; to be back in this Chamber is something of deep and profound meaning, here in paradise, in our democracy, our Hawai'i nei. I literally cannot greet everyone here that means so much to me, and I beg your indulgence a moment or two on that. My whole life has been...this building has been so much a part of my whole life. I can't help but notice the first person sitting there is Clayton Hee. My godson was born on the very, very night, 1986. Clayton's caused me all kinds of trouble all these years and—as Malama just indicated—more to come, no doubt.

"But the friendships, the loyalties, the aloha that's been expressed...Malama's smiling at me now. She and I used to arm-wrestle over on the other side before. And I look and see Gene Ward; we've been rivals for an office here and we're here today. Gene, I'm glad to see you and thank you for supporting me. Sam Slom—where's the lone ranger? There he is. Sam and I have...my hair was a heck of a lot longer and Sam's was dark when we first met one another.

"It was in this House is where I began to learn about what I needed to know in order to be here today. I need to tell you a story because I can't help but look over at Ben Cayetano there. You see him over there, that man with the big smile on his face. There he is. I was sitting out there—Denny, I think just about where you are, Scott, just about where you folks—when rookies Cayetano and Abercrombie came in to this body and...right there, Joe, where you're sitting, was Tony Kunimura and up here was Jimmy Wakatsuki. And we were freshmen and we were gonna get the legislation done; we knew what was going on. And we put out some legislation on land and we won. We won! It was only one vote; Ben said, 'I think we're gonna win, I think we're gonna win.' We won, one vote! Terrific!

"And just before the vote was announced, Tony Kunimura from Kaua'i gets up and says, 'Mr. Speaker, I'd like to change my vote.' He voted against us of course. And he said, 'I'd like to vote yes. I'd like to vote aye.' And so Wakatsuki recorded it, and Ben and I looked at one another and we're thinking, 'Hey! We are something! Even Tony Kunimura—because of the power of our arguments, the mastery of the legislative process that we had—he's changed his vote and going with us.'

“So they announced the vote and instantly Kunimura’s on his feet, ‘Mr. Speaker I move for reconsideration.’ Boom! The bang of the gavel comes down and the next thing...you can imagine the sounds of torment coming as the recess is called, right? And when they come back in, and immediately after Wakatsuki brings the gavel down, the session’s now back in order, and Kunimura’s on his feet instantly saying ‘Mr. Speaker, call the previous question.’ And they took the vote and we got smashed. And Cayetano and I were sitting there stunned and the second the vote was announced, Kunimura gets up, walks over to where we are—right there, Scott, Denny, Mark, you guys—comes over, puts his hands on the desk, he says, ‘Did you learn anything today, college boys?’

“We told him, ‘We learned you’re the professor.’ I called him Professor Kunimura for the rest of our days. But that’s what it was all about and he became our friend—our mentor— as did so many. The memories are here.

“So this is a new day. A new day for us. And this new day for me, begins with a greeting to all of you, all the distinguished folks that are here today that the Speaker’s introduced and a new day for me begins—I hope—with an honest account of the state of our government.

“Seven weeks ago when I began my term as Governor, I assembled a team of talented and dedicated public servants that are sitting right over here. I asked them to make an immediate assessment and today, I want to give you our report.

“What appears on paper as an \$844 million fiscal deficit through the next biennium—believe me—belies the fact that there is also a severe operational deficit in government. In other words, as difficult as it will be to balance the budget—and I give, by the way, credit to all the legislators here, past and present who have struggled with this—this has not been easy and the fact that we’re able to get here to today is a credit to you, and to those who served with you to this time. That effort to balance the budget will merely be life support for what has become a battered, under-resourced, and often dysfunctional democracy.

“A weakened government affects everyone: business owners waiting for permits that are piling up in offices with a fraction of the necessary personnel, school children without proper tools to learn, and public facilities in disgraceful disrepair.

“We cannot take full advantage of the rise in visitor arrivals because we are not able to maintain these public facilities or invest in the culture and arts programs that make our communities stronger and make those visitors want to return.

“Public employees steadfastly perform their duties in an increasingly demoralizing work environment. Furloughs and hiring freezes that supposedly saved money have sometimes resulted in more expensive private contracts and even excessive overtime pay.

“Basic operations of government are stymied by an information management system that hasn’t been upgraded in decades. And as our capacity to provide core services has diminished, our tax dollars have become vulnerable to lawsuits and even expensive court orders. Many of you in this legislature, particularly in the Education Committees, are only too familiar with what that means. As are those in the area of health.

“Meanwhile, we continue to send billions of dollars out of our islands to pay for food, for fuel, and other basic goods and services that we could and we should produce right here. Worst of all, we have put off making the sacrifices necessary to provide for the education, care, and financial security for our children and future generations.

“As we suffered through this erosion of capacity and public confidence—distracted occasionally by the question of who was to blame for all this—we are seen as protecting narrow interests to the detriment of all. We have been steadily losing our ability to work together and the trust of the public that we can reverse our course.

“This breakdown of our government is tearing our social fabric and undermining our economic recovery. I think we can all agree on that. This is not a Republican versus Democrat or an ideological situation. This is a crisis we all have to face.

“Now then, as Governor, I will take full responsibility for our current situation. But with that responsibility comes an obligation to tell the truth. The truth is that our canoe, which is our beloved Hawai’i, could capsize. We are in that unnerving moment when we could all huli (when we could turn over). All of us are at risk, and all of us have to face this.

“Our action now must be swift and unified as we right our vessel and pursue, I believe, a four-part economic recovery and reinvestment plan. We’ll get through this biennium. There will be better days ahead. We can make it happen, I promise you that. Working together we’re going to make it happen. I want to emphasize to everyone on this floor today, and most certainly to everyone who may be tuning in to what we’re saying and what our procedures are today: we are going to do this together. Of necessity and by custom and rite, I stand here, but I stand before you, not above you. And I stand with you. And I pledge to each and every one of you, each and every one, regardless of party, regardless of background: that our diversity indeed will define us and not divide us. And that this Executive and Legislative Branch of government that is the hallmark of our democracy, is something that I honor and treasure, as I honor and treasure every one of you.

“I speak to you as a former colleague. I speak to you as a friend. I speak to you as a fellow child of these islands. Someone who is reaching out to you with full heart in order to accomplish the things that I know we all want to get done on behalf of Hawai’i.

“We’ll start by restoring critical government services. Tax revenues will increase as the economy recovers. I think we all can agree on that, but that recovery will be stalled as long as there is a fiscal deficit and a government incapable of performing core duties.

“Therefore, I am putting forward a plan that will balance the budget, reallocate public resources to the most important government priorities, and restore the basic functions of government.

“Some of these proposals have been presented and discussed in the past in this legislature, and I want to pay particular credit to those of you who had the courage to put some of these bills forward. Some of you have been laughed at. Some of you have been mocked. Some of you have been criticized. Some of you have been put into a category, of why is he or she doing that? Some of you have been in the uncomfortable situation of having others say to you, ‘Why are you doing this? You’re putting us in a bad spot.’ The days of that kind of comfort zone for those who have to make decisions, who have been given the responsibility and given the opportunity to make those decisions. That situation can no longer be ignored, so I give you credit.

“In the present context—with the challenges facing our State, with long-term liabilities that can no longer be ignored, and with the new possibilities for collaboration with the Executive that I just outlined—we can look at these ideas, every one of your ideas, with fresh eyes. Proposals that may have been rejected in the past are not only possible, but likely necessary today in my view.

"As I indicated, I want to credit past legislatures for bringing us this far along the path in dealing with the fiscal crisis. What follows then for me are some of the measures I think we will now need to face and to address.

"I will be filing a bill to modernize the terms of our Employees' Retirement System to reflect the economic and social realities of today, so that it can be sustained into the future. Absent action in that regard today, the Retirement System itself is in jeopardy. We all have to pull together.

"To this end, I am proposing that we end the current practice of state-funded reimbursement for federal Medicare Part B benefits for Hawai'i government employees. I am personally one of those recipients. I asked our tax folks and Budget and Finance to start this review with me; taking a look at me. I'm not going to ask anybody to do anything that I'm not willing to do myself. I am personally, as I said, one of those recipients on the basis of my previous service in State government, but it is a bonus paid for by taxpayers that can no longer be justified in light of our current fiscal and social crisis. I did not earn this benefit, and cannot justify asking taxpayers, public and private, to pay for it.

"I am proposing two fixes to the tax code that will increase revenues to the State. One is a repeal of the state deduction for paying your state taxes. It's an absurdity in the tax code, the elimination of which is long overdue. This change will affect all taxpayers who itemize, so we will phase in implementation for middle-income earners to lessen the immediate effect.

"The other fix is to implement the recommendation of the Tax Review Commission to treat pension income like all other income for tax purposes, as is done when preparing your federal taxes, as is done when preparing your federal taxes. My proposal includes a provision so that those who are most dependent on their pensions will not be taxed. But people like myself will have to step it up. We cannot ask people to do something for us that we're unwilling to do to them in terms of share sacrifice. Thank you. And believe me, this is no real sacrifice on my part in that regard. This is the least that I think we can do if we're all going to join together.

"I am proposing what is an overdue increase in the alcohol tax and will also propose a fee on soda and similar drinks. We can no longer ignore the fact that consumption of these and other such products contribute to rising public health costs. Revenues from these fees will be used to repair the public health infrastructure, and also to fund prevention and education programs. We have to come to grips with not only with childhood obesity, but we have to come to grips with the question of diabetes, the question of our healthcare costs screaming out of control because we can't control ourselves, because we have not disciplined ourselves, because we have not put ourselves in a pono way with regard to our own health. Here in paradise that should be a first priority for all of us.

"I expect collective bargaining negotiations to be conducted in good faith and with common goals in mind to achieve savings without disrupting service to the public, to keep State employees on the job with paychecks for their families. I am not going to take public servants who have put everything forward on behalf of the public interest. I am not going to ask fellow public employees to do something other than that which I am willing to come to grips with myself. We want people working. We want their paychecks out there. We want to exercise creativity and long-term thinking then in the bargaining process to improve the work experience and achieve a resolution of the crisis of unfunded liabilities in pension funds and runaway health costs. We cannot avoid it. We have to deal with the unfunded liabilities in terms of pension, and we have to deal with the question of runaway health costs.

"I was here in this legislature when in the wake of Jack Burns' initiative, Governor George Ariyoshi and subsequently John Waihe'e helped to bring about the implementation of the most advanced healthcare system in the United States. The Pre-paid Employer Healthcare Plan that we had started in 1974. When Ben and I came in 1975, that was the most advanced, and is still the most advanced in the country. But events have overtaken us. Events have overtaken us. Unfunded liabilities and the screaming advance of healthcare costs are something we can't avoid any longer.

"We need to ensure that our visitor industry is sustainable by bringing the impact fees paid by the increasing number of timeshare occupants into alignment with hotel room occupants who pay the Transient Accommodations Tax. This is not an easy problem to resolve. The timeshare industry as such, I think, is the wave of the future and we need to address ourselves to it. We need to support it, we need to support travel and tourism, and what I now call the hospitality industry in a way that is beneficial for everyone starting with us. Starting with Hawai'i.

"And in that context I will also reallocate funds from the Hawai'i Tourism Authority to basic government services such as environmental protection, improvements to public facilities, and advancing culture and the arts. The amount we are spending in the name of marketing Hawai'i has grown disproportionate to the amount we need to spend on Hawai'i's own infrastructure, social and physical. We need to reprioritize. We need to reprioritize and reinvest in our Hawai'i in the things that make us unique. This is not so much a criticism of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. That is not the object. I am not here to point fingers or to criticize. What I'm here to do today is to suggest to you that we need to have a serious discussion about our priorities and the things that make Hawai'i what it is, and make Hawai'i a place that people want to come to and enjoy and tell others about.

"Now, I must address perhaps the most emotionally trying subject that I'm going to discuss with you. We will have to scale back on those social services for which funding no longer exists. There are some contracts, for example, entered into by the previous administration that assumed the existence of additional federal funds for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. I am saying that not that this was done with anything other than the best of intentions. I was part of the Congress at that time that help put those funds forward. I wish that the Congress would continue to aid and assist the states. But every appearance is, and I have to act on the realities in front of me. You have to act on the realities as a legislature, that are in front of you. It is every likelihood that those funds will not be any longer available. So therefore these unfunded contracts, while they are for very worthy programs, make no mistake about it, even though they're for these worthy programs we're going to have to take a hard look at it. We must now find new ways to support our neighbors.

"We must acknowledge, without flinching, the fact that the rising cost of healthcare also requires that we cut back on benefits provided to Medicaid patients in the coming years in order to sustain health coverage of any kind for eligible individuals and families. We are the ones on the state level that have to provide the Medicaid side in conjunction with the federal government. Medicare is on the federal side. Medicaid is what we have to take into account, and we're going to have to take a hard look at what those benefits are. That's why we have to get together on the question of obesity, on the question of how we live, on the question of good nutrition for our children in the schools. Good nutrition for our folks in the hospitals and living a pono life. This is one of the most difficult things I had to come to grips with as Governor, but we cannot and will not avoid it or evade the necessity of confronting the issue. I am

calling on community organizations, private foundations, and all of us to work together with us on the state agency side to help absorb the blows that these changes will bring. And there will be blows.

“All told, this plan will allow us to reduce, and in time, eliminate our fiscal deficit, and to turn around our operating deficiencies in government. This plan will speed up our recovery, result in increased revenues and create a healthy, functioning government that can serve the public good and restore confidence in ourselves.

“This proposal is presented as a package for consideration. I am wide open to other ideas from the legislature and from the community. I tell you that. You folks know me. You know that I mean it. I’m wide open. This is not presented from on high as a fait accompli, that it’s already been thought through and all you have to do is put your rubber stamp on it. That’s not the condition at all. That’s not the way I work. That’s not the relationship I want to have. But make no mistake, we cannot and will not entertain ideas that are designed simply to shift responsibility to someone else or to some future time. In the end, we must come to an agreement now that is balanced in its impact, that is adequate to restore the functions of government, and that does not create counterproductive barriers to economic recovery.

“The challenge before us then is not to balance the budget. Our challenge is to ensure that our values and priorities are reflected in the decisions we make and the actions we take. And boy, do I mean what I’m going to say now. The time for debate, debate which merely goes through the motions, or rhetoric for the sake of a safe harbor political agenda, has expired. Everyone must be prepared to contribute.

“For my part as Governor, I propose the New Day Work Projects. In the time I have been in office, our team has been preparing to launch the central part of our economic strategy, a broad-ranged series of capital improvement actions to be called the New Day Work Projects.

“The New Day Work Projects will directly attack unemployment and jumpstart business activity. I’m looking at you, Gene. I’m looking at you, Sam. I got your message. I heard what you said. It will provide an economic boost that will reverberate throughout the State. We will utilize the bonding power of the State, partner with willing private parties, streamline processes, provide work that will result in paychecks for families across all the islands. We’re going to take a systematic and integrated approach to New Day Work Projects to ensure broad economic distribution of economic benefits, and we’re going to be thoughtful about these projects we’re going to select to make sure they match our long-term priorities. You can count on it.

“The folks here on this Floor have been elected to represent individual constituents, yes. But we’re going to integrate with your suggestions what needs to be done in order to make this happen. I’m looking forward to that. I want to see it happen. We want smiles on people’s faces. We want to see people feeling that sense of prosperity again. That there’s a future for them. And we want to put smiles on their faces, especially with the election after reapportionment coming up in 2012. Oh yes, now you see the heads nodding up and down.

“But this is what it’s all about. That’s what democracy is for and I’m looking forward to working with you. I’m looking forward to being able to implement your suggestions the New Day Work Projects that you think are best for your people.

“For example, we have ambitious capital improvement plans for the University of Hawai‘i System, including the West O‘ahu Campus and the Pālanui Campus in Kona. These are just examples. I could cite many more. These will provide obviously

new educational opportunities for students. The Department of Transportation is freeing a backlog of work to improve our roads, airports and harbors—a transformation of our infrastructure that will have widespread positive effects on our visitor industry and local families for decades to come.

“The New Day Work Projects will look for long-range cost savings. Right now, for lack of action, we have state buildings that have been vacant for years, such as the Līhu‘e Courthouse. Right, Bernard? You folks showed me that when I was over visiting, and the Kamāmalu Building right down here on Richards Street. We can walk right out and see it. We’re going to get these buildings back into working condition so that we aren’t wasting taxpayer money to lease additional properties. We’re going to take cost effective measures to make State buildings energy efficient. This will result in long-term savings for taxpayers and lessen our dependence on foreign oil. We’re going to move on the question of energy.

“I’m also going to convene a group of experts and University officials to consider the future of sports and the future of development on O‘ahu to make a definitive decision on Aloha Stadium and any future stadium that might be built. Other than maintenance related to health and safety, I will divert all other capital improvement dollars for Aloha Stadium to other projects. Right now, multimillion dollar plans to extend the life of Aloha Stadium by 20 years could take 40 years to implement. It is time to reprioritize.

“The New Day Work Projects will look to the future and what our community and economy will look like decades from now. For example, as Honolulu moves on its transit plans, the State will actively encourage and support attractive, sustainable transit-oriented development. The legislature has proposals on these concepts, including looking at density rights and other zoning initiatives. I will look forward to participating in the discussion and moving quickly.

“The people of Hawai‘i are going to get to work and build our future.

“In meetings with other governors across the country, I have met some who have an ideological problem with utilizing resources from the federal government and collaborating with the President. We, of course, have no such problem. After all, federal dollars are our tax dollars, and we should pursue our fair share vigorously and strategically. Barack Obama is our President, and his vision is well aligned with ours.

“So the Hawai‘i Fair Share Initiative led by Lieutenant Governor Schatz, Brian stand up. Where are you? There he is. Thank you. I get to do that because he’s as short as I am. But Brian represents an unprecedented effort to bring in additional dollars to Hawai‘i. Here are two examples of what’s already been accomplished:

“First, we’ve positioned Hawai‘i to receive nearly, and I hope this is good news for some of you who haven’t heard it in the legislature I think it will be. We repositioned Hawai‘i to receive nearly \$100 million new federal dollars in 2012 and 2013 to be used for military facility upgrades and veteran cemetery improvements across the State; \$100 million. I want to thank General Wong and our Department of Defense, our Adjutant General and others in the Guard for taking a leadership role in helping us in this regard. By coming up with a little over \$12 million in State funds, we’ll get an 8 to 1 return investment for our critical capital improvement projects across the State.

“Another example, the Lieutenant Governor’s Office and the Department of Human Services are partnering with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs led by our own General Eric Shinseki and Tammy Duckworth of McKinley High School. This partnership will help community-based organizations secure funds to address homeless veterans as part of our

homelessness program. There will be additional federal resources available to make sure that we are working in a strategic and humane fashion to solve this problem of homelessness, and veterans homelessness in particular.

“Lieutenant Governor Schatz is providing leadership and forming partnerships that will yield both short and long-term economic benefits for Hawai‘i, and is driving real change in my judgment about how we do business with each other.

“This will call for reinvesting in our future.

“As we right our canoe, our top priority must be education. This past Saturday at Washington Place, both the Superintendent of Schools and the President of the University of Hawai‘i participated in our first cabinet retreat. We’re going to integrate the entire Executive decision making process across the State.

“The Department of Education is on the cusp of transformative change as a result of winning President Obama’s Race to the Top. I am totally committed to that effort. But to move this forward, we need an immediate resolution to the appointed School Board issue. In the coming weeks, the legislature needs to give me the enabling legislation allowing the Governor to appoint the School Board. The Senate Education Committee is meeting this afternoon—if I get through this speech in time—to consider a bill that will create a clear line of accountability and direct appointment by the Governor. I am already receiving applications and recommendations through the Governor’s website that will allow me to move quickly. This is the clear will of Hawai‘i’s people. I’m prepared to act now.

“As for the University of Hawai‘i, I have high expectations for how it will transform our state under President Greenwood’s leadership. Through its Hawai‘i Graduation Initiative, UH will increase the number of college graduates by 25 percent by 2015—25 percent by 2015. We can achieve this goal by keeping education affordable and reaching out to students across the state who have not been traditionally well-served at UH, including Native Hawaiians and neighbor island students. Native Hawaiians and neighbor island students are going to be a top priority.

“The University is also the State’s think tank. The Thirty Meter Telescope on Mauna Kea, and the Beacon health information grant at UH-Hilo are two examples of the kind of practical research and innovation that will provide jobs for our people and revenue for the State. Research programs at the University will play a big part in our economic recovery by bringing external dollars into our state and building innovative industries. The University’s current research activity brings \$450 million into the state, and I will strongly support any measure that will increase that capacity.

“I also want to take a moment to note a unique element in our education system that is often overlooked, but is vitally important to the future of our Hawai‘i. It brings me back to some of the moments that I’ve shared with some of you in these Chambers over these past decades. In 1896, it was made illegal to teach the Hawaiian language. In 1986, a group of legislators and community leaders removed that ban. I was part of that group. Today, I would like to introduce a founding member of Pūnana Leo and the first student of Native Hawaiian ancestry to receive a PhD in Hawaiian and Indigenous Language and Culture Revitalization: Dr. Kauanoe Kamanā. Please stand and be recognized.

“There stands a treasure of Hawai‘i. Today, we have the opportunity to organize a Hawaiian language university-within-a-university as a next step. Language is a key element in ensuring that Hawaiian culture remains strong and perseveres into the future for the benefit of all. When our young children,

when they master language, they master themselves. And when they master themselves, they can achieve anything. That’s what the mastery of language is all about. That’s the glory of Hawai‘i and all of the backgrounds. Everything that is brought to Hawai‘i. And on the basis and foundation of our Polynesian ancestors and the Hawaiian culture that is spread through Aloha, language is the key to all of that. That is the success that’s been achieved.

“For those children, for those youngest children, my office has been working with private and public agencies and will be utilizing federal, state, and private resources to develop a leadership position in my office for early education. Go ahead, you can clap for that. This person will coordinate efforts across departments and in the private sector as we lay the groundwork for the future establishment of a Department of Early Childhood.

“We will also move to ensure energy and food security for Hawai‘i. I have spoken of and sustained my interest in an independent Hawai‘i Energy Authority to move the clean energy agenda forward. However, I am encouraged by the ideas put forward by legislators and the energy community that propose a significant restructuring of the Public Utilities Commission to move energy projects and better connect our islands with the information and transportation infrastructure that we need to make us more self-sufficient. I look forward to working with the legislature to come up with a solution so we can take action on energy. I’m wide open on how we do this. I’m ready to go. We will move these matters on energy security, energy independence, and we’ll do it with dispatch.

“Jobs in energy, agriculture, and environmental protection will be a cornerstone of a new sustainable economy in Hawai‘i. I think we all agree on that. The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations is ready to deploy now, a \$6 million federal grant to implement a plan to do the necessary workforce development activities needed to increase green jobs throughout Hawai‘i. We’re moving now.

“Another element of our economic security is increasing our broadband capacity. Simply put, our information highway is essential to the future of our islands. We have an outstanding plan produced by the Hawai‘i Broadband Task Force. Now we will implement it. The potential for Hawai‘i to be a model state and access outside funding is before us. Our broadband initiative will parallel what we will accomplish in clean energy, and it will be the key to all our economic development plans I assure you.

“The Department of Economic Development and Tourism will take the lead on these energy and broadband initiatives. We will also refocus our efforts in creative industries such as film and television, a \$400 million industry that we can grow many times with smart investments and strong leadership. Help for small business is also on the way from Department working in collaboration with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to support small business activity. We will not have anybody held up because we failed to be able to move expeditiously on their legitimate request for anything by way of permitting or anything else to move along these projects. That’s going to change and change now.

“By far one of the biggest factors hampering this and our government, and costing the taxpayers is our outdated information technology. The Department of Accounting and General Services and my office are preparing to launch an unprecedented public-private partnership to accomplish an unprecedented goal. We are going to transform our government and make Hawai‘i the envy of the nation in its use of technology.

“All departments, including Health, Human Services, Public Safety, Hawaiian Home Lands, Land and Natural Resources—all departments—are working collaboratively to restructure these processes, bring pride back to public service work, rebuild our safety net for our most vulnerable people, and develop partnerships so that we can do a better job of taking care of our own people.

“My administration will continue to provide messages and proposals regarding the Executive budget and new initiatives. Our goal is to present ideas that are well considered and developed; products of conversations with lawmakers, academics, private businesses, workers, nonprofits, and community leaders. I believe this is the prudent way to govern in a new spirit of cooperation, deliberation, and steady determination to bring to fruition a New Day in Hawai‘i.

“I believe in Hawai‘i. I believe that you believe in Hawai‘i. This is the reason I ran for Governor: to have the opportunity to express every day, my confidence in all of us, no matter what our background or opinion. We are Hawai‘i, an impossible convergence in the spirit of aloha of discovery, perseverance, unity and humanity. There is no doubt in my mind that we will overcome every one of these challenges.

“On January 8 my friend and colleague, a member of my Armed Services Committee when I was serving in Congress, Representative Gabrielle Giffords, was shot through the head and six others were killed in Arizona. An hour after I heard the news, I found myself sitting in my office with Marc Alexander, who had been the Vicar General, I think many of you know, of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Hawai‘i. Marc was discussing with me the journey that led him to submit his name and resume through the New Day Hawai‘i website to the Abercrombie Administration. I think that’s important for you to know. His resume came in like everybody else’s, just a citizen hoping perhaps to participate and put forward what he had to offer. When it first came in, people thought someone’s playing a joke. You know, somebody’s taking advantage of Marc. But no, that’s what he had done so we were talking about that.

“On that day, still in the grip of the emotions in the wake of those events, I found inspiration. Marc and I come from very, very different backgrounds. We’ve been on opposite sides of very emotional issues and debates. We talked about how we justify ourselves to ourselves. We talked about homelessness in Hawai‘i and our responsibilities. We found so much in common. So, joined by common purpose, I asked him to serve and he accepted the job to help lead the charge on homelessness in Hawai‘i, and, more importantly, to help heal our communities—to reach out to all our brothers and sisters in the spirit of aloha as I reach out to you today.

“Because in Hawai‘i, we understand that it is our good actions that make us human beings. Our diversity, and beliefs, and background do not divide us, they define us.

“Government is and should be the literal representation of ourselves of the people of Hawai‘i. My expectations I know are high. My expectations of myself, I can tell you, are high. I am asking every person, each legislator, each administrator, each business person, each worker, each community volunteer, each citizen to help restore our government, restore our sense of community, restore our Hawai‘i.

“Let us right our canoe. Let us act in a pono way and begin our journey back to the heart of our island home with humble hearts and above all, with aloha for each other. I mua Hawai‘i.”

Senate President Shan S. Tsutsui then rose and stated:

“Thank you, Governor Abercrombie. On behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, we would like to thank you for sharing your vision and ideas with us this morning. We

would like to emphasize our willingness to work with you to find solutions to the many challenges which you just mentioned.

“While we know that we will have disagreements along the way, let us be an example of how an executive and legislative branch can work together to overcome adversity.

“So on that note, Governor, again on behalf of all of us, we would like to thank you, and we look forward to working collaboratively with you to implement your new beginnings initiatives. With that, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned.”

At 10:55 a.m., President Tsutsui declared the Joint Session adjourned.

ADJOURNMENT

At 10:55 a.m., the Senate adjourned until 9:00 a.m., Wednesday, January 26, 2011.

At this time, the Chair made the following announcements:

"Today is the last day of bill introduction, and the five bills per day limit is in effect. The deadline to submit bills to the Clerk's office is 6:00 p.m. tonight.

"Please report to the Senate Chamber at 9:45 a.m. for the Joint Session to receive the Chief Justice's State of the Judiciary Address."

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I just would like to congratulate the Chairmen, both Education and Judiciary, for expeditiously getting out these bills. I feel that it really says something positive about this institution, the Senate. I feel that it sends a very strong message that we're very serious in getting the business and the affairs of the State under way, and I'm very, very pleased with how we've facilitated these legislations. Thank you very much."

At 9:13 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Chief Justice's State of the Judiciary Address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, was called to order at 10:04 a.m. by the Honorable Shan S. Tsutsui, President of the Senate.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature:

The Honorable Brian Schatz, Jr., Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, who was presented a lei by Representative Karen Awana;

The Honorable Florence Nakakuni, United States Attorney, and members of the law enforcement community including the Counties' Chiefs of Police and Prosecuting Attorneys.

The President then appointed Senators Clayton Hee, Brickwood Galuteria, and Sam Slom on behalf of the Senate, and Representatives Gilbert S.C. Keith-Agaran, Blake K. Oshiro, and Gene Ward on behalf of the House of Representatives, to escort the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, to the rostrum.

Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland, on behalf of the Senate, and Representative Sharon Har, on behalf of the House of Representatives, presented Chief Justice Recktenwald with maile and 'ilima lei.

The President then presented the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature.

Chief Justice Recktenwald presented the State of the Judiciary Address as follows:

"Thank you very much. President Tsutsui, Speaker Say, Lieutenant Governor Schatz, members of the House and Senate, former Governor and Mrs. Waihe'e, former Governor Lingle, former Chief Justice Moon, fellow justices and judges, members of the Consular Corps, members of the Royal Order of Kamehameha, distinguished guests and friends, good morning and aloha.

"On behalf of the Hawai'i State Judiciary, I thank the Legislature for giving me this opportunity to speak with you today. I am honored to deliver my first address to you as chief justice. We appreciate the support you have given us over the years, and look forward to working with you to further the cause of justice in our community. We also look forward to working with Governor Abercrombie and his administration.

"There are many ways in which our three branches of government can collaborate to better serve the people of Hawai'i. To that end, I will explain the challenges and opportunities we are facing and our vision for the future, and respectfully ask for your support in making that vision a reality.

"The judiciary is a strong institution, and it owes that strength to the contributions of many people. This past year, Hawai'i lost two pre-eminent jurists, Chief Justice William S. Richardson, and Judge Samuel P. King. Judge King was a leader in the founding of our family court in the 1960s, before going on to a distinguished career as a federal judge. CJ Richardson was the heart and soul of the Hawai'i judiciary, and was instrumental in shaping the modern legal landscape in Hawai'i. We are honored to have members of the King and Richardson families with us today. Could you please join me in acknowledging the contributions of these two extraordinary men?"

"Also, I wish to acknowledge the many contributions of my predecessor, Chief Justice Ronald Moon. Chief Justice Moon provided us with strong leadership while guiding the judiciary into the 21st century. We are honored to have him here today. Could you please join me in recognizing CJ Moon?"

"I'd like to address several issues with you this morning: our mission, our caseload, our programs, and our needs that have been impacted by the economic downturn.

"Our core mission at the judiciary is to administer justice. We do this, primarily, by adjudicating cases, and doing so in a way that is fair, impartial, transparent, prompt, and respectful to the participants. But our role is not confined to deciding cases. Over the years, we have been given additional duties as well. We now play a role in addressing the problems that underlie those disputes, and in helping to alleviate their human impact. So whether it's supervising defendants on probation so they stay off drugs, or providing support to children whose parents are going through a divorce, or giving litigants the opportunity to resolve their disputes through alternative dispute resolution, the judiciary is asked to do much beyond simply deciding cases.

"There is a common thread running through these broadened expectations. I believe it can be summed up as follows: our citizens want to be treated fairly and they want a justice system that works. They want a criminal justice system that reduces the risk that defendants will commit crimes again in the future. They want a family court system that supports our families when they are confronted with problems such as divorce, domestic violence or child abuse. And they want a civil justice system that resolves disputes in a timely and fair manner, and that is not so complex, expensive and time consuming, that few can afford it. Our citizens want justice that works.

"Since I became chief justice just over four months ago, I have visited each judicial circuit to meet with our judges, staff, attorneys and the public, to find out how we are doing in meeting those expectations. I have encountered great excitement about the work we are doing, and many good ideas to pursue in the future. Even though our staff and judges have been asked to make many sacrifices in recent years, they remain dedicated to our mission, and passionate about advancing the cause of justice in our community. I am deeply grateful for their professionalism, loyalty and commitment.

"Nevertheless, there are substantial challenges facing us. These have been difficult economic times for all of Hawai'i, and the judiciary has been no exception. In the last two years, our general fund appropriation was reduced by \$19.7 million, or more than 13 percent, while demand for our services has continued to increase. Two-day per month furloughs of judiciary employees, which were instituted in November 2009, have eliminated more than 600,000 available staff hours of work. These reductions in our resources have had substantial negative effects throughout the judicial system. They have reduced, delayed, and in some cases, eliminated important services.

"Notably, Hawai'i's families and most vulnerable citizens have been significantly impacted. The time it typically takes to process an uncontested divorce has doubled. The wait time for children to participate in the Kids First program in Kapolei, which provides support for children whose parents are going through a divorce, has more than doubled.

"Justice has been delayed in civil cases as well. The number of pending civil cases in our district courts increased by almost 100 percent from FY2008 through FY2010. The number of civil cases filed in circuit court has increased by almost 20 percent over the last two fiscal years, particularly in those areas which are linked to the health of the economy, such as foreclosures. Not surprisingly, since the resources available to address that increased caseload have been reduced, the median age of pending civil cases in circuit court has increased by more than 40 percent. By prolonging the time it takes to resolve civil disputes, the cost and uncertainty of litigation increases, and our community's efforts at economic recovery are hindered.

"The criminal justice system has also been adversely impacted. Twenty-four adult probation positions were eliminated in the first circuit, including positions in high risk areas such as the sex offender unit and the domestic violence unit. This has left individual probation officers supervising as many as 180 defendants, as opposed to the recommended national standard of not more than 120 defendants per officer. By stretching our probation officers too thin, we compromise their ability to protect the public and help probationers gain control over the problems, such as drug abuse, that landed them in trouble with the law. Having defendants successfully complete probation saves money for taxpayers in the long run, since the average cost of supervising a probationer is less than \$2 per day, while the cost of incarcerating an inmate is approximately \$137 per day. It also helps to reduce the social and economic impacts associated with incarcerating Hawai'i inmates on the mainland.

"Adequately funding the state court system is an investment in justice, and an investment in our community, that should not be compromised even during tough economic times.

"Justice is not something that should be rationed. The costs of attempting to do so will be far higher in the long run, than any savings that can be realized now. That's why the judiciary's proposed budget seeks funding to eliminate furloughs, and get our employees back to work full time beginning July 1st.

"We are also asking for funding to address long-standing construction needs in our facilities across the state.

"Here in Honolulu, we are asking for funds to help us address issues such as leaking roofs at circuit court, where this winter's heavy rains damaged computers and documents, and destroyed ceiling fixtures.

"On the Big Island, we are asking for funding for design and land acquisition for a courthouse in Kona. Currently, we are holding court in three different facilities in Kona, none of which were designed as courthouses, including part of the Old Kona Hospital, where our law library is located in the former morgue. Moreover, the facilities we use to hold defendants in Kona are inadequate and raise safety concerns. For example, our pretrial holding area for district court defendants lacks toilets or drinking water, and defendants in custody must therefore use restrooms in the public areas of the courthouse. We respectfully ask for your approval of our funding request so we can address these issues. The people of Kona deserve a courthouse that is secure, convenient, and efficient.

"Although the challenges I have mentioned are daunting, there is much positive news to report. The opening of the new Ronald T.Y. Moon Judiciary Complex in Kapolei, which

houses the family court and our juvenile detention facility, has provided new focus to our efforts to serve children and families. The family court touches thousands of our families every year, often when they are at their most vulnerable. This new facility provides us with better tools to reduce the stress of that process.

“Across the judiciary, there is a real commitment to finding more efficient and effective ways to serve the public. The HOPE probation program, which is based on the simple premise of holding probationers immediately accountable when they use drugs or fail to report to their probation officer, has achieved remarkable results. Positive drug tests have been reduced by 83 percent among participants in HOPE probation, while recidivism has been cut in half.

“Hawai‘i has received widespread national recognition for these results, and other states have begun to adopt variations of the program. We are increasing the number of defendants in the program here on O‘ahu, and expanding its use on the neighbor islands. We have also begun discussions with Governor Abercrombie’s administration about the feasibility of expanding the program to the pretrial and parole stages of adjudication.

“While HOPE probation is an important tool in our efforts to break the cycle of drug dependence and crime, there are other critical programs as well. For defendants whose addictions are so deep-seated that the incentives provided by HOPE are not sufficient, the intensive treatment and supervision provided by drug court offers another important option. The combination of HOPE and drug court offers effective alternatives to incarceration at a fraction of the cost. In recognition of these facts, the legislature last year provided us with continued support for those programs. We deeply appreciate your support. We believe that the confidence shown by the legislature will be repaid many times over through lower costs and increased public safety.

“Our other specialty court programs—such as mental health court, girls’ court, and juvenile drug court—continue to make great strides in addressing the needs of those specialized populations.

“Indeed, they can have life-changing effects on the participants and those around them. One example of their success is Nellie Shy Mamuad. Nellie Shy has been involved in the family court system since she was 12 years old, and was a ward of the state. When Nellie Shy entered juvenile drug court in 2005 at age 16, she was using crystal methamphetamine and other drugs, and had been used by an older boyfriend to carry drugs between the islands.

“Through juvenile drug court, Nellie Shy was able to complete her GED, and subsequently graduated with honors from community college. She is currently enrolled at the University of Hawai‘i-Hilo, where she is working toward a bachelor’s degree in Social Work. Nellie Shy hopes to work with young people who have substance abuse problems.

“She continues to remain clean and sober, and to strive for a better future for herself and her two young children. Nellie Shy is here with us today. Could you please join me in acknowledging her for her success?

“In addition to programs such as HOPE probation and our specialty courts, the judiciary is looking for other ways to be more effective in our work. We are in the midst of a transformation in the way we conduct business, moving from primarily paper-based systems to electronic filing and processing. Our electronic case management system, called JIMS for short, has enabled us to address some long-standing and seemingly intractable problems, such as delays in issuing bench warrants, and collecting traffic fines and assessments.

The electronic bench warrant project received two national awards last year, and we have collected \$15 million for the general fund through the traffic collections system since it was implemented in 2007.

“Just this fall, we expanded JIMS to include filings in our appellate courts. Attorneys and self-represented parties are now able to file appeals from their computers, at any time of day, and serve them on other parties who have consented to electronic service. In the years ahead we will bring electronic filing to the criminal courts, followed by the civil and then family courts.

“In our civil courtrooms, we are looking for ways to streamline the litigation process without compromising the rights of parties. It has become increasingly costly and time consuming to take a case to trial. Indeed, in FY 2010, more than 5,000 civil cases were filed statewide in the circuit courts, but only 14 civil cases were tried to a jury verdict.

“Although the relatively small number of civil cases going to trial is something we should continue to monitor, nevertheless the reality is that the vast majority of civil cases are going to be resolved by settlement. The judiciary has a long-standing commitment to providing opportunities for alternative dispute resolution, and I share in that commitment.

“While the judiciary must by necessity focus on making the delivery of our services more efficient, at the same time we must remain true to the values reflected in the phrase ‘and justice for all.’ Many of Hawai‘i’s low and moderate income families are unable to obtain the legal services that they need in the best of times, and the unmet need has become greater in these difficult economic conditions. The Access to Justice Hui concluded in 2007 that only about one in five low to moderate income Hawai‘i residents have their civil legal needs met. Things have gotten worse since then, with the downturn in our economy. There are many more people facing eviction, collections actions, foreclosure, loss of jobs or benefits, and related problems such as divorce or domestic violence. At the same time, state funding for legal service organizations has been sharply reduced.

“As a result of the recommendations of the Hui, the Hawai‘i Supreme Court formed the Access to Justice Commission in 2008. The Commission has had a number of significant accomplishments, including the establishment of model pro bono policies, recommendations for rule amendments and legislation, and the development of a foreclosure mediation pilot project on the Big Island. Perhaps equally important, the commission has significantly increased the level of interest in access to justice in our community. There is real momentum now, which we cannot afford to lose.

“The challenges posed by access to justice illustrate a fundamental truth about the judiciary: in order to solve the many challenges we face, we must work collaboratively with other organizations and members of our community. We have a strong working relationship with the Hawai‘i State Bar Association, as well as the neighbor island bar associations, and with many other partners in our community, including the William S. Richardson School of Law and the American Judicature Society.

“We are blessed with a strong volunteer program, which contributed 39,000 hours to the judiciary in the past fiscal year. With us today is Mike Maeda, who contributed well over 12,000 volunteer hours during his 14 years of service to the judiciary, as well as Wayne Sakai and Susan Arakaki, who each contributed over 600 volunteer hours in FY 2010 alone. Please join me in recognizing these outstanding individuals.

“In addition, the judiciary would not be as effective as it is without our many other partners, who complement the work we

do in many different ways. One example of such a partnership involves the program known as Lawakua. Lawakua uses martial arts training to teach discipline and teamwork to young people, and has chapters set up at Kuhio Park Terrace and Halawa Housing. Since 2005, Lawakua has sponsored a chapter at the Kalihi YMCA for teenage boys and girls who are participants in our juvenile drug court—a one-of-a-kind partnership anywhere in the nation. I have attended Lawakua’s promotion ceremonies for the past three years, and have watched these young people grow and mature, in some cases winning scholarships and going on to college. We are honored to have with us today Matt Levi, the founder of Lawakua, as well as several current participants, graduates and instructors. Could you please join me in acknowledging them?

“Although the judiciary must be completely independent and neutral when we decide cases, we must also engage the community in as many ways as possible to promote understanding of our constitution and our system of law. To further that goal, the supreme court has begun holding oral argument at different locations in the community, starting with Kapolei in December, and at the Richardson School of Law next month.

“The judiciary also supports many civics education programs which benefit students, ranging from the Mock Trial and We The People competitions, to training for teachers in issues related to the constitution. Programs such as these are critical to the future of our democracy.

“During my remarks today, I have described the many challenges and opportunities facing the judiciary. As we move forward, we are fortunate to have the leadership of the extraordinarily talented and dedicated people who serve as judges here in Hawai‘i. Whatever the challenge—whether taking on a rapidly increasing caseload or developing new ways to improve the justice system—our judges have answered the call. I thank them for their dedication, and their many contributions. I also congratulate Judge Sabrina McKenna on her nomination to the supreme court.

“In closing, the role of the judiciary has evolved substantially over the years, from simply deciding cases to helping, in many instances, to address the underlying problems, and alleviate the impacts of those problems. We have embraced that broader role, and believe that we have done it well. But we need the resources to ensure that we live up to the public’s high expectations for us, whether it be deciding cases promptly, or helping children cope with the trauma of divorce, or helping a probationer overcome a drug problem and reconnect with his family and community.

“We know that there are many competing demands for our state’s scarce resources, and that we cannot reasonably seek a greater share of those resources without first ensuring that our own house is in order, and that we are using the resources we do have in the most effective and efficient way possible. That is exactly what we have tried to do through initiatives such as HOPE probation and the JIMS system, and we will continue looking for more such initiatives in the years ahead.

“Once again, I would like to thank the members of the legislature for inviting me here today, and for your continued support of the judiciary. On behalf of the judges and staff of the judiciary, and all of the people we serve, we look forward to working with you to further the cause of justice in Hawai‘i.

“Thank you and aloha.”

Speaker of the House of Representatives Calvin K.Y. Say rose to conclude the session as follows:

“Thank you, Chief Justice Recktenwald. We at the Legislature appreciate hearing from you, your thoughts, and

your insights. You have given us much to think about going forward into this 2011 Regular Session. We all recognize your sincerity, your dedication, and your effort to achieve the very best and effective and efficient operation of the State Judiciary. And for all of us, more importantly, we recognize and applaud your quest to make justice available to all who come before courts.

“Again thank you, very much. There being no further business, I declare this Joint Session adjourned.”

At 10:37 a.m., Speaker Say declared the Joint Session adjourned.

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“Mahalo, Mr. President. Colleagues, we are here today to stand up for human rights. Not special rights, but equal rights. We are here to affirm the rights of all who live in Hawai'i to legal protection and social respect for our relationships. But firstly, I'm puzzled by those who insist on predicting the future of this action. Let me be clear. This is but a step to equal rights. It's not a step to a deeper mission or a farther horizon. Our deliberations are for the present.

“The bill is clear. By establishing the status of civil unions in our state, it's not the Legislature's intent to revise the definition or eligibility requirements of marriage under Chapter 572,

Hawaii Revised Statutes. Right here. What about that don't opponents understand?

"This is a justice issue, and I stand to ask this body to move this Civil Union Bill so we may indeed have justice for all. Again, I ask you colleagues to advance this bill; the stars have aligned from here to the Fifth Floor. Let us be the people of justice that we are meant to be. Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"First of all, let me say that for those of us that have read court cases and court decisions and believe in the Constitution, this is not a civil rights issue or even a justice issue. This is a political and community activist issue; always has been, still is.

"And for those that question why we look into the future, we don't have to look into the future. We can look into the present in other states. We can look at exactly what's happened when these types of measures have passed, what the result has been. But we don't even have to do that. We can listen to the testimony that we had the other day—the three hours/two and a half hours of testimony—in the Senate Judiciary Committee, when the proponents of this bill told us exactly what they want; as they have all along, if we had been listening.

"What they want to do basically is to blur and then erase the lines between civil unions, domestic partnerships, reciprocal beneficiaries—any name you want—and marriage. And if you were to take this Bill 232 and everywhere where the term 'civil unions' appears, substitute the word 'marriage,' you would have exactly what the objective is. And while my good friend and colleague the majority leader said that it's not the intent of the Legislature to supplant marriage with this or any other bill, it's the impact and it's what actually happens. Often times we have good intentions and there are bad consequences.

"We've heard testimony for years, and initially we heard the point that if we just had the reciprocal beneficiaries law, we would take care of the problems that were then being addressed; and some of those problems were very real and they were very serious and they needed addressing. And as those of us who oppose this bill have said, if there are still shortfalls within the domestic partnerships then, in fact, we should address them and change them, but not change the entire law.

"There will be court challenges when this bill passes, and I have no doubt that the bill will pass easily today as it will, probably, in the House. Somebody can say that the stars are in alignment; some of us may say that the roads are unpaved, and that's why it goes from here to the House to the executive branch. Whatever the case, it won't end here. And as we've seen over these many years, if we're talking about human rights, that's all we're talking about. We're not talking about cats or dogs today; that'll be another day, we'll talk about them and foie gras and all the things we spend our time with here, while we should be devoting our time and our energy to fixing our economy and getting people back to work and letting them be self-sufficient. Instead, we divert ourselves into sexual proclivities. And that's what we're emphasizing.

"And make no mistake about it, you can sugarcoat it any way that you want. You can change the wording any way you choose, but that's what we're doing here and we're raising this to a new level. And make no mistake further that many of the same people that support this bill and talk about equal rights are the very same people that have gone after our many traditions in this country, and in this community, and in this body, who sneer at those of us who believe in a higher power. Who singlehandedly tried to deny us the right to pray, but they will not succeed. They have a very aggressive agenda, and it's to the disgrace of legislative bodies all across the country that we fold

up like a house of cards with these challenges which can and should be met in a court of law.

"So vote, as you're going to vote today. Do what you're going to do, but don't tell us this has nothing to do with marriage or nothing to do with creating a right that is not there. We are extending a privilege. I won't belabor the point. You all have your minds made up. You're going to do what you're going to do. Some day you'll have to account for that, but today we'll all vote our consciences. Mr. President, I request a Roll Call vote. (The Chair so ordered.) Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"I would say normally that I would use the previous speaker's remarks as if they were my own, because I agree with some of the things that he said. We are extending the privilege; we are extending a right. We are, in fact, codifying what the Declaration of Independence said, 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.'

"We are, after all, here today to stand by the Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution that says, 'no State shall deny any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.' We are, after all, here to extend the privilege of codifying legislatively, the Bill of Rights of Article I of the Hawai'i State Constitution: 'Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State.' No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor be denied the equal protection of the laws, nor be denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights to be discriminated against.

"We are, after all, here to stand by the Hawai'i State Constitution that says, 'the right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed.' 'No citizen shall be disenfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to other citizens.' That's why we're here. What a great day to be here. I think all of us are familiar with the phrase that began with, 'four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth, upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.' Of course, Abraham Lincoln meant all people are created equal. And he also said the assertion that all men are created equal was of no practical use in effecting our separation from Great Britain and it was placed in the Declaration, not for that, but for future use. And here we are.

"Some of you may be familiar with Thomas Jefferson, who said, 'all, too, will bear in mind this sacred principle, that though the will of the majority is in all cases to prevail, that will, to be rightful, must be reasonable; that the minority possesses their equal rights, which equal laws must protect, and to violate would be oppression.' Some of us may not be as familiar with Aristotle who said, 'Democracy arises out of the notion that those who are equal in any respect are equal in all respects; because men are equally free, they claim to be absolutely equal.'

"We have—in the Senate—the unique opportunity: a perfect storm; a collision of forces with this bill and the confirmation of the next Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. A person who is openly gay. Openly gay. A lesbian. We have that unique privilege of standing in judgment of a woman—a lesbian—to sit on the highest court in the State of Hawai'i. A lesbian who said:

I was raised in Japan and the Philippines by a Japanese mother and an American father and grew up in a bicultural, bilingual, and multi-region household. After my father's untimely death from a

heart attack when I was nine years old, my mother re-entered the work force in order to support me and I experienced how some people treat others differently based on socio-economic status. I decided to obtain a good education and that if some day I achieved a position of authority, to treat all people with the dignity and respect they deserve. I was fortunate to be able to enter the University of Hawai'i and become one of the first beneficiaries of Title IX, The Patsy Mink Act, to be warmly welcomed into the homes of my Native Hawaiian basketball teammates, and to learn the true meaning of Aloha, and to receive an excellent education at our local law school. I was then fortunate to be able to learn and train under excellent attorneys, then to work for a multi-national entity which enabled me to appreciate the importance of a stable, legal environment for economic prosperity. In 1990, I decided that I wanted to enter public service and to give back to the community that had given me so much. I first became a law professor and was able to appreciate the development and impact of law from a scholarly perspective while providing legal services to those who would not have been able to afford an attorney. For the last 17 years I have been honored to serve as a trial judge in every trial court, district court, and family court. I am also privileged to have a wonderful family. Upon careful consideration and based on my participation on various cases as a substitute justice for the last several years, I humbly believe that I am able to make a significant contribution.

"This woman is a scholar and—as we will find, as we go through the confirmation process—is eminently qualified for consideration to the highest court, but this is not about Judge McKenna. This is about us. This is about us, who would seat a lesbian on the highest court and deny her the equal privileges of her colleagues who sit beside her. This is not about Judge McKenna, this is about us; all of us. And we should be proud that the privilege to stand in judgment of this woman belongs to us. And this step today is but the first step—not for Judge McKenna, but for us. Thank you Mr. President."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"It's my privilege—again, as I mentioned yesterday—to be reappointed back to the Senate; and, of course, and as you know, when I left these halls 10 years ago we were debating this very issue. I want to congratulate the Judiciary Chairman. I want to congratulate our majority leader. I too, feel and support their words. However, Mr. President, I would like to remind each and every one of us sitting here on this floor to look to the bill. As I read Section 1, 'The intent of this measure is to recognize civil unions in Hawai'i. By establishing the status of civil unions in our state, it is not the legislature's intent to revise the definition or the eligibility requirements of marriage under chapter 572, Hawaii Revised Statutes.'

"I want to give credit to our minority leader; I am very happy that he recognizes this is why we have different branches of government, Mr. President. It is a citizen's right, if they are dissatisfied with our good works here, that they can go to the judiciary to get definition or whatever they so desire of the law.

"So with this said, Mr. President, I'm hoping that my colleagues will see fit that we put this aside, that we do get along with the work at hand, which is simply this, Mr. President: yes. The State is on the verge of bankruptcy. We have families, Mr. President, that are living from check to check. That is not a life, Mr. President; that is hell. When you as a mother have to make a decision, do I pay for my child's

milk for their cereal or do I pay my utility bill? This is the challenges of this legislature. This is why we are here today. So, Mr. President, as well as my colleagues, let's get beyond this. Let's realize what the spirit of aloha is all about, which means to include people, no matter their color, no matter their gender, no matter their lifestyle. Yes, marriage is a privilege, but companionship is a right, Mr. President. So, I urge each and every one of you to please get over this task so that we may move on, in the spirit of Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Aina i ka Pono. Mahalo."

Senator Kouchi rose to request that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kouchi's remarks read as follows:

"I rise in opposition to the form of S.B. 232 as passed out of the Committee on Judiciary and Labor and submitted to this body for consideration.

"On its face, the intent of S.B. 232 gives same sex couples the same legal rights as married couples as set out in HRS Chapter 572, the chapter relating to marriage. However, S.B. 232 does not place civil unions under the jurisdiction of the family courts pursuant to HRS Chapter 580 upon its dissolution, nor does S.B. 232 place the civil union and children under the jurisdiction of the family courts.

"It is my belief that the omission of family court jurisdiction which sets out the policy, procedure, and method of dissolving civil unions as set out in HRS Chapter 580, and thereafter dealing with resulting asset distribution, alimony, paternity, support and/or custody issues relating to children of civil unions, will result in adverse unintended consequences and S.B. 232 is therefore fatally flawed.

"For example, without explicit oversight of the family courts upon initial filing of dissolution, if participants to a civil union have a house in one parties' name and one joint bank account, and the party owning the house desires to terminate the civil union, this party may dissolve the union by unilaterally filing a notice of dissolution with the department of health, unilaterally raid the bank account and leave the unsuspecting partner of the now dissolved civil union without a home and funds and there would be no legal recourse for the injured partner.

"Similarly, without explicit oversight of the family courts upon initial filing of dissolution of the civil union with children, the custodial partner would not have clear and unambiguous legal means to obtain sufficient child support payments or benefits or, lack of explicit family court jurisdiction could lead to preventing the noncustodial partner without legal recourse to obtain custody and/or visitation with the child.

"It is for these reasons that I vote in opposition to S.B. 232."

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"Colleagues, good morning. Ke akua me ke aloha to you and your families. A few people, close friends of mine, have told me not to waste my breath on the floor today. They said that the play is in, it's a slam dunk, everybody's mind is made up, and it's a waste of time. And on the surface it seems to be a perfect set-up for a passage of the civil unions bill this session. There appears to be a solid majority in the Legislature. There's a new governor who has promised to sign a civil unions bill if and when it comes to his desk. And I know that some people in our state have grown weary of this cultural battle on civil unions, same sex marriage, and just want to pass this as quickly as possible so that the issue will go away. Yes, this issue has dragged on for over 20 years now and yes, many of the

arguments that we have heard over and over again and it's very tempting to think my mind's made up. It's a civil rights issue, period. But I think that's the easy way out. Each of you know that a significant number of your constituents oppose passage of this bill or any bill that radically changes the definition of marriage and the family.

"What I'm asking from you this morning is to please keep an open mind and an open heart and to carefully consider the societal ramifications and other new developments that have occurred over the last 21 years with regards to this issue. As this bill, or others related to it, winds its way through the House and Senate, all that I ask is that you listen to all sides and that we not try to rush this legislation through so that we can get on to more important issues like jobs and the economy.

"Having dealt with this issue intimately over the last 20 years, believe me, there is nothing more important to the people of Hawai'i than trying to make changes to the sacred institutions of marriage and the family. Colleagues, passing a civil unions bill will not end this debate. We all know that civil unions hasn't been enough to satisfy proponents in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, and California where gays and lesbians have gotten the courts to agree that you can't have civil unions on one hand and marriage on the other. For example, in Connecticut they passed the civil unions bill in 2005, but just three years later in 2008, their Supreme Court ruled that failing to give same-sex couples the full rights, responsibilities, and the name of marriage, was against the equal protection clause of the State's Constitution, and they therefore, ordered same-sex marriage legalized. So, we can be sure that as soon as the Governor signs S.B. 232 into law, there will be a challenge in the courts. This will force same-sex marriage on the people of Hawai'i who have consistently shown their opposition.

"One of the arguments that I've heard consistently over the years is from parents—tax paying parents—who object to their children being taught in taxpayer funded public schools that there's no difference between a traditional marriage or a same-sex marriage or civil unions. What will win out: so-called 'marriage equality' or parental rights? Am I exaggerating? It's a fact that in 2003, Massachusetts legalized same-sex marriage and in 2006, a federal court ruled that because homosexual marriage was legal in Massachusetts, that schools actually had a duty to normalize homosexual relationships to children and that schools have no obligation to notify parents or let them opt-out their children.

"Just yesterday I ran into one of my constituents, a very bright public school teacher—I was on a walk in Kalaehoa—who told me this, and I'm paraphrasing. She said, 'I don't care what people do in the privacy of their bedroom. I don't care if they're gay, straight, crooked, or curlicue. The two things that piss me off about this civil unions stuff is one: I will be forced to teach civil unions as equal to traditional marriage—I guarantee that I will quit the teaching profession before I do that—and two: my husband and I are trying our best to instill solid moral values in our children. If this civil union thing happens, it will be taught as part of the curriculum in public schools as equal to traditional marriage which goes against our family's deeply held beliefs and values. We will pull our kids out of public school and put them in private school or homeschool them ourselves if this becomes law.'

"So are we truly ready to go down this road? Also, have we really asked the deeper questions of what this fundamental change, to arguably the most important institution of our civilization, will mean? And if civil unions is the law of the land, what will ultimately win out: our religious freedoms or so-called marriage equality?

"Let me share a quote from a notable gay and lesbian activist Chai Feldman who is an Equal Employment Opportunity Commissioner and also a Georgetown University professor: 'There can be a conflict between religious liberty and sexual liberty, but in almost all cases, the sexual liberty should win because that's the only way that the dignity of gay people can be affirmed in any realistic manner.'

"And when a business refuses to participate in a civil unions ceremony, who will win out: our small businesses or so-called marriage equality? Consider this case: a young Christian photographer was reported to the New Mexico Civil Rights Commission, tried, and found guilty and ordered to pay nearly \$7,000 in attorney's fees after she respectfully declined to photograph the commitment ceremony of a same-sex couple.

"These are all very real concerns that we all have to face if this bill becomes law. It's going to cause a lot of anger and bad feelings in our community if civil unions is rammed through at the first of the session. I know there's a rush to get this passed as quickly as possible, all I'm asking is that we slow down a bit, give the community time to digest what's happening, and again, listen to all sides of the debate with fresh ears and open minds and open hearts. So, in the spirit of aloha, colleagues I will be voting 'no' on S.B. 232, S.D. 1 and I encourage you to do the same. Mahalo for listening."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Equality under the law is really what compels me to rise in support of this measure, because for me, it really is about equal treatment. It's about how the law views relationships, how the law views the kinds of rights individuals, how they're treated—what kind of rights they have—even though they may look differently or act differently than some of us. It really is about equal treatment under the law.

"We hear 'slow down, you know, we need to consider all of this,' but I believe we've had years of debate on this matter. I don't think that we've seen the list of horrible, and I guess I'm a little offended because I consider myself a Christian and I have to say that the God that I pray to wouldn't want people discriminated against based on their sexual orientation. I just don't believe that. But even if people disagree with me, and I know that there are those here on the floor and in the gallery that do, if you read the legislation, I see nothing in this measure that harms traditional marriage. I can't believe that proponents of traditional marriage who would participate in traditional marriage, would feel threatened by the legitimacy of someone else's relationship. I see nothing that takes away from those values or tells people you can't have a traditional marriage nor does anything to redefine that particular term.

"What I see this bill doing is acknowledging that there are all kinds of different families, there are all kinds of committed relationships, and that all of those need to be treated equally under the law, and that we need to respect one another. We need to respect those that may look at things differently than we do. For me, that's what the Aloha State is all about. That's what our Constitution requires us to do, and that's why I stand in support of this measure. I urge my colleagues to join me. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

"You know, it's true. We've had decades of discussion, but apparently we haven't been listening. We had a vote. We had a constitutional amendment. Of course, it was flawed because what people thought that what they were voting for—a very clear definition and delineation of marriage—had one little additional part in it; it gave the Legislature the final say. And we're taking that final say in the Senate today.

"I've said for several decades that if I had my druthers, the government wouldn't be involved at all in marriage and marriage-related issues. And I think that is the proper position, and I will still adhere to that. But for many people, they look to the government to protect them, protect their values, protect their rights, and we see how government has backed away from that.

"We had a vote; we don't encourage the people to vote again. In fact, we won't allow them to vote again, because we feel that the 25 of us here and the 51 in the House have enough wisdom. And we've listened to the right people—they may not be the majority of the people, they may not be the most compelling arguments, but we've listened to them and we're going to vote.

"Of course, some people still have a very sour taste in their mouth remembering on the last day, in the last hour, in the last moment of the 2010 Legislature in the House of Representatives, how that vote was manipulated. And that too, is government.

"But what I really wanted to say as my final remarks, I wanted to comment on some of the things that the Judiciary Chairman brought up. First of all, I like his referral to the minority and the wisdom of the minority; thank you, Mr. Judiciary Chairman. I also find it interesting when someone quotes from the sages of years gone by and they say, 'Well, this is what he really meant; this is what he said.' I think we've seen what they've said and we can make up our own minds.

"The thing that I found outrageous and inappropriate was bringing in the separate discussion of the nominee for the State Supreme Court and couching that in sexual terms. I saw a local TV station do that the other night; they led with that story about her alleged sexual proclivities. Now, I have happened to have had the privilege to know the judge for many years. I respect her, I admire her, I intend to support her; it has nothing to do with her sexual background, and in all those quotes that the Judiciary Chairman read, about her background, her upbringing, her thought, not one time was anything of a sexual nature mentioned. And I think it's a disservice to this Legislature, this Senate, and to the community and to the nominee to bring these things up. She can stand on her own merits. She will be confirmed. She'll be a fine Supreme Court Justice. That has nothing to do with the argument over civil unions, and I think that's really disparaging of all of us. So God bless us all; let's vote."

Senator Hee rose in response and said:

"Don't you just love it; don't you just love a democratic debate? The previous speaker has suggested that we're here to protect the rights. Nobody's here to take away any rights. People can still get married. This bill doesn't change that. You want to get married, get married. So, I don't know what right he's talking about. He thanked me for the wisdom of the minority; I take it back. So, I made a mistake. I gave him too much credit. I put words in his mouth. Don't you just like it when you think the sky's going to fall if the vote is aye? The earth will open up and swallow us all—or maybe we'll turn into Connecticut. But I do want to talk—just briefly—about the double standard of the previous speaker. I spoke to the nominee before coming to the floor today; I asked her if I might use her as an example for all of us. And it should come as no surprise to anyone that the answer was 'yes'.

"I'm not sure what 'sexual proclivity' means. I was looking for a dictionary and I'm not swift enough on Google to find the definition. I don't know what that means, but I know she's a lesbian. She told us and she doesn't hide it. I know she's gay and she's not the only gay judge. I confirmed—when I was Judiciary Chairman the last go-around—another judge who's

gay. The sky didn't fall, the earth didn't swallow us up, and we didn't turn into Connecticut; we're still here. And the Constitution is still here. And the Bill of Rights is still here. And the Hawai'i State Constitution is still here. I don't need a definition for the word 'equal.' Don't need the definition. Equal. I can even write the equal sign—watch me. Equal; two lines. Equal. Until such time that the Constitution is changed, until such time that the Bill of Rights is changed, until such time as the Hawai'i State Constitution is amended, equal means equal. Equal. And if the previous speaker takes offense at my generosity in my interpretation of Abraham Lincoln that 'all men are created equal' as all people are created equal, okay, have it your way; the Republican President meant that all men are created equal. He made a mistake, because all people are created equal.

"If the minority leader takes offense at the use of the next jurist to sit on the Hawai'i Supreme Court, who he has indicated publicly he will vote for, then by voting no today, he's voting on a double standard. He's going to support a lesbian judge of the circuit and vote not to allow that same person the equal liberties of the colleagues she will sit next to, one by one by one by one. And that's what this is about. That's what this is about. This is not an assault on marriage; this doesn't deal with marriage. This does not take away the right for people to marry; marry away! Marry away. This is about equality and this is about justice. It's really quite simple. It's not magical; this is not rocket science. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Espero rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"I'd like to rise in opposition to this measure. However, I'd like to look at it from a perspective of 'with reservations.' And I state 'with reservations' because this is my 12th year in a legislative session, and it has been, for me, the most difficult vote that I will be taking. I've spoken with many people within our community, my constituents; and yes, we all know that this state is split on this matter. It has become a very divisive issue, and it's unfortunate that this type of debate and dialogue is coming from the place that we call the Aloha State. But as I listen to my constituents, those that I represent in the district, the majority of those have expressed their displeasure with this bill, but deep inside, I do question whether that is the right choice and the right vote for me. I do reject much of the rhetoric, though, that has been thrown and spewed over the last 12 months. For example, those who are against this measure are bigoted; bigots, or those people who say this measure will harm our children and lead to the decay of our society. Societies change and evolve; civilizations change and evolve and this landmark historic legislation is one that we'll all have to live within the future.

"And when we talk about equality, yes, 'we hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights,' but within our society we do have rules. We do have laws. We do have parameters that we the people set. If we got messages from God written in the clouds, it would be so easy, but that's not how it is. So, a 21-year-old Marine who's about to go to Afghanistan cannot go into a restaurant and have a glass of wine with me. And CJ Ronald Moon, because he has gotten to a certain age in his life where he might be peaking in his intelligence and his ability to make great, sound decisions, he is forced out of a job because of the age requirement of judges. So, there are many areas that we have to look at and consider when we talk about equality for everybody. Why most likely an 'A' student will get into a law school versus a 'C' student; if all men are created equal, why is that the case? Because we humans, we make decisions, we make the rules, we set the laws, we determine what we will live by. And this measure, as

divisive as it is, is one that we must address. My guess is it will be addressed nationally within the courts one day, but once we make our decision here, I am hoping that we will be able to work together, heal the wounds that have been opened and move forward as the Aloha State is.”

Senator Ihara rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Ihara’s remarks read as follows:

“I support S.B. 232 because equality for civil union couples is long overdue.

“I appreciate the Judiciary chair’s efforts to quickly move the civil unions bill forward this session. However, I am concerned about the probability that Administrative Rules will be required to implement the bill. I also believe more clarification is needed to enable the attorney general to provide legal guidance to agencies charged with implementing the bill.

“I believe legislators, like me, who support civil unions, should allow voters to hold us accountable in the 2012 elections; especially if the dire consequences predicted by opponents, actually happens. But, if the predicted harm to society does not occur, I would like that be known before the next election.

“That’s why I prefer to clarify the ambiguities in this bill to allow the civil unions law to start a few months from now. This bill, instead, has a January 1, 2012 effective date—11 months from now—which leaves little time between the first civil unions and the start of the 2012 election campaigns.

“The civil unions vote today on S.B. 232 will show where the Senate stands on this important policy issue. And for this I thank the Judiciary chair. I also hope the bill will be amended to enable civil unions to start in a few months, preferably this July.

“I stand in full support for equal rights for civil union couples. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL UNIONS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

ORDER OF THE DAY

THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3 (S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3 be adopted and S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Colleagues, I would first like to express my deep appreciation for the support you have shown us as we have worked to expedite this measure. In November, the voters sent a clear message, a call to action—if you will—that when it

comes to making decisions about our children's education, they wanted the Governor to be held responsible.

"Senate Bill 8 is our answer to that call, setting in place a process that gives the people of Hawai'i the kind of direct accountability they asked for. This measure allows the Governor to appoint members to the Board of Education and provides him or her with the latitude necessary to be able to consult with whomever they need in order to make their decisions. Taking into account lessons learned from other boards and commissions, we have also developed a strong advise and consent process that would require the Senate to consider such factors as experience and understanding of the needs of students, parents, and the overall P-20 system, geographic representation, diversity, and broad educational stakeholder representation.

"I would also note that our measure is the only one that allows for six statewide at-large positions, in addition to one designated member per county. This is an important difference in that it would allow the current and future governors the option of appointing more than one member from any of the four counties in order to best represent the geographic and socio-economic diversities of our communities.

"Another aspect of S.B. No. 8 that is different from most of its other counterparts, is that it provides for a voting student member. For the past 30 years, generations of students have fought for this right, seeking to end the practice that they could be seen, they could even be heard, but in the end, they did not count. While this in and of itself is a contentious issue, I would be remiss if we did not take this opportunity to seek to right this wrong.

"That being said, your committee worked hard and listened to the concerns raised by testifiers and I believe that the amendments we made to require them to be registered to vote—which they can be at age 16—maintain a 2.0 GPA, and to limit voting to non-personnel issues only, makes for a very solid case for voting rights.

"This measure was supported by a vast majority of testifiers, but as with all bills, there were those that opposed the process that would be put in place. Some have argued that this gives the Governor too much power, but I would remind them that with power, comes much responsibility and ultimately, accountability.

"The power that comes with appointments can cut both ways. Appoint good candidates who make good decisions and their praises reflect on you as well. Misjudge the character of a candidate who fails to understand the importance of their decisions, and their criticisms will squarely fall on top of your shoulders. It is at this point, when things are not going well, that swift and sound action must be taken by the person directly and solely responsible for the nomination. Where an advisory council format can, and has, resulted in finger-pointing when challenges arise, the direct appointment process we have established would leave no doubt in anyone's mind who must take corrective action.

"Today the House will be hearing their measures on the appointed Board of Education process and I hope that as our measure moves forward, it would be given serious consideration.

"In closing, I would like to thank all of the members of my committee. Each and every one of whom sat and worked with me on amending this measure we have before us today. This was truly a collaborative effort and I think it was a great first bill for us to pass out of our committee. I would also like to thank the current members of the Board of Education for their dedication to our students and our schools and for their overwhelming desire and willingness to serve. I would

especially like to recognize Dr. Lei Ahu Isa. Her decision to step down to allow the Governor his first appointment was no doubt a difficult one, and I truly appreciate the leadership she has shown through her actions.

“And finally, I would like to thank everyone who has worked on all of these measures over the past year or so and who have shared their thoughts and opinions with us. It is clear that we all care about our children and the education they receive. Now, we need to roll up our sleeves and get to work. Colleagues, I will be voting in support of this measure and I humbly ask for your support as well. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“First of all I want to thank the Education Chairman for all her diligence, prior to this session and during the session. And I think this is one of the better moments in our State Legislature, because, first of all, we listen to the people and for those nay-sayers that said, ‘Oh, the Legislature’s just going to gum it up, delay; they won’t be able to reach a decision.’ We showed that, in fact, we are capable of doing that; we’ve done it and we wish Godspeed over in the House. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“I want to thank the chair of the committee for doing such an excellent job of putting this together. There’s just one small thing that I think, perhaps, was a bit of an oversight and I hope that we can correct this as the bill moves forward. It requires the new Board of Education to hold meetings in each county once a year, but Maui County is made up of four islands and I would really like to see that we require the new board to meet on each island, because Moloka’i and Lāna’i need to be included in this discussion, or—for that matter—we have to make sure that all of the rural areas are included as well. So, I’d like to support the measure and put that on the table for future discussion. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in support of this measure. We have an obligation to provide our keiki with the highest quality education possible. We also have an obligation to represent the people whom we serve, and last November they overwhelmingly supported a constitutional amendment to shift from and elected to an appointed board of education.

“There can no assurance of quality education without accountability. The Governor asked to be held accountable for our state’s public education and the electorate agreed. By appointing board members, with Senate confirmation, prospective board members will have the opportunity to share all of their qualifications with the public in an open, transparent process. The Senate will be able to engage in a thorough examination of the qualifications of each of the candidates being appointed to the board and the public can weigh in.

“The candidates will have to stand on their merit and track record. Because of a more streamlined removal process, the candidates will have to deliver on their promises to provide a quality education for all of Hawai’i’s keiki in our public schools.

“In addition, this bill provides for diversity on the board and geographic representation of all parts of our state. This measure represents a rational approach to implementing the will of the voters. I urge my colleagues to join me to vote yes on this

legislation and move the bill to the House and then on to the Governor as expeditiously as we can. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3 was adopted and S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I wanted to, through this means, share with the rest of the members that the Pūnana Leo program received a grant just over \$4.5 million from the Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan that was established for family days programs, education programs. But the reason I wanted to make the announcement is it's the latest in a long string of achievements towards Hawaiian language and the revitalization of our culture that so many of us and, in particular, the visitor industry uses as punch lines to sell the beauty of the islands. We have a great opportunity ever since 1986 when the law was changed to allow Hawaiian language to be part of a real curriculum in public schools after 90 years of it being illegal. Since that time, it has made it possible from 50 youngsters under the age of 18 to now over 5,000 people to speak the 'ōlelo 'ōiwi, the language of ancestors. Since that time, it is possible now for youngsters who choose to earn a B.A., an M.A., and now a Ph.D., as the Governor had recognized in the State of the State. There is a Hawaiian language college which is largely symbolic but is a beacon for other Native Americans and other indigenous languages throughout the world to look at Hawai'i as a leader in immersion education.

"We also have this year, an opportunity to take it another step forward with S.B. No. 1070, which proposes to move the symbolism of a Hawaiian language college into a Hawaiian language university. And I wanted to take the means of announcing this multi-million dollar grant for Hawaiian language to preschool to close the circle by a favorable consideration to consider the university-within-a-university as the Governor had indicated in the State of the State. Thank you, Mr. President."

The following concurrent resolution (S.C.R. No. 27) was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

S.C.R. No. 27 "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION AWARDING THE HAWAII MEDAL OF HONOR TO UNITED STATES MILITARY SERVICE MEMBERS WITH HAWAII CONNECTIONS KILLED IN ACTION WHILE SERVING IN DANGEROUS, VOLATILE, AND UNSTABLE AREAS OF THE WORLD, INCLUDING IRAQ AND AFGHANISTAN."

Offered by: Senator Tsutsui.

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"I would like to inform our colleagues as to the symbolism of the Hawai'i Medal of Honor. The Hawai'i Medal of Honor was designed by Sergeant First Class Aaron Pollick from the Hawai'i Army National Guard. The circle of kalo leaves: the kalo leaves represent the family or 'ohana. The leaves are designed in an encircled fashion and represent the concept of family and, of course, 'ohana which we strive to embrace and enhance in the State of Hawai'i. The coat of arms, the great shield, is the keystone of the design. The eight bars represent the eight major islands of the State of Hawai'i. The kapu sticks, or the pulo'ulo'u, symbolize authority and protection. The star in the center of the medallion is the Star of Hawai'i, the 50th star on the flag of the United States. The star also represents the honorees of this prestigious award. The Maltese Cross represents the four directional axes of the globe denoting Hawai'i as the crossroads of the Pacific. Sunrays: the radiant sun is symbolic of the new era. Its position in the center represents our sunny shores and warm hearts ever shining on all the corners of the world. The neck drape: the neck drape is red and yellow in color. These colors symbolize the royal monarchy that once ruled these islands. The red represents courage and strength. The yellow depicts the honor that the recipients have brought to our islands. The service ribbon and attachment: the service ribbon represents distinguished service. Its colors are identical to the colors of the neck drape. The attachment device at the middle of the ribbon is an ancient flag of Hawaiian chiefs. In olden times, the puela was raised above the sail of the ancient Hawaiians canoes while at sea. Our puela signifies that a person receiving this medal is of high rank or honor.

"On behalf of those of my colleagues who have distinguished service in the armed services and for myself—my brother died in Vietnam—I really want to thank this body and thank you, Mr. President, for recognizing these honorable people. Mahalo and aloha."

"Your Committee on Hawaiian Affairs, to which was referred Governor's Message No. 507, has reviewed the resume, personal history, and statements submitted by the nominee and finds Albert Alapaki Nahale-a to possess the qualifications to be nominated as Chairperson of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. Your committee received testimony in support of the nomination from over 100 testifiers and none in opposition.

"Alapaki Nahale-a has served as a member of the Hawaiian Homes Commission representing East Hawai'i since 2008. In addition, he serves as the Executive Director of the Hawai'i Charter Schools Network, and has been the director of Ka 'Umeke Ka'eo Hawaiian Immersion Public Charter School. Prior to work on behalf of Hawai'i's charter schools, he's held a series of community development positions with Hawai'i Community College and Rural Community Assistance Corporation, among others. He served five years with the County of Hawai'i as Legislative Auditor Assistant and Program Review Auditor. He served on numerous organizations, community organizations, and such. A graduate of the Kamehameha Schools, where he was active in student government and campus life. He holds a B.A. degree in political science from the University of Pennsylvania.

"Mr. President, your committee finds that through his work as a commissioner, he is well-versed in the directives, responsibilities, and operations of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, as well as the challenges the department faces in meeting the needs of its beneficiaries and the Hawaiian community. In his responses to your committee, Mr. Nahale-a acknowledged the challenge of making a difference in the department's response to the waiting list and the necessity for greater autonomy in the resolution of jurisdictional problems, such as permitting and zoning requirements, and in the

development of financial resources to replace the \$30 million annual payments appropriated through Act 14, which will end in 2050.

“Equally, and in some ways even more important, Mr. President, is his upbringing as a homesteader. With his roots firmly embedded in the Hawaiian homestead communities of Keaukaha and Pana’ewa, which through confirmation would make him the first keiki o ka ‘āina, born and raised on home lands to become Chairman of the Hawaiian Home Lands Commission. Therefore, as affirmed by the record of votes of the members of your Committee on Hawaiian Affairs, after full consideration of background, experience, and qualifications, has found the nominee to be qualified for the position to which nominated and recommends the full Senate advise and consent to the nomination. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, I’d like the previous speaker’s remarks incorporated as though they were my own, and I, too, support Mr. Nahale-a and urge all of my fellow colleagues to do the same. On behalf of Senator Kahele and Senator Green, we want to welcome Mr. Nahale-a to this position because his family has a long, prominent history, coming from the Island of Hawai’i. His grandfather, Uncle Albert Nahale-a, was one of the first Hawaiian Home commissioners, as well as very instrumental in bringing a lot of the Hawaiian homestead programs to fruition.

“I agree with the remarks of the previous speaker, and simply, he is the first keiki o ka ‘āina, and coming from the homestead that he not only will walk the walk, but he can talk the talk. Mr. President, I think that is very critical. In closing, there are some wonderful remarks about Mr. Nahale-a, but I especially paid close attention to this one. And of course, it acknowledges Mr. Nahale-a as a graduate of Kamehameha Schools. Well, so am I, Mr. President. So, we’re all proud alumni, and the commissioner of the Hawaiian Home Lands, he has served in these various positions working within the Hawaiian community, and we believe he understands the needs of the community and will work closely with them to deliver the services of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in an efficient and collaborative manner. Thank you very much, Mr. President. At the appropriate time, when we have introductions, Mr. Kahele will be presenting our lei of aloha.”

Senator Slom rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“The department faces a great many challenges. There are divisions. There are many issues. I find the nominee eminently qualified because of his background, his experience, his energy, and his attitude. And I know that he’ll be able to help solve these problems in a judicious and efficient manner, and therefore I lend my support. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose in response and said:

“Just on a commendation, I’d like to thank the minority leader for those words of encouragement. Thank you very much.”

Statement after statement noted her personal qualities of integrity, leadership, and successful stewardship of ‘Ōlelo’s resources during her tenure as its CEO. ‘Ōlelo, by the way, is the nation’s largest community media center.

“One testifier put it this way: ‘In Keali’i, the DCCA will gain a unique individual with strong leadership skills, a visionary with practical experience in building and running an excellent large organization, and a leader who has a passion for making Hawai’i a better place. Among her strengths are an incredible work ethic and the ability to both grasp the essence of complex issues while paying attention to details. She is a voracious reader with an insatiable appetite for knowledge and a keen understanding of how technology can be leveraged to improve business processes. More importantly, she knows the value of teamwork and how to bring diverse, often opposing, groups of stakeholders together to drive toward a common goal.’

“One supporter told the committee that Ms. Lopez ‘deserved confirmation’ because she has the ability to navigate the nuances of protecting consumers while being fair to business. It is a tenuous balance, but one that an excellent DCCA director must achieve.

“Your committee unanimously agreed that this thoughtful, analytical, pragmatic, visionary—a keiki o ka ‘āina—is well-suited to lead the DCCA. I urge all my colleagues to join me to advise and consent to Governor’s Message 505. Mahalo.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, I’d like to incorporate the previous speaker’s words as though they were my own, and I just would like to add this note, Mr. President: During Ms. Lopez’s hearing, I did bring up the mana’o that her name is of great significance: Keali’ilalanikulani. Just from a literal translation, it’s a chief title that comes from the highest heaven. So, I think that her resume, it really exemplifies those characteristics and, of course, I feel that this mana’o would definitely express a new direction for this department because as you know, Mr. President, this is the department that works with all the private sector. This is the department that really guides our economic mobility, as well as our accomplishments. So, with that well said, I’m looking forward to working with her in the future. Thank you. Aloha.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Baker introduced Director Keali’i Lopez, who was accompanied by her husband David, sons Kahuakaali’i and Eleazar, mother Lalani Segool, and sister Kapua Segool.

At 11:56 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 p.m.

Senator Gabbard rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“President and colleagues, I don’t know if you are aware of this, but on the Monday night edition of *Hawaii Five-0*, I happened to see one of our colleagues sitting in the right hand corner, and it was Senator Kidani. I had to rewind a couple times just to make sure, but lo-and-behold! There she was; and I did not realize that she had acting skills, sort of, but congratulations on your acting debut, Senator.”

Senator Tokuda rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“On a day that we’ve been doing a lot of congratulations, I did want to rise on a point of personal privilege and congratulate Don Horner, the Chief Executive Officer for First Hawaiian Bank, who just about an hour ago became the Governor’s very first appointment to the Board of Education, taking over Lei Ahu Isa’s position. This actually does not need advise and consent and he is able to begin serving immediately. So, I did want to congratulate Mr. Horner. He has extensive public and private school involvement. As many of you do know, he was vice chair of the DOE’s interagency group that actually implemented Act 51. He’s been advising the superintendent on her advisory council, as well as helping out our School of Nursing and our Shidler College of Business.

“I believe this is a positive sign of good things to come, and both Chair Takumi and I are really looking forward to working closely with him. I would also like to commend the House for working quickly on our S.B. No. 8. It’s set to pass out of committee today, and I’m told that Finance will be hearing it first thing next week, so theoretically in about a week-and-a-half to two weeks, the Governor could have a bill in which he can begin to start appointing members to the Board of Education. Again, my commendations to Mr. Horner. Thank you.”

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

I can’t help but think of this song every time I think of the Takamines—“We Shall Overcome”—Mr. President. So, I’m looking forward to continuing to work with Dwight as the chairman of what I consider one of the most important departments in the State of Hawai‘i because, as you know, we are a labor-driven state. So with that, Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to please support Dwight Takamine’s nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Taniguchi rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“It’s better known as his dream job. I’ve known Dwight for many years, having met him initially while we were both students at the University of Hawai‘i in the early 70s. He is a Honoka‘a, Big Island product who has never forgotten his plantation roots. We attended the Richardson School of Law together and we were in the same study group throughout the three years we were there. I was happy that he decided to run for office when his father Yoshito decided to retire. We served for many years together in the State House, and I especially enjoyed working with him for the six years that he was the Finance Committee Chair and I was the Ways and Means Chair in the Senate. Anyone who knows Dwight knows that he is dedicated to working for the best interests of working people in our state. He is highly qualified for this position because he has practiced labor law and has served as labor chair in both houses for many years. He works extremely hard, knows the issues, and now as labor director I’m sure he will be fair to all parties because that’s the kind of person he is. For these reasons, I’m asking my colleagues to support Dwight’s confirmation as Director of DLIR. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“The two previous speakers, who are both older than me, have demonstrated their wisdom beyond, certainly, any expectation that I may have had.

“It is said, ‘the acorn doesn’t fall far from the tree,’ and so we have the privilege of confirming a true ‘acorn’ in Dwight Takamine. Senator Kim and Senator Taniguchi and myself have had the privilege of serving with Dwight’s father, Yoshito, a long-time member of the ILWU; and then subsequently we have also each had, as well as the rest of the members, had the privilege of serving with the nominee himself. There’s no question—I believe that I speak for everyone—when the attributes of fairness and hard work are brought up in reference to Dwight Takamine. He works so hard that he didn’t bring his wife today because he was working too hard. But he did bring his aunt, May Takamine, and he did bring some close friends, Lynette Kama Hopkins and Shawna Lau Kong. With these few remarks, Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to confirm someone who I believe will be the best Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations that the state has ever had. Thank you very much.”

Senator Green rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“When I came into office—in I guess, 2005 or 2006—I was honored to come in with Representative Takamine at the time, and he taught me about reorganization about three hours after we started the phone call and insisted that I drive over to Hilo from Kona. But I will say he was a very, very generous individual with me as a young legislator, and I can honestly say over the course of the six years that I was privileged to work with Dwight that not a single time did he express any impatience when I was learning the ropes. So, he’s a terrific fellow, and I’m really honored to be here voting for his confirmation today. Thank you, Dwight.”

Senator Gabbard rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I would also like to add my unequivocal support for the nominee. I’ve not known him long, but he is a fine fellow as Senator Green said. Congratulations. Thank you, sir.”

Senator Kahele rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I rise in support of the nomination of Dwight Takamine as the director and acknowledge that the Governor has made an excellent choice in doing that. I had the privilege of getting to know Dwight, although I’ve known his dad, Yoshito Takamine, and his mom. My previous colleagues have stated eloquently all the good things that the Takamine family has done along the Hāmākua coast, and—as you all know here, his former colleagues—what he has done for the State of Hawai‘i. So mahalo, Dwight. Thank you.”

Senator Kouchi rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I, too, have had the opportunity and pleasure to work with Dwight, both when he was in the House and when he was here in the Senate, and I have always found him to be gracious and very supportive for the neighbor island issues. More importantly, I was invited into his home by his father in Honoka‘a, and had the opportunity to work with his father when he was in the House, and the kindness shown to me by the whole family. The common bond we share is that my mom was born and raised in Honoka‘a, and so I am pleased to support a fellow Honoka‘a-an this morning. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“It’s interesting. We’ve known each other for a long time. We used to battle in the House, and then we came over to the Senate. I think he mellowed out because that’s what the Senate does—we mellow people. And I enjoyed sitting next to him in the labor committee days. He was very gracious. He was very fair. And he used to call me at night, ‘Sam, could you please

explain this to me?' And of course, I'd spend a lot of time trying to explain the free market to him, and competition, and employer-employee relations, and I think he's getting it, Mr. President. But he was always fair. He was always open. And I know that he will be a good director. And even though initially he wanted to change it to the State Department of Labor Organizations and Card Check Provisions, I think he has agreed now to keep it with DLIR, and I don't think he too much would like the, I guess, comparison to an acorn, seeing what that organization has gone through in the last couple years. But I know that he will keep an open mind, that he'll run a good department, that he'll look to the fairness for all workers, whether they be organized labor members or not; and so I'm very happy to support Dwight Takamine. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Ihara, Kim).

At this time, Senator Hee introduced Director Takamine, who was accompanied by his Aunt May Takamine, and former workers and staff including Lynnette Marushige, Kama Hopkins, and Shawna Lau Kong.

Senator Slom rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Colleagues, today we have just completed our 15th legislative day. We're one-fourth of the way finished on our session this year. One-fourth of the way finished and we still have not received the budget. The budget is supposed to be our primary responsibility this year. I find it extremely difficult and disconcerting to deal with the situation that we have not gotten the budget and not gotten the financial information. Instead, we have had diversions. We rushed and spent many hours and many resources on a civil unions bill. We've got animal bills up the wazoo, from bats to jackasses to elephants. We've looked at all other kinds of things rather than what we're here for and what's the most responsible. And I think that we should urge the administration to give us those budgetary figures; give them

to the House, give them to the Senate, so that we can get on with that business.

"I would also like to say that this legislative session, to date, has done nothing to improve Hawai'i's devastated economy, or to create jobs here, or to do anything to improve our business and investment climate, so that we can attract new money, new capital, create new opportunities. And that's what we should be doing. Everybody is looking at more ways of taxing people, regulating people, banning and prohibiting, rather than telling people, 'Look, we've got a good business opportunity here. This is a place that people should invest and create jobs and add employees,' but we have not been doing that. And, finally, Mr. President, you I'm sure are aware that we have gotten national publicity for being the only state legislature, the only state Senate, to ban prayer at a time when we certainly need guidance from above. We have done that. I would urge you and the members of the majority of this body reconsider our rules. I think that more than ever we need this now. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, on a different note: As you know, Mr. President, the lottery bills have bit the dust; and no matter what my colleagues' positions on those bills, when the bills were introduced and the thought was these bills would serve as revenue generators, now, due to the decision of the committees, that these bills no longer exist. Mr. President, on a point of information, is the leadership working on other kinds of revenue generating pieces of legislation that we in fact could really come up with a plan of action to be able to compensate for the \$850 million deficit that the state is now faced with?"

The Chair responded as follows:

"Yes, we are, Senator."

Senator Solomon continued:

"Excellent. On the second, and finally, I want to congratulate the Ways and Means Committee Chairman for taking the challenge and introducing Senate Bill No. 120. We have received interesting information from this morning's review. And, of course, the point that stands out in my mind is the President of the University when she admitted that she had 600 special funds and really has no idea what the balances are in these funds. So I think, Mr. President, just speaking in support of the whole concept that we really need a handle on these general funds, calling these balances back to the Legislature. I'm hoping to have the support of the leadership to support the various subject matter chairmen in which these particular special funds are located because they're throughout every department, and to look at those balances and to be able to make a recommendation that these dollars be returned back to the Legislature, so we in fact can reprioritize, redirect, and to create a New Day in Hawai'i. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

So, there seems to be a missing amount of around \$36,000. If someone could clarify that for me, I would appreciate it. Thank you."

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 117 (Gov. Msg. No. 504):

Senator Nishihara moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 117 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kahele and carried.

Senator Nishihara then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of RUSSELL S. KOKUBUN as the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture, term to expire December 31, 2014, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Nishihara rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of Governor's Message No. 504, submitting for consideration and confirmation to the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture gubernatorial nominee Russell S. Kokubun, for a term to expire December 2014. Many of us in this room are very familiar with Russell, having worked with him for the past decade as a fellow

legislator. We know him to be an honorable and hardworking person who cares deeply about the future of our islands.

"Russell grew up in Kaimukī, and gained an early appreciation for agriculture by helping his mother and grandmother operate an extensive family garden that partially supplied food for the family. After graduating from college, he worked for several years as a farm laborer on the Big Island before purchasing and operating for nearly 10 years his own vegetable farm, which he still owns today. And while his career path eventually took him into public service at both county and state levels, he has always retained a significant interest and concern in Hawai'i's farmers and agricultural industry. In fact, in recent years, Russell has served as the Hawai'i island member of the state's Board of Land and Natural Resources, as the chair of the Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Task Force that delved greatly into the agricultural arena, and as chair of our own Water, Land, Agriculture, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee. I believe there are few individuals in our state who have had the experience and understand the complexities and challenges that agriculture faces. Russell knows that while such issues will not be easily resolved, the future of our state and our people relies greatly on our ability to enhance and expand our agricultural industry.

"The committee heard 83 testimonies, all in overwhelming support, attesting to Mr. Kokubun's qualifications, awareness of the issues, and challenges facing the agricultural industry and farmers in Hawai'i. They were effusive in their respect and belief that he was the best appointee to come into the Board of Agriculture. In light of today, Valentine's Day, Mr. Kokubun has certainly won the hearts and minds of those whom he supervise, advise, and direct. The committee heard the testimonies and his statements in support of agriculture in this state and his plans to focus on energy and food sustainability and security; identification of important agricultural lands; and the restoration, maintenance, and improvement of our agricultural infrastructure, thus endearing and securing the committee's unanimous support for Mr. Kokubun.

"As a former colleague, whom I and others admire and respect, Mr. Kokubun deserves to be confirmed by this body. So, colleagues the committee recommends that we consent to confirm this nominee so he can devote his complete energy and zeal into the job of reviving our agricultural industry in Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Tokuda rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"As you all know, there are so many things that we can say about Director Kokubun. By my count, at least 2,050 occasions on which he exhibited strong and fair leadership, which is why writing this speech was very difficult for me. So, I had to do my best to channel my inner Hanabusa and paint a balanced but bluntly honest portrait of the man that is Russell Kokubun.

"From the very first time I met the nominee, it was clear to me that he cared about creating a sustainable future for our islands. In fact, during one of our very first meals together, he showed me, through his actions, how committed he was to sustainability.

"To you and me, this is an ordinary pair of chopsticks right here, but to Russell Kokubun, these can be, and often are, instantly recycled into highly effective toothpicks (which I promise, Russell, I'll give them to you when you come on the floor; I haven't used them just yet). Waste not, want not, he is constantly setting an example of how we need to live in order to get to the preferred future we all see.

"I assure you colleagues that under Russell Kokubun's watch, there will be no Gestapo-like decisions; stakeholders young and old will be able to share their thoughts and be involved in the process, confirming the statewide importance

that agriculture should and will play in Hawai'i's future. Director Kokubun will also make sure that our aging agricultural infrastructure is sound and prepared to support the rebirth of this industry. With Russell at the helm, fields will grow, water will flow, and—I assure you—there will be no broken pet cock valves. I don't even know what a pet cock valve is, but my colleague from Kahuku via Moloka'i was once very concerned about the condition of our state's pet cock valves, and I know if anyone can fix a broken pet cock valve, it's Russell Kokubun.

"I would also say that if there is anyone who ever doubted Director Kokubun's fruitful abilities, they need not look any further than his silver Toyota Tacoma. I, along with thousands of other Twitter and Facebook followers and friends, have witnessed in awe the minor miracle of a pair of 'ulu, not one fruit, but two fruit, miraculously appearing on the roof of his truck. If there were ever a department that needed to have such a fertile director, it would be this one.

"While some of you may only understand the relevance of 85 percent of what I have said and are unclear as to the other 15 percent, trust me when I say that in the end it is all important. Whether you call him Senator Kokubun, Director Kokubun, or—my personal favorite—Russell Co-Co-bun (which really makes him sound like some kind of high-end French chocolate pastry), I support the Director's nomination 110 percent.

"In all seriousness, he has been a wise mentor and a good friend to me since I first took office. Russell was often the first person I called when I had a question and the last person I spoke to when I had to make a tough decision. He added perspective to my positions and, when needed, held me back—sometimes literally—when emotions got the best of me. Through Russell, I have learned that balance and patience can go a long way, but that when the moment calls upon you to make a quick decision, a good leader acts fairly and decisively. As his vice chair, I watched as he ran our committee in a fair, but firm manner. He gave me opportunities to learn the ropes and ultimately made it possible for me to branch out on my own.

"By far, Russell Kokubun is the most qualified individual for this position or any other job that requires strong leadership with the public's best interest at heart. While I still feel very much abandoned and have been taking it out on him in the form of questions at our hearings, I know that he is where he needs to be. He is a good son, a good father, husband, grandfather, and friend; and it is with no reservation that I strongly support his confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose on a point of inquiry and said:

"Will you ask the previous speaker if Russell Kokubun wrote her speech, or does she have a newfound genuine sense of humor?"

Senator Tokuda responded:

"I took inspiration from my colleague from Kahuku in writing this speech. Thank you very much."

Senator Hee rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"Let me say in support, regardless of whether he knows what a pet cock valve is. The previous speaker allows the Senate to measure him in four years should he come to confirmation, and the presumption is, based on the comment of the previous speaker, that every pet cock valve in the State of Hawai'i will be fixed, which suggests then the irrigation system will be fixed as well. I want to thank the previous speaker for engaging me to rise in support Russell Kokubun, not 'Co-Co-bun' as the previous majority leader used to say before he became head of

OEQC, I understand, and if we get to confirm him, I would expect that we will remind him of his mispronunciation of Co-Co-bun, which really drove Russell Kokubun up the wall. And, because of that, I support him. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Slom rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I have polled the Senate minority, and we are in agreement that we support Mr. Kokubun, a.k.a 'Co-Co-bun'. He is experienced. He is dedicated. And, you know, we are the only state in the union that has protection for agriculture in our constitution. We spend a great deal of time talking about agriculture, but that's generally what we do: just talk about protection of agriculture. We haven't done it. And we know that there are many challenges ahead as the head of the Agriculture Committee has said. There are competing and conflicting interests for our very valuable agricultural lands, but I am struck by Russell's imagination and creativity, and I know that he will be beneficial for all of us at this time. I particularly, Mr. President, am impressed with his ideas for growing taro in the moat around the Capitol, filling in parts of it and using his agricultural skills on the North 40. I think it would be really good if the Senate, in fact, can be the first example of sustainability, and we close all the fast food restaurants in a two-block radius, tell the trucks to go away, because Russell Kokubun decides fixing all the valves will also grow all the food for us. So, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to support his confirmation. Thank you."

Senator Kahele rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"When one thinks of Russell Kokubun, certain traits immediately come to mind. Committed, loyal, hardworking, intelligent, fair, and humble are just a few that define this man. His near decade of service to our state and this body demonstrates his adherence to these traits, indicated not only by the long record of legislation he successfully authored through, but also by his reputation that remains established amongst his colleagues, friends, and especially his former staff. Russell Kokubun's virtues exude collaboration and command respect from all of the people he works with. His leadership exemplifies the qualities needed to lead the Department of Agriculture at such a crucial time. His intimate knowledge of the critical issues facing the department will better enable the Board of Agriculture to render and execute informed decisions.

"Through his leadership on the Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Task Force, he is well-positioned to implement components of the progressive long-range plan, particularly with regards to agriculture, that he was instrumental in creating. They include: the continued support for increased innovation and diversification of our agricultural industry; the conservation and protection of our important agricultural lands in line with the provisions of Article XI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution; and the need to decrease Hawai'i's overdependence on imported sources of food and energy. These are areas that our Department of Agriculture can directly affect, and are also areas where Director Kokubun has worked on and improved through his efforts on the 2050 Task Force. Our most productive and valuable agricultural lands are faced with competing needs between various development projects and the need to provide land for food and energy production.

"Russell Kokubun's ability to approach problems objectively and with a reasoned mind will ensure that decisions are rendered with our state's agricultural needs at the heart of the discussion. I am confident that he will bring balance to any issues being considered by the Department of Agriculture, and am convinced in his ability to work effectively with stakeholders for the betterment of our state. One piece of advice, along with what my colleagues have previously said, that I would offer to the director was given to me by his former staff: to make sure that he is aware of those pesky pet-cocks.

They can be rather problematic. Again, I strongly support his nomination and ask my colleagues to join me in confirming him to lead the Hawai'i State Department of Agriculture.

"In closing, I would like to say, as his successor here in the Senate, that when I got here with two days to go and Opening Day was going to be happening at the Legislature a few days later on the 19th of January, I was very concerned about what we were going to be offering to the public and the people that were coming down here to the Capitol. And my staffer Linda Menda approached me and said, 'Senator, not to worry,' because Russell had left enough in the kitty that we were able to provide refreshments for the people who stopped by our office. And that's the kind of person that Russell Kokubun is. I've known him for the past 30 years and have great respect for Russell and also his wife Anne, who sits alongside of him, and his family. Good luck, Russell. Thank you and mahalo."

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"In support and incorporate the previous speaker's remarks as though they were my own, Mr. President. [The Chair so ordered, by reference only.] And just to wish Mr. Kokubun well on his way, and just to remind him of the Hawaiian values that are associated with our mahi'ai, or our agriculture: 'ike, to recognize; mālama 'āina, to care for the land; and of course, wai 'ola, and the water. So, with those thoughts in mind, Mr. President, it is my privilege, my honor, to be able to support a friend, a colleague, and someone whom I have great confidence that's going to turn Hawai'i to the right direction when it comes to our agriculture. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"Mr. President, your committee has examined the experience and education of the nominee and finds him to be well-qualified to serve as the Director of Budget and Finance. He earned his Bachelor of Arts in American History and his Masters of Business Administration from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. He received overwhelming testimony in support of his nomination. Your committee finds that the exemplary comments received on his behalf and his experience for six years as the Director of Finance for Maui County, and extensive and impressive professional background in management and finance with Kamehameha Schools, Mr. Young has excelled in recent months as the interim Director of Finance during which time he has created short-term and long-term strategies for addressing the budgetary challenges faced by Hawai'i.

"Mr. Young, in his previous role as Director of Finance for Maui County, has demonstrated and accomplished much that encourages his confirmation at Department of Budget and Finance. For Maui County, he increased the general fund carryover saving balances for each of the years that he served. He established the funding strategy to address Maui County's unfunded liability for the non-pension retirement benefits. He developed property tax policy that reduced the county real property tax from the fiscal years 2004 through 2009. And

finally, he structured the county bond transactions to refund debt and take advantage of federal stimulus financing. Each and every one of these accomplishments at the county level would serve us well at the state level.

“Those testifying offered many exemplary comments on his behalf. Former Mayor Charmaine Tavares testified, ‘He is keenly aware of the responsibility of using taxpayer funds to operate government.’ Others testified that Mr. Young will provide a balanced approach to address the state’s fiscal requirements and the steady and wise leadership needed during these challenging times. And others had offered: ‘His no-nonsense approach, openness to new ideas, and ability to collaborate with others represents the type of financial leadership I believe the state needs at this time. He brings with him a wealth of hands-on, finance-related experience from both the private and public sectors. Mr. Young’s management style encourages staff input and participation, and it’s created a supportive work environment for the department and the staff.’ For these and many other reasons, Mr. President, I encourage all my colleagues to vote in support of this nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I, too, rise in support of this nominee, and appreciate the words of our Ways and Means Chair and would echo them. You know, Maui County is blessed with some excellent public servants, and Kalbert Young, who served as finance director for the County of Maui, certainly exemplifies one. We’re so lucky to have him offer his services to the State and to have his name be put forward by the Governor for the State of Hawai‘i. I’m pleased to rise in support.”

Senator Ige rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. Pablo received a Bachelor of Business Administration degree and a Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa. He is a certified public accountant and has accumulated approximately 40 years of experience in taxation and finance. More importantly, his experience runs the whole gamut from county to state to federal to international experience in tax and finance. Mr. Pablo is well-respected for his knowledge of taxation, as well as his management ability. Your committee finds that Mr. Pablo has acquired considerable tax experience in serving in international, local, and state capacities, and I strongly encourage everyone to confirm his nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“It’s so refreshing to have someone like Mr. Pablo as the head of taxation. Not only is he responsive and quick to address the concerns that legislators have when he comes before them to testify, but I’m convinced with his background and expertise, we’re finally going to get the Department of Taxation into this

new technological age and out of all of the paper that accumulates and delays the deposit of checks. With electronic filing and processing, the Department of Taxation can ensure that receipts will be deposited in a timely manner to the benefit of the state’s coffers and not stay in a taxpayer’s personal bank account because of the delay in deposits. So, I’m delighted that another outstanding public servant from Maui County is being offered for state service. And good luck, Mr. Pablo. We need you to succeed in all that you do, and I know you will. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Kouchi).

At this time, Senator Ige introduced Director Pablo, who was accompanied by his wife Louise Braun and other supporters who were seated in the gallery.

At 11:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 a.m.

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Members, we are about to take up the matter on final reading on civil unions. I want to explain through this means that it was my hope that we would vote on this bill today. However, I am recommending that this matter be deferred for 24 hours, and let me explain.

“By way of explanation, let me thank all of those who have testified on this measure, both as advocates and opponents of this measure. It is a living reminder of how important this legislation is and of what an impact it would have for the State of Hawai‘i and decision makers. I want to acknowledge that the lead editorial, properly, in my mind, framed the bill before us. It is a matter of equality and equity. However, as part of the importance of this measure, I received as the Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary and Labor a call from a lawyer late in the evening last night, who requested that in an abundance of caution, because of the importance of this legislation, that the Senate consider a 24-hour delay to minimize any question of whether the bill had, in fact, sat on the clerk’s desk for 48 hours. I am eminently confident that the Senate has met every legal requirement on this measure. However, having said that, I believe that it is the prudent and reasonable alternative to allow this bill to sit another 24 hours.

“We are early in the session. This is not something that needs to be moved without delay. I want to apologize for those who may have joined us in support or in opposition. However, it is my recommendation as chair, based on the circumstances that this measure is so important, that it is prudent and reasonable to wait another 24 hours; and then I am more than happy and prepared to defend the merits of the bill tomorrow. Thank you, Mr. President.”

"Judge McKenna is a highly qualified woman for the position of Associate Justice, as evidenced by her integrity, her diligence, her legal knowledge, her professional experience, her judicial temperament, her intellect, and her dedication to public service. She came from humble beginnings before receiving her Juris Doctor degree from the William S. Richardson School of Law. Judge McKenna began her career in private practice with the law firm of Goodsill Anderson Quinn and Stifel, and later moved to an in-house counsel position with Otaka, Inc. Judge McKenna later also served as an assistant professor at the University of Hawai'i William S. Richardson School of Law.

"Born in Japan, Judge McKenna's first language is Japanese. She began from humble beginnings and has worked herself steadily and dedicated herself to public service in all aspects of her life. She is a beneficiary of the Patsy Mink legislation adopted by the federal government. She began after graduation her storied judicial career as a District Court judge. Four years later, she was appointed to the Circuit Court, where she administered to more than 150 jury trials, presiding in a wide range of criminal, civil, and family cases. In 2009, Judge McKenna became the senior judge of the Family Court and was instrumental in the move to the new Kapolei Judiciary Complex. Needless to say, Family Court is one of the most challenging of all courts because of the emotions and the human dynamics of all who appear before judges and the courts. Judge McKenna has also substituted for justices at the Hawai'i Supreme Court, as well as other judges for other agency appeals.

"Aside from her wide range of professional experiences, Judge McKenna has also been an active participant in the legal community, having been a member of numerous boards and committees. She has been time and again appointed and reappointed by the Chief Justices of the State of Hawai'i Supreme Court. As a result, and not surprisingly, Judge McKenna is also a recipient of numerous awards. In the courtroom, Judge McKenna has the innate ability to balance judicial temperament with keen analytical intellect. She has been commended time and again for her compassion, her sensitivity, her thoughtfulness, her patience, integrity, generosity, kindness, and positive and energetic attitude. Her reputation within the legal community is exemplary, where she is regarded as one of the most hardworking, industrious, diligent, meticulous, and insightful jurists. Her decisions display thorough knowledge of the law, applying the facts and the law in a decisive and fair manner.

"Testifiers have praised her depth and her breadth of legal experience gained through private practice, as in-house counsel, as a law professor, and for her service on the various benches of the District, Circuit, and Hawai'i Supreme Court. There is no doubt that Judge McKenna will continue to excel and offer to others the same qualities that she has offered on the benches of the Circuit and District Court as the next Associate Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. This would also mark for the first time, members, in the history of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, where two women will be seated, reflecting a more inclusive,

representative, and fair composition of the population of this state. With those few remarks, I would like to urge my fellow senators to confirm Sabrina Shizue McKenna as the next Associate Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Slom rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"As I've said several times publicly, previously, I have been a friend of the judge for a number of years. I have respected and been awed by her many, many accomplishments. We're here today to confirm her as an individual, as an experienced and qualified judge. And while other factors may be of interest to some, the real reason that she is achieving this position on the Supreme Court today is because she's earned it and because we have decades of experience of the things that she's done. Not things that she's said, but things that she's done. And it is a record of integrity. It is a record of service. And as the Judiciary Chairman just mentioned—I thought he was going to say that it was the embodiment of the Boy Scout oath because everything in that oath applies to Judge McKenna—she is the right person for that job today, and we know that she will make us proud because she has been a teacher, a justice, and a mentor to so many people in this community. I only wondered why it took so long for this to happen today so, I'm very happy to lend my full support to her nomination. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I too, speak in strong support, but for different reasons, although I want to incorporate the Chairman of the Judiciary's remarks as though they were my own. But I'm speaking in support of this nomination, Mr. President, because I feel very strongly that the judge will bring the kind of expertise that we need in resolving many of our Hawaiian issues. As a member of the Hawaiian caucus, we are faced with many difficult decisions this year as to how we're going to heal and bring the proper recognition to our indigenous people, our Hawaiian people, and I know that Judge McKenna has a lot of experience in this area simply because in her illustrious career she has dealt with many of these issues, and a lot of these issues began with CJ Richardson and they've carried on. I'm looking to her for the kind of guidance that we would need in terms of bringing these issues to closure so that the Hawaiian people can move on with their own agenda, as well as the people of this great state. So, with that, Mr. President, I urge all of my colleagues to please vote in her support. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"You know, we have in Judge McKenna someone who embodies the highest ethics, integrity, qualifications, and experience. It's delightful to see that she is also a woman and will bring that additional perspective to the bench. It is, as previous speakers have noted, high time that she was put forward to serve on our highest court, and I know that she will make the Senate, all of her friends, and colleagues proud as she takes her place on our highest court, and I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting her."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Kouchi, Taniguchi).

At this time, Senator Hee introduced Justice McKenna, who was accompanied by her companion and life partner Denise Yamashiro, her children, and family and friends.

Senator Hee also recognized Karen Kline who was a beneficiary of the intellect and judicial temperament of Judge McKenna.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"I rise in opposition for several reasons, not the least of which is the testimony by the Lieutenant Governor in Ways and Means was very troubling in that he intends to set up a number of special funds for his fee collecting purposes that he outlined during his testimony. I think that there may be a problem even in the title of the bill meeting the constitutional requirement of subject matter matching the title. While the title talks about the Lieutenant Governor's special fund, in the bill itself, in the body of the bill, it talks about depositing funds and fees into the general fund and then talks about the auditor examining the possibility of a special fund. So, I call this to your attention, but in any event, I think it is a bad bill. It's a bad precedent; at a time when we should be removing special funds and holding agencies accountable, we have the Lieutenant Governor's office trying to add more. Thank you."

FINAL READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Galuteria rose in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I stood before you on January 28, along with other colleagues, debating the merits of this landmark legislation. I could probably enter the exact same remarks into the record because my views haven't changed, but hopefully we will advance this bill to the Governor, rendering this the last time we address this issue on the Senate floor. With that hope, I'd like to offer mana'o, extended thoughts, combined with previous remarks.

"Mr. President, we're here today to stand up for human rights, not special rights. We're here to affirm the rights of all who live in Hawai'i to legal protection and social respect for our relationships. Now, let me be clear because the bill itself is clear. By establishing the status of civil unions in this state, it is not the Legislature's intent to revise the definition or eligibility requirements of 'marriage' under Chapter 572, Hawaii Revised Statutes. This is a human rights issue, Mr. President, and I stand to ask this body to move this civil union bill, so we may indeed have justice for all. In addition, today we're engaged in this continuing struggle to defend the right of those in committed relationships and committed family relationships, irrespective of gender, to receive services and opportunities.

"But, Mr. President, legal protection is not enough. Beyond this arena there is a hope for public commitment and social recognition. Civil unions will provide a choice for those who want to make a formal commitment to one another. It is unfortunate that those who choose this path are told that their relationships do not contribute to the social fabric of Hawai'i, that they do not deserve respect. Mr. President, the social cost of this prejudice is, like any other prejudice, enormous. But legislation alone cannot solve this problem. It must be solved in the homes of everyone in our communities across the country and across this great state. As Martin Luther King, Jr. once said, 'Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere.' Again, I ask you colleagues to advance this bill. Let us be the people of aloha that we were meant to be. Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I want to thank all of those who have testified on this measure. I wish to thank my hardworking staff who have, on more than one occasion, kept the ball moving on this issue by providing information, by providing data to move this bill quickly through the Senate to the House. I want to thank the other Chamber, the members of the House, who sought to improve the bill and, in fact, that brings us to today to make this bill a better bill. I want to also thank, last but not least, the members of the Judiciary Committee, who worked hard in agreement and in disagreement to bring us to this day.

"Today is a momentous day. There is no denying that by this action, Hawai'i takes a significant step towards true equality. There is no denying and one cannot ignore the plain fact of the matter that by taking this significant step in the right direction, people such as the woman who was just confirmed to sit as an Associate Justice of the highest court in this state herself becomes a recipient of justice.

"We were honored today and, by your vote, confirmed today by unanimous vote Sabrina Shizue McKenna. We also gave honor to her companion and life partner, and most of all we brought dignity to her two children of biological birth and her third child who is the biological child of her partner, all three from the same father who is a donor from California. She said to me her children now get the same entitlement as other parents with children of their own. We are here on a very momentous occasion not only to seek a new Justice, but to give justice to that Justice. I urge all of you to vote 'yes.' Thank you."

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President and colleagues, I was actually warned beforehand by one of my colleagues that anything that I say today would be construed as trying to delay or kill this bill, but I feel compelled to say a few remarks.

"Colleagues, in my humble opinion, we're making a big mistake in rushing the civil unions bill through. The two points that I would like to make today: One, many people who oppose the bill are going to feel that the process is unfair, that we did not have enough time to digest it, and that we really didn't discuss all of the ramifications. We're going to have a major part of our community that simply feels angry and disenfranchised. Two, the bill is flawed. We've been hearing a lot about equality over the past 20 years. If the advocates for this bill truly want equality, we should do the right thing now and allow all adults to enter into a civil union, including blood relatives. Yes, if you're related by blood, you can become a reciprocal beneficiary and receive the 35 or 40 survivorship benefits. But for some reason, according to this bill, you cannot enter into a civil union and get all the benefits that married couples receive presently. And that's clearly discriminatory. You saw the headlines. It was mentioned on the floor the other day. In yesterday's *Star-Advertiser*, it was said in the editorial: 'All Couples Deserve Equality'. And I've asked my staff to remind me to call their corrections department, because it should read: all couples deserve equality except those related by blood.

"We talk a lot about blended families and the importance of 'ohana here in Hawai'i, and recently I was visited by a woman who was taking care of her elderly, invalid father. She is struggling financially and would certainly appreciate any tax breaks that she could get, but because she's related by blood, she cannot enter into a civil union. Or, for example, I know two sisters who are actually my neighbors out in Kalaheo. They're in their 50s. They're both school teachers. They've been living together for years now and taking care of each other. They even adopted two beautiful children. Yet, these two sisters are not allowed to enter into a civil union because they're related by blood, and, what's interesting, yet two perfect strangers who meet on the street can say, 'Hey, let's sign up for a civil union so we can get all the tax breaks and benefits that everyone else gets.' And that's okay. So I don't get it. Why are people related by blood being discriminated against? And what puzzles me is why aren't the equality advocates standing up for these sisters? Or this daughter and her invalid father? It doesn't make sense to not allow two sisters to receive the same benefits as heterosexual or homosexual couples.

“We’ve got lots of time this session to make this needed change. I’m once again asking that we slow this down and take into account the controversy and divisiveness surrounding the bill. If we rush this through, potentially, lawsuits will be filed, and we’ll be back on this issue again in 2012, trying to fix it. I’ve contacted the Attorney General’s office for an official opinion. While I’ve received a preliminary answer from him, we need an official opinion which will take more time. The easiest solution, of course, is instead of creating a whole new section of the law, just take the existing reciprocal beneficiaries law and expand it. Everyone is already included there. Or if you insist on using this bill, we should delete lines 8 to 15 on page 2, which then would allow blood relatives to enter into a civil union.

“But colleagues, ultimately, the state should get out of the marriage business. I’ve been thinking about this for over a year and was reminded recently by comments made on the floor by the esteemed leader of the minority caucus. God forbid we would ever give credit to the minority leader for coming up with a good idea. And also comments that were made by former Governor Cayetano, who said in May of last year, and I quote: ‘I think the state should get out of the business of marriage. Marriage is a religious ceremony to be left to the churches.’ I totally agree, and keep coming to this question: Why are we giving benefits to any couples? The only people who should really be getting benefits from the state are those with dependents, those couples who have dependents; and this is why I’ve drafted a resolution for introducing which would request that the AG’s office establish a task force to review the legal, tax, and economic ramifications of the state discontinuing to license marriage.

“And finally, instead of doing things piecemeal, I ask that we take time to look at the big picture. We’re dealing with relationships. We’re dealing with family, the glue that holds our society together. What’s the rush? I ask that you please consider these points and join me in voting against S.B. No. 232. Mahalo.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I guess it’s interesting that if the opposition knows they’re about to be on the losing end, they will come up with whatever it takes to try to delay and derail this measure. I continue to be reminded that we talk about justice delayed is justice denied. Well, from my vantage point, equality delayed is equality denied; and quite frankly, there’s been a lot of debate and discussion on this measure. I think it’s time to move on and do what’s pono for all of the people in this state. This is not redefining marriage. It’s not telling anybody that you have to enter into this sort of relationship or this kind of entity. But it is providing for those in committed relationships to have the protection of the laws and the full weight of equality on their side; and I think that’s what we need to be concerned about and considering. And I urge all my colleagues: let’s move this expeditiously. Let’s get it up to the Governor’s office for signature and then we can have a real ‘ohana and real equality in our state. Mahalo.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“‘And liberty and justice for all.’ That is a saying that we have been taught since we were very young. Today, we advance that notion, that idea in Hawai‘i: that everyone is equal and that we have the obligation to protect that for one another. So, today, remember this moment. It will probably be one of the highlights of all of our careers in this body. You know, every day we vote on all sorts of things, and there are few, few items that rise above all of them. Today, we will vote

on granting liberty and justice for all. Equality for all. I ask that you support the measure. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“First of all, let me say that I have no animosity for anyone, and I certainly agree with the majority leader that thank goodness we will get this off the Senate after years and years and years. And I was one of those six senators in the Judiciary Committee that spent 18 hours continuously—the longest single hearing in the history of the Hawai‘i Legislature. So, it is true that we have discussed and re-discussed this issue over and over again, but it’s also true that this is an engine, very speedy, coming out of the tunnel now; the fastest piece of legislation in anyone’s memory. And it’s also true that a lot of people have a bad taste in their mouth for how this legislation was forced upon us and the political aspects of it, particularly from the end of last year’s legislative session in the House, the last hour of the last day, to what’s happened this year.

“We have differences of opinion, although it’s interesting that those of us that differ on this bill, have been the subject of a great deal of criticism and name-calling as well. We disagree on bills all the time, and that’s part of the process; and that’s why I say that I respect everyone who has come over the years and who has testified. I appreciate the good Senator from Kalaeloa mentioning my position and also mentioning Governor Cayetano. This has been my public position for 20 years, that the Legislature should not be involved with marriages or many other things that it’s involved with. I’ve also said that one of my problems with this bill is that it diverts attention from what we’re supposed to be really doing here.

“Tomorrow marks the 20th day of this legislative session, one-third of the way. We have no operating budget. We have no bills that will seriously and meaningfully address our problem as having one of the worst financial situations in the nation. We have no bills that are moving meaningfully to add jobs, improve the business climate, or to reduce our spending and debt. To the contrary: We are adding more spending and more debt, and one of the questions that arose in this bill was the economic implications. You can talk about human rights, you can talk about justice, you can talk about all of those things, but you cannot ignore the possible economic implications including those that will impact the State’s Employee Retirement System. That system, the ERS, is underfunded by nearly \$8 billion right now. It is ranked fifth worst in the United States; and along with the healthcare system, which also will be impacted but we don’t know by how much, we have grave economic challenges ahead of us. And no one seems to want to address them in their haste to get his bill through, to make it the first bill that the Governor signs into law.

“I don’t mind being on the losing end. Heck, I probably hold the record here—being on the losing end—but people have to stand up for things. They have to stand up for their principles and what they believe in, and they also have to ask questions and demand that we get answers, because the implications of these questions unanswered impact everyone in this state and not just now, but in the future as well.

“The attorney general sent in testimony, and he had a number of comments and concerns that have not been addressed with even this House draft one of the version. One had to do with the filing of joint state tax returns on the matter, which it’s done. Another concern had to do with not specifically addressing the termination of a civil union partnership. A third, the bill does not clearly define and distinguish about adoption procedures in civil union relationships. Fourth point that the attorney general made was that partners to a civil union not solemnized in Hawai‘i may be able to claim civil union status without formal documentation

and it calls into question civil unions in those few other states that allow it. The attorney general also called attention to a number of ambiguities—unclear statements—and other potential problems.

“Unfortunately, the Legislature, when it picks something that it really and passionately wants to move along, even though it has warnings or cautions about these instances, will always pass a bad bill and say we can come back later and fix it. Our responsibility should be to fix it now.

“We can debate about human rights and civil rights, and there is a debate. There are good points to be made on both sides and there have been inappropriate and outrageous remarks made by those on both sides. We should be civil to everyone that we talk with and discuss issues with, but the idea that someone says something is of a certain weight and magnitude does not, in and of itself, make it so. Those supporters today think that this will be a historic and legendary day for Hawai‘i. I do not. Again, I say that we should be doing primarily and in priority order those things which need our attention. Yet, we’re not doing that, and I think that’s a shame.

“I also again say that it is totally inappropriate to link and bring in the newly confirmed Supreme Court Justice who you heard me strongly support and confirm, as I have for over a decade. That is not an issue. I supported that individual and that woman because of her absolute qualifications and expertise—nothing else. And yet, we continue to try to bring people into a debate and into an argument even though they have not said that they are part of that argument. Let the bill and let the issue stand on its own merits. Enjoy the political victory that you have today, but remember that the problems and the challenges in the State of Hawai‘i still exist.

“By passing this law, which we have shown is so divisive within our community, is not going to satisfy everyone or even the majority of people. By doing it in a manner that we have done further tells people that they don’t have confidence in our Legislature. And finally, not allowing the people to vote on this important social issue, I think it is an error. So, with these remarks, again I say that I respect everyone who has testified for and against. The discussion will go on; not in the legislative arena, but probably it will move to the judicial arena.

“And with that, Mr. President, I call for a Roll Call vote. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose in rebuttal and said:

“Thank you for recognizing me; I cannot wait to respond to the previous speaker. The problem is I don’t know where to begin. In January, the previous speaker as well as the other previous speaker who raised reservations, stood before those two flags up there and before the two flags in front of him and solemnly promised to support and defend the Constitution of the United States of America and the Constitution of the State of Hawai‘i. Maybe it was a punchline when they did so. Because if they’d meant what they said, they would support and defend that, ‘we hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness;’ that no state shall ‘deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws’ (that’s what that flag there means); that Article I of the Hawai‘i State Constitution says that ‘equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State;’ that ‘no person shall be deprived of life, liberty and property without due process of law, nor be denied the equal protection of the laws, nor be denied the enjoyment of the person’s civil rights, or be discriminated against.’ ‘The right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed;’ that ‘no citizen shall

be disenfranchised or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to other citizens.’ That’s what that flag means.

“You know, I sat here 20 years ago, and I remember Senator Abercrombie (now Governor Abercrombie) and former Senator Cayetano (now former Governor Cayetano), and he used to look at some of the other guys and he would say, ‘Must be tough to lose.’ Must be. But the suggestion that economic implications take precedence over equality on its face does not deserve a response and will get none. That the implication that Associate Justice Sabrina Shizue McKenna be brought into the dialogue is outrageous and inappropriate. Ask her. Ask Associate Justice McKenna about her children. And then when you’re done, ask any woman about her children. And ask the woman’s partner, male or female, about his or her children. Inappropriate? Outrageous? I don’t think so. But ask McKenna; she’ll tell you. Because this is what she told me: ‘Isn’t it something that they can vote for me and not for my children?’ In her eyes, it’s not about her. It’s about her children. Ask any mother. It’s not about her. It’s about her children. We are here for her children and every child yet unborn. That is the significance of this day.

“Economic implications? Haste to judgment? This should have been done 20 years ago. This bill is not perfect. What bill is perfect? If bills were perfect, there’s no need for the Legislature, is there? No one would deny that this is perfection before us, no more than any one of us is perfect before their creator. Not a one. But this is a significant step in the right direction. This is a step towards that flag and that flag.

“You know, one of the previous speakers brought up the issue of blood relatives. Fair enough. That’s what this forum is for—issues. So, I called several advocates, and they said it doesn’t belong there; that if a sister wanted to leave a brother or a sister, or a grandmother wanted to leave a grandchild their property, the proper vehicle is a will. It’s a will. But if that is a compelling belief, I invite those who share that belief to submit an amendment to the bill. That’s fair, because that’s why we’re here.

“Mr. President and colleagues, let me read from the *Star-Advertiser* in an opinion lead editorial entitled ‘All Couples Deserve Equality’, ‘that improving the assurance of equal treatment does not expose a vulnerability, but instead strengthens Hawai‘i as a state that looks out for the interests of all its people’ and that ‘passing S.B. 232 will become a point at which’ all ‘Hawai‘i looks back with pride.’ Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

“The good Senator from Kahalu‘u lives for moments to grandstand and to attack what I say; and that, of course, is his right and his privilege. But what I don’t appreciate is when he doesn’t tell the truth about what I said. When I raise the issue of economic implications, I did not say it was superior to equal rights because I don’t believe that. I raised it as an issue which has not been addressed, just as I raise the issues in the attorney general’s testimony which have not been addressed; and I think that’s extremely important. And I’m fully aware of the significance of that American flag and that Hawaiian flag and the oath and pledge I take under the United States and Hawaiian Constitutions, and I would not get any schooling in constitutional law from the good Senator from Kahalu‘u. And when it was brought up that ‘liberty and justice for all,’ it should have been added that that’s great, but we’re not allowed to pledge allegiance to the flag in this body. And it should be brought up that we’re not allowed to pray in this body anymore. So, we’re very selective in the kinds of rights and the kinds of responsibilities that we address in this body.

“And as for the personal conversations, if someone has something to say, they either say it to the group, they testify to it, or they say it before another body. Instead, we continue to hear from the good Senator from Kahalu‘u about the conversations that he has, and we’re supposed to accept that. I have conversations with people, too, and they differ in what the content is, but that’s not what the issue is. The issue here is, and as I stood before you and said, ‘I respect people that have different opinions.’ But if you’re going to talk about issues here and you’re going to try to make it personal, then it doesn’t belong in this body. And if you’re going to talk about now is the time to pass this bill because you read the Constitution, I would ask what’s happened in the previous 51 years when we’ve had one party control this Legislature continuously in all but eight years, and the executive branch upstairs. If it were that important at that time and if it was that wrong in the Constitution, then it should have been addressed previously.

“I have a real problem with reading the Constitution and finding within it a lot of things that special interests want to see there in that Constitution. And, as a matter of fact, we’re looking right now at the courts and ultimately to the United States Supreme Court about an idea in terms of the commerce clause. And there are other clauses in the Constitution. Because someone wants it or because they interpret it that way does not make it right. That is why we have a justice system. That is why we have final adjudication before the United States Supreme Court, and that’s what we’ll do. So, again, this idea of loser, I don’t think so.

“Mr. President, I think we’re all winners when we can debate issues fairly and we reach a conclusion, and we move on, and as I said from the outset, do the important and most important business of this body and that is to bring economic equality to the people of Hawai‘i. Thank you.”

Senator Gabbard rose in rebuttal and said:

“I wasn’t going to say anything else, but since the previous Senator from Kahalu‘u brought up the previous speaker which was me, I, too, understand what the two flags mean. I understand the oath that I took. I understand it completely. And I think that when your integrity gets questioned, it behooves me to stand up and to explain that I fully understand what they mean.

“Secondly, in bringing up equal protection under the law and the Creator endowing us with unalienable rights, he’s made the case for the amendments for this bill because who you are leaving out is that father, that invalid father and his daughter, those two sisters from Kalaeloa. You’re leaving them out of this bill, and that’s not right.

“As far as the amendment, in talking with the equality advocates, the proponents of the bill, saying, ‘Well, just let those sisters leave it to them in a will.’ Well, if that’s the case, we’re just going to let them leave their estates or whatever in a will, then why do we need this bill? Then everybody can just do that. So unfortunately, I was not able to introduce a floor amendment as this has all kind of come to a head recently in terms of after 20 years of dealing with this bill. I really do feel that the ultimate solution here is looking at the total picture of marriage, relationships, family, and then coming together and coming for a real solution; that’s the answer. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Roll Call vote having been requested, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 232, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL UNIONS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

As you are aware, we allowed the department to allow the UI fund to go in deficit and borrowed money from the federal government to continue to make the uninsured payments. As a result of that, we need to be able to assess the interest amongst the businesses in order to repay the interest to the federal government. So, this is really part of the measure that we all supported last year to defer the unemployment insurance assessments against all businesses. I encourage all of my colleagues to vote in favor."

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

"Just a brief clarification and rebuttal to the clarification: The horrendous tax increase for all employers was still horrendous last year. It increases tremendously this year and will again increase tremendously next year. So, just to make it clear that businesses still are paying a tremendous amount for unemployment compensation and, to reiterate, only businesses. No employee ever pays for unemployment compensation. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Mr. President and colleagues, yesterday I asked for a courtesy delay on the nominee to be Land Board Chair. As it turns out, because of the five-day recess, that meant next week Thursday. Having chaired the Committee on Water, Land, Ag, and Hawaiian Affairs for the last three years, many of you may agree with me how important that committee purview is, how pivotal the department is, and how reliant the people of Hawai‘i are on the leadership of its director. As an aside and for example, I did not participate in the confirmation hearing of the nominee for DBEDT. I did, however, watch it on TV. I was fascinated to hear the request yesterday by a Big Island Senator for a panda bear for the Big Island. I watched it like many of you. Evidently, the chairman of the committee has written to you with some expressions of frustration about the process. It has been my experience that it is up to the chair to ensure that when a nominee comes before this august assembly that the assembly is fully prepared to act upon the confirmation of the nominee. It may be that I am the only one who was not asked if I was prepared, or it may not be; it doesn’t matter. It is a courtesy extended to all members, especially at a time when there is no urgency to confirm the individual.

“As most of you know, when nominees have come before this body, I have been particularly interested in disclosure; most of the time that interest has focused on jurors who would serve on the bench. On February 2, the *Honolulu Civil Beat* wrote an article entitled, ‘Aila Nomination Sails Through Committee.’ I raised the concern at that time because the article also indicated that he had not—as well as others including the attorney general—disclosed and filed the proper paperwork required of them with the State Ethics Commission. I would note in that same article that *Civil Beat* indicated, and I will quote, ‘But some offered their support with “deep” or “grave” reservations.’ And then it went on to explain the concerns of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. The nominee indicated, and I will quote, ‘I’m held to a higher standard because I’m Native Hawaiian.’ He’s not held to a higher standard by me because he’s a Native Hawaiian. He is held to that standard regardless that he may be Native Hawaiian.

“I would note that on February 12th, the *Civil Beat* said, and I quote, ‘Dela Cruz, who told *Civil Beat* Friday that he had a list of questions ready, stepped out to chair another hearing and missed the question-and-answer section entirely.’ I would note that when I asked for a courtesy one-day delay, the chair asked me, ‘What for?’ My response was, ‘The aquarium fish license.’ The chair said to me in the presence of others, ‘It’s inactive.’ I said, ‘It’s active.’ He said, ‘It’s inactive.’ I said, ‘It’s active.’ Well, either it is or it isn’t. At 11:32, all of you received by email a letter from the nominee, dated February 17 (today’s the 23rd). I will quote: ‘It is true that I did not disclose the fact that my wife and I both hold active commercial marine

licenses. In addition, I maintain an active commercial aquarium fish license.' Either he does or he doesn't. He may be eminently qualified. The plain fact of the matter is if the delay were not requested he may well have been confirmed today for us to go back to our offices to read the letter.

"Today, February 23, *Honolulu Civil Beat*: 'Amid Ethics Questions, Aila Confirmation Delayed.' Evidently, he was asked on February 17 by the chair to respond to the concerns I raised 11 days ago. Evidently, he quickly explained that he did not disclose that he and his wife hold commercial licenses because his position was consistent with testimony provided in years past. What does that have to do with disclosure? That the 'industry is sustainable at current harvest levels.' Really? That statement resembles someone who harvests fish for a living. That's what they say: 'Get plenty fish.' Why then does Guy Tamashiro sell fish from New Zealand. Hawai'i has plenty fish? I don't think so.

"The coup de grâce for me is the committee chair's statement: 'I think if it's brought up later, hopefully it's not because of any kind of political gamesmanship.' Really? What game? What game? The game of playing senator? The game of playing confiner? Or the game of playing obstructionist? What game? These concerns are not legitimate? You know, as the chair of that committee for the last three years, the aquarium fish bill came before it. How will the committee deal with the person who holds a commercial fishing license in his testimony that is 'consistent' with the department's position that it's at sustainable levels? Well, evidently Maui County disagrees because you cannot lay gill nets in Maui County. You cannot collect aquarium fish in Maui County. So, must be sustainable in Maui County. The *Civil Beat* article indicates he's going to surrender those licenses to make it a 'moot point.' Moot point. Moot point? Surrender the license and the issue goes away? Not for me.

"All Senators received this at 11:32 today. It doesn't say he's going to surrender his license in this letter you got today; and even if he were, so what? Because what are we talking about here? We're talking about the character of an individual. In this letter you folks received, he explained that it wasn't his fault that the Ethics Commission didn't receive the disclosure form on time—it was his secretary's fault. Oh, it was the secretary's fault! When's the last time any of us failed to file a campaign spending report or Ethics Commission report and the public bought the excuse, 'Wasn't my fault; was my secretary's fault.' That speaks to character. That's what the gamesmanship is all about. And I asked for one day, Mr. President. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose on a point of information as follows:

"I had the privilege of chairing the advise and consent portion of Mr. Aila's nomination when he was called to the forefront to share his remarks. It's unfortunate that the Senate has engaged in this format of organization involving joint or triple bills resulting in scheduling conflicts, which makes it impossible for a chairman to be presiding over two meetings at once. This was our situation; Chair Dela Cruz was representing your Committee on Water, Land, and Housing with your Committee on Agriculture.

"I just want to assure the previous speaker that yes, there were testimonies expressing reservations as to Mr. Aila's nomination, remarks that questioned the nominee's integrity and ability to be fair in looking at the issues in a much broader context. When your committee questioned Mr. Aila, we felt he was very receptive and his responses were appropriate in addressing these testifiers' concerns. He assured the committee that he will maintain a broader outlook, that he understands he is in a position that has greater responsibility, and he is no

longer representing positions that are targeted toward narrower interests.

"During a private conversation he admitted that he had a private aquarium license, and we suggested that he should consider giving up the license. We checked with the Ethics Commission and were advised that he was not required to register this license with them or list it in his disclosure statement. With respect to the previous speaker's inquiry as to whether or not Mr. Aila gave up his license, we were unsure and therefore agreed to defer action on Mr. Aila's nomination until this matter was resolved.

"Mr. President, I am hoping that it is leadership's position that when we engage in the advise and consent process, the chairman of a committee—or any member—should have the prerogative to express their concerns to the particular subject matter chair if they have concerns regarding a nominee. I'm most certain that if the previous speaker did bring these concerns to me or the chairman that we would have brought them up by questioning the individual to satisfy any senator and addressing the concerns. We felt that granting the request to defer would have met and addressed his concerns. So with that, Mr. President, I am yielding the floor to Chair Dela Cruz for further clarification. Thank you."

Senator Dela Cruz rose on a point of information as follows:

"Based on the deferral that happened in the Chamber yesterday, I did speak with the interim director. I also called the Ethics Commission. Immediately, the interim director met with Les Kondo to discuss the matter to ensure that everything was above board, that he followed the rules, he followed the guidelines. He did admit that he did not turn in his ethics financial disclosure in time. However, as the previous speaker stated, there is no requirement for any of us to file the kind of licenses we may have. That's not a state requirement; there's no law that requires that.

"Based on his meeting, I followed up with the Ethics Commission director. He notified me that they had a good, thorough meeting. He also said that the interim director was going to give up his license purely to ensure that he was going to avoid any type of negative perception. So, as of today, I think, all of us must have gotten an email, a letter to me from the interim director stating that his commercial license has been terminated, so that is no longer an issue. And as I mentioned, he went out of his way, he met with the ethics director. They had a meeting about it, and he is very intent upon complying with the law and ensuring that everything is above board. Thank you."

The fact that the interim director may or may not, does or does not have a license is superseded by the fact that he did not voluntarily disclose that information to the committee. That’s the issue. I could not care less whether the Ethics Commission required him to disclose a license. We are not the Ethics Commission. And I’ll tell you why: Even if he were to give up that license, how will the panel take his testimony on a measure that says no more night diving because the fish are asleep when you pillage their village, and he says, ‘No, no, no; get plenty fish.’ How will the Senate panel respond to a proposal to ban all gill nets statewide, and he says, ‘No, no, no; get plenty fish. The gill nets can stay.’ Or how will the panel take his response to a concern that there should not be spears in the hands of scuba divers because they stay underwater longer than the fish stay underwater until they get speared. ‘No, no, no; no need. Get plenty fish.’ How will the panel respond to those responses knowing that they’re coming from a former commercial fisherman?”

“That’s the point. The fact you didn’t disclose it to the Ethics Commission, I couldn’t care less. It’s the idea that he did not make that disclosure to the Senate committee in charge of his evaluation. It’s the idea that he would say his testimony is consistent with the department. Well, the department’s out of step. When was the last time you took your mo’opuna to Waikiki Beach to catch a fish? That is why Moloka’i people, like Ni’ihau people, reject the predatory nature of O’ahu fishermen who go to the Penguin Banks and Kaua’i fishermen who go to Ni’ihau. It’s not because they want to take a longer ride; it’s because that’s where the fish are. And why is that? Because the department says, ‘No, no, no; got plenty fish.’ That’s the issue with this director. It’s not about surrendering a license. That issue doesn’t go away with the surrendering of a license. It’s about disclosure. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose on a point of information and said:

“I just wanted to respond to some of the previous speaker’s concerns and just say that I was at the confirmation hearing; and that the few people who did testify with grave reservations about William Aila, Jr., ironically, their reason for having concerns about him is the issue of WESTPAC and the fact that Mr. Aila has for a long time held the belief that we should ban fishing in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands, and WESTPAC has the opposite view. And so, I hope that will allay some of the concerns that were just expressed; and as a resident of the Wai’anae coast community, Mr. Aila’s reputation has been one who has fought very hard to preserve our fish and to have self regulation among the fisherman. So, mahalo.”

ADJOURNMENT

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

MATTER DEFERRED FROM TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 2011

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 445 (Gov. Msg. No. 517):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 445 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Solomon and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of WILLIAM JOHNSON AILA, JR. as the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire December 31, 2014, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Dela Cruz rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. William Aila is a person from humble beginnings, having been born and raised in Wai‘anae and graduated from Wai‘anae High School. He pursued his desire of furthering his education and obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in General Tropical Agriculture from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa.

Subsequent to getting his degree, Mr. Aila served as Harbor Agent for the Wai‘anae Boat Harbor since 1987.

“In reviewing Mr. William Aila’s resume, one can conclude that he possesses the diverse vocational background which provides the ability to protect Hawai‘i’s most-valued natural and cultural resources.

“The nominee has widespread support from the community. Both management and labor expressed support for the nominee and his ability to bring all interested parties together. He has the respect and trust of groups with which he has worked. Hundreds of testimonies were received in support of Mr. Aila. However, there were some testimonies that expressed reservations on his appointment, and I know Mr. Aila is working to address these concerns.

“The Aha Kiole Advisory Committee and the Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club had some reservations as to whether Mr. Aila will be able to address concerns related to Native Hawaiian issues and whether he’ll ‘be able to live and practice our Hawaiian values taught to us by our ancestors and kūpuna.’

“Undoubtedly, any position has its challenges and presumedly most nominations will come with some reservations. I believe that former chairperson Laura Thielen’s testimony on Mr. Aila’s nomination is very pointed. Ms. Thielen stated, ‘This job requires someone who has experience and an appreciation of recent and long-term history to navigate the myriad of interests, passions, and controversies that surround land, water, cultural, and historic resources in Hawai‘i.’ She further added, ‘The real question you should wrestle with is whether Mr. Aila can be objective in his new role of Chairperson of DLNR, given his previous roles. This is no different than when you examine the record of a lawyer who has acted for years as an advocate, and determine whether he may successfully step into the objective role of a judge.’

“Former chairperson William Paty also testified on Mr. Aila’s behalf. He stated that he ‘first became acquainted with him when we both worked together to resolve a dispute between the weekend trollers of Wai‘anae and the newly arrived Gulf Coast Vietnamese long liners that had reached close to a gun-toting stage. Since that time, we have held both supporting and opposing positions on water, fisheries, land use, and environmental concerns. The Army’s use of Makua has been the longest issue between us...he doesn’t pull any punches. But through it all, he always kept his word.’

“Miwa Tamanaha and Marti Townsend of Kahea, the Hawaiian Environmental Alliance, stated: ‘In our work, we have had many opportunities to engage with Mr. Aila. Although we have not always agreed with his position, we have always found him to be respectful, hardworking, and professional with all concerned.’

“I would like to conclude with Kamaki Kanahale, Chair of the Sovereign Councils of the Hawaiian Homelands Assembly’s testimony that ‘never before have our native communities been accorded a place at the decision-making table, and rarer still to the chair of the DLNR. We believe that this bodes well for our Hawai‘i when, for the first time, a Native Hawaiian, Mr. Aila, whose ancestry and culture demands a full accountability like that of every kānaka maoli to preserve, protect, and defend to the fullest extent possible ka honua (the earth), ka ‘āina (the land), ka moana (the ocean), and nā lani (the heavens) in perpetuity, a sacred trust obligated to Mr. Aila by the requirements of his birthright.’

“I am comfortable that Mr. Aila will rise to meet this obligation. I endorse the confirmation of Mr. Aila. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I just would like to incorporate the previous speaker’s remarks in support of the nominee as if they were my own. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Hee rose in support of the nominee with very strong reservations as follows:

“First of all, let me start by saying this: Lengthen your stirrups; we’re in for a long ride, because I will not be brief.

“So, let me start with a kānaka maoli who said in 1887: ‘In the midst of these evidence of prosperity and advancement, it is but too apparent that the natives are steadily decreasing in numbers and gradually losing their hold upon the fair land of their fathers. Within the century, they have dwindled from 400,000 to a little more than a tenth of that number of landless, hopeless victims to the greed and vices of civilization. They are slowly sinking under the restraints and burdens of their surroundings, and will in time succumb to the social and political conditions foreign to their natures and poisonous to their blood. Year by year, their footprints will grow more dim along the sands of their reef-sheltered shores, and fainter and fainter will come from their songs until finally their voices will be heard no more. Forever. And then, if not before, and no human effort can shape it otherwise, the Hawaiian Islands with the echoes of their kūpuna will pass into the political as they are now firmly with the commercial system of the great American Republic.’ King David Kalākaua said that. How did he know in 1887 that in this year, at this time, that what he said then is truer than ever?

“And so with the respect of the previous speakers, we have a Native Hawaiian. As I have said earlier in caucus and I’ve said on this floor, this Native Hawaiian has said that he is held to a higher standard because he is Native Hawaiian. So, let’s look at the standard.

“On the matter of disclosure, and I have said this at prior confirmations: disclosure is paramount to us to render judgment in this process. Without disclosure, it would be impossible to fairly judge the evaluation of the nominees. When I was Judiciary Chairman in 1987 and 1988, one of the first judges came to me and said to me, ‘You know, Senator, I want to disclose something because if I don’t, I’m afraid it’ll come out. I’m from Kaua’i, and as a lawyer, I represented a husband and a wife who were divorcing. It is improper for me as a lawyer to represent two parties who are suing each other. I want you to know.’ On another occasion in the same year, a different nominee failed to disclose that he was in contempt of court, failed to disclose that he was admonished by the Intermediate Court of Appeals, failed to disclose that he was found in violation of Rule 11 by a federal judge, failed to disclose these things that came to light because others came forward with these disclosures. Two years ago, a nominee failed to disclose that he was admonished by the Intermediate Court of Appeals for engaging in prosecutorial misconduct. Not once; three times. He failed to disclose to the ICA; as a result of being found in violation and committing prosecutorial misconduct, the ICA remanded the case back to court. And then the nominee failed to disclose that on another occasion he was found in eight counts of prosecutorial misconduct by the same ICA judge who now sits as an Associate Justice of the Hawai’i Supreme Court. Just this year, a nominee came forward and said, ‘Mr. Chairman, I want you to know the ICA admonished me, but it did not remand a case back to court because I signed a Circuit Court ruling that said white males were not a protected class.’ And then the nominee said, ‘In fact, I made a mistake. I did not see the word “not.” I want you to know.’ And that allowed me to go to the ICA and to ask the judge who wrote the opinion, who replied, ‘You read the footnote in my decision.’ I said, ‘Yes, I did, Judge.’ And he said, ‘It’s quite

amazing when people will come to disclose things that may not necessarily be easy to do because disclosure begins with the word “character.” That is what disclosure is about.

“In this particular nominee, he failed to disclose issues; and the failure to disclose those issues is of grave concern to me. This nominee named and blamed a subordinate for his failure to file a timely document. That is troubling to me because it suggests a lack of leadership, of character, resulting in poor morale at the office.

“While I would have hoped that his confirmation hearing could have taken place later in the session, that decision is not mine; and let me explain. As members of the Senate, by Constitution we are charged with a responsibility of advise and consent. That is a solemn duty we swear to, because after each confirmation, whether it’s a judge or a director—in the case of a judge, it’s ten years before the term is complete; in the case of a director, it’s four years. So, we do not have the luxury nor the benefit of time with new directors to develop a track record to give us an indication of how he or she might perform his or her duties. For example, that is why the attorney general, who is the highest of law enforcement officers in the state, will not be confirmed until April to allow the Senate the time for Mr. Louie to develop a track record. In the case of this nominee, the track record as an interim director is very brief. His track record as a community activist is anything but brief. And all of those who emailed letters of support and messages of support acknowledged that part of his life. We are, however, judging the nominee on his performance as a director; and will he take that same passion of community activism and integrate that passion as a department director?

“The committee report said, ‘The Chairperson must fulfill a diverse mission to enhance, protect, conserve, and manage Hawaii’s unique and limited natural, cultural and historic resources held in the public trust for current and future generations.’ One of the first actions as director was to sign off on a programmatic agreement required as a component of the environmental impact statement process on the rail. That provides us the first footprint and gives some indication, although brief as it may be, of the nominee as a director.

“Colleagues, over three decades ago the Legislature declared ‘the historic and cultural heritage of the state is among its important assets and that the rapid social and economic development of this contemporary society threatened to destroy the remaining vestiges of this heritage.’ The Legislature further declares that ‘it is in the public interest to engage a comprehensive program of historic preservations at all levels of government.’ The Legislature further declares it ‘shall be the public policy of the state to provide leadership in preserving, restoring and maintaining historic and cultural property.’ Two decades ago, the Legislature also declared that ‘the cultural values related to the treatment and protection of burials is of the highest priority, that all human skeletal remains and burial sites within the state are entitled to equal—equal—protection under the law regardless of race, religion, or cultural origin, that the nature of this is a sacred trust for the benefit of all, and therefore the Legislature affirms the common law rule that a landowner knowingly in possession of human skeletal remains cannot own the remains but mainly holds the same in trust.’

“How does that square with the decision of the interim director to sign off on the programmatic agreement for the environmental statement for the rail? The director said that—and I’m paraphrasing—he had no choice, that the federal government required him to do so. In fact, it is my view, based on discussion with others familiar with this situation, that the federal government allows the alternative and does not require a phased-in project. The Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation asserts in its complaint that once again an archeological inventory survey needed to be prepared prior to the decision

making and construction and that the state law did not allow—did not allow—for a phased approach to these studies. Moreover, the O‘ahu Island Burial Council said on October 14, 2009, by a unanimous vote, that an archeological inventory survey needed to be done before acceptance of the final environmental impact statement. And further, on April 14, 2010, the O‘ahu Island Burial Council voted again, by unanimous vote, to recommend that the State Historic Preservation Officer (that is, the interim director) object—object—to any version of a programmatic agreement that allows for a phased, archeological inventory survey approach. The O‘ahu Island Burial Council is made up of descendants of the voices that shall be heard fainter and fainter that were spoken of in 1887. Evidently, no objection was raised by the State Historic Preservation Officer. That is truly unfortunate.

“Last week Friday at the land board, by unanimous vote of which the interim director was one, voted to allow for the CDUA for the TMT to go forward. That is his duty—to vote. In a question distributed to the interim director, the chairman of the committee said, ‘You have been an outspoken critic of the U.S. Army’s training in Makua Valley. How would you respond to the critics who say that you cannot be objective?’ He said, ‘I oppose training in Makua Valley because it is sacred.’ Why would you oppose training in Makua Valley because it is sacred and allow for the imposition of a TMT on Mauna Kea? I have yet to meet a Hawaiian who has not said, ‘Of all lands sacred in Hawai‘i, Mauna Kea is most sacred. It is the piko of who we are. Our piko goes back to Mauna Kea. Lake Wai‘au belongs to us. That is where our birth is.’ So why and how would the director vote ‘yes’ unless he holds the sacredness of Makua at a different standard from the sacredness of Mauna Kea?

“Three days ago, the Judiciary Committee held a hearing to designate two areas off the coast of Maui as marine conservation areas. The nominee submitted testimony in opposition. It must be very difficult to oppose the conservation effort while at the same time being a commercial fisherman. It must be difficult. This morning, the Committee on Judiciary and Labor held a hearing on S.B. No. 1310, which is the safe harbor law that gives citizens a right to bring a complaint against those who violate the law protecting endangered species. The nominee sent in testimony in support of removing the sunset to the law. Forever. This is a law that was in 1997 constructed, and the sunset was extended three times. And this nominee, this Native Hawaiian, testified to remove it, at the same time in his testimony saying, ‘Hawai‘i is the capital of endangered species.’ These are but only a few of the instances that my staff has been able to develop a track record to try to understand the conflicts inherent in this Native Hawaiian who has himself said he is held at a higher standard and then engage in these unfortunate decisions. I am not here to say they’re the right decisions. I’m not here to say they’re the wrong decisions. But for me, I disagree with every decision that I have issued to you folks this morning.

“By the nominee’s programmatic signing off on the EIS, I sent each member three emails today. The longer you live, the more life repeats itself. If you click on your computers, here is the first email. This is by Corky Trinidad, and it says, ‘Bishop Museum? What signs or clues tell us that it’s a real heiau?’ The second one is also by Corky, and it says—there’s a bunch of people with an HVB sign that says ‘heiau’ and it’s stuck in H-3, and it says—to this group of Hawaiians, ‘You never satisfied.’ And the third is real easy; it’s a dollar sign, and it says, ‘H-3 bypass of controversial archaeological sites.’ The longer you live, the more life repeats itself. This is the result of what happened to H-3, because of bones, litigation, archaeological sites to the extent that H-3 was moved out of Moanalua and into Halawa. Because of William Aila’s signing of the programmatic agreement, you can be sure that what

happened at H-3 will happen at the rail, that the \$250 million project of H-3, which turned into \$2 billion, will repeat itself. This is what happens when careful deliberation and looking at the history and signing off on agreement contrary to the Burial Council, contrary to state law, and contrary to Native Hawaiians.

“There are those of you who said to me, ‘If not him, then who?’ I say to you, what has the nominee demonstrated? And I asked the Senate Committee Chairman. I asked for two examples where the nominee as interim director has used being a Native Hawaiian as an asset to the office because the advocacy is one thing, the decision making is quite another. If the vote on Friday was five ‘ayes’ and one ‘no’ on the TMT, I’m good if the ‘no’ vote was a Native Hawaiian; but in fact the interim director who signed off on the staff report voted ‘yes’. That’s his thumbprint on the staff report. And I presume somebody up here is going to get up and say being a Native Hawaiian provides some comfort and relief. But other than advocacy, the nominee has an opportunity and a privilege as a Native Hawaiian to demonstrate that what Kalākāua said in 1887 stops right now, that the ‘ōiwi koko Hawai‘i go to the front of the line. But every decision that I can see, every testimony that I have had, suggests just the opposite. So, why be Native Hawaiian? Be like the rest. Laura Thielen? Ask six families in Kahana Valley about Laura Thielen. Come to my office. I have the eviction notice framed to always remind me what can be done to Hawaiian people on the fair lands of their fathers.

“I said this yesterday in caucus and I said this to a lawmaker earlier today, ‘I feel like...’ Actually, I said this to my wife when we were running in the morning one day. Because this nominee and this nomination have been on my mind, and it has been troublesome for me, and I said to her as we were running on the highway that this reminds me of going to Texas and going to see Clay O’Brian Cooper, who’s the world-renowned champion team roper; and going into his barn and having Clay O’Brian Cooper saying, ‘Hey, Clay; see this horse? You take this horse: worth every penny because this horse can perform in the arena. If the money’s on the line, this horse will take you to the hip all the time.’ And then, after taking the horse in the arena and calling for the steer, and finding out the horse is crippled. It may have plenty try in it—his heart bigger than his body—but he’s got navicular, he’s got ring bone, and he’s not worth a lick. I said to a lawmaker today, ‘I’m not sure if the nominee is a stallion or a proud cut gelding. What I’ve seen up to this point, he’s the second, not the first.’

“I regret that this Senate doesn’t have more time to evaluate this nominee, and the reason is simple: This nominee will make decisions that impact what King Kalākāua spoke about in 1887. This nominee will lead the most powerful board in the state, and by his actions up to this point, it causes grave concern. Mr. President, I support the effort because maybe this nominee’s heart is bigger than his body, but whether this nominee can run, we’ll know soon enough because what we’ve seen so far, or what I have seen so far, does not suggest that. Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, members.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“I’d like to thank the previous speaker for his remarks. I just want to note for the Journal that I, too, agree with many of the previous speaker’s positions as they relate to the Burial Councils, and to his remarks about King David Kalākāua. They were appropriate. I also agree with the Senator’s concerns as to the impact of the rail, the Hui o Malama, and as they relate to the duties of nā iwi o Hawai‘i. Likewise, I am a passionate admirer of horses, believe it or not; I feel the Senator’s remarks were more complimentary than negative. However, I still found them offensive, Mr. President. I feel it inappropriate to compare the nominee to that of a stallion or a

gelling. I had the privilege of listening to our nominee's remarks during the committee hearings. I felt at that time those in attendance would agree. We could feel this individual's passion as he spoke about his community activism and how he plans to integrate this knowledge into his leadership style. We heard many testimonies as to how he's already organized his department and, more importantly, how people within the department finally believe there's hope. They, the workforce, feel that they are well appreciated, they feel that the nominee knows and understands the difficulties of their jobs. In conclusion, this is the person that's going to be able to make the difference and lead DLNR, a direction reflecting the new Hawai'i.

"Now, in reference as to what was discussed in caucus: normally I would not elaborate on what was discussed in caucus, but I feel compelled to do so being that these discussions were brought up by the previous speaker. We in the Senate are the ones whom are responsible in providing the nominee with the direction as to how we are going to solve these problems. Yes, we must revisit the issues pertinent to Mauna Kea. Your Committee on Water and Land went on an on-site visitation. Many of my colleagues who were in attendance felt that this was a life-changing experience when they saw and could feel the sacredness of that mountain; they felt the mana that surrounded us. It was disturbing to us all when we saw how diminished the visitor center was and the limited public access. The visitor center should be promoting the magnificence of this mountain, representing the Hawaiian mana'o (spirit) and the Hawaiian no'ono'o (thought). Mr. President, we this body must focus and provide the proper direction to the departments. These issues not only involve DLNR, University of Hawai'i, but all other appropriate departments that need to collectively organize so that we can bring all of these thoughts to fruition, improve public access, and a bigger, better visitor center.

"On another subject matter, yes, I was part of that H-3 controversy, Mr. President. Believe me, it was not pleasant. As a matter of fact, it was gut-wrenching. And true, we should have learned from our mistakes. The lesson learned, dealing with cultural sites of significance, the discovery, as they relate to the iwi, should be dealt within as it pertains to the whole project in a very broad, perspective, as it pertains to the project, as approved identifying sites piecemeal. This approval caused the controversy, caused the heartache, caused the project to be one of the most expensive highways ever built in this country. And why did the project persevere? Because the leadership, at that time, cared. We were willing to go the extra mile to resolve the controversy, willing to spend the extra dollars. We were willing to meet with the Hawaiian groups to resolve the issues. I believe we're a sovereign nation. Everybody in this building knows this. The Hawaiian perspective: This isn't a state; this is our country. But we're the ones in this body that have to take the lead in providing the proper directions to our departments so they will gain this cultural sensitivity—they will gain this no'ono'o (knowledge)—resulting in advocacy which is truly best for our Hawai'i.

"Yes, it's true Mr. Aila does have a lot to learn. Well, don't we all, Mr. President? You know, learning is a process that evolves. Our committee feels confident that we know these challenges are just fine, not only in people's minds. The objectives and the goals are achievable if we all work together collectively. I just want to congratulate the previous speaker. It takes a lot of courage to stand up and to advocate on issues the speaker has brought to this body's attention.

"Mr. President, we have come to a political crossroads in our Hawai'i. We have made great strides in terms of our leadership. Look at our own country; we have the first black President. And now it's our opportunity to have a Native Hawaiian person

be in charge, Mr. President, of one of the largest departments in the State of Hawai'i, DLNR faces these challenges within it. I and the committee already put the nominee on notice. He is answerable to us, and I want to assure all of my colleagues the nominee has gotten the message. So in our future deliberations please, colleagues, call the nominee to your office. Express what your concerns are. And collectively we can solve and build a better Hawai'i that will take care each and every one of us. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Shimabukuro rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"First, I want to talk about the Mauna Kea issue that's been raised, and I want to point out to you that the DLNR did also approve a contested case to go forward; and if anyone can attest about how important and how critical contested cases are, it's William Aila, Jr. He has been a witness in contested case hearings many, many times. I've seen him testify on the Waimānalo Gulch contested case, on the Tropic Lands Industrial Park contested case. He understands that this is to be taken very seriously and that the issues and the concerns raised by the Native Hawaiian community can be dealt with in a contested case. On the issue of the rail, as a member of Hui Malama, I think we all know that William has been willing to put himself on the line when it comes to issues of burials and iwi, and if anyone understands those issues, it's him. So, I'm sure that those all went into consideration in the decision he made.

"The aquarium fishing bill is, as I stated earlier, much of the reason that William is under attack is because of his firm beliefs in protecting our natural resources. His stand on the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands is consistent with what the federal government has stated about fishing there, and he's been very firm in that despite the possibility of making enemies of people who support more fishing than he does.

"The issue of the S.B. No. 1310, the safe harbor bill: Earth Justice testified this morning that they want to work with the new administration of DLNR on crafting a bill that they can both agree on. And as allies and close friends, William Aila and David Henkin of Earth Justice, I'm sure, will work on that very important issue of the safe harbor.

"And I have many more written comments that I'd like to submit in support of this excellent nominee. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Shimabukuro's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President:

"I rise to speak in strong support of the confirmation of William Aila as Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. I speak not only as the Senator from Mr. Aila's home district, where he long served as the Wai'anae Harbor Master. I speak also as a longtime friend and neighbor of this dedicated environmentalist, cultural practitioner, community leader and state public servant for the past 24 years. And I speak with the firm conviction that the State of Hawai'i needs this man...at this critical time. He is by far the best candidate and the most qualified for the job. To think otherwise is not only misguided, it is a disservice to a good man and the overwhelming majority of individuals and organizations who stepped forward to support his appointment.

"As proof that I am not alone, I point to the 341 pages of testimony—99 percent of which supports Mr. Aila. And I quote the Water, Land & Housing Committee Report, which says: 'Your Committee finds that Mr. Aila has the unanimous respect and trust of the groups with which he has worked, and that his cautious, respectful approach can assist the Department in

fulfilling its mandates ... and finds that he has the knowledge, expertise, and abilities befitting the important position of Chairperson.' Even more compelling, in my opinion, is the following tribute from one of the 164 private individuals who testified: 'William Aila is a gentle giant. I have seen the firmness of his harbor administration, the immediacy of his reaction to water emergencies, the tenderness of his reactions to a friend's misfortunes, and the consistency of his dedication to the protection of our beautiful state.'

"As a DLNR employee, William has served under six Chairs—three of whom offered compelling testimony as to why he is qualified to follow in their footsteps. I was especially moved by the words of one of his distinguished predecessors, Bill Paty, who spoke of working with William for 25 years—'sometimes together, sometimes in opposition.' 'The Army's use of Makua,' he states, 'has been the longest issue between us ... I mention this because over the years, we developed a trusting relationship and a strong friendship that underlies the differences we may have had.' It comes as no surprise that William—an activist as well as an administrator—would be the center of controversy and a target for criticism. However, the words 'respect' and 'trust', even from opponents, form a common thread throughout all the testimony I heard.

"One testifier—the daughter of Governor John A. Burns—makes specific reference to political opponents. She writes: 'Just as those in opposition to my father's views initially feared his election, so do William's opponents. However, I believe they will find out differently when his appointment is approved.' Just as Jack Burns rose above the voices of opposition, so—I believe—will William Aila...once given the chance to prove himself to supporters and opponents alike.

"Much of the opposition to Mr. Aila revolves around fishing issues—as a lifelong fisherman in his private life and now, in public life, as one charged with protecting ocean and other natural resources. The controversy first surfaced in committee and was later brought to this floor on February 23. You may recall Mr. President and colleagues that I spoke in rebuttal on that occasion—pointing to a difference of opinion between Mr. Aila and a federal fishery management agency (WESPAC) over fishing in the Northwest Hawaiian Islands. In this dispute, it is William Aila who clearly emerges as the champion of conservation over consumption. This is consistent with his long-standing reputation on the Wai'anae Coast as one who has fought very hard to preserve our fish and promote self-regulation among fellow fishermen.

"I do not want to dwell, however, on points of opposition. I choose to focus instead on the outpouring of aloha and support for William Aila that began on the day our Governor announced his appointment. I urge all of my colleagues to join with me in confirming a man whom I greatly respect and whose friendship I cherish."

Senator Kouchi rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I just have two brief comments. I, as a new Senator, wonder at times what the role and function of the caucus leader is and how it all fits into the process here in the Senate. But after a very spirited caucus as described by my colleague from District 1, I will say the issues that were raised were excellent, and the suggestions about resolutions and clarifying policies and directions that the Senate would like to see arise or establish a process by which, I think, we will work together. If we want the horse to run and run well, it is incumbent on us to help the horse to run well in every way we can. Recently, having seen *Secretariat*, it takes a great trainer, it takes a great jockey, and it takes a great team to make a great horse run well. And I think the plan from my colleague from District 1 provides that road map, and I look forward to this horse running well.

"The second point and the most important reason why I'm going to be supporting the director is that while my colleague to my right gets all the attention of being the only one of his kind in this body, I too am the only one of my kind in this body. I am the only Senator from Kaua'i and Ni'ihau, and unlike my colleague I cannot be on all committees. Yet, when I've reached out to the director's department for help, I'm not a member of the committee that oversees them, but his deputy has been available. Other members of his staff have been available, and they've come up with great solutions. They've been ready to help—ready to help the people of Kaua'i, the people of Hawai'i—and I do believe that the true mark of greatness is not just in the individual, but in the team that that individual can attract and the people that will work with that individual. I am confident and I am so pleased in the kind of support I've had from his team that I'm going to be proud to vote for him today. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I must apologize first, however, to you, Mr. President, to the colleagues: There was no drama in the minority caucus. We have been fully supportive from the beginning.

"I've had the pleasure of knowing Mr. Aila for many years. Colleagues have seen Mr. Aila down here at the Legislature for many years, testifying very passionately. I do not see eye to eye with him on several issues, and many of those issues were brought up today, and I think that that's very important, that they have been brought up. I do not support the nominee because he is a Native Hawaiian. I do not support him because he is a man. I do not support him because he's likened to different kinds of horses. I support him because of his character, because of his integrity, because of his passion, because of what we've all seen over the years. I'm not particularly enamored of community activists, but I think it's very important for people to be involved in their community. And when the community comes together and says in one voice, 'We support this man; we believe in this man,' then I lend my voice to that support also.

"As was briefly alluded to, this is a very large department. I've called it a dysfunctional department on a number of occasions. There are a lot of competing interests within the department, and there are a lot of problems. In his very brief time as interim director, I think the nominee has achieved one of the major goals, and that is to increase and improve the morale of the employees in this department; and without that positive morale and without the employees believing that changes and positive directions can be attained, then nothing can occur. And we've seen that over the years through different administrations and the change in different personalities. This idea of taking difficult decisions—most of us are called upon to do this every day, and we know that it is impossible to please everyone and, in fact, that should not be our objective, to try to please everyone. Our objective should be to do the right thing. That still allows for people to disagree, or to agree to disagree, and we will do that, I'm sure, in the future.

"But the point is the Governor has made a nomination. The committee has had a full hearing of which I attended and participated. And we know that we have an individual who's humble and reasonable and rational, understands the complexities of running a department such as this, and understanding as he does that it's a lot easier to be a community activist on the outside than to be herding the cats on the inside. And yet, he has volunteered for this, not for self-aggrandizement. He could certainly do other things. It would be far less stressful. And we'll all have to watch his hairline from now on because it, like the tide, will recede.

“And as it was brought up about the various issues, we will continue to discuss and debate and take positions on these issues as we should. Specifically about the rail, I think all of my colleagues know my position on this \$8 billion train to nowhere, which must be and should be and will be stopped, not only because of the Hawaiian iwi, but because of the resources of Hawai‘i’s taxpayers, particularly those of us on O‘ahu. So, there’ll be time to discuss this, and I believe the director and his impression that he was forced to make a decision. But again I say that we can still disagree on decisions. He has demonstrated he is a person that not only will listen but that he will get personally involved. And as my good colleague from the island of Kaua‘i has mentioned, he has assembled a good staff and he has good people and they believe in him; and more importantly, people from across the state have been calling us, emailing us, stopping us at Longs and Safeway and talking with us, and I think that’s extremely important.

“And so for those reasons and others, I’m fully confident that all disclosures have been made and that the measure of this man has been formed by his parents, and by those who have come in contact with him and who have mentored him, and who he in turn will mentor. I think he is living proof of Hawaiian values, that part of Hawaiian values like all other values means that people can and should take a position after listening to others, after researching the issue, but then be able to stand by that position. And William Johnson Aila, Jr. has demonstrated that time and time again, and I think we all pray for his success in this department because it is so important and it touches our lives in so many ways. So therefore, I’m very happy to support his nomination. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Hee). Noes, none. Excused, 2 (English, Kim).

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz introduced Chair Aila, who was accompanied by his father Mr. William Aila, Sr., mother Carol Aila, stepmother Ruby Aila, wife Melva Aila, children Kekoa and Kainoa, and sisters Abigail Aila-Ainoa and Jeanette Maneafaiga.

At 12:37 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:50 p.m.

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, H.D. 2:

Senator Tokuda moved that S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Tokuda rose in strong support of the measure and said:

“After much thought and much deliberation, our bills are put in place: the appointment process for the Board of Education is before us for final consideration. As you are all well aware, in November, the people spoke and we have listened. Balancing the need to expedite the passage of this bill was the responsibility we have to get this right and to create a meaningful process that ensures both accountability and transparency. Our education committees have been working hard on this measure. While changes have been made since we last voted on this, I believe the structure and philosophical basis put forward by the Senate remains largely unchanged.

“Merging the perspectives of both legislative bodies, S.B. No. 8 creates a process that will give the people the kind of accountability they asked for, while ensuring that certain

minimum qualifications and desirable qualities will be embodied in all future members of the Board of Education. Vastly different from the current structure of the board or any previous piece of legislation, the Governor would select the chairperson from among the three statewide at-large members and will have the ability through these positions to grant additional representation from our neighbor island counties. One significant change that was made was in regards to the voting status of the student member. I want to thank all of you for standing by your committee in our efforts to send a strong message to our students and the thousands who came before them that we do see you, we do hear you, and, yes, you count.

“While I would have preferred to have it go through this measure, I want to commend and also thank the House for continuing the fight for voting rights by inserting the provisions into H.B. No. 338. We look forward to receiving it in committee, and perhaps after 30 years, this will be the legislature that makes the difference. Through the life of this bill and the subsequent campaign that led to the constitutional amendment, we’ve talked about accountability, we’ve talked about furloughs, and we’ve raced to the top discussing instructional minutes, hours, and days. In the end, the challenge to all of us is clear: we must do better. Our children deserve better. And heeding the words of our Senate president, I am confident that by working together, there will be better days ahead. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 8, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

And number three, the private sector employees, many of whom not only have not had salary increases or benefit increases, but they’ve lost benefits and they’ve lost their jobs. So, I think it’s unfair of us to consider public employee salary increases at this time. Thank you.”

Friday, March 4, 2011

The Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

When she started as a social worker, her father told her, 'Jodie, I know you will make a good social worker. Just remember the inmates are people who made mistakes and that their sentences are their punishment.' 'Most of the inmates will be returning to the community,' he said, 'and it is up to the staff to make their lives better so that they will become productive citizens who participate positively when they are released.'

"Five days after Jodie started as a social worker at Halawa, her father passed away. Miss Maesaka-Hirata earned her Bachelor of Science in Social Work at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and her Master of Science in Criminal Justice Administration from Chaminade University. She was a social worker with our state's prison system in 1989 to 1994, became a supervisor from 1994 to 2007, and was promoted to be the warden of Waiawa Correctional Facility in 2008. She shared with the committee her many goals for improving the corrections system, and your committee was satisfied with her credentials and her experience for this position. In the new administration and the new day, she will be tasked with many important jobs, including overseeing the return of at least 1,000 to 2,000 inmates from the mainland, improving the sheriff's division, and, of course, building and developing a corrections system for the next 50 years for our state.

"Your committee recommends that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Jodie Maesaka-Hirata for the position of the Director of Public Safety."

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I think that our nominee has been breaking the glass ceiling all of her life in her work in corrections, and this is another instance; and I commend the Governor for making this fine appointment because another glass ceiling will be shattered. Thank you."

His widespread background gives him the foundation to oversee the Department of Accounting and General Services. Mr. Coppa has a Bachelor of Science in Business Management and a Master’s degree in Business Administration and Global Management.

“Your Committee on Public Safety, Government Operations, and Military Affairs has reviewed and approved Mr. Coppa’s qualifications for the position. PGM members recommend that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Bruce Coppa as the Comptroller of the Department of Accounting and General Services.”

It is the eighth largest Air National Guard unit in the country with a total authorized strength of 2,515 personnel. It has one of the largest and most diversified wings with three operational flying squadrons, the Hawai‘i Regional Operations Control Center, and many units including the Combat Communication Group, Air Traffic Control Squadron, Eagle Vision, Air Operations Group, Signal Intelligence Squadron, and Weather Flight. Major General Wong created the 201st Signal Intelligence Squadron which provides linguists in Asian-Pacific languages for assignment in intelligence and ISR missions.

“He was a senior military officer in two separate China engagement programs and played a significant role in initiating exchanges for Chinese disaster management to improve international relationships through sharing ideas and enhanced emergency response and reduce trauma impact. He created the Eagle Vision Unit, one of only six in the nation, to provide commercial satellite imagery in war fighting and use in natural disaster response. The 109th Air Operation Group he created assists with Air Force fighting capability for contingencies in the Pacific and natural disaster response in the state. Your committee has reviewed and approved his qualifications for the position, and we feel that he will be the leader we need to help expand our Youth Challenge Academy, to work with the countries and the members associated with APEC, and most importantly, to train and make certain that our troops are prepared for any encounter before them.

“Your PGM members recommend that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Major General Darryll D. M. Wong as the Adjutant General for the State Department of Defense.”

Senator Kahele rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Having served in the United States Marine Corps, I, too, understand the rigors required of military service to our country. So first of all, you have a problem with the time. Secondly, I question why the Department of Corrections or anybody else would have to report to the Legislature. First of all, we’re not in session from May to December; and secondly, after they report to the Legislature, I have no idea what the Legislature is going to do. So, I think it’s unnecessary. Thank you.”

Senator Espero rose in support of the measure and said:

“I’d like to just address some concerns that were just stated by the Senator from east O’ahu. Basically, the reporting does not have to tell us the name of the individual, but what’s most important is that the legislative branch know that there has been a death within our corrections system as the individuals are within our care. So that is the intent of this bill. There have been times where people have asked me, ‘Did you know about this suicide? Did you know about this death?’ and I did not know about it. And if it is not told to us, there is a possibility we would never know unless we just heard it through third parties. So, that is the intent of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose on a point of information and said:

“When did the Legislature become responsible for the care of prisoners? And does that not in fact raise liability concerns if

anything happens to the prisoner? Could we individually or collectively be liable for that?”

The Chair then asked if Senator Espero would like to yield to the question.

And even though this bill’s been pared back to have a specified reduction and limitation on solar energy within agricultural property, I think that we’re all aware of what’s happening to agricultural prices and the incursion on agricultural lands. And I think that we have plenty of other opportunities for alternative energy which we can and should pursue, but I think that if we really are going to be talking about our sustainable products and the importance of agricultural lands, we should leave agricultural lands for agriculture. Thank you.”

“Again, I’m all for alternative energy, but if we can make the case for alternative energy and the savings and the cost and so forth, it should be voluntary and we should not have to force people to do it, or even force new single family construction to include design elements, because it is a very costly item and particularly now people are having a difficult time in meeting their cost of living. So, I think that this should be optional rather than mandatory. Thank you.”

Senator Gabbard rose in support of the measure and said:

“Colleagues, this measure would require developers to incorporate design elements and minimum equipment installation to make all new single-family homes photovoltaic ready by 2014. Ensuring homes are ready for PV on the front end will only add \$100 to \$500 to the cost of constructing a new home, and this is compared to the thousands of dollars it costs to retrofit a home with PV. As we are once again faced with skyrocketing oil prices, I know all of us have many constituents who would like to be paying less for their electricity costs through PV. So, please join me in supporting S.B. No. 181. Mahalo.”

At a time when private employees have been laid off—lost their jobs, lost their salary, lost their benefits—I think it is inappropriate for us to be talking about raising salaries of public employees. We still have a budget to balance. We still have tax and fiscal issues to deal with. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 532 was adopted and S.B. No. 1081, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR SALARY INCREASES FOR PUBLIC EMPLOYEES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“This is one of several bills we will be voting on today—we voted on one already—that actually seeks to have the state implement the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, also known as ‘Obamacare’. What we’ve seen so far is that several major parts of that law have been thrown out in court, although it’s still on appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. We’ve also seen that the Congressional Budget Office has ruled that the numbers and figures and data used in that act are incorrect. We have congressional hearings that are starting today in Washington, and before Hawai‘i jumps on the bandwagon of this act, which I believe is going to be ruled unconstitutional, I think that we should spend more time on improving our own health care in the state. So, I’ll be voting ‘no.’ Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

“Mr. President, colleagues, unlike the information just provided to us by the minority leader, even though there have been some challenges to the Affordable Care Act, the judge who made the most prominent ruling has basically told the states that you need to go ahead and implement. But even if that were not the case, this measure before us actually helps to advance health care in our state and could be the vehicle for giving us an additional amount of diversity in terms of our health care choices. This measure will set up the framework for the Hawai‘i Health Connector. It would be an internet portal whereby all of the qualified plans, either under the Federal Affordable Care Act or under the Hawai‘i Prepaid Health Act would be posted allowing people to have access to information about those plans. They could compare rates. They could compare the elements in the plans. And it would also be a way that we can ultimately integrate our QUEST and Medicaid programs so that those individuals have choice as well. Our Insurance Commissioner has taken the lead in pulling down some federal money to assist us in developing this. A task force has been convened of stakeholders and is meeting regularly.

“But it was your committees’—both the Committee on Health and the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection—position that it’s the Legislature that sets the policy and it’s the Legislature that needed to set the framework for Hawai‘i’s insurance exchange. It is, and will continue to be, a work in progress as we want to engage all of the stakeholders so that we can have the very best health connector possible for our health consumers and providers in this state. We are patterning it after a very successful one in Massachusetts that came up before the Affordable Care Act was enacted. And I think this measure can survive even if, in fact, there are elements of the Affordable Care Act that do not survive constitutional muster.

“I’m not as pessimistic as the minority leader. I believe that this is a great step forward. It frames the question for us in terms of looking at how we can create a little bit more of an informed, transparent marketplace for providing health insurance to our consumers. I urge all of my colleagues to join me in voting in favor of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose and said:

“Lest my colleagues think I’m a pessimistic guy, I’m an optimistic guy; and I’m optimistic that this law will be thrown out. Thank you.”

They said that they could not do it. They do not have the fiscal or financial or fiduciary background to do this. So, I think when we pass laws and we require agencies or individuals to perform and they tell us right up front that they are incapable or inexperienced in doing it, we should listen to them. Thank you.”

Senator Chun Oakland rose in support the measure and said:

“Just to respond to the previous speaker: In the amendments of the bill we addressed the Department of Human Services’ concerns. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Boy, did we have a lot of testimony, a lot of comments, about frozen bread. You'd think they were talking about dough. The main concerns were the additional regulation and the fact that we use frozen bakery products. It would hurt all small businesses, local businesses, other businesses. The only concession that was made in the bill: the original bill specified that labeling had to be 24-point font size, and the amendment is now that it's only 20-point font size. You know, we spend so much time in this chamber and in this building micromanaging what other people do, and yet we don't help create new businesses or improve our environment and our economy in any way; and this bill would not do that, either. So, I'm voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

"You know, one of the things that we try to do is provide transparency whether it's in government or in the marketplace, and a lot of consumers are not aware that much of the bread that we consume has been previously frozen. And a lot of us take that previously-frozen bread as fresh and then we refreeze it and sometimes the quality diminishes. So this basically will, for one of the more consumable kinds of breads (sliced sandwich bread) provide information about the product's previously frozen status. We tried to limit it so that the smaller bakeries are not unduly impacted since freezing their products is the only way they can get their products to the neighbor islands or elsewhere. We do not want to impact jobs. But more importantly, we prohibited the use of advertising a product—a bread product—as fresh if it has ever been frozen. And this will give the consumer some additional information. They're perfectly free to continue to make their decisions to purchase bread products based on price, but it will provide consumers with the information on the items that are locally baked and made in Hawai'i so that Hawai'i sliced bread products that are a 100 percent fresh get a marketing advantage. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Green requested his vote be cast "aye, with reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

Thank you."

board and improve our election process in Hawai'i. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"I am always faced with a quandary every year. I certainly would like to see our state law in conformity with the Internal Revenue Code, but every year it seems that there are certain sections, usually beneficial to the taxpayer from the federal standpoint, that are not adopted at the state point; and notably and consistently over the years, the amount given to personal exemptions in Hawai'i is approximately one-third of that for the federal deduction. I know it is a revenue question and a revenue decision, but it certainly is not one of fairness or equality. So, I'll vote 'no'. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1316, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

CONFORMITY OF THE HAWAII INCOME TAX LAW TO THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"You know, we're taking more of our pharmaceuticals, making them into dangerous drugs or prohibited drugs, where people used to be able to buy them over-the-counter; now they either have to go behind-the-counter, or in this case get a doctor's prescription for a common product such as Sudafed. The intent is to guard against terrorists and people making explosives and terrorist devices out of regular products. Well, we could actually ban just about everything or make it harder and most costly to get because just about every consumable product has the chemical compounds necessary to do this. However, 99 percent of the people, in fact, do not do this and rely on this for choice and for cost. I think this is a bad move. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

"Unfortunately, pseudoephedrine is one of the few legal drugs that has very bad outcomes if it is misused. It can be easily broken down into the components which drug dealers and drug manufacturers can turn into crystal meth. The pharmaceutical companies have responded by substituting a different compound of pseudoephedrine so that it's just the ephedrine. These ephedrine products can be readily available, and while the effects of ephedrine on symptoms may not last as long as a pseudoephedrine product you might take to abate your symptoms, ephedrine products are still very effective.

"But unfortunately, we've found in this state that meth labs are on the rise again and there are a new group of folks called 'smurfs,' who go from drugstore to drugstore to drugstore to try to get enough pseudoephedrine product because several years ago we had limited the amount of pseudoephedrine product that could be purchased at one time, even behind-the-counter, but unfortunately they're finding a way around our laws. So, a number of states are looking at ways to interrupt the supply of pseudoephedrine that makes its way into these illegal drug labs, and this is one method. Since this measure was heard, we have been made aware of a company that has been offering a service at the company's charge to various states so that you have real time tracking of these drugs and their purchases even with a prescription, so they won't be able to prescription shop and they won't be able to go from pharmacy to pharmacy and just purchase. I think this is something that we need to continue to explore and work with and make sure that we have as safe an environment in our state as possible, and allow people who actually need this particular form of an antihistamine to still have access to it. So, I ask my colleagues to move this measure forward. Thank you, Mr. President."

On motion by Senator Hee, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 574 was adopted and S.B. No. 171, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREWORKS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 576 (S.B. No. 643, S.D. 2):

"You know, when we hear 'excessive speeding' people think about the people that are speeding at 70, 80, 90 miles an hour or more. We're talking about 15 miles above the posted speed limit. This could be as low as, I think, 30 miles per hour. I think that the two egregious factors in this bill: One is, as the public defender testified, this particular law has added 1,000 or more cases to the public defender workload, the excessive speeding law. Secondly, this version goes a step further: It says if there are two prior convictions, then there is forfeiture of the vehicle, and I don't think that's warranted. Thank you."

I believe it too will be ruled unconstitutional. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose in rebuttal and said:

“In terms of S.B. No. 808, this actually does not create the senior deputy position. I think the minority leader is thinking of another measure coming up a little later on in the Order of the Day. This bill actually does not cost any additional funds. It simply allows the Board of Education to have the ability to pay complex area superintendents, deputy superintendents, and assistant superintendents up to the salary amount of the superintendent. It removes the 80 percent cap and allows them to be more flexible in terms of offering highly qualified individuals these positions. Right now, we do have complex area superintendents, deputy superintendents, and assistant superintendents that are making far less than active principals. This measure was a means of giving the Board of Education more tools to actively recruit highly qualified individuals for these positions. I just wanted to clarify that. Thank you.”

Slom rose in response and said:

“I thank the Education Committee Chair. I do stand corrected; it actually is S.B. No. 605 that adds the two supervisory positions. However, I will stand by my statement about too much bureaucracy and too many salaries in the DOE and I’ll still vote ‘no’. Thank you.”

However, I don’t understand why we need to design and build another museum when we have right across the way from our building the State Art Museum, which could be able to house this, or also the Bishop Museum. In other words, I support the intent, we need the museum, but we don’t need to build yet another facility, maintain it, take care of it, have staffing, and all of that. Thank you.”

“What this bill seeks to do is manipulate the amounts of money that are coming into different funds. It also creates a special fund—they call it a ‘special account’ but it’s a special fund—as part of the general fund. But I would ask my colleagues how many of my colleagues actually remember when this bill was passed, what the bill was for? It was environmental response. It was a tax to take care of an emergency oil spill. And now we’re using it for all kinds of things other than that; so I’ll vote ‘no’. Thank you.”

Senator Gabbard rose in support of the measure and said:

“Colleagues, the Energy Office of DBEDT urgently needs the additional funding from this bill. It would provide from the barrel tax to the energy security special fund. Currently, much of their staff is funded by federal money that will expire in April of 2012, and without this bill DBEDT would have to lay off much of its staff dealing with renewable energy. This would be a huge setback to our efforts to achieve energy independence. So, I ask that you join me in support of this bill. Mahalo.”

This exceeds that amount of money. I think in the end the Internal Revenue Code and the IRS will win. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"I rise in strong support of SB 652, SD2. The rate of mortgage foreclosures in Hawai'i continues to rise and poses a significant threat for homeownership in our state. Last year the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force, authorized by this legislature and comprised of representatives from borrowers, lenders, advocates and other stakeholders, convened to work on many of the issues faced by those who are in the foreclosure process or who are trying desperately to forestall a foreclosure.

"SB652 implements the recommendations of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force to improve public notice and transparency in the process as well as allow borrowers to convert from a non-judicial to a judicial foreclosure thus providing order and oversight of the process. The Task Force also recommended that if a homeowner determined that non-judicial foreclosure was their best option, then those homeowners should be spared the threat of a deficiency judgment in those cases.

"This measure was the product of much debate, discussion and compromise. It is part of our comprehensive attempt to reform our mortgage foreclosure statutes, improve consumer protection and assist homeowners who are desperately seeking fairness in the process and relief from unscrupulous practices, mainly at the hands of off-shore lending institutions and mortgage loan servicers.

"I urge all my colleagues to vote in support of this measure."

And we also know that the people that have pushed these plastic bag bans are by and large the same individuals and organizations that several years ago got us to ban paper; and at that time they wanted to ban paper and they went into plastic bags. Now they want to ban plastic bags. This is not consumer friendly and it's not free choice. Thank you."

Some would say that even if we did nothing, it would still cost us over \$30 million a year. Many people would say that would be a bargain if we paid the \$30 million and the Legislature did nothing. Thank you."

“Again, we’re taxing anything new in the state, and we’re creating a special fund.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 631 was adopted and S.B. No. 258, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 632 (S.B. No. 155, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 632 be adopted and S.B. No. 155, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“DCCA had testified against this. It is a bill that required action by the Legislative Auditor, and the athletic trainers themselves had testified in opposition.”

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

“I’m not sure which committee hearing the good Senator from Hawai’i Kai was speaking about, but this measure did go through a sunrise review. We passed the sunrise request last year. The Auditor reported back. DCCA, as I recall, was saying that they still had some issues, but we have cleared all of that up. And the athletic trainers are in strong support of this bill, as well as the PTs and the OTs. So, this is really about trying to make sure that employers who hire athletic trainers know that the individual athletic trainer is certified, national standards are met, and consumer protections are in place. We are one of, I think, two or three states that do not have any registration or certification laws in effect for the profession of athletic training. When we do not have regulation, we don’t have certification; that simply means that unscrupulous practitioners can come into our state, and there’s really no way to check them out. This is a registration measure. This bill is good for our institutions and companies who employ athletic trainers. It’s been requested by the Hawaii Athletic Trainers’ Association and it works for other professionals who practice in related fields, and it’s a measure that deserves to be adopted. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose on a point of inquiry and said:

“The Legislative Auditor’s report: Did that conclude that registration was or was not necessary? Thank you.”

Senator Baker responded:

“The State Auditor did not think registration was necessary, but quite frankly, the Auditor has never found a profession or an industry that needed regulation. And I’m of the opinion that maybe we should stop referring things to the Auditor because if there haven’t been consumer complaints, she doesn’t recommend any form of regulation. But until there is a licensing and registration system in DCCA, there’s no place in this state to receive consumer complaints, and they certainly wouldn’t go to the Auditor. So, we’ve developed a cycle here where we know that professions need regulations for consumer protection but we must involve the Auditor to affirm this. It defers legislative judgment and perhaps keeps the Auditor from other critical work. Over the years we’ve disagreed with the Auditor on the analysis or rationale for registration and have moved a regulatory framework forward. This is another such instance. However, we did what was required. We have the sunrise study, and it’s time to move forward. Thank you.”

We’re not talking about just a couple dollars or a small percentage point when people look at how much they’re spending now to register their motor vehicle. The county fees, the state fees, federal fees, and so forth—it is quite substantial. The reasoning for increasing the fees is that the state highway fund has been depleted and is dangerously low. There’s no doubt about that; I don’t disagree with that. The problem is the reason it’s low is because this legislature raided funds from the state highway fund. In addition to that, there’s no guarantee that additional fees will be used for the purposes of road building, road construction, road reform, and there is no guarantee that the fund will not be raided yet again once it gets high enough. Thank you.”

During the 2009-10 school year, we paid over \$1 million to subsidize the education of 73 local students attending WICHE schools on the mainland. The fields of study for these students are in high need areas for our state such as dentistry, occupational therapy, and veterinary medicine. Other states have imposed return to work requirements on their students and have found that significantly more students do return to their state to work in these very hard to fill positions. So, I would ask your support in continuing to move this measure forward. Thank you."

So, that's one reason it's a good bill. The second reason is you get one-for-one federal matching on all primary care health dollars spent. The third reason it's a good bill is because the good Chair of Education came up with an idea to structure the funds so that it could take private donations, and we do have some rich folk from Kona and other places that would give us some money towards this fund so that we'll be able to draw down match from the feds. So going forward, because it's difficult to pass medical malpractice reform both philosophically and practically, and also it's difficult to get increased reimbursements from the health insurance industry because things are tight in all areas, doing loan repayments is a successful way to get more physicians, primary care and actually specialty providers, into harder to reach places. So, it's going to be a good idea to do this sooner or later. Thank you, Mr. President."

“This bill would allow psychologists the ability to prescribe medication which would be a boon to the rural communities in my district who do not have the same access to qualified providers that urban communities have. A lack of psychiatrists in rural communities severely limits the ability for members in rural communities to have access to medication that is often taken for granted by those in urban settings. I believe this bill can be a step towards providing greater equality in regards to access to medication.”

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, colleagues, there is an immense need for mental health care in many parts of our state. This gap in access to mental health services can be safely filled by granting prescriptive authority to properly trained psychologists. That’s the purpose of SB 597, SD2.

“It is not a new concept. Since 1974, appropriately trained clinical psychologists have been practicing in certain settings and that practice has been shown to be safe and effective. Psychologists with appropriate credentials have been allowed to prescribe medications to active duty military personnel and their families in federal facilities and the federal Indian Health Service program for years. In recent years, Louisiana and New Mexico adopted legislation authorizing prescriptive authority for appropriately trained psychologists without regard to the service setting.

“Since 2000, twenty psychologists, all born and raised in Hawai‘i, have received psychopharmacological training through the Tripler Army Medical Center psychology training program. These psychologists have actively collaborated with primary care physicians to provide combined therapy and psychopharmacological care to a medically underserved patient population at 11 federally qualified health centers, Bay Clinic, Hāna, Moloka‘i, Kaua‘i, Wai‘anae, Kalihi-Palama, Waimānalo, Ko‘olaupua, West Hawai‘i, Kokua Kalihi Valley, and Waikīkī, as well as a Native Hawaiian health care system clinic located in a federally designated medically underserved area on Moloka‘i.

“Each time the legislature has considered granting limited prescriptive authority, there has been opposition. And each time other types of health care providers such as advanced practice registered nurses, physician assistants, and optometrists were given prescriptive authority, it has shown that limited prescriptive authority to non-physician practitioners is administratively manageable and is an effective means of expanding access to important health care services. The dire predicted consequences for these professionals when given appropriate prescriptive authority never materialized.

“The psychologists who would be affected by this bill must go through a thoroughly vetted training program to prescribe the drugs that are included in a limited formulary. The training is part of a Post Doctoral Master’s degree of which the curriculum is consistent with the American Psychological Association training curriculum in psychopharmacology for prescription privileges. This program is already in place at UH Hilo School of Pharmacy and Argosy University. The programs are extensive and clinically based.

“The pilot program as outlined in the bill has supervision and oversight. The sites are in areas where there is the greatest need for these services. The pilot program will provide the opportunity for us to learn the efficacy of the program by

requesting feedback from the all the stakeholders. With this knowledge, we can continue to move forward in providing better access to mental health care services.

“Many of our constituents need the mental health care that psychologists provide. This measure will ensure that appropriately trained psychologists can more fully address the health care needs of their patients especially in the most underserved areas of our state. I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure and expand access to mental health services in a reasoned and efficacious way. Mahalo.”

While I support the intent of the bill, OHA was asking for an additional \$50,000 to \$100,000 to create another program to do this when in fact OHA already has a cultural liaison officer. They have several positions. This is what they're supposed to do. In addition, there are culturally sensitive Native Hawaiian training programs existing already at the University of Hawai'i and other agencies. This would be duplicative, it would be expensive, and would be just more money for OHA. Thank you."

I think it does a disservice to those film and television productions that have been operating with existing tax credit and other laws, and I'm not sure that we can even afford this. I think, however, that originally we talked about tax credits for technology and spurring new industries and new developments. So I think for all of these reasons, this is not a good bill at this time. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga rose in support of the measure and said:

"In reference to the prior speaker's remarks, I want to indicate that the proposal that came before the Economic Development Committee and the Senate Ways and Means Committee had a number of areas that were problematic. The good news is that with the combination of the infrastructure, production, and workforce development proposals, the Departments of Economic Development, Taxation and University of Hawai'i's ACM representatives are working very closely with the proponents of this measure to come up with something that would be practical and positive for the State of Hawai'i. They also build on some of the assets that the State of Hawai'i has developed in its creative media endeavors. For

those reasons, I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this measure."

I also am very concerned that there's no overall plan for how the facility will be self-sustaining in regards to operational costs. There is also some concern that renovations for a packaging plant will be required. No plans have been presented to address this matter. So, I would like to state that I am supporting with strong reservations. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose in support of the measure and said:

"While I respect the comments of the minority leader, a \$60 fee assessed for relicensing our doctors every two years is a small amount to pay for the kind of data collection, analysis, and also recruitment and retention efforts that we can employ, especially for our rural and medically underserved areas of our state. While it may seem like a financial burden, it can go a long way towards such important programs as loan repayment programs for doctors that choose to serve us in some of the areas that currently have no access to physicians or other health care specialty areas. I would encourage us to continue to move this bill forward."

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

"If the \$60 fee was all that the doctors and physicians had to pay in Hawai'i, that would be one thing. But as a matter of fact, we continue to give them additional fees, taxes, the burden of medical tort reform, and medical insurance and all of that, and that's why the doctors are leaving. Thank you."

Senator Green rose in support of the measure and said:

"I just wanted to echo the comments of the Education Chair and also comment that though yes, the bill was controversial in its first incarnation when we passed the fee, the data that we've got now does enable health care providers to go to those areas where they can be more valued. Also, it increases our economic capacity because as opposed to be clustered in places where we have duplicate care, a lot of the times health insurers don't end up reimbursing any moneys because there's no provider to pay to give those services. So, this has been pretty helpful to the physician community, to actually know where they're needed most, and therefore actually ends up being kind of a positive economic driver for physician practices. Thank you, Mr. President."

And I think that, again, as we get farther and farther away from the original scope and purpose of these funds, we do damage not only to those individuals and organizations that counted on them, but also we find that, as in this bill here, we continue simply to put more money into the general fund. Thank you."

We saw what happened when the bill looked like it was going to pass and Amazon withdrew its services to Hawai'i and other people did that as well. It is anti-business, it is anti-consumer, it is a bad bill, and it should be defeated. Thank you."

Senator Fukunaga rose in rebuttal and said:

"I have a couple of corrections that I'd like to offer to the members in response to the last speaker's comments. First, this is not a new tax. This tax has been on the books under Hawai'i Revised Statutes, Section 238-2, since the 1960s. Second,

businesses including the Hawai'i Association of Realtors and the Retail Merchants of Hawai'i have long supported this measure as a matter of fairness to really level the playing field, so that those who are selling goods to residents in Hawai'i from out of state pay their fair share of the tax burden currently not being paid. For those reasons, I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this measure. Thank you."

Senator Chun Oakland rose in support of the measure and said:

"I would like to echo the comments of the previous speaker. The law was created in 1969, and for any one of us that purchases anything outside of the state, we are supposed to be paying this tax. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

“Actually, the previous speaker is incorrect. Naturopathic physicians are not included in most health plans; and what this does is rather than make a blanket inclusion, which would be a mandate that the previous speaker dislikes so much, this actually says that if you are a plan that already offers a complementary and alternative medicine (CAM) rider that you must include the services of naturopathic physicians. Most of those CAM riders do not cover naturopathic physician services. And yet we find that naturopaths are definitely included in worker’s comp and under the auto plans, but not in many of the plans offered under our Prepaid Health Care Act. Naturopathic services provide another option. This bill has limited it so that their services are included in any CAM riders offered but those riders are paid for by the individual, so it’s not a burden on employers. In checking with some of the plans, it actually adds very, very little to the overall cost; and some of our folks want to use the services provided by naturopaths.

“The other thing that this measure does is if you’re going to be included in the complementary and alternative medicine rider, it says at least pay them an appropriate fee; and we’re using the worker’s comp fee schedule because that’s already been established, and it seems to be working well and not adding a lot of additional costs. So, this measure, I believe, is fair to the naturopaths and their clients, and I encourage my colleagues to vote in favor of it. Thank you.”

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 756 (S.B. No. 99, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 756 be adopted and S.B. No. 99, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“The purpose of this bill is to update the statutory framework for the Public Utilities Commission to better address an increasingly complex regulated industries landscape. It is a regulatory landscape that demands specialized knowledge and expertise on the part of the regulators and improved structure and processes of the Commission. The bill restructures the Commission to improve its efficiency and address several deficiencies noted in previous reviews by the State Auditor. The bill also increases the number of commissioners from three to five to ensure greater representation of regulatory issues faced by neighbor island communities such as balanced regulation of water carriers and alternative energy generation and allowing for the acquisition of additional expertise on the Commission. The measure requests that the Governor consider geographic and professional diversity in the composition of the PUC when making appointments.

“The bill also contemplates a new deliberative structure for the PUC—a two panel structure similar to the structure utilized by the Intermediate Court of Appeals. Each panel will be composed of two commissioners and the chair and will have distinct jurisdiction. One panel will focus primarily on energy matters while the other panel will focus on transportation and telecom. Further, the measure clarifies findings of public necessity and the issuance of certificates relating to water carriers.

“Colleagues, this is an important measure to ensure the appropriate functioning of the PUC to address 21st century energy, telecom and inter-island water transportation matters. The Commissioners must fairly represent the interests of the entire State and hold the highest possible levels of experience and expertise. Finally, the Commission’s staff must be highly qualified and the processes of the Commission must be transparent and responsive to the needs of the people of Hawai‘i. SB99 helps move the PUC in a positive direction and I urge all my colleagues to join me in bringing a ‘New Day’ to this important regulatory agency. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 756 was adopted and S.B. No. 99, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757 (S.B. No. 1274, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757 be adopted and S.B. No. 1274, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Green rose in support of the measure with reservations and said:

“I think this is an important bill that’s been moving through the Legislature. We have to come into compliance with some of the federal mandates. I do just want to see us continue to look at the capacity for people to have a little bit of face-to-face time on their external reviews. So, I think we’ll probably get there by the end of session. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757 was adopted and S.B. No. 1274, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 758 (S.B. No. 1384, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 758 was adopted and S.B. No. 1384, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Solomon).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764 (S.B. No. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764 be adopted and S.B. No. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“Again, I attended the hearing, heard the testimony, and I heard divided testimony on this bill. Basically, what it seeks to do is do what the Akaka bill was not able to do for nearly 12 years, and that is to provide recognition, but also specific recognition, and something which has divided our people, not only Native Hawaiian and Native Hawaiians, but also the rest of the population, too, who have not been allowed to vote on this measure. We had no public vote on the Akaka bill; and what this bill does is really deny the public an opportunity to get engaged and to make a decision for us. Thank you.”

Senator Galuteria rose in support of the measure and said:

“Mr. President, members, the purpose and intent of this measure is to firstly, provide for the recognition of Native Hawaiians as the indigenous people of Hawai‘i; and secondly, establish a process, or at least encourage a process, members, for the reorganization of a Native Hawaiian governing entity. Now, while our previous speaker pointed out federal recognition by the congressional legislation is currently stalled, state recognition of the Native Hawaiian people is necessary and achievable. The entity, the reorganization process, is a work-in-progress. As a matter of fact, we’ll be listening to another measure in due time that calls for a separate type of pathway to reorganization. Its manifestation is yet to be

determined, to be advanced through processes like these. So it is, once again, a work-in-progress, and we'll want to request members to support this measure. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Solomon rose in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, just speaking in support of the measure and just speaking in support of the previous speaker's remarks. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764 was adopted and S.B. No. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE RECOGNITION OF THE NATIVE HAWAIIAN PEOPLE, THEIR LANDS, ENTITLEMENTS, HEALTH, EDUCATION, WELFARE, HERITAGE, AND CULTURE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, 3 (Espero, Green, Slom).

At this time, Senator English made a late introduction of Mr. Avery Chumbley, his mentor for many years and a former State Senator.

At 11:25 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

S.B. No. 671, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 671, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 2) to S.B. No. 671, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 671, S.D. 1, is amended by amending the definition of "charitable entity" to read as follows:

"Charitable entity" means an entity that has received recognition of tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code."

Senator Hee moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Members, as I said earlier, S.D. 2 narrows the scope of the nonprofits. There was some miscommunication, I believe, or misinterpretation by the attorneys; and if you look on page 2, line 2 where it says tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3), that is what we believe the Executive Director of the Ethics Commission meant. The original bill also includes, or the original Senate draft also included, 501(c)(4), (c)(5) and (c)(6), which are also charitable organizations. However, in discussing it with our lawyers, we believe that what Mr. Kondo meant was section 501(c)(3) and not beyond that. So accordingly, the amendment is drafted as S.D. 2 for everyone's consideration. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 671, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INFORMATION ACCESS," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 10, 2011.

THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 768 (S.B. No. 218, S.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 768 be adopted and S.B. No. 218, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"We get this bill year after year after year; and for those folks that truly believe in choice, they should allow the choice up to those hospitals with religious convictions that want the option to refuse to do certain things, but they insist that everyone be mandated and one-size-fits-all."

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"This measure will ensure that sex assault victims will have access to the standard of care in any emergency room in Hawai'i, no matter where care is sought. That standard of care includes information about and the option to utilize emergency contraception. Unfortunately the recognized standard of care for victims of sexual assault is not the standard in all of Hawai'i's emergency rooms. Some hospitals offer, some do not, and some staff are not clear on their facility's policy. Unbiased education on and the opportunity to choose emergency contraception is part of a standard of care that ensures that a sex assault victim has access to the best and most appropriate medical care.

"Emergency contraception is safe and effective in preventing an unwanted pregnancy that may result from rape. When it is taken within 120 hours of unprotected sex, it can prevent pregnancy. It is most effective the earlier it is taken with a 99 percent efficacy rate when taken within 12 hours and 82 percent within 72 hours. This time frame coincides with the time that a rape victim would be in an emergency room. EC will not terminate an existing pregnancy. EC prevents ovulation from occurring; it also prevents sperm from entering the uterus and fertilizing the egg.

"EC is widely recognized and accepted as a necessary part of caring for sex assault victims. Even the Roman Catholic Church's US Conference of Bishops recognizes EC as part of the standard of care that should be afforded to rape victims as have emergency room physicians around the country. Fifteen states and the District of Columbia have adopted legislation requiring the provision of information and access to EC for sex assault victims in emergency rooms.

"It is important that traumatized women not be re-victimized through the lack of information or access to appropriate care and treatment. It is time that Hawai'i's laws assist sex assault victims with access to the best available information and care possible.

"Passage of this measure will ensure that women who are the victims of rape in Hawai'i will have access to the standard of care most appropriate for them. I urge my colleagues to join with the members of the women legislators' caucus to pass this compassionate measure."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 771 (S.B. No. 1065, S.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Hee, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 771 was adopted and S.B. No. 1065, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 773 (S.B. No. 1088, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 773 be adopted and S.B. No. 1088, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Interestingly, even the Department of Labor is opposed to this bill. The bill would extend unemployment benefits to certain part-time workers and also to extend benefits to voluntary quits. We've seen what's happened with unemployment, nationally and locally. We've seen what's happened to employers who are the only ones that pay unemployment compensation taxes. Their rates have gone up tremendously—last year, this year, and plan for next year already. We don't do anyone a favor by adding additional costs and benefits because in that way, we make sure that we're not going to have hiring of new employees."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 773 was adopted and S.B. No. 1088, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE BENEFITS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Solomon). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 775 (S.B. No. 281, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 775 be adopted and S.B. No. 281, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Again, as I've said in committees, I support the intent of the bill. I think it's a good bill to use the quarantine facilities for revenue production, but I oppose the creation of another new special fund. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 775 was adopted and S.B. No. 281, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANIMAL INDUSTRY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 776 (S.B. No. 651, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 776 be adopted and S.B. No. 651, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Yet another special fund. I'll be voting 'no.'"

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Over the past year, mortgage foreclosures in Hawai'i have increased rapidly so that this state now holds the unfortunate distinction of having one of the highest foreclosure rates in the nation. While a portion of foreclosures in the state represent second homes, vacation homes, or timeshares, many more affect island families. Residential foreclosures also have an impact beyond the individuals and families who are directly affected. Widespread foreclosures disrupt communities by creating empty properties in neighborhoods and leaving the remaining members of planned community and condominium associations accountable for a disproportionate share of common expenses and responsible for additional maintenance on foreclosed units. Large numbers of foreclosures also impact this state's already overburdened housing market by forcing former homeowners into the rental market where their financial distress can be compounded by Hawai'i's high rental costs.

"In the 2010 regular legislative session, the legislature authorized the creation of a Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force through Act 162. Act 162 directed the Task Force to undertake a study to develop general and specific policies and procedures necessary to improve the manner in which mortgage foreclosures are conducted in the State and to submit reports of its findings to the legislature prior to the 2011 and 2012 regular sessions. The task force has worked diligently at its assignment and has submitted recommendations for legislation. Some of these recommendations, as well as other policies, are contained in SB 651. The Task Force has reported that it plans to submit further recommendations for, among other things, reforming the nonjudicial foreclosure process and the impacts on condominiums, planned communities and cooperatives its final report before the legislature convenes in 2012.

"SB 651 addresses the state's foreclosure crisis by providing a means for some homeowners to avoid foreclosure and for many more to mitigate the damage of foreclosure when it is not avoidable. Federal programs exist to assist distressed homeowners, but these programs have proven inadequate to meet real-world needs. Homeowners still report bad-faith behavior by lenders and a lack of oversight in the foreclosure process, especially in nonjudicial power of sale foreclosures. SB 651 provides opportunities for meaningful negotiation between homeowners and lenders as well as oversight mechanisms through its three major components: dispute resolution, conversion of nonjudicial power of sale foreclosures to judicial actions, and a moratorium on new nonjudicial foreclosures under section 667-5, HRS.

"SB 651 creates the mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program to be administered by the DCCA. Based on a successful program initiated in Nevada and tailored to Hawai'i's unique needs through input from lenders, advocates for homeowners, the Judiciary, and DCCA, this program makes a facilitated dispute resolution process and an accompanying stay of the foreclosure available upon request to all owner-occupant homeowners who have received a foreclosure notice. At the election of an owner-occupant, a foreclosing mortgagee will be required to participate in dispute resolution for the purpose of avoiding foreclosure if possible or coming to a negotiated agreement if foreclosure is inevitable. This program recognizes that foreclosure is not always avoidable but that it is almost always possible for the parties to reach an agreement that reduces long-term damage and preserves a homeowner's

dignity. Oversight of the process is provided by a trained facilitator who will ensure that the foreclosing mortgagee and homeowner comply with all program rules and participate in good faith in the process. Enforcement is provided by the possibility of sanctions against each party, including a bar on completing the foreclosure against the foreclosing mortgagee and a lift of the stay triggered by the dispute resolution program against an owner-occupant. The mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program will be operative no later than October 1 of this year and will sunset three years later on September 30, 2014, in anticipation that the State and national economy will have stabilized by that time and the foreclosure crisis will have abated.

“As another means of introducing third-party oversight into a nonjudicial foreclosure, SB 651 enacts a recommendation by the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force to authorize an owner-occupant homeowner to file a petition with the Circuit Court to convert a nonjudicial power of sale foreclosure into a judicial action. The vast majority of nonjudicial foreclosures in this State are conducted pursuant to section 667-5, HRS, under a process that includes minimal notice and oversight. Conversion to a judicial action subjects these foreclosures to the oversight inherent in any judicial process. The conversion authorization contained in SB 651 will be effective upon approval of this measure and will sunset on December 31, 2012. SB 651 envisions a dual function for conversion. First, it will serve as a bridge measure that will provide immediate relief to owner-occupant homeowners who are currently involved in a pending nonjudicial foreclosure or will be involved in a nonjudicial foreclosure before the mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program becomes operative. Second, it will provide an additional avenue of relief in the nonjudicial foreclosure process in anticipation of more sweeping reforms that may be recommended by the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force. The sunset of conversion authorization ensures that the resources of the Judiciary will have to accommodate a potential increase in its foreclosure case load for only a finite period of time.

“The final major innovation contained in SB 651 is a moratorium on new power of sale foreclosures brought under section 667-5, HRS, to commence upon the effective date of SB 651 and to expire on July 1, 2012. These types of foreclosures have been the source of most of the reported problems with foreclosures in this state and will most likely be the focus of the broad reforms to the foreclosure system that the Task Force is expected to recommend prior to the convening of the next regular legislative session. The purpose of the moratorium is two-fold. It avoids a situation where mortgagees rush to beat the clock and foreclose prematurely in cases where they may have otherwise been willing to come to an agreement with a distressed homeowner in order to avoid the new requirements created by SB 651. It also allows the Task Force to develop recommendations for broad reforms without risk of disrupting on-going actions in an operative system.

“The moratorium imposed by SB 651 allows for the continuation of nonjudicial foreclosures under section 667-5 that were commenced before the effective date of SB 651, subject to an owner-occupant’s right to pursue conversion to judicial foreclosure or dispute resolution, upon that program becoming operative. The moratorium on section 667-5 nonjudicial foreclosures will particularly affect condominium and planned community associations that use that process to foreclose on liens for past-due fees for common expenses payable to the association. The intention of the moratorium is not to burden associations when they take action to protect the interests of the majority of their members who have not defaulted on fees by collecting past-due amounts. Any actions under 667-5 that have already begun before SB 651 takes effect may continue.

“Further, nonjudicial lien foreclosures by an association are exempt from the dispute resolution and conversion requirements applicable to nonjudicial mortgage foreclosures, leaving nonjudicial foreclosure under part II of chapter 667, HRS, or judicial foreclosure free of those requirements. Finally, to account for the increased time and expense of meeting the requirements of the available foreclosure processes, the cap on the amount of past-due fees that an association may collect has been doubled.

“SB 651 also contains additional reforms to the mortgage foreclosure system such as requirements for the location of public sale of property following a power of sale foreclosure and strengthened regulations on mortgage loan servicers to provide additional consumer protections. These improvements to specific portions of the foreclosure system will continue to be applicable regardless of larger systemic changes that may be suggested by the Task Force. While SB 651 is not able to address every aspect of the mortgage foreclosure system that is in need of reform, it provides immediate and long-term relief to local homeowners in a manner that is fair to mortgage lenders, state regulators, and the Judiciary.

“I strongly urge all of my colleagues to support SB 651.”

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 778 was adopted and S.B. No. 1385, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Gabbard, Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 779 (S.B. No. 1363, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 779 be adopted and S.B. No. 1363, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Gabbard rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Gabbard’s remarks read as follows:

“Colleagues, when the question is posed to us: Paper or Plastic? The answer should be ‘Neither. I brought my own.’ People in Hawai’i use 400 million plastic bags and 20 million paper bags every year. That is almost one bag for every man, woman, and child every day. People in my district have been complaining for years about plastic bags blowing into their yards from the Waimanalo Gulch Landfill. And that is one of the problems about plastic bags. When these plastic bags blow into our streams, lakes, and ocean, they pose a hazard to marine life. Marine turtles often mistake plastic bags for jellyfish, their natural food. But plastic is indigestible, so their stomachs fill up with plastic, displacing their capacity to digest food until they starve to death.

“And plastic does not biodegrade. Instead, plastic breaks apart into smaller and smaller pieces that may then be ingested by organisms and work its way up the food chain. Paper is not the answer either. Paper bags are three times costlier than plastic bags and can also pollute our streams and ocean,

although paper bags will biodegrade. Paper bags also require water to manufacture and are several times heavier to transport, entailing a substantial carbon footprint.

“Instead, I believe that the answer is to push the use of reusable bags. SB 1363 SD2 sets out to achieve two goals: First is to change human behavior. We in Hawai‘i have become too accustomed to getting single-use bags to hold our purchases. That is unsustainable for our island state. We hope that this bill would reduce our consumption of single-use, disposable bags by 80 percent. The second goal of this bill is to generate revenue for the state. Although the SD2 blanked the amounts, the original plan was to charge a fee of 25 cents per bag. Assuming an 80 percent reduction in bag consumption, the fees would generate \$15.75 million annually for the state. I would also like to point out that this bill would not pre-empt any county ban or other ordinance regarding disposable paper or plastic bags. Colleagues, please join me in supporting SB 1363 SD2. Mahalo.”

The Senate reconvened at 11:54 a.m.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro recognized and honored the lifetime achievements of Adelaide Keanueneokalaninuiamamao "Frenchy" DeSoto, known as the "Mother of OHA" who was a passionate and inspirational advocate for a number of landmark Native Hawaiian initiatives, including the creation of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Auntie Frenchy was represented by her family including: sons John, Bruce, Ronald, and Manny; daughter Laura; nieces Ginger Fuata and Christine French; nephew Billy Card and his wife Momi; niece Mary Martinez; and friend and kākō'o Puna Mahuiki.

Senator Kim rose to make the following remarks:

"I'd be remiss if I didn't stand up and say a few words.

"Mr. President, I had the opportunity to get to know Auntie Frenchy up close and personal, and when I was elected to the City Council I had the opportunity to serve with her son John. And I knew Auntie Frenchy as John's mom, and she was always there supporting him in everything he did and supporting all of us, and so I send my aloha to the DeSoto family and to you, John and Patty. Aloha."

Senator Hee rose to make the following remarks:

"I remember on TV John DeSoto saying about his mother, 'She's one tough cookie.' Oh, yeah, she was one tough cookie, all right. She was so tough that every time I saw John DeSoto when I was at OHA and he was on the council, he would say to me, 'Thank you for taking care of my mother.' And I would

think aloud that that was his job, not my job. But she was a real tough cookie. But there's another side of her, and that was Cobra. If you knew Cobra, you knew French. In fact, Cobra's the only one I can recall referred to her as French. Cobra was a very kind man—very, very kind—and a very tough guy. His kindness was his toughness, and I think he was the balancing beam for French. French and I had a lot of good times together and we had a lot of tough times together, but they were very honorable times together. She was in-your-face and she was by-your-side; and that quality of elected official, in my opinion, is missing. On Senate Bill No. 1 today and then Senate Bill No. 1250, both dealing with nationhood, she would have been in-your-face and by-your-side. She is one of those young Hawaiians that King Kalākaua spoke about in 1887, of landless, hopeless, victims of greed. She is one of those. She represents me. Her passion for her people, which included Hawaiians, has been well-stated time and again.

"Her love for her children, and in particular her grandchildren, may not be well-known, but I do. I know it firsthand because we spent a lot of time together. Hawai'i has lost two great people in Cobra DeSoto and his wife French, and it is that caliber of elected official that in my view Hawai'i will miss. If only we could be more in-your-face and by-your-side, we would be a better chamber. John DeSoto, to me, is much like both Cobra and French. His niceness is Cobra. There is another side of him: he's in-your-face. It's his mother. But truly, I'm honored that John and Laura, Ronald, and Bruce are here and representing Cobra and representing French. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon rose to make the following remarks:

"I just would like to congratulate the 'ohana. I had the privilege of serving with Auntie Frenchy DeSoto on the first Office of Hawaiian Affairs board, so I don't have to tell you how exciting that was. But the two thoughts that I carry always with me is her two favorite words when she speaks about Hawaiian issues, and that is na'au and 'i'o. And for me, I was really thinking about how deep those words are, and what the Hawaiian people have to do in order to get their issues to the forefront in this State of Hawai'i has been something that has required a lot of na'au and 'i'o. And I'm hoping, you know, with her passing and all of these words and accolades that were actually given to Auntie Frenchy's memory, that this body would really have the courage to step to the plate and resolve many of the Hawaiian issues such as recognition of the Hawaiian nation. I think it's long overdue. I think in Auntie Frenchy's honor and her memory, these are the very thoughts that she was always very strong about. And it's unfortunate that in order to get to our Hawaiian issues to the forefront, we have to get in your face. You know, we have to go that extra mile when, in fact, why should we? When, in fact, the issues and challenges that the Hawaiian people have faced since annexation should be treated with respect. They should be treated with respect and honor. Not to the point where, you know, we're sending out the dogs, the SWAT team, and it goes on and on. And a lot of these movements, I am very proud to have said that I was part of, a lot of these struggles: Kalama Valley, Sand Island, takeover the airport, Pāna 'Ewa, you know when we occupied Kaho'olawe. The list just goes on and on. And I'm hoping that—30 years have passed—that perhaps in this Legislature's wisdom, that we really could look at where we're going and where we want to be in terms of not only just we as people but in terms of doing what's pono and what's right for the Hawaiians. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Chun Oakland rose to make the following remarks:

"I also wanted to add: I'm very happy that we're able to honor Auntie. John DeSoto is like a brother to my father-in-law. We're going to miss your mom, but thank you for all you do to honor her memory and your dad's. Aloha."

Senator Ryan rose to make the following remarks:

“I just wanted to share with the family that I had the privilege of meeting your mama just once, when I was a teenager growing up on Moloka‘i. There was a gathering of Protect Kaho‘olawe ‘Ohana actually at our house in Kawela. But what an impression she made on me: truly a wahine warrior. Congratulations on her recognition today.”

Senator Gabbard rose to make the following remarks:

“Senate President and colleagues, when I first got elected into office in 2002, replacing John DeSoto, City Council District 1, it was my baptism into elected politics to run into Auntie Frenchy at many of my community meetings; and I experienced firsthand what Senator Hee talked about as far as being in-your-face and by-your-side. And she is sorely missed. Thank you.”

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (English, Kouchi, Nishihara, Shimabukuro).

S.B. No. 671, S.D. 2:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 671, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator Slom rose in support of the measure with reservations and said:

"This bill has had a very long and traveled path in the last week or so. When the bill was introduced, it was a strong statement about legislators not receiving gifts and about lobbyists and special interests having more reporting responsibilities. The draft that followed should have been an embarrassment to all legislators. Basically it took away any restraints and any restrictions. Fortunately, the bill was then later amended to the current Senate Draft No. 2 that we have

before us today. It was amended on the floor on Tuesday and certainly is superior to Senate Draft No. 1. It still does not meet all of the requirements or considerations of the original bill. We are going to have to deal with this situation as more and more special interest organizations lobby us for the public's money. And while perception is in the eye of the beholder and people look at gifts in a different way, I think we spend much too much time concerned about gifts for ourselves and certainly protecting certain special interests that are down here at this capitol all the time. So, I will vote 'with reservations' on this bill. Thank you."

Senator Galuteria rose in support of the measure and said:

"The intent of the proposed legislation, Mr. President, in all its maturations, is to provide clear and specific guidelines on gifts that will enable the donor and the recipient to properly conform to the law. It's a work in progress. Clarity in the gift law has been encouraged and is needed, in that a step-by-step approach, a process we're engaged in right now, is appropriate; and I ask that we advance this bill to the House for further review. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose in support of the measure and said:

"Colleagues, let's be clear about this bill. This bill represents the recommendation of the Executive Director of the Ethics Commission. This bill also, at the Committee's recommendation to the Executive Director at a public hearing, is intended to be put before the Ethics Commission meeting on March 16 for the commission's take and recommendation for further action. That is the agreement reached by the Committee on Judiciary with the Executive Director of the Ethics Commission. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Gabbard requested his vote be cast "aye, with reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 671, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ETHICS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21; Ayes with Reservations (Gabbard, Ihara, Slom). Noes, none. Excused, 4 (English, Kouchi, Nishihara, Shimabukuro).

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz introduced a group of fourth-grade students from Hale Kula Elementary who were accompanied by their teachers and chaperones.

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I just would like to pay homage, Mr. President, today to the passing of Hawaiian artist Herb Kāne, who today passed away at the age of 82. Herbert Kawainui Kāne, a Hawaiian artist, historian, and one of the founders of the Polynesian Voyaging Society, who designed and help build the voyaging canoe *Hōkūle'a*, died on Tuesday after a brief illness. The Kona resident was 82. On his website, Herbert Kawainui Kāne said, 'If my work contributes to our comprehension of Hawaii's past, that will ultimately become the greatest reward.' U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka said, 'Herb Kāne helped the world recognize the history and the culture of the Native Hawaiian people through his art. He showed ancient Hawaiians as they were: explorers, seafarers, trail blazers in land and resource management. His beautiful portraits are displayed on stamps, in national parks and in museums, and continue to inspire people around the

world.' U.S. Senator Daniel Inouye said, 'Herb was a humble and gentle man who personified the exploratory and artistic spirit of the Native Hawaiians.' Kāne authored and illustrated the book *Pele, Goddess of Hawaii's Volcanoes* in 1987, and this is when we, our family, had the privilege of working with Herbert Kawainui. Our hula halau, Beamer-Solomon Halau O Po'ohala, who's now under the direction of my sister, our kumu loe'a Hulali Solomon Covington, are celebrating this year the family's 151st anniversary. Herbert Kawainui Kāne allowed us to use these illustrious paintings as the backdrop for the kahiko hulas dedicated to the Pele sisters, Hi'iakaikapoliopele, who's known to the Hawaiian people as the poet, and of course, glorifies their home at Halema'uma'u and the Kilauea Caldera. These presentations were performed in Albuquerque at the National Hispanic Cultural Center and featured here on the Island of Hawai'i, as well as on the Island of O'ahu. They will culminate this year in New York. The school has been invited to perform at Carnegie on June 3. Mr. Kāne believed that it was the hula that kept Pele, the volcano goddesses alive and their feats and their accomplishments kept in the minds and thoughts and hearts of the nā po'e o Hawai'i. I had the honor of presenting Herbert Kawainui Kāne with the Senate certificate in 1984 when he was selected as being a Treasure of Hawai'i. Herb Kawainui Kāne was a family friend, a mentor, and would be truly missed. E ola mau loa. His everlasting light will be perpetuated in honor throughout time through his good works. At the proper time, Mr. President, I would like to request that the Senate adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of Herbert Kawainui Kāne."

Senator Galuteria rose and said:

"Herb Kawainui Kāne: he was indeed a renaissance man, who would have walked with the scholars and historians, sculptors and artists, of any era anywhere in the world. He was not only well-known for his art, but also as the good Senator from Hawai'i island mentioned, instrumental in bringing back traditional Polynesian canoe voyaging. As a matter of fact, ironically, he passed away on the 36th anniversary of the maiden voyage of *Hōkūle'a* for which he served as the first captain. Additionally, he challenged the scholarly world by causing them to contemplate and eventually accept that non-instrumental navigation was and remains the cornerstone of leadership in the legacy of Polynesian canoe voyaging. To this end, he affirmed that the discovery of our homeland of Hawai'i was not a byproduct of drifting aimlessly, but rather a destiny fulfilled through high intelligence and best practices at sea. Herb was interested in helping people understand what a tremendous heritage they descended from. Beyond way-finding, the renaissance itself sparked and confirmed Hawaiians' and Polynesians' excellence in scholarship, the sciences, land management, and engineering, to name a few. Herb Kawainui Kāne's memory and legacy will live on through the work of all who love Hawai'i. Mahalo for this opportunity to share a brief reflection of a great Hawaiian. Mahalo."

Senator Espero rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I rise for two occasions, two reasons. Number one, I'd like to state my solidarity—and I know many individuals in this room as well—with the public workers in Wisconsin. As we all know, there is a legislative battle going on with the public worker unions; and despite our distance, I would like to let them know that we are watching, we are supportive of their efforts, and we are united with their cause. I'd also like to state my solidarity and support for the Muslim-American community in our country as well. Today, Representative Peter King from New York held a congressional hearing on the radicalization of Muslims, and I feel that he has certainly taken the wrong path because this brings back memories of McCarthyism in the 50s and even the way the Japanese-Americans were treated after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. When we talk about radicalization,

we have to look at poverty, lack of education, greed, people's desire for power and control; and to tie in radicalization with an ethnic group or religion is wrong and going down the wrong path. So, Mr. President, our support for these two groups, and I hope that we in Hawai'i will know better than what's going on on the mainland. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose on a point of information and said:

"Mr. President, on a point of information and in response to the previous speaker's remarks: I hope he's going to change his position regarding the state recognition of the Hawaiian nation, because so much of what he said is what the Hawaiians themselves have been through. So, I hope he'll give it some thought. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:59 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 a.m., Friday, March 11, 2011, on a rising vote, observing a moment of silence in memory of Herbert Kawainui Kāne, world-renowned artist, historian, and beloved Hawaiian Treasure.

Senator Baker rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Last night sometime after 8:00 p.m. Hawai‘i time, Japan experienced a devastating 8.9 magnitude earthquake. It wreaked havoc on land, causing widespread property damage, disrupting commerce, and taking lives. It also generated a potential devastating tsunami for Hawai‘i and the Pacific basin including the west coast of the mainland U.S. Hawai‘i prepared for the coming tsunami, evacuated to higher ground or higher floors, and waited. It was a restless night for so many.

“I wanted to take a moment to thank all our state and county emergency personnel; our visitor industry leaders and staff who helped comfort and take care of our many visitors, including those from Japan who were understandably worried about their homeland; and all our citizens who followed the directions from police and civil defense and sought shelter and higher ground. I stay in a hotel in Waikiki during session, and I have to say I was impressed with how that facility and others were prepared for

and executed disaster plans in the face of the impending tsunami. I want to express thanks to Ke Akua that although Hawai'i's normal routines were disrupted and there was some flooding and property damage, there was no loss of life. Our warning and emergency management systems from state and county civil defense to DOT highways, airports and harbors, health, and other state personnel to county first-responders, private business leaders who are part of the local emergency operations centers—all entities charged with keeping us safe—worked very well and collaboratively together. And finally mahalo to our local media who stayed on the air all night long to keep all of us informed.

“Hawai'i and the U.S. mainland dodged the devastating effects of the tsunami. Our brothers and sisters in Japan were not so fortunate. So, Mr. President, I ask that the Senate adjourn on a rising vote in sympathy with the Japanese people as they rebuild and recover and in memory of those who lost their lives. Mahalo.”

ADJOURNMENT

Monday, March 14, 2011

The Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journals of the Twenty-Seventh and Twenty-Eighth Days.

At this time, Senator Chun Oakland, on behalf of Senators Nishihara and Ige, introduced three sixth-grade student shadows from Pearl City Elementary—Courtney Segundo, Dayton Domingo-Brown, and Sawyer Matthews—who were accompanied by their teacher Mr. Russell Minobe and family members including Sawyer's brother Grayson and his grandfather Mr. Thompson; and Dayton's brother Ashton and his parents Mr. and Mrs. Domingo-Brown.

Senator Galuteria honored and commemorated the life of Kahauanu Lake—also known as “Uncle K,” “Mister K,” or just plain “K”—for his contributions to the preservation and perpetuation of classic Hawaiian music. Also recognized were the Kawai'ae'a family and Mr. Woody Chang, who represented the late Kahauanu Lake.

Senator Ryan recognized Elaine Nickie Ahuna Hines, affectionately known as “Auntie Nickie”, for being an excellent kupuna resource for the Hawaiian community.

Senator Kidani commended Kumu Hula John Renken Kaha'i Topolinski for his dedication and commitment to ensure that Nā Mea Hawai'i continue to be a part of our lives. Also recognized were his wife Anne; his daughter Kapu Ho'opi'i and her husband Shane Parker-Ho'opi'i; and his son Micah Topolinski and his wife Kimberly Ventura. Also seated in the gallery were members of the Royal Order of Kamehameha, members of Hale o Nā Ali'i O Po'omaikelani, and members of Ka Pā Hula Hawai'i.

Senator Solomon congratulated Kauanoe Kamanā for earning one of the first doctorates in Hawaiian language and for her work mentoring and educating the youth of Hawai'i as principal of Hilo's Ke Kula 'O Nāwahioalani'ōpu'u Iki Laboratory Public Charter School, a Hawaiian language immersion school.

Senator Kahele recognized Mr. Louis Hao for his outstanding lifelong contributions to the Native Hawaiian community. Mr. Hao was accompanied by his wife Leifi and brother Larry Hao.

Senator English acknowledged Dr. Noa Emmett Aluli for his efforts in improving the health and welfare of Native Hawaiians and bringing global attention to the devastation of the island of Kaho'olawe.

Senator Kim introduced Jory Watland, a constituent from Kalihi Valley.

Senator Chun Oakland moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 796 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ihara and carried.

Senator Chun Oakland then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of PATRICIA MCMANAMAN as the Director of the Department of Human Services, for a term of to expire December 1, 2014, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Chun Oakland rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, I believe that Patricia McManaman’s extensive experience, demonstrated leadership abilities, commitment to serving underserved and underrepresented members of our community, compassion, and personal integrity qualify her for the Director of Human Services. Ms. McManaman brings the Department of Human Services over 30 years of public service for Hawai‘i’s working class, low-income and immigrant communities. She has a deep understanding of the nonprofit community, a commitment to civil rights, and deep experience as an attorney. Throughout Ms. McManaman’s career, she has provided services as case manager, outreach worker, informal counselor, community advocate, community planner, activist, and administrator. Her clients have included the homeless, public housing tenants, persons with physical and mental disabilities, domestic violence and human trafficking victims, immigrants and citizens, felons, and other disenfranchised members of the community. During Ms. McManaman’s tenure as the Executive Director of Nā Loio Immigrants Rights and Public Interest Legal Center, she addressed systemic issues that impacted the Department of Human Services.

“In 2006, she was a key player in the development of Act 290. This act led to the creation of the Office of Language Access, which has been a guiding force in ensuring that equal access to state-funded services for Hawai‘i’s limited-English speaking residents was achieved. Immediately upon her appointment as interim director in December 2010, Ms. McManaman and the Department of Human Services were compelled to make some very difficult decisions in the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program. The cost-saving initiatives were undertaken in direct response to shortfalls in the TANF budget for the 2011 fiscal year. Ms. McManaman made these decisions to terminate contracts for worthy nonprofit service providers and seek an emergency appropriation to offset DHS’s cost overruns. Ms. McManaman dealt with the providers and the communities affected by the TANF cuts with compassion, honesty, and forthright conversations.

“The last few years have presented some of the most challenging times ever experienced by the department. The department has to deal with budget cuts, lack of funding, furloughs, reductions in force, retirements, higher caseloads, decreased services, and poor morale among staff. However, in Ms. McManaman’s short time with the department, she has been proactive and understanding of the multitude of issues faced by the department. She has demonstrated the ability to listen to concerns and has provided recommendations on how to move the department forward. Ms. McManaman is a true public servant with intelligence, compassion, character, and integrity to lead the department in these challenging times. The department is recognized as a vast and complex department with the broad mandate to assist people in need; in Ms. McManaman’s own words, ‘It is a big department with a big mission and a big heart.’ To that end, I believe that Ms. McManaman’s expertise, leadership, honesty, and commitment to the public good will serve Hawai‘i and the department very well. I respectfully request my colleagues to support G.M. No. 509. Thank you, Mr. President.”

At this time, Senator Chun Oakland introduced Director McManaman, who was accompanied by her husband Michael Tanigawa, daughter Sam Tanigawa, father Ray McManaman, mother-in-law Uki Tanigawa, sister-in-law Noe Tanigawa, brother-in-law Terry Lau, aunts Janet Hirata and Jane Niitsuma, uncle Kanji Niitsuma, and friends from the Department of Human Services who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Hee rose to make the following remarks:

“Mr. President, I, with a very troubled heart, ask for a one-day delay on this Governor’s Message. I recently found an article penned by the nominee entitled, ‘Dangerous Equations,’ and it called to my memory how this nominee fought vigorously for the three-strikes law that we are trying to repeal today, how the nominee fought vigorously for the wiretap law which rendered only me as a lone voter against such a law that prides into the privacy of others. Mr. President, this is an outrage. The Senate must do its work and revisit this nominee, so I therefore request a one-day delay on the nomination. Thank you, Mr. President.

“By the way, it need not be said the question, ‘What is the urgency?’ Why the rush? Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Tokuda rose in inquiry and said:

“Mr. President, would the previous speaker consider an extension to a 40-hour delay in consideration partly so that we can ensure that the nominee has adequate face time in the media?”

Senator Hee responded:

“Mr. President, 40 hours would mean we’d be back... I can’t compute it offhand, but she is the Education Chair, so I’m sure she knows what 40 hours would be from now. But I would consider it, but maybe a one-year delay. Maybe I misspoke too quickly. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Kim rose in response and said:

“Can I add to this? Can I request—having served with Senator Hooser for many years and just wanting to keep him around, and maybe perhaps we can get some candles and have a lighting ceremony—I’d like to request that we delay for seven days. That’s probably easier to compute, Senator Hee. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The Chair responded that the request was denied.

Senator Gabbard rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, in words that rang out frequently in these hallowed halls from the nominee in years past when he served as majority leader—‘My remarks will be very brief.’

“Mr. President, your Committee on Energy and Environment has reviewed the personal history, resume, and statement submitted by the nominee and finds him to be exceptionally qualified to be confirmed as Director of the Office of Environmental Quality Control. As you can see, we have two Governor’s Messages; G.M. No. 524 will complete the term set to expire on June 30, 2011, and G.M. No. 526 will be the term July 1, 2011, to June 30, 2015. We received testimony overwhelmingly in support of the nominee from a wide range of environmental groups, labor organizations, nonprofits, businesses, and people from all across the state. As a former colleague, Senate majority leader, and member of the Energy and Environment Committee, he has distinguished himself as a champion for environmental protection, working for important legislation related to mandating solar water heaters on new homes, public access to coastal or inland public areas, and reduction in greenhouse emissions. He’s been a principal advocate for the environment which he couples with a sense of balance as it relates to economic concerns.

“Throughout his years in public service, the nominee has proven to be an adaptable and creative problem solver while staying true to his core beliefs. He will bring to the OEQC organizational, communication, and team-building skills to raise the efficiency of the office to a level that will instill greater public confidence in the environmental review process. I commend the nominee for accepting the responsibilities and challenges of the Director of OEQC and for his commitment to those he serves. Colleagues, I ask you to join me in supporting Mr. Gary Hooser as the Director of OEQC. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Kouchi rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“I’ve had the opportunity to serve two terms on the Kaua’i County Council with Director Hooser. There were times when he was the one no vote on the 6-1 vote, so he knows what Senator Hee is talking about being the one person voting on the losing side. But he’s never been afraid to be that one vote, and he’s never been afraid to speak his mind and stand his ground on the principles that he believes are true and right. He has been a tireless advocate for the people of Kaua’i and Ni’ihau, not just on the county council, but also serving here in the State of Hawai’i Senate. It’s a privilege and a pleasure to rise to cast a vote in support of Gary to be the next director for OEQC. I believe he’ll do a great job for the people of Hawai’i. The people of Kaua’i and Ni’ihau are sad to lose him, but he’s serving a bigger purpose than just serving the islands of Kaua’i and Ni’ihau. I’d also like add two personal notes. I’d like to thank him for the opportunity he has given me to now serve as the Kaua’i and Ni’ihau Senator and his generosity in the amount of allowance he left in the office when he departed. Thank you.”

Senator English rose on a point of inquiry and said:

“Rule 71, Voting Rights of Members, number one says: ‘No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. The member voting “with reservations” shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote “Kānalua” the first time the member’s name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes “Kānalua” on the next call of the member’s name, the member’s vote shall be recorded as “Aye.”’ The point is that I’ve heard people talking about possibly voting ‘Kānalua’ today, so our rules say that if you vote ‘Kānalua’ twice, it means ‘yes.’ Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Gabbard introduced Director Gary Hooser, who was accompanied by his daughter Kelli-Rose.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 803 (Gov. Msg. No. 523):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 803 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Taniguchi and carried.

Senator Baker then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of HERMINA MORITA to the Public Utilities Commission, for a term to expire June 30, 2014, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“On behalf of your Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, it’s my pleasure to recommend that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Hermina Morita as Commissioner of the Public Utilities Commission. Ms. Morita is a proven leader and a recognized authority on energy and regulatory matters. Because of her position as Chair of the House Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection since 1999, she has developed comprehensive knowledge of the issues involved in the state’s energy market and has been a long-time advocate for renewable energy. Mina’s spearheaded innovative efforts to advance the state’s clean energy goals through legislation and by serving as an ex officio member of the Hawai’i Energy Policy Forum.

“Many from industry, environment, and labor, from Kaua’i, and government, including the House Speaker, came to support the nominee. All noted that one of Ms. Morita’s outstanding qualities when making important policy decisions is her fairness and openness in listening to and carefully considering the opinions and perspectives of others, including those with whom she may personally disagree. But more importantly is that Ms. Morita has demonstrated throughout her career her integrity, a willingness and desire to educate herself on new issues, an ability to synthesize technical and detailed information, as well as the desire and the action to seek out opportunities to learn from experts around her. Ms. Morita clearly has the requisite credibility, knowledge, and proactive leadership skills to assist the commission in fulfilling its duties of protecting the public interest while serving as a critical economic driver for the state. It’s also important for me to point out that Ms. Morita will provide a critical neighbor island perspective, which is sorely lacking on the current PUC and has been lacking for many years on previous commissions. This perspective, along with leading the streamlining and updating of the rules and policy framework for the commission, in partnership with the legislature, will help bring the PUC into the 21st century.

“Mr. President, your committee is committed to assisting in this endeavor. Colleagues, I believe that Hermina Morita will prove to be a positive, proactive commissioner, and add value to the deliberations on the many dockets and proceedings at the PUC. I urge your favorable vote on the recommendation to advise and consent on Governor’s Message No. 523. Mahalo.”

Senator Gabbard rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, I’ve had the pleasure of working with and opposite of Ms. Morita during the last two and a half years in her capacity as the chair of the House Energy and Environmental Protection Committee. I found her to be a strong, compassionate and principled person, and I am confident that she will bring those same qualities to the PUC. I

look forward to working with her in her new role, and I ask you to join me in her support. Mahalo.”

Senator English rose in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, members, you know I’ve worked with Mina for many years on energy policy when I was chair of the Energy Committee, and I can say that we did great things, all of us, together. We managed to turn around Hawai‘i’s energy policy and create the foundation for renewable energies to come into Hawai‘i and be a part of our energy future. Without the visionary leadership of Mina, I don’t think we would have gotten there. So, I ask all of the members here to please support the nomination. I think she’ll be a wonderful Chairman of the Public Utilities Commission. Thank you.”

Senator Kouchi rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Looking up in the gallery, I realized that between Gary and Mina serving on boards and commissions, being a State Representative, a county council member, and a State Senator, Kaua‘i is losing almost 30 years of community experience with their current appointments. Our loss is the State of Hawai‘i’s gain. I recall early on in Mina’s career when she was nominated to the Kaua‘i County Planning Commission, and her nomination was deemed very controversial by some for her environmental views and her perceived no-growth policy. I’d always been a strong supporter of growth, and people assumed I would vote against her nomination. I felt that her job was to be an advocate for the community, to do the best job she could as a commissioner, and to work hard; and I firmly believed that she possessed those qualities and stood in support of her nomination. As we have continued to work together, we have become friends, and colleagues.

“When I was newly appointed to this position to replace Senator Hooser, Mina immediately reached out to me, extended great courtesy, introduced me to members of the North Shore community, which is her representative district, and helped me be a better senator. I am very appreciative for her assistance and her guidance. It is also very interesting that we have come full circle, for today I stand up in support of her because I fully support the agenda that she’s been advocating for years as a representative here and the energy policies that she believes in, and the direction that the State of Hawai‘i needs to go in if we are to survive. And so, it is with great pride and pleasure that I stand in strong support of Representative Morita to be the next Chair of the Public Utilities Commission. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Let me say as I did say in committee, first of all, I do so very seriously, and people that know my record over the past 15 years know that there are very few nominations that I have challenged. It’s not that I agree with the individual, but I agree with the appointing authority, the Governor, and I agree with the individual to pursue his or her objectives. Why the difference in this nomination? There are several reasons. First of all, we’re talking about an extremely important position. Not just a member of the three-member Public Utilities Commission, but the chairman of this commission; and while I certainly believe in the need for reorganization and transition, the agenda that’s been presented in various hearings and over the years is not one that I sincerely believe is going to be beneficial to the State of Hawai‘i. Now, let me repeat what I did repeat in the committee, and that is that my objections have nothing to do with the nominee’s character, her integrity, or her legislative experience, other than the agenda which she has pursued and has been very successful at. From my standpoint, that agenda has included the elimination of the Superferry in Hawai‘i, the banning of certain goods and services, the

increase—tremendous increase—in taxation for our people, the lack of choices for consumers in this state, the lack of a visionary plan to get us from using fossil fuels into mandating us to use alternatives, with questions in between. I think that in terms of the taxes and the fees, whether we’re talking about the barrel tax or the beverage tax (which started out as supposedly being about recycling and ended up as a major tax and a benefit to the state), additional tax proposals, additional fees that have been suggested to me are policies that I cannot subscribe to.

“The nominee and I had a very interesting discussion; and her point was that we differ philosophically, and that’s true. But I try not to vote for a person because of their philosophy, because of their political party, or even because of their community activism—and as a matter of fact, we had three nominees, two of which were already confirmed today who are noted for their community activism. But in this situation, I’ve been concerned about the closeness of the nominee to selected regulated industries. Also to the fact that, in questioning, she has no support for free-market competitive economy, believes in more government, believes in more regulation rather than less regulation. I found the question and answer on the undersea cable project to be murky at best; and while I realize that I’m certainly in a minority and will be probably the only vote in this issue today, it’s interesting how my colleagues will praise people of their own opinion and own party for being a single vote. But I feel that it would be hypocritical of me not to stand up and say this after all of the issues that I’ve fought against and stood alone against in this body over the years, issues which I believe are not beneficial to the State of Hawai‘i, to our future or to our people, issues which have not created more jobs, more investment opportunities, or more of a respect for our state. Instead, people look at Hawai‘i as being the social laboratory to try out anything without thinking about what the consequences will be.

“I have nothing but positive belief in the nominee in terms of how she will work hard and how she will try to make changes. It’s just that darned agenda and just that history of actual votes that leaves me in this position of voting ‘no’. But there’s no animosity; it’s nothing personal and it’s nothing partisan. And so, I will wish her well, but I will still cast a ‘no’ vote. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“I’d like to bring to the attention of the previous speaker that our nominee has been receiving testimony from not only the Mayor of Kaua‘i or the Chair of the Public Utilities Commission, but also the Hawai‘i Business League, the World Business Academy, many other businesses, Grove Farm, Hawai‘i Energy Policy—the list goes on and on and on. So, for it to be so one-sided in perhaps an anti-business climate, I think not. So with that, colleagues, I would encourage you all to vote for our nominee. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

At this time, Senator Baker introduced Chair Morita, who was accompanied by her two daughters Mindy Laney and Misha Taylor; son-in-law Ben Taylor; granddaughters Kaula Taylor, Lili Taylor, and Halia Tinder; and sisters Phyllis McFadden, Alberta de Jetley, and Suki Nako. Senator Baker also noted that it was Lili’s fourth birthday and wished her hau‘oli lā hānau.

At 12:47 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:55 p.m.

Senator Tokuda rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Colleagues, as you know, today also marks the beginning of our 8th Annual Education Week. In addition to the traditional floor presentations that will be happening throughout the week, we’ve kick things up a notch and will be having demonstrations, displays, presentations, student hearings, and legislative shadow programs. You’ll find on all of your desks your special edition, color copy of our Education Week program. I have been reminded that in the spirit of going paperless that this is the only copy you will be receiving. And for those of you who have been feeling a little bit matrix-deprived, I have also provided you with a very Sakamoto-esque breakdown of the entire week as well.

“Today from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., we had Kapi’olani Community College, Hawai’i Community College, Maui Community College, Windward Community College, UH West O’ahu, UH Hilo, and UH Mānoa here cooking, displaying, presenting, and more. At 2:15 p.m. today, the Governor will be signing into law S.B. No. 8; and to help us capture the moment, we will also be having students from Waipahu High School’s ‘Ōlelo program filming the signing ceremony. Tomorrow is another full day starting at 7:45 a.m. with an Early Learning Council breakfast and presentation; demonstrations and displays from Honolulu Community College, UH Hilo, Kaua’i Community College, Leeward Community College, Kapi’olani Community College, Windward Community College, and UH Mānoa from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.; a presentation by Hiki Nō, the nation’s first statewide student run television network, from 12:30 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.; and robotics demonstrations in the rotunda from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. with teams from McKinley, Farrington, Kalani, Castle, ‘Iolani, and Kaneohe Elementary School.

“I just wanted to give a big mahalo to Hawaiian Airlines and HSTA for their continued support in bringing in our neighbor island honorees, and I would also like to thank my hardworking team, especially Erin Conner, for putting all of this together. I could not have done it without them. So, thank you, colleagues, and let’s have a great Education Week. Thank you.”

Senator English rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Members, this Thursday and Friday, we were issued a tsunami warning, and I really want to take a moment to commend our civil defense and all the workers that went out and made sure that people were evacuated. My village of Hāmoa in Hāna was completely devastated and wiped out by the April 1, 1946 tsunami. In fact, my family home which is on the ocean side ended up in what’s now my front yard on the other side of the street. So, we take it very, very seriously. And the work of the civil defense people and others was extraordinary considering that the warning was issued at 8:30 at night and by about 11:30 my village was evacuated, and people without cars and others were helped and got to safety. So, you know, we dodged a great bullet this last weekend. You look at the devastation in Japan; that could have been us. So, kudos to the civil defense people, and remember that they’re coming up in the budget as well. Thank you.”

Senator Galuteria rose to wish Senator Hee a happy birthday.

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

ORDER OF THE DAY

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1034, H.D. 1:

Senator Ige moved that H.B. No. 1034, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose in support of the measure and said:

"H.B. 1034 provides funds and authorization for fiscal year 2010-2011 for collective bargaining costs associated with the December 23, 2010 agreement negotiated between the state, the counties, and the exclusive bargaining representatives of units 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 13. Members this would pay for the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund premiums—the employer's contribution. Total appropriation is \$18 million and some change

"Mr. President, it is important that we take action on this measure immediately as the agreement was effective March 1 and the first pay period that would be impacted is the one that is scheduled for this Friday, so I encourage all members to vote in support of this measure. I also would like permission to insert a copy of a letter and some further comments clarifying and making clear the Legislature's position that our action today should no way be interpreted to endorse any ongoing distribution of the costs of the health fund on behalf of the employer."

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"The only emergency is that we have an emergency funding problem in this state, and to get involved in this particular collective bargaining agreement, I think, is outside of the scope of this legislature. The fact that we're willing to pay \$18 million to further subsidize and to enforce contract, I think, is a real slap in the face to the taxpayers of this state, and particularly to the small businesses who have to pay a larger amount of money for their own premiums and for those of their employees. The fact that the Governor unilaterally decided to increase the subsidy to 60 percent, 40 percent immediately after he took office, while raiding the hurricane fund to do so, is a further indication that this is not positive legislation; that we shouldn't do this. And I did read the caveat in both the House committee report and just heard the Ways and Means chairman saying that by this action, no way indicates that we support future actions and so forth, but of course it does. Because what we do in here is important. And when we talk about \$18 million and some change, like I

said, the taxpayers have to pick up that bill. I think this is ill-advised and I would urge my colleagues to think very clearly before they vote on this. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose on a point of inquiry as follows:

"I appreciate the willingness of the Chair of Ways and Means. I'd told him during the recess that I intended to ask a few questions and I appreciate his willingness to respond.

"Mr. President, would you ask the Chairman of Ways and Means if this \$18 million or so that's being spent, first, who is the requestor of this action, number one; and if the Senate did not fund or pass this bill, what would be the consequences of the requestor? Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Ige responded:

"Yes, Mr. President, the requestor of the funds is the Governor, the executive, on behalf of the employer. If the Legislature rejected the request, then the agreement negotiated between the employer and the appropriate collective bargaining agents would be rejected and null and void. That's my understanding of the law."

Senator Hee rose and said:

"Mr. President, would you ask the Chairman of Ways and Means to amplify the bargaining agreement between the employer and the employee to the extent that is the bargaining agreement reached by the employer and the employee that is in force sufficiently funded absent of the \$18+ million requested by the Governor?"

Senator Ige responded:

"Yes, I do believe that the current budget does not adequately fund the Employee Union Trust Fund appropriation to support the agreement, and that is the purpose of the emergency appropriation."

Senator Hee rose and said:

"Mr. President, would you ask the Chairman of the Ways and Means to specify the 'agreement'—is that the agreement made by the Governor subsequent to his election or the agreement made by the collective bargaining agreement that was reached between the employer and the units; hat is to say, if the agreement were between the Governor and I presume the employee. Absent of that, is the agreement in fact the collective bargaining agreement that was agreed to previous to the New Day in Hawaii?"

Senator Ige responded:

"Mr. President, there's two collective bargaining agreements. The previous agreement was reached with Governor Lingle and that agreement currently expires June 30 of this year. And on December 23, 2010, the new governor, Governor Abercrombie, negotiated an addendum to that agreement which deals with cost sharing on the Employer Union Trust Fund allocation. So, there are two agreements."

Senator Hee rose and said:

"So then, is it fair to say that the addendum to the agreement was made without funding?"

Senator Ige responded:

"Yes. Mr. President, as is the defined process, the employer and the unions negotiate agreements and any cost items that result in those negotiations are then presented to the Legislature for a determination of whether it should or should not be funded."

Senator Hee rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“Mr. President, respectfully, I rise to vote ‘no.’ Let me explain. I don’t think it’s a secret on this floor that most of us, as Democrats, have been very supportive of labor, and that’s not going to change by this vote today. On the other hand, it is not good policy, in my opinion, for the executive to reach agreements with the employees with the expectation that the Legislature will follow suit as if the back legs are following the front legs. An agreement was reached. With the best of intentions, the executive decided to change the agreement. Evidently, that agreement and that decision was made absent of legislative input, as is his prerogative. Since that time, the Council on Revenues projections have not gone up; they’ve gone down. And more recently, the tragedy in Japan has exacerbated an already difficult budget situation.

“It is difficult for me to understand number one, the urgency of moving this bill right now, today, without more discussion and more thought on the fiscal situation that has evolved since the time that evidently an addendum was reached. It is my belief that more time is warranted to have a fuller appreciation of the economic situation. And I would just add as an addendum, if the Governor since his election, by his own means and his prerogative, can exercise an upward cost from 50:50 to 60:40, then maybe in light of what has happened since that time a reconsideration may be in order. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose to request a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, H.B. No. 1034, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING EMERGENCY APPROPRIATIONS FOR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING COST ITEMS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Thursday, March 17, 2011

The Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, convened at 11:31 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

MATTER DEFERRED FROM TUESDAY, MARCH 15, 2011

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 804 (Gov. Msg. No. 506):

Senator Fukunaga moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 804 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kim and carried.

Senator Fukunaga then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of RICHARD C. LIM as the Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, for a term to expire December 1, 2014, seconded by Senator Kim.

Senator Fukunaga rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, many of you are familiar with Richard Lim's distinguished career in Hawai'i's banking industry beginning in 1976 with International Holding Capital Corporation through his term as President of City Bank Hawai'i from 1999 to 2004. However, what is especially noteworthy for an individual from a somewhat conservative banking industry, Mr. Lim was also responsible for showcasing Hawai'i's leading technology companies through City Bank's sponsorship of the Targeted Industry's Growth Report, or the TIGR report. At a time when few understood the value of supporting new technology development, he co-founded and directed this public service effort to encourage Hawai'i to diversify its economy. Launched in 1998, when the state was mired in recession and many local businesses were worried about Hawai'i's future in an increasingly competitive global economy, the TIGR report played a pivotal role in rallying the business community around Hawai'i's emerging high technology sector. It appeared monthly in Hawai'i Business Magazine and identified, analyzed, and reported on key sectors with the potential to provide meaningful diversification for the state's economy. It was based on extensive research with the aid of over 100 field correspondents. It was certainly one of the first things I turned to whenever I picked up the magazine. When the last report was published in 2003, we lost a vital source of information for Hawai'i's business community.

"During the TIGR report's lifetime, Mr. Lim also created an annual TIGR awards ceremony to publicly honor Hawai'i's high tech entrepreneurs and to encourage Hawai'i's business visionaries to stay in Hawai'i and start businesses here. Today, those businesses employ thousands of residents in well-paying jobs in targeted growth industries, such as diversified agriculture, aquaculture, astronomy, educational tourism, film

and digital media, internet and web startups, ocean and earth sciences, and companies supporting Hawai'i's high tech, dual-use industries. Equally important, he befriended the leaders of these growth industries, establishing a network of personal contacts that should provide invaluable assistance and guidance to the state as we focus on meeting the challenges of our current economic climate.

"Your Committees on Economic Development and Technology and Tourism were also encouraged to hear Mr. Lim's intention of rebuilding the department's capacity to provide timely, accurate, and well thought out economic growth analyses to help revive the state's economy. This focus will substantially improve the types of cost-benefit analyses provided by DBEDT, Department of Taxation, other research assets such as UHERO, and private sector economists. Events such as last week's tragic Japanese tsunami further emphasized the fragility of the Hawai'i economy and the need for timely and reliable economic data upon which legislators, the administration, business, and the broader community can rely upon as we respond to both short-term and ongoing challenges.

"I commend Mr. Lim for his willingness to serve as Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and for his frank acknowledgment that government is much more complicated than the private sector. He brings confidence, hope, understanding, and encouragement to the Hawai'i business community at a time that it is badly needed. We look forward to working with him in our collaborative efforts to rebuild Hawai'i's economy and to create more jobs for Hawai'i's people. For all of the foregoing reasons, I urge my colleagues to vote in support of his nomination. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"We're expecting a great deal from this nominee. As was said, we expect him to build or rebuild capacity of the department, but also credibility. The department has been troubled with a number of issues that were pointed out by the Legislative Auditor over the last couple of years. And the nominee has already indicated steps that were taken so that those circumstances don't happen again. The nominee has a great deal of experience and a wide breadth of contacts throughout the community, and I think this will be extremely helpful. Those of us in the small business community, while we appreciate technological advances, we don't want to be ignored either and think that since 98 percent of all businesses in this state are small business, we expect and hope to see a great deal of emphasis. We're also anxiously awaiting the reorganizational plans of the department. So, I'm very happy to add my full support and urge all of our colleagues to do so as well. Thank you."

Senator Taniguchi rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I've known Richard for more than 20 years. He was my boss at the old International Savings and Loan. He is a visionary, he is a tireless innovator, and he believes in empowering all those around him to do a better job. I believe he'll do a great job as the Director of DBEDT, and I ask my colleagues to support his nomination. Thank you."

“I think that’s wonderful, Mr. President, and I’m hoping that the committee would consider the possibility of opening Hawai‘i to receive those that are presently evacuating Japan. I heard that the numbers are now half a million that are exiting, and I think that we should seriously look at encouraging them to come to Hawai‘i, and work with whomever can accommodate them, and, you know, to be able to really open our city, as well as our neighbor islands, up to the nation of Japan. As you know, Mr. President, we’ve had a long-standing relationship with Japan. It came from the kingdom of King David Kalākaua. At one time they were considering a marriage between Princess Ka‘iulani and the prince of Japan, you know, many, many years ago. They were the only nation that came to our aid when the

marines came and illegally overthrew the Kingdom of Hawai‘i. Japan stood ready to come with their gunships to our rescue. So, because of this long-standing history, and being that I am a Native Hawaiian, I feel compelled at this time to encourage the committee to really take fast action because they desperately need our help. Thank you very much, Mr. President.”

From this, it appears that Ms. Topping's commitment to an inclusive management style is already showing promising results. Sunshine Topping's credentials in the human resources arena, as well as her many volunteer activities in both the Native Hawaiian and wider communities

present a picture of a highly competent professional who has not only visionary goals, but also the expertise to carry them out. Her experience in labor relations, collective bargaining, and other personnel issues, comes from a work history in companies both large and small, both in Hawai'i and on the mainland, the continent. Since returning to her home state 10 years ago, she has worked mainly in the high technology industry and at one point operated her own recruiting business.

"Colleagues, all signs point to Sunshine Topping, born and raised in Hilo, Hawai'i, and a proud product of its public schools, as the ideal person to lead the central personnel office of our state government. I urge you, colleagues, to join with us today, all together, as we give her our unanimous advise and consent to her nomination as Director of the Department of Human Resources. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I rise in strong support of this nominee and appreciate the words of our majority leader and would like to echo them. You know, the thing that impressed me the most when Sunshine made an appointment to come to visit with me was her extensive background in human resources. What a novel trait to have in the Director of DHRD. We all know the important role that that department plays for us, but it never gets the recognition or the thanks, I think, for the important role that the Human Resources Department does play in government. We're always complaining about people not getting lists on time, and not having qualified people apply. And so, I think with Sunshine's background and expertise, she can work with the hardworking folks in her department to really bring our human resource division and systems into the 21st century, and I think she'll do our state very well, so I'm pleased to join in support of her nomination."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro introduced Director Topping, who was accompanied by her husband Miles; her children Ka'ehu, Hōkūlani and Paoa; her mother Carol Helekunihi; her siblings Isaiah, Sommer, Keko, Levi, Micah and Rebekah; and her nephews Kahia and Makani who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Green then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of LORETTA J. FUDDY as the Director of the Department of Health, for a term to expire December 1, 2014, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Green rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand in very, very strong support of Loretta Fuddy to become our next Director of Health. To start, though this may be a little bit unconventional, this is an extraordinarily good-hearted person, and that was reflected—before I talk about Ms. Fuddy's professional credentials—this was reflected in the testimony unanimously. It was almost abnormal to see that many people have such an endearing sense of comfort to have the incoming director—should we vote for her in a moment—head the Department of Health. She has been not just respected by her colleagues, but has fought for women and children for decades.

“Loretta began her service to Hawai‘i back in 1975, 35 years of work here at the Department of Health, which is really important in this day and age because there’s so much change going on in the field of health—and this was reflected in the committee hearing—that there was a lot of apprehension that the department wouldn’t have someone that could carry it through into the next era. And person after person in our committee was excited to see that stability return to the Department of Health. Some of the awards Loretta has received also reflect what I’m talking about: Volunteer of the Year in 2000 for the March of Dimes, the Director’s Award for Health Resource Services for HRSA Maternal and Child Health Bureau, Lifetime Achievement Award for the National Association of Social Workers. So, this is a very, very giving person that I’ll be voting for here in a moment to become our next Director of Health.

“Not only was the committee unanimous on behalf of Loretta, but the testimony was actually unanimous, which is no small feat; and we had a couple hundred people write to us and testify. Loretta has worked extensively in the department so we are getting an experienced individual. She was actually the Director of Health back in 2003 as an acting director and has been our acting director for the past two months, which has not been an important point lost on the committee. When we had the radiation concerns from Japan, she performed admirably and has continued to perform admirably in that capacity as director. She also helped us deal with spilled arsenic on Kaua‘i. And I’ll tell you, when the Health Committee called the director to ask her for health information, she was absolutely right on the spot. There’s been no reluctance to reach out to us and help solve problems, knowing full well that she was in transition to this position.

“She’s been Deputy Director of Health, Chief of Family Health Services, Chief of Maternal Health Branch, Perinatal Health Services supervisor. Loretta has really seen the department in the whole, and so she is in a unique position to lead this department, which is enormous: 5,000+ employees, a multi-hundred million dollar budget, and changes coming from the federal side all the time. Even recent work on the tsunami has been impressive from Loretta. So, without getting into much more detail, I can just tell you this is an extremely well-educated individual with master’s degrees in the pertinent disciplines. She studied sociology, which I think really is a good fit for the Department of Health, and like I said, her heart is probably the most significant quality that recommends her as well. So, I’ll sit now, but I do encourage all of us to vote for this extraordinary individual to become our next director. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Baker rose in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“It really was a love fest in the Committee on Health when Loretta’s name was put forward and dozens and dozens of people testified. And I think it’s no secret in these halls that the department was severely impacted with the budget cuts and the morale in the department was very low. But since Loretta, who is passionate and devoted to public health, has come on board the morale has improved; people are working together again and really trying to figure out how to move forward at a time when it may be a year or two more that we have challenges from a budget perspective. Under Loretta’s leadership, she’ll put the focus back on public health and help all of the programs get back on track and hopefully get back to their full speed. She’s tackled some tough issues already at the department and I for one appreciate her leadership. I know the feedback that I’ve gotten from folks over there that I’ve worked with in previous capacities as health chair and as WAM chair really tell me that she has the skill sets, the ability and the heart to move the department in the right direction. So I look forward to

continuing to work with Deliana Loretta Fuddy. As one of the testifiers said, they thought for a long time that there might be two Fuddys around, but no, just one with two different names sometimes, depending on how you were first introduced to her. Loretta, I think you’re going to do an excellent job for the department. We all look forward to working with you because we know that this is a critical department and area for all of our citizens. And with that, Mr. President, I encourage all of our colleagues to join in supporting her.”

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, was called to order at 2:03 p.m. by the Honorable Shan S. Tsutsui, President of the Senate.

The President addressed the Chamber, stating:

"This is indeed a momentous occasion. We honor members of the Armed Forces of the United States, with ties to Hawai'i, who fought and died bravely, in combat zones designated by presidential order.

"On behalf of the House Speaker and all of the members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, I convey our deepest condolences to our very special guests—the family, friends and colleagues of loved ones, who have lost their lives overseas while in the Middle East. Our prayers are with you, and we are honored by your presence today.

"Please rise for the posting of colors by the Joint Service Color Guard, the Hawai'i Air National Guard, and the Royal Guard; and remain standing for the singing of the National Anthem and 'Hawai'i Pono'i' by Ms. Jennifer Lee, which will be followed by the invocation by Raymond Ganotise, Master Sergeant Retired from the Hawai'i Army National Guard."

At this time, the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and special guests rose for the Posting of Colors by the Joint Service Color Guard, the Hawai'i Air National Guard, and the Royal Guard.

The members of the Legislature and guests remained standing for the singing of the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by Ms. Jennifer Lee.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by retired Master Sergeant Raymond Ganotise.

At this time, the President thanked the Joint Service Color Guard, the Royal Guard, Ms. Jennifer Lee, and retired Master

Sergeant Raymond Ganotise for their participation in today's ceremony.

The President then addressed the members of the Legislature and guests as follows:

"Today, we have gathered so that we can honor and remember our fallen heroes, their families and friends.

"As we go about with our busy everyday lives, whether it's going to work, attending a baby luau, sporting events on the weekend, or even church on Sundays, it is easy to forget that there is a war going on, and in other parts of the world combat in the streets is an all day and everyday occurrence for both civilians and soldiers. Through the distance, we are sometimes able to disassociate ourselves from the reality that our brave soldiers experience on a daily basis and from the ensuing heartache that is felt by their loved ones who long for their safe return home.

"The Hawai'i Medal of Honor is awarded on behalf of the people of Hawai'i to soldiers who are connected to these islands and are a part of our 'ohana, our family, forever. Today, I am truly privileged and profoundly humbled to take part in this ceremony to honor those who have sacrificed their lives in defense of our nation and its freedoms.

"No one can take the place of a lost loved one. Nothing can be said to fill the void that is left in the hearts and lives of those who are left behind. In many ways, today's events bring up mixed emotions... great sorrow, for those who have fallen... and also the great pride in the bravery, dedication, and commitment these soldiers possessed and demonstrated in their lives.

"These individuals assumed their duties with the understanding of the potential danger that they would face and in light of that, they still chose to dedicate themselves to a life of service to our country. Their courage, honor, and commitment, have forged an enduring legacy as common individuals demonstrating uncommon valor.

"Let us pledge to each other that these brave soldiers that have fallen will not be in vain. Let us never forget the magnitude of their sacrifices and remain ever grateful. For the debt we owe can never be repaid, but through our continued commitment to the freedoms and ideals that define our country may we honor their memories.

"Words cannot adequately express the appreciation and the gratitude that the people of Hawai'i have for our courageous members in the military.

"To our fallen soldiers and their families and friends, thank you for your many sacrifices. Our thoughts and prayers remain with you all. You will always be remembered with honor and respect.

"Thank you and mahalo to everyone here today and may God continue to bless all of us."

The President then stated:

"Before proceeding any further, I would like to acknowledge the presence of our military and congressional leaders."

The President then stated:

"Ladies and gentleman, please help me in acknowledging once again these fine military and congressional leaders that are all here today."

At this time, the President called upon Major General Darryll Wong to deliver his remarks on behalf of the military.

General Wong addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

"Governor Abercrombie, Senate President Shan Tsutsui, House Speaker Calvin Say, Lieutenant Governor Brian Schatz, Walt Kaneakua, Ricky Oshiro, Marvin Buenconsejo, Rod Tanonaka, Bill Paty, Christina Kemmer, members of the State

Legislature, federal flag officers, veterans, and especially our esteemed families, I want to begin by thanking all of you for coming to this ceremony. Today marks the sixth year that the state officials have gathered here in these Chambers for this solemn ceremony. The presentation of the Hawai'i State Medal of Honor was the first of its kind in the nation and has since been emulated by several other states.

"As the newly appointed State Adjutant General, this is the first time that I've had the honor of addressing this assemblage. But it is my fervent wish that it will be the last ceremony of its kind. That would mean that no more of Hawai'i based members of our armed forces would have paid the ultimate price in the global of terrorism and no more families would have to grieve for their loss. But our nation remains engaged in Iraq, Afghanistan, and elsewhere in Southwest Asia and the Horn of Africa, and therefore our men and women in uniform will continue to place themselves in harm's way for the sake and the security and the freedom of others. No one who puts on the uniform wants to die for their country, but they are nonetheless willing to if it means that others may live in peace and security. At the very least, such selflessness deserves public recognition of the highest order and that is why we are here today.

"The State Medal of Honor is Hawai'i's way of remembering the soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines, and coast guardsmen who have paid the ultimate sacrifice, to show our appreciation to their families, to share in their loss, and to assure them that they will always be a part of this state 'ohana or family. It doesn't matter if they were service members that grew up in Hawai'i or first set foot upon these beautiful islands as part of a Hawai'i based unit. He or she is still embraced as part of our family. There is no greater sacrifice the family can make than the loss of their loved one while in service to our nation, and there is no greater honor that the people of Hawai'i can bestow upon them to symbolize that sacrifice.

"As this war on terrorism continues, it will remain our obligation to honor our selfless men and women in uniform and their families. It is the very least we can do for them after they have done so much for all of us. To the family and friends of our fallen heroes, I humbly ask that you accept this Hawai'i Medal of Honor on behalf of the people of Hawai'i who today and forever shall be your devoted family. Mahalo and thank you."

The President thanked Major General Wong for his continued leadership, then presented to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and special guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Welcome to all here, most especially to the families that have been able to join us today. I would like to begin my remarks with a passage that was taken by James Gould Cozzens in his great novel of World War II, *Guard of Honor*. It was taken from Shakespeare's *Tempest*. 'I and my fellows are ministers of Fate: the elements of whom your swords are temper'd may as well wound the loud winds, or with bemock'd...stabs kill the still closing waters, as diminished one dowle that's in my plume: my fellow-ministers are...invulnerable.' Cozzens understood with perhaps an artist's sensitivity and sensibility what it is that men and women have been called upon to endure in World War II. Suffice to say, that kind of sacrifice has been asked again, and again, and yet again.

"Those who are here with us today understand that for however brief a time, we were privileged and honored to have with us here in paradise those we honor today. As a member of the Armed Services Committee of the United States House of Representatives for two decades, it was my obligation and

responsibility to spend time among troops in the field, particularly in Iraq and Afghanistan. So, I come to you today with these words of greeting and gratitude, bringing with me the sentiments of those who have been mentioned as part of the congressional delegation and from those who have served on the civilian side of responsibility with regard to what has been expected of men and women defending the strategic interests of the United States of America: that that commitment to peace, and justice, and freedom, and opportunity, which is manifest in the lives that have been given are recognized here today and that those lives are held in our hearts and in our minds.

"One might say, and I expect one might find, those who would dismiss a ceremony of this kind and find it to be ritualistic. After all, we've done this now, as indicated by General Wong, six times. We hope not to have to do it a 7th, or an 8th or a 9th, but should that occur and should that be a necessity, we will surely do it. And the reason is, is that ritual is the great conservator of values: the values that were given to these young men and women that they manifested in their lives and their commitment and their sacrifice, and we recognize it. It's important to recognize it. It's important that we, who understand what that sacrifice was all about, let you know that it continues in our hearts and in our minds. And, so, yes, we give a greeting to all of you today. But more than that, we thank you. More than that, we say to you: come again to paradise. More than that, we say to you: you are part of our 'ohana, part of our family here in paradise. Aloha and mahalo."

The President then stated:

"Madam Clerk, please begin the announcements of the Hawai'i Medal of Honor recipients."

A 21-gun Salute and Taps were then carried out by the U.S. Air Force and the U.S. Navy.

The Speaker then gave his closing remarks as follows:

"To all of you, thank you for your participation in this ceremony. Thank you especially for your display of commendation, respect, and gratitude for the sacrifice of the young persons we have honored today. Thank you also for the honor you have bestowed upon their families.

"During these times of ceremonies, we are reminded of what not to take for granted. We should not take for granted our family and friends, our standard of living, and our appreciation of innovation, individualism, and self-expression. We should not take for granted our multi-cultural, multi-religious, multi-ethnic society of tolerance, which is the basis for our moral authority in the world today. Most importantly, we should never take for granted our freedom, dearly earned and preserved by the young persons honored today and their predecessors.

"I am sure that they would join me in saying: God Bless America!"

The Speaker then stated:

"Members of the House and Senate, and special guests, please stand for the retiring of the colors. Joint Service Color Guard and Royal Guard, please retire the colors."

At this time, the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and special guests rose for the Retiring of the Colors by the Joint Service Color Guard and the Hawai'i Air National Guard, Royal Guard.

The Speaker stated:

"There being no further business, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 2:49 p.m., Speaker Say declared the Joint Session adjourned.

FORTY-SIXTH DAY

Friday, April 8, 2011

The Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, convened at 11:30 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Kim who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Fifth Day.

At this time, the President introduced the Honorable Calvin K.Y. Say, Speaker of the House of Representatives of the State of Hawai'i.

Senator Shimabukuro, on behalf of the Senate and in conjunction with Governor Abercrombie's proclamation of April 8, 2011, as Agnes Kalanihookaha Cope Day, recognized and honored Agnes Kalanihookaha Cope ("Auntie Aggie") as a true Living Treasure of Hawai'i, and expressed gratitude for her numerous contributions to the people of Hawai'i.

Senator Galuteria introduced other dignitaries who accompanied Auntie Aggie including: from the Dr. Agnes Kalanihookaha Cope Native Hawaiian Traditional Healing Center at the Wai'anae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) Council of Elders—Joseph Hart, Kalena Hew Len, and Keonaona Kalua; from the traditional healers at the WCCHC—Kamaki Kanahale, Helen Lilia Kanawaliwali O'Connor, Uilani Hew Len, and James Lewis; kākō'o—Larry DeRego, Kumu Hula Hokulani DeRego, Al Harrington, and Rosa Harrington; and from the WCCHC administration—Richard P. Bettini, CEO, and Muthukumar Sooriyakumar, Master Copper Artist.

Senator Ryan noted that not only was Auntie Aggie the aunt of former Speaker of the House of Representatives Henry Peters, but also the great-aunt of her husband, and that she was honored to be a part of honoring Auntie Aggie's legacy today.

Senator Shimabukuro welcomed some of the many supporters of Auntie Aggie including: Hardy Spoehr, Gayle Bonham, Babette Galang, and Kim Ku'ulei Birnie from Papa Ola Lōkahi, which Auntie Aggie helped to form; Dede Alo, Jeannin Russo, Keala Nichols, Kaimo Muhlestein, and Capsun Poe from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs; State Representatives Jo Jordan and Karen Awana; and other supporters who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Slom, on behalf of Senator Tokuda and himself, introduced a group of 8 to 12 year old students from TeenPACT Leadership Schools who were seated in the gallery along with Adrian and Joshua Kresnak, children of Senator Espero's legislative aide Sheryll Bonilla.

Senator Slom also introduced guests from McDonald's of Hawai'i including Melanie Okazaki, Marketing Manager for McDonald's Restaurants of Hawai'i, Inc.; Miles Ichinose, owner/operator of McDonald's in Waipahu; and Victor Lim, President of LWD, Inc. dba McDonald's.

Senator Kouchi extended an additional welcome to Melanie Okazaki, a college classmate and first chair of his 1982 election campaign.

Senator Solomon rose to share her aloha with Auntie Aggie and all of her 'ohana, noted how instrumental Auntie Aggie was when the Aloha Spirit Law was being put together, and contemplated the importance of the law. Senator Solomon also noted that two of Auntie Aggie's profound contributions to the law were the ideas that "Aloha is the essence of a relationship in

which each person is important to every other person for collective existence" and "Aloha means to hear what is not said, to see what cannot be seen, and to know the unknowable." She also said how she was often reminded that the spirituality of the kūpuna transcends through our beings, and thanked Auntie Aggie for her tremendous contribution to the Aloha Spirit Law, which will remain with the state and all of its people forever.

At this time, the President presented to the members of the Senate and guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Abercrombie addressed the Senate as follows:

"Well, thank you very much, Mr. President, and aloha everyone. Thank you for your courtesy and kindness in allowing me to take the rostrum here before you today. I am particularly pleased to be able to be on this floor with all of you. It brings back very fond memories to me. Maybe not so fond memories in other instances; I've reacted with a great deal of empathy and understanding when Senator Solomon was talking about our more impetuous days here on this floor. But all of those days were instructive and all of those days, in retrospect now, were days in which our sense of not just who we were but what our obligations and responsibilities were towards Hawai'i were informed by Auntie Aggie. I was just arriving, I think, when reports were given to me about what Auntie intends to do to me if I get impetuous again. Yes, but she forgot to say she'll pull my ears again if need be.

"Suffice to say, and I won't read every part of the proclamation because that's already been essentially well prepared, but for you young folks that are here today and maybe wondering why we're taking this particular period of time to honor this lady, this lady Agnes Cope is the embodiment, as Senator Solomon indicated, of what the aloha spirit is all about. All of us fall far short, more often than we care to admit perhaps to ourselves, with regard to what the aloha spirit calls upon us to be and to do. But there is always a signal standard set by Aggie Cope. We measure ourselves against that standard.

"More than 35 years ago now, when I had the opportunity in the House (Jo, Karen, and others who are here, and Senator Shimabukuro who was just recently coming from the House), we formed the Culture and Arts Committee in the State House. Much of what you see taking place here today in terms of the cultural and artistic expression of the aloha spirit is because of Aggie Cope. She was the guiding mentor to us in the Legislature of deciding where we needed to go with culture and artistic expression of what aloha spirit was all about. Finally, I have an extraordinary privilege in this life. All of us revere and hope that we live up to what is expected of us by our mothers and our fathers, but particularly our mothers. And I have the great good fortune in this life to have had not just one mother, but two. When people ask me, 'Well, has your mother passed,' I am able to say to them with a smile on my face and really with a song in my heart, 'Well, one of them has, and I have still with me then my mother's sister: my mother Agnes Cope.' Mahalo nui."

At 11:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

"Development" does not include the following:

- (1) Construction of a single-family residence that is not part of a larger development; provided that a single-family residence that is situated on a tax map key parcel that is subject to a shoreline setback shall be included in the definition of a "development";
- (2) Repair or maintenance of roads and highways within existing rights-of-way;
- (3) Routine maintenance dredging of existing streams, channels, and drainage ways;
- (4) Repair and maintenance of underground utility lines, including but not limited to water, sewer, power, and telephone and minor appurtenant structures such as pad mounted transformers and sewer pump stations;
- (5) Zoning variances, except for height, density, parking, and shoreline setback;
- (6) Repair, maintenance, or interior alterations to existing structures;
- (7) Demolition or removal of structures, except those structures located on any historic site as designated in national or state registers;
- (8) Use of any land for the purpose of cultivating, planting, growing, and harvesting plants, crops, trees, and other agricultural, horticultural, or forestry products or animal husbandry, or aquaculture or mariculture of plants or animals, or other agricultural purposes;
- (9) Transfer of title to land;

(10) Creation or termination of easements, covenants, or other rights in structures or land;

(11) Preliminary or tentative subdivision approval;

~~(12)~~ (12) Subdivision of land into lots greater than twenty acres in size;

~~(13)~~ (13) Subdivision of a parcel of land into four or fewer parcels when no associated construction activities are proposed; provided that any land which is so subdivided shall not thereafter qualify for this exception with respect to any subsequent subdivision of any of the resulting parcels;

~~(14)~~ (14) Installation of underground utility lines and appurtenant aboveground fixtures less than four feet in height along existing corridors;

~~(15)~~ (15) Structural and nonstructural improvements to existing single-family residences, where otherwise permissible;

provided that whenever the authority finds that any excluded use, activity, or operation may have a cumulative impact, or a significant environmental or ecological effect on a special management area, that use, activity, or operation shall be defined as "development" for the purpose of this part."

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 117, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, is amended by adding a new section 4 to part 1 to amend section 205A-29(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to clarify that a county agency may authorize a development without first obtaining approval under chapter 205A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and to read as follows:

"SECTION 4. Section 205A-29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

"(b) ~~No~~ An agency authorized to issue permits pertaining to any development within the special management area ~~shall~~ may authorize any development ~~[unless approval is first received]~~ in accordance with the procedures adopted pursuant to this part. For the purposes of this subsection, county general plan, state land use district boundary amendments, and zoning changes are not permits."

- (1) An individual filer with federal adjusted gross income of \$70,000 or more;
- (2) A head of household with federal adjusted gross income of \$105,000 or more; and
- (3) A joint or surviving spouse filer with federal adjusted gross income of \$140,000 or more.”

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the Part II designation and Part II contents of the bill.

SECTION 5. House Bill No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering Section 5 as Section 2, and amending it to read as follows:

“SECTION 2. Section 235-2.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (h) to read as follows:

“(h) Section 164 (with respect to taxes) of the Internal Revenue Code shall be operative for the purposes of this chapter, except that [sections]:

- (1) Sections 164(a)(6) and 164(b)(6) shall not be operative for the purposes of this chapter[-]; and
- (2) The deductions under sections 164(a)(3) and 164(b)(5) shall not be operative for corporate taxpayers and shall be operative only for the following individual taxpayers:
 - (A) A taxpayer filing a single return or a married person filing separately with a federal adjusted gross income of less than \$70,000;
 - (B) A taxpayer filing as a head of household with a federal adjusted gross income of less than \$105,000; and
 - (C) A taxpayer filing a joint return or as a surviving spouse with a federal adjusted gross income of less than \$140,000.”

SECTION 6. House Bill No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the Part IV designation.

SECTION 7. House Bill No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering Section 6 as Section 3.

SECTION 8. House Bill No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering Section 7 as Section 4, and amending it to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2117, and shall apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2010.”

Senator Hee moved that Floor Amendment No. 5 be adopted, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Colleagues, the reason for this floor amendment is I believe that taxing government retirees is contrary to the Hawai‘i State Constitution. I would like to enter into the Journal the following remarks. This regards a letter dated March 18, 2011, from the attorney general regarding H.B. No. 1092, H. D. 1, Relating to

Taxation. I will read the salient parts of the opinion which has caused me to offer this amendment.

“The attorney general says in part, ‘We are alerting you that House Draft 1 could be the subject of a constitutional, legal attack. Should this bill become law in its present form, it could be challenged. The outcome would not be certain. It could take years to litigate the issue through the Hawai‘i court system.’ In paragraph three, the attorney general continues, ‘We are bringing the possibility of a legal challenge to your attention for the sole purpose of making sure that you have as much information as possible available to you as you consider this bill.’ He continues on page two, where the attorney general says, ‘It could be the potential subject of a legal challenge on the grounds that they may violate’—meaning this bill—‘Article XVI, Section 2, of the Hawai‘i Constitution, or may impair the contractual clause of the United States Constitution.’ The attorney general points out that Section 2 of the Article XVI of the Hawai‘i Constitution provides that ‘membership in any employees retirement system of the state or any political subdivision thereof shall be a contractual relationship, the accrued benefits of which shall not be diminished or impaired.’ He notes that ‘in a case in Oregon, where the Oregon Legislature attempted a similar effort to tax retirement pensions in a case brought before the Oregon Supreme Court entitled *Hughes v. State*, that the court held that the Oregon Legislature’s amendment of that provision to remove the exemption breached the retirement system contracted by taxing retirement benefits of work accrued or accruing before the change in the law. Recent Hawai‘i Supreme Court decisions suggest that holding in the Hughes decision, while not binding, might be found persuasive by Hawai‘i courts.’ The attorney general notes that our Supreme Court’s stated, ‘the framer’s intent underlying article XVI, section 2, of the Hawai‘i Constitution was to deprive the Legislature of the right to reduce benefits of state employees as to past services to the state.’ All of you know that the Everson case is presently under litigation, although it does not deal directly with the right of the Legislature to diminish accrued benefits. It appears to me that given the advice stated in the opinion of the attorney general, it is prudent for us to remove section 1 of the bill, which this amendment seeks to do.

“I would further note, Mr. President, that in addition to state and county retirees, there are private sector retirees, and this amendment seeks to remove the tax on those pensions as well. And I would say it simply that if one were to look, as I have been told by elders, with respect to the Hawaiian Homes Commission, ‘a Hawaiian is a Hawaiian regardless whether he is 50 percent or otherwise.’ In this case, all retirees should be treated equitably. I believe that this is the right and proper thing to do and is a reflection of the Senate’s position with respect to this issue.

“While I fully appreciate that there may be some impact on the proposal with respect to the income that may be generated, I would note that the latest version by the Committee on Ways and Means would generate zero income and the H.D. 1 that was offered by the Committee on Judiciary would generate but a half million dollars or so. Nonetheless, in part two of the bill, the House sent to the Senate Committee on Judiciary the taxation for those people who itemize their deductions. When the bill came to the Judiciary Committee in the Senate, the House had pegged the amount at 4.1 percent. The Committee on Judiciary and Labor raised that percentage to 6.7 percent, which would have generated \$33.2 million. In this amendment, the amendment proposes to raise the percentage to 9.7 percent, which would generate almost \$40 million.

“I would like to briefly explain the methodology for those who have asked me. This calculation is done after taxpayers calculate their federal adjusted gross income. Once you take

that figure, if your federal adjusted gross income is more than \$70,000 for a single filer, then no itemized deduction can be taken for state taxes paid. I would note that this only affects people who itemize their deductions. This does not affect people who do standardized deductions. Lastly, for the edification of those interested, there are 535,996 tax returns filed; 9.7 percent is the equivalent of 51,856 tax returns. Lastly, I would note that this philosophy is, for me, it is formulated on the promise made that the more you make, the more you pay. This will impact the highest of the income earners, the 9.7 percent, and will not impact 90.3 percent. Members, I would ask for your support with this amendment.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 5 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Hee then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1239 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ige and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1092, H.D. 1, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 14, 2011.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1253 (H.B. No. 922, S.D. 2):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1253 be adopted and H.B. No. 922, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Hee then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 6) to H.B. No. 922, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 922, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the Part I designation.

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 922, S.D. 2, is amended by amending page 1, line 8, to read as follows:

“The purpose of this Act is to expand the potential”

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 922, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the Part II designation and contents in Part II of the bill.

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 922, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the Part III designation.

SECTION 5. House Bill No. 922, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering Section 9 as Section 3 and Section 10 as Section 4.

Senator Hee moved that Floor Amendment No. 6 be adopted, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The amendment proposes to delete part two of the bill, which in essence is S.B. No. 2. We have been advised that Senate Bill No. 2 has passed the House Finance Committee and will be acted upon today.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 6 was put by the Chair and carried, with Senators Gabbard, Ryan, and Slom voting “No.”

Senator Hee then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1253 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried.

By unanimous consent, action on H.B. No. 922, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 14, 2011.

At 9:41 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 9:42 a.m.

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

H.B. No. 680, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 680, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 7) to H.B. No. 680, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 680, S.D. 1, is amended by replacing the language in the new section titled “Kakaako makai community development subdistrict; power to develop established” with new language to read as follows:

“§206E- Kakaako makai community development subdistrict; power to develop established. (a) The Hawaii community development authority shall act as the local development authority to facilitate the development of the Kakaako makai community development subdistrict in accordance with the Kakaako makai area plan, and the cultural public market pursuant to section 206E-34.

(b) Three additional voting members shall be appointed to the authority by the governor pursuant to subsection 206E-3(b) to represent the Kakaako makai community development subdistrict. These members shall be considered in determining quorum and majority only on issues relating to the Kakaako makai community development subdistrict, and may vote only on issues relating to the Kakaako makai community development subdistrict. The three additional voting members shall consist of:

- (1) One member from a list of four recommendations provided by the local governing body for the subdistrict; and**
- (2) Two members representing public recreation, cultural, and arts organizations or business interests that have participated in the community master-planning process in the Kakaako makai community development subdistrict.”**

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 680, S.D. 1, is amended by inserting a new Section 2 to amend section 206E-3(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to revise the composition of the Hawaii Community Development Authority and to read as follows:

“SECTION 2. Section 206E-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

“(b) The authority shall consist of thirteen voting members. The director of finance, the director of business, economic development, and tourism, the comptroller, and the director of transportation, or their respective designated representatives shall serve as ex officio, voting members. One member shall be appointed by the governor from a list of not less than three prospective appointees submitted by the president of the senate, and one member shall be appointed by the governor from a list of not less than three prospective appointees submitted by the speaker of the house of representatives. Seven members shall be appointed by the governor for staggered terms pursuant to section 26-34; provided that four members shall be appointed at large and, initially, three members, hereinafter referred to as county members, shall be selected from a list of ten prospective appointees recommended by the local governing body of the county in which the initial designated district is situated; and provided further that when vacancies occur in any of the three positions for which the members were selected from a list of county recommendations, the governor shall fill such vacancies on the basis of one from a list of four recommendations, two

from a list of seven recommendations, or three from a list of ten recommendations. The list of recommendations shall be made by the local governing body of the county. Of the nine members appointed either by the governor from the lists provided by the president of the senate and speaker of the house, at-large by the governor, or as county members recommended by the local governing body of the county in which the initial designated district is situated, ~~at least two members~~ one member shall be the director of the city and county of Honolulu department of planning and permitting and one member shall represent small businesses and shall be designated as the small business ~~representatives~~ representative on the board whose purpose, among other things, is to vote on matters before the board that affect small businesses. The small business ~~representatives~~ representative shall be ~~owners~~ an owner or an active ~~managers~~ manager of a small business with its principal place of operation located within the physical boundaries of the initial designated district. Notwithstanding section 84-14(a), the small business ~~representatives~~ representative shall not be prohibited from voting on any matter concerning any district under the board's jurisdiction; provided that the matter is not limited to solely benefiting the specific interest of that member and the matter concerns broader interests within the district. If an additional district is designated by the legislature, the total membership of the authority shall be increased as prescribed above by the appointment of three additional members, except as provided for in section 206E-191. Notwithstanding section 92-15, a majority of all members shall constitute a quorum to do business, and the concurrence of a majority of all members shall be necessary to make any action of the authority valid; ~~except~~ provided that, on any matter relating solely to a specific community development district, the members representing districts other than that specific community development district shall neither vote, nor shall they be counted to constitute a quorum, and concurrence shall be required of a majority of that portion of the authority made up of all ex officio voting members, members at large, and county and district members representing the district for which action is being proposed for such action to be valid. All members shall continue in office until their respective successors have been appointed and qualified. Except as herein provided, no member appointed under this subsection shall be an officer or employee of the State or its political subdivisions.

For ~~{}~~{}purposes~~}~~} of this section, "small business" means a business which is independently owned and which is not dominant in its field of operation."''

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 680, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering Sections 2 and 3 as Sections 3 and 4, respectively.

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 680, S.D. 1, is amended by replacing the language in section 206E-7(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, in Section 4 of the bill with new language to read as follows:

"(b) For the Kakaako community development district, the authority shall also adopt rules, pursuant to chapter 91, on the subdivision of lands that, upon adoption, shall supersede all other inconsistent ordinances and rules relating to the subdivision of lands in the Kakaako community development district; provided that the authority may issue interim rules by directive, pursuant to chapter 91, that shall be effective for not more than eighteen months."

SECTION 5. House Bill No. 680, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering Sections 4, 5, and 6 as Sections 5, 6, and 7, respectively.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 7 be adopted, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"The floor amendment allows the director of planning and permitting to be a voting member of the board, and would allow one of the three Kaka'ako makai subdistrict members to be selected by the governor from a list of four by the local governing body. The amendment also would require the authority to adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 7 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 680, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO KAKA'AKO," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 14, 2011.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Ige moved that H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"This measure is the executive biennium budget. Allow me to first acknowledge a number of people that have been instrumental to the work of the Ways and Means Committee over the past few months. You know, it definitely has been a challenge, but as we all know, a capable staff really working efficiently allows all of us to do our jobs. So, if you could hold your applause until everyone is introduced. The staff is lead by WAM's committee clerk Tony Valdez. The budget staff includes Budget Chief Rod Becker, Will Kane heading up CIP, Amy Sojot, Daniel Truong, Mark Inamasu, Michelle Scala, Nicole Masaki, and Susan Hirai. And on the bills side: Alan Sarhan, Daniel Holt, Cory Tanida, Melissa Ardo, and Sohal Moten. And a few familiar faces from in my office: Joyce Kami, Joanne Ishikawa, Kyle Monette, Megan Kami, Gail Ogawa, and Kanoe Kaaihue. Members, they often work in the windowless offices and cubicles next to the WAM staff room, and they are allowed out once a year to be recognized, so if you could all give them an applause.

"Mr. President, I also would like to thank you and your staff for your guidance and support you have provided as we worked through this challenging economic times. I am deeply appreciative to the members of the Legislature, the numerous representatives of the many executive agencies, the countless members of the public that have shared their concerns and worked with this committee in a positive manner. I would also like to thank my vice chair and the members of the Ways and Means Committee for their input, insight, and understanding of the challenge before us in balancing the budget and providing some fiscal policy for the state in moving forward.

"I believe we are all aware of what confronts us: it is how to address the budget shortfall currently projected to be \$1.3 billion through the upcoming fiscal biennium. This follows two consecutive years whereby the Legislature has had to close deficits of \$2.1 billion and \$1.2 billion, respectively. Colleagues, the executive budget is the largest component of the state's financial plan. Unfortunately, as the economy struggles, the demand for public services explodes. Let's be clear about the need to appropriate additional general funds for the current biennium. The state has had the fortune of being able to rely on significant amounts of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) funds, which are being used to supplant general funds for spending for education. ARRA also currently provides a substantially enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentages for Medicaid and other services provided by the

Department of Human Services and the Department of Health which provides services for what we call the 'safety net' for those least able to afford. Further, the prior administration unilaterally undertook a number of actions that are not fiscally sustainable. This includes massive restructuring of debt that, although provided immediate savings, has necessitated higher debt service payments for the upcoming biennium and beyond.

"The prior administration also reduced Medicaid benefits for COFA migrants, an action that a federal court has ordered to be reversed. Moreover, the prior administration's spending practices on temporary assistance for needy family contracts have left its reserve account insolvent. The need to now account for expenditures like these with general funds is principally what drives increases in the budget. Who among us would propose cutting \$60 million per year from education simply for the fact that we are unable to supplant this amount with federal funds for the current biennium? Is anyone willing to state for the state to default on debt service payments or defy a court order?"

"Anticipated reductions in FMAP and increases in enrollments require that a half a billion dollars in general funds be added for Medicaid services over the biennium. How many of us are willing to deny medical services to our most vulnerable residents as a means to close the deficit? Aside from the nondiscretionary expenses such as these is labor, the largest component of the state budget.

"This measure before us is premised on the need to maintain labor savings in the same amount assumed in the current fiscal year. It does not require an extension of the furloughs that have impacted government services. Indeed, it is expected that those negotiating collective bargaining agreements find creative solutions that yield savings and allow our government to maintain programs that are in great public demand. However, in recognition of the importance of educating Hawai'i's children, this measure restores funding needed to maintain the current level of instructional days for students. With regards to teachers, the funding provided in this measure assumes that collective bargaining negotiations would yield an agreement that resembles the one currently in place.

"Resources provided for state programs have significantly declined over the past two years. However, declining revenue projections now necessitate further spending reductions. Thus, this measure reduces \$30.3 million per year in positions that are currently vacant. These reductions are based largely on the amount of funds currently authorized for vacant positions in programs and allow agencies the flexibility to prioritize spending and hire personnel that may be in critical need. Additionally, no reductions were made to certain programs such as the plant quarantine program and the state library system that have broad impact on our economy and our quality of life.

"The adjustments made by this measure to the executive budget as proposed by the governor result in the reduction of \$277.3 million for fiscal year 2012 and \$376.9 million for fiscal year 2013. This is a reduction of about \$654.2 million over the fiscal biennium or about half the amount needed to close the budget gap. It is without doubt that the financial health of the state cannot be restored through spending cuts alone. Mr. President, your Committee on Ways and Means considered all of the recommendations received in the development of this measure. Colleagues, this is a responsible expenditure plan that maintains essential state services and contains spending reductions representative of half of the amount needed to bridge the budget gap. I invite your continued support and consideration as we work through the budget requirements in the last few days of session. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"Colleagues, I rise in opposition to this budget. And first of all, let me say I have a great deal of respect for not only the chairman, the committee, and all of those staff members who worked very hard, and we see their work every day. You know, every year we've gone through this same procedure; and every year the minority has neglected to mention its own folks who have worked on the budget, worked very quietly but also importantly to not only analyze budget figures, to try and look at the worksheets, to attend all of the hearings, but also to provide an alternative budget. And so with your permission, Mr. President, I would like to acknowledge all of our folks that worked on the budget this year and that you can hold your applause. First of all, over here, our budget chief Arik Look, and Carlotta Amerino, and up in the gallery Troy Thompson and Herb Laybon and Lauren Rogan. Give them a hand, please.

"And the reason I say that is because they work very hard and our problem is doubly difficult in trying to look at all of the numbers, trying to balance all of the requests and demands and needs. And yet, I would say even though the chairman of Ways and Means has outlined the cuts that were made, let's be very clear: these cuts are made to the increases from the executive branch, so that in fact—so that we all understand this clearly—if we took the base budget from the last administration, which is the budget that the new administration has to work on, if we took that amount and then we look at what the executive increased that, the cuts that are discussed are cuts to the increases. And this is what confuses a lot of people. And so, when we talk about bare bones cuts and programs and individuals being cut off from services, it's really not a true and accurate picture. What we have talked about are cuts to the increases. We have not gone back as every single mom, every family, every small business has had to do and cut what they actually are expending. Their demands remain important, but they understand that they can't do it. And yet we in government, their elected representatives, have shown that we haven't done it either.

"We can talk euphemistically about all of the things that we have done to bring this budget in line, and as the good chairman of the Ways and Means did point out, we've gone through now four successive years of very difficult and challenging times. And the last administration was faced with a \$2.1 billion deficit, a \$1.2 billion deficit, and we managed to do that by a number of ways, not all of which were popular and not all of which were painless, but we did that. We're looking at this new budget right now and we're really not in balance—which is required and by the end of the day and the end of the session, that's what has to happen—but most importantly, while the chairman says that everyone is now aware of our problems, I don't think that's quite accurate. I don't think everyone really and truly is aware of the significance of the economic challenges facing us. We talk about other states, and we deride other states for some of the things that they have done, but they don't have any other choices at this point. Their day of reckoning has come. They've run out of money. They've run out of borrowing power. They've run out of the ability even to take care of their core services. And while I certainly agree that's what we have to do (is take care of our core services, we have to keep to our promises that we have made to all of our residents including our public employees), we have to change our course. And there has been an absolute reluctance to do that.

"Our President has talked for three years now about hope and change, and this state remains the state with the least amount of changes, particularly in budgetary and fiscal policies. We are faced with a situation that demands—that requires—that we have the political backbone to change the culture of spending, taxation, and debt. And, unfortunately, this budget as proposed right now—and I understand we still have a lot of negotiating—this budget will not do that. I do not see signals from the House

for a change, and I do not see the significant amount of changes that need be done from our Senate budget. The chair of the Ways and Means said we cannot balance the budget by cuts alone. I would challenge that statement. We came up with an alternative budget last week. We introduced it, we detailed it, and it called for about \$4 billion in cuts. No tax increases, no additional putting off of tax refunds or anything of that nature, just straight looking at various programs and departments. And we do find that they are top heavy. We do find that further significant cuts can be made. They're not made, however, because we have a legion of people. They come down to our legislature or camp out here from January through May. They are very well educated. They are very well articulated. And they all have a particular and special point of view. They do not, however, recognize or represent the vast majority of people within our state who look to us and say, 'Who speaks for us? Who is providing an alternative to more taxation, more spending?'

"And I would challenge our body, and particularly when we go into our negotiations with the House, to really seriously look at this: how can we continue to do what we're doing, year after year (borrowing, going further into debt, taxing the people more), and just barely, if that, balancing our budget? We're having a hard time closing out fiscal year '11 which ends in three months. And then fiscal '12 and '13 under this budget would just barely budget for those two years without providing for a change in plan and looking to the future. And this is not something new. It didn't just happen. It didn't happen with the stock market crash alone. It did not happen with the Japanese situation, or the Middle East, or anything else. We can go back to the years with former Governor Cayetano when he called for major civil service and collective bargaining reform. And yet we didn't do anything. We didn't change our policies. We added more benefits, more costs. That's why 70 percent of our budget is labor costs. And now we see that the new administration and a new government has taken a tack of unilaterally negotiating. We saw the first contract last week and it was hailed as a five percent cut. When we looked at it in detail and specifically, it wasn't a cut at all. It's an increase. It gives more days off to one group of public workers. And even now designates them as 'most favored nation' so we have a nation within a nation. We talking about sovereignty, but we already have a nation; it's called the HGEA. These are all additional costs. So we're not coming to grips with the idea of cutting significant costs. Again, I will reiterate: I believe in prioritizing and meeting our core and essential needs, but not all of those needs are essential. And just because a group of people or even individuals come before us and say, 'We demand this' or 'we need this,' it does not make it so. Sometimes you have to stand up and say, 'no.' That's the mark of true leadership. We know what will happen if we continue to go in this same direction, and we have not made a significant change here. And that's why I'm voting against the budget today. We're got to make a statement. We've got to do it at sometime. This is the time. This is the place.

"So, Mr. President and Mr. Chairman, we understand that we're under challenging times, and we probably are going to have additional challenges and more difficulties in the future. And that's why it's extremely important for us at this point to change the direction that we're in, to make sure that we finally, as painful as it may be, make a choice and say, 'We want to be more self-sufficient.' We talk about sustainability all the time in our legislative body and we're very proud about many of the things that we've done and the initiatives. But if we can't have sustainability in our finances, and if our residents are not secure in their pensions, their incomes, their buying power, and their standard of living, then in fact we do not have sustainability. So, I would urge the members of this body to look very carefully at what we're doing and what we're saying, the

message that we're saying to the public, the message that 'well, change is good for other people, but not for us.' We've got to have that change and that change is now. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"A well-maintained physical infrastructure of state facilities is essential to maintaining a positive business climate and a strong economic foundation which will ultimately help to support the state's ability to navigate through the current and future precarious economic conditions. To combat the effects of the current economic difficulties and work towards positive growth, the continued investment in our economy is necessary. Investment in infrastructure and facilities is crucial for economic growth and job creation. Additional and increased investment in education, technology, communications, health care facilities, energy and transportation, as well as other needs must also be examined to ensure sustained, long-term economic recovery and growth for our state and its residents. Accordingly, the administration's capital improvement program biennium budget provided a total of \$1.47 billion for projects funded by general obligation and general obligation reimbursable bonds and \$2.67 billion for all projects funded by all means of financing. The Senate, after carefully considering the proposals needs and priorities of the administration and the departments, has provided a total of \$1.64 billion for projects funded by GO and GOR bonds and \$2.96 billion for projects funded by all means of financing. Specific areas include education: \$72 million for repair and maintenance for badly needed repairs to our current schools, \$50 million for electrical and technological upgrades, \$25 million to upgrade our high school science labs, for the UH System \$96 million for repairs and maintenance which is part of our six year plan to reduce the maintenance backlog, \$32 million to invest in the community college system which has seen its enrollment grow considerably. Each investment of \$1 million of CIP produces or returns 12.9 direct or indirect jobs. In health, we have \$56 million for repair, maintenance and upgrades at our community hospitals and Department of Health system. State facility renovations: \$33 million to renovate state-owned properties which will reduce our general fund expenditures and utilize current resources more effectively.

"Mr. Chair, I would be remiss if I didn't thank Chair Ige for his leadership; also, my colleagues for their patience. As a first timer trying to do a CIP budget, I do appreciate your patience. And I would also be remiss if I didn't thank the hardworking WAM staff. If they look a little pale, they haven't seen the light of day for 10 weeks. So, thank you, colleagues."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Creating a balanced budget during such fiscally austere times is extremely difficult, and I want to commend the Ways and Means chair and vice chair on not only doing this, but seeking to preserve those priorities the Senate has always embraced. Speaking specifically to the budgets of both the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i, I believe our message is clear: education matters. To that end, our budget proposal includes \$60.8 million in each year of the biennium to maintain instructional days and to say 'no' to more Furlough Fridays. Committed to educational access for all, especially in the face of a depressed economy, our budget chose to restore the \$6.6 million for our community colleges that are working overtime to be that gateway to thousands of new, traditional and non-traditional students each year. And though restrictions and target restorations were very much the order of the day, our budget is also clearly focused on the future. While cuts will get us through these deficit years, it is our investments that will determine what our future will be.

“Recognizing that strategically investing in education will yield the highest return for our people and our state, I applaud the Senate’s support for such programs as Nā Pua No’eau, the Office of Mauna Kea Management, and the Challenger Center. Whether it is making college a reality for a Native Hawaiian student, laying the groundwork for job creation and booming knowledge-based industries and research on the island of Hawai’i and across our state, or teaching our children that their dreams should not be limited to the boundaries of this earth, investments like these will make a difference in people’s lives. Also understanding where learning takes place, our budget reflects our goal to preserve and protect funds of the classroom and school level. While this has meant that tough choices and sacrifices had to be made elsewhere, I believe we did our best to focus resources where they are most needed. That being said, there are some cuts that I also would hope we’ll be able to at least partially restore going forward, but I truly appreciate the ability to have deliberated on these areas and respect the thoughtfulness that went into these very difficult decisions.

“Lean, yet forward thinking, our education budget makes clear that if we are going to be forced to make the tough decisions as to where to cut and where to spend, everyone involved must be held accountable to ensure that we maximize and properly utilize our resources. While some may object to contracts not being funded due to questions over constantly increasing costs, specific program ID is being created to better track resources or provisos levied to ensure transparency these are tax dollars and we have an obligation to do what is necessary to ensure that these funds are being used responsibly. As resources continue to be scarce and many more difficult decisions loom on the horizon, I again commend the work of our Ways and Means chair, his team, and your committee and stand in strong support of our budget that clearly makes the education of our children and our people a top priority. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“Just very briefly, as your health chair, I wanted to commend the committees for taking action on some critical service areas, particularly restoring funds to developmentally disabilities, adult mental health, and children’s mental health services. These are critical services that saw it cuts that were too severe during times of difficulty for the state, and restoring these moneys is going to make us a better society. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“I, too, rise in support of the budget, Mr. President, but I would like to make some remarks to beyond the issues that were discussed on this floor today.

“I was here at the time in the State Legislature when we actually had surplus dollars, and this was in the ‘80s; and we were looking at anywhere between \$600 to \$1.2 billion of surplus money. How did we get to that point? We got to that point simply because the neighbor islands experienced a tremendous economic growth. At that time, we were developing the Kohala coast and Kā’anapali, Maui. And the reason I bring this to your attention, Mr. President, is because this is exactly what we should be focusing on in this body. There is no way, Mr. President, that we can continue this way with our state budget simply because 70 to 75 percent of our state budget is fixed cost. Whether we’re paying labor, whether we’re paying benefits, whether we’re paying mortgage and debt, the way out of this dilemma is we have to start to restructure our programs. We have to look at stimulating the economy. We need the revitalization of O’ahu and the urban core. We have to

streamline permitting. APEC is an excellent opportunity for us to secure some time. This body should secure time in the schedule so that we in fact can make a presentation as to what our vision is going to be in terms of our future so we can secure investments.

“We need to start looking at the possibilities, start looking at the state’s potential in a positive light: the glass is not half empty; it is half full. Clean energy, Mr. President; it’s something that this body can definitely look into and we should support. Education, private-public partnerships. We had resolutions that we had discussed in this body way in the ‘80s of looking at Kamehameha Schools, for example. The Bishop Estate Kamehameha Schools, with a total aggregate based in the billions of dollars, that they should be, in fact, cost sharing the cost of Hawaiians that are being educated in the public school system. We had resolutions for consideration: 51 percent of student enrollment if they are of Native Hawaiian ancestry, Kamehameha Schools should be supporting. They should be in a partnership, a relationship with our public school system to be able to put up necessary dollars to help fund these educational programs. How is this done? This is done through looking at the way our unions work, looking at contracts, looking at a new direction to advance these ideas. We discussed in great length in the late ‘80s about the whole issue of deployment. This is something that we can look at where we can get more flexibility to our department heads so they in fact can deploy their personnel within their respective departments. These are the kinds of issues that this body should be considering over the interim.

“We should be revisiting the autonomy that we gave the University of Hawai’i. I feel very strongly about this. How they handle all of their budgets; 600 special funds is not something that we should take lightly. I think it’s something that we should be investigating, as to where these moneys are going and how they’re spent. Tax exemptions, of course, Mr. President, is another consideration that we should be looking at. The problem and the pilikia that we are facing today, Mr. President, is that Hawai’i’s economy is working against families, and I think that this is something that this body should seriously take into consideration. The fear that I have for our future is we’re going to have the brightest and the best leaving the State of Hawai’i. And why? So they can seek the opportunities that they are entitled to have.

“So with these thoughts in mind, Mr. President, again I am supporting the efforts of the Ways and Means Committee simply because it was almost an impossible task; and the only way that we can solve our problems is we have to rejuvenate and stimulate our economy. Thank you very much.”

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“Listening to everything and having sat here for four months, I fondly look back to that early January day when I was told we only had to find \$700 million. It seemed like such a huge number then, but I wish that those happy days were here again.

“With that as a prelude, I would like to thank the chair and vice chair of Ways and Means and all of their staff because it has been a daunting task. And what hasn’t been talked about is what has brought us here today. In a lot of the solving of the problems that we faced over the last three years, the previous administration had the opportunity to use funds that were built up during the prosperous times. What we inherited was a \$230 to \$240 million tab to simply close the end of this fiscal year before we even begin to wrestle with the problems facing us in the biennium. The only solution available to us is to deplete every single last dollar of reserve, to freeze all vacant positions, and to get further cuts of 10 percent from each of the departments to meet the challenges in this fiscal year. Because

of that, we will start the next fiscal year with no cash reserves. And we are like every homeowner out there living paycheck to paycheck, hoping to meet our bills, each and every month at the end of the month, but facing very uncertain times. And that's the task that the Ways and Means Chair had to deal with and the members of the committee. And what do we keep? What choices do we make in our household?

"I agree with the Education Chair. We are a state of immigrants. We have had people who have come here and toiled on the plantation fields, harvesting sugarcane and pineapples, being housekeepers, janitors, and groundskeepers so that they could send their children to school. And they recognized, as immigrants, that education created the ladder of opportunity for their children to rise up and to create a better life for them and to create a better Hawai'i for each and every one of us. In my lifetime, I've had the privilege to listen to Ellison Onizuka after he returned from his first mission in space. Listening to him talk to the children of Hawai'i and marveled that Mr. Onizuka, a young boy born from immigrants, barefoot in the coffee fields of Kona, could one day rise and reach the stars and tell our children that through education everything is possible. I have had the privilege of living in the neighborhood where General Eric Shinseki grew up, and he rose to become the Commander of the Army or the Armed Forces of the United States of America. Both of them matriculated through the public education system here in Hawai'i.

"If we are going to create the economic opportunities that my colleague from the Big Island has talked about, support for our community colleges are essential because most of us don't have the money to send our children to four-year universities right away. We need to be sure that the infrastructure is there so we can continue to support and encourage our best and our brightest. And so in the budget that the chair has put forward, there are no reductions to instructional time because he recognizes along with his committee that this is going to continue to give our children the opportunity to succeed.

"You've heard from my other colleague across the way from the Big Island how important it is to care for those who cannot care for themselves. That's one of the reasons why I first ran. And so if I'm raising taxes to take care of those who are disadvantaged, I stand guilty before you and my colleagues today, guilty with pride. And so, that's the second point in the budget. And last and most importantly, I have not campaigned with any of you before, but when I campaign on Kaua'i, I always make it a point to say, 'I'd like to thank those who came before me, those who sacrificed, those who labored, and those who fought, who have given me the opportunities that I enjoy today, and the benefits that my family enjoys.' And so, I'd lastly like to thank both the Judiciary Chair and the Ways and Means Chair for finding a way. Do not put the burden of continuing to provide new services on our seniors who have worked so hard to create the Hawai'i we have today, and that we'll be able to tell them, 'Thank you very much for everything that you have done and everything that you have given us.' Thank you."

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Like families in Hawai'i, state government needs and has cut our household budget significantly. Unlike a typical family, our state 'ohana has needed to help thousands of additional family members during this difficult time period. The prolonged economic recession has fostered exponential growth in the demand for social services, the reduction in force eliminated 365 positions across the Department of Human Services, creating backlogs and limiting contract oversight in a number of programs. As health care costs continue to rise and enrollment levels climb, addressing the Medicaid shortfall remains a

daunting task. The MedQUEST Division has accommodated a 25 percent enrollment increase while managing a 40 percent staff reduction and monthly furloughs. These economic circumstances are further exacerbated by carryover deficits from the previous administration's delayed payments strategy. Medicaid plays a vital role in the lives of more than 20 percent of Hawai'i's residents at this time. In an effort to continue delivering needed medical services to Hawai'i's vulnerable population, the Ways and Means Committee provided an additional \$248.2 million in fiscal year 2011-2012, and \$288.2 million in fiscal year 2012-2013, which will be matched with federal dollars to fund health care payments for Medicaid beneficiaries. However, the budget bill before us does reflect the Governor's proposal to save \$150 million over the next fiscal biennium.

"Your Human Services Committee, along with the health care community and Medicaid administrators are exploring possible reduction to Medicaid benefits, streamlining and improving efficiencies through technology, focusing on improved patient-centered practices, and focusing on wellness models that have effectively resulted in patients improving their health outcomes and reducing their need for medication and other expensive health care services. During these challenging economic times of job loss and the first of the baby boomers reaching age 65 this year, 2011, coupled with an anticipated decrease in the federal medical assistance percentage reimbursement, or FMAP, the demand for government assistance in the health care arena must be managed well to maximize our state's resources for the benefit of Hawai'i's residents.

"Mahalo to the Ways and Means Committee for supporting an appropriation of \$70,400 in general funds, an expenditure to implement the Electronic Health Fund Incentive Program which will receive \$668,232 in federal matching funds. This will incent health care professionals statewide to convert their offices to electronic health records systems. Like the Senate where we strategically invested in computer technology over a three-year period to manage information and realizing a 30 percent savings in operational costs, I predict that the health care industry will realize significant savings in operational costs with the use of electronic health records. Hawai'i also has an excellent opportunity to modernize its archaic Medicaid information system and improve the Department of Human Services' ability to deliver services in a more efficient manner and improve access to health care services to Medicaid beneficiaries. Ways and Means has appropriated \$2.9 million in general funds to receive \$26.5 million in matching federal funds for a new MedQUEST division computer-based eligibility system. The new system will support Medicaid staff in their work to service the public more efficiently and provide timely and useful information on patient care, health outcomes, and ensure in the health care provider performance. The new system will also enhance improved efficiencies in other parts of DHS and state government that interface with the Medicaid program. Congress enacted the federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act in 1996. At that time, the United States government made the decision to no longer extend medical benefits to members of the Compact of Free Association, or COFA as we refer, and gave individual states the choice to continue Medicaid services to COFA members with the understanding that they would no longer receive federal support for this population. Given Hawai'i's unique location and high concentration of COFA members, the decision was made to provide COFA members the same Medicaid package offered to similarly situated Hawai'i residents. In 2010, the previous administration attempted to achieve cost savings by moving the COFA population to a limited plan entitled, 'Basic Health Hawai'i' which offered limited visits and reduced the types of services available to

COFA beneficiaries. On December 13, 2010, a federal court found this change caused irreparable harm to COFA residents and issued an injunction mandating the state to re-enroll all COFA members to their original programs, reinstate the benefits, and expedite delivery of services.

“Your committees recognize the immediate effects of this ruling and accepted the Governor’s proposal to appropriate \$13.2 million in general funds to reinstate Medicaid benefits to COFA clients for this fiscal year. The costs are reflected as federal expenditures for fiscal year 2012 to 2013. Given the Lieutenant Governor’s focus on obtaining federal funds, the Ways and Means believes that this is an area that could be his top priority. Work opportunities and cash assistance for Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, or TANF, or Temporary Assistance to Other Needy Families, TAONF, remain priorities in the state’s efforts to help residents through the economic recession. Temporary public assistance for food and shelter is of highest priority in this budget for Hawai‘i’s families, and this budget preserves funding for services to help retool our working poor in an effort to become self-sustaining once more. However \$33 million worth of contracts were terminated earlier this year due to the use of TANF funds to support these basic needs. What will be appropriated in the biennium budget is \$37.1 million in fiscal year 2011-2012 and \$23 million in fiscal year 2012-2013 in general funds for cash assistance to help over 27,515 very low income families. Funds will also be provided from the DHS budget to support the A+ Program in elementary schools statewide, and it will be directed to the Department of Education. The dire economic conditions of the last few years increased the amount of Hawai‘i residents living below the federal poverty levels from five percent in 2007, to over nine percent in 2010. Shelters across the state are at capacity and forced to turn away many of Hawai‘i’s homeless. To support efforts to extend services and shelter accommodations to the growing number of homeless families and individuals, Ways and Means has approved \$1.5 million for shelter support contract and the addition of three new shelters on Maui, in Wai‘anae, and Kona. A total of \$20 million has also been appropriated to the rental housing trust fund over the biennium to support Hawai‘i’s efforts to partner with the private sector in providing additional affordable rental housing for our kūpuna, working families, and individuals. \$35,670,000 for fiscal year 2011-2012 and \$55, 300,000 for fiscal year 2012-2013 has been allocated to help the Hawai‘i Public Housing Authority revitalize affordable public housing facilities throughout the state, as well as to address over 450 affordable units that have had major repair needs and have not been available for years for people to use. In addition, the Preschool Open Doors Program offers TANF recipients a means of providing children with educational opportunities or parents work toward self-sufficiency through these supports. Early childhood education plays an integral role in the development of Hawai‘i’s children, and affordable child care allows many parents to engage in work opportunities. To support the valuable services the program offers, Ways and Means has appropriated \$2 million in child care subsidies.

“Our thanks to the Ways and Means Chair and Vice Chair and to all committee members, as well as the excellent WAM staff for your hard work. Mahalo also to the state employees who have worked tremendously hard with less staff support and thousands of additional people to help. I also want to thank the staff of the nonprofit and profit organizations who have been our true partners in delivering many of these public services. And most of all, to the people of Hawai‘i because they do care. And people constantly are saying ‘thank you’ to the Legislature for helping our most vulnerable. So, to our colleagues, thank you very much for your support of this budget, and mahalo to the people of Hawai‘i for what they do every day. Aloha.”

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

“I rise in support of this measure and would like the words of the Senator from Waimea incorporated into the Journal as if they were my own. As I sat here and listened to what she said, I was taken back to the days when she was here and it would seem like a very different time. I was in elementary school back then, but I appreciated what she and her colleagues back in the 70s and 80s were doing here because it was a different vision back then. It wasn’t about addressing the budget as we do today either by contracting the size of government, by cutting it, or on the flip side, by talking about revenue enhancements and getting more taxes into our coffers to sustain this government. It’s more about what the senator from Waimea talked about—about growing the economy, providing job opportunities for our people—and this budget gets us through this current situation, but still lacks the luster of creating a better Hawai‘i for our future.

“For the kids who are in elementary school, as I was 20 years ago, what kind of a future are we creating for them with this particular budget and what kind of messages are we sending out to them? When we look at the opportunities on the horizon, I think we hopefully all agree that energy is going to be a big part of our economic future, and the director of DBEDT mentioned how energy will create 11,000 green jobs. But we need to think beyond those 11,000 green jobs to how are we going to harness our cheaper sustainable energy into other opportunities. Perhaps manufacturing, clean manufacturing. But we’re not taking those extra steps. We’re looking at what’s just in front of us. We need to think farther and more visionary like the lawmakers who were luckily here in the 70s and 80s. And I also agree with the Senator from Waimea that we need to encourage more economic development on the neighbor islands.

“When you look at the wind power and the discussion there and it all lines up to having a cable that connects all of Lāna‘i to Moloka‘i to O‘ahu, that is so O‘ahu-centric, right? They’re saying that they’re going to deliver power to us here on O‘ahu. When there’s untapped opportunities on the neighbor islands, why should all the economic development be here on O‘ahu? Why can’t we further economic development on Lāna‘i, on Moloka‘i, and certainly on the Big Island with its vast amount of alternative energy opportunities? So I really appreciate the words of the Senator from Waimea because she and her colleagues back then provided a neat opportunity for me today. And I’m not too sure and real confident that what we’re doing here today is providing for the next generation of individuals to follow us because as we heard from the Senator from Liliha, there are voluminous amounts of needs that we’re going to be facing in the future. And are we going to continue to have a financial crisis on our front burner and taking this continuous approach of either downsizing government or increasing taxes to pay for this monster that continues to grow? I agree with the Senator from Waimea that we need to have visionary discussions about a better future for Hawai‘i. This budget I appreciate gets us through the current financial crisis, but at a certain point I think we as a legislative body really need to think about what kind of opportunities and growth we’re going to create for a better Hawai‘i in the future. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

“I think the words that have been said are very powerful. I can’t disagree with very many of them. In full disclosure, when Senator Solomon was here, I was already grown up and working. She has punctuated the point, however, that I tried to make earlier that what we’re going through now is not new, and it was not unknown and didn’t just suddenly appear. I remember the discussion back in the 70s, and back in the 80s, and back in the 90s. And we had ample opportunity to change

our direction or do things differently, and we chose not to. We chose to continue living off the fruits of the labor of others. And one of the things we didn't even talk about today, while we're talking about all these demands and all the increased numbers of people that need subsidies and help, we have not really talked about increasing supply. And that's what it should be all about. And I certainly concur with the good Senator from Waimea as I've said many times before: the fact that we tend to be O'ahu-centric, that we tend to use the neighbor islands as our plantations and farm communities, is flat-out wrong. But we're not in this legislative session doing anything—anything—to improve our business and investment climate. All we're talking about is how we are going to redistribute what we already have here? How can we borrow more? Now, the talk about capital investments, I think is important. You must have infrastructure, and we don't. Our infrastructure is crumbling. It is terrible from the roads on up or on down, depending on how you want to look at it. But even when we talk about billions in CIP, what are we talking about? We're talking about more general obligation bonds and more debt, more debt service costs. We're not listening to the entrepreneurs in our midst to tell us what we need to do. And first and foremost, they say we need to reduce the cost of taxation and employer mandates, and to free businesses to be creative.

"I introduced the other day the three representatives from McDonald's, and next week on the 19th all across the country, as I mentioned, they're going to have hiring day, and they're going to, one company, hire 50,000 new employees including 1,000 in Hawai'i. In one day. And what are we talking about? We're about more government jobs, more government costs, more government benefits. We haven't done anything to stimulate the private sector or to increase the supply, and that's what it's all about. We need more private jobs, we need more private businesses, and we need more private contributions to the entire economic welfare of this state. But that can't come with the kinds of policies that we're sponsoring and more hardships on the people that have the ability to create those jobs. We throw the term 'investment' around very loosely. I may be old-fashioned, but investment to me is a voluntary act by individuals who, looking at opportunities for risk and for expending their resources, decide to invest in something. What we're talking about is compulsory taking of private moneys and investing it in projects that we think are important. And if you look over the last couple years, and particularly the investigating committees we have, unfortunately, you'll find that this state does not have a good record of investment. And in terms of compassion, compassion for the people that are unable to make it on their own, I have that compassion. But it's a lot easier to be compassionate with somebody else's money, and taxes, and rules of how they must conduct themselves, rather than reaching in our own pockets and saying, 'If we really believe this, if this is really a priority, then we'll spend it voluntarily.'

"Human services was brought up. And as has been indicated in the hearings, in a very short period of time the amount that our state spends on human services and all of its programs will exceed the amount that we spend on public education. That's a fact. And, as the good senator said, now 20 percent—one in five residents—is now dependent on Medicaid. And every year we have an emergency; every year we have to have an emergency appropriation. And the numbers keep growing. And the numbers grow on the food stamp program and the numbers grow on the MedQUEST program. And let's not forget, let's not forget that years ago, this state and those departments actively went out and recruited people to be on those programs. We wanted to build up those programs. Well, we've succeeded beyond our wildest dreams. And not everybody is vulnerable and not everybody cannot take care of themselves, and yet, we continue to talk about the growth and we continue to tell the

regular taxpayers that they're going to have to continue supporting other people in other programs. Well, as was said earlier, if I have to stand up here and be the only one to tell you that tax increases, spending increases, and debt increases are not the way to go, not the way to have a better Hawai'i and take advantage of all of those people who are so talented and creative, if I have to do all that, then I will stand guilty and indicted on that, because somebody's got to do it. Somebody's got to stand up for the people that are paying for the other people and watching as money is not being well-accounted for, or transparent. So, yes, all the accolades that go to the Ways and Means Chair and committee are well worth it and to the staff; everyone knows that people have worked hard. But we're not in the right mindset for change, and we can't keep putting it off. We have to start now. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Hee rose and said:

"Now that the grandstanding and pontification and self-emulation is over, I move the previous question."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1076 (H.B. No. 300, H.D. 2, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1076 be adopted and H.B. No. 300, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, just some brief comments for the members. As you know, the Judiciary had placed a priority on ending furloughs this year for the Judiciary because they truly believe that justice delayed is justice denied, and this measure before us provides funds to end the furloughs in the Judiciary. We have managed and balanced the needs, and we've made other cuts to reduce the cost of providing that justice, but we do believe that it goes a long ways to allowing our citizens prompt and access to justice. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations and said:

"I think our objective, all of us, is to increase access to justice. I do agree with the statement that justice delayed is justice denied. However, we have seen that some of the expenditures in the past and currently by the Judiciary Department really are open to question. The whole Kapolei situation, the computer situation, and just using the money for ending furloughs in many respects leaves many questions about access to justice, but I will support the budget through the conference committee. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure said:

"I also rise in support of the budget. However, Mr. President, I'd like to encourage the Chair of Judiciary to continue his investigation into the fact that now we have incarcerated five generations of Hawaiians in our prison system; and I'm hoping that over the interim, we could bring this issue to a head and be able to resolve this, which I consider a heinous situation, Mr. President. Thank you very much."

Nine years later, we found out that that had not been done, and \$3,480,000 is now to be transferred into the general fund. This is what I mean about we are not adequately husbanding the moneys of the people of this state and we've got to do a better job. Thank you."

"I think that it's laudable that we're taking up the matter, and I really respect the Chair of Human Services for the extraordinary gathering she put together and how many important people are on the matter. I'm opposed to this bill because I think what happens with bills like this is: number one, people will say, 'Oh, we came up with some solution,' when in reality this may help a few people in a good way, but I don't want anyone to get the idea that this very small sliver of a solution for some people that need to get back to their families will in any way be a real meaningful approach to the huge challenge that our chair has taken up. And I support her, and so that's really why I'm voting 'no' today on this bill. I think I'd rather see every single penny put toward a solution on the ground here in Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senators Ihara, Nishihara, Taniguchi, Kahele, Solomon, Dela Cruz, Wakai, and Kidani requested their votes be cast "aye, with reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

"I know that the education chairman did a very good job in trying to get this bill through and get the change in instructional days, but the fact of the matter is the bill does not increase the instructional days, and it actually puts it off. You know, we're talking about priorities, and we're talking about we're all in agreement and education is an investment and all that; and yet in this bill, there is even a provision that requires the Department of Education to re-examine what constitutes student instructional days. Now, if they don't even know what constitutes instructional days, and we went down to the lowest in the nation last year, I think we have a real problem. It also gives the DOE plenty of time because they have to make a report to the Legislature prior to the beginning of the 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018 sessions. This is not a priority. This is not making a change. If we really are serious about these things, then let's do them and not talk about them. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure said:

"Well, I wholeheartedly agree that we must do more to add to the rigor of our school days and our school hours sooner than later. I believe this measure to delay the provisions of Act 167 until 2014 is both fiscally prudent and necessary to preserve as much resources as we can going directly into the classroom. As the Legislature has no involvement in collective bargaining which is currently ongoing, it is difficult to determine the actual cost to increase school days and school hours as mandated in

Act 167. However, conservative estimates have come in at around \$55 million. Regardless of what the final amount is, given that we may already have to look at double digit million dollar cuts to the Department of Education, I strongly believe it is necessary that this bill continue to move forward so that we can continue to do everything we can to preserve school funding and minimize the chance of future devastating restrictions to the department's budget once we're out of session. I would also note that the reporting requirements that we have mandated is really to make sure that we keep the fire under both the Department of Education and all bargaining units to make sure that we are in compliance and ready to proceed with the increased school days and school hours come 2014. But I definitely respect the opinions of the minority on this issue, as well. We will continue to move forward to try to make sure that our students have the most time in our classrooms with highly qualified and effective teachers, and I hope that you will all support moving this measure forward. Thank you."

There have been issues brought up by surfers, by recreational boaters, and by others in terms of transportation, in terms of safety, in terms of access. This bill also would add new fees and allow, I believe, 15 percent of the usage for commercial. I think, perhaps, going ahead in conference, maybe it'll work out, but having to vote on it now, I vote 'no.' Thank you."

So, I certainly support the legislation, but I don't think that we need a two year sunset. At the least, we should have the five year. Thank you."

We saw what happened two years ago with Amazon.com and a number of other providers who said that if we were to pass this and effect this that they would withdraw from Hawai’i. There are more and more of our residents that rely on online purchases to survive, and there are more and more opportunities to do so. We have contentious court cases that say that you cannot tax an entity if it does not have a situs within the state. Some of these national companies in fact do have presence here, and they should be taxed. They should be subject to either the general excise gross income or use tax. But to try to expand this is a money grab by the states, and I know my worthy opponent and supporter of this every year comes up with more states that are proposing to join a compact, and I realize a lot has to be done, but the philosophy is wrong about this. It is a detrimental bill to the taxpayers of this state and to those people that rely on fair commerce across the country. So, I will continue to oppose it. Thank you.”

Senator Fukunaga rose to speak in support of the measure said:

“This is becoming an annual ritual. I rise to speak in support of this measure and to bring members’ attention to some recent updates from the National Conference of State Legislatures. Two years ago, Dr. William Fox of the University of Tennessee had been one of the authors of a study which examined only the electronic b-to-b and b-to-c (and that means business-to-business or business-to-consumer transactions). At that time, Department of Taxation concluded that Hawai‘i was only losing out on roughly \$60 million dollars of uncollected use taxes which have been on the books for over 25 years in our state. What this year’s study adds to the mix is nonelectronic business-to-consumer, as well as nonelectronic business-to-business purchases; these would be the kind of purchases that are via catalog or other kinds of direct mail sales. So as we’re looking for ways to address our revenues shortfalls, I wanted to remind the members that NCSL has been an active proponent of working collaboratively with states as well as with state tax departments. If you look at the map on page two of this handout, all of the states that are participating in this voluntary program to demonstrate the efficacy of using technology to collect your use taxes, you should note that none of these participating states—those that are in yellow at this point or those that are green—have had their legislation challenged in the courts. And for those states that are in yellow, they have been collecting from out-of-state merchants who voluntarily collected those states’ use taxes to demonstrate that this is a practical and efficient way to help states balance their budgets. For those reasons, Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to vote ‘yes’ on this measure. Thank you.”

“The two hearings that we had in Ways and Means were very unsettling. The Reapportionment Commission did not have good answers to the questions of the committee. It was very

difficult to substantiate some of the figures that they did have: the money, the people, the overtime, and even a computer graphic planner that they were going to buy. We recognize that we have to have reapportionment and that there are certain expenditures, but I would hope that as we go forward with this bill, that we hold the Reapportionment Commission more accountable and more transparent on how they’re actually going to spend our money. Thank you.”

Sitting through the seven hours of confirmation hearings was like watching the pieces of a puzzle come together, and in the end, I believe everyone who witnessed the events walked away excited and hopeful, with a clear picture of what this board envisioned for the future. Among the nine, we have chief executive officers, university administrators, community leaders, educators, attorneys, and passionate advocates for more causes than I can mention.

"Your committee received 266 pieces of positive testimony from businesses, groups and organizations, and individuals that highlighted and praised the nominees for their commitment to public service and the unique skills and life experiences they would bring to the table. But beyond all of that, we were able to have honest and real discussions with the nominees about their children and their families. We got a true sense of what motivates them personally and professionally and talked about their vision and tangible plans for building upon our successes and making our school communities even better. And while all in the room could sense the urgency of the mission at hand, one of our nominees reminded us of an African proverb: 'If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together.'

"While much hope and expectation, unrealistic or not, has been placed on the shoulders of these nominees, your committee acknowledged and committed our support to working with them to bring about positive change for our students and our schools. In closing, one of our nominees shared with us the final words her mother spoke to her when she

was just 11 years old: 'Get a good education. Education is your ticket out.' It is my belief that if we as a community support and embrace the vision and the direction these inaugural nine have for our state educational system, our students will be holding onto tickets to wherever they want to go. I think that in many ways we have a perfect storm. This opportunity could not have happened a couple of years ago, may not happen in the future, but it's happening right now, and I know that many of these people have already demonstrated their success in other fields in the community, but this is probably in many respects going to be their biggest challenge.

"They come in with their eyes wide open, but they're all confident, individually and as a group, that in fact they can make the changes that we expect. I've cautioned all of them to make sure that any level of frustration does not dampen or diminish the energy and the passion that they have because we've all been there. But we're all rooting for you, and we'll do everything that we can to help you. This is something that we can all share in. It's something that can be a total success. So, again, thank you all for your willingness to serve and thank you for the things that you are about to do. And, as far as the changes, Mr. President, I just wish we could apply some of this philosophy to the change in budgeting, taxation, and spending in this state. Thank you very much."

Senator English rose in support of the nominees as follows:

"From the time of the founding of the Board of Education by Kamehameha V in 1850 until early 1960s, the Board of Education was an appointed board. And shortly after statehood, the voters of Hawai'i decided that it should be an elected board. And the reason for that was too much concentration of power in the executive branch. Now, today, the voters have decided that it's time to streamline once again the Board of Education, to bring it back to an executive department and an appointed body. But, you know, Kamehameha V's vision still lives. When we were independent, our little country had the highest literacy rate in the world. Hawai'i had a literacy rate of 98 percent under the kingdom. Our government spent a vast majority of its budget

on education. We established schools in the most remote villages of Hawai'i, paid teachers well to go to these remote, remote areas and teach people to read and write. You know, when Hawai'i was independent, our little country spoke at least three languages. Everyone spoke Ka 'ōlelo makua hine i Kēia 'āina nei; spoke Hawaiian. Most spoke English. And others still spoke another language. So, there's no reason that we cannot obtain high literacy rates again. I have great faith in this board, that they will remember the charge of Kamehameha V to educate Hawai'i; to make us one of the best.

"Members of the Senate, today we are standing at a very pivotal point in Hawaiian history. There's only two other times that we have dealt with this: when Kamehameha V established in 1850 the Board of Education, then shortly after statehood in the 1960s, when we went to an elected board, and now, today, when we go back to an appointed board. So, to remember Kamehameha V's charge, go to the remote areas, go to the most difficult places of Hawai'i, the places that the city tends to forget, and make sure that we get our fair share of education. By way of example, Hāna School in my district, under the weighted student formula cannot even pay for the basic core education that's needed to graduate. In fact, they rely on a grant from the superintendent's budget to meet the very basic needs. Moloka'i High School cannot meet the basic needs under the weighted student formula. Lāna'i, likewise. In fact, in the last two years I've introduced bills to simply exempt these schools from the weighted student formula and bring them back to categorical formula. Why? Because Kamehameha V's vision was education for all, not only education for those that are near the cities, not education only for those that can access it. Education for all.

"High schools suffer under the weight of a weighted student formula. It doesn't work for Hāna. It doesn't work for Moloka'i. It doesn't work Lāna'i. I also know it doesn't work for Ni'ihau. I also know it doesn't work for Ka'ū. So, Board of Education, I charge you: take care of Hāna, take care of Moloka'i, take care of Lāna'i. Do not forget, do not forget Kamehameha V's charge: education for all. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominees as follows:

"I know that the floor amendment probably eviscerated most of the—at least visible—harmful consequences, but any way you look at it, this is still a tax bill. It's still a tax on pensions. It still is going to go into conference committee, and there is a desire within this square building to tax the pensions of those who can least afford it. And those of us who have a jaundiced, cynical eye do not believe that just by temporarily raising the benchmark amount does not guarantee that it won't be lowered either this year in conference or next year if the bill is passed. So, the best thing to do, the safest thing to do, the most honest thing to do is to vote this bill down now. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Notwithstanding the previous remarks made by the minority leader, in fact we went through great pains to take out any effort by the Legislature to tax the pensions of retirees to the extent that the Attorney General's language was inserted into the journal for the record and the Senate went beyond the state and county retirees from being taxed but also included all retirees beyond government retirees. Any predetermined fear by the previous speaker is not good enough reason in my view to vote against this bill because there are several vehicles that the insertion could be made. What we do know is what is before us. And it is a bill that is absent of any tax on any retiree beyond the state and county, to include the private sector and the federal government, as well. I urge my colleagues to stand with the retirees on this bill. Thank you very much."

Ms. Chang previously served on the Board of Dental Examiners and is familiar with board procedures. She is a conscientious member and takes responsibility to understand the issues that come before the board. Colleagues, these nominees are well-qualified and I commend their willingness to continue to offer their time and expertise to assist the work of the Board of Examiners in Optometry. We can instruct the Public Utilities Commission to explore certain areas, but when we require that they take certain action and make sure that we don't disturb the monopoly status that we have right now, I think that's harmful to businesses and to consumers throughout the state. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Colleagues, it would be nice if our water carrier industries between and amongst the islands was as robust as the good Senator from Hawai'i Kai would like it to be. Unfortunately, we have many small ports and many small communities that would not be served if it were totally a free market and there were total competition. So, we do have a regulated market with regard to the movement of goods between the islands, and this measure makes sure that our small ports and our small communities are not going to be disadvantaged by not taking into account the requirements and restrictions for delivering goods to those areas. It's also going to make sure that we have an opportunity to continue to have the availability of barge service carrying agricultural products to and from the islands. Right now, it's the neighbor islands primarily that need to get their produce to O'ahu in order to sell it. And if we are really serious about

sustainable agriculture in our state, we need a measure like this. So, I encourage all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this very important piece of legislation. Mahalo."

At 11:42 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 319, for the Honorable Yoshihiko Kamo, Consul General of Japan in Honolulu, to address the Legislature and provide an update on the aftermath of the 9.0 magnitude earthquake off the eastern coast of Japan.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2011, was called to order at

12:00 p.m. by the Honorable Calvin K. Y. Say, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then addressed the Chamber, stating:

“Distinguished guests in attendance, residents of Hawai‘i, and family and friends in Japan: The members of the Hawai‘i State Senate and the Hawai‘i State House of Representatives assemble today in a very special Joint Session to receive the remarks of the Honorable Yoshihiko Kamo, Consul General of Japan in Hawai‘i.

“On March 11, 2011, America’s great friend, the majestic country of Japan, experienced a natural disaster of epic proportion.

“The earthquake off the eastern coast of Japan and the tsunami of epic magnitude which followed caused casualties and devastation to the people and land dear to Hawai‘i. Many of us have close ancestral ties with and a deep cultural appreciation for the people of Japan. And as Americans, we all acknowledge that Japan has been a most steadfast ally of the United States for the past 60 years.

“Today, we will receive a message from Consul General Yoshihiko Kamo about recovery and restoration efforts in Japan. By holding a rare Joint Session to do so, we publicly display Hawai‘i’s profound sympathy and support for Japan and its people.”

The Speaker then stated:

“Before receiving the Consul General’s message, I would like to recognize our special guests.”

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature:

The Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i;

The Honorable Brian Schatz, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai‘i;

The Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Hawai‘i Supreme Court; and

Mrs. Etsuko Kamo, wife of Consul General Kamo.

At this time, Senator Donna Mercado Kim, on behalf of the Senate, and Representative Karen Awana, on behalf of the House of Representatives, presented Consul General Kamo with lei.

Consul General Kamo was escorted to the rostrum by the House Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and guests the Honorable Yoshihiko Kamo, Consul General of Japan in Honolulu.

Consul General Yoshihiko Kamo addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

“Speaker Say, President Tsutsui, Governor Abercrombie, Lieutenant Governor Schatz, Chief Justice Recktenwald, Senators, Representatives, ladies and gentlemen: It is indeed my honor and privilege to be invited to this Joint Session of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2011, and to be given a chance to address to the distinguished assembly an update of the aftermath of the greatest Japan earthquake.

“First of all, as the Japan representative of the Japanese government in Hawai‘i, I would like to express my deepest appreciation for the sympathy and support that the people of

Hawai‘i so generously afforded to us. I am very pleased to say that your thoughts and prayers much encouraged us and reminded us how lucky and privileged we are to be bonded with the people of Hawai‘i.

“More than a month has passed since the outbreak of the disaster. Mr. Naoto Kan, Prime Minister of Japan, recently issued a statement entitled ‘Japan, the Road to Recovery and Rebirth.’ In this statement, he has given an update of the aftermath of the disaster and expressed his determination to bring recovery and reconstruction to Japan. So let me share his message with you by directly quoting from the text of his statement in full:

At 14:46 on March 11, Japan was hit by one of the most powerful earthquakes in recorded history. We are now making all-out efforts to restore livelihoods and recover from the series of tragedies that followed the Great East Japan Earthquake. The disaster left more than 27,000 people dead or missing, including foreign citizens.

Since March 11, Japan has been strongly supported by the international community and our friends around the world. On behalf of the Japanese people, I would like to express my sincerest gratitude for the outpouring of support and solidarity we have received from over 130 countries, nearly 40 international organizations, numerous nongovernmental organizations, and countless individuals from all parts of the world. The Japanese people deeply appreciate the *kizuna*, a Japanese word for ‘bonds of friendship,’ that has been shown to us by friends around the world. Through this hardship, we have also come to truly understand the meaning of ‘a friend in need is a friend indeed.’

Immediately after the earthquake struck, the U.S., our most important friend and ally, has provided swift cooperation. President Obama kindly called me to convey his strong commitment; confirming that the U.S. stands ready to provide all-out support to the Japanese people during this time of great difficulty. He also reaffirmed that the friendship and the lines between our two nations is unshakable. So many Japanese citizens, including myself, were enormously encouraged by these remarks. From an early stage in the response efforts, U.S. forces have diligently performed relief activities on multiple fronts as a part of Operation Tomodachi, named after the Japanese word for ‘friendship’. The collegial attitude that Americans have demonstrated towards us and this operation has deeply touched the hearts and minds of the Japanese. Support has come from not only the government but also NGOs and countless individuals, in the various forms of humanitarian assistance, search-and-rescue missions, and charity events and fundraising. We have also received the full support of the U.S. in responding to the accidents at the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant, from providing equipment and other material assistance such as fire trucks and special protective suits, to dispatching nuclear experts and radiation-control teams.

I wish to express our sincere thanks for all the sympathy and assistance the American people have extended to us. That Japan has experienced a nuclear accident at the Fukushima Daiichi plant, whose severity was assessed as most serious based on an international scale, is extremely regrettable and something I take very seriously. Bringing the situation at the plant under control at the earliest

possible date is currently my top priority. I have been working at the forefront of the efforts to tackle this troubling situation. Leading a unified effort by the government, I have mobilized all available resources to combat the risks posed by the plant, based on three principles: first, give the highest priority to the safety and health of all citizens, in particular those residents living close to the plant; second, conduct thorough risk management; and, third, plan for all possible scenarios so that we are fully prepared to respond to any future situations. For example, we continue to make the utmost efforts to address the issue of outflow of radioactive water into the ocean from the plant. In addition, the government has taken every possible measure to ensure the safety of all food and other products, based on strict scientific criteria. We have taken highly precautionary measures so that the safety of all Japanese food and products that reach the market and must be and will continue to be ensured. In order to assure domestic and foreign consumer confidence in the safety of Japanese food and products, my administration will redouble its efforts to maintain transparency and keep everyone informed of our progress in the complex and evolving circumstances at the Fukushima Daiichi plant.

I pledge that the Japanese government will promptly and thoroughly verify the cause of this incident, as well as share information and the lessons learned with the rest of the world in order to prevent such accidents from occurring in the future. Through such a process, we will proactively contribute to the global debate to ensure the safety of nuclear power generation. Meanwhile, from a comprehensive energy policy perspective, we must squarely tackle a two-pronged challenge: responding to rising global energy demand and striving to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to combat global warming. Through the rebirth of Japan, I would like to present a clear vision to the entire world that includes the aggressive promotion of clean energy that may contribute to solving global energy issues.

The Great East Japan Earthquake and the resulting tsunami are the worst natural disasters that Japan has faced since the end of the Second World War. Reconstruction of the devastated Tohoku region will not be easy. However, I believe, that this difficult period will provide us with a precious window of opportunity to secure the 'rebirth of Japan.'

The government will dedicate itself to demonstrating to the world its ability to establish the most sophisticated reconstruction plans for East Japan, based on three principles: first, create a regional society that is highly resistant to natural disasters; second, establish a social system that allows people to live in harmony with the global environment; and third, build a compassionate society that cares about people, in particular, the vulnerable.

We the Japanese people rose from the ashes of the Second World War using our fundamental strengths to secure a remarkable recovery and the country's present prosperity. I have not a single doubt that Japan will overcome this crisis, recover from the aftermath of the disaster, emerge stronger than ever,

and establish a more vibrant and better Japan for future generations.

I believe that the best way for Japan to reciprocate the strong kizuna and cordial friendship extended to us by the international community is to continue our contribution to the development of the international community. To that end, I will work to the best of my ability to realize a forward-looking reconstruction that gives people bright hopes for the future. I would wholeheartedly appreciate your continued support and cooperation. Arigato.

Consul General Kamo continued:

"Ladies and gentlemen, I know that all of us deserve breaking up for a nice lunch by this time, but please allow me to continue another five minutes so that I can get out my own words.

"The greatest Japan earthquake brought to Japan the unprecedented triple woes of earthquake, tsunami and nuclear disaster, and in this calamity I was stunned by the two unlikely stories of human dignity and compassion. First, I was marveled at the resilience of the people of the stricken Northeast Japan. They remained calm and composed and orderly responded to the crisis, helping each other and caring for the weaker instead of fighting for survival in time of extreme difficulty. These reticent, decent and enduring men and women quietly attested what human dignity and tolerance could accomplish even in extreme circumstances. I am most obliged to them for doing us proud to be Japanese. Second, I was touched by the generous offers of support and assistance from the international community. As Prime Minister Kan pointed out, the United States was a principal rescuer, coming to us first and helping us most. The Pacific Command played a key role in organizing Operation Tomadachi, which mobilized 20,000 military personnel and 20 vessels per day for helping Japan. The collaboration between U.S. forces and Japan Self-Defense Forces in responding to the disaster has further strengthened the U.S.-Japan alliance.

"The government and the people of Hawai'i showed their sympathy and support from the very beginning as well. On March 11, the following day of the earthquake, Governor Abercrombie and Lieutenant Governor Schatz visited me at the Japanese Consulate and conveyed their condolences. We opened the condolence book at the Consulate from March 16 to March 25. Many people including senators and representatives came and signed the book. Lieutenant Governor Schatz took the initiative in establishing the statewide fundraiser called 'Aloha for Japan.' Apart from Aloha for Japan, many other fundraising efforts in support of Japan are being held in Hawai'i. This gushing of sympathy and support for Japan may derive from the history of close relationship between Hawai'i and Japan that dates back from more than 125 years ago. It is my pleasure to note that during this past month, you have made us local Japanese deeply impressed by your kindness and thoughtfulness. I will take it as my important job to let as many Japanese as possible know how much the people of Hawai'i helped and cared about us.

"The strong bonds between Hawai'i and Japan explain our genuine yearning and attachment to Hawai'i. I want to tell you that Japanese tourists will be back soon. The great earthquake and tsunami made many Japanese refrain from having fun to show condolence and solidarity with the victims. With more than 500,000 cancellations, Japan's domestic tourism suffered a heavy blow. Accordingly, there has emerged a growing apprehension that excessive self-restraint does more harm than good to the stricken area as it slows down the economy. Hawai'i's appeal to Japanese tourists remains unchanged. Nature, people, history, safety, cleanliness and proximity all

contribute to alluring Japanese to Hawai'i. You can count on our loyalty.

“What is more serious is the sharp drop of foreign visitors to Japan, which can be ascribed primarily to the concerns for potential exposure to radioactive substances while in Japan. Some of you may be surprised to hear, but Japan is not a small country. Radioactive contamination is largely an on-site and near-site issue. A large part of Japan escapes from contamination that poses general threat to the public health. World Health Organization, International Civil Aviation Organization, and International Maritime Organization have made objective assessments that general travel restriction to Japan is not needed. Going to Japan is not prohibited by any laws. Whether it is Hokkaidō or Kyūshū, Tokyo, or Kyoto, we are eagerly await you in Japan and opportunities to reciprocate the hospitality. My dear Hawai'i friends, I believe that Japan is blessed with new hope and future. She is endowed with will and talent to overcome this hardship. Prime Minister Kan states that 'Japan aims at an innovative reconstruction', rather than a mere recovery, by introducing new ideas and credible means. He set up a wise man's group to garner all available expertise and ideas from home and abroad to help map out concrete plans for reconstruction. Japan is responsible for rebuilding her nation steadily and innovatively as she has been so generously accorded with support from Hawai'i and the rest of the world. The task we are undertaking is certainly is a challenging, but we are ready to do whatever it takes with all our resolve and commitment.

“May our friendship with the people of Hawai'i continue to guide us to a new hope and future. Thank you Hawai'i! Aloha!”

President Tsutsui then rose and stated:

“On behalf of the House and Senate, I would like to thank the Honorable Yoshihiko Kamo for joining us today and providing us with an update on the aftermath of the great tragedies that have recently occurred in Japan. With many ties to Japan, our residents are deeply moved by the devastation and the suffering that the Japanese people have endured. Together, we mourn the loss of life, search for answers to the missing, and offer our sympathies and support to the survivors. The resiliency and determination of the people of Japan, as well as the citizens of the world, will be necessary in rebuilding and the restoration efforts that are to come. We will continue to offer our thoughts and prayers to all those affected. Thank you again for your presence here today.”

“There being no further business, I now declare the Joint Session adjourned.”

At 12:23 p.m., President Tsutsui declared the Joint Session adjourned.

"Members, let me briefly state that Judge Loo was supported by the Bar Association and by the Committee by unanimous vote of those present. She received her B.A. from the University of Oregon, her J.D. from the University of Hawai'i William S. Richardson School of Law. She has served as a District Judge

from 1997 to the present in the Second Circuit, where she presides over civil and criminal calendars and trials. She has handled arraignments and change of pleas, motions, preliminary hearings and reviews, search warrants, informational charging packets, and TROs. She also currently serves as Deputy Chief Judge for the Second Circuit and has presided in the Circuit Court on many occasions, including during 10 criminal jury trials and 1 civil non-jury trial. She is a former prosecutor and has served as a law clerk for Circuit Court Judge John McConnell. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Baker rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I didn't rise in support of Rhonda Loo's confirmation, not only because she is a fine jurist, but she's a wonderful individual, and the fact that she becomes the first woman ever to be appointed to serve full time on the Second Circuit Court bench in Maui is remarkable and that alone would be enough reason for me to stand in strong support of her nomination. But when you read all of the supportive testimony that was given by former colleagues in the Prosecutor's Office, from police, from members of the bar and community. And yes, even from defendants that she has sentenced who said without equivocation, 'Yes, it was a harsh sentence, but I deserved it, and it actually helped me turn my life around.' One defendant wrote to the committee saying that, 'It made me take a look at my life and forced me to make some major changes. She told me that she never wanted me to return to her courtroom again, and I haven't.' Another said, 'It made an impact on my decision to stop drinking and to turn my life around.' I think judges like Rhonda Loo who are firm and compassionate are the kind of individuals that clearly we want on the bench.

"She was also well-respected by those that she worked with in the judiciary. One administrator wrote, 'Judge Loo has always shown reason and caring for the people who are serviced by the Judiciary, as well as those who work for the Judiciary.' But I think that when it comes to her community service, perhaps that's where Judge Loo really shines. In addition to being viewed by the attorneys in the Second Circuit as one of their most respected judges, this particular attorney wrote that his colleagues speak very highly of her judicial temperament and demeanor. She's also praised for being a knowledgeable and careful jurist in rendering her decisions. Additionally, Judge Loo's integrity and honesty have been above reproach. She's intellectually and judicially honest in that she interprets the law as she understands the law to be, not what she wants or wishes the law to be, a significant factor in instilling a public sense of consistency and reliability in the law. I think this was demonstrated when she went to visit with a group of students at Lahaina Intermediate School who were studying the impact of the case *Snyder v. Phelps* which was before the Supreme Court. The students were really coming down on the side of the family, thinking that the court's decision was going to be a bad one, but Judge Loo was able to explain to them the concept of free speech rights and its impact and importance. And the students were pleased with her ability to explain the law, how it would impact others, and then they got to vote and make their own decision. Their decision ended up the same way that the Supreme Court decided it. She was gracious in giving her time to visit with students, and so, I think she values our youth and 'regular' folks in the community.

"I've had the good fortune to watch Judge Loo, not in her capacity as a judge, but as someone who cares very much about women inmates. We both participated in a fundraiser for Women Helping Women and we had some inmates from the correctional facility on Maui, women who were victims of domestic violence and were participating by sharing their stories with us. And it was remarkable to see—and some of these inmates had been sentenced by Judge Loo—it was

remarkable to see how much they appreciated the time that she spent with them and the understanding that she had of issues that were before her court. So, I'm pleased, Mr. President and colleagues, to offer strong support for the confirmation of Rhonda Loo. I know she'll make a wonderful addition to the Second Circuit, and I'm pleased that the governor has appointed her. I urge all of my colleagues to vote in support."

Senator English rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I'd like to just simply add to the words of the Senator from Lahaina that anyone who understands the County of Maui and is willing to take the boat from Lahaina and the boat to Moloka'i, and to understand how difficult it is to administer justice within a multi-island county is well-suited and well-prepared and has a great temperament for Maui County for the Second Circuit. I think that besides everything that was enumerated by both of my colleagues, simply to say that Maui County's truly blessed to have Rhonda on the bench. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in support of the nominee as follows:

"I enjoyed our meeting together and our conversation, and I would just add to what my colleagues have already said. Judge Loo's respect is universal within the legal community. She has been extremely active in a number of areas, and I find it interesting that she had been a prosecutor and yet she helped develop the handbook and the procedures to treat the mentally ill more compassionately and more fairly in criminal trials. She's been described, among her many qualities and experience, positively for her intelligence, her impartiality, and her patience. But even with patience, she still has a record of reaching decisions in a timely manner, and I think she's exactly the kind of person that we need, and I'm very happy to support her. Thank you."

Senator Green rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“Colleagues, since we’re all here, I just wanted to speak with you for one minute about something that I think is an important issue. We’re hearing a bill as you know. This is the time where we have controversy, which is good. This is the medical marijuana bill I want to address.

“A few facts have come out, and you’re going to get a lot of emails, which is healthy—I’m glad, receiving them, responding to them—about the medical marijuana issue. In your conference committee, the debate is raged. This has been a debate about compassion centers, whether to do a trial of a compassion center somewhere in the islands. Compassion center would be somewhere where people could go and get a prescription, essentially, for medical marijuana. But a lot of people don’t understand the scope of the issue. In Hawai‘i about 8,000 people have medical marijuana permits. It’s about 1 in 140, so it’s something for perspective. I’m not judging it one way or another, because I do support medical marijuana as both a physician and a person. A couple things, though, that stand out from the dialogue: one is that 97 percent of the people who are getting a prescription for marijuana have only a complaint of pain or spasms. They don’t have a diagnosis, which has become a question and concern; 53 percent of the people that have prescriptions for medical marijuana in the state are under age 30, and 12 percent are under age 21. So this has been a point of the dialogue, which I think you want to know, as you respond to emails. I think it’s very important. So, when I say that 12 percent are under age 21, as a health care provider I can almost imagine no scenarios where people under age 21 have marijuana for pain. And it’s a concern. It’s something that’s come up. But certainly over 50 percent under age 30 has been a concern as well.

“Another concern has been that in the past year the number of prescriptions on the Big Island has gone from 3,000 to 4,500. And I want to tell you I blame the medical community for that. That’s a 50 percent increase in one year. So, this has been brought up and some of the language in the bill—this is whether it passes or not, I don’t know—this is for us to debate. But some of the language in the bill that has caused people to write you and I think it’s a legitimate concern is that we’ve put much more attention—or I have—on specific diagnoses of cancer, musculoskeletal conditions like MS, but much more specific rather than the vague complaints. I do think people with pain should get medical marijuana, but I think it should be based on diagnoses because out in our communities, out where our constituents are, a lot of the marijuana gets beyond the patients themselves. That’s just a fact. And when you’re talking about more than 50 percent going to people under age 30—under age 30, mind you—for chronic pain which is very, very, very rare that people would have chronic pain below age 30, it does raise these concerns.

“People who have marijuana for medical needs, it’s an extraordinary drug. Others who smoke marijuana at different times crash their cars. They hurt other innocent individuals on occasion. So, these are concerns and there’s significant abuse in the system. If we can reach agreement in the bill, I think it’s excellent, and I do think medical marijuana has an important place in both Hawai‘i and in medical science. But those are some things I just want people to know and to be able to hear from me because those are the real numbers here in Hawai‘i and it’s something that we should be cognizant as policy makers of. Thank you, Mr. President.”

At this time, the Chair made the following announcements:

The following memorandum regarding extension of the conference committee report filing deadline was sent to all Senators by Senate President Shan S. Tsutsui at 12:30 a.m., Saturday, April 30, 2011:

“In January of this year, we prepared an internal legislative timetable, setting April 29th as the last day to file fiscal bills to deck for Final Reading. Earlier this month, we signed the Conference Committee Report Guidelines that provides, in paragraph 11(c) that all Conference Committee Reports shall be filed by 11:30 p.m. on Friday, April 29th. However, several measures were being negotiated throughout this evening on April 29th.

“The Conference Committee on SB120, SD1, HD1, reached agreement on the substance of the measure, but did not have the

time to prepare and adequately review the report and the final form of the Conference Draft prior to the filing deadline. Therefore, we exercised our powers under Rule 13 of the Conference Committee Guidelines, to make an exception to this deadline for SB120, SD1, HD1, as it was agreed to and voted upon in Conference Room 309.

“We granted this exception to provide the conference members with an opportunity to ensure that the Conference Committee report and the Conference draft reflect the agreement made on Friday evening. We felt that since the Conferees had reached timely agreement on this bill, allowing this bill to die based on an internal procedural deadline for filing paperwork with the respective Clerks’ Offices, is not in the best interest of the people of Hawai‘i.

“For S.B. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, the Clerks of the respective Chambers shall accept a Conference draft no later than 9:00 a.m. tomorrow, Saturday, April 30th.

“I wish to emphasize that previous legislatures, when facing similar problems in past years, have followed the same procedure we will follow with these measures.”

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by changing the amount identified and authorized to be transferred in Section 23 from \$1,500,000 to \$4,200,000.

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting Section 30.

SECTION 5. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by adding two new sections to Part III to read as follows:

“SECTION 37. The legislature determines that there is in the captive insurance administrative fund at least \$2,500,000 in excess of the requirements of the fund. Until June 30, 2011, the director of finance is authorized to transfer from the captive insurance administrative fund to the general fund the sum of \$2,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011.

SECTION 38. The legislature determines that there is in the health care revolving fund at least \$916,284 in excess of the requirements of the fund. Until June 30, 2011, the director of finance is authorized to transfer from the health care revolving fund to the general fund the sum of \$916,284 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2010-2011.”

SECTION 6. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by adding two new sections to Part V to read as follows:

“SECTION 56. Part XIII of chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.

SECTION 57. Part XV of chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is repealed.”

SECTION 7. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by amending Section 58 to change the phrase “On July 1, 2011,” to “By July 1, 2011”.

SECTION 8. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by changing the effective date of the bill from July 1, 2011 to upon approval.

SECTION 9. Senate Bill No. 120, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering the sections of the bill accordingly.

Most of you know that on those occasions where I have felt that the nominee may not have been qualified, I have not been reluctant to express my opinion, sometimes, as a member of the minority when the vote is taken. I want to say as we embark on several nominees for district court judge, I want to say this in general, in my years of serving as a member of the Senate and as chair of the Judiciary, I have never been privileged to serve as a member of the Judiciary Committee with the nominees who would be rising to the district court bench in total.

“These young men and women who we are about to sit in judgment in confirmation, in my view, are among the brightest young minds and among the most committed to public service

that we will have the opportunity to consent. They are, as a group, wholly committed to public service. They are as sharp as any tack that I have been privileged to interview personally and as a committee. They, in my view, exemplify the best, the absolute best, of young lawyers who aspire to serve as judges that I have been privileged to be a part of. You know, in the mid-1980s when I was Judiciary chairman of the Senate, I once introduced a bill that required judges to take the bar exam, and as you might imagine the blowback from the senior bench was ‘memorable.’ I have no doubt, I have absolutely no doubt, that if these young men and women were asked to take the bar, while they may be reluctant, they would pass the bar with flying colors. Although they will serve as district court judges, I have no doubt they understand the difference between the Hawai‘i Constitution and the United States Constitution. I have no doubt that they understand the separation of powers between church and state, no doubt that they understand the separation between the judiciary branch of government and the legislative branch of government. I have no doubt that these individuals understand protected classes in Hawai‘i.

“So, as we embark, the first individual is Edmund Acoba. He is, quite simply, a committed public defender who has on five occasions made the short list but for whatever reason was not selected by past governors. He is not without his faults, and he recognizes them to the point, quite frankly, it was TMI (too much information) for me, but he’s not the first. But it demonstrates that he is an open book, and like all of us, he has very good points and he has some that he wishes not to be mentioned. Mr. Acoba will be a very fine judge whose first priority will be to serve with dignity, with honor, in the dispensing of justice. Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"First, let me say that I am deeply appreciative of the members of this legislature, numerous members of the many executive agencies and departments, and countless members of the public that have shared their thoughts and worked with this committee in a positive manner to craft this executive budget. I would also like to especially thank my vice chair and the members of the Ways and Means Committee for their hard work on this budget and the many proposals that were considered. And, finally, Mr. President, I would also like to thank you and your staff for your guidance and support through these arduous negotiations. And, finally, I would like to acknowledge one last time the staff of the Senate Ways and Means Committee for their tireless efforts and diligence in implementing the many decisions and providing input for the many decision points we had to make in crafting this budget.

"This session follows two consecutive years where the legislature has had to close deficits of \$2.1 billion and \$1.2 billion, respectively. This year the challenge before us grew and grew as time went on. At the end, the budget shortfall currently is projected at \$1.3 billion through the end of the upcoming fiscal biennium. The executive budget is the largest component of the state's financial plan and our adjustments to it comprise the single largest share of the solution to the severe financial situation facing the state. Together, members, we are able to balance the budget and close this deficit without taxing pensions. In the aggregate, this budget does increase the general fund expenditures from those authorized in the current fiscal year. Some may not grasp the reasons for this, but let me explain. This is largely the result of restoration of furlough reductions, the loss of American Reinvestment and Recovery Act dollars, Medicaid costs, which have increase enormously, and debt service requirements from the debt restructuring conducted by the previous administration. These adjustments, largely non-discretionary in nature, resulted in the administration's initial request to this legislature to add \$624.9 million for the fiscal year 2012 and \$810.6 million for fiscal year 2013.

"The new administration submitted a request to add an additional \$133.8 million for fiscal year 2012 and \$160 million for fiscal year 2013. This request included funding to address immediate needs of state programs, EUTF payments, the Temporary Assistance for Needy Family program, and Medicaid needs related to the Compact of Free Association. Colleagues, the measure now before you is a responsible budget that finds common ground and compromise between the various drafts of the executive budget. A balanced approach was taken that incorporates various components of the drafts prepared by the House of Representatives and the Senate. First, this draft represents labor savings in the amount of \$88.2 million per year, as a lump sum reduction to the Department of Budget and Finance. This adjustment presumes that the current labor agreements for HSTA remain in place, thus ensuring that student instructional days are maintained. Second, all reductions made directly to state programs in drafts of the budget proposed by the House of Representatives and by the State Senate were evaluated and, in most cases, tempered. Third, a large lump sum reduction in the amount of \$50 million per year was placed in the Department of Budget and Finance to provide the Governor with maximum flexibility to allocate the reductions amongst the executive branch of government. We have heard the Governor's desire to re-prioritize and retool state government and his counsel against excessive horizontal reductions. The Governor will have the authority to allocate this reduction to state programs in concert with his efforts to re-prioritize and redirect state government agencies.

"Finally, the Governor's request for additional resources had been thoroughly reviewed. Many of these requests are funded in this final conference draft as they pertain to maintaining the safety net and restoring the ability of government to perform certain necessary functions. However, many difficult choices were made and many funding requests could not be accommodated. General fund appropriations contained in this draft include the addition of about a quarter billion dollars per year for Medicaid services, \$13.2 million for fiscal year 2012 for COFA-related Medicaid costs, \$45.2 million for TANF programs, and another \$12.8 million for cash assistance payments over the fiscal biennium. And, finally, \$6.9 million per year to the University of Hawai'i to maintain enhanced funding levels provided by ARRA and also to ensure that they can meet the increasing student demands for high education. Additionally numerous other appropriations were made to restore or enhance vital state services, such as funding for the Department of Education's contracted nursing services, deputy sheriffs for the state's court complexes, equipment for the state

DOCARE officers, positions needed by the State Historic Preservation Division, the Department of Agriculture, and the State's Information and Communications Services division, as well as funding for programs such as Preschool Open Doors and homeless services. In total, the general fund adjustment made by this budget represent a reduction of \$259.8 million for fiscal year 2012 and \$358.8 million for fiscal year 2013 to the Governor's requested budget, a significant portion of the stated budget shortfall. As we all know, the final version of the budget is the result of the give and take of the conference process.

"I would be remiss if I did not state for the record that I was disappointed that we were not able to get the House to agree to a few strategic investments made by the Senate that would move our state forward. Specifically, these include funding for the Early Learning Council to focus on early learning, expansion and stabilization of the Healthy Start program, funding to continue the STEM initiatives that are thriving in nearly all of our public schools, funding to the University of Hawai'i to begin the Mauna Kea management plan so that would assure that we can protect this important resource, and finally funding to expand the Academy of Creative Media so that all of our students throughout our state can benefit from this new age and most important industry that we pursue. Mr. President, this budget represents decisions that will best move the state forward through these difficult times. Colleagues, through your hard work and cooperation, we have amended this legislation to provide an appropriate allocation to core services in light of the state's fiscal situation. I encourage all of you to support this measure. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure and said:

"First, I do want to recognize the efforts of the chairman of the committee, members of the committee, the research staff. I also want to again recognize the members of the Senate minority staff who worked so diligently since the beginning of this session on budgetary matters.

"The budget was the single most important thing that we had to do this year. And from the outset, we got a late start because the executive did not submit the budget on time. From that time on, we've been playing catch-up and we've been putting a lot of people's lives in jeopardy through tax hike discussions right up until the last minute. We threatened businesses, individuals, organizations, and in the end, the Senate had a much preferable position to the House, but still this budget document is a budget buster. It is something that is going to continue to lower the standard of living and the options for every man, woman, and child in this state. It is true, as the chairman said, that over the last several years we've had not one budget deficit, but actually three, in a total of \$5 billion in shortfall. This year we faced \$1.3 billion in shortfall. Now, what would that tell any prudent family or any small business if they had a trend for additional shortfalls and deficits? It would tell them that they are spending too much. It would tell them that they must make changes, systemic changes. We have not done that.

"What we have done is used a band aid approach to try to put together a plan that would get us through, first of all, this fiscal year which ends June 30, and then the next two fiscal periods which end June 30, 2013. But, Mr. President, what then? What happens on July 1, 2013? We're going to continue to face the same fiscal problems that we face today, only there will be no special funds to scoop. There will be no federal ARRA monies to rely upon. There will be no more manipulative budgeting techniques to get us through month by month. What was needed, what is needed, is that change in direction: to tell people of all the things that Hawai'i is, the aloha state, the diversity state, we should not be identified as the welfare state. Not one bill during this legislative session, not one, was heard or passed to help improve the business and investment climate

of this state. Not one. And yet, that's what we need when we talk about more revenues. We need revenues from new sources, not to continue to tax and re-tax our existing residents, not to make it more difficult on existing businesses but to create a very clear, transparent climate that welcomes new entrepreneurs, new people with fresh money, because they believe in the economic future of this state. But, that we didn't do. Instead we scrambled right up to literally the last minute to make deals, to trade off different programs, to add things here, subtract things there. But it is unfair and unrealistic to talk about cuts to our government spending because in fact this budget represents a double digit increase in spending. It represents an increase in the number of state employees, their compensation and their benefits.

"We had the opportunity. We had suggestions. We had models of things that we could do. They were not done. And so, instead, we're going to continue on the path that we have continued on. And we can hope and pray that on May 26, when the Council on Revenues meets again, that they will not further reduce the economic forecast for this state. We can hope and pray. The reality is they're probably going to do that. In the meantime, we have the figures, month by month, from the state Department of Taxation and we see a reduction in tax revenues. Our people are hurting. Our businesses are hurting. We're not doing anything to expand the pie or make more pies. All we're doing is finding different ways with different people to re-cut the existing pie. I find that that is extremely shortsighted. It is not really a plan. And if we lack the fiscal discipline to make the changes that are necessary, the cuts that we talk about, the reductions that we talk about, are reductions to the additions that were made by the executive over the former budget. They are not cuts to preliminary or past programs. We've even called for the addition of new programs. In our capital improvement budget, we've added amounts that have gotten the attention of the public outside, such as improvements to the slaughterhouse which has become such a controversial issue and calls into question how many people, how many organizations, how many businesses should this state government subsidize? The answer seems to be 'it's endless,' because even in these times of so-called economic stress, we continue to call for more spending and we call on more of our citizens and residents to bear that burden. Now, I know I'm just one voice in this body. If I were a gambling man, it would be real easy to predict what the vote's going to be on this bill and many others today. But I want to remind you, each and every one of my colleagues, that you have heard from your constituents outside. My voice may be the only one inside calling for a change from taxation and spending and more debt. But outside, the public is becoming more restive, and they don't believe that we are doing the best that we can or doing the most creative things outside the box. We're doing what is comfortable for us. That may be a perception, but we know that perception is reality.

"Further, I'm not convinced as I look over all the numbers. I went to all the hearings, listened to all the debates. I'm not convinced that this budget in fact is balanced. But ever if it is, at the moment of its passage, the question remains: what will happen next week, next month, next year, or certainly after June 30, 2013? We had the opportunity make these changes to end shortfalls. You can blame it on the past administration if you like, but we're the ones in charge. We're the ones making the decision. We're the ones that have listened to the constituents and then ignored them in many areas. So, while there was a herculean effort, and I don't diminish the difficulty, government is not a business, because if government were a business, we would have been out of business years ago. We don't use the same principles, we don't use the same discipline, and we don't have the same long-term goals and objectives. So, reluctantly, while I know there are a number of good things

within this budget bill, I cannot support a continuation of this fiscal irresponsibility. Therefore I vote 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Your Committee on Conference finds that well-maintained physical infrastructure and state facilities are essential to maintaining a positive business climate and a strong economic foundation. Your Committee on Conference also finds that the need to invest in local infrastructure to help stimulate direct and indirect job creation is highly critical at this time. Expediency and the creation and maintenance of local construction jobs, as well as other jobs associated with capital projects, will generate more disposable income which will in turn circulate throughout our economy. The impact of new bond issuances was of concern in light of refinancing of general obligation bonds in 2009, which will result in substantial increases to debt service payments beginning in fiscal year 2015 and 2016. Further compounding this problem was an error in the accounting of general obligation bond authorizations for state education facilities improvement or the SEFI special funds, where an additional \$390 million needed to be appropriated for fiscal years 2011 and 2012 to ensure that sufficient resources would be available to cover contractual obligations currently encumbered.

"While your Committee on Conference understands from both accounting and legal perspectives that the amount of general obligation bonds authorized and issued must equal the amount of SEFI funds appropriated and expended, the current problem that the \$390 million is intended to fix is a manifestation of a larger systemic problem with SEFI's financing mechanism that requires further evaluation and deliberation. Your Committee on Conference prioritized all projects and recommended those deemed essential for health and safety and those that were identified as shovel-ready for immediate implementation. These projects will serve to protect the public welfare while providing stimulus to the state's economy.

"The largest areas funded in this budget, all means of financing, include: \$816 million for the Department of Transportation Airports, Highways and Harbors, \$328 million to the Department of Education public charter schools and public libraries, \$174 million for the University of Hawai'i system, and \$149 million for the Department of Health and Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation. In addition, your Committee on Conference appropriated \$7.8 million to repair and reconstruct infrastructure damage by the tsunami that struck the state on March 11 of this year. Lastly, your Committee on Conference appropriated over \$20 million for grants-in-aid to nonprofit organizations for facilities improvement and expansion. Continuation of the services provided to state residents by these nonprofit organizations is vital, especially given that the state has been forced to reduce services due to the current economic climate. At this time, I'd like to thank Senator Ige for a remarkable job during these difficult times. Also, a big mahalo to the support staff of the Ways and Means Committee and to all of our colleagues. Mahalo."

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I know how difficult it was, having chaired the Ways and Means committee for the last two years, and so I really want to take this time to commend the chair of Ways and Means for balancing the budget. I know how hard the work is for him and the staff, in having to again fill the pukas for our deficit. I commend him for his temperament, for his leadership, and I certainly appreciate his steadfastness during our conference, and also, Mr. President, thank you and thank your

staff for all of your support that you gave to the Ways and Means Committee. Mahalo."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"I, too, rise in support of this budget and would like to incorporate the words of the previous speaker as if they were my own because I share her appreciation for both the hard work that our current chair had to undertake. I think I was probably the last chair of Ways and Means that had a little bit of money to play with and we could fund the bills our subject matter committees prioritized. I know that that's a much better situation to be in than what our current chair or previous chair had to put up with. But I do think that the one thing that Chair Ige brings to this task is not only an understanding of some of the areas that are most near and dear to some of our hearts, the health and human service area, as well as the economic development and workforce development aspect, but he has that engineering mind to sort through all of the elements in the budget and financial and he has a great temperament. His down to earth personality is one of both fairness, ease of getting along, but a real steel rod in his back that I particularly appreciate especially when it came to preserving and standing up for the positions of the Senate because the pressure was immense. It was not an easy thing to do, and I think we were very lucky to have him in that chair. And, so, I appreciate the work although with every budget, there are things that I wish would have been done differently, but I think on the whole, we're doing the very best we can, even though we continue to try to fund a 21st century government with a 1965 revenue stream. I appreciate the hard work the vice chair on the CIP matters, as well as the chair of Ways and Means, and all of the members. Mahalo."

However, this bill is very unique in that it also separates out and singles vermin, insects, and pests for the manner in which they may or may not be killed, and last time I checked we did not make the cockroach one of our valued state animals or insects, and I don’t think the use of a rubber slipper, particularly a heavy slipper, would fall into the purview of approved methods of getting rid of this particular insect or vermin. You know, I think that we do a disservice when we have serious bills and we don’t use common sense or reasonableness. People that have had problems with vermin before, want them out, and if we have to have a judicial hearing, for example, to find out if their removal or death was within prescribed means, I think we have very difficult time. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose on a point of order and requested a recess.

At 10:42 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

solar facilities or other renewable energy, and I think our major focus should be on agricultural lands for agriculture. There was some testimony that showed that in addition there were people within the agricultural industry that expressed concerns, not opposition, but concerns about putting too much emphasis on some of the areas for renewable energy. And I know that the good chairman of Agriculture made some changes (we protected important ag lands), but I think it’s still a concern for me. Thank you.”

“Real estate appraisers often act in various capacities. They serve as arbitrators in proceedings to determine the fair market value, fair market rental value, or fair and reasonable rents of real estate. They also provide appraisal services in connection with arbitration proceedings to determine the fair market value, fair market rental value, or fair and reasonable rents of real estate. When acting as an arbitrator or as an appraiser, they use their skills, collective knowledge of the market, as well as their experience and judgment in order to determine the appropriate information in either capacity. This legislation will ensure that there is the highest quality of service possible, while providing transparency to the consumer in the process, because it requires all real estate appraisers to adhere to the Uniform Standards Professional Appraisal Practice when acting as an appraiser or as an arbitrator. But perhaps more importantly this bill will provide the public with even better service because the arbitration panel must now provide a written report explaining their findings. No longer will the requesting parties be left wondering why the panel ruled as it did or get just a one-line report. The required report will now provide a rationale and methodology for the arbitration decision, allowing their decision to be more fully understood. Your committee appreciates the role and the value of the work of appraisers acting as arbitrators. With this measure, we believe that these appraisers acting in this capacity will continue to provide the people of Hawai’i with fair, consistent, high quality and professional work. I encourage all of my colleagues to join me in support Senate Bill No. 975, Conference Draft No. 1. Mahalo.”

"Pseudoephedrine is a safe drug, when it is used to treat cold and allergy symptoms and is use by many people for its intended purpose.

"Unfortunately, some people choose to abuse their access to pseudoephedrine and ephedrine products by stripping out the active ingredients and using them in the production of illegal drugs known as crystal methamphetamine.

"This measure is another tool to help interrupt the production and distribution of crystal meth in our community because it makes the practice of smurfing much more difficult. Smurfs are individuals who go from store to store to get the maximum legal amount of drugs from one location and move on to another, circumventing the current law. Without the electronic tracking system for the sale of pseudoephedrine and ephedrine products established in this bill the smurfs activity would continue to be largely undetected. SB 40 creates an electronic interface in order to track the sale of these products to individuals and will also electronically collaborate with a national database to track sales in a number of states.

"The database can be accessed by law enforcement officials if necessary, and the tracking system will also alert the pharmacy when an individual has exceeded the legal amount of purchased pseudoephedrine or ephedrine within a daily or monthly time frame.

"Our goal is to both give people access to the care they need while also continuing to limit the abuse of various drugs. SB40 is a powerful tool for us to continue to combat the production of methamphetamines in our state. And it comes at no cost to the taxpayers.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of SB 40. Mahalo."

The original draft of the bill had the correction facility reporting to the legislature, which I thought was a bit odd, because for example if we got a report on May 6,

what is the legislature going to do? Now the bill has a report going to the Governor. Again, I think the intent is good and there should be a timely manner of reporting this data, but we have not seen, really, a problem that needs legislative approval. Thank you."

A victim's ability to retain employment is crucial in assuring that they can access medical care and retain financial independence at a time that they are experiencing increased emotional and physical distress and are in the need of greater protection and security. I introduced this bill to address some of my constituent's experiences with discrimination in the work place as a result of their domestic abuse. This bill will create a new protected class for domestic and sexual abuse and victims, not only prohibiting employers from discriminating against abuse victims but also providing them with reasonable accommodations to provide for greater security in the workplace. All people need to feel safe, especially in the workplace where we as a society often spend a lot of our time. By providing increased safety and security in the workplace we are assuring that they can remain productive as well as providing them the support they need at such a vulnerable time. This bill addresses the concerns for victims and their families and employers in assuring that we can maintain safe workplace environments for everyone.

"I would just like to commend the great support of the Women's Legislative Caucus and the Judiciary and Labor committees that moved this integral piece of legislative forward. I would also like to say mahalo to the women helped by Maui's Women Helping Women and the West Maui Domestic Violence Task Force for bringing this issue to the forefront and helping us craft legislation to empower women in the workplace who are also coping the domestic abuse in their lives.

"I respectfully urge all of my colleagues to vote favorably on this bill."

I can speak to this bill, not because I’m a water safety officer or not because I’m a firefighter. While these classes are extremely important, I think that we send the wrong message into the community when we single out different kinds of people for different kinds of punishment. If crime is wrong and punishment should be swift, then everyone should be treated equally in that particular circumstance. I realize that we’ve already carved out exemptions, but I don’t think the answer’s carving out more exemptions. I think the exemption is swifter law enforcement and judicial determination. Thank you.”

They have proven themselves to have clinical experience of sufficient depth and breadth to safely practice within their specialties without supervision.

“For 15 years, APRNs have shown that they are qualified to be personally accountable for their practices and have safely prescribed drugs appropriate to their specialties. Because of this outstanding record, there is no longer a need for a supervisory relationship with a physician. This measure will ensure that APRNs will be able to practice to their fullest extent as primary care providers with the commensurate ability to prescribe and manage patients independently.

“This measure clarifies that hospitals must recognize the statutorily granted authority of APRNs to function as primary care providers and allow them to practice to the fullest extent of their licensure in a hospital setting. HB 484, CD1 will help to effectuate Act 169, SLH 2009, which required insurers to recognize APRNs as primary care providers. HB 484, CD1 along with Act 169 and Act 57, SLH 2010, which updated their licensing statute, will empower the nursing profession and help narrow the access-to-care gap especially in our rural areas. Further, allowing APRNs to operate to the fullest extent of their legally granted scope of practice will help increase the availability of highly qualified, caring healthcare providers and thereby ensure that the people of Hawai‘i have the best possible healthcare choices. Mahalo.”

This will also increase the Program loan limit to \$250,000. Our Department of Agriculture believes that these provisions will aid in the expansion of our struggling agricultural industry. So members, I ask for your support in helping to lift the burden that our farmers now face, and vote in favor of this bill.

It sets the following; qualification of new farmers based on ability, experience and training; substitutes the Future Farmer of America graduates with those of the National FFA organization; reduce the number of credit denials for class “F” loans; sets the Program interest rate for “F” loans at 1.5 percent below the prime rate at 6 percent whichever is less; and finally, reduces the minimum interest rate for agricultural loans made under Chapter 155 (HRS) from 3 to 1 percent. This will also increase the Program loan limit to \$250,000. Our Department of Agriculture believes that these provisions will aid in the expansion of our struggling agricultural industry. So members, I ask for your support in helping to lift the burden that our farmers now face, and vote in favor of this bill.

"Because the life of our land and of our people is what makes us successful, it is important to support measures in which the goal is to ensure that business is able to operate in a socially and environmentally responsible manner and consider other qualities besides the bottom line.

"The sustainable business corporation model, outlined in SB 298, CD1, enables entrepreneurs and investors to pursue socially and environmentally responsible goals in the context of a for-profit enterprise where the directors and officers are empowered to consider factors other than profit when making their business decisions. A sustainable business corporation is able to pursue an innovative business model overseen by a director or directors with the specific responsibility to enforce the corporation's declared general or specific public benefit purpose.

"When a business is formed under this regulatory framework, it will not be penalized for pursuing its goals of operating in a socially and/or environmentally sound manner in addition to pursuing profits. It also creates accountability and transparency of social responsibility to the public. One goal of SB 298, CD1 is to enable and encourage businesses to be more responsible to the land and their communities. This type of stewardship will make all of us more successful.

“Mahalo to members of the private sector, our business schools and regulators for their foresight and assistance in crafting this forward-looking measure.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz’s remarks read as follows:

“The State of Hawai‘i has continuously supported the efforts towards reconciliation among the Native Hawaiian people and we must continue towards complete reconciliation. Senate Bill 1520 will provide long overdue recognition of Native Hawaiians as the only indigenous, aboriginal maoli people of Hawai‘i.

“Native Hawaiians are the last of the nation’s three major indigenous peoples who currently lack a formal government-to-government relationship with the United States. State recognition is an intermediate step for Native Hawaiians to ultimately achieve formal recognition on the federal level.

“This measure will establish a process for the reorganization of a first nation government by Native Hawaiians and its subsequent recognition by the State. This process will allow for recognition and ratification of governing documents and an interim first nation governing council. In addition, it establishes a nine-member commission to prepare, maintain, and certify a roll of qualified Native Hawaiian constituents.

“SB1520 will finally bring about the recognition of Native Hawaiians by the State of Hawai‘i in the same way the U.S. government recognizes Native Americans and Native Alaskans. SB1520 will enable the Native Hawaiian nation to negotiate directly with the State of Hawai‘i which will have long term financial implications and resolution of the Native Hawaiian issue for the state of Hawai‘i. The state can now move on.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the measure and said:

“For nearly 30 years the state has wrestled with this divisive issue. I remember well as one of the original trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs the hurt and sorrow expressed by our kūpuna over the trauma caused them by the ill treatment, belittlement, and discrimination that they had suffered in years past. There have been modest strides since then but much more needs to be done to perfect this reconciliation.

“Under this bill, the State of Hawai‘i formally recognizes the Native Hawaiian people as ‘the only indigenous, aboriginal, maoli people of Hawai‘i.’ We are the true Native people of this land; no one needs to tell us that. But to have the formal recognition by all the people of Hawai‘i, as accomplished here through this legislative action, is all important to the process that we embark upon.

“This is another step on the path toward the federal recognition of the Native Hawaiian people as the native people of the United States. It is a strong testimony and evidence for our case pending before Congress.

“Just as important as formal recognition, however, this bill also accomplishes many things. It enables the formation of a verified roll or listing of qualified Native Hawaiian people, another critical stride toward putting Native Hawaiians on an equal footing with the other recognized native peoples of the United States.

“As I said, we are the native people of this land. Nevertheless, we need to create the roll, a verified listing, of who we are by name and status so that all the world will know who we are... and that we stand up to be counted.

“I congratulate this Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i and ask them to please support this farsighted legislation. Mahalo.”

Senator Galuteria rose in support of the measure and said:

“Mr. President, I’d like the words of the previous speaker to be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. In addition, I’d like to share some comments about a term that we found in our discussions earlier in the session called ‘reasonable inference.’ Reasonable inference, of course, is partly sunny, partly cloudy. It’s up to you. Reasonable inference depends on how you wake up at the beginning of the day and how you see the world, through your own lens. The recognition of the maoli has been reasonably inferred enough.

“We can take a look at about five instances, as instructed by the Attorney General, when asked the question of whether the

Hawaiians are the maoli people of Hawai'i. Well, he said, in about five ways: the apology from the federal government reasonably infers that you folks are. You have the Admissions Act that reasonably infers that the Hawaiians are the maoli people of Hawai'i. But, I think today with this landmark legislation, we will no longer reasonably infer that the Hawaiians are the maoli people of Hawai'i. Included in this is also the roll call, which will be funded by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, by the way, as they take their rightful place in this process, and in speaking to Senator Akaka this morning, he thanks the legislature for the initiative that we set forth in this next vote. With that, in support of this legislation, colleagues, we do ask you for your consent in this way. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"This bill has gone through six drafts. There have been many changes. I've sat through and participated in many of the hearings. And I think that the intent is quite clear and I certainly value and respect the words of both the good senator from the Big Island and the majority leader. However, I'm struck by the fact that what this bill is really doing is trying to find a way around the failed federal Akaka bill, failed for more than a decade. And, when we talk about reasonable inference, I don't think that any question has arisen here about the Native Hawaiian people, the laws that we have passed, the debates that we've had in the State of Hawai'i. I think that this bill really is aimed at the Congress. And just as when the apology resolution was passed and we were told it's not going to be used for any additional political purposes, it's a stand-alone statement, it's something long overdue, and this is what we deserve, and it's now justified, and we found out that that was not the true point, that it came back later on and was used in judicial, legislative and other conversations.

"I think that this bill goes far beyond what the intent and what the need is. I think that recognition is extremely important. I really don't think that anyone in this state has a problem with the recognition of the Native Hawaiian people. However, I do believe, after sitting through years and hours and hours of hearings about the proposed Akaka bill, and about blood quantum, and about lists, and about rolls, that people within the Native Hawaiian community themselves have issues about divisiveness and about selectivity. And I think what we should all be doing is finding ways to make sure that everyone is treated the same, that everyone gets the recognition that they deserve. Thank you."

Senator Kahele rose in strong support of the measure and said:

"This bill has been a long time in coming. This bill has been discussed here in this Chamber and among my colleagues, but more so it has been discussed for many, many years: that we are the indigenous people of this land. There are indigenous native Americans. There are native Alaskans. This bill, or its counterparts, have been discussed for many, many years by kūpuna who are no longer here today. This is just another step in recognition of the fact that our people, the Hawaiian people, that we are the host culture of these islands. We greeted all that came here with aloha.

"I was born in a fishing village, the last Hawaiian fishing village in the State of Hawai'i, the Territory of Hawai'i: Miloli'i. In the year 1942, when I was born, predominantly all of the residents there were Hawaiian: my kūpuna, my parents, my uncles, my extended 'ohana in that small fishing village. They spoke the language of these islands, 'olele o Hawai'i. I am an American. I served in the United States Marine Corps. I volunteered to serve. When my country asked me to do whatever to protect these islands and protect this nation, I willingly served. But the time has come for all of us to serve. We use the words aloha. We use the words Native Hawaiians.

It is time that the state and residents of this state, with no question in my mind, that they know, the majority of the residents of this state, know that this issue of recognition of the Native Hawaiians, its time has come. And as a freshman Senator, serving in this body, this august body of my colleagues, I ask for your strong support.

"For years, Senator Akaka has taken this issue to the United States Congress, and for years we tried, and for years in the House of Representatives it passed with the good help of the present Governor, Neil Abercrombie, and could never get it through the Senate for one reason or the other, whether it was the presidency that represented another party. Now, having said all of that, I want to thank all of my colleagues who are in support of this bill, and even I recognize the minority's opinion for his reasons why the bill should not be supported, but I ask all of my colleagues and all of the residents of Hawai'i to understand that this is the right thing to do. This is the pono thing to do.

"The Renaissance of the Hawaiian people started many, many years ago. For me, it started 30 years ago. And with those brave warriors who decided to occupy Kaho'olawe, the likes of Walter Ritte, Charles Maxwell, George Helm, those that gave their blood and their soul to bring this issue about our Hawaiians and the problems that we all face, and we can use many excuses of why we are what we are today. But I can say this and I say this from my kupuna, and I say this from my grandmother, a lady of pure Hawaiian blood, and blood quantum doesn't have anything to do with all of this. Yes, it does, and it doesn't. It has all to do with the word 'aloha,' and I recall as a young man in the fishing village of Miloli'i, when any stranger or anyone came into the village, when they approached our house, whether it was my dad or my grandma or my tutus or my kūpuna, they would say, 'e komo mai. E komo mai ika hale.' E komo mai and have food with us whether we had food or not, and whether it would just be a glass of water or anything offered in respect of the stranger. It is only in Hawai'i that we did that. And until today it continues, and as I look at my Senate colleague, Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland, and I can see and I can feel her pain for the homeless among our people. There are many that are on the beaches today, and they are of Native Hawaiian ancestry, and they need to be helped. And as the good governor has said, 'We need to stop attacking each other and we need to work together and help each other.' So, I ask all of my colleagues, that this is a very, very important issue today, the recognition of the Native Hawaiian people, and the time has come. Mahalo nui loa."

Senator Solomon rose and said:

"I just would like to submit these remarks in support of the previous speaker's remarks. This is The Queen's Prayer that was written by Queen Lili'uokalani on March 22, 1895, while she was under house arrest at 'Iolani Palace. I just would like to, for my colleagues, I just would like to just end my mana'o with the last verse where it says, 'No laila e ka Haku, Ma lalo o kou 'eheu, Kō mākou maluhia, A mau loa aku nō.' 'And so, to our Elders, protect us beneath your wings, and let peace be our portion, now and forever more.' Mr. President, this is the kauna of this bill. This bill goes beyond recognition. This bill asks and helps to heal the kaumaha, the heaviness, that the Hawaiian people have carried, not since statehood, Mr. President, since the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom.

"You know, my great grandfather, Tutu Kaia fought to restore the queen. He was imprisoned in those barracks that now we use as a room to socialize. The Hawaiian people were tortured in there, Mr. President. They were stripped down and they were, what, sprayed with cold water, hoping, hoping, Mr. President, that they would speak against the queen. My 'ohana believes to this day, Mr. President, this is how my great grandfather died from tuberculosis, and many of the Hawaiians

that were imprisoned at the time. Although I have great respect for our minority leader's remarks, but I see this as more, beyond what his remarks were all about.

"I just saw an interesting documentary on PBS that was aired Sunday on forgiveness and healing, analyzing the process of repairing nations that have been torn apart by civil wars. Our own country went through that after the Civil War. This isn't something new to democracy. This is what democracy is all about. Yet the willingness for people to stand up and face each other and say, 'You know, this was wrong.' This is what this bill is all about. I don't want my daughter being raised or being brought up in Hawai'i with all of this, as I say kaumaha weighing over her no'ono'o, her po'o, her head. It's we in this legislature and this body that have the na'au within us because we know all these people that have sacrificed their lives. Frenchy DeSoto: her whole 'ohana was just here. This was from 1978, the Constitutional Convention, when we created the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. This precedent is so profound of what this great State of Hawai'i has done so far for the Hawaiian people that we need to pono this and go one step farther and to get the United States to recognize us.

"As my fellow colleague, the judiciary chairman, mentioned during the conference and I felt it within my pu'uwai when he mentioned this. This is an indigenous legislation. This isn't talking about a preferred class of people. This isn't talking about the Hawaiians per se. This is an indigenous piece of legislation that was recognized by the United Nations in 2010. So, with this, Mr. President, speaking in support of my kanaka maoli who sits here next to me to the right, to his remarks, I'm urging all of my colleagues not only to support this legislation, but to advocate it on behalf of the Hawaiians. Mahalo nui."

Senator Ryan rose in strong support of the measure and said:

"As the Senator representing one of the largest communities of Native Hawaiians on O'ahu, as a kanaka maoli myself, and someone that grew up in the largely Hawaiian community of Moloka'i, I'd like to say to my colleague from Hawai'i Kai, we're not asking to be better than or special. I respect your comments. Oddly enough, my non-Hawaiian father was diligent in teaching me as I grew up that as Hawaiians we have responsibilities and as the indigenous people of this state, we do have rights. Our own Hawaiian history has shown us that. A lot of things have not been remedied. Many things have taken place both legally and historically to attempt to make corrections to what is wrong.

"Our ali'i had the foresight to create trusts because they saw what could happen. Department of Hawaiian Home Lands was created because the prince knew someday we may not be of our own 'aina. It's proving true. As I campaigned I saw a lot of issues we still need to work on. This bill is not the be-all solution for our people. It's just one more tool. I urge my colleagues to support this and thank you in advance. Aloha."

Senator Hee rose in support of the measure and said:

"This legislation is the first step in a long journey that began in 1893 with the overthrow of the kingdom. This legislation sets forth a path of recognition of Native Hawaiians, the indigenous people, with the state government. It facilitates now the negotiations directly between the Native Hawaiian nation and the state government of Hawai'i. This is not unique legislation. Indeed, nearly every one of us here belongs to an indigenous people. Nearly every one of us here is a member of an indigenous nation. It's just that that indigenous nation is not home to these islands. It is home to somewhere else.

"For most of us here, we are familiar with colonial conquest of imperial governments because most of our people are conquered people. Our indigenous ancestors were conquered by imperialists who colonized us, usually through the means of a

foreign religion, and at the end of the day, through the means of criticism of what our behavior was, contrary to the colonial government's. In the case of Hawai'i, a colonial intervention happened not once, but twice. I have spent most of my adult life in search of an identity. That is not unique to Hawaiian people. I have spent most of my adult life learning the language of my ancestors because inherent in the language is our identity. Two generations ago, my grandfather was born a citizen of the kingdom of Hawai'i in 1888. That's not a long time ago. It's two generations. At the age of five, his government was seized illegally by America.

"At the overthrow of the kingdom, President Cleveland sent Ambassador and former Congressman Blount who submitted a report that at the end of the day but for President Cleveland's unsuccessful re-election as president to William McKinley, the kingdom would have been returned, as it should have been. William Oleson, one of the annexationists, who conspired with Williams Stevens at the overthrow, became the first principal of the Kamehameha Schools of which I am a graduate. Kamehameha Schools became the first school of English immersion, and thus began the unraveling of who we are as Hawaiians by the unraveling and diminishment of our language. That is the way to take away a person's identity and by that virtue, that person's dignity. The Queen as deposed visited the Kamehameha Schools in the early 1900s. When she did so, the boys of Kamehameha stood and sang Hawai'i Pono'i, the song of sovereignty that all of us sing on occasion, most of us, without knowing the meaning of Hawai'i pono'i: that we will pick up our spears and defend our nation, Hawai'i pono'i, makua lani e, Kamehameha e. And when the queen drank from a cup of coffee, not a student among them would touch the cup because she was their mo'i wahine.

"This legislation restores a small measure of dignity to the first nation, the first nation of these islands. I said this on occasion: 'no la kou no kou la kou po'o po'o. That is taught by the kupa. To you alone belongs your thoughts. To them alone belong their thoughts. The recesses of that journey of pain belongs to them. There are a thousand indigenous people, nations, in the 50 states; 760 of those nations are federally recognized. There are a handful of nations that are recognized by individual states. This is not new legislation. There are those who would say everyone should be treated the same. Ask my grandfather. Ask him. Ask Lili'u, who was put in jail. Like the first speaker on this bill, I too served at the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and I am fully aware of my brothers and sisters who would reject this legislation. And I know why: because they reject the state government, they reject the United States of America. This is not hard. No legislation will get them to accept. Just as the majority leader of the House in conference said, 'somebody gonna sue.' Of course, somebody gonna sue. If this legislation wasn't important, nobody would sue. It is because it's important, but could you imagine my thoughts on listening to the House majority leader that somebody gonna sue after we passed Act 1? Somebody gonna sue? Of course. Because Act 1 is important legislation. And no wordsmithing of a new law of this importance could prevent Bill Purchase, Kenneth Conklin, Twiggy from filing a lawsuit. Bring it on. Bring it on. Because the facts of history will not change, the feelings of the indigenes will not change, and this issue will not go away. This legislation is the first step to reconciliation. This legislation sends a message to every member of Congress, and this legislation, supported by the Governor of the State of Hawai'i, begins a cooperative relationship between the Hawaiian people and the State of Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator English rose in support of the measure and said:

"May I ask that all the words of all of those who spoke in favor of this be incorporated as though they were my own.

"In addition, Mr. President, let me just say this, that my district, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, East Maui, Hāna, I was just looking at the recently released census numbers, and I can tell you that Hāna has dropped in its percentage of Native Hawaiians; we're down from 69 percent to 64 percent. Moloka'i has dropped from 63 percent to about 61 percent Native Hawaiian. What I'm trying to paint here, is that we have huge pockets of our people that have been disenfranchised, have been unincorporated, have been made to feel as if they are 'others' in their own homeland. So, this particular measure is the first step in us as a state not waiting for the federal government, not waiting for Congress, not waiting for the United Nations, not waiting for some outside entity, but us taking some action to rectify this very bad situation.

"Both senators from the Big Island spoke about the long wait of our people, spoke about the homelessness of our people. I can tell you that when I go home to Hāna, I have many people coming up to me and they're not quite understanding the work that I do, but saying simple things like, 'Are we getting some land back? Can we build houses on our hui land?' So this is the beginning, and I want to emphasize that. This is the beginning. It's not the end. In fact, now that we're going to formalize the process, maybe, just maybe, we can begin dealing with all of the outcomes of that overthrow: the homelessness of our people, the landlessness of our people, the loss of language. Let's take that up for a second. You know, this Senate for the last eight years has passed a bill asking for equality of language use in state government. This Senate, and I'm very proud of each and every one of you. I cannot say the same for the guys in the lower house. The House of Representatives each year refuses to pass the bill. And we have a bill that simply says, 'Use Hawaiian and use English.'

"We've had the Comptroller under the Lingle Administration come in and I think the first year they said it's going to cost us \$30 million to do this. Excuse me, if you go to a Macintosh computer, you can have your whole operating systems in Hawaiian if you want. And that's free. This new administration, for some reason, I saw in the testimony, opposed our language bill, which strikes me as very odd, very odd indeed. But you see, this measure before us gives us the basis now to push the House to now pass the language bill, to push ourselves to allow some things that we've not allowed for everyone else. Let's use one example. You know, many Hawaiians have fractional interest in lands, but when they go to try and get a building permit, the county governments say, 'Oh, no, you don't own the land. You only own the little bit. We can't give you a permit to build a house.' So, what do they do? Okay, we move to the beach. Then the city government comes and says, 'Tsk, tsk, tsk. You shouldn't be living on the beach. Move somewhere else.' So then they move to the parks. Then what happens? The city government says, 'Oh, we're going to pass a law saying you cannot live in the parks.' Where do they go? They go to the median strip on the sidewalk, and what does the city government do? Pass another bill saying, 'Oh, I'm sorry. You cannot live on the median strip on the sidewalk.' You know, guys, the only safe harbor left for them is our front lawn on this Capitol building. And all of this for somebody that has a fractional interest in land, that wants to put a house on it, and the city government says, 'no.'

"So, I'm saying all of this because don't think that this ends the debate. Not at all. It causes us to organize ourselves, yes. We've had a number of attempts at this. You go back to Ka Lahui Hawai'i. You go back to Bumpy Kanahale. You go back to all of the groups that were well-practiced at constitutional conventions. OHA spent I-don't-know-how-many millions doing Kau Inoa, but you know I never did Kau Inoa because I don't know who has the information. I don't know what they did with it. I don't know who owns it. I didn't trust that data base. I still don't. Where is it? Who owns it? Anybody ask that

question? Anyway, we've had a lot of practice. This one now puts it into reality. This one says, 'Okay. Go ahead. We'll help you establish a process.' And then the key part is we step back. The state steps back and lets the roll go. Once the roll is established, it's up to us as Hawaiians to make it work.

"So, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I just want to say that this is the beginning; it's not the end. And the first things we have to address as the Senator from Kāhala'u said: our language. Pass that bill, House. Pass that Senate bill that we've sent over eight years in a row. Are they scared of the word 'aloha'? Are they scared of the word 'mahalo'? Kokua? Just Auwē ka minamina e, iā lākou. Ua hewa paha lākou, kā lākou 'i'ini, kā lakou mana'o no kō 'ōlelo Hawai'i, ua pau 'ia? Auwē ho'i. 'A'ale aia o loko 'ōlelo Hawai'i i kēia Manawa, ua make kekahi. Ea? Na lākou, na lākou ka hewa. Na lākou ka hewa. Ua hewa lākou i ka hale. Kēlā ka 'oia'i'o 'o ko'u mana'o i kēia manawa. Okay. Please vote for this bill. Let us begin the process. Mahalo a nui."

Senator Kahele rose and said:

"I would be remiss in not saying that I appreciate the Hawaiian caucus that stood firmly behind this bill, and also a special mahalo to your leadership, Mr. President, and the leadership of this body, and especially to my colleagues Senator Hee and Senator Solomon. Mahalo a nui loa. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 41 was adopted and S.B. No. 1520, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 42 (S.B. No. 742, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Ige and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 42 was adopted and S.B. No. 742, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE COUNCIL," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, Kim, Solomon). Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Green, Kouchi).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44 (S.B. No. 2, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44 be adopted and S.B. No. 2, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz's remarks read as follows:

"To date, the State has been unable to quantify or properly identify all of the lands that are to be included in the public land trust inventory, determine whether certain information about each parcel of land would be useful, or investigate the most appropriate means of establishing and maintaining the public land trust information system. Senate Bill 2 will require the Department of Land and Natural Resources to do so.

"Testimony has argued that currently held parcels by the State acquired after Statehood that are not specifically described does a disservice not only to Native Hawaiians and their proper entitlements, but does a disservice as well to the general public of Hawai'i for whom these lands should provide greater public service and use. A complete and accurate inventory of public

lands is critical in order to clarify the amount of revenues derived from the public land trust. The State has a fiduciary obligation to Native Hawaiian beneficiaries of the public land trust. In an effort to satisfy this obligation, this measure requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources as well as all state agencies to report on each parcel of land it holds. In addition, it requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources to initiate and coordinate all efforts to establish a public land trust information system, and to complete an operational public land trust information system.

“The Department of Land and Natural Resources has already collected a substantial amount of information about lands that are in the public trust and established a database of information about these lands. Additionally, a further study and review of the trust status of those lands to which other state agencies hold title and the disposition of those lands must be completed. This study or review will enable the Department of Land and Natural Resources to verify the accuracy of or make amendments to the trust status of those lands as indicated in the existing database. Lastly, this measure will assist in the process of accurately describing parcels that comprise the public land trust.”

Senator Solomon rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon’s remarks read as follows:

“Senate Bill No. 2, Relating to Public Land, requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources to initiate and coordinate efforts to establish public lands information system and database. It requires all state agencies to report and describe each parcel of land it holds, as well as the disposition and acquisition of each parcel and report any inaccuracies in any reports. The Bill also requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources to submit a progress report to the legislature.

“I can’t tell you how long we have wanted this work to be done. The State of Hawai‘i has been unable to quantify or clearly describe all of the land contained in its general lands inventory, on one hand, or in the public trust or ceded lands inventory, on the other.

“It’s an embarrassment. Moreover, it has not been possible to accurately quantify the amount of money earned by the State of Hawai‘i through the disposition of state lands, through leases, licenses and other dispositions. Neither has there been an accurate accounting of amounts generated from the disposition of lands in the general inventory versus the amounts realized through the disposition of lands in the public (ceded) lands trust.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44 was adopted and S.B. No. 2, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC LAND,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 49 (S.B. No. 1555, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 49 be adopted and S.B. No. 1555, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz’s remarks read as follows:

“The State of Hawai‘i needs to be competitive in the global economic marketplace. With the federal government rolling back its spending on economic stimulus, what do we rely on to stimulate tourism? What business climate do we have that encourages businesses to establish here? We should be focused on investing in our infrastructure as high-quality infrastructure is the backbone of our economy. It is what allows us to compete in the global economy. Our infrastructure is in desperate need of repair and we are falling behind.

“As the State faces a budget shortfall of \$1.3 billion dollars, State departments and programs need to be evaluated and a determination made as to where reductions could occur and still maintain the sustainability of each program and the operating budget. Departments such as the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) have been struggling the past several years due to budget cuts over the years. The department has seen a reduction in staff in its Division of Conservation and Resource enforcement officers.

“The State should look at this bill as an opportunity for the conversion of ineffective land use into a diverse growth industry. The state needs to focus on revenue-generating vehicles for each department to help sustain themselves rather than rely on the support of general funds.

“It is estimated that DLNR has jurisdiction over 1.3 million acres of land. Due to economic woes and fiscal limitations, the department has been hamstrung resulting in ineffective land use, dilapidated boat harbors, and unmaintained parks and trails. Senate Bill 1555 attempts to address these concerns by establishing a development arm for the department known as the Public Lands Corporation. The corporation will be a public land development program that makes optimal use of public lands for the economic, environmental, and social benefit of the people of Hawai‘i through aggressive diversified mixed use enterprises.

“Placing applicable public lands under the corporation’s jurisdiction, along with rehabilitating the supporting infrastructure, including boat harbors, parks, and trails, may help to create recreation and leisure areas, while also creating revenue-generating opportunities. The overall purpose of the corporation will be to generate revenues that may be used to offset the regulatory functions of DLNR.

“The corporation shall identify public lands that are suitable for redevelopment, initiate marketing analysis to determine the best revenue-generating programs for the public lands identified, enter into public-private agreements to appropriately redevelop the public lands identified, and provide the leadership for the redevelopment, financing, improvement, or enhancement of the selected redevelopment opportunities. For example, one of the areas the corporation looks to rehabilitate is small boat harbor facilities. Redeveloping the boat harbors and entering into public-private partnerships can generate new revenue from everyday activities of such facilities.

“A collaborative effort to assist in this conversion includes the Chair of DLNR, the Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, the Director of Budget and Finance, the Hawai‘i Community Development Authority, and a three-member team of an executive director, planner, and project-development specialist.

“DLNR alone has been unable to effectively use its 1.3 million acres. It may be embarrassing that this State cannot generate a surplus although it holds one of the biggest real estate opportunities to generate such revenues.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 49 was adopted and S.B. Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"You know, we had a lot of discussion during the session and many of us were lobbied quite heavily about this bill, the design bill process, which is fine, but the idea that still came out of the conference draft on this bill is that those that bid and lose for the contract are still subject to getting paid. I don't think that is a good principle. I don't think it's fair. There are other things in the bill that are good in terms of eliminating the number of bidders and other conforming statements, but this idea that the taxpayers will pay for losing bidders just is not equitable. Some of the supporters point out that in private industry the losing bidders do get a portion of payment because of their design or because of work that they do, and I think that that's fine, but I don't think that this is a good precedent. What this would mean is that in every project, the taxpayers would pay the highest price. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I, too, agree that this bill will pay losing bidders at a time when the state can least afford to pay this kind of money, and I know the opposition or those in support have said that it will support the small contractors, the small bidders, and yet it also will pay the large companies, the large bidders, and they're more likely the ones to bid, they're more likely the ones to get money for this, and I just don't think that this is one of our priorities, and we really need to prioritize where we spend our dollars. Certainly, the language says 'may' but when you say 'may' that means we have no control over deciding who will decide when they will actually begin to pay these contractors. There's a case where they may not pay the small contractors and only pay those bids that have large contractors. So, I cannot support this measure, Mr. President. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 60 was adopted and H.B. No. 985, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Tokuda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 84 be adopted and H.B. No. 945, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Tokuda rose in strong support of the measure and said:

"While this measure has caused controversy, resulted in the proliferation of much misinformation, and has flared many emotions, I do believe that calmer heads did prevail when this conference draft was created, and we have before us our best effort to comply with Act 167 while being cognizant of our fiscal and logistical realities. This measure requires 50 percent of our elementary schools to comply with this measure this school year and 100 percent of our elementary schools to comply with Act 167 by next school year. It does push back compliance for secondary schools at least initially until 2014, but we do call for reports as early as this September to keep the fire under the department and our schools and to adhere to the Legislature's will and intent to add rigor to the school day and calendar. I should also note that we have not forgotten or lost sight of the bill's original intent, and we have provided a much-needed exemption from the provisions of Act 167 to our multi-track schools. While these schools face significant challenges in regards to both scheduling and facilities, I think it is important to note that three out of four multi-track schools make Annual Yearly Progress and do their very best for their students despite the fact that they are in this situation, because we have not been able to meet the demands for facilities amidst their communities' growing population and school needs.

"Responding to the good senator from Hana's concern about the exceptional circumstances of one of his schools, we have also included in the conference draft the ability for the Board of Education to grant exemptions to schools on both the day and hour requirements of Act 167. At the end of the day, we are doing our best and remain committed to fulfilling the Legislature's will to increase and lengthen school days. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the Ways and Means chair and vice chair for their support in funding furlough restorations to the tune of over \$120 million over the biennium to ensure that the resources are there to maintain and fund 180 instructional days. That being said, I think we all know that seat time alone does not result in increased student achievement. It takes such things as highly effective teachers, parental and community engagement, and the application of resources and support where it matters most. Working with my colleague in the House, I remain committed to not only focusing on the implementation of Act 167, but doing what is necessary in all areas of educational policy to increase student achievement and success for all of our students. I humbly would ask for your support in the consideration of this measure. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"I have followed the bill through all of our Education hearings. I commend the Senate Education chairman, as well as the Ways and Means chairman, but when all is said and done, we had an obligation, and the obligation was to restore the number of instructional days and instructional hours. The public demanded it. Teachers demanded it. Parents demanded it. And, yes, even some of the students demanded it. And what did we do? Well, while I agree with the Education chairman that just the number of days or the number of hours themselves are not a guarantee of success or of educational attainment, the fact of the matter is we used to have 180 days. And then we went to the lowest common denominator in the nation with 166 days and everyone was appalled, not only here but also across the country, and we vowed to restore and to put back what we had because after all, as we say every day, the two things that are most important to us are our keiki and education. And so we passed Act 167. And then it came time to implement that.

“We also had another bill that had to do with bullying, cyberbullying, and so forth. I never saw as much bullying as I did from the HSTA union this year. The HSTA drove this legislation. They didn’t want their members to work. They didn’t care about the keiki. They cared about money. And they threw out a figure of \$55 million that it would cost each year to go back to where we had been before at a 180 instructional days and hours, and nobody that I know of has done an analysis of that \$55 million. I don’t know if they’re telling the truth. I don’t think they are, but nobody took the opportunity to check their figures. Why? Because it was from the HSTA. And I’ve been told they have a great deal of power in this building and around this community. But it was not for the betterment of education or for our keiki. And when we say we’re going to do something and we establish our priorities, then we should darn well do it, because that’s why the public gets frustrated with us. It’s all talk. And something as simple as this, we should have had resolve and said, ‘We’re going to do it for the keiki, and for the teachers, and for the parents.’ But instead we’re putting off half of the schools, the elementary schools for another year, and all of the secondary schools. And we’re still debating at this late date the definition of ‘instructional hours.’ It didn’t seem for 50 years that that was a problem, but it became a problem last year.

“Instructional days, instructional hours, these are all smoke screens. The DOE, the HSTA, get plenty of money, the most money that the taxpayers pay for any function in state government, and yet the question is how wisely they use it. And so, while I appreciate all of the efforts that went into trying to reach a compromise in trying to please everybody, in the end, the only one we really pleased was the HSTA. Thank you.”

Senator Tokuda rose in rebuttal and said:

“While I respect the words of the minority leader, especially in his reference to the cyberbullying and bullying laws that we passed, and as the focus of much of the bullying in the last few weeks from the teachers’ union in relation to this particular measure, I can assure you that the measure we’re voting on today does not please the teacher’s union, that it does hold their feet to the fire, as well as a number of education institutions and our Department of Education. This is not as easy to comply with as simply putting dollars on the table. There are logistical issues, and I would ask that any of you who have concern about this, talk to every single one of your principals tomorrow and ask them how easy is it going to be for them to comply with the provisions of Act 167, as it relates to school hours. But as I said before, as a subject of much of the bullying, to imply that this bill has been done to appease the teacher’s union is a farce. So, please, again, I ask for your support in this measure, and I would also ask that if you have questions as to this measure, talk to your schools. Thank you.”

Senator Ige rose and said:

“I just wanted to add a couple comments on this measure. What just lost in this is 31 or 38 schools already meet the requirements and at many of those schools the teachers have already volunteered to teach longer hours on behalf of our children. So, I just wanted to state that for the record. I do know that that is the case at Pearl Ridge Elementary School that my children went to, that committed teachers are out throughout all of public schools already sacrificing and giving time to our children. Thank you.”

We still continue to collect that fee. Now what we’re going to do with this bill is we’re going to expand the monthly fee to users of all other electronic communications connections. So, it is a tax increase in disguise and, again, no one really is looking at the oversight of how this money is being used.”

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“You know, we’ve had this bill before on several occasions, but I would remind my colleagues that there is a very important issue involved with the issuance of this \$40 million in these bonds, and it goes to the heart of the company that’s involved specifically. Jonathan Roberts is the licensing associate with the University of Hawai‘i, and there is a question, there’s still is an issue, that was brought up several years ago, has not been resolved, about this company. And what Roberts said was that Carbon Diversion was licensed to use flash carbonization and other patents developed by University of Hawai‘i professor Michael Antal, that the company cancelled the licenses saying that it had developed its own technology for which it has applied for patents. ‘We have no way of knowing whether it infringes on our patents (meaning the University of Hawai‘i) or not,’ Roberts said. He also said that in looking at the process itself, he’s not sure that the company has been able to successfully demonstrate the use of its technology. And I would remind colleagues that Carbon Bio-Engineers, Incorporated, was created after the hostile takeover of its predecessor Carbon Diversion, Incorporated, by a company that later became the subject of a Securities and Exchange Commission investigation into a ponzi scheme. Colleagues, I would think twice before supporting this bill. I cannot.”

It is important. It is necessary, but I think we need to keep a fiscal rein on those that are involved in this process. Thank you.”

People that are looking at their motor vehicle registration annually, find that it has gone up tremendously. With bills like this and the next one in order, it’s in addition to the tremendous price that we’re paying for gasoline, for service repairs, because of the fourth-world conditions of our roads and everything else. I don’t think it’s fair to place increasing burdens on the drivers of our state. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“I know a lot of work was put into the bill and there’s been a lot of discussion, a lot of testimony, and I’m sure that my colleagues have received a number of testimonies, late testimonies and concerns, about this bill as well. I’m voting ‘no’ because this bill does a lot of things that I have problems with. It adds more fees. It also adds, I think, more bureaucracy and, as we’ve seen from some of the late communications that we’ve received, a number of patients are unhappy with some of the changes in the provisions in trying to match the federal law. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in support of the measure and said:

“In Hawai‘i, as with most of the nation, health care is undergoing immense changes. In order to ensure that we continue to have ownership over what is best for our state, your conference committee recommends passage of S.B. No. 1274, C.D. No. 1, an administration bill based on model legislation adopted by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners in response to provisions in the Affordable Care Act. I know many of you, as the previous speaker noted, have been contacted to oppose this measure, and unfortunately the opposition has chosen to vilify the CPN chair as being anti-consumer. I take great exception to that characterization and want to offer a few remarks to clarify what this measure is about, its rationale for passage, and to refute some of the misinformation contained in some of the email we’ve received.

“On July 1, Hawai‘i’s current law that outlines a process for a few people to use to dispute a denial of claims by their health insurance plan will be overridden by the provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. It will no longer be available to any of our consumers. The ACA requires use of an independent review organization to handle disputed claims. The IRO is a fair pro-consumer process that is a streamlined process and is used in many other states and for disputes regarding Medicare claims. Hawai‘i’s current law does not utilize this process and is not in compliance with federal law.

“Your committee believes that Hawai‘i should be driving the crafting of a compliance process that includes an independent review organization at its heart. The current law that the opponents of this legislation laud is currently not available to most of Hawai‘i’s health insurance consumers. Let me explain. In 2004, the Hawai‘i Supreme Court ruled that health care consumer employees of businesses covered by ERISA could not access the process, the external review process, outlined in current Hawai‘i state law.

“In 2008, based on an Attorney General opinion, EUTF members were also exempted from the state’s external review process. At this time our external review process only handles a few individuals, less than one complaint a month on average, of non-group members and some Medicaid members, and we are having a difficult time finding physicians to volunteer to serve on the current panels called for in our current statute. The process is costly, time-consuming, and does not help the vast majority of our health insurance consumers. We need a fair review process that all our citizens can utilize, and this bill is a step in that direction. Medicaid offers an administrative hearings process at the Department of Human Services and disputed services can continue to be paid for while the hearing officer hears the case. One of the provisions of this bill is to review the DHS administrative process which is overseen by the centers for Medicare and Medicaid to ascertain if this population should also be rolled into the IRO process. The EUTF process will be reviewed as well. It is this chair’s belief that all of our people should have access to an independent review organization process, and the information requested in this bill will give the 2012 Legislature the basis for that discussion. Also, in an abundance of caution, the bill provides that the current flawed statute will return to the books if ACA is deemed unconstitutional.

“This legislation, S.B. No. 1274, C.D. 1, will enable Hawai‘i to have ownership over shaping the IRO process for Hawai‘i, rather than a version imposed by the federal Department of Health and Human Services. It is a process that has been used successfully in other states and for thousands of Medicare recipients.

“Additionally, in an abundance of caution, we have inserted language that will allow the state to revert to the previous external review process should the Affordable Care Act be found unconstitutional. Madame President, your committee has

worked diligently on this measure, and I ask all of my colleagues to vote to move this measure forward. Mahalo.”

“Mr. President, colleagues, as I have stated before, this measure will help to advance healthcare in our state and could be the vehicle for giving us an additional amount of diversity in terms of our healthcare choices. It will set-up the framework for the Hawai‘i Health Connector, an internet portal whereby all of the qualified plans, either under the federal Affordable Care Act or under the Hawai‘i Prepaid Health Act would be posted allowing people to have access to information about those plans. They could compare rates. They could compare the elements in the plans. And it would also be a way that we can ultimately integrate our QUEST and Medicaid programs so that those individuals have choice as well.

“Your Conference Committee found that the federal Affordable Care Act requires each state to establish a health insurance exchange to regulate health insurance plans and distribute information. It is in the best interest of the State to retain regulatory control over all aspects of its domestic health insurance industry by creating the Health Connector. In order to assure this will be successful, your Conference Committee has clarified that qualified dental plans are included in all applicable provisions of the measure, funded \$750,000 from the appropriate federal fundings as well as provided an effective date upon approval with funding effective on July 1, 2011.

“I continue to believe that this is an important step forward. It frames a more informed, transparent marketplace for providing health insurance to our consumers. Thank you.”

So, if we’re going to talk about conformity, conformity means that we should take everything, and we don’t do that. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose in support of the measure and said:

"I got back just in time as it turns out. I wanted to rise in support, but really, I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce to the members the staff of the Judiciary committee. Some of you who have been around when the last time I tried this gig, there was a president who's now in Congress and it was a different day, and the anxiety was much higher. The anxiety has lowered, not so much because of a different president, but because I have a staff that has been remarkably resilient under the toughest of ... In any event, as you know, I'm sure you know, otherwise you wouldn't be there, the budget does take into account many of the things that the Chief Justice had requested, but most of all, it restores the furlough days. I want to acknowledge the Chair of Ways and Means and the Committee on Ways and Means because it was very easy working with the committee, as was the counterpart on the House, Representative Agaran. He was very, very easy.

"So, with your indulgence, I would like to introduce my staff. Kala Enos, some of you know, seated here. Henry Kim is seated there. He just passed the bar; was a former Deputy Attorney in California and he tells me that he will be employed

by the Attorney General following session. Immediately behind me is Lehua Opedal. She is a Hoke and a Kamehameha graduate. He uncle is Sandy Hoke who some of you, if you've been around as long as I have, would recognize the name as a former member of the City Council. Lehua is singly responsible for the confirmation of judges, so it was a nice occasion this session to have her. I have always referred her as still-waters-run-deep, because she's very quiet but very focused in her work. Next to Lehua is Laila Goring. She is a student of political science. She is Mexican. She is a sovereignty advocate. She is very passionate. She was the one in charge with Senate Bill No. 1520, and she is the one that, when I drop the ball, she always had the ball. So it's very easy to work with Laila Goring. Sherrie Seki is a former Deputy AG with Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Her glass is half-full; she found ways to make people smile and she's a tremendous asset in terms of keeping the agenda going forward. Lance Kobashigawa is next to Sherrie. He is singly most important, responsible for the judiciary budget. He is the one that was a literal nuisance to the judiciary, but he worked real hard and he got people real irritated, so I was very glad that someone could feel what that feels like. And Keiki Kipapa is one of our clerks, and she is on loan to me from the City and County of Honolulu. She took leave without pay to help shepherd the committee and keep the committee moving. There are a couple other members, Andria Pakele and Charin Tomomitsu, who also were very helpful. So, with those few remarks and the credit where credit is due, I would urge my colleagues to please support the budget. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129 was adopted and H.B. No. 300, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 130 (H.B. No. 1566, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 130 be adopted and H.B. No. 1566, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"We need to do a lot of work with our harbors. We have many problems, but the crown jewel, of course, is Ala Wai, and we've debated for years the fees that are being charged now, the need for repairs, and also the possible commercialization. This bill tries to put everything in one bill, but really hasn't satisfied all of the requirements. First of all, there still is a question about possible commercial use permits and how that will affect boaters, surfers, swimmers, and others in and around the property. In addition, it will increase moorage fees, and some people say, 'Well, that's long overdue. We should increase the moorage fees.' But it will also increase utility fees and common area maintenance fees. We don't know what those fees will be, and some of the boaters are concerned about the hearings process and the availability for input. In any event, it's going to be a hardship on boaters, and interestingly enough Hawai'i probably pales in comparison with the number of landlocked states in terms of the number of boats and boating facilities. So, our objective should be certainly repair, improvement, maintenance, and expansion of these facilities. This bill will not do that. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. com. Rep. No. 130 was adopted and H.B. No. 1566, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMALL BOAT HARBORS," having been read throughout,

passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Fukunaga, Galuteria). Noes, 3 (Green, Ihara, Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131 (S.B. No. 1073, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131 be adopted and S.B. No. 1073, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“We have instituted surcharges for the indigents in the past. Now we’re going to increase those, and what it means is that the cost of justice and the cost of filing for everyone else is going to continue to go up, so it’ll be another basically a tax or fee increase. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose in support of the measure and said:

“I’m not sure what the previous speaker means ‘another tax,’ because this fee is paid for by lawyers, and the part of the fee which began in 1995 is to support the indigent legal services, which include Legal Aid and other services for the poor people. Now, the previous speaker may imply that, ‘Well, because the attorney’s going to pay a higher fee for these indigent services, they’re going to charge more money for their work.’ Well, I hate to let anyone down by uncovering the surprise, but they’re going to do it anyway. It’s just like the hotel room tax: ‘Don’t raise it because if you do, the hotel’s going to raise the room price.’ Well, I hate to break it. They raise ‘em anyway. How this would somehow be construed as a tax is beyond me, unless if people pay more for private services that oftentimes they elect to engage in is form of taxation, then so be it. Everything is a tax, but the idea that there’s any public funds involved in this is not true. And at a time when the safety net has literally fallen out from under poor people, the idea that attorneys should now be required to pay anywhere from \$15 to \$30 to \$40 more to indigent legal services is long overdue and is only right so that attorneys can feel the pain of poor people that feel it on an everyday basis. So, I would ask for the support of the colleagues. Thank you.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose and said:

“Madam President, I’m sorry. I may have a potential conflict; I work at the Legal Aid Society of Hawai’i.”

The Chair responded that there was no conflict.

Senator Shimabukuro continued:

“And also, I’d like to have the words of the Chair of Judiciary and Labor Committee as if they were my own.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131 was adopted and S.B. No. 1073, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SURCHARGE FOR INDIGENT LEGAL SERVICES,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 132 (S.B. No. 1270, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 132 be adopted and S.B. No. 1270, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“Again, we’ve talked about this year after year: about raiding the fund. First, we raided the interest. Then, we raided part of the corpus. Now, we’re taking more of the fund. The most interesting thing to me though, in this bill, is the end part which holds the state free of liability in case anything happens with a hurricane or any damage. The state will not be liable in any way. So, everybody else is liable, but not us, for raiding this fund. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 132 was adopted and S.B. No. 1270, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HURRICANE RELIEF FUND,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 133 (S.B. No. 651, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 133 be adopted and S.B. No. 651, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“This is a very important bill. It’s a very important subject. It touches many people in our community and across the nation, and there was a great deal of deliberation and a lot of hard work put into the bill. I’m voting against the bill, first and foremost, because it does create a new special fund. In addition to that, however, while there are many desirable features in this bill, this bill is a very difficult one, and I think it gives false hope to people, particularly those that have faced, are facing, and will face foreclosure in the next several months. The bill kicks in in October. It requires mediation, but there’s no guarantee that it will stop a foreclosure process. In addition to that it treats all foreclosures basically the same: the person that has dutifully paid their mortgage and because of an illness or emergency or something else, something has happened to them, or the person that has refused to pay their mortgage for whatever reason over the years. It’s always more difficult to look at people as individuals and look at individual circumstances. Yet this bill, which is a big, hefty bill, attempts to do that. As I say, the intent is good: to try to get the mortgage lenders and the homeowners together.

“We don’t want people to go into foreclosure. We don’t want property to be lost. But both sides have responsibilities. We also saw the spectacle of out-of-state mortgage lenders coming into our state and telling us now they’re going to have a team on the ground and they’re going to do certain things. Where were they before? They should have done that. That’s one of the good features of the bill: trying to bring people together. But because of the special fund, because of the bureaucracy, because of additional fees and costs, I’m voting ‘no’ at this time. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in strong support of the measure and said:

“Before I review the measure, I want to say ‘mahalo’ to my staff and the extended staff from SMA that I’ve been so fortunate to work with on this measure, especially my SMA researcher Rebecca Anderson for her countless hours, late nights and weekends, working on this measure, even on a holiday. I also want to acknowledge and thank FACE, Faith Action for Community Equity, their leadership and their members for their advocacy and their steadfast efforts to assist us keep this measure on track. Mahalo for the input that we received from all the potential stakeholders.

“You know, this measure is truly a product of collaboration. Mahalo especially to the director and deputy director of the

Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, the Chief Justice, the Administrative Director of the Courts for their invaluable assistance in crafting the dispute resolution process embodied in this bill to ensure that it was workable and achieved our objectives on behalf of the owner-occupants in our state.

"I also want to recognize the members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force created by the 2010 Legislature who assisted us in crafting meaningful reforms. I especially want to thank the task force chair, Mr. Stephen Levins, our state's consumer protector for his leadership and invaluable advice. Mahalo, Stephen. The task force would not have gotten any productive work accomplished or meaningful recommendations without your leadership. You will be missed as the head of the Office of Consumer Protection. I'm happy, however, that we will still have access to your knowledge, institutional memory, and expertise available to us when you go to the Office of the Attorney General.

"Finally, I want to acknowledge my House counterpart, Chair Robert Herkes from the Big Island, and his staff for their steadfast support of developing a strong consumer protection measure to help our distressed homeowners. This bill does that and if I'm to believe some of my email, this bill may well be landmark legislation. I do know that it is a measure that we can all be proud of.

"Contrary to the previous speaker's remarks, this measure goes into effect upon approval and although the dispute resolution provisions must be operational by October 1st, between the day that the Governor signs this measure and October 1st, there is a moratorium on all non-judicial foreclosures in this state. In other words, we're giving a time-out for our consumers so that they can wait for the provisions of this measure to kick in so that they will have an opportunity to either convert to a judicial foreclosure (that was one of the recommendations of the task force) if that best suits their interests, or they can go through the dispute resolution process and the thing that should be noted is that the dispute resolution process, if you go through that, and at the end of the day a home-owner determines that foreclosure is actually the best process for you and you're in non-judicial foreclosure, you can walk away without what I call the sword of Damocles hanging over your head because you will be able to get on with your life without a deficiency judgment. That, I think, is real protection for our distressed homeowners.

"I'm also pleased that we've put a much longer moratorium on the non-judicial foreclosure part I process, until the task force has an opportunity to convene during the interim and make recommendations to the 2012 Legislature. Thus, the legislature can act before the non-judicial foreclosure process would go back into play. You know, this is a measure that may not help everyone stay in their home, but it will help everyone have a fair process, a fair hearing, and it will not clog our judiciary. I think this is something that, as I said, we can all be proud of.

"And, while you might think that this has been a long-winded speech, I actually have a much longer set of remarks that I would like to have inserted into the Journal, because it goes over all of the merits of the measure, all of the provisions of this bill, to help Hawai'i's distressed, single-family and multi-family homeowners. This is a measure that doesn't just affect a resident who may be in a single-family dwelling, but it would help many of us who are condo owners and we want to make sure that there's fairness all around. So, Madame President, if I could have those extended remarks inserted into the Journal, and then I ask all of my colleagues to join me in voting in favor of this measure. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's extended remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of SB 651 SD 2 HD 2 CD 1.

"Over the past year, mortgage foreclosures in Hawaii have increased rapidly so that this state now holds the unfortunate distinction of having one of the highest foreclosure rates in the nation. While a portion of foreclosures in the state represent second homes, vacation homes, or timeshares, many more affect island families. Residential foreclosures also have an impact beyond the individuals and families who are directly affected. Widespread foreclosures disrupt communities by creating empty properties in neighborhoods and leaving the remaining members of planned community and condominium associations accountable for a disproportionate share of common expenses and responsible for additional maintenance on foreclosed units. Large numbers of foreclosures also impact this state's already overburdened housing market by forcing former homeowners into the rental market where their financial distress can be compounded by Hawaii's high rental costs.

"In the 2010 regular legislative session, the Legislature authorized the creation of a Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force through Act 162. Act 162 directed the Task Force to undertake a study to develop general and specific policies and procedures necessary to improve the manner in which mortgage foreclosures are conducted in the State and to submit reports of its findings to the Legislature prior to the 2011 and 2012 regular sessions. The task force has worked diligently at its assignment and has submitted recommendations for legislation. Some of these recommendations, as well as other policies, are contained in SB 651. The Task Force has reported that it plans to submit further recommendations for, among other things, reforming the nonjudicial foreclosure process and the impacts on condominiums, planned communities and cooperatives its final report before the Legislature convenes in 2012.

"SB 651 addresses the state's foreclosure crisis by providing a means for some homeowners to avoid foreclosure and for many more to mitigate the damage of foreclosure when it is not avoidable. Federal programs exist to assist distressed homeowners, but these programs have proven inadequate to meet real-world needs. Homeowners still report bad-faith behavior by lenders and a lack of oversight in the foreclosure process, especially in nonjudicial power of sale foreclosures. SB 651 provides opportunities for meaningful negotiation between homeowners and lenders as well as oversight mechanisms through its three major components: dispute resolution, conversion of nonjudicial power of sale foreclosures to judicial actions, and a moratorium on new nonjudicial foreclosures under section 667-5, HRS.

"SB 651 creates the mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program to be administered by the DCCA. Based on a successful program initiated in Nevada and tailored to Hawai'i's unique needs through input from lenders, advocates for homeowners, the Judiciary, and DCCA, this program makes a facilitated dispute resolution process and an accompanying stay of the foreclosure available upon request to all owner-occupant homeowners who have received a foreclosure notice. At the election of an owner-occupant, a foreclosing mortgagee will be required to participate in dispute resolution for the purpose of avoiding foreclosure if possible or coming to a negotiated agreement if foreclosure is inevitable. This program recognizes that foreclosure is not always avoidable but that it is almost always possible for the parties to reach an agreement that reduces long-term damage and preserves a homeowner's dignity. Oversight of the process is provided by a trained facilitator who will ensure that the foreclosing mortgagee and homeowner comply with all program rules and participate in good faith in the process. Enforcement is provided by the

possibility of sanctions against each party, including a bar on completing the foreclosure against the foreclosing mortgagee and a lift of the stay triggered by the dispute resolution program against an owner-occupant. The mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program will be operative no later than October 1 of this year and will sunset three years later on September 30, 2014, in anticipation that the State and national economy will have stabilized by that time and the foreclosure crisis will have abated.

“As another means of introducing third-party oversight into a nonjudicial foreclosure, SB 651 enacts a recommendation by the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force to authorize an owner-occupant homeowner to file a petition with the Circuit Court to convert a nonjudicial power of sale foreclosure into a judicial action. The vast majority of nonjudicial foreclosures in this State are conducted pursuant to section 667-5, HRS, under a process that includes minimal notice and oversight. Conversion to a judicial action subjects these foreclosures to the oversight inherent in any judicial process. The conversion authorization contained in SB 651 will be effective upon approval of this measure and will sunset on December 31, 2012. SB 651 envisions a dual function for conversion. First, it will serve as a bridge measure that will provide immediate relief to owner-occupant homeowners who are currently involved in a pending nonjudicial foreclosure or will be involved in a nonjudicial foreclosure before the mortgage foreclosure dispute resolution program becomes operative. Second, it will provide an additional avenue of relief in the nonjudicial foreclosure process in anticipation of more sweeping reforms that may be recommended by the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force. The sunset of conversion authorization ensures that the resources of the Judiciary will have to accommodate a potential increase in its foreclosure case load for only a finite period of time.

“The final major innovation contained in SB 651 is a moratorium on new power of sale foreclosures brought under section 667-5, HRS, to commence upon the effective date of SB 651 and to expire on July 1, 2012. These types of foreclosures have been the source of most of the reported problems with foreclosures in this state and will most likely be the focus of the broad reforms to the foreclosure system that the Task Force is expected to recommend prior to the convening of the next regular legislative session. The purpose of the moratorium is two-fold. It avoids a situation where mortgagees rush to beat the clock and foreclose prematurely in cases where they may have otherwise been willing to come to an agreement with a distressed homeowner in order to avoid the new requirements created by SB 651. It also allows the Task Force to develop recommendations for broad reforms without risk of disrupting on-going actions in an operative system. The moratorium imposed by SB 651 allows for the continuation of nonjudicial foreclosures under section 667-5 that were commenced before the effective date of SB651, subject to an owner-occupant's right to pursue conversion to judicial foreclosure or dispute resolution, upon that program becoming operative. The moratorium on section 667-5 nonjudicial foreclosures will particularly affect condominium and planned community associations that use that process to foreclose on liens for past-due fees for common expenses payable to the association. The intention of the moratorium is not to burden associations when they take action to protect the interests of the majority of their members who have not defaulted on fees by collecting past-due amounts. Any actions under 667-5 that have already begun before SB 651 takes effect may continue. Further, nonjudicial lien foreclosures by an association are exempt from the dispute resolution and conversion requirements applicable to nonjudicial mortgage foreclosures, leaving nonjudicial foreclosure under part II of chapter 667, HRS, or judicial foreclosure free of those requirements. Finally, to account for the increased time and expense of

meeting the requirements of the available foreclosure processes, the cap on the amount of past-due fees that an association may collect has been doubled.

“SB 651 also contains additional reforms to the mortgage foreclosure system such as requirements for the location of public sale of property following a power of sale foreclosure and strengthened regulations on mortgage loan servicers to provide additional consumer protections. These improvements to specific portions of the foreclosure system will continue to be applicable regardless of larger systemic changes that may be suggested by the Task Force. While SB 651 is not able to address every aspect of the mortgage foreclosure system that is in need of reform, it provides immediate and long-term relief to local homeowners in a manner that is fair to mortgage lenders, state regulators, and the judiciary.

“I strongly urge all of my colleagues to support SB 651.”

Senator Kidani rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“As the Senator representing the largest homeowner's association in the State, I believe SB651 should not be enacted because it will harm residents in condominium and community associations. While I appreciate the protection from predatory lenders provided with this bill, an unintended effect of the bill would be to increase unrecoverable losses by restricting collection of association dues by homeowner associations. This increases the financial burden on renters and owners and is not a fair or equitable result of legislation intended to protect consumers.

“S.B. No. 651 impairs the financial viability of associations based upon abuses by lenders. The harms S.B. No. 651 is intending to address is not caused by associations, but yet the associations will bear the financial cost.

“The mortgage foreclosure task force reported that condominium-related issues will be taken up in its next report to the legislature. Legislation affecting associations should await the outcome of the task force's work. For this reason, colleagues, I will vote against this measure.”

Senator Baker rose in rebuttal and said:

“I happen to be a condo owner myself and have been in condos for a number of years, and so we worked very diligently to make sure that neither the owners nor the associations were disadvantaged. While there is an extended moratorium on part I non-judicial foreclosures, condominiums for lien foreclosures can continue to access part II, and in addition, we provided an ability to recover a \$7,500 amount for CAM fees not paid. The current statute, I believe, is \$3,600. So we're trying not to disadvantage homeowners associations or condominium associations, in this regard. I also wanted to point out that one of the other features was that while junior lien holders, which condominium associations would be, cannot jump ahead of the line, while there is a pendency of going through dispute resolution, they are still able to act ahead of time. They can also quickly follow up at the end. I know it's a tough balancing act and there's probably more in the condominium area that can and should be done and the task force will be taking that up next year. But I think there are enough provisions in this measure to not impeded necessary actions by homeowner associations and we have fairly balanced the concerns of associations and the condo homeowner. If there are lots and lots of foreclosures, the rest of the condo homeowners who are not in foreclosure will ultimately pay the price, but at the same time wanting to make sure that if there is an opportunity for a condominium owner to cure the default, that the condominium association must allow that to happen. We tried very much to address the concerns that the Senator from Mililani had raised to us, and I'm disappointed to hear her say that we had not, at least in her perception, based on some of the other provisions

that we put in. The other measures that she had been most concerned about stayed on the conference table. I still urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Ige moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138 be adopted and S.B. No. 754, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Baker rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“Madam President, I know that there was much discussion in various committees on behalf of eliminating certain exemptions

of the general excise tax, and the notion was ‘well, it’s fair to do that.’ But I think this measure is heading us down the wrong direction. It is actually anti-economic recovery, and I’m very distressed to see that a bill that I was one of the authors was hijacked as the vehicle. That’s part of the reason I stand in opposition. In addition to what I think is the wrong philosophy in the C.D. No. 1, I want to make it clear that this is not a measure that I would have ever voted for; as a matter of fact in both this year and last year had voted against just such an approach, because I believe that it actually will cost us jobs. It will raise the price of many of our goods and services and certainly raise the cost of living in the state. It may get us a little bit of money, but at what price? It’s going to cause some of our businesses to try to change the way that they do business to avoid a tax on the tax. And as one who had been in the legislature prior, when we began some of the process of de-pyramiding the GET, I certainly think we’re going in the wrong direction. So, it is with regret, because I know that this is part of the Senate’s financial plan and I guess ultimately the state’s financial plan, that I rise to speak against the measure. But I will be voting ‘no.’”

Senator Slom rose in opposition to the measure and said:

“And we’ve just proved the admonition of strange bedfellows. So happy to be on the same side with the Commerce and Consumer Protection Chair. Once.

“This is a bad bill. As I’ve said previously, this bill will hurt businesses, but more importantly, it will hurt people because it’s going to cost jobs. You know people have described this as exemptions and loop holes and tax benefits for particularly businesses, particularly the airlines, the water carriers, and so forth, and it’s not that. It’s exactly what the Commerce chairman said. It is a way of trying to equalize the playing field, and reduce or eliminate the double taxation, the pyramiding, of this horrendous tax, the general excise gross income tax. And I know that as I spoke earlier about the budget, everything is about money, and this was the biggest money maker, \$400 million, but we have to look at the consequences, and what it does, and what the unintended consequences are going to be. And again I repeat my sadness that this legislature did nothing to try to improve the business and investment climate here. That’s what we need. Instead, we’re picking apart those businesses, those individuals, where we see larger amounts of money. I think that we’re going to be very sad in the months ahead that we did this because it is going to have negative effects. Thank you.”

Senator Ige rose in support of the measure with reservations and said:

“Members, as you all know, the Senate had other alternatives that we definitely wanted to explore this session. As we went through the session and the House and the Governor had made decisions about how to close the deficit in our budget, this was the last proposal standing. So, I do stand in support of this with reservations. It is the largest part of our financial plan outside of the budget, and I am concerned and share the concerns with the previous speakers, but at this point in the session, it is the only option left that allows us to close our budget. So, I would encourage all of you to vote in support. Thank you.”

Senator Fukunaga rose and said:

“I want to note for the members that this was one of the measures that was introduced by the Small Business Caucus and it was modified in the House to add new contents; as a consequence, I must join my colleague from the Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee in voting ‘no.’ We appreciate the efforts of the Ways and Means conference chair in trying to mitigate the adverse consequences of deleting the GET exemption on loading and unloading with respect to the costs

that neighbor island residents would bear. I think that was a good amendment to make, to remove that particular section of the bill. However, since the bill was originally intended to make things a lot simpler for the small business community, I must regretfully vote 'no' on this measure. Thank you."

Senator Baker requested a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Taniguchi requested his vote be cast "aye, with reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Wakai rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"I think the negative fallout from moving forward on this measure certainly could be devastating. I've been a long advocate throughout the session and in previous sessions in the House of really getting a handle on credits and exemptions and finding out how many dollars do we lose, but also how many dollars of economic activity are generated. I think it's irresponsible for all of us to be here not knowing exactly what the loss is to all of these credits and exemptions, as well as not knowing what the economic benefits have been. So, I've been a long advocate to do that, to go down that road of starting to analyze and quantify all of these numbers. By the same token, I think it's almost irresponsible of us at this point to just sweep all of these tax exemption measures off the books without knowing what the potential negative impacts are going to be. So, for those reasons I will be voting 'no' on this measure. Thank you, Madame President."

Senator Chun Oakland rose in opposition to the measure and said:

"Originally I was one of the co-sponsors of this bill. The original bill contained a proposal that the Small Business Caucus was very supportive of. I'm sorry that the House inserted a proposal that hurts businesses into the bill. I cannot support the new content of the measure. Thank you."

Senator Nishihara rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Nishihara's remarks read as follows:

"I rise to speak with reservations on this bill. The unfortunate circumstances of our state facing another year of diminished revenues and need to balance the budget has led us to select this bill to close the budget deficit. This comes at a time of struggling businesses and continued unemployment. This bill to temporarily suspend the general excise and use tax exemption for certain amounts received by certain persons and require the payment of both taxes at a 4 percent rate, will, I fear, have the unintended consequence of diminished business activity leading to further reductions in tax revenue. If the assumptions that have led to its consideration turn out to be correct, the budget will reflect a chance to stabilize our state's economic picture. If it is wrong, we will be again faced with new unappealing Council of Revenue numbers, caused in part by the consequences of this bill. I will vote to support this bill, with my reservations, because it has become a piece of a total construction of measures to create a balanced budget. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Nishihara moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 37 be adopted and S.B. No. 1511, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Nishihara rose in support of the measure and said:

“You know, in the discussions, members, in hearings that have gone on for this bill, it was abundantly clear that it is intended to support and grow our fledgling aquaculture industry. This will allow lessees to be granted up to 65 years. And this is happening in good standing if they seek to renew existing ones. This bill will provide the opportunity for expansion of our aquaculture industry on public lands. This bill is not intended to include ocean farming, a section that was removed, allowing ocean leases was removed, and section two of the bill authorizes the DOT to designate certain lands for aquaculture to use and then to enter into agreements with the DLNR for the disposition of such lands. This is a good bill that will advance our local aquaculture industry, which, in addition to our agriculture bills, will make a meaningful attempt to reverse the downward trend that began 50 years ago where Hawai'i went from growing and producing 90 percent of our food to now, just 10 percent that we have today. So, colleagues, I ask for your support. Thank you.”

Senator Wakai rose in support of the measure and said:

“It was mentioned on more than one occasion this morning that there are no bills that we are passing today that create jobs, but I argue that this is one of the few bills that has a potential of growing an industry, to make our pie a little bigger. But, we have to question, ‘Why is this pie, aquaculture, so small?’ In an ocean state, we import 90 percent of the fish we consume in the State of Hawai'i. That, I find, almost ridiculous. Do you think they import steak into Nebraska? I highly doubt it. We need to look at aquaculture as an export commodity and for many, many years, we have not paid enough effort and put enough of an investment into this particular area of agriculture. And we're not using one dime of state funds to do it. We're simply allowing those who want it invest in this area the opportunity to get federal funding to go ahead and do so. Aquaculture, as of 2009, was a \$35 million industry. It could be so much more to us as a source of food, as well as an economic opportunity. The previous speaker mentioned that at one point, this bill did have language that allowed for ocean leases, but we specifically took that language out in the conference draft. It's correct that there is no prohibition against ocean leases in the future, and we can certainly come back next year and take care of that if that is what will allay people's trepidation about voting in favor of this bill today. But in the meantime, people who want to grow this potential industry are having difficulty doing so without the financing. So, to get to economic growth and job generation, here's one of the few bills that we can really get moving if we do so today. So, I ask my colleagues to vote in favor of this particular measure. Thank you, Madam President.”

At 1:49 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Hee rose in support of the measure and said:

“The previous speaker rhetorically asked about importing fish to these islands. Let's keep the lines on the discussion of this bill clear. It's not quite as simple as asking that rhetorical question. The fact of the matter is fish are imported here because of one word and it's 'greed.' It's really simple. There's no 'opihi on this island. One word: it's 'greed.' People die picking 'opihi every year in the State of Hawai'i. One word: it's 'greed.' So, the idea that somehow that Hawai'i's importing fish because the aquaculture industry is somehow the panacea to the reality is just not so. I think that supporting the bill on its merits is fine. But any suggestion that a bill like this is needed because of the importation of fish or the suggestion that the passage of this bill somehow is the panacea to the importation of fish is simply not true. What it takes is kuleana. What it takes is courage. What it takes is good policy to prevent greed. It is what the Hawaiians had in place. It's called the kapu system.

When the mullet was with egg, you didn't take the mullet. Real simple. So, it's not because the aquaculture industry or some unrelated psychobabble on how this thing's going to save us from importing fish because it is not true. I will support the bill on its own merits and not some idea to the contrary. Thank you.”

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1406 (Gov. Msg. No. 662, 663 and 664):

Senator Tokuda then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nominations to the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents of the following:

Senator Tokuda rose in strong support of the nominees as follows:

“Your Committee on Education spent a considerable amount of time reviewing and talking with all of the nominees and found Saedene Ota, Coralie Matayoshi, and Jan Sullivan to be highly qualified candidates to serve on the University of Hawai‘i Board of Regents. They are successful and innovative businesswomen, a chief executive officer of a major, local non-profit affiliate, serve on numerous boards and give their time and resources to dozens of charities and organizations, and have been recognized locally and nationally for their work. I should also note that these three women will not only make significant gains towards attaining gender balance on the Board of Regents, where they will go from being one to four, but above all, will bring to the board fresh perspectives, new ideas, and a tenacious spirit focused on ensuring that all individuals have access to top of the line higher education opportunities here in Hawai‘i.

“While your committee commends the Regents Candidates Advisory Council for fielding these outstanding nominees, I would be remiss if I did not take this opportunity to state that substantive concerns have been raised as to the selection process created in 2007 as a result of a constitutional amendment calling for the existence of an advisory council. I believe the Legislature at the time did its best to put forth a thoughtful process that was responsive to the constitutional mandate. Having witnessed firsthand over the years the issues and problems resulting from the process, and especially on the heels of the Board of Education appointments, where you can clearly see the value in granting the Governor the authority to select and appoint nominees on the basis of how each regent’s strength will add and complement the group, I believe the time has come to consider significant changes to the form and function of the Regents Candidate Advisory Council. I will be reviewing and considering changes during the interim, and it is my intention to come forward with legislation next year that creates a better, stronger process that responds to the will of the people while yielding the best candidates for the board. Until that time, I am very confident that the nominees we are about to confirm will bring much to the Board of Regents and will continue their service to our community in this new capacity. I humbly ask for all of your support and consideration on all of these Governor’s messages. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in strong support of the nominee under Gov. Msg. No. 662 as follows:

“I rise in strong support of Governor’s Message No. 662, the nomination of Saedene Ota as a member of the Board of Regents, and I do so on behalf of you, Mr. President, and our other Maui colleague, Senator English. You know, we’ve had an opportunity to observe Saedene and her activities in the community. She’s been very active on a number of non-profit boards and in community projects and school projects, and I can say without equivocation that she’s impressed me with her intelligence, her common sense, her optimism, her passion for life, and her exemplification of strong island values. Saedene’s personal experience as a young Maui entrepreneur and professional recommends her for the Board of Regents. Her own life illustrates a capacity to envision a Hawai‘i that can provide opportunities for other strong, educated professionals, and women, too.

“As someone filling a niche in the knowledge industry as a graphic and advertising professional, Saedene understands the

possibilities promised by new communications and graphics technology. These tools have allowed her to live and work on a neighbor island while providing quality service to clients statewide. Moreover, since we are all interested and this legislature, this Senate in particular, is committed to a strategy that supports STEM programs and career paths of helping young people go into science, technology, engineering and math professions, I believe that Sae’s background and commitment to developing Hawai‘i’s knowledge industry labor force will certainly serve her well and be an asset to the Board of Regents because she can speak and advocate for the opportunities provided by such STEM activities, as well as the creative side of those activities, to better prepare our future workforce.

“Mr. President and colleagues, I have no doubt that Sae will contribute to making sure that the University of Hawai‘i System remains one of the best bargains for a quality higher education in our country. As the university system continues to grow in its role as a more autonomous economic driver, as well as the premier source of higher education in all of our communities, it needs leaders who can balance the sensitivities of the ivory tower with the requirements and aspirations of the local community. Saedene Oda is certainly qualified in that regard, and I urge all of my colleagues to join me in supporting her for the UH Board of Regents. Mahalo.”

Senator Solomon rose in support of the nominees as follows:

“I am also speaking in support. However, I’m rising to speak in support of the chairwoman’s remarks, but I’m hoping that we’re going to be more far-reaching than what the chairwoman had proposed. I’m hoping that we could bring back the advise and consent back here to the Senate in reference to all of our Board of Regents. I think it’s necessary. The bottom line is that their collective energy provides the direction for the entire university system which definitely includes the neighbor islands. These are the kinds of situations that I feel this body should take a look at and we should really re-think, especially in times of crises, such as what this great state is experiencing: a tremendous deficit. I think that knowing who these players are and knowing what their positions are in terms of restructuring our programs is critical. And I really would advise the chairwoman that if she would take that into consideration, to look beyond of what she’s proposing, as a possibility of returning the advise and the consent of our Board of Regents to the Senate. Thank you very much.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At 10:56 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:57 a.m.

Senator Galuteria rose to make the following remarks:

"Mr. President, colleagues, before we adjourn today, which will happen in a few moments, this body would be remiss if we didn't seize this opportunity to thank you, Mr. President, for your leadership this year. It was a collaborative leadership with collaborative solutions that provided a sea change in the way this body operates with our colleagues on the other side of the Capitol. Through your leadership, we provided ourselves the opportunity to unify. We didn't get everything we wanted individually, but collectively, as a body, as a Senate, we spoke volumes in the hard decision that we made that affected all of us and all of Hawai'i.

"But lest we not forget the achievements that we made, colleagues, and if I may, Mr. President, I'd just like to point out a few, because it was landmark decisions and landmark legislation that we will leave this particular session with that sometimes we tend to forget because it seemed like such a lifetime ago that we passed the civil unions bill. Yet, through that and with the bookend on the other end of the Hawaiian recognition and roll call, in between, we had ERS reform, saving \$400 million in five years, and billions in thirty years. We addressed, through the leadership of our CPN chair, mortgage foreclosures which has taken our economy to its knees. Mr. President, we appointed a new Board of Education through the leadership of our Education chair. Furloughs is history. We have huge support for Medicaid. No GET increase. No tax on pensions. Lest we not forget, this is landmark colleagues. We shall leave this Chamber proud today.

"But without the help of our support, we couldn't have done it. So if I may, I'd like to thank the Clerk's office, our friends in HR (thank you so much; mahalo nui loa), the drafting agencies, SMA, LRB (mahalo nui loa), Data Systems (we are proud to be a paperless center), the Sergeant-at-Arms (mahalo nui loa for your hard work), the Document Center, Accounting, our Communications division, Capitol TV, and the many others, Mr. President and colleagues, that made it possible for the Senate to make its way through this session in a proud way. So, with that, we thank each and every one of our support staff, and

we just say this for the record: mahalo nui loa to everyone. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

Senator Kahele rose to make the following remarks:

“I would like to encompass the words of the previous speaker, the majority leader of this Senate. I would be remiss if I did not mention my staff. As a freshman Senator, when I arrived here on January 12 at 4:00 p.m., not knowing what was facing me, and I was picked up by my staff, Ainoa Naniolo and Ken Kakesako, and met the other staffers here at the Capitol; and knowing that the Legislature would be opening on January 19, the following Wednesday, I would be remiss in not thanking my staff for the wonderful work they have done, and all my colleagues here that I’ve gotten to know. Some of you I knew for many years, but others I’ve gotten to know a little better, and I really enjoyed my first session here, and I look forward to returning next year and being here again. I’d like to especially thank Senator Solomon, who has been a friend for many, many years, and when I got here, she graciously gave up her seat on the WAM Committee which I asked to sit on. Each one of you here is very special to me. I know today is our last day and we’re going to adjourn, but there’s a lot of work to be done ahead, and as our majority leader eloquently stated, that we have done a lot of good work here for the people of Hawai‘i. I look forward to working with you again next year and working hard for all of the people in our state, and in my district, and on the Big Island. Thank you very much. Mahalo ke akua ke iāla.”

Senator Solomon rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“I don’t mean to be putting the damper on everybody’s mahalo nuis, but I just want to speak to this issue if I may. The *Star-Advertiser*’s lead article in yesterday’s edition once again oversimplifies the state’s budget woes. It has again attempted to make the case that there are only two choices for Hawai‘i’s Legislature: either we’re going to continue to cut programs and services or raise taxes on an ever declining tax base. Of course, Mr. President, there is a third and better way that we can create new industry and that is a free-standing casino in Waikīkī. This would increase the total state revenue by over \$500 million a year. It would employ over 3,600 new workers on site and over 5,000 new jobs would be created by vendors servicing the new business. It would give Hawai‘i a larger pie to tax, and it would generate close to \$90 million in new taxes each year. That does not include the \$150 million impact fee that would be imposed on the winning bidder of the casino license. That doesn’t include the \$1 million fee just to make a bid. It does not include the costs and the benefits of constructing a casino and the renewal of the old and rundown Waikīkī area. And, Mr. President, I have to agree with this part about the ‘old and rundown Waikīkī area.’ I was simply appalled. I’m staying in Waikīkī. Simply, most of us do, from the neighbor islands. And I was really saddened to see how rundown Waikīkī really is. It really needs a facelift and it really needs some major help.

“A casino would be able to provide the funds to in fact do that, revitalize our aging tourism industry, and would have the added benefit of keeping some of the \$1 billion that Hawai‘i citizens spend already on gambling and related activities in Las Vegas, in California, and in all the other 48 states that already have gambling. And as in the case of ending prohibition in 1933, legalizing a casino would certainly put an end to the massive illegal gambling that’s going on now in Hawai‘i. Having a casino, of course, will not be a panacea. It won’t solve all our problems, but it will certainly go a long way toward creating a better tax base, and it will revitalize Waikīkī. It is a better way for us to go. So, during the interim, Mr. President, I’m hoping that all of my colleagues would give these thoughts some consideration, and when we do return,

maybe we could see the light at the end of the tunnel. Mahalo and aloha.”

Senator Ige rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“I just wanted to, I don’t know if some of you might have missed the article last Saturday, but at the FIRST Robotics World Championships in St. Louis last weekend, our own Waiialua High School’s robotics team took the top prize, the Chairman’s Award, as the best robotics team in the world. The world championship represents 352 international high school teams representing 29 countries, and our own North Shore’s best robotics team placed first. So, I just wanted to bring that to your attention. Just a reminder that, what we all know, that our public school students can compete with anyone on a global basis and take home the top prize. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Slom rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

“I think this was a momentous session for us. It was unlike any session that I’ve been a part of or have witnessed over the past several decades. I think that we, in fact, did achieve a great deal during the 60 working days. I, too, want to add my appreciation to the Senate President. Even though he may be younger, we’re often mistaken for one another in a crowd—from the back, at a distance. And you know, being the lone ranger is difficult, but even the lone ranger had help and support. And I want to particularly mention the majority leader who from the outset offered his hand of friendship and support, and my colleagues who made it a lot easier, and particularly those colleagues that when I would be trying to run back and forth to three different committees at the same time, a fourth and fifth committee would come over and say they still needed me for quorum. It was a warm feeling, Mr. President, knowing that.

“I also want to say that while we have had and will continue to have differences—and we had some very passionate discussions and arguments on issues—that’s the way it should be. And yet those arguments and discussions, I thought, were respectful, and they were beneficial to the public. I think in many ways, in many respects, we were more open and transparent this year, particularly this body, than before. And I think that’s a good thing. The good majority leader pointed out some of the things that we were able to stop that would have been even more negative for the taxpayers and residents of this community. I think we should thank those people that did not give up on us even though they were told, ‘You can’t fight city hall. You can’t fight the State Legislature.’ They continued to come down here.

“Many of my colleagues on the GET tax increase, for example, said daily about the number of calls and visits and communications that they had because the public did not give up. The AARP and their red shirts, had it not been for them, we would have had a pension tax unfair to all. To those in the business community and the new organization Save Our Jobs Hawai‘i, had they not been as consistent as they were, we would have had a devastating increase in the alcohol and liquor tax which would have affected adversely this industry. And there are many other people, people that came down continuously and advocated for animal rights, for the rights of women. Even though this is Boy’s Day, we know, Mr. President, the women really run the whole show (just stating the obvious). But people came down, more so than in recent years.

“And also, I think the media, which kind of dismissed us over the last couple years, I think the media did a much better job this year of uncovering or talking about the issues, particularly the online media that seemed to be much more independent of thought and spirit. So, we accomplished many things but we still have a far way to go. I talked about the budget and the budget process, and I know that a lot of hard

work and a lot of hard decision were made but we still have more decision and we still have a place to go because we have not reached the place where the people of Hawai'i can truly enjoy the fruits of their labor. I also believe that the public discussion that we had in this body and in our committees was really the lifeblood of the democracy and what we need to do. We need to not only say the words, but walk the talk and that means independence of thought and votes, and we had more of that, I think, this year than before.

"I was joking with the majority leader that on last Friday, when the decision was made that the Senate was going to stay strong and take a position no later than 6:00 p.m., some of us had our doubts whether we would do that, whether the leadership, Mr. President, would stick by that, but you did, and we applaud you for that, and I think it resulted in positive legislation that we got. Finally, two items: number one, I'm very proud of my staff and all that they helped do because being on all committees was quite an exercise, but it kept me young and strong, and I found out that I'm even older than Senator Kahele. It may be a couple months, but that gives me wisdom and kupuna status, which he will have to grudgingly recognize. Secondly, Mr. President and colleagues, I can assure you without any equivocation whatsoever that the native flying Hawaiian hoary bat will be back and prevail next year. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Hee rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I like to follow the previous speaker because he piques my interest; and I thought about this this morning, but I decided not to, and there he went again and piqued my interest. He talked about the online media in particular. You know, one of the things that the Legislature adopted this year was the shield law for two years, and it had been said over and over again that the Hawai'i law is more pervasive, is stronger than other states because it provides protection to bloggers. And so I thought about it this morning when I read the paper: that it's the same online media bloggers that have used the *Star-Advertiser* as its guinea pig this morning—or yesterday—with the alleged picture of Osama bin Laden, that the *Star-Advertiser* admits that it was duped by online bloggers. This is the seriousness of online bloggers, not only in Hawai'i, but everywhere, and that this is the kind of situation that while maybe there may not be anyone on this floor who take umbrage or find any sympathy or compassion, in this particular case, there are numerous situations where someone else's photo of what someone dear to us may have been used improperly by an online blogger in that blogger's 'competition' to have other dailies and media outlets like the *Star-Advertiser* to absorb quickly for distribution into the general public. As far as I'm concerned, those online bloggers should be held responsible for that kind of despicable work, actually, and this is the reason I believe this kind of unmitigated shield against media needs to be carefully evaluated.

"That was my comment that I thought about and my good friend over there has caused me to remember, just as my good friend over there, as he won't let me forget about the hoary bat, I want to remind him because I won't forget that when we voted on the floor on pensions, the vote was 24 to 1. He was the one. I want us to remember that because he said in so many words, he's much more eloquent than I am, that it was a rogue, that the Senate did not intend, and in fact by extension the Legislature, did not intend to do away with any kind of legislation on taxing pensions. In fact, the Senate held its ground, and I appreciate the support of all of you and particularly my colleague to my far left, the Chair of Ways and Means.

"Now, the accolades and whatnot being passed around on the Legislature of which I think it's the right of legislators to pat themselves on the back on this occasion, I was visited this morning by Larry Kamakawiwo'ole, who's retiring. I was

struck by... I don't think Larry's here. I didn't ask him to show up. In fact, I never thought about it. I was too taken by the fact that Larry Kamakawiwo'ole, who most of you know or should know in the Public Access Room, is retiring, is a hero. He's a hero for Hawaiian people, and that he would come to say 'goodbye' to me, I was honored. So much so that while the proceeding was going on, I googled him on my left up here, and I want to say a few things about Larry Kamakawiwo'ole, but I want to say it in this context: George Santos, Gwen Kim, Soli Niheu, Dana Park, Ko Hayashi, Pae Galdera, Ray Santana, Kalani Ohelo, John Wittick, Kehau Lee, Terri Keko'olani, Davianna McGregor, Bobby Fernandez, Marion Kelly, Joe Tassill, Dana Park, Joy Ahn, George Helm, Walter Ritte, Richard Sawyer, Emmet Aluli, Judith Napoleon, Joyce Kainoa, Guy Fujimura, Melvin Chang, Setsuo Okubo, Herb Takahashi. These are the men and women who have shaped the blueprint for local people. These are the men and women who were a part of my life and who have shaped the way I think. Larry Kamakawiwo'ole, who is retiring, was a leader of the ethnic studies program when the program could not agree to the policy set forth by Dennis Ogawa.

"I know there are others here who were in the ethnic studies program with me. I know that there are others who are not here, whose names that I just read off, are a part of their lives. We owe a debt of gratitude to people like Larry Kamakawiwo'ole because he has set the template that people like me strive to reach up for every day. He is a living reminder of why I ran for office. He is a living reminder of why we do what we can for poor people because the names that I have read, and there are many others that I have not read, are heroes to local people because they choose to fight for what they believe whether we agree or disagree, and they fight until their heartbeats stops, and then they expect that that heartbeat will be transplanted in others to pick up the fight. I owe a debt of gratitude to Larry Kamakawiwo'ole. I am honored that he came to my office. If you see him, thank him for his work. He is retiring after two bouts of cancer. He has had enough, but he said he will be back. This Capitol will long remember Larry Kamakawiwo'ole. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Taniguchi rose and said:

"Could I have the words of the previous speaker with regard to Larry Kamakawiwo'ole placed in the Journal as my own with one correction: I believe it's Ray Catania, not Ray Santana. Thank you, Mr. President." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Hee responded:

"That's the great thing about this office. There actually are two Rays. And actually, there are more Rays. I didn't mention Pete Thompson. Even Tony Chang. So many others. But the previous speaker is correct, as was I. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose and said:

"I, too, would like the words incorporated from the previous speaker in reference to Larry Kamakawiwo'ole. I was also a student of his at the University of Hawai'i. Just in some concluding remarks, Mr. President, I really would like to thank the Judiciary chairman. You know, he and I have been together on these many Hawaiian issues for over 30 years, and it was really through his guidance that we were able to get the recognition of the Hawaiian nation. Of course, he and I didn't agree in a lot of situations, but that's life. But the one thing with brother is that in the end we always come full circle and that's what's really important, because it's the circle and that's what the beautiful lei in our Hawai'i are all about, what the meaning of aloha is all about: that we come full circle, no matter we disagree, but we agree to agree and we agree to disagree. So, I want to thank the Senator for his outstanding

work as far as his tremendous tenure with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the House of Representatives. You know, he and I had an opportunity to take a photo together in front of Queen Lili'uokalani statue this morning, and we looked at each other and we said, 'Well, you know we came from the right-to-sue legislation in the 80s, and we came full circle, and we're here for the recognition of the Hawaiian nation.' So, Mr. President, I want to express my deepest aloha, and I want to thank this Legislature for supporting, and especially this body, the Senate, for supporting our endeavors. Mahalo nui."

Senator Kouchi rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I would like to begin by thanking AARP for the lei and to say that, as a first-time Senator, I've enjoyed working with each and every one of my colleagues. I was apprehensive about where I was initially located here on the floor, but I've grown to respect and enjoy sitting next to the whole minority caucus. I know that there were some questions about the style of leadership, being more open and collaborative, but I've enjoyed being a part of that leadership. And I think in that style, it has allowed the Ways and Means chairman to find his way and to identify his style of leadership, and at the end of the day was one that we all came to admire and respect, and I certainly want to express that respect and admiration to him and his staff for the job that they did. I believe that it was this kind of open and collaborative effort that allowed the chair of the Judiciary and Labor Committee to come to the caucus with an idea about how the Senate should move forward and what our policy should be, so that everybody could stand proudly and receive the lei from AARP this morning.

"I also know that the most valuable commodity in this Chamber is wisdom and knowledge, and so I am glad to recognize people like Uncle Tommy and Eddie Hayashi who have great wisdom and knowledge. This is a place where retirees can come, and they can work for the session, and we can continue to retain and utilize the wisdom and knowledge that they have gained throughout the years to help us do our jobs better. But most importantly, what started me on this journey in 1982 was to inspire and to create a path for our young people, to have them choose to come back here to Hawai'i to create their homes here, to choose to live here so that we can enjoy our grandchildren and our children. And I mention that because I would not have been able to take the gamble or risk that I did without having a great experienced office manager like Harrison Kawate and a young lady like Kara Chow who is from Kaua'i and was living in Las Vegas, that could do the administrative work, that allowed me to hire three young men fresh from college as my legislative staff. And they came here and it took them forever to write their first certificate; and they learned how to make the coffee and the tea in the caucus room, and to make fried rice with leftover food, and even much to the surprise of their mothers, how to do dishes. When I've talked to each one of the three young men as we were here in the last days of the session, each and every one of them expressed the gratitude for the opportunity to work here and how impressed they were by how hard each and every one of you worked. And each and every one of those three young men has made a decision to go back to school because they know how much they don't know. But they also know what they want to learn, so that they can provide quality service for the people of the State of Hawai'i. And so, I'd like to congratulate all of you not just on the work that you have done in the session, but your ability to continue to inspire our young people to strive to create that better Hawai'i we all dream about. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Kidani rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Colleagues, last week *Honolulu Magazine* did an article on Hawai'i's public schools, and I'd like to congratulate Mililani

High School for being named 'Hawai'i's Best Public High School' and Kohala High School for being named 'Hawai'i's Most Improved High School.' Congratulations."

Senator Ryan rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I'd like to echo the comments of my colleague from Kaua'i. As a former staff person and a freshman Senator, I also want to acknowledge all the staff that have worked very hard for the Senate. I came in on weekends and saw some of our Senators really working their staff very hard and we need to acknowledge that. Of course, as a former staff person, I'm going to emphasize that, but also I want to thank and recognize our WAM chair, Senator Ige. He comes across very quiet, very reserved, but he held strong for our Senate position, and I want to thank him for that. Good job, Senator Ige. Also, I want to recognize Senator Kidani as the WAM Vice Chair responsible for CIP. That was a very difficult job, and thank you very much. The budget was very challenging. On behalf of my district, we appreciate what you and your staff have done. And to the rest of my colleagues, we're back next year to rock and roll again."

Senator English rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"I would just like to add my gratitude and thanks to everyone here, all of the Senators, for a truly extraordinary session, to you, for your leadership. As our good friend from Maui Akoni Akana would say, 'Laki nō o Maui.' Maui is indeed fortunate. But, you know, there is something else that happened in this session and I think as we stand at the point of denouement and the end of this legislative session that we should consider this: you know when I came to the legislature in 1999-2000, I was the only Hawaiian in this body. So, at the turn of the century, there was one. And then Senator Hee joined me, and there were two. And others joined, and now we're seven. And, at that particular number, we were able to get a number of issues across, first and foremost, the recognition bill. But you know, we have to say very, very clearly, that but for all of your votes, that would not have happened. So, it's a critical mass and also critical understanding, and I want to thank all of you in the Senate for understanding the position of the Native Hawaiians and for your vote in support of that. The one thing that we have still holding out there (that we've passed this eight times, we've sent it to the House, and the House still refuses to pass): the Hawaiian language bill. It sits there. So, perhaps the final challenge of the Senate to the House, as we leave, is simply this: PASS THAT BILL. E ola ka 'ōlelo Hawai'i. E ola mākou a pau. Let the language live. Let the language thrive. The House should be ashamed of themselves if they do not pass this bill, but all of us can stand proud that we have passed this eight times. So, as we leave today, keep that on the top of your minds. As you look around, as you see how Hawai'i changes, realize that we can keep our sense of place, our identity, if our language lives as well. Mahalo nui."

Senator Kahele rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"The minority floor leader triggered something in my mind and also my colleague from Kaua'i also said a lot of good things about the staff. Now I did mention earlier when I arrived here on January 12, I was met by two of the male members of my staff and I would be terribly remiss if I did not mention the female members of my staff. I joined Senator Kouchi in his office when one of his female staffers was there and reminded me that my 'mom' was there and she was keeping an eye on me, which is Shawna Lau Kong from Honoka'a, who kept me out of a lot of trouble and from being afflicted further with my own ailment. So, I'd like to thank you, Shawna, and my office staff member, Linda, for keeping me on track and keeping me on time as I scurried around the Capitol on the waning days of

this Legislature. And, I thank you again, Mr. President, for your leadership. Thank you very much.”

At this time, the Chair made the following remarks:

“First, I would like to thank all 24 of you, Democrats and Republican, for your continued commitment and collective wisdom in getting our state moving forward. It’s been a very productive 60 days. We’ve worked well together. I would like to also echo the comments of some of my colleagues and thank the staff. Without them, we wouldn’t have been able to get good, sensible legislation passed in those 60 days. It’s truly an honor for me to stand before you and work with all of you and call you colleagues. To my personal staff led by Keira Kamiya and Ross Tsukenjo, thank you for your guidance and support. To the Governor and his administration, I know we’ll be here in a short seven months, but let us pledge to continue to work with him starting tomorrow to continue to make Hawai‘i the best place in the world to live. To House leadership, Speaker Say, and all the members in the House, we would also like to thank you for working with us in making sure that we had one of the most productive, non-fiscal years, in recent memory. So again, I would like to thank all of you, and I look forward to seeing you all again in a short seven months. Mahalo.”

“I would like to suggest that we take a short recess to inform the House that the Senate is ready to adjourn sine die.”

At 11:36 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:51 a.m.

Senator Espero moved that the Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2011, adjourn Sine Die, seconded by Senator Slom and carried.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 382, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Auditor.'

The purpose of this bill is to specifically allow the Auditor to inspect the documents, confidential tax returns, and financial affairs of the Department of Taxation and to require the Auditor to implement internal policies to protect confidentiality of private personal information contained in tax returns.

This bill is objectionable because the Auditor currently has statutory authority to inspect the records of agencies pursuant to section 23-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Moreover, section 23-5(c)(1), Hawaii Revised Statutes, authorizes the Auditor to issue subpoenas that are subject to judicial review. This bill appears to give the Auditor unrestricted access to taxpayers' tax returns and return information 'only to the extent necessary in the auditor's duties within the scope of the audit,' but leaves it to the Auditor to determine what is within the scope of the Auditor's duties.

America's taxation system, as well as Hawaii's taxation system, relies and rests on a bedrock principle of voluntary compliance and self assessment. In return for a taxpayer's voluntary act of self-assessment, federal and state laws provide stringent confidentiality requirements that provide a strong incentive for taxpayers to report all of their income. See, generally, Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation v. Krueger, 55 F.R.D. 512, 514 (D.C. Ill. 1972); see also United States v. Tucker, 316 F. Supp. 822, 825 (D. Conn. 1970) (statutes forbidding unauthorized disclosure of income tax return information encourages the full and accurate reporting of income for tax purposes).

Currently, with respect to tax returns or return information, sections 235-116 and 237-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes, make it a criminal offense for any officer or employee of the Department of Taxation to disclose tax returns or return information to any other person by the taxpayer or the taxpayer's authorized representative, with certain other limited exceptions. Similarly, sections 6103(a) and 7213 of the Internal Revenue Code generally prohibit the disclosure of federal income tax returns. Moreover, federal law in section 6103(i) (8) (C) of the Internal Revenue Code contains a provision for disclosures to the Comptroller General for auditing purposes, but this statute also contains the following pre-condition for disclosure for audit purposes:

(C) Disapproval by Joint Committee on Taxation

Returns and return information shall not be open to inspection or disclosed under subparagraph (A) or (B) with respect to an audit-

(i) unless the Comptroller General of the United States notifies in writing the Joint Committee on Taxation of such audit, and

(ii) if the Joint Committee on Taxation disapproves such audit by a vote of at least two-thirds of its members within the 30-day period beginning on the day the Joint Committee on Taxation receives such notice.

The bill lacks this important and essential provision that would safeguard and serve as an oversight function on the Auditor. In addition, the bill is silent on the Department of Taxation's ability to assert the attorney-client or executive privilege for certain communications and documents.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 382 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1416, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Highway Safety.'

The purpose of this bill is to extend the period in which an owner of a new car is exempted from obtaining a certificate of inspection from two years to three years from the date of purchase.

While new vehicles are unlikely to experience major mechanical defects during the first three years after purchase, other faults, which would be discovered during an inspection, may still occur. These faults include defective head lamps, signal lamps, and brake lamps, expired registration and insurance cards, worn-out brakes, tires, and windshield wipers, modified suspension and window tint, and cracked windshields.

New cars already have a two-year exemption from a required inspection and I cannot, in good conscience, sign a bill into law that would add another year to that exemption, because that would increase the likelihood of the aforementioned faults occurring without discovery.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1416 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to provide restrictions on the use of geographic origins of Hawaii-grown coffee on coffee packaging, including prohibiting the use of a Hawaii geographic origin in certain labeling unless one hundred percent of the coffee contained in the package is from that geographic region.

While I remain committed to protecting the integrity of Hawaii grown coffee, I do not believe that geographic references on coffee packages necessarily mislead consumers and imply that the coffee in the package was grown exclusively in the named geographic region. Additionally, the existing statute already requires the identity statement for blended coffee to be conspicuously displayed on the packaging. Therefore, I believe that prohibiting the use of a geographic origin on coffee packaging unless one hundred percent of the coffee is from that geographic region is more excessive than is necessary to serve the State's interest.

For the foregoing reasons, I intend to allow HB1552 HD1 SD2 to become law as ACT 049 (11) effective May 5, 2011, without my signature.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1155, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Repeat Offenders.'

The purpose of this bill is to amend the repeat offender law to do the following:

- (1) Amend the current law, which includes all class A and B felony offenses, to specify only certain class A and B felony offenses that may be considered in qualifying repeat offenders for mandatory minimum prison terms; and
- (2) Add and delete certain class C felony offenses from the list of class C felony offenses that could qualify repeat offenders for mandatory minimum prison terms.

While the goals of this bill are laudable, several difficulties need to be addressed as it reduces the applicability and effectiveness of the repeat offender law.

The repeat offender law, set out in section 706-606.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, was enacted in 1976 and has been in place for almost thirty-four years. It was intended to address the serious problem of repeat and habitual offenders and career criminals who have no regard for the law or the legal system. It helps protect Hawaii's people and communities from the relatively small group of criminals who commit so many of the crimes that occur in Hawaii. These individuals can have a tremendous impact on our communities and the entire criminal justice system.

This bill would make the repeat offender law inapplicable to all felony drug offenses. The current law is particularly important in combating the sale and distribution of dangerous drugs in our community which often destroy families and the lives of those who become addicted to and abuse the drugs.

This bill makes the repeat offender law inapplicable to the offense of ownership or possession of firearms or ammunition by persons convicted of certain crimes, in violation of section 134-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Section 134-7(b) prohibits a person convicted in this State or elsewhere of having committed a felony, or any crime of violence, or an illegal sale of any drug from owning, possessing, or controlling any firearm or ammunition.

The exclusion of the class C felony offenses of theft in the second degree and unauthorized control of a propelled vehicle is also troubling. These offenses are frequently committed by repeat offenders, who are often professional and career criminals. There are many car thieves who commit the offense as part of organized criminal activity involving motor vehicle 'chop shops.' The repeat offender law helps to ensure that these professional criminals, when finally caught and convicted, are incarcerated to protect our community and our visitors from their persistent criminal activity.

This bill disregards many concerns that led to the adoption of the repeat offender law and prompted changes in the law. It undermines many of the efforts made to address the problems.

The purpose of this bill is to provide for the automatic termination or expiration of conditional use permits, issued by the counties, for group living facilities that cease operations for a one-year period or fail to commence operations before the end of a one-year period from the date of issuance.

While the goals of this bill are laudable, several difficulties need to be addressed. This bill amends section 46-4(d), Hawaii

Revised Statutes. Section 46-4 provides broad requirements for the counties to implement their zoning plans. Subsection (d) specifically applies to 'group living in facilities with eight or fewer residents and that are licensed by the State.' The purpose of this subsection is to prohibit the counties from enacting permitting requirements for these types of group living facilities that are different from or more burdensome than permitting requirements for residential family dwellings. The prohibition exists to ensure compliance with the federal Fair Housing Act Amendments, which prohibit discrimination against the disabled or elderly in community settings. This bill would amend this subsection to require the counties' conditional use permits to expire within one year if the group living facility has ceased operations for one year, or has failed to commence operations for one year. However, the subsection being amended prohibits counties from requiring 'conditional use permits' or any other regulatory requirements for these specific group living facilities. Therefore, this amendment is inapplicable to the facilities that are the subject of this subsection. The bill does not effectuate its stated purpose because there are no 'unused permits' that can be made available to other organizations who wish to provide these 'critical group home services.'

Furthermore, if there were any unused permits or ordinances that prohibit others from providing group living facilities, these county zoning and permitting issues should be left to the jurisdiction of the counties, rather than the State.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 23, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Native Hawaiians.'

The purpose of this bill is to establish within the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the aha kiole advisory council, which may advise the Office of the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Legislature on issues relating to land and natural resources management through the 'aha moku system. The bill requires the 'aha kiole advisory council to submit an annual report to the Office of the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources over the course of the year. This bill also appropriates fund for an executive director.

While the goals of this bill are laudable, several difficulties need to be addressed. First, the council is self-selected, not confirmed, has no defined term limits, offers no guidelines concerning the role of its members, and will select its own

executive director. In addition, there is no recourse for inappropriate conduct by its members or the ability to remove for cause. The resulting council would essentially be a private entity funded by taxpayers with no governmental oversight. Second, the intent in creating the council is similar to the purpose for which the Office of Hawaiian Affairs ('OHA') was created and is a natural evolution of what a new Native Hawaiian governing entity would seek to accomplish. If there is determination to not wait until this entity is formed, then the council should at least be placed within OHA and funded by OHA. Third, the bill only provides funding for an executive director. This assumes that all other costs associated with this legislation, including travel and other expenses for the eight council members, will be absorbed by the Department of Land and Natural Resources. I support the intent of the legislation to provide state government the knowledge of traditional Native Hawaiian resource management practices and welcome the chance to review a bill that addresses the previously mentioned concerns.

This is clearly beyond the subject matter expressed in the title of the bill.

This bill requires the Department to establish performance measures and a tracking mechanism without enough time to accomplish these things in a well-thought-out manner. Additional funds and personnel are also not provided. This bill would require the first report to the Legislature to be made in December of this year, to include the established measures and tracking data. While the goal of this bill is laudable, appropriate implementation requires planning and resources so that the establishment of measures, tracking, and assessment of the Department's rehabilitation and reentry efforts are accomplished and reported substantively and meaningfully. Without the appropriate time and resources, the tracking of quickly established measures would not help the Department, the Legislature, or our citizens.

Further, it is unprecedented and inappropriate that the Governor report such occurrences to the Legislature.

If the Legislature wishes further information based on the reports it requires of the Department, it already has at its disposal a statutorily defined process through which this information can be obtained.

The stated purpose of this bill is to eliminate the statute of limitations for civil causes of action for damages arising from the sexual abuse of a minor by an adult based upon sexual acts that constitute certain criminal offenses under parts V and VI of chapter 707, Hawaii Revised Statutes. The bill also allows claims that are beyond the current statute of limitations to be revived for two years following the effective date of the act. Claims may be brought against the person who committed the sexual abuse and that person's employer.

While the goals of this bill are laudable, it appears to allow an employer, including the State, to be sued for the criminal acts of its employees. This is contrary to well-established tort and agency law and is in direct contravention of the intentional tort exception to the State Tort Liability Act (STLA), chapter

662 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Under the STLA, the State cannot be sued for the criminal or intentional acts of its employees. In addition, this bill irreconcilably conflicts with the STLA, which already establishes a statute of limitations for tort claims against the State.

The elimination of a statute of limitations for a civil claim also raises grave constitutional and fairness concerns. If a claim can be brought after an unlimited passage of time, it is likely that documents will be lost or destroyed, witnesses will die or move away, and memories will fade. The accused, even those falsely accused, will not be able to defend himself, herself, or itself and true justice will not be achieved.

The law as written is prohibitive.

However, this is a worthy issue and needs to be pursued. A temporary advisory committee was established by Act 161, Session Laws of Hawaii 2009 to develop a starlight reserve strategy to preserve the quality of the night sky. I will work

with this committee to develop legislation for the 2012 legislative session which achieves the objectives of Senate Bill 1493 and includes a financing plan.

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RULES OF THE SENATE
of the

PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawaii, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate is an open public forum for organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues.

RULES OF THE SENATE

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1 Organization.

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk, and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.

- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.
- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.
- (17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

- (1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.
- (3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
- (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
- (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

(12) To supervise the Senate's Document Center and Journal.

(13) To supervise the Senate's Human Resources personnel.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

(5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible.

The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to agriculture; aquaculture, including mariculture.

(2) Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.

(3) Committee on Economic Development and Technology. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to economic development and other emerging industries development; financial and technical assistance to business; film and digital media production; astronomy, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, and other scientific research and development activities; culture and arts; historic preservation; use of information storage, transmissions, processing, and telecommunications; and recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium.

(4) Committee on Education. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early education, public schools, continuing education, the public libraries, the University of Hawaii, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, including the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(5) Committee on Energy and Environment. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources; population; and environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, and hazardous waste.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to burial councils and Hawaiian affairs, including the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, sovereignty, and Hawaiian home lands.

(7) Committee on Health. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(8) Committee on Human Services. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance; Medquest; youth services; early childhood education and care programs under the Department of Human Services; vocational rehabilitation; long term care; programs relating to the promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth, families, and elderly population; and homeless and public housing.

(9) Committee on Judiciary and Labor. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts; crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters; criminal code revision; statutory revision; campaign spending and elections; ethics; constitutional matters; the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary; individual rights and civil liberties; public officers and employees; labor; employment opportunities and training; labor-management relations; collective bargaining; the Employees' Retirement System; and the Hawaii Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund.

(10) Committee on Public Safety, Government Operations, and Military Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, and the sheriff's division, military and veterans' affairs, space exploration and aerospace development, civil defense, disaster readiness, county and federal relations, matters of concern to the counties; state government operations policy, including government efficiency; procurement; and state facilities not specifically identified herein.

(11) Committee on Tourism. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawaii Convention Center, Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau; and the Hawaii Tourism Authority.

(12) Committee on Transportation and International Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation; and international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations.

(13) Committee on Water, Land, and Housing. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning; sustainability; urban renewal; community development; land and water use; coastal zone management; land reclamation; naturally occurring fisheries; ocean resources; state parks and beaches; management areas, including ocean recreation management areas; small boat harbors; and housing development.

(14) Committee on Ways and Means. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management; statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation; and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings and decision-making sessions shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered, and shall be publicly posted by first referral committees at least 72 hours before their meetings and by subsequent referral committees at least 48 hours before their meetings, no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the week, provided that these notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the

President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

- (A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and more than one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;
- (B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and
- (C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of groups or persons who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure; provided that a summary of individual testifiers may be provided when a large number of testimonies are submitted.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawaii at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

(1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.

(2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.

(3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"

(4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"

(5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"

(6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.

(7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.

(8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 39 Order of Business: General.

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.

- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS**Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

- (1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.
- (2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,

- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 68 Questions of Order.

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT**Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution shall govern.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.

- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS

Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES

Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER

Rule 89 Administrative and Financial Manuals.

(1) The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.
