FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 16, 2013

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013, was called to order at 10:12 a.m., by the Honorable Gilbert Kahele, Temporary Chair of the Senate.

At this time, the Hawaiian blessing was delivered by Mr. Danny Kaleikini.

The members of the Senate and guests then rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i," led by Gleemen Plus of Honolulu.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Galuteria nominated Carol Taniguchi, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Nishihara moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Thielen and carried.

The Chair declared Carol Taniguchi as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Chun Oakland then moved that a committee of three Senators be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator Green and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Ihara, Tokuda, and Slom to serve on such committee.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

On motion by Senator Ihara, seconded by Senator Gabbard and carried, Special Committee Report No. 1 was adopted.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair called upon Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Hawai'i State Supreme Court to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

Chief Justice Recktenwald administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Hee placed in nomination the name of Senator Donna Mercado Kim for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Shimabukuro moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator English.

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Donna Mercado Kim as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Donna Mercado Kim was declared unanimously elected President of the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013.

The Chair then appointed Senators Kouchi and Ige to escort the President to the rostrum, and the President addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Governor Abercrombie, Lieutenant Governor Tsutsui, Senator and Mrs. Schatz, Chief Justice Recktenwald, former Governor Ariyoshi, Governor Waihe'e, Governor Cayetano, and Governor Lingle, esteemed colleagues, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen:

"Aloha.

"It is my distinct honor and pleasure to welcome all of you to the Senate's opening of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature.

"It's heartwarming to see so many familiar faces, but this year begins with several newcomers to the Senate: representing Kahului and Wailuku is Gilbert Keith-Agaran...from Ka'u and Puna comes Russell Ruderman...and from windward O'ahu and east Honolulu is Laura Thielen. Please join me in welcoming them to these chambers.

"I would also like to acknowledge the lone voice of the minority, Senator Sam Slom. While he's but one strong, he's been a devoted voice for his party and he is 'still here.'

"I must confess that this is a very humbling experience to stand here before you this morning. I grew up a stone's throw from this building, in Kalihi-Palama, as one of five kids in a poor, working-class family. Like many of you, both my parents worked and struggled to keep food on the table and a roof over our heads. My Dad is here in spirit, but I would like at this time to acknowledge my mom.

"Given those modest beginnings, never could I have imagined that I would someday be standing before you as Senate President. I thank you, colleagues, for this tremendous privilege.

"The Hawai'i of our childhood was a lot different than it is today: We had a smaller population, an economy still largely dependent on agriculture, no freeways, no traffic congestion (like this morning), fewer of the social ills that we now see, and a smaller, and no doubt simpler, government.

"We were blessed with a strong spirit of community. We took care of each other. As kids, we played with marbles, tops, and beanbags in the streets with friends from the neighborhood. We walked to school together, and we were unburdened by the concerns that kids worry about these days. Places like Palama Settlement and my alma mater, Farrington High School, shaped our lives and prepared us to be responsible adults and leaders.

"Then there was that special teacher, aunt, or uncle who mentored and influenced our lives. For me, it was Kumu Hula Aunty Maiki Aiu, who instilled in me the traditional Hawaiian core values of aloha, lōkahi (harmony), kuleana (responsibility), and ha'aha'a (humility). Through hula she taught me discipline, respect, hard work, and grace. These values are the foundation of our kūpuna that has been handed down from generation to generation. Mahalo, Senator Solomon and the Beamer-Solomon Halau, for doing your part in continuing this legacy.

"While we may not have realized it at the time, the incredible changes that came with the Democratic Revolution of 1954, statehood a few years later, and the socio-economic evolution

that followed statehood, were the catalysts that set the groundwork for what we have continued to build upon to this day. But like any structure, no matter how good the foundation, it still requires upkeep and constant care. Years of budget cuts as a result of the economic downturn have weakened our foundation, so reassessments should be a priority.

“Beyond our personal hopes and wishes, I speak of what the Legislature has done to further the progress of our people: in our public education system...in the growth of charter schools...in the University of Hawai‘i...in Consumer Protection, Chair Roz Baker’s work for health insurance coverage for individuals and families...in the laws that give protections to workers, guided by Judiciary and Labor Chair Clayton Hee...in services that help our children and kūpuna and those unable to help themselves, under the watch of Human Services Chair Suzanne Chun Oakland. These, and so many other programs and services that enrich our lives and contribute to the quality of life, can and must be continued.

“After several years of belt-tightening, we’re greeting this session with a rosier economic outlook. The Council on Revenues has projected that tax revenues will increase by five percent this year, indications that the economy continues to improve. Our visitor industry remains strong, and other industries like construction are poised to make a comeback.

“But tourism deserves a special mention. The visitor industry continues to be a driving force for the economy, helping to power our recovery. Last year, tourism brought \$2 billion more to the economy than the year before. More than 166,000 jobs are supported by tourism, and its indirect impact is just as far-reaching. Our island visitor bureaus, our worldwide marketing partners, and the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority, under the leadership of Mike McCartney and board chair Ron Williams, deserve our applause for these accomplishments.

“The Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit demonstrated that Hawai‘i has a global presence. Our host culture can teach, touch, bridge, and inspire those who embrace Hawai‘i and our people. Hawaiian music and dance transcend differences in races, nationality, or language. It was Auntie Maiki’s stories, and her passion to preserve and perpetuate this aspect of Hawaiian culture that inspired me, and that’s why I have long advocated the establishment of a museum or center of Hawaiian music and dance. I am proposing that we consider building it atop the Convention Center. What better place to share the heart and soul of our host culture with residents and visitors alike. Tourism and Hawaiian Affairs Chair Brickwood Galuteria and I challenge the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs to work together to make this center a reality.

“But—and there’s always a ‘but’—with the strong visitor numbers and prospect of more revenues, and what I’d term ‘pent-up demand’ to restore the budget cuts we’ve had to make, it might be tempting and politically popular for us to return to the spending patterns of more prosperous times. We should, however, proceed with caution. After all, the salary cuts for state employees will expire this year. The administration is negotiating new labor agreements with the public employee unions, and this will be a huge cost item in our budget.

“Nationally, the Presidential campaign and Congressional wrangling over the federal budget reflect great divisions in our nation. Here at home, we face monumental changes in politics. The passing of Senator Dan Inouye, who we are still mourning, and the retirement of our beloved Senator Daniel Akaka have triggered a ripple effect that has impacted our state.

“Yes, there are lingering fiscal concerns and potential new ones, among them are possible cutbacks in federal funding, and many are looking to the state to make up the difference. Add to

this the backlog of repair and maintenance needs for schools, parks, public housing, state buildings, and our infrastructure. Initiatives to establish a state-run early education program, a new prison, and more affordable housing, tax credits, as well as proposals for more grants-in-aid and other public support, are among the issues lawmakers will be deliberating.

“Despite all of these demands, and the anticipation of better economic times, I hope, first and foremost, that there will be no new tax burdens thrust upon our citizens...and that we will not automatically open the taxpayers’ pocketbooks to every budget request, every new proposal, and every new capital improvement project.

“I am not saying that we should not consider new initiatives. After all, the Legislature is a forum for new ideas, new ways of doing things to better the quality of our life. But as we weigh their merits, let’s also look at the merits of what we already have. Reevaluating and reassessing what we have in place may not sound sexy or innovative or sell newspapers, but we must discipline ourselves to do this if we are to be more efficient and effective than we have been.

“While we consider early childhood education proposals, it’s imperative that we resolve our problems with the teachers’ contract, school bus services, and the many challenges facing the Department of Education and our charter schools. To help resolve these and other cost items, I call upon the administration to work with us to aggressively eliminate salary overpayments to state workers and abuses in overtime and sick leave. We are talking about the potential of millions of dollars.

“Let’s use these savings and the additional revenues forecast by the Council on Revenues to accelerate fixing our schools, funding kupuna care, reducing the unfunded liability of the state pension system, and repairing our roads and aging infrastructure. You know, the collapse of the Farrington High School’s auditorium roof was a loud warning that we need to quickly assess the structural soundness of our aging facilities. Fortunately, no one was injured, but we may not be so lucky next time.

“Likewise, we mustn’t create or reinstitute public programs without a thorough examination of their long-term impact. If we authorize new positions, what are the long-term financial obligations with regard to rising labor, pension, and health care costs? For every new building, how much will it cost to operate, maintain, and eventually repair or replace? Those costs should be factored into our five-year balanced budget requirement, and we’ll look to Ways and Means Chair David Ige and Vice Chair Michelle Kidani to help us accomplish this.

“The author Richard Schickel wrote, ‘The law of unintended consequences pushes us ceaselessly through the years, permitting no pause for perspective.’ With that thought in mind, we should pause to review the laws we have on the books. Are they working? Are they serving their intended purposes or are they barriers?

“I’d be remiss in not acknowledging the outstanding work of Marion Higa. Marion, we will miss you but we wish you well in your retirement. The Auditor is only able to evaluate a fraction of our innumerable public programs. The ‘Report on the Implementation of State Auditor’s 2008 Recommendations’ was released last February, revealing that less than one-third of the 2008 recommendations have been implemented. We could definitely do better in acting on the Auditor’s recommendations. It seems that closer scrutiny of statutorily mandated projects or offices is done only when a problem is reported by the news media or brought to our attention by constituents.

“Some examples include the HI-5 recycling program, charter schools, the Public Land Development Corporation, airport procurement contracts, and a host of other statutes and

requirements that affect us all. We need to either fix or repeal laws that are not working as they were intended, or which have created burdens that were unforeseen at the time of their establishment. And to achieve this, I urge the Senate to use the post-session interim to initiate these evaluations, since we never have enough time in our hectic 60-day legislative session.

“Higher Education Chair Brian Taniguchi has the task of following up on the issues raised during the Special Committee on Accountability’s hearings on the University of Hawai‘i. What resonated from those hearings is that those appointed as stewards of the public’s trust are responsible for the performance of the organizations they oversee, and, therefore, must be held accountable. Yes, we are indebted to these volunteer public servants for their willingness to serve without compensation, but we also need them to be the public’s watchdogs. Beyond their appearance at their Senate confirmation hearings, they should be called upon to periodically report to this body on what they see as problems, as well as opportunities, facing the organizations they help govern.

“In order to assure food security, farmers need our assistance and, most importantly, our commitment to preserve prime agricultural lands. These are long-standing goals that have been very slow to accomplish. On a recent visit to Israel, I was surprised to learn that Israel produces 95 percent of its food, despite the fact that more than half of its land is desert and the climate and lack of water resources do not favor farming. Plus, their farmers are not subsidized. So if Israel can successfully farm on desert land, then imagine what is possible on our lands. Let’s be serious. We need to be serious while preserving prime farmlands by purchasing them, as we did with the Galbraith Estate. I ask Agriculture Committee Chair Clarence Nishihara to help us pursue this. I also strongly urge the counties to expedite the completion of their identification and mapping of important agricultural lands.

“My experience on the Honolulu City Council and the Hawaii State Association of Counties has made me an advocate for county home rule. There is no doubt that we can do more in streamlining the duplication and overlapping of state and county jurisdictions that are confusing to those we serve. Let’s not forget that we serve the same constituency, and they don’t care whose jurisdiction it is – they just want it done! And, if done correctly, we could realize additional savings and be more efficient. With former councilmembers Governor Abercrombie, Senators Donovan Dela Cruz, J. Kalani English, and Vice President Ron Kouchi, I hope that we can all work together with the counties to resolve these issues.

“Respecting home rule also has the added benefit of making government less O‘ahu-centric. Our new Lieutenant Governor and Maui resident, friend, and colleague Shan Tsutsui made that point in accepting his appointment, and I believe it’s an important cause worth pursuing.

“A step in that direction is the Senate’s launch of a pilot video conferencing project this session. I’m happy to announce that the Education Committee and the Technology and Arts Committee will be utilizing video conferencing in their hearings to enable and encourage the participation of neighbor island residents. Our thanks to Chairs Jill Tokuda and Glenn Wakai for leading the Senate in this endeavor.

“Colleagues, I’m excited about working with all of you – the members of the House of Representatives, Governor Abercrombie and his administration, and our community – in the weeks ahead. Much of what I outlined today did not occur overnight and will take more than one legislative session to accomplish. But we must stay the course.

“In closing, I am reminded of this quote: ‘When we least expect it, life sends us a challenge to test our courage and

willingness to change.’ What better opportunity than now to heed these words.

“Colleagues, we come from different places, different backgrounds. You have your own reasons and your own stories for being here. And while we have differing opinions on the issues of the day, we must be united in our commitment to this institution, to collaboration, to being accountable to the constituents we serve, to building a better Hawai‘i, and, most importantly, to ‘live aloha.’ This is our challenge.

“God bless you all! Mahalo.”

At this time, the Chair called on Senate Minority Leader Sam Slom.

Senator Slom rose to present the following remarks:

“Senate President Donna Mercado Kim, Lieutenant Governor and former Senate President Shan Tsutsui, Governor Abercrombie, U.S. Senator Brian Schatz, former Governors, Mayors, Chief Justice, all the distinguished people here, and, most importantly, the *overburdened taxpayers* of the State of Hawai‘i, *Aloha!* On behalf of the *entire* minority, I bring greetings.

“You know, Senate President Kim, I must tell you that you are only the second Senate President that I kissed (no, not you, Shan), and the first one has now been elevated to Congress. In fact, and I’m sorry that Congresswoman Hanabusa is not here, but she’s probably watching Bill O’Reilly. So, there’s a great future ahead for you, Senate President Kim.

“Thank **God**, this body will once again have daily prayer in its opening sessions, because if ever there was a time that elected officials need supreme guidance and should call on a higher authority, it is now.

“**WE, the People.**’ That’s how the U.S. and Hawai‘i Constitutions begin, and we need to remind ourselves, as elected officials, of the significance of these words. These are serious times demanding our best abilities and swift action. And all of us just stood up and we pledged to defend these constitutions. And by the way, listen – that’s the voice of democracy outside, our right to free speech and our right to demonstrate and our right to address our government.

“It seems many of our residents, perhaps too many, believe we have lost our way and forgotten those limited beginning words as government becomes more dominant in our daily lives. There are negative consequences to this: a divided population, voter apathy, less confidence in us as elected officials, and more social and financial problems. People in Hawai‘i are tired of being pushed around while told everything is fine. They know better.

“Last month, the national emphasis was on the so-called federal ‘fiscal cliff,’ involving excessive government taxation, spending, and debt. Actually, we fell off that cliff months ago. In Hawai‘i, more accurately we face the looming ‘*financial Pali*,’ as government attempts to take away more freedoms and income from its citizens.

“*Forbes Magazine* describes Hawai‘i as one of ten ‘**Death Spiral States.**’ *Forbes* and other watchdog organizations cite over taxation and rising tax burdens, increased state debt, massive unfunded liabilities, and an exodus of private employers, as dangerous for investors.

“Nothing has really been resolved yet on the federal level, and while both sides continue to fight over the debt ceiling, fewer Americans are tuning in because they believe their elected officials are not accountable or transparent, and they don’t know where to turn.

“A nation and a state without accountability and lack of consequences set a dangerous precedent. We need meaningful change and must provide consequences for bad behavior and poor performance in government.

“Last year, we tried to run roughshod over established environmental hearings procedures by granting government special and favorable fast track powers. We tried to fool the public into believing that initiatives such as the Public Land Development Corporation were good for them. PLDC should be repealed, not amended.

“We don’t speak honestly to our constituents about the true costs and impact of major projects our state has embarked upon, including the heavy steel rail on O’ahu, the \$2 billion undersea electric cable, wind turbines covering neighbor island landscapes so that they can power O’ahu, and the costs associated with contract overages, add-ons, missing money and wasted funds. We must respect taxpayers enough to be truthful to them.

“As the President said, during Senate investigations of Hawai‘i’s only taxpayer-supported state university—hearings demanded *not* by government officials but by concerned taxpayers and UH alumni who put their trust in the Senate—we discovered our excellent university is being run by bureaucrats who have not been responsible with taxpayer funds.

“The problems go far beyond the \$200,000 lost in the so-called ‘*Stevie Wonder Concert Blunder*.’ The UH Administration showers high salaries and enviable perks on administrators while lacking oversight of its hordes of public relations personnel, incompetent attorneys, and old boys.

“At our University, there is high cost and low achievement from our administration. What are the consequences so far? *Nothing*. Those involved with the Wonder Blunder and other careless spending still hold power and are paid well. They hope we will forget. We will not. There must be consequences for their actions.

“Our Office of Elections is charged with only one duty every two years: organizing and holding fair, efficient, and affordable elections for every voter. They booted it, not just last year, but for several years. Not to print and distribute enough ballots thereby denying a citizen’s basic right to vote—an easy enough task—is **criminal** and should be punished, but instead, in true Hawai‘i tradition, the same people continue in office. This must be changed. They need to be replaced.

“Our judiciary has undergone a new initiative but problems still exist. Preference still appears, at least from the outside, to favor criminals and not restitution for victims, especially our children.

“Hawai‘i’s State Department of Health has badly mismanaged state recycling and several other programs they are responsible for. It’s not just me that’s saying that; it was the Legislative Auditor, yet we do nothing to stop or curb these practices.

“As I predicted previously, Hawai‘i’s outlays for welfare and social services would exceed annual expenditures for government education. Late last year, that became a fact. Hawai‘i now spends more on welfare and social service programs than we do on educating our children. Yes, there are people who are in need, but we should *not* be supporting those who *choose* not to work or to be financially responsible. Leading the Nation in food stamp distribution, and top of the list with homeless, are *not* badges of honor for our state.

“Our proposed new state budget would increase spending over the next two fiscal years by 8 percent and 11 percent, respectively, though there is not economic growth to support

this increase in government. Many are in denial about the consequences of continued spending growth. The Senate Minority again will develop and put online an alternative approach to the budget. Ineffective programs and personnel must be jettisoned.

“Now, there is a new, expensive, taxpayer-subsidized proposal to put our 4-year-olds in government schools—and the Governor promises he is going to wrestle me on this issue. But the \$30 million Early Education program—which is widely supported by politicians, non-profits that will gain financially, unions, and a well-funded lobbying effort—is not beneficial for our state. The proponents ultimately want the state to pay for care for children beginning in their infancy, not just starting at age 4, which is the initial program this year. I oppose this further intervention by a government that has not been able to provide even an average education with existing programs and billions of dollars of annual subsidies in the government schools. We would only be preparing these children not to ‘succeed,’ but to start earlier in the government bureaucracy.

“And to my friends in the labor unions – come on, guys! Compulsory public unions in Hawai‘i flaunt their power and are out of control. The HGEA seized a ‘most favored nation clause,’ guaranteeing them every possible unearned benefit that is bitterly unfair and burdensome to Hawai‘i taxpayers.

“The United Public Workers refused to take a 5 percent pay cut the same as all other state workers—without any consequence—and now are being rewarded by an arbitration panel with a 6 percent raise. I, for one, will strongly oppose the \$8 million so-called ‘*emergency*’ appropriation to reward the UPW, and call on my colleagues to stand up as well.

“The Hawai‘i State Teachers Association, which previously signed a contract agreeing to drug testing and other requirements during the previous Administration, refused to comply and there were no consequences. Now, the HSTA also wants more money and benefits. For the *keiki*? I think not; it’s about money and power.

“Senate President, you previously called attention to, and presided over, an effective investigation of unwarranted and costly public employee overtime. But the issue has not gone away, and in some cases it, and the spiked income pensions overtime allows, is even more rampant today. Whistleblowers and good, hardworking state and county public employees come to me seeking help to end bad practices. Many times, their supervisors fail them. We need to end these practices and support hardworking employees while weeding out the others.

“Now, our attention in the first days of the 27th Legislature will not be on providing consequences for poor behavior and performance. More likely, we’ll light up the debate on marijuana, roll the dice on gambling, and try to make it easier to die by suicide, if you escape abortion. On a side note, we should all do everything possible to help free our neighbor from the Big Island, **Roger Christie**, from unjust federal imprisonment and loss of civil liberties on the grounds that he is a ‘dangerous criminal’ because of his marijuana position.

“We need to focus on the priority items in our community, especially our economy. Hawai‘i’s economy has *not* turned around. The Visitor Industry single-handedly is propping up our dismal performance. But if we adjust the current record-breaking arrival and expenditure numbers, we are looking at the same visitor levels as occurred in the 1980s.

“Construction, retailing, wholesaling, and manufacturing are all doing poorly, no matter what some pundits would like you to believe. Just talk to our people in these industries to learn the truth. Then, do everything possible to improve our business and economic climate.

“The loss of our very special Senior Senator **Daniel Inouye** has enormous consequences—social, political, and fiscal. He is already missed. His absence, however, does allow for political changes and more independence; his legendary power probably will be fought over. The estimated \$450 million plus that he brought to this economy annually, and his political and fiscal clout, are gone. Hawai‘i had many years to prepare for this impact, but we didn’t. We need to search for other private market economic alternatives to boost our economy, and not for a single politician to fill this void.

“Hawai‘i can attract many new employers who provide jobs and tax revenues if we listen to those in our business community and repair our business climate. Instead, Hawai‘i government continues to be hostile to business. The recent loss of the Tesoro Refinery and regular closure of old-time benchmark businesses are just symptoms of a government that rewards its own incompetence and risky government ‘investments’ of public money, while punishing hardworking private risk takers.

“We need to look objectively at states like Wisconsin, Michigan, and 22 others, to debate ‘Right to Work’ legislation, not to punish compulsory unions, but to incentivize workers, and allow them to choose whether or not to join a union and pay dues in order to work. It is the right thing to do and the right time to do it.

“And by the way, wouldn’t it be wonderful if legislators would always act at the same speed to produce good legislation and defeat bad legislation as fast as the Governor did when appointing a new U.S. Senator, a new Lieutenant Governor, new Senators, and new Representatives? We must act quickly for the people, not just for a political party.

“In Hawai‘i, we have *not* done our best on behalf of our people. We can and must do better. I believe in an even greater Hawai‘i in the future with more choices and opportunities for all of our residents. Our people and culture are our greatest resources. They are counting on us, and we must not fail them.

“So, Madam President, on behalf of the Senate Minority, I pledge our efforts to support your good legislation regardless of who introduces it; to examine and report honestly on the impact of all bills; to work towards ending legislative exemptions for laws we pass on to others; and to end counterproductive practices, such as ‘gut and replace’ bills, which lack transparency.

“We celebrate our individual God-given liberty and our ability to change for the better. Our goal should be not just a ‘New Day,’ but a **better day**. This is not a partisan issue. We can navigate a different course. We can make that happen by a vision of what Hawai‘i can be. For, We, The People.

“**Aloha and Mahalo, God bless Hawai‘i, our armed forces men and women, and the United States of America.** Let’s begin today. Aloha.”

At 11:11 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the Senate and their guests were entertained by Brother Noland and Nick La‘a.

Senator Solomon placed in nomination the name of Senator Ronald D. Kouchi for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Ruderman.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Ronald D. Kouchi as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Ronald D. Kouchi was declared unanimously elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2013.

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013, was called to order at 10:02 a.m. by the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Scott K. Saiki and Aaron Ling Johanson on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Les Ihara, Jr. and Sam Slom on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Representative Karen Awana and Senator Jill N. Tokuda presented Governor Abercrombie with lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Abercrombie addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Mister Speaker, Madame President, former Governors, distinguished Justices of the courts, representatives of our Congressional Delegation and members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, elected officials, honored guests, family and friends: Aloha.

"Before I continue with my remarks, I want to just emphasize an introduction, if I might. I've had the great fortune in my life of having two mothers. My mom Vera lived here with me in Hawai'i for many, many years and had the privilege and the great good fortune to be able to have as her companion here my other mother, to whom I am hānai'd, Auntie Aggie Cope. Auntie, I love you. And I have had the great good fortune as well to continue to have the company of my wife and partner, Dr. Nancie Caraway.

"My friends, politics isn't a hobby or a pastime. At its center, politics is community, and we as office holders are obliged to address the greater good of the larger community. At its heart, politics is about doing good and relieving suffering. If politics is done right, it's all about making it better for people.

"In Mahayana Buddhism, we are admonished to renounce all evil, practice all good, and save the many beings.

"But when politics gets reduced to slogans or bumper stickers—what is right; what is good? What is wisdom and virtue? Wisdom and virtue to one is grounds for accusation and denunciation to another. Observation can quickly become doctrine, and demands for fidelity to the truth come even more rapidly. In secular political terms, the party line is established, and with today's cyber-technology, internet hysteria often takes on a life of its own. Perspective can give way to prosecution or even persecution. We can do better than what we have witnessed lately. The level of discourse in our public policy discussion stands in need of elevation, and I hope to be able to exemplify a bit of that today.

"Today it seems everyone's motivation is suspect. An opposing view is likely to be judged that of a fool or a tool of special interests. One's position is not merely faulty or misguided, it is sometimes characterized as the work of someone consciously plotting to destroy the environment, or stealing public benefit for private gain, or willfully corrupting the good and welfare of the community. This is not the model of dialogue and exchange that we want or that we need in Hawai'i.

"The virus of absolutism now infecting the Congress of the United States appears to be seeping into Hawai'i – whether it is the use of public lands, or dealing with gun violence, determining who may marry, decreeing how we are to be born or how we are to die. Even caring for the sick or preparing young children for life are opportunities sometimes for mocking dismissal or even patronizing skepticism.

"This absolutist attitude eliminates the human dimension from our political discourse. The absolutist has answers for everything and questions about little or nothing.

"I think perhaps it may be time to step back a bit and take a few deep breaths. In the wake of Senator Akaka's request that we let a sense of Aloha enter our lives more deeply, could we not try a little harder to practice Aloha with each other? Could we not express some generosity of spirit for each other – both in our deliberation and in our decision making?

"As I set about organizing my thoughts for today and reflected on the political atmosphere, I concluded that what we confront today is a situation of what might be called 'political Jeopardy'. In the game of Jeopardy, everyone already has the answers; the challenge is to figure out how to frame the right questions. We are so busy telling each other what the answer is, so certain we already know what needs to be done, that we can ignore the questions behind our pronouncements.

"My thought is, irrespective of what we are for or against, we cannot allow ourselves to preempt the raising of pressing questions we need to comprehend and address, lest we lose our way before we even begin to understand where we need to go or what path to take.

"We need look no further than the question of unfunded liabilities. How do we address recurring needs like paying for healthcare benefits and exploding pension deficits and the means to finance them on a recurring basis? How do we make use of our resources and assets, both public and private, with continuing investment security in the future?

"The Public Land Development Corporation is but one example of an attempt to answer the question and the struggle of coming out of the worst recession in memory. What we cannot do is allow controversy over the answer to this or any other challenge to preempt the asking or facing up to the questions before us.

"And then there is the greatest unfunded liability question of all – the failure to address early childhood development and education in Hawai'i. Leaving our keiki unprepared for elementary school puts them at a crippling disadvantage in terms of being able to meet the demands the future will make on them.

"These questions and the questions which follow require us to embrace our island values and steward our precious island home to become more self-sufficient, more self-reliant, more self-sustaining. We must move from the status quo and provide for future generations of Hawai'i.

"Therefore, our primary and priority initiatives need to be aimed at preparing ourselves as we assess the demands of the 21st century. We need to look at state government and the budget; our energy goals, our economy, our kupuna, and our keiki.

"First, the question of the state budget. Unlike some of the fiscal uncertainties and the core fundamental economic issues facing the federal government, our state stands on a solid financial footing and has a stable financial outlook.

"Two years ago, our administration had just taken office amidst an extremely difficult fiscal and economic outlook. As a state, we faced a daunting \$1.3 billion potential budget shortfall for the fiscal biennium years 2011 through 2013. But, as a result of our collaborative efforts here in the Legislature and elsewhere, the shared sacrifice and judicious administrative action we were able to take, the year-end balance for the fiscal year 2011 was \$126 million, and for fiscal year 2012, \$275 million. For this year, which ends in approximately five months, we are again looking at a healthy positive balance.

"I want to thank the Legislature for your collaboration in this process. I want to thank the public. I want to thank the taxpayers and our businesses for weathering these difficult

times. Thank you to those state employees who agreed to labor savings and additional payments for health benefits. There was no way we could have balanced our budget and achieved today's fiscally favorable outlook without the commitment of all those public workers, and I want to acknowledge it.

"Because of that sacrifice, we were able to support our workforce and avoid massive public worker layoffs. We have maintained our pension benefits for our retirees. The question is will we be able to secure these benefits for today's and future workers?"

"For the record: This is not Wisconsin. This is not Michigan. This administration is not going to abandon collective bargaining, but neither will it bankrupt the future for all by buying some temporary solution that does not address the fundamental fiscal issues we cannot escape.

"Because we did what needed to be done, because we were able to restore critical public services such as agriculture and elevator inspections, vector control, restaurant inspectors, these are the kinds of issues we were able to address.

"We achieved unprecedented success in earning a high bond rating and being able to finance state construction at impressively low interest rates. That means our tax dollars stretch farther in improving the state's infrastructure and in creating the jobs that come with capital improvements.

"It is for these reasons that we have now turned a fiscal corner. As of July 1, 2013, the 5 percent pay reductions will end for state workers, and full pay will be restored. Good faith collective bargaining negotiations are essential if we are to move forward toward a resolution that is fair to everyone – fair to our employees who create public value every day, fair to our taxpayers, and fair to future generations.

"Tourism numbers and profits are on a steady rise, construction is vigorous and growing, and unemployment is back down to the low rates we enjoyed before the recession.

"The recent bond sale of more than \$800 million, along with historic low interest rates at 2.6 percent, is a positive indicator that the bond raters, the marketplace and its investors consider Hawai'i's fiscal condition to be sound.

"The question is, will we continue to invest in the economy via construction and repair and maintenance projects and public-private ventures? Not only is this important to ensure that communities, schools, and our residents continue to have much needed infrastructure, buildings, and improvements, but we can do so at these historic low interest rates, saving the state millions of dollars in debt service. More importantly, these projects could mean the state not only will be investing back into our economy, but through partnerships generate needed revenue not otherwise available. I have asked Lieutenant Governor Shan Tsutsui to take a lead role in working to expedite addressing this opportunity.

"I welcome the new Lieutenant Governor here today as my partner. Formerly President of the Hawai'i State Senate, he is a valued addition to this administration. He is exactly the sort of young and able public servant/leader that Hawai'i needs. He is taking the place of another young and capable leader, Brian Schatz, our new senior United States Senator. Senator Schatz joins a congressional team with our vigorous senior Representative Colleen Hanabusa in the House of Representatives and Senator Akaka's dedicated and committed successor, Senator Mazie Hirono – joining a team that for the first time in the 53 year history of the State of Hawai'i will not have Senator Daniel Inouye at its helm. For many of us, we have never known a time when Senator Inouye was not the center of our political life. But while his physical presence may no longer be with us, the spirit of his example of public service

sets an unmatched standard we can only aspire toward. Senator Schatz joins another young leader in the Congress – Tulsi Gabbard, like Senator Inouye a war veteran, but of this generation. With these bright and energetic young people, Hawai'i looks to its future.

"They understand we can only continue to get good bond ratings and sell them at record low rates by continuing to practice sound fiscal management. As such, a primary budgetary priority is to recapitalize the Hawai'i Hurricane Relief Fund and the Rainy Day Fund. When my administration began, we were forced to borrow from both the Hurricane Relief Fund and the Rainy Day Fund. Now that our fiscal house is in order, it's time to pay back those debts, and there are reasons for that. Bond raters look at these reserves, and the levels to which they have been restored. Therefore, to keep our favorable ratings and attract investors, we must recapitalize these funds.

"But, we must also deal with the question of the looming cloud of current liability obligations that have not been paid for and that will wreak havoc upon our state's future fiscal stability. During the last few years of the recession, while staring into the face of obligations to retirees, other states and cities nationwide have blinked and have either slashed retirement benefits that were previously earned, or even declared bankruptcy. That's why I am asking the Legislature to start paying toward our other post-employment benefits. These post-employment benefits are the debt to which I refer.

"To pay down this liability would require the state to put more than \$500 million every year for 30 years – \$500 million dollars every year for 30 years. This is a number impossible to meet all at once. I am therefore proposing to address this liability by budgeting \$100 million starting this next fiscal year, with plans to continue to pursue payment in the coming years.

"Next, the question of energy. When we consider long-term financial stability and talk about controlling our own destiny, energy is at the top of the list.

"Two weeks ago today, Tesoro Corporation announced it would be closing its refinery here in Hawai'i. That means about 200 people will soon be out of work. Our Department of Labor and Industrial Relations stands ready to assist with job assistance for those who will need it.

"But it also means that Hawai'i only has one refinery to process oil to meet our state's energy needs, and we will be importing the rest of our fuel. We face greater exposure to the events occurring elsewhere in the world that affect our fuel pipeline – whether in the Middle East, Asia, on the seas, or at mainland refineries and ports.

"Therefore, I'm establishing a Hawai'i Refinery Task Force, which will be a collaboration of government, energy industries, utilities, and interested stakeholders from various levels of government and the private sector – to immediately work on short-term and long-term findings and recommendations prompted by Tesoro's closure.

"Reducing our dependence on imported oil will take an equal commitment from all of us. Our new energy future, one that allows Hawai'i to utilize and rely upon its fortunate circumstances and geography for renewable energy, is a long but necessary journey. We have already taken several proactive and affirmative steps down the renewable energy road.

"But along the way, we are facing financing hurdles and policy obstacles that require us to look not only at renewable energies, but at current alternative energy sources that are available now. One of those is liquefied natural gas. This is a resource that would allow us to purchase fuel from American

sources, and not be reliant upon foreign sources, friendly or otherwise.

“Liquid natural gas will reduce energy costs, reduce our carbon footprint, and is abundant, available, and the technology exists for us to use it now.

“Our state, our residents, our constituents, our businesses, and communities need relief. To do nothing puts everyone in the state at risk. Empty rhetoric and magical thinking about renewable energies avoids the question.

“The data is clear; embarking on a plan and a path to liquid natural gas will result in long-term avoided costs – whether those costs are mandated improvements to utility facilities or imported low-sulfur fossil fuels at exponentially growing prices. The energy storm is on Hawai‘i’s horizon. Will we take the necessary steps to weather it? I’m asking the Legislature to move forward with us. There is no time to lose.

“Likewise, there is a false controversy over renewable energy tax credits, and the interim administrative rules that were adopted to deal with it. Reasonable limitations and controls upon expenditures, including any tax credits, have been critical to the financial/fiscal management and our stable financial outlook. But more importantly, the lack of clarity and confusion by some who were gaming the system created an uneven playing field for the renewable energy companies who were not doing it. It placed taxpayers, and even their expert accountants, in uncomfortable situations of not knowing whether they were following the tax law correctly. This resulted in the unsustainable growth of the tax credit.

“Therefore, I have asked my Department of Taxation to work with the Legislature to find the appropriate balance and the proper amendments to the tax credit so that we can make the law fair for everyone, and maintain a sustainable incentive for the long term.

“Still, the problem with our reliance on a tax credit incentive is that it principally helps those with the capital means to pay up front for a system. The cost typically is in the thousands of dollars. We need to find an approach that allows all responsible residents to take advantage of Hawai‘i’s renewable energy options, to save money and to contribute to moving us off of fossil fuels.

“To that end, I’m happy to announce the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism will propose a sensible and fiscally sound financing mechanism that will allow residents, businesses, and organizations to take advantage of renewable energy options.

“By utilizing moneys deposited in a special fund to provide capitalization, we will provide a periodic payment system that can be assessed through a customer’s electric utility bill that will amortize the costs of the system over a sustained period, allowing more of us to take advantage of renewable energy in our homes, our businesses, our churches, and our communities. No longer will a photovoltaic system be only available to those who can afford the significant initial investment. Instead, this program will allow users to take advantage now, and pay for it over the long run while deriving the immediate benefits.

“If we are going to move forward on energy security and self-sufficiency, then we must also have the ability and resources to invest in these initiatives. It is for this reason that I will be proposing we redistribute the funding from the barrel tax, as well as making this law permanent, so that the monies no longer go into the general fund, but to the initially intended purposes of energy diversification and food safety and security.

“As we strive to be more self-sufficient and decrease our dependence on imported food, we must give local farmers the

tools that they need to overcome the challenges that face their industry. To this end, we will aggressively promote state agency purchases of local agricultural projects so that farmers know there is a consistent and regular market for their goods. We will also increase access to capital for farmers and ranchers by expanding the state Department of Agriculture’s loan programs. We are supporting the goals of the Hawai‘i Cattlemen’s Council and, I note, efforts by Kamehameha Schools to expand cattle ranching on O‘ahu’s North Shore.

“An integral component to nurturing Hawai‘i’s agriculture industry is the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, known as CTAHR. Under the vigorous leadership of its new dean, Dr. Maria Gallo, CTAHR is poised to meet critical research and extension needs if given the support. I’d like Dr. Gallo to stand and be acknowledged. She is a great example of the leadership throughout the University of Hawai‘i that we can count on.

“If we are going to nurture and expand our local agriculture – if we are going to be talking about how we meet the challenges of the 21st century and ensure that we perpetuate ‘our’ Hawai‘i and its natural beauty and environment – the question is what must we do to keep our watershed areas protected? The Department of Land and Natural Resources Watershed Initiative remains a top priority.

“Our forests can capture and collect up to 50 percent more water than through rainfall alone. When forests disappear, Hawai‘i shrinks its source of water. In the last 200 years, more than half of Hawai‘i’s forests have been lost. The longer we wait to take significant action, the higher the cost will be to reverse the damage, thereby threatening water supplies for future generations.

“I thank the Legislature for providing funding last session. But what we need is a sustainable and ongoing source of funding. I will be asking the Legislature to look at alternative methods of funding this critical initiative. One is an increase in the conveyance tax, limited to high-end property transactions – properties valued at more than \$2 million. It is estimated this would generate an estimated \$10 million for watershed protection. Another approach is to look at a 10-cent fee for single-use checkout bags to go into the natural area reserve fund. This is estimated to generate an income of \$15 million.

“Just as we need clean water to drink, our coral reefs depend on water free of silt, chemicals, and debris to survive. The Department of Health and its Environmental Health Administration will be proposing new measures to control polluted runoff, protect our streams, and keep our reef environment from harm.

“What about innovation? While the hospitality industry is fortunate to have Hawai‘i to rely upon, and while the United States military derives clear advantages from our location, and while construction is rebounding, we must look to diversify our economy in order to grow our economic base.

“To this end, I will be proposing a HI Growth Initiative, a state investment program focused on building an innovation ecosystem that supports entrepreneurial high growth businesses and creates high wage jobs for our people. We intend to provide \$20 million of state investment capital that will focus on the critical building blocks of research commercialization, entrepreneur mentoring, and the mobilization of startup capital investment.

“This comprehensive investment program represents a commitment to reinvigorate state efforts to fuel an innovation economy. The HI Growth Initiative will engage with the private sector to startup and grow creative and innovative companies. This initiative will help keep our established industries

competitive and create new areas of opportunities to allow our young people to pursue their dreams here in Hawai'i.

"We have examples of that entrepreneurial talent with us today. Dr. Jeffrey Yu is CEO of Kinetikor. His company is commercializing research done at The Queen's Medical Center and the University of Hawai'i. Kinetikor has developed an innovative system that compensates for patient movement during MRIs. This increases immensely the efficiency of performing MRIs and reduces health care costs considerably.

"Tina Fitch, from Maui, created a company that became a leading provider of software to the travel industry. She is now leading a new software startup, Umicam. Importantly, she is also a mentor to other Hawai'i startups to inspire and motivate the next generation of entrepreneurs.

"Skai Ventures is a company established by kama'āina, Ellary Kim and Mark Mugiishi, and has created 5 companies that employ more than 200 people. For example, TruTag Technologies has successfully developed a way to easily authenticate real prescription drugs from counterfeits, and is now looking to expand the manufacturing of its products here in Hawai'i.

"I would like to recognize and ask them to stand for recognition, Dr. Jeffrey Yu, Tina Fitch, Ellary Kim, and Mark Mugiishi. Please stand. Thank you for committing yourselves and your companies to Hawai'i.

"Now comes something that is very, very close to my heart; I would say even pretty emotional for me. There is a connection here that goes beyond words. There are grassroots and farming entrepreneurs, as well, who want to work the land, improve their communities, and put their neighbors to work. They will be crucial contributors to our economy and our food-sustainability.

"An outstanding example of the synergy of communities and agricultural self-sufficiency can be seen in our Veterans to Farmers program in Waimea, a program that will be extended throughout the state. It is designed to combine classroom and on-farm education by creating operating farms. The program teaches lessees to build and manage greenhouses that produce ready-for-market produce, and they are still working full-time jobs while doing it.

"The Department of Agriculture, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, the County of Hawai'i – all are working together to bolster this new agricultural venture, keeping Hawai'i dollars and workers in this state.

"Here with us today are the local leaders responsible for this vision and for helping their neighbors to put their hands in Waimea's healing soil. Mike and Tricia Hodson are the owners of Wow Farms. Mike, Tricia, and their great partner Dave Ruf have spent endless hours creating this innovative program to help their community, their neighbors, and veterans throughout the state to build a future in farming. I want to commit \$3.5 million in this fiscal year to build this community agricultural park that is central to the program. This program is already changing lives.

"We are fortunate today to have with us Ramona Noa. Ramona is one of the 14 new farmers who has expressed a desire to build a legacy for her family with her new farm. I had the great honor of handing her the very first diploma she has ever received, although she has earned one in our hearts for a long, long time. I want to recognize Mike and Tricia Hodson, Dave Ruf, and Ramona Noa. Please stand.

"Our veterans not only deserve these opportunities, but they deserve our respect and our support for their sacrifices. Just look around you: one out of every ten people in Hawai'i is a veteran. It is vitally important for us to take care.

"In August 2012, we launched the Hawai'i Network of Care website, a state-of-the-art way to make it easy for our veterans to find all the services and support they need. We created the Hawai'i Military Veterans Women's Task Force to address the fastest growing group of veterans, affecting more than 12,000 women veterans right here in Hawai'i.

"We have formed the Veterans Treatment Court, partnering with our State Judiciary and Veterans Affairs counterparts to help in critical treatment, counseling, and follow-up, while helping to promote low recidivism rates for repeat offenders.

"In the future, we will partner with the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation to explore an additional veterans' home on O'ahu, and develop multi-service Veterans Centers in Kahului on Maui, Līhu'e on Kaua'i, and Kona on the Big Island.

"These veterans deserve our full support and we need to recognize and appreciate all that they have done for our communities, our state, and our country.

"Another group, just as important and affecting every one of our families, is our kūpuna. As we look to the future, we must never forget where we came from, and to whom we owe our gratitude – those that came before us, sacrificed to help build our state, and create the foundation upon which we stand today.

"To those that have long contributed to our society, we owe much, and we should not ignore their needs.

"I will be asking the Legislature therefore to increase the Kupuna Care budget by \$4.2 million and make it permanent. Senior advocates should not have to come back year after year to secure funding. By being part of the permanent base for the Department of Health and the Executive Office on Aging, we can allow programs to properly plan and rely upon a steady stream of funding. This needs to be seen as an investment, and I must emphasize this. This needs to be seen as an investment that will pay immediate dividends as the aging population of Hawai'i grows both in numbers and lives longer.

"Many of Hawai'i's residents are products of plantation-era workers – people who worked and toiled in the fields and barely earned a minimum wage in order to afford a better opportunity for their families.

"Today, there still exists a hard-working sector of our society that deserves continued recognition. These are the working-class residents who earn the minimum wage. The minimum wage, currently at \$7.25 per hour, has not increased or been changed for six years. Nineteen other states and the District of Columbia have higher minimum wage rates than Hawai'i, with less to confront – much less to confront – in terms of the cost of living.

"Therefore, I will be proposing a bill to increase the minimum wage by \$1.50, to \$8.75 starting in January 2014. Minimum wage earners provide an immediate infusion of dollars into the economy. Everyone is worthy of their labor. Industry and corporations do not lack for support in these halls. Neither should those who work the hardest for the least return.

"The vision of Kaka'ako is about more than buildings; it is about creating a community – a place where its residents can live and work and play. It is for this reason that I will be proposing a bill that requires the HCDA to develop guidelines to implement the complete streets concept. This is a comprehensive plan that involves all aspects of transportation, including walking and biking, and how these uses can integrate themselves into street level use for commercial, residential,

entertainment, and retail places. And I'm sure that Mayor Caldwell is now smiling. Aren't you? He's smiling, yes!

"Kulani. We will re-open the Kulani Correctional Facility by July 1, 2014. We will restore needed jobs on the Big Island and return more than \$5 million a year to Hawai'i currently spent on Arizona correctional facilities. This will be a substantial addition to the more than 400 inmates already brought back from incarceration on the mainland.

"This renewed operational capacity at Kulani will not require any new funds. The new Kulani will work with the University of Hawai'i at Hilo to provide inmates who are two to four years from finishing their sentences with the tools to prepare them to re-enter our community as functioning and participatory members of our society.

"Last session, the Legislature granted our request to fund the Office of Information Management and Technology. It has completed and presented to you a comprehensive plan to improve business processes, and to update and consolidate all of our state technology including Healthcare Transformation. This will allow us to bring our three-decades-old information technology infrastructure into the 21st century digital age.

"To that end, we are requesting a significant, but much needed, investment of general funds and general obligation bonds. Any less in our funding commitments will adversely affect our ability to make this long overdue information transformation journey.

"This is more than buying technology and hardware. We will be instituting an Enterprise Resource Planning Initiative, the ERP, a collective and collaborative and cooperative inter-agency plan to integrate and provide a consistency within our state's finances, budget, payroll, human resources, acquisition, assets, and grants. The ERP will also provide better accounting of our taxpayer dollars and allow state government to operate transparently and efficiently.

"These IT improvements and our ERP Initiative will allow our employees to work smarter and not have to work with outdated and inefficient technology and paper-based processes. Modern technology will also provide the tools we need to attract new talent to the state workforce.

"We will modernize our tax collection process to empower the Department of Taxation to aggressively and effectively improve its collection of delinquent and overdue accounts. Those that fail to pay their share only unfairly burden the rest of us who are paying what is owed.

"It's vitally important to invest in and update our IT systems, infrastructure, and internal processes, yes, but especially when it comes to our schools.

"Our public schools are on average 65 years old, and many facilities have been ignored due to limited budgets. That means students are learning in structures that do not reflect our modern information and technology age.

"The 21st Century Schools Initiative is a public-private partnership that allows the Department of Education to lease underutilized lands for the purpose of generating income to be used to upgrade existing schools or to construct new schools. A 21st century school provides learning spaces that are flexible and support innovative learning approaches, such as individual, project-based learning.

"The program is based on successful models elsewhere, and builds long-term value for local school communities, which benefit from better school facilities, multi-purpose community centers, workforce housing, and other needs as determined by a cross-section of the community.

"Success will require a community-based policy and planning research approach. Any use of public lands must be compatible with and provide benefits to the surrounding community. Teachers, administrators, students, parents, community residents, and other stakeholders need to play a meaningful role in the planning, design, and partnership between the school and the community. Over the next several months, we'll be convening community meetings to solicit public input and feedback for this groundbreaking initiative.

"In addition to a new approach to school facilities to meet the needs and opportunities of the 21st century, we are going to transform our teaching and learning in the public schools.

"I am pleased to report that great progress in the Department of Education and the Board of Education's strategic plan has taken place. Last year, our students demonstrated unprecedented gains in student achievement. Hawai'i was the only state to show gains across the board in every subject and grade level.

"Supported by the federal government investment of \$75 million in the state's Race to the Top grant, now in its third year, Hawai'i has become a leader in moving curriculum and instruction in our schools to meet expectations for student learning. Similar to the goals of 45 other states, we want our students to graduate prepared for success in college and careers, and able to compete globally.

"Accordingly, I am advocating for an investment and commitment to support the Department of Education and the Board of Education's Digital Materials Initiative to provide students with the learning opportunities they need for this 21st century. Within the next three years, we want to provide each of our public school students with current curricular materials on a digital device, such as a tablet or laptop. This initiative takes advantage of the new technology we have for learning and the state's broadband infrastructure.

"Having students with curriculum materials on a digital device solves the problem of not having enough textbooks or obsolete textbooks. Common curriculum statewide is no easy task, but it has to take place, which is why we are seeking dedicated funds for teacher training to empower teachers with the current instructional innovations. Our students will be engaged in learning, and graduate with knowledge and preparation for using these technological tools in college and in the workplace.

"Now when it comes to how our students learn and how we treat our keiki, we need serious affirmative action in order to nurture and promote their well-being and preparation. This is the area of early childhood, focusing on best preparing our keiki before they enter our public schools at kindergarten.

"An alarming number of our children are entering school without the basics needed to succeed in school including reading, math, and socio-emotional skills.

"Only 57 percent of our students who entered kindergarten this year had attended preschool. We know that early years of a child's development are crucial to set the groundwork for a child's behavior and lifelong learning. From birth to five years old is when more than 85 percent of a person's brain development takes place.

"Our children deserve to have a strong foundation. This is for them and Hawai'i's future economic and community development and growth. Investing now in our children's early years of life will pay off dividends down the road in the form of healthy and contributing adults, reduced crime and incarceration, crime costs, and less dependency on social services.

"These programs must be accessible, affordable, and voluntary for all families. The goal is to ensure that Hawai'i's four-year-olds are healthy, socially developed, and cognitively prepared to learn and succeed on day one of kindergarten.

"Our keiki need to be immersed in a stimulating learning environment and have positive relationships with their families and teachers so they can thrive. Our teachers and children's caregivers need to be supported to help these children succeed.

"Our approach is ambitious, but it's pragmatic. It allows for all children to be equally prepared to learn. School readiness is the key to efficient and effective learning. By investing in our children, we are investing in our future as well as theirs. A school readiness program is the best possible start you can have in life.

"I'd like to recognize Chuck Larson, the Executive Director of the Early Learning Center at Seagull Schools, and the preschoolers and his staff who are joining us today and who give us a living, breathing example of what preschool and early childhood development and education can accomplish. Chuck, kids, Chuck's holding up that painting of a motorcycle that I thought was perhaps done out of the Honolulu Museum of Art, but is a product of the imagination and the instruction of the kids at Seagull School and the kind of thing that we can look forward to when every child in this state has the same opportunity.

"*Hawaii News Now* is presenting the whole story thanks to a special TV program put on by the Good Beginnings Alliance. It's called 'The Power of Preschool.' "You can also read about 'The Power of Preschool' in the complete booklet form, the special report in a special insert featured in *Hawaii Business* magazine for this January issue that's available at outlets all over the state. *Hawaii Business* magazine for January, 'The Power of Preschool,' the special report from the Good Beginnings Alliance.

"So, now we return to the Jeopardy challenge. Answers have abounded! Our task obviously is to formulate and frame the right questions and the changes we need to make. The hallmark of this election, my friends, was that some members had no opposition either in the primary or the general election. Some members were sent here with 60 percent plus of the vote. Some were sent here with 70 percent plus of the vote. This is a strong electoral foundation that enables this Legislature to set a new tone, I believe, in its deliberations.

"Set strident voices aside. You have the faith and trust of an overwhelming majority of your voters. You have the opportunity to authenticate the role of this government by acting in a bold affirmation of the faith and trust that the voters have placed in you.

"For more than half a century, Hawai'i legislators have played a leading role on progressive issues from civil rights to labor law to education and healthcare. You are the inheritors of a proud legislative tradition in Hawai'i. I've been privileged to be a part of that tradition. I love legislating. I love legislating; it represents the very core of democratic freedom. And so I speak to you today, yes, as a former colleague, as much as I do as Governor.

"Our people want us to act now. They have charged us with the responsibility and obligation to move forward now. If it was easy to solve these questions, we wouldn't be dealing with them, we wouldn't be asking them. But we wanted to meet

these challenges. We asked the voters to allow us to do so. That's why we're here. That's why I said, at its heart, politics is about doing good and relieving suffering. That's why I said if politics is done right, it's about making life better for people.

"Let us resolve then not to get lost in the noise of the moment. Rather, let us seize the moment to act with confidence in ourselves, confidence in the people of Hawai'i, and confidence in a future we determine. The clock is ticking; the time is now. Thank you very much. Thank you. Mahalo."

Senate President Donna Mercado Kim then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Abercrombie. On behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, I would like to thank you for sharing your mana'o with us and with the people of Hawai'i this morning. The new leadership in both houses pledge to work collaboratively with you and your cabinet as we formulate and frame the right questions to address the challenges facing our State. Yes, the answers are abound, so let's move together to agree on the right answers.

"So with no further business, I declare this joint session adjourned."

At 11:00 a.m., President Kim declared the Joint Session adjourned.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

At this time, the Clerk noted:

“These committee reports were filed with the Clerk’s office on Tuesday, January 22, and notification of action to be taken today on Jud. Com. No. 1 and Gov. Msg. No. 501 was distributed to all members yesterday.”

The Chair stated:

“If there are no objections from the members, we will proceed with the adoption of said standing committee reports today and we will be taking Advise and Consent on consent.”

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1 (Jud. Com. No. 1):

Senator Hee, for the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1) recommending that the Senate consent to the nomination of KEVIN A. SOUZA to the District Family Court of the First Circuit, State of Hawaii, in accordance with Jud. Com. No. 1.

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried.

Senator Hee then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of KEVIN A. SOUZA to the District Family Court of the First Circuit, State of Hawaii, for a term of six years, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Members, Kevin Souza has been practicing as a per diem judge in the District Family Court of the First Circuit, so he brings with him some experience. He is a graduate of the Kamehameha Schools, was an offensive lineman, I understand, because he, in his words, was tall and had long arms, and was recruited by Norm Chow when Chow was a coach at BYU. Kevin Souza proceeded to earn his post-high school education at BYU, where he played as an offensive lineman for Brigham Young University. Eventually, Souza returned to Hawai‘i and earned a law degree from the William S. Richardson School of Law.

“Like his father before him, Judge Souza has chosen a life of public service. His father, Ronald Souza, was a highly respected and lifetime Police Officer who rose to be assistant chief of police with the Honolulu Police Department. Judge Souza worked for the Office of the Public Defender because he believed that the people without a voice were those he wished to serve. He also was an associate of the McCarriston Miho Miller Mukai law firm where his private law practice included criminal defense and civil litigation.

“If members will bear with me, I think most of you know when the Judiciary Committee engages in the process of advise and consent, we try to do as thorough a job as we can. One of the areas that your committee is most sensitive to is the area of judicial temperament. I asked Judge Souza that since he was a graduate of Kamehameha Schools, one would presume he was Hawaiian. Judge Souza proceeded to explain about being Hawaiian: His mother is a kumu hula, and we had the lengthy discussion of the role of culture in the dispensing of justice as a family court judge.

“He made it very clear that family court brings out the worst in good people, and that it was not surprising to me that many times the difficult decisions that he rendered did not stay in the courthouse but rather went home with him, where his wife – also a public defender – serves as one of the highest criminal defense lawyers in the Office of the Public Defender.

“I’m not sure why Kevin Souza chose to be a family court judge, but I’m absolutely certain he didn’t do it because it was easy. In fact, just the opposite; he did it because it was very difficult. For me, one example Judge Souza takes to the bench is that in cases involving a child, the child’s welfare is number one. The child’s welfare trumps the parents, grandparents, and the state when things are difficult. The child’s welfare is number one.

“Members, it is a privilege for me to request of you your support in confirming and consenting to the nomination of Judge Kevin Souza as judge for the District Family Court of the First Circuit.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I just want to say that I think that Judge Souza is the right man for this position at this time. He does have the temperament that we need, particularly in volatile situations involving the family court. More importantly, though, he has experience in this building, in administrative affairs, and he is active in his community. He has been active in programs aimed to help those less fortunate. So, he is a man with compassion, and he himself has passion; and, as I say, I think it would be beneficial for all of us in the community but, as the Judiciary chairman said, particularly for the children. So, I’m very happy to support his confirmation and urge all my colleagues to do so. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Thank you very much, Madam President. I just would like the Journal to reflect my support and also to echo the remarks of our Judiciary chairperson. Also, Madam Chair, I really want to emphasize the paragraph that’s within our committee report that I feel is exemplary, where it says that he displays ‘strong independent judgment, integrity, honesty, acute analytical skill, a deep awareness of the issues and compassion. His experience in both the public and private sectors as well as his strong communication skills will serve him well on the Family Court bench,’ and in the best interests of our nā pua o Hawai‘i, our future of Hawai‘i nei. Mahalo.”

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, if you hadn’t been persuaded before that Kevin Souza was the man for the job, all you had to do was watch his performance before the Judiciary Committee. It was indeed an incredible show of compassion and wisdom, and the type of man that we do want on the bench making decisions for the family court. So, I ask for your full support, and Madam Chair, if you would be so kind as to enter the words of not only the Judiciary Chair, but the Minority Leader into the record as if they were my own. Mahalo.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Hee introduced Judge Kevin A. Souza, who was accompanied by his wife Catherine, their children Kaitlyn and Logan, and his mother Pohai.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2 (Gov. Msg. No. 501):

Senator Hee, for the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2) recommending that the Senate consent to the nomination of DEAN E. OCHIAI to the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, State of Hawaii, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 501.

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried.

Senator Hee then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of DEAN E. OCHIAI to the Circuit Court of the First Circuit, State of Hawaii, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Members, two sessions ago, many of you seated here voted to confirm Judge Ochiai to the District Court bench. As you can see, it hasn’t taken him long to earn the support not only of the Judicial Selection Commission but also of the Governor in his nomination of Judge Ochiai before us. Some of this was said previously, but because of my firm belief that most of you have a memory that is worse than mine, it bears repeating on his qualifications.

“Many of you have heard that Judge Ochiai received his Bachelor of Business Administration with distinction from the University of Hawai’i at Mānoa, and then went on to earn a law degree at the University of California, Hastings College of the Law. Judge Ochiai, who was for the most part of his law career an insurance lawyer, worked with First Insurance for a long time where he served as vice president and managing attorney. He has also served as a senior trial attorney with the Department of the Corp Council of the City and County, and served as an associate attorney with Damon Key Char and Bocken where his principal area of practice was commercial and construction litigation. He has earned some time as a deputy prosecuting attorney with the city and, as I said earlier, he has spent the last year-and-a-half or so as a District Court Judge of the First Circuit.

“Judge Ochiai is a product of Waipahu; he is a son of the plantation Waipahu, also the home of Jack Tonaki.

“One of the things that is very interesting about Judge Ochiai, in my opinion, is his common sense approach to the bench, and I would like to give you two examples. One involves a case where an individual had spent two days in jail and was charged with lewd exposure. And during the arraignment and plea phase where generally the defendant doesn’t say much, if anything, the defendant explained to the judge that in Chinatown, where he was arrested for lewd exposure, it was the result because no one would let him use the bathroom. Upon hearing that, Judge Ochiai dismissed the case. He took a common sense approach to a problem which really, assuming that the defendant was telling the truth, had no other option. The other case involves youngsters who were given citations by HPD for being in the park late at night after hours. He shared with the committee that during our time, parks were open 24 hours and that parks were places that young people congregated. Well, Judge Ochiai took a common sense approach to this and he dismissed the case because he felt that these youngsters, other than being in a park, that there was no other offense.

“You know, the community of Kailua had expressed some concerns about Judge Ochiai’s fitness to serve, and the specific case that they brought before the committee involved commercial activities at Kailua Beach. I think many of you have seen in the news that there is a strong view by the

residents of Kailua on the commercial activity proliferation at Kailua Beach. So, some of the members – one of whom I’m familiar with – had raised a concern that Judge Ochiai, as judge, had been dismissing the cases. So upon receiving the email, the judge and I had a discussion, and I gave him the emails so he could respond. Well, long story short, he felt that under the way the ordinance was written, it was unenforceable. He said, in fact, that former Mayor Carlisle, when he vetoed the bill he said, as a former prosecutor, the ordinance written was unenforceable. Nonetheless, the city council overrode the veto but in fact what needs to be done is a refinement of the ordinance. But then he used his common sense approach again and he said to me, ‘You know, quite frankly, the police are overburdened with assaults, burglaries, robberies where they don’t have the manpower to sit and watch for violations of commercial activities and, further, the ordinance was defective and unenforceable.’ So he provided a solution, which again demonstrates his common sense approach from the bench. He said, ‘The only reasonable way that the unenforceable ordinance might be enforced is if an undercover cop went to a commercial activity and paid for the use of a kayak and proceeded to take it to the beach.’ He said, ‘As a practical matter, the police are far more busy than going undercover to rent a kayak.’ That’s the kind of judge I believe serves the public well.

“He also said one last thing that I want to share. As a former insurance lawyer – I think most of you know insurance lawyers are on the clock; the longer the case takes, the more money they make. On the other hand, personal injury lawyers are on the court; they don’t get paid unless there’s an award rendered. I want to share with you that as a former insurance lawyer, Judge Ochiai sought to settle cases quickly. It wasn’t about taking a side on the insurance company because he may have been on the clock, and it wasn’t a case of taking sides with the PI bar, which means to settle quickly. He did it pragmatically and in his own time. But the fact that he looks for solutions as opposed to litigation speaks well, in my opinion, of Judge Ochiai.

“Members, I said this a year-and-a-half ago: I believe the public will be served well by the consent of this body of Judge Dean Ochiai to the First Circuit. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I, too, rise in strong support of the nomination of the judge, and previously had the privilege of voting to support him at the district court level. He will make an excellent circuit court judge. He brings with him a broad range of experience and knowledge, and most importantly, he has a good record of making and taking care of cases or settling, as the Judiciary Chairman mentioned. And though he does not have long arms and did not play as a lineman on a football team, we think he has a good heart and he’ll be a good judge. And isn’t it wonderful that we get to appoint and confirm two wonderful judges today because Lord knows we need better judges in Hawai’i. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I wanted to add my support of Judge Ochiai. I want to note for the record that despite the fact that he worked for me for one legislative session, he has been able to rise above that handicap and proceeded to do a lot of good things for Hawai’i and the Judiciary. I hope all my colleagues will support this appointment. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Hee introduced Judge Dean E. Ochiai, who was accompanied by his wife Rene and daughter Ellie.

At 11:57 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

“Thank you. You may recall in my Opening Day remarks I talked about the problem as I saw it of bad behavior by people within government and the lack of consequences. On Friday, the so-called Special Internal Committee of the Office of Elections reported on the terrible behavior that was the 2012 State of Hawai'i elections, where people were denied their right to vote. As expected, unfortunately, this internal committee said that there would be no action, no consequences, no one would lose their job or be suspended or be reprimanded in any way: that we would just go on a different path.

“I was reminded this morning, colleagues, that had this happened in a southern state, or in a state where people felt that their denial of their basic civil right of being able to vote had been impaired, there would be lawsuits, there would be editorials, there would be people clamoring to do something. But unfortunately, as we saw in the University of Hawai'i investigations and other things, we seem to turn a blind eye to things that are right around us. And I for one, having heard again from many constituents, know that the public is unhappy about this. And of all the institutions they've looked toward, they haven't looked toward the media, and they haven't looked toward the university or the Office of Elections; they look toward the Senate to do something about this miscarriage of justice. Fortunately, we have several pieces of legislation that might address this.

“So I urge my colleagues again to be vigilant. When we have things that happen, we have to have consequences for those

Senator English, for the Committee on Transportation and International Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3) recommending that S.B. No. 475 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 475, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HARBORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Senator English, for the Committee on Transportation and International Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4) recommending that S.B. No. 726, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 726, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENTAL MOTOR VEHICLE SURCHARGE TAX,"

passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

RE-REFERRAL OF SENATE BILLS

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. Yesterday there were a couple hundred or so students speaking Hawaiian in the rotunda in an effort to make their point that testing should be in Hawaiian. I thought about it, and I know Senator Solomon would probably agree with me – well, I'm sure you would agree with me because we were in the House in 1983, when I spoke Hawaiian on the floor and it caused a calamity to some degree that we were speaking Hawaiian on the floor. The youngsters yesterday brought home the point that Hawaiian needs to be spoken everywhere, particularly at the State Capitol, to remind all of us of who the first people of these islands were, who the first nation of these islands were, and what has happened over time to the descendants of the first people of these islands.

"I wanted to make a couple points because I have a strong feeling that if they are not made, what happened yesterday becomes part of a record that nobody remembers.

"I think it's very important that when we look at the po'e kánaka that we understand who these people are. When I was coming to the Capitol this morning, I was driving down behind a truck and I saw a bumper sticker on the windshield that I thought said 'protect the 'āina.' When I got close enough to the truck, it said 'respect the 'āina.' And that's who the po'e kánaka are – the people whose ancestors respected the 'āina.

"This issue of testing immersion students in English doesn't work any more than tossing Mr. Korematsu in jail for not going to a detention center. Didn't work. Na ke aloha i hānai mai i ku'u pōloli hoi. That means in English, 'I love you so much, I hunger for you.' How do you test that? Pulu pē me 'ili 'ike ano ahe ano mea 'ole i ka mana'o. 'I'm so thoroughly drenched in my love for you that the coldness of my skin doesn't matter.' How do you test that? The superintendent of schools feels our pain. Hip, hip, hooray.

"What is known now after all this time – 30 years, and I've been fortunate enough to have been around for 30 years around this building – is that from less than 50 – 50, five-oh – native speakers under the age of 12 – 50, five-oh – that today there are several thousand who speak Hawaiian as the medium of education. It's real. It's no different than going to Japan and going to an elementary school and, ho'opuka, they're speaking in Japanese. Not English. Not French. Japanese. And they're learning Spanish through the medium of Japanese. That's almost revolutionary over here. If you go to Nāwahī, you can learn Spanish, you can learn Japanese through the medium of the 'ōlelo makuahine, which is our language. But for the English person, they'd say, 'No, that's your mother's

language.’ Well, that’s the point: my mother’s language belongs to me.

“So, in Hawai‘i there’s a different standard. There’s the First Nation, and there’s the real nation. There’s the indigenous people, and there’s the American people – as if they’re mutually exclusive. There’s Korematsu, and there’s Mr. Smith – as if there’s a double standard of being an American.

“So, let’s look at the data. In the immersion schools today, the Department of Education said, as part of their application to Race to the Top, ‘Money money money.’ The Department of Education praised an all-Hawaiian immersion school – Nāwahīokalani‘ōpu‘u, named for Joseph Nāwahī, the great patriot who stood with the queen. And in their praise of the immersion campus, they said 100 percent of the students from Ke La Aina O Keawe graduated and went on to college. Graduated and went on to college. So, what does the test that doesn’t exist tell us? One hundred percent of the youngsters that graduate from Nāwahīokalani‘ōpu‘u graduated and went on to college. What campus, what campus can say the same in English? Not Castle. Not Kaiser. Not Kapolei. What campus? What campus?

“So, to use the Hawaiians to get moola from Wakinekona because 100 percent graduate and go on to college is to use a double standard when it’s in the interest the Department of Education. The graduates from Nāwahīokalani‘ōpu‘u include Stanford, Loyola Marymount, Seattle, and ke Kula Nui o Hawai‘i ma Mānoa. But the Department of Education has determined – and you saw in this morning’s paper – that the school is failing due to the testing issue. How can that be? What is the real test of a student’s education? Graduation and higher education. By those two standards, the Hawaiian immersion campus is working. So, Department of Education Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi has indicated – I like this – she understands the concerns voiced by parents and teachers. That’s the English way to say, ‘I feel your pain.’ ‘Mi casa es su casa: your house is my house.’ I feel your pain.

“So, there’s a plan to appropriate \$2 million in the next biennium. In the next biennium; not this biennium, the next biennium. We’ll deal with the Hawaiians later, deal with them later, because we’ve always dealt with the Hawaiians later because ai‘a kā po‘i kānaka mā... There they are; you just cannot see them. You cannot see them because they...

“It’s so simple; it’s really simple. Pick up the telephone, call Ka Haka ‘Ula O Ke‘elikōlani. Call UH Mānoa; ask the professors, ‘Kōkua mai – help us, help us because we’re not equipped.’ It’s not going to cost \$2 million. But more importantly than that, we will test them as they were meant to be tested – in the ‘ōlelo makuahine. Anything less is a facsimile. It’s rote. It’s mimicking, because if it isn’t, na ke aloha i hānai mai i ku‘u pōloli hoi. Somebody tell me, tell me what that means, not because I’m trying to trick you, because it’s a feeling. It is what Charles Naumu said: It’s a clash of cultures.

“It is my concern – which is why I wanted to raise this today, being guilt-ridden from yesterday having the kids, the youngsters, come and remind me who I am as their kanaka – that this Legislature will do what it can to bring justice to a program that is inherently as blue as this carpet. It is who we are, and that \$2 million is not needed. Cooperation, collaboration, understanding, and an attitude to do right by those youngsters who ‘ākoakoa mai ‘ike kapikala, who had a message: be fair to the po‘e kānaka. Let’s do something; this chamber can do something. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Galuteria rose to make the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, I’d like to ask that the remarks of the previous speaker be added to the

Journal as if they were my own, and if I could add a few comments.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

“Colleagues, this has become very personal to me. I want to thank the gentleman from Kahalu‘u for sharing his words about the big picture. Let me drill down into the weeds for you. The reason this is so personal to me is because we move bills in front of us that ask for the annual assessments, as the good senator from Kahalu‘u is responding to, about how we can at least provide an equal playing field for the keiki o ka ‘āina who ka ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i, who speak the language.

“Why does it mean so much to me, colleagues? I have mo‘opuna – or had mo‘opuna – in Ānuenue Elementary School, which is one of the Hawaiian language immersion schools. A very brilliant young mo‘opuna of mine in the fourth grade was asked to be a part of this math team who was going to compete in the school system on the same level as the other public schools (which was a good thing).

“‘Papa, I’m going to go to the Math Bowl.’

“‘Oh, you are, Hoku? Good for you! You go get ‘em.’ (A brilliant young man.) ‘How did it go at the Math Bowl, Hoku?’

“‘Papa, we didn’t do so good. Ānuenue didn’t do so good.’

“‘Why, Hoku? Why didn’t you do so good?’

“‘Papa, we couldn’t define “common denominator” in Hawaiian.’

“Pathetic! Absolutely pathetic, that we cannot make the connection between the two systems. This is unheard of and unacceptable, colleagues. The smallest thing that we can do is at least talk about it, because there are children falling through the system right now like my grandson Hoku and my other grandson Jacob. And I told their parents, ‘You pull them out of Ānuenue right now until we get it straight because they are going to be the sacrificial lambs.’

“And if any of you folks have mo‘opuna, understand that this is a very, very personal thing because if you know the growth of children, and if they’re between kindergarten and the fourth grade, if they’re falling behind, they will forever fall behind. It’ll be harder for them to catch up, and that is the plight of my mo‘opuna right now.

“So as painful as it was, we determined that for the best of the child, it was to move them out of the Hawaiian language immersion school until we get it right. Until we get it right, and we are on the verge of getting it right, colleagues.

“So, to everything that the previous speaker spoke, I reflect that in my remarks as well, and hope that we can look for a better day for all of our mo‘opuna, and especially mine, because Hoku has now moved to Jarrett School and he is doing brilliantly, getting straight As, and we hope the best for him in future years. And perhaps one day in the future, one of my future mo‘opuna – and yours too – can affect the same type of accomplishment as Hoku now, but in a Hawaiian language immersion class. Mahalo. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to make the following remarks:

“Madam President, I would like to follow up briefly with the previous speaker. Here’s the conundrum: The previous speaker said his mo‘opuna has fallen behind. His mo‘opuna has not fallen behind because he does not know what a common denominator is. Look it up in the dictionary; what’s so important about that? That’s not important; it’s a detail. That’s the problem; that is the problem between brown and white. With white, you’ve got to know the common denominator or you fail. With brown, ‘Aloha nui au ‘oe e ku‘u kupuna kāne, liliko o aloha nui au ‘oe.’ ‘I love you, grandpa.’ That’s brown.

That's another way to say in white, 'Grandpa, you my common denominator.'

"And you don't have to be Hawaiian, by the way, so don't get this thing mixed up. Because if you come from a neighbor island, you probably understand, maybe more than people in the urban core, because it's everywhere: being Hawaiian is everywhere. That's your common denominator. That's the beauty of immersion education. You want beauty? Akebono. Konishiki. Musashimaru. They were tossed in immersion education, and they came back as champions, all sons of Hawai'i. They went over there; they all speak Japanese. They didn't go school to learn Japanese; they became part of the culture. That's who we are. That is who we are. That's the gap of misunderstanding between the DOE and the Ka Haka 'Ula. So if it was me, my mo'opuna stays put because I am his common denominator. Mahalo."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you. I just want to add a comment that you don't have to be Hawaiian, and the sad day is when I tried to put my son in Pūnana Leo at five years old and they rejected him, would not allow him to go to Pūnana Leo. So, that's another issue that we have."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Since my name was mentioned by the previous speaker that I would probably be in support, I just would like to add my mana'o to the mix that I think that this is a discussion that has been ongoing in this Legislature for over 30 years as to where we're going with all of these goals that many of us have for our children. And I have been a very strong proponent of intercultural education and intracultural education which talks about preparing a student to become bilingual. It doesn't matter; you just have to take your 'ohana to Europe. You know, they're speaking French, they're speaking German. I mean, many of our students, in Europe, they speak four or five different languages to be able to communicate.

"I'm thinking that – I want to apologize; I didn't have an opportunity to read the paper, so unfortunately I cannot respond to the article – but I think testing, and you know, we have to make a decision, a policy decision, as to whether or not testing should be a contest as to what language it should be in. You know, my thoughts are, 'What is going to best prepare our young people to meet the demands of the new world?'

"I feel it important that all Hawaiian children should know what a common denominator is. This has to do with science and mathematics. Although I appreciate the remarks of the previous speakers in terms of looking at themselves in a very holistic way as it relates to the spirituality of our culture, and I'm very appreciative of all of that, but the reality is that in order to be a carpenter, an engineer, and in order to pursue anything of those kinds of professions, you really have to know what a common denominator is, although we'd like to think otherwise. But unfortunately, that is reality in this world.

"I don't really know the answer, and I'm not going to profess that I do, but this is an ongoing debate that is a challenge not only of the Hawaiian people, but all native people throughout this country, and it also goes as far as immigrant languages. You know, our Hawai'i, I think it was I read at one time, had 56,000 persons now coming to our state – Micronesians, Marshallese, you know many of them have their first language as their native language. I mean, how far are we going in terms of bringing some kind of commonality, in terms of our educational system so we in fact can coexist and exist in a world where English is, in many instances – I don't know, unless Chinese is going to be our economic language of the

future? I don't know. But right now, English is the economic language of the world.

"So, Madam President, I just would like to add those remarks, although I am very much in support of the immersion programs, but I feel that we need more professional assistance. I agree with the remarks of the previous speaker in looking at our resources at the University of Hawai'i, in terms of our academic Hawaiian studies programs, or for them to step up to the plate, become more active, become more participatory so that they can help us in guiding us as to how we're going to determine and resolve these critical issues. Mahalo nui."

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“First of all, let me say what a beautiful manicure job you have. I’m so happy that the monopoly newspaper picked up on that and decided that was a major piece and a story.

“It has come to my attention that one or more of my colleagues was critical of me for not being in a particular hearing for a particular vote. Really? I know that there are 24 of you and 1 of me. I know that I’m on every committee. I know that I strive to be a good attendee and participant. I know that at the alleged complaint, which was made public, that I was in an Education Committee hearing with the Governor yesterday. So, I just wanted to reiterate to my colleagues that I will do everything possible to be in all 16 committees – particularly when we have 3 or 4 meeting at once – I’ll try to do that, spread my wings and spread whatever else has to be spread, that you can always count on me. But I guess my real question is: There are so many of you, why don’t we have quorum in some of those committees at the time? Why does it depend on me? But I’m able for the job. I look forward to it. Or I can always say, ‘WTF? What’s going on here?’ I’ll be there. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of information as follows:

“The previous speaker, being only one, is free to excuse himself from the Committee on JDL because we always know he’s around. So, he can have one less committee that he has to attend. Although we enjoy his attendance, he’s free to excuse himself from JDL. Believe me, we’ll never ask and we’ll never complain in his absence.”

on the calendar for Third Reading on Monday, February 4, 2013.

At this time, Senator Solomon made the following announcement:

“Thank you, Madam President. Just an announcement to let my colleagues know that we will not be hearing Senate Bill 1, which is the repeal of the PLDC, on February 5. We decided that we’re going to wait for the House vehicle to come over. The House is having their hearing this Saturday on February 9. Thank you very much.”

At this time, Senator Baker informed the members about Go Red for Women Day, and thanked members and staff who were wearing red that day to raise awareness of women’s heart health.

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of inquiry as follows:

“Would you ask the Chair of Water and Land the question of if no vehicle comes from the House on the PLDC repeal, is there a commitment from Water and Land to hear a measure on the repeal of the PLDC, only to the extent that if no such vehicle would arrive to this chamber? Thank you.”

Senator Solomon responded as follows:

“Yes, that’s a commitment. You know, we had 11 bills that were introduced by our colleagues here on the floor, and we got the message. So, it’s just a matter of working through all of those bills because those bills just do not require a repeal; they also went further than a repeal. So, we’re trying to get everything put together and see where the House is positioning themselves and go from there. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Here’s the concern: Waiting for another chamber to take action sometimes invalidates the best efforts and commitments of the chamber that is waiting. So, in this particular example, if the House were to fail, the concerns of deadlines, internal deadlines, and moving measures forward is at risk. And I’m not suggesting that somehow I have a crystal ball and I’ve figured this thing out; in fact, quite the opposite – it is because I don’t have a crystal ball that the last thing anyone needs to hear from the Legislature is that, well, one chamber was waiting and nothing arrived and unfortunately because of our internal deadlines we are unable to go forward, which may result in discomfort in the chamber and could be avoided looking forward. And I don’t think anyone here wants to engage a mechanism more commonly known as ‘gutting and replacing’ bills that have appropriate titles because while waiting for the other chamber the anticipated response didn’t arrive. So, I raise these issues in anticipation of what I hope doesn’t happen because a lot of things can be avoided prospectively.”

“And I also want to say this: I’m from the old school, and I believe the chair has the absolute prerogative. Now, I recognize there are mechanisms that can yank things. Well, the old school also had mechanisms that could yank things, but there was an abiding respect for the chair’s judgment, at least in the old school, 100 percent of the time. I’m not standing here and suggesting that’s the right thing to do, but rather suggesting that while I recognize the chair’s absolute prerogative, as the Chairman of Judiciary and Labor I want to also state that this is an issue that simply won’t go away. I look forward to the debate that is anticipated and also, I don’t look forward if what is anticipated doesn’t come to fruition. Thank you.”

The Chair responded as follows:

“Thank you, Senator Hee. I’m sure all of the chairs are very cognizant of our deadlines and will be prudent about them.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in response as follows:

“Madam President, I just want to thank the introducer of the bill for his concerns. They’re very well taken, but I do not want to get into a running discussion on ‘gut and replace’ because I’m sure that the previous speaker has used that tactic and so have we all.

“The bottom line is that I was not making this decision in a vacuum. You know we’ve discussed it with the House; we feel that this is an appropriate way that we would like to proceed. I already made a commitment early on in my previous remarks that I’ve gotten the message loud and clear; there wasn’t just the introducer’s bill but there were several others that have expressed great concern.

“I’m not into a territorial battle over this bill. What I’m concerned about is doing what’s pono for Hawai‘i, and this has always been the agenda that has driven me. I don’t have to remind this body that the state is on the verge of bankruptcy, although nobody would seem to think that that matters as we’re going through all of our bills. I took the remarks of the Governor very, very much to heart about our obligations to pay our unfunded liabilities. No matter what, the PLDC was a tremendous opportunity for the State of Hawai‘i for revenue generation.

“So, these are my thoughts into how we can possibly buy us some time. I’ve always prided myself as being a part of this body; that we in the upper house always had a much broader vision into how we are going to solve our problems. I think these problems are real. I’ve expressed great concern in the caucus, and I would like to reiterate them at this moment – although I’m not the kind of person that normally talks about what goes on in caucus – but I expressed great concern about how the Judiciary has been making many of our decisions when it comes to land use policy. I feel it is appropriate that the Senate stand up and we take our land use policy back to this building because this is where it belongs.

“It is with those intents in mind that I am asking my colleagues to give your Water and Land Committee those kinds of considerations. You know we have a long ways to go; there’s a lot of other opportunities. We have many broad titles that are available to us. And I am most certain that I will be taking this to caucus before we make any kind of major decision as to how we are going to resolve this dilemma. Thank you very much, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of clarification as follows:

“When the previous speaker, whom I love dearly, said ‘the Judiciary,’ she meant the branch of government and not the Committee on Judiciary. I know we all know that – we all know that – but there may be somebody under the American flag who maybe didn’t hear it. So, I make that emphatically clear so we don’t read it in tomorrow’s *Star-Advertiser* or any other sterling media outlet. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of privilege as follows:

“Although I had not anticipated rising so early in my tenure, and I also had not anticipated publicly stating this early in my tenure that I am in agreement with the senator from Kahuku, but for the fact that he mentioned he was from the old school, I would say that his remarks, I would like to enter them as my own.

“But I guess I would like to add to that I had the pleasure of meeting with the various senators when I first started, to talk about thinking back to their freshman year and what advice could they give me. One of the things that came through loud

and clear is that there's a strong pride in this body as being the upper house of the Legislature and taking the initiative on many issues; and I find it a little, I guess, disappointing to just wait to see what the House sends over to us on this issue because it is a matter of great importance. I understand that there may be opportunities for hearings without decision making, and would wonder whether there would be an option for consideration so that this body can take some discussion, informed discussion, without just waiting to see what is received by the House. Thank you."

Senator Ihara rose and said:

"Madam President, I want to weigh in and I actually have a question for the Water and Land chair, if she's willing. To follow up on the last speaker: Is it the intent to have decision making on a bill – PLDC repeal bill or whatever bill that comes over – when the Water and Land Committee has jurisdiction over it?"

Senator Solomon responded as follows:

"Thank you very much. Well, I'm going to reiterate what my brother from Kahuku said: I don't have a crystal ball. I don't know what the House is going to come up with, although I wish I did. I wish I could really know exactly where they're coming from, but I think it's a wait-and-see, and see what they come up with. I'm hoping that it'll be a clean bill, something that we could all, if possible, look at the intent and go from there. So, at this moment, I'm not prepared to make a commitment.

"However, Madam President, I have never once shied away from bringing a matter to the Committee of the Whole. So if that's the desire of this body, so be it. I'm throwing the gauntlet out because it's within our Mason's Rules; we're all from the old shop. Thank you very much."

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

"Please note that the three working days for re-referral requests has long passed. I will consider, on very extenuating circumstances, for anything else."

The policy board would recommend to the Governor, and the Governor would issue this honorific title for someone who had been on the policy board for a time and give them an opportunity to continue their service – but it would not impact in any way the actual size or working of this board. I just wanted to clarify that for the members. Thank you."

"Thank you, Madam Chair. I'd like to rise in support but express some reservations about Senate Bills 1084, 1093, and 1095.

"I support early childhood education. I applaud the Administration and this Legislature for moving this effort forward, and especially the efforts of the chair and the Senate committee who have worked so hard on the matter. And I also respect the many groups who dedicated much time to this effort. However, I feel compelled to express two concerns as we move this discussion forward this session.

"First, I want to make sure that we do not make changes in our existing early childhood education network that will make it more difficult for the small businesses that operate these schools. Our state's blessed with many wonderful and long-time private early childhood educators, and in fact, my two daughters went to the same early learning school that my younger brother went to. None of us want to see these important partners in this effort negatively impacted, and I know that the ongoing discussion in this Legislature will take this into consideration.

"The second concern I wanted to express is that our Department of Education is tackling a Herculean job of raising our K-12 student achievement. At the same time they're implementing and creating new systemic changes affecting teachers and principals; addressing concerns with the bus and food services; operating, repairing, and maintaining 256 schools on 7 islands. So, in short, they are changing tires on an express bus at full speed. And I know all of us want the DOE to succeed in these efforts, and we've been mindful about diverting their attention to allow them to keep their focus on these tasks.

"And so I just wanted to support these efforts, but express the reservations to encourage discussion as we go forward to be able to find the best location for an early childhood education program, so that we can have good partnerships with the private sectors and not divert well-deserving K-12 student attention.

"Madam Chair, in addition to the reservations about Senate Bills 1084, 1093, and 1095, I'd also ask my vote to include reservations about Senate Bills 1194 and 1202. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I wanted to, by this means, convey some thoughts with regard to where the Committee on Judiciary and Labor is at this point in the session. There evidently is some discussion that the Committee on Judiciary and Labor has been difficult to deal with because bills are not being heard, so I want to offer a few comments in that regard.

"Like every committee chair here, I presume, the buck stops with the committee chair. What's heard, what's not heard, what's recommended to be passed, what's recommended to be deferred, whether indefinitely or not – it really rests with the leadership of the committee. Some of you have asked to hear certain bills, and to the extent possible I have tried to accommodate all of you. But there have been occasions where I may have disagreed with your request or there may have been other issues involved.

"Let me share with you some information. The Committee on Judiciary and Labor was referred 260 bills this session. Other committees have been referred 47, 85, 70, 59, 52, 67 – you get the point. As of February 4th, the Committee on Judiciary and Labor had passed out 25 bills and had heard 57 of the 260 bills – as of February 4th. What about other committees? One committee passed out zero bills as of the 4th; one committee passed out one bill; one committee passed out three bills; one committee passed out four bills; two committees passed out five bills; two committees passed out six bills. I can

tell you as of today, *as of today*, the Judiciary and Labor Committee has passed out 107 bills for the Senate's consideration. We're not done, but to give you the context of what we've been doing...

"It may be a privilege to say that one committee or another committee is difficult to deal with – you certainly have that privilege – but I would appreciate, as far as the Judiciary and Labor Committee is concerned, if there is an axe to grind or a bone to pick, I'm your huckleberry. Here I am. Not my staff. I'm your huckleberry. So if you folks have any thoughts of aloha you wish to share with me, I sure would be privileged to have those thoughts borne on my shoulders. Thank you."

“Ted Sakai has at least 26 years within the corrections industry in our state. Many of you may know him as the former director working for Governor Ben Cayetano, from the first term of the governor. During his term, he had many accomplishments; they include: implementation of substance abuse and sex offender treatment programs for inmates, reorganization of the correctional industries program in Hawai‘i, development of accountability systems for managers, development of strategic plans for the department, coordination of a multi-agency approach for substance abuse treatment, implementing programs to minimize suicides by inmates, restructuring of the correctional healthcare delivery system, developing effective policies and programs to reduce abuse of inmates by correctional staff, and working with children of incarcerated parents. His experience and his knowledge is second to none, and there is no doubt that Mr. Sakai will be a benefit to the department, a benefit to the State of Hawai‘i, and a benefit to the inmates and their families as well.

“He has a big plate that is very full for the next two, and hopefully six, years. This will include: the reopening of Kulani prison; building a new facility on Maui to replace MCCC, and a new prison for Maui; improving our reentry and rehabilitation services for our inmates so that the revolving door of prison is stopped and we can lower the recidivism rate; improving our Sheriff Division, and hopefully looking at making our State Sheriff Division the best that it can be and the best law enforcement division in the state; and many, many other opportunities, especially with the passing of last year’s justice reinvestment initiatives. We currently have approximately 1,500 to 1,600 inmates on the mainland. The goal is to get the majority of them back to Hawai‘i before 2018 – in the next four to six years – and spend that \$50 million which we are currently exporting to the mainland here within our state.

“So Madam President, I am very happy to nominate Mr. Ted Sakai as our new director. Thank you.”

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I only wanted to add to the previous speaker’s comments relating to the new correctional facility on Kaua‘i. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Ted Sakai serves as a great example of someone who gives much of his time and energy to fulfill a vision of well-being for our community. He’s such a pioneer of his time that I could stand here for hours and reiterate the countless challenges that he overcame.

“However, I will specifically speak, as did the previous speaker, on an issue that he is currently tasked with: to activate the Kulani Correctional Facility. This particular project will not only bring a portion of our inmates home, but it will also provide these individuals with the cultural rehabilitation programs which they so greatly need and deserve.

“His perseverance, dedication, and commitment to our community confirms his capacity to ensure the department’s continued progress towards a new day in Hawai‘i. He also comes highly recommended by one of his classmates that happens to be my younger brother, who is a Hilo product also and he says he’s a good guy. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I want to say a few words that haven’t been expressed: that is, I don’t know why he is taking this job. Ted Sakai can make more money in the private sector than working for the State of Hawai‘i, and that speaks to his dedication as a state employee – a lifelong state employee who knows his craft. But quite frankly, he and his wife Ruth should be spending more time with their grandson. I really don’t know why he’s taking this job. But since it’s his idea, I’m going to vote for him. Thank you.”

S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“You know, everything that we say that we do in this chamber and in this building, we say we do for the keiki. Yet sometimes, many of us find this hard to believe because when there are certain pieces of legislation or issues that involve the keiki, we seem to drag our feet. I think that S.B. No. 880 is one of those pieces of legislation. While it is well-meaning – meaning that it’s well-intentioned – this bill would impose a mandatory sentence for a first-time offender of sexual assault on a minor under the age of 12, of 6 years and 8 months, and there are certain exceptions.

“I introduced a bill popularly known nationally as ‘Jessica’s Law,’ which is the law now in 44 states. That bill sends a very

strong message about how we value our children, our minors, because that bill, that law, imposes a mandatory minimum 25 years to life sentence for those who would sexually assault our children. While I support this present bill, it doesn’t go far enough, and there is no reason that we have to continue to beg and plead to get tougher sentencing for those who violate our children.

“The data that’s used in the committee report in substantiation of this particular measure and its 6 year mandatory is based on a survey from 1990 to 2001. There has been no published survey that I’m aware of since that time; we’re now in 2013. That survey did reveal, however, that 440 sexual assaults on children occurred per year, with one-third of them made on children under the age of 12. That means that there are still two-thirds of sexual assaults on our children from the age of 12 up to age 18, or in Hawai’i’s case, 16 – the age of consent.

“What are we doing about that? If we say that bills like this send a strong message and a deterrent, then I think we are avoiding the facts. It seems more and more children are being harmed sexually, and we stand by and we make fancy speeches about it, but we don’t do anything about it. This bill would not be a deterrent as much as a minimum 25 year sentence, and yet, we think that we’ve done our job.

“Many of the hearings here, we get more emotion and more people coming forward if we raise the issue of dog abuse. I think it’s an important subject, but isn’t it interesting that all of the passion and all of the excitement and all of the hard-lining goes into cruelty to animals? And yet our children – who we say are so valuable and we’re so concerned about – we find it hard to penalize the first-time offender because what we’ve learned often, to our great distaste, is that the first-time offender becomes a second-time, third-time, fourth-time, and fifth-time offender. We are being hypocritical in this building and in this legislature, and we can start with the very basic protection of our young people.

“Now, I know this bill’s got a defective date and it’s going to go to conference. I would urge the members of this body and of this legislature to finally get serious if we want to protect our children, and to make sure that we not only send a message, but we send the judicial incarceration if we really think that these are serious crimes. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, this measure imposes a minimum mandatory; it doesn’t preclude a jury to impose a longer term. This bill was proposed by the law enforcement community, including the attorney general’s office and the prosecutor’s office. This bill was thoroughly vetted. But that’s really not why I rose to support the bill; it speaks for itself.

“I have a lot of affection for the previous speaker. Not great, but a lot. It’s easy to stand and pontificate: ‘We make fancy speeches, but we don’t do anything about it.’ ‘We are being hypocritical.’ That sounds nice, but let’s finish the circle. After this bill was heard, which proposes to amend this section, the previous speaker asked me about Jessica’s Law. I said to him after we had the hearing that Jessica’s Law amends the very section that we just heard, but why don’t you propose an amendment on the floor for the members to consider? That way the position that he advocates for and the bill that imposes a longer minimum would be given the opportunity by every member on the floor. That was my suggestion.

“So, yeah, we can say, ‘We make fancy speeches, but we don’t do anything about it.’ Then do something about it! I offer to the previous speaker: offer an amendment on the floor. It’s

the same section of the law. We're being hypocritical? Well, who's being hypocritical? It's not too late. We can defer this. You can make your amendment. But to stand up and make a fancy speech and call everybody else hypocritical, I think, is calling the kettle black.

"So, if the previous speaker wishes to defer this measure, he has my support. But let's not be 'hypocritical.' Let's not just make a fancy speech and sit down for the media to report on the pontification. But if the previous speaker has no amendment to offer, then I guess we should go forward and do as we discussed in the Judiciary Committee, of which the previous speaker was offered an alternative. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in response as follows:

"As reluctant as I am to stand up and speak again – knowing now that the chairman has great affection for me, or at least a lot of affection – I would just remind him of one thing because I think he's getting older and maybe his memory is a little weak: that I had asked for the hearing on Jessica's Law prior to the hearing on S.B. No. 880, and then repeated that request. But knowing now, Madam Chair, that the Senate Judiciary Chairman will support me in my efforts for an amendment to change this bill, I would formally request that we defer it, and then I will make an amendment to be seconded and supported by the Judiciary Chair. Thank you."

But in fact, that is what happened, and that's why the offer was made to him to amend the bill, and an offer was made by me to defer the bill. So I appreciate your patience and understanding of what happened. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Green rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Members, I just wanted to tell a tale, tell a story of something that happened to me this weekend and that I was a part of, and it kind of doubles back on our life here at the Capitol.

"On Sunday, a very nice gentleman was playing baseball on the Big Island in Kohala, and he was hit in the eye with a baseball. He was the clerk's husband – a very sweet 60-year-old guy – and his eye exploded, basically, and so it was all blood, oozing, and he couldn't see. It was very difficult to find a specialist for him; the only specialist that we have on the Big Island was actually doing her one four-day stretch in California, which she works once a month to go and keep her skills up and provide care in the urban Los Angeles area. So we really couldn't get him care and we're hopeful his eye will be saved – I think it can be. But it was that difficult to get him care.

"And then last night at about 2 in the morning, I was finishing up my shift at 8 this morning, and a gentleman (this story's pretty wild, kind of a classic Big Island story) he was – it was a bunch of kids – 32, and he was tinting his windows in the middle of the night, which is a strange thing. But he fell off his car onto a scythe and cut his leg off, just barely attached. And fortunately, due to the good graces of our colleagues here, we funded the Ali'i Health Center on the Big Island that does provide for some support for specialists that otherwise wouldn't stay in the neighbor islands, and he was able to get his leg reattached this morning.

"So, I just say these things because they happened this weekend – it's kind of a typical shift, for the most part, that I experience every weekend when I leave you here. We needed the help of those specialists, and some bills are pertinent to this this year. It's why we're moving S.B. No. 664, which is the pipeline bill, to create scholarships for Native Hawaiian scholars ultimately going to medical school and then stay here in Hawai'i. Some of the best and brightest young Hawaiian and Polynesian students become physicians because of that bill. S.B. No. 665, which is the corollary to our loan repayment bill for primary care, which is a \$300,000 appropriation which creates scholarships to keep physicians here in the State of Hawai'i; and then a much larger piece of legislation, S.B. No. 1306, which is a very broad discussion about how to better manage the HHSC system for the neighbor islands and how we might keep specialists and keep our hospitals open.

"So, I just want you to know that these issues are very pertinent, they're very real, and I wanted to say that, kind of on behalf of the Big Island colleagues that we have here at the Capitol, because that is not an uncommon circumstance – we don't have Queen's or Kapi'olani or other hospitals to get to quickly, and those two cases were really something that we see quite often. Thank you for your support, and that's why we're

considering some of these measures. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Baker rose to announce that the Women’s Legislative Caucus was sponsoring a drive for Welcome Home Easter Baskets to benefit folks who were moving from the Institute for Human Services shelter to transitional housing, and encouraged the members and staff to participate.

By unanimous consent, action on H.C.R. No. 41, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO RENAME THE KILAUEA POINT LIGHTHOUSE LOCATED ON THE ISLAND OF KAUAI, HAWAII, IN HONOR OF THE LATE SENATOR DANIEL K. INOUE," was deferred until Friday, March 1, 2013.

By unanimous consent, action on H.C.R. No. 42, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO DESIGNATE, WHEN APPROPRIATE, ROUTE 200 ON THE ISLAND OF HAWAII AS THE DANIEL K. INOUYE LEGACY HIGHWAY," was deferred until Friday, March 1, 2013.

At 11:57 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:07 p.m.

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2013

S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 1) to S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1:

S.B. 880 S.D. 1 is amended by amending page 1, lines 4-17 and page 2, lines 1-6 to read as follows:

“§706- Sentence of imprisonment for sexual assault of a minor under the age of twelve years. Any person who is convicted of an offense under section 707-730(1)(a), 707-730(1)(d), 707-730(1)(e), 707-731, or 707-732(1)(a) against a minor under the age of twelve years, shall be sentenced to a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of twenty-five years, without the possibility of parole or probation.

Senator Slom moved that Floor Amendment No. 1 be adopted.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“First of all, let me say there was some question as to whether or not a second was necessary here. I’m a little disappointed that none of my 24 colleagues decided that it was important enough to second, but let me go on.

“We had a very lively discussion yesterday about this bill, and particularly about the penalty portion of the bill. I had remarked that there had been another piece of legislation known popularly as ‘Jessica’s Law,’ which has harsher penalties for those that would sexually abuse and harm our young people.

“In attempting to make a floor amendment, we wanted to do several things, but we were constrained by a number of different procedural areas. For example, in the title itself, it prohibited us from doing what we really wanted to do, and that is not having this apply only to children (minors 11 and under). But the age of consent in Hawai’i is 16 and under and we wanted to make that change, but my legal counsel informs me that the title would not allow us to do that. Also, there is nothing in the current bill, S.B. No. 880, that talks about continuous and uninterrupted sexual assault, which is the most egregious of things, and that would be found in HRS §733.6. But again, apparently we’re not able to put that in the bill.

“We are, however, able to change the minimum sentence from the current in the bill – 6 years, 8 months – to a minimum of 25 years. Now, some people think that’s harsh. As I mentioned yesterday, most of our speeches are about protecting the children. If we don’t protect the children, who does? I also mentioned that we seem to spend more time on cruelty to

animals. There was a hearing in Judiciary today talking about cruelty to dogs, dog ears, and apparently 62 people showed up to testify or submitted testimony.

“We seem to have a problem in protecting our children. We seem to be able to make a lot of excuses. One of my colleagues yesterday expressed concerns that if this amendment passes, then those who rape and sexually assault who happen to be mentally ill or developmentally challenged might be caught up in the law, and that’s true. But again, who thinks for and who speaks for the victims? It seems that we spend an inordinate amount of time trying to provide excuses, exclusive exemptions, or other special treatment for those that commit the crimes on our children.

“And just today, Madam President, one of the major stories in the *Star-Advertiser* shows a \$5.7 million settlement by the state, which this legislature will have to approve, because of continuous sexual assault of minors at the state Hawaii School for the Deaf and the Blind. How long are we going to let these things go on? Why don’t we make this a priority?

“This amendment does not go as far as it should. This amendment does not deprive any law-abiding resident of any rights. This amendment is a step in the right direction for trying to help our minor children.

“The question also has been raised that we want children to be able to testify in some of these hearings, and longer sentences may make it difficult for them to do so because it may involve a family member. I would argue just the opposite: that a shorter sentence would probably discourage children and parents and guardians from putting the child through that testimony. But if they knew we were really serious about this, and they knew that we had some real teeth in this, that would be the deterrent and that would be the opportunity to do this.

“So, members, I ask you humbly and respectfully to consider this floor amendment to make this bill stronger than it is right now; and Madam President, I would request a Roll Call vote. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Kouchi rose to speak on a point of information as follows:

“Madam President, may I ask the Judiciary and Labor Committee chair if he could compare and contrast the proposed penalties and minimum sentencing requirements in the proposed floor amendment to the language in the current bill to be voted on by the body in light of statements by my colleague from the 9th Senatorial District relating to the content of his proposed floor amendment?”

Senator Hee rose in response as follows:

“In response to the Vice President of the Senate on sentencing comparisons, I had the opportunity to speak to law enforcement yesterday, and also our staff lawyers provided me some information which I’m grateful for.

“Members, for the information requested: murder one, first degree murder – which is ‘more than two individuals, judges, police officers, or witnesses’ – the sentence is ‘life without possibility of parole.’ There also is a mandatory court review after 20 years.

“For murder two, second degree murder – which is ‘intentionally and knowingly causes the death of another’ – the sentence there is ‘life with the possibility of parole,’ and also a mandatory court review after 20 years. So obviously the mandatory court review acts as a minimum sentence in some respects.

“For manslaughter – which is, ‘recklessly causes the death of another’ – it’s a class A felony with a maximum of 20 years.

Under that circumstance, the paroling authority sets the minimum.

“For first degree sex assault – which is ‘sexual penetration of a minor under 14’ – it’s also a class A felony with a maximum of 20 years, and the paroling authority sets the minimum sentence.

“For first degree assault – which is ‘intentionally or knowingly causes serious bodily injury’ – that’s a class B felony, maximum of 10 years.

“And for attempted murder, it’s the same penalty as if they’d committed the murder.

“So these are the comparisons, insofar as sentencing guidelines is concerned, that already exists on the book, in the laws. Obviously, under our system of jurisprudence, the court has followed the letter of the law. Thank you.”

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak on a point of information as follows:

“If the person proposing this could explain to me: If a person is 10 years old and commits something in this regard, would they also be subject to this if it became law?”

Senator Slom rose in response as follows:

“Yes, my understanding is the answer is ‘yes,’ but even with mandatory minimums, we still have judicial discretion. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Well, it’s very tempting to yield to the gut feeling to lock people up and throw away the key, particularly if they’ve done something as egregious as what’s contemplated with this measure. I think because it affects all people and it leaves no discretion, I disagree with the interpretation of the maker of the motion that this provides for our judicial discretion.

“There are situations where it may be someone under 18 who commits a crime, who may be developmentally disabled, or have some other kind of mental impairment. I’m not just talking about mental illness, but something else that would affect their judgment and they wouldn’t be acting at the age that their body might be.

“It also doesn’t help with encouraging people to come forward. I think if you talk with practitioners in the sex assault treatment arena, people in the domestic violence arena, they would say that this kind of law – because it does not allow any discretion and it does not allow for more appropriate handling in some of these cases – that it will have actually the opposite effect. And while I think most of us would be very unhappy if one of our family members or a child were the victim of some kind of sex assault, whether it was once or periodic, I think the evidence would tell us that in some situations the ‘lock ‘em up, throw away the key’ is not the appropriate punishment. And for that reason, because there is no discretion, I’ll be voting ‘no’ on this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose in response as follows:

“I’m just responding, if I may, Madam President, because I thought I did address the idea of developmental disabilities or mental illness. But the point is: in our laws today, we do have a judicial procedure to determine in fact whether a person has the mental capacity.”

Senator Hee rose on a point of order and said:

“The speaker is not responding any question that speaks to what he’s talking about.”

The Chair interjected:

“But he did earlier, so that was it. So, this is his second time.”

Senator Hee continued:

“Nobody asked him to elucidate on previous comments. I mean, if he were asked, then he has every right to stand there and respond to the question.”

The Chair responded:

“I think the point that Senator Chun Oakland had asked the question earlier, he had risen to that, so this is his second time rising.”

Senator Hee thanked the Chair.

The Chair instructed Senator Slom to proceed.

Senator Slom continued:

“That’s my point, Madam President. Thank you.”

At 12:20 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:22 p.m.

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

“Members, I have allowed for discussion on the floor on this motion; however, the motion lacks a second. Therefore, unless there is a second, the matter will be disposed of.”

Senator Ihara noted:

“Madam President, only for the purpose of allowing the floor amendment to be considered, I second the motion, and note that neither Senate Rules nor Mason’s requires a second. Thank you.”

Senator Espero rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Basically, my interpretation from what I’m hearing is if a 13-year-old is in love with an 11-year-old – 11 years and 11 months, under 12 – then that person could be charged for a crime that could have that person in prison for 25 years (if a 13-year-old is in love with an 11-year-old). So, where there may not be a crime, but there’s just youthful thinking and actions going on and who knows what, and a parent might say, ‘Hey, how dare you! I want you to throw the book at that 13-year-old for committing this act with someone who he thinks is his girlfriend.’ And I think there’s just a lot of gray areas and uncertainty, and I don’t think this is the time to back this amendment. Thank you.”

Senator Nishihara rose to speak on a point of inquiry as follows:

“I have a point of inquiry to the Chair of Judiciary. If the law, as it’s now stated before us – if you have a situation where there are two minor children and one gets one to do a sex act, would that cause this law to have that child held under this law, under the proposed law?”

Senator Hee rose in response as follows:

“Well, a couple things. The way I read the amendment, it says: ‘any person who is convicted of an offense [...] against a minor under the age of twelve years, shall’ – not ‘may’ – ‘be sentenced to a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of twenty-five years, without the possibility of parole or probation.’ That seems to be consistent with the answer given previously by the introducer of this amendment when asked by the chair of Human Services that if a child of 10 years old – I can’t remember what circumstance – violated someone under

12 would be sentenced to a minimum of 25 years, and the answer by the maker of the amendment was ‘yes.’ Then I didn’t understand the rest, when he said the court would have discretion to impose the minimum; there’s no discretion as I read it in the amendment. Thank you. I hope this responds to the requestor.”

Senator Solomon rose and said:

“Madam President, I just would like the words of the senator from Maui incorporated into the Journal as though they were my own; I support her remarks. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I rise in opposition to this motion because maybe – unlike some of you, who have not had that experience where such as occurs, which I asked for the point of information to the Chair of Judiciary – I’m aware and have been in a position where such an event did happen in an elementary school. And on the basis of that – basing what the comments by the Judiciary – would have imposed a sentence that certainly would have been harsher than any of us would want upon minor children. So, I’ll be voting in opposition to this. Thank you.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 1 was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 1. Noes, 23 (Baker, Chun Oakland, Dela Cruz, English, Espero, Gabbard, Galuteria, Green, Hee, Ige, Ihara, Kahele, Keith-Agaran, Kidani, Kim, Kouchi, Nishihara, Ruderman, Solomon, Taniguchi, Thielen, Tokuda, Wakai). Excused, 1 (Shimabukuro).

Senator Slom requested his vote be cast “Aye with Reservations,” and the Chair so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 880, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCE OF IMPRISONMENT FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT OF A MINOR UNDER THE AGE OF TWELVE YEARS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

“Hawaii electricity rates are at record levels, due in large to the high cost of petroleum used to fuel electric plants on all the islands. Electric ratepayers are in need of relief and with this regulatory tool, the State can better guide the electric utilities to accelerate their efforts to acquire and implement lower cost, clean energy resources.

“With the introduction of economic incentive mechanisms, the electric utilities can retire old, inefficient utility plants without passing the costs onto the consumer and without losing financial rewards. SB 120, SD1 will help encourage the much needed electric utility infrastructure improvements which will directly help the consumer and help Hawaii reach its clean energy goals.”

"(a) Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, the tax imposed by section 247-1 shall apply to the transfer or conveyance of an interest in realty located in the State as a result of the transfer or acquisition, or a series of transfers or acquisitions, including those combined with otherwise exempt transfers, by any person or entity, acting alone or in concert, within any twenty-four-month period, that result in the transfer of a controlling interest in an entity that holds an interest in realty that is located in the State and the transfer includes valuable consideration that alters the controlling interest or ownership of the realty; provided that this section shall not apply to:

- (1) Any transfer from a limited partner to a general partner of a limited partnership that owns an affordable rental housing project for which low-income housing tax credits have been issued under section 235-110.8 or 241-4.7 or section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended; or
- (2) Any transfer that consists solely of a change in controlling interest in an entity holding an interest in realty between persons with ownership interests in such entity for a minimum of three years immediately preceding the transfer."

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"During decision making on S.B. No. 97, we had announced that we would be including the amendment to exclude transactions between different parts of companies from the assessment of this conveyance tax; and in reviewing the measure that we decked, we noticed that this amendment was left off of the draft.

"This amendment reconciles the action taken by the committee with the committee report here, and the only amendment is to insert the language excluding a transaction internal to a company from taxation."

- (1) One member shall be appointed by the president of the senate;
- (2) One member shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives; and
- (3) Five members shall be appointed by the governor;

provided that one member shall be a student of the university who has been enrolled as a full-time student for at least three consecutive semesters. The senate president, speaker of the house of representatives, and governor are encouraged to appoint university faculty and staff to the candidate advisory council."

3. By amending section 2, page 4, lines 16 through 18, to read:

"(f) Each member of the candidate advisory council shall serve for the duration of the term of the person by whom the member was appointed."

4. By amending section 5 to read:

"SECTION 5. The members of the candidate advisory council for the board of regents of the University of Hawaii who are serving on the effective date of this Act shall serve until the council is reconstituted by the appointment of the seven members to the council pursuant to this Act, at which time the members of the regents candidate advisory council who are serving on the effective date of this Act shall be discharged from office and the members appointed by the president of the senate, speaker of the house of representatives, and governor pursuant to this Act shall begin their service. The president of the senate, speaker of the house of representatives, and governor shall appoint the requisite number of members to the council no later than days after the effective date of this Act."

Senator Taniguchi moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Madam President, the amendment would do two substantive things: one is to reinsert the appointments by the Senate President and by the Speaker of the House to the council, as well as to eliminate the ex-officio, non-voting, most recent regent emeritus from the council.”

“(a) Any payor engaged in a trade or business and making a payment, other than wages, in the course of the payor’s trade or business to another person, corporation, partnership, association, or limited liability company, that is valued at \$600 or more in any taxable year for the receipt of construction services, including any payment for materials, equipment, or both associated with the construction services, shall submit a report of the aggregate payments made to each provider of construction services, to the department in a manner prescribed by the department, including but not limited to mandatory electronic filing of the report; provided that the report specifies:

- (1) The name, address, and tax identification number of the payor;
- (2) The name, address, and tax identification number of the provider of construction services;
- (3) The total amount that the payor paid to the provider of construction services in the taxable year; and
- (4) Any other information that the department shall require by rule.”

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 1289, S.D. 1, is amended by amending Section 3 to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. This Act, upon its approval, shall apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2013.”

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The purpose of this floor amendment is to reconcile the actual draft before us with the action announced at decision making. This floor amendment actually has two amendments. The second one I’ll start with is the simpler one: It’s just correcting the effective date to be upon approval and applying to taxable years beginning December 31, 2013. During decision

making, we had announced that we would not be inserting a defective date. Unfortunately, the draft that was decked had a defective effective date.

“The first part of this bill just adds clarifying language. The proponents wanted to make clear that payments to construction contractors purely for equipment and materials should not be included in the totals reported. So, the first section of this just makes it clear if a construction services contractor has an invoice purely for materials and equipment that those shouldn’t be included in the amounts reported.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 4 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 7, 2013.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 690 (S.B. No. 215, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 690 be adopted and S.B. No. 215, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 5) to S.B. No. 215, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 215, S.D. 2, section 1, is amended by deleting subsection (e) of the proposed new section -5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, on page 8, lines 9 through 12.

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 215, S.D.2, is amended by amending section 4 to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. The public-private partnership authority shall neither plan nor implement any projects other than the pilot projects nor enter into any agreements or contracts related to the planning or implementation of any projects other than the pilot projects identified in this part.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 5 be adopted, seconded by Senator Slom.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“There are two changes to the bill. The first section removes the county waiver. The second amendment is to make it explicitly clear that there are only three pilot projects.”

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 690 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Slom and carried.

high level of performance. But I have reservations at a wholesale broadening of the definition of what constitutes ‘instruction,’ which may come at the expense of our students in lower-performing schools or who are being shortchanged in their instruction at some of our high schools.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 238, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Green, Hee, Ige, Keith-Agaran, Nishihara, Ruderman, Shimabukuro, Solomon, Taniguchi, Thielen). Noes, none.

S.B. No. 727:

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam Chair. I’ll be voting ‘no’ on this bill. I think the bill is unnecessary. The law already prohibits the counties from intervening in federal or state regulations, but the counties can regulate for health and safety. We rely on them to regulate for ocean safety for our residents and visitors, and for our fire and building codes. So, banning them from regulating in areas of health and safety is unwise, and I do not support the bill. Thank you.”

Senator Slom then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 7) to S.B. No. 1109, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 1109, S.D. 2, is amended as follows:

1. By adding a new section to Section 2 of the bill to read:

"§321-D **Religious exemption.** Notwithstanding any of the above, a hospital shall be granted a full exemption to the requirements in this part if to do so would violate its religious convictions. A hospital is eligible for this exemption if it satisfies the following four criteria:

- (1) Opposes emergency contraception because of religious objections;
- (2) Is organized and operated as a nonprofit entity;

- (3) Holds itself out as a religious organization or is affiliated with a religious denomination; and
- (4) Self-certifies that it meets these criteria."

2. By amending the section designation of the new section entitled "§321-D Rules." contained in Section 2 of the bill to read "§321-E Rules."

Senator Slom moved that Floor Amendment No. 7 be adopted, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"This amendment basically would do what we have talked about for years, and that is to grant exception to those hospitals that qualify on religious convictions. Thank you."

At 10:04 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:05 a.m.

Senator Green rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"Colleagues, this amendment would allow for hospitals a religious exemption if they did not want to provide emergency contraception in the case of rape. So, very specifically, a woman gets raped; it's the worst day in her life for sure. And the hospital that she gets taken to because of proximity – by the ambulance or by her relatives – if this amendment were to pass, would be able to refuse her emergency contraception. She could end up pregnant, for God's sake. There's no circumstance in this world that a woman should end up pregnant from a rape. No hospital – and this is coming from a physician, a husband, a father of a daughter – should ever be allowed to refuse a woman emergency contraception if she's been raped.

"Please vote down this amendment. I empathize with the provider if they don't want to perform an abortion or to do any other service, but no hospital has the right to categorically deny a woman who's been raped the care she needs. In medicine, it's important that all patients have all options. A patient could choose not to take medicine, but the hospital must offer it.

"I would add also that all of our hospitals in this state receive public money – all of them – through the Affordable Care Act, through our insurance policies, through our plans, through the sustainability acts we've been passing.

"Members, please vote 'no' on this amendment. I'm sympathetic to people's religious beliefs: I'm part Catholic, part Russian Orthodox, contrary to what anybody might believe. I'm half Jewish, I'm married to a Mormon. But for God's sake, please make sure everyone gets all the health care options that they might need, especially in this most dire situation. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"I, too, rise in opposition, and I would like to support the remarks of the senator from the Big Island as though they were my own. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal as follows:

"I think it's interesting that we so cavalierly trample over First Amendment rights and also religious rights; and particularly in this body, that has always seemed to be so concerned about separation of church and state, and here is the question of the state trampling religious rights. And interesting that it was brought up about the 'Obamacare,' the Affordable Care Act, because in the Affordable Care Act there is such a religious exemption granted to both individuals and institutions.

And several of the institutions in this state have very clear and well-defined religious beliefs, which they have practiced for a long period of time.

“And finally when we talk about right to choice, or right to choose, we should give that right equally to individuals and institutions as well. So, I urge passage of this floor amendment, and I request a Roll Call vote. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

“Madam President, colleagues, this is not about choice. This is not about religious freedom. This is about applying the standard of care which even the Catholic Bishops’ Conference nationwide has acknowledged is important for a young woman, an old woman, a middle-aged woman who may be the victim of rape. This is about compassionate care. It’s about the standard of care. It doesn’t force anyone to have to take the care, but they need to be given the options.

“And I would also note, for the first time the Healthcare Association of Hawaii, which is our hospital association, has come out in support of the measure that is on the floor – not the floor amendment. I urge all of my colleagues to join all of us in making sure that every woman in the state has the opportunity for compassionate care if they are the victim of rape. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani rose to request that the remarks of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as if they were her own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only).

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 7 was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“The reason for this bill is really to encourage people to actually participate in organ donation and bone marrow donation. Right now, there is a severe shortage of access, especially to bone marrow matches. A lot of children end up with leukemia, and the truth is it’s not going to hurt any small business because I do know that the small businesses are generous with their individuals and their time. But we need to send a message to everyone that this is one of the greatest gifts of life that they can offer to save people from many malignancies. So, that’s why I am in support of this measure.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 565 was adopted and S.B. No. 1233, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEAVES OF ABSENCE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill seems to be a bill crafted for one individual. It also has retroactivity in the bill, and it seems to shield individuals who serve on panels, task forces, boards and commissions. The argument was that if we required disclosure that people will not want to serve on these boards and commissions. I think it’s important that we encourage people because they are volunteers to be on these boards and commissions. But we talk about transparency and we talk about ethics, and the ethical thing to do is make sure that all information is available to the public. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I have some written remarks that I’d like inserted into the Journal. However, I think it’s important now to state for the record that based on the excellent opinion from our majority attorney, the views of the executive director of the Ethics Commission have been thoroughly refuted. The matter in question came from a lawfully created task force the Legislature requested be convened to help guide us with various mortgage foreclosure issues. We need people from the public with expertise to craft policy solutions to then come before the Legislature to be debated and acted upon. The Ethics Commission ED’s position is especially troubling in this instance because when the Legislature asks members of the public to serve and provide their expertise on very complicated matters, those public members should be able to provide perspective no matter who their employer is.

“And I would just note on this particular matter with the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force some of the recommendations from some of the industry representatives were not advanced by the Legislature and did not appear in the final bill which became law. In my view, this matter ought to be moot. But because the executive director continues to try to go after people, I think this measure is necessary. Madam President, I would also ask if I may be allowed to insert the opinion of our majority attorney on this particular matter which explains very clearly why members of task forces are not state employees.”

The Chair having so ordered, the majority attorney’s opinion is identified as “**ATTACHMENT A**” to the Journal of this day.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in support of SB 893, SD1.

“SB893, SD1, Relating to Ethics, exempts members and designee or representatives of members of task forces that existed on or after 06/03/10 from certain provisions of the code of ethics, specifically from being considered state employees. These exemptions do not in any way conflict with current laws and are necessary to ensure that qualified individuals will not be discouraged from serving on task forces. In the 2012 Legislative Session, Act 208 was passed but did not apply retroactively to those who had previously served on task forces before or on June 3, 2010. SB893, SD1 is necessary to protect those task force members who dutifully served on or before June 3, 2010. The Legislature owes these task force members this equal protection.

“Individuals who are selected or invited to serve on a task force are not nominated, appointed, or elected to their positions. They are not hired by the State and are not compensated for their service. They are not considered members of boards, commissions, or committees with regulatory or decision-making authority, because such task forces are solely and strictly advisory. Legislators create laws not the task force

members. Task forces do not have regulatory powers, do not make policy, and its members are not appointed by the Governor nor are they confirmed by the Senate. There is no employee-employer relationship between the State and members of legislatively created task forces, as task forces do not act on behalf of or bind the State in any manner and do not perform adjudicatory or decision-making actions. The Legislature is not required to take any of the task force recommendations and has a final say in on any measures that may emanate from a task force.

“SB 893, SD1 provides the necessary exemptions to ensure that qualified individuals are not discouraged from serving on task forces. Our legislative task forces should attract members who are experts in a particular area, many of those we would consider experts work directly in the field. This experience is a clear benefit to the State in its decision-making process. Task force members serve in other professional capacities that may conflict with the current code of ethics if no exemptions exist under the current statute making it less likely for individuals with valued expertise from serving on such legislatively-created bodies. We need to protect those that have served on boards previously so that they aren’t hurt by the statute of limitations of six years under section 84-31 (a) (6), Hawaii Revised Statutes. By making the bill retroactive we are able to protect the members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force as well as other task forces established prior to the enactment of Act 208 on July 3, 2012, who may still be in jeopardy of being found in violation of the Ethics Code based on the Commission’s May 2011 interpretation and application of Section 84-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

“Please join me in supporting SB 893, SD1.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I would like to insert into the Journal, with your permission, a letter dated February 14, 2013, from Daniel J. Mollway, Esq. regarding S.B. No. 893, Relating to Ethics.”

(The Chair having so ordered, the letter is identified as “**ATTACHMENT B**” to the Journal of this day.)

“I would like to read a part of the letter I referred to. It’s on page 9 and it’s entitled, ‘Improper accusation: the claim that the law is being changed for one person.’

To say that the Legislature is changing the law for one person is essentially accusing the entire Legislature of corruption. It is saying that the Legislature will allow **all future** task force members and **all past** task force members (there could be hundreds) to violate the State Ethics Code just to save one “friend”. This is patently absurd.

The need for retroactivity because of the Commission’s statute of limitations. Act 208 should have been made retroactive, and this retroactivity should take into account the Commission’s six-year statute of limitations. While Mr. Kondo contends only one person is affected by S.B. No. 893, this is not true. There could be many task forces that have been created by the various branches of state government, or working groups that might be considered task forces.

Mr. Kondo contends that **all** members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force but one complied with his directive. **This is impossible for him to say.** HRS section 84-14(d) bars “assistance” for pay, and this can take place without the Commission’s knowledge. A task force member can go back to his or her company and brief them on how to testify on bills, or how to lobby on a matter. “Assistance-type” violations of HRS

section 84-14(d) are basically learned of by the Commission by accident or through whistleblowers. Mr. Kondo cannot know how many task force members or work group members may have existed and are still subject to HRS section 84-14(d). Such task force members could unknowingly violate the law, as interpreted by Mr. Kondo.

There would be nothing improper with setting a retroactive date that ensures that former task force members are not in jeopardy. This retroactive date could be January 1, 2004, since once the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force met, its members could be subject to charges by the Commission or charges brought by members of the public, or legislators who believe Mr. Kondo's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d) is correct.

To my mind, there would be nothing improper with setting the retroactive date to January 1, 2000, to give everyone piece of mind.

"So, if we want to talk about making changes, we should do that. If we talk about conformity, this is not conformity. And I asked several weeks ago for the Department of Taxation to provide a side-by-side, line-by-line summary of what the changes are; I'm still waiting to see those. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of SB654 SD1.

"This measure requires that health insurance providers cover tobacco cessation treatment in every plan, as well as requires insurers to provide policyholders or subscribers information about tobacco cessation treatment coverage.

"The Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee found that cigarette smoking is the leading cause of preventable disease and preventable death in the United States. In Hawaii, tobacco use claims 1,100 lives each year and creates \$360 million in annual health care costs. By requiring tobacco cessation treatment to be covered not only will we be able to assist smokers who want to quit smoking but we will be able to lower the future healthcare costs of those individuals as well.

"The Department of Health testified that most smokers want to quit smoking and that insurance coverage of these treatments increases the likelihood that a person will succeed in those efforts. Furthermore, the Department of Health testified that according to the U.S. Public Health Services Clinical Practice Guideline on Treating Tobacco Use and Dependence:

- 1) Tobacco cessation treatments help people quit smoking;
- 2) Participation rates for treatment programs are higher when there is no cost-sharing;
- 3) Combining counseling with tobacco cessation medications is more effective than using one type of treatment alone; and
- 4) Quit rates are higher when health insurance covers tobacco cessation treatments.

"Based on these findings and the support of the Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawaii, I recommend, on behalf of the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection that this measure pass third reading. It will save lives because it will help smokers end their addictions by improving access to smoking cessation treatment programs. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill creates yet another new special fund. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 590 was adopted and S.B. No. 1101, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE INTERIM ASSISTANCE REIMBURSEMENT SPECIAL FUND,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 591 (S.B. No. 1093, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 591 be adopted and S.B. No. 1093, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen requested that written remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise to express support, but with some reservations, on SB 1093, SSCR 591 and on SB 1095, SSCR 727.

“I support early childhood education. I applaud the Administration and this Legislature for moving this effort forward. I respect the many groups who have dedicated much time on the many important policy decisions that we need to make. However, I feel compelled to express two concerns as we move this discussion forward this session.

“First, we need to make sure that we do not make changes in our existing early childhood education network that will make it more difficult for the small businesses that operate these schools. Our state is blessed with many wonderful and long-standing private early childhood education providers. In fact, my two daughters went to the same wonderful early learning

school as my younger brother. None of us want to see such important partners in this effort negatively impacted, and I know the ongoing discussion will take this into consideration.

“Second, our Department of Education is tackling the herculean job of improving our K-12 student achievement, including creating and implementing new systemic changes affecting teachers and principals. At the same time, they are addressing operational concerns with bus and food service; operating, repairing and maintaining 256 public schools on 7 islands. In short, they are changing the tires on an express bus at full speed.

“All of us want the DOE to succeed in these efforts. The Legislature has been mindful about diverting the DOE with additional tasks to keep their focus on the essential improvements they are undertaking.

“I encourage the discussion going forward to continue examination of the best location for an early childhood program so that it can support partnership with the private sector, without diverting attention from the well-deserving K-12 students. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Again, Madam President, I rise in opposition to the bill because it creates the interim assistance reimbursement special fund.”

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, this is the first of three early learning measures before us today and perhaps the most foundational in that it focuses on school readiness and ensures that we will be in a position to better meet the needs of our late-born children through this program, when junior kindergarten sunsets in the 2014-15 school year. Through the Executive Office on Early Learning that was established by us last year, our school readiness program will maintain standards of care for eligible providers, and focus on ensuring the greatest range of access and assistance for our families.

“Passage of this measure puts us in a good position for the hopeful adoption of a constitutional amendment that will allow us to build upon the foundation that this school readiness program creates, and puts into place a solid early learning system developed through best practice and the strength of public-private partnerships.

“While there are those who would argue that we should instead focus on K-12 – that we need to improve on outcomes in this area first – I would assert that their objection is in fact the solution. If we truly want to strengthen our K-12 pipeline, then we need to make sure that our children are ready to learn when they enter our schools. We are only 1 of 11 states in the country without a publicly funded early learning system. Let’s make 2013 the year we join the majority of states to support our youngest of keiki with access to opportunities that prepare them for school, and later, college, career, and life. Thank you very much, and I strongly encourage you to vote to support this measure as it moves forward.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 591 was adopted and S.B. No. 1093, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL READINESS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 592 (S.B. No. 1057, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 592 be adopted and S.B. No. 1057, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Madam President, we have about a dozen bills coming up all dealing with collective bargaining, all dealing with increasing salaries or additional costs at a time when our economy is so troubled, at a time when so many of our friends and neighbors in the community are struggling, at a time when small businesses are having a very difficult time. And yet, we call on these people to support collective bargaining increases for public employees. We just can’t sustain that. We can’t explain that. It’s not right, and I’ll be voting ‘no’ on all of these bills. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 592 was adopted and S.B. No. 1057, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYER UNION HEALTH BENEFITS TRUST FUND CONTRIBUTIONS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 599 (S.B. No. 495, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 599 was adopted and S.B. No. 495, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 600 (S.B. No. 237, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 600 be adopted and S.B. No. 237, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I have reservations about this bill and I’d like to explain them.

“Up until now, the Department of Education has relied upon the Department of Land and Natural Resources to do any leases, sales, or easements for land. The way the Department of Land and Natural Resources manages these lands is governed very strictly under chapter 171. Public leases must be done through public auction and public bidding and notice. This bill, with the way it’s crafted right now, exempts these pilot projects from chapter 171-13, and then also section 302A-1151. As best I could tell from reading these provisions, what it means is that the Department of Education would then have the authority to enter into long-term leases for these lands but would not be governed by any law regulating public auction, or how it enters into discussions with developers for those leases.

“I have asked questions about why these exemptions are necessary. I hope these questions are answered in the bill as it moves forward, because I do understand that we need funds to improve our schools. But we also need to be cautious about how we engage in long-term leasing of public lands.

“The other concern that I have with the bill is it requires the Board of Education to ‘foster school and community participation’ in the selection of the two sites in the pilot project, but it doesn’t provide any definition of what that means. At a minimum, we need to be adding provisions in here

that would govern the long-term leasing of public lands so it’s done in a public and cautious manner, and to also provide some more detail about the engagement of the schools, the parents, and the communities in the selection of pilot projects. Thank you very much.”

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, originally I called this the ‘Lieutenant Governor Shan Tsutsui Needs Something To Do’ bill, but in all seriousness – and especially since he or his staff is probably watching this measure – S.B. No. 237 is actually the Senate’s response as to how we can maximize the use of our public school lands and facilities to update and build twenty-first century schools for the benefit of our students, teachers, and all of our communities.

“While a few legislative approaches have been considered over the past two years, we have been working on these initiatives since well into 2011 – actually probably 2010. Your committee has decided to take a very prudent, cautious approach in the development of school lands, and authorize a limited two site pilot program that includes a three-year sunset and multiple requirements for reporting and extensive community engagement.

“I would also like to note, and just respond to the previous speaker, that while we have exempted them from going through the Board of Land and Natural Resources’ leasing requirements, I’m sure that given that we have authorized the lieutenant governor to facilitate this program that that can be something that we take a look at in terms of having them work with the Department of Education to actually be the one to engage with those leases. I know in the past there have been difficulties between the Department of Land and Natural Resources and the Department of Education to even work together for various land transactions or gifting, and I think that was the initial reason why authority over leasing had been given to the Department of Education, because when we had multiple agencies working together, we have had difficulties coordinating particular issues. But as this moves forward, we can perhaps look at moving that authority back to the Board of Land and Natural Resources in terms of having them work on those particular two site leases.

“Again, I want to reiterate – this is a very prudent approach. We are only looking at two sites over the next three years. This is a proof of concept; we want to see how this will work, again, really to make sure that we can look at benefiting all of our students. We know this for sure: the money that we put into our CIP budgets every year for repair and maintenance and capital improvements will not get us to the mark. It will not get us to that point where we can provide the twenty-first century schools that our children deserve. The only way we can do this is by increasing revenue, and we need to be creative and think out-of-the-box. So, we’re going to start by looking at a very prudent piloted approach, and this is the approach the Senate Committee on Education is putting forth for your consideration; and I humbly ask for your support in moving this forward, and hopefully we can pass something through this year so that we can get started do something. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’d like to speak in support of our chairwoman in Education. I think that this is a measure that would propel us into the future, and I’m looking forward to how these pilot projects would work; and I feel that the school properties that would most benefit from this new agenda would be those on the neighbor islands. We have many school properties that are celebrating their 100th and 125th birthdays, and our thoughts

are if we are looking for our future so that our students can compete in a global economy that requires high tech vision, infrastructure is the key to their success.

“So with that, Madam Chairman, please note that I will be voting ‘yes’ and I encourage all my colleagues to do the same. Thank you.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I guess my concern is that, potentially, a school in my district may be impacted, and that I think we are concerned that at the school, it has been expressed to me that they do not wish this to happen to them as a pilot or in the future, so I’ll be voting in opposition. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 600 was adopted and S.B. No. 237, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Slom, Thielen). Noes, 2 (Green, Taniguchi).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604 (S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604 be adopted and S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Galuteria.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill goes by various titles; this could be the ‘Memorial Chlamydia’ bill, or I like the words ‘Expedited Partner Therapy.’ Now, what does that really mean?”

“Well, as the hearing showed, there is great concern about the transmission of the sexually transmitted disease chlamydia, and also gonorrhea. So, the fix that’s proposed in this bill is to require anyone that’s diagnosed with that to give up a list of partners, in which case then a health professional will prescribe medicine for those partners. Now, it’s really interesting because there’s no physical exam that is required; no one gets to look at the partner. And in fact, there might even be a situation where names were given up that really were not involved.

“In any event, this does have the government prescribing medicine. It does raise the issue of liability, and I think the bill attempts to exempt people from any liability. There is no real discussion of who’s going to pay for these additional medicines, and what happens if there are unintended consequences.

“And finally, Madam President, I find it ironic that the bill only pertains to forcing this treatment on heterosexual individuals. I thought we stood for equality in this building here and I thought everyone was supposed to be treated equally, but not according to this bill. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“All right, it’s time for a reality check, Madam President, so I stand in support of this bill. What really goes on (this is the medical ‘deal’, okay): Someone comes in with an STD, chlamydia or gonorrhea, which are the common ones. A man comes in; he’s seen in my ER, or my clinic, or across the state. He’s got the infection. You can treat it with just a basic antibiotic; it’s very simple. His insurance pays for it. If, however, you don’t prescribe treatment for his significant other – and this of course can be reversed; a woman comes into the clinic and you don’t prescribe medication for her significant other – then the infection will persist in that couple. It’ll come

back; we’ll have additional costs and additional problems. Worse still, if you don’t prescribe an antibiotic for, say, a partner, and someone doesn’t come clean about having had that infection, a woman will have a persistent infection, will end up with scarring of her fallopian tubes, and then have infertility, which will result in incredible costs. It could result in an incredibly worse infection if it’s not caught early.

“So, everything about this bill is meant to be compassionate to someone. It’s not about government paying for or giving out care; that, of course, has nothing to do with this bill. What it really has to do with is getting people care; and believe me, patients want this. They want to not have to go and spend a day away from work. They want a quick antibiotic; a one- or two-day generic antibiotic – it’ll cost a couple bucks – rather than very severe complications, or no clarity in their relationship, or actually life-changing consequences from infertility. So, in every way this is about a practical solution that really is much more fair to those individuals who might not otherwise get treatment.

“So, this expedites treatment; and the reasons that the ‘it was specified for heterosexual patients’ comments can be taken up by others more specifically but mainly because more advanced treatments such as intravenous treatments aren’t involved in this bill because obviously just a prescription would just be for a basic couple tablets.

“So really, members, this is about getting people better care. It’s not about a record of sexual contact. It’s not about the government getting involved in your health care. It’s not even about getting around liability because frankly, most patients would want to come in, but they can’t find a primary care physician these days. So, in every way, this bill is actually going to prevent suffering and it’s going to get people better care.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604 was adopted and S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I have been a long-time foe of mandates, whether they’re in energy or healthcare or whatever. Our mandate for ethanol has proved to be a costly failure, costly in several ways: By requiring that 10 percent in all gasoline, we found it, first of all, did not do what we were told it was going to do – spur a local ethanol industry. Instead, we’re still importing ethanol from South America. Secondly, while biofuel is a good alternative, and it should be an alternative, the problems that we face with the mandatory ethanol would still be available even if you lowered it to 5 percent biofuel, and some of those problems include non-workability on small engines such as boats and small aircraft, and also the lack of productivity and the higher cost.

“So, I think what we really need are more options and more choices. For those people who want biofuel, they should be able to have it, but to force this like any other mandate shows that an education program has not worked. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 605 was adopted and S.B. No. 15, S.D. 2, entitled:

“I was under the mistaken impression that that’s what public archives had been doing. We learned in Ways and Means with full discussion that in fact they are just switching over now to digital records, so it is a redundancy because you’re paying once to record whatever the vital statistic is, and now you’ll pay again. Initially, only a \$1 fee, but we note throughout the history of fees in this body that they start off at a dollar and then go to three, and five, and ten, and so forth. So, I want to nip this in the bud and vote ‘no’ now.”

“You know, listening to the hearings and listening to all the attempts at changes, to me, was a turf war between electricians and plumbers. I don’t know who the winner would be, but I know the loser would be the consumer because we would pay more for this and it’s not necessary. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to request that written remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in support of SB1301 SD1.

“SB1301 relates to the licensing of tradespersons who perform air conditioning and refrigeration and/or fire sprinkler work. This measure will prepare such licensees to work in new construction settings involving the use of both potable and non-potable water as more buildings utilize new water reclamation technologies and procedures. This measure will ensure that consumers are protected from any cross contamination that may occur when construction plans call for both potable and non-potable water lines.

“New regulations to reduce water flow and encourage the safe use of reclaimed non-potable water in residential and commercial buildings are part of an updated state building code now under review. Thus, it is important to prepare and train the workforce to handle the changes and innovations ahead related to use of non-potable water technologies and processes to ensure public health and safety.

“As all interested stakeholders continue to work on refining this measure, it is important to note that SB1301 SD1 is not intended to require licensure for workers of any trade other than those directly licensed for air conditioning, refrigeration or fire sprinkler work and does not include the fabrication customarily performed by the sheet metal industry. Also, this amended measure is not intended to require licensure for all workers performing pipefitting. Instead, it focuses on the pipefitting associated with plumbing, air conditioning and refrigeration, or fire sprinkler work and does not preclude other properly licensed contractors from performing pipefitting work within the scope of their license.

“SB1301 SD1 is intended as a starting point for further discussion as this measure continues through the legislative process. I am hopeful that consensus among all interested parties can be reached during this legislative session and ask that we move SB1301 SD1 forward at this time. The ultimate goal is consumer protection as well as improved resource management. I think we all acknowledge that we must find ways conserve our valuable freshwater resources and make better use of so called gray water. This measure moves us toward that goal by ensuring that certain licensed tradespersons are appropriately trained to execute plans for new commercial and residential buildings that make greater use of available non-potable water sources. Mahalo.”

S.B. No. 1201, S.D. 1:

S.B. No. 1236, S.D. 1:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried, S.B. No. 1236, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIBER OPTICS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1:

Senator Wakai moved that S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill deals with the phased-in process in looking at historic sites. Clearly, it is aimed at projects like O’ahu’s rail project because the environmental law in Hawai’i is different from the other states and different from the federal government. The phasing law in the federal government allows a project to go ahead even though there may be questions initially at that project, and until they get to the phase that is controversial, construction has continued. The problem there is when it gets that far, the argument often is, ‘Well, we’ve gone this far, we’ve spent this much money; we’d better be able to fix the situation and complete it.’

“In Hawai’i, as we saw, the State Supreme Court ruled that the rail project had to stop because of the phasing-in law here in Hawai’i. And what it said was that you could go ahead with some of the early phases, but you could not start any construction on the phase that was in controversy. And as we’ve seen, that was a wise decision by our court because we’ve continued to see iwi being discovered along the route. What this bill would do is to exempt that process, result in greater costs and more projects that the public would not have any input for. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“One of the concerns I have about this bill is the potential unintended consequences. The bill allows phased archeological reviews where projects run along corridors that span large areas of land, which the prior speaker addressed, includes the rail situation. But the bill also allows phased archeological reviews for projects where access to the property is restricted, or where circumstances dictate that construction be done in phases. That language is really broad and ambiguous. Seeing as we don’t have any projects that are pending in front of the state that would require this type of bill, I would prefer that we defer this measure and take a look at some tighter language if such is necessary in the future. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill is an in-your-face response to the Supreme Court decision on *Kaleikini*. Every Hawaiian should be offended by this proactive effort to preempt the process, and it is a slap in the face to the iwi kūpuna who have been resting in place.

“It’s a sad day when this legislature moves forward to overrule and overturn the Hawai’i Supreme Court’s deliberate action to preserve the rights of Native Hawaiians. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE REVIEW OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 19; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Chun Oakland, Gabbard, Ige, Kidani, Nishihara, Shimabukuro, Tokuda). Noes, 6 (Green, Hee, Ihara, Ruderman, Slom, Thielen).

S.B. No. 472, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 472, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“The objective was to clearly delineate and separate possession of one ounce of marijuana from a criminal penalty to a civil penalty, a civil action, and I support that. But if we’re going to do that, I think we should be really clear. This bill leaves a fine of \$1,000, which is pretty hefty for a civil penalty and for one that previously had been \$100. So, I think that if we’re going to move in any direction and we want to change something that we should make it very clear; this is not that clear. Thank you.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I’d also like to express my reservations with the bill. I’m glad we’re moving to decriminalize this, but I think a \$1,000 fine is way too high for something we’re trying to decriminalize. I appreciate that this is a work in progress, and I hope to see it develop along the way; so, I’ll be supporting it with reservations.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Members, as you know this is a work in progress, and I’m sure that we all understand how our process works. The highest civil penalty you can impose is \$1,000. So, why not send the measure to the House with the highest, hoping that the House will now have something to work with? Perhaps they would lower it in their deliberations.

“So, I think that, all of us understanding the strategy of the Senate and how we move ahead, we should support this measure because we did pass a measure similar to this in previous legislatures. And, to speak more to the measure, this is a fundamental shift in our public policy and how we relate with marijuana.

“So, I think that this is a prudent beginning. If you recall, I introduced three measures: one completely legalizing marijuana, one decriminalizing, and one allowing for the compassion centers. I do believe this is the most prudent way to go because we’re setting a foundation. The first step is to decriminalize. If you remember, way back when in the mid-nineties – for those of you that were here – traffic infractions were criminal, and the first step in dealing with those: decriminalize traffic infractions to move it out of the criminal code and into the civil code.

“So, I ask that you support this measure, realizing full well that this is a major policy shift for us. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Just a few remarks to follow up on the previous speaker, who is the author of this bill. He is correct; the Senate has moved a measure like this previously. It does not make smoking marijuana legal or lawful. Smoking marijuana is still illegal. What it does is save the court backlog system, according to a study done, \$9 million. And what this bill also does, by moving it to the civil side, is it imposes a mandatory fine that’s presently allowed by law of \$1,000.

“The previous speaker is absolutely correct that it provides for the House meat on the bone because as was done previously, the House chose not to hear the bill. It gives the House the opportunity to make deliberative decisions and save taxpayers \$9 million by making the crime of smoking marijuana a civil penalty and still unlawful by law. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 472, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARIJUANA,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Ruderman, Slom). Noes, none.

S.B. No. 532, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 532, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Regretfully, I must oppose this bill. As my colleagues know, I’ve supported breastfeeding in the past; I support breastfeeding in the present. I like breastfeeding, but what I don’t like is mandates continually telling businesses – particularly small businesses – what time they have to allow, additional time, additional space. There were bills in the past, and I know the intent was still there, to have refrigeration and other units.

“Look, we have a law now. The state law is clear; the state law is working, and that is that there must be time allowed during breaks or during lunch for breastfeeding. But to require additional mandates on business, I think, is unfair and is costly to them. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 532, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BREASTFEEDING IN THE WORKPLACE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 465, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 465, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Boy, didn’t we have fun with this bill? Wasn’t it great having rock stars and legends here? It was almost as exciting as when the word leaked out that we were going to grow marijuana up on the fifth floor in the garden. That having been said, we have been the butt of many editorials and jokes across the country for this proposed legislation.

“We have strong privacy rules right now. We have it in our Constitution; we have it in our laws. The most egregious of actions against not only celebrities and politicians and others is currently taken care of in our existing law; this was pointed out by opponents to this bill. And while the bill was amended and changed for the better, it still is an attack on the First Amendment, still leaves a lot of unanswered questions and the possibility for misdeeds and wrongdoing, particularly as it affects those in the journalistic professions and even in law enforcement.

“So with all these things said, I know that there’s a great deal of harmony for the celebrities that have chosen to live here, but I think the laws should apply to everyone; and in the case of privacy, they do. And my final remarks to Mr. Steven Tyler, as he sang so eloquently, ‘Dream on, dream on.’ Thank you.”

“Madame President, I rise in support of SB 1135 SD2. The current e-waste recycling programs are not working because of inherent flaws in the language of the statute. As a result, the Department of Health requested a bill last year that would have required recycling anything with a plug. While I support that, the bill faced overwhelming opposition. So, instead, we changed it into a task force. Over the interim, the Department of Health held three meetings of the Electric Device Recycling Task Force, each time with more and more members. Unfortunately, they were unable to get consensus.

“The bill before us is our attempt to reach a compromise that restricted the scope to computers, TVs, similar devices and peripherals. The bill also has the Department of Health setting poundage goals for manufacturers based on their sales. Although the bill targets only manufacturers of computers, televisions and peripherals, it allows them to collect any electric device to meet those goals. So, for example, Apple, Dell, Sony or Samsung could choose to collect blenders, crockpots or microwave ovens to meet their goals. And it would require manufacturers to have Department of Health approve their collection and recycling plans.

“My hope is that this bill will help to reduce the amount of electronic waste going into our landfills and instead divert that into recycling. Please join me in supporting SB 1135 SD2. Mahalo.”

“If we’re going to have bills for cruelty to animals, then let’s enforce the laws on cruelty to animals, but don’t have such a wide, broad, and vague net that we ensnare law-abiding people who are enjoying their pets as well, and that’s what this bill does. Thank you.”

“I want to thank the members of the Senate that have been patient with S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2, in particular the Committee on Water and Land, the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, and the Committee on Ways and Means.

“This is a contentious issue on the North Shore – has been for some time – which really began more than 20 years ago. I would like to read a few things into the record. The first is a lead editorial dated December 26, 2012, by the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser*. I’ll just read four short sections. It begins by saying:

Residents of the North Shore district, whose treasured rural and scenic charms increasingly have run up against urbanization plans, face a narrowing window of opportunity to start building a force capable of preserving more of the Turtle Bay environs than the current developer aims to do.[...]

[T]here are a few possible end games here, but the one many in the community prefer – a “conservation partner alternative” – will take a nearly herculean effort to pull together enough money to achieve that kind of settlement.[...]

But its preferred alternative still entails development at Kawela, as part of an expansion by 625 hotel rooms in two hotels and 590 new resort-residential units.[...]

The priceless nature of this coastal resource has long been recognized. Former Gov. Linda Lingle put together a working group that in 2008 contemplated ways the state could acquire and protect much of the prime shoreline.[...]

The financial package will be tough to assemble, but the effort should be made. One of Oahu’s last pieces of pristine shoreline should not be relinquished – at least not without a real fight.

“The recommitment of S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2 is the result of an e-mail I received yesterday evening from Turtle Bay Replay Resorts, Inc. CEO Drew Stotesbury. I would like to read it into the record and also provide a hard copy for the record; it’s dated March 4, 2013.” (The Chair having so ordered, the letter from Drew Stotesbury is identified as “**ATTACHMENT C**” to the Journal of this day.)

Dear Senator Hee:

We greatly appreciate the opportunity to explore an alternative for both the State of Hawai'i and Turtle Bay Resort, LLC ("Developer") to voluntarily negotiate in good faith a solution that provides the State the ability to keep a portion of the undeveloped lands at the Turtle Bay Resort ("Resort") for public benefit. We have been apprised that you may be open to holding the referenced measure pending while the Developer proceeds in good faith to negotiate with the State in regard to the acquisition by the State of certain lands within the Resort.

The Developer is open to good faith negotiations with the State provided that these negotiations take place immediately and that negotiations terminate no later than November 30, 2013, at which time the State and developer will submit to the Legislature for its consideration a report as to the result of the negotiations. If the parties are able to negotiate terms, area, and price, then SB 894 could be amended to effectuate the terms of the negotiated settlement. If the parties are not able to negotiate a settlement, then I suspect SB 894 might proceed through the legislative process in the next session.

We believe this alternative provides a reasonable time for the State and the Developer to engage in good faith negotiations to reach a reasonable solution that benefits not only the immediate community, but the State as a whole.[...]

It is our desire to be good stewards of the land and find a way to reach a solution. We appreciate your willingness to be open to further discussions.

"Members, S.B. No. 894, in my opinion, has procured what I just read; and for that, I am wholly grateful to the members of the Senate to bring 894 to the floor this morning.

"While I am hopeful that Replay Resorts and the State are able to reach a negotiated settlement, I am drafting a resolution to this effect so that at the end of the day, it's my hope that S.B. No. 894, if picked up next year, will be just as the CEO of Replay Resorts proposed to amend it to provide for a settlement so that the final frontier on the island of O'ahu can be preserved for the public good. Thank you, members, and thank you, Mr. President."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 695 (S.B. No. 17, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 695 be adopted and S.B. No. 17, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This bill – first of all, we have to look at the law, and the law was set up as an environmental response to oil leaks. Initially, there was a \$0.05 per barrel fee; we now are up to \$1.05 per barrel. And we're trying to expand this law not only to include additional products, but also additional fees. Some of the amounts are blocked out, blanked out, but the purpose here, again, is to expand the scope of this bill, and I think it's unnecessary. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to request that written remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's remarks read as follows:

"I support changing the law to encompass the environmental impacts caused by all carbon-based fuels. However, I express concerns about exempting current users of coal from the carbon tax until they negotiate a new contract. This provision may

incentivize these companies to extend existing contracts for long periods, particularly since coal will be the only fossil fuel exempt from the tax.

"I'd prefer we tighten this language to prevent this from happening by adding a drop-dead date to the exemption as the bill moves forward.

"In addition, I'm concerned about striking the amounts of the proportional allocations of the funds for the specified purposes. We have broad popular support for the renewable energy, food security and invasive species prevention programs. My hope is that we ultimately dedicate this tax in its entirety to those purposes."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 695 was adopted and S.B. No. 17, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FOSSIL FUELS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 2 (Hee, Kim).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 699 (S.B. No. 331, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 699 be adopted and S.B. No. 331, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This is the increase to the minimum wage bill. This would be detrimental to all businesses, but particularly small businesses.

"There are very few people that actually receive minimum wage, which is an entry and training wage; it is not a living wage. What we have seen from study after study is that every time the minimum wage increases, it destroys jobs for the very people that need them most – the entry-level positions for youth and for minorities.

"In addition, those of us that are in business understand that any time the minimum wage goes up, forced by the government, there's no increase in productivity necessarily. And in addition to that, the mandates that we must pay – matching taxes, matching insurance, and so forth – also go up, their premiums go up, because in part they're based on experience and in part they're based on the total payroll.

"Finally, one of the things that the restaurateurs have talked about for years is the tip credit, which is a common practice in all 50 states. Hawai'i, at 25 cents per hour tip credit, is one of the lowest amounts in the United States; and in this latest version, there is a tip of the hat to tip credit, but it is a blank amount and no one knows what it's going to be.

"So for these reasons – this does not add jobs, does not improve our economy, it does hurt business – I'll be voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"In response to the previous speaker, not all businesses oppose such increase in wages and not all businesses feel like this hurts them. A lot of business owners are very compassionate for those at the lower rungs of our economic ladder.

"As I support the increase in minimum wage, I have concerns about this and will vote with reservations because I'm very concerned about the attachment of the CPI or any index to it. The thing that businesses need is predictability and stability

in their wage structure, and attaching it to the CPI will be disastrous, so I want to express my reservations. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This bill is long overdue. As President Obama properly indicated in the State of the Union, this helps the poorest of the poor. This particular bill is the only bill that is in play for the Legislature from the standpoint that the House bill has attached to it the unemployment insurance contribution by employers.

“This bill, as was reported or testified to accurately by the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, is a bill that unless the minimum wage was increased that by 2016, what is now the minimum wage of \$7.25 will be worth \$5 in purchasing power – I believe \$5.16. This bill proposes to take the Legislature out of the process by attaching it to the Consumer Price Index. I would note here that in testimony received by your committee, 10 other states have already engaged in this process by their own laws.

“While it’s fair to say that this bill is not the final product, I fully anticipate that the Committee on Judiciary and Labor and the Committee on Ways and Means will be involved in a conference. It provides a sound footing from which discussion can occur by raising the minimum wage in three increments at 50 cents per calendar year, and also by looking prospectively at a reasonable means already employed by 10 other states of taking this issue so that as the cost of living rises, the poorest of the poor will also see their buying power not diminished. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I will be voting for this bill in support, Mr. President. However, I wanted to note for the Journal and to my colleagues that I, too, am concerned about the CPI, using this to determine our minimum wage, just for the fact that the CPI is predicated on a Honolulu model. The neighbor islands, especially the island of Hawai‘i, have a much lower economy, in terms of where they’re at. And I’m supporting it simply because the Judiciary Chairman mentioned that this is not the final product, and I’m hoping that as the bill progresses we will be able to address these concerns. So, it’s a question of fairness when we’re making these decisions. Thank you very much.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just wanted to note to my colleagues that there are exemptions to the minimum wage that you can find in HRS Section 387-1 and Section 387-9; and specifically, Section 387-9 provides employers with exemptions if they hire people with disabilities, students, people who are coming out of Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility, and those types of things. And so, there is relief out there for employers. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 699 was adopted and S.B. No. 331, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABOR,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, Gabbard, Nishihara, Ruderman, Solomon, Thielen, Wakai). Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 1 (Kim).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 703 (S.B. No. 1194, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 703 was adopted and S.B. No. 1194, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX,”

having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Kidani, Ruderman). Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 1 (Hee).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 708 (S.B. No. 403, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 708 was adopted and S.B. No. 403, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BONDS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 711 (S.B. No. 708, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 711 was adopted and S.B. No. 708, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LEGACY LAND CONSERVATION PROGRAM,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 712 (S.B. No. 754, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 712 be adopted and S.B. No. 754, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“My opposition is that I find it difficult that we have to allow the Agribusiness Development Corporation to purchase land to encourage agriculture. I think there are enough people out there that want to engage in agriculture and to farm if we made the land directly available to them. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 712 was adopted and S.B. No. 754, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LAND ACQUISITION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 714 (S.B. No. 510, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 714 be adopted and S.B. No. 510, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill has been a very contentious bill for a number of years now because the effect of the bill has been for large PEOs (professional employer organizations) to try to have barriers to entry for smaller independent PEOs. And while this bill is an improvement and reduces some of the burdensome additional costs, it still is a burden and still acts as that barrier to entry to smaller independent PEOs. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“While I would agree that previous versions had both sides not happy – the small PEOs and the large PEOs – I’m pleased to say that because of efforts that your committee made, along with the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations and representatives of the small PEOs and the large PEOs, this bill represents consensus language. It allows all sizes of PEOs to fully operate, and if we left the current law in place, it would be more onerous. The current law on the books requires a

\$250,000 bond if you're going to be deemed a professional employer organization. This measure provides a sliding fee scale that allows smaller ones to operate successfully, as well as making sure that consumer protections and protections for their clients are in place. I ask my colleagues to join me in voting in favor of this measure. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 714 was adopted and S.B. No. 510, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROFESSIONAL EMPLOYER ORGANIZATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Ihara). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 715 (S.B. No. 515, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 715 be adopted and S.B. No. 515, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"You know, I've supported housing measures and housing bills over the years, but two things have happened: One is that we continue to increase and expand a number of these programs, and they're very costly; and number two, as I had earlier predicted late last year, human services has surpassed education in the State of Hawai'i as the single biggest expense to taxpayers.

"And this bill provides amounts for the homeless program, the homeless program office, the rental assistance program, the housing first program, the homeless prevention program, the rapid rehousing program, the shelter first program. All of these programs cost a lot of money and they have not shown their effectiveness. We continue to have more homeless and more people in need of affordable housing, and why is that? Because in the Legislature, we keep raising taxes, fees, and mandates. So, we can't have one without the other, and at this point I'm saying 'no' to all these additional costs. Thank you."

At 11:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:51 a.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 715 was adopted and S.B. No. 515, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 719 (S.B. No. 1027, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 719 be adopted and S.B. No. 1027, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Under Hawai'i's coastal zone management law, we have designated some of our most sensitive lands in the state to be in the Special Management Area. Most of our shoreline areas are in the Special Management Area, and under this designation, if anybody is going to be developing these lands, they need to obtain a Special Management Area Permit. That's one of the few permits that we have under state law that makes sure that we protect shoreline access. The rights of people to access the shoreline in Hawai'i is something that makes our state unique.

"What this bill proposes is to exempt state developments on state lands from the need to get a Special Management Area permit, and in some cases the developments may be exempt from the shoreline setbacks. The only requirement is that they conduct a self-consistency review, which is similar to the fox guarding the henhouse.

"I'd like to point out that we already passed S.B. No. 1207, which exempts the DOT Harbors Division from having to get a Conservation District Use permit for any new harbor or expansion of existing harbors. If we are to also pass this measure, the State DOT Harbors Division would not need to get any state permits protecting public access for expansions of existing harbors or when building new harbors. These harbors are areas that many people in our state – boaters, surfers, sailors, canoe clubs, fishers – use for shoreline access. To take away all the state permits that would require that these types of facilities and expansions to maintain shoreline access is something that I cannot support. So, I oppose this measure. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I rise in support with some reservations. I do so knowing that the bill is defective, and that's why I'm rising in support – so that there's some discussion that can deal with some of the issues articulated by the previous speaker.

"While I appreciate that side of the coin, there's also another side of the coin, and that is – and let me give you a specific example – for more than a decade, the Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology in Kāne'ohe Bay has been trying to get the necessary permits to shore up its island that is literally falling into the ocean and causing harm to the reef. We have, in the past, sent legislation over to the House to see the demise of the legislation which would have allowed HIMB to proceed with saving the island. That's the other side of the coin, and I don't mean to diminish what the previous speaker had said with respect to the example used by harbors.

"The concern here is that the public process of allowing people to weigh in, in my opinion, must be addressed, and let me give you an example: There was a time when DLNR intended to turn part of the shoreline of Sand Island into a marina for boats. On the face of it, it sounds like a reasonable idea; after all, we are an ocean state. But when doing more research, the place that the harbor for boats was proposed to be built was exactly where the canoe clubs were, and it stands for good reason that the canoe clubs were there because it was a sheltered area of Sand Island.

"So this is, in my view, why it's necessary that if permits are to be expedited, the public participation must not. The public has every right – and should have every right – to weigh in. While I can see this bill being of great assistance to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs on its Kaka'ako makai lands, the public still has a right – and should have that right – to weigh in on the future of shoreline areas.

"So, while I have some strong concerns about this bill, I note that it is defective and I am confident that some of the issues articulated can be addressed as it goes forward. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"The purpose of these bills is to provide a streamlined state consistency review process for the development by state agencies on state lands within a special management area (SMA) in place of a county approved SMA permit and shoreline setback variance. In light of scarce resources, reductions in staff, and reduced funding support for state programs, the state consistency review and certification process

will allow the Hawai'i CZM (Coastal Zone Management) Program to remain consistent with the state and federally approved Coastal Zone Management Program, and helps the state expeditiously deliver capital improvement and repair and maintenance costs.

"The question was proposed by previous speakers: 'Is this another exemption?' No, projects will not be exempt from the CZM law. This is a streamlining effort to make the process simpler and more efficient while still achieving the purpose of Hawai'i's CZM law to provide for the effective management, beneficial use, protection, and development of the coastal zones.

"In 1975, our Legislature found that special controls on developments within areas along the shoreline were necessary to avoid permanent losses of valuable resources and the foreclosure of management options, and to ensure that adequate access, by dedication of other means, to public owned or used beaches, recreation areas, and natural reserves is provided.

"Mr. President, the drafting of this bill was done in consultation with various stakeholders who have jurisdiction and regulatory responsibility over CZM Act implementation. The Office of Planning sought comments from: Department of Land and Natural Resources' Division of Forestry and Wildlife, Division of State Parks, Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation, Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands; Department of Transportation's Airports Division, Harbors Division, Highways Division, Statewide Transportation Planning Office; Office of Hawaiian Affairs; all four county planning departments; and the Marine and Coastal Zone Advocacy Council (a 12-member public advisory board with at least 2 members from each county). The director also discussed the Office of Planning's proposals at various presentations before such audiences as the 2012 Hawai'i Congress of Planning Officials, the Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, and members of the Environmental Council.

"So with this in mind, Mr. President, I'm asking my colleagues to please support this bill; and as we all know, Third Reading still means that it is a work in progress. Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 719 was adopted and S.B. No. 1027, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Chun Oakland, Green, Hee, Keith-Agaran, Shimabukuro, Slom). Noes, 3 (Ihara, Ruderman, Thielen).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 723 (S.B. No. 1007, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 723 be adopted and S.B. No. 1007, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to make the following remarks:

"I'd like a ruling on a possible conflict of interest; I apologize. I belong to a law firm that occasionally does cases that affect state tort liability."

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 723 was adopted and S.B. No. 1007, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LAND LIABILITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 724 (S.B. No. 1068, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 724 was adopted and S.B. No. 1068, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MONEY TRANSMITTERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726 (S.B. No. 1082, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726 be adopted and S.B. No. 1082, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to request that written remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran's remarks read as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President, I write to express my reservations on S.B. 1082 S.D. 1.

"I understand that it may be helpful for the Department of Education to have more flexibility in determining how to provide adequate transportation for schoolchildren and to use the limited funds budgeted for bus transportation. This bill would delete language specifying considerations for contracting transportation of school children from Section 302A-406, Hawaii Revised Statutes, including the availability of public carriers or other means of transportation and the frequency, regularity, and availability of public transportation. I am concerned that eliminating some of these considerations could leave schoolchildren in certain areas of the state with limited transportation options. This could be particularly problematic for students in some areas on the neighbor islands, which may lack a robust transportation infrastructure.

"I am voting in favor of the present bill with the hope that the Department of Education and the Governor's appointed School Board will give due consideration to the lack of public transportation options in our rural areas. Flexibility should not mean not taking into account important factors such as the availability of transportation infrastructure in a county or area when making decisions on how best to provide transportation for schoolchildren. Flexibility assumes that a one-size-fits-all solution may not be the most appropriate response to the escalating bus transportation costs."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 726 was adopted and S.B. No. 1082, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Keith-Agaran). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 727 (S.B. No. 1095, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 727 be adopted and S.B. No. 1095, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen rose to request that written remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise to express support, but with some reservations, on SB 1093, SSCR 591 and on SB 1095, SSCR 727.

“I support early childhood education. I applaud the Administration and this Legislature for moving this effort forward. I respect the many groups who have dedicated much time on the many important policy decisions that we need to make. However, I feel compelled to express two concerns as we move this discussion forward this session.

“First, we need to make sure that we do not make changes in our existing early childhood education network that will make it more difficult for the small businesses that operate these schools. Our state is blessed with many wonderful and long-standing private early childhood education providers. In fact, my two daughters went to the same wonderful early learning school as my younger brother. None of us want to see such important partners in this effort negatively impacted, and I know the ongoing discussion will take this into consideration.

“Second, our Department of Education is tackling the herculean job of improving our K-12 student achievement, including creating and implementing new systemic changes affecting teachers and principals. At the same time, they are addressing operational concerns with bus and food service; operating, repairing and maintaining 256 public schools on seven islands. In short, they are changing the tires on an express bus at full speed.

“All of us want the DOE to succeed in these efforts. The Legislature has been mindful about diverting the DOE with additional tasks to keep their focus on the essential improvements they are undertaking.

“I encourage the discussion going forward to continue examination of the best location for an early childhood program so that it can support partnership with the private sector, without diverting attention from the well-deserving K-12 students. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I certainly wish I could support this, since every major political person and special interest supports this early education, but are we really talking about early education? I believe not. I think what we’re talking about is a further subsidy by the taxpayers for early watching of children. We’re talking now about four-year-olds. The State Budget and Finance director indicated at a public forum last week that the actual cost of this will be about \$100 million for two years and that it will grow. But the proponents of this legislation have indicated early and often that they don’t want to stop at four-year-olds; they want to go to three-year-olds, two-year-olds, one-year-olds, and so forth.

“We have existing programs now. The Education Chair, I think, referred earlier to people that say, ‘Why don’t we fix K-12 first?’ I’m one of those people. We have a lousy record on our K-12 public education, and we’ve spent billions of dollars annually to improve this and we have not held the Department of Education accountable. And now we’re going to start a new program when we don’t have money and force the taxpayers to have yet another expensive program. I don’t think so. It’s not worth it, and for every study that shows that this early education results in better students, I can show you a study that shows just the opposite. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 727 was adopted and S.B. No. 1095, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION,” having been read throughout,

There was no indication, however, whether that had anything to do with the red light or not. I know I tell my friends and loved ones to stay out of crosswalks because that’s where everybody’s getting killed right now. That, again, has nothing to do with red lights. And if we have a program like this, the best that we can hope for is if someone runs a red light – and we do see that almost every day, it’s true – but if somebody runs a red light and even kills somebody, the only thing that we’re going to provide will be a nice, clear photograph of the person running the red light after they’ve already done the damage.

“The real answer here is stronger law enforcement – more boots on the ground, more people that can actually see things and can stop things before they start. This is a blatant money grab and I oppose it. Thank you.”

“And again, I would go back to the fact that it is so costly doing business in Hawai‘i for every kind of business, and particularly for agriculture and for farmers who work harder and probably make less than most other businesses. But we’re creating the very problems that they complain of through our taxes and our regulations and through non-exemption of the Jones Act and things like that that make importation of feed and other produce much more expensive.

“And I notice now that even in this bill, in S.B. No. 593, we’re expanding the subsidies to include milking goats, sheep, lamb, fish, and even crustaceans. Where will it end? That’s the problem: Once you start on the road to subsidies, you don’t solve the problem; all you do is increase the cost. I want to have a strong, viable agricultural industry, but we don’t do it with more subsidies. Thank you.”

“Madame President, I rise in support of SB 623 SD2. Colleagues, I consider this bill to be perhaps the most important bill that the Energy and Environment Committee passed this session. The intent is to lessen the fiscal impact on the state while still keeping the renewable energy industry going.

“Renewable energy tax credits have been a long-standing issue and has been my top priority this session. Starting in September of last year, I brought together stakeholders from the solar and wind industries, economists, investors, utilities, other legislators and state agencies with the goal of coming up with a workable solution. This informal working group held four meetings.

“In November, while we were still meeting the Department of Taxation announced temporary Administrative Rules that significantly curtailed the tax credit. The Administrative Rules were brought about in part because of mounting criticism that the current law was allowing folks to get multiple tax credits. We heard from homeowners, businesses, and utility scale solar developers who were very concerned about how the Administrative Rules would impact their planned projects. If this bill fails, those temporary Administrative Rules could be made permanent. Moreover, this bill will affect which utility-scale developers bid on the upcoming 200 MW RFP and for which type of projects.

“I have been working closely with my House counterpart, Rep. Chris Lee. And we see eye to eye on this bill. This bill is critical in keeping solar affordable for homes and businesses. I ask you to join me in supporting SB 623 SD2. Mahalo.”

And yet, even with the eight attorneys that are on staff, they still manage to spend millions of dollars to outsource to other attorneys in town. Now, the way it used to be before the Legislature granted autonomy to the university was that the attorney general was responsible for legal affairs, and then we had one corporate counsel, and now we have a staff of eight.

"I think that the hearings have shown and the public has indicated that they are really tired with high administrative salaries, the number of bureaucrats, and the number of lawyers that give conflicting – and lots of times, erroneous – advice at the university. So, I'll support this measure, but I like the original better. Thank you."

"This problem calls for innovative solutions like SB1306 SD2. SB1306 SD2 will assist Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation's acute care hospitals and feeder critical access hospitals on Maui and the Big Island by enabling the creation of a public-private partnership to provide Hawaii's hospitals with financial support in order to ensure sustainable access to high quality medical services for our constituents. This measure, therefore, advances our commitment set forth in Article 9 of our State's Constitution, to 'provide for the protection and promotion of the public health' by allowing the regional systems of the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation and their health facilities to transition to non-public status. Over the last 20 years, that department has lost a lot of its general fund funding and has had to develop special fund revenues. To deprive it of those revenues are going to come at the expense of some critical operations that I know we all support.

“I know there’s some frustration in Big Island County about the status of the property, but many of these properties are run-down because they’re nearing the end of the lease term, and lessees are not interested in investing in their properties at the end of their lease term. Transferring them to the Big Island County is not going to change that fact. I think we should explore other ideas next session that can allow the state to enter into, some way, a revitalizing of properties toward the end of the lease term. But I have to vote ‘no’ on this measure to transfer these properties to the county.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I would like to submit a letter from the Mayor of the County of Hawai‘i into the record as to the reason of why I am supporting this bill. Thank you.”

We import approximately 92 percent of our food, that we have an inventory of fresh produce enough for no more than 10 days. Ninety percent of the beef, 67 percent of the fresh vegetables, 65 percent of fresh fruits, and 80 percent of all milk are imported. We are always in a state of impending crisis should there be disruptions to our sea-borne highway.

“This bill will establish a food resiliency initiative under the D.O.A. to achieve measureable goals of food self-sufficiency, establish a food resiliency branch in the D.O.A., establish a food resiliency task force to set benchmarks for the initiative to achieve, and finally provide funding for the food resiliency initiative. The effects of achieving the goals of food resiliency will be felt by a positive economic impact, keeping money in the state by increasing farm production, lowering importation of food thereby reducing our dependency and high food and energy costs, all of which helps our bottom line in tax revenue. If we wish to make real improvement to our goal of greater self-sufficiency and thereby our state’s ability to become resilient in the face of future challenges to our food supply, this is the first of many steps we need to take. The future we seek begins today. I ask for your support for this measure. Mahalo.”

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

S.B. No. 286, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 286, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Solomon rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“It’s with deep regret that I will be voting ‘no’ on this bill. I cannot see how I could possibly support it. As late as March 4, Monday before Third Reading, I was of the mind to vote with reservations, but unfortunately, upon contemplation and speaking with the attorney that had represented me, I find that to be impossible. I will submit my remarks to the Journal and I will be voting ‘no’ on this bill. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered.)

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon’s remarks read as follows:

“I was one of the four plaintiffs in *Solomon v. Abercrombie*, 126 Haw. 283, 270 P.3d 1013 (2012), who were successful in proceedings before the State Supreme Court on the reapportioning of the State Senate to add a fourth State Senate seat to the County of Hawaii.

“In effect, the decision in question by the 2011 Reapportionment Commission to include ‘nonresident military and dependents, nonresident students and incarcerated felons’ in the population data used to determine districts was overturned.

“First, let me make this clear: I am the sister of a dearly loved fallen soldier who gave his life in Vietnam for the freedoms we enjoy, and am therefore, deeply committed to protecting the rights and interests of our dedicated men and women in uniform. However, to suggest that Hawaii is dishonoring the contribution of our military forces by excluding these ‘nonresidents’ in our population base is a very effective distraction from the real truth, which is that these Americans are just that – ‘nonresidents’. They have permanent residences and loyalties to their states and – historically – they vote in their home states not in ours.

“Please understand that the question about including ‘nonresidents’ should be moot; the people of Hawaii weighed in on the issue of fair and equitable representation in the reapportionment process with the passage of a Hawaii Constitutional Amendment in 1992. That amendment changed the population base to be used for reapportionment from ‘registered voters’ to ‘permanent residents.’

“As a result, I voted nay on Senate Bill No. 286, Senate Draft No. 1, with deep regret but strong conviction.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“While I certainly respect the views and the arguments of my colleague, I also respect the 108,000 military personnel who were disenfranchised last year by our Reapportionment Commission after they had voted the first time to allow them to be counted. Again, so there’s no confusion, not to vote, but to be counted for representation – so 108,000 it turns out are not being represented in any way, and that did have a political shift within the community, particularly the island of Hawai’i and the island of O’ahu.

“If this law goes into effect, it will basically define ‘permanent resident.’ The argument was that we passed a constitutional amendment 10 years ago that said that reapportionment would be based on permanent residents, and that’s true. The only problem was, it was left up to the Legislature to define the term ‘permanent resident’ – it was not defined in the constitutional amendment. And just like the issue involving same-sex marriage and marriage, the term ‘marriage’ was left up to the Legislature to define, as the Legislature has done.

“So, in this case, I think it seems only equitable for us to define – to use our legislative duties and responsibilities – and define permanent resident, and to define it the way 49 other states of the United States have defined it based on the census that’s taken April 1st every 10 years. It’s as simple or as difficult as that. It would not affect anything now and would not go into effect, really, until eight years from now during the next reapportionment. So, I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this measure. Thank you.”

QUESTIONS PRESENTED

The questions presented for analysis in this memorandum are:

- (1) Whether the State Ethics Commission is correct in its assertion that members of a task force are state "employees" for purposes of the State Ethics Code and, therefore, prohibited from engaging in paid legislative advocacy for legislation or issues related to the work of the task force; and
- (2) Whether the State Ethics Commission may prohibit the convening of a task force because it anticipates that the task force members will engage in paid advocacy for legislation or issues related to the work of the task force.

SHORT ANSWER

- (1) The State Ethics Commission is erroneous in its determination that members of a task force are state "employees" for purposes of the Ethics Code, despite the Ethics Commission's long-standing practice of defining task force members as "employees" and reliance on that definition as precedent in issuing opinions.

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- (2) The State Ethics Commission may not prohibit the convening of a task force due to any type of anticipated or projected potential violation of the State Ethics Code.

BACKGROUND

At issue in the present case are two Ethics Commission opinions or assertions regarding the applicability of chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") (the "Ethics Code"), to two legislatively created task forces. The first involves the participation in the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force ("Task Force") established by Act 162, Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, of certain individuals who are employed by private agencies, organizations, or industry groups involved with the mortgage industry and who also present testimony to or lobby the Legislature on behalf of their employers or industry groups. In a memorandum to members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force (the "Ethics Commission memorandum"), apparently issued *sua sponte* by Leslie H. Kondo, the Executive Director and General Counsel of the Ethics Commission ostensibly on behalf of the Ethics Commission, opined that Task Force members are prohibited by the Ethics Code from testifying or lobbying before the Legislature on any matter in which the Task Force participated or will participate.

The second involves the apparent communication from a staff person or other individual representing the Ethics Commission to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs regarding the legislatively created working group established in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 134 (2011) ("SCR 134") ("Working Group"), created to investigate the creation of a locally focused, Hawaii-based stock exchange. This communication from the Ethics Commission prohibited the creation of the working group, presumably on the basis that potential members may violate the Ethics Code.

ANALYSIS

A. Application of State Ethics Code to Task Force Members

Chapter 84, HRS, prescribes a code of ethics for elected officers and public employees of the State, as mandated in article XIV of the Hawaii State Constitution. Chapter 84, HRS, applies "to every nominated, appointed, or elected officer, employee, and candidate to elected office of the State and for election to the constitutional convention, but excluding justices and judges . . ." HRS § 84-2.

"Employee" is defined in section 84-3, HRS, as follows:

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"Employee" means any nominated, appointed, or elected officer or employee of the State, including members of boards, commissions, and committees, and employees under contract to the State or of the constitutional convention, but excluding legislators, delegates to the constitutional convention, justices and judges.

One of the provisions of the Ethics Code, section 84-14, HRS, prohibits conflicts of interest on the part of state employees. Among other specified prohibited conduct, section 84-14(d), HRS, states:

No . . . employee shall assist any person or business or act in a representative capacity for a fee or other compensation to secure passage of a bill or to obtain a contract, claim, or other transaction or proposal in which he has participated or will participate as [an] . . . employee, nor shall he assist any person or business or act in a representative capacity for a fee or other compensation on such bill, contract, claim, or other transaction or proposal before the legislature or agency of which he is an employee

1. **The plain language of the definition of "employee" in section 84-3, HRS, does not include members of task forces for purposes of the State Ethics Code.**

The Ethics Commission memorandum to the members of the Task Force states that the Ethics Commission interprets the definition of an "employee", as defined in the State Ethics Code, to include volunteer members of a legislatively created task force. "Employee" is defined in section 84-3, HRS, as follows:

"Employee" means any nominated, appointed, or elected officer or employee of the State, including members of boards, commissions, and committees, and employees under contract to the State or of the constitutional convention, but excluding legislators, delegates to the constitutional convention, justices and judges.

In reaching its conclusion, the Ethics Commission memorandum emphasizes the phrase "including members of boards, commissions, and committees". However, that clause does not stand alone, but rather modifies "any nominated, appointed, or elected officer or employee of the State". See, e.g., *Argo Oil Corp. V. Lathrop*, 72 N.W.2d 431, 434 (S.D. 1955) (stating that when used in statutes, "the term 'including' is not one of all-embracing definition, but connotes simply an illustrative application of the general principle"). Accordingly, only an officer or

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employee of the State who is "nominated, appointed, or elected" falls within this definition.

Thus, there are two requirements that must be met before an individual is subject to the Ethics Code as an "employee": (1) the individual must have been "nominated, appointed, or elected"; and (2) the individual must be an officer or employee of the State. Failure to satisfy either of these requirements means that the person is not an "employee" for purposes of the Ethics Code, HRS § 84-3, and the Ethics Code is not applicable to that individual, HRS § 84-1. Task Force members fail both tests.

a. **Nomination or appointment.** The inclusion of task force members in the definition of "employee" fails because task force members are not nominated, appointed, or elected.

Within the Hawaii Revised Statutes, the Legislature consistently uses the terms "nomination" and "appointment" as terms of art and not generically. *Agustin v. Dan Ostrow Const. Co., Inc.*, 64 Haw. 80, 82, 636 P.2d 1348, 1351 (1981) ("Words or phrases used in two or more sections of a statute are presumed to be used in the same sense throughout[.]"). These terms are also used specifically within the Hawaii State Constitution. See, e.g., Haw. State Const., art. 3, section 8; *id.* at art. V, sec. 6; *id.* at art. 6, section 3. The Legislature may confer the power to appoint by statute, *id.* at art. V, sec. 6, and, when that occurs, the authority to appoint is expressly articulated using that term. For example, selection and hiring of civil service employees and other public employees are referred to as "appointments" by an "appointing authority" in chapters 76 and 78, HRS. Vacancies in the Senate are filled by appointment by the Governor. HRS §17-3. Nominated and appointed member of boards and commissions that are established by law are nominated and then appointed by the Governor. See HRS §26-34 ("The members of each board and commission established by law shall be nominated and, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the governor."). Other positions established by statute refer to the person authorized to fill the position as having the power to "appoint" the person.¹ Thus, the

¹ See, e.g., HRS § 11-1.6 (authorizing the Elections Commission to appoint the Chief Elections Officer); HRS § 53-5 (authorizing county redevelopment agencies to appoint a manager and deputy manager, and expressly giving the manager the "power to appoint" other employees, subordinates, and assistants); HRS § 89A-1 (establishing the position of Chief Negotiator for the State, and authorizing the Governor to appoint the Chief Negotiator and deputy negotiators); HRS § 231-83 (authorizing the Director of Taxation to appoint investigators and other staff); HRS § 323F-8 (authorizing the Board of Directors of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to appoint a chief executive officer of the corporation, and authorizing the chief executive officer to appoint other personnel).

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Legislature's use of the term "appoint" confers the substantive authority to appoint.

When the Legislature establishes a board, commission, advisory committee, or other committee, the Legislature is generally very specific about any appointment and nomination process for the members of that entity. When the Legislature establishes a legislative task force, it is equally specific in omitting appointment authorization language, instead referring to the "selection" of task force members or simply requiring the convening agency to include members from specified representative organizations or industries.² For the Task Force, the Legislature specified that the members would be "selected" and "invited".³

Similarly, the Hawaii Revised Statutes (and the Hawaii State Constitution) consistently uses the term "nomination" as the selection of an individual who is later appointed or elected. The term is used when (1) the selection is made by a different person or entity than the person who appoints; or (2) the selection must be confirmed by another person or body, such as the Senate. Not only is the term "nomination" not used in Act 162, but neither situation is applicable here.

Accordingly, no appointment authority was given to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs for Task Force members, and, thus, Task Force members were not appointed (or nominated) for purposes of the Ethics Code.

- b. Officers or employees. The inclusion of Task Force members in the definition of "employee" also fails because Task Force members are not officers or employees of the State.

² Compare Act 52 (2009) ("There is established an aerospace advisory committee within the office of aerospace development of the department of business, economic development, and tourism for administrative purposes. The committee shall be composed of sixteen members appointed by the governor, as provided in section 26-34, except as otherwise provided in this section."); Act 71 (2009) ("There shall be a policy advisory board on veterans' services within the office of veterans' services. The board shall consist of nine members appointed by the governor as provided in section 26-34."); with Act 125 (2010) (requiring the Chair of the Board of Pharmacy to establish a task force, comprised of certain representatives of businesses and industries, without authorizing appointment of task force members or referencing section 26-34); Act 64 (2009) ("There is established a temporary task force, exempt from section 26-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes, The members of the task force shall be selected by the director of transportation").

³ See Act 162 ("The director of commerce and consumer affairs shall select the initial members of the task force and shall invite . . .").

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Initially, it should be noted that the Task Force members are not employees of the State, because there is no employee-employer relationship between the State and Task Force members.

Regarding whether Task Force members are "officers" of the State, it is black letter law that a "public officer" is one who holds a public office. 63C Am. Jur.2d Public Officers and Employees §9 (2009); Territory v. Wills, 25 Haw. 747 (1921). "State officers are those who receive authority under the laws of a state and perform some of the governmental functions of the state" or perform "some sovereign power for the public's benefit[.]" 63C Am. Jur.2d Public Officers and Employees at § 17, 2. Public officers engage in policy and decision making on behalf of the State and are imbued with the authority of the State. See, e.g., Gibson v. Soper, 5 Haw. 383 (1885). In performing "some sovereign power for the public's benefit", 63C Am. Jur.2d Public Officers and Employees at § 2, the public officer acts on behalf of the State, essentially wearing the "hat" of the State.

This is exemplified by members of boards and commissions. Board and commission members act on behalf of the State, performing adjudicatory, management, and decision making functions. A board or commission may be authorized to make rules, to enact policy, to contract for goods or services, and to take other official action. Members of boards and commissions are vetted by the Governor and the Senate to assure that they are able to perform these sovereign functions on behalf of the State and that they can be impartial in the performance of these functions, because they have public duties that may conflict with private interests. By performing state functions on behalf of the State, members of boards and commissions represent the State to third parties and may bind the State.

By contrast, task force members do not act on behalf of the State. They perform no adjudicatory or decision-making actions, and they do not bind the State. Task force members are selected and invited onto the task force to advocate for their private or professional positions. They are selected to represent the point of view of a particular industry or business and to bring their knowledge and perspective to assist the task force in its information-gathering and recommendation-making functions. Task force members are not required to be impartial, because it is their partiality in representing their industry or business that makes their input valuable. They do not represent the State in actions with third parties, have no authority to make concrete decisions regarding the rights of others, and cannot bind the State. There is no potential for a conflict of interest, because they do not have a public duty with which their private interests can conflict. Thus, because Task Force members do not exercise

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sovereign powers of the State or act on behalf of the State, they do not constitute officers of the State.

Accordingly, the plain language of the definition of "employee" excludes task force members because (a) they are not nominated, appointed, or elected, and (b) they are not "public officers" because they do not exercise any sovereignty of the State or act on its behalf. As Task Force members do not satisfy the two tests for an "employee" under section 84-3, HRS, they are not subject to the Ethics Code.

2. The legislative history of the State Ethics Code indicates that task force members were not intended to be included in the application of the State Ethics Code.

The legislative history of the Ethics Code supports this interpretation.

The Ethics Code was enacted by the Legislature through Act 163, Session Laws of Hawaii 1972. Revisions to the Ethics Code were subsequently made pursuant to the Ethics Code by, among other things, Act 245, Session Laws of Hawaii 1978, in response to the amendments to article XIV of the Hawaii State Constitution by the 1978 Constitutional Convention, which attempted to strengthen, broaden, and protect the system of ethics regulation in Hawaii.

During consideration of the legislation that would become Act 163, the Senate Committee on Public Employment issued Standing Committee Report No. 670-72, which found that laws purporting to regulate the avoidance of conflicts of interest should not be overly broad so that "competent people will be discouraged from serving." Senate Standing Committee Report No. 670-72, *Senate Journal*, 8th Leg., Second Regular Session, April 10, 1973, pp 1034-1037, cited in *Tangen v. State Ethics Commission*, 550 P.2d 1275 (Haw. 1976). Further, the Legislature appears to have intended that the definition of "employee" in chapter 84, HRS, apply to full-time "administrator" employees of the State. Senate Standing Committee Report No. 670-72 at 1035. For example, in Senate Standing Committee Report No. 670-72, the Senate Committee on Public Employment considered the applicability of the Ethics Code to part-time legislators. *Id.* at 1035. In doing so, it distinguished between the situations of part-time legislators and full-time state employees. "The representative function [of a legislator] is not identical to that of a full-time state employee; different things are expected from different positions and the ethics applied must differ accordingly. It is also plain that the ethics applied to a full-time employee may not be fair when applied to a part-time legislator." *Id.* (emphasis in the original).

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Moreover, the Legislature also made clear that the Ethics Code was intended to be a "conflict-of-interest statute", intended to "prohibit conflicts of interest which are most damaging to the standards of good government[.]" *Id.* It also underscores that the inclusion of the reference to boards and commissions within the Ethics Code was intended to reach "regulatory boards and commissions." *Id.* (emphasis added). "It is not necessarily the conflict of competing interests which should be prohibited, but any unethical actions arising out of them." Senate Standing Committee Report No. 670-72 at 1035.

In 1978, the Constitutional Convention convened, and one of the issues it considered was the Ethics Code. The Committee on Ethics, in considering revisions to article XIV, section 5 of the Hawaii State Constitution, relating to Codes of Ethics, initially relayed its belief that the subject of ethics in government is one of great importance:

Because the Constitution organizes the powers and procedures of government, 'governing those who govern,' your Committee believes that it is logical and essential that the Constitution contain some basic guidelines as to the form of ethics regulation that shall apply to those who govern.

Stand. Comm. Rep. No. 26 in *Proceedings of the Constitutional Convention of 1978*, at 565 (1980) (emphasis added).

As described above, the Task Force does not "govern." It performs no regulatory functions, nor do its members have even the potential for a conflict of interest, because the members do not have a public duty that would be subject to competing private interests. Their responsibilities as Task Force members comprise advocating for their private and professional positions with other Task Force members. There cannot be a conflict of interest and, thus, the intent of the Ethics Code, to promote good government by assuring that those who govern are ethical and do not engage in unethical actions, is simply inapplicable to the Task Force.

By contrast, a board or commission (two bodies that are specifically included within the scope of the Ethics Code) is a permanent or semi-permanent entity existing within the Executive Branch of the State's government pursuant to statute. HRS §§ 26-34 – 26-36. In addition, boards and commissions take official action such as interpreting the existing law and applying it to persons including state licensees, entities participating in regulated industries, and government bodies. Both the official public vetting of members and the regulatory function exercised by boards and commissions on behalf of the State give those bodies an entirely different character than that of a task force.

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Because these entities have regulatory functions, a conflict of interest by their members is possible. Accordingly, it is reasonable that these entities would be included within the scope of the Ethics Code. It appears that this was the intent and understanding of the Legislature when enacting the Ethics Code, which mirrors language stemming from the Hawaii State Constitution.

3. The definition of "employee" cannot be expanded through a liberal construction.

The Ethics Commission memorandum relies on language in section 84-1, HRS, which states that the Ethics Code shall be "liberally construed to promote high standards of ethical-conduct in state government." Pursuant to this provision, the Ethics Commission has liberally construed the definition of "employee" under the Ethics Code to include task force members. However, as noted above, the plain language of the definition of "employee" does not include members of task forces who are not nominated, appointed, or elected and who are not public officers or employees because they do not exercise the sovereignty of the State. Because the definition of "employee" is plain and unambiguous, the definition of "employee" is not subject to construction, liberal or otherwise. See *Territory v. Narimatsu*, 41 Haw. 398 (1956) ("Where the language of the statute is plain and unambiguous there is no occasion for construction and the statute must be given effect according to its plain and obvious meaning."). Accordingly, the definition of "employee" cannot be liberally construed to expand its plain meaning to include individuals who are specifically not included within its scope.

Further, even assuming hypothetically that the definition of "employee" were not plain and unambiguous, a liberal construction would not allow the Ethics Commission to add elements that were not in the definition, but would only allow the Ethics Commission to construe existing language. See also *Director, Office of Workers' Compensation Programs, Dept. of Labor v. Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co.*, 514 U.S. 122, 135-36 (1995) ("[The] principle [of liberal construction] may be invoked, in case of ambiguity, to find present rather than absent elements that are essential to operation of a legislative scheme; but it does not add features that will achieve the statutory 'purposes' more effectively."); *Rapanos v. U.S.*, 547 U.S. 715, 752 (2006) ("We have often criticized that last resort of extravagant interpretation").

Moreover, the precept of liberal construction of the Ethics Code was not intended to enlarge the scope of individuals who might be subject to the Ethics Code. The addition of the "liberal construction" portion of the Ethics Code arose from the amendment to article XIV, of the Hawaii State Constitution that added the liberal construction provision in 1978. The Constitutional Convention Committee on Ethics stated that this provision was included "to convey that high standards of ethical conduct are to be expended from public officers and employees, and that

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ethics codes are mandated to promote such standards." Stand. Comm. Rep. No. 26 in *Proceedings of the Constitutional Convention of 1978*, at 566. This same Committee debated the expansion of the scope of the constitutional provisions regarding the ethics code, but only as it related to legislators, judges and justices, lobbyists, and constitutional convention delegates. However, the Committee's understanding of the purpose of the Ethics Code is to establish ethic guidelines "that shall apply to those who govern." *Id.* at 565. Accordingly, the addition of the "liberal construction" provision in article XIV, of the Hawaii State Constitution (which is mirrored in section 84-1, HRS) was not intended to broaden who may be subject to an ethics code, but rather to promote high standards of the Ethics Code through interpretation of the existing standards themselves.

Accordingly, the definition of "employee" under section 84-3, HRS, is not subject to construction. Additionally, by applying a liberal construction of the term "employees" to enlarge the types of individuals subject to the Ethics Code beyond what was intended by the constitutional convention members and the Legislature, the purpose of the Ethics Code is being confounded.

4. Including task force members within the scope of the Ethics Code frustrates the will of the Legislature and the public policy purposes in establishing task forces.

The specific authority to convene a task force or to define its operations is not found in either the Hawaii State Constitution or the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Rather, in the exercise of the Legislature's inherent legislative powers pursuant to article III, section 1 of the Hawaii State Constitution, the Legislature authorizes task forces on an *ad hoc* basis to perform an information-gathering function, specifically to investigate certain policy issues and to make non-binding recommendations to the Legislature for proposed future laws. In establishing task forces, the Legislature brings together stakeholders and those who may come to the Legislature to testify or petition legislators regarding legislation in order to give these individuals and representatives an opportunity to discuss their divergent views and to make recommendations to the Legislature. It is not unusual that these stakeholders may also act as lobbyists for their particular business or interests, because often, it is lobbyists who have the necessary expertise and are in the best position to advocate and make recommendations to the Legislature. During task force meetings, members share information and viewpoints and hammer out compromises on complicated legislative issues. Essentially, these task force meetings serve as a prescreening of legislative committee meetings, saving legislators time by creating recommendations that are intended to address the respective concerns of stakeholders. During the legislative session, members of the public and these and other stakeholders may comment on and request amendments or changes to the task force's

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recommendation. However, the task force's recommendation serves as an important starting point for the Legislature.

By placing restrictions on prospective task force members that were not intended by the Legislature when creating the Ethics Code, prospective task force members will be dissuaded from serving on these important legislative task forces. Under the Ethics Commission's construction, prospective task force members would be prohibited from testifying in their individual capacities but may testify as task force members. Especially in cases where a prospective member represents a minority view on the task force, it may be more beneficial for the potential member to wait until the legislative session to comment on the recommendations of the task force rather than be constrained from testifying in that member's private or professional capacity. Thus, the Ethics Commission's construction discourages rather than encourages cooperation and discussion among potential task force members and thwarts the Legislature's intent in bringing groups together to hash out their differences before the legislative session.

The Ethics Code is intended to support and promote good government. One of the underpinnings of good government is encouraging the public to participate in the public sphere. The Legislature holds public hearings not only to promote public involvement and transparency, but also to obtain critical input regarding legislation before it. By unduly expanding the application of the Ethics Code to task force members who were never intended to be included within its application, this significant source of public input is jeopardized. The result is not only the frustration of the Legislature's intent and will, but also of the public.

As stated by the United States Supreme Court in Rodriguez v. United States, 480 U.S. 522, 526 (1987):

Deciding what competing values will or will not be sacrificed to the achievement of a particular objective is the very essence of legislative choice—and it frustrates rather than effectuates legislative intent simplistically to assume that whatever furthers the statute's primary objective must be the law. Where, as here, the language of a provision is sufficiently clear in its context and not at odds with the legislative history, there is no occasion to examine the additional considerations of policy that may have influenced the lawmakers in their formulation of the statute.

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5. Prior interpretations by the Ethics Commission that support this interpretation are incorrect and should be disregarded.

It should be noted that the Ethics Commission's incorrect interpretation of the term "employee" may be based upon an earlier advisory opinion. See State Ethics Commission Opinion No. 267, August 27, 1976. In that opinion, the Ethics Commission unquestioningly equated a task force with a "state board". As discussed above, a task force is not analogous to a "state board" or commission.

Further, it is unclear from the opinion whether the task force member subject to the opinion actually met the definition of "employee", as the Ethics Commission did not engage in any analysis regarding that issue. While it does appear that the task force may have exercised sovereign power, because it was responsible for "initiating studies and experimental programs", the opinion is otherwise unavailing. Accordingly, any broad reliance by the Ethics Commission on this opinion appears misplaced. Moreover, as discussed above, because a task force is not analogous to a "state board" or commission, the opinion should be disregarded to avoid this type of erroneous reliance in the future. See TIG Ins. Co. v. Kauhane, 101 Hawaii 311, 67 P.3d 810 (Haw. Ct. App. 2003) (stating that "an interpretation by an agency of a statute it administers is not entitled to deference if the interpretation is plainly erroneous and inconsistent with both the letter and intent of the statutory mandate") (internal quotation marks, brackets, and citations omitted).

6. Accordingly, because Task Force members are not subject to the Ethics Code, they are not prohibited by the Ethics Code from testifying or lobbying before the Legislature on any matter in which the Task Force participated or will participate.

As explained above, the Ethics Code does not apply to Task Force members by virtue of their participation on the Task Force because participation on the Task Force does not render them "employees" as defined in section 84-3, HRS. Further, section 84-1, HRS, does not include Task Force members within its scope based on their membership. Accordingly, section 84-14(d), HRS, which prohibits an "employee" from being paid to assist or represent another person or business on a matter in which the employee has participated or in which he or she will participate does not apply to Task Force members.

B. Forbidding the Convening of the Working Group

1. The Working Group members are also not subject to the Ethics Code pursuant to their service on the Working Group.

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As described above, the Ethics Code is not applicable to task force members. Similar to the Task Force, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 134, which requests the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to convene a working group to investigate the creation of a locally focused, Hawaii-based stock exchange, contains no appointment powers. Instead, potential groups from which Working Group members may be drawn are specified, and the Commissioner of Financial Institutions is requested to identify "other participants". Further, the Working Group members are not public officials or employees because, as Working Group members, they are not authorized to exercise any sovereign power. Rather, they are requested to investigate and to develop recommendations for legislation. Accordingly, pursuant to section 84-3, HRS, the Working Group members are not subject to the Ethics Code.

Thus, the Ethics Commission's instruction to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to not convene the Working Group is based on an erroneous interpretation of the Ethics Code.

2. The Ethics Commission has no power or authority to forbid the convening of the Working Group.

It is also beyond the power of the Ethics Commission to forbid the convening of the Working Group based on the potential of a conflict of interest by its proposed members. When the Ethics Commission instituted a ban on convening the Working Group, it appears to have assumed that (a) the mere service on the Working Group by any person who could potentially be a member would constitute a *per se* violation of the Ethics Code and (b) that the Ethics Commission has the power to enjoin or prohibit the convening of the Working Group. Neither is true.

Nothing contained in the Ethics Code authorizes or empowers the Ethics Commission to take the position that presumes and predetermines, without any evidence of violation, that every potential member of the Working Group is automatically guilty of a conflict of interest or other violation of the Ethics Code, such that even to convene the Working Group is prohibited. The Ethics Code, however, does not make or permit this assumption. By contrast, the Ethics Code regulates conduct. Section 84-13, HRS, contains prohibitions on the use of an official's position to secure certain advantages due to the position. Section 84-14, HRS, prohibits an employee from taking official action under circumstances where the employee has a direct financial interest. Nowhere in the Ethics Code is it a violation to simply have competing interests—it is how these competing interests are dealt with that are the subject of the Ethics Code.

Additionally, the Ethics Code does not authorize the Ethics Commission to forbid the convening of a task force on the basis that a violation might occur. Pursuant

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to section 84-31, HRS, the Ethics Commission is authorized to investigate alleged violations of the Ethics Code that have already occurred. The only prospective power given to the Ethics Commission is that it may render advisory opinions as to whether the facts and circumstances of a particular case constitute or will constitute a violation of the Ethics Code. But such opinions, while prospective, do not authorize the Ethics Commission to forbid the creation of the Working Group in speculation that convening the Working Group may create circumstances where a violation of the Ethics Code may occur. See In re Advisory Opinion to the Governor, 732 A.2d 55 (R.I. 1999) (holding that the ethics commission could not institute a prophylactic restriction because a member of the State Assembly could engage in ethically improper conduct, without regard to whether the member actually engages in such conduct). Thus, the Ethics Code does not authorize the Ethics Commission to forbid the convening of the Working Group.

The instant case is similar to Louisiana Milk Commission v. Louisiana Commission on Governmental Ethics, 298 So.2d 285 (La. Ct. App. 1974). In that case, the Louisiana Commission on Governmental Ethics (the "Ethics Commission") investigated the structure and organization of the Louisiana Milk Commission ("Milk Commission"). The Ethics Commission issued an opinion stating that there was an "irreconcilable conflict between legislative expressions". Specifically, the Louisiana law that established the Milk Commission required that its membership include four individuals who engage in businesses that are vitally affected by the Milk Commission's actions (specifically, three milk processors and one dairy farmer), and the Louisiana ethics laws prohibited a member of a board or commission from engaging in the business regulated or controlled by the board or commission on which the member serves. In reconciling these two laws, the Ethics Commission concluded that the ethics laws prevailed and thus prohibited membership on the Milk Commission of persons regulated generally by the Milk Commission. The Ethics Commission's opinion then mandated that the four milk industry representatives either resign from the Milk Commission or divest themselves of any interest in the business regulated generally by the Milk Commission. The Milk Commission and the four milk industry representatives (collectively, the "plaintiffs") subsequently filed a declaratory action and sought injunctive relief.

The Ethics Commission took the position that the Louisiana legislature gave it authority to override legislation which was passed prior to its creation. The Louisiana Appellate Court disagreed. "Nowhere in the act creating the Ethics Commission can any authority be found which gives to the Ethics Commission the power to change any act passed by the legislature. Since there is no authority for the Ethics Commission to change the qualifications of the members of the Milk Commission, it certainly follows that the Ethics Commission was

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attempting to perform an ultra vires act, namely, to usurp the power of the legislature."

The concurrence to this opinion highlighted that the make-up of the Milk Commission's membership was the Legislature's choice. "This does not, per se, create a conflict of interest."

In the instant case, even assuming that the Ethics Commission's interpretation of the definition of "employee" was correct and that the Working Group members were subject to the Ethics Code, it is still beyond the power of the Ethics Commission to forbid the convening of the Working Group. As in the Milk Commission case, the Ethics Commission does not have the power to change or repudiate the qualifications of the Working Group as expressed by the Legislature, nor to resolve any perceived conflict between the Ethics Code and SCR 134 in favor of abolishing the latter. By stepping in and rejecting the Legislature's acts, the Ethics Commission was "attempting to perform an ultra vires act, namely, to usurp the power of the legislature."


CONCLUSION

The Ethics Commission has misinterpreted the plain language of the Ethics Code to include Task Force members in the definition of "employee," thereby incorrectly applying Ethics Code restrictions on paid lobbying on behalf of others to Task Force members. Moreover, the legislative history of the Ethics Code does not support the Ethics Commission's interpretation of the definition of "employee". While the Ethics Commission relies on the provision that the Ethics Code be "liberally construed," this statutory construction guideline is not available to contravene the plain language of the Ethics Code or use it to add in elements that are missing from the Ethics Code to further its interpretation. Additionally, the Ethics Commission is not authorized to forbid the convening of the Working Group, based on the potential of a conflict of interest by its proposed members.

These interpretations and actions by the Ethics Commission violate public policy and usurp the power of the Legislature to convene these types of task forces.

Dear Senator Hee:

I am writing this letter in light of yesterday's article in the Honolulu Civil Beat entitled, "Are Hawaii Lawmakers Protecting A Lobbyist From the Ethics Code?" I am writing not to take issue with the article, as I believe it is a fair article on the subject. However, it appears evident to me that the situation surrounding the above bill requires more extensive elaboration. The problem that S.B. 893 seeks to address is very complex, and thus warrants further discussion.

First of all, let me explain my views regarding the interpretation of Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 84-14(d). This is a provision of the State Ethics Code, set forth in chapter 84, HRS. It is one of the most difficult provisions of the State Ethics Code to interpret, basically because of the way it is written. HRS section 84-14(d) reads as follows:

"(d) No legislator or employee shall assist any person or business or act in a representative capacity for a fee or other compensation to secure passage of a bill or to obtain a contract, claim, or other transaction or proposal in which the legislator or employee has participated or will participate as a legislator or employee, nor shall the legislator or employee assist any person or business or act in a representative capacity for a fee or other compensation on such bill, contract, claim, or other transaction or proposal before the legislature or agency of which the legislator or employee is an employee or legislator."

The second of the two restrictions in HRS section 84-14(d). This provision of the State Ethics Code, HRS section 84-14(d), has two restrictions. I will discuss the second restriction first, as it is more common and clearer to apply. The second restriction is that a legislator or state employee cannot be **paid or compensated** by a person or business to either (1) assist or (2) "act in a representative capacity" for a person or business (i.e., third party) on certain matters described in HRS 84-14(d) that are **before** (i.e., pending before) the board or state agency **the legislator or state employee is a member of.**

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For example, if one is a state employee in the Department of Health, that employee cannot **assist or act in a representative capacity** for a person or business for pay or compensation before the Department of Health, say, on a contract the Department of Health will be awarding.

Meaning of the phrase "act in a representative capacity". The meaning of the phrase "act in a representative capacity" generally means to appear physically before an agency, or contact the agency by phone, letter, or email, etc. The main thrust of the phrase is "personal" representation, where one's representation is obvious to the state agency or board.

Meaning of the term "assist". "Assist" can of course mean to assist in person. It can also mean to "assist" a person or business under circumstances in which the particular state agency or board is **not aware** of the assistance. This is a more common violation of HRS section 84-14(d). For example, The Department of Health was once in the process of awarding a contract. A Department of Health employee knew the details surrounding the award. The state employee went to a business or was solicited by the business, and for pay, told the business what to say in its bid to assure winning the contract. This was an actual case I handled.

In another case, which is public, the University of Hawaii was interested in selling a research vessel. Certain University employees were involved in the sale, and were told that the price of the vessel was a certain amount and would be advertised at that amount, but the University would take a lesser amount in actuality in negotiations, if necessary to sell the vessel. A University employee privy to this information and helping in the sale formed a company with others to buy the research vessel. The company was told by the University employee that the University of Hawaii would accept a lesser amount than the amount it advertised. Again, this was a case I handled.

In many cases, the Commission **does not know that illegal assistance is taking place.** Such assistance is kept quiet because the state employees know it is wrong, generally. In cases of personal representation, the state employee is generally unaware of HRS section 84-14(d), and when told, stops the behavior that violates this law. Such an employee may be subject to enforcement action by the State Ethics Commission ("Commission") if the situation warrants.

Again, these types of cases, where a state employee deals on behalf of a person or business vis-à-vis his or her own agency or board are very common and part and parcel of the daily work of the Commission.

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The first of the two restrictions in HRS section 84-14(d). Cases involving the first restriction in HRS section 84-14(d) are very rare. I was with the Commission for more than 28 years, and saw really only two or three, or a few, such cases. (I served the Commission as its Associate Director from October, 1981, to the end of 1985. On January 1, 1986, I took over as Acting Executive Director. On February 5, I was appointed by the Commission as the new Executive Director (after a public hiring process), and continued as the Executive Director and General Counsel until June of 2010.)

The first restriction in HRS section 84-14(d) states that a legislator or state employee shall not assist for pay or compensation or act in a representative capacity for any person or business on certain matters set forth in HRS section 84-14(d) in which the legislator or state employee "has participated or will participate" as a legislator or state employee.

As I mentioned, this situation is very rare. The Commission has applied this part of HRS section 84-14(d) to a situation where a legislator or employee has participated in a matter described in HRS section 84-14(d). The matter then is transferred for some reason to another state agency or board. Because the legislator or employee participated in the matter that was set forth in HRS section 84-14(d), the legislator or employee cannot accept pay to assist or represent a person or business before the "new" or "second" agency. For example, a state employee reviews an environmental impact statement for the employee's department. The environmental impact statement is then sent to another department for review. The state employee cannot be paid by a business to comment for the business on the environmental impact statement because the state employee "has participated" in the matter.

Again, this situation only came up only a few times in my 28-plus years with the Commission. A further complication with this first restriction was whether the "matter", so to speak, was the same matter that the legislator or employee had participated in. For example, the matter may have changed significantly enough to constitute a different matter.

Commission precedent. A quick search on the Commission's website will show dozens of Commission opinions where HRS section 84-14(d) could have been applied to bar certain conduct, but was not, after a look at the unique circumstances of particular cases.

There are over 800 opinions issued by the Commission since its inception. I have read them all, and when I joined the Commission, I read the over 400 opinions that existed at the time to learn from them, and to see if the law seemed properly applied. If I felt it was not, I made a note of it. But in general, the opinions made

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proper interpretations of the State Ethics Code, in my opinion. I made my own word index of these opinions. After that, I wrote around 100 opinions myself, and reviewed and edited all other opinions while I was the Executive Director.

Application of the State Ethics Code. The State Ethics Code consists of laws passed by the Legislature. Since these are laws, when applying them, under the standard rules of statutory interpretation, one first examines whether a plain reading of the law will address a situation. However, there are many situations where the law is not clear, or not clear in regard to a specific fact situation. In these situations, the Commission must look to the "legislative intent" when the law was passed. The question is, **What "evil" did the Legislature seek to prohibit?**

It has been stated in a legislative committee report that the Commission's prior opinions are to serve as a means of interpreting the ethics laws so that legislators and state employees know how to comply with the law. The Commission's opinions thus serve as a body of "case law" for interpreting the State Ethics Code.

Why the State Ethics Code is difficult to interpret and apply. The State Ethics Code is difficult to apply much of the time. There are reasons for this. First, the State Ethics Code provisions are often written broadly and vaguely, and even poorly at times. At times, one has to practically guess at their meaning—in terms of what the law was meant to prohibit. Some provisions are written simplistically. The provision that prohibits certain gifts, for example (HRS section 84-11), is only **one sentence long**. The gifts laws of other jurisdictions generally go on for pages. Further, the standard in the gifts law is vague and subject to wide interpretation. A gift is prohibited "if it can reasonably be inferred" that the gift is "intended" to influence or reward a state official or employee for official action taken (on not taken). Some Commissioners have taken this provision to bar even any gift beyond an inexpensive cup of coffee. The State Ethics Commission, under the circumstances, has set an arbitrary value for gifts that are acceptable, which is currently around \$25. But should a Department of Health inspector receive anything beyond an inexpensive cup of coffee or other similarly valued refreshment when doing an inspection?

Further, how is the Commission to interpret a gift that also serves a state purpose? For example, Company A wants to fly a state employee to its headquarters in Texas to look at its products. Is this a junket, or a legitimate gift?

In these situations, the Commission must **interpret** the State Ethics Code provisions.

The State's ethics laws are also difficult to interpret because not all state agencies or boards are the same. They can be extraordinarily different. The University of Hawaii

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faculty have "academic freedom" by, at least, tradition. They can sell their own authored \$100 textbooks to their students. On the other hand, state employees are generally barred from engaging in substantial financial transactions with those they oversee. The Legislature itself has state constitutional legislative immunity for carrying out its legislative functions. For this reason, the State Ethics Commission has no conflicts law for legislators that requires recusal from voting when a legislator may have a significant financial interest in a bill.

State boards, commission, and committees are incredibly diverse. Some are regulatory and adjudicatory. Some are **solely advisory, and exercise no sovereign power whatsoever**. Some boards have **tremendous sovereign powers**, like the Land Use Commission or the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii.

Because of the difference in government agencies and the ambiguity in provisions of the State Ethics Code with respect to many fact patterns, applying the State Ethics Code in a meaningful way is often very difficult.

For example, a state employee has a conflict that requires recusal if the employee has a "substantial financial interest in a business". The State Ethics Code does not define "substantial". It is **defined in advisory opinions** as "significant enough in value to influence a state employee". But does this mean 2 shares in Apple computers, 10 shares, 100 shares? **The law therefore must be interpreted by the Commission in an opinion**. A spouse's financial interests and those of a dependent child are considered the financial interests of a state employee. If a dependent child works 10 hours a week at a large company for minimum wage, does the state employee have to be recused from taking action vis-à-vis the company? What if the work is for 20 hours a week, or full time?

TASK FORCES

My comments about task forces are **not** about the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force per se, or any of its members. My comments are about similar task forces in general, using the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force as an example.

Such a task force as the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force is not a typical board. In the law that created the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force, certain businesses were **specifically named** as stakeholders and allowed by law to have a representative represent their interests. There were other stakeholders on this task force. The members of the task force **exercised no sovereign power of the state government whatsoever**. The purpose of the task force was to basically brainstorm and exchange ideas in order to come up with a **proposed bill for the Legislature**. Whatever the proposed bill, it would wend its way through the two

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Houses of the Legislature comprised of 76 legislators, along with anyone who wished to testify or comment on the bill.

In my experience serving the Commission, I do not recall this kind of task-force situation coming up. In my view, such task forces are completely different from regulatory or adjudicatory boards, etc.

Issue: Given HRS section 84-14(d) and the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force (and similar task forces that may or may not exist, or may have existed) what is the proper interpretation and application of HRS section 84-14(d)? This is not a matter of rigidity or flexibility, but simply the **proper application** of the law.

It should be noted that the Commission's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d) will affect all such task forces in the future (assuming no legislative action) and similar task forces that may have existed in the past. We are not omniscient. We do not know what the various branches of government have created. Under the State Ethics Code, any similar **working group** even if informally created, could be subject to the Commission's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d). In HRS section 84-3, the State Ethics Code defines a state agency to include "independent commissions and other **establishments** of the state government". [Emphasis added.] If a state official establishes a working group to address an issue, is this an establishment of state government and task force? Even the term "employee" in HRS section 84-3 is broad, and includes members of "boards, commissions, and committees". Nothing is said in the law about the **nature** of such committees. Would they include working groups or similar task forces comprised of stakeholders?

Consideration of Mr. Kondo's inconsistent interpretation of HRS section 84-14, the conflicts of interest law, to the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force.

Mr. Kondo applied the conflicts of interests law, **HRS section 84-14**, in an arbitrary and inconsistent way. This is because Mr. Kondo did not apply, literally or otherwise, **HRS section 84-14(a)** to members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force that were on the task force to represent their companies, mentioned in the task force law. Normally, **HRS section 84-14(a)** bars a state employee from taking action that **directly affects** his or her own company:

§84-14 Conflicts of Interests. (a) No employee shall take any official action directly affecting:

- (1) A business or other undertaking in which the employee has a substantial financial interest; or
- (2) A private undertaking in which the employee is engaged as legal counsel, advisor, consultant, representative, or other agency capacity.

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A department head who is unable to disqualify the department head's self on any matter described in paragraphs (1) and (2) will not be in violation of this subsection if the department head has complied with the disclosure requirements of section 84-17.

A person whose position on a board, commission, or committee is mandated by statute, resolution, or executive order to have particular qualifications shall only be prohibited from taking official action that directly and specifically affects a business or undertaking in which the person has a substantial financial interest; provided that the substantial financial interest is related to the member's particular qualifications.

[Emphasis added.] The members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force took action that **directly affected** the companies they represented, per HRS section 84-14(a), as they were on the task force to represent the interests of their companies.

Mr. Kondo could not have availed himself of the exception in the last paragraph of this section, **HRS section 84-14(a)**, since the task force members **did** take action that **directly and specifically** affected the companies they were there to represent.

Nothing in the law that created the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force exempted this task force from **HRS section 84-14(a)**, yet, Mr. Kondo decided that it should **not** apply. This was an interpretation he apparently made, as he understood that the Legislature **intended** the members of the task force to represent their companies.

The inconsistency thus in later applying HRS section 84-14(d) is as follows: Members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force could, **as state officials**, take action that directly benefitted their companies. Their presence on the task force gave them more stature and ability to benefit their companies. This was apparently not a problem for Mr. Kondo. (And should have not been a problem, as this was the **legislative purpose** of assembling stakeholders for this task force.

Yet, Mr. Kondo applied HRS section 84-14(d) to bar these same task force members **as private individuals** from representing their companies (and receiving compensation) before the Legislature. It is obvious that the Legislature wanted the input of these individuals **as task force members and as members of the public**, whether lobbyists or not, paid or not. The Legislature was interested in the expertise these task force members had. Barring these task force members from speaking as citizens or representatives of companies deprived the Legislature of exactly what it wanted. It would be impossible, in my view, to see it any other way.

Mr. Kondo refers to lobbying or any communication for pay (say as an employee of a company) by Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force members as **"influence-peddling"**, in violation of HRS section 84-14(d) **by these individuals in a private capacity representing the very companies they represented as task force members.**

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This makes no sense, and is inconsistent with Mr. Kondo's non-application of **HRS section 84-14(a)**, requiring recusal of employees taking action **directly affecting** their companies.

HRS section 84-14(d) was enacted to prohibit **influence-peddling**. Thus, the obvious legislative intent is to bar state employees from **unjustly enriching** themselves by assisting or representing persons or businesses for pay contrary to their state duties. Further, the law also bars businesses from being able to hire employees to give themselves an unfair advantage in dealing with the State. That does not exist here as to the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force in the least.

All boards are not the same. Mr. Kondo has equated a task force created with numerous stakeholders to basically brainstorm (with **no binding power or sovereign power of the State**) as the same as regulatory boards, adjudicatory boards, boards with the power to issue permits, and so forth—in short, boards with **significant binding power, as well as a part of the sovereign power of the State.**

The Legislature did not obviously intend that HRS section 84-14(d) apply to such task forces.

Interference with Free Speech, the Right to Petition Government, Chilling Effect. Mr. Kondo's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d) takes from task force members their constitutional rights such as Free Speech, the Right to Petition Government, and places a chilling effect on all past and potential task force members if no legislative action is taken to fix the misapplication of the law.

Interference with ability of Legislature to obtain task force members with expertise. Mr. Kondo's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d) also impedes the Legislature's ability (as well as the other branches of government) to acquire task force members with expertise.

Effect of Act 208. I realize that Act 208 took care of task force problems for the future for all branches of state government. However, such a bill would have been unnecessary had HRS section 84-14(d) been properly applied, Commission precedent examined, and Mr. Kondo being open-minded to the negative feedback he received.

Mistakes by Executive Directors and the State Ethics Commission. Executive Directors and the State Ethics Commission **are not infallible**. While I was the Executive Director I made mistakes, and so did the Commission. However, I believe that I and the Commission were open-minded and willing to consider what we were being told. Thus, we corrected mistakes in a matter-of-fact way, but in other cases

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believed we had made the right decision. The goal of the Commission is not to have its way, but to interpret the law correctly. Being wrong simply leads to problems down the road. Thus, in difficult cases, there should be no rush to judgment.

Improper accusation: the claim that the law is being changed for one person. To say that the Legislature is changing the law for one person is essentially accusing the entire Legislature of corruption. It is saying that the Legislature will allow **all future** task force members and **all past** task force members (there could be hundreds) to violate the State Ethics Code just to save one "friend". This is patently absurd.

The need for retroactivity because of the Commission's statute of limitations. Act 208 should have been made retroactive, and this retroactivity should take into account the Commission's six-year statute of limitations. While Mr. Kondo contends only one person is affected by S.B. No. 893, this is not true. There could be many task forces that have been created by the various branches of state government, or working groups that might be considered task forces.

Mr. Kondo contends that **all** the members of the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force but one complied with his directive. **This is impossible for him to say.** HRS section 84-14(d) bars "assistance" for pay, and this can take place without the Commission's knowledge. A task force member can go back to his or her company and brief them on how to testify on bills, or how to lobby on a matter. "Assistance-type" violations of HRS section 84-14(d) are basically learned of by the Commission by accident or through whistleblowers. Mr. Kondo cannot know how many task force members or work group members may have existed and are still subject to HRS section 84-14(d). Such task force members could unknowingly violate the law, as interpreted by Mr. Kondo.

There would be nothing improper with setting a retroactive date that ensures that former task force members are not in jeopardy. This retroactive date could be January 1, 2004, since once the Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force met, its members could be subject to charges by the Commission or charges brought by members of the public, or legislators who believe Mr. Kondo's interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d) is correct.

To my mind, there would be nothing improper with setting the retroactive date to January 1, 2000, to give everyone piece of mind.

Slippery slope. The notion that changing the law in this situation would lead to a slippery slope is absurd. The notion that anyone who is charged by the Commission will have the law changed by a willing Legislature is absurd. The Legislature has

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been and will be monitored for what it does with legislation. The bills are public. This is a special case, where the Legislature just happens to be right.

While I was the executive director, various legislators would on occasion attempt to weaken the law, in my view. In such cases, I spoke up, as did the Commission. But one has to, at the same time, consider that one might be wrong and the Legislature might be right (legislators at times revised my bills and were right to do so), and there is nothing per se improper with the Legislature amending the ethics code if it believes it goes too far, or the interpretations of the law are overzealous.

Mr. Kondo's contention that changing the law will weaken the authority of the Commission is not true. The fact that the Legislature is considering S.B. No. 893 will not weaken the authority of the Commission. From time to time, there will be legitimate differences of opinion.

Again, the Commission nor Mr. Kondo is infallible. This situation is an exceptional situation.

Rather, what weakens the Commission is poor interpretations of the law. The Commission loses credibility and stature. For this reason, the Commission must be sensitive when people disagree with it. This does not mean caving in—it means having an open mind. It also means reviewing facts and precedent.

But, to think there will not be legitimate differences of opinion is delusional.

Mr. Kondo's analogy to marijuana is illogical. Mr. Kondo contended in his oral testimony on February 5 that passing S.B. No. 893 would be like someone arrested or convicted for the possession of "pot" to go to the Legislature and have the matter overturned. The analogy is illogical because Mr. Kondo still assumes that he is correct about his interpretation of HRS section 84-14(d). It is a circular argument. The Legislature simply disagrees with Mr. Kondo.

This is not going to lead to every criminal or violator of law running to the Legislature for help. Such an assertion is absurd.

Asserting that S.B. No. 893 will interfere with "transparency" is totally devoid of logic. HRS section 84-14(d) prohibits certain conduct. This has nothing to do with "transparency".

Summary. There is nothing improper with providing retroactivity to correct a poor interpretation of the State Ethics Code. One has to consider the tremendous damage a wrong interpretation can do, the lives affected, the possible legal and other costs,

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the individuals still in jeopardy, the damage to reputation, the possible loss of employment for being seen as a violator of the law or bringing bad publicity to one's employer, and the waste of time resulting from an inability to be simply open-minded and fair-minded.

Dear Senator Hee:

We greatly appreciate the opportunity to explore an alternative for both the State of Hawai'i and Turtle Bay Resort, LLC ("Developer") to voluntarily negotiate in good faith a solution that provides the State the ability to keep a portion of the undeveloped lands at the Turtle Bay Resort ("Resort") for public benefit. We have been apprised that you may be open to holding the referenced measure pending while the Developer proceeds in good faith to negotiate with the State in regard to the acquisition by the State of certain lands within the Resort.

The Developer is open to good faith negotiations with the State provided that these negotiations take place immediately and that negotiations terminate no later than November 30, 2013, at which time the State and Developer will submit to the Legislature for its consideration a report as to the result of the negotiations. If the parties are able to negotiate terms, area, and price, then SB 894 could be amended to effectuate the terms of the negotiated settlement. If the parties are not able to negotiate a settlement, then I suspect SB 894 might proceed through the legislative process in the next session.


We believe this alternative provides a reasonable time for the State and the Developer to engage in good faith negotiations to reach a reasonable solution that benefits not only the immediate community, but the State as a whole. However, this alternative also does not jeopardize our ability to proceed concurrently with the Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement and subdivision with respect to our proposed development alternative or to protect our interests with respect to eminent domain.

It is our desire to be good stewards of the land and find a way to reach a solution. We appreciate your willingness to be open to further discussions.

RE: Senate Bill 1361, RELATING TO BANYAN DRIVE

Aloha, Chair Solomon, Chair Espero and Committee Members:

Thank you for this opportunity to express our deep concern with the deteriorating situation on Banyan Drive in general, and particularly at the Naniloa Volcanoes Resort. As you know, Banyan Drive has traditionally been the hub of East Hawai'i's resort activity, which makes it critically important to the economy of the Island of Hawai'i. When properly managed, these properties are an economic engine and a job creator that provides benefits to our working families. The state Department of Land and Natural Resources oversees this activity as the lessor of the resort properties along Banyan Drive, which means DLNR is an important participant in the East Hawai'i business community.

This arrangement provides significant benefits to the state in the form of millions of dollars in ground lease rents that DLNR collects from the Banyan Drive tenants, but DLNR also has a responsibility to the larger community on our island. At a minimum, DLNR has an obligation to actively manage the Banyan Drive leases to assure those properties are properly maintained and operated by tenants who comply with the terms of their leases.

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Hawai'i Outdoor Tours Inc. has now held the lease for the Naniloa Volcanoes Resort and the Banyan Drive golf course for seven years, and the result has been a disaster for East Hawai'i. The Kilauea Tower of the resort has been gutted and empty for years, the grounds of the property are a shambles, and the golf course clubhouse is closed. Valuable retail space on the grounds of the resort that could be contributing to the local economy and generating jobs is vacant and closed. Despite the lessee's well-publicized promises to restore the area as a top-quality destination, a lounge adjoining the hotel is closed, and the pool on the Banyan Drive side of the property has been drained. Only a fraction of the rooms in the Naniloa have actually been renovated. Since much of the hotel is empty, the facility operates with minimal staff.


Enormous effort has been invested in bringing direct flights to Hilo to boost the East Hawai'i economy, yet the lingering problems at the Naniloa jeopardize all of the progress that has been made. If we lose those direct flights, the damage done by the failure at the Naniloa threatens to ripple out into the surrounding business community. Jobs are being lost, businesses are suffering, the state is collecting less transient accommodation and excise tax revenue than it should, and potential lease rent revenue is being lost to the state because of the neglect of this single, strategically placed resort.

Now that Hawai'i Outdoor Tours Inc. has filed for protection in bankruptcy court, it is absolutely clear the company does not have the resources required to restore the Naniloa. Under the "breach" provisions of the Naniloa lease, DLNR now has the right to terminate this lease. The lease specifically allows for termination "if the Lessee shall become bankrupt..." We believe DLNR also has the right to terminate under a separate Naniloa lease provision requiring the lessee to "keep, repair, and maintain all buildings and improvements...on the premises in good order, condition and repair, reasonable wear and tear excepted."

Many of our East Hawai'i residents are traveling 100 miles to work at jobs in Kona and the Kohala Coast resort areas, while the once-beautiful Naniloa property sits mostly empty and deteriorating in Hilo. Hawai'i Outdoor Tours has been given ample opportunity over the last seven years to restore the property, and we cannot continue to stand by while a single hotel operator holds an entire community hostage. For the good of our working families and the business climate in all of East Hawai'i, we urge this committee and the DLNR to take whatever steps are necessary to terminate this lease.

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 97, S.D. 2:

Senator Ige moved that S.B. No. 97, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“What this bill does is expand the scope of the conveyance tax, and part of it is vague in its application and also the rates that actually apply. The floor amendment, I think, is a positive amendment in that it does say that a corporation, partnership, or LLC are not subject to the tax if they are owned for at least three years, but the tax burden is still going to fall heaviest on small local businesses. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 97, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 563, S.D. 3:

Senator Taniguchi moved that S.B. No. 563, S.D. 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“You know, the original intent of the bill, as part of the recommendations from the Senate Special Committee on Accountability last year, was to provide for more oversight of the university and particularly the regents. It was also to make clear a differentiation between the council and the governor’s responsibilities.

“The changes that were made here takes out the purpose clause originally and also takes out the ability for the Legislature, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House to have input and puts the council, at least temporarily, within the Office of the Governor, and it’s not clear what’s going to happen in the future.

“So, I’ll support the bill with the changes, but with the aforementioned recommendations. Thank you.”

At 11:56 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:57 a.m.

Senator Slom rose to make the following remarks:

“I was just informed that some of the information I had was incorrect, and the legislative ability to make presentations is still back in the bill. So, I thank my colleague for that information, and I will now vote straight up on the bill. Thank you very much.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 563, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 2:

Senator Ige moved that S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“More and more we are seeing that Form 1099, non-compensation filings, are required under various legislative acts. While I, as an employer, comply with that and file those 1099 forms, this particular measure has severe penalties for any failure to file, lack of information, or information that is not

correct, even if it is not maliciously so. Based on that, I am going to be voting ‘no.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1289, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 215, S.D. 3:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that S.B. No. 215, S.D. 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Slom.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I support my colleague’s desire for the Wahiawa Main Street project and will work to support it in every way that I can, but this does *not* include a new development agency created in the image of the PLDC.

“I supported the 21st-century schools bill, including the public-private partnership, because it was carefully crafted, limited in scope, true to its original intent, and aimed at one of our most pressing needs.

“For SB215, there has been an outpouring of opposition from my constituents. They are concerned about the PLDC-like nature of this bill. I acknowledge the good work done by my colleagues to improve the bill in the last couple of weeks, but my constituents overwhelmingly do not trust it.

“It was a ‘gut and replace’ bill, with PLDC-like exemptions from county rules that were glossed over at first, then addressed up to the last minute only as more attention was focused on it.

“There are consequences to losing the public’s trust on such issues. One of those consequences is lingering suspicion of new public-private partnership agencies. The new agency is not needed to support the specific projects and is seen as a newly open door to further potential abuses.

“Because of opposition from my constituents, I will vote ‘no’ on this bill. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I rise conflicted about this bill, if that’s permitted. I am going to oppose this bill. Senators, I ask you to cast your minds back to your freshman year (and I realize for many of you that’s going to be a lengthy cast). You know, going through the last few days and voting on over 350 bills, it’s been a real learning experience, and I am sure you can remember – and probably still do wrestle with – many of these bills. But I think many of you have become accustomed to this decision making process and have found lines that you can draw and also understand what’s coming in the second half of session better than we as freshmen can.

“I want to echo my colleague’s appreciation for the floor amendments and the other work that was done by many of you that share the concerns that we have about what was originally in this bill and in the Public Land Development Corporation, and the floor amendment does make it better.

“But I still am going to vote ‘no’ because I share my colleague’s concerns about the genesis of this bill and the public’s suspicion that has surrounded how it came forward, and some of the last-minute changes being made to it, and then what’s going to happen in the second half of session and whether we’re still going to have to monitor this so closely – every sentence – before it comes out of the conference

committee at the end to make sure that the intent doesn't change again.

"So my preference is as a body we would not move this forward, although I do support the individual projects in it, and I commend the senator from Wahiawa for being such a strong supporter for economic development in his district. But I think it is time that we move on to other issues in front of the Senate, so I will be opposing it. Thank you."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"With aloha to the previous speakers, this is a learning moment, members. This is where we do take the public into consideration; the full measure of their opposition as it relates to the legislation at hand means that we have heard them. We've heard them loud and clear. We also want to hearken back and echo the original mission, and this actually brings it to a place that provides for three projects. Period. I want to thank the author for taking it down to that particular level because this is just exactly what, in my opinion, the public wants: they want us to take their opinions into consideration and then decide.

"So, it is at this particular point that we have come to this decision, and I would ask humbly that all of the members vote in support of the amendment. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose on a point of inquiry and said:

"Will you ask the senator from the Big Island or the senator from Kailua what specifically is imperfect about this bill, and let me explain.

"It sounds like the senator from the Big Island is concerned because of constituency communications that he has received. I'm not sure if that means the constituency concerns are accurate or it's simply because he received them.

"With respect to the senator from Kailua, the concern that I have is – and the reason for the point of inquiry is – there's evidently some concern about the unknown in the future. Well, that could apply to all bills and, in fact, this issue may pop up yet again in a different iteration of which a title is appropriate.

"So, rather than stand up in opposition on a broadly-worded explanation, what is it specifically about this bill that is objectionable, so that we can ascertain the information prior to casting our vote. Thank you."

At 12:05 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:08 p.m.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"We are still in discussion. The inquiry was made; is there anyone wishing to address the inquiry? I see not."

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"When the minority caucus leader comments, 'Let's get to the other business at hand,' we have three simple ways of dealing with the greatest problem that faces this state, which is balancing our budget with revenue shortfalls: We can raise taxes, which nobody wants; we can cut employees but we've cut over 3,000 jobs from the state payroll since 2009; or we can stimulate economy. This is one of the few remaining vehicles that is attempting to stimulate our economy. In light of prior testimony and public outcry about broad exemptions for potentially unlimited development, this is a way to look at a more limited, private-public partnership and an opportunity to stimulate economy so we're not here talking about raising taxes, and we're not here talking about cutting more jobs.

Because if we do cut those jobs today, it will impact our ability to process permits that will foster the economic recovery that each and every one of us would like to see happen.

"And so, I think we need to have vehicles in place so that when my esteemed colleague across the way stands up and tells me what day of the session it is and we've not done anything, I can stand and say we've done something. So, I will be supporting the bill. Thank you."

Senator Kahele rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I agree with all the previous speakers, with the exception of those that oppose the bill, and stand firmly behind the senator from Kāne'ohe who eloquently stated his position. In response to the many emails that I also received in reference to S.B. No. 215, inferring that it was similar to the Public Land Development Corporation bill, I responded to one – because in general most of them were the same – and asked for a specific response as to what was wrong with S.B. No. 215, specifically to any sentence or any part of the bill and paragraph, and I did not receive a response.

"So, before going any further with this – linking it up with the Public Land Development Corporation – colleagues, I ask for your support to be courageous as we move forward to do something to help the economy. I commend the senator from Wahiawa for all of the heat, if you will, that he took with that particular bill to come forward with something, a resolution, to help the economy of the State of Hawai'i and in accommodating the concerns of the Hawai'i County Council, my island, who was in opposition to the Public Land Development Corporation. I would encourage those officials on the neighbor islands that came forward and opposed that particular bill to stand up and say that this is a bill that will move the economy forward and it is a solution towards resolving that end. So, again, I commend the senator from Wahiawa for coming up with a solution rather than being in opposition to everything else. Thank you."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President, and I want to thank all my colleagues who spoke to support the measure. You know, this body has been very patient and accepting of the Water and Land Committee and the Economic Development Committee in coming up with a solution and at the same time addressing the concerns of the Public Land Development Corporation. And as a body, we said, 'Okay, we're going to respond.' And so, we will soon see 'RIP' on the PLDC. But what's our option? What's our opportunity?

"This is an opportunity to show that we're not giving up on Hawai'i. I really believe in Hawai'i's potential. I don't really want to be in a position where we are going to be raising taxes or fees; our middle class is taking so much of a hit. Every department comes in and they say, 'You know, we don't have the staff.' We have so many programs that just don't have the revenue it needs, especially in DLNR, DOE, University of Hawai'i – every place we are asking the departments to be more creative.

"We had a joint hearing and every development corporation or authority came forward and said that they needed to be here because they facilitated economic development, and that our current laws don't really allow them the flexibility so they had to be created separately. No one wants to do the hard work here of restructuring government, so instead of restructuring, we've created these exemptions. It's easy to say, 'No, I'm opposed.' But what's your solution for economic development?

"We've talked about it for years when I was in high school: We're going to reverse the brain drain; we're going to diversify the economy. You know, I had a conversation this morning with the majority leader. His son is the same age as I am, his grandkids are in college, and there's no opportunity for them to come home. How serious are we really going to be about improving our economy and creating the opportunities for the future?"

"So what we are doing here is we are limiting the scope. I mean, I've worked with many of you to try and limit the scope so that we can show what we're really talking about. Unfortunately, we can't explain everything in theory or in the abstract, so what we have here is a bill that sets three specific projects; and our committee has worked very hard in working with the counties to get them on board and get their support. You don't see one county saying this is against home rule; that was a huge issue, especially as you mentioned in your opening day remarks. There are a number of us from the counties that support the counties. The counties see this as a vehicle that they need so that they can get some things moving.

"You know, if we didn't have this vacuum for creating this public-private partnership you wouldn't see things like the renaissance program. You wouldn't see things like harbors and parks authority. You wouldn't see things like twenty-first century schools. The question was asked, 'Why can't we do it already?' Because we can't, so we have to create. This body should be the architects of the future and we are creating something to allow this opportunity.

"So, I thank everyone for their patience. I'm really excited to show Hawai'i what we are talking about in the success of these three projects so that we can talk about expanding it later.

"Again, the changes, they don't include one exemption – not one exemption. We're talking about three limited projects. We're talking about a five-year sunset. So, if the worst fears occur, you know, it's going to be sunsetted anyway. It allows this body to revisit the legislation and say, 'Is this something that we want to expand?' You know, we've tried to address every concern, and so I really do wish that my colleagues who are standing up in opposition reconsider their position because we have to give Hawai'i a chance. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"I would just like to respond to some of the remarks. I think there is an implication that those of us who are concerned about fast-tracking development oppose economic development. That's not true.

"I support a diversified economy in Hawai'i. Becoming too reliant on development of land for our economy eventually is going to come to an end because we live on an island and we have only so much area in which to develop. I want to take a look at other areas of economic development.

"I'm sure my colleague who spoke out against this bill feels the same. I think it's ironic because he has, to my understanding, started several stores on the Big Island and has something like over 100, or close to 150, employees. That's economic development. I know I haven't done what he's done and I doubt very many other people in this room have as well. So, I think it's wrong to say that because we raise these concerns that we are opposed to economic development.

"I have two daughters. One is about to graduate from college and one is going to be graduating from high school soon, and I am concerned about their future and their ability to come back to this state. I think that there are many other ways we can work together.

"As far as the concerns in saying that this bill is going to sunset, you can ask my colleague in Hawai'i Kai how many bills where we've done things that are supposed to sunset that later on don't. So, raising concerns about what is the intent down the line are valid concerns when voting on this bill. Thank you for your time."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"Thank you, I just would like to make one correction in what was stated: this bill does not fast-track the development. That's very incorrect. I'm not sure where that's coming from. I think that's part of creating the hysteria that we really don't need in providing solutions. You know, instead of drawing upon people's worst fears, we should be figuring out how we can achieve their hopes, and giving correct information is what's really important. So, thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I just want to speak in strong support; I am going to be submitting some written comments for the Journal. However, in response to remarks that were made by the previous speaker in terms of not wanting to be considered being anti-development, well, Madam President, I'm really tired of people thinking that I am anti- the environment. With my colleague from Kāne'ohe, we were in the Kalama Valley struggle. At Sand Island, many were arrested. So many of the environmental laws we have on the books – we were responsible.

"We are on the verge of bankruptcy! 2016. That's what we're talking about here. I've done everything that I can possibly think of for revenue generation; they call me the gaming queen and I don't even gamble. Why? Why? Because I want to create a future.

"I believe in 'Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Āina i ka Pono'. When the Hawaiians, na po'e kahiko, took care of this 'āina, when we were a kingdom, we supported an economy of over one million people. You know what we raised? Kalo, mai'a, 'uala. The ocean was our source of protein. We can't even do this today! This state can't even feed themselves with a population of 1.3 million!

"This is the proud heritage that I represent, as a native Hawaiian. This is one of the reasons why I came back to this body – to help. To kōkua. But now I am getting blasted all over Twitter and social internet – calling me the maligned senator, this and that – because of my strong positions and my commitment to get this economy moving. I find it very offensive, Madam President. Accusing us of gutting and replacing and so on – six bills were gutted and replaced just within this legislative session; it's a process.

"Although I appreciate leadership's challenge – hey, I didn't create it: 120 days, 2,300 bills, referrals that involve now three or four committees. Every issue we discuss, we have three committee chairmen all trying to make a decision, all representing from different committee perspectives – that's how tough it is when you are trying to deal with economic recovery. Look how long it has taken us to get agriculture moving – over 30 years and we haven't achieved our goals.

"Our mo'opuna, our children: what is their future? These are my concerns within my na'au and my pūwai. I want them to have more opportunities. I graduated from the university; I never, ever thought that I could not get a job in Hawai'i. Not once did that come to my mind. But that is where we are at now.

"How many of you hear that from your 'ohana? 'Gee, I wish I could get a job, but I cannot; I gotta move to San Francisco.'

Look how many billions of dollars we're spending in higher education and our job market does not provide enough job diversification. Where are our graduates going? New York, San Francisco, all over the world – states other than ourselves are benefitting from our hard-earned money that we've invested in our citizens.

"This is what this bill is all about! This is what this Legislature is all about! Not sitting meekly by. Well, you know what? That's why you're elected to sit in this chair. Have some na'au! Have some strength! Be proud of who we are! Make this state the most beautiful it can be!

"We were once the most beautiful city in the Pacific. Have you walked downtown lately? Last night I did; I was walking over the homeless as I was leaving. Everything smells like what the Hawaiians call 'pu'u mimi' – and for those of you that don't understand it, that's urine – all over the place. Is that what we want? We can't even afford to clean our streets.

"My daughter comes to me, 'Hey mama, did you know that our airport is one of the most vulnerable for contagious diseases?' The fourth in the country – is that what we want? Well, I don't want it, Madam President. I want this to be the place that we all admire, and that's the legacy we represent in this building. Thank you very much."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to make the following inquiry:

"Madam President, I would like to find out – from the question that was posed on the point of inquiry – if there is a response.

The Chair responded:

"I asked for that; there was no response at the time."

Senator Ruderman rose in response and said:

"Briefly, without wasting any of my colleagues' time: If anyone's interested in my reasons for opposition, I'd refer them to my previous comments in which I specifically and clearly stated my opposition to it. Thank you very much."

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"It's been a very interesting discussion, although, you know, it pains me greatly to see disarray among my colleagues of the majority since the minority is always 100 percent when it comes to this body.

"Look, I opposed Act 55 and the PLDC, and we repealed it. I asked for changes to be made from the Chairman of Economic Development and he kept his word. I hate 'gut-and-replace' bills, and I don't care if there are one of them or six of them or ten of them – we should do without them. But they're here, and it's a matter of majority policy.

"But the point is I've had a lot of discussions with my constituents, too, and many of them are very concerned because they think it's an end run around the old PLDC and they think this could happen, that could happen, but they're not very specific. They're not very specific as to what really is the opposition other than it reminds them of PLDC and fast-tracking, which the chairman of the committee just said, really, this bill doesn't do that.

"Do I have problems with the bill? Yeah, I do. As the senator from Hawai'i Kai and Waimānalo said, I've been a strong critic of the sunset process because we tell people that we are going to sunset something, it comes up to that year, and we don't do it. But wait a minute – that's the responsibility of the people that elect us. I really wish that the public in Hawai'i would spend more time with the Legislature and with lawmaking than they do with *Dancing with the Stars* or even

with *Aerosmith*. I think it's abysmal the lack of economic education and the fact that we're not moving in this community.

"Now, I will take the intent and the words of my colleagues at face value; I will trust them. Of course, when they said that they don't support tax increases, that means that 24 of you will have to go change your votes from the other day, Tuesday. But we are faced with crises, as the budget director said; I think he said 2017, we'll be bankrupt.

"As I've said many times on this floor, I'm bullish about the future of Hawai'i. I'm bullish about the people that we have and the opportunities. But we've missed opportunities, and instead we do the same old thing. So, here some of my colleagues have tried to innovatively and creatively try to find a way around this, to try to open up new avenues of economic development. And while, again, I look at some of these proposals with a jaundiced eye, I'm willing to look at them and try because there is nothing else that we have done that is even remotely positive for jobs, the environment, wages, and so forth.

"We all have to make sure, however, that the promises that are made, the statements that are promised, are fulfilled. That's our job as senators, and that's the public's job – those that elect us, and pay for everything that we do. But if we are now afraid to take a chance and do anything, then we make a self-fulfilling prophecy for our state and for our future, and that prophecy is we become total wards of the federal government, which has its own problems, or we kick the can down the road or we give up any opportunity whatsoever.

"I said in Ways and Means the thing I don't like about this bill, also, is the fact that we continue to use the term 'authority' – the public-private 'authority'. I don't like that. I bristle every time I hear that because I've never seen an authority that's done a good job.

"But semantics aside, we do need economic opportunity and economic development in this state, and it doesn't have to be mutually exclusive with protecting the environment. In fact, it cannot be because if we continue to harm the environment, then we all lose. But we have an opportunity to do things and I would suggest, once again, every time we have people that have been successful in our community, the real job creators, when they come in and testify, they tell us what we need to do – no more taxes, no more regulations that harm businesses, no more fees, no more cost to them – we don't listen. We have to start listening.

"So, if we truly are to have a partnership, I will weigh in on that, but I will continue to be eternally vigilant and I ask my colleagues to do the same thing. Thank you, Madam President; now maybe you can get on with the vote."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“You know, we spend a lot of time talking about and debating the use of outside attorneys. In fact, the Legislature and the governmental agencies seem to revolve around how many outside attorneys and how much can we pay them. In this case here, the Hawaiian Homes Commission wants the ability to continue to be able to hire outside counsel. The attorney general testified against this. As I said, we’ve had numerous discussions as to why this is not a good policy, why it is extremely costly, and what the lack of benefits are. However, if the Hawaiian Homes Commission wanted to hire the attorneys and pay for them out of their budget, I wouldn’t be objecting. But instead, they don’t; they want the taxpayers again to pick up the cost of this, and that is why I oppose it. Thank you.”

As a working mother, she has offered her service to help Stand Down events on Maui and here on O'ahu assisting women veterans and their families. Her selection to the Hawai'i Women Veterans Military Task Force as an original cadre member proved her ability to go above and beyond to support veterans and their families. She has been a wonderful member of the Hawai'i Women Veterans Military Task Force, and she created a webpage so that interested veterans could find out more about programs and services offered to the 14,000 women veterans that are here in Hawai'i. Additionally, she and her fellow task force members published a legislative report to highlight the needs of our women veterans and a plan to address them.

"She certainly represents the very best of this generation of veterans, and I believe, and my colleagues from Maui join me in believing, that she is most deserving of this appointment, and I ask all my colleagues to join with us in voting in support of Chelsea Ann Fernandez. Mahalo."

helping to educate thousands on rape prevention and self-defense. As a result of this program, she was honored nationally as Officer of the Year by the International Association of Women Police Officers. Leaving HPD in 1982, Annelle began protecting citizens in a different way, serving as Governor Ariyoshi's State Coordinator of the Office of Affirmative Action, implementing Civil Rights laws and the Affirmative Action for UH Hawai'i, Department of Education and the State's Executive Departments. In 1988, I was fortunate to serve with Annelle, who had been elected to the House of Representatives. During the eight years she served in the House, she was in leadership positions first as Vice Chair of both Housing and Judiciary Committees before being appointed as the body's Majority Floor Leader.

"Annelle Amaral has had years of public safety and government experience and has been an active member of her community. Throughout her career she has continued to advocate for crime victims and has been a strong advocate for women. She has been temporarily appointed to the Hawai'i Paroling Board as a board member and has already begun to prove her ability to be fair, firm, and consistent in her decisions. Her diverse background clearly informs her ability to make thoughtful, well-reasoned decisions. Her strong convictions, extensive experience, and considerable street smarts make her well-qualified for this position and I know she will be an exemplary member.

"Colleagues, I ask you to join me in voting to confirm Annelle Amaral to the Hawai'i Paroling Authority."

Through her activities, she's integrated cultural practices into laws and regulations for our Hawai'i. Thank you so much, Rocky; mahalo.

"Pi'ilani Ka'awaloa practices and teaches traditional Hawaiian methods of fishing and farming, and currently serves as a community cultural liaison for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration regarding marine life and cultural Hawaiian practices. Mahalo nui loa.

"From Ni'ihau, Keith Robinson: He's a veteran, an environmental officer at Ni'ihau Ranch, and owner of Kaua'i Wildlife Reserve, where he grows Hawaiian endangered plants and trees and produces tens of thousands of seeds distributed through the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

"Kyle Nakanelua from the island of Maui: He's been a cultural consultant for the State of Hawai'i since 1996, and a member of the Royal Order. He is with the Pu'ukohola Heiau National Historic Site Advisory Committee and a part of the Pihanakalani/Hale Ki'i Heiau Restoration Committee. Mahalo to Kyle Nakanelua.

"Winifred Basques is from the island of Lāna'i. She's been with Lana'i Community Hospital for 22 years. She serves on the 'Aha Kiolo Advisory Committee, and is well known in the community as a strong advocate for Lana'i residents. She is a member of Hui Kako'o 'Aina Ho'opulapula, Hui Malama Pono O Lana'i, and the Lana'i Hawaiian Civic Club. Thank you, Winnie; mahalo.

"Leslie Kuloloio is a veteran and active member of the Maui community. He has the unique breadth of knowledge. He is a cultural consultant to the Maui Land Development Company, a member of the Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana, and was a Honokahua burials cultural community representative, among many things. Thank you so much, Les.

"Karen Poeopoe has played a significant role in the formation of the 'Aha Kiolo o Moloka'i. On this committee, she advised The Nature Conservancy on forest conservation and invasive management programs. She's highly regarded in the

community on Native Hawaiian cultural protocols. Mahalo nui loa; thank you so much.

“And finally, Thomas Hashimoto is from Hanalei and has worked all his life to protect Hawaiian resources through Native Hawaiian cultural methods that he learned from his dad. He’s been involved in the ‘Aha Moku process since 2006, and is a subsistence fisherman and has contributed significantly to the contents of two books regarding the oral histories of Ha’ena. Thank you so much, Thomas.

“Madam President, thank you so much to the Senate for advising and consenting to the nominations. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nominees as follows:

“Madam President, just in conclusion, I just would like to thank all of our kūpuna for serving, and I just would like to end with a famous verse from *Hawai‘i Aloha* that says, ‘E hau‘oli nā ‘ōpio o Hawai‘i nei.’ So happy are we, the youth, and the future of Hawai‘i for having such a prestigious ‘aha moku to guide us into our future. “Jobie graduated from Kamehameha Schools with honors. She obtained her Bachelor of Science degree at Northwestern University and continued on to earn a Master’s degree from Princeton University in Public Affairs/Urban and Regional Planning. She began her career as a budget examiner in the Office of Management and Budget, Executive Office of the President of the United States. She returned to Hawai‘i and worked as a land investment analyst for the Kamehameha Schools. And notably, she served as deputy to the Chairman of the Hawaiian Homes Commission from 1995 to 2002. She managed the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands’ operations for 130 staff members, colleagues. As deputy, she initiated reforms to the department’s mortgage financing programs to reduce the financial risk of exposure to departmental assets, facilitated the implementation of a new federal program for Native Hawaiian housing, and, among other things, oversaw the construction of the Lanikeha Community Center in Ho‘olehua, Moloka‘i.

“She then took a position as the assistant to the president and chief executive officer of The Queen’s Health Systems. She returned to public service as a public policy program manager at the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. She advanced as special assistant to the CEO of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and

currently she is the Chairperson Designate of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, and has expressed in our conversations a commitment to five integral areas of the department if she is approved today: stabilizing the department’s financial future, addressing homestead affordability issues, revitalizing the agricultural program of DHHL, and maximizing management of the department’s natural resources and supporting community-based projects. She has an acute understanding of the department and she is a highly motivated public servant.

“Madam President, after full consideration, we found Jobie Masagatani to be qualified for the position to which she is nominated and recommend the Senate advise and consent to the nomination. Mahalo.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nomination as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I am speaking in full support of the previous speaker’s remarks and I would like to just add what was presented in our committee report. I felt that these words truly personified her personality:

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you. I’m rising because of events as they were yesterday and the evident reactions since yesterday’s events.

“Let me start this way: The Clerk said, ‘Oh, I hope you’ll be short,’ and I said, ‘Lengthen your stirrups because we’re on for a good ride today.’ Let me start this way: I asked the senator from Mānoa what year he was elected, and he said 1980. Madam President, he predates you and me by two years, so he certainly would remember what I am going to refer to as the ‘old days,’ the ‘good old days.’ The good old days: Those are the days when he voted against a honey bill and I voted against a honey bill, and in a recess he said ‘Why did you vote against the honey bill?’ and I said, ‘Because I want to be close to you.’ He said, ‘Really?’ and I said, ‘Yes.’ Those are the good old days. Those are the old days when if a member knew that another member really wanted a bill, the member would go up to that other member and say, ‘You know, I’m sorry, but I’ll vote no,’ just as a courtesy. ‘I know this means a lot to you, but

I’m going to vote no.’ Those are the old days, the good old days.

“You know, a few weeks ago, I stood up on this floor on a point of personal privilege to express to all of you that I had become aware from my staff that a member of this august body had some serious concerns that the member’s bills weren’t being heard by the Judiciary Committee – you folks may remember that. I went on to detail how many bills other committees had moved out and how many bills we had, and so forth, so on, and so forth. I ended the speech by saying, ‘If anybody has any issue with the Judiciary Committee, do me a favor: don’t see my staff, don’t send your staff to see my staff – come see me.’ And I used three words that generated smiles and subsequent YouTube snippets from my dear colleagues when I used the three words, ‘I’m your huckleberry’ – whether you folks remember that.

“Yesterday, I had raised on a point of inquiry a question of what specific part of certain legislation caused two members to vote no. And the reason, and I said it during the reason, was because I was yet undecided, so I wanted to know what specific issue in the bill caused them to rise in opposition. Immediately, the policy leader called a recess; the policy leader went to you, and you came to me, and so on and so forth. You know, I went to see the policy leader yesterday and I asked him why he called a recess, and he explained to me his thoughts. And I spoke to him about my thoughts, and we clarified it and came to an agreement; and the agreement was that if you would rise prospectively to call a recess he would come to see me about the issue.

“You folks may recall yesterday that the senator from Mānoa rose to call a recess and went over to the entire minority delegation, and explained to the minority delegation whatever concerns the minority member had, as he voted with reservations. At the conclusion, the senator from Mānoa went back to his seat, the minority leader got up and said, ‘The issue had been clarified for me and I’m going to vote straight up.’ The senator from Mānoa didn’t call a recess to come see you; the senator from Mānoa went straight to the minority member to explain that maybe there was confusion. Those are the good old days. Those are the days when somebody has an issue, you go see that person because that person is entitled. That person is entitled.

“So yesterday, after this session concluded, I had a couple of meetings and then I went to a late lunch. Then as I was coming back to the Capitol, I ran into one of our colleagues and the colleague said to me, ‘What a glorious sunny day,’ or something to that effect, and I said ‘Yes, isn’t it a nice sunny day,’ or something to that effect. Then I was surprised to learn that there was a memo circulating – evidently what appears to be a memo to leadership – that I had crossed a line, that I had overstepped my boundaries. I can’t remember everything. I’m not sure if it said I ought to be sanctioned or I ought to be disciplined; I don’t remember that part. So, I am wondering, asking members questions on a point of inquiry – is that crossing the line? Because I do remember, Madam President, when you asked me about the question I said to you they can decline to answer; that’s their prerogative, just as it’s my prerogative to rise on a point of inquiry.

“But, here’s my point this morning. Isn’t it too bad that the individual who talked to me about the glorious day couldn’t have said to me, ‘Oh, by the way, I think you crossed the line,’ or, ‘By the way, I sent an email about your bad behavior.’ See, because that’s the old days; you got something to say, ‘I’m your huckleberry’ – because if I have something to say, you’re my huckleberry because you are entitled, you are entitled to what I think. And so, that is why I am rising on a point of personal privilege because when I asked the senator from Mānoa when he got elected, 1980, those are the good old days.

But guess what? Today is the start of good old days for those who will be asking those questions of some of you, and you're going to respond 2000, 2010, because that's when if your people had something to say, they just said it.

"Recently when the vote was taken on S.B. No. 894, I was surprised and disappointed when one of my colleagues had voted 'no.' Not because my colleague voted 'no,' but because my colleague didn't let me know. And wouldn't you know it, the next day at caucus my colleague stayed behind and as the caucus broke, he said to me, 'I want to apologize to you because I voted no on your bill yesterday.' I looked at him and I said, 'Well, that's okay.' He understands that philosophy of the good old days, and that's the tragedy of rising on a point of personal privilege this morning. Unless we can communicate directly to each other, it's going to get all curves. You and I know, we've been around since '82, and many people in here have been around a very long time. You know, it's like yesterday afternoon in the governor's office, a woman said to the assembled, 'You know how you catch a snake? You grab him behind his ears' - I didn't know a snake had ears - 'and you squeeze that snake behind his jawbone until all the poison comes out, and you keep squeezing.' That's how you catch a snake. Isn't this a glorious day, Madam President? Thank you very much."

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Kim who was excused.

The Vice President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

At this time, Senator Green noted that it was the State Council on Developmental Disabilities' 13th Annual Day at the Capitol, and welcomed guests from Hilopa'a Family to Family Health Information Center, Ho'opa'a Hawai'i Autism State Implementation Grant, and the Hawaii Waiver Providers Association; Executive Administrator Waynette Cabral; and the participants, family members, personal assistants, service providers, and other advocates for developmental disabilities from across the state who were seated in the gallery.

The governor was ready to sign the bill so that there would be

Schedule F, meaning the same unemployment compensation tax rates this year as last year.

“Well, the House did it, that dysfunctional body over there; they continued their belief that they had to put minimum wage on it, and my knowledge is that the bill has died. I don’t know if the Department of Labor can extend the deadline; probably not. And what that means is that every business, and particularly the small businesses in our state, will suffer yet another increase this year on unemployment comp.

“But I salute my colleagues: we did the right thing, and we fast-tracked that, but I wanted everybody to know that. Thank you, Mr. President.”

At 12:05 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:00 p.m.

Senator Gabbard, Chair of the Committee on Energy and Environment, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 to hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 106, H.D. 2.

Senator Gabbard noted:

“The measure allows the counties to establish a permitting process for geothermal development in ag, rural, and urban districts. I’m requesting this waiver because all three committees reached agreement to hear this bill after the 72-hour notice requirement.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Gabbard announced that the Committee on Energy and Environment, Committee on Water and Land, and Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs would hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 106, H.D. 2 on Thursday, March 21, 2013, at 1:15 p.m. in Conference Room 225.

Senator Ige rose to announce that the Committee on Ways and Means would be reconvening its public hearing on the State Budget at 1:30 p.m. that afternoon in Conference Room 211.

Senator Nishihara, Chair of the Committee on Agriculture, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 to hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 174, H.D. 2.

Senator Nishihara noted:

“First, I’d like to make it clear that this is a food labeling and not an anti-GMO bill, nor is it a pro-bioengineering bill. We initially took the position of not hearing the bill based on the attorney general’s opinion. The bill is likely to be found unconstitutional for many reasons; however, the attorney general will be able to explain his opinion when it’s time.

“Anyway, because we heard the public’s passionate response and requests to hear the bill through phone calls, emails, etc., we believe that it’s perhaps prudent that we do hear the bill.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Nishihara announced that the Committee on Agriculture, Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, and the Committee on Health would hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 174, H.D. 2 on Thursday, March 21, 2013, at 9:00 a.m. in Conference Room 229.

Senator Tokuda rose to announce that Education Week would be continuing the following day with events in the rotunda including health screenings and band and cheer performances from the University of Hawai‘i.

Senator Baker rose to remind the members that the Women’s Legislative Caucus would be collecting Easter basket donations for women at the Institute for Human Services.

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“This is probably not the point you folks think I’m going to make because I’ll make that point at a different time. But I did want to thank the chairmen – the appropriate chairs – on hearing the bill regarding labeling.

“The point I want to make is this: it’s easy to use the attorney general when it’s convenient. I’ve always said the attorney general’s opinion is like an armpit: everybody has two. And when it smells right, you use the attorney general; and when it doesn’t smell right, you beat the attorney general over the head. Quite frankly, this is an issue of the right to know, plain and simple. The right to know: that’s the issue. And the right to know is a health issue. So, while it took such a long time – it’s almost like an epiphany that the bill’s going to be heard – there are a lot of solutions at hand. And so, well, quite frankly, I guess those who made the decision should be commended on hearing the bill on the right to know. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As was announced a little while ago, Ways and Means will continue after this session. And this morning, we heard from a steady parade of the governor’s men and women, who all came before Ways and Means to beg for more money and to tell us that their department, their agency, was the most important and the number one priority. And it was interesting to me, Madam President, that all of them thanked the Ways and Means Committee for the money that they have received over the years and that they hope to receive this time. Not one person thanked the taxpayers, which is the source of all the money and oftentimes we seem to forget in this building, and I think it’s something that we should never forget – that it’s the taxpayers that pay for everything and all of us.

“And along those lines, in Judiciary this morning I voted against the bill for expanded and extended public financing. I have stood in support of almost every campaign spending reform bill and transparency bill, but I’ve always opposed public financing. Why should we ask the taxpayers to pay for politicians? That is the question and I think we should all examine that.

“And that goes along with the action that occurred yesterday; all these things are tied together. Yesterday, the State Commission on Salaries announced its recommendations for yet another round of salary increases for those of us in public office in the Legislature, the executive branch, and the Judiciary. And some of my colleagues may recall that I had campaigned against that constitutional amendment back in 2006 that allowed for the establishment of the Commission on Salaries, saying that all you’re going to do is guarantee that salaries and compensation for public officials will continue to increase, particularly in times when people are struggling in this economy.

“I think that it was Senator Bob Hogue and myself who were the last senators to vote – to be able to vote – on a salary increase, and we both voted ‘no’ at that time. And now we have a process that does not even have a public hearing. So, while we may have labeling hearings, we don’t have a hearing about

the expenses that the taxpayers are forced to pay. We don't even have an opportunity to vote 'no,' unless we have a concurrent resolution before the end of the session to vote 'no' on everybody's salary increase, and that's not likely to happen.

"So, I think that in all of this mad rush to try to prioritize our expenditures, we should not forget that it's the taxpayers of our city, our state, that are footing the bill for everything and that they are struggling right now. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Green rose to note that he was wearing a light blue ribbon in honor of Traumatic Brain Injury Awareness Day and relayed that individuals struggling to recover from brain injury were touched by the Senate certificate presented to them recognizing March as Traumatic Brain Injury Awareness Month.

At 12:08 p.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 25, to award the Hawai'i Medal of Honor to United States military service members with Hawai'i connections who were killed in action while serving in dangerous, volatile, and unstable areas of the world, including Iraq and Afghanistan.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013, was called to order at 2:04 p.m. by the Honorable Donna Mercado Kim, President of the Senate.

The President then addressed the Chamber, stating:

"On behalf of the House Speaker and all the members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, we honor members of the Armed Forces of the United States, with ties to Hawai'i, who fought and died bravely, in a combat zone designated by Presidential Order.

"At this time, please rise for the Hawaiian blessing by Ms. Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu."

The Hawaiian Blessing was then invoked by Kumu Hula Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu.

The President then said:

"Thank you, Ms. Wong-Kalu. Please remain standing for the posting of colors by the Joint Service Color Guard and the Hawai'i Air National Guard Royal Guard, and remain standing for the singing of the National Anthem and *Hawai'i Pono'i* by Danny Kaleikini."

At this time, the Joint Service Color Guard, and the Hawai'i Air National Guard Royal Guard enacted the Posting of the Colors before the Joint Session of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature.

The members of the Legislature and guests remained standing for the singing of the National Anthem and *Hawai'i Pono'i* by Mr. Danny Kaleikini.

At this time, the President thanked the Joint Service Color Guard, Hawai'i Air National Guard Royal Guard, and Mr. Danny Kaleikini for their participation in today's ceremony.

The President then addressed the members of the Legislature and guests as follows:

"Good afternoon, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen.

"On behalf of the members of the Hawai'i Senate and House of Representatives, I extend to all of you our warmest aloha and welcome, and a special aloha to the families of those we honor today. Many of you have traveled a long way to be here, and we are humbled and honored by your presence to join us for this ceremony.

"The Medal of Honor is Hawai'i's expression of gratitude to those who gave their lives in the service of our nation. These citizens volunteered to carry the flag of the United States, to uphold the ideals and principles of a free and democratic nation, to put themselves in harm's way to fulfill their military missions, and to represent our people and country with pride, honor, and distinction. We admire them immensely for their courage and willingness to make tremendous personal sacrifices for the greater good.

"The Medal of Honor is awarded posthumously. As such, this day is one of sorrow, of heartbreak. The families of our servicemen and women endured great suffering and hardship, and we convey our deepest condolences to all the families and loved ones.

"At the same time, in honoring these heroes, let us celebrate their lives and what they stood for. They are sons, brothers, husbands, fathers, comrades in arms, friends, and neighbors. They represent all the good things in life. They stood for those qualities we admire in our fellow citizens: honor, loyalty, courage, sacrifice, patriotism, and a commitment to putting the needs of others above their own. And they symbolized the values and traditions that have made our country a place of freedom, equality, and opportunity.

"To the families of our honorees, please accept this Medal of Honor Ceremony as a small token of our appreciation and admiration, which we present with our heartfelt and lasting aloha. Mahalo."

The President then stated:

"Before proceeding further, I would like to acknowledge the presence of our state, congressional, and military leaders.

Please hold your applause until all of our distinguished guests are recognized.”

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature:

Representing the 25th Infantry Division and Major General William Fuller – Colonel Frank Tate;

Representing the Hawaii National Guard Chief of Joint Staff – Colonel Joe Logan; and

Command Chief Master Sergeant Robert Lee, Senior Enlisted Officer, Hawaii National Guard.

The President then stated:

“Let us acknowledge these fine state, congressional, and military leaders and all other military personnel who are here today.”

At this time, the President called upon the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

“Ladies and gentlemen, aloha. Friends, the purpose of the act, designated as Act 21, Session Laws of Hawai‘i 2005, states, ‘The purpose of this Act is to provide for a Hawaii medal of honor that would help express the deep appreciation and gratitude of the people of Hawaii to the loved ones of members of the military who sacrificed their lives in defense of our nation and our freedoms.’

“It’s a position of gratitude. It is an honor for those of us who are privileged to occupy elective office to be able to represent to you, not only those who are gathered here to my immediate right, as family of those who are to be honored as a result of the passage of Act 21, but for all those assembled here today and who may see at least a portion of the results either in the newspapers or throughout the media. We do this, a public ceremony, because we wish to express, in more than just a symbolic way, what it is we regard as most fundamental to a recognition of what it takes to enable us to be a free people.

“In some respects, as I have indicated in previous remarks on another occasion – where this opportunity was provided for – that this involves, inevitably then, if it’s to be described, a ritual: Why are we gathered in such a manner, in such solemn regard for what it is we are about to undertake? It’s because we understand that in ceremonies such as this, we are engaged in a public expression of what constitutes our fundamental values: a public expression of what it is that we believe. We are trying to put three dimensions and a human context onto what might otherwise be considered an academic exercise; that is to say, the recitation of a philosophy, or the verbal expressions associated with what we say we believe.

“It’s one thing to take an oath – everyone here has taken an oath of office – everyone who is to be honored today took an oath of office. It’s a verbal expression, a particularly and peculiarly human endeavor in which we verbalize in front of our fellows what it is that we say we’re about to embark upon, in terms of our commitment to it, our fidelity with regard to it. And what we say is an extension of who we are as human beings and as free men and women in this democracy.

“I carry with me today a book that I brought with me the last time I did this because it’s a constant reminder to me, and it’s something that I read and re-read. It’s *Guard of Honor* by James Gould Cozzens, written in the wake of World War II. And it was an expression of Cozzens’s ideas in a fictional sense of what it was to be involved in WWII, and by extension, what was involved with us as human beings in expressing not just to ourselves, but to the nation and the world, what it meant to make an ultimate sacrifice. The quote that formulated the foundation for Cozzens’s work was from *The Tempest* and Shakespeare:

I and my fellows
Are ministers of Fate: the elements
Of whom your swords are temper’d, may as well
Wound the loud winds, or with bemocked-at stabs
Kill the still-closing waters, as diminish
One feather that’s in my plume: my fellow-ministers
Are like invulnerable.

“All those we honor today have embodied in their sacrifice, in their commitment, in their determination, to be as fellow ministers of each other’s fate. A sense, not that they were invulnerable: what was invulnerable was their commitment. What was invulnerable was their fidelity and loyalty to each other. What was invulnerable was their dedication to the proposition that freedom had to be defended, and that they were

willing to put themselves forward to accomplish that. None of us know, at any given moment, how we would be able to respond, how we would react, whether we would be able to carry through on that to which we pledged ourselves. Who knows, among us at this moment, whether we, too, could have met that challenge?

“But we know that we are ministers of our own fate, and that as ministers of that fate, we know that our own vulnerabilities are known only to us and known to God. What we do know is that sacrifices were made. What we do know is that we can acknowledge those sacrifices and that we can make certain that those who have had to bear the brunt of what those sacrifices meant know that they are not forgotten, know that all those honored today are carried in our hearts, and that we are brothers and sisters for and with and to each other. And with that sure knowledge, we hope that some small measure of comfort will be extended from us to you, not just this day, but in the days to come; and that you’ll carry with you from this ceremony our commitment and our pledge, not just to remember, but to try to fulfill the promise that was made ultimately and with complete sacrifice by those whom you loved.”

The President thanked Governor Abercrombie, then presented to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and special guests Major General Darryll D.M. Wong to deliver his remarks.

Major General Wong addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

“Governor Abercrombie, Lieutenant Governor Tsutsui, Senate President Mercado Kim, Speaker Souki, members of our State Legislature, and especially family and friends of our honored heroes: good afternoon and aloha.

“We are honored and privileged to be in the presence of the families of our fallen heroes. There is no honor higher that our state can bestow upon a member of our armed forces than the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor, but the price of that honor is far too high. To receive that medal means a member of our military with Hawai‘i ties has given up his or her life in the service of our nation. The burden imposed on the families and friends is heavy beyond measure. This is not an honor that we bestow with joy; rather, we do so with heavy hearts and solemn resolve.

“Collectively, as a state, we have made it our mission to express our deepest appreciation to these brave men and women. We resolve to ensure that the families of our servicemen shall always be a part of our Hawai‘i ‘ohana, and that the ultimate sacrifice made by their loved ones will always be remembered. As evidenced by these brave men who sit up in the gallery there, you know our nation has been at war for 11.5 years, and the burden of that war has been carried on the shoulders of a select few. Some two million men and women who currently wear the uniform, or who are now war veterans, have deployed since September 11, 2001. Of those, more than 6,600 have given their lives, which Hawai‘i has lost 327 service members. Our grateful state best honors and remembers the sacrifices of those who have served our nation by living our lives with deep appreciation for our freedom. While the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor cannot take away the pain of losing a loved one, it symbolizes that Hawai‘i will never forget. We’ll never forget them, nor will we ever forget their families.

“During World War II, gold stars denoting that a service member from a family had died in action were all too commonly displayed on the windows of apartment buildings, farmhouses, and in the communities that mourned the loss of these fallen heroes. The gold star on the Hawai‘i State Medal Coat of Arms that will be presented to each family today represents the star of the 50th State on the American flag. It

also is a reminder of the gold stars displayed on the windows of American homes from past conflicts. The type of device in red and yellow is a rendering of ancient puela, or flag, that Hawaiians raised above the sails of their canoes. Anyone who saw the puela from afar knew that a person of the highest rank was coming. Today, the service ribbon and its puela reminds us that these families are of the highest rank and honor. The kalo, or taro, leaves in the middle symbolize the embrace of the people of Hawai‘i as one ‘ohana. There is no community in the United States that embraces and loves its military members more than we here in Hawai‘i.

“To the family, friends, and comrades-in-arms that are here with us today, there may be times when you feel all alone, that no one understands your pain, or that few appreciate the ultimate sacrifice that your husband, father, son or daughter has made on our behalf. In those times, please remember this: It doesn’t matter whether a sailor, soldier, airman, or marine grew up in Hawai‘i or called Hawai‘i home for only a short period of time: their warrior spirit will always be a part of our islands. And it doesn’t matter whether the families of our heroes from Hawai‘i were from here or the mainland; your loss is our loss.

“It is with great humility that we present these Medals of Honor to these families who are, and always will be, a part of our ‘ohana and will always have a place of honor in our islands.”

The President thanked Major General Wong and stated:

“Madam Clerk, please begin the announcements of the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor recipients.”

At this time, the Senate Clerk proceeded to read the names of the following individuals who were represented by family members, friends, and colleagues to receive their medals and certificates:

The President then stated:

“Members of the Senate and members of the House, please recognize and thank the recipients’ family members, friends, and colleagues who have joined us in the Chamber today.

“Mr. Clerk, please begin the announcement of the names of other recipients of the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor, whose families could not be present for today’s ceremony.”

Speaker of the House of Representatives Joseph M. Souki then gave his closing remarks as follows:

“Before proceeding on with the 3-Volley Salute and playing of Taps, I would like to thank all of you for being here today to join with the members of the Hawai‘i State Senate and the House of Representatives as we pay our respect to these fallen servicemen and women, and their families, their friends, and fellow soldiers who served beside them.

“I am sure I can speak for all of us here, as well as the communities we represent, and indeed our state and our nation, when I say we honor you, our fallen heroes. And we offer our deepest gratitude to you for answering the call to duty and for making the ultimate sacrifice.

“Freedom is not free. We hear this phrase so often, and yet it is in ceremonies such as this that its truth is deeply felt when we pause to appreciate our freedom and our liberties that we too often take for granted, and when we are reminded that each of us, in our own way, also has a duty and responsibility to protect and uphold these basic human rights, at home and abroad.

“And to the families, the friends, the brothers and sisters in arms, please know that the people of this state, this community, stand with you in remembering and honoring your loved ones – heroes, each of them. May God bless them, and may God bless the United States.”

At this time, the Speaker made the following announcement:

“And now, members of the Senate and House, our special guests and audience, please rise as I turn your attention outside to the Capitol Rotunda for the 3-Volley Salute and the playing of Taps, which will be followed by a moment of silence in honor of our fallen heroes.”

“Members of the Hickam Base Honor Guard, please proceed.”

A 21-gun Salute and Taps were then carried out by the U.S. Air Force and the U.S. Navy.

The Speaker then stated:

“Thank you. Please remain standing for the retiring of the colors.”

The Speaker stated:

At 2:57 p.m., the Speaker declared the Joint Session adjourned.

FORTIETH DAY

Thursday, March 28, 2013

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2013, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"First of all, I just want to thank my office and the Clerk's office for preparing the copies that are in front of you. Members, you should see two sets of maps. The first set with the yellow lines: the yellow lines represent all the properties that the state owns. So if you look at this, the state owns property along every rail station except one. So the first 21 stations, the state owns property along 20 stations.

"Some of the discussion that we've had in committee is the coordination between the different departments – what is the necessary infrastructure and planning being discussed. You know, I'm hoping that as we proceed with our discussions these last couple of weeks, we can ask the departments to really be more comprehensive in their approach.

"The second set – where it says 'Honolulu Rail Transit Stations and Surrounding Sewer Capacity' – that's also the 21 stations, and you can see from the red lines that the infrastructure is over capacity. So, if anything were to be developed along that particular area or in that particular area, it would probably be denied. That's kind of the reason why you see storage facilities in urban Honolulu because they don't really require any kind of sewer infrastructure; you don't need toilets at a storage facility.

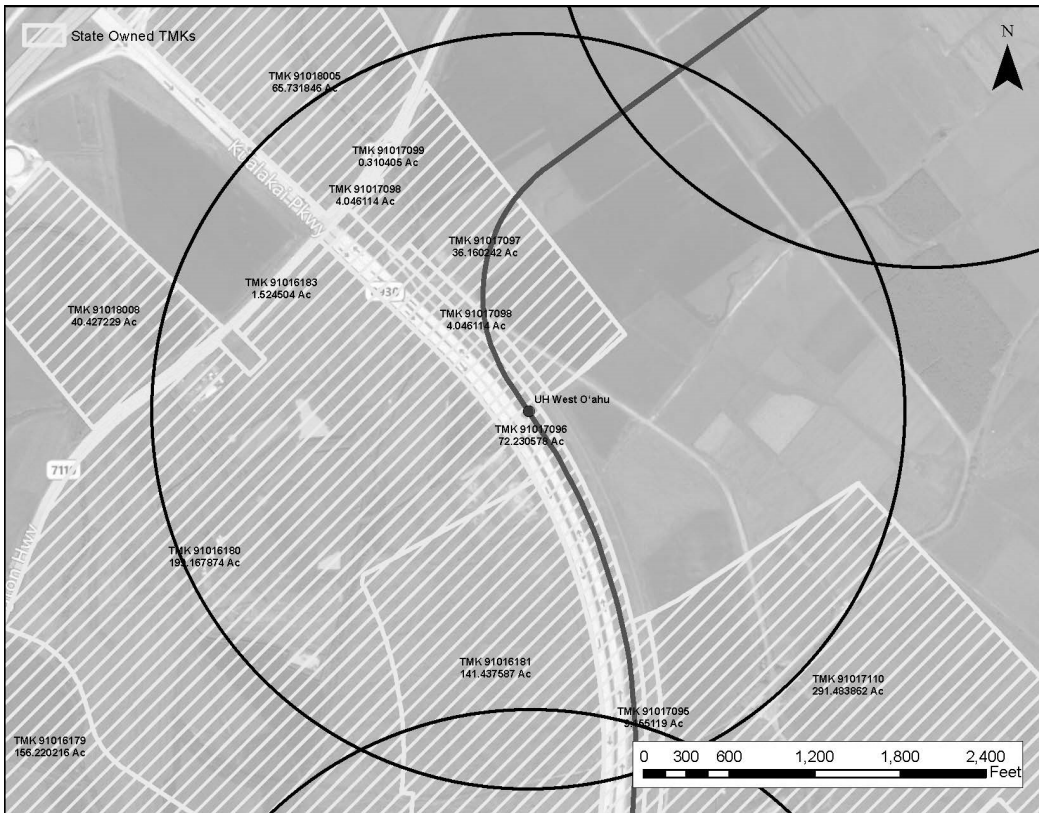
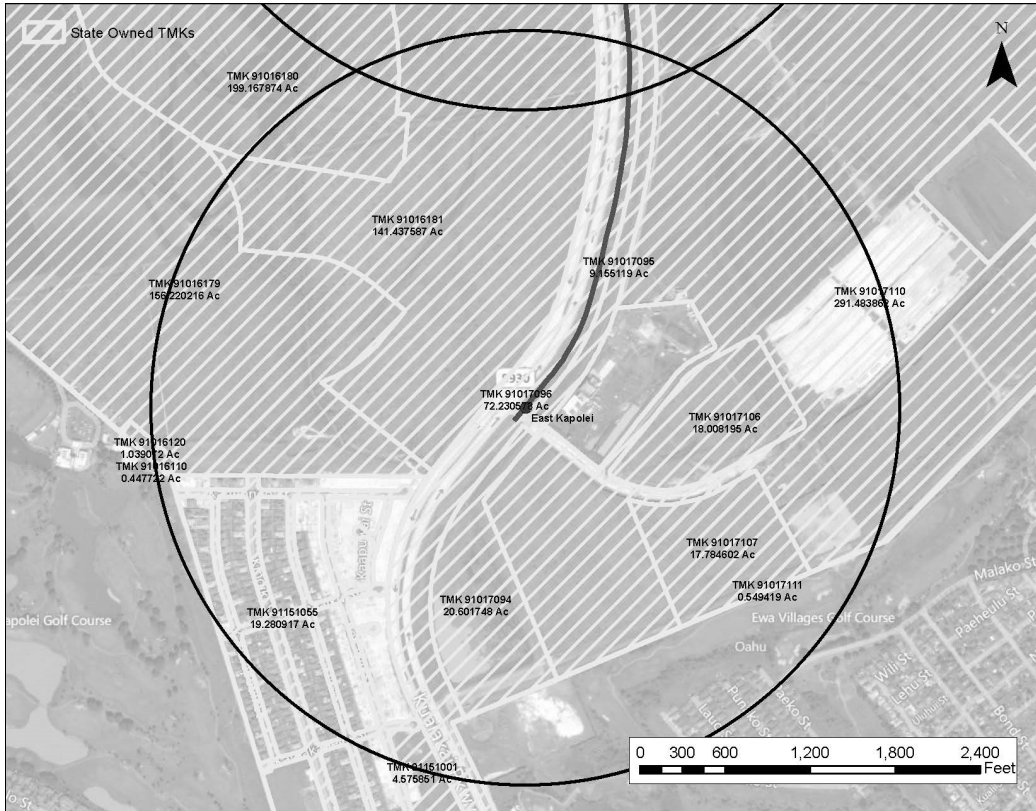
"So, we just have to make sure that as we proceed in what we do as far as the state that we're looking at infrastructure, sewer capacity, and that we actually really are coordinating our assets more appropriately. So, these were just offered as tools, and then I am asking that the maps be entered into the Journal. Mahalo." (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Ige moved that H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I just wanted to start by thanking the members of the Ways and Means Committee and the entire Senate for their input, contributions, and suggestions that helped guide the development of the Senate draft of the executive budget. And I would also like, if you would permit me, a moment to acknowledge the staff of the Ways and Means Committee. I think all of you – as the senator from the Big Island, in the moment of contemplation, had mentioned – I think we all understand how important the staff is in our being able to carry out our obligations on behalf of the people of Hawai'i; and I did want to take a moment to introduce the staff from the Ways and Means Committee and my office staff who really helped the committee to keep on task and really move forward. So, if you could hold your applause until they are all introduced, I would like to introduce all of them here.

"First, and this is in alphabetical order: Ashley Advincula; Cal Azama; Rod Becker, budget chief; Dayna Chikamoto; Jonathan Chikamoto; Brittany Dunton; Michael Hamasaki; bills chief Susan Hirai; Joyce Kami, my office manager; Will Kane, who works on the CIP; Sabrina Nasir; Robert Nishimoto; Derek Okubo; Alan Sarhan; Michelle Scala; Mei Yee Cheng Steele; Daniel Truong; Ryan Tsuji; and Tony Valdez. Members, if you could give them a round of applause. They keep me on task and focused on the budget.

"Madam President, the approach that your Ways and Means Committee took in dealing with the executive budget was cautious, conservative, with a regard to budget expansion in fiscal matters. You know, as living through several sessions of budget cutting, we clearly did not want to grow the state budget too fast where we would be faced with making reductions to the

state budget. As a priority, we believe that we need to provide a solid financial base for the state as the economy recovers and expands.

"This proposed Senate draft of House Bill 200 cuts about \$134 million from the executive request while still making important strategic investments in our community. In developing the budget, we continued to adhere to the following principles: First, support the state's core functions, including programs that provide services for those most in need; next, make strategic investments in people and programs that encourage economic growth and lower future costs; and third, support long-term planning and accountability efforts to fundamentally change the character and delivery of government services.

"Our committee has supported the recapitalization of the Emergency Budget and Reserve Fund and the Hurricane Relief Fund to ensure that the state has adequate reserves as we pursue a broader capital improvement program.

"And I did want to comment on the unfunded liabilities of other post-employment benefits. Despite the scarcity of general funds, the Senate draft continues to include \$200 million over the fiscal biennium to begin making payments for other post-employment benefits. Over the past several years, the state has made significant progress in addressing the unfunded liability of the Employees' Retirement System. The appropriation of funds for OPEB payments and the passage of the Senate's version of S.B. No. 946 that serves as solid foundation and framework for future payments will also demonstrate the Legislature's commitment to address the unfunded liability of the EUTF. We believe that paying down our unfunded liabilities must be a priority, not left to discretion. Our proposal ensures that all state and county employers pay 100 percent of the annual required contribution for OPEB within six years. This would ensure that our unfunded liabilities on both fronts are currently in hand.

"I did want to comment on the fact that the executive budget is the largest component of the state general fund financial plan. Since the Senate's plan does not consider increases in any broad-based tax, this committee has exerted control over growth in the budget so that resources are available to address issues the budget document does not. As presented to the Legislature, the state general fund financial plan relied upon a carryover balance and revenue measures that the Legislature was not certain to adopt. As would be expected of any household or business, your committee carefully scrutinized expenses in an effort to avoid a budget that could not be supported by realistic operating revenue.

"The executive budget request would add about \$1.2 billion in general funds over the upcoming fiscal biennium. While this is significant, the costs are largely nondiscretionary in nature; \$78 million in the budget in each year is needed to restore labor costs. This amount represents the five percent reduction in compensation that state workers have endured over the last two years in an effort to keep our budget balanced. This restoration does not include any increase for collective bargaining contracts that are arrived at before the end of session. This cost and others, such as debt service, health premiums, retirement benefits, Medicaid, federal sequestration mitigation, and the state's first payments for its share of the EUTF unfunded liability, amount to \$908 million, or nearly three-quarters of the governor's general fund budget request. This draft of the executive budget supports the payment of all of these costs and other high priority items, yet still reduces the general fund budget request of the governor by more than \$130 million.

"The governor's budget request includes several significant initiatives and numerous other requests from state departments. Many of these requests would restore some of the significant

reductions enacted over the past few years. Some of the significant items that we funded included: \$54 million for the Office of Information Management and Technology to modernize the state's IT infrastructure; \$27 million to establish an early learning program; \$55 million for the weighted student formula to support students in the classroom. The committee found value in nearly all of the requests for funds it reviewed; however, tough choices had to be made. Though the Council on Revenues' projection has relieved some of the financial pressure, the increase pales in comparison to the countless requirements and needs of the state. Thus, the committee was judicious in their allocation of the state's limited resources. This budget provides \$6.1 billion for FY14 and \$6.2 billion for FY15 in general funds, and \$11.9 billion in FY14 and \$12.2 billion for FY15 across all means of financing.

"Controlling the increase in state government expenditures allows us to assure that funds are available in the financial plan to consider, first, collective bargaining costs, should the executive and collective bargaining agents arrive at a contract that is ratified; and payments of future liabilities so that the next generation does not bear the cost accrued by the current generation; and we also have space available for possible tax relief in the form of tax credits or income tax adjustments as appropriate.

"Colleagues, I encourage all of you to support the budget, as I believe that it identifies the most pressing priorities for all of us to move forward. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of HB200 HD1 SD1 relating to the state budget. At this time in our history it is especially important to put forth a prudent budget focusing on investments in our infrastructure, paying down our debts, promoting quality education and ensuring access to health care for all. These areas should be appropriately funded and are critical for the economic growth of our State and overall well-being of our people.

"First, provide appropriate funding for education. I'm pleased to see that additional dollars were appropriated for weighted student formula to cover costs incurred while preparing our students for the Common Core State Standards assessments. When we invest in student success, we are also promoting economic growth.

"I would like express a special mahalo to the Ways and Means Committee especially Chair Ige and Vice Chair Kidani for including the full authorization for construction of the much needed high school in Kihei. The South Maui region is the fastest growing area in the state with no high school. A high school in the Kihei-Makena region is long overdue and will significantly alleviate overcrowding in central Maui at Maui High and Baldwin High Schools. The Kihei campus will benefit students and teachers by providing a state-of-the-art facility conducive to project-based learning for our students. With this authorization for the full project amount of \$130 million, DOE can bid out the entire project as design-build, thus saving the DOE millions of dollars. I would note for the record that the land has already been purchased and the EIS completed. We just need to get the school constructed. It will help put many construction workers back to work as well.

"Second, get our unfunded liability under control. This budget seriously and methodically sets us on a path to address unfunded liabilities in our employees' health fund. As a policy statement, the Senate passed SB946 which establishes a framework for future payments. This budget appropriates funds

to make a down payment on the unfunded liability in OPEB, other post employment benefits, so our retirees can be assured their hard-earned and promised benefits will be there for them. By these actions, we truly make solid strides forward to fully address the unfunded liability of the Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund.

"Third, make sure neighbor island hospitals receive much needed support. This budget continues important funding for Hawaii Health Systems Corporation's acute care hospitals including Maui Memorial Medical Center. HHSC is under increasing financial pressures as health care costs continue to rise while federal and private reimbursement rates decline. HHSC is the principal health care provider for Hawaii's most vulnerable citizens and visitors on the neighbor islands. Unless and until we find a private partner to assist the neighbor island hospitals, the State must continue its commitment to health care on the neighbor islands by providing operating and capital project funding to HHSC to ensure that all of Hawaii's citizens and visitors continue to receive adequate health care services and are not forced to travel away from home for life-saving, healing care.

"Fourth, invest in our people and our infrastructure. University of Hawaii, Maui College like other community colleges in Hawaii, play an important role in providing post-secondary educational opportunities for the people of Hawaii. Due to enrollment restrictions, Hawaii's community colleges are unable to generate the tuition revenues required to meet their operational needs. Therefore, it is pertinent that this body supports funding for the operating expenses of Hawaii's community colleges. As our community colleges thrive so will our non-traditional students and life-long learners who armed with new skills will be able to fill in-demand jobs and add to the economic growth of our community.

"Our physical infrastructure is the second part of our economic sustainability equation. This budget invests in our roadways, harbors and airports as well as refurbishing state buildings. These are crucial for sustained economic growth and job creation as well as the productivity of our state workforce. For instance, I'm pleased that WAM acknowledged the Public Utilities Commission's need for funds to obtain a larger more appropriate space to accommodate additional personnel and equipment necessary to better execute their duties in regulatory functions. The PUC provides critical oversight and regulation of our move to more renewable energy generation and distribution, the current electric companies, interisland shipping among others. They've out grown their current space to do the important work required of them.

"These are just a few highlights I wanted to mention as I rose in support of H.B. No. 200, S.D. 1. I look forward to the conference draft which hopefully will retain the best of the Senate draft and some of the other projects for my district contained in the H.D. 1. Mahalo to the committee and their staff for crafting a budget we can proudly support."

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"First of all, no one can deny the hard work of the Ways and Means Chair and the committee members, and also the openness and cooperation of the chair and the Ways and Means staff.

"Having said that, however, there is a need to change in our state: change in how we view real education, change in how we view economic development, change in our business climate. And yet, we don't see change, and we don't see it in the budgetary process because in the budget again this year, Madam President, the governor proposed a budget with nearly \$1 billion in additional new spending. The House reduced that,

but it was still an increase in spending. The Senate put back many of the things supporting the executive budget.

“The bottom line is we’re still staring at more than \$23 billion in the next two years at a time when our economy continues to wander. We have not seen, as I have mentioned time and time again, an overall improvement – overall improvement – of our economy. We’re being held up by the visitor industry single-handedly, and we know how that could change.

“We need further diversification in construction, retailing, manufacturing, wholesaling. We need to reduce the burden on our taxpayers and residents in this state who are struggling, and I know that all my colleagues get notes and emails and phone calls from their constituents telling them this – that every day it gets more and more difficult.

“So our role in here in this body should be to try to alleviate those hardships, and that has not been done in our budget process because we’re focused on, as always, the growing demands of people seeking government funds. People come down here every day; they come and crowd into room 211, the Ways and Means, looking for, begging for, emotionally demanding funds for their particular project. And everybody’s project and everybody’s agency seems to be number one in importance. We haven’t learned in government the realistic approach to prioritizing actual demands, and we make promises that, fiscally, we can’t keep. Fiscally, we don’t have the economic engine to deliver, and yet we continue doing this.

“I’m supporting this budget because I know we still have a long way to go in conference and there will still be further changes, and we’ll find out, hopefully, more information. Hopefully, we’ll have more positive information. But again, the thrust of the budget is more spending, more debt, and not lessening the burdens of our residents.

“Also, if we look at this bill, this budget bill, from the perspective of business and investment, we don’t see any major changes in terms of economic development or making things better or providing more incentives or more opportunities. And we invite people down here to the Capitol to tell us: what do you need to do to expand your business? What do you need to do to have more investment? What do you need to do to hire more people? To pay greater wages? And they tell us, but we don’t listen to them. And unfortunately, the budget process goes along in ignoring, basically, what the job creators are telling us as we pander more and more to those people that have become dependent on government. We spend an inordinate amount of time trying to fund union contracts for public union workers, and they are but a small part of the overall work force, yet we spend a great deal of time in doing it.

“I think that we are spending too much money, money that we do not have, and further burdening people. And I sincerely believe we need a change in direction and in priorities, and I don’t see that fully recorded in this budget document. But I do like a number of the approaches the Senate took over the House and over the executive positions, and again, that’s why I will support this with reservations.

“However, Madam President, I think it is important for me to indicate that, as has been the practice for the last several years, the Senate minority has worked diligently and hard in researching an alternative budget. And I’d like to introduce my staff today and have them recognized because very few of you in this room know what it’s like to come to work every day and be outnumbered 24 to 1 – to have votes that are 24 to 1 – day after day after day after day. And yet we talk about bipartisanship and we talk about reaching across the aisles and all that. But we take our responsibilities seriously, and we may

be small in number, but I think we’re great in terms of what we’ve accomplished.

“As I said, the Senate President, the Ways and Means director, the staff, and the Budget and Finance chief all got copies of our alternative budget last week. It was put online as we have done every year, but this year’s a little different because it’s much more detailed, it’s much more specific. And at this time, I’d like to ask my staff to stand; please hold your applause until all have been introduced. Starting with our budget director who has done a tremendous job this year, Mr. Paul Harleman; Julia Allen of our staff; up in the gallery, Kaitlyn Baria, Noelani Bonifacio, Herb Laybon, and Melvin Ah Ching. Now you can applaud for them. Thank you so much.

“This is a document that we’ve introduced. It is full of statistics, full of data. We’ve attended every hearing. Paul has been to the Sunday sessions and looked at all the worksheets – and again, I want to thank the staff and the chair for all of their cooperation.

“We had four simple objectives in proposing an alternative budget. The budget accomplishes these objectives, and they are:

“(1) The budget does not rely on any current or future tax, or fee increases, in order to balance the budget.

“(2) It is our objective to reduce the size and cost of government through a combination of budget reductions, program consolidations, and policy reforms.

“(3) The budget provides a sustainable path to solve our problem with unfunded retirement benefit liabilities and recapitalize our budget reserves.

“And finally, the budget leaves the state treasury with a projected general fund surplus of \$741 million in fiscal year 2015, which could be used to lower the tax burden for our struggling taxpayers and small businesses.

“Our budget is \$1.6 billion less in total funding in comparison with the proposed executive budget; \$1 billion with the House of Representatives’ budget. I urge you to look through it, to be critical of it, but it shows that, in fact, we can have an alternative and go in a direction that is different from what has been proposed.

“So I won’t go into greater detail in the interest of time, and I will be actively looking at the negotiations that continue. Again, I thank the Ways and Means chair, staff, and everyone involved. The overall objective is to have a good, sustainable, and affordable budget for the people of the State of Hawai‘i. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I would like to thank the Ways and Means chairman for taking the unfunded liability pilikia that we have been in for many, many years – taking it very seriously. That has been one of my particular concerns, and I have expressed this mana‘o many, many times.

“But I, too, would like to express my concerns, Madam President, as to the direction of our state budget. I’m hoping that in our deliberations, or even for next session, that we would consider more incentives to be able to create more of what I consider to be revenue generators for the State of Hawai‘i. I still don’t understand why we can’t consider some kind of gaming as a possibility, increasing our cash situation. I’m thinking also of why we cannot consider looking at more investment in alternative energy, such as geothermal energy production. I think that this would be a key for our future. I’m hoping that as we address our Hawaiian issues that we are

going to be giving more autonomy to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands so they, in fact, can use their resources in helping to be able to provide the kinds of programs that are needed by their beneficiaries and being able to become more self-sufficient.

"I cannot express the importance of the public-private partnership legislation. It's unfortunate that we were not able to – I don't know where it is right now as I'm speaking, but if we had some dollars backing up this thought, I think that we could really provide more incentive to be able to get the private sector up and running.

"The bottom line, Madam President, as well you know, is building capacity in the private sector that is going to be our future for our Hawai'i nei, and to be able to provide the opportunities for our future generations.

"So again, thank you very much for this opportunity. Thanks to the Ways and Means Committee; I know how hard they're working and will continue to support their efforts. Thank you. Aloha."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Contrary to the minority leader's belief, I do believe that this budget is fiscally prudent while allowing for targeted investments that will yield silent returns on investments that will save resources going forward and still hold agencies accountable on all levels of government.

"But specifically, I would like to highlight the Senate's support for education and our efforts to focus resources at the school level and in the classroom. I'd like to thank the Ways and Means chair and vice chair and the WAM staff for their diligence and ongoing commitment to understanding the many complex issues and systems surrounding education, and their willingness to work with your Education Committee to address the challenges we face through both the budget and our bills.

"House Bill 200, S.D. 1 increases the weighted student formula by \$10 million each fiscal year through Federal Impact Aid funds to ensure that these resources directly benefit students, and appropriates an additional \$40 million in Impact Aid for regular instruction in EDN100 to further support our schools. We have also included \$5 million in each year of the biennium within the weighted student formula to deal with the upcoming Common Core transition and Smarter Balanced assessments in 2014-15 and the preparations that are already underway.

"I recognize that there are still many questions on how we best implement the Common Core, a transition and shift that is taking place not only in Hawai'i, but in 45 other states, the District of Columbia, four territories, and all the DoDEA schools across the globe. What excites me about this is the opportunities this transition presents to transform how and what we teach. While much of the discussion on this line item has centered around the fact that it would be based on a one-to-one digital device, it really is much more than that. The real opportunity lies in the integrated professional development; the standardized, rigorous, and updated curriculum; and the use of formative assessments to individually move students forward. I appreciate that while we continue to address these questions, we have included a nominal placeholder amount in the budget to keep the discussion alive going into conference on how we best support schools, teachers, and students in this transition.

"We have also provided an additional \$4 million in general funds, subject to match from administrative funds, for school bus transportation. This is very much in line with your Education Committee's focus on reforms and greater accountability in the area of the department's operations for

school bus transportation. We will be doing a briefing during the interim to follow up on the results of the department's transportation pilot project and our expectations for the near and long-term future in this particular area.

"I should also note we have also passed S.C.R. 97 and sent it over to the House, which calls upon the department and board to undertake a systemwide review and overhaul of its school food services branch.

"In the area of charter schools, our budget reflects full staffing support for the Charter School Commission, which is critical given the complete recodification of our law passed last session and the new responsibilities placed on them as the state's sole authorizer. I should also note that as a result of your support in passing Act 130 last year, Hawai'i has moved up in national rankings, in terms of the strength of our charter laws, from being 35th out of 42 states to number 14 in the country. Our budget also includes a nominal placeholder amount for facilities funding for charter schools to allow us to take this discussion and concept to conference. I appreciate the chair's consideration of this, and I would like to acknowledge Senators Ruderman and Solomon for being strong advocates on this particular issue, and look forward to working on moving this forward.

"And last, but definitely not least, I'd like to express my deepest appreciation for support received for early learning in the budget: \$1.269 million in the first year, and \$24.553 million in the second year, with an additional \$4 million each year to expand and redirect Preschool Open Doors.

"Colleagues, I could talk for hours about the studies that tell us why investments in early learning make a difference. From Nobel Prize-winning economist James Heckman and his equation based on decades' worth of data and research that investments in early learning development yields high societal gains, to the Perry report that tracked high-risk three- and four-year-olds until age 40, with results pointing to the positive outcomes of preschool; from reductions in delinquencies and lifetime arrests, to the greater wage earnings and economic independence and less reliance on public assistance. We could also talk about the study done specifically for Hawai'i that estimates that for every dollar spent on early learning, we would see a return on investments or savings of \$4.20.

"But rather than go into those studies and go into detail on them as to why this appropriation that we have in our Senate budget is so significant to so many people, the governor got me thinking the other day when he told me about a family he met in Foodland: about how, while money was so tight that they budget down to the very last item that they decide what they can afford to spend on down to the can of Spam or that container of milk, the first thing they pay for every single month is that child's \$700 preschool tuition. They know that that's their child's ticket to a better way of life.

"This couple's story got me thinking about another young couple – two teenagers who had a child – and while they struggled, living in various rentals, Section 8 housing, and Grandma's house, they, too, made the sacrifice to pay for preschool to give their child a chance at a life and options they never had. And when that child started kindergarten, it didn't really matter what they didn't have; in fact, that child thought she had everything. In fact, she actually did: a family that loved her, and educational foundations that got her ready for school and whatever life brought next. Not a day goes by that I am not eternally grateful for all that those two teenage parents did for me growing up, and how blessed I am that my father is still here able to help me raise my two young sons.

"I know that life could have been very different and far worse for me. I saw it in the lives of people around me growing

up, and I know there are thousands of stories that are even more dramatic as to the power of preschool and early learning. All you need to do is look in your own life, in your own family, amongst friends, and in your own communities, and it will become ever so clear why this significant appropriation in our budget is so important to so many people. Thank you very much for your support for education in our budget.”

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’d like to take this opportunity to thank the minority leader for sharing his perspective and the previous speakers for their specificity during their remarks. I will fly at about 30,000 feet and simply say, ‘Madam President, the majority supports this budget.’”

“Hawai‘i stands at a threshold, colleagues, of a very bright, new future. As we also take this opportunity to thank the hard work of our Ways and Means chair and Ways and Means vice chair and our staff up there, because of their hard work, we’re well positioned as a state to lead the country in economic growth that will lift us – all of our people – and define the 21st century.

“In recent years, colleagues, our people and our state have faced immense challenges. The recession has left no family, no business, no community unaffected, and though there are still challenges to address, today we can say confidently that with this budget Hawai‘i has emerged in a better position than most other states.

“But we cannot sit back and wait for the economy to develop as we go into our conference committee. We must lead the way. Now is the time for Hawai‘i to choose our path forward to build the foundation for a stronger, more innovative economic future with the leadership of our Ways and Means Committee that harnesses the greatness of our people and allows for all of our citizens to succeed. So with that in mind, colleagues, I urge your support of this budget. Mahalo, Madam President.”

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Madam President, if I could just make one final comment: I did want to publicly thank – members, I’m sorry that the vice chair of Ways and Means is not here, but I did want to publicly acknowledge her work and her partnership in shaping the capital improvements programs that is part of this budget.

“Members, it still is a good time to make needed investments in state facilities. The interest rates are still at record low, the construction industry is still hurting (although recovering), and this budget does make a significant investment in the capital improvement infrastructure of our state.

“I just wanted to highlight a handful of things: \$120 million for the IT Enterprise Resource Planning System, as well as the tax modernization project. We’ve made more than \$230 million for state-owned facilities for repair, maintenance, and health and safety investments in our public schools, our public hospitals, and the University of Hawai‘i System; and we funded \$33 million for the College of Pharmacy and made other significant investments in the University of Hawai‘i – West O‘ahu, and in public school facilities throughout this state, which I think goes a long way to ensuring that our communities and our citizens have access to quality public facilities. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Kidani).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1242 (H.B. No. 865, H.D. 1, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1242 be adopted and H.B. No. 865, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I am opposing the bill as I have consistently because it does include a new fund – a new special fund, the school facilities special fund. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“First of all, I want to commend the Education chair for how far she has brought this bill and this idea. It is true that many of our schools need to be repaired and upgraded. We have changing population in areas that are long overdue for new school facilities, and I applaud her conservative approach to a pilot project that takes a look at the possibility of redeveloping two school properties to determine whether that could become a means of helping to improve our schools which so desperately need it.

“But I think one thing that we’ve learned in the last couple years is that people want to make sure that when the state does enter into long-term leases for the development of lands that it is done in an open process, and also that there is some community involvement. And I think there are two loose threads in this bill that I hope, as we go into conference committee, are addressed.

“The first loose thread really, I think, is an oversight, and it deals with the process the state would enter into negotiations for a long-term lease in the development of these school lands. Normally, any development that’s done through the Department of Land and Natural Resources is done under Chapter 171, which lays out a very specific public bidding and public notice process, and these are statutes that were enacted by this body to make sure that when we enter into long-term leases of public lands, it’s done in a manner to protect public trust. Other agencies that have been exempted from Chapter 171 either have enabling legislation, which lays out criteria and procedures they must follow when they lease lands, or administrative rules that lay out that procedure.

“What this bill does is it de-links DOE from the DLNR development, which is fine; it’s probably appropriate for the pilot projects for the possibility of development to be pursued by other agencies. But in that de-linking, I think it inadvertently leaves that long-term leasing process ungoverned by any statute or criteria or procedure. And I don’t think it’s appropriate to have an utter absence of procedure for long-term leases of state lands, but I think it could be rectified by referring to procedures that are used by other agencies or other statutes.

“The second area that I’m hoping that the conference committee addresses – and I believe it will – is the community engagement process in the selection of these two sites and the types of developments that will occur there. While I believe the Senate version of the bill is generally superior to the House version, in one area I think it’s worthwhile to take a look at the House version. They do have more specificity as far as the community engagement process. And because these are pilot projects that will determine how we proceed in the future, I think it’s worthwhile to make the extra effort to have the community involvement so that we can gain support and success.

“And so I wish our Education chair the greatest success in her efforts in conference committee, and thank her again for all the hard work that she has done to bring the bill this far.”

Senator Taniguchi requested his vote be cast “Aye with Reservations,” and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just wanted to follow up on some of the comments that were just made. When you look at most of the properties that the Department of Education has even considered in regards to some of these programs, the land is owned by the city. So regardless of what process DLNR has, it still has to go through the city process of leasing land. So you know, I think we’re mixing apples and oranges as far as ensuring that DLNR’s process is exempt when DLNR is not even included in most of these processes anyway since the city owns the land.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1242 was adopted and H.B. No. 865, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL REDEVELOPMENT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Taniguchi, Thielen). Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 2 (Green, Kidani).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1243 (H.B. No. 927):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1243 be adopted and H.B. No. 927, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“First of all, this employment training fund is a tax; it’s attached to the unemployment compensation tax that almost every employer pays. In the past, we’ve seen that there has been abuse of the use and distribution of these funds, not unlike some of the problems with Act 221, that the money was not actually going for training; it was going for specific programs. We also learned that only a few businesses used the fund for the purposes that it was allowed. And I think the premise of the bill is that training is the biggest problem facing small businesses in our community, and I would dispute that.

“The biggest problem, as I keep mentioning, are taxes, employer mandates, and regulations, and this of course doesn’t do anything to absolve that. The problem is the tax is already being collected; the money is already there. I would urge other businesses, particularly the small businesses that make up 98 percent of our business climate, to find out how they can take advantage of these funds. But further, this time there’s got to be oversight on how the monies are actually dispensed, whether or not people are held accountable for the actual training, and when the application is made for those funds – that there be a follow-up to see if the funds were actually used for that purpose. Thank you, Madam President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1243 was adopted and H.B. No. 927, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING FUND,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

No. 925, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY APPEALS REFEREE’S OFFICE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1245 was adopted and H.B. No. 921, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCEEDINGS BEFORE THE LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS APPEALS BOARD,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1246 (H.B. No. 919):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1246 was adopted and H.B. No. 919, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE EMPLOYMENT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 2 (Green, Kidani).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1247 (H.B. No. 527, H.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1247 be adopted and H.B. No. 527, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I find it interesting that the committee report says, ‘Your Committee further finds that the numerous benefits accorded by the State to the National Guard and other military members in recent years will more than cover the loss of funds experienced by enlisted personnel upon the repeal of the uniform maintenance allowance.’

“I find that hard to believe, and if it were true, we’re basically taking away a benefit from our armed forces personnel, and specifically from the enlisted personnel who would be the least likely to afford these costs. So I think it’s a bad bill. I just signed a certificate this morning on behalf of the armed forces. We do a lot of talking about how we support the military, but this bill is not pro-military. Thank you.”

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This measure has to do with the uniform maintenance allowance, and previously that was primarily for dry cleaning of uniforms. Today, many of the new uniforms are wash-and-wear; and speaking with General Wong on this matter, he’d like to see more funding for our personnel go towards education and tuition. There was no opposition to this measure, and that is one of the reasons why we are passing this bill. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I respectfully disagree with the assessment of the minority leader. It is not about a disagreement between two breweries, as there are a number of small-craft brewers that would like to be able to grow their industry, grow their business.

“I really look at this measure as akin to the ‘Island Fresh’ that we put on eggs and milk and things that are done here – not done offshore and come back here – or even Kona coffee. And I would also note that this is a permissive activity, and one that does not require funding, a regime to set up, or any kind of monitoring; it’s a way to help our small-craft breweries grow. Thank you, Madam President.”

 - (A) Substantial or multiple skin bruising;

 - (C) Burn or burns;
 - (D) Malnutrition;
 - (E) Failure to thrive;
 - (F) Soft tissue swelling;
 - (G) Extreme pain;
 - (H) Extreme mental distress;
 - (I) Gross degradation;
 - (J) Poisoning;
 - (K) Fracture of any bone;
 - (L) Subdural hematoma; or
 - (M) Death;
 and the injury is not justifiably explained, or the history given concerning the condition or death is not consistent with the degree or type of the condition or death, or there is evidence that the condition or death may not be the result of an accident;
- (2) The child has been the victim of sexual contact or conduct, including sexual assault; sodomy; molestation; sexual fondling; incest; prostitution; obscene or pornographic photographing, filming, or depiction; or other similar forms of sexual exploitation[;], including but not limited to acts that constitute an offense pursuant to section 712-1202:

- (3) The child’s psychological well-being has been injured as evidenced by a substantial impairment in the child’s ability to function;
- (4) The child is not provided in a timely manner with adequate food; clothing; shelter; supervision; or psychological, physical, or medical care; [or]
- (5) The child is provided with dangerous, harmful, or detrimental drugs as defined in section 712-1240, except when a child’s family administers drugs to the child as directed or prescribed by a practitioner as defined in section 712-1240[-]; or
- (6) The child has been the victim of labor trafficking under chapter 707.”

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 1187, S.D. 1, is amended by adding a new Section 5 to part III to read as follows:

“SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were begun before its effective date.”

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 1187, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering Section 5 as Section 6.

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 1187, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering Section 6 as Section 7.

Senator Chun Oakland moved that Floor Amendment No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“This amendment is both technical in nature and adds language which allows DHS to better comply with this mandate as recommended by the Senate Majority Office. Thank you.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 9 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Hee moved that H.B. No. 269, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The reason for the defective date in Senate Draft 1 is to continue discussion on the bill in conference.”

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 269, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII RELATING TO RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR MEMBERS OF THE

LEGISLATURE,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 11, 2013.

H.B. No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Green moved that H.B. No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Hee.

Senator Green then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 12) to H.B. No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting the designation of Part I on page 1, line 1.

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting Sections 1 and 2.

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting the designation of Part II on page 5, line 5.

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“This just restores the language back to the initial posted language relating only to the piece of the legislation that had to do with leave – medical leave for people who participate in organ donor programs. My apologies to any of the other chairs if we jumped the gun on other language. When we had the debate, we had a good discussion about it, but I think it’s the right thing to do to just go with the initial language on the organ transplant issue.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 12 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 399, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 11, 2013.

H.B. No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

Senator Galuteria moved that H.B. No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Hee.

Senator Kouchi then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 10) to H.B. No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, is amended by amending Section 25 to read as follows:

“SECTION 25. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.”

Senator Kouchi moved that Floor Amendment No. 10 be adopted, seconded by Senator Galuteria.

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Again, the reason for the amendment is to have a defective date to continue the discussion on this bill in conference.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 10 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Ruderman then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 13) to H.B. No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, is amended by amending Section 5 to read as follows:

“SECTION 5. Chapter 205, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

“~~§205-~~ **Geothermal resource permits.** (a) The use of an area or site for geothermal resources development within the conservation district shall be governed by the board; provided that the appropriate county authority may issue a geothermal resource permit pursuant to subsection (c) to allow geothermal resources development in an agricultural, rural, or urban district if the geothermal resources development is not considered a permissible use under the applicable county zoning ordinances or general plan.

(b) If geothermal resources development is proposed within a conservation district in an application containing all required data, the board shall conduct a public hearing. Within ten days after the public hearing, the board may receive additional written comments on the issues raised at the public hearing from any party.

The board shall consider the comments at the hearing before rendering its final decision. The board shall then determine whether a conservation district use permit shall be granted to authorize the geothermal resources development described in the application. The board shall grant a conservation district use permit if it finds that:

- (1) The desired uses would not have unreasonable adverse health, environmental, or socio-economic effects on residents or surrounding property;
- (2) The desired uses would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water, drainage, and police and fire protection; and
- (3) There are reasonable measures available to mitigate the unreasonable adverse effects or burdens referred to above, which the board shall have the authority to prescribe as conditions for the proposed geothermal resources development.

A decision shall be made by the board within six months of the date a complete application is filed; provided that the time limit may be extended by agreement between the applicant and the board. The board shall have the exclusive authority to impose reasonable conditions and restrictions upon the proposed use in support of its findings, except to the extent that the department of health and other state and federal agencies have jurisdiction to regulate such activities.

(c) If geothermal resources development is proposed within agricultural, rural, or urban districts and the proposed activities are not expressly permitted uses pursuant to the applicable county general plan and zoning ordinances, then, after receipt of a properly filed and completed application including all required supporting data, the appropriate county authority shall conduct a public hearing. Within ten days after the public hearing, the county authority may receive additional written comments on the issues raised at the public hearing from any party.

The county authority shall consider the comments raised at the hearing before rendering its final decision. The county authority shall then determine whether a geothermal resource permit shall be granted to authorize the geothermal resources development described in the application. The appropriate county authority shall grant a geothermal resource permit if it finds that the applicant has demonstrated that:

- (1) The desired uses would not have unreasonable adverse health, environmental, or socio-economic effects on residents or surrounding property;
- (2) The desired uses would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water, drainage, school improvements, and police and fire protection; and
- (3) There are reasonable measures available to mitigate the unreasonable adverse effects or burdens referred to above, which the county authority may prescribe as conditions for the proposed geothermal resources development.

Unless there is a mutual agreement to extend the proceeding, a decision shall be made on the application by the appropriate county authority within six months of the date a complete application was filed; provided that the time limit may be extended by agreement between the applicant and the appropriate county authority. The county authority shall have exclusive authority to impose reasonable restrictions and conditions for the geothermal development in support of its findings, except to the extent that the department of health and other federal and state agencies have jurisdiction to regulate such activities.

(d) For purposes of this section:

"Appropriate county authority" means the county planning commission unless the respective county's agency or body is designated by applicable provisions of the charter or by ordinance of the county council to issue development permits.

"Board" means the board of land and natural resources."

At 11:30 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:37 a.m.

Senator Ruderman moved that Floor Amendment No. 13 be adopted, seconded by Senator Thielen.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"I propose an amendment to remove references to mediation from this bill. This has to do with two paragraphs that were previously in sections 205 (b) and (c).

"As the senator from the only district with geothermal development, I am aware of some of the problems that poorly regulated planning brings. Enforced mediation proved profoundly unsuccessful in 1990. The agreements reached in mediation were violated, and the enforced mediation process is widely reviled by the community. We deserve the right to contested case hearings as every other citizen in the state. My community and I support safe geothermal development; we simply desire fair treatment and due process, resulting in a safe community just as each member desires for his or her district. Given this amendment, I can support this bill and keep the dialogue going. Thank you."

Senator Kouchi rose to make the following remarks:

"I just wanted to clarify for the members that Floor Amendment No. 10 amended section 25 to have a defective effective date. Senator Ruderman's Floor Amendment No. 13 amends section 5, so both amendments would be incorporated in the Senate draft that will be coming back for the vote. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 13 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 252, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 11, 2013.

"The bill would create a state earned income tax credit to help alleviate poverty. However, the EIC in itself would not help alleviate poverty because it only addresses the symptom and not the cause of our economic hardships in Hawai'i, which basically is our high tax and regulatory burden. It would, however, cost – as estimated by the Department of Taxation – approximately \$23 million. The state's already spending right now about \$22 million in the Federal TANF program, and fewer than half of the people that are designated as below the poverty level would actually be served by this bill.

"So, a better way to help the poor is, first of all, to reduce the income tax rate and secondly, to remove some of the impediments to people earning a decent living and having a reasonable standard of living here. Thank you."

investment climate. So, this would be a waste of taxpayers' money. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"You know, the Legislature spent a great deal of time over the last couple of years on this so-called Starlight Reserve and

in providing the money to retrofit certain lighting across the state. And then, we just learned a couple months ago that the federal government is suing the state and, in fact, may bring criminal action against the state for it not doing all the things that the federal government has requested. So I think the Legislature had made a good-faith effort to try to comply, but obviously these requirements are so restrictive and so pervasive that the state is now putting itself into a poor financial position in order to be involved in this. So, I'm going to vote against this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 471, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STARLIGHT RESERVE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

H.B. No. 1203, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"We had a committee hearing on the bill and, for the life of me, I still don't understand why the National Guard would be given precedence and preference in the selection of an adjutant general. I think that we all admire and respect what the National Guard does, but we also respect the military, the active duty military. And I guess I'm old-fashioned, but I believe that the decision for adjutant general should be made entirely upon the basis of a person's qualifications, and not give preference to one military unit over another. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1203, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE NATIONAL GUARD," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Chun Oakland, Dela Cruz, English, Green, Ige, Ihara, Kahele, Keith-Agaran, Kouchi, Nishihara, Slom, Solomon, Wakai). Noes, 1 (Thielen).

H.B. No. 619, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that H.B. No. 619, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Are we really going to be talking about birds and bird poop? I mean, really? I understand it is a problem between some people and their neighbors. It should be a personal and private problem. It should not be for the Legislature to get involved. There are people – well, as you know, we spend a great deal of time for animals and I guess this time I'm standing up for the birds (some people say I am for the birds). But I think that the idea that because one or two people have a problem with their neighbors feeding the birds and then the

birds doing what birds will do, I think that should be a problem that the neighbors should solve themselves. We also have neighborhood board mediation; we have alternatives. I don't think that we should have state law banning the feeding of birds. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 619, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FERAL BIRDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Kidani, Slom).

H.B. No. 622, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that H.B. No. 622, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"This is the so-called Journalism Shield measure. It's one of the few things that Hawai'i has done right over the years. We passed the law five years ago; it was hailed across the country as a model for legislation to protect legitimate sources of those in journalism and particularly those in the new media and electronic media. We had a thorough study of the bill by the judiciary. We had five years, as I said, to look at this measure. And the reason the bill came up again this year is because it had a sunset date; it's supposed to sunset the end of June of this year.

"The simple thing to do would be to recognize that, in fact, this is a good bill that has worked, that has the support of everyone in the fourth estate, the journalism community; they've all come together to support it. All they wanted to do was to remove the sunset date and continue the law. But in fact this version, the Senate version, is so convoluted that there've been some harsh words written about it by people in the industry who have all said that basically it would be better not to have the law than to have this version of the law.

"I'm supporting with reservations this bill in the hopes that it will go to conference and in the hopes that reason will prevail; and, as I say, we'll have one of the better pieces of legislation that's come out of this state legislature. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I understand the frustrations with so many people engaging in social media today about having responsible statements, but I'm not comfortable with the way this bill defines journalists. We're in the midst of a real change in our journalism industry and our publishing industry. We've seen newspapers collapse around the nation; magazines, even books, are going down. And we're looking for a new model across our nation. I don't think it's appropriate at this time to define a journalist as somebody who has a subscription because the Internet is deemed as free. And so we have a lot of old-time reporters who are casting about, trying to find ways to be able to report their stories and reach people, but looking at revenue sources such as advertising and the like. So I'm very uncomfortable with this definition in the bill. I hope we can come to some better accommodation in conference committee, but I need to vote 'no' on this measure. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm going to make a couple comments and thank the Judiciary Committee – particularly the staff of the Judiciary Committee – for working hard on this issue.

"I think it's important to note that over the last five years, there has been only one case where the shield was used, and in that one case it happened to be a documentarian who asserted his right not to divulge his source on the presumption that his documentary was accurate. Because of the shield, no effort was made to identify the source, and the presumption that his documentary is accurate is just that: a presumption.

"There have been a lot of self-serving comments recently and various iterations of so-called journalists. Regardless of the iterations, the history is clear, so let me read and enter into the record the opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States, who said: 'The prevailing view is that the press is not free to publish with impunity everything and anything it desires to publish. Although it may deter or regulate what is said or published, the press may not circulate knowing and reckless falsehoods damaging to private reputation without subjecting itself to liability for damages, including punitive damages, or even criminal prosecution.' The Supreme Court of the United States also said that it decided in *Branzburg* that 'there is no First Amendment privilege protecting journalists from appearing before a grand jury, or from testifying before a grand jury [...] or otherwise providing evidence to a grand jury, regardless of any confidence promised by the reporter to any source. The Highest Court has spoken and never revisited the question. Without doubt, this is the end of the matter.'

"Many things were said at the public hearing. I would like to point out that the representation made by Jeff Portnoy in that the Judiciary Committee on the Rules of Evidence had unanimously – unanimously – agreed is in fact incorrect because the Deputy Attorney General Deirdre Marie-Iha informed the committee that in fact what Mr. Portnoy said was untrue. And when asked by one of the members of the committee how did she know, she responded, 'Because I was a member of the committee and I voted "no."'

"Many things have been said. The fact of the matter is this bill represents the recommendations of the attorney general. This bill represents the recommendations of the Judiciary Committee on the Rules of Evidence. This bill represents the assistance and help of the American Civil Liberties Union. This bill tightens up definitions. It does not continue with reckless regard to undefine the territories of what is, and what is not, privileged information. This bill relies on the judgment, not once, not twice, but three times, of the United States Supreme Court.

"And this isn't the end of the road. Presently, in Denver, a reporter is trying her best to prevent the identity of two law enforcement officers who tipped a Fox News reporter of information that allegedly the gunman of the theater shooting had in a notebook that was then disclosed. We will find out very shortly that this information, whether or not it needs to be disclosed, shall be disclosed. But clearly, the reckless abandon of so-called journalists is limited by this effort by the Judiciary and Labor Committee. Thank you."

Senator Ihara requested his vote be cast "Aye with Reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

At 11:58 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 a.m.

Senator Slom rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"First of all, the fact that there was only one case involving this law in five years actually should be interpreted that the law works and that there have been no excesses.

"In terms of reckless disregard, reckless abandon: certainly even on free speech there are limitations. That's always been

recognized; it still is recognized. It does not, however, impact our Hawai'i law.

"Thirdly, the citing of the U.S. Supreme Court case, the Branzburg case, has been pointed out that in fact that case is not on point, does not affect whatsoever the real details of this particular Hawai'i law, and there is a differentiation that gives no shield or no protection to any journalist in criminal matters.

"So, I would urge my colleagues to support the measure in conference to make sure that in fact we have a good bill, and a bill that is not one that seeks to throttle and silence free speech and a free journalism industry in Hawai'i. Thank you."

Now you know, we did really well up until last year; we didn't seem to have any problem whatsoever, and people know the difference between an 'A' and an 'M' and a 'Z.' What this bill would do is set up a convoluted process to try and determine by lot how the names are supposed to be on the ballot.

"Now if I were a cynical person, I would suggest that perhaps it had something to do with the fact that this last time, the presidential candidate Mr. Obama appeared in non-alphabetical order after Mr. Romney on the ballot, and he still got 72 percent of the vote. Perhaps if he been in the right place he would have gotten 82 percent of the vote; I don't know. All I do know is the problem is with the Chief Elections Officer and the Office of Elections, who couldn't even deliver ballots and denied people the right to vote. That's the problem – not how to determine the alphabetical listing. Thank you, Madam President."

I think our public workers are doing a good job, but I think that they – like private workers – should be extremely happy and fortunate that, in fact, they have a job and that the taxpayers can afford to pay them. The idea of having an additional salary increase, I think, is inappropriate. Thank you."

"We have discussed this bill for years; we have discussed this bill in various committees. What it comes down to is denying religious freedom and denying individuals the choice not to participate in a particular program. If we did not have additional resources or facilities, if it was extremely difficult to get anything like this, that would be one issue, but that is not the issue. The issue is it's an all-out assault on religious freedom. Thank you."

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd just like to say that I personally believe that any woman anywhere who gets sexually assaulted should have the right to have compassionate care completely and have complete access to health care no matter what that means. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"What we're talking about is emergency room care; this is not a denial of religious freedom. What this is is the right for a woman to obtain emergency care to respond to a horrific event in her life.

"I have had friends who have gone through this. I have young daughters. I want to make sure that when they are taken to a hospital – if that horrible event ever happens to them – that they can obtain the care that they need at that hospital in the emergency room.

"This bill respects the rights of everyone, and I ask for people to support it; and I would also like to give thanks to former State Representative Marilyn Lee for all the work that she's done to bring us to this day. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to request that the previous speaker's remarks be entered in the Journal as her own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only). Senator Baker also requested that additional remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB411 HD2 Relating to Hospital Emergency Compassionate Care for Sexual Assault Victims. This is a measure we have tried for years to pass and it is about time that we provide the standard of care to any victim of sex assault. HB411 HD2 makes sure that female sexual assault victims are provided with medically and factually accurate, unbiased information about and access to emergency contraception at all Hawai'i hospital emergency rooms when they go for help after being sexually assaulted. This measure will require that all victims receive the standard of medical care they deserve. By fully informing patients of their options in dealing with potential outcomes of a sexual assault, we are empowering these women and returning to them the control over their own bodies and destiny.

"We cannot allow personal beliefs, religious or otherwise, to trump a patient's right to receive appropriate emergency medical care. The American Medical Association and the Hawaii Medical Association have stated that emergency contraception is not an abortion pill, and should be offered as part of standard medical care after sexual assault. It can only prevent pregnancy. If it were able to harm an established pregnancy, it would never have been made available by the FDA without a prescription.

"Sexual assault victims have been through a horrible trauma. What if the victim was your mother, sister, wife, child, or loved one? The idea of denying victims the care they need is just plain wrong and it is another assault on their person. Further, transferring a patient to another emergency room prolongs the trauma that they are already going through. The ability of emergency contraception to prevent pregnancy is highly time sensitive. We must give victims the support and care they need at this critical time.

"Opponents have suggested an amendment would be appropriate to allow the initial hospital, because of religious objections, to transfer the victim by ambulance to another emergency facility to receive comprehensive treatment including emergency contraception, incurring all costs rather than treat the patient in a timely manner. Ambulances that transfer patients between hospitals are needed for sick or injured patients whose transfer is medically appropriate. Those patients who need such a transfer often wait hours for a transfer ambulance to become available. It is an abuse of a precious resource, no matter who pays, to use an ambulance to shuttle a

patient to another facility because of religious beliefs. Such a delay would further traumatize the sex assault victim.

“Colleagues, I urge you to vote yes on HB411 and require all hospitals to provide the standard of care for sexual assault victims. It is the pono, just and compassionate thing to do. Mahalo.”

I still oppose it becoming permanent, particularly since in the past we have learned of abuses made of products and services used under the exemption. Thank you.”

Senator Ihara requested his vote be cast “Aye with Reservations,” and the Chair so ordered.

My fear is, again, today that with the increase in unemployment compensation taxes already, with this addition to that addition, you’re going to have businesses paying more money and you’re going to have a few entities that will take advantage of this – use the money not for training, but also for administrative expenses. So, I think it’s a wrong use of this particular fund. Thank you.”

“We’re seeing now, as we saw with the announcement with HMSA, that they’re going to be raising the cost of premiums on

small business holders by 8.5 percent July 1st, and they attribute it to the Affordable Care Act. We're also going to see that the promises made that premiums go down are not true; that people can keep their own doctor – not true; that they still will be able to keep their own medical – not true.

“So what we should do – we had a program that worked for 40 years, the Hawai'i Prepaid Care Act – we should use our independence and speak up if we're really concerned about patients and costs and transformation. Transformation is not going to come from this federal act. Thank you.”

We need long term care, but we don't need yet another program that the taxpayers have to subsidize, or pay for entirely, and another mandated program which means to me that if we can't educate the public and we can't make our case that it's important, mandating and making something compulsory is the wrong way to go. Thank you.”

“But having instant registration on the day of election is not going to cure that problem and, in fact, there is no oversight for that instant registration. Certainly we can get more people to vote, but are they citizens? Are they qualified? Do they have identification? We don't have those requirements; it's just, ‘Let people register the day of voting.’

“We make it really easy in Hawai'i with absentee voting, walk-in voting, early voting – we've got all kinds of options. What we don't have is a system that actually can deliver ballots and actually do the one thing that they're supposed to do every two years, and that is guarantee that we have a fair election. Other states that have used this instant registration have also told us that they have problems in terms of security and fraud and other difficulties. I think we can certainly study something like this, but in order to pass this it is premature without oversight. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"Madam President, I support this bill with reservations, and the reservations again have to do with both privacy and with the security of data. We've seen that federal agencies and, here in our own state, state agencies have not done an adequate job of protecting data. So, while we certainly should be looking in the direction of more open data and easily achievable transfer of information, we also can't overlook oversight and security, and that is lacking in this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1371 was adopted and H.B. No. 632, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPEN DATA," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Dela Cruz, Hee).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1372 (H.B. No. 775, H.D. 2, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1372 be adopted and H.B. No. 775, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"Yes, Madam President, I'm supporting the bill with strong reservations. This is the annual bill to pay off people that sue the state. In some cases, I think it probably is justified; in other cases, it is questionable. I think that this is a bill, by the way, that moves throughout the Legislature and the numbers keep changing; they keep going up. Right now, I believe that the amount is somewhere around \$26-27 million that the state has to pay. Of that amount, \$14 million has to do with back compensation to the substitute teachers that won a lawsuit against the state. Many of us supported those substitute teachers years ago when they sought that money that was due them. However, the \$14 million may not be the end of this because if court costs and attorneys' fees are counted in against the state – and that decision is pending – then we are probably talking about another \$10-15 million.

"In addition to that, one of the amounts in this bill for settlement is \$5.3 million to settle the sexual molestation of children at the Hawaii State School for the Deaf and Blind.

There was a rapid settlement in this case, and one of the reasons is because all of the details have been sealed. I made a request to the attorney general's office to get a copy of the report that's been done and was denied.

"I think it's important that this Legislature looks a little bit more deeply into what happened at that school and if there are any consequences other than the taxpayers being asked to pay \$5.3 million. That's inappropriate. That's outrageous. We also understand now that the Hawaii State School for the Deaf and Blind is no longer there. It is only the Hawaii State School for the Deaf, that the DOE has taken over directly the instruction of blind with instructors and so forth.

"We need to know what's happening with our own state facilities. Too easily and too often, someone comes in here and asks for more money and we give them money. It's not our money; it's the taxpayers' money, and we have responsibilities for oversight. And I'm saying particularly in this case with this school, with what happened over a period of years, that it's not just the right thing to pay off somebody and move on.

"So, I'm understanding that we have to pay certain claims, and that's why I'm supporting this bill with reservations, but I urge my colleagues to be much more critical of this and other payouts. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1372 was adopted and H.B. "You know, we've had loan programs before, and we have another program which is a subsidy for feed coming up. We're not helping the agricultural industry, which we say is so important.

"First of all, we pave over prime agricultural lands. We don't go through all of the environmental or zoning processes. And

then we say the real answer is if we just make more loans available to farmers, and that doesn't solve anything because that loan is a debt. It's got to be paid back. It doesn't do anything to lower the cost of goods. It doesn't do anything to encourage farmers. It doesn't do anything to make our farmers more competitive.

"So, I think we've got to reach a point when we say – just like we do with other small businesses – what is the real problem that we have, why we have fewer farmers today, and why they have so many problems that we don't address. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"How nice it must be to live in east Honolulu and not know a damn thing about agriculture loans. I cannot tell you how many cattlemen are dependent on loans; otherwise, there's no meat to eat. This pontification of what's wrong with agriculture, and 'we' not doing a thing about agriculture, is misplaced. This loan program will assist farmers – genuine farmers – and livestock operators in continuing their business that feeds us. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1379 was adopted and H.B. No. 1264, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LOANS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"I'd like to 'pontificate' that this again is asking the taxpayers to support something. We ask them all of the time because we don't have any money of our own here, and what we're asking them to do is to fund politicians, fund elections. I think taxpayers are overburdened enough with electric costs, water costs, sewer costs, health care costs, food costs, transportation costs. To ask them to subsidize politicians does not guarantee we're going to get better politicians; we'll just get the same politicians, in most cases, who don't have to use their own money or raise their own money. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1382 was adopted and H.B. No. 1481, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"There's no question that we have a problem at the university with maintenance and repairs backlogged for over \$450 million. Part of that is because of the high salaries and the administrative overload and the lack of priorities at the university. But I'm voting against the bill primarily because it establishes a new special fund: the major repairs and replacement special fund. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1394 was adopted and H.B. No. 115, H.D. 3, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 1 (Galuteria).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1397 (H.B. No. 450, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1397 be adopted and H.B. No. 450, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This bill would require the taxpayers to support a program of hydrogen fueling stations. Now, we've already got the state involved in electric fueling stations and we have electric vehicles. As far as the hydrogen industry, I remember that Senator Hemmings and I spoke about this many years ago. It was premature then, and since that period of time, I think we've learned that probably we're not going to be going in a major direction for hydrogen refueling. And one of the reasons for that, as I was told by a chemist, is that if we're concerned about

clean energy, as we always say we are, and we're concerned about the green environment and carbon emissions that the number one component of carbon emissions is not carbon dioxide, but in fact is water vapor. And water vapor is the primary component of hydrogen, and so therefore we would be hurting the environment by doing this. So for those reasons, and the fact that we're talking about an initial outlay of \$7 million, I'm voting 'no.' Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1397 was adopted and H.B. No. 450, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HYDROGEN FUELING STATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1398 (H.B. No. 487, H.D. 2, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1398 be adopted and H.B. No. 487, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I support the section in this bill about the livestock feed subsidy, but there's also provisions in this bill that authorize the Department of Agriculture to lease or dispose of lands to the Agribusiness Development Corporation.

"I hope as we move into conference committee the discussion is to request the departments to come back to the Legislature with a plan about which lands are appropriate to be managed by ADC and which agricultural lands are appropriate to be managed by the Department of Agriculture. Otherwise, what we're going to end up with is piecemeal management of our agricultural lands between DLNR, DOA, and ADC, and I think it'd be preferable for this legislature to seek a policy call from the administration before we grant authority for the transfers. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Again, this is an agricultural subsidy bill, and it seeks to expand a feed subsidy to goats, sheep, lambs, fish, and crustaceans. There's no question that the cost of feed for agriculture is extremely expensive in Hawai'i, but again, just subsidizing the high cost is not going to solve the problem.

"There is a proposal, of course, to produce feed locally, but to me I would rather see the operation. It's akin to the discussion we've had for the last five or six years about how we're going to have ethanol production here utilizing sugar lands. We have not had that, have nothing in sight, and yet again we're asking taxpayers to subsidize these programs. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1398 was adopted and H.B. No. 487, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, Ruderman, Thielen, Wakai). Noes, 2 (Gabbard, Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1400 (H.B. No. 634, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1400 be adopted and H.B. No. 634, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This is probably the baddest of the bad of this year because what this bill would do would be to further damage the already damaged Hawai'i business and investment climate. This bill would require that if a business were sold that the successor employer must – *must* – rehire or retain every employee. In the past we've had sales of businesses and most employees, in fact, were retained on a voluntary basis. To force an employer to do this would jeopardize the sale of businesses and also the purchase of businesses.

"Last week, some of you may have seen the report that came out of the organization Thumbtack.com. It was: 'Hawaii Small Business Friendliness: A 2013 Report.' It's done by Thumbtack.com and the Kauffman Foundation:

For 'overall friendliness' in our business climate, Hawai'i gets a grade of 'F.'
Ease of starting a business: F.
Ease of hiring: F.
Regulations: F.
Health and safety: F.
Employment, labor, and hiring: F.
Tax code: F.
Licensing: F.
Environmental: D.
Zoning: F.
Training and networking programs: D.

"We are already damaged. We are not doing the things that we need to do to have economic development, to increase revenues by having existing businesses expand. Instead, we're seeing more and more of them close down, and we're not attracting new businesses because of our business climate. This bill further sends the message, 'Don't do business in Hawai'i.' I urge my colleagues to vote this bill down. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1400 was adopted and H.B. No. 634, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 16; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, English, Espero, Kahele, Kidani, Kim, Kouchi, Shimabukuro, Solomon). Noes, 9 (Chun Oakland, Gabbard, Green, Ihara, Nishihara, Ruderman, Slom, Thielen, Wakai).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1401 (H.B. No. 152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1401 be adopted and H.B. No. 152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"In our committee, Ways and Means, the other day and in previous committees, we've discussed what the problems are for our rising health care costs, the lack of doctors, physicians, and particularly specialists – and particularly on the neighbor islands – and we also talked about the number of things that we need to do to try to improve prompt care for injured workers under workers' compensation.

"I made the point that I've been involved in one way or another with workers' compensation issues in this state for more than three decades. I have not seen it change. All I've seen change is the injured workers are still unhappy because they're not getting treatment. The doctors are leaving because of the costs and the regulations. Businesses bear the brunt of the costs of some of the highest workers' comp premiums in the country. I don't know whether just adjusting the fee schedule

from 120 percent to 150 percent is going to solve many problems. My belief is it probably will not because we have other systemic problems.

“But again, to just go and say, ‘Let’s have yet another study,’ – there’s been five studies already. They all point to basically the same thing. I have a great deal of confidence in the legislative auditor, but how much more, or new, information can we find? We haven’t done anything innovative. The Department of Labor hasn’t done anything. We just talk about this issue over and over again, and that’s why workers get frustrated, the employers get frustrated.

“One suggestion I would make with this bill, if you’re going to pass it, that at least you require that the report, the legislative auditor’s study report, be presented to the Legislature 20 days prior to its opening in 2015. We don’t have that in this present version. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Ige rose to announce a meeting with the members of the Committee on Ways and Means to discuss upcoming conference committee meetings.

Senator Baker rose to inform the members about Equal Pay Day 2013, and highlighted the disparity in earnings between men and women and Hawai’i’s progress towards closing the gap. Senator Baker also announced that the Hawai’i Health Connector had recently received \$128 million in federal funding to ensure its timely launch on October 1 and seamless integration with the Department of Human Services.

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Just to follow up on the equal pay parity: I would like to open up the offer to all the male senators in the Senate. If you would like to help correct this egregious situation and dedicate 20 percent of your salary to your sisters, I’m sure we would accept it and that would help show some solidarity towards equal pay. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“On behalf of Senator Green and myself, we wanted to note that Hilo was abuzz last week with dance and festivities, and Senator Green had asked me if I would make the announcement that on behalf of 24 members of your Senate that we congratulate the overall winner of the Merrie Monarch Festival: Howell ‘Chinky’ Mahoe. Thank you.”

Senator Baker noted that Miss Aloha Hula 2013 and the runner-up were both from Maui, and that Miss Aloha Hula may be a relative of Senator English as they have the same last name.

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Now, let me extend the congratulations of the Senate to my family, Miss Aloha Hula. She is from Maui and is a distant relative. I can tell you exactly how we’re related: my great-grandfather and her great-great-grandfather are brothers. So congratulations, and Maui is very, very proud of Miss Aloha Hula 2013. Thank you.”

I want to enter into the record my response to Mr. Portnoy that all of you have received as well.

“Evidently, Mr. Portnoy can’t seem to bring himself to grips with the fact that his testimony before the Committee on Judiciary and Labor was not entirely accurate. He was one of the first to testify, if not the first, and as he is prone to do, he blathered on about his role as a media attorney in the commission on blathering. Mr. Portnoy said that the Judiciary Committee on Rules of Evidence had unanimously adopted the proposition that the Shield Law should be adopted by the Legislature by removing the sunset date. In fact, that’s not accurate, and he was put in his place by none other than the Deputy Attorney General who followed, Deirdre Marie-Iha, who testified and said that Mr. Portnoy’s remarks on the Judiciary Committee on Rules of Evidence was untrue. Whereupon she was asked by the minority member, ‘How would she know?’ To which she responded directly, ‘I was a member of the committee, the Judiciary Committee on Rules of Evidence, and I voted “No.”’

“Now maybe this is a small thing; evidently it would appear so to Mr. Portnoy. But there’s a huge difference between unanimous and not unanimous, and to represent something to the Committee on Judiciary and Labor that is not true is inappropriate, and his impertinent comment was noted. I raise this issue because the self-serving industry has been very active to protect their interests, which I personally believe to be vague and overly broad.

“I would note here that you have added the majority policy leader to the conference – and I note this only because he voted ‘with reservations’ – whereupon I asked you, upon learning of that addition, because he asked you – not me, you – that I asked that the Chair of the Committee on Energy also be added so that there’s an odd number on this conference committee. So what we have here is the entire Committee on Judiciary and Labor serving as conferees. There’s no rule against it, but it is out of the ordinary. There is a reasonable expectation that the conferees assigned to this conference, as well as all others, would represent the interest of the Senate position. There is an expectation that that will be done, and I promise you that if that is not done, I shall ask you to take appropriate action. Thank you.”

Senator Taniguchi moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of BARRY MIZUNO to the University of Hawaii Board of Regents, term to expire June 30, 2018 (Gov. Msg. No. 712), seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Barry Mizuno is a current member of the Board of Regents at the University of Hawai'i, serving since his appointment in August 2011. He is chair of the Planning and Facilities

Committee; he is vice chair of the Committee on University Audits, and is a member of the Committee on Community Colleges and on the Budget and Finance Committee. He's a Certified Public Accountant and only recently retired. He is very aware of the various concerns raised by the Senate Special Committee on Accountability regarding the oversight, transparency, and accountability of the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents. The Board of Regents and the University of Hawai'i System will benefit from Mr. Mizuno's continued service. I ask my colleagues to support this nomination."

Senator Ruderman requested his vote be cast "No," and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"I rise in opposition to the nomination. Thank you. It's with regret that I do so because the nominee, I think, is qualified in so many ways, in so many areas, and he has volunteered and has served the University of Hawai'i. The problem is he has been a regent since August of 2011. There have been many critical decisions and 'mis-decisions' made by the University of Hawai'i, particularly the Board of Regents, which has had the responsibility to make changes and to follow its own policy.

"The questions that we had in the Higher Education Committee, they were very pointed questions, and basically they're the same questions that I've asked of every nominee, and that is: their ability to be independent, to be able to speak up and speak out. And particularly when you have a member of the Board of Regents who had a responsible position, a leadership position, and an obligation to speak out, I feel that we're very... I guess we're short-changed when we don't get all the leadership that we need, and particularly those of us in the Senate when we advise and consent to the nomination.

"It's not just about the personality or the integrity of the individual because that's not in question here. It's not about the willingness to serve and the ability to serve, but it is a question of making changes at the University of Hawai'i so desperately needed, and I'm just not sure that this message has gotten through to this nominee. Thank you."

Senator Kaele rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I've known Mr. Mizuno for many years and his extensive work experience in government. And the fact that he has served as a Board of Regent and his awareness of the situation at the University of Hawai'i. His continuation as a Board of Regent will be an asset for the university, and I believe that is in the best interest for our local students and he will work hard to improve the entire University of Hawai'i System. Thank you very much."

Senator Ige requested his vote be cast "Aye with Reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

"WHEREAS, First Lieutenant John Kuulei Kauhahao led his platoon over thick jungle terrain at the point of their company when a battalion-sized force of North Vietnamese soldiers occupying bunker fortifications fired upon their platoon; and

"WHEREAS, First Lieutenant (Infantry) John Kuulei Kauhahao quickly directed his men to take cover behind several large, bamboo-covered dirt mounds and, as the rest of the company moved up to lend supporting fire to the pinned-down point element, the enemy in flanking bunkers unleashed a flurry of crossfire; and

“WHEREAS, seizing upon a momentary lull in the exchange of fire, First Lieutenant John Kuulei Kauhahao hacked an opening through the bamboo growing on the dirt mound and took cover; and

“WHEREAS, in the next 15 minutes, First Lieutenant (Infantry) John Kuulei Kauhahao hurled more than 30 hand grenades through this opening at the enemy bunkers and drew enemy fire upon himself so that his men could sight enemy gunners and bring the enemy under suppressive fire; and

“WHEREAS, after directing the withdrawal of his battered point element, First Lieutenant John Kuulei Kauhahao crawled over 100 meters of fire-swept terrain, dragged vital equipment to the rear, and helped wounded soldiers to a position of safety; and

“WHEREAS, while rejoining his men to the company’s main force, First Lieutenant (Infantry) John Kuulei Kauhahao sighted an enemy squad moving up on his tattered platoon, and as he advanced to engage the approaching enemy, First Lieutenant John Kuulei Kauhahao was mortally wounded by enemy fire.”

“Colleagues, Hawai‘i has many sons and daughters who have been in the military, and who have been in many positions such as our First Lieutenant. We are asking Congress to look at his situation and to consider him for the Congressional Medal of Honor; we believe he has earned it, he has paid the ultimate sacrifice, and this is an honor that we should certainly support, and I ask for your vote on this measure. Thank you very much.”

He created the Year of the Hawaiian Forest calendar for the State of Hawai’i in 2003. He is a member of the Hawaiian Trail and Mountain Club, Sierra Club of Hawai’i, and Hawai’i Audubon Society.

“Your Committee notes the following excerpt from the nominee’s personal statement: ‘I’d like to be on the Natural Area Reserves Commission to help save rare and endangered native Hawaiian plants and animals. For the past 15 years I have been an amateur naturalist/hiker/photographer/blogger where I have hiked to remote parts of the islands to photograph and blog about these unique creatures . . . Hawai’i is known as the extinction capitol of the world. The NARS Commission can play a big part in reversing this unenviable distinction.’”

Remarks on Legislative Petition to the State House and Senate

For our democracy to work, citizens must be able to participate in the legislative process in a fair and orderly manner. Legislators who use practices such as “gut and replace” or adding unrelated provisions to a bill to create a “Frankenstein” bill do a disservice to members of the public and each other.

Our State Constitution specifically provides for a public hearing for each bill in each house of the legislature so that members of the public can participate in the legislative process in a clear, unambiguous fashion. How can our democracy work if members of the legislature amend bills to replace the original bill with unrelated material or add unrelated material to an existing bill? This makes it impossible for the public to review, understand and comment on the measures, especially when hearings are skipped altogether.

The League of Women Voters, Common Cause and other civic organizations have complained about these techniques for many years. But it is now easier for voters to recognize when our elected representatives engage in these tactics, so we will all be ramping up our advocacy. It would be far better if our Senate and House adopted rules that reflect our State Constitution (or better yet a Constitutional amendment) to avoid such distortion of our democratic process.

In addition, this bill allows child care programs licensed by the U.S. Department of Defense to be exempt from licensing by DHS. DHS does not have jurisdiction over child care programs located on federal property, and the licensing and certification standards of the federal memo exceed the local standards. So, there was just an effective date placed as July 2, 2014. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1106, S.D. 2, and S.B. SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 908, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by redesignating part VIII as part X, renumbering sections 14, 15, and 16 contained therein as sections 18, 19, and 20, respectively, and amending the newly designated sections 19 and 20 to read as follows:

“SECTION 19. Funds appropriated or authorized by parts II to VII of this Act that are not expended or encumbered by June 30, 2013, shall lapse as of that date; provided that funds appropriated or authorized by parts VIII and IX of this Act that are not expended or encumbered by June 30, 2014, and June 30, 2015, of the respective fiscal years, shall lapse as of those dates.

SECTION 20. This Act shall take effect upon its approval; provided that parts VIII and IX shall take effect on July 1, 2013.”

Senator Hee moved that Floor Amendment No. 14 be adopted, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Yes, I believe you were advised that there are some issues that we have been dealt with, with respect to making appropriations for bargaining cost items that may have been left out. As a result, in our conversation with the chairman of Ways and Means, we concluded that Floor Amendment No. 14 needed to be considered for adoption by the Senate.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 14 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Hee then moved that the Conf. Com. Rep. No. 155 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ige and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 908, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING COST ITEMS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 2, 2013.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 105 (H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 105 be adopted and H.B. No. 200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“First of all, I would like to thank all of the members of Ways and Means for their patience and input as we considered the executive budget. I also would like to thank all of the senators as each and every one had contributed some part to the final product that stands before us.

“The House of Representatives and the Senate approached development of the budget from different perspectives. The House was very conservative with the allocation of resources. The Senate was cautious but strategic in the development of the budget, able to provide more funding for important programs under the Council of Revenues’ most recent general fund revenue projections.

“This conference draft is the product of the open and collaborative work of the House and the Senate. I thank the chair of Finance, the House Speaker, and their members for their earnest efforts, too, during this process.

“Madam President, I also appreciate the support and guidance you have provided throughout the course of this session. Of course, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the hard work of WAM’s vice chair and her assistance in the final product. And again, all of the members, I do want to thank you for your patience as we worked through the budget document.

“This budget builds a solid financial base for the state as the economy recovers and expands. While this draft of the budget reduces the executive request by \$253 million in general funds, we are still able to make important strategic investments in our community.

“In developing this budget, we continued to adhere to the following principles: support the state’s core functions, including programs that provide services for those most in need. Two, make strategic investments in people and programs that encourage economic growth and lower future costs and improve the state’s resiliency and ability to exist long term. And third, support long-term planning and accountability efforts to fundamentally change the character and delivery of government services.

“Controlling the increase of state government expenditures has allowed us to assure that funds are available in the financial plan to provide for the collective bargaining costs; as we all know, we have asked state employees over the last four years to share in the fiscal burden. Two, make payments for future liabilities; we do believe we have a commitment to those who have earned their entitlements. Three, provide tax relief and tax incentives in targeted areas. And four, recapitalize the reserve funds.

“We continue to support recapitalization of the Emergency Budget and Reserve Fund and the Hurricane Relief Fund to

ensure that the state has adequate reserves. I wanted to take a moment to talk about unfunded liabilities and OPEB. This budget provides \$217 million over the fiscal biennium to begin making payments to prefund other post-employment benefits.

“Over the past several years, the state has made significant progress in addressing the unfunded liability of the employee retirement system. The appropriation of funds to prefund OPEB and the passage of H.B. No. 546 sets a solid framework for future payments, which will demonstrate the legislature’s commitment to address the unfunded liability of the Employee Union Trust Fund. And Madam President, if I would say, this is the first in the nation of making a commitment and establishing a schedule to ensure that the unfunded liability that the health fund proposes will be taken up first and foremost. Paying down our unfunded liabilities will be a priority, and no longer left to the discretion of employers. All state and county employers will pay 100 percent of the annual required contribution for OPEB within six years.

“The executive budget is the largest component of the state general fund financial plan. Instead of increasing any broad-based tax, we have exerted control over growth in the budget so that resources are available to address the issues the budget document does not encompass.

“The executive budget request would add about \$1.2 billion in general funds over the upcoming fiscal biennium. Much of this amount is nondiscretionary in nature. It is items such as labor restoration costs, debt service, health premiums, retirement benefits, Medicaid, federal sequestration mitigation, and the state’s first payments for the unfunded liability that amount to about \$900 million of the \$1.2 billion request, nearly three quarters of the governor’s asks. This draft of the executive budget supports the payment of these necessary costs and other high priority items, yet still reduces the general fund budget request by the governor by more than \$253 million.

“I would like to highlight a couple of the important investments that we make, and first and foremost besides the OPEB liability, we begin the transformation of the state’s information technology infrastructure. Madam President, we learned firsthand how investments in IT personnel and infrastructure allows the State Senate to provide more enhanced services at reduced costs. We believe that this kind of investment is critical to enable all of state government to do the same. This budget provides more than \$130 million to begin that IT transformation for state government. This includes \$33 million for the Office of Information Management and Technology to modernize the state’s IT infrastructure; \$5.6 million for the tax modernization system; \$32 million in GO bonds for that same tax system modernization; also includes \$48 million in general obligation bonds for the enterprise resource planning system statewide; as well as another \$12 million in GO bonds for enterprise IT infrastructure – in total, more than \$130 million. I think this is a critical investment to move the state forward.

“I’m going to end my remarks here as I know that some of the other chairs might want to talk about the budget a little in their areas. In total, the budget provides \$6 billion in FY14 and \$6.1 billion for FY15 in general funds, and \$11.8 billion in FY14 and \$12.0 billion in FY15 across all means of financing. I strongly encourage all of my colleagues to support this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This past session has been an interesting one to say the least. I say this because of how different this year has been from the last several, in which the state was dealing with the economic crisis that gripped our economy and affected the

entire nation. In the last few years, the creation of the CIP budget was driven in large part by the need for us to keep in step, to provide that shot in the arm, that boost, to get things rolling again. The thought then was to get people back to work, to maintain and improve what we already had, while planning for the future needs of our state.

“Now, thankfully, our economy is slowly improving and we have a job market – especially in the construction industry – that is rebounding.

“I said earlier that this has been an interesting year. In some ways, the prioritization and vetting process done for the CIP budget was more difficult than in past years. This bill will fund thousands of worthwhile and critically needed projects; projects that will impact the lives of our residents now and for many years to come. However, this bill is not perfect. There are projects, while valuable, while needed, while important for our state, we were not able to fund this year. These decisions we asked were made after doing our due diligence, being thoughtful, careful, and mindful of our responsibilities.

“H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 proposes a CIP budget for fiscal biennium 2013-2015 in the amount of just over \$3 billion, of which \$1.36 billion is funded by general obligation or reimbursable bonds. We will continue the progress made in renovating, repairing, and maintaining existing state-owned facilities to utilize our current resources and reduce general fund expenditures in the future.

“The CD proposes nearly \$400 million to fund these types of projects for the Department of Education, the Department of Health’s Waimano Ridge facility, Hawai’i Health System Corporation’s network of hospitals, and hundreds of other projects in the UH System, DLNR, and DAGS.

“We also looked at previous requests to fund aging infrastructure to move people, goods, and materials which have been in disrepair or unusable. To address this, we focused considerably on transportation. The basics: repairing our highways, expanding our harbors, and renovating and modernizing our airports. Approximately \$1.2 billion is appropriated for the Department of Transportation for projects, such as \$70 million for the expansion of Kona International Airport to meet the requirements of increasing visitor arrivals. Another \$140 million is included for Honolulu International Airport for improvements and upgrades for the main gateway to our state.

“We are also supporting increased capacity at our harbors statewide to handle the import and export of goods and products, as well as dozens of highway improvements and bridge repairs. These projects will continue the process of addressing the declining conditions of our highways and transportation infrastructure.

“Another priority was to designate appropriations for projects needed to address future capacity needs and economic growth. H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 includes \$38.2 million to build an Advanced Technology and Science Center at Honolulu Community College and \$11.8 million for a dedicated facility for the Allied Health program at UH West O’ahu.

“Additionally, funding for the renovation and expansion of the Foreign Trade Zone facility was included to keep this business incubator functional. We also appropriated \$18.4 million for ‘Ewa Makai Middle School to complete the campus and reduce overcrowding of schools in the ‘Ewa plain.

“There is always much talk about keeping agricultural land in agriculture, and an opportunity arose to purchase over 20,000 acres of Dole Foods agricultural land on the North Shore of O’ahu. The Senate included \$175 million in revenue bonds and

\$12.5 million in GO bonds to take advantage of this opportunity.

“This bill also invests in the state’s aging and obsolete IT infrastructure by appropriating over \$130 million for informational systems to begin the process of creating a statewide information network, streamline tax collections, maintain and share critical health information, as well as provide for a secure communication network for the islands. One of these is the Transpacific Cable Project. By 2015, the state will be close to reaching full capacity of its existing broadband network. In addition, Hawai‘i is being bypassed as a vital communication hub in the Pacific. This project will begin to address these concerns and move Hawai‘i to the forefront in telecommunications technology.

“In closing, I would like to thank Senate President Kim, WAM Chair David Ige and his staff, as well as our counterparts in the House for their support and hard work in crafting this CIP budget. I believe we all look forward to the positive impact this budget will have on our state. Mahalo.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz’s remarks read as follows:

“I would like to thank the joint-conference committees on finalizing the state budget ahead of schedule. It is always a tremendous task to come to an agreement recognizing we have to be both fiscally cautious and responsible without jeopardizing the well-being of our communities, our people, our state.

“Big gains were made for both agriculture and economic development. We were able to approve \$175 million in revenue bonds to purchase approximately 20,000 acres of agricultural lands and an additional \$12.5 million to purchase industrial agricultural facilities, warehouses, office space, and additional farmland. I want to express my thanks to the vice chair of the Committee on Ways and Means for her continued support of our local agriculture industry and all of her assistance throughout this legislative session with securing the monies.

“Furthermore, we made a commitment to the future of Hawai‘i by investing \$6 million in future startup companies and entrepreneurs. Recognizing the challenges of raising startup capital, the legislature put forward a plan to support and foster the growth of our local businesses which will assist in diversifying our economy.

“As we continue to address our state’s challenges, our unfunded liabilities, and providing critical public services, we must engage in other ways of providing funding as our current resources, such as general funds, become scarce. We need to look at alternatives, such as public-private partnerships. We must continue to be fiscally cautious and responsible yet fulfilling our commitment to our communities, providing jobs and workforce housing, supporting our local farmers, diversifying our economy – encouraging economic growth – while lowering future costs and reversing the brain drain.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Madam President, members, I’d like to first express my gratitude and thanks to the chair and vice chair and members of the Ways and Means Committee, and indeed the whole Senate, for passing an excellent transportation budget. As previously mentioned, altogether we’ve allocated \$1.2 billion for transportation, and as previously mentioned by the vice chair of

the committee, this \$1.2 billion will go to many of our needed projects in all of our districts throughout all of Hawai‘i.

“And in fact, some of the things that we have not addressed squarely before – bridge replacement and bridge fortification, making sure our bridges can handle the loads – will be dealt with in this budget.

“Also dealing with our harbors: many of you understand that we have a ‘just in time’ delivery system; in other words, the goods arrive at our ports, they come off the ships, and they go right into our system. If our ports back up, our entire delivery system fails, and we’re at that critical point where if we don’t put some attention into our harbors, we’re going to have higher prices, we’re going to have goods backed up in ships waiting to offload. So that’s why we’ve moved the harbors modernization projects a few years ago, and we’ve reauthorized a number of them in this budget. Altogether, 13 state harbors will need to be worked on in order to ensure that goods and services continue to flow freely in this state, and this budget goes a long way to address that.

“As also mentioned, our airports are going to receive huge amounts of capital resources to bring them up to modern standards, so that likewise our people, goods, and services can come into the state and leave the state in a way that’s acceptable around the world. We will not only be improving Honolulu International Airport, Kona International Airport, but there’s monies in for Hilo, and lots of monies in for Kahului airport and the smaller airports – Lāna‘i, Ho‘olehua on Moloka‘i, Hāna, Big Island airports, small airports on Kaua‘i, Princeville – all of these have some consideration in this budget.

“So I wanted to stand up and highlight some of these important projects and thank all of you for supporting us moving these projects ahead because understand that without proper transportation, our economy will come to a standstill. If the goods and services cannot move through our harbors, airports, and on our roads, then our economy slows down. If we cannot move through our roads, everything slows down.

“So with that, I stand in support of this bill, give my gratitude to all of you for supporting transportation, and just remember that this will hit all of our districts and will be a major boon to all of Hawai‘i. Thank you, Madam Chair.”

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“First, I’d like to thank the Ways and Means and Finance chairs and vice chairs and staffs for their hard work, dedication, and willingness to work with your Education Committees as we have sought to move the metaphorical ‘marshmallow’ to focus resources and actions around students and schools.

“A few important education highlights from the budget that I would like to call to your attention include \$1 million in general funds in fiscal year ‘14 for the Hawaiian language Common Core Standards Assessment. This is an unprecedented amount allocated towards this function, and will complement well S.C.R. No. 147, which was just passed by the House, and will direct the Board of Education to create a formal coalition to address the issue of developing assessments in the Hawaiian language immersion for students to more accurately measure their academic achievement, and will send to the U.S. Department of Education the Legislature’s position in strong support of a federal waiver from the requirements of No Child Left Behind. Provisos have also been included in the budget, calling upon the department to detail their activity in this area, providing the Legislature with proposed plans for implementation of the assessments and any future costs anticipated so they can be considered by this body.

“We have also kept to the Senate’s strong belief that resources should be focused at the school level, adding \$53.6 million in Federal Impact Aid for weighted student formula, regular instruction, and special education. We have also increased general fund appropriations to the weighted student formula in the amount of \$12.8 million, and supported charter schools for the establishment and funding of 15 positions in the Charter School Commission in alignment with our reform efforts.

“While we are urging a cautious, piloted approach, the \$8.2 million in the budget for our Common Core Digital Curriculum program will provide us with the opportunity to look for ways to best maximize the use of technology as we transition into the Common Core and Smarter Balanced Assessments in 2014 and ‘15, and will allow us to develop critical professional development opportunities for all of our educators.

“The budget also includes \$8 million for student bus transportation while maintaining a high level of oversight and accountability in this area, something I definitely appreciate as we will be working with the department throughout this interim to once again focus in on increasing controls over both this area and now also school food service.

“Both the funding appropriation and guidance provided in the budget will serve us well as we continue to work hard over the interim with the department. Education makes up almost 25 percent of our total budget, and I assure you that your Education Committee takes that responsibility to manage these resources wisely very seriously.

“Again, mahalo to our Ways and Means leadership and staff for their support, and I encourage everyone to vote in strong support of what is a fiscally sound budget. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I would be remiss if I didn’t congratulate and mahalo the Ways and Means leadership, Chair Ige and Vice Chair Kidani, and their committee members for putting some things into the budget that are really firsts: one that my district has been asking for, for at least the ten years that I’ve been representing Kīhei, and that’s a high school.

“Kīhei is the fastest growing community in our state without a high school. All of the students drive from Kīhei to Kahului to go to school, and that adds additional traffic on our roads, but it also means that the students really can’t participate fully in afternoon and after-school activities.

“With all of the great growth that’s been occurring in central Maui, their addition to Maui High School’s campus really means that that school is going to become overcrowded in the near future – that’s one of the reasons that constructing Kīhei High School is so important.

“But the thing that I find so amazing about the leadership in Ways and Means and Finance this year is that this was a huge ask; it was \$130 million. That would have sucked up a lot of space and dollars in the CIP budget, but they were able to come up with a mechanism that allowed us to authorize the entire amount and allow GO bond funding to be phased in a way that the bonds that were needed for that full amount and build out could be floated when the time came. They put in \$30 million in real money (GO bonds) so the construction and site improvements can be begun on land that has already been acquired and is in the final process of permitting at the county level.

“This is so important for our community, and it means that in the long run, this method identified by Finance and Ways

and Means, led by the WAM chair, will enable the state in the long run to save between \$22 and 25 million on the building of the high school because the project can be bid out as a design-build on a one-time contract – all-at-once contract – which will enable enough savings to almost fund another elementary school. So, mahalo on behalf of the community for that particular project.

“I also want to say mahalo for another project that ended up in the C.D. 1 because I didn’t think it was going to get there. This is another very innovative and very forward-thinking position on behalf of the Legislature. This is the acquisition of Līpoa Point. For those of you who are not familiar with northwest Maui, this is an area that is surrounded by a marine conservation district, Honolua Bay. It’s former Maui Land and Pine Company agricultural pineapple land, but is fallow at the moment. Because of the difficulties that Maui Land and Pine has been facing, it was likely that that land was going to be sold off and carved up and fancy houses were going to be built there. The land had been pledged as collateral for the company’s employees’ pension fund. With the forward thinking the Legislature, led by Ways and Means and Finance, agreed to, this very beautiful, pristine, and environmentally important piece of coastal land is going to be preserved in perpetuity in conservation for the generations to come.

“It is truly an amazing gift to not just the people of Maui County, but to all of our visitors and future residents. It is an important gift we leave to the future. So, along with thanking the WAM and Finance Committees, I also want to say mahalo nui to the chair of Water and Land for helping to support and move this measure in a bill form; even though the money is in the budget, it’s very, very important for all of us. It will ensure that significant pieces of coastline are preserved from development for future generations to enjoy, and I think this is one of the significant contributions that this budget makes to the future generations of Hawai’i. Mahalo.”

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I agree with almost all that is in this budget bill and appreciate the hard work of the staff and committee members. However, I do have concerns about what happened in the area of higher education, and regrettably must vote with reservations on this bill. Thank you.”

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“First of all, I would like to thank the chairs and vice chairs of the Senate Ways and Means and House Finance Committees, the WAM and Finance Committee members and hardworking staff, and my legislative colleagues for being so supportive of funding programs that will make a significant difference in the lives of infants, children, youth, kūpuna, and families.

“H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 contains funding that will support people in meeting basic human needs, including food, shelter, and health care. The Legislature’s commitment to our kūpuna and persons with disabilities is significant this year. In this state budget bill, along with provisions in S.B. No. 106, C.D. 1, there is full funding for the Aging and Disability Resource Center statewide so that people can have one-stop resource centers to connect kūpuna and persons with disabilities with long-term care services and supports that will improve their quality of life. It will also provide a total of \$8 million allocated for Kupuna Care, which will help thousands of seniors with home-delivered meals, transportation services, respite services, home modifications, and health and wellness services. H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 also helps to fund many programs that will actually prevent falls and injuries that have been attributed to the high

cost of health care, and so these are very important investments that we are making to not only improve the quality of life, but also, practically speaking, reduce our health care costs over time.

“Also noteworthy this year is funding that addresses shortfalls in early intervention services for children with special health needs. It also supports home- and community-based waiver services for developmentally disabled children and adults, and funds health care payments for people eligible for QUEST and QUEST Expanded, impacting over 270,000 people in Hawai‘i; as well as implements the Affordable Health Care Act requirements that would allow young people to be covered by their parents up to 26 years of age who are still living with them.

“H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 also restores funds to the acute care hospitals at a higher Medicaid reimbursement rate. It increases the reimbursement rates for primary care physicians, reflecting federal funds that will become available to Hawai‘i as part of the Affordable Care Act. It also supports the technology and programming work necessary to complete the new, more efficient, and accountable Medicaid eligibility system by October 1 of this year to enroll Hawai‘i’s eligible residents needing health care insurance and meet the Affordable Health Care Act starting date, which is January 1, 2014. I really appreciate all the hard work of the Medicaid staff; they have done work that truly, truly we are appreciative of in a very short time period with the community.

“There are also resources appropriated in H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 to support neighborhood centers and wraparound services statewide for families so that there can be prevention of child abuse and neglect and promote healthy family relationships. There is also funding that will support voluntary foster care that will provide stable housing for youth while attending higher education or working, up to age 21.

“There are also two parole officer positions for neighbor islands to allow youth to stay on their islands and reduce the number of neighbor island youth that have to go to O‘ahu each year to the Hawai‘i Youth Correctional Facility. There are also funds to continue supporting the 28 middle schools with resources for positive after-school programs statewide using TANF funds, as well as resources to domestic violence shelters and sexual assault services, legal services for our very poor, funding for deaf and blind support services, and funds to support the Commission on the Status of Women and the state’s Fatherhood Commission.

“Finally, I wanted to highlight the Legislature’s commitment to address homelessness and affordable housing options for people in our state. Through H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1 – in combination with S.B. No. 515, C.D. 1 – the Legislature fully funds \$1.5 million for the Housing First Pilot Program statewide to assist chronically homeless people obtain and maintain permanent housing. It also begins much-needed repair and maintenance of our existing homeless shelters, and supports a centralized service system of health care for the seriously mentally ill within our Medicaid program.

“These initiatives, along with other significant allocations for shallow rent subsidies, veteran services, public housing renovations, substance abuse treatment and mental health services, Rapid Re-Housing, Shelter Plus Care, and increased funding for the rental housing trust fund and dwelling unit revolving funds, will help in the affordable housing infrastructure needed to begin addressing the anticipated 50,000 new housing units needed in Hawai‘i in the next four years.

“Thank you very much, Madam President and colleagues; thank you so much to the people of Hawai‘i for your support of H.B. No. 200, C.D. 1. Thank you.”

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I rise in strong support of H.B. 200, C.D. 1, and offer my appreciation to the chair of Ways and Means and the committee for their support of initiatives proposed by our Committee on Agriculture. I’d also like to thank my staff and other members of the committee for helping move the bills forward. The eight bills that the conference committee approved will move our hopes and desires to broaden and ensure the long-term health of our agricultural industry. I’d also like to thank the members of this chamber for keeping the focus on agriculture. Again, mahalo.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I would like to thank my colleagues and urge their votes – a big ‘yes’ vote – because we have expressed a great desire in the budget document to be able to support our state parks. We have included dollars that would address tremendous budget deficits in particular areas in recreation regarding payroll and maintenance problems.

“We also included dollars, which I’m hoping that next session we’ll be able to address, for land appraisals and other studies at Turtle Bay on this island for the possibility of acquiring those pieces that are historically and culturally appropriate.

“We also included dollars for the Hawai‘i State Historic Preservation Division to continue their works and to upgrade their computer system, which is necessary, and of course it complies with federal requirements.

“The other part of our committee addressed recreational fishing, which I think is paramount in our state. And we were able to get added dollars to our recreational fishing to be able to increase those opportunities, and more importantly, to look at the issue of restocking our fisheries; and I think restocking our fisheries is something that we definitely have to take into consideration.

“Also, supporting lifeguard services; I think it’s really critical. We had a big front page about the situation on Kaua‘i; and I think it’s very important that we’re able to educate not only the malihini but also the kama‘āina as to ocean safety. So, I’m very happy that we were able to help in these areas.

“Also, I would like to support the remarks that were made by the chairman on Agriculture. My only disappointment, if I may say, is that I was hoping that we could have passed the legislation that would have empowered the Agricultural Development Corporation, the ADC. I feel that the ADC is critical for our future in agriculture because the whole purpose of the ADC is not to empower government, but is really to help to empower the private sector because it’s the private sector that is going to push agriculture to the forefront and be able to allow us to produce more of our food locally. As you know, we are exporting almost \$2 billion out of state for those purposes.

“The disappointment for me in your Water and Land Committee was our inability to get out our geothermal legislation. I felt it was critical to the furtherance of geothermal energy. Simply, the Senate position was to restore the Hawai‘i County oversight of geothermal energy development. I feel it’s critical that we need to address that next session, and also look at the whole complexity of reserve lands in the State of Hawai‘i.

“So with that, Madam President, I’m urging all my colleagues to please vote in support. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“And now, the rest of the story: yes, we have to have a budget, but do we need such a big budget? Many of us can remember when the Legislature debated a two-year, \$4 billion budget. Now we’re at \$24 billion – six times more. We have to ask ourselves: have the people of Hawai‘i had a six-times increase in their standard of living, in their wellbeing, in their economic security?”

“There were references made to the revitalization of the economy, rebounding of construction, and so forth. Yet if you talk to people that are involved in any of these industries, you find that that’s not true. The visitor industry is carrying the entire economy all by itself. Construction? The workers are still on the bench. Retailing is flat. Wholesaling, manufacturing – practically nonexistent. We are struggling in this community.”

“And when we look at individuals, single moms, and families, and small businesses, they have to go through a budgetary problem and process also. They don’t have the luxury of all the staff and all the people that we have – of course, they’re paying for all of us, too. And they have to make really hard decisions. And most of those decisions result in a change of direction, a change of course, not because they want to do without, not because they want to do with less, but because they have to.”

“And yet here we are passing a budget today of \$24 billion, and we say that it’s fiscally prudent. We talk about the investments that we’re making, and yet, they’re not investments. An investment is a voluntary decision made by an individual with his or her own money. There’s no money in this room right now, except maybe up in the galleries, and we’re coming after it – every penny of it. And not only do you have to support the state’s budget, you have to support the City and County of Honolulu or your neighbor island budget, and you have to support the federal government budget. There’s only one source for income. The government doesn’t have any money; it only has the money that it takes from you.”

“Instead of changing our course, we’ve added more things for the government to do. You heard the list from my colleagues. Many of them you can argue are very worthy programs, very worthy projects, and yet, if we really think back on a lot of them, we find that many of these projects were done by individuals in the past. We were responsible for our own lives, and now it’s the government. And with only 50 percent of the people in Hawai‘i voting now, that means that 50 percent of the people are telling government what they want and allowing the other 50 percent of the people to foot the bill. There are many good things in the budget. There are many programs that we need, but government should be limited to those things that the people cannot or are unable to do for themselves. Instead, we have heightened the welfare and entitlement society, and we’ve got people coming in here, duplicating efforts, asking for money.”

“But again, the money is not coming from us; the money is coming from the taxpayers. And while it is true that there are no major tax increases to fund this budget this year, these expenditures will generate demands for new tax revenues in the years to come. The governor’s already said that. Not this year, not next year, but the following years. The Budget and Finance Director of the state said this state will be broke in 2017 – he said that!”

“Now, I admire the work that my colleagues have done. I was part of the Ways and Means process; I know how hard they worked and how sincere and dedicated they are. Yet, we’re moving in the wrong direction. We continue to make government the focal point of our lives and to pay handsomely for it.”

“Madam President, you realize that a month ago I presented an alternative budget done by the minority, done by our Budget Director Mr. Harleman over there; very detailed, very specific, and yet it showed how we could change the course of government spending and, therefore, the burden of our taxpayers. We didn’t do that. You may recall that the governor’s initial executive budget added \$1 billion to our spending. The House initially cut that down by \$600 million, including removing 1,000 vacant state positions, but in the conference committee that ensued, most of that money and those expenditures were put back and most of those employee positions were put back.”

“Sometimes it seems to me that we are down here for one purpose and one purpose only, and that is: to finance the three major public employee unions with compensation and benefits unheard of in most of the private sector, and to fund duplicative nonprofit organizations. There is nothing in the budget or in the bills that we’re about to vote on that improves Hawai‘i’s business and investment climate. There is nothing that we’re going to do today that is going to generate more private jobs, more private wealth, more private income, or change the negative position of this state among the other 49 states. And that’s what we should be concerned about: new revenues.”

“Now, I do like the fact that in the budget there is a commitment and substantial amount for recapitalization. And as I’ve done in the past, I laud the administration for keeping their promise and their commitment to pay back the Hurricane Relief Fund, the Rainy Day Fund, because that’s a part of Hawai‘i’s credit rating. And I also support the idea of recapitalizing and paying for our tremendous unfunded liability. Just think about it: the budget is \$24 billion for two years. Our current unfunded liability for employees’ retirement and employees’ health is \$25 billion, the worst in the nation; and the taxpayers are on the hook to pay that.”

“Now I’ve always said when government makes a promise, they have to keep that promise, and I don’t disagree with that. But we should take that in mind when we’re talking about adding new programs, new expenditures, new outlays because these programs, even when they start new and they start small, every year they grow bigger. There are calls for more personnel, more office space, more money to operate, and that’s what’s going to happen and we’re going to see that in a number of bills that we’re about to vote on. And by the way, in case the public is not aware: while the budget bill is \$24 billion, we still have dozens and dozens of other single appropriation bills, which will add even more millions of dollars to this mix.”

“So colleagues, I know we have to have a budget, but we’re going in the wrong direction. We’re not doing anything to reduce dependence on government, that doesn’t do anything to improve the status of our residents in Hawai‘i. And many of them cry out to us to be responsible, as they must themselves, and yet we continue spending.”

“I will conclude by saying that I think it’s everybody’s responsibility to support the necessary parts of government. And so from my standpoint, now that I’ve enjoyed your company for 17 sessions, I calculated that over those 17 sessions, in addition to our salary – which we now have no vote on when there are increases proposed – we get an annual office allowance. In 17 years, I have not touched a penny of that office allowance, choosing instead to pay for things outside of my legislative responsibilities with my own dime. So, I calculated what that amount was over the 17 years and I came up, Madam President, with a sum of \$118,037. And so, to show my participation, I’m going to present a check to the taxpayers for that amount: \$118,037. *[Holds up giant check.]* I’m sure the money’s around here somewhere; it’s probably in a special fund. And I would like to give this money to the keiki because everybody knows that everything we do in Hawai‘i is for the

keiki. So that's my contribution to the budget, and I support that budget with reservations. Thank you, Madam President."

The Chair noted:

"The Chair would like to join in on behalf of all the senators here to thank our Ways and Means chair, Senator Ige; our vice chair, Senator Kidani; and your staff. As a former Ways and Means chair, I know how much work it takes, how many hours, the long nights, weekends – especially on the staff's part – and we all thank you very much for that sacrifice and for your families, we thank them, as well. Thank you."

"Increasingly, health plans turn to pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) to handle the drug benefits for plan members. While PBMs can perform a valuable function for members and plans, there is growing evidence that PBMs in Hawai'i and elsewhere are using the patient's health information at their disposal inappropriately. Some pharmacy benefits managers have gone beyond using a patient's health information to process prescription claims and, instead, use a patient's health information for marketing purposes without the patient's express consent. This practice is a breach of privacy under the State Constitution. Also the inappropriate sharing of a patient's personal health information directly violates provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), a federal law. HB62, CD1 strives to increase protection and raise the bar on patient privacy.

"HB62 CD1 addresses the practices and protects the privacy of an individual by prohibiting pharmacy benefits managers from marketing, selling or disseminating an individual's health information for marketing or profit. Moreover, this measure makes clear that a pharmacy benefits manager shall not directly contact an individual by any means for the purpose of marketing pharmacy services to their subsidiaries unless the contact is medically necessary for the health and safety of the individual or the individual has expressly given consent for such contact.

"In the interest of consumer protection, I urge all my colleagues to vote 'Aye' on this bill. Mahalo."

"Madame President, I rise in strong support of this bill. I'm a staunch advocate of distributed generation – generating electricity where it is used. And photovoltaic is a great means to that end.

"However, up to now, renters could not enjoy the benefits of distributed generation. And that's unfortunate because renters make up 40% of our population. Until now, if landlords and lessors wanted to install PV on their property and sell power to their tenants, they would have been considered a public utility. This was a huge deterrent.

"We have heard from a guy on the Big Island who owns a single-family dwelling that he rents out. He installed a PV system on the roof of the rental home with the intention of selling electricity to his tenant to pay for the system.

"However, his tenant, who evidently has a sharp lawyer, refused to pay for the power on the grounds that the landlord was not a public utility and did not have a proper exemption. For a while, the landlord gave electricity to his tenant for free. Finally, he got fed up. He disconnected and padlocked the PV system. So that means that the landlord is not getting any compensation for the PV system that he paid for. The tenant is not getting the lower-priced power from the landlord. And the PV system is just sitting on the roof unused.

"This bill will help situations like that. And we have included strong language to ensure that this statute could not be used for wheeling, which is when a person generates electricity, sells it to a customer and transmits it over the transmission and distribution lines belonging to a third-party, such as HECO. Colleagues, I ask for your support for this bill."

“The bill would provide an unnecessary burden for small businesses, very small cash transactions. I know the idea the government wants to ‘trap’ those people that are using the cash economy and all that, but in spreading their net they’re going to impact the very small businesses, and that’s a bad procedure. Thank you.”

Senator Ruderman requested his vote be cast “No,” and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“What this bill does is it grants the Department of Transportation Harbors Division an exemption from having to obtain a conservation district use permit for any improvement that they do on submerged lands, and that would include new harbors or expansions of harbors. One of the reasons that Department of Transportation has argued that we don’t have to worry about this exemption is they say that they’ll still be subject to the federal permits under the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. But the federal permits, while they do cover some of the same environmental and resource protections as our state law, there is a very large area of our state law that the federal permits do not address, and that’s under Article XII of our Constitution, Section 7: traditional and customary rights. Under the Constitution, the state ‘shall protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for subsistence, cultural and religious purposes.’

“We’ve had a lot of case law in Hawai‘i, including the Pele Defense Fund, the Public Access Shoreline Hawai‘i, and Kapa‘a Kai O Ka ‘Āina, which have interpreted these provisions to mean that the public has to have access to the ocean and to the resources contained therein. Since I grew up on O‘ahu, I really wasn’t aware of how limited the public access to the ocean is on our younger islands, including Maui and the Big Island, where the shorelines are hardened, and in many of these areas, people rely upon our commercial harbors for access for surfing, fishing, canoe paddling, and the like.

“I’m hopeful that if this measure does pass, and if we do exempt the State Harbors Division from having to get conservation district use permits, that we will come back next year and require that these rights be protected through our state permitting process because if we rely exclusively on the federal permits, we’re going to be jeopardizing that public access. Thank you, Madam Chair.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Point of clarification: you know, my understanding is that the constitution trumps any of the laws that we pass, and all of our laws must be conforming with it. Therefore, Article XII of the Constitution, which protects traditional and customary rights, is paramount law of the land, and any law that we pass must be conforming with that.

“The idea of access to the ocean is one that I guard very, very dearly coming from Hāna, coming from east Maui, and representing Moloka‘i, Lāna‘i, Kaho‘olawe, and all of eastern, upcountry, and the north shore of Maui. But let’s make sure that we’re talking about the same thing. This bill does not infringe, in my opinion, on the traditional and customary rights. In fact, most of our harbors on the neighbor islands have a dual use. The rural harbors – let’s say Kaunalapau on Lāna‘i, Kaunakakai on Moloka‘i, Hāna Harbor on Maui, and even Kawaihae and Hilo Harbors – have a very delicate balance between traditional uses: fisherman going down, canoe paddling, etc. And the imposition of the TSA, the federal security and Homeland Security laws – I remember a few years ago in Kaunalapau on Lāna‘i we had a big issue where the Homeland Security organizations wanted to shut down the harbor to public access period in the name of homeland security. Well, we worked it out so that fishermen and traditional access can occur there and traditional uses.

“So, I can give you assurances that this bill in no way tramples or infringes on traditional gathering rights as enumerated in the constitution, and I ask for continued support of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Madam President, I just would like to rise in strong support of the remarks that were made by our Transportation chairman, and I do have some remarks that I’d like to submit in support to the Journal.” (The Chair so ordered.)

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon’s additional remarks read as follows:

“This bill proposes to provide an exemption from the permit and site plan approval requirements relating to submerged lands within the State’s commercial harbors system in the Conservation District. This exemption will enable the Harbors Division to more efficiently implement needed projects to meet the growing needs of the maritime industry.

“Sufficient oversight already exists for submerged land within the State’s commercial harbors system for the preservation of the ecosystem, flora and fauna. SB 1207 will

eliminate redundant plan review and permitting. The DOT will continue to be subject to:

The requirements of Chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes, The U.S. Army Corp of Engineers Permit requirements, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency requirements, Oversight by the State Department of Health for federal programs such as the Clean Water Act.

“The above listed review processes more than adequately address the environmental concerns and public interest and the proposed bill will eliminate any delay for obtaining permit and site plan approvals that are already covered under these processes. This proposal will allow the DOT Harbors Division to more timely and efficiently implement harbor projects.”

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM THURSDAY, APRIL 25, 2013

S.B. No. 2, H.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 2, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“While I certainly agree that anyone committing any offense with something that looks like a firearm or is a simulated firearm should be punished, I think the problem with this bill is a problem with the proposed law: it treats simulated firearms exactly the same as lethal firearms in the case of terroristic threatening and robbery. It would be in the first degree, and I think you’ve got to have some separation, you’ve got to have a difference between the use of those things. I know that people, if they’re confronted with a simulated firearm, they’re not going to take time to decide whether it’s simulated or real, and I appreciate that; I’m just talking about the actual punishment. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“You know, if you think of a clerk working at 7-Eleven for minimum wage, and some person in a hood shows up with a plastic gun, sticks it in her face, and says, ‘Give me your money,’ she won’t have, in my opinion, the wherewithal to tell this individual – who, for the case of this discussion, would be a male – ‘That’s a toy gun; go get your money someplace else.’

“The reason it’s first degree is precisely that: there’s no degrees of fear when somebody sticks a gun in your face; and if there were degrees of fear and degrees of identification of a plastic gun and a real gun, the defendant, if caught, would say, ‘I should be charged in the second degree because it was a plastic gun and not a real gun,’ as if to distinguish that there are two types of crimes in robbery. The only distinction between a plastic gun and a real gun is he can’t shoot her dead.

“That is the reason law enforcement make no distinction when it came to a simulated firearm, because if they did so, as they have in the past, the defendant would say, ‘I knew it was plastic, so I should not be charged with robbery in the first degree.’ Law enforcement, led by the attorney general, was very, very adamant that closing the loophole and treating

the perpetrator with the simulated firearm as if it were real is appropriate in this case. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2, and S.B. No. 2, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SIMULATED FIREARMS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, H.D. 2:

Senator Wakai moved that S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Hee rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As all of you are well aware, I have spoken passionately in opposition to this measure since its introduction. I would like to point out what I believe to be misunderstandings, in the least, and flat-out ignorance on what this bill does.

“As we have heard in caucus, this bill allegedly codifies the federal law that allegedly allows for phasing. I would challenge anyone in support of this bill to get up after me and cite the federal law. I challenge you because there is no federal law. There is no federal law. I invite the individual in support to stand after me and cite the federal law. That’s point number one.

“In its testimony before the respective committees, the Department of Transportation justified the passage of this proposal because, and I quote, ‘Senate Bill 1171 would make Hawaii law consistent with the National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106, 36 CFR Section 800.4(b)(2)(2010).’ DOT went on to say this bill would make state historic preservation laws consistent with federal historic preservation laws. I challenge the individual who will stand up next in support of this bill to defend that position.

“The fact is – the fact is – S.B. No. 1171 will not bring any consistency between federal and state historic preservation laws. The Department of Transportation is confused in its definition of the terms ‘statute,’ ‘law,’ ‘regulations,’ and ‘rules,’ and like maple syrup, they have poured it on each of us. A statute or a law is an act of the legislature that declares, prescribes, or commands. A regulation or a rule describes how the statute or law will be implemented. In this case, the applicable federal statute cited is Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, which says in its entirety, ‘Section 106 – Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, comment on Federal undertakings. The head of any Federal agency having direct or indirect jurisdiction over a proposed Federal or federally assisted undertaking in any State and the head of any Federal department or independent agency having authority to license any undertaking shall – shall – prior to the approval of the expenditure of any Federal funds on the undertaking or prior to the issuance of any license, as the case may be, take into account the effect of the undertaking on any district, any site, any building, any structure, or any object that is included in or eligible for inclusion in the National Register. The head of any such Federal agency shall afford the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation established under Title II of this Act a reasonable opportunity to comment with regard to such undertaking.’

“The federal statute says nothing – zero, ‘ole, squat – about phased reviews. Nothing. ‘Ole. Zero. Squat. And for that matter, phasing of any kind. That language is found only within the much more detailed implementing regulations for Section

106 at 36 CFR Part 800. You may check it for yourself; and the presumption is the person who stands in support after me has done so because he will be asked by me. Unless Congress is planning to amend Section 106 of the NHPA, passage of this bill will not make state law consistent with federal law because phasing does not exist in federal law. To say the DOT is confused is to be kind.

“This is nothing more than a taking by the state executive in response to a Supreme Court decision entitled *Kaleikini*. That’s all it is. You can fluff it up any which way you want; if it quacks, it’s a duck. And this is a duck. When the Supreme Court’s ruling on *Kaleikini* was handed down in August 2012 – August 2012 – the executive branch of this government could have and should have immediately begun to amend the existing administrative rules at Hawai’i Administrative Rules 13-275 and 13-284. Had they done so expeditiously, it is highly likely that the necessary amendments would be in place by now, allowing for phased project reviews that the DOT alleges it needs. Instead – instead – the executive branch inexplicably delayed taking action – any action – until the beginning of this session, and S.B. No. 1171 is the disingenuous action taken by the executive to suggest that phasing is necessary when it is not. The fact of the matter is, no matter what anybody says after I’m done, this legislation is not necessary. The rules under Hawai’i Administrative Rules provides the Department of Transportation with all necessary rulemaking authority, and if somebody can tell me differently, I’m here.

“You know, when I started on this bill, I thought we’d have a discussion about the ‘āina iwi kūpuna. It’s not about that. That’s only the reason we shouldn’t do it. What it’s about is being led to believe that this is so critical that highways cannot be built. That’s not true, and I just explained why. So critical that this bill is so broad, so vague that this allows for private developers to move forward. This is not about highways; this is about everything. That broad, that vague, and so pohō when this can be done. So pohō when the water bucket’s delivered to us. If not for people like Sara Collins – most of you know Sara, you folks been around long enough – to weigh in on the distinguishments of the law, we’d be flying this bill through because without it, ‘cannot build highways.’ No. No. Hawai’i Administrative Rules: O ‘oe ke kahe kia’āina hana ‘oe – get your work done.

“I thought I’d use this bill as an attack on our culture, an attack on the host culture. It’s not necessary. It’s not necessary. We could be in Iapana, and if the rules existed there as they do here, we wouldn’t have to talk about the iwi because it’s not necessary. It’s only another example of the erosion of the host culture, which politicians use every time they run for office.”

The Chair interjected:

“The Chair would like to ask if we could have courtesy from the audience to allow for the final speeches.”

Senator Hee continued:

“Thank you, Madam President. This bill is as inappropriate as it is for us to use words like ‘aloha,’ to use a word like ‘pono.’ ‘A’ole. This is not pono, and this is not aloha. This is not necessary.

“And so the next person who stands up in support, I would ask you, as you go about supporting the bill, to respond to the federal law; respond to the federal law because when you do so, the Society of Hawaiian Archaeology is going to learn something. I have a hunch that I’m going to use my second time to stand up shortly. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Opponents would like you to believe this bill would give the state a license to bulldoze important historical or cultural sites. But really, nothing could be further from the truth.

“The truth is this measure makes only two ‘procedural’ changes.

“First, it provides a specific provision in state law which authorizes the phased review of certain projects by SHPD to ensure consistency between state and federal law. There are NO exemptions. This bill does not circumvent Chapter 6E, the state’s historic preservation law. All required archaeological inventory studies will be completed and any necessary mitigation must be done before construction proceeds.

“Secondly, it removes redundancy in agency appeals, by deleting language providing the governor with the option to request a second study by the Hawaii Advisory Council on Historic Preservation.

“And the previous speaker asked me to cite the federal law that makes these words and phasing in congruence; and again, I cite the National Historic Preservation Act, section 106. And the part that I feel is pertinent here states, ‘phase identification and evaluation where alternatives under consideration consist of corridors or large land areas where work access to properties is restricted, the agency may officially use a phase process to conduct identification and evaluation efforts.’ So, we’re both reading the same statutes, but obviously having very different interpretations. And I’d argue that this clearly, in federal law, allows for phasing, and we’re simply making the laws locally in congruence with that.

“In the *Kalekini v. Yoshioka* ruling, on page 65, footnote 33, the Court suggested that SHPD amend its rules so that state law would be consistent with the federal law in the National Historic Preservation Act. That is exactly what the justices recommended, and exactly what we’re about to do this morning.

“For decades, it has been a common practice to build projects in phases. This bill simply puts that practice in statute. If the state had a sketchy track record of desecrating historical sites, there may be reason for us to pause. But the opposite is true; the state has been an excellent steward of the land and has a record of preserving important cultural sites.

“Here’s a sample of projects that have been phased in around the state:

On Oahu: Kahekili Highway, Kalanianaʻole Highway, Farrington Highway, Kamehameha Highway;

On the Big Island: Hawaii Belt Road, Volcano Road, Kuakini Highway;

On Maui: Haleakala Highway, Honoapiʻilani Highway, Hana Highway;

On Molokai: Kamehameha V Highway, Maunaloa Highway, Kalae Highway;

On Lanai: Kaunalapau Highway;

On Kauai: Kaumualiʻi Highway and Kuhio Highway

“It would be ideal if the state and feds could bankroll entire projects once they are approved. But the reality is that funding for federal projects roll in over several years. Sometimes we don’t own all the land we need at the beginning. We need to develop in manageable bites – or phases. If this bill is not passed, there will be delays in construction of new facilities or master planned projects. Just this morning, the attorney general indicated there is a likelihood that projects already in the pipeline could wind up back in court. On your desk, you have a list of potential projects that could stop in its tracks very soon if

there is further litigation, and all of these roads are highways that are coming to a neighborhood near each and every one of you.

“And it’s not just transportation projects, as the previous speaker had mentioned; it includes renewable energy, agriculture projects, and school expansion.

“The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands has had master-planned communities ‘phased in.’ DBEDT’s efforts to expand broadband, geothermal, sea water air conditioning would all be hampered. Even the Office of Hawaiian Affairs will likely have to phase in their master plan for their 25 acres in Kaka’ako that was given to them last year. They don’t have enough money to do an entire plan all at once.

“Some opponents argue that doing an Archeological Inventory Survey at the start of an entire project COULD alleviate problems down the road, if a project has to be redirected in a subsequent phase.

“If we are going to contemplate hypothetical situations, I can also argue doing a comprehensive AIS at the start COULD cause more problems and cost more money. All projects don’t turn out as initially planned; a road could be realigned or funding for a project could force developers to scale back their project. If you dig in an area that ultimately never gets developed, you’ve just disturbed remains that didn’t need to be touched, and put money into a study that was not useful. That is a waste of time and resources.

“A comprehensive AIS at the beginning of a development doesn’t guarantee there will be no problems later. An AIS is like hunting in the dark: you may hit your target, but oftentimes you come away empty-handed.

“This bill is NOT about being disrespectful. There are NO exemptions. If a survey identifies any burial sites, the project comes to an immediate halt. This bill IS about allowing progress to occur as it has for decades, and at the same time being VERY respectful of sacred sites around the islands.

“I encourage my colleagues to vote YES. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’d like to raise two points: the first to address the comments that were just made by the senator to my left, and the second to add to the comments of the senator from Kahaʻulu.

“I heard the previous speaker mention that federal law does authorize phasing where the proposed project consists of corridors or large land areas where access to the properties is restricted. But this bill in front of us today adds a third category where it would allow a phased archaeological inventory survey where circumstances dictate that construction be done in stages. That’s an extremely broad exemption to the existing practice. What does that mean? Is that going to apply to developments on relatively small footprints of land because the construction is done in stages, even when you can conduct an archaeological inventory survey relatively easily? Is that going to apply when private developers are developing areas where they’re concerned that a portion of the land contains burials and they want to begin the phased archaeological inventory surveys in the regions that are less likely to contain burials or historic sites in order to get their preliminary approvals? This is an extremely broad exemption, and it sounds to me like that is nowhere in the federal law. So once again, we are having, similar to S.B. No. 1207, the Department of Transportation come in here and talk about a very broad-based exemption that is not necessary, and it’s going to lead to a lot of consequences that I think many people in this room are going to regret.

“I want to add also to the remarks of the senator from Kahalu‘u: allowing a phased archaeological inventory survey is going to change the process by which the approvals are done, and I’m speaking as the former Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Prior to project approval, if burials are found during an inventory survey, the determination on whether they should be removed or remain in place, the determination on the type of mitigation, the determination on the type of response is made by the Burial Councils. Once the project is approved, that determination is made by the State Historic Preservation Division. And I can tell you what will happen is if a phased AIS is allowed, a project is approved, and down the line your survey comes about and something is found, and there’s been a lot of money spent on a project – there’s been construction that’s been started: the pressure that is going to be placed on that administrative determination by the State Historic Preservation Division – they’re going to be asked and pressured to consider the economic impacts of their decision, and may reach a different decision than if that decision is made prior to the project approval by the Burial Councils. If we pass this bill, we are going to be changing not just the process but who will be making the decisions.

“So, I ask you to please consider that and oppose this measure. We can come back with a much narrower measure next year if it is necessary, or the department can engage in administrative rulemaking and go through a more thoughtful and lengthy process that we don’t have the luxury of doing here during such a short session. Mahalo.”

Senator Hee rose on a point of inquiry as follows:

“Will you ask the Senate member from Salt Lake if he will yield to a question? The question is: did the Hawai‘i Supreme Court suggest, in the *Kaleikini* decision, that the Legislature change the law or that SHPD amend its rules? And if the answer is the Supreme Court did not suggest the Legislature change the law, but suggested that SHPD amend its rules, will you ask him if we are members of SHPD? Thank you.”

The Chair directed the inquiry to Senator Wakai, who declined to yield to the question.

Senator Hee continued to speak in opposition the measure as follows:

“Then, I rise in opposition, yet again. I only do so to clarify reckless comments by the Senate member who spoke in support of this measure. He alleges that the state, in his remarks when it came to the topic of desecration of the land, he stated, ‘The state has been an excellent steward of the land.’ Really? Maybe he can elucidate and share with us how Kukui O Kane Heiau is no longer in existence. Really? ‘The state is an excellent steward’ – it’s hard for me to even spit it out – ‘of the land.’ Those kind of comments are inappropriate when they’re not true. The state might try to be an excellent steward, but it needs to try harder. Ask Paulette Kaleikini. Ask those descendants whose bones over a thousand were unearthed in 1988 at Honokahua; ask them. Ask the descendants whose bones were unearthed at Wal-Mart. Ask the descendants whose bones were unearthed at General Growth. Ask the descendants whose bones are being unearthed at Kahuku Plantation Village 5. Ask them what a good steward the state has been. Those comments are not necessary because they’re not true.

“What is true is the Supreme Court suggested SHPD amend its rules. We should follow the advice of the Supreme Court and ask SHPD to amend its rules. I pointed them out to you. That’s where the discussion should be held.

“The speaker in support rattled off a list of highways that have already been built, so many so I could only recall Kahekili, because I live at the end of Kahekili, and Hana, because I’m fond of Hana. But in between that was a whole list.

It begs the question: if those highways could be built, why can’t future highways continue to be built? And if the state requires assistance through administrative rules, why not do what the Supreme Court says? Amend the rules. And that’s really what’s important. We can always pass laws, but this is not necessary. What is necessary, in the state’s eyes on the advice of the Supreme Court, is to have SHPD amend its rules, and so that’s what they should do, and save us the offensive remarks of native people about the excellent stewardship of the State of Hawai‘i on the ‘āina iwi kūpuna. Mahalo.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“It was a very interesting discussion thus far. And it is not a black and white issue, but it shows several things: one is that God bless the fact that we have so many lawyers writing so many bills that are so vague because anybody can interpret them any way they want. And then when they do, they go to court, they need more lawyers; and then they have appeals and they need more lawyers.

“I’m a little disappointed, however, to have ethnic divisiveness brought into the argument because this is an argument that people of all cultures and all ethnicities here in Hawai‘i have felt very strongly about. We have unique environmental laws in the State of Hawai‘i; we’ve always been proud of them. We’ve been different from the federal government, and we’ve stood alone. I, too, found the statement about the state stewardship most unusual because first of all, there would have been no State Supreme Court action or ruling had the builders and developers of the rail transit followed the law and done what they were supposed to do in the first place, but they didn’t.

“Secondly, I represent east Honolulu, and an issue emerged a couple of months ago in Hao Street in ‘Āina Haina where historical sites were allegedly bulldozed down when the state was asked for support, and an historic trail was asked to be kept open and the state was saying that they were not sure of the historic significance. So, that really is a problem. I don’t think that stewardship has been well done.

“I think the final thing, however, is if we look to the past and what the state government has done or has not done, it has made a lot of people uneasy because we were told in the past, ‘Just trust us.’ And we did, with negative consequences.

“So, I think under the circumstances and with the arguments made, it is the right thing to do to oppose this bill; and Madam President, I request a Roll Call vote. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Solomon requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon’s remarks read as follows:

“This bill gives the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) the discretion to allow archaeological inventory surveys to be conducted prior to each phase of complex, multi-year, multi-phased projects.

“The ability for phased reviews provides for the following:

“The flexibility for SHPD to address potential impacts to historic and cultural resources in the most effective manner when dealing with complex projects. SHPD would have the option of fashioning customized and adaptable preservation plans and measures when dealing with multi-year, multi-phased projects.

“Use of a phased AIS will allow SHPD to address potential impacts to these resources in the least intrusive manner.

Requiring an AIS for an entire project before construction begins will create significant delays, increased costs, and possibly unnecessary disturbance of potential burial sites and historic properties.

“This is especially true for complex projects, particularly those done by DOT.

“Phasing allows AIS’s to be conducted at the start of final design of a portion of the project that is intended to be built, thereby minimizing the amount of area disturbed. If burial sites are found, there is still opportunity to make changes to avoid the sites.

“Allowing phasing of the AIS makes Hawaii’s Historic Preservation Law Section 6E-8 consistent with federal historic preservation law and minimizes conflicts and duplication when projects involve both State and federal reviews.”

Senator Ihara requested that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Ihara’s remarks read as follows:

“I rise in opposition to SB1171.

“Madame President, I believe this bill seeks to address a legitimate concern that important highway projects may be unnecessarily delayed due to a recent court ruling involving the Honolulu rail project.

“However, the criteria for projects this bill allows – for phased review of archaeological surveys – is overly broad, which can lead to unnecessary harm archaeological sites and burials.

“Some schools, commercial complexes, and other projects with fixed footprints may be allowed to phase their project and construct buildings before due diligence is conducted for siting the other buildings.

“I believe SB1171 needs to be thought through much more to limit the negative outcomes that could arise. Not only harm to historic preservation, but financial losses caused by archaeological discoveries in later phases that require costly mitigations.

“Let’s do this right and not rush before considering all the consequences.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 1171, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE REVIEW OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS,” having been read throughout and Roll Call vote having been requested, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 16; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Dela Cruz, Espero, Gabbard, Galuteria, Kim, Nishihara, Taniguchi). Noes, 9 (Chun Oakland, English, Green, Hee, Ihara, Ruderman, Shimabukuro, Slom, Thielen).

We thank them all for their service and appreciate everything they’ve done, but to pick one category to give them preference I think is unwise and unnecessary. What we should always be doing is looking for the best man or best woman for whatever position it is, and we don’t need to give preference because of duty assignments. Thank you.”

At this time, the Chair called for a Roll Call vote.

“Madam President, I don’t know of anybody who likes boots, at least the boots that you put on cars. I don’t like the process at all. But this bill is a very interesting bill because, of course, it is a gut-and-replace bill, and it is a bill in which the local boot industry is pitted against the local tow truck industry. And we’re talking about small businesses. We’re also talking about the small business that hires the boot industry as a last resort when their valuable parking space is not adhered to and they have a difficult time in preserving that very valuable space.

“The problem here has been that the boot industry – which is one large company, basically – has said that it was very willing to undergo regulation to have the same kinds of rules, caps on fees as does the towing industry, but in fact was not allowed to discuss this matter with either the House or the Senate conferees. There was no public hearing, as I mentioned, and it is a process that I think we should all be concerned about. There is no law on the books right now that regulates booting of automobiles and, as I say, you’re not going to get many fans that are going to support it.

“But it is, basically, a turf war between two kinds of industries within the state. And they do have employees, the boot industry. They do have responsibility for signage and for discussion and explaining what their process is. And rather than ban the business and put them and their employees out of business, I think much more concern would be to regulate them – to have certain restrictions, make sure that there is enough transparency – but allow the business to survive and to thrive. And as I said, they have indicated their willingness to do this; the least that the legislature can do, if we should be involved at all, is to meet them halfway. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“You know, members, first let me correct the misstatements of the previous speaker, who should’ve known better on this that gut-and-replace means you take out language and add in language that was never discussed. But in fact, what we did in this particular measure was we conformed the language to the House committee reports.

“So, just a little history: this bill went over as a clean bill with a clean date; and it’s ‘Relating to Transportation,’ so this is the same subject matter. It dealt with abolishing the Commission on Transportation. The House Committee on Transportation added in the Part 2, which put in language on booting. Now, if you read their committee reports, the committee report says the intent was to stop or ban or prohibit, etc. Unfortunately, the language that they used actually authorized this. It went through two committees; both committees passed it out like that, but if you read their committee reports, the intent was to do what we did. When this language came here, we simply conformed the language to what the House committee reports said. Their hearings on this talked about what this measure does, which bans an illegal practice.

“I have to point out to you, members, that we got an email this morning – I’d like to enter this into the record – from the

Office of Consumer Protection, which points out a few things. And just one part: ‘[T]he Attorney General’s February 8, 2013 letter opinion that applying a tire boot to a vehicle constitutes Criminal Tampering in 2d Degree under HRS § 708-827(1).’ And further, he says that ‘in order to commit the offense of second degree criminal tampering, the offender must have intentionally tampered with another person’s property with the specific intent to cause substantial inconvenience to the other person, and the offender must have done so without that person’s consent. It appears that applying a tire boot to a vehicle without consent would violate the criminal tampering statute.’ The Office of Consumer Protection goes on that their convention that the practice is illegal booting; the practice is illegal under the current towing laws.

“So, members, you know, this is a House position; the House inserted this language. It’s unfortunate that they couldn’t get the right words to put into the bill, but we did. The committee reports all said that this was what they wanted to do, so we’ve conformed the language to what their committee reports said. So, I take exception to the fact when someone says that this is a gut-and-replace; it is not. It’s conforming the language to the other house and what their intent was.

“So, I ask for your support on this because either way, we need to get some resolution on this and we need to make sure that some very shady practices come to an end, and then we can perhaps take a look at this next year to see how we can do proper regulation. Thank you.”

The Chair having so ordered, the email is identified as “**ATTACHMENT A**” to the Journal of this day.

Senator Espero rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I have a problem with the process and how the bill sneaked its way through session to come to us now. But as you could hear, there’s many emails and correspondence, and I think there are still many questions and that it was not really vetted as much as we should. So, I feel that if it is illegal, as some are saying that it’s illegal, why do we need the bill? And I know those that are involved in this industry are feverishly working in this capitol right now, and talking to legislators and assuring us that they have gotten the message. They understand that there might be some issues that need to be resolved, and I do believe that they’re willing to work on that immediately. And I take their word for it because if they don’t, then there will certainly be legislation next year that could even be worse if this bill does not pass. So, I will be voting ‘no.’ Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal as follows:

“Just a brief rebuttal to the Senate Transportation Chair: first of all, I stand by my comments about the process.

“Secondly, the fact that it was a House bill – gee, aren’t we always proud that we stand here for our Senate bills and our Senate positions, so why are we defending the House position with their mis-wording, their careless use of phrases? I don’t know where that comes from.

“Thirdly, when we talk about illegal activity, that’s absolutely incorrect; there was no ‘illegal’ activity. And the chairman of the House Transportation Committee was flaunting an attorney general’s letter, but would not give it to either the attorney or the company itself. When the letter was finally received – a copy was received, and I think all of us got copies of that over the weekend – that’s not what the attorney general said. But here again, we get into, ‘Gee, we have so many lawyers, and everybody can take a position on it.’ But if, in fact, it’s not good legislation, why are we passing it and coming back next year? Because the impact will be we will put a small business out of business. We will also affect those small

businesses that have tried tow companies, have tried everything else, and they have not been able to protect their property.

“So, if it’s a bad bill, if it is a questionable bill, if the language is bad, why do it? Let’s wait until next year, and as the good senator from ‘Ewa Beach said, let’s see if the company, in fact, makes some changes and does some things that will mitigate some of the complaints that were made. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“For me, it’s about consumer protection. There’s been no signage, there’s been no contact information for redress, there’s been no recourse if a mistake has been made. Somebody gets a boot – you’re at the mercy of whoever put the boot on, and you never know what amount of cash only is going to be extorted in order to get your car back.

“And for the previous speaker who says that this is something that really helps parking lot owners: if your car is immobilized with a boot and you cannot come up with the cash immediately, your car is still going to sit there until they call a tow company to tow it away. So, it really doesn’t enhance turnover in a small parking lot.

“I think that we’ve had lots and lots of discussion about the towing industry. There were lots of unsavory practices in that industry before it was heavily regulated, and maybe there is room for regulation of this industry. But in order to stop what the attorney general, the Office of Consumer Protection have already opined is an illegal activity, this measure needs to go forward, and then perhaps we can take a look at what might be appropriate legislation or regulation. But to allow a known practice that is really scamming persons who happen to get caught in their ‘traps,’ so to speak, I think it would be irresponsible of the Legislature, and I urge my colleagues to support this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I have already voted ‘no’ on several other fee bills. We’ve got a dozen bills that are going to raise the fees for various transactions that all of us are involved in, whether it’s mortgage or banks or money transmission, coming up. And the fact of the matter is we’re already paying high amounts for these

transactions and they will be passed along to the consumer. So again, it’s a way of taxing us by calling it ‘fees.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 48 was adopted and S.B. No. 1067, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ESCROW DEPOSITORIES,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 54 (H.B. No. 622, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 54 be adopted and H.B. No. 622, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This is the so-called Journalism Shield bill. This is one of the best pieces of legislation this legislature produced five years ago. It was, as my colleagues like to say, very progressive; it took into consideration new technology and changes in news gathering and news distribution. It was a law that was copied in many other jurisdictions. It was a law, as we’ve discussed, that here in Hawai‘i was used one time, and that shows actually the effectiveness of the law.

“It did not give special privileges to journalists. What it did was protect their sources in certain cases that were well-defined and very narrow, and it recognized the growth and the new technology of news gathering. It provides a means of investigating corruption in government, business, and unions in this state, while at the same time preserving and protecting sources of that information.

“To simply not extend the sunset date – which is what the people in the media wanted done and what people that believe in the First Amendment wanted done – instead crippling the newly developed electronic media industry, I think, is really a shame. And so, as most of the people in the media have said, having no bill is better than having this bill, which even seeks to define who a journalist is, what a magazine is. That’s not the business of the Legislature; that’s all part of the U.S. Constitution and the First Amendment. It’s a bad bill; it should be defeated. Thank you.”

At 1:12 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:17 p.m.

By unanimous consent, action on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 54 and H.B. No. 622, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EVIDENCE,” was deferred until the end of the calendar.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“First of all, I don’t understand why we’re dealing with this bill if it has to do with TheBus and it has to do with a county issue.

“Secondly, disorderly conduct: we spend a lot of time and a lot of money talking about the homeless, talking about how people don’t have places to stay and all that. And in the grand scheme of things, of all the problems that we’re facing, the fact that somebody’s laying down at a bus stop doesn’t seem to be something that we should be concerned about.

“But the main thing is, I think, it is a home rule issue and has nothing to do with the state. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’d like to ask that we move this one day out for consideration. This is really a home rule issue; it’s something that the counties need to deal with, and I find it offensive that we would essentially be making homelessness illegal. So, if you could consider moving this out until Thursday for final reading.”

By unanimous consent, action on Conf. Com. Rep. No. 56 and H.B. No. 31, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISORDERLY CONDUCT,” was deferred until Thursday, May 2, 2013.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I rise in support of this bill, but the reason that I’m talking about this bill is because, again, this is one of a dozen bills that we’ve discussed or continue to discuss that have to do with animal cruelty. And I hearken back to our last crossover session when I made the comparison between our response to molestation of children in our state and the concern for animals. And this bill is one of several bills that increases the penalties for cruelty to animals, and I love animals and I’m all in support of that, but I don’t think we have our priorities straight because we continue to look the other way when it comes to child molestation.

“And you recall, Madam President, at the last session I attempted a floor amendment to change a bill to incorporate the stiff penalties for sexual assault on children. I tried to amend that by incorporating the parts known as ‘Jessica’s Law,’ and my colleagues voted me down 23 to 1 on that bill, saying various things that the penalties are severe enough and pointing to a bill that we passed in the Senate that established a new minimum of six years and eight months for sexual assault of a child. The Jessica’s Law bill has a minimum of 25 years to life. Well, what happened to that bill? That bill went over to the House and died. So, we still don’t take care of our children.

“We have a settlement coming up, in the bill about settling state debts, that we are settling \$5.75 million for the assaults that took place over a number of years at the State School for the Deaf and Blind. We can’t get a copy of the attorney general’s report; that’s sealed.”

Senator Hee interjected on a point of order and said:

“Madam President, point of order. Ask the speaker to speak to the bill. It’s animal cruelty.”

Senator Slom continued:

“Yes, Madam President, I am speaking to the bill; thank you. As I said, I’m in support of it, but I think that our priorities are misplaced, and we should have more concern for the abuse of children. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 74 was adopted and S.B. No. 978, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 76 (S.B. No. 535, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 76 be adopted and S.B. No. 535, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This is such a bad bill: so-called domestic workers bill of rights. What it really is it takes away the rights of the choice of any homeowner, any family, any employer, any person who wants to hire a domestic worker in a broad array of activities, and not having the choice really to determine if that worker is appropriate in their own household. And this basically is a household or residential issue rather than business.

“What it does is create yet another legal cause of action for the attorneys and ability for people to say, ‘Well, you didn’t pick me because I’m of this new class,’ or, ‘I can sue you to get the same kinds of rights as somebody in a business has.’ It’s absolutely unprecedented in terms of other areas in other states,

but the main thing is it takes away totally right of choice of people to pick those individuals who they want to be in their home, with their family, with their children. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This measure actually is part of the Women’s Legislative Caucus package, and the reason that it came forward is because domestic workers have the least amount of consideration and protection. This is a modest measure that will ensure that workers who are in the domestic worker classification or employment actually have basic dignity and human rights. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 76 was adopted and S.B. No. 535, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABOR,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 78 (S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Green moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 78 be adopted and S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This is the bill that allows health professionals to treat partners of certain individuals who have been diagnosed with sexually transmitted diseases. Now certainly, we should all be in favor of public health treatments to protect the public. However, this bill allows partners to be given medication and to be given treatment without ever having seen a doctor. There are liability concerns, there are ethical concerns with this, and there is an apparent move to exempt the state from any kind of liability in any of the health professions. I think this is a bad practice to allow people to be treated without being examined.

“Furthermore, it’s very interesting that the proponents of this bill want to exclude same-sex or homosexual people and only treat heterosexuals in this matter, which is a very curious decision as to why that would be part of the law. So, I oppose the bill. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“The measure is meant to decrease the burden of disease on people. It’s a standard of care according to the American College of Gynecologists, who are really our experts on this matter. In reference to comments made by my good friend, the senator from the east side, the truth is this is definitely not an issue about homosexuality or heterosexuality; that issue was resolved weeks ago. This is really a standard of care, and interestingly also: for those who happen to like medical malpractice reform and whatnot, which we’re not taking up today, this bill actually gives some protection from liability because it was a very small scope of medicine where the liability concerns were so minimal but the benefit to society for people to get better treatment were so significant. People will still get follow-up treatment, but it is a standard of care according to the OBGYNs, and that’s why we should take care of women. If they don’t have this care often, there are issues of infertility, scarring – really quite terrible, Madam President. So, we’re trying to make things better for people who might have contracted an infectious disease. That’s why I support this bill.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 78 was adopted and S.B. No. 655, S.D. 2, H.D. 2,

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Well, if we’re talking about fee increases, this is the granddaddy of all of them because this bill would increase the license fee for people in this industry from \$150 to \$5,000 and the annual increase fee to \$2,500. A statement was made for the justification for this bill that our fees are too low; well, this certainly would take care of that. And again, the people that are going to wind up paying for increases in fees and licensure are going to be the public. So, this is not a consumer protection bill; this is against consumers. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 82 was adopted and S.B. No. 345, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PORTABLE ELECTRONICS INSURANCE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Slom, Thielen).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 83 (S.B. No. 997, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Wakai moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 83 be adopted and S.B. No. 997, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill establishes a new fee: a \$1 digitizing fee for the State Archives. During our discussions in hearings in Ways and Means, we found out that if you go and record your document at the Bureau of Conveyances, of course, you’re paying a fee. Now, there would be an additional fee to transfer that document over to the Archives and to digitize them. Well, I’m all for the new technology, but I’m not all for new fees and we’re paying double and triple in some cases, and I think that this is unwarranted. We’re starting out with a dollar; guaranteed that in a couple of years it’ll be \$5, \$10, whatever. The main point is it’s on top of fees you’re already paying for the same registration. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I actually like the content of the bill and what it’s trying to do, but I don’t like the methodology. In the state budget, the Senate position was to fund this project because I think that we understand \$1 for every long-term record – that means every time you register an LLC, you register your business, you file your documents, it’s going to be \$1 on there. I believe that this is a core function of government: to preserve our records for the future. And the Senate money committees believe this as well and entered this into the budget, proposed it to the House, and the House agreed to fund one year of it. But I think we’re off to the beginning of funding this as a core part of our government.

“So, I think by adding \$1 on to every permanent record, and let me give you an example: for those of you who file with DCCA every year, you file your business registration. So, on

the one hand, if you file by paper, it's \$25. If, however, you file electronically, which we try to encourage, we said, 'Let's halve the price,' so it's \$12.50. But the company that processes it charges \$1, so now it's \$13.50. Then we're adding another dollar on for that same record to be transferred to the Archives and processed there, so now it's \$14.50. Didn't we just defeat the purpose of encouraging people to file electronically because we're adding a dollar here, a dollar there?

"So, I think that we should recognize this as a core function of government, which the Senate did; we put it into the budget, funded as part of their base, and move on. But I don't like this because every person who files what's considered a permanent record will have to pay this, and the speaker before me is correct that we're not sure if it's \$1 now and next year it's \$2, and then \$5, and \$10, and etc. So, I like the content of the bill; I like what it's trying to do. I don't like the funding mechanism, and for that reason I encourage you to vote 'no' on this. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 83 was adopted and S.B. No. 997, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC ARCHIVES," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Solomon moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 122 be adopted and H.B. No. 1424, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kouchi.

Senator Kouchi rose on a point of information as follows:

"Before we take the final reading vote on this bill, I'd like to address an error on the conference committee record of votes for Senate conferees. May the Journal reflect the correct conference committee votes: on behalf of the Senate, Senators Solomon, Dela Cruz, and I were present and voted 'Aye,' and Senators Ige and Slom were excused. A quorum was present, and a majority of the Senate managers voted in favor of the recommendation to pass the bill with amendments. Thank you."

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madame President, I rise in support of HB1424, SD2, CD1.

"The purpose of this measure is to ensure preservation of the area known as Lipoa Point on Maui for future generations by requiring the Department of Land and Natural Resources, in consultation with the Hawaiian Islands Land Trust, to acquire the parcel of land. Due to financial difficulties, Maui Land and Pineapple Company pledged this parcel as collateral to cover the costs of the employees' retirement funds. The funding of \$20 million, slightly less than the appraised value but acceptable to all parties, has been included in HB 200, CD1, the executive budget bill. With the passage of this bill, the pension

benefits of numerous retirees will be protected. None of the funds will go to Maui Land and Pineapple Company.

"It is important to note that Lipoa Point is a significant, iconic landmark for Hawai'i and the waters surrounding it are nationally recognized as a marine preserve. Also, Lipoa Point holds a wealth of history. In 1976 it was the departure point for the maiden voyage of the Hōkūle'a as well as a site of two Hawaiian heiau. The acquisition of Lipoa Point is a unique opportunity for the State, the Hawaiian Islands Land Trust and friends of Honolulu to explore the various options available to preserve Lipoa Point's pristine lands and history for the future keiki of Hawai'i to experience.

"Colleagues please join me in supporting HB1424, SD2, CD1. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 122 was adopted and H.B. No. 1424, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ACQUISITION OF RESOURCE VALUE LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124 (H.B. No. 672, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Green moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 124 be adopted and H.B. No. 672, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Slom requested his vote be cast "Aye with Reservations," and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of HB672 HD2 SD2 CD1.

"Smoking and tobacco use are Hawaii's and the nation's leading cause of preventable morbidity and mortality. Our youth are being targeted by big tobacco companies with advertising and marketing strategies encouraging them to smoke or use tobacco products at an early and impressionable age. Governmental protections are needed, as approximately 1,500 Hawaii youth per year become new daily smokers and tobacco use can detrimentally impact their health and quality of life.

"HB672, CD1 helps to address this problem by prohibiting the sale of tobacco or electronic smoking devices to minors under age 18 and the purchase of tobacco or electronic smoking devices by minors under age 18. The term 'electronic smoking devices' replaced 'vapor products' as the Committee on Conference for HB672 found the term 'vapor products' to be too narrow as it refers only to a noncombustible tobacco-derived product containing nicotine and is not inclusive of the electronic mechanism and its components, which simulates smoking and delivers nicotine and other substances. The term 'electronic smoking devices' covers the entire electronic product and is the term that the FDA and other states are using in their laws and proposed regulations.

"HB672, CD1 was further amended to satisfy the Attorney General's concern that this bill could be interpreted to require tobacco products to be hidden from sight by adding a provision requiring retailers who sell cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, and all other tobacco products to do so only in a direct face-to-face exchange between the retailer and consumer, with an exception

for retail tobacco stores, bars or establishments where the minimum age for admission is 18. This new language requiring direct face-to-face exchange between the retailer and consumer mirrors the federal regulations around the sale of cigarettes and smokeless tobacco. The Committee on Conference specifically included 'all other tobacco products' to ensure that all tobacco products are prohibited from being sold in any self-service display. Furthermore, the conference committee exempted businesses who engage in the sale of duty-free merchandise from this provision.

"HB672, CD1 is an important step forward in our efforts to improve Hawaii's health by encouraging a smoke-free, tobacco-free Hawaii. I urge all my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"Certainly, we're all concerned about homeland security, but just because we call something 'homeland security' does not make it so, and I'm concerned that we're going to have a duplication of efforts within our Department of Defense in the state. I have been assured that is not the case. We've had conflicting testimony about the need for this bill and right now there is no appropriation. So, I'm voting with reservations until we found out the exact direction of the changes here. If we have a redeployment of personnel within the department, that would be fine. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 157 was adopted and S.B. No. 680, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELAND SECURITY," having been read throughout,

passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kahale, Nishihara, Slom, Solomon). Noes, 1 (Thielen).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 160 (S.B. No. 1133, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Gabbard moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 160 be adopted and S.B. No. 1133, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President; you know I have to speak in opposition to this bill. Yes, yes, I do. What this bill does is take away the exemption for dietary supplements and taxes them along with my sugary beverage and all the other things. Now, we spent two legislative sessions talking about the little fat kids – oh, excuse me, the problem of obesity – and now we're taking away the dietary supplements and we're going to tax that even more. And I remind my colleagues, we already pay the general excise tax and then beverage tax when we go to the store and buy any kind of beverage, but now we're taking it out on those darling little keiki. I think it's wrong. I urge my colleagues to reconsider. Thank you."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd just like to clarify that this does not apply on any fees to legitimate dietary supplements. The primary thing it does is includes energy drinks such as 5-Hour Energy in the HI-5 program. We all wish everyone would've recycled without the HI-5 program, but we needed the HI-5 program and there's a lot of recycling as a result. This just adds a few more million plastic bottles to what gets recycled every year. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 160 was adopted and S.B. No. 1133, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINER PROGRAM," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of HB65 HD2 SD2 CD1.

"HB65 CD1 allows beneficiaries of prescription drug benefit plans to opt out of the requirement to purchase prescription drugs from a mail order pharmacy and provides them with an opportunity to choose to purchase prescription drugs from a pharmacy within the pharmacy benefit manager's retail pharmacy network.

"Currently, many pharmacy benefit managers and other prescription drug benefit plan providers require beneficiaries to purchase certain prescription drugs only from a mail order pharmacy. This mail order requirement makes it difficult for

beneficiaries who live in rural areas and/or who are in immediate need of medication to obtain prescription drugs in a timely manner. With recent cuts to the post office hours, some delivery times have increased for mail orders. Furthermore, many beneficiaries trust and rely on face-to-face interactions with their local community pharmacists who are familiar with their medical history and can better assist with any questions or concerns they may have relating to prescription drugs or watch out for drug interactions. It is important to note that for consumers who take multiple prescription drugs, a face-to-face interaction with a pharmacist may prevent dangerous drug interactions and avoidable health consequences.

"HB65 CD1 increases consumer choice by allowing beneficiaries to opt out of the mandatory mail order provisions. This in turn will help increase competition in the marketplace, encourage utilization of community pharmacies all while remaining cost neutral to plans and beneficiaries. It is important to also note, it is not the intention of HB65, CD1 to interfere with existing incentive programs.

"Thus, passage of HB65 CD1 will significantly benefit plan members by giving them the choice to opt out of mandatory mail order provisions to accommodate their unique circumstances. It applies to all plans including the Hawaii Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund health benefits plan, enhancing pharmacy networks without reducing legitimate incentives to encourage health and wellness.

"I urge all my colleagues to join me to vote 'aye' on this important measure for all our communities. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This bill has had a long journey this session. It started from a bill that was going to provide buybacks of firearms and so forth, and now it's down to background registration expanded and broadened. People that don't understand the Second Amendment don't understand firearms, don't understand that in fact we do have background checks. The background checks are not going to make us any safer. They're not going to eliminate the horrendous and terrible shootings and occurrences on the mainland. This is 'feel-good' legislation; it is unnecessary, not needed.

"It's going to be further burdensome. Anybody in the State of Hawai'i who has registered a firearm within the last six months has found that if they go, particularly in the City and County of Honolulu, waits may be up to eight or nine hours to do that. So, we're putting a burden on firearms owners and legitimate Second Amendment individuals.

"Again, some people say, 'Well, why should you be fighting anything or opposing anything like this? We have to register our car every year, we have to get safety inspections; we have to do this.' I remind everybody: there is a major difference between the Second Amendment and license or privilege of other activities. This is a guaranteed right, and every time we

make further incursions into the rights of individuals exercising that constitutional right, then we weaken our Constitution. Thank you."

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I really don't know what all the fuss is about. There's no 'incursions' on anyone's rights or infringements on anyone's Second Amendment. We understand the right to bear arms, but that doesn't mean you can own a Stinger missile. We understand the right to bear arms, but that doesn't mean you can have a bazooka. Society places rules and restrictions on certain items; and in our society, the weapon known as the gun, the firearm, certainly has certain restrictions.

"This bill just closes a loophole, a gap, in our law. If anyone brings in a gun to Hawai'i, it must be registered, which makes sense, and the person must have a background check. That makes sense. If we didn't have this law, hypothetically, would that mean a person, a criminal, in Miami who wants to vacation here who feels he might be in jeopardy of his life or safety can bring a gun? This closes a loophole; and let me, by the way, remind everybody the Hawaii Rifle Association supported this measure. And I believe all of the advocates who were against this were probably those same individuals who, at the national level, were saying, 'We don't want background checks at gun shows.' So, anybody could walk into a shopping mall or a cafeteria or a side street gun show and buy a gun with no background checks. I saw a segment on television where that happened: people were buying guns without any checks. They were just selling them straight cash up front. And then you see some testimony from the NRA saying, 'Well, these are all legally acquired.' How do we know they are legally acquired if you don't check? So, I ask you to support this bill. Thank you."

But I don't like further requirements on employers, particularly smaller employers, making them set aside space, making them set aside additional time in addition to the rules that we've already adopted by law for breaks and for lunch periods and so forth. What we're doing is once again making a burden, particularly on those smaller businesses; and when we talk about limitations on the size of business and all of that, we know that every time we pass a bill, we start out with one number of employees and we always reduce that.

"So, let's continue breastfeeding. The law is working correctly right now, but let's not add any additional burdens to small business owners. Thank you."

But the idea and the opinion I want to share with my colleagues is this: When we talk about internment of the Japanese during World War II, that decision was made by the Democrat President of the United States Franklin Delano Roosevelt in opposition to information that was given to him by the military and by the head of the FBI J. Edgar Hoover at the time. This was in excess of executive power, and that's what Mr. Korematsu stood up against.

"I think this is extremely important that we recognize, not only this individual who was courageous, but also the fact that cyclically we see every generation or so that the executive branch seems to want to take it upon itself to have additional powers, which sometimes many of us sit back and just either don't get involved with or say that's okay. We're going through some of the same situations right now with the executive order to kill American citizens on foreign soil and possibly on domestic soil, and the use of domestic drones for the purpose of taking out those people that the executive branch considers to be problematic.

"So, when we pass this bill and we celebrate this holiday, let's celebrate the true meaning and let's be ever vigilant about excessive power by our government. Thank you."

We've had national experts from the mainland who have flown here and are looking at this concept that Hawai'i originated as a model that they can emulate. So, I'd like to congratulate DBEDT and PUC for their hard work on this bill.

"Colleagues, this will help the guys without 24-karat credit to afford renewable energy such as PV. Just to be clear: it's not for people with multi-million dollar mansions; they have other options. Instead, this is intended for the rubber slipper folks – the people who barbecue in their backyards and tailgate at UH football games, not the country club set. It's for those who shop at Longs instead of Louis Vuitton. It's for the folks who drive older Hondas and Toyotas instead of brand new Lamborghinis and Ferraris. In other words, this green financing infrastructure is for the majority of our constituents to allow them to borrow

to install renewable energy and to repay the loans over time through their electric bills.

“The song that comes to mind is, ‘Here comes the sun...’ I ask for your support for this revolutionary bill. Mahalo.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered in the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz’s remarks read as follows:

“As legislators, we realize that significant investments must be made in order to achieve the State’s goals of energy self-sufficiency and energy security and diversification. This bill moves us closer to meeting our Renewable Portfolio Standards and Energy Efficiency Portfolio Standards.

“This bill will assist with green infrastructure installations and support Hawaii’s evolving energy market and ecosystem and provide affordable and accessible energy options for Hawaii’s consumers.

“High up-front costs of green infrastructure equipment prevent many customers from purchasing alternative energy options thus lose the benefit of lower energy costs. This measure will provide a means of acquiring and providing an alternative low-cost financing to underserved markets, enabling the installation of affordable and green infrastructure equipment in those markets.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just wanted to congratulate and say ‘thank you’ to Chair Gabbard and Richard Lim of DBEDT and Mark Glick of the Department of Energy and the others who worked on this. As the senator just said, this is the first such bill, I believe, in the nation and possibly in the world; and it will bring the benefits of solar energy to lower income households, and I think it’s a truly landmark legislation we can be really proud of. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’d also like to rise in support of this bill, and give my mahalos to the Chair of the Energy and Environment Committee in the Senate and then also his counterpart in the House on this excellent legislation. I appreciate the work that was done by DBEDT, and I think that this is something that really helps in the private marketplace to democratize renewable energy and to put Hawai’i on much more resilient and self-reliant footing. So, thank you again very much for this great legislation.”

We are really sitting ducks as a state. We are deep pockets, and more and more people are suing the state, trying to get easy money. There are legitimate claims against the state and these should be paid, but I would hope that the Attorney General’s office and the legal department would sometimes take a tougher point of view against automatically paying off these claims. Thank you.”

Hawai'i, the high cost of transporting feed, the difficulties in maintaining a competitive edge in this state. And by just continuing subsidies rather than making some substantive changes and systemic changes, all we're doing is making sure that we'll continue to have more and more types of agriculture, as this bill indicates, dependent on taxpayer subsidy. Thank you."

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm glad that this bill came up. My humble Agriculture Chair, that I had the pleasure of serving as a Vice Chair, was very short in his comments on the budget, and really didn't talk about some of the great things that he's done to try and help ensure that we can move away from subsidies.

"I am supporting this because we want to keep agriculture strong and viable, but in the budget we have \$600,000 for a digester that will create feed for hogs and liquid fertilizer that would be at a lower cost than our farmers are now getting. It would produce energy and it would put crops such as sorghum back into the fields for fallow lands that we have that are not working now. And so, with the help of Jimmy Nakatani and the Agribusiness Development Corporation, we are trying to find ways to get off the subsidies to be self-sufficient; and in that process, this digester would create 40 private sector jobs as this would be a public-private partnership, and I think these are the kind of solutions and answers that we're looking for to move Hawai'i forward. So, thank you very much."

Thank you."

It's a bad policy. I'm all for paying the promises that we've made, but we're increasing salaries, we're increasing compensation and benefits, and we do not have the money and will not have the money to do this. Thank you."

"The only industry that is carrying the weight of our economy and keeping people employed is Hawai'i's visitor

industry. It had a record-breaking year last year in terms of visitor arrivals and expenditures. It's on pace right now for another record year. That's something we should all celebrate.

"But we should also be cognizant of the fact that we have not diversified our economy; we have not refueled our economy; we have not done anything to make our business and investment climate better. So, the call is, 'Let's continue to tax the visitor industry.' The good news is there were bills early in this session to actually increase the transient accommodations tax from the current supposed temporary 9.25 percent to 11.25 percent. Well, that died, and everybody's patting themselves on the back and saying, 'All we did now was make this temporary tax, which was supposed to sunset, permanent – 9.25 percent.' In addition to that, when you go to a hotel – and all of us do because we become tourists when we go to another island and we try to help the economy with 'staycations' – but when we go, we're paying the 9.25 percent plus we're paying the 4.5 percent or 4.0 percent on the neighbor islands. It's expensive, and I hear people tell me, 'Well, what does a couple more bucks mean to a tourist? They don't care, in the total package.' But guess what? They do care, and it all adds up. And there are many other areas that are competitive with Hawai'i in terms of attracting our visitors.

"Additionally, we know that even though we are enjoying record-breaking amounts of visitor arrivals and expenditures, if we converted them to nominal rates, these are the same rates we had in the 1980s. So, we're doing well compared to every other industry that's not doing well, but we're not doing that well.

"And we know that the visitor industry is very ethereal. We know that our Asian visitors are very skittish right now about what's happening in North Korea and other places around the world. We saw what happened at the Boston Marathon. We know how disruptive things can be and how easily you can change that visitor industry.

"So why do we keep penalizing them and punishing them? Well, the answer is really easy: because the transient accommodation tax, which years ago started out as a tax to fund a state convention center, is now being used by many diverse organizations who see it as a source of additional revenue for their programs.

"So, I think this is a bad idea. It's bad precedence, and I wish you'd reconsider. Thank you."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Madam President, it just amazes me; the previous speaker reminds me of an area of the old Honolulu Stadium – the grandstand. It's amazing that everything that he has to say has much bluster, but does it have facts attached to it?

"This is the number one industry in the State of Hawai'i. This particular bill helps balance the budget, and it balances the budget for the next several years and the outlying years as well. The hotel industry, the visitor industry, has agreed that 9.25 is a good percentage that we made it permanent at this particular point. The Hawai'i Convention Center now has clear direction in the allocation of \$33 million. The Hawai'i Tourism Authority now has much more strength in promoting our number one industry throughout the state and throughout the entire nation and throughout the world. The neighbor islands now can make plans because they have clarity on what they'll be receiving from this particular tax. We'll also have the opportunity to fund our natural resources with the excess revenue coming from this particular tax.

"So, colleagues, I would want you and ask you to support this particular measure because what it does is it completes our

budget, it completes our year, and this is the final piece of the puzzle in our budget. Thank you very much."

Senator Slom rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"I respect the majority leader very much and I always listen to his comments. Now, when he criticizes me, that's okay, but to criticize our beloved 'Termite Palace' that everybody spent so much time and encouragement at – where you could afford the admission, you could afford the beer, you could afford the enjoyment there – to attack the 'Termite Palace' as somehow being something out of place... Madam President, it cuts me to the quick.

"Although, he did get one thing right: this is about balancing the budget. It's not about helping the visitor industry or helping the economy; it's about balancing the budget for all these outrageous costs that we've just voted to approve. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"A brief rebuttal, and I apologize to the 'Termite Palace.' Mahalo. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 146 was adopted and S.B. No. 1194, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 150 (S.B. No. 46, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, C.D. 1):

Senator Taniguchi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 150 be adopted and S.B. No. 46, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, thank you for your patience and support on this issue as we have worked to be in compliance with the federal mandates dealing with post-secondary state authorization requirements for the last three years. What has been at stake is federal Title IV's financial aid for roughly 63,000 students in Hawai'i, totaling more than \$283 million if we fail to stand up a process of authorization by this session in order to meet the July 1, 2013 deadline. Thanks to many individuals, of particular note Krislen Maunakea in our Senate Majority Office, Hawai'i has gone from being amongst the farthest states behind in this area to being referenced in national circles as having one of the most model legislations that other states are now looking at adopting. I would humbly ask for your support in continuing to move this measure forward. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Tokuda's additional remarks read as follows:

"Since 2010 when Congress passed requirements for states to authorize post secondary institutions that operate and serve students in their state, Hawaii has been working vigorously to comply in order to maintain eligibility for the roughly 63,000 students that would be impacted and receive over \$283 million in federal student aid under Title IV.

"Unlike other states that have a Department of Higher Education or active boards and commissions to oversee, monitor and regulate both their public and private institutions, Hawaii has historically lacked this kind of formal governance structure, and as such, had amongst the farthest to go in terms of compliance when it came to the recently enacted

amendments to the Re-authorization of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

“For the past three years, we have worked closely with the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE), the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), our local public and private post secondary institutions and the Office of the Governor to create a regulatory framework and process that would meet all of the requirements for both federal law and to participate in interstate reciprocity agreements that are being created.

“Looking for models of best practice and for what would be most similar to Hawaii, we worked closely with the Colorado legislature to use their statute as a ‘straw man’ and integrated into it the various requirements being development under the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA), all the while tweaking the measure to be appropriate for what works best for our state and institutions.

“This has truly been an effort in collaboration and cooperation, with multiple agencies and over a dozen individuals from across the country coming together to help Hawaii craft what is now being hailed as one of the most progressive state authorization laws in the country. Whereas our state started with nothing in terms of a governance and regulatory framework, we now have a system in place that is not overly burdensome, but that provides sufficient oversight and checks and balances to protect our students as consumers of post secondary institutions.

“All of this would not have been possible had it not been for the hard work of many individuals, but in particular, I would like to point out the herculean efforts of our Senate Majority Research attorney Krislen Maunakea, who saw this through from the very beginning and made a very complex and complicated subject understandable. Tammi Chun, Education Policy Advisory to the Governor was also invaluable, both in analyzing the requirements, working to draft the policies and interface with the executive agencies and interfacing with the US Department of Education. And last, but not least, Vice Chair of the House Higher Education Committee Representative Linda Ichiyama was an outstanding partner in helping to navigate this complex piece of legislation through a tough session – without her assistance and her ability to amend the bill to make it stronger overall, it’s passage would not have been possible.

“Now that the guiding statute has been set in place, the real hard work begins in implementing all that is required to comply. With the \$400,000 we have appropriated through this measure, I believe DCCA has both the framework and the resources it needs to do what is right for the students of Hawaii.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I want to acknowledge the hard work of the Senate Education Chair. She undertook this very monumental task when she chaired both lower and higher ed. I think CD1 is a testament to her ability to grasp all of the things that needed to be in this legislation, but also her willingness to work with a ‘new’ agency, DCCA, that is being tasked with implementing this measure and to make this measure very workable for them as well as for the institutions having to comply. This measure, a mandate from the US DOE, is important so that our students here in Hawai’i can continue to receive much needed financial aid and loans. Thank you.”

Senator Tokuda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 170 be adopted and S.B. No. 237, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“While there have been many contentious discussions surrounding this measure, I believe the conference draft that emerged from committee took into account all of the concerns raised and put forth a prudent, piloted approach that will still allow the Department of Education and Board of Education to be innovative as it looks at ways to most responsibly utilize its lands and facilities to provide our students with twenty-first century schools.

“Very much in line with the Senate position going into negotiations, this bill has a defined timeframe within which the department and board must act, requiring that the identification of possible sites and execution of leases must be completed within five years of the signing of this bill. No other sites can be selected or leases executed after such time, unless the Legislature comes back and, through full public discourse, determines that such actions are warranted. Wanting to first explore a well-defined proof of concept, S.B. No. 237 allows the board to identify and select up to five public school land sites as candidates for participation in the pilot program but may lease no more than three of the identified sites.

“In concert with our goals to maximize school and community engagement throughout the process, we have required that the department hold at least one public meeting in each affected community, and must report on their community engagement efforts annually until all of the projects are completed. Responding to county concerns, we have been explicitly redundant and included in the bill language that reiterates that any redevelopment shall comply with county plans, ordinances, and zoning and development codes and requires all required government approvals and permits. We have also included language that requires the department to consult with the county if the land is owned by the county.

“This bill does not fast track any development, and while it does allow the Board of Education to lease lands versus the Board of Land and Natural Resources, we have included language in the conference draft that aligns the lease process with Chapter 171, and allows the DOE to work with any department or agency and receive assistance from them, including DLNR, to carry out the purposes of this pilot.

“In looking at the bill before us, I do believe we were successful in being both bold and responsible as we seek to create community-centered schools that meet the needs and challenges of the twenty-first century, and humbly ask for your support.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I know it’s been a long day, colleagues. I’m going to begin by again complimenting the Chair of the Education Committee. I think she’s done an excellent job in narrowly crafting a bill, of not having exemptions for the land use and zoning, making sure that there is coordination with the city and county, and also permitting the working with other departments.

“But in my reading of the final version of the bill, it still does decouple the long-term leasing process from Chapter 171, and does not place any mandatory requirements on the department to be conducting those lease negotiations through the public bidding process. And so, in order to be consistent with my opposition to the bill, I am going to vote ‘no’ on it.

“I think we will have time to come back next year to address this concern, and hopefully we can. I know there were some comments raised earlier that because some of these school properties are owned by the City and County of Honolulu, there would have to be a public process through the county council,

but that public process, under the city and county ordinances, would only apply to the memorandum of agreement between the state and the city. It would not necessarily apply to the lease negotiations between the state and any long-term developers.

“One of my colleagues commented that since the procurement code would apply to the lease negotiations, there would be a bidding process. However, under HRS 103(d), I think it is, the procurement code only applies to the purchase of goods, services, and construction contracts. It specifically exempts long-term leases of land from the definition of goods. So, in the decoupling of the DOE from the DLNR process, we have inadvertently decoupled these long-term lease negotiations from any requirement that they be done through the public bidding process. My hope is that if this bill passes we can come back next year and provide some type of guidelines to make sure that that leasing process honors the public trust. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I support a lot of statements that were just made by the good senator from Waimanalo. First of all, we, in negotiations, got bullied by the House conferees. This is not the Senate bill, not the Senate position. And earlier we had the discussion on S.B. No. 1171, and the issue was whether or not the state was a good steward of the ‘āina. Well, if we look at past practices of the State Department of Education, the DOE, we find that citizens have had to fight for their community schools against closure and, in fact, lost that battle in a number of areas. They have fought against decisions made by the DOE without consultation and input from the community. The issue of city-owned lands sitting beneath public schools I do not think has been totally resolved; it is not resolved in this bill. And if we had to rely on the city council, we can see what’s happening with the rail and HART negotiations, as well as budget negotiations right now. So, for all of these reasons, I’m in opposition. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 170 was adopted and S.B. No. 237, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 19; Ayes with Reservations (Galuteria, Ihara, Nishihara, Solomon). Noes, 5 (Dela Cruz, Kidani, Slom, Taniguchi, Thielen). Excused, 1 (Hee).

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This, of course, is the crown jewel of the governor’s proposal to have massive new spending. It is a result of a tremendous lobbying effort that started last year and the expenditure of a great deal of money. It’s not really school readiness; it’s a subsidy of school services that currently are paid for directly by parents. It’s also a result of the Legislature’s action in ending the Pre-K program a number of years ago.

“This basically is not education; it’s babysitting. And it is a change of who pays for these services. We’re not creating any new services; we have services now. People can pay for them,

but now we're asking the taxpayers to pay for those who have children who are four years of age. And as discussed previously and in hearings, the proponents of this legislation do not want to stop at four-year-olds; their stated objective is we'll start with the four-year-olds, and then we'll do the three-year-olds, the two-year-olds, the one-year-olds. They want the state to be responsible for the education and the financing for all of this.

"Again, we're talking about a lot of money. It has been estimated that the real cost and the full cost of this program will be \$100 million dollars on a biennium budget. This is a modest proposal of \$6 million, whereas the governor had suggested \$20 million, but the numbers are misleading because they will go up, and that's just for the four-year-olds in the first part of the program.

"This bill also depends on the passage of a constitutional amendment allowing public funds for private resources, private institutions that provide for so-called early learning right now.

"And finally, all we have to do is look at the studies that came out of Head Start, the massive amount of money that went to fund these programs, and the very manini amount of education that came from them. Thank you."

Unfortunately, we have slipped behind, but these two measures have now pushed us forward and we'll be looking at more improvements in the future years. I would just like to congratulate our Senate Health

Chair from Hawai'i County and the House Health Chair from Makiki for all of the work and effort, and all of the stakeholders and advocates involved as well. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I am in favor of the process that's being proposed, and that is the transfer of the medical marijuana program from Public Safety to Department of Health. In fact, I was the thirteenth vote in the Senate when we passed medical marijuana.

"However, the bill does contain the creation of a new special fund, and even though my colleagues would like me to vote for this special, special, special fund, I can't do it, haven't done it in 17 years, so I vote 'no.' Thank you."

"The bill is filled with wonderful words of encouragement for HI Growth Initiative and for the Department of Business and Economic Development. The problem is we've been told over and over again what we have to do to improve our business climate and investment climate, and we refuse to do that. Instead, we continue to have high taxes, additional taxes, fees, regulations, restrictions, and prohibitions. The government is not going to help with the growth initiative. It's going to come from entrepreneurs and people who are able to reach into their own pockets and provide new business, new jobs, new opportunities, but they're only going to do that if we have a hospitable, rather than a hostile, business climate. This bill doesn't do anything for that except tap more money and hire more bureaucrats. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 183 was adopted and H.B. No. 858, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HI GROWTH INITIATIVE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I think this bill sets a bad precedent. It is a constitutional amendment, however, and would have to be voted upon by the people. But to change our Constitution and what we're doing – to take public funds to support private institutions – right now, it only talks about early learning private institutions, but once this were in place, it could be broadened and expanded, and I think it's a bad policy. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, much of what we do here is maintaining, changing, adding to, or repealing what policymakers of the past did before us. This is not a bad thing, merely an observation of how government functions and works to keep society moving. But I raise this point to illustrate how unique an opportunity we have in S.B. No. 1084 to be a part of the beginning, the very start, of something I believe is a real game-changer for our people and our state.

"I could cite you the statistics and studies again, from Heckman to Perry, about why access to high quality early learning opportunities are the greatest equalizer a child can have. I could remind you about the research done on Hawai'i concluding that the social benefit from early learning, from a lower crime rate to a more productive economy, is 4.2 times the cost of the investment.

"I could verbally refute the arguments that have come in against this bill asking you to vote 'no.' This is not a voucher system. It lacks the fundamental characteristics of a voucher system like absolute parental choice, and will not open the door to vouchers or privatization into the K-12 public education system.

"Or the fact that our state is amongst the strongest Blaine Amendment states in the country. This bill does not water down our Constitution's protection of the separation of church and state; and this voluntary program would allow faith-based preschool providers to either continue operating separate and apart from the program, or participate utilizing models of best practice taken from other states and the federal government that safeguard against entanglement issues.

"For those calling for mandatory kindergarten first, we've essentially achieved that with 97-98 percent of children who would attend kindergarten if it were mandatory already attending on a voluntary basis.

"And then there was the K-12 argument: fund the system and focus on our K-12 pipeline first. On such a fundamental level, we are. By making sure our children are ready to learn

when they enter kindergarten and have access to high quality early learning opportunities regardless of their socio-economic status, regardless of where they live, we are enhancing the efforts already underway to improve and strengthen Hawai'i's P20 system of public education.

"In finally seeking to step out and create a publicly funded early learning system, we are the witnesses to a beginning, and it all started last year when we created the Executive Office on Early Learning. It has foundationally moved into our school readiness program which we just adopted through S.B. No. 1093, and has the potential to really take shape through this constitutional amendment because here's the thing: while we in government are new to the early learning game, our partners in the private sectors are leaders in the field. As I've said before, if you need a reason to support our early learning bills, you need look no further than our own communities, our own families, our own lives. If you or a loved one have had the benefit of a preschool education, it was because a private provider gave it to you. For decades, they have shouldered the burden and responsibility of educating our youngest children alone. This constitutional amendment would allow government to step up to the plate and partner with the private sector as we seek to prepare our children to be ready to succeed in both school and in life.

"A survey done last year for the People's Pulse showed a broad consensus in favor of funding early learning with 77 percent indicating that it was important to fund a preschool program here in Hawai'i. People in Hawai'i want to come out of the small minority of states that do not put public funds towards early learning, and this bill would allow people to affirmatively cast their vote in the direction they want to see our state go in. Even if you disagree with me despite the arguments and all of the points we have made thus far, I'll completely understand and respect your right to vote 'no' – on the general election ballot in 2014. But let us first give every voter in Hawai'i that opportunity. They deserve to make an educated and informed decision about how we should educate our youngest of keiki, and it starts with a 'yes' vote today. Thank you."

At 2:42 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 2:44 p.m.

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"As the spouse of a Hawai'i public school teacher for 18 years, I understand the concerns expressed by the teachers; I understand the life that a teacher has and the dedicated work that our public school teachers have put in. But I do agree with my colleague that I support putting this to a vote of the people of Hawai'i to hear from them, but would also state for the record today, so that I am on record in this chamber, that I oppose any voucher system today and would continue to oppose any voucher system going forward so there can be no confusion on my vote. Thank you."

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I don't believe it to be a voucher as it was reported to be. I do believe that the voters deserve to weigh in on this issue, so I will be supporting this measure. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I, too, speak in very strong support; and as an educator, I feel that this is timely for our Hawai'i, and I would like to

incorporate the remarks of the speaker, our majority whip, as though they were my own. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“As one who has experienced and attended school at the age of three years old in the fishing village of Miloli‘i, I speak in strong support of this measure and ask my colleagues to do the same. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’m also an educator by training; and I know that junior-K was very valuable, and I regret that we didn’t take the step of continuing to invest in that program. I’m concerned that while this is not a voucher per se, perhaps, Governor called me and said it wouldn’t be a voucher on his watch. Unfortunately, we can’t say that for future generations or for future governors. And I’m very concerned that what I hear in the community is that the schools that we might want to partner with are not interested because they’re concerned about strings that might come with that money, and if that’s the case, it means that this approach is not going to work.

“So, I would rather take a pause; let’s see what kind of implementing legislation advocates are able to come up with next year. The implementing bill did not get out of conference which makes me wary. I think we need to know the details of what voters will be asked to approve, and I think that would be the more appropriate way. So while I appreciate the dedication and passion of our Education Chair, I cannot vote for this measure; I voted against it when it was first considered in the Senate, and I’m being consistent. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I wanted to thank our Education Chair for her very diligent and very difficult task of bringing this measure this far. And I, too, must say that I do not support vouchers; however, I very strongly support our keiki. Aloha.

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal and said:

“I found this discussion very interesting because it’s really not about the keiki; it’s about the fear of vouchers. I do believe that the Governor, who is sitting up in the gallery, would never have vouchers; I absolutely believe he’s telling the truth... Yeah, because we don’t like choice for people in our state.

“These keiki have parents; let the parents be responsible for their children. We’re not talking about services that do not exist right now. We’re talking about asking the taxpayers to subsidize a small group of people, and we’re doing it because, as I said earlier, of legislative action to get rid of the pre-K program. And again, we’re talking about not four-year-olds, but the entire program – four-year-olds, three-year-olds, two-year-olds, one-year-olds. We’re talking about an extremely expensive program, and now we learn that while we would authorize or possibly authorize the use of public funds for private sources, oh, we’ve got to be really careful – don’t let any religious-based or any organizations that we don’t believe in, don’t let them have any of that money, so we’ll probably have additional legislation.

“So again, this is not about education; this is about funding and subsidies. I urge you to vote it down. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I think this is a tough call. I did have an opportunity to have a very good and thorough discussion with our governor, and we kind of concluded together – and I took a lot of his advice –

that ultimately, more resources being invested in education, at the end of the day, is a good thing. I think all of the studies have been showing that resources invested in children at an early age pay off. We certainly don’t want to do anything ever to undermine public education; in fact, I’d like to see companion measures to increase pay for school teachers. I think that’s the right place for us to put our money. But at the end of the day, I think this is a good investment for kids, so I’d urge my colleagues to also vote up.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1 was adopted and S.B. No. 1084, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE X, SECTION 1, OF THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION TO PERMIT THE APPROPRIATION OF PUBLIC FUNDS FOR PRIVATE EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAMS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I know it’s been a long day and from what I’ve heard, the measure was amended on the House side, so it appears the bill is dead. So, rather than make my remarks, I would just like to have them entered into the record.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen’s additional remarks read as follows:

“A press that is free to investigate and criticize the government is absolutely essential in a nation that practices self-government and is therefore dependent on an educated and enlightened citizenry.

“There is no question that some publications take advantage of the freedom of the press, and publish lies, gossip and trash that have nothing to do with enlightening people, and in some cases may even intend to deceive and mislead the people.

“One of the great political figures of our time was himself subject to these kinds of bad publications and personal attacks during his tenure. But despite the acts of some journalists, Thomas Jefferson remained a staunch believer in the ultimate triumph of truth in the free marketplace of ideas, and looked to that for his final vindication.

The basis of our governments being the opinion of the people, the very first object should be to keep that right; and were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers of newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter.

– Thomas Jefferson to Edward Carrington, 1787.

"I've heard opponents of this bill being described as 'self serving.' But I don't think anyone could describe Thomas Jefferson as self-serving.

"No doubt he would be horrified by the collapse and consolidation of the news media in today's world.

"No doubt he would applaud the attempts to democratize the reporting of news through the Internet.

"And no doubt he would judge reporting by its content, and not by who a reporter works for or how her work is disseminated. After all, he lived in a world where reporters and journalists did not work for corporations and did not always receive paid subscriptions for their reporting.

"Fellow Senators, we should support a strong and diverse free press. Please do not support this bill. Please do not adopt a state law whereby we define journalism by the type of employer and the method of circulation."

Aloha Senators & Representatives: This confirms that OCP has already testified concerning earlier versions of bills relating to booting, i.e. HB1100, that the practice is illegal under the current towing law HRS § 290-11 and that OCP is in agreement with the Attorney General's February 8, 2013 letter opinion that applying a tire boot to a vehicle constitutes Criminal Tampering in 2d Degree under HRS § 708-827(1).

As the Attorney General clearly points out in his letter opinion: "In order to commit the offense of second degree criminal tampering, the offender must have intentionally tampered with another person's property with the specific intent to cause substantial inconvenience to the other person, and the offender must have done so without that person's consent. It appears that applying a tire boot to a vehicle without consent would violate the criminal tampering statute."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As I discussed the other day with this bill, I find this very troubling. First of all, I don’t think this is a state issue or a state matter. I definitely think that it has to do with home rule – it’s the counties. And it also comes at a time when we have spent a great deal of our efforts and resources and time on trying to find solutions to homelessness. So I think this sends the wrong message, I think it’s unnecessary, and it’s an unwarranted intrusion by the state into county affairs. Thank you.”

Senator English moved that the Senate recommit Conf. Com. Rep. No. 56 and H.B. No. 31, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1 to the Committee on Conference.

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 130 be adopted and S.B. No. 946, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Madam President, I guess there’s discussion, and the discussion is why – while we all are for recapitalization of our unfunded debt, our tremendous \$25 billion unfunded debt – this bill, as amended and as changed by the House, I think does more of a disservice. The bill that the Senate had produced and provided, I think, was a clean bill and was an attempt to move us in the direction of recapitalization. But I think this bill fails in terms of the amount of money that would be mandated and committed over a period of time, and also the idea of setting up a statewide, state-operated, government captive insurance company again is not the way to properly do the fiscal decisions that need to be made. So, I would urge a ‘no’ vote on this bill. Thank you.”

So I would like to insert some comments into the Journal and a copy of the letter requesting the governor to line-item veto those appropriations that are explicit to the collective bargaining agreement, but allowing those other excluded members to receive the 4 percent raises that was offered.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Ige’s remarks read as follows:

“I rise to speak in support of this measure.

“Hawaii Government Employees Association – Unit 13 voted on April 30, 2013 to not ratify a proposed tentative agreement. The Administration has provided via Governor’s Message the estimated costs to fund increased salaries associated for the proposed tentative agreement. Included in the Governor’s Message was funding for those employees who are considered exempt and excluded and not affiliated as unionized employees of the State of Hawaii. For administrative purposes, salary increases and fringe benefits have previously been mirrored to those provided to Hawaii Government Employees Association - Unit 13 through finalized agreements. However, the Legislature recognizes Executive and Judiciary Branch authority to set salary increases for those employees who are exempt and excluded and not affiliated on a collectively bargained salary schedule. In light of Unit 13 not ratifying a contract prior to the conclusion of the 2013 Legislature, in sending this bill to the Governor, the Legislature recommends the executive to line-item veto any funding attributable to Hawaii Government Employees Association – Unit 13 costs, but allow for funding for those employees who are exempt and excluded and not affiliated on a collective bargained salary schedule at the Governor’s prerogative.”

The Chair having so ordered, the letter is identified as **“ATTACHMENT A”** to the Journal of this day.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As my colleagues know, I have spoken and voted against every collective bargaining bill this year, saying that in fact it was excessive; it was not fair to the private sector, who have to pay for these raises; and in addition to that, it was a question of fairness and equity in terms of increases at a time when our economy still struggled.

“But this was an interesting matter in that the state’s largest public employee union apparently voted to not accept the terms and conditions of the contract, which to me is amazing since it, as I said, is excessive in my point of view. But I think that there’s good reason not to adopt this. And also, one might even look into how fair that vote was because a number of the rank and file are complaining that while they supported it, their leadership, in a non-democratic manner, voted to decline the offer.

“So with all of this, I think it’s a bad bill, and I think we should decline it. Thank you.”

No. 1147, although similar, we passed it and rely on the advice of the attorney general to give counsel to the governor which of the two bills is in the interest of the people of Hawai‘i.

“As all of you know, both measures have to do with the disclosure of campaign contributions by Super PACs and the role of the Super PAC in elections of the past – the mayor’s race comes to mind immediately – and elections prospectively. Both bills promote transparency; both bills promote accountability. It’s unfortunate that the House two days ago unilaterally decided to recommit S.B. No. 31, but evidently, they have been persuaded to bring it back; and I am persuaded by you, Madam President, to honor the commitment of passing H.B. No. 1147 as we would have done on Tuesday. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I want to say a few words about H.B. No. 622, the media shield bill, believe it or not. I think much has been said – actually, too much has been said – with regard to the process, but it does highlight what I believe to be, or should I say... I don’t want to say ‘irresponsible,’ but maybe not ‘complete’ in the media’s reporting. For the last couple days, there’s been some comment by Jeff Portnoy, and so I want to focus on some of the things in the process that H.B. No. 622 went through.

“It’s been suggested that the blame be laid squarely on me, the Senate’s Judiciary and Labor Chairman. That suggests that it’s really an indictment, in my opinion, on everybody else – on everybody else. Jeff Portnoy, I presume, suggests that but for me, this bill would have passed; but for me, the sunset would have occurred, would have been removed.

“So, let’s look at the record. On January 29, 2013, the House Committee on Judiciary recommended that H.B. No. 622 be passed with amendments. The votes were as follows: 11 ayes, 0 noes, 2 excused. On February 12, H.B. No. 622 passed Second Reading, as amended, unanimously by the House. On Third Reading, it would have been unanimously adopted but for one vote – that was ‘no.’ On April 3, 2013, after crossover, the bill was heard by the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, and recommended that the measure be passed with amendments. The votes in the committee were 5 ayes, 0 noes, 0 excused. On April 5, the bill passed Second Reading by unanimous vote. On April 9, the bill passed Third Reading with one ‘no’ vote. On April 25, after the Conference Committees had deliberated and agreed by a vote to recommend a conference draft for the Senate, there were three votes in favor: Hee, Shimabukuro, and Slom, with reservations. There were two excused: Gabbard and Ihara. On February 25, the House committee recommended and there was one ‘no’ vote. And finally, on April 30, there were 16 ‘aye’ votes and 9 ‘no’ votes.

“I appreciate that Jeff Portnoy has offered me up as the one responsible. However, it indicts democracy, and that’s unfortunate. ‘The ship of democracy has weathered many storms.’ Guess who said that. You wouldn’t believe it if I told you, but I’m going to tell you. Not Big Bird, not Bert, not Elmo – because I went through all of these names – not Cookie Monster. Grover. Grover. I don’t even know what Grover looks like. Not Grover Cleveland.

“It’s interesting that much has been said over something that we’ve all participated in. I didn’t plan on talking about this, but I was humored by I don’t know what article I read where the Senate majority policy leader was quoted as saying, ‘Democracy is at stake.’ Oooh. ‘Democracy is at stake.’

“A few years ago, Judith Miller, a reporter for the *New York Times*, reported in her article that the CIA was in Iraq, and that the CIA individual that Judith Miller outed was Valerie Plame. And it was stated that part of her work, Plame’s work, concerned the determination of the use of aluminum tubes purchased by Iraq. CIA analysts, prior to the Iraq invasion, were quoted by the White House as believing that Iraq was trying to acquire nuclear weapons and that these aluminum tubes could be used in a centrifuge for nuclear enrichment. David Corn and Michael Isikoff argued that the undercover work being done by Plame and her CIA colleagues in the Directorate of Central Intelligence Nonproliferation Center strongly contradicted such a claim. However, the CIA was concerned enough to send Plame’s husband, Joseph Wilson, to Niger in 2002, to investigate the potential sale of nuclear materials from Niger to Iraq. ‘My name and identity were carelessly and recklessly abused by senior government officials in the White House and the State Department,’ and this abuse occurred for purely political reasons.

“You folks are old enough but may be, like me, too old to remember the details of this. This was George Bush’s effort to justify bombing Iraq, and to do so he sent Scooter Libby to drop on Judith Miller a small detail: there are weapons of mass destruction and the United States needs to take a proactive, aggressive action to stop the weapons of mass destruction. None were found – but democracy was at stake. Oooh. Democracy.

“But to finish off the story, Judith Miller was sent to jail; and after 85 days, she outed the outer, Scooter Libby. And shortly thereafter, guess what happened to Scooter Libby: President Bush pardoned him. Democracy was at stake. Oooh.

“The same policy leader said in an article I read that there were not enough votes for an amendment. You know, it’s like my son Kaohu once told me when he was trying out for the basketball team, and I kept telling him, ‘Why don’t you shoot

the ball?’ I told him, ‘If you score ten points, you guys win.’ And he told me, ‘I might not make the basket.’ So, if you don’t have the votes, how do you know? How do you know? You don’t know. Lay them down. Like we did on this bill was lay it down. Lay them down. But to say democracy is at risk and we don’t have the votes is to say, ‘I’m going to take my ball, and you know what, we’re going home because you know what? We cannot win.’ Sounds good. Sounds good, but if you don’t shoot the ball, you cannot make the basket. And this ball was shot many times, and the same one who’s now complaining about what’s at stake with democracy was the one who voted every time, every time.

“Here’s a guy – I don’t know if he’s a journalist – Rick Tubania in *Civil Beat*, who says, ‘What’s the big deal? If journalists are truthful, then they should not worry.’ If journalists are truthful, then they should not worry. But many of them, in order to sell, they report mistruth, half-truths, and hide behind the shield law. If journalists write about something that is their opinion, then they have no worry, but to cite something as true but not really is irresponsible journalism, creating false controversy. These journalists want to have their cake and eat it, too.

“I guess we’ll find out. Journalism seemed to be quite remarkable before this bill became law; and I suspect that democracy is really not at stake, that the earth will not swallow us up, and that the sky is not going to fall. These are the same kinds of arguments three years ago with the passage of civil unions: ‘The sky is going to fall.’ Damn near two and a half decades with the establishment of the hotel room tax: tourists weren’t going to come; the hotels were going to go empty. Fact is, I think Grover got it right: democracy has weathered many storms. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Galuteria rose to make the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. Just a very brief follow-up to the previous speaker with regard to the bill we were talking about: I think equally important about the contents of the bill was the learning moment that happened. Now, the floor amendment that was presented by the House was a very substantive change. It’s how we do business with our colleagues across the way, and how they intend to do business with us in the future. Now, to introduce such a change moments before the Senate begins its session lacked the transparency and openness that the public deserves. Ironically, it was to accommodate the needs of the media, an industry that calls for transparency, and that particular industry would advocate for a process that locks out the openness that the public deserves.

“This Senate will not stand for that, so we sent back the message that said, ‘No, listen; this is not correct. We do business the way we do business.’ And so the House has learned that the Senate stands for good business and transparency and openness, and that’s the way we’re going to play it from here on in.

“So, the majority stands firmly, and I’m sure the minority leader will have something to say; perhaps not. We stand firmly behind Senator Hee and the process that the Senate advocates for. Thank you for that, Madam President.

“Now lastly, I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you. This is a ‘thank you’ moment. Madam President, this was your first session as our leader. I know that you’ve taken great pains to wear the new clothes, and so we thank you for that and for allowing us to do our work. To our Vice President: we thank him for his leadership, steady hand. To the money chair: we could not have asked for a better gentleman and scholar to lead us through our money deliberations. To all of the chairs of our different committees: thank you so much for taking everything that you had, pouring everything into

your work so that we could come out with our documents to govern this great land of ours.

“So as we finish off this particular session, we’ve learned so much about not only the way the House intends to do business with us, but we’ve sent a strong signal about how we intend to do business with the House. And in knowing how we do business together, we will just continue to ensure the quality of life for this great land we call home – our Hawai‘i nei.

“So having said that, thank you to each and every one of our staffers and everyone who works at the Senate and in this beautiful building that is the people’s building. Thank you again for allowing me the time to share this mahalo nui loa as we move closer to our final sine die. Mahalo. Aloha.”

Senator Slom rose to make the following remarks:

“Madam President, as unaccustomed as I am to stand up, let me just say it was a very interesting and unique session this year. I think we accomplished many positive things, and there are other things that need our attention.

“I think that first of all, I want to thank the people that are really responsible for everything we do here – the taxpayers of Hawai‘i, because we pass things in their name but they get the bills. They don’t get the credit; they get the bills. So, thanks to all the taxpayers.

“I want to thank you, Madam President, and the leadership, who have treated me respectfully. I especially want to the Chair of the Economic Development Committee. He took a chance and he took a risk to do something that had not been done here in 21 years, and that is to have a member of the other party in a leadership position. When my early discussions with him were taking place, I said, ‘I’m going to disagree with you. I’m going to vote against some of your bills,’ and all that, and he said, ‘That’s alright,’ and we did that throughout the entire session. So, I thank him for that. I enjoyed that position, and if he needs help in the future, I’ll be glad to do that.

“I think that of all the things that we did we kept our promise on repeal of the PLDC; the Governor has now signed that bill into law. I think that we were very serious this year in terms of the recapitalization of our massive \$25 billion unfunded debt. We can’t do it all in one year. We have to keep the promises that we made to people who have relied on those government promises in the past. But we have made steps, taken serious steps towards paying that amount down and to changing the direction that we have.

“I want to thank my staff as well; I’ve thanked them previously. My staff is unique in this building; they have the responsibility for getting me in and around and knowledgeable of all 16 Senate committees, and they’ve done a fantastic job all session doing that. They’ve done it with grace. They’ve done it with energy. They’ve done it with enthusiasm.

“I mentioned our Budget Director, Mr. Paul Harleman, who did an alternative budget like no other that’s been done the last several years. It’s still up online now; it is a serious document. It shows what can be done in another direction to get us away from this death spiral of taxes and fees and more debt. We’ve got to do that because we know the direction that we’re headed right now financially. Our state budget director has told us. We can see it. Anybody that can read a simple balance sheet or balance their checkbook knows that you cannot keep spending more than you take in; and yet we keep trying to do that.

“So, those were some of the good things that we did. I think that it was interesting that we probably had fewer bills come out of conference committee this year than in past years, but hopefully they are good bills. And while we disagreed on some of the issues, and I narrowly lost the votes 24 to 1 usually, at

least we had discussion. And if we’re talking about transparency, I would encourage more discussion. We need to let the public know why we support a bill or why we oppose it, and we need to vote it up or down; it’s as simple as that. And we’ve done that this year, to a greater extent, but we still have a ways to go, and I don’t think any of my colleagues would disagree that we can always do better, whatever it is that we do.

“So the budget, the \$24 billion budget, is going to loom large. Again, as I said the other day, we respect and admire all of the work that was done and the conscientiousness, including the work that the Vice Chairman of Ways and Means did with the capital improvements budget. It’s really hard when you’ve got everybody asking for something and you have to say ‘no,’ or ‘not at this time,’ or ‘no, not this amount.’ And that’s our job. We’re not here to be buddies, particularly to special interests or certain groups or certain individuals. We are here to do the people’s business, and it is all about democracy. And democracy – it’s interesting. It gets battered. It gets knocked down. It gets up again. It gets knocked down. It gets up again. That’s what we do.

“I’m probably most concerned that a number of things did not happen, Madam President. You may recall, back in January, my opening statement. One of the things that I said was that we really don’t take care of the misuse of public funds or misuse of authority. There are no consequences for bad behavior in government. I think this is still clear in the issue of the University of Hawai‘i, my alma mater. We’re all proud of the university. We like to highlight the things that they’ve done, but believe me, they have not done the things that the Senate Special Accountability Committee ordered or asked them to do, and what the public supported. The public supported the Senate; the public supported our investigation of what was going on, and they kept begging us to make sure that there are changes at the university. I am not sure that the head administration has gotten the message. I am not sure that we’re going to see the independence that we need from the Board of Regents. But that’s our job, too – to follow up and to work on it – and so we’ll do the best that we can.

“On opening day also, I talked about one of our citizens, one of our residents, who now has been imprisoned by the federal government for nearly three years: Roger Christie of the Big Island. I think it’s a travesty that this Senate could not even adopt a resolution in support of Mr. Christie. We’re not talking about his guilt or innocence. We’re talking about an individual who has been denied basic civil and judicial rights for three years because the federal government wants to make an example of him. But we couldn’t even come together in this body to show support and to ask that he be given the very simple things like a bail hearing. Yet, we have a Secret Service agent who was here for APEC last year who allegedly killed another individual; he was out on bail. He’s okay. But somehow, Roger Christie remains a danger and a threat to our society. Can’t understand that; can’t believe that. And that was the Senate that did not adopt that.

“And again, I’m sorry to say that even though we’ve had such great aloha for animals, the poor native Hawaiian hoary bat again did not pass this state, did not pass this legislature. Held hostage for a number of personal and political reasons; not because of the bat itself because even the environmentalists were saying what a wonderful creature he is (or ‘she’ is, in the case of ‘madam’ bats).

“And then we did talk about the journalism shield law and bill, and there’s been a lot of discussion. There’s a couple things that I guess could be mentioned: number one, the government really has no business involving itself in the freedom of speech or journalism issue, but we did. Five years ago, we passed model legislation, which has been copied around the country and it’s gotten good reviews and worked

really well. And in the discussion from the Judiciary Chairman about votes and how this bill progressed, there was no discussion about how the committee members did not see the drafts of the bill before the votes were taken, or how difficult it was for some committee members and the public to actually get details. But I am happy that we've moved from 1947 and the Dewey Headline up to Judith Miller, so we are making some progress there. The Legislature should not coddle or help specifically one industry over another. And again, this area of free speech and journalism is important, but neither should we be trying to determine and define who is a journalist and what is acceptable journalism, particularly since we laud ourselves on our technological advances and we have moved away from the old printed monopoly publication of news. But be that as it may, this will be for another day and another discussion.

"It is important to note that we in the Senate do have a different responsibility and a greater responsibility than our members across the hall. And process is extremely important, but I think far too often we use process as an excuse not to do things that we can do. And again, it's really simple. Vote something up or vote it down – we can bring that forward.

"So overall, Madam President, I think we can say safely that we accomplished a number of positive things for the community, but we cannot and should not forget the taxpayers of this state because ultimately it is their burden. And we must work harder to improve our business and economic climate. I couldn't find one bill this year that was beneficial to businesses, particularly when we asked them to come here and tell us what they need to expand their business, to keep their business, to have new investment. We have bills and we have legislation that they wound up spending most of their time opposing. Fortunately, most of the bills did not pass. Fortunately, in the budget that we adopted, there are no new major tax incentives – or, I should say, tax increases. Many of the incentives are still under discussion, but we do have a lot of mandated benefits for business, and a tremendous amount of new fees or increased fees for business. Somebody's got to pay this, and ultimately it is the taxpayers and the consumers of our state.

"So, Madam President, thank you again for your leadership. Thank you to my colleagues for your courtesies, and hopefully we'll all be back next year to do an even better job. Aloha."

At this time, the President delivered her closing remarks as follows:

"As this 27th legislative session draws to a close, I would like to take this time to thank all of you for the amount of work and passion you have devoted to representing your respective districts.

"While we all have different issues that we are passionate about, this body and the House of Representatives can take a good measure of satisfaction in what we were able to achieve collectively.

"We began the year with unexpected changes thrust upon us with little time to prepare ourselves. But the Senate adjusted, and we did what was needed to ready ourselves for the responsibility entrusted to us by the electorate. While it took the House a little longer, the new leadership of both houses brought refreshing changes.

"We dealt with the uncertainty in the direction of our economic recovery and the pent-up demand to restore the cutbacks of recent years and evaluated and considered hundreds of proposals as part of our normal course of business. Despite the scope of the work before us, I believe we fulfilled our obligations as legislators and succeeded in providing a solid foundation for the continued progress of our island community.

"I would be remiss in not highlighting the huge change both Houses adopted in the way we deliberated over the budget and how we dealt with the final day of conference committees. Gone were the late nights of agree/disagree/limbo budget volleying. Gone was the Friday deadline extensions and the chaos that ensued in Committee Room 309, making decisions while the midnight dead line loomed.

"We were able to accomplish this largely due to our money chairs and vice chairs closing the budget and CIP in record time and by House and Senate leadership sticking to a firm deadline with not a single extension on bill negotiations. This took discipline from both houses and I commend all of you for that. But this day, and every day of our session, was not of our own doing. So I'd like to take this opportunity, speaking for all Senators, to extend our heartfelt and profound gratitude to those who worked on our behalf and that of all the people of Hawaii. I speak of our unseen heroes – our legislative aides, office managers, and support staff who kept us informed and got us where we needed to be, on time and worked long hours into the night and on weekends.

"Our Senate Clerk Carol Taniguchi and her staff, who ensured that our bills and committee reports were timely and properly, prepared the orders of the day, and oversaw the many legal nuances of the legislative process.

"The Ways and Means and Judiciary staffers, who made preparations long before we formally convened in anticipation of the complex measures we were to consider and were often the last ones to leave this building.

"The Sergeant-at-Arms Ben Villafior and his staff, who prepared our committee rooms, kept order in the gallery and assisted us with everything from the mundane to the impossible.

"Data Systems – Jon Shimabuku and his staff kept us both connected and paperless.

"The document center – Tia Lobendahn – and Journal Clerk Grace Wong did a remarkable job in keeping abreast of the day-to-day flurry of activity.

"The Senate Majority Office – Casey Hines, Richard Wada, and the SMA staff; Senate Minority Office – Sam Slom with Paul and Herb; and Legislative Reference Bureau – Charlotte Carter-Yamauchi. These teams did yeoman's work in drafting bills, committee reports, legal checks and dealt with Chairs to get research and committee reports completed yesterday.

"Capitol TV and the Public Access Room who brought our proceedings to the public.

"Finally, on a personal note for my staff Terrence, Gina, Frances, Daniel, Nancy, Lauren and volunteers Bridget and Sam: I don't thank them enough for all that they do and for stepping up to help me fulfill my duties as President.

"Please, members, join me in a standing ovation to commend and thank these exceptional people for their professionalism and commitment to this institution.

"I dare to say that this has been a productive and successful session. It wasn't perfect and it wasn't always easy. But I am not only proud of what we achieved but appreciative of your spirit of teamwork and aloha. While we may not always agree on specific ideas, we can all agree that we want the people of Hawaii to enjoy a quality of life second to none and a future filled with hope and opportunity. Let's keep our eyes on this goal and let it inspire us to continue working together in the interim. Because even though the session formally ends today, we all know that our work continues throughout the interim. Committee Chairs you will be getting a memo soon requesting that you pick an interim project to work on that will to prepare

us and could be included in our Majority package for the 28th Legislative Session.

“But for now, let’s sine die, and collectively join in with our House colleagues.... for a House/Senate end of session gathering. Mahalo!”

ADJOURNMENT

Senator Espero moved that the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2013, adjourn Sine Die, seconded by Senator Slom and carried.

At 11:55 a.m., the President rapped her gavel and declared the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2013, adjourned Sine Die.

Dear Governor Abercrombie:

Hawaii Government Employees Association - Unit 13 voted on April 30, 2013 to not ratify a proposed tentative agreement. The Administration provided, via Governor's Message 272, the estimated costs to fund increased salaries associated for the proposed tentative agreement. Included in the Governor's Message was funding for those employees who are considered exempt and excluded and not affiliated as unionized employees of the State of Hawaii.

For administrative purposes, salary increases and fringe benefits have previously been mirrored to those provided to Hawaii Government Employees Association - Unit 13 through finalized agreements. However, we recognize the Executive and Judiciary Branch authority to set salary increases for those employees who are exempt and excluded and not affiliated on a collectively bargained salary schedule.

In light of Unit 13 not ratifying a contract prior to the conclusion of the 2013 Legislature, in sending this bill to the Governor, we recommend that line-item veto power be exercised with respect to any funding attributable to Hawaii Government Employees Association - Unit 13 included employee costs, but allow for funding for those employees who are exempt and excluded and not affiliated on a collective bargained salary schedule at the Governor's prerogative.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 909, entitled "A Bill for an Act Making Appropriations for Collective Bargaining Cost Items."

The purpose of this bill is to provide fund authorizations and appropriations for collective bargaining cost items for employees in unit 13 and its excluded counterparts, including salary increases and contributions to the Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust fund negotiated between the State and the Hawaii Government Employees Association for fiscal biennium 2013-2015.

The amounts appropriated for state employees included in bargaining unit 13 were placed in the bill in anticipation of ratification by the unit 13 members of the public employers' last collective bargaining offer including pay raises. The state employees included in unit 13 failed to ratify the proposal and thus the employer and the exclusive representative remain in negotiations. It is a well settled labor law that the employer may not unilaterally implement a non-negotiated pay raise during negotiations. Therefore, to avoid the possibility of subsequent administrative actions that may constitute committing a prohibited practice under chapter 89, Hawaii Revised Statutes, I cannot approve those parts of the bill that would appropriate funds for such a pay raise.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same."

Because of the foregoing objections, pursuant to my line item veto authority, I have stricken by drawing a line through each of the appropriation amounts in sections 1, 9, and 13 of this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 909 with the appropriations in sections 1, 9, and 13 stricken as set forth above.

The purpose of this bill is to expand the use of the Environmental Response Revolving Fund (“the Fund”) to, among other things, support the operations of an environmental disaster standby and response facility that shall be responsible for the recovery and rehabilitation of native wildlife affected by oil or fuel related disasters in the State of Hawaii.

This bill is objectionable because it is too narrow in scope and only allows the Fund to support the operations for a recovery and rehabilitation facility of native wildlife affected by oil related spills. If the goal of this bill is to provide funding for a specific facility, the grant appropriation process as provided under chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, would be a more appropriate funding source. Additionally, section 128D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, currently allows the Fund to be used

“[f]or oil spill planning, prevention, preparedness, education, research, training, removal, and remediation.” This would allow for the rehabilitation of wildlife harmed by an oil spill, although the responsible parties typically pay for such response.

This bill is also objectionable because it expands the number of programs that draw from the Fund generated by the Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax pursuant to section 243-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, commonly referred to as the “barrel tax,” without increasing the barrel tax allocation to support the expansion. The Fund has been declining due in part to: (1) the rising cost of oil; (2) the switch to alternative energy sources; and (3) the aviation fuel exemption. The Fund is already being burdened by supporting the environmental emergency response activities and approximately forty positions within the Department of Health and cannot support an additional program within the current allocation to the Department of Health.

This legislation addresses RCUH's role and leadership to affirm the organization's focus.

However, the composition of the RCUH governing board set forth in this bill leaves gaps in describing the expected competencies of individuals, only naming the professional backgrounds of only three appointees and not identifying the characteristics of the other five members of the board, relying instead entirely on the good judgment of the appointing parties to select appropriate individuals and to ensure balance of the board in important qualities such as experience. We should hold all appointing authorities, whether the Governor, President of the Senate, or Speaker of the House of Representatives, to a high standard in appointing individuals of competence, judgment, and integrity.

For the foregoing reasons, Senate Bill No. 1388, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1 will become law as Act 288, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, effective July 9, 2013, without my signature.

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RULES OF THE SENATE
of the
TWENTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

RULES OF THE SENATE

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1 Organization.

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

(1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.

(2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

(3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.

(4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.

(5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.

(6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.

(7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.

(8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.

(9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.

(10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.

- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.
- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.
- (17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

- (1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.
- (3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
- (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
- (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of

the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

(5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to agriculture; aquaculture, including mariculture.

(2) Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.

(3) Committee on Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism not specifically identified herein; other emerging industries development; financial and technical assistance to business; urban renewal; community development; housing development; film and digital media production; astronomy, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, and other scientific research and development activities; and recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and state government operations policy, including government efficiency; procurement, and state facilities not specifically identified herein.

(4) Committee on Education. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(5) Committee on Energy and Environment. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources; population; and environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(6) Committee on Health. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(7) Committee on Higher Education. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but not including Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(8) Committee on Human Services. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance; Medquest; youth services; early childhood learning and care programs under the Department of Human Services; vocational rehabilitation; long term care; programs relating to the promotion of the general well-being of Hawai'i's youth, families, elderly population; the homeless, and affordable and public housing.

(9) Committee on Judiciary and Labor. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts; crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters; criminal code revision; statutory revision; campaign spending and elections; ethics; constitutional matters; the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary; individual rights and civil liberties; public officers and employees; labor; employment opportunities and training; labor-management relations; collective bargaining; the Employees' Retirement System; and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund.

(10) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, and the sheriff's division, military and veterans' affairs, space exploration and aerospace development, civil defense, disaster readiness, county and federal relations, state building code, and matters of concern to the counties.

(11) Committee on Technology and the Arts. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the development of technology, including but not limited to the use of information storage, transmissions, processing, and telecommunications; and culture and the arts in the State, including but not limited to programs relating to historic preservation.

(12) Committee on Tourism and Hawaiian Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to tourism and Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to, the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, the Hawai'i Tourism Authority, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(13) Committee on Transportation and International Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation; and international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations.

(14) Committee on Water and Land. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning; sustainability; land and water management; forest management and reserve; coastal zone management; land reclamation; naturally occurring fisheries; ocean resources; state parks and beaches; management areas, including ocean recreation management areas; and small boat harbors.

(15) Committee on Ways and Means. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management; statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation; and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

- (A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;
- (B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and
- (C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to

testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

(1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.

(2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.

(3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"

(4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"

(5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"

(6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.

(7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.

(8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS**Rule 39 Order of Business: General.**

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.

- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS**Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

- (1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.
- (2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 68 Questions of Order.

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT**Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

(A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.

- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES**Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER**Rule 89 Administrative and Financial Manuals.**

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

Rule 90 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

JOINT HOUSE-SENATE
2013 COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

The Senate and House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2013 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on April 15, 2013 until 12:00 midnight on April 26, 2013.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly:

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature's website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before midnight on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:

For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.

For the House, the lead chair must be present.

All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee during the decision-making on the measure.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.

- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair’s designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair’s designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber’s Chief Clerk.

11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
