**Wednesday, January 15, 2014**

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, was called to order at 10:03 a.m., by the Honorable Donna Mercado Kim, President of the Senate.

The members of the Senate and guests rose for the Hawaiian blessing, invoked by Danny Kaleikini. The members and guests remained standing to sing the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i," led by Danny Kaleikini.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

At this time, Senator Taniguchi welcomed the following members of the Fukuoka Prefectural Assembly: Toshio Matsuo, Chairman; Shinji Nakamuta, Member; Masato Moriya, Member; Masanari Takahashi, Member; and Tokuhiro Kabashima, Member.

The President addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"Because Hawai'i is a special place."

"The year was 1982. It was my first time running for office, and that was the Democratic Party's campaign slogan: 'Because Hawai'i is a Special Place.'

"I believe this timeless expression captures why many of us chose public service – to ensure that Hawai'i continues to be a special place for everyone.

"Aloha and welcome to the Twenty-Seventh Legislature's opening day. While we're continuing with our recent practice of treating this first day of the biennium session as a regular working day, we're making it a special day by welcoming back to these chambers 36 former Senators. It's so wonderful that they've been able to join us to celebrate the fifty-fifth anniversary of statehood, and we'll be introducing them later in the agenda.

"You know, at the conclusion of last year's session, I urged Senate members to use the interim to follow up on issues we were unable to address during the regular session, or to initiate projects that would give us a head start on the pressing issues that we'll be facing this year.

"And they delivered.

"Agriculture Committee Chair Clarence Nishihara reported that his committee spent the interim gathering the most current, objective information on genetically modified organisms, or GMOs, to enable us legislators to separate fact from misinformation to guide us in our decision-making.

"Commerce and Consumer Protection Committee Chair Roz Baker spent time evaluating the progress of the Affordable Care Act and the Hawai'i Health Connector, with an eye toward ensuring it meets the needs of consumers and businesses, as mandated.

"The committee also has been reviewing means to ensure that utility customers installing photovoltaic systems don't face unnecessary delays in connecting to the electric grid.

"Chair Donovan Dela Cruz and his Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing Committee worked on helping shape the rejuvenation of Whitmore Village in central O'ahu and collaborating with the film industry to bring more production to west O'ahu.

"Chair Mike Gabbard and the Energy and Environment Committee are tackling the difficult task of stopping the spread of invasive species, one of the greatest threats to our natural resources, by developing a comprehensive strategy to bolster the state's response to this very huge challenge.

"Human Services Chair Suzanne Chun Oakland is reaching the needy by partnering with the Homeless Assistance Working Group to develop a mechanism to identify property for temporary and permanent housing for the homeless. Members are also focusing on our growing population of seniors and how the state can best serve them.

"Our small boat harbors, state parks, conservation lands, and shorelines seem to be in constant need of upkeep, and so Water and Land Committee Chair Malama Solomon has been assessing the facilities and programs of the Department of Land and Natural Resources to identify what the Legislature can do to support the agency's mandates.

"The Ways and Means Committee, as always, has the herculean task of balancing the state's many and diverse needs with our financial resources. Chair David Ige, along with Vice Chair Michelle Kidani, led visits throughout the state, seeing firsthand the capital improvement needs.

"There are other issues as well. Last year, with Education Chair Jill Tokuda taking the lead, we took a first step toward universal early education, and I expect the debate will continue as we examine the costs of expanding publicly funded preschool education, including how it will impact our current mandate for kindergarten through twelfth grade, and the feasibility of its long-term sustainability.

"At the other end of the educational spectrum, Higher Education Chair Brian Taniguchi held hearings with the University of Hawai'i on its proposed repair and maintenance budget estimated at \$480 million, plus new construction projects totaling \$200 million. Given the similar needs of our public schools and other state infrastructure, there will be many, many requests competing for a limited amount of capital improvement money.

"And I'm happy to say that we will be revisiting the proposal to raise the minimum wage.

"The Senate looks forward to working collaboratively again with our House counterparts. I'm pleased that under the leadership of Majority Leader Brickwood Galuteria and Policy Leader Les Ihara, we have a joint House/Senate legislative

package this year. And while there will be plenty of areas where we may disagree, it is important for us to work collaboratively in the best interests of our constituents and all the people of this state.

“What I’ve just summarized is not a comprehensive list of everything the Senate has addressed during the past several months, but it does provide ample evidence that we were very engaged during the interim, giving us a jump-start on this session.

“A jump-start on building on a foundation created by those who served, deliberated, and debated in these very halls and chambers, and who we honor today.

“We honor them on a milestone in our history: the fifty-fifth anniversary of statehood.

“These men and women are responsible for so much of our progress we have come to enjoy. Their contributions are many and enduring.

“I speak of the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care Act that mandated health insurance coverage for our workers. We were the first state in the nation to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment. Our public schools and the University of Hawai‘i System have given our people knowledge and confidence to go out and build a better world.

“We have a strong visitor industry, led by the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority, that is the envy of competing destinations.

“We were, and continue to be, pioneers in the use of renewable energy, including solar and geothermal power, while protecting our fragile natural resources.

“And you know, each successive legislature adopted changes that contributed to help make our legislative process more transparent and open. More recent legislatures embraced technology to give people greater opportunities to be heard, to be involved, and to understand what we do. Yes, their accomplishments are numerous. It surrounds us, it affects our lives, and is captured in part by our commemorative yearbook, which will be our gift to you today.

“But even more remarkable than their legislative accomplishments was their collaboration, despite differences in upbringing, personalities, values, district and constituent priorities. They managed to put aside those differences to compromise and collaborate, so the work of the Legislature could proceed, the people could be served, and Hawai‘i could be a special place.

“This is not to say that our work is done, because it never is. But I can say that the inspiration of these men and women have given us, through their leadership and their aloha for our islands and our people, they have guided and shaped the most special place on earth: our home, our Hawai‘i. Mahalo.”

At this time, the President called on Senate Minority Leader Sam Slom.

Senator Slom rose to deliver the following remarks:

“Senate President Kim, Governor Abercrombie, distinguished former State Senators, our guests from Fukuoka – boy, didn’t they look like they were campaigning already? – and our overburdened taxpayers of Hawai‘i: On behalf of the entire Senate Minority, Aloha!

“Now, for the rest of the story. First of all, Madam President, the inclusion of our past senators in this, the fifty-fifth anniversary of our statehood, and the publication of a book of memories, is most welcome; and you know, looking out over the group here, some of the buggahs aged pretty well. So, we welcome you, because history, experience, and perspective

should be important; they are reminders to us as we move forward. Otherwise, we are bound to repeat our past mistakes.

“At this time, Madam President, let me acknowledge the passing, at the end of December, of Hawai‘i’s greatest fiscal watchdog and the taxpayers’ best friend, Mr. Lowell Kalapa of the Tax Foundation of Hawaii. Lowell will be missed during these hard times in the session. He helped all of us understand the consequences of government fiscal actions. Many of us are glad that the year 2013 is behind us, because that year did not live up to expectations of change and measurable improvement and was difficult for many of our local families and small businesses.

“By the way, let me say that I was advised to keep my remarks ‘light’ today and refrain from being too ‘hard-hitting.’ Light? Unfortunately, that’s not in my DNA. We have serious problems in our Hawai‘i that too many choose to ignore or deny. We must confront and solve them so that we have a better Hawai‘i and realize our dreams for all of our citizens. And my professional experience and discussions with real people in the marketplace tell me that, despite what some politicians say, Hawai‘i has not turned an economic corner, and our economy has not rebounded across the board, and we’re still struggling. Recently, the State Council on Revenues reduced the economic growth forecast from 4.1 percent to 3.3 percent.

“From my perspective, and as a disturbing consequence, I believe we have become a nation, and a state, of entitlement. Our work incentive, our American individual exceptionalism, have been eroded by a growing clamor by those who think they are entitled to the fruits of other people’s labors.

“Last week, we noted the fiftieth anniversary of President Lyndon Johnson’s ‘War on Poverty.’ It is yet another war, similar to international conflicts and actions like the ‘War on Drugs,’ that cost much, too much, but that we have not won. Since 1964, more than \$21 trillion has been transferred in the U.S. from some taxpayers to others thought to be ‘entitled.’ In 1964, the government had said that about 14 percent of the population were below the government-mandated ‘poverty level.’ Today, it’s more than 21 percent. So clearly, government has been moving in the wrong direction, creating more poverty and homelessness.

“And that’s because money thrown at a problem does not bring positive results. Money without a sound, workable plan and able leadership results in more failure.

“Consider, if you will:

- Our state’s existing \$25 billion unfunded liability to present and past employees.
- Providing more subsidies with lack of oversight to our largest energy monopoly, which keeps increasing electricity rates and experimenting with wind turbines and undersea cables, instead of deregulating to help consumers.
- Then there’s my alma mater that we’re all proud of: the University of Hawai‘i, the state’s only public university. But they continue to increase salaries and benefits, and a suggestion to pay \$10 million to a failed and deficit-ridden athletic program at a time when we’re struggling and students are called on to pay higher tuition? A UH that said it’s proud that ‘52 percent of our students are able to graduate in six years’? A university that is charging fees to students for services that are not even in existence?
- In addition to that, spending nearly a million dollars on a sex program labeled ‘Pono Choices’ to teach eleven- and twelve-year-olds how to have sex without teaching them how to read, write, or do mathematics?

- Proposing a 36 percent pay increase for the Chief Elections Officer, who failed miserably during the last election.
- Raising motor vehicle fees and taxes while not repairing roads and potholes.
- Using \$204 million to create a flawed Hawai'i Health Connector for Obamacare.
- And finally, funding studies on 'global warming' while the streets, the highways, and the streams of Hawai'i are littered with trash and sewage. Are we serious?

"Members of the public, who pay our salaries, are fed up. They demand that we listen to them and change. I'm talking political change, not climate change. And we'd better do so, starting today.

"Taxpayer expenditures for welfare and social services in Hawai'i now exceed expenditures for government education. We must refuse to support those who choose not to work or who are financially irresponsible. Leading the nation in food stamp usage and welfare subsidies, and being among the top for homelessness, are not badges of honor.

"During the recent not-so-special session, which focused on same-sex marriage, nearly 10,000 people came to the State Capitol. Many weren't registered to vote. Almost none had been to their capitol before. But in the end, nearly all were disappointed, frustrated, or angry because of the perceived arrogance of those of us, their elected representatives. They felt betrayed.

"Let the People Decide!' was their cry. And yet, we did not do that.

"Article I, Section 1 of the Hawai'i State Constitution says, 'All political power of this state is inherent in the people and the responsibility or the exercise thereof rests with the people. All government is founded on this authority.'

"It seems that many in government have forgotten that we derive our power from you, the people.

"A state without accountability and lack of consequences sets a dangerous precedent. We need meaningful change and must provide consequences for bad behavior and poor performance by government.

"Every year, the Senate Minority has introduced legislation providing the people more empowerment and choices, as well as greater government transparency. And this year, again, we have introduced measures to allow for initiative, referendum, recall, and term limits. Hopefully, the people will become more engaged so that the Majority will at least hear these measures.

"Hawai'i requires true economic development. Instead of artificially forcing entry and training wages up, and taxing and regulating small business further, we should be listening to our job creators and incentivizing them. Those in government who have never met a private payroll in their lives shouldn't be giving their failed advice to businesses and adding more taxes, regulations, and employer mandates.

"We say everything we do here is 'for the keiki.' But is it really? With sexual assaults and harm to our children increasing, and more evidence of human trafficking of minors in our state, Hawai'i needs more meaningful protection of our keiki. We should start with the adoption of Jessica's Law and harsher penalties for those who would hurt or endanger our children.

"Our skies may become crowded with drones and unmanned devices. We welcome their positive use but must be vigilant with unlawful government or law enforcement use, these uses

that violate the Fourth Amendment constitutional guarantees. We should not condone NSA-type spying on law-abiding citizens.

"Madam President, I pledge my efforts to support good legislation regardless of who introduces it, to analyze and report honestly on the impact of all bills, to work towards ending legislative exemptions, and to boost transparency.

"Let us celebrate our individual, God-given liberty and our ability to change for the better.

"Our goal, as I outlined last session, with apologies to the governor, is not just a 'New Day,' but a 'Better Day.' This is not a partisan position. We can navigate a different course. Turn the state government canoe into the wind, which is harder, and explore the greatness that Hawai'i can be. For We, the People.

"God bless America, God bless Hawai'i, our men and women in uniform, and to all of you who participate in this session. Aloha and mahalo."

The Chair then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Senator Slom. To begin our ceremony to commemorate Hawai'i's fifty-fifth anniversary of statehood and to honor those who have served in the Hawai'i State Senate since 1959, I would like to share, first, a satire that congratulates all the kids who survived the decade – the fifties, the sixties – when Hawai'i became a state, and to be a little light.

"First, we survived being born to mothers who smoked or drank while they were pregnant. We were put to sleep on our tummies in baby cribs covered with bright-colored, lead-based paints. We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, locks on doors or cabinets, and when we rode our bikes, we had baseball caps, not helmets, on our heads.

"As infants and children, we would ride in cars with no car seats, no booster seats, no seatbelts, and no airbags. Riding in the back of a pickup truck on a warm day was always a special treat. We drank water from the garden hose, not from a bottle. We shared one soft drink with four friends from one bottle, and no one actually died from this. We ate Ho Hos and Twinkies, real butter and bacon, we drank Kool-Aid made with real white sugar, and we weren't overweight. Why? Because we were always outside playing. We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to teach us all day, no A+, and we were okay. We would spend hours building our go-karts out of scraps and then ride them down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. And after running into the bushes a few times, we learned to solve the problem ourselves.

"We didn't have any PlayStation, Nintendos, Xboxes; there were no video games, no 150 channels on cable, no video movies, no DVDs, no CDs, no cell phones, no personal computers, no Internet, and no chat rooms. But we had friends, and we went outside and we found them. We fell out of trees, we got cut, we broke bones and teeth, and there were no lawsuits brought from these accidents. We ate worms and mud pies made out of dirt. We were given BB guns on our tenth birthdays, and we made up games with sticks, and we made rubber bands from old rubber tires. Little League had tryouts and not everyone made the team. And those who didn't learned to deal with the disappointment – imagine that. The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of because parents actually sided with the law. And when they spanked us, parents weren't charged with child abuse.

"These generations have produced some of the best risk takers, problem solvers, and inventors ever. The past 55 years have been an explosion of innovation and new ideas; we had

freedom, failure, success, and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all.

“To commemorate today’s ceremony, we will be presenting two special mementos to each of you. The first is a Senate yearbook – a chronology of legislative history from statehood to present. It includes photos of every class from 1959, with a narrative and pictures that tell the story of the Legislature through the years. And I hope you will enjoy reading it and reminiscing about what was accomplished and the friendships you all made.

“The second is a very special lapel pin designed for those who served in the Senate. It is to be worn only by current and former members of the Hawai‘i State Senate as a symbol of your membership in this august body. It is presented today in appreciation of your service to the people of the State of Hawai‘i.

“Senator Kouchi, please proceed with the presentations. And members of the audience, please hold your applause until all the presentations have been made.”

Senator Kouchi rose and stated:

“Thank you, Madam President. 1959 to 1969: Ten days after Hawai‘i became a state, the First Legislature convened in a special session at ‘Iolani Palace. Construction for a permanent home for the Legislature began in 1965, and the Fourth Legislature first convened in the new State Capitol building on February 21, 1968. The sixties were a time of dynamic change for both the nation and the Fiftieth State. The decade began with the devastating tsunami that hit Hilo in 1960, but it was also a time of growth and promise. The tall construction cranes that were rising high into the Honolulu skyline were referred to as the state bird and a symbol of that explosive growth. Tourism was fueled by the golden age of air travel and Hollywood productions like Elvis Presley’s *Blue Hawaii* and the *Hawaii Five-O* television series. The first Constitutional Convention was held in 1968, and much of the framework of our state government was established during these formative years. Thank you, Madam President.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The Honorable George R. Ariyoshi: Former Governor Ariyoshi was a member of the Senate from 1959 to 1970. During his tenure, he served as the Majority Leader and Majority Floor Leader, and as Chair of the Ways and Means, Utilities, and Military and Housing Committees before serving three terms as Hawai‘i’s governor. Governor Ariyoshi was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Ige.

The Honorable Walter M. Heen: Senator Heen was a member of the Senate from 1967 to 1968, and a member of the House of Representatives from 1983 to 1984. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as the Majority Floor Leader and Chair of the Military and Civil Defense Committee. Senator Heen was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Galuteria.

The Honorable Fredrick W. Rohlffing: Senator Rohlffing was a member of the House of Representatives from 1959 to 1966, and 1981 to 1984, and a member of the Senate from 1967 to 1975. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as the Assistant Minority Leader and Minority Policy Leader. Senator Rohlffing was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Slom.

Senator Galuteria rose and stated:

“Members, let’s move into the seventies, for those of us that can remember the seventies. In the turbulent seventies, our legislature strived toward greater fiscal responsibility and

openness to the public. The seventies included major milestones such as – as you mentioned, Madam President – Hawai‘i’s Prepaid Health Care Act, the Sunshine Law, and Title IX. The Hawaiian Renaissance was also gaining momentum, and the 1978 Constitutional Convention established the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and adopted the Hawaiian language as an official state language. Aloha Stadium opened in 1975, the *Hökūle‘a* set sail for Tahiti in 1976, and the first Ironman World Championship was held in 1978. Thank you, Madam President.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The Honorable Richard Henderson: Senator Henderson was a member of the Senate from 1970 to 1978, and 1981 to 1987. During his tenure, he served as the Minority Leader and Chair of the Economic Development Committee. Senator Henderson was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kahele.

The Honorable Joseph T. Kuroda: Senator Kuroda was a member of the House of Representatives in 1971, and a member of the Senate from 1972 to 1988. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as the Majority Leader, Vice President, and Chair of the Consumer Protection; Tourism; and Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation Committees. Senator Kuroda was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Nishihara.

The Honorable Dennis O’Connor: Senator O’Connor was a member of the Senate from 1975 to 1982. During his tenure, he served as the Assistant Majority Floor Leader and Chair of the Transportation and Judiciary Committees. Senator O’Connor was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Green.

The Honorable T.C. Yim: Senator Yim was a member of the House of Representatives from 1963 to 1968, and 1971 to 1974, and a member of the Senate from 1975 to 1980. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Energy and Natural Resources and Economic Development Committees. Senator Yim was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Hee.

The Honorable Patsy K. Young: Senator Young was a member of the House of Representatives from 1973 to 1974, and a member of the Senate from 1975 to 1988. During her tenure in the Senate, she served as the Assistant Majority Floor Leader, Majority Policy Leader, and Vice President. She also served as Chair of the Housing and Hawaiian Homes, Legislative Management, Housing and Urban Development, and Public Utilities Committees. Senator Young was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Baker.

The Honorable Neil Abercrombie: Governor Abercrombie was a member of the House of Representatives from 1975 to 1978, and a member of the Senate from 1979 to 1986. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Higher Education, Education, and Human Services Committees and is currently Governor of the State of Hawai‘i. Governor Abercrombie was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Keith-Agaran.

The Honorable Dante K. Carpenter: Senator Carpenter was a member of the Senate from 1979 to 1984. During his tenure, he served as the Assistant Majority Floor Leader and Chair of the Health and Judiciary Committees. Senator Carpenter was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kahele.

The Honorable Norman Mizuguchi: Senator Mizuguchi was a member of the House of Representatives from 1975 to 1978, and a member of the Senate from 1979 to 2000. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as the Majority Floor Leader, Assistant Majority Floor Leader, Majority Whip, and Senate President. He also served as Chair of the Transportation,



Human Resources, Education, Corrections, and Employment and Public Institutions Committees. Senator Mizuguchi was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Ihara.

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“In the eighties, members of the Senate were vocal and independent. They held contentious caucuses and battled on the floor of the Senate – oh, my god. During this decade, the Legislature implemented a landlord-tenant code, raised the drinking age from 18 to 21, gave Native Hawaiians a limited right to sue the state in land trust issues, and enacted a transient accommodation tax to support tourism and a proposed convention center. In 1988, eight women senators set partisan politics aside to create the formidable Senate Women’s Caucus to address special concerns. Thank you to our predecessors – we still have a women’s caucus, jointly with our House colleagues. And in 1982, the University of Hawai’i women’s volleyball team became the very first UH team of any kind to win a national title. Thank you, Patsy Takemoto Mink, for your Title IX legislation.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The Honorable Milton Holt: Senator Holt was a member of the House of Representatives from 1979 to 1980, and a member of the Senate from 1981 to 1996. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as the Assistant Majority Leader and Vice President. He also served as Chair of the Higher Education; Tourism and Recreation; Planning, Land and Water Use Management; and Consumer Protection Committees and the Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments. Senator Holt was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kouchi.

The Honorable Ann Kobayashi: Councilmember Kobayashi was a member of the Senate from 1981 to 1994. During her tenure, she served as the Minority Floor Leader, Majority Policy Leader, and Vice President. She also served as Chair of the Ecology, Environment and Recreation, and Ways and Means Committees and the Leadership Committee on Executive Appointments. Councilmember Kobayashi was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Taniguchi.

The Honorable Charles T. Toguchi: Senator Toguchi was a member of the House of Representatives from 1977 to 1982, and a member of the Senate from 1983 to 1986. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Education Committee. Senator Toguchi was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Gabbard.

The Honorable Donna R. Ikeda: Senator Ikeda was a member of the House of Representatives from 1975 to 1986, and a member of the Senate from 1987 to 1996. During her tenure in the Senate, she served as the Assistant Majority Leader and Majority Floor Leader. She also served as Chair of the Agriculture, Consumer Protection, and Ways and Means Committees. Senator Ikeda was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Solomon.

The Honorable Ron Menor: Councilmember Menor was a member of the House of Representatives from 1983 to 1986, and 1993 to 2000, and a member of the Senate from 1987 to 1990, and 2000 to 2008. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Corrections; Judiciary; Commerce, Consumer Protection and Housing; and Energy and Environment Committees. Councilmember Menor was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kidani.

The Honorable James K. Wong: Senator Wong was a member of the House of Representatives from 1981 to 1982, and a member of the Senate from 1987 to 1988. During his

tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Military and Civil Defense Committee. Senator Wong was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Hee.

The Honorable Eloise Yamashita Tungpala: Senator Tungpala was a member of the House of Representatives from 1981 to 1988, and a member of the Senate from 1988 to 1994. During her tenure in the Senate, she served as the Assistant Majority Leader and as Chair of the Culture, Arts, and Historic Preservation and Higher Education Committees. Senator Tungpala was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Thielen.

The Honorable Mike McCartney: Senator McCartney was a member of the Senate from 1989 to 1998. During his tenure, he served as the Assistant Majority Policy Leader, Assistant Majority Leader, Vice President, and Co-Majority Leader. He also served as Chair of the Government Operations, Education, and Labor and Employment Committees and as Co-Chair of the Health and Environment Committee. Senator McCartney was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Tokuda.

Senator Ihara rose and stated:

“When war broke out in the Persian Gulf in 1991, the Legislature cancelled its opening day festivities and leaders gave impassioned speeches about peace and progress. Hurricane Iniki pummeled Kaua’i, causing nearly \$3 billion in damage. Over the next few years, the Legislature enacted a family leave law, overhauled the no-fault motor vehicle insurance law, enacted the Hawaii Public Procurement Code, and created the Kaho’olawe Island Reserve Commission. And the Legislature moved its operations across the street to the State Office Tower and Hemmeyer Building as the Capitol underwent renovations for several years.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The Honorable Randy Iwase: Senator Iwase was a member of the Senate from 1991 to 2000. During his tenure, he served as the Majority Whip and Assistant Majority Floor Leader. He also served as Chair of the Planning, Land and Water Use Management Committee, and as Co-Chair of the Water, Land, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee. Senator Iwase was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kidani.

The Honorable Carol Fukunaga: Councilmember Fukunaga was a member of the House of Representatives from 1979 to 1982, and 1987 to 1992, and a member of the Senate from 1993 to 2012. During her tenure in the Senate, she served as the Majority Whip. She also served as Chair of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, and Chair of the Communications and Public Utilities; Economic Development and Taxation; and Media Arts, Science and Technology Committees, as well as Co-Chair of the Ways and Means Committee. Councilmember Fukunaga was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Chun Oakland.

The Honorable Brian Kanno: Senator Kanno was a member of the Senate from 1993 to 2006. During his tenure, he served as Chair of the Agriculture, Labor and Employment, and Judiciary Committees, and as Co-Chair of the Human Resources and Commerce and Consumer Protection Committees. Senator Kanno was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Dela Cruz.

The Honorable Matt Matsunaga: Senator Matsunaga was a member of the Senate from 1993 to 2002. During his tenure, he served as the Majority Policy Leader and Chair of the Science, Technology, and Economic Development Committee and as Co-Chair of the Judiciary Committee. Senator Matsunaga was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Ihara.

The Honorable Joe Tanaka: Senator Tanaka was a member of the Senate from 1993 to 2000. During his tenure, he served as the Assistant Majority Leader and as Chair of the Tourism and Recreation Committee and Co-Chair of the Economic Development Committee. Senator Tanaka was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Tokuda rose and stated:

“It looks like the nineties were so busy, we split them in half. Returning to the Capitol building in 1996, the Legislature established the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority, the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, and secured a land exchange with the Campbell Estate to lay the groundwork for the future University of Hawai‘i – West O‘ahu campus. The Legislature began a systemic reform of our K-12 public education system, providing individual schools with flexibility and autonomy to meet the diverse needs of our students – something we are still doing today. We also saw the largest and most expensive public works project, the H-3 highway, open in December of 1997, after more than 30 years of planning and environmental and cultural protests. And while Prince may still be partying like it’s 1999, after much planning and preparation, we all survived Y2K.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The Honorable Avery Chumbley: Senator Chumbley was a member of the House of Representatives from 1993 to 1994, and a member of the Senate from 1995 to 2002. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Vice President, Chair of the Education Committee, and Co-Chair of the Judiciary Committee. Senator Chumbley was escorted to the rostrum by Senator English.

The Honorable Rod Tam: Senator Tam was a member of the House of Representatives from 1983 to 1994, and a member of the Senate from 1995 to 2002. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Ecology and Environmental Protection, Government Operations and Housing, and Economic Development and Technology Committees, as well as Co-Chair of the Education Committee. Senator Tam was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Chun Oakland.

The Honorable Norman Sakamoto: Senator Sakamoto was a member of the Senate from 1997 to 2010. During his tenure, he served as the Majority Policy Leader, Co-Majority Whip, and Majority Floor Leader. He also served as Chair of the Education, Education and Military Affairs, and Education and Housing Committees, as well as Co-Chair of the Transportation and Intergovernmental Affairs Committee. Senator Sakamoto was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Gabbard.

The Honorable Jonathan Chun: Senator Chun was a member of the Senate from 1999 to 2002. During his tenure, he served as the Majority Floor Leader, Majority Leader, and Chair of the Hawaiian Affairs Committee. Senator Chun was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Kouchi.

The Honorable Lorraine R. Inouye: Senator Inouye was a member of the Senate from 1999 to 2008. During her tenure, she served as Chair of the Economic Development; Water, Land, and Agriculture; Transportation and Government Operations; and Intergovernmental and Military Affairs Committees. Senator Inouye was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Thielen.

The Honorable Bob Nakata: Senator Nakata was a member of the House of Representatives from 1983 to 1986, and a member of the Senate from 1999 to 2002. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as Chair of the Labor and Environment

and Labor Committees. Senator Nakata was escorted to the rostrum by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Kahele rose and stated:

“Thank you, Madam Chair. 2001 to present: The huge economic impact of the September 11 terrorist attacks set the tone for much of the Legislature’s actions in the first decade of the new millennium. Attempts to bolster local businesses and the faltering tourism industry were the Legislature’s top priorities. We bid farewell to the Superferry and Aloha Airlines, but welcomed other opportunities with the 2011 APEC summit and a growing high-tech and film industry. Hawai‘i became a premier filming destination for high-profile television and movie projects including *Lost*, *Hawaii Five-O*, and *The Descendants*. The Senate went ‘paperless’ in an effort to reduce waste and increase participation in the legislative process. We look forward to what the next decade may bring as we consider ways to integrate web streaming, videoconferencing, social media, and other tools into the legislative process. Mahalo.”

The Clerk proceeded to introduce the following former members of the Senate as they were presented with the Senate yearbook and lapel pin by Senate President Kim and Senator Wakai:

The President then stated:

The members of the Senate and guests rose in applause for the honorees.

The President continued her remarks as follows:

#### SENATE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (S.R. Nos. 1 and 2) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

S.R. No. 1 “SENATE RESOLUTION ADDING A NEW SENATE RULE 91 TO THE RULES OF THE SENATE OF THE TWENTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII.”

Offered by: Senators Galuteria, Slom.

Senator Espero moved that S.R. No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Senator Slom.

Senator Slom rose to make the following remarks:

“First of all, I think that the pin is outstanding and all that, but I’d like to know a little bit about the background, where it was manufactured, how many there are in existence, and so forth.”

The Chair responded as follows:

“It was designed here, and I believe it was manufactured in Vietnam. Is that correct?”

The Clerk responded in the affirmative.

The Chair continued:

“And we ordered 175 pins.”

Senator Slom responded as follows:

“Well, as I said, they’re beautiful pins, and I think we’re very proud to have them and all that, but I’m a little discouraged since we always have a campaign of ‘buy local, use local, make local,’ and all that, and the pins are made in Vietnam?”

The Chair replied:

“Yes, and part of that was for the cost.”

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“This is exactly what an economic system does; we often have to go for cheapest cost of any product in a globalized market, because the criticism might have been, ‘Why did we spend so much on locally produced if we could get cheaper elsewhere?’ So herein lies the problem of laissez-faire economy, globalized economy, and the issues of local production and price points. So, the Minority Leader did an excellent job of pointing it out, but he didn’t give the entire story of the entire economic debate. So, I wanted to say thank you for looking at the best price, saving the taxpayers of Hawai’i some money, and helping us find a very good product. Mahalo.”

The Chair responded:

“Thank you. I was very aware of the cost, and I know we would get criticized if we spent a lot of money on a pin for the Senate, so that was a main consideration.”

Senator Slom rose in response as follows:

“Yes, Madam President, just a brief comment about that. I appreciate the good senator’s remarks, because I certainly am in favor of – totally and always – for laissez-faire, and I do believe that. I think it’s just that sometimes we have conflicting statements and conflicting policies, and I’m always for the economizing and using the best possible practices, and so I salute you in this endeavor. Thank you.”

Senator English responded:

“Yes, Madam President, to clarify that the conflicting statements often come from the Minority Leader himself – advocating for a laissez-faire economy and advocating for open and free markets, and then the next statement is saying, ‘Why aren’t we buying local?’ when the price is higher. So, thank you for pointing out the conflicts and the contradictions in your own statements. Mahalo.”

The motion to adopt S.R. No. 1 was then put by the Chair and carried.

At 9:20 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor’s State of the State Address.

**JOINT SESSION**

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, was called to order at 10:04 a.m. by the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature:

The Honorable Shan S. Tsutsui, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, who was presented with a lei by Representative Sylvia Luke;

The Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice, Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, who was presented with a lei by Senator Jill N. Tokuda;

Ms. Colette Machado, Chair, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, who was presented with a lei by Senator Gilbert Kahele;

Dr. Nancie Caraway, wife of Governor Abercrombie, who was presented with a lei by Vice Speaker John M. Mizuno;

The Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, former Governor of the State of Hawai'i;

The Speaker continued:

“We are honored to have in the gallery today members of the Japanese National Diet who have come to visit our State and initiate a friendship association with members of the Hawai'i Legislature. These Diet members are officers of the Japan-Hawai'i Legislators' Friendship Association.”

The Speaker introduced the following members of the Japanese National Diet: Hiromi Yoshida, Chairperson; Masaji Matsumura, Chief Whip; Aiko Shimajiri, Vice Chairperson; Kenta Wakabayashi, Director General; Iwao Horii, Deputy Director General; and Toyoei Shigeeda, Consul General of Japan.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Scott K. Saiki and Aaron Ling Johanson on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Will Espero and Sam Slom on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Representative Rida T.R. Cabanilla and Senator Michelle N. Kidani presented Governor Abercrombie with maile and 'ilima lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Abercrombie presented the State of the State Address as follows:

“Thank you. I felt like Jay Leno saying hello to Jimmy Kimmel. Thank you very much. But before I begin, could we

have a big hand for our congressional delegation, who are smart enough to be here, rather than in Washington where it's snowing right now.

"Madam President, Mr. Speaker, members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, former governors, distinguished justices of the courts, mayors in absence, congressional delegation and other elected officials, honored guests, family and friends, Auntie Aggie, Kamaki, Nancie. Aloha.

"As we begin our session, I ask that we set aside our political preoccupations of the moment and reflect on the privilege we have to serve and the responsibility we have to look to horizons beyond our own concerns. I ask that we begin today with a moment of silence to honor Hawaii National Guard Sergeant Drew Scobie of Kailua, who died earlier this month in Afghanistan. He was 25 years old. He leaves behind his wife, his four-year-old son, and another child yet to be born. Our hearts and best thoughts are with his family during this time. On March 25, the Legislature will hold its Joint Session for the Hawai'i Medal of Honor ceremony to recognize fallen soldiers with Hawai'i ties. I think everyone here wants to work for the day when we have no more fallen to recognize for their ultimate sacrifice, no more families to console for their loss. But until that day, I ask for us to join in a moment of silence and reflection in honor of Sergeant Scobie and his family. If those who are able to rise would do so at this time, may we have a moment of silence on behalf of Sergeant Scobie and his family.

At this time, the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and guests observed a moment of silence for Sergeant Drew Scobie of Kailua.

Governor Abercrombie continued his remarks as follows:

"Mahalo. Thank you very much.

"When I entered office, we issued a call for a 'New Day in Hawai'i.' We presented and implemented a plan that has guided this administration and our state over the last three years through very difficult times. We faced hard choices and had to make some tough decisions. I'm grateful for this legislature's collaboration as we navigated through these troubled waters. The question before us, then, is what direction shall we now set our sights?

"Where do we see our Hawai'i – our people, our keiki, our kūpuna, our 'āina, our businesses – in the future? To answer that core question, we need look no further than our island values. We must be trustees with a duty not just to the present, but to the long-term future of our islands. We must be stewards with a responsibility to protect our identity, our precious human and natural resources, and become more self-sufficient.

"For three years, we have strategically managed our resources, endured shared sacrifices, made fiscally prudent decisions, and have seen our economy measurably improve. This has resulted in a general fund balance of \$844 million for the fiscal year 2013, an historically unprecedented figure that represents a turnaround of more than \$1 billion since 2010! I want to extend my appreciation to all of you in this legislature for helping to make some of those tough decisions; extend our thanks to our public sector employees, who made sacrifices; and the people and businesses of Hawai'i, whose faith and patience made this effort possible.

"I am able to report to you today, our state government's financial house now stands on solid ground.

"We are entering a new phase. The administration's package and supplemental budget do not rely on any new taxes or fees! On the contrary, as you will see, I believe we may be able to reduce taxes in key areas. We have the resources to deliver services to the people of Hawai'i while living within our means.

And, what is most important, my administration's budget philosophy ensures our budget is sustainable. Our financial plan accommodates any fluctuations in revenue projections in the years to come.

"We are stabilizing future costs and expenditures. We are concluding collective bargaining agreements, several of which are for multiple years. We have taken affirmative action in addressing our state's unfunded liabilities – for medical benefits for retirees – and pensions, salvaging both from fiscal disaster.

"We are committed to strengthening the finances of the state with a plan that builds our state revenues up to 10 percent of general fund revenues. These reserves will allow us to weather possible future economic downturns and to guard against the public service cutbacks of the recent past.

"Financial rating agencies recognize our efforts and have improved their outlook assessment of us from negative to stable to positive. What, then, of the future? I shall outline a few central elements for your attention this morning, and I will address other issues in more detail – such as housing, agriculture, energy, et cetera – through messages to you in the days immediately following this address.

"First, there is no more critical issue before us than early childhood development and education. I look forward to strengthening relationships with the private and nonprofit sectors by the passage of the constitutional amendment to provide for partnerships in early education. I appreciate the Legislature's support last session for our expansion of the Preschool Open Doors program.

"Administrative rules are nearly complete. The program envisions providing assistance to over 1,200 families of four-year-old children that will no longer be eligible to attend kindergarten as of August 1 of this year.

"However, this modest approach is not enough. Some 5,000 four-year-olds will be affected by this change in the age requirement. Some families have the financial capacity to afford the average preschool rate of over \$8,000 per year. Many middle-income families will struggle and have to make difficult choices. Most lesser-income families will be precluded from the option of making any choices.

"We know that the early years of a child's development are crucial in setting the foundation for a child's behavior and lifelong learning. From birth to age five, more than 85 percent of a person's brain development takes place. An alarming number of our children are entering school without the basics needed to succeed in school: wanting to read, vocabulary acquisition, learning how to behave within a group (a lesson we could all take to heart ourselves).

"Investing in our children's early years will pay dividends down the road in the form of healthy and contributing adults, reduced crime and incarceration, and less dependency on social services.

"We invest in ourselves by investing in early childhood education.

"Our plan is to build and strengthen Hawai'i's mixed delivery system of early learning programs. Community-based preschools are now and will be a key component. To expand access for four-year-olds, we are proposing direct services in 32 classrooms across the state, half of which are on the neighbor islands.

"We are seeking additional resources for Family-Child Interaction Learning programs. We are proposing support for families who participate in the Preschool Open Doors. These requests total approximately \$8 million. Our plan is targeted, aimed at helping those who otherwise have little or no options.

These initial investments will serve an additional 1,040 children and their families.

“Now, I realize this is an election year. Political agendas and ambitions are being formulated. But let us take children out of these equations. Let us resolve – all of us – to be champions of children. You have my pledge and my word on that.

“Our unemployment has improved to the fifth lowest in the nation. Three years ago, the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund was practically bankrupt. Our progress over the last three years has allowed us to reduce unemployment insurance tax rates for 2014 by 35 percent. Employers will pay \$130 million less in taxes, or \$300 less per employee on average for 2014.

“But a hardworking sector of our community has gone seven years without seeing their wages rise. Therefore, I will be proposing a bill to increase the minimum wage by \$1.50 to at least \$8.75 starting in January 2015. Average weekly earnings have increased 16 percent since 2007. For minimum wage workers, it’s zero. Currently, 21 other states plus the District of Columbia have higher minimum wage rates than Hawai‘i, while our minimum wage earners are confronted by much higher living costs.

“It is a myth that increases to the minimum wage just benefit entry-level workers, mostly teenagers. In Hawai‘i, 85 percent of minimum wage workers are 21 years old or older. The last four times the minimum wage was raised, on average, the number of jobs increased by 2.2 percent over the following 12 months. Twenty percent of our children in Hawai‘i under six years of age, over 22,000 children, live in low-income working families – low-income working families.

“Now, I’m aware that the issue of tip credit in the hospitality/restaurant service sector was the stumbling block last year. I want you to know I’m prepared to accept a reasonable accommodation on this point. Employees who earn tips, as I did waiting tables at Chuck’s Steak House in Waikīkī, have the opportunity to earn tips and to add to their income. Minimum wage earners in other jobs do not. They cannot offset any deductions. Let’s move quickly and resolutely on this issue.

“Homelessness is an issue for which there is no simple answer. In 2011, I established the Hawaii Interagency Council on Homelessness. The council is comprised of state department directors; federal agency representatives; and community, religious, and business leaders. Mayors and county councils across the state are united in coming to grips with this issue. On O‘ahu, where the need is greatest, we could not have a better partner than Mayor Kirk Caldwell and the City Council, led by Council Chair Ernie Martin.

“In December, the Interagency Council submitted an action plan to you for your consideration. We must now deliver on this plan; for example, by giving support to the Housing First program, which houses and cares for the chronically homeless and those who suffer from a disability. Housing First is an evidence-based best practice, currently being used in Denver, Seattle, and Utah. It has established that providing housing and support services under this mode saves taxpayers money and reduces homelessness.

“When I took office, many inmates served their sentences out-of-state. This sent Hawai‘i dollars out of the state and took many inmates away from appropriate facilities and alternative programs here in the islands. In addition, it often decreased the chances of successful rehabilitation as prisoners were away from their families. We had no plan or commitment to do or act otherwise.

“Nearly 2,000 prisoners in that context were in mainland facilities. At the end of the last fiscal year, we reduced that

number by 600. Starting this July, more prisoners will be coming home when we reopen Kulani Correctional Facility on the Big Island.

“It’s clear we need additional facilities. Most of our current decades-old structures are deteriorated, over capacity, and poorly designed.

“The Department of Public Safety has issued a request for information to procure a comprehensive plan to return prisoners, build facilities with sufficient capacity to keep those prisoners who present a danger to our community properly incarcerated, and to provide programmatic options while keeping our communities safe.

“And here may I add a personal note of gratitude from me and my wife, Dr. Nancie Caraway, to this legislature. You have passed and we are now implementing a domestic workers’ bill of rights – only the second such law in our nation. Headlines from around the world, as recently as yesterday, confirm a sordid picture of exploitation and degradation. You have also strengthened laws against domestic violence and human trafficking.

“Thanks to all of you, the intense work of the Attorney General’s office, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, the Civil Rights Commission, the State Commission on the Status of Women, and the Office of Community Services, these crimes against our common humanity will not be tolerated in Hawai‘i.

“Now, there are times for planning and there are times for acting. Now is the time to preserve open spaces at Turtle Bay.

“The dispute over the expansion of the resort into adjacent coastal and open lands has been going on for decades. Whether in the courts, in permitting proceedings, in the North Shore community, in the community at large, this issue has been divisive and disruptive.

“I am requesting authority to use general obligation bonds to obtain a conservation easement of more than 600 acres at the site. This guarantees these lands will remain open and free of development, and open to public access in perpetuity.

“Similarly, I am requesting general obligation funds to enable the state to work with a renewable energy company, NextEra, to purchase agricultural and conservation lands currently owned by the Dole Company – nearly 20,000 acres of open space between Wahiawā and Hale‘iwa on the North Shore of O‘ahu.

“We need to make this investment to secure these lands so they do not become a temptation for development and urbanization. Moreover, this purchase will ensure a combination of energy production and contemporary farming.

“We move to Mauna Kea. Mauna Kea is Hawai‘i’s gift to the world – the best place on the planet to observe the universe. It is without peer. It provides an unparalleled opportunity to advance our knowledge of our universe. Today, we celebrate 50 years of astronomy in Hawai‘i with 13 observatories from 11 countries and over a billion dollars in infrastructure atop Mauna Kea. One project will solidify Hawai‘i’s position as the world’s premier astronomy center – the \$1.3 billion Thirty Meter Telescope. The TMT will be the catalyst for the development of high-tech and high-paying jobs. TMT is presently partnering with the Institute of Astronomy’s Akamai Workforce Initiative to train local college students for technical fields. The initiative promotes STEM initiatives relating to local robotics and science programs. It is also investing \$1 million every year in education so our children can reach for the stars. Our state must support and ensure this tremendous opportunity comes to fruition.

“This leads us to the reality of climate change, which is becoming more and more evident across Hawai‘i and the planet. Our islands are especially vulnerable to the impacts, and we cannot wait to act.

“In the fall, I was appointed by President Obama to serve on the State, Local, and Tribal Leaders Task Force on Climate Preparedness and Resilience. At our first meeting in Washington in December, governors, mayors, and tribal leaders from around our country discussed the effects of climate change on their jurisdictions. One thing was apparent despite our vast geographic, topographic, and community differences: today’s climate changes are warning bells signaling the necessity for preparedness now.

“At that forum, we emphasized that the Hawaiian Islands are a learning laboratory for scalable, innovative mitigation; for adaptation policies and techniques; for providing a model on local and regional collaboration.

“The State Office of Planning has been instrumental in coordinating efforts to update our Ocean Resources Management Plan. We have a state sustainability coordinator in the Department of Land and Natural Resources with authority to work across department lines for planning purposes.

“The Senate-House Majority Package includes the Hawaii Climate Adaptation Initiative, which supports research, planning, and coordination. The Interagency Climate Council plays a key role in this initiative. I will be convening Resilient Hawai‘i Forums this year to engage stakeholders – Native Hawaiian organizations, natural resource managers, the military, tourism officials, agricultural representatives, researchers, and government – at all levels. These forums will create a climate change roadmap for Hawai‘i.

“Protection of our environment from invasive species must be a top priority. We are experiencing a biological crisis and deadly threat to our isolated ecosystem, our natural resources, and our economy. A multitude of invaders – such as the little fire ant that can blind animals and destroy nesting birds and hatchlings, the coconut rhinoceros beetle, and parasites attacking coffee crops – graphically illustrate the seriousness of this issue.

“The work of the interagency Hawai‘i Invasive Species Council is tasked with combatting this menace. I endorse your legislative initiatives proposing up to \$5 million to meet operating costs of invasive species programs.

“This session, my administrative package will include a sustainability investment strategy to advance targets in clean energy development, local food production, natural resource management, waste reduction, smart growth, green jobs creation, and housing for the working middle class.

“This includes funding to support watershed protection, farming infrastructure, invasive species management, e-waste recycling, transportation planning, and creating jobs associated with that and meeting needs.

“Early in my remarks, I commented on the necessity of providing preschool education as a foundation for the future of our children. That observation needs to be bookended by consideration of ways to promote security and dignity on the other end of the spectrum of life – those of us, like myself, experiencing our senior years.

“Not only do we need to protect seniors from fraud and abuse, and assist with care issues, but I believe we can provide tax relief measures that will have practical and immediate benefits for seniors.

“I will be asking the Legislature to look at the way we tax seniors in order to provide more equity and fairness for those on

fixed and middle incomes to see that more money remains in their pocketbooks. We need to bring parity to the way we look at and tax retirement income.

“I accept and understand the message on pension income and taxation. If you have an employer-sponsored pension, it is exempt from income tax, and that will not change. But everyone may not be aware that other pensions – not employer-based – are being taxed right now. Thousands of Hawai‘i seniors are paying income tax even on low- and middle-income retirement benefits.

“I propose to exempt any presently taxed income from all sources for taxpayers age 65 and older with an adjusted gross income of \$25,000, an adjusted gross income of \$35,000 for heads of households, or an adjusted gross income of \$45,000 for joint filing.

“This assures that these seniors will not have their present retirement income taxed. This will affect as many as 25,000 or more seniors throughout Hawai‘i.

“I also propose to double the current refundable food/excise tax credit for taxpayers 65 years or older whose AGI is less than \$50,000. This is a direct payment to the senior taxpayer. This will affect as many as 110,000 Hawai‘i seniors or more.

“I am also requesting we increase the Kupuna Care budget by \$4.2 million and make it permanent. This program enables seniors to remain in and receive care in their homes. This is an investment that will pay big dividends as our senior population ages, grows in numbers, and lives longer.

“These proposals, my friends, address the practical, everyday reality of expenses for seniors. They’re across-the-board fairness in application, can take effect immediately, and fit comfortably into our long-term financial stabilization plan.

“I began my remarks today in sad recognition of the sacrifice of his life by Sergeant Scobie. I have spoken of other sacrifices we have made or need to make in acknowledgment of our responsibilities to and for each other, and to advance the common good of us all.

“Referencing that sobering context, please allow me to conclude my thoughts today with some reflection on the passing of our beloved Loretta Fuddy. It is difficult even now, more than a month since her death, to accept its finality because of the vitality of her presence. I said at the time, our hearts were broken, but I also know she would remind us of the biblical admonition that life is for the living: the duty to carry on, to offer the hope and encouragement to others that marked her life – every day of it.

“I would like to thank the University of Hawai‘i Foundation for setting up the Loretta Deliana Fuddy Memorial Scholarship in Health, Human and Public Service. This will provide a lasting legacy to the University of Hawai‘i students, on any UH campus, who are committed to pursuing a career in health and public and human services.

“Loretta was a lifelong supporter of public health measures. She was a lifelong advocate for families and children. She set the standard for helping those in dire need of services that promoted and nurtured their health and wellbeing.

“So, I am requesting additional funding for the Department of Health’s Early Intervention Services. The program provides critical services to children with developmental delays from birth to three years of age. The program provides positive intervention in the crucial areas of cognitive and physical function, social and emotional wellbeing, and adaptive skills. Loretta Fuddy was their champion.

“There are, of course, several budget requests and bills that will be proposed by the Department of Health, all of which are important. Nonetheless, I am asking for your specific attention to make funding for Early Intervention Services a priority. This will serve as a fitting tribute and appropriate legacy to honor Loretta. There will be lasting benefits for the affected families and children – the children she loved and cared for passionately to her last day.

“None of us knows with any certainty how much time will be given to us. What we do know is that the time given us as public servants is a public trust. We justify that trust only by acting in the public interest.

“The financial stability we’ve achieved, coupled with our long-term plan to sustain it, presents us with the opportunity to act both with confidence and with dispatch. In this legislature, public trust and the public interest can meet and be joined – now. Let’s do it together. Mahalo.”

Senate President Donna Mercado Kim then rose and stated:

“Thank you, Governor Abercrombie. On behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, we would like to thank you for sharing with us your vision and ideas this morning. We would like to emphasize our willingness to work with you to find solutions to the many challenges that you just mentioned. We will seek to accomplish our common goals and work collaboratively with you to work out our differences.

“With that, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned.”

At 10:44 a.m., Senate President Kim declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At this time, Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“If I may, I’d like to submit my remarks to the Journal regarding the most recent U.S. Supreme Court’s decision and legal team for upholding our Supreme Court’s decision on the creation of the new Fourth Senatorial District on the Island of Hawai‘i. Please place these remarks in the Journal.” (The Chair so ordered.)

“Also, Madam President, I just would like to make a few remarks on the headlines, ‘Too much, too fast?’ in reference to the Kaka‘ako redevelopment. These remarks are based on the theme of opening day, and I realized, ‘Hey, I was in the Twelfth Legislature and now it’s the Twenty-Seventh,’ and we’re finally doing something, Madam President, about Kaka‘ako.

“Kaka‘ako has been laying in dormancy for 40 years; I’m looking at the Minority Leader, for his nod of approval. I can’t imagine how the development of Kaka‘ako would be interpreted as too much, too fast. I’m yielding to the Minority Leader. Therefore, Madam President, I’m hoping that the senators will have the na‘au and the tenacity to move forward so we in fact can make our city, our Honolulu, to become one of the most beautiful urban centers in the Pacific, the world, and to create jobs, and the future’s list can move forward.

“I want to thank this body for supporting this vision and hopefully continuing with perseverance. I know it’s not going to be easy as indicated by these headlines. Madam President, thank you very much.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Solomon’s additional remarks are identified as “**ATTACHMENT A**” to the Journal of this day.

Senator Galuteria rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As a follow-up to the previous speaker, I’d like to take this opportunity to thank the Senate as well. As we move into the next phase of our development, as the area legislator for Kaka‘ako, we’re very, very proud of what we have. We want to also share that the reason Kaka‘ako is growing at its present rate is to prevent urban sprawl into many of your districts. We have the opportunity to create a world-class urban core, and we look forward to working with all of you to make that happen. I certainly appreciate the previous speaker’s remarks; I appreciate all of the past legislators who have worked for such a long time to create the infrastructure that we are now growing Kaka‘ako on.

“It is, of course, important that the community gets a chance to respond to all of the growth patterns that are being advanced in Kaka‘ako. But I think beyond that, we must look towards the future for our children, their children, and their children’s children, so that we have a beautiful Hawai‘i to be very proud of. And Kaka‘ako will be one of our jewels that we’ll look at so that we stand toe-to-toe with the great metropolitan areas of the world. Thank you very much, Madam President.”

**SEN. MALAMA SOLOMON THANKS U.S. SUPREME COURT AND LEGAL TEAM FOR  
PROTECTING HAWAII ISLAND'S RIGHT TO EQUAL REPRESENTATION AS  
GUARANTEED IN BOTH THE U.S. AND STATE CONSTITUTIONS**

Honolulu – State Sen. Malama Solomon today issued a public “Mahalo” on behalf of all Hawai‘i Island residents to both the U.S. Supreme Court and the legal team working “to protect Hawai‘i Island’s right to equal representation as guaranteed by both the U.S. and State of Hawai‘i Constitutions.”

Sen. Solomon’s message of gratitude comes as more than two years of intense litigation concluded Tuesday, January 21, 2014, when the U.S. Supreme Court formally resolved a case she and several Hawai‘i Island residents had taken to the State Supreme Court challenging the 2011 State Reapportionment Commission’s initial plan based on the 2010 Census to count out-of-state military members and their families stationed in the islands and out-of-state students when re-drawing legislative districts.

Sen. Solomon and her legal team – working with the State Attorney General – challenged the plan on the basis that it denied Hawai‘i Island residents equitable representation which they believed required adding a 4<sup>th</sup> State Senate seat for Hawai‘i Island because of the nearly 25% increase in resident population on the island between 2000 and 2010. During this same period of time, the island of Oahu had experienced only an 8% growth.

The addition of a 4<sup>th</sup> Senate seat to Hawai‘i Island meant Oahu would lose a Senator.

It became a very complicated case but the heart of the issue was inequitable representation for Hawai‘i Island residents in the first reapportionment plan. The State Supreme Court agreed with Sen. Solomon’s challenge and the plan was revised, adding a 4<sup>th</sup> Senate seat for Hawai‘i Island in the 2012 elections.

In the meantime, however, opponents to the decision filed a judicial challenge to the U.S. Federal District Court (Kostick v. Nago (Case No. 13-456)). A three-judge U.S. Federal Court upheld the Hawai‘i Supreme Court decision. The opposition had an automatic right to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington, D.C. and did so.

“The battle is over; let us move forward working together for all the people of Hawai‘i,” said Sen. Solomon, who added her acknowledgement of the legal team that served to protect the rights of Hawai‘i Island residents, including Stan Roehrig of Hilo, Robert Kim of Kona and Peter Esser of Honolulu, and also State Attorney General David M. Louie and Deputy Attorney General Charleen M. Aina.

Sen. Solomon also thanked Public Utilities Commission Chair Hermina M. Morita, a former State Representative, for providing testimony for the Supreme Court docket related to her experience representing a “canoe district” – a now illegal practice of combining residents from more than one island into a representative districts of approximately the same population size. Such districts were banned in recent years by the State legislature because they “seriously undermine equitable representation for all residents of the district,” said Sen. Solomon. Both Hermina Morita and Sen. Solomon represented “canoe districts” before the Legislature banned this practice.

## SEVENTH DAY

**Tuesday, January 28, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Sixth Day.

At this time, Senator Galuteria introduced Jeff Dayton, world renowned guitarist and musician from Nashville, Tennessee.

Senator Keith-Agaran, on behalf of Senate President Kim, rose to congratulate Shane Victorino on his many athletic achievements in major league baseball as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. On your behalf, we Valley Islanders like to say, 'Maui nō ka 'oi,' and nowhere is that more evident than baseball, where the pride of Wailuku – and all of Hawai'i, for that matter – helped his team earn the 2013 World Series title just three months ago. I'm obviously speaking of Shane Victorino of the Boston Red Sox, who we honor today.

"Shane, who's the son of Joycelyn Victorino and Wailuku's Maui County Councilmember Mike Victorino, was an outstanding student athlete at St. Anthony. He lettered in baseball and track, earning a state championship as a sprinter.

"Drafted by a National League team located in southern California out of high school, he followed the customary path of ball players by being assigned to a number of minor league stops, making it to the show in 2003 with the San Diego Padres. Shane finally got his chance to be a regular starter in the Majors when he was signed by the Philadelphia Phillies in 2004. Since then, his professional career has been nothing short of phenomenal, as he earned a World Series title with the 2008 Phillies and two trips to the Fall Classic, picking up numerous honors for his consistent performances, including three Gold Glove Awards, two Major League Baseball All-Star Games, the 2008 Lou Gehrig Memorial Award, and the 2011 Branch Rickey Award, among others.

"Following many successful years with the Phillies, he was traded to the team that originally drafted him for a season before signing with the Boston Red Sox as a Free Agent before the 2013 season. BoSox fans must be glad that Shane signed with them, as the Red Sox returned to the postseason and Shane joined the elite few big leaguers with at least two World Series rings, as Boston won their third World Series in ten years. Shane's 2013 playoffs displayed his flair for show time hitting, including a dramatic seventh-inning grand slam in game 6 of the ALCS that enabled the team to beat the Detroit Tigers for the American League title, while his clutch bat and stellar fielding in the decisive game this series helped clinch the World Series title over the St. Louis Cardinals last October.

"Now, while Shane's accomplishments on the diamond have been abundant, they have been equally matched by his generosity and aloha. Through the Shane Victorino Foundation, he and wife Melissa are supporting educational, recreational, and other programs for underserved young people, and thereby provide a catalyst for them to live fulfilling lives and contribute to society as productive citizens.

"We're very proud to welcome Shane Victorino – known to fans as 'The Flyin' Hawaiian' – to our chambers, and to congratulate him on his many athletic achievements in Major League Baseball, to thank him for his service to our community, and for bringing great pride to the people of this state, and to

wish him continued success in his professional and personal endeavors. Shane Victorino – please join me in welcoming him.

"Seated next to Shane are his parents, Mike and Joycelyn Victorino, and in the gallery is Shane Victorino Foundation Board of Directors Member Keith Amemiya. Please stand to be recognized."

Mr. Shane Victorino shared the following remarks with the members of the Senate:

"First off, I'd like to say thank you for the honor. You know, as we all represent the State of Hawai'i, just like you guys do in these chambers, I try to do the same on the baseball field and in my community work; and to always understand where I came from and never forgetting my roots, I think, most importantly, is the way I live life every day and accomplish what I do in the game of baseball.

"And I think we all try to do the same here, coming from the special place that we call home. There's no better place in the world than the State of Hawai'i – for me, obviously being a little biased about the island of Maui. But I think, collectively, me representing the State of Hawai'i, as I said, when I walk out on the field every night I carry a little thing on my sleeve; it doesn't really show, but in my heart and in my attitude, going out there, like I said, I represent Hawai'i. So, it's truly an honor for me to be up here to be recognized by you folks who, as I said, keep everybody and everything great here in the State of Hawai'i. So, thank you guys again for having me. Thanks for having my mom and dad, and have a great day."

The Chair thanked Mr. Shane Victorino, and noted that his parents had raised him well.

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam President, I rise as a lifelong New York Yankees fan. On behalf of the entire Senate Minority, we really respect and admire Shane and his family. Shane, it's not that you try to do those things; you have done those things. You've succeeded. You bring great pride to our state and to the people here. You're a wonderful role model for our young people, and all I've got to say is I know the best is still ahead for you. Aloha and thank you for coming today."

Senator Ige rose to make the following remarks:

"As a lifelong Boston Red Sox fan, I just would be remiss if I didn't have a few comments concerning Shane Victorino. You know, I have suffered through many, many seasons with the nemesis of the Yankees spoiling the season, and I just wanted to let the members know that the Red Sox were really down in the dumps. The season before Shane joined the Red Sox was a total disaster. I thought that it would be a decade before the team would return to prominence, but I really do think it was Shane's addition and his leadership and his chemistry that the Red Sox really turned it around. I don't think anybody thought that they would win the World Series last year, and I think that Shane and the other additions to the team really made a big difference. So, I did want to congratulate Shane. His presence was more than just what he did on the field; it really is what he brought to the locker room and the whole change in chemistry on the Red Sox from infighting and complaining to really working together to win the World Series. So, congratulations, Shane."

At 11:49 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Thielen rose to make the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I would like to request that the Senate adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of Pete Seeger, who passed away yesterday.

"Pete Seeger is a very famous folk singer and he started the careers of many people in the next generation, but he was also known for his liberal politics, environmentalist positions, and protesting against the wars in Vietnam and Iraq.

"A lesser-known fact may be how much he risked in standing for his political convictions. He was sentenced for refusing to testify in Congress about his time in the Communist Party; and although that case was dismissed later, the controversy shattered his career. He was barred from network TV for 17 years.

"Pete Seeger was known as America's tuning fork, and his songs captured the essence and beauty of this country. So I'd like to also ask to enter some words in the record honoring Pete Seeger. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's additional remarks read as follows:

"Pete Seeger, who helped create the modern American folk music movement and co-wrote some of its most enduring songs such as 'If I Had a Hammer,' died on Monday at the age of 94.

"Seeger, a Woody Guthrie protégé whose songwriting credits included folk classics 'Where Have All the Flowers Gone' and 'Turn! Turn! Turn!'.

"Seeger also was known for his liberal politics, working as an environmentalist, protesting against wars from Vietnam to Iraq and being sentenced to prison for refusing to testify to Congress about his time in the Communist Party. The case was dismissed years later.

"The controversy shattered Seeger's career. He continued to record and make concert appearances but was barred from network TV for 17 years.

"By the early 1960s, he had returned to performing at schools and colleges and came to view the blacklist as a blessing in disguise: He was showing 'a whole generation of young people you didn't need to depend on the commercial world to make a living.'

"When he finally returned to television in 1967 on *The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour* on CBS, his antiwar song, 'Waist Deep in the Big Muddy,' was censored. But after his performance was broadcast the next year, it was credited with helping to cement public opinion against the war.

"Gifted at connecting with audiences, Seeger called his ability to inspire regular folks to sing along his 'cultural guerrilla tactic.' 'There's no such thing as a wrong note as long as you're singing it,' he told the 15,000-strong crowd at his birthday celebration.

"Seeger's life of music and political activism could be summed up in 'The Hammer Song,' the enduring anthem he wrote more than 60 years ago with his good friend Lee Hays to support the progressive political movement in the U.S.

"Popularized by Peter, Paul and Mary in the 1960s, the song embodied the heart of Seeger: his musicality, his activism, his optimism and his lifelong belief that songs could and should be used to build a sense of community to make the world a better place.

"'Pete is America's tuning fork,' author and oral historian Studs Terkel once said. 'His songs capture the essence and beauty of this country.'"

Senator Kidani rose to make the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Colleagues, as we rise and adjourn, I would like you also to remember astronaut Ellison Onizuka and the *Challenger* tragedy that happened 28 years ago. I had the pleasure of being at the Challenger Center this morning with his brother Claude and students, so thank you very much."

**Wednesday, January 29, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Hee welcomed the following participants of Cattlemen's Day at the State Capitol: a group of students from Maui 4-H, Keoki Wood of Parker Ranch, Louis Cambra of the Maui 4-H Livestock Association, and Jacob Tavares.

Senator Hee also introduced a group from Ni'ihau comprised of Bruce Robinson and his wife, Leiana; their daughter, Briana; Kunia Pahulehua; Enoka Kaohelaulii; Hiwa Kelley-Kanahele; and Napua Niau.

Senator Kidani congratulated the Mililani High School Trojan varsity football team on capturing the 2013 OIA Division I title, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President and Senate colleagues, thank you for the opportunity to honor the Mililani High School varsity football team, winners of the OIA Division I Championship 2013.

"On their way to the title, the Trojans won all seven games against OIA Red West opponents, undefeated at 7-0 for the first time since 2004. A win over Farrington – my alma mater, sorry Madam President – of the OIA Red East won them the overall OIA title and sent Mililani into the State Championship tournament. There, a win over Campbell at the semifinals propelled the Trojans into the final game of the year against number one-seeded Punahou, the only school to have beaten them during the year.

"In spite of the Trojans' exceptional play and never-give-up spirit, the state title went to Punahou – but wait until next year. Such was the caliber of individual standout performances during the 2013 season that a total of 14 Mililani Trojans were named to the first, second, third, and honorable mention All-Star team, including many of our players and guests who are with us today. It was, of course, the team effort that counted most, and the Trojans succeeded in taking the entire Mililani community with them through their exciting season from start to finish.

"It is my pleasure to introduce our honored guests today: Trojan team captains Dayton Furuta, senior linebacker; Ian Namu, senior slot; Bronsen Ader, senior receiver; Keli'i 'KK' Padello, senior defensive end (and our Defensive Player of the Year); Vavae Malepeai, sophomore running back (that's why I said wait until next year); and their fellow team members McKenzie Milton, sophomore quarterback (wait until next year); Rex Manu, junior defensive tackle (wait until next year); Kaimana Wilson, senior linebacker; Tayler Fernandez-Dizon, senior outside linebacker; and Antonio Ala, junior offensive linebacker.

"These are our Mililani Trojans – wait until next year. Accompanying the team today is varsity football Head Coach Rod York. Coach York was selected 2013 Coach of the Year by the media and coaches statewide.

"Madam President, the Senate prepared a congratulatory certificate for the team and at the appropriate time, I would request a short recess so that we can personally welcome our

honorees and present the certificate to them. Mahalo and congratulations. Yay, champs, Trojans!"

At this time, Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I rise to speak in very strong support of the Hawaii Farmers and Ranchers Alliance. The Hawaii Farmers and Ranchers Alliance also included floral and nursery growers who collectively produce more than 80 percent of the agricultural products grown in Hawai'i. They have organized themselves into an alliance and have pledged themselves to these goals and objectives:

- 1) To ensure the viability and sustainability of Hawai'i's farming community for all the benefits agriculture brings, including increased local food availability and the achievement of Hawai'i's food security goals.
- 2) They support public policies that are inclusive of all types of agricultural production so as to ensure the

viability and sustainability of all forms of agricultural enterprises consistent with federal and state laws and regulations and generally accepted agricultural practices.

“There’s a whole list, which I’ll be submitting for the Journal; however, I just would like to expound on a few:

- 3) They are very proud to support Hawai‘i’s rich agricultural heritage and honor the strong men, women, and children who have endured many hardships to create and perpetuate our agricultural culture.

“Madam President, I don’t have to remind you how our agricultural industries in Hawai‘i have suffered severe droughts. My family has farming and ranching experience of over 80 years; our family agribusiness generationally has survived a series of 25 serious droughts here in our Hawai‘i nei.

“Members of this organization will be visiting senators’ offices and House members to discuss the recent legislations referring to the GMO. They are very concerned about the outcome of these GMO legislations that are resting with us today.

“They will be sharing a resolution that I also speak in very strong support of, and I will be submitting it to be placed into the Journal. This resolution supports our Hawai‘i State Constitution and the Right to Farm statute, as contained in Chapter 165 and provides a solid foundation to ensure and sustain a vibrant agricultural sector in Hawai‘i. Madam President, many of us sitting on this floor were very much a part of the creation of this statute and legislation.

“I would like to end with a very famous song, and this song is entitled ‘Kilakila Nā Rough Rider.’ It’s a traditional mele, and it says:

Hanohano wale nā cowboy (Glorious are the cowboys)  
 E maku‘u noho i ka lio (Proudly mounting their horses)  
 Halena pono ‘oe i kaula ‘ili (Pull taut now your lassos)  
 I ka lae o ka pipi ‘ahui (Hold the brow of the plunging cattle)

“I’m asking all of my colleagues to please welcome these members of the alliance into your offices so that they can express their mana‘o of how they feel about their agricultural situations and the legislations that we are considering today, and how it affects their future, their life, and ours. Thank you so much. Mahalo.”

Senator Gabbard rose to make the following remarks:

“Madam President, I would like to request that the Senate adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of Chief Warrant Officer 2 Edward Balli. He died last week on January 20 in Kandahar Province in southern Afghanistan from small-arms fire when he was attacked by insurgents. He was raised in Salinas, California, but called Kapolei home. He was described as an outstanding leader with a kind heart and smile who aimed to please those that he worked with. Our heartfelt condolences and prayers go out to his family and friends. Mahalo.” (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President; it’s also an announcement. Tomorrow, your Committee on Judiciary and Labor will be holding a hearing at 9:30 in Conference Room 016 on Senate Bill 2609, which is the minimum wage. Normally, I wouldn’t have made that announcement because it’s distributed to everyone, but for the fact that last night a local boy gave some remarks to the country. So, I want to read some of his remarks as it relates to Senate Bill 2609. The local boy said:

Today, women make up about half of our workforce, but they still make 77 cents for every dollar a man earns. That is wrong, and in 2014, it is an embarrassment. A woman deserves equal pay for equal work.

Today, women hold a majority of lower-wage jobs, but they’re not the only ones stifled by stagnant wages. Americans understand that some people will earn more than others, and we don’t resent those who, by virtue of their efforts, achieve incredible success. But Americans overwhelmingly agree that no one who works full-time should ever have to raise a family in poverty.

In the year since I asked this Congress to raise the minimum wage, five states have passed laws to raise theirs. In the coming weeks, I will issue an executive order requiring federal contractors to pay their federally funded employees a fair wage of at least \$10.10 an hour, because if you cook our troops’ meals or wash their dishes, you shouldn’t have to live in poverty.

Of course, to reach millions more, Congress needs to get on board. Today, the federal minimum wage is worth about 20 percent less than it was when Ronald Reagan first stood here. Tom Harkin and George Miller have a bill to fix that by lifting the minimum wage to \$10.10. This will help families. It will give businesses customers with more money to spend. It doesn’t involve any new bureaucratic program. So join the rest of the country. Say ‘yes.’ Give America a raise.

“Senate Bill 2609, which we will hear tomorrow at 9:30, coincidentally proposes to raise the minimum wage to – you guessed it – \$10.10. Thank you, Madam President.”

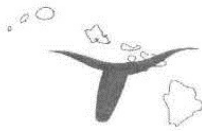

“Thom’s career spanned four decades, including public relations and communication positions with Honolulu Mayor Eileen Anderson’s administration; the Hawai‘i Visitors Bureau; Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism; Chaminade University; UH Community Colleges; and finally, ‘Ōlelo.

“I regret his passing and the loss to our community. He was a selfless individual that his friend Ray Abregano noted was a ‘humble steward, mentor, and companion who embodied a beauty of mind, soul, and heart.’ I offer my condolences to his family.

“I request that we adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in his memory.” (The Chair so ordered.)

"The essay contest, which has just observed its sixteenth anniversary, gives female juniors and seniors in high school an opportunity to expound on a current issue as it involves the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

"Kristen is a remarkable student; she is the chapter president of the Health Occupation Students of America, a second lieutenant in the JROTC, a captain of the Rough Rider varsity air riflery team, and a freshman mentor. Kristen's proudest accomplishment to date was her involvement in the Partnership in Unlimited Educational Opportunities – or PUEO – Program. Her elementary school principal nominated her to this program while she was a fifth grader so she could experience a college-level learning environment during the summers. As a PUEO scholar for the past seven years, Kristen believes that the program helped her grow as an individual while inspiring her to pursue a college degree.

"I know we'll be hearing a lot more about and from Kristen in the years to come, and I hope we can someday welcome her back to these chambers as a leader of our state and nation. Whatever her path in life, we know it will be successful and fulfilling, and we wish her the very best.

"On behalf of you, Madam President, Senator Taniguchi, and all of my Senate colleagues, I would like to congratulate Kristen on this most recent accomplishment.

"I would also like to introduce Principal of Roosevelt High School Jeanette Uyeda and Counselor Dana Kaneshiro."

## TWELFTH DAY

Tuesday, February 4, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:42 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Kidani who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Eleventh Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard honored and commended Energy Excelsior, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President, colleagues, please welcome the team from the Energy Excelsior. Thank you, colleagues, thank you.

"What's the Energy Excelsior?" you may ask. No, it's not the latest high-tech treadmill available at Sports Authority. Actually, the Energy Excelsior is a startup program of the Pacific International Center for High Technology Research – or PICHTR – dedicated to helping solve energy challenges, starting here in Hawai'i. They provide the funding and connections in the perfect place, our own island paradise, to roll out renewable energy ideas. Energy Excelsior funds clean energy technologies in multiple areas, especially smart grid, energy storage, energy efficiency, transportation, and biofuels. These companies see Hawai'i as an ideal early market for energy innovation because of our high electricity prices and excellent natural resources.

"First, starting from our right is Senior Manager Dawn Lippert, Project Manager Warren Doi, Communications Director Lauren Tonokawa, Operations Director Kanoe Pu'uohau, Strategic Partnerships Director Brad Punu, PICHTR Chief Financial Officer Janel Pang, Project Assistant Linda Ome, and Intern Jamie Uota. Please give them a hand.

"PICHTR CEO Dennis Teranishi, Director of PICHTR Energy Programs Maurice Kaya, Senior Advisor Harold Matsumoto, and Engineer and Project Manager Jill Sims unfortunately could not be with us today.

"Colleagues, as we continue to pick the low-hanging fruit in the clean energy arena – energy efficiency, plus residential, commercial, and utility-scale solar, as well as wind – many folks are asking, 'Who should be leading the charge in kicking our addiction to foreign oil? The governor? The Legislature? The PUC? The counties? The utilities? Our energy nonprofits?' Obviously, it's all of the above, but considering the past year and the big challenges that have increasingly become front and center here and on the mainland with the integration of distributed generation, it makes it clear to me that we're unlikely to be the ones who get us to that fruit on the top branch of the tree.

"Today, we use our smartphones, iPads, social media – things that weren't around a mere five or six years ago. And you'll recall, it was Steve Jobs and the Mark Zuckerbergs of the world who made these things happen. So, from my perspective, it's going to take these kinds of entrepreneurs who will actually reach the luscious fruit at the top of the tree and bring it down to ground level, allowing us to get our HCEI goals and beyond.

"And that's why I'm stoked to see what the Energy Excelsior, our clean tech incubator, is doing. It's huge that they received a \$30 million grant from the Navy's Office of Naval Research under the Asia Pacific Technology and Education Program; and it kind of makes sense that the Navy is stepping up big in this area because last year the DOD spent \$20 billion on oil and is the world's largest consumer of energy.

That dwarfs even our huge annual oil bill of \$4 billion to \$6 billion dollars. The Energy Excelsior's latest awardees are 15 companies who focus on everything from smart grid and energy storage to energy efficiency, transportation, and bioenergy. And any one of these companies could be the one that revolutionizes clean energy for Hawai'i and the world. Of the 32 companies the program has funded thus far, \$55.9 million has been raised in follow-on funding, nearly \$20 million in revenue has been generated, and over 400 jobs have been created. The program is highly selective, accepting less than 7 percent of startups who apply, and helps companies succeed in Hawai'i and the Asia Pacific with funding of up to \$1 million. In June 2014, it will be opening an innovation center in Honolulu and extend an invitation to you all to pay them a visit.

"Madam President and colleagues, would you please, again, recognize the team from the Energy Excelsior?"

"Finally, also in the gallery, we have three reps from the Energy Excelsior: Ann Chung of Navatek, Michael Pfeffer and Erika Bockhaut from Ibis Networks. Welcome. Mahalo."

Wednesday, February 5, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twelfth Day.

At this time, Senator Slom welcomed a group of fifth-grade students from Kaimuki Christian School who were accompanied by teachers Chau Sachs and Jane McClair, and chaperones Jonalee Yuen and Connie Hall.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. This bill is long overdue; it prohibits the trafficking of dogs and cats and the consumption of dogs and cats. It is part of the cruelty to animals package. This bill, quite frankly, should have been passed by the Legislature many years ago. I urge my colleagues to support the passage of this measure and have it move forward for consideration. Bye... I mean, thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I have been instructed by Sunny, Chalupa Batman, Snuggles, Gray Kitty, and Hoku the dog in my family, and they urged me to take a very strong stand on this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2026, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANIMAL CRUELTY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

S.B. No. 2120:

On motion by Senator Hee, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried, S.B. No. 2120, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Nishihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"The hearing we had yesterday was unusual for Senate Bill 110. Although I felt that its outcome was probably not in doubt, which was what occurred at the end, the members of the committee all spoke truthfully to what they believed about the way they took their vote; and to that extent, we should all be granted that opportunity. But in my view, science should not be trumped by emotional counterclaims to the contrary that are not supported by overwhelming research, data, studies, scientific journals, and organizations in support of the science of creating good technology for agriculture.

"By and large, our legislature and our process, to the public, probably appears opaque at best, but it is the process we work under. When I first got here 10 years ago, there were two things I was told. One was keeping your word, and the courtesy of letting the chair know if you decide you can't vote with them.

And those two I've always stayed with, and sometimes, I think we all do, more or less, because it's important for the good working of this body.

"So, having said that, I harbor no ill will to how it turned out. As I always tell people, we're big boys and girls here; we should be able to understand the process that we live with. That's the process. So, having said that, and whatever happens going forward for the rest of the session, I'm sure we'll all do our job, and I thank the committee for doing theirs, as well, and I appreciated the opportunity to at least get a hearing on that short-form bill. There was no intent to circumvent a process, as sometimes gets reported.

"So, you're welcome to ask me how I feel about it. I'll give you a straight answer; I always have. And to that extent, I appreciate the camaraderie we have in the Senate, and I think it's important that we remember that this body decides collaboratively, or tries to assume that role of collaboration. We should also be very deliberative about what we do, and for that, I thank everyone. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to make the following remarks:

"Thank you very much, Madam President. I'd like to speak in very strong support of the remarks that were made by our chairman of Agriculture.

"I cannot fully express the disappointment on behalf of many of my constituencies on the Big Island. Madam President, I represent one of the largest agricultural districts in the State of Hawai'i; and although many of our farmers were not so focused on issues that possibly influenced votes to deny the chairman's bill to be heard is irrelevant because we are the policy decision makers, in the State of Hawai'i, this body, is responsible for. If you look at the Constitution, it is the State of Hawai'i who is responsible for the protection and the perpetuation of agriculture. Our fiduciary duty as stated by the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i has given the state the responsibility to expedite and to get our agricultural industries moving in an expeditious manner; it's all about food security.

"The issues at hand – when you talk about agricultural technology, we're not talking about just biological technology; we're talking about many other scientific technologies that have made it possible for agriculture to pull itself up by their own bootstraps and to get food production going.

"We should consider a rule change if we are deadlocked; the chairman's position should prevail. We need more discussion on this matter. I think when you're at three to three, the chairman should be instructed to call recess and seek help from leadership. Maybe it is because of the referral system – some bills that are at three or four referrals, 50 percent of the Senate is sitting in one committee hearing. I have requested for a caucus to discuss this referral practice, which is indicative as to how we are managing our own house. It is impossible for members to be in attendance at many of the committee hearings due to conflicts caused by our referral system. For example, yesterday I had a dual referral with Higher Education; I was downstairs attending my own committee, rushed to Transportation because the committee did not have quorum. And I think what happened yesterday is not serving the best interest of the public and is a reflection of our own management problems.

"Therefore, Madam President, thank you for allowing me to present remarks in particular to agricultural issues and my concerns as to who is the lead – is it the county? Or is it the State? I feel the State is the lead regarding Agricultural policies. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon's additional remarks read as follows:

"The right to farm.

"Hawaii State Constitution, Article XI, Section 3, mandates that 'The State shall conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands.' This policy sets forth the State's responsibility to oversee and implement uniform laws, rules and regulations to guide Hawaii's agricultural industry statewide.

"Thus the State has established the State Department of Agriculture, Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC), Department of Land and Natural Resources, State Land Use Commission, State Water Commission, State Department of Health, State Office of Planning and other related agencies to oversee, coordinate and implement the laws, rules and regulations governing all aspects of agriculture on a statewide basis. The University of Hawaii is a land grant institution that further recognizes that the State's role and responsibility to provide the necessary research to support Hawaii's agriculture on a statewide basis. The State as mandated by the Constitution has set forth the resources, knowledge and expertise to support agriculture.

"In 2001, the Hawaii Right to Farm Act was enacted and put into law (HRS 165), that further recognized that the State has the responsibility to protect and enhance agriculture. The purpose of the Hawaii Right to Farm Act is to protect bona fide farming operations from urban encroachment. The Hawaii Right to Farm Act provides the farmer with the basic 'right to farm' without the fear of frivolous lawsuits by their neighbors. The Hawaii Right to Farm Act also assured the State that the farmers must operate in a legal and reasonable manner to be eligible for the law's protection and must follow best management practices.

"The Legislature also enacted legislation that provided additional protection of our most valuable agricultural lands in the State called the 'Important Agricultural Lands'. The passage of this legislation provided incentives to encouraged landowners and farmers to keep our ag lands in agricultural production.

"The State must also ensure that its laws, rules and regulations coincide with federal law. The Federal pre-emption ensures that all of the State and County laws does not conflict with the Federal law. The Commerce Clause allows our nation to control the economy. It is important that we have uniform laws so that the movement of goods and services between states as well as internationally is.

"The County does not have the appropriate charter that clearly provides the guidance and role in regulating or promoting agriculture. Nor does the county have the resources, knowledge, and expertise to dedicate towards agriculture. We should not create a situation that fragments Hawaii's agricultural industry making it more difficult for farmers to farm. Rather we should encourage, incentivize and promote Hawaii's agriculture so that we can perpetuate the future farmers of Hawaii and reach for sustainability."

Senator Solomon's additional remarks are identified as "**ATTACHMENT A**" to the Journal of this day.

The Chair responded:

"As a clarification, the purposes of having committees that are odd-numbered is so there isn't a deadlock; and if there is one, then it's not because of the makeup of the committee. Committees have time slots, and you're not supposed to be on a committee that conflicts with that. However, the chairs do have the prerogative of calling recesses or putting decision-making to

a different time and date, so those are all the tools available to the chairmen so that they can maneuver when there are situations where members are in other committees due to joint meetings.”

At 12:01 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:03 p.m.

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you for the recess. It provided some clarification. What is interesting with what happened yesterday is that, at least my understanding is, the matter was a procedural matter to allow, as our rules provide, for a proposal to be heard. And the procedural issue was denied. That’s unfortunate because the chair was merely making an effort to have a matter heard. I take no position on the matter that the chair wished to be heard, other than to share with my colleagues that there will be two short-form bills which I will ask, procedurally, to allow a matter to be heard. One is to allow the consideration of this chamber to designate Ni‘ihau as its own county. To do so will require a short-form bill that I will ask the appropriate committees to make a determination if that subject shall be heard for consideration, procedurally. The second is to repeal the extinguishment of the konohiki rights for the island of Ni‘ihau. That requires another short-form bill that, procedurally, for it to be considered by this chamber, would have to go through a vote, as was taken yesterday by the chairman of Agriculture.

“I would suggest very strongly that if there are members in this chamber that are opposed to the procedures – as opposed to the efficacy and merit of the proposal – that they do so at this time. That would save the Committee on Judiciary and Labor the effort to bring a matter before this chamber that by any other means could not be done. This goes back to the rule change that was adopted by this chamber. These are procedural matters that have been cut at its knees, preempted from having the merits debated in a public hearing, and that is unfortunate. So, I give notice to this chamber that there will be at least two matters that I have mentioned, procedurally, of which the members will be asked to vote.

“And quite frankly, for those of you who have been here any number of years, you should not be surprised that there will be other short-form bills because that’s the purpose of a short-form bill: to provide for opportunities that may not have existed. For example, I’m working with the state retirement system at this very moment so that those convicted of crimes shall not be eligible to collect their state retirement. Case in point: two prison guards accused of fencing meth and other drugs arrested. My view is if they get convicted, they should not be eligible for their state retirement benefits. These issues arose subsequent to the deadlines imposed by the House and Senate, so in order to do that, to consider the merits, would require the availability of a title. Procedurally, it would have to be done as was evidently conducted by the chairman on Agriculture. It makes no sense to me that under this scenario the merits of the bill would be shortchanged and curtailed because of a procedure. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I think we just really need to clarify what happened yesterday in the Ag Committee. Procedurally, we did follow the rules. What has failed to come to light – and I think we have to put it on the table here – was that the difference is that there is an existing bill that dealt with this issue that’s already been referred. And that’s why part of my consideration for voting ‘no’ on it, besides being against the content, was that short-form bills are to be used when there are no available titles to deal

with the issue. In this case, there was one that was square on point and it was already referred. So, to my thinking, why not move the bill that was already there? The chairs couldn’t agree, I understand, on the hearing, but that is our process. So, to say that we have not followed our process is a little bit misleading. The fact of the matter is the difference is that there was an existing bill, and that one didn’t move. We tried to put the same content into a short-form, which might have been trying to circumvent our existing process. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“It’s a prerogative of the chair, regardless of the existence of other legislation that may or may not exist, to provide for this chamber the opportunity to weigh the merits of a proposal, regardless of whether we agree or disagree.

“I’m not involved with this issue and I couldn’t care less, quite frankly, that there may or may not have been another bill in existence. Each of you in this chamber, for the most part, sit as a chair, or have sat as a chair or a vice chair. Each of you has taken that responsibility, presumably, with the greatest seriousness of that leadership position. I’m not arguing about the merits of the proposal; I am arguing about the opportunity for each of you to exercise your discretion as a leader in this chamber. That’s all. There were at least five or six bills on minimum wage. I exercised my prerogative as the chair to hear one of them. It is the vehicle at such time that the chair provided for the committee to exercise its prerogative as a member of the committee. Case in point: If \$10.10 was too high, then someone should have said at the committee hearing, ‘\$9.25.’ But in fact, that didn’t occur.

“My comment is on the exercise of your authority as a chair. And from my reading in the newspaper, the chairman of Agriculture merely – merely – provided an opportunity to hear the merits of the bill, regardless that there may have been another vehicle, regardless that the bill may have been killed, regardless that he might take a House bill and stick it in a House bill *as is his prerogative*. We’ve been here long enough to know that. This wasn’t about the bill; it was about a procedure.

“So if this chamber starts on its way of undercutting the chair’s authority, so be it. Let us give notice to each other at this time. We give notice; we cut you at the knees procedurally. That’s the argument before this chamber – not the merits of the discussion. To hear the chairman of Agriculture apologize? For what? Exercising his authority to ask its members for the opportunity to hear a bill? This wasn’t about the bill; this was about the procedure. That’s what I’m arguing about, not about the bill. Thank you.”


The Chair responded:

“Just a note that at the end of the day, every member has the right to exercise their right to vote, whether it’s procedural or whether it’s on the merit of the bill.”

#### ADJOURNMENT

At 12:15 p.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 a.m., Thursday, February 6, 2014.

 ("HB174") – Genetically Engineered Organism; Produce; Labeling; Import

Dear Senator Baker:

Thank you for your questions regarding the constitutionality of HB174.<sup>1</sup> You also asked whether the State has the legal authority to restrict the import of genetically engineered or genetically modified organism (GMO) food into the State that otherwise complies with all federal requirements.

This bill will very likely be found unconstitutional because (1) state efforts to require GMO labels have been preempted by the federal government, (2) it violates the First Amendment protections of commercial speech, and (3) it violates the Commerce Clause. In addition, the Commerce Clause will prohibit the State from restricting the importation of GMO food into Hawaii that meets applicable federal requirements.

As a preliminary matter, we note that the Legislature provides no articulation of the basis for its presumption that HB174 furthers a state interest. Pursuant to any constitutional inquiry, a federal court will seek to find justification for the proposed state action. The federal government, as discussed in more detail below, has taken the position that GMO food poses no threat to consumers and is not, from a scientific perspective, materially distinguishable from non-GMO food. For purposes of a constitutional analysis of what the likely outcome of litigation in federal court will be, any information that runs counter to conclusions embraced by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) will certainly be treated as suspect. The absence of any statement of

purpose at all, which is the case here, precludes a federal court from even considering whether a legitimate state interest exists.

1. Express or Field Preemption

State law can either be expressly or field preempted. Express preemption is exactly what it sounds like. Congress has explicitly determined and stated that federal law will preempt state law. In the absence of express preemption language in a federal statute, courts may infer an intention to preempt state law where the federal regulatory scheme is pervasive. In this instance, Congress is said to occupy the entire field of regulation to the exclusion of the states. Congress, in enacting the Federal Food Drug and Cosmetic Act (FDCA), empowered the FDA with the authority to create a federal scheme for the labeling of food.

State GMO labeling laws may be expressly preempted by section 403A<sup>2</sup>, an amendment to the FDCA under the Nutrition, Labeling and Education Act, which provides that "[i]n]o State or political subdivision of a State may directly or indirectly establish under any authority or continue in effect as to any food in interstate commerce [a]ny requirement for the labeling of food of the type required by [various sections related to misbranded articles] that is not identical to the requirement of such section." See 21 U.S.C. § 343-1(a). The misbranding sections of the FDCA to which this preemption language refers include prescriptions for "definition and standard of identity," "standards of quality and fill of container," and "nutrition levels and health-related claims." See 21 U.S.C. § 343(g), (h), and (r), respectively. These provisions strongly suggest that, where there is no federal mandate to label GMO food, any state effort to do so would be contrary and inconsistent with the misbranding provisions of the FDCA and be expressly preempted. Interestingly, the FDCA does not require any nutritional labeling on produce, to which HB174 is currently directed. See 21 U.S.C. § 343(q)(4). Nutritional labeling for what the FDA describes as "conventional" foods, by which it means fruits and vegetables, is voluntary. However, the same analysis that applies to food more broadly also applies to produce, i.e., the FDA has determined that, in both instances, there is no basis in fact or in the federal misbranding laws to require what would amount to a GMO "warning" label.

Requirements to label GMO food may also be field preempted. The federal government, via the FDA and its authority to prescribe the content of food labels pursuant to the FDCA, in furtherance of Congress' power to regulate commerce, has arguably "occupied the field" of food labeling. The FDA's regulations are expansive and cover all aspects of what a food label must and must not contain. Specifically, the FDA has examined the question of whether food labels should contain information about the content of GMO and has determined that no such information should be on the label. In fact, the FDA has suggested that even the voluntary labeling of food as "non-GMO" by the industry might be a violation of its rules because it would constitute the misbranding of food. The FDA reaches this conclusion because it has found no scientific basis for the claim that there is a material difference between GMO foods and non-

GMO foods. Therefore, the requirement by state law, as contemplated by HB174, of GMO labeling is inconsistent with the scope of FDA's rules regarding food labeling and is thus preempted. Even if the Legislature were to amend HB174 by articulating a state interest, it is likely to be viewed as inconsistent with the conclusions reached by the FDA. The FDA has advised that,

[T]he use or absence of use of bioengineering in the production of a food or ingredient does not, in and of itself, mean that there is a material difference in the food. Therefore, a label statement that expresses or implies that a food is superior (e.g., safer or of higher quality) because it is not bioengineered would be misleading.

Guidance for Industry: Voluntary Labeling Indicating Whether Foods Have or Have Not Been Developed Using Bioengineering; Draft Guidance in Docket Number OOD-1598 (Draft released for comment January 2001 for comment purposes only).

2. First Amendment Protection of Commercial Free Speech

In addition to facing preemption challenges, state measures requiring GMO food labeling will likely be subject to claims that such measures violate the First Amendment. In the case of Vermont's effort to require the dairy industry to label milk produced from cows treated with growth hormones (International Dairy Foods Ass'n v. Amestoy, 92 F.3d 67 (2d Cir. 1996)), the Second Circuit Court of Appeals undertook a very methodical review of the rationale provided by the Vermont legislature and determined that the state label requirement was an impermissible restriction on the dairy producers' right to free (commercial) speech. The court reached this conclusion despite Vermont's argument that the legislation was justified on the basis of consumer protection and a citizen's right to know. Id., at 73. This case was decided strictly on First Amendment grounds without reaching the preemption or Commerce Clause issues raised in the lower court. Id., at 70. This suggests that any state effort (regardless of how well-intentioned) to require labeling that is inconsistent with federal law, particularly where the veracity and relevance of the information sought to be mandated remains a matter of contention at the federal level, will be met with great skepticism in federal court. The decision in International Dairy also demonstrates the lengths to which a federal court will go to call into question the state's rationale in support of its labeling requirement. The court found:

Vermont's failure to defend its constitutional intrusion on the ground that it negatively impacts public health is easily understood. After exhaustive studies, the FDA has "concluded that rBST has no appreciable effect on the composition of milk produced by treated cows, and that there are no human safety or health concerns associated with food products derived from cows treated with rBST." 898 F.3d at 248. Because bovine somatotropin ("BST") appears naturally in cows, and because there are no BST receptors in a cow's mammary glands, only trace amounts of BST can be detected in milk, whether or not the cows received the supplement.

Id. Moreover, it is undisputed that neither consumers nor scientists can distinguish rBST-derived milk from milk produced by an untreated cow. Id., at 248-49. Indeed, the already extensive record in this case contains no scientific evidence from which an objective observer could conclude that rBST has any impact at all on dairy products. It is thus plain that Vermont could not justify the statute on the basis of "real" harms. See Edenfield v. Fane, 507 U.S. 761, 770-71 (1993). We do not doubt that Vermont's asserted interest, the demand of its citizenry for such information, is genuine; reluctantly, however, we conclude that it is inadequate. We are aware of no case in which consumer interest alone was sufficient to justify requiring a product's manufacturers to publish the functional equivalent of a warning about a production method that has no discernable impact on a final product.

Id., at 73.

3. The Dormant Commerce Clause

State action to restrict the importation of GMO, whether taking the form of a labeling requirement, an additional tax burden or an outright ban, will likely run up against the Commerce Clause's overarching goal of ensuring a national marketplace. The Supreme Court has said:

This principle that our economic unit is the Nation, which alone has the gamut of powers necessary to control of the economy, including the vital power of erecting customs barriers against foreign competition, has as its corollary that the states are not separable economic units.

H.P. Hood & Sons, Inc. v. Du Mond, 336 U.S. 525, 537-38 (1949).

[W]hat is ultimate is the principle that one state in its dealings with another may not place itself in a position of economic isolation.

Baldwin v. Seeig, 294 U.S. 511, 527 (1935).

Article I, section 8, clause 3 of the United States Constitution empowers the federal government to regulate commerce among the states. A line of Supreme Court cases, exemplified most recently in United Haulers Assoc., Inc. v. Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste, 550 U.S. 330 (2007), has developed the concept of a dormant Commerce Clause which dictates that, in addition to the power it vests in the federal government, the Commerce Clause also acts as a limitation on the individual states' authority to regulate commerce even in the absence of a contrary federal statute. This line of cases is summarized by the United Haulers decision as follows:

Moreover, as appellants correctly note, that "residuum" [of legislative authority] is particularly strong when the State acts to protect its citizenry in matters pertaining to the sale of foodstuffs. Florida Lime & Avocado Growers, Inc. v. Paul, 373 U.S. 132, 146 (1963). By the same token, however, a finding that state legislation furthers matters of legitimate local concern, even in the health and consumer protection areas, does not end the inquiry. Such a view, we have noted, "would mean that the Commerce Clause of itself imposes no limitations on state action . . . save for the rare instance where a state artlessly discloses an avowed purpose to discriminate against interstate goods." Dean Milk Co. v. Madison, 340 U.S. 349, 354 (1951). Rather, when such state legislation comes into conflict with the Commerce Clause's overriding requirement of a national "common market," we are confronted with the task of effecting an accommodation of the competing national and local interests.

Id. at 350.

4. Conclusion

It is likely that any state effort to require GMO labeling (of any kind) will be viewed as either expressly preempted by the FDCA or an intrusion on the comprehensive federal scheme of food labeling. Furthermore, as the International Dairy decision clearly demonstrates, the federal courts will apply strict scrutiny to examine whether a labeling requirement violates the First Amendment protection of commercial speech. Finally, the Commerce Clause may be implicated where a state seeks to impose a restraint on interstate commerce and a court examining, for example, a labeling requirement, an import tax, or some other import restriction, may find that law invalid where the facts are not sufficiently compelling to justify state action.

It is for the law enforcement officials, really, to investigate further for a conviction.

"So, I think that we're on a road of losing even more of our personal rights. I'm a little surprised that the ACLU did not weigh in, nor the public defender, in this particular case, but I'll be voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Baker also noted that heart attacks manifest themselves differently in women than in men, and urged the members to learn the warning signs of heart disease in women, monitor their diets, and encourage the women in their lives to do the same to take care of their health.

The big-picture issues the Legislature can take up, but in regards to ‘Made in Hawai‘i’ labeling, the percentages of coffee and the percentages of tea is really something that should be done at the administrative level, and that’s what the bill is about. It may not be in its perfect form as we adopt S.B. 111 in a short-form bill, but the committee will take care of that in upcoming committee meetings. Thank you.”

Senator Tokuda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“While I rarely do this, I would like to just clarify for the record that what I did state in caucus – and what we state in caucus is rarely brought up on the public floor – that I recommended that we ask our communications director to clarify what, in fact, that short-form bill was, in fact, doing so that the members of the public would clearly note what the intention of the bill was since there clearly is some misinformation coming through in the emails we are receiving. Our communications office is there to provide information in a clear and succinct way, and that was all that I was asking for us to be doing, so that it was available to the members of the public what the intentions of the Agriculture Committee were. "Earlier today, the President of the United States issued the following executive order. I'm only going to read the first lines of the first two paragraphs and section 8 on the last page (I believe this executive order is seven or eight pages). The President of the United States said, and I quote:

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act, 40 USC 101, it is hereby ordered as follows: Section 1. Policy. This order seeks to increase efficiency and cost savings in the work performed by parties who contract with the federal government by increasing to \$10.10 the hourly minimum wage paid by those contractors. Raising the pay of low-wage workers increases their morale and the productivity and quality of their work, lowers turnover and its accompanying costs, and reduces supervisory costs. These savings and quality improvements will lead to improved economy and efficiency in government procurement.

"On section 8, the effective date of this executive order is as states, and I quote this: 'This order is effective immediately and shall apply to covered contracts where the solicitation for such contract has been issued on or after January 1, 2015.'

"I raise this issue this morning because, as members should know by this time, the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor passed Senate Bill 2609 on January 31, 2014. That bill now resides in the Committee on Ways and Means. Last night, the chair of the Committee on Ways and Means issued a statement on the Senate Majority website. I presume this statement speaks for itself and not the majority, because we have not yet had that privilege of fashioning a statement. The chairman says:

We are committed to working with our counterparts in the House and the leadership of both chambers to ensure that we pass a minimum wage bill this legislative session. Currently, there is a bill still in conference that has carried over from the 2013 legislative session, as well as new bills that have been introduced this year. I support increasing the minimum wage and passing a bill as soon as possible this session. We have Senate Bill 331 in conference committee and would be able to take action immediately once we have agreement on the bill.

“Last night, I had the privilege of speaking to my House counterpart, Representative Mark Nakashima, probably somewhere around 7:00 or 8:00 p.m. in my office. Yesterday, the House passed their version of the minimum wage bill. The bill that was passed in committee sets the minimum wage at \$9.25. Senate Bill 2609 sets the minimum wage at \$10.10. The governor’s bill sets the minimum wage at \$10.00. The House bill passed yesterday contains no tip credit. The Senate bill passed this year contains no tip credit. The governor’s bill contains a tip credit of \$0.25, I believe. The House bill this year, passed yesterday, contains indexing by the CPI. That is also true of the Senate Bill 2609. The governor’s bill is silent on this issue. The House and Senate bill passed in 2014 is a dramatic departure from Senate Bill 331. I’ll make that clear – it is a dramatic departure.

“Representative Nakashima and I agree that the last discussion on Senate Bill 331, minimum wage in 2013, provided that the tip credit was at \$1.50 and provided that the minimum wage was set at \$9.25. I raise these issues so everybody understands the same thing that is being said. The tip credit in the House bill passed yesterday is zero – not \$1.50. Zero. The tip credit passed by the Senate in 2014, Committee on Judiciary and Labor, is zero – not \$1.50.

“Now, I am familiar enough with the rules of conference, and I had the staff attorneys raise them for me this morning. I fully recognize that the rules of 2013 no longer apply. But I also fully recognize that the rules of 2013 are identical to the rules of 2012, 2011, 2010, 2009, and beyond. In those rules, on page 1 of 7, it says, among other things, on rule number 2, subsection A, ‘With the exception of the executive budget, the judiciary budget, and the budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a conference committee’ – a conference committee – ‘shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.’ If it is accurate that the chairman on Ways and Means has suggested strongly in written notice to the public that Senate Bill 331 is a vehicle, by this statement, based on rule 2, subsection A, located on page 1 of 7 of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature 2013 Committee on Conference Procedures, that rule should stay intact. Because if it doesn’t, then clearly there’s something going on here. If it doesn’t, then clearly there’s something going on.

“Evidently – and I had the benefit of speaking to the chairman of Ways and Means – he evidently has not yet decided on whether he’s going to hear Senate Bill 2069 on the minimum wage. I hope he does, and I hope he moves the bill because it will give the Senate of 2014 the opportunity to take a position. And that position may be the position that arrived on his desk when the JDL Committee passed it on January 31 by a vote of six ‘ayes’ and one ‘no.’ I hope the Senate has an opportunity, and the Senate may, if given that opportunity, amend the bill on the floor. And the Senate will have the opportunity to talk about the efficacy of the minimum wage and the efficacy of a tip credit, which I submit to you is nothing more than subsidizing employers. It is a red herring.

“Let me make this clear. Let me make this point respectfully: Last year, as a manager of the conference committee, when it was evident that the minimum wage bill of 2013 was going to be lost, I requested a caucus of the majority party. I was declined that request. I say to all of you now: that bill should have been caucused last year because, as the majority party, we should not be taking each other apart publicly.

“The minimum wage bill deserves a hearing; and if anybody is wondering, I decline to give prior concurrence on any matter of Senate Bill 2069. That bill is at \$10.10 and no tip credit and the index is at the CPI. I decline to give prior concurrence, as is provided by our rules. On the other hand, I invite the debate on the floor to establish a tip credit. I invite the debate on the floor to change the \$10.10 to lower than what the executive order

signed by the President of the United States did today. I invite that debate because that is where the debate belongs: on this floor of this chamber.

“There may be other issues that many of you feel are more important than a minimum wage. I would suggest to you that the 40 percent of the homeless population that are minimum wage earners may have a different opinion. I would suggest to you that the 75 percent of the minimum wage earners which are women may have a different opinion.

“Regardless, this is not an issue of who is right or who is wrong. This is an issue of bringing that bill to the floor and not yanking it out of the chair – bringing it to the floor and having a full and free debate on all of the issues because when my request was declined to have a caucus last year, the minimum wage bill of 2013 went up in flames. It very well may have been different if we had a caucus and we brought it to the floor. As it is, hindsight being 20/20, I’m not standing here complaining because we have a better bill in 2014 than the hemorrhaging that was taking place on the conference committee in 2013. The House has spoken loud and clear on its primary committee – \$9.25, no tip credit, indexed by the CPI – as has the Senate in its primary committee – \$10.10, no tip credit, indexed by the CPI. Let us do what we were elected to do: debate that issue right here on the blue carpet. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Wakai, Chair of the Committee on Technology and the Arts, rose to request a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for S.B. No. 2505.

Senator Wakai noted:

“The reason is that we were given a last-minute request by the advocate for this particular measure. For the members, I just wanted to let you know that Senate Bill 2505 would designate the walkway behind the Capitol building as ‘Memorial Mall,’ creating a working group to design bronze plaques and kahili to portray Hawaiian rulers in perpetuity, and to interchange the Queen Lili‘uokalani statue located on the grounds of the Capitol building with the Eternal Flame memorial on Beretania St. That’s the guts of this particular measure.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Wakai announced that the Committee on Technology and the Arts and the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs would hold a public hearing on S.B. No. 2505 on Thursday, February 13, 2014, at 1:45 p.m. in Conference Room 414.

At 11:55 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:02 p.m.

Senator Green, Chair of the Committee on Health, rose to request a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for S.B. No. 2058.

Senator Green noted:

“The bill is the loan repayment bill; we get federal matching dollar for dollar. You have my apologies; after the re-referral, I neglected to put it onto a calendar with our hearing on Monday.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Green announced that the Committee on Health would hold a public hearing on S.B. No. 2058 on Thursday, February 13, 2014, at 1:00 p.m. in Conference Room 224.

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“While I found the former discussion very interesting, and I do support the Senate chairman’s desire to bring that bill and many more bills before this body, I would like to see more open debate instead of everyone running into that little room over there. (Well, not everyone; only 24 of the 25.) I think it’s a healthy debate when the public knows why we support or why we oppose a certain measure, and I don’t think that we’ve done a good enough job in doing that. So, I would suggest that we have more floor debates and more open debates.

“However, as it pains me to do so, I just want to correct one of the things that I think the good Senate Judiciary chairman was inferring by the news today – which really was not news, that the President issued yet another executive order – so that people don’t misunderstand. That executive order had nothing to do with increasing the minimum wage generally. He can’t do that; the Congress has to do that. What it had to do with was a very limited increase for certain limited government projects; and at last count, we found out that there were a total of three – three – federal government jobs in Hawai‘i that would be affected by this announcement this morning. So, just to keep it in perspective and keep it clear: the debate on minimum wage still continues. Thank you, Madam President.”

## Thursday, February 13, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

## Friday, February 14, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Kouchi introduced his friend since 1993, Florida State Representative Randy Avon; and Leilani Longbas and her husband Phil who were visiting for the Mossman family reunion.

Senator Slom noted the presence of Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, in the gallery.

Senator Taniguchi congratulated and recognized the William S. Richardson School of Law on its fortieth anniversary, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to recognize the William S. Richardson School of Law, which is celebrating its fortieth anniversary this year. Representing the law school on the floor this morning is Dean Avi Soifer.

"The only law school in the State of Hawai'i was created by the Hawai'i State Legislature in 1968. On September 4, 1973, the new law school opened its doors to the inaugural class of 53 students. Forty years ago, the law school enjoyed very modest facilities: two classrooms, a library, and one unisex restroom were located in portable buildings in the quarry. As a side note, as a member of the third graduating class, I can recall our large lecture room was right next to the freeway off-ramp, and we also were serenaded by pile driving, which was for the new UH swimming pool.

"Hawai'i Supreme Court Chief Justice William S. Richardson's vision and leadership made the law school possible. He believed that all qualified students in Hawai'i should have the opportunity to obtain an excellent legal education, with sensitivity to unique cultural and historical circumstances and a commitment to community service for our people. In 1983, the law school was formally named the 'William S. Richardson School of Law' in honor of Chief Justice Richardson.

"In addition to Dean Soifer, this morning in the gallery are Associate Dean for Students Ronette Kawakami and Senior Advisor Lyn Flanigan. Already introduced is the UH Law School 'wannabe,' our chief justice.

"Madam President, I would also like to recognize my fellow Richardson School of Law alumnus from the Twenty-First District – Senator Maile Shimabukuro."

We’ve seen a steady progression from this holiday from name to name, and I thought that we were celebrating discovery from all peoples and of all events. And so, from this standpoint I have a real problem adopting the bill. Thank you.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Just briefly in support of the bill: The reason that we kept the date is that at this point the supporters of the bill have celebrations that they do on that day. Just to point out the movement to try to change the name, so we weren’t sure if it would create confusion to change the day at this point in time. But the point is well-taken from the prior speaker. So anyway, I appreciate your support of this measure. I know it’s a change, and the holiday was clarified earlier to honor the Polynesian discoverers of Hawai‘i, so it still sticks with that same tradition. Thank you.”

"On the floor with us are members of the Laborers' International Union of North America Local 368, who are celebrating their sixtieth anniversary; and at this time, I'd like to introduce each of them: Business Manager and Secretary-Treasurer Peter Ganaban, President Alfonso Oliver, Vice President Joby North II, Government Relations Al Lardizabal, Auditor Joe Yaw, and Recording Secretary Toni Figueroa. Please give them a hand.

"The members of the Laborers' International Union of North America have built highways, bridges, and erected schools and hospitals around the nation. In Hawai'i, the union's Local 368 has been instrumental to the construction industry, taking part in building much of the infrastructure, buildings, and soon-to-be rail transit system. In 2014, the Laborers' International Union of North America Local 368 celebrates its sixtieth anniversary.

"On December 1, 1954, the Local 368 was chartered by the hard work and progressive beliefs of Elmo Samson; Norman Janicki, Sr.; Salvador Ambrocio; and Benjamin Saguibo. In 1955, a general laborer was paid \$1.46 an hour. In addition to the small wages, laborers had no funds to cover health and welfare, vacation, or pension benefits. A hiring hall for employment and representation was nonexistent. Some of their first members came from National Metals on Pier 35 and the Honolulu Lathing and Plastering Company.

"From those humble beginnings, the union today has grown to include over 5,000 members. The strides made by Local 368 in protecting workers' rights is proudly displayed by the minimum wage of an average laborer now at \$26.20 an hour. Local 368 prides itself on strong representation of its members and deep commitment to protecting and promoting the core values of the labor rights movement around the globe. Today, the union has representation on all major Hawaiian Islands and is led by Business Manager/Secretary-Treasurer Peter Ganaban."

S.B. No. 499, S.D. 1 (H.D. 2):

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 499, S.D. 1 (H.D. 2), entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PARTITION OF HEIRS PROPERTY,” was deferred until Thursday, February 27, 2014.

**THIRD READING**

S.B. No. 233:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 233, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“You know, it’s very difficult to stand up and oppose a bill whose purpose is to honor the dignity and memory of Queen Lili‘uokalani. However, I think that we have done that over and over again – honoring the queen – and I think that her record and her achievements and her accomplishments stand on their own.

“But I’m troubled by this measure. We started out with this bill last year, and it was simply a change in inscription and dates, and the bill got left by the wayside somehow, even though we had a ceremony commemorating changes at the statue last year. And now we’ve got this bill, and here’s my problem: I think that the bill goes far beyond just talking about the dignity and respect for the queen, which I have no objection to and fully support.

“This bill commits the Legislature to certain findings, and this legislator does not agree with several of those findings. Notably, the bill again uses the so-called Congressional Apology Resolution of 1993 in a way that is neither legal nor correct. We remember that when that Apology Resolution was introduced at the behest of Senator Inouye, under the presidency of William Clinton, it was made clear at the time that it was, first of all, a resolution and not a binding law. Secondly, that with that apology, then, we would not hear any more discussion about the issue of Hawaiian statehood versus sovereignty. And yet, since that period of time, since 1993, it seems that a great deal of our time has continued to be involved with sovereignty, with what happened in 1893, with what we should do.

“However, I think it’s important for the record to read what the U.S. Supreme Court decision in *Hawaii v. OHA* in 2009 had to say, and I’m quoting. The Supreme Court Justices held ‘that the Apology Resolution did not restructure the rights and obligations of the state.’ Also, ‘that there was no clear and manifest intention of Congress to cloud the title that the United States held in absolute fee and transferred to the state during admission in 1959.’ Then, in the last paragraph, ‘When a state supreme court incorrectly bases a decision on federal law, the court’s decision improperly prevents the citizens of the state from addressing the issue in question throughout the process provided by the state’s constitution.’ And here, the State Supreme Court incorrectly held that Congress, by adopting the Apology Resolution, took away from the citizens of Hawai‘i the authority to resolve an issue that is of great importance to the people of Hawai‘i.

“I mention this because 90 percent of this bill talks about the Apology Resolution and about things that happened previously,

and is not honoring Queen Lili‘uokalani. So it is more than a mere change in date; it also basically keeps alive the concept that sovereignty was never relinquished, and that has possible legal liabilities on things that happened since 1959.

“For example, transfer of lands. Would they still be considered not crown lands but sovereignty lands not belonging to the people of Hawai‘i or to the State of Hawai‘i? There could be litigation with cloud on title and other things.

“And finally, Madam President, all of us take an oath when we are elected or re-elected to support and defend the Constitution of the United States of America and the State of Hawai‘i, and I believe that the verbiage included in this bill goes far beyond that and makes us violate our pledge.

“So, by all means, let’s continue to honor, appreciate, and respect Queen Lili‘uokalani, but let’s not deal with incorrect analyses of the Congressional Apology Resolution and other matters. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Madam President, members of the Senate, I have to point out an illogical statement that was previously made. You know that Hawai‘i was annexed to the United States by a joint resolution of Congress, so a joint resolution of Congress has the effect of the law. It’s called the Newlands Resolution. And to say that the Apology Resolution, as the previous speaker did, has no force of law, then his logic says that the annexation of Hawai‘i was illegal. So, it’s faulty logic because we have settled the question that a joint resolution of Congress has the force of law. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Galuteria rose and stated:

“Thank you, Madam President. I would like to ask that the words of the previous speaker be entered into the record as if they were my own.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

“In addition to that, I’d also like to point out to the Minority Leader that all of his words, perhaps, represent the minority party of the State of Hawai‘i, and if he wants to go on record as saying that, then we will take him at his word.

“Number two, there will be absolutely never enough reconciliation. This is but a small gesture to our queen, who was brought into her station in 1891, and, as many monarchs do, hold that title until they pass away, which was in 1917. So, we are simply trying to right another wrong against Queen Lili‘uokalani.

“And, once again, I would like to get some clarity from the Minority Leader if his particular position represents that of the minority party throughout the entire State of Hawai‘i and the United States of America. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Slom rose in response as follows:

“Thank you. Thank you for your questions, Majority Leader. I do not pretend to speak for anyone else, certainly not a political party or any other organization. I’m speaking as a State Senator in this body in the State of Hawai‘i. The views are my own and they represent my position. Other positions, I can’t speak for.

“Secondly, however, not to beat a dead horse or to quibble over a resolution: I would go back and commend all of you to read Senator Daniel Inouye’s statements after the passage of the Apology Resolution where he said it was a resolution, it was the feeling of the Congress, it did not have the effect of law, and it would not be used any further. Thank you.”



Senator English rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

“You know, no matter what we call it and what we say, when a joint resolution of Congress is passed, it has the force of law. That is settled point of law. You can call it whatever you want and say anything about it, but it does have the force of law, because if it didn’t Hawai’i would not be legally annexed. The Newlands Resolution was a joint resolution of Congress, and it has the force of law. Therefore, all other joint resolutions have the force of law. It’s like our resolutions here: We can call it anything we want, but it expresses the sentiments of our body. So, no matter what you say about it, it is what it is. Thank you, Madam President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 233, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO QUEEN LILIUOKALANI,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Kahele rose to make the following remarks:

“Colleagues, as mentioned earlier by our Senate Majority Floor Leader, today is our Military Appreciation Day at the Capitol, and I would be remiss if I did not mention that on February 19, 1945 – 69 years ago – 70,000 U.S. Marines invaded the island of Iwo Jima against 18,000 Japanese soldiers. In 36 days of fighting on the island, nearly 7,000 Marines were killed. Another 20,000 were wounded. Marines captured 216 Japanese soldiers; the rest were killed in action. Twenty-seven Medals of Honor, our country’s highest military award for bravery, were awarded for action on Iwo Jima, more than any other battle in U.S. history. The average age of a Marine was 19. The iconic photograph taken by Joe Rosenthal of the flag-raising on Mount Suribachi, a flag raised by five Marines and one Navy Pharmacist’s Mate, we all know and recall as one of the most famous photographs of World War II. Among the men who fought on Iwo Jima, ‘uncommon valor was common virtue’ – Admiral Chester Nimitz. Freedom has not been free. Freedom has been paid for by blood. Thank you very much.”

S.B. No. 499, S.D. 1 (H.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate disagreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 499, S.D. 1, and requested a conference on the subject matter thereof.



**THIRD READING**

S.B. No. 2470, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 2470, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As I said when first voting against the creation of this connector, it was flawed, it was not going to achieve what it was supposed to, and any changes in the bill right now, I think, are unnecessary. We all read the comments of the interim director of the health connector saying that, basically, it cannot be fixed at this point. So, instead of tinkering with it, we should get on with the business of abolishing it.

“I find particularly interesting the statement within the bill: ‘No state agency shall impede the efficient operation of the connector.’ There has been no efficient operation of the connector. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“It’s curious that the Minority Leader continues to object to the workings of the Hawai‘i Health Connector. It is an entity that is helping to move forward subsidized health care plans – affordable health plans for small groups, for individuals, and families in our state. It has not operated as well as people had hoped for, but part of that is because of procedural changes and other operational and implementation adjustments decreed at the federal level.

“Those matters aside I believe that as the connector goes forward, we need to ensure that its board of directors has the best mix of people, the appropriate numbers of members and skill sets to make it a successful operation; that’s really what this bill is designed to do. It consolidates the government representatives, specified that one shall represent the state government. The other government representatives will be ex officio, but without a vote. The bill also removes the insurers from the board of directors. They’ve actually been very helpful in the formative stages of the connector, and they have recused themselves when they needed to. But now that we’re in the phase of actually selling plans, it is more appropriate that insurer representatives be available to advise and to respond to inquiries from the board, rather than sitting on the board and constantly having to recuse themselves. And I think that’s an appropriate action for this body to take.

“In addition, the line that the senator from East Honolulu read had to do with how the government directors were operating. There were some issues with the fact that all of the applications to purchase insurance from the connector had to go, first, through a determination by the Department of Human Services and be denied before they could go on to the Hawai‘i Health Connector. And this was just to acknowledge that we want to make sure that all of the systems, whether they’re within government or outside of government, are working together, talking together; and it just acknowledged the fact that there were some issues that impacted the number of people that could come into the connector, and ultimately, its sustainability.

“I think this measure, as it continues to move forward, will give us an opportunity to see how the connector has improved over time with additional personnel and skill sets. And I’m optimistic that when we get to 2015, we will have a great number more individuals eligible and getting their health plans through the Hawai‘i Health Connector and getting savings from subsidized premiums as a result. So, I ask all my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo.”

Senator Slom rose in rebuttal as follows:

“The issue really should not be about the people involved or how we rearrange the board. You can have the best people in the world, the most knowledgeable, just like you can have a house with brand-new furniture, but if it’s got a rotting foundation, you’re going to have difficulties. The fact that the early estimates were between 100,000 and 300,000 people to sign up, and we have approximately, at best guess now, 4,000 – which also means that we’re going to trigger a tax on every premium holder – shows that the problem is with the substance of the plan itself, and it should be time for the Senate to acknowledge that. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose in rebuttal as follows:

“With regard to the previous speaker’s remarks, Hawai‘i has one of the lowest uninsured rates in the entire country, partly thanks to our prepaid healthcare law. In addition, when the Department of Human Services made the appropriate decision to expand the eligibility for Medicaid, that decision additionally shrunk the numbers of eligibles that could go to the connector. So, the numbers may have been overly optimistic, but the truth remains that many, many people have had an opportunity to get health insurance. People cannot be denied because they have a preexisting illness, and that’s very important. Young people up to age 26 can stay on their parents’ plans.

“So, we have more and more people with an opportunity to have health coverage and to have it at an affordable price. Yes, there have been some rocks along the way, but any new program standing up as this one has done, really when it was probably more of a tech startup than a health care startup, has had some issues, but I’m confident that, with the leadership that’s in place now and some of the changes that the Legislature will make with this measure and others, will give us an opportunity to have a very successful connector and make sure that the health of our people is first and foremost. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I’ll be voting with reservations on this measure, Madam President, but I would like to ask a question of the chairwoman if she will yield.”

Senator Baker responded:

“I’ll be more than happy to try to answer the senator’s question.”

Senator Solomon continued:

“Thank you. I’m just curious about ‘no state agency shall impede the efficient operation of the connector.’ Does that involve the attorney general’s office as well?”

Senator Baker responded:

“No, it doesn’t.”

Senator Solomon responded:

“Okay. Thank you very much.”

#### RECONSIDERATION OF ACTIONS TAKEN

S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2:

Senator Hee moved that the Senate reconsider action taken on March 5, 2013, in recommitting S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2 to the Committee on Judiciary and Labor and the Committee on Ways and Means, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Hee noted:

“Thank you, Madam President. This bill, S.B. No. 894, was recommitted last year largely due to a letter received dated March 4, 2013, from Turtle Bay Resorts CEO Drew Stotesbury, where he said, and let me just read the important sentences: ‘If the parties are able to negotiate terms, area, and price, then S.B. No. 894 could be amended to effectuate the terms of the negotiated settlement. If the parties are not able to negotiate a settlement, then I suspect S.B. No. 894 might proceed through the legislative process in the next session.’

“In addition, Madam President and members, this body passed S.C.R. No. 164 and on page 3, I’ll read the ‘whereas’ that relates to this action taken today: ‘Whereas, however, if the developer and the State are unable to negotiate a settlement, then S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2, may proceed accordingly through the legislative process during the Regular Session of 2014.’

“The reason for the action taken today is that, as everyone in this chamber knows, we’re up against a first crossover deadline. So, this allows what I consider to be a safety net in the negotiation process presently ongoing between Turtle Bay and the state administration through the Department of Land and Natural Resources to continue, but yet have in play an instrument that could be used to effectuate a settlement.

“As for the settlement itself, it is ongoing and proceeding slower than I personally would like, but nonetheless, because I’m not personally involved in the settlement discussion, understand that a resolution is in the offing. Quite frankly, I’m optimistic that an agreement will be reached. In any event, taking this action this morning allows the widest latitude provided to the Legislature to the extent that it wishes to exercise its prerogative if a settlement is reached, as well as if a settlement is not reached; the Legislature is afforded the opportunity to exercise its prerogative. While I hope a settlement is reached, I am not naive to think that there should not be alternative considerations if Turtle Bay continues negotiating at this pace. Thank you, Madam President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Hee then moved that S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

At 12:06 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

## TWENTY-FOURTH DAY

## Friday, February 28, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:42 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro welcomed eleventh- and twelfth-grade students from Kamaile Academy in Wai'anae, who were accompanied by teachers Jeffrey Majkowski and Kendra Singletary.

Senator Slom introduced Julie Sparks, University of Hawai'i William S. Richardson School of Law extern with the Senate Minority and Hawaii State Mother of the Year. Senator Slom recognized Ms. Sparks for her many accomplishments, active involvement in the community, and compassion for others, and presented her with a Senate congratulatory certificate.

Senator Thielen recognized and celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Hawaii Foodbank, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Colleagues, this year the Hawaii Foodbank is celebrating its twenty-fifth anniversary of the annual food drive. The Hawaii Foodbank provides food so that no one in our 'ohana, the people of the State of Hawai'i, goes hungry. The Foodbank is the only nonprofit agency in the State of Hawai'i that collects, warehouses, and distributes mass quantities of both perishable and non-perishable food to 250 charitable agencies on the island of O'ahu. Last year, the Hawaii Foodbank distributed over 12.8 million pounds of food – including nearly 4 million pounds of fresh produce – to help feed 183,500 individuals statewide.

"In 1996, the Hawaii Foodbank was rated Hawai'i's number one charity by *Hawaii Business* magazine. The Foodbank is the only organization in Hawai'i that is a certified member of Feeding America, the nation's largest domestic hunger awareness organization, and is also active in the Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster to help with disaster relief.

"The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i recognizes this auspicious occasion of Hawaii Foodbank's twenty-fifth anniversary, and we join the citizens of the State of Hawai'i in the celebration of this historic event. We are being active ourselves in supporting the Hawaii Foodbank's efforts to meet its 2014 goal to raise one million meals.

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. It's my pleasure to present to the body Linda Rosen, who is an exceptional physician in our community and who has been a physician leader for many years. You all know that we had a tragedy in our state several months ago when we lost a very dear friend, Director Loretta Fuddy, in a plane crash. One of her very able and loyal team members was Dr. Rosen, who has spent a great deal of time helping us improve our trauma system.

"She's been, from my perspective, one of the most proactive, one of the most intelligent, and one of the most compassionate people in the Department of Health for a very long time. She is

a go-getter; and when we tasked her with putting together a better program to take care of people who get injured in our state, whether it's on a neighbor island or here, we entrusted her with resources from tobacco taxes to put together an exceptional system, and she stepped up to the plate. She gets things done, she was unanimously supported in our committee, and really is a very extraordinary person. She's a pediatrician and a surgeon. She has the respect of her colleagues; that was evident in our hearing. She has a good team of deputies that have a lot of work on their plate, but she felt that she could do this job this year; and the circumstance notwithstanding, this is the person that would have had my trust, under any and all circumstances, to be director. So, I'd like to ask, colleagues, that we consider confirming Dr. Linda Rosen today in our chamber."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I, too, rise to join in support of this governor's nominee and would echo many of the words from my colleague, who chairs the Health Committee.

"I've known Linda for a lot of years and worked with her on many different projects; and if it hadn't been for the leadership that she has provided, I don't think our trauma system, our emergency system, would be to the point where it is today. So, I'm delighted that she stepped to the plate and that she offered her extraordinary skills and good heart to this effort to lead the Department of Health. It was heartwarming to see all of her colleagues from the department come forward and support her as well. So, Linda, we wish you all the best, and I encourage all of my colleagues to stand with Senator Green and me in supporting Linda Rosen."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Green introduced Director Linda Rosen.

At 12:07 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:12 p.m.

### THIRD READING

S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 894, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I thought this was a bad bill last year; I think it's still a bad bill this year. While the amendments clarify and say that this is not a taking and that it's for conserving, the bill title, of course, is 'land acquisition.'

"This bill requires – it doesn't suggest or ask or whatever – requires the governor to enter into negotiations for purchase of certain lands involved with the Turtle Bay Resort. The amount is blank, but the discussion was that it was going to be \$40 million, but there's no guarantee that it won't be \$100 million or \$200 million or some unspecified amount.

"The main thing is this legislature went on record last year as requiring Turtle Bay to do certain things and to actively negotiate for changes within their plan. First of all, they did show their flexibility last year and did change their plans, did

listen to the public; and my understanding is that the negotiations have been ongoing and are fruitful at this point. So, I view this as a taking with loss of value for the owners. I understand that all of the guarantees for public hearings, for zoning, for request for changes are still with the public and still available, so I think this is not even a question of being premature while the negotiations are going on. I view this as the heavy hand of government getting involved in private matters where it seems to be worked out. So, I would urge my colleagues to think about this before supporting it. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Notwithstanding the remarks by the previous speaker, in fact, this measure before us, for anyone who's been in the Legislature in any amount of time would understand that if the Senate does not act upon this measure, it would be lost simply by the internal deadlines imposed on the House and the Senate.

"Secondly, this matter before us is in keeping with the CEO of Turtle Bay Resort, who, in a letter dated March 4 said, and I quote, 'If the parties are able to negotiate terms, area, and price, then S.B. No. 894 could be amended to effectuate the terms of the negotiated settlement. If the parties are not able to negotiate a settlement, then I suspect S.B. No. 894 might proceed through the legislative process into the next session.' Well, here we are. I said yesterday that the negotiations evidently were moving along and that much progress has been made; and in fact, that statement has been made by the CEO of Turtle Bay in an email to several parties, myself included.

"However, the negotiations are not moving quickly enough. The CEO of Turtle Bay had said in the letter dated March 4, 2013, that he believed – let me read it, so I'm not putting words into his mouth: 'The developer is open to good-faith negotiations with the State, provided that these negotiations take place immediately and that negotiations terminate no later than November 30, 2013.' Well, we're way past November 30, 2013, notwithstanding the fact that the negotiations by the individual whose letter I read believes that it is moving along and is fruitful.

"The plain fact of the political matter is that \$40 million of general obligation bonds has been thought about by several members of the Legislature for use in other endeavors. And the fact of the matter is if the individual whose letter I quoted doesn't move posthaste, he may find himself without a funding mechanism, good intentions notwithstanding.

"We should, at this point, be talking about how to implement the \$40 million; in fact, the concern here is whether or not the \$40 million will be in play to the extent that the CEO of Turtle Bay Resort finally takes the proper arrow out of his quiver and executes it by hitting a target. Mayor Caldwell is on board. Councilmember and Chair Ernie Martin is on board. The governor is on board. Turtle Bay purports to be on board.

"Sometimes, a spur is required, and evidently this spur has gotten the attention of all parties, and the desire is that this bill – which, really, is a safety net – will not be necessary. But the longer this delay occurs, the less likely, in my opinion, this settlement can be brought to a fruitful conclusion. If we don't act on this bill, in accordance with the CEO's own remarks, this safety net may not be available because of our own internal deadlines, which all of us try to adhere to. Thank you."

“Next week, colleagues, we celebrate National Consumer Protection Week. It runs from March 2 to March 8. In its sixteenth year, the National Consumer Protection Week encourages American consumers to learn about their rights in the marketplace and to recognize and report scams, identity theft, and unfair business practices.

“Our own Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs will celebrate National Consumer Protection Week with a resource fair here at the Capitol on Monday, March 3 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on the third floor lanai. Now, I know many of us will be in caucus, but perhaps there’s a time we can take a few minutes out to learn about some of the other services that DCCA provides on behalf of consumers in Hawai‘i, and encourage your staff to stop by as well. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Gabbard rose to thank Senator Thielen for coordinating the Senate’s fundraising efforts to benefit the Hawaii Foodbank, and encouraged the members to participate in upcoming fundraising events including his signature lasagna plate sale and the second annual Capitol Idol talent show.

The Chair suggested that Senator Gabbard invite the media to participate in the benefit event as well, then made the following announcement:

Industrial hemp is quite simply a miracle crop that can be made into food products, such as oils, seeds, and protein powders. It's also used to make paper, rope, soaps, materials in auto manufacturing, insulation, and construction materials.

"You've probably seen a lot of these products on our store shelves, but the head scratcher is that all these products can't be made with hemp grown in the U.S. Instead, it has to be imported from countries, such as China, France, and Chile. However, in the 1930s, laws were passed to lump hemp with narcotics and were banned. For most of our history, hemp was grown in our country and was a very important crop. One of its other benefits, is that it can be grown without the use of pesticides and can actually heal lands that have been heavily contaminated through chemical pesticide in the past.

"Ten states around the country have passed legislation (California, Colorado, Kentucky, Maine, Montana, North Dakota, Oregon, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia) to

legalize hemp. States can also apply for waivers from the federal government to allow for hemp production. Related to that, the U.S. House recently approved language in the Farm Bill to allow hemp research at universities. I highly recommend the documentary *Bringing it Home* if you're interested in learning about the history of hemp and why it could potentially be a huge agriculture crop for our state's future. Please join me in supporting SB 2175 SD2. Mahalo."

I witnessed firsthand the problems little fire ants, coconut rhinoceros beetles, miconia, albizia, coqui frogs, and others are having in our islands. Our island-based invasive species committees are dedicated folks who are doing a heroic job, but the fact is they need us to come through with the necessary resources. I urge you all to consider these points and continue supporting this very important bill. Mahalo."

“SB 2934 would add another arrow to our quiver in making solar PV accessible to all and keep us on the cutting edge in clean energy technology. What this bill does is start the process of establishing a community-based renewables program in our state. At its core, this measure allows all ratepayers to sign-up to purchase PV panels at an off-site location and receive a credit on their electricity bill for the energy produced. This is great for folks who don’t have adequate roof space or have shaded roofs, or simply want to own a small amount of solar, but still want to reduce their electricity bills. People can own as little as one PV panel or as many as they want. It’s also helpful for those who live in areas with high levels of solar saturation because they can still get the benefits of lowering their electricity bills with PV. There are 10 other states around the country that have already put this kind of policy in place. One example of this program in action is an 858 kW system near the Garfield County Airport in Rifle, Colorado – where 3,575 panels are owned by Jimmy’s Pizza, Montessori School, and various families and individuals. I ask you to join me in supporting SB 2934 SD2. Mahalo.”

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2651 be adopted and S.B. No. 2054, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 2) to S.B. No. 2054, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 2054, S.D. 2, is amended by changing its effective date from July 1, 2014, to July 1, 2050.

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"We agreed to insert a defective effective date in S.B. No. 2054, and that's what this floor amendment does."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Ige then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2651 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2054, S.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2780 (S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2780 be adopted and S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Baker then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 3) to S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, section 1, is amended by amending page 2, line 9, through page 3, line 19, to read as follows:

"Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

- (1) Include electronic smoking devices within the definition of "tobacco products" under chapter 245, Hawaii Revised Statutes, thereby:
  - (A) Subjecting wholesalers and dealers of electronic smoking devices to the same licensing requirements as wholesalers and dealers of cigarettes and other tobacco products; and
  - (B) Subjecting retailers of electronic smoking devices to the same permitting requirements as retailers of cigarettes and other tobacco products;
- (2) Establish an excise tax on electronic smoking devices of an unspecified per cent of the wholesale price of each electronic smoking device kit, electronic smoking device nicotine cartridge, or electronic smoking device nicotine refill sold, used, or possessed by a wholesaler or dealer on or after October 1, 2014; and
- (3) Amend Hawaii's anti-smoking statute to prohibit the use of electronic smoking devices in places open to the public and places of employment."

SECTION 2. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting sections 3 and 4.

SECTION 3. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended as follows:

1. By renumbering section 5 as section 3.

2. By amending section 3 to amend section 245-3(a)(12), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to correct a drafting error and to read:

"(12) An excise tax equal to seventy per cent of the wholesale price of each article or item of tobacco products, other than large cigars, electronic smoking device kits, electronic smoking device nicotine cartridges, or electronic smoking device nicotine refills, sold by the wholesaler or dealer on and after September 30, 2009, whether or not sold at wholesale, or if not sold then at the same rate upon the use by the wholesaler or dealer; ~~and~~"

SECTION 4. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering section 6 as section 4.

SECTION 5. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting sections 7 and 8.

SECTION 6. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended by renumbering section 9 as section 5.

SECTION 7. S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 2, is amended as follows:

1. By renumbering section 10 as section 6.

2. By amending section 6 to read:

"SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050; provided that sections 2 and 3 of this Act shall take effect on January 1, 2015."

Senator Baker moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. As the clerk noted, this measure addresses the regulation of electronic smoking devices. During the Ways and Means discussion, it came to my attention that there were attorney general concerns regarding agreement between subject and title, understanding that each bill can only encompass one subject matter. I worked with the attorney general to resolve those conflicts. Unfortunately, our work wasn't completed in time to deliver that information to the Committee on Ways and Means before their decision making and subsequent amendments. Since this chair doesn't like to send over constitutionally flawed measures to the House if we can avoid it, therefore, I offered to draft a floor amendment to bring this measure in line with what would be accepted practice.

"So, the floor amendment amends the purpose, as there are sections being taken out. It also deleted the sections that created the title problem – sections 3 and 4, sections 7 and 8 of the original bill – and I kept all of the other items in terms of blanks and defective dates that the Committee on Ways and Means had adopted."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 3 was put by the Chair and carried, with Senator Slom voting "No."

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2495, S.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRONIC SMOKING DEVICES," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2809 (S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2809 be adopted and S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ige then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 4) to S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting the language contained on page 3, line 14 through page 4, line 2, and replacing it with the following:

“The purpose of this Act is to convene a task force to assist the department of land and natural resources in developing rules to establish a marine life conservation district to ensure greater protection of the State’s ocean resources.”

SECTION 2. S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2, is amended by amending Section 2 by deleting the contents of subsection (b) on page 4, lines 8-16, and replacing it with the following:

“(b) The task force shall be composed of five members as follows:

- (1) One member appointed by the mayor of Kauai;
- (2) One member appointed by the governor; and
- (3) Three members who are residents of Niihau, to be appointed by the owners of Niihau.”

SECTION 3. S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 2, is amended by deleting Section 3 in its entirety and renumbering Section 4 as Section 3.

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Yes, Madam President. As we were making amendments to S.B. No. 2125, I did not have sufficient time on deadline night to get prior concurrence to all of the amendments made prior to us having to deck the bill. I had agreed and discussed this with the subject matter chair, and we are jointly offering this floor amendment.

“The floor amendment would make two changes: one, it does delete the prohibition about the department moving forward with rules until the conclusion of the task force. We felt that if the department was able to move forward with some rules concerning the implementation of the marine, that they should be free to do that. The second amendment was to change the makeup of the task force to better reflect the residents of Ni‘ihau as well as the general public. So, this floor amendment does those two things as agreed to with the chair of the Water and Land Committee.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 4 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Ige then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2809 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Solomon and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2125, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARINE LIFE CONSERVATION DISTRICT,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

At 10:45 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:49 a.m.

The Clerk made the following announcement:

“Madam President, we are returning to an item on page 57, one of the floor amendments – S.B. No. 2495, Relating To Electronic Smoking Devices.”

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2780 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ige and carried.

At 10:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:51 a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2766 (S.B. No. 2696, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, S.B. No. 2696, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE KAKAOKO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT,” was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2810 (S.B. No. 2698, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, S.B. No. 2698, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY,” was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2827 (S.B. No. 2697, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, S.B. No. 2697, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY,” was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

S.B. No. 180, S.D. 2:

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 180, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCEAN MANAGEMENT,” was deferred until later on the calendar.

S.B. No. 2687, S.D. 1:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 2687, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“The whole idea of having a statute of limitations is to avoid frivolous lawsuits. We passed a bill two years ago that extended the statute of limitations on sexual abuse cases. We have seen, since that time, an abundance of lawsuits. This bill provides an age limit of up to 55 years of age. It seems that the statute of limitations serves no purpose if we are able to just remove it or to increase it to this kind of age limit.

“While I’m all for the prosecution of anyone involved in sexual abuse, I find it difficult to support this kind of legislation because if we’re talking about something 30 or 40 years later, we find that, in most cases, the alleged defendant is either infirm or dead, so it makes the judicial process that much more difficult. We have not had an opportunity to really examine what the extension of the past law has done, but my predilection is that it has been negative. Thank you.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. Our laws should be made to protect victims of abuse and rape and support them and their courage to come forward to obtain justice. Adult perpetrators prey on the vulnerabilities of child victims, and it’s well-known that a vast majority of these victims do not report the sexual assaults to the authorities.

“If we do not pass this measure, the window will expire in April, and I really believe that this measure provides a compromise and a fair age to allow victims to bring these causes of action. I have additional written remarks to submit.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Shimabukuro's additional remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of S.B. No. 2687, S.D. 1. In 2012, the Legislature passed a law that would allow victims of childhood abuse who had been previously barred by the statute of limitations a two-year window to bring a civil action against the perpetrator or against the entity that employed the person accused of committing the abuse. This law will sunset on April 24, 2014, if we don't take action today extend the statute of limitations.

"The measure before you will extend the window for a victim of child sexual abuse to file a cause of action if the statute of limitations for filing a civil claim has lapsed and the victim has not yet attained the age of fifty-five.

"Our laws should be made to protect victims of abuse and rape and support them and their courage to come forward to obtain justice. Adult perpetrators prey on the vulnerabilities of child victims, and it is well known that a vast majority of these victims do not report the sexual assaults to the authorities.

"Consider these facts from a study by the Director of the Crimes Against Children Research Center:

- 1 in 5 girls and 1 in 20 boys is a victim of child sexual abuse;
- Self-report studies show that 20% of adult females and 5-10% of adult males recall a childhood sexual assault or sexual abuse incident;
- During a one-year period in the U.S., 16% of youth ages 14 to 17 had been sexually victimized;
- Over the course of their lifetime, 28% of U.S. youth ages 14 to 17 had been sexually victimized;
- Children are most vulnerable to child sexual abuse between the ages of 7 and 13.

"Sexual abuse should not be tolerated in our community at any time, and this bill sends that strong message. By eliminating the statute of limitations we are encouraging survivors to come forward and hold their perpetrators accountable.

"Because of Act 68, we have had at least 10 survivors come forward with suits directly attributable to the law. If we don't pass this bill, we essentially will leave survivors like them behind.

"Those opposed to this measure say that the law would encourage false reporting or that the length of time raises due process concerns. These arguments are weak in the face of the benefit to our communities and child victims of sexual abuse. In any lawsuit brought forth by this law, there would still be the burden of proof and difficulty for both sides to provide sufficient evidence given the passage of time.

"Not only does this measure give survivors of sexual abuse a chance for justice, it can prevent future abuse of other children by identifying perpetrators today.

"Simply put, Madam President, we should not be protecting child predators by silencing child sex abuse victims. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this measure. Mahalo."

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Your Committee on Judiciary received compelling testimony with respect to this measure. In particular, one victim came forward and indicated to us as a committee that there are times when he smells things that remind him of his rape in church. The same victim came forward and said, in a very nice way, there are things he sees when he doesn't expect to see

things that remind him of when he was raped. There are people he sees that remind him of when he was raped.

"In deference to the previous speaker who spoke in opposition, I would submit to you that what he smells, what he sees, and what he hears will stay with him for the rest of his life. I do not believe there is anything frivolous about his situation, nor do I believe the situation at Penn State, where young boys were raped by a former coach, is frivolous. Justice sometimes takes a long time, and if the perpetrator happens to die while justice is being sought, so be it; justice was served. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2687, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIMITATION OF ACTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 2623, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 2623, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Hee.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I think the intent of the bill is good, but it really interferes with the franchise process, with contracts, and with venue, and I don't think that the stated intent is going to be achieved. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2623, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FRANCHISES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none.

S.B. No. 2199, S.D. 1:

Senator Gabbard moved that S.B. No. 2199, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This bill mandates that building permits be issued only if certain electrical wiring requirements are made. This results in additional costs, but more importantly, as was produced in testimony at the hearing, testimony is far outpacing legislative intent and statutory frozenness. The idea that we require that this kind of wiring be done for electric vehicles flies in the face of research that was presented during the hearing that no less a company than Toyota has already indicated that they're working on wireless charging technology. So, to force any kind of technology into statute rather than to incentivize, I think, does a disservice and defeats the purpose of alternative energy. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2199, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 2487, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 2487, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“There was an attempt to do away with the Small Business Regulatory Review Board, and as someone who has been involved with the creation of that board from the very beginning, I think that the intent of the board as a buffer for legislation that impacts small businesses – 95 percent of all of our businesses in Hawai‘i are small businesses – has been thwarted throughout the years because the government agencies, legislative intent, and even the executive branch of both political parties have interfered with the workings of this group.

“This group is independent, they’re non-paid, they work hard, they represent all islands, and they have provided information as to why certain legislation would be harmful. The attempt to do away with them, I think, is unconscionable. The attempt here to mitigate some of the things that they do and also to sunset their work, I think, diminishes the importance of this body. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2487, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, 1 (Ihara).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2515 (S.B. No. 2021, S.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2515 be adopted and S.B. No. 2021, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Certainly, we want to protect our police officers and law enforcement officers; we want them to be able to do their duty. We do already have on the statutes resisting arrest laws; we also have assault laws. I think that we’ve seen some incidents in the recent past where there have been excessive uses by law enforcement officials that resulted in unsatisfactory consequences for people that were trying to protect their family members, and it can be argued that this gives overly broad powers and more penalties for someone who can be accused of resisting arrest or whose actions may be seen subjectively as resisting arrest. So, I would caution any broader use of this law. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2515 was adopted and S.B. No. 2021, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESISTING ARREST,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Slom, Solomon). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2516 (S.B. No. 2260, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Hee, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2516 was adopted and S.B. No. 2260, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAGES AND HOURS ON PUBLIC WORKS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 1:

Senator Wakai moved that S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Certainly, I would be remiss if I didn’t remind everyone again that the only true native land mammal in Hawai‘i, a real resident, is the Hawaiian hoary bat. And you know, there are other instruments that have been suggested including the nose flute, which Danny Kaleikini, when he opens our session every year, seems to play quite well. So, maybe we could honor the Portuguese and the Hawaiians at the same time, and with a friendly amendment, have the ‘ukulele-strumming by Jake and the nose flute by Danny. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As much as I enjoy playing ‘ukulele – although I admit to playing it not that well – I have among my constituents a renowned musician by the name of Henry Allen, who happens to be a master of the Hawaiian steel guitar. And in support of his efforts to make sure that our young people learn about Hawaiian music and learn about the only true indigenous Hawaiian stringed instrument, the Hawaiian steel guitar, I must stand in opposition to this measure.

“It’s the Hawaiian steel guitar that evokes Hawaiian music. It’s played by wonderful masters like Henry Allen and others; and I would also note that we’ve received a number of emails from such noted musicians that talk about the fact that while the ‘ukulele is very popular, its use is pervasive among all music genres and not necessarily symbolically associated with Hawai‘i and Hawaiian music. It is the Hawaiian steel guitar and the art of playing it that immediately conjures up images of hula dancers and palm trees in direct association with Hawai‘i. Simple characteristic Hawaiian steel guitar patterns, when played with no other instrument, are immediately recognizable as Hawaiian.

“So, it seems to me that instead of raising up the ‘ukulele, while wonderful and played a lot in Hawai‘i, the official state instrument should be symbolic of that which is representative of and consistently associated with Hawai‘i: the Hawaiian steel guitar. Mahalo.”

Senator English rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Members, you know, this is a slippery slope because when we start trying to look at what should be the official instrument, we run across all of these problems that the good senator from Kīhei just enumerated.

“Members, I would propose that we look at the Hawaiian pahu drum as the official Hawaiian instrument. Why? Because Pa‘ao, when he came from Tahiti, brought with him a drum named Naniuaola, the first pahu drum to come to Hawai‘i. And it was symbolic of the native peoples of this land, of everything we’ve been through, and it is something that has followed all steps of hula, all music, all the way through.

“So, I cannot support – I like the ‘ukulele, but I cannot support it as the official state instrument. The pahu drum should be the Hawai‘i state instrument. Thank you.”

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’m in support of the measure, and support it simply because I think the discussion we’re having, even here today on the floor, is a healthy one. When your Committee on

Technology and the Arts passed this measure a week ago, there was all supportive testimony. So, I think we should be open to having the discussion about what should our state instrument be. Should it be the Hawaiian steel guitar? Should it be a drum that came to us from Tahiti? Please allow this measure to go forth so we can continue that discussion over on the House side. None of the suggestions that were uttered today were brought up at the hearing last week, and I think that I would be more than receptive if there was a similar bill coming over from the House to look at all other instruments that might be deemed worthy of being our state instrument. So, I encourage my colleagues today to just let this discussion continue and be assured that if we have the opportunity, we'll look at all the possibilities as this discussion continues. Thank you."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Thank you very much, Madam President. I, too, will be voting 'no' on this bill. I support the remarks of the senator from Kīhei. The steel guitar was invented by Joseph Kekuku when he was a student at Kamehameha Schools, and I feel it more appropriate that that should be the instrument that we should be looking at for the possibility of declaring that as our state instrument. Thank you."

Senator English rose to make the following inquiry:

"Madam President, would the chair of the committee be open to defecting the date on this?"

Senator Wakai responded:

"I think it already has a defective date of 2020."

Senator English continued:

"So, it's six years from now? Okay, that's not as defective as much as I would like, but it's still defective. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE INSTRUMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 17; Ayes with Reservations (Espero, Green, Ige, Ihara, Kidani, Nishihara, Ruderman, Slom, Thielen, Tokuda). Noes, 7 (Baker, English, Gabbard, Galuteria, Kahele, Keith-Agaran, Solomon). Excused, 1 (Shimabukuro).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2530 (S.B. No. 2577, S.D. 2):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2530 be adopted and S.B. No. 2577, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"You know, if you want to get a crowd down here, you either have a bill about animals or different professions, and we saw the results when we talked about naturopaths versus physicians and midwifery and all of that. In the end, I salute the chair of the committee for trying to mitigate some of the most outrageous parts of the original bill, but still, it does not recognize the separation between naturopaths and MDs, physicians. Neither one wants to be the other, and that's the point. There's not a problem. There has not been a problem in terms of lack of care by the naturopaths, and so I think that some of these amendments, while reduced from the original, are still overbearing and interfere with that profession. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"What the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection did, with concurrence of the Committee on Health, from whence this measure originated, was to address concerns that were brought by the Board of Naturopathy, as well as other naturopathic physicians. Their testimony was that they wanted to be in line with other professions that have continuing competency or continuing education, and that's what the committee provided. So, I think it does recognize that there are differences among the professions, particularly the healing arts, and it was something that was unanimously sought by all members of the naturopathic board as well as their physicians out in the community. Thank you."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I support the intent of the bill to include continuing education for all healthcare providers, but I don't believe that we should put any more requirements on naturopathic doctors until we give them the most basic thing that they need and deserve, which is a mandate that insurance companies cover them in our state. Right now, we pay our money for medical insurance, but we don't get to choose our doctor if you don't believe in the standard model: you have to pay extra to see a naturopath. And while insurance is mandatory, I believe that we should have the freedom of choice of the kind of doctor we see, and the most fundamental part of that choice is being covered by insurance. Thank you."

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I stand in support of the measure. I think that the Consumer Protection chair did make some amendments that make sense to provide continuing medical education, but let me be clear. We passed a bill a couple years ago – a bill that I introduced, actually – that gave extended prescription privileges to naturopathic physicians. The context of that bill was to expand their capacity to prescribe, but to have them do it in concert with the rules that were in California.

"After we passed the bill, in which they had carte blanche ability to prescribe all drugs, they were supposed to form a relationship with physicians, which is what California does, so that those two disciplines can work together. The truth is, whether people want to believe it or not, naturopathic physicians have utterly different training than allopathic physicians. The core of naturopathic medicine is prevention. I'm totally supportive of naturopathic physicians, but they are not a prescribing discipline at their core. We've made a very serious mistake in having absolute comprehensive prescription privileges for naturopaths, just like we would make a terrible mistake if we had allopathic physicians doing naturopathic modalities of treatment. We would really be remiss if we didn't focus on what these groups do best.

"So, this bill, which provides for continuing medical education, will help naturopaths do more training, but they just honestly do not train like allopathic physicians, and anyone who says differently has got their head deep in the sand. Thank you, Madam President."

It might be that many people don't see it that way, but I think that if we're going to err, we should err on the caution of free speech, and this bill doesn't do it. Thank you."

This should be in the supplemental budget, should be a direct appropriation, and not an emergency. Thank you."

"Since the board regulates both dentists and dental hygienists within the state, the board is more appropriately named Board of Dentistry and Dental Hygiene to reflect the true function of the board.

"As we strive for greater transparency throughout our state agencies, the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection thought it was prudent for the Board to establish a conflict of interest policy. Many of the Board members participate with dental examination companies as examiners, officers and committee members, which is part of the reason these board members have depth in understanding of their profession. It is important and necessary that the Board serve the people and not the companies they represent.

"This measure also addresses the Auditor's report issued in 1993 that noted with concern the Board's failure to implement the earlier recommendation to create a 'better balanced Board since the interests of dental hygienists may conflict with and be outweighed by those of dentists.' Currently each dentist on the Board represents 190 practicing dentists and each hygienist represents 520 practicing hygienists. SB2501, SD1 will increase the number of dental hygienist on the Board from two to three in order to provide a more balanced view of the overall oral healthcare professions. This change will create a ratio approximately of 1 board hygienist to 347 practicing hygienists.

"Balance is important because dentists both oversee and hire dental hygienists, and if one hygienist is unable to make a board meeting this composition will ensure there is still adequate representation of their profession. The hygienists' insight into patients' overall oral health will help make dental policy and practice more robust and thereby provide the patients with safer, better and more practical oral health care. Your Committee feels that the safety and health of the consumer is of the utmost importance.

"We should not let the opportunity to provide better oral care to the patients in this state pass us by. Please join me in supporting SB2501, SD1. Mahalo."

“Madam President, I rise in support of SB451 SD1, Relating to the Public Utilities Commission.

“This measure provides much needed support to the Public Utilities Commission by giving it the freedom and control of being an autonomous agency attached to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs solely for administrative purposes. This new structure will help to ensure that the Commission is able to function effectively and to streamline its decision making process without undue interference. Additionally, the mission of DCCA is more closely associated with that of the PUC making it easier for the Commission to obtain the resources it needs to fulfill its ever-expanding role of policy implementation for and regulation of public utilities.

“The Public Utilities Commission Chair and Commissioners have not received a salary adjustment since 2005. In 2008, Hawai’i and the U.S. Department of Energy launched the Hawai’i Clean Energy Initiative. As a result of this initiative the PUC workload and dockets have significantly increased creating a larger workload than ever before. The Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection believes that a salary adjustment to better reflect the increased workload of the PUC Chair and Commissioners is necessary. This increase will also ensure that the salaries remain competitive with other private and public sector positions.

“Your Committee also included an Executive Officer position. The Commissioners greatly need an Executive Officer

to manage the day-to-day operations so that can they focus on the issues being brought to the Commission.

“These changes will help to increase the effectiveness of the PUC by helping assist the Commission in addressing what is truly important, regulation and policymaking. The Commission needs this support, and I ask my fellow colleagues to vote yes and to pass this measure on to the House for further discussion. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 451, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 2777, S.D. 1:

Senator Nishihara moved that S.B. No. 2777, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“The original form of this bill had 300 people in opposition, including the Department of Agriculture, who says if we’re going to change our relationship with the county, the county should be consulted. One person was in support of this bill, one person who is a farmer and also an attorney.

“If we’re going to change our relationships with the counties and what jurisdictions they have over agricultural lands, I think we should do it carefully and deliberately. I don’t think we should remove the county control over where commercial development happens; that’s what the current version of the bill does. I think it’s legally ambiguous: what is a commercial activity? It can be construed as almost anything.

“It started off as a shady bill; by mistake, it dictated state preemption over county rules. It had a shady process and it resulted in a shady bill. I believe we should hold ourselves to a higher standard that includes public input, clarity, and fair play. And I will note that besides the 300 people plus Department of Agriculture that opposed the original form, there was no public testimony on the final form because there was never an opportunity for public input on its final form. I oppose it based on its content and based on the process that brings it to the floor. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you. I respect the remarks of the prior speaker. I do want to thank the amendments that were made to the bill in the committee; I think it substantially narrows it from the original bill, which raised a lot of concern.

“But in my mind, those amendments are still too broad. The bill does have a defective date, which gives opportunity for further discussion. But I think it is important that we do follow the remarks of the previous speaker, that we’re cautious about how we would change the enforcement language. To leave the bill the way it’s written, without any ability to do some type of regulation on the types of commercial activities that could go on agricultural lands, we may end up with some unintended consequences that none of us here would support. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2777, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Ige, Ihara, Thielen). Noes, 3 (Gabbard, Green, Ruderman).

At 11:36 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:43 a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2608 (S.B. No. 2128, S.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2608 be adopted and S.B. No. 2128, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Galuteria then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 6) to S.B. No. 2128, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 2128, S.D. 1, is amended by amending the effective date from upon approval to July 1, 2050, and to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.”

Senator Galuteria moved that Floor Amendment No. 6 be adopted, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The reason for the amendment is to continue discussion on this issue.”

The motion was to adopt Floor Amendment No. 6 put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Galuteria then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2608 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Espero and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2128, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RETENTION OF BIOLOGICAL EVIDENCE,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

The Clerk then made the following announcement:

“Madam President, we’re going to turn back to page 59, Third Reading of S.B. No. 180, S.D. 2, Relating to Ocean Management.”

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 180, S.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCEAN MANAGEMENT," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

### THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2609 (S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2):

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2609 and S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLAR ENERGY," was deferred until later on the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2612 (S.B. No. 2531, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2612 be adopted and S.B. No. 2531, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Yes, Madam President. I think I'm going to go 'no' on this bill. I was wavering on it. I don't know whether it's a conflict of interest or whether I should recuse myself; there are so many things to choose from here. But the idea of the fall coordinator – I was getting a little woozy.

"I noticed in several bills, we're creating all these new offices and all these new positions, and while falls certainly are serious business and important, establishing yet another government office – the fall coordinator prevention – I don't think is going to work. I don't think the fall coordinator is going to be at every home of every aged person preventing falls, but I do know that it's going to be more costly and more bureaucratic and may give some people a false sense of security, so I will vote 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I appreciate the senator from Hawai'i Kai's comments. I know that currently, falls are by far the leading cause of fatal injuries – 40 percent – and the leading cause of injury-related hospitalizations – 83 percent – and emergency medical services-attended injuries among adults 65 years and older. The direct medical costs have been calculated at \$95 million a year associated with falls, and if we were to actually include the cost of rehabilitation and long-term care, it actually doubles that amount.

"So, by having this coordinator we are hopeful that we can actually impact, on a statewide basis, some of the best practices in terms of encouraging people to build their core strength, to look at the issues related to medications that are causing falls when you have an inappropriate mixture of medicines, et cetera, so we are hopeful that this coordinator position can help in this regard. Thank you."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I want to remind our colleagues that we are involved in a joint majority package that, in essence, addresses the aging population. Fall prevention, colleagues, is critical to the safety and wellbeing of the state's elderly residents; we all know that. It's the fastest growing segment of Hawai'i's population.

"In addition, this particular bill, with regard to fall occurrences, would reduce medical costs and suffering by expediting treatment, minimizing serious long-term

consequences, reducing the extent of injury, and, in some instances, avoiding death. We support the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2612 was adopted and S.B. No. 2531, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2613 (S.B. No. 2496, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2613 be adopted and S.B. No. 2496, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of SB 2496, SD2, Relating to Tobacco Products.

"Tobacco products, such as chewing tobacco and snuff, are currently taxed at a lower rate than cigarettes, yet pose health risks that are just as significant. Smokeless tobacco use causes oral, throat, stomach and pancreatic cancer; gum disease and heart disease. The nicotine the products deliver to users is just as addictive as the nicotine delivered by cigarettes. According to the American Cancer Society, tobacco use is responsible for 30 percent of all cancer deaths and 87 percent of all lung cancer deaths. Each year, Americans pay \$96 billion in tobacco-related healthcare costs. Each day, about 1,300 people in the U.S. die as a result of tobacco use.

"It has been proven that higher costs of tobacco products reduce the rate of smoking by adults and youth, and even prevent youth tobacco use. As price of cigarettes has risen, the price of other tobacco products has not, and smokers, especially teens, may be tempted to purchase the less-expensive tobacco products. According to the CDC's director of the Office on Smoking and Health, 'A large portion of kids who use tobacco are smoking products other than cigarettes...'

"SB 2496, SD2 will impose an excise tax based on a percentage of the wholesale price of a tobacco product, excluding large cigars, sold after January 1, 2015. It also requires subsequent excise tax increases for cigarettes to trigger an automatic excise tax increase on other tobacco products.

"When the prices of tobacco products are on par with that of cigarettes, they are no longer a less-expensive alternatives. SB 2496, SD2 also requires that all tax amounts be deposited into the Hawaii Cancer Research Special Fund beginning December 31, 2014.

"Other tobacco products are as dangerous as cigarettes and negatively impact public health, yet their lower prices make them a more appealing alternative. It is our responsibility to change this. It furthers our public health goals. I ask my colleagues to vote yes and pass this matter to the House for further discussion. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2613 was adopted and S.B. No. 2496, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOBACCO PRODUCTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2618 (S.B. No. 2435, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2618 be adopted and S.B. No. 2435, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I realize it’s just a reallocation of funds within the bill, but you may recall that I voted against the creation of the barrel tax and raised concerns at that time. The legislative auditor followed up with a report that there was no nexus between the barrel tax and the special fund, so I continue to oppose it. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you, Madam Chair. I rise in support, but with reservations. I do support the barrel tax; I think there is a nexus here. And I support *all* the purposes for which the funds are going to go. I just don’t want to prioritize one purpose over another. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2618 was adopted and S.B. No. 2435, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2622 (S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2622 be adopted and S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Madam President, I oppose the bill. We’re raising the permit fees yet again. Even though it’s a blank amount, the original intent was to double or triple the amount. And as we saw during our past New Year holiday, people were forced to buy permits and then there was no supply, and then there was difficulty in trying to get their money back from the permits which had been issued. So, maybe this is a very clever revenue idea; we could also issue bonds and then abolish the bonds at the same time. So, at the present time, I’ll vote ‘no.’”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2622 was adopted and S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREWORKS PERMIT FEES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2624 (S.B. No. 2324, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2624 be adopted and S.B. No. 2324, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Just very briefly: I think we have a societal need to encourage alternatives to fossil fuels; and while I understand the concern that such vehicles aren’t contributing to the roadway maintenance, I believe there’ll be plenty of time to address this if and when we succeed at reaching 1 percent of our cars being electric. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“When we created the incentives for electric vehicles, we also said very clearly that at a certain point, when the technology was mature and there was enough demand, that we would taper off those particular incentives because there’s enough demand in the public for this type of vehicle. We’ve reached that point.

“We also note that electric vehicles are heavier and are not paying into the state highway fund because they’re not paying that particular tax. So, this only imposes \$60 on that vehicle as their way of contributing to the state highway fund for the repair and maintenance of our roads. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2624 was adopted and S.B. No. 2324, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Ruderman, Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2628 (S.B. No. 2351, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2628 be adopted and S.B. No. 2351, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I oppose the bill for several reasons, one of which it is a requirement now and may be in violation of HIPAA requirements. It doesn’t square with the information we were given by the Affordable Care Act; it’s requiring more information, more data. This data has to go to the exchange. The exchange has got enough problems right now; handling additional data is not a positive sign. And the index and the measurement of this information itself, I think, should be between the patient, the parents, and the child, and not more government agencies. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just wanted to correct one of the statements of the previous speaker. The information is not going to the Hawai’i insurance exchange, which is the Hawai’i Health Connector. This is going to the Hawai’i Health Information Exchange to aggregate data so we can see trends and see if there are ways that we can help mitigate childhood obesity. So, I just wanted to correct that for the record; I think it’s a good bill and urge my colleagues to vote ‘yes.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2628 was adopted and S.B. No. 2351, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILDHOOD OBESITY,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2629 (S.B. No. 2383, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2629 be adopted and S.B. No. 2383, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I support the bill with reservations, but I would note that we take more seriously the unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle – with a minimum mandatory term – than we do with the

unauthorized entry into a child, in the State of Hawai'i. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2629 was adopted and S.B. No. 2383, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNAUTHORIZED ENTRY INTO MOTOR VEHICLE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2631 (S.B. No. 2397, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2631 was adopted and S.B. No. 2397, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Green, Ihara, Ruderman, Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2633 (S.B. No. 2970, S.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2633 was adopted and S.B. No. 2970, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST BIOTORK HAWAII, LLC," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2634 (S.B. No. 3008, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2634 be adopted and S.B. No. 3008, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Even though I was one of the original co-sponsors, having gotten additional information, I believe that this measure is ill-advised at this time. I don't believe the company that would benefit from special purpose revenue bonds has a plan that, even though some members in Maui County have endorsed it, is actually in the best interest of all of us in the county.

"I believe if this plan goes forward, it will completely eliminate our recycling efforts and businesses in Hawai'i, which I think is not a really good idea. And one of the provisions in the contract that the county signed would require that if the tonnage is not maintained – if we don't have enough garbage to burn – then the costs go up, and the costs go up precipitously.

"I have some additional remarks that I'd like to have included that outline some of the other objections that I have against this measure, but I ask my colleagues to join me in voting against this measure. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in opposition to SB 3008 SD1 RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST ANAERGIA INC.

"These Special Purpose Revenue Bonds would assist Anaergia Inc. with the development of facilities for renewable non-fossil fuel energy production on the island of Maui. Although this is a noble goal, and we all can agree that we should support programs that enable us to develop non-fossil fuel energy sources, Anaergia's project overall is fatally flawed.

"Their project continues to change with each discussion, and as of current, there is no documented proof that they have met the qualifications for this project as stated in the RFP. This project has been billed as a 'no cost to the county'. Yet, the county will have to pay Anaergia \$65/ton with a minimum tonnage of 126,000/year, which is a roughly \$8.6M in annual costs. If this cost is not the county's who will then be paying it? In the agreement between Anaergia/County there is a 'Put or Pay' clause. Meaning if the county does not produce the required amount of MSW to the Anaergia facility then the county must pay to cover the shortfall. This is definitively a budget risk.

"Many of the Maui refuse businesses will be significantly hurt by Anaergia's business and that will result in loss of tax revenue and jobs of Maui residents. Pacific Biodiesel, Maui Recycling Service, Aloha Recycling Maui Disposal, EKO Compost are all companies that will be crippled by Anaergia's plans. These companies employ MANY of the Maui County's residents.

"The refuse derived fuel products from Anaergia do not appear to have a local market, but there is a market for RDF in Japan with a definite carbon footprint in transportation. And RDF could be considered toxic waste by the EPA, which needs to be processed in very specific ways.

"The entire project is not in conformance with the County of Maui Integrated Solid Waste Management plan, which ultimately means the State Department of Health is not likely to issue permits for the project in its current configuration.

"Above all Anaergia has not been transparent in this process and nowhere are we able to find any information on the details of its experience, if any, in creating, developing or managing a project of this nature.

"If we continue to support this project, we are not supporting the recycling businesses of Maui; we will be destroying them. We cannot support businesses who have not been completely honest and clear and who do not have a successful record in their proposed projects.

"I urge my colleagues to oppose SB3006 SD1. We need to demand honesty, transparency with upholding the expectation of excellence for our county communities."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"First, I'd like to thank my colleagues from Maui who introduced the bill on my behalf when I was absent, and I thank them for that. This bill is to support an entity that was selected on a competitive basis through procurement by the County of Maui to do a waste-to-energy facility out of the Central Maui Landfill. And for that reason, I did agree to have this SPRB introduced, and I would ask my colleagues to allow the County of Maui to go forward in working with this entity that they selected to build a facility that they've entered into contract to build. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2634 was adopted and S.B. No. 3008, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST ANAERGIA INC," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21; Ayes with Reservations (Espero, Green, Ige, Ihara, Kouchi). Noes, 4 (Baker, Kidani, Ruderman, Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2637 (S.B. No. 2853, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Ige, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2637 was adopted and S.B.

No. 2853, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES ADULT FOSTER HOMES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Espero). Noes, 1 (Slom).

The Clerk then made the following announcement:

"Members, we are turning back to page 66 to Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2609 for Third Reading on S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2, Relating to Solar Energy."

The Senate reconvened at 12:09 p.m.

Senator Solomon moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2609 be adopted and S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Galuteria.

Senator Galuteria then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 7) to S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2, section 2, is amended by amending section 205-2(d)(6)(B), Hawaii Revised Statutes, on page 2, line 9, to page 3, line 5, to read as follows:

"(B) Solar energy facilities placed within land with soil classified as overall productivity rating class B or C shall not occupy more than ~~ten~~ thirty per cent of the acreage of the parcel, or twenty acres of land, whichever is lesser~~],~~ or in the alternative, of two or more adjacent parcels having met the applicable county requirements for the joint development or joint lot use of those parcels; provided that:

- (i) A special use permit has been granted for the solar energy facilities pursuant to section 205-6;
- (ii) The area occupied by the solar energy facilities is also made available for compatible agricultural activities at a lease rate that is at least fifty per cent below the fair market rent for comparable properties. For the purposes of this clause, "agricultural activities" means the activities described in paragraphs (1) to (3); and
- (iii) The solar energy facilities shall be decommissioned and removed within twelve months of the conclusion of operation;"

SECTION 2. S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 2, section 3, is amended by amending section 205-4.5(a)(20), Hawaii Revised Statutes, on page 14, line 20, to page 15, line 17, to read as follows:

"(20) Solar energy facilities that do not occupy more than ~~ten~~ thirty per cent of the acreage of the parcel, or twenty acres of land, whichever is lesser~~],~~ ~~provided that this~~, or in the alternative, of two or more adjacent parcels having met the applicable county requirements for the joint development or joint lot use of those parcels; provided that:

- (A) A special use permit has been granted for the solar energy facilities pursuant to section 205-6;
- (B) The area occupied by the solar energy facilities is also made available for compatible agricultural activities at a lease rate that is at least fifty per cent below the fair market rent for comparable properties. For the purposes of this subparagraph, "agricultural activities" means the activities described in paragraphs (1) to (3);
- (C) The solar energy facilities shall be decommissioned and removed within twelve months of the conclusion of the operation; and
- (D) This use shall not be permitted on lands with soil classified by the land study bureau's detailed land classification as overall (master) productivity rating class A; or"

Senator Galuteria moved that Floor Amendment No. 7 be adopted, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Mahalo, Madam President. The floor amendment moves the acreage from 10 percent to 30 percent of the acreage of the parcel for solar energy facilities placed within land with soil classified as overall productivity rating class B or C. The subject matter committee chairs and the second committee have agreed to this amendment, and for further discussion I would defer to the subject matter chairs."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I was on the first committee that heard the bill, the Agriculture Committee, where we had a discussion about whether we should open up our class B-rated lands for industrial solar facilities. And after some robust discussion, we decided that there would be a cap on the amount of any class B lands that could have industrial solar facilities on it – no more than 30 percent of the acreage.

"That bill then went to the Water and Land Committee, and I sat on that committee as we heard that bill. During that hearing, we had further robust discussion in which the proposed developer came forward and asked for a number of changes. I objected to some of them and proposed some alternative amendments – one of which was accepted, one of which was not – and after some discussion, what the committee decided to do was vote to amend S.D. 1 to include a sunset date and to require that the applicant get a special permit, but there was no discussion in that committee about lifting the 30 percent cap on the limit on the amount of the B-class lands that the solar facilities could go on. However, the final language in S.D. 2 included the amendments we discussed, but also eliminated the 30 percent cap.

"The floor amendment that's in front of us puts a 30 percent cap in the initial section of the bill, but then it says in the alternative, in the event a special permit is granted, that 30 percent cap would not apply. That's not what was voted on by the Water and Land Committee on that day. I understand that the three subject matter chairs are agreeing to this amendment as written, but what I'm asking for is that we have a S.D. 2 that reflects the discussion and the vote of the committee that day, because it's disturbing to me that the bill that was produced after our committee hearing did not reflect the discussion or the vote of that committee."

At 12:13 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:16 p.m.

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“There’s different readings of the proposed language, but if the chairs believe that this draft is meeting the intent of the original language of the bill, I’d like to support it. I know when we had the hearing on this bill, I mentioned that former Kaua’i County Councilmember Daryl Kaneshiro is, in fact, already doing what is proposed in the bill on the island of Kaua’i. He has solar panels on his farm lands and is raising sheep in the shadows of his solar panels. With regard to there being a local market for sheep, I am aware of one restaurant on Kaua’i that serves locally grown livestock. Merriman’s in Po’ipū, Kaua’i, makes it a point to purchase locally grown livestock. On their menu, they have what they call the ‘featured burger of the day,’ and whether it’s hamburger, lamb, or other locally raised livestock, it’s served as the ‘featured burger of the day’. So, I really think that there’s great potential for this proposal, and I’m going to support the chairs in the language they’ve submitted. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“You know, the three chairs evidently, despite the indictment of the previous speaker, have chosen to remain silent. In talking to at least one of the chairs, he’s indicated that the amendment before this body is exactly what the three chairs had agreed to. So, I stand in support of the three chairs. Thank you.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 7 was put by the Chair and carried, with Senator Thielen voting “No.”

Senator Galuteria then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2609 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Espero and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLAR ENERGY,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 6, 2014.

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2645 be adopted and S.B. No. 2196, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill reestablishes the development special fund. Thank you.”

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Back in 2010, colleagues, Act 73 was enacted to increase the barrel tax from \$0.05 to \$1.05. The purpose clause of that legislation read, in part, and I quote:

Hawaii is at a crossroads. As the most geographically isolated state in the country, we are dangerously dependent on imports for basic food and energy. We import about 85 percent of our food and 95 percent of our energy. It’s been estimated that Hawaii exported \$8.6 billion for food and oil in 2008, and every dollar exported is a lost opportunity to support and invest in local businesses. Our dependence on imports also exposes residents and businesses to volatile food and energy costs as oil prices fluctuate.

The legislature finds that it is in the best interests of Hawaii’s people to build the capacity we need to become self-sufficient in our energy and food needs and to protect the health and function of our environment. As discussed in the “Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Plan” and the “Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative,” Hawaii has all the necessary assets to significantly improve the state’s energy and food sustainability and independence over the next 20 years if appropriate personnel resources and funding are used wisely. To succeed, the State must ensure that our long-term strategy is well-resourced, coordinated, and focused.

“So, even though the legislation had such high ideals, at the time we were faced with a \$1 billion budget deficit. So in the end, Act 73 took \$0.60 of the \$1.05 in the barrel tax meant for energy and food security and sent it to the general fund. Since then, another \$0.10 has been added to the general fund. Here we are today with a budget surplus; it’s time that we begin shifting additional barrel tax revenue to the original intent: energy and food security. S.B. 2196, S.D. 2 will do that. Colleagues, I ask you for your support.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2645 was adopted and S.B. No. 2196, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2646 (S.B. No. 2222, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2646 be adopted and S.B. No. 2222, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Again, an example of nanny government telling people what they can and cannot do or enjoy involving legal products. The interesting thing about this bill: The continuing war on tobacco has taken a new turn because we’re now attacking

menthol as well as other flavors. It was always discussed that nicotine was the bad boy on the block, but we're not going after nicotine, we're going after menthol and other flavors, again, with a legal product. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of SB 2222, SD2, Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products.

"Documents obtained during litigation against the tobacco industry reveal that tobacco companies have targeted youth using fruit, candy and alcohol flavors in their products. In 2009, the Federal Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act prohibited the manufacture and sale of flavored cigarettes. However, there is no comparable federal prohibition for other flavored tobacco products.

"According to the CDC, a large portion of kids who use tobacco are smoking products other than cigarettes, including cigars and little cigars, which are offered in a variety of flavors. More than 40 percent of middle and high school students who smoke use flavored tobacco products. These products are less expensive than cigarettes and are made with fruit and candy flavors that are banned from cigarettes – like chocolate and strawberry.

"About 90 percent of all smokers begin smoking as teenagers which is more likely to lead to lifelong use. Accordingly, the purpose of this measure is to prohibit the sale, offering for sale, or distribution of any flavored tobacco product, including menthol products, within the state, effective July 1, 2015.

"Each day, more than 2,000 youth and young adults become daily smokers. According to the Surgeon General, if young people remain tobacco-free until age 18, most will never start. I ask my colleagues to vote yes and pass this matter to the House for further discussion. Together, we can give our children a greater chance at healthier, tobacco-free lives. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"While I do appreciate the education given me on emergency appropriations by the good senator from Maui, I'm still voting 'no' because it's not an emergency and because we continue to

pour good money after bad into this failed health system. We did it during the special session. We did it last year. We've done it every year. We don't make them change; they continue to run amok in terms of fiscal responsibility. It's time this legislature puts an end to these appropriations. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2655 was adopted and S.B. No. 2866, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION TO THE HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2662 (S.B. No. 2846, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2662 be adopted and S.B. No. 2846, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"We continue to add more people to government and particularly to health and human services, human services being the biggest expenditure in our state budget. But the interesting thing about this second deputy: We had had a second deputy in this department and the Legislature removed that position back in 1994. We've gotten by since 1994, but now it seems that there is a desire for more bureaucracy and more office personnel. I will not support this. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2662 was adopted and S.B. No. 2846, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ESTABLISHING A SECOND DEPUTY DIRECTOR POSITION FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2668 (S.B. No. 2446, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2668 be adopted and S.B. No. 2446, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"While we all want to honor the late Representative Patsy Mink, I think, more and more, we are imposing, from the legislative standpoint, names on communities and operations within a community. There has been discussion within the Kīhei community and some opposition to the renaming of their school. I think we should, as a standard policy, listen to the people within a community and let them decide who they want to name their buildings after. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"As the senator representing Kīhei, I'm sensitive to the concerns that were raised, but a number of the concerns that



were raised – not wanting this particular name – was because they wanted it to be called Kīhei High School. There already is a Kīhei High School in Kīhei. It is a Department of Education school; it is a charter school. We can only have one high school in an area with the same name.

“In addition, if the Legislature doesn’t act, then it’s the complex area superintendent that makes the determination. This high school in South Maui, in Kīhei, to be named after a woman who was born and raised on Maui, was the first woman to be the president of her student body government, went on to distinguish herself, and really took great pride in making sure that educational opportunities were available for all children, girls as well as boys. I think this is a most fitting name for our new high school. I doubt that we’re going to have many more new high schools. We need to take this opportunity to name our new school for Congresswoman Mink.

“And I note that when the Senate Education Chair held this hearing, we had two sites on Maui that were able to connect to the hearing and make their concerns and their support known, and I appreciate the chair of the Senate Education Committee for taking the time to hear this measure and for allowing our residents to weigh in on it. And I think once people understood that the name that they thought it was going to be – because that’s what we’ve all called it – is not appropriate, that more and more, people have come around and said, ‘Yes, it is appropriate to have the name of our new school after someone who dedicated her life to equality in education – Patsy Takemoto Mink.’ Thank you.”

The only shooting range is the one that was developed by the Kaua’i Police Department for their use in certifying its police officers. For DOCARE officers, sheriffs, as well as other law enforcement personnel not employed by the County of Kaua’i Police Department living on Kaua’i, the State must incur costs involved in having these individuals fly to O’ahu and obtain their certification at firing ranges on O’ahu.

“Having a firing range on Kaua’i that allows hunters and law enforcement officials to use a safe and accessible facility is a very big issue on Kaua’i. Thank you.”

While this may not be a pervasive issue in all of your communities at current, it has definitely impacted many of the neighborhoods in my district for quite some time and is an issue that our office has worked on almost constantly through the years.

“From an 80-year-old woman who has told me that she no longer feels safe in her home that she had hoped to live her life out in, to a father who has said that his daughter has not been able to look out her bedroom window for four years because she looked out one day as a child and saw a man looking back at her, this bill goes far in both abiding by both federal law and constitutional provisions and seeking to support good establishments while providing protections for all in our community. I ask for your support on this legislation.”

We're getting far away from what the bill was supposed to do, and now we're going to apply that \$0.66, or an unspecified amount, per month per prepaid cell phone. At last check, we had a \$16 million balance in the 911 fund, which was raided by the Legislature and used for completely different purposes. We need more oversight on this fund, but more importantly, we need it to end; the purposes have been achieved. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Unlike the previous speaker, the technology changes. There are new demands for making sure that we can capture where people are located if they get into an emergency. One of the reasons that we include these prepaid cell phone cards is because their users need to be safe when they are out on the road, and should a prepaid telephone card user need to use their cell phone for a 911 call, then we need to be able to track it.

"I appreciate that it would be nice to be able to end some of our surcharges, but if we want to keep the technology up-to-date, we want to make sure that 911 cellular technology is available in all places so that people who need to be alerted on their cell phone, need to text in an emergency or be able to make 911 calls when help is needed can do so with their cell phone no matter who their carrier is. We want to make sure that it's available for all. Thank you."

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I'd also like to point out that it was stated that this measure was intended to be revenue-neutral. So, we're not looking at raising more funds, but what's happening is that more people are doing prepaid wireless and not getting on these one-year plans or two-year plans. So, this is certainly a measure that we need to pass in order to maintain and keep our emergency system operable. Thank you."

“Thank you. I know that this is one of two instructional time measures that we’ll be considering today, three total between the House and the Senate. As I have mentioned in committee, moving multiple vehicles simply keeps their diverse approaches alive as we head over towards crossover, and as we all know with legislation, at the end of the day, there will only be one, if any.

“Having spoken to principals in all of our complex areas, this bill addresses many of the concerns they had while maintaining the integrity of Act 167, which passed unanimously in both the House and the Senate back in 2010 following the backlash from Furlough Fridays, to ensure a base minimum of instructional time throughout the system. As evidenced in the informational briefings held jointly by your Senate and House Education subject matter committees, while working to comply with the 990-hour requirements has been difficult for our secondary schools, it has been extremely beneficial and forced them to make positive changes that they were previously unable to do. Principals are talking about how they are working with each other to create unique master schedules that build in prep and collaboration time, allow for students to finally have more options by mandating the ability to earn seven credits versus six, and complies with both Act 167 and the teacher master contract.

“This bill keeps that all-important 915- and 990-hour floor that has provided equity across our schools – critical when you consider the fact that some schools had as much as two months less instructional time as their peers – while removing the mandate for 1,080 hours in 2016. Even the advocates for Act 167 have admitted that additional resources would be required to accomplish the 1,080 requirement, an across-the-board mandate that would put us amongst the top four states in terms of instructional time. While being amongst the top five in the country may be a good thing, we have learned much in recent years about extended learning time and how it can be best applied. If additional resources are to be allocated, I would suggest we consider applying extended learning time similar to how states and jurisdictions like Massachusetts have done: through differentiation on a school-by-school basis for those who feel their students need and would benefit from the additional time.

“While establishing a base of equity – like what we’ve done in the 915- and 990-hour requirement – is important, the data has not shown that simply adding more time across the board will help. In Hawai‘i’s case, going to the 1,080-hour requirement for both elementary and secondary schools will cost an untold amount of additional resources but add only roughly five minutes per class period for our students.

“I appreciate the support and patience that this body has given your Committee on Education over the past few years as we’ve worked on this issue, and I hope we can continue our discussions moving forward. Thank you.”

“Thank you. This bill has many flaws with it. First of all, it is additional and new mandated coverage on health insurance. It requires a 20-year coverage period, and as was brought out in testimony, there is still very active debate in the definition of the brain injuries that were discussed. It was also discussed by the providers that, in fact, they do provide coverage now but the devil is in the details and in the description and the definitions. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2804 was adopted and S.B. No. 1227, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH COVERAGE FOR BRAIN INJURIES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2808 (S.B. No. 2592, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2808 be adopted and S.B. No. 2592, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I am all for community-based treatment and the pilot project for releasing nonviolent offenders into community-based treatment. I think it’s worthwhile, but as many of us have heard, a lot of times the community programs don’t exist. I just want to be cautious because we don’t have, at this point in the bill, an appropriation to ensure that the people released in the pilot projects would have the community-based treatment programs. We wouldn’t be doing the offenders or the communities they’re released into a favor unless we make sure that the appropriations for those treatment programs are included for the pilot project at the end of the session. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2808 was adopted and S.B. No. 2592, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2812 (S.B. No. 2858, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2812 be adopted and S.B. No. 2858, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Madam President, this is yet another bill of padding the departments with additional and superfluous personnel. We have here the establishment of an Environmental Information Management Office, and I think that’s a duplication of what is being done or should be done by existing personnel in the Department of Health. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2812 was adopted and S.B. No. 2858, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN ENVIRONMENTAL INFORMATION MANAGEMENT OFFICE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Espero, Kahele). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2813 (S.B. No. 2609, S.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2813 be adopted and S.B. No. 2609, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. You knew I would stand up for this, didn’t you? Thank you. Well, what can be said? I think it’s all been said in committees and in the press. I’ll just reiterate and summarize a couple of my points.

“This is a political – not an economic – decision to increase the minimum wage. When people from the President on down say, ‘Let’s give workers a raise,’ they’re not giving the workers a raise; the employers are giving workers a raise, and it’s not related in any way to productivity. It will harm job creation as evidenced by the report from the Congressional Budget Office and others.

“But all you have to do is talk to employers and they will tell you. Those employers, some of which are in this room, that have already paid their employees higher than minimum wage – and I’m one of them – that’s fine. That’s not what this is about. This is about forcing a wage not related to productivity or to training on businesses to cover the 2.5 to 2.75 percent of the workers in Hawai’i that are on minimum wage. And I repeat again, people that are on minimum wage, for the vast majority, are not there for very long because it is an entry and training wage. They are trained. They learn the job. They get experience. They have time. They’ve shown what they can do. They move on, and are getting higher pay – in many cases, very dramatically higher pay.

“We had a big debate about tip credit, and while the tip credit was restored in the final version of our bill here, the intent of this body – and probably the majority of the House – is to have no tip credit whatsoever. So, when it goes into conference, there won’t be any surprises in that direction.

“The main thing about this bill is government should not have the right to dictate wages unless it can also guarantee profits and lower costs as well. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2813 was adopted and S.B. No. 2609, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINIMUM WAGE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2817 be adopted and S.B. No. 2663, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you. You know, usually when we consider bills we systematically include all the stakeholders. A funny thing happens when we get to the subject of geothermal: We systematically exclude certain stakeholders, including the only community that has any experience with geothermal development in Hawai’i. This bill purports to restore county permitting control over geothermal permits, but in fact, as our pro-geothermal former Planning Commission Chair Chris Yuen pointed out in testimony, there’s a phrase in here that says, ‘Except to the extent that other federal and state agencies have jurisdiction.’ In other words, it actually does the exact opposite of what it says: it excludes county participation.

“We also had a geothermal health assessment report that was not available to us last year. It was commissioned and embraced by our pro-geothermal mayor; it’s called the Adler Report. It makes a series of recommendations, none of which are included in this bill. Likewise, some of the active community groups involved in this issue suggested some constructive amendments, none of which have been included in this bill.

“I’ll remind my colleagues that last year with a very similar bill, we voted 25 to 0 to exclude mandatory mediation. We have

a statement this year from the mediator last year, Peter Adler, who expresses the inappropriateness of mediation in this kind of plan.

“So, I want to encourage my colleagues to realize that this is not just Puna; this wonderful industry may be coming to an area near you. You’re going to wish you had the rights of other citizens of our state as you go into the permitting process. So, I will vote in support with reservations and hope that the House will correct some of the serious errors with the bill. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2817 was adopted and S.B. No. 2663, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Chun Oakland, Green, Ihara, Ruderman, Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2818 (S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2818 be adopted and S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. Reluctantly, I rise in opposition to this bill. This is the ‘Alicia’s Law’ bill dealing with Internet abuses with children. I absolutely think that there should be severe and swift prosecution. I think also that Hawai‘i continues to suffer from many, many different kinds of crimes on the Internet and elsewhere against children, and that we need to do something about it.

“My opposition comes from the funding. As I discussed in Ways and Means, the original bill was simply a funding mechanism charging every convicted person a \$10 fee, which was then going into a new special fund. Number one, I don’t think there’s a nexus between the special fund, the collection, and what the purpose is for. It was good that the Ways and Means chairman suggested an amendment. I had called for a direct appropriation if we think this is a problem, and we do, and if we want a solution, and we do. If we want to hire more people in the attorney general’s office to investigate, then we should, and we should directly appropriate it.

“The problem is this version of this bill has both the special fund and the \$10 charge and a direct appropriation. What we need is a direct appropriation to send a very clear and convincing message that Internet sexual abuses against our children must end. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2818 was adopted and S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2819 (S.B. No. 2768, S.D. 2):

Senator Nishihara requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Nishihara’s remarks read as follows:

“Our communities have been torn by the emotional and polarizing debate over the regulation of agriculture and on the efficacy of genetically engineered or genetically modified crops.

“On one side, we have those who believe the introduction and open planting of GMO crops has a harmful effect on the environment and health of our people.

“On the other, we have farmers, ranchers, the scientific community, and a broad range of support from throughout the food industry who ardently disagree with these claims against GMO crops.

“So, what do we do? As responsible lawmakers, we must base our policy decisions on facts and truths that are rooted in sound science.

“This legislature believes that an assessment done by a fair and balanced group of individuals representing the scientific community, along with representatives of the organic and conventional farming community and others, can work through the different perspectives and arrive at reasonable outcomes that will enlighten the debates about GMOs.

“I ask the consideration of my colleagues to vote in support of this modest attempt to educate the public on the issue of how we should foster and nourish the industry that nourishes us.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2820 was adopted and S.B. No. 2454, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Gabbard, Green, Ihara, Shimabukuro). Noes, 1 (Ruderman).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2822 (S.B. No. 3041, S.D. 2):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2822 be adopted and S.B. No. 3041, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. Again, reluctantly, I oppose this bill. I say ‘reluctantly’ because any time we can lower taxes, I think it’s a good thing, particularly on our businesses. The problem is that we are picking winners and losers. We are picking certain local mini pubs to give a tax break to while charging among the highest beer taxes in the nation to other imported beverages that come into the state. We should have an equal and fair and level tax proposal for all businesses, and those taxes should be reduced. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Unfortunately, while I support the intent to provide a tax credit for the local microbreweries, this bill would provide a tax break for any microbrewery from any state, according to



DOTAX, because of our federal fair trade act laws. So, because of that, I need to vote in opposition.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2822 was adopted and S.B. No. 3041, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR TAX LAW,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz). Noes, 2 (Kidani, Slom).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2826 (S.B. No. 2804, S.D. 2):

"Madam President, I rise in support of SB 2495, SD3, Relating to Electronic Smoking Devices.

"E-cigarettes are battery-powered devices, often resembling cigarettes, designed to deliver nicotine or other substances in the form of vapor smoke that is breathed in and then exhaled. Electronic cigarettes have been on the U.S. market since 2007. Since 2008, sales of e-cigarettes in the U.S. have doubled each year, with sales in 2013 estimated to reach \$1,700,000,000.

"Electronic cigarettes are manufactured without regulatory oversight or quality control. Most come from China, which has a poor record for product purity. They are promoted, advertised and sold without health warnings or legal age restrictions.

"More and more of our youth are trying and using e-cigarettes.

- The percentage of high school students who reported ever using e-cigarettes rose from 4.7 percent in 2011 to 10 percent in 2012.

- Additionally, 1 in 5 middle school students who reported ever using e-cigarettes say they have never tried tobacco products.

"CDC Director Tom Frieden said: 'Nicotine is a highly addictive drug. Many teens who start with e-cigarettes may be condemned to struggling with a lifelong addiction to nicotine and conventional cigarettes.'

"Repeated doses of nicotine alter the brain's activities, reducing receptors that carry dopamine – the chemical that makes us feel good – to brain cells. Making the smoker dependent on nicotine to maintain normal levels of dopamine in the brain. There's an even greater concern about the effects of nicotine on adolescent brain development.

"SB2495, SD3 will include electronic smoking devices within the definition of 'tobacco products,' subjecting them to the same licensing permitting requirements as cigarettes and other tobacco products.

"This act will establish a currently unspecified excise tax percentage on electronic smoking devices. It will also amend Hawaii's anti-smoking statute to prohibit the use of e-cigarettes in public places and places of employment.

"Our current lack of regulation only promotes the idea that e-cigarettes are safe; this notion is false. By not regulating e-cigarettes, we continue to do a disservice to the public and especially our youth. I ask my fellow colleagues to vote yes and pass this measure to the House for further discussion."

## TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY

**Monday, March 10, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Kouchi welcomed a delegation from Vietnam who were attending the Asia Pacific Clean Energy Summit in Hawai'i, including Dr. Nguyen Huu Ninh, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for climate research with Vice President Al Gore; Ms. Nguyen Thi Hai; Ms. Dang Kim Ngoc; Mr. Nguyen Hong Quang; and Mr. Nguyen Gia Lap.

Senator Chun Oakland introduced participants in this year's March for Meals, sponsored by Lanakila Pacific's Meals on Wheels Program, Hawai'i's largest and only island-wide meal service for seniors. Senator Chun Oakland recognized Marian Tsuji, CEO of Lanakila Pacific; Uncle Joe Tassill and Auntie June Toguchi-Tassill; as well as volunteers of the Meals on Wheels program.

Senator Kahele honored and recognized the *Hōkūle'a* and her crew for bringing the spirit of Hawai'i and traditional Hawaiian culture around the world, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Today, we are proud to have with us representatives from our Polynesian voyaging canoes, the *Hōkūle'a* and the *Hikianalia*, as they prepare to continue with the 'Mālama Honua' worldwide voyage.

"Last May, the worldwide voyage began with a trip through the Hawaiian Islands, and today they embark on their international journey. Once the *Hōkūle'a* is put in the water today, she won't touch dry land here in Hawai'i for the next four years as she carries her crewmembers over 47,000 miles to 26 countries and 85 ports. While all the *Hōkūle'a* voyages spread the spirit of aloha, the Mālama Honua worldwide voyage is not just a goodwill mission: 'Mālama Honua' means 'care for the Earth,' and it defines the *Hōkūle'a*'s and *Hikianalia*'s mission. Over the next four years, crewmembers will raise awareness of the issues confronting Hawai'i's shorelines, reefs, and deep waters while teaching and learning traditional indigenous practices of natural resource management with other members of our Pacific Ocean community. We salute their efforts to bring together indigenous cultures and to cultivate enduring connections based on environmental stewardship.

"Like any big endeavor, the worldwide voyage needs a big team. We only have a handful of representatives with us today, but there are hundreds of others who stand beside them in spirit and are integral to the success of this journey. We honor you and the hundreds of people who couldn't be here today, but without whom this mission would not be possible."

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President and colleague from Moku O Keawe. Colleagues, as proud as I am to be a crewmember here in the State Senate, I'm equally honored to have sailed on *Hōkūle'a* as a crewmember in the 1992 No Nā Mamo voyage for education. I served on the legs between Tahiti, Mo'orea, Huahine, Ra'iātea, Bora Bora, and then headed to the Cook Islands of Ma'uke, Atiu, Aitutaki, and Rarotonga. So, this presentation here today brings back a flood of memories.

"On that particular voyage, as well, back to Hawai'i, the crew of the canoe contacted the crew of the space shuttle

*Columbia* flying overhead. Space shuttle crewmember Lacy Veach spoke with the children of Hawai'i and sail master Nainoa Thompson, and I had the extraordinary honor of facilitating that discussion. It was extraordinary, as are the sailors of *Hōkūle'a*.

"Over the past 35 years, Nainoa Thompson, my good friend here, has inspired and led a revival of the traditional arts associated with long-distance ocean voyaging in Hawai'i. Would you please rise? I know it's too steady here; you need kind of an unsteady ground on *Hōkūle'a*. He's led the revival: he's the first Hawaiian to practice the art of wayfinding on long-distance ocean voyages since such voyaging ended in Hawai'i around the fourteenth century. He studied traditional, non-instrumental navigation under his mentor, Mau Piailug of Satawal – that's in Yap. Nainoa now teaches the system of wayfinding, or non-instrument navigation, that he developed by synthesizing traditional principles of ancient Pacific navigation and modern science. Devoted to education, Nainoa continues to develop and implement a multi-discipline, culturally relevant program focused on teaching children of Hawai'i the values of Polynesian voyaging. The program emphasizes both traditional and modern scientific knowledge of the environment and stresses the importance of eco-cultural principles of conservation.

"Mr. Thompson is a graduate of Punahou and the University of Hawai'i – but we won't hold that against you, Punahou, we won't hold that against him. He's a licensed commercial pilot, a boat pilot, and certified advanced diver. He's received numerous community awards, including the Unsung Hero of Compassion awarded to him in 2001 by His Holiness, the Dalai Lama. He has received the Native Hawaiian Education Association's Manomano Ka 'Ike Educator of the Year Award and he currently serves as a member of the Ocean Elders and as president of the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

"In addition to Nainoa, I would also like to introduce CEO of the Polynesian Voyaging Society; we know of him as the former administrator of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Clyde Namuo."

Senator Solomon rose to present the following remarks:

"Mahalo nui. Aloha. I just want to say, on behalf of Senator Clayton Hee and myself, we've been involved with the *Hōkūle'a* since the late seventies, and it's a wonderful day for us to be standing and see you embark on this very – I want to use the word 'memorialized' – memorialized event. Mahalo.

"It gives me great pleasure to introduce Jenna Ishii. Jenna was raised in Hawai'i and graduated from the University of California in San Diego with a degree in communications. She spent a year abroad teaching English in Okinawa, Japan with the Japan Exchange and Teaching Program. In 2007, the *Hōkūle'a* voyaged from Hawai'i to Japan and inspired her to return home and reconnect with her community.

"Since 2008, she has been training as a crewmember and is now the education coordinator for the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Her passion is to inspire the next generation of youth in Hawai'i to become active and engaged leaders of their island communities. It gives me great pleasure to introduce Ms. Ishii to this honorable body. Mahalo."

Senator English rose to present the following remarks:

"Madam President, good morning, members of the Senate. Before I introduce Lehua Kamalu, I'd just like to remind everyone about the symbology of this particular chamber: the blue is of the oceans; this tapestry is showing the canoes that

came from Kahiki; and of course, the chandelier, which is a reflection of the moon. So, all of these are part of our history and our heritage of voyaging across great lands to find Hawai'i.

"Members, today I'm very pleased to introduce Lehua Kamalu. Lehua recently graduated from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa with a degree in mechanical engineering. She has been serving as the voyaging assistant at the Polynesian Voyaging Society, where she provides a vital support role planning the logistics for *Hōkūle'a's* worldwide voyage. This integral role includes crew training, vessel preparation, sail planning, and facilitating various special projects and connections with the worldwide voyage for *Hōkūle'a* and the newly constructed *Hikianalia*. Without Lehua's dedication to her tasks, these historical voyages would not be possible."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Aloha. Mahalo, Madam President and honorable colleagues. Our fourth honoree is Marisa Hayase. Marisa is communications coordinator for the worldwide voyage. She has worked with human rights, education, health, and community development organizations in the United States, South America, Mexico, Japan, and Europe. Marisa lives in Kailua with her husband, son, and daughter. She is a graduate of Williams College and received a master's degree in public policy from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government."

Senator Hee rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Today is a terrific day for those of us who have been close to this symbol of Hawai'i and of being Hawaiian, and it's so wonderful to hear surnames that are not Hawaiian that we honor today, and that's the beauty of this day. This canoe was made possible by others that are not too often mentioned anymore; they include Senator Dan Inouye. When I was a member of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, by law, the chairman of OHA is chairman of the Native Hawaiian Culture and Arts Program administered under the Department of the Interior. The individual who made the funding possible was Nainoa's father, Pinky. Pinky sat on NHCAP with me, and that's how I first got to know Nainoa. NHCAP funding was only made possible because of one person who is no longer with us, and that's Senator Inouye. So, when I see the *Hōkūle'a*, I think of those who have come before us, who made things possible for us, and it's such a wonderful thing to see the next generation of navigators and sailors. And I applaud Nainoa for seeing the wisdom of passing the responsibility and kuleana on to the next generation.

"It gives me great pleasure to honor one who is of my generation. He is surfing royalty, like my colleague to my immediate left. He was a pro competitor. He's a Polynesian voyager. He's a Waimea big wave waterman, and he is all Hawaiian. He cut his hair recently, so I didn't recognize him. He looks so much younger. I would like to introduce Clyde Aikau.

"Clyde's brother Eddie is often known because of his relationship with *Hōkūle'a*; Clyde's relationship is no less than his brother's. He spent many years pulling surfers and tourists out of the storm surf at Waimea as a lifeguard, just like his brother. He's a regular footer and was named a Waikīkī Surfing Legend by the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation. He was on *Hōkūle'a* on the 1995 journey and continues along with so many others. I recently saw Buffalo Keaulana at Mike Wilson's confirmation, and it's very difficult, when you see these icons, to separate them from the ocean and to separate them from all that they symbolized by this voyaging canoe.

"This voyaging canoe, like the 'ōlelo makuahine, are living testaments that Hawaiians are here, we were here before, and we'll be here tomorrow. Thank you for allowing me to honor Clyde Aikau. Mahalo."

Senator Slom rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. If I may, I just wanted to add a few words in support of the crew. The *Hōkūle'a* makes us all proud; it has nothing to do with partisanship in any way. I've been privileged to have seen and touched the *Hōkūle'a* many times during the 1970s. It was most recently in Hawai'i Kai to visit with us. We are all proud of the things that you have accomplished, and we'll be even prouder with things that you will accomplish. You truly are outstanding for all the people of Hawai'i, and I wanted to add my thanks. Aloha."

Senator Kahele rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I would like to remind our colleagues that immediately following our floor session, there will be a meet and greet with our honorees from the *Hōkūle'a* in the lieutenant governor's ceremonial room, and I hope all of you can join us. Thank you very much."

At 11:59 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

**ORDER OF THE DAY****AGREE/DISAGREE****MATTER DEFERRED FROM  
FRIDAY, MARCH 7, 2014**

S.B. No. 60, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate disagreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 60, S.D. 1, and requested a conference on the subject matter thereof.

At this time, Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you. The Judiciary and Labor Committee recently held a confirmation hearing on the governor’s nominee to be Associate Justice of the Hawai’i Supreme Court, Mike Wilson. During the hearing, it was painfully evident that the Hawaii State Bar Association would not disclose the reasons that they found the nominee unqualified, despite the fact that, as an affiliate of the American Bar Association, the ABA, when finding reason to find a candidate unqualified for the federal bench in fact discloses the reasons why the ABA has found the candidate to be unqualified.

“Well, as it turns out, an article dated January 18, 2011, in the *Star-Advertiser* begins like this: ‘In the wake of the controversy over its negative rating of chief justice nominee Katherine Leonard, the Hawaii State Bar Association has amended its rules to allow for the disclosure of the reasons for its “qualified” or “unqualified” findings for judicial nominees.’ The article goes on to say that, ‘After a review of the responses,’ this from the lawyers who criticized the bar, just as they are doing so now with this particular proceeding, ‘the Hawaii State Bar Association board of directors changed the policy to allow the bar association president’ – that would be Greg Markham – ‘with board approval, to disclose the reasons, Jones said.’ Jones being Hugh Jones, who was the president at the time. Louise Ing, who was the president-elect at the time, said it might not be necessary for the board to disclose reasons for all nominees, but thinks the need might arise for an ‘unqualified’ vote for a nomination that has drawn mixed feedback or negative publicity.

“I raise this point only because this particular proceeding has gone through several messages to the committee and, in particular, myself as chair, most of whom, if anyone watched the closed circuit TV, were from lawyers who were very upset – not so much, I suppose, at the ‘unqualified’ finding, but because of the lack of candor and disclosure, notwithstanding the fact that, in fact, the bar has changed and amended its policies. I have asked the bar to provide the policy, but thus far have not received it.

“I will speak to the committee, but my inclination is to call another hearing and have the bar president explain to the committee, in light of their policy that changed following the hearing on Kate Leonard, how they can continue to hide behind the cloak of anonymity.

“One last thought on this is that the committee has recommended to the full Senate to consent and we’ll – unless something changes, and it may change, but unless something changes – we’ll try to get a vote on the floor by the twenty-eighth day so that we won’t get into some counting discussion, as has happened on the Senate floor in the past. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I’m also rising on a point of personal privilege and I would like to support the remarks of the previous speaker. I felt very uncomfortable, as being part of the committee, because some of those, I felt, whether it be rumor, innuendo, but they had to do with issues of sexual harassment. And I had asked the individual that was testifying on behalf of the board as to, in terms of their criteria, if they had some kind of weighted formula, as to how they decided, and unfortunately, we were never given a straight answer.

“I felt, as a female legislator and a leader, I have always taken sexual harassment in a very serious way. I expressed my sentiments then as I will now: it’s because in most circumstances – not always, but in most circumstances, Madam President – females are the victims, and females feel very intimidated simply because, it’s unfortunate, but we still live in a society where males dominate most of the leadership positions in our society, and they’re fearful of any kind of reprisal.

“And I just want to bring this to your attention, Madam President, that we had dealt with those issues with the University of Hawai’i, and this was when President Simone was the president. And the University of Hawai’i had an affirmative action program, but unfortunately never adopted a sexual harassment procedure as to how women or men could bring forth these complaints, as to whether or not professors are given any kinds of classes to remind them of their duty in terms of any kind of situation that may happen with female students under their guidance. I had discussed this matter with the chairman of the Higher Education Committee, and all of this manifestation was really brought forth by your Judiciary Committee during this hearing.

“So, likewise, I want to support the chairman’s recommendation. I feel very strongly, although I was dismissed – well, I wouldn’t use the word ‘dismissed,’ but challenged – by the person representing the board as to whether or not the Supreme Court, whoever’s being nominated for that position, I feel very strongly that they have a higher standard simply because, Madam President, as we all know, many of the issues dealing with women’s rights have not been settled in the lower courts; they’ve been settled in the higher courts. And for me, I feel as a woman that this is of particular interest for us. We owe it to our daughters. We owe it to the future of this state, so that women can really rise to a higher level and a higher calling. You know, we as females in this body have fought these issues from day one that we entered this arena, and unfortunately, many of our fellow women are still in that predicament and still fighting for those same kinds of, what I would call, equality and justice, and this is what’s driving me to support the recommendation of the Judiciary chairman. Thank you very much.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I want to thank the prior speaker for her comments about supporting women and recognizing the challenges that many women face. I think for those of us who have made it to the Senate, we’re at a point in our careers and in our lives where we, maybe, don’t have to be as fearful of reprisals as other women in society.

“I support the Judiciary chair’s drive to bring the bar association back to the table, because there are indeed some aspects of their reviews that are troubling. My understanding is that the comments that they received from members of the bar were not anonymous. They knew the identities of the people who were making the comments, but they were promised confidentiality. Because of the nature of the topic at hand and because of the fear of reprisals that some people may have, perhaps we may need to have some of those discussions in camera or in an executive session in order to be able to preserve

the confidentiality. But I agree it's troubling on many levels and would like to support this effort. Mahalo."

## TWENTY-NINTH DAY

**Tuesday, March 11, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Kahele introduced Daniel Caluya, retired Master Sergeant and principal of Nā Wai Ola Public Charter School in Mountain View on Hawai'i Island.

Senator Chun Oakland recognized the following current commissioners and supporters of the Commission on the Status of Women who were present in the gallery: Margaret Masunaga, former State Representative Marilyn Lee, Sally Little, Honolulu County Committee Chair Kat Brady, Carol Philips, Marsha Joyner, Lisa Ellen Smith, Carmille Lim, Amy Monk, Judy Kern, Elena Cabatu, and Joan Husted.

Senator Slom introduced local business and education specialists Debra Martin and Kirk Beauvais, and their guests, Ihor Kovalskiy and Serhiy Vedernikov, who were visiting from Ukraine to learn about Hawai'i's government and business climate.

Senator Tokuda noted that the Capitol was bustling with parents, tūtū, and keiki who were present to talk about early learning at the Family-Child Interactive Learning Rally that morning, and recognized representatives from INPEACE, Keiki O Ka 'Āina, Partners In Development Foundation, and Keiki Steps, as well as Danny Goya and his wife, Jamie.

Senator Baker commended and congratulated the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women on its fiftieth anniversary, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. On behalf of you and all of the women in the Senate who are part of the Women's Legislative Caucus, I rise to introduce some very special women we have on the floor with us as we recognize and celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women.

"The Commission on the Status of Women, for those of you who may not know, was established by Executive Order of Governor John Burns back in 1964. So, for 50 years, the commission has been an invaluable resource in raising awareness and advancing equality for Hawaii's women and girls. Over the years, the commission has accrued quite an impressive record of advocacy, including their strong support to help with the passage of Title IX, the 1972 Education Amendments now known as the Patsy T. Mink Educational Opportunity Act; their advocacy on behalf of affirmative action in employment; inclusion of pregnancy as a temporary disability insurance benefit; rights for victims of domestic violence; and of course, our landmark final passage of the Compassionate Care for Sex Assault Victims Act in Hawaii's hospital emergency rooms.

"The commission, throughout their work, has encouraged dialogue and the establishing of task forces and committees to really look at the changing role of Hawaii's women in the workplace and at home, the condition of women and girls in our justice system, and in a variety of educational settings. Their efforts have truly addressed the status of women and girls across the lifespan and across all aspects of their lives in Hawai'i and in society.

"I'm so proud to acknowledge some of the fine women on the floor today; we have some, of course, wonderful women in the gallery that Senator Chun Oakland recognized. And let me start with a woman from Maui, who just happens to be the chair of the current Commission on the Status of Women.

"Leslie Wilkins is an experienced advocate for women, workplace diversity, and equity issues. I am proud to say that she's a colleague from Maui. She's the current vice president of the Maui Economic Development Board and founder and director of the Women in Technology Project, and has really done a lot to encourage young girls to think about science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) degrees and really help ensure that we have appropriate representation of women in the STEM pipeline.

"In the past, she's been honored as the 2001 Small Business Administration Women in Business Advocate for Hawai'i and region X, the 2013 Small Business Administration Hawai'i Veterans Small Business Champion, and in 2010, was honored by the County of Maui with a Woman of Achievement Award.

"Leslie previously served two terms on the State Commission on the Status of Women, where she was commission chair from 1996 to 2003; and because she's such a strong advocate for women, she re-upped and has been appointed to the commission and is the current chair. It is my pleasure to introduce Leslie Wilkins; colleagues, if you could give a round of applause, please."

Senator Tokuda rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you. It has been my pleasure to learn from, and even be scolded by, from time to time, the amazing Faye Kennedy over the past 20-plus years. Faye, a retired social worker from New York, is a longtime advocate for women and minority rights in our community. Influential in the institution of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day in Hawai'i in the late 1980s, she went on to serve on the Hawai'i Advisory Committee to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission from 1990 to 2007, the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women from 1993 to 1995, and the Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission from 1995 to 2003. She has also spent several years as board member of the ACLU, vice president of the Honolulu NAACP, president of the Hawaii Women's Political Caucus, and founder and co-chair of the Hawaii Friends of Civil Rights – we could go on and on, talking about her accomplishments.

"Ms. Kennedy currently sits on the Honolulu County Committee on the Status of Women, and has been honored with the Making of the King Holiday Award in 1991 and the YWCA Leader Luncheon Award in 2010 – truly a role model for many young women, past and present. Thank you, Faye, and let's acknowledge her accomplishments today."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you. It is my pleasure to acknowledge my friend, and a friend to all women, Allicyn Tasaka. Allicyn currently serves as director of operations within the Office of the Governor. She has a long record with the Hawai'i State Commission; she served as commissioner from 1993 to 1996, chairperson from 1994 to 1996, and executive director from 1998 through 2004. She was elected to serve as national director on the National Association of Commissions for Women from 2000 through 2002, where she co-chaired the Hawaii Family Economic Self-Sufficiency Standard Advisory Committee. The committee assisted in the publication of a self-sufficiency study for Hawai'i that serves as a benchmark on the status of women in Hawai'i. Thank you so much, Allicyn."

Senator Solomon rose to present the following remarks:

“Mahalo. It gives me pleasure to introduce Pamela Ferguson-Brey – names in Hawai‘i that ring a bell for many of us – an accomplished lawyer in our community and a champion of children and crime victims. She currently serves as the executive director for Hawai‘i’s Crime Victim Compensation Commission and has served as executive director of the Commission on the Status of Women, deputy prosecuting attorney for the City and County of Honolulu, and deputy attorney general representing the Department of Human Services in child abuse and neglect cases.

“She is also the recipient of many awards for her community-oriented work, including the 1994 Hawai‘i Woman Lawyer of the Year, awarded in part for her efforts to establish Hawai‘i’s Missing Child Center; the Outstanding Achievement Award from the National Association of Commissions for Women for her role in creating the first women’s health month; and the 2013 Crime Victims’ Financial Restoration Award from U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder. How about a big mahalo to Pamela Ferguson-Brey, mahalo nui.”

Senator Thielen rose to present the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. Before I introduce my person, I would like to say a big mahalo to all of the trailblazing women up in the chambers today with us. I’m so happy that you could join us today and thank you for all that you have done.

“Cathy Betts has been the executive director of the Hawai‘i State Commission on the Status of Women since 2011. Cathy has extensive experience in advocacy on women’s issues and has worked in the fields of family law, violence against women, child abuse, and Title IX. During her work at the Commission, she has successfully initiated legislative efforts for women and girls, including the passage of House Bill 411, which ensures compassionate care for sexual assault victims in Hawai‘i’s emergency rooms. And Cathy, as a mother of two daughters, I want to thank you very much for your efforts in that area.

“She’s also been successful in increasing legislative support for workplace protections for breastfeeding women and increased rights for Hawai‘i’s domestic workers. So, can we please honor Catherine Betts?”

Senator Chun Oakland rose to recognize Judge Simms and Nanci Kreidman who were present in the gallery.

## Wednesday, March 12, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard honored and commended the Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President and colleagues, please welcome the board of directors and officers of the Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation. Kalaeloa has been my home for the past 10 years, and it means 'the distant or long point.' And to give you a little history, it was a resting place for ali'i that provided refreshing, cool water in the sinkholes along the ancient trails between Waikiki and Wai'anae. In 1877, James Campbell purchased 41,000 acres west of Pearl Harbor. Later, the Kalaeloa area became the Marine Corps Air Station Ewa and then Naval Air Station Barbers Point. In 1999, Naval Air Station Barbers Point closed and in 2002, the State Legislature transferred redevelopment responsibilities for the area to the Hawai'i Community Development Authority.

"Kalaeloa was envisioned as a wahi ho'okela (center of excellence) where Hawai'i's people would come together to share knowledge, develop expertise, and advance themselves while remaining respectful of past and place. The Ahahui Siwila Hawai'i O Kapolei (Kapolei Hawaiian Civic Club) worked in partnership with HCDA to identify, preserve, and protect Native Hawaiian historical sites, native plants, and fauna in Kalaeloa. This process led to the discovery of a parcel of roughly 77 acres abundant with rare historical sites. This area was named the Kalaeloa Heritage Park.

"The Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that was created to lead the stewardship of the Kalaeloa Heritage Park. Starting off is President and Board Member Melissa Lyman, next is Vice President and Board Member Eric Matanane, Secretary/Treasurer and Board Member Valerie Kane, Board Member Shad Kane, Board Member Dan Lyman, and also Board Member Lance Holden. Please give them your applause. Mahalo.

"Colleagues, the Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation has forged partnerships with over 50 community organizations, including schools and businesses, since its inception four years ago. KHLF members and volunteers have logged almost 13,000 volunteer hours and, along with its partners, cleared about 2.5 acres of overgrown kiawe bush to reveal a cluster of significant archaeological sites, which include sinkholes, habitation structures, a religious altar, and a trail that is being used as an educational site. The goal of Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation is to build a multi-purpose educational community and visitor center, where the mo'olelo of Kalaeloa can be shared, where cultural practitioners can display their art, and where the community can embrace their heritage. And so we honor and commend the Kalaeloa Heritage and Legacy Foundation today, and we say a big mahalo to all the organizations and individuals who have dedicated themselves to preserving this cultural treasure and making the vision of Kalaeloa as a wahi ho'okela become reality.

"And on a personal note, as an 'ignorant' Samoan who is learning daily about the beauty and depth of the culture from

my northern cousins, I would say it's groups like KHLF and others that are helping us all to appreciate the beauty of our island paradise.

"Also with us today, we have in the gallery some volunteers: Charles Rodrigues, John Kaaha Jury, Clayton Cabebe, Darwynne Moki Matthews, and Ron Shaedel. And also from HCDA, we have Executive Director Anthony Ching, Outreach Compliance Manager Lindsey Doi, Program Specialist Shelby Hoota, Program Specialist Pearlyn Fukuba, and Kalaeloa Director of Planning and Permitting Tesha Malama. Mahalo."

Senator Galuteria rose to note that he had sailed with Clayton Cabebe's brother, Clement "Tiger" Espere, on the *Höküle'a* from the Society Islands to the Cook Islands in 1992.

At this time, Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. Colleagues, this morning's *Star-Advertiser* has an op-ed by a lawyer named Barry Sullivan, and he begins by saying – this is in relationship to the confirmation of Michael Wilson – he says, 'One of my law partners sits on the Judicial Selection Commission, which submitted Circuit Judge Michael Wilson as qualified for the nomination. Another sits on the board of directors of the Hawai'i State Bar, which thereafter voted Wilson "unqualified."'

"What this guy doesn't say – I mean, it's really a sad commentary on lawyers, but it's not unexpected and it's not surprising – what this guy doesn't say is his partner who sits on JSC, Jim Bickerton, a well-known lawyer, was voted to sit as a member of the JSC by the entire bar association. What he doesn't say is his other partner – Nadine Ando, wife of Bill Meheula – sits on the bar association. She led – she led – the character assassination on the nominee, and I've kept this quiet and only to myself because there seemed to be no redeeming factor in starting to name names. But when a lawyer like this comes out and presents himself as if he's some kind of beacon or arbiter of fairness, he needs to be transparent in his disclosure.

"Nadine Ando led the character assassination without principled due process. I have no problem if people want to take any nominee down, but to ask the nominee, as was testified by the nominee, 'Have you ever been arrested?' without giving dates, names, places, or time, and then of the nominee ask the question, 'Then why would somebody say that, if it wasn't true?' 'Have you ever been publicly intoxicated?' and without giving names, dates, and places, being asked, 'Then why would someone say that, if it wasn't true?' 'Have you ever engaged in sexual harassment?' without giving dates, names, or time, and then being asked, 'Then why would they say it, if it wasn't true?'

"You know, this thing is very unfortunate. I think – well, I don't think, I know – those of you who have spent any time with me as a member of the Senate know full well that I take these confirmations very seriously, and I'm sure you do, too. We're going to send to the clerk on Friday the committee report. Today's Wednesday; by our count, Monday is the twenty-ninth day and Tuesday is the thirtieth day, and I don't think the Senate wants to engage in hours and minutes on the thirtieth day.

"If anybody wants to name names, time, and places, I wish they would do so instead of casting more questions on a nominee that, as far as we have been able to find, meets the qualifications to sit as a member of the Supreme Court. There may be those who feel he's not the most qualified; well, I'm not sure if that's an accurate or inaccurate statement because, indeed, he may not be. But no one has come forward, other than to cast innuendo and aspersions on an individual who interviewed and was found to be unqualified by the association of which he is a member. And to have some lawyer named Barry A. Sullivan write an op-ed as if he doesn't know speaks very poorly of not only Mr. Sullivan, but the bar association. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you very much, Madam President. On a point of personal privilege, and would the previous speaker please yield to a question?"

Senator Hee responded that he would yield to the question.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Thank you very much, Madam President, I'd like to ask the speaker: Yesterday, he issued a challenge to the bar to reappear in front of the Judiciary Committee so that we, in fact, could verify, and the fact is that he brought some kind of documentation to say that in 2011, if I recall, that the bar had agreed to disclose. I'm asking, Madam President, if, in fact, that's going to happen before Friday. Thank you."

Senator Hee responded as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I'm glad the previous speaker asked the question. Shortly after the floor remarks – I can't remember what day it was, I think it was Monday – I received an email, and I have it here, from the executive director of the Hawaii State Bar Association. And the email is totally in line with my comments on Mr. Sullivan. The email said, from Pat Mau-Shimizu, that they were going to change the policy, but in fact, despite the article written by Ken Kobayashi, they never did. And that's why they still hide behind the cloak of anonymity."

"But I'll tell you what I will do. From now on, I will ask the nominee, 'Who said what to you?' so the nominee will then name these people. I thought about doing it at the public hearing, but I thought we should take the high road. It wasn't until this op-ed came from Mr. Sullivan that I thought, 'Well, maybe we should take all roads.' Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Slom rose to commend the chair of the Committee on Judiciary and Labor for his "all roads" policy, and suggested he read a related article by Bob Jones in *MidWeek*.

Senator Slom then invited the members to a live broadcast that would be occurring the following day at 1:00 p.m. in Conference Room 414 on the Jones Act and seeking a congressional exemption to the U.S. shipbuilding requirement. Senator Slom noted that there was bipartisan support in the Senate and House of Representatives, and that elected officials in Guam, Puerto Rico, and Alaska would be participating in the discussion as well.

Senator Ige rose to request that the members sign a congratulatory certificate for former Governor Ariyoshi's eighty-eighth birthday.

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. Yesterday, the Council on Revenues met, and some of you may have heard the results; many may not have.

And for the record, the Council on Revenues reduced its revenue estimates for Fiscal Year 2014 from 3.3 percent revenue gain to 0 percent, and the impact of that is a net loss of revenues estimated at \$180 million. You know that the Senate Minority has maintained two things all along: Number one, our economy, in fact, has not improved and is getting worse; and number two, that the so-called \$184 million budget surplus was illusionary.

"If there was \$184 million and the governor still had bills left over from last year with appropriations that he had not released, he started doing so this week and that reduced that amount. But the \$180 million means that currently, both the governor's budget and the House draft of the budget are not in balance as required by law. Thank you."

## THIRTY-FIRST DAY

## Thursday, March 13, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chun Oakland, English, Espero, and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz introduced Mrs. Joy Kouchi, wife of Senator Ronald D. Kouchi, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Green introduced participants of the fourteenth annual State Council on Developmental Disabilities Day at the Capitol, held in partnership with Hilopa'a Family to Family Health Information Center and Ho'opa'a (Hawaii Autism State Implementation Grant). This year's event, with the theme "Ability At Work," drew over 500 individuals with developmental disabilities, family members, personal assistants, service providers, and friends from O'ahu and the neighbor islands, including 76 participants from Hawai'i Island, Kaua'i, and Maui. The participants would be meeting with legislators to discuss issues and concerns, touring the Capitol building, and attending hearings and a ceremony during which the governor would present a proclamation declaring March 2014 as Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month. Senator Green recognized Waynette Cabral and Curtis Tyler of the State Council on Developmental Disabilities, as well as all of the developmental disabilities 'ohana, and thanked all of the participants for their presence and input with their state government.

The Chair shared that she had just learned to sign, "I can work," in American Sign Language, in keeping with the event's theme.

Senator Gabbard recognized his sister Barbara Gabbard of Goodwill Industries who was participating in the day's events.

Senator Galuteria introduced his son Sean who was also participating in the day's events.

Senator Kidani, on behalf of Senate President Kim, honored Alfredo Torco, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. It's always a pleasure to welcome and recognize someone who lives to serve others and to build a better community. This morning, we say aloha to one such person: Alfredo 'Al' Torco.

"Al graduated from Farrington High School – go Govs! His career led him to serve as an officer with the Honolulu Police Department for 35 years, where he retired in 2001 as a lieutenant. That wasn't the end of his public service, though. He became a substitute teacher at his alma mater. It wasn't because he was looking for something to do; rather, it was because he wanted to help Farrington, the pride of Kalihi.

"Al confesses that he bleeds maroon and white. He's served as the school's archivist, collecting items and keepsakes about Farrington and its history that would rival that of neighboring Bishop Museum. He's been an active member of the Farrington Alumni & Community Association, the group that grants scholarships and contributes in other ways to improving the school and helping its students. For his leadership and hard work, Al was named by the association as Farrington's Alumnus of the Year in 2003.

"If the Farrington 'ohana weren't an impressive enough family, Al and his wife, Helen (Farrington class of 1960), have 9 sons and a daughter, 29 grandchildren with a 30th on its way, and 1 great-grandson.

"Al Torco just celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday, and the Senate joins in applauding this public-spirited citizen for his service to our community and to Farrington High School. We also extend our very best wishes to him and his family for many more years of good health, prosperity, and happiness. Go, Al; go, Governors!

"And joining Al this morning in the chamber is his daughter-in-law, Jonal Hew-Len, all the way from Washington State."

At this time, Senator Baker rose to thank those who participated in her office's food sale to benefit the Hawaii Foodbank and acknowledged the hard work of her staff, noting that their efforts raised about \$1,000 for the Maui Food Bank.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Madam President, I'd like to ask you a question; if you would yield, I would appreciate it."

The Chair responded that she would yield to the question.

Senator Solomon continued:

"Thank you, Madam President. Today, Madam President, the majority of the women here in the Senate had sent you a memorandum regarding the nomination of Mike Wilson for the Hawai'i Supreme Court and the Hawaii State Bar Association's testimony. Have you, in fact, received the memorandum?"

The Chair responded that she received the memorandum.

Senator Solomon continued:

"And may I ask our course of action in regards to this memorandum?"

The Chair responded:

"I believe the memorandum is addressed to our Judiciary chair, and I will be following up with the Judiciary chair. In fact, we've had a short conversation on that, as to how we proceed from here."

Senator Solomon thanked the Chair for her response.

At 11:58 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:59 a.m.

Senator Hee rose to respond to the previous speaker as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I have received a copy of the letter dated March 13 to me, requesting that the Judiciary Committee should ask the nominee to allow the Senate – I'll just read it straight out, 'in a manner that respects the nominee's right to maintain personnel records as confidential from the general public, to review relevant information from judiciary records, including his personnel file, any ethics, performance, conduct, or other matters, including lawyer comments and other materials gathered under Rule 19, Judicial Performance Reviews.'

"I looked at Rule 19, and really, the substantive part of 19 is, and I'll just quote it: 'Except as otherwise provided herein, the chief justice shall have the sole discretion and authority to determine how the above information can be used to fulfill the purposes of the program. The chief justice shall provide such information and data concerning the performance of a judge to the Judicial Selection Commission as the Commission may request in writing,' and that 'the chief justice shall in a manner consistent with the requirements of paragraph (a) of this section relating to respondent confidentiality, furnish the judge evaluated a summary of the judge's performance as determined by the evaluation process established by this rule.'

"I'm sure that all of you who are familiar with the process will understand that the JSC will not release anything, as is required by the JSC. Any information we have received has been received by the individual himself. This is not a new phenomenon; in fact, every judge that I've led the confirmation of has provided us, the JSC, as well as the Bar Association questionnaires. I am happy to ask the chief justice to provide this information. What he does with the ask is really something that I'm not sure he would do, absent of a conversation with the nominee, at the minimum.

"That, however, being said, there will be – and I'm doing this only because we're up against the thirtieth day – with the concurrence of the Senate President, the Judiciary Committee will meet at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. I've checked with enough members of the committee to provide for a quorum, so we will meet at 11:00 a.m. in room 016. Now, I'm not sure if we're going to discuss this issue as articulated in the letter because I have some reservations whether the chief justice will, in fact, release this information in accordance with Rule 19, which the Women's Caucus has cited.

"I also believe, because the thirtieth day, depending on – counting is tricky in this building, as lawsuits have demonstrated between former Senate President Hanabusa and former Governor Cayetano, the most recent example of which – what constitutes the thirtieth day. As I've said all along, the committee will submit a committee report on Friday, which is

tomorrow. By my committee's count, the thirtieth day is Tuesday, but that doesn't mean the thirtieth day is Tuesday; that means by my committee's count. That gives the president the discretion to move forward on Monday, which, by my committee's count, is the twenty-ninth day.

"If something should occur on Saturday, I want to give notice, and the Senate President is aware of this. If something should occur on Saturday, it is likely that the Judiciary Committee may have to exercise its discretion and submit either an addendum or a new committee report, but I want to be sure that everybody understands that the Judiciary Committee, by unanimous vote, took action last week. And just to be sure that the Senate does not shirk its constitutional duty, and by its authority, we will be submitting a committee report on Friday. Depending on what happens Saturday, things may change, but that gives us, at least, the opportunity to stay within our constitutional mandate. If anyone has any questions, I am available. Thank you very much."

The Chair stated:

"Thank you. Senator, you would like to request that the nominee be asked if he would be willing to provide that information."

Senator Hee responded:

"That's correct. I will do as has been requested of the Judiciary Committee in a letter as articulated."

The Chair continued:

"And one more point: at the public hearing, outside of the nominee and perhaps the bar, that you may have questions, and it should be new testimony so that you don't have to rehash the old testimony."

Senator Hee responded:

"That's a terrific suggestion on two fronts. One is, as most people who have testified before the Judiciary Committee understand, this is not the time to rehash what has already been said. But let me also say this, because you make an excellent point, Madam President: Saturday at 11:00 a.m. This gives everybody the opportunity – everybody, including Greg Markham, the president of the bar – to come forward with names and to come forward with people. Absent of that, it would be very difficult to change, in my opinion, the will of the committee at this time based on innuendo, allegations, insinuations, and rumor. So, Mr. Markham has another opportunity on Saturday at 11:00 a.m. in room 016 to bring forward these, and make visible to the committee, these people who have brought forth these allegations. Thank you, Madam President."

The Chair clarified:

"You're welcome. And also, to make clear that members who were not able to ask questions and have questions would also be entertained that opportunity."

Senator Hee responded:

"That's correct. I'm sure we can fit all the members who want to also be present. Just as a point of information, do I need to waive any rule to hold a hearing at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday? Because if so, we should do it."

At 12:07 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:08 p.m.

Senator Hee, Chair of the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 to hold a public hearing on Gov. Msg. No. 580.

Senator Hee noted:

"I've already described the reason for requesting the waiver."

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Hee announced that the Committee on Judiciary and Labor would hold a public hearing and possible decision making meeting on Gov. Msg. No. 580 on Saturday, March 15, 2014, at 11:00 a.m. in Conference Room 016.

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I would like to thank the Judiciary chairman for his expediency in terms of responding to this memorandum. However, Madam President, I'd like to remind the Judiciary chairman that I voted free and clear with the understanding that if there was going to be any kind of evidence that would be produced to the contrary, that we, in fact, would take the matter up again. This is the reason why, Madam Chairman, that I voted free and clear on it.

"I just want to make mention – although I appreciate the chairman's remarks about names, so on and so forth – but I feel that those involved, if they feel that there's going to be any kind of reprisal, then perhaps there could be another way for these persons to come forward to be able to testify to the contrary.

"So, these are my concerns. I didn't create this situation, Madam President. It is what it is. It is what it is. You know, females do feel intimidated; they do feel that they are not treated as equals. If we were, Madam President, we'd have equal pay for equal work! That's the bottom line of this argument. So, women have not been treated fairly in this society. It's unfortunate, but it is what it is. And this is why I want to thank my fellow senators who are part of the Women's Caucus for standing up and having the courage. It's not easy. The easy thing for us is just to turn the other cheek or make like it's not happening, but it's out there. I mean, we just addressed a piece of legislation, Madam President, that would allow people to come forward until the age of 55 if they've been sexually harassed or abused or whatever it may be. Because normally, a woman is abused, but first, she's sexually harassed. So, these are very serious thoughts that the Women's Caucus is sharing with our fellow colleagues here on the floor. This is not something that we should take lightly.

"Now, as I said earlier, the higher courts are the courts where women have been able to get justice and been able to discuss our issues – whether we're talking about abortion, whether we're talking about many issues that are pono and have to do with women's rights. So, this is how I'm viewing this memorandum, Madam President. So, with that, thank you very much."

The Chair responded:

"Let me just remind the committee that there is an option of an executive session, I'm sure, where there could be some confidential testimony taken. I know that's been done in the past."

At 12:13 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:14 p.m.

Senator Hee rose and stated:

"Thank you, Madam President, for the recess. This has to do with the nomination of Michael Wilson, but does not have to do with the Women's Caucus letter. I've been trying to focus on the letter and the request, and I appreciate the counsel of the president.

“Before I came down, which is the reason I was late, I received an inquiry from a woman, but I did not meet her – I want to make that clear. And we’re trying to reach her again. This does not have to do with his conduct as a judge – I want to make that clear. So, I wanted to be sure that everybody understood that providing the public hearing is yet another opportunity for everyone to come forward. This person who left a message did not indicate it had anything to do with sexual harassment, if people are wondering. But until I get more information and actually have the privilege of speaking to this person, who, evidently, is the first person who is willing to come to my office and identify herself, I won’t have any more information.

“I share this because the last thing I want is for anyone to think that anything is going on that hasn’t been shared with every member of the Senate. I’ve tried to handle this as best I can and give it the greatest latitude. And like I said with Mr. Markham, until we see faces, names, places, times, and people willing – and I know this is a very difficult thing to do – to come forward and identify yourself. I’ve been through this with Judge Glenn Kim. If some of you may remember, two women came forward, they came public, and he was confirmed, 14 to 11. So, I realize the gravity of how important it is and the kinds of chances people take by coming forward.

“Nonetheless, this committee doesn’t engage in trolling, and it certainly will not lead a witch hunt, in fairness to the nominee. We will give every opportunity, as required by the Constitution, and the nominee himself, in this case, to come forward yet an additional time, and I hope the Hawaii State Bar Association gets busy and provides us more than what they have up until this point. Thank you.”

Senator Kouchi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“The possibility of having an executive session has been raised and while I can appreciate the sensitivity and difficulty for individuals to speak about personal matters in open hearings, I would caution that we need to look carefully at Chapter 92. The intent behind the law is to foster open hearings and any exception to holding an open hearing is narrowly construed. If the Senate Judiciary Committee chair refuses a request to close the hearing for an executive session, the chair becomes the target for failing to comply with the request, despite the fact that he is following the law. In this particular case, for the women who feel threatened and are intimidated to come forward and testify, there may be certain exceptions in the law that could provide them some protection. Thank you.”

The Chair noted that she would follow up with the attorneys.

At 12:18 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:22 p.m.

The Chair stated:

“Just for the members’ information, we do have Rule 21 that says, ‘Meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.’ So, I believe that there is that latitude and that is left up to the committee chair at this point in time.”

Senator Nishihara rose to announce that the Senate and House Committees on Agriculture would be hosting a presentation entitled, “GMO Crops and Food: Fact and Fiction,” by Dr. Peter Davies of Cornell University the following day at 10:00 a.m. in Conference Room 224, and invited the members and their staff to participate.

## THIRTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 14, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chun Oakland, English, Espero, and Solomon who were excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Kahele introduced Todd Belt, associate professor and chair of the Department of Political Science at the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, and head of the Political and Legislative Internship Program. Professor Belt was accompanied in the gallery by Senator Kahele's session intern, Derek Inaba.

Senator Baker introduced the following visitors who were serving as consultants to the Department of Health on improving children's oral health: Andrew Peters, associate in Children's Dental Policy at the Pew Charitable Trust; Paul Glassman, DDS, MA, MBA, professor of Dental Practice and director of Community Oral Health and director of the Pacific Center for Special Care at the University of the Pacific Arthur A. Dugoni School of Dentistry; Deb Zysman, director of Good Beginnings Alliance; and Jacee Mikulaneca, policy director for Good Beginnings Alliance. The visitors were accompanied in the gallery by Senator Baker's office manager, Janice Salcedo.

Senator Slom recognized the 2014 Hawaii Business Hall of Fame Laureates, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you. Good morning, Madam President and colleagues. This is one of my favorite times of the year because we come up on an annual event honoring a wonderful organization and wonderful individuals, and that's Junior Achievement of Hawaii. Junior Achievement has been at the forefront of business education, nationally and in our community. The organization was formed nationally in 1919, and here in Hawai'i in 1957, and I'm proud to have been involved with the organization for many years and been a volunteer in several of its many fine programs.

"The mission is education, and to inspire young people to understand about business and the free enterprise system, and no other organization has done the job as well as JA. Also, besides the programming, in 1990, we established the JA Business Hall of Fame in Hawai'i, which now actually physically resides at the University of Hawai'i. Since that time, 70 business individuals have been recognized – both living and legacy awardees – and every year, Junior Achievement recognizes several more inductees and has an annual banquet, which will be held this evening.

"So today, we're here to honor those newest business honorees and also to honor the organization. At this time, I would like to invite the president of JA Hawaii to please stand, and that is Kimberly Canepa. With Kim is Chairman of the Board Ben Nakaoka.

"Madam President, we have some very special people up in the gallery supporting Junior Achievement and our awardees today, and I'd like to ask them to please stand. First of all, Erin Chisholm, who is an education assistant; Cid Inouye, who is the board secretary of JA; Brad Shin, member of the board; Susan Jaworowski, also a member; Fain McDaniel is the treasurer; and Reid Chung, also a board member of JA Hawaii.

"And in addition, to root on our honorees for this year, Paul Mizoguchi, Jessie Mizoguchi, and John McNamara. Now let's give them all a hand. Thank you all for coming and supporting the fine program of JA."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you. Sherry Menor-McNamara was born in Tokyo, raised in Hilo, is a graduate of Waiakea High School, and received her BA in political science from the University of California, Los Angeles and a combined JD/MBA from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. She also earned a certificate in Expanding Impact in Advocacy from the Harvard Kennedy School of Executive Education. Sherry joined the Chamber of Commerce of Hawai'i in 2006 as the director of business advocacy, and in 2013, was named the first female and youngest president and CEO of the 162-year-old organization.

"Sherry was recognized as a 'Top 20 to Watch' by *Hawaii Business* magazine and a 'Top 10 to Watch' by *Pacific Business News*. She was also recognized this year as a Hawaii Business Hall of Fame Laureate. She currently serves on seven community boards and executive committees."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I have the distinct honor of telling you how a prodigy turned into a musical legend. Jake Shimabukuro was born in Honolulu and received his first 'ukulele at the age of four from his mother, who also happened to be his first teacher. Jake is now an 'ukulele virtuoso and composer known for his blazing fast and complex finger work. Recognized nationally and internationally as an award-winning 'ukulele virtuoso, Jake won four – four – Nā Hōkū Hanohano Awards as a member of the trio Pure Heart. Their self-titled debut album was named as one of the top 50 Hawaiian music albums of all time by *Honolulu Magazine*.

"Jake began his illustrious musical career as a solo artist in 2002, and was the first Hawaiian artist to sign with Epic Records International, a division of Sony Music Japan International. He later formed his own management company, Toastman Incorporated, and a record company, Hitchhike Records, the latter securing a national U.S. distribution deal and concert tour.

"In 2013, Jake founded a nonprofit organization called Four Strings Foundation, which creates music education workshops nationwide. Their inspiring message and mission is to 'create a new opportunity for people of all ages to participate in the act of making music and to use those experiences as a vehicle to promote personal empowerment and fulfillment.'

"This morning, we honor Jake Shimabukuro as a 2014 Hawaii Business Hall of Fame Laureate. Congratulations, Jake."

Senator Slom rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Finally, we're very happy to honor real entrepreneurs, the Kamitaki and Mizoguchi family. Representing them is Wayne Kamitaki. Also, however, Lynn Ushijima, Guy Kamitaki, and Paul Mizoguchi. They are outstanding examples of excellence in free enterprise.

"You know, they started a small dry-goods store many years ago. Actually, the family started almost a century ago on Maui. They started with a single store in Kahului, and it developed into Maui Varieties, Ltd, and it became a successful franchise. But together, the families now oversee 31 stores, including 6 Ben Franklin Crafts stores, 14 Ace Hardware stores in Hawai'i,



plus another 11 Ace Hardware stores in both Asia and on the West Coast.

“They’ve given back to the community; they’ve been very active in the community. They established a \$35,000 endowed scholarship fund for undergraduate students attending the Shidler College of Business at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa in a spirit of community service.

“Now in 2014, the State Senate recognizes the Kamitaki and Mizoguchi families as new Hawaii Business Hall of Fame Laureates. We congratulate them and all of our winners for all of the accomplishments and the good things that they do for Hawai‘i.”

Senator Wakai, on behalf of Senate President Kim, commemorated the 125th anniversary of the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. We have a second floor presentation this morning and a number of honored guests; they hail from the Bishop Museum. The Bishop Museum has touched and enhanced countless lives. It is more than a historic landmark and repository for treasures from throughout the Pacific. This venerable institution was founded 125 years ago by Charles Reed Bishop, who named it in memory of his wife, Bernice Pauahi Bishop, the great-granddaughter of King Kamehameha I. The Bishops had been captivated by the museums they visited throughout Europe and dreamed of someday opening one right here in Hawai‘i to preserve the rich history and culture of the Native Hawaiian people. The numbers of Hawaiians during that time were declining.

“The Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum’s early collections consisted of possessions and bequests of the Kamehameha and Kalākaua families, but thanks to outstanding and energetic leadership and community support over the decades, the museum has amassed an amazing collection that ranks it amongst the best and most unique in the world. Today, it is the home to more than 25 million cultural artifacts and natural history specimens.

“Bishop Museum isn’t just a place for collecting and displaying objects; scientists and researchers are making invaluable contributions to our knowledge base in Hawai‘i, its people, and the world. It has been a leader in preserving and translating the oral history of Native Hawaiians and has published some of the most important works on the Hawaiian language, culture, and history.

“But the museum is proudest of its role as a gathering place and educational center for our people and for those across the globe. The museum welcomes 350,000 visitors through its doors every year. It also reaches 28,000 of our young people annually, educating them about everything from history to science. It also sponsors about 6,000 public programs a year, while its website reaches nearly 1.5 million visitors each year. This is a remarkable record of achievement, reflecting not only 125 years of service to our community, but the leadership and contributions of so many throughout its remarkable history.

“Please join me in congratulating the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum and its staff on the 125-year existence of this historic and cultural treasured site. Congratulations. Joining us on the floor today are Blair Collis, president and CEO; Allison Holt Gendreau, chairman of the board of the Bishop Museum; Watters Martin, vice chairman of the board; and Courtney Chow, director of development.

“We have two other friends in the gallery this morning: Dr. Yoshi Sinoto, director of Polynesian archeology; also in the gallery, Dodie Brown, daughter of Aunty Pat Bacon and senior cultural advisor. Thank you, Dodie.

“Thank you for your fantastic work over the century, and 125 years. Thank you, Madam President.”

At 12:03 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:37 p.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

At this time, Senate President Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Obviously, I have been deprived of doing personal privilege, and so I thought that I would take this opportunity only because something was presented to me this morning that sort of got me very concerned. What I’m holding in my hand is a document that says, ‘The University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa Athletic Department is requesting architectural design services to create and design conceptual renderings for a potential outdoor 30,000-seat multipurpose entertainment facility to be located in an undetermined site on the island of O‘ahu. Design services are to include design of a single entertainment facility for Hawai‘i community capable of multipurpose use in a versatile facility, (2) develop preliminary schematic drawings detailing layouts of the facility and two conceptual street views, (3) determining the necessary acreage footprint needed to construct the facility,’ it goes on and on.

“And I checked with the Finance chair in the House; I checked with our Ways and Means and our committee chair of Higher Ed, and nobody seems to even know about this request for quotations, which troubles me because the university is coming before us with their budget, they’re asking for all of these priorities, and for some reason we are not told or there’s no transparency in their projects. We saw in the newspaper how the T.C. Ching Field is over-budgeted and is late. We know that the campus center is 14 months behind. We know there are overruns over at the West O‘ahu campus. There are a myriad of problems and all of a sudden now we see that there’s a request for quotations for another stadium. So, I’m very troubled by this. I’m troubled that the university has not been transparent with us and is not keeping us informed; and certainly, I think that we need to take a second look at their request and their budget. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. Just to stand on a point of personal privilege to announce that your Committee on Health will be having an informational briefing today on the use of herbicides across the state by the counties and the state. The goal of this informational briefing is really to determine if the use of Roundup is being used safely and in a way that doesn’t harm anybody. We’ll be receiving a full comprehensive report on the use of Roundup and glyphosate across the state.

“This was brought to my attention by people from the community over the last several months. They’ve seen power spraying near schools, churches, and whatnot – thousands of gallons. And there was some concern, but I didn’t know if it was a concern to us, so we have some experts coming in. We’ll have the Departments of Health and Transportation also addressing the issue. It should be, actually, a very good informational briefing to make sure that we’re achieving the highest standards of safety and proper use of this chemical.

“So, if people would like to join me, it’ll be room 229 today at 1:30 p.m.; it’ll probably be about 90 minutes to 2 hours. If you could come and go, that’d be good, or definitely send your staff. I think this is a significant public health question. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Tokuda rose to inform the members of the following week’s events for Education Week at the Capitol, encouraged everyone to participate, and thanked the staff for their efforts.

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you; it’s really an announcement as well as a comment. Tomorrow, as all of you know, Judiciary and Labor will be conducting a hearing on the Associate Justice nominee to the Supreme Court, Michael Wilson. This will be, I presume, the last opportunity to have a public hearing unless something that I can’t even imagine comes forward tomorrow. There is at least one woman who is to testify, but I wanted to be sure that opportunity to invite the bar association to be present, including Calvin Young and particularly Greg Markham and others whose names have been bandied about. They include Ronette Kawakami, Nadine Ando, Russ Awakuni, Cecelia Chang, Vladimir Devens, Rhonda Griswold from the bar, as well as Pat Mau-Shimizu, to the extent that there may be questions by the members or also clarification.

“If you’re not on the committee and wish or intend to participate, my staff would certainly appreciate a heads-up because we’re trying to organize the logistics of the meeting. I’m presuming that all members of the Judiciary and Labor Committee will be present.

“Finally, I wanted to, by way of this opportunity, let you know that subpoenas will go out this afternoon with respect to the investigation on the Hawai‘i State Hospital. Thank you.”

Senate President Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I’d like to add and ask the Judiciary chair that we request someone from the Judicial Selection Commission to hopefully be there, if none other than the Senate’s selection be there also, if there are questions from the members. Thank you.”

Senator Ige rose to announce that the Committee on Ways and Means would be planning a committee briefing regarding the State Budget, and asked the members for their preference for meeting times.

The Chair extended best wishes to the national award-winning Kapa'a Middle School 'Ukulele Band as they perform at the Heritage Music Festival in Anaheim, California.

At this time, Senator Galuteria wished Senator Hee a happy birthday on behalf of the members of the Senate.

## THIRTY-THIRD DAY

**Monday, March 17, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Wakai who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Chun Oakland, on behalf of Senator Ige and Senator Nishihara, introduced Mr. Russell Minobe and the following outstanding students of Pearl City Elementary School who were visiting the Capitol to learn about the legislative process: Joanna Reid, Liah McKee, and Celeste Aguinaldo, all of whom were accompanied by their parents.

Senator Taniguchi welcomed a group of Cub Scouts from Noelani Pack 35, who were accompanied by their parents and friends.

Senator Tokuda recognized Department of Education Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi who was present in the gallery, as well as board members of the Hawaii Association for the Education of Young Children (HAEYC), and updated the members on the morning's Education Week events related to early education.

Senator Tokuda, on behalf of Senator Hee and herself, recognized Dayna Hironaka of Kahalu'u Elementary School for having been designated as 2014 Windward District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"It is my honor to begin our floor introductions today on behalf of both Senator Clayton Hee and myself. Please join me in recognizing and honoring Ms. Dayna Hironaka. Dayna believes that teamwork and high expectations are important in the education of the students in her classroom at Kahalu'u Elementary School.

"Dayna received her bachelor's degree in education from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. She has taught third, fourth, and fifth grade and also served as the technology teacher and temporary vice principal. She became a National Board Certified Teacher as an early childhood/generalist in 2012. She is also very involved in the community while serving as a Kahalu'u 'ohana board member. Dayna truly believes that every child's learning experience is individualized and says, 'I build on each child's individual's strengths to maximize their learning.' She enjoys volleyball, traveling, and spending time with her family. She has an 11-year-old son and an 8-year-old daughter, and her husband is the computer teacher at Kahalu'u School.

"Again, on behalf of both Senator Hee and myself, please join me in welcoming and honoring, for all that she does for our Kahalu'u School, Dayna Hironaka. And I believe to support our 2014 Windward District Teacher of the Year, we have her husband, Ryan, in the gallery and, definitely important, her cheering squad – her son, Kalei, and her daughter, Mia."

Senator Slom honored Matthew Lawrence of Waikiki Elementary School for having been designated as 2014 Hawai'i State Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Good morning, Madam President and colleagues. It's 'Sammy O'Slom' to you, today. Thank you. I love Education Week and the chance and the honor to recognize our outstanding teachers. Today, I'd like to honor Matthew Lawrence.

"Matthew Lawrence is recognized as the state's premier educator by receiving the 2014 State Teacher of the Year award. He's taught for 13 years at Waikiki Elementary School. He's a National Board Certified Teacher. Matthew received his bachelor's degree in elementary education with middle school endorsement from Illinois State University and a master's degree in educational psychology from UH Mānoa. He encourages his students to use their creativity and higher level thinking skills and he integrates the philosophy of children-, concept-, and project-based learning to challenge his students in his everyday teaching.

"Matthew has served on the school community council as chairman from 2006 to 2011, and he currently is a mentor teacher with the University of Hawai'i undergraduate teaching program. Mr. Matthew Lawrence, and his support team up in the gallery: his lovely wife, Jessika, and daughter, Lily Ann Lawrence. Aloha."

Senator Hee recognized Teresa Cramer of Hale Kula Elementary School for having been designated as 2014 Central District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. It's my honor to introduce Teresa Cramer, the 2014 Central District Teacher of the Year. It's interesting; I have the privilege of representing districts that begin in Kahalu'u, and Teresa is in Hale Kula in Wahiawā, so the district has two districts within the Department of Education.

"Teresa Cramer began her career as a social worker who specialized in cases of high-risk children in shelters and outreach programs. After 10 years in the profession, she was inspired to become a schoolteacher to address the needs of at-risk children at an earlier age. At Hale Kula Elementary School in Wahiawā, Teresa created the co-teaching inclusion class, which utilizes the school's Hope Garden to teach hands-on learning and sustainability. She is also recognized by the parents of her students for teaching them to strive for excellence and to achieve their goals.

"Present in the audience to support her mother is Teresa's daughter, Tess Cramer. Thank you very much."

Senator English honored Anthony Williams of Pa'ia Elementary School for having been designated as 2014 Maui District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President, members of the Senate, I'm so pleased today to introduce the 2014 Maui District Teacher of the Year, Kumu Anthony 'Kamaka'eu' Williams.

"Kumu Kamaka'eu has received the honorable distinction as the 2014 Maui School District Teacher of the Year for his outstanding work as a fourth-grade Hawaiian language immersion teacher at Pa'ia Elementary School. He is an award-winning educator credited with helping to create the Hawaiian Aligned Portfolio Assessment, which is an assessment to determine if Hawaiian immersion schools have made adequate annual progress.

"Joining Kumu today are his guests in the gallery: Nanette Williams, Chihiro Ikezawa, and his sister, Sophia Amasol.

"Originally from Honolulu, Kumu Kamaka'eu has been a great asset to us in Maui; and I just want to say that in the sea of bureaucracy, he is a steady, steady light guiding our programs and guiding our students to make sure that the students are at the center of their education and making sure that the Hawaiian

language lives. So, I'd like to say mahalo and congratulations on this distinctive award. Thank you."

Senator Ruderman recognized Elizabeth Timbal of Kea'au High School for having been designated as 2014 Hawai'i District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I rise to acknowledge the honor being given to the Hawai'i District Teacher of the Year for 2014, Ms. Elizabeth Timbal. Ms. Timbal is unable to be with us today because she is fighting a serious illness.

"Colleagues praise Elizabeth Timbal's classroom management skills and her genuine care. She has helped spearhead the implementation of advancement by individual determination at Kea'au High. She developed an extended learning opportunity program and continually strives to improve her craft, most recently by completing an English-language learner course to better understand her needs. One of her students wrote, 'You made me discover talents that I never knew I had. You are the only one who took a chance to give me a chance.' Her investment and dedication to her students has been an invaluable service to the Kea'au community.

"So, I'd like to recognize Ms. Elizabeth Timbal, 2014 Hawai'i District Teacher of the Year awardee, and will yield the floor to Senator Shimabukuro."

Senator Shimabukuro honored Terra Wight of Nanakuli High and Intermediate School for having been designated as 2014 Leeward District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"I also have the honor to acknowledge the 2014 Leeward District Teacher of the Year, who is Terra Wight of Nanakuli High and Intermediate School. Unfortunately, Ms. Wight was unable to join us today, but I do have written remarks to insert into the Journal in her honor. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Shimabukuro's additional remarks read as follows:

"In light of the importance of education, it is always a pleasure and a privilege of the Hawai'i State Senate to recognize those exceptional people who have taken on this great responsibility and who have made significant achievements in educating the young people of their community. The Senate of the State of Hawai'i believes that teachers impress upon young minds the foundation, standards and ideals that last a lifetime. Those individuals who choose to become educators have a special calling because they dedicate their life's work to the development of young and eager minds and are willing to lead the way in discovering life's mysteries and wonderful surprises.

"In this spirit, the Senate recognizes Terra Wight, teacher at Nanakuli High & Intermediate School, for having been designated 2014 Teacher of the Year for Oahu's Leeward District.

"Terra seeks to build strong bonds that inspire students. Her lessons blend rigor with relevancy and foster curiosity, allowing students to experience science in the world around them. She helped initiate an ecology club through which students and community members are partnering to restore native plants to Piliokahe Beach Park. On the Instructional Leadership Team, she helped develop new policies for tardiness, uniforms, and curriculum that improved attendance and student achievement.

"The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature, State of Hawai'i, congratulates Terra Wight, 2014 Teacher of the Year for Oahu's Leeward District, for her outstanding contributions to our young people through her tireless and inspiring work as a teacher at Nanakuli High & Intermediate School. The Senate further extends its gratitude and warmest aloha to Terra, along

with sincere best wishes for continued success in the years ahead."

At this time, Senator Kouchi recognized John DeSoto, former chair and member of the Honolulu City Council, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Kouchi then recognized Justin Yamagata of Waimea Canyon Middle School for having been designated as 2014 Kaua'i District Teacher of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"The Kaua'i District Teacher of the Year is Justin Yamagata, and he's a science teacher at Waimea Canyon School. While he's not able to be here, I'd like to read just two bullet points. The first is when he joined Waimea Canyon School eight years ago, he was surprised to find out students were not competing in science fairs – and he's a science teacher. Today, about 100 student experiments are displayed in a science event, with several of them qualifying for state and international tournaments.

"And his nomination came on the heels of him taking top honors in March 2013 as the Hawai'i Academy of Science Teacher of the Year. So, our congratulations to Justin Yamagata, Kaua'i Teacher of the Year."

Senator Tokuda then rose and stated:

"Madam President, that wraps up our outstanding teachers. We want to thank them for all that they do in our classrooms and for our students."

Senator Hee then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of MICHAEL D. WILSON as Associate Justice to the Supreme Court, State of Hawaii, term to expire in ten years, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“On March 6, 2014, your committee held a public hearing to consider the appointment of Judge Wilson to the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawai‘i. At that hearing, your committee found, by unanimous vote, the appointee to be qualified for the position and recommended that the Senate consent to this appointment. The background testimony and conclusion reached by your committee on Gov. Msg. No. 580 was discussed at length and reported to you in Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2886.

“In response to a March 13, 2014 memorandum addressed to your committee from members of the Senate Women’s Caucus, your committee held a second public hearing for the consideration of this appointment on Saturday, March 15, 2014. The memorandum stated that during the hearing on March 6, 2014, the Senate Women’s Caucus believed that the testimony of the Hawaii Bar Association raised questions that warrant further inquiry by the Senate.

“Furthermore, your committee commented that following the hearing on March 6, a woman expressed concerns about the appointee, and your committee wanted the opportunity to investigate these concerns. Lastly, your committee offered Judge Wilson, officers and directors of the Hawaii State Bar Association, and anyone else the opportunity to come forward and comment again on the appointment.

“Your committee appreciates the input from all individuals who have appeared or participated, especially members of the Hawai‘i Judicial Selection Commission, Judge Wilson, and members of the Senate Women’s Caucus. This hearing provided your committee an opportunity for the appointee, Hawaii State Bar Association, Hawai‘i Judicial Selection Commission, and members of the legal community and public to engage in discussion on various topics including, but not limited to:

- The transferring of an employee back to her original position at the Office of State Planning while Judge Wilson was the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources;



- The judicial rating process and procedures of the Hawaii State Bar Association;
- The judicial rating process and procedures of the Hawai'i Judicial Selection Commission;
- The Judicial Performance Program under Rule 19, Rules of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i; and
- Issues relating to sexual harassment and discrimination.

"Of the various topics discussed, your committee notes the following. Your committee notes that the appearance by two members of the Judicial Selection Commission to discuss the commission's judicial rating processes and procedures is unprecedented and appreciates their participation. In addition to serving on the commission as elected members of the Hawaii State Bar Association, these two members previously served as board members of the Hawaii State Bar Association. Thus, these two commission members are experienced and knowledgeable in the judicial rating processes and procedures of the Hawaii State Bar Association that existed during their respective tenures, as well as the existing processes and procedures of the Hawai'i Judicial Selection Commission.

"The commission members testified that the commission's judicial rating processes and procedures are confidential pursuant to Article VI, Section 4, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, but disclosed that the sources of information for judicial rating include the Office of Disciplinary Counsel, the Hawaii State Bar Association, and the Judicial Performance Program established pursuant to Rule 19, Rules of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawai'i. The Judicial Selection Commission members testified that in addition to its constitutional requirement, such information is confidential because many attorneys do not want others to know that they are considering a career track change and because the release of such information may discourage sitting judges from seeking retention.

"Your committee notes the testimony from a number of attorneys regarding Rule 19. Rule 19 establishes the Judicial Performance Program under the Hawai'i Supreme Court to periodically evaluate a judge's performance in order to promote judicial excellence and competence. Judges are evaluated according to legal ability, judicial management skills, comportment, and other criteria established by the special committee appointed by the chief justice to implement and administer the program and approved by the Hawai'i Supreme Court. All information, questionnaires, notes, memoranda, data, and reports obtained, used, or prepared in the implementation and administration of the program is confidential.

"The memorandum from the members of the Senate Women's Caucus requested that your committee ask the appointee to allow the Senate to review relevant information from judicial records, including materials gathered pursuant to Rule 19. However, testifiers, including retired Associate Justice James Duffy, indicated to your committee that the appointee is not authorized to allow your committee to review the performance evaluation summary that was furnished to the appointee. Your committee acknowledges the testimony of retired Associate Justice James Duffy regarding the reasons to maintain the confidentiality of information obtained pursuant to Rule 19. Your committee further notes that several lawyers – including Judicial Selection Commission member James Bickerton and private attorneys Michael Livingston, Brook Hart, and Judith Pavey – offered strong testimony that the nominee was not permitted to release the information pursuant to Rule 19.

"Finally, on this matter Public Defender Susan Arnett, an original member of the committee to construct Rule 19 in 1991, stated emphatically that the 'contents offered under Rule 19

were for the chief justice to review in an effort to evaluate and constructively comment on the conduct of sitting jurists only.'

"Your committee notes the testimony from two female civil rights lawyers who testified in support of the appointment of Judge Wilson. Both testified that Hawai'i has strong laws to provide recourse for victims of sexual harassment or discrimination. However, in order to provide recourse or address an uncomfortable or sometimes traumatic situation, the victim must come forward. The attorneys also urged that as a matter of fairness, a victim must also come forward at the time the instance of sexual harassment or discrimination occurs. Coming forward when the instance occurs provides an opportunity for correction and education, as the harassment or discrimination may have been a misunderstanding or unintended.

"Your committee believes that sexual harassment and discrimination are not to be tolerated and takes claims of sexual harassment or discrimination seriously and with sensitivity. Your committee also recognizes the courage it takes for a person to come forward to disclose instances of sexual harassment or discrimination. As such, your committee's intention to hold a second hearing was to provide an additional opportunity for any individuals with concerns regarding sexual harassment or discrimination by the appointee to express or substantiate concerns so that your committee could appropriately consider that testimony. Your committee notes that no one came forward, and that any claims regarding sexual harassment or discrimination remain unsubstantiated and unknown.

"Accordingly, your committee maintains its finding that Judge Michael D. Wilson has the experience, temperament, judiciousness, and other competencies to serve as an Associate Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and that Judge Wilson has a good sense of where the equities, rights, and responsibilities lie in a case, which is essential for an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. I urge confirmation of Judge Michael Wilson. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"I had questions about the qualifications and suitability of this nominee to serve on the high court from the beginning. There was something I just couldn't put my finger on, but unlike other nominations to the Supreme Court, there didn't seem to be much happiness or excitement about this nominee. 'Was he the best and brightest; couldn't we do better?' I heard that in whispers and then in phone calls and conversations from people I know and respect. I heard that he created a hostile work environment, didn't treat subordinates with respect – some of whom were women – and that the nominee didn't have the appropriate judicial demeanor or work ethic. He wasn't diligent, didn't come to his calendar on time or prepared, and expected others to do his work. I expect more of a judge – whether in the Circuit Court or on the Supreme Court. I also heard from others who I also know and who wanted me to vote for him because he was a liberal, just like I am, or because it would make the governor look bad if the Senate turned him down. Now, in the governor's defense, nobody from the administration suggested that to me – just zealous supporters.

"When I talked to the nominee, I raised some of those questions. All were denied. But that nagging doubt in my stomach continued. Then, he invited me to speak with folks in the community I greatly respect to vouch for his veracity. I did; they didn't.

"When I listened to and read the testimony, one piece of testimony stood out for me. It was the testimony of litigator Janice Kim. She recounted her encounters with Judge Wilson in

that testimony in support of his nomination on March 15. However, in so doing, she brought into question his judicial ethic. According to her testimony, she had a personal relationship with the nominee in 2008, after her divorce. In 2011, she represented clients in a lawsuit in which Judge Wilson sat in as a substitute justice. The case eventually was decided in Ms. Kim's clients' favor. Based on my understanding of the Code of Judicial Conduct, it seems that Mr. Wilson should have declined to sit on that case because of a personal relationship with one of the attorneys in the case. I'm told that in a situation of judges sitting as substitutes to the Supreme Court, such judges are given a list of all the parties and their counsel and must acknowledge that they have no personal relationship with any of the parties to ensure there is no potential conflict of interest or favoritism. In an abundance of caution, it seems to me that Judge Wilson should have declined to sit on that case.

"Madam President, do we want the best possible candidate for the Supreme Court? I think we do. There are simply too many questions surrounding this nominee for me to conclude that he represents the best, brightest, and most diligent. I have to vote 'no.' In that regard, I ask that the statement of the Senate Women's Caucus submitted to the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* be submitted into the Journal.

"There's another aspect to this nomination. I have to question the process, and offer to my colleagues that our judicial selection and confirmation processes are flawed. Much has been made about anonymous testimony or assertions. Since I personally knew some of the people who had concerns and expressed them to a number of us, those complaints weren't anonymous but confidential. Those personal observations questioned his diligence, treatment of others, and work ethic. I find it interesting that we want to uphold confidentiality for lawyers and judges – that's okay – but not for subordinates whose careers may be in jeopardy as well.

"The chair and some committee members made much of the fact that those complaining didn't come forward. May I offer some thoughts on this topic? As difficult as it is to imagine, not everyone is in a position to offend their bosses or, if early in their legal career, to offend those in power. Those of us with power sometimes lose touch with those who are without it. That makes it our responsibility to deepen our understanding, allow for the possibility that powerlessness is immobilizing, and assist in whatever ways we can to protect against exploitation wherever it may occur.

"Our expectation sometimes is that everyone can step forward and speak truth to power. The too-easy mantra that I heard is this: 'If it happened, tell us about it. If it happened and you don't describe it, we can't help you. We won't leap to conclusions; we just won't assume anything.' But the unwritten response that I heard is, 'We discount whatever is said in confidence.'

"We don't have to assume anything. The communications I received from people that I know and know their veracity raises doubts about this nominee. The so-called 'whisper campaign' was loud and persistent. In spite of the fact that the titans of politics and the titans of the legal community came forward, plenty of our people in our community did not. They were the powerless with firsthand knowledge; they did not come forward, and those also included subordinates and others in the legal, law enforcement, and women's communities.

"I expect that this body will confirm Gov. Msg. No. 580, but we must learn from this sad chapter and reform the system. I hope the nominee will take to heart the concerns raised and strive to do better. I'd like nothing more than over the next several years to have my 'no' vote proven wrong.

"What we should be striving for is the creation of an environment where people who are unfamiliar with the legislative process, or who have little experience participating in the legislative process, can be invited to share their experiences. Circulating a hearing notice to attend a hostile hearing is hardly inviting.

"It may seem unrealistic to create such an environment, but I think that is the challenge before us, and we've failed at it so far. Procedural reforms appear to be necessary in the judiciary and the legal profession as well.

"I humbly ask the chief justice to pull together a panel of professionals within and without the judiciary and the legal community to examine the judicial selection process. I ask him to review the court's harassment policies and procedures and develop a process where subordinates in the judiciary can feel safe offering their concerns about their bosses or supervisors, even if those bosses or supervisors are judges. No one – *no one* – can be above the law. We expect more of those who apply the law than perhaps we expect of others. I make the same request of the Hawaii State Bar Association; your processes need to be reformed as well.

"Madam President, colleagues, this is not the first contentious judicial nominee that we've had, and I suspect it won't be the last. However, we need to move forward to improve the system so that all in our community are better served and the best and the brightest can rise to the highest courts in Hawai'i. Mahalo."

The Chair having so ordered, the statement of the Senate Women's Caucus as published in the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* is identified as "**ATTACHMENT A**" to the Journal of this day.

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you very much, Madam President. With due respect to the remarks of the previous speaker, I'm going to be making my own. I'd like to speak in very strong support of the Judiciary chairman's remarks. I want to thank the Judiciary chairman for taking the Women's Caucus letter seriously, and because of this, was able to extend the hearing.

"As you know, Madam President, I was in attendance at both, and if anyone should be intimidated, maybe, I guess, I should have been when the former governor came forward and accused a senator of possibly misusing my 'political power' or influence in requesting that the hearings be continued. Of course, Madam President, you've known me for many, many years, and I don't really get intimidated very easily. But I like to think of myself as a role model that's encouraging women to step forward. I know it's difficult. I owe a lot of this, I guess, to my upbringing. I was brought up on a farm and a ranch, and as you know, in my circle on the ranch, I'm known as a 'cow boss.' Now, not as a cowboy, but a cow boss, and I've always taken that quite seriously because on a ranch you're treated with respect and equality. If you can do the job, you're judged on your merit, and that's really the *nā paniolo* way of really looking at people and what people can do.

"I myself was very disappointed as women did not come forward. I myself, Madam President, who was the second female on the committee, did not receive one call from a woman or any women that felt intimidated or harassed, but I felt very compelled to support the Women's Caucus position simply because I believe that women are caught up in a situation, a very difficult situation. Many of them are single mothers and as you know, this is a very small shop, and people, especially in various professions, people do feel overwhelmed and intimidated.

“But I think as it pertains to this particular instance, and because this was the highest court in Hawai‘i, I was hoping that females would feel more motivated to come forward. I want to commend the only woman that did show up to express her mana‘o and her concerns when she was there at DLNR. But I think that through the process of the testimonies that were received, it was resolved that Mr. Wilson was not the one involved, but her immediate supervisor.

“So, with that in mind, Madam President, I’d like to urge all my colleagues to vote in support. I agree with the remarks of the previous speaker and I’ve said it verbally, at the end of the testimonies, that I think that the pilikia with this whole process really rests with the judiciary. I think that they have to examine how they are conducting – and although I agree, confidentiality is important – but there comes a moment when one has to really look at the issues. I was very happy – if I can use those words – very happy that Justice Duffy did step forward and because many of his colleagues are retired, they are willing to look into the whole process and to come up with better recommendations so that we in this body can make better decisions as we, in fact, truly represent the public.

“So, with that, Madam President, thank you very much.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in support of the nominee but with some very serious reservations. First of all, I’d like to thank the chair of the Judiciary Committee for holding the second hearing and responding to the Senate Women’s Caucus request. I’d like to thank my fellow women senators for standing up to make the request based on the statements of the Hawaii State Bar Association about the areas of concern regarding the nominee. I also want to thank the HSBA representatives on the Judicial Selection Commission for coming to that second hearing and explaining the process that they go through, the people who submitted testimony, and the people from the public who contacted us senators to give input for us to consider and weigh. And I want to thank the nominee for answering some very direct questions in the hearing.

“Perhaps because of my role as the former president of Hawaii Women Lawyers and the work that I’ve done back when I was a member of the private bar and afterwards, some people felt more comfortable contacting me than others. I have to say that some of the contact came to me after the initial Judiciary Committee vote, and although I encouraged people to call others, I think some felt that because the committee had already voted, their input may not be listened to.

“We all have to vote our conscience based on the information that we have in front of us, and I support the vote of my fellow senator and all of you. And in struggling with my own conscience and the information I have in front of me, I have decided that I would discard secondhand information or allegations that were raised about the nominee’s private life and just look at the information relating to the nominee’s role as a judge.

“Unfortunately, because we don’t have access to the performance evaluations or even the summaries of the performance evaluations, we senators are put in a situation where we cannot look to a record to validate or invalidate statements that may have been made to us privately. So, I’ve made the decision to take the nominee at his word when he answered my direct questions at the hearing and to trust the screening of the judicial selection process as described by the two representatives and vote to support his nomination with my reservations expressed.

“But going forward, many of you have sat through a number of very contentious judicial nominations. I have not; this is my

first. It’s clear to me that this process is flawed, and I’d like to echo some of the remarks that some of the other senators have but to add my own thoughts on this, too.

“It’s often been said in the military that most generals go into battle fighting the last war; in other words, you overcompensate for recent events. But the really good generals are the ones that understand that the next battle is going to be different. We now have had a number of judicial appointments where the HSBA has come forward with an ‘unqualified’ rating, and in response, we’ve reached very different votes in this body. I think there are going to be some people who are motivated to go back to HSBA to take a hard look at that process and whether it’s appropriate to allow confidential comments regarding nominees to be made as part of their process.

“I want to point out that there are confidential comments made at every level of the nomination process relating to judges. The judicial performance reviews allow attorneys to make confidential comments. They do so because they know that attorneys appearing in front of a judge are going to be very concerned that the comments that they make are going to be held against them by that judge in rulings later on. The Judicial Selection Commission process includes an avenue for confidential comments, including access to the performance reviews as well as the other due diligence that they do. The HSBA process allows for confidential comments, and many of the past presidents of the HSBA have cited their support for that confidentiality and the necessity for it, including back in 2010, when people like Rai Saint Chu, who has stepped forward to support the current nominee, defended the need to provide an avenue for members of the bar to provide confidential comments to the HSBA when they are evaluating the nominees for the courts. And our process here in the Senate also includes an avenue for confidential comments. It always has and it always will, because part of our role is to represent the public and allow not just members of the bar, but other members of the public to contact us, either formally through testimony, through appearing in hearing, or through individual confidential meetings or phone calls.

“I don’t want us to eliminate an avenue for confidentiality, and I’m going to cite an example here not because I think it relates to this nomination, but for future nominations. Several people brought forward the name of Anita Hill, and they said that you have to stand up, you have to be willing to come forward. Last week, *The New York Times* ran an article about Anita Hill because it’s been 23 years since she came forward. And what most of us have forgotten in those 23 years, including myself, is that Anita Hill did not voluntarily step forward to raise the allegations of sexual harassment against Clarence Thomas. Anita Hill had been an employee and subordinate to Clarence Thomas in two different jobs in the federal government. When the administration of George H. W. Bush was considering nominating Clarence Thomas to the Supreme Court, the FBI was doing a background check on him. The FBI contacted Anita Hill. In a confidential interview where she was promised confidentiality, she shared her experience with Clarence Thomas. And after the Bush administration nominated Clarence Thomas to the bench, somebody in the government leaked that confidential report to the press, where it was published. After it was published, the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee called Anita Hill forward, where she was clearly a reluctant witness.

“Moreover, Ms. Hill at the time was a tenured professor, and I believe she was living in a different state than the nominee for the Supreme Court. So as she testified, she knew that she was not going to have to go home and live and work in close proximity to the nominee and she wouldn’t have to appear in front of him in his role as a judge. And even then, Ms. Hill, according to that *New York Times* report and the documentary

that's coming out on her, received death threats; received attempts to take her out of her job, even though she was a tenured professor; and felt uncomfortable for many years afterwards.

"Anita Hill's experience is not an example that we can use as a parallel for our process here in Hawai'i. And as we go back and take a look at how to re-examine this judicial selection process and the confirmation of the nominees, I think it's very important that we maintain an ability for people to bring forward confidential information. What we need to focus on is how do we better weigh, evaluate, verify, and validate the information that comes forward in that confidential manner, because we do have to be fair to the nominees as well.

"I applaud the efforts of retired Justice Duffy and others to go back and take a look at the bar association process. I encourage them to involve younger people in that evaluation. What's become clear to me as my daughters are growing – I have a 21-year-old and a 17-year-old – they have very different standards about what's acceptable conduct. We see that in polls relating to attitudes towards same-sex marriage. People in my generation or older, maybe fewer than 40, 50 percent support it, but when you take a look at the younger generation, you see something like 80, 90 percent support. They have a very different standard of conduct that's acceptable, and I think as we evaluate this process, it's important that we bring the younger professionals into that consideration.

"I also would like to encourage that we engage in a discussion with the chief justice of the Supreme Court to find out if there is a way that we can – without creating a chilling effect on the confidential nature of the information that they have – access some form of records or evaluations to help us in our weighing and validation of the individual comments that we receive regarding sitting judges.

"I think the other thing that we need to revisit is the length of time that we have in making this determination; 30 days is very short. I understand it is under the Constitution and may require an amendment, but I think in order to give the bar, the public, and the members of this Senate more opportunity to judiciously weigh the information, we may need a little bit more time, 45 to 60 days, and would encourage further discussion on that topic as well.

"Thank you, Madam President, for the opportunity to make these remarks."

Senator Slom rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you. First of all, I want to thank the Judiciary chairman, not only for the way the hearings were conducted, but also for his comments today about sexual harassment and about any charges that were brought forth.

"Having said that, let me say that I've known the nominee for several decades. He's a Democrat; I am not. He is a liberal; I am not. He apparently got close to Miss Universe; I did not. But I know his integrity and I know his experience, and we've seen him as a presiding judge in the First Circuit. We've seen him in action. We've seen countless numbers of people come forward to testify, men and women – and you know, I have to say I'm a little sad that this has become a 'woman versus man' kind of issue because it's not. It's an issue of experience. It's an issue of serving the people.

"I must say, in my limited experience, Madam President, I only admire and love strong women, and I see many, many, many strong women in our community, many in our body here. I do not understand that not one woman could come forward other than the DLNR employee, who was totally discredited in her testimony by her supervisor. I cannot understand this so-

called climate of fear among and between attorneys because attorneys, in fact, do have things that they can do if they suspect or allege retribution. All this talk about 'somebody's going to take it out on anybody that testified' is hearsay and conjecture. We do not have any examples of that happening before, but we do have remedies.

"The nominee met all eight criteria of the Hawaii State Bar Association to the extent that no negative information was given by them in detail or by anyone else. Some of the information that was alleged was, on this day, Madam President, purely blarney. And what we saw over the last two weeks, with hushed whispers and alleged confidentiality, was a public colonoscopy of a judge who deserves better. I am all for people standing up and being contrary to anyone or any issue. There was plenty of time to do this. The process revealed even more the dysfunction of the Hawaii State Bar Association and their procedures. I have been involved in my 18 years in the Senate in many, many Senate confirmations. I have been very critical of their process. While there were suggestions that they were going to make changes, no important changes, in fact, have been made. So, we can all join hands in saying that there need to be changes.

"Probably the most bizarre statement of all came on Saturday, when we spent six hours in our second hearing. I asked the incoming president, or president-elect, of the bar association if he thought it was fair that the nominee, in fact, was denied due process, which was acknowledged. And the answer, incredible to me and to members of the committee and to the public that were there, was, 'Due process is reserved for criminal actions only.' How shameful.

"And this whole idea that this nominee, first of all, received initially a 'highly qualified' rating when that rating was available, and then subsequently a 'qualified' rating on the bench when the 'highly qualified' was discontinued, and now all of a sudden received an 'unqualified' rating, brought to mind a number of former candidates for judicial selection who, because of the action of the Hawaii Bar Association, were denied the opportunity to serve the people of Hawai'i. Probably most prominent among that long list was Kate Leonard. I think the community suffered because of that. I think women suffered because of that, but I note that all women voted against Kate Leonard's nomination.

"So, we have to get over this and get the politics out of this. Let's hold nominees absolutely accountable to the criteria. Let's talk about their experience. Let's talk about their judicial demeanor, their professionalism. Every question – as bizarre as those questions were on Saturday – every question given to the nominee was asked and answered. Everything that we would've known or should've known or could've known or wanted to know about this nominee was answered in this timeframe.

"I believe in confidentiality. All of us in this room, I'm sure, have been approached by people referred to as 'whistleblowers,' people who have come forward, some of us more than others. But in this case here, we are still left with no evidentiary substance, not one iota. And the fact that an individual member of this Senate body may have talked to people, but that that information was not available even in a confidential manner leaves us with allegations, innuendo, and falsehood.

"The only thing we should be concerned about is the nominee's character, experience, and whether or not he or she will serve the best interests of the people – all the people, men and women – in his or her responsibilities as justice. And is there a difference between being a Supreme Court justice and a Circuit Court or District Court nominee? Yes, there is. Should there be a higher standard? Yes, there should. But we only have the information given to us and asked for, and if we can't get it

and if we have asked every question of the nominee and that nominee has answered that question, and nearly a hundred people came forward in his support, then why do we still have questions?

“Ms. Arnett, the public defender, was brought up earlier, and I thought her testimony on Saturday was extremely compelling. And in her role, if anyone – *anyone* – would have come forward or come to her, or if she would have known or suspected anything about this nominee, it would have come out, but it didn’t. And a rational person must conclude there’s nothing there – nothing at all.

“So, we’re left with a nominee who men and women came forward to support; who, when asked, ‘What is the biggest weakness of this nominee?’ they said, ‘Probably his over-compassion and the time that he devotes to individuals and the fact that he has been open and accessible and willing and able to meet anyone on campus or off campus.’

“This nominee will be confirmed today and will prove to be a justice that we need on our State Supreme Court. He brings humility; experience; professionalism; the background from a small law firm rather than a highly connected, political law firm; and he brings the ability to have a strong voice and a strong effect on justice in Hawai‘i. And after all, what’s this all about other than fairness and justice for all? Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Thank you. Let me explain why I rise in support. I think some of the statements made by the senator from Maui – who I have a lot of fond aloha for – are the kinds of statements that may be played up by the media who is present; and I want to make a few remarks because of some of the comments she made which may be played up.

“So, let me start. The question was raised, ‘Was he the best?’ We’ll never know. That decision does not rest with us. The governor is given six names, and it’s not our choice to choose: it is the governor’s.

“A second remark was made up with respect to the time afforded this body: 30 days by Constitution. Just so everybody knows, when the six names were submitted to the governor from the Judicial Selection Commission, I took it upon myself to ask the governor to take his time so that the Senate would be afforded more time from when the clock began to toll 30 days so that the Senate could look at all six without presuming who the governor’s selection was, and the Committee on Judiciary could be afforded as much time as possible. The governor asked me, ‘How much time?’ My response to him was, ‘As much time as you can afford the Senate.’ My recollection is he had a trip to the National Governors Conference some time in late February. I asked him to send the name down as he was leaving, and he did. In essence, it afforded the Senate more time than 30 days, regardless of the Constitution.

“Comments have been made with respect to the flawed process as imperfect, and you’ll get no argument from anyone on this floor. But this process, this longstanding process, has been flawed since time immemorial and it, in my opinion, will not be fixed. But the process, to me, was even more flawed with this nominee because for the first time since 1982, when I was first elected to public office, the flawed process included the chief justice himself. All of you know – because all of you have received everything that I have sent out or received a copy of, all of you – and all of you know that when the Senate Women’s Caucus sent me their letter of concern, I did not interpret it to the chief justice; I sent it as an attachment. And all of you know that when the response came from the judiciary, it was signed not by the chief justice, but by the administrative director of the

courts. There’s a message there. There is a message there! And all of you know that that letter signed by the administrative director of the courts did not emphatically say one way or the other whether he was permitted to release Rule 19 information. There is a message there from the administrative director of the courts. There is a message there! So, the process that has been described as flawed is made profoundly more flawed by the highest member of the third branch of government, the judiciary. This is unbelievable.

“With respect to Janice Kim, in a letter dated March 14, way in the middle of the letter, she said this; I’m going to quote it:

My other interaction with him [meaning the judge] was personal. I apologize in advance if this is the proverbial “more information than you need” scenario. I was divorced in 2008 and kindhearted friends thought I should date. They picked Judge Wilson as the first victim. We didn’t hit it off, which would be reason enough for me to testify at odds with his nomination. However, I can tell you that I was already a civil rights lawyer. I am keenly aware of power issues between men and women, and I cannot help but evaluate that in every interaction. I simply didn’t detect any misogyny in my brief encounter with Judge Wilson. I found him to be respectful, gracious, and amiable.

“I want to also make comment with the propriety of Judge Wilson to sit as an interim member of the Hawai‘i Supreme Court, a substitute justice, in the case Ms. Kim argued in 2011 called *Steigman v. Outrigger Enterprises*, Supreme Court No. 28473. I’m going to read her remarks:

Judge Wilson asked one question indicative of his viewpoint. He asked how a sitting trial judge would properly instruct a jury if the law that I advocated [meaning Ms. Kim] were changed in the manner I proposed. This question was extremely astute: Judge Wilson brought to the floor the day-to-day issues the trial judge and the litigants would confront given my proposed change to the law. A trial judge would be faced with the dilemma of how to translate my changes into reasonable instructions to a jury and judge, and Judge Wilson knew it. As a litigator, I would come up against the same challenge, and Judge Wilson knew it. It was a good question, and his view from the bench bodes well for all of us who toil daily with the vagaries of how to give life to concepts expressed in legal precedent. This makes me believe Judge Wilson would be an asset to the Supreme Court.

“And then she said, ‘If you have heard this before, please forgive me.’

“Rule 2.11 is explicit in the Hawai‘i Rules of Court regarding recusal. What we don’t know is whether a recusal was asked of, whether a recusal was offered, or whether any such discussion on recusal took place. But I invite you to go to Hawai‘i Rules of Court, Rights of Recusal. You will see – as I have while everyone was talking, in this computer – that the sword cuts both ways on rules regarding recusal.

“I want to close with what I believe to be the only shred of evidence that questions Judge Wilson, and that is – and all of you have it – in a series of emails from an individual named Dave Holzman. Mr. Holzman has asserted that he himself was a party to a proceeding in bringing a complaint before the Office of Disciplinary Counsel 20 years ago. He described the situation, as all of you well know, which he asserted was bad conduct by the nominee when he represented a client as a private attorney; and Mr. Holzman described the complaint in

great detail to all of you. Mr. Holzman even identified the investigator for the ODC. I gave a call to this individual; he has not returned my call. In the latest email from this individual, Mr. Holzman identified the law firm that represented him, and the law firm is the law firm of William McCorriston. He did so this morning, and I called Mr. McCorriston's firm this morning. Mr. McCorriston's executive secretary said it was her opinion that no such files longer than 10 years are kept by the law firm, so I asked her to please take another look. I just received this information from Sergeant-at-Arms, I presume from one of my clerks, and it says, 'McCorriston's firm has nothing on their files on this matter. Mac also does not recall anything. Pua said,' that's the executive secretary, 'if there was anything, it would have been destroyed since it was so long ago, and if you want to speak to her...' and then she left a number.

"I'm not sure that there is a stone that hasn't had at least an effort made to unturn it. If this in fact happened, which seems to be quite possible, the Hawaii State Bar Association still found the nominee highly qualified. The Judicial Selection Commission evidently in 2000, with the consent of the bar in 2009, found the nominee qualified on retention. On page 19, and this is the nominee's questionnaire to the Judicial Selection Commission, on professional responsibility, 'Have you ever been admonished, disciplined for a breach of code of professional responsibility, a breach of the guidelines of professional courtesy and civility for Hawai'i lawyers, professional misconduct, or professional negligence?' Respondent: 'No.' 'Have you ever been found by a court, administrative body, or official committee to have been professionally negligent or guilty of professional misconduct?' He answered no. I submit to you, despite our best efforts as the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, there is no reason, or in fact, every reason, to agree to consent to his nomination based on every sincere effort we have made to try to find every wart that has been alleged on this nominee.

"In retrospect, the lessons learned on this particular nomination are not happy ones. I feel very sorry for others in private practice or presently presiding as a jurist who may even consider to be a jurist on a higher court or a jurist, period. This display of what has happened with this particular nominee is shameful. And this is not to discredit those who choose not to come forward, but in fact, to acknowledge those who choose not to come forward that because of that decision, we have been left with rumors, innuendo, aspersions cast against an individual's character that, as Chris Yuen said, were laid in the shadows and limited us to fighting with ghosts. There is nothing that this committee, in my humble opinion, has not undertaken to put him under the heaviest scrutiny that I have ever participated in because, like all of you, I take this responsibility very seriously.

"I am very sad at the kinds of allegations that have been leveled against an individual who elected to be considered to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Slom rose to request a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Ayes with Reservations, 2 (Kidani, Thielen). Noes, 1 (Baker). Excused, 1 (Wakai).

At this time, Senator Hee introduced newly confirmed Associate Justice Michael Wilson, as well as supporters including his father, Don Wilson; his mother, Linda Wilson; retired Judge Michael Town; Judge Karl Sakamoto; Judith Ann Pavey; Carol Acoba, wife of Associate Justice Simeon R.

Acoba, Jr., and her grandchildren, Liko and Lehua Acoba; judicial assistant Alden Kau; the DeSoto 'ohana; and Denise Antolini, professor of law.

At 1:08 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:20 p.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

#### RE-REFERRAL OF A HOUSE BILL

The Chair re-referred the following House bill that was received:

Senator Kahele, Chair of the Committee on Tourism, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 1671, H.D. 1 and H.B. No. 2434, H.D. 2.

Senator Kahele noted:

"Your chairs of both Committees on Tourism and Water and Land agree that the public discussion on this measure is necessary to better craft a plan on caring for our state natural resources. It leaves the amount of the TAT to DLNR at \$3 million and it allocates the funds to the Special Land and Development Fund.

"H.B. No. 1671: After deep consideration, your Committees on Tourism and Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs have decided to hold a public hearing on this measure to continue the discussion specifically regarding the transient accommodations tax. This measure removes the cap on the appropriations to the counties and replaces it with a percentage."

The Chair granted the waivers.

Senator Kahele announced that the Committee on Tourism and the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs would hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 1671, H.D. 1 on Wednesday, March 19, 2014, at 2:40 p.m. in Conference Room 229.

Senator Kahele also announced that the Committee on Tourism and the Committee on Water and Land would hold a public hearing on H.B. No. 2434, H.D. 2 on Wednesday, March 19, 2014, at 2:35 p.m. in Conference Room 229.

Senator Tokuda rose to announce that Education Week would continue the following day with events celebrating the University of Hawai'i's Community Colleges' 50 years of service including a fashion show and demonstrations of culinary arts, robotics, and agripharmatech.

Senator Espero extended condolences to Senator Wakai on the passing of his father on behalf of the members of the Senate.

**Possible unfitting behavior toward women should not be ignored**

The intent of the Women's Caucus memo that resulted in a second confirmation hearing for Circuit Judge Michael Wilson was to address the concerns of misconduct toward women in the workplace that recently surfaced.

This is also a matter of fairness to Wilson, as he deserves an opportunity to respond to the testimony the Hawaii State Bar Association (HSBA) submitted after the first hearing.

More detailed questions about Wilson's work history have been raised, stemming from the negative comments from HSBA which cited "work ethic concerns, a lack of professionalism in the workplace and questions concerning the propriety of conduct toward women in professional contexts, and the ability to serve at the level of Supreme Court justice."

Lawmakers will hold a hearing Saturday, 11 a.m. at the state Capitol in Room 16, to allow people with concerns to step forward.

The caucus recognizes that Wilson is highly regarded by many reputable people in our community and has done many wonderful things in his career. However, we do believe that issues and concerns related to the treatment of women in the workplace should never be ignored. We have an obligation to address these concerns.

If we did not give it a second look, we would be doing a disservice to all the work that many women have done to make sexual assault, sexual harassment and conduct toward women a public concern.

The fact is, the issue of treatment of women in the workplace is all too often dismissed, as the problem is belittled or normalized.

As female senators, we want to send the message to our society that this is a real issue that needs to be addressed. Workplace misconduct toward women is one of the most difficult and insidious issues to tackle, as most victims are in vulnerable positions and/or are afraid of retribution.

Many women don't speak up for fear of not being taken seriously.

We also want to make sure that women are given a safe place to raise these issues during a confirmation process for any position.

Our society must continue to take issues of sexual harassment, sexual assault and conduct toward women seriously in order to keep us from becoming a society that trivializes them to a point where we

accept it as the norm.

As mentioned in the memo, the Women's Caucus also supports re-evaluating the Judicial Selection Commission (JSC) screening process for future judicial applications.

Based on inquiries, it appears that some of the performance evaluations of sitting judges may not be routinely weighed by the JSC.

We want to ensure a thorough vetting before the Senate receives the nomination for consideration.

During the legislative session, the Senate has only 30 days to consider the nominee, and therefore relies heavily on the JSC to do a good job.

Senator Tokuda then congratulated Sheena Alaisa for being selected as the 2013 Hawaii Middle School Principal of the Year and the 2014 National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) National Middle School Principal of the Year while at King Intermediate School, and presented the following remarks:

"So now on Day 3 of Education Week, we definitely have some amazing educators to recognize on the floor, and I have the honor and privilege of beginning with our 2013 Principal of the Year and 2014 National Middle-Level Principal of the Year. Sheena Alaisa is the first educator from Hawai'i to be named National Middle-Level School Principal of the Year by MetLife and the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

"Sheena led King Intermediate, my alma mater, out of restructuring, creating a safe, personalized environment in which all students feel welcomed and valued. And by the way, if you go to any King student and ask them what 'SAM' means – and it's not the guy who wants to make you eat green eggs and ham – they will tell you, 'Student Achievement Matters,' and that's an outstanding accomplishment.

"I always think back to that moment when we were all huddled in the gym, waiting to surprise her with the announcement that she had won the national award. There were hundreds of students, principals from the entire complex area, teachers, community members; we all had tears in our eyes, leis in our hands, and it was all so deeply personal to every single one of us, as if we had all won that national award with her. And I think that's actually a direct reflection on the kind of leadership style that Sheena has. It's never just about her: it's always about raising up the people around her, and I think that's what makes her absolutely so special to all of us.

"I remember preparing the comments to the national committee when we were helping to support her nomination, and I remember telling them that, for me – as both an alumna, as a future parent of King Intermediate students, and as the niece of a former principal (I believe the first principal, actually) of King Intermediate School – I am most thankful and grateful to Sheena because she gave us something back that we were struggling to regain: she made us proud of our school.

"So, thank you so very much on behalf of myself, my family, and my community for giving us that back, Sheena. We are forever grateful. So, please join me in, once again, congratulating not just our Middle School Principal of the Year, but our National Middle-Level School Principal of the Year, Sheena Alaisa."

Senator Tokuda then recognized Naomi Matsuzaki of Kahalu'u Elementary School for being selected as the 2013 National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP)

Hawaii Distinguished Principal of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

“Naomi Matsuzaki is our 2013 Hawaii Elementary School Principal of the Year, but Naomi couldn’t be here today, so we actually have her outstanding principal daughter, Wendy Matsuzaki, here to accept on her behalf. Wendy is the principal of Waiahole Elementary School. Well, actually, Wendy, you’re acting principal now at King Intermediate, right? Okay.

“Naomi was awarded the National Distinguished Principal Award in 2013 by the National Association of Elementary School Principals and the Hawaii Elementary and Middle School Administrators’ Association. Naomi served as principal at Benjamin Parker Elementary School – my husband’s alma mater – and King Intermediate School and is currently the principal at Kahalu’u Elementary School. I wish we had their nationally recognized Kahalu’u ‘Ukulele Band here to perform for us, and I should mention, under Mrs. Matsuzaki’s leadership, they have been invited to play, I believe, next year in Washington, D.C. So congratulations to them, as well.

“She’s been instrumental in leading the Kahalu’u School out of restructuring and into unconditional good standing. So, congratulations again to Naomi Matsuzaki, our 2013 Hawaii Elementary School Principal of the Year.”

Senator Slom congratulated CeliaAnn Main-Anakalea of Kaimuki Middle School for being selected as the 2013 Hawaii Vice Principal of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President, and thank you, Senator Tokuda. I love Education Week. It’s wonderful, and we get to meet some wonderful people, like the person that I am honored to introduce right now: Hawai’i’s Vice Principal of the Year, CeliaAnn Main-Anakalea.

“CeliaAnn is vice principal at Kaimuki Middle School. She’s been there for seven years, and everyone agrees that she has provided a high-quality environment for the students at Kaimuki Middle School. She is respected for her collaborative leadership and she’s dedicated to supporting the involvement of families as well as community and organizations at Kaimuki. And her efforts at the school reflect high expectations for her teachers, students, and staff. CeliaAnn Main-Anakalea.

“And in the gallery, in support, we have Violet Anakalea, David Main, Roxanne Main, and David Alexander Main; stand and be recognized. Thank you all very much.”

Senator Nishihara recognized Keith Hayashi of Waipahu High School for receiving the 2013 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. At this time, I’d like to introduce Keith Hayashi, the 2013 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in Leadership awardee. Mr. Hayashi has been an educator for 25 years. He’s been the principal of Waipahu High School since 2009. He has developed several innovative programs with one area of focus being on achieving students’ career and college goals. The College Readiness Academy Success Hawaii, or CRASH (I hope it’s not indicative of the program), is another unique program developed by Mr. Keith Hayashi to help students and their parents obtain financing for secondary education.

“And at this time, I’d like to also recognize in the gallery Mr. Hayashi’s wife, Donna; Kira and Kami, their daughters; Amy Hayashi, his mother; and Shige and Laura Honda, father-in-law and mother-in-law.”

Senator Kidani congratulated the Mililani High School “We the People” team on winning top honors at the 2014 “We the

People: The Citizen and the Constitution” program, and presented the following remarks:

“During this recognition of Education Week, it is my distinct pleasure this morning to welcome to the Senate an outstanding group of students from Mililani High School. They comprise the Advanced Placement class in government and politics that together won the top position in the state’s finals for the ‘We the People’ competition.

“That program seeks to education our young people in elementary, middle, and high schools about the rights and responsibilities of U.S. citizenship by teaching the history and principles of the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights. After having studied the Constitution and having prepared for the competition through the school year, the Mililani team appeared at the state finals on February 1. Their essays and answers to questions were presented before a panel of Supreme Court justices, distinguished members of the legal community, college professors, and others including, by the way, our own colleague, Senator Glenn Wakai. At the end of the day, Mililani High School emerged victorious and the team will now travel to Washington, D.C. late next month to represent Hawai’i in the national ‘We the People’ finals. Their part in the finals will be to testify as though at a congressional hearing on aspects of constitutional history and interpretation.

“Colleagues, there are 16 members on the winning team from Mililani; 4 of them, selected by their fellow students to represent the team, are with us on the floor this morning: Isis Osborne, Daniel Smith, Joby Celozza, and Caytlin Yoshioka. The remaining team members are seated in the gallery: Kanoë Ackerly, Gilbert Caraveo, Princess De Dios, Stephanie De Juan, Marcus Dunn, Justin Hara, Aina Iglesias, Josh Lopez, Allysen Manding, Miguel Menjivar, Joseph Tagorda, and last but not least – and you should be nice to her, because her daddy is somebody you all know – Myla Pereira. She’s the daughter of TV reporter Andrew Pereira. And also with them is the team’s teacher and coach for the competition, Dr. Amy Perruso.

“We would also like to acknowledge the Hawai’i Judiciary History Center that has coordinated the ‘We the People’ program since 1987, the bicentennial anniversary of the U.S. Constitution. For your information, Hawai’i has sent a ‘We the People’ team to Washington, D.C. every year since 1993, to compete with teams from all 50 states. Over the course of that time, Hawai’i has placed 2 teams in the top 10 and won regional and unit awards. Dr. Perruso has told me that while there are 16 young men and women on the team, the Hawai’i contingent traveling to D.C. may actually be one of the smaller teams there for the finals. That means that a couple of these students are going to have double up on their areas of expertise to effectively challenge their counterparts from the mainland, who normally have 30 on their team.

“We have every confidence that Hawai’i will be very well-represented at the finals, and we wish them Godspeed and good luck as they continue to prepare. Go, Trojans!”

Senator Tokuda rose to introduce Norris and Risha Alaiasa, members of Sheena Alaiasa’s family who were present in the gallery, as well as Department of Education Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi.

Senator Wakai rose to extend congratulations to the Mililani High School “We the People” team, who stood head and shoulders above the rest of the public and private schools. Senator Wakai judged the competition a month ago, and noted that while other schools did very well, including noted competitor Kahuku High School, the Mililani team was well-prepared and well-versed in the material, showing a thorough understanding of the history of the United States Constitution and how it applies to our lives today. Senator Wakai also

commended their teacher, Dr. Amy Perruso, for her efforts that help the Mililani team excel every year, and acknowledged the hard work of the students, teachers, and administrators in our education system.

Senator Ihara noted that the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS) was learning about the Legislative Intern Program to consider implementing it into private school curriculum, and introduced HAIS representative Lauren Calhoun of Island School on Kauai.

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I would like to add my congratulations to Mililani and to the program. And I would like to suggest that perhaps we need a couple of teams here in the State Senate – about the Constitution, knowledge of our history – and perhaps we could call on the good people from Mililani to help instruct us with that. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Solomon, Chair of the Committee on Water and Land, requested waivers of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 1823, H.D. 1 and H.B. No. 193, H.D. 1.

Senator Solomon noted:

"H.B. No. 1823, H.D. 1: subject matter chairs request this measure to be heard to continue the discussion on appraisal disputes through nonbinding mediation.

"A proposed S.D. 1 for H.B. No. 193, H.D. 1 has already been posted for public hearing. Due to new content made to the proposed S.D. 1, the subject chairs are requesting this waiver to



update the hearing notice of H.B. No. 193, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 Proposed.”

The Chair granted the waivers.

Senator Solomon announced that the Committee on Water and Land and the Committee on Judiciary and Labor would be holding a public hearing on H.B. No. 1823, H.D. 1 on Thursday, March 20, 2014, at 1:20 p.m. in Conference Room 225.

Senator Solomon announced that the Committee on Water and Land and the Committee on Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing and the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs would be holding a public hearing on H.B. No. 193, H.D. 1 on Thursday, March 20, 2014, at 3:30 p.m. in Conference Room 224.

Senator Espero, Chair of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 2521, H.D. 1.

Senator Espero noted:

“This measure provides an appropriation to remove dangerous trees or branches that pose a hazard to properties and to help clean streams and stabilize unstable rock and other land areas. We are requesting a waiver because we missed our deadline and there was some confusion on whether we were going to hear this measure or not.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Espero announced that the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs and the Committee on Water and Land would be holding a public hearing on H.B. No. 2521, H.D. 1 on Thursday, March 20, 2014, at 1:18 p.m. in Conference Room 225.

Senator Tokuda noted that Education Week activities would continue the following day with a presentation on Creating New Best Practices for Public Education in Hawai‘i, as well as R.E.A.C.H. (Resources for Enrichment, Athletics, Culture and Health) performances by students from Mililani Middle School including band, orchestra, hula and Tahitian dancing, and robotics.

Senator Wakai rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I stand here before you with much sorrow. I thought my tears were dried up already, but they aren’t. But I do want to convey to all of you, as well as the staff: thank you for your support. I’m sorry I wasn’t here for the past two days. I particularly would like to thank Senator Nishihara, who guided my Technology and Arts Committee through the past two days. For years, I’ve affectionately called him ‘my fadda,’ and now that takes on a new meaning for me.

“But I really am happy to be here with all of you today. It was a complete shock for me on Saturday, with my father’s passing. He had a brain hemorrhage; the good news is he passed in his sleep, so there was no pain. Being that I’m not a medical professional, I do think, in my diagnosis, he died of a broken heart. I was here five months ago to convey to you my sorrow when my mom passed away, and now my dad is gone. I have no parents to lean on any longer, and I appreciate the fact that I’ve been able to lean on everyone in this room as well as those outside of this room.

“For the past few days, I’ve been thinking about my particular role in this body, and I relish the fact that we’re able to create policy, direct different ways in which Hawai‘i grows. But I also take into consideration that for me, when I’m facing my end of life, I’ll be happy about the policies we’ve created,

but perhaps even more happy about the relationships that I’ve made through the course of my life. We all wish, probably, we could spend more time with those who we love, and I certainly have that level of regret that I didn’t spend enough time with my mom and dad.

“But what I was trying to convey is that when we’re facing the last days of our life, I think it’s going to be really acknowledging how many lives we’ve touched, how many lives have touched us, and not so much about the policies we created and the bickering that we have, but about the people that we’ve embraced with our sense of kindness. I’m not going to be in politics for the rest of my life – for me, politics is a pit stop in the course of my life – but what I really appreciate are the individuals here who have embraced me over my years here, and I will continue to enjoy and relish the relationships I have built here. So thank you, Senate members, as well as the staff who support everything that we do for the people of Hawai‘i.

“Thank you, Dad, for giving me this opportunity to race in the direction that I saw fit. Thank you, Dad. Thank you, God. Thank you to all of you here in the Senate.”

The Chair extended sympathies to Senator Wakai on behalf of the members and staff of the Senate, and shared that everyone’s thoughts and prayers were with him.

## THIRTY-SIXTH DAY

## Thursday, March 20, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz introduced the following guests from Mililani Middle School: Principal Elynn Chung, who was recently named 2015 Hawaii Middle School Principal of the Year; Vice Principal Errol Hahn; PTSSO President Shelly Sumile; PTSSO Vice President S.J. Melendrez; Hannah Chapman; Jeff Hortsman; Tracy Momohara; Kory Aoki; Zach Wood; and Kumu Noelani. Senator Dela Cruz noted that Mililani Middle School was the recent recipient of a \$45,000 R.E.A.C.H. (Resources for Enrichment, Athletics, Culture and Health) grant, and welcomed students who were at the Capitol that morning to showcase the diverse, high-interest program.

Senator Kidani rose to praise Mililani Middle School for providing opportunities for learning and growth through programs like the R.E.A.C.H. after school program; and thanked Principal Chung, the administrators, and the teachers for their efforts to build excellent foundations for students so they can continue to achieve at schools like Mililani High School, which is among the top schools in the state for civics, science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

Senator Thielen welcomed Principal Ed Noh of Lanikai Elementary School, a public charter school and her alma mater.

Senator Solomon recognized the following educators from charter schools in the Fourth Senatorial District: Katie Benione from Kanu o ka 'Āina New Century Public Charter School, Taffy Wise from Kanu o ka 'Āina Learning Ohana (KALO), and Curtis Muraoka from West Hawaii Explorations Academy Public Charter School. Senator Solomon commended the committed and dedicated educators for their tremendous work in directing their schools in alignment with their own missions, and urged the members' support of their endeavors.

Senator Ruderman recognized the following educators from Ke Kula 'O Nāwahīkalanī'ōpu'u Iki Public Charter School, (also known as Nāwahī) in Kea'au: Kauano Kamana, principal of Nāwahī and professor of Hawaiian language at the University of Hawai'i; Kaleihōkū Kala'i, vice principal; Kēhau 'Aipia, chair of the governing board; and Pila Wilson, governing board member and professor of Hawaiian language at the University of Hawai'i. Senator Ruderman also introduced Kapela Eli, a teacher at the Nāwahī satellite school in Wai'anae. Senator Ruderman proudly noted that Nāwahī is a unique hybrid of a charter school for grades kindergarten to 8, a public school for grades 9 to 12, and a lab campus for the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, enrolling 550 students with a 100 percent graduation rate, of which 80 percent attend college.

Senator Ruderman also introduced Principal Dan Caluya of Nā Wai Ola Public Charter School in Mountain View, and noted that it was the only charter school in the state to become a School of Recognition according to Department of Education Strive HI performance standards.

Senator Shimabukuro acknowledged guests from Kamaile Academy in Wai'anae who were present in the gallery.

Senator Tokuda welcomed guests from the following charter schools who were present in the gallery: Leilani Roth, Oliver,

and Kalama from Hakipu'u Learning Center; Hālau Kū Māna New Century Public Charter School; Kualī'i, Kalenua, and other representatives from Ke Kula 'o Samuel M. Kamakau Laboratory Public Charter School; Usha Kotner from Kona Pacific Public Charter School; Richard Hogeboom from Kua O Ka Lā Public Charter School; Mary Beth Barr from Voyager Public Charter School; Wendy Lagareta from Wai'ālae Elementary Public Charter School; and Megan McCorriston from Ho'okāko'o Corporation. Senator Tokuda also recognized Lynn and Peter Finnegan from the Public Charter Schools Network for their assistance in organizing the day's events, as well as all advocates, friends, and family of charter schools who were present in the gallery.

Senator Gabbard recognized Bryan Rankie of Mauka Lani Elementary School for receiving the 2013 Milken Educator Teacher of Promise Award, and presented the following remarks:

"Madam President and colleagues, I would like to introduce you to Bryan Rankie, who is the National Milken Educators of Hawai'i's 2013 Teacher of Promise.

"The Hawai'i Milken Group was formed in 1996 to promote and enhance the quality of teaching and the education profession. Bryan is a resident of 'Ewa Beach and has been a fifth grade teacher at Mauka Lani Elementary in Makakilo since 2011. He became the coach of the school basketball team and track team during his first year at the school. He holds the position of the school community council co-chair and is also the fundraising chair for the parent/teacher 'ohana.

"Mauka Lani Principal Shelley Ferrara had this to say about Bryan, and I quote: 'Bryan has an excellent rapport with everyone within our school, especially the students. He has an innate ability to connect with students through their academic strengths and interests.'

"We commend Bryan for all his hard work and dedication to the education of our keiki. Again, would you please recognize Bryan Rankie?

"And also, in the gallery are Bryan's guests, Olivia Roth, Sue Roth, Mark Roth, and Nick White; please rise. Mahalo. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Wakai honored Michelle Kay of King David Kalākaua Middle School on receiving the 2013 Milken Educator Award, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. It is with great pleasure this morning that I am allowed to introduce the Milken Educator Award winner, Michelle Kay.

"Founded in 1985, the Milken Educator Award is a teacher recognition program that rewards and inspires excellence by honoring top educators from around the country. The award targets early- to mid-career education professionals for their already impressive achievements and, more significantly, the promise of what they will accomplish in the future.

"Kalākaua Middle School teacher Michelle Kay has already laid out a grand foundation. Michelle moved to Hawai'i 14 years ago to follow her love for the ocean and marine biology. Ms. Kay has been instrumental in developing programs in robotics, aquaponics, and science fairs. She is credited as the key driver of VEX Bots Program, which has captivated the imaginations and interests of her students and qualified her school for national as well as international awards.

"Ms. Kay also oversees the seventh and eighth grade Advancement Via Individual Determination, otherwise known

as AVID, college readiness program. Her high expectations, ability to mentor, and early intervention are credited for making it possible for struggling students to stay in school.

“Department of Education Superintendent Matayoshi describes Ms. Kay as ‘admired by her peers and respected by her students. Michelle’s genuine care and unwavering focus to empower each child to thrive academically and in life make her truly deserving of this recognition.’ Congratulations, Ms. Kay.

“Joining us in honoring her this morning are her guests. They are: Treena Yeung, Jessica Aschettino, Nicole Testa-Mara, Lorelei Aiwohi, as well as Brian Mar. Thank you very much, Michelle.”

Senator Wakai congratulated Laura Fukumoto of Aliamanu Elementary School on receiving the 2012 Presidential Award for Mathematics and Science Teaching, and presented the following remarks:

“I also have the honor of introducing another honoree this morning. Unfortunately, she couldn’t be here today, but we would still like to acknowledge her outstanding contributions to education. This is for Laura Fukumoto; she’s a recipient of the 2012 Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching. She could not be here today, but we, again, would like to recognize her contributions.

“Laura Fukumoto has been a teacher at Aliamanu Elementary for 40 years. Of those 40 years, she’s been teaching the fifth-grade level for 28 years. While her strength has always been in language arts, Ms. Fukumoto was determined to be able to teach and conquer the art of mathematics. Ms. Fukumoto obtained several grants, also formed study groups, and began her mastery of the arts and numbers. Her perseverance paid off as mathematics scores rose dramatically, and Ms. Fukumoto and her peers were recognized and praised in *Honolulu Magazine*.

“Ms. Fukumoto believes that mathematics is an important way to teach young children how to think and visualize. She’s a fountain of information for her peers, whether it be providing in-service training to other schools, offering workshops on Singapore math models, or helping other teachers infuse a thinking and teaching model in their own teaching.

“We recognize and congratulate Ms. Laura Fukumoto from Aliamanu Elementary School.”

Senator Dela Cruz recognized Dave Morishige of Mililani Mauka Elementary School for receiving the 2012 Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. I’m pleased to congratulate Dave Morishige, fifth-grade science teacher at Mililani Mauka Elementary School. He is the recipient of the prestigious Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching. The award recognizes teachers who develop and implement a high-quality instructional program that enhances student learning and who serve as models for fellow educators.

“Dave instituted the Lego robotics and underwater robotics clubs, both of which have earned statewide acclaim; has brought interesting and innovative science agencies such as NASA, Hawaiian Astronomical Society, and the Hawai’i Space Grant Consortium as guest speakers to the school; and organizes an annual reef walk, partnering with university doctoral candidates to help students and parents understand the marine ecosystem. Recipients of this award are leaders in the field of mathematics and science education throughout the United States.

“In the gallery today to support him are Carlene Ozaki-Morishige, Marjorie Morishige, Dennis Morishige,

Casey Morishige, and Cory Takemoto. Please stand and be recognized. Thank you for coming out to support Dave.”

Senator Taniguchi recognized Christel Collins of the Mānoa Public Library for being selected as the 2013 State Librarian of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise to recognize Christel Collins, the 2013 Librarian of the Year. Christel is the branch manager of the Manoa Public Library. She has served in the Hawai’i State Public Library System for 21 years. She is an exceptional leader who selflessly goes beyond the scope of her duties to provide outstanding service to library patrons and colleagues.

“She is an open, friendly, and thoughtful person. She listens with focused attention and has a good sense of humor. These traits played an integral role as she steered the Manoa Public Library through the years of overseeing the design and construction of a new building, including running a temporary library during the two years of construction. The new Manoa Library is a wonderful success story, for which she is grateful to her staff and patrons for their support. Again, Christel Collins, 2013 Librarian of the Year.

“I would also like to recognize supporters of Manoa Library who are in the gallery. We have Friends of Manoa Library Treasurer Kimberly Funasaki, and Hilda Comitini, the children’s librarian at Manoa.”

Senator Chun Oakland honored Edwin Kawakami of the Hawai’i State Library – Main Branch for being selected as the 2013 Librarian of Excellence, and presented the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. Thank you, Senator Taniguchi. I would like to recognize and honor today Edwin Kamikawa. He is the recipient of the 2013 Excellence in Service Award.

“The Excellence in Service Award recognizes outstanding performance by the Hawai’i State Public Library System. Edwin Kamikawa has been working as an illustrator/photographer in the Library Development Services section for nearly four decades. He has created many attention-grabbing and high-quality graphics and promotional items for all of Hawai’i’s 50 public libraries and administrative offices. He is very versatile in his body of work, and we really need to thank him for the beautiful logo, the notable Hawaiian quilt design, on the library bags and the Friends of the Library of Hawai’i logo, which is very beautiful and an outstanding example of his creativity.

“Some of Edwin’s colleagues from the Library Development Services division are here, and I wanted to recognize them, as they have such high esteem for this gentleman. With us are State Librarian Richard Burns, Susan Nakata, Susan Nakagawa, Grant Okazaki, Laurence Cabanting, and Paul Mark.

“And so, Mr. Kamikawa, thank you for your years of service. We truly, truly appreciate you. Thank you. Congratulations.”

“In the spirit of ‘bragging,’ I do want to say that my son Dan, who works for Senator Hirono, was called in from his furlough to help do the tour for the 70-something Mililani students, which he gladly came in and did without compensation. I’m glad that it went well and that they were happy, and that a Kuaa’i High School alum could help make the experience so great for the Mililani students.

“On a second point, Madam President, when I took to the rostrum after you left on Friday, I’d mentioned that the Kapa’a Middle School ‘Ukulele Band was going to be competing in Anaheim, and I’m pleased to report to the Senate – since it’s difficult for them to get here to be honored – that for the seventh consecutive year, they have come home with both the choir and band gold medals, and one of their students had a specialty award for individual recognition. So, in the spirit of Education Week, I just wanted to say that. Thank you.”



Senator Taniguchi rose to invite the members to an informational open house hosted by the National Conference of State Legislatures in Conference Room 329.

Senator Tokuda rose to note that Education Week would be concluding the following day with a book sale by the Friends of the Library of Hawai'i, demonstrations in the rotunda by a number of schools to showcase Military in the Schools, and a special performance by nationally-recognized violinists from President Theodore Roosevelt High School's Symphony Orchestra shortly before the start of the Senate floor session.

The Chair added that she enjoyed the book sale last year, and encouraged the members' participation in the events.

The Chair then made the following announcement:

"The deadline to file standing committee reports on House bills that need to pass Second Reading and move laterally to the final Senate committee is 10:00 p.m. this evening."

## THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY

Friday, March 21, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Ige and Kouchi who were excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

Senator Chun Oakland noted that March was National Professional Social Work Month, and introduced social work students and faculty from the University of Hawai'i, Hawai'i Pacific University, and Brigham Young University, as well as social workers and members of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) who were at the Capitol for their annual Legislative Day. Senator Chun Oakland recognized the Legislative Day Planning Committee consisting of Chris Slavens, Sherry Gilespe, Karissa Cheng, Aurora Buell, Kukana Kama-Toth, April Lockman, and NASW Executive Director Marty Oliphant.

Senator Chun Oakland then introduced Together We Move Forward, a group created by the members of the Ko'olau Clubhouse, with the help of Alex Santiago, for the purposes of helping members of the community feel comfortable at the State Capitol as well as expanding training and advocacy.

Senator Kidani welcomed scouts and leaders from Troop 75, and introduced Assistant Scoutmaster Jeffery Eshelman, Merit Badge Counselor Andrea Eshelman, and their sons, Ian (Boy Scout) and Evan (Cub Scout).

Senator Gabbard introduced guests from TeenPact Leadership Schools including private and homeschooled students from O'ahu, Maui, and Kaua'i; CEO Peter Martin; One Day Class Coordinator Robin Metcalf; and ten student staffers from Hawai'i, Maryland, Ohio, Texas, and Washington who were touring the State Capitol, reading and debating bills, and writing and participating in a mock legislature.

Senator Tokuda thanked the following members of her staff for their hard work during Education Week: Darlene Tsukazaki, Allen Awaya, Vaughn Tokashiki, Carol Pang, and Joanne Swearingen. Senator Tokuda and the members of the Senate extended an additional mahalo to Erin Connor for her efforts.

Senator Tokuda recognized Cherry Torres and Tammy Heck from Hawai'i P-20 Partnerships for Education, as well as representatives from the military who were present for the morning's events showcasing Military in the Schools.

Senator Taniguchi recognized and commended Jamie Labrador and Sarah Wilson, Hawai'i's participants in Carnegie Hall's 2014 Honors Performance Series, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Senator Tokuda and Senate President. It is my distinct pleasure this morning to recognize Jamie Labrador and Sarah Wilson, a pair of violinists who performed for you this morning from Roosevelt High School's Rough Rider Symphony Orchestra, who represented Hawai'i at Carnegie Hall's prestigious Honors Performance Series.

"They were the only 2 students from Hawai'i chosen, along with more than 500 high school students from across the country. This prestigious program offers elite musicians the opportunity to rehearse under master conductors and perform before an invited audience of representatives from collegiate

and professional music programs. The 2014 program was held in New York City from February 5 to 10.

"Jamie currently serves as a concertmaster in the Roosevelt High School Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Gregg Abe. She has been with the Roosevelt orchestra throughout high school and previously participated in the Kawanakoa Middle orchestra for three years. Jamie can also be found teaching privately during the weekends.

"Sarah has played the violin for the past 10 years and, like Jamie, was a member of the Kawanakoa Middle string program. She has been a member of the Hawaii Youth Symphony orchestra since the sixth grade. She is a member of the Roosevelt High School swim team and also tutors beginning violin students.

"So, Jamie and Sara, thank you for that performance.

"In the gallery this morning, Madam President, we have some of their supporters. We have Jeraldine Labrador, Jamie's mother; Daniel and Kanako Wilson, parents of Sarah; and we have Gregg Abe, who's the band teacher at Roosevelt."

Senator Nishihara congratulated Waipahu High School's LifeSmarts Consumer Education Competition Team, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President, and thank you to Senator Tokuda. At this time, it gives me great pleasure to recognize students from one of the two high schools that are in my district. In this case, they are the students from Waipahu High School who are the LifeSmarts winners.

"It's a competition that celebrates personal finance, health and safety, environment, technology, and consumer rights and responsibilities. So, it tests the students on these areas and it's sponsored by the National Consumers League, also by the DCCA and the Office of the Securities Commissioner, in partnership with the Hawaii Credit Union League.

"Anyway, it was the statewide final that pitted three high schools against each other. The Marauders' team won and they'll go on to represent the state in Florida in April. So, at this time, I'd like to recognize them and ask them if they could stand, starting with Cindy Takara, the teacher and advisor for the group; Roel Jake Ibanez; Maximiano Saldares; Mark Abuca; Marc David Ramirez; and Cia Monique Dela Cruz. Thank you and go, Marauders!"

At 11:49 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

**Monday, March 24, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Galuteria who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Slom recognized Skylar Soares, a 12-year-old recipient in the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Hawaii who was also named 2013 Entrepreneur of the Year by *Hawaii Business* magazine for realizing her dream of starting her own business, HiSky, a hat retailer that also teaches others about the importance of sun safety to prevent cancer. Senator Slom also introduced the following members of her family who accompanied her in the gallery: father Stephen Soares, mother Irma Baptiste, siblings Kalei and Kala'i, and grandparents Josie Baptiste and Eddie Coronel.

Senator Slom then recognized and congratulated the United States Small Business Administration's 2014 Small Business Award Recipients for the State of Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

"It's my lucky day, Madam President. We are very fortunate today and this week to honor businesspeople as part of the United States Small Business Administration annual awards. This is a program that I've had a pleasure and an honor to be part of for many years. The nominees are evaluated on their business acumen and leadership, giving back to the community, and many things that they do. So, today we honor them, and we have a wonderful group of awardees."

At this time, Senator Espero rose to remind the members that the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor Ceremony would be taking place in the House Chamber that afternoon at 2:00 p.m.

Senator Thielen rose to thank the members for their participation in the food plate sale, and reminded the members of the ongoing canned food drive to support the Hawai‘i Foodbank.

Senator Ihara rose to wish Senator Thielen a happy birthday on behalf of the members of the Senate.

The Chair then made the following announcement:

“The deadline to file standing committee reports on Senate concurrent resolutions and Senate resolutions that need to move laterally to the final committee is 6:00 p.m. this evening.”

At 11:55 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator Slom and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to

the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 29, to award the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor to United States military service members with Hawai‘i connections who were killed in action while serving in dangerous, volatile, and unstable areas of the world, including Iraq and Afghanistan.

### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2014, was called to order at 2:06 p.m. by the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then addressed the Chamber, stating:

“The Joint Session called pursuant to a concurrent resolution adopted by the members of the Senate and the members of the House is called to order.

“On behalf of the Senate President and all of the members of the Hawai‘i State Legislature, we honor members of the Armed Forces of the United States with ties to Hawai‘i who fought and died bravely in a combat zone designated by Presidential Order.

“Please rise for a Hawaiian blessing by Kahu Kordell C.L. Kekoa.”

At this time, the member of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and special guests rose for the Hawaiian blessing invoked by Kahu Kordell C.L. Kekoa.

The Speaker then said:

“Thank you, Kahu Kekoa. Members and guests, please remain standing for the posting of the colors by the Joint Service Color Guard and the Hawai‘i Air National Guard Royal Guard, and for the singing of the National Anthem and ‘Hawai‘i Pono‘i’ by Mr. Richard Ah Lee Sam.”

At this time, the members of the Legislature and guests remained standing for the Posting of the Colors by the Joint Service Color Guard and the Hawai‘i Air National Guard Royal Guard, and the singing of the National Anthem and “Hawai‘i Pono‘i’ by Mr. Richard Ah Lee Sam.

The Speaker thanked the Joint Service Color Guard, Royal Guard, and Mr. Ah Lee Sam for their participation in the ceremony.

The Speaker then addressed the members of the Legislature and guests as follows:

“Good afternoon, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen. On behalf of the members of the Hawai‘i State Senate and the House of Representatives, I extend to you all a warm aloha, and a special aloha to the families of those servicemen we honor today. Some of you have traveled a long way to be here, and we are humbled and honored by your presence.

“For the last eight years, the Hawai‘i State Legislature has gathered in joint session to recognize the recipients of the Hawai‘i Medal of Honor. The Medal of Honor is Hawai‘i’s expression of gratitude to those who gave their lives in the service of their nation. These citizens put themselves in harm’s way so that we could live our lives without the threat of harm. Under extraordinary circumstances, they displayed extraordinary courage. In the face of that kind of sacrifice, we are all humbled. Clearly, these four individuals and their families, whom we recognize today, honor us by their courage and commitment to freedom and their country. We honor them, not by just awarding them these medals, but by remembering why our way of life was so important to them, that we take part in the freedoms that cost them so much and, more importantly,

that we take responsibility to ensure that freedom is passed on to future generations.

“At the end of the day, it is not how they died that is important to remember, but how they lived and what they valued most. To the families of our honorees, please accept this Medal of Honor ceremony as a small token of our appreciation and admiration and our gratitude. It seems like so little in the face of such great debt, but to all of you, from the bottom of our hearts, thank you.”

The Speaker then stated:

“Before proceeding further, I would like to acknowledge the presence of our state, congressional, and military leaders.”

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature:

Representing the 9th Mission Support Command and Brigadier General John Cardwell – Colonel John Ellis;

Command Chief Master Sergeant Robert Lee, Senior Enlisted Officer, Hawaii National Guard; and

Command Sergeant Major Dana Wingad, Senior Enlisted Officer, Hawaii Army National Guard.

At this time, the Speaker stated:

“Let’s acknowledge these fine state, congressional, and military leaders and all the other military personnel today. Please give them a hand.

“And finally, if I may, I would like to acknowledge and say thanks to Representative Mark Takai for proposing this ceremony many years ago, as Hawai‘i’s way as a state to say thank you.”

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and special guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i.

Governor Abercrombie addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Aloha, everyone. Mr. Speaker, as you mentioned, we have had this ceremony for a little less than a decade now. Some members, I believe, have been here virtually all of that time; some may be new to this ceremony. It, I suppose, is of some interest, in an academic sense, that we are hoping that the numbers continue to diminish in terms of those who will be respected and recognized and honored today. It is, again, perhaps of academic interest that we hope that the ceremony may, in fact, not need to be held at some point in the near future. It is, of course, of deeply personal and emotional interest to all of us and to all the people of this state, that the ceremony is held at all.

“Because it has taken place over the better part of a decade, I suspect that we may be able to categorize it at the level of a ritual: that we gather together in every session at some point during the session to see to it that the recognition takes place. Human beings distinguish themselves by engaging in such ritual. We have as a result of our capacity to make judgments about ourselves and about our lives and how we conduct ourselves and what we value in terms of how we recognize one another – we understand that such rituals, then, are essential. They take place not simply because they are repetitive and familiar to us, but we engage in them because it gives us a visceral reminder of who we are and why we do what we do, particularly for those of us who are on the margins of what these families have experienced, and what the individuals honored today have sacrificed.

“By coincidence, just this past weekend, there was the seventy-first anniversary observation of the sacrifices that were made voluntarily by those who were in World War II with the 442nd and the attendant battalions and outfits that were associated with World War II, with December 7, 1941, and its aftermath. Again, it served as a reminder of what constitutes our fundamental values.

“So, for all of us here today, I want to take the opportunity to say to the families that we are one with you in support. We are one with you in understanding that what you have given, and what your loved ones have given, brings honor to those best features of ourselves as human beings.

“In my years as a member of the Armed Services Committee and in my present capacity as commander in chief of the National Guard, I’ve had occasion on more than one instance such as this to be caused to reflect on what it is that we truly value. And more than once in that time, my reference has gone to Shakespeare and his observations, particularly where the question of courage, where the question of honor, where the question of valor was at issue. I would like to extend, on behalf of all here, to the families, this quotation from *The Tempest*:

I and my fellows  
 Are ministers of Fate: the elements,  
 Of whom your swords are temper'd, may as well  
 Wound the loud winds, or with bemock'd-at stabs  
 Kill the still-closing waters, as diminish  
 One feather that's in my plume: my fellow-ministers  
 Are like invulnerable.

“The temporal existence of those we honor today may have passed, but our memories and our honor and our respect are like invulnerable.”

The Speaker thanked Governor Abercrombie, then called upon Major General Darryll D.M. Wong to deliver his remarks on behalf of the military.

Major General Wong addressed the Joint Session and guests as follows:

“Governor Abercrombie, Lieutenant Governor Tsutsui, Senate President Mercado Kim, Speaker Souki, members of the State Legislature, fellow flag officers and members of the armed services here, family and friends of our honored heroes: good afternoon and aloha. We are here today for an important and a solemn ceremony, one that we can only hope, as the governor had said, will be held for the last time. Our nation has been engaged in continuous combat for the past 12 years, and the Hawai'i State Medal of Honor was conceived to honor those who gave their lives serving in Iraq, Afghanistan, and neighboring countries over these past twelve-and-a-half years. We still do not know how many American forces will remain in Afghanistan after December of this year. The only thing we know at this time for sure is that the number of U.S. servicemen and servicewomen deploying to contingencies after this year will be significantly smaller than today.

“As one of the leaders in the Hawaii National Guard and, more importantly, as a resident and as a father, I look forward to the day when all of our Hawai'i-based troops are safely home. We still have Hawaii National Guardsmen deployed, flying CH-47 helicopter missions, as well as soldiers flying surveillance aircraft. And it was one of these missions in January that Hawaii Army National Guard soldier Sergeant Drew Scobie paid the ultimate price. His widow, McKenna, and son, Duke, and many others of their family are here with us today. Visiting McKenna was the most difficult task I've ever had to perform in my four decades of service in uniform, and especially as the adjutant general this year. Yet that task pales in comparison to the burden of a family that has lost a loved one. The presentation of this Medal of Honor is a small token that we, collectively as a state, can bestow to provide some closure to these families who are with us today. We resolve to ensure that these families shall always be part of our state family, and the sacrifice made by your loved ones will always be remembered.

“This ceremony is the culmination of efforts of many, and as a precursor to what, I hope, will be our last ceremony, I'd like to especially thank two gentlemen for their actions that made this ceremony possible. The first has already been recognized by our governor: Representative Mark Takai, who is also a lieutenant colonel in the Hawaii Army National Guard. He was the casualty assistance officer for the family of our first Hawaii National Guard casualty in Iraq, and shortly after that, he proposed the establishment of the State Medal of Honor. His office has been instrumental in the coordination of this and of all previous ceremonies.

“The second is Specialist First Class (retired) Aaron Pollick, who retired from the Hawaii Army National Guard just a few months ago. Aaron was the principal designer of the State Medal of Honor. He drew upon his vast knowledge of the military and Hawaiian history to design a fitting tribute to

Hawai'i's heroes. The gold star in the Hawai'i State Medal coat of arms represents the star of the fiftieth state on the American flag. It is also a reminder of the gold star displayed in the windows of American homes from past conflicts. The attachment device in the red and yellow ribbon is a rendering of the ancient puela, or flag, that Hawaiians raised above the sails of their canoes. Anyone who saw the puela from afar knew that a person of the highest rank was coming. Today, the service ribbon and its puela remind us that these families are the highest rank and honor. The kalo, or taro, leaves in the medal symbolize the embrace of the people of Hawai'i as one 'ohana.

“Today, when relatively few Americans have family members in uniform, when even fewer have lost a loved one, there may be times when you may feel all alone, that no one understands your pain, and that few appreciate the ultimate sacrifice that your husband, father, son, brother, daughter has made on our behalf. Although none of us can truly feel the pain of your loss, the one thing you can be sure of is that you are not alone. It doesn't matter whether a sailor or soldier or airman, Marine, or Coast Guardsman grew up in Hawai'i or called Hawai'i home for a short period of time: they are a part of the fabric of this community. And it doesn't matter whether the families of our heroes were from Hawai'i or from the mainland: your loss is our loss. So, it is with great humility that we present these Medals of Honor to these families who are, and always will be, a part of our 'ohana. Mahalo.”

The Speaker then stated:

“Thank you, Major General Wong, for your leadership. Mr. Clerk, please begin the announcement of the Hawai'i Medal of Honor recipients.”

At this time, the House Clerk proceeded to read the names of the following individuals who were represented by family members and friends to receive their medals and certificates:

United States Army Sergeant Tofiga J. Tautolo: Sergeant Tautolo was 23; was born in Pago Pago, American Samoa; and was from Wai'anae, Hawai'i. He served with the 3rd Squadron, 61st Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division from Fort Carlson, Colorado. Receiving his medal were his father, Foa Thomas Tautolo, and his stepmother, Tia Tautolo.

United States Air Force Captain Reid K. Nishizuka: Captain Nishizuka was 30, from Kailua, Hawai'i, and served with the 427th Reconnaissance Squadron from Beale Air Force Base, California. Receiving his medal were his mother, Karyn Hatakeyama; his stepfather, Deane Hatakeyama; and his brother, Reyn Nishizuka.

United States Army Sergeant Drew M. Scobie: Sergeant Scobie was 25, from Kailua, Hawai'i, and joined the Hawaii Army National Guard in 2009. He served with the Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 487th Field Artillery from Wahiawā, Hawai'i. Receiving his medal were his wife, McKenna Panui-Scobie; his son, Duke Scobie; and his mother, Karen Tao.

United States Army Chief Warrant Officer 2 Edward Balli: Chief Warrant Officer Balli was 42; from Kapolei, Hawai'i; and served with the Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, 2nd Cavalry Regiment, United States Army Europe from Vilseck, Germany. Receiving his medal were his, wife Kristy Balli; his daughter, Momilani Morales; and his son, Michael Donios.

The Speaker then said:

“Members of the Senate and members of the House, please recognize and thank the recipients' family members, friends, and colleagues who have joined us in the Chamber today.”

The members of the Legislature rose in applause to thank the participants in the ceremony.

The Speaker then directed the Senate Clerk to announce the names of those honored in previous years, whose Gold Star Families were present.

The Senate Clerk proceeded to read the names of the following individuals and Gold Star Families:

United States Army Sergeant Eugene Williams, 24, from Waipahu, Hawai'i, who served with the 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division from Fort Stewart, Georgia. Present in the Chamber were his wife, Brandy Williams, and his daughters, Mya and Monica Williams.

United States Army Specialist Kyle K. Fernandez, 26, from Pearl City, Hawai'i, who served with the 2nd Battalion, 5th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division (Light), Schofield Barracks, Hawai'i. At this time, Senate President Kim addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Thank you, all of you, for being a part of this ceremony for our fallen heroes. The citizens we honor today answered the nation's call to duty. They volunteered to fight our battles, to put themselves in harm's way, to leave behind families, friends, and the comforts of home to serve our country. They made the greatest sacrifice any citizen could. So, we mourn this loss. We join in expressing our gratitude to the families and loved ones they left behind.

"Hawai'i is indebted to those of you here today for being a part of our island community and for the many personal sacrifices you have made and continue to make. The medals we presented are symbols of our recognition of the gallantry and heroism of the individuals we honored this afternoon. They represent the spirit of aloha of the people of Hawai'i, a spirit we hope you take with you wherever your future lies, and which we hope will endure in your hearts for years to come. They symbolize, above all, our deepest appreciation of our founding ideals and what it took to defend them. Mahalo nui loa. May your journeys be safe, secure, and filled with the blessings of aloha."

The President then announced:

"Members of the Senate and House, our special guests and audience, please rise as I turn your attention outside to the Capitol Rotunda for the 3-Volley Salute and the playing of 'Taps,' which will be followed by a moment of silence in honor of our fallen heroes. Members of the Hickam Base Honor Guard, please proceed."

A 3-Volley Salute and "Taps" were then carried out by the Hickam Base Honor Guard.

The President then stated:

"Members and guests, please remain standing for the retiring of the colors."

At this time, the members of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature and special guests remained standing for the Retiring of the Colors by the Joint Service Color Guard and the Hawaii Air National Guard Royal Guard.

The President said:

"Members, guests, family and friends: thank you all for your participation here today. There being no further business, I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 2:59 p.m., Senate President Kim declared the Joint Session adjourned.

**Thursday, March 27, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Solomon who was excused.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Galuteria welcomed a group of students from the McKinley Community School for Adults who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Kouchi introduced the following representatives from the Kaua'i Chamber of Commerce: Randy Francisco, president and CEO; Caroline Texeira, executive vice president; and Chantal Zarbaugh, executive assistant.

Senator Kouchi also welcomed Christian Naea, supervisor for the students from the Boys & Girls Clubs on Kaua'i; Luke Rita, Boys & Girls Kapa'a Clubhouse; and Grace Peralta, Boys & Girls Lihue Clubhouse.

Senator English introduced Nasimi Aghayev, Consul General of Azerbaijan in Los Angeles, who was accompanied in the gallery by State Representative Rida T.R. Cabanilla.

Senator Shimabukuro welcomed Lala Fernandez and Kekoa Tupua of the Boys & Girls NFL YET Nanakuli Clubhouse, as well as Lana Keamo of the Boys & Girls Wai'anae Clubhouse.

Senator Thielen acknowledged Maureen Purington of the Boys & Girls Windward Clubhouse who was present in the gallery.

Senator Slom introduced Delorese Gregoire, founder and director of Winners' Camp, a residential camp program in Hawai'i for teens and 'twens'; and Ruriko and Michael Randolph, owners of and teachers at The MR English Language School in Kiryu City, Guma Prefecture, Japan.

Senator Baker congratulated the 2014 Boys & Girls Club Youth of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I'm pleased to be a part of recognizing this outstanding group of youth in our chambers today: the Boys & Girls Clubs of Hawai'i. For those of you who may not know, the Hawai'i Alliance of Boys & Girls Clubs is a consortium of three organizations: Boys & Girls Club of the Big Island; Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i, which includes O'ahu and Kaua'i; and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Maui. Each year, youth at the Boys & Girls Club across Hawai'i compete at the local level for a chance to be selected as a finalist for the Hawai'i State Youth of the Year competition, and those are our honorees on the floor today. In order to participate in this prestigious national youth recognition program, candidates must do well in school, lead healthy lifestyles, and contribute to their clubs and communities.

"So today, we have the pleasure of recognizing these outstanding teens from the Hawai'i Alliance of Boys & Girls Clubs, as well as our military institutions, who have been selected as Hawai'i finalists from their clubhouse for their leadership, resilience, and commitment to serve their families, communities, and their club organizations.

"But before I turn it over to my colleagues to introduce our individual finalists on the floor, I wanted to take this opportunity to recognize some of their adult leaders who have joined us in the gallery, as well as some of the others. First, the

chief professional officer from the Boys & Girls Club of Maui is Colin Hanlon; from the Big Island is Zavi Brees-Saunders; and from the Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i that serves Kaua'i and O'ahu, Mr. Tim Motts. I also recognize one of our councilmembers from Maui, Don Couch, who is also a big Boys & Girls Club supporter and board member.

"And we have some of our youth who were honorees. They were considered for this recognition but did not make it to the finals, but they're deserving of recognition for all of their wonderful accomplishments and some of them have already been recognized, but let me call out the others: from the Makawao Clubhouse on the island of Maui: Jamie Gomes; from the Lāhainā Clubhouse: Aaron Naea; from the Haiku Clubhouse: Tia Bright; from O'ahu, from Wai'anae: Kamalani Kauai; from Hale Pono, 'Ewa Beach: Angela Gabriel, Katherine Lundgren-Aiwohi, and Lala Aisek; from the Big Island, Hilo Clubhouse: Jenasey Namba and Tyler Nahinu; and we had the two young people from Kaua'i. These two leaders have been individuals who have shaped many of the youth and teens within the 'Ewa Beach – West O'ahu community.

"Today, I'm very proud to introduce to you, from the wonderful, dynamic community of 'Ewa Beach, Joy Gabriel. Joy is an O'ahu native, attends James Campbell High School, and has impressed her club with her strong sense of community and volunteerism, leadership, and mentorship of others. She regularly volunteers for community-support activities including beach and community cleanups, graffiti paint-outs, and community outreach. Joy has completed more than 100 hours of service for her club. She is an active member of the Hale Pono Clubhouse Leaders in Training program and provides small business mentorship for members of the Torch Club leadership program comprised of youth ages 10 to 12. He’s volunteered at the Red Cross beach cleanup, supported disaster readiness pack drives for disabled veterans, and donated more than 300 pounds of food to the Hawaii Foodbank with the Keystone Club. He’s a garden club member and assistant for the Teen Center dances and activities. Congratulations, Preston Colón.”

At this time, Senator Espero rose to invite the members to a demonstration of the robotic lunar rover the following day in the rotunda at 1:45 p.m., and noted that a genuine space suit worn by astronaut and current NASA Administrator Charles Bolden would also be on display.

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. Today marks the fortieth day of our legislative session. That means we're two-thirds finished, but it also means we have one-third to go. Today in Ways and Means, we passed the Senate version of the budget: a \$23 million supplemental budget for the next two fiscal periods. But in that budget, we see a lot of expenditures, we see more problems for Hawai'i's families who are struggling right now, and we see that three of the outlying six years face a deficit position.

"We have to get serious about the real aspects of Hawai'i's economic situation. As I noted today in Ways and Means,

unfortunately, there's nothing in this legislative session thus far that has addressed the problems of our fallen economy, the fact that we are not creating new jobs in the private sector at the level that we need to, that we are not lowering the tax burden and the cost of living burden for our residents, that more and more people are struggling in this economy.

"So, we have one-third of this session to go. We still have a long way to go in the budget; it will go into conference committee. But I urge the members to be very cognizant of the fact that we continue to struggle in this economy and we're not doing the things that we need to do. We're not listening to the people who know how to create jobs and to encourage investment. Thank you, Madam President."

## FORTY-FIRST DAY

Friday, March 28, 2014

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Ihara, Kim, and Solomon who were excused.

The Vice President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

At this time, Senator Wakai, on behalf of Senate President Kim, Senator Chun Oakland, and himself, introduced a group of students from Governor Wallace Rider Farrington High School who were accompanied by their teachers and chaperones in the gallery.

Senator Slom recognized and commended the Niu Valley Middle School Band for outstanding achievement and performance, and presented the following remarks:

"Good morning, Mr. President and colleagues. It gives me great pleasure and honor to introduce the Niu Valley Middle School Band today. You've had an opportunity to hear them out in the atrium. They are an outstanding group of individuals, an outstanding group of students, who give us such pleasure and a break from some of the tussles that we're having with the budget and with the other problems.

"Some interesting facts about Niu Valley and the middle school band: actually, Niu Valley has two bands, two orchestras, and a Polynesian music group, as well. The band is part of the concert band, which has a total of 140 members. They are split up in different periods and hold instrument sectionals and full band rehearsals after school and sometimes on weekends and holidays in preparation for concerts and performances. I can tell you there's no harder working and musically inclined bunch of students with the passion that they have. The band admits highly motivated students from grades six through eight, who may have had no prior instrumental experience – although you can't tell – and trains them to become talented musicians.

"Having been selected to perform at the prestigious American School Band Directors Association and their national sixtieth anniversary this July in Iowa, it's a great honor and they're one of the few middle schools in the country that gets this opportunity. The band will be premiering a new work by renowned composer and conductor Brian Balmages. And aside from the year the organization, the ASBDA, held its conference in Honolulu, this is the first time that a Hawai'i band has been invited to perform at its national meeting. We're so proud of them and so grateful.

"Mr. President, I'd like to introduce some special students, members of the band seated on the Senate floor. And when I call your name, please rise and be recognized: Kylie Nakano. To show you how well-rounded the Niu Valley students are, Kylie plays clarinet, dances hula, enjoys traveling, playing card games, being with friends, and making origami – Kylie Nakano. Next is Dylan Poon: Dylan plays trombone, enjoys playing flight simulators on his computer, football, and one day, dreams of being a pilot in the U.S. Air Force – Dylan Poon. Another Dylan: Dylan Wacksman. Dylan plays saxophone, also guitar and bass for his band, 'The Wreck,' and enjoys sharing his love of music with others – Dylan Wacksman. Reina Yamashita: she plays French horn, enjoys ballet, video games, and being with friends. She speaks Japanese and wants to be a ballet teacher – Reina Yamashita. And finally, Cobe Yoshino. Cobe plays

bassoon; he enjoys bike riding and exercising and would like to be a cardiologist or a pediatrician one day – Cobe Yoshino.

"And up in the gallery, the fabulous Niu Valley Middle School Band and their supporters: please rise and be recognized. Thank you all for coming and entertaining us and making our day better."

Senator Thielen recognized educators of the Niu Valley Middle School Band for outstanding achievement and performance, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President, or President in standing. I have the honor of representing many of the Niu Valley Middle School families because the school serves the middle school students in my district, and I have the honor today of introducing the adults who have helped make this fantastic band happen.

"We have with us today on the floor – if you could please stand to be recognized – Brendan Burns, who is the acting principal for Niu Valley Middle School; and Justin Mew, who is the former principal of Niu Valley Middle, who's now gone up to Kaiser High School. Along with them is Kent Miyashiro, who is the IB coordinator for the school and a music teacher; Zachary Morita and Wayne Fanning, who are band directors – if we could give them all a hand, please, and recognize them. You obviously have the support of your band. Thank you, gentlemen, for all that you do to help this band be so excellent, the bands that preceded them, and the ones that are going to come in the future, as well.

"I believe Director Fanning is also a member of the American School Band Directors Association. The Association began in 1953, to make music an integral part of the educational curriculum, and it's an extremely prestigious and selective national organization. To become members, band directors must demonstrate five or more years of superior teaching experience and gain the endorsement of the association. So, it's wonderful that we have a band director who is a member, but also that they've been invited to play for this prestigious association. And if you could please join me in giving the students another round of applause as a thank you for the marvelous concert they gave us today. Mahalo for everything."

Senator Slom rose to make the following remarks:

"Thank you, Senator Thielen. As Senator Wakai had said earlier, 'Education Week never ends because education is our primary focus.' And we're so happy to recognize wonderfully talented, passionate young people in our public school system. So if you get an opportunity right after session, say hello to these folks. I want to thank Niu Valley again for coming and for performing and making our lives better."

The Chair recognized the parents of the band students for supporting their efforts.

At 11:48 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

**Monday, March 31, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that she had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

Senator Galuteria extended additional congratulations to the Washington Middle School Chess Club, who recently won first place at the 2014 State Scholastic Championships for the second year in a row.

Senator Shimabukuro congratulated Partners in Development Foundation's Ka Pa'alana Homeless Family Education Program on receiving full accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Aloha and good morning. On March 13, 2013, Partners in Development Foundation's Ka Pa'alana Homeless Family Education Program received full accreditation from the world's first and foremost recognized early childhood agency for excellence in education: the prestigious National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). In doing so, Partners in Development Foundation's Ka Pa'alana Program became the first program of its kind in the nation to receive full NAEYC accreditation.

"The mission of Partners in Development Foundation is to inspire and equip families and communities for success and service using timeless Native Hawaiian values and traditions. In 2007, Partners in Development Foundation recognized the need to work with the ever-increasing homeless population along the Leeward Coast. Particularly disturbing was the large amount of homeless families with young children. To address this issue, Partners in Development Foundation created the Ka Pa'alana Traveling Preschool and Homeless Family Education Program. Since then, Ka Pa'alana has assisted in transitioning 325 families from the beach to shelter and distributed over 50 tons of food and life necessities. Annually, over 900 children ages 5 and under and their caregivers receive service, and over 100 clients receive assistance in obtaining employment, including 7 who work at Ka Pa'alana as teachers, teaching assistants, and outreach assistants.

"I'd like to introduce our special guests today; could you please hold your applause until all are introduced. Representing Partners in Development Foundation (PIDF) and Ka Pa'alana here today are: Alison Masutani, vice president of operations, PIDF; Danny Goya, program manager, PIDF; Terry Nakamura, family literacy coordinator; Stacey Kauka, assistant program manager; Sweets Wright, parent educator; Kasey Galariada, lead teacher, HOPE School; and Cheryl Kekumu, currently a

teacher at PIDF's Mā'ili Land site and a former program participant.

"Also in the gallery is Danny's family: his wife, Jamie, and his daughters, Autumn and Cassidy. Can we give a round of applause for these outstanding people?"

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you. Madam President, before proceeding I would like to thank the members of the Senate Ways and Means Committee for their insights, assistance, and support in formulating this Senate draft. It is a product of the committee members, as well as other senators, that I believe we can take pride in. I would also like to acknowledge the work of the Senate Ways and Means staff. They were shy to be here this morning, but I did want to acknowledge them. As you know, Budget Chief Rod Becker and his staff have always done yeoman work in analyzing and reviewing the budget to ensure that the Senate can put forth something that we can all be proud of.

"As you know, because of the budget situation and the recent lower tax projections, the committee has formulated this Senate draft with an extra measure of prudence, sense of responsibility, good judgment, and willingness to make difficult decisions amongst the many competing demands.



“Members, I would also like to note that this is the earliest that we could find that the budget has been decked and that we’re bringing this measure forward for final reading in the State Senate. The chair and the members of the committee felt it most important with the changing fiscal situation that we provide for additional time in conference so that we can work with the House and the administration to arrive at a final budget and financial plan that provides for a sustainable future, that makes important strategic decisions and investments, that really moves our community forward.

“The Senate draft reduces the operating budget request submitted by the administration. For fiscal year 2015, the Senate draft appropriates \$105 million in all funds and \$41.4 million in general funds. Furthermore, the Senate draft reduces the appropriation for the current fiscal year, FY 13-14, by \$92.5 million, the bulk of which is in general funds.

“We have been very prudent and aggressive in reducing appropriations. We’ve identified appropriations to lapse in the current fiscal year because we felt it was very important to balance the budget and the financial plan on a going-forward basis. You know, this includes reviewing all of the provisos and we have identified \$7 million in general funds provided in proviso, which we chose to lapse in this draft so that those funds would be available as we pursue and prepare the financial plan on a going-forward basis.

“To reduce the general fund appropriations for the current fiscal year, the Senate has also repealed a number of appropriations and we’ve initiated a number of measures going through special funds and lapsing those programs as well. With these reductions, the Senate draft, the executive budget for the fiscal biennium now amounts to \$11.7 billion in all funds and \$5.9 billion in general funds for fiscal year 2014, and \$12 billion in all funds and \$6.1 billion in general funds for fiscal year 2014-2015.

“In the interest of full disclosure, please note that a portion of the \$158 million general fund reduction in fiscal year 2014 is taken from programs that the Senate intends to fund in separate bills. A reduction has been made of \$33.5 million in the University of Hawai‘i for the employment costs because the Senate has passed S.B. No. 2816, which appropriates to the university the same amount for the same purpose. Reductions have also been made to the supplemental request for the Hawaii Invasive Species Council – which, as you know, is a priority of the Senate – Kupuna Care, and other senior citizens’ programs. The Senate has passed the joint majority package bills appropriating funds for all of these purposes. Despite the cutbacks from the administration’s supplemental budget request, this Senate draft funds most of the highest priorities of the executive budget and, more importantly, priorities for the Senate.

“Preparation for this austere supplemental budget began long before the convening of the Regular Session of 2014. From monitoring actual monthly tax collections, the possibility of a potential shortfall of general fund revenues in fiscal year 2013 and 2014 became apparent. Actual general fund tax revenues from the beginning of the fiscal year lagged the projected growth rates of the Council on Revenues. The Council on Revenues also apparently was concerned about the pace of collections and other economic factors. Since September 2013, the Council on Revenues lowered its general fund tax revenue projections twice. On January 7, the council met as required by law and reduced the projection for FY 13-14 from 4.1 to 3.3 percent. Subsequent tax collections indicated the holiday season did not reverse the tax collections and the revenue further declined.

“In this financial backdrop, the Council on Revenues met again on March 11. As expected, the council reduced the

projected general fund tax revenue growth for fiscal year 13-14. Unexpected, however, was the magnitude of the reduction, from 3.3 percent to 0.0 percent for the current fiscal year, from 7.4 percent to 5.5 percent for fiscal year 2014-2015, and from 7.7 percent to 5 percent for fiscal year 2015-2016. Obviously, the council’s reduced projections resulted in a major decrease of general fund revenues expected in this and the next fiscal biennium. The projected revenue loss is \$189.5 million for fiscal year 13-14 and \$302.3 million for fiscal year 14-15. The projected revenue loss for the next fiscal biennium is even more staggering and, frankly, extremely alarming: \$484.9 million for fiscal year 15-16 and \$502 million for fiscal year 16-17. On a cumulative basis, the administration and Legislature is projected to have almost \$1.5 billion less in general fund revenues to spend for fiscal year 2016-2017.

“In whatever action we take going forward during this session, we must always be mindful of the decision making of the dismal budget and fiscal situation of the State of Hawai‘i. For this and the next fiscal biennium, state government is expected to experience negative revenues over expenditures; that is, state government will spend more than it takes in. Our annual budget will be balanced by the carryover surplus of \$844 million that we struggled to achieve in the aftermath of the Great Recession. We are facing much difficulty in the future that should not be compounded by unwise and irresponsible actions taken today. We must recognize that state government cannot fund all things for all people. We should not raise the expectations of the state departments, nonprofit organizations, special interests, and others that demand or request more funds and tax breaks from the Legislature. In sum, we must exercise fiscal restraint and responsibility.

“Although this Senate draft is austere, it funds many programs of high priority of the Senate and executive departments. Major programs, general funds for which are appropriated, include the following. We have made a priority of the Department of Education and the University of Hawai‘i and those safety net programs for those unable to provide for themselves.

“For the Department of Education, we are appropriating \$15 million for the weighted student formula. Members, this will assure that each and every school in our community will receive additional funds from this budget. In addition, we’ve provided \$2 million for the Strive HI school performance improvement system, which is critical for the completion of the Race to the Top project. In addition, we are restoring much-needed funds for the school athletics program across the state. As you know, members, these provide opportunities for many students who would not be engaged in school throughout the school year and I think, more importantly, it gives them an incentive to stay engaged and ensure academic progression throughout the school year.

“We have also made a commitment to the early learning program. We are funding more and covering more students who would otherwise be left out as we change the starting date of enrollment for many across the public school system. We are providing \$5.7 million for early learning pilot projects, including pre-kindergarten and family-child interactive learning projects.

“For the Department of Human Services, we’re adding \$5.5 million for the Pre-Plus Program to ensure that more students who are impacted by the change in the starting school date can be accommodated in the program. We are also providing \$3 million for Preschool Open Doors and \$1.5 million for the successful Housing First Program that provides some opportunity for dealing with the homeless.

“For the Department of Health, we are providing \$3.2 million for home- and community-based services waiver

for the developmentally disabled and \$1.2 million for the early intervention services. We provide additional funds for the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to help balance their budget and continue to provide quality healthcare services for our communities.

“For the Department of Land and Natural Resources, we do provide \$1.5 million in additional funds for the conservation and resource enforcement unit so that they can better protect our environment, and \$2.5 million additional funds for the watershed program.

“For the Department of Public Safety, we are providing a lump sum amount to allow them to further implement the Justice Reinvestment Initiative, targeted at reducing the population and bringing more prisoners home. In addition, we are responding to the concern about the mental health care provided to prisoners and to improve the suicide and hospital watch programs in light of the suicides that have occurred in the public safety system.

“And for the University of Hawai‘i, in addition to the \$33.5 million to cover the incremental UHPA contract, we are providing funds and positions to the University of Hawai‘i – West O‘ahu so that they can deal with the significant student enrollment increases.

“Overall, Madam President, I believe that this budget is prudent and austere, but most importantly, makes key investments in those programs that advance our community forward. I would encourage all of my colleagues to vote in support of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“In comparison, our two-year biennium for the CIP budget: We took out \$287 million in A funds, cash money, so that we could restore it for use in the operating budget, some of which was replaced with general obligation bonds. The Senate draft is \$46 million higher than the executive budget request in comparing general funds and GO bonds, but \$703 million less in comparing to the executive budget with all means of financing.

“And to continue further discussion, there are placeholders for about \$50 million or so that was requested in the Governor’s Messages for which funding was not previously requested. We have lapses of over \$50 million total, \$30.75 million of which are GO bonds.

“Highlights of the budget include: the University of Hawai‘i College of Pharmacy CIP was returned to the budget, including the UH West O‘ahu Allied Health administration building, which was also cut – that was restored; the Honolulu Community College science building. There was restoration to the cuts made to the University of Hawai‘i health and safety funding and also the R&M funding.

“With regard to the DOT, the Department of Transportation, there was reduced funding in all areas for new projects plus additional appropriations to existing projects. The revenue bonds were reduced by \$430 million from executive request, the federal funds were reduced by \$220 million from the executive request. There have been concerns and the reason for this was the concern about the possible loss of federal funds due to the lack of progress by the DOT for the current projects. Thank you, Madam Chair.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you. I certainly appreciate and understand the efforts made by the chair and the vice chair and the staff of Ways and Means, and the complexity and the difficulty in any budgetary

process, but particularly now. What strikes me, however, is when we talk about austerity; a \$23.7 billion budget is not austere. The cuts that we have made in this version of the budget to date primarily are cuts to increases in program and direct appropriations. And as the chair correctly pointed out, in addition to this supplemental budget, we also have other bills that expend additional millions of dollars.

“The Council on Revenues downgrading in their estimate should have been a wake up call, when they went from 3.3 percent to 0. But those of us who have been critical of the council over the years and looked at their track record know that they’ve had problems in the past, generally being overly optimistic. The zero percent is just exactly that: zero percent, no growth. That should have been the clarion call us that we had to get more serious, we had to cut more severely than before. A single mom doesn’t have the opportunity to spend more than she takes in. A family doesn’t have the opportunity to spend more than they take in. A small business doesn’t have the opportunity to do that – only government. And why?

“The chairman mentioned about the different groups and special interests that come before us seeking appropriations, increases, or seeking grants, and that’s certainly true. And everyone that came before the Ways and Means Committee, as they do every year, thanked the chairman, thanked the committee, thanked the Legislature for the appropriations that they were promised. But as I’ve mentioned before, nobody thanks the taxpayers, and the not-too-secret secret is that we don’t have any money in this building. The only money that we have is money that we take from others, and those people are struggling in this economy, and that’s what was reflected in the downward estimate for the current fiscal year.

“However, we have to look to the future: that’s what the Legislature must do. And we have to look to sustainability. And I, for one, again challenge the 5 percent estimate that the Council on Revenues has made for the future. I don’t think it’s accurate. I don’t think it’s honest. I don’t think it’s going to occur. And we’re going to see the Council on Revenues probably downgrade that estimate in the future.

“Our economy has not diversified. The visitor industry, which has carried us singlehandedly for nearly two-and-a-half years now, has shown signs of slowing down. Construction has picked up only because of government and government-subsidized projects. There still is a lot of debate; we’ve had debate on bills here, particularly in Kaka‘ako, where most of the construction would be centered. But as a whole, the construction industry is not healthy. Neither is wholesale. Manufacturing is practically nonexistent. Retailing is flat. So where is the impetus coming from to give us the ability to spend \$23.7 billion?

“The other part of the message is, and those of us who were here a week ago Sunday saw, that we had two years because of the cuts – the cuts to the increases – in balance, but four years were in deficit position. That later was amended so that one more of those years had a modest surplus, but we are still dealing with what everybody understands and admits to: at least three years of fiscal deficit. We still have our \$20 billion-plus unfunded liability. We still have many problems, fiscally. I know it’s hard to say ‘no’ to different groups and different people and different programs, but that’s our job. And we can’t say that we have a prudent budget when we know that there are deficits looming and we have, at best, uncertainties for our economic climate.

“Nothing we’ve done thus far in this session will lower the costs and burdens of our citizens, raise their standard of living, or improve the business climate; and those are the things we have to look toward. The minority will again provide a detailed alternative budget with hard choices and with the ability to have

to say 'no' to certain programs or certain agencies. But after all, those are the tough decisions, and that's what we get paid to do, and that's what we must do. And so, while I recognize all the work and I recognize the honest effort to do things, we can't – as the chair said – we can't do things for all people. That's been the problem of the growth of state government. We've taken on more and more responsibilities, primarily when times were economically good, but they have lasting impact and lasting effect, and that's what we have to deal with.

“So, I know we're going into conference committee, but I'm certain that we need to do a better job for the people of this state, who depend upon us and look to us – not just the agencies who receive the largesse of their money or the GAOs or the nonprofits. We have to do a job and we have to take a tough position, one which requires a decision based on true austerity at a time when we need to be austere, and true prudence. So, as much as I would like to share in the support of this budget, at this time I cannot, Madam President. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1700, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Yes, members, this is the judiciary supplemental budget for fiscal year 2015. For fiscal year 2015, the Senate draft appropriates an additional \$1 million in general funds for the judiciary. This amount covers an increase in electrical costs throughout the system; it also provides the following additional general fund appropriations. It does cover the cost of the judges' salary increases as recommended by the Commission on Salaries. It does provide \$281,000 to upgrade the recording equipment throughout the court system, and \$147,000 for special duty officers for the Third Circuit to provide increased security to those facilities. And finally, it does provide \$94,900 to replace the Children's Justice Center interviewing and recording equipment to minimize the impact on children who are affected and provided service in those areas. With those appropriations, I encourage all of our colleagues to support this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This measure restores the \$90 million requested by the judiciary for their new Kona courthouse and some additional funds for repair and maintenance of others, for a total of about \$100 million. Thank you.”

**Tuesday, April 1, 2014**

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014, convened at 11:43 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator Kidani commended and congratulated the Japanese Women's Society Foundation on celebrating its sixtieth anniversary, and presented the following remarks:

"Aloha, Madam President and colleagues. We are frequently reminded that Hawai'i is home to an incredibly diverse population and that the various ethnic groups that live here are deeply passionate about celebrating and perpetuating their rich cultures. It was that kind of passion that motivated a group of women of Japanese ancestry to establish a Japanese Women's Society. Their goals were to promote friendship between the United States and Japan and to encourage their members to engage in community service. That was in 1954, and this year marks the society's sixtieth anniversary. For the original founders, the formation of the society marked a transition from first- to second-generation, from Issei to Nisei, in service to the community.

"The society has been engaged in a number of programs over the past six decades, but there has been a singular focus through that time: members have sought to support the elderly, especially women of Japanese ancestry, who are residents of Kuakini Home, now known as Hale Pulama Mau. Through year-round fundraisers, the society has contributed well over \$1 million to the facility. And for more than 30 years, members have maintained regular visits at Kuakini, especially monthly friendship teas providing a light Japanese lunch as well as entertainment to the long-term care residents. Those experiences have been deeply gratifying for both society members and Hale Pulama Mau residents.

"Several years ago, the organization became the Japanese Women's Society Foundation to carry on its charitable work. I have been a proud member and board member over a number of years. My Japanese heritage is from my father, Jack Sakai, although membership is not limited to those of Japanese ancestry.

"Colleagues, I am pleased to introduce society leaders who are with us on the floor today. First, the current society president and distinguished former member of this body and now a member of the Honolulu City Council, Councilmember Ann Kobayashi. Also, join me in welcoming the society's president-elect, Irene Nakamoto.

"Madam President, we also have guests in the gallery that I would like to introduce. Other members of the society that are here with us today are Julie Shimonishi; Delna Shinohara; Amy Young; and Amy's father who is also a member, Herbert Yonemura. I would also like to introduce Mr. David Nakamoto, who is the spouse of our president-elect, Irene, who is on the floor with us today. Thank you all for being with us.

"Madam President, the Japanese Women's Society Foundation has gone about its good work for 60 years. The society will have an official gala to celebrate in July. We wish them well in this anniversary year and for many years to come."

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. Yesterday, I had the opportunity to speak to the Department of Ag Chairman, Scott Enright, and the purpose for the meeting was the Department of Ag's reluctance, or flat-out refusal, to notify the public that little fire ants have been found in Waimānalo. It was not discovered yesterday, which is baffling to me. After my discussion with the director of the

Department of Ag, he disclosed to me that fire ants have been in Waimānalo for three years.

“What troubles me – and I shared this with him – is that the public interest should be served first, and what I found troubling was that they have not notified the public. I think anybody on the Big Island who has been bitten by fire ants would appreciate what this message is about. After our discussion – and by the way, the chairman of Ag was also in the discussion – it was noted that the little fire ants in Waimānalo evidently are in gulches and in treetops. And unless my memory is incorrect – and I certainly would yield to the wisdom of the chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture – there may be as many as nine nurseries that are in the immediate vicinity of the little fire ants.

“Now, here’s the deal from my point of view: Nurseries – and I used these exact words with the director because he’s a cattleman – I said, ‘Nurseries are crying like cut calves,’ but can you imagine how consumers would feel if, with the best of intentions, a spouse or a good friend went to purchase a plant and brought it home and put it in the bedroom, only to find out the plant had fire ants in it? And let’s say that person might live in ‘Āhuimanu, where I live, or in Hau’ula, or on the North Shore. Or let’s say a buyer for the Royal Hawaiian Hotel purchased hapu’u from one of these nine nurseries and put it in the foyer of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, or the Sheraton Waikiki, or any place in Waikīkī, or maybe in a hotel near an area where you live.

“I reminded the director of ag that there was a time when the island of Moloka’i was quarantined. The entire island was quarantined because of bovine TB. He remembered, and I remember because I had 40 head of cattle in Ho’olehua. Moloka’i Ranch had 500 head of cow-calf units. And the homesteaders in Ho’olehua and Kalama’ula and Kapa’akea, they had one cow tied to a rope on the side of the highway eating grass, and that was next year’s freezer meat. The people who owned cows on Moloka’i had no say in the matter. I filed a lawsuit. We lost the lawsuit because it was in the public interest to eradicate every living bovine on the island of Moloka’i.

“The Department of Ag needs to explain to the public how it’s in the public interest to keep little fire ants in Waimānalo a secret. They need to explain how it’s in the public interest to not quarantine every one of those nurseries that are in the immediate vicinity of the fire ant infestation, which the Department of Ag asserts is outside of the nursery. Can you believe it? So, if I take my truck and I drive on that driveway outside the nursery and drive in that nursery, who’s to say a little fire ant is not hitching a ride to ‘Āhuimanu? It is shameful that the Department of Ag would not put the public’s interest first on issues like this. Thank you very much.”

Senator Tokuda, Chair of the Committee on Education, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for S.C.R. No. 113.

Senator Tokuda noted:

“This is an important and urgent issue facing the Kahuku community, and we did post an S.D. 1 yesterday. We need to hear the measure today to meet the concurrent resolution deadlines.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Tokuda announced that the Committee on Education, Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs, and Committee on Water and Land would be holding a public hearing on S.C.R. No. 113 that afternoon at 1:30 p.m. in Conference Room 414.

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As you know, I am the senator for the Waimānalo area and I live in that area. And I have to say, unfortunately, the little fire ant is in that area, and it was news to many of us, including many of the nursery operators.

“Now, I’ve been speaking to the Department of Agriculture for about four to five years now about state properties that are under the Department of Agriculture’s management that are fallow and that have been fallow and not leased out for probably going on about 10 years now. And the Department of Agriculture keeps assuring us that they will lease these lands and that there is a waitlist of people that are trying to get onto them, but their process takes years and years and years. And in the meantime, the property remains fallow, and lo and behold, we’ve recently discovered that there is a large colony of little fire ants on this fallow land that is ‘managed’ by the Department of Agriculture.

“And these little fire ants have traveled to the adjacent lands that are being run by nurseries, where the nurseries have baited and trapped and worked to eradicate them. And they did get a clean inspection, only to find a couple months later the little fire ant was back, and how did that happen? And it was only then that it was discovered that, oh, the colony is on the adjacent Department of Ag land, but the Department of Agriculture apparently did not notify the Invasive Species Council.

“So, when the colony was smaller and able to be addressed, the Invasive Species Council and the other partners that this legislative body has funded for years and years in order to assist the Department of Agriculture with the eradication and control of invasive species was not able or invited to come on in to help and is only being brought in now at the demand of the adjacent nurseries. This happened earlier this year, senators, when we were having the Department of Agriculture budget presentation in front of the Ways and Means Committee at the beginning of session. And we discovered when little fire ant was brought onto Maui from the importation of some hapu’u fern from the Big Island, and it was being sold in the big box stores and some resident recognized it and contacted the Invasive Species Council, and the Invasive Species Council then went to the Department of Ag, only to find that the Department of Ag knew about that infestation and also had not reached out to the network that this body has funded to help address this invasive species.

“Now, I’m a member of the Waimānalo Ag Association and I can tell you that the nurseries there are ready, willing, and able to step up, which they did with coqui frog. And when coqui frog went into Waimānalo, they drove around at night, they listened for it, they worked with the Invasive Species Council and the DOA people, and they eradicated it, and you can drive around Waimānalo at night now and you do not hear a single coqui frog. So, they welcome the assistance, but what they’d like to see is the state agency to step up and take care of its own lands, including the infestations there, and to work with the network that this body has helped establish and fund to make sure that we can bring all the partners to bear to work cooperatively together to eradicate this pest on O’ahu. Mahalo.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Just some information regarding the little red fire ant. It didn’t start last week, last year, five years ago; the little red fire ant was first found in the district of Puna in 1999, and it has since spread throughout the Big Island and it’s spreading to the other islands. So, as we go forward to address the invasive species problem, including the coqui frog, which I tell my colleagues that live on O’ahu, ‘Get used to it; it’s only a matter

of time before it's in your backyard.' We're living with it. For me personally, it doesn't really bother me now; it did at one time. But the little red fire ant doesn't live on the ground: it lives on the trees and it falls on you, and as the senator from Kāne'ohe said, it's a sting that is worse than a jellyfish sting. So, it all depends on us: the will and the might, I guess, of how we're going to address the invasive species problem and all the other problems that confront us in times of short funds. Thank you very much."

The Chair made the following announcement:

"Madam President, in considering all the options here, I'm going to rise with reservations on this particular measure, and let me lay out why. This particular S.C.R. is supposed to approve a lease of submerged lands at Honolulu Harbor for a certain company. My problem is with the process on this. You know, we changed the law a few years ago to say that the board has to approve the leases first and then we're the final approval; it comes to the Legislature. This has not gone through that

process, and I know there are other circumstances. I'm going to vote with reservations because I would like to be on the conference committee on this. And I also note that there are other lessees in the harbor that are waiting and did not put in this because they haven't gotten their leases from BLNR yet. So, as we move forward, we have to be careful on how we move these types of resolutions ahead. Thank you, Madam Chair."

Senator Hee rose on a point of inquiry as follows:

"Madam President, will you ask the previous speaker if he will yield to a question? The question is: Is the company in question on a month-to-month lease arrangement with the state? And if the answer is 'yes,' how long has that lease been on a month-to-month permit? And if the answer is 'no,' does the previous speaker then agree that the company may be in danger of losing its business? Thank you."

Senator English responded:

"I yield to the question. Yes, my understanding is that the company's been on a month-to-month lease for over 70 years of this particular area, so before Hawai'i was a state – from the territorial days."

Senator Hee continued:

"Thank you. Then, Madam President, I vote 'no.' And the reason I vote 'no' is really simple: many, many companies and many, many businesses in Hawai'i relish the opportunity to be on a month-to-month permit, and many, many have been on a month-to-month permit like this one for decades. And the reason is simple: month-to-month permits are cheaper. The state is negligent in processing month-to-month permits into long term leases regardless of what excuse the state would like to pull out of their deck of cards at the time. It isn't until the Legislature enacts laws that compels the state to terminate month-to-month permits that such permits are terminated.

"Case in point: In the eighties, the Legislature determined that it was in the best interests of ag to have month-to-month permittees on ag lands to be commuted into long term leases. I happened to be a worker at DLNR and my job was to collate and organize all the month-to-month permittees, and we started in Waimānalo; and the reason we did so was because the state's response to month-to-month permits was to auction off the land. And the local people who were month-to-month permittees got anxious and came to the Legislature because they knew in an auction they would be outbid. And this is the sad state of affairs with the State Department of Land and Natural Resources as well as other departments.

"If what the previous speaker said is accurate, this permittee has enjoyed a month-to-month permit at no liability or very little liability at a significantly reduced rate that otherwise would be market rate. I happen to agree with the previous speaker: this is putting the cart before the horse. And if, in fact, the previous speaker is accurate and this company is on a month-to-month permit, there is no danger of this business going out. For those reasons, I vote 'no.'"

seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the nominees as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I’m speaking on Governor’s Messages 586, 587, 588, 589, and 590. I rise to speak in support of the Senate’s advise and consent to the confirmation of the governor’s four nominees to serve as members of the Board of Regents of the University of Hawai’i.

“Your Committee on Higher Education held a hearing to consider each of the nominees on March 25. After review of their personal histories, resumes, and statements, and consideration of the testimony received, your committee finds Stanford Yuen, Lee Putnam, Jeffrey Portnoy, and Michelle Tagorda well-qualified to serve as members of the Board of Regents.

“Your committee especially notes that all four nominees have developed extensive and knowledgeable relationships with the University of Hawai’i.

“Stanford Yuen began as a mechanical engineering student at UH Mānoa, and later taught engineering economics for many years. Throughout his professional career in private industry and with the United States Navy in the Pacific region, Mr. Yuen cultivated opportunities for UH engineering students and alumni and advocated in support of the College of Engineering.

“Dr. Lee Putnam began her career at UH with the University Libraries in 1980, and has served in executive positions in the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and as a faculty specialist with the Office of Student Equity, Excellence, and Diversity. Now retired, Dr. Putnam is committed to assuring access to higher education.

“Jeffrey Portnoy is currently a regent, having been appointed on November 22, 2013, to fill a vacancy. Mr. Portnoy is an attorney and has been a UH Department of Journalism adjunct professor for media law and a strong supporter of the William S. Richardson School of Law and Rainbow Warrior basketball. An advocate of ethics, transparency, and accountability, Mr. Portnoy cites the selection of the new university president as the Board of Regents’ most immediate task.

“Michelle Tagorda is to serve as the student member for a term of two years. A proud graduate of Kea’au High School and the University of Hawai’i at Mānoa with a B.S. in psychology and B.A. in biology, Ms. Tagorda is a graduate student in the UH Master of Public Health program. She also currently serves as an undergraduate advisor, graduate research assistant, and program assistant with the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Undergraduate Education at UH Mānoa.

“Madam President, your Committee on Higher Education is satisfied that each nominee will significantly contribute to the Board of Regents in the fulfillment of its responsibilities for the University of Hawai’i System, and recommends that the Senate advise and consent to the confirmation of these four nominees. Thank you.”

Senator English rose to speak in opposition to Gov. Msg. Nos. 588 and 589 as follows:

“Members, you know, the basic premise of the Board of Regents is to run the university, but part of that whole system is being accountable and being able to talk to diverse groups and even hear the other side of the coin and listen to opposing views. It’s no wonder that I’m voting ‘no,’ because this particular appointee didn’t even have the respect nor the courtesy to try and make an appointment with me, to try and come and ask for my vote, and to reach out and say why he should be on the Board of Regents. In fact, this has been something that I’ve noted over the years with this particular person.

“We have to think about this and think about it very carefully. We’re asking for innovation. We’re asking for creativity. We’re asking for the Board of Regents to be the leadership of the whole university system. And in fact, what the Legislature did a number of years back was we created what’s called constitutional autonomy. We ceded our authority in running the university to the regents, and what did they give up? They gave up sovereign immunity, which means that the regents are personally liable, not us. The government will not defend them if someone sues them. That’s what they gave up.

“I want somebody there that’s able to listen intently, to hear the other side, to talk to people. And that’s what a university should be. A university should be a place where the marketplace of ideas can be shared without trampling down the other side. I don’t see that type of respect with this particular person. I don’t think that he should be sitting on the Board of Regents after observing him for a number of years. And in fact, you know, there’s a Hawaiian word that describes this aptly: we need ha’aha’a there. We need the ability for the regents to sit down with everyone – not that they know best, but they’re willing to hear everyone. I don’t think this person has that ability.

“I’m voting ‘no,’ and for those of you that he did not come to see, I want you to consider this. Consider the fact that there was no ha’aha’a there, that there was no thought about what you wanted to hear from this person. It was more about, ‘I want to be on that board so that I can tell you how to run this.’ If he didn’t come to see you, I advise you to vote ‘no.’ Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in opposition to Gov. Msg. Nos. 586, 588, 589, and 590 as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. It’s easier to say who I’m going to vote for, and that is Lee Putnam; I’m going to vote for her. I’m not voting for the rest and I’ll tell you why. It’s not because I’m important; it’s just the opposite. It’s because they’re important. They’re so important that they never took it upon themselves to contact me but for Lee Putnam, and that’s the reason.

“The University of Hawai‘i is the only public institution of higher learning that provides such promise, particularly for our local kids who don’t have the opportunity or the means to go abroad. I’m one of them. My father was a lifetime civil servant; my mother was a front-office cashier in Waikīkī. We didn’t have the means to send me abroad, and I’m a proud graduate of the University of Hawai‘i, having graduated three times. The University of Hawai‘i is the symbol of hope for the next generation. It is an economic engine that cannot be quantified, and I would challenge anyone to put a value on the University of Hawai‘i because it is priceless. Many of you are graduates of the University of Hawai‘i, and by that means, beneficiaries of the University of Hawai‘i, despite the politics that goes on.

“Madam President, you have spent nearly two years focused on the University of Hawai‘i and, with others on your committee, you have brought to light many things that otherwise would never have been brought to the public arena. How is it that only one person cared enough to contact my office? Not because I’m important: it’s just the opposite, because the job that this person is seeking compliance from this body is so important to her. I suppose a pass could be given to the student with the thought in mind that the student regent, how would she know, or he know? But then the chair of Higher Ed said that he encouraged the nominees to contact the members who would consent – or not – to this appointment. Now, I realize that some of the nominees may have contacted some of you, and that’s good enough; and my response is that’s fair enough. But I hope you realize that if they never contacted you, on what basis would you approve them?

“There are some who are not new to this advise and consent. The previous speaker articulated one such person who is very, very ma‘a to this process. He used to sit as a member of the Judicial Selection Commission until the governor moved him off, and look where he landed: at the University of Hawai‘i. And he cares so much, at least of some members of this Senate, that he never called. He never called because he’s that important. I cannot vote for the student regent because to do so would treat the student differently. I treat them all the same.

“I will vote for Lee Putnam. Although she didn’t interview with me, she gave me the courtesy of a nice letter that stated her desire to serve in the public interest at the only public, land-grant school in Hawai‘i that is a priceless gift to the local kids, particularly those without the means to go abroad. Madam President, that is the only regent I will support. Thank you very much.”

The Chair then stated:

“Just a note: There are many advise and consents, and I’m sure there are many that have not contacted your office in other situations. I know some boards weigh heavier than others, but keep that in mind.”

Senator Kahele rose to affirm his support of all four nominees.

He is currently a general partner for HMS Hawai‘i Management Partners and an adjunct professor at the University of Hawai‘i’s College of Business Administration and the William S. Richardson School of Law, which bears the name of his father. He also serves as a trustee on the University of

Hawai'i Foundation, where he serves on the finance committee and manages an investment portfolio of more than \$300 million.

"In addition, he is the founder and president of HighBeam, a virtual incubator helping build Hawai'i-based companies. They make a significant contribution to the local economy. As an attorney, he has practiced in securities, finance, and commercial law. Mr. Richardson's extensive business, legal, and financial experience make him an ideal candidate for the Hawaiian Homes Commission, and I urge you to vote in support. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. You know, yesterday I got up on a point of personal privilege along with two other colleagues to talk about the fire ants, and I wanted to share some information. In just that little announcement on the floor, I received an email and I want to read it; it's very short. 'Aloha, Senator Hee. As a 38-year resident of Waimānalo, I am very appreciative of your recent effort to bring the matter of Waimānalo fire ants to the public's attention. I live in the back roads and certainly want to be aware of where this infestation occurs to be on the lookout for infestations in other areas of our valley.' This is from Thom Grande, who is an attorney.

"Well, that was really nice, but that's not the reason I stood up. This is the reason: Mr. Grande then wrote to the Department of Ag and he said the same thing, and he said, 'What is the name or names of the nurseries where the fire ants have been located? Are those nurseries being required to disclose the fire ant infestation to plant purchasers? If my neighbors or I see what I believe to be a fire ant, whom do we contact and what

other steps should we take?' This is the answer from the Department of Agriculture, who they asserted puts people first (and I see you smile): 'Your email has been received by the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture. I'm forwarding your inquiry to the Plant Pest Control Branch for response. The crews are in the field today, so they will respond as soon as they are able.' Isn't that a nice way for the State Department of Ag to put people first? Put people first.

"I'm not a 'Facebook-er,' but I know some of you are. Somebody said, 'We have that kind ants in Wai'anae, too.' Somebody said, 'They always have been at Waimānalo Elementary.' Somebody said, 'Not new. They've been on Bellows.' And somebody said, 'They gotta go check the polo field, too, in Waimānalo.' This is the point; this is the point of full disclosure by the Department of Ag. Three years, fire ants in Waimānalo; three years, and people making up – maybe they making it up, maybe they serious – where are these fire ants in Waimānalo? And that is why the Department of Ag is shameful in their conduct to the public by putting nurseries first and people last. Thank you very much."

#### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Thank you. I rise in support and to clarify my concerns. My concerns about this nomination, now so well-known, were never about the person. I’m concerned about the direction of our ag efforts. There has been plenty of support for large chemical companies and virtually none for organic or any other form of sustainable farming, and I crave some balance in our policy.

“Health benefits aside, organic farming and other sustainable methods are better for the land, safer for the workers, and improve our ability to farm sustainably. Important as these are, what is not arguable is that for the last couple of decades, organic has been the fastest-growing segment of our food industry. Not only does this represent what more and more people are wanting politically, but it’s also crucial to recognize this economic trend. We talk so much about economic growth as though we could legislate it into existence instead of following good business principles. As a businessperson, I know the most basic concept is to watch for trends, take advantage of them, or ignore them at our peril. The political infrastructure of the State of Hawai’i has categorically ignored the biggest trend in the food industry, and our sad situation reflects this lack of basic business sense.

“So, I crave some balance in our ag policy. I was concerned whether a strong GMO proponent is what’s needed to achieve this balance. When we need different outcomes, going in the same direction is not the way to get there, and I feared more of the same. After talking with Mr. Ha, I discovered that I was incorrect about what I had perceived as antipathy on his part toward organic, and Mr. Ha generously assured me that he will advocate for organic farming in addition to the other kinds. That’s all I can hope for here.

“As I wait for some balance someday in the ag board and ag department, I realize that for now only GMO proponents will be nominated. I do not understand why, in a house full of GMO proponents, that more GMO proponents are the only ones eligible for consideration. Why is a diversity of opinion on this subject so feared? The citizens of our state do not share this monolithic support for the large chemical companies.

“But I take comfort in the fact that Richard Ha is indeed a local food farmer, and I hope that will bring us some benefits. I’ve always known him to be a respectable community leader despite any differences we’ve had, so I look forward to working with Mr. Ha on this. In fact, now when I need someone to help small organic farmers, I’ll be calling on my new ally,

Mr. Richard Ha. Of course, we all recognize Mr. Ha’s success and leadership in the local food production, and in this, I could not be more supportive. In fact, I enjoy buying his produce every week at my store. As far as any harsh words used, Mr. Ha has already received and accepted my apology as well as clarification that my concerns were about the direction of our agriculture and never a question of personal character or qualifications. Thank you, Madam President.”

It's limited to cases in the nature of assumpsit, which are cases that allow for recovery of damages for non-performance of a contract. There are currently a number of other instances where certified mail is an accepted means of service, such as small claims cases, cases involving property, operation of motor vehicles, cases involving boat operators, and under the Long-Arm Statute.

"This measure allows for the same thing for cases in the nature of assumpsit. The Committee on Judiciary passed it as is, and we're asking the Senate to agree to the House amendments that limited the scope of the bill to cases of assumpsit only. This will prevent the bill from possibly interfering with or overlapping other exceptions that allow for service of process through certified mail."

In June 2013, California became the first state to set a target of achieving 1.3 GW of utility-scale energy storage by 2020. Some of the energy storage projects underway in California include: EV to grid projects, a solar-thermal power project incorporating molten salt energy storage, a compressed air energy storage system, and storage projects using sodium-sulfur batteries.

"Energy storage is one of the keys to taking us to the next level in our clean energy goals. As we know, solar and wind are intermittent power sources and when the sun isn't shining and the wind isn't blowing, those systems aren't generating power. So energy storage systems are kind of a 'holy grail' which allows that power to be stored for later use and makes it easier on our utilities to keep the power running smoothly. This bill applies to only utility-scale energy storage, so the number of taxpayers utilizing this tax credit will be limited. It does not apply to someone putting batteries in their backyard, but would only apply to large-scale facilities that will help to stabilize the grid. However, it would enable the utilities to accept more renewable energy, including PV. I ask you to join me in supporting HB 2618 HD2 SD2. Mahalo."

Our utilities need to ensure that those folks can connect to the grid in a timely manner without facing huge costs. You might have heard about former U.S. Department of Energy Secretary Steven Chu's recent quote in *Forbes Magazine* about HECO's decision to limit solar installation and I quote: 'Solar installations don't threaten grid stability until they approach 20 percent of the customer base. In Hawai'i solar is at 2 percent. Instead of that, you need a better business model. So I'm telling utility companies, this is coming down the line, so let's think of a new business model.'

“This bill would address this situation, but also goes beyond just distributed generation. The problem is that our electrical grids are antiquated and aren’t keeping up our rapidly changing world. This bill helps the PUC and the utilities get started on the road to modernization of the grids. This bill would require the PUC to commence regulatory action, either through one or more dockets or through a working group, to address the technical, policy and economic issues associated with grid modernization. My office put together our own working group, consisting of the PUC, Consumer Advocate, DBEDT, HECO, KIUC, HSEA, PV Coalition and Sierra Club, to come up with a consensus draft for this bill. And I’m pleased to announce that the working group recently reached ‘kumbaya’ on a consensus draft. I will be submitting that consensus draft as a proposed conference draft. I thank all those who have helped with the process. Colleagues, I ask for your support of this bill. Mahalo.”

We have seen that people are now blaming the Prepaid Health Care Act for our additional costs and the dysfunction of the healthcare exchange, but it's not that at all. The Prepaid Health Care Act should have been left alone; we should have had the exemption beforehand. Now, to try to talk about it and wait until 2017, I think, is going to cost us more money and more bureaucracy. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm delighted to hear that our Minority Leader supports so strongly the Prepaid Health Care Act, and I believe that that act has served us well. As we move into health transformation, which will actually help to improve the delivery of healthcare services to our state – to all of our residents, including those that may be underinsured at the moment – this measure will give us an opportunity to continue to be creative and innovative in the ways that we can provide for access to high-quality healthcare services in our state. I believe it's a measure that should move forward, and I have some additional remarks I'd like to have included in the Journal. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in SUPPORT OF HB2581, SD2 Relating to Insurance

"The purpose of HB2581 is to establish a State Innovation Waiver Task Force of interested stakeholders to develop a unified strategy for a universal health insurance coverage system that meets consumer and provider needs, adds value and convenience to employers, and is economically sustainable. This group develop the healthcare strategic plan in order to obtain a state innovation waiver from certain requirements of the Affordable Care Act.

"This bill is necessary for Hawai'i to remain in control of its own healthcare and health insurance practices. We have always been in the forefront of healthcare innovation as seen through the Hawaii Prepaid Healthcare Act, our state's Medicaid program and various gap group strategies. These practices have advanced us to the point where the ACA makes our system more complicated than it needs to be.

"When we developed and passed legislation to form the Hawaii Healthcare Connector, we did so to maintain autonomy and to preserve our Prepaid Healthcare law. HB2581 establishes a task force that will develop a waiver request from various requirements of the ACA so that Hawai'i will continue to be in control of healthcare for its residents. We know what is best for us. We have a long history of providing better care for our residents than other states.

"The innovation waiver goes hand in hand with the sustainability of the Health Connector. States that are granted innovation waivers may receive federal assistance to operate their reform programs in an amount that is equivalent to the aggregate amount of tax credits and cost-sharing subsidies that the federal government would have paid for individuals enrolled in state health insurance exchanges. The goal of the innovation waiver is to provide the people of Hawai'i with the best possible healthcare options. By continuing to manage our local exchange, we are better positioned to accomplish this goal. We need to lead the charge instead of being dragged along and told what makes good health care policy.

"I urge my colleagues to join me to pass HB2581, SD2 to ensure that we continue to remain at the forefront of best practice in healthcare and provide the people of Hawai'i the best possible healthcare options available. Mahalo."

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure and have remarks that I’d like to have inserted in the Journal, please. Thank you.”

“Madam President, **I rise in support of HB2012, SD2 - Relating to Consumer Protection.**

“The purpose of HB2012 is to put the Hawai‘i consumer first when it comes to ticket sales for local events. Hawai‘i prohibits ticket scalping at boxing and mixed martial arts events, but doesn’t have restrictions on ticket scalping at other major events.

“CPN worked with the various stakeholders involved to craft a bill that supports our local consumers by reigning in exorbitant prices on scalped tickets and starting the sale of tickets at a reasonable time for Hawai‘i residents.

“Because of Hawaii’s location, Hawai‘i consumers are at a disadvantage when tickets go on sale, since many sales begin in much earlier time zones. HB2012 restricts commencing online ticket sale times to after 8:00 a.m. Hawaii Standard Time or before the primary ticket seller commences sales, whichever is later, to make sure that our Hawai‘i consumers have a fair chance to purchase tickets.

“As technology changes, we need to make sure our laws adapt to those advances. An important aspect of this legislation addresses ticket brokers who use computer software to circumvent online ticket queues and buy large blocks of tickets in seconds. The bill makes such actions a misdemeanor and tracks legislation from California that is recognized as one of the toughest anti-scalping laws. This bill will provide tools for civil and criminal enforcement authorities to investigate and prosecute allegations of illegal and unfair ticket selling practices.

“I urge my colleagues to pass HB 2012, SD2 so that the people of Hawai‘i aren’t held hostage by ticket scalpers or remain at a disadvantage for online purchases because of time zones when it comes purchasing tickets for events at local venues. Mahalo.”

So, I see this as a way of taking more money and then saying that we need to increase the conveyance tax. Thank you.”

“The purpose of this legislation is to balance the public’s concern of abuse of power with the ability of council members to attend and discuss council business at community meetings or similar events. This legislation is intended to help allow greater communication with the public, subject to appropriate limitations, by establishing a limited meetings category where any number of council members can attend public community meetings to hear and discuss concerns in the community without violating Chapter 92, HRS, the sunshine law.

“The sunshine laws were established to help promote transparency in government. Unfortunately, sometimes they are also a hindrance to hearing from the community. Council members are unable to attend important community meetings together that can be educational and better inform future decision-making. The public is then unable to have the opportunity to interact and question the council as a whole rather than just a few members. Instead, many times, the public feels that members do not actually care about a particular community or don’t seem aware of community concerns because not all are in attendance, when that is not the case. The community doesn’t always appreciate or understand why all council members can’t come to a meeting in their community.

“Passage of HB2139 will help to promote the rich and multifaceted dialogue that is necessary to implement the best practices in our local communities. It will lead to even greater transparency because the public will have the opportunity to more freely interact with more council members at community meetings to provide better insight into multi-faceted issues before decisions are made and policies are implemented.

“I urge my colleagues to pass this measure to help increase dialogue and transparency at the county level. Mahalo.”

“It is clear from testimony presented to Senate committees that the issue needs clarification. The OCP, which administers the Residential Landlord-Tenant Center, has received numerous inquiries from landlords and tenants regarding this matter. HB1503 will help to protect those using medical marijuana by ensuring that they will not be evicted from their home for legal use.

“HB1503, SD1 will protect individual’s rights. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this important measure. Mahalo.”

“I think we’re all concerned about the incidence of skin cancer and also about UV rays, but I find several interesting things in this bill about tanning salons and ‘under 18.’ I spoke to people in the industry; no one seems to have been contacted or asked for what policies are, and most of the companies that I’m aware of, they already do not allow below 18-year-olds to have tanning unless there’s parental consent. So, what this bill does is take away parental consent, and it’s interesting that you can have a minor get tattoos and piercings with parental consent. So if, in fact, we want to involve parents in this process, there should have been an application for that. It is not; it’s a total ban. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure, and have some remarks that would begin to refute the comments of the previous speaker, and would like to have those inserted into the Journal, please.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 611, SD1 - RELATING TO TANNING.

“HB 611 will make it unlawful for anyone who is under the age of 18 to use a tanning bed. It further requires tanning facilities to post notices that disclose the health risks associated with using tanning beds. The only exemptions to this legislation would be for physicians licensed to use ultraviolet light as a form of treatment.

“This bill is necessary to protect public health. Most people know that prolonged exposure to the sun’s ultraviolet rays is harmful. However, many people do not know that tanning via artificial ultraviolet light delivers levels of radiation 10-15 times higher than the mid-day sun. In fact, there is a misconception that a ‘base tan,’ obtained by using tanning devices protects from actual sun exposure. This is false.

“In 2009, the International Agency for Research on Cancer elevated tanning devices to its highest cancer risk category – ‘carcinogenic to humans.’ Excessive ultraviolet radiation

exposure, particularly during childhood and adolescence, is an important predictor of future health consequences.

“According to the American Cancer Society:

- Those who use tanning beds prior to age 35 have a 59% increased risk of melanoma, the most deadly of all skin cancers;
- Melanoma is one of the most common cancers among men and women aged 15-29 years;
- Using a tanning bed increases the risk of two types of skin cancer, squamous and basal cell carcinomas, by 67% and 29% respectively;
- UV radiation from indoor tanning and other sources is cumulative over time. The earlier a person starts tanning, the greater the risk of getting melanoma and other skin cancers later in life.

“Furthermore, the tanning bed industry lacks regulation. There are no guidelines regarding exposure times and frequencies, education of employees or information given to consumers.

“Passage of HB 611, SD1 will help protect public health by appropriately regulating the use of tanning beds and educating unaware consumers in the process. I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo.”

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As some folks observed when we started, the women of the Senate got together to take a photo because today is Equal Pay Day, and I just wanted to make sure that everyone understood what that meant. It’s the day representing how far into 2014 a woman has to work to earn a salary equal to what a man earned in 2013. So, women in America have to work more than three months longer than their male counterparts just to earn the same amount of money.

“I know that we are considering raising the minimum wage and I would note that a number of women, more than men, are at those low-end jobs; and so I join with my colleagues here on the floor in support of increasing the minimum wage to something that would be more acceptable and help women close that gap. And I would just note that Minnesota seems to be poised to increase their minimum wage to \$9.50. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Espero rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you. I’d just like to officially state for the Senate Journal and honor my parents. They’re in ‘Ewa Beach; they’re not here right now, but today they are celebrating their fifty-seventh wedding anniversary. My father, Victor Dungca Espero, from Bacnotan, La Union; and my mother, Paulina Calip Espero, from Santiago, Ilocos Sur.

“And to add to the celebration, my oldest son, the captain in the Marine Corps, is celebrating his thirtieth birthday today, as well. Thank you.”

we knew the concerns of the developers, the labor area, the HCDA themselves, and the governor’s office. And for the past month, we have been meeting to recalibrate the processes of the Hawaii Community Development Authority, and we crafted what we consider a bill worthy of your consideration.

“Now, having said that, part of the growth of Kaka’ako will be the ownership of the lands on the makai. Makai of what? Shall we move the makai to Ilalo Street? And so everything mauka can grow? Or shall we take the makai and shall we grow the makai? So, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, in a bill that has been advancing – that passed, by the way, 41 to 10 in the House – to ask for residential on the makai is now at a juncture where the crossroads is either put up or shut up. Now, are we going to ask the Hawaiians to wait a little bit more? Well, that’s up to the Legislature.

“So, the bill passes the body on the other side of this grand building 41 to 10 – headed to conference. And in the midst of all of this ‘legislative process,’ shall we say, my colleague on the other side of the building expounds on the fact that this bill is dead on arrival. ‘We already have irreconcilable differences with the Senate.’ What would that be? They agreed to our bill. So, is it a forewarned conclusion that the House is going to kill something that they just agreed on? Is that how we do business here in this house? Is that how we do business here in the Legislature? I don’t think so.

“Furthermore, since I’m on the topic of OHA on the makai, let’s talk about the fallacies that have been expounded by those who oppose development on the makai. Shoreline development: what does that mean? The last time I looked, shoreline development was on the shoreline; in this particular case, it’s almost half a mile from the shore. That’s shoreline development? More than 2,000 feet from the shoreline? Okay. ‘I won’t be able to get to where I’ve recreated for years.’ There’s five streets that take you to the shoreline! Okay. Those are but two of the fallacies that have been expounded by opponents of the bill.

“In addition to that, colleagues, within the bill – and we know it because we voted for it – we have put fees for everyone who lives in that area so that the park will be secure and the park will be taken care of. It is almost a self-sufficient process that we’re trying to allow OHA to do; and then the bottom line is that OHA still has to ask HCDA for the ability to build residential on the makai.

“Now, this is what I do not appreciate. I don’t appreciate anybody standing up in the public forum and saying that if we go to conference, we don’t need to talk about anything because it’s done. Is that the way to do business with the Senate? Is that why we’re the upper house? Because we don’t do business like that? Well, I’ve got news for anybody who does business like that: you’ve got something coming. When we go to conference, we intend to talk the bill. We intend to take every opportunity to vet the bill; and at the end of the day, if the conference committee decides that it’s dead on arrival, then we will decide that – certainly not half the House, certainly not half this Capitol. I wanted to share that with you because I was incensed by the comment by the Majority Leader of the House, saying that ‘we go to conference, the bill is done,’ even before we hit the table.

“So, I hope my words are ringing somewhere and it’s just not empty because we intend to go to conference and talk it out. Let’s not send our messages over there that our foregone conclusion is that we pass something, but our words – basically, our votes – are empty because that’s essentially what we read and what we learned.

“I want to thank the Senate President for the opportunity to share this and, of course, the merits of the bill. It wasn’t

intended to share the merits of the bill, but, I think, the fallacies I certainly wanted to expound on. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to echo the comments of the previous speaker and thank him for his remarks, as well as to remind the members of her office’s upcoming lunch plate sale to benefit the Hawaii Foodbank.

"Madam President, I rise in strong support of SB 2175 SD2 HD2. This bill would authorize the Dean at the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources at the University of Hawai'i to establish a two-year pilot industrial hemp research project. The research would focus on research for phytoremediation, which is the environmentally-friendly science of using plants and trees to remove toxins in the soil, such as metals, pesticides, solvents, explosives, and crude oil. The bill also directs the research to focus on looking at hemp as a possible feedstock for biofuels. Hemp is an incredible crop that's used in over 27,000 products, including food, soap, car materials, insulation, and construction materials. What about a cottage industry springing up selling Hawaiian Hemp Seeds, Honolulu Hemp Shampoo, Hawaii Island Hemp Oil? It's clear that we should be growing our own hemp instead of importing it. I ask that you join me in supporting SB 2175 SD2 HD2. Mahalo."

Senator Gabbard moved that S.B. No. 2658, S.D. 3, H.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. I should, first of all, say what I like about the bill. What I like about the bill is the promise of sharing agricultural use with renewable energy. I think we do have a very limited land base in Hawai'i and we need to support shared uses because it's an efficient use of land. I also like about the bill the fact that, theoretically, under this shared-use arrangement, the compatible agricultural uses would have an ability to lease the land at 50 percent below the market rate because I know that the market rate lease rents for agricultural lands are too high for most of our farmers.

"But the reason that I rise in opposition to the bill is because this promise of compatible use, this tradeoff about having some of our best soils being paved over with solar facilities, is not enforceable, and what I'm concerned about are the unintended consequences. This concern was driven home Sunday when I picked up the paper; many of you saw the front page article entitled, 'A Building Concern' by Rob Perez. And it's about the unintended consequences of a bill that we passed here a couple years ago, a bill where we intended to help farmers. And I quote from the article: 'Because of a 2012 state law that exempts certain structures from building permit requirements, the city did not have the authority to enter the Kunia Loa structures and, without being able to do so, was unable to prove that they were being used as residences. The 2012 exemption law was designed to free farmers and ranchers from the time-consuming, costly process of obtaining building permits for small agricultural-related buildings, but the law has created some confusion and enforcement challenges.' And because of these enforcement challenges, the unintended consequences are, it appears, that we're having residential development on agricultural lands.

"The lesson that I think we have is that if we want to help farmers and we want to avoid unintended consequences, we have to pay attention to how the laws we pass are enforceable, particularly for agricultural uses on agricultural lands. And it's not just because we want to help farmers; it's also because we have a constitutional obligation under our state constitution that we're all sworn to uphold: that 'the state shall conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency, and assure the availability of agriculturally suited lands.' I want to repeat that last line

again: we have to assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands.

"Under our current law, we have a very narrow list of permitted uses on our class A and class B soils, and that's because these are the best soils in our state for growing. And I want to point out: the class A soils, out of all the agricultural lands in our state, only 3.1 percent are class A. Only 6.2 percent are class B. That's less than 10 percent of the agricultural land in Hawai'i that is our best soils. Over 90 percent of our agricultural lands in Hawai'i are class C, D, or E soils. Over 90 percent of the agricultural lands in Hawai'i can host solar facilities.

"What this bill would do is it would open up the class B soils for industrial-scale solar development on 100 percent of the class B lands with no sunset provision, and it would offer this promise that the lands will be held out for compatible agricultural use. But the problem is the Land Use Commission has no authority to enforce the special-permit conditions that it would issue to authorize these solar facilities. And I've distributed to all of you senators a copy of an attorney general opinion where it says it is not clear that the Land Use Commission has any jurisdiction to enforce its conditions on special permits and that the law is silent about the Land Use Commission enforcement authority.

"I've asked for this bill to be amended to include the ability for the commission to enforce the special permit conditions. If that were done, we could throw the bill into conference committee. It would have wholehearted support; and the promise that we are holding out to the farmers, like Tin Roof Ranch and the other farmers that have come to testify in support of this bill, would be honored and that we would know that we wouldn't be facing another front page story in two to five years saying that, whoops, you know, once again, the Legislature passed a law that was unenforceable.

"I cannot in good conscience support this unenforceable promise for compatible use, and I would ask for your support to either defer the bill or to amend it and throw it into conference committee so that we can have something that we know is going to meet the constitutional obligation to assure the availability of suitable agricultural lands, the limited lands that we have, with the best soils in the state. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Thielen requested that additional remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's additional remarks are identified as "ATTACHMENT A" to the Journal of this day.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"This bill could be a win-win for both ag and solar because it will allow more solar on B and C ag lands. It will also require a special use permit for approval to provide oversight, accountability, and transparency. We've heard about how sheep grazing, aquaculture, and bees can work alongside PV panels.

"The truth is solar is not keeping farmers off the land; what's keeping small farmers off of ag lands is the high cost of rent. This bill would basically have solar developers subsidizing small farmers because the rent for small farmers would be cut in half. So, I ask you to please join me in support of S.B. 2658, S.D. 3, H.D. 2. Mahalo."

This measure also specifies that banks and trust companies serving as trustees will be required to publish their fee schedules and give written notice to the settlor and all beneficiaries if there are changes in their fee schedules.

"Existing law governing trustee compensation is ambiguous and has led to litigation between beneficiaries and trustees. By clarifying the trustee provisions, this measure will create a compensation system that is fair to beneficiaries and trustees and will reduce the need for court intervention.

"Last year, the Senate JDL and WAM Committees passed a bill with amendments that clarified the trustee fee schedule. This year, the House JUD Committee worked with the proponents of the measure to clarify the measure's language and include a provision that requires the banks and trust companies to provide written notice if their fee schedule changes. The Senate is agreeing to the latest House amendments because the amendments strengthen the intent of the measure and change the effective date to January 1, 2015. Thank you."

RE: SB 2658 SD3: Re: Solar Facilities on Agricultural Land

I'm writing to ask you to amend SB2658 SD3 to provide the State Land Use Commission with the power to enforce Special Permit conditions.

SB2658 SD3 authorizes solar facilities to be placed on up to 100% of Class B agricultural lands, provided the facility: (1) allows compatible agricultural uses on the property; and (2) the applicant obtains a Special Permit.

Up until now, industrial-scale solar facilities have been prohibited on Class A and B lands in order to preserve our best soils for agricultural use.

First Wind is seeking a change in this state policy. They are holding out the promise of sharing the land with "compatible" agricultural activities. They support statutory language requiring them to "offer the land at 50% reduced market rate to compatible agricultural operation."

The problem: SB2653 SD3 as written is not enforceable.

I've attached an AG Opinion which states that there is no clear authority for either the County or the State to enforce conditions the Land Use Commission (LUC) places on special Permits. (See final paragraph on pg. 2 for conclusion.)

Accordingly, the bill – if passed – could result in solar facilities being placed on hundreds of acres of Class B land, an operator defining "compatible" agriculture narrowly and "offering" to rent land at 50% below market rate – and then saying they were unable to find any compatible agricultural tenants.

Tin Roof Farms, which raises sheep, is submitting testimony in support of the bill in hopes of later leasing some of the solar facilities' land. The head of the private Mililani Agricultural Park is getting up mock solar panels and testing shade tolerant crops, in the hopes of expanding to lower rent lands. I have met

with the First Wind proponents and suggested a number of ways to amend the bill to ensure they end up with some agriculture on the property. They have rejected all suggestions.

This response raises concerns regarding this, or other, solar developers will ever actually place agriculture onto the property. A failure to put compatible agriculture on these lands would be grossly unfair to the farmers who support this bill, and violate our state policy to preserve our limited best soils for agricultural production.

Providing the Land Use Commission with the ability to enforce, amend or vacate Special Permit conditions will allow a solar developer and the LUC to work out the timing and details of the shared agricultural use at the permitting stage. In the event the developer runs into unforeseen circumstances, they can seek an amendment of permit conditions. But the Legislature can at least be assured that some shared agricultural use will occur on our best soils.

I've spoken with the LUC Executive Director, to ask for statutory language that would enable that body to enforce conditions they place on Special Permits. I'm providing the draft amendments for your consideration.


"§205-6 Special permit. (g) Any other provision of the laws to the contrary notwithstanding, the land use commission may vacate, void, modify or amend any special permit if it reasonably finds that there has been a failure to substantially confirm with the conditions or requirements of the order granting the special permit.

I've attached the AG Opinion. The bill would authorize solar facilities on all Class B lands, and not just the parcels under consideration by First Wind. We are speaking of a very limited number of parcels that are capable of hosting large-scale agriculture.

Re: Enforcement of Special Permits Under Chapter 205,  
 Hawaii Revised Statutes

This responds to your email request of March 5, 2014, for advice as to the authority of the Land Use Commission (LUC) to enforce conditions of special permits granted under Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 205-6.

For land that is fifteen acres or less in size or not designated "important agricultural lands" (IAL), the LUC has no authority to impose conditions on permits or to enforce conditions of special permits, because special permits for land that is fifteen acres or less in size (and not IAL) are subject only to county approval. See HRS section 205-6(a). As to lands in excess of fifteen acres in size or lands designated IAL, the enforcement authority of the LUC is less clear.

HRS section 205-6 provides in part:

(a) Subject to this section, the county planning commission may permit certain unusual and reasonable uses within agricultural and rural districts other than those for which the district is classified. Any person who desires to use the person's land within an agricultural or rural district other than for agricultural or rural use, as the case may be, may

petition the planning commission of the county within which the person's land is located for permission to use the person's land in the manner desired. Each county may establish the appropriate fee for processing the special permit petition. Copies of the special permit petition shall be forwarded to the land use commission, the office of planning, and the department of agriculture for review and comment.

\*\*\*

(c) The county planning commission may, under such protective restrictions as may be deemed necessary, permit the desired use, but only when the use would promote the effectiveness and objectives of this chapter; provided that a use proposed for designated important agricultural lands shall not conflict with any part of this chapter. A decision in favor of the applicant shall require a majority vote of the total membership of the county planning commission.

(d) Special permits for land the area of which is greater than fifteen acres or for lands designated as important agricultural lands shall be subject to the approval of the land use commission. The land use commission may impose additional restrictions as may be necessary or appropriate in granting the approval, including the adherence to representations made by the applicant.

\*\*\*

HRS section 205-6 gives the LUC authority to provide a secondary approval in the limited cases of land exceeding fifteen acres in size or land of any size designated as IAL. The LUC is also given authority to impose additional conditions to a county approved permit. See HRS section 205-6(e). The LUC administrative rules allow the LUC to modify, release, or delete a condition to a special permit. See Hawaii Administrative Rules section 15-15-96.1 HRS section 205-6, however, is silent as to how conditions of a special permit are to be enforced.

It could be argued that since the special permit process starts with the county, the county has jurisdiction to enforce conditions for all special permits. But there is nothing in the statute regarding whether the LUC or the county is to enforce LUC-imposed conditions.

The enforcement provision in HRS chapter 205 is stated in HRS section 205-12, and the penalties for violation are contained in HRS section 205-13. HRS section 205-12 provides that the counties are to enforce the "use classification districts adopted by the land use commission and the restrictions on use and the conditions relating to agricultural districts under section 205-4.5 . . ." Although it is not explicit whether the counties are responsible for enforcing special permits issued pursuant to HRS section 205-6, under the ruling in *Morgan v. Planning Department, County of Kauai*, 104 Hawai'i 173 (2004), it would appear that the counties have



implied authority to enforce such conditions. In Atty. Gen. Op. No. 70-22, we concluded that "the counties have the duty to enforce the land use law and that such duties include using whatever legal or other corrective measures may be necessary to insure conformance with Chapter 205 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes." We further note that, for example, the Planning Commission of the City and County of Honolulu has adopted administrative rules relating to enforcement of conditions of special permits. See section 2-48 of the Rules of the Planning Commission of the City and County of Honolulu.

We conclude, therefore, that while there is no clear authority in HRS chapter 205 for the counties to enforce conditions the LUC may impose on special permits, HRS section 205-12 confers implied authority to the counties to enforce special permit conditions. It is not clear that the LUC has any jurisdiction to enforce its conditions on special permits.

## FIFTY-THIRD DAY

Thursday, April 17, 2014

Senator Solomon presented the following remarks:

“Aloha mai. I’d like to dedicate this to the passing of Ali’i Sir H.K. Bruss Keppeler. Ali’i Sir H.K. Bruss Keppeler, known to many of us in these halls as ‘Uncle Bruss,’ passed on Saturday, April 12, 2014. Uncle Bruss Keppeler’s whole life was dedicated to the issues of sovereignty as it relates to the Native Hawaiian peoples. I’d like to just read a few remarks that were made by President Grover Cleveland, who was President of the United States, who at that time supported the Queen’s effort:

The law of nations is founded upon reason and justice, and the rules of conduct governing individual relations between citizens or subjects of a civilized state are equally applicable as between enlightened nations. The considerations that international law is without a court for its enforcement, and that obedience to its commands practically depends upon good faith, instead of upon the mandate of a superior tribunal, only give additional sanction to the law itself and brand any deliberate infraction of it not merely as wrong but as a disgrace.

These principles apply to the present case with irresistible force when the special conditions of [Queen Lili’uokalani’s] surrender of her sovereignty are recalled. [The Queen] surrendered not to the provisional government, but to the United States. She surrendered not absolutely and permanently, but temporarily and conditionally until such time as the facts could be considered by the United States.

“Then, on July 6, 2011, Governor Neil Abercrombie signed Senate Bill 1520 into law as Act 195. Uncle Bruss said at the bill signing, ‘For the k̄naka maoli, this measure is one more important step in a very long and arduous journey toward justice. Indeed, this journey has taken more than a span of a single life. It has taken generations. For all of the people of Hawai’i, it marks a historic and positive step in the reconciliation process, mending relations between the State of Hawai’i and the Native Hawaiian people.’

“Mahalo a nui loa, Uncle Bruss. This is your legacy, your life’s work, and we are proud to have been with you on part of this journey, shoulder to shoulder, as we shared your aloha. You taught us the meaning of ‘m̄lama,’ to care for our people, especially our k̄puna and our children; ‘h̄’ihi,’ to respect the views of all; and ‘kuleana,’ to take responsibility – these core values were the beginning of our great friendship with Uncle Bruss, whose love and steadfastness for the betterment of conditions for our beloved Hawai’i will remain with us always.

“I’d like to close with his own words, when he, in fact, said, ‘I have engaged in a lifetime of endeavors, striving to better the lot of my Hawaiian people and our heritage and culture.’ Aloha a hui hou no, Ali’i Sir H.K. Bruss Keppeler. Mahalo pau loa, mahalo nui. Aloha.”

“Madam President, I rise to speak in support of House Concurrent Resolution No. 167. HCR 167 proposes the establishment of a task force to plan and coordinate the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

“The State Foundation on Culture and the Arts was established by the Legislature in 1965. Its mission is to promote, perpetuate, preserve, and encourage culture and the arts, history, and the humanities as central to the quality of life of the people of Hawai‘i. Its creation made Hawai‘i eligible to receive federal grants from the National Endowment for the Arts. Next year, 2015, will mark the Foundation’s fiftieth anniversary, an occasion well-deserving of a statewide celebratory series of programs.

“The proposed task force of sixteen members, to be established within the Department of Accounting and General Services, will develop, plan, and coordinate various program activities to celebrate and commemorate the Foundation’s fiftieth anniversary, including a series of events from July 1, 2014 through December 31, 2015. The task force is to report to the Legislature prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015.

“Every day, and on every island, we are the beneficiaries of the vision of those legislators who advocated for the creation of the Foundation in 1965, and subsequent programs that were the first of their kind in the nation – the Art in Public Places

Program (1967) and the Artists in the Schools Program (1970). More recently, the Foundation has especially promoted and recognized Hawaii's talented visual and performing artists and folk artists.

"More personally for us, for six years now the Legislature has held its Art at the Capitol event on the first Friday in April. The majority of legislators, the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, and the Public Access Room have opened their offices after hours to share the extensive portion of the Art in Public Places collection that is displayed within the Capitol. Many of the artists whose works are displayed here have been able to participate and discuss their efforts. Members of the Hawaii Youth Symphony have performed during the event – providing a wonderful musical accompaniment to our enjoyment of the creativity and diversity of Hawaii's artists.

"It is appropriate for us to celebrate the tremendous work and accomplishments of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts upon the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary, especially through a coordinated series of diverse cultural and artistic displays and performances. That coordination, in collaboration with many partners, will be the responsibility of the task force. The celebration will be of our people and their creativity. The experience and inspiration will be uniquely our own.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in support of HCR 167.

"Thank you, Madam President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. Senator Solomon noted:

“There were just several technical changes.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2876, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 2876, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII, SECTION 12, OF THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION TO ASSIST DAM AND RESERVOIR OWNERS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Monday, April 21, 2014.

At this time, Senator Hee rose to speak in a point of information as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise on two points: the first is a point of information. All members of the Senate should have received an electronic communication that was forwarded by me to you from the Ethics Commission. The Ethics Commission – I believe it was yesterday – took it upon themselves to evaluate and subsequently decide to open an investigation of nepotism at the Hawaii State Hospital as a result of the ongoing hearings conducted by your Senate committee investigating Hawaii State Hospital. All of you, if you have any questions, you should either come see me or call Mr. Kondo directly. He, evidently, is asking for some information. As soon as we get clearance from our attorney assigned to the investigative committee, my guess is we’ll be forwarding that information to the Ethics Commission.

Senator Hee continued to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“The second reason I am rising is on a point of personal privilege. Today’s lead editorial is titled, ‘Repelling ants takes full effort.’ In short, what it is is the *Advertiser’s* enunciation of what really originated on the Senate floor several weeks ago as a result of a press conference held by your committee’s chair on Agriculture and me in my office. Long story short, Department of Ag evidently has seen the wisdom in disclosing the location of the little fire ants in Waimānalo. I’m not sure why it took so long for them to discover that people impacted in the immediate area really want to be helpful but cannot be helpful as long as a veil of secrecy conducted by the Department of Ag persisted. For whatever reason, Department of Ag should be acknowledged for understanding the virtue of full disclosure, particularly in areas populated by many people.

“The second reason my view is that this is an editorial worthy of note is it may be time for the Legislature to consider whether invasive species properly belongs in the jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture. It’s my own opinion, having personal experience, that the Department of Health is much more effective in disclosing issues of public health and safety and also taking decisive action. I said earlier that many years ago, when I was running cattle on Moloka‘i, there was a bovine tuberculosis outbreak and the Department of Health wasted little time in placing a quarantine on an entire island – not part of the island, not a district of the island, but the entire island – and before too long, eliminated every living bovine on the island. In the case of Moloka‘i Ranch, it was in excess of 500 cow-calf units, and in the case of myself, who was using a homestead in Ho‘olehua, 40 head of cattle, because it was a public health issue.

“I would believe very strongly that those on the Big Island, in particular, who have been victimized by the little fire ant would agree that an issue like this is worthy of the public’s health and welfare going forward. So I believe, in light of the

truculence initially by the Department of Agriculture and their newfound virtue in full disclosure, that it may be worthy of thought by the Legislature to consider invasive species as a kuleana, going forward, prospectively, of the Department of Health. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in response as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. Although I want to commend the previous speaker for his concerns and remarks, I don’t totally agree. My thoughts were, as I have been deliberating on the issue through committee hearings, that I think we would be best served if we had an MOU with the counties. I feel that the counties should be the ones that should be more responsible for the eradication of invasive species within their respective kuleana. And I think that this is something that we should definitely look at, whether it’s going to be over the interim or, at least, for next session. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to thank the members for their Easter basket donations for the Institute for Human Services to help mothers and children at the shelter and those transitioning into housing.

Senator Thielen rose to make the following remarks:

“Thank you, Madam President. Getting back to the invasive species issue, I want to applaud the Department of Agriculture for taking a precautionary approach in doing a survey of the area before identifying the location of the little fire ants. There was some concern that some of them were located on private nurseries and it turns out, after the survey, that none of them were located on private nurseries. So, it was beneficial to those businesses not to have their reputation impugned until after the survey was done. And then, once the location was identified, the Department has announced it, which I think was a good, measured approach.

“I agree that we should take a look at the best way and most effective way for our state to eradicate invasive species, but I do want to point out: While some of them may be a public health concern, we do have a number of invasive species like miconia that don’t really affect the public health whatsoever, but they do affect the environmental health of our watersheds, and so, that’s something to take into consideration as we evaluate the issue. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you. I agree, in substance, with the previous speaker, but let’s be clear about something with little fire ants on O‘ahu. Those ants have been in Waimānalo for three years – *three* years. Thousand days. Three years. So, while we like to be patient with our state departments, 3 years is 2 years and 11 months too long to keep the public stupefied by what they believe to be little fire ants, but they just don’t know where in Waimānalo. And trying to put the best face on the Department of Ag is challenging, Madam President.

“So, rather than engage in some surgical procedure to find the black hole in the Department of Ag, suffice it to say, a lesson may have been learned. And that lesson was learned in large part, in my opinion, because of the discussion held on this carpet in this chamber. Now, maybe somebody wants to get up and say it was a mere coincidence; I don’t think so. I think the State Department of Ag needs to get its act together, and it begins with transparency. People are injured and people are getting hurt. Most of all, people are being kept in the dark by the ones whose paychecks are signed by them – not by the nurseries, but by the ones that are being kept in the dark. So, if we want to mollify the discussion by saying that they should be given credit, that’s okay with me. But let’s give them also what is their due. Little fire ants have been in Waimānalo for three

years and only now, the Department of Ag has found the wisdom in disclosure. I may write a certificate in that regard. Thank you, Madam President.”

The Chair then made the following announcement:

“The deadline to file committee reports on amended House concurrent resolutions in order to meet Monday’s second crossover deadline is 4:30 p.m. today. The Clerk’s office will distribute a list this evening of all resolutions to be scheduled for adoption on Monday.”

You know, I think it's almost every so many months – because, as you know, my daughter is in attendance at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa – they do get these emails: someone was assaulted here, someone was assaulted there. You know, and I've asked my daughter, 'Is there any follow-up after you're notified?' And she said, no, there's no follow-up. So, I think

this is very serious, and as well you know, most of those that are assaulted are females, but I'm sure maybe males are being assaulted also; it's just that it's not being reported properly. So, I urge all my colleagues to strongly support this resolution. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the nominees as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise to speak in favor of Gov. Msg. Nos. 706 and 707, both reappointments to the Board of Education. Thank you. While I could talk at length about the contributions and confirmation process for both, I would like to have the Clerk insert written comments in the Journal in support of Mr. Williams and instead focus my comments on the floor on Chair Horner’s tenure and hopes for continued service.

“At the confirmation hearing, your committee received testimony in support of the nominee from a range of organizations and individuals including the Hui for Excellence in Education, the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools, the Friends of the Library of Hawai‘i, the Filipino American Citizens League, the Hawai‘i Public Charter Schools Network, the Hawaii Business Roundtable, and the Friends of Civil Rights. Following the hearing, we also received a letter from Equality Hawai‘i informing the committee that they had met with Chair Horner for an hour and a half to discuss the various issues and concerns that had been brought forward during the confirmation process, summing up their meeting in a single thought: ‘We learned that more brings us together than separates us. We are pleased to find that common ground and accept his invitation to be involved in multiple issues where our perspectives would be valuable and our mutual interests significant.’

“There was, however, also a significant amount of testimony and opposition to Chair Horner’s reappointment from groups and individuals including the Americans for Democratic Action Hawai‘i; the Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawaii; Girl Fest Hawaii; and Rainbow Family 808. Much of the opposition centered around Chair Horner’s personal affiliation with New Hope Diamond Head as a pastor, as well as concerns regarding public accessibility to Board of Education members and the board meetings.

“Your committee engaged Chair Horner in a full discussion on the issues and concerns raised, from conflicts of interest in regards to use of facilities to the recent handling of curriculum concerns to the management of meetings. Upon completion, indications were clear to the committee that steps were continuously being taken to improve the transparency and accessibility of the Board of Education; and Chair Horner reiterated that while he has never attempted to hide his religious affiliation, he made it clear to members that he has never imposed it upon our school system through his position on the board or through board policy.

“Colleagues, through the confirmation process and subsequent hearings, I have had the opportunity to reflect on where we’ve come since passing the original enabling appointed Board of Education legislation back in 2011, and confirming Chair Horner during that same session. Despite operating with one-third the staff and less than a third of the total budget as compared to 2010 totals – when the Board of Education was elected, which included \$110,000 for board member compensation, as individuals were paid \$100 a day for attending meetings and appointed members are no longer compensated for attendance – the Board of Education has made

great strides during Chair Horner’s tenure. They have adopted more rigorous diploma requirements through Board of Education Policy No. 4540 that are aligned with the state’s college and career readiness goals; successfully implemented Act 130, which completely recodified the state’s charter school law; created the first ever joint Board of Education and DOE strategic plan to align its goals and overall vision and direction; and approved a phase-in schedule to ensure that all DOE schools are accredited by 2019.

“Through his leadership, the Board of Education increased public accessibility to the board by holding over 400 stakeholder meetings statewide; holding over 169 committee and board meetings since 2011; instituting chair office hours, which take place twice a month, usually between 4:30 and 5:30 p.m. following board meetings; and creating an independent hotline with an audit trail to provide opportunities for individuals to express their concerns anonymously.

“Working with fellow board members, Chair Horner has made it a priority to increase access to state public libraries by expanding hours of operation to include weekend hours; improved the Board of Education’s student representation selection process to increase the student voice by supporting participation by students in all 44 high schools; worked with various stakeholder groups through a series of 40 meetings to approve the revision of Hawaiian education program policies to ensure that the related constitutional and statutory mandates are appropriately effected; and created an audit committee to proactively investigate and address issues within the department, already resulting in various school- and system-level results including efforts to overhaul the school food service system and processing of background checks.

“In talking with Chair Horner, he is the first to say he is not an expert, but through the conversation, it becomes evidently clear that he has done his homework and is willing to listen to all sides to formulate solutions that are both short- and long-term. In meeting with your committee, he was both gracious and humble, and he made clear that more could be done to support our schools and improve the workings of our board, which he laid out to us in his plans and his thoughts, which is why he has sought a second term as chair.

“Knowing that you have been receiving emails advocating for both the support and opposition for his nomination, I struggled for a way to close my comments today that would do our deliberations justice. As often I do during times like this, I look to the great orators and thinkers of our times and happened upon this quote that I think is appropriate for the vote that is before us. In 1908, President Theodore Roosevelt wrote:

To discriminate against a thoroughly upright citizen because he belongs to some particular church, or because, like Abraham Lincoln, he has not avowed his allegiance to any church, is an outrage against that liberty of conscience which is one of the foundations of American life. You are entitled to know whether a man seeking your suffrages is a man of clean and upright life, honorable in all of his dealings with his fellows, and fit by qualification and purpose to do well in the great office for which he is a candidate; but you are not entitled to know matters which lie purely between himself and his maker.

“Colleagues, I humbly ask you to join me in supporting Chair Horner for his reappointment to the Board of Education. Thank you.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Tokuda’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Mr. Williams is seeking a second term on the Board of Education and wishes to continue the significant progress the appointed Board has made in the first three years, including implementing the joint Board of Education and Department of Education strategic plan; and monitoring achievement objectives set forth in that plan.

“Mr. Williams was first appointed in 2011 and has served on the Board of Education’s Finance and Infrastructure Committee, Student Achievement Committee, Audit Committee, and Human Resources Committee. As the Chair of the Human Resources Committee, Mr. Williams has provided leadership in developing a strategic plan for staff success; drafted Board policies on performance, evaluation, and pay; adopted and implemented a comprehensive evaluation process for the Superintendent of Education and the State Librarian; and helped to shepherd the implementation of the new charter school law, Act 130, including the startup of the new Charter School Commission. Mr. Williams extensive charter school experience has been particularly valuable in the implementation of Act 130, and will be critical as both the commission and the Board move forward.

“Mr. Williams brings a unique and varied background in education, administration, and business to the Board of Education, and he continues to contribute his high level of knowledge and professionalism to the Board of Education. Mr. Williams spent 11 years as a Social Studies teacher at Kaunakakai School and Moloka’i High and Intermediate School. He is one of the founders of Voyager Charter School, and currently serves as the Vice Chair of the Voyager Charter School Governing Board and Chair of the Board of the Voyager School Foundation.

“Mr. Williams has had various experiences dealing with all aspects of school administration, including facilities and financial needs. His background of teaching and knowledge of numerous administrative duties make him an excellent choice for the Board of Education. Our students and their families, teachers and community will benefit from Mr. Williams remaining as a Board member, bringing his wealth of experience and knowledge to the group.”

“I believe that Mr. Aczon’s wealth of experience in the construction industry will enable him to deliberate and contribute to discussions regarding the complex land use issues before the Land Use Commission.”

“Thomas Oi possesses a wealth of knowledge about the land and natural resources on Kauai, having worked in land surveying on Kauai for many years.”

“Madam President, I rise to speak in support, specifically relating to Gov. Msg. No. 705, to fill a vacant position on the State of Hawai‘i’s Board of Land and Natural Resources. ## ORDER OF THE DAY

## FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148-14 (H.B. No. 1700, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Ige moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 1700, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Chun Oakland.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Madam President, I rise to speak in support of H.B. No. 1700, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, the Supplemental Appropriations Bill for fiscal year 2015.

"Before proceeding, I would like to thank all of you for your insights, assistance, and support in formulating this conference draft, especially those of you who share our conference room on the Ways and Means Committee; I do appreciate all of your input. I would also like to acknowledge the support; although the staff did not want to be here formally, I know that they're listening in the offices. As you all know, staff are so important to all of the work that we do. I did want to acknowledge Calvin Azama, Rod Becker, and Susan Hirai and the rest of the Ways and Means staff for all of their work on the budget as well as the many bills that the Ways and Means Committee manages and tries to fund during the session.

"I would also like to express my appreciation for House Finance Chair Sylvia Luke. In these last two years, we have shared a good rapport in working through the many critical fiscal issues that are before the state. It is through this joint effort of the Senate and the House that this budget was developed, and it is a product in which we may all take pride.

"This conference draft reflects our prudence, sense of responsibility, good judgment, and willingness to make difficult decisions among many competing demands. The administration had requested an additional \$200 million in general funds for fiscal year 2015. Instead, the conference draft approves \$65.7 million in general funds for fiscal year 2015. The conference draft also further reduces appropriations for the current fiscal year from the administration's request of a reduction of \$53.4 million in general funds to a total reduction of more than \$92 million in general funds. Over the current fiscal biennium, this amounts to a total general fund reduction to the administration's request of \$173 million. With these reductions of the conference draft, the executive budget for the fiscal biennium now amounts to \$11.7 billion in all funds, inclusive of \$5.9 billion in general funds for fiscal year 2014;

and \$12.1 billion in all funds, which includes \$6.2 billion in general funds for fiscal year 2015. In the interest of full disclosure, please make note that a portion of the \$134 million in general fund reduction in fiscal year 2015 is taken from programs that are funded through separate bills.

“The Senate and House have passed a joint majority package: bills appropriating funds for the Hawaii Invasive Species Council, Kupuna Care, and other important senior measures. We note that the reductions have been made from the supplemental request. Despite the cutbacks of the administration’s supplemental budget request, this conference draft funds the higher priorities of both the Legislature and the executive.

“I just wanted to make a few comments about the preparation of the budget. Preparation for this budget really began long before the convening of the Session of 2014. In monitoring monthly annual tax collections, the possibility of a potential shortfall of general funds in revenues in fiscal year 2013-2014 became apparent. The actual general fund tax collections from the beginning of the fiscal year lagged the projected growth rates of the Council on Revenues. The Council on Revenues also apparently was concerned about the pace of collection and other economic factors. Since September 2013, the Council lowered its general fund revenue projections twice. On January 7, the Council met and reduced the general fund tax revenue growth for fiscal year 2014 from +4.1 percent to +3.3 percent. Each percentage point equates to about \$50 million in revenue. Subsequent tax collections still showed a continuing decline in the revenue collections for the State of Hawai‘i.

“With this fiscal backdrop, the Council on Revenues again met on March 11 and, as expected, the Council reduced the projected general fund tax revenue growth rate for fiscal year 13-14. Unexpectedly, however, the Council also reduced the projected revenue growth rate for fiscal years 15, 16, and 17. The reduction went from +3.3 percent to 0 percent in the current fiscal year; from +7.4 percent to 5.5 percent in fiscal year 2015; and from 7.7 percent to 5.0 percent in fiscal year 16. The Council’s reduced revenue projections had a major impact on the general funds available in this biennium budget. The projected revenue loss was \$190 million in the current fiscal year and more than \$300 million in the fiscal year 2015. The projected revenue loss for the next biennium was even more staggering – frankly, extremely alarming: \$484 million for fiscal year 16, \$502 million in fiscal year 17. The total cumulative impact on the revenue forecast was \$1.5 billion less than had been previously projected. The executive budget that sat before us was a billion dollars in deficit spending in the current biennium.

“For this and the next fiscal biennium, state government is expected to experience negative revenues over expenditures; that is, government will spend more than it takes in for the next several years. Our annual budget will be balanced by the carryover surplus of \$844 million that we struggled to achieve in the aftermath of the recession. We face much difficulty in the future and have chosen to not compound this by unwise or irresponsible actions taken today. We have continued our commitment to fiscal responsibility and have honored our investment in the unfunded liabilities of both the health fund and pension fund, so rest assured that those trust funds will remain intact and on a pathway to full funding.

“Although this conference draft is austere, it funds many of the programs of high priority to the Legislature and the executive. This clearly is a budget that makes and expresses our commitment to public education and the University of Hawai‘i System. The Department of Education got the lion’s share of additional funds that is appropriated in this budget: more than \$31.6 million have been added, which includes \$15 million in the weighted student formula – those are funds that will go to

each and every school across the state. We’ve also added \$3.7 million for special education services, \$1.9 million to implement the Strive HI performance improvement system, \$2 million for student athletics, \$9 million for utilities and other fixed costs, and we’ve made an appropriation for \$3 million for the early learning program through pre-kindergarten. Clearly, our commitment to public education is reaffirmed in this budget.

“In addition, we’ve appropriated more than \$23.5 million to the University of Hawai‘i and we have demonstrated our commitment to stabilizing the West O‘ahu campus by providing 89 positions and \$4 million in operating funds so that the university can begin to build its programs that all of our communities want.

“We have also made investments in the infrastructure and safety net services in the Department of Human Services, Health, and the Health Systems Corporation, and we have made a commitment to fund the UH College of Pharmacy and the primary care residency program at the Hilo Medical Center.

“All in all, members, I really believe that this budget demonstrates our commitment to the core priorities of state government and I encourage all of you to support it. Thank you.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“First of all, I also want to acknowledge the work of the Ways and Means chair, members, and staff; I know it’s extremely difficult. And I want to take some of the words that the Ways and Means chairman just used: the alarming figures, the revenue losses, the economic estimates of downturn. My background is that of a consulting economist; my belief has been, as I’ve expressed to you many times, we never came out of the recession. We are still in a recession now. The people of Hawai‘i are suffering and they are struggling: single moms, families, and small businesses. And while it is difficult to make decisions, and difficult to say ‘no’ to certain people and certain needs, that is our job.

“And we heard before we went into conference that this was a prudent budget, an austere budget – and yet I would take issue with that. It’s not austere when we’re spending more money than we’re taking in. It’s not prudent when we see the alarm signs all around us and now almost everybody, almost everyone, can read these economic signposts, and they tell us that we must change our course. And yet we have not. Instead of this being a debate over the budget, it more accurately is a spending bill and a debate on spending. And the question is the priorities, and we still don’t seem to get our priorities straight because every time a special interest group comes in to lobby us, then their issue becomes front and center and the most important thing. And I’m not here to diminish the importance to individuals and to groups of their particular programs, but I am here to say, ‘This is not our money; this is the public’s money.’ This is the young people that we see sitting in the gallery today. They’re the ones that are going to be responsible for the fiscal decisions that we make.

“People talk about compassion and they say we have to be compassionate. It’s a lot easier to be compassionate with other people’s lives and other people’s money. True compassion means fiscal restraint and fiscal reality. And the fact that we cut some of the increases that the governor proposed is not reducing the overall spending that we need to do, that every family and every business that operates under a budget must do. It’s painful; you don’t want to do it, but you must do it in order to survive. Most families and most businesses don’t have the opportunity to tax their neighbors to get more revenue or to

issue bonds, to which additional debt accrues. They must live within their means.

“And that means we need to change, but we haven’t done that. We’re on the same course. In addition to the \$23.7 billion in this supplemental two-year budget, as was correctly pointed out, we have additional measures, which we’re going to vote on this morning, which also authorize more millions of dollars. We also have the debt service that we pay. We also have a capital improvements budget. We have all of these expenditures, yet we don’t have the means to pay for them. And as was pointed out, after the next two fiscal periods, fiscal year 15 and 16, this state will be without cash. It will be in a deficit position. We are gambling on the future – not our future in the Legislature, but the future of the taxpayers and the young people that we say that we represent. We’re gambling that somehow, some way, from sources unknown to us now, we’ll be able to find the money to fund the expenditures of today.

“Your Senate Minority, for the last several years, has worked very diligently to produce an alternative budget; and I would like to salute our members and particularly our budget director, Paul Harleman, who worked so hard and worked in conjunction with the state budget director to make sure that we were accurate in what we were doing. But it is a clear difference in philosophy, and our philosophy is we have to cut spending. We have to cut debt, because in addition to the operating supplemental budget and the CIP and the budget of the judiciary, in addition to the additional bills that we have that appropriate money, we also have the largest unfunded liability in the nation at over \$20 billion more. That’s just to pay for employees, retired and active, their health plan, and their retirement plan. We are a state of a population of 1.4 million people. Do the numbers. We can’t afford \$20 billion here, \$23 billion there; it just doesn’t add up.

“And we didn’t pass one bill this session – not one – to help improve our business climate, to lower the cost of doing business in this state, to make us more hospitable as a business and investment place that people want to come to. Instead, we hear about how costly it is to live; how our costs keep going up geometrically; how we fail to wrestle with other alternatives; how we can’t even get support in this legislative body to ask our Congress and our congressional delegation to seek relief from the burdensome Jones Act, just as Alaska has done, just as Guam has done, just as Puerto Rico has done, but not Hawai‘i. And now we know that over 50 percent of the increased costs come from this one piece of legislation alone.

“But we haven’t done these things; we haven’t made the changes. So, we can pat ourselves on the back and leave here today thinking that we’ve done a good job and wrestled with the hard decisions, and yet we have not. It’s difficult being a good legislator; it’s difficult having to vie with these competing interests. But it’s just like being a parent: Occasionally, you have to say ‘no,’ and even though your child is unhappy with you and may even be angry with you, it’s the right thing to do.

“So, I urge my members, I urge my colleagues to look at these figures carefully, to understand where the money comes from, to understand that if we don’t improve our overall economy that we are going to visit upon our children and their children grave economic consequences, and it won’t be because no one knew about it or no one raised a warning flag. So, you’ll have to vote your conscience and you’ll have to vote what you do. It’s not easy to vote against the budget because there are many fine things in the budget and many contributions that have been made. But it is the idea that we need to change direction in Hawai‘i and we need to do it now. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“One might have thought that assembling the construction budget in better economic times would be easier than in the immediate past, but this has very definitely not been the case. In spite of the Administration’s somewhat optimistic budget proposal – and largely because of revised forecasts from the Council on Revenues – we found that it was necessary to cut and re-prioritize to accommodate what, together with the House, we eventually decided on as the best investments in bond-funded projects. So, I believe our priorities are straight.

“The longer term economic outlook for two or three years out offers hope that some of our unmet needs can be taken care of, but for now, here is an overview of the items we have agreed on in the draft before us.

“H.B. No. 1700, C.D. 1 proposes a CIP budget for fiscal biennium 2013-2015 in the amount of just over \$5 billion, of which \$2.3 billion is funded by general obligation or reimbursable bonds.

“A primary goal is to continue the progress begun over the last few years in renovating, repairing, and maintaining existing state-owned facilities to utilize our current resources and reduce general fund expenditures in the future.

“C.D. 1 proposes nearly \$900 million to fund these types of projects – including \$700 million for the Department of Education and \$90 million for the UH System – with the remainder allocated to hundreds of other projects, mainly within the Department of Health, DLNR, and DAGS.

“Major funding in the amount of \$1.9 billion is provided to the Department of Transportation for highways, harbors, and airports, including an additional \$280 million for the new mauka concourse at Honolulu International Airport.

“Another priority was to designate appropriations for projects needed to address future capacity needs and economic growth.

“C.D. 1 includes funding for the UH Hilo College of Pharmacy in the amount of \$32 million. We are also funding a new allied health and administration building for the growing UH West O‘ahu campus at Kapolei in the amount of \$28 million.

“Following last year’s major investment in technology infrastructure, the budget this year includes an investment of \$100 million in state and matching federal funds for KOLEA, the new eligibility system for public assistance programs.

“Let me thank Ways and Means Chair David Ige for his encouraging support and steadfast leadership and diligence in supporting our efforts through this CIP budget. A big mahalo also to our counterparts in the House for their support and hard work in crafting this CIP budget. We all look forward to the positive impact this budget will have on our state. And finally, I’d be remiss if I didn’t introduce my staff: my CIP specialist, Will Kane, and my office manager, Park Kaleiwahea. I wanted to thank Will for his expertise and knowledge and abundance of patience, as well as my office manager, Park, and all of my staff for keeping us focused through this very, very hard work. And I thank all of you, my colleagues and Madam President, also for your patience with us. Mahalo.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“I’m pleased to note that the Senate understands the importance of the budget as a policy document and works with our House colleagues to ensure that the budget can be used as a tool for economic development and growth. That will really

help our bottom line as a state. This budget balances the needs in health and human services along with the needs in business, economic development, and tourism, housing, and all of the other areas that are primary for the state to fund in terms of both operating and capital improvement. I think it conveys that the Legislature, with this C.D. 1, are actually responsible, visionary, concerned about where we put our dollars and are being the best stewards of those resources that we can.

"I'd like to congratulate our Ways and Means chair. Madam President, you, Senator Taniguchi, and I know how difficult it is to sit in that role. I think that the Senate has been fortunate over the past number of years to have his steady leadership and his steadfast interest in working with all of our colleagues to make sure that the budget was balanced, it took the needs on the neighbor islands as well as O'ahu into consideration, and tried to accommodate priority of our various constituencies as well as our subject-matter areas. I'd also like to commend the vice chair of Ways and Means for her leadership in crafting the CIP portion of the budget. It's not an easy job trying to balance the needs and concerns that all of us, representing different parts of the state, who request consideration for construction projects, school improvement projects, and other infrastructure items that will make the lives in our various communities better.

"I'm proud of this budget; I'm proud of the work that all of the members of Ways and Means, under the leadership of Senator Ige and Senator Kidani, have done. We have a document that we can be proud of and will help to continue to move our state forward as we stay steadily on a course that's going to bring even better economic times for all of us. Mahalo."

Senator Chun Oakland rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you. First of all, I would like to thank Senator Ige and Senator Kidani for their leadership as Ways and Means chair and vice chair. Your thoughtful, creative, and diligent work will have long-lasting positive impact on our islands and the people of Hawai'i. Mahalo to all your staff and the members of Ways and Means, our Senate colleagues, all of our office staff and support staff for their countless hours and dedication to serving the public. Mahalo also to the executive branch for working together with the Legislature and providing guidance and assistance in our deliberations, as well as our House Finance chair and vice chairs and all the members of the House for their leadership and guidance.

"H.B. No. 1700, C.D. 1 provides funding for early childhood, public elementary, middle, and high school education; higher education; social and health services; needed transportation infrastructure upgrades for our harbors, airports, highways, and bikeways; social, environmental stewardship, and preservation initiatives; medical and public health facility upgrades; public safety and law enforcement supports and facility improvements; homeless and housing funding and infrastructure investments to make affordable housing a reality; information and technology upgrades that will improve efficiency in delivery of public services and cybersecurity infrastructure; juvenile justice restoration efforts and community integration programs for people coming out of incarceration; economic development investments that will continue to diversify our agriculture, tourism, green industries, technology, cultural and historical preservation; and many more important things.

"In particular, I wanted to highlight the area of affordable housing, public housing, housing for beneficiaries of Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, veterans' housing, long-term care, our after-school programs for middle school students and our elementary schools, and various social and health programs for our vulnerable populations.

"What I've included on your desks is a summary of some of the affordable housing initiatives that you have all been a part of. In particular for the budget, I wanted to point out the following: For the Rental Housing Trust Fund, which has built over 4,000 units to date, we are, for the first time, adding new monies to this trust fund in the amount of \$5 million. This, along with the bill that will increase and restore the Bureau of Conveyances tax to the Rental Housing Trust Fund, will help nonprofits and other developers to build affordable units here in Hawai'i. As you know, we have a 50,000 housing unit shortage in this state, of which 19,000 units are for those that are earning 80 percent of the area median income. For an individual person, that is about \$57,000 that you earn if you're at 100 percent of the AMI. So, 80 percent and below would be in the \$36,000 range or lower. And for a family of four, where the 100 percent of AMI for a family of four is about \$83,000, we're looking at units for households that earn about \$64,000 or less annually.

"We are also including in this budget an additional infusion of \$7 million in the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund. This particular DUR fund will help with building infrastructure that is needed to reduce the overall cost of building housing. We have also included in this budget \$7,832,000 in low-income housing tax credit loans, and as many developers have indicated to us, that is also critical in reducing the overall cost of housing built in Hawai'i. We have also added \$29,383,000 for the Hawaiian Home Lands trust fund. This will help over 23,000 applicants that are waiting for Hawaiian home lands: our Native Hawaiians. We are also adding \$26 million to the already-appropriated \$45 million last session to our Public Housing Authority. We have a waiting list of about 10,000 families, which equals about 30,000 people in Hawai'i.

"There are many other things that I know are noteworthy that our chairs of the various subject matters, I hope, will be able to highlight, but I really wanted to thank all of you and Senator Ige and Senator Kidani for making affordable housing a priority this year. Thank you very much."

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I just wanted to make some brief comments thanking the chairs. They did an excellent job protecting our health care safety net. The \$15 million emergency appropriation for HHSC will keep those hospitals open. The \$2 million appropriation for the residency program on the Big Island, as Chair Ige mentioned, helps us train primary care physicians. Resources for community health centers are essential for our most needy individuals. And they funded the good work of Senator Baker on the health insurance exchange to protect the Prepaid Health Care Act, which was absolutely essential to making sure we didn't lose ground on health insurance. So, just some of the highlights, and I think it was a good year, strategically, to preserve our health care safety net. Thank you, Madam Chair."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Madam Chair. I rise in support and take this opportunity, on behalf of the Senate Majority, to thank the chairs of the money committees in both houses and the vice chairs as well.

"As stewards of the taxpayers' money, colleagues, the Legislature has an obligation to both spend wisely on today's needs and to ensure that we have enough to be prepared for the challenges of the future. This state budget proposal was a cumulative result of four years of austere budgets, revenue changes, furloughs, and layoffs. Sacrifices were made by everyone: families, businesses, and governments. Utilizing the experiences of the past, the Legislature finds that the signs of slow growth are appearing throughout the economy.

Economists have consistently predicted much more moderate rates of growth in the coming years and the money chairs have adjusted.

"Considering all these factors, the Legislature has constructed a conservative budget. The Legislature tasks itself with assuring that government and the services on which people rely are consistent and sustainable for the long term and can withstand the cyclical nature of the economy. This sound and far-sighted financial plan and budget will allow the state to operate confidently and plan strategically for the future. We encourage all, especially in the majority, to vote in favor of the budget. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 1700, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 115-14 (H.B. No. 2490, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Chun Oakland moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 115-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 2490, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Ige then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 9) to H.B. No. 2490, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

Section 1. House Bill No. 2490, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended as follows:

1. By amending Section 5 of the bill to read:

"SECTION 5. Section 352D-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"**§352D-4** **Establishment; purpose.** There is established within the department of human services for administrative purposes only the office of youth services. The office of youth services is established to provide services and programs for youth at risk under one umbrella agency in order to facilitate optimum service delivery, to prevent delinquency, and to reduce the incidence of recidivism among juveniles through the provision of prevention, rehabilitation, and treatment services. The office shall also be responsible for program planning and development, intake/assessment, oversight, as well as consultation, technical assistance, and staff training relating to the delivery of services.

The office shall provide a continuum of services as follows:

- (1) An integrated intake/assessment and case management system;
- (2) The necessary educational, vocational, social counseling and mental health services;
- (3) Community-based shelter and residential facilities;
- (4) Oversight of youth services; and
- (5) Other programs which encourage the development of positive self-images and useful skills in such youth.

The executive director of the office of youth services shall submit annual reports to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, reporting the services or programs funded pursuant to this section, the number of youth served by each service or program, and the results of the services or programs funded.

To this end, on July 1, 1991, this office shall assume the responsibilities for juvenile corrections functions, which were temporarily placed in the department of corrections pursuant to Act 338 of 1987. These functions shall include, but not be limited to, all responsibilities, under chapter 352, for the Hawaii youth correctional facilities."

2. By amending Section 17 of the bill to read:

"SECTION 17. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,260,500 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the necessary costs and expenses incurred in carrying out the purposes of this Act.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of youth services for the purposes of this Act."

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Yes, Madam President. In reviewing the draft that was placed before us, we did notice that there were provisions that would have allowed unused appropriations for the juvenile justice reinvestment program to remain un-lapsed indefinitely. The floor amendment before us just deletes those provisions so that expenditures and appropriations for the juvenile justice reinvestment program are like any other appropriations that we make and lapse at the end of the fiscal year."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 9 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Ige then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 115-14 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Espero and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2490, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JUVENILE JUSTICE," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 136-14 (S.B. No. 2948, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 136-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2948, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Ige then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 10) to S.B. No. 2948, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. S.B. No. 2948, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended as follows:

1. By amending Section 1 of the bill to read:

"SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the public utilities commission is undergoing a major transition due to increased work complexity and program responsibilities, particularly in the area of energy regulation. To ensure that the mission of the public utilities commission is adequately supported, the commission should transition from its current administrative status within the department of budget and finance to being administratively attached to the department of commerce and consumer affairs; subject to certain limitations on the oversight role of the department of commerce and consumer affairs.

The legislature further finds that the commission's internal management capacity needs to be updated. The chairperson of the commission is in need of an executive officer to assist with managing the operations of the commission. The creation of an executive officer position to oversee the management and recruitment of personnel, budget planning and implementation, strategic planning and implementation, procurement and contract administration, and implementation of administrative programs and projects will enable the chairperson of the commission to focus on the growing number and increasingly technical complexity of issues brought before the commission. Enabling the commission to establish two civil service

positions, a personnel officer and a fiscal officer, will further support the commission and provide for a seamless transition.

The legislature additionally finds that the division of consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer affairs protects and advances the interests of Hawaii's consumers of regulated public utilities. The executive director and staff members of the division of consumer advocacy attend public hearings held by the public utilities commission to get input from the public, which helps them to better understand the consumer's perspective on utility services and rates. Because this understanding is an integral part of the division's work, the legislature concludes that the executive director of the division of consumer advocacy, rather than the director of commerce and consumer affairs, should be the consumer advocate in hearings before the public utilities commission.

The purpose of this Act is to adequately support the mission of the public utilities commission, ensure the efficient operation of the public utilities commission, address the role of the consumer advocate, and ensure that important decisions relating to public utilities continue to be made in the public interest by:

- (1) Transferring the administrative placement of the public utilities commission from the department of budget and finance to the department of commerce and consumer affairs; subject to certain limitations on the oversight and administrative support role of the department of commerce and consumer affairs;
- (2) Clarifying that notwithstanding section 26-35, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the public utilities commission has authority concerning standard administrative practices, including operational expenditures and the hiring of personnel;
- (3) Enabling the chairperson of the public utilities commission to appoint, employ, and dismiss an executive officer to manage the operations of the commission;
- (4) Enabling the chairperson of the public utilities commission to appoint, employ, and dismiss a fiscal officer and a personnel officer to further support the administrative activities of the commission and fulfill the administrative support functions formerly provided by the department of budget and finance;
- (5) Establishing that the executive director of the division of consumer advocacy shall be the consumer advocate; and
- (6) Appropriating funds to effectuate the transfer of the public utilities commission and for the hiring of an executive officer, a fiscal officer, and a personnel officer within the public utilities commission."

2. By amending Section 7 of the bill to read:

"SECTION 7. Section 269-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) There is established in the state treasury a public utilities commission special fund to be administered by the public utilities commission. The proceeds of the fund shall be used by the public utilities commission and the division of consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and consumer affairs for all expenses incurred in the administration of chapters 269, 271, 271G, 269E, and 486J[?], and for costs incurred by the department of commerce and consumer affairs to fulfill the department's limited oversight and administrative support functions; provided that the expenditures of the public utilities commission shall be in accordance with legislative appropriations. On a quarterly basis, an amount not exceeding thirty per cent of the proceeds remaining in the fund after the deduction for central service expenses, pursuant to section 36-27, shall be allocated by the public utilities commission to the division of consumer advocacy and deposited in the compliance resolution fund established pursuant to section 26-9(o); provided that all moneys allocated

by the public utilities commission from the fund to the division of consumer advocacy shall be in accordance with legislative appropriations.'"

Senator Ige moved that Floor Amendment No. 10 be adopted, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Yes, once again, Madam President, in reviewing the conference draft for S.B. No. 2948 that was decked, we did notice that there was a provision that increased the ceiling for the PUC special fund that would have impact on the financial plan that was not accommodated for or included in approval given the subject matter committees. This floor amendment just removes those provisions to ensure that the impact of S.B. No. 2948, C.D. 1 is appropriately reflected in the financial plan."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 10 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Ige then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 136-14 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Baker and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2948, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

“**HB1706 CD1** establishes a single fine for motorists who park a vehicle in a bicycle lane or pathway.

“As Hawai‘i is working on expanding its alternatives modes of travel, including bicycle paths and lanes, it is becoming more and more pressing that something be done to protect our bicyclists. One of the best ways we can do that is by reducing the occurrence of obstacles hindering the use of bike paths and lane. Currently a maximum fine for parking violations is \$500 but ticketing officers typically only impose the minimum fine of \$35 which is not high enough to deter offenders.

“By creating a higher, single fine for obstructions in bike lanes we will hopefully create a larger deterrent for motorists to obey the law.

It requires a meaningful dialogue between patients, their loved ones and their primary care provider whether physician or APRN. It gives patients and their families the peace-of-mind that their loved one will be cared for in exactly the way they want when patients are no longer able to speak for themselves.

“HB 2052, HD1 is consistent with barrier-breaking legislation enacted from 2009-2011, when the Legislature authorized APRNs to function independently as primary care providers to help relieve the oncoming shortage of primary care physicians. Expanding signatory authority to POLST is necessary to ensure that all patients – especially those who live in rural, medically underserved areas of Hawai‘i – are able to make important healthcare decisions for themselves.

“I ask all my colleagues to join me in supporting this important measure. Mahalo.”

"Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 611, CD1 - RELATING TO TANNING.

"HB 611 will make it unlawful for anyone who is under the age of 18 to use a tanning bed. It further requires tanning facilities to post notices that disclose the health risks associated with using tanning beds. The only exemptions to this legislation would be for physicians licensed to use ultraviolet light as a form of treatment.

"This bill is necessary to protect public health. Most people know that prolonged exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays is harmful. However, many people do not know that tanning via artificial ultraviolet light delivers levels of radiation 10-15 times higher than the mid-day sun. In fact, there is a misconception that a 'base tan,' obtained by using tanning devices protects from actual sun exposure. This is false.

"In 2009, the International Agency for Research on Cancer elevated tanning devices to its highest cancer risk category – 'carcinogenic to humans.' Excessive ultraviolet radiation exposure, particularly during childhood and adolescence, is an important predictor of future health consequences.

"According to the American Cancer Society:

- Those who use tanning beds prior to age 35 have a 59% increased risk of melanoma, the most deadly of all skin cancers;
- Melanoma is one of the most common cancers among men and women aged 15-29 years;
- Using a tanning bed increases the risk of two types of skin cancer, squamous and basal cell carcinomas, by 67% and 29% respectively;
- UV radiation from indoor tanning and other sources is cumulative over time. The earlier a person starts tanning, the greater the risk of getting melanoma and other skin cancers later in life.

"Furthermore, the tanning bed industry lacks regulation. There are no guidelines regarding exposure times and frequencies, education of employees or information given to consumers.

"Passage of HB 611, CD1 will help protect public health by appropriately regulating the use of tanning beds and educating unaware consumers in the process. I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

It clarifies that health care providers in reference to telehealth include primary care providers, mental health providers, oral health providers, physicians and osteopathic physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, psychologists, and dentists. It also creates consistency in statute by using the term ‘telehealth’ throughout instead of both telehealth and telemedicine.

“In many rural areas of Hawai‘i and often on the neighbor islands residents do not have the same level of access to care as residents in urban areas of O‘ahu. Thus, it is important to look for additional ways to provide our residents with the best health care possible. Telehealth expands those options.

“This measure will allow health care providers including primary care, mental health and oral providers, physicians, osteopathic physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, psychologists, and dentists to be reimbursed at the same rate as a face-to-face consultation with a patient. This process will ensure that many of these health care providers including specialists will utilize telehealth to consult and diagnose patients in varied settings in turn providing health care options to people with limited physical access to such health care services.

“It is important to be cognizant of the health care status of all of Hawai‘i’s people to enable them to access the best health care options available. This measure will help to us that goal.

“I urge all my colleagues to support this important measure for equal access to health care services in Hawai‘i. Mahalo.”

This can help family members cool off and give time, if necessary, for an individual to seek a restraining order for further protection.

“HB 1993 CD1 is most important for the youngest victims. The measure would make committing an act of domestic abuse in the presence of a juvenile under the age of 14 a Class C felony. Research has shown that children who witness domestic violence can suffer lasting severe emotional and developmental difficulties that are similar to those of children who were the direct victims of abuse. We need to protect these children from years of suffering. This measure is finally beginning to address the effects of domestic violence on the children in a household who don’t have physical scars but have had to bear witness to these traumatic events leaving wounds for many years to come. We need to make it a commitment to protect all the keiki and

truly look at the devastating effects domestic violence has on our youngest survivors.

“Colleagues, I ask that you vote in support of HB 1993 CD1 so that we can further protect the safety and well-being of Hawaii’s families.”

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 13-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2048, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Slom spoke to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I think there are many positive features in this bill to revitalize the cable industry and also the issuance of service area vendors, but what I'm most concerned about is the elimination of the required annual financial and management audit. I think that's something that we need, particularly in this day when we see that there's government oversight that's lacking in the expenditures of our agencies. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I would just note for my colleagues that the financial audits are required yearly already, so that provision was redundant. And we have received a communication that I would like to insert into the Journal, along with these remarks and some extended remarks that note that DCCA plans to do biennial management audits, anyway. That's a more appropriate time frame, as these are very expensive audits for the department as well as the PEGs. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Madam President, I rise in support of SB 2048 CD1.

"This measure deletes the sunset provision from Act 19, Session Laws of Hawaii 2011, allowing the Director of Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) to designate access organizations in each franchise area to oversee the designated public, educational, or governmental access channels (PEGs). This measure will also remove the requirement for the DCCA to do annual management and financial audits of the PEGs. These audits are costly to the department and a time burden to the staff and management of PEGs. They are also a duplicative expense for the Department, a cost that is passed onto the consumer through subscriber's fees. By removing the requirement the Department will be given the ability to regulate the PEGs by the having the flexibility to run plan management and financial reviews when necessary to ensure sufficient oversight and transparency.

"On April 24, the Senate and the House received a letter from Director Lopez affirming that the Department will conduct biennial management audits of PEG access organizations. The final results will be posted on the Department's website to ensure transparency in the oversight of the PEG access organizations.

"DCCA is the most appropriate agency to protect the public interest in the cable franchise process, including oversight of the process for designating the PEG access organizations rather than the State Procurement office. A regular procurement process would not be in the best interest of consumers and could be costly and disruptive to services provided in each of the PEG broadcast areas. By designating an access organization in each franchise area to oversee the PEG channels, we can ensure that the unique needs and interests of each community are met. This bill provides much needed stability for PEG access and will provide the framework for community media to continue to thrive in Hawai'i.

"I respectfully request my colleagues to join me in voting yes on this measure that will continue to ensure high quality PEG access. Madam President, I would also like to request that the

letter from Director Lopez on DCCA's commitment to transparency and biennial auditing be included in the Journal following these comments. Mahalo."

Again, we create more organizations, which add to the cost of government and cost to the taxpayers. Thank you."

"SB2742 SD1 HD1 CD1, a bill that establishes the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability, creates a revolutionary and innovative public-private partnership to better approach community resilience and improve how the region addresses disruptive changes through global collaboration. It provides the structure and opportunity for a new generation of well-trained leaders to emerge who possess the skills and ability to address the region's risks from natural and man-made hazards.

"In the region, we have concerns about climate change, environmental degradation, and sustainable use of natural resources, infrastructure protection and cyber resilience. As lawmakers we are looking ahead at how we will face these challenges and adapt to the changes.

"I introduced this bill to address what lies ahead.

"Upon the establishment of PAIRS, at the Hawaii Pacific University, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor will act as the State's liaison to assist the Institute to: form partnerships with various entities from the public, private and civil sectors; facilitate three core initiatives: (1) Sustainability and the environment; (2) Global leadership and capacity building; and (3) Critical community continuity, including all levels of security awareness.

"Establishing PAIRS at HPU, we envision the creation of three research centers of excellence. These centers are: (1) Center for Cyber Leadership, serving as the initial innovation hub committed to revolutionizing leadership development, education and applied solutions; (2) Center for Sensemaking, bringing together experts from government,

business, academia and the science and technology communities to address critical infrastructure; and (3) Center for Strategic Planning and Network Analysis, providing a hub for network and relationship science analytics with a comprehensive set of big data and analytic capabilities for a community.

“The Institute, with the aid of partners such as the Global Partnerships Forum of the United Nations, State Department of Defense, PACOM, Hawaiian Telcom, IBM, HPU and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) will engage in activities to achieve the three core initiatives by establishing: a named fellowship program; an interdisciplinary executive master’s degree program; and formation of innovative hubs throughout the region to provide a platform for problem solving.

“Thanks to the establishment of PAIRS, communities in the region will become resilient and sustainable through new solutions. It is a commitment by government and our partners to meet a new wave of global challenges that permeates the world and demands an innovative and revolutionary approach to enhance security, the economy and well-being of our residents.”

“Thank you, Madam President. As the employer of over 150 people, no one has more at stake here than I do, specifically and financially. Among businesspeople, it’s often expected that I would oppose this, yet I vigorously support this overdue increase. While I was hoping for more increase sooner, I’m happy that we’re acting this year. Many so-called businesspeople oppose the increase, but that’s not fair. When someone gives their life’s energy to a business as a full-time employee, that employee deserves a living wage in return. The employee is supporting the business and helping it succeed; who else other than the business should support that full-time employee to succeed in the very basics of life – rent, food, medical, living expenses. Business is about people: People take care of the business; the business should take care of its people.

“Some say ‘laissez-faire,’ ‘hands off of business,’ and ‘get government out of business, let the market decide.’ And included in this stance is the ‘personal responsibility’ mantra, but let’s look more closely at that. When a business pays only a subpar minimum wage, the employee turns to government to make up the difference in food stamps and other assistance, and in the worst cases, adds to the homelessness problem. All of these cost the government money. Why shouldn’t a profitable business pay its fair share instead of relying on government subsidy to keep their employees afloat? What about self-reliance for the business?”

“Even the new wage, at its eventual maximum of \$10.10 is not a living wage in Hawai‘i, but the increase will raise the whole pay scale in many cases and is a step in the right direction. We have the highest cost of living in the nation; our minimum wage ought to at least be among the highest also. It’s only fair. Thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, 85 percent of Hawai‘i’s minimum wage earners are 21 years and older; 47 percent are women. So it’s not just an equity issue, but it’s also a fairness issue. Two in three tipped workers are women, and one in three tipped workers are parents. According to the Hawai‘i State Commission on the Status of Women, most female minimum wage earners are the sole breadwinners of their families.

“We are all aware that the minimum wage in Hawai‘i has remained at \$7.25 an hour since 2007. Let me offer just a few perspectives on what has happened in the intervening years. In 2007, a monthly bus pass here on O‘ahu was \$40; since then, it’s risen to \$60. In 2007, the *Star-Bulletin*, our paper at the time, reported a half-gallon of milk costing \$2.74; today, it costs \$3.49. In 2008, the *Star-Bulletin* reported a 20-pound bag of rice cost \$7.99; today, it costs \$13.49.

“Raising the minimum wage, I contend, will have a direct, positive impact on Hawaii’s families. Hawaii’s women with children are disproportionately represented in low wage jobs and they are the ones who will gain the most from an increase in the minimum wage. The rate at which the minimum wage would increase is conservative, but it takes crucial steps in the right direction we need in order to move families forward. We need to ensure that as the minimum wage increases, our small businesses can sustain themselves and their employees, who depend on them. I urge my colleagues to join me in voting ‘yes’ on this very important piece of legislation, and I would like to say mahalo to the Judiciary and Labor chair for his leadership in this area.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in strong opposition to the measure as follows:

“This bill probably is the worst bill of the legislative session in terms of creating jobs because it will destroy jobs. It will not increase our economic wherewithal or our ability to pay for higher costs. I regret that the good senator from Puna used the term ‘so-called businesses.’ I don’t know of any so-called businesses; I do know of the businesses that have written to you and to me that have told you what the impact will be if we raise these costs.

“I’ve mentioned before on the Senate floor that as a business owner, not only does the wage go up, but also the employer mandates go up that are based on any wage increases, such as your workers’ compensation insurance, unemployment compensation tax, temporary disability insurance, the matching taxes that you pay, and all of that. So, it’s not just a single amount that goes up.

“I also hear from my colleagues, again, trying to mix a minimum wage – a forced government minimum wage, which has nothing to do with productivity or output – with a living wage. And certainly, all of us would like more money. The question is where does the money come from and what happens when you force that increase? My colleague from Maui just gave us a good recitation on price increases, and we’re all suffering through that. But the price increases came, in large measure, because of bills that this legislature has passed, mandating increases for the very same areas where prices have increased. And we can guarantee you that prices will increase in those areas where minimum wage is actually an issue.

“If we’re using percentages, let’s stick to the facts. Less than 2.5 percent of all workers are minimum wage employees, and of that 2.5 percent, they understand that it is an entry or training wage only, to get your foot in the door. First, you’ve got to have a job. If you do anything right, that minimum wage or that wage goes up and increases. But it can’t go up to what some people would like – \$20 an hour, \$30 an hour, \$50 an hour – without some consequences, and there are tremendous consequences here. So we don’t listen, again, to the business community. We haven’t suggested or passed one bill that’s going to help our business community or create jobs here. Instead, we will hurt the very people that need a foothold and an opportunity to get a job.

“In terms of turning to government, it’s been our desire to make more people dependent on government and to use our largesse so that now we spend more on welfare than we do on public education in the State of Hawai‘i. This will continue not because we have a lower minimum wage; it will continue because we have too much government and we continue to increase it. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“First of all, I want to thank my colleagues of the majority, who allowed me the opportunity to go to conference on this

measure and allowed the conferees the opportunity to try to improve the life of the working poor.

“A year ago, the minimum wage did not pass, and in reflecting now, I’m very grateful for that. It was reported accurately that I characterized last year’s inability to pass a minimum wage bill at \$9.25 an hour over three years and a \$1.50 tip credit, as was offered by the House, as ‘a damn shame.’ I was wrong from this point of view. I did not see enough prospectively to even think that today we would have a bill that provides for \$10.10 over four years and a tip credit of \$0.75 over a trigger that makes it nearly impossible, in my own opinion, for employers to pay less than the minimum wage to the small neighbor island restaurants, where tips are hard to come by. And for that creativity, I would like to thank my colleagues in the House for coming up with something as artistic as that. Were it up to me, there would be no tip credit because, as I said earlier, a tip credit is nothing more than a red herring. And if this legislature was fully intended in its desires to provide some kind of financial relief, it would not do so in a tip credit but in a tax credit. That sleight of hand and renaming of creativity to pay the working poor less, most of whom are female, is very unfortunate.

“The fact of the matter is, and I think some people have said kind of jokingly that, well, as a result of going to conference, the net effect is 10 cents. You may recall that on April 2, the House Finance Committee took the House Labor Committee’s recommendation of \$10.10 and reduced it to \$10.00, a difference of \$0.10. And on April 4, I had my staff tape a dime on each of the members’ desks and I said that that dime should stay there to remind us of the working poor. Some people, in my own opinion, saw that as a measure of levity. The fact of the matter is, over those 28 days, that \$0.10 is worth \$22.40 today. And some of you may say, ‘What’s \$22.40?’ Now it’s my turn to laugh. Those of you who say \$22.40 is not much, I wonder if you’re among nearly everyone who pumps their own gas because it’s cheaper to pump your own, self-service, than it is to go to a service station and have them pump your gas for you for an added cost. I wonder how many of us, because we have the means, when we go to the post office we buy forever stamps because by doing so, when the postal service raises the cost of a stamp, we already bought it at a cheaper rate. And how many of us, when the postal service says they’re going to raise the first-class stamp by three cents, takes umbrage. The nerve of the U.S. Postal Service, charging us three cents more. Ten cents may not seem like a lot to many of you. I don’t think the working poor agree with you, if that’s how you feel.

“Many of you, over the years, I have known personally, and I know that many of you have come from working families. Some of you got your meat from a can, just like me – not from a cellophane package, but from a can of Vienna sausage or Spam or corned beef. And that’s why, in large part, many of us have the same illnesses – because that’s the meat that we could afford.

“Because of many of you on the floor, I was provided the opportunity to take a conference committee and try to make it better for the working poor. It may not be what we may have wished it to be, but there is no denying it is better than it was before we went to conference. And for that, I am eternally grateful to all of you, and the reason is that’s our job: to make life better.

“The previous speaker said – or implied, or alluded to, or gave the impression – that raising the minimum wage will raise the cost of everything. That suggests that lowering the minimum wage would lower the cost of everything! And if that is true, somebody needs to explain how it is that, while the minimum wage hasn’t been increased, the State of Hawai‘i enjoys the number one position for the cost of a hotel room rate in the nation. The fact of the matter is when not raising the

tourist tax – which, some would argue, myself included, that it should be attached to an index – that the hotel room rate would stay the same. But in fact, the hotels have enjoyed a windfall and today, they’re wondering where it is that cuts need to be made to bring more tourists to Hawai‘i. The cost will go up regardless of whether minimum wage is imposed by law, as it should be, or whether this bill dies today. That’s a fact.

“For seven years, the working poor have not enjoyed an increase. Every one of you and I have enjoyed an increase; we all know that. Labor unions have enjoyed an increase. But for 40 percent of the lowest working poor, who are homeless, they have been working at \$7.25 an hour.

“Every year, we have the opportunity and the privilege to make the lives of others better. While I would not argue that some of you would say that opportunity is embraced by the state budget, I would say to you humbly, just like S.B. No. 1 during special session, this measure moves the paradigm for working people and has the opportunity to allow them to enjoy life a little bit easier than they have done so up to now. So for those remarks and, again, the opportunity to take this bill to conference, I want to thank those of you who allowed me this. Thank you very much.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

“I rise to briefly address a couple of the remarks from my colleague from Hawai‘i Kai. To correct, I had mentioned ‘so-called businesspeople,’ not ‘so-called businesses.’ And the other comment I wanted to correct was the idea that the minimum wage is only an entry-level wage and can’t be expected to be a living wage. Over the weekend, my partner and I visited her former workplace, which is a fast food restaurant. I don’t need to name it; they’re probably all similar. She was speaking to one of her colleagues, who’s been there for seven years. The colleague has had several promotions and good reviews. After seven years, the colleague is earning \$8.50 an hour at a fast food restaurant. So, I challenge the notion that the minimum wage is entry-level only and is not expected to be a living wage. Thank you.”

#### MATTER DEFERRED FROM MONDAY, APRIL 21, 2014

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3393 (H.B. No. 1716):

Senator Ige moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3393 be adopted and H.B. No. 1716, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, please indulge me a little history so you'll understand the context of this important legislation. In 1961, Joseph F. Rock, a prominent botanist and horticulturist, introduced miconia at Wahiawa Botanical Garden as an ornamental, and it was traded among gardeners. In my mind's eye, I can see all the plant aficionados gathering at Mr. Rock's lanai, sipping mai tais and gushing over the beautiful plants

with their distinctive purple leaves. Fast forward some 50 years later and we're now spending millions of dollars trying to eradicate miconia before it destroys our watershed. In Tahiti, miconia has overwhelmed over two-thirds of their forests and is directly responsible for threatening 25 percent of their native forest species with extinction.

"A 2010 study by Shwiff found that if brown tree snakes were introduced to Hawai'i, the cost to the state in lost tourism, health costs, and damage to the power infrastructure could total \$2.14 billion a year. So far, we've been lucky this little critter has not taken up residence yet.

"So with that, colleagues, it's truly something to celebrate that this joint majority package bill has gotten to this point unamended, and that we as a collective legislative body are putting the people's money where our mouths are to fight invasive species. This \$5 million appropriation is the first step and it's a huge plus because it will allow us to put more resources toward entomological expertise identifying alien species and also put more boots on the ground for surveying and control.

"Madam President, when you gave us our homework assignment over the last interim, I had no idea where I would end up with my project. And after visiting with the counties and seeing the tremendous and crucial work that each of the invasive species committees are doing, I learned firsthand about the devastation that invasive critters and plants are wreaking on our island paradise and the lack of financial support by government for their incredibly important work.

"I don't want to point fingers at who may or may not be at fault for the introduction and spread of different species, whether it be little fire ants, coconut rhinoceros beetles, coffee berry borer beetles, macadamia felted coccid, coqui frogs, varroa mites, or miconia. The fact is that these invasive species are here and are having a devastating impact on our economy, our environment, and our way of life. Department of Ag Director Scott Enright says that there are at least 20 new invasive species that arrive in Hawai'i each year. For example, this past December 23, 119 adult coconut rhinoceros beetles and 250 larvae and 16 pupae were found near the Hickam Air Force Base golf course. These critters can devour the crown and kill coconut palms and other palm species. So how do they get here? One entomologist suggested to me they might have gotten here by hiding in wheel wells of jets as the planes approach Honolulu International Airport, getting ready to land. The wheels come down and there they go, descending onto the 'Ewa plain and elsewhere. Others think that they may have hitched a ride on pallets aboard incoming cargo planes.

"The point is we don't know, but we need to know; we have to know, so we can do all we can to prevent future unwanted critters from taking up residence in Hawai'i nei. That's why it's imperative that we scrutinize each invasive species and find out how and why they were introduced in order to determine the proper protocols to deal with each of them. Going forward, we as a legislature need to make sure we are dedicating the necessary fiscal resources so that we can equip the Department of Ag and the Department of Transportation with the tools that they need to wage this fight. And we also have to be sure that those who are tasked with the responsibility for protecting Hawai'i nei do so with the utmost care because dropping the ball on this will cause lasting damage to our islands. H.B. No. 1716 shows our renewed commitment to addressing this incredibly important issue.

"Now that I know the problems with invasive species, I already know what my next homework assignment will be during the next interim, Madam President. I'll be working with the departments and stakeholders to come up with solutions, such as measures to improve the prevention, control, and

eradication of invasive species. Colleagues, I ask for your support on this very important bill. Mahalo.”

“I had raised questions about this company prior to this. This bill would allow the issuance of up to \$50 million in special purpose revenue bonds for the BioTork corporation. I’d asked for more information about the company several months ago. I’ve gotten all of the research that I can get about the company, and you know, I still don’t know much more about it. I do know that it’s a Delaware company, an LLC. I do know that it operates in Florida. I do know that its first presence in Hawai‘i was January of this year. I don’t know of any past actual experience that they’ve had in turning agricultural waste into biofuels. I’ve seen their testimony. I’ve seen their website, which is the website of the national corporation, not Hawai‘i.

“And so, you know, I look at some of the things that we’ve been involved with in the past, and we get all enamored because the theme here is ‘biofuel,’ and I think we can all support and believe in biofuel. But I think we should be more circumspect in companies that we give an endorsement to, and unless somebody can give me more information here, as I say, I’m voting ‘no’ on the bill. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 60-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 2543, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST BIOTORK HAWAII LLC,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 1 (Hee).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 82-14 (S.B. No. 3065, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 82-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 3065, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“You know, we’ve talked about this and other land exchanges over the years, and I think that the problem that I have with this: I don’t have a problem with an actual land exchange. I have a problem with we’re going to spend another \$550,000 to investigate the possibility of the land exchange, and

then we would have untold millions of dollars for the land exchange. And the state seems to be hell-bent on buying lands that it cannot take care of and really can’t afford. So, I think that we need to have more information and less expenditure before we go ahead with this project. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 82-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 3065, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND EXCHANGE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 1 (Slom). Excused, 1 (Hee).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 87-14 (S.B. No. 2470, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 87-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2470, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in strong opposition to the measure as follows:

“The Hawai‘i Health Connector has been nothing short of a major financial disaster, and yet the major financial disaster that’s coming, if we continue to allow this connector, is going to be even worse. As I mentioned previously, publicly, we had the prepaid health insurance measure in Hawai‘i since 1974. I was not a supporter of the measure because I don’t like any mandates, but it worked and it worked well. And now we have the health connector, which is yet another area of bureaucracy in between individual consumers and the purchase of insurance. And as we’ve seen from Obamacare, or the so-called Affordable Care Act, which has turned out not to be affordable, we find out that the President did not keep his promise. People were not able to retain their doctors; they were not able to retain their current health care plans; and their premiums did not go down in most cases – in most cases, they went up. In the cases where premiums went down, it’s because of government subsidy.

“This health care connector has been a financial disaster from the beginning, and those of us that raised questions about it from the beginning have not gotten answers. The previous executive director resigned earlier without answering questions of legislative committees in both the House and the Senate. The current interim executive director has provided information, but only partial statistics as to how the connector is working. The overall success rate is approximately 6,000 people at a federal government cost of \$204 million, and now the health connector is seeking additional state funds and state regulation.

“The point, in fact, is they do not have a business plan that works. They have not had a success rate. They have not added any more major people to the rolls other than people that had lost their existing insurance. The interim director said that he needs more money and that the state should support the health connector to ‘buy them time,’ so that they could look into future changes. The fact of the matter is they’re incapable of making the changes because it is an economic plan that cannot work. For this legislature to continue to support this particular connector and anything that’s involved with it is going to detrimentally impact our taxpayers and our citizens and give them false hope that, in fact, we’re going to see our insurance improve and our premiums decline. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. In support, just in defense: I think the Consumer Protection chair did a very good job paring down our responsibility. There have been challenges, there’s no question, but in support of our Prepaid Health Act, that’s the



reason that we move forward with the bill and I think that that is reason to pass this measure. So, thank you, Madam President.”

Senator Baker requested that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in strong support of **SB2470 CD1**.

“I would like to thank my co-chairs from the Senate and the House on the collaborative effort that resulted in this CD1. SB2470 CD1 is significant legislation for the people of Hawai‘i to be able to move forward with the Affordable Care Act as well as preserve Hawai‘i’s Prepaid Health Care law. Here are some of the key provisions of this measure: restructures the Board, establishes a Legislative Oversight Council, requires the Connector board to submit of a sustainability plan to the Oversight council, and appropriates funds and well as creating additional funding opportunities to keep the Connector moving forward.

“Adopting this measure will ensure that the people of Hawai‘i reap the benefits of both the ACA and Hawai‘i’s Prepaid Health Care law. Without this measure, Hawai‘i will be subject to the Federal Connector which cannot accommodate the provisions of our Prepaid Health Care law. Thus we’d lose decades of work that has enabled Hawai‘i to have one of the lowest uninsured populations in the country. The employer mandate of Prepaid is far superior to the individual mandate of ACA.

“An important element that will help to be part of the success of the Connector is the restructuring of the Connector’s board of directors. This change will accomplish greater efficiency of operation, improve transparency, and will allow for the Connector to more easily comply with the many federal requirements of the Affordable Care Act.

“This measure also creates a legislative oversight committee. This committee will help to review long range institutional and fiscal planning. The Connector will also be required to provide reports including specific efforts to reduce costs related to contracted services and other actions. With this effort there should be great progress in cementing the Connector’s sustainability.

“It is imperative that we honor the profound effort that the Legislature, Health Connector and the many other stakeholders have poured into this measure. It is truly been a collaborative effort. Continuing to enable Prepaid Health Care to operate in this state is a priority. Too many people have worked too long to provide all the people of Hawai‘i with healthcare to let us lose choice and become solely managed by the federal exchange without the provisions of Prepaid. The federal exchange has been plagued with more technical glitches than Hawai‘i’s Health Connector and the federal exchange does not have all the functionality that HHC does.

“I humbly ask my colleagues to consider what losing the Connector would mean to the people of Hawai‘i. We cannot let the people down who look to the Connector for comparison shopping for health insurance, to access tax credits and to be assured that quality plans are available to them and through their employers. We must ensure that Hawai‘i continues to be a leader in health care delivery and innovation to assist all of Hawai‘i’s people.

“Colleagues, please join me to vote yes on this measure and send it to the Governor for his signature. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 87-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2470, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE

HAWAII HEALTH CONNECTOR,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Gabbard, Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 88-14 (S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Chun Oakland moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 88-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I fully support the intent of the bill and what the bill is supposed to do, as I testified in Ways and Means, but I must oppose the bill because it does add a new special fund. I had asked for just a direct appropriation. If we really want to protect our children, if we really want to go after Internet child abusers, then we should make this a priority and we should have a direct appropriation. We don’t need a separate fee and a separate new special fund. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 88-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 702, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 93-14 (H.B. No. 1931, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Nishihara, seconded by Senator Taniguchi and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 93-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 1931, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 99-14 (S.B. No. 2346, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Chun Oakland moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 99-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2346, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Chun Oakland requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Chun Oakland’s remarks read as follows:

“I rise in strong support of Senate Bill No. 2346, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D.1.

“This measure demonstrates much needed support for our kupuna. The funding in this bill is essential to maintaining the health and welfare for our most vulnerable seniors and their caregivers. Supporting our elderly residents is especially important in Hawai‘i, as the elderly comprise the fastest growing segment of the State’s population.

“The Legislature finds that the federal Older Americans Act was established in 1965 in response to policymakers’ concerns about a lack of community social services for aging individuals. Elders who are medicaid eligible are not prohibited from receiving services under the Older Americans Act, but the State

may not require programs under the Older Americans Act to fund benefits that can be funded by medicaid.

“Hawaii’s kupuna care program was established in 1999 with a mission to help frail and vulnerable older persons lead independent, meaningful and dignified lives in their own homes and communities. The executive office on aging is responsible for coordinating and administering both federal Older Americans Act and state kupuna care funds. The executive office on aging has issued kupuna care guidelines which include eligibility criteria as follows:

- 1) United States citizen or qualified alien;
- 2) Sixty years of age or older;
- 3) Not covered by any comparable government or private home and community based care services;
- 4) Not residing in an institution, such as an intermediate care facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital, foster family, or adult residential care home; and
- 5) Having impairment of at least two activities of daily living, instrumental activities of daily living, or substantive cognitive impairment; and an unmet need of at least one or more activities of daily living, or one or more instrumental activities of daily living.

“The target population for Older Americans Act and kupuna care services is older adults who are low-income, minorities, non-English speaking, frail, or live in isolated or rural communities. Both funding sources are meant to address social issues. Medicaid, on the other hand, is meant to address medical issues.

“The executive office on aging and MedQuest division of the department of human services continue to work on integrating home and community based services to ensure that there is no gap in services for any elder individual. However, until full service integration occurs, there remains a gap in services for medicaid eligible individuals for whom services comparable to kupuna care and Older Americans Act services are inaccessible because they are not offered under medicaid.

“I fully support the Attorney General’s interpretation of the kupuna care guidelines that individuals who are eligible for Medicaid are also eligible for kupuna care services as long as they are not receiving a comparable or similar service under Medicaid. Non-medical transportation, non-medical assisted transportation, and case management are examples of important services for our kupuna that Medicaid does not cover but individuals can receive under kupuna care.

“The Legislature finds that aging individuals who qualify for medicaid are eligible for kupuna care and Older Americans Act services when there are no comparable medicaid services available.

“The Legislature further finds that the aging population in Hawai‘i, similar to the rest of the United States, is rapidly increasing as more and more residents born during the baby-boom era of 1946-1964 turn 60 years of age. Between 1980 and 2010, the number of adults in Hawai‘i over the age of 60 grew by 139.8 percent, eclipsing the growth of the general population, which increased by 34.2 percent during the same period. The increase in the number of adults in Hawai‘i over the age of 85 during this period is even more extreme at 431.5 percent. In addition, it is projected that Hawai‘i’s adult population over the age of 60 will comprise 29.7 percent of the total population or one out of three people by 2035.

“The significant increase in Hawai‘i’s elderly population and the concomitant increase in demand for services, particularly those that allow for aging in place, will require an ongoing

commitment to ensure that Hawaii’s kupuna are adequately cared for.

“The most successful programs for aging-in-place recognize and build upon integrated health and social services.

“Senate Bill 2346, CD1, provides \$4.2 million to fund the Kupuna Care program and, along with the \$4.8 million found in the base budget of the Executive Office on Aging in House Bill 1700, allocates a total of \$9 million to support community-based programs that incorporate collaborations between health care and social service agencies to provide services necessary for the health and well-being of Hawaii’s kupuna.

“These funds for fiscal year 2014-2015 will be distributed to the area agencies in the four counties. The kupuna care funding will be used to provide long-term care services to aging individuals 60 years and older, including those who are Medicaid eligible but who require services for which there are no comparable Medicaid services available.

“The bill also appropriates \$1,900,000 for the four county aging and disability resource centers, Hawaii’s one-stop shop for our elders and disabled people; \$476,772 for the healthy aging partnership program of the Department of Health’s Executive Office on Aging; and \$500,000 for a public awareness campaign educating the public about long term care and critical issues facing individuals and families in Hawai‘i.

“I would like to thank Executive Office on Aging Administrator Wes Lum and his staff, the directors of the four county area offices on aging, the many providers of services, the advocate groups, and our kupuna for their wisdom and for helping me and other legislators understand the complexity and invaluable work that is done daily to care for our elders.

“Mahalo colleagues for making this a top priority this session and being so supportive all these years.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 99-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2346, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGING,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 102-14 (S.B. No. 2054, S.D. 3, H.D. 3, C.D. 1):

Senator Green moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 102-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2054, S.D. 3, H.D. 3, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I will not speak on many bills today, but I just wanted to very briefly say, I want to thank our colleagues for passing this bill. This is the actuarial study now for autism spectrum disorders. I will say this: We were very close to passing a bill this year which would provide insurance for all families who have children with autism. One in sixty-eight children, now, that are born are affected by this disorder. It’s common. It’s prevalent in society to the extreme, and we don’t take care of these families. For those of you who weren’t on the conference committee or in those committees, this is the kind of thing: We had a little boy who we’ve been seeing for the last 10 years. We’ve seen him since he was about 3 years old – now he’s, I think, 13. His name’s Luke. He came and he put this on my desk afterwards. And I want to just be frank: I really feel strongly that we let this boy down.

“We do a lot of things here. It’s complicated, and we have challenges upside down, right and left. But this is one that I feel

so strongly about, that we have to, at some point, set aside all of our other concerns. We look at the costs, and that's why I'm glad we're doing the actuarial study. We will know next year how much it's going to cost to cover these children. But some things just have to be done. Forget Republican or Democrat or those who we work with on other issues – we have to provide coverage for families because they just can't provide adequate care for their children.

“So, please, colleagues, come back next year, whoever's here; pass the full bill. The cost will be absorbed by society, but that's the way we have to take care of those we love, and these are people that we love, especially if you've been in these conference committees and these hearings. So please remember this next year and please go all the way, past the finish line, and win for these children. Thank you, Madam President.”

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 103-14 (S.B. No. 2866, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Green moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 103-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2866, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As I've argued previously, emergency appropriations for the hospital association is continuing to throw good money after bad. We continue to subsidize a failing operation. We spend more than \$100 million a year. We have these special bailout emergency appropriations for, what is it, for unspent or uncollected bills and for more collective bargaining to bail out Kaua'i. When is this going to end? We had a bill to transform the Hawai'i hospital association; that bill did not pass this year. No changes have been made. As long as they know that they can come back to the Legislature, the taxpayers, for more money, there is no incentive to change or improve or to live within their means. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure and take great exception to the mischaracterizations by the Minority Leader on the hospitals. It's not a hospital association; it's the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. It was created by the Legislature. It's primarily neighbor island hospitals, and I believe that neighbor island individuals and residents deserve the same high quality care and access to services and treatments that folks on the larger populated island do. And I think it's unfortunate that the efforts that we've made in the past have met with inadequate funding. There are not economies of scale in the hospitals, and I think that's always going to be the case because the populations that they serve are much smaller. There's a higher incidence of folks on Medicaid, Medicare, and uncompensated care. We cannot turn those folks away. We have an obligation.

“I, too, am sorry that the framework didn't pass, but I know that, even absent that framework, which will be necessary if we're to transition to a new model of management for the hospitals, we will continue to work in the interim. I appreciate the effort that the Health chair made in conference to try to move it along. I appreciate what the Health chair on the House side did to try to move it along. There are some very thorny

issues and some very difficult issues that we on the neighbor islands will continue to struggle with and ask for the support and assistance of our friends and colleagues here on O'ahu. We cannot get away from the fact that hospital service is essential. If the hospitals on the neighbor islands go down, the hospitals on O'ahu will not be able to pick up the slack; and I don't think anybody on this floor, Republican or Democrat, wants to deny people quality health care.

“I appreciate that we need to do some streamlining, that we need to make some changes in our structure. It is time. We took, many years ago, back in the late eighties, the community hospitals and part of the Department of the Health and moved them to HHSC. We need to make that additional transition out of that model to another one. It will take everybody's care and effort, but we need to move this measure forward because we need to make sure that our hospitals are there, providing services for all of our residents and visitors. Mahalo.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

“The issue here and the argument is not for care of people; there's no argument that we need to provide the best care. The argument, really, is not even O'ahu versus neighbor islands. The issue and the argument is whether we will continue to subsidize and bail out a failing organization that fails to make changes. And in the past, when we've given extra money, that money was used for bonuses for the administrators and for the executives of the hospitals. This money now is primarily for labor unions and for bills that have not been paid. That really is the issue, and we've got to wise up and we've got to spend the taxpayers' money better. And if we want quality medical control, then what we have to do is look at some of the other expenditures we make and decide that this should be more of a priority. But we can't continue the level of subsidy year after year after year and saying, 'Now is the time for change,' and we've had no change in 15 years. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

“Madam President, with the indulgence of my colleagues, I cannot let some of the previous speaker's statements stand.

“Hospitals, by their very nature, are labor intensive. That's really what you're paying for: you're paying for doctors, nurses, technicians, as well as the appropriate equipment to make those diagnoses. Yes, I do agree that we need to make some changes in the structure, but you cannot let the services fall; you cannot afford not to pay vendors so that you have the equipment and the supplies and all of the things that it takes to run a hospital.

“Medical costs in this state are rising higher and higher. We are allowing people to go to emergency rooms, the most expensive care, rather than going to their primary care or to a clinic during regular hours. That's just the nature of health care. And as long as there's no way to curb the costs of rising health care, whether it's through salaries or vendors or other services that the hospital has to provide, I think it's incumbent upon us to continue to work with our Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to find the ways that they can streamline, find the ways that they can improve their services – perhaps at a lesser cost – but understanding that a lot of these costs are costs that they have no control over. They don't bargain for their employees; it's bargained by others – the governor being the chief bargainer – and when an agreement is reached, the Health Systems Corporation is obliged to pay for those services. I don't think that we want to balance a budget or balance the expenses of the hospital on the backs of the nurses, the techs, and the docs that have to provide the services, and our citizens deserve nothing less than the very best that we can provide them. Thank you.”

Senator Kouchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“On April 14, a meeting was held at Kauai Veterans Memorial Hospital (KVMH) in West Kaua’i. During this meeting, the administrator told all of the employees – that included doctors, nurses, janitors, cafeteria staff – that unless substantial changes were made, current operations could not continue because of insufficient funds. Back in October of last year during the special session, a promise was made to fill all of the beds to be more economically viable; and in spite of filling all of those beds, they were still falling short of their budget.

“On Good Friday, when I was back home, I walked into the hospital, knowing that somebody would be on duty, and just started talking to employees. One of the doctors that I spoke to that day is an emergency room doctor and the doctor said that his group came forward to the CEO and said they would take a pay cut to try and help some of the goals that they’re attempting to meet. So I can’t speak for other hospitals, but I can certainly say that the \$15 million proposed in this bill, when Kaua’i applies the formula to what they’ll actually get, is still not sufficient for their needs. And so those changes that are being talked about are, in fact, being implemented and being sought on Kaua’i. Otherwise, they will still not be able to keep their doors open. And so, I think I’d be remiss if I didn’t stand up and speak on behalf of the hospitals in my district and express the changes that they’re going through, what they’re hoping to try to restructure and accomplish, so that they can continue to deliver medical services in our rural community. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. Just for a little perspective, in support: Yes, I do think it’s important for us to pass something similar to our legislation that we discussed this year, which was S.B. No. 3064, and that it’s going to take compromise and partnering to get that done. But for perspective, we’re talking about a \$15 million emergency appropriation; this year, we’ll spend \$9 billion on healthcare in the State of Hawai’i. That’s the all-in: \$9 billion. So, we’re all pretty savvy here about money; \$15 million to keep these hospitals afloat is important and it’s \$9 billion that’s spent statewide, number one.

“Number two, though there are concerns about cost and we should run a good system, a tight ship, and so on, I want to reiterate the points that were made about the way the structures of hospitals are. Seventy percent of those who go to our safety net hospitals have Medicare or Medicaid. Those are really, really low reimbursements from the state and the federal government for services rendered to keep our relatives alive. So, that is the main reason that it’s very difficult to provide for enough money to be in the black for these hospitals.

“We will continue to work on reforming the system; I take to heart those comments. I thought we were there this year. The last little wrinkles can get taken care of and I hope that next session, we’ll be able to pass that legislation. But please keep these things in perspective. Thank you, Madam President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 103-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2866, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION TO THE HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 107-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2073, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I’ll be voting ‘no’ on this bill and the following bill. Both of them are collective bargaining items; both of them saw increases from the original amounts and original estimates. This particular bill will add \$15.5 million over the next two fiscal periods. The next bill will add \$27.3 million over the next two fiscal periods. Again, when we’re looking at everything in total, we have to prioritize what our expenditures are for and we have to get our costs in order. These bills do not do that. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 107-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2073, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING COST ITEMS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129-14 (H.B. No. 849, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Espero moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 849, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Hee.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“As I’ve stated previously, this bill gives broad and expanded powers, not only to the governor, but also to the mayors of the counties for what they deem to be a crisis, an emergency. They allow for the entering of private property and homes. They allow for determining whether or not people are hoarding certain goods or commodities. They allow for seizing that property. This bill is far-overreaching. It is much too broad and too vague. It also has an appropriation. I wish that more of my colleagues and other outside agencies that always champion privacy and the invasion of rights would have given more consideration to this bill, but I’m voting ‘no.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 849, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131-14 (S.B. No. 2246, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2246, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“This is our annual bill of claims against the state. Every year, it continues to increase during the legislative session. This year’s probably lower than it has been in many areas, but that doesn’t mean that there aren’t areas that we can do better. And in fact, the state is still looked upon as deep pockets by many in the legal profession and many people who know better but get into trouble or violate signage laws or kapu laws, and then they get injured and they still sue the state. And the state has taken the position that oftentimes it is easier and more economical to pay off people rather than go through the legal costs of the full action, and I concur with that theory. The problem is we continue to show people that they can sue the state with virtual impunity. And if you look at some of the individual claims again this year, you would scratch your head and say, ‘Why are we paying them off?’

“We also have, within this group of claims, a claim for legal fees from the O’ahu newspaper, the *Star-Advertiser*, when they sued the governor for release of names of the judicial selection. That went through the Office of Information Practices, but it wound up in court and the newspaper sued for legal fees. They got a judgment for those legal fees. They probably have something pending right now for an appeal and more legal fees. So, I think, in some cases, while initially it may be more of a cost for us to litigate, it sends a message that unless you have a clear claim, unless there was genuine negligence by the state, we shouldn’t be so eager and so easy to pay out, again, taxpayers’ money. Thank you.”

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to make the following inquiry:

“Yes, Madam President. I’d like your ruling on a conflict. My law partnership represents a claimant whose claim is being funded in this bill.”

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict.

At 2:06 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 2:07 p.m.

The Chair then stated:

“Senator Keith-Agaran, in review, there is an appearance of a conflict of interest. Therefore, the Chair will change her ruling; there is a conflict of interest.”

Senator Keith-Agaran responded:

“Just to clarify, then: I’m excused from voting on this bill.”

The Chair confirmed that Senator Keith-Agaran was excused from voting on the measure.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2246, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE, ITS OFFICERS, OR ITS EMPLOYEES,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Keith-Agaran).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 140-14 (H.B. No. 2590, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 140-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 2590, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Ige.

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“You know, we want to encourage people to vote and register to vote. We want to make it easy for them to do so – easier. However, in the State of Hawai‘i, it has been very easy to register to vote. We have our Wikipiki Registration forms; we have, at almost every public event, registrars and people trying to get out the vote. And yet, we went from number 1 in the country in terms of voting back in the early sixties to an embarrassing number 50 right now. We are worst in the nation. We had a 48 percent turnout in the primary two years ago.

“So what’s the answer? Is the problem ease of registration? I would say no, it’s not. The problem is not ease of registration because there’s no difficulty right now. The fact that somebody wants to register at the last minute – I mean, we have statute of limitations, we have all kinds of opportunities for people to register. That’s not it. The reason that people are not voting is because they feel, for different reasons, that there’s no competition. In fact, it’s true that in a lot of elections that we have, a lot of the races, there is only one candidate. We find also that there is a prevailing sentiment among people that their vote is not going to count in this state. And that’s a wrong philosophy, but it’s a self-fulfilling prophecy if, in fact, they don’t vote. We have seen other states that have used instant registration or last-minute registration, and they’ve had problems with fraud, with the inability to actually determine whether or not a person is a legal resident, and other problems as well.

“My problem with this bill, among the things that I’ve just mentioned, is the fact that two years ago, we had a dysfunctional elections office that couldn’t even print enough ballots and get them distributed – particularly in my area, in east Honolulu – which denied people their basic constitutional right of voting. Now, we’re going to let these same people be in charge of instant registration on Election Day? I think not,

Madam President. I have no trust in them because there were no sanctions; there was nothing ever done; the same people are there. The only thing that was done: there was an attempt to raise the salary of the very person that screwed up so badly before.

“So, I would suggest that we get our current election system in order, first of all. We hold people responsible. We have consequences for poor actions, and then we can talk about registration. Also, the counties weighed in on this and talked about the additional costs and the minimal amount of additional people that will register. And then you have one more step: registering is one thing; actually voting is something else. So for all of these reasons, I think this is an ill-informed bill at this time, and I will vote ‘no.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 140-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 2590, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Dela Cruz, English, Kahele, Keith-Agaran, Kidani, Kim, Kouchi, Nishihara, Solomon). Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141-14 (H.B. No. 1714, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Gabbard moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 1714, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This is, colleagues, a bill, a part of our joint majority package on climate change, and if you would enter my remarks into the Journal, I would appreciate it. Mahalo.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Gabbard’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, I rise in strong support of HB 1714 HD1 SD2 CD1. This is a Joint Majority Package bill to address the impending crisis of climate change.

“Climate change is a global problem with global and local impact. As former Vice President Al Gore recently noted during a speech at UH Mānoa, we’re seeing the rapid disappearance of glaciers and polar ice caps. That means that we in Hawai‘i must contend with sea level rise and salt water intrusion into our water table and even into our streets through storm drains. We’ll see more extreme weather worldwide. That means that we in Hawai‘i may expect more frequent and probably more severe hurricanes and other storms. Greater carbon dioxide emissions into the atmosphere is leading to acidification of the oceans. Sea level rise and acidification of the oceans imperil the health of our coral reefs. Climate change is also changing or aggravating rainfall patterns. This means that we in Hawai‘i must deal with flooding from increased rainfall in some areas and protracted drought from decreased rainfall in other areas.

“This bill is intended to set up a framework for us to prepare for the impact of climate change, starting with sea level rise and then going beyond that. Colleagues, I ask for your support for this bill. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 141-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 1714, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Slom).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 144-14 (H.B. No. 2434, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Kahele moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 144-14 be adopted and H.B. No. 2434, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Yes, members. This is the measure that would fund the acquisition of the conservation easement at Turtle Bay Resort. This oceanfront property at Turtle Bay, including Kawela Bay and Kahuku Point, is pristine land that is one of the finest examples of the state’s natural beauty, and it is important to preserve this in perpetuity for the benefit of the public including visitors and residents alike who pay the TAT. The acquisition of this conservation easement will enhance our visitors’ experience and promote and support the tourism and visitor industry throughout O‘ahu. The preservation of the natural beauty and open space will help offset the hustle and bustle of Honolulu and provide visitors with a glimpse of the Hawai‘i we know and love. This, in turn, should contribute to economic activity in the visitor industry by providing a tourist attraction, thus stimulating economic activity which will further increase TAT revenues.

“I think, most important, Madam President and colleagues, this will preserve for our residents – those on the North Shore and the rest of O‘ahu – a pristine venue for perpetuity and ensure public access to these important lands. I encourage all of you to vote in support of this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“It’s with a deep sense of gratitude that I stand as the member of the Senate who represents this area; gratitude for the members of the Senate, who have been patient with this proposal – and I mean that very sincerely; gratitude to the previous speaker, who found the creativity because of issues beyond his control in the other chamber which did not make it possible to include this as a budget item; gratitude to the hard work of people dedicated to see this area preserved. And specifically, I would like to name three individuals, and they are Denise Antolini, who is an associate dean at the UH School of Law; Lea Hong, who is with the Trust for Public Land; and Doug Cole. These three individuals have kept the momentum going forward and they have provided the will of so many others to weigh in.

“This particular opportunity is somewhat similar to the cash payment that was made last year for Lipoa Point to preserve an area that is highly valued by the local residents. This particular issue is not unlike the Galbraith purchase to preserve lands for ag. In this example, however, this 666 acres or so of lands at Turtle Bay do two things. They preserve for all time, for generations yet unborn, the privilege of seeing an area that will not change on the island of O‘ahu; and very little other areas can be said the same on an island that represents 80 percent of the population and is the tourist hub for in excess of 7 million tourists who visit annually.

“Very few opportunities like this are borne before us, and I’m deeply grateful and indebted to the hard work put together by the community, put together by the political leadership and will, and most of all, in an effort to provide for future generations what past generations have enjoyed and taught us to enjoy. Thank you very much.”

Senator Slom rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“For all of us that went through the discussions over the last couple years – the community outreach, the opportunity for the Turtle Bay company to try to make changes to its plans – I think we’re all glad that there has been a settlement. However, I have reservations because unlike the two examples that the previous speaker just mentioned – Lipoa Point and Galbraith Estate – that was a situation where the state got fee simple ownership of the lands. We’re paying \$40 million here for an easement. I think that’s a significant difference.

“In addition to that, as I spoke earlier on the Dole lands, we continue to spend a lot of money on preservation land. We also see that, in some cases, we’ve had land that’s preservation and then years later there are attempts or actual success in changing that preservation land into something else, usually commercialized land.

“So, I know that everybody seems to be in agreement with this – I’ve talked to the people from Turtle Bay and people from the North Shore communities – and that that’s a good thing and we’re able to do that, and it’s far superior to the original attempt for the state to condemn the property and take it over. But I would just caution that all this money that we’re spending and all this land has consequences not only of ownership or care but also of maintenance as well. So, I will support it, support it with reservations, and thank all those people that did meet and get together and try to hammer out a solution, but let’s be cognizant of what the total cost really is. Thank you.”

Senator Hee rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

“This \$40 million purchase in reimbursable bonds is a purchase in perpetuity. If Replay Resorts were to sell the land to some other investment security owner, that does not change the conditions upon which the 666 acres of the conservation easement as they are intended to exist, should this legislation pass, nor would it change the 400 acres across the street mauka on the permanent ag easement. This is a condition that places upon over 1,000 acres a guarantee that the lands will be preserved as they are designated, regardless of the owner.

“The idea that the previous speaker floated with respect to Lipoa Point and Galbraith purchased in fee, let me be the first one to offer to him that I will co-sign with him a bill next year to condemn the 666 acres – and let’s make it the whole resort including that hotel that stands there. And he and I can do what may be surprising to some as a bipartisan effort, and he can be the lead signer, and I’ll be the huelo – I’ll be the tail on the bill. But only us – only him and me, nobody else. The only part that troubles me is that he did admit, which puzzles me a little bit, that this is far superior – and this is a quote now – ‘far superior’ to the attempt to acquire the land. Well, we can’t have it both ways, so let’s settle this now and let’s do this together, my friend. You and I, let’s put the initiative forward to purchase all the lands, and that’ll give me a reason to come back next year. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I rise in strong support of this measure, and I like the word ‘perpetuity.’ Last year, we set aside acreage, and I think it’s money well spent and I strongly support the bill. Thank you very much.”

Senator Solomon rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Madam President. I also stand in strong support. However, I would be remiss if I didn’t mention the fact that I was disappointed. I was hoping that the language could have

been included in this bill that will allow the ceiling to be lifted for DLNR, so that they could engage in proper enforcement for this easement and conservation. So I’m hoping that, next session, that we’ll see our way clear to really fix the language so that we can proceed accordingly. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Madam President, I support the bill and would like the previous speaker’s remarks to be entered in the Journal as my own. Thank you very much.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 144-14 was adopted and H.B. No. 2434, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Slom). Noes, none.

### FINAL READING

#### MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135-14 (S.B. No. 2478, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135-14 be adopted and S.B. No. 2478, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Green rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Just brief comments, Madam President. This one’s a little rare; I’m going to vote ‘no’ on this bill. I think that the language that the House adopted is problematic, or that they sent over to us. This bill, ‘Relating to Health,’ didn’t happen to go to Health. I think there was an accident, but it’s okay – water under the bridge. The concern I have is that we are going to set up some pretty unprofessional expectations on chiropractors, who I love, and also unrealistic expectations for patients.

“Let me be very specific. So, they provide excellent care; this is a critical discipline for care in the State of Hawai‘i. The first patient I ever saw as a resident was a gentleman about 75 years old who fell over a rake. So, he fell over a rake, but he fell just three feet and broke his neck and ended up paralyzed from the neck down. He’d been getting good care for neck pain, in that particular case, from multiple modalities but had never seen a doctor to do a full workup, and he had widespread prostate cancer that had gone into his bones. And so, his neck was very weak and he ended up paralyzed and died a few years later, but was paralyzed from the neck down. So, he didn’t get a full workup, and that is a problem because these are complicated questions when people have neck pain.

“The second patient that I would tell you about was someone I saw down in Ka‘ū, when I was a doc there in the early 2000s, who came in for low back pain. And in doing a gynecologic exam on this woman, I felt very large ovarian tumors in her, and she had been seeking care from people, other individuals. In that case, she had been seeing and getting nutritional support and getting chiropractic support. Now, people misdiagnose all the time, but in her particular case, she had metastasis from this ovarian cancer to her spine, and it’s rare. I mean, that’s a rare circumstance, okay, that someone’s going to not go and seek care when she had multiple reasons to seek care.

“But the expectation from, I believe, the House language does place that burden now on chiropractors to have a pretty expanded responsibility in our healthcare system. And I know

many, many good chiropractors will do an excellent job, but we are changing the expectations now and we will see more individuals get their primary care, if this bill passes, from individuals who are chiropractors. That's just a fact. I'm not trying just to focus on cancers, but we will misdiagnose many, many individuals if the community gets the expectation that they can get their comprehensive care from these individuals, who do provide excellent services.

"So, I'm voting 'no.' I think we should revisit this bill, make some small changes, and pass it next year. It's just my belief, but those are two vignettes that are absolutely real stories that I think we should be cautious about. So, please consider that, members. The House is debating this as well. I would rather we wait until next year and revisit it. That's the input I would have given if I was more involved from a referral basis on this bill. So, please be careful with your votes; there's a lot of good in this bill. The premise of making them more important to these individuals in society for back problems and chiropractic problems is very well-intentioned, but I am worried about that language, Madam President."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I would just note that the chiropractic scope of practice has not been modified since 1997. This measure merely says that the chiropractors will keep up with their continuing education; they will make sure that it goes from programs that are accredited nationally; and it allows them to practice up to their level of training. I think it's a leap to say that just because we are ensuring that licensed chiropractors in this state are licensed appropriately to practice appropriately that it's going to mean a rush from someone who has been getting their services from an MD to go to a chiropractor.

"To me, what this measure is, along with some of the others, is looking at health care professionals to make sure that they're appropriately licensed, they're appropriately trained, so that individuals who, exercising their own choice to go to a variety of practitioners for whatever reason, have that choice and have some comfort that the individuals who have a license are qualified within their very narrow scope of practice.

"I know that there was some concern raised about the notion of physiotherapy. That's currently in the existing statute. That's one of the elements of the chiropractic national exam, and that is in our rules and it's been there since the 1990s. So, I think that some of the concerns that were raised by my friend from west Hawai'i perhaps are unfounded and I think we've looked at this for many, many years. It is not really expanding the scope; it's merely updating the scope, and I would ask my colleagues to vote up on this measure to make sure that individuals have choice and they can then exercise that choice appropriately. Mahalo."

Senator Green rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"Thank you. I appreciate the comments from the good chair from Maui. The specific comments that I would make are that on the second page of the bill, where it says 'use or order diagnostic imaging' and 'use or order laboratory testing,' that's extraordinarily broad, and that will be irresponsible and put patients at risk.

"It's not that I think that people shouldn't have access to chiropractors; I do. And I do think that expanding their practice so that they can provide the top level of their discipline is important. But 'all laboratory testing' certainly so far exceeds what their training is; it's just not, from my perspective, the right thing to do, and 'all diagnostic imaging.' It's not hedged. It's not described better. They're not trained for that. I do want them practicing at the top of their discipline, but what this does is this enables them to do any tests and any diagnostic imaging,

and that is simply too much. And I tell you, I respect the process, but that language needs to be amended from my point of view because I think it's going to cause major damage to patients, Madam President."

Senator Baker rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"Thank you, Madam President. Colleagues, that language is found in many of the licensing laws in our state and it is language that describes the kind of programs that are made and taken in schools of chiropractic that are nationally accredited by the United States Department of Education; that's how the schools are accredited.

"So, I appreciate the chair of Health's concern, but I think perhaps, if you look at it objectively and you look at how people are being trained today, it's not saying that a diagnostic image – that oftentimes, chiropractors will take that image, give it to the individual, and refer them some place else. That, to me, is really what we're talking about: it's enabling the professions to work more collaboratively together, so that if you – whether it's a naturopath, whether it's a chiropractic doctor, whether it is a medical doctor, whether it's a nurse practitioner – every profession has an obligation to do no harm to their patients. They have an obligation to give them the best possible treatment. They have an ethical obligation, a professional obligation, to hand that patient off to somebody else if, indeed, that's what is required, and I think we want all of our professionals to do just that. And I believe that when we're looking at patient-centered medical homes, patient-centered care in our state, this is the kind of thing that will incent that, along with some of the other measures that we've passed, and so I'd ask my colleagues to vote up on this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135-14 was adopted and S.B. No. 2478, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Nishihara, Thielen, Wakai). Noes, 1 (Green).

#### ADVISE AND CONSENT

##### MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3514 (Gov. Msg. No. 585):

Senator Gabbard moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3514 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ruderman and carried.

Senator Gabbard then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of JESSICA WOOLEY as the Director of the Office of Environmental Quality Control, term to expire June 30, 2015, seconded by Senator Ruderman.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, Jessica Wooley has been one of our colleagues here at the Legislature, serving the Windward side with distinction since 2008. She has served as chair of both the House Ag Committee as well as the Culture & the Arts Committee. I've personally sat across the conference committee table from her and found her to be intelligent, caring, capable, and committed to doing what's best for our state. She accepted the governor's offer to step down from her position as a State Representative to assume the important position as director of the Office of Environmental Quality Control.

"Jessica's credentials and background make her a very good fit for the position. Among other qualifications, she earned a law degree from the University of California, Berkeley and was



a deputy attorney general representing the Department of Health's clean water, drinking water, and wastewater branches. The testimony we received on her nomination was unanimously in support. I've been truly impressed with Jessica's enthusiasm and vision for OEQC and want to share a quote from her personal statement that reinforces this, and I quote: 'Hawaii's unique geographic location has blessed us with some of the most unique and fragile forms of life, all integral to a historically rooted way of life that, for many, sits at the center of their lives. Our economy, health, quality of life, and future all depend on our stewardship of these environmental resources. I will do everything in my power as OEQC director to address and anticipate the needs of future generations.'

"And finally, for those of you who might have concerns about Ms. Wooley in this position, I would like to add that this appointment is for a term that ends on June 30, 2015. So, if she is confirmed today, you'll have the next year to observe her in action and you'll be able to weigh in once again if the governor chooses to reappoint her in 2015. I ask you to join me in supporting G.M. 585, and Madam President, I request a Roll Call vote on this measure. Mahalo." (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"As a member, I am vice chair of the Energy and Environment Committee. I participated in an open, fair, and thorough vetting process of this nominee. I won't repeat her qualifications, but I will say she's among the most qualified nominees we have seen.

"I believe our job in the confirmation hearing is twofold: to assess the qualification and to assess the support and opposition to the nomination. The qualifications part was easy. The assessment of support and opposition was also easy, as there was 100 percent support among all testimony received; that is, zero opposition. The support included both of the two previous directors of OEQC. If there is a fear of standing up and opposing a nomination, I note that there was not even a single anonymous testimony in opposition to this nomination nor was there a phone call to our office in regards to it.

"I hope that in the future, for any members that have concerns about nominations, they will attend the confirmation hearing and address their concerns in a fair and open way that allows the nominee the opportunity to respond to those concerns. That would be fair to the nominee; that would be respectful to the nominee. So, I urge my colleagues to respect the subject committee chair, to respect fair play and respect the Senate's own processes, and to approve this nomination. Thank you very much, Madam President."

Senator Slom rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"Thank you, and let me say, first of all, I did take part in that hearing and I did vote 'with reservations' at the time. To say that there's been no opposition, I don't know - I've received telephone calls and I've received emails and I'm sure I'm not the only one. And basically, it is a question, I think it is a determination as to the qualifications of the nominee and it is debatable. The hearing was described by the chairman as a 'lovefest,' and that's exactly what it was. I don't think there were very many hard questions, but there were comments from people that felt that there was not going to be a fair balance by this nominee - people in the farming and agricultural community, people in small business - and whether that's right or wrong, that is the perception.

"One thing that we can be sure of is that this OEQC has become a veritable political hotspot in the last decade in terms of the people that have been appointed, that served there. The previous nominee, whose name was withdrawn because she did

not garner enough votes even before there was floor action, she had served under a Democratic governor, under a Republican governor. There had been no problems in terms of what she was doing with her job. The criticism came from those who did not like her association with Governor Lingle's administration and positions she took or did not take relative to the Superferry, which, many could argue, really had nothing to do with her primary responsibilities.

"So, I think it's important that we fully vet a nominee and that there is room for discussion and differences in terms of both qualifications and evenhandedness and fairness. We ask that of our judges; we should ask no less from important cabinet-level positions. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 17; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, English, Espero, Taniguchi, Tokuda). Noes, 8 (Dela Cruz, Kahele, Kidani, Nishihara, Slom, Solomon, Thielen, Wakai).

"Thank you very much, Madam President. The House has amended this measure by removing the provisions extending the conclusive presumption for legally adequate warning to include dangerous, non-natural conditions on unimproved public lands and making technical amendments for clarity, consistency, and style. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1007, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 1007, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LAND LIABILITY," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

S.B. No. 2118 (H.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 10, 2014, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2118, seconded by Senator Espero and carried.

In accordance with the Conference Committee Procedures agreed upon by the Senate and the House of Representatives, the managers on the part of the Senate recommended that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2118, on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 3 (Hee, Ige, Slom). Noes, none. Excused, none.

Senator Hee then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2118, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Hee noted:

“With respect to S.B. No. 2118, H.D. 1, the purpose and intent of this measure is to make housekeeping amendments to HRS 11-426 and HRS 11-424 by removing reference to an obsolete tax credit and requiring a notification to the Office of Elections when a candidate exceeds campaign expenditure limits. Existing law requires candidates to notify all opponents to the Campaign Spending Commission and chief elections officer upon exceeding campaign expenditure limits. The Senate Committees on Judiciary and Labor and Ways and Means passed the measure as is. The Senate is agreeing to the latest House amendments, in which the Judiciary Committee restored a provision that would require candidates to provide notice to contributors of their campaign within 30 days should the candidate exceed their campaign expenditure limit.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2118, and S.B. No. 2118, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

Senator Hee moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 10, 2014, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Espero and carried.

In accordance with the Conference Committee Procedures agreed upon by the Senate and the House of Representatives, the managers on the part of the Senate recommended that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1, on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 2 (Hee, Shimabukuro). Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Galuteria).

Senator Hee then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Espero.

Senator Hee noted:

“With respect to S.B. No. 2629, H.D. 1, the Senate JDL Committee passed the bill with amendments that clarified the reporting period and expenditures and contributions that needed to include statements of expenditures relating to lobbyists during special session. The House Judiciary Committee changed the bill’s effective date to ‘effective upon approval.’ The Senate is agreeing to the House amendments because the amendments changed the effective date to ‘upon approval.’ Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 2629, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOBBYISTS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

#### WAIVER OF REFERRAL

Senator Espero, Chair of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs, requested that the referral of H.C.R. No. 68 to the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs and the Committee on Ways and Means be waived.

Senator Espero noted:

“I am asking for this waiver because, as you know, as it gets busy during session, many resolutions are not heard and the deadlines are passed. However, the author of this measure from the House, he is in his last session here at the State Capitol after

20 years and he asked me if I would waive it, and I did put in the request.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

By unanimous consent, H.C.R. No. 68, entitled: “HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO SUPPORT THE AUTHORIZATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A LONG-TERM CARE FACILITY FOR VETERANS CONTINGENT UPON THE RECEIPT OF FEDERAL FUNDS,” was placed on the calendar for adoption on Thursday, May 1, 2014.

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for certain 2014 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 12:00 noon to 5:00 p.m. on Monday, April 28, 2014 for the following measures only:

H.B. No. 1745, HD2, SD2 – Relating to Education  
 H.B. No. 1796, HD2, SD1 – Relating to Education  
 H.B. No. 2257, HD2, SD2 – Relating to the Department of Education Superintendent's Salary  
 H.B. No. 2626, HD2, SD2 – Relating to Taxation

1. **Definitions**  
 For purposes of these procedures:  
 "Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.  
 "Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.  
 "Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.  
 "Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.  
 "Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.
2. **Conference Committee Scope and Amendments**  
 The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly, the Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
3. **Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places**  
 Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 4:00 p.m.

and 4:30 p.m. on April 28, 2014.

4. **Meetings**  
 This memorandum shall serve as notice of the meetings which will occur at 4:00 p.m. on April 28, 2014 in room 329, State Capitol.
5. **Attendance at Meetings**
  - a. The lead chairs shall be present at the Conference Meeting.  
 All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the meeting.
  - b. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
  - c. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee during the decision-making on the measure.
6. **Conference Discussion**  
 Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.
7. **Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers**
  - a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
8. **Decision-making Meeting**  
 The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:
  - a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.

- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

**9. Conference Committee Reports**

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

**10. Decision-making Deadlines**


All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on April 28, 2014.

**11. Electronic Transfer**

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

**12. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures**

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.

This is in response to any concerns that may arise regarding the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) oversight of Hawaii's Public, Educational and Governmental (PEG) access organizations, which would be designated in accordance with §440G-8.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). This section of the HRS, among other things, requires the department to conduct annual management and financial audits of the access organizations designated under this section.

S.B. 2048, S.D.1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1 deletes the annual requirement of the Department to conduct annual management and financial audits of the PEG access organizations. However, your Senate Conference Committee and your House Conference Committee on S.B. 2048, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, as referenced in Conference Committee Report SB2048 CD1 CCR13-14, indicates:

The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs has also indicated a willingness to mandate periodic management and financial reviews in the contracts with the designated public, educational, or governmental access organizations, thus ensuring sufficient oversight and transparency.

No. 1700, the budget that was recently passed, we have included \$33 million in funds, including \$28 million in general obligation bond funds and \$5 million in revenue bond funds. So, this sends a different message by passing this bill out.

“Also, if this body chooses to do this in the future, I believe that all University of Hawai‘i schools who want to be financially independent – or this body feels that that should be – then it should be with all of the schools and not just carving one certain school like UH Hilo does for this bill. Thank you, Madam President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and failed to carry, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 143-14 was not adopted and H.B. “Mr. Nakamoto is a Big Island son whose father started the law firm that he eventually became a partner of and is today still a partner of. He has expressed the difficulty in working in the family court because, as most of us understand, those kinds of cases bring out the worst in good people. Mr. Nakamoto has been doing family court work for many years. He was supported by every person who came before the committee or sent testimony in. He was also supported by others who have presided over court as a per diem judge as well as in other ways as personnel of the court system.

"I believe that Mr. Nakamoto will serve the District Court of the Third Circuit with great distinction. He will bring honor to the judiciary, and I urge all of you to consent to the nomination of Henry T. Nakamoto to the District Family Court of the Third Circuit. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you very much, Madam President. I just would like to speak in very strong support of the previous speaker's remarks and also to urge my colleagues to vote in the affirmative. Thank you."

Senator Kahele rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"You know, we've gotten into a rut in the last couple years and we equate higher salaries with better performance and yet, there's no proof of that. We have a proposal here to actually have the Superintendent of Education get a salary of \$250,000 or more. We still have problems with our public education system, K through 12. We've not made improvements and yet, our first inclination is always to go for a higher salary. I would rather see results first, and then we can always adjust salaries later. Thank you."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you. I'm sure at some point, perhaps in the interim, I can take the Minority Leader on a tour in his district of all the wonderful things that we have been doing in our school system to actually improve public education. In fact, as he's well aware, the Secretary of Education actually finished his 50-state tour of the country in Hawai'i and talked about how Hawai'i is actually now a model for the rest of the country in terms of how we've been leading the way with our reform efforts, in terms of transforming public education."

"But that being said, that's not the discussion point for today. It is the superintendent's salary that we are discussing in today's bill. Hawai'i is the ninth largest school district in the country, and the superintendent's salary range has not been adjusted since 2001, and it is by far the lowest among the top 15 largest school districts in the United States. This doesn't even begin to take into account that many of the school districts above and below Hawai'i actually include other benefits besides salaries within their compensation for their superintendents. In fact, we don't even allow for those types of compensations within this measure that we're discussing."

"This is also much more than just about the superintendent; it's about the ability for us to recruit and retain the very best and

brightest for the Department of Education's leadership team. This was already difficult, given the fact that about half a dozen principals were already making more than the superintendent and her entire leadership team. With the recent arbitrated pay raises for Unit 6, you'll now have many more making tens of thousands of dollars more than those that they actually report to.

"Now, in conference committee, we did also make some changes that put the performance contract in alignment with other employee evaluations in the department. This will allow the tenets of the evaluation to be relevant with what is being strategically measured at the time by the board versus having static tenets laid out in statute. I believe this measure we have before us is prudent and sound, has the broad backing of both parent and community advocacy groups and the business community at large, and I humbly ask for your support. Thank you."

Senator Ige rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I did want to emphasize that the conferees had made changes to the original proposal and that they would be including a performance basis of the salary. In addition, we do have a sunset provision so that the Legislature would have the opportunity to revisit, after 10 years, about whether the policy to raise the salary is appropriate. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Although floor presentations ended a month ago, thank you, Madam President, for allowing me the opportunity to make just one more.

"Colleagues, this is the final day of our 2014 Regular Session of the Twenty-Seventh Legislature. One among us has made what I am sure was a very carefully considered and likely very difficult decision that he will leave the Senate to pursue higher office. I think it is appropriate for us to spend a few minutes acknowledging his service and leadership over the last 20 years in this body and even more years previously in the House of Representatives.

"I refer to the senator from Pearl City/Aiea, who has served in numerous committees and leadership positions over that time, and who leaves at a high point in his career as an elected official.

"Most of what we want to say about Senator Ige is in the Senate certificate, which all of you have signed, colleagues, and so, let me read from it:

The Senate is pleased to recognize Hawaii residents for their service in the public interest and exceptional leadership over a sustained period of years. In this spirit, the Senate commends a member of this body – Senator David Y. Ige – for having devoted more than

half his life to representing residents of Pearl City and Aiea as a member of the State Legislature.

David Ige was appointed by Governor George Ariyoshi to a vacant seat in the House of Representatives in December 1985 at the age of 28. He took his seat in the session of the Thirteenth Legislature that convened on his 29th birthday, January 15, 1986.

David and his colleagues, Senator Les Ihara, Jr. and Senator Brian Taniguchi, were elected to the Senate in 1994, and today the three of them are the longest continuously serving members of this body. For that kind of endurance alone, they warrant commendation.

David's 20-year tenure in the Senate has been marked by thoughtful, intelligent, insightful, and forward-thinking policy proposals that have always sought to build solid foundations for a better Hawai'i. His well-recognized ability to understand the big-picture implications of decisions, for which we are responsible as elected officials, has contributed to his effectiveness as a leader among us. We are so fortunate to have benefited from his wisdom and counsel.

Now, David has chosen not to seek re-election to his Senate seat. He will leave behind a distinguished record of accomplishments and accolades too numerous to recite. However, we do acknowledge his key role in supporting public education through increased funding, allowing more autonomy and fiscal flexibility, and authoring the first laws creating charter schools.

We note his authorship of the Hawaii Telecommunications and Information Industries Act. We are grateful for his focus on transforming the Legislature to make government more accessible that has made this body a national leader in electronic accessibility. In 2010, to recognize his leadership on the Senate's paperless initiative, David was awarded the National Association of State Chief Information Officers State Technology Innovator Award.

In more recent years, we cannot help but stand in awe of his grasp of the state budget and the process by which it is formulated under his leadership as chair of the Committee on Ways and Means.

Like most of his colleagues, David works in the private sector. He is a successful electrical engineer and project manager with a 34-year career devoted to information technology, telecommunications, networks, and responsible public communication policy. He served with distinction for more than 18 years as an engineer at GTE Hawaiian Tel.

Literally closer to home, the senator is a devoted husband to his wife, Dawn, and a loving father to their three children, Lauren, Amy, and Matthew. They have provided unquestioned, loyal support and encouragement to David as he has pursued his professional and public service careers.

The Senate of the Twenty-Seventh Hawai'i State Legislature, Regular Session of 2014, commends Senator David Y. Ige for his tireless commitment to improving the lives of all of Hawai'i's residents. With sincere gratitude, the Senate further extends warmest aloha and best wishes to our departing

colleague, with the wish for good health and much success in life beyond legislating.

"David, this hala lei presented on behalf of all of your colleagues represents 'new beginnings' or 'transition.' Madam President, I think that some of our colleagues have additional comments to offer. Thank you, and thank you, David."

Senator Slom rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I just want to say that with or without a mustache, David Ige has been a true leader and, like the man that appointed him first, Governor Ariyoshi, David has proven to be quiet but effective. He has been nothing but fair. He has worked hard. Every once in a while, you see that twinkle in his eye, but he has led us in very difficult discussions. He has been very fair to other opinions and dissent and he is someone that we can all respect and be proud of as a colleague in this body.

"So, he's been called 'State Representative'; he's been called 'State Senator'; and perhaps we'll add another name to that in the near future. But in any event, on behalf of the Senate Minority, we wish you the very best of luck and we thank you for everything you've done, David Ige. Aloha."

Senator Tokuda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. There comes the occasion when one decides to seize the day – *carpe diem* – and decisively leave the relative comfort of the Senate in search of higher office. We find ourselves face to face with such a departure today, with our colleague, friend, and at many times, a teacher to all of us over the past 29 years, as this truly is the final day of session for our Ways and Means chair, David Ige. And so, while most of you usually can't get me to stop talking, I really struggled with what I was going to say. After all, how do you thank someone who took a chance and a huge risk on a high school kid over 20 years ago and has never given up on them, no matter how much they probably wanted to and, maybe a few times, probably should have. Or who was among the first to stand by you in the rain and wave when the odds were not on your side, never once asking or caring about Senate factions or alliances, and when you won, was always there to listen and give you great advice, so much so that one of your best programs you've done every session every year since, since the beginning, was because of him.

"It's a tall order for such a special friend, so I decided that I would give him 'piece' – chess pieces, to be specific. When I first met the chess club over 20 years ago, they weren't called the 'chess club.' In fact, they were scattered between the chambers of the Legislature, but they were still working very closely together and were very much aligned, and at one point in the Senate, they may have been called the G6 or G7 or G8. Sorry, they made that term cool way long before the Far East Movement made any money off it – I don't know if any of you know what song that is, either. But yesterday, I asked David's three closest friends two simple questions in my desire to give him 'piece': If you could be a chess piece, which would you be? And if David were a chess piece, which would he be? Les said he'd be a knight; I think he likes the fact that it moves in an 'L' shape, but strategically, can be quite the multitasker, like Les is, in terms of taking out an opponent. Susie said she'd like to be a queen. I think we should all want to live in Susie's kingdom because there would be no poverty, no hunger, the elderly would age with dignity, and the children would be cared for. Roz said she'd be the rook, one of the most powerful pieces on the board, but it also is the one that watches out for the team and in many cases and in many games could deliver the final checkmate. When asked which piece David would be, Les and

Roz both said 'the queen,' the second most powerful piece on the board, and Susie said he'd be her king.

"So now, I was still faced with a bit of a dilemma. Considering I can probably count on one hand the number of chess games I've actually won in my entire lifetime, by my calculations I still had one too many queens to give him. And then my husband, who was primarily responsible for most of my chess losses, dropped a pearl of wisdom my way. I was reminded that there is a most humble of pieces that is often taken for granted by novice players like myself, disregarded by many, sacrificed without thought or strategy – even the name alone suggests being used by others for their own purposes, while in reality their existence has been in constant service for the greater good. And yet the humble pawn, if you think about it, is still the only piece on the chess board that can strategically, quietly, and decisively set the landscape of the chess board, as their moves are permanent. Unlike the other pieces, they do not move backwards; there's no backpedalling or second-guessing for them. And they also have a special skill that no other piece has, if patience and strategy prevail and that pawn makes it to the other side, you can have two queens.

"As I thought about all these skillsets, it dawned on me slowly that this is very much like the legislative career and personality of David Ige: how over the last 29 years, he has changed Hawai'i's social, economic, educational landscape – as mentioned by Senator Kidani – as Education chair, Health chair, and most recently as Ways and Means chair; and how time after time, he has stepped up to support either the House or the Hawai'i State Senate, taking on any role that was asked of him in service to the greater good.

"And now, I'm not that good at chess, obviously, but if I had to guess, in a game of chess and in a matchup, it's probably very similar to real life that if it came down to a game where you had two queens against a king, well, I guess we know just what might happen. So, David, I give to you on your desk before you a king, a queen, and a humble pawn – just small tokens of 'piece' to remind you of your friends and your time here at the Legislature for wherever your next journey may take you."

Senator Espero rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. Senator David Ige is certainly a man of honor and integrity. He epitomizes the positive attributes that all of us want to see in our elected officials. I've been honored and privileged to work with him and with all of you and I want to thank you, Senator Ige, for supporting my bills and initiatives and projects. We certainly wish you the best in all your endeavors and we know you will be close by wherever you may be. Aloha."

Senator Hee rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Madam President. I'll take a different angle on David Ige. A few years ago, he came to me and he said, 'Can you teach my daughter Amy how to ride a horse?' And I said, 'Sure.' And so we were at Waimānalo in the arena, and I had my good horse in those days – he's not here anymore – but he came in his van with his family. And I can't remember how old Amy was, but I don't think she was in high school yet. And as soon as the door opened, I was by my horse, and she came running – and I hadn't met her yet – her arms open and she said, 'Uncle, I'm Amy.' And before David could say a word, I threw her on that damn horse because I know the horse. And she was so tiny at that time, her feet couldn't reach the stirrups. And I know you know what that's like, Madam President, because of your own relationship with your boy, Micah.

"So, I looked and here came David Ige, running faster than I've seen David Ige run. But by that time, I took the horse, threw him in the arena. And he said, 'Well, don't you need to

teach her a few things?' I said, 'No, she'll be fine if you leave her be.' And she rode that horse in the arena; I took her a little bit, and then she went on her own and she rode.

"Shortly thereafter, I guess she wanted to be a vet, or she thought she wanted to be a vet. I took her up to Hale'iwa, and we were castrating calves, as we do seasonally. David used to bring her to Kemo'o Farm, and I'd pick her up there and I'd go. And I never invited David, because I don't want him to tell the girl what to do and be careful of this and that. I think Senator Solomon understands this: You let those kids be kids. And so I told David, I said, 'We're going up this weekend; we're going to be castrating calves. You want to bring Amy?' And he said, 'Yeah, I'm sure Amy wants to go.' And so he said, 'But can I go?' I said, 'No.' I said, 'You cannot go.' You remember, David? So I said, 'You cannot go.' So, David being David, he's not going to ask why; I think I hurt his feelings. But he said, 'Well, could you do this for me? Could you explain to her, before you guys start castrating those calves, what you're doing and why you're doing it?' I said, 'Okay, David, we'll do that.'

"So, we went. We rode and we round up those calves, and – this is really David, and this is really why I think so highly of him – that girl stayed on that horse all day. She never got off, and I said to her, 'Amy, don't you have to use the bathroom?' 'No, Uncle, I'm all good.' And she stayed on all day. We brought those calves in, took a few hours, and then one of the cowboys – and generally, they're Portuguese – and they said, 'Girl! Girl, you in the way!' So she said, 'Okay, Uncle.' She don't know who that is speaking, but 'Okay, Uncle!' She moved that damn horse over. And then one of the other Portuguese cowboys said, 'Can you open and close the gate when the calves come through?' She said, 'Of course I can!' She got off that damn horse and she went to the gates. And I know you know what I'm talking about because you've been around cowboys.

"And she did it all day; she sorted the calves, basically, from the heifers and the bull calves. And I'm waiting to tell her, 'Okay, your father said I've got to teach you what we're going to do.' And my son was with us that day, and he knows what we're going to do and he knows the young boys, they're going to wrestle those calves so the old-timers come and do the rest. And my boy marched up to me and he said, 'Pop, I'm not grabbing any calves. I didn't go to Princeton to grab calves, so get that out of your mind. I'm going to the fire,' and he took the horse and he sat as far as he could away from the catch pen. But not Amy; Amy said, 'What are we going to do?' I said, 'Well, now we're going to take those bull calves, we're going to rope them and tie them and knock them on the ground.' I said to her, 'Amy, your father asked me to explain this to you. So, we're going to castrate them. Amy, you have to understand, when you castrate a bull calf, why we ...' and she said, 'Uncle, stop.' And so I stop. I look at her; she said, 'I know why we're doing this and I know what we're doing.' I said, 'Don't you forget. If your father asks you, you tell him I told you.' She said, 'Okay.'

"But that's the David Ige that I like. All of us know David Ige, the legislator; all of us know the fairness with which we've been treated by David Ige. But I've been privileged to know David Ige, the father. And what a great statement, in my mind – well, I have a son, and many of you have children of your own – to know that he'll let these kids run and be kids. He'll ask you to take care of them without asking you to take care of them. He will ask you to explain what you're doing so that they understand, regardless of the fact that we don't put enough trust in these kids to know what we're going to do and why we're doing it.

"If I am not mistaken, Amy Ige is in medical school today. I know it's not because of what we did in Hale'iwa, but because of who her parents are. And what more can you say about a father than, 'Look at how he raised his kids.' That, to me, is a

measure of David Ige, and I'm very, very proud and I'm very, very honored that I had a small slice of Amy Ige's life that will stay with me the rest of my life. David knows that when we have the occasion to talk, I will always say, 'How's Amy doing?' And that's how I know she's in medical school. I think it's a terrific tribute to David Ige, the father, and that's what I want to share with you today. That's the David Ige that goes with me. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I just would like to thank David. You know, we kind of came in together. I was in the Senate; you were in the House. And I want to thank you on behalf of the Hawaiian community because it was really through your support and many others such as yourself who are not Hawaiian but stood up for the Hawaiian people. It started with the 'right to sue' bill, which was extremely controversial. It went on to the 'Onipa'a ceremonies that were held right here in our Capitol, when our former Governor John Waihe'e had the courage to lower the American flag and raise the Hawaiian flag. And I know for many of you that were not Hawaiian, many of you had difficulties with those thoughts. But David kind of stood firm with many of those that were not Hawaiian legislators to help further our cause.

"I want to thank you for your strong support for all of the Native Hawaiian schools. I want to thank you for your strong support for the University of Hawai'i Hawaiian studies programs. Many people don't realize that whole movement came from the eighties and carries on today.

"When the Hawaiians present you with a hala lei, I want to leave you with these thoughts that hala, the true definition of 'hala' – and I want to say this with pride because my district is Kohala, which really means 'the land of destiny.' And when the Hawaiians present this lei to you when you're going to be moving on to a different endeavor or a different career, the na'au and the significance of that lei is to tell you, 'God be with you in your choices that you have made and Godspeed, because only you make those determinations as to where you want to be and how you feel that you can best serve your Hawai'i nei.' So, with that, mahalo a nui loa a mau loa for all of ia kākō'o and your support that have really paved the ala nui for Hawai'i to become a better place in this time and space. Mahalo."

Senator Galuteria rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you very much, Madam President, and I would like the words of the previous speakers to be entered into the Journal as if they were my own. I rise on a point of personal privilege. On behalf of the majority, I stand with the Minority Leader and thank you, Senator Ige, for your leadership. I'll be very brief: You are a gentleman, and in these bodies, we welcome gentlemen. We welcome people that we can depend on. Your word is your bond. When Senator Ige says something, we can carry it to the bank. We carried the budget to the bank under your leadership, and through your prudent money management, we were able to pass a budget that is worthy to serve the people of Hawai'i.

"On behalf of all of the men in the Senate, we thank you for being a part of our caucus. On behalf of the women of the Senate, I'm sure they want to say the same.

"And one last and final thought is, you are the most humble of gentlemen, and wherever you go from here, this body will be better for that. This is a Senate moment. There are 25 of us who stand proud to represent our communities of over 1.5, maybe 2 million at this point. And we will always remember this day where we can stand up and we can thank you for your service to the people of Hawai'i. So with that, we bid you farewell, and

we'll see you over there, wherever 'over there' is. And good luck on your next venture, my friend. Mahalo a nui loa and aloha. Thank you, Madam President."

Senator Nishihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"You know, David has represented part of the district which I now currently represent for well over the nine years that I've been in the office. And throughout his tenure representing the district of Pearl City, I can truthfully say I've never heard anyone have any words that didn't say that he was a man of honor, quiet, and that you could count on him if he gave his word. And I think that is particularly important to me, that when you have someone who represented you at some point before you got into office, that the person who sits in that position is going to be steadfast in his views and honest and not a showmanship kind of guy but really one that does the work – does the people's work – and does it in a quiet and a very effective way.

"And I know his constituents in the area will miss him. Maybe when he moves on, if he is able to be successful, then he'll represent a much larger body of people, and I'm sure he'll do it in the same manner. So again, David, I really thank you for all that you've done and I wish you Godspeed as well. Thank you."

Senator Kouchi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"This is kind of awkward. I found out David and I were born in 1957, and in all of the years that I lobbied on behalf of the county and the electrical cooperative, he never seemed to chair the committees that I appeared before. And so I knew him to say 'hi.' Never heard anybody speak ill of him, but it's not until I had the opportunity to serve in this body did I really get to know him: how bright he is, how thoughtful, as everyone has said.

"But more importantly, I think what I would like to share, like my colleague Senator Hee stated, is watching him as a father. I had the opportunity to get to know his daughter Lauren a lot better, and she's become a friend of my sons, and she's in law school in Georgetown right now in Washington, D.C. What we do here, we do with great passion and commitment, but we also do it at great expense to our families. And so, to do this job well, to serve the people of this great state and yet, give that kind of love and commitment to your family, it's usually our families that suffer and it's usually time with our families that is sacrificed. So, I would like to strongly echo what Senator Hee has said about David Ige: that as a father, he has not failed in his commitment to his children, to his wife and his family, and has somehow found a great balance to serve us well while making sure that they never suffered for that service.

"There are two things I will take away in remembering David in the last four years. Our first WAM site visit on Kaua'i wound up being David and I with staff; nobody else could make the site visits on day two. We wound up at a restaurant, and after he ate a healthy salad and we both declined the dessert, the manager of the property, doing the correct thing, overruled our denial and brought us the dessert anyway. There was a deep-fried chocolate lumpia, and as he bit into the lumpia, the chocolate started to run down his arm. It was so good, he started to lick his arm. And then somehow, who we are is simply who we are. If we're bright, if we're intelligent, if we're thoughtful, and most importantly, an engineer, we find ourselves compelled to ask life's tough questions: 'How did they get the chocolate inside?' And I look at him, and I said, 'Really? You know, I think they wrap it and then they deep fry it and it melts.' I don't know, you know? I thought, 'You loved it. You're an engineer;

why do you have to ask the question?' But he does and he always has and that's why he's done his job so well.

"The second and, more importantly, my strongest memory, is of a sleep-deprived David Ige in 2011, throwing his folder down on the table in conference room 309 during budget conference committee hearing and saying, 'We got this. We got this. We got this. We got this. It all adds up – we're done!' and walking out and creating a great budget for the people of Hawai'i.

"So, while I wish you well, David, I reserve the right – in case you are promoted – to take back everything I say if I have to negotiate with you. But on behalf of myself and my family, we certainly wish you and your family all the best. Thank you."

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I'd just like to add my voice in thanking David for working so hard on our behalf, for all of the people of Hawai'i; and for taking the time to come to our districts, come visit us, get to know us, and allowing us to get to know you. David, thank you very much for everything. We're going to miss you here and we wish you, as they say in French, 'bon voyage' – good journey – to your future endeavors. Mahalo."

Senator Baker rose to present the following remarks:

"I want to say 'aloha' to David; I can't get through much of anything else except to say that I appreciate all of the things that everyone has said about our colleague, and I would just say I echo those sentiments. And David, we're going to miss you; you've been a wonderful friend and a wonderful colleague. I had an opportunity to be a co-chair with Senator Ige when we tried that experiment in the Senate, and it's different than being a vice chair. It's a very interesting relationship because you have to work together and you have to come up with a unified approach and a way to address the issues. And I learned a lot about David; I learned a lot about his integrity and how much he cares about good policy and doing the right thing.

"It has been an amazing journey to serve with him, both in the House and in the Senate. And I, for one, am going to miss him deeply – not just because he's a chess club member, but he's a great friend. He's understood the neighbor islands and he's really tried to do what is pono on all the issues that he has come into contact with. So, good luck; best wishes; we'll miss you."

At 12:39 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:44 p.m.

Senator Ige rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"This is one of those things that you kind of think about sometimes but not really. I wanted to talk a little bit about my journey to public service and about some of the experiences and people that I think have been very important to me, and some of the best accomplishments, I think, in my time here at the State Capitol.

"You know, Madam President, you had a part in starting me on this journey, as you know. You may recall that a mayor had convinced a couple of city councilmen to change parties, and Congresswoman Mink was incensed and mounted a recall petition and actually got them recalled. And my journey here started because you and your colleague from Pearl City decided that you would take up the charge and resign your seats. And a short while later, Governor Ariyoshi appointed me to represent the community of Pearl City, and as they said, in terms of

destiny, my twenty-ninth birthday was the very first session day that I served at the State Capitol.

"I just wanted to tell a little bit about the things, I guess, I'm most proud of in my service here. When I first came here, I was shocked. I came from Hawaiian Telephone; we had personal computers at the company by at least a half a decade before the time I came over here. I was shocked; I walked into my office and there's no computer in the room. I mean, it's sort of like, 'Well, how can this be?' There's no network, and then I find out, right: Well, word processing, if you actually wanted to do word processing – and those old-timers here know – well, you've got to go to the word processing pool. There was a bunch of Wang computers, so if you wanted to do a mail merge, you actually had to wait your turn. So, as a freshman appointee, it didn't take me long to figure out that I would never get a turn. You know, these guys had it rigged, right? I mean, you're last on the priority list. And so, I had a very resourceful retiree working in my office, Nancy Matsunaga. So she said, 'The Tax Department is throwing away a whole bunch of mag card readers,' and she said, 'If you want me to, I'll get one.' And so I said, 'Sure.' How can you be in public office and not have a word processor, right? So, she brings in this mag card reader, and I swear, it was the size of a piano. It had these cards that I never knew what it was, and the way that you do a mail merge is you type a letter and then you'd program the typewriter – it's a Selectric typewriter, right? – you'd program the typewriter to stop and then you had to manually type in the name and address and then you hit 'continue' and it would continue on. So, my first year here at the State Capitol was very unusual. I couldn't quite figure out whether this was really the way that laws got made or whether I was being punished.

"But, you know, a strange thing happened in one of those very, very early sessions. We probably had the worst calamity that public access could ever have because the House and the Senate had voted on the entire Third Reading calendar and the general public couldn't get copies of any of the bills, because the Xerox machines and everything had broken down. So, can you imagine if, on all the work that we've done in the last two days, the public couldn't get access to the Final Reading bills until two weeks from now, what would happen in our community? Well, that actually happened a number of years ago. So, a couple of colleagues of mine – we were in the House at that time, the senator from Pālolo and the senators from Makiki and Mānoa – formed the first special legislative access committee because we really felt that the public not having access to the legislative process was a problem.

"That was a great time for public access; we went to hearings across the state and we really looked at what it would mean for us to be committed for the public to participate in the legislative process. And we came back from the statewide meetings and we passed the first group of legislative access measures. What did we do? We created the Public Access Room. We really felt that we needed somebody who really understood what the process was to be able to help the public: to help the public understand and help them interface. We knew that we had to create access, so – and this is before the Internet and PDFs – we committed to electronic access to bills and resolutions. The public, for the first time, would be guaranteed that when the Legislature is voting on measures, they would have full access to every single document that the Legislature's voting to in real time, not two weeks later.

"I think, most importantly, we recognized the role of the public library, and the public library became the access point. We put terminals and printers in each and every library; we installed fax machines so that the public, if they wanted to be engaged, could go there and get access to every document; and we started accepting electronic testimony. Anyone could go to the library, and at that point in time, it was a dollar a page to go



to a private company, but anybody could go to any public library and fax testimony to the Legislature so they could be part of the process. Ever since that day, Hawai'i has been at the forefront of public access.

"In 1993, the first 'Ōlelo broadcast of a public hearing occurred, and for the first time, shortly thereafter, my children could actually see the work that we do. In 1996, we launched the Capitol website, [www.capitol.hawaii.gov](http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov); and you know, what most people don't understand is we had gone through an RFP to procure a bill drafting system at \$3.1 million, and the vendor failed miserably. We decided that we were going to do it in-house. We made an investment in the staff, and some of those Data Systems staff are still with us. And we relied on their talent to create a system that would be the core of the legislative website on a going-forward basis rather than work with high-priced consultants. And I've got to say today that the Data Systems staff of both the House and Senate really have created a remarkable piece of software that serves our entire community and has become the model of public access across the country. So, Carol and the rest of the Data Systems staff, thank you very much for all that you do.

"In 1999, we started hearing notices by email. In 2000, the first email testimonies arrived. In 2006, ahead of the game, we provided free Wi-Fi access at the State Capitol. And in 2007, we started the Senate Paperless Initiative; and I want to thank each and every one of you for your participation in that, even the minority member. We were all committed to proving that we could do something better, that we could serve the public and provide better services at less cost. It was a remarkable project, I think, that all of us had a hand in and clearly the Senate paperless project is something that we can all be proud of. We reduced paper consumption by over 85 percent since 2007, something that I think we can all be proud of.

"Then, in 2008, we put all testimony online, so the public had full access to all of the documents that we were considering in making our decisions. And most importantly, it was searchable, so that if you wanted to see what the senator from Pālolo had submitted in his testimony, you could actually search his name and really see if he had submitted testimony or not.

"And then finally, starting in 2013, the entire budget process went paperless and online. For the last two years, we've been providing full access to all legislative documents for all of the decision making that we made. I do believe that legislating in the State of Hawai'i will never, ever be the same for all of the things that we contributed to make public access real in the State of Hawai'i. And I wanted to thank each and every one of you for your part in that work.

"It's funny; as some of you got up to speak, I was concerned because you were taking part of my speech, but I said, 'You know what? I'm not flexible; I'm an engineer,' so I'm going to deliver it as I wrote it.

"The other thing that I've always been passionate about is education and education reform. I did have the privilege to serve as the chair of the Education Committee and I was a partner with my colleague, the senator from Kāne'ohe, at that time. We were committed to improving the public school system unlike any other effort at that time. We had hundreds and hundreds of public meetings. We went across the state. We met with everybody: We met with parents and students and teachers, principals, faculty, staff, community members. We wanted to hear from each and every one of them, what was working in the public schools and what wasn't. We met with the private schools. We met with headmasters. We met with the College of Education. We met with anybody and everybody who had any idea about what needed to be fixed in the public school system.

"After many, many hours, I have to say we invented the idea of an omnibus bill. I'm sorry for those of you who don't like that idea. We were convinced that we had to do a comprehensive overhaul of the public education system, and introducing a bill at a time was too easy for special interests to pick off. But collectively, if we had a bill that was addressing all of the areas in public school reform, we knew that collectively, the sum parts would be more than the individual parts.

"So, we did embark on that strategy and along the way, a precocious senior from Castle High School sort of joined the team. It was remarkable for her to be willing to sit with us and contemplate all of the changes that we believed were important. But it really reconfirmed our commitment to public schools, that a public school senior could be so committed to improving the public education system that she would be willing to work with us and take on all of the special interest groups as we tried to carve out a path that would accelerate and enhance the public school system. I knew at that time that this senior was something special and she would be doing great things – and most importantly, she's a public school graduate.

"Well, at the end of the day, we were able to pass the most comprehensive public school reform at the time, and I'm certain that precocious senior might disagree a little bit with those statements since, but there was a whole ton of things that we did. We were committed to making it fun. We had 'Let's Get Wired.' It was a commitment to ensure that our public schools would be the first public schools in the country to be connected to the Internet. We started that program and completed, and then we enhanced that, because then we expanded that to ensure that each and every classroom had access to the public Internet, way before any other state or school district had even thought about that.

"We created the 'Back to School Hawaii Day.' As my colleague and I traveled around the state, we were appalled that all these guys throwing lobs about why public schools can or cannot work, and most of them had not been on a school campus in 20 or 30 years. So, we created this 'Back to School Hawaii Day,' and we asked everybody – everybody – to join us and go back to school and visit for a day so that they could understand what it was like to be at a public school.

"In the end, we completed the most comprehensive reform of the public school system. We were focused on empowering schools. We enacted pay for performance; we wanted to ensure that principals who did a good job could get paid for their increasing the student learning. We included accountability; we established statewide performance standards. And we were really focused on seeing the budget and the money follow the students. We believed that it really was about grassroots, top-down – empower the schools and let those closest to the children make the most important decisions.

"And finally, we did pass the first charter school law, and although we didn't know that we should call it 'charter schools' at that point in time, we were a bit ahead of the envelope. We called it 'student-centered schools' because we believed that if you focus on the children first, that everything else would fall into place. And I'm proud of the work that I've been able to do on this public school system. In conference committee that year, we broke all the rules. We decided that we were – my colleague and friend from Kāne'ohe – we decided that we'd sit with this precocious senior on the same side of the table in conference committee. And it was funny because you would see all the other House and Senate members walk in the conference room and they didn't know what was going on. How in the world can the House and Senate be sitting on the same side of the table, trying to decide and define how we should reform public schools? It just didn't work like that, but we made it work.

“And there are a couple other things that I’m very proud of in public schools. As the senator from Kohala had mentioned, I remember the first time I met with Larry Kimura from ‘Aha Pūnana Leo and heard and talked with him about how we were losing a nation, about how there were less than 50 Native Hawaiian speakers, and the language *is* the culture. And we talked about what we needed to do to be able to save the host culture in our communities, and it was about Hawaiian language immersion programs.

“I was proud that the first Hawaiian language program was in my district at Waiāu Elementary School, and fully supported. Meeting after meeting with the parents and the supporters, it was obvious: those people – the teachers, parents in that immersion school – were on a mission. They were on a mission to save the culture and the language. It was so energizing to be meeting with them. And as the first Hawaiian language immersion school, there were no textbooks. There were no library books. We would be meeting after school, and they would purchase children’s books. There was a group that was translating them, and then we would be cutting and pasting the translations so the children could have reading material because there was no reading material in the Hawaiian language. It was a phenomenal experience for me and I think, most importantly, I still believe that Waiāu Elementary is the best example of merging the immersion program with the regular students because both the English language students and the Hawaiian language immersion students enhance and encourage each other. That school is unlike any other school that I’ve been to, and today, they still are a beacon and a model for how the immersion school can coexist with the English language school and excel.

“I was also part of the whole effort on homeschooling. Meeting with the superintendent back then, it was very difficult for you as a parent to choose to homeschool your child, but we looked at the data and we said, ‘This is ridiculous. Homeschooled children do very well. We ought to make it easier for you to choose to homeschool your child.’ We believed that a parent should have every opportunity to find the right educational environment for their children for them to excel.

“So, I’m just proud of the work. I want to thank my colleague from Kāne‘ohe. I want to thank that precocious senior from Castle High School who has followed us around, thankfully. I thank the thousands and thousands of parents, teachers, educators, and community members who really joined us on that journey and really helped inspire us to enact the reforms that we enjoy today.

“I just wanted to take a little time on two more things and then I’ll be done. My colleague from South and West Maui has talked a little bit about our experience as co-chairs of the Consumer Protection and Technology Committee, at that time. We were asked – I was asked; I was not interested in serving as Consumer Protection chair, but we had years of gridlock on auto insurance. We had a crisis on our hands: insurance companies were leaving the state because they couldn’t make a profit. The insurance rates were going higher and higher and higher and insurance rates were the highest in the country as insurance companies bailed on the market, and we were asked to take on that challenge.

“It is difficult being a co-chair, but I believe that that really allowed us to do a better job in our conferences with the House at that point in time. There were two of us to figure out what the options should be. The senator from West Maui talked about it, but I really felt that being co-chairs allowed us to really outgun the House at that point and it was truly remarkable. The insurance rates were soaring. We involved all stakeholders in discussions – we invited them all. We focused on the cost drivers, working with those experts in the industry. We used

actuaries to evaluate the options that we wanted to consider so we knew exactly what the impact of the various changes that we were making would be. And finally, we were able to get an auto insurance reform passed. I was proud of the fact that we were able, because of our work with the actuaries, to mandate a 20 to 35 percent reduction in auto insurance rates so that all of the members in our community would be able to benefit from lower insurance rates. And you know, it’s really funny; at that point in time, a plaintiff attorney had talked to me after the bill was completed and they said, ‘Five years, max. We’ll figure it out. We’ll figure out how we can work around your law,’ so that they can continue the lawsuits. And here we are, 17 years after we enacted the auto insurance reform bill, and our auto insurance rates are stable. We have more insurers than we need and our community has benefited from 17 years of stable rates and affordable insurance.

“One last story I did want to tell, and it’s concerning my friend and colleague from Kahalu‘u. He spilled the beans; I think it’s all about relationships here at the Capitol. I think we all work and learn to work with each other, be able to listen. My colleague from Kahalu‘u figured out my weak spot and he befriended my daughter. Now, the other side of the story that he didn’t talk about is for the next six months after that fateful trip up to Hale‘iwa to round up the cattle, my daughter was in my face about buying a horse. She would find horses for sale on the Internet; she would talk about buying a horse. She was all of 13 years old, I think, at that time. So, I’m trying to be the good parent, right? So, I’m trying to say, ‘Well, why don’t you figure out what’s involved with a horse?’ So she goes along, ‘Oh, Dad, it’s easy.’ I said, ‘No, it’s not easy.’ So where do we keep the horse, right? I mean, I’m in ‘Aiea, right? ‘Where do you keep the horse, Amy?’ ‘Oh, um, well, we can just tie him up in the back.’ You know, for six months, she badgered me and finally, I just said, ‘You know what, Amy? When you make 18, you can go ahead and buy your horse, but I’m not going to buy you a horse until then.’

“But you know, the remarkable thing about that is when the opportunity to acquire the conservation easement at Turtle Bay was before us, it didn’t take a whole lot for my friend and colleague from Kahalu‘u to convince me that it was the right thing to do. The challenge before us – my vice chair from Mililani knew that the budget was out of balance, that there was no way we could find \$40 million. There was no way we could cut that project from Kapa‘a or cut that project from Kaimukī or cut the pharmacy building in order for us to find the \$40 million in general obligation bonds to fund this project. So, in the dire evening of Thursday, thanks to my colleague and friend from Kāne‘ohe, the whole notion of restructuring the debt came to us as a win-win solution for everyone. And I’m so proud to be able to say that I had a small piece in preserving that pristine piece of property out in Turtle Bay for my friend from Kahalu‘u – who’s my daughter’s horse-riding coach and friend – for all the people of Hawai‘i, because I am certain that that is one of the things, 20 years from now, that we will remember as a big accomplishment in this legislative session: the preservation of the lands at Turtle Bay.

“So, I did want to thank each and every one of you for being part of my journey here. I wanted to thank Governor Ariyoshi for giving me this opportunity. I am certain that if he did not appoint me, I would never choose to run for office. It is something that I think is just not in my DNA. I did want to thank my wife, Dawn, and my kids, Lauren, Amy, and Matthew for their willingness to give up some time so that I can do this public service.

“I did want to thank my staff. You all know I have been blessed for all the years that I’ve served in the Capitol with wonderful staff. We know, with all the things that we’re required to do as part of our service, that if it weren’t for staff,

we wouldn't get anything done. And in all of my 29 years here at the Capitol, I have had so much support and been able to cobble together, on the meager pay that we're allowed, a tremendous staff that allows us to do more with less and provide the services that our community demands. I did also want to thank and acknowledge the permanent staff: the Clerks and the Sergeant-at-Arms and SMA; LRB, if they're watching. They really do yeoman's work. They all serve at the pleasure of the Senate. They all commit more time and energy than we would ever ask of normal people, but they really do make the Legislature and the Senate work for all of the people of Hawai'i.

"And finally, I did want to thank the community and constituents in Pearl City and 'Aiea for the honor and privilege of being their representative here in the State Capitol. I want to thank each and every one of you, as well as those in my community, who empower us to do the work on behalf of the people of Hawai'i. From the very first day that I walked into this building – even though I started in the minority caucus room by mistake – the thing that I got and what encouraged me to run for office the first time was the commitment of each and every person I met in this building to public service. We may not agree on all the issues, but it's very clear that we are all committed to serve the people of Hawai'i and do the best that we can on their behalf.

"So, I want to thank you for 29 years of the best experience of my life. I am energized and excited about my future and wish you all the best. Thank you."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to remind the members that the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs would be holding an informational briefing on the Native Hawaiian Roll Commission on Monday, May 5, 2014 at 10:30 a.m. in Conference Room 229.

Senator Hee rose to announce that the Senate Special Investigative Committee on the Hawaii State Hospital would be holding its next meeting on Wednesday, May 14, 2014, at 10:00 a.m. in Conference Room 016.

Senator Galuteria rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I just want, on behalf of the majority, to thank you for your leadership. This legislative session, as we move to adjourn, I think we're confident that we've aligned with our initial priorities to continue Hawai'i's quality of life now and in the future through the initiatives that have surfaced supporting Hawai'i's keiki, kūpuna, workers, and the environment for consideration. Our state supplemental budget provides funding for core services such as education, health, the University of Hawai'i, human services, the environment, public safety, supporting and caring for the lives of Hawai'i's people.

"Flagship legislation that emerged include increasing the minimum wage: boosting the income of Hawai'i's lowest-paid workers, giving them more money to spend and invest, increasing economic activity and growth. Our joint majority package, Madam President and colleagues, supports Hawai'i's kūpuna through funding of aging and long term care and investor education programs. We are protecting our environment, establishing an adaptation committee on the sea level rise vulnerability. We have appropriated \$5 million for the Invasive Species Council.

"And in everything we do, we did it with balance and fairness. It's always about balance, Madam President – the same way we look at things here in the State Senate, every issue has two opposing sides. Our job as lawmakers is to come out of the end of session with worthy legislation to improve the quality of life of our people, the people of Hawai'i nei, the people we

represent, and I think we did just that. Once again, thank you for your leadership. Mahalo."

Senator Kouchi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Most of our support agencies were mentioned, and I know when I extended my thanks to the permanent staff last year, it was pointed out to me that I failed to mention the accounting department. And I want to make sure that I don't do that this year because I want to get my paycheck. And so, I apologize for missing them last year. I know most of the agencies were thanked today, and again, I express our thanks for all the work they do to allow us to do our work and certainly, the accounting department. Thank you."

Senator Slom rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Thank you. Well, we made it to the end. It's always a question, how difficult it's going to be during the session. I want to thank Senate President, the Majority Leader, and the majority team; and I want to especially thank my staff, my attorney, research staff, and office staff. I think they've done a yeoman's duty. When you're on all 16 committees and every ad hoc committee and every investigating committee, you must rely on a dedicated and energetic and passionate staff, and I'm very blessed to have had that again this year.

"We don't always agree, although most of the votes were very close: 24 to 1. I've tried to present facts and alternatives and I've tried to be a person who disagrees without being disagreeable. We had our moments. People ask me, 'How would you describe this session in one word?' And it was difficult to say. Some people suggested 'quiet.' This was a quiet session compared to previous sessions – until the end and the excitement of room 309 on Friday night. The other word that comes to mind would be 'rush.' I think we broke all kinds of records this year in our rush to pass the budget early, to agree to the extent that we've never agreed before with the House, to wrap up conferences in a timely manner.

"While I disagree with many of the things and, as I say, have offered alternatives, I do certainly agree with the Majority Leader that all of us are committed and dedicated 100 percent to the future of Hawai'i and to our people. And while I probably project a more negative point of view for our finances and the budget, I know also that I am an optimistic person and I believe in the abilities of individuals, and I know that one person can do many things and have a tremendous impact on others. We spent a great deal of time talking about that with Senator Ige and others of you who have done the same thing. We have taken different paths but we want to get to the same destination, and that is to make our state the best that it can be.

"I would urge a few things, however, in reviewing this legislative session. Again, I think we spend too much time patting ourselves on the back for spending other people's money. I think we owe it to the taxpayers of this state, among the highest-burdened in the nation, to recognize it is their contributions, it is their wealth, it is their work that we decide upon.

"I think, also, that we need to do a little better job in reading and understanding certain bills and certain requests, particularly for money, particularly at a time when we have such a multiplicity and duplication of nonprofits and other organizations and individuals asking us for money – again, not our money, the taxpayers' money. The story in the paper today just highlights that about a conflict of interest – clear, clear conflict of interest – of a member of the House of Representatives, but we all approved that budget with all that money in it, except your Minority Leader. The story that had come out recently about the company Sopogy, which had been

a darling of the Legislature because of political commitment and not actual educational or engineering attainment. We need to do a better job. We need to read the bills and understand and listen to the criticism before we vote; and then we shouldn't be afraid to vote in opposition to something that clearly raises red flags, even if that vote goes against us.

"I'm proud to be in the Senate. I enjoy our discussions and our debates. I think that we need to have more openness and more transparency. Retiring Senator Ige has done so much in that regard and it's a wonderful thing, and while I have been critical of many areas of government, I have been quick to point out that our website is the best in the United States; that even though legislators often try to fool the public with our procedural shenanigans, the public can now follow us. They can do it in real time, and that's a real tribute.

"And so I'd say, as we close another year, our work, of course, is not done; we should always strive to do better and know that we can do better, and we look forward to working during the interim. A lot of people don't understand that we still have work to do; we still have hearings, as was mentioned. We still have briefings. We have work and we meet with our constituents. All of us understand that, in fact, we are public servants. We serve the public. We want to get that public more engaged; they need to be more empowered. We can't go from number 1 in the nation in terms of voter turnout to number 50 without consequences. We need to encourage people to get engaged, to run for office, to help those that are running, to be part of the system, so that all of us together will make a better Hawai'i, the best state in the nation. Aloha and thank you, Madam President."

Senator Kidani rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I also wanted to give a shout-out to our Capitol TV program Executive Director Glenn Booth and all of his staff for enabling us, the general public, as well as our staff to follow us on the many committee hearings and meetings that we have to go through. So, job well done; thank you, Glenn."

Senate President Kim delivered her closing remarks as follows:

"Colleagues, we convened this session by honoring and acknowledging those who had served with us and before us in these Senate chambers over the years. It was heartwarming for us to welcome them back, to see old friends, and to have an opportunity to thank them for their enduring contributions to the people of Hawai'i. It was also a time for us to look back over the 55 years of statehood and to celebrate the accomplishments of the past legislatures.

"Now, this 2014 Session is part of that history. I believe we can point with pride to what we accomplished. Future legislators will note the key accomplishments of 2014: worthy increase of the minimum wage to help our working people; expanding the educational opportunities for our preschool children; making kindergarten mandatory; instituting government reforms; preserving conservation lands on our North Shore; protecting the environment of invasive species with prevention, control, research efforts; supporting Hawai'i's kūpuna; and, all the while, maintaining discipline and control over the state budget; and so much other key legislation that commits our state to move forward without an over-commitment of the taxpayers' money.

"As always, there were issues of contention, each with passionate, reasoned proponents and opponents. There were disagreements over spending priorities and the scope and direction of government programs. And of course, we were faced with the ever-present deadlines that sometimes limit us in the debate that we desired. And like other sessions, it was not easy; it never is. But we did conduct our session with

congeniality, with openness, fairness, and an earnest commitment to do the people's business, to serve our constituents to the best of our abilities, and to work together to keep Hawai'i a special place.

"Sure, there are other important measures that we will need to work on that will need more collaboration. And while we did address many of those needs, there simply wasn't enough time to address them all. The weeks ahead will provide some time for reflection on what we need to do as we come up on the next session. This interim will be hectic with elections, but we must carve out some time to continue the work to prepare for the 2015 Session, which will be upon us in just eight short months.

"On a personal note, I'm very grateful to each and every one of you for your support, your collaboration, and the work we did together. It's always difficult when a large group tries to deal with a number of complex issues in a short period of time. But we worked it, always reminding ourselves of our purpose and the awesome responsibility that have been bestowed upon us by our constituents.

"Of course, we could not do this alone; as many of you have said, we do have the assistance and the help of very hard-working staff members. I'd be remiss in not thanking my staff: Terrence, Gina, Nancy, Daniel, Charn, and Lesli. Also thanking the Ways and Means staff; having been chair of Ways and Means, some of them served with me and they are immensely dedicated to their job. Our permanent staff: our Clerk, Carol Taniguchi, for being available all hours at night when I would call; our Sergeant-at-Arms, Ben Villaflor, and all of his people; SMA, Casey also there for phone calls, and Richard; Data Systems; our Communications; LRB; Accounting; our Printshop; our Journal; Supply; and our minority staff, as well. Everyone, all of you combined, have made our job a little bit easier.

"I'd also like to thank my leadership team – Vice President Kouchi, Majority Leader Galuteria, Assistant Majority Leader Kidani, Majority Floor Leader Espero, Majority Policy Leader Ihara, our Majority Whips Senator Kahele and Senator Tokuda – for working with me to address the day-to-day rigors of this office. I really appreciate the frank discussions we've had, your support, and your guidance throughout the session. I also want to thank our, Minority Leader, Sam Slom for always providing us with an alternative view and for your support. I especially want to thank our Ways and Means chair. I've had the privilege of working side by side with him for the past 14 years. I hold him in very high esteem and I believe that he has shepherded us through some of the hard times of the budget. Senator Ige, I join with my colleagues in wishing you success in your future goals and hopefully, we will work together again.

"Members, we can all be proud of what we were able to accomplish this year in keeping Hawai'i a very special place. Mahalo to all of you."

The Chair then made the following announcement:

"Members, I'm going to call for a recess. We're going to walk over to the House of Representatives to let them know that we're ready to adjourn Sine Die."

At 1:29 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 1700

Honorable Members

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1700, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purpose of this bill, the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2014, is to adjust appropriations for fiscal biennium 2013-2015 funding requirements for the operations and capital improvement projects of executive branch agencies by amending the General Appropriations Act of 2013, Act 134, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, and other budget authorizations effective during fiscal biennium 2013-2015.

Section 13 of Article VII of the State Constitution requires that the Legislature "include a declaration of findings in every general law authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds that the total amount of principal and interest, estimated for such bonds and for all bonds authorized and unissued and calculated for all bonds issued and outstanding, will not cause the debt limit to be exceeded at the time of issuance." House Bill No. 1712 did include the required declaration of findings, but the total amount of general obligation bonds declared was understated by approximately \$46,000,000. This difference in amounts of general obligation bonds will raise legal concerns about the bond authorization and could adversely affect the State's ability to issue the general obligation bonds.

To avoid questions as to the validity of the bond authorization, the total amount of the appropriations of general obligation bond proceeds must be reduced by \$46,000,000 so that the total amount of the appropriations of general obligation bond proceeds is equal to or less than the amount of the general obligation bonds authorized to be issued. Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." I have exercised that authority by reducing item K-3, capital project no. 00-02, in section 39 of Act 134, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, as amended by section 5 of House Bill No. 1700 on page 330, lines 13-22, reducing the appropriation for fiscal year 2014-2015 from \$399,000,000 to \$353,000,000. In addition, I have made a corresponding reduction to the total investment capital appropriation for fiscal year 2014-2015 for item K-6, program ID no. BUF101, in section 3 of Act 134, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, as amended by section 3 of House Bill No. 1700

on page 43, lines 33-43, by reducing the total investment capital appropriation from \$428,383,000 to \$382,383,000.

The Department of Education will reschedule work on various projects to accommodate this reduction. The Legislature will have to provide a \$46,000,000 appropriation during the regular session of 2015 to restore the capacity to execute these projects.

Although it is common practice to sign the bond authorization bill on the same day as the budget, I will not sign House Bill No. 1712 before July 1, 2014. This is necessary to ensure that the general obligation bond declaration has not been exceeded, as required by Section 13 of Article VII of the State Constitution.

The Conference Committee Report for House Bill No. 1700 indicates that \$399 million in State Educational Facilities Improvement (SEFI) funds were lapsed. However, the bill itself fails to reflect this action.

In sum: in the absence of a special session, I am required to:

- (1) Line item veto approximately \$46 million from the budget bill;
- (2) Give the required notification to the Legislature;
- (3) Sign House Bill No. 1700 on or before June 30, 2014; and
- (4) Sign House Bill No. 1712 on July 1, 2014.

SEFI appropriations will be reduced by \$46 million. As soon as practicable during the next session, the Legislature can, if it chooses, pass an appropriation bill for the Department of Education to replace \$46 million that had to be vetoed.

Finally, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR) informs me that for its General Administration (LBR902) program, the cost for payouts for accrued vacation payments for all employees leaving the employ of DLIR will be approximately \$200,000. However, subparagraph (4) on page 51, line 13 of House Bill No. 1700 indicates that \$450,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015, shall be expended for this purposes and that unexpended funds shall lapse to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year.

This will force a lapse of \$250,000 in general funds which were appropriated to DLIR because they cannot be used for any other purpose. In essence, this results in a \$250,000 reduction to LBR902's budget of \$1,488,081 in general funds for fiscal year 2014-2015. This equates to a 16 percent reduction.

I request that the Legislature correct this inconsistency in an expedited manner during the regular session of 2015 to allow DLIR to effectively carry forth its responsibilities for the remainder of the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1700 with the appropriations in item K-6 in section 3 and in item K-3 in section 5 of the bill reduced as set forth above.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1288, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Order of Succession."

The purpose of this bill, among other things, is to provide that the individual who will succeed to the office of Lieutenant Governor when the office of the Lieutenant Governor becomes vacant by reason of the Lieutenant Governor becoming Governor, the Lieutenant Governor's failure to qualify, or the Lieutenant Governor's removal from office, death, resignation, or otherwise, will be first the Senate President, provided that the Senate President is of the same political party as the Governor and promptly resigns his or her legislative office. If the Senate President does not meet those criteria, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives will become the Lieutenant Governor if that individual is of the same political party as the Governor and promptly resigns his or her legislative office. If neither is of the same political party as the Governor or promptly resigns their legislative offices, then the Governor may appoint an individual who is a member of the same political party as the Governor and is qualified to hold the office of Lieutenant Governor pursuant to Section 2 of Article V of the Hawaii State Constitution.

This bill is objectionable because this bill does not provide for succession in the situation when the office of the Governor becomes permanently vacant at the same time as the office of the Lieutenant Governor and the Senate President and the Speaker of the House belong to a political party different from that of the Governor. In that situation, there is no one to appoint a member of the same political party as the Governor to be the Lieutenant Governor to act in the Governor's stead, and, of course, there will be no one to succeed to the office of the Governor. This lack of a provision for succession under such circumstances could cause confusion and disrupt the normal functioning of state government activities. This gap in the provisions for order of succession should be remedied.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 1288 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to require the court to balance the interests of parents involved in divorce proceedings when issuing orders related to custody, spousal support and maintenance, and the division of property. The bill would require a court, in awarding child custody, to consider frequent, continuing, and meaningful contact of each parent with the child, unless the court finds that a parent is unable to act in the best interest of such child. In addition, a court would be required to consider whether there is a necessary reduction of a parent's employment due to caring for a dependent child and whether there is a wasting of assets by a parent in determining spousal support and maintenance. Finally, this bill creates a rebuttable presumption that the value given to a joint investment or asset given to a parent is a joint gift, excluding inheritance assets.

This bill is objectionable because the rebuttable presumption that an asset given to a parent is a joint gift is vague, ambiguous, and inconsistent with well-established principles guiding the parties and the courts in divorce matters. This amendment would likely create additional litigation in an area of law already burdened with litigation.

Furthermore, the practitioners in the family law area have not had an opportunity to comment on this bill because this change was made by the conference committee. As a result, several letters have been submitted to me expressing strong opposition to enacting this bill as law.

The bill provides that victims, surviving immediate family members, and "any accompanying loved ones thereof" shall be allowed to participate in restorative justice processes "to discuss and address how they were affected by the wrongful act, and any actions or outcomes desired that may mitigate or repair the harm." The processes include the victim or surviving family members meeting with the accused person or a representative of the accused person.

Restorative justice can be used to promote the healing of both crime victims and offenders. The restorative justice process should be victim-centered and empower the victim to meet with the offender in structured and controlled in-person encounters in order to voice the victim's perspective and to address personal impacts of the crime. Recidivism can be reduced by holding the offender directly accountable to the victim, or to surviving family members, and by requiring the offender to recognize the detrimental consequences of the crime, accept personal responsibility, and make amends.

While I support the concept of restorative justice, Senate Bill No. 60 is objectionable because, as written, it does not provide adequate protection for victims of domestic violence, child sexual assault, or elder abuse from intimidation, coercion, and manipulation by the offenders. These vulnerable victim populations are susceptible to undue influence by offenders who may want the victims to recant or alter their testimony or advocate for the offender's early release at a parole hearing. The bill does not limit requests for a restorative justice dialog with offenders to cases involving offenders who have already been convicted and sentenced. Victims of offenders whose

cases are pending investigation or charges, or pending trial or sentencing, will be particularly vulnerable. Offenders may take advantage of the process to try to better their positions in the criminal cases. Furthermore, the bill does not require that: (1) mediators, or restorative justice facilitators, are knowledgeable about, and experienced with, the dynamics of domestic violence, child sexual assault, and elder abuse; (2) an evidence-based safety assessment has been conducted to ensure victim safety; or (3) the domestic violence offender has received programming in accordance with the Hawaii Batterer Intervention Program Standards while incarcerated. This bill may result in greater harm to victims and detrimental impact on pending criminal cases.

While the goals and objectives of restorative justice may be laudable this bill needs to be more tightly written to achieve them.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 60 without my approval.

The purpose of this bill is to make permanent the provisions of Act 58, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004. Under this bill, the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA) would continue to be able to deposit revenues and interest derived by HTA from any project into the Tourism Special Fund. Also, the HTA's Executive Director would continue to be subject to the State's retirement system. Finally, this bill would permanently exempt the HTA from the Comptroller's account supervision, while allowing the Comptroller to request that the HTA provide information when preparing the Comptroller's annual publication of statements and subjecting the HTA to accounting form requirements (for uniform business and accounting forms in statewide use).

This bill is objectionable because it makes permanent those provisions of Act 58 that exempt the HTA from the Comptroller's account supervision. This exemption was created by the Legislature in 2004 as a temporary exemption, with a sunset date of June 30, 2015. This bill, which proposes to repeal that sunset date, permanently takes away the checks and balances that ensure transparency in the operations of executive branch agencies that the Comptroller's account supervision provides.

Since all the provisions of Act 58 mentioned above survive until June 30, 2015, even without this bill becoming law, the Legislature will still have an opportunity to introduce legislation

during the regular session of 2015 to repeal the sunset date for any of the unobjectionable provisions of that Act.

Further, the issuance of citations or notices of infractions of the state harbors civil violations system, pursuant to this bill, are to be under the jurisdiction of PSD, but all other functions and responsibilities, such as the administration of any contested case proceeding, will remain with DOT. This appears inconsistent.

While I agree with the underlying objectives of the bill regarding enforcement activity, I believe both departments are working collaboratively to improve efficiency and effectiveness. Prior to the introduction of this bill, DOT and PSD had already begun preliminary discussions on this issue. Accordingly, I believe the departments should be allowed more time and opportunity to administratively implement the objectives of this bill with duties and responsibilities of DOT and PSD being resolved through a memorandum of agreement.

SB2682 SD1 HD2 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE STATEMENTS" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to amend section 84-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to make the financial disclosure statements of members of fourteen specifically identified boards and commissions available for public inspection and copying. In addition, this bill limits the source of income information for the spouse and children of those individuals whose financial disclosure statements are public to the name of the income source.

Like Governors Cayetano and Lingle, who vetoed substantially similar measures, I find this bill will adversely affect the State's ability to attract the most qualified individuals from serving on boards and commissions. Service on nearly all of the additional boards and commissions identified in this bill is voluntary and uncompensated. Public disclosure of confidential financial information will make it difficult to convince knowledgeable and competent individuals to serve on these boards and commissions.

Members of boards and commissions are currently required to file annual financial disclosure statements with the Ethics Commission that are not subject to public disclosure. This filing requirement balances the public interest with the right of a board or commission member to keep confidential his or her business and financial information.



Safeguards are currently in place to help ensure ethical behavior on the part of board and commission members. They are subject to confirmation by the State Senate and during the confirmation process, the Senate has the opportunity to make certain that the individuals who are confirmed will abide by the highest ethical standards.

Subsequently, after confirmation by the State Senate, boards and commissions are subject to the Sunshine Law, which requires that the public is given reasonable notice of their meetings and that meetings are open to the public. Thus, members of the public have an opportunity to raise conflict of interest concerns they may have and they may also file a complaint with the State Ethics Commission.

Additionally, this bill, as written, would take effect upon approval and thereby apply to current members of boards and commissions. Subjecting current members of boards and commissions to the public disclosure of their private business and financial information now, after they agreed to serve and were confirmed by the Senate, or alternatively, causing them to resign if they do not agree to the required public disclosure, is unfair.

When it comes to the role of volunteer participation in the policy and decision-making process of governing in a democracy, the power of government to intrude in people's lives becomes far more than a technical issue. It goes beyond labels of left and right. The whole rationale of democratic governance, after all, is to ensure the protection of individual rights, particularly in matters of personal information and dignity.

Having a participatory role in government as a volunteer, calling on one's experience and background in the service of the public interest, should not be a gauntlet to be run. In this digital age, there needs to be a sensitivity to what data can be collected and sifted through internet scavenging about private citizens in a volunteer role. Potential volunteers may well ask what will I or my family suffer from those who have a political agenda that is uninterested in my qualifications or motivations but seek to advance their cause without limit to their demand for information.

There are tough issues to be considered in this bill with competing values: Legitimate inquiry into possible conflicts regarding the public interest versus legitimate concerns about personal information on family, finances, credit history and medical records becoming cannon fodder in political battles.

It seems reasonable in these circumstances then, to allow this bill to become law with the object of reviewing the disclosure documents to determine what information serves the public interest, what limitations are relevant and most importantly, what constitutes conflict. The issue then is not about disclosure, but to what end and by what means.

Re: SB2483 SD1 HD1 CD1

SB2483 SD1 HD1 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUM ASSOCIATIONS" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to clarify that a condominium association's lien is subordinate to real property taxes and that the association may assess unpaid common fees against any purchaser who purchases a delinquent unit in a foreclosure. Part II of the bill also clarifies filling of board vacancies.

The Department of Taxation and representatives of condominium associations have agreed to monitor the effect of these amendments on the collection of property taxes. Additionally, the language of the order of collection needs to be reassessed and reviewed by the Legislature.

For the foregoing reasons, SB2483 SD1 HD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 235, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, effective July 8, 2014, without my signature.

**RULES OF THE SENATE**

of the

**TWENTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII**

**PREAMBLE**

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate’s dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai’i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

## RULES OF THE SENATE

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

### PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

#### Rule 1 Organization.

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

#### Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

#### Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.
- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other

reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

(17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.

**Rule 4 The Vice-President.**

(1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.

(3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

**Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.**

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

**Rule 6 The Clerk.**

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of . ." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

**Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.**

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.



**Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.**

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

**Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.**

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

**Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.**

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

**Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.**

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

**Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.**

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

**PART II. COMMITTEES****Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.**

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

(5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

**Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.**

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

**Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.**

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

**Rule 16 Standing Committees.**

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to agriculture; aquaculture, including mariculture.

(2) Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.

(3) Committee on Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism not specifically identified herein; other emerging industries development; financial and technical assistance to business; urban renewal; community development; housing development; film and digital media production; astronomy, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, and other scientific research and development activities; and recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and state government operations policy, including government efficiency; procurement, and state facilities not specifically identified herein.

(4) Committee on Education. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(5) Committee on Energy and Environment. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources; population; and environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Health. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(8) Committee on Higher Education. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but not including Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(9) Committee on Human Services. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance; Medquest; youth services; early childhood learning and care programs under the Department of Human Services; vocational rehabilitation; long term care; programs relating to the promotion of the general well-being of Hawai'i's youth, families, elderly population; the homeless, and affordable and public housing.

(10) Committee on Judiciary and Labor. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts; crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters; criminal code revision; statutory revision; campaign spending and elections; ethics; constitutional matters; the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary; individual rights and civil liberties; public officers and employees; labor; employment opportunities and training; labor-management relations; collective bargaining; the Employees' Retirement System; and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund.

(11) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, and the sheriffs division, military and veterans' affairs, space exploration and aerospace development, civil defense, disaster readiness, county and federal relations, state building code, and matters of concern to the counties.

(12) Committee on Technology and the Arts. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the development of technology, including but not limited to the use of information storage, transmissions, processing, and telecommunications; and culture and the arts in the State, including but not limited to programs relating to historic preservation.

(13) Committee on Tourism. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.

(14) Committee on Transportation and International Affairs. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation; and international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations.

(15) Committee on Water and Land. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning; sustainability; land and water management; forest management and reserve; coastal zone management; land reclamation; naturally

occurring fisheries; ocean resources; state parks and beaches; management areas, including ocean recreation management areas; and small boat harbors.

(16) Committee on Ways and Means. The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management; statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation; and government structure and finance.

**Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.**

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

**Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.**

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

**Rule 19 Leadership Committees.**

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

**Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.**

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

**Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.**

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

**Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.**

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

**Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.**

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

- (A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;
- (B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and
- (C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

**Rule 24 Committee Reports.**

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

**Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.**

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

**Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.**

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

**PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS**

**Rule 27 Meetings.**

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

**Rule 28 Attendance.**

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

**Rule 29 Extension of Session.**

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request an extension of \_\_\_\_\_ days of the \_\_\_\_\_ session of \_\_\_\_\_ of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

**Rule 30 Recessed Session.**

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

**Rule 31 Special Sessions.**

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, respectfully request that a special session of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i be convened at \_\_\_\_\_.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai‘i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai‘i be convened at \_\_\_\_\_.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai‘i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai‘i at \_\_\_\_\_.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate’s responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai‘i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

### **Rule 32 Adjournments.**

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

### **Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.**

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

### **Rule 34 Quorum.**

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

### **Rule 35 Executive Session.**

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

**Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.**

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

**Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.**

(1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.

(2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.

(3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"

(4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"

(5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"

(6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.

(7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.

(8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

**Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.**

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

**PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS****Rule 39 Order of Business: General.**

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

**Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.**

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

**Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.**

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

**Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.**

(1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.

(2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

**Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.**

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

**Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.**

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

**PART V. BILLS****Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

**Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.**

(1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.



(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

**Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.**

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

**Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.**

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

**Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.**

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

**Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.**

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

**Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.**

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

**Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.**

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

**Rule 53 Matters Tabled.**

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

**Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.**

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

**Rule 55 Bills: Certification.**

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

**Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.**

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

**Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.**

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

**Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.**

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

**Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.**

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

**Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.**

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

**PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS**

**Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

**Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.**

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

**Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.**

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,

- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

**Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.**

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

**Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.**

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

**Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.**

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

## PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

**Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.**

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

## PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

**Rule 68 Questions of Order.**

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

**Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.**

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

**Rule 70 Voting: Methods.**

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

**Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.**

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

**PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT****Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

**Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.**

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

**Rule 74 Decorum: Address.**

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the \_\_\_\_\_ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on \_\_\_\_\_"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

**Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.**

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

**Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.**

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

**Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.**

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

**Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.**

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

**Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.**

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

**Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.**

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

**Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.**

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.

- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

**Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.**

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

**Rule 83 Disclosures.**

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

**Rule 84 Violating Confidence.**

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

**Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.**

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

**PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS****Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

**PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES****Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

**Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.**

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

**PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER****Rule 89 Administrative and Financial Manuals.**

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

**Rule 90 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.**

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

**Rule 91 Issuance of the Senate Pin.**

- (1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.
- (2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.
- (3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.
- (4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.
- (5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

JOINT HOUSE-SENATE  
2014 COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2014 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on April 14, 2014 until 12:00 midnight on April 25, 2014.

**1. Definitions**

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

**2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments**

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly:

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

**3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places**

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

**4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice**

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature’s website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

**5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings**

a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before midnight on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

**6. Attendance at Meetings**

a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.

b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:

For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.

For the House, the lead chair must be present.

All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.

c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. “A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.” See Section 9.a of the “Procedures.” The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.

d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee during the decision-making on the measure.

**7. Conference Discussion**

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

**8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers**

a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.



- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. **Decision-making Meeting**

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber.
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. **Conference Committee Reports**

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

11. **Decision-making Deadlines**

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. **Electronic Transfer**

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. **Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures**

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
