During the hearing, both peers and subordinates alike spoke of their respect and admiration and all that they had for him in terms of his ability to inspire his team, think critically, and plan and execute actions that would result in positive outcomes.

"Your committee engaged the nominee in our hopes for where we would like to see the Department of Taxation go, moving forward, and the challenges that have faced both the department, its modernization efforts, and internal staffing issues and collections in the past. It is our sincerest hope that Deputy Director Kim will embark upon this newest mission with open eyes and a commitment to 'do the right thing for the right reason,' quoting our governor, because this is a critically important department that will be served well by his fresh and new perspective.

"It is my hope that all of you will join me in confirming our newest deputy director for the Department of Tax. I could go on and on, talking about this individual: He's quite an engaging guy; don't let all that uniform up there fool you. I hope all of you have had a chance to talk with him one on one prior to today. But again, I ask for your support of this nomination. Thank you."

"I just want to say a few words about this bill because it's so important to my community. There are very few ways that we can legislatively help the lava threat that Puna faces, but this is one. You know, most of the crises that have occurred so far have all been manmade; it includes schools and businesses closing and a lot of relocation. But the first, and perhaps biggest, crisis has been a threat by insurance companies to not renew homeowners policies and to not grant any new homeowners policies, which has resulted in the real estate market coming to a halt; no home sales, which has resulted in property values dropping precipitously. It's resulted in threats of foreclosures and bankruptcies and affected the whole community. And this bill goes a long way toward returning normalcy, or at least as much as the word 'normalcy' can apply to lower Puna, and I want to thank the work of the Consumer Protection chair as well as those parts of the insurance industry that came to the table to be part of the solution. Thank you."
