

THIRTY-NINTH DAY

Wednesday, March 30, 2016

The Senate of the Twenty-Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2016, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Baker introduced the following Boys & Girls Clubs of Maui Youth of the Year nominees: Prism Reinier from the Haiku Clubhouse, Amanda Caires from the Makawao Clubhouse, and Tahiti Ahsam from the Paukukalo Clubhouse. Accompanying the finalists in the gallery were staff members Erica Amico, resource development specialist; Megan Aberley, Lahaina Clubhouse director; Maurice Bajan, director of operations; and Kelly Pearson, chief executive officer.

Senator Gabbard introduced Justice Antonio Herman Benjamin, International Jurist-in-Residence at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa William S. Richardson School of Law from March 28 to April 1, 2016, who was present in the gallery with Denise Antolini, professor of law and associate dean for academic affairs. Senator Gabbard noted that Justice Benjamin was appointed to the National High Court of Brazil in 2006 by President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva, and is recognized worldwide as a leading expert in environmental law and as a pioneer of the green courts and tribunals movement. Justice Benjamin also serves as chair of the World Commission on Environmental Law of the International Union for the Conservation of Nature.

Senator Shimabukuro welcomed supporters of the Boys & Girls Clubs in west O'ahu, who were seated in the gallery: Tatyana Samuels, Youth of the Year nominee from the Nānākuli Clubhouse; Tatyana's mother, Veronica Malabey, and grandmother, Juliet Malabey; Claudia Fernandez and Kekoa Tupua, staff members from the Nānākuli Clubhouse; and Lana Yahiku-Keamo, Wai'anae Clubhouse director.

Senator Thielen recognized visitors from the Boys & Girls Clubs Windward Clubhouse, who were present in the gallery: Maureen Purington, club director; Caitlin Slattery, former club youth and current club staff member; and Jason Goldstein, Youth of the Year nominee.

The Chair acknowledged supporters of the Boys & Girls Clubs on Kaua'i, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Inouye honored and recognized the Hawai'i Boys & Girls Clubs' 2016 Youth of the Year finalists, and presented the following remarks:

"Aloha, colleagues and Mr. President. Today I'm pleased to present and honor the five finalists for the Hawai'i Alliance of Boys & Girls Clubs 2016 Youth of the Year competition. The clubs are located across the state, and a total of 21 participants are here today.

"Since 1947, Youth of the Year has been Boys & Girls Clubs of America's premier recognition program, celebrating the extraordinary achievements of club teens. Club members who earn the Youth of the Year title embody the values of leadership service, academic excellence, and healthy lifestyles. They exemplify the critical impact that Boys & Girls Clubs have on the lives of young people. Each club nominates a member for the statewide competition, and from those, five are selected as finalists. Following this session at a luncheon today, one of the finalists will be selected as the 2016 Youth of the Year. I would

like to yield the floor to the senator from Puna to introduce our first finalist, Senator Ruderman."

Senator Ruderman rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President. It's my honor to introduce Jordyn Alexandra Brooks-Mathew, also known as Alex. Alex is an eighth grader at Hawai'i Academy of Arts and Science, where she has developed an interest in ornithology through her engagement in her school's conservation program. In this program, she has learned about and helped in restoring indigenous habitats that help the native bird populations. She also enjoys math and has participated in extracurricular math courses and helped design her class yearbook.

"Alex has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club of the Big Island, Pahoia Club, for two years. She has a strong attendance at the club and is always one of the top 10 members for attendance at the Pahoia Club, participating in Too Good for Drugs and Violence while developing strong leadership skills. Alex has been named Pahoia Club Youth of the Month, Pahoia Club Youth of the Year, and Boys & Girls Club of the Big Island Youth of the Year.

"She routinely participates in community service activities with her church, her school, and the club. With her church, she helps prepare meals to feed the homeless; with her school, she volunteers for beach cleanups; and with the club, she has started her own program collecting and distributing clothes for needy people in the community. In the gallery, we have Alex's mother, Ms. Dionne Mathew. Please join me in congratulating Alex. Thank you very much. I'd like to yield the floor to my colleague from West Maui."

Senator Baker rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Colleagues, I am delighted to introduce Jamie Fujii, the 2016 Youth of the Year finalist from the island of Maui. Jamie's been a member of the Lāhainā Boys & Girls Club for the past six years. She participates in a wide variety of club activities, including Power Hour, Project Learn, arts and crafts, sports, and character and leadership programs and is a role model for her younger siblings and other youth club members.

"A 16-year-old junior at Lahainaluna High School, Jamie excels in her academic pursuits as well as her extracurricular endeavors. She maintains a 4.0 GPA and is enrolled in honors and advanced placement courses. She's a member of both the Lahainaluna varsity and club tennis teams, a tutor for the Lahaina Complex tutoring program, and a dedicated pianist.

"Jamie intends to pursue a career in medicine and is her class representative for the Health Occupation Students of America, HOSA. She and a partner recently won first place in the Hawai'i statewide HOSA Leadership Conference competition for their presentation on communicable disease prevention. They will be competing again at the National HOSA Leadership Conference in Nashville, Tennessee, this June. So, colleagues, please join me in congratulating Jamie on her many accomplishments and wishing her the best of luck at the national competition in Tennessee. Congratulations; good luck, Jamie. Mr. President, it's my pleasure to yield to the senator from Wai'anae."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you very much. I'm pleased to introduce Jeffrey Jones from the Waianae Clubhouse. Jeffrey is a junior at Wai'anae High School with a GPA of 3.8. He is actively involved in and out of the classroom. Besides participation in

the Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i Leaders in Training program, he's enrolled in Early College High School and Advancement Via Individual Determination – or AVID – coursework.

"Jeffrey has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i Waianae Clubhouse since he was seven years old. He's been actively involved in the Leaders in Training program for the past three years, during which time he has continued to hold positions in increasing responsibility. He has overseen several community service projects and has completed over 400 hours of community service in 2015 alone. Some of the projects Jeffrey helped to coordinate are the Waianae Clubhouse annual canned food drive, the annual toy drive, Shriners Children's Hospital visits, Kapi'olani Children's Hospital visits, the annual Boys & Girls Club Walk in the Country, the annual Youth of the Year luncheon, and program mentoring.

"He'll graduate from Wai'anae High School in 2017 and plans to attend the University of Hawai'i's John A. Burns School of Medicine, where he plans to pursue a doctorate degree. Congratulations, Jeffrey, on being one of the finalists. And I now yield the floor back to Senator Inouye."

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, colleagues. Mr. President and colleagues, the Boys & Girls Clubs of America also has a partnership arrangement with the Department of Defense. They are one of the nation's largest military service providers, with one in four military youth attending a Boys & Girls Clubs of America-affiliated Youth Center. This partnership has grown over the years, and today, 393 military installations serve more than 468,000 military youth throughout the United States and in 15 countries abroad. Boys & Girls Clubs are committed to military members and their families. The children of the military face many unique challenges, but like the children in local clubs, they can exceed the odds to become strong, resilient, and true leaders in their communities. Our next two finalists come from the Boys & Girls Clubs of America-affiliated centers. May I yield the floor to the senator from District 14?"

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President. It's my pleasure to introduce Anessa Ridley. Mr. President, Anessa is the finalist from the Fort Shafter Youth Center. She is an eleventh grader at Moanalua High School, where she has been a member of the girls varsity soccer team for three years and is currently team captain. She's also part of the school's Peer Education Leadership Program and serves as class advisor.

"Anessa has been a member of the USA Gymnastics Hawai'i and Children Youth and School Services, Fort Shafter Youth Center for five years. She has served as Keystone Club president, Pacific Teen Panel representative, and has been a member of the gardening club, art club, and the cooking club – she has it all. She has volunteered as a Red Cross swim buddy, helped feed the homeless, and worked in a peer education program. Through her church, she has been a part of their Pacific Club, helping to plan and facilitate social activities and service projects, and has been part of the church choir and helped fill various roles during mass. Congratulations and good luck, Anessa. Mr. President, I'd like to yield the floor to my colleague from district 15, Senator Wakai."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President; thank you, Senator Kim. Our last finalist hails from the pearly shores of Pearl Harbor. Welcome, Zachary Case. Zachary is an eighth grader at Āliamanu Middle School. He is a member of the Boys & Girls Club Pearl Harbor/Hickam Teen Center, where he has participated in Operation Future, Operation Homefront, Mokulele Elementary

School Clean-Up, Marathon Readiness, and Hickam Beach's Clean Up.

"Zachary has been a member of the Pearl Harbor Boys & Girls Club for two years. In his role as a club member, he has led preteen events at monthly Keystone events; served as vice president of Keystone Club; hosted monthly events for 9- through 12-year-olds at the center; helped set up teen quarterly socials; and participated in teen center clubs, such as the cooking club, the garden club, and the woodwork club. He began taking taekwondo at the beginning of this school year and is now a yellow belt. Congratulations, Zachary, for being one of the finalists today. Mr. President, I would now like to yield the floor over to my next-door neighbor, Senator Inouye."

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Senator Wakai. I'd like to introduce the 16 Youth of the Year nominees who have been selected by their clubs from across the state, and they are seated in the gallery, and some have been recognized by their senators here on the floor. From 'Ewa Beach, Roxanne Marie Agraan; from Līhu'e, Jaelyn Belarde; from Wai'anae, Kirsten Earll; Makiki and McCully, Alexis Freeman; from Windward, Jasmine Gilmete; and also from Windward – we have two more – Jason Goldstein and Caitlin Slattery; from Makiki/McCully area, Skipper Isaac; Līhu'e, Rendle Mones; Nānākuli, Tatyana Samuels; 'Ewa Beach, Ernesto Yoro, Jr.; from Wailuku, Tahiti Ahsam; from Hilo, was not able to be here today, is Nicholas Miguel; from Makawao, Amanda Caires; from Haiku, Prism Reinier; we also have Nigel Mayfield, who's not here today, from the Kahului Club. Mr. President and colleagues, how about a nice round of applause for all of them?"

"Mr. President, by the end of the day, one of these students will be the 2016 Youth of the Year, and I'm glad that I'm not a judge because it'll be a very tough decision. Each of these youth have impressive credentials and community service experience. With the finalists today are some of their parents, who also have been recognized earlier, but may I take a moment to introduce those who are here today: the parents of Jeffrey Jones, Jeff and English Jones; the mother of Jordyn Alexandra Brooks-Mathew, Dionne Mathew; with Jamie Fujii is chaperone Megan Aberley; the father of Zachary Case, Tyler Case; and the mother of Anessa Ridley, Rosemary Citizen. A round of applause for them, and thank you for supporting your children. And good luck to all of you!"

Senator Tokuda congratulated and recognized Dr. Geoffrey Bannister for his outstanding service to Hawai'i Pacific University and the State of Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, colleagues, and guests, it's my honor today to recognize Dr. Geoffrey Bannister, president of Hawai'i Pacific University. For the past 50 years, Hawai'i Pacific University has been an important contributor to Hawai'i's educational landscape and our economy. Beginning with a single classroom in downtown Honolulu, it has grown to encompass three campuses – in Windward O'ahu, at Makapu'u Point, and in the downtown financial district – and now includes the revitalized Aloha Tower Marketplace, adjacent to one of Hawai'i's most iconic landmarks.

"Since July 2011, Dr. Geoffrey Bannister has served as president of Hawai'i Pacific University, joining HPU after serving as president of Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana, and as dean of arts and sciences at Boston University. During his time at the helm of HPU, he has helped guide the university through strategic planning and campus master planning, affirming the vision of the university and laying the foundation for many more years of continued success. Under Dr. Bannister's leadership, HPU invested in the acquisition,

renovation, and revitalization of the oftentimes-troubled Aloha Tower Marketplace, successfully creating a mixed-use space that is now home to nearly 280 students in its waterfront lofts, increasing access to international education as well as contributing to a lively and reinvigorated downtown.

“Dr. Bannister also played a lead role in finalizing the merger of Hawai‘i’s Oceanic Institute with HPU after years of affiliation, illustrating the university’s commitment to sustainability and underscoring its dedication to drawing from the natural advantages of educational programs in the islands that grow and sustain Hawai‘i and its people. With this support, the Oceanic Institute is contributing to the development and maintenance of sustainable practices in aquaculture and agriculture here at home and across the globe.

“Geoffrey Bannister has made important contributions to Hawai‘i’s economic strength as well. For example, as an active member of the Hawaii Business Roundtable, his experience as an economic geographer who has published extensively in the field of urban studies, regional development, and demographic forecasting helped him take a leading role in the Keep Hawaii’s Heroes initiative.

“This July, Dr. Bannister will retire as HPU’s president, and while we wish him well in spending more time with his family and his golf clubs, we do so knowing that his contribution to Hawai‘i Pacific University will have a lasting positive impact on its programs, students, and overall vision as well as the State of Hawai‘i. So, colleagues, please again welcome Dr. Bannister to the Senate floor and congratulate him on his service to HPU and to our state. We also have with him his lovely wife, Jerri Ross. Thank you both for your commitment to our state and education.”
