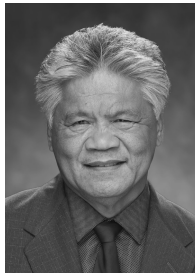

FIRST DAY

**Wednesday, January 18, 2017**

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, was called to order at 10:08 a.m., by the Honorable Kaiali'i Kahele, Temporary Chair of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose for the invocation by Kahu Curt Kekuna of Kawaiaha'o Church, followed by the singing of the National Anthem by Ms. Nalani Brun, and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by Mr. Nick Castillo.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Thielen nominated Carol Taniguchi, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Taniguchi moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kim and carried.

The Chair declared Carol Taniguchi as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Green then moved that a committee of three senators be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator Riviere and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Galuteria, Harimoto, and Tokuda to serve on such committee, and directed the committee and Temporary Clerk to examine the certificates of election.

On motion by Senator Shimabukuro, seconded by Senator Ruderman and carried, Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1 was adopted.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair then called upon Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i, to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

Chief Justice Recktenwald administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate, who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Inouye placed in nomination the name of Senator Ronald D. Kouchi for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Galuteria moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kidani.

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Ronald D. Kouchi as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Ronald D. Kouchi was declared elected President of the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2017.

The Chair then appointed Senators Inouye and Wakai to escort the President to the rostrum, and the President addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

“Aloha. I know that pursuant to Toastmasters’ protocol, I’m supposed to introduce all of the distinguished guests, but I’ve been fighting a cold, so I’d like to have the words of the Chair as he read the names inserted into the Journal as if they were my own, and acknowledge all of the special guests that Senator Kahele recognized.

“There is one exception I’d like to make: If you’re wondering who’s sitting between Dawn and the lieutenant governor, that’s Governor Ige and Dawn’s son, Matt, so how about a hand for Matt?

“As I stand here this morning, the first thank you I’d like to extend is to my wife, Joy; my sons, Dan and Egan; my mom, Carolyn; up in my office, my dad, Mitch; my brother, Scott; and, in Idaho, my sister, Val. Without their love and support, it would not be possible for me to be serving here today, and I love them and I appreciate everything that they have done and the sacrifices they have made on my behalf.

“Unfortunately, all 25 members are not going to be able to speak today, so the second thank you I’d like to offer is on behalf of my 24 colleagues – their love, appreciation, and thanks for their families and all of the supporters who work so hard to help us get into the seats that we now occupy. So, on behalf of my colleagues, thank you very much to all of you for everything you have done for us.

“The last thank you before I begin my speech is inspired by attending the services on December 7th for the 75th commemoration of the attack on Pearl Harbor. I was so moved in listening to Admiral Harris that morning as he quoted from the Gettysburg Address, and he said that on that fateful morning, the brave men and women gave their “last full measure of devotion” to ensure the freedom and the liberty that this nation enjoys. The Gettysburg Address goes on to further say that these men shall not have died in vain, and their names will not be forgotten from the face of the earth. And it reminds me that we need to give great thanks to the men and women in uniform who stand watch every day to ensure the freedoms we enjoy. After standing that watch in their uniform, they turn over the operation and the running of the government to officials elected by the citizens and governed by the citizens and not by the military, and so we cannot tell you thank you enough, so how about a big hand of appreciation?

“I was going to say the Senate Majority – we don’t have the Senate Majority, we only have Democratic senators; there is no Minority, and we’re getting used to dealing with that. The Majority Leader has worked hard with the members in putting together the majority package. We have a handout that articulates in a very concise and wonderfully laid-out way the goals of the Senate, and I’m not going to belabor you this morning by going through all of them. But when you look at the four overarching themes and what we hope to accomplish, clearly, homelessness, which we put \$12 million to address last year, is at the top of our list. Affordable housing, which we put over \$100 million to address last year – and the largest amount appropriated for affordable housing by any legislature – continues to be at the top of our list. Ensuring quality health care for every citizen in Hawai‘i, especially those who live in rural areas, continues to be at the top of our list. Pre-K, K through 12, and our University of Hawai‘i System – the community colleges and the four-year institutions – continue to be at the top of our list. Rail, in one way or another, is going to come to a conclusion in this legislative session, and that will certainly be occupying much of the time during the session. And I personally have supported rail; I hope we find the path, but we are not close to finding that path yet, and we certainly

need a lot more information for us to be able to make our final judgment on the rail issue.

“But what I really wanted to do today is just talk about a couple of things, and I wanted to bring a little human element into the discussion. I have been pleased to have as my guest – and I have been a guest in his city of Sacramento – former mayor Kevin Johnson. Kevin? As a sports fan, I was much more enamored with his accomplishments on the NBA court, especially as a point guard for the Phoenix Suns, but I find that he is a national award-winning mayor because he’s created after-school programs that have established to taking over charter schools in Sacramento, creating reading programs, and homelessness programs. And so our problems are not unique to the rest of the world, and where we have others who have found success, why not find the smart people to help us solve our problems? And so I’ve been excited to hear from Kevin about what he’s been doing and how he’s tackled the problems, and now that his two terms have ended, he has some free time, so we’re hoping that we’ll see more of him here in Hawai‘i.

“When I was thinking about what to say two weeks ago, I was so excited. I thought about all of the aspirational things we’ve been talking about and what we’d like to achieve as a State and as a community. And then the Council on Revenues told me I had less money to talk about in the speech. And then a few days later, the ERS filed their report and told me I had no money to talk about in my speech. And I realized that in the last biennium, Ways and Means Chair Tokuda as well as Finance Chair Luke in the House have crafted fiscally conservative budgets at a time when we had money. They, along with all of your votes, ensured that we had budgets that paid down faster on our unfunded liability, put the money back into the “rainy day” fund, and acted in a fiscally responsible and prudent way and didn’t squander the treasury. And I can only imagine the trouble we’d be in today if we had been more free in our spending over the last two years, and so I’d like to say thank you in our chamber to Chair Tokuda for the leadership that you’ve shown and the vision on the budget. Mahalo.

“And I know we’re not supposed to mention each other by name, so sorry about that, and I won’t mention the senator from Wahiawā who constantly says, “Well, if we want to do education, if we want to take care of the homeless, if we want to help our kūpuna and our keiki, where are we going to generate the money?” We have to find revenue so that we can take care of everyone in our community. A month ago, I read the *Star-Advertiser* and I saw an article on Chenoa Farnsworth of Blue Startups Hawai‘i. And I called and I asked to meet with her, and I finally got a chance to meet her yesterday. Chenoa? Please come to the front. This is Chenoa, and when I told the Clerk that she would be coming, she told me Chenoa was a staffer here in the Senate 20 years ago. So before I talk about her company Blue Startups, to all of our legislative staff: I’d like to thank you because we can’t pay you much. We have incredibly difficult and challenging work, and yet you step up and come here to gain the experience and to make a difference for the people of Hawai‘i. And I guess when we look at Chenoa, now you know where your path may lead you, and so I’m grateful to have such a great role model like you. Now, Chenoa through her company Blue Startups has taken a \$700,000 grant from the HI Growth fund, leveraged that with another \$700,000, and that \$1.4 million has had \$42 million of flow-through capital as of the time they printed their brochure. Tomorrow and Friday, they are hosting a conference at the Hilton Hawaiian Village with people coming from all over the world to talk about entrepreneurship in conjunction with social media and how people get their message out. You know, the impressions that we’re going to make are going to be incredible over the next two days, so it’s incumbent on us to build the climate, to support Chenoa and people like her in their endeavors to create that economy, so we can continue to support those who are so

challenged in our community that we can make sure the safety net remains strong. And I asked Chenoa to be here today because she said she’s had some challenges in having some of the businesses in the community step up to support them. Well, Chenoa, there are a lot of captains of industry in this room this morning, so I hope they know who you are, and I would go grab some business cards if I were you. So thank you very much, Chenoa.

“The third person I wanted to talk about had a personal problem and couldn’t make it here from Kaua‘i. Her name is Mahina Anguay. She is the principal at my alma mater, Waimea High School. She was last year’s Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award winner, and I have been blessed in the six years that I’ve served in the Senate – two Tokioka Award winners have come from the island of Kaua‘i. Mahina attended the University of Hawai‘i on a golf scholarship back in 1978 and vowed never to return to Kaua‘i. She was working here on O‘ahu and she said, “There’d be no way I’m ever getting back to Kaua‘i and definitely not to Waimea High School,” where both her grandmother and her mother were teachers. Well, she came back. The Tokioka Award speaks for itself, but she has – through programs like Running Start and the Early College credit – gotten students who, will be the first in their family to attend college. Mahina has the Westside community believing in themselves, and she is creating that better pathway for her students. This is critical. We hear in the anger of the national politics and the divisiveness that we face in our community that a lot of it is attributed to the widening gulf between the haves and the have-nots. And the only equalization that we can offer our children is a quality education to ensure that they get the tools and the skills to compete in the global market that they are going to enter. And it is through principals like Mahina that we’re going to achieve these goals. And too often, we hear about what isn’t working or what isn’t right, and it’s really heartwarming for me to share a story – especially when that story comes from my alma mater. When we do Education Week here in the Senate, the stories that are told are incredible statewide, and when we meet the young people who are Prudential volunteers or Prudential award winners for doing community service and all the great things that they’re doing we need to celebrate these success stories to foster an atmosphere of achievement.

“And the last person – as we’re coming to the close of my remarks – I’d like to introduce is Sarah Kern. You can stand up, Sarah. Sarah is a valedictorian from Kaiser High School. She went to Tufts University, where she was on the dean’s list all four years. When she came home in the summer, she worked at Summer Fun. Her degree is in chemistry, biology, math, or something where you could make a lot of money. But when I met her, she was teaching at Wai‘anae High School through the Teach for America program. And it was clear when I found out about her working at Summer Fun and some of her other activities – following along with the reverend’s message – it became clear to me that she loves children. And no matter what she could do with the degrees that she has, she wanted to pour that knowledge and love into our students. I’ve heard administrators say why they don’t like the Teach for America teaching candidates, and why they won’t hire them. Some of them come from the mainland, and after they complete their obligation, they leave to go back home, and the administrators say, “I don’t want to pour in the effort and the energy on someone I’m going to lose.” But if we don’t take the risk and pour the energy in, then we stand the risk of losing great teachers like Sarah, and she never gets the chance to make a difference for our most at risk students. Sara has completed her mandatory obligation and she’s still at Wai‘anae High School. Why it isn’t Waimea High School, I don’t know, but it’s still at Wai‘anae High School. And the other part I forgot to say is, she drives from ‘Āina Haina every day to teach at Wai‘anae High



School, because she has a love for the students that she teaches out at Wai'anae, a love for the community, and she is continuing to do that.

“And so, to my colleagues, we need to create sufficient diversified economy to support all of our citizens. We need to support principals like Mahina Anguay and most importantly, we need to support people like Sarah Kern on the front line so that we can create the educational opportunities for our young people. At Waimea High School, there's a teacher, Jerry Nishihira. He and I are the same age but he attended Kaua'i High School. As a teacher at Waimea High School, he has students who are launching rockets out in the fields of Mānā. Jerry told me that his students think they're the first high school students to be able to launch rockets several thousand feet into the air. Jerry's story reminded me about the time I met Ellison Onizuka, and Ellison told me the story about him being barefoot in the coffee fields of Kona, gazing at the stars and dreaming of a better life, and how he was amazed one day that this barefoot boy from Kona would not look at the stars but would touch the stars. And those are the dreams that I see for the students at Waimea High School, for the students here in the State of Hawai'i – if we help them achieve those dreams, then we will have succeeded and we will be able to solve all of our problems.

“I'd like to close with a quote from Jim Rohn, an inspirational speaker and author, and I'm going to paraphrase a little to make it apply to the Hawai'i State Senate: 'Let others lead small lives, but not us. Let others argue over small things, but not us. Let others cry over small hurts, but not us. Let others leave their future in someone else's hands, but not us.' Thank you very much.”

At 10:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the Senate and their guests were entertained by the Kahalu'u 'Ukulele Band, and Shar Carillo, Loke Sasil, and Shay Marcello.

The Senate reconvened at 11:29 a.m.

Senator Dela Cruz placed in nomination the name of Senator Michelle N. Kidani for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Tokuda moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Michelle N. Kidani as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Michelle N. Kidani was declared elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017.

## SECOND DAY

**Thursday, January 19, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Galuteria who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the First Day.

At this time, Senator Kidani commended and congratulated Cherise Imai for outstanding service to the State of Hawai'i and Hawai'i's military families, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President and colleagues, some of us had the opportunity to participate in last week's programs, when the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii laid out issues of concerns regarding our State's military bases and our neighbors and their families who are stationed here. The presentations organized by the Chamber's Military Affairs Council underscored not only the tremendous importance of the military in Hawai'i but also reaffirmed our commitment to fully engage this largely transient population. We learn and benefit from the diversity these men and women and their families bring to our islands. We encourage opportunities to share our island culture, values, and the aloha spirit, and we appreciate their contributions to the economic vitality of our communities.

"One of the most important venues through which military families participate in our neighborhoods is the public school system. Some 14,000 military dependents enrolled in schools on O'ahu, Kaua'i, and Hawai'i Island represent about 8 percent of the 180,000 students in the current school year. The Department of Education has long recognized how important it is to integrate these children and young men and women into our schools. With the help of the late Senator Dan Inouye, the DOE established the Joint Venture Education Forum in 1999 to coordinate policies and practices. Our former colleague in the other chamber, Representative Mark Takai, was instrumental in putting together resources for the Hawai'i DOE team who works with the military on those efforts.

"I offer this background and context so that we can appreciate the outstanding contributions to this important work that our guest this morning was involved in with the DOE for about a decade until late last year. May I please introduce Cherise Imai? During her time at the DOE, Cherise actively engaged in numerous programs and projects that benefited our military students, such as Federal Impact Aid, the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission, National Association of Federally Impacted Schools, Military Impacted Schools Association, Military Youth Advisory Council, and countless state-, district-, and school-level efforts. Her guidance and support of various federally funded grant applications helped the DOE receive more than \$25 million to provide resources at the state, district, and school levels. The beneficiaries of this funding are our students, always a priority for Cherise. Now Cherise, alas, is no longer with the DOE. Late last year, she accepted an opportunity to apply her expertise and talents to a national position as executive director of the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission in Lexington, Kentucky. Our loss is certainly their gain. Because we were not in session at this time when Cherise moved to the mainland, we did not have an opportunity to accord her the recognition for her work in Hawai'i that she so richly deserves. I am pleased to present a certificate of congratulations and gratitude on behalf of the Senate and our colleagues in the

House for outstanding service to our public schools, our friends and families in the military, and the State of Hawai'i. Mahalo, Cherise.

"Mr. President, with Cherise on the floor this morning are Brigadier General (retired) Kathleen Berg, who is a state Hawai'i commissioner to the Interstate Children's Commission and Senior Assistant Superintendent and Chief Financial Officer of the Hawai'i DOE Amy Kunz. Thank you for being here.

"Mr. President, Cherise has family members and others in the gallery this morning we would like to recognize: her sisters Chris Agena and Kammie Aguada and two-month-old niece J.C. Also, Rick Masters, legal counsel for the Council of State Governments, who flew to Hawai'i to be here with Cherise for tomorrow's meetings of the Hawai'i Interstate Compact Council. They will be meeting here in the Capitol at 10 a.m. tomorrow. And we should also acknowledge Cherry Okahara, who succeeded Cherise as a Hawai'i DOE military liaison. Thank you and mahalo to all school liaisons and military and community stakeholders who do such good work on behalf of our schools and communities. I would also like to acknowledge Sami Takai, who's present today, and all of you know – as we talked about her late husband, Mark, who was so special for us in this endeavor – so thank you for being here with us today. Thank you, Mr. President."

At this time, Senator Inouye rose to inform the members that she would be attending the Women's March at the State Capitol the following day at 10:00 a.m.

Senator Espero rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Today marked the final day of a fruitful eight years of leadership from one of Hawai'i's native sons, President Barack Obama. His mark on America and the world will undoubtedly go down in history as one of the most successful and most significant Presidents to have ever been elected to office. I, for one – and I think I can speak on behalf of our entire state – will miss him dearly. To our new President, good luck.

"Over his two terms, the President has accomplished more things than I could have hoped for. I want to highlight just a few of his major accomplishments under his tenure.

"Under President Obama's leadership, we went from a horrible recession in 2008 to a stock market at record highs, unemployment at record lows, and job creation in the millions. President Obama's bailout of the U.S. auto industry in 2009 saved three million jobs.

"In 2010, the President passed a landmark healthcare bill known as the Affordable Care Act, ensuring that millions upon millions of Americans can get the health care they need, effectively sending a clear message that whether you are poor or wealthy, you are equally deserving of quality health care in America.

"As the mortgage and banking crisis took hold, President Obama, working with Congress, passed critical oversight laws like the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform Act that improved regulations of eight key areas of the financial sector that went unchecked for too long and led to the financial crisis we all knew too well.

"In 2010, President Obama and Congress agreed on \$858 billion in tax cuts. These tax cuts included a \$56 billion

extension of unemployment benefits for those who were still suffering from the effects of the Great Recession. Businesses received \$140 billion in tax cuts for capital improvements. The estate tax, commonly utilized by some of the wealthiest in our society, was exempted up to \$5 million.

"President Obama promised to fight terrorism, and under his command, Osama bin Laden, America's Public Enemy No. 1, was eliminated.

"As a staunch defender of the environment, President Obama finalized the International Climate Agreement in Paris, where countries agreed to reduce carbon emissions and increase carbon trading. In 2015, he also enacted the Clean Power Plan, which would reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions by 32 percent from 2005 levels by 2032.

"For our brothers and sisters in the LGBT community, President Obama repealed the military's 'Don't ask, don't tell' policy that for so long had cast a cloud on the exemplary service of those military men and women who defend our country and our rights yet had to live their lives in secret, as second-class citizens. President Obama also directed that the federal government would no longer provide a legal defense for the Defense of Marriage Act, which effectively led to the U.S. Supreme Court decision legalizing same-sex marriage across the country.

"Colleagues, I could go on and on about the wonderful accomplishments our native son and his team have done for our nation. It is my firm belief that the history books will soon write Obama's name alongside the likes of Lincoln, Roosevelt, and Kennedy.

"With the peaceful transition of power from his administration to the next, I am energized and committed to doing my part in defending the progress President Barack Obama has made and to fight even harder where we need to.

"He said, 'Yes, we can,' and I know, yes, we will.

"I have no better, more poignant way to end this but by saying, 'Thank you, Mr. President.' Thank you, Mr. President."

At this time, Senator Kahele rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Colleagues, over the weekend, Hawai‘i Island lost one of its most passionate and revered leaders: George Yokoyama. An icon of legendary influence, he was, in the truest sense, a son of Hilo. Born and raised and educated on Hawai‘i Island, George returned home after his time in the armed services and dedicated his life to serving our community. Through his work with the Hawai‘i County Economic Opportunity Council, a nonprofit committed to fighting poverty, George brought in nearly \$100 million in state and federal grants over a 45-year career. Not only was George able to bring in much-needed funding for HCEOC programs, he was also able to rally the people behind grassroots groups and causes. To quote former Hawai‘i Island Mayor Billy Kenoi, ‘You can’t be a successful politician unless George is your friend.’ He is the archetype of the community organizer. And so, Mr. President, I would like to request that the Senate observe a moment of silence to honor the life and memory of Mr. George Yokoyama. Thank you, Mr. President.”

At 9:39 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator English and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair, on a rising vote to observe a moment of silence for George Yokoyama, to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor’s State of the State Address.

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2017, was called to order at 10:10 a.m. by the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Scott K. Saiki and Beth Fukumoto, on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators J. Kalani English and Brickwood Galuteria, on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i, to the rostrum.

Representative Cindy Evans and Senator Lorraine R. Inouye presented Governor Ige with maile and ‘ilima lei.

At this time, the Speaker also introduced the Honorable Michael D. Wilson, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature and guests the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i.

Governor Ige presented the State of the State Address as follows:

“Mr. Speaker, President Kouchi, former governors, distinguished justices of the courts, representatives of our

congressional delegation, members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, elected officials, military leaders, honored guests, family, and friends: Aloha.

"Last December, I had the privilege of participating in ceremonies marking the 75th anniversary of Pearl Harbor – the day when all that was personal and intimate here in the islands collided head-on with history.

"In 1941, my late father was about the same age as my children are today. He was young and just starting to plan out his life. We know how those events dramatically changed those plans for him and his entire generation.

"Life has a way of doing that, no matter how well our plans are laid out. It made me think deeply about both where we've been and where we're headed as a state. While we cannot predict the future, it's clear to me that we are living in very challenging and exciting times.

"And we face these times standing on solid ground. This year, as in previous years, our people are among the healthiest in the nation. Our unemployment rate is the third lowest in the country. Our personal income growth is ranked 17th, and in 2016, we added 14,000 new jobs. Our biggest industry, tourism, has had five successive record-setting years and is moving toward yet another. In many ways, the state of the State of Hawai'i is sound and full of possibilities.

"Having said that, we all know there is still much work to be done. There are families out there who continue to struggle despite the overall state of our economy. I know there are those who are concerned about health care, child care, and rent payments. That's why we need to press on with the progress we've made over the last two years:

- Transforming our schools;
- Reshaping our economy;
- Addressing homelessness and building more affordable homes; and
- Making government more efficient so that it can continue to work for the people.

"All of these goals are inextricably linked to each other. To transform our economy, we need to transform our schools, so our children can provide the brain power and fill the jobs required in a knowledge-based industry. To keep them here, we need to ensure that our economy provides challenging and satisfying careers and homes they can afford. And we need to protect our lands and natural resources, which underpin everything. These are tough challenges.

"What sets Hawai'i apart from the rest of the world is that we have the ingenuity, the determination, and the heart – values from our island culture – that built this great state. I truly believe our people can overcome any roadblock, and not just succeed, but do so in outstanding fashion.

"And for those who feel that I might have my head in the clouds, let me remind you about where we all came from: about how our great-grandparents took a far-flung Pacific outpost and transformed it into the leading provider of sugar in the world through innovation, new technology, and hard work – and how they did the same with pine.

"For those old enough to have worked summers in the canneries as teens, you may remember, like I do, the Ginaca machines that could peel and core a pineapple in seconds. That technology allowed Hawai'i to completely dominate global markets and transformed the industry. We did not wait for someone to show us how to grow and harvest sugar and pineapple better. We did it ourselves by being innovative and entrepreneurial.

"As we know, global competition, fueled by our own innovations, eventually contributed to both of their demise. So we set out to create a new industry and to take advantage of new technologies in air travel – the jet engine. We invested and attracted investment capital. And guess what? We proceeded to create the most desired and successful travel destination in the world and hundreds of thousands of jobs.

"So where do we go from here? How do we once again respond to a changing world? For me, the answer is very clear.

"We shape our own destiny. I'm a problem solver and I'm excited about what we've accomplished and what we can continue to achieve. Together, we must pursue our own self-made opportunities through education, innovation, and entrepreneurship. We must tap our greatest resource, our people, to find our way to the next great economic transformation: the development of an innovation sector.

"We have done much in the last two years to move us down that path. We have a blueprint for schools that will prepare our children to fill the jobs that the new economic sector will require. A strong university plays a key role in creating a new economy. The University of Hawai'i has embraced innovation and has successfully launched a number of creative initiatives. We are already expanding the economy, focusing on areas such as energy, ocean and earth science, and astronomy, where we have expertise. And we are transforming the culture within state government to embrace change and drive innovation in every part of our economy.

"We have adapted to meet a changing world many times before and we can do it again – beginning with the most important part of this transformation: our public schools. I believe that education reform in Hawai'i starts with changing the current top-down bureaucracy in the DOE to a school-centered one.

"Our blueprint for Hawai'i's schools is based on input from over 3,000 parents, teachers, and community members from a statewide summit to dozens of meetings across the state, including on Moloka'i and Lāna'i. Some of the volunteers who worked so hard on that blueprint are here with us today; I'd like them to stand and be recognized. They've told us that we need to go beyond test scores and a one-size-fits-all approach. We need a school system that truly prepares students to think creatively and be problem solvers and innovators. Most importantly, I believe that those closest to the students best understand how they learn and what motivates them.

"I want a system that empowers schools and trusts teachers and principals to make meaningful decisions on curriculum and instruction and the expenditure of school funds. Schools need to be able to design their own programs, implement their plans, and be accountable for their results. And they need to be encouraged to take risks and be creative. That's why in the executive budget before you, we've increased funds that go directly to schools.

"To further drive school-based changes, we will be proposing a new Innovation Grant Program to support school-level innovations that help us meet priorities of the Board of Education, such as closing the achievement gap for special-needs, immigrant, and low-income students.

"We know that programs focused on classrooms and schools pave the way to desired student outcomes. And we also know that the physical environment in which our students learn plays a role in their success. Last year I pledged to cool our schools. No one is more disappointed than I that implementation has lagged. But we haven't lowered our sights; we continue to press on. The capital budget before you includes \$61.7 million to continue this effort.

“My budget also includes more than \$700 million in new schools, classrooms, science facilities, and repair and maintenance. I am also asking for \$150 million for university facilities statewide. These are big numbers, but we must not let them obscure the real objective: to improve the learning environment to support students as they work toward their dreams of success.

“One national study predicts that 70 percent of Hawai‘i’s jobs will require some postsecondary education by 2020. That’s why I’m proposing to expand the Early College Program. The University of Hawai‘i and the DOE are working together to dramatically increase the Early College Program that allows high school students to earn college credits. Imagine having a semester or more of credits under your belt when you start college, at no cost to you? I can see parents already calculating the savings in time and money. Studies show that this may be one of the most powerful tools to advance college enrollment and success among our public high school graduates – especially for low-income and first-generation college students. I believe it is a great strategic advantage to keep the best students in our public schools.

“When Rovy Dipaysa immigrated to Hawai‘i in 2012, she barely spoke English. She threw herself into her studies with a passion, learning English in a class at Waipahu Intermediate. Rovy began her college career with a group of other rising freshmen in the summer of 2014 – before she and her classmates took a single class at Waipahu High School. This group of students became known as the first Early College high school ‘Olympians’ in the state. Today, Rovy and 13 of her Olympian classmates anticipate being the first to complete all requirements for the associate of arts degree from Leeward Community College by May of 2018. If all goes according to plan, they will receive their AA degree before they graduate from Waipahu High School. Rovy and her mom, Victoria, are here with us today. Please help me recognize them for their hard work and determination. That kind of success is the reason why I want to expand the Early College Program to eventually include every public high school in the state.

“I am also proposing to establish the Hawaii Promise Program at the University of Hawai‘i that will fill the gap between what a qualifying family can afford and the cost of community college, without taking out a loan to cover tuition, fees, and books.

“With students like Rovy and her cohorts, how can we not succeed in building a workforce more than equal to the challenges of the 21st century? And so we arm them with math and science, teach them to think critically and creatively, and anchor them with the social sciences and art, so they will know who they are, where they came from, and the beauty of it all.

“I’ve said it before: I strongly believe that the long-term sustainability of our economy must center on innovation. Innovation means developing new clean energy technologies that will create engineering and other high-paying jobs while reducing our dependence on fossil fuels and protecting the ‘āina.

“Innovation means remaining on the cutting edge of health care. That’s why I’m proposing \$5 million in each of the next two years to support the Cancer Center of Hawaii. Our families deserve access to the latest research and treatment for cancer.

“Innovation means new agricultural technologies, new local fashions, new apps for your computers and phones, and locally created digital media for multiple platforms. More importantly, the innovation sector offers the best promise of high-quality, high-wage jobs for our children.

“And it’s not just the stuff of dreams. A recent report sponsored by the Hawaii Business Roundtable found that

innovation jobs already make up 7 percent of Hawai‘i’s economy. A Kauffmann Foundation report ranked Hawai‘i 13th in the nation for startup growth.

“Among those many success stories is the startup of Shaka Tea, owned by Bella Hughes and her husband, Harrison Rice. Bella and Harrison have taken māmakī leaves, grown in Pāhala on Hawai‘i Island, and used them to grow an exciting new local company. The benefits of the māmakī plant, native and found only in Hawai‘i, are well known among Native Hawaiians. Recent studies by the University of Hawai‘i have confirmed its health properties. But to make māmakī commercially viable as a ready-to-drink beverage, Bella and Harrison had to find a way to extend its shelf life so that it could be marketed beyond the islands.

“It took them over a year. But, working with R&D partners in Hawai‘i and on the mainland, they overcame that obstacle. Today, they are not only well established in local markets, but are looking to expand to the West and East Coasts, Japan, and, of course, on the Internet. Bella and Harrison are with us today, and I’d like to ask them to stand and be recognized for their innovation and hard work.

“That kind of local success is the reason why I’m so excited about HI Growth, the state program to foster entrepreneurship in Hawai‘i, and I know the Senate President also recognizes the value of this program. From virtually nothing four years ago, local entrepreneurs today are supported by six startup accelerator programs, with three of them nationally recognized. In fact, about 145 startups have gone through the accelerator programs. With a \$10 million investment, the startups have generated over \$250 million in total capital. That’s why the budget includes additional funds for the HI Growth program. It is a good investment in Hawai‘i’s economy, and I hope you will support us in this endeavor.

“Innovation also creates a bigger tax base. That means resources to pay for government programs that address issues like homelessness and affordable housing.

“In addition to HI Growth, the state has undertaken other initiatives to utilize innovation to grow the bottom line; a good example is Hawai‘i’s clean energy mandate. Our goal of generating 100 percent of our electricity from renewable sources by 2045 is good both for our economy and the environment. The mandate has stimulated demand for clean tech innovations, many of them running through our Hawai‘i Energy Excelsator.

“Because of the Legislature’s actions, we lead the nation in moving toward clean energy in many areas. Together, O‘ahu, Maui, and Hawai‘i Island currently obtain 25 percent of our electricity from renewable sources, clearly the highest in the country. On Kaua‘i, the figure is 40 percent. With 65 renewable energy projects across the state, we are on schedule to meet the 2020 target for increasing renewable energy use.

“Earlier this month, the state’s largest operating solar facility in Wai‘anae successfully placed 28 megawatts into commercial operation.

“On Kaua‘i, the nation’s first closed-loop, biomass-to-electricity plant began operations near Kōloa, fueled by albizia and eucalyptus trees. The plant is putting out enough electricity to power 8,500 homes on Kaua‘i and replace 3.7 million gallons of oil annually. I’m sure Mayor Carvalho appreciates this and the millions of dollars that stay in the local economy rather than going to purchase offshore fuel.

“On O‘ahu, new agreements promise an additional 61 megawatts from two solar facilities, enough electricity to power more than 22,000 homes for a year.

“Reducing our reliance on fossil fuels in transportation is also a key component of our renewable energy goals. The fuel cost for an electric vehicle is 30 percent cheaper than that of a gas-powered car. That can mean as much as \$500 in annual fuel savings per household for each electric vehicle. That’s why my administration is participating in the Drive Electric Hawaii Initiative. We will be using funds from the state’s portion of the Volkswagen settlement to support the changeover to state-owned electric vehicles.

“Agriculture and our visitor industry are also experiencing significant transformations, aided by the same kind of technology and innovations utilized by the knowledge-based sector. In fact, agriculture has expanded statewide. Nowhere has our partnership with the Legislature been more productive than in making the state more self-sufficient and food-secure.

“We have a goal to double local food production by 2020, with the purchase of farm lands, programs that support and encourage local farmers, incentives to grow organic, and incubators to help entrepreneurs create new food products and businesses.

“With your help, we purchased the Galbraith lands on O’ahu, adding more acreage and employing 50 new farmers. We completed the purchase of the Turtle Bay mauka agricultural lands to preserve it for future ag use. We also worked with you to secure \$1 million each for the livestock revitalization and feed development programs and for feed subsidies for qualified ranchers. All of these efforts move us closer to self-sufficiency and a more sustainable economy.

“Combating invasive species is a big part of protecting and expanding agriculture. That’s why we developed the state’s first interagency biosecurity plan, a 10-year blueprint to protect the state from invasive plants and animals. That’s also why we are proposing the creation of an invasive species authority to direct these and future efforts.

“And the state and our community partners will continue to work together to coordinate our efforts, which include new challenges due to climate change.

“Building on record visitor arrivals, we worked with our congressional delegation and the U.S. Customs and Border Protection to reestablish international flights at Kona International Airport. There are some who doubted that we could meet this aggressive deadline before the first scheduled flight last December. But we did. It is estimated that one daily international flight to Kona will result in more than \$160 million in annual visitor spending, and we are in discussions with other airlines who are looking at Kona as a potential travel destination.

“International visitors will also spend tens of millions of dollars at local businesses and attractions, further boosting the economy and generating jobs. That’s why I’m requesting \$50 million in CIP funding to build a permanent international facility at Kona.

“Tourism, like all of our industries, depends directly or indirectly on the good stewardship of our lands and natural resources. Certainly, both the House and the Senate have been consistent stewards of our environment, and our collaboration over the last two years has been very fruitful.

“We have set ambitious goals for the state. Last September at the World Conservation Congress, we unveiled our Sustainable Hawaii Initiative to:

- Protect our watershed forests,
- Better manage our oceans,
- Create a biosecurity plan,
- Double our food production, and

- Achieve 100 percent renewable energy by 2045.

“My budget includes \$31 million in CIP funds for these sustainability initiatives.

“I am also proposing that we invest \$18.4 million in general funds to protect natural resources, watersheds, forests, and oceans in our fight against harmful invasive species.

“I am proud that we’ve been able to protect tens of thousands of acres of watershed forests on Kaua’i, O’ahu, Maui, Moloka’i, and Hawai’i Island, and help preserve precious shoreline along Turtle Bay and other iconic Hawai’i lands. I’m proud of the work of the Departments of Agriculture and Land and Natural Resources, who are working closely with private and public partners to combat the spread of rapid ‘ohi’a death.

“Last fall, when President Obama created the world’s largest marine sanctuary in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands, we asked him to make the Office of Hawaiian Affairs a co-trustee of the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument. The monument is world-renowned for both its natural and cultural attributes. OHA’s trustee role will ensure the protection of Native Hawaiian cultural features and provide critical cultural sensitivity to decisions made to protect this unique natural treasure. I am so pleased to announce that, a few weeks ago, our request was granted, and OHA is now a co-trustee of this national marine monument. An old Hawaiian proverb goes, ‘As the ocean goes, so do we.’

“Providing enough affordable homes has been a longstanding problem. Given our cost of living and limited land availability, some say it can’t be done. As governor, I just don’t buy that, and I don’t believe that the housing chairs of both chambers do, either. That’s why I’ve asked the state housing agencies to focus on producing more rental units, because that’s where we have an enormous need. As a result, we’ve produced a total of 1,050 units in the past two years with over 4,000 more in the pipeline, 80 percent of which will be rentals.

“To build on that momentum, I convened a group of affordable home developers and advocates to listen to their suggestions to maximize state financing tools and provide the infrastructure needed. Last year, we worked together to expand the application of state funding for roadways and other infrastructure – a prerequisite for the development of new communities.

“The Legislature infused the state’s Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund with \$25 million to finance regional infrastructure in conjunction with the counties and private home builders. And as Mayor Kim knows, we put that money to work on Hawai’i Island for the construction of the Manawalea Street extension to help ease traffic congestion in Kona. The construction of this connector road was required before any new homes could be built. As a result, last October, ground was broken for Kamakana Villages, which includes 170 units for seniors and low-income families.

“Our thanks to all of you in the Legislature for your support. We’ve also added \$75 million in gap financing for more affordable rentals throughout the state. My budget for the next two years proposes to invest \$123.4 million to promote new housing statewide.

“The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands also plays an important part in our affordable housing solution. Recently, DHHL conducted lot selection for Kaka’ina Hawaiian homestead in Waimānalo for qualified Native Hawaiian beneficiaries. Kaka’ina is one of two parcels being developed by DHHL to build homes for Native Hawaiians. The first 70 families in the homestead community of Malu’ohai in Kapolei signed their leases recently and fulfilled their dreams of becoming homeowners. In addition, Ka Makana Ali’i in

Kapolei, which will be O'ahu's second largest shopping center, will generate substantial revenues for DHHL's homestead development and sustain its home-building programs far into the future. Congratulations to Hawaiian Home Lands.

"Transit-oriented development remains one of the biggest game changers and will allow us to build affordable homes, direct growth, protect open space and agriculture, and reinvigorate older neighborhoods such as Kaka'ako and Kalihi. In fact, the transformation of Kaka'ako can already be seen, with new affordable units for seniors and for middle- and low-income families.

"At the same time, perhaps no district is more representative of the plight of those who are homeless than Kaka'ako. The individual stories and the efforts on their behalf have been well-documented.

"Let me be clear about this: We have a crisis and we are working urgently to fix it in a humane and compassionate manner. That is why my budget proposes \$20.9 million each year for rent subsidies, supportive services, outreach services, and enforcement.

"And we are making inroads. With the help of all of you, our congressional delegation, the counties, federal agencies, business and community service organizations, we have made significant strides in addressing homelessness in Hawai'i. On Maui, Mayor Arakawa supported our statewide efforts to address homelessness and maximize existing housing inventory. When we put out a call to action, he stepped forward and convened a landlord summit that generated much-needed housing units while forging new relationships with realtors, homeless service providers, and the business community. Thank you, Mayor.

"On O'ahu, we've worked closely with Mayor Caldwell and his team to use state land, city funding for infrastructure, and private-sector participation to convert a 13-acre paintball facility off Nimitz Highway into affordable rentals for homeless families.

"And I would be remiss if I didn't thank Duane Kurisu, whose AIO Foundation is building the plantation-style island neighborhood. Duane, could you stand to be recognized for your part in our homeless efforts?

"In Kaka'ako, we have reduced homelessness by two-thirds. Over a year ago, there were 300 individuals camped near the waterfront park. Since then, over 290 homeless individuals from this area have transitioned into shelters or permanent housing. Statewide, we increased funding for homelessness prevention; this has contributed to a 25 percent reduction in the eviction rate. It's kept nearly 4,200 people from joining the ranks of the homeless. Working together, the state and our partners have assisted over 5,000 people in the past year, and more need our help.

"The Department of Human Services also recently announced the awarding of contracts to 33 homeless shelters, totaling \$13 million over the next 12 months to serve the state's homeless population. Together, those awardees have pledged to add nearly 200 beds – increasing the total to 3,761 – and to double the number of individuals they place in permanent housing from about 3,000 to over 6,200. For the same taxpayer investment as last year, we are doubling the number of people getting housed. We are finding better solutions, becoming more efficient, and creating better cooperation.

"A new family assessment center was opened last September to connect homeless individuals and families to services and help them transition into permanent housing. I would note that this site was one of the first identified by Chairs Luke and Tokuda as we embarked on our efforts for homelessness. And

that's always been our ultimate goal. This is about more than increasing shelter beds, but finding people permanent supportive housing. That's why the budget before you includes \$59 million for public housing improvements.

"And that's why public housing repairs and renovations have been expedited. Our public servants were enthusiastic about aiding people who need homes. These civil service employees helped develop a team approach that uses the broad talents of those in the Hawaii Public Housing Authority. I'm proud to report that the team members of the Multi-Skilled Worker Pilot Program have reduced the turnaround time for an empty unit from over seven months to just a week. As a result, over 400 units have been made available to families in record time.

"Two representatives from the team are here today. Let's thank Gregory Cuadra, who leads the DHS Team of the Year, and Andrew Medeiros, DHS Employee of the Year, for their remarkable service to the people of Hawai'i. Please stand to be recognized. (I have to say, that's the first time I've seen them wearing suits, so they look terrific.)

"In fact, the Multi-Skilled Worker Pilot Program is just one example of how we are finding ways to tap into the talents of our public employees across departments to leverage their many skills.

"Three years ago, we set out to make government more efficient, effective, and accountable to the people. One of the more exciting ways we're doing this is through a program with the Office of Enterprise Technology Services. To engage the local tech community in the modernization of state government, we began a code challenge. We brought local talent together to develop modern tools and applications to provide enhanced government services to the public. The challenge is based on a hackathon, a problem-solving event that brings together creative individuals to explore new technologies or programming language.

"One winning team converted visitor scheduling at OCCC, which was being done manually, to a web-based, self-service process. In the past, visitor scheduling was done by phone and Post-It notes, resulting in visits not being scheduled and families not being able to see their loved ones. The new concept created by a group of Honolulu Community College students is far more efficient and is being developed into an application that works better for the staff, inmates, and their visitors. Two of the 19 members of the Hawaii Advanced Technology Society team are with us today; I would like to ask Gerome Catbagan and Jayson Hayworth to stand and be recognized.

"One of my duties as governor is to be a responsible fiscal manager, and I am proud of our combined efforts to put the state back on sound fiscal footing. We have done this by:

- Building financial reserves – as the Speaker noted in his opening day remarks – for a rainy day that helps to reduce future financial strain on taxpayers; and
- Making lump sum contributions at the beginning of the year to our pension and health benefit systems to grow investment funds by millions of dollars and save future taxpayer contributions.

"And while I'm on the subject of finances, let me add this: In recent weeks there has been much discussion about this year's budget. Building a budget is a long and complex process, which started last May. A month ago, the revenue forecast for the current fiscal year was a robust 5.5 percent increase. Two weeks ago it was reduced to 3 percent, resulting in an anticipated loss of more than \$330 million over the biennium. Actual revenues collected for the first half of this year grew by less than 1 percent, signaling that growth in our economy has slowed. The economic assumptions upon which the budget was based have changed, and we will have to make adjustments. The

finance chairs of both houses understand this very well, and I appreciate Senator Tokuda and Representative Luke's hard work and diligence. Believe me, I've been there; I understand how tough their jobs really are.

"So I will be submitting adjustments to our budget that reflect the changing economic forecast and ensure that we live within our means. I will be submitting a proposal to phase in increased payments to the retirement system to ensure that we can keep our promises to our retirees in a responsible way. And I will be planning for fair wage increases for all of our public employees. We cannot presuppose what agreement will be reached; that would be neither fair nor appropriate.

"I know that we can work together to craft a responsible budget that, at the end of the day, is not my budget, not the Legislature's budget, but really reflects the people's budget and addresses their priorities.

"As Speaker Souki noted last week, traffic congestion affects the quality of all of our lives. The fact is, we have not had sufficient funding for at least a decade now to keep our roads well-maintained and to increase capacity to meet our community plans.

"We have an aging transportation system on all islands that is in need of significant upgrades to increase durability, capacity, and dependability. I want to work with you to find the funding to make significant upgrades to increase safety, reliability, and capacity. For the same reasons, I want to work with the City and County of Honolulu and the Legislature to generate the funds needed to complete a rail system. This will give us a more comprehensive approach to traffic congestion on O'ahu for the long term.

"I mentioned at the start of this address about my summers working in the pineapple cannery. Let me share a story about a friend of mine. Like me, she trimmed pineapples as they came out of the Ginaca machines. When she first started, the pineapples on her line would pile up. The experienced workers would laugh at her clumsiness in trying to keep up with the 'technology.' She would go home at the end of her shift, tired, her hands and forearms red and blistering from the acid in the pine juices. Her mom would lather on cream and wrap her arms in wet cloth and Saran wrap to replenish the oils from her skin. She said she cried herself to sleep at night because they hurt so much. But it was her first real job, and she was determined to see it through. By the end of the summer, she was trimming pineapple with the expertise and speed of the best of them.

"We here in Hawai'i have a proud history of perseverance, hard work, and overcoming great odds. Our parents and grandparents have been outstanding role models, showing us that we can be and do anything we set our minds to. It's something to remember as we work our way through this important and often difficult transition to the 21st century.

"And that work doesn't begin in Washington, D.C. It begins right here in our own backyards, where the foundations of nation-building have always been based. It begins in our places of worship, on our playgrounds, in our classrooms, at PTA meetings, and at work. It begins here in Hawai'i, the place that I choose to call home.

"It is here where we celebrate our rich diversity and immigrant roots, the source of our strength; where we respect working men and women and the unions that represent them, upon whose shoulders Hawai'i was built; where we honor our seniors and retirees and keep the promises we made to them; where we understand the need for self-determination and to make right the wrongs of the past regarding Native Hawaiians; where we value the importance of public education; where we have long provided our citizens with access to health care; where we take care of the 'āina because it is the life that

sustains us; and where we march, not out of fear and anger, but out of confidence in the direction that we must take. We do this, not because of new leadership or direction from Washington, but because this is what we've always done right here in Hawai'i – because we have always been better together than alone, identifying ourselves as part of a greater 'ohana, bound by the spirit of aloha.

"Even as the world around us changes, I do not see that aspect of who we truly are changing. If our past is proof that we can do anything we set out to do, then let it also be our inspiration as we shape our future.

"Thank you, mahalo, and aloha."

Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Ige, for sharing your vision for Hawai'i with everyone here this morning. How about another big hand for the governor?"

"As the person with the last word this morning, I'm going to take the liberty of summarizing what I just heard. As I look to the governor, lieutenant governor, the 76 members of the Legislature, the cabinet members, and our collective community gathered here – without question, we have the collective knowledge to succeed and accomplish all of the goals laid out by the governor. But I believe in what I heard today; it is only if we choose to make the final decision with our hearts will we have the compassion and the capacity to meet the goal of having a budget for all of our people, and not a budget for the governor and not a budget for the Legislature.

"As I listen to you, Governor, I thought, with the recent Martin Luther King holiday, of one of my favorite quotes from Dr. King: 'Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that.' So it is my sincere wish to work together with you and your administration, Speaker Souki, and my colleagues in the Senate to provide the light of leadership to take us out of the darkness, and to do it in a way with love, so that we will deliver the greatest State of Hawai'i in the history of this great state."

At 11:15 a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At 9:35 a.m., on motion by Senator Espero, seconded by Senator English and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Chief Justice’s State of the Judiciary Address.

### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2017, was called to order at 10:02 a.m. by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

The President then appointed Senators Gilbert S.C. Keith-Agaran and J. Kalani English, on behalf of the Senate, and Representatives Scott Y. Nishimoto, Scott K. Saiki, and Beth Fukumoto, on behalf of the House of Representatives, to escort the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i, to the rostrum.

Senator Maile S.L. Shimabukuro and Representative Cindy Evans presented Chief Justice Recktenwald with maile and ‘ilima lei.

The President then presented to the members of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature and guests the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i.

The Chief Justice addressed the Joint Session as follows:

“Thank you so much for that warm welcome. President Kouchi; Speaker Souki; Governor and Mrs. Ige; members of the Senate and House; Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi; Governor Waihe‘e; Governor and Mrs. Cayetano; Chief Justice Moon; my fellow justices, judges, and judiciary staff; members of the Consular Corps; members of the Royal Order of Kamehameha; distinguished guests and friends: Good morning and aloha!

“I note with sadness the recent passing of Representative Clift Tsuji, who always made time to honor those attorneys who provide volunteer legal assistance to the community, and we will forever miss his warm presence here in the House.

“I thank the Legislature for its strong support of the judiciary. We’re grateful to all of you for funding construction of a new courthouse in Kona. More than 200 people came to the groundbreaking in October; the pride in the community was overwhelming. And when that courthouse opens in 2019, it will provide the people of West Hawai‘i with a modern, efficient, and secure place for obtaining justice. Thank you. I also thank Governor Ige for his strong support of the Kona courthouse as well as for the judiciary’s efforts to increase access to our civil justice system.

“I deeply appreciate this opportunity to report to the Legislature and the public. We live in times of uncertainty, when people are rightfully asking tough questions. How are we ensuring that their voices will be heard? What are we doing to address the profound problems – such as public safety, homelessness, and drug abuse – that face us as a community? No one knows exactly what the future holds. What we do know is there will be tough questions along the way. There will be different visions of what Hawai‘i is and can be, and there will be divergent interests that will come into conflict. And that’s

where the judiciary comes in: We provide the forum where people can obtain a just and fair resolution of their disputes. In performing our mission of deciding cases, we affect and touch the lives of virtually everyone in our community. The broad range of matters that come to our courts for resolution include criminal prosecutions and disputes involving family relationships and children, the environment, land use, civil rights, employment, personal injury, collective bargaining, and business relations, among others. Our ability to perform that role comes from one thing and only one thing: the public's trust in our integrity and impartiality. People must know that they'll get a fair shake in our courts, whatever their background or economic status, and even if their views are not popular or shared by the majority. Essential to our ability to decide cases fairly and impartially is the principle of judicial independence. This is a critical part of the separation of powers that is fundamental to our democracy. Judicial independence **does not** mean the judges are free to decide cases however they may want. To the contrary, they must follow the rule of law and faithfully apply the constitutions and laws of the United States and Hawai'i to the facts of each case. Judicial independence **does** mean that judges are able to decide cases impartially, free from passion, pressure, or outside influence. Only then can we expect the public to have confidence and trust in our decisions. We must earn that trust every day, and I'm honored to be here this morning to share with you how we are doing so.

"One of the most fundamental roles of the courts is to ensure the safety and well-being of our community, and we do that in many different ways. First and foremost, we provide a fair and transparent forum for the peaceful resolution of our disputes. We do a lot of that; this past fiscal year alone, more than 100,000 cases were filed in Hawai'i's courts along with hundreds of thousands of traffic and parking citations. I'm grateful to our 82 full-time judges, many of whom are here today, and our dedicated staff, who strive to ensure that everyone is treated with fairness and respect when they come before our courts. Can you please join me in recognizing them?"

"We make every effort to enable parties to reach a resolution on their own. Mediation helps parties avoid the cost of litigating in court, can result in quicker resolutions, and helps to preserve relationships. The judiciary provides free mediation services for all small claims and residential landlord-tenant cases statewide. But despite the availability of mediation, there are nevertheless parts of the state with significant increases in demand for our services. For example, on Maui, the last district court judge was added in 1982, when the population was less than half of what it is today. In the past five years alone, criminal case filings in Maui County have increased by 50 percent, significantly increasing the workload of each judge. Accordingly, we're respectfully requesting funding for an additional district court judge position on Maui as well as family court judges on O'ahu and Kaua'i.

"When a dispute does go to court, it's essential that it be decided in a way that's transparent. The media are welcome to bring cameras into most courtrooms, and all of our appellate court decisions are available online, along with many other court records. Simply put, the rule of law is best nurtured in the sunshine.

"But for all of the audiences that we strive to reach, there's one that is closest to our hearts: our young people. Our future depends on their understanding of our democracy and the Constitution, yet there are so many issues competing for the attention of our youth, how do we get them to focus on this one? The best way to make the judicial process real for our young people is to have them witness it firsthand. The Hawai'i Supreme Court has been traveling to high schools across the state, holding oral arguments in actual cases in what we call the 'Courts in the Community program.' Hundreds of attorneys

have volunteered their time to join teachers in educating the students about the case that will be argued. So far, the Supreme Court has convened at eight schools on O'ahu and the neighbor islands, most recently at Wai'anae and McKinley High Schools. Nearly 2,800 students from 51 schools have participated, including students from Ka'u to Ni'ihau. And we're excited to continue this unique educational opportunity and to visit Maui this April.

"If we expect the public to trust the judicial system, we must provide a level playing field in our courts. Nowhere is this need more acute than in our civil courtrooms, where thousands of people must represent themselves each year because they cannot afford a lawyer. Going to court can be difficult even under the best of circumstances. Imagine how it feels for a 19-year-old domestic violence survivor to stand alone before the court to confront the alleged abuser and seek a restraining order? How do we ensure that every person has their day in court? Partnerships and innovation have been the key. Our Access to Justice Commission, under the leadership of its chair, Justice Simeon Acoba, has achieved amazing things with very limited resources. Self-help centers are successfully operating in courthouses from Hilo to Lihu'e, where volunteer attorneys provide information to individuals representing themselves in civil cases. Nearly 15,000 people have been assisted free of charge since the first center opened in 2011 at almost no cost to the public. Volunteer attorneys are assisting self-represented parties on appeal, where the issues can be particularly complex.

"We're utilizing digital resources to reach even more people. In October, Volunteer Legal Services Hawai'i rolled out a program called Hawaii Online Pro Bono, where people can ask legal questions online and obtain answers from volunteer attorneys, and the Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i has developed an interactive software program that generates legal documents to file with the courts. This resource is available on our website and on public computers at Hawaii State Public Library locations statewide. These efforts have received national recognition. In 2016, the Justice Index survey ranked Hawai'i among the top three states in the country for practices that provide access to justice. And we were also ranked number one for providing support for people with limited English proficiency.

"And this is another area in which the Legislature has provided vitally needed resources, which we deeply appreciate. Because of Hawai'i's established track record, we were recently awarded a \$100,000 grant to develop a roadmap for further expanding access to justice. We appreciate the Legislature's strong support of these efforts, including providing additional funding last session for civil legal services. Such funding makes economic sense: A recent study showed that for every dollar spent on civil legal services in Hawai'i, more than six dollars is returned to the economy. And we also thank our other partners: the Access to Justice Commission; the Hawaii Justice Foundation; the Hawaii State Bar Association, including President Nadine Ando and Executive Director Pat Mau-Shimizu; the neighbor island bar associations; the William S. Richardson School of Law and its dean, Avi Soifer; our civil legal services providers and their incredibly hard-working staff; and the hundreds of attorneys who have generously donated their time and expertise. Many of these partners are here today, the members of all the organizations I mentioned, as well as the volunteer attorneys, and I'd like to ask them to stand and be recognized.

"Strong families are the foundation of a safe, vibrant community, and when families break down, the effects can be profound, particularly for children. Our family courts see that every day in cases involving divorce and child custody, domestic violence, juvenile offenses, and the abuse and neglect of children. And the volume is staggering: Last fiscal year, there

were more than 27,000 new cases filed in our family courts. You might think that family court would be a dark place, but in fact, it is often a place of hope, innovation, and new beginnings. For example, our Girls Court program, which addresses the unique needs of teenage girls in the juvenile justice system, was one of the first in the nation. Girls Court significantly reduced recidivism, and we recently expanded it to Kaua'i. And with the support of the legislative and executive branches, we're pushing ahead with reforming our juvenile justice system by emphasizing more treatment for kids with substance abuse or mental health issues and by increasing accountability by having juvenile offenders perform community service and make restitution to victims.

"Now, we all know that education is the key to a brighter future, but there are schools where too many kids are chronically truant. Our family court worked with partners in the community to come up with solutions. We learned that cases of chronic truancy weren't making their way to the courts until the school year was almost over; that there are root causes, such as medical issues, that can be addressed; and that a team approach could be effective, particularly when parents become active partners in their children's success. We put those principles into practice last year at Wai'anae Intermediate School, which had the highest rate of truancy among middle schools on O'ahu. Of the 63 students in the program, most had missed more than three months of the prior school year. The results were amazing: 78 percent of those students completed the school year with less than 10 unexcused absences. The statistics are impressive, but let me put it in human terms. One young man was living with his family in a tent and had not been attending school for two years. Some of the challenges he faced were heartbreakingly simple; for example, he often didn't have dry clothes to wear to school. The Department of Education and other partners stepped up to address those issues. This young man began going to school again and earned a promotion to the next grade on merit, and we recognized his success by awarding him some donated movie passes. It turned out it was the first time he'd ever been to the movies, and it was the first time that people at family court had seen him smile. That smile is what hope looks like. To the members of our community who are cynical about government and wonder whether it is up to the task of addressing our most intractable problems, I'd simply say this: Come on down to family court. I'd like to acknowledge the team that made this happen, including family court and partners from the Department of Education and the Offices of the Attorney General and Public Defender. Could you please stand and be recognized?"

"As our experience at Wai'anae Intermediate illustrates, we sometimes have a role that goes beyond what takes place inside the courtroom. Simply put, it's not enough to hit the gavel and walk off the bench if that means losing an opportunity to bring about a more lasting resolution. We've done this successfully in addressing illegal drug use and addiction through the creation of drug courts. The court intensively supervises each defendant in the community with the goal of getting them clean, sober, and employed or in school through a treatment team that includes prosecutors, defense counsel, drug counselors, and probation officers. Drug courts cost substantially less than incarceration: \$25 a day versus about \$140 a day for prison, and the graduates are far less likely to create additional crimes. With the State considering construction of a new jail, it's important to determine whether the expanded use of drug courts could reduce the size of such a facility while increasing public safety. A task force chaired by my colleague Justice Michael Wilson is considering that issue among others, and I appreciate their work.

"We've extended the treatment court model to different contexts. We have a pilot Driving While Impaired Court for chronic drunk drivers, which has received national recognition

and has zero recidivism among the first 34 graduates. We also have the mental health court for individuals with severe mental illnesses, and we have HOPE Probation, which uses a lower level of supervision while still holding defendants accountable for becoming clean and sober. But we've taken the treatment court model to a new level with veterans treatment courts, which address the special challenges faced by veterans who have substance abuse or mental health issues. Under the leadership of Judge Edward Kubo, the Veterans Administration has been made a part of the treatment team to ensure that the vets receive the VA benefits that they earned through their service; this brings in additional federal funds that were previously being left on the table. And we've established a team of mentors, fellow veterans who can assist the vet with anything from advice to helping them obtain housing. One of the veterans succinctly explained the significance of veterans court when he graduated from the program just two weeks ago. He explained that before the program, he was addicted to drugs, was on welfare, and was in public housing. Now, he has a job and an apartment and, in his words, 'is living on his own two feet.' He said, 'Before, I used to hurt people. Today, I don't hurt people; I help people.' Given the success of veterans court here on O'ahu, we're bringing it to other parts of the State. We now have veterans courts in Kona and Hilo, a special calendar for veterans on Maui, and we'll be opening a veterans court on Kaua'i this year. I'd like to recognize all of the veterans court mentors who are here with us in the chamber today, both for serving our country and for supporting their fellow veterans. Could those mentors and Judge Edward Kubo please stand and be recognized?"

"There is another seemingly intractable problem that affects the health, safety, and well-being of our community: homelessness. Although the judiciary cannot solve this problem by itself, it can be part of the solution by bringing people together to address some of the root causes. For people who aren't able to pay their rent, our district court's landlord-tenant calendar is often the last stop before the street. Sometimes there's a possible solution that can keep the tenant in the unit and be a win for the landlord as well. To facilitate those positive outcomes, we've launched a program in Honolulu that brought together the State, the city, landlords, private attorneys, Legal Aid, and nonprofit organizations, which we call Steps to Avoid Eviction, or STAE. And this initiative was recently expanded to Maui. Some homeless individuals repeatedly come through our district courts, arrested on minor offenses and held for a couple of days, building up unpaid fines or outstanding warrants that can keep them from obtaining gainful employment. In order to break this pattern, we must treat these encounters as opportunities to bring about change. I want to commend Honolulu Prosecutor Keith Kaneshiro and State Public Defender Jack Tonaki for putting these ideas into action through a program called Community Outreach Court. The ultimate goal is to send the court and a treatment team out into the community and offer these individuals an opportunity to resolve pending cases, obtain needed services, and move forward in their lives. The prosecuting attorney obtained grant funding to start this project, and the first session of this court will be held tomorrow.

"We also provide services to homeless individuals who commit more serious crimes. Our treatment courts work to get a roof over their heads and help them develop a support structure and the skills to stay off the street, and we're asking for additional funding to support these efforts in our budget request this year.

"I'd like to talk about the challenges of the future and the values that will guide us. Our courts will face challenging environmental issues in the years ahead. We're well positioned to address those issues in a consistent, informed manner thanks to the Legislature's decision to create the environmental court in



2015. We are only the second state in the nation to have a statewide environmental court.

“We view technology as an opportunity to make the courts more transparent, more accessible, and more responsive. We’re moving away from conducting business on paper. On Monday, we rolled out a new system in our circuit courtrooms so documents in criminal cases can now be filed and accessed electronically. We’re also making it easier to obtain information about the judiciary. We just launched a free judiciary mobile app that provides quick access to a wealth of information about our courts – it’s called Hawaii Courts mobile app, and we’re only the second statewide judiciary in the country to offer this service.

“Although we’re embracing changing technology, we must remain true to those core values that provide our foundation as an institution. I spoke earlier about our commitment to transparency; another core value is integrity. Integrity means standing up for what’s right even when it’s not easy or comfortable to do so. For judges, it means faithfully applying the law to the facts of each case without regard to the popularity or status of the parties or fear of reprisal. Hawai‘i’s merit-based system of selecting and retaining judges protects their ability to make those tough calls while still holding them accountable for their performance. And it has also helped to ensure that our judges reflect the remarkable diversity of our community. A study released last year by the American Constitution Society found that Hawai‘i had the most diverse judiciary in the nation. The fight for human freedom and dignity is not easy. Throughout Hawai‘i’s history as a state, our courts have been open to all. Our merit-based system of judicial selection and retention gives judges the independence to make the calls when the legal interests of the minority are challenged by the will of the majority. Our judges are grateful for that trust and ever mindful of the great responsibility that accompanies it.

“In conclusion, I would like to thank our dedicated judges and staff who work hard every day to treat all people with respect and fairness, even in the face of high caseloads and often-contentious circumstances. It’s a tough job, but they do it with dedication, excellence, and aloha, and we could not succeed in our mission without the passion and commitment of every one of them.

“While we are all blessed to live in this great State, the path forward has not always been straight or smooth. But despite the setbacks and sometime-grave injustices that people have encountered, the shared values that unify us have always been stronger than the forces of division, and we must never lose sight of the unique power of Hawai‘i’s message of diversity and inclusion. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. spoke about it when he visited Hawai‘i just after we became a state in the fall of 1959. Dr. King addressed the Hawai‘i House of Representatives next door at ‘Iolani Palace. The struggle for civil rights was gaining strength in the South but still faced terrible obstacles, and Reverend King referred to Hawai‘i as an inspiration, saying, ‘You can never know what it means to those of us caught for the moment in the tragic and often dark midnight of man’s inhumanity to man, to come to a place where we see the glowing daybreak of freedom and dignity and racial justice.’ That glowing daybreak still burns bright in Hawai‘i. It is a unique gift to the world, forged through the toil, sweat, and – sometimes – blood of those who came before us in this beautiful place. At the judiciary, we are sworn to protect that legacy by upholding the rule of law and the freedoms set forth in our constitution.

“Once again, thank you to the Legislature for its support of the judiciary’s work and for giving me this opportunity to speak with you today. Mahalo and aloha.”

Speaker Souki then rose and stated:

“Thank you very much for that very inspiring speech, Justice Recktenwald. I’ve never met a more humble man, and with great inner strength. I want to congratulate the justice system to come out with all of these innovation programs that we have, the outreach to the poor and to the needy, and to the veterans especially. Me being a veteran, someday I may need your help.

“However, I wish just to advise the justices that we also believe in an equal justice system. We believe in the executive, judiciary, and the legislative. And we ask the justices also not to forget that. With this, I will close. Thank you all for being here. Thank all you justices in the system for doing a very, very good job. With this, we shall adjourn the State of the Judiciary message to the State.”

At 10:36 a.m., Speaker Souki declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At this time, Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I just want to make some brief remarks about the passing of retired Supreme Court Justice Mario Ramil. I don’t really like to talk about role models, but I think, for those of us who came of age and entered the legal profession, I think he was clearly one of our role models. He actually was only the second Filipino American in the United States to rise to the office of associate justice. The first, of course, was Benjamin Menor, also from the Hawai‘i Supreme Court.

“Justice Ramil immigrated to the United States and the Bay Area when he was only 10 years old. He received his college and law degrees from the Bay Area and in 1975 moved to Hawai‘i, where he served as a deputy attorney general. He was appointed as our insurance commissioner. He served as director of the Department of Labor, and in those last two positions, he was involved in fashioning our Prepaid Health Care Act. In 1993, he was appointed to the Hawai‘i Supreme Court, where he served for almost a decade.

“I can only say that, on a personal note, all of us who knew him and looked up to him recall that he was a soft-spoken person. I don’t recall him saying anything bad about others; he was always a joy to work with. And I would like to extend my condolences to his wife, Judy, and their sons, Jonathan and Bradley. And, Mr. President, I would like to request that the Senate adjourn today on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of retired Hawai‘i Supreme Court Justice Mario Ramil.”

Monday, February 6, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Harimoto and Kim who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Eleventh Day.

Senator English recognized and honored Lieutenant General Daniel P. Leaf, USAF, Retired, for his service as the director of the Daniel K. Inouye Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, members of the Senate: Today, we have the privilege of honoring a man who has selflessly served our country as a member of the armed forces for over three decades. Lieutenant General Dan Leaf distinguished himself for his exceptional, outstanding service as director of the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies, more commonly known as APCSS, from January 2012 to January 2017.

"Through superb leadership, he expanded the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center's influence in Indo-Asia Pacific security and led an engagement with Burma's emerging democracy and U.S.-Vietnam strategic partnership, amongst many others. The exceptionally meritorious achievements of the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center are a direct result of the superb leadership of Lieutenant General Leaf and reflect great credit upon himself, the State of Hawai'i, and the Department of Defense.

"Prior to APCSS, he worked in the defense industry as vice president of full spectrum initiatives at Northrop Grumman Information Systems. He also served as a deputy commander of the U.S. Pacific Command, from which he retired in 2008 after serving over 33 years in the U.S. Armed Forces.

"Lieutenant General Leaf's dedication to our community, the State of Hawai'i, and our country is embodied in all that he has accomplished over his illustrious career.

"Back in 2015, the entire Senate was welcomed at the Center on a very special retreat and very special briefing, and I want to thank him personally for doing this and helping us with high-level military briefings on big, big issues like pandemics and critical infrastructure. From this collaboration, we have changed course in the Senate and now we do the legislative agenda, which we've produced over the last three years, based on research, based on very, very good real-time data, that we learned from APCSS. So I want to thank Dan Leaf for working collaboratively with us, for all of the great work that he has done, and congratulate him on his retirement. And I just said to him, before we sat down, that retirement does not necessarily mean you stop working – it just means you have more control of your time. So, ladies and gentlemen, members of the Senate, please join me in congratulating and thanking Lieutenant General Leaf on his retirement."

The Chair commented:

"Senator English, I thought you were going to say that in retirement, you work as hard, but most of the offers are without compensation for all of the hard work."

Senator Taniguchi introduced Lynn Corbett, an artist and friend of Ruthadell Anderson, who was seated in the gallery. Ms. Anderson designed and handcrafted the unique tapestries

installed in both the House and Senate Chambers, and Ms. Corbett was on the team of handcrafters that made the tapestries. Senator Taniguchi also introduced Evelyn Giddings, an artist who worked with renowned artist Jean Charlot and cultivated many varieties of kalo and assisted ethnobotanist Beatrice Krauss.

The Chair remarked:

"Before calling the recess, I'd be remiss if I didn't add to Senator English's remarks for the Center. If you are planning an international trip in the Pacific and Asian theater, I've found that if you reach out and go down to the Center, a pre-briefing before you go to the region you're about to visit will make your visit all the more meaningful and allow you to maximize the best use of their time because of the resource that they are."

At this time, Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Some of you may know that Friday was my committee clerk’s – my very pregnant committee clerk, Kelli-Rose Hooser Simmons – last day here at the Capitol. She was anticipating that she would go home and have a few days of rest and respite before baby came – baby came over the weekend. So the Simmons household has welcomed an over-eight-pound baby girl named Isabella Juliet, and Isabella is Kelli’s grandma’s name. So both Kelli’s parents – a former colleague of ours, Gary Hooser, and her mom – were there, and Justin, the proud father, was able to watch some of the Super Bowl while waiting for his daughter to arrive. It was a very exhausting experience, I think, for Kelli-Rose, but I know she and everyone are very happy, so I wanted to share the good news with all of you.”

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Members, Friday marked a very special day in the development of Hawaiian language in the Senate because the very first committee hearing notice went out in Hawaiian and English on Friday, and I want to congratulate Senator Karl Rhoads for pursuing this and also Senator Maile Shimabukuro, the two committees that are testing out the bilingual, Hawaiian and English, committee hearing notices. I also invite other committees, if they are so moved, to let us know and we’ll help you with translations, and we can start making every committee hearing notice in Hawaiian and English.

“I want to share this very particular story because, when a language is revitalized, one of the key elements in its revitalization is when government starts using it again. And, you know, for many years, we did a bill to require the use of Hawaiian language in government documents and government letterheads. In fact, we passed one in 2012, and Governor Abercrombie vetoed that bill, saying that he would do it internally. He did not; it did not happen, and I took a different approach. I said, ‘You know, let’s just do it.’ So we’re starting to do it. The Senate now does our Order of the Day in Hawaiian and English, and we’re starting to do our committee hearing notices in Hawaiian and English. Hopefully, we’ll do more documents as we move forward. And we put this challenge out to other branches of government, other agencies, other departments, that they, too, can do the same, and all it takes is finding the right help in doing the translations, and there’s plenty people to do that. But once we start using it more, the Hawaiian language will become stronger, more vitalized, and hopefully, in the future, we will be using Hawaiian in all government documents. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Ihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I wanted to note that I was there at the 1978 constitutional convention, and we made a major decision in including the Hawaiian language as an official language of the State. And what our Majority Leader is doing is helping to implement that constitutional amendment. Thank you.”

**Tuesday, February 7, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Harimoto and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twelfth Day.

At this time, Senator Keith-Agaran recognized ten journalists from leading Philippines news organizations who were on a tour of the United States to explore many facets of the U.S. – Philippines relationship, including U.S. government engagement, diaspora influence, and people-to-people ties. The journalists were accompanied in the gallery by Mark Zimmer from the U.S. Department of State Foreign Press Office.

Senator Galuteria welcomed third-grade students from King William C. Lunalilo Elementary School, who were seated in the gallery with their chaperones and teachers Joy Buckland, Lori Towata, and Wendy Gonsalves.

The Chair noted that he had taken a photo with the students prior to the Senate's floor session, and extended an additional welcome to the group.

Senator Tokuda recognized and commended Dr. Ernest James Harris for receiving the Congressional Gold Medal for his service as one of the first African Americans in the United States Marine Corps, and presented the following remarks:

"It is indeed an honor to introduce Dr. Ernest James Harris to the Senate Chamber, a man who is a legend throughout our Windward community and our state, and even throughout our country and our academic and civil rights world. Dr. Harris, if you could please stand to be recognized by all of us today? Joining him today is the other half of this power couple, if you know them well: his wife, Bettye Jo – and you can wave, Bettye Jo, because everyone knows Bettye Jo in our community – and their son, Gregory Harris. I'm so glad the children are here to hear us talk about Dr. Harris and what he has done.

"Today we congratulate Dr. Harris on receiving the Congressional Gold Medal for his service as one of the first African Americans to serve our nation in the United States Marine Corps. This first wave of black enlistees began their training at Camp Montford Point, North Carolina, after President Franklin Roosevelt signed Executive Order 8802, prohibiting the branches of the armed forces from discriminating on the basis of race. After leaving the Marine Corps, Dr. Harris went on to study biology and chemistry at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. He attained his master's degree from the University of Minnesota and a doctorate in entomology from the University of Hawai'i. His work as a researcher for the U.S. Department of Agriculture was nothing

short of groundbreaking. He pioneered new strategies that prevented millions of dollars' worth of crop damage domestically by fruit flies each year, and the controls he developed are common practice in agricultural sectors in over 20 countries worldwide. He received an official commendation from the Chilean government in 1996; they've been fruit fly plague-free since 1975 and, as a result, can ship fruit all over the world as a result of his efforts. He was inducted into the Royal Entomological Society of London and received the NAACP Lifetime Achievement Award – by the way, just like his wife, and we acknowledged her on the floor last year as well.

"It is with a great deal of humility that I consider myself very much a friend of this family and an ardent supporter of this truly exceptional human being. Ladies and gentlemen, let's once again give Dr. Ernest James Harris a round of applause for his accomplishments and contributions to our community."

And I also want to thank Jill Kuramoto, who helps us with PR. I had wanted to keep the media as far away from us as we could to accommodate more of the public. With her help we were able to strike a balance and we got the media in so they could take their notes and get their pictures, and I think it was a win-win for everybody. So, if we ever have another 'hot button' bill hearing in the future we now have our processes and procedures for handling such a hearing, tested – we are prepared. Thank everyone very much."

"If it's all right, Chair Baker, I would just add two other notes. The public was very respectful in the way that they came out and expressed their opinion, and I know we've been commenting statewide how some of these meetings have been more contentious with lack of respect, and so, for those who testified and participated, they were great. They were available if we needed the assistance, but I appreciated the fact that they quickly recognized that that would not be necessary, and they watched from a safe distance to make sure that they were part of the solution and not escalating anything in the room, and so, for their professionalism, I certainly want to express my thanks."

S.B. No. 871:

Senator Tokuda moved that S.B. No. 871, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in strong opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong opposition to S.B. 871, Relating to Taxation.

"S.B. 871 limits the tax imposed on wholesalers and dealers for each large cigar to the lesser of 50 cents or 50 percent of the wholesale price of the cigar. Tobacco use in Hawai'i is pervasive and by lowering the excise tax for large cigars, S.B. 871 will encourage the purchase and smoking of a harmful tobacco product.

"Tobacco use is the single most preventable cause of disease, disability, and death in the United States. Tobacco use continues to be a problem in Hawai'i causing approximately 1,400 deaths per year among adults. An estimated 21,000 children in Hawai'i currently under the age of 18 will ultimately die prematurely from smoking. Tobacco use also poses a heavy burden on Hawai'i's health care system and economy. Each year, smoking costs approximately \$526,000,000 in direct health care expenditures and \$387,300,000 in lost productivity in the State.

"Cigar smoke is composed of the same toxic and carcinogenic constituents found in cigarette smoke. All cigar smokers, regardless of whether they inhale cigar smoke, expose their lips, tongue, and throat to smoke and its toxic and cancer-causing chemicals. Moreover, due to their size, cigars can produce even more secondhand smoke than cigarettes and can contain substantially higher levels of carbon monoxide and other toxins than cigarette smoke. To the extent that cigar smoke is not inhaled as deeply as cigarette smoke, secondhand cigar smoke is also less 'filtered' than secondhand cigarette smoke before bystanders are exposed to it.

"While cigarette smoking has generally declined over the past several years, sales of cigars have been rising. One reason for the increase in cigar sales is that many still fail to realize the addiction and health risks associated with cigar smoking. However, another large reason is that almost every state taxes cigars at a much lower rate than it taxes cigarettes. In Hawai'i, large cigars are imposed a lower excise tax than cigarettes and other tobacco products. Existing law imposes different rates of tax on various articles of tobacco. For example, the excise tax on wholesalers is equal to 16 cents per cigarette (\$3.20 per pack), which is the same rate for little cigars, however the tax rate is 70 percent of the wholesale price of each article or item of tobacco products, other than large cigars, sold and 50 percent of the wholesale price of each large cigar sold.

"Large cigars should be similar to the tax rates imposed on tobacco products pursuant to section 245-3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Taxes on large cigars are imposed a lower rate than other tobacco products even though cigar use carries similar health risks. Research has shown that either a tax on cigarettes or increase in cigarette prices has the propensity to reduce the rate of smoking by adult and youth smokers. However, as the price of cigarettes and other tobacco products increases, smokers may be tempted to purchase large cigars as they may be more affordable.

“There should not be a lower-priced tobacco alternative to cigarettes or other tobacco products in Hawai‘i. Thus, a similar tax rate for cigarettes and tobacco products that acts as a deterrent for all forms of tobacco use is necessary. Higher tobacco product prices will encourage tobacco users to quit, sustain cessation, prevent youth initiation, and reduce consumption among those who continue to use tobacco.

“I urge my colleagues to join me in opposing limiting the tax imposed on wholesalers and dealers for each large cigar to the lesser of 50 cents or 50 percent of the wholesale price of the cigar. It is our responsibility to ensure that we do all in our power to deter the use of harmful tobacco products. I ask for a no vote on S.B. 871. Mahalo.”

Friday, February 17, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

Mountain View is one of the most economically challenged areas in our state; services such as the public library are especially needed and appreciated. We're fortunate to have her in our community and are extremely grateful for her service to Mountain View.

"In the gallery joining us from the Big Island today is her family: husband Dado Corpuz, sister Marilyn Ah Heong, sister Susan Pau, and cousin Janice Arakaki. Congratulations to Carleen Corpuz. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Harimoto rose to present the following remarks:

"For the past 20 years, the Friends of the Library of Hawai'i has recognized excellence in service for Hawai'i's librarians through the prestigious Librarian of the Year Award. This honor is presented each year to an outstanding librarian who embodies the qualities of dedication, enthusiasm, and excellence in providing library services to their community. This year, in recognition of her outstanding service, the Friends of the Library of Hawai'i's 2016 Librarian of the Year is Vicky Bowie. Vicky Bowie has served Hawai'i's communities through its public libraries for the past 11 years. In 2005, she began as a librarian at the McCully-Moiliili Public Library then moved to the Ewa Beach Public and School Library. She later became the children's librarian at the Pearl City Public Library, where she was promoted to branch manager in 2011.

"Vicky and her staff worked hard to make the Pearl City Public Library a vibrant community gathering place that serves 37,000 registered library card users in the Pearl City area. As a regional library, the Pearl City Public Library is a hub of activity, with an average annual circulation of over 200,000 items per year, more than 23,000 Internet sessions recorded, and host to numerous library programs serving our keiki to kūpuna, such as Tablet Tuesdays, Lego clubs for children, and computer classes for kūpuna. In order to ensure that visitors feel welcome

and comfortable, Vicky coordinated various library construction improvement projects, including renovating and reopening the library's meeting room for public use.

"Now, therefore, the Senate hereby congratulates Vicky Bowie upon her selection as the 2016 Librarian of the Year and expresses our gratitude for her caring and dedicated service. Congratulations, Vicky. And joining us today in the gallery to support Vicky, we have some very important people from the library: Keith Fujio, special assistant to the state librarian; Stacy Kaneshige, public libraries branch director; Paul Mark, the library's communications and official photographer; Sally Morgan from the Friends of the Library; and Kelsey Poaha, Friends of Pearl City Library president. So will you all please stand and be recognized? Thank you. Congratulations, Vicky."

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard honored and congratulated Auntie Debs Dudoit, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, we have with us today Debs Dudoit, or Auntie Debs, as the old-timers call her. When we called to tell Auntie Debs she was being honored on the Senate floor, there was a brief silence on the other end of the phone, followed by tears of disbelief. Auntie Debs immediately said she wanted to share the limelight, and so family and friends are joining her today. Next to her is her husband, Mitch; and her dad, Jack; and also we have Carmelo Santiago-Lopez and Jessica; and also we have U'i Kuie'e.

"Over 10 years ago, Debs and her husband, Mitch, helped a friend's son get into the U.S. Veterans transitional home in Kalaeloa, Barber's Point, on Shangrila Road, which is just a few blocks from my home. Bringing a simple meal and basic household items to their hanai son gradually evolved into full-on celebrations at the Vets Center, with food for all and a live band. Over the years, Auntie Debs and her friends added enhancements to their holiday celebrations, including live music, lion dances, taiko drums, and hula hālau. Sponsored by friends and family from various churches and ministry groups, Debs and her friends currently serve the veterans two to six times a year. They celebrated their 10th annual Christmas event in December with over 70 veterans. When asked what keeps her coming back every year to serve the vets, Debs says she does it from her heart; she loves seeing the smiles on their faces, not to mention all the hugs and kisses she gets. This special lady has even received three marriage proposals from the vets – I don't know what, Mitch, you got to say about that.

"As co-founder of My Father's House Hawaii, a nonprofit charitable ministry, their vision is to heal hearts and restore lives. Some of the vets have no one to encourage and support them during their traumatic transition into the community from war-torn experiences and weary hearts and souls. Jack Gaidos, Debs's dad, who's also a veteran, loves joining the parties as well, especially getting to share war stories with the guys.

"As Debs Dudoit insists on not taking all the credit, we'd be remiss not to mention her other friends and groups that have helped her over the years – as I mentioned, U'i Kuie'e, Ron and Momi Szypulski, and Ulu Crowell. For the past seven years, Debs's friends, including the Lopezes, have also been cooking and serving meals to the vets. So, Auntie Debs, Mitch, and friends, mahalo nui for sharing your aloha and making a difference in the lives of so many. The Senate thanks you for your inspiring efforts to bring love and caring to our vets who might otherwise be forgotten. Your selfless acts of aloha bring a smile to our faces and warmth to our hearts. Please give them a hand."

## TWENTY-THIRD DAY

Thursday, March 2, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Dela Cruz and Rhoads who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Kidani introduced North Carolina State Senator Dan Blue, president of the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL), who was seated in the Senate Chamber, and acknowledged his educational and professional background, as well as some of his legislative and community involvement and accomplishments. Senator Kidani also recognized Senator Blue's wife, Edna Blue, who was not present. Senator Kidani then introduced Bill Pound, executive director of NCSL, and Corina Eckl, director of leader services, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Tokuda welcomed a group of sixth-grade students from Trinity Christian School, who were present in the gallery with their teacher, Eric Fugitt, and praised them for being active in the legislative process by writing letters to her about issues they care about and bills they are tracking.

Senator Shimabukuro recognized Demont and Momi Conner, constituents from Nānākuli who were seated in the gallery, and noted their diligence in advocating for O'ahu's Westside.

Senator Galuteria commended and congratulated John Yukio Gotanda on becoming president of Hawai'i Pacific University, and presented the following remarks:

"I see the chamber is flush with presidents today, and I'd like to add one more to the roster. Take this time, colleagues, to acknowledge Mr. John Yukio Gotanda, who became the fifth president of the Hawai'i Pacific University. HPU is the largest private university in the State of Hawai'i, and he was inducted on July 1, 2016. Born and raised in Hawai'i, President Gotanda is a graduate of Roosevelt High School, the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, and the William S. Richardson School of Law, where he was editor-in-chief of the University of Hawai'i Law Review. Following law school, he was a staff attorney with the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. He then worked as an associate attorney with Covington & Burling in Washington, D.C., and later with Goodwin, Procter & Hoar in Boston.

"In 1994, he joined the faculty at Villanova University, where he served as professor of law, associate dean for academic affairs, associate dean for faculty research, and director of the JD/MBA program. From 2011 to 2016, he served as a dean of the law school of Villanova. Under his leadership, the Villanova law school developed and implemented a strategic plan that radically reformed the school's curriculum, reducing the time and cost of the program, eliminating barriers to entry, and establishing and increased international opportunities for its students.

"President Gotanda is recognized as one of the world's leading authorities on damages in international law and has been cited by courts, tribunals, and commentators, including by the U.S. Supreme Court. He has spoken widely on the subject of damages, international arbitration, and international sales law, including the Hague Academy of International Law, and has served as an expert on damages and an arbitrator in

international investment disputes. Under President Gotanda's leadership, HPU will build on its successes to date as it continues to prepare graduates to live, work, and learn as active members of a global society and realize its vision to become a leading institution of higher education.

"Including in that, colleagues and President, our new president of HPU is a fellow musician and a keyboard player. And back in the day, when there was a limited list of keyboarders, he was playing all over the place in Waikīkī. Colleagues, for those of us who used to run around Waikīkī in the day, you remember the Point After? Remember Cilly's? Remember even the Top of Da Shoppe? Well, President Gotanda played at all of those places. So, we've got some sentimentality in that way.

"Joining him today is his wife, Brenda, and his mom, Masae. Thank you very much. Mr. President."

The Chair commented:

"We'll make the correction in the Journal: Senator Galuteria, I believe you said, 'For those of you who ran around Waikīkī in the day,' it would appear the word was 'at night,' late night."

At 11:41 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

#### ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 571 (Gov. Msg. No. 503):

Senator Green moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 571 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Chang and carried.

Senator Green then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of PANKAJ BHANOT as Director of the Department of Human Services, term to expire December 3, 2018, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Pankaj Bhanot is an extraordinary gentleman. I’m tempted to leave that the end of my speech, but I will say a few words about this great person. Pankaj will become our director of Human Services after today’s vote, with your support. He’ll be the leader of one of our largest departments, as you’re well aware – \$3.4 billion budget, I believe. He’s an award-winning innovator: In 2006, he was DHS Employee of the Year, which I think is important to recognize because he’s been with the department and has been respected by his peers and has been a leader from, really, day one when he started there 17 years ago. Pankaj also has served as deputy director for three years, so he brings a great level of leadership to the job.

“We had a really special time together when he came before our committee. Of course, everyone came out in support; not a single individual raised any concerns about Pankaj. He has an exceptional record. He’s been very committed, I should tell you, to human rights – that was exceptional in the times that we spent together. He has a law degree from University of Delhi. He received a fellowship at Cornell Law School to study international law, and I mentioned already that he’s had a long-standing experience at the department.

“But really, all of this was – though very impressive – secondary in many ways to what stood out about Pankaj. When he came before us and spoke very passionately about why he

wants to be director of Human Services, I can tell you each and every one of us on the committee felt we had not heard anything that extraordinary in our time when listening to very exceptional candidates over the years as they were elevated to the directorship. Pankaj spoke eloquently about the impact that his father had on him, the struggles that the family had when they were not wealthy – when they were poor – in India, as he grew up. He spoke about the challenges of a father who was going through great difficulties in both his life and his career and how that impacted the family and how the family suffered. He was able to reconcile and love that father, but it really informed his whole life, and that was really special, I have to say – to speak about a father that way and to see how that translated both into a man and now a leader in the State of Hawai‘i. I think that we have had, if any that I can remember, as exceptional candidates, you could really count them on a single hand. So I want to commend Governor for putting a terrific person in front of us to become director of Human Services. I want to say to the family who’s here today: You’re lucky to have him, but we’re even more lucky as a state to have Pankaj Bhanot become our director. Thank you, Pankaj.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“I had the good fortune to work with Pankaj Bhanot when I was WAM chair. I needed his help because was having some difficulty finding my way through the department’s budget because the leadership of the department at that time was less than transparent. Then I discovered that not only was Pankaj very knowledgeable and very respectful, but he was not your typical bureaucrat. He demonstrated leadership potential. I’m delighted that, when the governor needed to tap another individual to lead this very large and sometimes very unwieldy department, that Governor Ige chose Pankaj. I think he has the leadership skills not only to inspire those at the line level but to bring a spirit of unity and camaraderie and forward thinking to a department that certainly needs it. So I’m delighted to stand in support of Pankaj Bhanot and wish him well as our new DHS director.”

Senator Galuteria rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mahalo nui loa, and I offer comments especially as it relates to the safety of our young and vulnerable infants in the care of childcare facilities that are licensed and regulated by the Department of Human Services. As you remember, Mr. President, four years ago, we passed a bill to set safe sleeping standards for children in daycare. What loss of life, a precious child’s life, ensues anguish and recriminations to the surviving family members. That bill was heard; it was passed, and the department set forth a promise to set the standards. During that period – which took four years to promulgate rules for child safety standards – we watched three children that, possibly, their deaths could have been prevented with safe sleeping standards.

“I spoke to Pankaj on January 17th, and there was a very heartfelt discussion that the two of us had in the privacy of my office. And he said he would immediately promulgate the rules as a matter of his personal word and honor, and I’m relieved to inform you, colleagues, that these long-promised safe sleeping rules finally came into existence last Friday. And I thank our forthcoming director for his honor and his word, and I would ask him that, once confirmed by the State Senate, to implement more best childcare standards to cover all aspects of childcare safety and to provide the best-quality daycare for our children and their working parents. So I conclude my remarks, Mr. President, and urge all colleagues to confirm our soon-to-be director, and we urge you to do good work and thank you for the work you’ve done thus far. Mahalo.”

Senator Green introduced family members and supporters of Director Bhanot, who were present in the gallery: his wife, Lynn Bhanot; his brother-in-law, Ernest Taketa; his sister-in-law, Carolyn Taketa; his niece, Charmaine Taketa; Bridget Holthus, deputy director of the Department of Human Services, and other friends from the department; cabinet members and Governor David Y. Ige; and a motley crew of his golf buddies called The Musubis.

Senator Keith-Agaran then moved that the Senate consent to the nomination of DERRICK H.M. CHAN to the Intermediate Court of Appeals, for a term of ten years, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Judge Chan’s background, character, quiet passion, and even-keeled demeanor promise that he will be a very good addition to Hawai‘i’s appellate courts. As my colleagues know, with the Hawai‘i Supreme Court currently operating under our statutes as a cert. court, the ICA now deals with the bulk of the appeals that are processed through Hawai‘i’s justice system, and I expect that Judge Chan will establish himself in his new role as another one of the workhorses at the ICA. Judge Chan will bring to the appellate bench nearly three decades of trial experience on both sides of the criminal bar, having served as a public defender and as first deputy Kaua‘i prosecutor. Significantly, Judge Chan also sports solid experience and knowledge as a trial and probate judge from his 16 years of service as a circuit court judge, experience that some of his colleagues on the ICA do not possess. He received support from both sides of the criminal bar.

“Throughout his tenure, Judge Chan has cemented a reputation for diligence, hard work, and integrity, as well as decisiveness, courage, and street smarts, which allow him to cut to the chase. Domestic violence advocates testified that his work ethic, intelligence, abiding commitment to the well-being of the community, and his untarnished leadership within the judiciary position him persuasively to take on this important role, and the long-standing experiences that we have had with Judge Chan are deeply assuring and encouraging in these times, when good character and suitable demeanor are in short supply.

“As another testifier noted, Judge Chan has shown the ability to navigate between various legal fields. He has served on all of the First Circuit-level calendars. As administrative judge and as chief judge of the circuit court, he has seen and heard it all, and there’s no substitute for experience. Judge Chan’s tenure has also been marked by his yeoman work on the probate calendar. As one of the doyennes of the Hawai‘i probate bar wrote:

Judge Chan is an exceptional judge and person. When he became Probate Judge in 2010, Judge Chan humbly acknowledged that he was not well-versed in trusts and estates law, but it was clear from the outset that he did his homework, worked diligently, and quickly mastered the applicable statutes, court rules, case law, tax laws, and financial issues that are unique to this practice area. No matter how many cases are on his Thursday calendar, Judge Chan is always prepared, asks pertinent questions, and treats everyone with respect. Judge Chan is very sensitive to the families that come before him and does his utmost to give

pro se parties their day in court. Even when he may rule against a pro se party, that party leaves Judge Chan’s courtroom knowing that Judge Chan listened to them and ruled within the confines of the law. Judge Chan also considers how his ruling in one case might impact other cases and situations that might come before him.

“She concluded, ‘He does not decide cases in a vacuum but instead realizes that his rulings may have a broader impact if applied in other contexts,’ something that, as an appellate judge, he will have full opportunity to do so.

“Having reviewed the testimony and other materials submitted on this nomination and having examined the nominee in a hearing, your Judiciary and Labor committee is satisfied that Judge Chan has a deep commitment to justice and the rule of law and the appropriate role that the three branches play in our state, and we recommend and I would urge all my colleagues to consent to the nomination of Derrick H.M. Chan as an associate judge of the Intermediate Court of Appeals.”

At 12:03 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. Eddins brings to the bench nearly 25 years of experience in the criminal bar and as a trial lawyer, where he has distinguished himself as one of the top defense lawyers in our state. I also got the sense that prosecutors testifying in favor of Mr. Eddins were simply glad he will no longer be their opponent in court. Mr. Eddins has also been an active member of the bar and his windward community.

“In the materials he submitted and the responses he provided, both in writing and in person, I was struck that he seemed to express a profound passion and confidence in the U.S. and State Constitution and our justice system. His discussion of cases showed a nimble and well-reasoned interest in the legal issues and his clients. The testimony submitted also indicated that, while he believes strongly in the ability of our traditional adversary system to reach just results, he has always conducted himself as a zealous but dignified civil and professional advocate for his clients. A lawyer I respect simply concluded, Mr. Eddins is ‘a “once in a generation” kind of guy.’ Clearly, Mr. Eddins’s background, character, quiet passion, and even-keeled demeanor promise that Mr. Eddins will be a very good addition to the First Circuit Court, the workhorse of Hawai‘i’s court system.

“Again, Mr. President, your committee has reviewed the testimony and other materials submitted on this nomination and we have examined the nominee in a hearing, and we’re satisfied

that Mr. Eddins has a deep commitment to justice and the rule of law, and we recommend and I would urge all my colleagues to consent to the nomination of Todd W. Eddins as a circuit court judge of the First Circuit.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Judge Remigio will bring to the First Circuit Court bench extensive experience as a family law practitioner, former deputy public defender, and, of course, her current role as a district family court judge. The attorney general himself recalled – from his time at the city prosecutor’s – that as a trial attorney, Judge Remigio was always ‘thoughtful, considerate, smart, and well-prepared.’ She was first appointed to the family court in 2011, having served the courts already as a per diem district court judge, circuit court grand jury counsel, and twice as a judicial clerk. She’s a graduate of Kamehameha Schools and received her undergraduate degree from Georgetown. She then attended the University of Hawai‘i Richardson School of Law for her law degree, and she has been an active member of the Native Hawaiian lawyers bar and her community.

“Your committee feels that her strong background and character, her steady demeanor and determination promise that Judge Remigio will be a solid addition to the First Circuit Court. Although we note that those of us who have read testimonies from the family court will now miss her advice, maybe she’ll continue in that role as well. But your committee, having reviewed the testimony and other materials and having examined the nominee in a hearing, we’re satisfied that Judge Remigio has a deep commitment to justice and the rule of law, and we recommend and would urge all our colleagues to consent to the nomination of Catherine Remigio as a circuit court judge.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I think all four of these nominations are great nominations, but, colleagues, I just wanted to share something with you about this Judge Remigio. When I interview the judicial nominees, one of the questions I always ask them is why do they want to be a judge or, in this case, why do they want to move from the district court level to the circuit court level? And I was particularly interested because I always hate to lose a really good family court judge because it’s such an important role. But when I asked Judge Remigio why she wanted to move up to the circuit court, her entire face lit up, and she said, ‘Because of the jury trials.’ She’s been appointed to sit on jury trials in the past, and she told me that she feels that the right to a trial by peers is one of the foundations of American democracy. And so she takes the time, with the juries, to be able to explain to them

what their role is, why it’s important, and talks to them after the trials. And she shared with me that in many cases, people told her they hadn’t wanted to sit on a jury, they really didn’t like the obligation, but once they had come into her courtroom and gone through the trial and seen the importance of it and had that conversation with her, it was something that they were really glad that they had done.

“Colleagues, I don’t know about you, but sometimes I talk to people and ask them why didn’t they register to vote? And sometimes the answer I get is, ‘Because I don’t want to have to be called for jury trial.’ And I’m really, really glad that Judge Remigio has the high-level ability to see her role not just as a judge in the courtroom, but also in the systemic foundations of our democracy that the jury trial serves, and that she is encouraging citizens to embrace that role and then hopefully share that with their family and peers. So I greatly appreciate her vision and urge you to support her nomination to the circuit court. Thank you.”

One of the state’s most prominent trial attorneys wrote of Mr. Hiraoka:

He always exhibited competence, legal knowledge and experience, and considerate demeanor. He is a very professional attorney who represents his clients with vigor and principle but always with the utmost professionalism and civility. His temperament is ideally suited for judicial office.

“Several judges wrote in support of Mr. Hiraoka as well, and one district court judge wrote that, based on his experience training new judges, he can unequivocally say that Mr. Hiraoka possesses all the attributes to make a very good jurist. Specifically, he believes Mr. Hiraoka has the potential to mature and become a good jurist:

Willing to be taught, flexible in their positions, firm yet fair in controlling the courtroom and calendar, willing and not afraid to make hard decisions, having had courtroom trial experience as a lawyer, and displaying a good temperament.

“Your committee finds that his background, character, professionalism, and demeanor promise that Mr. Hiraoka will be a very good addition to the circuit court. Having reviewed the testimony and other materials submitted in his nomination, your Judiciary and Labor committee is satisfied that Mr. Hiraoka has a deep commitment to justice and the rule of law,

and we recommend and I would urge all my colleagues to consent to the nomination of Keith Hiraoka as a circuit court judge of the First Circuit.”

"Governor Ige launched the 2017-2027 Hawai'i Interagency Biosecurity Plan at the World Conservation Congress last September. S.B. 776, S.D. 2 is a key component of that plan and very important in our fight against invasive species. The bill

would create the Hawai'i Invasive Species Authority as an attached agency to the Department of Agriculture and would increase the state's coordination efforts in reducing the threat of invasive species in our islands. The establishment of the Authority would expand upon the existing Hawai'i Invasive Species Council by adding additional expertise to the interagency Board of Directors, authorizing the Board to hire staff as necessary, and mandating new duties relating to the coordination of interagency invasive species and biosecurity efforts. The bill would also fund positions and operational expenses for the Authority and provide funding for interagency projects and research

"Please join me in supporting this important bill. Mahalo."

As I've said many times before in this chamber, Hawaiian-grown hemp and its value added products will become a huge boon to our economy.

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 778, S.D. 1.

"For the last several years, public concerns about pesticide use in our state has been a big topic. There has been county legislative action, public events and marches, and a lot of questions about potential negative health effects of exposure to pesticides. As you'll recall, on November 18, 2016, federal Judge Consuelo Callahan ruled that Kaua'i, Maui, and Hawai'i counties can't enact their own bans or regulations on genetically modified crops and pesticides. This court decision upheld a lower court's decision saying Hawai'i law prohibits counties from regulating ag matters. The federal court also made it clear that pesticide regulation was the responsibility of the state.

"It's clear to me that this issue isn't going to go away and we need to act. Going into the session, I was looking for a win-win on the pesticide issue. The Pesticide Use Joint Fact Finding Study Group Report, 'Pesticide Use by Large Agribusinesses on Kauai' came out last year and I thought their recommendations were something that we should strongly consider. The study group was led by Peter Adler and included nine Kaua'i residents with science backgrounds and was funded by the Department of Ag and Kaua'i County with \$175,000. The report calls on Governor Ige to ensure that state agencies have enough staff and resources to fulfill their responsibilities regarding pesticides. It called for \$3 million to implement the study's recommendations which focus on efforts to:

- 1) increase human and environmental safety;
- 2) further determine the presence of pesticides in people, plants, and animals;
- 3) achieve the greatest possible transparency and public access to data while respecting information that must legally remain confidential; and
- 4) advance public understanding of agricultural pesticides.

"S.B. 778 follows this path and would appropriate funding to the DOA to implement the findings and recommendations of the Joint Fact Finding Study Group's report on pesticide use by large agribusinesses on Kaua'i. Please join me in supporting this important bill."

### THIRD READING

#### MATTER DEFERRED FROM FRIDAY, MARCH 3, 2017

S.B. No. 380:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 380, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"In some of the conversations I've had with some of my colleagues, there seems to be some misunderstanding about this

bill. I wanted to try to provide an explanation for the bill and regret that I was not able to thoroughly explain when we had some earlier conversations about what a hygienist can do with regard to administering anesthesia. First, let me say that hygienists are licensed professionals: They have a course of study that they must go through in order to obtain their license. No dental hygienist is licensed or permitted by statute or rule to administer sedation – that means putting somebody under for which they have to be brought out of that sedative state. Only a licensed dentist is allowed to do that kind of sedation. And the unfortunate and horrible situation that happened about a year ago in Kailua involved an untrained, unlicensed dental assistant when it was the dentist who should have been administering those sedatives. The only way a dentist can delegate to another professional is with board approval and it can only be to a nurse, anesthetist, or a physician, and that delegation has to be approved by the Board of Dental Examiners. So, in that case, both the dentist and dental assistant were wrong, and both of them are under criminal indictment; and, as a result, the Board of Dental Examiners has improved their rules and regulations for dentists administering such sedation. The dentist now has to have a particular certification. It is not just any dentist who can perform those procedures.

“But I know there was a question of me about the language of the bill because it talks about hygienists being able to do intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia. Well, what do those terms mean? So I asked specifically the Board of Dental Examiners to give me the layman’s terms. In simplest terms it means numbing. Specifically, intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia numbs a specific spot or a specific tooth; intra-oral block anesthesia is a procedure that numbs an area of teeth. So, sometimes it’s done with a spray or a gel; sometimes it’s done with an injection – but it’s a specific area in your mouth; it’s not intravenous; it’s not ‘put a mask on,’ and you don’t go under. A patient is not sedated with intra-oral or intra-oral block anesthesia. It is a numbing action and, for that, hygienists have a specific certification in order to do those procedures.

“So the language in Senate Bill 380 is consistent with what hygienists are trained to do. They would be doing it in a dental office with the dentist in the area, and they would not be sedating – putting somebody out – with an intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia or a block anesthesia. I also have copies of the Hawai’i Revised Statutes that say a licensed dental assistant may administer these two items in supervision of a dentist after being certified by the Board, and for those categories of intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia for which the licensed dental hygienist has been certified through a course of study meeting the requirements of this chapter. So the only thing that we’re changing is from ‘direct supervision’ to ‘general supervision,’ and general supervision is exactly what hygienists working in public settings are under with their dentist-employer. I think the rules that we have are very specific with both the HAR and HRS; and, Mr. President, I’d like permission to submit both the copies of the relevant sections of the Hawai’i Administrative Rules for this as well as the Hawai’i Revised Statutes that explains specifically what these items are. It seems to me that we allow it in a public setting. This is consistent practice; it is a licensed activity – that’s why dental assistants don’t do these things: they’re not licensed; they’re untrained. And perhaps what we should be looking at next year is to make sure that all of the folks who work in the dental office have some certification or licensure to make sure that we don’t have untrained, unlicensed people making bad decisions and, ultimately, hurting somebody or taking a life. So with those remarks, I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting Senate Bill 380. Mahalo.”

The Chair having so ordered, the excerpts are identified as “**ATTACHMENT A**” to the Journal of this day.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I want to thank the committee chair for the homework that she’s done and her responding to the concern raised by myself, because of that traumatic event in my community. I’m going to withdraw my reservations based on the information that she gave, so I’m rising in support of the measure. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 380, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DENTAL HYGIENISTS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

### THIRD READING

S.B. No. 513, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 513, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’m rising in opposition and the reason is – and I may be misreading this, and I spoke with the chair, so if I’m misreading this, an apology is in order. But at this point, to my reading – and I’ve read the bill several times – I believe it is silent on whether or not minors can go to a pharmacy and receive their contraceptives. I know this is a hot subject for many reasons. I’m always falling on the side of parental responsibility and parental control, so, to my reading of the bill, I don’t see that there is any parental authority required for minors. If it clearly stated that it was adults only or with consent of a parent, then I would support it, but with my reading, I cannot support it in this form. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“This is a Women’s Legislative Caucus measure, and the idea is to make contraceptive supplies more available to adult women. Pharmacists cannot provide anything to someone less than an adult unless there is an age specifically written in. It’s clear from the reading of the bill that it is for adult women, which means somebody over the age of 18. Pharmacists have to have some additional requirements in order to be able to prescribe contraceptive supplies, and it really is designed – initially started out looking at college women, how they sometimes have to go off and they needed a 12-month supply, so we did that, and now we’ve also tried to make it available without having to go to see a physician or a nurse practitioner just to get your supplies. And this is clearly in their statute: It’s adults. All of the other areas where we’ve asked pharmacists to do vaccines, we’ve put a specific age requirement in there, and so their statute reads, I think, fairly clearly if you look at the totality of what we ask pharmacists and enable pharmacists to do, and so I ask my colleagues to join me in voting in support of this measure. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 513, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTRACEPTIVE SUPPLIES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

S.B. No. 389, S.D. 1:

Senator Inouye moved that S.B. No. 389, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I understand the concerns over this highway; I just think that it's a slippery slope when we start to do speed limits, and if this bill passes ultimately, I'm going to be introducing one for H-1 because I think those speed limits are off. Thank you."

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"The Department of Transportation establishes the highway speed limits based on engineers looking at the design standards of the roads and taking other factors into consideration, so I really believe that it's not a good policy for us to set the speed limit via law. If something happens and DOT needs to change the speed limit, they can't. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Colleagues, I rise in support of this measure and want to thank the chair of the Transportation and Energy Committee for moving this measure forward to address the concerns of many of us on the west side of Maui, and believe that it's important to have a measure like this to move forward to make sure that DOT, in fact, comes back and looks at our highways and looks at appropriate speed levels. When you have a significant grade and the speed limit is 10 miles, there's no way that a tractor-trailer, a bus, a vehicle of any weight can get up that, and that's what's on some of our roads, particularly the Lahaina Bypass. So I appreciate the opportunity of my colleagues to let this go forward so that DOT gets the message and will work with us to provide more appropriate limits."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 389, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21; Ayes with Reservations (Riviere, Ruderman). Noes, 4 (Green, Harimoto, Kim, Thielen).

S.B. No. 376, S.D. 1:

On motion by Senator Baker, seconded by Senator Inouye and carried, S.B. No. 376, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE INTERISLAND TRANSMISSION SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Gabbard).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634 (S.B. No. 134, S.D. 1):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634 be adopted and S.B. No. 134, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I just think the University of Hawai'i has the authority to do this, so I would encourage them to move forward and I'm not sure why we need to do this at the legislative level. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I have some remarks in support of this measure I'd like to have inserted, but I would just like to note for my colleagues that this measure is in line with previous legislative action to provide no smoking on our DOE campuses and on our HHSC hospital premises. Mahalo."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand in support of S.B. 134, S.D. 1, Relating to prohibiting smoking on University of Hawai'i premises.

"The purpose of this measure is to promote positive health practices and protect University of Hawai'i students, employees, and visitors from the exposure of secondhand smoke by prohibiting smoking, including the use of electronic smoking devices, and tobacco use on University of Hawai'i premises.

"Tobacco use continues to be the single most preventable cause of death and disability in Hawai'i as well in the United States. Cigarette smoking alone is responsible for more deaths than HIV/AIDS, alcohol, motor vehicle crashes, homicide, suicide, and illegal drugs combined. The growing popularity of electronic smoking devices is a public health concern. Sales have doubled each year since 2008.

"Tobacco-free college and university campuses present an opportunity to protect over 20,000,000 people across the country from the effects of smoking. As of January 2017, nearly 1,500 colleges and universities nationwide have adopted a completely tobacco-free policy and many colleges and universities are also including electronic smoking devices in their campus-wide bans. Smoke-free campuses also increase productivity and decrease sick time, decrease employee health care costs, and decrease the risk of fire. University of Hawai'i at Mānoa has asked us to help establish a smoke-free policy at their campuses.

"This measure will also demonstrate Hawaii's continued commitment to health. It is in line with previous legislation enacted to restrict smoking at Department of Education schools and facilities as well as hospitals of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation.

"I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 134."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Thank you; in support with a reservation and a brief comment: I’m supportive of this to the extent that it’s a public place and of the public health policies and such; as you will see later, I oppose when we go into private places and mandate these things. My reservation is that I do think it would be appropriate to have designated areas for people who would like to smoke. So I’m a little concerned it’s a little over-sweeping but support it with reservations. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634 was adopted and S.B. No. 134, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Gabbard, Kim, Riviere, Taniguchi, Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 636 (S.B. No. 332, S.D. 1):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 636 be adopted and S.B. No. 332, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I stand in strong support of S.B. 332, S.D. 1, Relating to Notaries Public.

“Currently, Hawai‘i notaries are required to accept Limited Purpose Drivers Licenses (LPDL). This type of identification does not comply with the REAL ID Act, meaning it does not meet the federal standards to board a plane. Without a REAL ID for verification, unscrupulous individuals can more easily commit fraud

“Notaries act in an official capacity to verify the identity of an individual through their ID. It is important that our laws help them to carry out their duties.

“Notaries need to know the identification they are reviewing meets the same federal standards of the REAL ID Act. Subsequently using a REAL ID compliant driver’s license will lessen the possibility of fraudulent documentation and thus help to create a more trustworthy transaction.

“I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 332, S.D. 1. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 636 was adopted and S.B. No. 332, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NOTARIES PUBLIC,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 638 (S.B. No. 849, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 638 be adopted and S.B. No. 849, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I understand the need for taking a look at this, and I think the amendments that were made in the Senate do improve the bill. I guess I have reservations on a couple of issues. One, as I pointed out to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, I

would feel much more comfortable about passing this measure if they were providing more homesteads to people, because we have such a huge number of people on the waitlist. But the other is, I’m concerned about the timing of bringing this matter to Congress were it to pass, because we would have to have congressional approval since it’s related to the federal law. And given what’s going on in the United States Congress, I’m not sure that this is a good time to be bringing this measure forward. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele requested that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kahele’s remarks read as follows:

“This bill will address a longstanding issue in our Native Hawaiian community that addresses successorship and one’s ability to pass on land leased by Native Hawaiians to their children, grandchildren or great-grandchildren that have less than the required one-fourth blood quantum for successorship. If this bill becomes law, it will convey to the United States Congress, Hawai‘i’s commitment to prevent the ejection of families from Hawaiian Homesteads that they have occupied for generations. This issue is an indigenous rights issue that must be resolved as it has become apparent that under the current law, it has become increasingly difficult for Native Hawaiians to inherit land access. The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was a step in the right direction, however the inclusion of blood quantum as a requirement for qualification as well as succession, set into motion the issues that we are dealing with today. For these reasons, I urge my colleagues to support this bill and to send a message to the United States Congress that the State of Hawai‘i is committed to working with Native Hawaiians and their families to return them, as well as keep them, on the land that was legally theirs to begin with.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 638 was adopted and S.B. No. 849, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 672 (S.B. No. 898, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Keith-Agaran, seconded by Senator Rhoads and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 672 was adopted and S.B. No. 898, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS OWNED, POSSESSED, OR CONTROLLED BY PERSONS WHO POSE A SERIOUS RISK OF VIOLENCE OR HARM TO PUBLIC SAFETY,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Gabbard, Harimoto, Riviere). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 676 (S.B. No. 419, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 676 be adopted and S.B. No. 419, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Espero rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’m a supporter of the military; my son’s a captain in the Marine Corps. But we shouldn’t be connecting Military Selective Service to a person’s education and a person’s career and a person’s future, and that’s what this bill does. If someone is a pacifist, if someone is a conscientious objector, and if they

do not participate in the Military Selective Service, we're telling them, 'We're not going to let you have an education in our state institutions, our community colleges.' I think – the way I read this – too, school for adults, and I believe I would like to ask that you reject this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 676 was adopted and S.B. No. 419, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SELECTIVE SERVICE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, 3 (Espero, Taniguchi, Thielen).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 (S.B. No. 1105, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Keith-Agaran, seconded by Senator Tokuda and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 was adopted and S.B. No. 1105, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 692 (S.B. No. 663):

On motion by Senator Tokuda, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 692 was adopted and S.B. No. 663, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Riviere).

S.B. No. 151, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 151, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"My opposition relates to the part where we're going in and telling people what can or cannot be allowed in their private residence, so thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"This measure clarifies that condominium associations may prohibit smoking inside a unit as part of a rental lease agreement. This also allows the condo associations to prohibit smoking on the lanai of a condo unit and in all common areas. This is really designed to mitigate secondhand smoke. As we know, any of our buildings are not a hundred percent airtight, and if you are actually renting out a unit and allowing smoking, you have much less control over the tenant than owners when they have taken part in banning these things in their own areas.

"Secondhand smoke, I would remind my colleagues, is linked to many adverse health effects, including heart disease, stroke, and lung cancer. Children can suffer even more health problems when exposed to secondhand smoke. Our public housing in Hawai'i already benefits from smoke-free multi-housing policies, but these protections do not extend to the private sector. This measure provides protections against secondhand smoke to residents of affordable and market-rate housing, the condominiums. It is essential that we ensure the health and safety of nonsmokers who live in these multi-unit residences; I am one of them. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Just a quick note to point out that more people die from secondhand cigarette smoke every year than die from traffic accidents. This is not a minor public health issue, and it's certainly a problem in condos where you share air handling systems. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 151, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUMS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I understand and am sympathetic to the challenges of managing state land. I just think we need to work on this bill as it moves forward because, as we've seen more and more development around our islands, our oceans and shores are cut off from public access. Our mountain areas are cut off from public access as a lot of land is gated. And what we've found is, by default, a lot of the state lands are often the only access that people have to these areas. So I think we need to improve and tailor this measure. The way it reads right now, it looks like a state agency can create a criminal trespass simply by posting a sign, so there really is no public notice, no public discussion. I think we need to have those discussions to make sure that we can craft no trespass areas in a way that people can still access these important resources. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 895, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL TRESPASS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 731 (S.B. No. 510, S.D. 2):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 731 be adopted and S.B. No. 510, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Tokuda.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“This measure will formally establish the Hawai‘i Keiki: Healthy and Ready to Learn program by providing funding as well as set up formalized coordination between the Department of Health and Department of Human Services to increase communication and success of comprehensive school-based health services.

“You know, education does not start in the classroom: Education begins with an individual who is able and ready to learn. Study after study shows that healthy students perform better across the curriculum. Healthy students are overall happier, attend school regularly, have fewer absences and discipline referrals, and have higher test scores, according to the Alliance for a Healthier Generation.

“The Hawai‘i Keiki program will formally be established through this piece of legislation. Partially in progress by way of Act 139, there is a successful partnership between the DOE and the UH Mānoa School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene, which has helped to establish community organization partnerships that have matched state funding. DOE has implemented software to report in real time on health services through complex areas. School wellness programs have been expanded; sports physicals are provided as needed; vision screenings and glasses have been provided to those in need. Nationally-certified school nurses are now in Hawai‘i schools, and UH Mānoa nursing students are in schools to assist, increasing the activities and information available to school health academics.

“Now, that list, I think, is certainly noteworthy, but you may ask, what about the education component? More importantly, there are increased attendance rates and decreased early dismissal rates. That means that students are staying in school, where they’re learning, growing, and thriving.

“With this type of success, we should continue to support our keiki, and this measure will help to expand these services by implementing the Hawai‘i Keiki program statewide in 15 DOE complex areas and pilot it in 2 charter schools. It will build school-based oral hygiene services and sealant programs, which is another way that we can address the poor dental health of the keiki in our State, and ensuring eye assessment software is forever in place in all of our schools. Now, it’s kind of hit-and-miss, depending on whether there is a Lions Club or a Rotary Club that has taken this up. It also establishes coordinator positions between the Department of Health, Department of Human Services to work with the DOE and UH Mānoa School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene.

“You know, student success really demands a healthy mind and a healthy body. They need to be able to focus on academics, not hunger. Fifty percent of public school students receive free or reduced-price meals. They don’t need to focus on tooth pain – we all know that Hawai‘i’s children rank worst in the nation in dental health. Students need to be able to see in order to learn the alphabet, the building blocks of reading and writing. Students need to be immunized in order to prevent communicable diseases that can have long-term effects on health and education. By creating this permanent structure and long-term means for success, we are ensuring that our children will be more successful in school, which is where they build the tools they need for a successful life.

“The more affluent a child’s family and community, in general, the greater likelihood that child will succeed academically. Through this bill, we’re ensuring that **all** students are healthy and **all** students are ready to learn from the moment they come to school, no matter what their socioeconomic background, because learning can’t take place unless body health is addressed. This measure, I believe, will have long-term positive effects, not only for our keiki and their families, but our communities, where students will one day live and work. I urge all of my colleagues to join me in showing our keiki how important their health and their education is to us and our State by voting ‘yes’ on Senate Bill 510 and supporting the Hawai‘i Keiki: Healthy and Ready to Learn program. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani rose in strong support of the measure and requested that the remarks of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only).

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 762 be adopted and S.B. No. 403, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in support of S.B. 403, S.D. 2, Relating to Health Insurance.

“This bill ensures certain benefits under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) are preserved under Hawai‘i law.

“The Affordable Care Act of 2010 resulted in an estimated 20,000,000 Americans gaining health insurance coverage. The federal Department of Health and Human Services reported that since the enactment of the Affordable Care Act, 54,000 residents of Hawai‘i have gained health insurance coverage. In addition to those residents who would otherwise be uninsured, hundreds of thousands of Hawai‘i residents with employer, Medicaid, individual market, or Medicare coverage have also benefited from new protections under the Affordable Care Act.

“If ACA were to be repealed, it would have detrimental effects on people in Hawai‘i. According to recent data from the Urban Institute, by 2019, 86,000 fewer people in Hawai‘i would have health insurance. Hawai‘i would suffer a loss of \$47,000,000 in federal marketplace spending, with a loss a potential loss of if \$532,000,000 between 2019 and 2028. Without an adequate replacement for ACA, the welfare of many people in Hawai‘i will suffer.

“This measure helps to protect the healthcare of those who will be affected by a repeal of the Affordable Care Act by:

- Requiring all health insurers to include ten essential health care benefits, plus coverage of contraception and breastfeeding necessities;
- Preserving the individual health insurance mandate for taxpayers;
- Extending dependent coverage through age 26;
- Prohibiting exclusions for preexisting conditions (which could include pregnancy); and

- Prohibiting premium or contribution rates based on gender.

"If we allow people to lose health care coverage, it is not just their own well-being that will be affected. We will place further strain on our state health systems and rob our communities of healthy, productive, contributing residents.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 403, S.D. 2."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"This one is a little harder to go after because I understand the situation of children in a car with their parents. But my principles dictate that I have to stand strong for people's rights and parents' rights in their private places, so for those reasons I must oppose this bill. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I sympathize with my colleague from Hale'iwa's feelings, and I think a lot of times I would vote either 'with reservations' or 'no' for the individual rights. But I think, in this situation, what's interesting is this measure has been a top choice for the youth conference for many years, and what they're asking for is an ability to say to their parents in the car, you know, 'Stop smoking.' Youth are at such a disadvantage to the parents. We also want to make sure that they participate in the political system, and so I think for us to be able to pass one of their top priorities, to put them in a situation – being in the driver's seat for a change and being able to tell the parents what their preference is for their health – but also to help them participate in government and governance issues. I'd like to see the measure pass for those reasons. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I have some written remarks that I would like to have inserted into the Journal, but I'd also ask that the Clerk incorporate the remarks of the senator from Kailua and Waimānalo into the Journal as if they were my own as well." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 261, S.D. 1, relating to the statewide traffic code.

"S.B. 261, S.D. 1 prohibits smoking in a vehicle in which a person under the age of 18 is present. This bill also requires the Department of Health to report on the enforceability and coordination of data collection efforts of the respective law enforcement agencies.

"Secondhand smoke can cause heart disease, lung cancer, and stroke in people of all ages. In children, it can also cause ear infections, more frequent and severe asthma attacks, respiratory infections, and a greater risk for sudden infant death syndrome.

"Exposure to secondhand smoke is more concentrated in vehicles due to the confined, enclosed space. Even with the windows down, secondhand smoke in a car causes the air to be many times more toxic than what the Environmental Protection Agency considers to be hazardous air quality.

"Smoke-free vehicle policies ensure that clean air is maintained in the vehicle while children are inside. We need to ensure the health and safety of our children.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this legislation and ask for a yes vote on S.B. 261, S.D. 1. Mahalo."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you. I have some remarks in support of this measure, which we consider a work in progress, and I'd like to have them inserted into the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's additional remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of S.B. 1312, S.D. 1, Relating to Licensure of Midwives.

"The purpose of this measure is to establish mandatory licensing for certified midwives and certified professional midwives in Hawai'i and establish the board of midwifery within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to regulate the practice of midwifery by certified midwives and certified professional midwives. Midwives play a vital role in the home childbirth process through their maternity and prenatal services. Although their services can directly affect the health and safety of women and newborns, this is a profession that is not adequately regulated. It is a work in progress.

"In recognition of that impact, the State Auditor recently recommended that every person who provides maternity and prenatal service as a midwife be subject to licensing requirements to protect the health and safety of women and newborns and to ensure that certain minimum standards and qualifications are met. To address the Auditor's concerns, this measure seeks to establish a licensing, regulatory framework for certified midwives and certified professional midwives, based on standards and best practices adopted by the United States Midwifery Education, Regulation and Association coalition. This measure exempts Native Hawaiian healers who are recognized as such by a council convened by Papa Ola Lokahi.

"This measure also establishes a board of midwifery within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. The board enables representatives of the midwifery community to establish a scope of practice and standards for the practice of midwifery in our state. Members of the Board of Midwifery will include one certified nurse midwife, two licensed certified midwives, two licensed certified professional midwives, one traditional Native Hawaiian healer and one public member.

"Public health and safety concerns far outweigh any negative effects arising from regulation, including the resulting restriction on individuals entering the profession of midwifery and any increase in the cost of midwifery services caused by regulation of the profession. Licensure will ensure the necessary health and safety protections for women and their newborns when seeking services for childbirth at home.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure for further consideration by our colleagues in the House."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 813 was adopted and S.B. No. 1312, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LICENSURE OF MIDWIVES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 382, S.D. 2, Relating to the Public Utilities Commission.

"S.B. 382, S.D. 2 makes various updates to the structure and operations of the Public Utilities Commission to increase efficiency, effectiveness, and to restore a more open and democratic process within the PUC. This bill will increase the number of PUC commissioners from three to five members, require at least one commissioner to reside on one of the neighbor islands, and ensure diverse backgrounds are represented on the PUC, especially with respect to educational background. This bill will also update the commission's guiding principles, provide for teleconferencing capabilities, promote diverse training opportunities for members, clarify staffing issues, require a management audit, and provide important transparency via public financial disclosures from key staff members. Finally, this bill will clarify the procedure for replacing a commissioner who has not completed a full term of service, which preserves the Senate's proper role to advise and give consent to the governor's nominations.

"The Public Utilities Commission's primary purpose is to provide effective, proactive, and informed oversight of all regulated companies to ensure these companies efficiently and safely provide their customers with adequate and reliable services at just and reasonable rates, while providing regulated companies with a fair opportunity to earn a reasonable rate of return. Additionally, the Public Utilities Commission is facing increased work complexity and program responsibilities, which go beyond the commission's traditional regulatory role, including in the area of energy regulation. With the advent of new and emerging technology, the market, and other forces, the regulatory landscape throughout the country is rapidly changing. However, the commission's current structure and operations have prevented it from quickly adapting to these changes. It is essential that the structure and operations of the Public Utilities Commission be updated to enable the commission to operate more efficiently and effectively, consistent with best practices. For example, updating the operations of the commission by adopting best practices ensures that the commission functions in a more inclusive and collaborative manner. Updating the structure of the commission

will also be beneficial. Increasing the number of commissioners from three to five promotes diversity and is in line with the number of commissioners in many other jurisdictions. Requiring the commission to be composed of at least one member from a neighbor island and members from fields other than just the legal profession will enable the commission to consider a wider variety of backgrounds, perspectives, and expertise in its deliberations to better serve Hawaii's geographic and demographic diversity.

"Commissions throughout the country are impaneled to provide for collective deliberation, as well as diversified perspective across geopolitical, demographic, professional, and other criteria. A diverse commission and staff can provide a stronger, more robust foundation for decision-making. A commission made up of individuals with diverse educational and geographic backgrounds will have a broader range of knowledge, skills, and abilities than a homogeneous commission.

"As it has been 13 years since the last management audit in 2004, another audit is appropriate. This will ensure that any previously identified issues have been addressed and will also aid in the transition to a more efficient and effective commission.

"The changes to the structure and operation of the PUC in S.B. 382, S.D. 2 are necessary to preserve an effective and democratic body, which will better represent the diverse populations and interests which it is meant to serve. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting these beneficial updates to the Public Utilities Commission and ask for a yes vote on S.B. 382, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 853 (S.B. No. 1016, S.D. 1):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 853 be adopted and S.B. No. 1016, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"About five years ago, we had a rousing debate when I was in the House on this measure. We're talking about exemptions that, at that time, there was a lot of talk about exemptions for a lot of things for government projects. I would note that most of the projects that have been exempted in that bill five years ago still haven't moved. The Department of Transportation always complains that the rules are so onerous, yet when you ask them how that environmental study is coming, and five, six, seven years later, the environmental study is still under work. I don't think they're working as hard as they can to actually follow the environmental laws, so I'm in opposition to this. Thank you."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"The purpose and the intent of this measure is to continue the DOT's efforts to expeditiously rehabilitate bridges under its jurisdiction and, specifically, the measure extends DOT's exemption from certain statutory requirements for specified bridge rehabilitation programs by specifically extending the sunset date of Act 218 to June 2022. The committee finds that this measure will allow DOT to continue accelerating the design and construction of bridges listed in the Act, Session Laws of 2012. And the committee also noted that these projects must continue to comply with all applicable federal laws as this measure does not exempt the bridge projects from these requirements that the committee noted as well. I urge my colleagues to support this measure. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator English rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"You know, where I live, members, there's more than 60-some odd bridges going out to that side. Eight of them are in imminent threat of failure; that means that it could collapse at any moment. Many of the items that are exempted in this bill are actually covered under federal guidelines, and what we tried to do is eliminate the reduplicative efforts that were put into this and created a longer time for the permitting process to go through. But I have to say this, that when we looked at bridges – at least during my time as Transportation chair – that the bridges throughout the State, as a whole, are failing. And if you want a bridge to collapse, kill this bill because this will help the department to speed up, get the bridges fixed, get them moving. If we didn't do the bridge survey and the inventory at the time that we did – this body did this about four years, five years ago – we wouldn't have known this information, and I want to commend the Department of Transportation for looking at all of the bridges, for doing the engineering studies and all of them, and for prioritizing which ones need to be fixed so that we can begin funding them properly. So, members, I ask for your continued support of this measure for all of the bridges in your districts. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I wasn't going to comment, but feel compelled to because of that last comment, that a vote against this measure is a vote to support our bridges collapsing. We have emergency rules; we have things in place that would allow the Department of Transportation to move forward expeditiously. I don't support continuing the exemption because I don't think these rules that are in place for ordinary, non-emergency repairs are what's slowing them down. For those reasons, I oppose the extension. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 853 was adopted and S.B. No. 1016, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

TRANSPORTATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Ruderman). Noes, 3 (Harimoto, Riviere, Thielen).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 861 (S.B. No. 1150, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 861 be adopted and S.B. No. 1150, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Any time we can protect our ocean environment and our marine life, we should do so, and this measure is a good first step in making certain that oxybenzone does not enter our oceans. However, whether it’s this year or next year, I do hope that we may take up the issue of banning the sale of sunscreen which has oxybenzone in the future. Thank you very much.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I also hope we’ll proceed to a ban on the sale of such sunscreens, but meanwhile, I think the objections that have been raised to this bill is it’ll be difficult to enforce, but I believe it’s very valuable nevertheless because even without extreme enforcement measures, most people will obey the law. It’s an opportunity to protect our reefs and to educate each other on which products are appropriate with the ocean. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 861 was adopted and S.B. No. 1150, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESERVING CORAL REEFS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Taniguchi). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 864 (S.B. No. 223, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 864 be adopted and S.B. No. 223, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Tokuda.

Senator Green rose to speak in strong opposition to the measure as follows:

“So this bill is about allowing, on the surface, something fairly innocuous, and I’m sure this is going to hit home, Senate President, to you and me. It’s about prescribing testosterone from naturopathic physicians – physicians who have good training but different training than allopathic physicians or healthcare providers like nurse practitioners or PAs. People think, ‘Oh, it’s just testosterone; how big a deal can that be?’ Well, I don’t know if other people are very studied in this area, but the pathophysiology of testosterone is complicated. Specifically, if you use just testosterone – if you’re a naturopath and you don’t have a full understanding of the issue because you haven’t had pathophysiology training and know that you have to use Arimidex with that medication more often than not, you have a big problem because if you give testosterone to somebody and you haven’t had the training, it does something. If I may, Mr. President: It shrinks your testicles. Now, we are going to pass the ultimate in wedge-issue bills here. If you vote ‘yes’ on this bill, you are voting in support, potentially, of shrinking the testicles of half of your constituents, because the individuals who are asking to prescribe this medication do not know how to use Arimidex. They also don’t know that you need to use growth hormone. I do respect naturopaths, but they have a different scope of practice. This will be dangerous for people; this will mess up their hormones, and people’s testicles will shrink if we pass this bill. I urge you to vote ‘no.’”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 864 was adopted and S.B. No. 223, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Espero, Nishihara, Rhoads, Riviere, Thielen). Noes, 2 (Green, Harimoto).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 866 (S.B. No. 384, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 866 be adopted and S.B. No. 384, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Tokuda.

Senator Green rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Let me first say that I have a great deal of respect for the psychology community and the psychiatry community. I understand that this is a tough call for people because we do have need to provide psychological care, in especially the rural areas.

“I’m standing in opposition to this bill for a different reason. I do feel that the training is not the same for psychiatrists, and that could be debated at great length and has been, so people will vote their conscience, of course, on that. But I’m going to invoke a different story and metaphor on this bill, and I think this hasn’t been adequately discussed, and this comes from a beloved writer, Dr. Seuss. Now, I don’t know how many people are familiar and recall the story about the Star-Belly Sneetches. The Star-Belly Sneetches is a story about social inequities and people trying to one-up one another. In that story, he expressed very eloquently for children and adults across the world, ultimately, that people who try to distinguish themselves within a single community ultimately have two classes, and I feel very strongly that we are going to do great, great damage to the psychology community when we pass this bill.

“When we pass this bill, a small number of psychologists will be able to prescribe pretty significant medications and, like I said earlier, we can debate whether they have adequate training or not. Some of my best friends are psychologists; they are more than talented and very well-trained to do this. Others might not be. I can tell you that I, as a physician, do not prescribe the medications for the most part without getting a psychiatrist to help me, so that’s why I’m voting ‘no.’ I don’t think it’s safe. But I do think, courtesy of Dr. Seuss and his metaphor, we will create this class of people in psychology who think they are better than the other psychologists. We will destroy the reputations, unfairly, of those who choose not to go down the road of getting extra training. We’re making a very large mistake; I don’t think that has often been discussed. I think it’s interesting that this bill has been around for so many years. I would rather see my psychology friends pursue additional medical training if this were going to be the focus of their practice. That’s just my personal feeling, so I’ll vote ‘no’ and I’ll leave it to the rest of you to decide what you think is adequate as far as training for these significant medications.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Like some of the other measures we’re discussing, this has some significant safeguards in it as well as a track record. Psychologists have been prescribing with additional training in the Department of Defense for decades. There have been no concerns about their practice; there have been no harms noted. We also have it in a number of other states, but more importantly, this measure is easing us into the prescribing-by-psychologist by making sure that they have a collaborative relationship with a physician or primary care provider who has the expertise to assist them.

“We don’t have enough psychologists in this state; we don’t have enough psychiatrists in this state. This is a way to try to make sure that, at least in our rural areas, we have choices for people. I have had so many people come up to me and say, ‘I can’t get a psychiatrist to work with my child,’ or ‘My child doesn’t feel the empathy from a psychiatrist that they do from their psychologist.’ Psychologists are trained in slightly different ways in terms of relationship-building and working with their clients, but more importantly, with the provisions in this measure, they will be trained to handle a limited class of psychotropic drugs that can be helpful, but more importantly, if they need to wean somebody off of those medications, they’ll have the knowledge to do it safely.

“I see this as a great opportunity for collaboration and partnership and not the wedge that my colleague from Kona talked about. This is a measure, yes, that has been around. We passed it last year; save for one person in the body behind us, this measure would be law now and we would be seeing great results from more mental health services in many critical areas. I ask my colleagues to join me in voting up on this measure. Mahalo.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“While I share some of the concerns of the opponents to this bill, I want to emphasize that psychologists would have to go through a specific training for a specific formulary; and the bigger issue for me is, in a community like mine, you cannot get an appointment with a psychiatrist. When I said this in a committee last year, one of the advocates gave me a list of 14 psychiatrists who apparently say they’re practicing on the Big Island. I called them – none of them are taking new patients. Most of them live on O’ahu. So we have a situation where you literally cannot get an appointment with a psychiatrist unless you check yourself in to the emergency room, and so the risks of a trained psychologist mis-prescribing are to me much less than the risks of no treatment whatsoever.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 866 was adopted and S.B. No. 384, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY FOR CERTAIN CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGISTS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 2 (Green, Kim).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 869 (S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 869 be adopted and S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’d like to rise in support of this measure, and in support of rail. Thank you. I’d like to, first of all, assume we’re going to pass this and thank you all in advance for passing this measure. I see this, though, as a work in progress. This is about one of the most important issues that we’re going to be taking up in the next few years: transportation and, ultimately, mobility, and tied to the rail is the issue of housing. How we’re going to pay for it, obviously, has been a controversial issue for the last couple years, and I’m hoping that we will be able to – working with our House colleagues – come up with a reasonable plan. I, like many of you, am angry and very unhappy at the overruns in rail, and it is certainly an issue that we need to look at now and in the future. But when you look at our projected population growth being an additional 500,000 residents on O’ahu in the next 50 years, and that figure will double to 2,000,000 residents

on O’ahu, this is about how we’re going to move around people, goods, and services on O’ahu and continue to create a strong, vibrant economy. So, please support this measure and, hopefully, we will have more discussion with the House. Thank you very much.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I rise in support of Senate Draft 2 of this bill. Colleagues, as you know, I voted against the extension of the rail tax two years ago and I voted against the prior versions of this bill, but I want to commend the chair of the Ways and Means committee for the fiscally prudent approach she has taken in this version of the bill. And I wanted to address the comments that were made by the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* criticizing Senate Draft 2. I think the City had initially talked to residents of O’ahu about a public transportation project that was going to cost something around \$3.8 billion. The current estimates for rail is more like \$10 billion, and that is before we get into the most complicated construction portion of the rail. We’ve seen huge cost overruns in the past on contracts, and I think we can anticipate even greater cost overruns on the contracts for the last portion of rail.

“I think it’s prudent for us to stop, reevaluate the project, determine what needs to be done to keep the costs actually under control, and there’s a lot of pressure from people saying, ‘No, no, no, we can’t stop. We have to keep moving forward.’ When I’ve talked to people about why don’t we take a look at the cost of moving rail to grade level, and they say we can’t do that because it’s going to cost \$100 million to do an EIS. Well, a billion dollars is a thousand hundred millions. So, if it costs you a hundred million dollars to go back and do an evaluation that saves you a billion dollars, that is more than worth it. And I think we need to go back to the City at this point and say, ‘Reevaluate,’ because if we push through, what’s to stop the rail cost from ballooning now to \$15 billion, \$20 billion? And then isn’t the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* editorial board going to criticize the Legislature for not asking for us to stop and take a look at it? How are we going to afford to upgrade the water lines and the waste lines and sewers around the rail route to build the housing that we need if we’re going to spend fifteen to twenty billion dollars on rail? We won’t be able to afford both, which is ridiculous. So we do need to take a breather now; we do need to go back and reevaluate the project. I agree, at this point, we need to complete some form of public transportation there, but the question is, how much money are we willing to spend for it? Because if we want to have housing **and** rail, the path we’re on now is not sustainable. So I support Senate Draft 2 and I hope that we do not go back to one of the prior versions. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“May I have the comments from our colleague from ‘Ewa be included as my comments into the Journal, please?” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

“And I urge my colleagues to support this measure as it is a work in progress, and we need to continue the vetting in the House, so I urge the support of my colleagues. Thank you.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Mr. President, for me, this is not about whether or not you’re for rail or against rail. I’ve always supported rail, voted for it on the City Council. Unfortunately, back then, when the federal government was going to pay for 90 percent of it, we were one vote short. However, this measure is how we’re going to fund rail and whether or not the State is obligated to fund rail. We have already given an extension to the City based on what they told us they needed, and now they’re coming in for more

money. The mayor made it seem as though we are obligated to support this and if we don't, then shame on us – then they're going to raise the property taxes and it's going to be all our fault. But if you recall correctly, when the City decided to pass rail, they didn't come to us and ask us whether or not we agreed. They didn't come to us and say whether or not we were going to support rail. They passed rail on their own based on their budget, based on the fact that they could fund and pay for rail. And so why should we feel that we are responsible for whatever shortfalls that they have now?

“In addition, back when I was Ways and Means chair, we offered the City that, if they would let us borrow the bond money – because we had a very bad economy going on at that time – that we would give them back one-and-a-half times whatever we borrowed via bonds and we would extend the rail tax, and at that time, Managing Director Caldwell said, ‘We don't need money. We have enough money, so we don't need for you to do that.’ And he could not guarantee that future councils were going to, in fact, vote to extend the tax for the counties. And so they turned it down.

“So, for those reasons, Mr. President, I support the rail, but I don't necessarily support the funding – **more funding** – of the rail. Thank you.”

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Obviously, this is a topic that's been discussed for years at this stage, and there are a number of problems associated with the project that I'm very unhappy with, having been involved with it from quite a ways back now. I do think that, in the end, there really isn't much of an alternative if the City doesn't manage to finish this project in a way that actually does some good, and if they stop it at Middle Street or at the stadium, it really doesn't do anybody any good – it's a train from nowhere to nowhere which will have cost us \$5 billion and the ridership numbers will be horrible.

“The argument's been made that we should put it at grade; there are a couple problems with that. One is that the federal government hasn't agreed to that. Another problem is that it makes the iwi issue much more salient because you have to put down track on the ground all the way through, whereas if it's elevated, you only have to plop down a column every a hundred feet or a hundred yards – I forget what the distance is, but you can adjust that around the bones of the ancestors. The other problem is, if you put it at grade, it goes much slower: You have to cross traffic; you have to have pedestrians walking out in front of the train, and that slows it down and makes it more dangerous because every time a train hits a car, the train wins. Every time a train hits a person, the train wins. And the other problem is, of course, that this system was going to be cutting-edge in the sense that it was going to be driverless – that's the plan. If you put it back on grade, I don't think a driverless system is really in the offing at that point and that raises the operational costs significantly.

“Finally, I would say that if the city project doesn't work, there's every reason to believe that the State is going to be the entity that people expect to deal with the west side traffic problem; it's not like it's going to go away and right now, of course, the H-1, which is a state highway, is the main artery, and there's just not very many good options for us to go forward as a State to pick up the pieces if the city rail project fails. Mahalo.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I'm in support of this current version, S.D. 2. I think it is the responsible way to go forward. The members will remember two years ago, we were assured by the City that all they needed

was \$910 million and they would have all the contracts let by the following year, and it was all going to be wine and roses – they were going to finally be done. At that time, I was terribly concerned about that commitment to ‘just give us the money and we'll make sure we happen to make it.’ I was one of those who voted against the rail tax two years ago. I cannot support continuous extensions of the rail tax. I would note that the ink wasn't dry, basically, on the City's authorization of the tax extension when, all of a sudden, it mushroomed from \$900 million to \$1.8 billion or whatever it's at now, because it's a moving target. I would note that the mayor casually said, ‘Well, I don't know, \$9.6 billion is the current estimate, but let's just round that up to 10.’ I was at that hearing when he said that, and that alarmed me to no end, that cavalier, ‘Well, let's just round it up \$400 million because I don't know where this is going to stop.’ I would note that the actual cost to the O'ahu residents – if you just do the simple math by the number of residents and the revenues collected thus far – we're on the hook for somewhere in the range of \$32,000 per family if we get out of this at \$10 billion.

“So what I like about this measure is it's holding the County and the mayor and HART accountable; it's making them come forward with a plan that is spelled out. We will remember that the feds have been asking for a recovery plan for a couple years, and every time the recovery plan is, ‘Well, let's just wait six more months,’ ‘Let's wait six more months.’ The recovery plan is due April 30th, which is an interesting and probably not-so-coincidental date. So I like this bill; it takes away the skim, which I always thought was unfair to the County: If the tax is being collected in the county, the money should go to the county. So it solves that problem, and it holds their feet to the fire, and I am in support of this measure as it presently is. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 869 was adopted and S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Kim). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 872 (S.B. No. 249, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Tokuda, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 872 was adopted and S.B. No. 249, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RETIREMENT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 19; Ayes with Reservations (Espero, Ihara, Rhoads). Noes, 5 (Gabbard, Harimoto, Riviere, Taniguchi, Thielen). Excused, 1 (English).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 875 (S.B. No. 658, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 875 be adopted and S.B. No. 658, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“First of all, just to go on record that this bill creates a new governing entity and, in its original form, it was exempt from procurement, which should have been referred to my committee and was not. I certainly appreciate that Ways and Means took out the exemption for procurement.

“However, Mr. President, this measure is troubling because, while I understand some of the issues and concerns raised why we should have an airport authority, the airport has decades of history of problematic operations, lack of transparency, lack of

accountability, questionable procurement practices. We have many projects that have been in litigation; currently, we have the FAST project for \$17 million, \$92 million for the Hawaiian maintenance facility that is currently ongoing and not completed. We have vendors and subcontractors who did not get paid. We had an entity that had to be fired, and so forth and so forth. So, while this measure talks about having this airport authority that would be accountable via board appointments, public meetings, and full transparency, any of you who have had problems with any of our boards and commissions – be it Hawai‘i Tourism Authority, be it Board of Regents, be it the police commission – any boards and commissions where it was difficult to get information, difficult to have accountability by appointees, this would be even worse. There would be no oversight by the State.

“Now, I know some of the other arguments are that many, if not most, of the airports around the country have an independent board. I’d like to remind this body that many of those airports are municipality airports; they’re not state-run, like our school system and our airports. Also, people have a choice: They can drive to another airport; they can take a bus; they can take a train; they can drive; there’s other ways. We are an island; we have one statewide airport, and I think that this is a mistake. It’s going to cost a lot more money; there’s going to be less transparency and less accountability if we move forward on this. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“With regards to creating an airport corporation or authority, all the more reasons we should do that with regards to the comments offered by our colleague of Kalihi. As we moved to hear this measure, we found that the development, management, and the operation of our state airport system is distributed among several state departments, and some of which have conflicting goals and priorities, and this has resulted in delayed decision-making, inefficient control, and airports that require extensive renovation to become world-class facilities. We also found that consolidating the management of the operations of the state airport system into a singular and independent state entity will certainly help maximize the airports’ contribution to the State, improve global access to Hawai‘i, and simplify the process for making improvements to airport infrastructure. I urge my colleagues to please support this measure as we move this measure in the House for continued vetting. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 875 was adopted and S.B. No. 658, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN AIRPORT CORPORATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Chang, Ihara, Riviere). Noes, 3 (Harimoto, Kim, Taniguchi).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 879 (S.B. No. 1290, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Tokuda, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 879 was adopted and S.B. No. 1290, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Baker, Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 881 (S.B. No. 686, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 881 be adopted and S.B. No. 686, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Kidani rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. May I also request permission to speak on Senate Bill 683 at the same time?”

The Chair invited Senator Kidani to proceed with her remarks.

Senator Kidani continued:

“Mr. President and colleagues, I rise in strong support of Senate Bills 683 and 686.

“Senate Bill 683 proposes an amendment to the Hawai‘i State Constitution to allow the State to enact a property tax surcharge on certain residential investment properties and certain visitor accommodations. Assuming approval of the amendment by the voters, Senate Bill 686 **creates** the surcharge. Proceeds would be channeled to our public schools, which are desperately underfunded for the enormity of the responsibility they shoulder.

“Hawai‘i is the only school district in the United States that does not fund education through property taxes and, believe it or not, the property taxes levied by our counties are among the lowest in the country. The surcharge would be levied on residential investment properties, **not** the homes in which we live and for which we receive a homeowner’s exemption, and **not** on the *first additional* residential property a family might own and rent out. This bill was amended by Ways and Means to include only those properties now valued at over \$2 million.

“We have attempted to put the issue of a dedicated source of funding for schools on the table in the past, but without success. The governor tells us his first priority is public education, and in the revised budget he sent us a couple of weeks ago, the biggest cuts he proposed were to the education budget. The cuts are deep; the wounds are lasting.

“For those of you who have voted ‘no’ in committee and will vote ‘no’ again today, I simply ask, if not this measure, then what other measures do YOU propose. If not now, then when? How much longer will we put our keiki’s futures on hold?

“Finally, colleagues, let me remind you that since this is a constitutional amendment, once the bill becomes law, it goes onto the ballot for the **voters** to decide.

“We need more money for public education. This is a means to that end. I ask for your support for our schools, for our students, and for our teachers. Mahalo.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I also would like to speak to both of these measures at once, if I may. I applaud the outside-the-box thinking that has brought this measure before us today because, certainly, that’s what’s needed in this issue. Teachers are a special case in our society; they’re not like every other union or every other function. They play an important and, in fact, crucial role and, without getting into a lot of statistics, when you consider the cost of living in our state, we have the most poorly paid teachers in the nation. And that results in a loss of teachers and a loss of good teachers who have better options or who cannot afford their lives in our state on a public education salary. Our keiki deserve a good education, and to get that, they require good teachers. I also appreciate that this puts the issue before the voters; and finally, if this measure does not succeed, I hope we’ll take this issue as seriously as it deserves and find some other solution for one of the biggest crises facing our state.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“In opposition on these two measures: I think it’s a bad policy decision. I think we’re stomping on the counties’ source of revenue. I worry about mission creep – we say this year we’ll tax only the \$2 million houses and then, once we get going, then next year it’s the \$1 million and then we come down. And I would point out that in the proposal originally submitted, the original version, the median-price home on O’ahu would see an additional – for an investment property – it would see an additional property tax increase of about \$4,300, I believe, which was about \$360 a month to the owner. Now, the owner of an investment property isn’t paying the taxes: The renter is paying the taxes, the person living in the house. And we have a high amount of renters in this state, so the renters are going to be paying this tax. Now, who are these renters? They’re the guys who can’t afford to buy a house; they’re the ones who are working two or three jobs. I know the teachers are working two jobs many times, and I know the teachers are underpaid, and I’ve said this before. My wife is a teacher; my sister’s a teacher, and I have great empathy for the predicament. I believe in supporting our teachers with more pay, but this is a bad policy because it crosses over into an authority.

“And I would remind the members that there is no sacred fund here. We have special funds for this; we have special funds for that; we have a conveyance tax to solve this; we have a barrel tax for that – those monies get sloshed around all over the place. And so, if we were to even go for it and start collecting money from the property tax, I would predict that probably would ease up on funds from somewhere else to use for another purpose. So, the net result – as we’ve seen in other states such as California, which has adopted a lottery to pay for schools – is they use the money from the lottery to pay for the schools, but then they stop funding it in the original sources. So, ultimately, the responsibility is on we, the Legislature, to make the tough calls and prioritize our funds. A more equitable solution would be general excise tax – that’s a hot potato, too; we don’t want to touch that. But the property taxes is the wrong way to go for this, so I’m in opposition. Thank you.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“You know, I feel I need to stand and speak and say why I am voting with reservations, and it’s not because I don’t support our teachers. It’s not because I don’t feel that our teachers should be paid more. I think they do, and it’s our responsibility to do it – from the general fund. Why aren’t we giving our teachers more? Why do they have to resort to out-of-the-box thinking? Why do we have to look at a slippery slope of going down a constitutional amendment, because where does it end? There are so many other entities that will come and say we started this, that they feel that the elderly and the needy and the homeless and so forth all should have these kinds of dedicated funding or amendments made to the constitution. And so I don’t think that this is the way to go.

“I also believe in home rule, and I don’t believe that we should be taking property taxes. The reason why we’re the only state in the nation that doesn’t give property taxes to education is because we have a state-run education system. Unlike every other state in the country, it’s municipalities, and that’s why they get theirs from property taxes. And so I think we need to support the teachers; we need to be able to pay them more, and we should be doing that, but we shouldn’t be using these kinds of methods to do so. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 881 was adopted and S.B. No. 686, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION

FUNDING,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Nishihara, Taniguchi, Thielen, Wakai). Noes, 1 (Riviere).

At 11:53 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:57 a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 882 (S.B. No. 683, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Tokuda, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 882 was adopted and S.B. No. 683, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES VII AND X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO AUTHORIZE THE LEGISLATURE TO ESTABLISH A SURCHARGE ON RESIDENTIAL INVESTMENT PROPERTY AND VISITOR ACCOMMODATIONS TO INCREASE FUNDING FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Taniguchi, Thielen, Wakai). Noes, 2 (Kim, Riviere).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 889 (S.B. No. 518, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 889 be adopted and S.B. No. 518, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 518, S.D. 1, relating to intimate partner violence. This measure requires individuals licensed under the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology to complete a one-time, one-hour training program on intimate partner violence awareness and education.

“Intimate partner violence affects people in every community, regardless of age, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, gender, race, religion, or nationality. It can be difficult, even for family and friends, to recognize the signs of abuse. Professionals working in the grooming and beauty industry have a unique opportunity to recognize signs of abuse in their clients, as the profession requires close physical proximity and often creates an atmosphere of trust.

“Requiring a one-time, three-hour training program on intimate partner violence will give these professionals the tools to recognize the signs of intimate partner violence and potentially direct their clients to much-needed resources for help. The course will help licensees understand the dynamics of abuse and the barriers faced by survivors, which will help to cultivate empathy and compassion.

“I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 518, S.D. 1. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 889 was adopted and S.B. No. 518, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Harimoto, Ihara, Riviere). Noes, 1 (Kim).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 893 (S.B. No. 1129, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 893 be adopted and S.B. No. 1129, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure with strong reservations as follows:

“Mr. President, this is landmark legislation. I commend the chairs of Consumer Protection and Judiciary and their teams for doing a ton of hard work. It is a great lift; I’ve been there twice. A couple points: I think that this is a law where safety will ultimately be critical, and we see some states across the country embracing death with dignity as the right thing to do for their citizens, and I think we all have very strong philosophical opinions about that one way or another. I can tell you, for one, that I have been a part of the care of dozens of people who have been very near death, and I’ve actually been their provider in a hospice capacity. Hospice is relevant; it is not part of this bill, but it is critically important that we continue to have hospice and palliative care, no matter what we ultimately decide as both the Senate and House. But I have seen people suffer and I’ve seen people get very good services there.

“Going the next step, to death with dignity, is a place that we do have to soul-search. One consideration and concern I have about this measure, and I’m going to take this in two parts, is who the providers will be, ultimately – whether they’ll be a physician like myself or a nurse practitioner. We passed very important legislation over the past several years to allow nurse practitioners to serve as primary care providers, and I think that was smart, I really do. I think that they provide extraordinary care. But many nurse practitioners are only out of practice one or two years and they’ll have the capacity to be a part of an end-of-life decision. I think we should be cautious about that. There are 13,500 providers in that space, and this is the ultimate decision. And by the same token, some of my physician colleagues – say, pathologists, for example, or radiologists – may have never presided over end-of-life questions, and I think they would be no more qualified than a nurse practitioner who hadn’t had training or another physician who had not spent time in end-of-life spaces. So I think that is a great concern; I hope that will be taken up going forward.

“A couple of the recommendations that I would make would be the following, should this bill have further discussion in the House or in conference committee: One, I think that, as we look at who the providers should be for this most important legislation to make sure no one suffers, I think we should make sure that after they’ve seen their primary care provider – whether that’s a nurse practitioner, who are excellent, or a primary care physician like a family practice doctor – I think that the second provider should definitely be a licensed physician who practices in a relevant specialty to that person who has terminal disease. I think we have a little bit of language work to do right there, and I do appreciate the Judiciary chair, who has been thinking very hard about that language. That is something I think we should clarify.

“A second change I think that we really need to make, and I will hearken back to another controversial issue, which is the prescription medical marijuana for pain management. In that case, in a space for prescribing or delivering what was a controversial substance, a controlled substance, we had the NED, our Narcotics Enforcement Division, spend some focus on our narcotics enforcement licenses. Here’s one of my old ones [*holds up license*]; you can see that there’s a space down here – if you want to be a part of the medical marijuana program, you just designate that. You say that I will be a prescriber of medical marijuana certificates, and the reason I say that is, I think we would be wise to do the same thing for people who want to participate as providers for death with

dignity. It’s obviously more significant – people we’ve prescribed 75 Seconal pills, or pentobarbital, which will absolutely kill you. So I think that makes sense.

“And, finally, I think that there should be some further discussion on how we hold providers accountable for the end-of-life decision that occurs. I think that it would be wise for us over time to find the effort, the additional effort – though much great effort has been put into this measure – to make sure that, notwithstanding any other consideration, we’re very intellectually honest as healthcare professionals about why people die. If people die of a medication overdose, intentional, or medically assisted death, I think we should be brave. I think we should take that issue head-on; I think we should be honest about how we describe a person’s death. I think that should be part of the public health question; I think it should be part of people’s medical record. I know that it’s controversial and scary for a lot of people, but if we’re going to be brave and pass death with dignity, I think we should be brave on behalf of all of our patients, all of our providers, and all of our constituents. I hope we’ll make some of these necessary changes in the months to come. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, this is really about individual choice. That’s really what it comes down to, because it’s an individual with a terminal illness, giving them the ability to take control of a part of their life that is as important to them as the growing-up, maturing, and aging. It really is about choice. It’s the ultimate choice. While it does create a regulatory process for adult residents in Hawai‘i who have medically confirmed terminal illnesses to obtain prescriptions for medication to end that patient’s life, it puts that control in the hands of that patient. If they want to be surrounded by loved ones, celebrating those last breaths, that’s their choice. If they don’t want to be in a hospice facility, medicated and without control, that’s their choice as well. We’re not saying that hospice is wrong – I think hospice does a wonderful job, but it may not be right for everyone. I know, when my time comes, I want to have that choice. Would I be like some who say, ‘I have that control, but maybe I’m not going to use it.’? That’s their choice as well, and we have provisions in this measure to actually allow those drugs to be taken back. But that’s the ultimate choice: How are we going to meet our maker? How are we going to go forward with that next phase of our existence? But if we can do it with assistance and with loving care, we’re going to be much more at peace with ourselves, I believe, and clearly that was the testimony that our committee heard.

“This measure is indeed modeled after Oregon’s Death with Dignity Act, which has been in effect for over 20 years. It was enacted during a time when no other state authorized the medical practice of aid in dying. It’s really not about the physician; it’s about the patient. During the two decades in which the law has been in place, there have been no cases of abuse. Six other states plus the District of Columbia have recently passed a similar law, indicating the growing support for aid in dying across the country. The public opinion of aid in dying in Hawai‘i reflects this national trend. A poll in December of 2016 indicated that 80 percent of Hawai‘i voters support aid in dying. Support for aid in dying is strong in all categories of age, gender, ethnicity, religion, and island of residence; it’s not an isolated support. Currently, our statutes lack any kind of regulated process for medical aid in dying, leaving terminally ill patients without complete and consistent access to end of life resources. Medical aid-in-dying laws, such as those in Oregon, California, Colorado, Vermont, and Washington, are based on the concept that the terminally ill should have the ability to make reasoned end-of-life decisions and choose to end life in a peaceful and humane manner, not starving to death and unable



to care for themselves. Remember, this is only for competent, able-minded individuals, and that is one of the safeguards that's in here.

"We received lots of support from all sectors of the State from all kinds of individuals, from the LGBT Caucus of the Democratic Party to the Chamber of Commerce for Persons with Disabilities to the Hawai'i Death with Dignity Society and many, many others. Over 200 individuals and more came to the Capitol to weigh in, and all of these testimony reinforced – even the ones who didn't support the measure – it reinforced, to us, the importance of autonomy, control, and choice for terminally ill patients in deciding just how much pain and suffering they're willing to endure.

"As I said, Senate Bill 1129, Senate Draft 2 – and I want to thank my colleagues on the Judiciary and Labor committee for their contributions to this measure because it includes the same strict safeguards and reporting requirements as the Oregon law, requiring the attending provider to inform terminally ill adults about other end-of-life options, including comfort care, hospice care, pain control; requiring a second provider to confirm the terminal prognosis and mental capacity; and requiring the terminally ill adult to make two verbal and one written request signed by two witnesses. In keeping with the overarching theme of choice, this measure clearly states that a qualified patient may rescind a request at any time and in any manner. Furthermore, providers may not write a prescription for medication under this measure without offering a qualified patient the opportunity to rescind.

"The terminally ill person's end of life choices are, colleagues, very deeply personal and private matters that should be left to the patient, the patient's family, the patient's attending provider. Accordingly, this measure permits mentally capable, terminally ill adults in Hawai'i to have the choice and the autonomy to make informed decisions regarding their end-of-life care. And with regard to advanced practice registered nurses, they are already part of our end-of-life care by being able to certify orders not to resuscitate, our POLST orders. So I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this very compassionate bill, medical aid in dying, allowing their death certificate to note what the underlying illness was and not to create a legal cloud by saying that it was physician- or provider-assisted suicide. I believe that providing these medical death and dying options for terminally ill individuals is the most compassionate choice we can provide to them, and I ask my colleagues to join me in voting 'yes' on this measure. Mahalo."

Senator Nishihara rose in support of the measure, requesting that the remarks of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only).

Senator Keith-Agaran requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, in support of the measure. I appreciate the comments and work on this measure by the chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Health, and the thoughtful concerns expressed this morning by the chair of the Human Services Committee, and the heartfelt and profound concerns presented by my other colleagues. The Senate Draft 2 builds on the work of the prior committee and discussion and debates in prior session. For all of us, this bill implicates intimate personal issues and calls on all of us to consider our personal views and beliefs about life and faith and suffering, and this was reflected in many pieces of testimony submitted to the two committees considering this measure.

"Mr. President, this is a measure that we have considered in a very serious fashion. It includes important safeguards against misuse, coercion, or collusion. In reviewing and working on this measure, my aim was to ensure that it is consistent and clear when it comes to setting out procedures and safeguards.

"This bill applies only to persons with a terminal disease and a prognosis of no longer than six months to live. That medical prognosis must be confirmed separately by at least two medical professionals who are qualified to treat the patient's particular terminal disease.

"In order to address concerns expressed by committee members that the two medical professionals—again, who would both be qualified and trained to treat the patient's particular terminal illness—might be acting in concert or otherwise exerting undue influence over each other, the Senate Draft 2 added the important safeguard that they have no previously practiced together with respect to the same patient (Section -1, p. 3, lines 16-18).

"Further, the bill includes safeguards to ensure that the patient is mentally and psychologically able to make an informed decision. If either the attending provider or the consulting provider believe the patient may be suffering from a psychiatric or psychological disorder, or a depression causing impaired judgement, then the patient must be referred to counseling and is explicitly prohibited from receiving life-ending medication with the disorder or depression continues to exist. (Section -6, p. 11, SD2)

"This measure also requires the attending provider to ensure that the patient is making an informed decision, including a requirement that the attending provider explain to the patient that alternatives such as palliative care, hospice care and pain control may be feasible. (Section -4, p. 8 SD2)

"The attending provider is also required by this statute to recommend that a patient notify next of kin of the patient's decision to request life-ending medication. (Section -8, p. 12, SD2)

"Your Committee on Judiciary and Labor also strengthened and updated the safeguards in this measure by further limiting one of the persons who may serve as a witness to a person with no interest in the patient's estate under any trust document, in addition to no interest under a will or by operation of Hawai'i's inheritance law.

"Finally, the bill includes two waiting periods in the statute, that the patient may rescind a request at any time, and that the patient is of course under no obligation to take the medication. The bill provides that the attending provider must explicitly remind the patient that he or she always has an opportunity to rescind the request.

"In sum, this statute presents a valuable legal option to persons of sound mind who wish to deal personally with the final stage of their terminal illness in a manner that affords them comfort and dignity. It is a bill that requires all of us to vote based on our own conception of the value of life and suffering and even our ultimate ends."

Senator Green rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President; just a couple of follow-up comments. So, I understand that we often seek all the input we can on passing bills. In this particular case, though, I have to say I have some umbrage with citing a poll about what we should do on a life-and-death issue. I think we should always represent all of our people and the majority; this is an interesting issue, though. To say we've polled it and therefore suggest, 'Vote for it because large numbers of people are in favor of it, and fear your re-election,' or I don't know what, I

think is a grave mistake because, in this particular issue, there is no going back. Now, I'm, as I said earlier, going to vote in favor with reservations, but I should point out a couple things. We represent not only the 70 or 80 percent of people, I guess, as it was spoken about, who may support this issue – depending on how the question was raised – in the State of Hawai'i or across the country. We also represent the 25 or more percent people who have concerns about this.

“There is no perfect safeguard on this measure, and let me tell you why. Controlled substances get into the community. We know already that 50 percent of all the narcotics that result in overdose in our State of Hawai'i come off of the shelves of people who had them legitimately prescribed to them by nurse practitioners and doctors. We see abuse because of that. We see overdose, as we've spoken about over and over and over again on this floor. Let me give you some facts: 36 percent of people who have been prescribed death-with-dignity medications, barbiturates – which will kill you straight out – 36 percent will not take those medications. They will be sitting on people's shelves indefinitely if they haven't taken them. And I take to heart the peace of mind in case someone's suffering and they have not yet chosen to end their life. Those pills will end up in the hands of some teens and other family members and stolen and be on the black market – where they cost as much as \$5,000 – where they will be sold for profit. We already also have another fact to consider, which is, we have twice the national rate of suicide. You want to commit suicide, this is the way to do it. Taking 35 to 40 Seconals will kill you, with alcohol. Taking 75 by prescription will absolutely kill you.

“Now, I support people's right to die, should they choose it. I say we should put every possible safeguard for the 2 or 22 or 32 percent of people who are worried; or the people who are worried about their teen children; or worried about their loved one who, after they've died, may be depressed and take the other half of the pills. This is a very serious issue that cannot be polled, that cannot be pushed down a policy road without every last precaution. Please – as you go forward with this very progressive piece of legislation – please exercise the greatest caution, take the most time you possibly can in these hundred days to do all that we can to protect not only the rights of the individuals who choose death with dignity, but also their loved ones around them and our society around all of us. Thank you, members.”

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Mr. President, colleagues, while I realize many of you have made up your mind on this issue, I feel compelled to share with you a chance encounter I had yesterday after caucus, in Kapolei, at all places, Costco. I was in the parking lot, getting ready to leave, and I heard a voice from someone parked next to me that said, ‘Senator Gabbard, could I have a few minutes of your time?’ And I said, ‘Yeah, sure,’ and it was a guy, who introduced himself as Louie; and in the course of our conversation, he told me that he has pancreatic cancer, stage IV, and had been given a year to live. And he had been following S.B. 1129 ever since it came on the public square and the public scene. And one of the things that he said right off the bat was that the thing that he was pissed off about was this whole idea of choice, the ultimate choice – that he feels like he's got the ultimate choice. When he decided to do some research, he went online and he googled, ‘What is the easiest way, the fastest way I can commit suicide?’ And he made a choice, talked it over with his family, and the family is actually, if that time comes, if he makes that choice, the family decided they were going to have a big going-away party and then he was going to go into the room by himself and ... leave his body. So that was the thing that he was really angry about, that somehow, he was being denied this choice. The second thing he said was, he

could not even consider going to his family doctor, who he considers part of his family, and asking him to be a part of him committing suicide. So he said, ‘That's not even on the table.’ So I would ask that you – you may not have thought of that point of view – but I would ask that you take that into consideration as you deliberate on this very important bill. Mahalo.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I think many of us here do support having the choice to end a life with dignity as opposed to some other means that may leave a very traumatic situation for your family to clean up. So to have the ability to go to a doctor is something that I think a lot of us do support. But I think many of us felt concerned about the bill that was initially introduced by some of the advocates and the claim that we didn't need safeguards because in Oregon, there'd been 20 years of history. And I know I was not comfortable with taking the bill without safeguards. So the introducer of this measure followed what was done in Oregon, but after some public discussion and public hearing, the first committee did amend the bill to strengthen those safeguards and address some of those concerns. And there was continued discussion and email. I sat on the second committee, and it was one of the better discussions I've heard at the committee level between the chair and the members to really address some of the concerns that some of the members had and to further strengthen the bill. I think we should be open as the bill continues, if it passes today and goes through the House, to continue to address and strengthen the bill. And I think it's important that we listen with an open mind when these issues are raised.

“One of the things I liked about the states where they do have this option is that when the public is surveyed, they have a deeper understanding of end-of-life choices, including hospice, including palliative care, so that many of them who don't take advantage of the death with dignity do take advantage of these other options, so they don't have to suffer needlessly. These are conversations that many families avoid because they're very difficult conversations. We shouldn't stunt the conversation in the Legislature because that's part of the process of the general public understanding that it's important to talk about these end-of-life situations with your family – what are your preferences? In many cases, family members who may want to exercise this option won't have it available to them because, at the end of their life, they're not conscious, and it's going to leave the rest of us to understand what it was they wanted and to make those decisions.

“It's important that we foster and support the conversations, and so while I don't agree with many of the amendments or ideas that are raised by the senator to my right, I support his right to raise them, and I think we need to treat those concerns with dignity ourselves and to consider them. I encourage House members to move this measure forward, to engage in that discussion and conversation at the House level. While I don't think it's just a popular vote, I do think it's important that so many people do want to have this option available to them, and I think it's important that we continue this conversation in our state and have our residents prepared for end of life, because the one thing that is certain is every single one of us is going to die. Every single one of our family members and loved ones is going to die. And we need to appreciate each other and respect each other while we're alive, but also to be prepared, so that we can meet the end in a way that we each would prefer. Thank you.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I just want to thank the Judiciary chair for considering amendments and safeguards that I requested, and because of that, I can vote for it with reservations. Thank you.”

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“So, Mr. President, I have strong opposition to this bill, and I won’t go through the many reasons why I oppose it, but I just would like to explain what’s in my heart, because this is such an emotional and personal issue.

“First, there’s the foundation of my personal belief that life is a precious gift. No matter how bad things may seem to be, that sense of hope in our hearts keeps us all going, and unexplainable miracles happen. Second, we have already-legal compassionate choice to discontinue life-prolonging measures such as medication, ventilators, dialysis, feeding tubes, chemo – you know, the list goes on and on. Third, people today already have the choice to end their own lives and, sadly, this happens far too often. But they make that choice on their own and they do it by themselves; no doctor is involved. I cannot, in good conscience, vote to allow physicians to become complicit in their patient’s suicide. It is a misplaced sense of compassion to allow doctors to become agents of death.

“But most importantly, I’d like to relate my personal experience that makes me so strongly opposed to this bill. Mr. President, I don’t know how many of us sitting here today in this chamber have stared death in the face; I have. In June of 2015, I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. I thought my life was over. I knew that pancreatic cancer is one of the most deadly forms of cancer, with a very low survival rate. I knew people who died within a few months or just a few weeks after being diagnosed, and they suffered so much. And I knew that once pancreatic cancer spreads, it’s terminal. So a month later, in July, further tests confirmed that my cancer had spread to my right lung. I was devastated, and I broke down and cried, thinking that I would die soon.

“I’m sure that if I chose to not suffer through the surgeries and treatments, I would have been given just a few months to live. But after much prayer, my wife and I decided to have faith; I chose to fight for my life with every ounce of energy I had. I chose to have surgery to remove the cancerous part of my lung to prevent further growth and spread of that mass. After the surgery, the pathology report on the removed part of my lung showed that the tissue was not cancer, after all. Doctors had no explanation, but I know that it was the miracle that we had been praying for: Miracles do happen.

“I then chose to undergo major surgery to cut out everything that could possibly be cut out from my abdomen in an attempt to remove all the cancer. My surgeon said that this is one of the most complicated surgeries there is. It would be a six-hour surgery if all goes well. She said that cutting everything out is the easy part; reconnecting the remaining parts together so everything works properly is the hard part. The mortality rate of this surgery is high, and there is a large risk of major complications. I was wheeled into the operating room not knowing if I would die on the operating table. If I survived, I didn’t know what condition I would be in, but I chose to live. When I woke up, I gave thanks to God. My recovery in the hospital was slow and painful. I was suffering so much that at one point, when I couldn’t take it anymore, I just cried out to God to take me home. I just wanted it all to end. But with my wife at my side, reading scriptures of healing and faith, I eventually came to my senses. I wanted to live.

“Thinking back on this experience, I wonder what anyone who is given six months or less to live would do with those

pills. It would be too easy and tempting in a moment of weakness and despair to reach for those pills to end it all. I’m just glad I didn’t have those pills when I was suffering so much.

“The surgeon cut out half my pancreas; a third of my stomach; the first section of my intestines; removed my gall bladder, bile duct, and some lymph nodes. Recovery was slow and painful. I had a feeding tube sticking out of my abdomen that remained in me for more than a year that I used for nutrition because my digestive system was not working. Some cancer near an artery could not be removed, and the cancer would grow back without further treatment. After recovering sufficiently from the surgery, I endured six months of weekly chemo followed by two months of daily radiation and chemo. It made me so sick and weak and with extreme fatigue, and sometimes my mind was in such a fog that I had difficulty comprehending what was going on. This was eight months of suffering and pure torture, but I chose to live. It is a miracle that I am still alive today.

“After nearly two years of suffering so much in the hospital and with many trips to the ER and stays in the hospital, I’m now in remission and feeling good again. However, my doctors warn me that pancreatic cancer is aggressive and tends to recur. If the cancer returns, I will continue to fight with all I have and never give up, but my faith and my doctors will keep me going. Physicians must not be allowed to assist in causing their patient’s death.

“And I’d like to end by telling you about Charlie Wedemeyer, a sports legend from Hawai’i. Charlie was diagnosed with ALS and given just one year to live. As his condition deteriorated to a point where he was kept alive through machines, he continued to have faith and chose life. This past Sunday, coincidentally, his wife, Lucy, told us in church that when things got really bad, Charlie continued to keep on going. Lucy recalled that one of the times when it appeared that he was near death, the doctors put a ‘Do not resuscitate’ on him, thinking that it was best to just let him go. But Charlie and Lucy chose life. Originally given one year to live, Charlie persevered and endured the pain and suffering with ALS for 34 years, finally passing away in 2010. During those 34 years, Charlie touched thousands of lives, and his story of choosing life and enduring pain and suffering continues to give hope and inspiration to millions.

“How sad it would have been if Charlie chose to take those pills to end his life when he was suffering so much and appeared to be at death’s door 34 years ago. And I would not be standing here today if, in my moment of despair, suffering so much and with the grim prognosis of pancreatic cancer, that I took those pills. Because I stared death in the face two years ago, and I still face the prospect of the cancer returning, I see very clearly that life is so precious. We should be making laws to give people a sense of hope, not making laws that allow physicians to assist in death. So, Mr. President, I will be voting ‘no.’ Thank you.”

The Chair stated:

“Before calling the vote, I think each one of you sitting in your chairs saw exactly what I saw standing up here, and the emotion on the face of each one of the members, and it is clear to me from where I stand that there isn’t a single member here who is taking this decision lightly and has searched their souls in how they’re going to cast their vote. And of that much, I am assured, as we’re going to call for the vote.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 893 was adopted and S.B. No. 1129, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Green, Kim). Noes, 3 (Gabbard, Harimoto, Riviere).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 905 (S.B. No. 221, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 905 be adopted and S.B. No. 221, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand in support of S.B. 221, S.D. 2, Relating to Highway Safety.

"The purpose of this measure is to establish a photo red light imaging detector systems program to improve public safety and enforcement of the traffic signal laws. This bill will allow counties to implement the program, establish a red light running committee to review this act and make recommendations on how to improve it, prior to its implementation. The measure also authorizes that the fines collected under a county's program to be deposited into a general fund account. These funds can then be expended by the county in which the fine was collected for the operation, management and maintenance of the photo red light imaging detector systems program.

"There is a growing prevalence of violations of Hawaii's traffic laws, particularly drivers who run red lights. It has become increasingly common to hear reports of hit-and-run drivers who have run over children or the elderly. These violations endanger the lives of motorists and pedestrians and compound the already hazardous conditions on Hawaii's roads and highways.

"Photo red light imaging detector systems have proven to be effective in identifying and deterring motorists running a red light in other jurisdictions in the United States, in Canada and in countries in Europe and elsewhere. In a 2011 study by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, large cities with long standing red-light camera programs found that the cameras reduced by 24 percent the number of fatal crashes caused by running a red light.

"The photo speed imaging detector system, created in 1998 and implemented in January 2002, generated intense public opposition; however, the majority of the opposition to this program resulted from the method by which the program was implemented. This measure establishes a red light running committee under the Department of Transportation to review this Act to provide the necessary amendments that may be considered during the 2018 legislative session prior to implementation. Through the establishment of this committee, the program can be improved to better protect citizens and allay concerns raised. The committee will include county police, county prosecutors and county officials.

"Photo red light imaging detectors systems provide protections against negligent drivers who pose dangers to pedestrians and motorists. Safer streets could lead to a decreased need for traffic enforcement, fewer violators in court due to the color photograph violation, and lower insurance costs for safe drivers due to an overall reduction in crashes and injuries.

"There is support for this measure from the Department of Transportation, the Honolulu Police Department, the Mayor of the County of Hawaii and Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 221, S.D. 2."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 907 (S.B. No. 501, S.D. 1):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 907 be adopted and S.B. No. 501, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 501, S.D. 1, Relating to Health. The purpose of this bill is to ensure that women in Hawaii are able to make personal reproductive health decisions with full and accurate information regarding their rights to access available reproductive healthcare services in the State.

"S.B. 501, S.D. 1 will require limited service pregnancy centers to disclose in writing to potential patients that they do not offer a full range of family planning services. It also specifies that these centers provide information on where a patient may access a full range of care; and it establishes necessary privacy and disclosure requirements for individual records and information, and for civil remedies.

"All women in the State, regardless of income, should easily be able to access comprehensive reproductive health services. The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act recognize that all women should have 'immediate access to free or low-cost comprehensive family planning services and pregnancy-related care.'

"Limited service pregnancy centers, also known as crisis pregnancy centers, do not provide comprehensive family planning services. Limited service pregnancy centers advertise free pregnancy tests and offer other services, leading a consumer to believe they are full-service women's health clinics. However, these centers are not what they seem. They aim to discourage and prevent women from seeking abortions, by delaying access to true family planning services, and by reproaching vulnerable women on religious grounds through mandatory 'counseling' sessions.

"Your committee received testimony that these centers have used patients' personal information and email addresses without authorization; during the hearing on 2/27/17, a representative of a limited service pregnancy center attempted to offer, publicly and without consent, information about another testifier present, which was obtained during her visit to the limited service pregnancy center. This irresponsible action highlights the need for the privacy protections present in this bill.

"Your CPH committee has heard, but lends little credence to opponents' spurious complaints regarding a violation of first amendment freedoms. Your committee also notes with irony that the complaints come from parties who would attempt to impose their own religious views on vulnerable persons. These women come seeking unbiased information and access to a full range of care. However, based on the false way in which the clinics promote themselves, these vulnerable women do not receive the unbiased, appropriate information and care they need. Despite opponents claims to the contrary, a similar California law has overcome a constitutional challenge in the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in 2016.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 501, S.D. 1. Let's help protect woman's constitutionally protected rights. Mahalo."

No. 1084, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII TOURISM AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Kim). Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Kim rose to remind the members that the Committee on Government Operations would be holding a hearing that afternoon at 2:45 p.m. in Conference Room 224 to consider the nomination of the director of the Department of Accounting and General Services.

The Chair remarked, in good humor:

"Senator Green, I don't know why you referenced you and me on the discussion of testosterone. I pointed out there was no HIPAA violation by what you were disclosing – I am not your patient; you have not examined me. And I don't know why brought me into that whole conversation, but I wanted that into the Journal and clarified for history's purposes."

**§447-3 Employment of and practice by dental hygienists.** (a) Any licensed dentist, legally incorporated eleemosynary dental dispensary or infirmary, private school, welfare center, hospital, nursing home, adult day care center or assisted living facility, mental institution, nonprofit health clinic, or the State or any county, may employ licensed dental hygienists.

(b) Clinical dental hygiene may be practiced by a licensed dental hygienist. The practice of clinical dental hygiene is defined as the removal of hard and soft deposits and stains from the portion of the crown and root surfaces to the depth of the gingival sulcus, polishing natural and restored surfaces of teeth, the application of preventive chemical agents to the coronal surfaces of teeth, which chemical agents have been approved by the board of dental examiners, and the use of mouth washes approved by the board, but shall not include the performing of any repair work or the preparation thereof, or any other operation on the teeth or tissues of the mouth; provided that nothing in this subsection shall prohibit a dental hygienist from using or applying topically any chemical agent which has been approved in writing by the department of health for any of the purposes set forth in part V of chapter 321, and other procedures delegated by a dentist in accordance with the rules of the board of dental examiners.

In addition, a licensed dental hygienist may administer intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia under the direct supervision of a dentist after being certified by the board, and for those categories of intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia for which the licensed dental hygienist has been certified through a course of study meeting the requirements of this chapter.

(c) A licensed dental hygienist may operate in the office of any licensed dentist, or legally incorporated eleemosynary dental dispensary or infirmary, private school, welfare center, hospital, nursing home, adult day care center or assisted living facility, mental institution, nonprofit health clinic, or in any building owned or occupied by the State or any county, but only under the aforesaid employment and under the direct or general supervision of a licensed dentist; provided that in the private practice of dentistry, the hygienist shall be under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist. No dental hygienist may establish or operate any separate care facility which exclusively renders dental hygiene services.

(d) A licensed dental hygienist may operate under the general or direct supervision of any licensed dentist providing dental services in a public health setting. As used in this subsection, "public health setting" includes dental services in a legally incorporated eleemosynary dental dispensary or infirmary, private school, welfare center, hospital, nursing home, adult day care center or assisted living facility, mental institution, nonprofit health clinic, or the State or any county. A licensed dental hygienist employed in a public health setting may perform dental education, dental screenings, and fluoride applications. Other permissible duties shall be pre-screened and authorized by a supervising licensed dentist, subject to the dentist's determination that the equipment and facilities are appropriate and satisfactory to carry out the recommended treatment plan. No direct reimbursements shall be provided to licensed dental hygienists. **[\$447-3.5] Educational requirements for intra-oral block anesthesia.**

(a) The applicant for certification to administer intra-oral block anesthesia shall show proof that the applicant successfully completed a course of study that shall include the following categories of intra-oral infiltration local anesthesia and intra-oral block anesthesia:

- (1) Maxillary mandibular infiltration anesthesia;
- (2) Long buccal nerve block anesthesia;
- (3) Mental nerve block;
- (4) Inferior alveolar/lingual nerve block;
- (5) Incisive nerve block;
- (6) Posterior superior alveolar nerve block;
- (7) Middle superior alveolar nerve block;
- (8) Anterior superior alveolar nerve block;
- (9) Nasopalatine (incisive canal) nerve block; and
- (10) Greater (anterior) palatine nerve block.

(b) A course of study shall also include didactic studies and clinical experience, and for intra-oral block anesthesia categories in subsection (a) (1) to (10), at least thirty-nine hours, and a minimum of fifty successful injections of which ten shall be in intra-oral block in subsection (a) (4) and five in intra-oral block in subsection (a) (6).

(c) The curriculum of the course of study shall include as follows:

- (1) Cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification;
- (2) Medical history evaluation procedures;
- (3) Physical evaluation procedures;
- (4) Anatomy of head, neck, and oral cavity as it relates to administering local anesthetic agents;
- (5) Pharmacology of local anesthetics and vasoconstrictors;
- (6) Indications and contraindications for administration of local anesthetics;
- (7) Prevention, diagnosis, and management of medical emergency;
- (8) Recognition and management of post-injection complications and management of reactions to injections;
- (9) Medical and legal management complications;
- (10) Selection and preparation of the armamentaria and recordkeeping for administering various local anesthetics;
- (11) Methods of administering local anesthetics with emphasis on technique, which includes aspiration and slow injection, in addition to minimum effective dosage; and

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(12) Proper infection control techniques with regard to local anesthesia and the proper disposal of sharps.

(d) As part of the course of study, the applicant or licensed dental hygienist shall be required to pass an examination to determine if the applicant or licensed dental hygienist has acquired the necessary knowledge and clinical proficiency to administer intra-oral block anesthesia.

(e) The board of dental examiners may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91, relating to the education and certification of dental hygienists to administer intra-oral block anesthesia. [L 1999, c 97, §1]

- (10) Placing, condensing, carving, finishing, or adjusting the occlusion of final restorations; or placing cavity liners, medicaments, or pulp cap materials;
- (11) Placing materials subgingivally, including but not limited to, prescriptive medicaments, retraction cords, and other devices used for tissue displacement;
- (12) Prescribing medications or authorizing the fabrication of any restorative, prosthodontic, or orthodontic appliances;
- (13) Testing pulp vitality; and

§16-79-69.10 Allowable duties of licensed dental hygienists. (a) A licensed dental hygienist may perform the procedures as delineated under section 447-3, HRS, as well as all of the allowable duties of a dental assistant listed in section 16-79-69.1. Also, a licensed dental hygienist may perform the following procedures pursuant to the delegation of and under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist:

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§16-79-69.15

- (1) Administering intra-oral infiltration and intra-oral block anesthesia in accordance with the provisions of section 16-79-76;
- (2) Administering prescriptive treatments and chemotherapeutic agents (i.e., application or placement of supragingival and subgingival prescription drugs, including but not limited to, fluoride desensitizers, antimicrobial rinses and local delivery antibiotics), as prescribed by the licensed dentist;
- (3) Applying pit and fissure sealants;
- (4) Performing non-surgical clinical and laboratory oral diagnostic tests, (e.g., pulp vitality test) for interpretation by the licensed dentist;
- (5) Performing non-surgical periodontal scaling and root planing, and periodontal maintenance;
- (6) Performing dental prophylaxis, coronal polish natural or restored surfaces, and removing overhangs;
- (7) Placing periodontal dressing;
- (8) Collecting, documenting, and assessing the comprehensive patient data that may include screenings for oral cancer, periodontal chartings, indices, and risk assessments which identify dental hygiene needs;
- (9) Establishing the dental hygiene care plan that reflects dental hygiene goals and strategies; and
- (10) Providing dental hygiene care which may include, but is not limited to, pain management, full mouth debridement, care of restorations, behavior modification, preventive health education and nutrition counseling as it relates to oral health.

(b) In a public health setting as allowed pursuant to section 447-3(d), HRS, a licensed dental hygienist may perform the procedures describe in subsection (a) under the general supervision of a licensed dentist. (c) The board certification to administer intra-oral block anesthesia procedures shall automatically expire upon the revocation or suspension of the license to practice dental hygiene. ## TWENTY-SIXTH DAY

Thursday, March 9, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:30 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Harimoto welcomed a group of 70 students from Pearl City Highlands Elementary School, who were present in the gallery with parent chaperones and their teachers Mrs. Mizuuchi, Mr. Matsuura, and Ms. Yamaguchi.

Senator Galuteria recognized his grandson, Lincoln Lanakila Soares, who was among the students present in the gallery.

Senator Gabbard honored and commended MA'O Organic Farms, and presented the following remarks:

"Good morning, Mr. President, colleagues, our visitors in the gallery. Mala 'Ai 'Ōpio Community Food Systems Initiative, or MA'O, was established in 2001 to recognize our land and youth as our most important assets and to catalyze educational and entrepreneurial opportunities around these assets. MA'O is an acronym for *mala* (garden), *'ai* (food), *'ōpio* (youth) – or 'youth food garden' – and affirms our belief that when we reconnect and restore the relationship between the land and the people, we are able to return abundance and prosperity to youth, to their families, and to the community.

"MA'O Farms is a 23-acre certified-organic farm based in Wai'anae that trains new farmers and community leaders by having them co-manage the operations as they produce, process, market, and distribute a diverse array of high-quality, organic fruits and vegetables. MA'O Farms is improving local food security as well as the economic and social situation of this marginalized community. At MA'O, young people aged 18 to 25 are invited to become involved in an internship, where they work three days a week and go to college two days a week. MA'O Farms pays for their tuition and also gives them a \$500-a-month stipend to work on the farm. MA'O's goal is to bring in young people from the community, make them work hard, compensate them fairly, and let them see that agriculture is a viable career option. At the end of the program, the interns can do more than just work on a farm; they can run the whole operation from the sales and marketing all the way to the fundamentals of land prep and clearing. MA'O Farms's website beautifully explains their mission, and I quote:

Our efforts toward a just, healthy, sustainable, and resilient community food system is envisioned to be community gathering places where love, respect, and a willingness to work is practiced daily. As a teaching and learning farm, MA'O will adhere to its Hawaiian cultural values to aloha 'āina, to care and nurture the land in perpetuity to grow, process, package, prepare, and share food in ways that are pono, sustainable, and just. Our commitment to gather, engage, and empower youth, families, and community in place is of utmost importance to our success, so we will ensure that our work reflects and manifest our values and guiding principles to mālama kuleana – our responsibility to care for our beloved 'āina and our beloved people.

"So I'd now like to allow my colleague from Wai'anae to say a few words."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you so much. I'm very proud that my district hosts MA'O Farms, which is producing healthy organic foods and

also helps in creating our next generation of leaders. There have been a lot of nice things said about their work; I want to share a couple more gems. Local award-winning and top-selling singer-songwriter Jack Johnson had this to say in *Time* magazine about them:

MA'O Farms is one of the most inspirational places in Hawai'i. Not only are they growing organic produce in a state that ships in 90 percent of its food, they are growing Hawai'i's future by putting youth from Wai'anae Coast through college.

"MA'O's most famous visitor was none other than former First Lady Michelle Obama, who paid a visit to MA'O and spent an afternoon touring the farm and talking story with the interns in November 2011. Mrs. Obama recognized MA'O Farms as a successful model for increasing awareness of and access to healthy eating options and had this to say about them:

We feel like we're just a small part of what you all have been doing for a very long time, and it's important to know that it's working. It's sustaining a community; it's creating conversation, and it's putting young people to work and giving them futures, which is the most powerful thing.

"My ties to MA'O run deep: My sister met her husband through MA'O; I had a life-changing trip to Aotearoa through MA'O. So, from the bottom of my heart, mahalo to MA'O for their incredibly important work for our community and the 'āina. I now want to turn it back over to Senator Gabbard."

Senator Gabbard rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. First is Gary Maunakea-Forth, the co-founder and farm operations director; next is Kukui Maunakea-Forth, co-founder and executive director; Kamuela Enos is the social enterprises director; Derrick Parker, farm co-manager; Cheyanne Teixeira, farm co-manager; and Taylor Freitas, farm co-manager – please give them a hand. I first met Gary and Kukui when I was on the City Council between 2003 and 2005. I was impressed then with their vision, and I was even more impressed when I did a site visit this past December and Kamuela gave me a tour and an update. During that time, I spoke with some of the students who arrived for work while it's still dark, and they used headlights around their head to harvest the salad greens that are destined for the Four Seasons hotel and other hotels and businesses. I heard and felt the passion in their voices and hearts about doing something good for their families and doing something positive for their community, to counter the bad rap the Wai'anae Coast sometimes gets in the media and elsewhere.

"Ladies and gentlemen, the average age of our farmers in this state is 61, and we're currently importing 90 percent of our food at a cost of around \$3 billion every year. In my humble opinion, who you are looking at today is the future of agriculture in Hawai'i. It's my sincere hope and dream that we replicate MA'O Farms on each of the islands in Hawai'i nei – I'll continue to champion policies that can support making this a reality. So mahalo to MA'O Farms for teaching our youth the value of aloha, respect, and the willingness to work hard. Mahalo for connecting two of our most precious assets: our 'āina, that which feeds, and our 'ōpio, our youth. Your efforts are empowering our community to move forward toward self-sufficiency; mahalo and aloha."

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Yesterday, we celebrated the International Women's Day. It officially began in New York City in 1909. This day gives us an opportunity to pause and reflect on the role and treatment of

women throughout our world. Women have made great strides since 1909, yet there is a much further race to run. Part of the strides we have yet to make are the ways in which we address domestic violence. In 2004, the Joyful Heart Foundation was created to be a part of the solution in creating a world free of sex assault, domestic violence, and child abuse. To honor that mission today, on all of our desks and those of our colleagues in the House, there are lapel pins, which I have – it's a teal circle with a hole in the middle – to represent that we're part of the Joyful Heart Foundation 'Say NO MORE' campaign. Along with these pins, I distributed cards that give you an opportunity to print a message on it. Mine says, 'No more bullying,' and for those of you who are willing to participate after we take this wonderful picture with MA'Ō Farms representatives, we will be taking one with our signs that we can post to show that the Hawai'i Senate is participating in the NO MORE campaign. Mahalo."

At this time, the Chair made the following statement:

The Chair continued:

“In conjunction with our 55 years of Statehood anniversary in 2014, we presented a very special lapel pin to current and past members of the Senate. This pin is a symbol of a member’s service in the Senate and to the people of the State of Hawai‘i.

“Pursuant to Senate Rule 91, the Senate pin shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it is presented.

“Senators Kahele, Chang, and Rhoads, on behalf of the Senate, thank you for your service.”

At this time, Senator Kim presented Senator Kahele with the Senate pin, Senator Kidani presented Senator Chang with the Senate pin, and Senator English presented Senator Rhoads with the Senate pin.

The Chair then noted that it was Senate President Emeritus Kim’s idea to start the tradition of the Senate pin to recognize past and current senators, and led the members in a round of applause to acknowledge her excellent idea.

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I just wanted to thank all of my colleagues for participating in the ‘NO MORE violence, NO MORE bullying, NO MORE sex assault’ campaign and joining us for the picture, but also for all of our colleagues who serve on committees that these bills come through and support all of the efforts of the Women’s Legislative Caucus in this endeavor at UH or wherever in our state. ## TWENTY-SEVENTH DAY

Friday, March 10, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Sixth Day.

At this time, Senator Kidani recognized guests from the HCAP Head Start program, the largest early childhood program in the state, serving more than 1,600 children and their families each year. Senator Kidani announced that the group would be visiting legislators' offices to share information on the importance of early childhood education, and introduced Lynn Cabato, director of HCAP Head Start; Karla Rios, policy council treasurer; and other HCAP staff and parents of Head Start youngsters.

Senator Wakai congratulated and commended the Hawaii Venture Capital Association's award recipients, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, guests: The state is working diligently to create an innovative economy. In order to do so, we need infrastructure; we need workforce; and we need financing. That third leg of the stool is where the Hawaii Venture Capital Association is leading the charge; they turn geniuses into entrepreneurs. The organization fosters entrepreneurial development through education, a series of speakers, and introductions to key members of our business community. Each year, they award those individuals who shine brighter than the rest, and we are lucky to have a number of them here with us today.

"Meli James is the president of the Hawaii Venture Capital Association. The organization has been around for 17 years, but it's really blossomed since she took over just a few years ago. Meli was born and raised in Honolulu. She is a graduate of Cornell University and lived in Silicon Valley for more than 10 years, where she started a number of her own startups before taking the HVCA to the heights that it enjoys today.

"Mr. President, with your permission, and to begin the introductions of the six winners we'll be honoring today, I yield my time to my colleague, Senator Les Ihara."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, the Deal of the Year award recognizes the Startup Paradise company that received the largest financial deal during 2016, and the winner is Scott Mercer, founder of Volta Charging, for securing \$40 million in funding to expand his company nationally. In 2012, Volta Charging launched on O'ahu with six electric-car charging stations. There are now 212 Volta charging stations in Hawai'i and California, with 500 more under contract to be built in Arizona, Chicago, Seattle, and Washington, D.C., with more locations to follow.

"Scott Mercer, who is unable to be with us today, has a passion for bringing future-focused technology to market quickly. Since he founded Volta Industries in January 2010, he has been named 2012's Young Entrepreneur of the Year by the Hawaii Venture Capital Association, and in 2013, he was named both to the 40 Under 40 by *Pacific Business News* and *Hawaii Business's* 20 for the Next 20.

"Volta Industries' mission is to use technology as a force for social change, where services are underwritten by companies with a vested interest in the community. Volta's charging

stations come with billboard advertising to pay for bills, which translate to free electric car charging for customers. Stations are built in places where people spend time doing something else while their car charges, like at shopping malls. When the business started, there were only two manufacturers of electric cars; today, most auto manufacturers either have or are planning an electric model. With Volta, everyone has an outlet for taking action to make the community better. Today, Meli James will be accepting the certificate on behalf of Scott Mercer."

Senator Nishihara rose to present the following remarks:

"At this time, I'd like to introduce the Startup Paradise Champion of the Year, *Bytemarks Café* – Burt Lum and Ryan Ozawa. This award is given to someone who consistently contributes to the startup community. These contributions consist of supporting, promoting, and building a successful startup culture and ecosystem in Hawai'i. The winners this year are Burt Lum and Ryan Ozawa of the *Bytemarks Café*. Burt Lum is a communicator, innovator, community leader, open data advocate, and a sci-fi/tech geek. He's also the executive director of Hawaii Open Data. Ryan Ozawa is a media maker and community builder who serves as communications director for Hawaii Information Service and the chief marketing officer of local ag-tech startup Smart Yields. Together, they co-host the *Bytemarks Café* – and not only Hawai'i Public Radio, but also the 'Geek Beat' on Hawaii News Now. So, at this time, again, Burt Lum; thank you."

Senator Harimoto rose to present the following remarks:

"Members, it is my privilege today to recognize Purple Mai'a Foundation as the Social Impact Entrepreneur of the Year. This prestigious award honors an entrepreneur or entrepreneurial company that has shown leadership, innovation, and commitment to improving our community and has made a substantial contribution to Hawai'i and its people. The Purple Mai'a Foundation is a nonprofit startup technology education company that focuses on empowering Hawai'i's youth in underserved communities by providing indigenized and culturally affirming technology education in coding and computer programming. It is their mission to build channels of technological knowledge together with Hawai'i's youth in order to help communities thrive. This school year, they are working with over 200 middle and high school students in DOE schools, charter schools, and alternative learning centers on O'ahu, Maui, and Lāna'i. Receiving this award today is Donovan Kealoha. Donovan, along with Kelsey Amos and Olin Lagon, co-founded the Purple Mai'a Foundation. Thank you for your dedication to serving Hawai'i's youth and inspiring them to become indigenous technologists."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"The Life Science Entrepreneur of the Year award is presented to the entrepreneur whose company's innovation is helping to solve some of the biggest problems in the medical field. This year's Life Science Entrepreneur of the Year is Dr. Jeffrey Yu. Dr. Yu is a serial entrepreneur and is board-certified in radiology and nuclear medicine. He is CEO of Kineticor, a company that is eliminating motion from MR images in collaboration with the world's leading MR vendor. He is also the founder of OneMedNet, the leading medical-image sharing and exchange provider to leading medical image management vendors and a part of the office of the president of Queen's Health Systems."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"The Corporate Intrapreneur of the Year: This award goes to a person who creatively challenges tradition and assertively

makes changes in their company culture. The goal is to ensure fellow employees are engaged in their environment and their field and are provided with a platform to be ‘intra-preneurial.’ This award goes to Ian Kitajima. Ian is a senior executive at Oceanit, one of Hawai‘i’s largest and most diversified privately-held technology companies, with 150 scientists and engineers.

“Since 2001, Ian has contributed to Oceanit’s evolution and sharing of their culture of innovation. The overall goal is to create, fund, incubate, and transition new technologies to the marketplace – and a community mission to create prosperity. Ian has initiated Oceanit’s entry into such areas as nanotechnology, energy, and design-thinking. He is also an advisor and/or board member for several educational, government, and community organizations, such as the Public Schools of Hawaii Foundation, UH Alumni Association, and the Workforce Development Council. Mahalo nui, Ian.”

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

“The Island Innovator of the Year: this award is to honor the most impactful innovation that has helped our island state in truly solving a problem in our own backyard, our mountains, our beach, our ‘āina. This innovation inspires and celebrates an innovation, entrepreneur, or company that has shown leadership and commitment to tackling a significant problem in our state. Our Island Innovator of the Year is Henk Rogers of Blue Planet Energy. And now the story: Henk Rogers is a Dutch-born entrepreneur and clean energy visionary who has dedicated the past decade of his career to the research, development, advocacy, and implementation of renewable energy sources in his adopted home of Hawai‘i and beyond. He has studied computer science at the University of Hawai‘i and spent his early career in Japan as a video game designer, gaining distinction for producing the country’s first roleplaying game, *The Black Onyx*. He went on to revolutionize the video game industry by securing the rights for the blockbuster *Tetris*, which 30 years later remains a bestseller and global gaming icon – and I’m pretty sure every one of us has played the game, Henk. Thank you for that. Ladies and gentlemen, the Island Innovator of the Year, Henk Rogers.”

Senator Wakai rose and stated:

“Thank you, Mr. President and colleagues. I apologize; when I was introducing Meli James earlier, I failed to ask her to rise so, Meli, if you could please stand to be recognized? Thank you for all of your good work.

“There are several other award-winners with us today from the HVCA who are in the gallery. I’d like to acknowledge a number of them who are here today. From *Bytemarks Café*, Ryan Ozawa; from Purple Mai’a, we have Kelsey Amos as well as Olin Lagon – Olin is Kelsey’s partner; Entrepreneur of the Year Tina Fitch of Hobnob; Tech Entrepreneur of the Year is Alex Cabello of AlgorithmHub Incorporated. We have the Clean Tech/Ag Entrepreneur of the Year – these individuals are Jack Beuttell and Bobby Farias of Kunoa Cattle Company. And here’s the future of entrepreneurship, the Student Entrepreneur of the Year, Kyle Chang of HealthTechApps. Just a couple more: There’s a People’s Choice Startup of the Year – that award goes to Kainoa McGee of KMB Co. And, finally, our Investor of the Year, Dawn Lippert and Jill Sims of Energy Excelerator. Congratulations to all the HVCA honorees.”

The Chair noted that the lollipops on the members’ desks were from State Representative Linda Ichiyama, to celebrate the recent birth of her baby boy, Dylan Kalei Leonard Chong.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 533) was read by the Clerk and was placed on file:

At this time, Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Mr. President, as we all aware, it is the Senate’s role to advise and consent on governor’s nominations to various boards and commissions. Your Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health has a good number of these, and we heard some of the ones for the Department of Health boards and commissions this morning, but after looking at the information that I’ve been given by the department, there are well over 40 more to come down. Some of them, I’m told, have names; some of them do not. But, the longer that the governor waits to send them down, the less time we’re going to be able to give to appropriately consider those nominations. In the past we’ve received names of people who didn’t want to serve or weren’t qualified to serve in the position to which the individual was nominated. The advise and consent process is important. So although the governor was quoted as saying that he’s not late –

no, he’s technically not late. We have a deadline a few weeks from now, but that’s going to put us right in the middle of conference, to try to consider and give each nominee the appropriate consideration on whether they should be confirmed or not. Therefore, Mr. President, I ask all of us to send the message up to the fifth floor to get those nominations down. Quite frankly, I believe the Executive has had plenty of time to get them to us. As CPH Committee Chair I’d like the Governor to respect the process. Send the nominees down now to accord the Chair the opportunity to meet with each nominee so that I can verify to my committee members that each nominee is interested in serving and ready to serve. I would certainly like to be able to do that before we get into conference. Mahalo.”

The Chair responded:

“Thank you. I guess the only comment I have is that, two weeks ago, my office sent a communication to the governor indicating that we need to get the names to be able to do our job in the advise and consent. We sent a letter the next week again conveying the same message, so he has been notified in writing that the Senate is anxiously awaiting the names to come down so that we can schedule them and give them the proper time and consideration that these nominations deserve, and also that we have the time we need to do our jobs properly.”

The Chair then made the following announcement:

“Today is the last day for the introduction of Senate concurrent resolutions and Senate resolutions. The deadline is 4:00 p.m. this afternoon.”

Monday, March 13, 2017

## ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 916 (Gov. Msg. No. 502):

Senator Kim moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 916 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ruderman and carried.

Senator Kim then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of RODERICK BECKER as Director of the Department of Accounting and General Services, term to expire December 3, 2018, seconded by Senator Ruderman.

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, it's rewarding to see a local boy who is a product of our public school system – a graduate of Kailua High School and the University of Hawai'i – come before us today to be confirmed as our state comptroller. Roderick Becker began as a budget analyst in the 2000 legislative session. Then he became the Senate CIP program specialist from 2001 to 2005. He left the Senate to work across the street as a legislative analyst for the Honolulu City Council until 2008, when I became WAM chair and he returned to the Senate as our budget chief, where he remained until 2014, when the governor appointed him as the deputy director of finance.

"As a budget analyst and working for WAM, he learned about the budget from the bottom up. We all know the long hours that WAM staff put in every session and, as budget chief, I worked with Rod and watched how he trained and worked with the budget analysts from all walks of life, who often are hired with no prior experience. I found Rod to be hardworking, honest, and not giving into political pressures. When he came on as budget chief, I had him and the entire WAM staff clean out the WAM staff offices that had not changed for decades. The office had rusted filing cabinets, an antique sofa, ancient document binders with spider webs and all. Rod and staff came in on the weekend to clean, paint the bookshelves, and rearrange the offices. We worked to bring a new perspective of the WAM staff by holding a WAM open house, something that was never done before. We wanted Senate members to meet these mysterious WAM staff, get to know what they did, and tour the mysterious WAM offices. Senators were encouraged to feel free to ask questions and get information from the WAM

staff for any budget questions. I believe that Rod will bring that same kind of perspective to DAGS.

"In his opening statement to the committee, Rod read an old reference letter written for him as he embarked on the job market by a UH advisor for student government. In summary, it said:

Roderick's behavior in the student senate was characterized by consistently high standards of ethics and a willingness to stand up for what is fair and just; this meant, at times, supporting a position that was unpopular and subjected him to criticism. He was also known for his intelligence, hard work, and keen understanding of the issues.

"Rod told the committee:

I wanted to share this with you because that's who I was 18 years ago; it's who I've always tried to be. I think it's consistent with the governor's charge to his cabinet. The governor tells us all the time, 'Just do what is right.' This is his principal directive; I believe that I've worked in a manner consistent with that and will continue to do so.

"Mary Alice Evans, deputy director of DBEDT, says, 'Rod is a quiet, thoughtful leader who brings an analytical approach to complex problems.' And finally, Wes Machida, director of finance, said in his testimony about Rod, 'He represents the next generation of leaders that we need to ensure that state government transitions our business practices into the 21st century.' I cannot agree more, and I urge my colleagues to advise and consent to Roderick Becker as the director of Department of Accounting and General Services. Thank you."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"I have no prepared remarks because I had no intention of standing in opposition; I was going to go quietly by as a 'with reservations.' However, I feel compelled to say that, in my dealings with Mr. Becker, I do believe that he has not been forthright. I question his character and his integrity. Several weeks ago, I had a conversation with the governor, and it did not deal directly with Rod – it had other issues – but I brought that up, and I brought up other instances that I questioned dealing with relationships with members of his staff. And I don't think that it's a personal issue. When you are in leadership and when you're tapped to be the leader of a large department like DAGS, I think integrity and character and how you treat people comes – something that has to be very forthright and at the start of everything you do in order for people to have faith in you and for you to work with people. And I don't think that he has the capabilities or the experience to carry forth this job in a way that it deserves to be dealt with, and so for that reason, I will be voting 'no.'"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 19; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, Kahele, Nishihara, Shimabukuro). Noes, 2 (Chang, Kidani). Excused, 4 (English, Galuteria, Inouye, Taniguchi).

Senator Kim then introduced newly confirmed Director Roderick Becker, who was present in the gallery with his mother, June Becker, and his sister, Sheryl Cruz.

Senator Dela Cruz introduced guests from Wahiawā Middle School, who were present in the gallery, including Principal Ursula Kawaguchi, Steve Grey, Edith Gima, Malachi McSheron, and Dee Gonzales, as well as members of the student choir, who had opened the floor session with several uplifting songs.

At 11:55 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:01 p.m.

## THIRTIETH DAY

## Wednesday, March 15, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Kidani welcomed the following friends of Senate President Kouchi who were visiting from Des Moines, Iowa: Ron Angel; his wife, Dawn; and his mother-in-law, Faye.

Senator Shimabukuro honored and commended the Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation, and presented the following remarks:

"The superhero 'Wonder Woman' is a masterful athlete, acrobat, fighter and strategist, trained and experienced in many ancient and modern forms of armed and unarmed combat, including exclusive Amazonian martial arts. She is highly skilled in using her Amazon bracelets to stop bullets and in wielding her golden lasso. Batman once called her the 'best melee fighter in the world,' and she is known to use lethal force when she deems it necessary.

"Colleagues, today we have before us the Wai'anae Coast's own 'Wonder Woman,' Patty Kahanamoku-Teruya, and some representatives of the Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation, or WCCF, which she heads. While she may not be an Amazonian demigod, as her name indicates, she is a proud descendant of one of Hawai'i's real-life superheroes, Duke Kahanamoku.

"Patty's name is almost synonymous with the Nānākuli-Mā'ili Neighborhood Board, on which she has served as a zealous advocate for 22 years. The Wonder Woman description sounds just like Patty at Neighborhood Board Meetings, especially the use of mortal combat skills and lethal force! In addition to this, Patty and the WCCF have 'come to the rescue' when the community was in need over and over.

"The Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation's mission is to enhance economic development and cultural values of the Wai'anae Coast, and to develop programs and opportunities that give children, seniors, and families in crisis the tools they need to overcome challenges they face.

"Under the direction of Patty, WCCF has invested in significant planning to nurture the community. Their involvement extends into various programs and community service projects.

"In 2015, the community was heartbroken to hear that the Toys for Tots Program was on the verge of collapsing. The burden of collecting, storing, and distributing toys to needy children had become overwhelming for The Salvation Army, with no organization in sight willing to take on this immense task. The call for help went out, and none other than WCCF came to the rescue. Today WCCF collects toys from the U.S. Marines and others, and oversees sorting and distribution of toys to impoverished children. Needless to say, the community is eternally grateful.

"Another blow came when organizers of the hugely popular Wai'anae Coast Sunset on the Beach announced they had run out of steam and resources, and had to discontinue it. I remember my office would get calls asking when is the next

Sunset on the Beach, and people were always disappointed to hear it was canceled. And then suddenly last year, Patty sent word out that WCCF was bringing the event back. She aptly named it, "The Return of Wai'anae Coast Sunset on the Beach," and it was as if a miracle had been announced. Sure enough, the event was wildly successful, attended by the Mayor and climaxing with a dazzling fireworks show. Thankfully, WCCF has plans to stage the event every two years, and once again, they 'came to the rescue.'

"WCCF does even more. They support After-School All-Stars Hawaii by providing the Intermediate football teams for Nānākuli High & Intermediate School and Ka Waihona o Ka Na'auao Public Charter School with uniforms, coaching staff, and transportation. WCCF also supports the NFL-YET Hawaii - Boys and Girls Club of Nānākuli, which provides an after-school sports program for students in grades 4, 5, and 6 at three elementary schools located in Nānākuli - Nanaikapono Elementary School, Nānākuli Elementary School, and Ka Waihona o Ka Na'auao Public Charter School. WCCF provides coaching staff, and has funded the entire sports program.

"Other WCCF projects include a furniture store where vocational training is provided for at-risk individuals, and community food distribution and delivery to anyone in need, including beach areas for homeless families.

"I'd like to take this opportunity to introduce the following superheroes who are here representing WCCF. Please stand when I call your name, and I ask that all applause be held till the end: Patty Kahanamoku-Teruya - President and Director of the Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation; Keoki K. Aiwohi - Vice President and Director of the Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation who also serves as the After-School All-Stars Sports Coordinator; Emmanuel Silva - Food Bank and Toys for Tots Warehouse Project Manager; Lara Pangan-Chun of Hale Ola Hou, who provides volunteer support for food distribution and delivery, as well as for Toys for Tots; and John Dudoit of Makana O Ke Akua, who also provides volunteer support for food distribution and delivery, as well as for Toys for Tots.

"I would also like acknowledge Katherine Lundgren, WCCF Treasurer, and Chris Kuaiwa, WCCF Secretary, who both were unable to attend today.

"Also, in the Gallery are several individuals here to help celebrate WCCF and their heroic achievements: Rep. Cedric Gates, staff from the office of Rep. Andria Tupola, Breana Naehu, Prince Aiwohi, Keoki Dudoit, Calvin Chun, Georgette DeMello, and Dezy DeMello; and representing PVT Land Company, who have partnered with WCCF in many of their efforts, Ben Yamamoto, Steve Joseph, and Eric Epling.

"I ask my colleagues to join me in expressing thanks and appreciation to the Wai'anae Coast Community Foundation for their selfless and generous efforts, and for continuing to 'come to the rescue' for their community. Please give them a round of applause."

## THIRTY-FIRST DAY

**Thursday, March 16, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators English and Kidani who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

At this time, Senator Baker noted that it was the 17th Annual State Council on Developmental Disabilities Day at the Capitol – a partnership of the Disability and Communication Access Board, Hawai'i Self-Advocacy Advisory Council, Hawai'i Waiver Providers Association, Hilopa'a Family to Family Health Information Center, and Maternal and Child Health Leadership Education – with 57 participants from the neighbor islands and over 400 participants from O'ahu, including individuals with developmental disabilities, family members, personal assistants, and other advocates. Senator Baker then acknowledged Waynette Cabral and all of the staff of the State Council on Developmental Disabilities, who were present in the gallery, for organizing the event.

Senator Ruderman introduced Department of Health coordinator Jesse Floyd, who was present in the gallery with a group of participants from Hilo, as well as a group from Easter Seals in Kea'au.

Senator Green introduced the following participants from West Hawai'i, who were present in the gallery: from the Arc of Kona – Chris Barnett, Sanoe Wong, Joshua Getz, Lois Philips, Robert Sonoria, Lisa Pardom, Mariana Ruiz, Duke Ka'awa, Kamini Mako, and Makakilo Isadoro; and from Full Life Kona – Jameson Nakana, Logan Dido, Jackie Hopf, and Matthew Bester.

Senator Rhoads introduced Blane Sardinha, a resident of Kukui Gardens, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Chang welcomed a group of fifth-grade students from Mayor John H. Wilson Elementary School, who were present in the gallery with their teachers Roxane Yi and Max Kaneshiro, and educational assistant Rie Barnhart.

Senator Shimabukuro recognized a group from Kahumana in Wai'anae and the Department of Health.

Senator Kahele welcomed participants from Hilo who were present in the gallery: Darwin Nagamine from Arc of Hilo; and from Full Life Hilo – Kaulia Haumea, Mia Manzo, Victoria Murray, and Marlene Murray.

Senator Baker acknowledged guests from Maui, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i who were participating in Developmental Disabilities Day at the State Capitol.

Senator Baker then commended and congratulated the Hawai'i State Board of Nursing for its dedication to the health and welfare of the people of Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

“Today, colleagues, we recognize the 100th year anniversary of the Hawai'i State Board of Nursing – 100 years. The Board of Nursing was created when Governor Lucius E. Pinkham of the Territory of Hawai'i signed Act 163 into law. The title of the act was ‘To Provide for the Registration of Nurses,’ which has served to standardize and enforce nursing requirements from territorial days. Over the past 100 years, the Board of Nursing – which is housed in DCCA and today consists of seven nursing professionals and two public members – has ensured that

Hawai'i nursing requirements have evolved to keep pace with the ever-changing landscape of health care.

“Joining us on the floor today are representatives from the Hawai'i State Board of Nursing: first, the chair of the Board, Loraine Fleming; and the executive officer of the Board, Lee Ann Teshima.

“Colleagues, the Board plays a significant role in defining the scope of practice while continually promoting improvements for the nursing profession. The Board's top priority has always been to ensure that the people of our state receive the best care possible by regulating the practice of nursing in a consistent, comprehensive, and quality manner. One hundred years ago, the Board of Nursing was founded by the mission to safeguard life and health in the practice of nursing. Today, we honor them as they continue to fulfill that mission and bring personal and quality health care to their patients in a variety of healthcare settings.

“Mr. President, we were supposed to have some other nurses, part of the Board, in our gallery. Let me recognize them by name and they can wave: We have Edna Magpantay-Monroe, who is associate professor and Vice Chair, School of Nursing, at Chaminade. We have Nancy Atmospera-Walch, president and CEO of Advantage Health Care Provider; Dean Mary Boland, Professor, School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa; Liane Muraoka, who's the program lead for the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing; and a former intern in my office who is now the director of the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing, Laura Reichhardt.

“Mr. President, on your behalf and on behalf of all of our colleagues, we want to extend a truly heartfelt mahalo nui loa to the Board of Nursing and your dedicated members, who volunteer their time to maintain the high quality of nurses who serve our state so well. Mahalo.”

Senator Chang recognized and congratulated the American Red Cross of Hawai'i for 100 years of service, and presented the following remarks:

“It's a very special year – it's another 100-year anniversary we're celebrating today. Working side by side with the police, fire, military, and civil defense, the American Red Cross Hawaii unwaveringly focuses on its mission to prevent and alleviate human suffering, providing disaster relief, and teaching life-saving techniques to the people of Hawai'i, helping people prevent and prepare for emergencies, and providing support to military families. Since the late 1800s, the Red Cross has had a rich and distinguished history in Hawai'i, beginning with Princess Ka'iulani helping to care for sick and wounded soldiers during the Spanish-American War. The American Red Cross of Hawaii was officially chartered in 1917 during World War I.

“For the past 100 years, the American Red Cross of Hawaii has assisted victims of every major disaster in the islands' history, including the bombing of Pearl Harbor. In addition to larger-scale disasters, the Hawaii Red Cross is on call 24/7 and responds to everyday disasters every four days, providing food, clothing, shelter, crisis counseling, and emotional support. Each year, the Hawaii Red Cross teaches 20,000 residents how to save lives through CPR, AED, first aid, wilderness, aquatics, and workplace safety training, and offers free emergency, first aid, and pet first aid apps. Hawaii Red Cross volunteers install free smoke alarms in people's homes – targeting vulnerable populations, like the elderly and disabled – and teach local residents about fire safety and escape plans. Red Cross

volunteers also teach businesses, children, and community organizations how to prepare before a disaster strikes.

“Today, we celebrate the month of March as American Red Cross Month and honor and congratulate them for 100 years of service. Joining us on the floor is CEO of Red Cross Hawaii Coralie Matayoshi; Randy Harris, board member and vice chair for Red Cross Hawaii; and Katherine Lagareta is also a board member and secretary for Red Cross Hawaii. Thank you to the Red Cross for your service to our state, and here’s to another 100 years of service.”

At 11:49 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Baker rose to commend the attorney general for the handling of the case against the immigration ban, noting that she and Senator Green, along with Directors Pressler and Bhanot, had an opportunity to present some issues from Hawai'i to the Conference of Western Attorneys General, and were there when the decision's announcement came down. Senator Baker remarked that it was to the credit of the attorney general in understanding Hawai'i's history, that it was appropriate that Hawai'i be the state to be the first in this round to say that the ban was not constitutional; the federal district judge upheld it and made it a nationwide stay of the order, with a judge in Maryland also making the same decision later that day. Senator Baker commented that, based on what she's read, the foundation of Hawai'i's suit was stronger and more likely to withstand being overturned, and applauded the attorney general. Senator Baker then asked colleagues on the fifth floor to please send down the nominations to the professional vocational licensing boards as there were only ten more session days remaining until the deadline.

## THIRTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 17, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators English, Galuteria, Keith-Agaran, and Tokuda who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads recognized Michael Broderick, president and chief executive officer of the YMCA of Honolulu, who was present in the gallery with executives from the Atherton, Camp Erdman, Central, Kaimuki-Wai'alaie, Kalihi, Leeward, Nu'uuanu, Windward, and Metropolitan Office branches.

Senator Thielen recognized and commended the ocean safety departments of the various counties, and presented the following remarks:

"The Outdoor Heritage Caucus began last year with a mission of uniting legislators to identify, protect, and promote the State of Hawai'i's heritage of outdoor cultural practices and recreational activities, and to foster appreciation and respect for outdoor heritage. Each of the years, we have done a floor ceremony, and this year, we want to recognize the ocean safety officers throughout the State of Hawai'i for their continuous hard work and dedication to Hawai'i, its people, and its visitors. Every day, our ocean safety officers are the primary responders to emergencies arising on Hawai'i's beaches and nearshore waters. Through ongoing and extensive training, ocean safety officers across our state are able to perform over 4,500 rescues every year, and well over 1.5 million preventative actions, keeping our residents and visitors safe as they enjoy our state's ocean waters. To begin our presentation today and recognize our floor honorees, I turn the message over to my colleague Senator Russell Ruderman."

Senator Ruderman rose to present the following remarks:

"Ocean safety services began on Hawai'i Island in 1972 at Punalu'u Beach with two guards. Today, 55 water safety officers staff 15 lifeguard towers covering 12 beaches across Hawai'i Island. This year, two of the department's rescue watercraft operators, Paul Tucker and Robin Fasciano, were honored with a Wake of Fame Heavy Water Award for saving two adults and a child on a kayak that was blown out into the channel. Joining us today from the Hawai'i County Fire Department is Battalion Chief Gerald Kosaki. Thank you for being here."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, I'm very happy to introduce the handsome ocean safety officers of Kaua'i County. Playing a major role in the development of the Ocean Safety Bureau is director Kalani Vierra – please, Kalani, would you stand to be recognized? (See, I wasn't kidding when I said 'handsome.') The Kaua'i Fire Department Ocean Safety Bureau has the responsibility of providing ocean safety awareness, safeguarding beach patrons, responding to emergencies, and providing medical aid to Kaua'i's visitors and residents. Education is a large part of the Ocean Safety Bureau's program, and the Junior Lifeguard program has been an ongoing success to educate Kaua'i's youth in ocean safety awareness and to keep the next generation active, drug-free, and productive. With support from community groups, the Kaua'i Ocean Safety Bureau works vigilantly to accomplish the collective goal of increasing ocean safety and

awareness. Thank you, Kalani, for being here today and representing Kaua'i's ocean safety officers. We commend you for the outstanding job that you have done and continue to do so to make the ocean safe."

Senator Baker rose to present the following remarks:

"Maui County Ocean Safety Bureau began in 1977 at Baldwin Beach. In 2016, the Bureau was reorganized from the Maui County Department of Parks & Recreation to the Department of Fire & Public Safety, and we from Maui are equally proud of our ocean safety personnel. Today, there are nine year-round ocean safety locations on Maui, one seasonal location at Hāna Bay. The Maui County Ocean Safety Bureau works tirelessly to accomplish the collective goal of increasing ocean safety and awareness for everyone who enjoys Maui's pristine beaches. They do their work tirelessly with our visitor industry to make sure that we can maximize the information provided to our visitors who come to enjoy the wonderful outdoors that we have on Maui. Joining us today from the County of Maui Department of Fire & Public Safety is the battalion chief of Ocean Safety, Colin Yamamoto; and with him is our very active and supportive fire chief, Jeff Murray. We appreciate your good work on behalf of our residents and visitors in and around all of our islands in the County of Maui. Mahalo!"

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"Government-run lifeguard services began at Waikiki Beach in 1912 with two lifeguards operating under the Territorial Board of Harbor Commissioners. Today, the City and County of Honolulu's Ocean Safety officers guard 29 beaches and provide ocean safety services for 198 miles of O'ahu's coastline. Joining us today from the City and County of Honolulu's Emergency Services Department is Ocean Safety operations chief Kevin Allen. Mahalo."

Senator Thielen rose and stated:

"I do want to note: also joining us from the island of Kaua'i is safety officer Randy Ortiz. Thank you.

"Just to wrap up: The ocean safety officers of Hawai'i County, Kaua'i County, Maui County, and the City and County of Honolulu continue to be challenged with maintaining service levels as both resident and visitor population increases with a continuing increase in ocean activity. We applaud their hard work and dedication; we're privileged to honor you folks today, and I do want to note that we have some legislation in front of us this session which, hopefully, will allow them to continue their work. I'd like to introduce, in the gallery, we're being joined by Jim Howe of the City and County of Honolulu, Director of Emergency Services, and his deputy director, Ian Santee. And also our state parks administrator extraordinaire, Curt Cottrell, has joined us. As many of you know. Our state beach parks are provided ocean safety services by the county divisions."

At 11:45 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

## THIRTY-THIRD DAY

**Monday, March 20, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Baker noted it was Kick Butts Day at the State Capitol, where young people learn more about activism and being empowered to speak out about tobacco issues.

Senator Espero introduced Kaniala Peters Clark, a junior at James Campbell High School who was serving as an intern in his office.

Senator Baker recognized staff members and participants in Kick Butts Day who were present in the gallery, including members of the Youth Council that advised the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i and is leading the next generation to be tobacco-free. Senator Baker noted that the Youth Council was the driving force behind making Hawai'i the first state in the nation to raise the age of sale of tobacco products and e-cigarettes to 21, and that this year they were focusing on protecting keiki from harmful secondhand smoke in vehicles through the prohibition of smoking in a car when a minor is present, as well as working to make University of Hawai'i campuses tobacco-free and regulating electronic smoking devices.

Senator Dela Cruz introduced a group of students from Kanuikapono Public Charter School in Anahola, Kaua'i, who were present in the gallery.

The Chair thanked the students for the beautiful lei.

Senator Kahele recognized the presence of Dr. Leina'ala Ahu Isa, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Trustee-at-Large, in the gallery.

Senator Kidani recognized and commended the Department of Education's Teachers of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, we begin our Education Week recognition program this morning with a salute to the Department of Education's Teachers of the Year. Student success in the classroom begins with strong and supportive teachers. Our public school teacher corps numbers just over 12,000 – men and women who devote countless hours to preparation and presentation, mentoring and motivating.

"I should note that we take a chance by scheduling these presentations during spring break. Of the eight teachers nominated by their peers and selected for recognition, some are, today, at workshops, and others were not able to be here. One of them is here this morning, and another has sent a representative. To begin our presentations, my colleague Senator Chang."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, we are honoring Kay Beach, who is represented by Buffy Cushman-Patz, the principal of our school. Kay is the Public Charter Schools 2017 District Teacher of the Year. She is currently an English language arts and project-based learning teacher for the School for Examining Essential Questions of Sustainability, also known as SEEQS. Her approach as a teacher is through openness, empathy, and values-learning. As a teacher, she has created a safe space for her students to develop their minds, and believes that education is the gateway to developing

a generation of individuals who create and live in a world of discovery. She is heavily influenced by supportive parents and colleagues as well as her travel experiences. Her students are able to reflect on their lives, use research to make decisions, and think critically about issues. Even though Kay could not be here, let's give one more round of applause for Kay."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Nominees for District Teacher of the Year must be exceptionally skillful and dedicated classroom teachers who have the respect and admiration of students, parents, and coworkers; play an active role in their school and communities; and inspire a love of learning in students of all backgrounds and abilities. Meeting this criteria, Luane Higuchi emerged as the 2017 Leeward District Teacher of the Year. For 21 years, this award-winning digital media teacher has challenged her students to surpass their own expectations. Inspired by teachers who encouraged, respected, and believed in her, Higuchi pays it forward through tireless efforts with extracurricular activities and traveling with students to competitions and awards ceremonies, and open new opportunities by coordinating the Wai'anae Coast Film Festival and launching a new video contest, the 'Na Hana Pookela o Waianae.' Please join me in commending Luane Higuchi for her commitment to public education and to the hundreds of Wai'anae students and their families whose lives she has guided and enriched over her many years in public education, and congratulating Luane for being selected Leeward District 2017 Teacher of the Year."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to present the following remarks:

"I'm pleased to acknowledge Jennifer Suzuki, 2017 Maui District Teacher of the Year. Unfortunately, Ms. Suzuki was unable to attend today's session. Like many of our teachers during spring break, she's working. I know that Ms. Suzuki is taking 31 Maui Waena students to the annual Student Television Network competition in Orlando, Florida. Over the past few years, the Maui Waena Technology Club has dominated the event, which is the nation's premier student video convention and competition with nearly 3,000 middle and high school kids.

"Ms. Suzuki has been teaching for 17 years at Maui Waena. Her dedication to her students has been key to inspiring the development of their talents. Her interdisciplinary and applied approach to learning has been highly effective and well-received by her students. I know, because she's taught a lot of my relatives, and her garage is no longer a garage – it's a workshop for her students. During her tenure, Ms. Suzuki has helped to initiate and expand the STEM programs to include subjects such as coding, media, and robotics, all with facilities that were not designed and equipped with those programs in mind. But when she returns from Orlando, Ms. Suzuki will finally have use of a STEM building, a project that was proposed in 2005 and which was supposed to be completed and opened in 2009. On Friday afternoon, Mr. President, I'm glad to say, she and her colleagues finally got the keys to their classrooms and the 15,000-square-foot building, which boasts nine classrooms for math, science, music, and computer resources. After a lot of delays, more than any certificates or public recognition, I think moving in and using her new classroom will be the most fitting – although very belated – reward for her work. Let's again acknowledge Ms. Suzuki."

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

"My, my, my, what do we have here: The State Teacher of the Year that comes from Washington Middle School in the district that I represent. Oh, my – mahalo nui loa. Sung Man Park is the 2017 State Teacher of the Year from Washington Middle School. He's a mathematics teacher and has taught in public

schools for 12 years and coached Washington Middle's MATHCOUNTS team since 2010. Every year since, his team has won the state championship. Mr. Park's math knowledge is his great wealth, and he shares it with students and fellow educators in classes and competition preparation and in the school's vertical and horizontal strategies to improve math literacy. The accomplishment Mr. Park holds most dear is the community of learners, composed of his former students, who return as mentors and coaches to his current middle school students. Through math, Mr. Park develops a growth mindset, a love of learning, and resilience that are essential to student success in school and life. By his skill and determined coaching and confidence-building, his students overcome their temerity in competition. Mr. President, colleagues, although Mr. Park was unable to join us here today, I ask you to join me in congratulating Sung Man Park, the 2017 State Teacher of the Year."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, who among us can't remember with great fondness and admiration that teacher who inspired us to learn, who quenched our thirst to know more about the world around us, who profoundly shaped our choices in life? And I know each of us has special memories of our favorite teacher. Tracey Idica is such a teacher and has been selected as the Department of Education's 2017 Central District Teacher of the Year. She's an English language arts teacher at Aiea High School and she holds a National Board Certification and has been in the classroom for 34 years. In her own words, she says, 'I love being a teacher and I love my students.' That passion is evident in her work. She believes it's too easy to focus only on those students who are eager to learn. She believes that all children can learn and will do so if given the proper environment, expectation, and strategies. Tracey sets very high expectations for her students and demands nothing but the best. Her mantra is 'accountability.' She expects students to meet the high standards she sets. It's little wonder that she earns the respect of her students, colleagues – not only because of her success in the classroom, but as an advocate for education in the community and before our government leaders. So, colleagues, Tracey Idica's unable to join us today because of a work commitment, but please join me in congratulating her and thanking her for achievements as a selection of the Central District Teacher of the Year. Thank you."

Senator Thielen rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the honor today of recognizing the Windward District Teacher of the Year, Kristi Kusunoki. Kristi Kusunoki is an accomplished musician and a conductor and a leader in her field. She became a music teacher 10 years ago when she realized that music would help students become contributing members to our society. Ms. Kusunoki organizes musical events to increase musical literacy and to highlight the talents of her students. While she improves their technical skills, she also develops their ability to recognize and respond to each other. Kristi recognizes that music provides a creative way to teach students about larger life lessons and also a way to reach students who do not necessarily respond to ordinary classroom lessons. As she says, 'When you are a member of a band, you realize that you are a part of something bigger than yourself. When each student plays by listening and responding to each other, they elevate their performance to create a sound that is blended, balanced, and unified.' Unfortunately, Ms. Kusunoki was not able to join us today, and she has relocated to Washington, D.C., which is a great loss to Hawai'i. We wish her well in her future endeavors, but please join me in recognizing the work that she has done and being recognized as Windward District Teacher of the Year."

Senator Ruderman rose to present the following remarks:

"Laurie Ann O'Brien has been named the 2017 Hawaii District Teacher of the Year. Laurie Ann O'Brien, a National Board Certified math instructor at Kea'au High School, was inspired to teach by a college professor who encouraged her to think outside the box and personalize learning by establishing supportive relationships with her students. As an after-school track and field coach, O'Brien worked with community members and stores to sponsor equipment and supplies to her students. Described as a lifelong learner seeking to improve her teaching and motivate her students, Laurie Ann O'Brien is also pioneering a new computer science course to further her students' understanding of and preparation for the real world. Ms. O'Brien is not able to be with us – please join me in congratulating and thanking Laurie Ann O'Brien for her service and commitment to excellence at Kea'au High School and the Hawai'i Island community."

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. And on your behalf, I'd like to acknowledge David Mireles, Kaua'i District Teacher of the Year. Mr. President, though he is unable to attend today's session, I would like to recognize the 2017 Kaua'i Teacher of the Year from Kapa'a High School. After graduating from University of California, Berkeley, David spent some time figuring out what would be his next path in life and then began working with at-risk young people in Emeryville, West Oakland. After reflecting on the experience, David went on to receive his teaching license and master's degree from the UCLA Graduate School of Education and Information Studies.

"For the past 27 years, David has educated students across the globe, including California, India, and Indonesia. He has helped every student achieve greater heights in their futures, utilizing his talents to guide students in unlocking their full potential regardless of perceived ability or income.

"As a dedicated, veteran teacher, David Mireles established himself on the island of Kaua'i, which he believes to be 'the most beautiful place on Earth.' He has been teaching at Kapa'a High School for the past 10 years. David has been praised by colleagues, students, and parents for his enthusiastic, consistent, and innovative approach on education. Mr. President and colleagues, I would like to extend my sincerest congratulations and mahalo to Mr. David Mireles for his exemplary initiative and outstanding contributions to the Kaua'i community and for being named the 2017 Kaua'i Teacher of the Year.

"Before we conclude, Mr. President, I would like to acknowledge guests who are with us in the gallery and elsewhere in the Capitol this morning. This day during Education Week has been designated Charter School Day. In 1999, Hawai'i passed the first charter school law, converting Wai'alae and Lanikai Elementary Schools to public charters. Today, there are nearly 11,000 students enrolled in 34 charter schools – about 6 percent of public school students statewide. As with any public school, charters are staffed by certified teachers – this morning we acknowledged Kay Beach as one of the DOE's Teachers of the Year.

"The Hawaii Charter School Network has been set up in Room 225 this morning, with more than a dozen schools represented by students and teachers with displays. They will be making the rounds visiting your offices during the day, and I hope you will listen to their stories of success. With us in the gallery today is executive director of Hawai'i State Public Charter School Commission Sione Thompson and Yvonne Lau, his chief operating officer. Also with us in the gallery: staff from the Charter School Network – Jeannine Souki and Malia Gray. And with them are students and leaders from almost two

dozen of the state's 34 charter schools, representing a wide variety of specialty education programs. Thank you all for joining us today.

"Mr. President, that concludes our Education Week presentation for today. Tomorrow, we will be honoring Hawai'i's Milken Educators, our two National Blue Ribbon Schools, and several students – including the Prudential Spirit of Community Award recipients who have been involved in outstanding community service projects. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Taniguchi recognized Boy Scouts from Troop 33, who were accompanied in the gallery by Carl Silva, Leah Inouye, Paige Inouye, Mark Okikawa, Masako McMann, Harlan Kimura, Ross Ishida, and Chris Lee.

## THIRTY-FOURTH DAY

Tuesday, March 21, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Ihara who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Green introduced Katrina Whalen, Lenae Nygaard, Sarah Olival, and Michelle Brunner from Makua Lani Christian Academy, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Espero welcomed a group of enthusiastic sixth-grade students from Holomua Elementary School, who were seated in the gallery with their teachers Mrs. Wilson, Mrs. Rivera, and Mrs. Jackson.

Senator English introduced Mac Poepoe and Kama and Kekai Han, members of Hui Mālama O Mo'omomi on Moloka'i, who were seated in the gallery. Senator English noted that they were on O'ahu to attend the North Moloka'i Community-Based Subsistence Fishing Area rules meeting that evening at Prince David Kawanakoa Middle School, a part of the final stages of the boundaries proposal process that first started in 1994, and wished them well in their endeavors.

Senator Kidani commended and congratulated the recipients of the prestigious Milken Educator Award, and presented the following remarks:

"Yesterday, we began our Education Week presentations by honoring the state's outstanding public school teachers of the year. This morning, we are pleased to recognize three more teachers. They have been selected by the prestigious Milken Family Foundation that each year undertakes a totally secret review process to find the best and brightest – and then stages surprise announcements at really high-energy school assemblies. If you have ever been to one of these events, as I have, you will know that the awards presentations are truly heart-warming. To introduce the first of two Hawai'i Milken Family Foundation Educators, here is Senator Galuteria."

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, the first of our Milken Educators, our 2016-2017 Milken Educators, is Kelly Sutcliffe of Thomas Jefferson Elementary School. Now, Kelly is a fourth-grade teacher at Jefferson Elementary and has used inventive and original means to teach Jefferson Elementary fourth-graders to solve real-world problems. To illustrate how humans might acclimate to climate change and rising temperatures, she asked students to design and build portable air-conditioning units using the engineering design process. Her students developed four different solutions based on the same low-cost materials, such as foam coolers, PVC piping, and ice cubes, and tested them to see which design was most effective. Kelly adapts her dynamic teaching style to meet students' personal interests, to boost engagement using a variety of visuals, empirical learning tasks, group discussions, and physical activity to make each lesson resonate. She is a hands-on teacher, working side by side with each student to monitor their progress. She also works with the parents as partners in each student's education, making them key factors that can enable even greater success. Additionally, she mentors future teachers studying at the university level to help them prepare for their careers. Colleagues, I present to you one of our Milken Educators, Kelly Sutcliffe. Aloha! Thank you."

Senator Harimoto rose to present the following remarks:

"The Milken Family Foundation national Educator Award is one of the most prestigious awards an educator can earn. It has been described as 'the Oscars of education.' The Momilani Elementary School 'ohana, the people of Pearl City, and the entire State of Hawai'i are proud to recognize Mr. Masaru Uchino as a recipient of the Milken Educator Award. Mr. Uchino is truly an outstanding and amazing teacher who has, year after year, gone beyond just teaching students in the classroom. He has been honored for his extraordinary efforts, displayed initiative and creativity, maintained high standards of teaching excellence, and established a learning environment that creates an exuberance for learning among students. Mr. Uchino created the Momilani drama program, in which he writes, produces, choreographs, and directs a new, original, curriculum-based play each year. Last year, my granddaughter was in the play, and I can honestly say that she and all the other students had so much fun performing, singing, and dancing in the play, all the while learning about the science of the water cycle. Yes, Mr. Uchino, that song you wrote about evaporation, condensation, and precipitation still runs through our minds, and Hailey and I still catch ourselves singing that really catchy song.

"So, Mr. Uchino also developed and leads the Momilani fit club that incorporates a nutrition and exercise program for students in grades three to six. Thank you, Mr. Uchino, for being such a caring, dedicated, and exemplary teacher for my granddaughter as well as all the other students at Momilani Elementary School. You are truly among the best of the best. So, Mr. President and colleagues, please join me in congratulating Masaru Uchino on being the recipient of the Milken award. And, Mr. President, if I may, some of his fan club in the gallery: We have his fiancée, Rachel Kimura; and principal Doreen Higa and teacher Dawn Kanoho."

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

"I happened to be at Momilani Elementary that wonderful morning, and I have to say that he was treated like a rock star by his students – the rock star that all of our Milken teachers are because they work so hard to gain the respect of not just the students but your principals and all of your colleagues, so thank you very much for what you do.

"The 75 teachers who have been named Milken Educators over the last 30 years have received an impressive \$1.9 million in award grants. They also continue to connect among themselves as Milken Educator alumni and get together to choose Teachers of Promise. These are instructors who have no more than four semesters of experience in the classroom who show exceptional talent and commitment to their profession.

"This year's Hawai'i Milken Teacher of Promise is with us this morning; here to introduce her is Senator Donovan Dela Cruz."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"We congratulate Kaitlyn Huff on being named recipient of the National Milken Educators of Hawaii Teacher of Promise Award for 2017. This award recognizes a teacher who demonstrates excellence in the field and the highest qualities of a professional educator during their first four semesters in the classroom. Kaitlyn was the honored state winner of this prestigious award in only her third semester of teaching. Kaitlyn strives to broaden her students' experiences with fun, hands-on learning activities that extend into the community and connect with community members. Kaitlyn's students' growth rate in English language arts/literacy and math subjects are the highest

in the school and among the highest in the 42 schools in Central O'ahu. Kaitlyn, in her humble way, was surprised to receive the award for what she considered 'doing my daily duties.' She's also the recipient of the district Teacher of Promise Award. Today we have with us in the gallery Kaitlyn's mother, Vanessa Huff; grandmother Martha Hiroshima; fiancé Hayden Atkins; co-teacher Kanani Benz; and her friend Kiana Espinosa. Thank you. We extend our congratulations and best wishes to Kaitlyn Huff for continued excellence and success in all her future endeavors – congratulations."

Senator Kidani recognized and congratulated the National Blue Ribbon Schools, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, early in this school year, two elementary schools on O'ahu were designated Blue Ribbon Schools of achievement in Hawai'i. Under this national program, schools are recognized for having achieved high levels of performance or making significant improvements in closing achievement gaps. Let's begin with a school in the district of Senator Taniguchi."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"Located in Mānoa Valley and led by principal Rochelle Mahoe, Noelani Elementary has been chosen as one of only 279 public schools in the United States to be recognized as a 2016 National Blue Ribbon School for its hard work in striving for academic success. At Noelani, students are encouraged to think independently and creatively; to participate, challenge, and persevere in the classroom and community; and develop into life-long learners who will continue to contribute to our society.

"This is the second time Noelani has been so honored: In 2001, the school was also selected and recognized as a National Blue Ribbon School. And a notable former Noelani attendee is our 44th President of the United States, Mr. Barack Obama.

"Here today representing Noelani Elementary School and Principal Mahoe is Natalie Wong, who is now in her sixth year as a second-grade teacher at Noelani. Also in the gallery, with us from Noelani, is Alex Kiyokane, another second-grade teacher."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, we recognize Helemano Elementary School and principal Ernest Muh of Helemano being named a 2016 National Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education. (On a side note, Helemano Elementary is where my father attended school, so it's a special school for us.) The Department recognizes elementary, middle, and high schools where students achieve very high learning standards or are making improvements in closing the achievement gap between high-needs students and their peers. Helemano Elementary School in Whitmore Village was one of two schools in Hawai'i and among 329 winners nationwide named as a 2016 Blue Ribbon School.

"Helemano is also characterized as a Recognition school, the highest category of the Department of Education school accountability system known as 'Strive HI,' which recognizes schools for various achievements, including standardized test scores and reducing chronic absenteeism. Helemano provides opportunities for students beyond traditional core subjects, including fine arts, physical education, music, and social/emotional learning. We extend our congratulations and best wishes to Principal Ernest Muh and Helemano Elementary School for continued excellence and success in all future endeavors. Congratulations."

Senator Kidani honored and recognized the Prudential Spirit of Community Award recipients, and presented the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you to our Blue Ribbon Schools. The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards program is the nation's largest youth recognition program based exclusively on volunteer community service. We are pleased that all four Hawai'i students selected for recognition could be with us this morning. To begin the introductions, Senator Espero."

Senator Espero rose to present the following remarks:

"Emma Tandara is an eighth-grader at Ewa Makai Middle School and is this year's Prudential Spirit of Community Awards winner. Emma led efforts at her school to promote recycling of bottles, cans, paper products, and old t-shirts. Her inspiration and motivation to give back to the community through volunteering is founded in her grandmother: The two would often volunteer together up until her grandmother's passing.

"When she joined her school's leadership team, she spearheaded a music video explaining the school's new green initiatives. The video would later be shown to over 300 educators statewide. In total, Emma led a recycling sorting game at three elementary schools, helped coordinate two community recycling drives, and demonstrated how to turn old t-shirts into bags at an emergency preparedness fair – and something that's done every year now. Emma said, 'Though my grandmother couldn't stay forever, the work I've done in her spirit has become something that can.' It is my hope that her peers and even us adults will look toward Emma's hard work and dedication to the environment and find the inspiration to do more ourselves.

"At this time, I'd like to introduce some of her supporters in the gallery: her parents, Anousone and Michelle Tandara; principal Kim Sanders at Ewa Makai Middle School; and teachers Vanessa and Joshua Ching. Congratulations to Emma Tandara, Prudential Spirit of Community Awards winner."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next honoree is Lisa Kam. Lisa Kam is a senior at Maryknoll School; Lisa was selected as the 2017 Prudential Spirit of Community Distinguished Finalist for creating the Family Oriented Cultural Understand Study, also known as FOCUS, which drew teens and their parents to a series of genealogy workshops to help trace their Chinese roots. Lisa created the initiative as part of her volunteer work with Projects Inspired by Teens Changing Hawaii. She worked with the Hawaii Chinese History Center to secure a speaker, and Lisa also contacted schools and Chinese clubs to recruit participants and obtained an in-kind grant for materials and supplies. Can we have a nice round of applause for Ms. Kam? I also wanted to introduce her proud parents, Lori and Leonard Kam, who, I think, are sitting right behind me in the gallery."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"We're honored to have here today Evan Liu. Evan is a 2017 Prudential Spirit of Community Distinguished Finalist. He is the son of proud parents Richard and Amber Liu, who are in the gallery today. He is currently a junior at Punahou School and is an active volunteer whose service activities have included keeping patients company at Kuakini Hospital, serving as a teacher's assistant and as a translator at the International Hospitality Center. One of Evan's projects includes working with friends to raise \$1,000 for cleft lip surgeries through Smile Train. Evan is currently exploring a career in dentistry and has collected 1,000 toothbrushes for people in need in Guatemala. With all the projects he's involved with, he still finds time volunteering as an assistant at a dental office. Thank you, Evan, for your service to our community, and congratulations on your achievements."

Senator Kahele rose to present the following remarks:

“Mr. President, I have the honor of introducing our final Prudential Spirit of Community Award recipient today, and her name is Cierra Nakamura. Colleagues, Cierra is a senior at ‘Iolani School and a stepdaughter of our colleague Senator Glenn Wakai. Cierra’s crusade of philanthropy began when she joined Senator Wakai and her mom at a fundraiser for the Aloha Medical Mission in the eighth grade. She was saddened to hear about the plight of those struggling to survive in Nepal and wanted to help. But she didn’t know how, so she began to research how a lack of preventative dental care can lead to terrible oral health. Cierra discovered that family income in Nepal could only be 80 cents a day, and there was no way that anybody in Nepal could afford a 23-cent toothbrush for their children. So her project was born. Cierra asked a few dentists for toothbrushes, and she got a bunch – but she wanted to make a big impact. In January of 2013, she created a flier; she practiced her pitch and went to the Dental Convention at the Hawai‘i Convention Center. There, she approached the vendors from Colgate, from Crest, from Oral-B, and no one was interested. But that didn’t dismay her – she continued and she kept on pitching, and on her sixth attempt, she met the manager of Patterson Dental. He saw her sincerity; he saw her passion, and he gave her 2,000 toothbrushes and tossed in another 2,000 tubes of toothpaste and dental floss. Cierra was ecstatic: Someone finally believed in her. As she prepped her boxes of donations for the Nepal medical mission, she realized toothbrushes and dental floss are foreign objects to children there. So she went to the University of Hawai‘i dental hygiene school and worked with a professor to create a tutorial video, making sure that it was translated into Nepali. In the fall of 2013, her boxes arrived at a school, and each of the 500 Nepali students watched her demonstration video and were given four brushes, toothpaste, and dental floss.

“Cierra’s success compelled her to create an organization called Smiles Across Miles, and her next effort was to collect not only dental supplies but also school supplies for an orphanage in Vietnam. She put together two boxes filled with a thousand toothbrushes plus coloring books, crayons, and origami paper, and she personally took her donations to Ho Chi Minh City in the summer of 2015 and spent the day interacting with dozens of Vietnam’s forgotten children. She tried to teach them how to fold paper cranes, but they were more interested that day in making paper airplanes. It was a memorable day of giving for her.

“Cierra spent last summer volunteering at the Aloha Medical Mission Dental Clinic in Pālama to help our neighbors without dental insurance. In the meantime, her collection of dental supplies continues, and just last month, she sent 1,400 toothbrushes and toothpaste with the Aloha Medical Mission to the Philippines.

“Cierra wants to be a doctor one day and plans to pursue a career in public health. She has been accepted into JABSOM’s early admissions program and is awaiting mainland college acceptances. We hope she decides to stay here in Hawai‘i. Cierra Nakamura is an extremely intelligent, compassionate, and resourceful teenager, and, colleagues, we recognize and congratulate her for being this year’s Prudential Spirit of Community Hawai‘i State honoree – congratulations. Mr. President, I would also like to introduce her very, very proud parents in the gallery today: her mother, Miki Wakai, and her father, Taro Nakamura. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

Senator Kidani rose to acknowledge the Hawai‘i coordinator of the Prudential Spirit of Community Award – Geri Marks, Vice President, Government Affairs for Prudential Financial, Inc. – and thanked her for all her hard work.

Senator Kidani then honored and congratulated Kacie Kajihara of Kalani High School for her academic achievements, and presented the following remarks:

“Our next student of excellence has accomplished much during her high school years, and we are so pleased that she has made time during spring break to be with us today. For the introduction, Senator Chang.”

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

“Today, we are honored to have Kacie Kajihara with us. Kacie is the daughter to proud parents Ken and Sally Kajihara in the audience. I also have grandparents Takashi and Toshiko Kajihara, and grandma Ellen Ryusaki. And, actually, I also see Kalani High School principal Mitch Otani in the audience as well. She is currently a senior at Kalani High School and has a GPA of 4.125 and has a perfect 36 out of 36 ACT score. She is the president of the school’s Leo Club; an athlete on the school’s varsity soft tennis team; and a member of the Hawaii Youth Symphony and Kalani High School Band, playing the oboe and English horn. In 2016, she placed second in the National FFA Agriscience Fair in plant science, where she was the first top three finalist for Hawai‘i in over 50 years. Even with her academic achievements and extracurricular activities, she still manages to hold a part-time job at Diamond Head Aquatics as an accounting assistant. Congratulations, Kacie, on your achievements.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Thank you, colleagues and Mr. President. This concludes our Education Week presentations for today. Tomorrow, our honored guests will include principals, vice principals, and counselors as we recognize outstanding campus leadership. Thank you.”

The Chair commented good naturedly that Senator Chang omitted the fact that Kacie’s father was a proud graduate of Waimea High School and her grandfather was a teacher at Waimea High School, which, in the Chair’s opinion, was the foundation for all of her success.

At this time, Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I appreciate the last of the boards and commissions for the Department of Health-attached entities that are on our OD today. Unfortunately, with only seven more session days left to receive advise and consent nominations from the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, we have 40 nominees for professional and vocational licensing board that have not come down – 6 on one board, 4 on another; 3 on another, so those boards are critically short of members. I think it would be most unfortunate if those nominations were held over and – because they’re mostly current vacant – and were down to only interim appointments if the names do not come down to the Senate soon. Your committee on CPH and the full Senate need the opportunity to receive the governor’s nominations and thoroughly vet them, and it would be most helpful to do that before conference gets started. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani announced that Education Week would continue the following day, designated as Early Childhood Day, with visits from representatives from the Hawai‘i Children’s Action Network and the Executive Office on Early Learning to advocate for early learning programs.

## THIRTY-FIFTH DAY

**Wednesday, March 22, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Inouye who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fourth Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro welcomed representatives from the Ko 'Olina district Cub Scouts Pack 50 and Pack 126 and Girl Scouts Troop 126, who were present in the gallery with chaperones Leslie and Joshua Hernandez, Shane and Tabatha Toyama, and John Mack.

Senator Shimabukuro then recognized a group of students from the Kamehameha Schools Ipuukui 'Ewa program, who were seated in the gallery with instructors Leonani Puailihau and Punahele Kealanahele-Querebin.

Senator Baker welcomed volunteers of the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN), who were seated in the gallery and were at the State Capitol to raise awareness of colon cancer, as March is Colon Cancer Awareness Month. Senator Baker noted that colon cancer is the third-leading cause of cancer death in the United States, as well as in Hawai'i, with 660 Hawai'i residents diagnosed with colorectal cancer each year, and 240 of them eventually dying of the disease. The advocates' efforts would help progress toward the common goal of eliminating cancer among Hawai'i residents. Senator Baker announced that volunteers would be visiting each office with a board containing 240 blue origami ribbons, signifying the Hawai'i residents that will lose their battle with colorectal cancer, to which the members would add their own ribbon to show solidarity with the cause. Senator Baker then recognized ACS CAN staff member Cory Chun, who was present in the gallery with other volunteers and advocates.

Senator Kim welcomed student council members from Sanford B. Dole Middle School, who were accompanied in the gallery by advisor Grace Domingo, as well as student council members from Kalihi Uka Elementary School, accompanied by advisors Debbie Arakaki, Kristi Hsu, and Inga Park Okuna. Senator Kim noted that the students were participating in the Farrington Complex Leadership Conference, with visits to Honolulu Hale and the State Capitol, as well as participation in a mock hearing in the Capitol Auditorium that afternoon to deliver testimony on House Bill 1172, Relating to Fireworks. Accompanying the students was the group conference coordinator, former State Representative Dennis Arakaki.

The Chair welcomed a group of preschool students, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Green recognized and commended the Aloha United Way and the Institute for Human Services, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, Mr. President, we're going to honor two sectors of our society, our community. As we all know, we're going to talk about education, our education heroes here, in a moment. We also want to thank Senator Kidani for sharing this day with us on the floor. We have two organizations which we're going to give a brief presentation to today.

"Mr. President, homelessness has worsened in our state. It's one of our greatest challenges, as we know. In Hawai'i, we have the highest rate of homelessness per capita in the nation. Many, many of our citizens struggle, so today we're going to recognize

and honor two organizations that have taken up this fight, who have been at the forefront of the battle against homelessness in our state for the past several years. I'd like to first yield the floor to the good senator from 'Ewa Beach for our first introduction."

Senator Espero rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, it is my pleasure to introduce to you, to my colleagues, and our guests, a nonprofit organization that is well-known for its role in assisting our homeless population: the Institute for Human Services. Here with us, representing the Institute for Human Services, are Connie Mitchell, executive director, and Kimo Carvalho, director of community relations. Let's give them a hand.

"The Institute for Human Services is the oldest, largest, and most comprehensive human services agency focused exclusively on ending and preventing homelessness in Hawai'i. IHS strives to create and offer housing solutions for those in crisis and to nurture homeless people toward greater self-direction and responsibility. IHS provides services to help those who are at risk of becoming homeless, those who are homeless, as well as the chronically homeless population. Services such as case management support and Hele2Work and other numerous programs have helped thousands of people through the years to not only find but maintain housing and jobs. In fiscal year 2016, IHS has helped to house 1,654 homeless individuals and delivered homeless services to over 5,000 people.

"Mr. President and colleagues, today we recognize and honor the Institute for Human Services for its efforts in homeless solutions, and we applaud their continued compassion and spirit of innovation in service to all members of our community to include homeless persons and those who have not been touched by such a loss. Mahalo to the Institute for Human Services for your service to the people of Hawai'i – let's give them another big hand. Thank you very much."

Senator Green rose and stated:

"The second part of our presentation today on behalf of the Senate is for individuals who work at Aloha United Way, so I'd like to ask, at this point, Cindy Adams, Jay King, and Norm Baker – the president, program manager, and COO, respectively – to stand. Members, if we could give them a round of applause? Because we had just a little limited space for so many fantastic people from Hawai'i here today, at this moment I'd also like to recognize in the gallery: Jillian Okamoto from Catholic Charities; Ana Pilon, the housing director of Alternative Structures International; Tehani Diaz from Honolulu Community Action Program; Darrin Sato from Kalihi-Palama Health Center; and Major John Chamness from Salvation Army, all of whom also contribute very greatly to this incredible work.

"Mr. President, as a part of this very brief presentation, I want to do something a little bit untraditional. First, I want to say we're not just recognizing these extraordinary people because of their work at United Way; we're speaking a little bit more specifically to their work that they did for the Coordinated Statewide Homeless Initiative, the CSHI. We're going to speak to that because they've done so much to prevent homelessness from occurring in our state. First, I'd like to just read a brief letter. This letter came to me; this is about what these good people did:

Dear United Way,

I was working full-time at a minimum-wage job. I was homeless and had been for almost two years. It seemed no matter what I did to move forward and gain affordable housing, it was not working out for me. I had applied for

housing assistance three years prior while I had existing housing, but that came soon to an end. My daughter, who was on the mainland, was coming home in a few months, and I had no home to offer her but a spot on the beach where I slept. Then, one day, a help services worker called me to inform me my turn had come for the housing assistance. The case advocates processed my application, and now I'm spending my sixth month in an apartment and my daughter is happily attending University of Hawai'i. I was at the end of my rope, with failing health and nothing but worries. I wanted to find a way out of my troubles, but I couldn't find a way past it. So what has the United Way's funding done for me and my family, and their work? It has given me a release of the burden of trying to maintain housing I couldn't have afforded alone. It has provided me with a clean, affordable home for myself and my daughter, along with renewed hope in myself and strength to go on trying to move forward in life – it has given me all of that.

“This is the work that these good people have done. They have kept many, many people from becoming homeless. In fiscal year 2014, I would note, the District Court of the First Circuit, which oversees all of O‘ahu, was going to preside over 6,968 eviction cases, but the program that you participated in, supported, and tasked these good individuals with providing – they served 1,500 households, 4,600 individuals, all under the CSHI program. Forty-seven percent of those homeless households are families with children; 64 percent were at risk of becoming homeless, as many of our citizens are just two or three months away from becoming homeless. Court evictions dropped by 25 percent on O‘ahu alone during this experience. They prevented so many thousands of people from becoming homeless. So, with that, I just want to say: We really can't thank you enough for the work that you've done with your friends over, just across the way. And we just appreciate that you have fought to keep people from becoming homeless and suffering terribly. Thank you for being with us today.”

Senator Kidani recognized and honored distinguished principals, vice principals, and counselors for their commitment and dedication to Hawai'i's students, and presented the following remarks:

“Mr. President and colleagues, thank you for your participation in our Education Week presentations. The career achievements of our teachers and students who have been here this week are – as the President said in his Opening Day remarks – a true inspiration.

“Today's honorees provide leadership on their campuses that also serves to inspire. We recognize their commitment to teacher-teams and to staff who provide a safe and secure learning environment for the students we commit to their care each school day. To begin this morning's introductions, let me call on Senator Gabbard.”

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

“Mr. President, colleagues, and guests: Today we honor National Distinguished Principal of the year Bruce Naguwa, who was selected out of seven nominees statewide by the Hawaii Elementary and Middle Schools Administrator's Association. Remarkably, this isn't the first time he's received this honor; in fact, he's the first to be awarded the National Distinguished Principal Award twice. Previously, he received the NDP Award in 2005, when he headed up Kipapa Elementary School in Mililani.

“As principal of Kapolei Middle School, Bruce Naguwa has demonstrated outstanding leadership in advancing the school's performance and raising student achievement. When he arrived

at Kapolei Middle School, it had the second-lowest middle school scores in Hawai'i, with zero growth index points in both reading and math. After implementing a number of new initiatives the following year, Kapolei Middle received a maximum 90 points for growth in math and 64 points in reading, moving from the bottom fifth percentile to the upper twenty-fifth percentile of schools in the state. We commend him for his strong leadership, innovation, and teamwork.

“With a school of 1,400 sixth- to eighth-grade students – yes, folks, 1,400 middle schoolers – transitioning from childhood to adolescence, Principal Naguwa definitely has his hands full. As part of O‘ahu's growing second city, Kapolei Middle School is expected to have an enrollment of 1,600 students in the next two years. With such a large campus community, it's not easy to create a sense of unity, but Principal Naguwa continually strives to make a personal connection with the students and teachers under his care. At one point in his life, Principal Naguwa thought he'd pursue a career in business – luckily for us, he didn't. For 25 years, Bruce has served the educational community, including being a principal at several O‘ahu schools and a deputy superintendent.

“The Hawai'i State Senate hereby honors and commends Kapolei Middle School principal Bruce Naguwa. We greatly appreciate your lifetime of effort to assure that our students are part of a supportive community, leading them to successful futures. Please give him another hand.”

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

“Although he's not here, it gives me great pleasure to recognize and congratulate, nonetheless, Mr. Michael Harano for being selected the 2017 National Distinguished Principal. Now, National Distinguished Principals, colleagues, are selected based on a wide variety of criteria, including leadership skills, student learning, school demographics, professional preparation and education, and recommendations from students, teachers, staff, and DOE leaders. Principal Harano has been a principal at Washington Middle School for 15 years and has been a school administrator for 29. He's received many awards: In 2010, he received the Hawaii Elementary and Middle School Administrator's Association award – the National Distinguished Principal award – and was a nominee in the 2009 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award. Washington Middle School's Principal Harano understands the challenges that are unique to middle school students, and he embraces them. His approach to ensuring that the needs of his students are met while also providing additional support and activities has earned him respect by his staff, his students, and the State Senate. Mr. President and colleagues, along with our special guests, please join me in giving Mr. Michael Harano, our principal of the year, a nice round of applause. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

“Thank you, Mr. President, and on your behalf, it is my honor and privilege to introduce and recognize Ms. Mahina Anguay, principal of Waimea High School and the recipient of the 2016 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award. The Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award is presented to a public school principal who exemplifies vision, community service, and entrepreneurship. The awardees are based on five criteria:

- establishing a focus on learning,
- building professional communities that value learning,
- engaging external environments that matter for learning,
- acting strategically, and
- sharing leadership and creating coherence

“Mahina has been a principal at Waimea High School for nearly four years and has developed and improved school programs by implementing the STREAM program on Waimea

High School's campus. The STREAM program is a strategic plan integrating science, technology, resources, engineering, art, humanities, and math into the classroom. Mahina is revered by her students, colleagues, and her community and uses her leadership and vision to provide high-quality learning opportunities for her students. She does this by listening to all of the concerns and supporting programs by engaging the community and enlisting assistance from local businesses. The result is students who are college- and career-ready and who are better able to become responsible, productive members of society.

"Mr. President, on our ESSA visit to Waimea High School last year, I was so touched by Mahina's leadership and love for her students. Her professional work ethics were instilled by her mother and grandmother, who were also teachers at Waimea High School. I believe, Mr. President, she is also your longtime friend and a Waimea High School classmate."

The Chair interjected that Principal Anguay was a classmate of his younger sister.

Senator Kidani continued:

"I would like to recognize in the gallery her family who is here with her: her husband, Leo; daughter Pono Lynn Ho; and her grandchildren Hunter and Hailey Ho, Brooke and Braxton Pililau. Thank you for joining us today. Please join me in recognizing and congratulating the 2016 Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award recipient, Ms. Mahina Anguay."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"We congratulate Greg Nakasone, vice principal of Mililani Middle School, on being named the 2017 Hawaii Outstanding Vice Principal by the National Outstanding Assistant Principal of the Year award program. Let's give him a round of applause. This honor was created to celebrate assistant principals who are promoting educational excellence for pre-kindergarten through eighth grade, who are strengthening their schools, and who have demonstrated exceptional leadership and have set high expectations for school staff and students. Greg Nakasone extends the role of vice principal from daily disciplinarian and school operations to devoting his efforts to the principal's plan and the coordination and expansion of the school's charter counts, service learning, and high-interest programs. The result has been an increase in student achievement scores, a 97 percent attendance rate, truancy below 0.1 percent, and no dropouts for the last five years. Greg's oversight of the high-interest program has significantly contributed to its success, where there are over 25 activities with over 700 students participating in the various after-school activities.

"Vice Principal Nakasone has with him today in the gallery family and supporters, if they could please rise? And, although I'm excited to honor Vice Principal Nakasone, I'm even more excited to introduce his parents: his father, George Nakasone, was my former principal at Wahiawa Elementary – let's give him a round of applause; and his mother was my former teacher at Leilehua High School. Just on a side note, Mr. Nakasone taught me the importance of community service and giving back, and Mrs. Nakasone taught me the importance of civics and responsibility, so you can partly blame them – or give them credit – to me being here. Vice Principal Nakasone's wife, Mischele Nakasone, is here, and she's a current teacher at Waikele Elementary; and his three kids, Rylan, Quinn, and Grant – let's give them a round of applause. And from the school we have Principal Elynn Chung, who we recognized on the floor in 2015 as the State of Hawai'i Middle School Principal of the Year; and Errol Hahn, vice principal at Mililani Middle School. So, with that, we extend our congratulations and

best wishes to Greg Nakasone for continued excellence and success in all future endeavors."

Senator Espero rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, I am honored and it gives me great pride to introduce Ms. Geri Martin, the 2017 Hawai'i Assistant Principal of the Year. Ms. Martin is the vice principal of Ewa Makai Middle School in the dynamic community of 'Ewa Beach. Through her hard work and dedication to her students and school, the National Association of Secondary School Principals has recognized her stellar achievements in educational administration. The program annually recognizes the accomplishments of 53 assistant principals representing the 50 states; Washington, D.C.; the Department of Defense Education Activity, and the U.S. Department of State Office of Overseas Schools. This award recognizes Ms. Martin's excellence in the following categories: personal excellence, collaborative leadership, curriculum, and personalization.

"Vice Principal Martin grew up in Wai'anae and found her calling when she worked as a substitute teacher. At age 32, Ms. Martin went back to earn her teaching degree from the University of Hawai'i, Mānoa, College of Education. Her aptitude for leadership and teaching was noticed by her peers and supervisors immediately. In 1997, she was honored with the Sallie Mae award, which is given to the nation's best first-year teachers. Over the years, she has earned a reputation for her outstanding work and efforts. Vice Principal Martin will now be considered for the National Assistant Principal of the Year award. An independent panel of judges will select three finalists, who will be notified later this month. I, along with my colleagues and the entire state, are wishing you the best and know that you are deserving of this national recognition. One more time: Ms. Geri Martin."

Senator Tokuda rose to present the following remarks:

"Good morning, colleagues. I have the pleasure of introducing our 2016 Hawai'i State Counselor of the Year, Ramona Kahawahi. Ramona is a counselor at Kapunahala Elementary School and has been there since 2005. Prior to her work at Kapunahala, she was a counselor at my alma mater, King Intermediate School, and Kapolei Middle School. She holds both a bachelor's degree in family resources from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and a master's degree in psychology and counseling from Chaminade University. Ramona's passion for counseling stems from a desire to maximize the education, academic, career, and social development of all students at Kapunahala Elementary.

"In addition to her responsibilities as a counselor, Ramona serves as an advisor for the school student council, coordinating the STAR assemblies that recognize the school's general learner outcome students, and is the lead counselor for our Castle Complex Leadership Camp at Camp Erdman in Mokolē'ia. I can personally attest to all of her hard work and dedication: My niece Kyla is a student at Kapunahala, and as I was rushing to take her to school last week – I apologize; she's sometimes late, and it's Aunty's fault – she was going over her notes for the STAR assembly that she was emceeing, and I had to admit, I was very impressed by the detail in which Ramona had all of the notes laid out for the emcees. And Rep. Ito and I go every year and drive out to Camp Erdman and we are always amazed at the hard work and the dedication with which educators like Ramona give their time and their effort toward grooming future leaders within our Castle complex. So mahalo for all that you do. Ramona is also an integral member of Kapunahala's faculty, leading several staff wellness programs on campus, including procuring exercise balls for teachers, planning staff healthy socials, pedometer challenges, and Zumba exercise classes. Maybe she can make some recommendations for the Senate as well; we can try some Zumba challenges here.

“We are truly fortunate to have dedicated counselors like Ramona, whose hard work and enthusiasm for counseling inspires our keiki to reach their fullest potential. So, colleagues, please join me once again in congratulating our 2016 Hawai‘i State Counselor of the Year, Ramona Kahawii. We do have some, I believe, supporters of Ramona in the gallery: We have Judy Wong, Kapunahala SASA; we have Ayada Bonilla, behavioral health specialist as well; Konnie McKeague, one of our counselors; and Amanda Affonso, a kindergarten teacher – no easy job. Thank you, colleagues.”

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

“Washington Middle is in the house and we’re doubling down with Washington today, a great school in urban Honolulu. It gives me great pleasure, Mr. President, to recognize another outstanding educator from Washington Middle School: Kristin Silva has been selected as the Secondary School Counselor of the Year by the Hawaii School Counselor Association. Now, the School Counselor of the Year program recognizes individuals who have helped students and advocated on their behalf in school and in life. She is a National Board Certified counselor and has been at Washington Middle for 16 years. Kristin’s teaching and counselor experience began as a counseling practicum student at Lanikai Elementary School. She then became a counseling intern at Waimanalo Intermediate School, working with students in grades seven and eight – oh, good luck with that one. She has a wealth of experience on both the local and national level, much too numerous to recognize, but, believe me, the list is long. She’s received numerous awards, including the National Board Certified School Counselor in 2010 and the Girl Scout Troop 48 cookie manager and co-leader, 2012 – I like the Samoas that they sold me the other day; thank you for that – and also a part of the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawai‘i volunteer cohort. Colleagues, please join me in congratulating Kristin Silva; thank you so much.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Today has been designated Early Childhood Day. Activities for the day, including a rally earlier this morning, have been coordinated by Deborah Zysman, executive director of the Hawaii Children’s Action Network, and Lauren Moriguchi, director of the Executive Office on Early Learning.

“At various times during the day, representatives from early childhood advocacy groups have been or will be calling at your offices. I was informed earlier that people from 17 groups are here – some are in the gallery. Everyone here for Early Childhood Day, please stand to be acknowledged. Thank you so much for the work you do on behalf of our keiki.”

Senator Kidani then commended and congratulated Lynn K. Cabato for her lifelong service to Hawai‘i’s keiki, and presented the following remarks:

“Finally, Mr. President, in keeping with the early childhood theme, last but not least, it is my honor to recognize the next guest in the chamber with us today. She is someone who has dedicated more than 40 years to doing what’s best for literally thousands of our keiki in vulnerable communities. Those 40-plus years began in 1976, when she was hired as a social service aide by the Honolulu Community Action Program (HCAP) Head Start. Lynn Cabato, will you please stand and be recognized?”

“From the time she started for HCAP Head Start, Lynn pursued the many opportunities for professional development available to her, always seeking the most challenging positions to enhance her knowledge and skills. As a Head Start teacher, program manager, and assistant director, she gained experience in program development and fiscal management and learned the best practices in collaboration and networking. Lynn became Head Start director in 2005, accepting the position as fulfillment

of her passionate and life-long commitment to HCAP and Hawaii Head Start’s philosophy and mission: Enriching the Lives of Children; Engaging Families; Strengthening Communities.

“While Lynn may never fully know all of the wonderful ways in which she has enriched the lives of thousands of youngsters and their families, her wisdom and good counsel will be missed by her Head Start ‘ohana and the network of child centers island-wide. Lynn will retire as Head Start director at the end of the week – just two days from now – after a remarkable and selfless career. Congratulations, Lynn; may you enjoy many years of retirement in good health among your family and friends. Thank you; mahalo, Lynn.

“Mr. President, I would note that I first came to know her when I served on the HCAP board many years ago, but she is also a long-time neighbor in Mililani, and I thank her for being here and thank her for all her good work for HCAP.”

**Thursday, March 23, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Harimoto introduced his brother, Dr. Deane Harimoto, who was visiting from Michigan to celebrate their parents' seventieth wedding anniversary. Dr. Harimoto was seated in the gallery with his wife, Dawn, and son, Alex.

Senator Kidani commended and congratulated Roosevelt High School LifeSmarts State Champions, and presented the following remarks:

"This morning, our Education Week presentations conclude with a team of students from Roosevelt High School that has distinguished itself by winning the statewide LifeSmarts competition last month. For the introductions, Senator Taniguchi, please."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"On February 11, 2017, Roosevelt High School's LifeSmarts team emerged as the state champions in the 13th annual LifeSmarts Hawaii competition. They will now go on to represent Hawaii at the national LifeSmarts competition in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, from April 21st to 24th. LifeSmarts is a consumer literacy competition. Students compete in the following categories: personal finance, health and safety, the environment, technology, and consumer rights and responsibilities. After testing their skills through written tests, a 'Speed Smarts' activity, and game-show-style buzzer rounds at the state finals, the team from Roosevelt High School emerged as this year's state champion.

"LifeSmarts is a program of the National Consumers League and run locally by the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs Office of the Securities Commissioner in partnership with the Hawaii Credit Union League. As a proud alumnus of Roosevelt, I'm very happy to introduce and congratulate the 2017 LifeSmarts team champions. Here today with us on the floor are four members of the team: Zheng Huang, Hajin Jang, William Li, and Elvis Tran. Captain Bryan Kitsu and coach Brian Lock could not be here to join us today, but sitting with the team is DCCA's LifeSmarts coordinator, Theresa Kong Kee. In the gallery, we also have a few guests: DCCA director Cat Awakuni Colón, who's also a Roosevelt grad; acting commissioner of securities Henry Tanji; Roosevelt High School principal Mr. Sean Wong; LifeSmarts program assistant Ariana Masuoka; program partner Hawaii Credit Union League business services manager Grant Kashiwabara; and one of the program sponsors, UPW Local 646, Florence Kong Kee, representing Dayton Nakanelua."

## THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY

Friday, March 24, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:43 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Galuteria, Kim, and Ruderman who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads welcomed Debbie Higgins, his longtime friend who was visiting from southern California. Senator Rhoads noted that Ms. Higgins was an English literature professor, and spent time as the warden at The C.S. Lewis Study Centre at The Kilns, C.S. Lewis's former home in Oxford. Accompanying Ms. Higgins in the gallery was Cindy McMillan, Senator Rhoads's wife and favorite constituent.

Senator Baker noted that it was World Tuberculosis Day and recognized guests from Lanakila Health Center, who were at the State Capitol to raise awareness about the disease.

Senator Keith-Agaran introduced Margie Tupper, a teacher at Nu'uauu Elementary School and mother of his legislative aide, Manuokalani Tupper, both of whom were seated in the gallery.

Senator Espero welcomed a group of sixth-grade students from Holomua Elementary School in 'Ewa Beach, who were present in the gallery with teacher Will Kane and parent chaperones Melanie Natividad and Chandelle Toigoe.

Senator Inouye recognized the presence of Blaine Miyasato from Hawaiian Airlines in the gallery.

Senator Espero celebrated the inaugural Honolulu Biennial Festival, and presented the following remarks:

"I would like to begin by introducing the following individuals affiliated with the Honolulu Biennial arts festival: co-founder Katherine Anne Leilani Tuider; co-founder Isabella Hughes; vice president of the board Gloria Lau; board member Taiji Terasaki; curator Ngahiraka Mason; and board member Li Lundin. Give them a hand, everyone. I have a few words, Mr. President.

"Entwined in art is a reflection of the world around us, capturing both its beauty and despair. The Honolulu Biennial Foundation, through its inaugural Honolulu Biennial arts festival, seeks to link the hearts and minds of the Pacific with presentations and exhibitions of contemporary art highlighting the cultural diversity and common understanding that emboldens the human spirit and the meaning of aloha. Founded in 2014 by Dr. Kóan Jeff Baysa, Isabella Hughes, and Katherine Tuider, the Honolulu Biennial Foundation worked diligently to bring contemporary art to the forefront, further demonstrating our state's growing reputation as an international crossroads for culture, entertainment, and the arts. The community-based, non-commercial exhibition offers complimentary public programs throughout the duration of the eight-week festival. The central exhibition area is located at The Hub at Ward Village, which is the old Sports Authority. Additional exhibition sites include Bishop Museum; Foster Botanical Garden; Hawaii Prince Hotel; Honolulu Hale; Honolulu Museum of Art; the IBM Building at Ward Village; The ARTS at Marks Garage; and Shangri La, a museum of Islamic art, culture, and design. I encourage each and every one of my colleagues to visit these sites to see the contemporary works from 33 artists curated under the direction of Fumio Nanjo, director of Tokyo's Mori Art Museum, and Ngahiraka Mason, former curator of the

indigenous and Maori art at Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki, the largest museum in New Zealand. And we are planning a day where we can have our colleagues in the Senate and in the House visit with staff in the very near future – pau hana, after work.

"Some of the international artists include Brett Graham of New Zealand, Choi Jeong Hwa of Korea, Mohammed Kazem of the United Arab Emirates, Alexander Lee of Tahiti, and Zhan Wang of China. Hawai'i artists include Andrew Binkley, Marques Hanalei Marzan, and Al Lagunero. Our own local artists will benefit from the exposure and publicity of this international art festival, which we know will become a regular event every two years. Our local artists' participation will build and grow Hawai'i's art industry and enhance tourism as well. Pablo Picasso said, 'There are painters who transform the sun to a yellow spot, but there are others who, with the help of their art and their intelligence, transform a yellow spot into the sun.' For those of you who are able to visit these impressive exhibitions at the Honolulu Biennial, you will go from understanding the meaning of Picasso to seeing and feeling its meaning.

"Thank you, Mr. President, for allowing us to share our support for our Hawai'i art industry and helping to promote creativity and innovation globally. We did support and pass a GIA for this endeavor as well, so the State of Hawai'i certainly has skin in this game. And at this time, I'd like to introduce a few people in the gallery: Leila Hughes, the mother of Isabella; Harrison, her husband; and their children, Koa and Roya. And again, one more hand for the Honolulu Biennial inaugural event. Thank you very much, Mr. President."

At this time, Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health heard governor's messages totaling about 25 this morning. There were some great nominees, and

our boards and commissions, particularly in the Department of Health, will be the richer for it in terms of the work and goodwill that these nominees will bring. Unfortunately for your Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health, we still have about 40 positions to professional and vocational licensing boards and commissions that are very important to our state, many of whom are in jeopardy of not having quorum if nominees don't come down and we have an opportunity to vet them. So, I would just note for our friends upstairs that there are only four more session days in which to receive boards and commissions nominations, particularly the critical PVL ones. Mahalo."

Senator Inouye rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Okay, we got the results of our contest today and, as you all know, members, we did have the list that would include 29 names. Third place, tie: 27 went to Senator Dela Cruz and Senator Thielen; second place: 28 – Senator Rhoads; and the first place, with complete 29 names: Senator Chang! So, his ears were sharp. Clerk's Office: Allison – she did a good job. Congratulations. Thank you."

The Chair commented, in good humor, that the results were in favor of the younger people in the Senate Chamber, having the skills needed to succeed at the activity.

Senator Green rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Just very briefly: I think that a lot of you have noticed that I've been focusing on some of the health economics of homelessness this year, and I wanted to give a fact and do this maybe over the course of the next couple weeks. Today's fact is that there's a gentleman in our state, a wonderful person who I've been able to meet, who is homeless. He, last year, went to the hospital 241 times, and his healthcare spend, his Medicaid spend – and he shared this openly with us – was \$1,229,570. Some of the proposals that we are working on show that if we get housing for individuals who have chronic homelessness, their healthcare spend drops 43 percent in Hawai'i, 55 percent in other states, which means that this gentleman – named Gary – we would save, if we were able to get him a home, \$528,715, and that's just data from last year. So, as we begin to unfold policy on this and work on this issue, I think, I want to be able to make very clear that this will be good for Gary and good for our state. Thank you, members."

Senator Baker then introduced American Diabetes Association Hawaii Community Leadership Board members Gino Soquena and Wendy Loh, and American Diabetes Association Hawai'i office staff member Lawrence Duenas, who were present in the gallery.

After the first harvest of Hawai'i hemp, in the not-too-distant future, you'll receive a one-way ticket on the city bus to Senate District 20, where you'll be wined and dined on Hawaiian hemp wine, smoked hemp ale from the Maui Brewing Company, hemp tofu soufflé, hemp heart risotto, and hemp mango cheesecake.

"Colleagues and guests, you have heard me on many occasions talk about hemp, a wonderful miracle crop that's got thousands of uses: food, clothing, medicine, cosmetics, biofuel, animal feed, and an eco-friendly building material called 'hempcrete' – which I forgot in my office. It can even clean the soil through a process known as phytoremediation. As Ziggy Marley, son of world-famous reggae legend Bob Marley, has said, 'I want people to get over the stigma about hemp. These seeds can't make you high, but they will make you feel good.' And I say amen to that, brah. And if you'll pardon my enthusiasm, hemp hemp hooray!

"In 2015, the Hemp Industries Association estimated the retail value of all hemp products sold in the U.S. at \$620 million, but all that profit is now going to countries like China and Canada because of our ridiculous, archaic federal laws banning its use, except under certain conditions. And, as an aside, I am still lobbying a certain congresswoman who's working hard to make some changes at the federal level; I think I still have some leverage with her. But before I go on, a brief history of hemp in Hawai'i: Locally, in 1999, Act 305 was enacted in Hawai'i, establishing a privately funded hemp research project that lasted three years. It was a small plot in Wahiawā, the results found that the Chinese variety of hemp seed were best for Hawai'i. Governor Cayetano proclaimed December 14, 1999, as Industrial Hemp Day of Hawai'i. You'll like this, as legislators: Since 1999, there have been 32 bills and 13 resolutions introduced in the Legislature related to hemp. Yes, that's right: 45 pieces of legislation. In 2014, I introduced S.B. 2175, which was signed into law as Act 56, authorizing UH's CTAHR to establish a two-year hemp study. And, finally, 17 years later in 2016, S.B. 2659, Act 228, passed, establishing a five-year industrial hemp pilot program under the Department of Ag to allow the cultivation of industrial hemp for agricultural and academic research, which includes the commercial sale of hemp for marketing and industry development.

"So today is a special day because we're honoring our very own local team who led the 2015 industrial hemp research project that put hemp back on the map here in Hawai'i nei. First, we have Dr. Harry Ako, who was the principal investigator; and his associates are Melody Heidel, Alan Yoshimoto, and Shauna McHugh. Please give them all a hand. Dr. Harry Ako is the ideal visionary to be Hawai'i's hemp hero. He was at UH as an assistant associate and full professor in the biochemistry and molecular biosciences and bioengineering departments from 1976 to 2015. His efforts brought in grant

funds in excess of \$2 million for research projects important to Hawai'i's agriculture and aquaculture. Dr. Ako has authored 57 peer-reviewed books and articles and has been responsible for teaching hundreds of students to love biochemistry.

"As I mentioned, Act 56 of 2014 authorized UH's CTAHR to establish a two-year hemp study. The study wasn't all smooth sailing: Because of the nightmare dealing with the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, it actually took 11 months to get the seed here. Nevertheless, on April 10, 2015, a few Senate and House members joined Dr. Harry Ako and his team for the hemp seed planting at the test plot in Waimānalo. It was very nice; there was an official Hawaiian blessing; the kahu was there, and all good vibes. A few months later, on July 23rd, I was invited to participate in the harvest, and, I must admit, I was a bit apprehensive, wondering how tall these plants could be after a few months – three, maybe four, feet tall? When I arrived, I was shocked and surprised to see Dr. Ako standing beside hemp plants that were over 10 feet tall. Yes, from seed to 10 feet tall in 16 weeks. Here's my visual aid: Here's one of those from that harvest [*holds up hemp stalk*]. And there was Dr. Ako, dwarfed by these huge hemp plants, blowing in the wind, pointing at them, exclaiming, 'Senator, look! From seed with no fertilizers, no pesticides; we just watered them.' In December 2015, CTAHR's hemp research report was presented to the Legislature concluding that 'hemp seed production may be a lucrative activity for farmers. There is significant potential for a successful hemp agricultural industry in Hawai'i based on the preliminary findings of the 2015 industrial hemp research project.' Now, colleagues, given that this was a research study by academics, they, of course, had to be a little conservative in their assessment.

"You might be wondering, well, where do things stand now? After session today, at 1:15 in Room 224, Dr. Ako will be kicking off an info briefing on his research. We'll hear about the current status of the state industrial hemp pilot project and the potential for hemp development in Hawai'i. We'll also have presentations from the Department of Ag and the Maui Hemp Institute for Research & Innovation. You might recall it was the Maui Hemp Institute who awarded me the prestigious and highly coveted 2016 Honorary Hempster of the Year award, which is prominently displayed in my office. And to give you a teaser for this afternoon's info briefing, the RFP for the seed development went out earlier this month, and the Department of Ag is on track to complete the admin rules by July of this year. But the big question on everyone's mind is, when can we actually start growing it? Well, I invite you to come to Room 224 at 1:15 to find out the answer to that question.

"I was told that the Hawai'i Farmers Union surveyed its members and over 100 farmers said that they are ready to put hemp seed into the ground. So, as the Ag and Environment committee chair, I want Hawai'i nei to become the hemp seed capital of the world. My vision is to see farmers growing hemp in Hawai'i as a cottage industry and the unique branding that comes with that. And I have inside my hemp briefcase right here a few of those products: Here we have hemp oil, hemp protein, hemp seed, toasted hemp seeds, hemp granola, ready-to-eat hemp seeds. Now, the problem is, these aren't made here in Hawai'i. These should have the Hawaiian label, you know? The label with the hula girl, right, and the guy strumming his 'ukulele? That's what we need to be doing here in Hawai'i.

"So, I know some of you are entrepreneurial types. I've already spoken with a couple of you, and you're doing some research and thinking about jumping in on this cutting-edge hemp industry. My advice is don't dilly-dally. My understanding is that the DCCA has over 100 trade names that



are already registered. Some of these are: The Bomb Hemp Wear, Hemp Hawaii, Hawaiian Hemp Cafe, Hemp Is Aloha, The Hemphisphere, Holy Hemp Ministry, and – my all-time favorite – Hemp Hemp Hooray LLC.

“So none of this would be possible without the hard work and dedication of Dr. Ako and his team. Dr. Ako, we are indebted to you for showing your lifetime of expertise and mana‘o. Mahalo nui loa for confirming that industrial hemp is viable and valuable for a sustainable Hawai‘i. So, please, another round of applause for Dr. Ako and Melody, Alan, and Shauna. And, finally, also in the gallery, we have with us today supporters of Dr. Ako and his hemp research team: executive director of the Hawai‘i Dispensary Alliance, Chris Garth; and also journalist Hans Kern. Aloha! Welcome. And I also notice longtime hemp advocate Representative Cynthia Thielen. Nice to see you, Cynthia. Mahalo.”

At 11:46 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

## FORTIETH DAY

**Thursday, March 30, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator English who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Ihara recognized a group of student government leaders from Kaimuki High School, who were seated in the gallery with their teacher, Ms. Holly Honbo.

Senator Shimabukuro welcomed the "three-peat" champion Wai'anae Tigers Jr. Pee Wee football team, who was present in the gallery with coaches and team parents.

Senator Kahele introduced Mike Morris, president and chief executive officer of Maui Family YMCA, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Baker recognized and honored the Boys & Girls Clubs 2017 Youth of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"On behalf of our Majority Leader, it's my pleasure to introduce some very special guests we have on the floor and in the gallery. Every year, the Hawaii Alliance of the Boys & Girls Club holds a statewide competition in order to select Hawai'i Youth of the Year. Beginning with island competitions, youth from various clubhouses compete against one another to be selected as an island finalist for the Hawai'i State Youth of the Year competition. The island finalists then come to O'ahu to compete. Today, the Hawai'i Youth of the Year will be determined. The five finalists who are with us on the floor today made their presentations and were interviewed by a panel of judges this morning. The winner will be announced at a luncheon this afternoon and will represent the State of Hawai'i in the upcoming Boys & Girls Clubs of America Pacific Region Youth of the Year competition. The National Youth of the Year is inducted by the President of the United States and receives a \$100,000 four-year scholarship. To achieve the title of Youth of the Year on any level, club members must embody the values of leadership and service, academic excellence, and healthy lifestyles. They exemplify the positive impact that Boys & Girls Clubs have on the lives of young people.

"Before introducing the island finalists who are here with us on the floor today, I would like to recognize the participants from the island competitions who are in the gallery, so can the youth from Maui, the Big Island, O'ahu, Kaua'i, and the military youth please stand to be recognized? Thank you very much for being with us. May we also recognize all of the supporters who are here for our island youth competition? Don Couch from Maui, former councilmember; I see Kelly Pearson from Boys & Girls Clubs of Maui. Thank you so much for supporting all of them, the parents, the staff, and administrators. Now I would like to yield the floor to my colleague from Maui, Senator Gil Keith-Agaran, for the first introduction of our floor guests."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to present the following remarks:

"Amanda Caires is from the Makawao Clubhouse. As a tenth-grader, she already has 100 hours of volunteer work through her club and her school. She is an avid participant in the clubhouse, where she's also cultivating her artistic talents. She recently created a piece of art for the Boys & Girls Clubs of

America national fine arts competition, and it was selected to represent Maui in the regional level in California.

"Amanda maintains a 3.8 GPA at King Kekaulike and also participates in Key Club, the drama club, and the Japanese club at school.

"The Maui delegation is proud to have her representing our home island and wishes her much success."

Senator Kahele rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, this year's 2017 Boys & Girls Club of the Big Island Youth of the Year awards finalist is Shelsi Candaroma. Shelsi is a junior at one of our state's finest public educational institutions, Hilo High School, and serves as a positive role model and tutor at the Boys & Girls Clubhouse in Hilo. During her seven years with the Boys & Girls Club, Shelsi has learned and developed critical leadership, communication, and teamwork skills. She's exercised these acquired skills for multiple community service projects, including feeding the homeless, the Revolutionary Youth Market, and various Keystone service projects. When Shelsi isn't at school or serving our community, you can find her on the basketball court or the soccer field or dancing hula or leading cheers for Hilo High fans. Congratulations, Shelsi."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Mr. President. On your behalf, it is my pleasure to introduce Mr. Bryden Ka'auwai, the 2017 Boys & Girls Club of Kauai Youth of the Year. Bryden is currently a sophomore at Kaua'i High School enrolled in several honors classes and has been an active member of the Boys & Girls Club of Kauai for the past nine years. He is also a member of the Kaua'i All-Island Band and has traveled extensively throughout the country with the band performing in a multitude of prestigious events, including Memorial Day Parade in Washington, D.C., and the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City. In December, he and the band will be traveling to California to perform at the 2017 Holiday Bowl.

"In addition to his academic accomplishments, Bryden has consistently challenged himself to employ his strengths and abilities for the benefit of his community. Through the Boys and Girls Club - Kauai's Leaders in Training program, he helped to establish the first annual True Colors Color Run, a suicide awareness and prevention event, which will be held next month at Vidinha Soccer Field on Kaua'i. This free event will include Kaua'i's first Color Run and obstacle course, special performances, food trucks and vendors, but most importantly, the day's events will culminate with a rally to promote suicide awareness and prevention.

"Bryden exemplifies the virtues of selflessness and leadership and possesses a strong sense of self and character. Simply put, in his own words, 'If I continue with my best effort, everything is possible.' Mr. President and colleagues, another round of applause for Mr. Bryden Ka'auwai. Thank you, Bryden.

"Mr. President, also in the gallery today are two of the finalists for the 2017 Kauai Youth of the Year: Ms. Kimberly Matutina from the Lihue Clubhouse and Ms. Alexis Freeman from the Kapaa Clubhouse. They are accompanied by Lihue Clubhouse director Ms. Asaka Herman, Ms. Tina Albao, Ms. Leah Nuesca, Ms. Charlene Hanie, and Mr. JR Guerrero. Once again, colleagues, please join me in congratulating Mr. Bryden Ka'auwai; thank you so much for joining us today."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues and guests, today I am delighted to introduce to you another Youth of the Year finalist named Alexis Goodwin of the Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam Teen Center. Alexis is originally from Ohio but has been a member of the Hickam Teen Center for more than two years. She’s a 16-year-old and is currently being home-schooled at Obridge Academy. Alexis serves as president of the Keystone Club, a leadership development program for youth ages 14 through 18. As the president of that club, she has coordinated various club events dedicated to academic success, career preparation, and community service. She also volunteers at Mokulele Elementary School, where she reads to children, hoping to instill in them a love and passion for reading. She also volunteers at the school’s monthly clean-up efforts and is a phenomenal leader in our community. Ladies and gentlemen, guests, colleagues, please help me in honoring one of this year’s Youth of the Year finalists, Alexis Goodwin.”

Senator Riviere rose to present the following remarks:

“It’s my privilege today to introduce Xavier Garrido. He’s a finalist, and he’s representing U.S. Army Garrison. This fine young man is representing the U.S. Army Garrison, Child & Youth Services at Schofield Barracks. He’s also a member of the Keystone leadership training program. He has served as the sergeant-at-arms from 2015 and 2016, and he is now the Keystone president in his chapter. He’s clearly an accomplished panelist; he’s participated in the Keystone Conference, Pacific Teen Panel, and the Army Teen Panel from 2016 to present. Furthermore, this dynamic young man has spent three years volunteering with Schofield Barracks Youth Center and multiple volunteer service projects with the Army Community Service. Additionally, he’s dedicated time to the Fisher House project, and if you folks recognize that name, the Fisher House does great work around the world taking care of the disabled and people who are injured and getting medical treatment who have served our country, so he’s worked with that. And he’s volunteered locally, of course, but he’s also assisted even in the Yongsan skate park beautification project when he lived in South Korea.

“Xavier Garrido displays so much potential; I’m impressed to see all that he’s done and I’m looking forward to seeing what he will yet accomplish in the life ahead of him. Ladies and gentlemen: Xavier Garrido. Mr. President, if I could also introduce Virginia and Peter Garrido, his parents, who are in the audience. Aloha. And also, some of his mentors and other supporters are in the audience. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Baker rose and stated:

“Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, colleagues, for all participating in honoring our Youth of the Year finalists. We look forward to finding out who is named Youth of the Year and will represent the State of Hawai‘i in the national competition. You are all very worthy and will represent Hawai‘i well. Good luck to each of you. We are delighted to have you with us in the Senate Chamber. Mahalo.”

Friday, March 31, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

At this time, Senator Espero recognized Ernest "Ernie" D. Libarios, Sr., who was recently selected as the 2017 Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Education Alumni Association. Senator Espero noted that Mr. Libarios was the first Filipino counselor in a student service department of the UH Community Colleges system when he joined the newly established Leeward Community College in 1969, as well as the first Filipino male graduate of Chaminade University in 1961. Mr. Libarios was present in the gallery with his son, Ernest "Niki" Libarios, Jr., director of student services at the UHM College of Education; Leon Florendo, a friend and former student of Mr. Libarios, who works as an assistant professor and counselor at Leeward Community College Wai'anāe; and Ken Sabog, a friend and parishioner at Resurrection of the Lord Catholic Church, where Mr. Libarios is a deacon.

Senator Kahele introduced a group of student leaders from the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy at the University of Hawai'i Hilo, who were seated in the gallery with Dr. Carolyn Ma, Dean of the College of Pharmacy; Dr. Wesley Sumida, Associate Specialist; and Gerald De Mello. Senator Kahele noted that the students were enrolled in a four-year course of study leading to a doctor of pharmacy degree, with an emphasis on patient care as well as research in pharmacy science to help drive the improvement of quality healthcare in Hawai'i and throughout the Pacific.

Senator Kim expressed gratitude to Dr. Amefil "Amy" Agbayani for her exceptional leadership and service to the University of Hawai'i and innumerable contributions to the State of Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, it is an honor, and fitting, on this last day of Women's History Month to recognize a woman who has contributed so much to the people of Hawai'i. This morning, I speak of Dr. Amy Agbayani, who recently retired as the assistant vice chancellor for student diversity and director of the Office of Student Equity, Excellence and Diversity at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

"Amy has been contributing to our society for more than 50 years. She arrived in Hawai'i in 1964 as an East-West Center scholar. She earned her doctorate from the University of Hawai'i and immediately began demonstrating a combination of scholarship and leadership that would distinguish her tenure at the university and in our community. She's perhaps best known for co-founding Operation Manong, a program to tutor Filipino and other immigrant students in the public schools. Over time, this type of service would be expanded to provide opportunities to Native Hawaiians, African Americans, Pacific Islanders, women, students with disabilities, preschool children, senior citizens, and many others. Just as importantly, she secured millions of dollars to underwrite scholarships and various services. All the while, Dr. Agbayani continued to conduct research on Filipinos in Hawai'i and produce papers and books as well as serve on boards, like the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission and the Judicial Selection Commission. She never lost her desire to fight for the disenfranchised, mobilizing individuals and groups and mentoring them on bringing

meaningful change to society. Dr. Agbayani has received numerous awards for these achievements, including from the YWCA, Filipino Community Center, and the Honpa Hongwanji Mission as a Living Treasure. While she is retired, her work will continue through her Endowed Scholarship for Civil Rights, which will enable young people to continue her work in building a more equitable and inclusive society.

"As a resident and representative of Kalihi, Amy, who is my constituent, has been a longtime community leader who has been selfless in her service to others as a friend, a good neighbor. She never hesitates to answer a call to help, to do whatever is in her power to contribute or give freely of her precious time and talents to build a better society.

"So, joining her today are family members Gus, Aleli, and Lina; Associate Justice Sabrina McKenna; Associate Justice Michael Wilson; from the University of Hawai'i, Amy's former boss, Dr. Doris Ching; Regent Simeon Acoba; Regent Michelle Tagorda; Vice Chancellor for Students Lori Ideta; and faculty and staff and students from the Equity, Excellence and Diversity – or SEED – program and Pamantasan Council; Faye Kennedy from the Hawaii Friends of Civil Rights; and other friends of Amy who supported her efforts in the Filipino community, with the Patsy Mink Political Action Committee, at Parenthood, and the Commission on the Status of Women; and all of you who are here to show your support for Amy, please stand to be recognized. Amy, if you will stand, and, members, will you join me in congratulating Amy Agbayani on her retirement? We wish her nothing but the best in coming years, and we also wish her hau'oli lā hānau, happy birthday – it's also her birthday today."

Senator Galuteria rose to request that the words of the previous speaker be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only). Senator Galuteria expressed his gratitude as "the tallest Filipino in the Legislature" to Dr. Agbayani, a wonderful woman who had provided him unwavering support and guidance during his tenure as state chair of the Democratic Party 12 years ago.

## FORTY-SECOND DAY

**Monday, April 3, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:40 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Ruderman who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Wakai recognized and congratulated the United States Small Business Administration's State of Hawai'i Small Business Award recipients, and presented the following remarks:

Senator Thielen rose to present the following remarks:

Founded in 1959 by John and Margaret Mullen, John Mullen & Company is a third-generation kama'aina company that operates as an insurance adjusting firm, representing companies throughout the State of Hawai'i and the Pacific Basin. Owner and president Terry Mullen has worked in the enterprise for 40 years before being named president and CEO in 1990. Terry's daughter Sara also works in the company, taking on other high-level management duties in the family business. Under the Mullens' leadership, the 58-year-old family company continues to grow, showing annual increases in revenue, assets, and net worth. Employees are treated like family, a priority that is validated with loyalty and longevity of staff who have worked at the company over 25 years. 'Demonstrating aloha through every task and interaction, whether with a client or a fellow employee, is what we strive for at John Mullen & Company on a daily basis.' I'd also like to recognize Russell Shogren Jr. of First Hawaiian Bank, who had nominated the company; thank you. And another round of applause for Cyndy Knudson and John Mullen & Company."

Senator Harimoto rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, it's my privilege to recognize Maria A.F. Etrata as the 2017 SBA Small Business Advocate for Minorities. Maria was unable to be here with us today, so representing her is Nedy Directo, who nominated Maria for this award."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Each year, the Small Business Administration is pleased to honor Hawai'i's top entrepreneurs and advocates with prestigious annual SBA awards. This year's Small Business Advocate for Financial Services for the State of Hawai'i is Reginald Baker. Sherry’s a consultant, advocate, educator, and moderator offering awareness to Hawai’i’s small business owners and individuals about information, issues, and policies which impact our local community. Sherry Bracken writes, hosts, and produces a daily event program as well as a weekly interview program for two Hawai’i Island stations. She’s a contributing news reporter for Hawai’i Public Radio and works with Big Island Video News, giving a voice to stories about business, nonprofit organizations, and people and events all across our Big Island. Sherry has interviewed more than 500 guests, each of whom have impacted Hawai’i’s economy and quality of life, from elected officials – which we fear Sherry, on occasion, when she’s interviewing us, because she gives great probing interviews – to business leaders, from subject matter experts to students. Storylines have covered issues from our weather to environment, vog and the volcano on Big Island, disease to diversity, and many of the most important issues and controversial challenges of our time.

At this time, Senator Baker announced that the annual Legislative Women's Caucus Easter basket donation drive had started, and urged the members and all staff offices to participate.

## FORTY-THIRD DAY

**Tuesday, April 4, 2017**

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Baker commended and congratulated the 2016 Healthcare Heroes awardees, and presented the following remarks:

“The Healthcare Association of Hawaii is a leading voice for healthcare providers in the state. The organization works to positively influence state and federal policy to provide quality and accessible health care to all of the people in Hawai'i. Through HAH, patients are given the opportunity to acknowledge the service of outstanding healthcare providers – those who have demonstrated exceptional commitment and noteworthy expertise. The five healthcare providers for 2016 we are recognizing today are honored for their exemplary care that they delivered to patients as well as their loved ones across the state. These people truly are the epitome of selfless service for the betterment of our community and, therefore, are more than worthy to be recognized as the 2016 Healthcare Heroes. I would now like to yield the floor to Senator Kidani for our first introduction.”

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

“Our first Healthcare Hero – with the most wonderful name – is Pixie Bickel. Pixie never realized how her career choice would impact the lives of so many women. Born in Nebraska and raised in Colorado, she grew up loving photography and people. These passions led her down the path to becoming a radiologic mammography technician. Pixie is on the staff at Queen's Medical Center, where she gives her undivided attention and exceptional expertise to every one of her patients. She loves knowing that her images are helping the radiologist to detect cancer in very early stages. Pixie makes a significant difference in the lives of many women because of her genuine compassion and professionalism. The personalized care that she has demonstrated toward her patients makes her truly worthy of recognition as a 2016 Healthcare Hero. Mahalo and congratulations, Pixie.”

Senator Galuteria rose to present the following remarks:

“Our next Healthcare Hero is Dr. Ian Okazaki. Mahalo. Dr. Okazaki has been interested in medicine since high school. Graduating from the John A. Burns School of Medicine, the doctor chose to pursue oncology because of the research and science involved. Today, he works with cancer patients and their families here in Hawai'i. He works in a patient-centered team approach to provide care while striving to make the tumultuous cancer journey as stress-free as possible and by providing the family information as well as emotional and medical support. He believes that one of his most important roles is to be a good listener. His passion, empathy, and expertise make him deserving to be among the recipients of the Healthcare Hero award. Mr. President, Dr. Ian Okazaki. Mahalo.”

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues, our next honoree is Ms. Phung Le Ouchi, who, unfortunately, could not join us today. But representing Phung Le Ouchi is Mrs. Laurie Callies. Laurie's a daughter of Phyllis Garrett, who nominated Nurse Phung for this award.

“Phung Le Ouchi holds a certificate as a licensed practical nurse and is working on her bachelor of science in nursing while caring for patients at Hi'olani Care Center. Phung is the oldest of six and helped lovingly care for her siblings. At work, Nurse Phung combines professionalism with care that comes from her heart, and she makes sure that her patients not only receive unparalleled care but are treated as the special and unique people they are. Her outstanding work at the Hi'olani Care Center at Kāhala Nui over the last two years has made her worthy of recognition as a 2016 Healthcare Hero.

“With us in the gallery is the administrator of Hi'olani Care Center at Kāhala Nui, Melissa Manchester. Let's acknowledge again this honoree, Phung Le Ouchi. Thank you.”

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

“It's my pleasure to introduce Dr. Thomas J. Kane. He is a Healthcare Association of Hawaii 2016 Healthcare Hero as well. Dr. Thomas J. Kane graduated from medical school at Santa Clara University. He then worked at Orthopedic Associates of Hawaii, which has given him valuable experience in adult hip and knee reconstruction. He later began his own patient-centered medical practice to allow him to treat his patients in a way that ensured the patient was always being put first. He also serves as a medical director at the Queen's Medical Center. In the 40 years that Dr. Kane has been practicing, his favorite part of medicine is helping to restore his patients' quality of life. He considers being a healthcare provider a privilege, so he gives his full dedication to his patients. I would like to recognize Dr. Kane's evident commitment to helping restore the lives of many patients, thus distinguishing him as a true Healthcare Hero. Mahalo.”

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

“Thank you, Mr. President, and good morning. It's indeed my pleasure to introduce our kama'āina from Hawai'i Island, Catherine Marquette. Catherine grew up in a small town in the Sierra Nevada mountains in northern California. She attended UC Davis, where she discovered nursing was her calling, not just a career choice. Once she graduated, she traveled to the Bronx, where she took her first job as a nurse. Catherine's chosen career accentuated her profound caring nature as well as satisfied her keen interest in science. Moving from the Bronx, Catherine made her way to Hawai'i and has been working at Hamakua Health Center since 1993 in my district of Hāmākua. In 2016, she accepted the position of medical director. Catherine is an amazing example of pure integrity and kindness, which are integral to her as a successful family nurse practitioner; she uses her heart and her expertise to provide the best care and experience possible to her patients. She should take much pride in positively touching so many lives. This exceptional, personalized care is what earned her the honor of being recognized as a Healthcare Hero. Congratulations, Catherine.”

Senator Baker rose and stated:

“Thank you, Mr. President. Again, I would like to wholeheartedly thank all of our honorees for the significant contributions that they've made, not only to their chosen field of health, but to all of the folks whose lives they've touched. I'd also like to recognize some of their supporters, including some of the HAH staff who are in the gallery, and ask both Paige Heckathorn and Paul Young to rise to be recognized and other members who are here to support our 2016 Hawai'i Healthcare Heroes – please rise. Mahalo.”

Senator English commended and congratulated Volcom Hawai'i for their many contributions to the betterment of our state, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, members of the Senate, colleagues: Today, it's really my pleasure to recognize Volcom Hawai'i for their philanthropy and deep commitment to the local communities. Volcom is an international surf, skate, and snowboard brand founded in 1991, and Volcom Hawai'i represents this company's leadership here in the islands. Today, we have professional surfers and Volcom Hawai'i's local contingency: David Riddle, welcome; David Wassel, welcome to the Senate; Tai Van Dyke; Kaimana Henry; and Kawai Lindo.

"Through the generosity and hard work of this group of outstanding watermen, our keiki and our environment has benefited by Volcom's motto, 'Live like this.' The emphasis is on giving back, protecting the 'āina and the oceans, and promoting a viable and healthy community. This is actualized by the larger Volcom Hawai'i family of coaches, athletes, and personalities statewide. For the past eight years, Volcom Hawai'i has invested in the people with their Hawaii Giveback program and their sustainability programs – a portion of the sales from Volcom Hawai'i's products and sales from the Volcom Pipe Pro held at Banzai Pipeline goes to this program. At the completion of this year's contest, Volcom presented \$60,000 to the Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii and a \$16,000 check to the Live Like Sion memorial fund. Over the past eight years, Volcom has donated a total of \$450,000 to the Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii, Sunset Beach Elementary, and the Live Like Sion Foundation.

This legislation allows those few existing 514A projects an additional two years to do just that. It is important to note that Chapter 514B has superior and additional consumer protection measures not present in 514A, and that a repeal of 514A would create not only clarity in the law, but also protect Hawai’i condominium owners. Please join me in supporting H.B. 243, H.D. 2, S.D. 1. Thank you.”

If identity theft is suspected, caregivers or other representatives can place a freeze on the account to stop the illegal activity.

## ORDER OF THE DAY

### THIRD READING

#### MATTER DEFERRED FROM THURSDAY, APRIL 6, 2017

H.B. No. 100, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Tokuda moved that H.B. No. 100, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to acknowledge the Ways and Means chair, the Ways and Means committee and staff, and the CIP analyst and my office staff for their invaluable insight, dedication, and hard work.

"Capital improvements play a pivotal role in building the future of our State. The governor proposed a budget of \$1,490,000,000, the House proposed a budget of

\$1,090,000,000, and the Senate proposed a budget of \$999,000,000 in capital improvement budget projects.

"The Senate draft aligns with many of the initiatives the administration has pledged, including the State's goal of doubling food production, addressing jail overcrowding, decreasing the backlog in affordable housing, and addressing capacity issues and new schools for growing communities.

"The Senate is committed to improving the quality of life of our residents, diversifying our economy, investing in our keiki, and ensuring our safety. Proving this commitment, your Committee worked diligently to address increasing the State's inventory of prime agricultural land, putting an end to the search and debate of a site to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center, addressing our housing crisis by funding development of both affordable and senior housing, and addressing capacity issues at public schools statewide.

"Mandated by our Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, Article XI, Section 3, the Senate draft includes \$20 million to purchase over 500 acres of agricultural land, which will help to provide long-term leases to local farmers and decrease Hawai'i's dependence on imported food items. The Senate also invested an additional \$25 million in upgrades and improvements to water infrastructure systems and agricultural facilities statewide.

"For the Department of Education, the Senate appropriated almost \$440 million for all projects to the Department, including \$77 million for a new secondary school in Kapolei, and \$63 million for continued construction for a high school in Kīhei. The Senate's total investment in education represents 44 percent of the entire general bond monies appropriated statewide. Also included in this effort is a \$5 million appropriation for a pilot project that will renovate existing classrooms and other support facilities to align with an academy concept, strengthening pathways and supporting pipelines into higher education and future employment opportunities.

"The Senate has made a commitment to address the shortage of affordable housing throughout the State. To this objective, your Committee provided \$25 million for an infusion to the Rental Housing Trust Fund, \$25 million into the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, and over \$86 million to the Hawaii Public Housing Authority, which includes \$35 million to fund senior living public housing facilities. The senior living housing project is expected to provide an additional 200 to 250 units to an underserved elderly population.

"Your Committee sought to end the discussion and debate on the prospective jail sites once and for all by solidifying a Hālawā location and providing \$60 million to the Department of Public Safety to begin the process for design of a new jail. Six million dollars was also furnished to the Department of Public Safety to add beds to the current Hālawā facility to bring prisoners on the mainland back home; the \$6 million would be for an environmental impact statement. To this effort, your Committee has also provided \$4 million to relocate Department of Agriculture facilities outside of the Hālawā site to accommodate the jail and the prison sites.

"Finally, your Committee recognizes a growing need for proof-of-concept plans and design to better outline initial CIP project criteria and costs, including stakeholder engagement, applied research, conceptual planning, and design investigation. To this end, your Committee has allotted \$2 million to various departments statewide to better facilitate this process.

"Your Committee carefully scrutinized and reviewed all the requests for funding. We had the very difficult task before us of cutting half a billion dollars from the administration's CIP budget due to the decreased revenue projections. With that in mind, we made an extreme effort to address funding needs

across the State while remaining fiscally prudent and sensitive to the administration, its departments, and the community at large.

“Again, I want to thank the WAM chair, the WAM committee members, the committee staff and all their effort and hard work in helping to execute a sound capital improvements budget. I appreciate their commitment and service to Hawai‘i and its future. Mahalo.”

The Chair thanked the vice chair and his team for their work.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Yesterday, Vice Chair Dela Cruz inadvertently challenged me to be creative with my commentary on our draft budget. So, this could be very daunting, considering the fact that we needed to convey the message and overarching theme behind \$14 billion in fiscal year ‘18 and \$14.3 billion in fiscal ‘19, all means of financing. But I decided that this would be an opportune time for me to reclaim my Seussian position on our Senate floor, since the good senator from Hilo decided to put on a red and white hat for his birthday. So, while I wish I could rhyme my way through this speech, like our general excise tax collections, it would all come out flat, and we would find ourselves staring down the barrel of a \$250 million deficit, just like that not-so-happy day in March when the Council on Revenues decided to lower their projections. So, instead, I give you a speech punctuated by some of Dr. Seuss’s well-known and lesser-known book titles to highlight our Senate draft.

“But before I delve into the details, I need to thank my very amazing team. While they are in no way like the characters from Seuss – *Did I Ever Tell You How Lucky You Are?* – being able to work side by side such dedicated, hard-working, and enthusiastic people gives me hope. They really inspire me, and every day, when I come in, and each night, when I leave, I think to myself, ‘Duckie, you really are quite lucky.’

“I should pause right here and note that half of these books I could not find in the state library, but we really appreciate the fact that we were able to borrow them from our state library, and we were able to provide much of the top priority fundings to our state library system, including \$250,000 in priority health and safety repair and maintenance funds as well as the positions and funding they needed for the Nānākuli library, which I know the senator from Wai‘anae-Nānākuli was in great support of, as well as an outreach specialist for homeless services, but I digress.

“Up in our offices, please help me acknowledge the hard workers who are up there right now being continuous, hardworking public servants: Darlene, Nic, Kate, and Vaughn from my office staff, who do an amazing job holding it all together; as well as our amazing WAM team, who have dedicated countless days, nights, weekends, holidays, you name it – every waking moment, led by our committee chief Calvin Azama, budget chief Sabrina Nasir, bills chief Ben Park, Lee Leonard, Chris Tu, Heather Schultz, Robert Nishimoto, Julian Juarez, Johnathan Say, Dylan Smith, Mark Ogata, Jennifer Song, Christopher Han, Michele Sansone, and Daniel Hironaka. Please help me give them a round of applause – working so hard they wouldn’t come down! I tried to get them down here.

“I’d also like to thank very much my vice chair and his office for all of their hard work on the CIP budget. It’s difficult enough to tackle all of your priorities and try to fit it in under the ceiling that they’re initially given, then to be asked to take it down half a billion dollars to help with our overall financial plan and our budget – that’s extremely significant, and that’s a huge sacrifice. And I truly appreciate all of the help that he was willing to give us, so thank you very much for all that you are willing to do and able to help us with.

“Even before the March Council on Revenues, I couldn’t help but feel like ‘the Grinch who stole Christmas,’ and I felt like everyone looked at me in that way, especially when we began our public informational briefings in January with news that our unfunded pension liability had ballooned from \$9.5 billion to \$12.4 billion, meaning significant and immediate increases in employer contributions would be required. Ultimately, this came down in the form of Governor’s Message 4, following WAM’s public informational briefing with Budget and Finance, DOTAX, and DBEDT to go over the revised financial plan, revenue collections, and the state of the economy after the March COR downgrade. And as a result of our discussion there in our hearing rooms during that hearing to consider more moderate phase-ins for the ERS contribution that would still satisfy rating agencies, we discussed what that phase-in would mean for us. Those phase-ins alone meant over a hundred million dollars, and we also talked about the fact that we would also need to look at Maui Memorial severance payments in the amount of \$30 million. But in talking with them and in bringing and considering a more moderate approach, we were able to save over \$60 million over the life of the biennium. These amounts, over \$130 million, are included in our budget, and I can tell you this was extremely significant. It really was like searching for ‘One Cent, Two Cent, Old Cent, New Cent’ when it came to finding the resources necessary to craft a fiscally prudent budget that still reflected the priority needs of our community.

“The Senate draft of the budget reduced the initial admin request by \$204 million over the biennium and includes over \$5.4 million in reductions through the elimination of old and low-priority-to-fill vacant positions. We also conservatively revised our assumptions for various non-discretionary cost items, such as debt service and fringe benefit requirements, saving over \$23 million over the biennium. Going through a very deliberative process of cutting in order to add, we looked for operational redundancies that could be eliminated, prioritized departments’ core needs, and focused on creating a safety net or buffer for critical services at risk for federal fund reductions, and considered what could be funded via bills currently making their way through conference should resources be made available. Similar to approaches WAM took in the previous biennium, we looked to see where costs could be combined and reduced to encourage efficiencies, and considered appropriately utilizing existing base funds first.

“Knowing our Education and Higher Education chairs’ commitment to ensuring access to a broad range of high-quality, highly effective P-20 educational opportunities and supporting our educators in their mission to teach our children, our goal was to provide the foundation that would boost our students up. *Oh, the Places You’ll Go!* But before they can become high fliers who soar to high heights, our budget includes the basics, like buses, lunch, school maintenance, and lights, which we restored or added over \$15 million to the existing biennium budget. As the home of Patsy Mink, it was important we do right by her and Title IX, which is not just sports, but equal opportunity and one’s basic civil rights in education, so we included over \$4.7 million and 22 full-time positions in both the DOE and throughout the University of Hawai‘i System to move us forward toward compliance.

“Looking *Inside Your Outside*, we then had to address rising healthcare costs, such as providing rebased provider payment rates in the amount of \$2.7 million in fiscal ‘18 and \$7.1 million in fiscal ‘19 for developmental disabilities. We also focused on improving services through CAMHD, and added \$1.3 million in fiscal ‘18 and \$1.6 million in fiscal ‘19 for purchase of service contracts. Continuing to support healthcare services to our Medicaid population, we provided \$9.1 million in fiscal ‘18 and \$39 million in ‘19 for capitation payment increases. And, building on previous budget decisions, we included in our base

\$1.8 million in fiscal '18 and \$4 million in '19 for nursing facility inflation factor. Especially as the critical healthcare access point in our rural communities, we included \$36 million in fiscal '18 and \$34 million in fiscal '19 for HHSC operational subsidies for the regions. We also included \$33.4 million in each year to the Maui Health System and provided \$5 million toward their working capital or operational subsidies for our other regions.

"Like Horton, who heard a Who, the Senate draft continues to recognize that 'a person is a person, no matter how small.' Oftentimes, the most vulnerable in our community feel that they have no voice, so those items we have put and increased in the base ensures that all are able to be heard. We've provided \$3 million in each fiscal year for Rapid Re-Housing and an additional \$3 million in each fiscal year for Housing First. We provided \$1.5 million in each fiscal year for homeless outreach and \$2.1 million in each fiscal year for public housing and elderly housing. We've continued efforts to support those with severe mental health and substance abuse challenges, providing outreach, counseling, and housing totaling \$1.6 million in each fiscal year.

"I've often felt it a bit auspicious that we have two former DLNR chairs amongst us, almost like we have two little Loraxes. I don't know if they **look** like Loraxes, but often I think they remind us that 'unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing's gonna get better. It's just not.' Like the Lorax, we made a commitment two years ago in Act 84 to base-fund much of the department's core services with general funds, providing them stability going forward. Following through with this promise, we gave \$14 million in each fiscal year for various programs from watershed management to forestry to natural resources and natural area reserves. We also added \$750,000 for each year for rapid 'ōhi'a death response, an additional \$400,000 each year for fire protection, and \$250,000 each year for watershed protection partnerships. With an admin bill currently moving through the Legislature to reassign HISC to the Department of Ag, we provided \$4 million in fiscal year '18 with the intention that in fiscal '19, funding should be provided to the appropriate agency. While their self-sufficiency efforts continue, we provided 15 positions and \$1 million in each fiscal year for the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission. And, an ongoing priority and concern of the Senate, we included over \$1.7 million in positions and funding for pesticide studies and regulations.

"The highlights I've mentioned reflect a few of the fundamental priorities of our departments and critical needs of our communities. While the dollar amounts may seem significant, I assure you, finding the funding and the resources to fund them was no small task given the financial condition of our state and the ever-increasing fixed costs and unfunded liabilities ahead of us in our future. But thanks to our amazing team, led by our very own Dr. Seuss, Calvin Azama, and his very own Thing 1 and Thing 2, budget and bills chiefs Sabrina and Ben, and their teams, I have the utmost confidence that we will be fine. Going forward into conference, I am reminded of one of my very favorite passages from *Oh, the Places You'll Go!*: 'So be sure when you step, step with care and great tact, and remember that's life a great balancing act. Just never forget to be dexterous and deft. And never mix up your right foot with your left.'

"And finally, Mr. President, as I was looking through the various titles of books, I paused and smiled and just thought of you: *If I Ran the Zoo*. I'm pretty sure, on most days, you feel like you do. Thank you."

The Chair thanked the chair and her team for their work.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I feel very inadequate with my remarks today because I can't match our masterful speaker who chairs the Ways and Means committee. But I did want to take this occasion to congratulate her team and all who have provided input. With the financial picture being bleak, the budget, of course, cannot reflect all of our wants and desires, but I think the Chair and her team have crafted artfully a measure that addresses many of the urgent needs in our community and helps to move us forward. So, I offer my congratulations to Ways and Means Chair, Committee and staff for the proposal we'll take into conference.

"I'd like to highlight just a couple of things that happen to be near and dear to my heart. First, House Bill 100, Senate Draft 1, for which I stand in strong support, has \$3 million in general funds for the UH Cancer Center. All of you know, as a cancer survivor, I've been very keen on trying to make sure that we keep our NCI-designated Cancer Center because of the research that the Center does and focus it has on our population, and there's no place else in the country – in the world – that can do that as well as we can. The \$3 million that's in the Senate draft will help make up any operating shortfall and will give confidence to the NCI when our Cancer Center is up for the designation review that the Legislature, particularly the Senate, supports the UH Cancer Center. I believe such a demonstration of support will help us maintain this very important designation, because with that designation comes significant federal funding.

"Another area that I'd like to address has to do with the efforts that this budget makes to take care of our kūpuna. Some of you know that, over the years, there have been many efforts going back to the days when Lingle was governor and vetoed a measure that would have instituted our long-term care tax designation to make sure that we had appropriate funds to provide for seniors. Unfortunately, we were not able to override her veto, but we have continued working on ways to make sure that our seniors are provided with the care and services they need. This budget makes sure that those efforts stay on track. The funding provided will help our seniors continue to lead healthy, independent, meaningful, and dignified lives through two important programs: first, the almost \$4 million per year that goes into Kupuna Care – a very successful, very important program of services for our seniors – as well as \$600,000 in general funds for the first fiscal year to help support family caregivers. Our family caregivers should not have to make a choice between working and saving for their own retirement or staying home to help a kupuna family member. By allowing some resources to go to kupuna caregivers, we are ensuring the development of a strong support system for not only our seniors but their caregivers. Also, by appropriating an additional \$1.7 million in each fiscal year for the Aging and Disability Resource Center, this budget ensures that our entire continuum of services throughout the state is robust in supporting our rapidly aging and growing senior population. Because of programs funded in the Senate Draft of the Budget, more and more of our seniors are living longer, healthier, and more productive lives.

"And finally, Mr. President, colleagues, I would be remiss if I did not recognize the excellent work that WAM did to make sure that our community hospitals received the support they need – whether it's an operating subsidy for Kahuku, for HHSC, or for the transition that Maui Memorial Medical Center will be making to Maui Health System, a Kaiser-affiliated hospital. These hospital resources in our community are so important. We cannot exist without the subsidies – at least on the neighbor islands and in the more rural areas of O'ahu. Especially on the neighbor islands, our residents have very limited options. There are very few other alternatives, and our residents on Maui, on Lāna'i, on Kaua'i, and on the Big Island deserve the top-notch

care that is found here on O‘ahu. (I want to note the reason I didn’t include Moloka‘i in the list of neighbor islands is because the hospital on Moloka‘i is affiliated with Queen’s; they’re not part of the HHSC.) Flying everyone from a neighbor island to Honolulu for hospital care is not an option. I’m sure that none of the folks here on O‘ahu would want to have to stand in line for services because the health systems on the neighbor islands failed and everybody was forced to come over here for care. Supporting MMMC’s transition and the other neighbor island hospitals really benefits all of us statewide. I truly appreciate all of the help and support that we found in the Senate to make sure that we have a robust healthcare system for all of us, no matter which island we happen to call home. Mahalo.”

This measure will formally establish the Hawaii Keiki Healthy and Ready to Learn Program by providing funding and establishing formalized coordination between the Department of Education, the Department of Health, and the Department of Human Services to deliver comprehensive school-based health services.

"The Hawaii Keiki program has been a pilot project in five DOE complex areas with great success. DOE and the UH Mānoa School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene have partnered to bring nurses to schools, implement software to report in real time on health services, expand school wellness programs, and provide sports physicals, vision screenings and glasses.

"The program has also engaged with other community organizations, by creating partnerships to provide greater access to health care services and supplement state funding and draw down additional Medicaid funds that have been left on the table.

"The Hawaii Keiki program is important not just for keiki health but also for education. According to the CDC, school health programs can help students perform better in school. Healthy students perform better on tests, get better grades, attend school more often, and behave better in class (Alliance for a Healthier Generation).

"We need to expand this program to reach all of Hawaii's keiki. H.B. 672 gets Hawaii's closer to that goal because it will:

- implement the Hawaii Keiki statewide in 15 DOE complex areas and pilot the program in 2 charter schools;
- build school based oral hygiene services and sealant programs, which is another way we can address the poor dental health of our keiki in our state;
- ensure eye assessment software is forever in place in all schools, so that students have access to vision screening and eyeglasses they need but often can't afford; and
- establish coordinator positions in DOE, DOH, and DHS to work together for the coordination of a successful program.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in showing our keiki how important their health and education is to us and our state by voting yes on H.B. 672 and supporting the Hawaii Keiki Healthy and Ready to Learn Program."

"The DOE would then use the resulting energy cost savings to repay the loan. Senate Draft 2 authorizes an unspecified amount to be made available for this effort from the fund – an amount to be decided in conference.

"I urge a yes vote on H.B. 957, H.D. 1, Senate Draft 2."

### THIRD READING

#### MATTERS DEFERRED FROM FRIDAY, APRIL 7, 2017

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1341 (H.B. No. 997, H.D. 2, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1341 be adopted and H.B. No. 997, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"This bill addresses the problem that contracts for concessions at airports cannot be negotiated by DOT Airports Division but have to be given to the highest bidder regardless of

quality of food and services, management experience, and hours of operation.

"Thus, this bill exempts not only wireless connectivity and advertisement contracts at airports from this bidding requirement but expands that exemption to all airport concession contracts and gives DOT the flexibility to negotiate lease extensions.

"There is precedent for this kind of arrangement. Most mainland airports award terminal concession agreements through a negotiation process, wireless connectivity and advertisement contracts have already been negotiated successfully without the bidding requirement, and – when DOT was allowed to temporarily negotiate amendments to existing concession contracts (through Act 141, Session Laws of 2014) – the negotiations resulted in the concessions paying for \$90 million worth of revenue-enhancing improvements.

"There are numerous safeguards in place to ensure a fair contracting process. Section HRS 102-2 of the law was in existence prior to the procurement code. The procurement code, when adopted, did not alter this section of the law. The procurement code did not touch this section of the law because there were ample safeguards already built into the approval process relating to concession-contract awards. These safeguards include that all airport concession agreements must be approved at a Land Board public hearing after public hearing notice before signing. Thus, anyone who feels the concession-award process or agreement is not fair or in the public's best interest has the right to ask the Land Board to deny approval as requested by the DOT. If so denied, the contract cannot be signed by DOT. The safeguards also include court appeals to any inappropriate Land Board approvals, not limited to airport concession agreements, such as the current TMT appeal and related court matters.

"This is a good bill, Mr. President, supported by DOT and our Airport Concessions Committee. This bill seeks to ensure a better image and operations of our airport concessions. This change to the law and resulting benefits is long overdue. Hawai'i needs to ensure that our visitors have a positive first and last impression of Hawai'i as they spend time at our public airports. I urge my colleagues to support H.B. 997. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Let me first say, ordinarily at Third Reading, I would just rise with reservations because the bill would be going into conference committee, but because this bill does have an effective date, it may be the last time that we have a chance to speak on it. So I am going to oppose the bill.

"I have spoken with the head of the Procurement Office and I understand, in other jurisdictions where there are airport authorities, the authority may not work under the statewide procurement code, but the authority works under some form of procurement code that applies to airports. So it may be appropriate for us to be taking a look at a different type of procurement code. But just giving an exemption from the public bidding process, I think, is very risky and inappropriate, given the amount of money that goes into these contracts. The Land Board oversight, having sat as the former chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources – it would be extremely unusual and, I think, unprecedented for the Land Board to reject a concession contract. Those tend to be pro forma approvals that go in front of the Land Board en masse from the DOT and, in many cases, some of those are even being exempted now, so it doesn't really provide a check and balance on the DOT process. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Mr. President, it’s interesting that the speeches this morning are all about the procurement of these contracts for these concessionaires and yet this measure did not come to the Government Operations committee, and we have oversight and purview over procurement. Even though I asked for a referral, this matter was not granted.

“There are so many problems at the airport. For decades, we have seen a lot of mischief going on; we have seen favoritism; we have seen contracts that have been extended to get around procurement code. All of the items talked about, any terms, any conditions, can be put into the bid document; they can be put into the specs, and so I’m very concerned about this measure. I’m very concerned about the types of contracts – large concessionaire contracts – and lots of money to the airport; there could be a lot of problems if we exempt them. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1341 was adopted and H.B. No. 997, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONCESSIONS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21; Ayes with Reservations (Rhoads). Noes, 4 (Kim, Riviere, Ruderman, Thielen).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1342 (H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1342 be adopted and H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. This is part of the governor’s package. The Project Adjustment Fund already exists and contains \$17 million appropriated last year. But DOT Airports Division cannot use these moneys to adjust projects because they need a budget proviso to access these funds. Therefore, some projects where the budget needs to be adjusted are in danger of being terminated.

“This bill allows the governor to make supplemental allotments to capital investment cost elements. As an example, if a project turns out to require 10 percent more money than in the initial bid, this bill allows those projects to move with supplemental moneys from the Project Adjustment Fund, which is what the fund is intended for. These additional allotments shall not be used to increase the scope of a project. The governor has to submit a report to the Legislature that includes all the instances where he has used the Project Adjustment Fund. According to testimony, the traveling public will benefit from the timely completion of projects at airports statewide which will require supplemental funding from this Project Adjustment Fund in order to be implemented. Therefore, Mr. President, may I ask the colleagues to please support this measure? Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1342 was adopted and H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, AIRPORTS DIVISION, PROJECT ADJUSTMENT FUND,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

“Colleagues, the Department of Agriculture is looking to possibly take over irrigation systems across the state that are critical to increasing our agricultural production. Concerns have been expressed about how the current version of the bill might have unintended consequences related to water rights because the version sent over by the House would also apply a PUC-regulation exemption to other non-potable water systems. So, my hope as chair is that during conference we will look at amendments which would narrow the scope of the bill to make sure that the public interest is protected, and so I ask for your support of this measure. Mahalo.”

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 1536, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, relating to irrigation. This measure clarifies the Board of Agriculture’s authority to acquire property by eminent domain for the construction and maintenance of water facilities used for agricultural purposes and excludes such facilities from the definition of ‘public utility.’

“It’s important for the Board of Agriculture to retain oversight of agricultural irrigation systems. The Public Utilities Commission’s regulations are meant for privately owned potable water utilities, not for state-owned agricultural irrigation systems overseen by the State’s Commission on Water Resource Management. Current policies by both entities reflect this separation of oversight, but the current statute must also be updated to provide for alignment.

“The Department of Agriculture and Board of Water Supply, along with several other state and county departments and private organizations, support this measure. To pass this bill will strengthen Hawaii’s agricultural industry. Mahalo.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I’m going to be voting ‘with reservations’ on this because I’ve been supporting Chair Gabbard’s efforts to modify the bill. In its current form, I would not be voting for it on Final Reading, but I think there’s a chance here to improve the bill, and so I’ll be voting ‘with reservations.’ Thank you.”

Senator Baker moved that H.B. No. 696, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President I rise in strong support of H.B. 696, S.D. 1, Relating to Health.

"This bill updates the name of the Board of Dental Examiners to more accurately reflect current Board duties, adds three additional dental hygienists to ensure appropriate representation as well as include neighbor island representation and clarifies duties that can be performed by untrained, unlicensed dental assistants.

"When the Board of Dental Examiners was created, the Board actually administered the licensing exam. That is no longer the case. Today the board oversees the dentist licensing statute as well as the hygienists statute – HRS Chapters 447 and 448.

"Unfortunately, some dentists at the behest of Hawaii Dental Association aren't aware that the current board licenses both professions. A number of dentists submitted opposition to the original Senate Bill 371 after which this measure is fashioned. They stated their opposition was predicated on this false premise that the Board would be reconfigured, and it would add oversight of dental hygienists.

"The fact is the Board of Dental Examiners already has oversight over dental hygienists, and that is the VERY reason to

rename the board and to add additional registered dental hygienist members. These actions are merely a reflection that the Board regulates both professions.

"Currently in Hawai'i there are at least as many dental hygienists as there are dentists. The hygienist members of the board are expected to screen and certify qualifications of applicants for registered dental hygienist licensure. In fact, there are more requests for dental hygiene licensure than for dentists, and yet only two board members, who are registered dental hygienists, are available to handle the high volume of certification requests.

"In my opinion it is high time that this imbalance is corrected. It takes nothing away from the dentists as there will still be a majority of licensed dentists on the board and can still out vote the registered dental hygienist members if necessary.

"Furthermore, H.B. 696, S.D. 1 will actually create a better functioning board. Typically, the licensing boards have an odd number of members. However the current board has an even number of 12 members and conceivably decisions could end in a tie vote – nullifying an action. By adding additional dental hygienist members, a board with an odd number of members will be created thereby greatly minimizing the chance of a tie vote.

"Finally, the bill clarifies that through the creation of a rule adopted by the Board, the Board cannot allow an untrained, unlicensed dental assistant's duties to conflict with or infringe on the responsibilities of a licensed dental hygienist.

"The Legislature determines the licensing parameters of our various professions by statute. Rules are a way to help implement the law and to provide important clarifying details to help facilitate legislative intent, but those rules cannot enable one vocation without a license or appropriate training to provide services for which training is necessary and a license is required.

"The section of the Senate Bill that gave the dentists the greatest source of discontent regarding reciprocity in dental licensing was stricken from the S.D. 1 version of H.B. 696 in an effort to address their concern.

"Change doesn't always come easy. However, the modest changes proposed by this measure are logical and based on sound policy, reflecting current law. I urge my colleagues to join me to support this measure. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 696, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1500 be adopted and H.B. No. 115, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“There are many roads where the owner is unknown or the ownership is in dispute, and many of these roads have fallen into disrepair. This is a really longstanding problem, but this bill requires such roads to be transferred to the City, and the City must accept ownership. This solution is really problematic because it puts a huge burden on the City – and this is the City and County of Honolulu – so, without adequate funding, this may be an unfunded mandate and may be illegal. But the bigger concern really is the impact to the City has not been fully assessed yet. So, last year, the Legislature created the roads commission via Act 194, so I believe we should wait for this commission’s report before proceeding with any other solution. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“This bill addresses so called roads in limbo and requires ownership of these roads to be transferred to the county, in a county with population of 500,000 or more. Many of these roads are abut or are sandwiched between sections of roads owned by the county, and are either in bad shape or maintained by the city, even though the city does not own them. When these properties were developed and deeded to homeowners, such road fragments should have been deeded to the city, but for reasons that are unclear, these title transfers never happened, so now the ownership of these roads are disputed or “in limbo”. This bill clarifies ownership of these roads as belonging to the county to ensure that they will be properly maintained and issues of responsibility and liability are clarified.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1500 was adopted and H.B. No. 115, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAYS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Homelessness is a serious concern that demands our full attention and resources; we must do all we can to reduce homelessness. The federal government, through the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, identifies several best practices in combating homelessness. Safe zones are not among these best practices: Indeed, it is identified as detracting from best practices that have proven to be successful in jurisdictions around the country. So I urge this legislature to dedicate our energy and resources to recognized and proven best practices and strategies to reduce homelessness. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1519 was adopted and H.B. No. 83, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Rhoads). Noes, 1 (Harimoto).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1539 (H.B. No. 451, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1539 be adopted and H.B. No. 451, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I just want to have an opportunity to explain my reservations. This measure, if passed, would have to go before Congress to have approval before it is effective, and I don’t think it’s wise to be bringing this matter in front of Congress at this time. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1539 was adopted and H.B. No. 451, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Riviere, Ruderman, Thielen). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1540 (H.B. No. 554, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1540 be adopted and H.B. No. 554, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“We’re talking here about people, including pretrial detainees, in a mental hospital or a prison and we’re talking about people who have absolutely no power, in a tremendous crisis in their lives. Taking away the need for a court order opens up a tremendous potential for abuse, in my opinion, where the administrator of that facility and two or three of his

employees can decide to treat someone against their will. These treatments could include being sedated for the rest of your life. Bear in mind, some of these people have not been convicted and have not been legally committed. The two-day delay that it takes to get a court order cannot be compared with the complete removal of a person's civil rights. I urge you to consider – I'm sure most of you either read the book or saw the movie *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*. Well, here we're siding with Nurse Ratched. And while we don't do lobotomies anymore, our current procedures will probably look pretty bad 30 years from now. And I believe that a person in this ultimate crisis deserves the one final safeguard to preserve the civil rights of a completely powerless citizen. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"The measure authorizes the Department of Health or the Department of Public Safety to issue an administrative order for psychiatric treatment of patients admitted to the Hawai'i State Hospital, pretrial detainees, or other committed persons who object to treatment, and establishes the necessary criteria to administer such orders. Some patients in custody of the state who experience acute mental health symptoms may not believe that they are ill, and for this reason, they refuse treatment. However, treatment may be necessary to protect the patient as well as others. Currently, the only way to authorize treatment over a patient's objections is to go through the courts, a long process averaging not just a couple of days but 17 days, during which the patient can further deteriorate. In order to ensure the health and safety of any individual, it is important to tend to their medical needs. Treating psychiatric symptoms in a timely manner ultimately benefits the patient and creates a safer situation for all who come in contact with that patient. Similarly, treating pretrial detainees or other committed persons helps to create a safe environment for staff and others in custody.

"The administrative orders process described in this measure would only apply to medically appropriate treatment of those who suffer from a psychological disorder who are imminently dangerous to themselves or to others. In these instances, there are simply no less intrusive alternatives available, and treatment would be necessary to prevent the person from causing imminent harm to themselves or to others. I think it's very important that we ensure the safety of all who are taken into custody as well as those who care for them. This measure would actually contribute to a person's rehabilitation and return back to the road of health by getting them the appropriate treatment in a timely fashion and not having them further decompensate, which can ultimately interfere with their return to stability. Mahalo."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I had voted for it when it came in front of Judiciary committee, and it was my error for not looking at the bill more closely. I had supported it when I thought this applied only to pretrial detainees because I figured there would be a check and balance after an administrative determination. But in taking a closer look at the bill, I realize that it gives an administrative process to our prison system where an administrative panel can make a determination to give medications to somebody against their will. It mentions that the person can attend the hearing, but it's not a contested case proceeding; they're not represented by counsel. And then, if they do not like the decision, they are allowed to appeal, but it's not a Chapter 91 appeal, and I'm not sure that the person would be capable of appealing or filing that request if they're put onto the medications against their will. So I feel that the lack of safeguards – I agree with the concerns raised by my colleague on the Big Island, and I have to vote against the measure, the way it's worded now. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1540 was adopted and H.B. No. 554, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ORDERS FOR TREATMENT OVER OBJECTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, as you all know, the Kapolei region was designated as the Second City of O'ahu over 30 years ago. Since that time, the state, city and county, federal government, and the private sector have made big investments in the public infrastructure, commercial and retail offerings, and housing options for that community. But with the rapid growth, this community has experienced major growing pains, such as traffic, gridlock, and overcrowded schools. One of the main culprits of these problems has been that Kapolei still tends to be a bedroom community, with most of us having to commute back and forth to Honolulu or other parts of the island to work every day. Consider the latest numbers: From 2015 to 2040, the population of Kapolei is expected to increase from 116,650 to 172,680. The number of homes is expected to increase from 35,810 to 57,510 by 2040. So the solution, of course, is to create more good jobs. The purpose of this bill is to establish a five-year Kapolei jobs initiative pilot program to provide tax incentives for businesses that establish themselves or open new locations in the Kapolei region. I see this as a template that can be looked at for other communities around the state that are also experiencing rapid growth, and I ask for your support on this important bill. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1563 was adopted and H.B. No. 943, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"As a large employer, I'm usually expected to oppose such measures, but I fully support it. It's very important, when someone is sick, that they be able to afford to stay home to keep

their coworkers and their customers from getting sick. This measure will cost me in the six figures per year, and I proudly support it as I do almost all employee rights. I hope that one day, we'll have the courage to establish a living wage in Hawai'i, which would help all workers; meanwhile, this will help some. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1584 was adopted and H.B. No. 4, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I'm concerned about the creation of the minimum essential coverage premium supplementation trust fund. I think we're jumping into this headlong without understanding the consequences or the cost of it. I think it's wide open and could be very problematic. If the feds do, in fact, repeal the ACA and they repeal funding for the program, yet we continue with all of these obligations, it could be a very severe expense to the state, and I think the time is not yet right to jump ahead of the curve here. I think we should wait and see what happens and adjust accordingly. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"As the committee report acknowledges, this is a work in progress. The fund that the senator just mentioned actually is only there as a possibility for receiving contributions that would be made in order to defray the cost of keeping some of our folks insured and treated – it could replace the subsidy that might be repealed under the ACA. It is a contingency matter; it doesn't obligate us. None of these items obligate us now because these provisions would only go into effect once the ACA is repealed.

"I think we need to have some measures in place. I believe it's especially important that we establish the working group to continue to look impacts at the state level because the way that the current federal administration is so schizophrenic, we don't know exactly what they're going to do. They announce one thing one day and something else the next day. This, as I indicated, would preserve some of the best features of the Affordable Care Act. Quite frankly, if the Republicans' repeal and replace goes into effect, we have the prospect of losing our expanded Medicaid with the enhanced match. We would have the prospect of losing health coverage for the COFA migrants, who now actually are able to get coverage and are not a drag on the system. By the way, they are getting healthier, staying healthier, and costing the state and related nonprofits less. We need to have a measure like this in place. The bill will continue



to be worked on in conference. I promise my colleagues that the kinds of things that raise the concerns by the previous speaker will not be in effect unless they're absolutely, positively necessary, and they would not go into effect without us having to come back after any repeal and replacement of the Affordable Care Act. Mahalo."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I'm glad that the chair of the committee is going to be taking this matter into conference for further discussion. I completely support the working group for the reasons that she described, but I would ask that the conference committee also consider: The bill, as written now, places an individual mandate on individuals to have insurance, and if we lose the federal subsidies for the individual insurers, we would be passing a law that, if Congress were to repeal the Affordable Care Act or stop the subsidies, would be placing a legal burden on individuals to have the insurance without the subsidies. So that's one concern that I hope we can address in conference committee."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1592 was adopted and H.B. No. 552, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Thielen). Noes, 1 (Riviere).

Senator Baker, Chair of the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health, rose to request a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.C.R. No. 164.

Senator Baker noted:

"Some of the HCRs came over a little late. This resolution requests the Director of Health to establish and convene a medication synchronization working group to explore any legislative proposals for consideration next session. We thought this important topic was going to be addressed in another way. However, it's important that we have the opportunity to hear this HCR and act on it."

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Baker announced that the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health would be holding a public hearing on H.C.R. No. 164 the following morning at 9:00 a.m. in Conference Room 229.

Senator Galuteria reminded the members that Kūpuna Power Day would be taking place on Thursday, April 13, 2017, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m., and invited the "kūpuna, not-quite-kūpuna, and junior-senior" members of the Senate to attend.

Senator Kahele announced that the Senate would be honoring Rainbow Wahine volleyball coach Dave Shoji with a floor presentation at the Senate's next floor session.

## FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

Thursday, April 13, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Wakai welcomed a group of fourth-grade students from 'Aliamanu Elementary School, who were present in the gallery with teachers Veronica Garza and Jennifer Teruya, and chaperones Angel Mota, Patty Carter, Wanda Rosarivas, Bernadette Toyama, Jennifer Vinarao, and Momi Gallarde.

Senator Kahele recognized and honored Coach Dave Shoji, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues and friends, members and the gallery: It is both an honor and privilege to be able to welcome to the Senate chamber and to introduce to all of you our final honoree of the 29th Legislature. Today's honoree needs no introduction; in Hawai'i, he is a household name. Throughout women's volleyball in our country, he's a living legend who has taken his place in the history books. But on this day, we gather to recognize, to show our appreciation for, and ultimately say mahalo nui loa to a coach, a friend, a role model, a mentor, a champion who has given so much to Hawai'i, to the sport of volleyball, and to the thousands of keiki across this great state. And so it is my honor to introduce the greatest coach in the history of the University of Hawai'i athletic program, Dave Shoji.

"Dave Shoji was born December 4, 1946, in Upland, California. His parents, Chiz and Kobe, met in 1942 at the Poston internment camp in Yuma County, Arizona. Dave's dad was a member of the famed 442nd 'Go for Broke' unit serving in Germany. Dave played collegiate volleyball at the University of California, Santa Barbara, earning All-American honors as a setter in 1968 and 1969. Dave started his coaching career here in Hawai'i, first as a varsity basketball coach at 'Iolani in 1972. He also was an assistant coach to Chris McLachlin at Punahou School, and at the time, UH and its athletic director, Donnis Thompson, was looking for a coach in the era of U.S. Representative Patsy Mink's historic Title IX legislation mandating equal opportunities for female athletes. In 1975, in the fall, at the recommendation of McLachlin, UH offered Dave the head coaching volleyball position, which also included the men's team, and his starting pay at the time was \$1,200. And the rest is history: Dave led the Wahine volleyball team to national championships in 1979, 1982, 1983, and 1987. He is a two-time American Volleyball Coaches Association National Coach of the Year, and Dave's teams at the University of Hawai'i have amassed 1,202 wins, second most in NCAA Division I history, and he has been the head coach for the Rainbow Wahine volleyball team for 42 seasons.

"I think I can speak for our gallery and say they broke the mold when they made Dave Shoji, and we will quite possibly never see here at the University of Hawai'i someone who has brought so much to Hawai'i, athletics, and to keiki all across the state. I have a paddle here for you, Dave, in honor of your contributions. On behalf of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature and the Hawai'i State Senate, we'd like to present this to you and say mahalo nui loa for all you have done for Hawai'i. Thank you so much, Dave; mahalo. I would also like to recognize Dave's cornerstone and his lovely wife, and that would be Mary Shoji. Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Kahele then presented the paddle to Dave Shoji, with the thanks of the Senate.

The Chair noted in good humor that since Dave Shoji was retired, there would be no conflict with the gifts disclosure requirement.

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"I would be remiss if I don't stand and also add my aloha to Dave and Mary. You know, after watching him for decades like we've all done, we had the unique opportunity for my son to be coached by Dave when he joined the Outrigger Canoe Club and played volleyball alongside one of his sons. So he has the honor of saying that he's been coached by the legend Dave Shoji, and that will go down, I'm sure, in history. But I went to many of the practices, watched how Dave coached all of the kids – and he's a wonderful coach. He was very measured and equal in how he treated all of the players, no matter if they were starting or if they were not starting, but he gave all of them his attention. And we traveled to the mainland for Junior Olympics with him and Mary and the rest of the team, and it was a wonderful opportunity to see him up close and personal. And so, Dave and Mary, congratulations to you. Our prayers and our good wishes are with you always. Thank you."

Senator Kidani introduced the following distinguished guests from the University of Hawai'i, who were present in the gallery: Ernie Wilson, University of Hawai'i Board of Regents; David Lassner, University of Hawai'i president and interim Mānoa chancellor; and Stephanie Kim, Elmer Kaai, and Robbie Watland from the university's government affairs team.

Senator Taniguchi introduced the following guests from the University of Hawai'i athletic department, who were seated in the gallery: Dave Matlin, athletic director; Carl Clapp, associate director; Joel Matsunaga, associate athletic director; Marilyn Moniz-Kaho'ohanohano, senior women's athletic director; Lois Manin, assistant athletic director and chief of staff; Derek Inouchi, director of media relations; Jay Metzger, multimedia specialist; Kara Nishimura, administrative assistant for women's volleyball; Kari Ambrozich, academic counselor; Renae Shigemura, athletic trainer; Kaleo Baxter, assistant coach; Robyn Ah Mow-Santos, head coach for Rainbow Wahine volleyball; Stanley Ching, booster chair; Dr. Elizabeth Ignacio, volleyball supporter; and Charlie Wade, head coach for men's volleyball.

The Chair remarked:

"It normally isn't my place to say anything, but in 1987, as the coach of the Waimea High School girls volleyball team, the Rainbow Wahine chose to do their summer camp at the Waimea High School, and they stayed in what is known as the Judge's Quarters, or Courtroom, where they slept on cots. And Dave reported to me that it was wonderful because he had no curfew because there was nowhere for the girls to go in Waimea – at least, nowhere where they could get in trouble.

"As it turned out, from the remarks from Senator Kahele, they were going to become national champions. But they were better champions as people than players. We fed the team every night, with our girls bringing potluck dinners, and Mahina Eleneki and Tita Ahuna would get their plate and sit in the middle of our girls. But they would say how they trained, including weightlifting; and we had a gifted young girl at Waimea, Maile Golden, who refused to lift weights because she didn't want to look like a boy, which was a problem back in those days. And then after listening to Mahina, I said, 'She could be Miss Hawai'i, so tell me what's wrong with lifting weights,' and she started to weight train, walked on for the

University of Hawai'i women's team, earned a scholarship, and, as a senior, started at the University of Hawai'i for Coach Shoji. And that's one of so many stories like this in the 42 years that he has coached, and by bringing the Rainbow Wahine team all around the state to inspire the young women in our state to reach for the stars and their dream of playing for Coach Shoji and the difference you've made in those lives, Coach, I certainly want to echo my thanks. And maybe I'll have my dad back, because no matter what family function we have, if there's a Rainbow Wahine game going on, he gets up, jumps in his car, and he drives home because he's going to watch you and he's not going to stay with me. So congratulations."

At 11:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. Costa is, in fact, already Judge Costa as he has already been serving as a per-diem judge for over two years now for the District Family Court of the First Circuit. He has presided over divorce and annulment proceedings, paternity motions and trials, and guardianship and adoption cases, among other matters. Testimony in the committee indicates that he has already achieved the respect of his full-time judicial peers and that he will hit the ground running in good form.

“Judge Costa is originally from New York but has developed strong ties and roots in Hawai‘i over the last 20 years, beginning at Hawai‘i Pacific University and later at William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa, from which he graduated magna cum laude in 2001. After a brief stint as a prosecuting attorney, he then served as a law clerk to former justice Simeon Acoba at the Hawai‘i Supreme Court. Since 2003, he has managed his own small practice specializing in traffic and criminal defense matters in district court, where he has represented hundreds of clients. He’s also experienced in proceedings before the Administrative Driver’s License Revocation Office. Combined with his recent experience as a per-diem judge, he is clearly well-qualified to serve as a district court judge in the First Circuit.

“Mr. President, it is the recommendation of your Committee on Judiciary and Labor that Brian Costa possesses the requisite skills and demeanor to serve full-time as a district court judge, and I urge my colleagues to support his nomination.”

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Ms. Heim grew up in Waialua, where her mother and father taught their family the values of plantation life: hard work, integrity, and respect. She experienced the plantation as a teenaged field worker before she graduated from Waialua High School, where she was the Bulldog of the Year – she remains a bulldog. Ms. Heim attended a school in southern California – well, she did go to USC – where she received her degree in

journalism/political science. Ms. Heim wanted to be a reporter covering the United States Supreme Court, and as a step toward that goal, she became an intern with the Los Angeles bureau of the *Wall Street Journal*. But working at the *Wall Street Journal* sparked her lifelong interest in the law, and before too long, Ms. Heim entered Boalt Hall, the University of California, Berkeley, where she earned her law degree.

“Returning home, Ms. Heim was one of a small group of women lawyers in the 1980s who, with the help of their mentors, began to make great strides as litigators in the often-male dominated legal culture of Bishop Street. Although she began her career with Goodsill Anderson Quinn & Stifel, three years later, Ms. Heim was a founding partner with McCorrison Miho & Miller. In 1994, she left McCorrison for a two-year stint as corporation counsel with the City and County of Honolulu, becoming the first Filipina to hold this position. She then returned to McCorrison in 1996. Ten years later, in 2006, she was hired as vice president of legal affairs at the University of Hawai‘i. In 2015, she again returned to McCorrison, where she’s still a partner. Never satisfied with remaining at McCorrison, although she’s very qualified for this position, her years of private litigation practice and public service gives her an unusually broad perspective of legal issues that affect the people of Hawai‘i, and she’s eager to continue her public service in the people’s court. Therefore, I recommend that the full Senate vote to consent to Ms. Heim’s appointment.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I just want to note for the record that we have the rare opportunity today to confirm two very well-qualified women to the bench, and I know that they will be excellent role models for other qualified women lawyers out in the community who, when judicial appointments become available, will offer themselves for judicial service. We need to have more gender equity at all levels in our court system, and I’m delighted that these two women have stepped to the plate, and we will confirm them today. Mahalo.”

She’s a graduate of Kamehameha Schools, the University of Pennsylvania, and the William S. Richardson School of Law.

“Although in the last several years, she has been in private practice, Ms. Morikawa has extensive public service

experience. For a total of nearly 13 years, she was a deputy prosecuting attorney for the city. She also spent three years as deputy attorney general for the state. At one time, she was also the county housing coordinator for the City and County of Honolulu and has also served as a volunteer commissioner for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. In those last two roles, she developed a reputation for dealing fairly and firmly with people in difficult situations directly affecting their possessions and land rights. Testimony indicates that, throughout her career, Trish K. Morikawa has exhibited enthusiasm, compassion, and common sense in approaching complicated legal issues that affected the lives of real people. Your Committee on Judiciary and Labor recognizes that these traits, along with her demeanor and work ethic, will make her an excellent full-time addition to the District Court of the First Circuit, and I urge my colleagues to support the nomination.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I just want to note for the record that we have the rare opportunity today to confirm two very well-qualified women to the bench, and I know that they will be excellent role models for other qualified women lawyers out in the community who, when judicial appointments become available, will offer themselves for judicial service. We need to have more gender equity at all levels in our court system, and I’m delighted that these two women have stepped to the plate, and we will confirm them today. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Ihara rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Mr. President, I understand and support allowing the University of Hawai‘i to customize ethics protocols for their technology transfer process. However, I would like to request that, in conference, our Senate co-chairs consider adding three important safeguards to allow exemptions to the State Ethics Code for university technology transfer activities. I join the State Ethics Commission in requesting the following safeguards be added to House Bill 425, including: 1) requiring final approval by the governor – this would be one approval outside the University of Hawai‘i; 2) specifying criteria on whether the technology transfer will adversely affect research and other state interests; and 3) adding quarterly reports and recording the project approvals in Board of Regents meetings. I believe these safeguards are necessary to ensure the university’s own technology transfer needs are balanced and aligned with the state’s broader interests. Thank you, Mr. President.”

At this time, Senator Thielen remarked that she had visited The Hub in Kaka'ako, as part of the Honolulu Biennial Festival, and encouraged the members to view the interactive art displays, which would appeal especially to young children.

Senator Kahele rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Colleagues, we have all been there: that moment when your phone rings, and it's from someone who you haven't heard from in a long time or someone who you least expect, and there is that initial sense of, 'Why is this person calling me?' – that something must be wrong. I got one of those calls yesterday, and it is with great sadness and a heavy heart that I share with you the passing of a great man, a father, a husband, a brother, a friend, a Hawaiian, who gave so much to our beloved state. Timothy Lui-Kwan passed away at the young age of 66 on Easter Sunday.

"Born in Hilo to a family of 10, he was a Kamehameha Schools graduate and a classmate of one of our former colleagues, Senator Malama Solomon of Waimea. He was an archaeologist at Bishop Museum and a graduate of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa with degrees in anthropology and law. In the early 1980s, he was a lawyer for the Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i on the Big Island, which is where he met another idealistic Hawaiian, a young Gilbert Kahele, and together they led the preservation of historic lands in south

Kona at Miloli'i and Kapu'a. Tim was a lawyer for Pa'a Pono Miloli'i. Later in his legal career, Tim became heavily involved and eventually was the lead attorney for the University of Hawai'i at Hilo regarding the Thirty Meter Telescope. What is of note is that, although Tim was a kanaka maoli who had a deep commitment as well as the educational experience of preserving and protecting Hawai'i's most precious natural resources and cultural artifacts, Tim was firmly committed to the TMT project on Mauna Kea, as he believed that culture and science could coexist on a mauna and that the future of Hawai'i's keiki depended on it.

"Finally, colleagues, one of the most comforting things I can think of is when Tim Lui-Kwan passed away on Sunday – just two days ago – that he was with his family at Kaimana Beach, enjoying a beautiful day in Hawai'i, and he was on the water, doing exactly what he loved to do, and I have no doubt our former colleague and Tim are smiling down at us right now. Our condolences go out to his wife Marty; daughters Erica and Malia Paul; and son Nicholas. And, Mr. President, at the appropriate time, I ask that the Senate observe a moment of silence for Mr. Timothy Lui-Kwan. Mahalo."

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Timothy Lui-Kwan was also my law school classmate and a good friend. It's very sad to hear about his passing but, as the senator from Hilo mentioned, he passed away in the ocean, at the beach, and I think that's kind of a fitting way for him, in a way, if he had to go. Condolences to his family from me also, and I'm going to miss him a lot. Thank you."

“These HCRs are important for the public safety to improve our prison system. They were not able to be considered earlier.”

Senator Tokuda noted:

“Given that we need to have a hearing on this measure – this economic development HCR – and given the tight schedule in the next week, we’d like to put this on our upcoming agenda.”

Senator Tokuda announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on H.C.R. No. 89 the following morning at 9:35 a.m. in Conference Room 211.

Senator Gabbard introduced Vincent Mina, newly confirmed member of the Board of Agriculture, who was seated in the gallery, noting that he also serves as president of Farmers Union United. Senator Gabbard commented that Vincent and one of the two other newly confirmed Board of Agriculture members, Randy Cabral, a lifelong farmer and president of the Farm Bureau, would represent farmers well as leaders of the two primary farmer membership organizations in the state. Senator Gabbard then stated that the other board member who had just been confirmed, Glenn Hong, is a current board member who brings a unique knowledge of how shipping costs impact the ag community from his role as president of Young Brothers.

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Mr. President, earlier this month I was invited to Military Appreciation Night at Kaleiopu’u Elementary School in Village Park. Kaleiopu’u is home campus to 896 students, and about 8 percent of them – 72 students – are dependents of military families. The school is one of 45 campuses in our public school system on O’ahu, Kaua’i and Hawai’i Island that are designated ‘military impact schools’; all together, they enroll about 14,000 military dependent students.

“The DOE has an excellent and very active military liaison office that coordinates among these schools to take advantage of federal programs available to assist through the Military Interstate Children’s Compact and the Joint Venture Education Forum.

“Their goal, of course, is to support military families with children in our schools and communities, to make sure they experience our islands’ cultural diversity and the aloha spirit. At the same time, *our* youngsters benefit by learning from classmates from different backgrounds, even though they may be in our schools just two or three years before their families move on.

“The Department of Defense invests heavily in services for dependents. You will recall that just last week, the DoD announced that \$70 million is being allocated to make substantial improvements at Solomon Elementary School at Schofield Barracks. That follows similar upgrades at Daniel K. Inouye Elementary – also at Schofield – just a few years ago. Both schools are run by the Hawai’i DOE.

“The month of April has been set aside nationwide as the Month of the Military Child to recognize and be sensitive to the

special challenges dependents and their families face with frequent relocations; acclimating to new schools and classmates; and parents absent for overseas duty, training missions, or other assignments.

“As part of the awareness month, this Friday – tomorrow, April 21 – has been designated Purple UP! Day. Purple is the color you get when you mix together Army green, Marine red and Navy-Air Force and Coast Guard blue – the official colors of the military services.

“I would like you all to consider wearing something purple tomorrow to join in this awareness program. To help you along the way, we have assembled and distributed these purple lapel ribbons – they should be on your desks – that you can pin to your blouse or jacket to join in this salute.

“Mahalo for your participation, and mahalo to our military families, who contribute so much to our communities.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I want to note with sadness the recent passing of Moanike‘ala Akaka. Moani was a former OHA trustee and Hawaiian activist, a friend of Puna and Hilo, and an ally and a friend of mine. She was outspoken, bold, sometimes controversial, and always courageous. Her strong, clear voice will be missed. I do not ask for a moment of silence but rather that we celebrate her colorful and meaningful life. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The Chair then stated:

“I didn’t read yesterday’s *Star-Advertiser* until after lunch yesterday, but if you look at Lee Cataluna’s column, she talks about Ric Cox, who lived on Kaua‘i for a short six years. He decided to get involved through the Rotary and – with Rotary support for education, teachers, and students on the island of Kaua‘i – created Aloha Angels. In three short years, he raised over a million dollars and invested tremendously in our young people and, suddenly, unexpectedly, passed away last week Thursday. Lee Cataluna wrote a very fitting tribute to someone who has contributed so much to Kaua‘i and Hawai‘i in the short time that he was here.”

The Senate reconvened at 6:41 p.m.

Senator Nishihara noted:

"Thank you, Mr. President. After consideration, the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs, as well as the Committee on Judiciary and Labor, have consented to agree with the House amendments made on Senate Bill 562. The Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs has decided that the concerns raised by the potential sunset of the current law outweigh the difference of opinion on the current form of the bill that exist between the House and the Senate. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 562, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 562, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TORT LIABILITY," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, April 28, 2017.

S.B. No. 1002, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

Senator Tokuda moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 11, 2017, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1002, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried.

Senator Tokuda then moved that the Senate agree with the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1002, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Tokuda noted:

"Senate Bill 1002, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 is the annual IRC conformity bill that conforms certain provisions of the Hawai'i income tax law to the federal Internal Revenue Code. Conforming state tax law to federal tax law is intended to make tax administration and collection more efficient for Hawai'i's taxpayers and the Department of Tax. The House simply made some clarifying amendments providing that portions of the measure relating to the estate and generation-skipping transfer tax apply to decedents dying or taxable transfers occurring after December 31, 2016. They also changed the effective date to 'upon approval,' so we recommend that we go ahead and agree to this measure."

Senator Tokuda then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of WILLIAM CURTIS as Vice Chairperson of the Board of Taxation Review, 2nd Taxation District (Maui), term to expire June 30, 2021, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Tokuda moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1743 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1747 (Gov. Msg. No. 703):

At this time, the Chair stated:

“Members, pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), the final question on nominations made by the governor that require the advice and consent of the Senate must be stated in the affirmative. Therefore, those casting Aye votes are voting to confirm, and those casting No votes are voting to reject the nomination.

“The recommendation of the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health on Governor’s Message No. 703 is that the Senate not advise and consent to the nomination of Thomas Gorak to the Public Utilities Commission. Therefore, the Chair will first entertain a motion to file Standing Committee Report No. 1747, then we will move on to the final vote on this matter.”

At 7:14 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 7:31 p.m.

The Chair announced:

“Just to remind the members: We are first dealing with Standing Committee Report 1747.”

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1747, as amended to delete the third paragraph from the bottom of page 4, be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator English and carried.

The Chair then directed the Clerk to place the amended committee report in the Journal.

Senator Espero moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of THOMAS GORAK to the Public Utilities Commission, term to expire June 30, 2022, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Ruderman rose to request a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“We have had the nominee in his hearing the other day, and we’ll note that 76 or so people and groups came in in support; there were only 3 in opposition – 3 people who used to work at the PUC. The gentleman before us is extremely well-qualified; he’s eminently qualified – everybody says so. **Everybody says so.** Some of the testimony that was used against him by one of the testifiers referred to an expert named Scott Hempling, and this person used Scott Hempling and his policies on regulatory affairs against Mr. Gorak. Mr. Hempling is a strong advocate and supporter of Mr. Gorak. Mr. Hempling is a regulatory expert known nationally and well-renowned. Mr. Gorak has 37 years or so, he’s got decades of regulatory experience. He’s exactly the person we need in the State of Hawai’i to move us forward with our renewable energy portfolio. He’s exactly the person we need with the expertise to help navigate the trials and tribulations that are going to come as we move to this new world. Hawaiian Electric sometimes needs a little coaxing and they need some direction; they need someone who’s going to be strong, somebody who knows the ins and outs.

“There are people here today, I believe, who probably will be opposing Mr. Gorak, and I, for the life of me, can’t understand why. We’ve looked at it, and there was a case that was presented to the circuit court that said that the governor’s nomination on interim appointment was wrong. But, Mr. President, the circuit court ruled against – ruled that the governor has the right to have an interim appointment, and it’s common sense! If the Senate is not in session, the governor has authority to nominate a person to fill the void. If we do nothing, or if we vote against

Mr. Gorak, or even if we support him, his term will expire at the end – the interim term will expire at the end of this session. If we deny his nomination today, he will be out at the end of next week, and we will have no third Public Utilities Commissioner, and we will have no expert that we have seen for the years that he has served the State of Hawai‘i. This guy is a valuable asset to the people of Hawai‘i! We’re not just knocking him out; if he doesn’t make it today, we’re not knocking him out – we’re hurting the people of Hawai‘i. Why? I can’t wait to hear somebody get up and say why this guy is not qualified for this job. The court case was ruled that the governor had the prerogative to make the interim appointment. That interim appointment is expiring. Whether that court rules one way or the other is not going to matter; we have a nomination going forward for the next four years. He’s eminently qualified; everybody knows it, and there’s something afoot here, and I think people are going to be voting against him and I just think, if they do, that would be wrong, so I am in the strongest of support for Tom Gorak. Thank you very much.”

Senator Ihara rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Because the Consumer Protection committee report discussed the Senate’s advise and consent process, I wanted to address its valid underlying concerns and the governor’s constitutional interim appointment authority superiority over holdover status created by statute. I agree with the chair of the Consumer Protection committee that the legal question at issue in *Morita v. Gorak* should be resolved by the courts – whether a holdover statute and its requirements can limit the governor’s interim appointment authority granted by the constitution and whether the Senate’s constitutional advise and consent authority was impermissibly denied by the Gorak and similar interim appointments. In the attorney general’s opinion, April 26th, he explained that, no matter if the Senate confirms or rejects Mr. Gorak, the *Morita* appeal would be moot but that the appellate court would likely still decide the appeal because a similar or repetitive situation could happen. He also said that since the appeal turns on a constitutional law question, only a ruling by an appellate court would resolve the question unless – and there’s one caveat – unless the appellate voluntarily dismisses her appeal, which I assume is unlikely.

“There is another concern about checks and balances between the governor and the Senate in the use of their respective constitutional powers to, on the one hand, make executive interim appointments and, on the other, provide advise and consent. Checks and balances serve in part to avoid imbalance among the co-equal branches of government and curb abuses of power. It appears to me that the superiority of constitutionally authorized interim appointments – their superiority over statutorily created holdover status is appropriate. While it’s possible general appointments and interim appointments could be used to manipulate the outcome of decisions, interim appointees without Senate confirmation have a fixed term of less than one year. If, on the other hand, PUC-type holdover officials could not be replaced by an interim appointee, the holdovers could have their terms extended by a mischievous governor or Senate. The Senate could keep in office a favored commissioner for almost two additional years by rejecting all nominations submitted to it. So the holdover person stays on for two years. And the Senate would not ever do that. The governor, in turn, could retain a high official for two additional years by using a holdover statute without Senate confirmation simply by not submitting nominations. In 2007, the Senate rejected gubernatorial nominees for a few departments – Department of Land and Natural Resources, Department of Public Safety, and other high officials – and there was some belief that the absence of a nominee for the Labor department director may have been a factor in the governor not submitting a nomination for fear of possible

rejection. Right now, if the governor does not have constitutional interim appointment authority to replace a holdover member of a board or commission, any governor could extend their first-term cabinet members without having to go through a Senate confirmation, which I think would be improper. I believe maximum one-year interim appointments followed by Senate confirmation allows for less political mischief than the almost-two additional years that holdovers would get in situations that I believe would harm the public trust.

“All legal issues aside, I believe we are indeed fortunate to have the caliber of Mr. Gorak here in Hawai‘i to shape our state’s energy and regulatory future. I believe the Senate should fairly consider Mr. Gorak’s qualifications and confirm him today. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I do not know Mr. Gorak; I met him for the first time the other day when he came to my office when he was doing his rounds, meeting with us for the nomination. And I’ve looked carefully at the testimony that was submitted and listened to the arguments that were made. It seems that a lot of the displeasure that’s expressed by some of my colleagues regarding Mr. Gorak relates to the choice to nominate him rather than to retain a certain commissioner on the Public Utilities Commission. And I can understand that displeasure: Sometimes we don’t get the nominees we would like. But that said, it seems to me we are misdirecting our displeasure at the nominee, as opposed to the nominator.

“The other argument I hear is that there is displeasure at the way the commission was run and information about that was shared with Mr. Gorak during his tenure as an attorney for the commission. But again, it seems to me we are misdirecting our displeasure at the nominee rather than the person who was heading the Public Utilities Commission and the supervisor of the nominee at the time that he was working there.

“I understand that there are limited way to express our displeasure, and it’s one thing to express it in a bill, to amend it or reject it. But I think it’s a completely different thing when you’re dealing with the nomination of a person. I’ve sat up there myself and watched the vote take place down here, when I was nominated as chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. And while many legislators say it’s not personal – and that’s true for legislation – it’s deeply personal when you’re sitting up there as the nominee because we’re voting on the nominee as a person. So, in looking at all the evidence that’s in front of me, I’m coming down on the fact that every single person, including the committee chair, is saying that it’s not a question that this gentleman is qualified to serve as a Public Utilities Commissioner. And that’s why I’m going to be voting in favor of him and ask that you do as well.”

The Chair having so ordered (on the Fifty-Ninth Day, May 2, 2017), Senator Thielen’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, colleagues, I again speak in support of the nominee, but also to highlight the extremely unusual nature of this Committee’s recommendation to reject this nominee.

“The Chair of the Committee has not provided any substantive floor remarks to explain why we should reject this nominee. Indeed, the Chair has been uncharacteristically silent tonight regarding the recommendation. Normally a Chair making such a recommendation would detail specific reasons to reject a nominee. We have yet to hear any.

“Nor has any other member of the Senate spoken out to give any reason to reject the nominee. Again, normally you’d hear several members explaining why we should vote to oppose a

nomination, why they think the person is unqualified to hold this position.

“Even more unusually, the Committee Report recognizes that the nominee IS qualified to serve as a Commissioner of the Public Utilities Commission. The Chair of the Committee recognizes the nominee is qualified.

“So why is there a recommendation to vote this person down? The Report cites one lone reason to reject the nominee: because there is a pending judicial appeal on the question of whether the Governor had the authority to nominate this person as an interim appointee. Apparently the Committee – mistakenly, as it turns out – believed at the time of writing the report that our confirming the nominee will jeopardize the pending appeal.

“Mr. President, I want to attach to my remarks a recent opinion from the Attorney General that directly addresses this question. This opinion was prepared at the request of a Committee member after the Committee made its recommendation. The member asked the AG if the Committee concern were valid, whether confirming the nominee **would** jeopardize the pending appeal. This AG Opinion has been shared with every Senator, and we had a chance to discuss the opinion and hear directly from the Attorney General’s Office prior to this vote here tonight. Therefore, the privilege over this opinion has already been waived, and every Senator voting tonight has had an opportunity to read it and hear directly from the First Deputy and Deputy Attorney who wrote this Opinion (the AG himself is on the mainland right now).

“According to the AGs, the Committee report’s rationale to reject the nominee is meritless. The Committee report claims that approving the nominee will moot out the appeal, and by inference, rejecting the nominee will preserve the appeal.

“According to the AG, either approving or rejecting the nominee will moot the issue on appeal. However, because the issue whether the Governor had the legal authority to make an interim appointment applies to most Executive appointments, and is an issue that is capable of repetition but evading review, the court most likely will still hear the appeal, regardless of our vote tonight.

“Furthermore, the AG has said – in writing and to all of us tonight – that they support the appeal, believe that the court should rule on the issue to provide certainty for future Executive interim appointments, and will not seek to dismiss the case regardless of our vote.

“So the one, lone reason we have been given to vote against this nominee, is meritless.

“We have before us, literally, sitting upstairs in the gallery, a gentleman who by every account is highly qualified to be a State Public Utilities Commissioner.

“In the immortal words of Ferris Bueller’s teacher: ‘Can anyone in this Chamber give me a reason for rejecting Mr. Gorak’s nomination to the PUC?’

“Anyone?”

“Anyone?”

The Chair having so ordered, the opinion from the Attorney General is identified as “**ATTACHMENT A**” to the Journal of this Day.

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I also do not know Mr. Gorak; I just met him a few weeks ago when he came to pay a courtesy visit. I reviewed his resumé, and I think, by all accounts, he is a very qualified

individual. I did review all the testimony; as was previously mentioned, almost every testimony also is in support and talks of his qualifications. You know, in my mind, the only question at hand is: Is Mr. Gorak qualified for this position or not? All of the other issues, questions, are not part of this decision. So if we look at ‘Is he qualified or not?’, I find absolutely no reason for us to deny this confirmation. As was mentioned, there were over 60 testimony in favor of Mr. Gorak and only 3 in opposition, and I think that speaks volumes. And I believe, in addition to these, were not counted are all the emails that we’re receiving: It’s all in support of Mr. Gorak.

“And good people don’t come by very often, and I fear that if we treat good people in the manner that Mr. Gorak has been treated, I fear that we’re going to suffer from a lack of good people stepping forward. We need good people to serve this state, and if we just limit our decision to looking at ‘Is he qualified?’, I do not believe there is any reason that we should find him not qualified. There has been, I believe, innuendos; there have been, perhaps, anonymous concerns raised through someone else. I think, if we are to find any credibility in those reports, we need to have some evidence. So, again, I stand in support of Mr. Gorak and I will be voting in strong support. Thank you.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Thank you; I’ll be brief. I want to speak because I think it’s very important, although I realize my words will sway few, if any, members. Tom Gorak is eminently qualified, perhaps more so than anyone in the state. Very important decisions are in process and more coming along. The PUC needs expertise such as his to address these, as the PUC and most of his staff have said. I’ve spoken to several attorneys and staff at the PUC, all of whom expressed unqualified support and were surprised by the whispered innuendo against him and denied the accuracy of such. He has been accused of lacking judgment for the simple reason that he accepted the appointment. The governor called him to provide his expertise to benefit our state, and he answered – this was his only crime. The statements that the appointment was not legal are curious; the attorney general says it was legal and a court upheld that. Yet we are asked to assume that this will be turned over on appeal and to act on an appeal whose decision is not before us and may never occur. We’re asked to imagine that the attorney general and the court are in error with no basis to do so. If the appointment was not legal, then virtually all interim appointments are not legal. In any case, we’re not voting on the interim appointment; we’re voting on the perfectly legal, unchallenged nomination before us.

“We’re asked to deny this nomination in part because those who would have spoken against it were intimidated from doing so and we should listen more closely to innuendo and unspoken words than the abundant legal support before us. Only 3 people spoke against the nominee while over 60 spoke in support. Curiously, the three opposing testimonies were not among those presented in advance even though the existence of those testimonies was announced loudly weeks in advance. The nominee and the committee entered the hearing with only visible support and were blindsided by opposition carefully coordinated and obviously prepared well in advance. All those opposing him have an axe to grind unrelated to the nominee. The ambush he walked into was inexcusable. He was treated with antagonism from the start to finish, and I, for one, apologize to the nominee for the unfair treatment he received at our hands. The defamatory statements in the original, already-published committee report is one such example. As the *Star-Advertiser* said so clearly, ‘If there’s any just cause to dismiss Gorak, it was not identified at the hearing.’

“We all know this is not about the timing of the process but about the NextEra decision. The decision would have been the

same with or without Mr. Gorak on the commission and with or without his vote. There's a great desire for payback against someone, maybe the PUC or the administration, and Mr. Gorak is the scapegoat for a decision he did not control. After a 40-year stellar career, this man's reputation is being dragged through the mud in a veritable witch hunt. It is unfair to the nominee and beneath the dignity of this body to do so. For those few of you who are free to vote your conscience, I urge you to confirm this nominee for the benefit of our state, our renewable energy goals, and, most importantly, the integrity of the Senate. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Re: Relationship Between *Morita v. Gorak* and the Nomination of  
Thomas Gorak to Serve on the Public Utilities Commission

Dear Senator Ihara:

We are writing to respond to your e-mail from early this morning, asking several questions regarding the relationship between the pending case *Morita v. Gorak* and the nomination of Thomas Gorak for a full-term appointment on the Public Utilities Commission.

**Questions and Short Answers.** We have consolidated your questions as follows, with short answers.

- How would the *Morita v. Gorak* appeal to the Intermediate Court of Appeals be affected, if at all, by Senate confirmation or rejection of PUC nominee Thomas Gorak? Would either outcome render the *Morita* appeal moot?

In our view, the *Morita v. Gorak* appeal will be rendered moot regardless of how the Senate votes on Mr. Gorak's nomination. But our appellate courts will likely still rule on the appeal by invoking an exception to the mootness doctrine, called "capable of repetition, yet evading review." Given this likelihood, the only way the appellate courts could not decide the appeal would be for the appellant, Hermina Morita, to voluntarily dismiss her appeal. The State and Mr. Gorak did not file the appeal and therefore cannot voluntarily dismiss it.

- Is Mr. Gorak's nomination for a position as PUC commissioner, to expire June 30, 2022, at issue in the *Morita v. Gorak* appeal, directly or indirectly?

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No. The only issue in the *Morita v. Gorak* is the propriety of Mr. Gorak's interim appointment under article V, section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution. This is legally and factually distinct from the full-term appointment presently under Senate consideration.

- If it goes forward, will *Morita v. Gorak* resolve the legal disagreement between the Department of the Attorney General and the Senate, as evident from the Attorney General Op. No. 16-3, issued July 15, 2016, and the Senate's amicus brief from August 2016?

Yes. In resolving the *Morita v. Gorak* appeal, the appellate court will likely resolve this disagreement. Because the appeal turns on a question of state constitutional law, a ruling from our appellate courts is the only way to conclusively resolve this question.

**Background.** As you will recall, Governor Ige appointed Mr. Gorak to the PUC as a commissioner, effective July 1, 2016, on an interim basis. His predecessor's term had expired on June 30, 2016. Mr. Gorak's appointment was made under the interim appointments provision in article V, section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution. Under that provision, the Governor may fill "a vacancy in any office, appointment to which requires the confirmation of the senate," when "the senate is not in session[.]" Unless later confirmed by the Senate, such an appointment expires "at the end of the next session of the senate."

In July 2016, Hermina Morita brought suit against Mr. Gorak and the State, claiming that Mr. Gorak's interim appointment was improper. The challenge concerns only the interim appointment. Ms. Morita argued that Mr. Gorak's predecessor was permitted by statute to stay in office as a holdover commissioner, thus preventing there from being a vacancy under article V, section 6. In August 2016, Judge Edwin C. Nacino of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit rejected her claim, instead accepting Mr. Gorak and the State's arguments that a vacancy was created by the end of the predecessor's term and that the statutory holdover provision did not displace the Governor's interim appointments authority.

Ms. Morita appealed. The appeal is presently in briefing before the Intermediate Court of Appeals, CAAP-16-0000686. The appeal turns on whether the interim appointment was proper.

In March 2017, Governor Ige sent a Governor's message submitting Mr. Gorak for consideration and confirmation on the PUC, for a term to end June 30, 2022. GM 703. As you know, on April 21, 2017, the Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health voted, 4-3, against recommending Mr. Gorak for confirmation by the full Senate. We understand that the full Senate will vote on the matter in the near future.

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The current session of the Senate will end with the Legislature's adjournment *sine die* on May 4, 2017. Thus, unless confirmed by the Senate before then, Mr. Gorak's interim appointment will end with the Senate's adjournment.

**Analysis.** There are only two possible outcomes at this juncture: Mr. Gorak is confirmed or he is not. Either result will render the appeal moot. This is so because either outcome will terminate the *interim* appointment that is the subject of the appeal. If Mr. Gorak is confirmed, this confirmation will be for a *full-term* appointment, which will end on June 30, 2022. The interim appointment will have been replaced. If, on the other hand, Mr. Gorak is not confirmed, then his interim appointment will expire with the adjournment of the Senate on May 4.

As a result, regardless of how the Senate proceeds, the appeal in *Morita v. Gorak* will shortly become moot. But there is an exception to the mootness doctrine that the court could invoke and allow the appeal to go forward. A court will not dismiss a case as moot if the "passage of time would prevent a single plaintiff" from completing the case:

[W]e have repeatedly recognized an exception to the mootness doctrine in cases involving questions that affect the public interest and are 'capable of repetition yet evading review.' . . .

Among the criteria considered in determining the existence of the requisite degree of public interest are the public or private nature of the question presented, the desirability of an authoritative determination for the future guidance of public officers, and the likelihood of future recurrence of the question. The phrase, "capable of repetition, yet evading review," means that a court will not dismiss a case on the grounds of mootness where a challenged governmental action would evade full review because the passage of time would prevent any single plaintiff from remaining subject to the restriction complained of for the period necessary to complete the lawsuit.

*Diamond v. State, Bd. of Land and Nat. Res.*, 112 Hawai'i 161, 170, 145 P.3d 704, 713 (2006) (emphasis added; citations and internal quotation marks omitted). *Diamond* concerned the legality of a shoreline certification, which was valid only for one year and had already expired by the time the Court reached the case. The Court concluded that the exception to mootness applied, reasoning that "it is virtually certain that, given that the appeals process generally takes more than one year, any future shoreline certification of this or any other property will expire before the appellate process is complete, effectively frustrating appellate review[.]" *Id.* at 172, 145 P.3d at 715.

The interim appointment at issue in *Morita v. Gorak* can last, at most, just over ten months (July 1, 2016 to May 4, 2017). In fact, the longest that any interim

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appointment could last would be about a year (from just after the Senate adjourns from one regular session until the following adjournment). There is little doubt that the exercise of this authority is of great public importance, both for Mr. Gorak's appointment and to resolve this question for any other interim appointment that may be made in future. The Court in *Diamond* proceeded with the merits of that case in analogous circumstances. See also *Okada Trucking Co., Ltd. v. Bd. of Water Supply*, 99 Hawaii 191, 197, 53 P.3d 799, 805 (2002) (collecting cases). We cannot, of course, speak for our appellate courts. Based on this analysis, however, we believe that the appellate courts will likely resolve the legal question presented in *Morita v. Gorak* regardless of its imminent mootness. Resolving this appeal would put to rest the disagreement between Atty. Gen. Op. 16-3 and the Senate's amicus brief.

In the interests of completeness, we note that Ms. Morita could opt to voluntarily dismiss her appeal under Hawaii Rules of Appellate Procedure (HRAP) Rule 42(b). This approach cannot be initiated by Mr. Gorak and the State, as they prevailed before the trial court and the choice to file the appeal was not theirs to make.

**FINAL READING**

Senator Tokuda moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135 be adopted and H.B. No. 100, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I just have some very brief remarks today and would ask that the Clerk insert some written remarks that I'll provide later into the Journal. At this time, I would like to begin – first of all, really, today I'd like to highlight my remarks by making a number of acknowledgments because we would not be here with this budget had it not been for the hard work and effort of so many individuals. First off, I would like to thank my vice chair and his team for their hard work on the CIP budget. As I had mentioned previously on this floor when we did the Senate draft, it was really commendable to have to take down the amount from \$1.5 billion to \$1 billion. I know that sounds like a lot of money, but looking around this room, at all of your priorities and your requests, then you add the House's priorities and requests, and then you balance that out with the needs of the state. This is no simple task, but, I think, when you take a look at what came out of the conference draft of the budget, it was clear that, on his shoulders, he balanced that out and represented the Senate very well. I appreciate the hard work of his team, CIP specialist Lee Leonard, who is here and I'll be acknowledging shortly as well; they spent a lot of late nights and weekends really making sure that they made the Senate proud, and that really means a lot to me because I think a lot of times they see our faces; it's our names in the paper; it's our names that they think about, but really, we have to acknowledge the staff and the team that makes sure that the ink on paper is correct, the numbers line up. But also, I want to acknowledge the leadership that went into this, so please join me in giving a hand to Vice Chair Dela Cruz for his hard work on the CIP portion of the budget.

"You know, I'd also like to thank at this time – although they are not in this chamber; they're across the way in the other chamber – my counterpart, Finance Chair Luke, for being extremely supportive of me. I can tell you that, as Ways and Means chair, it's a job – as some of you here know, having sat in this seat before – it can be challenging at times, as I mentioned, trying to balance out all of the needs that you have within your body, and then going into conference, especially, then trying to manage those expectations and priorities against those of House members, and then looking at it from the bigger-picture perspective of the state. Having a friend – a sister, if you will – in Chair Luke has been a great learning experience. It's been something that I've really appreciated being able to walk side by side with her with, and I think, as a result of our partnership and efforts, the budget process has been a better one. It's been a transparent one; more things have been put online faster in the last few years, and we've gotten things done quicker. And I really do appreciate all the efforts that we've been able to do together as well. I think the budget before us is stronger, and I just really want to thank her for all the support, for all that I've been able to learn from her as well. I know she probably can't hear me right now; they're probably deliberating some bill of some sort on their agenda, but I do really want to thank her for her patience, for all that she has taught me, and the willingness and ability to work with her on these budget proceedings. I also want to thank Vice Chair Cullen for all of his efforts and for the ability to work with him. Previously, he was doing GIAs and was exceptional at that particular point, but even bringing now to the floor the vice chair experience, he's really stepped up and proven himself as a strong vice chair in this capacity as well. And GIA co-chair Lowen. Altogether as a leadership team for the Finance committee, I think being able to work with them together, with the Ways and Means leadership, I think we are able to provide for you House Bill 100 as a

conference draft that is reflective of the needs of the state but also financially prudent and sustainable, knowing that we are going into some fiscally austere times that will be difficult and challenging. We were able to do so, make those tough decisions on behalf of the state, because we were able to work as a team because we recognized together what needed to be done, and I appreciate the partnership that we were able to foster together. So, if you would please help me in acknowledging and giving them a huge round of applause – because they gave us a round of applause earlier – to our House counterparts, to Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, Co-Chair Lowen: Please help me in acknowledging them for all their efforts and their support.

“You know, I’d also like, at this time, to thank my committee members. Sitting on WAM usually means you’re sitting there for quite a long time, although it could be worse: We could have many more hearings. But I really do want to thank our committee members because it’s not always easy to get quorum, so especially to the good senator from ‘Aiea-Pearl City, who was always there first, I want to acknowledge him for his help in providing me with quorum without fail. It is often difficult to pass, literally, the hundreds of bills that we had to pass, whether it’s before First Cross or after. Our committee members are what makes it happen and we had additional briefings this year to keep us apprised of the budget status, the financial plan, and on various aspects, and you folks were there, so thank you for giving us the ability to move things forward, especially on this particular budget, being there to participate, being active participants, asking the questions. It is not always easy, but we do appreciate all the time and effort you put in. And even in these conference proceedings, serving as co-chairs on these countless bills, we cannot be in one place everywhere, all the time – you folks made it happen, so I really appreciate all of the members for participating actively in the Ways and Means process.

“I’d now like to move on to thank individuals who have finally made their way down from our offices. I know that it’s rumored that Ways and Means staff is somehow guarded under lock and key in the office and never actually come out, but I promise you we don’t torture them in such ways. There are labor laws – I assure you, they do get out; they are fed, and they are not tortured in any such way. But I do want to send out a huge mahalo. I’m so humbled and so grateful, I cannot even begin to express the deep aloha I have for our office team, although I think the office team is still hiding upstairs, probably, but I definitely want to extend my grateful appreciation to our office team and especially for our Ways and Means ‘ohana – our WAMily – who finally made their way down to the gallery; they usually do for this day. So I will introduce all their names and ask them to stand up so that you can acknowledge them at this time: Sabrina Nasir is not here, unfortunately – there was a family emergency she had to attend to, but I know she is definitely here with us cheering us on; we have Ben Park, Lee Leonard, Chris Tu, Heather Schultz, Julian Juarez, Rob Nishimoto, Johnathan Say, Christopher Han, Daniel Hironaka, Michele Sansone, Dylan Smith, Jennifer Song, and Mark Ogata, if our entire team could please stand, and please help me acknowledge our amazing group. Thank you. As I said before, had it not been for these individuals, I don’t know what we would be able to do in terms of the budget. I really do feel so blessed to be able to come in every day to work with these individuals, although I often do find it to be extremely bittersweet as it comes toward the end of the session, especially with our session staff – we just want to keep them all with us. But they really reflect the very best of us, in terms of the commitment that they have to our state, and it really is reflected in the budget worksheets that you have before you.

“I’m not going to comment too much on all of the fine details; I will leave that for our written report, but I will say this: As I was considering my thoughts for today, I couldn’t help

but think of a moment – as I was walking through ‘Iolani Palace a couple weeks ago, I happened to find a little school group practicing for a video that they were shooting. Luckily for you, I will not sing like the good senator from Kapolei or else it will clear the house here because, unlike most of my students at my alma mater, I have no performing ability at all. But they were singing the song ‘Seasons of Love,’ one of my favorite songs from the Broadway musical *Rent*, and it just got me thinking about the budget process, about everything we do here. And it’s not just because it talks about cups of coffee, although I will tell you that when it comes to producing the budget and making the numbers count, it took a lot of cups of coffee. But it forced me to think upon this season – it’s like a season when we go through session. What goes into the days and the minutes? How do we measure what we’ve done here? How would you count all of these things? Advocates will look through the budget and some of them will say, well, for homelessness we did quite a bit, and they’re okay and they’re happy: \$3 million in general funds in fiscal ‘18 for Housing First – that’s even more, in some cases, like the \$3 million in general funds in fiscal ‘18 for Rapid Re-Housing, more than the governor asked for; \$1.5 million in general funds in ‘18 for homeless outreach services – that’s going to make a huge difference in making sure people get the services they need. Half a million in services for homeless individuals with serious and persistent mental health challenges and \$800,000 in general funds for outreach and counseling services for chronically homeless individuals with severe substance abuse disorders. Even \$300,000 to support them in clean and sober housing for those who are chronically homeless – making sure that we have supportive services, wraparound services, across the spectrum. They would say this is a really good thing when we measure what the Legislature did during this season; it was a good thing. They would look at those minutes, those hours, those days; they would look at the 60 days; they would look at the 86,400 minutes, the 5,184,000 seconds, the 60 days we stood here and say we did all right.

“They’d probably pick up health care, and depending on which end of the spectrum they were at, they would appreciate what we were able to do. Perhaps on the senior spectrum, making sure that we had \$4.1 million in general funds in ‘18 for Kupuna Care, \$1.7 million in general funds in ‘18 for the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC), or even the bills that we’re able to pass hopefully soon today for the kupuna caregiver program, which has taken literally decades for us to get to, to finally get started – \$600,000 there. It was previously in the Senate version of the budget, but it’s now going through a bill – considered landmark, in some cases. They would look, on the neighbor islands, in the healthcare spectrum, and go, ‘We’re getting what we need’: \$33.4 million in general fund subsidies for Maui Health System, making sure that we had the \$33 million we need for the Maui severance as well, because healthcare access across neighbor islands is important. They would look at Medicare – \$2.9 million – and say that’s important. All of these things, even vector control and supporting all of those things – if you look at the entire vector office, we increased their funding over the biennium by over \$1.4 million to support the health issues that are coming across our state all the time.

“Some of our advocates, measuring what we did this season, looking at the minutes, looking at the hours, considering all of these things that we did – if they’re looking at education, they’d look across the spectrum and they’d consider, from our youngest of our keiki to those who are in college, we were able to support finally going a little bit further in getting more pre-K classrooms in our public schools. That’s over half a million, almost \$750,000, in the biennium for pre-K classrooms and getting teachers into induction programs to make sure we have access for students, all the way to the other end of the spectrum to make sure that they have access into higher education, which

is especially important now, with the federal government being where it is. Securing funds for the Early College High School initiative, \$1 million in each year, and even making sure that we have support for the Hawai'i Promise program. For so many of our students, we take it for granted. I know I don't: I was a first-generation college student. I know many of you here were as well. It's not natural; it's not automatic you will just go to college and you can afford it. So the \$1.8 million for the Hawai'i Promise program will make a difference in countless lives in every one of our districts; that was important. And honoring the legacy of Patsy Mink and Title IX and what she wanted: I know that was a priority for many of you here who have stood by the late congresswoman who was a mentor to many of us. From the Department of Education to the University of Hawai'i, we put resources and funds and positions in both the Department of Education and UH to make sure that we honored the late congresswoman's legacy and we didn't just talk about her like she was just somebody who served here and lived here. We did well by her; we represented and honored her well. So we made sure that there was \$1.6 million in general funds in each year for Title IX positions at UH campuses statewide, but there was also over a million dollars in the Department of Education as well to implement Title IX and comply with Title IX in the DOE.

"And even above and beyond that, recognizing our commitment to agriculture, because we made a promise a few years ago that we would go toward general funds for DLNR, and we did that. This was a banner year when it came to actually getting general funds in the base budget for various programs in DLNR: \$13.8 million for general fund base budgeting for various programs in DLNR; \$4 million in each year for the Hawaii Invasive Species Council; combating rapid 'ohi'a death, which is a huge issue - \$750,000. I'm sure if advocates asked, can you measure what we did in environmental protection, agriculture, they would look at the minutes that ticked by and say that the resources we put here will be adding things back, adding protections back, and that's going to make the difference. Even agriculture - which I know is a priority for so many here who wish to support agriculture - \$1.5 million in general funds for Ag Loan Revolving Fund.

"There are so many things that we tried to do in this budget while at the same time understanding that we are fiscally constrained, and there was a lot of things that we did still have to, unfortunately, leave on the table, and that's always the hard part. Those are the things that I'll remember as I look back on the minutes and the seconds and the hours and the days. When I look through the 60 days, the 86,400 minutes, the 5,184,000 seconds, I'll think of all of those deliberations, and the fact that, yes, our budget did approve a little bit more, but at the same time we still came in over \$145 million less than what the administration asked for. We still did go in and cut where we had to; we restricted where we had to; we constrained where we had to because we understood that it's not just about the minutes that we are here; it's not just about the hours and the months that we are here - it is the years ahead; it's the days ahead. That's what we thought about as we went through our deliberations. That's the difficult part. Luckily for me, I will reflect on the very positive things that went through this session that got us to those very difficult decisions: the many cups of coffee and enjoyable moments, albeit difficult, that I had with Chair Luke and the House, trying to come up with these decisions; with our Ways and Means team, trying to figure out how we're going to make things work with very little resources, struggling to find those resources; with our Ways and Means committee - Vice Chair taking the fastest votes on record. I assure you, you'd better be in your seat or you're going to get missed in many cases. But really appreciate all of those days, the minutes, and the seconds because I assure you that they were very thoughtful and thought out, and that's how we came

to a budget that, while far less than what the governor started off this session with, is still very full in terms of how we can measure our progress and what we committed to for the people of this state and the priorities that they feel are most important and, going forward, will give them good results in terms of the minutes, the hours, the days, and the months and the years ahead, and be able to provide for them. So I want to thank you again for all of your support and hope for a positive vote on this budget."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Tokuda's additional remarks are identified as "ATTACHMENT A" to the Journal of this Day.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd just like to insert written remarks into the Journal in support, and if I could also thank the Ways and Means chair, the committee, and the staff for all the countless hours that they put into it. It is not easy having to make these hard decisions, and I also want to thank the committee and the Senate for their conversations on all the many issues to make sure that we can support the constituencies, the departments, and the state overall. Mahalo."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz's additional remarks read as follows:

"The Legislative intent of the general obligation bond fund appropriation for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (HHL-602), the sum of \$6,900,000, is for the transfer of tax map key numbers (1) 7-1-002-031 and (1) 7-1-002-033, to the Agribusiness Development Corporation. This appropriation for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands is to acquire real property for the purposes of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920. It is to our understanding, through the Department's cooperation, that the fee title on two parcels of land located in Wahiawā, O'ahu, will be transferred to the Agribusiness Development Corporation prior to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands expending these funds."

"Hemp, hemp, Hooray! Last session, we passed S.B. 2659, which became Act 228, establishing a five-year industrial hemp pilot program. This session we have S.B. 773, which will improve the existing industrial hemp pilot program law by allowing farmers to apply for hemp licenses year round instead of just from January to April, requiring the counties to recognize the cultivation of industrial hemp, limiting the cultivation of hemp to licensees on agricultural lands, and repealing the requirement of having to get a movement permit to transport hemp plants or material.

"In the next eight months, we'll be seeing a lot of activity focused on hemp as we get closer to January 2018 when farmers in our state will be able to obtain licenses from the Department of Agriculture to grow hemp. On Maui, from June 5 to 11, 2017, the Maui Hemp Institute for Research and Innovation will be hosting Hemp History Week. And on Hawai'i Island, June 9 - 11, 2017, the Hawaii Hemp Conference will take place on Hilo. I'll be representing the Legislature at both of these events.

"As we look to solutions to environmental problems that confront us, we should look at hemp as a miracle crop that can truly change our world. Take for instance toilet paper.... each of us uses about 50 pounds of toilet paper each year. That's a lot of trees we're cutting down. Already there's hemp toilet paper being made and you might be surprised to learn that according to the Marijuana Times, 'in 1857 Joseph C. Gayetty invented the first commercial toilet paper in the United States. His product was made from Manila hemp and the sheets were moistened and soaked in aloe.' Also, each year at the Legislature we discuss banning polystyrene and reducing the use of single use plastic bottles. Hemp plastics can replace all of these everyday products.

"So hopefully this time next year, farmers around our state will be harvesting their first crop of hemp and researching what incredible products they can create with it. Let's get this hempening! Mahalo."

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 505, C.D. 1, Relating to Health.

“This bill requires an informed consent agreement between a patient and any prescriber of opioids in the State. An uninformed user of opioids may not understand the risks of dependency that is inherent in opioid use as well the increased risk of death from an accidental overdose. The informed consent process allows the patient to better understand the goals of treatment, potential benefits of treatment, realistic outcomes, potential risks, how to use the medication, and alternative treatment options. It is one approach to begin addressing the nationwide opioid epidemic that affects Hawai‘i, too. The bill also limits initial concurrent prescriptions of opioids and benzodiazepines to seven days, except for treatment of specified conditions. This may help unused opioids from falling into the hands of unintended users.

“This measure was introduced as part of the Women’s Legislative Caucus package to address the growing opioid epidemic in our islands. According to the Department of Health, opioids accounted for more than 35 percent of drug overdose deaths from 2010 to 2014, and the percentage could be higher. The CDC’s 2013 Prevention Status Report noted that opioid overdose deaths have quadrupled since 1999, coinciding with an equal increase in opioid pain reliever sales. As more and more opioids are being prescribed, their abuse is also increasing. Although there are many legitimate uses for opioids, this class of drugs is highly addictive and can be easily abused. It is crucial that we reduce addiction, overdose and death related to the use of opioids.

“Creating an informed consent process will enable providers to give appropriate and necessary care to their patients while also ensuring that their patients are aware of the risks associated with taking opioid drugs. These agreements are considered a best practice in the medical community and can greatly increase public awareness of the dangers associated with opioids. A more informed public will be better equipped to care for themselves and take precautions to avoid opioid addiction and other abuse.

“Additionally, limiting initial prescriptions of these drugs will reduce the likelihood of abuse. Many times opioids are needed only for short-term recovery. If a patient receives a prescription for longer than needed, they can become addicted and experience withdrawal symptoms when trying to stop taking their prescribed medication. This creates a dangerous situation and can lead to opioid abuse. This measure provides safeguards so that if additional prescriptions are needed after the first week, physicians may consult with the patient over the telephone, removing the burden for the patient to return to the prescriber’s office. There are also exceptions for situations in which long-term opioid therapy is necessary for the patient’s treatment.

“It is my sincere hope that taking these steps will alleviate further opioid abuse in Hawai‘i. Mahalo.”

"This bill is another way we can assure our students a supportive learning environment. I urge a positive vote for S.B. 423. Thank you, Mr. President."

At 10:55 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:33 a.m.

The Chair announced:

"If there are no objections from the members, we will be taking Conference Committee Report No. 91 on S.B. No. 382, C.D. 1 out of order."

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 91 (S.B. No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 91 be adopted and S.B. No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Baker then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 2) to S.B. No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting sections 1, 2, and 3.

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering section 4 as section 1.

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting section 5.

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering section 6 as section 2.

Senator Baker moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. The essence of this floor amendment is to skinny the bill down to only the request of the auditor for a management audit of the Public Utilities Commission. In further reflection on this measure and in concert with my House counterpart, we believe that it is more appropriate to take out any of the extraneous language so that we're not presupposing the findings or activities that the audit may uncover, so I ask my colleagues to join me in voting for this measure."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Baker then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 91 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Nishihara and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 382, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2017.

The Chair announced:

"If there are no objections from the members, we will be taking Conference Committee Report No. 192 and S.B. No. 1183, C.D. 1 out of order."

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 192 (S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 192 be adopted and S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Kahele then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 3) to S.B. No. 1183, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1183, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 2, Conference Draft 1, is amended as follows:

1. By amending the provisions in part I by authorizing counties to adopt or extend a county surcharge on state tax until December 31, 2037;

2. By deleting part II, which prohibited a county from using revenues derived from a county surcharge on state tax for operating or administrative costs of a mass transit project;

3. By deleting part III, which prohibited a county from prohibiting the use of county funds for the capital cost of a mass transit project;

4. By deleting part IV, which:

A. Increased the transient accommodations tax from 9.25 per cent to 12 per cent from January 1, 2018, to December 31, 2027, and allocated \$50,000,000 of the annual proceeds to the New Start Education Special Fund and the remainder to a county with a population greater than five hundred thousand that adopts or extends a county surcharge on state tax for capital costs of a mass transit project; and

B. Required that \$13,000,000 in annual transient accommodations tax proceeds allocated to the City and County of Honolulu, separate from the additional proceeds from the temporary increase in the tax rate to 12 per cent, shall be used only for capital costs of a mass transit project;

5. By deleting part V, which prohibited a county with a population greater than five hundred thousand that receives revenues from a county surcharge on state tax from using public funds to reconstruct or redevelop the event venue known as the Neal S. Blaisdell Center;

6. By deleting part VI, which established the New Start Education Special Fund;

7. By deleting provisions in part VII that prohibited the collection and allocation of revenues from a county surcharge on state tax if other provisions in the measure are not met;

8. By deleting provisions in part VII that authorized the Director of Taxation to levy, assess, and collect the transient accommodations tax at an increased rate;

9. By deleting all part designations in the bill; and

10. By renumbering all remaining sections of the bill accordingly.

Senator Kahele moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator Inouye.

Senator Kahele rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Colleagues, this proposed floor amendment that you have in front of you will extend the rail surcharge tax for 10 years, to 2037. What this floor amendment will do is it will finish the rail project; we will not have to raise property taxes on the island of O’ahu. And, colleagues, I want to make something clear: I

strongly support the rail project. My goal is to one day see the rail project go to UH Mānoa and to do originally what it was intended to do, and that was to connect our second city in Kapolei with our state’s flagship university. I’m not happy with the cost of this project, but I believe we started it, and we need to finish it: 20 miles of elevated track, 21 stations, to Ala Moana – but we need to do it the right way.

“I’m opposed to the current proposal. You know, in the Hawaiian language, we have a word that we use to describe things, and that word is *pilau*. This proposal is pilau. I’m against this proposal for many reasons. First and foremost, this process, this proposal and the way it was drafted – colleagues, it’s been 95 days since Opening Day, 59 session days, and this pilau proposal is the best we have. This bill was concocted in the eleventh hour by a privileged few with the complete absence of transparency and collaboration and accountability. The subject matter chairs were circumvented; the industry was sidestepped; the counties were a mere afterthought; and the public, of all people, were not given the opportunity to be heard. The mechanism of using the transient accommodations tax is one thing and one thing only: It is a job killer in the State of Hawai’i. And make no mistake, this bill will hurt our state’s number-one industry, which is tourism. The potentially disastrous consequences of passing this bill and adding to the unfortunate reputation as one of the most expensive places to visit in the United States, putting us at a competitive disadvantage that could lead to fewer visitors and less visitor spending and cause a ripple effect that may negatively affect small businesses in our community. The economic impact of this bill on our neighbor island communities and local families will be devastating. From my home, on Hawai’i Island, the ramifications of the proposed change to 1 percent TAT would result in an immediate loss of \$4 million to the economy of the County of Hawai’i. We would put at risk core services for residents and visitors, including ocean safety officers, park and trail maintenance, police protection, fire protection, bus services, infrastructure repair, and maintenance.

“So, colleagues, for the aforementioned reasons and many, many more, I oppose the job-killing, pilau bill we have in front of us and I implore you to support the floor amendment in front of you. Mahalo.”

At 11:40 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:41 a.m.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the amendment with reservations as follows:

“I feel that those of us who have taken a consistent stand opposing the extension of the rail project without some form of accountability and cost containment being brought to the table are put in a no-win situation today, and it’s a very hard decision to decide what to do because, clearly, I don’t support the bill as it’s being proposed in any of the forms, but I’m going to support the amendment on the grounds that I don’t want to be put in a position where the ends justify the means. And I think the way that the current proposal that’s in front of us in the unamended version, coming out at the eleventh hour without any public input, without any public hearing, on shifting of the tax base is something that I just can’t support. So I support the amendment, although I will – if it does pass – I will be voting against it on the floor.”

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

“For those in the transportation community who know I’ve been a longtime supporter of rail, I probably, on a personal level, would prefer an approach more like the one in the proposed floor amendment, but I don’t believe the House will



pass this floor amendment, and if they don't – if we do and they don't – the bill is dead. Maybe that's not the end of the world; maybe we'll come back into special session; maybe we can deal with it next year. I seriously doubt that we'll be brought into special session because I don't think we have the votes to bring ourselves in and I don't think the governor's going to bring us in for it. I don't know what the consequences are to putting the whole thing off a year, but considering that the rail project has already been delayed 18 months because of lawsuits and refusals on the part of a prior administration to do their administrative duty and sign the EIS, the cost, the additional cost of rail because of those 18 months of delay were extremely high, and I think another year's delay – I mean, I understand it doesn't have to be a year's delay, necessarily. The city may finance it themselves, and they have every right to do that and maybe a responsibility to do it, too, but this should be a collaborative project between the state and the county. We shouldn't have to play chicken with them. If this project fails, people are going to come looking to the Legislature for relief of the problem that it was attempting to solve in the first place, which is traffic congestion on the H-1, which is a state highway. So I think the risks are too high to support this amendment, despite the fact that as a conceptual matter, probably, I would be more inclined to go this direction, but I don't think this floor amendment is the way to get there. Thank you."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"I believe that the rail will be dead if this amendment is not passed because there will be challenges to it, and there is not enough money as it is proposed in the Senate bill as it reads now. Therefore, I am supporting Floor Amendment 3. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the amendment with reservations as follows:

"Mr. President, I have reservations because I have expressed my concerns to the amendment-maker about the accountability and my preference to have it, in the bill, perhaps, allocate funds in phases for cost containment, but having said that, I have always been a supporter of rail. I believe that it is for the next generation. When I was on the city council, I said back then that if we didn't pass it then, we would not be able to afford it, and here we are in the situation that we are having problems with affording it. I'm also concerned that this is not going to be enough money, even 10 years, because there are going to be more cost overruns as we come into downtown and go into Ala Moana, and it's a never-ending money pit. However, saying that, I cannot support the bill in its current form. I cannot support the proposed amendment that is coming forward because I believe that they are flawed.

"You know, the budget chair talked about the transparency of the process and yet, where is the transparency? We have not discussed this in caucus; we have not been part of the process, as it was raised by the senator from Hilo. This measure in the current form as well as the proposed amendment no. 4 violates our conference rules 2a and 2b, and while our rules can be waived by concurrent agreement with the House, the rules are there for a reason. 2a states that, with the exception of the executive budget and the judiciary budget and the budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a conference committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject. 2b states: 'To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.' Those rules are there and agreed to in advance to ensure that we are transparent in our deliberations and that no last-minute proposals are sneaked into a bill that the public did not have an opportunity to testify on.

"In addition to violating our conference rules, this measure also violates our Senate rule no. 23(4); 23(4) states:

If a bill: ... (B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and (C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment; then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

"Raising the TAT to 12 percent was never discussed in committee, nor did it get a public hearing. Raising the TAT to 12 percent or even 1 percent and designating a portion of that to rail was not previously discussed in any drafts and did not get a public hearing. Prohibiting the county from renovating or developing the NBC was not in any bill that I'm aware of, nor did it get a public hearing. Ironically, if you read page 1 of the bill, it states the counties must hold a public hearing before authorizing the half-percent tax. So they have to hold a public hearing but the State Legislature does not when we raise the TAT by 2.75 percent or even 1 percent. The public and those affected by this bill, the general public, the visitor industry, the counties, were not able to testify on the impacts of this measure. As legislators, we don't know the real impacts since we only learned about this measure on Friday afternoon after the conference committee agreed to it in record time. This surprises me, Mr. President, because veteran legislators were on the conference committee, and I know that they all knew that this violated not just our rules, but the fact that all bills must have three readings, allowing the public to testify. The conferees are all familiar with the practice of gut and replace; for those who aren't familiar with this term, it is when a bill is gutted somewhere during the three readings and replaced by new contents. This is a procedure that we have discouraged and have issued memos reminding members that when there is a gut-and-replace, the new contents have to be noticed to the public and given a hearing. That is why when Senate Bill 1183 was amended with four possible rail scenarios, the Transportation chair held a hearing to assure that we did not violate our rules. This bill, in its current form and in the form of Amendment 4, is gut-and-replace on steroids. There are so many poison pills in this bill and in this proposed amendment that I cannot help but wonder whether it was done intentionally to kill the measure or to give the governor no choice but to veto. And it's for those reasons that I am supporting the floor amendment with reservations. Thank you."

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"I think our credibility's on the line, Mr. President. All these people here who come and spend a hundred days with us during the year, who give input, who trust us to be a deliberative democracy, will not be able to continue to trust us to work forward on any number of thousands of issues that we have if, at the end of the session, good or bad policy gets dropped into a bill without a democratic process. Setting aside what you believe the substance of this issue should be, that alone – putting in the other draft, which we did not discuss, did not have input from the people, did not have input from experts, did not have input from analysts, so we don't know what the impact would be on the state – is just unconscionable and unacceptable. I therefore support this draft. We have dealt with GET for rail for many years; we know what the year-over-year impact is; we've had input from **all** of the citizens – some like it; some don't like it, but at least they were able to be a part of democracy. If we don't approve bills that have gone through the process, then we really can't call ourselves a legislature any longer. That's why I'm supporting this amendment."

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Colleagues, Senate Bill 1183 has become the main bill of this session, and it’s important that we look at it from the path of least resistance because the rail has already been subjected to legal challenges. It has been subjected to delays, and these delays have cost our residents hundreds of millions of dollars. And if we look at the measure that includes the TAT, there is a strong possibility, a likelihood, that the opponents of rail are just chomping at the bit, waiting for us to make this decision. If we stick to what we’ve been discussing, the GET – which many of us do support – I think the likelihood of any lawsuit is minimized and eliminated. But to throw this at the *n*th hour – is obviously something you’ve already heard from our colleagues – is not in the best interest of this body; it’s not in the best interest of O’ahu taxpayers; it’s not in the best interest of rail, and I ask you to support this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the amendment with reservations as follows:

“I share a lot of the concerns of the previous speakers. I actually think that, financially and politically, the proposal in the current bill is actually a much better proposal on how to pay for rail, but I **cannot** go along with the lack of due process. I cannot accept having no discussion among our members or among the public, let alone the tourism industry, when we’re establishing a new special fund, a new tax increase, a new constraint on the county. And at least the GET proposal has had Senate discussion and can rightfully be considered a Senate decision. I wish we would have had a chance to have due process on the measure before us. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to request a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 3 was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

One of the consequences of this bill: It will have an intimidating factor on certain protests, and while most of us might not be protesters today, we could think about who our President is – and I’m not talking about you, Mr. President; I’m talking about a national situation – and I think we might all agree that someday, we might want to have the right to protest. I’m a recovering serial trespasser myself, and I want to protect the rights of people who feel the need to go out and express their protest, and I don’t

believe we ought to pass laws that can be used to intimidate such. Thank you very much.”

In its final form, this bill would allow the Department of Transportation to designate specific stretches of road where motorcyclists can overtake cars on the shoulder lane, if and only if the traffic is completely stopped. Motorcyclists have to move at a reduced speed of less than ten miles per hour, and when traffic starts moving again, they have to maneuver their vehicle back into the adjacent lane as soon as it is safe to do so.”

“I want to echo the remarks of the senator from Puna, but I also want to thank the staff from the respective departments, who also did a lot of work to address the concerns that were raised, and appreciate the amendments that they worked out with the chairs.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I have some written remarks, but I just want to add that this is an example of collaboration and I appreciate all the input that we received. I think we have a stronger bill as a result. Mahalo.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s additional remarks read as follows:

Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 554, C.D. 1, relating to orders for treatment over objection. This measure permits the Department of Health to issue an administrative order to overcome a patient’s objection to psychiatric treatment and establishes criteria for the issuance of such an order.

“Many patients in the custody of the state have acute psychiatric symptoms that may put themselves and others in danger. These patients may refuse treatment even though it is necessary for not just their safety but also their health. In these situations, it is imperative that the state be able to act on their behalf.

“Physicians and advanced practice registered nurses are well-equipped to determine whether treatment is necessary, and this measure creates strict guidelines to ensure administrative orders for treatment are not abused. It is solely for the benefit of the patient and those surrounding him or her that orders for treatment would be issued.

“I’d like to thank the many people who have worked hard to address this issue in our State. DOH will work closely with the Department of Public Safety so that they, too, may be able to issue administrative orders in the future. I look forward to hearing DOH’s report to the Legislature before we begin session next year.

“Please join me in supporting H.B. 554, C.D. 1. Mahalo.”

"S.B. 1016 temporarily exempts the Department of Transportation and its contractors from certain statutory requirements for specified bridge rehabilitation projects by extending the sunset date of Act 218, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2012 (Act 218), from June 30, 2017, to June 30, 2022. This is necessary to expedite the design and construction of a number of bridges that are in desperate need of repair to ensure safety and reliable access. The Department of Transportation is still required to comply with all federal laws for each bridge project."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 154 was adopted and S.B. No. 1016, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 156 (S.B. No. 501, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 156 be adopted and S.B. No. 501, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President: I rise in strong support of S.B. 501, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, Relating to Health. This bill will ensure that all women in Hawai'i, regardless of income, have meaningful access to comprehensive reproductive health services.

"Tens of thousands of women in Hawai'i each year have an unintended pregnancy. Pregnancy carries enormous social, legal, and economic costs that disproportionately fall on women, and serve as a barrier to equality of opportunity between the sexes.

“Some limited service pregnancy centers use advertising practices, which conceal that they do not offer access to a full range of reproductive health options. Additionally, we received testimony that some of these centers espouse strong anti-choice opinions. Instead of providing women with all legal options, these centers specifically counsel women against having an abortion.

“Abortion is a legally protected constitutional right of women in this state and country, despite the religious convictions of certain segments of the population. Ours is a very diverse society with a secular government that is prohibited under the constitution from the establishment of any state religion. The role of government is to allow free exercise of protected rights, so long as they do not infringe upon the rights of others.

“This bill simply requires centers who do not offer comprehensive reproductive services to inform women visiting the center where those services are offered. There should be no controversy associated with providing people with the information to make informed choices.

“The genesis of this bill came from several consumer complaints alleging that some limited service pregnancy centers engage in questionable marketing tactics in order to attract women in crisis to their facility and using a free pregnancy test as leverage to subject the women to proselytizing.

“This is not a constitutional question—the question opponents of this bill are truly concerned about has been settled since 1973 when the United States Supreme Court issued their decision in *Roe v. Wade*.

“If you call your doctor in a true emergency, they will instruct you to call 911, because they understand that EMS is best equipped to handle an emergency, and a primary care clinic is not. If we received complaints about a doctor’s office responding to emergencies in place of appropriate EMS, we would pass a law prohibiting that in order to protect the public while they are in crisis. When you remove the ideological components surrounding this issue, it is the same concept. This bill is basic consumer protection for women in crisis.

“Free speech does not extend to those who aim to deceive consumers or endanger the public health. If a limited service pregnancy center’s public face is not intended to deceive, then a posted notice informing the public that there is more comprehensive care available should be welcome additional information. Opponent’s vehemence in opposing this common-sense measure, I think, speaks more eloquently about their intent than I am able to today. Please join me in protecting consumers’ right to accurate information, and pass S.B. 501. S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 156 was adopted and S.B. No. 501, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22; Ayes with Reservations (Kim). Noes, 3 (Gabbard, Harimoto, Riviere).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 (H.B. No. 306, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 be adopted and H.B. No. 306, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“H.B. 306, Relating to Continuous Alcohol Monitoring for Repeat Offenders, will increase the traffic safety by reducing the number of drunk drivers on our roads.

“Specifically, this bill addresses the issue of repeat offenders, which account for 1,000 arrests out of 5,000-6,000 total DUI arrests every year. These are persons who have already been convicted of a DUI in the previous five years, but for whom conventional existing methods of deterrence or treatment are simply not working.

“Currently, our laws allow all repeat DUI offenders to be released from jail, pending trial, with no requirement to stay sober or monitor their drinking. No matter how many prior offenses they’ve had. And for those who are released from jail pending trial, it is typically several months before their trial date, and this can get pushed back for various reasons up to six months or even longer. That is months of knowing that potentially 1,000 people per year are on our roads, probably still drinking and driving like they’ve done repeatedly in the past.

“This bill allows judges to order the repeat offender to refrain from drinking alcohol and impose a Continuous Alcohol Monitoring or ‘CAM’ device for at least 90 days as condition of bail. This device is an ankle bracelet that detects alcohol through the skin and sends this data every half-hour.

“The CAM device is complementary to Ignition Interlock, which is a voluntary device that requires a breathalyzer test in order to start your car. Ignition Interlock is very effective and is mostly installed by first-time offenders (For example, 2016 data indicates that only 13 repeat offenders on O’ahu have applied for Ignition Interlock). This bill requires an annual report to the Legislature on the effectiveness of CAM devices and its impact on Ignition Interlock.

“For those repeat offenders who are indigent, meaning they’re on food stamps or other types of government assistance, the bill specifies that the CAM device vendor will be required to provide financial relief, just as our Ignition Interlock vendor is required to do.

“This bill will not only make our roads safer, but will also give more repeat offenders a real shot at long-term recovery by changing their long-term behavior and allowing us to identify those who remain in need for treatment.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 was adopted and H.B. No. 306, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTINUOUS ALCOHOL MONITORING FOR REPEAT OFFENDERS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Thielen).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 (H.B. No. 735, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 be adopted and H.B. No. 735, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“Current law permits rental car companies to recover certain government fees paid by the companies to make rental vehicles road-ready. However, the prorated formula is calculated over a

period of 365 days, even though the vehicles are only in use 80 percent of the time. Therefore, this bill adjusts this calculation accordingly from 1/365th to 1/292nd. It also includes weight taxes, certain registration taxes, license plate fees, inspection fees, highway beautification fees, and certain use taxes under a new term 'vehicle license recovery fees'. This bill also requires that all rental car companies submit an annual audit to the Office of Consumer Affairs to ensure that they pass on these fees in a fair and transparent manner."

Senator Chang rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Some bills are hard because they have a lot of pros and a lot of cons. Other bills are easy because they have a very clear positive impact but very little negative impact. And yet other bills are no-brainers for the opposite reason, because they are purely negative in impact. There are very few bills that have made it this far in the legislative session in that last category, but I think this is one of them. It would do two things. First, it would greatly expand the number of fees and charges that would be broken out of the base price of a car rental, so that the consumer would be stuck with a much higher bill than they had expected. Car rental companies are already allowed to pass on license and registration fees, weight taxes, surcharge taxes, county surcharges, and DOT concession rents. This bill would add to that list: section 286-41(c) registration fees, license plate and emblem fees, inspection fees, highway beautification fees, and any use tax under chapter 238. So convoluted are the references and sub-references that I'm not even sure that's a full list of the fees that can be passed on, and none of us know how much those fees would add up to. Second, it would increase the daily amount that car rental companies can pass onto the consumers from 1/365 of the yearly amount to 1/292 of the yearly amount.

"Combined, these two actions comprise a pure money grab. We are charged to protect consumers and the public interest. Instead, we are increasing prices on consumers for no other purpose than to boost the bottom line for car rental companies.

"To add insult to injury, this would increase those prices in an opaque manner. While car rental companies advertise low base rates, the actual price per day that consumers pay will be substantially higher. It's deceptive, and it should be prohibited by the FTA. But until then, my no vote on such a deceptive, opaque, and anti-consumer policy is a no-brainer. Thank you, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 was adopted and H.B. No. 735, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE RENTAL INDUSTRY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

**"General Information:**

- Bill History:

- This is part of the Governor's Package.
- House was TRN, FIN; Senate was TRE, WAM.
- WAM amended to specify that funds can only be used for CIPs.
- All other amendments were technical.
- No Senator or Rep ever voted 'no' or 'WR'.

**"Problem:**

- The Project Adjustment Fund already exists, and contains \$17 million appropriated last year. But DOT Airport Division cannot use these moneys to adjust projects, because they need a budget proviso to access these funds. Therefore, some projects where the budget need to be adjusted are in danger of being terminated.

**"Solution:**

- This bill allows the governor to make supplemental allotments to capital investment cost elements. For example, if a project turns out to require 10 percent more money than in the initial bid, this bill allows those projects to move with supplemental moneys from the Project Adjustment Fund, which is what the fund is intended for.

**"Safeguards:**

- These additional allotments 'shall not be used to increase the scope of the project'.
- The governor has to submit a report to the Legislature that includes all the instances where he has used the Project Adjustment Fund.

**"Benefits:**

- According to DOT testimony: 'The traveling public will benefit from the timely completion of projects at airports statewide which will require supplemental funding from the Project Adjustment Fund in order to be implemented.'"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 166 was adopted and H.B. No. 1152, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, AIRPORTS DIVISION, PROJECT ADJUSTMENT FUND," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Thielen). Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 167 (H.B. No. 997, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 167 be adopted and H.B. No. 997, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in opposition to this measure because it exempts the concessions of the airport from procurement."

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

"**This bill addresses the problem that** contracts for concessions at airports cannot be negotiated by DOT Airport Division, but have to be given to the highest bidder, regardless of 1) Quality of food and services, 2) Management experience, and 3) Hours of operation.

"**Thus, this bill exempts** not only wireless connectivity and advertisement contracts at airports from this bidding

requirement, but expands that exemption to all airport concession contracts, and gives DOT the flexibility to negotiate lease extensions.

**“There is precedent for this kind of arrangement.** Most mainland airports award terminal concession agreements through a negotiation process; wireless connectivity and advertisement contracts have already been negotiated successfully without the bidding requirement. And, when DOT was allowed to temporarily negotiate amendments to existing concession contracts (through Act 141 Session Laws of 2014), the negotiations resulted in the concessions paying for \$90 million worth of revenue-enhancing improvements.

**“There are numerous safeguards in place to ensure a fair contracting process.** HRS Section 102-2 of the law was in existence prior to the procurement code. The procurement code, when adopted, did not alter this section of the law. The procurement code did not touch this section of the law because there were ample safeguards already built into the approval process relating to concession-contract awards. These safeguards include that all airport concession agreements must be approved at a Land Board public hearing after public hearing notice before signing. Thus, anyone who feels the concession-award process or agreement is not fair or in the public’s best interest has the right to ask the Land Board to deny approval as requested by the DOT. If so denied, the contract cannot be signed by the DOT. The safeguards also include court appeals to any inappropriate Land Board approvals, not limited to airport concession agreements, such as the current TMT appeal and related court matters.

“This is a good bill supported by the DOT and our Airport Concessions Committee. This bill seeks to ensure a better image and operations of our airport concessions. This change to the law and resulting benefits is long overdue. Hawai’i needs to ensure that our visitors have a positive first and last impression of Hawai’i as they spend time at our public airports.”

On motion by Senator Rhoads, seconded by Senator Thielen and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 183 was adopted and H.B. No. 575, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 189 (H.B. No. 591, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 189 be adopted and H.B. No. 591, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“In 2014, we passed Act 200 to help displaced waterfront tenants from the Kapalama Container Terminal site secure

financing to move and build out. This bill simply clarifies the definition of capital infrastructure costs and corrects language discrepancies in the original bill.

“Some of these displaced tenants are being moved to essentially BARE pieces of state-owned land that REQUIRE FULL INFRASTRUCTURE BUILD-OUT including sewers, electrical, roads, parking, and other site improvements. The displaced tenant can ONLY apply this tax credit on CAPITAL SPENDING – for every \$1 of credit they MUST SPEND \$2 on JOB PRODUCING CAPITAL ASSETS.

“This bill encourages the growth of commerce in the State, supports high-skilled, important maritime jobs, and improves State-owned lands upon which the State will ALSO receive significant lease rents.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 189 was adopted and H.B. No. 591, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE TAX CREDIT,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Taniguchi).

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 193 (H.B. No. 1488, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 193 be adopted and H.B. No. 1488, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 1488, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, Relating To Medical Marijuana. This is an omnibus bill which will ensure an adequate supply of medical marijuana is readily available for patients, streamline the implementation of the dispensary program, and strengthen the State’s regulatory framework for the program. Specifically, it creates an alternative sales tracking method in case of primary system failure, provides commonsense rules relating to laboratory testing of medical marijuana, and allows highly skilled individuals to continue working to implement the dispensary system. To ensure qualified patients and their caregivers have an adequate supply of medication, the bill increases the number of plants a patient or caregiver can cultivate, the number of plants grown at a production center, and the number of retail locations for licensees serving rural areas. The measure also makes it possible for those assisting qualified patients with mobility issues to enter a dispensary and assist the patient in obtaining medication. H.B. 1488 expands the list of treatable conditions to include lupus, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis and rheumatoid arthritis. Additionally, the measure extends the existing caregiver program through 2023, and expands access to laboratory testing of medical marijuana for qualified caregivers and patients who cultivate their own medication. Lastly, required video monitoring of dispensary locations will be retained for 50 days for security purposes. Overall, H.B. 1488 will significantly improve qualified patients’ access to medical marijuana, and assist the dispensary operation, and ensure robust oversight of the program.

“Please join me in supporting this measure which will aid in implementing the dispensary program, and ensure that Hawai’i residents are able to access crucial medication.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 193 was adopted and H.B. No. 1488, H.D. 1, S.D. 1,

C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL MARIJUANA," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 195 (H.B. No. 115, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

"This bill addresses so-called roads in limbo and requires ownership of these roads to be transferred to the county, in a county with population of 500,000 or more. Many of these roads abut or are sandwiched between sections of roads owned by the county, and are either in bad shape or maintained by the city, even though the city does not own them. When these properties were developed and deeded to homeowners, such road fragments should have been deeded to the city, but for reasons that are unclear, these title transfers never happened, so now the ownership of these roads are disputed or 'in limbo'. This bill clarifies ownership of these roads as belonging to the county to ensure that they will be properly maintained and issues of responsibility and liability are clarified."

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"So, the issue of roads in limbo is an age-old one. The ownership of some roads are in dispute between the state and the county, state and private, or county and private. In some cases, the owner is unknown or the owner passed away and there are no records as to who the current owner is. The resulting problem is that many of these roads have fallen into disrepair, are substandard, and perhaps need major work. This bill would require the City and County of Honolulu to accept ownership of all disputed roads on O'ahu. This bill targets only the City and County of Honolulu, although roads in limbo is a problem in all counties. The impact to the City and County of Honolulu is unknown and is likely to cause significant impacts to the city in terms of ongoing maintenance, upgrades, and liability issues. This is an unfunded mandate that may be illegal. A roads-in-limbo report by LRB in 1989 identified 699 such roads; it is likely that the number of disputed roads is much greater today.

"In addition, because this bill broadly defines the term 'disputed roads' as 'a highway, road, alley, street, way, lane, bikeway, bridge, or trail,' the scope and concerns magnify significantly. No one knows how many disputed highways, roads, alleys, streets, ways, lanes, bikeways, bridges, and trails exist. Further, in many cases, a disputed road is really a portion of a road. In many cases, the metes and bounds of such disputed roads must first be determined before ownership can be transferred to the city. If there are no records, it is not clear how the metes and bounds will be determined, and if the current owner is not known, it is unclear how ownership will be transferred to the city.

"Assuming ownership of such roads in limbo brings with it many unknown costs and liabilities, the city administration states that they have no way of assessing such costs and liabilities until all such roads in limbo are identified and conditions determined. To make the required determinations,

the Legislature, through Act 194 last year, established the roads commission. The counties have nominated their respective members and are waiting for the state DOT to call a meeting of the commission. So this bill is clearly premature and will likely result in significant costs to the city. The roads commission should be convened and allowed to do its work as specified in Act 194 before further legislation is enacted."

"As tourism remains a vital industry in Hawai'i, venues such as the Festival of Pacific Arts provides a unique avenue for marketing the diversity we have to offer to the world.

"More importantly, this is an indigenous festival for and by the peoples of the Pacific. We do this for ourselves to celebrate ourselves."

"I stand in strong support of this measure, which funds the creation of the Hawai'i climate change mitigation and adaptation commission. It shall provide policy direction, facilitation, coordination and planning among state and county agencies, federal agencies and other appropriate partners. The establishment of the commission signifies the State's commitment to combating climate change and aligns the State with the principles and contributions achieved with the Paris Agreement. The agreement was adopted by 195 countries on December 12, 2015, and will go into effect in the year 2020. It looks to lessen greenhouse emissions worldwide by addressing greenhouse gas emissions mitigation, adaptation, and finance objectives.

"The effects of climate change are real, as seen primarily with sea level rise in the Pacific. As a State, we must find ways to combat greenhouse emissions, as we grapple with the disastrous effects of climate change in our own environment. The Federal Administration has begun a campaign to diminish the effects of climate change and proclaim its non-existence based upon innuendos and non-scientific fact.

"This measure aims to dispel the Federal Administrations' mission and provide the State with a guide to planning and statewide implementation using the latest scientific analysis and risk assessment to monitor and forecast climate change impacts at the regional, state and local level.

"At its core, the commission shall focus on and develop sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation reports, which is profoundly critical to life in the Pacific."

"One of the most noxious things we're being asked to do today, in my opinion, is to accept the House position to defund the civil legal services budget in this bill. Last year, the Legislature passed H.B. 2121 to fund civil legal services in the amount of \$750,000, and the two prior years before that, the Legislature budgeted \$600,000. Other than during the recession, the state has consistently funded civil legal services, marking 2017 as a striking aberration. Civil legal services funding goes to nonprofit organizations like Legal Aid Society and Volunteer Legal Services of Hawai'i. Their clients are society's most vulnerable. They help homeless people get their Social Security or other benefits that can get them off the streets. They help domestic abuse victims secure custody of their children. They help veterans avoid foreclosure or eviction from their homes. These are the people on whose backs we're going to balance the budget? Amazing.

"You know who else thinks that's a good idea? Donald Trump. He proposed to zero out funding for the Legal Services Corporation, the federal equivalent. When civil legal services are already facing the potential loss of federal funding, state level support becomes even more important. And instead of stepping up to protect our neediest constituents, we're leaving them in an even deeper hole. I just wish there was something we could do today. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"My reservations are the same as those expressed by the prior senator from Hawai'i Kai, and it's perplexing to me – the House position on this – because there are so many alumni of the civil legal services that are in that chamber. They should know better; we should know better, and it's been hard to support some of the fiscal bills that we do have on our agenda, thinking that those monies could be far better served and utilized with the civil legal services contracts that we have funded in this state. It is going to be a devastating hit for many of our people. We also are going to be facing federal restrictions as well, and that's going to impact a lot of lives here very

negatively. So, for those reasons, I have reservations about this bill."

"Homelessness is a serious concern, so I appreciate all the attention this matter is given by this body. After decades of inaction and finger-pointing, the state, counties, private providers, and faith organizations are finally working together and coordinating efforts and resources. The federal government, through the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, has for years determined a set of best practices, and the combined experiences of many cities across the country have confirmed these are indeed best practices. Cities across the country are having much success with solutions such as Housing First and supportive housing.

"Safe zones are not among these recognized best practices. To the contrary, experience has shown that safe zones do not work. We should not spend our limited resources on a perceived quick fix that has proven not to be best practice. Indeed, the

goal of safe zones is to quickly get homeless persons out of sight and thus solve the problem. It is very likely that this quick fix will create a myriad of other problems, and we will end up spending more resources to manage and resolve these issues. This will divert limited resources from true solutions to homelessness, best-practice solutions, to addressing problems created by safe zones. Directing the Hawaii Interagency Council on Homelessness to develop recommendations to establish safe zones, as this bill does, is good-intentioned but perhaps misguided. We should learn from others and follow national best practices. Thank you.”

Senator Green rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I really appreciate the comments from the good senator from Pearl City, who I almost always agree with. In this case, I disagree with him. I don’t think safe zones are the answer. In fact, I, of course, support Housing First wholeheartedly and as the best solution, but I do think that, when you dig down deep into the issue for chronic homelessness, you find that those who are suffering the greatest end up utilizing an incredible share of our state’s resources, and applying a very modest safe zone model – if the working group does determine that it can be done efficiently – would probably save us a lot of resources. This is just my feeling, but I look forward to the working group finding, and I would agree we shouldn’t invest significant resources until we know that it can help us. Thank you.”

Senator Espero rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, if you think of what is a safe zone, a safe zone is a place where homeless people can go where they’re not going to be hassled, where they feel secure, and where they feel safe. One can argue that IHS is a safe zone. One can argue that the Next Step Shelter in Kaka’ako is a safe zone. If you look at this bill, it says ‘recommendations of potential sites to be designated as safe zones ... the type of facilities or dwelling units permitted within a safe zone,’ so it could have a structure. It could have a building; it could have tents or other facilities.

“If we don’t do this, we’re just going to continue to have the homeless in Capitol grounds, by our veteran memorial, sidewalks, parks, along the canal – in other words, the status quo for the last 30 or 40 years from when I go back working for Mayor Frank Fasi. This is an issue that should be considered because what we are doing now is not enough and we need to look at every option and, again, a safe zone is not necessarily a tent in a park. It’s about a place where the homeless can go where they won’t be bothered, where they won’t be hassled, and where they can get the services. If we attach services to a safe zone, it works. If we attach funding to a safe zone, it works. If we get the churches and nonprofits involved in a safe zone, it will work. Thank you.”

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 607, C.D. 1, Relating to Kupuna Care. This measure allows the Executive Office on Aging to establish the Kupuna Caregivers Program, which will assist family members caring for elders to remain in the workforce by providing additional, needed services to the elderly. The Kupuna Caucus and others have worked diligently to create the framework for this important program. I especially would like to thank Dr. Lawrence Nitz, Economics and Political Science Professor at UH Mānoa for all his help in perfecting this concept for many years. Kupuna Caregivers works hand in hand with Kupuna Care, a well-established program of supports for kūpuna in our community.

“Caring for elderly family members can place an enormous strain on caregivers – taking time, money, and resources that may already be in limited supply. Caregivers may be faced with a choice between leaving their job to provide necessary care or staying in the workforce but taking sick leave, vacation time and essentially burning the candle at both ends to be available to help a frail loved one. Long-term care facilities are costly and not always the best option for aging members of the community, who want age in place at home.

“The Kupuna Caregiver Program would provide families up to \$70 a day for qualified Kupuna Care support services, such as adult day care, assisted transportation, chore services, home-delivered meals, and personal care. These funds would allow caregivers who would otherwise need to leave the workplace to care for an elderly loved one to stay in the workplace while their loved one receives help from senior serving agency personnel.

“This program will help not just our kūpuna, but also their caregivers, giving them much-needed support and assistance and reducing some of the stress of caring for elderly family members. Allowing the elderly to receive care outside of a long-term care facility will give them greater autonomy and a better quality of life in their preferred setting. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129 was adopted and H.B. No. 607, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"I support this measure because it's attempting to address some of the issues with homelessness, especially in the visitor areas. I appreciate that it encourages a match from the tourism industry, the hoteliers. What I would like to point out and make people cognizant of is that it does not have any direction for them, so I'm a little curious as to how the money is to be used. And also, I would hope that the hoteliers and whoever is using this money will adequately account for it and report back to us next year to see how successfully the money has been invested. Thank you."

having met, and after full and free discussion, has agreed to recommend and does recommend to the respective Houses the final passage of this bill in an amended form.

**PART I. OVERVIEW**

Your Committee on Conference has approved a Conference Draft of the executive budget that reduces the operating budget request submitted by the Administration. The Conference Draft appropriates \$408,279,449 in all funds, inclusive of \$211,883,004 in general funds, for fiscal year 2017-2018 and appropriates an additional \$606,570,295 in all funds, inclusive of \$385,025,333 in general funds, for fiscal year 2018-2019.

- (10) Adding 4.00 permanent positions and \$1,755,525 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$3,711,835 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in

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general funds for statewide student transportation services; and

- (11) Adding \$1,500,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for utilities.

*Hawaii State Public Library System*

The Administration's request was to add \$1,295,169 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and add \$1,480,317 in general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Hawaii State Libraries' appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$1,664,613 in general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$1,215,205 in general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding 3.00 permanent positions and \$50,592 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$101,184 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for Nanakuli Public Library; and
- (2) Adding \$500,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for the repair and maintenance backlog for public libraries statewide.

*Charter Schools*

The Administration's request was to add \$11,336,693 in general funds and \$303,150 in federal funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and add \$11,419,807 in general funds and \$303,150 in federal funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Charter Schools' appropriation as follows:

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(1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$10,813,540 in general funds and \$303,150 in federal funds; and

(2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$11,684,877 in general funds and \$303,150 in federal funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustment:

(1) Adding \$9,797,069 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$10,668,406 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for per pupil adjustment.

Early Learning Program

The Administration's request was to add \$89,486 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and add \$118,070 in general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Early Learning Program's appropriation as follows:

(1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$230,414 in general funds; and

(2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$679,152 in general funds.


The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

(1) Adding 2.00 permanent positions and \$53,733 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$82,317 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for the Executive Office on Early Learning; and

(2) Adding \$136,688 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and 10.00 permanent positions and \$556,842 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for the Pre-Kindergarten and Induction Program.

Governor

The Administration's request was to add \$184,035 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$184,035 in general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

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The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Office of the Governor's appropriation as follows:

(1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by reducing \$354,070 in general funds; and

(2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by reducing \$354,070 in general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustment:

(1) Adding \$117,167 in general funds for each fiscal year for membership fees for national and regional chief executive organizations.

Hawaiian Home Lands

The Administration's request was to add \$1,195,390 in general funds and reduce \$31,484,159 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and to add \$1,195,390 in general funds and reduce \$31,484,159 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands' appropriation as follows:

(1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$1,195,390 in general funds and reducing \$5,743,625 in non-general funds; and


(2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$1,195,390 in general funds and reducing \$5,743,625 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustment:

(1) Adding \$6,865,887 in general funds for each fiscal year for fringe benefit funding for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands' general funded positions.

Health

The Administration's request was to add \$22,123,885 in general funds and \$52,363,112 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018

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and \$25,041,849 in general funds and \$8,296,893 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Health's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$21,608,232 in general funds and \$52,473,444 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$15,442,557 in general funds and \$8,407,225 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$1,300,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$500,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for outreach and counseling services for homeless individuals and families with serious and persistent mental health challenges or severe substance abuse disorders;
- (2) Adding \$300,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for clean and sober housing for chronically homeless individuals with severe substance use disorders;
- (3) Adding \$1,340,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$1,613,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for purchase of service contracts for Child and Adolescent Mental Health;
- (4) Adding \$2,754,980 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$7,118,914 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for rebased provider payment rates;
- (5) Adding \$3,000,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for maintenance of effort for the maternal infant early childhood home visiting grant;

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$28,681,003 in general funds and \$23,459,087 in special funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by reducing \$9,938,997 in general funds and adding \$23,459,087 in special funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$36,486,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$34,686,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for operations subsidy;
- (2) Adding \$3,000,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for Hawaii Health Systems Corporation - Regions or Maui Health System, a Kaiser Foundation Hospitals LLC; and
- (3) Adding \$33,420,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for operations subsidy.

Human Resources Development

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The Administration's request was to add \$2,052,292 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$2,302,292 in general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Human Resources Development's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$2,052,292 in general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$2,201,212 in general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustment:

- (1) Adding \$3,274,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$3,524,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for workers' compensation claims.

Human Services

The Administration's request was to add \$25,596,723 in general funds and \$157,393,373 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$66,440,270 in general funds and \$276,330,208 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Human Services' appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$7,122,833 in general funds and \$147,622,055 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$28,361,291 in general funds and \$253,920,541 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$3,000,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for the Housing First Program;
- (2) Adding \$1,500,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for homeless outreach services;

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- (3) Adding \$250,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for legal services for homeless persons;
- (4) Adding \$2,100,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Hawaii Public Housing Authority state family and elderly housing facilities;
- (5) Adding \$1,553,559 in general funds and \$2,309,090 in federal funds for each fiscal year for the nursing facility inflation factor; and
- (6) Adding \$240,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for juvenile justice and delinquency prevention.

Labor and Industrial Relations

The Administration's request was to reduce \$2,753,210 in general funds and \$19,987 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and to reduce \$376,494 in general funds and to add \$45,604 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations' appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$105,985 in general funds and reducing \$19,987 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$765,821 in general funds and \$45,604 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$750,000 in general funds for each fiscal year to support workforce advisory councils;
- (2) Adding \$450,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for transition to the federal Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act; and
- (3) Adding 1.00 permanent position and \$515,386 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$2,810,772 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for Disability Compensation Division Modernization.

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Land and Natural Resources

The Administration's request was to add \$21,234,212 in general funds and \$16,036,430 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$20,766,112 in general funds and \$1,891,237 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Land and Natural Resources' appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$22,827,227 in general funds and \$12,279,060 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$21,505,253 in general funds and \$362,117 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$14,049,108 in general funds for each fiscal year for various programs' base budgets per funding in Act 84, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015;
- (2) Adding 15.00 temporary positions and \$1,065,147 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$1,097,047 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in general funds for personnel and operating funds for management and restoration of Kahoolawe Island Reserve;
- (3) Adding \$4,000,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for the Hawaii Invasive Species Council; and
- (4) Adding \$400,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for the fire protection program.

Public Safety

The Administration's request was to add \$7,265,245 in general funds and \$1,292,671 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$4,201,373 in general funds and \$1,292,671 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Public Safety's appropriation as follows:

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- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$6,592,410 in general funds and \$1,292,671 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$1,518,800 in general funds and \$1,292,671 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$3,334,801 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for housing inmates in non-state facility during renovation of Halawa Correctional Facility;
- (2) Adding \$165,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Malpractice Insurance; and
- (3) Adding \$1,500,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for lease rent for Department of Public Safety Administration building and moving costs.

Taxation

The Administration's request was to add \$648,279 in general funds and \$3,572 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$523,279 in general funds and \$3,572 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Taxation's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by reducing \$393,819 in general funds and adding \$3,572 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by reducing \$518,819 in general funds and adding \$3,572 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustment:

- (1) Adding \$93,860 in general funds for each fiscal year for security for medical marijuana tax collections.

Transportation

The Administration's request was to reduce \$500,000 in general funds and \$43,904,674 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018

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and reduce \$500,000 in general funds and add \$28,461,212 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the Department of Transportation's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$500,000 in general funds and \$37,264,241 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by reducing \$1,500,000 in general funds and adding \$25,794,742 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding 7.00 permanent positions and \$157,939 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$303,878 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for Airside Operations Section Security Unit Pass and Identification Office;
- (2) Adding 13.00 permanent positions and \$684,787 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$1,369,574 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting Unit;
- (3) Adding 6.00 permanent positions and \$162,752 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$293,004 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for the Federal Inspection Station;
- (4) Adding 2.00 permanent positions and \$97,161 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$194,322 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for the Office of Environmental Compliance;
- (5) Adding 2.00 permanent positions and \$101,809 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$203,618 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for the H-3 Tunnel Management Center;
- (6) Adding 10.00 permanent positions and \$679,152 in special funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$1,243,998 in special funds and \$216,000 in federal funds for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the Intelligent Technology Systems Branch;
- (7) Adding \$800,000 in special funds for fiscal year 2018-2019 for trash reduction plan implementation; and
- (8) Adding \$3,514,950 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$1,242,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 in special funds for information technology projects.

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University of Hawaii


The Administration's request was to add \$42,558,733 in general funds and \$5,540,939 in non-general funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 and fiscal year 2018-2019.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget adjusts the University of Hawaii's appropriation as follows:

- (1) For fiscal year 2017-2018, by adding \$42,176,529 in general funds and \$5,540,939 in non-general funds; and
- (2) For fiscal year 2018-2019, by adding \$42,131,529 in general funds and \$5,540,939 in non-general funds.

The Conference Draft of the executive budget includes the following major adjustments:

- (1) Adding \$350,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for concussion testing and awareness;
- (2) Adding \$1,829,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for the Hawaii Promise Program;
- (3) Adding \$250,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Title IX positions;
- (4) Adding 2.00 permanent positions and \$150,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Title IX compliance for the University of Hawaii, Hilo;
- (5) Adding 4.00 permanent positions and \$820,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Title IX compliance for the University of Hawaii Community Colleges;
- (6) Adding 1.00 permanent position and \$70,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for Title IX compliance for the University of Hawaii, West Oahu; and
- (7) Adding 2.00 permanent positions and \$375,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for University of Hawaii systemwide Title IX legal support.

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**PART III. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS BUDGET**

Your Committee on Conference finds that capital improvement projects are essential to our economy and play a pivotal role in building social infrastructure and helping strengthen communities.

Your Committee on Conference has provided a total of \$1,027,951,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$49,445,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 for projects funded by general obligation bonds and \$1,907,509,000 in fiscal biennium 2017-2019 for projects funded by all other means of financing. In comparison, the Administration's proposed capital improvement projects' biennium budget, as amended pursuant to Governor's Messages, provided a total of \$1,375,734,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$151,676,000 for fiscal year 2018-2019 for projects funded by general obligation bonds and \$1,748,338,000 in fiscal biennium 2017-2019 for projects funded by all other means of financing.

Highlights of the capital improvements projects' budget for the biennium include:

- (1) \$23,800,000 in general obligation bond funds for the Department of Agriculture for fiscal year 2017-2018 to purchase over 600 acres of agricultural land to lease to local farmers, and an additional \$12,200,000 in upgrades and improvements to critical water infrastructure systems and agricultural facilities statewide;
- (2) \$10,000,000 in general obligation bond funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 for the Department of Accounting and General Services for an environmental impact study and master plan for a new stadium, adding \$15,000,000 in general obligation bond funds in fiscal year 2017-2018 for lump sum maintenance of existing facilities, along with an additional \$1,200,000 in general obligation bond funds in fiscal year 2017-2018 to begin the rehabilitation of the chambers level waterproofing system at the State Capitol Building;
- (3) A rental housing revolving fund capital infusion of \$25,000,000 in general obligation bond funds and a dwelling unit revolving fund capital infusion of \$25,000,000 in general obligation bond funds for fiscal year 2017-2018 to expand affordable housing statewide;

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- (4) \$155,900,000 for lump sum condition, equity, and program support for Department of Education schools, and an additional \$332,209,000 in general obligation bond funds in various other Department of Education capital improvement projects for a total of \$488,109,000 in the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium;
- (5) Lump sum repair, maintenance, and new housing units statewide for the Department of Public Safety totaling \$78,710,000 in general obligation bond funds for the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium;
- (6) Support for repair, maintenance, and renovations at the University of Hawaii campuses statewide, including \$20,000,000 in general obligation bond funds for community colleges and \$83,250,000 in general obligation bond funds for University of Hawaii, systemwide support in fiscal year 2017-2018; and
- (7) Encouragement of the future chefs and culinary industry of Hawaii with an infusion of \$20,000,000 in general obligation bond funds, and a \$10,000,000 match in private funds for phase II of the Kapiolani Community College Culinary Institute of the Pacific.

Your Committee on Conference recognizes the great need in the State for services provided by non-governmental groups and nonprofit agencies and has thus provided \$19,975,000 in general obligation bond funds in fiscal year 2017-2018 to help aid these organizations in better serving the community.

Finally, your Committee on Conference provided funding for various projects within the Department of Defense, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, Department of Health, Department of Human Services, Department of Land and Natural Resources, and Department of Transportation, among others, to ensure that contributions of matching federal, private, and other funds may be maximized and not lost or forfeited.

As affirmed by the record of votes of the managers of your Committee on Conference that is attached to this report, your Committee on Conference is in accord with the intent and purpose of H.B. No. 100, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, as amended herein, and recommends that it pass Final Reading in the form attached hereto as H.B. No. 100, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1.


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

## SIXTIETH DAY

Thursday, May 4, 2017

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2017, convened at 12:04 p.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Nishihara recognized the following members of his office staff, who were present in the gallery: Priscilla Kubota, office manager; Alec Ikeda, committee clerk; and Jaren McCartney, legislative aide

Senator Nishihara also acknowledged Kat Brady and her husband, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Espero thanked the following members of his office staff, who were in the gallery, for doing an excellent job: session staff Carolyn Weygan-Hildebrand and Ann Oshita, and permanent staff Marlene Uesugi and Ryan Toyomura.

Senator Gabbard thanked all his staff and acknowledged Kendall Andrews, a student intern from Hawai'i Pacific University, who was present in the gallery with his parents, Steve and Becky Andrews, who were visiting from Utah. Kendall Andrews was then presented with a congratulatory Senate certificate in the gallery, with Senator Gabbard's thanks and best wishes for continued success.

Senator Rhoads introduced Leilani Carreo, a student of journalism at the University of Hawai'i, who had been working in the governor's office for the past few months. Accompanying Ms. Carreo in the gallery was Cindy McMillan, Senator Rhoads's wife and favorite constituent.

At this time, Senator Kim rose on a point of personal privilege to thank members of her staff for their support and help during the legislative session: office manager Lisa Vargas Omo; committee clerk Nancy Bernal; and session hires Gregg Hirata and Colleen Takenouchi.

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Members, I'd like to insert into the Journal a number of documents concerning rat lungworm and the distribution of the disease throughout Hawai'i – one is a chart that shows where the disease is on each island, and it shows the presence of it from Kaua'i, O'ahu, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, Maui, and Hawai'i Island; and some other documents with background information. I'd also like to say that this has been a rather contentious issue, but I hope we can get beyond the political debate on it and get down to taking care of how we're going to deal with the disease because it's rampant in many of our districts, and for those of you who have not dealt with it in your district, it's coming soon because it's spreading very, very quickly. We've given a lot of resources to the Department of Health, which I think is the appropriate agency, but we also have to give them the guidance to do this properly, which we'll be doing.

"I can tell you that, in my district, we have moved very quickly without waiting for outside help because in Hāna and east Maui, in the early 2000s, we dealt with an outbreak of dengue, and our response was a very quick response and we were able to eradicate it. With this particular disease, because of the vectors, this new introduced semi-slug, it's a very, very quick-moving vector and it distributes this disease very, very quickly. We're having to take really drastic action. I'm willing to share this with all of you because if this comes up in your districts, then you'll be able to have a quick response and work in partnership with all of the agencies to deal with this disease. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair having so ordered, the documents are identified as "ATTACHMENT A" to the Journal of this day.

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. Because, in the discussion that we had earlier on recommitting Senate Bill 1183, the potential of a special session was raised, I feel compelled to rise to make some comments on the rail project. Five years ago, when I was running for office, there was a candidate for mayor running at the same time who promised over and over again at many of the campaign events we both attended to build rail on time and on budget. At that time, the estimated cost for rail was \$5 billion. Two years ago, that same person came to the Legislature to ask for an extension of the rail tax, received a five-year extension from this body, and said that they wouldn’t be back. Now, we have the same person in front of the Legislature asking for yet another extension, and we’re being told that even a 10-year extension will not pay for rail. The estimated cost now is \$10 billion, and that’s before we’ve put out the contracts for the most expensive portion of the rail construction through the urban core. We’re being told by the mayor that we need to build rail; we need to finish it. I want to point out, originally, the project was to UH. We’re being told now that ‘finishing’ is to Ala Moana.

“But while the mayor is the poster boy for finishing rail at all costs, I really want to direct my remarks today to all the civic leaders who are saying the same thing, that we must finish rail at any cost. I want to point out that we’re not talking about a \$10 billion project now; we’re talking about a project that is going to forego the opportunity to address the infrastructure needs that we have in Honolulu and across our state. If we could contain the rail costs, we could also build the affordable housing and workforce housing that’s needed along the rail line that we were promised as part and parcel with the rail project. But as everybody in this room knows, the water and infrastructure lines surrounding those properties are insufficient to be able to build additional housing along the rail. How are we going to build a \$10 billion-plus rail project **and** fix those water and sewer lines to build the workforce housing? If we were going to spend a hundred million dollars on revising the rail project and we were able to save a billion dollars, we would come out \$900 million ahead. What could we do with \$900 million in this state? We could fix those water and sewer infrastructure lines. We could fix the Banyan Drive infrastructure so that we could revitalize the hotels there, and we could direct tourists to an economy on the Big Island that needs it and give some relief to the communities on O’ahu that are suffering from too much. We could put photovoltaics on the rooftops of all of our schools, air-condition every single classroom, and not have to pay the utility bills, which would free up a lot of our operating budgets at the state level. We could build shelters with mental health and social services for the chronic homeless to get them into a safer living situation and out of our beach parks, and also revitalize those parks and the infrastructure there for our residents and our visitor communities. If we continue to build rail **at any cost**, what we’re being asked to do is to build rail at the opportunity of doing all those other things.

“The federal government, FTA, in one of their e-mails a while ago, made the comment that the city never has time to do it right, but they always have time to do it over. Many people are frustrated that the Legislature didn’t extend the tax and continue the rail project this session. What I want to say is that we’ve given everybody a gift: We’ve given the city a gift of time to do it right. This is not anti-trade. There are so many jobs and so many projects that we could be doing in addition to rail, but the mismanagement of this project, the lack of fiscal responsibility – we’re at the point now where not only has it jeopardized the city where the city can no longer be independently operated without having to rely on state tax revenues, we are now getting to the point where it’s

jeopardizing the state as well. And the civic leaders who have been standing behind the city and saying, ‘Build this at any cost’ bear a share of responsibility because if they spent one-tenth of the amount of energy asking the city to be fiscally responsible, we would not be in this position. So I’m asking everybody, in this hiatus that we have right now, to go back and revisit the project. Don’t be penny wise and pound foolish. Spending a hundred million dollars to save \$900 million, \$2 billion, is what we need now. Who looks at a project that is double to triple the size of the original budget and says, ‘We cannot change a thing’? If you take that attitude, you are foregoing the ability to build workforce housing so Hawai’i residents can stay in urban Honolulu and not have to go to the mainland. We’re foregoing the opportunity to address the homeless problem, to address classrooms that are crumbling and don’t have the electrical and wiring infrastructure to deal with modern curriculum needs. We need to re-look at this project, so please take advantage of this break and do not just come back to the Legislature to ask us to extend the tax without having some type of responsibility over the project. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose on a point of personal privilege to introduce members of the masons union, operating engineers, and other labor groups, who were present in the gallery and were wearing pink and orange shirts, and thanked them for all they do for Hawai’i nei and for their rare and unusual appearance in the gallery.

Senator Kidani rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“You know, I just felt a need to say something about Senate Bill 1183 and the rail project. I’d like to remind this body that when H-3 was built, it took over 30 years, and those on the west side and Central O’ahu, where I represent, didn’t complain that our state dollars had to help those on the windward side. And there are three holes in the mountain: Pali, Likelike, H-3. But yet, in the last 50 years, development of homes, et cetera, have been all on the West and Central O’ahu side. The infrastructure has not kept up, and it takes us so long to get into town. And I would just remind this body that what’s fair is fair, and all of us deserve to pay for infrastructure that everyone will use and, even if they don’t use it, we have paid infrastructure for something they have used. So thank you very much.”

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Mr. President, I have to say some comments about 1183 but, more to the point of what was said in the newspapers, what is being said by the editorial, to be blaming the state for the fact that the city may have to use property taxes, that because we didn’t come to some kind of agreement we are the ones to be blamed: Let me remind everyone that this is a city project; we were not part of the discussion when it was brought up. It was told that it was going to be on time and on budget. The public were fooled! If the public knew at that time that they would need their property taxes in order to pay for rail or they’d need to have their GET raised in order to pay for rail, I don’t know that the public would have voted the way they did to support rail. And don’t mistake it: I have supported rail from when I was on the city council, and I said then that if we didn’t build it then, with 90-10 monies from the feds, we would not be able to afford this project in the future, which is where we’re at. So let’s just get it on the record – you know, we are not the ones that are causing the city to raise the property taxes. They should have known these things were going to happen. They shouldn’t have fooled the public into thinking that any city project would have come in on budget and on time. Thank you.”



At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

“Members, at this time we will be taking a short recess to inform the House that the Senate is ready to adjourn sine die.”

At 12:32 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:41 p.m.

Senator Tokuda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I know that there are a number of changes that are probably afoot in the weeks to come, and I am sure there are a number of things that people expect me to say, reflecting how I’ve been feeling these last few days, even weeks and months. Some may even cringe a little as I get up to speak; there might be an awkward silence that comes across the Senate Chamber as well. So I once again sought the wisdom from my good old friend, Dr. Seuss, as I contemplated my thoughts for today, and he said, ‘If things start happening, don’t worry. Don’t stew. Just go right along, and you’ll start happening, too.’ And so I’d like to take this moment to say thank you to all of you for giving me the opportunity to serve as your Ways and Means chair for the past three years. While it has by no means been easy, I stew not on that, but instead the good things that we were able to make happen across our entire state, in all of our communities. Thank you for giving me the chance to work with you, sitting side by side, talking with community groups in your districts, visiting schools and places that were important to you and your constituents. I do believe we have made a significant difference in people’s lives and impacted greatly the way programs and services are delivered statewide, despite limited resources, and I am very grateful for the opportunity to have played even a small role in all of it.

“I especially want to thank my two Ways and Means vice chairs – you, Senate President, were once in that seat as well. It is not easy making these decisions, and having someone by your side that you can trust is especially important. Thank you to both of you for being there for me and the team to help get us through the CIP portions of the budget and for sitting by me during some very tough votes. Having someone by your side means a lot when you’re faced with difficult decisions and limited to no answers. I appreciate you both for being there for me. It has been most humbling and such a pleasure working with our executive departments and engaging members of the public these past few years as we’ve tackled some of Hawai‘i’s gnarliest issues. Thank you for being there to provide input, for disagreeing with me, for challenging me, for making me a better chair, for helping all of us make better decisions. Mahalo.

“Dan Boylan once called us ‘Da Sistahs,’ and Chair Luke has truly become like one to me through all of this. Some have frowned on how well we work together; I have always viewed working well with my House counterpart as an asset, not a liability. That’s how we should all do the work of the people – focused on the common good. My most heartfelt thanks to her and her team – to Vice Chair Cullen and her committee. It has been such an honor and a pleasure working with them.

“To my office team: Darlene, Nic, Kate, and Vaughn – there are just no words that I can express. You are a member of my family; I could not have gotten through any of this, all the highs and the lows, without you. I have so much I could tell you, but I’d probably start to cry, so I’m just not going to say any of them, but you know exactly what you mean to me, and I appreciate every minute that you’re part of my life.

“To my Ways and Means team: In all honesty, the hardest part of this whole reorg was that I’d have to part ways with all of you. The late nights; the stress; the begging for money; people complaining, asking for all of this – I can totally get rid

of all of that, trust me, and I pass it on to whoever comes next. But my WAMily – the Ways and Means team, the session staff you grow to love each year and can’t figure out how to part with – that’s the hardest part. So I’m just going to stop because I’m totally pulling a Susie right now; sorry, I didn’t mean that.

“But, you know, as a Star Wars mama, I think only of what Shmi Skywalker told a very scared little Anakin about to face a brave new world full of opportunities: ‘You can’t stop change any more than you can stop the suns from setting.’ While my time as WAM chair has clearly ended and this sun has set, I am really excited about the opportunities on my horizon and where my sun will rise next. This isn’t the end; it’s clearly just the beginning. Thank you for allowing me this opportunity, and I stand ready to serve you, my colleagues and the Senate, in any way I may be helpful going forward. And ‘May the Fourth’ be with you. Thank you.”

Senate President Kouchi then presented his closing remarks as follows:

“In closing, I, too, want to convey to all of our permanent staff, the session employees – who I had a chance to address yesterday – all of our full-time employees, our gratitude for the hard work that you’ve put in, from the wonderful ladies who are cleaning the restrooms and cleaning our offices with such a cheery disposition, making my day when they come in in the afternoon when I’m tired and down and they’re so upbeat. And as a team, every single piece has to work together in unison or we will not succeed. And in this building, there are no secrets, and so that staff has been performing under very trying and tense conditions, and you define greatness by how you respond in times of adversity, and I can tell you you are a truly great staff, support staff, for the professional way that you’ve served each and every one of the 25 members during this legislative session.

“I closed on such a happy note last year, telling the Clerk what a thrill it was to hear her say, ‘Twenty-five present’ at the end of her roll call, as we had lost our beloved colleague Gil Kahele right at the very start, health problems with Senators Harimoto and Slom, deaths in the family for so many of us with our direct members’ parents and siblings. But I come here and say this has been a difficult session. I appreciate all of you working as professionally as you can to get us to the finish.”

#### ADJOURNMENT

Senator Espero moved that the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2017, adjourn Sine Die, seconded by Senator English and carried.

At 12:50 p.m., the President rapped his gavel and declared the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2017, adjourned Sine Die.

CAUTION AND PREVENTION OF RAT LUNGWORM DISEASE



Wash vegetables and fruits thoroughly. The small slugs can remain undetected in the tight folds of leaf growth at base of plant stalks.

Cooking and steaming is the safest practice.



Please teach your children these healthy practices and share this information with your friends and neighbors.

**SYMPTOMS**

Rat lungworm can cause a disease affecting the brain and spinal cord. Symptoms may include severe headache, stiffness of the neck and back, skin tingling, pain and sensitivity to light, hallucinations, nausea, vomiting, and sometimes coma and death. The symptoms vary from person and person.

**TREATMENT**

There is no specific treatment for the disease. However, the parasites cannot age or reproduce in humans and will eventually die. Treatment and pain medication can be given to relieve the symptoms.

**DETECTION**

The State laboratories division can detect rat lungworm disease through a DNA or blood test. More commonly, diagnosis is based on a patient's exposure history such as travel to infected areas or ingesting raw or undercooked snails or slugs.

**TAKE ACTION NOW**

Prevention and control of the disease is important to avoid the disease from spreading.

- Control the rodent population by using appropriate traps.
- Avoid eating raw or undercooked snails or slugs, which may be in vegetables or on fruits.
- Use gloves to thoroughly wash and inspect fresh produce and vegetables, especially if eaten raw.
- Eliminate snails and slugs near houses and in the garden. Do not handle slugs/snails! Use tongs or chopsticks to dispose.
- Dispose of snails and slugs by burying deep in the ground to avoid rodent, animal or human contact.

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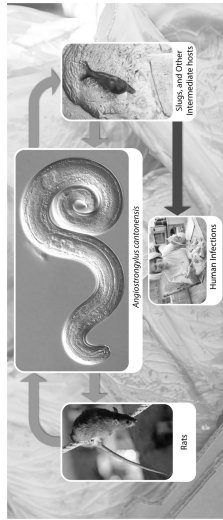

RAT LUNGWORM DISEASE  
COMMUNITY ACTION ALERT

Rat lungworm disease has been found in our district. Therefore, we must take immediate action to control and eliminate the spread of the disease.

In March, the State Health Department confirmed a case of rat lungworm disease on Maui and is investigating four more cases. Rat lungworm is caused by a round worm parasite. The adult parasite is only found in rats. The infected rats can pass the larvae in their droppings. Snails and slugs become infected by eating the larvae. People can get the disease by eating raw produce with tiny snails or slugs that have eaten the lungworms. We might also get the disease from eating undercooked freshwater prawns/frogs that have become infected from water contacting infected slugs and snails.

The State Department of Health, State laboratories division can diagnose rat lungworm disease through a test of cerebral spinal fluid (lumbar puncture), though initially blood abnormalities increase our suspicion. Most importantly suspicion is based on a patient's exposure history, such as travel to infected areas, eating raw or undercooked snails or slugs, and their consumption and preparation of raw fruits/vegetables. There is no specific treatment for the disease. However, the parasites cannot age or reproduce in humans and will eventually die. Supportive and pain medication can be given to relieve the symptoms.

Until March, most of the cases occurred on Hawai'i Island. Tricia Mynar was diagnosed with the disease after feeling her first symptoms on Feb. 24. She is a preschool teacher for Kamehameha Schools on Maui and had been temporarily assigned to work on Hawai'i Island, where the disease is prevalent. At first, Mynar had flu like symptoms, soon she was experiencing severe back pain. Her doctor gave her a blood test and the results showed that she had rat lungworm disease. The results in other patients exposed on Maui (Hana) confirm rat lungworm disease is here.

Therefore, our communities need to take immediate action through prevention and control of the disease. First, the community must control the rodent population by using appropriate traps. Secondly, DO NOT eat raw or undercooked snails or slugs, which maybe in vegetables or on fruits. Thoroughly wash and inspect fresh produce and vegetables, especially if eaten raw. Finally, eliminate snails and slugs near houses and in the garden. If you have suspicious symptoms see your physician.

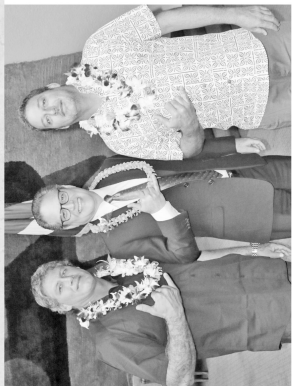

**PALAPALA HO'OMAU CHURCH  
HO'OLAULE'A IN KIPAHULU**

Sen. vegetables, (165° or freeze for 24 - 48 hours.  
Adopting these practices, daily will become second nature in a short time and will reduce the risk of interaction and exposure to the parasite.

**Be alert to symptoms**

Hypersensitivity to skin, headache, pruritus (a burning or prickling sensation that is usually felt in the hands, arms, legs, or feet, but can also occur in other parts of the body), pain that moves from one area of the body to another - neck and shoulder, leg next day back to head. The vague initial symptoms mimic other diseases, like leptospirosis and typhus. These must be diagnosed and treated with antibiotics quickly. If fits or flu like symptoms appear, see your Doctor immediately.

**Treatment**

Currently a spinal tap is the only method of diagnosis. Large doses of steroids counter effect of inflammation from meningitis. Pain medication are administered to help relieve symptoms.

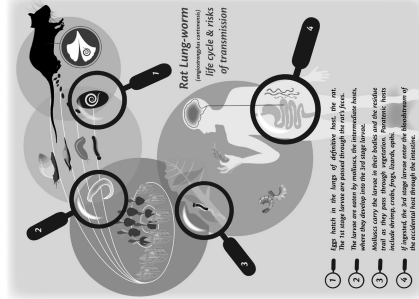

**Use gloves or utility tools** clearly marked for this purpose. Store tools in a antiseptic solution. - **never handle** slugs, snails, dead rats or feces with bare hands. Dispose of slugs and snails in a jar with tight fitting lid filled with a 15% salt water solution. This kills the slug and prevents pets or rats from eating. Do not leave dead slugs out in the open. They may be dead but the parasite is transmittable for hours.

Commercial slug bait is effective, read labels carefully, some are toxic to pets. There are simple methods to attract and trap/kill slugs. One method demonstrated uses a dark tarp or black plastic garbage bag. Lay flat on the ground - folded 3 times with water sprinkled between layers. Place a rock on top to secure in place overnight. Using gloves and utility tools, unfold the layers and remove the slugs gathered between folds. Place in salt water jar.

Use appropriate traps to kill rats. Do NOT handle carcass without gloves, place in sealed plastic bag, dispose in trash containers with lid firmly closed.

If transporting potted plants, truckloads of dirt or rock, inspect containers thoroughly before distributing on your property. The parasite nematode can survive deep in the soil.

Properly cook prawns, crabs, ophi, frogs,

**We have learned** that particular ecosystems, just like East Maui, are ideal for the transmission of the parasite. Since it has emerged here, it is imperative that our way of living has to change - being observant, proactive, informed is more critical than ever. The team outlined the fundamental hygienic practices necessary as a preventative. The parasite is not visible so to get an upper hand on controlling the spread of the parasite calls for a war on rat feces - minimizing and eradicating rats, slugs and snails.

Rat's lungs: host the first stage of incubation, the larvae is passed through the rat feces, the slugs that travel over the rat feces ingest and carry the parasite third stage larvae as they raid the veggie garden, banana bunches, papayas, pineapples, damp garages, pet food dishes by night leaving the third stage slime trail behind them. By morning they all flee to dark places, some smaller slugs hide in the dark folds of (or some animals) the larvae enters bloodstream through the intestine and the body's natural defense attacks the larvae. The larvae will eventually die, humans do not pass the larvae on through their feces, however the ensuing battle takes a deleterious toll on the body, often with long term affects, especially devastating in children's developing and vulnerable systems. Crabs, frogs, snails, prawns and possibly ophi may be carriers and if not cooked properly when eaten may introduce the third stage larvae through the intestinal track.

**Smart Precautions**

All water consumed and used for washing fruits and veggies should be potable standard. Adopt a hyper cleaning habit with fruits, veggie, cooking surfaces, cutting boards, knives, refrigerators, etc. Food brushes and food thermometers are important handy tools.

If on a catchment system, clean tank roof and gutters often. Change water filters regularly, a 15 micron filter is preferred.

Generally slugs are active by night and hide in cool, damp, dark places by day. They can be found along the under plastic and terracotta planters, along the lip of pots, under leaves and rocks, in damp dark garages, shops and laundry rooms, under petfood bowls and in pet food storage containers.

An estimated 250 - 300 people attended the DOH sponsored community meeting in Hana at Helene Hall April 6.

Dr. Lorinn Pang, Hawaii Dept. of Health, Kay Howe, Professor, College of Pharmacy, UH Hilo, Lissa Fox Stroehner, Maui Invasive Species Committee (MISC), Robyn Pihali, Hawaii Farm to School Coordinator, teamed up to inform an anxious East Maui community after three confirmed cases of angiostrongylus cantonensis (rat lungworm disease) have emerged. Local Health Care Professionals, Farmers, Gardeners, Parents, Educators, Keli, and Food Handlers were in attendance.

Dr. Pang presented a thorough introduction of the systematic pathology of transmission of the parasite to humans through ingestion and the affect of Parasite. Meningitis as the human immune system is triggered to fight the parasite.

Prof. Howe shared her and her son's terrifying first hand experience with the disease. She also shared her profound depth of research and knowledge from years of study on Hawaii Island which has a long history of battling this disease.

Prof. Howe stressed that while much is being learned through the tragic first hand local and the subsequent studies at UH Hilo. Federal funding and support is essential for broader studies of this health crisis and eradication efforts. Help from USDA is needed for pest control. Recent data revealed that of 557 rats collected and tested, all were infected. MISC will require additional support for surveying, specimen and data collection.

Robyn Pihali stated that there has been support for education and prevention from Sen. English, CTAHR (College of Tropical Ag. and Human Resources), Maui County and UH Hilo. Through her outreach program, partnering with Lehua Maui School Garden Network Coordinator has education material available to Dept. Of Education DOE. Cooperation and support with Dept. Of Ag. to extend crop protection, Rat and snail protection for farm operations.

Robyn and Lehn arranged additional meetings scheduled by Maui School Garden Coordinators for Hana School and a RLW Workshop at UHMC on April 7, 2017. A video will soon be made available of Prof. Kay Howe's presentation and distributed to CTAHR, UHMC Ag Department, Maui County Farm Bureau, Hawaii Farmers Union United, Maui Invasive Species Committee, Department of Health, Maui District Health Office.

"I am pleased that our community is quickly responding and taking action to a real threat that could affect all of our lives," adds Sen. English. "This is not the first time that we come together to combat a regional health problem while in its initial stages and prevent it from becoming an actual hazard in the State and affecting residents and visitors as well."

HAWAII AND TAIWAN SIGNS RECIPROCAL DRIVERS LICENSE AGREEMENT

State of Hawaii Department of Transportation Director Ford Fuchigami and Taipei Economic and Cultural Office Director-General Chow Min-Gan signed a reciprocal driver's license agreement on April 5 in the Governor's office. Under the agreement, Republic of China (Taiwan) nationals residing in Hawaii with a valid Republic of China driver's license are exempt from taking a road test, as well as a written exam. They can now obtain a class 3 or standard license upon completing of a regular physical exam.

Similarly, Hawaii State residents with a valid Hawaii driver's license residing in Taiwan for a minimum of one year can acquire a license within 12 months of entering the country without taking a road or written exam. Taiwan has signed similar reciprocal driver's license agreements with states across the U.S. that include Alabama, Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas and Washington.

"This agreement with Taiwan marks an important milestone in the development of bilateral relations with foreign governments," said Sen. English. "It will also bring greater convenience to residents of both Hawaii and Taiwan."



\$144,910 RELEASED FOR CIP AT KUALAPU'U ELEMENTARY PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL

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## RAT LUNGWORM DISEASE COMMUNITY ACTION ALERT UPDATE

*Maui Senators: Kenti Aguiar, English and Baker and 500 rat traps, April 21, 2017.*

**Rat lungworm disease has been found in our district. Therefore, we must take immediate action to control and eliminate the spread of the disease.**

In March, the State Health Department confirmed a case of rat lungworm disease on Maui and is investigating four more cases. Rat lungworm is caused by a round worm parasite. The adult parasite is only found in rats. The infected rats can pass the larvae in their droppings. Snails and slugs become infected by eating the larvae. People can get the disease by eating raw produce with tiny snails or slugs that have eaten the lungworms. We might also get the disease from eating under cooked freshwater prawns/frogs that have become infected from water contacting infected slugs and snails.

On April 26, in collaboration with Jonathan Starr Foundation, Senator English's staff, Senate and House Colleagues and other community leaders, gathered over 500 rat traps that will be distributed at the East Maui Taro Festival on Saturday, April 29th. "A big mahalo to Jonathan Starr and his foundation for collaborating with us on combating rat lungworm disease on Maui," said Sen. English, "Our Hana community is putting together a task force to help neighbors with tools and education as well."

Our communities need to take immediate action through prevention and control of the disease. First, the community must control the rodent population by using appropriate traps. Secondly, **DO NOT eat raw or under cooked snails or slugs which might be on fruits.** Thoroughly wash and inspect fresh produce and vegetables, especially if eaten raw. Finally, eliminate snails and slugs near houses and in the garden. Follow tips and read information provided herein. If you have suspicious symptoms, see your physician.

### MESSAGE FROM KALANI

I am pleased with the actions our community has taken since our special issue on rat lungworm disease. Precautionary measures will continue to combat the disease, while education will be the goal of our office. I ask the community to stay vigilant and alert to the dangers that threaten our health. We will coordinate private donations of rat traps and other items for a rapid response, as the State ramps up its campaign through the Department of Health and other agencies.

CAUTION AND PREVENTION OF RAT LUNGWORM DISEASE



TAKE ACTION NOW

Prevention and control of the disease is important to avoid the disease from spreading.

- Control the rodent population by using appropriate traps.
- Avoid eating raw or undercooked snails or slugs, which may be in vegetables or on fruits.
- Thoroughly wash and inspect fresh produce and vegetables, especially if eaten raw.
- Eliminate snails and slugs near houses and in the garden. Do not handle slugs/snails! With designated utility chopsticks or tongs.
- Dispose of snails and slugs in a solution of 15% salt water in a container with tight fitting lid.

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RAT LUNGWORM HEALTH ALERT UPDATE CONTINUED

We have learned that particular ecosystems, just like East Maui, are ideal for the transmission of the parasite. Since it has emerged here, it is imperative that our way of living has to change - being observant, proactive, informed is more critical than ever. The team outlined the fundamental hygienic practices necessary as a preventative. The parasite is not visible so to get an upper hand on controlling the spread of the parasite calls for a war on rat feces - minimizing and eradicating rats, slugs and snails.

Rats' lungs host the first stage of incubation, the larvae is passed through the rat feces, the slugs that travel over the rat feces ingest and carry the parasitic third stage larvae as they raid the veggie garden, banana bunches, papayas, pineapples, damp garages, pet food dishes by night leaving the third stage slime trail behind them. By morning they all flee to dark places, some folds of vegetation by day. If ingested by human (or some animals) the larvae enter the bloodstream through the intestines and the body's natural defense attacks the larvae. The larvae will eventually die, humans do not pass the larvae on through their feces, however the ensuing battle takes a deleterious toll on the body, often with long term effects, especially devastating in children's developing and vulnerable systems. Crabs, frogs, snails, and possibly ophi may be carriers and if not cooked properly when eaten may introduce the third stage larvae through the intestinal track.

Smart Precautions

All water consumed and used for washing fruits and veggies should be potable standard. Adopt a hyper cleaning habit with fruits, veggies, cooking surfaces, cutting boards, knives, refrigerator, etc. Food brushes and food thermometers are important handy tools. If on a catchment system, clean tank roof and gutters often. Change water filters regularly.

are simple methods to attract and trap/kill slugs. One method demonstrated uses a dark tarp or black plastic garbage bag. Lay flat on the ground - folded 3 times with water sprinkled between layers. Place a rock on top to secure in place overnight. Using gloves and utility tongs, unfold the layers and remove the slugs gathered between folds. Place in salt water jar.

Use appropriate traps to kill rats. Do NOT handle carcasses without gloves. Place in sealed plastic bag, dispose in trash containers with lid firmly closed.

If transporting potted plants, truckloads of dirt or rock, inspect contents thoroughly before distributing on your property. The parasitic nematode can survive deep in the soil.

Properly cook prawns, crabs, ophi, frogs, vegetables, (105° or freeze for 24 - 48 hours).

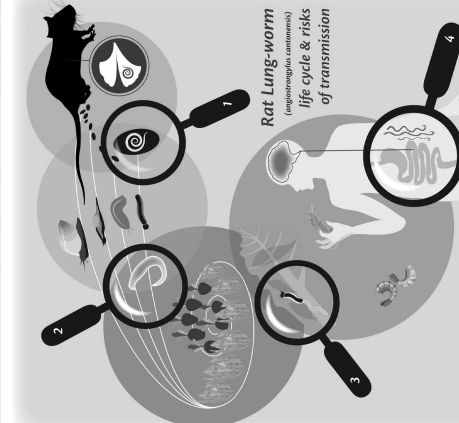
Adopting these practices daily will become second nature in a short time and will reduce the risk of interaction and exposure to the parasite.

Be alert to symptoms

Hypersensitivity to skin, headache, paresthesia (a burning or prickling sensation that is usually felt in the hands, arms, legs, or feet, but can also occur in other parts of the body), pain that moves from one area of the body to another - neck and shoulder, leg next day, back to head. The vague initial symptoms mimic other diseases, like leptospirosis and typhus, these must be diagnosed and treated with antibiotics quickly. If these or flu-like symptoms appear, see your doctor immediately.

Treatment

Currently, a spinal tap is the only method of diagnosis. Large doses of steroids counter affect inflammation from meningitis. Pain medication are administered to help relieve symptoms. The parasites cannot age or reproduce in humans and will eventually die.



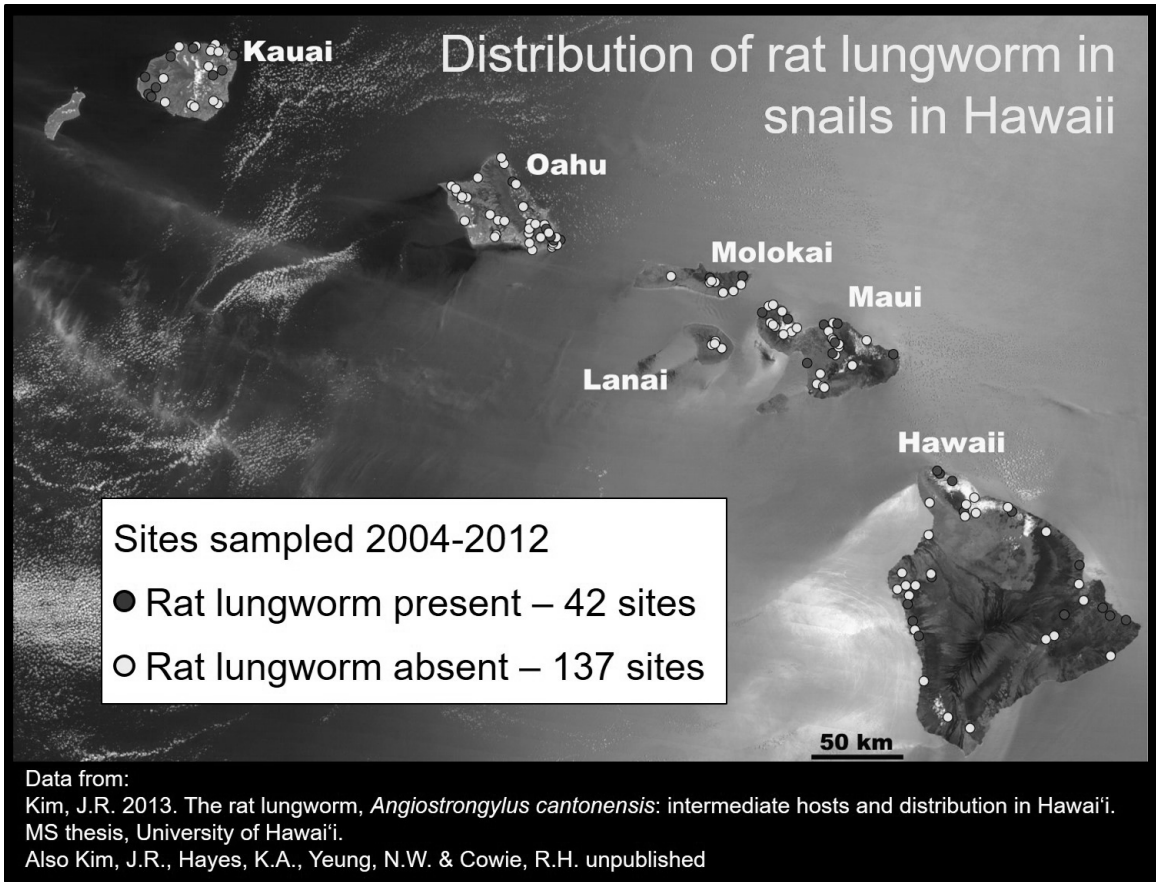
- 1 Eggs hatch in the lungs of definitive host, the rat. The 1st stage larvae are passed through the rat's feces.
- 2 The larvae are eaten by molluscs, the intermediate hosts, where they develop into the 3rd stage larvae.
- 3 Molluscs carry the larvae in their bodies and the residue where they develop into the 3rd stage larvae. Parasitic hosts include slugs, snails, frogs, lizards, ophi.
- 4 If ingested, the 3rd stage larvae enter the bloodstream of the accidental host through the intestine.

a 15 micron filter is preferred. Generally slugs are active by night and hide in cool, damp, dark places by day. They can be found along the under plastic and terracotta planters, along the lip of pots, under leaves and rocks, in damp dark garages, shops and laundry rooms, under petfood bowls and in pet food storage containers.

Use gloves or utility tools clearly marked for this purpose. Stone tools in a antiseptic solution - never handle slugs, snails, dead rats or feces with bare hands. Dispose of slugs and snails in a jar with tight fitting lid filled with 15% salt water solution. This kills the slug and prevents pets or rats from eating. Do not leave dead slugs out in the open. They may be dead but the parasite is transmittable for hours.

Commercial slug bait is effective, read labels carefully, some are toxic to pets. There

**PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, under Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Governor is required to give notice, by a proclamation, of the Governor's plan to return with the Governor's objections any bill presented to the Governor less than ten days before adjournment sine die or presented to the Governor after adjournment sine die of the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 1240, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Aquatic Life," passed by the Legislature, was presented to the Governor within the aforementioned period; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 1240 is unacceptable to the Governor of the State of Hawai'i;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DAVID Y. IGE, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, do hereby issue this proclamation, pursuant to the provisions of Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, giving notice of my plan to return Senate Bill No. 1240 with my objections thereon to the Legislature as provided by said Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution.

I am also concerned that creating an office to oversee and manage all public-private partnership projects in the State could impede the progress of those public-private partnership projects that have already commenced in the State. Finally, this bill places the Office of Public-Private Partnership in the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, even though the expertise and responsibility for many construction and infrastructure projects are currently held by the Department of Accounting and General Services.

The purposes of this bill are to alleviate traffic congestion and enhance the safety of motorists by allowing motorcycles and motor scooters to pass between two same-bound lanes and on roadway shoulders when traffic is stopped, a practice known as motorcycle lane filtering.

This bill is objectionable because of the concern that motorcycles and motor scooters operating between lanes and on the shoulders will cause more safety issues than could be alleviated. Shoulders were designed for stalled vehicles and other emergencies. One of the intents of the bill is to reduce congestion, but motorcycles and motor scooters make up less than one-half of one percent of vehicles. Data shows motorcycle and motor scooter usage is going down due to decreases in gasoline prices. The practice of lane filtering will increase the potential for road rage by providing preferential treatment for motorcycles and motor scooters.

Another intent of the bill is to reduce rear-end collisions between cars and motorcycles. From 2009 through 2015, only two out of 162 motorcycle fatalities involved rear-end collisions. Of those two, one was a motorcycle crashing into another motorcycle and the other was a motorcycle hitting a car.

The purposes of this bill are to add grants for planning, design, construction, renovation, operations, and equipment of facilities to the types of grants for which repayment to the State is required if the grantee acquires land and discontinues the activities or services approved in the grant by selling the land in fee simple or by lease; require the grantee to publicly recognize that the project was supported by the State through an awarded grant; and allow the expending agency to delegate its expending authority to a different agency when it is deemed advantageous to do so with the approval of the Governor.

This bill is objectionable because chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires that when a grantee uses a grant for land acquisition and discontinues the activities on the land acquired with the grant and disposes of the land in fee simple or by lease, the grantee must negotiate with the expending agency for a lump sum or installment repayment to the State of the amount used for the acquisition of the land. This bill adds these conditions to grants used for the planning, design, renovation, operations, and equipment and requires the Department of Budget and Finance to negotiate with the grantee instead of the expending agency for the repayment of the grant moneys. Consequently, this bill only applies to that small category of grants where the grant funds are used to acquire land as its part of providing services to the public.

I have concerns about applying the same repayment requirements to operating expenditures such as planning, design, construction, renovation, operation, and equipment for facilities as compared to the repayment requirements for capital expenditures for the acquisition of land. It appears contrary to the intent of chapter 42F to provide funds for operations serving the public, only to require the reimbursement of such funds at a later date, perhaps beyond the date of the grant contract. Further, I believe that it would be more appropriate for negotiations for the repayment of the subject moneys to be handled by the expending agency that had the initial contractual relationship with the grantee, and not the Department of Budget and Finance.

Also, the cap on the maturity of the general obligation bonds issued for repair and maintenance projects that extend the life of an asset for a period of ten years or greater will reduce the State's flexibility to structure its debt.

Further, the tracking and recordkeeping necessary to ensure compliance with the provisions of this bill would be overly

burdensome on the departments managing repair and maintenance capital improvement projects.

The purpose of this bill is to require the Attorney General to defend any civil action or proceeding brought in any court against a county based on any negligent or wrongful act or omission of a lifeguard who provides lifeguard services at a state beach park under an agreement between the State and a county.

This bill is objectionable because it requires the Attorney General to defend the counties for any civil action or proceeding, without exception, based on an allegedly negligent

or wrongful act or omissions of a county lifeguard providing lifeguard services at a state beach park. Because the Attorney General would be required to defend a lawsuit brought against the counties for any "wrongful" act of a lifeguard, and not just acts that are within the scope of the lifeguard's employment, the Attorney General potentially could be required to defend the counties for acts arising out of criminal or intentional acts of lifeguards and for the county's own wrongful acts that may have allowed the lifeguard to commit criminal or intentional acts. This is contrary to well-established tort and agency law and is bad public policy.

The safety of the beachgoing public remains the utmost priority. In order to avoid a disruption in lifeguard services, the state and counties are working together to extend the existing agreements to keep lifeguards on the state beaches until more comprehensive agreements can be reached with the respective counties that can address any issues that may arise from the loss of the limited liability protections with the sunset of Act 170 (SLH 2002).

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1240, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Aquatic Life."

The purposes of this bill are to:

(1) Require the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to define "sustainable" and establish a policy for

sustainable collection practices and a process for determining limits for certain species, for legislative adoption, to ensure the sustainability of Hawai'i native near shore aquatic life; and

(2) Prohibit the DLNR from issuing new aquarium fish permits to use fine meshed traps or fine meshed nets, other than throw nets, to take aquatic life and from transferring or renewing existing permits except under certain conditions.

This bill is objectionable for the following reasons:

1. The State of Hawai'i, by its DLNR, is in agreement that sustainable policies and practices are paramount where state aquatic resources are concerned. However, the focus of this bill on the aquarium fishery, by requiring collection limits for the "top forty" species and phasing out the use of aquarium fish permits, does not appear to be correct.

The State established the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area almost two decades ago, as the aquarium fish collection industry is strongly concentrated in West Hawai'i island. DLNR established fishery replenishment areas in West Hawai'i island as protected areas to allow fish to grow to full mature reproductive potential and repopulate fish stocks both inside and outside of the fishery replenishment areas.

Scientific data, involving more than 6,700 coral reef survey transects by DLNR in West Hawai'i island taken in the course of over seventeen years, show that aquarium fish populations are generally stable or increasing due to the spillover effect of the fishery replenishment areas. Populations of yellow tang and kole, two of the most heavily collected species in the aquarium industry, have not declined either inside or outside of the fishery replenishment areas, notwithstanding the concentration of fishing pressure in the areas outside of the fishery replenishment areas.

In contrast, food fish – which represents over ninety percent of all fish caught in Hawai'i – have decreased dramatically statewide. Reasons for this decline include overfishing, destructive fishing practices (including lay gill nets or night spearing with scuba), and decreases in coral reef habitat. Coral health is imperiled by the lack of such large herbivores as uhu (parrotfish), surgeonfish (such as pāku'iku'i or Achilles tang), and sea urchins that keep algae in check, allowing room for more coral growth. Other pertinent impacts to the reef include coral bleaching events.

Despite the premise of the bill that the primary problem is from the aquarium fishery, the actual scientific data do not support that conclusion. The bill cites a 2015 article in the journal Nature. No actual mention of the impact of aquarium fisheries is made in the article.

2. Numerous technical problems with this bill appear to have been established by the wording adopted by the conference committee. These include the requirement that DLNR develop a process for establishing sustainable catch limits by the 2019 regular session for a top forty of near shore aquatic species currently collected. No guidance is given as to whether the top forty should be constituted by number, size, biomass, economic value, fisheries landings, ecological trophic level, or other factors. There is no indication that establishing catch limits for the "top forty" species will advance the bill's stated primary purpose of reef recovery.

Even given this undetermined quality, the goal established in the bill appears unrealistic as DLNR indicates that such individual catch limits would take years of data and millions of dollars to establish.

3. The wording in section 3 of the bill that prohibits the issuance of new permits and limits the transfer of permits beyond five years would create a safety issue for permit holders



who continue to operate. Permit holders would be unable to employ other permitted companions who can act as safety “dive buddies.”

Given the willingness of DLNR to work with the proponents of this bill, legislators, industry representatives, and the public and the availability of management tool resources such as limited entry regulations (e.g., permit caps, open and closed seasons), marine managed areas (e.g., fishery replenishment areas), and other collection restrictions, it appears that these means can achieve fisheries resources that are sustainable without eliminating one of the State’s public fisheries.

The bill provides that the property boundaries of the conveyed land are to be determined pursuant to "subsection (d)." No provision in the bill, however, including subsection (d), concerns property boundaries. The lack of a mechanism for determining the boundaries of the conveyed properties, as required by the bill, is a material legal defect at the heart of the legislation.

There is insufficient information about the properties at issue to perform a full analysis of the legal implications of the bill. The bill releases, waives, and extinguishes all claims and liabilities that the Department of Land and Natural Resources has, may have had, or may have in the future against the City and County of Honolulu concerning the physical, environmental, soil, economic, and legal conditions of the conveyed properties. Even though the Department of Education has been operating schools on these properties, it is imprudent to acquire substantial property and extinguish unknown potential liabilities without ordinary due diligence.

The bill does not provide the Department of the Attorney General with any role in the conveyance of the properties. According to section 107-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, "No real property or any right, title, or interest therein shall be acquired by agreement, purchase, gift, devise, eminent domain, or otherwise, for any purpose, by the State or any department . . . without the prior approval of the attorney general as to form, exceptions, and reservations." The bill states that the City and County of Honolulu shall prepare, execute, and record quitclaim deeds for the properties without providing a role for any state entity in this process, including the Department of the Attorney General.

The purpose of the EBRF is to provide a temporary supplemental source of funds during emergencies, severe economic downturns, or unforeseen reduction in revenues. An adequate EBRF appropriation will better enable the State to plan its course of action to meet the budget shortfall. The restrictions set by this bill limits the Legislature's ability to address budget shortfalls and may lead to deeper budget reductions and reductions in workforce.

Another concern is this measure allows appropriations from the EBRF in a succeeding fiscal year, if the State collected or is projected to collect less general fund tax revenue in the current fiscal year. Thus, appropriations from the EBRF would be allowable in years with robust general fund tax growth as long as collections in the current fiscal year are less or are projected to be less than the prior fiscal year. This provision does not appear consistent with the desire to preserve the use of EBRF for dire financial situations.

Moreover, forecasts won't be able to predict "economic shocks" and the use of a handful of metrics is too simplistic to forecast the future of Hawai'i's economy (population, personal income and gross State product).

Re: HB523 SD1 CD1

HB523 SD1 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RECYCLING" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) to establish a recycling pilot program for the onsite collection of recyclable materials at DAGS buildings and facilities.

There is concern that there is not a sufficient amount of recyclable material in the waste stream to warrant spending for this type of program. Many of the DAGS facilities have already implemented recycling programs in which individuals or janitors volunteer to handle the recyclables.

However, the State Capitol receives an influx in public traffic during session and recyclable material could increase in the waste stream. DAGS can work with the State Capitol Management Committee to address this issue.

There is concern that DAGS received no positions and will be required to hire vendors to implement the program. The administration is committed to working with the legislature on this issue and implementing recycling programs where necessary.

For the foregoing reasons, HB523 SD1 CD1 will become law as Act 217, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, effective July 12, 2017, without my signature.

**PREAMBLE**

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

**RULES OF THE SENATE**

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

**PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**

**Rule 1 Organization.**

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

**Rule 2 Officers and Employees.**

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

**Rule 3 The President.**

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.

- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.
- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.
- (17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.
- (18) To disperse information to all members relating to the President's nominations and appointments to boards and commissions on a monthly basis.

**Rule 4 The Vice-President.**

- (1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.
- (3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

**Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.**

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

**Rule 6 The Clerk.**

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
- (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
- (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

**Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.**

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

**Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.**

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

**Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.**

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

**Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.**

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

**Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.**

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

**Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.**

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

**PART II. COMMITTEES**

**Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.**

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or

finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

- (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

**Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.**

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

**Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.**

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

**Rule 16 Standing Committees.**

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture and Environment (AEN). The purview of this committee includes agriculture and aquaculture, including mariculture; and population, environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(2) Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health (CPH). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds; and general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(3) Committee on Economic Development, Tourism, and Technology (ETT). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism unless the authority or corporation is within the purview of another Committee pursuant to this Rule, other emerging industries development, financial and technical assistance to business, film and digital media production, astronomy, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, other scientific research and development activities, recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, and the Hawai'i Tourism Authority; and development of technology, including but not limited to the use of information storage, transmissions, processing, and telecommunications.

(4) Committee on Education (EDU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early childhood learning, early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(5) Committee on Government Operations (GVO). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state government operations policy, including government efficiency, The Procurement Code, and state facilities unless the state government operations policy, including government efficiency, departmental procurement, and state facilities is within the purview of another Committee pursuant to this Rule.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Higher Education (HRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but excluding the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(8) Committee on Housing (HOU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to affordable and public housing, urban renewal, community development, housing development, and the housing of, or sheltering of, the homeless.

(9) Committee on Human Services (HMS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance, Medquest, youth services, day care programs under the Department of Human Services, vocational rehabilitation, long term care, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth, families, elderly population, and services relating to homelessness.

(10) Committee on International Affairs and the Arts (IAA). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations; and culture and the arts in the State, including but not limited to programs relating to historic preservation.

(11) Committee on Judiciary and Labor (JDL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts, crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters, criminal code revision, statutory revision, campaign spending and elections, ethics, constitutional matters, the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties; and public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities and training, labor- management relations, collective bargaining, the Employees' Retirement System, and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund.

(12) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs (PSM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, the sheriffs division, civil defense, disaster readiness, state building code; and space exploration and aerospace development; and county and federal relations, and matters of concern to the counties; and military and veterans' affairs.

(13) Committee on Transportation and Energy (TRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation, and transit-oriented development as it relates to transportation projects; and energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources.

(14) Committee on Water and Land (WTL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning, sustainability, land and water management, forest management and reserve, coastal zone management, land reclamation, naturally occurring fisheries, ocean resources, state parks and beaches, management areas, including ocean recreation management areas and small boat harbors, and transit-oriented development as it relates to land use.

(15) Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management, statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation, and government structure and finance.

**Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.**

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

**Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.**

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

**Rule 19 Leadership Committees.**

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

**Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.**

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.



**Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.**

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

**Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.**

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

**Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.**

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

(A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;

(B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and

(C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

**Rule 24 Committee Reports.**

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

**Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.**

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the

President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

#### **Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.**

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

### **PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS**

#### **Rule 27 Meetings.**

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

#### **Rule 28 Attendance.**

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

#### **Rule 29 Extension of Session.**

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, respectfully request an extension of \_\_\_\_\_ days of the \_\_\_\_\_ session of \_\_\_\_\_ of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

**Rule 30 Recessed Session.**

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

**Rule 31 Special Sessions.**

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at \_\_\_\_\_.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at \_\_\_\_\_.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the \_\_\_\_\_ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at \_\_\_\_\_.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

**Rule 32 Adjournments.**

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

**Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.**

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

**Rule 34 Quorum.**

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

**Rule 35 Executive Session.**

- (1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.
- (2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

**Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.**

- (1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.
- (2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.
- (3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

**Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.**

- (1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.
- (2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.
- (3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"
- (4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"
- (5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"
- (6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- (7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.
- (8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

**Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.**

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

**PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS****Rule 39 Order of Business: General.**

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.

- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

**Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.**

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

**Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.**

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

**Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.**

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

**Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.**

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

**Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.**

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

**PART V. BILLS****Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

**Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.**

- (1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.
- (2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.
- (3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

**Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.**

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

**Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.**

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

**Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.**

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

**Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.**

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

**Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.**

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

**Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.**

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

**Rule 53 Matters Tabled.**

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

**Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.**

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

**Rule 55 Bills: Certification.**

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

**Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.**

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

**Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.**

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

**Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.**

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

**Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.**

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

**Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.**

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

## PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

**Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

**Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.**

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

**Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.**

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,

- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

**Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.**

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

**Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.**

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

**Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.**

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

## PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

**Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.**

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

## PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

**Rule 68 Questions of Order.**

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

**Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.**

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.



**Rule 70 Voting: Methods.**

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

**Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.**

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

**PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT****Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

**Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.**

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

**Rule 74 Decorum: Address.**

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the \_\_\_\_\_ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on \_\_\_\_\_"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

**Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.**

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

**Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.**

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

**Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.**

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

**Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.**

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

**Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.**

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

**Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.**

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

**Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.**

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.

- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

**Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.**

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

**Rule 83 Disclosures.**

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

**Rule 84 Violating Confidence.**

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

**Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.**

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

**PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS****Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

**PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES****Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

**Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.**

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

## PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER

**Rule 89 Administrative and Financial Manuals.**

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

**Rule 90 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.**

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

**Rule 91 Issuance of the Senate Pin.**

- (1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.
- (2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.
- (3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.
- (4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.
- (5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

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**29th LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2017  
JOINT HOUSE and SENATE  
COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2017 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 17, 2017, until 12:00 midnight on Friday, April 28, 2017.

**1. Definitions**

For purposes of these procedures:

“Chairs” refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

“Conference Committee” refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

“Lead chair” refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

“Lead committee staff” refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

“Managers” refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

**2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments**

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly:

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

**3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places**

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

**4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice**

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature's website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

**5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings**

a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before midnight on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

**6. Attendance at Meetings**

a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.

b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:

For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.

For the House, the lead chair must be present.

All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.

c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.

d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee during the decision-making on the measure.

**7. Conference Discussion**

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

**8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers**

a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.

b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.

c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

**9. Decision-making Meeting**

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair’s designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

**10. Conference Committee Reports**

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair’s designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber’s Chief Clerk.

**11. Decision-making Deadlines**

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

**12. Electronic Transfer**

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

**13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures**

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
