

THIRTY-FIRST DAY

Thursday, March 15, 2018

The Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2018, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, English, and Harimoto who were excused.

At this time, the Chair welcomed Sean Galuteria, son of Senator Brickwood Galuteria, who was seated in the Senate Chamber as the "twenty-sixth senator."

Senator Baker noted that it was the State Council on Developmental Disabilities' eighteenth Annual Day at the Capitol, and welcomed 68 participants from across the state, as well as Daintry Bartoldus and her staff who organize the annual event. Senator Baker then recognized participants from Maui, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Rhoads introduced Blane Sardinha, Che Yi, Nathan Brown, Sang Byun, and Justin Lee, members of the Self-Advocacy Advisory Council who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Ruderman welcomed Self-Advocacy Advisory Council participants from Hawai'i island, who were present in the gallery.

The Chair extended an additional welcome to the remaining participants who were present in the gallery.

Senator Kidani, on behalf of Senator Chang, welcomed a group of fifth-grade students from the American History class at Mayor John H. Wilson Elementary School, who were seated in the gallery with teachers Max Kaneshiro and Roxanne Yi and counseling intern Kelly Souza.

Senator Baker acknowledged Anya Maga, who was present in the gallery with her mother, Michelle Pestel-Maga, and noted that she served as the inspiration for Anya's Law, which assists those with orofacial anomalies.

Senator Shimabukuro recognized Lorenzo Tagura-Bear, Logan-Ann Gueco, and Loleina Kamaka, 2018 Youth of the Year honorees from the Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i – Wai'anae Clubhouse, who were seated in the gallery.

The Chair extended additional congratulations to Lorenzo Tagura-Bear for delivering a particularly enjoyable and impressive speech at the Hawai'i Convention Center.

Senator Espero recognized Alyana-Marie Castillo, 2018 Youth of the Year honoree from the Boys and Girls Club of Hawai'i – Hale Pono 'Ewa Beach Clubhouse, who was seated in the gallery with clubhouse director Lori Respicio.

At 11:42 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:43 a.m.

Senator Ruderman recognized and honored the 2018 Boys & Girls Club of Hawai'i honorees, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, we have honorees who are the finalists from the Boys & Girls Club Youth of the Year award, recognizing outstanding records of volunteer service, peer leadership, and community spirit. I'm proud to introduce our first honoree, who's from my district of Puna on the Big Island, Ms. Mia Dahl. Mia has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club for three years. She immerses herself in everything the club has to offer and enjoys going to the club to help others and make new

friends. Mia is a freshman at the Hawaii Academy of Arts & Science, where she maintains a 4.0 grade point average – one of five charter schools in our district that we're very proud of. She volunteers at her school, working with elementary school students in completing homework assignments and cultivating the school's garden. Mia has impressed many with her dedication and service to community. She's actively searching for ways to give back and make a difference in the lives of those in her community. She and her mother put together meals for the victims of Hurricane Iselle and, through this work, she developed a passion for helping those in need. Mia aspires to become a pediatrician in her local community. Congratulations, Mia."

Senator Keith-Agaran presented the following remarks:

"Maui is proud to present Caylie Peterson, Maui Youth of the Year finalist. Caylie is from Ha'ikū and has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club for six years. She's a role model for younger members of the club and actively engages with them through arts and crafts. For the past three years, she has represented the Ha'ikū Clubhouse in the annual Little Chef Big Chef competition. Caylie is a high school sophomore at King Kekaulike High School, where she maintains a 3.7 grade point average. As a member of the school's Japanese club, she has developed a passion for learning languages. She is also an active member of the drama club and will perform in the school's spring musical this year – I think, in their new auditorium. Caylie has impressed many with her entrepreneurial skills. She created her own business growing Hawaiian chili peppers, Meyer lemons, and kaffir lime leaves in her home garden, selling her produce to a local Thai food restaurant. On behalf of your Maui Senate delegation, congratulations, Caylie."

"And, Mr. President, before I yield the floor, let me also acknowledge the other Maui participants in the Youth of the Year award: Jaenahleyn-Kaiola Kanaha, Kayla Kennedy, Makamae Naleieha, and 'Ōiwi Gormley."

Senator Kidani presented the following remarks:

"I'm proud to recognize Cornelius Phillips. He is Hawai'i's military Youth of the Year finalist. Cornelius is originally from New Orleans, Louisiana, and has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club for five years. He is also a member of the Schofield Teen Center basketball team. Cornelius is a senior at Mililani High School, where he maintains a 3.6 grade point average. Cornelius has impressed many with his academic performance. He has received honor roll for the past 12 academic quarters and recently received a college scholarship to attend Louisiana Tech University. Congratulations, Cornelius."

Senator Wakai presented the following remarks:

The Chair remarked on Jessica-Ann Herman’s performance at the Hawai‘i Convention Center, and extended an additional welcome to the previous year’s winner, Bryden Ka‘auwai.
