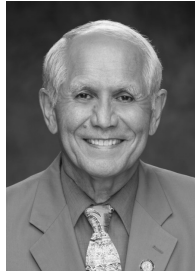

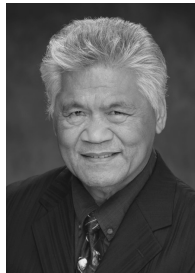

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 16, 2019

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, was called to order at 10:08 a.m., by the Honorable Kaiiali'i Kahele, Temporary Chair of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose for the invocation by Pastor Matt Higa from New Hope Kaua'i, followed by the singing of the National Anthem by Ms. Nalani Brun and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by former Kaua'i County Mayor Bernard Carvalho.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Thielen nominated Carol Taniguchi, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Taniguchi moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kim.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the Chair declared Carol Taniguchi as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

Senator Keohokalole then moved that a committee of three Senators be appointed by the Chair as a Committee on Credentials to examine the certificates of election of the newly elected members of the Senate and to submit a report of its findings to the Senate, seconded by Senator Riviere and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed Senators Chang, Dela Cruz, and Keith-Agaran to serve on such committee, and directed the committee and Temporary Clerk to examine the certificates of election.

On motion by Senator Shimabukuro, seconded by Senator Ruderman and carried, Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1 was adopted.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair then called upon Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

Chief Justice Recktenwald administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate, who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Inouye placed in nomination the name of Senator Ronald D. Kouchi for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Nishihara.

Senator Kanuha moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Kidani.

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Ronald D. Kouchi as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Ronald D. Kouchi was declared elected President of the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019.

The President addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

“Aloha! Thank you, Senator Kahele, for getting us off to such a smooth start. I would like to acknowledge and recognize all of our special guests, but, in respecting people's time, I would ask the Clerk to insert the names that were read off by Senator Kahele in the introduction as if I had just gone through everyone again, and then I'd like to acknowledge all of the special guests on the floor and in the gallery, and I notice that we have an array of councilmembers—would the councilmembers please rise?

“What I'd like to do is begin my remarks this morning by saying the same thing I said two years ago: I am the one to speak on behalf of the Majority today, and I know if my colleagues had the chance to speak, the first thing that they would say is ‘thank you’ to each and every one of their family members, to their friends and their tremendous supporters who sacrifice so much and who work so hard to allow us to sit in the seats we now occupy and have taken the oath of office for, so, to each and every one of you, thank you so much.

“I have the privilege, as the one who speaks, to share a story, so I would be remiss if I didn't introduce to you, sitting next to my mom, Carolyn, one of her best friends, Kazui Nakata, with whom my mom worked with as employees of First Hawaiian Bank. From 1982, when I first decided to run for the Kaua'i County Council, through all of my campaigns, this woman has done everything from sign-waving; canvassing; frying fish tempura, chicken; to opening up her big garage because we couldn't afford to buy t-shirts, and we silk-screened the t-shirts to get our campaign underway back in 1982. And how do you find the words to say thank you to her and so many others like her, who have worked so hard, that have given me the

opportunities that I have enjoyed today. I had a chance to meet my wife, Joy, while I was in office. We had our two sons, Dan and Egan, who are joining us here on the stage this morning, while I was in office. When I first started as a councilmember, I simply wanted to create economy for young people like myself to move back to Kaua'i, and then I became married, and then I started having children, and my view of what my life's mission was as a member of the council and now the Hawai'i State Senate dramatically changed, and now my greatest passion is to create a Hawai'i where each and every one of our children would make the choice to come home. We can't force them to come home because we educate them; we create the better path for them than we had, and when they become successful, then they make choices because they are good enough to decide what to do. I had always lamented at my 50 percent success rate: Our younger son, Egan, upon finishing college on the mainland, chose to come back and work on Kaua'i, and it was a blessing to have him back home and see him every day. Now, I am so proud to stand before you today as a 100-percent success story: Yesterday, our son Dan moved back from the mainland after working there for six-and-a-half years, and started working here in Honolulu. Just because I have reached my goals doesn't mean that I'm not going to fight to make sure that each and every one of us can feel as happy and as proud as my wife, Joy, and I are. Yesterday, dropping him off at work, I had to buy him breakfast, so Dan being home may result in me taking a little economic hit, but it's certainly worth it. So I stand here more committed than ever to create that Hawai'i that our children will choose to come back to.

"Before I get into the issues that face this legislature, I did want to introduce one special guest who's sitting up here with me on the stage. Senator English and I, a couple of weeks ago, had the opportunity to attend a leadership conference in New York City for leaders across the country, and one afternoon, they put us on a bus and we went to the 9/11 memorial and we got to hear from the deputy director of the memorial, who lost a brother that day in the towers. We also heard from a docent who was a New York City firefighter, one of the elite rescue firefighters who helped so many people get down through a stairway to safety that day, and when the building came down on him, he sustained injuries that disabled him and forced him into retirement, and he now volunteers as a docent, and he lost the other five members of his company who responded that morning. I share that with you because I'd like to ask Dan Moynahan, the ex-firefighter docent who was injured as a 9/11 responder from New York City, who's with us today, to please stand, and let's recognize Dan. Thank you for being with us here, Dan.

"The first issues that I'd like to highlight that we will be tackling in the Legislature, acknowledging the work of our first responders, is, we have not forgotten that, while the lava has taken a timeout, the devastation on the Big Island is left there for the residents to deal with. There is so much more work to be done. To Mayor Kim, the councilmembers who are here, I can tell you the members of your Senate delegation have been in continuous contact with the rest of their colleagues here in the Senate, and we are committed to work with you in continuing to help the Big Island recover. We are not going to be strong if each one of our counties aren't strong, and so we want to see you prosperous and healthy again. Mayor Carvalho, who sang "Hawai'i Pono'i," was the Kaua'i mayor dealing with the world-record floods on Kaua'i in April, we have not forgotten that Kaua'i needs help. The devastation of the rains that caused the flooding also greatly impacted east Honolulu, and they continue to need help. We will be looking at what are the appropriate resources and how we can work with you to make sure that each and every one of your areas recover.

"At the top of the list, I'm sure we're going to have some vigorous conversation on legalizing cannabis, and we look

forward to those bills going through the appropriate committees and going through the process. We are going to also have a serious discussion about the incremental increase of our minimum wage. We have reached \$10.10, which was the last incremental raise the last time we passed the minimum wage bill, and so that will be on the list.

"But, most importantly, we kind of joke around when we get to the portion of the program of certifying member credentials because, what's the big deal? You know, the election is over, but this year, there were two races whose results were contested. The Hawai'i Supreme Court recently upheld Senator Fevella's victory but has not decided one council race here on O'ahu. To rectify the problem of having Senator Fevella be in limbo for such a long period of time and to address the remaining unresolved council race, I believe we need to do two things: One, last year, we passed vote-by-mail for Kaua'i to be the experiment or pilot project; I believe we need to do vote-by-mail statewide. Two, we need to look at our election laws because they are out of date, and they were written at a time when voting was done in a different way, and we need to make sure that, whether it's an automatic recount or some other mechanism, that we don't leave legislative bodies or executive branches in limbo because we cannot resolve the election results in a timely fashion, and I believe we need to give clearer direction to the courts about what that process should be, and so I hope that we'll be able to achieve that goal.

"Clearly, homelessness continues to be at the top of the agenda, and we made an unprecedented commitment to funding affordable housing last session. That was the first step. Clearly, we need to continue the effort to fund affordable housing, and having permanent affordable housing is the key to having the transition from homelessness into having housing that they can afford to live in. We still recognize there are many reasons for homelessness and why people aren't in homes, and so it needs to be a multi-tiered approach; there is no one-size-fits-all.

"We need to continue to support our kūpuna. If you aren't aware of it, we have the oldest demographic population of any state in the country. The other good news is, at 80.3, Hawai'i has the longest life expectancy; California, at 80, is the second. And while it's great that we have the technology and the lifestyle that allows this long life, we need to deal with all of the other things that happen as you get older: Caregiving; how do we ensure that you have now planned adequately for retirement when your initial savings as a young person didn't envision your ability to live so long? And your options shouldn't be to just keep working and not have an opportunity at some point to enjoy life. It should be to work with everyone to have them on a financial plan to ensure that there is an opportunity to enjoy some of the fruits of their labor and spend time with their family. I'm not going to put any pressure on my single sons, but, you know, I would not mind being a grandparent sometime soon. (Are they smiling?)

"We talk about working with the administration. For these homelessness programs, for our affordable housing programs, taking care of our kūpuna, funding the pre-K programs to start them on the right path to education, the support for K through 12, as well as our community colleges and universities, we need money. Now, we sent a bill to the governor several years ago to collect the taxes that aren't being collected from Airbnb in the hopes of getting to alternative accommodations. I will let the governor know I stand ready to work with him on finding a bill that will allow us to collect these funds so that we can deliver the money to create the lifestyle or opportunities that our seniors deserve and to create the opportunities for our children to get the education that they need and that they deserve so they can compete with anybody in the world.

"But at the top of my list is my worry about the economy and where we're going next year. Most of the financial analysts on

the major financial network news shows say that a recession is coming. And so I appreciate Senator Dela Cruz and the philosophy that he has taken about A) being fiscally conservative, to make sure we have the money before we spend the money, and B) if these are the great programs we want here, then he needs to see a column of what it is we're going to do to create the economy and create the revenue so that we can fund the desired programs. When I saw the governor's budget message, I was excited. Normally, in the first year of the biennium, we put in \$1.2 billion for capital improvement programs. He is suggesting \$2 billion, and \$2 billion says about fixing our prisons; \$2 billion says *investing in affordable housing*; \$2 billion says *investing in the infrastructure that is sorely lacking here, improving classrooms, and supporting the rest of our community*. But, most importantly, if the recession is coming, and times get tougher, and the construction bids get more competitive, then the government gets better pricing on our projects, and we can stretch the \$2 billion to do a lot more than what we originally hoped. And, more importantly, at a time when nobody else is putting money in the economy, the State of Hawai'i will be putting the money in the economy, making sure that people are going back to work, that people are spending those dollars in our economy, so that we can have a healthy and vibrant Hawai'i.

"The second thing, and this comes from the governor's inaugural remarks: Technology is the future for us, and Senator Keohokalole—I've been practicing that and debating whether I wanted to be brave and go there, but there's no way for me not to mention technology and to mention what I am expecting of Jarrett. He is brand-new to the Senate, and he and Stanley Chang and Dru Kanuha are three thirty-somethings, which we almost never have in the Senate, but he has a wealth of knowledge in the technology field. But, even more importantly, if you talk to him, he has an incredible passion about what he wants to do. And so I had asked the caucus to take technology out of business and economic development, tourism, not get it lost behind tourism and other activities, but put it out on its own, get someone with the passion to lead it, and let us run with technology because I do believe, like the governor, that technology is the next frontier for us to derive great economic success, and so I look forward to great things from technology.

"But, last and most importantly, and I talked about this two years ago, when the sugar plantation closed on Maui, and what was going to happen on the central plain, what was going to happen to all of that land, and I had envisioned farming activity, and I envisioned biodigesters, which would be able to create fertilizer, create feed for livestock, or create energy because what you put in as additives to the fuel stock determines what comes out at the backend of the biodigester. I am pleased to have former Lieutenant Governor Shan Tsutsui and Tiare Lawrence of Mahi Pono sitting with me here and their commitment to make sure that the agriculture activity thrives on the central plain of Maui; how about a big hand for them? The reason why I bring this up is that I am most passionate about a program the former lieutenant governor started, which is Farm to School. They started with three schools in Kohala; they did a few schools in Mililani. We have added positions to the Department of Ag and the Department of Education to ensure the continuation of this program, and we had students help create menus; we sourced products from local farmers and ranchers. I listened, at the most recent Farm Bureau meeting, to the deputy director of Agriculture tell the farmers of Hawai'i that, if you convince the Legislature to give us the funding we ask for, we will meet the goals of doubling food production in Hawai'i. Well, I got up after her and said, no, that's not how we're going to get there. The path there is easy: The Department of Education serves 100,000 meals a day, it is the largest restaurant in the State of Hawai'i. We have prisons that we run and feed inmates, and we have state-run hospitals with

cafeterias, where we feed patients and workers if they choose to buy our food. We have the land in the central plain of Maui now, all of the land on the Big Island. We have nonprofits that have land on Kaua'i and, as the global footprint is shrinking for the seed companies, they are returning land to ADC and private landowners across this state, and growing less seed corn, that makes opportunities available for us to plant food that we consume. And we control all three of those silos, and I submit to the governor and his administration that I stand ready to work with you to see how we would be able to interface with each other and make all of this work. I am frustrated and tired of hearing about why we **cannot** do it, and I would like to go to work with people who are going to tell me **how** we're going to do it, and if I get upset because it's not going fast enough, it's not about who I supported for what office. It's about my desire to support the people of Hawai'i; it's my desire to see our children who are going to school, that they have the proper meals so that they can maximize their potential and perform at their best. And I am aware that for many of those students, their school lunch is either the best or possibly even the only meal they will be having that day, so it shouldn't be something that they want to throw in the trash. It should be something that they enjoy eating, something that will nurture their minds and bodies and to have them perform at their optimum levels. With this model, we could then utilize the prisons and utilize the hospitals to expand our food production to reach our stated goals.

"So, next week, on the 22nd, on Kaua'i, at Kauai Veterans Memorial Hospital—I want to make your mouth water—and on the 23rd at Samuel Mahelona Hospital, they will be serving sautéed shrimp with butter garlic reduction and fresh parsley, ginger-marinated sweet potato tempura shrimp, stir-fried shrimp with oyster sauce, Cajun-style shrimp and andouille sausage gumbo, shrimp cakes with sweet chili aioli. The sides are a luau with poi gravy, taro, something I cannot pronounce (I think it's Turkish), 'ulu chips, 'ulu chowder, and they are featuring locally sourced products from Kaua'i Shrimp, Kuamo'o Farms, Aloha 'Āina, and Hawai'i 'Ulu Co-op. To all of my colleagues, if you were wondering what I was doing in the interim, it was trying to get this off the ground and lift it up. I encourage each and every one of you not to settle for anything less, and let us all run together and make sure that this happens because it's not just about feeding our children, providing a meal for our inmates, or taking care of our patients and workers in the hospital, but it's ensuring that we are reinvesting, cultivating, and keeping our fields green, not creating, like the problems in Lāhainā, where you have fallow land and brushfires that threaten local communities. We need an active agriculture, and we need to revitalize the economy, and, last and most importantly, it will create incredible renewable energy opportunities because there is nothing that should be wasted. When we do the value-added program, all of the waste that we don't use should go into that biodigester so that we can create the byproducts and we can create the energy that will show the way about how we can lead for the rest of the world.

"We have adopted the 100-percent-renewable-energy goal for Hawai'i, and I would be remiss if I didn't close by bragging about Kaua'i. Last week, they just had the blessing for the opening of the AES solar battery farm; Kaua'i has now hit 50 percent renewable energy to the grid five years ahead of KIUC's strategic plan. With their newest solar program and hydro projects that are coming online, it is hoped, by the end of 2019 or early 2020, that Kaua'i will have hit 70 percent renewable energy to the grid, so it is not a theory; it's not something that they just talk about. On Kaua'i, we are leading the way and showing you how to get it done, so I look forward to working with you and helping each and every one of you achieve the kind of goals that we've been able to achieve on Kaua'i. So, I would like to close by simply quoting Gandhi: 'The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service

of others.' I hope we all achieve that for the next session for the Hawai'i State Senate. Mahalo."

At this time, the President called on Senate Minority Leader Kurt Fevella.

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

"Mahalo, Mr. President. It's an honor to be here; thank you guys very much. I just want to say aloha, my fellow senators and honored guests, and ladies and gentlemen. I thank the Heavenly Father, for every day, I keep waking up in these beautiful islands that we call home, especially our hometown of 'Ewa Beach, and giving me this opportunity to deliver this Minority speech, being here, representing them. I just want to thank and honor my wife, Donnalee; my daughter, Abigail; and my dad, David; and all my family and friends from 'Ewa Beach. Thank you. Since I've been here on November 7th, I've just had a lot of love and aloha from every one of you here, my colleagues, staff, and people who work within the Capitol every day. It was just so overwhelmed, coming from a community like 'Ewa Beach and, of course, working in the public school system; to come here, it was very overwhelming, walking around this big building and not getting lost. Having a lot of friendly faces and a lot of aloha, especially from our Senate President, our governor, Lieutenant Governor Josh Green, you showed me a lot of love when I came here, and advice, and I took that advice, about being myself, who I am and my community, and what got me here today. So, getting on to: We're not like the mainland, I always said that to people that I meet here. We're not like Washington, D.C., because we're one family, one 'ohana. We live on a rock in the middle of the Pacific. At the end of the day, we still call each other family. Whether we agree to disagree, we all live as one and one 'ohana, so, for me, I just want to thank each and every one of you guys here, especially the legislators that I'm going to be working with; it's an honor to be here.

"That is why I'm very concerned on how we're going to achieve increasing the minimum wage. I believe, instead of raising the minimum wage across the board, we should start with a pilot program, starting with our government workers first. Also, we need to take care of our kūpuna; we need to pursue cutting taxes for those 65 and older. We must work together in finding ways to help our Hawaiian families with chronic health issues. We must encourage our young people to stay in school and graduate. The economy and the visitor industry are very important, and let's move quickly on the airline corporation bill and work hard with our House of Representatives in getting this to the governor's desk and asking him to sign it.

"I will oppose any raise of any transient accommodation tax, and I will work hard with all of my colleagues to collect taxes from currently illegal rentals that are in our community, pushing local families and taking away their quality of life. These homes that come up in our community, especially in our community of 'Ewa Beach on 'Ewa Beach Road, I particularly say that because, when I grew up there, I knew every single person there by name—rode my bike there; I don't swim, but I go to the beach there and have fun there. Now, because of this kind of lack of taxing and lack of accountability, these homes are popping all over the communities, not just in mine. But this is why I am here today to try to work with my colleagues to try to figure out a way in collecting these fees that are not being paid so that we can take care of family and friends in the community.

"We must commit to preserving and protecting our environment. We must not depend on fossil fuels. I support photovoltaic projects and creative energy and expanding our support by buying local first—we need to buy local first, guys. Speaking of, as a proud graduate of public schools, we need to ensure that our children have the best classrooms and facilities

to make their education meaningful. We must also give them opportunities to earn their college degrees here at home. We have outstanding public universities, and we should make education affordable for more people. I will seek to have UH West O'ahu expand their curriculum to provide Native Hawaiian students with the means to bear the rising costs of college. I support the completion of the Honolulu rail transit project in its current configuration—this is the alternative of the transportation for my family and friends in 'Ewa Beach and the State of Hawai'i.

"Enhancing the quality of life: I have worked many years in serving homeless in 'Ewa Beach. As a legislator, Governor Ige and his administration has made great progress in helping the homeless. From my personal observation, many of our homeless do not want to go on a list and to be sent to downtown Honolulu; they want to stay in their comfort zone in the area where they have their family and their close network, and sending them from 'Ewa Beach or Wai'anae to town, it doesn't make sense, and that's the reason why they prefer to be homeless. We need to also expand our homeless base shelters and communities and especially affordable homes, making it really affordable for our people to have housing.

"Wouldn't you agree with me that Hawai'i is the most beautiful place on Earth? Wouldn't you agree with me that one of the reasons it's so beautiful is because of its people and the aloha spirit that binds each and every one of us together? Therefore, in closing, I just want to thank each and every one of you, especially the community of 'Ewa Beach for making their voices heard. I just want to pray for each and every one of us here so that we can work closely together and letting us know that the main reason we're here is for our people and our community. So, in closing, I just want to ask our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, to bless this chamber and this capitol and the people who come and visit here from this Aloha State. I want to ask Him to cover us, to keep us and teach us to be humble and loving to one another, as we should be because we live in the best State of Hawai'i, the Aloha State. I ask Him again, in closing, to love one another like we want each other to be loved, trust each other like how we want each other to be trusted, and we go on and do His great works because, at the end of the day, everybody here, needs to have a better quality of life in the community, especially living for the rest of our life in the most beautiful State of Hawai'i. Thank you, and God bless."

The President responded:

"Thank you, Minority Leader Fevella, and I appreciate your desire and willingness to find ways to work together. I can tell you, from what I heard in your remarks, you have my full support in trying to get that airport authority bill to the governor's desk for signature."

The President then acknowledged former State Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland, who was seated in the gallery.

At 11:03 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator Kim remarked on the life of Malani Bilyeu, co-founder of Kalapana, and introduced a special video presentation in tribute of the music icon.

The members of the Senate and guests were entertained by the music of Nā Hoa and an impromptu hula from Kumu Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu.

Senator Kidani celebrated the extraordinary talent of Miss Aloha Hula 2018 Shalia Kamakaokalani and 2019 Grammy-nominated Hawaiian music trio Nā Hoa, who then entertained the members of the Senate and guests with music and hula performances.

Senate President Kouchi informed the members and guests that the Senate had adopted a number of sustainable development goals, and encouraged them to share the information with others. He then thanked Kumu Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu for her wonderful impromptu performance.

Senator Fevella introduced local music group Kapena – Kelly Boy DeLima and his children Kapena, Kalena, and Lilo – who performed several popular songs for the members and guests.

The Senate reconvened at 12:13 p.m.

The President thanked the entertainers, then announced that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President of the Senate.

Senator Dela Cruz placed in nomination the name of Senator Michelle N. Kidani for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Chang moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Michelle N. Kidani as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Michelle N. Kidani was declared elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019.

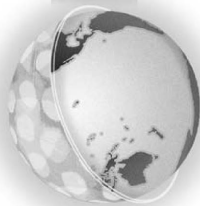

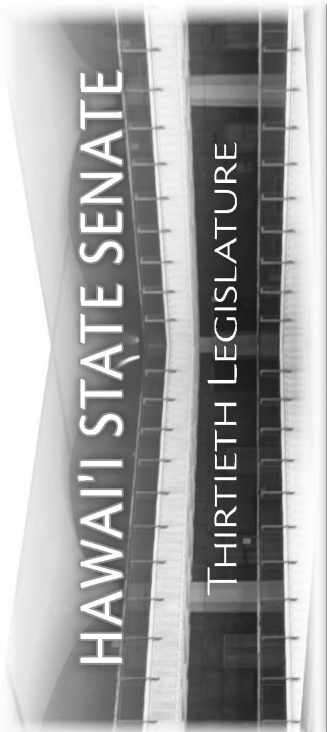

In the upcoming Regular Session of 2019, we will continue to advance high priority areas of policy in Hawai'i that will improve our communities.



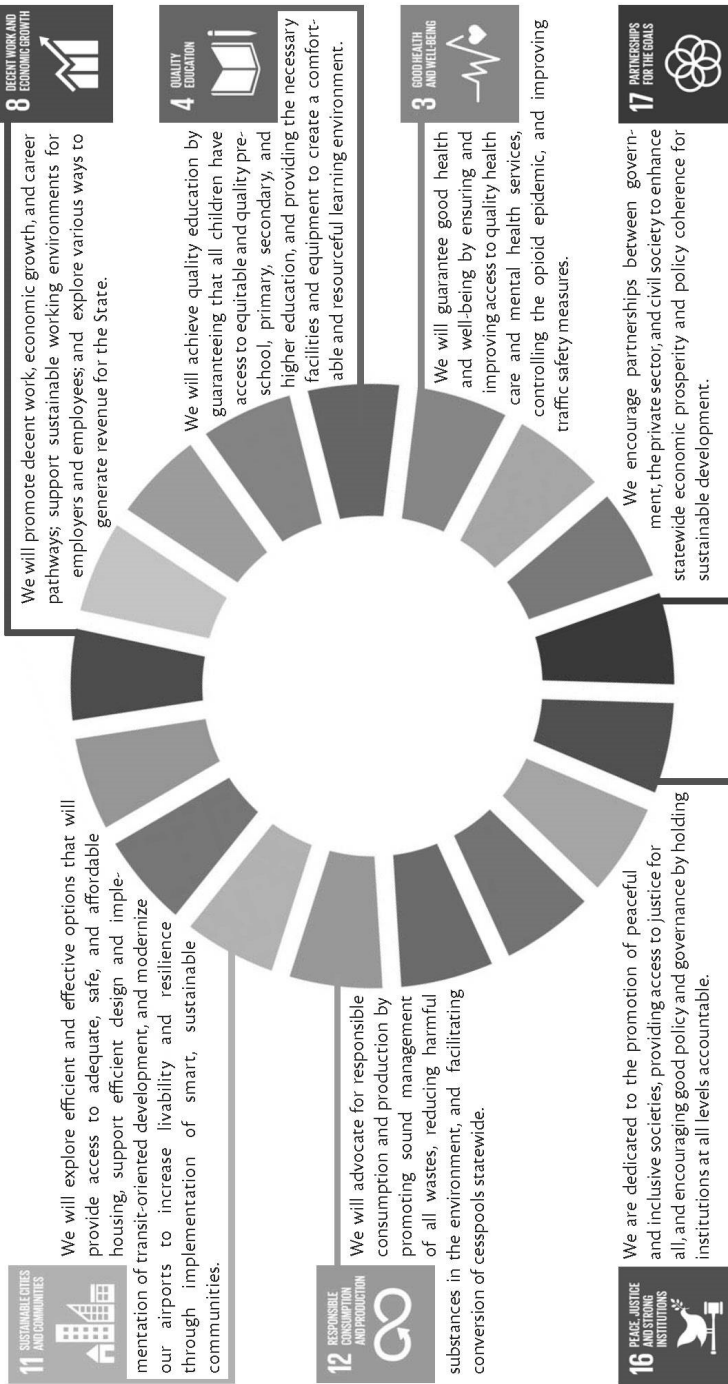

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Della Au Bellati and Gene Ward, on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators J. Kalani English and Kurt Fevella, on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Representative Dee Morikawa and Senator Rosalyn H. Baker presented Governor Ige with maile and 'ilima lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Thirtieth Legislature and guests the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Ige presented the State of the State Address as follows:

"Mister Speaker, President Kouchi, former governors, distinguished justices of the courts, representatives of our congressional delegation, members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, elected officials, military leaders, honored guests, and all of you who took the time to be with us this morning: Aloha. Like the start of each new year, the State of the State Address offers us an opportunity to both look back at where we've been and forward to where we want to go. The decisions we make today touch all of our lives. They are informed by our past and will affect the lives of many far down the road. As I look around the room and see the former governors, I am reminded of the hard choices they made during their tenure and how much we benefit from those decisions today. Yet the view from this crossroad is often obscured by our busy schedules and the day-to-day concerns we face as parents, students, employees, and community leaders. But it's a view that we need to pay close attention to, and perhaps look at from other perspectives.

"About a minute past midnight on January 1, 2019, Alekah Obra Garcia was born to Clarissa and Johnson Garcia of Kona: The first baby of the new year for the State of Hawai'i. In 2037, when she and her classmates graduate from high school, some of us will be long gone. Perhaps one of your grandchildren will be among the class of 2037. How will they view the decisions we make today? How will they grade the schools and education we provided for them? How will they assess the job and career opportunities that will be available to them? What will they say about the condition in which we left our ocean, beaches, and rainforests? How will they view their past and their children's future? Will they look back with reverence the way we do at our parents' generation, or will they look back with disappointment and regret? Too often, when we talk about the future we speak

in macroeconomic terms. But, for me, the future is personal. In many ways, it has to be, if we want to make good and wise decisions. The future has a name, and it is the name of your son or daughter, your grandson or granddaughter. But whether you have children or not, I know many of you feel the same way about Hawai'i. The future is personal because it is about our home. We choose one path over another, believing it will lead to a better, more secure, more nurturing Hawai'i. We make choices for Alekah's sake; we make choices for our children's sake.

"Fortunately, we do so at a time when our foundation is strong. Hawai'i is once again ranked the healthiest state in the nation. That's due in part because our healthcare coverage is among the broadest and most enduring. Our unemployment rate is among the lowest in the country. Our visitor industry is moving toward another record-setting year, and both individual personal income and the state's gross domestic product have been steadily growing over the years. For four years, we have worked hard to put the state on sound financial footing by building our reserves and paying down our unfunded liabilities, including those to our employee pension and health benefit systems. We now have the highest bond rating in the state's history, resulting in lower interest rates when we need to borrow money. The state of the State of Hawai'i is sound. More importantly, we are positioned to meet the challenges—both good and bad—because we have proposed a prudent budget that does not spend all that we project to bring in. As President Kouchi had noted in his Opening Day remarks, we will continue with that prudent stance even as we take care of the current needs of our people. It is, as you might guess, a delicate balancing act.

"I am mindful that the world around us has changed since we began this journey four years ago. Indeed, it has dramatically changed since I delivered my second inaugural address just a few weeks ago. In my remarks, I talked about how we are no longer limited by our geographic isolation, freed by the wonders of technology. But that's also a double-edged sword. The very thing that makes us more connected with the rest of the world also makes us more vulnerable to its slings and arrows, including what happens in our nation's capital. More than ever, we need to take control and shape our own destiny through education and innovation. And we need to protect those things which mean the most to us: our natural resources, our way of life, our values, and our children's future.

"Together, we have done so much in the last four years. In 2015, we were the first state to set a 100 percent renewable energy standard, the most aggressive clean energy goal in the country. In 2016, we were the first in the nation to enroll firearms owners in a centralized information system. In 2017, we were the first state to enact legislation that aligns with portions of the Paris Accord. And in 2018, we were the first state to ban pesticides containing chlorpyrifos to protect our children's health, and the first in the world to ban certain sunscreens to protect our environment.

"The road ahead remains clear and so do the reasons why we need to press on with the progress we've made over the last four years in transforming our schools with a new education blueprint that is school- and community-based, in reshaping our economy using technology to drive innovation, in addressing homelessness in a compassionate way, and in short-circuiting the underlying cause of homelessness by building more affordable homes for our communities.

"As a state, we have always been outward-looking in our values, goals, and actions. We have always put others first. In today's me-centered world, that is what I am most proud of as your governor. That is the gift we pass on to little Alekah Garcia, that compassionate spirit that I believe resides in all of us: the spirit of aloha! Concern for our children and the future

of our island community is one of the most important ways we show our compassion for others.

“In 2023, Alekah will be ready for preschool. But will a preschool be available and ready for her? Our public school system begins with kindergarten, but early education specialists tell us how important it is to prepare young children for a lifetime of learning. Research also tells us that early childhood education, such as preschool programs, are critical for brain development. It contends that children’s early years set the stage for how well they will learn for the rest of their lives. Yet in Hawai‘i, we have left that important task to others and only for families who can afford private preschool tuition. But it doesn’t have to be that way. First and foremost, we must create a universal, statewide, high-quality public preschool system that will give every child in Hawai‘i a head start on learning. Ultimately, we will need more than 300 public pre-K classrooms. Clearly, this is a long-term goal, but we don’t have to wait until we have funding for all of it. We can start to fill this significant gap in our education system by being smart about how we use existing space.

“But I don’t want to just add pre-kindergarten classes; I want us to do much more. I am proposing to the Department of Education that we look at our elementary schools in a whole different light, that we reinvent our elementary education by making early learning an integral part of our children’s overall elementary curriculum. That’s what good beginnings are all about. That’s why I am proposing to the DOE that we restructure those schools presently composed of kindergarten through grade six to pre-K through grade five. Grade six in those schools would then become part of our middle schools, where the added classes could be more easily and financially accommodated. Presently, about half of our elementary schools still include sixth-grade classes; most are located on the neighbor islands, where preschools, both public and private, are lacking. That provides us with a tremendous opportunity to kick-start this initiative, initially in those communities where they are needed most. In addition, the phasing in of our public preschools will give us the time to ensure that we have well-qualified preschool teachers to staff these classes. We also want to apply best practices learned from our own public pre-kindergarten program and from other states who have added preschools to their public education system. Of all the initiatives upon which we’ve embarked, I believe this one will make the greatest difference in preparing our children for the future and in creating a 21st-century workforce. Moreover, this is an initiative we can and should begin now. My thanks to Lauren Moriguchi, director of the Executive Office on Early Learning, and DOE Superintendent Christina Kishimoto for spearheading this initiative. A recently released strategic plan details the state’s vision for early learning in Hawai‘i.

“And so, in 2034, when Alekah Garcia is a freshman in high school, she’ll be well prepared to take advantage of the state’s Early College and Hawaii Promise programs if she so chooses—a choice made possible because of the partnerships we’ve established with the DOE, UH and its community colleges. That’s why we’re working hard to ensure that Alekah will have good teachers throughout her education, and that’s why we need to expand our pool of teachers in some of the most difficult-to-staff schools. And we’re doing this in partnership with the university, HSTA, and the DOE, and with the help of education advocates like State Senator Michelle Kidani and State Representative Justin Woodson.

“On an island where land is scarce and the cost of living is high, providing affordable homes for our families has been one of the most challenging aspects of caring and looking out for each other. Widespread homelessness across the state is a symptom of how steep that challenge is. I don’t have to tell you it is a complicated one and one that will take an entire village to

solve. But more than any other place in this country, Hawai‘i intimately understands the village concept because it is embedded in our values of ‘ohana and aloha. With the help of the Legislature, our congressional delegation, the counties, federal agencies, businesses, and community service organizations, we have made significant strides in addressing homelessness in Hawai‘i. Together, we have reduced our homeless population for two consecutive years, for a total reduction of 18 percent. This includes decreases in every county as well as decreases in key homeless subgroups, such as families, children, and veterans. We have also seen an increase in people exiting homeless programs to permanent supportive housing. Two years ago, only a third of those exiting homeless services went to permanent housing; that number has now increased to over 50 percent. In addition, this year’s budget includes \$35 million for homeless programs.

“More importantly, we have addressed this challenge as a community and not left it to government alone. For example, Queen’s Medical Center has seen what the impact of homeless patients has had on its overall mission. Without appropriate housing, recovery was a hit-and-miss affair, and many became repeat patients with prolonged stays. Hospital officials knew that if they didn’t treat the whole patient that the process would become frustratingly repetitive for both the patient and the doctor. And that’s why they became the first hospital in the nation to place its most medically fragile, homeless patients into housing as part of the recovery process. In the last year and a half, the Queen’s Care Coalition team has worked with 112 individuals, placing 75 percent of them into stable housing. The hospital estimates the program has generated more than \$5 million of savings and, at the same time, lightened the burden on the emergency rooms and the ambulances. And more importantly, it has changed the lives of those they have treated. With us this morning are Dr. Daniel Cheng, who heads the Queen’s Care Coalition, members of his Coalition team, and the president and CEO of Queen’s Health Systems, Art Ushijima. I would like to ask them to stand and be recognized. Thank you for reminding us that we all can take on a role in helping others.

“I should also note that Lieutenant Governor Josh Green will be the state’s new point person on leveraging private-sector partnerships to address the chronically homeless in our community, which includes some of the most difficult situations to resolve. He will be working closely with Scott Morishige, the state’s homeless coordinator, who will continue to lead the state’s overall homeless efforts.

“I strongly believe that our response to homelessness must address both immediate concerns and its underlying cause: the lack of adequate affordable housing. That’s why this year’s budget includes \$315 million for housing over the next two years. In the past four years, we’ve produced a total of 6,600 units with over 7,100 in the pipeline, 90 percent of which will be rentals.

“We have also struggled with the reality that the lack of affordable housing affects more than just families at risk. It impacts all of us. For many in Hawai‘i, homeownership has always seemed like a farfetched dream. The high cost of land will always be a significant barrier to making homes affordable, and on an island with little capacity to expand, demand will always outpace our limited supply. It seems like a no-win situation, perhaps until now. How do you make homes in Hawai‘i affordable? I believe you do it by thinking outside of the box—by looking at what you **do** have and not focusing on what you **don’t** have. We need to use public resources and public authority to break the cycle of speculation and profit-taking that has turned affordable housing into an unreachable goal for our people. That’s why we will be submitting legislation to build condominiums for sale on state lands utilizing 99-year leases. These will include parcels along the

transit route as well as on other underutilized state lands. This legislation will be critical to unlocking the potential for thousands of new affordable housing units to be built on state lands on all islands. The state will retain ownership of the land under these condos and determine the terms of resale if the owners decide to sell at a later date. In this way, we will be able to keep these units affordable, plan growth, create jobs, and make the most of unused state lands. We can take a no-win situation and turn it into a win-win situation. My thanks to State Senator Stanley Chang, whose input went a long way in helping us shape this initiative.

“We have long talked about transit-oriented development as one of the benefits of rail: as a way to build communities and provide housing for our families. But it’s not just about rail. On Maui, for example, we have a great example of how the state and county are working together to build a new transit hub at the Kahului Civic Center. Together, we are transforming underutilized state land into a vibrant, new mixed-use project with multi-family affordable rental housing, senior housing, and office space. It’s a good example of the collaboration happening between state and county on behalf of the people.

“In addition to controlling and directing growth, planned development allows us to accommodate other priorities as well. Our future requires that over time, we, as a state, acquire and preserve more and more land, either as a state or in the hands of partners like the Trust for Public Lands and The Nature Conservancy. If we want green spaces; if we want to grow our own food; if we want places for recreation; if we want clean, fresh water; if we want the environment that has been so central to Hawai‘i’s life, we need to have special lands in public hands.

“Take, for example, the new state Helemano Wilderness Recreation Area: 2,900 acres of former plantation and conservation land now dedicated to protecting our watershed and wildlife habitat and providing outdoor recreational opportunities for all. In October 2018, the Trust for Public Land and the state completed the purchase of four parcels of land from Dole Food Company using a creative combination of private, federal, and state funding. In an earlier time, those lands might have been sacrificed to uncontrolled development. To a certain extent, this project was made possible because we have a plan for future development on O‘ahu, for directed growth to our urban core and along our fixed transit system. That lessens the pressure for development on other areas, including important agricultural and preservation lands.

“It also allows us to initiate discussions with other private landowners who have expressed an interest in developing lands in places like Kāne‘ohe and Maunawili. We would prefer to negotiate acquisition agreements with them so that we can realize similar benefits to our natural resources and recreational venues. For those unfamiliar with the neighborhoods, Kāne‘ohe and Maunawili both include areas that the landowners have proposed for housing development. But they also contain the mauka source of freshwater streams that feed ancient lo‘i and flow into vital coastal waters of Kāne‘ohe Bay and Kawai Nui Marsh. They contain some of the richest agricultural lands on O‘ahu and have been farmed by ancient Hawaiians for centuries. They are irreplaceable natural resources and part of the economic, ecological, and cultural heritage of Ko‘olaupoko. These places are worth saving for us and for future generations. That’s why we are requesting increased funding for land conservation by removing the \$6.8 million cap on the 10 percent conveyance tax to the Legacy Land Conservation Program. And I’ve also instructed DLNR to prioritize a strategic plan to help us better identify and coordinate the acquisition of such parcels of land going forward.

“In addition to the preservation of important conservation and agricultural lands, we have established strong guidelines to protect our watershed forests, better manage our oceans,

strengthen invasive species prevention through our biosecurity plan, double our local food production, and achieve 100 percent renewable energy by 2045. Our budget includes \$3.9 million over two years for Sustainable Hawai‘i initiatives, to support our biosecurity plan, watershed protection, and our Agriculture Loan Revolving Fund.

“And, speaking of sustainability, I would be remiss if I didn’t mention that last November, Hawai‘i was designated one of the United Nations’ first Local 2030 sustainability hubs—the first and only such forum in the Pacific. I would like to thank Hawai‘i Green Growth and the Kamehameha Schools for their work in achieving this designation. They are highlighting our achievements and helping to establish Hawai‘i as a leader in sustainability in the Pacific.

“In addition, private companies are investing in Hawai‘i to help us meet our sustainability goals. For example, Ampaire has a memorandum of understanding with Mokulele Airlines to deploy an electric airplane on Maui. CarbonCure is working with the Hawai‘i Department of Transportation, HC&D, and Hawai‘i Gas to develop carbon-infused concrete to lower the carbon dioxide emitted during the construction process.

“And our public utilities have also made great progress in transitioning to a renewable-energy future. Earlier this month, Kaua‘i Island Utilities Co-op announced it had reached 50 percent renewable generation and believes it can reach 70 percent renewable energy a full 10 years ahead of schedule. In the last 10 years, Hawaiian Electric Companies have reduced fossil fuel use to generate electricity by 26 percent—that’s 48 million gallons fewer of imported oil each and every year. The companies have also pioneered technology to integrate more renewable energy into the electrical grid, and delegations from around the world are coming to Hawai‘i to learn from our experience.

“In agriculture, we are entering a new age of innovation, one that will bring new jobs and opportunities and decrease our reliance on imported foods. The future of agriculture relies on producing crops more efficiently and with less impact on the environment. Farmers are constructing cutting-edge greenhouses, using automated production systems, and analyzing data to increase crop yields. These modern practices will require new skills and a workforce grounded in science- and math-related education. Companies like Costco want to build high-tech greenhouses and use these new agricultural techniques in Hawai‘i to complement the food production of local farmers and replace fruits and vegetables from out-of-state.

“Just as the nurturing of our natural environment is critical to the future of these islands, so, too, is the nurturing of those who, together, make up our human resource, including those who are incarcerated. There are some who hold fast to the old notion of crime and punishment and scoff at the concept of second chances, but correctional facilities today need to be more than just a secure holding cell. They need to be places where an individual can take stock of his or her life and seek a second chance to become a contributing member of society. If we don’t, then our jails **will** become a place for repeat offenders, at a terrible cost to them and to all of us. We are seeking to continue the process of replacing the outdated correctional center in Kalihi. The relocation gives us a chance to provide enhanced services and program opportunities that would aid in rehabilitation. I agree with Representative Gregg Takayama and Senator Clarence Nishihara, who have led the committees on public safety: It’s a chance to rethink how we design and build correctional facilities. If we are legally obligated to carry out judgments of the courts whenever confinement is ordered, then let’s do it in a way that doesn’t make matters worse for those incarcerated. If we disagree on this location, how big it should be, or the programming that should be offered—fair enough.

Let's work together to define it. Let's take this initiative and move it forward, with thoughtful planning and with purpose.

"And let me add one more thought on this matter. For several generations now, the community of Kalihi has hosted OCCC with little protest in its backyard. While it is not the primary reason to relocate O'ahu's outdated jail, the chance to revitalize the community of Kalihi by using that vacated space to create new economic and social opportunities is another good reason to relocate OCCC.

"Concern for others—whether they are homeless, incarcerated, disadvantaged, our children, or the community at large—that is the hallmark of who we are. Concern for others is why we are submitting legislation to bring the minimum wage closer to a real living wage. Concern for others also underlies the reason why we work so hard to provide economic opportunities for all to realize their dreams, whatever they may be. But to translate those concerns into meaningful action takes resources. That's why we must also be cognizant of the needs of the counties. To help them do their jobs better, we will be asking the Legislature to remove the current \$103 million cap on the TAT and return the tax to how it originally functioned: allocating to the counties a straight percentage of TAT funds collected. In other words, the counties' share would rise and fall based on the amount of money collected, without any cap on the high side. There is a fairness to that formula that speaks volumes not only about our concern for others, but our willingness to work with the counties as equal partners in moving the state forward. It's a change in the whole notion of revenue-sharing whose time has come. Let me add that the bill we're submitting would also increase from three to ten million dollars monies earmarked to maintain our state parks, trails, beaches, and waters to the benefit of both residents and visitors alike.

"In 2018, Mother Nature threw a lot our way: historic volcanic eruptions, hurricanes, and floods. And yet, I find that we, as a people, are amazingly resilient and resourceful. We should all applaud those on Hawai'i island who faced devastating volcanic eruptions and others on Kaua'i and O'ahu who were buffeted by damaging hurricanes and floods and who refused to be defeated by those events. We will work with the Legislature to continue our support for those families affected, as they put their lives back on track.

"Finally, we have spent the last four years implementing frameworks that will help guide us along the continuum that will extend far beyond the next four years: our blueprint for education, our clean energy portfolio, and our sustainability roadmap. The major initiatives that I've highlighted this morning—on public preschool education, affordable leasehold condominiums, and the TAT adjustment—are built upon these and other frameworks.

"But to realize our goals, it will take more than just this administration, more than government, more than the private sector, or community service and nonprofit organizations. It will take all of us. In my inaugural address, I talked about the need to work together. Little did I expect that the leaders in Washington would underscore my point by shutting down the federal government. That, my friends, is what gridlock looks like. Tragically, it has been devastating for the many federal workers caught in the middle, and increasingly for the general public. I began my remarks this morning with the notion that the future is personal. Leadership is also personal, and it has a name, and it is 'Us.' We have a duty and responsibility to do our jobs and do them in partnership with each other. That is the **least** those folks up there in the gallery—the people we all work for—expect from us. But I know we can do so much more if we work together, and it begins with me, and it begins with all of you. That's why we have been meeting with the Senate and the House: to see if we can establish a common ground from which

both houses can better shape a budget that serves all the people of Hawai'i.

"After four years in this office, I know that what I am asking is not an easy task. It has never been. But it becomes easier if we remember that little girl who was born in Kona in the very early morning hours of January 1st. She's the reason we do what we do. She is the real source of our strength and our determination and our commitment to the people of Hawai'i. She is the one who will carry on the values that were passed on to us from our parents: reverence for our kūpuna, love for family, respect for each other, and love for this 'āina and this place we call home. We are here to protect her and nurture her. In turn, she enriches our lives. We have much to teach her, and she has much to teach us. I hope and pray that one of the most important things that we instill in her is empathy and compassion for others: empathy for those who are homeless even while she sleeps safe and warm in her own bed; compassion for those who go hungry even when she is generously nursed and nurtured; compassion for those who cannot make ends meet even if she thrives with a career that meets all of her needs; and empathy for those who find themselves without a country or face a wall that is far more daunting than any physical one we could ever build. Empathy and compassion are no strangers to those raised in these islands or to those who embrace our shared values. We do not often speak of them by those names, but rather by one word we hold above all others: aloha. Alekah Obra Garcia is our future, and we welcome her with loving open arms. We have a job to do to prepare these islands for her, so let's get started, shall we? Thank you, and aloha."

Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Ige. Based on my remarks last week when we opened in the Senate chambers, while I will not have a grandchild who will be a classmate of Alekah Garcia, class of 2037, nonetheless, I certainly share the vision, the dreams, and the hopes that you have for her and all the rest of the children of Hawai'i. I'd like to paraphrase from Dr. Martin Luther King: 'The measure of an individual is not what you do in times of comfort but what you do in times of adversity.' Last year, in spite of different political choices by each and every one of us that we were going to make in the upcoming election, we rose above the politics and joined together to create an amazing agenda for the people of Hawai'i in affordable housing, in dealing with homelessness, in dealing with the disasters that we were confronted with, and I stand committed—as I said on the Senate floor last week Wednesday—to work with you, Governor, to create that future. To my colleagues in the House, I have never had a better feeling than gaveling out at the end of last year, looking back to see everything that we could all accomplish together. I look forward to having a better feeling when we hit the gavel at the end of session this year, and I would simply close by quoting Ecclesiastes 4:9–10: 'Two are better than one because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up.' So my hand will be out for the whole session to my colleagues in the House and to you, Governor Ige and Lieutenant Governor Green."

At 10:58 a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At 9:10 a.m., on motion by Senator Kahele, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Chief Justice’s State of the Judiciary Address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2019, was called to order at 10:06 a.m. by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Thirtieth Legislature:

The President then appointed Senators Karl Rhoads, J. Kalani English, and Kurt Fevella, on behalf of the Senate, and Representatives Chris Lee, Della Au Belatti, and Bob McDermott, on behalf of the House of Representatives, to escort the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Senate President Kouchi also introduced the Honorable James E. Duffy, Jr., former Associate Justice, Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i.

Senator Maile S.L. Shimabukuro and Representative Joy A. San Buenaventura presented Chief Justice Recktenwald with maile and 'ilima lei.

The President then presented to the members of the Thirtieth Legislature and guests the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i.

Chief Justice Recktenwald addressed the Joint Session as follows:

“Good morning, aloha. President Kouchi; Speaker Saiki; Governor and Mrs. Ige; Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Green; members of the Senate and House; Mrs. Ariyoshi; Governor and Mrs. Waihe'e; Chief Justice Moon; my fellow justices, judges, and Judiciary staff; members of the Consular Corps and the Royal Order of Kamehameha; distinguished guests and friends: Once again, good morning and aloha.

“I'd like to thank the Legislature for this opportunity to speak today. I am grateful for your strong support of the Judiciary and, in particular, for enabling us to achieve the decades-old vision of constructing a modern, secure courthouse for the people of Kona. Thanks to you, the new Keaholu Courthouse will open this fall, **on time** and **on budget**. Thank you so much.

“The judiciary has one mission—to provide justice. We offer a fair and impartial forum where people can peacefully resolve their disputes. We strive to ensure the peace they find is a **lasting** one by helping them address the causes of what brought them before the courts. And, we provide justice for **all**, regardless of the person's background or economic status. Under our constitution, the Judiciary is sometimes called upon to protect the rights of those whose views may be unpopular. In

making decisions, our judges must faithfully apply the constitutions and laws of the United States and Hawai'i to the facts of **each** case—free from passion, pressure, or outside influence.

“While our core values are timeless, the tools we use to achieve our mission cannot be frozen in time. We must constantly ask whether our justice system is achieving the results that our people rightfully expect. We appreciate it when the Legislature asks tough questions, because **we** are asking those questions ourselves: Is our criminal justice system keeping our communities safe, while respecting the constitutional rights of defendants who are awaiting trial? Are we rehabilitating those who have been convicted? Is our civil justice system providing justice that is timely and affordable?

“While there is much work to do, we have a strong foundation to build on. Our efforts to increase access to our civil courts have received national recognition. With the support of the Legislature and the Bar, we are exploring new ways to use technology. These range from using text messages to remind criminal defendants to appear for court to using artificial intelligence to make the civil litigation process more understandable for self-represented litigants.

“We have made progress because we have so many partners who share our passion for providing justice for all, including the Legislature; the executive branch, with Governor Ige and Lieutenant Governor Green; the Hawaii State Bar Association; the William S. Richardson School of Law; the American Judicature Society; and the community as a whole.

“Last year, approximately 500,000 cases were filed in our courts, including traffic offenses. Each day, our judges address some of the most sensitive and challenging problems facing our community—from violent crimes to bitter disagreements between divorcing spouses to complex environmental cases. I will address each of those areas—our criminal, family, and civil courts—to highlight the challenges we face and the opportunities we see.

“Our criminal courts are home to some of our most innovative programs. In order to keep our communities **truly** safe, we are often called upon to address the underlying challenges, such as substance abuse and mental illness, that defendants face. ‘One size fits all’ simply doesn't work in this context, so we offer programs that are targeted to specific populations: Drug Court, HOPE probation, Mental Health Court, and Veterans Treatment Court, to name a few.

“One recent example of this approach involves homeless individuals, some of whom have multiple cases in our district courts for nonviolent offenses such as sleeping in public parks. With the strong support of the Legislature, we partnered with the prosecuting attorney and the public defender to launch Community Outreach Court on O'ahu. The goal is to enable homeless individuals to resolve their pending cases by performing community service, while offering them services that can get them back on their feet.

“Since the program started in 2017, 102 participants have performed more than 2,100 hours of community service, and more than 1,100 pending cases have been cleared. Many participants have found jobs, housing and more stable shelter, and have earned driver's license permits.

“When we started the program, court sessions were held in a typical court setting: a courthouse in downtown Honolulu, with a judge sitting up high on the bench. Thanks to funding from the Legislature, we were able to expand the program to Wahiawā district court. But the vision has always been to hold sessions outside of a traditional courthouse to make the program more accessible. This became a reality in September, when Judge Darolyn Lendio held court at the Wai'anae Public

Library. She sat at a plastic folding table, at eye level with the participants. And **that** truly is justice in action! We have several participants from the Community Outreach Court in the gallery today, along with Judge Lono Lee, Deputy Court Administrator Calvin Ching, and the staff and community partners. Could they all please stand and be recognized?

“There are other significant developments underway in our criminal justice system. The first involves reforming the way we handle criminal defendants who have been accused of crimes but are awaiting trial. Under the law, they are presumed innocent and are entitled to bail or other forms of release except to the extent necessary to ensure their appearance and protect the community if they pose a danger. Low-risk defendants should **not** be in jail simply because they are too poor to afford bail. At the same time, the community must be protected from those who are dangerous.

“A number of states have undertaken pretrial reforms. In response to House Concurrent Resolution 134, the Judiciary convened a task force led by circuit judges Rom Trader and Shirley Kawamura. That task force had 30 members, including the chiefs of police and prosecuting attorneys of all four counties (and I appreciate many of them being here today), defense attorneys (including the public defender, and I appreciate Jack Tonaki being here today), the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and other agencies, and Senator Clarence Nishihara and Representative Scott Nishimoto. They recently delivered a comprehensive report with recommendations for legislative and administrative action.

“The Judiciary is already implementing several of the recommendations, such as obtaining more information about each defendant’s ability to afford bail. We are also creating an electronic reminder system for defendants so they can receive text reminders before their next scheduled court date. We have implemented this system on the neighbor islands, and expect to extend it to First Circuit district court in February. These reminders increase the likelihood that defendants will appear and save scarce public resources by decreasing the number of bench warrants that are issued.

“Another important statewide initiative is the Prison Reform Task Force chaired by my colleague Justice Michael Wilson. This task force, with broad representation from the community, including Senator Nishihara and Representative Gregg Takayama, studied effective incarceration policies in other jurisdictions, and has made recommendations to improve Hawai‘i’s correctional system by focusing on rehabilitation. Those recommendations include expanding drug court to provide an alternative to incarceration for defendants with serious drug problems.

“I thank Judges Trader and Kawamura, Justice Wilson, and the members of both task forces. Thanks to their hard work, we have a unique opportunity to make Hawai‘i safer, and our criminal justice system more fair and effective.

“Our family courts also have a long tradition of innovation and working collaboratively with many partners to protect Hawai‘i’s children and support Hawai‘i’s families. Virtually all of the youth in our juvenile justice system have been subjected to trauma in their lives, so we have focused on addressing the effects of that trauma. That approach has worked. Over the last 10 years, the number of youth held in custody has **decreased** by 61 percent. I want to thank the senior family court judges who have led this effort, including Mark Browning, Cathy Remigio, and Christine Kuriyama, and our entire family court team. While these strategies require additional resources up front, that expense is modest in comparison to the cost, both financial **and** social, of having these children become adult offenders.

“We have many programs, such as Girls Court, that have contributed to these positive results by providing individualized care where it can help the most. Notably, our O‘ahu Juvenile Drug Court, which provides drug treatment and intense supervision, last year had the **lowest** recidivism rate since the program began in 2001.

“Another example of this individualized approach is the Family Court’s effort to address truancy by collaborating with the Department of Education to intervene **early** when children start missing school, and addressing the circumstances that caused them to be absent.

“This approach resulted in a significant decrease in the number of unexcused absences when we first used it at Wai‘anae Intermediate School. Building on that success, the Judiciary launched another truancy collaboration on Kaua‘i, under the leadership of Judge Edmund Acoba, at Waimea Canyon Middle and High School. That effort reduced truancy petitions in the district from 56 in 2016 to only 6 the following year. And on the Big Island, we recently launched another truancy collaboration under the leadership of Judge Darien Nagata at Kea‘au Middle School, with partners including The Salvation Army and the Children’s Law Project.

“Other important innovations include a public-private partnership to build a center for youth offenders, along with nearly 200 affordable rental apartments on Alder Street in Honolulu. This project—which is expected to be completed by 2021—will include a 24-hour youth shelter, and a meeting space for youth to take after-school classes and receive other vital services. We are grateful to Speaker Scott Saiki, Councilmember Ann Kobayashi, the Hawaii Housing and Finance Development Corporation, and the many others who are making this project possible. This is the first joint partnership of its kind between two branches of government and a private entity, so, again, thank you to all of those folks who made this possible for us.

“Our family courts also address some of the most heartbreaking cases we see involving the abuse and neglect of children. Some are newborns whose mothers abused crystal meth or alcohol during their pregnancy; others are mere toddlers. To meet their special needs, we have created a Zero to Three Court designed to provide them with permanency as quickly as possible, whether through reunification with their parents, legal guardianship, or adoption to a safe, new home.

“To cite one example, a homeless family entered the program as a result of a domestic violence report. The Zero to Three team helped them obtain employment and find an apartment, furniture, and household goods. Thanks to these steps, the family eventually was reunited. The judge and the court team members took the time to show these parents that they mattered—and sometimes, that is the most important thing we can do to help families succeed.

“Finally, I want to thank the Legislature for its support of our efforts to more effectively address domestic violence. In 2017, the Women’s Legislative Caucus held meetings across the state to hear from stakeholders, including domestic violence survivors and advocates. We made several significant changes as a result. For example, the Kaua‘i YWCA is now providing free assistance in our Lihu‘e courthouse to individuals who are seeking petitions for temporary restraining orders.

“Turning to our civil courts, there have been profound changes in the civil justice system nationwide. In 2008, a national survey of several thousand lawyers concluded that America’s civil justice system was ‘in serious need of repair—it takes too long and costs too much.’ That report jumpstarted interest in rethinking how civil litigation is conducted. A

number of states and the federal courts explored ways to improve.

“Here in Hawai‘i, there has been much discussion about this issue during our annual bench-bar meetings, which have become a valuable source of feedback for the Judiciary. As a result of that input, in June of last year, I created the Task Force on Civil Justice Improvements for Hawai‘i’s Circuit Courts, chaired by retired Chief Judge Craig Nakamura. Seven current and retired judges and 17 attorneys are also serving on the task force, and expect to submit their report later this year.

“In our district courts, we have a high percentage of litigants who are representing themselves. To make the court more accessible to them, we are revising our most commonly used forms to make them more understandable. Moreover, we are identifying opportunities to use technology to help them.

“Deputy Chief Judge Lono Lee is leading a group that is evaluating online dispute resolution alternatives for small claims cases. This project could enable civil litigants to mediate certain types of claims online, and if online mediation is unsuccessful, the parties could then, by agreement, have a judge quickly resolve the case based on documents and other materials submitted online. Online dispute resolution is **not** appropriate for every litigant, such as those with limited English proficiency or without access to the internet, but for some people, the possibility of being able to resolve their dispute without having to come into a brick-and-mortar courthouse will be very appealing.

“Also, I am happy to share that the Judiciary’s online electronic filing system is set to launch in our civil courtrooms this fall. People will be able to file documents electronically and access case information 24/7, much like what is available now for criminal and appellate cases. I’d like to thank Judge Gary Chang and his team for their hard work in developing this system.

“We are also making significant strides in increasing access to our civil courtrooms for those who cannot afford an attorney. Last year marked the tenth anniversary of the Hawai‘i Access to Justice Commission, which is chaired by retired Justice Simeon Acoba. The Commission has championed many significant initiatives, such as our self-help centers, where volunteer attorneys provide legal assistance to self-represented litigants. More than 24,000 people have been helped so far. The centers are a great example of what can be accomplished when we work together, and I want to thank the Hawaii State Bar Association and its president, Derek Kobayashi, and Executive Director Pat Mau-Shimizu; the Legal Aid Society of Hawai‘i and its executive director, Nalani Fujimori Kaina; the county bar associations, who’ve been great partners in so many of our initiatives; and all the volunteer attorneys for making this resource available to the community.

“Often, people find themselves in court when they are experiencing turmoil in their lives, and the experience can be daunting. The Judiciary launched a Volunteer Court Navigator program in the Second Circuit that helps those who do not have an attorney. Court navigators assist individuals when they appear in district court civil cases, such as landlord-tenant disputes or debt collection cases. Court navigators help in small but important ways by helping to ensure that parties arrive at the proper courtroom, check in, and respond when called on, among other things.

“Thanks to the enthusiasm of the volunteer navigators and the leadership of our 2018 Jurist of the Year Chief Judge Joseph Cardoza, more than 200 people have been helped through the program, and it is now being piloted in the First Circuit.

“All of our work on access to justice has helped establish national recognition for Hawai‘i, which has opened doors to

increased resources for our efforts. One project championed by Majority Leader Della Au Belatti is creating an interagency roundtable on access to justice. Another involves training for ‘community navigators,’ trusted leaders such as a respected teacher, church pastor, or kupuna. By providing them with the necessary tools and information, they can help members of the community access our civil legal system.

“Another project that is garnering national attention is the ‘Legal Navigator’ portal, which was made possible thanks to the contributions of Microsoft, the Legal Services Corporation, ProBono Net, and the leadership of the Legal Aid Society of Hawai‘i. Microsoft has dedicated close to \$2 million worth of resources to Hawai‘i and Alaska to develop an online legal services portal that will use artificial intelligence to help people identify legal problems, and then access critical resources. This transformative project will launch later this year and will **empower** those whose voices might not otherwise be heard.

“Although we have undertaken many of these initiatives with existing resources, in some instances we need additional funding to address new challenges. This session, we are respectfully requesting funding for four new judges: a family court position on Kaua‘i, where we currently have only one full-time family court judge; a family court judge on O‘ahu, where some judges have calendars nearing 3,000 cases per year; a district court judge on O‘ahu to help handle the increased number of DUI cases and expand Drug Court; and a district court judge on Maui, where the population has more than doubled since the last position was added in 1982. Additionally, we are asking for several staff to support the Community Outreach Court, a permanent position for the Zero to Three Court, maintenance staff and funds to operate the Keahuoli courthouse when it opens, and additional funds for domestic violence services for Maui county, among other needs. Finally, our construction-related requests are all focused on repairs, maintenance, and keeping our current buildings safe and secure.

“We appreciate your consideration of our requests and stand ready to provide any information you may need.

“In conclusion, one of the most fundamental challenges we face as an independent branch of government is building trust and understanding of the Judiciary’s mission. We do this in many different ways. For example, it became apparent last year that we needed to do more to ensure that the use of ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i was encouraged and protected in our courts. We adopted a policy to ensure that parties who want to express themselves to the court in the Hawaiian language are able to do so, and we have actively recruited more interpreters for that purpose. Also, in response to House Resolution 110, we have held Hawaiian language training for more than 400 judges and staff. And earlier this month, we began calling cases in the Hawai‘i Supreme Court in **both** Hawaiian **and** English.

“In addition, we are engaging our young people so they understand the role of the courts in our democracy. Under the Courts in the Community program, the Supreme Court holds oral argument in schools across the state in real cases with volunteer attorneys visiting classrooms to help the students understand the issues. This program has had an incredible impact. So far, we have held 13 oral arguments, with more than 4,500 students from 61 schools participating. Many partners assist us with this program—the volunteer attorneys who visit the classrooms; the Hawaii State Bar Foundation, which provides buses and lunches for the students; law students from the William S. Richardson School of Law, which has been a great partner in so many initiatives; and the teachers who work with the Judiciary History Center to incorporate our program in their lesson plans and who welcome the volunteer attorneys into their classrooms, and I want to extend my thanks to each and every one of them for making this program possible.

“Another important component of building public trust is a judicial selection process that ensures we have highly qualified judges who reflect and understand our community. Although there are many reasons why people become judges, our robust system of judicial selection and retention has attracted individuals who are highly qualified **and** who reflect the diversity of our community. As Chief Justice, I appoint the judges who serve in our district and family courts, and I am pleased to report that we now have an equal number of men and women serving on the bench in these courts.

“We can never forget that our diversity is a great source of strength. The late governor John A. Burns stood before this legislature nearly 50 years ago, in February 1969, and delivered one of his most famous speeches. Governor Burns spoke about the ‘tremendous power of Hawai‘i as a source of inspiration’ and reminded his listeners about how ‘it is through an understanding of our backgrounds, our heritage, that we can best achieve amicable accommodation of the diversity of views that is the hallmark of a truly democratic society. Let us clearly understand that diversity and division are not the same. In diversity there can be unity.’

“The wisdom reflected in those words guides us at the Judiciary. I thank our dedicated judges, staff, and volunteers for treating everyone who comes before us with respect, fairness, and compassion. By doing so, we provide a place where **all** of Hawai‘i’s people can find justice. We thank the Legislature and our other partners for supporting us in that cause, and look forward to working with each of you in the years ahead. Mahalo and aloha.”

Speaker Saiki then rose and stated:

“Thank you, Chief Justice Recktenwald, for your eloquent and judicious message. I’m sure that the Senate President will agree with me that not many people realize how challenging it is to manage and administer a branch of government, especially when you have to count the votes. So, could we just please give the chief justice another round of applause for his work?”

At 10:39 a.m., Speaker Saiki declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Mr. President, colleagues, I certainly hope that the governor will not wait until the 41st day in order to provide us with governor's messages outlining his directors and deputies. Mahalo."

At this time, Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Colleagues, today is the 15th annual Go Red for Women Day, and I would like to read just a few quick facts that highlight the importance of the American Heart Association’s work. First, heart disease is the number one killer of women, taking more lives than all forms of cancer. Physical activity reduces a woman’s risk for heart disease and stroke, but in the U.S. only one in five women are getting the recommended amount of physical activity. (I think I fall in that category, unfortunately.) Third, healthy eating is critical to managing the weight and preventing cardiovascular disease in women, but poor dietary habits are the cause of about 45 percent of the U.S. deaths by heart disease, stroke, and type 2 diabetes. Smoking is the leading cause of preventable heart disease and stroke death, and high blood pressure is the second leading cause. Nearly half of the United States adults have high blood pressure.

“As you can see, heart disease affects many women in Hawai’i and around the world. However, the American Heart Association’s Go Red for Women campaign has led a nearly 90 percent increase in awareness among women, but we still have a long way to go. But I’d like to thank the American Heart Association for its hard work, and I’d like to thank all of our colleagues who found some kind of red to wear today, and I’d like to recognize in the gallery the director of government relations and communications for the American Heart Association of Hawaii, Mr. Don Weisman. And he is joined by community impact senior director Aly Hite. So, thank you to all of the colleagues for finding some red, and for you, Mr. President: You look fabulous in your red jacket, and I’ll send that email to confirm.

“I would also just like to add to my point of personal privilege that I appreciate seeing those governor’s messages on our OD. Mahalo.”

Senator Thielen rose to appreciate Senator Baker as a champion of Go Red for Women Day, and said that she looked forward to seeing her in the stairwell to push for women’s health.

Senator Kahele shared that the number two nationally-ranked University of Hawai’i men’s volleyball team would be playing number seven-ranked Stanford that evening at 7:00 p.m. at the Stan Sheriff Center, and invited the members to watch the game.

Senator Rhoads commented, in good humor, that if the members should go to the volleyball game, then they shouldn’t wear red.

Monday, February 4, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator Shimabukuro commended the students and teachers of the 'A'ali'i Program, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, on the first day of Hawaiian Caucus Week here at the State Capitol, we are honoring outstanding 'ōpio, or youth, who have made impactful contributions to their community. Although the 'ōpio are not able to be here with us today, the Senate Hawaiian Caucus is proud to honor the students and teachers from the 'A'ali'i Program at Nānākuli High and Intermediate School.

"The students, with support from their kūmu, Hawaiian Civic Club members, and the Wai'anae community, have been advocating for the restoration of the Wai'anae Kai Forest Reserve and the return of water to the Wai'anae watershed streams for traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practice. These students engage with their local neighborhood boards on the Wai'anae Coast, local farmers, members of the Hawaiian agriculture community, and the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. In their advocacy, the students learn about the legislative process. They learned how to write and present testimony and, more importantly, developed a passion for Native Hawaiian water rights. Although it took three years for the students to pass a resolution through the Annual Convention of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, the students persevered and got a resolution passed at last year's convention on Kaua'i. Kamehameha Schools even highlighted these students in 2018 during the preshow of their 98th annual songfest.

"Many of the students from the 'A'ali'i Program have either graduated, furthered their education, or are new parents, but their hard work, perseverance, and contributions continue to inspire future students. Representing the students here today are Tammy Jones and Tara Ferron. Both Tammy and Tara currently work for the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. Tammy is a teacher and a strong supporter of place-based education and worked very closely with the cohort of students who submitted the resolution in 2016 to 2018. Tara taught at Nānākuli High and Intermediate School, and was a teacher to these 'ōpio when they were in middle school. It takes a village to raise a child, and I would like to commend the hard-working parents, teachers, and community members from the Wai'anae Coast who fostered these students and their passion to make their community a better place. Colleagues, please join me once again in recognizing and commending the students and teachers of the 'A'ali'i Program from Nānākuli High and Intermediate School. May Tammy Jones and Tara Ferron please stand to be recognized? Thank you."

Senator Thielen introduced Scotty Reis-Moniz, a constituent and volunteer extraordinaire.

Senator Inouye welcomed Sandi Weir and a special group of guests from Alaska Cruise Lines, who were seated in the gallery with Charlie Toguchi.

Senator Kahele recognized Joseph Kūhiō Lewis, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, as we celebrate Hawaiian Caucus Week here at the Legislature, it's my honor this morning to introduce our second honoree for Hawaiian Caucus Week as we, today, celebrate outstanding mākuā, or parents, in our Native Hawaiian community. The individual I'm going to introduce you to is, without question, a leader in his community. He is a dedicated champion of Native Hawaiian issues, and he's someone who embodies ha'aha'a—humility—and honesty, diligence, and someone who leads by example for his children, and so I'm proud to introduce to you today's honoree, Mr. Joseph Kūhiō Lewis; could you please stand?"

"Colleagues, Kūhiō is a proud product of Hawai'i's public education system—a graduate of McKinley High School; he is a graduate of Honolulu Community College and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. He has since then served as the president of the Kapolei Community Development Corporation, then as a community outreach and engagement manager. Also, he has served at the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. He is a member of the Hawaiian Civic Clubs; he's also a member of the Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems and, presently, is the chief executive officer of the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement.

"What I admire the most about Kūhiō is his love and his dedication and his strong values for his children and how he leaves a lasting impression on them as a father and a parent. Kūhiō is a single father: He raises his son, Bryson

Makanaokalani, and daughter, Breana Kawaiola, and he embodies in them what it means to be a Native Hawaiian, and the important culture and rich and diverse history and the vibrancy of everything that it means to be Hawai'i. Kūhiō is a skilled listener; he's someone who has various different perspectives. He is someone who tries to find common ground in very difficult issues, and he brings an insightful approach to the challenges that we face in Hawai'i today.

"And so I'd like to, again, introduce to you and ask for a round of applause for who I would consider a very distinguished leader in the State of Hawai'i: Mr. Joseph Kūhiō Lewis. Could we also get his children, Breana and Bryson, to stand? And I would also like to recognize, colleagues, his father, Dickie, who is in the gallery, if his father, Dickie, could please stand. Mahalo, Dickie."

At 11:45 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

She's a lifelong resident of the district and a great advocate for the community of Kahana. Welcome today, Aunty Ulu.

"So, for over 20 years, she was a Native Hawaiian affairs consultant to Outrigger Hotels. Aunty Ulu was also a member of the State House of Representatives; she served in the Seventeenth Legislature in 1993 and '94. And over the past four decades, Ulu has been involved in many organizations, including the Coalition of Hawaiian Organizations and Hui Na'auao. In 1995, she was appointed by Governor John Waihe'e to the Hawaii Sovereignty Elections Council as a councilmember. She also served as a delegate on 'Aha 'Ōiwi Native Hawaiian Convention in the 1990s, and also on Na'i Aupuni: Native Hawaiian Governance Convention in 2016. I'll just say on the side: She stays very active and is one of the cultural interpreters in the Ahupua'a 'O Kahana State Park that we have. More recently, Aunty Ulu has been very active with the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, and she is the president of the Ko'olauloa Hawaiian Civic Club and has been for the last 10 years. She's a dedicated community leader who consistently advocates for issues affecting kūpuna, Ko'olauloa, the North Shore, and all of Hawai'i. Colleagues, please join me in recognizing Aunty Ulu Beirne.

"With Aunty Ulu is Troy Thompson, Louis Wallace, and Kamalani Johnson today, and Kaiwi Johnson, too. Welcome the family. And in the gallery, we have Sherri Lynn Johnson and Kahiau Wallace; Keaka Aumua with her husband, Zed Aumua; Puanani Beirne is with us today, I believe, and Charles Kaai, and other members of the Hawaiian Civic Clubs, so please all be welcomed. Aloha. Thank you."

Senator Rhoads acknowledged Bixby Ho, a friend and constituent, who was seated in the gallery.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Keith-Agaran introduced the 2019 Ka Ipu Kukui Fellows, who were accompanied in the gallery by Lori Teragawachi and Jeanne Skog; Neal Hoapili Ane, Sherman Baisa, Robert Bennett, Daryl Fujiwara, Jonathan Jennings, Gabriel Lucy, Leonardo Lunario, Saumalu Mataafa, Shaun Pederson, Chase Kawika Rogers, Lopaka White, Jodi Arisumi, Lauren Armstrong, Grazel Caceres, Lana Ruth Kaimipono Coryell, Chandy Ann Lopes, Cristina Schenk, and Alana Yurkanin.

Senator Moriwaki introduced Timothy I. Wee and LeNora N. Wee, longtime employees of the state now retired, and noted that LeNora contributed to the Senate by providing her administrative service skills.

Senator Keohokalole introduced his office staff, who were seated in the gallery: Julia Peleiholani, Kaila Ka'awaloa, Troy Pyler, and Jaren Tengan.

Senator Kanuha commended the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

"Here on the floor, we honor the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i for their contributions in the advancement of our Hawaiian lāhui, so: Welcome. Today, on the fourth day of the Hawaiian Caucus Week, we honor those individuals or organizations that have supported the Native Hawaiian community; they are Hawaiian at heart. On February 8, 1885, about 900 Japanese immigrants arrived in Hawai'i. The Japanese would quickly become one of the island kingdom's largest ethnic groups. Japanese immigrants were able to maintain strong cultural traditions in Hawai'i and be one of the Native Hawaiians' strongest allies. One such organization is the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i, who shares the living teachings of Jōdo Shinshū Buddhism so that all beings may enjoy a life of harmony, peace, and gratitude.

"The Honpa Hongwanji was established in Hawai'i in 1889 due to concerns for thousands of Japanese who had migrated to Hawai'i and may have been in need of some spiritual support; the mission became a spiritual and cultural center of Japanese immigrant life. On May 19, 1901, the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i was visited by Queen Lili'uokalani, accompanied by her dear friend Mrs. Mary Ward Foster, to attend services which honored Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jōdo Shinshū Buddhism. The Queen's visit to the Buddhist temple was a significant historical event which had a major impact on the Buddhist community in Hawai'i. During her visit, the Queen spoke of the value of heritage to all who call Hawai'i home.

"It is an appreciation of heritage that the Honpa Hongwanji share yearly when they recognize Living Treasures of Hawai'i. FIFTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 8, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Ihara who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fourteenth Day.

At this time, the Chair publicly acknowledged and thanked Danicia Honda, Senator Kidani's office manager, for her contributions to the community in working with young women from Wai'anae High School to prepare for their prom.

Senator Kahele introduced Kawika Perreira, a tenth-grade student at Saint Louis School, who was accompanied in the gallery by his mother, Dr. Trisha Kehaulani Watson; Dr. Benton Keali'i Pang of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs; and Elmer Ka'ai from the University of Hawai'i.

Senator Keohokalole recognized and honored the Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu and the Hawaiian Civic Club movement, and presented the following remarks:

"In the malama of Kaulua and the rising of the Kūlua, this 8th day of February during the 'Ōlelo Hawai'i Month marks the final day of Hawaiian Caucus Week. On Monday, we honored our 'ōpio from Nānākuli Intermediate and High School, and the process they took to fight for water rights. On Tuesday, we honored Joseph Kūhiō Lewis, a single parent raising his children with Hawaiian values. On Wednesday, we honored a kupuna, Auntie Ululani Beirne, for her advocacy in the fight and education on self-determination. And yesterday, we honored an ally, Honpa Hongwanji, for their contributions in the advancement of Native Hawaiians. This month, February, is the month for growing things in the Hawaiian calendar, and together we are planting the seeds to build an 'ahahui—an organization—so that those seeds will help grow our Native Hawaiian lāhui. Mr. President, with your permission, I'd like to yield my time to my fellow colleague from Maui Nui to share further about our 'ahahui."

Senator English rose to present the following remarks:

"The Hawaiian Civic Club movement was the fulfillment of a dream for Prince Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole. As a delegate to the United States Congress, with his concerns over the decline in spirit and devastating spike in the mortality rate of the Native Hawaiian people and the fear that they would not have the educational skills to protect their interests, Prince Kūhiō knew that he needed to plan and grow those grassroots to build an 'ahahui so the seeds would help grow our native lands. Along with the Hawaiian leaders, Prince Kūhiō recognized that Native Hawaiians were going through a very difficult period of adjustment after losing their nation, their lands, and their way of life. Mr. President, with your permission, I yield my time to the colleague from Moku o Keawe, Senator Kahele."

Senator Kahele rose to present the following remarks:

"In 1918, Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole and a group of his cohorts established and organized the Hawaiian Civic Club, now called the Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu. The Hawaiian Civic Club was formed with the objective of providing scholarship aid for the education of Hawaiian students; of preserving and promoting the Hawaiian heritage, traditions, language, and culture; of promoting and supporting

organizations interested in improving the lives and conditions of the Hawaiian people and community at large, as well as legislation beneficial to the Hawaiian community. It also advocated for the perpetuation of those values that dignify all human life, which are the moral and ethical foundation of our cultural expressions that comprise a unique, rich, and enduring legacy of the indigenous people of Hawai'i. The Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu was the first of 5 councils and 67 clubs to follow in the Hawaiian Civic Club movement, all working toward the goal of improving the lives for Native Hawaiians. The Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu continues to thrive and serve as a leader within the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs that was created in 1959 to facilitate the goals and objectives of bettering the conditions of Native Hawaiians. Mr. President, with your permission, I yield my time to the senator from the ahupua'a of Wai'anae for the introduction of our individual honorees."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Our first honoree, Charles Manu'aikohana Boyd, is a kumu hula, songwriter, composer, well-known entertainer, a cultural and protocol advisor, and is currently employed at Kamehameha Schools as their cultural consultant. Manu Boyd is the current pele kikena of the Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu. Also with him is Hailama Farden, and he is currently the new pele kikena of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. He currently is the regional director of Kamehameha Schools for Kona O'ahu. He is a leading language and cultural resource to many. Mr. President, with your permission, I yield my time now to the senator from Ko'olaupoko."

Senator Keohokalole rose and stated:

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Wednesday, February 13, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

"Colleagues, the Healthcare Association of Hawaii is a leading voice for healthcare providers in our state. The organization works to positively influence state and federal policy to provide quality and accessible health care to the people of Hawai'i. Before we get to the introductions of the folks on the floor, I'd like to recognize a couple of folks in our gallery: The head of the Healthcare Association of Hawaii, Hilton Raethel, and he's also joined by some of the other staff and members, so if all of those individuals could stand to be recognized, please?"

"Colleagues, through HAH Healthcare Heroes awards, patients are given the opportunity to acknowledge the service of outstanding healthcare providers, those who have demonstrated exceptional commitment and noteworthy expertise. These providers are honored for their exemplary care they deliver to patients and their loved ones across Hawai'i. They truly are the epitome of selfless service for the betterment of our community and, therefore, are more than worthy to be honored as a 2018 Healthcare Hero. I'd like to now yield the floor to Senator Rhoads for our first introduction."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"Our first Healthcare Hero is Dr. Christie Izutsu of O'ahu, who was nominated for this award by the family of the late Richard Kaneshiro. During Richard's medical journey, Dr. Izutsu was truly thoughtful and steadfast by being just one call away at all times. Working as a nephrologist at the Kidney Clinic of Hawaii, Dr. Izutsu demonstrates top-notch professionalism and compassionate care. She is dedicated to her profession, ensuring every single one of her patients receives unparalleled care. She uses a patient-centered team approach while also striving to make the tumultuous cancer journey as stress-free as possible. Her unwavering care for her patients, seen with her efforts as a listening ear and a guiding voice, makes her deserving of the award as a Healthcare Hero. Could we please give a round of applause to Dr. Izutsu? I would now like to yield the floor to Senator English. Mahalo."

Senator English rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next Healthcare Hero is nurse Valerie Janikowski from Lāna'i. One of Valerie's patients, Walter Hanog, says that if it weren't for Valerie, he may have lost his legs. But Valerie was not discouraged by Walter's complex medical scenario; as a home healthcare nurse, she cleaned and dressed his wounds, gave insulin shots, monitored his intravenous treatments, and organized his medication intake. She also arranged for off-island medical checkups, including air and ground transportation. It was comprehensive, compassionate caregiving. Now, with Valerie's dedicated care, Uncle Wally still has both of his legs and is able to walk again despite being told by several doctors that they would need to be amputated.

Valerie truly is a Healthcare Hero. I'd like to say mahalo, thank you very much, Valerie, and, from experience in the islands, kommol tata. I'd like to now yield the floor to Senator Kanuha."

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next Healthcare Hero is nurse Dee Ono from Hawai'i island, who has helped many of my family in Kona; mahalo for all that you've done in the community. Caring for people in their homes creates a special kind of patient-caregiver bond, and these relationships can naturally evolve into friendships. Through her kind and generous spirit, Dee inspires hope in patients who feel like there is none. One patient in particular is Clayton Punihaole: Through Dee's compassion and authenticity, she helped Clayton realize that dialysis was not a death sentence but just another chapter in life's story. Dee reassured Clayton that his family and medical team truly cared about him and that, in their trusted hands, things could be different. Dee supported Clayton at dialysis and podiatry checkups, and provided in-home care. Dee Ono's care and tireless support allowed Clayton to enjoy life again and advocate for those disabilities and, for this reason, is being honored as a 2018 Healthcare Hero. Please give a round of applause for my aunty, my good friend, Dee Ono. I will now yield the floor to the senator from Hawai'i Kai."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next Healthcare Hero today is Dr. Rebecca Sawai of O'ahu. Dr. Sawai is a general surgeon specializing in colon and rectal surgery at Kaiser Permanente Hawaii. She chose medicine because it allows her to combine her interest in science with her fondness for working with people. Her patient Jeffrey Peterson witnessed her outstanding professionalism and empathy. He is especially thankful for Dr. Sawai's ability to be proactive by creating a plan of attack to extend his life. She took the time to communicate the medical terms to Jeffrey as well as the strategy they'd be following. Dr. Sawai knows that it is important to be able to communicate procedures clearly to patients as a form of full engagement from both healthcare provider and patient. Because of Dr. Sawai, Jeffrey didn't miss out on milestones in the lives of his children, and it is through wonderful stories such as this that we are proud to recognize Dr. Rebecca Sawai as one of our 2018 Healthcare Heroes. How about a round of applause? I now yield the floor to Senator Kim."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, I'm in such awe to witness and see all of these heroes sitting on our floor here in the chamber, and so our final Healthcare Hero is nurse Lesley Yoshimori of O'ahu. Lesley Yoshimori demonstrated her selflessness and dedication to her profession when her patient at Tripler Army Medical Center, Sheldon Kimura, was diagnosed with amyloidosis that required a heart transplant. When Sheldon's treatment was moved to Stanford, Lesley did not stop helping her patient, and she remained proactive as a resource and an advocate. Lesley became instrumental in pushing through Sheldon's medical needs, from coordinating discussions between Tripler and Stanford to being someone the patient and the family confided in at a time when decision-making was growing tougher. Professionals like Lesley embody the power of altruistic actions in times of hardship, making her truly noteworthy for the award as a 2018 Healthcare Hero. S.B. No. 711, S.D. 1:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, S.B. No. 711, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL

LAND,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

At this time, Senator Taniguchi, Chair of the Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for S.B. No. 1394.

Senator Taniguchi noted:

“Senate Bill 1394 proposes to establish an historic preservation income tax credit. Your Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts heard S.B. 1394 on Tuesday, February 12, and deferred the measure in order to seek a re-referral jointly to LCA/WAM to allow more time to work with the interested parties before First Decking. WAM has advised us that it would accommodate revisions to the bill and asked LCA to hold decision-making to move the bill forward and to avoid a joint hearing.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Taniguchi announced that the Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts would be holding a decision making meeting on S.B. No. 1394 that afternoon at 3:05 p.m. in Conference Room 224.

The Chair called on Senator Gabbard and directed him to lead the members in song to wish Senate Chief Clerk Carol Taniguchi a happy birthday, after which the members rose in applause.

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“A few days ago, Hawai‘i lost an amazing woman. Not only was she a civil rights advocate, a volunteer for projects and issues that inspired social change, she was a feminist; she was a mother, a grandmother, and a third-generation Korean American here in Hawai‘i. I’m speaking about my dear friend Jacqueline Young—Jackie to all of us.

“I got to know Jackie when we were working with the American Cancer Society, advocating for greater screenings and raising awareness. I also had the good fortune to serve with her when I was in the House of Representatives. She was the first woman who was elected Vice Speaker in the House and served there with distinction. She also has, to her credit, the founding of a domestic violence/spouse abuse shelter on the windward side, and she’s done so many, many other things. But I wanted to take this opportunity to share a little bit about her; I wanted to acknowledge her daughters Paula and Nani in the gallery.

“Jackie just did so many things in our community that we can only say aloha and mahalo nui loa for her dedication, her wonderful life, and for her friendship to so many of us here in the state, working to make sure that equal rights are protected, that civil rights are protected, and that people are uplifted in all that we do. Hawai‘i historian Tom Coffman said about her, ‘Jackie Young is what the public no longer believes exists: An adept politician and a pillar of unwavering conviction.’ That was Jackie, and I know that’s how we will all remember her, so, Mr. President, at the appropriate time, I’d like to request that the Senate adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of former Representative Jackie Young. Mahalo.”

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I would like to add my thoughts for Jackie as well. As fellow Koreans, we often worked together on a number of issues, and I was really pleased as President to appoint her to the Judicial Selection Commission, and I know she loved serving on the commission. We had many talks about that, and

she was an advocate for them as well as so many others that were mentioned by Senator Baker. And my condolences to her daughters and her family. Mahalo.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I’d like to recognize Jackie Young. I moved back to Hawai‘i in 1990 after 12 years of living on the mainland, and I remember going to an event that was sponsored by the Hawai‘i Women’s Political Caucus and the Hawaii Women’s Legal Foundation. Up on the stage, there was this woman who was talking about domestic violence and the need to take action to help victims of domestic violence and the work that she’d done in our community in Kailua to help set up a shelter so there would be a safe place for victims to go, where they could get help. I remember I had lived downstairs from some people where there was violence going on, and I hadn’t really recognized the extent of the problem, but she helped to educate so many of us in the community, and she was just a stalwart representative for women everywhere, and also for the environment. She helped protect the view planes on Olomana to make sure that it wasn’t developed. She helped so many environmental and land use areas on Windward O‘ahu, and we will forever be in her debt. She also was somebody who, when she left public office, continued public service in a lot of quiet and mainly unrecognized ways because she was a dedicated public servant. She was a tremendous role model. I want to thank her daughters for the time that they gave up with her in order that she could do the public work that she did because she really inspired so many of us, and we’re just eternally grateful for what she’s done and the legacy that she’s left in this state. Mahalo, Jackie.”

The Chair remarked:

“I would say, following up on Senator Kim because of her appointment of Jackie to the Judicial Selection Commission, which she eventually was the chair of, I have shared the rostrum with Jackie at the swearing-in of the newly confirmed judges at the Supreme Court, and she has always handled herself with class, with dignity—an articulate spokesperson, and, most importantly, lent the credibility that she brought to the process, and never have any of the senators questioned the Judicial Commission’s selection. We most often commend them on the selections that they have sent forward to the chief justice as well as the governor, and under Jackie’s leadership, we have seen an ability to work with the chief justice and the governor to bring better gender equity to the amount of women who serve on the bench, which I would add to all of the accolades that Senator Thielen talked about. Her legacy—certainly, for me, the first thing I will think about because of my interaction—is her work to bring that gender equity to the bench in the State of Hawai‘i, and I will miss sharing our time together at the swearing-in ceremonies at the court. She was always wonderful to be with.”

Senator Ihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Jackie was Vice Speaker of the House when I was Majority Floor Leader. We had selected our preferred Speaker, and Jackie and I were part of a team to balance with the Speaker and bring much more diversity, and it was a time when I would call it a good-government bloom; we had a whole bunch of reforms. In fact, the Speaker, working with Jackie, we really advanced the Public Access Room and brought a lot of visibility in the community, and Jackie was the spokesperson for that, and the Speaker that year got an unprecedented good-government award from Common Cause, much of it because of Jackie’s work. I’d been to her house a number of times. As a person, I would aspire to be a human being like Jackie, and I really want to honor her and acknowledge her daughters: Thank you for

being here in this sacred place that she was the Vice Speaker of on the other side. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Inouye rose and stated:

“I’d be remiss not to join the rest of my fellow colleagues in honoring Jackie as well, and just to add that Jackie was so involved with many areas that were recorded earlier. But I must add that she attended an event when I was mayor—on behalf of the three women mayors in 1990 who got elected the first time in the State of Hawai‘i—here on O‘ahu where the Hawaii Women Lawyers honored the three women at a forum, and Jackie came up and she was so proud of us three women, and, hopefully, it will continue. However, as Senator Kim and you, Mr. President, mentioned, in her role as chair of the Judicial Selection Commission, she appeared at—I believe it was her last visit to the neighbor islands, in October, when the Selection Commission, under her purview, had appointed and recommended six women judges for Hawai‘i island—the last appointment of the judge in Waimea of Big Island, and she was just ecstatic and proud, and, of course, the chief justice did allow her to speak during that confirmation process as well. But we all understand and share our condolences to the family and, hopefully, we’ll see a lot more Jackie Youngs going forward.”

Senator Inouye then thanked Senator Nishihara for the baked goods on the members’ desks in honor of Valentine’s Day.

The Chair then announced that the deadline to file standing committee reports would be 11:00 p.m. that evening.

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:40 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Nishihara who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz acknowledged students from the Study Hawai'i Educational Consortium, a nonprofit organization that promotes the State of Hawai'i as an international education destination, and noted significant direct and indirect economic impacts from nearly 13,000 international students in Hawai'i.

Senator Taniguchi introduced State Representative and Speaker Emeritus Calvin K.Y. Say, who was seated in the gallery with Mr. Toshiharu Miyamoto from Hashikatsu Honten in Tokyo, Japan, and Ms. Hiromi.

Senator Dela Cruz announced that Study Hawai'i would have informational displays on the fourth floor that afternoon.

Senator English recognized and welcomed members of the United Nations Development Program and various Pacific Island leaders, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, today we are very honored to have the elected leaders, legislative clerks and staff from across the Pacific join us in the chambers. With them are the representatives of the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) Pacific Office. These leaders are legislative representatives from seven Pacific Island countries: Guam, the Republic of Palau, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Independent State of Samoa, the Republic of Nauru, and the Republic of Vanuatu. They are in Honolulu this week to take part in a strategy meeting hosted by the UNDP with the Strengthening Legislatures in Pacific Island Countries Project, or SLIP. SLIP is a three-year endeavor; it focuses on strengthening legislative bodies in the Pacific. The project seeks to provide support to these legislative bodies to become more effective and efficient through strengthening the work of their committees and building the capacities of the legislators and their staffs.

"Joining us on the floor, we are honored to have leaders of these parliaments, congresses, and legislatures: Speaker Esmon Saimon from Vanuatu Parliament; Speaker Cyril Buraman from Republic of Nauru; Senator (and in Guam, the senators are called 'the speaker'), so Speaker Tina Rose Muna Barnes from Guam; Senator Daisy Alik-Momotaro from the Republic of the Marshall Islands; Vice Speaker Esmond Moses from the Federated States of Micronesia; and then we have assistant clerk Leilani Senior from Palau; assistant clerk Graeme Tualalelei from Samoa; and Suzanne Gallen, UNDP office. Can we welcome them to the Senate? Also with us in the gallery are members of the legislative staffs from the various governments, and if all of you would please stand to be recognized as well?"

"Members, this is a very special event; it's the first time that the Senate has partnered with the United Nations Development Program for their workshops in Hawai'i. We are flying all of their national flags on our flagpoles in the front and, for the very first time, the UN flag is flying in Hawai'i. To our distinguished guests, the Hawai'i State Senate looks forward to future collaborations as we continue to strengthen our relationships with our island countries."

At 11:47 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

TWENTY-FIRST DAY

Tuesday, February 19, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Harimoto, and Ruderman who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard recognized RiceUp Farmers, Inc., and presented the following remarks:

“Colleagues, today we are honoring RiceUp Farmers, Inc. Colleagues, dreams can be made with only a handful of pesos: 88, to be exact, or \$1.68. Just ask Elvin Laceda, a young farm boy who traveled to the United States from the town of Lubao, Pampanga, Philippines, in 2016. He left the Philippines with a meager \$47.81 that his grandmother gave him and came to Hawai'i to study at BYU–Hawaii with the aid of a scholarship grant. And, in 2017, RiceUp Farmers, Inc., was born. The vision? To improve the livelihood of Filipino farmers and to help innovate agriculture. So, while the RiceUp story began with meager resources, it did not deter Elvin from starting a program that would become one of the best social enterprises in the United States. One month after he set foot on Hawaiian soil, RiceUp was born.

“I met the RiceUp students in 2017, and we've kept in touch on various ag issues. From the initial 50 farmers who joined the RiceUp network in his hometown in Pampanga, there are now more than 300 farmers benefiting from the program. By the end of this year, there will be 2,800 farmers who will be part of this social enterprise. RiceUp started with a very small team in Hawai'i; now, more than 40 students are part of the movement, with more than 30 local and international partners. One farmer, Mr. David, who has been farming for more than 40 years, said of the RiceUp program:

No other organization has ever produced such excitement within us to change our vision in farming than RiceUp. Initially, we did not believe these young people would help us improve our livelihood; we had been in the industry for decades, even before these kids were born! But as we discovered their sincerity and commitment, we feel this is unique. This is more than a business: We are a community; we are a family.

“An American dream that began with an 88-peso inspiration grew to become one of the leading social enterprises in the world. The RiceUp team has more than 88 things that they are grateful for. The RiceUp crew, now composed of a management team of BYU–Hawaii students and an on-site team in Pampanga, Philippines, has been recognized and has shared its story not only in the United States and the Philippines but throughout the whole world. RiceUp's mission is to innovate the system of farming through digital technology and to empower farmers through education while enriching communities through entrepreneurship and sustainable farming systems that benefit both the farmer and the consumer. The admirable mission of the RiceUp organization is to assist farmers so they can earn a sustainable income, to encourage young people to become proactively engaged in agriculture, to ensure farming is efficient and climate-resilient, to establish a strong partnership with the government, and to create farmer leaders in society. RiceUp envisions communities where farmers both young and old work together with technology to

create sustainable livelihoods. In just two short years, RiceUp has a long list of impressive accomplishments. They established a farm school with more than 60 farmers being educated in financial, technological, and business skills in Pampanga, Philippines. They created an app that helps farmers directly sell to consumers. They taught farmers vermiculture and hydroponics as another source of income and other climate-resilient ways of farming. RiceUp partnered with the mayor of Davao City, Philippines, to establish a farm school with more than 1,000 farmers. This will also help former rebels and indigenous people to turn to farming to establish peace. Additionally, RiceUp was invited and sponsored by the UN to speak at the World Youth Conference in Malaysia. RiceUp won the Enactus Social Entrepreneurship National Competition out of more than 400 universities, and they were semi-finalists at the Enactus World Cup held in Silicon Valley.

TWENTY-THIRD DAY

Thursday, February 28, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro honored the Cultural Learning Center at Ka'ala, and presented the following remarks:

"A tremendous conflagration swept across Wai'anae and Mākaha Valley in August of last summer, 2018. It began with two large brushfires, which devastated 17 farm lots in the state's Wai'anae Agricultural Park along with destroying five farm structures and leaving one Wai'anae family home in ashes. In its finality, it scorched almost 9,000 acres. Unfortunately, fires are commonplace on the hot and dry Wai'anae Coast and are becoming alarmingly more and more devastating. However, from those ashes rose the phoenix of a combined community effort to recover, restore, and rehabilitate the vibrancy of those lands that were left scorched. The honored guests we recognize here on this floor have made it their personal kuleana to mālama the lands of the Wai'anae Coast and to make every effort to heal its wounds inclusive of all community stakeholders from local youth to esteemed kūpuna. Through their collective efforts, they created the Wai'anae Kai Wildfire Preparedness Plan and are actively seeking to protect their ancestral lands. Their goal is to prevent ignition of fires in Wai'anae while implementing key best management practices. This includes increasing security in the upper valley and improving the ability of firefighters to respond to fires, extinguishing them quickly by increasing water availability.

"Watershed and native forest preservation go hand in hand with fire prevention. Because these groups recognize the importance of educating our future generation about their mission, a key partner among them is the 'A'ali'i Program at Nānākuli High and Intermediate School. The 'A'ali'i students drafted a resolution to restore watersheds across the state and perpetuate Hawaiian cultural practices. The students presented their resolution to the Wai'anae Neighborhood Board, the Wai'anae Moku Hawaiian Civic Clubs, and Ke One o Kākuhihewa O'ahu Council of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, who all eventually adopted it. It's here today that we come together to recognize this committed group, who are seeking to heal Hawaiian lands in a Hawaiian sort of way. We realize that in supporting their endeavors, there is so much more which we all could gain, in the absence of which, there is so much which could all be lost. I would now like to yield the floor to the senator from Kapolei."

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, as the chair of the Agriculture and Environment committee, I would be remiss if I didn't say a few words about the importance of Ka'ala Farm and their Cultural Learning Center. Just yesterday, the front page of the *Star-Advertiser* highlighted the publication of a new study by Kamehameha Schools, UH, and the United States Geological Survey in the journal *Nature Sustainability*. The study found that traditional indigenous agro systems are key to us facing the future challenges posed by climate change. And this is exactly what Eric Enos and his team are currently doing at Ka'ala Farm. They lease a 97-acre parcel from DHHL and another 1,100-acre ranch from DLNR at the top of Wai'anae Valley. Back in the 19th century, the streams were diverted for the sugar industry,

but they've been restoring those streams and also kalo lo'i and 'auwai. What they have is one of the best preserved agricultural village systems in the state. Over the past four decades since their founding in 1976, they have developed expertise in the ancestral knowledge of growing food, managing valuable land and water resources, and bringing people together in a spirit of shared responsibility. Ka'ala Farm provides cultural and environmental educational experiences for thousands of visitors each year to reconnect to the 'āina through hands-on experiences. They are teaching the youth of the Wai'anae Coast and their families traditional agricultural practices, such as the planting of dryland taro and the concept of edible forests. The idea is that with this knowledge, people will plant gardens for their subsistence. We commend Ka'ala Farm, UH PALS and PLACES, Nānākuli High and Intermediate 'A'ali'i Program, and the members of the Wai'anae Moku Ke One o Kākuhihewa O'ahu Council of Hawaiian Civic Clubs for coming together in the spirit of cooperation to focus on this important watershed management and fire prevention and mitigation project. I'd like to now turn the floor back over to the senator from the Wai'anae Coast."

Senator Shimabukuro rose and stated:

"Colleagues, it's my privilege to introduce our honored guests. Representing the Cultural Learning Center at Ka'ala, also known as Ka'ala Farm, we have director Eric Enos; representing the UH Place-Based After-School Literacy Support and Community Engagement programs, which are also known as PALS and PLACES, we have Kellen Smith and Kay Fukuda; representing Nānākuli High and Intermediate School's 'A'ali'i Program, we have principal Darin Pili'aloa and teachers Jewelynn Kirkland and Kathryn Fisher; representing the Wai'anae Hawaiian Civic Club, we have pele kikenā Rochelle Kawelo; and representing the Ke One o Kākuhihewa O'ahu Council for the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, we have pele kikenā Benton Keali'i Pang. In the gallery, to support our honorees, we have Bruce Tsuchida and Katie Franklin from Townscape; Mele Worthington and Stephanie Kawelo of Wai'anae Hawaiian Civic Club; Georgianna Navarro of the Wai'anae and Mākaha Hawaiian Civic Clubs; and I know that the driver for some of them was DeMont and Momi Conner of Ho'omana Pono PAC; and we also have Hailama Farden, who's the president of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. We have a gang who takes care of Ka'ala Farm: we have Stone, Mango, and Warrior Levi, and AK King. We have Wai'anae High School Hawaiian studies students. We've got Miwa and Kili Enos and her 'ohana and she is with Kua. We have Tammy Jones, Tara Ferron from Nānākuli High 'A'ali'i Program. And if anyone else is here in support of these honorees, please stand to be recognized, and will you give them a round of applause? Thank you so much."

As a result of the committee’s discussion, Senate Bill 166, Proposed S.D. 1, proposes a recruitment modernization program to address issues state departments are having in regards to recruitment.

“Senate Bill 656: Your Committee on Ways and Means notes the concerns regarding the City and County of Honolulu’s rapid transit project with the recent federal subpoenas. I’m requesting a waiver of Rule 21 to allow the posting of S.D. 2 to allow discussion on the state’s involvement regarding both the Office of the Auditor and the comptroller.

“Senate Bill 816: Your Committee on Ways and Means finds that there are certain members who are affected by the transfer of use and exclusion management operations of the Maui Memorial Medical Center, Kula Hospital, and Lanai Community Hospital. The proposed S.D. 2 seeks to resolve compensation differentials for certain HHSC members from the Maui region.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Dela Cruz announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on the aforementioned measures the following morning at 10:15 a.m. in Conference Room 211.

Senator Shimabukuro invited the members to a luncheon in Conference Room 016 that afternoon.

On November 27, 2018, the *Star-Advertiser* reported that Michael Maeda of Honolulu and Iliana Sanchez of Los Angeles had filed a class-action lawsuit against a Delaware company, Pinnacle Foods, Inc., for false and deceptive advertising and fraudulent and unfair business practices. Pinnacle Foods sells potato chips labeled as 'Hawaiian' potato chips even though they are made in Washington State of ingredients not from Hawai'i. And as of March 2, 2019, the *Star-Advertiser* also reported that three Kona coffee farmers have filed a class action lawsuit on behalf of Kona coffee farmers in federal court in Seattle alleging that Walmart, Amazon, Costco, Safeway, Kroger, and other companies are selling fake Kona coffee.

"The question arises: how much money is our economy losing because of companies misusing the Hawai'i name but whose products have no affiliation with Hawai'i? This bill would try to put a number to that question. S.B. 763, S.D. 2 would direct DBEDT, in consultation with the Department of Agriculture, to conduct a study to assess the impacts of companies selling products in the U.S. using place-based marketing without any material ties to the state. DBEDT tells us that they have the ability to conduct the study and provide us with some data. With that data, we can then as a state look at next steps to reduce the exploitation of the Hawai'i brand and keep more of that money here in our local economy. Mahalo."

Senate Bill No. 1433, section 1, is amended by extending for nine months, rather than two years, the period in which a county may adopt an ordinance to establish a surcharge on state tax to December 31, 2019, and specifying the corresponding period in which the surcharge on state tax may begin to be levied, assessed, and collected to January 1, 2021, to read as follows:

"(c) Each county that has not established a surcharge on state tax prior to July 1, 2015, may establish the surcharge at the rates enumerated in sections 237-8.6 and 238-2.6. A county electing to establish this surcharge shall do so by ordinance; provided that:

- (1) No ordinance shall be adopted until the county has conducted a public hearing on the proposed ordinance;

(2) The ordinance shall be adopted prior to ~~March~~ December 31, 2019; and

(3) No county surcharge on state tax that may be authorized under this subsection shall be levied prior to January 1, 2019, or after December 31, 2030.

A county electing to exercise the authority granted under this subsection shall notify the director of taxation within ten days after the county has adopted a surcharge on state tax ordinance. Beginning on January 1, 2019, ~~or~~ January 1, 2020, or January 1, 2021, as applicable pursuant to sections 237-8.6 and 238-2.6, the director of taxation shall levy, assess, collect, and otherwise administer the county surcharge on state tax."

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 1433, section 2, is amended by amending section 237-8.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the general excise tax law, to specify that no surcharge on state tax may be levied prior to January 1, 2021, rather than January 1, 2022, if the surcharge was established on or after March 31, 2019, but prior to December 31, 2019, to read as follows:

"(b) Each county surcharge on state tax that may be adopted or extended pursuant to section 46-16.8 shall be levied beginning in a taxable year after the adoption of the relevant county ordinance; provided that no surcharge on state tax may be levied:

(1) Prior to:

(A) January 1, 2007, if the county surcharge on state tax was established by an ordinance adopted prior to December 31, 2005;

(B) January 1, 2019, if the county surcharge on state tax was established by the adoption of an ordinance after June 30, 2015, but prior to June 30, 2018; ~~or~~

(C) January 1, 2020, if the county surcharge on state tax was established by the adoption of an ordinance on or after June 30, 2018, but prior to March 31, 2019; ~~and~~ or

(D) January 1, 2021, if the county surcharge on state tax was established by the adoption of an ordinance on or after March 31, 2019, but prior to December 31, 2019; and

(2) After December 31, 2030."

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 1433, section 3, is amended by making the same amendment described in section 2 above to section 238-2.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to the use tax.

Senator Thielen moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Members, I was not in this body, but the Legislature in 2005 adopted a law to allow the counties to adopt an ordinance enacting a surcharge on the general excise tax within their county: for O'ahu, to be used for the rail, and for neighbor islands, to be used for other types of mass transit and infrastructure relating to mass transit. It was a temporary opening, an offer to the counties, that, under that original 2005 law, expired in December of 2005. So if the counties did not act by that December, they would not be able to enact a GET surcharge, and the GET surcharge was supposed to expire in 2022. It's been 15 years—**15 years**. If you had a baby in 2005, your child would now be 15 years old. They'd soon be off the payroll—in college, working, possibly marrying, having children. It's a long, long time.

"So, some people may wonder, why am I offering this amendment to limit the opportunity for a county to amend or apply a GET surcharge now? It's because I know, as a state, we're going to need to look at the GET additional charge

ourselves because we have a huge, looming unfunded liability that we are constitutionally obligated to honor for our retirees. We have a dire need to fill hard-to-fill positions, and we need to bring our salaries into alignment with the private sector's so that we can compete and bring more people on board to fill these vacancies to do these essential state jobs that we all want to have done for our constituents. And the worry that I have is that if we keep extending this tax 20, 21, 22 years, what's going to happen is that the counties are not going to look at it as a temporary opportunity; they're going to look at it as an entitlement, and then what do we do to meet the obligations that we have to our state employees and our constituents as a state? So, I think, I can see opening the door and extending it one last time, but I'm asking that we close that opportunity December of 2019, and if a county has not enacted it or not adjusted it by that time, then that door is closed, and then we can move forward with our planning for our state needs in the future, so I'd ask that you join me. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 1433, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 7, 2019.

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM FRIDAY, MARCH 1, 2019

Stand. Com. No. 814 (S.B. No. 693, S.D. 1):

Senator Rhoads moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 814 be adopted and S.B. No. 693, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Thielen then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 3) to S.B. No. 693, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 693, S.D. 1, section 2, is amended to require any pedestrian who begins to cross the roadway, when the pedestrian-control signal is equipped with a countdown timer, to complete the crossing to a sidewalk or safety island before the countdown timer ends.

Senator Thielen moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Most of us, when we walk downtown for lunch, we come up into Alakea Street, we see the stoplight, and it's a green light, and there is a signal for us to be able to enter the intersection, but then, all of a sudden, it changes to a countdown signal: 21 seconds remaining. And, as you often have done yourselves, or many of the other pedestrians who we see on the street, people pick up the pace; they enter the intersection; they safely cross. At the end of that 21-second countdown, there is a solid red hand that comes up, and there's 7 more seconds with that solid red hand. Then the light will turn yellow; there's another 4 seconds until the light turns red. So people who exit the intersection by the time the countdown time is done have exited well before the green light in the opposite direction comes on. What the floor amendment would do is say that if you exit the crosswalk after the countdown signal has ended, then you can be cited for violating the law, but if you enter the crosswalk, you can still cross it in time before the countdown signal finishes, then you can move forward. In either case, under the existing proposed bill or under the floor amendment, there's going to have to be enforcement. The only question is, under the existing bill, the police officer can cite you when you step into the intersection, even if it's when you've got 21 seconds to cross the street. Under the proposed floor amendment bill, the

police officer would be able to cite you when you exit the crosswalk if you have not finished crossing by the time that countdown timer is done. So I'd ask that we follow common sense and the pedestrian patterns that are already in existence, and if there's going to need to be adjustment in the signals, I think that the City and County and the State will be more motivated to make the adjustments under the floor amendment than they would under the proposed bill. Thank you."

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"I'm not a traffic engineer. The reason we set speed limits a certain number, my understanding is, is because traffic engineers have studied the corridors where speed limit signs have been put in place and they've determined the minimum cruising speed necessary to avoid collisions or pedestrian accidents at intersections. My understanding is that's the reason why they make the countdown timers the way they're written. Again, I'm not a traffic engineer. We have lots of pedestrian fatalities, as all my colleagues understand. I think we should take a little bit more thoughtful approach on this. I'm not necessarily opposed to the concept because of the reality of pedestrian traffic, but not everybody can get across a crosswalk at the same speed. We have these intersections where people yield, where motorists are looking for individuals to get across the street and they're also looking at the countdown timers. I think that the public policy behind the way the law is originally written and the clarifications proposed in the current version are sound, and those are the reasons why I oppose. Thank you."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"Every community has a different counting. What Senator had just said, it doesn't go like that in our community. As soon as that timer stops, it turns yellow and red; it doesn't give so many seconds. In my community, as soon as that timer's done, it turns red. It doesn't give the pedestrian that extra time that maybe downtown does. Every district is different, so I feel if we're going to mandate this and have the officers enforce it, it's going to give them a hard time enforcing it because in each county or in each district the light is situated differently. Thank you."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"I, too, will be voting 'no' on this measure. I believe that this measure has gone on its fourth year, and it has gone to two committees, including Judiciary. I believe that the two are sufficient at this time as well, and so let's say sayonara and down with the amendment. Mahalo."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"I agree with the introducer of the amendment. I think, when you're standing there and you've got 30 feet to cross the street and it says *30 seconds*, 29, 28, and you stand there, and you could walk backward many times very safely and get across the intersection. I think the point of the law is to be safe, to be out of the intersection. I think this amendment addresses that: As long as you're out of the intersection, you're safe and you shouldn't be ticketed. So, in support. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 3 was put by the Chair and carried, with Senators Baker, Chang, Dela Cruz, Fevella, Inouye, Keith-Agaran, Keohokalole, Kidani, and Rhoads voting "No."

Senator Thielen then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 814 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator English and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 693, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 7, 2019.

At 9:54 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 9:58 a.m.

"The floor amendment defects the effective date from July 1, 2019, to July 1, 2050. Approval of this floor amendment would guarantee that this bill comes back to this body for a final vote or consideration in conference committee or on the floor if the House chooses to act on the bill. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 8 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 77, S.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 7, 2019.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1053 (S.B. No. 1353, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1053 be adopted and S.B. No. 1353, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Gabbard then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 4) to S.B. No. 1353, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1353, S.D. 2, is amended by amending section 10 to add an appropriation for fiscal year 2020-2021, to read as follows:

"SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be deposited into the industrial hemp special fund established pursuant to 141-I, Hawaii Revised Statutes."

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 1353, S.D. 2, is amended by amending section 11 to add an appropriation for fiscal year 2020-2021, to read as follows:

"SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the industrial hemp special fund established pursuant to 141-I, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be allocated as follows:

- (1) \$ for the establishment of one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program coordinator position;
- (2) \$ for the establishment of two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) specialist positions; and
- (3) \$ for administrative costs of the industrial hemp program.

The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department of agriculture for the purposes of this Act."

Senator Gabbard moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"S.B. 1353, S.D. 2 would permanently establish an industrial hemp program to license individuals to cultivate industrial hemp in the state. This necessitates funding for both years of the biennium. This floor amendment would add a blank appropriation for fiscal year 2020-2021."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 4 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Gabbard then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1053 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried.

"This bill is one of the policy proposals stemming from the 2018 Task Force, mandated by Act 12, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018. This bill is about improving access to mental health services and requires as a standard of care for a mental health profession to ask the minor if the provision of services should be kept confidential from the minor's parent or guardian. The purpose of this bill is to prohibit health plans and providers from disclosing any payment or billing information for a minor's mental health services to a policyholder or other covered person if the minor received the services without the consent or participation of the minor's parent or legal guardian and to ensure that no out-of-pocket payments are assessed for minor-initiated mental health treatment or counseling services.

"Too many minors are hesitant to seek mental health services because they do not feel safe or comfortable asking for permission from a parent or guardian for such services. While the suppression of explanation of benefits is a standard practice where minor consent laws exist to preserve minors' privacy, the existing law does not explicitly prevent health plans from disclosing bill information related to minor-initiated mental health services.

"This measure guarantees a minor's privacy is maintained when the minor seeks mental health treatment. This measure will make it easier for a minor to feel comfortable asking for help and seeking mental health services. Please join me in support of S.B. 768, S.D. 1. Mahalo."

The National Constitutional Law Center notes that there are several recent U.S. Supreme Court cases which have ruled that state legislatures cannot put restrictions on candidates for national office listed on a state election ballot."

“Colleagues, this is the only bill I plan to speak in opposition to today, so please forgive me three minutes of your time that I ask. It’s easier, a little bit, to transition our electric grid to renewables, non-fossil fuels. The transportation sector is going

to be a lot harder to do, but now we have the tools to do it with electric vehicles and hybrids. As Greta Thunberg said about her country, Sweden, 'We're just a small country; what can we do?' We could say that about Hawai'i, but Hawai'i has a role to play in being a leader and spreading ideas around the world. We've seen that with hula, with surfing, with the concept of aloha, with music—we lead the world in many ways. We have a special role to play in the establishment of electric vehicles because we have shorter distances to drive; we have solar all year that we can charge our cars or get electricity to the grid without fossil fuels; we're the richest state in the richest country. So we have a role to play, but now we're going to put the brakes on supporting the transition. Now that two-and-a-half percent of our cars are electric vehicles and almost four percent are hybrids, we're going to put the brakes on because road fees are more important than climate change?

"It's been said that electric vehicles need to pay their fair share because they're so heavy and they do damage to the roads. An electric vehicle is lighter than the average SUV; it's much lighter than an empty pickup truck. Road damage has an exponential relationship to the weight of a vehicle: 90 percent of the damage to a road comes from the heaviest truck that goes down it that day; 9 percent comes from the second-heaviest vehicle that goes down it, and 1 percent comes from all the other vehicles put together. It's not a good reason to do this.

"This is not about my car: I have an electric vehicle, yes; I've also got a pickup truck on the Big Island. I'm going to buy another electric vehicle anyway, even if you're penalizing me for it. But it's not about my car. I had a Nissan Leaf for three years, and when the lease was up, the new Leafs came out with double the range, so, last year, I bought my second Leaf. You might say I turned over a new leaf.

"Now, I realize that most of you folks today are not going to change your vote based on what I say today, but I'm asking you that, next time we're faced with a decision on whether to take action on the greatest crisis facing our generation or not, that you turn over a new leaf and prioritize climate change as a matter of public policy. I ask you to hear this tiny voice from your future: 'Daddy, Grandma, after you learned that our planet was dying from burning fossil fuels, you did everything you could to save it, didn't you? I know you wouldn't let my planet die after you knew how important it was. I know you did everything you could to leave me a healthy world. I know you wouldn't put anything ahead of this, right, Mommy? Didn't you, Daddy, Grandma?' Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Though I agree that we are changing our method of transportation throughout the state, however, the increase of \$15, I believe, is not too much of an increase considering the cost of the car. Grandma, daughter, son, wife, husband, I think, I believe, would continue to say, 'Why are there so many potholes on our roads?' And, just to let you know, Mr. President, my car is just a gas car; it's five years old, and let me tell you, I paid \$1,400 because of the damages to the shocks and whatever it is, and that means that our roads need to be fixed. I believe our vehicles, our hybrids, must pay their fair share since we all seemed not to have an increase in our gas taxes these last couple of years, so I believe that \$15 is not too much of a big deal. Mahalo."

They depend on lay nets for catching the food that they need for their dinner tables."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. The purpose of this measure is to clarify provisions on electric vehicle charging and parking and extend the sunset date of Act 168, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2012, by three years to June 30, 2023.

"Electric vehicles are becoming more popular amongst drivers in Hawai'i due to financial incentives and the positive impact on the environment. While providing incentives to electric vehicles, electric vehicles still need to pay their fair share.

"This bill requires EVs to pay for parking when parked at a non-metered stall for more than the initial four hours in a public parking facility. This amendment has been made to address parking problems at the airport. As previously written, the Act did not address non-metered stalls and electric vehicle users are taking advantage of the free incentives. DOT continually loses significant revenue from these parking stalls when there is oftentimes a lack of parking spaces in airport parking structures.

"Support for the measure has come from the Department of Transportation, Ulupono Initiative, ChargePoint, Inc., Alliance of Automobile Manufacturers, Hawaiian Electric Company, Inc., Tesla, Blue Planet Foundation, Hawaii Automobile Dealers' Association, and numerous individuals.

"For these reasons I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to encourage early adoption of electric vehicles."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 857 was adopted and S.B. No. 657, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Ruderman, Shimabukuro). Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Harimoto, Keohokalole).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 858 (S.B. No. 663, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 858 be adopted and S.B. No. 663, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Inouye rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. The intention of this measure is to increase public safety. In 2018, 117 people were killed statewide in a number of traffic accidents, 43 of them pedestrians. Photo red light systems are used throughout the world and in the United States. They have proven to be reliable, efficient and effective in identifying and deterring those who run red lights.

"Speeding and the failure to yield the right of way contribute to at least 15 percent of Hawai'i's accident rates behind 'driving under the influence (DUI).' Speeding and failure to yield the right of way may also include running red lights.

"Testimony from the Department of Transportation indicate the following: Between 2011–2016, there has been 1,616 intersection crashes resulting from red light and other traffic signal violations. These crashes resulted in deaths, numerous injuries and property damage. During calendar years 2011–

2018, a total of 13 deaths occurred from a driver disregarding a red light signal. During calendar years 2014–2018, police have issued 17,021 red light violations to motorists who disregarded the traffic signal. Because police have other priorities for calls for services, it is not possible for them to enforce the laws at every intersection. A red light camera system is an attractive alternative to better enforcement of our traffic laws.

“This measure will apply to motorists who ‘run red lights’ that are in a steady red cycle state before the vehicle enters an intersection. Vehicles that have gone through an intersection when the light is yellow but turns red while still in the intersection should not be subjected to action.

“There has been at least a 15 percent reduction in red-light running incidents reported by the Federal Highway Administration, with some localities reporting up to a 44 percent reduction.

“One of the keys to the program’s success will be for acceptance by all stakeholders. This includes government officials, local law enforcement and, most importantly, the public. The counties are going to have to make an effort to differentiate this photo enforcement program from the ill-fated ‘van cam’ speeding program that was repealed in 2002 after public outcry.

“It will be up to the state and/or county to inform the public that this new program will use automated cameras that are affixed to a stationary location near the intersection like a light or utility pole. It is also to be made clear that the program is not a ‘revenue generator’ for either the government or the hardware vendor. The counties will be the entity to implement the program.

“Support for the measure has come from the Honolulu Police Department, Hawaii Bicycling League, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), Peoples Advocacy for Trails Hawaii, Blue Zones Project, and numerous individuals. There were only three testimonies in opposition to the bill.

“For these reasons I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to increase public safety and save lives.”

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella’s remarks read as follows:

“No. If this bill were to be made law, people would be treated as guilty until they prove themselves innocent. That goes against the very foundation of our legal system. There is no guarantee that this program would create safer roads.”

Senator Rhoads moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 884 be adopted and S.B. No. 522, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, plastic is a huge problem in our oceans, our wildlife, our environment as a whole, and in human health. If you don’t want to take my word for it, I would strongly recommend that you watch the December 8th edition of *60 Minutes* on plastics; it’s an eye-opener. It was for me. So I want to give you some bad news and good news this morning. First, the bad news, and my colleagues from Hawai‘i island may take interest in this: Kamilo Point in rural Ka‘ū on Hawai‘i island was highlighted in a May 1, 2017, *Huffington Post* article as being one of the dirtiest places in the world because of plastics. Ocean Crusaders reports that there are 5.25 trillion pieces of plastic debris in the ocean; of that mass, 269,000 tons float on the surface while some 4 billion plastic microfibers per square kilometer litter the deep sea. Shoppers worldwide are using approximately 500 billion single-use plastic bags every year, and this translates to about a million bags every minute across the globe, or 150 bags a year for every person on Earth, and the number is rising. We use 500 million plastic straws every single day in the United States. I visited Greenpeace’s *Arctic Sunrise* ship when it arrived here in Hawai‘i on October 11th of 2018, after it had just left the Great Pacific Garbage Patch. Greenpeace reported that microplastic particles which make up the garbage patch now stretch for a distance twice the size of the state of Texas. The *Arctic Sunrise* also visited Kaho‘olawe and brought back an estimated two-and-a-half tons of debris, including a large amount of plastics. Coastal Care reports that 90 percent of seabirds have some plastic in their digestive tracts.

“And now for the good news: Walmart, the world’s largest retailer, announced late last month that it will eliminate non-recyclable plastic packaging in all its private label brands by 2020, impacting over 30,000 products. Our counties have been taking the lead on reducing plastics for the last several years; as of July 2015, Honolulu, Hawai‘i, Maui, and Kaua‘i have all banned plastic checkout bags. At UH, a student-initiated ban on polystyrene food containers at all campus food establishments has been in place as policy since 2012. The Hawai‘i Ocean Friendly Restaurants program launched in 2016 now includes more than 200 eateries that are certified as foam-free. Maui County became the first county in Hawai‘i to pass a ban on polystyrene foam containers in June of 2017. Hawai‘i County banned polystyrene containers in October of 2017, and this will go into effect July 1, 2019.

“So, S.B. 522, S.D. 2: This is our zero-waste bill that will move us forward in a very big way in reducing single-use plastic. Zero-waste plastic reduction plans are moving forward all over the world, including within the European Union, Ethiopia, Costa Rica, and municipalities across the United States. This bill would ban state and county agencies from selling or using single-use plastic beverage bottles, utensils, stirring sticks, polystyrene foam containers, or straws after July 1, 2021. It would ban restaurants and other food businesses from selling or using single-use plastic beverage bottles, utensils, stirring sticks, polystyrene foam containers, or straws after July 1, 2022, and it would ban any form of plastic bags after July 1, 2023. It would also set up a working group to look into the issue of eliminating single-use plastic packaging and phasing out single-use plastic beverage containers.

“Now, some of you may be concerned about, well, what are the alternatives to these items? Last summer, I think, I was at the National Conference for Environmental Legislators, and for those of you who were there with me, they passed out these [*holds up products*], and this is—you get your stainless steel chopsticks, and you get your stainless steel fork and this nice little bag, and they also passed out these straws: Not only is it a straw; it’s got the straw brush to clean your straw, right? So, for you ladies, you can just very conveniently put that in your purse; guys, stick it in your backpack or whatever. And, on the news last night, *Hawaii News Now*, there was a piece last night and it was talking about a group called Hawaii Eco Straws, and they’re in 17 cafés across O‘ahu, and they have distributed 24,000 of these types of straws for free. All they’re asking for is a donation, and what caught my eye on the piece last night on the news was, there was a little sign next to the cash register and it said, ‘This is the last straw,’ and they had a bowl of these things where you could come up and just grab your straw, grab your reusable straw, and there was a little bowl where you could put donations. I also saw a piece in South Africa where there’s a company that’s coming up with the replacement for plastic water bottles made out of hemp—hemp, hooray—and so they are working on that now, and I’m sure, in the next few years, some entrepreneur or some ‘hempreneur,’ whichever you’d prefer, is going to come up with a replacement for these items. Also, there are replacements for the takeout containers and polystyrene containers that are made out of hemp; already, they’re in existence.

“I also wanted to mention—and some of you may have experienced—the lobbyists and young lobbyists who came to your office from SEEQS. SEEQS stands for School for Examining Essential Questions of Sustainability: a small private charter school, 180 students, established in 2013, sixth to eighth graders in Kaimukī. And they were lobbying for bills such as this bill, that we would pass it, and they touched my heart because this is the future, that young people are beginning to understand the importance of what we do here in this building regarding sustainability.

“Finally, I wanted to mention that we do have a reputation for being the first in the nation: Our hundred percent clean renewable energy by the year 2045; last year, we passed a ban on chlorpyrifos; also the ban, worldwide, first in the world, on oxybenzone and octinoxate in our sunscreen, so we have this reputation of setting the example for the world to follow, and that’s what we’re trying to do here. So, our state can once again take the lead in protecting our environment, so I am asking you to strongly support this zero-waste bill. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Just to make a comment of the previous speaker, and we thank him for his extensive research. I do want to make a comment on Kamilo Beach on my Big Island, just in support of our island as well. I’m very familiar with what’s happening and what has happened in the years that I’ve been raised on the Big Island. Just to let you know: Kamilo Beach is not to be entitled the dirtiest beach in our state as well because, as you all remember, due to the Fukushima earthquake and tidal wave that occurred, a lot of the trash and the currents and most of all the debris from the ocean has been heading to Ka‘ū and Kamilo Beach. Unfortunately, though, *60 Minutes* came there after and, I guess, identified Kamilo Beach as the dirtiest, probably in the world or in our state. I just want to support the notion that it wasn’t because of the trash made by residents or whatever, but we did have the trash from the Fukushima earthquake and tsunami, and I’d like to add that not only plastics occurred on that beach but tons of wrecks from the fishing boats as well. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I agree with both of the previous speakers, but since Kamilo Beach has come up: I've sponsored several of the cleanup efforts down there, including my staff going there several times, and, yes, it's right that there was a big wave of trash after Fukushima, but every year, new trash gets deposited there from around the world, and it just happens to catch it. By the way, I also own a business that's operated 20 years while being a leader in plastic elimination, and it hasn't hurt us at all. Thank you very much."

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"No. Hawai'i already has strict recycling laws and small business owners would suffer from the enactment of more regulatory laws."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 884 was adopted and S.B. No. 522, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PLASTIC," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 885 (S.B. No. 921, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Rhoads, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 885 was adopted and S.B. No. 921, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Moriwaki). Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Harimoto).

S.B. No. 415, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 415, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 415 S.D. 1, Relating to Health.

"The purpose of this measure is to authorize advanced practice registered nurses to perform aspiration abortions. Many women routinely receive their well-woman care from advanced practice registered nurses (APRN) who are considered primary care providers in Hawai'i. APRNs currently perform medication abortions but are not allowed under their scope of practice to perform any surgical procedure.

"An aspiration abortion is a common procedure for surgically terminating an abortion in the first trimester. Current state law allows only physicians, surgeons or osteopathic physicians with a surgeon to perform the procedures. There is a statewide shortage of these medical practitioners, especially in rural areas. As a consequence, women in rural areas may not be able to access legal abortions in a timely manner. People on Kaua'i, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i must often travel to O'ahu or Maui for care. On the Big Island, abortion care is only provided one day per month and on Maui, one day every other week.

"A 2018 review by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine concludes that advanced practice registered nurses who received proper training are just as capable of providing safe and effective abortion care as physicians and surgeons. Advanced practice registered nurses who are considered primary care providers or other non-physician providers are already able to perform aspiration abortions as well as provide well-women care in California, New York, Montana, Oregon, Vermont, and New Hampshire.

"Allowing advanced practice registered nurses in Hawai'i to perform aspiration abortions will significantly improve access to comprehensive reproductive healthcare services. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 415, S.D. 1."

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"No. I am voting NO on this measure which expands who can perform an abortion in Hawai'i.

"In committee, the last testifier, a young mother with her child in her arms, stated that the bill actually puts a pregnant woman's health at more risk by taking her out of a hospital and into a less equipped office.

"I'm also not convinced that if there are complications, a Registered Nurse will be ready to respond.

"We are already taking one life here. We should not be risking another."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 415, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 3 (Fevella, Gabbard, Riviere). Excused, 1 (Harimoto).

S.B. No. 1251, S.D. 1:

Senator Kahele moved that S.B. No. 1251, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"No. I oppose this bill because it gives too much power to the Board of Land & Natural Resources over 'ceded lands' for too long a period of time. Giving extensions for developments on our public lands for 40 years—without any periodic review process (such as every 5 or 10 years)—is like giving away the 'birth right' of Native Hawaiians and of the general public. The extensions for leases for developments on our public lands should be far shorter than 40 years—40 years, by anyone's standards, is a long, long time—much too long!"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 1251, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASE EXTENSIONS ON PUBLIC LAND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I was just going to speak briefly: I know it’s the diaper-changing bill, but just with all due respect to the introducer, I’m going to explain myself in order to avoid the appearance that I’m trying to get out of diaper-changing with my own children. I have three young kids; I’ve been changing their diapers for eight years. In fact, I changed two this morning because I pulled

the trigger too early. Colleagues, respectfully, I’ve never heard of a diaper that went unchanged because some poor parent didn’t have access to a changing station. These stations are simply matters of convenience. If we’re going to allow individuals to take responsibility for getting themselves across the street in the crosswalk on time, we ought to expect that dads can take responsibility for their equal share of diaper changes, if this is an attempt to get dads to do their fair share, which is an effort that I applaud. If it’s an attempt to prevent the spread of diaper rashes by making changing more expeditious and convenient, then I can applaud that, too. I just don’t know if this bill solves either of those problems, and if you actually look at the public accommodation law, there is a gray area when it comes to certain places of business, like grocery stores, which often allow me to take my five-year-old in the back warehouse to use the restroom in an emergency, which—most of you have had five-year-olds—often, it is an emergency situation if they have to go in a public place, and so, what I’m concerned about is businesses will prevent individuals from allowing folks to go and use the restrooms in those areas because those places are small and cumbersome to put in a diaper-changing station. I can wait to change the baby until we get back to the car, but when my five-year-old has to go, she has to go ... you know, is this bill really necessary? Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Notwithstanding my colleague’s reservations, equality for both males and females is enshrined in the letter of the law. Senate Bill 821, S.D. 1, requires all new and existing places of public accommodation to provide baby diaper-changing stations that are equally accessible to men and women. The accommodation means a safe, sanitary, and convenient baby diaper-changing station, deck, or table would be installed in women’s and men’s restrooms or in unisex family restrooms. Despite strides in minimizing gender roles, diaper-changing accommodations are still often omitted from men’s restrooms. Our laws need to encourage equal opportunities for men **and** women. American fathers are indeed involved in child care just as much as mothers are, and attitudes among men toward gender and family norms are increasingly egalitarian. I believe that S.B. 821 will enable men **and** women to take equal part in the daily nurture of a child, encouraging the full participation of both men and women in family life. Please join me, colleagues, in supporting this commonsense public policy. Mahalo.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Right now, we have facilities that are family rooms; they’re already accommodating these things, and most of the men’s restrooms in most of the businesses do have it, but exactly what our previous senator said over there is that we’re going to force them to put in in certain restrooms, in certain stores and restaurants. Especially in my community, there’s one restroom that they use to hold all their equipment to clean the restroom in the restaurant. If you’re going to force them to put one of that inside, exactly what he said: They’re going to tell us only employees can use the restroom. So, instead of making something like this, as a bill and a law to chastise these small businesses and businesses, we should make it just a requirement for convenience because I’m going to tell you now, my daughter is right now ninth grade; I changed a whole heck of a lot of diapers, and I never needed one changing room. I did it inside her stroller or I went to the car or found creative ways, but just because it’s for convenience for us to be men and men to go in there and change the diapers, I have no problem in doing that, and making somebody mandate them on new and old businesses that don’t have the room, you’re going to take away the opportunity for us to use the restroom, and they’re

going to be closed to public restrooms for a lot of people, so I'm voting with reservations."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's additional remarks read as follows:

"With Reservations. I am voting with reservations on this bill, which requires all new private businesses that sell to or service the public, such as restaurants, as well as government agencies, to provide baby diaper-changing platforms in both men's and women's restrooms or unisex restrooms (1) by June 30, 2019, for new businesses and new State government facilities and (2) by July 1, 2022, for ALL older businesses and government facilities. The purpose of the bill is a good one, which I agree with: namely to make both women and men feel that they are sharing the responsibility of diaper-changing equally.

"However, the bill needs to be improved (which is the reason I am voting with reservations): Small mom-and-pop restaurants—long-time established and new ones—those in Chinatown, 'Ewa Beach, small towns in rural O'ahu and on the Neighbor Islands will suffer: They do not have space in their one unisex restroom to put in a diaper-changing station. Under the bill, as presently written, mom-and-pop restaurants would have to prove that 'no reasonable physical option exists.' And yet they can still be sued, successfully, by anyone who feels he or she is being 'injured by [the] unlawful discriminatory practice' of the mom-and-pop small business restaurant not providing a diaper-changing table. The party claiming discrimination can be awarded \$100 and also 'reasonable attorney's fees'—which usually will involve even more than an additional \$100.

"So: This bill has to make more clear the procedures and detailed process by which a mom-and-pop small business can qualify for the exemption that 'no reasonable physical option' exists for providing a diaper-changing station—and can display a public sign that the small business has qualified for the exemption so that members of the public cannot mistakenly try to take advantage by suing the small business. There needs to be a common-sense compromise that allows women and men of the general public to feel that they are being treated equally in terms of the availability of diaper-changing tables in men's restrooms as well as women's restrooms. That common-sense compromise should also allow small mom-and-pop businesses for whom diaper-changing tables are not feasible to operate without fear of being wrongfully sued."

The Chair commented:

"Director Butay: You guys are doing a great job. I know in the men's restrooms at the airport, we do have the diaper changing stations."

"I rise in strong support of this measure, which was inspired by an incident that happened on Maui, and I appreciate my

colleagues' support, and I have comments I'd like to have inserted into the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of **S.B. 477, S.D. 1**, Relating to Education. This bill allows the Department of Education to provide sexual abuse and sex trafficking prevention training to certain staff and requires DOE to make available to certain staff explanatory information about protocols that DOE has approved for providing services to victims of sexual abuse and sex trafficking.

"Minors are at risk of sexual abuse and sex trafficking, some of which could be happening at the child's home. Because they spend much of their time at school, it is important to train DOE employees on warning signs and ways to intervene. This measure will provide the resources needed to teachers and other DOE employees to protect our keiki from sexual abuse and sex trafficking in Hawai'i.

"I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

"In September 2018, the median price for a single family home here on O'ahu rose to \$812,500. A household has to make \$160,000 a year to afford to buy that median home. I think we can all agree: The system is broken. And S.B. 1 is a program designed to fix Hawai'i's housing shortage.

"This is not impossible. There are cities that have solved this problem, like Singapore, the direct inspiration for this bill. Singapore builds high-density residential units on government-owned land and sells 99-year leases on them for as little as 180,000 U.S. dollars. As a result, it has achieved a 90 percent homeownership rate.

"I recognize that there are many, many issues that have held up the production of affordable housing supply in Hawai'i, but many stakeholder groups have participated in drafting this measure, and their concerns are being heard. For environmentalists: no development of agricultural or conservation land, no shortcutting any environmental review processes. For taxpayers: no subsidy, no new taxes. For engineers and architects, developers, contractors, and labor: lots and lots of work for a long time to come.

"For those who fear an influx of outside investors or vacation renters: These units will only be available to Hawai'i residents who are owner-occupants and own no other real property—no outside investors, no renters of any kind. And no windfall profits, because 75 percent of all the profits from every resale go back to the State to help pay for the maintenance.

"S.B. 1 will build communities for all: young and old, rich and poor, every ethnic group, you name it, all side by side. No more income caps or first-time homebuyer requirements, no more concentrating poverty.

"Now, are there issues we still have to iron out? Of course. Getting a big project in on time and on budget is not easy; getting neighbors to buy in, getting people to accept that existing institutions will have to be redeveloped. There's a lot of work that we have to do before and after this bill passes.

"But this is more than a policy debate of pros and cons, Mr. President. This is about the future of our community. Ninety percent of my high school class went to college on the mainland, and most have not come back. For the first time since

statehood, our state has lost population not one, but two straight years, in large part due to the housing shortage. If the new generations of local people just leave, the Hawai'i we all know and love will simply cease to exist. Mr. President, let's try something bold. I believe that the future generations are worth it. Thank you."

This saying comes to mind with regard to this bill—and is the reason why I am voting 'No.' This bill allows the Department of Education—only AFTER a student has been expelled—to allow parents and guardians of the student, who has already been dismissed from attending school, to then request a clinical or psycho-educational evaluation 'to uncover contributing factors' that led to the suspension.

"This is definitely 'Too little – too late!' Instead, the Department of Education should allow parents and guardians to request such a clinical or psychoeducational evaluation BEFORE the student is expelled. Indeed, such an early evaluation can reduce the number of suspensions from school."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 985 (S.B. No. 824, S.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 985 be adopted and S.B. No. 824, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I just want to take a second to explain because my reservations are not what you think they are for. About a year and a half ago, I was visiting my daughter in Washington, D.C., and my husband and we rented bikes. I had a helmet on, and we were biking pretty quick because I've biked for many, many, many, **many** years of my life, and I've been a very experienced biker. And my wheel got caught in a deep rut in the road, and I went down. I remember the wheel getting caught, and the next thing I know, I was in an ambulance. I was knocked out and had a concussion. So why wouldn't you support this bill? I do support mandatory helmets for scooter renters, but I think, if we're going to be serious about brain injuries and the cost to society of them, that we need to be taking on some harder calls in addition to the scooters and taking a look at bikes and motorcycles and people riding in the backs of pickup trucks. People think, including myself, that you can react in time to avoid a disaster, and I can tell you from my experience and talking with other people, you cannot. If I hadn't had that helmet on, I would've had much worse than a severe concussion. Thank you."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"This bill was introduced due to a tragic accident that took the life of Alexis Patrice Jenkins, a young woman, after the moped she was driving collided with a truck on the island of Maui. Alexis was conceived in Maui in 1992 by Tim and Danielle Jenkins, and she was their only child. Though she had never been to Maui, she loved Hawai'i and had a little tattoo on her ankle of the Hawaiian Islands. Alexis waited 24 years for her first trip to Maui, and on August 14, 2017, she came for a vacation. On her second day, Alexis was riding a scooter without a helmet in the Wailea-Makena area of Maui and collided with a truck with no possibility of surviving this accident.

"The intention of this measure is to prohibit the operation of a moped or motor scooter leased from a rental company unless the operator is wearing a helmet, provided that the prohibition does not apply if the operator has a valid license to operate a motorcycle from any state; and prohibit the renting out of any moped or motor scooter with an aftermarket modification to its motor.

"Wearing a helmet when operating a moped or motor scooter could increase the chance of survival in the event of an accident. According to the Hawaii Injury Prevention Plan for 2012-2017, published by the Emergency Medical Services and Injury Prevention System Branch of the Department of Health, helmets can reduce the risk of death by 42 percent and reduce the risk of a head injury by 69 percent. In the state, there were 23 motor scooter and moped operator fatalities from 2016 to 2018. Of the 23 fatalities reported, 22 operators were not wearing a helmet.

"This measure will ensure the safety of residents and visitors of the state and reduce the number of fatalities by requiring certain moped and motor scooter renters to wear helmets. Support for the measure came from the Department of Transportation, Keiki Injury Prevention Coalition, O'ahu County Committee on Legislative Priorities of the Democratic

Party of Hawai'i, Meal Prep Las Vegas, Icon Tile, Lexi's Law 808, and 56 individuals. I urge my colleagues to support this measure in memory of Ms. Jenkins. It will help save lives and limit serious injury. Mahalo."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I was remiss on the earlier bill; this is the one that was inspired by an incident in my district. I've been in touch with the family, and they are quite pleased that we are considering this measure. I would just like to ask that the eloquent words of the chair of the Transportation committee be entered into the record as if they were my own, and just make a note that the irony of this is Lexi rode her bicycle in her home state of California, where she was very familiar with the roads, and wore a helmet. She came to Hawai'i, saw the beauty of the island, and because she wasn't reminded when she rented her moped that she should also wear her helmet here, on unfamiliar roads, she did not and lost her life. I know this can be a controversial subject, and that's why we've limited it to rentals, because I think the argument is most compelling there. When people come and rent something to go out on roads with which they are unfamiliar, we need to remind them and encourage them and require them to wear a helmet. It will, in fact, save lives. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 985 was adopted and S.B. No. 824, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENTALS OF MOPEDS AND MOTOR SCOOTERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 1405, S.D. 2, Relating to Electronic Smoking Products.

"E-cigarette use or vaping among youth and young adults has become a national public health concern. E-cigarettes are now the most popularly used tobacco product among youth and young adults, surpassing cigarettes. While smoking rates in Hawai'i have decreased through the years, ESD use has rapidly increased, threatening significant public health gains through our Tobacco 21 law and tobacco youth access laws.

"Without regulation, e-cigarette manufacturers will continue to aggressively market their products by using young adults and celebrities as endorsers, glamorizing its use, promoting deep discounts, and offering popular local e-liquid flavors such as Kona coffee, Maui mango, and pineapple.

"The FDA has deemed ESDs as tobacco products, as this measure would do, and would tax e-liquids. This measure would also increase permit fees for retailers and wholesalers, and make illegal the shipment of e-liquid. Many kids access

vape products online, using their parent's resources and information to order them. This loophole needs to be addressed and corrected.

"It is time to regulate an industry, to collect the appropriate taxes, raise the cost of licensing and permitting fees as well as ensure that there are no longer illegal online sales.

"Please join me in support of S.B. 1405, S.D. 2. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1000 was adopted and S.B. No. 1405, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRONIC SMOKING PRODUCTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"A carbon emissions tax is sort of the Holy Grail of carbon reduction, and it's a difficult subject because our tax system is set up, and it's never been set up before to try to address the issue of carbon. I just appreciate that you and my other colleagues are moving this bill forward and continuing the discussion because I think the timeline for when really catastrophic things are inevitable is very short—in the 10- to 12-year range—and the whole world needs to move forward quicker than we are. That's one reason I think, even though this bill is certainly a work in progress, that we have to have the discussion now because it will soon be too late. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1006 was adopted and S.B. No. 1463, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 331, Relating to Movie Theaters.

"Hawai'i has been a pioneer in public policy regarding access to movie entertainment for the deaf and/or hard-of-hearing community. Act 39, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2015,

required movie theater operators to provide closed captioning showings at least twice a week. The closed captioning requirement supplemented the federal Americans with Disabilities Act requirement to provide an assistive technology option.

“Unfortunately, the Legislature effectively repealed the open captioning requirement in 2017 by allowing movie theaters the option of offering a personal closed captioning system in lieu of offering showings with open movie captioning, depriving the deaf and/or hard-of-hearing community as well as other movie goers who may benefit from closed captioning of a tremendous benefit. Your Committee has heard testimony that eyewear was often broken or malfunctioning and that it is uncomfortable. In addition, it calls unnecessary attention to the users as being handicapped. The deaf and hard-of-hearing community strongly prefers open captioning to any type of eyewear, and have stated this virtually unanimously in testimony to multiple committee hearings.

“S.B. 331 addresses the discriminatory effects of communication barriers at movie theaters and seeks to restore and make permanent the requirements originally contemplated by Act 39, SLH 2015, which will enable deaf and hard of hearing consumers an equal opportunity to attend and enjoy movies in a similar manner as those who do not require open movie captioning. Please join me in support of S.B. 331, Relating to Movie Theaters.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1014 was adopted and S.B. No. 331, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOVIE THEATERS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 1244, S.D. 2, Relating to the Sale of Tobacco Products.

“This bill clarifies that liability for illegally selling tobacco products including electronic smoking devices to a person under the age of 21 is borne by the retail entity or individual who holds a valid permit to sell tobacco products, rather than an employee. Ninety-five percent of smokers start smoking before they turn 21. Therefore, it is imperative that we do all we can to prevent the sale of tobacco products including electronic smoking devices to minors below the age of 21. Such policy can significantly reduce smoking initiation in children and teens and thus help prevent young people from an addiction to this dangerous and deadly habit.

“This bill will hold retail entities and licensees responsible for oversight of their employees and sale activities. Retailers and permittees are the ones best positioned to set the parameters for sales in their establishments. The buck starts and stops with owners and licensees to institute effective best practices in their retail locations in order to ensure that there are no sales to underage customers. Placing the responsibility with the retail entity or licensee further ensures that Tobacco 21 laws will be

upheld. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 1244, S.D. 2.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1017 was adopted and S.B. No. 1244, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SALE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

“No. Any bill that infringes upon the Second Amendment right of individuals ‘to bear arms’ is one that I oppose—as I do with this bill. This bill extends the long arm of government into the privacy of our people who wish to own firearms to protect their own safety, to hunt for food for their families, and for other worthy purposes. These people, with good intentions, should NOT be required to report to the government if they have a firearm ‘lost, stolen, or destroyed.’ The government is invading the privacy of individuals and their right to bear arms whenever the government makes it mandatory for an individual to report to the authorities the ownership status of any firearm in her or his household.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1020 was adopted and S.B. No. 621, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23; Ayes with Reservations (Kidani). Noes, 1 (Fevella). Excused, 1 (Harimoto).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1022 (S.B. No. 739, S.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1022 be adopted and S.B. No. 739, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Chang rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Chang’s remarks read as follows:

“Ground transportation consumes roughly a third of the state’s imported fossil fuels. To reduce imported fossil fuel usage in Hawai‘i, we need to encourage people to drive less and use alternative forms of transportation. A parking cash-out program helps provide incentives for other forms of transportation. Offering commuters the option to choose either free parking or its cash value makes it clear that parking has a cost, which is the cash not taken. This would have multiple

benefits, including reduction of traffic congestion and giving employees what they really want.

“California has enacted legislation supporting a cash-out program, and research conducted afterwards found significant shifts in commuter behavior, including significant reductions in traffic.

“There are benefits to businesses as well, these include reduced costs associated with employee recruitment, onboarding, and training. A happy, healthy, stress-free employee is more likely to be a productive employee, and one of the biggest stressors for anyone is traffic. Finally, if driving is reduced, then the need for parking will be reduced as well.

“For the government, there are multiple benefits from a parking cash-out program such as user fee funding of its transportation programs, reduction of traffic congestion, and reduction of driver-related facility expenditures. Also, when a commuter does voluntarily choose taxable cash rather than a tax-exempt parking subsidy, federal and state income tax revenues increase.

“We should be supporting people to help lower their cost of living, not subsidizing driving, fossil fuel use, and traffic congestion.”

Senator Inouye rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. The intention of this is to require employers of 50 persons or more who provide a parking subsidy to employees to offer a parking cash-out program.

“CPH has found that ground transportation alone uses approximately one-third of the State’s imported fossil fuels. A parking cash-out program may help provide incentives for other forms of transportation, such as walking, bicycling, bus, rail, or carpooling, to be used.

“Testimony from the Department of Land and Natural Resources indicates that this measure is likely to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, and help Hawai’i make progress towards its energy and climate change goals. Parking experts generally agree that parking cash-out programs increase the share of commuters who choose modes of transportation other than driving alone to work. Such programs have been known to reduce vehicle miles traveled, and to benefit low-income commuters. This measure will not only help reduce the amount of fossil fuels being used in Hawai’i, but reduce the congestion that plagues our streets by promoting the use of public transportation.

“For these reasons, I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to research and explore the idea of a parking cash-out program that would enable businesses and employers to offer cash allowances instead of parking subsidies to provide incentives for other forms of transportation that are less dependent on fossil fuels.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1022 was adopted and S.B. No. 739, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PARKING,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

No. 642, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN AS AN OFFICIAL LANGUAGE OF THE STATE OF HAWAI’I,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1029 was adopted and S.B. No. 526, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Harimoto).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1035 (S.B. No. 1033, S.D. 2):

Senator Rhoads moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1035 be adopted and S.B. No. 1033, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 1033, S.D. 2, relating to the licensure of midwives. As with all bills at this point in the 2019 session, this bill is a work in progress. Its purpose is to create a licensing regime for midwives in the state. The state auditor conducted a sunrise analysis for the licensure of midwives in 2017, which concluded that regulation of this field is needed because the nature of the services provided by midwives may endanger the public’s health and safety.

“By way of background, midwives used to be regulated in this state. In 1931, the Territorial Legislature in Act 64 required midwives to register with the Board of Health and to file birth certificates for those births at which the midwife attended. In 1941, the Territorial Legislature in Act 87 regulated midwives along with other health professions and required the Board of Health to promulgate rules which provided that it was illegal to practice as a midwife without a permit or certificate of registration from the Board of Health. The relevant report from the Senate Committee on Public Health noted that registration was necessary to safeguard health. Fast forward to March 1989: There were only five licensed midwives in Hawai’i and they were all nurses. In October 1989, there were only 10 nurse midwives in Hawai’i, and of that, only 2 were practicing midwifery. In December 1989, the auditor did a sunset evaluation and concluded that since most midwives come from nursing, additional regulation was not needed.

“The situation in Hawai’i has clearly changed in the intervening years. Registration of health professionals is no longer under the Department of Health but under the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Nurse midwives are regulated under the Board of Nursing; non-nurse and non-credentialed personnel are holding themselves out as midwives with no regulation. The number of non-nurse midwives including cultural practitioners has grown in Hawai’i, leaving the auditor to conclude that the field of midwifery needed to be regulated.

“This measure is not a prohibition on a woman’s ability to choose her preferred birth attendant. Rather, licensure will provide consumers with increased access to midwifery care from providers who are skilled professional midwives with proper training and in the event that a problem birth occurs, these professionals would have access to a hospital setting if required.

“Hawai‘i is one of 17 states that does not license or regulate midwives, leaving women in Hawai‘i with no way to know who is certified to do a community birth and who is not. This measure protects the health and safety of women and their unborn infants. Please join me in voting yes on S.B. 1033, S.D. 2. Mahalo.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I was in full support of this bill as it passed out of our health committee and commend the work of our chair for including, I think, all the concerns. I’m less in support in its current form, so I’ll be voting with reservations.”

"Testimony from Keahole FBO I LLC indicate the following: Our project is generating revenue and jobs for the State of Hawai'i in areas such as but not limited to aviation services, aviation-related services, fuel, energy, food and beverage, ground transportation, tourism, architecture, engineering, law, finance, accounting, construction, landscaping, building maintenance. Further, our development and operations will generate multimillions of dollars in revenue for the DOT and State of Hawai'i through taxes, fees, and our lease. In addition to the lease fee, the DOT will generate revenue from 2 percent of our income, \$0.04/gallon of Jet A fuel we sell, and a portion of any subleases.

"This measure applies only to Keahole FBO I LLC in order to authorize the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds to planning, designing, constructing, equipping, and operating facilities for aviation services and aviation-related services at Ellison Onizuka Kona International Airport at Keahole. For these reasons I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to assist Keahole FBO I LLC."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1071 was adopted and S.B. "Mr. President, once again, I am standing here to speak in favor of our Airports Corporation bill. As you know, Mr. President, and as stated in the latest committee report, the Hawaii Airports Corporation is being established to 'assume all of the authority, powers, functions, duties, and responsibilities of the Department of Transportation related to airports and aeronautics.'

"This bill has the support of government entities including the state Department of Transportation, the Office of the Governor, Department of Public Safety, and the University of Hawai'i. Support also comes from diverse organizations, such as the Building Industry Association of Hawaii, American Council of Engineering Companies, the Airport Concessionaires Committee alongside tourist-related entities, such as the Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association, Kohala Coast Resort Association, Hawaiian Airlines, and a number of others, including several individuals.

"The Hawaii Airports Corporation will be an important step to improving the management, efficiency, and facilities at our airports. With a strong emphasis on commercial and customer focus, the Airports Corporation will be able to adjust to economic opportunities and market conditions through dedicated expert airport leadership. The entity will also ensure that there is management continuity and year-round decision-making consistent with best practices in the industry. For example, the State could have been more timely in the establishment of new gates for the arrival of the Airbus A380, the construction of the new hangars for Hawaiian Airlines, freight facilities at Hilo Airport, terminal upgrades and better management and maintenance of the various facilities that make up our airport communities.

"There have been concerns raised about the exemptions from the Hawaii Public Procurement Code. As written, the bill allows the Airports Corporation to establish rules and procedures in regards to procurement, provided that the corporation shall consult with the State Procurement Office prior to adopting the rules. The board of directors shall act in good faith to maintain internal policies and procedures for the timely and efficient procurement of goods and services, including planning, engineering, and construction services, to include post-award contract management and oversight procedures, that are consistent with the goals of public accountability and public procurement practices. I am confident that we can keep lines of communication open between the Legislature and the Airports Corporation.

"There have also been some concerns raised regarding the transfer of police powers to the Hawaii Airports Corporation. As this involves the state sheriff's office, Transportation Security Administration, county police departments, and private security firms, just like the procurement code, the CEO shall also act in good faith to come up with a comprehensive plan that maintains and strengthens airport security for the public and the airport communities.

"In terms of maintaining transparency, it will be the board's responsibility to uphold current and future laws that address this issue.

"For this and many other reasons, I urge my colleagues to support this bill as we move Hawai'i further into the 21st century and the next. Mahalo, Mr. President and colleagues."

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

I ask my colleagues: Did anybody not look at your phone the first hour after you woke up today? Anybody not look at it in the last 10 minutes? So, that's okay for adults; we're making that choice with some sense of consciousness, but for our kids, their brains are getting wired in the first few years of their development. They're getting wired differently today than they ever have been in our history, and we don't know the results of that. So I'm thankful that we're going to begin to address this issue, and I'd ask for your support. Thank you."

"I worry that if we don't watch out this may affect residents in my 'Ewa Beach district who will find their hours and tips cut and maybe even lose their jobs due to the rising cost of doing business.

"Now we hear that the City & County of Honolulu is targeting tourism again by having the hotel and resorts be the only business class in the county to have their real property taxes raised.

"That's why I say a better idea is to go after the illegal transient vacation rentals that aren't paying their taxes."

"Senate Bill 789, S.D.2, proposes to (1) provide for increases in the minimum wage from the current \$10.10 per hour to \$12.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2020, and to \$15.00 per hour beginning January 1, 2023; and (2) establish a nonrefundable income tax credit for qualifying small businesses to offset the increase in the minimum hourly wage that employers must pay their employees. This measure is intended to strike a balance between the interests of employees and employers by increasing the minimum wage in two increments over three years, while providing a tax credit to help qualified small businesses adjust to the increased labor cost.

"Hawai'i has the lowest average wage in the nation when adjusted for the cost of living. There is a significant difference between the minimum wage and what is needed to afford basic needs in Hawai'i. The Senate has made passage of an increase

to the minimum wage a priority for this legislative session. I urge my colleagues to support Senate Bill 789, S.D.2."

Senator Fevella requested that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

"With reservations. I vote with reservations regarding raising the minimum wage because it will only hurt small businesses in my community, such as mom-and-pop stores and restaurants. It will raise their costs and put them out of business. It will also eliminate entry-level jobs such as those at McDonald's, thus depriving our youngsters of the opportunity for their first job."

And so here we are again with our facilities a year older and our repair and maintenance backlog a year longer.

"If there is a misconception that it is the intention of this body to privatize the libraries and take them away, let me assure you that is not the intention of this bill. This bill gives the libraries the opportunities to partner with the private sector to look at how these community spaces can be revitalized to further the mission of the public library system. This could include having coffee shops or other retail opportunities to generate revenue for the public library system.

"We know that we cannot afford to simply spend our way out of our crumbling facilities. I hope that this body will continue to support our libraries by again offering them this tool to build 21st Century Libraries by voting in the affirmative for S.B. 976, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

Having said this, I can't subject my constituents and the Big Island residents to this; they're the most vulnerable for another increase in higher taxes. Mahalo."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I rise to speak on the merits of Senate Bill 1474, S.D. 2, Relating to Taxation. Members, we are here yet again to vote on a measure to increase funding for our public education system. We know that we have needs in our schools: We have classrooms without proper supplies, equipment, or even highly qualified teachers. We cannot continue to wait and see if more money will magically appear or rely on a growing economy to put more resources into our classrooms.

"I know there are those who speak out against any raises in the GET due to its regressive nature, but I want to remind my colleagues today that, with the exception of the one-half percent surcharge for rail, the tax rate on GET has remained at 4 percent since 1965. (Ironically, I will note, that the session act of 1965 that raised it to 4 percent was Act 155, and, five years ago, we passed Act 155, which was to build 21st-century schools, which has still not happened.) But since then, our population has doubled. Government services expanded. We have had federal mandates, but our largest general revenue tax stream, our GET, has remained at 4 percent for the state. I hope that this body will continue to support ways to fund our public education system by voting in the affirmative on this measure. Mahalo."

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd like the comments of the senator from Mililani to be put into the record as my own and offer also some additional comments." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Taniguchi's remarks read as follows:

"Senate Bill 1474, S.D. 2, proposes to increase the general excise tax and use tax by 0.5 percent to benefit public education by providing a dedicated funding source for operations of the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i. The State of Hawai'i is struggling with budget issues and the limited financial resources presently available to address the many needs of the public, including addressing the compensation of teachers and staff, and the maintenance and capital improvement program backlog. Accordingly, the Legislature needs to seriously consider the establishment of an increase in the general excise and use taxes, with the additional revenues generated to serve as a dedicated funding source for public education through the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i. I urge my colleagues to support Senate Bill 1474, S.D. 2."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'm tempted to ask that the excellent comments of our Education chair be added, but I don't want the Journal to get too repetitive. But no one likes added taxes, and this is certainly not perfect, but every other effort to try to get significant more funding to teachers and schools so far has failed. We all know about the teacher crisis that we have, and that affects our next generation. So I will support any and all efforts that the teachers

themselves support to try to get more money to our teachers. Thank you.”

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Harimoto and Thielen who were excused.

The center became a federal Head Start Program 20 years after its founding and has succeeded in the years since thanks to continued support from its government and community partners.

"Today, PACT provides a very impressive range of educational and social services for our most vulnerable families and individuals. The first is early childhood education for pre-qualified parents on O'ahu and Hawai'i island: Early Head Start serves prenatal parents and infants from birth to three years while Head Start is for children ages three to five. Its domestic violence prevention and intervention services help individual families affected by domestic violence through Family Peace Center, a domestic violence shelter; Family Visitation Center, a transition house; and a Trafficking Victim Assistance Program. In the field of child abuse and neglect prevention and treatment, PACT offers comprehensive services to promote positive parenting and healthy child development. Its community-building and economic development efforts include programs geared toward the social, economic, and cultural well-being of individuals and families in need.

"We all know that government can't do it all, and organizations like Parents and Children Together have a vital role in providing holistic care to the needy so they can build a better future for themselves and their children. Celebrating 50 years is an achievement for any organization, and it is a testament to the strength and importance of community and those who have answered the call to help others. Here with us today, Madam President, are Ryan Kusumoto, our president and CEO; Dawn Kurisu, vice president of strategy and innovations; Ben Naki, vice president of early childhood education; Tina Porras-Jones, vice president of community-building programs. Please join me in thanking them and everyone at PACT for their exceptional service. Madam President, we wish them many more years of success."

Senator Moriwaki rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Moriwaki’s remarks read as follows:

“Madam President, with reservations and comments. The United States Army Corps of Engineers has been working with the State and City since 2001 to develop a plan to mitigate flooding in the Ala Wai Watershed in the event of a ‘once in a century’ storm. If such a catastrophic flood were to occur, over 3,000 structures, with over a billion dollars in structural damages alone could severely impact Honolulu’s urban core and Hawai’i’s economy. A 2004 25-year storm flooded Mānoa Valley and caused about \$85 million in damages.

“In an emergency appropriation last July, Congress appropriated \$345 million to plan and construct a flood risk management system, but only if we came up with a local sponsor—either the state or the city—and matching funds of \$125 million. S.B. 77 provides for the local match.

“But the project has not sufficiently engaged community members directly affected by the flood risk management measures. Over a hundred members of the public who live or work in Mānoa, Makiki, Pālolo, McCully/Mō’ili’ili, and Waikīki oppose going forward with the project. They feel excluded from the planning process. Neighborhood boards in and around the watershed in Mānoa, Makiki, Pālolo, McCully/Mō’ili’ili, Ala Moana/Kaka’ako, and Diamond Head/Kapahulu/St. Louis Heights have adopted or are considering adopting resolutions calling for more public involvement and even for a halt to the State funding of the project.

“Madam President, I believe we can mitigate the flood risk in the Ala Wai watershed while addressing community concerns. We can preserve and restore the surrounding ecosystem while minimizing adverse impacts to the affected properties. During our Ways and Means Committee hearing on S.B. 77, the State, the City and County, and the Army Corps personnel committed to engaging with the community on project design and to communicating status updates to the public. They committed to consider preserving schools and other public institutions with cultural or historical significance, addressing the concerns of private property owners to minimize adverse impacts of the project, and finding opportunities to preserve and restore the Ala Wai ecosystem. University faculty with expertise in engineering, planning, hydrology, climate change, and landscape architecture have since offered their expertise to work on this project if it is approved.

“Given these commitments and for the long-term safety of our community, I believe we should move S.B. 77 forward at this time.”

Babson College in Massachusetts, one of the most prestigious schools for entrepreneurship in the United States.

“Jade’s long professional career spans the course of 26 years in various positions of increasing responsibility in both the private sector and government. His first stint in government was working for the state Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism as a budget analyst and a legislative coordinator. He worked for former U.S. Congressman Neil Abercrombie as a congressional aide before moving on to several construction firms in the private sector. In 2011, Mr. Butay was appointed to the Department of Transportation as the deputy director for administration under the Abercrombie administration before being appointed deputy director for the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations until 2014, when he was reappointed back to the Transportation department as deputy director for administration again in 2014 under the Ige administration. Jade was first appointed as director of the Department of Transportation in 2017, and we confirmed him in the Senate last year. The governor reappointed Jade as the Transportation director for another term; this is a reflection of the governor’s confidence in Jade in continuing the outstanding work he has done since that initial appointment last year. As you know, the Transportation department has had to deal with all kinds of emergencies, ranging from flooding rains on O’ahu, Kaua’i, and the Big Island; the Puna volcano eruption; to the recent landslides along the Pali Highway.

“While Jade is well-versed in the areas of process and technology as applied to each division of the Transportation department, he firmly believes that the people who work for the department are major factors in keeping the processes running well. He stated, ‘The DOT has 2,600 positions. I believe that as with any large department, leading by example, being respectful of others’ opinions, creating a consistent and fair process, listening to others’ feedback, and understanding that one cannot succeed without the support of staff, creates a positive working environment.’ He goes on to state, ‘I will continue to focus on improving communications across the department and up and down the management chain, [and implement] greater recognition of employee contribution to the mission.’ Leadership development and employee training opportunities will continue while preserving teamwork, accountability, excellence, transparency, and communications to make sure employees can carry out the department’s mission on behalf of the state.

“Jade outlined the department’s top priorities for the fiscal biennium from 2019 to 2021 as follows:

- Ensure the safety of the public;
- Improve operational efficiency;
- Improve infrastructures ‘to provide domestic and international travelers a unique destination experience’;
- Airports, harbors, and highways modernization;
- Support commerce in the state through cost-effective maintenance of facilities;
- Promote ‘revenue enhancements’;
- Leverage federal funds with state funds;
- Better communication with the public.

“Members, the accolades for Jade Butay are plentiful. All of the testimony the Transportation committee received was overwhelmingly supportive. Jade is humble but an extremely able public servant who knows how to manage the department and get the job done. I ask for your full support and vote of confidence for Director Butay.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I am honored to present Lynn A.S. Araki-Regan as the governor’s nominee for deputy director of the state Department of Transportation. Lynn has worked in both the private and public sector for many years. Most recently, she was the managing director for the County of Maui. She served in that position from 2018 to this year, when she was tapped for the deputy director’s position for DOT this year. Prior to that, Lynn served as the Maui mayor’s chief of staff from 2017 to 2018. She managed the Communications, Budget, Community Development Block Grant offices and the Office of Economic Development programs. She also assisted the mayor with public relations efforts, and helped facilitate effective decision-making. She coordinated the execution of strategic initiatives and ensured that all staff issues were properly addressed. Lynn’s other public service positions include budget director for the County of Maui, economic development coordinator for the County of Maui as well, and law clerk at the Hawai’i Supreme Court. She is a member of the Hawaii State Bar Association, and has been practicing law since 1996. She has 22 years of experience in litigation, commercial transactions, creditors’ rights, and landlord/tenant law. Her private sector experience includes realtor at Keller Williams Realty on Maui; etiquette instructor at the Hawaii School of Etiquette (do we need all that at DOT?); and faculty instructor at the University of Phoenix, also in Maui.

“Lynn has also been highly engaged in her community, being involved in organizations as diverse as the Maui Chamber of Commerce, Maui Filipino Chamber of Commerce, the Realtors Association of Maui, Boy Scouts of America, Hospice Maui, Caring K9s Maui, the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai’i, and the H.P. Baldwin High School Foundation.

“Lynn is a graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai’i, where she got her juris doctor in 1995. She got her bachelor of science degree in accounting at Santa Clara University in California and graduated summa cum laude from Baldwin High School on Maui.

“Lynn cites her experience in law and the positions of budget director and the mayor’s chief of staff for the County of Maui as qualifications to this appointment. She stated, ‘I have gained invaluable experience in a variety of areas including overseeing and managing operations, budgeting, public relations, strategic planning, community coalition building, grant writing and monitoring, preparing for emergencies, environmental issues, working in the EOC, and personnel/HR issues—all of which are extremely valuable for the position deputy director responsible for the administrative functions of the department.’ (I don’t think this girl sleeps.) While in her various capacities at Maui County, Lynn also worked closely with the county’s Department of Transportation and the Department of Public Works throughout the annual budget process and addressing transportation-related issues.

"In her position as deputy director of the Hawai'i State Department of Transportation, Lynn's vision for the DOT is 'to enhance the quality of life and the environment of Hawai'i's residents and visitors by creating an integrated transportation system that focuses on safely moving people and goods by offering an efficient and sustainable inter-modal transportation system.' She will emphasize safety, people, integrity and respect in her new position. Some of her goals include filling vacant positions within the department, completing a transportation funding study, and proposing long-term alternatives for funding.

"Members, Lynn Araki-Regan is a highly qualified individual with years of knowledge and experience in both the public and private sectors. This has prepared her for the position of deputy director of DOT. I ask for your full support and vote of confidence to advise and consent. Thank you, Madam President and colleagues."

Due to a chance conversation, he decided to put his name in to apply to be a director with Governor Ige's cabinet, and, fortunately, Governor Ige was smart enough to realize the tremendous opportunity he had in inviting Mr. Otaguro to join the cabinet.

"Prior to his appointment by the governor, Mr. Otaguro worked for First Hawaiian Bank for over 37 years, where he spent most of his career in various positions of increasing responsibility. Most recently, he served as the executive vice president and division manager of the Digital Banking Division of First Hawaiian Bank. He has also served, among other positions, as executive vice president and division manager for the Personal and e-Banking Division; executive vice president and regional manager of the Retail Banking Group; executive vice president and group manager of the Card Services Group; senior vice president and division manager of the Information Management Group and Operations Research and Development Division; and vice president and department manager of the Research and Development Department.

"Mr. Otaguro is a graduate of 'Iolani School and earned his bachelor of science in business management from the University of Redlands in California. His nearly 40 years of private sector management experience will be especially helpful when directing and coordinating the various activities of the Department of Accounting and General Services. His knowledge of the banking and financial services industry will also ensure that the state has the highest standard of financial

reporting and accounting operations, which are central to this department and the position of comptroller for the state Accounting and General Services. So, colleagues, please join me in giving your wholehearted support and confirmation for Mr. Otaguro as comptroller for DAGS."

Ms. Hidano has extensive community ties in addition to her public and private sector experience, having served as a board member of the City and County of Honolulu Neighborhood Board No. 12 since 1989—that is 30 years. So, not only is she deeply involved in community issues, she also must have the patience of a saint. And she's serving as a current board member of the Nu'uano YMCA.

"Ms. Hidano's invaluable background in the private and public sectors arm her with a wealth of experience to craft innovative solutions for the department. Her experience in construction gives her a deep understanding of the industry and a wealth of industry context, which will be invaluable to her as she contributes to the leadership of a department charged with overseeing numerous state construction contracts. Members, please join me in supporting and confirming Ms. Audrey Hidano as the deputy comptroller for the State of Hawai'i."

The Chair commented:

"I'd like to interject that in a former life, I worked with Ms. Hidano, back in 1969. I'm not telling you her age; that was a long time ago."

Monday, March 11, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:40 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Moriwaki congratulated Sara King for receiving the 2019 Milken Educator Award, and presented the following remarks:

"Aloha, members. I'm honored and pleased to introduce Sara King, a teacher at Ala Wai Elementary School, recipient of the 2019 Milken Educator Award. Like the Milken Family Foundation, we believe that teachers are key to our future. If they teach, inspire, love, and nurture students, especially so in our Title I schools, their students will become engaged citizens and leaders who will build a better Hawai'i, nation, and world. Sara is one of 33 national awardees receiving the 2019 Milken Educator Award, called the Oscars of the teaching profession. For 30 years, the Milken family has rewarded inspired excellence in education by honoring top educators in the country. In addition to the national recognition comes a \$25,000 unrestricted award; travel to Washington, D.C., to meet and discuss important issues in education; and membership in a network of over 2,700 top teachers, principals, and specialists to strengthen education. The Milken award sends a strong message to teachers: We recognize you; we value you; we thank you.

"Alexander the Great said, 'I am indebted to my father for living, but to my teacher for living well.' And so does Sara for the Ala Wai Elementary students. Her dedication to and love of her students know no bounds. She spent seven years as a first grade teacher at Ala Wai before heading its Title I compliance program. She took on this challenge only on one condition: that she could continue to teach. A believer in project-based learning, Sara taught students to facilitate their own learning through active questioning and research. She has created inclusive environments for English language learners, pioneered student-led conferences, and developed educational tools that the entire school uses. Sara also goes outside the classroom to coach basketball and softball, and organizes school beautification projects. I recently had the pleasure of visiting Ala Wai Elementary's Leadership Day. Pre-K to fifth-grade students led the program, telling how they live Franklin Covey's seven habits as leaders—very impressive; we could all learn from them! Sara's dedication does not end with her students; she goes way above and beyond: mentoring other teachers, serving on the science committee in aligning curriculum with the Next Generation Science Standards, coordinating professional development on literacy, and even helping an international colleague adjust to her new school and her new country.

"We wish to congratulate and thank Sara for her commitment and outstanding contributions to the students at Ala Wai Elementary School, the Department of Education, and the State. Mr. President, members, please join us in congratulating Sara King, our 2019 Milken Educator awardee. Thank you. Mr. President, I would like to now turn the floor over to the senator from Pālolo."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President and fellow senators, in the gallery are some of our honoree's supporters. First, I'd like to introduce Sara's husband, Jason King; with him is their three-year-old son, Jake,

and their eight-month-old daughter, Siena. At the school, honoree Sara King certainly is an inspiration to her school community and state. As Sara would say, her accomplishments are not all of her doing and recognition is also deserving for her fellow educators. I'd like to introduce Ala Wai school principal Michelle DeBusca. Principal DeBusca creates a welcoming atmosphere for those who believe in doing what is right and best for children, and collaborates with community partners to support this mission. Ala Wai school librarian Jennifer Moku and English language coordinator Carla Cunningham: both are key supporters of Ala Wai's culturally diverse student body. From the Department of Education, I'd like to introduce district resource teacher Joyce Luka, deputy superintendent Phyllis Unebasami, and our state Education Superintendent Dr. Christina Kishimoto. Thank you all for joining us today in honoring and recognizing Sara King! Thank you. We appreciate all the work you're doing in caring, loving, and educating our children. Thank you, Mr. President. At this time, I'd like to turn the floor back to the senator from Kaka'ako."

Senator Moriwaki then rose to invite the members to a luncheon that afternoon to honor Sara King.

She is a lifelong farmer with over 30 years of experience in fresh egg production, management, and poultry feed, which has provided her with a wealth of knowledge of Hawai‘i agriculture. Since 2015, Ms. Shimabukuro-Geiser has served as the deputy chairperson of the Board of Ag and has been instrumental in moving the Department of Ag forward to reach its goals. She has received recognition from the agricultural community as the first female recipient of the Hawai‘i Farm Bureau Federation Outstanding Member award.

“Her mission is to assist all farmers and ranchers to grow more wholesome food, fiber, and energy through coexistence of conventional and organic practices with innovative tools to double local food production. Ms. Shimabukuro-Geiser’s passion for and commitment to sustainability, food resiliency, and quality of life for the people of Hawai‘i make her well-suited to serve as the chairperson of the Board of Agriculture. Colleagues, please join me in supporting G.M. 596.”

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:31 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fevella and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole introduced his constituent Bonnie Christensen, who was seated in the gallery with her eleventh- and twelfth-grade students from Punahou School.

Senator Chang acknowledged Ray Sakamoto, who was seated among the students from Punahou School and was serving as an intern in Senator Chang's office.

Senator Chang then congratulated the Maryknoll School boys varsity basketball team, and presented the following remarks:

"In 1984, Ronald Reagan was president, a cell phone looked like a brick, I was two years old, and the Maryknoll School boys basketball team won their last state championship. Today, we are honored to have the 2018–2019 Maryknoll School boys varsity basketball team with us, who, after 35 years, are top dog again in high school boys basketball.

"On February 23, Maryknoll won the HHSAA Boys Basketball State Tournament, defeating Punahou 50–34 in the championships. (As a proud 'Iolani grad, I love saying, 'Defeating Punahou'!) This win comes as no surprise to anyone who knows the school's team. The team put in long hours practicing on the courts and in the gym, all while devoting time to schoolwork. Even with the amount of time they spent practicing and focusing on their academic career, a 30 and 2 record, one of the strongest defenses in the state, and the top seed in the tournament, the road to the championship was still a tough road as they would be making history by ending a 35-year drought. Together with hard work, teamwork, and perseverance, they were able to pull off the victory and win the state championship. Today we are honored to have them with us. Mr. President, with your permission, I yield my time to Senator Taniguchi."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"I rise today to introduce our special guests that we have on the floor today. When I call your name, please stand so that you may be recognized. On the floor today we have:

"Ms. Shana Tong: Ms. Tong is a 1982 graduate of Maryknoll School and is currently vice president of academic affairs.

"Mr. Ben Valle: Mr. Valle is a 1984 graduate of Maryknoll School and played under legendary coach Tony Sellitto on Maryknoll's 1984 team, which won the school's first state championship in boys basketball. He currently serves as director of athletics at the school.

"Coach Kelly Grant: Coach Grant is the head coach of the Maryknoll boys basketball team and is a 1984 graduate of Maryknoll School. Coach Grant was a teammate of Mr. Valle and, under coach Tony Sellitto, they were both on that 1984 championship team, and this latest championship continues a history of success that has seen Coach Grant achieve, not only at Maryknoll, but at Kaimuki High School as well in 2007.

"Mr. Liko Soares: Liko is a junior member of the boys basketball team. He scored 13 points and was described as

being almost unstoppable once he touches the ball near the basket.

"Mr. Kalai Akaka: Kalai is a senior member of the Maryknoll basketball team. He is a forward with the team and had nine rebounds, four assists, three steals, and one block.

"Would you all please give them a round of applause? Congratulations. Mr. President, with your permission, I yield back to Senator Chang."

Senator Chang rose and stated:

"I would like to introduce the rest of the Maryknoll School boys varsity basketball team and coaching staff who have joined us in the gallery today: We have assistant coaches AJ De Jesus, Matafaga Loa, David Lum, Kalia McGee, Tyler Reuter, and Devan Uyeda. And we also have team members Payton Grant, Marcus Tobin, Makoto Kamata, Reginald Eiland, Noah Furtado, Irvin Lin, Kahaweoakali'aaloha McGee, Matthew 'Nui' Pila, Nikolas Robben, Sage Tolentino, Tyler Brooke, Logan Dias, and Parker Grant. Let's give them all a round of applause."

The Chair commented:

"I just would briefly say: I shared with the coach that I had the opportunity to get back to Kaula'i in time to watch the whole game and saw earlier games, where Punahou's press created havoc and panic in other teams, and was thoroughly impressed by the composure of the Maryknoll team, and they were great free-throw shooters at the end of the game as they tried to foul to stay in the game. They pulled away as they continued to successfully make the free throws, and it was a team well coached. As a father of two sons myself, I can only imagine the pride of the coach when he had a son who is also a player on that team, and it certainly was a heartwarming human-interest story besides a great sports story, so I'd like to offer my personal congratulations. And, Madam Clerk, if there are no objections from Senator Chang, on his introduction, if you would amend it to include 1984, the birth year of Senator Dru Kanuha."

Shortly before Team Honolulu won the United States Little League Championship to meet South Korea in the championship game, news broke that Category 5 Hurricane Lane was streaming toward O'ahu. Team Honolulu became a beacon of hope for the State of Hawai'i as their success on a national stage provided a welcome diversion and sense of pride for the people of Hawai'i. With their shutout win against South Korea in the championship game, Team Honolulu became the third team from Hawai'i and the first Honolulu-based team to be crowned Little League World Series champions. Throughout the World Series tournament, Team Honolulu exemplified the aloha spirit with their passion, humility, and sportsmanship on and off the field. He also served as president and chief executive officer of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, which includes our public hospitals providing inpatient and outpatient services primarily in rural areas across the state. Altogether, Bruce has over 35 years of experience managing health and environmental protection programs in our state.

"The director of Health is the chief health and environmental official in Hawai'i, and oversees more than 100 programs and over 2,700 dedicated staff members whose mission is to protect

and improve the health and environment for all people here in Hawai'i. I believe that Dr. Anderson's leadership abilities, his professional experience, and extensive knowledge will continue to be valuable assets to the Department of Health, and I urge my colleagues to join me to vote in favor of his confirmation. Mahalo."

Senator Ihara extended an additional welcome to Dr. Deane Harimoto, noting that they were classmates at Highlands Intermediate School and that he remembered Dr. Harimoto as a "brainiac" with a very strong mind.

Senator Inouye acknowledged Randy Iwase, former chair of the Public Utilities Commission and former State Senator, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Thielen recognized the Hawai'i State Department of Education School Food Services Branch, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, we'd like to recognize Mr. Albert Scales as the program administrator for the state Department of Education Farm to School Initiative, and we are also pleased to welcome Dexter Kishida, who serves as a program specialist for the DOE Farm to School Initiative. Thank you.

"The Hawai'i State Department of Education, the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture, and the Kohala Center are working collaboratively on the Farm to School Initiative. Across the nation, Farm to School programs are reconnecting students to a better understanding of the food system and where their food comes from. Farm to School programs introduce students to healthier eating habits and help them become familiar with new vegetables and fruits that they and their families will then be more willing to incorporate into their own diets. The goal of the Farm to School Initiative is to address the supply and demand issues surrounding the purchasing of local food for our state school cafeterias. The initiative also aims to systematically increase state purchasing of local food for our school menus as well as connect our keiki with the 'āina through their food using products from the local agricultural community. I know that there'd been some work done in the Senate for many years on trying to increase local food in our school cafeterias, both for the benefit of the farmers and for the health of the keiki, and we were making incremental progress after many years' effort. But a couple years ago, I walked into a meeting with Mr. Albert Scales, where he was doing a presentation, and it really was phenomenal, just the innovation, the breath of fresh air, and the invigorating atmosphere that he was bringing around the issue and the goals that he was setting forth. Since I know this is near and dear to the Senate heart, we wanted to recognize these folks, and I'd like to turn it now over to my colleague from Kapolei to say a few words."

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, actions speak louder than words and tell the truth of one's leadership. Albert Scales serves as the administrator for the Department of Education's School Food Services Branch. He was instrumental in the Farm to School Initiative, designed to address the supply and demand issues

surrounding the purchasing of local food for our state school cafeterias. The initiative also aims to systematically increase state purchasing of local food for our school menus as well as connect our keiki with the 'āina through their food using products from the local agricultural community. I'd now like to yield the floor to my colleague from Hawai'i island to say a few words."

Senator Ruderman rose to present the following remarks:

"Starting in 2017, the Farm to School Initiative has provided thousands of pounds of local produce in our public schools, including local beef, banana, papaya, pineapple, 'ulu, and Okinawan sweet potato, and there are already plans to purchase green papaya and kalo and poi in the year 2019. Albert Scales was instrumental in working with various farming organizations to secure the fresh and local produce. We're pleased to welcome Albert and Dexter to the Senate and to recognize the amazing work they've accomplished in our public schools, and if I can just echo the words of our senator from Kailua, that the difference that such an innovative individual made was like night and day. Thank you very much, and I'd like to turn the floor back over to the senator from Kailua."

Senator Thielen rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I do need to make a correction, though: I am the senator from Waimānalo—originally from Kailua, but moved to God's Country about 10 years ago.

"So, like every great leader, Mr. Scales, when we contacted his office and said the Senate wanted to recognize him, immediately said that he could not do this without all the folks in his office, and, unfortunately, they seem to be swept with a flu or bug and some vacation scheduled, so the ones who were going to be here today could not be, but I do want to recognize them on the floor. In addition to Dexter Kishida, the program specialist who's with us today: Iris Fujimoto, Earlyn Worley, Laureen Oda, Lindsay Rodrigues, Curtis Haida, Jayson Watts, and Anna-Lisa Okoye have been instrumental in making these changes.

"One of the comments that we didn't make is, in the presentation that Mr. Scales made to the Legislature that I got a chance to walk into a couple years ago, he voluntarily said they were going to be moving away from the use of Styrofoam trays. Many of us remember being in school and they had those plastic trays; well, they replaced those with Styrofoam a little while ago, so when you think of the number of school students, the number of school lunches and school breakfasts that are being served, and you calculate the cubic feet of Styrofoam trays that are utilized every year, you could easily fill up this room. So it is a phenomenal effort that they are undertaking, not only in bringing local food to our students, promoting farming, but also reducing the waste and trash that's going into our landfill and being much more environmentally sensitive. So, colleagues, please join me in welcoming Albert Scales and Dexter Kishida."

The Chair extended a personal thanks to Senator Ruderman, who spearheaded the legislation and pushed the idea forward back in 2015, and former Lieutenant Governor Shan S. Tsutsui, who had been assigned to the initiative.

ORDER OF THE DAY**THIRD READING**

H.B. No. 2, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 2, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I rise in support of H.B. 2. Additionally, please apply my comments in support to the next bill, H.B. 116, as well. Your Committee on Ways and Means, in keeping with the intent of the new budget process established a few months ago, passed out both H.B. 2 and H.B. 116 together to make up the Senate's position on the executive budget. H.B. 116 is supplemental to H.B. 2.

"Before I get into the highlights of the two budget bills, I'd like to thank all of the Senate subject-matter committee chairs for taking up the challenge presented at the beginning of session to really dive into their departments' budgets, scrutinize their requests, and make recommendations to the Ways and Means committee so that we may pass an executive budget that helps hold the state government accountable and live within our means based off of the revenues that we collect. The committee feels it is important to limit the growth of government and reduce duplicative services. Where applicable, departments should be working with each other to provide services to Hawai'i residents. With that in mind, I would also like to thank the subject-matter committee chairs for finding vacancies to cut for new positions that were added to the Senate draft.

"The Senate approached the Senate draft conservatively in the event the Council on Revenues further lowered their general fund revenues forecast. On Tuesday, the Council on Revenues decreased their forecast for fiscal year '19 from 4.2 percent to 3 percent. This amounts to an \$81.6 million decrease in revenues for fiscal year '19 and will cause a compounding decrease of \$103.2 million by fiscal year '25 in the state's financial plan. Council on Revenues kept their forecast flat for fiscal year '20 to '25 at 4 percent growth.

"The Senate put together a responsible budget; we looked at ways to cut costs, reduce spending, and put forward bills to generate revenue that have crossed over to the House. Working with the subject-matter chairs in putting together the Senate draft, we kept in mind our fixed-cost obligations, such as health benefits, Medicaid, pensions, and debt service. These obligations alone account for 51 percent of our budget spending. The Senate draft on the executive budget for the fiscal biennium 2019-2021 puts forth a state budget that is \$31.7 million lower than the executive budget for fiscal year 2020 and \$183.6 million lower for fiscal year '21.

"House Bill 2, S.D. 1, includes the base budget from Act 53, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018; the addition of previously appropriated collective bargaining amounts that were enacted in a number of bills in 2017 and '18 legislative sessions; the addition of full-year funding amounts for positions established with a six-month delay in hire in Act 53, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018; the adjustments necessary to fulfill ERS, EUTF debt service, and Medicaid requirements for this biennium; and the reduction of non-recurring amounts identified in 2017 and

'18 executive budget worksheets issued by the Legislature. Also included are approved executive requests for tradeoffs, transfers, changes of means of financing, conversions of positions from temporary to permanent, ceiling increases or decreases, all reductions in new positions that were already authorized by the Legislature in the previous biennium, and additional funding for priority budget requests.

"Your committee amended House Bill 116 to include funding requests above and beyond the base budget adjustments. These adjustments include new positions, new programs, and budget requests from the Senate subject-matter committee chairs. The Senate draft of Senate budget includes funding the following priorities: supporting programs and services for agriculture to implement the Interagency Biosecurity Plan; funding to support grants for local businesses to help expand and diversify our economy; help provide funding for Weighted Student Formula, Early College, and Hawai'i Promise; funding to protect our natural resources, wildfire response, combat critical invasive species, and to help stop Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death; funding for critical programs to address homelessness, state Rent Supplement Program, and other homeless initiatives; and provide funding for the Juvenile Justice Reform. The Senate also determined that the following are priorities that should continue to receive funding; therefore, they are placeholders that have been included in the Senate draft to allow further discussion for Kupuna Care, Kupuna Caregivers Program, Maui Health Systems, and each governor's message that requested to add funding to the executive budget. The governor's messages were submitted late to the Legislature; therefore, a placeholder has been included in the Senate draft and have been inserted into individual Senate bills.

"In closing, I'd like to thank the members of the Ways and Means committee for their hard work, and I would like to acknowledge their efforts, time, and dedication as well as efforts and hard work of the vice chair for putting together the CIP budget. And, lastly, I'd like to thank the Ways and Means budget staff for their hard work and extended hours in helping to shape the Senate draft. In the gallery, we have with us committee clerk Dane Wicker, budget chief Erin Conner, budget analyst Alika Ke-Paloma, Janos Palko, Kaley Vatalaro, RJ Martin, and Zarek Wong, and intern from HPU Yurie Hoshino. I'd also like to acknowledge the vice chair's staff: Susan Wong, Robert Nishimoto, Danielle Evangelista, and Sara Tanigawa, if we can just give them a round of applause. I'd also like to give acknowledgement to Senate leadership for their support in helping the Ways and Means committee draft the budget. Mahalo."

Monday, March 18, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Harimoto who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day.

Chelsea Masaki, an eighth grader at Mililani Middle School, was named one of the top two youth volunteers in Hawai'i for 2019 out of 29,000 young people across the country who participated in this year's program. Chelsea works to keep the ocean and beaches of Hawai'i clean by participating in regular cleanups and activities for the past three years, and educates others about the dangers of plastic pollution. In the gallery, we have Chelsea's parents, Sean and Judy Masaki; and if we can just acknowledge Chelsea for all her hard work and her leadership. Congratulations."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Another of this year's two top student youth volunteers is Ryan Park, who is 18 and a senior at Punahou School. About two years ago, a tumor was found on Ryan's tailbone, and he thought that this might be the end for him. Reflecting on his life, he recalled that one of the things that brought him joy was helping others. After finding out that his tumor was benign, he resolved to make the most of his life, and he organized a club called HOPE, or Helping Oncology Patients Everywhere. He grew his club into a nonprofit organization that aims to improve the lives of people with cancer and their families through hospital volunteering, fundraising, and personal interaction. HOPE is now 150 members strong. Members participate in many activities, including giving monthly music recitals at treatment centers, sharing food and craft with young patients, raising money for gifts, and participating in national cancer-related fundraising drives. Ryan has also designed specialty T-shirts and tote bags to help raise money. Please join me in congratulating Ryan Park for turning a personal challenge into a passion for helping others and being a role model for his peers and our community. Thank you, Ryan Park. Mr. President, Ryan's mother, Imei Sun, is in the gallery this morning, and you've already met his brother, Joshua, who is a member of the 'Iolani LifeSmarts team. Thank you; I now return the floor to the senator from Mililani."

Through her Girl Scout project, she created a multi-faceted nutrition education program that she named ALOHA (A Life of Healthy Actions). She has reached more than 200 children and families by teaching them about nutrition and healthy eating for sustainability. She designed a website with information about healthy eating, and she also has a blog. Stefani wants to pursue a business management degree in college and hopes that it will provide a solid foundation for her to be a leader for change and a future director or founder of a service-oriented company or organization. Will you please give Stefani another round of applause? Congratulations. Joining us in the gallery are her parents, Steve and Lori Sakamoto. Thank you, Mr. President."

Thank you, Mr. President.”

THIRTY-FOURTH DAY

Tuesday, March 19, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:44 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fevella and Harimoto who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

On behalf of Senate President Kouchi, Senator Keith-Agaran welcomed visitors from the Department of Education on Kaua'i: Kevin Matsunaga from Chiefess Kamakahelei Middle School, Dawn Taba from Kaua'i High School, Robyn Herbig from Waimea High School, and Jonathan Medeiros from the Department of Education Kaua'i State Office.

Senator Kanuha recognized his legislative assistant Iokepa Command, who was present in the gallery with his mother, Mary Command, from Kona, a former teacher at Konawaena Elementary School and Konawaena High School who now teaches at Kamehameha Schools Preschools.

Senator Kim introduced Department of Education Assistant Superintendent Cynthia Covell, as well as Ryan Mandado, a volunteer, constituent, and neighborhood board chair.

Senator Kahele recognized and honored Beth McLachlin, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, two years ago, we had an opportunity to honor a great member of the Rainbow Wahine volleyball 'ohana when head coach Dave Shoji retired after 42 years at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. Today, we get to honor another great Rainbow Wahine as she takes her place in the USA Volleyball Hall of Fame in May of this year, and so it is my honor to recognize Beth McLachlin in the Hawai'i State Senate.

"Colleagues, Beth McLachlin is a name that evokes a feeling of great pride: pride in our state, pride in the University of Hawai'i, pride in the progress that our society has made in the last 50 years, and, for me, personally, great pride in Rainbow athletics. When Beth McLachlin started her career at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, she had already been competing with the USA women's Olympic team for six years. Indoor volleyball, only a recognized Olympic sport since 1964, when it made its debut in Tokyo, allowed Beth to establish herself on the international stage with Team USA as an alternate, finishing eighth in the 1968 Summer Olympics in Mexico City, and then earning bronze at the 1969 North, Central America, Caribbean Volleyball Championship, and finally gold at the 1970 World Championship. Yet, at that point in time, even Beth McLachlin as an Olympic athlete and world champion at the age of 20 did not have the same opportunities to compete as her male counterparts did. For example, the first men's athletic team at the University of Hawai'i was founded in 1909. However, the first women's team was not founded until 1972. In the 1970s, the NCAA did not govern women's athletics, and, in fact, the rules at that time allowed Beth to begin her college athletic career at the age of 24. And so, in 1974, Beth joined the Wahine volleyball team in its very first season, and, at that time, no one would have predicted the overwhelming success the Wahine would become. Today, the Rainbow Wahine volleyball program has three national championships, the fifth-most winningest program in NCAA women's volleyball history, and year over year is considered one of the top programs in the country. Beth played for the Wahine for three seasons, and in every one of those seasons, she captained the team to second place finishes at the college

national championships, and in 1976, Beth would reach the pinnacle of her career when she would co-captain the 1976 Olympic team. The very next year, in 1977, Beth began her teaching career at La Pietra – Hawaii School for Girls, where she coached volleyball and served as its athletic director until 2000. She retired from teaching in 2016.

"Volleyball has been an integral part of Beth's life since she began practicing with her sister in the fifth grade. She met her future husband, Chris McLachlin, at a volleyball tournament in April of 1968, and they were married in 1970. Together, they have three children: Parker, Bekka, and Spencer, all of whom have gone on to embrace volleyball and athletics. Parker graduated from UCLA; he has been on the PGA Tour for 15 years. Spencer graduated from Stanford; he is an assistant coach at UCLA for the men's program. And Bekka graduated from the University of Utah and returned home to Hawai'i to be a DOE PE/health teacher and today is at Central Intermediate just up the road.

"And so, with that, the Senate would like to recognize and congratulate Beth McLachlin on her induction into the 2019 USA Volleyball Hall of Fame, and, as a testament to her impact on athletics in Hawai'i, Beth is the first Rainbow Wahine volleyball alumna to receive the Flo Hyman All-Time Great Female Player Award. Colleagues, please join me in honoring a great athlete, a distinguished alumna, and tremendous figure in volleyball history. Here also on the floor is her longtime husband, Chris McLachlin. Not a familiar face to everyone, he is the play-by-play TV commentator at UH athletics for 35 years for KHNL, for K5, for Oceanic, and now for Spectrum. Thank you for joining us, both Beth and Chris. Also in the gallery, colleagues, I'd like to recognize former head coach of the University of Hawai'i Wahine, Dave Shoji; members of the current and former UH Rainbow Wahine volleyball program; members of the UH Athletics Department; members of the booster club and family and friends; and also colleagues from La Pietra. Welcome to your Hawai'i State Senate. Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Kidani recognized the Department of Education's Teachers of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"The State of Hawai'i echoes the sentiments of the Milken Educator Award, which recognizes teachers as the unsung heroes of our state and country. On local and state levels, educators are those tasked with the immense responsibility of cultivating young minds and impressing upon them not only the knowledge necessary to become successful but important values and life skills needed to adapt to the changes of the modern world. Today, we recognize the efforts and accomplishments of Hawai'i's teachers and recognize these exceptional leaders for the impact they have had upon our youth. In celebration of inspiring teachers, we also recognize Ewa Makai Middle School's Cynthia Tong, the recipient of the 2019 Horace Mann Award for Teaching Excellence. To introduce this honoree, the senator from District 23, please."

Senator Riviere rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, guests, I have the privilege today of introducing and speaking a little about Cynthia Tong. Welcome to the Senate. Cynthia is this year's honoree for the 2019 United States National Education Association Horace Mann Award for Teaching Excellence. She's got many years in the field; she's presently teaching at Ewa Makai Middle School. I was pleased to learn that she taught for several years at Waiialua High and Intermediate School, where she taught every grade from seventh through twelfth. At that time, she was focusing on the history program, and we talked a little bit about the love for

history and learning that she was able to instill in the students, and I talked about my son's interest in history and such, so we had a good little conversation there. As I said, she's now with Ewa Makai; she's teaching social studies over there, and she, of course, is the Horace Mann Award winner. She's got a 25-year career; she's got a passion for learning, and her leading goes beyond the community and the classroom to everybody she touches. Cynthia motivates everyone around her to be the best they can be; she inspires others to excel and explore new possibilities and have a zest for learning. Her dedication to her community is outstanding. At this time, ladies and gentlemen, please welcome and congratulate Cynthia Tong. Thank you, and I'd also like to note that Eric Tong, her husband, I believe, is in the audience. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President, I now yield the floor back to the senator from District 18."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, we would also like to again acknowledge the 2018 Milken Educator Award honoree, Sara King. We had the pleasure of honoring her earlier this month, and though she is not here today, we offer our heartfelt congratulations again to her honor for receiving the highest educators' honor in the nation.

"In addition to these inspiring teachers, we would like to acknowledge the extraordinary educators leading their districts and the education industry. The following recipients are all deserving of thanks and praise for the work they do. To introduce the 2019 Teacher of the Year, Senator Kanuha."

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, we honor and recognize an educator who has demonstrated a remarkable commitment to challenging, inspiring, and fostering the growth of youth on Hawai'i island. Education is an open door to opportunity, and our teachers are the first people to help us walk through it. They teach us to read, write, take tests, and the value of being on time, but I think I can speak on behalf of this entire body when I say they are tasked with so much more. The popular sentiment, 'It takes a village,' is the first thing that comes to my mind, reflecting on my school years in Kona. Within our tight-knit community, it is common knowledge that there are two groups who raise our keiki: our families and our educators.

"It is with great pleasure that I introduce to you Mathieu Williams, a multimedia teacher at Kealakehe Intermediate School in Kailua-Kona. Mathieu is the 2019 Hawaii Teacher of the Year recipient. Over the past 12 years at Kealakehe, Mathieu has developed the reputation of being both firm and widely popular around campus, taking his students to the 2018 Student Television Network's national convention in Nashville, Tennessee. And I heard just today that they're on their way to Seattle this Friday to compete in this year's national convention. The Hawai'i State Senate extends a warm mahalo to Mathieu Williams for his dedication, vision, and commitment to our state's future. Again, congratulations, Mathieu. Now I turn the floor over to the senator from Kaimuki."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Mr. President, although he's not able to be with us today, I'd like to tell you about this year's Hawai'i Public Charter School Teacher of the Year, Shane Albritton. Shane is a sixth-to-eighth-grade history teacher at the School for Examining Essential Questions of Sustainability, or SEEQS. Mr. A, as his students call him, uses role-playing to help students feel connected to the history they're studying. Students use archival newspapers and other sources to learn about the characters they role-play. Mr. A gives students an historical situation and choices their characters faced. Students are asked what they would do and

feel if they were their character back then. After the role-playing, Mr. A explains what history says actually happened. Sometimes the student's and the history-character's outcomes are the same and sometimes not. Either way, they come to understand history and how historical characters made decisions. Lessons learned through role-playing enable Mr. A's students to see how history can be relevant to their own lives and how individual choices made today can impact the future of each student. For Shane Albritton, success in the classroom is based on the personal connections his students make with history, and their understanding that history is relevant to today's world and their own life. Let's give Mr. Shane Albritton a well-deserved round of applause in absentia. I now yield the floor to the Senator from Kahului."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to present the following remarks:

"It's my great pleasure to introduce Mr. Brandon Arakawa, the 2019 Maui District Teacher of the Year. Mr. Arakawa has been an incredible role model as a teacher at Kahului Elementary, where he's taught fifth grade for the past four years. In the immediate three years, his students have, through his encouragement and dedication, raised their test scores each year. He's also a committed member of the school's leadership team, where he works directly on behalf of the 980 students on campus. Mr. Arakawa is also a youth baseball coach and also then impacts all the children in our community. Please join me in congratulating 2019 Maui District Teacher of the Year Brandon Arakawa."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Senate President. On your behalf, it is my great pleasure to introduce Sean Doi, a resource teacher for the Kaua'i District Complex Area, as the 2019 Kaua'i District Teacher of the Year. Kaua'i-born and raised, Sean Doi is a proud public school graduate with 21 years of teaching experience. As a certified elementary school teacher, Sean began his teaching career at 'Ele'ele Elementary School on Kaua'i and has since embraced his role as a resource teacher for the Kaua'i District Complex Area. Outside of the classroom, Mr. Doi is passionate about sharing accomplishments of others. Six years ago, he created Kaua'i Shining Stars, an educational program that spotlights great work taking place at Kaua'i district schools. Congratulations, Sean. Thank you very much.

"At this time, Mr. President, we would also like to recognize Sam Hankins as the 2019 Honolulu District Teacher of the Year. Though he is unable to join us here today, we offer our heartfelt congratulations for his exceptional contributions to education. Can we please acknowledge Sam Hankins?

"Up next, we have Gail Izumigawa joining us on the floor. Gail is the 2019 Leeward District Teacher of the Year. As an educator for 32 years, Gail has demonstrated her dedication to Hawai'i's youth. She currently serves as director for career academies at Waipahu High School, where she pioneered the development of its educational program. The impact of her efforts has seen significant strides, with Waipahu High School becoming the first in the state to become nationally certified. Gail oversees six academies covering 24 programs of study for 200 educators and over 2,500 students. She has demonstrated such leadership on both local and national levels by providing opportunities for schools throughout the country to visit Waipahu High School to observe and learn about effective career academy design and how they can best implement such practices into schools nationwide. We are deeply grateful to Gail for her extraordinary contributions to the education industry and for the profound impact her work has had upon the students of Waipahu High School and the State of Hawai'i as well as throughout the country. Thank you, Gail. I now turn the floor over to our senator from District 15."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

“Members, it is with great pleasure I introduce you to Mary Ann Kurose. Ms. Kurose is the Central District Teacher of the Year. She teaches strategic writing, reading, AVID, web design, and news writing at Radford High School, where she’s been since 1997. Drawing on her role as a parent, she has employed that teaching philosophy of being the type of teacher she would want for her own children and thus strives to be the best teacher she can be for her students every single day at Radford. She has developed a teaching model that focuses on visual, verbal, and social learning styles combined with Google-based digital tools to ensure her lessons stick with her students beyond the classroom. This award is a testament to her excellence as an educator. Congratulations to Mary Ann Kurose. Mr. President, I’d like to yield the floor to the senator from Waimānalo.”

Senator Thielen rose to present the following remarks:

“I am pleased to recognize Debbie Morrow from Kailua Elementary School as the 2019 Windward District Teacher of the Year. Unfortunately, Ms. Morrow was not able to join us today; she’s in a professional development trip to Finland, where the Finnish people will teach her how their children bike to school in three feet of snow, and she will teach them about how our children go to school in rubber slippers. But she is represented here today by Judy Mailheau, the Windward District preschool SPED coordinator and former Kailua Elementary preschool teacher and colleague of Debbie, so, Judy, if you could please stand to be recognized in honor of Debbie? You can take that applause back to her.

“Debbie is an accomplished educator, where she taught an inclusion class at Head Start for over five years. Her goal is to improve inclusion opportunities for preschoolers with disabilities through partnerships with state-funded preschools on public school campuses. She applied for and was awarded a state-funded preschool classroom for the 2018–19 school year. She’s provided guidance on self-contained classes that serve as a model for autism education, training new or struggling teachers and assistants to work effectively. She maintains an open-door policy for families, and she does home visits, which is really rare in this day and age, and facilitates parent trainings and encourages parent participation in the classroom so that children can succeed both in school and at home. It’s dedicated educators in our community, like Debbie and Judy, who are making a difference every day for our students. Colleagues, can you please join me in wishing Debbie, through her colleague Judy, continued success in her future endeavors?”

Wednesday, March 20, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The group was advocating to end the sale of flavored tobacco products in Hawai'i, and were represented by students from the following schools: Konawaena High School, Waiākea High School, Henry Perrine Baldwin High School, Kīhei Charter School, University of Hawai'i Maui College, Governor Wallace Rider Farrington High School, Kailua Intermediate School, Kalani High School, Maryknoll School, Mid-Pacific Institute, Mililani Middle School, Moanalua High School, and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Senator Rhoads then extended an additional welcome to Davin Aoyagi of the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, who had served as an intern in his office.

Senator Taniguchi introduced representatives of the Council of State Governments West who were seated in the gallery: Edgar Ruiz, executive director; and Jacqueline Tinetti, policy committees and programs coordinator.

Senator Kidani recognized and honored outstanding and distinguished principals, vice principals, and assistant principals, and presented the following remarks:

"The Hawaii Elementary and Middle School Administrators Association honors school leaders for education excellence. These educators are those tasked with the immense responsibility of cultivating safe, collaborative, and enthusiastic environments where students and staff can thrive. Their efforts are responsible for supporting teachers as they inspire young minds and impress upon them not only the knowledge necessary to become successful but important values and life skills as well. These principals are inspiring leaders in education and invaluable resources providing the foundation for staff and students to achieve success. Introducing the 2018 Hawaii National Distinguished Principal of the year is the senator from District 11."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"At this time, we'd like to congratulate the 2018 National Distinguished Principal of the year, Linell Dilwith. Unfortunately, she is unable to join us here today, but I wanted to personally thank her for navigating the construction of the Stevenson science learning center a few years ago. This has made a big difference at the school. Could we offer our heartfelt congratulations to her for her tremendous leadership and contributions to Robert Louis Stevenson Middle School and to education as a whole by giving her a round of applause?"

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Up next, we have Mrs. Corinne Yogi joining us on the floor with her granddaughter Kamryn. Corinne is our 2018 Central District Hawaii National Distinguished Principal of the year. Principal Yogi has been an educator at Kipapa Elementary for over 24 years, with 8 years serving as principal. She has demonstrated her dedication to Hawai'i's youth by establishing a culture of 'ohana within Kipapa Elementary School, where students, families, and communities are welcomed and provided a foundation for children to thrive. In 2018, she received the Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award, and has seen tremendous success developing and establishing a new science, technology, engineering, and math studies program as well as after-school enrichment opportunities to improve student achievement and encourage better study habits. We commend Principal Yogi for extraordinary contributions to the education industry and for the profound impact her work has had upon the students of Kipapa Elementary. Thank you very much, Principal Yogi (and Kamryn)! I now yield the floor to the senator from 'Ewa Beach."

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

"Today, I'm recognizing Debra Hatada as the honoree of the 2018 National Distinguished Principal of the Year. Debra is the principal of Ka'imiloa Elementary School in 'Ewa Beach. Debra is an outstanding principal with great vision and a lot of heart. She believes in learning through the eyes of her students and wants the children to be their own teachers. Debra always puts the needs of her students and staff first. I want to congratulate Debra Hatada. At this time, I would like to ask Deb to stand and be recognized for her great accomplishments. Thank you, Deb. At this time, I would like to turn this floor back over to the senator from Kāne'ohe."

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, the National Distinguished Principals Program recognizes elementary- and middle-level principals who set high standards for instruction, student achievement, character, and climate for students, families, and the staff in their learning communities. Today, I am privileged to introduce Kāne'ohe Elementary School principal Derek Minakami. Derek is one of six principals across Hawai'i to receive the National Distinguished Principal award for 2018. Among other things, in 1999, Derek became the first public school National Board Certified teacher in science, with an emphasis on adolescence and young adulthood. In 2001, he was named Hawaii Teacher of the Year at Kailua High School, where he taught physics, conceptual physics, advanced physics, Iron Man physics (I just made that one up. I don't know; these are extremely complicated classes—I'm really impressed.), and youth leadership. And, on a personal note, we had a discussion this weekend, Principal Minakami and I, about some of the innovative approaches that he's taken regarding place-based learning and outdoor learning for our students in our schools. You folks all know: Schools really require strong leadership.

He's taken chances and provided the opportunity for his faculty and staff to innovate. I'm so grateful and proud to have him as a principal in our district, so can we please have a round of applause again for Kāne'ohe Elementary School principal Derek Minakami? Mr. President, at this time, I would like to turn the floor over to our senator from District 3-Kona."

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

"As you know, administrators play a key role in **fostering an environment conducive** to everyone's success.

"From the big things like preparing us to succeed in school, encouraging us to **follow our passions and talents**, to the little things like making sure we have a way to get home. Most importantly, they shape the institutions that mold us into contributing members of society. They are dynamic, diligent, and influential while at the same time **nurturing and compassionate**. They carry an important responsibility of blending together ideas from different cultural backgrounds and national standards to create an **encouraging, welcoming** learning environment.

"Most of us can probably recall a **school administrator** who positively impacted our learning and our lives. Therefore, it's with great pleasure that I have the honor to present this certificate to a **remarkable administrator from the Big Island: Noreen Kunitomo**.

"Noreen was awarded the **2018 Hawaii National Distinguished Principal** of the year for Hawai'i island on behalf of her service at Honaunau Elementary School in South Kona.

"The Hawai'i State Senate extends a warm mahalo to **Noreen for her commitment** in encouraging our youth to learn and **excel both inside the classroom and beyond it**, so, again, colleagues, can you please extend a warm welcome and **congratulations to Noreen**.

"Now, I would like to turn the floor over to the senator from Hāna."

Senator English rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, today I have the great honor of introducing our next honoree. She's not here today, but her name is Robyn Honda. Last April, Robyn was honored as the 2018 Maui District principal of the year. Robyn served as the principal of Makawao Elementary School from 2010 to 2018 and retired at the end of the school year last May. Her diligent leadership has established Kilauea Elementary School as a strong foundation from which her students can learn and grow as they matriculate to middle school. "Up next, we would like to recognize the 2019 State Assistant Principal of the Year. Will the senator from Waipahu please introduce our next awardee?"

She's also active and supports numerous organizations to improve the quality of life for Waipahu students, residents, businesses, employees, and visitors. So I'd like to congratulate Meryl Matsumura, the 2019 State Assistant Principal of the Year, and hope we can just applaud her as well. And now I'd like to turn the floor over to the senator from District 21, Senator Shimabukuro."

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Unfortunately, it looks like Vice Principal Cecile LaMar cannot be here today, but I wanted to just acknowledge that she's a prime example of an educator pursuing her path with passion and commitment. Ms. LaMar hails from northern California but traveled to the University of Hawai'i to obtain a BA in sociology. She then undertook intensive graduate work in public administration while achieving her master's in special education. Ms. LaMar put her special ed training to the test at Highlands Intermediate from 2002 to 2009, and she then undertook the vice principal training at Waikele Elementary, and, soon after, in 2010, she became the VP for the last nine years at Makaha Elementary, helping to lead a team of over 100 staff and faculty to nurture a population of 525 students. It's through her challenges and successes for almost 10 years that we now recognize and congratulate her as the 2018 Hawaii Outstanding Vice Principal of the year. She remains a tremendous asset for Makaha Elementary and for the entire state in building a promising road to a brighter educational path for many of our keiki, so let's give a round of applause to VP Cecile LaMar."

Friday, March 22, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

At this time, Senator Ihara introduced Toby In, a junior at Kalani High School and a Center for Tomorrow's Leaders Fellow, and Rin Inuzuka, a senior at Sacred Hearts Academy and president of her school's National Honor Society, both of whom were interning in his office.

Senator Keohokalole recognized State Representative Scot Z. Matayoshi and State Representative Lisa Kitagawa, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Kidani acknowledged Justine Jumalon, a freshman at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, who had volunteered during her spring break to help with Education Week, and thanked her for all her work.

Senator Kidani then stated:

"Mr. President, on our final day of Education Week, we would like to recognize other awardees for their commitments to our students and their schools, including the 2019 Global Educator Award, the 2019 Milken Teacher of Promise Award, and the Leilehua High School esports team. At this time, we would like to acknowledge the 2019 Milken Teacher of Promise honoree, Bella Finau-Faumuina. The Kāne'ohe Elementary School special education teacher and head of the Innovation Academy receives this prestigious award in her third year of teaching, demonstrating immense educational excellence. To introduce this honoree, the senator from Kāne'ohe."

Senator Keohokalole commended Bella Finau-Faumuina, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, today I have the privilege of introducing, from Kāne'ohe Elementary School, Bella Finau-Faumuina, as the 2019 Milken Teacher of Promise Award honoree. Bella Finau-Faumuina, referred to as Kumu Bella, has regularly received high praise from students, who have spoken of her caring and effective teaching, as well as from parents, complimenting her ability to instill a love of learning in their children. Her success as an instructor is reflected in her students' increased attendance achievements and decreased problematic behaviors. She has not only shown her abilities in the classroom but has also made presentations to statewide audiences, organized district-wide professional development events, and demonstrated leadership in piloting new initiatives at Kāne'ohe Elementary School. Through her notable achievements in the classroom and outstanding leadership in her profession, Kumu Bella is more than deserving of the prestigious Milken Educators Teacher of Promise Award. Colleagues, please join me again in congratulating Kumu Bella Finau-Faumuina. Also joining us today in the gallery to honor her is her husband, Don Faumuina. Thank you. I now yield the floor to the senator from Hilo."

Senator Kahahele congratulated Joel Wagner-Wright, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, it's my honor to introduce to you Waiākea High School's Joel Wagner-Wright, who is the 2019 Global Educator Award honoree. Welcome, Joel. Colleagues, Joel Wagner-Wright is the chair of Waiākea High School's social studies department and teaches a wide range of subjects, including

global studies, participation in democracy, psychology, sociology, and political science, just to name a few. After the school day ends, Joel dedicates his time to instruct an after-school global studies class and has done so for the past 12 years. He has also led students on educational tours to Japan and Vietnam. Joel discusses the topics that, while difficult to confront, most seriously affect the future of our younger generations. He has taught units on poverty, human trafficking, domestic violence, and the effects of pollution on our oceans. During a unit on poverty, Joel encouraged students to develop a campaign, conduct a march, and volunteer at a local shelter. For a unit on microplastics and ocean pollution, Joel had students teaming up with the University of Hawai'i at Hilo's marine biology program to conduct a beach cleanup and work with university students to study the impact of microplastics on local sea creatures. Ultimately, it is the impact Joel has had on his students that distinguishes him as an educator. He understands that inspiring a love for learning is far more important than any one subject. The lasting effect of his lessons and his understanding of students make Joel a model educator for teachers across this great state.

"Colleagues, seated in the gallery today, Joel is joined by his grandparents Eric and Ruby Kawamoto; his partner, Dennis Ancheta; and representatives from the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council – Ana Reidy Ungureit, Niki Shishido, Jason Shon, Erin Hoshibata. Again, colleagues, it's our honor to recognize Joel Wagner-Wright for his outstanding achievement in receiving the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council's 2019 Global Educator Award, and at this time, I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Wahiawā."

Senator Dela Cruz recognized the Leilehua High School Library Learning Commons and esports team, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, we congratulate and recognize the Leilehua High School Library Learning Commons on its recent grand opening and the Leilehua esports team on its successful inaugural season. The Library Learning Commons provides students and faculty with the support, tools, and information that they will need to successfully navigate their learning and become self-reliant and knowledgeable to be successful in the twenty-first century and excel in the global society. Esports was made possible through the Library Learning Commons and enabled the Leilehua team to successfully compete in the Hawaii High School Athletic Association's pilot season. The esports team has already acquired the skills necessary to compete nationally, with some of the team being recognized for esports scholarships from many different colleges. Today we have with us team members Enrique Sanchez, Elizen Bumanglag, Nathaniel Jara, Chase Harrison, and Dominic Castillo, and coach Anthony Arneson. In the gallery we have Principal Jason Nakamoto, librarian Jenny Yamamoto, and Leilehua Complex resource manager Grant Toyooka. We also have family members Joshua Harrison, Pedro Kirkpatrick, Judy Sakuoka (who hasn't aged, because she was there when I was in high school—looks like Wahiawā water is very good for you), Allen Sakuoka, and Laverne Arneson. Thank you, Mr. President, and let's give them another round of applause."

Senator Kidani rose to thank the members of the Senate for recognizing educators and students during Education Week.

On behalf of the members of the Senate, the Chair expressed gratitude to Senator Kidani for the outstanding program during Education Week, noting that she and her staff had done a tremendous job and that it was uplifting and rewarding to see the great achievements by students, teachers, and administrators.

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:31 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Seventh Day.

At this time, on behalf of Senator Kim and himself, Senator Rhoads welcomed a group of constituents who were touring the State Capitol with State Representative Takashi Ohno: Benjamin Bruch, Dam Bui, Ruby Chan, Richard Chang, Grace Kodama, Selina Kuni, Randall Lum, Dominique Mccier, Noel Murata, Carol Murata, Paul Ogawa-Lerman, Hazel Ogawa-Lerman, Greg Okamura, Alfredo Pasatiempo, Ellen Sato-Lum, Gwen Tamaru, Mike Tamaru, Susan Wagner, and Anne Wheelock.

Senator Wakai congratulated the 19th Annual HVCA awardees, and presented the following remarks:

"Members, last week, we celebrated Education Week; today is Business Hoopla Day. Many of our children who we saw last week who are going to be changing the world in innovation in the future are going to be set with job opportunities and the pathways set forward by some of the luminaries we have here to be recognized this morning. Today, we honor the winners of the 2019 Hawaii Venture Capital Association Entrepreneur and Deal of the Year awards. We have seven of them here with us on the floor of the Senate. The Hawaii Venture Capital Association stands as a nexus for entrepreneurs, capital foundation, and networking opportunities. The association strives to foster entrepreneurship through education and exposure to members of the business community. HVCA's Entrepreneur and Deal of the Year awards are held annually to honor achievements in the local venture community.

"Today's first honoree is Robert Hennessy, who is representing FloWater. FloWater was this year's recipient of the Deal of the Year award. This award recognizes the Startup Paradise company that received the largest financial deal during the year. FloWater is a water refill station company that aims to transform ordinary tap water into advanced hydration. By developing these refill stations in nearly all 50 states amongst hotels, schools, residences, and even here in our State Capitol—you might see them on the third and fourth floors of this building—the company hopes to eliminate single-use plastic bottles and provide the best-tasting water to consumers. To date, FloWater has eliminated more than 100 million plastic bottles and is well on its way to eliminating 1 billion plastic bottles by 2022. Congratulations to Robert and FloWater. Now, Mr. President, I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Waimānalo."

The Chair wished Senator Thielen a happy birthday.

Senator Thielen then rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to introduce today Steve Haumschild, the CEO and founder of Lanikai Brewing Company. Steve was awarded the Entrepreneur of the Year, which is given to an individual who has gone above and beyond the expectations of their company and serves as an example for other entrepreneurs. Since its inception, Lanikai Brewing Company has partnered with company stakeholders and community stakeholders, including farmers and artists, to deliver authentic Hawaiian craft beers and to take care of the environment—good for you, Steve. Farmers give the company fruit while Lanikai Brewing donates

pallets to farmers and artists for fences and works of art. As the company's visionary, Steve has been at the forefront of these efforts and poured his heart and soul into producing high-quality products, even foraging in nature to collect their ingredients. This hard work has paid off as people around the globe have recognized the unique flavors of made-in-Hawai'i beer and traveled all the way to Kailua to taste this one-of-a-kind product. This is only the beginning for Steve and Lanikai Brewing Company, and I want to tell you that my brother is offering to get this special beer for my birthday as well. Congratulations, Steve, and now I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Hawai'i Kai."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to recognize Brynn Foster, founder of Voyaging Foods. She is represented today by Meli James. Brynn was honored as the Island Innovator of the Year, which is given to those whose efforts have helped our island state. This award celebrates an innovator who has demonstrated leadership and commitment to tackling a significant problem in the islands. Brynn tackled the issues of sustainability, food security, and health stability, which are certainly problems in the islands. Following the birth of her son, Brynn created allergy-free teething biscuits using homemade taro powder after realizing no sugar-free or gluten-free products existed on the market. This passion to create healthy food for her child grew into a full-fledged business with healthy, gluten-free, and locally grown products offered online, in Whole Foods, and other wholesale retailers. Through Voyaging Foods, Brynn hopes to see the islands become more self-reliant and return to Aloha 'Āina, or love for the land. The company's success is proof that Hawai'i can return to these roots. Congratulations to Brynn and Meli. I'd now like to yield the floor to the senator from Salt Lake."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

"On behalf of Senator Harimoto, I'd like to recognize now Rose Wong, founder of Kolohe Ocean Gems and also a triple major in entrepreneurship, marketing, and finance at UH Mānoa. Rose was awarded Student Entrepreneur of the Year, which is given to younger members of the innovative community who have a passion for learning new things, the tenacious spirit of entrepreneurship, and a potential for growth. Entrepreneurship has always been in Rose's blood: Before even graduating from Kaiser High School, she had been designing, crafting, and selling jewelry to friends and family. Realizing she liked being her own boss and working on her own time, 16-year-old Rose set out to create her very own jewelry. Her hard work and determination paid off as her business has since expanded to include fine jewelry, gemstones, and diamonds. Additionally, her products can also be found in upscale retail stores and trade shows as well as online. Congratulations to Rose Wong. Mr. President, I'd now like to yield the floor to the senator from Kāne'ohe."

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

"I'm proud to introduce our next awardee, Josiah 'Ākau, founder and president of Kinai 'Eha. Josiah was named Social Impact Entrepreneur of the Year. This award is given to an individual who has shown leadership, innovation, and commitment to solving our state's toughest problems. Kinai 'Eha is an educational and occupational skills training program that aims to empower non-high school graduates to become leaders and change-makers in their community. The organization renovates homes to make them accessible for the physically challenged while providing training in construction trades and personal development for youth who did not necessarily fit in to traditional schools. Participants in the

program remark that Kinai 'Eha made it possible for them to be anything and everything. Thanks to Josiah, many of these individuals have now found their way. Congratulations, Josiah. Colleagues, also in the gallery, I'd like to take a moment and introduce several of the mentors who have helped Josiah and Kinai 'Eha in their efforts. Up in the gallery, we have Uncle Earl Kawa'a; also, I believe I see Stacy Ferreira and Samson Malani; and then, finally, I have several of their names, but I know there are a number of the young men who have participated in the program, so can I please have all of you folks, young men, please rise and be recognized by the Hawai'i State Senate? Mr. President, I'd now like to yield the floor to the senator from Kapolei."

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues and guests, I'd like to introduce Andrew Fowers, founder of the mobile app Shaka Guide, who's also my constituent. Andrew has been named Tech Entrepreneur of the Year, which is given to those whose work has created new technology and innovation to make our lives more efficient, fun, and better. Shaka Guide combines an audio tour with a curated driving route in one mobile app to offer visitors an insider's look into Hawai'i's best routes and sights, complete with entertainment, trivia, and history. Shaka Guide's story began when Andrew was a senior at BYUH; watching tourists miss the best scenic spots around the island inspired him to seek a solution. Andrew and his wife, Rita, researched locals' favorite spots around the island and launched Circle Island Oahu Audio Tour. However, the CD did not sell. Rather than give up, Andrew and Rita persevered and partnered with car rental companies to offer tours in English, Japanese, and Korean. The couple then focused on mobile apps after noticing the shift to mobile apps from GPS and, thus, Shaka Guide was born. The app remains popular, with thousands of five-star reviews, and is only poised to grow bigger and branch out to Japanese and mainland markets. Congratulations, Andrew. And now I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from the North Shore."

Senator Riviere rose to present the following remarks:

"President, colleagues, guests: Today, I have the privilege of introducing to you Karl Fooks. Karl is the president of the Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation, and he's a proud resident of our great North Shore. Karl was named this year's Startup Paradise Champion, and this is an award that recognizes an individual who supports, promotes, and builds a successful startup culture and ecosystem in Hawai'i. Under Karl's leadership, HSDC has invested in private sector venture capital partnerships that support startups, such as Blue Startups, Elemental Excelsator, GVS Transmedia Accelerator, and XLR8UH. From 2010 to 2018, these efforts have directed nearly \$250 million in funding for Hawai'i startups as well as created opportunities for locals and nurtured the business environment throughout the islands. Nearly all companies in Hawai'i have benefited either directly or indirectly from HSDC's investments, and this is due to Karl's hard work as its president. Congratulations, Karl. Mr. President, I now yield the floor back to the senator from Salt Lake."

Senator Wakai rose and stated:

"Congratulations to the honorees on the floor today, but this is just half of the group. There are six more individuals who will be honored in the House gallery, and I'd like to point them out to all of you here this morning. Wednesday, March 27, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole acknowledged representatives of Native Hawaiian advocacy groups who were seated in the gallery: Lualualei Hawaiian Civic Club, Mākaha Hawaiian Civic Club, Wai'anae Hawaiian Civic Club, Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu, Prince Kūhiō Hawaiian Civic Club, Kalihi-Pālana Hawaiian Civic Club, King Kamehameha Hawaiian Civic Club, Ali'i Pauahi Hawaiian Civic Club, Sovereign Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations, Hawaiian Affairs Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, Hawaiian Community Assets, Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action (HAPA), Hawaii Teamsters Local 996, and Unite Here! Local 5, as well as Dr. Kamana'opono Crabbe of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, students from Wai'anae High School, Kamehameha Schools, and other individuals who advocate on behalf of the Native Hawaiian community.

Senator Ihara introduced his nephew Zachary Ihara, an eighth-grade student from Boy Scout Troop 82 in Kaimukī, who was attending the Senate floor session to earn his Citizenship in the Community merit badge. Senator Ihara also recognized Zachary's parents, who were seated in the gallery: his father, Percy, publisher of *Generations* magazine; and his mother, Laurie, whose father was the first Chinese-American federal judge.

The Chair extended an additional welcome to Percy Ihara, who was a classmate of his wife, Mrs. Joy Kouchi.

Senator Kidani introduced her sister-in-law Vicky Paresa from Wai'anae, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Riviere honored and commended the North Shore Community Land Trust, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, I have the great honor of introducing to my colleagues and guests in the gallery the North Shore Community Land Trust. This is an organization that was founded about 22 years ago by a group of community individuals who wanted to be proactive instead of fighting always on our heels to defend the great North Shore. And the North Shore is, by many accounts, a global treasure. It's worth preserving; it's worth giving it our all, and I believe that our community really does step up to do its part to keep it great for the benefit of everybody. We have town, which is great—all the infrastructure—and we've got country, and that balance is something that we're always after. So the North Shore Community Land Trust provides a great tool and advocacy for that. So, today with us, we have the outgoing executive director of the North Shore Community Land Trust, Doug Cole. Thank you, Doug. And also Adam Borrello: Adam is taking over for Doug, and we're going to see great things coming out of him. Thank you.

"Folks, I just want to give you a quick history. This is a group that has fought to save Pūpūkea-Paumalū, which is 1,200 acres of pristine North Shore land above Sunset Beach. You may have heard of the Save Sunset Beach efforts and coalitions. They've been involved in saving Waimea Valley. They've been involved in the Turtle Bay resolution. They are now the guardians and the land stewards up at Kahuku Point: Through

all the settlement, through all the work that we've all been involved with and everything else, they get a grant from Turtle Bay to preserve and enhance the wildlife and outcomes up at Kahuku Point. There are now albatross fledging and coming back, living in that area; there's monk seals; there's turtles. It's a pristine land, and they are actually doing the volunteer work and organizing, and they're open for tours if you guys would like to come out and see the great work that they're doing. Recently, you may have seen in the news that there was an extra acquisition of land out at Ka'ena Point that a family donated. There were some hang-ups in that, but this is the group that helped pull it all together. They work with the Trust for Public Land; they bring people together for voluntary land conservation. They don't go at it in lawsuits and challenges; they work with willing landowners to conserve land, such as the Sunset Ranch up in Pūpūkea. So the list is long; it's getting longer; they are a fantastic organization, and it is a great, great privilege to know them and to get to say a little bit about the great work that they do. Thank you, ladies and gentlemen; please, again, for the North Shore Community Land Trust.

"And if I may, Mr. President, I'd like to acknowledge a few other members of the organization; they're up in the gallery today with my office manager, Margarete Olson: Tim Tybuszewski, Alice Terry, Bob and Agnes Leinau. These are longtime supporters of the group and have been active with it forever: Welcome."

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"I'm honored to make this recommendation because I believe Mr. Murdock to be a highly qualified candidate to serve in this position, the importance of which is ever increasing thanks to the speed at which our state and society adopt and adapt to technology. With that change comes the need for our state government to follow suit, not only in its management of our existing government operations but in its approach to modernizing these systems in a way that is both effective and accountable. Mr. Murdock has the experience and ability to accomplish these critical tasks.

"His experience includes positions he held recently as systems analyst lead for the successful and long overdue state payroll modernization, as vice president for administrative and fiscal affairs for the Hawai'i Tourism Authority, and as the state comptroller and director of the Department of Accounting and General Services. Mr. President, in addition, he also attained the rank of colonel in the United States Air Force, which included 25 years of service as a judge advocate, including roles as the executive officer to the Air Force Judge Advocate General and legal issues chief for the Air Force at the Pentagon.

"In reference to his ability, I was particularly struck by his temperament and outlook on this position, which I think speak directly to his leadership ability. Instead of focusing on the complicated minutia of IT systems management, our first conversation was a discussion about the critical nature of people management when it comes to upgrading our state technology. At the end of the day, he recognizes that this job is about managing people. You can buy the best tech on the market, but you will only implement it successfully if you conduct proper outreach and generate buy-in from the people who are tasked with using it. That is not an easy thing to achieve. I think we can all agree that that was and continues to be a major source of trials and failures for our IT efforts in the past, and I think it demonstrates a profound understanding of the situation he is coming into as CIO and the challenges that lie ahead. Colleagues, I am, again, happy to speak in his favor and urge your support for his confirmation."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"The governor has nominated Linda Chu Takayama for a second term as director of the Department of Taxation. He knows that her appointment to the department has been critical in turning around the Tax System Modernization project as she worked with managers and employees to address all of their concerns. The project is expected to finish on schedule as it moves into its final phases of this multi-year effort. Ms. Takayama has a long history of public service to the people of the State of Hawai'i. As one of the testifiers stated, she has established a record of stellar service to this state, having served in many senior positions. She served as director of Labor and Industrial Relations, deputy director of the state Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, and Hawai'i insurance commissioner. Ms. Takayama also served as a director of economic development for the City and County, and chief of staff to the United States Senate Sergeant at Arms in Washington, D.C. And she's also been in private practice throughout the past 20 years.

"Colleagues point out her notable achievements include the creation of the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund in her role as insurance commissioner during the aftermath of Hurricane Iniki, stating that her work in crafting the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund was stellar. Indeed, it remains one of the most successful insurance catastrophe funds in the nation. Ms. Takayama's long-term commitment to the Hawaii Foodbank has brought that organization from a good organization to a great one. Her leadership there has helped create a robust, well-functioning service helping to feed Hawai'i's people, and she has effected the repair and maintenance budget of DOE schools throughout Hawai'i's 3R's initiatives, a partnership between government and private sector to help repair, remodel, and restore our public schools.

"Her employees have witnessed her professional and management approach in leadership, experiencing how she has worked with managers and employees to improve the department. They note that Ms. Takayama has shown her commitment and determination to work toward establishing and achieving goals for the department. And I just wanted to read from her questionnaire one of the things that I think not just myself but probably many of you here also probably suffer from. In her assessment of strengths and weaknesses, in her weaknesses, she says, 'I'm often impatient with the pace of change, which appears to me to be agonizingly slow. Possibly related to the impatience is the complaint that I can sometimes be demanding.' So I think that's something that we probably can all relate to, and I'm glad that she has those traits. The Committee on Ways and Means has interviewed and reviewed Ms. Takayama's qualifications for this position, and, as stated in the committee's report, we find her to be qualified for the position and recommend that the Senate advise and consent to her nomination."

He brings to the position more than a decade of experience working on tax issues for the state. He is currently a trustee for EUTF and, as a deputy attorney general for the Department of Taxation, he represented the state’s interest in contested tax-related cases, collecting over \$50 million for the benefit of the state. When he joined the Department of Taxation, he served as the compliance coordinator at DOTAX before being appointed its deputy director. Prior to joining the state, Mr. Elefante worked at Hisaka Stone Goto Yoshida Cosgrove & Ching, and served as a law clerk for Chief Judge James S. Burns at the Intermediate Court of Appeals. Governor Ige knows that Damien’s knowledge, skills, and abilities have helped the director effectively lead the department and administer improvements to programs and services of the department. Among these improvements is the Tax System Modernization, which will provide taxpayers with secured access to their tax accounts as well as allow for paperless payments and filings. The Committee on Ways and Means has interviewed and reviewed Mr. Elefante’s qualifications for this position, and, as stated in the committee’s report, we find him to be qualified for the position and recommend that the Senate advise and consent to his nomination.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, this is an unnecessary bill to address a nonexistent problem, and it creates a bunch of other problems along the way. I notice that all the public testimony, both on the House and Senate side, was in opposition—100 percent, including the Retail Merchants, Hawai'i Restaurant Association, Hawaii Food Industry Association. As a retailer, I share the concerns expressed there, which include: Sometimes a cashier in this non-cash era that we have will not have the exact change to reimburse somebody, and we're putting cashiers and mom-and-pop businesses in an impossible situation, where they're criminals if they don't have \$3.59 on demand. So, as a retailer myself, and as a recovering cashier, I think it's very important that the point of sale flows smoothly and without government interference, so, on behalf of the small-business community, I oppose this bill. I hope that in the future we'll support small businesses. Thank you."

FORTIETH DAY

Thursday, March 28, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Harimoto thanked his office manager, Linda Nunes, for delivering a Moment of Contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session, and introduced office staff Robert Sato and Kess O'Halloran, who were seated in the gallery with members of Linda Nunes's family: her partner, Joneal Altura, and his family from Maui—father Dionisio; mother Nelia; brother John and his girlfriend, Joy; and other friends.

The Chair extended an additional welcome to Linda Nunes's partner, thanked him for his service, and, on behalf of the Senate, offered prayers and best wishes for his deployment.

Senator Thielen introduced members of her office staff: interns Jessie Garbeil and Anna Thielen, session staffer Rudy Gordon, Zachary Espino, Jennifer Barra, and Eliza Wilcox.

Senator Fevella recognized staff member Tristel Tynanes, and wished her a happy birthday.

Senator Gabbard congratulated the Hawai'i Youth Challenge Academy on its 25th anniversary, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, colleagues, and guests in the gallery, we are honored to have with us today the Hawai'i Youth Challenge Academy, which hails from Kalaeloa, formerly known as Barbers Point Naval Air Station, in Senate District 20, also known as God's Country. Yes, we have the Youth Challenge O'ahu campus Class 50; there are 83 cadets in the gallery as well as their staff, including their leadership team, joining us here on the Senate floor. And today, we are recognizing and celebrating the 25th anniversary of this amazing program here in Hawai'i nei. First we'll start off with the leadership team on the floor: the Youth Challenge O'ahu director, Sina Atanoa; operations chief Pasila Taua; program coordinator Brandon Suzuki; Hilo interim director Ku'ulei Kekuewa; mentor coordinator Margaret Tatum; lead counselor Penina McMoore; lead instructor Sesega Sivatia; and the Youth Challenge Class 50 student president, Cadet Fernandez Sauvao. Please give them a hand. Thank you.

"Youth Challenge was founded in 1994 and is administered by the Hawaii Army National Guard. With campuses in Kalaeloa on O'ahu and Hilo on Hawai'i island, Youth Challenge provides 16- to 19-year-old, non-traditional, at-risk youth a second chance to obtain their high school diploma and become productive citizens within our community and state. I'm particularly honored to have Youth Challenge here today because the graduation of Class 50, which will be on Father's Day, June 16th, as I mentioned earlier, marks their 25th anniversary here in Hawai'i. In a rigorous five-and-a-half month live-in program in former Barbers Point Naval Station enlisted soldiers' barracks, Youth Challenge instills discipline and a sense of self-worth by using military training to improve the life skills and employment potential of the young people who are accepted into the program. The program's eight core components focus on the holistic development of the youth and include academic excellence, life-coping skills, job skills, health and hygiene, responsible citizenship, community service, leadership/followership, and physical fitness. Some of their

community service projects, where they're learning about service to others, include Loko Ea fishpond, Wahiawa Hospital, Aloun Farms, Adopt a Highway, Wai'anae Boat Harbor, and fun fair for the surrounding community. In addition, Youth Challenge has a wonderful mentor program of volunteer mentors from the community who meet with their assigned cadets not only during the cycle but for a year after graduation. Some of the graduating cadets choose to join the military; some continue their education; others enter the workforce. For example, Boyd Torricer, a Class 16 graduate in 2002—and he was a keynote speaker for Class 49—has gone on to a successful career as an air traffic controller here at our Honolulu airport.

"As a senator from the district, a former high school English teacher, and a neighbor to Youth Challenge in Kalaeloa, I can't say enough about this wonderful life-changing program for the cadets who graduate. Each cycle, Youth Challenge accepts approximately 225 young people. Roughly 21 percent of those who enter the academy fail to complete the course. About 80 percent graduate and go on to earn their high school diploma. Since its inception, the programs in Hawai'i have graduated over 6,800 students. Over the years, I've worked closely with Youth Challenge leadership and have had the honor of attending several of their functions, from helping cadets serving dinner at a homeless shelter to being the keynote speaker for a couple of their graduating classes. I created a \$500 scholarship for a deserving cadet from each class as a way to encourage and reward these students who go above and beyond during their stay at YCA. Today, I'm honoring these courageous leaders, cadres, and staff to show my appreciation for all they have done and continue to do to help at-risk youth find themselves and become productive members of the community. I suppose you could say I have a unique bond with Youth Challenge Academy. Living just down the street from the barracks, we have the distinct pleasure of hearing their bugle blasting 'Reveille' every morning at 5:00. Today, it was a little early: It was at 4:51 a.m. (I think they got 'em up a little early because they knew they were making a field trip to the State Capitol.) And some mornings, when I hear the cadets marching in that wonderful Kalaeloa air and the birds chirping, I hear this [*Hawai'i Youth Challenge Academy cadence*].

"Now, it may come as a surprise to many of you, but I was an, ahem, an at-risk youth myself, and I give a pep talk to each Youth Challenge class a couple days before graduation, where I divulge some of the sordid details of my rebellious youth and how I turned my life around, and I speak to them about some of the problems that we face here in paradise: the cost of living, affordable housing, homelessness, and how they should get involved in helping solve these problems instead of just complaining about them. I talk to them about the importance of serving others instead of oneself if they want to be truly happy and successful in life. I let the cadets know how much I believe in this program and how proud I am of their commitment to see it through to its end. Hawai'i's Youth Challenge Academy program has been recognized as one of the nation's most effective for at-risk teens, and its value never ceases to amaze me. YCA has been changing the lives of young men and women since 1994, leaving a positive mark on the Hawaiian community that will last for years to come. So, today, the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, hereby honors and commends the Hawai'i Youth Challenge Academy leadership team and staff for having the vision, determination, and commitment to help the young cadets under your care get a second chance at a productive and successful life. We commend you for your efforts over the years to sustain and facilitate a program that nourishes and grows Hawai'i's youth, and we wish

you continued success. Congratulations to Class 50 and to the Youth Challenge Academy staff on your 25th anniversary. Imua!

“Mr. President, in the gallery, I’d like to recognize the following Youth Challenge Academy staff: Larry Sivatia, Philip Ganaban, Isaac Ava, Michelle Small, Maria Miller, Christopher Barrows, Shauna McHugh, Sean Donohue, Donna Yoshimura, Kiarra Bae, Grace Kawamura, Justin Faulkner, Robin Kunishige, Maaele Fonoti, Monique Jackson, Gail Fujimoto, Roger Chavira, Taigaafi Titilii, Stevie Ward, Carol Agbisit, Jerome Bayron, Saifoloi Filisi, and Shanna Von Oelhoffen. Please give them a big hand. And, last but certainly not least, would Class 50 please rise and be recognized? Youth Challenge! Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Shimabukuro extended additional congratulations and thanks to the Hawai‘i Youth Challenge Academy, and shared that she had personally seen many lives changed due to their great work.

Little did we know of the extent of the damage that would come after that visit, so very, very grateful to the House and Senate, and I know Hawai’i island stands with Senator Ruderman and Puna. Mahalo.”

“I’ll just say my opening statement on Opening Day was the relief for the Big Island, so I’m excited that I’ve gotten at least one thing right on Opening Day. successful business owner herself, Mary serves on elected boards and appointed task forces, as leadership in chambers, and on appointed boards that are committed to improving the economic outlook and lifestyle for our community. She is a veteran, a real-estate entrepreneur, and a business leader who has broken barriers in business, for women in business, and for veterans. Senator Dela Cruz, Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, rose to request a waiver pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 348.

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"It makes appropriations for public employment cost items of and cost adjustments for employees of various legislative agencies. These offices include the State Ethics Commission, Office of the Auditor, Legislative Reference Bureau, Office of the Ombudsman, Senate, and House of Representatives."

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Dela Cruz announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on H.B. No. 348 on Thursday, April 4, 2019, at 10:10 a.m. in Conference Room 211.

Senator Baker rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Colleagues, you will note that some of your female colleagues today are wearing their pink kitty-cat hats (cleaning it up because I tried to use the title that the project used when they did these, and ETS would not let me go to that site because they said it was pornography). However, not to be deterred ... Today is Equal Pay Day. It symbolizes the gap from the beginning of the year through that it's going to take us to have women earn the same amount that men earned, so it's a floating date. Since 1980, where women earned 60.2 cents for every dollar that men earned, we are now up to 81 cents in Hawai'i, but that just means that we still have a long way to go. So, colleagues, in honor, I suppose, or with sadness for our Equal Pay Day that we still don't have, some of us are wearing our pink hats as a symbol of how women are still treated in the workplace as an object and not a meaningful participant deserving of equal pay with their male colleagues. Mahalo."

Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Colleagues, I'd like to put a human face on what the meaning is for the difference in pay for women and men. Two years ago, I talked about how the pay gap exists not on average, but in every single profession, in every single age group, in every single ethnic group, in every single education level, there is a pay gap between women and men. It's not just coincidence, and it's not just limited to a few areas. Last year, I talked about some rising stars in Hawai'i, some high school and young college-age women and what it was going to mean to them, over the course of their lifetimes. Today, I'd like to talk a little bit about what it means to the women in the workforce who are reaching retirement age or who are my age, of a "certain age," and going to be retiring.

"We took a look at some trend information, and the one profession that we could find trend information on for the average salary of women and men were elementary school teachers. The average female elementary school teacher in 1960 was paid \$35,000 a year. The average male elementary school teacher in 1960 was paid about \$45,000 a year. Over the lifetime earnings of these two people, the woman would earn \$400,000 less, meaning \$400,000 less saved up for retirement, \$400,000 less to support her family during her working years. In 1980, average pay for a female elementary school teacher was still around \$35,000. Average male elementary school teacher had risen up to about \$55,000. That's 70 cents on the dollar, \$600,000 over the career less that that woman would earn. Today, when we say that we've made progress and there's 80 cents on the dollar for the women, we still have, on average,

female elementary school teachers earning about \$57,000 a year, male elementary school teachers earning about \$71,000 a year, and, over the lifetime, \$560,000 less.

“It’s not a matter of taking money away from men to have equal pay. It’s a matter of bringing more income into family households; more income for those children, for the women’s spouses, for their parents, to be able to help take care of them; more income for them as they age and go into retirement so there’s less of a burden on the state systems and the social welfare systems. Eighty cents on the dollar is nothing to celebrate. It just means that we have to do a lot, lot more to help these women. Thank you.”

The Chair announced that the leadership meeting originally scheduled for 12:00 p.m. that afternoon would be canceled so that members could attend the joint public hearing of the Committee on Water and Land and the Committee on Ways and Means.

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Keith-Agaran, Kidani, and Ruderman who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Fourth Day.

The current bill, as written, has a clean date, but a defective date of July 1, 2050, is needed so that the bill can go to conference for further deliberation.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 13 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Kim then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2031 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1547, H.D. 2, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 11, 2019.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2040 (H.B. No. 398, H.D. 1, S.D. 1):

- (4) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity and consistency.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“S.B. 919, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, Relating to the University of Hawaii Board of Regents, passed out of the Senate and crossed over to the House. In the House, the measure has had a triple referral to Lower & Higher Education, Judiciary, and Finance, and passed all three committees. However, the measure was recommitted on the floor on Third Reading. This measure is needed to ensure efficiency, accountability, and transparency for the university, its students, and the public, and will enable the Board of Regents to better fulfill its constitutional mandate to formulate policy and exercise control over the university.”

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Kim and carried, Floor Amendment No. 16 was adopted.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2040 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kim and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 398, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 11, 2019.

“Members, we’re simply defecting the date to allow us further discussion with our good friends from the House.”

"I just wanted to briefly explain my reasons for opposing this bill. This bill calls for adding a teacher to the Board of Education and the teacher union will appoint that teacher. So I wanted to say on the record that I really appreciated the teachers' viewpoints on the board. When I served on the Board of Education, we were blessed to have retired teachers on the board. Their perspectives were very valuable—as well as retired principals. But where I have a problem is that this bill proposes to have what is in essence a union representative on the board. I think it's different to have just a teacher on the board, but this bill calls for the union to appoint the teacher who, in essence, becomes a union representative. And while I appreciate and respect the unions, I just think it is a huge conflict to have what is in essence an employee sitting on the management board. And I understand fully it's a non-voting position, but, still, this person would be included in sensitive discussions about things like collective bargaining salaries, personnel matters, and, even if excluded from voting, I think the discussion may be skewed. So, again, I just wanted to briefly explain my opposition. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1871 was adopted and H.B. No. 615, H.D. 3, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Moriwaki, Riviere, Thielen). Noes, 1 (Harimoto).

H.B. No. 118, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Thielen moved that H.B. No. 118, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Fevella rose to request that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"NO. Based on recent media reports, the City and County of Honolulu's Office of the Auditor may be initiating a forensic audit of HART and the federal government is also investigating HART. The Legislature should not interfere with a federal investigation."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, when we passed Act 1, part of the agreement was that there would be an audit of the rail expenditures and to make sure that the state tax dollars that were flowing to that project, that there would be some cost containment measures. The audit that was conducted by the state auditor was not completed, so what this bill does is it asks for the auditor to complete just that portion of the audit that was not completed under Act 1. The attorney general did help with drafting the language to assure that there would be no interference with any investigation that's being done at the federal level, and I know there's been some folks who have said an audit isn't necessary because the city council has passed a resolution to do an audit. I'd just like to read briefly: The city council resolution asks HART to audit itself. It doesn't conduct an audit on behalf of the city. So I would ask for your support so that we can complete the job that we asked to be done under Act 1. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 118, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"I support the state utilizing its sovereign prerogative to set the terms of office for president and for vice president. Where I have a disagreement with the content of this bill and the fact that it has a clean date is extending those requirements down to the governor, the lieutenant governor, and the mayor. Our constituents are not satisfied perennially with the quality of the candidates put forward, and I think this will have a chilling effect on those individuals as we move forward. I think it's a slippery slope, so, respectfully, I oppose this bill."

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, this bill requires that candidates for president, vice president, governor, lieutenant governor, or mayor to disclose their federal income tax returns to be listed on a general-election ballot. And while I'm not opposed and would certainly love to see the tax returns, especially of our president, what's troubling me about this measure—and I agree with the previous speaker—is that not only is it a chilling effect, but it makes us all-powerful because what it goes on to say: It prohibits electors from voting for candidates for president, vice president, if those candidates have not disclosed their federal tax returns, including the mayor and the governor, and what it does is it makes us determine who our voters can vote for. We're in essence either saying a candidate will be able to be on the ballot or not, and you, voters, you don't have a choice because they didn't turn in their returns. The voters should make that decision on whether or not they believe that that candidate should get their vote if they do not turn in their returns. For those reasons, I will be voting 'no.'"

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I just want to have my remarks on the record because I know I'm going to be asked about this bill. Similar to the senator from Kāne'ohe, I do support the state exercising its sovereign rights about who may be placed on the ballot for the

presidential elections, but I do think it is also going too far for the other provisions. But I want to point out that we do have a state law that requires certain ethical and financial standards of our governor, and we have a bill going through this session that would apply higher standards to the governor and also apply those to the mayors for the four counties, so I think we have adequately addressed this issue for our local representation. Thank you."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I agree with my previous colleagues who spoke against this bill, and I also have additional comments that I want to insert into the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"This bill will waste taxpayers' money in trying to keep the names of candidates for U.S. President and Vice President off the Hawai'i ballot if they do not disclose their income tax returns. The State of Hawai'i will be sued immediately for trying to impose a State requirement on a federal election. According to most constitutional law experts, the State would lose the lawsuit because only the U.S. Constitution and the U.S. Congress can impose ballot-qualifications requirements for President and Vice President."

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Section 1 of Article II of the U.S. Constitution says, and I quote, 'Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors.' The U.S. Constitution gives us wide latitude on how we choose the electors or how we instruct them to vote, and I think that we're not overstepping our bounds with this measure. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 712, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," having been read throughout, failed to pass Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

H.B. No. 307, S.D. 1:

Senator Wakai moved that H.B. No. 307, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Fevella rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"WR. By defining renewable energy so broadly, this bill includes windmills as sources eligible for income tax credits. Unfortunately, windmills often ruin the landscape and near shore ocean they are placed in."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"When we heard this bill in your joint committee, no one testified in favor of it, and there was no one present to explain the very curious phrase that was the original purpose of this bill, adding a non-specified renewable energy to our list. We passed it anyway. The vague, unexplained portion is still there, and it's essentially been interpreted as giving a renewable tax credit to

Hu Honua to cut down trees and burn them for 30 years. To make a bad bill worse, we also added a part that reduces our renewable energy tax credits. Now, we've been told we have 10 to 12 years to act on climate change and we're going to bring our tax credits to zero in about 5 years. I think that it's magical thinking to think that climate change will be solved by somebody else while we do nothing. It's financially irresponsible to think that \$80 million a year is an expenditure we can't afford as compared to the disaster of climate change. It's been said that renewable tax credits are to jumpstart an industry, and, while that's true, this isn't any old industry. This is an industry that can save our planet. I also think that it's suicidal. Nothing in this bill is needed or helpful. I won't repeat my Greta Thunberg quotes that you folks are probably tired of, but I will remind you of this voice from your future that's saying, 'Mom, Dad, after you knew that burning carbon was killing the planet, did you do everything you could to save it?' So we have one part giving a renewable tax credit, which I liken to being on the *Titanic* and hoisting a 'mission accomplished' banner and standing in front of it and bragging about it. The other part is standing on the deck of the *Titanic*, pointing toward the big white thing in the distance, saying, 'Captain, can you get closer to that as quickly as you can, please?' Thank you."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Members, I'm a huge fan of getting to 100 percent renewable energy; I strongly support creating clean and advanced energy industries and jobs throughout our state. I also strongly believe that solar and wind credits were a good idea to help us catalyze our ambitious goals. Hawai'i is now at nearly 30 percent renewables and climbing, and we have a 35 percent tax credit that has no sunset and absolutely no limit. I believe that the fundamental purpose of tax credits is to subsidize a behavior or technology to a level where customers and consumers choose it over the status quo. Once a technology or behavior is cheap enough to make economic sense on its own merits, I believe there is no longer a need to incent that choice. In fact, continued government subsidies and influence may hamper further innovation. The National Renewable Energy Laboratory statistics on inflation-adjusted costs on solar between 2010 and 2018 show that residential solar costs have decreased by 63 percent. For solar utility, that cost has dropped by 77 percent. Because our electricity prices are highest in the nation, solar installed at businesses and homes pays for itself incredibly fast. Homeowners and business who invest in solar today can already see a system buyback in just a few years. A 2016 study by Makena Coffman and UHERO found that the internal rate of return for solar in a typical household was 16 percent without a tax credit, and a whopping 25 percent with a credit. Solar is already the best investment you can make; no one needs to be incentivized to make that investment. We lost \$86 million in taxes in 2017 to incentivize the installation of distributed solar. The state has been so successful at promoting rooftop solar that the utility is now complaining that there is too much for their grid to handle—it's actually destabilizing the electric power system. A different way of stating this is that *all* taxpayers are paying for *some* taxpayers to get solar, and *all* ratepayers are paying for an upgrade to the grid to support those lucky taxpayers. This is nonsensical.

"H.B. 307 proposes to double the tax credit to \$700 for residents of multi-family homes, which are largely low- and moderate-income families. It leaves the existing tax credit cap and percentages untouched until 2024. We have aligned this timeline to the next round of large procurements that coincide with the retirement of O'ahu's coal plant, thus ensuring the push to 40 percent renewables by 2030 will be on track. From 2024 through 2029, the credit then would step down to 20 percent from the current 35 percent for residential, commercial systems, but not multi-families. All of these tax credits on solar would

expire in 2029. With this proposal, we would be able to more clearly project the revenue lost from the credit and potentially explore leveraging the tax savings to newer, more expensive technologies, like electric vehicles, energy storage; those technologies actually do need some subsidization in the future. The path we are now on is a path with unlimited, unrefundable tax credits that have no sunset for technology that does not need public support. It wastes both taxpayer and ratepayer money; it weakens the competitiveness of our solar industry and is preventing innovation in other advanced grid technologies. Solar is but one of the 100 percent renewable energy future. I urge you to support House Bill 307 and let us all work on promoting the rest of our clean energy portfolio. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, colleagues, I agree with the senator from Hawai'i island about the 100 percent RPS goal that we have. I'm concerned about capping the renewable energy technology tax credit at \$2,500 in 2024. It's also unclear to me what renewable energy technologies this bill is intending to add to our renewable-energy definition; there were no examples that were given. And, finally, seawater air conditioning is an energy-efficiency measure and not renewable energy in terms of adding that technology to the renewable energy technologies tax credit. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 307, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 20; Ayes with Reservations (Fevella, Harimoto, Inouye, Kim, Moriwaki, Nishihara, Riviere, Shimabukuro, Taniguchi, Thielen). Noes, 4 (English, Gabbard, Ihara, Ruderman). Excused, 1 (Chang).

I hope we come out with \$15 or \$17 an hour, a minimum wage pure and simple, rising at the rate of a dollar a year. That's what businesses in our society need. Thank you."

The last element is an addition to the above Senate position sent to the House of Representatives in Senate Bill 789, S.D. 2 at First Crossover.

"This measure is intended to strike a balance between the interests of employees and employers by increasing the minimum wage in two increments over three years, while providing a tax credit to help qualified small businesses adjust to the increased labor cost. Hawai'i has the lowest average wage in the nation when adjusted for the cost of living. There is a significant difference between the minimum wage and what is needed to afford basic needs in Hawai'i. The Senate has made passage of an increase to the minimum wage a priority for this legislative session.

"The House of Representatives proposes to increase the minimum wage rate annually from January 1, 2020, through January 1, 2024; and provide lower minimum wage rates for employees who receive employer-sponsored health benefits under the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care Act.

"Resolution of these differences, and the consideration of several amendments suggested by the Department of Taxation in its testimony to the Committee on Ways and Means, must be addressed by the Committee on Conference expected to be convened on House Bill 1191.

"I urge my colleagues to support the passage of House Bill 1191, S.D. 2 so that work on the measure may continue in conference committee. Thank you."

The judiciary itself has testified that they would prefer that contested cases be referred to the Environmental Court for first pass for adjudication and that they should not just go straight to the Supreme Court, which is not really a trial court so much as a review, and reviews appellates and other broader questions. So, for those reasons, I am in opposition. Thank you.”

“This bill has two parts. Part II is the ALOHA homes, which I have some concerns, but I’m really voting ‘no’ based on my objection to Part I. Part I is where it would mandate that the counties cannot do inclusionary zoning. This really is about county home rule. I think those of us who have served on county councils understand the need for the counties to have a certain amount of flexibility in making their own decisions, so I’m just really concerned that I don’t see a real justification that the state now should step in and tell the counties that they cannot do inclusionary zoning. Some counties may find it an important tool for the counties to have in their toolkit when they look at affordable housing, so I think we should give the counties flexibility to do inclusionary zoning to attack the problem of affordable housing if they so choose. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2053 was adopted and H.B. No. 820, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

“We all agree our university’s graduate student assistants should not have to experience abusive, discriminatory, or hostile conditions at any time. If this occurs, redress should come from the university administration. The solution is not by forming an employee bargaining unit under Chapter 89 that covers public employees. It is clear that graduate student assistants are students, *not* employees. Graduate students are first and foremost here to learn and earn their degrees. Of approximately 4,100 graduate students, 30 percent are successful in getting a graduate student assistantship. They are learning the craft in teaching, research, or other academic or administrative areas in these positions. The university’s executive policy is clear that graduate student assistants are receiving a form of financial assistance with a stipend and tuition waiver, not wages or salaries earned by employees. While I agree that our graduate student assistants must be treated fairly and provided with adequate stipends and benefits, their complaints must be addressed by the university administration and faculty supervisors. If we pass this bill, we will be intruding into the university’s academic and operational management of its programs. I believe the university administration should address these issues; therefore, I will be voting ‘no’ on this measure. Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2058 was adopted and H.B. No. 1274, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

This measure provides the bones for our regulation. It requires DCCA to have rules promulgated, which will be through a public process. It does not prohibit healing practices by traditional Hawaiian healers engaged in prenatal, maternal, or child care as recognized by any council of kūpuna convened by the group designated in our constitution to do so. I believe that we are at a point in time where we need these regulations, and I ask my colleagues to agree with me to the good work of the House and move this measure forward. Mahalo.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“The Department of Human Services in Hawai‘i makes a difference on a daily basis in the lives of one in four residents, including 40 percent of Hawai‘i’s keiki. With over 2,400 employees, running this department is no small feat, and it takes an exceptional person to do so. Luckily, in Hawai‘i, we have such a person. Pankaj Bhanot, our current director, not only has the skills, background, and experience to do the job well but also the dedication and character to earn the respect of his colleagues and employees of the department, and the reputation for going the extra mile for those who have little or no voice.

“Pankaj has a bachelor’s degree in political science from the University of Delhi, a degree with honors in international human rights law from Cornell University, and a juris doctor degree from the University of Delhi. He’s been with the department since 1999, when he started as a food stamp employment and training program specialist; then became the employment and child care program administrator in 2002; benefit, employment and support services administrator in 2007. In 2010, he served as deputy director and in September 2016 became the director of Human Services. This rare transition from an employee to director has given him the advantage of understanding the core of the department. Under his guidance, many innovative programs have been initiated: for example, the ‘Ohana Nui framework, which is a multi-generational approach to human services, as well as a stronger focus on data collection, which has allowed for better understanding of where we are and how our services can be improved. An example of this is the health analytics program with Med-QUEST in order to address the rising cost of health services and maximize benefits.

“In addition to caring for DHS clients, Pankaj also pays close attention to the well-being of DHS staff. The work of the DHS staff is intense and can be tragic—for example, in the social services division when responding to reports of child abuse and neglect. Two pilot programs for staff wellness are moving forward to ensure that no staff member is alone in the struggle, and self-care is promoted.

I have many friends and family members who've chosen this route of childbirth.

"As we saw yesterday with the big group of midwives and their supporters, there's a lot of opposition to this bill and a compromise hasn't been reached. They informed me that they are upset with some misinformation that has been circulated that paints midwifery as being dangerous. While I can see that some form of licensure for midwifery might make sense, this bill is too heavy-handed. This bill would eliminate the apprenticeship model of midwifery which has been in existence for all of human history. And it would mean that all prospective midwives would have to leave our state to get trained. This would mean less midwives in our state and would create great hardship for those who choose this profession. While the bill protects the rights of Native Hawaiian traditional practices which does make sense, it fails to consider the traditional and cultural practices of other groups in our diverse islands. For these reasons, please consider voting 'No' on S.B. 1033, S.D. 2, H.D. 2."

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 1025, H.D. 2, relating to the Kupuna Caregivers program.

“The Kupuna Caregivers program was designed to lift some of the burdens placed upon people caring for an elderly family member at home. The program allows qualified caregivers to

receive compensation that can be used for caregiving supplies, to supplement lost wages or to hire additional help.

“Community feedback regarding the program has been overwhelmingly positive. The need for the Kupuna Caregivers program is evident; within a few weeks of its launch, the Executive Office on Aging documented over 500 requests for services. Public interest in the program remains high. The program served 110 caregivers statewide as of the end of December 2018. To continue assisting Hawaii’s kūpuna, we must pass S.B. 1025 which appropriates a necessary \$1,500,000 for this fiscal year to continue this program. The bill also changes the program’s allocation ceiling to allow for more flexibility.

“Family caregivers play a significant role in Hawaii’s healthcare system by providing long-term care to the elderly. According to the AARP, there are 154,000 unpaid family caregivers in Hawai’i, with the average caregiver being a 62-year-old, married woman, who cares for an elderly parent or husband while remaining active in the workforce. Caregiving for an elderly family member takes an emotional, physical, and financial toll on caregivers, and care recipients often worry they will become a burden on family members. The Kupuna Caregivers program is a way to alleviate these tolls. As Hawaii’s aging population continues to grow, caregiver assistance is critical in supporting caregivers’ health as well as the health of Hawaii’s kūpuna.

“I strongly encourage my colleagues to vote yes on this measure and support the Kupuna Caregivers program. Mahalo.”

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2175 and H.C.R. No. 137, S.D. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF BUDGET AND FINANCE TO INFORM THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2150 (Gov. Msg. No. 667):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2150 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ihara and carried.

Senator Shimabukuro then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of WILLIAM J. AILA as Deputy to the Chairperson of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I would like to read from the testimony that was submitted by Jobie Masagatani, the chair of DHHL:

Mr. Aila has served as Deputy to the Chairman of DHHL since 2015. As part of the executive leadership team at DHHL during the first Ige Administration, Mr. Aila played an instrumental part in completing the many accomplishments achieved in the first Ige term including: securing the highest level of general funding provided to DHHL for its operating budget in the history of the program and substantial CIP resources in the last two fiscal years; completing over 700 lots of which nearly half have been awarded on Hawaii, Kauai, Maui and Oahu and the remaining lots are planned for award beginning this year; increasing the earnings from available lands; refinancing all debt resulting in a saving of over \$20 million; doubling the balance of loans to make more financing available for other beneficiaries; addressing programmatic reforms through Administrative Rules amendments; and securing approved water reservations for DHHL's foreseeable groundwater needs statewide which are significant for future development on Hawaiian home lands.

In addition, Mr. Aila shepherded through several complex issues during his time as Deputy. Most notable was the historic Mediation Agreement for the Waimea Watershed Area between Po'ai Wai Ola/West Kauai Watershed Alliance, DHHL, Kauai Island Utility Commission, Agribusiness Development Corporation, and Kekaha Agriculture Association regarding the use of water in the Waimea/Kekaha area of Kauai. This agreement and the process followed to reach this agreement provides a tangible model and approach that balances competing public, private, and trust uses for an important trust resource, water.

On the island of Hawaii, Mr. Aila was the lead DHHL senior executive working with Ms. Niniau Simmons [. . .] to respond expeditiously to the advancing lava flow that began in June 2014 that threatened to displace Makuu homesteaders. Procedurally and tactically this was no easy undertaking to set in place a plan to relocate expeditiously existing homesteaders in the event the flow overran Makuu.

Mr. Aila also was the lead senior executive to negotiate the alternative energy land disposition on Maui to select producer NextEra. Although the exit of NextEra out of Hawaii terminated this project, the lack

of opposition to this project when it was brought to the Hawaiian Homes Commission for final approval was a testament to the ground work undertaken by Mr. Aila. Specifically, Mr. Aila, along with DHHL staff, invested several hours in extensive discussions with the beneficiary leaders of the impacted community, Kahikinui, and several hours invested in beneficiary consultations on Maui to identify and mitigate the concerns of the beneficiary community.

Mr. Aila is a life-long resident of Wai'anae, a graduate of Wai'anae High School, and a graduate of the University of Hawaii with a Bachelor of Science degree in General Tropical Agriculture. He has served as Harbor Agent, Wai'anae Boat Harbor, Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation, Department of Land and Natural Resources, and as the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, which governs the department, from 2010-2014.

Mr. Aila resides with his family on a Home Lands residential award to his wife. As such he understands the how, what, and why of living and being, a Home Lands resident. It is frustration, it is gratitude.

His involvement in his community has been life-long. A very few of the groups he has helped are the National Marine Protected Areas Advisory Council, Ka'ena Point Advisory Group, Advisory Group to the US Army Garrison Hawaii, US Army Ordinance Reef Advisory Committee, Leeward Community College Wai'anae Campus- Advisory Board, Hui I Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawaii Nei, Ka Papa O Kakuhihewa, Hawaii Community Development Authority, Wai'anae Weed and Seed Task Force, Mohala I Ka Wai -- just a few. This is his service, as he has been taught by his kupuna.

"And so, members, with that being said, I urge you to support this nominee. Mahalo."

Senator Kahele rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, colleagues, this has been a difficult nomination for me and one that I have deliberated on even up to just an hour ago. It's difficult for me, as a Native Hawaiian, to vote against another Native Hawaiian, but I will be voting 'no' on the nomination.

"Mr. President, I represent Hilo in this body and I'm one of four voices on Hawai'i island, where thousands of constituents are homestead families or are on the homestead wait list. I've listened carefully to the testimony; I've read hundreds of emails from my own district and the districts of others and the homestead associations across this state; I've watched over three hours of video testimony on my own, and I've had a chance to meet with the nominee; I've read testimony from across the state, and I could feel the desperation of our people. The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, a beautiful piece of legislation championed by Prince Kūhiō, is approaching its one hundredth anniversary, and, today, we have almost 45,000 agricultural, pastoral, and residential leases on the wait list, and it grows every day. Native Hawaiians who meet the 50 percent blood quantum are dying every day. My own father, a beneficiary of the trust, passed away on the wait list.

"The nominee, Mr. Aila, is a good man. He's a good Hawaiian. He's knowledgeable and well-known in the management of harbors, of natural resources, of dedication to his community in West O'ahu. I have no problem with Mr. Aila in his field of expertise. He gave the last four years his best, and I truly believe that. But what DHHL needs today is, it needs leadership. It needs to go in a new direction. It needs to have a stronger working relationship with this body, with our body at

the federal government. It needs to know that the reason DHHL exists is to serve the beneficiaries of this state and its homestead associations, not the other way around.

"Colleagues, the well-being of our state is tied directly to the strength and well-being of its host culture, the Native Hawaiian community. Every aspect of our way of life, every arena—the economy, education, health, culture—is tied to the strength of the Native Hawaiian people and their economic and cultural prosperity. And at the center of that is the Hawaiian homes land trust, which gives our Native Hawaiian community the best hope to advance its economic self-sufficiency of Native Hawaiians. Moreover, the economic development potential for Native Hawaiians, if realized, can and will advance the economic prosperity of this state. Why is that? Because when a dollar is invested in infrastructure on Hawaiian home lands, a Hawaiian business is building a road, installing utilities, building homes, creating jobs. When a dollar is spent on the administration and operations of the trust, that's a vital job that is created, a dollar that is going in someone's pocket, food on their table, rent to a landlord, preschool tuition for their keiki, and becomes part of the spending power of the people of Hawai'i and the tax base of this state.

"Mr. President, I want to see DHHL firing on all cylinders: not just one section of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, every section. Send me leadership for the next four years that can move section 207, especially mercantile lands on the wait list; section 211 on community pastures; section 213 on the use of trust funds that belong to beneficiaries; section 214 on all types of loan programs we should be providing; section 219 on general assistance of technical resources; section 220 on bonds; section 221 on water reservations; section 222 on transparent reporting. I want all cylinders firing, as Prince Kūhiō intended, together, and I want a level of humanity and customer service that puts beneficiaries in their rightful place, the owners of this amazing land trust. No matter what happens today on the floor with the nominee, I am willing to work with the nominee as we move through the interim if he is confirmed by this body, but make no mistake, we need change at the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. We need to change its course of direction, and we need to change it now. Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"I have comments of my opposition on behalf of my homestead constituents in my district and other areas of Hawai'i island I'd like to insert into the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in opposition to William Aila's confirmation.

"The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands manages 200,000 acres statewide for the purpose of awarding homestead lots to qualified Native Hawaiians. According to DHHL's website, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act provides for economic self-sufficiency of the Native Hawaiian people through a government-sponsored homesteading program. However, next year marks a hundred years of the HHCA and according to the DHHL's latest figures, a little over 9,800 beneficiaries currently reside on Hawaiian Home Lands, and nearly 28,000 are still waiting for an award. We have a severe housing shortage and we need to be providing adequate housing much faster than we have in the past. Roughly half a dozen homestead associations opposed the nomination of Mr. Aila in the Hawaiian Affairs Committee, a number of them representing the Big Island. My office continues to receive phone calls and emails from constituents asking me to take a stand on the

reappointment of William Aila, as such, I hereby stand with my constituents in voting no on his reappointment.”

The Chair then stated:

“Madam Clerk, before going to the next item, I know that the presiding officer doesn’t speak during debate to influence the vote. Now that the vote has been taken, I want to say, in a very clear voice, that Senator Kahele was ready to offer comments into the Journal, and I asked him to please speak his mind this morning so that we can send a clear message about what our hopes and aspirations are for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. Now that we’ve confirmed the deputy, I would like to ask Senator Shimabukuro, Senator Kahele, who are on the Hawaiian Affairs committee for the Senate, for Senator Keohokalole, who is the chair of the Hawaiian Caucus, to outline some of those goals and that we communicate in a written document what we expect and what we hope to see as we look for that progress that Senator Kahele had talked about and the progress that I believe that the deputy is looking for as well. But we should be on the same page so that we can work together to accomplish these goals, not just for the beneficiaries but, as Senator Kahele so articulately put, all of us in Hawai‘i will benefit from the beneficiaries getting these kinds of improvements, so if you are willing to do that, then I thank you very much.”

He previously served as the director of facilities at the University of Hawai'i Community Colleges. Previous to that, he was a general manager of the Hawaii Convention Center. In 2016, Mr. Tanaka oversaw the World Conservation Congress, which hosted more than 10,000 delegates from 190 countries. In addition, in 2011, he helped organize the APEC meetings, which brought together 21 countries. Those events put Hawai'i on the international stage and are proof that Mr. Tanaka can collaborate, lead, and position Hawai'i as an economic leader. He's well-qualified to serve as deputy director of DBEDT, and I look forward to working with him over the next four years."

S.B. No. 1406, S.D. 1 (H.D. 2):

S.B. No. 1130, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

Thursday, April 18, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Under current law, the interstate compact, among other things, requires the State to use a method in cooperation with other states in allocating risk and computing taxes due on premiums to each state where properties, risks, or exposures are located. A very small minority of states have signed onto this interstate compact, and it is more beneficial for the State to use a system where surplus lines brokers make direct payments to the Director of Finance. Please join me in voting to support this measure. Mahalo."

But I think it's not the Legislature's business to identify what is a healthy beverage, and therefore instructing restaurants on what they may or may not sell and which order they may sell it or how they should do it—I just think this is overreach. I don't see an end to this. This is one of those cases where, this year, we say, 'Well, you can only sell eight ounces of the drink that we've

identified as healthy,' and then, next year, we'll say, 'No, in fact, you can't sell those at all.' I don't think people should be drinking sodas and unhealthy beverages, but that's up to their parents to decide; it's up to the restaurant to decide what they want to sell. I could see a day when we start counting french fries and saying, you know, 'You can have 24 french fries but not 25, and don't put too much salt on it.' I just think we get to a point where this is the sort of legislation where, at some point, it becomes too much, and so I'm going to go early on it and say I don't think we should be mandating this. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, despite the previous speaker, who, I think, misunderstands the measure, this measure requires that healthy beverages be the **default** option in a children's meal purchased at a restaurant in Hawai'i. Over the past 30 years, Hawai'i has experienced an unprecedented increase in obesity and chronic conditions like type 2 diabetes, heart disease, liver disease, and tooth decay. Numerous scientific studies have identified sweetened, sugary drinks as a major contributor to the obesity epidemic, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends decreasing sugar-sweetened beverages to prevent and reduce obesity. Requiring retail food establishments to provide a healthy default beverage as part of a children's meal encourages healthier choices when families eat outside the home. It does not say that you cannot sell them. Please join me in voting to support this important measure. Mahalo."

"Colleagues, I rise in strong support of Senate Bill 1406, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 2, Relating to Health, as it relates to physician assistants, and ask my colleagues to join me in voting 'yes.' Mahalo."

Senator Kanuha rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kanuha's remarks read as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in **full support** for Senate Bill 1406, S.D. 1, H.D. 2.

which will prove useful as our attorney general. She clerked for U.S. District Court Judge David Ezra. She was an assistant U.S. attorney for seven years, and she has been a partner in a well-known Honolulu law firm. President Obama nominated her for a position on the U.S. District Court for the District of Hawai'i. She successfully completed the federal background checks and was voted favorably out of the United States Senate's Judiciary committee for a floor vote. Unfortunately, Justice Scalia's death brought the nomination of all federal judges to a halt, and she never got her floor vote.

"Being the state's attorney general also requires managerial ability as the Department of the Attorney General is the largest law firm in the state. Fortunately, Ms. Connors also has significant supervisory experience in an organization much larger than the AG's office. Before she attended law school, Ms. Connors spent several years in management positions in the New York City Parks & Recreation department. Having spent some time in New York City politics myself many years ago, I suspect she will find managing the much smaller Department of the Attorney General no more challenging than the Parks & Rec department in New York City.

"One final aspect of Ms. Connors's confirmation process is worth noting. The committee received no testimony in opposition, and no one that I talked to in the legal community had anything negative to say about her. On the contrary, virtually all the feedback about her was glowing. Mr. President, I support Ms. Connors's nomination to be our next attorney general, and I urge my colleagues to support her as well. Mahalo."

During his tenure with the OTS, he was vice president of finance & administration and then senior vice president & deputy general manager from 2006 to 2017, working on the daily operations of OTS. In addition, he was the administrator for the OTS deferred compensation plan and was involved in labor union grievances and negotiations, served on the OTS pension plan and investment committee, and was a trustee on the Teamsters health and wellness benefits board.

"Testifiers have described him as hard-working, innovative, honest, straightforward, and that he possesses the highest moral and ethical values. A fellow CPA describes his greatest skill as the ability to think critically and strategically, to appreciate

detail but not to lose sight of the big picture, objectives, and goals. “It can be difficult to seek help, and even more so if you live in a community that does not have adequate services to support mental health issues. We must continue work in communities to de-stigmatize conversations around mental health, and provide residents in all communities, and especially on neighbor islands and in rural areas, the health support services they need.

“This funding will support efforts to reduce the rates of youth suicide on a statewide level. Please join me in support of H.B. 330, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1. Mahalo.”

Happy Earth Day, colleagues. Aloha.”

Tuesday, April 23, 2019

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Fevella who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fourth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads recognized his friend Ken Farm, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Kahele introduced Idaho State Senator Mary Souza, a classmate from the 2018 Council of State Governments West leadership academy, who was seated in the gallery with her husband, Rick.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 1114) was read by the Clerk and was placed on file:

Gov. Msg. No. 1114, dated April 18, 2019, informing the Senate that on April 17, 2019, the Governor allowed the following measure to become law without signature, which reads as follows:

Senate Bill No. 464, S.D. 2 as Act 13, entitled: "RELATING TO PRIVATE PROPERTY."

"Dear President Kouchi, Speaker Saiki, and Members of the Legislature:

Re: SB464 SD2

SB464 SD2, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRIVATE PROPERTY." will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

Albizia has become one of Hawai'i's most detrimental invasive plant species and is overtaking our natural ecosystems. Its rapid growth rate produces a large number of trunks and limbs that are structurally weak. Tropical Storm Iselle demonstrated that albizia can cause significant damage to infrastructure and be a threat to human life. To address the increasing concern, Hawai'i Invasive Species Council released the "Strategic Plan for the Control and Management of Albizia in Hawai'i" in 2018. Although the State has been actively addressing the situation, there is no mechanism to control albizia on private property.

The purpose of this bill is to authorize a property owner or agent to enter adjacent vacant privately owned real property with albizia to control the trees before they become hazardous. The property owner or agent must meet the following criteria before proceeding:

1. Consult with a certified arborist to confirm that the albizia trees are creating a condition that could become hazardous, but can be safely addressed.
2. Unsuccessfully make two or more reasonable attempts to contact the owner of the adjacent private property within the previous thirty days via telephone or registered mail
3. Give written notice to the adjacent property owner prior to accessing the adjacent property to prevent the property from mistakenly being determined vacant.

The bill also establishes a defense for the entering property owner or agent to criminal prosecution for criminal trespass and criminal property damage offenses.

Although SB464 SD2 addresses the control of albizia on private property, there are some concerns about its implementation and

enforcement. The bill is adding a new section to the Hawai'i Penal Code in chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) that addresses offenses against property rights. However, a law that does not create criminal offenses, but rather allows entry onto private property to control albizia, should not be added to this section of HRS. The provision also creates a rather broad defense for the person entering another's land in regards to criminal property damage offenses. Perhaps the defense should have been limited to the damage of albizia trees instead of general property damage.

Placing this new law into the Hawai'i Penal Code, also places the burden on the prosecutor's office to disprove beyond a reasonable doubt that the property owner or agent entered an adjacent vacant property without fulfilling the prerequisites of this statute. This would result in the owner or agent entering the property not having to prove compliance with the albizia control provisions.

The requirement to consult with a certified arborist could create difficulties. It is unclear how the certified arborist is to legally enter the private property if necessary to make an assessment.

The bill does not require any experience or licensure to fell or remove the targeted tree and lacks disposal requirements. This could result in unintended propagation of albizia in other area of previously unaffected lands.

Finally, the language of SB464 SD2 is very vague. The bill defines "vacant" as "improved or unimproved but having no reasonable indication of use or maintenance for one year or more." The term "vacant" is extremely important to this bill, as the bill is authorizing entry onto another person's private property, provided it is vacant. The definition of "vacant" is unclear and the terms "improved" and "unimproved" are not defined in this section. Also, the phrase "indication of use or maintenance for one year or more" can be interpreted in many ways. The concerns over these terms could lead to unintended circumstances.

Despite the concerns, SB464 SD2 will provide a mechanism to remove hazardous albizia so that landowners can have an option to protect themselves and their infrastructure from damage.

For the foregoing reasons, SB464 SD2 will become law as ACT 013 (19), Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, without my signature.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2218 (Gov. Msg. No. 599):

Senator Nishihara moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2218 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried.

Senator Nishihara then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of ARTHUR J. LOGAN as Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Appointed as the adjutant general in 2015, not only was General Logan in charge of the training and preparedness of 5,500 soldiers and airmen of the Hawaii National Guard, he also provided direct support to the Office of Veterans’ Services, and the homeland security advisor to the governor as the director of the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency.

“Prior to his appointment, his past positions have deemed him to be a man of action, responsibility, and integrity. Since receiving his officer-commissioned status from the Hawaii Army National Guard in 1984, he was a brigade engineer officer responsible for providing full support to the wide range of engineering duties for the Army like building structures, developing civil works programs, and even providing combat support. As a platoon leader, General Logan not only maintained combat equipment like rifles and explosive mortar weaponry, he also made sure that discipline, training, and the morale of his men were up to par. In a position that engaged military involvement in the war on drugs, General Logan was even a counterdrug coordinator who detected, monitored, and combatted the production, trafficking, and use of illegal drugs. The value of these experiences is memorialized in 19 merit medals, badges, and ribbons, which include the Bronze Star Medal, awarded to members of the U.S. Armed Forces for heroic achievement and for merits of service in a combat zone; the National Defense Service Medal, which recognizes all military members who were on active duty during a declared national emergency; the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, which recognizes military service members who have deployed overseas in direct service to the War on Terror; and several Hawaii National Guard medals and ribbons that honor General Logan for his humanitarianism and involvement in Hurricane Iniki. General Logan served several years as commander of field artillery, a combat arms branch that neutralizes the enemy by cannon, rocket, and missile fire. And, most recently, in a mission which ended in 2014, General Logan was also in command in Operation Enduring Freedom, a 13-year combat mission in Kabul, Afghanistan.

“In addition to General Logan’s vast, 36 years of service, he has a bachelor’s degree in justice administration and management from HPU, and a master’s degree in strategic studies from the United States War College, among other exemplary academic accomplishments, all of which have enhanced his expertise in military tactics, techniques, and procedures.

“In 2010, General Logan was the chief of staff for the Hawaii Army National Guard. Truly epitomizing the word *leadership*, this quote by American five-star general Douglas MacArthur applies to our gubernatorial nominee. General MacArthur was chief of staff of the United States Army during the 1930s and played a prominent role in the Pacific Islands during World War II, and I quote: ‘A true leader has the confidence to stand alone, the courage to make tough decisions, and the compassion to listen to the needs of others. He does not set out to be a leader, but becomes one by the quality of his actions and the integrity of his intent. In the end, leaders are much like eagles... they don’t flock, you find them one at a time.’

“So, dear colleagues, General Logan has shown great leadership in maintaining Hawai‘i’s military presence as a force to be reckoned with in the Pacific. I ask for your support in reconfirming him to the status of Adjutant General of Hawai‘i for the State Department of Defense. Thank you.”

Senator Nishihara introduced Major General Arthur Logan, Adjutant General of the State of Hawai'i Department of Defense, who was seated in the gallery with his spouse.

The Chair stated:

"Before going on to the next item, Madam Clerk, I am sure I didn't quite hear it correctly, but I know that Senator Nishihara said that he was commanding the men **and** women of the National Guard, so make sure the Journal has that marked appropriately."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2219 (Gov. Msg. No. 600):

Senator Nishihara moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2219 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried.

Senator Nishihara then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KENNETH S. HARA as Deputy Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you for the correction to include men **and** women in our armed forces. I rise in strong support of gubernatorial nominee Brigadier General Kenneth Hara as the deputy adjutant general of the Hawai'i State Department of Defense.

"Prior to General Hara's current assignment as the primary advisor to the adjutant general for the State of Hawai'i, he had been in charge of various units of the Army for almost 30 years, notably as a platoon leader, executive director, deputy commander, and commander in a variety of capacities. Most recently, he served as chief of the joint staff of Joint Force Headquarters, which provides command and control of all National Guard forces within the state for the governor, and provides situational awareness and resource requirements to Department of Defense authorities before and during operations, as in national level or contingency response efforts.

"Early in General Hara's military career, he held positions that have honed his skill set and broadened his repertoire. As an aviation section leader, he was not only in charge of training officers and enlisted men in matters pertaining to military aviation, he also supervised the operation of military aircraft. As a chemical officer, he defended against the specific threats of chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear warfare, also known as *weapons of mass destruction*. A relatively new frontier of defense for our country, these officers lead an extraordinary unit advising the commander on issues regarding homeland protection. In 2005, General Hara deployed as the commander of the 2nd Battalion, 299th Infantry, to the north of the Persian Gulf—Baghdad, Iraq—in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, a mission that President Bush authorized to rid Iraq of dictator Saddam Hussein and his weapons of mass destruction. In 2008, General Hara was deployed to the Arab country of Kuwait as the deputy commander of the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, the largest unit in the Hawaii Army National Guard. Since 1995, the brigade has been one of the nation's 15 enhanced readiness brigades. This distinction means that the 29th Infantry Brigade must be trained and equipped to deploy within 90 days of a federal call-up. In 2012, General Hara deployed for a third time to southern Afghanistan to a city called Kandahar as a commander on the Security Forces Assistance Advisory Team. This office provides information daily to the Secretary of Homeland Security, senior leaders, and

the homeland security enterprise to enable decision-making and the continuity of primary mission functions in the event of a degraded or crisis operating environment.

"As international assignments have been a big part of General Hara's military career, he has also served on several local missions, notably as assistant operations officer following Hurricane Iniki, which devastated the island of Kaua'i on September 11, 1992. In 2006, as commander of the Task Force KOA, which was comprised of the Hawaii Army and Air National Guard soldiers, he led the National Guard operations in addressing an earthquake that struck the Big Island on October 15, 2006. And, last year, in support of the Kilauea volcanic eruption and Hurricane Lane natural disasters, he commandeered the joint task force in response operations.

"General Hara has earned 20 medals and badges that represent his feats of success, including the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Medal, which is awarded by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, or NATO, an intergovernmental military alliance between 29 North American and European countries. General Hara is also the recipient of the Humanitarian Service Medal, which is awarded by the United States Department of Defense to any military personnel who distinguishes himself or herself by meritorious participation in specified military acts or operations of a humanitarian nature, as in cases of natural disaster relief and evacuation of non-combatants from a hostile area. In addition to General Hara's medals, he has a master's degree in strategic studies and a bachelor of arts degree in human services. His accolades include the 2001 Hawaii Army National Guard Outstanding Officer of the Year award as well as the 2011 Hawaii National Guard Field Grade Commander of the Year title.

"He truly epitomizes what it means to be a leader, a trait characterized by the quote from astronaut and former commander of the International Space Station, Chris Hadfield, which I quote: 'Ultimately, leadership is not about glorious crowning acts. It's about keeping your team focused on a goal and motivated to do their best to achieve it, especially when the stakes are high and the consequences really matter. It is about laying the groundwork for others' success, and then standing back and letting them shine.'

"So, colleagues, I urge you to continue your support of this decorated and highly qualified individual, and to reconfirm Brigadier General Kenneth Hara to his position as Deputy Adjutant General of the Hawai'i State Department of Defense. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the nominees as follows:

"Mr. President, your Committee on Higher Education has reviewed the three nominations and heard from the nominees, and recommends confirmation of Robert Frank Westerman, Sr.; Albert 'Alapaki' Nahale-a; and Kelli Acopan to the Board of Regents. The nominees have been serving since January. Regent Benjamin Kudo testified before the committee and had high praise for the nominees. He attested to the sincerity and seriousness of all three and was impressed with their dedication to learning their responsibilities and the passion for the perspectives they bring to their duties.

"Robert Frank Westerman, Sr., represents Kaua'i, where he was the chief of Kaua'i Fire Department for 13 years. He spent his childhood as a military dependent living all over the mainland, Asia and Southeast Asia, and Hawai'i. He enjoyed a career in the U.S. Air Force and served in Vietnam during the conflict there. Among his degrees and certifications, Mr. Westerman has an MBA from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. Chief Westerman desired to become a regent because, as a civic-minded citizen, a UH alumnus, and an employer using the UH System, he wanted to offer his ideas for improvement from those perspectives while holding the school administration accountable to the policies set by the board. At his confirmation hearing, Chief Westerman told our committee that he was looking forward to applying his years of administrative experience to the policies and practices of the university and to ensuring that Kaua'i Community College has a voice and place within a very large and complex education system. (I'm sure, Mr. President, you agree to all of that?)

"Alapaki Nahale-a describes himself as a poor homestead boy who hails from Keaukaha on Hawai'i island. He is the senior director of community engagement and resources for his home island for Kamehameha Schools, his alma mater. Despite his self-described humble upbringing, he's a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and, since graduation, has returned home to serve the people of Hawai'i in many key leadership capacities. You will recall that he was the director and chairman of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and East Hawai'i commissioner. As a dedicated public servant, Mr. Nahale-a recognizes that the regents are individually and collectively responsible for the successes and failures of the University of Hawai'i, and he and his fellow regents must demonstrate the

leadership necessary to ensure the institution upholds its promise to the people of the islands to improve the social and economic and environmental well-being of current and future generations. He contends that the school must regain the people's confidence and trust, and that the regents should be engaged and working hand in hand with the school stakeholders.

"Kelli Acopan is the student representative to the Board of Regents. Ms. Acopan graduated from 'Iolani School and earned her bachelor's degree from the Mānoa campus in December. She is continuing her education by pursuing a graduate degree, again at Mānoa, while continuing to be a wife and mother of three school-aged children. Of all the nominees, Ms. Acopan comes with the most experience with the UH System. Before entering Mānoa, she earned her associate's degree from Windward Community College, where she was the president of the student body for two years. She complements that with work in lower and higher education, where she is a Department of Education substitute teacher, and with Upward Bound with Windward Community College and as a graduate assistant with the UH history department. As a former student leader and current student, Ms. Acopan sees affordability and accessibility as major challenges for the school. She would like to have students be able to graduate on time without worry for course availability or cost of tuition while also enjoying the meaningful experience of college life.

"Mr. President, members of the Senate, we have before us the nominations of three very qualified, capable, and outstanding citizens who are willing to devote themselves to the governance of the University of Hawai'i. These nominees have been approved by your Senate Committee on Higher Education as individuals for their unique perspectives. It is our hope that each of them will reflect their perspective as a member of the Board of Regents, and remember that they will be held accountable for the performance and budget of the university and the performance of the administration. The members of your committee recommend the full Senate join us in confirming their nominations. Thank you."

Currently she is a partner at Ashford and Wriston, after having been a managing partner at Carlsmith Ball for years. Given Ms. Motosue's dedication to women's concern and her extensive legal experience, I see her as a great asset to the Commission on the Status of Women."

Senator Kahele rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, earlier this year, I had an opportunity to read a book titled *Hawaii Lawyer*, written by James Case (father of the nominee, who has joined us in the gallery today), born in 1920 on a sugar plantation on the island of Kaua'i. Hawai'i was still a young territory; its population was just 250,000 people. It is a fascinating book and, in it, he talks about his life, his wife of now 71 years—also named Suzanne—and four children who were born and raised in these islands, one of them being our nominee. He tells a story about a four-day, three-night family camping trip in 1965 through Haleakalā Crater. The family

would hike all day for hours and rest at Kapalaoa cabin, Palikū cabin, and, finally, Hōlua cabin before making their way out of the crater. Our nominee, who was nine years old on that trip, would get an opportunity to experience the beauty, the environment, the switchbacks, the vastness, the greatness of one of Hawai'i's marvels, Mount Haleakalā, and this is where the fabled one-eyed hokua of Hōlua is born. The young Suzanne, on day three, playing with her brother John, would get hit square in the head by a loose boulder. She almost passed out; she felt dizzy, ill, nauseated, and ultimately suffered a severe concussion. They would remain overnight at Hōlua cabin until she was stabilized. When she woke up in the morning, she had a large black eye where the rock had hit her. They covered her eye with a scarf, and they hiked out of the crater the next day, making it back down to Kahului to see the doctor. It was, I believe, stories and countless experiences like this, the love for our 'āina, our forests, its reefs and oceans, that were instilled in our nominee by her parents at a young age, that helped shape the person she is today. I'm reminded myself of my dad, who did the same thing for me, only on the South Kona coast of Hawai'i island, that helped shape my love and deep respect and appreciation for the environment and natural beauty that is Hawai'i.

"Our nominee would go to school in Hilo, where she attended Waiakea-Kai and Keaukaha Elementary Schools, eventually graduating from Punahou School. After high school, she attended Williams College and then Stanford University. She then received her juris doctorate from the University of California Hastings College of the Law in 1983. After receiving her juris doctorate, she worked in real estate transaction law for four years. From 1987 until 2001, the nominee served as Western and Asia/Pacific regional counsel for The Nature Conservancy, where she ultimately became the program's executive director from 2001 until 2015. In her 28-year career with The Nature Conservancy, our nominee oversaw 16 nature preserves totaling 53,000 acres and an annual operating budget of \$11 million. She gained vast legal experience during this time in forest stewardship, land protection, and marine preservation.

"In 2015, Suzanne Case was appointed by Governor Ige as chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, and, as chair, she currently oversees a staff of a thousand and a budget of \$159 million. A key focus of the department under Chair Case has been to fulfill the objectives of Governor Ige's Sustainable Hawai'i Initiative. Those objectives are to protect 30 percent of Hawai'i's priority watersheds by 2030, to effectively manage 30 percent of nearshore ocean waters by 2030, and to implement the Interagency Biosecurity Plan by 2027. Toward these goals, under Chair Case's leadership, the department has protected an additional 40,000 acres of priority watershed forests, produced the first-ever statewide coral bleaching recovery plan, worked with marine scientists to make Hawai'i one of the most data-rich marine areas in the world, initiated the statewide '30 by 30' marine planning process, established a coral nursery for lost or damaged reef, passed coral rules to enable the regulation of impacts to corals from private-sector projects, amended interim instream flow standards across the state, digitized all land conveyance records at the Bureau of Conveyances since 1845, completed Hawai'i's first interagency biosecurity planning process, and, finally, planted a quarter-million trees.

"The Senate Committee on Water and Land unanimously voted to advise and consent to the nomination of Chair Case. We concurred that Chair Case's extensive experience in conservation, land acquisition, and coastal preservation, as well as decades of legal experience, show that she is not only qualified for this position, her particular attributes will continue to be an exceptionally valuable asset to the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

"Mr. President, colleagues, in closing, I also have the utmost confidence that, after this often-contentious legislative session that has elevated the debate over water rights in this state to an entirely new level, the nominee, Suzanne Case, before she leaves office in four years—sooner rather than later, I would encourage—that she will do what no other chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources has been able to do in its history, and that is to issue long-term water leases with her signature to each and every one of the current revocable permit holders so that we can finally put an end to this issue in our state and this body. Colleagues, I urge you to join me and support the nomination of Suzanne D. Case to continue as chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Mahalo."

The Chair commented:

"Thank you. As my pastor would say in church on Sunday, 'How about an amen there,' Senator Kahele."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Kahele introduced Chair Suzanne Case, who was present in the gallery with her partner, Gigi Able, and her parents, James and Suzanne Case.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2234 (Gov. Msg. No. 609):

Senator Kahele moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2234 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried.

Senator Kahele then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of ROBERT K. MASUDA as Deputy to the Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Kahele rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, Robert K. Masuda holds a bachelor of science in applied behavioral science & group work education from George Williams College and an executive MBA from the University of Hawai'i. He has served for 55 years with the YMCA in a wide variety of administrative roles; his positions have included president and CEO of the Honolulu YMCA, executive director of the YMCA USA's International Division, director of the YMCA USA's International Office for China & the Pacific, and president and CEO of the Island of Hawai'i YMCA.

"For the last 12 years, Mr. Masuda has served as a senior advisor for Special Programs Development at the Institute for Pacific Islands Forestry under the U.S. Forest Service. Working with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Bob Masuda has helped in initiating the Akaka Foundation for Tropical Forestry, which works with federal and state agencies to restore native tropical forests and eliminate threats that degrade Hawai'i's bio-cultural heritage.

"Mr. Masuda has served, on two separate occasions, as first deputy to the chair of DLNR: once from 2005 to 2007, and again as the current deputy director upon his appointment in 2017. In his current tenure at the department, Mr. Masuda has played a leading role in initiating the Natural Resources Advancement Team and the Honokōhau Small Boat Harbor Working Group, two major projects which exemplify a proactive approach to resource management. Robert Masuda has served as the point person for DLNR's emergency disaster response coordination, acting as the nexus for the department's various functions during emergencies and natural disasters. He has been instrumental in the department's work with the Office

of Hawaiian Affairs, Kamehameha Schools, and various Native Hawaiian groups to begin to rethink how the department manages its lands.

“The Senate Committee on Water and Land voted unanimously to advise and consent to the nomination of Bob Masuda as first deputy to the chair, and I truly believe that his experience at the international, federal, state, and county levels of government affairs and his genuine connection to a variety of communities across the state reiterate the value he brings in facilitating cooperation among different stakeholders. I believe that his multifaceted professional and governmental experience, spanning over five decades, will continue to be crucial to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. So, colleagues, I urge you to join me and support the nomination of Robert K. Masuda to continue as first deputy to the chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Kahele introduced Deputy Robert Masuda, who was seated in the gallery.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2235 (Gov. Msg. No. 543):

At this time, the President made the following observation:

“The recommendation of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs on Governor’s Message No. 543 is that the Senate **not** advise and consent to the nomination. Therefore, the Chair will first entertain a motion to file Standing Committee Report No. 2235, then we will move on to the final vote on this matter.

“Pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), the final question on nominations made by the governor that require the advice and consent of the Senate must be stated in the affirmative. Therefore, those casting ‘Aye’ votes are voting to confirm, and those casting ‘No’ votes are voting to reject the nomination. So, I’ll simplify it: The motion will be to approve. If you are in favor of the approval, then you would vote yes. If you are not in favor of the approval, you’ll vote no.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2235 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried.

Pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), Senator Dela Cruz moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of NOLAN P. ESPINDA as Director of the Department of Public Safety, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Nishihara rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, it is not an easy decision to speak against a nominee for an important department of our state. It does not take courage to oppose a person who many here will support. It does take conviction, however, to believe and stand before this most public of places to declare that this nominee does not meet the standards of management required to lead this department.

“The Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs met and decided not to advise and consent to Director Espinda as the director of Public Safety by a 5–0 vote. The committee took a considerable amount of time and energy to vet this nominee. They considered information, much of it from persons within the department who put their careers in jeopardy by even speaking to us. These are good and honest public servants concerned over what they saw as improprieties, some rising to unethical or possibly criminal behavior by the director or his deputies, down to immediate supervisors. The

committee was hampered by a lack of time and resources, including the inability to use subpoenas to grant whistleblower status to bring witnesses forward to aid in transparency of information. We did the best we could; unfortunately, it may not be enough. The news media reported on a number of disturbing revelations; unfortunately, that, too, may not be enough. I would like to list some of the committee’s findings.

“Number one: Public Safety’s training and staff development administrator, Marte Martinez, lied on her job application regarding her education, naming educational institutions that she did not attend, including overstating her experience in public safety positions at a number of sheriff departments on the mainland. However, she was subsequently promoted by personnel supervisors, including those overseen by Deputy Director Maria Cook (previously, it was Cathy Ross). When confronted with the discrepancies discovered by news reporters, they tried to cover it up. Ms. Martinez is currently tasked with training **all** of Public Safety personnel, including ACOs and sheriffs. The sheriff who shot and killed the homeless individual in the rotunda just above us was trained by this trainer. She has neither the training nor the certification to do this job.

“Director Espinda claims that overtime has been cut. However, by cutting overtime by reducing staffing, he leaves the facility with insufficient personnel, and places both the ACOs and inmates at risk. A case in point was the Maui riot. Director Espinda claims that overcrowding was the cause of the riot; however, overcrowding is prevalent throughout the PSD system, but riots do not occur elsewhere.

“PREA, the Prison Rape Enforcement Act, was put in place throughout the prison system throughout the country and is a federal mandate. This act has been and continues to be violated with the tacit acquiescence of the director by the person put in charge of PREA compliance. It has been reported that the data ensuring compliance is fraudulent or non-existent.

“A law was passed by the Legislature two years ago which required inmate identification. When Director Espinda was asked at one of the hearings regarding the number of inmate IDs completed, he stated that they were working on it and had completed only a handful of the IDs. However, by contrast, the Waikiki Health Center has completed almost 90 percent of the ID requests—1,512 compared to just a handful by PSD.

“CALEA certification: At his first confirmation, Director Espinda told the state that his number one priority as director was to achieve CALEA certification. Three years have gone by. In the interim, he hired Renee Sonobe Hong as deputy director of law enforcement to oversee the CALEA certification. After I contacted the regional program manager for CALEA and learned that PSD had not even **applied** for CALEA program certification and the news media reported that fact, Sonobe Hong called the regional manager, who’s on the mainland, to ask what she needed to do to **start** the program. Let it be noted that the Maui Police Department, the Big Island police department, Kaua’i Police Department, and our own HPD are all CALEA-certified.

“Under the advisement of the attorney general, our committee could not get answers to a number of pressing questions related to the ongoing investigations into the Maui riot, OCCC escape and death of the escapee, and the shooting of the homeless man at our state capitol. All of these investigations are still ongoing as we speak. These investigations and restriction into the possible culpability of the director of our jails comes as we are now considering his reappointment. The governor has even taken an unprecedented and keen interest in his nominee’s reappointment to the degree of having his chief of staff intimately involved in making daily rounds to assure the support from senators.

“There are other instances where leadership was lacking. We have also heard too many stories of intimidation and retaliation from individuals within the department. This type of environment cannot and should not be allowed to continue. We cannot afford a continuation of the same leadership style. What I am saying is that the current director is not the right person for the job of leading and managing this large and complex organization.

“Our own H.C.R. 85 criminal justice reform task force called for moving Hawai‘i into a different direction to improve outcomes and bring costs under control, transitioning from a punitive to a rehabilitative correctional system, one where our inmate population will receive job training, drug treatment, and mental health services that will reduce the recidivism rate and address the overrepresentation of Native Hawaiians. We will not achieve a reduction of overcrowding by building bigger and better jails and prisons; we will do so by reducing numbers of pre-trial detainees. To achieve that goal, we need new leadership that will work towards a new vision, not continue with more incarceration and punishment.

“Within the Department of Public Safety, safety for the public should also include rehabilitation of persons who have done criminal acts and ultimately return them back into society after completion of their punishment and sentences. The department is also called the department of corrections: It is tasked with instituting programs and policies that will lead inmates to correct bad behavior that led to their incarceration. The high recidivism rates of over 40 to 50 percent indicate a failure of programs and leadership.

“The Public Safety department has not been managed well, and it lacks accountability under the current director. Our state and its many departments should expect leadership without favoritism; leadership without fear, intimidation, or retaliation; leadership that will not place people in positions to cover up wrongdoings or misdeeds within the department. It is time to change and time for new leadership within the Public Safety department, with more accountability and a greater adherence to mandates and established policies. So, colleagues, I ask that you weigh these considerations heavily before you take your final vote, and oppose his nomination. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“On January 13, 2018, at 8:07 a.m., Vern Miyagi was at home in Hawai‘i Kai, drinking a cup of coffee, ready to start a relaxing weekend. He was not in his office in Diamond Head. He was literally at home, miles away, when one of his employees pushed the button and erroneously sent out a false missile alert that terrified hundreds of thousands of people. Miyagi, a 37-year veteran of the military, a retired major general, is a man of tremendous honor. He was a stellar administrator and leader. That day, as many remember, when everyone else was making excuses, Vern Miyagi stepped forward in front of all the cameras and said, and I quote, ‘This is on me.’ For, while he may not have pressed the button—in fact, he wasn’t even in the building—but as administrator, he was in charge. The missile crisis may not have been his fault, but it was nonetheless his responsibility.

“Like Vern Miyagi, I believe the nominee, Nolan Espinda, is a man of tremendous honor. I think he is a dedicated public servant, a devoted husband, a father, who has been with the Department of Public Safety for over 35 years. He has worked in facilities across the system, from the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility to OCCC to Halawa and, most recently, as its director. The director of Public Safety is not an easy job. It is a highly visible, largely thankless, position that has admittedly been under-resourced. It is quite possibly one of the most difficult jobs in the state.

“Nolan Espinda was not at OCCC on March 1st when, because of an open door and an open gate, Maurice Arrisgado, Jr. was shot and killed trying to escape, nor was he on Maui on March 11th when 214 inmates breached their cell doors and started a riot that included trying to burn officers alive in their control boxes and when a critical part of the investigation, a SIM card for a camera that could have recorded the event, went mysteriously missing. Nor was he at the Capitol, right here, on the evening of February 18th when a sheriff’s deputy shot and killed a homeless man, Delmar Espejo. He wasn’t on Hawai‘i island on September 15, 2015, when William Carroll, who was arrested for theft and criminal property damage, was inadvertently released, and, since then, since September of 2015, 20 inmates were inadvertently released from the Hawaii Community Correctional Center since he has been at the helm, creating panic throughout Hawai‘i island and resulting in thousands of dollars being expended in manhunts to find these mistakenly released inmates. Director Espinda was not present for **any** of these events. He was not a direct cause of a single one of them, but they were nonetheless, as the director of the Department of Public Safety, his responsibility.

“There are clearly serious systemic problems with the Department of Public Safety, and there have been for years. I have no doubt that the director has inherited many of them and made considerable strides in correcting a number of the department’s problems. And were it not for the very serious breaches that have occurred this year—just last month on the island of Maui—all while the director was seeking reconfirmation, I would be voting for his reconfirmation. But, as an elected official, I simply cannot ignore that there have been two fatal shootings and a prior riot, 20 inadvertent releases since September 2015 on Hawai‘i island. There needs to be accountability, and that accountability needs to be and start at the top.

“It’s a special privilege that this body has to advise and consent to nominations to lead our critically important 18 state departments, and whether the nominee is confirmed or not confirmed by this body, it is important, and I hope that my message sends to **any** director and **any** chair and **any** nominee that we expect no excuses, that we expect you take responsibility, and that accountability starts at the very top. I want to genuinely commend Director Espinda for how he has handled himself throughout this nomination, as well as his family. It has admittedly been challenging, and he has been the epitome of professionalism throughout the entire process. But because of that and what I have outlined and the grave concerns I have, I cannot support the nomination. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong opposition to the nominee as follows:

“I’d like to have the words of the chair of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs included into the Journal as if they were my own, as well as the eloquent statement by our Majority Floor Leader.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) “And I want to explain why I am planning to vote in opposition to this governor’s message.”

“The Public Safety department is a troubled department, I believe, in large part due to the lack of leadership demonstrated by the current director, who is seeking reappointment. Currently, colleagues, there are four different entities looking into a variety of concerns about operations and other matters at PSD: The U.S. Department of Justice, in response to an ACLU Hawai‘i complaint on unconstitutional prison conditions and overcrowding at Hawaii’s jails and prisons; an FBI complaint regarding PREA violations, submitting false information regarding MCCC PREA audit report, June 1, 2018, and turned over to the white-collar crimes department; the Hawai‘i Department of the Attorney General opened a case, No. 19-

0734, regarding the mispending of public funds and other violations in 2019; and the State Ethics Commission is looking into a complaint filed regarding procurement law and other violations in 2019.

“There are documented deviations from the staffing plan that the auditor needs to review: a claimed shortage of female-deployed staff when there were female staff available, but male staff worked gender-posts for overtime pay. A documented sex assault of an inmate that led to a suicide while Director Espinda was the warden at Halawa. And then there’s the MCCC riot—not a disturbance, colleagues, as PSD characterized it, but a full-blown riot—which, according to people on the ground, had been building for a very long time: high staff turnover, a poorly run facility, drugs that were pervasive inside MCCC, overcrowding, broken AC and phones, and a TA chief of security captain who told the inmates, ‘Go ahead and do what you gotta do,’ and that attitude placed lives of staff and inmates in danger. Here’s what one family member reported to me: There were four phones on the unit, but three were broken. Inmates were allowed to receive mail only once per week, making connection with families difficult. Inmates were, in fact, hurt in the riot, some with serious injuries, like a broken jaw. Inmates and families at MCCC believe no one cares about them or what happens to them. They’re just warehoused.

“Mental illness is rampant in all of our facilities and certainly has not been addressed at MCCC, and the staff is not trained on how to assess or deal with folks with psychosis, mood disorder, substance abuse, or behavioral disorders due to aging. The staff isn’t trained on how to prevent suicides. While the department may have spent considerable dollars on less-than-lethal weapons, the staff is not trained on them, doesn’t have access to them; they’re locked up some place off-site. According to media reports and email that I’ve received from Maui, the staff at MCCC were ‘armed’ only with handcuffs. They did not have training to address the situation that erupted into a riot. In addition, Hawai‘i has no training academy for its corrections personnel. The police do. Personnel who oversee training for corrections staff don’t appear to be qualified trainers, some with questionable credentials.

“All of these deficiencies fall directly at the director’s doorstep. From the conversations I’ve had with staff, law enforcement, corrections, and family of inmates, it appears to me that morale functioning of the department has deteriorated over the past four years while the current director has been director. I find a leadership vacuum at the Department of Public Safety because leadership has to come from the top, and the top is the director. Through his policies and procedures, I believe he has put both staff and inmates at risk. I am voting ‘no’ on Governor’s Message 543 because I find that Mr. Espinda lacks the leadership skills necessary to lead this very difficult department. The Department of Public Safety, in my view, needs to move forward in a **new** direction with a **new** director who has the skill sets and ability to provide leadership to the law enforcement side as well as the corrections side. Mahalo.”

Senator Harimoto rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. I have never before spoken in this chamber to oppose the confirmation of a nominee. It pains me to do so today. While I do not wish to speak badly of anyone, I believe that it is my responsibility and duty to explain why I cannot support the confirmation of Mr. Espinda as director of the Public Safety department.

“It is clear to me that this is a troubled department in need of new leadership. Mr. Espinda has been at the helm of the department for the last four years. To continue the status quo for another four years is not in the best interest of the public. Granted, this is a difficult department to manage, but that is not

good reason for us to lower our expectations of the director. Many employees and members of the public have lost confidence in the current department leadership. We need a director with clear vision and who will be the champion to lead the charge toward that vision. We need a director who will be a dynamic leader in advocating for needed reforms and usher in new ideas and innovations. We need a director who will command the respect of employees, advocates, legislators, and the public. We should expect nothing less.

“To be clear, some of the problems pre-date Mr. Espinda’s term as director, such as overcrowding and substandard facilities. However, there is much that he can do to address these problems that are within his control. His complacent acceptance of these problems and lack of leadership to address these problems are of serious concern.

“Mr. Espinda touts his success in reducing staff overtime costs, but the results raise concerns about safety. To be clear, the problems in the department are so much more significant and deep-rooted than simply overtime costs, and these problems are but the tip of the iceberg. These deep-rooted problems are not a result of a lack of funding, as some may say; they are the result of poor leadership and poor management.

“So many problems came to light in the past hearings, in the media, and from various sources that we should all be very concerned. The more I delve into these problems, the more concerned I become. Here are just a few of the problems: inmate escapes; releasing inmates by mistake; keeping inmates beyond their release dates; shootings, two of which recently resulted in deaths; inmate suicides; issues with weapons; issues with training; less-than-lethal weapons kept for training only and not deployed; reports of the training official’s questionable qualifications; failure to make progress to obtain national certification for law enforcement officers; the Maui riot; and, just last night, a media report that weapons and ammunitions do not comply with the department’s own policies. It seems like almost every day there are new reports of more problems. Clearly, this is a symptom of poor leadership and management.

“As a member of the Public Safety committee, I’ve heard from numerous current and former employees and others about deep-rooted and pervasive problems in the department. I read through every testimony and every email, and there are many, with emails still coming in. And I personally met with and spoke with employees, advocates, and members of the public. Many current and former employees from all areas of the department—corrections, sheriffs, and administration—bravely came forward to reveal disturbing information about what’s going on in the department, and many more say that they are afraid to speak out. Some people say that employees should just file a formal complaint or union grievance or file a lawsuit. Some say that these are just disgruntled employees. Others say that this complaint or that complaint turned out to be baseless. Perhaps. But it’s really not about any particular complaint or piece of information. As senators, we are not equipped to investigate specific complaints or even get the facts because these may be personnel issues. It is not our responsibility to investigate such complaints, but it is our job to listen and understand the nature of the complaints and to step back to put them into the perspective of legislative oversight. I find much of the information presented to be credible because there are common themes: an environment and culture of fear, intimidation, and retaliation; favoritism and nepotism; questionable procurement issues; lack of or failure to follow policies and procedures; no faith in internal investigations; you’re either for the director or against him. The information presented is certainly disturbing, but, more so, I’m concerned because perceptions of a toxic work environment are similar. This points to employees who have lost faith in and respect for their leadership. Last year, we had a bill calling for an audit of

the department. Mr. Espinda's harsh and accusatory testimony opposing an audit was appalling and totally unacceptable. Was he lashing out because he perceived us to be questioning what's going on? This was not the temperament of a good director, and it should give us personal insight into why employees might be afraid to speak out.

"And, finally, Mr. President, I respect the decision of each senator regarding the confirmation of Mr. Espinda. I only ask that my colleagues give serious consideration to the fact that the subject-matter committee members devoted so much time and energy in sifting through all the information presented, and the committee concluded that this is a troubled department desperately in need of new leadership. The lives of far too many people are literally in the hands of this department for us to allow the status quo to continue for another four years. It is for these reasons that I will be voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Chang rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"May I have permission to insert the remarks of the Majority Floor Leader into the record as if they were my own?" (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

"It has been a troubling decision for me. I heard many of the employees; I read the testimonies; I looked at the documents. I also met with the director and the deputy director a couple of times, the governor's chief of staff, to carefully look at the issues that were troubling for this department: not having the policies and procedures; not having the training; inadequacy of the equipment; and not having good communication with all the employees in the department; and, the biggest, employees' fear of retaliation; not being able to voice their opinion for fear of being moved or suspended without due cause. Those concerns are very troubling. I talked with both the director and the deputy director, and was assured that they will make changes to address the concerns raised by employees. I've been in the cabinet a number of many moons ago, and it was a troubled department then as it is now. It was a very challenging department at that time, and then it only included Corrections. Today, it has the added responsibility of the sheriffs and law enforcement. And there is need for strong leadership among all three divisions, and especially in the Sheriff Division: They have not felt the support of management.

"I have received a number of responses and information from the director that there will be change; that he has heard loudly and clearly the problems in the department, especially the lack of communication, the lack of support of employees, the lack of training, the lack of equipment. Some of that is on our shoulders by not providing the funding and the positions for him to do his job, but I have been reassured, for example, that he will, beginning in May, have quarterly meetings. The deputy for the sheriff's division will be meeting quarterly with the commanders so that issues and concerns can be brought up and addressed and, especially, the policies and procedures that have been sitting for quite some time without adoption. I've also got assurances that the commanders' input on these policies are going to be expedited and submitted to HGEA by May 1st. I also have been assured that the issue that the PSM committee chair mentioned of the training director's background will be addressed; it is going to the internal affairs office to be fully investigated. These are actions the director is taking that I see as a commitment to change, to really hear from employees, hear from those who have been affected and afraid to speak, and I'm being assured that he will, in fact, make these changes. I'd like the record to show that he will, in fact, get the CALEA certification, as he promised, before his term is over should he be confirmed. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Much has been said on Governor's Message 543. However, let me say I firmly believe we have much to do as a whole if Nolan Espinda is confirmed. We have also failed tremendously in providing resources to the needs of the only state-run prison system that's been on request forms for more resources for many years. We have and continue to ask for more dollars to build a new stadium, millions of dollars for hospitals, for the homeless, for housing. Where are the dollars for our prison system?"

"Nolan Espinda is blamed for some of the deficiencies that are downright wrong. He has been slighted in newspapers, in social media, in emails and phone calls. Nolan Espinda, in my mind, is a reformer, and folks who think otherwise don't like it. I look at him as one who, when the going gets tough, the tough get going. There has been no director in the history of Public Safety who has stayed more than seven to ten years. It's a tough job.

"Mr. President, I look for a hero. We need a champion, and I hope there is someone here in this chamber to fight for our neglected facilities on all our islands, to provide more needed resources for personnel, to work with the director to make things right. Colleagues, please join me in confirming Nolan Espinda, Governor's Message 543. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

"Good afternoon. I wasn't going to say much this afternoon. In the committee: Yes, it was my fault; I wasn't paying attention. When I went into the committee, I told them in Senator Nishihara's office that I stand firm on my vote as reservations. Never changed from when I left the room; I went from committee to committee and I went to his committee. For whatever reason, I do not know how it was changed or I misled or misunderstood because all the governor's messages were all the same, so I voted the same every single time I went in there. So, when I voted 'with reservations,' I did not know that I was voting against his confirmation. Yes, I went in there to try to correct it. It couldn't be corrected, so, yes, it is five to zero. But I'm correcting it here on the floor that that's not how I wanted to vote. I wanted to vote for Espinda with reservations, and I'm going to tell you guys why.

"Yeah, I was not here four years ago when he got the job, but I feel, as one of the senators here, to keep his feet to the flame, I want to work with him. I think he deserved a chance after all what he went through with the media, every single email and every single one that I had from my community. My community, I think, has one of the most sheriffs, law enforcement, and even prison guards and inmates at OCCC and Halawa. And I had both sides telling me this, and this is the bottom line, from inmates to prison guards to sheriffs: If not Nolan, who? There's nobody who has the backbone. Understandable he's hard, but he's doing the job, from what I learned through my investigation, what the senators want: Cut the budget, overtime, making sure we have no cancellations on the weekends for the families to come and see their families in prison. Far as I see, he did his job.

"Yes, again, we talk about the riots in Maui, and, unfortunately, some people died. But if you guys look at what everything was said and done, even the inmates, some of the inmates, said it wasn't his fault. The prison guards who were treating them like inhuman conditions weren't Nolan's fault because he was not there on a daily basis. This was an eruption that was going to erupt whether Nolan was director or not. Why? Because it's our fault. For the overcrowding, it comes down to us; it's our fault, and it's not just four years ago. It's

been going on for years, overcrowding prisons, years. So he inherited the problem, tried to do the best he can from what I see, but then he's crucified in the media. I'm just really frustrated in a sense that a guy who put his health on the line, goes through all of this—he could've easily just said, 'I'm done. I'm not gonna put my wife, my family, my friends through this.' But he didn't. Every committee meeting, he sat there. Every question, everything that anybody asked him, he had an answer.

“So I interviewed pretty much the same people that my colleagues interviewed, in my district, at the coffee shops. Yes, I listened to them. But I'm going to tell you, fellow colleagues, my investigation and the bottom line is about the money. It is about the overtime; it is about the sick leave; it is. And a lot of you guys said it ain't, but it is. Out of the five people, four said the same thing in a different way. So my conclusion was that I was—and you can ask my wife and my family; I had a hard time—mine was a 'no' for a long time. But I'm going to tell you when the turning point came for me, guys: when Mrs. Espinda came and testified, not on the accomplishments of her husband or the things that he did for the state, but just to talk about her husband. I watched in the room the people who came and testified, in uniform or not, against Mr. Espinda. And my conclusion came when she gave that speech in that room. I looked across the room: If you had somewhat of not being selfish and not being for yourself, just had an open mind and one open heart, you could see your face change, the emotion change, in that room when she was speaking. We weren't looking at Nolan; we were looking at a wife speaking about her husband. And, you know what, the people who came against Nolan, nothing changed, but everybody else in the room, men, women in there, some of them had tears, some of them were crying, emotion, putting their head down. But the guys who came against Nolan in the audience, not a flicker because they did not come for their fellow colleagues who work with them. They came for one thing: I, me, myself, that's it. They weren't scared of repercussions; they weren't scared to lose their jobs; they weren't scared and afraid like they said they were; they weren't shaking, because they had no emotion, but I did. And that time when I was sitting there and I was listening to her and I said, wow. And then how's this one, we didn't take a stand then. We took another day to go vote. Media again got involved, ripping him to shreds. So, my fellow colleagues, on behalf of just justice and a willingness to serve and go through the pain and the suffering that this man went through for his job—none of us should have to go through something like that. Yes, he is the leader; he is at fault. I'm not saying none of the stuff that you guys saying is not true. But to cost a man his job because of a lot of hearsay and a lot of angry and disappointed employees, I think we should think different because that is not a way somebody should be losing their job.

“I am voting with reservations, but I'm going to tell you, since I sit on this committee and all the rest of the committees: If Mr. Espinda does get through this Senate, I guarantee you I'll be working side by side with that man to make sure everything that he said he was going to do, and everything that I'm saying here on the floor that he's going to do, I'm going to work with him. As long as I am the senator of 'Ewa Beach, I'll still be with him. I'll work with him, and I'll tell you why: because I think he's the work guy to do. Yeah, he's not a smiley guy, you know, walking around with big dimples in his face, but he is undoubtedly a strong man to lead. I understand you guys saying that he's not a good leader or he's not a leader, but he is. He is a good leader. I talked to some of his good friends who are prison guards, and they told me the day what I said over there in the committee and even what I'm saying now. Maybe he's not a great boss, yeah? But he is the one stepping up; he's the one to step up and make the change. So, if you guys can find somebody else better than Espinda, then that's a choice you guys make, but I am voting with reservations, and I'm willing

to work with him side by side. And thank you guys for your time. Thank you, Senate President.”

The Chair called for a Roll Call vote, and clarified the voting procedures.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 17; Ayes with Reservations (English, Fevella, Gabbard, Ihara, Kanuha, Moriwaki, Shimabukuro). Noes, 8 (Baker, Chang, Harimoto, Kahele, Nishihara, Rhoads, Riviere, Wakai).

Senator Dela Cruz introduced Director Nolan Espinda, who was present in the gallery with his wife, Malia; his daughter Caitlyn and her fiancé, Ryan; and his grandson Royce.

The Chair then stated:

“Before moving on to the next item on the agenda, Senator Nishihara and I have talked at great length about what would be the next step if Director Espinda were confirmed today, much as we did with Deputy Director Aila. While there were concerns raised, the majority of the body felt that we wanted to give an opportunity to serve, but it would be incumbent on us to lay out terms of what we believe should be done and what we expect to see happening going forward. I think Senator Nishihara, both in the hearings and information briefings that he's held and his floor remarks, as well as the floor remarks from Senators Moriwaki, Baker, and Harimoto, have indicated a list. I'm going to ask Senator Nishihara, as the chair of the committee, to put that list together in writing and work with his colleagues so we can have an open line and a clear communication with Director Espinda so that we can achieve the goal of working together to move forward and ensure a better-functioning public safety operation here in the State of Hawai'i.

“Senator Inouye, to your question of the hero, it is not any question to me. In 2015, when I asked Senator Nishihara to chair this committee, he immediately answered to the task, and he has, with great passion and determination and countless hours of research, work, attending conferences to make sure he can do the best job that he can, he has been that champion, I believe, for us already, and I look forward to continuing to work with our champion to ensure that the people of Hawai'i get the best service in the public safety system, so thank you for your tireless efforts, Senator Nishihara.”

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**RECONSIDERATION OF ACTIONS TAKEN**

S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2 (H.D. 3):

Senator Wakai moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 11, 2019, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator English and carried.

Senator Wakai then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Wakai noted:

"Mr. President, this measure provides us much-needed revenues to deliver much-needed government services."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the motion as follows:

"Members, I apologize in advance; it's been an emotional week, but I rise in opposition to this motion. I'd like to read an email that I received today:

Good afternoon, Senator Thielen [spelled incorrectly]. I ask that you please vote 'no' on S.B. 1292, H.D. 3, and here is why. My name is [I'll respect his privacy]. I am a retired battalion chief with the Honolulu Fire Department. I grew up in Kailua and have lived in the Waimānalo Beach lot subdivision for the last 19 years. Over the past 50 years, I've seen the illegal vacation rental industry ruin our island home by replacing local families in our residential communities with tourists. I searched the internet and walked my neighborhood, and this is what I was able to find: According to the City and County of Honolulu's property tax maps, there are 282 residential properties in the Waimānalo Beach lot subdivision. Internet searches of Airbnb, VRBO, and Google Maps showed the following: 68 illegal vacation rentals on 57 properties, 34 transient vacation units (8 of these have more than one rental on the property), 23 shared homes/B&B. Twenty percent of our neighborhood is no longer available for rent to local residents, and this is only the beginning. There are several more properties that are for sale and/or under

construction as we speak. The list price is starting at \$1,200,000—who will buy these? Local residents? I think not. These will also become illegal transient vacation units. There are more that I could not verify. This is an epidemic. If we don't put a stop to this industry, where are our children going to live? Who will rent to locals when they can rent to tourists for three or four times as much? Twenty percent of my neighborhood is already gone. This industry is driving prices up and squeezing the top of the housing market. This pushes residents who are trying to buy or rent a house down a rung, and the poorest kama'āina fall off the bottom and end up homeless or having to move away. Stop this crime so local people can afford to buy and rent here. Let's be a part of the solution, not part of the problem. I have a personal stake in this fight: My own daughter is moving to California in June because she cannot afford to rent an apartment and live her life without working three jobs. Please vote 'no' on S.B. 1292, H.D. 3. Let's not let this illegal industry have any ground to stand on here in Hawai'i.

"Twelve ninety-two started out as a Senate bill. We worked really hard on the Senate position, as we have done every year for the past three years, to have a responsible bill, to make sure that these illegal vacation rental operators could be managed, that they could not hide behind one of the internet platforms and proliferate and crowd out our neighborhoods. This gentleman is writing from Waimānalo. The neighborhood I grew up in Kailua—that was lost years ago. It's moving to Kāne'ohē; it's moving around the corner to Hawai'i Kai, and the locals who are crowded out in the neighborhoods are moving even farther into the next neighborhood and the next. If we don't manage it the way the Senate position has been solidly for the last three years, it's going to get worse and worse. There is an ability for this legislature this session to pass responsible legislation. Sitting here in the Senate is this bill, 1292. We can move to accept it, and it would hold the platforms liable for paying TAT and GET on every vacation rental unit that they book.

"At the same time, sitting in the House is House Bill 419, which the Senate amended to put in the provisions that we have fought to have passed out of this legislature for the last three years that would give the counties the ability to manage these vacation rentals, to make sure that they're operating in conformance with county laws and would stop the platforms from booking the unauthorized vacation rentals. House Bill 419, Senate Draft 2, follows almost exactly the language that was used in an ordinance in Santa Monica, California. Airbnb and HomeAway sued. They said you can't pass these kinds of regulations because we're protected by the federal Communications Decency Act. And that case went on up to the Ninth Circuit, which is the same federal circuit that governs Hawai'i, and the Ninth Circuit appellate court said the Santa Monica ordinance is legal. It is not preempted by federal law.

"So just as we are being asked to move to accept 1292, the House can move to accept House Bill 419. It doesn't have to go through any committee; it's not being governed by any particular chair or individual member. It is a bill that is sitting on the House floor, and the members can move to accept it. I don't know whether we're going to go forward with the move to accept 1292, but I know there are a lot of concerns in the Senate. Do we want to be known as a legislature that's just going to make a tax grab and act as a shield for illegal vacation rentals to continue to proliferate and take over neighborhood after neighborhood? Or do we want to be a legislature that changes the narrative, says we want to do both, making sure that vacation rentals are paying their fair share of the taxes that are due **and** we want to make sure that the counties have the ability to regulate the operations within their counties in a manner that works for the different counties around our state to

make sure that we can protect our communities and our housing for local peoples. I come from a community that would not understand me doing anything but a 'no' vote on this move to accept Senate Bill 1292, but I understand that many people are holding out hope that the House will take similar action on House Bill 419, and I think it's important that we send a very strong message to the House and to everybody who is watching here tonight. Four nineteen, Senate Draft 2, is on the floor of the house. Any member can make the motion to accept the Senate version of that bill. That will assure that our counties have the ability to regulate the vacation rentals in their districts and the platforms that are funneling the over 30,000 different units that are being operated and offered in our state. They may not be in your neighborhood yet, but 'yet' is the operative word. And if you think that this is a fiscal bonanza for the state, we've been getting less revenue per capita from tourists for the last 20 years, but that decline accelerated over the last 10 and even more over the last 5. Why? Because people can rent out a room; they can rent out a unit; they don't have to comply with permitting; they don't have to comply with restrictions, and it's cheap. So do we open the door to less and less revenue from more and more people with less and less housing for more of our residents? Or do we insist that, if we're going to pass something out of this legislature, that it be responsible and support both the counties' and the state's needs on vacation rentals? I ask, if you cannot vote 'no' on this motion, to at least step forward with reservations to send a strong signal to the House that we need them to come to the table so that we can protect our communities, our 'ohana, and our housing. Mahalo."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the motion as follows:

"I brought this up before, and I'll bring it up again. We wanted the city and county to take lead. Tuesday, went to the city council: Councilwoman Pine, Councilman Anderson decided to come up with a bill, 89. In the bill, it says to keep the resorts resorts, and if these bed and breakfasts and these people who want to do vacation rentals need to do it in the resort area. I thought was fabulous, awesome. Went down there—sorry to my senators and Senate President; that's the reason why I wasn't in chambers—I went down there on the behalf of my community that's getting slapped, cracks, and everything that you can think of by these vacation rentals. I brought up this example before, and I'll bring it up again. 'Ewa Beach Road, 96706, guys: Please visit. Beautiful place to grow up. Plenty local families, plenty 'ohana, are getting ripped apart by these vacation rentals. Simple country home built in the '40s, maybe early '50s, was made with three bedrooms (very small, now, not like the ones you see now; very country). Fifteen vacation rental adults decide to rent 'em. Person who rented to them did not know that they were going to have 15 people there, 7 cars, bonfire. That's why I talk about making doodoo in my community, and I want it to stop. We have the sewer treatment plant; that is fine. But when you want to do that on my beaches and in my community, I get offended. That's the reason why I went to the city council, and I was so happy to see that they were trying to do something. You know, me and Councilwoman Pine and Ron Menor, sometimes we don't see eye to eye, but when they came up with something like this, I was like, finally! Finally, they're going to do something for our state, which we talked about, that they need to take the lead. And then, here we are: we're going to pass something that's going to chastise their movement. It's going to handcuff the city in doing what they said they were going to do.

"In 'Ewa Beach—I'm not sure about all the rest of the communities—but my community speaks loud to me. They do not want this; they don't want it in our community. We have a house that is being built right now, right now: 15 bedrooms, 7 bathrooms, but they're smart. They hide all the utilities, wait till the city pau pass 'em. Soon as they're gone, they know that

they're not going to get inspected again. So guess what aunty and uncle gotta live next door to; you know goin' have more than 15 people in that house. We want rest for our elderly and our seniors and our local families and our community. They deserve it! They live there all their lives. To have a transformation of a community to be tourism, that is so not native to what we do over there in 'Ewa Beach. There's a place for it, and that's Waikīkī. And that's what the council had, and when I read that, I was so happy, seriously. And then tonight, when I went to the meeting earlier, to one of the committee meetings, and they said, oh, that this was just going to go straight to the Senate floor, something I learned today. And I was very disappointed because I was going to voice myself in the committee and say how I felt about this bill and why. But we're here today, again, debating on something that we shouldn't be debating about because no neighborhood should be subject—not yours, not mine—to something that is not legal. It's not legal for us to have this. It's not something that is easy. I goin' tell you right now, five to six of those houses, Filipino booking agencies. Six of those houses, they don't live in the States. They never came to Hawai'i! They purchased that home online. These are the people that we're dealing with.

"So please, I ask you, my fellow senators, please do not vote for this bill, because it's going to hurt my community and a lot of other communities. Give my community, give my 'Ewa Beach residents, my seniors a rest from this kind of everyday weekend partying. We know it's illegal to burn stuff on the beach; DLNR says that. But they go take pallets and cardboard from the stores, and they burn 'em. 'Kay, fine, but they no clean their mess! We get turtles come over there, monk seals. Our beaches are beautiful, guys. You guys gotta come and see! You can see all of Diamond Head from 'Ewa Beach Road; beautiful, clean ocean. To have this in our community is just a stab in the heart for the people who work hard, plantation; they don't need that. We don't need that, and we're going to send a message tonight; if we vote this down, we'll send a message to them that you gotta get out those neighborhoods. That's not where you belong! Take your action to Waikīkī, the resort areas, like how it said in the council bill—resort areas, not residential. So that's my plea to you guys tonight, and I hope you guys make the decision and vote this thing down. Thank you."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the motion as follows:

"I share the concerns of many of the members. When the bill originally passed the Senate, it had a lot of the language that was referred to that would help with enforcement. However, this bill has \$46 million attached to it, and so the hurt that communities will also receive if we don't pass this bill is tremendous. This bill may determine if Maui Hospital is funded; right now, we've approved \$22.5 million for Maui Hospital. We just passed today a high-tech tax credit with \$5 million; it could affect that. There's \$4 million for UH athletics; there's millions of dollars in collective bargaining; there's at least \$20 million for Aloha Stadium, \$15 million for a tax credit, and there are still a lot of bills out there for education, economic development, public safety, health, and the environment. So I understand people have concerns, but it's also our duty to pass a balanced budget, and so unless members are willing to forego all the bills with the monies attached, I urge my colleagues to at least let the measure move and eventually pass so that we can have a balanced budget and fund these very needed programs. Thank you."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the motion with reservations as follows:

"I want the tax funding just as much as anybody here, and I respect the Ways and Means chair's desire to be fiscally responsible and I support his concerns. I'll be voting 'with reservations' because this bill, to me, is toxic if H.B. 419 does

not pass, and I just want to state clearly that if 419 does not pass, I'll have to vote 'no' on it tomorrow night. I hope I'm not alone. Thank you."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the motion as follows:

"The version that we passed out of this chamber, the Senate, to the House was a well-crafted bill, as previously stated, and it's been our position. It's been our Senate position because it's an honorable bill. It does the right thing: It has enforcement and tax collection. Somewhere along the way in the other chamber, it got changed and it had taken away all the enforcement and the oversight and the mechanisms that made it a balanced bill. I think it's unreasonable that now we are being asked to take a bill that is not our position, nor did the other side even come to negotiate in good faith on the Senate versus the House position. So, to just roll over and to accept the House position, in this case, is unacceptable to me.

"I do believe that the people doing the business should pay the tax, but I do not believe that we should covet that money so much that we lose sight of the bigger picture. The bigger picture is the health and wellness of our communities. As the previous speaker from Ewa Beach mentioned, it's destroying our communities, and it's coming everywhere. It's really wreaking havoc, and it's just unacceptable that we should be so worried about getting what amounts to maybe 2 percent of the budget if this passes or doesn't pass, and if the revenues actually materialize in the amounts that are estimated because, according to most of these vacation rental people, they're already paying their taxes—so they say, the illegal activities that they're doing.

"So I think if you look at the volume of emails that we've received, the passionate opposition to this bill, 1292, there's no question which is the right side to be on if you're looking to serve the people. If your heart is with the people, I don't know we can do this without requiring enforcement and correction. This bill is going to create hardships for the counties. The county of Honolulu is on the verge of finally getting control of their policies, and this bill, I think, is going to make it that much harder for them by providing that shield and that tacit approval for what is an illegal activity, so we are now coveting taxes on illegal activity. That's wrong; we shouldn't be going there. So I think if your values are clear, decision-making is easy, and I think that going for this now, just because we have no choice, I don't think that's clear thinking. Thank you."

The Chair made the following clarification:

"Is there any discussion? If not, we have a motion to approve, and let me be clear to the members and the audience: If the motion passes, this is to put a 24-hour notice for a final vote, possibly tomorrow. Any vote being taken right now is a procedural vote in positioning the bill and not a final approval for the bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, April 26, 2019, with Senators Chang, Gabbard, Ihara, Inouye, Kanuha, Keohokalole, Kim, Ruderman, Shimabukuro, and Taniguchi voting "Aye with Reservations" and Senators Fevella, Harimoto, Kahele, Moriwaki, Rhoads, Riviere, and Thielen voting "No."

S.B. No. 1271, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on April 11, 2019, in disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1271, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Kahele and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 1271, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"S.B. No. 1271, S.D. 1 (H.D. 1) would allow the Department of Accounting and General Services or the Department of Taxation to offset a debt owed to any state agency against a debtor's tax refund. Both departments are also required to notify the debtors and provide certain information to the claimant agencies."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I rise in opposition, and I stand with the communities who are suffering from the overwhelm of vacation rentals. We have a dire crisis in the state right now, especially in areas that I represent—areas that are very popular with visitors, and they're beautiful places and we want to share them with the visitors, but we need a place to live also. We need residents in our residential communities. There is a giant problem before us in this explosion of alternative accommodations.

"This body has taken a pretty good position the last couple of years. We've put together a comprehensive, well-crafted, honorable bill to address the transient accommodation tax collections with appropriate enforcement mechanisms. In each year, the House has failed to act on that. In fact, this year, we passed over a very good bill: this one. When it left here, it was fine; it came back in a form that's absolutely inadequate. I would note that the House did not appoint conferees; they didn't even want to talk about it. I would point out also that there's House Bill 419 that we modified when it was here to put some enforcement mechanisms in there so that there were a couple of vehicles to address this huge societal shift and problem that it's creating: the homelessness, the high price of rentals and living, the lack of availability of housing. So we passed over a bill, House Bill 419, Senate Draft 2, that had enforcement mechanisms built into it. Once again, the House failed to even appoint any conferees. They're not serious about addressing the problem, and if all this is is just a money grab—let's just grab the money and we don't care about the impacts on our societies—I cannot support that. I think it's terrible that there are people doing illegal activity. They should pay the tax: If they're doing the business, they should be paying the tax. But if they're doing illegal activity, we should not then condone that by saying, 'That's okay; just give us the check. Give us the money because we need it.' We have much greater problems with our homelessness and the affordable housing. I mean, we've got 20,000 houses that are now no longer in long-term rentals.

"So I'll leave it there, but the House has failed to act. That is not incumbent upon us to then just cave in and acquiesce to every one of their wishes. We need to be strong; we need to send them a message back; we need to say 'no' to this bill tonight, and then let's pick this up again next year. Thank you."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Colleagues, each of us understands we don't get everything we want during any legislative session, and, for three years, lawmakers have tried to wrap their arms around transient vacation rentals. I agree, the perfect fix involves two elements: taxation and regulation. The House has been resistant to putting

any responsibilities on the TVRs except to mandate they pay taxes. Year after year, the Senate has been working diligently to put hooks into those platforms, empower the counties, mandate reporting, and force them to take down the bad actors. That call to action has been repeated for three years, but the House is not listening. While state lawmakers engaged in hand-to-hand combat, the counties watched from the sidelines. They cheered us on as the Senate did their dirty work. For the last two weeks, I've been working with the senator from Waimānalo on amendments to House Bill 419. We brought the AGs and the mayors into the discussions; the House refuses to budge.

"A Ninth Circuit court decision in March sided with Santa Monica and determined that the platforms can no longer hide behind the Communications Decency Act or the Stored Communications Act. The removal of that shield paves the way for the counties to do what they should have been doing decades ago. Honolulu is close to setting up a permitting process, finally, for these TVRs. Under S.B. 1292, all operators must register with DOTAX and get a TAT as well as a GET number. There are fines for those who fail to register. It mandates that the Airbnbs and Expedias of the world become tax collectors. They must submit reports to DOTAX. That report will include names, address, tax numbers, and amount of taxes paid. Auditors can check on compliance and go after those who are cheating us of our taxes. DOTAX and the gov's office are supportive of this bill in front of you.

"Opponents say the government won't know if an owner is operating a TVR in violation of the zoning code, but the state is not responsible for enforcing county zoning rules. On page 15 of this measure in front of you, we give the counties the authority to put hooks into the platform. It says, 'Nothing . . . shall be construed to preempt or prohibit the authority of any county or political subdivision of the State, to adopt, monitor, and enforce local land use ordinances, rules, or regulations, nor to transfer the authority to monitor and enforce these ordinances, rules, or regulations away from the counties.' That's all that the counties need to finally do their job.

"Colleagues, when it comes to controlling where and how many TVRs exist, that is not our kuleana. Ours is to collect taxes rightfully due to the state. Opponents are demanding the entire loaf of taxation and regulation, and refuse to accept half a loaf. Half a loaf, I tell you, is better than to starve our state coffers for another year. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Most of us in this room are familiar with Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death, the disease that's decimating our native forests, especially on the Big Island. It's sweeping through our forests and it's killing off our native ecosystem, and when the trees die, the native species that live in them, the flora and fauna, all die. We could try to plant more trees, but it doesn't work. The area gets taken over by invasive species, and that forest is never the same again. We can see the impacts of Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death because it's very visible. What we're experiencing in our communities is a rapid local housing death, but it's not visible because you drive down the street, and the houses are still there. But the difference is, they're no longer homes: The heart and the spirit that lived in those homes, our local families, are being moved out. According to the Honolulu Department of Community Services report in 2015, at 80 percent occupancy, the average Airbnb unit brings in about 3.5 times more revenue than a long-term rental. This is why we've had about a 35 percent increase in illegal vacation units over the last two years. And it's not a coincidence that over that same two-year period, it's the first time in the State of Hawai'i we've had a decline in population.

"Now, I know we've all listened to the many, many good things that we've put in our budget that help our residents, but I want you to think about the human impacts that this disease that's spreading across our state is having. Yesterday, I shared an email from a retired fire battalion chief who's saying that his daughter is going to be moving to the mainland because she can't afford to live here anymore because the community's been taken over by vacation rentals. We passed an excellent bill that increases the amount of funding that's available to our kūpuna and their working adult children so the adult children can have some respite from caregiving and stay in the workforce and care for their kūpuna. How is that going to help this retired fire chief? His adult child is moving to the mainland, and many, many, many other families like that, too. My friend Warren who was in rental housing for 12 years—Chinese nationalist bought the housing, kicked him out. It's an investment property; they can make a lot more money by a vacation rental. He's lucky: He's in his fifties; he can work. Hawai'i has the highest proportion of our residents who are in rental housing than any other state. What's going to happen to them, particularly the kūpuna, who are on fixed income, who get moved out and now have to try and find housing and compete in a market where people can earn 3.5 times the amount of revenue by flipping to a vacation rental than they can from a long-term rental? My husband and I dream about having our adult daughters be able to move back to Hawai'i. I have very strong memories of my oldest, when my parents would take care of her on the weekends so my husband and I could go out for a date night, and watching her one time walk down the street holding both their hands when she was little. And I wish to have that opportunity myself, with a grandchild or grandchildren one day, if I'm so lucky. But I don't know if that's going to happen. It was always a heavy lift to get our kids back from the mainland because the cost of living was high here, and that was before these platforms existed, before it was so easy for people to hide behind the shield of the platform and to rent their apartments or their homes.

"I agree with what the senator from Pearl City said: It's very, very frustrating to sit here and watch the City and County of Honolulu not take action year after year after year. But in the past couple weeks, as the senators here have given me the opportunity to negotiate with the House, I've had a lot of talks with the planning directors and others on the neighbor islands where they are taking action, and they need help. The platforms are not violating any land-use laws. The county ability to enforce its land-use laws—it's irrelevant. The tax department has come to us and said, 'We need new authority to be able to manage these vacation rentals through the platforms because it's not possible to manage them one by one by one.' We have to make sure that the counties have that ability, and we should not be balancing our budget on these illegal operations because then we will become reliant upon those revenues and more resistant next year to giving the counties the authority to regulate.

"I know we're in a terrible position tonight, and, again, I really appreciate the flexibility many of you have given me to try and negotiate and carry the Senate position, and it's not our fault that the House hasn't done this. It is the House's fault. They even stripped out the little bit of language they had in House Draft 2 that required the tax department to share a minimal amount of information with the counties so that they could enforce their land-use laws, and that got stripped out in House Draft 3! It was an insult; it was such a minor give that the counties and the hotels all said, 'We'll take that! We'll take that version because it will put us in a position where at least we have a fighting chance,' and that got taken out in House Draft 3. And what got put in to House Draft 3 is that the information that's given to the tax department is confidential and **cannot be shared**.

“So the choice that we have tonight is, do we go for the money or do we hold firm to our position? And I know it’s a terrible choice that we’ve all been put in, but we’ve been put in it by the House. And I ask you—I know you’re thinking of the good programs that we’re funding in our budgets—but I ask you to think of the real human costs and what’s going to happen to our society as more and more of these homes turn into houses, where they lose their spirit and their heart of our native ‘ohana community system, and what that’s going to mean for our state over the long term. I ask that you join me and vote ‘no.’”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“However the body decides to vote, so be it, but I just want to point out some facts. Council on Revenues came in, and that reduced \$80 million from our budget and a hole that we’re going to have to fix in the out-years. Collective bargaining came in, and that’s going to cost us way over \$100 million. I’m not sure what the financial outlook is going to be in the upcoming years, but I just want to point out some of the bills for which the subject-matter committees got WAM/FIN approval which may be impacted if the bill doesn’t pass. I just wish, as I had asked the subject-matter chair last week, to vote on this bill last week Thursday because that would’ve allowed the FIN chair and I to really determine if we can have FIN/WAM approval or not. It would’ve saved a lot of people’s time and effort. So that part, I think, bothers me, is that if we were going to vote this down, we should’ve voted it down last week because it impacts a lot of bills, which I think we’re going to have to look at, at some point, either recommitting or deferring, so I’ll just quickly go over them.

“We approved Filipino American World War II veterans burial grants. We approved State Procurement Office homelessness training procurement; FDA Food Safety Modernization Act; food certification training program appropriation; loan repayment healthcare professionals matching funds; suicide early intervention, prevention, education for Department of Health; Hawai‘i 2050 Sustainability Plan; He‘eia State Park appropriation; DBEDT–DOA study, impact marketing appropriation; UH Hawai‘i Pamantasan Council appropriation; agriculture theft and vandalism pilot project appropriation; culturally competent palliative care pilot program; industrial hemp state plan appropriations; Department of Agriculture aquaculture development program appropriations; Hawaii Public Housing Authority Section 8 vouchers; DHRD employment recruitment, experimental modernization administrative officer position, experimental modernization project; Hawaii Correctional System Oversight Commission; DLNR Rapid ‘Ōhi‘a Death appropriation; Hawai‘i Museum of Natural and Cultural History, appropriation to Bishop Museum; historic preservation rehabilitation tax credit; voting by mail; creative media and film industry special fund appropriation; HTDC appropriation; homelessness, Human Services, housing shelters, ohana zones pilot program; DOA agricultural disaster funds, agriculture loan revolving fund; UH student athletic program; HTDC activities research credit; homelessness, Hawaii Public Housing Authority, Human Services appropriation; motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit; Hawai‘i Community Development Authority stadium development district appropriation; Maui Health System appropriation; Cancer Center, liver and bile duct cancer appropriation; and Office of Energy appropriations. And those are just what we passed within the last two days, so there are other bills that are going to be impacted, and it would’ve been good to know that we weren’t going to have that \$46 million last week.

“DOTAX had mentioned that there’s a big difference between this bill and the bill that went to the governor several

years ago. It’s mandatory for platforms to collect GET and TAT using this bill. Platforms will be liable for GET and TAT as well. It also requires platforms to report name, address, property address, TAT, GET, and taxes paid. There are civil penalties. There are consequences for placing an ad without TAT number. There’s also potential violations of federal CDA and SCA laws, which the bill uses definitions now upheld in other jurisdictions. It also allows counties more aggressive actions, and the revenue estimate is \$46 million. Thank you.”

The Chair then called for a Roll Call vote.

You may remember, we've passed four pieces of legislation over the course of the last five years to have UH conduct a hemp research study and also set up a pilot hemp research program. To date, there are 17 licensees across the state who are licensed to grow 117 acres of hemp under the Department of Agriculture's hemp program. I know you've been hearing from some of your constituents, there's huge potential for hemp as an economic driver for our ag industry for years to come. Consider these facts:

- New Frontier Data released a report in February 2019 estimating that U.S. hemp sales in 2018 were \$1 billion and that global hemp sales will reach \$5.7 billion by 2020.
- According to Vote Hemp, there are now 23 states, including Hawai'i, that are growing hemp.
- There are currently 3,546 hemp licensees around the country with a total acreage of 78,176.
- In December, Congress passed the Farm Bill which took hemp off the federal schedule 1 controlled substances list.

"So with S.B. 1353, we're on the cusp of taking advantage of hemp's new legal status and opening the door to a new booming industry for our state. This bill will require our Department of Agriculture to establish a commercial hemp program and submit a plan to the USDA on how our program would roll out. It would allow existing seed inspectors to also do inspections for hemp. It would also create two new hemp positions, so that we would have a total of three people working on this important project. While I would have liked us to pass a bill more closely aligned with the recommendations of the Department of Agriculture and the Attorney General, as we all know we don't always get what we want during the legislative process so we need to do the best with what we have in this bill. I urge you to join me in supporting this important legislation and get this hempening! Mahalo."

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTIONS TAKEN

S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3:

Pursuant to Senate Rule 66, Senator Chang moved that the Senate reconsider its action taken on S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3 on Friday, April 26, 2019, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Kim rose on a point of order, stating:

"Mr. President, point of order. We are discussing whether or not the reconsideration—"

The Chair interjected:

"The motion of reconsideration."

Senator Kim continued:

"Not for the measure itself, correct?"

The Chair replied in the affirmative.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried, with Senators Fevella, Harimoto, Ihara, Kahele, Keohokalole, Kim, Moriwaki, Riviere, Ruderman, and Thielen voting "No."

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3:

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Thielen rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I move to amend Senate Bill 1292, House Draft 3, and would ask the Clerk to please pass out the floor amendment."

Senator Riviere rose and stated:

"I second that."

At 10:49 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:52 a.m.

At this time, Senator Nishihara welcomed a group of fifth-grade students from August Ahrens Elementary School, who were present in the gallery with their teacher, Ms. Ragmat.

Senator Thielen offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 21) to S.B. No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1292, S.D. 2, H.D. 3, is amended by:

- (1) Inserting language in sections 5 and 6, relating to chapters 237 and 237D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, respectively, that requires the director of taxation to provide each county the minimal amount of data necessary to enable each county to provide for meaningful enforcement of its land use ordinances, rules, or regulations; and
- (2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity and consistency.

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Members, we're put into a situation of 'take it or leave it,' but I firmly believe there are always more than two choices. A legislative body sits down at the table, and they work out agreements, and sometimes they're tough agreements. This Senate has tried and tried and tried to work out an agreement with the House. We have said we agree that vacation rentals should be paying transient accommodations tax and GET. We agree it is easier to collect these taxes through the platforms. The one area that we have disagreement is whether this measure should also provide some language that allows the counties to enforce their land use zoning and to restrict vacation rentals from taking over communities.

"We're being told that Senate Bill 1292, House Draft 3, does protect the counties because it requires information about the vacation rental to be posted on the advertisements. The problem is that requirement is placed in the sections of the law that apply to the Department of Taxation. Those requirements cannot be

enforced by the county. They can only be enforced by the Department of Taxation, and, by the way, those requirements have already been in law for three years, and the Department of Taxation has made very clear that they don't really care about whether there is a local contact listed on the advertisement; their job is purely to collect the tax. We cannot rely on the Department of Taxation to enforce those provisions, and I don't blame them because their job is simply to collect the tax. That is why we need a bill that makes it clear that there will be some assistance to the counties because the way that Senate Bill 1292, House Draft 3, is written, the internet platforms will be a shield for the illegal operators and the counties will not be able to get that information to do enforcement.

"And what's happened is, although we've tried and tried and tried to hold the Senate position and the House has said 'no,' we're the ones making the vote. We're the ones who will be blamed for doing the tax grab. And the irony is, I just found out yesterday, one of the House counterparts in my district is apparently telling people, oh, he didn't know! He wouldn't have voted for this if he had known! It's the Senate's choice! This member's in leadership; this member could've stopped this; this member could've insisted that we work on the compromise. We are being set up.

"So I thought about what is, then, a third choice? And I think a third choice would be, the Senate makes one more offer for a compromise. We reinsert into this bill the language that was in House Draft 2. The House voted to support the language in House Draft 2; maybe it just got accidentally stripped out in House Draft 3. But the language requires—very simple—the director of Taxation provide each county the minimal amount of data necessary to enable each county to provide for meaningful enforcement of its land use ordinances, rules, or regulations. Simple. I spoke to the director of Taxation; she said they could work with that. It's not so prescriptive that it violates any federal law, and the Department of Taxation would have to go through rulemaking to lay that out. If the platforms want to challenge it, they would challenge the rules; it would not challenge the underlying law. We would still be able to collect the tax.

"If we make this offer today in an amendment, the ball goes to the House's court. Hey, House: You say you didn't know? You say that you want to help the counties, too? Hey, there you go! Floor amendment—let's pass it! Or do you guys just want to get a tax grab and leave the counties hanging? We can defer one day on the bills that our Ways and Means chairman is saying are necessary, if this measure doesn't pass, to be recommitted, and we can put the ball in the House's court. You want to collect the taxes; you want to make sure the counties have the minimum information needed to be able to enforce their land use laws; you want the 15 bills and the funding that's supportive for them? It is your call, House. It is not the Senate's responsibility; it is **your** responsibility to make this decision because we have tried and tried and tried to protect communities. We should be the last people taking the blame for this. Every person who is in the gallery who is watching us today, they can walk on up to the House. They can jam their phone lines; they can jam their emails; they can go and fill out petitions and walk into the House and tell them, 'Pass this amended bill,' and you know what? If the House tells you you can't: House Concurrent Resolution 232. It was offered by the House on April 22nd. It was adopted by the House on April 22nd. It was transmitted to the Senate on April 22nd. It was received by us from the House on April 22nd. It was adopted by the Senate on April 22nd. It was returned to the House on April 22nd. And it was adopted in final form on April 22nd. You tell me, House: If you can do that, why can't you take a floor amendment and pass it? This is your choice, not ours. If you turn it down, it's your fault, not ours. I ask that you vote with me to support this floor amendment."

The Chair clarified:

"I thought I heard you move to approve the amendment with a second from Senator Riviere. I have been corrected; you stood to offer the amendment. It had to be identified first, so just so we're clear, then, will you please offer the motion to amend."

Senator Thielen stated:

"I offer the motion to amend."

Senator Riviere stated:

"I second that."

Senator Dela Cruz rose on a point of information as follows:

"Is there a House bill?"

The Chair replied:

"There is no House bill to amend, so everything that was said about amending it, sending it over for the House to consider and amend, this was a motion to agree on Friday night, and so there is no companion in the House to be amended, and so that's not technically possible. Is there further discussion?"

Senator Baker rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"When we were hearing similar measures last year or the year before, we heard from the City and County of Honolulu that they have a wonderful tech system that they know where every vacation rental is in the City and County of Honolulu. They know how much is being collected in rent for those vacation rentals. They know exactly what the tax map key is; they know how to find them, and they track it. So, this seems to be all about the City and County of Honolulu. We don't need this amendment because they can already enforce their own laws, their own land use laws, with the technology and the commitment that they have, and they shared that with the Senate in previous sessions, so that's why I'm opposing this measure."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"A little clarification: I was very blessed this morning to go to the ceremony for the prayer breakfast, and just so happened the person I was sitting next to was Councilman Ron Menor. We had a little discussion of me not being here on Friday because I had an emergency, and it was possible that this version of this bill might be heard, so we talked. Yesterday, Bill 89, C.D. 2 and Bill 85, C.D. 2 passed in committee, and they're going to be hearing them on Wednesday. So I urge everyone from the Senate who has concerns, really got big concerns, of this amendment or even 1292, to go down there and listen. I talked to him at length, and I asked him three questions that I had. If we passed this version of 1292, would it do anything to these bills? He said yes, because when they go ahead and try to go after the illegal rentals, they going to say they're paying taxes. We're going to legitimize illegal activity. What we're saying down here is not about the legal people that the city can keep track of; I'm not worried about them. I'm worried about the illegals that are popping up—not just in my community, Senator Shimabukuro's community, North Shore, Kailua. If we legitimize this tax collection, which we should figure out, by making them feel that they're legal when enforcement will be a problem: they're going to have a legal problem. So I asked Ron—Ron is also an attorney—that question, and again he reassured me. So it wasn't by chance or by might that I sit by Ron Menor; I believe it was a godsend because this was something that I battled from day one until now—Thursday, when I talked about it, until now. I'm going to tell you why: because, as legislators here, we can be more creative in how we're going to obtain the taxes. Now we're

having a floor amendment that might put a little bit more bite in 'em, giving the city and county a little bit more bite, and not legitimizing the illegal vacation rentals. So now we're worried about housing, homelessness, Hawaiian families not having homes. Well, if we legitimize all these guys, who's going to rent the homes? Not my family, not your family—people who are coming in our community who are only there for vacation when that could be housing one of our family members to rent, lease, live, bring their family up. It's not a temporary solution. Our community is hurting, and I fight for my community, and I'm going to tell you why: Because we're losing this battle. We grumble all this time, since I've been here—all I heard was, 'The city is not doing their job.' Well, guys, here it is: They're doing their job, and then now, we're going to come up with something. I understand that we need the money, fine, but now we have a floor amendment that we can pass to work it out with the city and still collect the money, but for legal rentals, not illegal. And the reason why I have trouble, off and on, and I talk to leadership and I talk to fellow colleagues here about *yes, no*, I don't know. It's confusing.

"Now I remember why I had hurt my feet earlier this past week; ended up in the emergency on Friday. It wasn't by chance that we were in 12–12 deadlock; there was a reason for it, so all this time, I just was thinking that I'll go try to help everybody, make sure I'm there, work with my colleagues. But God was telling me to slow down. That's why I hurt my feet. I was running here and there, to and from, worrying about everything else except one thing that's important—our state. Yeah, my health is important, yes, because I gotta do my job, but our state—by passing this bill, it's going to ruin the State of Hawai'i, whether you believe it or not. I'll go back a little bit: I always talk about my mom, my mom passing. Her birthday was April 28th. Wasn't by chance, and I shared with a few colleagues, a song was given to me, 'If There's a Phone in Heaven,' and I asked Jesus to forward my call to my mom. My mom would want me to vote 'no' on this bill because she started her career, before she got money saved, by working in the hotel industry to be a nurse, a registered nurse, so she'd take care and contribute to the family by being a hotel worker at Waikiki Banyan, where she helped organize and start Local 5. When I prayed—and I prayed hard for this, and it was very conflicting for me—what would my mom want me to do? The betterment for a few people or the State of Hawai'i? And it came down to the conclusion at my mom's birthday—sitting there, talking to her, and fellowshiping with my family—realized, this is not pono. Twelve ninety-two is not right. We can do better as legislators. We could've pressured the House leadership. I didn't know these things until after, that the House had something there and the city would be chastised. I learned this over on the few days and the few times I was there. Yesterday, when I left session after honoring a great governor, I went home and I slept and I prayed—couldn't sleep because of the pain. Standing here, still have the pain, but I think this is very important for our state. I listened to our governor yesterday, said this to us here, if anybody was listening: If a bill is not good for the majority of the state, then we need to vote 'no.' That was from our governor. I've heard that man speak; I was in awe yesterday of a great, especially at his age, and well-spoken man and knowledgeable. I pray to God one day I can have that kind of knowledge. But the thing for me, guys, is that this didn't sit well, so from injuring my feet, ending up in the emergency and 12–12 vote, there was a reason for that. There was a reason only God knows, but I cannot—cannot—vote for (I know it's not on the floor yet) but I cannot for 1292.

"I support this amendment because I feel this is something that we can legitimize and keep the illegal rentals out of our community, because if we don't have this amendment and we go to the city, Councilman Ron Menor told me that, and regardless if somebody goin' say, some people were saying that

they talked to the attorney general, Ron Menor did the same thing. So when I testified a couple weeks ago at the council, and I asked Councilwoman Pine and Councilman Ron Menor before this passed out, is this the best thing going forward for Hawai'i? And he said yeah, but he said if we just take out, we go with 1292, this will have them hard time for the illegal rentals, to bring them to justice, so all I'm here to asking my colleagues today for this floor amendment is justice for the State of Hawai'i. Mahalo."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"We have a unique taxing and powers in this state, where we have so much authority vested in the state and then we've delegated specific powers to the counties. I think, nationally, what we see is a municipality has both taxing authority and property enforcement zoning, and the local authorities have all the tools in the kit to enforce civil order for the betterment of all their community. This disconnect that we have here, where the state collects the TAT and the county is responsible for enforcing zoning and land use, doesn't work. The incentive is for us to collect the tax and we just say, 'You guys go do this.' We do this all the time: We give the county mandates. Meanwhile, we're collecting the TAT from the visitors. So I applaud this amendment because I think it's brilliant. It bridges that disconnect. It simply says the director of taxation shall provide to each county the minimal amount of data necessary to enable each county to provide for meaningful enforcement of its land use ordinances, rules, or regulations. Who can deny the simplicity and the beauty of that? That makes this bill work. We can collect the taxes.

"We heard previously that we have the authority to originate and approve a resolution in one day. We heard yesterday that, as a previous speaker spoke, Governor Ariyoshi spoke clearly about his many times of standing against the powers that wanted something and saying, 'No, I'm going to always try to find what is right.' And what is right is protecting our communities, protecting our least advantaged people, protecting those people who are being driven out of their housing because we can't control this new business. Now, this new business is dynamic and it's there. We cannot kneecap the counties in their enforcement authority. I went down yesterday to testify on Bills 85 and 89, and I was pleased to see that they did, in fact, move them forward, and they're on the verge of approving enforcement mechanisms, but, as previously stated, we are going to be interfering with that. If we want to collect these taxes, let's either work with the counties—let's have that unity and work together—or let's wait until next year. But, either way, this amendment is the way forward. Let's pass this amendment today. Thank you very much."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"Members, I agree with the senator from Waimānalo, who said that we've been struggling with this bill and this issue for more than three years now. And it was the senator from Waimānalo, myself, as well as the senator from Maui who, two years ago, went upstairs, talked to the governor, asked him what was his position on how to regulate Airbnbs? We've gotten no response. We were supposed to get stakeholders gathered; that didn't materialize. So we're stuck with the reality that we face today. The House doesn't want to play ball with us. The House refuses to put any hooks into these platforms, and that's where I begin to differ from my colleague from Waimānalo, who believes that, somehow, we have to do the dirty work for the House as well as do the work for the city. And I point out to you, members, that the language in this bill is clear that nothing that is in 1292 is going to preempt the counties from providing any regulations that they want. This bill provides us the ability for taxing authority and collecting the taxes, and I remind my

colleagues that Bill 419 already sits on the House floor. They can go ahead today, Thursday, pass that bill and do everything that this body has been pushing for for three years. It's already there; they don't need to have an amended 1292 to vote on. And that Bill 419 does everything that we want: It mandates reporting; it mandates sharing of that information, and it also mandates that the platforms take down the bad actors when they're found. It does even more than the amendment that is in front of you today. And we cannot continue to hope and throw a Hail Mary at the House. We cannot anticipate wishful thinking as getting us through the day. We need to have strategic thinking. I encourage you, members, not to vote for this proposed amendment."

At 11:16 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:32 a.m.

The Chair remarked:

"Before proceeding, a couple of factual items: Senator Riviere, we certainly have had debates about unfunded mandates; the power of zoning to the counties is not one of them. The power of zoning is granted solely to the counties; through zoning, they issue building permit fees, plan review fees, and, through the process of zoning, create real property value, which they collect, and is not an unfunded mandate that is passed on to the counties. And again, if it wasn't clear, there is no companion bill in the House. A vote for the amendment effectively would kill the bill. Also, a vote for the amendment would require it to go over and the House to agree. A vote against the amendment would then bring us back to a motion to approve. Do we have further discussion? If not, Madam Clerk, can we call for the Roll on the motion to approve the amendment?"

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 21 was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 9. Noes, 16 (Baker, Chang, Dela Cruz, English, Gabbard, Inouye, Kanuha, Keith-Agaran, Kidani, Kim, Kouchi, Nishihara, Rhoads, Shimabukuro, Taniguchi, Wakai).

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"A lot has been said by others smarter than me about the legal ramifications of this bill and its effect on counties; I'd like to talk just a minute about the long-term effect on our economy and our society. Governor Ariyoshi said just yesterday, do what's right for the society of Hawai'i when you consider a bill. In my business experience, I had fairly humble beginnings and I started a business from scratch that has done very well over the course of 20 years, and to get to this point required taking the long view of financial situations in general. In any given moment, how much money we make this year is not as important as how much money we make over the next five or ten years. Many times, we've had to take money that I could've taken to the bank and reinvest it, and put it into infrastructure and marketing, and understand that the rewards will come in future years. So the tradeoff of money now for less money later or a much worse situation later is not economically smart; it's penny-wise and pound-foolish.

"We also have to, always, look at **both** sides of a ledger. Money coming in, there's benefits and there's costs. Right now, we're looking at only the short-term benefit: \$46 million this year, it has been said. But we have to consider the cost on the other side of the ledger. What is the cost of the loss of a livable society in our state? There are numbers to that; they're not as easy to get to. They'll become real over the next five or ten years if they're not real now. What is the cost of increased

homelessness instead of addressing homelessness? Less affordable housing, which is the direct result of the continued proliferation of vacation rentals. More loss of jobs for hotel workers, who are already having their hours cut and laid off. If they didn't come to your office the last couple weeks, I don't know why. I have sympathy for those people. What's the cost of more poverty in our state? What's the cost of the stress, including the dramatically rising suicide rate in our population from the stresses of society and homelessness? And, of course, what is the cost of more and more of our people leaving our state for the mainland because they can't afford to live here? And I submit to you folks, as someone who has a little bit of experience in long-range business planning, that it's a very bad bargain to take what money you can get now and leave the disaster for future years."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"I'll keep it short. The problem that we don't foresee in the short term that we're looking at right now is inventory. I don't know about your guys' communities; we're one of the most growing communities out there on the west side. If we don't have enough inventory, supply and demand, prices go up. People cannot afford to live in there; kids are graduating from Campbell High School or future graduates from Campbell High School won't be able to live and afford in their own community like I do. So that's what I'm asking you guys today, when you guys thinking about this bill, think about the inventory, because as soon as they saturate our area, believe you me, they'll go 'Aiea; they'll go Mānoa; they'll go all over. Because why? Accessibility and availability. They'll be able to do it all over. Our area is very much victimized because it's cheap, very cheap. We have the most beautiful beaches, beautiful view of Waikīkī. So they go on the internet and they buy these homes, never step foot here, rent 'em out. Passing this is going to chastise our future residents and future children's residency in 'Ewa Beach.

"Right now, they're building Ho'opili, affordable homes. But what is affordable? Seven hundred thousand? Eight hundred thousand? All the people that I live by, and I live with my dad, my father-in-law, and my wife and my daughter. Now if you ask if I could live by myself, no. Could I buy a house in 'Ewa Beach? The answer is no. So these are the things to think about when you guys are thinking about voting for this bill. It's not just about the money and the tax collection. It's about lives in different communities that we're going to affect for generations—not just today, generations—because these guys are going to come in droves. They're waiting right now; they're watching, listening to us. Once this passes, North Shore won't be the North Shore anymore. They'll be gone. And when they're gone there, they're going to go in every single community: Mililani, Wahiawā; they're going to be there. And believe you me, we not goin' have any place to go.

"My daughter right now is a freshman in high school. By the time she graduates Campbell High School, it's almost a fact, no matter how great her job would be, no matter how minimum wage increases, she's not going to be able to buy her own home, either, because the homes we're talking about today, and by letting these guys come in and victimize, the increasing rates of land tax and rentals—'Ewa Beach went up five times in the last year and a half. A three-bedroom house between \$900 to \$1,200; now it's \$2,500. So imagine now more of these illegal rentals and these things pop up. The city said, keep it in the resort area. I agree. I not trying to tell them they cannot do their business; I'm just asking them politely not to do their business in my neighborhood, because we don't want 'em. I want to still see my aunties and uncles and cousins, not have to go vacation in Vegas to go visit them because it's cheaper and affordable. So

I ask you, my colleagues, today, to please, do not vote for this measure because it will hurt generations to come. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’ll keep my remarks short because I’ve spoken about this at length two times already, but I do want to correct the record because the senator from Lahaina said this is an O’ahu problem: This is not. The mayor and the planning director for the Big Island of Hawai’i are asking for this. They say that they need help. The mayor and the planning director for the County of Maui is asking for the Senate version to go through because they need help. The mayor and the planning director for the County of Kaua’i is asking for the help. This is not an O’ahu problem; this is a statewide problem. Twelve ninety-two as written will allow the internet platforms to be a shield for the vacation rental operators, and all four counties oppose it, say it’s going to make it extremely difficult to impossible for them to enforce their land use and zoning laws, and they need the Senate position to prevail. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I’d like to add the comments of the senator from Waimānalo as if they were my own.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, earlier, I talked about the amendments to Senate Bill 78 and what it meant for our pre-K children. In this bill, there are 18 charter pre-K classrooms that could lose funding because we do not pass this bill. Are you willing to tell those kids, ‘Go home and stay home; we don’t have room for you—we can’t afford it.’? Are they going to wait five years for the counties to get their act together? This is our problem, our issue. There is also funding in Senate Bill 78 for 10 additional pre-K classrooms. A total of probably over 550 children will not be able to go to prekindergarten and start their early education, as we all know is super important because of the brain development at that early age. Colleagues, I urge you to please support this bill.”

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I just want to point out that \$46 million, \$50 million, is approximately, of the total budget ... We’re passing appropriations in budgets equaling nearly \$16 billion. Last year, the state budget was \$14.5 billion. We’ve gone from an astronomical increase, from \$14.5 billion to nearly \$16 billion, in one year. That is gigantic. We have a lot of priorities. We’ve heard that we’ve got collective bargaining; we’ve got other expenses; we’ve got big bills coming around the corner. Yes, we do, but this bill is not going to plug that hole. We need some discipline; we need some priorities. The amount of money that \$46 million is of the budget is 0.3 percent. It is not going to make or break a balanced budget, yet we have all of the societal costs that we’ve been arguing about, so I just want to point out, although it is a significant sum of money, to depend on this for future generations at the expense of the societal adverse effects, I cannot support this measure. Thank you.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I just want to reiterate what I had stated earlier. I share the concerns brought forward on enforcement. I just wish this debate happened two weeks ago, when I asked for this debate to occur, before we started funding bills. I had a conversation with the senator from Waimānalo, who asked me to hold off because

she wanted to leverage this bill so that she could get the House to make some movement. We acquiesced and we allowed for several days. This bill wasn’t heard for another week and a half later. Her exact words were, ‘Go ahead: Give WAM/FIN approval; the bill will probably pass and we can fund bills.’ Well, that’s not exactly what happened.

“I think we funded a lot of necessary and needed programs: homelessness, education, higher ed, and the list goes on. There’s 15 bills, and if anybody wants to read it, somehow *Civil Beat* got it, so I don’t think it’s that hard to find. And we’ve had this conversation many times in the caucus that there are two sides to this coin. I wish there was enforcement language; unfortunately, there were unsuccessful efforts to try to leverage the House. In the meantime, we funded bills. And we can’t really go back, open up all those bills, and figure out, okay, how can we adjust all these different bills so that we can make \$46 million disappear. It’s not that easy. The only way we can do it is to actually recommit whole bills with dollar amounts because we’re on the second-to-the-last day of session. So there are going to be consequences.

“I shared with the caucus earlier that, already, by 2021, the estimated in-the-red is \$58.7 million. So \$46 million is \$46 million, but we’re going to be in the red in year 2021. We’re going to have to start to really, really cut programs. As was mentioned, I asked the senator who brought up, ‘Well, we need to prioritize.’ I don’t disagree, but I want to hear from any committee chair who says, ‘You can take my bill off the list. It’s not important. It doesn’t help Hawai’i. You can take my bill off the list.’ I haven’t heard that. If we’re serious about funding these needed programs, then we should have had this vote earlier so that we could’ve prioritized and maybe give a little bit less so that the program could still go forward. But that’s not the case and that’s not possible. I wish it were. I feel frustrated that we’re in this position; I wish that the senator who had made that commitment to hear this bill earlier followed through so that we could have funded things differently and actually fed every single committee chair equally and fair so that we could still move Hawai’i forward. Thank you.”

The Chair then called for a Roll Call vote.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 35 (S.B. No. 767, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Baker moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 35 be adopted and S.B. No. 767, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keohokalole.

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of S.B. 767, C.D.1, relating to contractors. Handymen provide a valuable service by providing maintenance services, doing minor jobs, and other projects that are too small for a licensed contractor to take on. This is especially true in rural areas and on the neighbor islands where there is a smaller pool of contractors available.

"Handyman exemption laws in Hawai'i have not been addressed since 1992. Since that time, there has been a tremendous increase in the cost of housing materials, needed for repair and maintenance projects. Our state has also seen a shortage in licensed contractors, who are required to complete any construction work, including materials and project value, that exceeds the amount of \$1,000 or that requires a permit.

"This measure provides a modest increase to the threshold under the contractor's licensing law's handyman exemption from \$1,000 to \$1,500 and makes it applicable to the cost of labor and materials. This honors the value of our handymen's service in completing minor jobs that are too small for a licensed contractor to take on, especially in rural areas where the pool of availability of licensed contractors is small. Please join me in supporting S.B. 767, C.D. 1. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 35 was adopted and S.B. No. 767, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTRACTORS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 290, C.D. 1, Relating to the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. The purpose of this measure is to authorize qualifying patients and qualifying out-of-state patients to transport medical cannabis between islands for their personal medical use. Qualifying patients who travel interisland still need access to their medicine. Making them buy more medical cannabis at each stop is a burden not placed on residents of other states that do not have Hawaii's geographical peculiarities.

"DOT opposes this measure because it violates federal law. Medical cannabis as a concept violates federal law, as cannabis is a Schedule I drug. Hawai'i is out in front of the federal government on its medical cannabis program, a situation with which we are all well-aware.

"Hawai'i policymakers have made the decision to allow qualifying patients to use cannabis as a medicine. This measure will allow qualifying patients to take their medicine with them when travelling within the state, as they could with any other medicine. Please join me in supporting H.B. 290, C.D. 1, Relating to the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. Mahalo."

"Mr. President I rise in support of S.B. 770, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, Relating to Real Estate Licenses. This measure requires a high school education or its equivalent as a condition for new applicants to obtain a license as a real estate broker or real estate salesperson. Many states currently require a high school education or its equivalent as a condition of licensure for real estate licensees.

"According to testimony from the Real Estate Commission, requiring a high school diploma or its equivalent as a condition for obtaining a license ensures an educated licensee population, which protects consumers in their real estate transactions—one of the most important financial decisions in many people's lives.

"The bill applies only to new applicants who are applying for licensure as a real estate broker or salesperson for the first time on or after the July 1, 2020, effective date and for first license renewal applications commencing in 2020. This is a commonsense measure that will not affect any current licensees. Please join me in support of S.B. 770, C.D. 1. Mahalo."

"Mr. President I rise to speak in support of S.B. 693, C.D. 1, 'Relating to the Statewide Traffic Code'. Existing law regarding pedestrian-control signals was last substantively amended in 1981, and does not reflect the crosswalk countdown timers. This bill will improve the existing laws that need updating in order to provide consistency with the various types of pedestrian-control signals used throughout the state.

"The bill clarifies that 'If the pedestrian-control signal is equipped with a countdown timer, no pedestrian shall start to cross the roadway in the direction of such signal once the countdown begins, but any pedestrian who has partially completed the pedestrian's crossing when the countdown begins shall complete the crossing to a sidewalk or safety island before the countdown timer ends.'

"The Department of Transportation prepared the Statewide Pedestrian Master Plan for the state's highway system in 2013. And the City and County is currently developing an O'ahu Pedestrian Plan, set to be completed this year, that will define the steps needed to make Honolulu a more walkable, livable, and healthy city. Senate Bill 693 is just one of many ways the Legislature can contribute to making Hawai'i streets more pedestrian friendly. For this reason, Mr. President and members, I urge you to vote to pass S.B. 693, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1."

"Mr. President, I rise in support of S.B. 991, C.D. 1, relating to telecommunications. This measure would, in part, amend the existing regulatory framework and alleviate burdens from rules and regulations that limit certain providers' ability to fully compete in a competitive, growing market.

"As the telecommunications industry has become more competitive over the past several decades, regulation of businesses offering telecommunications services in Hawai'i has been significantly reduced through legislative action and Public Utilities Commission orders. The Legislature believes it is in the public's interest to enable robust competition in the market and support a level playing field for all competitors. While doing so, we must also ensure high quality customer service from telecommunications service providers and non-discriminatory access to infrastructure in less-competitive rural markets and on the neighbor islands.

"This bill will reduce the regulatory burden on providers of basic local exchange service, putting them on a more equal footing with providers of voice-over-internet-protocol, which are not subject to the same rules as basic local exchange service. Please join me in supporting S.B. 991. Mahalo."

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I support the eventual transfer of the authority over Kaka'ako Community Development District from the state Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) to the City. However, given the purpose of HCDA, as established by this body to preserve light industrial use, build affordable housing for residents, and to create a quality community with parks and open space in the 600-acre last open shoreline in urban Honolulu, I must raise my concern about this measure's timeline. The job of HCDA in Kaka'ako is still unfinished. HCDA has yet to build a school, a first responder station and other services. It's still developing the public open spaces; storm drain, street, and sewer system upgrades; as well as improving the central district of light industrial and small businesses. I support financing the HCDA staff with general funds rather than the diminishing revolving funds; however, this measure makes the method of funding contingent upon a very accelerated transition timeline. This measure requires a comprehensive plan by year-end and it forces a three-year transition timeline. Because of these deadlines, which appear not to be realistic for sound planning and transition, I vote 'with reservations.' Thank you."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Typically, HCDA staff has been funded by revolving fund, and revenues from those specific development areas funded those positions. Now, HCDA is asking that the general fund fund all 32 positions. If that's the case, HCDA needs to help all of Hawai'i because all of Hawai'i is paying for HCDA. If revenues are being generated from one specific area, paying for its staff that's focused on one specific area, then that's understandable, but now all of Hawai'i is paying for HCDA and that agency shouldn't have one area that they're just going to focus on. Kaka'ako doesn't have exclusive ownership over 30 staff. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President I rise in strong support of H.B. 452, relating to preferential electricity rates for protected agriculture. This measure promotes the production of fruits and vegetables for local consumption by authorizing the Public Utility Commission to establish preferential electricity rates for agricultural activities that use protected agriculture to produce fruits or vegetables locally for distribution. When properly managed, protected agriculture allows for more efficient use of water and fertilizer while reducing the need for pesticides and herbicides.

"Protected agriculture aligns with the federal Food and Drug Administration's Food Safety Modernization Act by producing fruits and vegetables in a safe environment. Without a preferential rate for electricity, protected agriculture cannot economically produce the quantities of fruits and vegetables needed to advance Hawaii's sustainability initiatives.

"This measure will require that the protected agriculture include reasonable efforts to incorporate cost-effective renewable energy sources and energy efficiency. It also requires the Public Utilities Commission to ensure that any subsidization being paid by other customers is limited and reasonable, and to periodically review and adjust the rates, if necessary.

“This bill strikes a balance between protecting ratepayers and encouraging local food production. I urge my colleagues to vote in support for H.B. 452. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 153 was adopted and H.B. No. 452, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PREFERENTIAL ELECTRICITY RATES FOR PROTECTED AGRICULTURE,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 be adopted and S.B. No. 409, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Firstly, let me say my thanks to our Transportation chair, who worked on this bill and made it as best she could. I really appreciate it.

“This bill is only important if you care about climate change. This is not about my car or whether I own an electric vehicle or not; I’m happy to pay my way. I often vote for things that are not in my financial best interest because I care about our society. This is about what signals do we send and what do we incentivize and disincentivize. Just this same year, we’re passing an incentive for installing electric vehicle charging stations, so, apparently, this legislature supports electric vehicle development. But this bill is a disincentive to buying electric vehicles. In my opinion, it’s the worst bill on our ordinary calendar today. Let me explain two of the reasons why.

“Road damage is only caused by the heaviest vehicle to travel down a road—it’s caused by trucks and buses. Electric vehicles are lighter than SUVs, pickup trucks, or any truck or bus. In fact, my staff and I have done some extensive research on the exact total of all the cumulative road damage done by all privately owned electric vehicles in our state. Let me see if I can find that figure here ... oh, here it is [*holds up sign*]: It’s zero. We’re addressing a problem that doesn’t exist, and we’re penalizing the wrong people.

“You’re tired of me talking about the 10 or 12 years that both the United Nations and our government have said we have to reverse climate change. Forgive me for pounding that drum, but every time a report comes out, the timeline is actually shorter, and we here in our state legislature completely wasted the first year on that list. We didn’t do anything of significance to address climate change, and, yes, it is our kuleana to do our share, just like everyone else in the world. This is a small bill, you might say, but it moves in the wrong direction. It’s a small bill; it’s not enough money to make any difference to the Department of Transportation, but we’re going to disincentivize purchasing emission-free vehicles. This bill sends the strong signal that our heads are firmly and willingly planted in the sand, and we are in denial about climate change.

“This is a small bill, once again, unless you care about climate change, and then it’s important because, as I’ve explained, Hawai‘i has a very unique role to play in the adoption of electric vehicles. Please, if you care about this issue, skip the reservations: Vote ‘no’ and tell the world that Hawai‘i won’t move backward on climate change. Thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“As you know, electric and alternative fuel vehicles are the wave of the future as Hawai‘i moves toward its mandate to be free of fossil fuels by 2045. Electric vehicle sales are on the rise. Last year, 2,296 EVs were sold, up from 1,934 vehicles from the year before. Of the more than 1 million vehicle registrations in Hawai‘i, 7,954 of them are electric vehicles. Hawai‘i is one of the most EV-receptive states in the union. We are the sixth highest state in terms of EV ownership.

“EVs use the same roads as motorists who drive traditional gasoline-powered vehicles, which are subject to registration fees and the gasoline tax. In recent months, due to more fuel-efficient vehicles and the gradual rise of EV ownership, Hawai‘i’s portion of gasoline tax revenues has started to slip. In March 2019, the State of Hawai‘i collected \$11.9 million in gasoline taxes. That was lower than the \$12.99 million collected in February 2019, which was lower than the \$13.12 million collected in January, according to monthly reports from the State Department of Taxation. Gasoline taxes are an important source of revenue for state highways. While EVs play an important role in reducing our carbon footprint in Hawai‘i, the lost revenue needs to be made up. I must add, members, the highways portion of this fund also has been the catalyst for improving all those damages done by our terrible weather.

“Mr. President, it is time that we make a start in addressing the reduced revenue from the gasoline tax. S.B. 409, C.D. 1 is a good place to start. The \$50 surcharge on the annual registration fee is a small price to pay for the privilege of owning an electric or alternative fuel vehicle in the State of Hawai‘i. As with the gasoline taxes, the amount collected from this annual fee will go back into the highway fund for maintenance of our highways. This is a forward-looking bill as Hawai‘i heads into an environmentally friendly and more fuel-efficient future while still having a revenue source from motorists who will pay their fair share for using Hawai‘i’s highways. For this reason, Mr. President and members, I ask for your support in voting in favor of S.B. 409, Conference Draft 1. Mahalo.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I ask that the words of the senator from Puna be inserted into the Journal as my own.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

“I also wanted to add that if I multiply \$50 times 7,954 EV vehicles, it only comes up to \$397,000, and we are giving \$75,000 tax credits already, and, to me, that amount of \$397,000—I don’t know if that even will cover filling up five potholes. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 was adopted and S.B. No. 409, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 174 (S.B. No. 663, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 174 be adopted and S.B. No. 663, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Inouye rose to request that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. The intention of this measure is to increase public safety. In 2018, 117 people were killed statewide in a number of traffic accidents, 43 of them pedestrians. Photo red light systems are used throughout the world and in the United States. They have proven to be reliable, efficient and effective in identifying and deterring those who run red lights.

"Speeding and the failure to yield the right of way contribute to at least 15 percent of Hawai'i's accident rates behind 'driving under the influence (DUI)'. Speeding and failure to yield the right of way may also include running red lights.

"Testimony from the Department of Transportation indicate the following: Between 2011–2016, there has been 1,616 intersection crashes resulting from red light and other traffic signal violations. These crashes resulted in deaths, numerous injuries and property damage. During calendar years 2011–2018, a total of 13 deaths occurred from a driver disregarding a red light signal. During calendar years 2014–2018, police have issued 17,021 red light violations to motorists who disregarded the traffic signal. Because police have other priorities for calls for services, it is not possible for them to enforce the laws at every intersection. A red light camera system is an attractive alternative to better enforcement of our traffic laws.

"This measure will apply to motorists who 'run red lights' that are in a steady red cycle state before the vehicle enters an intersection. Vehicles that have gone through an intersection when the light is yellow but turns red while still in the intersection should not be subjected to action.

"There has been at least a 15 percent reduction in red-light running incidents reported by the Federal Highway Administration, with some localities reporting up to a 44 percent reduction.

"One of the keys to the program's success will be for acceptance by all stakeholders. This includes government officials, local law enforcement and, most importantly, the public. The counties are going to have to make an effort to differentiate this photo enforcement program from the ill-fated 'van cam' speeding program that was repealed in 2002 after public outcry.

"It will be up to the state and/or county to inform the public that this new program will use automated cameras that are affixed to a stationary location near the intersection like a light or utility pole. It is also to be made clear that the program is not a 'revenue generator' for either the government or the hardware vendor. The counties will be the entity to implement the program.

"Support for the measure has come from the Honolulu Police Department, Hawaii Bicycling League, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), Peoples Advocacy for Trails Hawaii, Blue Zones Project, and numerous individuals. There were only three testimonies in opposition to the bill.

"For these reasons I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to increase public safety and save lives."

"So, I know that earlier vote wasn't easy, but because of those votes, these very needed programs are going to get funded. Many people cite the words of Governor Ariyoshi, saying that we have to make hard decisions, but because of your hard vote, all of these programs are now going to get funded, and you're going to really affect the lives of many, many people throughout the state, so thank you."

"Senate President and colleagues, I rise in support of H.B. 1552, C.D. 1. This bill was a direct result of the H.C.R. 85 Task Force that had met over a course of almost two years. The intent of this measure is to support best practices for an effective correctional system. It establishes and appropriates funds for the Hawaii Correctional System Oversight Commission within the Office of the Attorney General and abolishes the Reentry Commission and Corrections Population Management Commission and transfers all right, powers, functions, and duties of these two commissions to the new Hawaii Correctional System Oversight Commission; requires intake service centers to complete pretrial risk assessments and bail reports and provide them to the court within five working days of an offender's admission to a community correctional center and to include information on the offender's financial circumstances, executed pretrial risk assessment, and detailed information about the risk assessment in the bail report; establishes that a defendant has a right to a hearing concerning pre-trial release or detention at the time of his/her arraignment and a right to counsel at the time of hearing; requires that bail be set at a reasonable amount and under the least restrictive conditions possible based upon all available information and that monetary bail shall be payable twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week; and establishes and appropriates funds for a Criminal Justice Research Institute under the Office of the Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court to monitor the success of changes implemented as a result of the Task Force recommendations, conduct ongoing research on national best practices in the criminal justice policy and procedure, develop outcome measures and recommend further reforms, and create a centralized statewide criminal pretrial justice data reporting and collection system; authorizes any court to authorize the use electronic monitoring and surveillance to require confinement to a defendant's residence and additional requirements in this bill. This bill also provides for over \$1.7 million to implement the provisions contained in the bill. So colleagues I ask for your support in passing this important criminal justice reform bill that has been long time coming. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise in support of H.B. 654, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, which provides funds to the University of Hawai'i cancer center to determine the cause of the high incidence of liver and bile duct cancer in Hawai'i.

"Hawai'i is among the states with the highest rates of liver cancer and bile duct cancer in recent years, and rates have increased in recent years while rates of other types of cancer are falling. While some cases of liver cancer in Hawai'i are related to hepatitis, a known cause of this disease, the majority are not, and appear to be related to abnormal accumulation of fat in the liver due to other factors, potentially infectious organisms such as liver flukes, or environmental toxins.

"This appropriation will fund a study at the University of Hawai'i Cancer Center to determine the etiologies of the high incidence of liver and bile duct cancer in the State, which will inform future public health interventions to reduce liver and bile duct cancers. Please join me in support of H.B. 654, S.D. 1, C.D. 1. Mahalo."

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I agree with our Ways and Means chair that all of these bills are important and will help our people. I think the most important bill on this list, however, is House Bill 654, Relating to Health. As was brought up by our Maui senator, it is for liver and bile duct cancer research, and statistics show that Hawai'i has the highest mortality rate and that this may be linked to watercress. We're not sure what it's linked to, and I think it's very important that we find out because we certainly don't want anyone else suffering from this type of cancer, and if there's any way that we can prevent that, I think this is the start of that. So, of all the bills, I think this is one of the most important bills, so thank you very much."

Senator Inouye also recognized legislative aide Melvin Ah Ching for his help with social media, constituent communication, and photography throughout the legislative session.

Senator Chang thanked members of his staff for their hard work: office manager Adrian Tam; committee clerk Erynn Fernandez; Ian Terayama; interns Daisy Chang, Chloe Huang, Dyson Chee, Ray Sakamoto, and Jacob Heberle; and Dr. Allen Awaya, who had served various legislators for 13 legislative sessions and had recently gotten engaged.

Senator Thielen thanked staff members Jennifer Barra, Eliza Wilcox, and Rudy Gordon, and introduced her lifelong inspiration and mentor—her mother, State Representative Cynthia Thielen.

Senator Kidani introduced and thanked her staff: Danicia Honda, the reigning Miss Chinese Jaycees, Marie Richardson, Jade Snow, session staff Kay Watanabe and Trent Sewell, and committee clerk Scott Fuji, who had recently gotten engaged. Senator Kidani also thanked Napela Shim, committee clerk for State Representative Justin H. Woodson, Chair of the Committee on Lower & Higher Education, and noted that it was her last legislative session as she would be returning to Wisconsin.

Senator Riviere expressed appreciation for his hardworking and loyal staff: office manager Margarete Olson, legislative assistant Mike Dezelle, and session staffer Justin Salisbury.

The Chair acknowledged and thanked Ross Tsukenjo, Rayanne Fujimoto, and other members of his office staff. On behalf of the members of the Senate, the Chair also recognized the hard work of all of the session staff, full-time staff, and support staff, who have a great passion to create a better Hawai'i and work very long hours for modest pay, and expressed appreciation for their efforts.

The Chair then remarked:

"Before proceeding, I was remiss on Tuesday; it marked the retirement of Jon Shimabuku. Jon worked for the state for 30 years; before working at the Senate he was at the Department of Public Safety and also at Taxation. Jon led the Senate IT office through a period of rapid growth in both staffing and responsibility. Under Jon's leadership, the Legislature won the NCSL Online Democracy Award in 2012, created the popular LiveStatus program that transformed the way many of the staff track legislation, and was known for his exceptional ability to train non-technical staff on IT software and hardware, unflappable patience, and level head.

"On a personal note—and I've watched Jon participate in Sergeant-at-Arms Ben Villaflor's after-work boxing classes—his coworkers said he inspired some of them to travel more and to go on hikes. When I told people that he served 30 years, they all said he didn't look old enough to have been here that long, and so they also noted he doesn't look a day older than he did on the first day he started. And he achieved his goal of retiring on time by his tenacity of bringing home-lunch every single day, eating tuna sandwiches or stinking up the office with his salmon patties. But he has been an exemplary employee. I just feel badly that I did not get him onto the floor on Tuesday and, as any good retiree, he's not here today—he's enjoying his retirement, but I certainly wanted to be sure we had his name entered into the Journal and acknowledged his service."

Senator Chang then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nominations to the Board of Directors of the Hawai'i Public Housing Authority of the following:

Senator Chang rose to speak in support of the nominees as follows:

“The Housing committee, having had the opportunity to meet with the nominees transmitted in G.M. 743 through 750, found them to be extremely capable, qualified, and open-minded, and we’re relying on these members to help address the housing shortage that we have here in Hawai‘i, so I urge our colleagues to vote to confirm these nominees. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Chang introduced Milo Spindt, newly confirmed member of the Board of Directors of the Hawai‘i Public Housing Authority, who was seated in the gallery.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2243 (Gov. Msg. No. 664):

At this time, the Chair announced:

“The Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism made no recommendation on Governor’s Message No. 664. Therefore, the Chair will first entertain a motion to file Standing Committee Report No. 2243, then we will move on to the final vote on this matter.”

Senator Keohokalole moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2243 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Taniguchi and carried.

The Chair then made the following observation:

“Members, pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), the final question on nominations made by the Governor must be stated in the affirmative. Therefore, those casting ‘Aye’ votes will be voting to advise and consent, and those casting ‘No’ votes will be voting to reject the nomination. The Chair will now entertain a motion to advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. McCartney.”

Senator Keohokalole moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of MIKE MCCARTNEY as Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 664, seconded by Senator Taniguchi.

Senator Wakai rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, Hawai‘i’s economy stands at a precipice. After years of prosperity, it saw record-high visitor counts, and that was paired with record-low unemployment. We are now staring at the inevitable softening of economic growth. Our population is declining; we can no longer rely on federal funding to bolster our state coffers. It’s more important than ever that we carefully and strategically position our state, economy, and workforce, not only to withstand these near-term headwinds, but to take

advantage of the potential opportunities that are right in front of us.

“The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism is charged with shepherding the state’s economic development engines through good times and bad. Its director is one of the most important positions in our state government. Over the last four months, I’ve sought to engage Mr. McCartney in relevant issues and allow him to show me what he can do, but he has failed to adequately demonstrate an ability to lead. In my questionnaire, I asked for his vision for the department and specific goals he wanted to achieve over the next four years. What I got was a response that was surprisingly meaningless. He cited general goals but absolutely no details. At his hearing on Monday, he delivered this binder to the EET members. His strategic plan really comes down to six slides in this binder. It talks about getting new hires up to speed, connecting legislative priorities to the DBEDT budget, and drafting a plan for economic growth. If Mr. McCartney talked to his own research division, he would have found this document; it was published in December of 2018. It’s called ‘Hawaii’s Targeted & Emerging Industries.’ It outlines for us the great opportunities for growth: film, healthcare, alternative energy. It also identifies industries that are on the decline, such as pharmacies, radio, call centers, and biotech. This document should have at least been the starting point for Mr. McCartney to come up with a clear plan as to where the state is going. Instead, he’s trying to start from zero and reinventing the wheel. We need somebody who’s going to really drive our economy, not on-the-job training.

“I don’t want to revisit the issues brought up at Monday’s confirmation hearing, but it was evident that Mr. McCartney has difficulty communicating and gets involved in issues either too late or never at all. Those who submitted testimony that were in support of Mr. McCartney really talked about him being a collaborator, and over the past four months, I’ve found him to be the complete opposite.

“Mr. McCartney is a very good man. I understand many of you have a personal relationship with him. On Monday, in this very chamber, Governor Ariyoshi shared with all of us the importance of doing good for the people, not for your friends. Those running the state cannot be just nice and kind; they have to be competent; they have to be responsible. If Mr. McCartney is confirmed this morning, Mr. McCartney: I promise you I will work with you, and I will keep that promise. But Mr. McCartney’s mantra is, ‘To go fast, you have to go slow.’ That is **not** how businesses function. Executives have to define goals, chase outcomes, and measure progress on a daily basis. I urge you to vote ‘no’ with me on Mr. McCartney’s confirmation. The public deserves much better.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I can’t help but note that there was no opposing testimony to the nomination and a hundred percent supportive testimony. Mr. McCartney came to Puna to spend the day with me during our crisis last year—not once, but twice—and I observed in him a good, caring person with a good heart and a lot of aloha. In viewing the confirmation hearing, I watched a good man and a friend treated with shocking disrespect. Only once before have I seen such mistreatment of a nominee in our house. No one’s perfect; he’s been criticized for a lack of communication. Communication is a two-way street: If you treat someone with antagonism instead of aloha, it’s hard to expect open communication. I’m more influenced by the testimony provided in public, which can be seen and responded to, and for me that must outweigh whispers, hidden agendas, and personal vendettas. I’ll be voting along with a hundred percent of the testimony we received in support of Mike McCartney. Thank you.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, on Monday of this week, we honored former Governor George Ariyoshi with the Aloha Order of Merit. In his acceptance remarks, the governor recalled a confirmation vote in which he was asked by colleagues to vote down a nominee. He said that, putting aside all politics, he asked a simple question: Is this person worthy of confirmation? I ask the same question today. Is Mike McCartney worthy of confirmation? And as Governor Ariyoshi voted ‘yes’ on the Senate floor many, many years ago, I, too, say ‘yes’ today.

“Mike served with distinction for 10 years as a member of this very body. He has devoted himself to public service. I did not know him personally at the time when he was in the Senate; I was on the city council, but I got to know him when, as Tourism chair, we confirmed his nomination to the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority board in 2004. He served as board chair during a time when the Legislature proposed many major changes to HTA. I worked with him, and he led the HTA board in effectuating those changes, as difficult as it was. Then, in 2009, he was selected by the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority board to serve as president and CEO. He has been the state’s director of Human Resources Development and, most recently, Governor Ige’s chief of staff. Mike also has worked in the private sector as CEO of Hawaii Public Television, director of Hawaii State Teachers Association, and president and cofounder of Hawaii Stars.

“Whether you agree or disagree with his style of leadership, I think it’s undeniable that we’ve appreciated not only his stellar service to the people of Hawai‘i but the integrity and aloha with which he fulfilled his demanding mandates. We all know here in this body that any job in the public eye is difficult: There are competing demands for resources, for money or staff; there are pressures from many constituencies who are often at odds over the direction of public policy; there are many sleepless nights over tough decisions that must be made. Mike McCartney has not only endured these demands but demonstrated an inclusive leadership style in every capacity, always sensitive to Hawai‘i’s culture, bringing people together, and, most importantly, being respectful of everyone’s right to disagree and have a different perspective. He is honest; he is caring, with goals of protecting our state’s fragile environment, our history, and, most important, our most precious resource: our people. He is fully cognizant of his department’s many missions and the differences over how the agency’s goals can be met, which is what he tried to spell out in a binder that he was asked for. And I remind this body, I don’t recall any other director we’ve asked for this kind of binder or goals.

“I have every confidence in his ability to resolve these challenges with integrity, respectfulness, and aloha that has marked his lifelong career in public service and to set a firm course for the future of our state. Approximately 138 testimonies were submitted in support; I could find none that opposed. Is he worthy? Absolutely, and I urge my colleagues to support his nomination for DBEDT director. Mahalo.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

“In committee, when I was leaving the Capitol that day, I wasn’t going to go to the meeting because I had a previous engagement for my doctor’s appointment that I postponed, and I came back up. I didn’t hear all the testimonies; I didn’t really sit down and listen to everything that was going on but, because, at that time, Mike never came to my office, we never got to talk. I only know him briefly a long time ago when I was previously a Democrat. He came to my office and dropped off a binder, and due to my staff, they put it next to some certificates that I have for the community of ‘Ewa Beach (the kids from Campbell), so

I didn’t see it, so I went on the phone again and I made some calls and I said, ‘You know, this guy never came to see me,’ so that was my response, was that I voted ‘no.’

“Previously, after that, I found that he came. Just so happened, I was talking to Donna about bill ... I no need talk about that bill, but, anyway, we were having deep conversation and emotion and what not and, in conversation, I just said, you know, I voted ‘no’ because I never met the guy. So, as I was leaving her office, who was bending down inside the ice box grabbing a bottle of water? Was Mike. So, I was leaving and then he looked at me, I looked at him, and then I said, ‘You have time? You can talk to me?’ I know he came to see Donna; he didn’t come to see me, but I asked him, ‘Do you have time?’ He said, ‘Sure, sure. I’ll come to your office.’ So he did, and we had a conversation, you know, we kinda, you know, ho‘omalimali little bit, but bottom line is that I got a clue that, yeah, he’s probably going to struggle like any one of us. I struggled when I got here, in doing my job, but all of you guys made it easy for me, each and every one of you. And I feel that, if he’s going to struggle, yeah, I know this is a big position; it does drive our economic force, but if we don’t ... I mean, our lives are surrounded by chances, guys. If nobody ever gave us a chance, none of us would be here today. I had chances; I had numerous chances, so I am here today.

“I’m supporting him with reservations, yes, because I want to see and I want to work closely with him. I want the dialogue to be open, for all of our senators to work closely with him, and that’s what I stressed to him. That’s what I brought up to him about my reason why I voted ‘no,’ because I felt that he wasn’t open to discussing anything to do with his plan for his position. So, like I said, I had talked to him, and he left. I did not make a decision. I didn’t tell him, ‘Hey, way to go, boy,’ whatever—I didn’t say that with him—high five, nothing. We didn’t do none of that, and my staff was there. And when he left, he said, ‘You know, whether you support me or not, we’ll work closely together,’ and I admire that. So I went home; I went to Campbell High School’s event and it was a great event. Listening to people talk about the testimony about this man—I don’t have a personal relationship with him, but I want to give him a chance, and that’s the reason why I’m voting ‘with reservations.’ Thank you.”

The Chair reiterated the voting procedures and called for a Roll Call vote.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 15; Ayes with Reservations (Fevella, Moriwaki). Noes, 10 (Baker, Chang, Dela Cruz, Harimoto, Kanuha, Keith-Agaran, Kidani, Nishihara, Shimabukuro, Wakai).

Senator Keohokalole introduced Director Mike McCartney, who was accompanied in the gallery by his wife, Candace, and his sons, Bricen and Jaren. Also acknowledged was his daughter, Lauren, who was not in attendance.

The Chair then remarked:

“This is the third time this session I find myself in this place, with the Senate divided over a nominee from the governor. At the beginning of the session, I said directly to the governor from this rostrum that I’m committed to working with him in spite of the trash that was being out in the media about me holding political ill will and trying to mess him up. I don’t know what stronger statement I can give to you, Governor, than my support of these three nominees, but I also tell you in a clear voice from this rostrum that my committee chairs want to see us go forward and go forward together, and so I expect to work with you and your department heads to ensure that the programs that are being outlined by Chair Wakai, by Chair Nishihara and Chair

Shimabukuro come to fruition. I know that Hawaiian Affairs has already held their informational briefing and laid out their program. I know Senator Nishihara is diligently working on his, and Senator Wakai clearly has a vision of where he believes we need to go and, although I am voting in support of Senator McCartney, I want you to know that I am in full support of the agenda as it's been laid out by Senator Wakai, and he can count on my full support to work with you to try and carry it out."

At 11:55 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

H.B. No. 1453, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 2:

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 1453, C.D. 2, Relating to Emergency Medical Services. Currently, 911 emergency medical patients are only transported to facilities designated as hospitals; however, not all patients who receive need emergency treatment need to subsequently be transported to the hospital.

"Emergency medical services (EMS) currently only charge fees when they transport a patient to an emergency room. This incentivizes inappropriate use of transport assets and emergency departments. Many patients that utilize emergency medical services do not require hospitalization, and allowing emergency medical services to work with patients and community partners to develop and employ more customized care plans will provide

more appropriate patient care while reducing the burden on emergency medical services and hospital resources.

"With the cost of healthcare increasing, this measure authorizes the Department of Health to establish reasonable fees for transportation to medical facilities and for provision of emergency medical services that do not include transport and authorizes transportation by ambulance to medical facilities other than hospital emergency departments.

"Also, this measure requires private insurers to provide coverage for statewide community paramedicine services rendered by emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and paramedics. The Community Paramedicine program is a new model that involves using EMTs and Paramedics to provide care to underserved populations.

"Please join me in support of H.B. 1453, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 2 and help provide coverage for emergency medical services and creation of efficient programs that are designed to help our most fiscally vulnerable community members. Mahalo."

H.B. No. 888, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2:

Senator Baker moved that H.B. No. 888, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 888, C.D. 2, Making Appropriations to the Maui Health System. The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to the Maui Health System for fiscal biennium 2019-2020, to continue assisting the organization's operations as it moves toward self-sufficiency.

"The Maui Health System manages several key health care institutions in the County of Maui that are critical to the health and well-being of county residents. These key health care institutions include Maui Memorial Medical Center, Kula Hospital, and Lanai Community Hospital. The Maui Health System took over these facilities from the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC), and Maui Memorial Medical Center is currently the only hospital on the neighbor islands that provides cardiac surgery, interventional cardiology, interventional neurosurgery, and neurosurgery.

"In 2019, the Maui Health System will continue on its path toward self-sufficiency by focusing its efforts to resolve union negotiations and identify appropriate staffing levels by managing productivity. Maui Health System also plans to improve revenues by decreasing the outmigration of services from Maui and recruiting physicians specializing in areas

including but not limited to neurosurgery, trauma, oncology surgery, cardiology, nephrology, urology, and primary care. Additionally, for each physician recruited, the Maui Health System can provide their services for the communities of Maui and Lānaʻi on island and generate additional revenue, thus reducing the need for subsidies.

“Please join me in supporting H.B. 888, C.D. 2 to assist the Maui Health System’s operations as it moves toward self-sufficiency and continues to provide invaluable life-saving hospital services in Maui County. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 888, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO THE MAUI HEALTH SYSTEM,” having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 1405, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Baker requested that remarks in support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Baker’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President I rise in strong support of S.B. 1405, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 2, Relating to Electronic Smoking Products. This bill makes it clear that DOE employees are required to confiscate electronic cigarettes from students under 21 year and dispose of forfeited electronic cigarettes in a manner provided for under law. It increases administrative fines for persons under 21 in possession of electronic cigarettes, and creates a Safe Harbor Program whereby students can voluntarily surrender their electronic cigarettes without risking a fine.

“New findings from the 2018 National Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS) demonstrated a dramatic increase in youth use of ESDs. From 2017 to 2018, there was a 78 percent increase in current e-cigarette use among high school students and a 48 percent increase among middle school students. In a rare advisory in December 2018, the U.S. Surgeon General, Dr. Jerome Adams, officially declared ‘e-cigarette use among youth an epidemic in the United States’. Likewise, Dr. Scott Gottlieb, Commissioner of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, in his press statements described his shock at the alarming surge in youth uptake of ESD and that youth vaping is an epidemic. Hawaiʻi rates of youth ESD use is higher, with 25 percent of high school students reporting being regular users, and 42 percent had tried them, and rates for neighbor island youth are consistently higher than rates for the entire state.

“Please join me in supporting S.B. 1405, which aims to curb student use of electronic cigarettes. However, I want to emphasize that this is only one part of the fight against the youth vaping epidemic. We should also be taxing e-cigarettes as we do tobacco, and we should ban the sale of flavored e-liquids that appeal to youth. These measures were up for passage this year. Unfortunately, those measures did not pass the House of Representatives. Hopefully in future legislative session, the House will join the Senate in holding vendors and manufacturers to account for their role in the dangerous youth vaping epidemic. Mahalo.”

Senator Keohokalole invited the members of the Hawaiian Caucus to take a photo in front of the Hawaiian flag immediately following the session’s adjournment.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I hate to inject a somber note into today’s proceedings, but, just this last Saturday, for the first time, I got to take my daughter to the Children’s Discovery Center in Kaka’ako. I’m sure you all are familiar with it. For someone from the Big Island, it was an eye-opener because we don’t have anything of the sort there. It’s a precious resource, and I think most of you know that they are facing tremendous challenges from an aggressive homeless encampment and very serious security

concerns that might very well force them to close. I think that would be a heartbreaking situation if that happened. Joni Mitchell said, 'You don't know what you've got till it's gone,' and I think this is an example of it. I don't have the answer to what they need, but it's a combination of security, patrolling, and other kinds of support that they don't have right now. There's a turf battle between the sheriffs and the Honolulu Police Department of whose job it is to support this place. There are other issues facing them. I ask you folks, don't let the Children's Discovery Center close. Let's find a way to support them and keep it open. It's a precious resource; it's important for our keiki, and those of you who take it for granted: You don't know how wonderful it is and what you've got. Please find a way to save the Children's Discovery Center. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, as you know, my mom passed away during our conference time, and I just want to thank all of you for all of your kind words of comfort and all of your support for my mom. Thank you."

Senator Kahele rose to inform the members that the number-one ranked University of Hawai'i men's volleyball team would be competing in the 2019 NCAA Men's Collegiate Championship semifinal game later that afternoon, and would undoubtedly compete in the final championship game that weekend, and wished the team good luck.

Senator Moriwaki requested to have the remarks of the senator from Puna entered into the Journal as her own, and also reminded the senators that she would be working with the senator from Puna to ensure that the Children's Discovery Center would continue on and that they would look at ways in which they could work together to support the center.

The Chair then announced:

"Members, at this time we will be taking a short recess to inform the House that the Senate is ready to adjourn Sine Die."

At 12:09 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:12 p.m.

Senate President Kouchi then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"This is normally when I talk about everything we've accomplished, what we hope to see, but today I'm just going to be honest. This has been incredibly difficult, and I've never been a paddler on a canoe team, but you hear so many of our elected leaders use the metaphor. We heard Nainoa Thompson talk the other week about being in the canoe and paddling together, and I now clearly know what it feels like when everybody's paddling in a different direction. But it's because each and every one of you ran to make a difference, to make a better Hawai'i, and you feel an obligation to each and every one of your constituents. I laugh when people tell me, 'It must be easy because you've got all Democrats,' (or now 24 and 1), 'Oh, there must be no debate,' 'Oh, the voices are silent.' The voices here are anything but silent. I'm looking forward to bringing the gavel down, having an opportunity for us to attend educational seminars and conferences, to get back into our districts and take an assessment for next session, but mostly just for some re-creation, recreation, relaxation, and rebuilding my spirit to come back. And, in spite of saying how difficult it's been, I wouldn't trade it for anything else in the world, for the opportunity to work with each and every one of you and the passion you bring to work every day, and I look forward to the

work we're going to put in in the interim and what we're going to be able to accomplish next year."

ADJOURNMENT

Senator Kahele moved that the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2019, adjourn Sine Die, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 290, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the Uniform Controlled Substances Act."

The purpose of this bill is to authorize qualifying patients or qualifying out-of-state patients to transport medical cannabis between islands for their personal medical use. It further requires the Departments of Transportation and Public Safety to adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as necessary to carry out this purpose.

This bill is objectionable because of the large number of residents and visitors who may be misled to their detriment by the purported authorization in this bill of the interisland transportation of medical cannabis for personal medical use.

Interisland transport necessarily entails travel outside the jurisdiction of the State of Hawai'i, as the State only has jurisdiction up to three nautical miles offshore. Because Hawaii's laws cannot completely regulate the interisland transport of cannabis, a state statute purporting to allow interisland transport may give false comfort to some that such transport is protected from federal enforcement.

The existing law, section 329-122(f), Hawaii Revised Statutes, defines "transport" for the purposes of interisland transportation as "between a production center or retail dispensing location and a certified laboratory for the sole purpose of laboratory testing." This bill amends that definition of "transport" to include "by a qualifying patient or qualifying out-of-state patient for the patient's personal use," but retains the existing wording, "with the understanding that state law and its protections do not apply outside of the jurisdictional limits of the State." Consequently, I believe that this bill's amendments to section 329-122(f) may result in confusion by residents and visitors as to what protection this bill provides.

In addition, this bill requires the Department of Transportation and the Department of Public Safety to adopt rules "necessary for the purposes of this subsection." It is unclear whether, and if so, how state rules would work for an area that includes federal and international jurisdiction.

The special interest vehicle law was implemented to accommodate hobbyists who spend significant amounts of money and time modifying their vehicles. The objective was to make it possible for these hobbyists to show off the products of their labors.

Military vehicles are not the product of hobbyists and they were not manufactured for use on our public roads. The State of Hawaii requires vehicles to be in compliance with all applicable Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards as of the date of manufacture. In addition the emissions of these military vehicles do not meet Federal Clean Air Act.

Federal guidance ensures that Hawaii's inventory of registered vehicles meet certain safety standards that help keep our roads safer and environmentally friendly for Hawaii's residents and visitors.

The bill also sets forth specific requirements for both HPA and the Public Safety Department (PSD) to follow when establishing and implementing the medical release program.

This bill is objectionable because it is unnecessary. A medical release program has been in existence since December 2014 under PSD and HPA policies.

Further, the bill requires PSD and HPA to complete certain tasks within short periods of time but does not provide for necessary resources. For example, the bill allows referrals for medical release from inmates and inmate representatives, who may not be medically trained. PSD's Health Care Division would be required to provide a detailed, comprehensive medical assessment within twenty days of receipt of each referral. The bill does not, however, provide funding for additional healthcare or other staff required to perform the comprehensive assessments.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 748, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Property Forfeiture."

The purpose of the bill is to prohibit civil asset forfeiture except when the owner of the asset has been convicted of a felony. The bill also changes the distribution of forfeited property, or sales proceeds from forfeited property, to the state general fund. Presently, forfeited property and/or sales proceeds are distributed to the state and local law enforcement agencies and the forfeiture fund.

At the outset, we note that there are distinctions between criminal and civil forfeiture proceedings. A criminal forfeiture is an *in personam* proceeding against an individual. The individual is charged with crimes that authorize the forfeiture of proceeds, or money or property involved in, or used to facilitate, an offense. The forfeiture becomes a component of the criminal sentence; it is not a separate criminal offense. See Carlisle v. One (1) Boat, 119 Haw. 245, 261 (2008) ("[T]he forfeiture of property is a part, or at least a consequence, of the judgment of conviction.") (citation omitted). A civil forfeiture, by contrast, "is entirely separate from the judgment of conviction," and is not considered punishment for an offense. Id. Rather, the property itself is "primarily considered as the offender[.]" The Court has also explained that such a proceeding "is a proceeding *in rem*," and "not a proceeding against any person." State v. Tuipuapua, 83 Haw. 141, 147 (1996).

This bill is objectionable because it eliminates civil forfeiture as an effective and critically important law enforcement tool. The Hawai'i Supreme Court has explained that the civil forfeiture law serves important non-punitive goals such as "encouragement" of property owners "to take care in managing their property," and that it tends to ensure "they will not permit that property to be used for illegal purposes." State v. Tuipuapua, Id. at 153 (1996) (quoting U.S. v. Usery, 518 U.S. 267, 289 (1996)). See also Carlisle v. \$10,447.00 in U.S. Currency, 104 Haw. 323, 336 (2004) (asset forfeiture statute is "designed to ensure that the economic benefits of committing a crime do not outweigh the consequential criminal penalties; otherwise, without the forfeiture statute, an individual might determine that the money gained from gambling activities outweighs the costs associated with criminal convictions."). While the language of the bill characterizes asset forfeiture as "government-sponsored theft," in reality, civil asset forfeiture is used only when a crime is committed and only for the purposes of stopping ongoing criminal activity and deterring further crimes. Moreover, while the seizure of property and proceeds of a crime can occur at the outset of the related criminal matter, the

sale of any proceeds often does not occur until after a conviction.

In addition to the mischaracterization of the use and purpose of civil asset forfeiture, problems with the bill also include the following:

First, the felony conviction requirement in the bill is problematic because it misunderstands the distinct nature of a civil asset forfeiture proceeding. An asset forfeiture is usually *not* a proceeding against a person (unlike a criminal prosecution) but rather is a civil proceeding *in rem* (i.e., against the property used in the commission of a crime or obtained as proceeds from the commission of a crime). See State v. Tuipuaupua, at 147. Requiring the owner to be convicted of a crime before his or her assets are forfeited misses the point of asset forfeiture, which seeks to prevent *property* from being used in the commission of criminal conduct. Often, the owner of the property is not the defendant in the criminal case. For example, if a landlord knowingly allows his tenant to use a residence to manufacture or sell drugs, the residence may be forfeited, even if the landlord does not commit a criminal offense. To be clear, the law presently applies to property owners who *knowingly* and *blatantly* allow their property to be used in the commission of a crime. To stop ongoing criminal activity, the property of such individuals should continue to be subject to the civil asset forfeiture proceeding.

Second, the bill's requirement of a felony conviction conflicts with other provisions in chapter 712A, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and the Penal Code of the HRS. For example, section 712A-11(6), HRS, states, "[a]n acquittal or dismissal in a criminal proceeding shall not preclude civil proceedings under this chapter." Thus, even if the defendant who engaged in the criminal conduct using property subject to asset forfeiture is not convicted, the property the defendant used is still subject to the civil forfeiture process, which uses a different standard and has different purpose, i.e., the removal of property from use in criminal activity.

Third, the bill's felony conviction requirement disregards the fact that misdemeanor and petty misdemeanor statutes specifically provide for the forfeiture of assets. Again, this is important because the asset forfeiture proceedings target property that is being used in criminal activity, regardless of a criminal conviction. For example, section 712-1230, HRS, provides for the forfeiture of gambling devices, paraphernalia used on fighting animals, or birds, implements, gambling records, and other property related to gambling. Quite often, the related criminal offense is promoting gambling in the second degree, under section 712-1222, HRS, which is a misdemeanor. Another example is section 199-7, HRS, which allows the forfeiture of property used in the commission of offenses described in chapters 6D (Protection of Caves), 6E (Historic Preservation), and 6K (Kaho'olawe Island Reserve), HRS. The offenses in these chapters are misdemeanors and petty misdemeanors, but the forfeiture of assets in these circumstances serves the same purpose: to stop the use of property in criminal activity and to deter future crimes. While not felonies, these are all serious offenses that negatively impact our society, and this bill would inhibit our ability to encourage property owners to manage their property in a legal manner, regardless of whether they are charged with criminal offenses.

Finally, the concerns referenced in the bill are misleading because they identify abuses that may occur in other jurisdictions but do not happen in Hawai'i, where we presently have significant safeguards against abuse. At the outset, our statute requires that there be a substantial connection between the property seized for forfeiture and the related crime. In the case of a seized car, for example, unless there is evidence that a particular car was used to facilitate or assist in a crime, or was obtained using the proceeds of a crime, a substantial connection

is lacking and the car cannot be forfeited. See Carlisle v. \$10,447.00 in US Currency, 104 Haw. 323, 336 (2004). An interested party also may file a claim for relief in a court proceeding asserting that the interested party's property was used in the commission of a crime without that party's knowledge. This is an "innocent owner" defense to the forfeiture of the property. Additionally, section 712A-5.5, HRS, requires that the amount of the asset forfeiture be proportionate to the owner's conduct. Under section 712A-10(4), HRS, an interested party may file a petition for remission or mitigation for relief in an administrative proceeding.

In short, the existing statutes require proof that property was connected to a crime, give an aggrieved owner the right to show lack of knowledge of the criminal acts, and allow for relief from any excessive forfeiture.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 748 without my approval.

This bill is objectionable because it is unnecessary. DLNR already limits the number of commercial-use permits in the Molokini Shoal MLCD, which is the only MLCD that is not accessible by land, to forty.

Furthermore, the bill's language limiting access by commercial-use permit holders to fifty percent of the current number of permit holders at any one time in Molokini Shoal MLCD is counterproductive to DLNR's efforts to address concerns regarding overcrowding. DLNR is in the process of working with the commercial-use permit holders to adjust the operating schedules to coordinate access to better manage the impact of commercial activity on this precious natural resource.

Overall, the unintended consequences of imposing a corporate tax on REITs, are not worth the potential benefits. Hawai'i needs to be a place that is able to attract investment capital in order to create jobs and a sustainable economy.

This bill is objectionable because the State's taxation of transient accommodations through hosting platforms should complement the counties' regulation of transient accommodations. While requiring the hosting platforms to collect and pay the taxes on illegal transient accommodation uses would not legalize these operations, there is concern that it could be viewed as legitimizing these operations. To ensure effective regulation, state statutes and county ordinances must

be coordinated. Both the federal Internal Revenue Service and the State Department of Tax (DOTAX) are obligated to collect taxes on business activity, whether legal or illegal, as affirmed by the U.S. Constitution (16th Amendment) and a hundred years of court decisions. However, the passage of Bill 89 (2018) by the Honolulu City Council - which Mayor Kirk Caldwell recently signed into law and is an example of a county's enactment of specific enforcement provisions governing transient accommodations and hosting platforms - highlights the concern that a state law not impede or adversely affect county efforts to regulate land use. This bill raises significant issues, including for DOTAX, that were not fully contemplated by the Legislature or DOTAX when the bill was debated and then passed.

Importantly, the State is exercising its enforcement powers to ensure tax compliance by transient accommodations operators and managers. For example, on June 28, 2019, the State filed an application to issue a subpoena to Airbnb. The State looks forward to working with companies such as Airbnb to ensure tax compliance.

This bill is objectionable because it legalizes the cultivation of industrial hemp without establishing effective licensing regulations. The bill would make the unauthorized cultivation of hemp, that is, the cultivation of hemp without a license, subject to only an administrative fine. A stronger incentive is necessary to ensure that growers of industrial hemp go through the licensing process, and to ensure the program is adequately enforced. Given the close relationship between industrial hemp

and marijuana, the State should maintain strict control over the cultivation of hemp and a monetary penalty alone is insufficient to ensure proper regulation. Additionally, the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018 requires USDA approval of a state regulatory program. Without sufficient regulation, there is a concern that the program will not receive approval.

A definition is necessary to provide teachers, educators, and students with an understanding of what items are subject to confiscation. Furthermore, confiscating and destroying evidence of a crime may hinder prosecution of those individuals responsible for selling or furnishing electronic cigarettes to persons under the age of 21. It should be noted that the costs to plan for and to create a safe harbor program and store and destroy electronic smoking devices, including the hazardous nicotine waste contained in these devices, are unknown and unfunded.

This bill will decriminalize the possession of three grams or less of marijuana and establish that the possession of that amount is a violation punishable by a monetary fine of \$130.00. It also provides that upon motion by a person convicted for the possession of marijuana under section 712-1249, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for an amount of three grams or less, and arising from a set of facts and circumstances that resulted in no other criminal charge, the court shall grant an expungement order pertaining to the conviction for that offense. Finally, it establishes a marijuana evaluation task force to make recommendations on changing marijuana use penalties and outcomes in the State.

There are numerous concerns, including the normalization of marijuana use, clear conflicts with federal law, the inability to refer violators to effective treatment programs, and the ability for the courts to actually collect fines.

While this bill presents serious policy concerns, it also establishes a task force that is charged with thoughtfully considering recommendations on marijuana policy and preparing a report before the convening of the 2021 Regular Session. In connection with its mandate, I expect the task force will take a close look at the concerns raised in connection with this bill and carefully scrutinize and evaluate the effect of decriminalizing the possession of three grams or less of marijuana.

This bill amends chapter 801G, Hawaii Revised States, to change the governmental entity responsible for administration of the address confidentiality program from the Department of the Attorney General to the Office of the Lieutenant Governor. The legislature determined that the Office of the Lieutenant Governor is the appropriate governmental entity to administer the program.

The address confidentiality program was signed into law on July 5, 2018. This law provides survivors of domestic abuse, sexual offenses, or stalking with a substitute address to be used by state and local government agencies. The program is intended to prevent a victim's assailant or potential assailant from finding the victim through public records. Chapter 801G prohibits the address of a program participant from being made public or published in state or county governmental records.

Although the bill presents implementation and funding issues, we recognize the need to establish this program and to begin offering program services to victims that fear for their safety because their whereabouts are available through government records.

Attorney General Clare E. Connors fully supports this program and has agreed to assist with the transition of this program from the Department of the Attorney General to the office of the lieutenant governor by sharing program processes, training presentations and forms that were developed during the past year.

Although the bill originated as a funding bill to allow for proper staffing and operational costs related to the administration of the program, funding provisions were not included in the final version of the bill. We hope to have a continued conversion to address the funding issue and to ensure successful implementation and sustained operation of the program.

This bill will: (1) increase the annual rolling cap for the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit to \$50,000,000; and (2) require the University of Hawaii, West Oahu (University) and the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) to execute a memorandum of understanding by December 31, 2020, that will commit the parties to enter, by December 31, 2021, a no-cost lease agreement for a thirty-acre parcel of University land that is adjacent to Farrington Highway and Kapolei Golf Course Road. The bill further requires the lease agreement to be for a term of not less than sixty years, and include a provision requiring that

within six years, the title of the parcel will be transferred from the University to the HTDC.

The legislature received testimony from the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and the private sector in strong support of this bill's increase of the income tax credit for the motion picture, digital media, and film production industries. The increased tax credit was viewed as essential to sustaining and continuing the growth of these industries in Hawaii, which in turn strengthens job creation and continued employment for the people of the State of Hawaii.

However, in addition to the tax credit increase, the bill also requires the University to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the HTDC for the eventual transfer of a parcel of University land to the HTDC. This part of the bill creates challenges, which should be addressed before DBEDT takes any action.

Notwithstanding the requirement for a University-HTDC memorandum of agreement, and the concerns it raises, the income tax credit established by this bill is hugely beneficial to our state. One of the goals of this administration is to create an environment that encourages and supports its citizens to remain and thrive in Hawaii. Accordingly, to that end, this administration is fully committed to strengthening the local economy through job creation and industry support. The motion picture, digital media, and film production industries are strong players in the local economy and must continue to be supported. The increased tax credit provided by this bill will further that purpose.

Since the University-HTDC memorandum of agreement does not need to be executed until December 31, 2020, my administration will be working closely with the legislature next session to reevaluate this requirement and make the necessary changes to restore the university's autonomy.

However, section 4 of this bill deletes Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 431:9-235(e), which provides for the right to a hearing and an appeal from an order suspending, revoking, or not renewing any license application by the Insurance Commissioner. The right to a hearing is not limited to defaults of student loans, student loan repayments contracts, and scholarship contracts; rather, this right also applies to violations of HRS chapter 431, article 9 (Licensing of Adjusters and Bill Reviewers). Deleting the right to a hearing under HRS section 431:9-235(e) will make the legislative intent unclear and hinder the Insurance Commissioner's ability to enforce violations of the licensing laws of public adjusters and bill reviewers.

State Highway Fund limits the Hawaii Department of Transportation's ability to capture matching federal funds. Unfortunately, the federal government operates through reimbursements and requires the state to front the money for transportation projects.

Electric vehicles will continue to receive incentives such as tax credits, free parking, and single driver zipper lane benefits. However, these drivers are equally responsible for the wear and tear to our road systems. My administration will continue looking for the appropriate balance between incentives and road usage equity.

We understand that these procedures are intended to result in more accurate eyewitness identifications, and thereby increase the ability of law enforcement agencies to solve crimes and protect the innocent.

In fact, law enforcement agencies already have adopted many of these procedures. However, some of the other procedures have not been adopted because they are unduly burdensome. Some agencies are also concerned that this bill legislates what should be internal policies and procedures regarding the investigation of crimes. Such legislation could eliminate the flexibility and control agencies need to conduct their investigations.

The bill provides for an effective date of June 1, 2020. This delay will give law enforcement agencies time to adopt and implement eyewitness identification procedures. It will also allow them to raise any concerns that arise during the implementation process with the Legislature during the next session.

It also requires the foreclosing association to offer mediation along with any notice of default and intention to foreclose, as well as prescribed procedures when mediation is chosen by the consumer.

While we have concerns because the bill expressly states that it will apply retroactively, we recognize the need for foreclosing associations to have clarity after *Sakal*. Thus, despite the retroactive application, the prospective application of the bill has utility and value.

We hope to have continued conversations next session to address the bill's implementation challenges and to help both foreclosing associations and delinquent homeowners in condominiums achieve the intent of this measure.

The handyman exemption amount has not been increased since 1992. A project that cost \$1,000 in 1992 is estimated to cost more than \$1,800 in 2019 according to Bureau of Labor Statistics consumer price index. This bill will assist landlords and homeowners in reducing the cost of maintaining a home or to make expedient repairs to make rentals more marketable.

Also, rural parts of our state have a shortage of licensed contractors for these types of projects because the work is too small or contractors are unavailable. Some types of repairs required quick action to prevent further damage to the home.

Although there is merit to raising the threshold, increasing the exemption cap leads to potential consumer protection concerns as unlicensed individuals can engage in larger and more complex construction work. Many of these unlicensed individuals have not met the experience, examination, and insurance requirements required of licensed contractors.

This bill proposes to permit the issuance of a limited lines self-storage insurance license.

Currently, occupants of self-service storage units may purchase property insurance from fully licensed property and casualty producers to insure their belongings. Product availability and access to purchase these products have not been problem issues for consumers.

This bill does not introduce a new product, lower premiums, or create more competition that would presumably result in lower pricing. Rather, this bill will provide the convenience of on-site purchases of insurance by consumers for their stored property by individuals selling property insurance through these limited lines licenses. These individuals will not have the complete knowledge, experience, or background information of insurance products that fully licensed property and casualty producers have.

The creation of the self-service storage limited lines license is reflective of proposals coming from business interests to increase the number of permitted limited lines licenses covering different niche areas. Consequently, with the numerous additions of limited lines licenses permitted (e.g., air travel, vending machines, accident and health or sickness, credit, credit life disability, and motor vehicle rental), the number of non-fully licensed producers selling insurance policies is growing through a patchwork of disjointed regulations. The growth of these types of licenses, while they may be convenient ways to sell insurance, is not the best way to regulate insurance to protect consumers.

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RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

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PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAI'I**

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**Rule 1 Organization.**

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members- elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.
- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.
- (15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.
- (16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.
- (17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.
- (18) To disperse information to all members relating to the President's nominations and appointments to boards and commissions on a monthly basis.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

- (1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.
- (3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

- (1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.
- (2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

- (1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.
- (2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).
- (3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.
- (4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.
- (5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.
- (6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.
- (7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.
- (8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.
- (9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.
- (10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

- (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture and Environment (AEN). The purview of this committee includes agriculture and aquaculture, including mariculture; and population, environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(2) Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health (CPH). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds; and general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(3) Committee on Education (EDU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early childhood learning, early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(4) Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism (EET). The purview of this committee includes programs relating to energy, energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources, and to programs related to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism unless the authority or corporation is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule, other emerging industries development, financial and technical assistance to business, film and digital media production, astronomy, space exploration and aerospace development, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, other scientific research and development activities, recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, and the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.

(5) Committee on Government Operations (GVO). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state government operations policy, including government efficiency, The Procurement Code, and state facilities unless the state government operations policy, including government efficiency, departmental procurement, and state facilities is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Higher Education (HRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but excluding the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(8) Committee on Housing (HOU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to affordable and public housing, urban renewal, community development, housing development, and the housing of, or sheltering of, the homeless.

(9) Committee on Human Services (HMS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance, Medquest, youth services, day care programs under the Department of Human Services, vocational rehabilitation, long term care, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth, families, elderly population, and services relating to homelessness.

(10) Committee on Judiciary (JDC). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts, crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters, criminal code revision, statutory revision, campaign spending and elections, ethics, constitutional matters, the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.

(11) Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts (LCA). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities and training, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, the Employees' Retirement System, and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund; and programs relating to international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations; and culture and the arts in the State, including but not limited to programs relating to historic preservation.

(12) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs (PSM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, the sheriff's division, civil defense, disaster readiness, state building code; and county and federal relations, and matters of concern to the counties; and military and veterans' affairs.

(13) Committee on Technology (TEC). The purview of this committee includes development, implementation, and innovation of technology, including but not limited to information storage, transmission, processing, and telecommunications, and programs and issues addressed by the State's Chief Information Officer and the Office of Enterprise Technology Services, including any boards, commissions, committees and councils addressing technology issues.

(14) Committee on Transportation (TRS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation, and transit-oriented development as it relates to transportation projects.

(15) Committee on Water and Land (WTL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning, sustainability, land and water management, forest management and reserve, coastal zone management, land reclamation, naturally occurring fisheries, ocean resources, state parks and beaches, management areas, including ocean recreation management areas and small boat harbors, and transit-oriented development as it relates to land use.

(16) Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management, statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation, and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

(A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;

(B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and

(C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

- (1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.
- (2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

- (1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.
- (2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.
- (3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

- (1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.
- (2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.
- (3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"
- (4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"
- (5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"
- (6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- (7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.
- (8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS**Rule 39 Order of Business: General.**

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.

- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS

Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

- (1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.
- (2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.
- (3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS

Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,

- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 68 Questions of Order.

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT**Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.

- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS

Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES

Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER

Rule 89 Legal Action.

Except in legal proceedings where the Senate of the State of Hawaii is named as a defendant, the President shall obtain written consent of a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled prior to undertaking any affirmative legal action taken on behalf of the Senate, such as the filing of a lawsuit or amicus curiae brief or intervening as a party to a lawsuit.

Rule 90 Administrative and Financial Manuals.

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

Rule 91 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

Rule 92 Issuance of the Senate Pin.

- (1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.
- (2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.
- (3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.
- (4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.
- (5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

**30th LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2019
JOINT HOUSE and SENATE
COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2019 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 15, 2019, until 12:00 midnight on Friday, April 26, 2019.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

“Chairs” refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

“Conference Committee” refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

“Lead chair” refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

“Lead committee staff” refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

“Managers” refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly:

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature's website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before midnight on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a fiscal measure, the Chair or Co-Chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee must be present during decision-making and give their approval.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair’s designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair’s designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The “Record of Votes of a Conference Committee” sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber’s Chief Clerk.

11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
