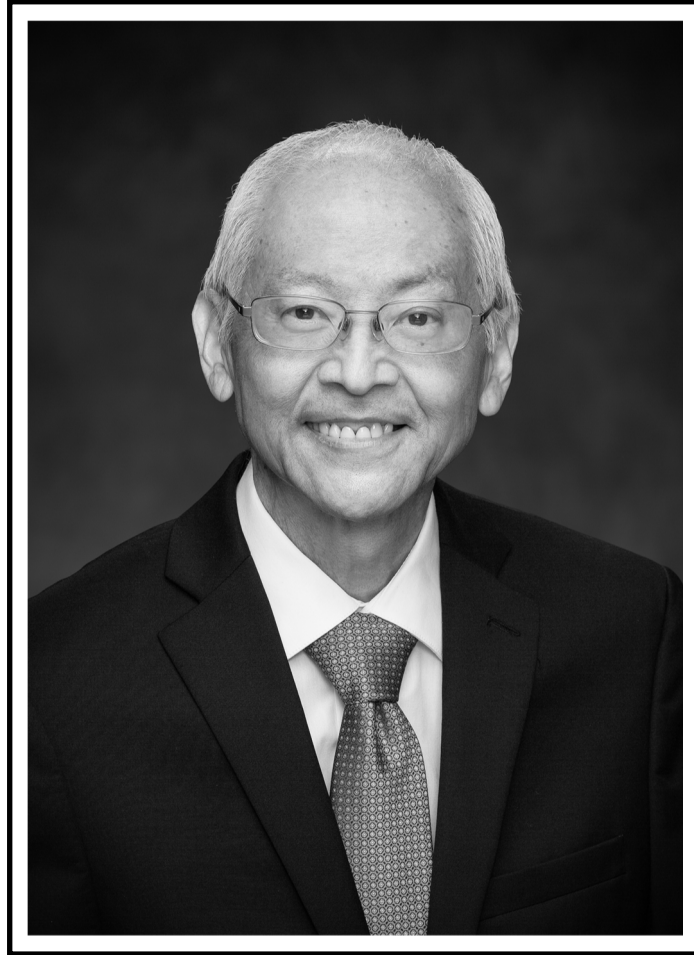

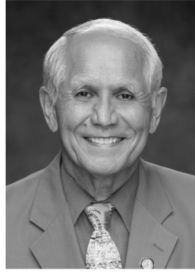

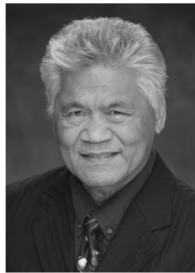

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 15, 2020

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, was called to order at 10:05 a.m., by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

The members of the Senate and guests rose for the invocation by Reverend David Fujimoto of Mililani Hongwanji Mission, followed by the singing of the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'ī" by Ms. Nalani Brun of the County of Kaua'i Office of Economic Development.

The Roll was then called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Harimoto who was excused.

At this time, Senator Taniguchi recognized a delegation from the Fukuoka Prefectural Assembly who were seated in the gallery, including Mr. Wataru Kurihara, chairman; Mr. Isao Kurauchi, senior Assembly member; members of Sho Cho Kai in Fukuoka; and executive staff.

Senator Kidani introduced Mr. Rana Sakar, Consul General of Canada in San Francisco, who was seated in the gallery, noting that he was appointed in 2017 and previously served as national director for high-growth markets at KPMG Canada and co-chairman of the advisory board at the Munk School of Global Affairs & Public Policy at the University of Toronto.

Senator Rhoads recognized former State Senator Melodie Aduja, Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, and Rod Maile, Administrative Director of the Courts, all of whom were seated in the gallery.

Senator Ihara welcomed a group of 14 honor students from the University of Hartford's Hillyer College in Connecticut, who were present in the gallery with Hillyer College Dean David Goldenberg, Professor Stephan Bullard, and Professor Rebecca Townsend. Senator Ihara noted that it was the sixteenth year of the program in which students learn Hawaiian culture, history, and art through a collaboration with the University of Hawai'i School of Pacific and Asian Studies.

Senator Kahele remarked that his father had brought him to the Opening Day of the Thirteenth Legislature in 1984, and that he was blessed that morning to bring his daughters 'Iolana and Nāmaka to the Opening Day of the Thirtieth Legislature. Accompanying them in the gallery was his wife, Maria.

On behalf of the Maui delegation, Senator Baker recognized the Honorable Michael Victorino, Mayor of the County of Maui, as well as various councilmembers and the county's tourism liaison.

Senator Kidani introduced Office of Hawaiian Affairs Trustee Hulu Lindsey, who was seated in the gallery.

The Chair recognized Office of Hawaiian Affairs Trustees John D. Waihe'e IV and Kalei Akaka, who were also seated in the gallery.

Senator Keohokalole introduced Office of Hawaiian Affairs Chief Executive Officer Sylvia Hussey, who was present in the gallery.

The Chair extended additional greetings to Office of Hawaiian Affairs Trustee Brendon Kalei'aina Lee, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Nishihara introduced Major General Kenneth Hara, Adjutant General of the State of Hawai'i Department of Defense, who was seated in the gallery.

The Chair shared that, despite his earlier explanation to the Fukuoka delegation that the Opening Day festivities were scaled back during the second year of the biennium, the Senate's floor session was actually well-attended and the gallery was full of guests. The Chair then extended an additional welcome to various executive branch department directors and deputy directors and county councilmembers who were present in the gallery, and recognized the Honorable Josh Green, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i, and his wife, Mrs. Jaime Green, who were seated on the dais.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"I told my colleagues that we're going to say, 'Let's get to work,' and then let's go because I didn't expect anybody in the gallery, so you've messed me up here this morning. I will begin by saying what I said at the beginning of each of my previous remarks. To each one of our family members, to all of the friends and supporters each of us have, who have the privilege to sit in the seats on this Senate chamber floor: We want to express our sincere gratitude for everything that you have done to give us the opportunity to serve the people of Hawai'i. As the President, I am fortunate enough where I can introduce my wife, Joy, who's sitting in the gallery, and my eldest son, Dan, and his girlfriend, Katie, sitting next to my wife, Joy. I was told, if I was making that introduction, that I had to clarify that Katie is the proud product of Maui nō ka 'oi, and she's not a Kaua'i girl.

"The other thing I'd like to say is that we have many philosophical differences, and we have passionate philosophical arguments among ourselves as we go through the course of the session, but you cannot help but feel a family tie to all of the members here because of the time we spend together, and we get to know each other personally. And I know, recently, Senator Thielen, Senator Riviere, Senator Rhoads, Senator Kim, Senator Kahele have all lost parents, and, this past November, I for the first time experienced that, losing my dad. In 1982, he was the person who was most influential in starting me on a career of government service, and this is the first time we're going to have the Opening Day of a legislative body I serve in and he's not present. Like all of you and others who have lost their parents before this, I better understand the emptiness that you feel, the longing and how much you miss someone whose counsel you could rely on, someone whose only motivation in advising you was your best interest, that they weren't interested

in any other kind of personal gain, just to see you do your best—and, most importantly, at least in the case of my father, the person who was unafraid to tell me when I was off-base, to tell me when he thought I was wrong, and to tell me what he thought the right path would be to get back on. So, thanks, Dad; I miss you a lot, appreciate everything that you have done, and, like all of my colleagues, for their late family members, we appreciate the differences that they've made in their lives.

"I would also like to give you a report very quickly before I talk about the future. Last year, I talked about how we were going to double food production in the State of Hawai'i, how we were going to get agriculture productive, and I'm happy to report to you that, before the end of 2018, the Kona hospital, state hospital, started serving farm-fresh menus in their cafeteria. In February of last year, the two state hospitals on Kaua'i, the Samuel Mahelona Memorial Hospital in Kapa'a and Kauai Veterans Memorial Hospital in Waimea, started serving farm-fresh meals on Kaua'i. When Dr. Linda Rosen of Hawai'i Health Systems saw what happened in Kona and on Kaua'i, she held a meeting of the state hospital board in February and they adopted a policy to convert all state hospitals in the next two years, now, to farm-fresh menus. On Kaua'i, before the farm-fresh menus they were serving five to ten meals a day to employees. They are now serving in excess of a hundred meals a day and having requests from the community to come in. We talked back in 2013 about possibly closing and/or privatizing the whole state hospital system. What's happening on Kaua'i has now dropped \$55,000 to the bottom line, and while that may not be a large amount of money when you look at the operational cost of the hospital, we are not only getting better health outcomes for our patients, for our employees, but we are also adding to the bottom line and finding how we can pick the low-hanging fruit and turn it into positives. They have gone to over 60 percent of the meals served being locally sourced. That is significant because we don't have a dairy on Kaua'i, we don't produce chicken on Kaua'i, so there are quite a bit of items that you cannot produce locally to make those farm-fresh meals happen, and so they've made great strides. Last week Monday, the 15 public schools on Kaua'i, two years ahead of the rest of the DOE statewide, have started serving farm-fresh meals for our students on Kaua'i. It has been, at the hospitals and the schools, an incredible collaboration process with the HGEA and the UPW. We could not make this kind of change without the unions working hand in hand with us to make all of this happen. We have gotten tremendous private-sector assistance; Chef Mark Oyama, the head of the culinary program at the Kaua'i Community College; the executive chefs at several of the hotels have volunteered their time to come out; and a collective group of growers; and we are trying to set up the distribution systems and the procurement systems that we can take this out statewide. The Big Island: How do we recover from the devastation of the lava flow, and with all of the land that you have, I am still optimistic that this is going to be a game-changing program to assist you. With Mahi Pono taking over the central plain of Maui, I did call Mahi Pono when I read about the 50,000 pounds of food donated to the food banks. I said, 'We don't need that many for the schools on Kaua'i, but a little bit might help out,' so I'm trying to work with them to be sure that they're going to actively engage in the farm-to-school program and create better meals for our students, so I am incredibly excited. First Lady Dawn Ige has been a great partner: She has been primarily focused on the healthier breakfasts and better participation than the 50th place—out of 50 states and the District of Columbia—that Hawai'i currently rates, and is working very hard to move us up and make sure that our kids have nutritional choices. It is clear that they learn at a better rate when they are well-fed and able to think clearly.

"Yesterday, January 14, 2020, we had a press conference, so I'm not going to get into the details because the committee

chairs talked a lot about it. I simply want to say that we have received criticism over the years for a process shrouded in secrecy. We have received criticism for getting to a point of agreement too late in the session so there's too little time for input from the public on important legislation. And by coming forward yesterday with four bold initiatives and laying them out to the public, we are hoping to create a more transparent process. We are hoping to create a process that is going to engage our community.

"Last year, we partnered with Pacific Resource Partnership to have a phone app to try and engage younger voters, and last year, we voted for all mail-in ballots. We are working hard to address the concerns of the working men and women of Hawai'i. We are working hard to address the issues about Hawai'i not being affordable, and losing our most valuable asset, our people, because they can't afford to live here. And we are striving hard to get better engagement by creating communication tools that are more comfortable for people much younger than I am, and by making voter accessibility much greater. I look forward to what we are going to collectively achieve. I am incredibly proud, at a time when we look in Washington, D.C., and see the divisiveness in our nation's capital and the gridlock, when I see the news reports about state houses across the nation that are unable to work, that we have been able to come together, talk to the House, talk to the Governor and his administration—Lieutenant Governor Green is here with us this morning to show his support and willingness to work together—that we are going to be a shining model for the rest of the nation. Thank you very much."

At this time, the President called on Senate Minority Leader Kurt Fevella.

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

"Thank you, Senate President. I'm still nervous; even though I talk to a lot of you guys all the time, I'm still nervous in talking in front of you guys, but aloha and good morning. I just want to thank everyone here today for coming out to the State Capitol to join us on this Opening Day of the 2020 legislative session. First and foremost, I want to thank our heavenly father for his blessing upon me and my family every single day. I want to mahalo Senate President Ron Kouchi and Vice President Senator Michelle Kidani, Lieutenant Governor and your lovely wife, Jaime, and honored guests and my colleagues. I just want to share a little bit. When I first got here, I had a very open mind, I was willing to work, and I just want to thank all my colleagues, every single one, those that I had a lot of contact with and those I didn't have much contact with. It was a privilege and an honor working with everyone last session, and I really look forward in working this session with you guys the same way. I know I belong to 16 committees; I try very hard to be at every single one of them. That is my goal as serving to the state and also my community. But I just want to thank you guys all for opening up your hearts and minds, and giving me that aloha. Thank you, guys.

"I'm also thankful every day, waking up in this beautiful State of Hawai'i that we call home, especially my hometown of 'Ewa Beach. I am grateful to stand here before you as the state senator, serving and representing my family and friends of District 19. I'd like to reassure you that we are focused and committed and assure that we're a better Hawai'i to implement beneficial and developmental programs and projects that benefit you, the people. We are the working people of Hawai'i, working long hours, laboring in every changing weather, sitting in traffic as we commute to work every day. Some of us have multiple jobs just to make ends meet. I want to let you know that I care, and I understand your everyday struggles. During this session, I'll make sure that the bills that we introduce will help each and every one of us here because one job should be enough.

“Hawai‘i is at a critical crossroads, and we all agree that Hawai‘i should become energy-independent by the year 2045, but at what cost? This is what I share every day with my family and friends around the state. When our quality of life impact our public health and safety along killing our indigenous species, like our native bats, pollinating bees, and our environment and our ecosystem, we as legislators need to look closely in the process which we set forth to helping our communities. It was really touching for me when my fifteen-year-old daughter who goes to Campbell High School—as you guys know, the most crowded school in the state—had wrote, ‘Who will take care of our aloha ‘āina if not we, the people? Until the last aloha ‘āina, I will not stop protecting my Hawai‘i.’ When she wrote this, I didn’t have the chance to read it when she wrote this essay for one of her classes, and her teachers and her fellow students had spoken to me about it. Not everybody knows my daughter; I mean, she’s not like her dad (little bit more open-spoken), but she’s more reserved. So when I read this, it really touched my heart to know, not only are our kids worried about plastic straws and all the stuff that we have going on that we are battling here at this capitol, but also our environment and our ecosystem is very, very critical to these kids.

“I will not stop protecting my Hawai‘i.’ What does that mean to us, guys? Every one of us here got into the position that we are in today because we want to make sure that we protect our home where we love and we serve. And again, I would like to thank you all for just sharing and being with me through this session. All my colleagues here, it’s just a humbling experience for me to be here. Thank you, Senate President; again, thank you guys all here; thank you to all my colleagues. I look forward to working with you all and just making Hawai‘i a better place for everyone. Thank you and God bless.”

The Chair then shared that the 2020 Senate Legislative Program was available, and that it wasn’t the “Majority package” since the Minority member had also embraced the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals that were the cornerstone of the Senate’s priorities. The Chair thanked Majority Leader English, his staff, and the Senate Communications office for their work in producing the program.

SECOND DAY

Thursday, January 16, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Harimoto and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the First Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard introduced his brother and sister-in-law Bill and Kelly Davis from Moline, Illinois, and dear friends Tim and Vicky Marland, who were celebrating their thirty-third wedding anniversary that day.

Senator Fevella recognized and honored the board members of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, I am honored to introduce these three gentlemen, who not only left their legacy on the football field but also in the islands of Hawai'i. Although Ma'a, Jesse, and Vai each have their own outstanding athletic accomplishments, together, they paved a path for young Polynesian athletes. It is because of them there is inspiration and creation of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame. Coaches, contributors, and athletes like Manti Te'o, Marcus Mariota, and Tua Tagovailoa—who you guys all know is from 'Ewa Beach, my community, and we're proud of him and all his accomplishments—will be recognized more on a traditional and cultural platform. I'd like to now yield the floor to the senator from Mililani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"I am pleased to start off today's floor introductions with Mr. Ma'a Tanuvasa. Ma'a was born in American Sāmoa and became a track and field and football standout at Mililani High School (go, Trojans!). He continued to the University of Hawai'i, starting for three years in his career. He then was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams initially but spent most of his nine-year NFL career with the Denver Broncos as a defensive tackle. Ma'a assisted in the Broncos winning the Super Bowl championships in 1997 and 1998. He also played for the San Diego Chargers and for the Atlanta Falcons before returning to Hawai'i. He is a co-founder of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame and the Polynesian Bowl. Ma'a has returned to his roots at Mililani High School by coaching our Mililani Trojans football team (go, Trojans!), and let us not forget the great quarterbacks out of Mililani High School: McKenzie and Gabriel. Thank you, Ma'a; please, a round of applause."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the honor of introducing Jesse Sapolu. Jesse was born in Apia, Sāmoa. He later moved to O'ahu, where he attended Farrington High School. In honor of him, I have brought our Farrington football helmet [*holds up helmet*] that I'm sure he will sign later, after we get done. (I do have a Denver Broncos helmet as well, so I could get that one as well.) But he is from the class of 1979, and on behalf of Farrington Governor Michelle and wannabe Governor Mufi Hannemann, we praise you for that. Jesse was selected for the all-state team as an offensive linebacker. He went on to the University of Hawai'i (I have a helmet for that as well), where he lettered in all four years as a standout player. In 1983, he played in the Hula Bowl, and went on to be drafted by the San Francisco 49ers, a team that we all love. He spent 12 years of his NFL career with the San Francisco 49ers. He is one of six 49ers to own not one, not two, not three, but four Super Bowl

championship rings, and earned Pro Bowl honors in 1993 and 1994. He is the co-founder of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame and Polynesian Bowl. How about a round of applause for Jesse Sapolu?"

Senator Riviere rose to present the following remarks:

"Today I have the honor of introducing everyone here to Mr. Vai Sikahema. Vai was born in the Kingdom of Tonga, and he's the first Tongan to ever play in the NFL. He attended Brigham Young University, where he added significant contributions to the team even as a freshman. After that, he left for two years to complete his mission for the church, and he returned for his senior year, when they were undefeated at 13-0. His senior year was also defined by an NCAA record for the most punt returns of 153 in a college career. (So, I'm thinking we've got defensive guys and offensive guys, and I'm wondering if you guys could still catch him today. No chance, yeah? Okay.) Vai continued to play running back and kickoff returner for eight seasons in the NFL with the St. Louis and Phoenix Cardinals, with the Green Bay Packers, and with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was named to the Pro Bowl twice, in 1986 and 1987, and he's now a member of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame. Ladies and gentlemen, members, please, how about a round for Vai Sikahema. Mahalo, Vai. Mr. President, I yield the floor to the senator from 'Ewa Beach."

Senator Fevella rose and stated:

"Before I continue, I would like to acknowledge—I know this person is not here, but I still want to recognize him because he's part of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame—Burt Trembly; Chris Tatum, president and CEO of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority; and we have former mayor and current CEO of Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association Mufi Hannemann. Thank you for making this possible for the Senate to honor these distinguished individuals who have made it possible for us to have the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame. Could we have a round of applause for them, please? I would like to offer again a big mahalo to the honorees for their significant and positive force they have shown and continue to show in the communities both on and off the field."

At 11:49 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

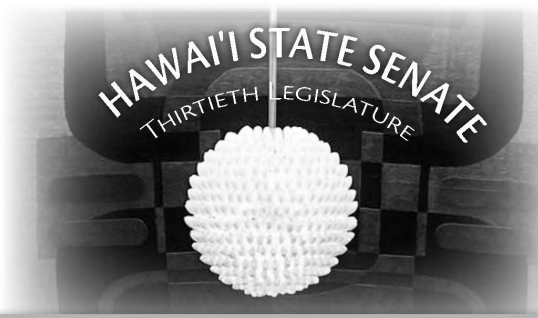

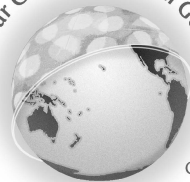

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2020, was called to order at 10:05 a.m., by the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, Speaker Saiki called upon Kahu Kekoa Kordell to offer a prayer.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Della Au Bellati and Gene Ward, on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators J. Kalani English and Kurt Fevella, on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Representative Dee Morikawa and Senator Michelle N. Kidani presented Governor Ige with maile, kika, and kukunaokala lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Thirtieth Legislature and guests the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Ige presented the State of the State Address as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, President Kouchi, former governors, distinguished justices of the courts, representatives of our congressional delegation, members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, elected officials, military leaders, honored guests, and all of you who took time this morning to be with us: Aloha.

"Before I begin my formal remarks: Our first responders—whether they are police officers, firefighters, or lifeguards—take great pride in their professionalism and great satisfaction in knowing they are serving others and our community. If you ask them, they will tell you to a man and woman that they are just doing their job, even when they step into harm's way. But, in truth, they do so much more, especially when the need for them arises. On Sunday, a desperate need did arise, and two heroes stepped forward. I would like us to take a moment this morning in honor of Officers Tiffany Enriquez and Kaulike Kalama. Chief Ballard, please know that our thoughts and prayers are

with your HPD 'ohana and with the families of these two brave officers.

"On January 1st, we welcomed the dawn of not only a new year, but a new decade. For those under 30, that may not seem like a big deal, but for those who grew up without the internet—when *The Lord of the Rings* was a book you read, not a movie you watched—time has a way of sneaking up on us. Could any of us have imagined the changes and discoveries that have already taken place in this century? Smartphones, 3D printers, Facebook and Skype, self-driving cars, to name a few. And it seems that each year, change happens faster and faster and faster. How do you keep up with all of it? If we are honest with ourselves, we must admit we can't. We go along with the flow and hang on for dear life.

"But the issues that concern our families haven't changed for as long as I can remember: finding a job that pays the bills, dealing with Hawai'i's high cost of living, and taking care of our family.

"A study sponsored by the Aloha United Way reported that a family of four in Hawai'i needs a combined annual income of \$77,000 just to survive: to pay for food, housing, health care and child care, and, of course, taxes. If you asked the working families in Hawai'i whether they make \$77,000 a year, many would answer, 'no.' If you asked families who made \$77,000 a year whether that was enough, I suspect they would say, 'no,' as well. At various times, we've taken stabs at different aspects of the overall problem. We've taken bites out of affordable housing; we've increased the minimum wage; we've started childcare and preschool programs, and we've provided tax relief for working families. As a state senator, I remember supporting many of the bills to help ease Hawai'i's high cost of living, and I recall many others trying to do the same. Hundreds of bills were introduced, many requested by our community, all competing to improve the quality of life here in Hawai'i. The House selected their priorities, and the Senate did the same. Advocates successfully moved their priorities from committee to committee. In the end, we all agreed on a budget and hundreds of bills that made life a little bit better here in the islands. We went along with the flow and hung on for dear life. Still, the elephant in the room—the cost of living—got a little larger and a little harder to deal with each and every year. Too many in our community simply gave up and moved away. And so, at the start of this new decade, it is appropriate to ask ourselves: Does it make any sense to continue business as usual?

"That's why House and Senate leadership and community leaders and my administration got together to look for a better way of helping working families. We challenged each other to identify ways to take on reducing the cost of living for working families. We committed to a package of bills that was outlined last week in our joint press conference. We committed to shaping these bills, ushering them through the legislative process. And we made a promise to make life better for our working families. Moreover, we had an army to assist us. I would like to recognize House Speaker Scott Saiki, Senate President Ron Kouchi, members of the Legislature, key department directors, and many business and nonprofit leaders who participated in this historic collaboration. Whether you are up in the gallery or seated here on the chamber floor, please stand to be recognized.

"The first thing we agreed to do was to put more money into pockets of working people, but how do you increase wages without increasing the cost of living? The two are joined at the hip. Clearly, increasing the minimum wage alone would not do it, but a modest increase phased over time, combined with targeted tax relief right now, could result in an annual cash benefit of \$4,400 to each worker. We believe we have hit the sweet spot that will make a difference for our working families.

Still, some say, that is not enough. And that's why our package also includes initiatives to reduce the cost of child care and housing, two of the biggest expenses in a family's budget.

"The proposed bill on expanding affordable child care complements the proposal we made last year to create a universal public preschool system for four-year-olds. To reach that goal, I noted we would need more than 300 pre-K classrooms. At the time, I had no illusion about the cost or difficulty of attaining that goal, and so we embarked on a phased process of taking small steps, steady steps, forward. But this new bill on child care will allow us to do much more than that. Today, half of our toddlers, 20,000 statewide, have no access to childcare or preschool programs. By the end of this decade, we want to eliminate that gap, whether it's through our pre-K classrooms, private preschools, or the proposed Learning to Grow centers. By the end of this decade, we want every three- and four-year-old in Hawai'i to have the opportunity to attend a childcare or preschool program. Business as usual is **not** acceptable. We want to make an aggressive start right now. Instead of asking working parents to bring their toddlers to us, let's bring these services to them, whether it's in community centers, in condominium buildings, or in suburban shopping malls. Instead of waiting three years to construct more classrooms, let's look at the empty classrooms and underutilized facilities statewide to see if we can make better use of them. Instead of trying to do all of this with just taxpayer dollars, why not leverage those funds through partnerships with nonprofit and private groups? We are committed to go the distance because we know our children's future is at risk. Education is the foundation of our economy and our quality of life. Everything, including our future, begins with how well we educate our children, and that is significantly affected by the kind of beginnings we provide them. We cannot let them down.

"In Hawai'i, the biggest expense for working families by far is housing, whether it's rent or mortgage payments. Young families in Hawai'i just cannot afford to buy that first home without help. The spiraling cost of homes in Hawai'i is driven by two forces: The first is the high cost of land; the second is real estate speculation. And so, in our joint package, we propose to build 17,000 affordable homes over the next decade on state-owned land in partnership with private developers. The homes would be sold as leasehold, effectively removing the biggest cost for developers: the cost of land. That, in turn, will dramatically bring down the price of the homes they build. Moreover, as the landlord, the state can keep these homes affordable while allowing leaseholders to share reasonably in the equity when they are ready to sell. In other words, we hope to take the wind out of speculators' sails. In this way, we can also ensure that leasehold property stays affordable forever.

"As part of our joint package on housing, we are also proposing to invest \$200 million for roads and infrastructure to stimulate interest in the University of Hawai'i's housing development plans for its West O'ahu campus. With 4,000 units already planned, we are very excited about the new energy this initiative will inject into this project. We are also proposing \$75 million for affordable housing on the neighbor islands. In addition, we want to streamline the permit process to generate additional interest from private developers. This joint package works hand in hand with the progress we made together to make low- and middle-income rental units available to our working families. This not only provides for their immediate housing needs but helps them save for the day when they can buy a home of their own.

"But the real story lies with the families that we—you and I—have been able to help. About six years ago, Krysyan and Jonathan Durrett were living on the mainland when he was offered an internship here in Hawai'i. The couple, who were born and raised in Hawai'i, returned to their islands with their

three children, and moved in with his parents. When Jonathan's internship turned into a full-time job, they knew that their living arrangement would no longer work. The cost of living was overwhelming, and finding a place to rent seemed impossible. They were faced with the tough choice of staying near family or moving back to the mainland, where the price of everything is lower. Fortunately, they were able to qualify for an affordable rental in 'Ewa Beach in a development built by Mutual Housing Association of Hawai'i with state assistance. That allowed the Durrettts to not only stay in Hawai'i but, more importantly, save for the future. After six years, they were able to save enough money for a down payment on a home of their own. Krysyan credits living in the affordable rental community as the primary reason they were able to save and purchase a home here in Hawai'i. Krysyan and Jonathan are here with us this morning. Would you please stand to be recognized? And I would be remiss if I didn't mention the private developments like Waiawa and Ho'opili and Koa Ridge, where thousands of units will be developed over the next few years. Clearly, it will take a public and private partnership, the public and private sectors working together, in concert, to meet all of our families' housing needs.

"Building homes is not just about building houses but also about nurturing communities, and the importance we give to eliminating homelessness says as much about us as it does any new development. From the start of this administration, working with you here in the Legislature and the private sector, we have made reducing homelessness a priority. At the time, Hawai'i had the highest per capita rate of homelessness in the country. But between 2016 and 2019, we increased the number of homeless moving into permanent housing by 73 percent. On average, we move over 600 individuals from homelessness into permanent housing each month. Those are the statistics, but when it comes to homelessness, progress is measured one person and one family at a time. For those individuals, their stories are no longer about shuffling between streets and temporary housing. Kalani Lautele is a single father with three children. He works in construction, and in 2016 his rent was suddenly doubled; he found himself and his children homeless and desperate. He was referred to the family assessment center in Kaka'ako, which we developed together, where he stayed while waiting for affordable housing or public housing. Fortunately, Catholic Charities Hawai'i was able to find his family permanent housing, but that's not the end of his story. Kalani needed a way to pay forward the help he was given. After settling in his home in Kalihi, Kalani continued to visit the family assessment center, and he brought with him his children and his entire youth football team that he coached to help with outreach events. They also brought donations for the families there, such as food, toiletries, bedding. I would like Kalani and his family to stand and be recognized for their strength of character and for the example they have set for others.

"I would also like to take a moment to recognize Lieutenant Governor Josh Green for his work on the H4 initiative. The initiative provides medical services for homeless individuals through Joint Outreach Centers in Chinatown and Kāne'ohe. As you know, the lieutenant governor has focused on the health concerns of the homeless and is also working on other projects, like the Kauhale village concept, and addressing a broad range of community needs. On behalf of everyone involved in these efforts, I would like the lieutenant governor to stand and be recognized.

"While the joint package has been the focus of our attention, we are also continuing to work on other important areas as well. Great things do not happen overnight. To paraphrase Robert Kennedy, they begin with a vision to see things not as they are but as they might be. The transformation of agriculture in Hawai'i from large plantations that exported sugar and pineapple to smaller, more diversified farms that grow food for

local consumption is such a vision. But it has taken a while. The transition of our visitor industry from a sector that focuses on growth to one that embraces sustainability is just beginning. It, too, will take time. In fact, the shift to sustainability in many of the things we pursue—including energy, economic development, and the environment—will continue long after we are gone. That is why we cannot lose sight of those broader goals, no matter the obstacles, changes in administration, or how long the process takes.

“Perhaps the longest transition we have experienced recently has been the transformation of our agricultural industry from large-scale farming to more diversified farms. But there is one important difference in today’s efforts from yesterday’s, and that’s technology. As in other fields, we have seen the rise of technology change the face of everything in society. In agriculture, it, too, has been a game changer. It has enabled farmers to produce higher yields in the field with more precise targeting strategies in the marketplace. Consequently, we are seeing a greater willingness to invest in local agricultural endeavors.

“Over the last several weeks, we have seen a number of news articles about agricultural start-ups here in the islands. Mahi Pono, which bought 41,000 acres of former sugar cane land, is raising potatoes in central Maui, and they want to plant another 120 acres of citrus trees and 20 acres of non-GMO papayas. Their plans also include growing avocados and bell peppers, guava, lilikoi, oranges, lemons, and limes. Sensei Farms is transforming agriculture on Lāna‘i by using a proven mix of innovative technology to power its hydroponic greenhouses on former pineapple lands. This mix of traditional farming and new technology is the wave of the future for agriculture throughout the state. Mr. En Young of Sensei Farms is here with us today. Would you please stand to be recognized? More than at any other time in our history, local farmers have it within their grasp to make a difference in our drive toward self-sufficiency. At this time, I would also like to acknowledge State Senators Donovan Dela Cruz and Mike Gabbard and Representatives Richard Onishi and Richard Creagan, who have long been strong advocates for agriculture here in the islands.

“You know, we can initiate a host of activities to encourage local food production, stimulate our economy, and protect our environment. But the key has always been whether we are able to keep those initiatives going, and so sustainability has been an integral part of our efforts. How do we sustain our economy, our lifestyle, and our natural environment? We do it first by developing clean energy sources. With a flurry of commercial solar projects in the pipeline and local homeowners’ enthusiasm for residential solar power, we will exceed our 2020 energy goal of attaining 30 percent of our energy needs from renewable sources. The significance of this pivot to clean and renewable energy cannot be overstated. We have become a leader in this effort, and our actions have inspired other states to follow our lead. Since we set a goal to become carbon negative by 2045, four other states have followed our lead. So far, we have successfully reduced our greenhouse gas emissions and will exceed our 2020 goal. And our utilities are meeting our clean electricity goals faster and at record low prices. Today, 37 percent of O‘ahu’s single-family residences have rooftop solar. On certain days, the island of Kaua‘i is already achieving 100 percent of electricity from clean energy sources, decades ahead of when anyone thought it was possible. We will continue to aggressively engage in actions that will continue to decarbonize our economy and make our environment whole.

“In commerce, sustaining our economy has replaced the old mantra of growing the economy, and, in fact, we are already seeing a shift in focus in our biggest industry. In 2019, the Hawai‘i Tourism Authority shifted its priorities from increasing visitor arrivals to improving the visitor experience while

supporting the quality of life for residents. Through HTA’s Aloha ‘Āina program, 28 nonprofit and government agencies were given funding for programs to help protect Hawai‘i’s natural resources. For example, the authority is working to repair and improve hiking trails like those at Mānoa Falls. Through its Kūkula Ola program, the authority has funded 28 programs this year and committed to fund 43 more programs in 2020 that perpetuate the Hawaiian culture. The beneficiaries are programs and groups like the Lāna‘i Culture & Heritage Center, Hula Hālau O Moloka‘i, Hāna Arts, the Edith K. Kanaka‘ole Foundation, the Kalihi-Palama Culture & Arts Society, and so many more.

“And while we are on the subject of Native Hawaiian culture, let me digress for just a moment and speak on the Thirty Meter Telescope and Mauna Kea. Emotions have run high on both sides. The arguments are strong on both sides, and that’s what makes the situation so difficult. There is no easy or quick solution; we will have to work hard if we want to resolve this conflict. But I truly believe it can be resolved if we put our heads and our hearts together. There are some who have encouraged me to take strong measures against those who are protesting on Mauna Kea. That would have been the easier course. But it is not just the authority of law that is at stake. It is so much more than that. What is also at risk is the glue that always bound us together: that sense of aloha. It is the thing that underpins our laws and gives them meaning and an ethical foundation. That trust in each other is sacred, and I will not break that bond, no matter how convenient or easy. At the heart of our dilemma is both the history of wayfinding and discovery and the future of wayfinding and discovery. If we have lost our way, we must find our way back. To do this, we must be open-hearted as well as open-minded. We must listen as well as speak with conviction, and we must have aloha for each other in spite of our differences. I am of that mind, and I ask all of you to join me to continue to look for a way forward. I stand ready to work with any and everyone who refuses to let this issue divide us. Let us together find a way forward.

“Like our host culture, we sustain our environment by protecting it. Stewardship of the ‘āina has always been a central part of public policy here in Hawai‘i. It is embedded in our state motto and in the awareness of our children from an early age. The life of our lands has always depended on right thinking and a love of this place we call home. But there is a new danger threatening the ‘āina, and it comes from climate change. No one need tell us how global warming is directly impacting our lives or the lives of families who live along the North Shore of O‘ahu; or those who suffered from recent historic storms on Kaua‘i; or the people of West Maui, who were affected by unprecedented high tides; or those affected by devastating wildfires on the Valley Isle.

“Recently, *Time* magazine named Swedish teenager Greta Thunberg its Person of the Year in 2019. She is a passionate and compelling youngster who believes we all have a part to play in preventing climate change. She sets an example for all of us. I would like to challenge our own young students to think about Greta’s message to all of us. The adults in this room often talk about sustainability and the future, but for those under 21, it’s more about your future than ours. It is never too early to take ownership of it because it’s as much about everyday activities as it is about large, sweeping public policy. We can work with the Legislature to permanently set aside 10,000 acres in conservation land under the state’s Legacy Land program, as we have over the past year and a half. We can mandate 100 percent clean energy usage by 2045. But without your involvement, public policy is just that: a policy written on a piece of paper. It is your support and daily participation that transform those policies into meaningful actions. And if you don’t believe me, just ask the graduates of Kupu, a nonprofit youth organization dedicated to making a difference in their communities. Ask Aziz

Agis, a Kupu alumni who maintained and restored hiking trails on O'ahu, or Sean McDonough, who spent his days assisting in the preservation of natural area reserves throughout O'ahu. Sean is with us today, along with John Leong, director of Kupu. I would like for them to stand to be recognized for their contributions to making a difference right here in Hawai'i. They are only a few years older than those of you still in school. The future will be here faster than you think, but you don't have to wait for that day to come. These young folks have shown that you can make a difference right now.

"As the saying goes, time waits for no man or woman, no matter how young or old. We have much on our plate. Those on this floor know better than most how arduous the journey is in laying the groundwork for a thriving community and a better life. We also know that no one individual has all the answers. Government cannot do it alone, but what we cannot accomplish alone, we can with the help of others. Here in Hawai'i, we intimately understand that truth. Throughout our history, we have tested it over and over and over again. During the plantation era, communities banded together to provide for each other what others would not. In the early 1900s, workers came together to fight for higher pay and better working conditions. Their efforts resulted in improving the work environment for everyone. Today, at the start of a new decade, we have it within our power to change the lives of our working families. We have it within our power to change the trajectory of Hawai'i's future. That is the underlying belief of this joint package by the House, the Senate, my administration, and the broader community at large.

"There are cynics out there who will dismiss the notion of government working together, but working together—that's what Hawai'i has always been about. *'Ohana* is not a cliché; it is about the whole body of values centered around family in the largest sense of the word. Our working families have taken it on the chin for far too long. They are the backbone of our workforce and the heart of our communities. While some have opted to leave the islands, many have not because Hawai'i is not just a place to build a house: It is our home. We all deserve a chance to earn a decent day's wage for a decent day's work. We all deserve the opportunity of our own to own our own home. We deserve the best education for our children, and, someday, the opportunity to see our grandchildren playing on our beaches. More importantly, we, in government, owe it to every working family to give this our best shot. Earlier, I recognized those who played a part in putting this joint package together. They took a chance and stood up for change. They delivered a package that's aggressive and bold. We must be just as aggressive and bold in making it happen. Half measures will only add up to half a loaf. It will not nurture our families. I believe we can overcome the challenges facing us as a state and work together to create a better life for all of us. Ladies and gentlemen, it's time to stand up and be counted. It is time for us to put some skin in the game. I believe in Hawai'i, and I believe in all of us. I believe in all of you. Let's get to work. Mahalo and aloha."

Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi then rose and stated:

"I guess I'm not the only one who enjoyed the speech. Aloha! This is one of my favorite events, and, while I enjoyed the governor's remarks, the best is the Speaker reading a long list of dignitaries. He has to get their titles correct and pronounce their names right, and at the end, I get to come up and say anything I want and then hit the gavel.

"Governor, you mentioned at the end of your speech about the skeptics, and after the press conference last Tuesday, they were already out, speculating that this will never last. Well, I'm thrilled to be here this morning to celebrate the one-week anniversary. And I say that not to be funny and to make light of the situation; I say that because, like a good marriage, the only

way it works and the only way it works in the long run, is you go to work and you work at it to make it the best it can be every single day. And I want to remind all of my colleagues, our partners in the private sector and the advocates that that's what it's going to take from each and every one of us to come here each and every day and give our best effort. Even when we're tired, even when we had a bad day, something didn't go right, we need to come back here and be focused on the work at hand, so I look forward to working with my colleagues in the House, with the governor, his administration, all of our advocates, and just want to assure you that your Hawai'i State Senate is committed to work with this partnership to succeed.

"The second thing that I'd like to say is, too often we talk about what isn't going right, what isn't happening, and one of the reasons why I have so much hope for this package is an example that's here in the chamber. It's not my intention to embarrass you, Arryl, but it's my intention to tell a story. Council Chair Kaneshiro was so anxious to come into this world that he came very early, and immediately was at Kapi'olani Hospital because he was so tiny and fragile. But with the medical technology, the doctors, and the nurses at Kapi'olani, he quickly grew into a healthy young man. A little over 32 years ago, when I got married to my wife, he was the ring bearer at our wedding. He attended Koloa Elementary School, and he went to Kaua'i High School. When he graduated, he went to Pacific University in Forest Grove, and upon graduation, he's now a licensed certified public accountant, and came back here to work in the State of Hawai'i and his beloved Garden Island. Today, he sits in this chamber as the chairman of the Kaua'i County Council. When we invest in that early pre-K, when we invest in the K-12 program, when we do Early College, when we work on things like the Promise program, we have young people in this state like Arryl Kaneshiro, where there is no limit to what they can achieve when they're given a chance. Arryl, thank you for being a great role model.

"And I'll simply close with this: I talked a little bit last week at the opening of the Senate about losing my dad, and I did some reflection. Well, I want to let you know, Chief Ballard, that he was a 26-year veteran of the Kaua'i Police Department, and I know what it's like, as a family member, every time your dad puts the uniform on, or your mom, and walks out of the door, and hoping that they're going to be coming home at the end of the shift. In my reflection, I marveled at the fact that, after 26 years of service, he was retired for 33 years, saw his grandchildren grow into adulthood, and enjoyed that life with his family. I haven't made any other public statements, but I want you to know and your officers to know, on behalf of the Hawai'i State Senate, the gratitude that we want to express for your two officers who have stepped forward to ensure the safety for the rest of our community. And to their families, who, unfortunately, are not going to have the experience that my family has enjoyed, our hearts truly go out to them, and we deeply appreciate the sacrifice of all of our men and women in uniform, and, as the governor said, our first responders. So, thank you, and on that note, we are adjourned."

At 11:03 a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Thursday, January 23, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Dela Cruz, Harimoto, and Kidani who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fourth Day.

On behalf of Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Nishihara congratulated and honored Sergeant Chris Kim of the Honolulu Police Department, and presented the following remarks:

"First, I'd like to have Sergeant Kim please rise. My colleagues and I offer our deepest condolences for the loss of your brother and sister in blue, Officers Enriquez and Kalama. But we will not forget their sacrifice.

"Now, more than ever, we must recognize the work of our heroes and protectors. I would like to recognize the 2019 national CrimeStoppers Coordinator of the Year, Sergeant Chris Kim, and his exceptional work. He has made history by being the first coordinator in CrimeStoppers Honolulu's 38-year history to receive this award—truly an important award.

"Sergeant Kim did not have an easy time. What he managed to do was to completely turn the Honolulu CrimeStoppers ship around. When he took over and took up the mantle of CrimeStoppers Honolulu coordinator, tips were declining rapidly. In response, Sergeant Kim implemented the P3 Tips application, allowing the public to anonymously submit tips with their smartphones. What happened next was a 200 percent increase in tips! This increase led to the arrest of 34 wanted individuals and 458 cases being closed.

"Not satisfied with this success, Sergeant Kim decided to expand the Student CrimeStoppers program across our islands. Presenting in schools throughout our island, Sergeant Kim tackled topics such as bullying, fighting, vaping, and social media safety. This work with our keiki resulted in a 400 percent increase in tips to the Student CrimeStoppers program.

"Sergeant Kim also utilized our state's media. They promoted media awareness for the Animal CrimeStoppers program to combat animal cruelty, and they have worked with the media to increase volunteer hours and personnel for the program. Six hundred fifty applicants were inspired by the TV story that aired. These volunteers resulted in a 120 percent increase in volunteer hours.

"It is unsurprising that Sergeant Kim was invited as a guest speaker to discuss Honolulu CrimeStoppers' huge success at this year's CrimeStoppers convention. So let us congratulate and thank HPD's Sergeant Kim, our nation's top CrimeStoppers coordinator for 2019. You have made Hawai'i proud!

"Also seated next to him, we have Chief Susan Ballard and members of his family: his mother, Jong Hee Kim; older brother, David Kim; younger brother, John Kim; oldest daughter, Hailey Kim; and the youngest daughter, Christalyn Kim. Again, thank you all for coming and blessing us with your presence here. Thank you very much. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard congratulated Mariah Quibol and Sean Valencia of Waipahu High School, and presented the following remarks:

"Mr. President, colleagues, and guests: Future Farmers of America, or FFA, has been in Hawai'i for 91 years. During that time, this program has produced successful farmers, business, community leaders, and, yes, even legislators. Prior to 2000, the state had a vibrant secondary ag FFA education program in over 30 high schools, with a statewide FFA membership of over 800 members. After 2000, due to several factors, local FFA membership began to decline, and in 2010, it hit a historic low of 10 active FFA schools, with a statewide membership of just 120. Thankfully, there's been a resurgence in agricultural education due to strong concerns about the health of our ag industry and a renewed commitment from both the government and private sector. In 2018, our local FFA had 18 active schools with over 400 members. Nationally, there are over 700,000 student members, easily making FFA the largest career and technical student organization in the nation. The National FFA Convention is held every year at the end of October in Indianapolis, with over 70,000 in attendance.

"In 2017–2018, Waipahu Intermediate chartered one of only two middle school-level chapters in the state, with only 15 active members. At the end of their first year, five students with three projects qualified and competed in the National Agriscience Fair at the National FFA Convention. To qualify for the National Agriscience Fair, students need to be the state champion for their category. Out of all the state champions across the nation, the National FFA selects the top 12 for each category and age division. The three projects from Hawai'i placed third, sixth, and seventh in the nation in their respective categories. In 2018–2019, Waipahu Intermediate qualified seven students with four projects, and Waipahu High School qualified three students with two projects for the National Agriscience Fair in October 2019. Waipahu Intermediate had another third-place finisher, and, for the first time since 1955 in Hawai'i FFA history, national champions. And because of all those accomplishments, I've been informed that the National FFA magazine, *New Horizons*, will be at Waipahu Intermediate and High School in February, where the schools will be featured in the summer 2020 issue, and the magazine is sent to nearly a million readers across the nation. At this time, I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Mililani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Sean Michael Valencia Monte and Mariah Pricella Quibol won first place in the environmental services/natural resource systems category at the National Agriscience Fair for their project on bokashi composting. They explored the effective microorganism starter and discussed the environmental impacts that composting could have on small and large scales.

"Besides qualifying for the National Agriscience Fair as an eighth grader, Sean Michael was a proud FFA member and involved in student government, Youth for Safety, and the National Junior Honor Society, and was also a bronze Presidential Service Award winner for completing over 60 hours

of community service and maintaining honor roll the entire year. He also traveled to Washington, D.C., to attend the National FFA Washington Leaders Conference. Currently, Sean Michael is a ninth grader at Waipahu High School, the assistant treasurer of the ninth grade council, and a member of the Science Olympiad Team, Key Club, and Waipahu FFA. He is in the Academy of Natural Resources to pursue his dream job as an environmental scientist to create a more sustainable world in the future. Thank you.

"Mariah Pricella is a two-time National Agriscience qualifier, placing third in her first year and now first in her second year. As an eighth grader, she was involved in FFA, student council, Youth for Safety, National Junior Honor Society, and was a silver Presidential Service Award winner for completing over 80 hours of community service and maintaining honor roll the entire year. Currently, Mariah Pricella is a Senate representative for the ninth grade council and a member of the Science Olympiad Team and Waipahu FFA. "Colleagues and guests, as a personal aside, as the AEN committee chair, it's about time that we restore farming as a profession to the stature it once held in our country. In every

speech that I give to young people around the state, I remind them that farming is a noble profession, no less noble than being a doctor, lawyer, teacher, businessperson, or politician. I want to acknowledge the outstanding success of the FFA 'ohana and ask that they stand and be recognized—please, everyone stand. And for the record, I'd like to let you know that I'm proudly wearing my FFA tie today."

Thursday, February 6, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Kim and Taniguchi who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole introduced members of his staff, who were seated in the gallery: Jules Peleiholani, Kaila Kaawaloa, and Jaren Tengan. Senator Keohokalole also recognized his friend Rayne Cobb-Adams, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Kahele celebrated and recognized the fifteenth anniversary of the Legacy Land Conservation Program, and presented the following remarks:

“Colleagues, on behalf of the Hawai'i State Senate, we have the privilege and the honor this morning to recognize a fantastic program that this body created over 15 years ago called the Legacy Land Conservation Program, whose sole purpose and mission is to create a legacy of aloha 'āina for which all of our local communities are extremely grateful.

“The Hawaiian Islands are our home; it's the place we've grown up in, and I don't need to tell you that it's easily one of the most unique places in the United States of America, if not the entire world. There's a little over four-and-a-half million acres of beauty and lands throughout the Hawaiian Islands, and many of those lands, unfortunately, throughout the history of our islands, have suffered from land use and various forms of development, and, despite the regulation that this body has tried to implement, many of those important resources went often unprotected, inaccessible, and were threatened with damage and destruction.

“Fifteen years ago, in 2005, the Legislature took a look at how we can help protect these very special lands and unique places, and found that just a small portion of revenues that were being generated annually by the state were being dedicated to the preservation of these lands. Some of you were here in 2005, when the Land Conservation Fund was created and the Legacy Land Conservation Program, and since then, 15 years later, this program has protected over 21,000 acres of land across five islands. Among many other sites that the program has protected and provided grants to organizations to protect those lands that have immense cultural and historical value, as an example, are the Kuamo'o Battlefield and Burial Grounds in Kona. Additionally, the program has expanded the existing Pūpūkea Forest Reserve in northern O'ahu to over five times its original size, from fewer than 800 acres to over 4,000 acres. These are just two out of the nearly 40 sites that the Legacy Land Conservation Program has conserved and protected. Through these efforts, and with the help of public and private partners, the program continues to protect our agricultural, natural, and cultural resources, and preserve them for our keiki and generations to come.

“This morning, I'd like to recognize the following people who have helped make this program a success and who are joining us here today: the chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Suzanne Case; the administrator of the Division of Forestry and Wildlife, David Smith; and, finally, the current chair of the Legacy Land Conservation Commission, William 'Butch' Haase. Finally, I'd like to thank all the staff, volunteers, and supporters of the Legacy Land Conservation

Program, and, even though they are not here today, please join me in also congratulating them on reaching this fantastic milestone. Mahalo.”

The Chair then stated:

“Before calling for the recess, I would just offer a brief comment: One of the jobs the Senate President gets to perform is a review of the recommendation as to what projects or lands they're going to expend the money on, and the President and the Speaker review for approval the list, and I'm certainly very pleased with the work that has been done. I've had no objections to any of the recommendations, and maybe have not, like you said, said 'Thank you,' enough to the department and the commission, but I hope, by always approving what you've recommended, you understand that I've been appreciative of your work and supportive of your efforts, so thank you very much for what you do.”

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Go Red movement was started in 2004 to raise awareness and help women in different communities around the world facing this health threat to take action to lower their risk; the movement is also dedicated to closing gender gaps in research and STEM careers while improving access to care and advocating for change through public policy. Senator Baker thanked those on the Chamber floor who were wearing red to show their support, and introduced guests from the American Heart Association of Hawaii, who were seated in the gallery: Rick Bruno, board member, chief medical officer, and vice president for patient care; Lauren Rachel, Heart Walk business development director; Don Weisman, government relations director; and other supporters.

SIXTEENTH DAY

Monday, February 10, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Gabbard who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifteenth Day.

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, this week is Hawaiian Caucus Week: E Ala e Lāhui, a rising lāhui. As chair of the Senate Hawaiian Caucus, I'm proud to announce that this week, both the Senate and House will be recognizing community leaders who have contributed to the advancement of the Hawaiian community.

"We begin today by honoring a community organization dedicated to serving our 'ōpio, or youth. I'd now like to yield my time to my colleague from Hilo."

Senator Kahele commended the Kalihi Pālāma Culture & Arts Society, and presented the following remarks:

"E Ala e Lāhui, a lāhui rising, starts with our keiki, our 'ōpio, who will always be our future. This organization was created in 1972 for the purpose of providing education, training, and to provide much-needed services in the area of culture and the arts. The Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society, a nonprofit community-based organization whose primary target was for the underprivileged population residing in the Kalihi-Pālāma area, provides special projects throughout a statewide basis. Two such programs are the Queen Lili'uokalani Keiki Hula Competition and the Malia Craver Hula Kahiko Competition, which recognizes and highlights our 'ōpio in the art of Hawaiian dance, the hula. Created in 1976 and held at A'ala Park, which featured multi-ethnic dance performances, Hawaiian crafts, demonstrations, a pageant of Hawai'i's mō'i wāhine, and the first keiki hula competition, Kalihi-Pālāma's program coordinator, Kahu Wendell Silva, along with committee chairman and kumu hula legend, Hilo's own Uncle George Na'ope, envisioned a competition where children could share their achievements in hula while learning about Queen Lili'uokalani, her 'ohana, and Hawai'i's historical past. The Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society mission was to create an organization to perpetuate the Hawaiian culture through dance and, by doing so, teach a new generation to carry on the traditions of hula into the future; they were rising a lāhui. Now entering its 45th year, the Queen Lili'uokalani Keiki Hula Competition has estimated that over the course of its illustrious history, over 20,000 keiki have participated in and benefited from the organization's cultural events and programs.

"In 1986, the Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society took over sponsorship and, with Aunty Malia Craver and Mr. Earl Kawai, the Hawai'i Secondary Schools Hula Kahiko Competition was introduced. The purpose of the competition is to provide students to learn about the Hawaiian culture, receive hula training, share their skill and knowledge in ancient Hawaiian hula, and compete among their peers, again rising a lāhui.

"Another project was the documentation of 135 hula resources who revealed interesting stories of their hula lineage and philosophies. These interviews, along with photographs, were compiled into two large format books titled, *Nānā I Na Loea Hula (Look to the Hula Resources)*, both Volumes I and II.

"Today, the Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society offers classes at various locations in hula, Okinawan dance, Filipino dance, 'ukulele, and drama classes with the sole purpose of empowering and rising our 'ōpio.

"At this time, Mr. President, I'd like to yield my time to the colleague from Kalihi."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the privilege of introducing our honorees today. First, the founder of Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society, someone that I've known for a long time: Kahu Wendell Kalani Silva and his wife, Sharon Silva. Mr. President, both of them have served the community for 40-plus years. Together they are passionate about sharing their Native Hawaiian culture and heritage in a variety of unique, interesting ways, and they look forward to sharing with our 'ōpio. The president of Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society is Trisha Kehaulani Watson; and their vice president is none other than our fellow colleague, former Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland; and the executive director of Kalihi-Pālāma Culture & Arts Society, Guy Sabilla."

Senator Kahele rose to yield his time to the senator from Kāne'ohe to complete that morning's presentation.

Senator Keohokalole rose and stated:

"Well, I decided to cut the program a little bit short so our wonderful guests can enjoy the accolades that they are about to receive, but just to sum it up real quick because I'm terrible reading off of a piece of paper, this week is Hawaiian Caucus Week. Each day, we will be honoring a different segment of our community. We start today with this wonderful community organization that honors our youth; we'll also make presentations in honor of our mākuā, our kūpuna, the surrounding community that have helped rise the lāhui (as is our theme for this week), and we'll finally end with Hawaiian Caucus Day on Friday. We ask all the members in the Chamber and also in the gallery to join us in the morning on Friday, when we will be also honoring one of the distinguished ali'i trusts that's done so much for our community. So without further ado, thank you, and also thank you to the President and the Speaker for allowing this week to go on so that we can continue to honor the efforts of our Hawaiian community. Mahalo."

The Chair thanked the Hawaiian Caucus for its hard work.

Senator Taniguchi rose to share brief remarks about his good friend, Wendell Silva, noting that when he was in the State House of Representatives and served as the chair of the Committee on Culture and the Arts, he and Wendell did a lot of damage. Senator Taniguchi stated that Wendell is a great advocate for the arts and that he was glad to see him.

The Chair commented that Wendell Silva appears to adhere to the "walk softly and carry the big stick" school of management.

Senator English rose to share that Wendell Silva is family to him, and that he was Senator English's mother's date to the prom. Senator English was "hānai'd" by Wendell's mom and dad; they took care of him when he was a baby and he grew up with all of Wendell's brothers and sisters. Senator English considers them like his family and was very happy to see them.

At 11:50 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

ORDER OF THE DAY ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2414 (Gov. Msg. No. 507):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2414 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kahele and carried.

Senator Shimabukuro then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of TYLER I. GOMES as Deputy to the Chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022 (title amended to Deputy to the Chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands by Gov. Msg. No. 511), seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Tyler Gomes possesses an impressive display of experience for someone his age, which ranges from his education in Hawaiian language and his time working as a law clerk to his role as partnerships manager at Elemental. As a deputy public defender, he fought for the people of Hawai'i, ensuring that the laws were upheld, justice was done, and Hawai'i's most vulnerable citizens were protected.

"I'd like to quote some of Mr. Gomes' many supporters:

"Jim Murphy, executive director of Honolulu Habitat for Humanity, testified: 'I believe Tyler Gomes to be enthusiastically interested in providing systemic, lasting and positive change in DHHL's interaction in the communities. We currently have almost 20 families whose homes are either under construction or in the planning phase. All of them on DHHL land and all because of the partnership between our two agencies. With Tyler Gomes' leadership, I am confident our ability to serve more and support DHHL goals will be even greater.'

"Susan Arnett testified: 'I've known Tyler for almost ten years. Professionally, I've known him as a law clerk to Judge Dexter Del Rosario and as a respected colleague in the State Office of the Public Defender. I was impressed with his diligence and his commitment to his clients. He has a keen mind and demonstrated an ability to focus on the most important aspects of a case. He related easily with his clients who were from diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds. Tyler is an energetic member of our community who has continually worked to make things better for those who need assistance in a variety of ways.'

"Dr. Kamana'o pono Crabbe testified: 'Mr. Gomes has proven exceptional competency of systemic socio-political and cultural issues that continue to impact Native Hawaiians. His ability to assess such matters and implement actions through collaborative relationships and programs is a unique quality of character. He is an emerging leader within the Native Hawaiian community and familiar with controversial issues of land tenure, water rights, and the affordable housing crisis given his legal background and professional experience.'

"Colleagues, I'm confident that the combination of Tyler's unique legal background, his ingenuity, and his empathic ability will help him navigate the complex issues surrounding DHHL as well as aid him in crafting new and creative solutions to inspire improvement and development. I urge you to support his confirmation. And, Mr. President, I have additional comments I'd like to add to the Journal."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Shimabukuro's additional remarks read as follows:

"I would like to quote some of Mr. Gomes' many supporters.

"Rebecca Soon: 'I have known Mr. Gomes for 20 years as a classmate, colleague, consultant, community advocate, and friend. Throughout that time, he has consistently been put forward as a leader among his peers. He is an extremely hard worker, passionate about community, and naturally empowers those around him to fulfill their potential.'

"Jonathan Likeke Scheuer: 'In my interactions with him in the time he has been at DHHL, I have seen him bring his considerable intelligence and intuition to bear on complex issues. This is complimented by his calm and engaging demeanor, which is a great asset in dealing with this precious trust and obligation held by the people of Hawai'i.'"

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Gabbard).

Senator Shimabukuro introduced Deputy Tyler Gomes, who was accompanied in the gallery by his parents, Ed and Georgette Gomes; his husband, Blair Suzuki; and his sister Kaleimomi Gomes.

The Chair remarked:

"I know I got chastised by Senator Ihara for speaking too early where I'm not supposed to influence the vote from the rostrum, so I did want to say just two things to Tyler: One, I was impressed in watching the hearing that people who had come in with their minds made up changed their minds, and it's not easy to have someone who's felt they know you and did all of their homework and research come in and be willing to stand up and acknowledge that change, so you clearly brought a fresh perspective. And the second is, I hope you are given the opportunity to pursue some of these new ideas and that your energy that you bring is going to be supported and we will see the fruit borne by that energy, so congratulations."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2415 (Gov. Msg. No. 506):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2415 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ihara and carried.

Senator Shimabukuro then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of WILLIAM J. AILA as Chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, term to expire December 31, 2022 (title amended to Chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands by Gov. Msg. No. 510), seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, the final count of testimony received on time was 136 in support, 127 opposed. I subtracted state agencies from these numbers to give you a more accurate picture of the breakdown.

“I realize this has been a divisive confirmation process. In listening to the opposition, I realize their concerns are valid. However, much can be attributed to the lack of funding, resources, and land mass given to a department tasked with the impossible: righting a wrong done to an indigenous people over a hundred years ago.

“As one testifier aptly stated, it’s not Mr. Aila who he opposes, but rather the fact that the very government which illegally overthrew the Hawaiian kingdom is now in charge of choosing the person in charge of making reparations. In frustration, he told the committee, ‘If it was *me* who was appointed, I would oppose myself!’

“Based on my personal knowledge of William Aila’s character and longstanding commitment to serving his community, I stand with those who support his confirmation. His supporters include key leaders from across the state, including: from Hawai’i island, Puanani Woo and Edward Halealoha Ayau; from Maui, Kaleo Cullen, president of Ka Ohana O Kahikinui, and Randy Awo; from Kaua’i, Sherry Cummings Yokotake, Junedale Hashimoto, and Jade Haunani Pacheco; from Moloka’i, Glenn Teves and Lori Buchanan; from urban O’ahu, Puni Kekauoha and Esther Kia’aina; from Kapolei, Homelani Schaedel; from Wai’anae, Kapua Keliikoa-Kamai, Sharlette Poe, Poka Laenui, Carl Jellings, Sr., Lu Ann Faborito, Duane DeSoto, and Eric Enos; and from Nānākuli, Kamaki Kanahale, Paige Kapi’olani Barber, Cynthia Rezentes, and Shaena Hooihuli. In addition, leaders from the Hawaiian community supported Mr. Aila, including Kali Watson, Dr. Kamana’opono Crabbe, OHA Trustee Haunani Apoliona, Pono Shim, John Monis, Mahealani Cypher, Leialoha ‘Rocky’ Kaluhiwa, and many others.

“I would like to share some of Director Aila’s supporters’ mana’o with you:

“Kamaki Kanahale and Ivan Lui-Kwan submitted joint testimony, stating: ‘Kamaki Kanahale founded the [Sovereign Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations, or] SCHHA in 1987 and currently serves as Chair Emeritus of the SCHHA. The directors of the Hokupili Foundation are leaders of Hawaiian Home Lands community associations in Nanakuli and Waianae. As a beneficiary of the trust and resident in a Hawaiian Home Lands community, William is an inspirational role model for our haumana. His exceptional performance in significant leadership positions in the State of Hawaii serves as an inspiration for all beneficiaries of the trust, particularly our young people. . . He has excellent capacity, is fair and honest, and works well with people.’

“Pono Shim, president and CEO of Oahu Economic Development Board, testified: ‘Any leader asked to serve our Native Hawaiian Community at a Governmental level will sit in a seat with a gallery of support and disdain. To carry oneself with a commitment to the appointment of the seated responsibilities and to recognize the added silent missing of being a bridge to those in the seat of disdain is crucial for our Hawaii. William is a strong man and like my identified heroes, he is also a leader with a gentle spirit. He gets the best and most from his staff, he is serving the mission of the commission, and he has the presence to heal. I ask that you confirm his appointment.’

“Mahealani Cypher and Rocky Kaluhiwa testified: ‘The Ko’olaupoko Hawaiian Civic Club and Ko’olau Foundation are

two Native Hawaiian community organizations who have a long history of commitment to Hawaiian people. We humbly urge you to vote in favor of the appointments of William Aila and Tyler Gomes as director and deputy director of DHHL. They are a very good combination of experience and new skills that may help to move DHHL forward in the years ahead.’

“Edward Halealoha Ayau testified: ‘Despite serious disagreements with what I characterize as his mishandling of the Mauna Kea Access Road situation by denying beneficiaries such as myself the right of open consultation with the Hawaiian Homes Commission . . . I nonetheless support his confirmation because I know deep down inside William is a man of integrity. I base this opinion from having worked with him for about 15 years in the care and protection of iwi kūpuna and moepū during which time I came to know his na’au and he came to know mine. I recognize others may disagree with me, but when one works hand in hand to care for the ancestors, that is a bond not easily broken.’

“And Eric Enos testified: ‘I have worked along-side William Aila, Jr. and his extended ohana for most of my life in all issues pertaining to the care and protection of cultural sites, both in the Moku of Waianae and outwards. I know William very well from working in the trenches alongside him and his ohana. He works tirelessly, consistently, without regard to public recognition and willing to stand up for the long haul of ‘change we must’ to help correct the wrongs perpetrated against our indigenous people. Whether or not William Aila, Jr. is confirmed, or not confirmed, you will be stuck with a broken paddle needing fixing. A suggestion: whomever we finally put in the Chair of the Department of Hawaiian Homelands has an uphill, and perilous climb. Many trying to climb that wall, are stuck in rhetoric. Others, we must help to climb up, or we must send them rope down, or extra paddles. Hoe ka wa’a! In time of storm and strife, for us, William Aila, Jr. and his ohana nui was always there to lend a hand, or even help to step up and swing. We cannot listen just to those in the stands. We have come on to the bench, have a plan, and get out into the field and ‘Kanu ka ‘Aina.’

“During his tenure, Mr. Aila has begun diversifying lot offerings with products including turnkey homes, vacant lots, and preowned homes. Mr. Aila has also taken steps toward increasing the number of products available to beneficiaries while preparing to produce 1,300 lots over the next five years. Mr. Aila’s other accomplishments at DHHL include completing new administrative rules for planned community, multi-family complexes, and rental housing, which expand residential lease offerings and housing opportunities. These new administrative rules for rental housing are an integral part of the release of an RFP issued under the leadership of Mr. Aila to develop affordable rentals at 820 Isenberg Street in Mō’ili’ili. Given the greatest demand for rental leases on O’ahu, Mr. Aila worked to secure additional land on O’ahu suitable for residential development through the purchase of three parcels in Mō’ili’ili from Kamehameha Schools. Further, Mr. Aila was able to acquire 44 acres utilizing affordable housing credits near Wailuku, Maui, that have 137 turnkey homes and 24 vacant lots scheduled to become available following an EA.

“Mr. Aila is open to collaboration, and I have faith that he will lead DHHL well. I urge you to support his confirmation.”

Senator Ihara rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, thank you for appointing me to serve on the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs. It’s my first appointment to this committee in 34 years, and a timely one. So I’m relatively new to direct involvement on Hawaiian issues. If you bear with me, I’ll explain how I’ve come to decide my vote on G.M. 506.

“Last year, in 2018, I found the Hawaiian Homes confirmation process quite contentious and disturbing to me, and very confusing. It reminded me of the harsh and unforgiving sentiments heard on the national level.

“Besides my legislative experience, I’m fortunate to have long involvement in the national deliberative democracy field as a trustee of a mid-size foundation, and also as founder of several community-based nonprofit organizations.

“We’ve found that today’s live-TV, national civic education programming, led by our own President and Congress, is all about power and the difference between political values and civic values.

“In the advice and consent process of nominee Aila, I’ve learned a lot about power. Unpacking the perceived and felt power struggle between the leadership responsible for implementing the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act on one side and, on the other side, 50 percent Hawaiian homestead beneficiaries and those on and off the waitlist.

“I understand that Prince Kūhiō disagreed with several key provisions of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act—blood quantum and leasehold issues, to name a few—but made a political decision to consent to its passage. He used his nonvoting political power for what he believed was best for his Hawaiian people. To some, it might have been better to let this congressional bill die. Maybe so.

“As a foundation trustee myself, I view passage of this congressional Act as a political compromise to secure the votes needed, presumably by a majority vote that did not qualify for a single-senator’s filibuster and therefore two-thirds cloture vote. As a trusteeship matter, it’s an impractical situation with fundamental conflicts of interest baked into the Act. I believe a common aspiration for amending the Act among all concerned could lead to a sincere proposal to a future Congress, especially a receptive U.S. Senate.

“Our federal constitution sets forth the governing structure for the awesome power of government. In America, we have a representative form of government, with a populace wishing it was a more citizen-centered, deliberative democracy. Current U.S. democracy gives ‘we the people’ the right to elect representatives who are endowed with two very special powers: One, the executive and congress, or, in our case, governor and legislature, have the power to **deem** what is best for the nation or state. Right or wrong, good or bad, we delegate the power to chart our future to those we elect. The second special power is called ‘the ends justifies the means’. Within the bounds of the Constitution, our elected leaders can and sometimes must do whatever it takes to accomplish what is deemed best for ‘the people’. Combined, these are superpowers that elected officials have to direct the use of government’s vast civic resources.

“While I’m at it, I’ll mention the other two civic resource groups in any community: tax-exempt financial assets held by the philanthropy community, and the human resources organized by nonprofit organizations. I don’t initially count business philanthropy because of its private economic interests, though it often organizes effective civic efforts.

“I mention the three civic sectors because, combined, they can be trusted to use our community’s resources, our civic resources, and power for civic purposes. I call it a civic north star, not to be confused with the political north star of private interest. The nation recently learned that re-election of a public official is a private interest and not a civic purpose. With new public awareness, voters have begun to track the actions of elected officials to evaluate whether they are guided by the civic or political north star.

“Even when what’s deemed good is consistent with our values, there’s often controversy over how power is used. I believe in the compassionate use of power. I believe in the use of power for civic purposes. I believe today’s unmooring of traditional civic platforms has taught us much about power.

“I believe current powerholders should own their power, which is awesome, a light for good, but also a source of unintended harms to the lives of individuals caught in the crush. The U.S. Government has been known to have done many bad deeds in our history. In the relationship of power vis-a-vis ‘the people,’ it feels like power is always right because power always wins. But political power can be wrong. I’ve seen 13 votes in this Senate change from time to time, and it doesn’t mean that one majority is better than the other; it simply means that the current majority gets what it wants for now.

“Kettering Foundation president David Mathews proposes a new way of democracy. Besides Lincoln’s ‘of, by, and for the people,’ he suggests ‘with’: a relationship **with** the people. I believe a **with** relationship starts with power kneeling to the people. Power is so powerful, it is able to accept, validate, and appreciate criticism, even from adversaries. And it is power’s responsibility to ensure civic spaces are safe from disrespect, diminishment, bullying, and indignities to our humanity.

“With this background, I entered the scene of the Hawaiian Homes Commission chair confirmation process this session. I assessed that unpacking layers of very stuck reality in this domain may take too long, so I took a riskier truth-telling route. Besides the interim commission and department chair, I saw the chair of the Sovereign Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations as representing the main adversary and threat to the chair’s perceived power. Of course, there is no threat because power always wins, but it always feels threatening to powerholders at first.

“I believe the nominee has matured in his use of power. He is able to deploy power with compassion. The interim chair has accepted responsibility for the experience of Hawaiian Homes beneficiaries resulting from his actions. It’s his job to hear people who feel invisible. I find the nominee is capable of hearing criticism from adversaries in the adversaries’ context, hearing their truth as experienced in their reality.

“I had several separate and profound discussions with both the nominee and the perceived arch-adversary. Both love Hawai‘i and the Hawaiian people, and both seem to accept the situation at hand. I call it ‘accepting the cards we’re dealt with.’

“Both stand for upholding the dignity and respect of each person involved with the commission and department. At a dinner two weeks ago, the three of us started on a journey of respect that includes vigorous disagreement at times.

“I believe the nominee, William Aila, will endeavor to walk the talk of respect and appreciation of criticism—maybe not agreement, but at least appreciation—even when difficult. I am joining their journey, which is similar to many I’ve experienced with our current governor.

“Mr. President, little did I know what your appointment of me to the Hawaiian Affairs committee would lead to. It’s been quite a ride. I see extraordinary, loving, and committed people and Hawaiians involved with the Hawaiian Homes Commission. Thank you.”

The Chair responded:

“Thank you. I offer no comment on the choice you’re making, but I certainly appreciate the effort and due diligence you’ve put into your responsibility as a member of the committee, and, should Chair Aila be confirmed, I know that you, by putting yourself out there today with the remarks you

gave, are going to have people turning to you to help make sure that the words you spoke today are the actions going forward.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“I sat here this morning; I wasn’t going to say anything. I rushed in from an event to be here. I wanted to show that Governor’s Message 507, that I was willing to give Mr. Gomes a chance in his position. Doing my research in his capabilities and what he can do because everybody asks me, ‘If it’s not William Aila, who?’ I understand Mr. Gomes is young, but we need new and different things that we need for our Hawaiian people.

“Like I said, I wasn’t going to get up, but I just want to give a little history lesson, fellow colleagues. Last session, when Jobie and Mr. Aila were walking around to get support for the two of them as a team, a lot of people had voiced their opinion to our governor, including myself, and then Jobie went away. Then we proceeded into putting Mr. Aila through, and I had talked to some of my colleagues here and my staff that, when Mr. Aila gets confirmed, he will hire Jobie. A lot of senators here, I know, you guys had the opposition to Jobie being the leader of Hawaiian Homes. You had your issues, and you were willing to give Mr. Aila a chance. And so did I, even though I voted ‘no.’ When Jobie had been hired by, at that time, the deputy or acting director of Hawaiian Homes, it already made my decision from then. We knew the leader of the Hawaiian people, State of Hawai‘i, was not going to go in the direction that we needed to, and everything fell into place. Instead of having him lead, like how we’re hearing today of his great leadership, he did not. He did not lead; he **enforced**. There’s a difference. We heard the word ‘bullying,’ that leadership and power usually prevail. Well, every single homestead on this island, every single homestead, maybe a few exceptions on the homestead, is in opposition to this nominee. We have a lot of people out there voicing their opinion and being opinionated to this nominee. Like I said, I came to show my support and my change of heart to Mr. Gomes, but I cannot change my vote and the way I feel today because of what had happened in the last year under the leadership of Mr. Aila.

“We’re not going to blame him for all the things that happened previously, but the proof is in the pudding of what had happened on Mauna Kea. I asked him, before I asked Suzanne Case at DLNR, and I asked other people that were involved. I asked him point-blank, ‘Who was responsible for the arrests of the kūpuna on Mauna Kea?’ He said it wasn’t him. Took him for his word for it, so, again, I approached another person, and that was Suzanne Case. She said it was a collaborative effort from all of the people on Mauna Kea. But the lead on Mauna Kea, like jurisdiction, is Hawaiian Homes. Again, the nominee had them be part of the arrests instead of being part of the solution because as a leader of this state, and of the Hawaiian people, he should have went there and ho‘oponopono with them before the arrests of our kūpuna. Then he was asked, when I went to a Hawaiian Homes meeting in Big Island, ‘Who took down the shack that was up there on the Mauna?’ He took responsibility. I asked him how many commissioners—because the commissioners, he said, he answers to. He answers to the commissioners. So I asked most of the commissioners, found out he only talked to two commissioners on the phone. There was no beneficiary letter, nothing to move forward, nothing to let the beneficiaries know what he was doing or letting the other commissioners know.

“So as I sit here and I hear a lot of things—like I told him and I told a lot of people here, I have nothing personal against Mr. Aila, but if we’re going to go forward and having something to grow on and having things better for our Hawaiian people, we need to have change. And you all know here that I’m all about giving people second chances and believing in people

that they can do the job. Well, he had his second chance to prove to me this whole year, coming to where we are today, that he could lead with a soft hand, not a fist. And that’s what he proved me, that he went in that direction because that’s the only direction that he knows, and he came down as a little ball coming down the hill, like the snowball effect, and it got bigger. Yes, not everything is his fault, but he could’ve made the change the day he got confirmed to be the acting director from the governor, and not hire Jobie to work with him at Hawaiian Homes. And there are other things that he has done under his administration since he took over that’s not going well with the Hawaiian people on the homesteads, especially in Kapolei. Yeah, we had a few people from the homestead, Kamaki and all these others who support, but the other part of Kamaki that helped run his SCHHA, Robin Danner, is opposed. And that’s who our senator had dinner with, with Mr. Aila, because Senator told me that he was going to do that and he was going to get his purview into his investigation. Same thing I told all the senators here, but I silently give him a chance, an opportunity, to show that he can be the great leader that he was when he was at DLNR in the beginning of DLNR, and how he used to fight tooth and nail for his Hawaiian people and the land where he lived. So we all know him for that, but things have changed, things went in different directions. I don’t know why; I never asked him that point-blank, but today, I sit here, representing all of my family and all of my Hawaiian community. I cannot sit here and I cannot vote ‘yes’ for William Aila. So my vote for him will be ‘no’ today on the floor.

“I had a lot of other things to say, but because of time, I’m going to yield myself, Senate President, but I’m just saying I cannot vote ‘yes’ because the proof is in the pudding. If he never have put Jobie in, to me—I had phone calls from you guys, a lot of you guys, after he hired Jobie, and this is the words exactly was from my fellow senators in this chamber, ‘Wow, it’s a slap in all our faces.’ And I’ll leave it at that. Mahalo.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella’s additional remarks read as follows:

“A major concern was whether significant changes would be made by the Interim Director. Instead, the Interim Director hired, as a consultant, his prior superior, Jobie Masagatani.

“Also, on December 16, 2019, at the December Hawaiian Home Lands Commission meeting, the Commission was given a few questions. Interim Chair Aila responded by saying he will answer these questions in writing and will post his replies on the dhhl.hawaii.gov website. He never did. So, another e-mail was sent to him on December 24, 2019, about the December 16 meeting and requesting a reply. Such a reply has never been received. Here are the questions raised in the Christmas Eve e-mail:

“1. There appear to be many things happening with regard to DHHL leases such as the recent lease extension granted to Catholic Charities. Was a letter sent out to DHHL beneficiaries on the lease extension to Catholic Charities. How many Commissioners voted on this extension, and who were the ones who voted in favor? How many Commissioners are needed for a quorum? Per the Sunshine Law, when did this public meeting take place?

“2. Does the Leihoku/Lualualei lease allow industrial waste to be dumped and stored on the property? Was a letter sent out to inform beneficiaries about this property? How many Commissioners voted to allow this industrial lease, and who were the Commissioners who voted in favor? How many Commissioners are needed for a quorum? Per the Sunshine Law, when was this public meeting held?

"3. The removal of the Ahu and the library on Mauna Kea: Are the minutes of the meeting that took place to decide on the removal of the Ahu and the library on Mauna Kea available to the beneficiaries and the public? Who authorized the machines on the Mauna? Where are copies of the demolition and disposal permits available to the beneficiaries and to the public? What about the destruction to the lava field by the truck equipment? How many Commissioners voted to remove the Ahu and the library, and who were they? Per the Sunshine Law, when did this public meeting take place?"

"4. The arrest of the Kupuna on Mauna Kea: Where are the minutes of the meeting that took place to decide on the arrest of the Kupuna on Mauna Kea? Where are copies of the letter, if any, sent to the beneficiaries with regard to the decision to arrest the Kupuna? How many Commissioners voted to arrest the Kupuna? Who were they? Per the Sunshine Law, when did this public meeting take place?"

"5. The lease to Canadians to build a solar farm on 300 acres of DHHL land: When did the Commissioners decide the property was not suitable for homesteading? Which of the Commissioners is qualified to determine that the property was unsuitable? Where available are the minutes of the meeting to authorize the lease of 300 acres to Canadians to Canadians, and who were the Commissioners in favor? How many Commissioners are needed for a quorum? Per the Sunshine Law, when did this public meeting take place?"

"6. At the August Legislative Informational Briefing, Interim Chair Aila stated that the Commissioners were consulted and decided on all of the issues listed above. How many Commissioners are needed to decide on and approve Board actions?"

The Chair clarified that he believed Senator Shimabukuro's reference to "Esther Kia'aina of Nānākuli" in her floor remarks should be corrected to "Esther Kia'aina of the Waimanalo area."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 3 (English, Fevella, Kahele). Excused, 1 (Gabbard).

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro introduced Chair William J. Aila, who was present in the gallery with his wife, Melva Aila; sister-in-law Minerva Ka'ilikea; former Office of Hawaiian Affairs Chair and Trustee Haunani Apoliona; Jobie Masagatani; Attorney General Clare Connors; directors and staff supporters from various state departments and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands; and other supporters.

At 12:33 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:42 p.m.

Tuesday, February 11, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Ihara who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Sixteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro commended Mālia Ka'aihue and Duane DeSoto, and presented the following remarks:

"A strong part of the Hawaiian culture is 'ohana, the Hawaiian word for 'family.' The concept emphasizes that families are bound together, and members must cooperate and remember one another. 'Ohana extends beyond the core family to include blood-related, and can also be used informally, such as with close friends to the family or within an organization. Once in an 'ohana, it is a give-and-take relationship among the members, whether past, present, or future. This is part of the responsibilities and obligations of the makua, or parent: a big part of that kuleana, that responsibility, is to take care of the 'ohana. A lāhui rising and its foundation is formed by the makua generation. We take great pride in recognizing outstanding individuals who have demonstrated a strong commitment to the betterment of our society and who help to shape the lives of others through their ability to excel in their respective fields. These two individuals we honor today continue to take care of their 'ohana—their children, family members within the circle and out.

"Duane DeSoto excelled in surfing at a very young age and became a water sportsman, taking on championships and creating records in the sport of surfing. He most recently sailed aboard the *Hōkūle'a* on a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to participate in a four-year-long initiative to circumnavigate the globe by non-instrument navigation. He sailed from Aotearoa to Australia, across the Tasman Sea, along with the crew led by master navigator Bruce Blankenfeld. A devoted family man, Duane is now working to support the next generation of local and Native Hawaiian youth to build a deep and abiding passion for the sea through his nonprofit, Nā Kama Kai, or Children of the Sea, which works to empower youth by creating, conducting, and supporting ocean-based programs, specifically targeting ocean safety and conservation awareness in order to increase the capacity of youth in the community through Hawaiian values, culture, and environmental education.

"Mālia Ka'aihue is the president of DTL, a Hawaiian strategy studio she founded in 2014. Using her expertise in Hawaiian history, politics, and language, Mālia develops and executes strategies that are culturally appropriate, community-minded, and relevant to her clients. Mālia previously worked for WCIT Architecture, Pacific Basin Communications, and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. She attended the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, where she received a bachelor's degree in Hawaiian studies and language as well as a master's and doctorate degree in political science. Currently, she serves as a board member for the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, Reach the Runway, Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenuē, and Nā Kama Kai, an ocean-safety nonprofit she founded with her husband in 2008. Together with her husband, Duane, they have eight children: Laura, Micah, Keanuē, Puamakamae, Kala, Hokuwelo, Honua, and Wailana.

"With all of these challenges in today's world, their value to mālama their 'ohana, caring for their kūpuna, who once cared

for them, providing shelter for their 'ohana, they sought to understand the difficulty and importance of an education. They shared the mana'o to work hard and get ahead; they helped their children to start their own business and excel in school and in life.

"It is in the malama of Kā'elo and the rising of the Lā'au Kū Kahi, this 11th day of February 2020, that we commend Duane DeSoto and Mālia Ka'aihue for working hard at being a makua, for teaching those Hawaiian values as you raise your lāhui. Duane and Mālia, can you please stand? My esteemed colleagues, please help me to honor and congratulate these two individuals for being inspiring parents. Mahalo."

At this time, Jacob Ka'ōmakaokalā Aki shared an oli with the members of the Senate and guests.

EIGHTEENTH DAY

Wednesday, February 12, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Harimoto who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Seventeenth Day.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole commended Melody Kapilialoha MacKenzie, and presented the following remarks:

“On this third day of Hawaiian Caucus Week, I'm proud to honor an individual who has committed her career to advocating for Native Hawaiian families and issues. Melody Kapilialoha MacKenzie is a professor of law at the William S. Richardson School of Law, and is also the founding director of the Ka Huli Ao Center for Excellence in Native Hawaiian Law. After receiving her law degree as a member of the first class of the University of Hawai'i law school, she served as a law clerk to Chief Justice William S. Richardson of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. In 1980, she joined the staff of the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, eventually serving as senior staff attorney and executive director, and is also well-known for her work as the principal author of the *Native Hawaiian Rights Handbook* and the 1,400-page *Native Hawaiian Law: A Treatise*, the definitive resource for understanding the critical legal issues affecting the Native Hawaiian community. In 2005, she was instrumental in creating the Ka Huli Ao Center for Excellence in Native Hawaiian Law, an academic center that promotes education, scholarship, community outreach, and collaboration on issues of law, culture, and justice for Native Hawaiians and other Pacific and indigenous peoples.

“While often soft-spoken and reserved (for example, she was initially upset, very upset, when she found out that she would be honored here individually in both chambers of the Hawai'i State Legislature), her humble nature betrays the fact that she has had a giant impact on the lāhui. Instead, she lets her work speak for herself and truly embodies the Hawaiian value of ha'aha'a, or humility. The only regrettable outcome of this admirable quality is that the community might never fully come to know and appreciate how important an impact she has had on the lāhui and the pae 'āina. For nearly every significant Hawaiian issue over the last 40 years, Professor MacKenzie has been involved as an advocate, a counselor, a mentor, or even a recruiter. For example, when the Kaho'olawe landings took place by Hawaiian activists in 1976, she helped recruit young attorneys—including a young Hawaiian attorney named John Waihe'e—to defend the activists who were arrested and jailed during those landings. Her quality of service without seeking the limelight deserves recognition because it highlights a path that is often not pursued in this current climate of self-congratulation and -promotion. So today, we take this opportunity to thank her for a lifetime of service, and congratulate her and wish her well in future endeavors. Professor MacKenzie, please rise and be recognized by the Hawai'i State Senate.

“Mr. President, also joining her in the gallery are her 'ohana: husband Lawrence Araki, sister Irene Hi'ilei Chung, nephew David Keali'i MacKenzie, and niece Beth Ku'uleimaile MacKenzie, also cousin Lori MacKenzie. And also from the University of Hawai'i's William S. Richardson School of Law, we have Dean Avi Soifer, and from the Ka Huli Ao Center for Excellence in Native Hawaiian Law, we have Kapua Sproat, director; Susan Serrano, associate director; as well as legal

fellows Mahina Tuteur, Letani Peltier, U'ilani Tanigawa Lum, Ku'upuamae'ole Kiyuna, and Sabrina Gramberg. Members, can we please give them a round of applause? Also hiding in the crowd over there is Max Sword—why don't you stand up and be recognized? Mr. President, thank you.”

The Chair commented that, based on Senator Keohokalole's remarks, Melody MacKenzie is much more comfortable when she's in charge. Also, when the Chair walked in and congratulated her that morning, she shared that she was very nervous that morning, and he found it interesting that, with all of her accomplishments, this would make her nervous.

Senator Ihara rose to share brief, spontaneous remarks about the honoree, noting that he met Melody during the Constitutional Convention of 1978, and what a time it was. It was the birth of a whole generation of political leaders, civic leaders, attorneys, and scholars, and Senator Ihara wanted to acknowledge Melody for being a key player in nurturing that social ecosystem and community that we see flourishing today with high ethical standards, guided by what's best for all of us and rooted in our culture here in Hawai'i.

At 11:40 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

NINETEENTH DAY

Thursday, February 13, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Harimoto and Kahele who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Eighteenth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads recognized former State Senator Dante Carpenter, who was present in the gallery, and extended an additional welcome to his friend, a farmer from O'ahu.

Senator Keohokalole celebrated the 200th anniversary of Christianity in Hawai'i, and presented the following remarks:

"Today, on this fourth day of Hawaiian Caucus Week, we honor organizations outside of the Hawaiian community who have made a major impact on this place and our native people. So today I'm privileged to honor the 200th anniversary of Christianity in Hawai'i.

"In 2013, Act 28 was created and designates the month of February as 'Ōlelo Hawai'i month to celebrate and encourage the use of Hawaiian language. 'Ōlelo Hawai'i is both the indigenous language and official language of the State of Hawai'i as recognized by our state constitution. And because of the group being honored today that came to the islands nearly 200 years ago, we have a written Hawaiian language, and because of them as well, Hawaiians were at one point the most literate nation on the planet. Also deserving recognition is the kahuna nui Hewahewa, who was a religious leader, sage, oracle, and kahuna who served under Kamehameha I and II, and was particularly responsible and influential in charting a path that allowed the missionaries to come and spread Christianity throughout the State of Hawai'i.

"The first missionaries arrived in Hawai'i on March 30, 1820, and sailed aboard a ship called the *Thaddeus*. They built churches and soon taught Hawaiians to read and write. They brought a printing press to Hawai'i to print Hawaiian-language Bibles, books, and newspapers. They also opened schools for adult Hawaiians and ali'i children, and the ali'i soon embraced Christianity and allowed the rest of the kingdom to convert as well. So today we applaud and recognize some of the original missionaries who had such a profound impact on our state and our culture: Hiram Bingham, Betsey Stockton, and Lorenzo Lyons, who gave of themselves to share the Lord with the Hawaiian community.

"Mr. President, at this time, may I please yield my time to my colleague from Waikiki?"

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

"Reverend Hiram Bingham was born in Bennington, Vermont, in 1789. He was ordained on September 29, 1819, the same date he met Sybil Moseley. The two were married 13 days later, and departed from Boston on October 23, 1819, as part of the first company of missionaries sent to Hawai'i by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions.

"Reverend Bingham was the leader of the mission from 1819 to 1840 and a masterful translator. When the missionaries began to translate the Bible in 1826, they divided into three teams, each composed of a classically trained missionary and one or two leading Hawaiian scholars of the day. Reverend Bingham was one of the most important of the missionary translators.

One of Reverend Bingham's last efforts in Hawai'i was one of the most enduring: laying the foundation of Kawaiaha'o Church in Honolulu in 1836, at which Hawaiian kings, including Kamehameha III, worshiped. It's today regarded as sort of the 'St. Peter's Basilica' of Hawai'i. The Bingham family left the islands in 1840 due to Sybil's ill health. Reverend Bingham's work through our Baibala Hemolele project, sharing the Gospel in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i throughout Hawai'i.

"Our first honoree is no stranger to this building. Peter Young was born and raised on O'ahu. He served as deputy managing director of Hawai'i Island County and as director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. He now operates Ho'okuleana, a real estate planning and consulting firm. Peter is the great-great-great-grandson of Hiram and Sybil Bingham; Hiram led the first company of missionaries to the islands, arriving in 1820. Peter serves as president of the board of directors of the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society, operating as Hawaiian Mission Houses Historic Site and Archives. Please help me in congratulating our honoree, Peter Young.

"Our next honoree is the director of development for Hawaiian Mission Houses, and is part of the executive team that is leading Hawaiian Mission Houses as it starts 2020, the 200th anniversary of the organization's founding. Elizabeth Lentz-Hill grew up in Kailua before her family moved to the continent when she was in high school. Ms. Lentz-Hill has been an artist, educator, and nonprofit administrator for over 20 years. She established an extensive professional contemporary dance career and toured France, Mexico, Brazil, and the United States with numerous dance companies. Most recently, she was a tenured professor of dance at the University of Southern Mississippi, serving as chair of both the dance and the theater departments in her final year. Ms. Lentz-Hill returned to the islands in 2018, teaching at Assets School for one year before being appointed director of development for Hawaiian Mission Houses. Since joining the organization, Ms. Lentz-Hill has loved relearning her own history as an Alexander, Bond, Bishop, and Baldwin missionary descendant, as well as sharing the stories of the vibrant programming and research being done at Hawaiian Mission Houses with the larger Hawai'i and national communities. Please help me in congratulating our honoree today, Elizabeth Lentz-Hill.

"Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Puna?"

Senator Ruderman rose to present the following remarks:

"Betsey Stockton is one of the most remarkable of any of the missionaries to Hawai'i. Stockton was born an enslaved person, probably in 1798, in the household of a politically prominent family in New Jersey. In the years preceding her own emancipation, Stockton spent much of her time educating herself, becoming not just literate but committed to learning and teaching. Stockton often spoke of wanting to journey abroad on a Christian mission, and when introduced to Charles Stewart, a newly ordained young missionary, she decided to join him and others in the second company of American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions missionaries to Hawai'i. The company left New Haven, Connecticut, on November 19, 1822, arriving first in Honolulu on May 10, 1823, and then continuing to Maui. It was there, in what is now Lahainaluna, that Stockton opened and led a school for the maka'āinana, which was the first of its kind on Maui and probably the first in all Hawai'i.

"Betsy carried out her work with relentless faith in herself and in the possibilities of the Hawaiians. After only two and a

half years in Hawai'i, Stockton chose to return to the United States with the Stewart family when Mrs. Stewart became ill. Stockton's life followed a remarkable trajectory from slavery to freedom, from Princeton to the Pacific and back again. Betsey Stockton's work through her emphasis on education as a means of empowerment. May we all strive to hold our sense of faith and of hope as tightly as Betsy did, and to share them freely with so many, as she did.

"Our third honoree today, Reverend Dr. George W. Scott, and his years of ministry in Hawai'i have been well-connected with the roots of the missionaries and Christianity, and have been foundational in helping him understand the history and culture of Hawai'i as well as respecting the delicate balance of the diverse faith traditions and its people. Reverend Scott is an ordained United Church of Christ minister, and is blessed to have had the Reverend Abraham Akaka as a mentor. He was an associate minister with Central Union Church for 25 years and has been a chaplain, counselor, and football coach with Punahou School since 2005. He recently taught a chaplaincy course at Yale Divinity School. Originally from Detroit, Michigan, the Reverend Dr. George W. Scott arrived in Hawai'i in 1989 for a one-year Interfaith Ministries chaplain residency program. He fell in love with Hawai'i and with a local girl and has been here ever since, together raising their four children. Please help me in congratulating our honoree today, Reverend Dr. George W. Scott.

"Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Hawai'i Kai?"

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Reverend Lorenzo Lyons was born in Colrain, Massachusetts, on April 18, 1807. In 1834, at the age of 24, he married Betsy Curtis in September, was ordained in October, and left in November from New Bedford, Massachusetts, with his new wife as part of the fifth company of American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions missionaries to Hawai'i. Reverend Lyons' base was at 'Imiola Church in Waimea on Hawai'i island. His first wife died within their first few years at the mission, and Reverend Lyons married a second time, to Lucia Garratt Smith. Unlike many of their missionary colleagues, Reverend and Mrs. Lyons lived the rest of their lives in Hawai'i, and on June 6, 1851, Reverend Lyons became a naturalized Hawaiian citizen.

"A prolific letter writer, Reverend Lyons was known for his love of 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, once writing, 'Long live the grand old, sonorous, poetical Hawaiian language.' Reverend Lyons is remembered for translating and writing over 600 hymns in his *Buke Himeni Hawaii*, and was known as the Haku Mele, or Bard of Hawai'i. Often referred to by his Hawaiian name, Makua Laiana, Reverend Lyons is perhaps most famous for writing Hawai'i's beloved song 'Hawai'i Aloha.'

"Nola Nāhulu connects with Reverend Lyons' work through the joy and connection music brings to all humans. Nola is a Hawaiian choral conductor; the artistic director for the Hawai'i Youth Opera Chorus, the Kawaiiaha'o Church Choir, Kawaiolanāpukanileo (an a cappella Hawaiian choral ensemble); a teacher and a lecturer at UH Mānoa. Additionally, she runs Bete Mu'u, a dress manufacturer in Hawai'i. Nola has served on many community boards and received many awards and accolades for her passion for music. Please help me in congratulating our honoree today, Nola Nāhulu.

"So, on this fourth day of Hawaiian Caucus Week, we stand with all the Hawaiians and celebrate the 200th anniversary of Christianity in Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. President."

TWENTIETH DAY

Friday, February 14, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators English, Fevella, Harimoto, Kahele, Nishihara, and Ruderman who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

Senator Rhoads introduced his legislative intern Alan Muneoka, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Gabbard welcomed a group of students from the Health Policy, Politics, and Law class at the University of Hawai'i West O'ahu, who were seated in the gallery with their professor, Dr. Ricardo Custodio: Ashley T. Enanoria, Ayuko Takabayashi, Brooklyn R. Dela Cruz, Cheri K. Comparan, Jane Sherisse A. Coloma, Jared A. Puyot, Kaira L. Spencer, Kiana P. Akana, Kyla G. Saguccio, Mutiatani K. Tulifua, Precious M. Ventura, Roseanne A. Borromeo, and Tiffany S. Sanchez.

Senator Moriwiki introduced her legislative intern Sky Chun-Matsukawa, a proud graduate of Kamehameha Schools, who currently attends the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Senator Riviere acknowledged his legislative aide Mark Clemente, a graduate of Kamehameha Schools, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Kanuha recognized Iokepa Command and Marlene Sai, members of his office staff who had also graduated from Kamehameha Schools.

Senator Kanuha then honored and recognized Kamehameha Schools, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, as you know, February is 'Ōlelo Hawai'i month, and this week, members of the Native Hawaiian Caucus honored members of our community who have made a difference in our Lāhui Rising. We celebrated two ali'i birthdays this past Sunday: King Kamehameha IV (Alexander 'Iolani Liholiho) and Princess Ruth Ke'elikōlani. Both ali'i were very instrumental in advancing the Hawaiian people, and were strong advocates for the use of 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. Princess Ruth Ke'elikōlani, primary heir to the Kamehameha family, eventually became the landholder of what will become the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Estate, which funds the Kamehameha Schools.

"Today, Kamehameha Schools is a private charitable educational trust endowed by the will of Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, the great-granddaughter and last descendant of King Kamehameha I. During her lifetime, Princess Pauahi witnessed the rapid decline of the Hawaiian population. The princess knew that education would be key to the survival of her people. Therefore, she left 375,569 acres of ancestral land to the children of Hawai'i, which comprises approximately 9 percent of the total land mass of the state. Princess Pauahi instructed the trustees of her estate to erect and maintain in the Hawaiian Islands two schools, one for boys and one for girls, to be known as the Kamehameha Schools.

"The mission of the Kamehameha Schools is to improve the capability and well-being of Hawaiians through education. Its mission is to operate an educational system serving over 6,900 students of Native Hawaiian ancestry at K-12 campuses on O'ahu, Maui, and Hawai'i island, and at 30 preschool sites statewide. Throughout our community, the Kamehameha Schools serves over 40,000 additional learners annually through a range of interdisciplinary programs and community projects. Such efforts include community charter schools and literacy enhancement programs for public school children, thus making Kamehameha Schools the largest private contributor to the public school system in Hawai'i. Among its many outreach efforts, Kamehameha Schools offers scholarships to preschool, K-12, and post-high school students—which I'm a proud beneficiary of, so again, mahalo, Kamehameha Schools, for providing me with that education—enabling Hawaiian learners to attend the educational institutions outside of the Kamehameha Schools system. In terms of financing, approximately 98 percent of the support for their educational programs comes from Kamehameha Schools' endowment fund, of which two-thirds comprises a globally diversified financial assets portfolio; the remaining one-third of the fund comprises revenue from retail, hotel, industrial, and office properties throughout Hawai'i.

"As we look toward the future, Kamehameha Schools' strategic plan guides their commitment to education and long-term stewardship in the State of Hawai'i, including countless opportunities to broaden and develop a thriving lāhui, where learners can achieve postsecondary educational success, building the foundation for purposeful career choices and a meaningful life. It is the vision of Kamehameha Schools that these learners will become leaders who contribute to their communities at the local, state, and national levels while staying grounded in the Protestant Christian and Native Hawaiian values. Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Mililani?"

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"In accordance with the will of Bernice Pauahi Bishop, the governance of Kamehameha Schools rests with a board of trustees. The board of trustees provides the strategic direction and focus necessary to fulfill and sustain the vision, mission, and values of Kamehameha Schools. Composed of five individuals equally vested with the responsibility and duty of collectively carrying out the testamentary will of Bernice Pauahi Bishop, the sole purpose of the board is to set policy. In accordance with Kamehameha's organizational structure, the day-to-day management of the institution rests with a board-appointed chief executive officer and his or her chosen managerial staff.

"Honorees, please stand when I call your name: Trustee Lance Keawe Wilhelm, chairman of the board. Trustee Wilhelm is the president and founder of the Wilhelm Group, a full-service development consultancy and construction management

firm. Previously, Trustee Wilhelm worked for Irongate and Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. He serves on various industry and trade organizations, is active in the construction and real estate development industries, serves as a board member for several nonprofit organizations, and serves as trustee on several union trust funds.

“Next, Trustee Elliot Kawaiho’olana Mills, the secretary/treasurer of the Kamehameha Schools. He has worked in Hawai’i’s travel industry for more than 25 years, holding executive and resort management positions on various islands with brands such as Disney Resort, Marriott, Hyatt, and Outrigger. He also serves on several boards.

“Next, Livingston ‘Jack’ Wong is the chief executive officer for Kamehameha Schools. He joined the Kamehameha Schools family in 1997 as senior counsel, then director of the Endowment Legal Division. Prior to joining Kamehameha Schools, Jack represented international, national, and local businesses, financial institutions, and landowners in the areas of real estate, finance, and business association. Please help me in congratulating these honorees today from Kamehameha Schools.

“And in our gallery today we also have staff, family, friends, and alumni from Kamehameha Schools; will you all please stand to be recognized? Mr. President, may I also submit a list of names and their affiliation to be entered into the Journal?” (The Chair so ordered.)

Senator Kidani continued:

“In the will of Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, she stated that she wanted to ‘make good and industrious men and women.’ To the many alumni who have become good and industrious men and women, we thank our ali’i, current and past trustees, employees, teachers, land managers, and all who have assisted in helping a Lāhui Rising. May we leave you with our small ho’okupu from the Hawaiian Caucus and the alumni who work in the building—mahalo piha!”

At this time, Jacob Ka’ōmakaokalā Aki shared an oli with the members of the Senate and guests, followed by an oli by the

Kamehameha Schools alumni and students who were present in the gallery.

Senator Ihara rose and stated:

“Mr. President, I have remarks in support of our honoree. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to acknowledge Kamehameha Schools for sharing responsibility for the health and wellbeing of our civic life in Hawai’i. They don’t have to do this; they have their mission. And they nonetheless have taken on responsibility for sharing in the wellbeing of our civic life; thank you very much. They’re among the leaders nationally that are setting this trend. I believe from the Joint House-Senate-Executive Legislative Package, leaders of the legislative, philanthropic, and nonprofit communities—and we’re really one community—can learn collaborative skills, walking the talk about collaboration. It’s kind of new, I think, and so we’re learning, so I think the public will find out that this is really about a collective skill that we’re all learning together. And I want to thank you for providing the leadership and being a civic catalyst in our growing together. Thank you very much.”

Senator Keohokalole rose and stated:

“As chair of the Senate Hawaiian Caucus, and as a proud Saint Louis graduate, I’d like to thank you and the members of the KS ‘ohana for your commitment to bringing the wishes of Ke Ali’i Pauahi to fruition, including the education of so many young people, Warriors and people like me, for whom my higher education would probably not have been possible without the support of all of you folks at Kamehameha Schools.

“In particular, I’d like to say mahalo to the CEO and trustees for their dedication. It’s my belief that they are unusually positioned to identify with us legislators, being in a position like theirs where they are granted the awesome privilege of stewarding vast resources while also realizing that they are yet insufficient to accomplish all of the wishes of their constituency. So mahalo to you for your dedication and for continuing the work of Ke Ali’i Pauahi.

“I’d also like to thank the Senate President and his staff, especially Roth Puahala, and my staff for making this week’s Hawaiian Caucus possible, and to all of you, my colleagues, for participating and celebrating with us this week. As you recall, on Monday, we celebrated the Kalihi Pālama Culture & Arts Society for their contribution to the youth of our community; on Tuesday, we celebrated the DeSoto ‘ohana for their commitment to ‘ohana and community; on Wednesday, we celebrated the career and accomplishments and contributions of Professor Melody MacKenzie, a giant in the Native Hawaiian legal community; yesterday, we honored the 200th anniversary of Christianity in Hawai’i and all of the good that’s come from that; and today, finally, one of our major Hawaiian organizations, an ali’i trust, for their commitment to community as well. This would not have been possible without your support, Mr. President, so I’d like to say thank you to all of my colleagues for allowing this to happen. Aloha.”

The Chair remarked:

“Well, thank you for your work as the chair of the caucus and all of the members of the caucus for a great week. It’s certainly been a fantastic finish with all of the people who were set up on the fourth floor and all of the participation here in the Chamber. I would like to say, as everybody’s talked about the contribution, the thing that I’ve admired the most: When my son was going to college at Western Oregon, two of his roommates were recipients of the higher education scholarship, and it is significant; it is not a small amount of money that these two students received to make their dreams of going to college possible. One of the requirements, the main requirement, that each of these students had was when they returned home to Kua’i in the summer, they had to do community service to

continue to receive the scholarship. So, while the money was important to get them there, I was so appreciative the main lesson that they wanted to teach was if you are blessed, then you go back into your community and you bless others by giving of yourself, which is the most valuable thing that you have. And with that core value, I've always appreciated what you have done in my community as well, so thank you."

"For over 20 years, Auntie Jessie has continuously fought for equitable access to healthcare services and programs in our community. In 1996, she helped to prevent the closure of the local hospital in Ka'u and has served as a volunteer organizer in Ka'u Grassroots Coalition to preserve access to quality health care for the community of roughly 5,800 residents. In 1998, Auntie Jessie created the Ka'u Rural Health Community Association, the first and only rural health community association in the United States. She served as a volunteer on the association's board of directors as president and secretary, and was later asked to become the executive director. She has uplifted her community through her endless efforts, including the establishment of a resource and distance learning center and the first Ka'u Rural Health Academy, a training demonstration project that focuses on health education, research opportunities, and economic sustainability.

"Congratulations, Auntie Jessie, and mahalo for the valuable work that you do for the community of Ka'u. Mr. President, may I now yield my time to my colleague from Kona?"

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:48 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Second Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard noted that it was National Future Farmers of America (FFA) Week, and welcomed national and state leaders and students who were visiting the State Capitol to discuss proposals to advance the growing agriculture youth movement in Hawai'i: Kourtney Lehman, National FFA Secretary; Ben Meyer, National FFA regional specialist; Ken Kajihara, a volunteer who coordinated the visit; Mike Barros, Hawai'i Association FFA Executive Secretary; Bronson Azama, State FFA President; Harvey Tagalicud, State FFA Vice President; Hannah Diocares, State FFA Secretary; Chynna Chun, State FFA Treasurer; Hannah Apostol, Darren Estal, and Marvin Picar from Waipahu High School; and Katheren Lam, Rainer Tanaka, and Donald Lye from Kalani High School.

Senator Wakai introduced Scott Glenn, gubernatorial nominee as Chief Energy Officer, who was seated in the gallery with his wife, Tomomi Glenn, and friend Rina.

Senator Kahele acknowledged Uri Barron-Silva, a member of his staff, for being named the 2019 ILH Boys Division I Soccer Coach of the Year.

Senator Kahele then recognized and honored Coach Charlie Wade and the University of Hawai'i men's volleyball team, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, this is a special day here in the Senate: We get a chance to honor a magical team, a team that captured the attention of the entire State last year. Unfortunately, when they played in the national championship game, we had already adjourned the last legislative session, so today is an opportunity to honor a very special team and their coaches of the University of Hawai'i men's volleyball team.

"Colleagues, Josh Walker is the recipient of the 2019 American Volleyball Coaches Association National Assistant Coach of the Year. He is the first University of Hawai'i assistant coach to win this award since it debuted in 2010. Josh was a member of the University of Hawai'i Rainbow Warriors volleyball team from 2007 to 2011. He was named to the All-Mountain Pacific Sports Federation second team in 2011 and made the All-MPSF third team as well as a second team as an AVCA All-America in 2010. He finished his four-year career with 1,428 kills, and currently ranks fifth in the program's history. After his time at the University of Hawai'i, he spent a volleyball career overseas professionally in Greece, Denmark, Finland, and the UAE. In 2019, as Josh came back in his fourth season as the assistant coach on head coach Charlie Wade's staff, he helped lead the Rainbow Warriors volleyball team to the best record in the program's history with 28 victories, and they captured their first Big West Conference title. Congratulations, Josh; welcome to the Senate.

"Next, colleagues, Coach Charlie Wade is the recipient of the 2019 AVCA National Coach of the Year award. He began his coaching collegiate career at Cal State Fullerton in 1987 as an assistant coach. In 1995, when I was a member of the UH men's volleyball program and team, Coach Charlie Wade arrived as an assistant coach for the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Rainbow

Wahine volleyball team for Coach Dave Shoji, and was his right-hand man while he was there for an 11-year career. He then went on to spend three years as the head coach for the University of the Pacific women's volleyball team until he returned in 2010 to be head coach for the Rainbow Warriors men's volleyball team. In the 2019 season, he led the Rainbow Warriors volleyball team to the best record in program history with 28 victories, earning their first Big West Conference title. Additionally, the team set an NCAA record 74-set win streak and finished as the national runner-up. The Rainbow Warriors spent the entire season in the top five of the AVCA Coaches Poll, including four weeks in the top spot, and a program-high of five Rainbow Warriors were selected as AVCA All-Americans, with four on the first team. Currently, our University of Hawai'i men's volleyball team is ranked number one in the country. Mahalo nui loa and congratulations, National Coach of the Year Charlie Wade.

"Finally, colleagues, we're going to honor the entire 2019 Rainbow Warriors men's volleyball team, so I'd like to have stand President David Lassner, the University of Hawai'i; of course, Charlie Wade, National Coach of the Year; Josh Walker, Assistant National Coach of the Year; and three players that are a part of that team: Patrick Gasman, James Anastassiades, and Rado Parapunov. I just would like to point out that Rado Parapunov was on the 2019 AVCA All-American first team and the All-Big West Conference first team, a Bryan Ivie Award winner as the nation's best opposite, and he also was part of the academic all-conference team. I'd like to point out that Patrick Gasman was on the 2019 AVCA All-America second team and the 2019 All-Big West Conference first team, the 2019 National Blocker of the Year, and he's also a three-time conference all-academic player. Finally, James Anastassiades is a senior in his fourth year; he is currently the team captain, and he is a 2019 Big West Conference all-academic player.

"Colleagues, the 2019 Rainbow men's volleyball team is the Big West Conference champion. They are the National Collegiate Athletic Association runner-up and the recipient of the American Volleyball Coaches Association Team Academic Award. This team won the Big West Conference championship and finished national runner-up to Long Beach State in the national championship game last year. They were skillfully instructed, mentored, and motivated by head coach Charlie Wade and his coaching staff, including Milan Zarkovic (who is in the gallery), Josh Walker, and Chad Giesseman. The 2019 Rainbow Warriors men's volleyball team capped off a stellar 28-win season and played in the national championship match for only the third time in program history. The team captured the program's first conference title by winning the Big West Tournament, and they earned the number one seed in the NCAA championship for the first time in program history. This team won its first 24 matches of the season in three straight sets, setting an NCAA record with a 74-set win streak, which obliterated the previous mark of 32, and also set a new program record with a 25-match win streak, which is the sixth longest in NCAA history. They were the nation's number one-ranked team for the final five weeks of the regular season. They finished as the national leader in four team categories—hitting percentage, kills per set, assists per set, and blocks per set—and with a program record four AVCA first-time All-Americans and five All-Big West Conference first team members. I'm going to say the names of the team for the record. Those team members were seniors, although they are not here today: Brett Rosenmeier, Dalton Solbrig, Stijn van Tilburg, Joe Worsley (who finished with the most victories, 90 of them, during a four-year period in program history), as well as James Anastassiades, Colton Cowell, Patrick Gasman, Cole Hogland, Filip Humler, Devon

Johnson, Rado Parapunov, Max Rosenfeld, Brett Sheward, Jakob Thelle, Alaka'i Todd, Jackson Van Eekeren, Danny Wong, and Gage Worsley. Congratulations to the 2019 AVCA national runner-up champions.

“Colleagues, I’d also like to recognize here in the gallery the athletics director for University of Hawai’i, David Matlin; associate athletics director Lois Manin; associate head coach Milan Zarkovic; team manager Matt Larson; volunteer coach Chad Giesseman; athletic trainer Renae Shigemura; strength coach Josh Elms; director of media relations Derek Inouchi; and, finally, Coach Wade’s family: his wife, Tani; their boys, Makana, Kainoa, and Kekoa; and Coach Wade’s father-in-law, Don Martin. “There are two kinds of renewable energy: safe and unsafe kinds. There’s one person in this room who’s had **any** experience with living with geothermal in Hawai‘i, and it’s me, and my community and myself have had 30 years of it. And let me say in no uncertain terms that it’s been **a disaster**, and I do think that we need an Energy Office that can look at our challenges with clear eyes and not ignore the actual reality on the ground of what we’ve experienced in Hawai‘i, and look toward realistic, sustainable solutions to our energy future. To expect geothermal to be a part of our energy future here in Hawai‘i is to engage in a fantasy-type magical thinking.

“That said, I believe the nominee is a good man with good intentions; I’m glad that he shares my climate concerns, and I look forward to working with him, but I must express those concerns in the strongest possible terms. Thank you.”

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Members, Scott Glenn is exactly the right person we need for this office. At this time last year, we were looking at an Energy Office that was non-collaborative, almost irrelevant to our aspirations for a clean energy future for this state. Jettison to where we are today: It’s a dramatic change. If you look at it from a staffing morale standpoint, he has turned a demoralized staff into one that is raring to go. On a policy level, he is one of the most collaborative people we have in government. I look back at what he did at OEQC, changing the rules that couldn’t be changed for perhaps more than a decade—he was able to accomplish that, and he was able to accomplish that with various opponents actually coming together and applauding him for all that he did. For the first time that I’ve seen, we’ve had environmentalists and developers who were actually supportive of the rule changes he made at OEQC.

“Now, in his capacity as the head of our Energy Office, we’re going to need that sense of collaboration because, as the previous senator mentioned, there are some areas in the clean energy aspiration where there is a little bit of controversy, whether it’s geothermal, whether it’s wind, solar, anything else that might be coming on the horizon. We have one common enemy: That’s fossil fuels, and Scott Glenn is the right person who’s going to be able to bring all the different opinions together and help us get to our clean energy goals. So although we might have a little bit of angst on certain types of energy, I think this is exactly the right person we need to march us

forward to our hundred percent energy aspirations. I hopefully encourage all of you to vote in favor of his confirmation.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I also rise in support of this candidate for our energy policies. I had a long talk with him, and a lot of you know about how I am against windmills and windmill energy. I know prior to our committee hearings and I got to speak with him on this thing, and, you know, the best part about it is engaging the community and the people who are surrounding renewable energy, whether it’s fossil fuel reduction and getting rid of the coal, and even with PV and even with windmills. The part that I liked about him is that he was willing to say that he’s going to get into more engagement, more community input, and more community meetings to make sure that all parties involved, with any, going forward, renewable energy; that he will engage with the communities and make sure that everybody has a clear view on what he’s going forward with new renewable energy and the energy that we need in the State of Hawai‘i. So I thank you for that and for having that open mind. Thank you.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

“My concern is that there seems to be a lot of unclear boundaries between the PUC and the Office of Energy. We need to ensure that regulatory functions and studies that are related to regulatory functions and regulatory nature stick with the PUC, and what we really need that Office of Energy to do is grow our energy economy. We’ve been talking about diversifying the economy for years. We’ve been talking about trying to address the brain drain for years. And it’s not enough to just create jobs for rooftop solar installation—that doesn’t cut it. What are we going to do to start getting R&D jobs? What are we going to do to really start to get energy becoming a big sector so that we don’t just have to rely on tourism, on the military? We have an Office of Energy; it’s located in DBEDT, and we’re at the brink of having tourism be affected by the coronavirus, and yet we don’t have high-paying jobs. I really do hope that that’s going to be the focus of the Office of Energy. We’re educating our kids—we talk about agriculture as an example, I mean, look at our kids from FFA—but what are we doing to really create jobs in agriculture? I mean, it’s not enough just to have sustainability goals. We’ve got to create jobs so that our kids can live and work in Hawai‘i and not be based on a service economy where we’re only going to be fighting about minimum wage. We’ve got to create jobs that are going to be able to allow them to afford to live in Hawai‘i and grow their families. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At this time, Senator Wakai introduced Chief Energy Officer Scott Glenn, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"In regards to Senate Bill 75, S.D. 1, we just accepted the governor's message. This bill is to insert language to deal with the emergency appropriation in dealing with the coronavirus.

"S.B. 2776, Relating to the Environment, directs the Department of Health to require the Clean Water Branch to perform water quality testing during brown water advisories, inform the public of risks associated with water runoff during brown water advisories, and establishes an Environmental Management Division Oversight Advisory Board.

"S.B. 3063, S.D. 1 proposes an amendment to Article IX, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i to require the state to place housing for its residents amongst its highest priorities and implement this provision by statute.

"S.B. 2191, Relating to Water Storage and Distribution for Agricultural Lands, authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purposes of funding construction costs of a water storage and distribution system for agricultural lands owned by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs."

The Chair granted the waivers.

Senator Dela Cruz then announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on S.B. No. 75, S.D. 1 that afternoon at 2:15 p.m. in Conference Room 211, and a decision-making meeting on S.B. No. 2191; S.B. No. 2776, S.D. 1; and S.B. TWENTY-FOURTH DAY

Friday, February 28, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:48 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Gabbard and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Thielen welcomed Melissa Alvarado, a distinguished visitor from Los Angeles, who was accompanied in the gallery by her extraordinary chief clerk, Jackie Rosas.

Senator Moriwaki welcomed students from the newswriting class at President William McKinley High School who produce the school newspaper, *The Pinion*, which has been a tradition since 1920. Senator Moriwaki noted that the staff of *The Pinion* strives to provide and maintain accurate, entertaining, and informative news for McKinley students, staff, and alumni. Seated in the gallery were editors Alexandria and Ryan; reporters Nyler, An, Thai, Jesse, Shileen, Mark, Wynn, Kelly, Nickolas, Cheng, Sairin, Cherisa, Joseph, Rodney, and Julia; and their advisor, Cindy Reves.

Senator Moriwaki also introduced, on behalf of Senator Ihara, journalism students of 'Iolani School who edit the school newspaper, *Imua 'Iolani*, which has provided the 'Iolani community with on-campus news and relatable content since 1923. Present in the gallery were students Liam, Makai, Conrad, Ari, Skye, Sherie, Alec, Steph, Austin, Catie, and Channah, and their advisor, Chase Wiggins.

Senator Moriwaki noted that students of *The Pinion* and *Imua 'Iolani* would be joining Governor David Y. Ige in proclaiming February 24–28 as Scholastic Journalism Week to recognize and celebrate the national importance of scholastic journalism, and thanked them for their contributions to student journalism.

Senator Keohokalole introduced Philip Ho, grandfather of his office tech expert, Jaren Tengan, both of whom were seated in the gallery.

Senator Shimabukuro recognized John Allen III, and presented the following remarks:

“American historian Henry Adams once said that ‘teachers affect eternity; you can never tell where their influence stops.’ Teaching is undoubtedly one of the most praiseworthy professions on this earth. It is also vastly under-appreciated. Motivating and stimulating young generations to help them reach their full potential is something that deserves more recognition and honor in our current society.

“The Student Television Network Association annually elects a National Teacher of the Year, who is recognized for their dedication to their profession and high level of achievement in all areas of teaching broadcast journalism, film, or media. This teacher must display creative and media skills, classroom effectiveness, and strong leadership. This year, I am proud to announce that Wai‘anae’s own John Allen III will receive STN’s National Teacher of the Year award at STN’s national convention in March in Washington, D.C.

“John Allen III graduated from Wai‘anae High School in 1997, and he is a proud product of the school’s celebrated Searider Productions program, or SP. The school always remained close to his heart, and he rejected better-paying jobs to continue making a difference as the video advisor and

operations manager for SP. In an interview, John said he’s always been a behind-the-scenes kind of guy, pushing his students to be in front of the camera. His mission is to provide students with a place to learn product development and job skills aside from the technical skills of video production. He even teaches life skills such as how to file taxes. He has been called the ‘secret ingredient’ behind his students’ success, as he provides them with the opportunity needed to follow their passions.

“SP alumni represent diverse professions all over the country. Tina Ludewig, a producer/editor in the marketing department of Hawaii News Now, is one, and she stated, ‘John was **the** influence in my life and career. He is the reason I am in broadcast news today. He always challenged me to think about my work and what message I wanted to convey. He was a tough critic, but he always inspired me to do better and be better. Searider Productions is the reason I ventured outside of Wai‘anae, and I hope I could one day have that kind of impact on someone’s life.’

“Candy Suiso, SP’s co-founder, program director, and John’s teacher when he was a student participant in the program, stated, ‘As a student, John was not only technically talented but very creative. Once he learned basic camera work and editing, he taught himself the rest. Then he began teaching his classmates. He continues to be the magic behind all of our video projects, and his former students are success stories in their own right. He’s a very humble and careful guy. I think that’s what I love about him most. He never asks for his recognition, but now, it’s John Allen’s time.’

“John, I congratulate you on winning this well-deserved award, and I agree with Candy Suiso wholeheartedly: This is your day, and you deserve this celebration and recognition of your hard work and earnest dedication. I’d like to introduce John’s supporters: Mr. Allen’s son, John Makana Allen IV; parents, John Jr. and Maria Allen; sister Rachel Allen; and he’s got his grandmother here as well; and complex area superintendent Ann Mahi. Also in the gallery, we’ve got SP founder Candy Suiso; Wai‘anae High CTE director Lei Aken; student activities coordinator Janice Uemori; SP Foundation eduprise managers Schae Nii, Dannon Dano, and Amber Moreira. And anyone else here to support John Allen III, please stand to be recognized, and welcome to our capitol.

“I would now like to yield the floor to Vice President and Education chair Senator Michelle Kidani.”

Senator Kidani recognized Dr. Christina Keaulana, and presented the following remarks:

“Colleagues, I’m thrilled and honored to have the opportunity to introduce Dr. Christina Keaulana. Dr. Keaulana first started her teaching career teaching incarcerated youth at a residential correctional facility. By working closely with these youth, Dr. Keaulana saw the social injustice and detriment of the school-to-prison pipeline firsthand and has since been committed to working with underserved populations. Now, Dr. Keaulana is the mastermind behind the Nānākuli Education Assistant to Teacher Pilot Program, which has been designed to recruit, support, and retain educators from diverse backgrounds who have demonstrated experience and commitment to students with special needs, and who themselves are representatives of the culturally and linguistically diverse populations that they serve.

“As the Senate chair of Education, I have made it a priority to end the teacher shortage. In order to do so, we need innovative programs. When I first learned of Dr. Keaulana’s

pilot program out in Nānākuli, I thought that this was a great program to support. I worked to secure \$450,000 and five full-time employee positions to ensure that Dr. Keaulana's Nānākuli Education Assistant to Teacher Pilot Program at Leeward Community College can continue to serve the Leeward Coast. With the incredible work and determination from Dr. Keaulana, I am happy to announce that the program plans to expand to Wai'anae and Mākaha next fall.

"The Nānākuli Education Assistant to Teacher Pilot Program could not be what it is today without the determined future educators who have been participants of the program. I had the opportunity to meet with current teacher candidates who will be graduating soon; their stories were heartfelt and are perfect testimonies for why this program must continue. One candidate spoke about coming home, helping her three keiki with their homework, cooking dinner, putting the keiki to bed, and only then being able to do her own homework. Another candidate talked about how, after putting three kids through college, it was now finally her time to attend college. These are the incredible and purpose-driven stories of teachers who choose not to leave places like the Leeward Coast.

"Please help me in congratulating Dr. Christina Keaulana for her incredible work in preparing the next generation of teachers and the remarkable work of the Nānākuli Education Assistant to Teacher Pilot Program. On the floor today, joining Dr. Keaulana in her recognition, is Mr. Cameron Rivera, an academic advisor; Ms. Angela Hoppe-Cruz, the associate program director at Kūlia & Ka Lama Education Academy; and complex area superintendent of the Nānākuli-Wai'anae complex, the incredible Ms. Ann Mahi. Thank you all for joining us as Dr. Keaulana's guests today; we appreciate you being here. Mr. President, may I yield my time to our colleague from the Wai'anae Coast?"

Senator Shimabukuro rose and stated:

"I knew Christina Keaulana before she was famous. We met through our mutual friend, Mihoko Ito, who many of you may know through her work at SanHi Government Strategies, back in the late 1990s. Later, Christina would go on to marry Richard 'Buffalo' Keaulana's grandson, Noland, who himself is a renowned waterman and serves as a lifeguard. They have two beautiful young boys who are 'groms,' or young surfers, who are excelling both in and out of the ocean. Unfortunately, Noland could not be here today since he is sailing aboard the *Hōkūle'a*, but he is extremely proud of his wife.

"Christina shared with me some extremely exciting news: The DOE will be providing the first-ever pay step increase specifically designated for these EAs in the Nānākuli pilot after they have reached their 60-credit associate in science in teaching, and then another pay step increase just before they enter their final year of student teaching. In addition, as many of you know, the governor has supported the DOE's push to get to the heart of our teacher shortage. Starting this month, special education teachers received a \$10,000 per year bonus, and Hawaiian immersion and hard-to-fill teachers received an \$8,000 per year bonus. It sure seems like it was fate and an alignment of the stars that drove Christina Keaulana to create the Nānākuli Education Assistant to Teacher Pilot Program, and we thank her from the bottom of our hearts for the tremendous positive impact she is having on our teachers and keiki! And I just wanted to say that I think Mihoko Ito is on her way to also congratulate you, so she might be at the luncheon. With that, thank you so much, Christina, for all you have done."

Senator Taniguchi recognized students from Mid-Pacific Institute who produce the school newspaper, *Na Pueo*, who were also visiting the State Capitol for Scholastic Journalism Week with their advisor, Jessica Hanthorn.

S.B. No. 2582, S.D. 1:

Senator Baker moved that S.B. No. 2582, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Chang.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"This measure authorizes advanced practice registered nurses, in addition to physicians, to practice medical aid in

dying in accordance with their scope of practice and prescribing authority. It authorizes psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners, in addition to psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers, to provide counseling to a qualified patient. It reduces the mandatory waiting period between oral requests from 20 days to 15 days. Colleagues, this measure will help to ensure that all terminally ill patients have access to the full range of end-of-life care options authorized in the state. It doesn't require anyone to accept any of them.

"Act 2, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, established the Our Care, Our Choice Act to allow qualified patients in the State of Hawai'i with a medically confirmed terminal illness of less than six months to live and possessing the decisional capacity to determine their own medical care at end of life to exercise any of the options available. Thus, it allows a terminally ill person to die in a peaceful, humane, and dignified manner of their choosing. Unfortunately, Hawai'i's unique geography and the state's shortage of physicians creates barriers to access for qualified terminally ill patients; finding a physician in some parts of our state may be burdensome, especially for individuals on the neighbor islands. Furthermore, Hawai'i has the longest mandatory waiting period amongst all 10 medical aid in dying-authorized states and the District of Columbia, and a high percentage of terminally ill individuals die while waiting to complete the regulatory 20-day requirement.

"This measure, Senate Bill 2582, allows APRNs within their scope of practice to participate as providers under the Our Care, Our Choice Act. They are already deemed as primary care providers in our statutes, and this measure would help address the disparity in access to physicians across our state. Additionally, it will reduce the mandatory waiting period to 15 days and provide a more reasonable pathway for those terminally ill individuals not expected to survive the waiting period. Delivery of high-quality, compassionate end-of-life choices for terminally ill patients who wish to exercise them, your Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health believes, is a very important measure to move forward to the House. I ask all of you to join me in voting yes on Senate Bill 2582, Senate Draft 1. Mahalo."

Senator Fevella rose to request that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella's remarks read as follows:

"I oppose this bill because it eases the restrictions against medical assistance in dying. For example, it authorizes—in addition to medical doctors—advanced practice registered nurses to practice medical assistance in dying. Medical aid in dying should continue to be restricted only to being approved and conducted by licensed physicians.

"Life is a gift from God. Nothing should be allowed to take that away."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2582, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 2759, S.D. 1.

"Back in September 2018, there was a story about four men who were cited for entering Mānoa Falls Trails when it was closed. Officers reported seeing the suspects going under clearly visible yellow 'police' tape and past numerous closed signs. DLNR had reported that the Mānoa Falls had been closed because of a rock slide. That led me to introduce this legislation which is before us today.

“This bill is directed at deterring people from knowingly entering our public trails illegally, putting their lives and the lives of our fire and police department personnel at risk. This bill would require a government agency to be reimbursed when a person hikes into prohibited or remote areas, acts in an irresponsible manner, and ends up needing to be rescued. This will save taxpayer dollars because a helicopter rescue can cost upwards of \$1,500. The bill would also increase fines for violations involving trails (trespassing, enter when closed) in state parks, trails that are part of DLNR’s Nā Ala Hele trail system, and trails on state lands (in instances where there’s signage)

“When we checked in with HPD about this legislation, we learned that HFD takes the lead on rescues, but that HPD also goes out to assist and takes lead when HFD is unavailable. They directed us to the tragedy that occurred at Sacred Falls in 1995 that killed police officers Kahakai and Bayne and HFD helicopter pilot Peter Crown.

“Ultimately, the intention of this bill is to protect public safety and highlight the personal responsibility that should be taken when a person chooses to ignore trail closures. This is especially important because social media is encouraging people to take risks that put themselves and others in harm’s way. Various internet adventure websites have promoted wrong or misleading information that places hikers in danger, leading to uninformed hikers getting injured while on the trails, or hiking on trails that are unmaintained or prohibited. The number of Honolulu Fire Department rescues in mountainous areas on O’ahu nearly tripled between 2006 and 2016. According to DLNR, if this trend continues, the number of annual mountain rescues will double by 2024.

“Colleagues, please join me in supporting S.B. 2759, S.D. 1. Mahalo.”

The bill would ban someone from knowingly capturing, possessing, abusing, or entangling any shark, whether alive or dead, or killing any shark in state waters

“Sharks are apex predators whose presence and populations are critical to the health of our entire ocean ecosystem. The International Union for Conservation of Nature’s Red List of Threatened Species, using data thru 2019, reported that up to 57 percent of extant species of sharks are considered threatened and have been assessed as vulnerable, endangered, or critically endangered. DLNR reports that 12 of the 41 shark species in Hawai’i waters fall under one of those three threatened categories; 11 are listed as vulnerable and 1 as endangered.

“It’s important to note that this bill will NOT inhibit ongoing research on sharks or apply to any person, who in the lawful course of fishing, accidentally catches then releases a shark. That is exactly what ethical fishers do now.

“I had the honor of working with many of you in 2010 when we passed the nation’s first, and still strongest, shark fin and fin product ban, which became a global model for shark conservation. With S.B. 2717 we have the chance to take the next necessary step in exemplary marine protection, and I urge your support. Mahalo.”

"Mr. President, in my view this new fund could prove successful in generating contributions from a wide variety of organizations toward the development of critical multi-family housing, and I therefore encourage my colleagues to support this measure."

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The floor amendment makes the following changes that were announced on February 19th in the Committee on Ways and Means but were not properly reflected in both the operating and CIP budget tables and line items: naming on pages 2 to 3, copying the operating budget from Senate Bill 2116, which is Judiciary’s fiscal year ’21 supplemental budget; adding additional funds to JUD601 for civil legal services; and amendments to the CIP budget.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Keith-Agaran then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3304 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz and carried.

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3080, S.D. 3, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, March 5, 2020.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3383 be adopted and S.B. No. 2409, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Chang then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 3) to S.B. No. 2409, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 2409, S.D. 2, is amended as follows:

1. By broadening the measure’s scope to include current state residents among the persons eligible to apply for down payment assistance grants from the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation;

2. By deleting the contents of Senate Bill No. 2409, S.D. 2; and

3. By replacing the measure’s contents with the following:

“SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the size of the State’s population is declining. In fiscal year 2016-2017, the United States Census estimated that Hawaii had a net loss of 13,537 people. People who move away from Hawaii often cite Hawaii’s high cost of living as the deciding factor in moving.

The legislature further finds that the relocation of individuals and families out of Hawaii causes economic, social, and cultural burdens for the State. The lack of frequent physical contact with family members can be traumatic, disruptive, and fragmenting to ohana. This erosion of kinship support networks among existing residents can even delay family-making decisions for younger generations when considering their ability to clothe, feed, and educate their future children.

The legislature further finds that many who move out of Hawaii are often the most skilled and educated members of the

workforce since those individuals have the greatest opportunity for career choices in the mainland United States. Failure to stem this loss represents a danger to Hawaii’s economic future.

Additionally, the legislature finds that the problem of home affordability is not limited to former Hawaii residents who wish to return. Residents who choose to remain in the State are faced with single-family home prices that are significantly higher than those of most other cities in the United States. For example, Hawaii News Now reported in August 2019 that the median sale price of a single-family home on Oahu reached a new record high of \$835,000 in July 2019. The legislature further finds that high home prices, combined with the State’s high cost of living, are significant factors that compel many Hawaii residents to leave the State, and that decisive action must be taken to slow this out-migration.

The purpose of this Act is to ease the burden of Hawaii’s high cost of living for current residents and encourage former Hawaii residents to return to the State by establishing a program to assist qualifying individuals with down payments for the purchase of a primary residence.

SECTION 2. Chapter 201H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

“§201H-A Current and returning resident down payment program; established. (a) There is established the current and returning resident down payment program, to be administered by the corporation. The program shall encourage former Hawaii residents to return to Hawaii, and assist current Hawaii residents in coping with the State’s high cost of living, by awarding grants to assist with the down payment on the purchase of a primary residence that shall be a single family residence.

(b) Subject to available funds, the current and returning resident down payment program shall award grants of up to one dollar for each dollar of down payment made by a qualified applicant; provided that the total award to an applicant shall not exceed the lesser of ten per cent of the value of the single family residence to be purchased or \$50,000.

(c) To be eligible for an award under the current and returning resident down payment program, an applicant shall:

- (1) Have earned a high school diploma from a high school located in the State;
- (2) In the case of a former resident, have ceased residency in the State for the purpose of attending a four-year course of study leading to a baccalaureate degree at a college or university accredited by the United States Department of Education or other entity recognized by the corporation;
- (3) Use the award to make a down payment for the purchase of a single family residence as defined in section 521-8; and
- (4) Be a resident of the State, or a former resident of the State who satisfies the requirements of paragraphs (1) and (2) as applicable, represent that the applicant will be an owner-occupant of the residence to be purchased pursuant to paragraph (3), and own no other interest in real property within or without the State.

(d) Any applicant who has received an award and fails to satisfy the requirements of subsection (c)(4) shall repay the award plus interest at the rate of eight per cent.

“§201H-B Current and returning resident down payment special fund. (a) There is established in the state treasury the current and returning resident down payment special fund, into which shall be deposited the following moneys:

- (1) Appropriations made by the legislature to the special fund; and
- (2) Repayments to the fund made pursuant to section 201H-A(d).

(b) Funds in the special fund shall be used for the purposes of the current and returning resident down payment program.”

SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for deposit into the current and returning resident down payment special fund.

SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the current and returning resident down payment program.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 5. In codifying the new sections added by section 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating the new sections in this Act.

SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050."

Senator Chang moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Senator Thielen.

Senator Chang rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"This floor amendment conforms the bill text to the committee report and the amendments agreed to by the Committee on Housing by broadening the program to residents still in Hawai'i in addition to those returning from elsewhere."

S.B. 2543 specifies that an employer may use a fit for duty test for medical cannabis users in potentially dangerous occupations and exempts certain categories of employment.

"This is not novel legislation. Several states have given their residents access to medical cannabis to address pain from an illness or disability. However, due to a conflict between some state and federal regulations regarding the use of cannabis as a medicine to treat pain, employers are concerned that the use of medical cannabis by an employee would violate the employer's ability to claim that theirs is a drug free workplace. This measure seeks to resolve that conflict by clearly addressing the scope of accommodation that employers must provide to medical cannabis users.

"Please join me in voting yes on S.B. 2543. Mahalo."

"Our schools are in desperate need of assistance. With many of our schools over 50 years old, our repair and maintenance backlog has exploded to nearly one billion dollars. This is candidly unacceptable. The Legislature, over the last four years, has appropriated hundreds of millions of dollars of Capital Improvement Project funds to the Department of Education for new schools, new buildings, and repair and maintenance, and still we find ourselves falling further behind the ball. Money alone will not solve this problem.

"I believe that the Department of Education is the most appropriate body for handling education policy. However, when the Department's own facilities administrators publicly presented on the structural deficiencies of the Department for the management of 271 schools and the land parcels they sit on, it became clear that it was time for a change. This bill is a step in the right direction.

"S.B. 3103 would create a school facilities agency as an independent agency charged with new school construction, major renovations and repairs, and implementing the 21st Century Schools pilot program. While this is a new and innovative concept to Hawai'i, we are not alone in moving in this route. New York City created the New York City School Construction Authority, which was established back in 1988 with the mandate to build new public schools, many of which were over 50 years old. Sound familiar? Since then, they have built hundreds of schools and classrooms across New York City utilizing streamlined construction and design processes and increasing competition amongst contractors. This is the kind of change Hawai'i needs to bring our education system into the 21st Century.

"I understand that there remain concerns about the implementation and I acknowledge those concerns. However, I remain steadfastly resolved that without drastic change our keiki will be left further and further behind. I urge you to vote in support of S.B. 3103."

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 2903, S.D. 2, Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products, which will prohibit the sale and distribution of flavored tobacco including menthol in Hawai'i.

"In 2019, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notified local and state health departments about the growing number of cases of e-cigarette, or vaping, product use-associated lung injury, also commonly referred to as EVALI. This outbreak echoed public health concerns towards tobacco products and electronic smoking devices as the popularity of products continue to increase. Availability of flavored tobacco products is the significant driver behind the increased use of electronic smoking devices.

"Hawai'i has seen the use of flavors to entice youth and other consumers. Vaping flavors such as Kona coffee, Maui mango, shaka strawberry, and Moloka'i hot bread have contributed to

this recent and significant increase of youth use. Research shows that 95 percent of all smokers start before the age of 21 and 81 percent of youth who used a tobacco product report that the first tobacco product they used was flavored! This is particularly concerning because the adolescent brain is still developing and the use of tobacco products during adolescence can disrupt the formation of brain circuits that control attention, learning, and susceptibility to addiction.

“S.B. 2903, S.D. 1 also addresses the problems with menthol cigarettes. The use of menthol cigarettes reduces the harshness that an otherwise unflavored tobacco product would have. Thus, menthol cigarettes make it easier for beginners to try and ultimately become addicted to the nicotine in tobacco products. Research shows that 78 percent of Native Hawaiian and Pacific islanders use menthol cigarettes. Additionally, the use of menthol cigarettes among Filipino adults also remains high.

“Please join me in voting in support of S.B. 2903, S.D. 2 and help protect Hawaii’s public health. Mahalo.”

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 2280, S.D. 1, Relating to Pharmacy Benefit Managers.

“Pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) negotiate prescription drug benefits on behalf of health insurers and other payors. By negotiating with drug manufacturers and pharmacies to control drug spending, pharmacy benefit managers have a significant behind-the-scenes impact in determining total drug costs for insurers, shaping patients’ access to medications, and determining how much pharmacies are paid.

“Pharmacy benefit managers control the formularies for drug plans and prices for classes of pharmaceuticals which can create pricing uncertainty for pharmacies and drug plan beneficiaries. This measure promotes transparency by increasing reporting requirements and supporting efforts to control drug costs by preventing PBMs from promoting medications based on the rebates the pharmacy benefit manager receives from a drug manufacturer.

“Current law relating to PBMs provides no transparency regarding where a drug can be purchased at a particular price, in what market, or even if a drug on a particular formulary is available at that certain price in Hawai’i. PBMs can reimburse pharmacies at less and sometimes half of what it costs to acquire the drug. For smaller, independent or rural pharmacies, this is extremely damaging and threatening to their ability to provide appropriately priced medications for their clients.

“Many independent pharmacies have been forced to close their doors or sell to mainland corporations due to the predatory practices employed by PBMs. Not only do these closures take a toll on local economies, but they also leave residents in less populated areas without a pharmacist to fill prescriptions and provide vital services. These smaller communities are already facing a shortage of health care providers, and the loss of community pharmacies is just another barrier they face in trying to access care.

“Please join me in supporting S.B. 2280, S.D. 1. Mahalo.”

“Mr. President, I rise in strong support of S.B. 2538, S.D. 1, Relating to the Youth Vaping Epidemic.

“Over the last decade, there has been a dramatic increase in the use of electronic smoking devices by Hawaii’s youth. Today, 16 percent of middle school students and more than a quarter of high school students use electronic smoking devices. Current use of electronic smoking devices by county is even more problematic, with figures exceeding thirty percent on the islands of Hawai’i, Maui and Kaua’i. These rates are higher than the national average.

“Use of an electronic smoking device puts these young users at risk for lung injury and even death. S.B. 2538, S.D. 1 creates solutions to address this youth-targeted public health problem by creating a ban on the sale of flavored tobacco products, prohibiting mislabeling of nicotine products and creating penalties to help guide Hawaii’s youth to understand the effects of using electronic smoking devices.

“I ask that you all vote in support of S.B. 2538, S.D. 1 to protect our youth.”

counties. The red light imaging systems program will reduce traffic accidents, injuries, and death on Hawai‘i’s roads.

“Here are my reasons for introducing and justifying this bill:

- Statewide, a total of 1,312 intersection crashes occurred as a result of red light and other traffic signal violations. (Committee Report SSCR 3148)
- Red Light Detection Cameras have been effective in cities across the nation in reducing red light violations and traffic collisions (SSCR 3148)
- Thirteen deaths from red light violations, 2015 to 2018 (Hawai‘i DOT testimony)
- 20,885 red light violations have been issued by police statewide to motorists who have disregarded a red light traffic signal (Hawai‘i DOT testimony)
- Honolulu Police Department supports S.B. 2994 because it makes roadways safer and reduces the number of intersection-related crashes throughout the state (Testimony, HPD)
- In 2014, red light running caused 171,000 crashes nationwide which led to 126,000 injuries and 709 deaths. (NCSL *Legisbrief* Dec. 2016)
- More than 50 percent of fatalities were of bicyclists, pedestrians, and occupants in the vehicle that did not run the red light. (NCSL *Legisbrief* Dec. 2016)
- Red Light Cameras reduce fatal red light crashes by 21 percent. (NCSL *Legisbrief* Dec. 2016)
- As of March 2020, 23 States and the District of Columbia have implemented red light camera programs. They are operating in 342 jurisdictions (Insurance Institute for Highway Safety)

“For these reasons, I urge my colleagues to support this bill so that we can all have safer roadways when crossing an intersection.”

"The federal administration has persistently been attacking Hawaii's benefits and protections by a determination to repeal or undercut the Federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, which includes access to sexual and reproductive health care benefits and protection. Thus, it is vital for the Legislature to preserve certain important aspects of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act in order to expand access to care for residents of Hawai'i.

"Additionally, it makes economic sense to ensure that Hawaii's people receive comprehensive sexual and reproductive health care that is client-centered and culturally-sensitive because it will improve the overall health of our communities. Research shows that for every public dollar spent on reproductive health and family planning services, the State will save seven dollars in Medicaid costs for pregnancy, labor and delivery, and children's health care.

“S.B. 2539 will require health insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to provide coverage for a comprehensive category of reproductive health services, drugs, devices, products, and procedures; and prohibit discrimination in the provision of reproductive health care services. Codifying the Affordable Care Act’s coverage requirements into state law will ensure that our residents regardless of gender, gender identity, or sexual orientation will not lose access to no-copay preventive services and life-saving cancer screenings.

“Given the recent federal attacks on basic rights and health care, it is more important now than ever that the Legislature act to ensure that no one loses access to health care services, including reproductive services. Without legislative action, there will be uncertainty regarding the continuation of access to reproductive health care in Hawai‘i. And vulnerable individuals may be forced to delay care or forgoing care altogether due to high out-of-pocket costs. None of our residents should have to make that kind of no-win choice.

“I would like to express my reservations on this bill, but first I’d like to declare a potential conflict of interest in that I sell a lot of CBD in my personal business. Although this bill wouldn’t affect me more than the several industries that it affects, in an abundance of caution, I’d like to disclose that potential conflict.”

The Chair ruled that, as Senator Ruderman is in a general class, there is no conflict, and directed Senator Ruderman to proceed with his comments.

Senator Ruderman continued, speaking in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I agree that CBD needs to be regulated. I don’t believe that we are the right place to regulate it. I think it’s obvious that the Department of Health has more important, more urgent things to do than regulate CBD, and even when the current crisis is over, this will still remain true. Aside from the economic benefits it’s bringing to many people in our state, the health benefits are huge and still developing. Even unregulated, I can think of no other product in our society that has the benefit-to-risk ratio as CBD has, and it’s still unfolding. Ultimately, the federal government will regulate CBD and supersede any efforts we take, and I don’t think it’s useful to spend millions of dollars and a lot of effort by the Department of Health to do something that is going to be superseded any minute now. I think of this as the mildest of the CBD-regulating bills that we saw, and many in our industry support it, and I want to thank the three chairs involved for the work on this bill and letting this bill be the one to proceed. I remain skeptical that this is an appropriate Hawai‘i priority, and I think this is a rabbit hole we don’t need to go down, so I’ll be watching carefully and voting ‘with reservations.’ Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“In 2019, the U.S. Department of Agriculture opened the industrial hemp market due to the passage of the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018. With the new industrial hemp market, approximately over 16,000 hemp growers have emerged throughout the United States. In response, the FDA (Food and Drug Administration) issued non-legally binding public statements, arguing that it is illegal to market cannabidiol as a food additive or dietary supplement because it is an active

ingredient in a pharmaceutical drug. In Hawai'i, the Department of Health has adhered to the FDA's public guidance; however, cannabidiol products continue to be sold across Hawai'i with no regulatory oversight. While the nation awaits the FDA to further act on this issue, Senate Bill 2050, Senate Draft 2 creates a timely regulatory framework to address some of the confusion amongst consumers and the industry. It really tags on to a regulatory framework that already exists with the Department of Health. Please help our state provide action on this issue by joining me in voting 'yes' on Senate Bill 2050, Senate Draft 2. Mahalo."

This bill looks to prevent and reduce injuries to our keiki, and if this bill passes, Hawai'i will join 11 states that currently have requirements that children under the age of two be rear-facing. Injury is one of the leading causes of death and disability in Hawai'i for all children, responsible for more deaths of children ages 1 to 17 than all other causes combined. For these reasons, Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to support this important measure in our effort to ensure the safety of our keiki. Mahalo."

"A lot of illegal gunfire and fireworks cause safety risks and health hazards in the state for visitors and residents. Senate Bill 2406, S.D. 2 will help the law enforcement and emergency first responders to detect fireworks explosions within a specific area and to respond to the explosion related to the crime. This would help first responders in the area. To some of you who read the bill, 45 seconds seems like it's not a lot, but it is a lot when you have an officer in need, or a safety responder person in need of help: 45 seconds can be a lifetime. So I urge my colleagues to please support this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3295 was adopted and S.B. No. 2406, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXPLOSION DETECTION TECHNOLOGY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Rhoads rose speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I have written comments I'd like to insert in the record and just brief comments. An overwhelming majority of economists support a carbon tax as the best way to combat global warming. To quote Greg Mankiw, who chaired the Council of Economic Advisors under George W. Bush, 'Among economists this is not controversial. The politics is complicated, the international relations is complicated, but the economics is really simple.' Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Rhoads's additional remarks read as follows:

"S.B. 3150 has TWO key components. One, it reconfigures the existing barrel tax to set taxes on each fossil fuel, based on the relative amount of carbon dioxide emissions that result from its combustion. The burning of different types of fuel results in different amounts of carbon going into the atmosphere; coal is different from gasoline, for example. The PURPOSE is simple: to indirectly raise prices of fossil fuels to provide a disincentive to their future use. As drafted, the initial result of the bill's provisions would be a uniform tax of \$40 per metric ton of carbon dioxide emissions from all fossil fuels. That tax rate would incrementally increase over the next decade to \$80 per ton of CO2 emissions—a level that many experts believe is needed to provide an adequate disincentive to further use of fossil fuels.

"The second critical component of the bill is the creation of a refundable income tax credit that would offset much of the financial impact of the carbon tax that will be incurred by the lower income households of the State until fossil fuels have been broadly replaced by renewable energy. The tax credit will help our lower income families deal with the fundamental changes that are already beginning to happen as a result of climate change, but the higher price of energy derived from fossil fuel will also encourage lower income families and all other families to find ways to reduce the use of energy from fossil fuel.

"We know the actions of the State of Hawai'i alone will not prevent disaster. But we are very late in this game and we cannot afford to delay further. In October 2018, the United Nation's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change issued a report that states with a high degree of confidence that the people and the governments of earth had 12 years (in 2018) to keep the world from warming no more than 1.5 degrees Celsius. Compared to pre-industrial levels, the earth is already 1 degree warmer. Above a 1.5 degree change, the consequences of global warming get substantially worse. Every year we delay means the accumulation of even more carbon dioxide in our atmosphere that will further exacerbate the adverse impacts of climate change.

"It is true that Hawai'i, with our 1.4 million people, cannot save the planet by ourselves. Everyone else, from the

48 contiguous states, to China to India to Brazil will all have to take bold actions to keep the planet from a catastrophic rise in temperature as well. But it is also true that we have led by example so far, setting ambitious goals for greenhouse gas reduction that many others have followed already. And it is also true that of all the places in the world we are likely to suffer especially badly from the effects of climate change. Losing our beaches and more frequent hurricanes alone will make Hawai'i a much less pleasant place to live.

"Last year we provided funding to study how a carbon tax would work in Hawai'i. Dr. Coffman, the Director of the University of Hawai'i's Institute for Sustainability and Resilience, is leading that effort. Some argue that we should wait to advance a carbon pricing bill until that study is done. There are three compelling reasons not to wait. First, the climate situation is dire. The world, not just Hawai'i, has 11 years to act. Second, whatever Dr. Coffman's team comes up with, it is unlikely to look that different in concept or in carbon tax rates than the bill before us today. Third, and most importantly, while the economic argument is simple, fundamentally altering our tax system is not. Moving a bill forward will force us to look at those details, to better understand where the pitfalls are and how best to fine-tune the structure of a carbon tax and the companion income tax credit.

"It's time to act and I urge my colleagues to move this bill forward."

Senator Inouye rose speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"The State of Hawai'i Office of Planning's *Feasibility and Implications of Establishing a Carbon Offset Program for the State of Hawai'i*, released in December 2019, calls for the state to conduct a study on carbon pricing before the Legislature considers a carbon pricing model for Hawai'i. In accordance with Act 122, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2019, the Hawai'i State Energy Office will conduct a study on carbon pricing, including whether and how a carbon pricing policy shall be implemented in Hawai'i. Any potential carbon pricing mechanism should align with the current goals of the State of Hawai'i. The state is currently on track to meet its 2020 greenhouse gas emissions reduction target and has a more ambitious zero emissions clean economy target for 2045.

"As noted in the committee report:

- Singapore jet fuel, which Hawaii petroleum marketers use as a benchmark for pricing, is currently trading at around \$65 / bbl. A tax of \$16.07 would be assessed in just the first year of the proposed legislation. That is a twenty-five percent increase in the cost of jet fuel. That cost is absorbed by air travelers and would price out entire segments of our largest industry, raising ticket prices and visitor expenses.
- The cost of fuel oil for HECO and other power plants would rise thirty-one percent in the first year. Hawaii is already struggling with some of the highest kilowatt per hour prices in the world. Raising the price of electricity would further increase the cost of living for Hawaii's working families.
- There are federal carbon tax proposals that are likely to be considered by Congress after the November election. A federal carbon pricing standard would ensure a level playing field for the industry and is likely to include border adjustments to deal with large pollution emitters such as China and India. Climate change is a global problem and addressing it with state specific measures does little to fuel the coordination between nations that we need.

"Additional submitted testimony cited, and I quote, 'Businesses can and will pass on any enhanced costs to their consumers if they hope to continue providing their products or services. That means our already astronomical cost of living could head further up into the stratosphere,' and this is from the Tax Foundation of Hawaii. 'Hawai'i is an isolated land mass relying on the air, water, and ground transportation modes for everything. Nearly 100 percent of everything you see in your office and home, nearly 100 percent of everything you eat, comes from outside our state. Increasing costs to our lifelines will, in turn, cost Hawai'i residents dearly. Putting a price on carbon merely boosts our industry's and residents' price to survive,' and this came from the Hawaii Transportation Association.

"Several organizations have urged the Legislature to wait on this bill until the study and report on carbon pricing by the Hawaii State Energy Office can be completed. State Deputy Attorney General Janine Udoi noted, and I quote, 'This bill may be subject to a challenge under the Privileges and Immunities Clause and the Commerce Clause of the United States Constitution. The Privileges and Immunities Clause provides that "[t]he Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.'" U.S. Const. art. IV[...] The Clause 'prohibits a State from denying nonresidents a general tax exemption provided to residents.' She further states, 'A challenge under the Privileges and Immunities Clause, however, may be overcome where there is a "substantial reason for the difference in treatment" and the discrimination against nonresidents "bears a substantial relationship to the State's objective.'"

"For this and other reasons, I urge my colleagues to vote 'no' on this bill. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Ruderman rose speak in support of the measure as follows:

"The carbon tax is the number one strategy that's been identified by multiple agencies in our country and around the world, including the National Caucus of Environmental Legislators and the Citizens' Climate Lobby as well as the United Nations. A United Nations and United States report from about a year and a half ago says we have 10 to 12 years to take drastic action. We have wasted our first two years here. The idea of studying it first and let's wait for the study to be done is a good idea for most of the things that we consider; of course we want knowledgeable guidance. But it's also a useful procrastination tool, and in the face of the climate crisis, procrastination is not acceptable. Our little study group may advise us how much more to raise it and how quickly we need to raise this tax to have any meaningful effect. There is no question about whether it will advise yes or no on a carbon tax; that's the number one tool that we have. This is perhaps the only potentially meaningful action we are considering on climate change this year.

"There are costs of addressing climate change, but they are dwarfed by the cost of not addressing it. Here in Hawai'i, we have a dirty little secret: We have the highest carbon footprint of any population in the world because of our dependency on air travel. No one wants to talk about that, but in the absence of national leadership, it is our responsibility to act, to act in the ways that we can to address our contributions to it. Those of us who believe the worldwide scientific consensus and care about the next generation and our planet support this bill and support increasing the carbon tax as aggressively as possible, and I want to commend the senator who brought it forward, the senator from Chinatown, for his efforts on this. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Thielen rose speak in support of the measure as follows:

“My goodness, this is only halfway through session, and if we just stopped every bill halfway through session because it wasn’t perfect, we wouldn’t be passing very many bills today, and that’s one of the reasons why there’s a defective date on this bill: It gives us an opportunity to fine-tune it.

“When my colleague was concerned about the cost of the tax, I think what we have to realize is that there is a cost with the use of these fossil fuels that the industry has not been paying and that we’ve not been dealing with. We had a big article in the paper over this weekend about the roads—this is going out to my colleague’s district on the North Shore of O’ahu—that are literally crumbling in the water, and how many roads we have around the state that we are going to have to move. The three largest costs that were identified facing this state today, in addition to our unfunded liabilities, is the cost of moving our public infrastructure to deal with climate change because we’re losing these areas, and these costs are going to be borne by our citizens. So the question is, are we going to have a tax on the fuels that are accelerating these costs so that there is an incentive for these industries to change out to cleaner fuels, and that goes to help fund those infrastructure changes that we need to make?”

“And when we talk about the increase in the cost of living, I want to thank the authors of the bill because they did put provisions in there where we do have a number of lower-income residents who are living farther away from the work centers and having to drive, so that there will be some rebates to them that will help offset those costs, so it’s trying to find the middle ground where we can help our lower-income residents to overcome that but still be able to fund the changes that the state needs to make for our infrastructure and to get the industry to hasten its moves to cleaner fuels. So thank you.”

Senator Inouye rose speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“While I agree with the bill’s intention of reducing our usage of fossil fuels, I believe this bill will prove more harmful to our state and its industries. Rental car industry leaders such as Enterprise Holdings have encouraged the rental of electric vehicles; customers still opt to rent cars powered by gasoline. The rental car industry is driven by market demand, and companies should not have to force customers to rent cars they do not want to rent. On a practical matter, electric vehicles are undesirable for tourists, who comprise 85 percent of the market, because renters will have to worry about the smaller trunk space EVs tend to have along with securing charging stations.

“This leads me to my second point: infrastructure. The Department of Transportation notes concerns with the constant revenue stream required to support this zero emission vehicle infrastructure special fund and grant program for this bill’s implementation. If this bill were to pass, the recently completed airport rental car facility in Kahului and current ongoing rental car facility construction in Honolulu would need to be redesigned and retrofitted to accommodate zero emission fleet requirements. Along with airport facilities, charging stations would have to be installed at hotels and other tourist destinations to accommodate renters.

“I firmly believe we should let the market determine when the rental industry is ready to incorporate zero emission vehicles into its fleets and thus stand in opposition of S.B. 996. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

By having this bill pass, my colleagues, we will be helping and having them be able to relate to one another in the mental health industry, so I ask you for your support for this bill. Thank you.”

Hawai'i law offers a modest extension of unpaid leave. However, it is available only to employees of large employers having more than one hundred employees. The purpose of S.B. 2491, S.D. 2 is to ensure that all employees in Hawai'i are provided family leave insurance benefits during times when they need to provide care for their 'ohana.

"Currently employees are often left with the dire choice of staying home to care for a sick family member or staying at work to sustain their family's income. The majority of Hawai'i's workforce cannot afford to take unpaid leave to care for a new child or attend to the needs of a family member with a serious health condition. Paid family leave is also an equal pay issue, and is necessary to correct gender inequality, as women are often the caregivers for all generations across their life span.

"Paid family leave alleviates economic instability for struggling families by ensuring job security for some of the most vulnerable and marginalized populations in our State. We have a vested interest in ensuring individuals are healthy, thriving, and economically secure.

"Please join me in support of S.B. 2491, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

"During the Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism and Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health joint hearing, Senate Bill 3036 was passed with amendments to include Section (k). The language added ended the tax credit going forward for all systems except for those utility-scale projects that have a PUC-approved or pending power purchase agreement that predated 2020. This change would effectively end the tax credits for community solar projects, affordable housing projects, utility scale solar projects, and residential solar energy systems approved after December of 2019. Tax credits like the REITC cannot last forever, and a transition path to reduce and eventually eliminate them may be appropriate. However, by potentially eliminating the tax credit altogether for systems on a going forward basis, does too much too soon. A more considered and thoughtful approach is needed. The Ways and Means Committee made additional amendments to address my concerns, along with the concerns that my colleagues had. This included deleting section 235-12.5(k) and clarifying that the measure also applies to a commercial, utility-scale renewable energy project developed pursuant to a power purchase agreement filed with and pending approval from the Public Utilities Commission prior to December 31, 2019. As a result of pursuing its goal to reach one hundred percent renewable energy by 2045, Hawai'i must continue to support utility-scale renewable energy projects that benefit residents and ratepayers. In order to continue to support this goal, the State must provide certainty and clarity for these projects to ensure their stability and long-term financial viability."

Senator Keohokalole rose to thank Senate President Kouchi, Senate leadership, Senate Chief Clerk Carol Taniguchi, Director of Information Technology Chris Lam, and the rest of the staff for their hard work in putting together the livestream pilot program, which allowed the Senate's proceedings to be broadcast live on YouTube.

Senator Shimabukuro announced that the Committee on Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Housing would be holding a public hearing on one resolution that afternoon at 1:45 p.m. in Conference Room 016.

Senator Kahele remarked that Hawai'i is a multi-cultural state with a broad number of traditions and customs, and noted that it was Hinamatsuri (Girls' Day). Although they were not present, Senator Kahele wished his daughters, and young girls across the State of Hawai'i, a happy Girls' Day.

Senator English announced that the 13th Festival of Pacific Arts & Culture, which had been scheduled for June 2020, would be postponed due to the coronavirus concerns in the best interest of protecting the people of Hawai'i and its visitors. Senator English informed the members that they would coordinate with the 28 participating countries to plan the festival for the following year, and thanked everyone for their support.

The Chair then invited all members of the Senate to the Majority caucus room immediately after session.

Thursday, March 5, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang and Harimoto who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Baker informed the members that March is Developmental Disabilities Month, a national campaign to raise awareness about the abilities and strengths of individuals with developmental disabilities, and that the State Council on Developmental Disabilities, an attached agency to the Department of Health, was holding their 20th Annual Day at the Capitol event that day in celebration of the contributions people with developmental disabilities make to our community. Senator Baker noted that about 400 event participants would be visiting various legislative offices, and welcomed all of the advocates and self-advocates who were present in the gallery, as well as Daintry Bartoldus, executive administrator of the State Council on Developmental Disabilities, and her staff from the Department of Health.

Senator Wakai recognized the United States Small Business Administration's State of Hawai'i Small Business Award recipients, and presented the following remarks:

"We are all business today: acknowledging it and celebrating it. This morning, we are honoring the winners of the 2020 Small Business Administration Small Business Awards; we have eight of them joining us on the floor of the Senate today. SBA is a federal agency whose mission is to aid, counsel, and protect small business concerns; preserve free enterprise; and bolster our economy. But don't be fooled: 'Small business' doesn't necessarily mean 'small impact'—these little engines are a source of strength for our economy, and it is important that we recognize their significant contributions. Much of the money we get to spend here in this building comes from their successes. I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Moanalua Valley to get us rolling."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to start off by introducing Christine Lanning, president of Integrated Security Technologies, Inc. She is the recipient of the Small Business Person of the Year award. Mr. President, colleagues, and guests, this award recognizes an individual with the best overall success in business. Since 1998, Integrated Security Technologies has been a leader in delivering quality electronic security solutions that protect Hawai'i's government, businesses, and employees. Notably, the company is woman-owned and is noted as one of the best places to work in the past couple of years. Christine has been instrumental in leading Hawai'i to a safer place, and has been a leader in creating connections and building bridges, paving the way for women and minorities in security. She will represent Hawai'i in the national Small Business Administration Awards. Congratulations, Christine. I'd like to now yield the floor to the senator of Kapolei."

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

"Aloha mai kākou. I'd like to introduce Ricky Price, chairman of the board of FastLube, Inc. Ricky is this year's recipient of the Entrepreneurial Success of the Year, an award which recognizes business growth and development. Established in 1992, FastLube, Inc., operates as Flagship FastLube and Flagship Express Car Wash. The company originally specialized in preventative maintenance services for cars and light trucks, and has since grown to six locations: Kapolei, Waipi'o Gentry, 'Aiea, Royal Kunia, and Pearl City. The company has since expanded to include a car wash in Waipi'o Gentry, notably washing over 120 cars per hour for a total of 1,000 cars per day. With hard work, determination, and ambition, Ricky has shown that it is possible to grow and set an example for other small businesses. Congratulations, Ricky; let's everyone give him another hand. I'd now like to yield the floor to the senator from Mānoa."

Senator Taniguchi rose to present the following remarks:

"It is my distinct pleasure this morning to introduce Claire Takashima of Uyeda Shoe Store, this year's recipient of the SBA Family-Owned Business of the Year award. This award honors a family-owned and -operated business with more than a 15-year history and that has passed some ownership and operational management from one generation to the next. The Uyeda Shoe Store has been helping customers find the perfect shoe fit for 105 years (which is slightly longer than I've been in the Senate). Claire's grandfather originally repaired shoes, eventually expanding the business into a shoe store. Claire is the business's third-generation owner and has since put her own touch into running the business, notably adding new merchandise and providing shoes that can't be found anywhere else for their loyal customers. Although the business has changed locations, its high-quality service and family touch keep the customers lining up. Congratulations, Claire. I'd now like to yield the floor to the senator from Mililani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"I would like to introduce Brian Suzuki, president and CEO of Hawai'i Air Cargo. Brian is this year's Small Business Exporter of the Year. This award is given to those who represent our nation's strong entrepreneurial spirit and rich diversity. Since 1982, Hawai'i Air Cargo has provided the islands with a reliable, economical freight forwarding service to and from the mainland and beyond. Throughout their nearly 40 years of business and counting, Hawai'i Air Cargo has proved themselves time and time again why customers return and why they are one of the best in their industry. Under Brian's

leadership, the company has only reached greater and higher heights. Congratulations, Brian. Mr. President, I'd like to now yield the floor to the senator from Waimānalo."

Senator Thielen rose to present the following remarks:

"Before I start my introduction, I do just have to point out that five of our eight businesspeople of the year are women, so anybody who doubts that we can have fewer than 50 percent of our state boards and commissions and our private boards be represented with gender equality should come down and take a look at the floor today.

"That announcement aside, it's my great pleasure today to introduce Alana Penarozza, the co-owner of Tag Aloha Company. Alana is the SBA Young Entrepreneur of the Year awardee. This award is given to those who have achieved great success as a small business owner from a young age. Alana helped start Tag Aloha with her partner, AJ, and their respective spouses. They started out Tag Aloha in 2013 in the small town of Kailua. Since then, they've expanded to many retailers across the state, including their signature line of Whole Foods bags and accessories that are loved by visitors and kama'āina alike. In 2019, Alana led Tag Aloha to a new tier: She diversified the business to add new products and lines, expanded to new markets outside of Hawai'i, doubled the company's number of employees, invested in new marketing resources and channels, and brought the company into its first ever Made in Hawaii show. Alana's ability to seek out creative growth opportunities, develop new ideas in uncharted space, and continually learn new skills to benefit her business and Hawai'i's business community distinguish her as outstanding SBA's Young Entrepreneur.

"I also want to give a shout-out to Alana and her young entrepreneur peers because they are very socially- and environmentally-minded. Tag Aloha is proud to be Hawai'i's very first Fair Trade-certified business. They donate portions of every product purchased to the Surfrider Foundation to protect our ocean and beaches. Alana believes that if we all keep doing just a little more, together we can make a big impact. With this in mind, all of their products are made from sustainably sourced organic cotton and supports fair pay, real families, and the reduction of plastic in our environment. Alana, thank you very much for all that you have done. Mr. President, I would like to turn the floor over now to the senator from Hale'iwa."

Senator Gabbard interjected to extend additional congratulations to Alana Penarozza for her accomplishments, and also for the birth of her new child. Senator Gabbard noted that Alana Penarozza's husband, Kainoa, serves as chief of staff for United States Representative Tulsi Gabbard, and that their new baby girl was celebrating her one-week birthday that day.

Senator Riviere rose to present the following remarks:

"On behalf of Senator Chang, it's my pleasure to introduce Catherine Taschner. Let's talk about Catherine for a moment. She's the cofounder and vice president of Business Law Corps and this year's Small Business Advocate for Women in Business. This award recognizes individuals who have supported and championed women in business. Understanding the difficulties in navigating and establishing one's self in the business world, Catherine founded Business Law Corps to connect local entrepreneurs with law firms willing to provide pro bono legal services. She coordinates the BLC's outreach and placement of direct legal service matters, working directly with the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business & Leadership and the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation to provide free weekly legal consultation to clients. And as any of you know if you've been involved with legal things, *free* and *pro bono* are magical words. She conducts free consultations and seminars on basic issues that face small businesses, such as

choice of entry, intellectual property, and raising capital. It is due to advocates like Catherine that businesses can thrive. Congratulations, Catherine. Mr. President, I now yield the floor to the senator from downtown Honolulu."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to introduce Lani Dawson Arena. Ms. Arena is cofounder and vice president of Business Law Corps and this year's Small Business Advocate for Minority Small Business. This award recognizes individuals who have supported and championed minorities in business. Lani works tirelessly to improve and enhance the Native Hawaiian community in more ways than one. She has dedicated multiple resources to support Native Hawaiian businesses, and she has established and administers programs that directly benefit Native Hawaiians and promote Native Hawaiian languages, arts, and culture. Beyond financial affairs, she regularly dedicates time to testify in support of Native Hawaiian issues and serves on various advisory councils and committees, such as the Native Hawaiian Organizations Association Legislative Committee. In all that she does, she continues to look for new strategies and solutions that can better the people of Hawai'i. Congratulations, Lani. I now yield the floor to the senator from Kaka'ako."

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to introduce Nam Vu, cofounder of Impact Hub Honolulu and one of this year's Small Business Advocates for Innovation. This award is given to those who have done significant work in fostering an innovative ecosystem. Since 2014, Impact Hub has provided a co-working, office, and community event space designed to facilitate sustainable impact in Hawai'i and overseas, offering a reliable space for the entrepreneurial and small business community to work in and build connections. Nam and cofounder George created a program called Impact Partners to provide scholarships funded by larger companies to cover access to event space, membership costs, and other benefits to promising firms. The two went above and beyond, setting intentional coffee dates and office hours with new members to discuss business, learn how Impact Hub can help them, coach, offer other business connections, and bring in subject-matter experts and professional services. Nam and George have helped businesses every step of the way. Impact Hub is well on its way to seeing its vision of an interconnected Hawai'i come true. Congratulations, Nam. Thank you. Mr. President, I'd now like to yield the floor back to the senator from Salt Lake."

Senator Wakai rose and stated:

"Cha-ching! I can feel the love for business leaders in this room. Congratulations to all of our honorees, particularly the five female tycoons amongst you. These individuals are part of the reason why Hawai'i's business environment continues to thrive."

Senator Kahele recognized Hawai'i State Film Commissioner Donne Dawson, who was present in the gallery with her niece Alana Song.

TWENTY-SEVENTH DAY

Friday, March 6, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang and Gabbard who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Sixth Day.

At this time, the Chair publicly thanked Senator Kim for her ideas about sanitation and how to deal with the coronavirus to ensure the safety of the members, staff, and the public.

Senator Baker commended the 2019 Healthcare Hero awardees, and presented the following remarks:

"Before I introduce our guests on the floor, I'd like to introduce those in the gallery who are here to be a part of our presentation today. From Hawai'i Pacific Health, Mike Robinson; he was here earlier. From the Healthcare Association of Hawaii, we have Hilton Raethel, Paige Heckathorn, Stacy Wong, Patrick Harrison, Wendy Odo, and Janna Hoshide. Thank you.

"Colleagues, the Healthcare Association of Hawaii is a leading voice for healthcare providers in the state. The organization works to positively influence state and federal policy to provide quality and accessible healthcare to the people of Hawai'i. Through HAH's Healthcare Heroes awards, patients are given the opportunity to acknowledge the services of outstanding healthcare providers: those who have demonstrated exceptional commitment and noteworthy expertise. These providers are honored for the exemplary care that they deliver to patients and their loved ones across Hawai'i. They truly are the epitome of selfless service for the betterment of our community, and we are proud to honor them this morning as Healthcare Heroes. I'd like to yield the floor to the senator from Kaka'ako for the first introduction."

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

"Our first Healthcare Hero is Agusta Yoro, a medical technician at Kalākaua Gardens assisted living facility. Beverly Da Silva nominated Agusta after her mother, Kikue Fujita, was a patient at Kalākaua Gardens for two and a half years. Beverly will never forget the respectful and compassionate care Agusta gave to her mother. Agusta always had a smile and encouraging words to get Kikue to join in activities, take her medication, and other daily necessities, and we know how hard that is for patients. Agusta would be there to help Kikue with her mobility, make her feel comfortable as long as possible. Agusta enjoys working with seniors and thinks of them as her own parents. Agusta not only gave her undivided expertise to enrich the wellness and spirit of her patient, but she also proved herself as one who truly values the ethics and professionalism behind her work as a healthcare provider by being nothing short of exceptional. Agusta exemplifies the power of altruism in times of hardship and is a noteworthy individual who uplifts the aloha spirit of our state. Shall we all again congratulate Agusta? Mr. President, I now yield the floor to the senator from Waipahu."

Senator Nishihara rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next Healthcare Hero is Brandy Boyce, a neonatal intensive care unit nurse at the Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children. Simone Schmid nominated Brandy when her daughter Sophia was born with some organs outside of her body because of an abdominal wall defect. Brandy signed up to

be Sophia's primary nurse to take care of Sophia from birth all the way to her discharge. Brandy supported skin-to-skin contact between Sophia and her parents, even when the effort would take over an hour to get her into the parent's arms. She taught the family a great deal about how to care for Sophia, making them feel more confident despite the challenges. Brandy not only cared for Sophia but also cared about her. Her professionalism, listening ear, and guiding voice make her deserving of the award as a Healthcare Hero. Thank you again. I would like now to yield the floor to the senator from Wai'anae."

At this time, the Chair recognized the presence of Sophia in the gallery.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

"Our next Healthcare Hero is Mervin Lum, a pharmacist at Foodland Pharmacy in Kapolei. Candice Phillips has lived with a life-threatening illness for a very long time. She and her physicians tried various medications and treatment options to improve her quality of life. She received a prescription for a last-chance medication, which she found hard to find on island after being rejected by one pharmacy after another. After many attempts to get her prescription filled, she ended up at the Foodland Pharmacy in Kapolei. Mervin listened intently as she described her dilemma. He told her he was familiar with the medication in question and would do his best to learn more about it. Merv knew and was able to get Candice the medication she needed, and her life dramatically improved in just a matter of days. His care didn't stop at the initial encounter, as Merv continues to check in on Candice to make sure that her needs are addressed and to check for any side effects. His care and support allow patients like Candice access to the same last-chance medications, making him and his efforts more than worthy of the award as a Healthcare Hero. Would you please give another round of applause to Mervin Lum? Thank you very much. I will now yield the floor to the senator from Moanalua."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"Dr. Walter Igawa-Silva is our next Healthcare Hero. Dr. Igawa-Silva is a physician at Tripler Army Medical Center, the iconic pink building in my district, my neighborhood. Dr. Igawa-Silva helped retired Vietnam veteran Len Kacher twice. Len first came into contact with Dr. Igawa-Silva in the emergency room with uncontrollable blood sugar levels, and Dr. Igawa-Silva assisted Len with getting a continuous glucose monitor in order to help Len regulate his blood sugar levels and improve his quality of life. And then Dr. Igawa-Silva saved Len's life a second time when Len went to the emergency room again and was admitted for a few days for treatment. After being discharged, Dr. Igawa-Silva saw Len for a follow-up and immediately suspected that something else was wrong and affecting his health, so he ordered blood tests and x-rays, and diagnosed Len with pneumonia. As we all know, pneumonia has killed many people, and so Len was readmitted to the hospital and was able to fully recover with the appropriate treatment. Dr. Igawa-Silva's attentive and proactive care greatly improved Len's life and demonstrated why he is a Healthcare Hero. Congratulations and thank you again. I now yield the floor, Mr. President, to the senator from downtown Honolulu."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"Our final Healthcare Heroes are patient navigators Lyne Elzman and Jocelyn Nishioka from The Queen's Medical Center. Rochelle Lee is the manager of The Queen's Women's Health Center, and she nominated Lyne and Jocelyn for the exemplary care and service they provided during her own cancer journey. Rochelle manages and organizes programs to

serve breast cancer patients, never thinking that she would become a patient herself. After her diagnosis, Lyne and Jocelyn brought hope and guidance to Rochelle through all the many treatments needed for recovery. Lyne and Jocelyn immediately reassured Rochelle that everything was going to be okay and started working on the next steps of Rochelle's treatment. Lyne and Jocelyn looked out for Rochelle's best interests, working on the consultations with oncologists and surgeons, staying on top of needed treatments and appointments, and being with Rochelle every step of the way through the arduous process to beat cancer. Lyne and Jocelyn not only gave their undivided expertise to help enrich the spirit and health of their patient but also prove that each of these patient navigators value the ethics and professionalism of their healthcare roles by being nothing short of exceptional. Thank you so much. I will now yield the floor to the senator from Lahaina."

Senator Baker then recognized Straub Clinic and Hospital of Hawai'i Pacific Health, and presented the following remarks:

"It's my pleasure to recognize Straub Clinic & Hospital for the award that they received, and I'm going to start by recognizing their CEO, Martha Smith. Martha is the CEO of Straub Clinic & Hospital and the executive vice president of Hawai'i Pacific Health O'ahu operations. Let's give Martha a round of applause. For those of you who may not know, Straub was named one of the 2020 Healthgrades 250 Best Hospitals in America, chosen among more than 4,000 hospitals in our nation. This distinction places Straub in the top 5 percent of hospitals in the United States.

"A little history for those of you who may not be familiar: In the early 1900s, Dr. George F. Straub arrived in the islands with a mission to provide the finest medical care available. His vision was to create a clinic where patients always came first and where the healthcare needs of entire families were met under one roof. This vision was realized in 1921 with the opening of the clinic, which expanded over the years into what is known now as Straub Medical Center, a fully integrated not-for-profit medical center with a 159-bed hospital in Honolulu, a network of neighborhood clinics, and visiting specialist programs that reaches throughout our state. Throughout its years of operation, Straub Medical Center has introduced many medical firsts to Hawai'i, such as the notable Straub burn unit center that opened in 1983, which is the Pacific region's only multi-disciplinary burn treatment center. In its distinction as one of the best hospitals in America, Straub was rated as high-performing for aortic valve surgery, colon cancer surgery, heart bypass surgery, and hip replacement. Straub also received 2020 Excellence Awards for pulmonary and stroke care, and Straub is also the only hospital in Hawai'i to receive the Healthgrades 2020 America's 100 Best Hospitals for gastrointestinal care and general surgery awards. So please join me in recognizing and honoring Straub Clinic and Hospital of Hawai'i Pacific Health for their many accomplishments.

"I would like to, once again, wholeheartedly thank all of our honorees for the significant positive force that they are in the medical field here in Hawai'i."

The Chair announced that the honorees would be greeted on the Senate floor immediately after adjournment.

Senator Taniguchi introduced Patti Igawa, grandmother of Dr. Igawa-Silva, and noted that they had worked together in Governor John A. Burns's office many, many years ago and have remained friends.

The Chair recognized Mike Robinson of Hawai'i Pacific Health, who was present in the gallery.

The Chair then remarked that part of the challenge on the neighbor islands is that there aren't enough people to have specialty services. The Chair had found out several years ago

that no one does pacemakers on the island of Kaua'i, and his father had to be medevaced to Honolulu to receive a pacemaker at Straub. The Chair was aware of the excellent care his father had received and was appreciative of the extra years his father had to spend with his family due to receiving the pacemaker at Straub.

TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY

Monday, March 9, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Gabbard and Harimoto who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Keohokalole welcomed a group of students from Kailua High School's leadership program, who were seated in the gallery with student activities coordinator Sheri Hanoa.

Senator Chang honored Ray Aivazian III, Sophia and Lucas Magel, and Scott Kunihiro, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues and guests, a great amount of microplastics end up on our shores every year. They produce poisonous gases, leach toxins, and are harmful to us, animals, and our environment. Kailua resident Ray Aivazian III is a former combat engineer who served eight years active duty in the Marine Corps. He was stationed at Camp Pendleton, California, from 2009 to '13, and here from 2013 to '17. Before he retired from the Marines, Ray purchased a house because he wanted to make Hawai'i his home as he loves this land and the people who inhabit it. After the Marines, Ray immediately immersed himself in school and began his journey in attaining a degree in global environmental science through the University of Hawai'i. It was at UH that he started getting more involved in different outreach programs, clubs, and giving back to the community, and it was at a beach cleanup where his new adventure really began.

"Distressed by the amount of debris on our shores and armed with an engineering background, Ray designed an invention for removing microplastics from our beaches called a buoyancy separation device. His invention—constructed of easily attainable materials—was made available online for others to replicate. After realizing that more was needed, Mr. Aivazian created a new methodology for assessing shoreline marine debris accumulation and found a way to separate small pieces of wood, leaves, and grass from the collected microplastics using an underwater vacuum chamber. Through these novel approaches, Mr. Aivazian was able to quantify microplastic particles that had never been observed or removed before. He then went on to create a STEM-based curriculum for different grade levels which allows keiki to create a buoyancy separation device, participate in a beach cleanup, extricate natural and synthetic material in the vacuum chamber, and then separate it into different size categories to add to our understanding of shoreline marine debris accumulation. This curriculum is allowing students to learn first-hand about the science of the sea and the severely detrimental impacts of microplastics. Mr. Aivazian received the Sherwood Maynard Award from the University of Hawai'i for the Marine Option Program Symposium project with the largest oceanic impact.

"After reading about Mr. Aivazian's mission and his inventions, Lucas and Sophia Magel, Haha'ione Elementary students, were inspired. The siblings created a slideshow that they presented to their school's PTSA, requesting funding for materials to build a few of Mr. Aivazian's devices with their classmates. They were articulate, informative, and confident in what they were proposing. The PTSA was impressed and awarded Lucas and Sophia the funds. Using Mr. Aivazian's

blueprint, and with guidance from Haha'ione STEM teacher Scott Kunihiro, the Magels set off to build the first microplastics device as a family. The first buoyancy separation device build-and-beach trial went off without a hitch. Seeing real results and realizing the impact this could make, Sophia and Lucas immediately thought about what worked and what could be improved for the next round. Sophia and Lucas then demonstrated the device to some of their classmates during a school field trip. That group beach cleanup became the first of many gatherings to come. Sophia and Lucas formally started a club called the Green and Blue Crew, which focuses on helping our oceans and our earth. The Green and Blue Crew started a new recycling program at Haha'ione Elementary, and they hope to be able to eliminate plastic forks in the cafeteria.

"Today, we honor and commend Ray Aivazian III, Lucas and Sophia Magel, and Scott Kunihiro for their work to remove microplastics from our shores. Their efforts are an inspiration to others, creating a movement to spread awareness, rehabilitate our shorelines, and make a real difference in the world. We also have with us today the following people who came to show their support: We have the parents of Sophia and Lucas, Diana Dayrit and Jon Magel; we have Lisa Jack and her children Torin and Talon Jack from Makakilo; the Surfriider Foundation; Protea Zero Waste; Lanikai Brewing; Treehouse Coworking Space; Wastewater Alternatives and Innovations; Rogue Waves; Center for Marine Debris Research; Windward Community College faculty; and University of Hawai'i faculty."

The Chair announced that the honorees would be greeted on the Senate floor immediately following adjournment.

Let's give them all a big hand, please. I'd like to now yield the floor to my colleague from Kapālama."

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Harimoto, and Kahele who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads recognized members of Planned Parenthood's Teen Council, a diverse body of students from local schools who meet weekly with a Planned Parenthood educator to discuss various sexual health and relationship issues. Teen Council members create classroom presentations to share with their peers and are involved in advocacy, social justice, and public policy, all of which fosters an environment where teens feel empowered to find their own voice and to advocate for greater change for future generations. Senator Rhoads noted that Teen Council members were holding a Lobby Day at the State Capitol in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of Hawai'i's law legalizing abortion, and invited the members to view a painting by local artist Lauren Hana Chai that demonstrates advocacy in action at last year's rally to stop anti-abortion laws. Senator Rhoads then introduced Teen Council members Jensen Dunn, Krislynn Gonzales, Jane Paia-Sobrado, Ellie Sampson, Sirena Spurrier, and Mahinamakamae Wallace, as well as other supporters and guests who were present in the gallery.

Senator Rhoads also introduced Fetu Kolio, an old friend and longtime resident of the 13th Senatorial District, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Dela Cruz welcomed Randy Ching, a big supporter of Hawai'i's environment, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Kim honored Robert Lopaka Kapanui, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, today we are honored to recognize an individual on his standing as one of Hawai'i's foremost storytellers and for his dedication and passion for perpetuating Hawai'i's rich history through the treasured art of storytelling. For over 20 years, Robert Lopaka Kapanui has been sharing more than Hawaiian ghost stories—he perpetuates and celebrates local culture, history, language, and folklore through his storytelling and knowledge of the islands' history and legends. Lopaka is a Native Hawaiian storyteller, writer, actor, kumu hula, and cultural practitioner as well as a husband, father, and grandfather, and even a former professional wrestler. Sometimes known as 'The Ghost Guy,' he says his expertise has come through research, personal experience, and others who share their stories with him.

"Born and raised on O'ahu, he grew up hearing legends and ghost stories from his kūpuna, which were passed on to Lopaka through mo'olelo, mouth to ear, sitting at the feet of his mother and aunt. He listened and learned that this legacy would be passed down to his family one day. In 1994, Lopaka took a ghost tour with Glen Grant, tour creator and renowned author of the *Obake Files* and *Chicken Skin* story series. At the time, he had no idea that he was about to meet his future mentor, the man who would change the course of his life. Lopaka quickly realized that the stories Grant told were the same that his kūpuna had shared with him, but bolstered by documentation and history. Through his company, *Mysteries of Hawai'i*, Lopaka followed in the footsteps of his friend and mentor to

honor the legacy of the man who meant so much to him. Carrying on Hawai'i's rich history of ha'i mo'olelo, Lopaka today shares tales with those who respect and admire him as a teacher, guide, and repository of our culture and history. In keeping with Grant's encouragement to do more, *Mysteries of Hawai'i* also gives back to the community by supporting the Special Olympics and Project Graduation, storytelling at public schools and libraries to support literacy, and sharing at Camp Anuenue, a children's cancer program.

"I'd like Lopaka to please stand to be recognized along with his wife, Tanya Ululani Kapanui. It is because of Tanya's love and support and encouragement that he is able to do what he does and share the stories of our island home. Now, I'm not going to let him tell you any ghost stories about this capitol because I know many of you work late at night and you might not want to know what is lurking in our hallways, but once again, thank you very much for being here, and we can have another round of applause for our guests."

“Major General has over 36 years of military service of which 27 years were on Active Federal Service as a full-timer with the Hawaii National Guard.

“In the previous five years, he has served as the Deputy Adjutant General for the State of Hawai‘i, Department of Defense. Additionally, during the past two years, he concurrently served as the commander of the Hawaii Army National Guard and as the Deputy Chief of Staff, G3 Operations for the Eighth U.S. Army in Korea.

“Other significant military assignments include assignment as the dual status commander of Joint Task Force – 50 during the 2018 response to the Kīlauea volcanic eruption and Hurricane Lane.

“Major General served on three combat deployments. The first deployment he commanded an Infantry battalion with over 600 soldiers that deployed to Baghdad, Iraq; second as the deputy commander of the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team responsible for camp commands in Kuwait and convoy security missions throughout Iraq; and third as the commander of the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team with over 3,500 soldiers and simultaneously led the deployment of 16 Security Forces Assistance Advisor Teams to the Regional Command South, in Kandahar, Afghanistan.

“His greatest strength is his leadership style with significant strength in experience, planning, organization and supervision of tasks.

“I therefore ask that my colleagues and you, Senate President, support me to confirm the nomination of Major General Kenneth S. Hara to the position of Adjutant General, State of Hawai‘i, Department of Defense.

“Thank you, Mr. President!”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Harimoto, Kidani, Ruderman).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3434 (Gov. Msg. No. 505):

Senator Nishihara, for the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3434) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of STEPHEN F. LOGAN as Deputy Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 505.

Senator Nishihara moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3434 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried.

Senator Nishihara then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of STEPHEN F. LOGAN as Deputy Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Nishihara rose to request that remarks in strong support of the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Nishihara’s remarks read as follows:

“I rise in strong support of GM 505 – for consideration and confirmation as the Deputy Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, Gubernatorial Nominee Stephen F. Logan, for a term to expire at noon on 12/05/2022.

“Colonel Stephen F. Logan has over 39 years of military service with the Hawaii National Guard. For 15 years, he served as a Dual-Status Federal Military Technician in the grades of GS14 and GS-15. Prior to that, three years were served in an Active Military Status in the 1990’s. All other times were served as a traditional part-time National Guard Soldier while concurrently employed with the Honolulu Police Department for a period of twenty-two years. Within that timeframe, he progressed to the rank of Metropolitan Police Lieutenant as a Patrol Watch Commander.

“In the previous three years, he served as the Chief of Staff of the Hawaii Army National Guard, comprised of over 3000 Soldiers and over 600 active, technician, and state employees. He commanded two of three major subordinate commands of the Hawaii Army National Guard: the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, and the 103d Troop Command. For over ten years, he managed the multi-million dollar fixed and rotary wing aviation program as the State Army Aviation Officer; and is qualified to fly both platforms. Colonel Logan is qualified as a Certified Defense Financial Manager, and member of the American Society of Military Comptrollers.

“Other significant military assignments include assignment as the deputy commander of Joint Task Force – 50 during the 2018 response to the Kīlauea volcanic eruption and Hurricane Lane. Additionally, he served on a combat deployment as the deputy commander of the 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team with 16 Security Forces Assistance Advisor Teams to the Regional Command South, in Kandahar, Afghanistan. While there, he detached to advise an Afghan Major General in charge of all Afghan Uniformed Police in Regional Command South; and subsequently the Kandahar Province National Directorate of Security Chief.

“His greatest strength is his ability to motivate others and his commitment to fiscal stewardship and proper execution of federal and state funding that is most applicable to the Deputy Adjutant General position.

“I therefore ask that my colleagues and you, Senate President, support me to confirm the nomination of Colonel Stephen F. Logan to the position of Deputy Adjutant General, State of Hawai‘i, Department of Defense.

“Thank you, Mr. President!”

At this time, the Chair remarked:

“Thank you. I was remiss in General Hara’s confirmation: They were originally not scheduled for today. In light of everything that is happening, I want to commend Senator Nishihara, his staff, and our staff in making sure we could get this to the floor and conduct the vote today. You know, they are the leaders of our civil defense and, with everything happening in our community today, we want to send a clear and strong message about who is in charge, so thank you, Senator Nishihara. Convey my thanks to your staff.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3418 (Gov. Msg. No. 508):

Senator Taniguchi moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3418 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ihara and carried.

Senator Taniguchi then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of ANNE E. PERREIRA-EUSTAQUIO as Deputy Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, term to expire at noon on December 5, 2022, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Your Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts held a public hearing on February 13th. After review and consideration of the nominee’s personal history, résumé, statement, and testimony received, your committee finds Anne Perreira-Eustaquio very well-qualified to serve as deputy director of DLIR. Accordingly, your Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts recommends that the Senate advise and consent to the confirmation of Anne E. Perreira-Eustaquio to serve as DLIR deputy director. And if I could have some comments inserted into the Journal also?”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Taniguchi’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Ms. Eustaquio has been serving as the Acting Deputy Director since October 2019. Committed to public service, she has more than 30 years of experience with DLIR, including most recently as Unemployment Insurance Administrator—responsible for managing the safety net of the federal–state program. She previously served as an Unemployment Insurance Program Development Officer, Auditor, and Program Specialist. Born and raised in Hilo, she earned a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in Accounting, and a Master’s degree in Business Administration from Chaminade University of Honolulu.

“Ms. Eustaquio has been an integral part of the DLIR modernization efforts by leading the information technology steering committee projects, and increasing employee engagement with the development of the Alternative Working Schedule.

“As reflected in the committee report and many testimonies, Ms. Eustaquio strives to do what is right, and her tremendous experience, expertise, people skills, and integrity all complement the efforts of Director Scott Murakami. Ms. Eustaquio is personally committed to providing both ‘leadership with passion’ and a strong, collegial work ethic to help realize the vision and mission of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I’m so proud of our Hilo, Big Island, girl, who has come from humble beginnings. She has shown her dedication to her work for 30 years, and I’m proud of her willingness to continue in her new role if confirmed today, and I ask that you all join me in confirming Anne Perreira-Eustaquio. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

The Chair commented:

“Thank you, Senator Inouye; I appreciate your comments. All she talked to me about was her connections to Kaua’i when she came for her appointment with me.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, none. Excused, 3 (Harimoto, Kidani, Ruderman).

At this time, Senator Taniguchi introduced Deputy Director Anne Eustaquio, who was accompanied in the gallery by her mother, Marie Perreira; husband, Ish Eustaquio; brother and sister-in-law Duane and Kathleen Perreira; sister and nephews

Millicent, Kaleb, and Jaron Gilmore; her friends Rene and Mao Layne; as well as a large contingent of Department of Labor and Industrial Relations employees, headed by Director Scott Murakami.”

At 12:15 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:36 p.m.

At this time, the Chair remarked:

“First, I am reluctant to call a caucus and go into a space that would be, under the current advisory, inappropriate for us to meet, but we are having two resolutions being prepared that are asking the administration to prioritize issues. Senator Dela Cruz, as the introducer, will explain them; when the draft supplemental Order of the Day is completed and the amended resolution can be put on your desk, we will deal with that matter. Second, the House is still in caucus and we will wait for the House to vote on the resolution to be sure that we are in a joint action. Should they, for some reason, decide to take another action, then we are prepared to act accordingly.”

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Colleagues, I know that, like me, many of you are disappointed in the cancellation of Education Week, and while we will not be honoring these amazing educators on the floor, we will be asking that comments be inserted into the Journal so that there is still an official record of the honorees, and with that, I’d like to ask that comments be inserted into the Journal noting the honoring of Ed Week nominees that would have been honored today.”

The Chair having so ordered, the comments on behalf of Senator Kidani, Chair of the Committee on Education, read as follows:

“Floor Recognition: Education Week

“MONDAY: March 16, 2020

“Despite the unprecedented reality that we are presently encountering due to COVID-19, this pandemic should not deter our outstanding educators and students to go without the recognition that they all deserve. For that reason, I would like to add these remarks to the Senate Journal to ensure that the Education Week recipients are rightfully recognized.

“Colleagues, today marks the first day of Education Week, where the Hawai’i State Legislature recognizes leadership, teaching, service, and scholarship within our Hawai’i education system. This year, we will show homage to teachers, counselors, librarians, and school administrators who have shown a dedication for the future generations of Hawai’i students. We will also give recognition to students who have made strides in academics and athletics.

“We would first like to recognize outstanding students. Four incredible young people have shown leadership outside of the classroom. The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards program honors middle and high school students for their volunteer work within the community.

“**Rylee Brooke Kamahale.** Rylee is a seventh-grade home-schooled student from Mililani. She does not let her young age stop her from helping her community. She started volunteering with her parents at a young age, and by the age of eight, she wanted to make her own impact. She was told at first that people ‘didn’t want to babysit while doing community service.’ However, with a strong drive and perseverance, Rylee was able to work alongside others in charitable organizations and then started her own movement. She established ‘Love is a Verb,’ an organization that has put on numerous youth-run projects,

including beach cleanups, animal protection projects, and providing Thanksgiving dinners to the homeless. Rylee also co-founded a 'Secret Santa Project' that held donation drives and made Christmas a little brighter for youth who were staying in shelters.

"I would also like to recognize **Joie Agoo**, a senior at Mililani High School. Joie is also a Prudential Spirit of the Community honoree for her incredible volunteer work. A proud member of the YMCA, she and a group of friends have been preparing lunches for those who are homeless; providing them with nutritious meals containing fresh fruits and vegetables. It has become apparent that **Joie Agoo** is a compassionate young person and explains, in her own words, that 'we don't just feed their stomachs; we strive to feed their hearts and souls.' I would like to congratulate Joie for her outstanding efforts.

"Our next honoree is **Dyson Chee**. Dyson is a home-schooled senior with a keen eye for the environment and the ocean. His initiative, 'Project OCEAN' has educated people about the issue of plastic pollution in Hawai'i. Dyson attends local schools and community events to present information on why plastic pollution is a problem and how it could be solved. In addition, he has worked with schools to eliminate their use of single-use plastic bags and distributed over 1500 reusable straws. Dyson is also a familiar face here at the Capitol, as he has been actively testifying before the Legislature. The Senate would like to thank **Dyson Chee** for his efforts in keeping our precious oceans clean and congratulate him for being a distinguished finalist for the Prudential Spirit of the Community Award.

"**Yucheng Wu** is from Maryknoll High School. After relocating from China, Yucheng started using Khan Academy, a web-based nonprofit which offers educational resources to improve her English skills. She realized how beneficial the website was for her and decided to volunteer her time to help others around the world. Yucheng has volunteered more than a thousand hours of her time to translate learning materials from English to Chinese for Khan Academy. Yucheng's efforts have been able to help even those in rural and undeveloped regions. Congratulations **Yucheng Wu** and mahalo for helping others in our community and around the world.

"A student-athlete who has proven excellence in the classroom and on the soccer field is **Liya Brooks**. She is a 14-year-old Moanalua High School student and has been selected as the only member from Hawai'i for the US Club Soccer's first ever id2 National Selection Girls Team. They will be traveling to England in March to challenge other top soccer academies. In addition to being an outstanding athlete, Liya is an outstanding student with a grade point average of 3.9. Congratulations to **Liya Brooks** for her achievement as a student-athlete.

"Education is a privilege that is often taken for granted, and we forget how much time and effort is placed into teaching our next generation. Principals, teachers, administrators, custodians, and more are involved. This incredible group of people put the time and effort to help our students excel. With that being said, I am proud to acknowledge the National Blue Ribbons Schools. These schools were selected by the U.S. Department of Education for their overall academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups.

"The first school I would like to recognize is **Lā'ie Elementary School**, led by **Principal Eliza Loha Kaka**. **Lā'ie Elementary School** has met the performance award criteria for the Exemplary High Performing schools and is ranked in the top 15 percent of Hawai'i schools in achievement in English and math. **Lā'ie Elementary** has implemented several initiatives that have been central to its success, including detailed writing

goals, reading stamina goals, and a schoolwide Response to Intervention plan.

"Our next National Blue Ribbon School is **Waialua Elementary School**, led by **Principal Scott Moore**. **Waialua Elementary School** met the performance award criteria for Exemplary Achievement Gap Closing and is in the top 15 percent of schools closing achievement gaps in English and Math in the last three years. Since school year 2015-16, the school has reduced the achievement gap in English by 17 percentage points and in Math by 15 percentage points. **Waialua Elementary School's** curriculum is standards-based with focused targets and clear criteria. In addition, each classroom has a teacher and a paraprofessional tutor or part-time teacher. The teaming allows for real-time interventions to minimize and prevent learning gaps from occurring.

"Our next National Blue Ribbon School is **Hickam Elementary School**, led by former **Principal Alisa Bender**, now the current Assistant Superintendent for the Office of Curriculum and Instructional Design. **Hickam Elementary School** has also met the performance award criteria for Exemplary High Performing schools and is ranked in the top 15 percent of Hawai'i schools in achievement in English and Math. **Hickam's** enrollment consists of 99 percent military-dependent students and is highly transient due to personnel movements. Understanding that one of the biggest challenges military children face is integration into new communities and schools, **Hickam Elementary School** recently dedicated its Aloha Transition Center, the 'front door' to the campus and a space that provides a feeling of belonging to the school 'ohana for any student new to the school.

"TUESDAY: March 17, 2020

"Colleagues, each session we have the great opportunity to recognize teaching excellence in our public schools. Our teachers are some of the most selfless people in our community; the time and effort that they invest to ensure our keiki are safe, educated, and thriving surely make them altruistic human beings. I would like to first say 'thank you' to all teachers for their dedication to our keiki.

"We would like to honor the Hawai'i State Teacher of the Year and Complex Teachers of the Year. The Hawai'i State Department of Education selects from over 11,000 educators to determine one Teacher of the Year, 15 Complex Teachers of the Year and one Charter School Teacher of the Year.

"The State of Hawai'i Teacher of the Year is Ms. **Cecilia 'CC' Chung** from Ka'imiloa Elementary School. Ms. Chung is an inspiration and a mentor to her fellow educators. Her passion for teaching is an inspiration not only to her peers, but to her students, as well. Ms. Chung joined the DOE in 2013 and is currently a sixth-grade teacher at Ka'imiloa Elementary. She has led and facilitated a variety of workshops for the education community including the Schools of the Future Conference, EdCamp for West O'ahu schools, and Kamehameha Schools' Ed Tech Conference. Congratulations again to **Cecilia 'CC' Chung** for earning this well-deserved honor as the 2020 Teacher of the Year.

"We are fully aware that teaching is not always done between the four walls of a classroom. Physical education is as important as any subject learned in the classroom. The lessons taught in PE class about staying physically active and making healthy lifestyle choices will be a lifelong benefit for our keiki.

"**Ms. Jessica Adkins** is the PE department chair and recreational leadership teacher at Maui High School. She is this year's Baldwin-Kekaulike-Maui Complex Area teacher of the year. Her work with the Special Olympics Unified Champion promotes a culture of inclusion by working to improve students' self-esteem and creating an accepting school environment.

Ms. Adkins' Unified Program gained national acclaim when it was recognized by ESPN as one of the Top 30 Special Olympics programs in the country. Congratulations to **Jessica Adkins**, the Baldwin-Kekaulike-Maui Complex Area Teacher of the Year.

"Mr. **Russell Rapoza** is a career and technical education teacher at Kea'au High School. He has motivated Hawai'i Island students with hands-on engineering challenges that have led to many breakthrough moments. Mr. Rapoza is currently coordinating students to develop a self-sustaining canoe hale, complete with solar and water catchment systems that will provide a cultural center for school activities. Congratulations to **Russell Rapoza**, the Ka'ū-Kea'au-Pāhoa Complex Teacher of the Year.

"Ms. **Kathy Sewake** of Waiākea Elementary School has passion for improving the quality of instruction through technology. Her initiative to pursue HIDEOE's Innovation and Computer Science Grants enabled teachers to better support technology and innovation. As the technology coordinator at Waiākea Elementary, she also serves as the school's testing coordinator and established the school's first digital media production team. Congratulations to **Kathy Sewake** of Waiākea Elementary School, the Hilo-Waiākea Complex Teacher of the Year.

"Ms. **Kai Ah Hee** is a district resource teacher in the West Hawai'i District Office and she has led the implementation of math, AVID and Next Generation Science Standards. She skillfully integrates her deep understanding of cultural and Hawaiian education to create an innovative, place-based curriculum for students and building the Instructional Leadership and Teacher Leader initiatives of the complex. Congratulations to **Kai Ah Hee** of West Hawai'i District Office, Honoka'a-Kealakehe-Kohala-Konawaena Complex Teacher of the Year.

"Ms. **Kaui Spitalsky** is a Hawaiian language immersion teacher at Lahainaluna High School. She teaches language arts, science and performing arts and crafts through the Hawaiian language and perspective. In addition, she is excited to promote Lahainaluna High's first graduating Hawaiian Immersion class. She is part of the Nā Hopena A'o General Learner Outcomes Committee, where she serves as a Hawaiian cultural education advisor to other teachers. Congratulations to **Kaui Spitalsky** of Lahainaluna High School, Hāna-Lahainaluna-Lāna'i-Moloka'i Complex Teacher of the Year.

"Ms. **Megan Nii** is the Academic Coach, and the creator and director of the Creative Arts Program at Wilcox Elementary School. During her 14 years of service, Megan has strived to boost the next generation of teachers and has served as a mentor for numerous student teachers. She mentors new teachers, facilitates teacher collaboration, conducts professional development, assists teachers in analyzing student performance to determine best practices, and serves as RTI (Response to Intervention) Coordinator and on the Leadership and Academic Review Teams. Congratulations to **Megan Nii** of Wilcox Elementary School, Kaua'i Complex Teacher of the Year.

"WEDNESDAY: March 18, 2020

"On our third day of Education Week, we have the honor to recognize school faculty and our dedicated librarians. The individuals that are here today support our keiki beyond the classroom and beyond academia. These unsung heroes operate behind the scenes providing academic support to ensure that students have an excellent experience, all while contributing to a positive school culture.

"School administrators play significant roles to ensure efficient school operations. A school is nothing without a dedicated vice principal who is dedicated to his or her student

body and staff members. Mr. **Michael Sugano** is a prime example of a truly dedicated and extraordinary Vice Principal. Mr. Sugano was selected Hawai'i's outstanding Vice Principal of the Year by the Hawaii Distinguished District Principals for his work at Prince David Kawānanakoa Middle School.

"Grounded in Nā Hopena A'o, Mr. Sugano provides opportunities and resources for teachers to enhance instruction, curriculum and assessment. He strives to build teacher capacity in order to increase engagement and develop students into self-directed learners. Mr. Sugano believes that confident teachers provide an increase in an authentic learning experience that supports growth and independence in students.

"Although Mr. Sugano is no longer with Kawānanakoa Middle School, as he has taken his expertise and leadership skills to Kaimukī High School, we at the Hawai'i State Senate would like to thank Vice Principal **Michael Sugano** for his work.

"School faculty plays a significant role in student success with more than what is taught in the classroom. School counselors are the unsung heroes of academia; helping students with issues much more than just academics. Counselors are there for students to receive guidance, advice, and even inspiration. This is the reason that **Ms. Raemie Pagaduan** is the Department of Education's Counselor of the Year.

"Ms. Pagaduan began her career at Nānākuli High School a little over a decade ago as a 7th-12th-grade counselor. She then turned her responsibilities to college counseling and became the college and career counselor. Concerned for her students' future and welfare, she takes the initiative to invest her passion into the Early College program, as many of her students will be the first of their families to attend college. With her steady commitment, Nānākuli's Early College student participation has increased seventeen percent with the rate of student enrollment in a four-year college being the highest in over a decade. Thank you so much to you, **Raemie Pagaduan** for your commitment towards future betterment for our keiki and thank you for your work in helping our Leeward Coast students.

"As we may know, reading comprehension is still a privilege in many areas around our world. Reading allows us to expand our knowledge. As we read, we ask questions, find answers, and solve issues. Much of this curiosity for knowledge could not be done without our librarians. With thanks to our librarians, our keiki can mend and fix current issues and new learn skills. We have the opportunity to recognize two wonderful librarians.

"Our first librarian is from the island of Maui. Ms. **Jessica Gleason**. Ms. Gleason is a librarian at Wailuku Public Library. She started as a library assistant at Makawao Public Library before transferring to Wailuku Library. However, she does not let the brick and motor location limit her from spreading knowledge and reading materials. Ms. Gleason also operates the Wailuku Library's Bookmobile program, which has been making library resources more accessible since 2016. Her regular route will include stops at nursing homes, senior homes, community centers, the correctional facility, and schools that do not have access to a library. Jessica Gleason is ensuring that all members of the community have the same opportunity to learn. We would like to thank you, Ms. **Jessica Gleason**, our Librarian of the Year, for providing information to the public and breaking down the barriers that prevent people from accessing information.

"Everyone deserves the opportunity to access knowledge. There should be no barriers for anyone to learn by retrieving information. Ms. **Nani Hee** has shown a true dedication to ensure those who are visually and hearing impaired have the same opportunities as anyone else. Ms. Hee is the Supervisor of the Transcribing Section at the Library for the Blind and

Physically Handicapped. Her department is responsible for the completion of all audio and braille transcribing projects, the execution of the closed-circuit radio broadcast for visually impaired patrons, and the supervision of other technicians in her section. Ms. Hee's career with the Hawaii State Public Library System started in 1989 as a library assistant. In 1994 she transferred to the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. She has worked tirelessly with dedicated volunteers, staff, and patrons to make their world a better-informed place. For this reason, Ms. **Nani Hee** is the Hawaii State Library Excellence in Service award winner. Thank you so much, Ms. Hee, for your truly selfless career to help our disabled community.

"Ms. **Larisa Gadach** of 'Ewa Makai Middle School was named Hawai'i State Assistant Principal of the Year by the National Association of Secondary Schools Principals. Vice Principal Gadach is an assistant principal for the 6th grade class at 'Ewa Makai Middle School. In her role, Ms. Gadach is passionate about building relationships with her students. She dedicates her time learning about her students, which gives her insight into who they are. Ms. Gadach says her goal every year is to learn as many students' names as she can, because knowing who they are means they know that they matter to you. Congratulations to **Larisa Gadach** for her incredible work.

"THURSDAY: March 19, 2020

"On our fourth day of Education Week, we would like to revert our attention back to our fine educators. On Monday, we were honored to recognize the Hawai'i State Teacher of the Year and the District Teachers of the Year from the Neighbor Islands. She keeps lessons intriguing by introducing students to animation, coding, and video production. The Pearl City-Waipahu district Teacher of the Year, Ms. **Jennifer Yamaguchi** envisioned herself as a teacher since she was in the first grade. Fast forward to the present; Ms. Yamaguchi is a fourth-grade teacher at Pearl City Highlands Elementary School. She believes that building positive relationships with each student creates a solid foundation. Ms. Yamaguchi is not just a role model for her students, but for her peers as well. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**WAIVERS OF REFERRAL**

Senator Dela Cruz, Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, rose to request that the referrals of the following measures to the Committee on Ways and Means be waived:

S.R. No. 146, entitled: "SENATE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXATION TO CONDUCT A REVENUE LOSS ANALYSIS OF MEDICAL AND GROCERY EXCISE TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR RETIRED SENIOR CITIZENS AGED SIXTY YEARS AND OLDER."

S.R. No. 166, entitled: "SENATE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE TAX REVIEW COMMISSION TO STUDY AND SUBMIT A REPORT ON THE TAX RAMIFICATIONS OF ENACTING LEGISLATION THAT ADDRESSES CLIMATE CHANGE MITIGATION AND ADAPTATION FACTORS IN HAWAII."

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"Mr. President, I request a waiver of the referral on the said resolutions to the Committee on Ways and Means so that we can discuss urgent subject matters."

The Chair granted the waivers.

ADOPTION OF SENATE RESOLUTIONS

S.R. No. 146:

Senator Dela Cruz offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 4) to S.R. No. 146:

SECTION 1. Senate Resolution No. 146 is amended by deleting its title and replacing it with language to read as follows:

"URGING THE GOVERNOR TO CREATE A COLOR-CODED ADVISORY SYSTEM TO ADDRESS THE RAPIDLY CHANGING THREAT OF COVID-19."

SECTION 2. Senate Resolution No. 146 is amended by deleting its contents and replacing it with language to read as follows:

"WHEREAS, considering the recent developments regarding COVID-19, or novel coronavirus, which causes a mild to severe respiratory illness, and the increasing danger it poses to our public; and

WHEREAS, the government of the State of Hawaii has a duty to inform and protect its citizens; and

WHEREAS, constituents have many questions based on a lack of information, and it is imperative to not only promote healthy hygiene and social distancing, but to also take steps to assure the public clearly understands the level of threat our communities face; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has announced a travel ban on persons arriving from Europe; and

WHEREAS, countries around the world are implementing procedures to combat and attempt to control the threat and spread of COVID-19. For example, Saudi Arabia is restricting travel to holy sites; South Korea is implementing quarantines enforced by criminal charge; Northern Italy is imposing army-guarded lockdowns of its towns, schools, and universities; China has implemented lockdowns of its cities, travel, and other public venues; Japan has closed its schools; France has requested its citizens to abandon the traditional "bise" greeting and banned public gatherings of five thousand people or more;

Iran has suspended its parliament; and Switzerland has banned gatherings of more than one thousand people; and

WHEREAS, counties and states across our nation are calling for, or have already declared states of emergency, with the states of California, Florida, and Washington having already declared a state of emergency; and

WHEREAS, Mayors of Kauai, Maui, and Honolulu have already issued separate proclamations of emergency to combat the threat of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, government agencies, such as the Department of Defense and other states, such as Washington, have already implemented tiered response protocols; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii state government needs to present a unified, cohesive response in the form of a singular, universally applicable tiered response protocol that informs the public and state agencies alike of both the current threat level posed by COVID-19 and the government's according response; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Homeland Security has previously implemented a color-coded advisory system used to communicate risk levels for previous threats to the public's health and welfare that is easily understood by and familiar to the public; and

WHEREAS, this previously used advisory system requires clear details in the context of the current situation to be effective; and

WHEREAS, the risk posed by COVID-19 can rapidly change, necessitating a system that can be quickly adjusted to reflect the level of risk posed by COVID-19 as well as the appropriate responses to the various risk levels; and

WHEREAS, this previously used system provides a means for the government to quickly and easily inform the public of updates to the situation and to plan appropriately in the event of changing risk levels; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, that the Governor is urged to create a color-coded advisory system consistent with the system previously developed and used by the Department of Homeland Security to address the rapidly changing threat of COVID-19; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor, Department of Health, and HIEMA are requested to coordinate with the appropriate government agencies to create a single, unified system that will inform the public and agencies alike of the standing threat level and according government restrictions, protocols and policies; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the risk advisory levels could be denoted as follows:

- (1) Red – Severe, indicating widespread community transmission, spread is ongoing, the majority of the islands in the State are involved, and recommended actions to be taken include:
 - (A) Continue all measures from the prior risk level;
 - (B) Consider restriction of movement, including quarantines, isolations, cancelation of public gatherings, avoiding congregate settings, and practicing social distancing;
 - (C) Access to public installations are limited;
 - (D) Cancel community activities; and
 - (E) Cancel all non-essential travel; and

- (2) Orange – Substantial, indicating sustained community transmission, spread is ongoing, and recommended actions to be taken include:
- (A) Continue all measures from previous risk level;
 - (B) Declare Public Health Emergency;
 - (C) Limit access to some state/public installations;
 - (D) Cancel large public gatherings and community activities; and
 - (E) Limit travel; and
- (3) Yellow – Moderate, indicating increased community transmission, multiple people in multiple locations have been infected, spread is contained, and recommended actions to be taken include:
- (A) Continue all measures from the previous level;
 - (B) Restrict travel in afflicted communities and advise civilians of the risk;
 - (C) Limit access to specific installations; and
 - (D) Strongly advise against large public gatherings; and
- (4) Blue – Limited, indicating community transmission beginning, sporadic and limited instances of infection, and recommended actions to be taken include:
- (A) Re-emphasize health and hygiene protocols;
 - (B) Limit access to areas with direct connection to infected individuals;
 - (C) Encourage cancelation of large public gatherings and communities’ activities; and
 - (D) Warn of risks of travel; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each level would include clear instructions regarding the anticipated action of the government, for example, at the Red risk level citizens can expect the government and state facilities, including schools, will be shut down; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this advisory system would also have clear requirements, which would effectuate a change of risk levels, such as the number of COVID-19 cases in the State; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each level would include recommended responses and actions to be taken by the public; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, all Executive Branch Directors, Chief Justice, and Mayors of each county.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“In light of the current situation, I believe that these resolutions are important for the Senate to pass. Last week, the Majority of the Senate had several meetings with the administration, and there are many concerns about the response, not just within government but how government is interacting and guiding the public. So I ask my colleagues to support this resolution.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 4 was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, S.R. No. 146, S.D. 1, entitled: “SENATE RESOLUTION URGING THE GOVERNOR TO CREATE A COLOR-CODED ADVISORY SYSTEM TO ADDRESS THE RAPIDLY CHANGING THREAT OF COVID-19,” was adopted.

S.R. No. 166:

Senator Dela Cruz offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 5) to S.R. No. 166:

SECTION 1. Senate Resolution No. 166 is amended by deleting its title and replacing it with language to read as follows:

“REQUESTING ALL EXECUTIVE BRANCH DEPARTMENTS AND ATTACHED AGENCIES TO INFORM THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES WHEN IMPLEMENTING THEIR PLANS AND PROCEDURES RELATING TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.”

SECTION 2. Senate Resolution No. 166 is amended by deleting its content and replacing it with language to read as follows:

“WHEREAS, the World Health Organization has declared COVID-19 to be a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is implementing its pandemic preparedness and response plans and working on multiple fronts, including providing specific guidance on measures to prepare communities to respond to local spread of the virus that causes COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, there is an abundance of pandemic guidance developed in anticipation of an influenza pandemic that is being adapted for a potential COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, current Centers for Disease Control and Prevention pandemic planning considerations include:

- (1) Disease severity in the community where a business is located;
- (2) Impact of disease on employees that are vulnerable and may be at higher risk for COVID-19 adverse health complications, including informing employees that some people may be at higher risk for severe illness, such as older adults and those with chronic medical conditions;
- (3) Preparing for possible increased numbers of employee absences due to illness in employees and their family members and dismissals of early childhood programs and K-12 schools due to high levels of absenteeism or illness;
- (4) Encouraging employers with more than one business location to provide local managers with the authority to take appropriate actions outlined in their business infectious disease outbreak response plan based on the condition in each locality;
- (5) Coordinating with state and local health officials for all businesses so that timely and accurate information can guide appropriate responses in each location where their operations reside;
- (6) Encouraging all employers to be ready to implement strategies to protect their workforce from COVID-19, while ensuring continuity of operations, including encouraging sick employees to stay home, the practice of respiratory etiquette and hand hygiene, and the routine cleaning of commonly used areas;

- (7) Identifying possible work-related exposure and health risks to employees;
- (8) Reviewing human resources policies to make sure that policies and practices are consistent with public health recommendations and existing state and federal workplace laws;
- (9) Exploring whether policies and practices can be established to increase the physical distance among employees and between employees and others in the workplace, if state and local health authorities recommend the use of social distancing strategies, including telecommuting and teleconferencing;
- (10) Encouraging businesses to identify essential business functions, essential jobs or roles, and critical elements within supply chains required to maintain business operations;
- (11) Requesting businesses to set up authorities, triggers, and procedures for activating and terminating a business' infectious disease outbreak response plan, altering business operations, and transferring business knowledge to key employees;
- (12) Urging businesses to plan to minimize exposure between employees and between employees and the public, if public health officials call for social distancing;
- (13) Asking businesses to establish a process to communicate information to employees and business partners on a business' infectious disease outbreak response plan and the latest COVID-19 information;
- (14) Whether early childhood programs and K-12 schools should be dismissed, particularly if COVID-19 worsens;
- (15) How local conditions will influence the decisions that public health officials make regarding community-level strategies;
- (16) Canceling non-essential business travel to additional countries per travel guidance by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention;
- (17) Travel restrictions enacted by other countries that may limit the ability of employees to return home if they become sick while on travel status;
- (18) Canceling large work-related meetings or events; and
- (19) Engaging state and local health departments to confirm channels of communication and methods for dissemination of local outbreak information; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, that all executive branch departments and attached agencies are requested to inform the Senate and House of Representatives when implementing their plans and procedures relating to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all state departments and attached agencies are requested to inform the President of the Senate and members of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives and members of the House of Representatives when adjusting or deviating from normal operating procedures, such as reduced hours, telecommuting, or cancellation of public meetings; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all state departments and attached agencies are requested to communicate all new

procedures being implemented and include the start and end dates of the new procedures; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and all executive branch departments and attached agencies.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 5 be adopted, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in support of the floor amendment for the same reasons that I mentioned on the previous resolution.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 5 was put by the Chair and carried.

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, S.R. No. 166, S.D. 1, entitled: “SENATE RESOLUTION REQUESTING ALL EXECUTIVE BRANCH DEPARTMENTS AND ATTACHED AGENCIES TO INFORM THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES WHEN IMPLEMENTING THEIR PLANS AND PROCEDURES RELATING TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC,” was adopted.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President. I rise in support of the capital improvement projects budget and I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of this Senate draft.

"Let me thank my counterpart in the State House of Representatives, Kyle Yamashita, who led them in discussions with your Ways and Means committee regarding the bill.

"This measure authorizes over \$5 billion dollars in public works and infrastructure spending that will help provide a solid transition towards our economic stability while the rest of Hawai'i's businesses and industries slowly recover from the shutdown. The measure includes over \$2 billion in projects funded through general obligation bonds with a mixture of shovel-ready and projects in various stages of development.

"This bill addresses one of the priority areas identified by the Legislature and the executive when this session started: having the state invest in infrastructure that advances the ability of both government and the private sector to address our housing shortage. While we have subsidized the development of rental units, we have not provided as much direct support to encourage building for sale units. Instead, developers, to make projects 'pencil out', have had to pursue developments with a mix of homes for low and moderate income residents with units priced way out of the reach of most working families in our state. We are investing \$100 million in West O'ahu infrastructure that will promote not just a broader mix of housing in the region but also allow us to move forward with planned new schools in the area. In addition, we are earmarking \$50 million dollars for housing infrastructure on the neighbor islands with the same goal in mind. We need homes and will continue to need homes that our working families can reasonably and truly afford.

"The bill also includes funding for the following priorities:

"EDUCATION: In the region with the fastest growing population, \$3M for planning and design for new East Kapolei High School, as well as \$26M for Phase III construction for new East Kapolei Middle School and \$6M to increase the utilization of classroom space for Kapolei High School.

“We are also pushing forward gender equity projects throughout the State, including \$19.2M for design and construction for Kauaʻi High School girls locker room and gym as well as \$6.3M for Konawaena High School track and field improvements.

“We were also successful in maintaining significant lump sum funding for both the Department of Education (DOE) and University of Hawaiʻi (UH) for FY21. \$153.2M is provided to the DOE for repair and maintenance, health and safety, and project completion and \$100M is provided to UH for renovations, improvements, and modernizations throughout the State.

“NATURAL RESOURCES: This measure also earmarks \$11M for restoration and berm enhancements at Kāʻanapali Beach, \$4M for improvements at Waianapanapa State Park, and an additional \$11.85M for other facilities improvements and restorations at State Parks throughout the islands.

“AIRPORTS: The bill also directs \$571.3M for airport and facilities improvements throughout the State, which includes \$30M for design for extension of the Diamond Head Concourse at Daniel K. Inouye International Airport.

“HIGHWAYS: The bill also provides \$514.3M for Oʻahu highways, \$166.7M for Hawaiʻi highways, \$126M for Maui highways, \$102.8M for Kauaʻi highways, and an additional \$114.6M to address various projects throughout the state.

“PRISONS: This measure includes \$5M for planning of a new community correctional center at Pūlehunui for a long-needed replacement of Maui Community Correctional Center.

“Finally, I would be remiss in not thanking my office manager, Susan Wong; my session staffers James Nelson and Pam Ono; and the two people who assisted in preparing the Senate’s version of the CIP bill: Danielle Evangelista and our CIP Specialist Robert Nishimoto. They spent some long hours on Zoom with me and our counterparts in the House to negotiate a budget that will serve the State well.

“Again, I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure.”

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Harimoto, Thielen).

H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“The Senate position of the supplemental budget for 2020–’21 puts forth a state budget that closes the \$1 billion shortfall, \$600 million less than what the administration reported as needed in fiscal year 2021. House Bill 2200 includes a base budget for the executive branch for fiscal year 2020 and ’21 from Act 5, does not incorporate any of the governor’s supplemental budget requests, reincorporates base budget amounts appropriated in other acts in the budget, reduces all vacant general fund positions, reduces excess fiscal year 2020 general fund appropriations as identified by the executive departments. This position maintains core state programs and services to ensure stability and continuity for our communities, and it reduces the state’s positions and funds that have remained

vacant for an extended period of time. It’s the responsible thing to do in this current pandemic, and I ask the members for their support.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Harimoto, Thielen).

H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, action on H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BONDS,” was deferred until Tuesday, May 19, 2020.

Senator Kahele moved that the Senate adjourn until 11:30 a.m. on Tuesday, May 19, 2020.

At 11:48 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:52 a.m.

The Chair then called for a motion to reconsider the deferral of H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1.

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTIONS TAKEN AND THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that the Senate reconsider its previous action taken on May 18, 2020, in deferring action on H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1 until Tuesday, May 19, 2020, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose and stated:

“So I just wanted to explain for the members what happened. The attorney general did have some concerns about the debt bond ceiling, which is why they suggested deferring, initially, House Bill 1631. Instead, what we’re deciding to do is have the governor send down a governor’s message explaining that we have to go above the debt ceiling so that we can go ahead and pass these two measures now.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1631, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BONDS,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Harimoto, Thielen).

At this time, the Chair noted the presence of Senator Thielen, who had just joined via videoconference.

Senator Thielen remarked:

“Thank you, Senate President. I was not able to get on to the broadcast until just now. The original link that I had was not recognizing this as a valid meeting, so I would like to ask to be able to register a vote on House Bill No. 2200, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1, Relating to the State Budget. May I do so?”

The Chair replied:

“I don’t believe we can have you registered, but you can submit your comments to us and we will attach it, and I apologize you weren’t able to get in sooner.”

Senator Thielen continued:

“Thank you. Yes, I had put the caucus chair on notice last night that I needed to participate remotely today. I did not receive a link to this meeting until the caucus, when one of the other senators sent me a link and that was the link that was not working. So, I’ve just been able to come in now; I just want to put that in the record. I will be putting some notes on the record on the budget bill that passed, but I would ask, you know, with the rules because we’re supposed to be allowed to participate and everybody was on notice that I needed to participate remotely, that we’re able to resolve the technical problems before proceeding with the votes in the future.”

The Chair so noted.

At 11:56 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:58 a.m.

H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Ihara moved that the Senate reconsider its previous action taken on May 18, 2020, in passing H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 on Third Reading, seconded by Senator Kaehele and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Thielen spoke in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Thank you. I will reserve my remarks on the bill, if I may, until when we receive Senate Bill 75 from the House, and I believe we will be voting on an agree motion. But because my concerns are really to both bills combined, I will spare the members from having to listen to them twice and, if I may, I will be in attendance personally, and so, if I may insert the remarks I make on our vote on Senate Bill 75 in the Journal for this House Bill 2200, I would appreciate it.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen’s remarks, as delivered on the Fortieth Day, Tuesday, May 19, 2020, read as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill No. 75 and then also Senate Bill No. 3139. The reasons I have are the same ... Mr. President, I had also voted ‘no’ on the budget bill yesterday, 2200, and just to save time for everybody here, I’m asking that my remarks now be placed in the Journal as my remarks on House Bill 2200 yesterday, the two bills that we are moving to agree to the amendments on today, and then on Thursday, when we make a final vote on those bills, so I only have to say this one time. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you.

“This is my eighth year here, and every year, I’ve voted in support of the budget. I haven’t done it ‘with reservations,’ even though I haven’t agreed to a hundred percent of the budget, because I know every budget—like every bill, but especially every budget—reflects a compromise. Sometimes, some people get what they want; sometimes, they don’t. Usually everybody gets a little bit less than what they want.

“The reason I have a problem this year is that there are huge groups of Hawai’i residents that are getting nothing despite an unprecedented emergency and economic crisis that our state is facing, and I cannot in good conscience support this choice. I don’t think my words today are going to change anybody’s mind on their votes on the bills in front of you, but I want to walk through why I have the reasons for voting against this and why I think we should be doing something different, because we will be recessing and coming back in June and making a

decision then about what to do with the approximately \$1.8 billion that we’re putting into the rainy day fund.

“There is a sense of urgency that I feel is lacking, both in the executive and in this legislature, about what our population is facing. According to unemployment statistics in DBEDT, nearly a quarter of a million Hawai’i residents have filed for unemployment. This has happened in just less than two months. We went from under 3 percent unemployment—we’re waiting for the figures now—but somewhere between 25 to maybe close to 40 percent unemployment in a two-month period. Twelve thousand people filed for unemployment last week. We have been among the worst, if not the worst, state in the nation at getting unemployed people their entitled unemployment benefits. Forty-four states began making the federal \$600 plus-up payments that were in addition to the regular state unemployment before we did. Thirty-five states began making the PUA federal payments to self-employed, independent contractor, gig workers, and other people who were not eligible for regular unemployment beginning back in April. One state even began in March. We have yet to make a single payment—today is May 19th. Between 100,000 to 130,000 Hawai’i residents still have not had their application approved. Either they’re stuck in the regular unemployment system or they’ve finally been rejected from that system and they’ve been allowed to apply for PUA, which has just begun starting to process applications. Most of these workers are low-wage service-level workers in our tourism industry and in our restaurant industry. This is the perfect storm. It’s the highest cost-of-living state, it’s workers with the lowest wages and the least amount of savings, and it’s the state that’s among the slowest to deliver employment payments to them. Even today, I got an email this morning from a woman who filed her application for unemployment 10 weeks ago and has yet to see anything—two and a half months. Many of these people also lost their health insurance. And it’s not just the people who filed for unemployment: It’s their spouses, it’s their kids, it’s their parents. It’s nearly half a million people or more in Hawai’i that have been economically hit by this.

“Their employers have been hit, too—hard. University of Hawai’i partnered up with the Chamber of Commerce and a number of other business associations, and they surveyed 623 businesses across the state: 24 percent of those businesses surveyed said they will not survive without additional assistance. Even those who were fortunate enough to get the federal PPP loan, 75 percent of that has to go toward payroll. They have rent, they have utilities, they have to struggle with figuring out how do they reinvent their business to act when they are allowed to open up in an era where they cannot do business as usual and they have to have social distancing and measures in place to protect their employees as well as their customers. They need help with these expenses. Every business that shuts down is one less that we’re going to have to help us with an economic recovery.

“So, when there’s a sudden economic collapse—and this is more sudden than we’ve had in a long time, and it’s also unusual and, unlike the Great Depression, it’s due to this virus that’s come in—but when you have a sudden economic collapse, and we’ve had them before (2009, other periods), all of the experts say government needs to increase its spending. And the studies after the 2009 collapse show that the governments that did increase their spending in a way that got the best returns on those investments had shorter downturns and less debts and faster recovery. The biggest bang for the buck: spending on newly unemployed and lower-income—programs that help them. The last three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve have said the important thing is to prevent businesses and individuals from going bankrupt, keeping people housed, keeping local businesses open or alive.

“We received nearly a billion dollars in federal CARES Act money, either CARES relief or those recent CARES 3.5. Part of what we were doing this session and in some of these bills in front of us is to assert our legislative authority over appropriations over these fundings. It’s to move them out of the governor’s control and into the rainy day fund, to say that the Legislature can make better decisions.

“I’d like to point out what some of the other states are doing because I contacted NCSL and looked online. They’re realizing that they need to get money out to their local businesses and to the families and individuals who are hurting in order to keep them afloat because it’s those people that are going to help them get out of the economic problems that they’re in, and by helping keep them afloat, it’ll reduce the amount of support that they’re going to have to provide in the future:

- Montana: \$133 million in emergency grants for small businesses to adapt, for senior care homes to keep kūpuna connected, for emergency housing and food and childcare so people can go back to work;
- New Hampshire: \$490 million for small business relief, early child care, family support, food bank, nonprofits for social services;
- Ohio: \$174 million to expand who is eligible for food stamps because they don’t want to have that strict income requirement when they know so many people are struggling with severely reduced household incomes, and expanding food banks and school food programs;
- Vermont: \$300 million for economic relief for local businesses;
- North Carolina: \$125 million for small-business loan program, operated by two NGOs (they’re not trying to retain control—they’re trying to help);
- Alaska: \$290 million for small-business relief grants.

“We called ourselves back into session because we wanted to assert control. We gave out small amounts of money to the neighbor-island counties, which I think we needed to do for their CARES Act relief so they could start the programs that City and County of Honolulu was able to do because it got its appropriation directly. And we put in a small amount of money to shore up some of our state operations to respond to COVID, which, again, we should do. But out of two billion-plus dollars, we chose to put about \$1.8 billion into the rainy day fund, to recess later this week, and to take three weeks (maybe more) to decide what to do. The reason that was given by the House Finance chair for putting this amount of money in the rainy day fund, I’m a little perplexed about.

“One of the reasons was our unemployment fund is running out of money. Well, we knew that. We’ve known that for some time. The director of the Department of Labor over two months ago notified us about that, and had applied to the U.S. Treasury for a no-interest line of credit, and in the Ways and Means memo to the members of the Senate dated May 15, 2020, we’ve been notified that we’ve been approved for \$1.3 billion in a line of credit from the unemployment trust fund. According to the Congressional Research Service, we can have up to 34 months with no interest to pay back that line of credit to the unemployment trust fund, but we can’t tap into that line of credit until our unemployment state funds go down to zero. So if we use some of this CARES Relief Act money to put it into the unemployment fund, that’s the longer we’re going to have to wait to tap into this zero-interest line of credit, and unlike the municipal liquidity bond funds, if it takes us longer than 34 months to pay back this credit, we have longer. There’s just a very, very small interest rate that’s added on top of that, and many states have tapped into this fund back in 2009 and took

many years to pay it back. We’re passing another bill that’s encouraging the governor to take out loans under the municipal liquidity fund, so we are encouraging the state to take advantage of programs that offer zero-interest money. I do not understand why we would say we cannot give out any of these CARES Relief Act funds to our residents or our small businesses because our unemployment money is going to run out. It’s not going to run out. The federal government, again, according to Congressional Research Service, cannot let the states’ unemployment funds run out because it is an entitlement with money that was paid for by the businesses. They will back us up just like they will back every other state up that has record unemployment, and if we’re looking for the hope of whether we have a Republican or Democratic administration after the next election, Republicans are more likely to bail out businesses and to help states that are struggling with repayments to the unemployment trust fund than just about any other program.

“I don’t find the reasons given to be compelling, to say that we can do nothing for our citizens and our small businesses that are struggling now, particularly because we had come up with this plan apparently before we called ourselves back into session. And after we called ourselves back into session, we found that we received an extra \$50 million from the federal CARES 3.5. We could have taken some of that \$50 million to provide emergency grants. We have nonprofit partners out there that had people on the ground on every island that can screen applicants to make sure that we were getting money to the people who are still waiting on their unemployment application or still waiting for PUA to make some type of decision and issue any money; to small businesses that were turned down for the PPP, that are on the list of businesses that can open up but they need to make the adaptations in order to keep their customers and their employees safe. There was no reason why we couldn’t act like so many of these other states to take some of this federal money to help people who are in serious pain now, and it would’ve been the smart thing to do as well, because it would reduce the amount of time that we’re going to be in this economic pit.

“I want to share one more story before closing. Our youngest daughter—my husband and I, we started doing this tradition about 10 years ago. On Friday mornings, just as a treat, we would go to Like Like Drive Inn for breakfast before we dropped her off at school. And I don’t know how many of you have gone there, but it’s one of the great Hawai’i diners, and it’s one of those great Hawai’i restaurants where all the waitresses are women of a certain age—you know, fifties up to their seventies—and they get to know you really quickly. And even after our daughter graduated from high school, my husband and I would go there every few months just for old times’ sake, and they’d always say, ‘Oh, how’s Emma? How’s she doing?’ They’d always welcome you; they were always friendly. In 2009, after the crash hit, one of our favorite waitresses told us that that was her last day. She had all the lei on; I was asking if it was her birthday, and she said, ‘No, just, we’re having to cut back, and, you know, some of the girls here can’t afford cutback hours, and I can afford to retire, so I’m gonna retire because I want to make sure that they can take care of their families.’ Like Like Drive Inn announced a little while ago it’s closed; it’s not surviving COVID. I think about all those women and the busboys and the line cooks, everybody there: how many of them are waiting still on their unemployment checks? That business is not going to be able to open up. We talked earlier about how we had to do job creation and business development. In this crisis, we have to make sure more businesses don’t close their doors like Like Like and never reopen.

“I am ashamed that we did nothing with the money that we had. At the end of the day, I was just asking, out of that extra \$50 million, could we just take \$30 million, give it out to partners like the Hawai’i Community Foundation, have them do

the reporting, come back to us when we reconvene in June; if all the money wasn't spent, we pull it back. But even that was turned down. Again, I don't expect that I'm going to be changing anybody's vote here today, but I'm speaking up about this because we can't come back here in June and have a repeat of this. In the three weeks it's going to take us to come back (or more), we're already going to see more people going into bankruptcies, more businesses closing their doors. The small amounts that we gave to the neighbor islands are not going to be enough for our state to recover. Even the middle-size amount that the City and County of Honolulu has and already has started to get out the door is not going to be enough for our state to recover. We need to take some of that \$1.7 billion and get it out to the people and the businesses because we rely on them, and they rely on us for their hope, and if we don't give them hope and some ability to recover, then we're not going to be able to help anybody a year from now. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2200, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 1101) was read by the Clerk and was placed on file:

HOUSE COMMUNICATIONS

The following communications from the House (Hse. Com. Nos. 356 to 358) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

Hse. Com. No. 356, returning S.B. No. 75, S.D. 2, as amended in H.D. 1, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on May 18, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 75, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"S.B. 75 is the reallocation of the CARES dollars to the counties, the \$40 million for the Department of Defense, \$1.3 million for PUA, \$8 million for DLIR, \$2 million for Department of Human Services for upgrades to SNAP, and \$600-plus million for the emergency and budget reserve fund."

According to the Congressional Research Service, we can have up to 34 months with no interest to pay back that line of credit to the unemployment trust fund, but we can’t tap into that line of credit until our unemployment state funds go down to zero. So if we use some of this CARES Relief Act money to put it into the unemployment fund, that’s the longer we’re going to have to wait to tap into this zero-interest line of credit, and unlike the municipal liquidity bond funds, if it takes us longer than 34 months to pay back this credit, we have longer. There’s just a very, very small interest rate that’s added on top of that, and many states have tapped into this fund back in 2009 and took many years to pay it back. We’re passing another bill that’s encouraging the governor to take out loans under the municipal liquidity fund, so we are encouraging the state to take advantage of programs that offer zero-interest money. I do not understand why we would say we cannot give out any of these CARES Relief Act funds to our residents or our small businesses because our unemployment money is going to run out. It’s not going to run out. The federal government, again, according to Congressional Research Service, cannot let the states’ unemployment funds run out because it is an entitlement with money that was paid for by the businesses. They will back us up just like they will back every other state up that has record unemployment, and if we’re looking for the hope of whether we have a Republican or Democratic administration after the next election, Republicans are more likely to bail out businesses and to help states that are struggling with repayments to the unemployment trust fund than just about any other program.

“I don’t find the reasons given to be compelling, to say that we can do nothing for our citizens and our small businesses that are struggling now, particularly because we had come up with this plan apparently before we called ourselves back into session. And after we called ourselves back into session, we found that we received an extra \$50 million from the federal CARES 3.5. We could have taken some of that \$50 million to provide emergency grants. We have nonprofit partners out there that had people on the ground on every island that can screen applicants to make sure that we were getting money to the people who are still waiting on their unemployment application or still waiting for PUA to make some type of decision and issue any money; to small businesses that were turned down for the PPP, that are on the list of businesses that can open up but they need to make the adaptations in order to keep their customers and their employees safe. There was no reason why we couldn’t act like so many of these other states to take some of this federal money to help people who are in serious pain now, and it would’ve been the smart thing to do as well, because it would reduce the amount of time that we’re going to be in this economic pit.

“I want to share one more story before closing. Our youngest daughter—my husband and I, we started doing this tradition about 10 years ago. On Friday mornings, just as a treat, we would go to Like Like Drive Inn for breakfast before we dropped her off at school. And I don’t know how many of you have gone there, but it’s one of the great Hawai’i diners, and it’s one of those great Hawai’i restaurants where all the waitresses are women of a certain age—you know, fifties up to their seventies—and they get to know you really quickly. And even

after our daughter graduated from high school, my husband and I would go there every few months just for old times' sake, and they'd always say, 'Oh, how's Emma? How's she doing?' They'd always welcome you; they were always friendly. In 2009, after the crash hit, one of our favorite waitresses told us that that was her last day. She had all the lei on; I was asking if it was her birthday, and she said, 'No, just, we're having to cut back, and, you know, some of the girls here can't afford cutback hours, and I can afford to retire, so I'm gonna retire because I want to make sure that they can take care of their families.' Like Like Drive Inn announced a little while ago it's closed; it's not surviving COVID. I think about all those women and the busboys and the line cooks, everybody there: how many of them are waiting still on their unemployment checks? That business is not going to be able to open up. We talked earlier about how we had to do job creation and business development. In this crisis, we have to make sure more businesses don't close their doors like Like Like and never reopen.

"I am ashamed that we did nothing with the money that we had. At the end of the day, I was just asking, out of that extra \$50 million, could we just take \$30 million, give it out to partners like the Hawai'i Community Foundation, have them do the reporting, come back to us when we reconvene in June; if all the money wasn't spent, we pull it back. But even that was turned down. Again, I don't expect that I'm going to be changing anybody's vote here today, but I'm speaking up about this because we can't come back here in June and have a repeat of this. In the three weeks it's going to take us to come back (or more), we're already going to see more people going into bankruptcies, more businesses closing their doors. The small amounts that we gave to the neighbor islands are not going to be enough for our state to recover. Even the middle-size amount that the City and County of Honolulu has and already has started to get out the door is not going to be enough for our state to recover. We need to take some of that \$1.7 billion and get it out to the people and the businesses because we rely on them, and they rely on us for their hope, and if we don't give them hope and some ability to recover, then we're not going to be able to help anybody a year from now. Thank you."

Senator Dela Cruz noted:

"For Senate Bill 3139, monies are getting transferred from the rental housing trust fund, stadium development district, mental health and substance abuse special fund, and \$432 million from savings, also \$8 million from the tobacco settlement fund to the rainy day fund."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's remarks in opposition read as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill No. 75 and then also Senate Bill No. 3139. The reasons I have are the same ... Mr. President, I had also voted 'no' on the budget bill yesterday, 2200, and just to save time for everybody here, I'm asking that my remarks now be placed in the Journal as my remarks on House Bill 2200 yesterday, the two bills that we are moving to agree to the amendments on today, and then on Thursday, when we make a final vote on those bills, so I only have to say this one time. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you.

"This is my eighth year here, and every year, I've voted in support of the budget. I haven't done it 'with reservations,' even though I haven't agreed to a hundred percent of the budget, because I know every budget—like every bill, but especially every budget—reflects a compromise. Sometimes, some people get what they want; sometimes, they don't. Usually everybody gets a little bit less than what they want.

"The reason I have a problem this year is that there are huge groups of Hawai'i residents that are getting nothing despite an unprecedented emergency and economic crisis that our state is facing, and I cannot in good conscience support this choice. I don't think my words today are going to change anybody's mind on their votes on the bills in front of you, but I want to walk through why I have the reasons for voting against this and why I think we should be doing something different, because we will be recessing and coming back in June and making a decision then about what to do with the approximately \$1.8 billion that we're putting into the rainy day fund.

"There is a sense of urgency that I feel is lacking, both in the executive and in this legislature, about what our population is facing. According to unemployment statistics in DBEDT, nearly a quarter of a million Hawai'i residents have filed for unemployment. This has happened in just less than two months. We went from under 3 percent unemployment—we're waiting for the figures now—but somewhere between 25 to maybe close to 40 percent unemployment in a two-month period. Twelve thousand people filed for unemployment last week. We have been among the worst, if not the worst, state in the nation at getting unemployed people their entitled unemployment benefits. Forty-four states began making the federal \$600 plus-up payments that were in addition to the regular state unemployment before we did. Thirty-five states began making the PUA federal payments to self-employed, independent contractor, gig workers, and other people who were not eligible for regular unemployment beginning back in April. One state even began in March. We have yet to make a single payment—today is May 19th. Between 100,000 to 130,000 Hawai'i residents still have not had their application approved. Either they're stuck in the regular unemployment system or they've finally been rejected from that system and they've been allowed to apply for PUA, which has just begun starting to process applications. Most of these workers are low-wage service-level workers in our tourism industry and in our restaurant industry.

This is the perfect storm. It's the highest cost-of-living state, it's workers with the lowest wages and the least amount of savings, and it's the state that's among the slowest to deliver employment payments to them. Even today, I got an email this morning from a woman who filed her application for unemployment 10 weeks ago and has yet to see anything—two and a half months. Many of these people also lost their health insurance. And it's not just the people who filed for unemployment: It's their spouses, it's their kids, it's their parents. It's nearly half a million people or more in Hawai'i that have been economically hit by this.

"Their employers have been hit, too—hard. University of Hawai'i partnered up with the Chamber of Commerce and a number of other business associations, and they surveyed 623 businesses across the state: 24 percent of those businesses surveyed said they will not survive without additional assistance. Even those who were fortunate enough to get the federal PPP loan, 75 percent of that has to go toward payroll. They have rent, they have utilities, they have to struggle with figuring out how do they reinvent their business to act when they are allowed to open up in an era where they cannot do business as usual and they have to have social distancing and measures in place to protect their employees as well as their customers. They need help with these expenses. Every business that shuts down is one less that we're going to have to help us with an economic recovery.

"So, when there's a sudden economic collapse—and this is more sudden than we've had in a long time, and it's also unusual and, unlike the Great Depression, it's due to this virus that's come in—but when you have a sudden economic collapse, and we've had them before (2009, other periods), all of the experts say government needs to increase its spending. And the studies after the 2009 collapse show that the governments that did increase their spending in a way that got the best returns on those investments had shorter downturns and less debts and faster recovery. The biggest bang for the buck: spending on newly unemployed and lower-income—programs that help them. The last three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve have said the important thing is to prevent businesses and individuals from going bankrupt, keeping people housed, keeping local businesses open or alive.

"We received nearly a billion dollars in federal CARES Act money, either CARES relief or those recent CARES 3.5. Part of what we were doing this session and in some of these bills in front of us is to assert our legislative authority over appropriations over these fundings. It's to move them out of the governor's control and into the rainy day fund, to say that the Legislature can make better decisions.

"I'd like to point out what some of the other states are doing because I contacted NCSL and looked online. They're realizing that they need to get money out to their local businesses and to the families and individuals who are hurting in order to keep them afloat because it's those people that are going to help them get out of the economic problems that they're in, and by helping keep them afloat, it'll reduce the amount of support that they're going to have to provide in the future:

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- New Hampshire: \$490 million for small business relief, early child care, family support, food bank, nonprofits for social services;
- Ohio: \$174 million to expand who is eligible for food stamps because they don't want to have that strict income requirement when they know so many people are

struggling with severely reduced household incomes, and expanding food banks and school food programs;

- Vermont: \$300 million for economic relief for local businesses;
- North Carolina: \$125 million for small-business loan program, operated by two NGOs (they're not trying to retain control—they're trying to help);
- Alaska: \$290 million for small-business relief grants.

"We called ourselves back into session because we wanted to assert control. We gave out small amounts of money to the neighbor-island counties, which I think we needed to do for their CARES Act relief so they could start the programs that City and County of Honolulu was able to do because it got its appropriation directly. And we put in a small amount of money to shore up some of our state operations to respond to COVID, which, again, we should do. But out of two billion-plus dollars, we chose to put about \$1.8 billion into the rainy day fund, to recess later this week, and to take three weeks (maybe more) to decide what to do. The reason that was given by the House Finance chair for putting this amount of money in the rainy day fund, I'm a little perplexed about.

"One of the reasons was our unemployment fund is running out of money. Well, we knew that. We've known that for some time. The director of the Department of Labor over two months ago notified us about that, and had applied to the U.S. Treasury for a no-interest line of credit, and in the Ways and Means memo to the members of the Senate dated May 15, 2020, we've been notified that we've been approved for \$1.3 billion in a line of credit from the unemployment trust fund. According to the Congressional Research Service, we can have up to 34 months with no interest to pay back that line of credit to the unemployment trust fund, but we can't tap into that line of credit until our unemployment state funds go down to zero. The Senate reconvened at 12:44 p.m.

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 75, S.D. 2, H.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that S.B. No. 75, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I want to mostly refer to the senator from Waimānalo’s comments here on the floor on Tuesday as well as in her *Civil Beat* editorial today; I couldn’t say it nearly as well. I just want to expand on the sense of urgency she mentions.

“This week, my daughter’s preschool closed, not for the summer, for good. It’s one of about a dozen in our community that have closed. In today’s local paper, St. Joseph School, a 150-year-old institution and one of the largest private schools, announced it may close. That’s just in our little small town, and there’s hundreds of stories like that around our state.

“My point is the crisis is now, and it’s urgent, and soon we’re going to have a lot more homeless, a lot more hungry, a lot more people in permanent need of expensive social services. We should not be afraid of borrowing as needed, as provided by our constitution in a crisis, and helping our people. We should be putting aside our power struggles, our desire to stash and control money, and we should be helping our people as much as possible. The desire for a balanced budget is admirable; the need for a balanced budget in a major economic crisis is misplaced. We need to be the government that helps the people.

“I know there are no easy answers, and I acknowledge the very, very hard work that’s been done and everyone doing what they think is right. But we, the State of Hawai‘i, can handle the debt. We can handle long-term debt. Families without work cannot handle the current situation. The risks of long-term debt are dwarfed by the risks of further devastating our local economy. So we should welcome any debt needed as our responsibility and help our people as much as we can as quickly as we can. Thank you.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This legislative body understands the gravity of the situation and the impact on every resident of the state. We owe the citizens of this state both immediate and long-term stability and security. We need to think and act responsibly and prudently with the federal resources that are being provided us.

“Hawai‘i’s economy relies heavily on tourism, not the case for the states that were previously upheld as examples. Tourism accounts for 20 percent of the state’s economy. On May 7th, Dr. Tian presented on the economic impacts of COVID-19. He estimates that our state’s non-tourism sector will at least take two years to recover. For tourism, he estimates it will take five to six years.

“It costs \$677 million to operate state government monthly so we can run our state hospitals, pay for education, maintain safety-net programs, take care of our natural resources, and the list goes on. Looking at state tax collection reports: collections of \$533 million in March 2020 as compared to \$590 million in March 2019—the state is down by \$57 million. For April 2020, compared to April 2019, collections are down \$350 million. We went from \$810 million in 2020 to \$540 million last month. In speaking with the Department of Taxation, the downward trend is to continue. The Council on Revenues will be meeting in exactly one week. Before we commit every dollar of the federal CARES Act, we should pause and see what the economic forecast will be.

“I want to highlight and reiterate to the Senate membership and the public that millions of dollars of relief funding for food grants, for businesses, are being provided directly to state and county agencies. The Legislature and the counties agree and have developed and coordinated budget plans that will meet the needs for the state.

“The Emergency Food Assistance Program: through the state Office of Community Services, two appropriations were received from the federal government. The Families First Coronavirus Response Act provided \$1,136,000, of which \$880,000 will be for food purchase. The federal CARES Act provided \$1.3 million, of which the full amount will be for food purchases. The state Office of Community Services will order through the USDA and work with nonprofit organizations, such as the Hawaii Foodbank, in distribution of food to the public statewide. The state Executive Office on Aging received \$1.2 million from the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, of which \$400,000 will be used for congregant meals, \$800,000 will be used for home delivery meals. In addition, the state Office on Aging received \$2,400,000 from the Older Americans Act, of which the full amount will be used for home delivery of meals.

“Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, otherwise known as SNAP: The Department of Human Services has seen a spike of almost 17,000 people—new applicants—for the month of April as compared to the same point in time last year. In speaking with the director, the department has been able to keep up with the filings and was approved last week to provide emergency SNAP supplements to address temporary food needs for SNAP households. The emergency supplements will benefit

approximately 60,000 households (about 75 percent of total households currently receiving SNAP) and will bring in more than \$13 million per month in federal food assistance to address our growing food needs. We have allocated an additional \$2 million toward SNAP so that we can even broaden SNAP's capability.

“Unemployment insurance: The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations has received \$3.9 million of emergency grants for administration of the state's unemployment compensation law. The department has applied for and has been approved by the U.S. Department of the Treasury for a quarterly, no-interest line of credit for \$1.3 billion. DLIR is working on determining what's the state's repayment schedule. This line of credit can only be used once unemployment compensation fund has a zero balance. In addition, the Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation was launched this week. This program allows for an additional 13 weeks of payments to individuals whose regular unemployment benefits ended on or after July 1, 2019. Both the cost of new federal benefits and the funding to the states for the administration of the program are 100 percent federally funded.

“The state Office of Community Services also received Community Services Block Grant, an estimated \$5.2 million. Potential use of these funds include the community action agencies (CAAs) to respond to economic impacts of COVID-19 pandemic on people with low income (individuals up to 200 percent of the federal poverty line), used to support and possibly expand anti-poverty programs that the CAAs currently have. Some of these programs include but are not limited to: rental and utility bill assistance; food delivery for seniors and disabled; support for existing food programs like Senior Farmer's Market; transportation services, particularly for seniors and disabled individuals; child care; homeless prevention; and emergency shelter. CAAs may also use the funds to coordinate services and refer clients to other resources needed to address client situations. CAAs will use funds from other programs as they deem necessary to address the current situation in the recovery efforts to address the economic and community consequences of the outbreak. There are four CAAs, one for each county: O'ahu – Honolulu Community Action Program; Kaua'i – Kauai Economic Opportunity; Maui – Maui Economic Opportunity; and Hawai'i County – the Hawai'i County Economic Opportunity Council.

“For the counties, which is in S.B. 75: The County of Hawai'i has committed \$28 million for childcare grants, household grants, technology improvements for rural areas to help support school closures and teleworking, student and senior technology tools, and homeless prevention. The Hawai'i Island Recovery Initiative: \$22,300,000 for grants and support for small businesses, agriculture, energy; restarts startups, nonprofits, and the business community. Property acquisition, housing, and construction: the Big Island county is committing \$9.5 million for shelter needs for quarantine, homeless, contact tracing, and services location and other housing needs.

“The County of Maui also has several initiatives, which we are budgeting for in S.B. 75: \$26 million for grants for households, small businesses, and child care, which includes HELP, microbusiness loan programs, and farmer relief programs. Maui County is also committing \$4.5 million for recovery planning and incentives.

“The County of Honolulu, outside S.B. 75, is committing \$166 million for grants for households, small businesses, and child care. For the Household Hardship Relief Fund program, they're also distributing \$25 million in CARES Act funds designed to support households economically impacted by the current pandemic. City and County of Honolulu also has a program called the Small Business Relief and Recovery; this program provides one-time reimbursement for expenses up to

\$10,000 to each qualified business that has less than \$1 million in gross annual revenue or 30 or fewer employees. Eligible business types include nonprofit organizations. Examples of expenses include rent, utilities, and payroll. The fund can also reimburse expenses incurred to implement physical distancing and other safety precautions to comply with business openings and operating guidelines.

“For the County of Kaua'i, the county is committing \$1.5 million for food distribution, \$2.2 million for mental health and domestic violence prevention for grants to nonprofits, \$3 million for small-business loans and other business support, and \$330,000 for nonprofit food support, all within S.B. 75. The County of Kaua'i is also committing \$3.5 million for agriculture infrastructure support and \$250,000 for commercial fishing assistance.

“Again, I want to reiterate that it costs \$677 million to operate state government a month. If the governor's proposed furloughs were adopted, the state would only find a savings of \$50 million; it would cost us \$627 million a month to operate the state. For March collections, in 2019, we brought in \$590 million; for 2020, we brought in \$533 million—we saw a loss in March. In April, the loss was even greater: We went from \$810 million in 2019 to \$540 million in 2020. In May, we collected \$704 million in 2019, and we can expect even lower numbers for collections in 2020.

“People brought up the fact that we can borrow money. Well, we're going to authorize the governor to borrow \$2.1 billion from the Municipal Liquidity Facility fund. And UI, as I mentioned, can borrow up to \$1.3 billion in loans. But how are we going to balance all of this if we're going to be in the red every month? How are we going to operate the state **and** pay back loans? We need these three weeks to figure out and see what Council on Revenues is going to do and what kind of federal assistance Congress is going to pass.

“I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting S.B. 75, which provides funds to our neighbor-island counties for relief as well as makes the responsible decision of depositing the difference into the rainy day fund so we can make better and smarter decisions with the new information from Council on Revenues and actions from the feds. Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I'd like to record my 'no' vote on Senate Bill 75 and then have the remarks that I make on that also be applied to the Journal for Senate Bill 3139 that we're going to vote on. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you. And if I could have the remarks that I made on the floor on these two bills on the motion to accept the House amendment on May 19th, two days ago, to be inserted in the Journal on both these bills, and also the article that I had posted in today's *Honolulu Civil Beat* with my commentary on why I voted against both these bills, but if I can first preface it with a clarification to the remarks that were just made? [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you, Mr. President.

“So just a point of clarification first: I had never proposed that we use the entire \$650 million to be spent right now in the federal CARES relief funds. The first proposal I made was that we put out a zero-interest loan program to the people who were waiting on the unemployment, requiring them to sign an agreement that once they were approved for unemployment, the first check could repay the state. So that would've used the money for an initial need and then left us free to use it for other purposes as it was repaid. The second proposal I made was for \$30 million to supplement the monies that were going out, and that was based on the extra \$50 million of CARES 3.5 monies that came to us after we had already put together this financial plan. So I never did propose that we spend all of it.

“But I also want to point out that, in an economic collapse at this level, the past three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve Board (Powell, Yellen, Bernanke), appointed by Democrats and Republicans; the Secretaries of the Treasury, again, appointed by Democrats and Republicans after 2009 and to today; the think tanks and most economists that have taken a look at governments, how they recovered from the 2009 crash, have pointed out time and again: Expenditures upfront that can prevent businesses from going bankrupt, expenditures upfront and quickly that can prevent people from going bankrupt, will save governments from increasing burdens and debts from people tapping into their supporting services, and allows governments to recover faster and with less debt. And that’s the sense of urgency and the reason why I’m voting ‘no.’ I support those programs that are going out from the neighbor-island counties from the CARES money that we gave them, but if you put these numbers into household budget figures, we literally gave them tens and twenties when we’re dealing with over \$2,000. It’s not going to be enough to meet the magnitude, and it’s not going to be at the speed, because in the three weeks that we’re taking, more people are going to sink into insolvency. However, I look forward to this body and our chamber on the other hand coming forward when we reconvene in June with programs that are going to help the families that are facing bankruptcy and that are going to help our small businesses so that we don’t have more of them go insolvent and that we can recover more quickly. Thank you.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen’s remarks, as delivered on the Fortieth Day, Tuesday, May 19, 2020, read as follows:

“Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill No. 75 and then also Senate Bill No. 3139. The reasons I have are the same ... Mr. President, I had also voted ‘no’ on the budget bill yesterday, 2200, and just to save time for everybody here, I’m asking that my remarks now be placed in the Journal as my remarks on House Bill 2200 yesterday, the two bills that we are moving to agree to the amendments on today, and then on Thursday, when we make a final vote on those bills, so I only have to say this one time. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you.

“This is my eighth year here, and every year, I’ve voted in support of the budget. I haven’t done it ‘with reservations,’ even though I haven’t agreed to a hundred percent of the budget, because I know every budget—like every bill, but especially every budget—reflects a compromise. Sometimes, some people get what they want; sometimes, they don’t. Usually everybody gets a little bit less than what they want.

“The reason I have a problem this year is that there are huge groups of Hawai’i residents that are getting nothing despite an unprecedented emergency and economic crisis that our state is facing, and I cannot in good conscience support this choice. I don’t think my words today are going to change anybody’s mind on their votes on the bills in front of you, but I want to walk through why I have the reasons for voting against this and why I think we should be doing something different, because we will be recessing and coming back in June and making a decision then about what to do with the approximately \$1.8 billion that we’re putting into the rainy day fund.

“There is a sense of urgency that I feel is lacking, both in the executive and in this legislature, about what our population is facing. According to unemployment statistics in DBEDT, nearly a quarter of a million Hawai’i residents have filed for unemployment. This has happened in just less than two months. We went from under 3 percent unemployment—we’re waiting for the figures now—but somewhere between 25 to maybe close to 40 percent unemployment in a two-month period. Twelve thousand people filed for unemployment last week. We have been among the worst, if not the worst, state in the nation at getting unemployed people their entitled unemployment

benefits. Forty-four states began making the federal \$600 plus-up payments that were in addition to the regular state unemployment before we did. Thirty-five states began making the PUA federal payments to self-employed, independent contractor, gig workers, and other people who were not eligible for regular unemployment beginning back in April. One state even began in March. We have yet to make a single payment—today is May 19th. Between 100,000 to 130,000 Hawai’i residents still have not had their application approved. Either they’re stuck in the regular unemployment system or they’ve finally been rejected from that system and they’ve been allowed to apply for PUA, which has just begun starting to process applications. Most of these workers are low-wage service-level workers in our tourism industry and in our restaurant industry. This is the perfect storm. It’s the highest cost-of-living state, it’s workers with the lowest wages and the least amount of savings, and it’s the state that’s among the slowest to deliver employment payments to them. Even today, I got an email this morning from a woman who filed her application for unemployment 10 weeks ago and has yet to see anything—two and a half months. Many of these people also lost their health insurance. And it’s not just the people who filed for unemployment: It’s their spouses, it’s their kids, it’s their parents. It’s nearly half a million people or more in Hawai’i that have been economically hit by this.

“Their employers have been hit, too—hard. University of Hawai’i partnered up with the Chamber of Commerce and a number of other business associations, and they surveyed 623 businesses across the state: 24 percent of those businesses surveyed said they will not survive without additional assistance. Even those who were fortunate enough to get the federal PPP loan, 75 percent of that has to go toward payroll. They have rent, they have utilities, they have to struggle with figuring out how do they reinvent their business to act when they are allowed to open up in an era where they cannot do business as usual and they have to have social distancing and measures in place to protect their employees as well as their customers. They need help with these expenses. Every business that shuts down is one less that we’re going to have to help us with an economic recovery.

“So, when there’s a sudden economic collapse—and this is more sudden than we’ve had in a long time, and it’s also unusual and, unlike the Great Depression, it’s due to this virus that’s come in—but when you have a sudden economic collapse, and we’ve had them before (2009, other periods), all of the experts say government needs to increase its spending. And the studies after the 2009 collapse show that the governments that did increase their spending in a way that got the best returns on those investments had shorter downturns and less debts and faster recovery. The biggest bang for the buck: spending on newly unemployed and lower-income—programs that help them. The last three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve have said the important thing is to prevent businesses and individuals from going bankrupt, keeping people housed, keeping local businesses open or alive.

“We received nearly a billion dollars in federal CARES Act money, either CARES relief or those recent CARES 3.5. Part of what we were doing this session and in some of these bills in front of us is to assert our legislative authority over appropriations over these fundings. It’s to move them out of the governor’s control and into the rainy day fund, to say that the Legislature can make better decisions.

“I’d like to point out what some of the other states are doing because I contacted NCSL and looked online. They’re realizing that they need to get money out to their local businesses and to the families and individuals who are hurting in order to keep them afloat because it’s those people that are going to help them get out of the economic problems that they’re in, and by helping

keep them afloat, it'll reduce the amount of support that they're going to have to provide in the future:

- Montana: \$133 million in emergency grants for small businesses to adapt, for senior care homes to keep kūpuna connected, for emergency housing and food and childcare so people can go back to work;
- New Hampshire: \$490 million: small business relief, early child care, family support, food bank, nonprofits for social services;
- Ohio: \$174 million to expand who is eligible for food stamps because they don't want to have that strict income requirement when they know so many people are struggling with severely reduced household incomes, and expanding food banks and school food programs;
- Vermont: \$300 million for economic relief for local businesses;
- North Carolina: \$125 million for small-business loan program, operated by two NGOs (they're not trying to retain control—they're trying to help);
- Alaska: \$290 million for small-business relief grants.

"We called ourselves back into session because we wanted to assert control. We gave out small amounts of money to the neighbor-island counties, which I think we needed to do for their CARES Act relief so they could start the programs that City and County of Honolulu was able to do because it got its appropriation directly. And we put in a small amount of money to shore up some of our state operations to respond to COVID, which, again, we should do. But out of two billion-plus dollars, we chose to put about \$1.8 billion into the rainy day fund, to recess later this week, and to take three weeks (maybe more) to decide what to do. The reason that was given by the House Finance chair for putting this amount of money in the rainy day fund, I'm a little perplexed about.

"One of the reasons was our unemployment fund is running out of money. Well, we knew that. We've known that for some time. The director of the Department of Labor over two months ago notified us about that, and had applied to the U.S. Treasury for a no-interest line of credit, and in the Ways and Means memo to the members of the Senate dated May 15, 2020, we've been notified that we've been approved for \$1.3 billion in a line of credit from the unemployment trust fund. According to the Congressional Research Service, we can have up to 34 months with no interest to pay back that line of credit to the unemployment trust fund, but we can't tap into that line of credit until our unemployment state funds go down to zero. So if we use some of this CARES Relief Act money to put it into the unemployment fund, that's the longer we're going to have to wait to tap into this zero-interest line of credit, and unlike the municipal liquidity bond funds, if it takes us longer than 34 months to pay back this credit, we have longer. There's just a very, very small interest rate that's added on top of that, and many states have tapped into this fund back in 2009 and took many years to pay it back. We're passing another bill that's encouraging the governor to take out loans under the municipal liquidity fund, so we are encouraging the state to take advantage of programs that offer zero-interest money. I do not understand why we would say we cannot give out any of these CARES Relief Act funds to our residents or our small businesses because our unemployment money is going to run out. It's not going to run out. The federal government, again, according to Congressional Research Service, cannot let the states' unemployment funds run out because it is an entitlement with money that was paid for by the businesses. They will back us up just like they will back every other state up that has record unemployment, and if we're looking for the hope of whether we have a Republican or Democratic administration after the next

election, Republicans are more likely to bail out businesses and to help states that are struggling with repayments to the unemployment trust fund than just about any other program.

"I don't find the reasons given to be compelling, to say that we can do nothing for our citizens and our small businesses that are struggling now, particularly because we had come up with this plan apparently before we called ourselves back into session. And after we called ourselves back into session, we found that we received an extra \$50 million from the federal CARES 3.5. We could have taken some of that \$50 million to provide emergency grants. We have nonprofit partners out there that had people on the ground on every island that can screen applicants to make sure that we were getting money to the people who are still waiting on their unemployment application or still waiting for PUA to make some type of decision and issue any money; to small businesses that were turned down for the PPP, that are on the list of businesses that can open up but they need to make the adaptations in order to keep their customers and their employees safe. There was no reason why we couldn't act like so many of these other states to take some of this federal money to help people who are in serious pain now, and it would've been the smart thing to do as well, because it would reduce the amount of time that we're going to be in this economic pit.

"I want to share one more story before closing. Our youngest daughter—my husband and I, we started doing this tradition about 10 years ago. On Friday mornings, just as a treat, we would go to Like Like Drive Inn for breakfast before we dropped her off at school. And I don't know how many of you have gone there, but it's one of the great Hawai'i diners, and it's one of those great Hawai'i restaurants where all the waitresses are women of a certain age—you know, fifties up to their seventies—and they get to know you really quickly. And even after our daughter graduated from high school, my husband and I would go there every few months just for old times' sake, and they'd always say, 'Oh, how's Emma? How's she doing?' They'd always welcome you; they were always friendly. In 2009, after the crash hit, one of our favorite waitresses told us that that was her last day. She had all the lei on; I was asking if it was her birthday, and she said, 'No, just, we're having to cut back, and, you know, some of the girls here can't afford cutback hours, and I can afford to retire, so I'm gonna retire because I want to make sure that they can take care of their families.' Like Like Drive Inn announced a little while ago it's closed; it's not surviving COVID. I think about all those women and the busboys and the line cooks, everybody there: how many of them are waiting still on their unemployment checks? That business is not going to be able to open up. We talked earlier about how we had to do job creation and business development. In this crisis, we have to make sure more businesses don't close their doors like Like Like and never reopen.

"I am ashamed that we did nothing with the money that we had. At the end of the day, I was just asking, out of that extra \$50 million, could we just take \$30 million, give it out to partners like the Hawai'i Community Foundation, have them do the reporting, come back to us when we reconvene in June; if all the money wasn't spent, we pull it back. But even that was turned down. Again, I don't expect that I'm going to be changing anybody's vote here today, but I'm speaking up about this because we can't come back here in June and have a repeat of this. In the three weeks it's going to take us to come back (or more), we're already going to see more people going into bankruptcies, more businesses closing their doors. The small amounts that we gave to the neighbor islands are not going to be enough for our state to recover. Even the middle-size amount that the City and County of Honolulu has and already has started to get out the door is not going to be enough for our state to recover. We need to take some of that \$1.7 billion and get it out to the people and the businesses because we rely on them,

and they rely on us for their hope, and if we don't give them hope and some ability to recover, then we're not going to be able to help anybody a year from now. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, the article is identified as "**ATTACHMENT A**" to the Journal of this day.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in rebuttal as follows:

"I'd just like to point out that I did have a conversation with the director of Labor in seeing how we could advance him some CARES funds. He said there would still be an issue on delaying payments. DLIR has to adjudicate every application to confirm that they're an employee of an eligible business. Should the State advance payments to every applicant prior to being approved, the State would need to track down and request advance payments back from non-eligible recipients. So we did not necessarily ignore the senator from Waimānalo; we did forward her concerns. It would be, I think, not prudent if we provided the money to the department if they're not able to spend the dollars and get it out to the programs that we need. With that being said, I've already listed the amount of programs out there that can provide assistance. Let me be clear that we're providing over \$200 million right now once this bill is passed. Two hundred million—not zero—two hundred million. The other \$630 million we can take up when we come back in three weeks. I'd be very surprised if all the different counties are able to spend that \$200 million within three weeks. Thank you."

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I just want to point out that the debate we just had between the other two senators—much of it would've been a moot point if the unemployment insurance situation had been addressed, so I urge, urge, urge the administration to hurry up and get this done because the senator from Waimānalo's correct: There are people who are in a serious personal financial difficulty right now who wouldn't be if they had their UI payments plus the \$600 plus-up. Mahalo."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Members, today the Department of Labor announced that seasonally adjusted unemployment for April is at 22.3 percent. That's one out of every four of our constituents. Keep in mind that just a few months ago, we had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.4 percent, so we went from the lowest to the highest in just a matter of months. The state's GDP in 2019 was \$97.3 billion. What happened? Seventeen percent of that evaporated due to the hemorrhaging of tourism. The situation is far worse on our neighbor islands, and I don't see much light at the end of this tunnel.

"Today we're arguing about how to cut up the pie; I believe, in addition to that discussion, we need to be focusing on baking a new and much bigger pie. It is imperative that we get our economy moving, and the governor and DBEDT really have no plans. Instead, they wanted to throw \$10 million to create a new division in government, with most of that money being spent on a mainland consulting firm. We really have no time to marinate for a year over a business plan with a lack of expectations. Businesses and our people are starving now.

"The airports are pivotal to reopening our economy. As we invite tourists to return, we're going to invite the potential for viruses and diseases to come with them, so it's essential that we assure the public that our airports are as COVID-proof as possible. Due to the exemplary work of Chair Dela Cruz and members of his Special COVID Committee, they've highlighted and we've seen just the opposite: We've seen a Department of Transportation with woeful plans that really depend on being told what the next steps should be. So, instead of leading the

charge on screening and pretty much inventing the wheel for the country on how to operate an airport in 2020, DOT continues to just make excuses, waits for the feds to tell them how to respond. In the meantime, businesses and our people are starving. Outside of temperature checks, our COVID shield comes down to the honor system, and we've seen over the past few weeks there are a lot of dishonorable people on this planet. We need thermal screeners and rapid COVID testing yesterday. DOT is still **looking into** which equipment they might buy for thermal screeners; they're going to go out to RFP, maybe in 45 days get an award, and, according to the Department of Transportation, if we're lucky, we're going to get those thermal screeners in by the end of summer. By the end of summer! Businesses are not going to be around that long. And rapid COVID testing—that's going to be essential. That's off the board, apparently, because the Department of Health doesn't believe it can be done at the airport, only in a laboratory setting, despite the FDA approving Abbott Labs and other forms of testing that can be done quickly and quite accurately.

"The back-and-forth for all of us is very frustrating and exhausting, and as we contemplate how to borrow more money or spend more money, we're not going to spend our way out of this situation. Let's also have a conversation on setting our sights on getting businesses open. Doing nothing will mean businesses and our people will continue to starve. Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair made the following clarifications:

"We're not the federal government—a balanced budget is not an admirable goal; as a state government entity, we are legally required to adopt a balanced budget.

"Second, Senator Dela Cruz, I believe that missing from your list is also assistance from USDA. I believe there was a recent article about grants that have been given to farmers in Hawai'i, and I cannot recite everything off the top of my head; I'm only aware of the \$468,000 grant awarded to a nonprofit in Kilauea on the island of Kaua'i that is, as a requirement of the grant, required to purchase produce from local farmers and then distribute that food to families in need. So if you could have maybe your staff find the article and add that to the list of assistance that is being delivered by the federal government to, not just our people in need, but supporting our farmers and hopefully helping us economically."

S.B. No. 3139, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that S.B. No. 3139, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's remarks, as delivered for S.B. No. 75, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, read as follows:

"I'd like to record my 'no' vote on Senate Bill 75 and then have the remarks that I make on that also be applied to the Journal for Senate Bill 3139 that we're going to vote on. [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you. And if I could have the remarks that I made on the floor on these two bills on the motion to accept the House amendment on May 19th, two days ago, to be inserted in the Journal on both these bills, and also the article that I had posted in today's *Honolulu Civil Beat* with my commentary on why I voted against both these bills, but if I can first preface it with a clarification to the remarks that were just made? [The Chair so ordered.] Thank you, Mr. President.

"So just a point of clarification first: I had never proposed that we use the entire \$650 million to be spent right now in the federal CARES relief funds. The first proposal I made was that we put out a zero-interest loan program to the people who were waiting on the unemployment, requiring them to sign an agreement that once they were approved for unemployment, the first check could repay the state. So that would've used the money for an initial need and then left us free to use it for other purposes as it was repaid. The second proposal I made was for \$30 million to supplement the monies that were going out, and that was based on the extra \$50 million of CARES 3.5 monies that came to us after we had already put together this financial plan. So I never did propose that we spend all of it.

"But I also want to point out that, in an economic collapse at this level, the past three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve Board (Powell, Yellen, Bernanke), appointed by Democrats and Republicans; the Secretaries of the Treasury, again, appointed by Democrats and Republicans after 2009 and to today; the think tanks and most economists that have taken a look at governments, how they recovered from the 2009 crash, have pointed out time and again: Expenditures upfront that can prevent businesses from going bankrupt, expenditures upfront and quickly that can prevent people from going bankrupt, will save governments from increasing burdens and debts from people tapping into their supporting services, and allows governments to recover faster and with less debt. And that's the sense of urgency and the reason why I'm voting 'no.' I support those programs that are going out from the neighbor-island counties from the CARES money that we gave them, but if you put these numbers into household budget figures, we literally gave them tens and twenties when we're dealing with over \$2,000. It's not going to be enough to meet the magnitude, and it's not going to be at the speed, because in the three weeks that we're taking, more people are going to sink into insolvency. However, I look forward to this body and our chamber on the other hand coming forward when we reconvene in June with programs that are going to help the families that are facing bankruptcy and that are going to help our small businesses so that we don't have more of them go insolvent and that we can recover more quickly. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Thielen's remarks, as delivered on the Fortieth Day, Tuesday, May 19, 2020, read as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill No. 75 and then also Senate Bill No. 3139. The reasons I have are the same ... Mr. President, I had also voted 'no' on the budget bill yesterday, 2200, and just to save time for everybody here, I'm asking that my remarks now be placed in the Journal as my remarks on House Bill 2200 yesterday, the two bills that we are moving to agree to the amendments on today, and then on Thursday, when we make a final vote on those bills, so I only have to say this one time. (The Chair so ordered.) Thank you.

"This is my eighth year here, and every year, I've voted in support of the budget. I haven't done it 'with reservations,' even though I haven't agreed to a hundred percent of the budget, because I know every budget—like every bill, but especially every budget—reflects a compromise. Sometimes, some people get what they want; sometimes, they don't. Usually everybody gets a little bit less than what they want.

"The reason I have a problem this year is that there are huge groups of Hawai'i residents that are getting nothing despite an unprecedented emergency and economic crisis that our state is facing, and I cannot in good conscience support this choice. I don't think my words today are going to change anybody's mind on their votes on the bills in front of you, but I want to walk through why I have the reasons for voting against this and why I think we should be doing something different, because we will be recessing and coming back in June and making a decision then about what to do with the approximately \$1.8 billion that we're putting into the rainy day fund.

"There is a sense of urgency that I feel is lacking, both in the executive and in this legislature, about what our population is facing. According to unemployment statistics in DBEDT, nearly a quarter of a million Hawai'i residents have filed for unemployment. This has happened in just less than two months. We went from under 3 percent unemployment—we're waiting for the figures now—but somewhere between 25 to maybe close to 40 percent unemployment in a two-month period. Twelve thousand people filed for unemployment last week. We have been among the worst, if not the worst, state in the nation at getting unemployed people their entitled unemployment benefits. Forty-four states began making the federal \$600 plus-up payments that were in addition to the regular state unemployment before we did. Thirty-five states began making the PUA federal payments to self-employed, independent contractor, gig workers, and other people who were not eligible for regular unemployment beginning back in April. One state even began in March. We have yet to make a single payment—today is May 19th. Between 100,000 to 130,000 Hawai'i residents still have not had their application approved. Either they're stuck in the regular unemployment system or they've finally been rejected from that system and they've been allowed to apply for PUA, which has just begun starting to process applications. Most of these workers are low-wage service-level workers in our tourism industry and in our restaurant industry. This is the perfect storm. It's the highest cost-of-living state, it's workers with the lowest wages and the least amount of savings, and it's the state that's among the slowest to deliver employment payments to them. Even today, I got an email this morning from a woman who filed her application for unemployment 10 weeks ago and has yet to see anything—two and a half months. Many of these people also lost their health insurance. And it's not just the people who filed for unemployment: It's their spouses, it's their kids, it's their parents. It's nearly half a million people or more in Hawai'i that have been economically hit by this.

"Their employers have been hit, too—hard. University of Hawai'i partnered up with the Chamber of Commerce and a number of other business associations, and they surveyed 623 businesses across the state: 24 percent of those businesses surveyed said they will not survive without additional

assistance. Even those who were fortunate enough to get the federal PPP loan, 75 percent of that has to go toward payroll. They have rent, they have utilities, they have to struggle with figuring out how do they reinvent their business to act when they are allowed to open up in an era where they cannot do business as usual and they have to have social distancing and measures in place to protect their employees as well as their customers. They need help with these expenses. Every business that shuts down is one less that we're going to have to help us with an economic recovery.

"So, when there's a sudden economic collapse—and this is more sudden than we've had in a long time, and it's also unusual and, unlike the Great Depression, it's due to this virus that's come in—but when you have a sudden economic collapse, and we've had them before (2009, other periods), all of the experts say government needs to increase its spending. And the studies after the 2009 collapse show that the governments that did increase their spending in a way that got the best returns on those investments had shorter downturns and less debts and faster recovery. The biggest bang for the buck: spending on newly unemployed and lower-income—programs that help them. The last three chairpeople of the Federal Reserve have said the important thing is to prevent businesses and individuals from going bankrupt, keeping people housed, keeping local businesses open or alive.

"We received nearly a billion dollars in federal CARES Act money, either CARES relief or those recent CARES 3.5. Part of what we were doing this session and in some of these bills in front of us is to assert our legislative authority over appropriations over these fundings. It's to move them out of the governor's control and into the rainy day fund, to say that the Legislature can make better decisions.

"I'd like to point out what some of the other states are doing because I contacted NCSL and looked online. They're realizing that they need to get money out to their local businesses and to the families and individuals who are hurting in order to keep them afloat because it's those people that are going to help them get out of the economic problems that they're in, and by helping keep them afloat, it'll reduce the amount of support that they're going to have to provide in the future:

- Montana: \$133 million in emergency grants for small businesses to adapt, for senior care homes to keep kūpuna connected, for emergency housing and food and childcare so people can go back to work;
- New Hampshire: \$490 million: small business relief, early child care, family support, food bank, nonprofits for social services;
- Ohio: \$174 million to expand who is eligible for food stamps because they don't want to have that strict income requirement when they know so many people are struggling with severely reduced household incomes, and expanding food banks and school food programs;

All three came back negative, so the view by Dr. Miscovich as well as the Blood Bank is that perhaps I never had it; it was a false positive. So with that thought in mind, I just want to make sure that that's clear for all of you, which probably would explain why none of you came down with it. Neither did my family. Again, I'd just like to set that record straight. Thank you, Mr. President."

Sen. Laura Thielen: The Hawaii Legislature Failed To Do Its Job

The state has money to help people who are hurting now, but lawmakers won't use it.

We blew it when we came back into session. We needlessly left many residents and local businesses to sink further into insolvency, we're prolonging economic pain, and we're making our recovery slower.



Federal Reserve chairs, Treasury secretaries, most economists and studies of the 2009 recession agree: In economic recessions, governments that spend money to help people avoid bankruptcy, help businesses stay open, and keep people housed, have faster recoveries with less debt. Governments that do not prolong the damage and end up deeper in debt.

In two months, over 225,000 Hawaii residents filed for unemployment. About 100,000 of them have yet to get a dime. The director says the backlog will go into June.

Three months with no income, many losing health insurance in the middle of a pandemic.



The Hawaii Legislature reconvened on May 11 but with COVID-19 restrictions that prevented the public and media from entering the building. As it ramps up business for now, a state senator says lawmakers could have done far more to help those most in need because of the pandemic.

Twenty-four percent of local businesses surveyed say they will not survive without help. Most don't get federal Paycheck Protection Program loans; those that did can only use a fraction on rent or costs to revamp operations to meet social distancing.

The state has money to help now. The feds gave us \$1.25 billion with only two strings attached: Spend it on COVID-19 response (not budget shortfalls); and, spend it by Dec. 31. Honolulu received its share directly; the state got nearly \$900 million.

Governor Ige should have sent the neighbor island counties their share and helped people stuck in the state unemployment mess. But when he didn't, the Legislature chose to assert our control over the money.

'Not One Dime'

So, what did we do when we came back into session this week?

We identified over \$2 billion in the state budget that could be used for budget shortfalls and emergency needs: \$900 million of federal COVID-19 money, about \$700 million in cuts and transfers, and nearly \$400 million in savings.

Then we did three things with that money:

- We earmarked \$1 billion for budget shortfalls in 2020 and 2021 to avoid furloughs and cuts;
- We gave neighbor islands their share of COVID relief and a bit for state COVID response; and
- We put about \$650 million COVID relief into the rainy day fund, where the governor can't touch it.

Not one dime for people waiting on unemployment. Not one dime for local businesses inching closer to shutting forever.

Our plan: We will recess today, go home, and think over what to do.

We're pretty sure we'll come back in mid-June.

I am utterly mystified at the lack of urgency.

The money committee chairs said it's unfortunate I'm not looking at the whole CARES Act funding; they gave some to the neighbor islands, and the state must take care of hospitals and food stamps.

I am looking at the whole federal funding. In addition to the \$1.25 billion in CARES Relief, the state also got hundreds of millions more to help hospitals and schools. Food stamps are federal money. The whole federal package makes the state more able than the counties to provide direct assistance to residents and businesses.

The counties can't make the level of government investment needed with what we gave them. They got tens and twenties, while we banked nearly two thousand, plus several hundred more earmarked for state services.

The state must put some skin in the game. That includes help for people and businesses on Oahu, because its economy subsidizes the other counties.

Other states are putting skin into their games, so we have models to follow:

- Montana — \$133 million in emergency grants for small businesses to adapt, senior care homes to keep kupuna connected; emergency housing, food and childcare;
- New Hampshire — \$490 million small business relief; early childcare and family support; food bank; non-profits for social services;
- Ohio — \$174 million to expand SNAP (food stamps), food banks and school food programs;
- Vermont — \$300 million for economic relief for local businesses;
- North Carolina — \$125 million for small business loan program;
- Alaska — \$290 million for small business relief grants.

I proposed zero-interest loans for people waiting on unemployment insurance — \$600 a week, provided they sign an agreement that once approved, the state would repay itself first. As the repayments came in, we could put those funds elsewhere to help.

That was shot down.

Last week we found out the state was getting yet another \$50 million of federal money. I proposed we put \$30 million with non-profit partners to distribute emergency grants for people waiting on unemployment, or who could return to work but needed childcare or kupuna care.

Again, no.

The state must put some skin in the game.

The House Finance Committee chair stated we needed to bank money because we're about to run out of unemployment funds.

We are not about to run out of unemployment funds.

We've received a \$1.3 billion, interest-free line of credit from the Unemployment Trust Fund. The Legislature is passing another bill encouraging the governor to take out interest free loans, so we're obviously not against borrowing money.

The Legislature blew it this week by not putting some of our emergency response funds into programs to directly help newly unemployed and local businesses.

I'm speaking out now in the hopes that more people will do the same, so that when we come back in June, we don't blow it again.

Pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 244, the Legislature recessed the 2020 Legislative Session beginning May 22, 2020. SCR 244 allows for the Senate President and the Speaker of the House to reconvene the 2020 Legislative Session by joint signed memorandum.

Please be advised that pursuant to SCR 244 and with this joint signed memorandum, the 2020 Legislative Session will reconvene on Monday, June 22, 2020. Senate floor session will begin at 11:30 a.m. and House floor session will begin at noon.”

At this time, Senator Gabbard, Chair of the Committee on Agriculture and Environment, requested a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 1819, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1.

Senator Gabbard noted:

“The proposed S.D. 1 for H.B. 1819 involves the purview of CPH; therefore, we need additional time to circulate a referral notice for the bill.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Gabbard announced that the Committee on Agriculture and Environment and the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health would be holding a public hearing on H.B. No. 1819, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1 on Wednesday, June 24, 2020, at 1:30 p.m. in Conference Room 224.

At this time, the Chair invited the members to share remarks about their late colleague, Senator Breene Harimoto.

Senator Riviere rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I think we all agree that Breene Harimoto’s the nicest guy we ever met—without a doubt, the most honorable, nicest, straightforward, reliable guy that we could count on. It was my great pleasure, and I think all of ours, to work with him, and he’s going to be sorely missed. He brought so much clarity to his decision-making; it was easy because he knew the right thing, and he stood by it, and he was willing to stand by his convictions. I think we can all learn to be better people if we

just remember the great life and the effective manner in which he lived his life, and if we could all try to be a little bit more like Breene, the world would be a better place. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I had the privilege and honor to know Breene from my Neighborhood Board days. He taught me; he was just a gentle soul. He helped us: To tell you the truth, ‘Ewa Beach would not have our library if it wasn’t for Breene. He came to me when I was the chair of the Neighborhood Board very early and said, ‘Eh, you guys gotta prepare. I think they’re gonna start cutting the libraries, and I think ‘Ewa Beach is one of them.’ And I said, ‘Why? It’s a school **and** a community library.’ He said, ‘Yeah, but you guys need to get ahead of it because you guys are one of them on the chopping block.’ So we did. We got together with the ‘Ewa Beach Lions Club and some of the other board members; we came right out here, and we made news, and, lo and behold, you folks know our library’s still there—thanks to Breene’s caring about the ‘Ewa Beach community.

“When I was blessed with the opportunity of winning the Senate seat to be here with all of you, Breene was the first one who came and invited me to his office, and we just sat down and started talking about the old days and stuff that we used to do back on the Neighborhood Board. When ‘Ewa Beach Neighborhood Board was kind of rowdy back then (I don’t know why; I don’t think it was the chair, but anyway it handled lots of controversies), Breene was the one who gave me great wisdom in the sense of not just being yourself but also being a people person—standing by your convictions and your beliefs, and always, no matter how frail he was at the time, he would always have a word of encouragement. He would never let you know what was really happening, even when you’d go over there and ask him how he’s doing. He always had something to encourage **you** by, and, while we’re there to try to comfort and encourage him, he’ll do the reverse on you. That’s something I learned so much from being with him the short time that I got to work with him in the Senate. It is a privilege and an honor to have worked with him side by side and to have known him all these years.

“So, again, he’s going to be surely missed not only by our colleagues here but also the community of ‘Ewa Beach, who never will forget the fact that he was the one who helped us save the ‘Ewa Beach Library. Thank you.”

Senator Gabbard rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“As we all know, Breene was a strong person of faith, and a while back I had a discussion with him about that. I was curious where he was in terms of his relationship with God and the disease that he was carrying in his body. And what he told me was, ‘I would never pray to God to heal me because I don’t know if that’s what God’s will is. What I’m praying to God is that, whatever your will is, Lord, that’s what I want to do.’ We will miss him dearly. Ke Akua, me ke aloha.”

Senator Nishihara rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Breene and I shared the Pearl City community in the Senate, and all through the years that I’ve known him, he’s been a strong supporter of that community. He was both active and he expended his energy to whatever act that could support the community of Pearl City. Although we sat on the same committee, there were times in a lot of the committees when Breene had his own point of view about how he was going to vote. But where it mattered, I think in the last committee we had together, he gave his word, and he stood firm on it throughout that. And that shows, to me, the quality of Breene, that he was good for his word and that he had a strong faith, and I’m sure

not just myself but others probably prayed for his health. So he'll be sorely missed in the community that he had served so long, both as a councilman and then later as a senator. So he leaves a void in the community, and I'm sure we will all miss him, and so, to which, I just say, Godspeed, Breene, and until we all meet again, thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"From when Breene became a senator, we became close friends, and Breene and I often had talks together, and, as a neighboring senator, we also shared a lot as far as what we would do for our communities. Toward the end, Breene knew; he called me several times. He knew that his time was getting close. He got off of the treatments because it wasn't working. He said he spent times when he couldn't remember stuff, and so he apologized when we were talking if he didn't always remember what he was saying before, but he was very concerned about his community. He was concerned about his staff. He apologized for not being here with us. He was a very quiet warrior in the sense that he fought the fight, and even until the end, he said, 'Even though they said that there's no hope ...' Well, he didn't really say 'hope,' but that he was off the treatments and that it didn't look good—it was still in the hands of God, and he believed in that and he believed that whatever was God's will would happen, and I think that's the reason why he didn't resign his seat. He contemplated it; we talked about that, and I think that's the reason why: because, to the very end, he believed, and that it would be in God's hands. And so I think we're all better for having known him, to have known his fortitude and his willingness to stand up and fight for what he believed was right, and so we just say aloha to Breene, and condolences to his family and his staff. Thank you."

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I didn't know Breene for very long, just the time that I was here, but he was always a gentle soul. He always was there to help. I do want to say that he is the epitome of Micah 6, that he sought justice, that he really gave love and kindness, and he walked very humbly with his God, and I do want to say, to his family and to him, aloha, he will be very much missed."

Senator Rhoads rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Breene and I disagreed about just about everything, including death with dignity, which of course we passed a couple of years ago. I think all I can say is that when I'm at my end, if I can do it with the dignity that he did, I will be satisfied. Thank you."

The Chair offered the following remarks:

"Normally the survival rate of pancreatic cancer doesn't extend past six months, but Breene was in the three to five percent. It's clear for the five years that he continued to serve after the diagnosis that there was a bigger plan for him and contributions for him to make, and it's also clear to me that he was here so long because of his faith, which gave him the courage, the conviction, and the strength to carry on. Besides the kindness that everybody acknowledges and the respectful manner that he had even in disagreement, I have said on more than one occasion from the rostrum here, looking at his slight, frail figure, that he's not the person I envisioned as the strongest member of the Senate physically, but clearly, the way that he handled himself, he had an incredible strength within him, certainly helped by his faith. Certainly, like Senator Rhoads says, when each of us faces our last challenge on the road home, to be able to carry ourselves with the same dignity that Senator Harimoto carried himself, to have that unwavering faith in making a difference until you draw your very last breath, is all

that I could also hope for. I thank him for his friendship, thank him for his service, thank him for being a role model every single day of his life about how to live and how to contribute and how to be strong. And then to his family and to his staff, on behalf of the Senate, our condolences on our loss. He will be missed."

Senator English rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"The Hawai'i State Senate is humbled to express its heartfelt aloha to the family of Senator Breene Harimoto. He was a loved and valued member of the Hawai'i State Senate who passed away on June 19, 2020. Senator Harimoto is survived by his wife, Cheryl, three children, and three grandchildren. I would also like to acknowledge his staff, Linda and Robert, who are seated with us in the gallery today. Mr. President, I'd like to request the Senate adjourn on a rising vote and observe a moment of silence in honor and memory of our friend and colleague, Senator Breene Harimoto."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1631, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to State Bonds."

The purpose of this bill is to authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds by the State. In addition, this bill authorizes the borrowing of moneys from the Municipal Liquidity Facility under section 13(3) of the Federal Reserve Act, 12 U.S.C. § 343(3). Further, this bill declares the Legislature's findings with respect to these bond authorizations as required by Article VII, Section 13 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

This bill is objectionable because, due to revisions in the State's bond issuance plan, the State plans to issue an additional \$100,000,000 in general obligation bonds in the second half of fiscal year 2022-2023. This bill needs to be vetoed so that the Legislature can consider this additional bond authorization.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 1631 without my approval.

H.B. No. 2294, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Rhoads moved that H.B. No. 2294, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keohokalole.

Senator Rhoads then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 8) to H.B. No. 2294, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 2294, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by amending the effective date from July 1, 2050, to September 1, 2020, in section 27 and to read as follows:

"SECTION 27. This Act shall take effect on September 1, 2020."

Senator Rhoads moved that Floor Amendment No. 8 be adopted, seconded by Senator English.

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Mr. President, this bill passed out of JDC before the coronavirus pandemic had started and, as is common practice, we had left a defective date on it that is no longer really very practical, so all this floor amendment does is put on a clean effective date, and the House has agreed to the measure as it stands."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 8 was put by the Chair and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2294, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NOTARIES PUBLIC," was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Monday, June 29, 2020.

FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1-20 (S.B. No. 126, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1-20 was adopted and S.B. No. 126, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2-20 (S.B. No. 785, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator Taniguchi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2-20 be adopted and S.B. No. 785, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"There are two main reasons we need to approve this measure.

“First, the contracts this bill funds will not protect government workers from pay cuts, furloughs, or getting laid off. These contracts do not guarantee employment. In fact, they have specific provisions about how the government can make cuts and lay people off.

“The Legislature has wisely adopted a cut last approach to the current recession. Cutting first would have made the economic situation even worse. Government employees would have taken a pay cut, less money would have been spent, the economy would slow further, tax revenues would have dropped more, we would have cut the budget more, and the economy would continue its downward spiral.

“Having said that, barring a vaccine or significantly more help from the federal government, the chances of significant cuts in the one-year to 18-month range is very, very high. By then, we will have burned through our rainy day funds, which we have so painstakingly stockpiled since the last recession, used up the CARES Act money, and tapped every available special fund for general fund use. If we get to that point, we will have no choice but to cut, and government workers will take the brunt of that economic pain.

“Second, and related, many government workers, both State and county, have been working without a contract for almost a year. This means that in the fiscal year starting July 1, 2019, they made less than they did in the previous year due to inflation. This bill catches those employees up to other government employees whose contracts were finalized during the 2019 legislative session and who already had new contracts (and got raises) before the COVID pandemic hit.

“It also means that most government worker contracts will be up again in just over a year. This time, the economic effects of the pandemic will be painfully clear. There is a statutory provision that prohibits an arbitrator from taking into account that the government could raise taxes to cover government employee raises. I sincerely hope that business is booming and our tax revenues are on the rise a year from now, but that doesn't seem very likely. Government workers will be lucky if they maintain their current salaries at that point, both those who got a new contract last year and those whose negotiations took longer that we are addressing today.

“We're in a very difficult position, but there are rational reasons to hope. Better political leadership in Washington could be in place as early as January, and Dr. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, is cautiously optimistic that a vaccine could be developed by the end of the year. Both of these events would improve the economic situation tremendously, and maybe these cuts will never be necessary. Mahalo.”

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Since I was elected to office, I've come to the capitol every year in January to hear our economic forecast, and the report for all six years I've been here has basically been the same: The best of times is now. With that said, our public workers deserve these raises in this contract. They deserve a contract, and when this is all over, one day in the future—because one day in the future, it will be over—I will be the first to advocate for raises and to make sure that all of our state workers who are impacted by this bill and the decisions to come are made whole. But I cannot ignore the state of affairs we find ourselves in, which occurred after this agreement was reached but before we were able to approve it.

“Mr. President, the path we are on is unsustainable. Unsustainable. And the work we are doing this session, with the exception of this bill, acknowledges and addresses that reality. I just cannot support this bill because it makes it harder for us to

make the already-difficult decisions before us and, more so, because it will make it harder to make the terrible decisions that we all know are coming, and they are coming soon. With this vote, I am asking respectfully for the administration and the unions to come back to the table and work on a solution that is sustainable because this is certainly not it. I'd also like to ask that the governor hire a negotiator instead of having our Department of Human Resources head do double duty, which has become clear to me that he's not able to do at this time. I ask that they work on a viable solution to this mess that considers the hardship our public workers will face; a solution to this can be reached. I think our state workforce and our constituents deserve to know just how precarious the situation we find ourselves in is—and I'd like to acknowledge the comments of the senator before me—and what we will have no choice but to do to emerge from this crisis.

“With that said, I'm proud of the work that Senator Dela Cruz and my fellow colleagues on the Senate Special Committee on COVID-19 have done to shine a light on the State's response to the pandemic, especially because the committee has created a mechanism for the public to see and understand the nature of the challenges we are facing and the options we are forced to choose between in addressing this once-in-a-century catastrophe. The choices we are faced with are depressingly inadequate to fix the problems we are being asked to solve. Unfortunately for all of us, I believe this bill will make things harder to fix and our options fewer, and for those reasons, I cannot support it. Mahalo.”

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I vote to approve the collective bargaining agreements in the bill that were negotiated or arbitrated in good faith in reaching agreement. I believe all agreements should be honored by the employer. However, these agreements were negotiated prior to the unprecedented coronavirus pandemic that hit our state hard. We have over 250,000 unemployed, and many businesses closing. We face a budget shortfall of \$2.3 billion. If the Legislature were able to do so, we would defer the salary increases in these agreements. We cannot, by law, but we must. It is incumbent on the governor to lead during these times and to engage all the unions, who I know represent responsible and hard-working employees who would rather have their salary increases deferred than face furloughs or layoffs. With the faith in the governor and our public unions to agree on deferral of these salary increases, I vote 'aye with reservations.' Thank you.”

Senator Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I always thought we should have a 'no with regret.' We have 'yes with reservations,' but there are times where you vote 'no' and with regrets.

“I think our employees do deserve a raise. I think members of the general population who work in the private workforce deserve a raise in the minimum wage. But we've been hit badly in our economy, worse than in '09, and the fact of the matter is we just simply don't have the money. We are talking about encouraging the governor, and I understand that everybody in this room who's voting on this bill is trying to wrestle with what's the best way to move forward, but I agree with the senator from Kāne'ohe: If we pass this bill, we will leave the governor with fewer options rather than more, and we are going to throw people in the union into conflicting arguments between themselves about how to respond, which is going to make it more difficult to go forward.

“I was in the administration in '09. The governor, during that economic decline, tried to impose furloughs, and the judge said,

‘The governor does not have the authority under law to furlough or cut pay. That is only through collective bargaining.’ The only remedy the governor has on the books is to do layoffs. Layoffs are horrible. They’re horrible in any time, but they’re horrible in an economic downturn because you’re telling people that they’re going to be losing a job, losing the benefits that go with the job, and it’s horrible for the public because there’s a huge loss in services, and the budget impacts take a lot longer than a reduction in pay does because it takes longer for the State to see the savings from layoffs. But there was a lot of fighting within the union because senior members are affected less in a reduction in force or layoffs than junior members. I don’t want to see us go into that situation.

“If we pass this, we’re **asking** people to go back to the table, but if we don’t pass it, we’re **requiring** people to go back to the table, and while that’s not something any of us want to do lightly, given the magnitude of this economic crisis that we’re in, I think we need to ask people to go back to the table. I would prefer to send a message to the union that right now, if we were to pass this, we’re looking at having to borrow money from the Municipal Liquidity bond fund at a 2 percent interest rate to pay these salaries. That just helps the banks and the federal government, to give them the 2 percent interest. Let’s send them back to the table and recommend to the unions and the governor that we defer any pay increase and take a 1 percent additional increase to the people who do the deferral for that period of time that we would have taken out the loan. That keeps the money here in Hawai‘i; it’s a win-win situation because it’s a less burdensome repayment for the government, and it’s more revenue for the workers. But we can’t get people back to the table if we pass this bill, necessarily. We’re going to throw people into a lot of horrible discussions. So I just recommend that we send people back to the table. We will continue to operate under the current contracts. Everybody will continue to be paid and to have their full benefits while this discussion is ongoing, and they can come back to us in January with an agreement that would work in this economic crisis. Thank you.”

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I want to vote for these raises. I’ve voted for every raise that’s come before us, and I always strive for better worker wages. These union members of course deserve this, in part because we’ve agreed to it. The rest of the workers in our state, including some much more needy, also got a promise. We agreed at the beginning of this year, if they would be patient and be quiet, that they would get \$13 an hour minimum wage in four years. We agreed to it. All workers deserve for us to keep our promises, not just some. As it stands, although the bill is alive, we are not allowed to hear, amend, or vote upon the promised minimum wage increase for the rest of our workers, including the most needy. That’s a travesty of democracy, and it’s outrageous to me. We’re asked to vote on this one, but we’re not allowed to vote on the one that affects the rest of us. I implore the leadership in both chambers to find the compassion to fight for the rest of the workers also. It’s possible to hear a pure and simple minimum wage increase in the next few days; all it takes is will and leadership, and I hope that we’ll do the same for our most needy workers that we’re doing for our loyal government workers today, and keep our promise. So my reservations are to express that concern in the strongest terms. The union members before us today—this wasn’t their fault. This is our fault they’re in that mess, so I’m going to support it with reservations. Thank you.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that the remarks from the senator of Kaka‘ako be entered into the Journal as if they were his own, and the Chair so ordered (by reference only).

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“This is a painful time for everybody. The economy is in the tank; 150,000 people are unemployed, some of them are still struggling to get their unemployment checks. Fortunately, everybody who works for state government has continued to work. What we’re looking at here is a pay raise, which is warranted and it’s due, but there’s no money. Our current financial plan envisions borrowing a billion dollars to get us through the next year, and even after we borrow that billion dollars, we’re still going to be short an estimated \$130 million. It has been reported that these pay raises are worth about \$150 million, and whatever the exact numbers are, it’s money that we don’t have, and as catastrophic as the economy has been, fortunately, people are still working. There’s going to be some painful, painful cuts that are coming one way or the other, and this bill in itself is not going to close the budget or solve the budget. I would give pay raises, which are warranted—nobody’s arguing that—but I’d like to just quote an email that was sent to me this morning. It said:

Dear Senator,

I’m against the public workers getting a raise at this time and think it would be fiscally irresponsible for the State to consider it. I say that even though I was a DOE teacher for 32 years, and I know how hard our public workers strive to meet the public needs. But at this time, anyone fortunate enough to be employed should be willing to forego a raise. As a retired state worker, I am also willing to forego the annual increase in our retirement money if anyone is willing or wanting to bring that up.

“He concludes, ‘We all need to do our part.’

“So, Mr. President, as hard as it is to deny these pay raises, at this point, I would have to be in the camp that says we should pick this up later and not pass it down and hope that something gets fixed later. Thank you.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Mr. President, obviously this is not an easy vote for any of us here today. My reservations are not with the collective bargaining contract because I, too, believe that they negotiated it in good faith, so that is why I’m voting ‘with reservations.’ I don’t believe that the union should have to renegotiate their contract. I know that these contracts also include our frontline workers but, unfortunately, we can only vote yes or no; we don’t have the ability to amend the contracts.

“The reason for my reservations is that all collective bargaining contracts will have a raise on July 1st. These raises come at a time when over 200,000 residents are unemployed, and in 30-plus days, the federal plus-up dollars will end. I’m also concerned that, according to the budget plan, we have to borrow \$900 million to help balance the budget that will include these raises. While we don’t have the authority to amend these measures—only the governor has that authority—I would prefer, like many of my colleagues have already spoken, that these raises be deferred one year just as we, the judiciary, and the administration had agreed to a one-year deferral. After all, Mr. President, aren’t we in this together? Every message, every commercial on TV, is saying, ‘We are in this together.’ Is that just a hollow slogan? How are we in this together when businesses are struggling to stay afloat, when businesses had to close and lay off people, and over 200,000 people have no jobs, and the situation is not likely to improve in the near future? Yet, in five days, July 1st, public sector employees not only have their jobs but will get raises when so many people right now line up for hours just to collect food to feed their families. As a

member of the COVID committee, I hear the cries. I read the emails, probably more than many of you have, and we feel the pain of these people who have no jobs and knowing that they're going to have even less money come July 31st. So, sadly, Mr. President, not all of us are in this together."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2-20 was adopted and S.B. No. 785, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

ORDER OF THE DAY**ADVISE AND CONSENT**

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3714 (Gov. Msg. No. 706):

Senator Kidani moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3714 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kim and carried.

Senator Kidani then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CHRISTINE NAMAUU to the Board of Education, term to expire June 30, 2023, seconded by Senator Kim.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to request that remarks in support of the nominee with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President: I rise to express reservations regarding a second term on the Board of Education for Ms. Christine Namauu. She has been the Maui member on the appointed board for several years now.

"But first I have a general concern with how much oversight the current Board, including the nominee, has been willing to assert over the current Superintendent of Education. I still have issues concerning data gathered by the Board and used in fashioning a plan for the school year that begins in little over a month.

"What information did the Board use in measuring how well the teachers reached the students—especially the children who live in areas with less or no connectivity—or who cannot afford connectivity. More importantly, how well were our children served by the distance learning efforts in Maui Nui in the recently completed school year.

"When I spoke with the nominee, she was not aware of the metrics or measures of what has happened, nor had she asked for that data when the DOE was declaring a success in the online teaching during the fourth quarter of the school year. To her credit, I understand in recent meetings that she has been active in demanding more than canned general responses from the Superintendent and her central office staffers.

"My main concern has been the lack of urgency in expanding Hawaiian immersion opportunities outside of Pā'ia Elementary, Kalama Intermediate, and King Kekaulike to serve Central-East-Upcountry Maui children. I voted in favor of her service based largely on her past experience in helping develop Hawaiian immersion education in my county. Perhaps the nominee, due to her affiliation with Punana Leo, has some reticence in being an advocate for this issue for public school children. Quite a number of families in Central Maui, including those living in Hawaiian Home Lands in Paukukalo and Waiehu Kou, and longtime native Hawaiian and part-Hawaiian residents through the Na Wai 'Eha region, would like to have their children in those classes but currently need to get geographic exceptions for the limited places in the Upcountry Schools. When I met with her and communicated with some of her supporters (including teachers and administrators in these immersion schools), they uniformly recalled the thirty years or so that the programs have been worked on to reach the availability of classes today—a viewpoint that seemed to rest on the laurels of the hard work that it took to get what we have presently. They also asserted that they are having discussions about the program; I mentioned I hoped the discussion does not take another thirty years.

"I also had questions about properly determining the community districts for our schools in Central Maui—a contrast are the two newest schools: Pōmaika'i Elementary in Kahului takes a lot of geographic exemptions to fill its classrooms while Pu'u Kukui Elementary in Kehalani was purposely small and is overcrowded already.

"Pu'u Kukui is supposed to take the children from Happy Valley and the Ka Hale A Ke Ola Homeless Resource Center but there are discussions about changing the lines and sending those children to the older schools (Waihe'e Elementary and Wailuku Elementary). The demographic disparities are a concern if that happens. How involved will the nominee be once she is safely seated for another term in helping to make sure the disadvantaged residents of the districts don't get segregated into schools with older facilities and resources (Pu'u Kukui and Pōmaika'i were built with air conditioning and wired for a 21st century computer education).

"Nevertheless I am willing to vote in favor of her again with her aware that her role on the Board is not just to fill a space but to be an advocate for the children of Maui Nui. Mahalo."

I should note that, in the conference on this bill, in the heat of the discussion, I mis-spoke about our correctional officers, and I now correct that. They are far more than security guards—they too are trained Law Enforcement Officers who undergo extensive training to face the many challenging situations at the prisons.

“I also oppose this bill because we already have a serious problem trying to fill our Law Enforcement Officer positions in this State. If we pass this bill, we will make a poor recruitment situation—where people are reluctant to serve as Law Enforcement Officers—even worse by showcasing names of Officers prior to their being proven guilty. How is this fair? It isn’t!

“Plus: How does this bill protect the very individuals who constantly put their lives on the line every single day? HRS 92F states, ‘The name of any other public employee who is suspended or discharged is not disclosed until AFTER that employee’s rights have been fully adjudicated and exhausted.’ These are the due process rights given to every other public employee. Now this bill would change that only for Law Enforcement Officers. We legislators should follow HRS 92F, and we should oppose this bill when we really look at the need to protect those who protect us. So, let’s vote down this bill and, by doing so, we will continue to protect our Law Enforcement

Officers who lay their lives down daily to protect you, your family, and our communities.”

I would cross the very dangerous intersection at Vineyard Blvd and Pali Hwy where I saw children and kupunas walking. I would also see drivers running red lights and not watching out

for pedestrians. Unfortunately, it's still happening right in my own community. We've been sign-waving at intersections in the Moanalua, Salt Lake and Kalihi communities and vehicles continue to disregard traffic signals.

It's very disturbing to witness reckless driving and I feel the cameras will make drivers think twice about doing the right thing and obey the laws. I'm confident that this program will change driving behaviors, reduce traffic related deaths and most importantly, save lives of pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists. My son, Zach, was killed about ten years ago while riding his bicycle and my commitment to him is to raise awareness for safer streets. I hope you will join me in honoring Zach's legacy and saving lives. Thank you for your consideration.

I sincerely ask that you vote in FAVOR of HB1676 SD2.

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 2457, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, Relating to the Youth Vaping Epidemic. This important measure bans the sale of flavored tobacco products, prohibits the mislabeling of e-liquid products containing nicotine, and establishes fines and penalties for violations. In addition, the measure authorizes a court to require a person eighteen to twenty-one years of age who is convicted of possession of a tobacco product or electronic smoking device to complete a tobacco education program or complete a tobacco use cessation program or perform community service instead of paying a fine. A measure like this is necessary because there has been a dramatic increase in the use of electronic smoking devices by Hawaii's youth. Coincidentally, medical doctors have begun to document a major outbreak of the condition known as EVALI (E-cigarette Use-Associated Lung Injury) found mostly in youth and young adults who vape. EVALI creates lasting damage in its victims' lungs.

"H.B. 2457, H.D. 2, S.D. 2 addresses the significant drivers of this epidemic: the availability of flavored products and misleading marketing. Some electronic cigarette products on the market offer flavors such as candy, fruit, chocolate, mint, Kona coffee, Maui mango, shaka strawberry, and Molokai hot bread. These flavors and marketing appeal to youth are addicting and threaten the health of many who were previously non-smokers.

"H.B. 2457, H.D. 2, S.D. 2 creates the path for Hawai'i to fiscally and legally address this epidemic as the public health crisis it is. Although the cases of EVALI have declined in these recent months, it is important to address the continued health threat e-cigarettes have on Hawaii's youth. Vaping is not benign; vaping causes serious health conditions which can be deadly!

"Please join me in support of H.B. 2457, H.D. 2, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

Although stay-at-home orders were effective and essential to this pandemic, those same stay-at-home orders caused a rise in domestic violence. H.B. 2425, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 amends the definition of 'domestic abuses' under Hawaii's insurance laws and laws relating to domestic abuse protective orders to include coercive control between family or household members.

"This measure recognizes that domestic abuse victims can be victimized by being isolated from friends and family, controlling access to money, and monitoring individual activities and communications under the definition of 'coercive control'. It is increasingly difficult to reach and provide support to these victims of non-physical violence. The passage of H.B. 2425 will allow victims to obtain the necessary legal and financial protection that current law does not address.

"I want to express my gratitude to the Ways and Means chair, Senator Dela Cruz, and the House Finance committee chair, Representative Luke, for their assistance in making sure that some of our most vulnerable students have access to digital learning."

On motion by Senator Dela Cruz, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3788 was adopted and H.B. No. 460, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE COUNTIES,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3789 (H.B. No. 2502, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3789 be adopted and H.B. No. 2502, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Ruderman spoke in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I take the health concerns that bring this bill before us very seriously, and I take very seriously the attorney general’s concerns in wanting to push this bill forward. I also take very seriously all of our hard-fought civil rights, including those relating to privacy.

“I note that this bill comes before us through a very non-democratic process; it didn’t come through the normal process. I know it’s unusual times. It didn’t allow any normal public input; there was never discussion allowed. I understand—I’ve heard how we’ve dismissed the thousand testifiers in opposition. I’ve heard it clearly. Our committee report says there were numerous individuals opposed. And I’ve also heard it said quite loudly that they must not have read it or they don’t understand it, and, yeah, that’s true in a lot of cases, but that’s not the democratic process, to completely dismiss an overwhelming outpouring of opposition because they don’t know enough and we didn’t provide a process that allows them to know or allows us to hear their concerns. I don’t share all those concerns and I think a lot of them are farfetched, but I sure share some of them.

“I think of all the other times in our history when we were faced with fearful crises, and if we had surrendered some of our rights at every point along the way, where would we be now? We’re the link in the chain now. There’s fear in the air; some of it’s justified. Do we respond by surrendering our civil rights in an undemocratic process? So although I understand there’s a lot of fear today and much of it is well-grounded, I continue to stand on the side of civil rights where they’re being challenged, and I’ll oppose this bill. Thank you.”

Senator Keohokalole spoke in support of the measure as follows:

“This bill before us takes the response actions already articulated in the governor’s emergency proclamations and places them before the legislative branch, where they are better addressed under the constitution in order to properly allay the civil rights concerns mentioned by the senator before me. This bill explains who, should emergency circumstances related to the pandemic continue or escalate, is responsible for directing the public health aspects of this response and how they may go about taking action. This is in direct response to criticism that the governor exceeded his mandate under the constitution because of the issuance of multiple temporary emergency orders in succession. I know that there has been much criticism and controversy about how the State and counties have responded to

the pandemic, in part because of, again, successive executive orders without the opportunity for public input. Like it or not, as acknowledged in part by our local federal court last week, the constitution does allow this. But, in recognition of the democratic principles inherent in our constitution, I believe it is imperative that the Legislature speak on the actions taken to address this once-in-a-century catastrophe and, while we sit here in session, endorse the path forward and articulate how we expect the crisis to be managed going forward, if only to allow our constituents who disagree the opportunity to voice that displeasure.

“Regardless of the passage of this bill, the executive branch must still tailor its action to address the emergency narrowly and temporarily with a clearly explained justification that can withstand legal challenge. That criteria for action cannot and will not change; the constitution requires it. For example, the bill, starting on page 13, specifically explains the due process rights of individuals subject to any of the provisions of this bill. This bill does not abrogate the constitution. It does not abrogate the provisions of any other statutes, and no other statutes abrogate the provisions of this bill.

“With that said, I support the bill, and it is important to note that the provisions in question that are the source of so much controversy will expire in two years. Extension of any of those sections will again require legislative action. My hope is that we will not need to extend them. With those remarks, again, I support the bill. Thank you for your time.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I was in the Senate hearings for this bill, and while it was heard and when I was a part of, at the time when this moved forward, no non-elected government official was going to be able to have this kind of powers. Now I feel, if this bill goes through, it’s going to allow giving people who are not elected to have authority over certain decisions. I don’t feel comfortable with that, giving that kind of power to someone who’s not been elected to the position. Thank you.”

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“This measure was heard in the Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health on 6/25. It was heard in Ways and Means on 7/2/2020, so it had its requisite hearings, but more importantly, this is a measure that was requested by the attorney general and is much-needed to fight against COVID-19 and future pandemics. The unprecedented pandemic that we are facing has highlighted the need for our state to effectively respond to disease outbreaks. We have learned a great deal since March, and this measure codifies elements that will help the Department of Health to have the flexibility and efficiency in containing the spread of a disease.

“And I will note for the record and underscore it that the only person in the State of Hawai’i who can declare a pandemic and call some of these provisions into play is the elected governor of the State of Hawai’i, not an unelected head of a department. The head of the department is tasked with carrying out the law as many of the other department heads are. Screening travelers is a very important strategy in fighting the spread of disease, and this measure will allow the department latitude to screen, test, and perform contact tracing for people who are infected or at risk of infection—that’s one way that we help mitigate community spread.

“We’ve all received calls from the public—you hear ‘em outside—to oppose this measure. But I would like to emphasize that this measure does not give the director of health the authority to declare an emergency without consultation with and agreement from the governor. It’s the governor who declares the

emergency; the Department of Health director simply recommends and requests that action. And, to underscore what some other people don't seem to be able to grasp: This does not require vaccination. First of all, there is no vaccine for COVID-19, but there's no language in this measure that requires any compulsory vaccination even if it becomes available.

"I know there are people who looked at the first version of the bill, didn't understand or didn't realize that we had amended it significantly to address their concerns. I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this important measure to respond to this current pandemic and future ones. Mahalo."

Senator Dela Cruz, Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, rose to request a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for Gov. Msg. No. 503, and the Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Dela Cruz announced that the Committee on Ways and Means would be holding a public hearing on Gov. Msg. No. 503 that afternoon at 1:00 p.m. in the Auditorium.

Senator Taniguchi, Chair of the Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts, rose to request a waiver of the notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for Gov. Msg. No. 751.

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Taniguchi noted:

"This is the appointment of Damien Elefante to the Department of Industrial Relations Appeals Board. We had thought that the governor was going to send down a withdrawal, but apparently he has not done so yet, so we will try to have a decision-making on this so that we can have a vote on the floor."

Senator Gabbard rose on a point of personal privilege to observe that there was only one person in the Chamber wearing a lei, and extended happy birthday wishes to the chair of the Committee on Ways and Means.

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Happy birthday, Senator Donovan Dela Cruz.

"Earlier, we voted on H.B. 285, H.D. 1, S.D. 2. I will insert comments into the Journal, but also on the Senate floor, I want to say: What happened in conference—there was a lot of feedback on what had happened. I want to clarify: I don't want to disrespect our adult correctional officers at the prison; they do a great job for us there, and they protect us by keeping order in the prisons. So I just want to apologize to them because I called them 'security guards.' So in the heat of the moment, I misspoke, and I called them 'security guards.' They're not just security guards; they do a lot more than just being a security guard, so I just wanted to correct that and I wanted to insert my comments into the Journal on this bill, please."

At 1:17 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:17 p.m.

The President then addressed the members as follows:

"On Thursday afternoon, I received a letter from the governor talking about the Ways and Means committee and actions that they may have taken since they took no action and instead adjourned the committee meeting that day without taking testimony. In regards to the nomination of Rona Suzuki, the phrases of 'politicized' or 'political agendas' and terms of that nature were utilized, and I would like to say, on behalf of the Senate, we take our advise and consent role seriously. I have here with me this afternoon the constitutional power given to the Hawai'i State Senate for advise and consent: the statutory provision given to the Hawai'i State Senate for boards and commissions and the statutory authority given to us to deal with department heads. It is imperative that we do our duty, that we take our role seriously as conveyed to us by law, and when we disagree, it cannot be because of politics. If it were politics, the most email traffic we've had was on House Bill 2502, which we just voted on and amended several times because of the voluminous testimony that we received in trying to achieve balance between the public's concern and working with the governor and the attorney general in trying to do the best for the people of Hawai'i. That has always been the goal of each and every member of the Senate, and I will let the governor know and I will let each and every one of the other members of the Senate know that we will continue to do our job. I urge and implore you to continue to be vigilant in the work that you do, continue to put the scrutiny to every nominee the way that you have done, and to continue to carry out your job in the best interests of the people of Hawai'i."

At 1:20 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:21 p.m.

Senator Taniguchi announced that the Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts would be holding a decision making meeting on Gov. Msg. No. 751 the following afternoon at 3:00 p.m. in the Conference Room 224.

Wednesday, July 8, 2020

The Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, convened at 12:43 p.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Keohokalole, Rhoads, Ruderman, and Thielen present and participating via videoconference.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-First Day.

Gov. Msg. No. 1105, informing the Senate that on July 6, 2020, the Governor signed into law Senate Bill No. 3139, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 as Act 4, entitled: "RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," noting a line item veto on page 5, line 6, reducing the \$432,000,605 appropriation to \$0.

The Chair then directed the Clerk to take Third Reading out of order.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1805, H.D. 1, S.D. 2:

On motion by Senator Baker, seconded by Senator Nishihara and carried, H.B. No. 1805, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none.

H.B. No. 1819, H.D. 2, S.D. 3:

Senator Gabbard moved that H.B. No. 1819, H.D. 2, S.D. 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Gabbard rose to request that remarks in strong support of the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Gabbard's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of H.B. 1819, H.D. 2, S.D. 3.

"Before getting into my comments on this legislation, I'd like to share the history of hemp in Hawai'i. Locally, in 1999, Act 305 (H.B. 32 introduced by Rep. Jerry Chang) was enacted in Hawai'i to allow privately-funded industrial hemp research that lasted three years. Hemp shampoo maker Alterna Professional Hair Care Products funded the project with a \$200,000 grant. The hemp was grown on a small plot in Wahiawā and they found the Chinese variety of hemp seed best for Hawai'i. Gov. Cayetano declared Dec. 14, 1999 as Industrial Hemp Day and marked Hawai'i as the first U.S. state to plant industrial hemp seeds since WWII.

"Then government fell asleep, as it tends to do sometimes. Fifteen years passed, and fortunately, in 2014 the federal Farm Bill included a provision to allow the growing of industrial hemp for research purposes as long as it's connected to a university or Dept. of Agriculture. A dear friend of mine, John Rogers, who recently died from terminal cancer, asked if I would look into hemp as possible legislation for the 2014 session. Not knowing anything about hemp, my research began with viewing a wonderful documentary, 'Bringing it Home' which I highly recommend. So I introduced S.B. 2175 in 2014, which was signed into law as Act 56. Act 56 authorized UH's CTAHR to establish a two-year hemp study. I must admit I was a bit disappointed. I thought, 'Enough already...we already did the study in 1999...let's grow this NOW.' Then, it became a bureaucratic nightmare dealing with the federal DEA...it took 11 months to get the seeds here for the study. Nevertheless, on April 10, 2015, I patiently joined Dr. Harry Ako from UH for the hemp seed planting at their test plot in Waimānalo. A few months later, on July 23, 2015, I was invited to participate in the harvest. I was shocked when I arrived to see Dr. Ako standing beside hemp plants that were over 10 ft. tall, with some in the 12-14 foot range. Dr. Ako was a skeptic at the beginning of the project. He looked at me and said, 'Senator, we've got to grow hemp in Hawai'i.' In Dec. 2015, CTAHR's official hemp research report was presented to the Legislature, concluding that and I quote, 'Hemp seed production may become a lucrative activity for farmers. There is significant potential for a successful hemp agricultural industry in Hawai'i based on the preliminary findings of the 2015 Industrial Hemp Research Project.'

"In 2016, I introduced S.B. 2659, Act 228, establishing a five-year industrial hemp pilot program under the DOA allowing the cultivation of industrial hemp for agriculture and academic research, which includes the commercial sale of hemp for marketing and industry development. On May 5, 2016, I was on Maui to celebrate Hemp History week and the viewing of the hemp house of former NBA player and coach Don Nelson—800 sq. ft. (Guest/Ohana House) and 4,000 sq. ft. (main house). The houses were made with hemperete...breathable, extremely sturdy, and mildew-free. At the banquet that evening, I was honored to receive a surprise award as the '2016 Hempster of the Year' from the Maui Hemp Institute of Research and Innovation.

"Then, in 2017 we passed, S.B. 773, Act 199, a bill I authored which improves the existing industrial hemp pilot program law by allowing farmers to apply for hemp licenses year round instead of just from January to April, requiring the counties to recognize the cultivation of industrial hemp, limiting the cultivation of hemp to licensees on agricultural lands, and

repealing the requirement of having to get a movement permit to transport hemp plants or material.

"In 2018, S.B. 2556 passed which completed the creation of our hemp pilot program by establishing a Special Fund, where the licensing fees and potential fines can be deposited for the program's operation. DOA could use the monies for the program's operations and to hire employees, specialists, and consultants. S.B. 2556 was signed into law by Governor Ige as Act 59 on June 27, 2018.

"In 2019, I introduced our commercial hemp bill, S.B. 1353. The House insisted on amending the bill to their liking. When I ran their changes by the HDOA, I was told the Attorney General had major issues with the amended version, and would recommend a veto by the Governor. I unsuccessfully tried numerous times to convince House members to stick with the Senate version, but they refused. In conference, I reluctantly signed on to the bill, hoping the Governor would not veto. He did veto it and his reasoning was: 'There are concerns that this bill creates a licensing structure that cannot be enforced, will not meet USDA requirements for an approved industrial hemp program, and creates practical problems in the enforcement of existing medical cannabis. Although the 2018 Farm Bill removes hemp from the controlled substances list, there are restrictions in S.B.1353 that would prevent Hawai'i from properly regulating this industry. Hawai'i's unique tropical environment and year-round growth calendar allows between three to four crop cycles per year. While this is a positive for most crops, the fine line between hemp and marijuana creates complexities. The limitation of inspection to one time per calendar year would allow hemp growers to cultivate marijuana for the remainder of the calendar year following their one allowed inspection.' Even with the veto, we still had our pilot hemp research program under the state HDOA. Farmers could continue growing up to 10 acres of hemp under the pilot. Right now, we have 50 licensees.

"Now back to H.B. 1819. This is the commercial hemp program bill that has the possibility of helping grow a new industry in our state. This is especially needed given the dramatic negative impacts the COVID-19 pandemic has had on our local economy. Once we got the directive from the Senate President that we weren't going to have any money to set up a state based commercial hemp program, it was clear we were going to have to be creative. I requested that HDOA put together a new draft for H.B. 1819 which would set up a USDA direct program, which would allow hemp farmers to apply directly to the federal USDA to get their licenses, instead of going with a state hemp program under HDOA which requires staffing and resources. HDOA brought together a hui of their department, Department of Health, and Public Safety with input from the AG's Office. It took them about one month to provide a proposed draft of the hemp bill. During the AEN/CPH and the JDC/WAM hearings, there was a lot of testimony and discussion about the impacts that the buffer zones in the bill would have on existing hemp farmers. There was also input from Kula residents who brought up concerns related to noise and smells from a nearby hemp farmer. We were trying to balance the concerns of existing hemp farmers about buffer zones with those of neighbors who live by the hemp farm in Kula. JDC/WAM amended the bill based on input from the House to exempt the 50 farmers who currently have licenses to grow hemp under the current pilot hemp program from the 500 ft. buffer zones around residences, playgrounds, childcare facilities, and schools. We passed a floor amendment on Monday to tighten up the grandfathering language even more. This will make it so those existing farmers aren't negatively impacted. JDC/WAM also required HDOA to come up with Administrative Rules by September 30, 2020 to address noise, smell, and lighting concerns from residences near hemp farms. Given our economic downturn amid the COVID-19 pandemic,

H.B. 1819 can definitely be seen as a bright spot of our session. It will allow our farmers to apply for licenses with the USDA to grow, process, and sell hemp products. Hemp is an amazing crop that can create over 25,000 incredible products. The key is developing a cottage industry with Hawai'i branding that will set us apart from the global competition. I'm hopeful hemp will help stimulate our economy and create opportunities amid our COVID-19 pandemic. Hemp, hemp, hooray!"

Senator Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I support the creation of a robust hemp program in Hawai'i; I would like to just see hemp legalized. That said, I do want to express reservations because this bill includes buffer zones, which I think is a dangerous precedent to set in the agricultural district. We have a right-to-farm law, and what that means is that farmers on agricultural lands are allowed to farm, which sometimes can be noisy and smelly and messy and dusty, and people who are living in either fake farm residential subdivisions or adjacent residential subdivisions are often complaining. So I hate to see us opening the door to creating buffer zones because it's going to make farming practically impossible in my district, in Waimānalo, where the lots tend to be fairly small. This bill does have a sunset period. So while I will not be in the Legislature in two years when it does sunset, I'm hoping that if there is a continuation of the hemp program, that this legislature eliminates the buffer zone requirement and instead moves forward with maybe some more practical rules adopted by the Department of Agriculture. Thank you."

By unanimous consent, H.C.R. No. 147, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO DISPOSE OF THE LONG-TERM WATER RIGHTS LEASES FOR HAWAIIAN ELECTRIC'S NON-CONSUMPTIVE WATER USE ALONG THE WAILUKU RIVER BY DIRECT NEGOTIATION AND PROVIDE GUIDANCE ON DETERMINING THE VALUE OF THE ANNUAL WATER LEASE RENT," was placed on the calendar for Adoption on Friday, July 10, 2020.

Hse. Com. No. 388, returning S.B. No. 2060, S.D. 2, as amended in H.D. 2, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Gabbard moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2060, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Gabbard noted:

"Mr. President, the House amendments are reasonable and appropriate to improve our overall resiliency to climate change. Their amendments will, number one, require coastal-dependent development to consider the effects of coastal hazards and to plan and locate facilities to minimize exposure to coastal hazards; number two, strengthen the protection of coastal areas by prohibiting shoreline structures in areas with sandy beaches unless the granting of a variance is clearly in the public interest; and number three, repurpose the definition of development in special management areas to regulate uses or activities that result in cumulative environmental effects or significant environmental or ecological effects."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2060, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 2060, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

Hse. Com. No. 389, returning S.B. No. 2130, S.D. 1, as amended in H.D. 1, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Nishihara moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2130, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Nishihara noted:

"We'd like to move to agree to the amendments made to Senate Bill 2130 by the House to simply clarify the State Fire Council's exemption from the Hawaii Administrative Procedures Act when adopting the State Fire Code, and some technical and nonsubstantive amendments."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2130, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 2130, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE CODE," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

Hse. Com. No. 390, returning S.B. No. 2139, as amended in H.D. 1, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Thielen moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2139, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Thielen noted:

"Thank you, Mr. President. The House amendments basically set a cap on the number of days after the close of filing on which a candidate may withdraw from office, and then it makes it retroactive to conform with federal law and makes some technical, nonsubstantive amendments, and I think these are improvements to the bill and recommend that we accept."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2139, and S.B. No. 2139, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VACANCIES," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

"The House has added a section on restricting government use of facial recognition technology. Considering the disruptions that we have undergone because of the pandemic, I believe this is a reasonable amendment and recommend that we accept it."

Hse. Com. No. 392, returning S.B. No. 2193, as amended in H.D. 2, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Taniguchi noted:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2193, H.D. 2 amends HRS Section 378-2.5, which limits when convictions may be used in employment decisions. Currently, all convictions may be used in the most recent 10 years. The amendments would change the use of felony convictions to those that occurred in the most recent seven years and misdemeanor convictions that occurred in the most recent five years."

"Senate Bill 2193, H.D. 2 reflects the agreement reached between the relevant House and Senate committees, and would be effective upon approval."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2193, and S.B. No. 2193, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT DISCRIMINATION," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

Hse. Com. No. 394, returning S.B. No. 2262, S.D. 1, as amended in H.D. 2, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

At 1:03 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 1:04 p.m.

Senator Kidani moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2262, S.D. 1, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Kidani noted:

“Senate Bill 2262 offers private school teachers a voluntary pathway to teacher licensure. This bill also gives the Hawai‘i Teacher Standards Board the authority to extend the period of time an emergency hire teacher will have to obtain their teacher license in the event of a declared emergency.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2262, S.D. 1, and S.B. No. 2262, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII TEACHER STANDARDS BOARD,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

“The House made an amendment that certainly addressed one of the testifier’s concern that the use of the phrase ‘outside the United States’ was too broad, and we specify in this bill now what ‘outside of the United States’ means—basically, banks located in the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Republic of Palau. We also note that the House inserted an effective date of January 1, 2021, to allow these amendments to be put into effect by notaries public.”

On motion by Senator Inouye, seconded by Senator Kahele and carried, the Senate disagreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2329, S.D. 2, and requested a conference on the subject matter thereof.

Hse. Com. No. 397, returning S.B. No. 2384, S.D. 2, as amended in H.D. 2, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

Senator Inouye moved that the Senate agree to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2384, S.D. 2, seconded by Senator Kahele.

Senator Inouye noted:

“The Senate Committee on Transportation moves to agree to the changes made in the House. These changes include ‘deleting language that would require certain tow operators to provide to a disabled vehicle’s driver a written disclosure of certain

information and itemization of charges before attaching a disabled vehicle to the tow truck under certain circumstances.’ These changes are acceptable to both myself and the introducer of the bill.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2384, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 2384, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

“The purpose is to prohibit any waste or disposal facility from being located in a conservation district except in emergency circumstances to mitigate significant risks to public safety and health. This bill requires no less than a one-half mile buffer zone around residences, schools, and hospitals for the construction, modification, or expansion of a waste or disposal facility, and it specifies that ‘waste or disposal facility’ excludes individual, state-certified, non-industrial redemption centers. This measure was amended in the House by making inapplicable to federal agencies the prohibition on construction, operation, modification, expansion, or closure of a municipal solid waste landfill unit without first obtaining a permit from the director of health; number two, making inapplicable to federal agencies the prohibition on construction, modification, or expansion of a waste or disposal facility or construction and demolition landfill unit without a one-half mile buffer zone around residences, schools, and hospitals; making it effective upon approval; and making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style. The recommendation is to agree to Senate Bill 2386, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 2, sent over from the House.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the Senate agreed to the amendments proposed by the House to S.B. No. 2386, S.D. 2, and S.B. No. 2386, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WASTE MANAGEMENT,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Friday, July 10, 2020.

This bill will save a great program at Fernhurst and all that they do to give women a second chance.”

“The penalties were made somewhat more stringent by the House, and I think those are reasonable amendments as well.”

Hse. Com. No. 404, returning S.B. No. 2638, S.D. 2, as amended in H.D. 3, which passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives on July 6, 2020, was placed on file.

2. Requiring courts who grant a motion for deferred acceptance of guilty plea to require offenders to complete domestic violence intervention programs or parenting classes, if applicable;
3. Removing language that would have enabled the person charged with a misdemeanor or petty misdemeanor offense of abuse of a family member or household member to plead no contest;
4. Clarifying the court authorization to accept deferred acceptance of guilty pleas applies only if the defendant has no prior conviction or has not been granted a deferred acceptance of guilty plea for any offense of abuse of family or household member charged in the family court, regardless of the final plea;
5. Standardizing types of documents accepted as proof of domestic or sexual violence victim status;
6. Specifying that certified or exemplified restraining orders, rather than valid restraining orders and records or files of a court or government agency, are documents that will be accepted as proof of domestic or sexual violence victim status;
7. Allowing courts to impose a one-year probationary period for a petty misdemeanor of abuse of a family or household member, to ensure that defendants placed on probation will have sufficient time to complete mandatory terms imposed by the courts and that the probationary time is equal to that of the defendants placed on a period of deferral;
8. Changing the effective date to January 1, 2021; and
9. Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style.”

"Colleagues, Senate Bill 2629, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1's purpose is to ensure that the use of coal in Hawai'i for electricity production is eliminated by, one, prohibiting the Public Utilities Commission from approving, after June 30, 2020, a new, modified, or renewed power purchase agreement for electricity generated from coal; and two, prohibiting the Department of Health from issuing or renewing, after December 31, 2022, covered source air permits for coal-burning electricity generation facilities. This measure was amended by the House by, one, specifying that the PUC prohibition on approving a modification of a power purchase agreement applies to coal power purchase agreements that extend the term

or increase the amount of generation allowed to be produced under the existing agreement; and it makes this measure effective upon approval. I move to agree to Senate Bill 2629, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1, sent over from the House.”

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

The Chair then presented to the members Senator Bennette Misalucha of the Sixteenth Senatorial District.

The Chair continued:

"In conjunction with our 55 years of Statehood anniversary in 2014, we presented a very special lapel pin to current and past senators. This pin is a symbol of your service in the Senate and to the people of the State of Hawai'i. We owe a debt of gratitude to President Emeritus Kim, who had it designed and made. Under Senate Rule 92, the Senate pin shall only be worn by current or past members. Welcome to the Senate."

At this time, the Chair presented Senator Misalucha with the Senate pin.

The Sergeant-at-Arms then escorted Senator Misalucha to her seat.

He has strong qualifications in public accounting, auditing, tax law and has provided valued work as former chair of the tax review commission. As head of the Hawaii Housing Finance Development Corporation, he led with integrity the 60-member corporation in addressing one of the most important needs of our state—affordable housing.

“Today, we face an unprecedented projected budget shortfall of \$2.3 billion, with 250,000 residents still unemployed, with businesses and our economy yet to return to normal. To take us through these times, to restructure state government, to reconstruct our executive budget, and to work with our 18 departments to plan and execute, we need an exceptional leader.

“The director of budget & finance must administer the state’s program and financial plan, the executive budget, and improve its management. This requires working closely with department heads to develop the budget, generate financial sustainability, and deliver essential services to the public. During the last five months, the interim director should have made progress on all these fronts. He should have worked with departments to use the federal relief funds to help position them for the coming year. Unfortunately, Mr. Hirai failed to provide such plans or even an overall direction or framework for how the state should proceed.

“Asked how he advised the Governor on salary increases for our public workers he merely replied ‘governor does not negotiate in public.’ Such answers, combined with the lack of a plan for delivering essential services to the public under our severe budget constraints, leaves little confidence that he can lead us at this critical time. We need someone else who can lead us out of this fiscal crisis.”

Senator Fevella requested that remarks in support of the nominee with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella’s remarks read as follows:

“I vote with reservations for confirmation of this nominee because he has not been assertive enough in urging that the Executive Branch fully take into consideration the negative impact that reductions in pay and ‘furlough days’ will have on public school teachers and lower-ranking State workers such as clerks.”

In compliance with Gov. Msg. No. 869, the nomination listed under Gov. Msg. No. 503 was returned.

“The recommendation of the Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts on Governor’s Message No. 751 is that the Senate not advise and consent to the nomination of Damien Elefante as Chairperson of the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals Board. Therefore, the Chair will first entertain a motion to file Standing Committee Report No. 3827, then we’ll move on to the final vote on this matter.”

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3827 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Baker and carried.

The Chair stated:

“Again, members, pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), the final question on nominations made by the governor must be stated in the affirmative. Therefore, those casting ‘Aye’ votes will be voting to advise and consent, and those casting ‘No’ votes will be voting to reject the nomination. The Chair will now entertain a motion to advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. Elefante.”

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DAMIEN ELEFANTE to the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals Board, term to expire June 30, 2030, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Taniguchi rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, your Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts held a public hearing on May 15th for this governor’s message. Decision-making was made on July 7th after full consideration of the nominee’s qualifications and the testimony received. The committee voted unanimously to **not** confirm the nominee.

“Mr. Elefante is an inappropriate nominee to be chair of the board which deals with complex workers’ compensation cases. At present, the nominee has no background or experience in the law or cases involving workers’ compensation, boiler and elevator safety, occupational health and safety, or wages and benefits.

“Your Committee on Labor took notice that, as a matter of custom and practice, the Labor and Industrial Relations Appeals

Board has included proportional representation from labor, management, and government to provide the appropriate balance needed to fairly apply the law, decide cases, and develop policy precedents. The nominee would be the second government representative, together with one management representative, on the three-member appeals board—no claimant representative would be included.

“Your Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts received testimony in opposition to the nominee from seven labor organizations, whose thousands of public and private employee members utilize the established rights and benefits for which claims are made and appeals may follow. These organizations were alarmed by the possible loss of any labor representative on the appeals board, and the nominee’s clear lack of experience in the substantive areas of law comprising the appeals board’s jurisdiction.

“Based on these concerns, I ask that the Senate **not** advise and consent to the nomination, and vote ‘no’ on Governor’s Message 751. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Ihara rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, I have no problem with this nominee’s ability to learn the job. As to his qualifications, I believe he is qualified. I think he’s the kind of person we need in government. But my one sticking point is that we are changing the practice of having a labor-management balance on this appeals board. There was an exception when a former senator was confirmed as LIRAB chair; but for him there was consensus that he could be part of the balance.

“Now, the balance issue may be wrong, because I could not find it in the law anywhere. It’s been the Senate’s practice, our job and our role, to vet the leaders of the other two branches of government. Nobody gets past us; no top leaders in the other branches get positioned until they come through our vetting process.

“So we’ve had a past practice, and I asked the nominee for rationale to change this practice because I’m open to changing it. I did receive a response, but it was a bit conclusionary, such as its outmoded and we need to move on, and all that. But I still haven’t found a reason.

“If I had to make the argument, which I won’t, I still couldn’t enough reason in my mind. I could be wrong, but I do not find reason to change our past practice of having consensus or a balance for LIRAB chair. I don’t think we need to have proportional representation, I don’t have to go that far. But I believe that there needs to be at least some semblance of trust in the community that parties to these appeals would be viewed from a balanced perspective. It’s a vague notion, and that’s why I believe it’s not in the law.

“I’ll say one more thing that I’ve said before. My vote on nominations and on bills is what I call a political act. Because as elected officials and constitutional officers, we have wide latitude on how we vote—left, right, up and down, deep, any which way. We don’t need a reason for our votes. We are sort of like the policy gladiators in the colosseum. Voters elect us, and we do the people’s work. They have no role in this, except we want their input.

“From my own perspective, I believe there’s too much politics in the public policy arena. The public wants to see public policy conducted using civic values. My main north star is—what is the civic purpose? I do not see a civic purpose here.

“I see a political purpose for this nominee, to reduce the backlog and get more decisions made. I consider this a political

reason, and a good political reason, because we need to be strong in order to do the job, and that’s fine.

“The question is: what is the civic purpose? I have not been able to find the civic purpose in this case, so I’m voting ‘no’ for this nominee. Thank you.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I think I heard the previous speaker say that there was an exception made in the past and it was a political one, and the exception was a former senator, so nothing seems more political to me than to deny this nominee the same exception. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

“I was also part of the Senate Committee on Labor hearing Mr. Elefante. I’m going to be voting ‘with reservations.’ The reason for that is because I got to finally talk extensively for about a couple hours with him: My main concern was because I’m very concerned about his views on Labor. That was one of the main reasons why I wanted to talk to him and kind of pick his brain. I understand we have concerns on his abilities to be fair to Labor. In the conversation that I had with him, he said, as an attorney, he has respect for law—and that’s the important part, knowing the laws. There is something about him that I know that he’s going to be able to not only interpret but also follow the law in the favor of what he needs to do for his position. I understand the unions have some concern, and he tried to reach out to some of the unions. So I asked him this question because of the enormous opposition from the unions: If he is put through, would he be able to reach out to them and try to break bread and ho’oponopono with them and try to make them see that he is a good, qualified candidate who is capable of following the law and doing right by the people and the government agencies and the people that they represent? So that’s the only reason why I am voting ‘with reservations,’ because I know he does not have that experience in Labor, but I think he’s more than capable of following and abiding by the laws. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

“The recommendation of the Committee on Water and Land on Governor’s Message No. 583 is that the Senate not advise and consent to the nomination of Christopher Yuen to the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Therefore, the Chair will first entertain a motion to file Standing Committee Report No. 3828, then we will move on to the final vote on this matter.”

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3828 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Baker and carried.

The Chair stated:

“Again, members, pursuant to Senate Rule 37(3), the final question on nominations made by the governor must be stated in the affirmative. Therefore, those casting ‘Aye’ votes will be

voting to advise and consent, and those casting 'No' votes will be voting to reject the nomination. The Chair will now entertain a motion to advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. Yuen."

Senator Keith-Agaran moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CHRISTOPHER YUEN to the Board of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire June 30, 2022, seconded by Senator Baker.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I believe he is highly qualified. He's always been a strong voice for the environment. His lifetime record of conservation advocacy and achievement, I believe, speaks for itself. Chris's legacy is far-reaching; whether through good planning or public acquisition of precious conservation and park lands, Chris Yuen's contributions will benefit generations. His legal training, planning expertise, demonstrated commitment, and track record make him a valuable BLNR member in helping to protect and wisely manage Hawaii's natural resources, the core mission of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

"There's one more criterion by which every appointee to a state board or commission should be judged, and that is personal integrity. There should be no self-dealing, no self-aggrandizement. There should be a genuine focus on the common good or the greater good, and there should be honesty. I believe 'personal integrity' describes Chris Yuen. Also, many upstanding and highly respected citizens who have worked with Chris over the years support his reappointment—folks like Colbert Matsumoto, Lea Hong, Ken Kupchak, Roy Takemoto, Keith Kato, and JoAnn Yukimura. Chris is a moderate voice who will help BLNR find real solutions and create the community of aloha.

"I support Chris Yuen's nomination because I believe he has the integrity and demonstrated commitment and ability that's much-needed by the Board of Land and Natural Resources. I ask my colleagues to join me to vote to confirm him. Mahalo."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Chris is a long-standing public servant with decades of experience and knowledge that can continue to benefit the board, Hawai'i island, and the state. Those who know Chris and have served alongside him know him for his character, his integrity, his levelheadedness, and his fair decision-making. We can see this highlighted in the testimony that was submitted by DLNR chair Suzanne Case, board member Sam 'Olu' Gon III, Professor Jonathan Price, among many others.

"Chris Yuen has received opposition from a number of individuals who are frustrated by his decisions regarding Kalo'i Gulch, the North Shore wind farm, and the east Maui water permits. As legislators, we know that we all must make difficult decisions. We research, we listen to the community, and we hope that whatever side of the issue we're on, it has a positive outcome that we intended. Either way you vote, there will likely be a group of people who will disagree with your decision. There is seldom a clear right or wrong answer, yet the committee report emphasizes again and again that Chris has come up on the wrong side of the vote. I respect my colleagues in doing their due diligence to make sure that the people's interests are acknowledged and represented. However, I also have concerns that the committee is holding Chris responsible for decisions that were made by a majority of the DLNR board members.

"If we are going to single Mr. Yuen out for his vote on issues, then why don't we look to his voting record in some of your own districts? To the senator representing Mānoa, Chris rejected

the expansion of Paradise Park. To the senator representing Ala Moana, Chris voted to not reduce the free parking at the Ala Wai boat harbor. And to the senator representing Kapa'a, Chris voted to approve the Hā'ena State Park master plan, which addressed the increasing number of visitors and associated impacts in order to protect significant cultural resources, maintain the park's natural beauty, and attempt to reduce impacts to the local communities and residents. Chris has also voted in favor of several land acquisitions, including nearly 2,900 acres of mountain watershed and lands set for native reforestation and recreation known as the Helemano Wilderness Recreation Area in Senate District 22, and the land acquisition from Kawela Bay to Kahuku Point preserved 630 acres of undeveloped property next to Turtle Bay Resort in Senate District 23. For years, development on this coast was fervently opposed by all who love O'ahu's North Shore. Chris Yuen's decision ensured that access to the shoreline will remain undeveloped so that people will be able to enjoy the land for generations to come.

"The Department of Land and Natural Resources' pledge is to enhance, protect, conserve, and manage Hawai'i's unique and limited natural, cultural, and historic resources for current and future generations of the people of Hawai'i. I believe it is evident that Chris Yuen's decisions align with his obligations as a board member. He has shown his willingness to sacrifice time, effort, and political affiliations in order to serve the people of Hawai'i.

"Colleagues, in closing, let me share some comments that I received from President Lehuakona Isaacs and past president Dr. Charles Burrows of 'Ahahui Mālama i ka Lōkahi, Hawaiians for the Conservation of Native Ecosystems:

Please vote 'yes' to confirm Chris Yuen as a member of Board of Land and Natural Resources. This modest, thoughtful champion of the environment is needed due to his experience and grace while finding a way forward for the many users of public waters and lands. Instead of just enjoying the fruits of his country farm or basking in a beach or park he planned or defended, in an era of civic dilemmas, thankfully this unflappable citizen volunteers more years in the hot seat sorting options with great care to build a better future for wahi pana, special places in communities we love. Chris Yuen has had broad legal, planning, and farming experience all over the state, beginning at Volcanoes National Park and continuing in Kona, pushing for new state parks. Together, we have worked for 30 years volunteering in Kawai Nui State Park Reserve's legendary sites Na Pohaku o Hauwahine and Ulupō Heiau while leading the nonprofit 'Ahahui Mālama i ka Lōkahi. Recently, Mr. Yuen crucially improved the DLNR master plan to allow a home base for our future restoration efforts. Too many Hawaiians have become disconnected from these places, and he enhanced educational opportunities for local folks, youth especially, to be personally involved in outdoor environmental restoration. The cultural benefits of nonprofit education centers around the public's marsh are new to this plan. We have personally experienced his problem-solving, proving the public needs his experience, grace, and wisdom on BLNR, so we strongly urge you, Senator Inouye and members of the Senate, to please vote to confirm Chris Yuen.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I will be voting to reconfirm Chris Yuen to the Board of Land and Natural Resources, and I hope my colleagues will do the same. Mahalo."

Senator Ruderman rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I’ve known the nominee for well over 30 years. I know him personally from within our community, and I feel it’s my job to speak out because I’ve heard a lot of things said that aren’t true about him. Full disclosure: Although I’m pretty sure it’s not a conflict of interest, I do buy bananas and lychee from Chris’s organic farm, and I’m a good friend of his wife and himself.

“One of the things I admire about Chris and his service on the board is that he’s a very active board member. He’s one of those board members who digs into the details, asks questions—asks the tough questions—on both sides. It’s easy to be a passive board member and it’s almost irresistible not to do that, but what we need are active board members who will dig into the details and will ask the tough questions. If you take a hundred controversial votes, everyone’s going to disagree on at least some of them, probably five or so, even if we totally agree. I don’t agree with all of his decisions; he’s dead wrong on the most important issue in my community, which is geothermal. He’s still willing to ignore the health impacts on hundreds of my neighbors, but in that regard, he’s like almost everyone else viewing the issue at a distance.

“So I don’t agree with every one of his decisions; that’s what happens when you make a lot of tough decisions, but I do want to take a minute to explain when I first met Chris Yuen because it’s telling. I was a member of a community called Waa Waa. It’s out in as rural Puna as you can get. It’s four miles down a dirt road. Only about a hundred people live there, and one day at our community association, this guy comes to talk to us about trying to save a beach called Makalawena on the Kona side from development. He came to talk to us as a grassroots environmental activist. A guy whispered to me while I was at the meeting, ‘Do you know that this fellow has won a case before the United States Supreme Court?’ I think that’s a pretty rarefied atmosphere for attorneys, but this guy was out in the boondocks, talking to 15 people about an environmental issue that was far from his home, and we were far from his home as well in another direction, so he was doing this volunteer work, the nuts-and-bolts work that is environmentalism, as a private citizen after having this really remarkable career as a successful attorney. By the way, the fellow, he went to the Supreme Court to save my friend Jim Good’s house from an illegal forfeiture. I thank him for that.

“There are many areas on the Big Island that are currently preserved because of Chris’s efforts as a private citizen, and I don’t know anyone else I can say that about, so when someone comes along and says he used to be an environmentalist but he’s not anymore, well, I’m an environmentalist, and I recognize one when I see one, and I admire Chris for his decades of action and efforts, even though I don’t always agree with him. Thank you.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Integrity, transparency, accountability, honor, fidelity, and trustworthiness: Those qualities mean a lot to me, and I know they mean a lot to this body because it means everything to the people of Hawai‘i—the people we serve and whose trust we cherish. Now, I have absolutely no doubt that the nominee had all of those qualities all the previous speakers spoke of before me, but that is not the nominee who came before the Water and Land committee who has served on the BLNR for the last six years and is the nominee before this body today.

“Why is the Hawai‘i island seat on the Board of Land and Natural Resources so important? It’s because preserving and sustaining in perpetuity the irreplaceable beauty of our state’s natural resources for the benefit of my children and their children is our kuleana; it’s our responsibility. Our vistas and

landscapes, our majestic summits and streams, our lush waterfalls and coastlines, our sandy beaches and ocean resources, our rainforests and our pastures, our native birds and bats and fish and ‘o‘opu and hīhīwai and wēkiu, and most of all—perhaps even best of all—our cultural resources and inheritance, the heart and the soul of these islands, that gifted us—all of us—our unique identity in this world. Because of that, there is a profound responsibility that comes with this position. A nominee must possess compassion; open-mindedness; innovative ideas; due regard for the law; a healthy respect for our diverse communities and their opinions, however dissimilar from their own; and what I believe is the most important characteristic of a nominee, humility.

“The nominee is highly educated and is a dedicated individual who has volunteered his time over the last six years, fourteen years total, to serve on the BLNR. Most people never get a chance to serve on the BLNR in their lifetimes. Fourteen years. We thank him for that. We appreciate his service, but today, it’s time to move on.

“Now, more than ever, we need a nominee—we deserve a nominee—who understands how to bring people together and collectively work to address the management of our natural resources, who can understand how to administer these resources for the public, who respects this state’s constitutional and statutory obligations. We need a nominee who can resolve conflicts. Unfortunately, on multiple occasions over the last six years, the nominee has not demonstrated this. For the many environmentalists, cultural practitioners, subsistence fishermen, farmers, limu gatherers, and, yes, their legal advocates who, six years ago, strongly supported this nominee but do not support his nomination today: Why is that? Well, the answer is obviously complex, but in the final analysis, these entities believe, as the subject-matter chair and the committee believe, that it is time for us to move on. These people, they’re not losers with malicious intent and ill-founded opinions, undeserving of an audience. They are not threats to our democracy. These people simply care deeply, as they should—as we all should—about the natural and cultural environment we’re leaving for the next generation. And if that’s their agenda that they’re guilty of, then we owe it to them to listen more closely, listen more thoughtfully and more respectfully to what they have to say and teach us. Given that generations of residents will be affected by these decisions, we owe it to the public to fill the Board of Land and Natural Resources with people they trust, people who will listen with an open mind, people who look at decision-making as a process to be collaborative. There are many fair, reasonable, objective, and qualified individuals on Moku o Keawe, Hawai‘i island, who should be given an opportunity to apply and be considered for this important position. This body must set a minimum standard that we adhere to and a vision that we must strive for. We have a difficult decision to make, but that’s why we are here.

“We thank the nominee for his 14 years of service on the Board of Land and Natural Resources. We wish him and his family well. But, colleagues, it is time to give someone else on Hawai‘i island that opportunity. It’s time to move on, and so I ask you to support my recommendation to not consent to Governor’s Message No. 583. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“I know I’m new to this body. I did a lot of extensive research, not only in my community but in other places on the neighbor islands. Yes, he has a very, very impressive résumé, very impressive record; I even told that to the nominee. But the gentleman who came before us in the committee—and that’s the reason why I have so much mixed feelings with him myself battling, because I very much admire this guy in previous times in his whole main reason to take care of our environment, but as

I went through and talked to people around the islands and realized there's a lot of decisions that this gentleman had made, and even went even against the board when the board had made recommendations to support not doing certain things and he went against them, and now some of the stuff is still in legal court.

"But I'm going to go with what I know, with Uncle Henry, in all the years that I know him when I was president of the Lions Club and chair of the neighborhood board. All his vision was, is to bring back the limu to not only in 'Ewa Beach but to the State of Hawai'i. With the constant run-ins that he had with Chris Yuen over the years, Uncle Henry, sadly to say, passed away, and he has left down his legacy to have other people to try to pursue his legacy, but his strength within the community in limu and trying to get the state to realize how important the environment on land is to the ocean and what is the land doing to the ocean. And I'm not that smart with all that stuff because I'm not a swimmer; I mean, I don't swim, ever since I was 12 years old, in the ocean, but I know what our ocean in 'Ewa Beach looks like today with all the runoffs, with all the development. And no get me wrong, development is okay, but we have to have development that is smart. But we have opposition saying that 'Ewa Beach, Hau Bush, where I grew up, where we cleaned every month, is okay to have runoff from the big development of Haseko, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, city and county, yeah? All the guys whose mountain-side 'ōpala is going to come our side, and they're pushing Haseko to do it, so I called Haseko and asked them. They said they don't need to lower the berm to continue their development. It's everybody further inland need them to lower the berm. So I asked Chris Yuen what was his scientific fact, being the only person who voted 'no,' saying it was okay when the 10-year flood come in and run off for a few hours, it won't contaminate the ocean, it won't contaminate the reef, it wouldn't kill the limu, wouldn't hurt the fish. If that's the case, then why did the City and County of Honolulu, Honouliuli Treatment Plant, move their outlet pipe one mile out to sea? Because it was out there, exactly where he's talking about the runoff: 25, 30 feet, where they all claim they get toilet paper coming out of there. Toilet paper coming out of that pipe would be a miracle, but the city knew what they were doing to the inlet and the outlet of that area, where exactly where he's talking about that it was okay. But, again, we of 'Ewa Beach, because we no more the cane fields, we no more the runoffs, we get all the golf courses—try look at our golf courses, guys, if you guys ever been out to 'Ewa Beach. I'm glad the chair of Water and Land came out, he's seen: Every single golf course in our community get holes more deep than this capitol roof, and you know why? When they had gotten their permits from the city, city and county said, 'You guys gotta be able to make an area where you guys can catch in the hundred-year flood.' While moving forward with Chris Yuen six years ago, going forward, now the city and county is putting the pressure on Haseko to do it, and the community came against them. He was the only 'yes' vote to lower the berm.

"So, again, I asked him this question again, and I'm saying it again here: What was his scientific fact? He didn't have one. It was a personal analysis that he had on himself of being 14 years of experience. So I asked the candidate again, 'Reading your résumé, sir, reading your résumé, this is two different people,' because the Chris Yuen in the beginning that our previous senators talked about on the Big Island who came to talk to 15 people, that's not the guy. It's not. And I asked him that question, because I'm going to tell you right now, if that's the guy that his résumé, hundred percent, and all the people who voted for him before say the same thing to me.

"So it's not my imagination, it's not my short-term or narrow view because it's my community. I'm talking about other communities made decisions to make the count higher on

killing our native bats without even having—to this day, I asked how many male bats we have, how many female bats we have. To this day, nobody knows, but it's okay for so much to die a day. Let's change this around. Let's say this thing was killing cats, yeah? You know how much people love cats around here. Let's say it was allowed to kill 1,500 a day. Well, what happened at the Humane Society? They lynched that person, got rid of 'em! Because nobody knew she was killing cats. But that's what I'm saying. We pick and choose what we're going to sacrifice when it comes to land, water, and our natural resources, and I am here today not willing to make any more sacrifices. His accolades, all that he accomplished, I take nothing away from this gentleman, but going forward, we need something new, more creative—not saying that he's not smart; he's a smart man. But, like I said, when we had the first hearing with him and was questioned about the windmills, he said the people of Kahuku should be proud—he changed that later on, he apologized—because they should be proud because they're taking away the carbon footprint. Hmm. But I asked him again, what was the scientific fact, what was the study around human beings and windmills? I don't know if anybody in this body knows; he doesn't know, either. And you know why? Because there was never a study done because windmills were never supposed to be put in residential areas. They know that now, and the guys who doing now for do renewable energy, they all checking and taking a look on how we go about renewable energy in Hawai'i. It's already there; not all of them are working because, again, we have a blocker—that's Hawaiian Electric, stopping these things from going forward. But I don't know if any of you guys ever went out there, which I did, not only with the Land chair and Senator Riviere. I sat there, and I've seen huge bulldozers knocking down fruit trees and all kind of agricultural plants to build these windmills, so if we conserve to our 'āina and we want our 'āina to grow, ask the guys who are building them and ask the people who do windmills, what is it going to do to the earth? What's it going to do? Thirty years from now, when this thing comes down, you cannot plant nothing around it for years! That's the part I'm trying to say to him. This is not the guy that I read, hear about from all my different senators. He really did, at one time, don't get me wrong, love what he did, love volunteering, love the 'āina. But making decisions, saying that not everybody is going to agree with him and then he's got to make the hard decisions—hard decisions is not taking away agriculture, which everyone over here always talk about how much we need agriculture! Please, you guys, go down to Kahuku, talk to the people. Go over there, look at this ugly thing. Look at the ziplines they want to propose. There's a lot of stuff that is happening out there, taking away the very little land that they have for agriculture out there.

"So I'm just saying: I talked to him—I even tried talking to him on the side. The guy I read about, the guy here everyone talking about, that's the guy that everybody said six years ago: phenomenal! Phenomenal champion. But I think, you know, all the research I did and the families that I talked to about the environment—that's not the decision that we should going forward now. We need somebody who's, you know, really conservative and really thinking about how important the land and our ocean is because it's vital to us, guys.

"'Ewa Beach, we don't have limu like we used to. Uncle Henry tried, we tried at the neighborhood board, to make a no-pick zone. He died trying to revive something that was unrevivable because he had no support. You think DLNR would have been behind him 10,000 percent, not on the side of the developer trying to make more houses, more roads, and more runoff. I don't want no runoff in my community, and I'm fighting against that, and has nothing to do with him personally. I have nothing against the gentleman, but the decisions that he made for these communities is vital, is not reversible, it cannot! The water cap that we had broken over there out in Hau Bush,

it's not reparable. It's done! So when Uncle Henry them were trying to revive statewide, neighbor island-wide education about this, they had no support. So that's the reason why it's in litigation right now, and that's the reason why I was very saddened when I tried to talk to him about it, knowing that we're not going to have the compassion, the compassionate guy who came with the 15 guys out there, talking to people about the environment.

"So I just advise my colleagues to understand this is nothing personal. It's something that I observed in the short time I'm here and all the research that I did, that this is not the same guy who is on paper, the same guy in his résumé. So I ask my colleagues to join me in not advising Chris Yuen for the position. Thank you."

Senator Riviere rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"Before I begin my remarks, I should acknowledge that I have had interactions with the Board of Land and Natural Resources through my capacity with Keep the North Shore Country; we've been involved in some of these windmill and bat cases.

"My opposition to Mr. Yuen basically falls on his, shall I say, his notorious habit of disregarding staff submittals. In the case that I've been involved with, with Keep the North Shore Country and Na Pua Makani's wind farm, there was a contested case hearing that lasted over a year. Evidence was presented, debated, briefed; oral arguments were heard; and the hearing officer, a neutral party, recommended that the plan to protect the endangered 'ōpe'ape'a was inadequate, and she was a neutral party and she did her due diligence and made the recommendation. Mr. Yuen just outright discounted it; it didn't matter, the years' worth of research that she had pored through and presented. He just felt that it was more important to have the wind energy, and this is my observation of what he did. And I hear other stories, whether it's a staff submittal for an amount of water to be diverted out of east Maui, and in the meeting, he says, 'Well, it doesn't matter that the staff said "35 million gallons a day"; we're going to just up it to 45 million.'

"Other cases where we all remember a couple years ago, the fishermen for the longline boats who are stuck on the boats and they can't come onto the dock. Well, one of the unique aspects of that is that in order for them to sell the fish, all these fishermen who cannot come onto the dock have to have a local fisherman's license. So there was a hearing before the board, and Mr. Yuen aggressively challenged the people who were speaking against issuing these licenses for fishermen who cannot come into the state, and we know—we saw that in the news a few years ago, how tragic it is that they can't get off the boats. So we see again and again, time and again, that there's this pushback. There's Kahala Hilton, and they're using the beach, but they say, 'Oh, it's not a beach now; it's covered in grass.' No, but that is the beach that was covered with grass and now is being used for commercial, private use.

"The common thread in all of this is that in every case where push comes to shove versus when it's the community pushing back and saying, you know, we don't want this development or we don't want water flooding into 'Ewa Beach to destroy the limu or the community says we don't want these gigantic wind turbines towering over our schools and our houses with the shadow flicker and the noise and the vibrations, the people's concerns—I asked him this, during the hearings, and he just basically dodged every question I asked about how do you weigh the public sentiment and the host community. How do you care about this? And in every case, it's just he's the smartest guy or something, and he doesn't care what your other recommendations are. He's made up his mind; he's going to

push. And in every single time, it's for the developer, the builder, the whatever, and not for the community interest.

"And I'll finish with this: When I asked him what his message would be to the people of Kahuku after 200 people were arrested—and these people are beside themselves, believe me. I was involved; I was out there, seeing the deliveries and the pain and the grief and the agony that was those deliveries, and the people are still, to this day, suffering and dreading these monstrosities that are towering over their elementary school. I asked Mr. Yuen, 'What would you tell the people of Kahuku?' And he said, 'Well, I would hope they would find it in their heart to find a place of pride in these turbines.' So that's the disconnect that I want you guys to think of as you cast your vote today. Thank you for allowing me to voice my opposition. Aloha."

Senator Ihara rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, if this motion was to vote down the nominee, I would vote 'with reservations.' But we don't have reservations for 'no,' so I'm a clear 'no.' And I'm a clear 'no' because I can accept, as one of our 25 citizens in this chamber, I could be wrong. But I'm trusting my civic sensibilities and will make the best judgment I can.

"Like I said, I'm using my political tool, my vote, for a civic purpose. So what is the civic purpose? I am looking for land board members, just like Hawaiian Home Lands Commission members, that have legal fiduciary responsibilities. They are trustees, trustees for the state and to protect and steward our natural resources, the use of our state resources. In our state, public lands, beaches, water—they're public resources. These things are not owned.

"This nominee did start out as a steward. We've been in battles together, and he's been one of my heroes. There weren't many of them back when he was there, so he would stand out. But BLNR is not like a court where you try to be fair, where the judge has to be fair. The judge is a trustee for the state. It's not like there's something to balance.

"As a trustee and steward of resources, he started out that way. I believe in my judgment that is what I call 'power creep.' When you're in power for a while, you get used to it. You want to do good, so you be efficient, and you move fast as you can. You try to bring everyone along, but if you can't, you can't. I think we forget, especially like this empty chamber, that every time we make a decision, we need to look in people's eyes.

"I say the way we relate to the people is we kneel. Because we're the ones with power, and power is the one that's responsible for this space. We are responsible for the safe space and all its quality. After a while, and I'm talking about myself as well, intellectual humility kind of drains away a little bit, because of the job we have to do. We kind of forget that civic spaces are sacred spaces.

"We treat them as political spaces, because there are two things about political decisions. One is the political leader decides what's good; and then how we get there. So we have two powers that are self-justifying. I know it's hard. It's hard to move out of the family and personal values of reciprocity, and those reciprocities do not belong in civic space. We're not to favor others or demean others in the civic space. They're all equal. We need to treat it like that.

"We're noticing systemic racism. We're noticing that, and we need to notice, how we treat dissidents, how we treat people with different views. I've done it; I've inadvertently diminished them. I've actually thought that they were lesser than me. I mean, how dare I? I did, I have, and we all have. And this nominee is so well and good that he's effective, and he's not the

only one where utilitarian values sometimes trump human relationships.

"I do appreciate the nominee. Actually, all the nominees I spoke to; they were honest. I tell people that advocates lie, because advocates will purposely omit datapoints that will undercut their position. And sometimes they exaggerate some datapoints to advance their position untruthfully.

"I had a truthful conversation with the nominee, and I really do honor him for that, because he did that not knowing how I'd vote. That means a lot to me. It's just my one vote, so I don't know, like with the other nominee, I don't know what the majority will be.

"I know that all I can do is vote based on what I can do.

"To the credit of the nominee, I think the nominee and I are on the same page. I'll tell you a couple of things that we are on the same page. So, I could vote for him. But what's my civic purpose?

"I have found that on the land board minutes, the nominee and I had a disagreement, even the chair. I had to explain that once you're a movant, you step up and you make a motion. Until you step down, everything you say counts. You can make mistakes, but the vote sticks on what you say. He had said, to his credit, next time he'll sit down and say whatever gallage or whatever numbers that were incorrect. But it was said during the motion, as a movant! If he was on the floor debating and gave wrong information, that's okay because we're voting on the movant's motion, and as a movant, he misstated it. But that's what they voted on, and no minutes can correct what happened in the room.

"I'm a little bit forceful on this, not because they're bad people, but because I think they're well-meaning. I mean, I'm proud of them because the private marketplace is not open at DLNR. It used to be. I was involved in politics for 30-40 years, and DLNR land board leases, that's a marketplace. That's how you help. We in Hawai'i have got good people in government, but when you have to raise money for your campaign, you want to stay on the line. And you try to stay on the right side of it, but some people cross it; inadvertently, probably.

"There were times during the Bob Watada era when it was done purposely, when they thought they could get away with it. That's when I rolled out a 60-foot scroll of all of the millions of dollars of campaign funds that were blatantly given for quid pro quo purposes. Anyway, this doesn't happen anymore.

"So I think it's ironic that we have probably what I consider the cleanest, non-transactional executive branch we've had in a long time. It's ironic that we find what would be considered, maybe some people would call it corruption? I don't consider it political corruption. What it is, is political expediency. There's political goals, and what it is, is we have to, we're doing it, so the minutes, he did it the way he did it because that was the most efficient way to do it, but when you did it, he wasn't looking into people's eyes. It was, can I say it: something, a letter - 'you'? A 'blank-you' to them. He didn't mean it, but that's what happened. That's how people feel. The nominee is, I think, now open to hear people's truths. You hear a lot of times 'Oh, I don't want to hear it', or 'I'm sorry, I don't want to hear it.'

"But the second thing is on being a steward. I found the Kahala Hilton example, whether it's a violation and as well as the lease amounts. You know, how valuable is the use of public resources? And I think the default should be it's valuable! It's priceless! So we start with, we have value. Then we try to utilize it with the private sector, and that's good. But the default should be on our side, on the state's side, because we have a fiduciary responsibility.

"I'll close by saying that if the nominee is confirmed, which we'll see, I just don't know. I hope that whatever he's learned in this advise and consent process will be used. He did say, and I do want to note interestingly that I'm kind of lifting up the person I'm going to vote down on. But he did say in one of our conversations, actually in writing, if confirmed, 'I will always ask myself before I vote on anything: "what is the civic purpose?"'

"Thank you."

Senator Fevella rose to request a Roll Call vote, and the Chair so ordered.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 16; Ayes with Reservations (Kanuha, Keohokalole, Nishihara, Taniguchi). Noes, 9 (Chang, Fevella, Ihara, Kahele, Kim, Moriwaki, Rhoads, Riviere, Shimabukuro).

At this time, the Chair observed that it was an appropriate time to say, "Senator Misalucha, welcome to the Senate. We've not even gotten to the bills yet."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Fevella’s remarks read as follows:

“I was one of the eight Senators who co-sponsored this bill, proposed by the Senate Native Hawaiian Caucus. This bill places reasonable restrictions on the use of conservation district lands for waste or disposal facilities. The buffer zone of no less than one-half mile from residences, schools, and hospitals is critically necessary to protect the health and safety of the public.”

Senator Kahele rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Colleagues, Article XI, Section 9, of the Hawai‘i State Constitution is dedicated to the environmental rights of Hawai‘i’s people, and states, ‘Each person has the right to a clean and healthful environment, as defined by laws relating to environmental quality, including control of pollution and conservation, protection and enhancement of natural resources.’ The measure before this body today, Senate Bill 2386, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 2, would prohibit a waste or disposal facility in the conservation district as well as require a half-mile buffer zone for any future facility, and this is a bold step to advance environmental justice in Hawai‘i’s rural communities.

“But what is environmental justice? Environmental justice is a movement inspired by the 1960s civil rights movement, when communities across the continent, primarily made up of low-income, minority populations, began to fight the disproportionate placement of toxic land uses in their communities. One of the first communities to lead the effort was Warren County, North Carolina. In 1982, the State of North Carolina proposed to create a highly toxic polychlorinated biphenyl (otherwise known as PCB) landfill in the predominantly African American community of Warren County. The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) noted that PCBs have been demonstrated to cause a variety of adverse health effects. The community of Warren County fought the siting, with hundreds of people arrested during protests. The Warren County situation resulted in numerous studies showing that commercial hazardous waste landfills were predominantly placed in African American communities across the country.

“For far too long, the Wai‘anae Coast has carried the heavy burden of O‘ahu’s industrial energy, military ordnance, and municipal and construction landfill waste. For decades, this community has sounded the alarm as to the numerous and concerning health impacts that remain concentrated in the adjacent communities to these landfills. Moreover, there are numerous health vulnerabilities in these communities that warrant concern, including high comorbidity and respiratory diseases, including asthma. These baseline health insecurities are further exacerbated by the current COVID-19 crisis. The communities bearing the burden of the island’s waste are predominantly Native Hawaiian, and many of these families also struggle economically. This pattern of marginalizing indigenous, minority, low-income communities is a strong example of environmental racism, and it can no longer be ignored, and it can no longer go without redress. Every community in Hawai‘i has the right to a healthful, healthy environment, and no community should bear the disproportionate risks and consequences of environmental pollution. Toxic coal ash, asbestos, contaminated petroleum

soil, and thousands of tons of construction and demolition waste have no place within 750 feet of any Hawai'i residential neighborhood. The existing construction and demolition facility in Nānākuli will not be affected by this bill, and in fact has stated in its final EIS, dated January 2020, that it has seven to twelve years before reaching capacity. In the meanwhile, the City and County of Honolulu has the capacity and must develop a long-term plan for responsible waste management on the island of O'ahu.

"Further, if we are truly committed to island sustainability, we should encourage and prioritize projects that reuse materials to the maximum extent possible. This has the potential to increase the life of the existing C&D facility without having to expand the facility into pristine, untouched, undeveloped land or local communities. Today's architectural and building professionals have the talent and technology to do extraordinary work in the area of sustainability. By working together with the construction industry, the business community, and nonprofits, state and county governments are fully poised to support maximizing reduction, recycling, and reuse best practices with the goal of diverting as much C&D waste away from our landfills as an essential aspect of design and construction activity.

"Colleagues, we have been moving toward environmental justice in Hawai'i for decades. Those who came before us in 1974—the year I was born—passed the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act, otherwise known as HEPA, finding that the quality of humanity's environment is critical to humanity's well-being, that humanity's activities have broad and profound effects upon the interrelations of all components of the environment. This remains just as true today as it was 46 years ago, and we are well past due to better realize this vision. In Hawai'i, our state motto is Ua mau ke ea o ka 'āina i ka pono, which means, 'The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.' Let us never forget, it is our kuleana to conserve and protect our limited islands' natural resources and that we have an affirmative duty to promote a healthy and sustainable Hawai'i for everyone, regardless of race, ancestry, or socioeconomic class. Mahalo, Mr. President."

At this time, Senator Thielen rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"So, my fellow senators—it's going to be the last time I can say this in a regular session. I wasn't going to stand up and say anything, but I know how much you all **love** when I get up to talk, and I didn't want to deny you that privilege. But I know I'm the final thing standing in between you and lunch, so I will try to keep this short.

"I just wanted to say a thank you, and I want to begin with the Senate staff, the SMA, Sergeant-at-Arms, LRB, Communications office, and, most of all, the Senate Clerk's office. I want to thank all of you for the tremendous work that you do day in and day out. You are such a professional and committed staff, and it's been a real pleasure to serve with all of you. I have relied so much on your assistance and your help, and you've just been phenomenal. I've never had a better staff in any office that I've worked in, and you're wonderful, and the Senate is very, very lucky to have you, so thank you all.

"I also want to thank the staff in my office. I've been really fortunate over the years to have a number of wonderful young people that we've brought in as interns, session staff, and it's been a real treat to work with them and to help share with them the great training that's available here, and help them get used to the legislative process and to understand it so that they're not scared of it and that they will participate in it as they get older and as adults. But most deeply of all, I want to thank Jennifer Barra of my staff. She has been just instrumental; she's been with me for the last seven of the eight years that I served here and is just phenomenal and has done just a wonderful job at everything, and it's just been a real joy to watch her grow in her ability and in managing the other staff and in helping them. My time here would not have been the same without her.

"And then I want to thank you, my fellow senators. I think it's safe to say that we've had a tempestuous relationship, in

part because I ran for office because I was really angry at this body about some of the legislation that it passed, and I entered into this body more as an advocate than as a senator. I took a little bit of umbrage at the senator from Mō'ili'ili, his comments about advocates earlier—I don't think that that's actually accurate. I think there's a lot of great things about advocacy. But I came from a family with three brothers, I'm Irish, a strong feminist who grew up in the '70s, so I tend to be a little bit scrappy, and I know that it's been a rocky road a lot of times in working with many of you, and I want to thank you for your patience. I've always been a little bit of a square peg in a round hole here, and that's one of the reasons why I decided to leave; I want to go back out to do some other work. I don't know what that is going to be yet, but hopefully I'll be able to work with you again in the future in another capacity.

"But I did want you to know that, even while we tend to have disagreements, I spend a lot of time talking to other people outside this body so that they understand the value of the Legislature, because I understand it a lot better now that I've been here for eight years. A lot of times, people will come in and they'll talk about, you know, 'It's so political! The decision's so political!' And they're using it as a dirty word, but this branch is intended to be a check and balance. It was created because the founders of the country were worried that the executive would evolve into a king, and they didn't want a king making decisions, and so they came up with the idea of the representative democracy, where you would have bodies that were elected representatives geographically distributed around the community, and they would have to make decisions based upon a majority. And so the ideal is that check and balance on the executive is going to be bringing in wider opinions from across the state, from closer to the people, and it's going to have a requirement that there be a majority, that the majority of the people would be supportive of it. And I think it's important that when folks come on in here and complain about 'political,' is that in the ideal world, that's **exactly** what we're supposed to be. That's exactly the function of the legislative branch, and I appreciate all that I've learned from you folks going through this past eight years about that.

"I guess me being me, though, and always being a little bit scrappy, I can't walk away without just saying one other thing. Which is, we all know we don't live in an ideal world, and one of the senators earlier talked about this thing called the 'power creep.' We're in the middle of an epic time across our nation and our state, and I think, over the next two years, it's going to be really difficult and it's going to be important that this body remembers the importance of the legislative branch in the ideal term. A lot of times what we end up deciding here requires self-enforcement, and that means that we have to take the time to be empathetic with people. We have to take the time to listen to the complaints and, even when we don't agree with them. And if we decide to do something different, to take the time to explain why. We can't convince everybody. But right now in our country, the distrust of government is so phenomenally high that it's important for us to be able to get through this pandemic and this economic crisis is to help bring back that trust in government. That's going to mean that what you do (because I won't be here with you next year or beyond), that you take the time to make sure that you can help bring back that trust. And I was really heartened, Senate President, by the comments that there is a commitment in the Senate to try and open up testimony and participation through remote access next year because I think, as an island state, that's especially important. It's difficult even for people in my district or the farther reaches of O'ahu to get here sometimes, but for the neighbor island folks, it's well-nigh impossible. I think that openness and transparency, while sometimes it may make the immediate decision more difficult, is just so important to gaining that increased trust in government.

"So I will continue to try to help educate folks on the outside about the importance of the political branch of government, and thank you again for your time and your patience. It's been a pleasure."

The Chair then remarked:

"Before asking if there are other announcements, the Speaker and I, the majority leaders, and our heads of the Communication office have been in discussion this week to make sure that we adjourn in an appropriate fashion. Whoever finished first was going to come over in a small group to extend their best to the other chamber. We looked at people in the gallery and of course with the tradition of singing 'Hawai'i Aloha,' but as we read how community spread has occurred with larger groups and some of the singing and everything else, we couldn't find a way to get everybody in. I, unfortunately, was confident that the Senate would be hosting the House because they would be adjourning before this passionate body would have concluded our business, so I'd like to invite the Speaker, Majority Leader, I see the Vice Speaker, and I would like to yield the rostrum to either the Speaker or the Majority Leader, who wanted to extend their best wishes. As they walk up, I can only tell you, during these extraordinary times, the Speaker and I have been involved in numerous meetings, and we still want to assure the people of Hawai'i that we continue to work together, and our ability to work together to get through COVID-19 and all of its terrible effects it's been having on our community, our nation, and our world, that we are together."

The Chair then invited the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, to address the members of the Senate from the rostrum.

Speaker Saiki remarked:

"On behalf of the House, I want to just thank the Senate for all of your work this year. I think that we did a lot, and it was a very challenging time for all of us, but I think it's made us all stronger. It's made the Legislature stronger and, as I informed the House today in closing remarks that, if we put our minds to it, we can do anything. So we look forward to working with you; I'm sure after sine die we'll be around for the next few months, and also looking forward to working with you next year. Thank you."

The President then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"A year ago, at sine die, I stood before you and said that it was the most difficult session I had ever confronted, and the challenges were incredible, and I'm not going to jinx next year by saying **this** was the most difficult and have them prove me wrong again. But what is incredibly important to me, and certainly what was hurtful, is the accusation that some of our actions, especially in the area of advise and consent, were politically motivated. It is no great secret that the Senate is comprised of varying blocs of votes that come together to try to work to govern. But when I stand up here in front of you and count the votes and look for the ayes and the noes, the reservations, there is no semblance of sense relative to the blocs of votes in the Senate as to how you cast your votes on advise and consent. But you each bring your individual passion to the task; you take advise and consent incredibly seriously, and understand that once we give that final approval that they will be entrusted with an incredible responsibility, and so I thought last year's was tough. This year's was as tough.

"I like Laura's thing about, you know, 'I'm sure you all were anxious to hear me speak,' but I try hard as the president to have a relationship with every one of the members so that I can understand what's important to you, where you come from, what you're trying to do. And last year at the end of session, I found that, not a relationship, but a friendship that I have with

Senator Nishihara was incredibly strained, and it was incredibly painful to be in that place because of advise and consent. But because we all so strongly believe in trying to do the best job we can, that is where all of that comes from, and, luckily, it is a strong friendship that has been healed and restored, and I am so grateful to have that back. But I'm grateful that each one of you brings your passion onto this floor, votes your conscience, and then walks out of the chamber to see where we can agree and collaborate to continue to move Hawai'i forward, because that's why we're all here. And it is tough to say no to some of the nominees because each nominee has taken a great risk by putting their name forward, putting their name in the public domain, and all with the intention of serving and doing what is best for Hawai'i, its people, and its land.

“With COVID-19, we've faced challenges that we've never faced before. I followed more members on social media, especially when I was in the 14-day quarantine, than I ever had before. I even started watching Facebook Live programs done by our members. Senator Keohokalole, one of my favorites—I even got invited to be on his show one night. And so it is hurtful when I read in social media that we're in recess, so why are you even getting paid, and these people are doing nothing. I saw nothing but incredible work that each and every one of you were doing in your communities: group Zoom meetings to be in touch with your constituents, food drives, assisting constituents with the backlog at the unemployment insurance, and then when we bring the gavel down today, that doesn't mean that our work is finished. Each and every one of you are going to go back into those communities and continue to do the work that you have been doing. Unfortunately, each and every one of us are going to continue to help our constituents to get through the unemployment insurance process because we still have too many of our constituents who have not gotten paid, food drives, and I am incredibly worried about what is going to happen after July 31st, when the \$600 a week unemployment insurance plus-up goes away. Now, Chair Dela Cruz and Chair Luke put together a great package. We were able to commit a hundred dollars a week until December 30th, \$500 a month or half of your rent, whatever is less, to assist those who are going to be challenged in paying those rents, helping retraining for unemployment. It has been incredible, hard work, and I have already seen the agenda posted for the COVID-19 committee, who intends to get back to work immediately next week, continuing to do the work, so I just want to let you know how much I admire the dedication and commitment from each member of this Senate.

“I want to really thank our staff. We have had several positive tests here, but through good practices and making sure that we did have the face masks, that we were washing hands, that we were practicing social distance, none of them led to spread beyond the one individual, but our employees continue to come to work to perform the essential services that are so important for us to get our job done so that we can serve the people of Hawai'i. I'd like to thank the National Guard, who has assisted us and worked with our Sergeant-at-Arms staff here and the House Sergeant-at-Arms to continue to try to make the capitol a safe place for essential workers to report to and do their work and get the job done.

“To both Senators Thielen and Ruderman: You have made the job incredibly interesting. You are the definition of what 'challenging environment at the workplace' is, where no statement goes unchecked, but it makes each and every one of us better because you know you cannot perform at anything less than your best because everybody else comes here with their best efforts, and so I look forward to seeing all of you. We will be back, we project, in September to confirm judges, so while this is our last regular session, we will have another opportunity or two to be back together, so stay safe, take care of yourselves, all of my best to you and your families. And certainly to the late

Senator Harimoto and his family, our thoughts are still with you, but as in birth and new life, we welcome Senator Misalucha to our chambers to continue to do the work of the late Senator Harimoto's district.”

Senator Kahele moved that the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2020, adjourn Sine Die, seconded by Senator Fevella and carried.

Re: SB75 SD2 HD1

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution, SB75 SD2 HD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS." became law as ACT 008 (20), Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, on July 7, 2020.

The purposes of this bill are to:

1. Appropriate federal funds designated for the State of Hawaii from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and

Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"), Public Law 116-136, to:

- a. The Department of Defense;
 - b. The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations;
 - c. The Department of Human Services; and
 - d. The Counties of Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai.
2. Authorizes the issuance of instruments of indebtedness in the sum of \$2,100,000,000 for the purpose of the Municipal Liquidity Facility under section 13 (3) of the Federal Reserve Act, 12 U.S.C. § 43(3), for fiscal year 2020-2021.
 3. Deposits the remaining federal funds designated for the State of Hawaii by the CARES Act to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund.

Section 11 of this bill authorizes the issuance of instruments of indebtedness in the sum of \$2,100,000,000 under the federal Municipal Liquidity Facility for fiscal year 2020-2021. Such instruments of indebtedness are bonds that require legislative authorization pursuant to article VII, section 13 of the Hawaii State Constitution. However, as passed this bill did not meet the bond declaration requirements because the constitutional requirements that allow for exceeding the debt limit if an emergency condition exists had not yet been fulfilled. Consequently, section 11 of this bill violates article VII, section 13 of the Hawaii State Constitution.

Furthermore, various other allocations could not be encumbered and/or expended before June 30, 2020.

We are relying on additional legislation that will resolve the constitutionality issue and ensure that we can continue to move forward in our economic recovery.

For the foregoing reasons, I allowed SB75 SD2 HD1 to become law without my signature.

1. Replace, where eligible, general fund appropriations with general obligation bond funds;
2. Deposit, or authorize the transfer of, those general funds into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund;

3. Authorize the transfer of excess moneys from other sources into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund; and

4. Transfer savings from the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2020 and the Judiciary Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2020 due to reduced expenditures in fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 from the general fund for deposit into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund.

This bill is objectionable because the \$432,000,605 appropriated out of the general fund for deposit into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund represents fiscal biennium 2019-2021 general fund appropriation reductions to the Executive and Judiciary budgets. A general fund appropriation reduction does not represent cash; it represents reduced spending authority. Consequently, the transfer from the general fund for deposit into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund of \$432,000,605 is overstated by \$432,000,605.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objection, pursuant to my line item veto authority, I have stricken out the appropriation out of the general fund of \$432,000,605 for fiscal year 2019-2020 for deposit into the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund in section 10 (on page 5, line 6) and changed it to \$0.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 3139 with the general fund appropriation of \$432,000,605 for fiscal year 2019-2020, described above, stricken from the bill and changed it to \$0.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 126, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purposes of this bill are to:

1. Provide adjustments to the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2020, the Judiciary Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2020, and the Supplemental Improvements Act of 2020;

2. Make changes to Senate Bill No. 75, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, and Senate Bill No. 3139, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, passed by the Legislature on May 21, 2020;

3. Deploy the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) Public Law 116-136, funds received by the State and transferred to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund;

4. Appropriate balances in the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to support critical needs and services during the coronavirus disease 2019, or COVID-19, pandemic; and

5. Provide the Governor with access to amounts in the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund to support critical needs and services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

While the bill as a whole has merit, and I appreciate the Legislature's efforts to respond to the community's needs, the following appropriations must be modified for the reasons indicated. As a general matter, we are determined to fully utilize every federal dollar available under the CARES Act. However, the current uncertainty over what, if anything, the U.S. Congress will pass requires us to preserve our options to make the most efficient use of the funds, while awaiting the outcome of the debate in Congress. The line item vetoes outlined below will enable us to fulfill the objectives of the Legislature, while maintaining flexibility to meet any new programs and guidelines the Congress may hand down.

1. The \$90,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for airport screening and health assurance security initiatives, designated in section 31, page 106, line 20, of the bill. According to the Department of Transportation, it believes, and I concur, that \$70,000,000 will be sufficient for equipment

and services to test, verify, and monitor travelers and for other health assurance security initiatives as needed.

2. The \$230,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used between August 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020, to provide an additional weekly unemployment benefit of \$100 per week to State eligible recipients provided that no additional \$100 weekly unemployment benefit shall be issued if there exists an additional federal unemployment benefit of more than \$300 per week, designated in section 38, page 115, line 13, of the bill. I understand that the U.S. Congress is negotiating another economic stimulus package. At this time, it is not known when and in what form such an economic stimulus package, if any, will take. Because the implementation of such a package by the U.S. Congress is not clear and may exceed \$300 per week, and because I must act now, I will line item veto this appropriation. The most effective use of these funds to support the needs of the community will then be determined once the U.S. Congress has taken action or recessed without taking action.

3. The \$100,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for housing and rental assistance and the administrative costs related to the housing relief and resiliency program, designated in section 25, page 98, line 8, of the bill. According to the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation, it believes, and I concur, that an initial working capital of \$50,000,000 is sufficient to commence a program to help renters and homeowners who have experienced a reduction in income because of unemployment or reduction in work hours due to COVID-19. If additional funding can be utilized beyond the initial working capital amount, it will be provided at a later date.

4. The \$100,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for the purchase and distribution of personal protective equipment (PPE) to hospitals, childcare facilities, elderly care facilities, business, non-profits, and schools, designated in section 30, page 105, line 14, of the bill. This appropriation does not include the purchase and distribution of sanitation or disinfectant supplies. According to the Department of Defense, it believes, and I concur, that \$61,000,000 is sufficient for the purchase and distribution of PPE to eligible organizations. The remaining funds will be used to purchase and distribute sanitation or disinfectant supplies for eligible organizations and state agencies.

5. The \$36,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for retraining and workforce development programs, designated in section 32, page 108, line 1, of the bill. In reference to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism's business plan, \$10,000,000 is sufficient to launch workforce retraining programs for individuals impacted by COVID-19. Additional funding will be provided as needed.

6. The \$15,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used to support emerging industries to create a supply chain for cleaning supplies and PPE, designated in section 33, page 109, line 6, of the bill. According to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, it believes, and I concur, that \$10,000,000 is sufficient to provide start-up funding to businesses in this emerging industry. An additional \$5,000,000 may be available after the first tranche is released.

7. The \$2,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for a public-private partnership (PPP) to provide support to

public high school seniors who were adversely affected by school closures in their final semester of school, designated in section 36, page 113, line 6, of the bill. An initial working capital of \$1,000,000 is adequate to begin establishing these programs. As they become successful, additional funds may be provided.

8. The \$1,080,000,605 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2019-2020 for deposit into the general fund, designated in section 39, page 116, line 15, of the bill. I understand that, of the \$1,080,000,605 appropriated out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for deposit into the general fund, \$432,000,605 of that amount represents fiscal biennium 2019-2021 general fund appropriation reductions. A general fund appropriation reduction does not represent cash; it just represents reduced spending authority. Consequently, the appropriation from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to the general fund of \$1,080,000,605 is overstated by \$432,000,605.

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, the following actions were taken pursuant to my line item veto authority:

1. Stricken out the \$90,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 for airport screening and health assurance security initiatives (on page 106, line 20) and changed it to \$70,000,000.

2. Stricken out the \$230,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for additional weekly unemployment benefits subject to federal legislation, if any, (on page 115, line 13) and changed it to \$0.

3. Stricken out the \$100,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for housing relief (on page 98, line 8) and changed it to \$50,000,000.

4. Stricken out the \$100,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for the purchase and distribution of personal protective equipment (PPE) to hospitals, childcare facilities, elderly care facilities, business, non-profits, and schools (on page 105, line 14) and changed it to \$61,000,000.

5. Stricken out the \$36,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for retraining and workforce development programs (on page 108, line 1) and changed it to \$10,000,000.

6. Stricken out the \$15,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used to support emerging industries to create a supply chain for cleaning supplies and PPE (on page 109, line 6) and changed it to \$10,000,000.

7. Stricken out the \$2,000,000 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2020-2021 to be used for a public-private partnership (PPP) to provide support to public high school seniors who were adversely affected by school closures in their final semester of school (on page 113, line 6) and changed it to \$1,000,000.

3. Stricken out the \$1,080,000,605 appropriation out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal year 2019-2020 for deposit into the general fund (on page 116, line 15) and changed it to \$648,000,000.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 126 with the appropriations out of the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 totaling \$803,000,605, stricken from the bill.

The purpose of this bill is to mandate that all State facilities (other than Aloha Stadium) having an area of ten thousand square feet or more must implement all cost-effective energy efficiency measures, whether directly or through performance contracts, by January 1, 2024 (or by January 1, 2022, if the facility in question has not implemented any energy retrofit and performance contracts since 2010). Further, the State Energy Office is tasked with collecting all utility bill and energy usage data for State-owned facilities monthly and making such information available in a publicly accessible format. Finally, the bill requires that beginning July 1, 2020, if feasible and cost-effective, designs for all new state building construction must maximize energy and water efficiency, energy generation potential, and use of building materials that reduce the project's carbon footprint.

This bill is objectionable because it creates an unnecessary risk of litigation. Reasonable people could disagree on whether a given energy efficiency measure is cost-effective or not. Using the term "all cost-effective energy efficiency measures" would mean that, if the agency failed to implement even one such measure, it could be in violation of the law. Unfortunately, when reasonable people disagree on language such as this, if often means it is resolved in court, costing the state further time and money and taking away from achieving these clean energy goals. Vetoing this bill does not preclude the State from leading by example or saving tax-payer dollars. The State has the ability under current law to implement the energy efficiency measures and savings that the bill calls for without the added risk of litigation.

During this pandemic, we need to look at every opportunity to save the state money without upfront costs and we will continue to do so. I believe energy efficiency measures are a way to achieve that. To date, the Department of Public Safety, Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, Department of Transportation, and numerous other state-owned facilities have undergone and are currently under terms for energy savings performance contracting. Anticipated in 2021, are twenty-three projects valued at \$39 million addressing energy efficiency and other sustainability improvements. Working through multi-agency efforts, the State of Hawai'i is working towards acquisition of a more energy efficient vehicle fleet. Furthermore, public works projects continue to incorporate Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design building elements in new and renovated public facilities and energy savings. Performance contracts are being implemented at state facilities when feasible. Clearly, the state is already implementing the measures that this bill addresses.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1846 without my approval.

The purpose of House Bill No. 2124 is to amend the State Ethics Code to prohibit the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, and other high-level government officials, including the members of certain boards and commissions, from representing any person or business for a fee or other consideration regarding any legislative or administrative action for twelve months after termination from their respective positions.

The current post-employment law, section 84-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, prohibits former high-level government officials from representing others for pay before (1) their own agencies or (2) other agencies on the same matters on which they worked prior to terminating their employment. This bill expands the prohibition to apply to not only the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, and other former government officials, but also to the members of certain boards and commissions, and prohibits them from representing any person or business regarding any legislative or administrative action before other state agencies for twelve months after termination from their respective positions.

This bill is objectionable because most of the boards and commissions listed in this bill have members who serve voluntarily without compensation. The additional restrictions imposed on volunteer board and commission members who fulfill an important role in protecting our community through their service without compensation will make it significantly more challenging to attract and recruit the most qualified individuals for service on boards and commissions.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 2124 without my approval.

RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

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PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAI'I**

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**Rule 1 Organization.**

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members- elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

(1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.

(2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

(3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.

(4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.

(5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.

(6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.

(7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.

(8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.

(9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.

(10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.

(11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

(12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.

(13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.

(14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

(17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.

(18) To disperse information to all members relating to the President's nominations and appointments to boards and commissions on a monthly basis.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

(1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.

(3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

- (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture and Environment (AEN). The purview of this committee includes agriculture and aquaculture, including mariculture; and population, environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species and hazardous waste.

(2) Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health (CPH). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulation, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds; and general health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, developmental disabilities, and hospitals.

(3) Committee on Education (EDU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early childhood learning, early education, including the Hawai'i P-20 Initiative, public schools, continuing education, and the public libraries.

(4) Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism (EET). The purview of this committee includes programs relating to energy, energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources, and to programs related to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism unless the authority or corporation is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule, other emerging industries development, financial and technical assistance to business, film and digital media production, astronomy, space exploration and aerospace development, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, other scientific research and development activities, recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawai'i Convention Center, Hawai'i Visitors and Convention Bureau, and the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.

(5) Committee on Government Operations (GVO). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state government operations policy, including government efficiency, The Procurement Code, and state facilities unless the state government operations policy, including government efficiency, departmental procurement, and state facilities is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Higher Education (HRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawai'i, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but excluding the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(8) Committee on Housing (HOU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to affordable and public housing, urban renewal, community development, housing development, and the housing of, or sheltering of, the homeless.

(9) Committee on Human Services (HMS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public assistance, Medquest, youth services, day care programs under the Department of Human Services, vocational rehabilitation, long term care, promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth, families, elderly population, and services relating to homelessness.

(10) Committee on Judiciary (JDC). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts, crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters, criminal code revision, statutory revision, campaign spending and elections, ethics, constitutional matters, the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary, and individual rights and civil liberties.

(11) Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts (LCA). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities and training, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, the Employees' Retirement System, and the Hawai'i Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund; and programs relating to international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations; and culture and the arts in the State, including but not limited to programs relating to historic preservation.

(12) Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs (PSM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public safety, corrections, the narcotics division, the sheriff's division, civil defense, disaster readiness, state building code; and county and federal relations, and matters of concern to the counties; and military and veterans' affairs.

(13) Committee on Technology (TEC). The purview of this committee includes development, implementation, and innovation of technology, including but not limited to information storage, transmission, processing, and telecommunications, and programs and issues addressed by the State's Chief Information Officer and the Office of Enterprise Technology Services, including any boards, commissions, committees and councils addressing technology issues.

(14) Committee on Transportation (TRS). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation, and transit-oriented development as it relates to transportation projects.

(15) Committee on Water and Land (WTL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning, sustainability, land and water management, forest management and reserve, coastal zone management, land reclamation, naturally occurring fisheries, ocean resources, state parks and beaches, management areas, including ocean recreation management areas and small boat harbors, and transit-oriented development as it relates to land use.

(16) Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management, statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation, and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

(A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;

(B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and

(C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____.”

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

“To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

- (1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.
- (2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

- (1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.
- (2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.
- (3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

- (1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.
- (2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.
- (3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"
- (4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"
- (5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"
- (6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- (7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.
- (8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

Rule 38.5 Virtual Attendance During Catastrophic Disasters.

- (1) During a period of catastrophic disaster, the President may authorize, for good cause, any meeting of members of the Senate to be conducted at which one or more members participate through virtual attendance.
- (2) A member participating through virtual attendance shall be considered present and in attendance as if the member were physically present, including but not limited to, for determining a quorum pursuant to Senate Rule 22 and Senate Rule 34.
- (3) In ascertaining whether a quorum is present, the presiding officer or chair shall count the number of members in physical attendance and those members, including the presiding officer or chair, participating by means of virtual attendance.
- (4) "Catastrophic disaster" means a severe or prolonged natural or human caused occurrence including, but not limited to, world conflicts, terrorist threat, national or global economic crisis, natural disaster, outbreak of disease, or any other event or occurrence that severely threatens or negatively impacts life, health, welfare, property, infrastructure, the environment, and financial security of the State.
- (5) "Virtual attendance" means participation in a meeting of members of the Senate using telecommunications technology, video-conferencing technology, or other electronic or digital means of communication that allows any member who is authorized or required to be at the meeting to:

- (A) Authenticate and verify each participating member and the vote made by each member;
- (B) Simultaneously hear or read the comments of every member who is duly recognized by the presiding officer or chair;
- (C) Vigorously participate in debate with other members as if they were physically present; and
- (D) Send and receive documents and other material that are used or referred to in the meeting;

provided that if equal access of a member via virtual attendance is interrupted, the meeting shall be recessed until such time as equal access by all members is restored.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 39 Order of Business: General.

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS

Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

(1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS**Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS**Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.**

- (1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.
- (2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.
- (3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.
- (4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.
- (5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING**Rule 68 Questions of Order.**

- (1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.
- (2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

- (1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.
- (2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.
- (3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.
- (4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.
- (5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

- (1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."
- (2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.
- (3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.
- (4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT**Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.**

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES**Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER**Rule 89 Legal Action.**

Except in legal proceedings where the Senate of the State of Hawaii is named as a defendant, the President shall obtain written consent of a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled prior to undertaking any affirmative legal action taken on behalf of the Senate, such as the filing of a lawsuit or amicus curiae brief or intervening as a party to a lawsuit.

Rule 90 Administrative and Financial Manuals.

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

Rule 91 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2012, shall govern.

Rule 92 Issuance of the Senate Pin.

- (1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.
- (2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.
- (3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.
- (4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.

(5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

**30th LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF
2020 JOINT HOUSE and SENATE
COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

Due to extraordinary circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2020 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures are not meant to establish any precedent and shall only be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, June 22, 2020, until 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 2, 2020.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

“Chairs” refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

“Conference Committee” refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

“Lead chair” refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

“Lead committee staff” refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

“Managers” refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House on a measure.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature’s website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before 6:00 pm on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

6. Attendance at Meetings

a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.

- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee prior to the decision-making on the measure.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

11. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

12. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
