FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 19, 2022

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, was called to order at 10:05 a.m., by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

Ms. Tamlyn Kurata, from the Office of Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi, offered a moment of contemplation, after which the members of the Senate rose for the singing of the National Anthem and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by Ms. Malia Kaai-Barrett.

The Chair stated:

"Before we proceed further, I would like to note for the record that the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic qualifies as a 'catastrophic disaster' as defined in Senate Rule 38.5 and there is 'good cause' for authorizing Senate members to continue participating in any meeting of members via virtual attendance as set forth in Senate Rule 38.5 until further notice."

The Roll was then called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Dela Cruz, Ihara, Keith-Agaran, Keohokalole, Rhoads, and Shimabukuro present and participating via videoconference.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"I was disappointed that we were unable to have the gallery full this morning and have friends and family on the floor. I was looking forward to drawing the energy from those in attendance to help inspire the remarks I'm offering today, but I am pleased to report to each and every one of you, the energy that you brought to the floor today was invigorating. I am amazed at how ready you are to do the work that is before us and that you have found the way to seek what are our opportunities and not be stymied by the disaster that has befallen us for the last two years. I am so optimistic about what we are going to achieve together by just seeing how you carried yourself here on the floor before we even started. Now, in the Senate, I view my job as your president to help you achieve your goals, so I'm going to give a few brief remarks at the 30,000-foot level because I don't want to take away from any committee chair going into the details of the hard work that you have been putting in during the interim in preparation for this session, and I look forward in working with you as we continue to share with our state the specificity of your goals, the programs that you've been working on, and how they're going to benefit the lives of the people of Hawai'i.

"The one thing that we all know is true: with all of the problems that we were trying to tackle pre-COVID, COVID has only made them worse. We were trying to deal with mental health issues, and in my district on Kaua'i, we had high per-capita suicide rates. But, in the pandemic, being cooped up, being locked down, not having social interaction and contact, stress of the inability to pay bills and support our families has

only added more stress, and we need to support mental health services, and I know Chair San Buenaventura is working diligently in that area. Senator Baker, over the years, has been a champion in that area. So I look forward in working with you as we continue to address the mental health issue.

"Homelessness, which was a highlighted problem, has only gotten worse and, again, with Senators San Buenaventura and Chang, we'll continue to work in this area. And I'm not going to get into the specifics of going forward, but I do want to say Ohana Zones work. We wound up giving latitude to partner with counties and other private organizations because the homeless situation on each island and each different region called for different solutions, and we did not have a one-fits-all, and so I look forward for us committing resources and funds to continue to address the issue.

"Affordable housing: so many people now want to come to Hawai'i and work remotely. The average cost of a home is a million dollars now, and we need to make sure that our residents have homes that they can afford. We're incredibly concerned, as I talked with Senator Kidani, in retaining teachers; the cost of a home has been one of the major impediments to that retention. Firefighters, police officers: they're making almost \$70,000 a year, and so we need to look at housing in the 100 to 120 percent or 140 of median just to retain our first responders, nurses, and teachers because if they can't buy homes, then they need to compete for million-dollar houses, which are out of their reach, and I look forward to working with Senator Chang in this area.

"When I look straight ahead, a recent birthday boy, Mike Gabbard—you know, there's been many articles; we need to continue to work on the farm-to-school, farm with the hospitals, and farm-to-prisons to support our agricultural industry and have better choices, healthier options on the plates of our students and for those in our hospitals while supporting our agricultural industry.

"Senator Dela Cruz has tremendous ideas about how we're going to work for diversifying our economy. With the broadband money from the federal government, it will create opportunities, and we cannot squander this once-in-a-lifetime chance to improve the connectivity for everybody in the State of Hawai'i, to give equal educational chances for every child here. With Senator Kidani, I'm so confident that we've got a great Education chair, with Senator Kim, the Higher Ed chair.

"While all of those problems are important, while the Senate is concerned in raising the minimum wage, the thing that keeps me up at night is the educational or learning loss that will have a generational impact, potentially, on these young people who will not be able to achieve the goals that they dreamed about because their educational opportunity did not allow them to succeed, and they will see a lost income over their whole working career. And so we need to make sure that we can deliver that education and have college and community college and vocational avenues available for these young people to succeed.

“So, those are the 30,000-foot issues. Those are some of the problems that we’re going to be dealing with. I look forward to working with you to get there. But I also want to be sure that we’re not missing some of what may seem like a small issue but are critically important. I read the article in *Civil Beat*, and they quoted Senator Acasio on the Ma’i Movement and a bill that the Women’s Caucus—or legislation (there’s more than one bill)—in trying to get feminine hygiene products in all of our schools. Since the article appeared yesterday, I’ve received several emails, and some of them have shown me the studies where, of the people surveyed, half of the respondents have missed class because they would not go to school because they did not have the proper feminine hygiene products. And it breaks my heart to read that they’re using leaves, newspaper, and other materials. And if we work so hard to get the devices, and we work so hard to get the connectivity, and we work so hard to train and compensate the teachers fairly, it’s all lost if they’re not going to school. And so this is something that I’m going to work with the Women’s Caucus on; this is something that is important to me. And there was a seventh-grade teacher quoted in the article. She’s a teacher at Chiefess Kamakāhelei Middle School, which is less than 10 minutes from my house, and what struck me is the quote, ‘If we have to make a decision between buying food for the family or getting the right products for the teenager, then the food will win.’ And that should not be a choice that our people have to make. We need to ensure that we’re giving them every tool to allow them to succeed.

“So, I look forward, as we begin Day 1 of 60, to work with each and every one of you for the betterment of the people of the State of Hawai‘i. Thank you.”

At this time, the President called on Senate Minority Leader Kurt Fevella.

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

“Thank you, Senate President. I’ll just start off: Governor Ige, Lieutenant Governor Green, Senate President Kouchi, Vice President Kidani, distinguished guests, family and friends, members of the viewing public, on behalf of the entire Senate Minority Caucus, I say a warm aloha and good morning to all of you. I want to thank my Heavenly Father for the many blessings that he has bestowed upon me and my family. I come from the community of ‘Ewa Beach, where I love to surf and I have the great opportunity of being here. I want to say a big mahalo to my constituents of Senate District 19 for giving me the opportunity to serve them. Mahalo for voting for me, representing our awesome community of ‘Ewa Beach.

“I was blessed to be raised in a loving, supportive family thanks to my parents. They worked very hard to provide for me and my family. They instilled the values and principles that I carry with me today. My father, who is still with us, along with my wife, Donnalee, and my daughter, Abigail, constantly remind me to never forget the working-class families like us. Many of these families live paycheck to paycheck and face ongoing battles to make ends meet. It hurts me to see many families struggling—financially, mentally, psychologically, and emotionally. I can very much relate to their pain, because I see that the pandemic is not one of the biggest challenges that we face this legislative session. As the Senate Minority Leader, my passion is to help advance economy equality for our struggling families.

“I stand ready, as I always have, to reach across the aisle to work with my colleagues to support reasonable living wages, to boost the economy on our hard-working families. The last time we raised the minimum wage was in 2018, which is now \$10.10 per hour. The time has come for change.

“In order to support an increase in the minimum wage, we have to make sure that our hospitality industry is on a good path

to recovery so that we can be strong in our economy. Thanks to my mom, who’s no longer with us, I learned that she valued of her work in the hospitality industry. Going forward. I will continue to be a strong advocate for our number one industry. A lot of people are saying that that’s not our number one industry. Right now, it’s reversed. Agriculture was our number one industry back in the day, and now hospitality is here. If we do not make the industry strong, then it’s hard to get our economy moving forward and try to get our farms and our agriculture up to par.

“As a product of our public school system, and as a parent of a daughter who attends James Campbell High School—go, Sabers—I have firsthand experience in volunteering and working with the schools in my district. So whether it’s a problem at our public schools or at the university system (which you know that I’m passionately trying to beef up University – West O‘ahu [go, Westside]), going forward, know that I will strive to make things better for our children.

“With respect to specific legislation, the Senate released priorities for our 2022 session. One of the Senate’s priorities and first areas of focus is to address the affordable housing shortage and providing great access to affordable housing for Native Hawaiians. This is one of my highest priorities. One of the bills that I have introduced will allow local families who are renting an affordable housing unit to save for and live in home of their own.

“And, finally, I’m hoping that, this session, we’ll be able to help law enforcement, use the latest technology to locate and respond to explosions caused by illegal use of fireworks and, of course, firearms.

“In closing, at the end of the day, when I stand and sit in my office, looking out the window, looking over to the statue of Queen Lili‘uokalani, it reminds me of why I’m here. She improved the quality of life for our families and our constituents and advocate for what’s right for our people. Because all of what is said and done, the community is, to me: God, Family, Community, and the People of Hawai‘i. It is who we represent here.

“When I came here—and this is straight from my heart, not from the book—when I came here, each and every one of you, through the Senate President, Vice President Kidani, Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Kim, constantly guide me, and Senator Breene (God rest his soul) always gave me the opportunity to come to their office, ask questions. I sat down with them and they were always willing to share. If we are going to show anybody in this State that we can work together as one people in this building, reaching across the aisle because I—the Minority, with you—the Majority, it doesn’t make no sense at the end of the day if we can’t and the people suffer.

“Senate President, you moved me today, along with Senator Acasio, because those things really matter. Having families that cannot go to school for education because their children don’t have the proper feminine hygiene is very serious. People don’t realize it. Mental health issues which people don’t take seriously enough. We don’t share it because Hawaiians, growing up, it was taboo to talk about mental illness in the family. I brought this up when we had the rallies, Senator Baker having this discussion in the Health committee. I’ll let you guys know this issue means a lot to me because, when we were growing up, we didn’t know what was wrong with my mom. It took years and years until she found a doctor, only to find out that her menopause was causing her mental illness. So we had to go from there, she had to do the surgery she needed to get on the path of recovery. But because nobody knows about these things, we always thinking that they acting, ‘Oh, they are not depressed, they joking,’ and then they kill themselves. These are

serious things that we need to take very seriously—houselessness, mental illness—going forward.

“Thank you again, Senate President. Thank you, my colleagues. I’m willing to work with you and I look forward to an awesome session. Take care, God bless. Mahalo.”

The Chair made the following comments:

“On behalf of the entire Kaua’i Senate delegation, we wish our best to the entire minority delegation.

“Before moving on, I don’t like writing down what I talk about, and I got a little emotional at the end. And as a good politician, I remembered to talk about the young lady who’s a constituent in my district, and realized I didn’t talk about Nikki-Ann Yee who, with her two sisters, have brought the program to Hawai’i and have been the driving force for the six schools that are piloted here, including Chiefess Kamakahelei on Kaua’i. And I really wanted to acknowledge Nikki because she and her two sisters are all granddaughters of Wadsworth Yee, who served in this very body and sat in this chamber, and I appreciate everything that she and her sisters have done, and I’m sure that their grandfather, if he were here, would be very proud of the accomplishments of his granddaughters.”
