Tuesday, February 1, 2022

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with Senators Chang, Gabbard, Inouye, Keohokalole, Rhoads, and Shimabukuro present and participating via videoconference.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Seventh Day.

THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2011 (S.B. No. 152):

Senator Rhoads moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2011 be adopted and S.B. No. 152, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keohokalole.

Senator Acasio rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I would like to speak to correct my previous vote in committee. I do have reservations, but I absolutely support the intent of this measure to have utmost safety for our keiki in vehicle transportation. The concerns that I do have are generally around the fines—and increase in fines for the infraction—seems to be also based around poverty and for those already stretching with limited resources or without means to have proper childcare restraints, and there are other ways to approach this issue as well. I just also wanted to say that there is some lack of clarity around the age of the two-year-old versus their size in regards to the restraint, so mahalo for allowing me to speak on this in reservation."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"My concern is also about the increase in fines. I don't think this is the vehicle to tax families, especially where there is no written testimony of the need to increase fines. Thank you very much."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"I had a pretty big daughter when she was growing up. She didn't fit in a lot of the standard car seats and, at the time, they didn't have the type of booster seats they have now. And going forward, in my community, we hand down or give away or trade with families in need of car seats. For example, at the Waianae Comprehensive Health Center, they're always giving out car seats and boosters because the community can't afford it. Having these fines—and I understand the reason for it, but it

would only hurt the community and the people who are in the greatest need of assistance. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator Lee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I appreciate the comments from colleagues; I just note that Hawai'i has among the most dangerous roads of any state in the country, with more fatalities and injuries and so forth. This is a measure recommended by medical experts and our law enforcement, and the fines, to which I think folks have raised some issue, only apply in repeat-offender situations; they're not intended to penalize anybody. Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2011 was adopted and S.B. No. 152, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PASSENGER RESTRAINTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:
