

## FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

**Tuesday, April 12, 2022**

The Senate of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2022, convened at 10:05 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator San Buenaventura thanked her staff for their work, especially since Linda Menda, her longtime staffer, had retired at the end of March. Senator San Buenaventura then introduced members of her staff: Jackie Rosas; intern Billie-Ann Bruce; and Amelia Castro, who had offered a moment of contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session.

### THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3886 (H.B. No. 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 1):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following floor amendment (Floor Amendment No. 8) to H.B. No. 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, section 5, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.”

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Floor Amendment No. 8 be adopted, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Your Committee on Ways and Means is requesting this floor amendment to defect the effective date.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 8 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3886 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1539, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SAFETY OF JUDICIARY PERSONNEL,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Thursday, April 14, 2022.

H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz then offered the following floor amendment (Floor Amendment No. 5) to H.B. No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting SECTION 3 found at page 1, line 8, to page 65, line 7, and inserting in its place a new SECTION 3 to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. APPROPRIATIONS. The following sums, or so much thereof as may be sufficient to accomplish the purposes and programs designated herein, are hereby appropriated or authorized, as the case may be, from the means of financing specified to the expending agencies designated for the fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2023. The total expenditures and the number of positions in each fiscal year of the biennium shall not exceed the sums and the position ceilings indicated for each fiscal year, except as provided elsewhere in this Act, or as provided by general law.\*

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 1600, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting SECTION 4 found at page 66, line 1 to page 109, line 6, and inserting in its place a new SECTION 4 to read as follows:

SECTION 4. Part III of Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, is amended as follows:

1. By adding nine new sections under the heading “ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT” to read as follows:

“SECTION 6.01. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for strategic marketing and support (BED100), the sum of \$200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for international sister state relations with Hawaii's sister states in Japan; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 6.02. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii technology development corporation (BED143), the sum of \$3,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for various grant programs and \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the state match to establish the Hawaii office of naval research grant program; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2023, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.03. Provided that out of the American Rescue Plan Act appropriations for the Hawaii community development authority (BED150), the sum of \$13,874,350 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for infrastructure upgrades at Kalaeloa, Oahu, for needy families.

SECTION 6.04. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$300,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purposes for which the rental housing revolving fund was established; provided further that the moneys appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.05. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$10,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purposes of establishing an equity program to address the high, unmet demand of for-sale units by Hawaii residents, specifically those residents earning more than eighty per cent and up to one hundred twenty per cent of the area median income; provided further that the moneys appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.06. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii housing finance and development corporation (BED160), the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the purpose of providing, in whole or in part, loans to nonprofit community development financial institutions and nonprofit housing development organizations for the development of affordable homeownership housing projects; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 6.07. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for agricultural resource management (AGR141), the sum of \$26,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to repair and expand the spillway associated with the Wahiawa irrigation system and to bring the spillway into compliance with all relevant dam safety requirements and to acquire a fee simple interest in the spillway associated with the Wahiawa irrigation system; provided that the terms of sale shall be conditioned on an appraisal of the property pursuant to section 171-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes; provided further that the moneys provided for in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 6.08. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for general administration for agriculture (AGR192), the sum of \$100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the agriculture workforce development program for agriculture licensure, credentials, and certificates; provided further that the department of agriculture shall partner with the department of education and the university of Hawaii community colleges in creating a pipeline for non-credit courses at the community colleges; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 6.09. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for fisheries management (LNR153), the sum of \$1,327,059 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the payroll and operational costs of the division of fisheries management; provided further that the department of land and natural resources shall continue to work with the department of agriculture on a pilot program at Wahiawa reservoir to implement Act 223, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund June 30, 2023.”

2. By adding after the new SECTION 6.09 added by item 1 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “EMPLOYMENT” and a new section to read as follows: “EMPLOYMENT

SECTION 6.10. Provided that out of the American Rescue Plan funds appropriation for office of community services (LBR903), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for emergency food assistance programs in each county as follows:

(1) City and county of Honolulu - \$1,220,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

(2) County of Hawaii - \$400,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

(3) County of Maui - \$260,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023; and

(4) County of Kauai - \$120,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023;

provided further that funds shall only be awarded to The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) of the Food and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of Agriculture-approved programs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

3. By adding after the new SECTION 6.10 added by item 2 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES” and a new section to read as follows:

“TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES

SECTION 6.11. Provided that out of the special fund appropriation for highways administration (TRN595), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the coordinated removal of albizia and other invasive trees that potentially threaten the public roadways and utility infrastructure on public and private land; provided further that the funds are matched on a two-to-one basis from a public utilities source; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

4. By adding after the new SECTION 6.11 added by item 3 of this section, a new subject heading entitled “ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION” and a new section to read as follows:

“ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

SECTION 6.12. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for LNR – natural and physical environment (LNR906), the sum of \$144,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023, including two permanent full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) cultural resource specialist III positions, shall be expended for the Kahoolawe island reserve commission; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.”

5. By adding three new sections under the heading “HEALTH” to read as follows:

“SECTION 8.01. Provided that of the special fund appropriation for Hawaii health systems corporation – regions (HTH212), the sum of \$35,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for operating costs, including costs associated with four hundred forty full-time equivalent (440.0 FTE) pre-existing positions, for the Oahu region.

SECTION 8.02. Provided that of the American Rescue Plan Act appropriation for Hawaii health systems corporation – regions (HTH212), the sum of \$20,218,840 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the Oahu region.

SECTION 8.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for state laboratory services (HTH710), the sum of \$14,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for planning, design, repairs, renovation, and modernization of existing laboratories; provided further that the funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.”

6. By adding four new sections under the heading “SOCIAL SERVICES” to read as follows:

“SECTION 9.01. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for homeless services (HMS224), the sum of \$2,567,200 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for one permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist V position (SR24) and for the establishment, implementation, and administration of two homeless triage center pilot programs that serves as a crisis assessment and management center; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 9.02. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii public housing authority administration (HMS229), the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended by the Hawaii public housing authority to support the state rent supplement program; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 9.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for Hawaii public housing authority administration (HMS229), the sum of \$25,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to rehabilitate, remodel, renovate, and repair at least two hundred fifty housing units; provided further that funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 9.04. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for general administration – DHS (HMS904), the sum of \$15,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the ohana zones pilot program established pursuant to Act 209, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, as amended by Act 128, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, including expenses relating to staffing, facility construction, provision of services, and administrative costs; provided further that the funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.”

7. By adding forty-five new sections under the heading “FORMAL EDUCATION” to read as follows:

“SECTION 17.01. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school-based budgeting (EDN100), the sum of \$461,289 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for workforce development opportunities in career and technical education programs, including five permanent full-time equivalent (5.0 FTE) positions to be housed within the office of the superintendent; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.02. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school-based budgeting (EDN100), the sum of \$1,850,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to provide increased custodial services during the summer months; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.03. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$7,148,647 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for special education and student support services, including eighteen permanent full-time equivalent (18.0 FTE) registered professional nurse V positions; provided further that the department of education shall establish licensed practical nurse and registered nurse positions in the school list of approved positions that may be purchased by principals for school level services; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.04. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$103,163 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the development, maintenance, and enhancement of alternative learning programs, including one permanent full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) educational specialist III position to support the state alternative learning programs through collaboration with complex area superintendents and school

principals to develop and implement plans for alternative learning programs, facilitation of the guidance committee, coordination of professional development and workforce development opportunities, and the collection of data for reporting purposes; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.05. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for special education and student support services (EDN150), the sum of \$1,278,590 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the high core alternative learning program to support the implementation of alternative learning programs for students who demonstrate academic, behavioral, and social-emotional challenges, which requires additional support services within a smaller learning setting that individualize academic interventions, behavior supports, and workforce development opportunities, including eleven and one-half permanent full-time equivalent (11.5 FTE) positions; provided further that the funds be directly allocated to the Leilehua-Mililani-Waiialua complex area within the department of education's 18863 budget program account; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.06. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$560,154 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the department of education to develop a statewide kindergarten readiness assessment pursuant to Act 210, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, and section 302A-1165, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that the department of education shall submit the statewide kindergarten readiness assessment and data findings on the implementation results to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.07. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$103,163 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the coordination and support of the Perkins V federal career and technical education program with workforce development programs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.08. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for instructional support (EDN200), the sum of \$1,200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the grow our own teachers initiative; provided further that of the general fund appropriation, \$300,000 shall be prioritized for candidates who teach Hawaiian immersion or comply with the requirements set forth in the memorandum of understanding between the department of education and the university of Hawaii for the grow our own program; provided further that any funds unexpended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.09. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for state administration (EDN300), the sum of \$16,134,014 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 17.10. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$6,364,830 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended within four complex areas; Kauai; Maui (Molokai); Hawaii island (Honokaa-Kealahou,

Kohala, Konawaena); and Leilehua-Mililani-Waiialua for the purpose of a pilot greenhouse(s) for sustainability and agriculture training, including robotics and other agricultural technology training; provided that, to the extent practicable, the greenhouse(s) shall be adjacent to agricultural production centers and shall develop capacity for future farming and farmers; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

SECTION 17.11. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to provide menstrual products free of charge to all students on all public school campuses; provided further that any funds unexpended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.12. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$6,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for an agriculture innovation center on Kauai; provided that moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.13. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$15,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the purpose of securing a maintenance base yard; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.14. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$45,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for centralized kitchens on Oahu for the farm-to-school program; provided that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.15. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$2,500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the purpose of securing and renovating a permanent facility for the Papahana o Kainoa alternative learning center; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.16. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$8,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the Center for Workforce Excellence; provided that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.18. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$453,940,455 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall not lapse at the end of the year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that any moneys that remain unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 2024, shall lapse on that date.

Provided that of the general fund appropriation for public libraries (EDN407), the sum of \$1,933,365 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for various repairs and maintenance including but not limited to roofing, paving, window tinting, and other improvements and maintenance; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.20. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school facilities agency (EDN450), the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for the plans, designs, construction, and renovation of preschool facilities; provided further that the moneys provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.21. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school community services (EDN500), the sum of \$200,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 shall be expended for adult workforce readiness programs, including for two permanent full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) workforce development coordinators positions for McKinley community school for adults and Waipahu community school for adults; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.22. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for charter schools commission and administration (EDN612), the sum of \$97,202 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to hire one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position to ensure compliance by public charter schools with this Act and Title IX of the federal Education Amendments of 1972, as amended; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.23. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$983,847 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended by the Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office; provided further that the Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office coordinates statewide workforce development initiatives, aligns education pathways with state departmental employment needs, and regional economic development and career opportunities, including programs in the department of education, the university of Hawaii, the department of labor and industrial relations, the department of human resources development, and the department of business, economic development, and tourism; provided further that Hawaii P-20 partnerships for education office shall submit a report to the legislature of the coordination, alignment, shared metrics, and resulting impacts of statewide career technical education, college and career readiness, college and career pathways, workforce development, and training opportunities no later than thirty days

prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that the funds provided in this section not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.24. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, Manoa (UOH100), the sum of \$381,767 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.25. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, Hilo (UOH210), the sum of \$532,150 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.26. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$2,542,572 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended to increase the State's capacity to train new nurses and project future nursing workforce needs; provided further that no funds provided in this section shall be expended unless the nursing program at the university of Hawaii, west Oahu is first reinstated; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.27. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$303,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the operating expenses of the culinary institute of the Pacific; provided that the university of Hawaii shall raise new moneys for the remainder of the other current expenses in the amount of \$376,677; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.28. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$2,650,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the early college program; provided that the early college program shall target at-promise youth with a focus on career and technical education and workforce development; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.29. Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, community colleges (UOH800), the sum of \$4,800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the Hawaii promise program; provided that Hawaii promise program scholarships shall cover not more than ninety per cent of unmet needs; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.35. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the university of Hawaii community design center to conduct a study to create an inclusive and fair criminal legal system devoted to restoration and healing, particularly addressing the disparate challenges facing Native Hawaiians, Pacific Islander communities, and people of color in the criminal legal system; provided that in developing the Hookeulike plan, the community design center shall work with the department of public safety, other state law enforcement, the department of human services, the department of the attorney general, the judiciary, the county police departments, county prosecuting attorney offices, the Hawaii paroling authority, and community stakeholders; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for the university of Hawaii community design center to develop a master plan that identifies the priorities for physical improvements for the department of education school campuses; provided that in developing these school campus plans, the community design center shall work with the department of education; provided further that any funds not expended or encumbered for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2023.

SECTION 17.40. unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

Provided that of the general fund appropriation for university of Hawaii, systemwide support (UOH900), the sum of \$88,083,334 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended on systemwide projects including various repairs, maintenance, and improvements to facilities, equipment, infrastructure, utilities, and existing buildings; provided further that funds provided in this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation that are unexpended or unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 17.45. Provided that out of the general fund appropriation for school support (EDN400), the sum of \$21,300,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be deposited into the Hawaii 3R's school improvement fund pursuant to section 302A-1502.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes."

8. By adding after the new SECTION 17.45 added by item 7 of this section, a new subject heading entitled "CULTURE AND RECREATION" and two new sections to read as follows:

“House Bill 2471 is an effort to help employers by amending the definition of ‘adequate reserve fund’ to exclude the times of record high unemployment rates from the calculation of rates. The effect of this will result in an average savings of \$365 per employee in 2023 and an average savings of \$668 per employee for 2024. In combination with last year’s \$747 million unemployment insurance loan repayment by the State to the federal government, the primary purpose of this bill this year is to keep employers in business and to help them survive the last two years of struggle. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of House Bill 2471. Thank you.”

“Colleagues, this House measure, as amended by the Senate, will raise the minimum wage in increments until it reaches \$18 an hour in 2026 and would eliminate our current tip credit in two increments. This bill is part of a package of bills which help employers **and** workers. As I mentioned earlier with House Bill 2471, last year we appropriated \$747 million to pay back our federal unemployment insurance loan. In normal times, this would have been paid back by employers through increased unemployment insurance taxes. The governor also authorized an additional \$100 million into the UI Trust Fund to prevent the loss of a federal employer tax credit which would have significantly raised the FUTA (Federal Unemployment Tax Act) taxes for our employers.

“This year, House Bill 2471 would adjust the experience rating to exclude the period of record high unemployment from the rate calculation for the next eight years. This would mean hundreds of dollars of savings in unemployment insurance taxes per employee for our employers.

“So, colleagues, if anyone tells you that the Legislature did nothing for employers and only helped minimum-wage workers, then you must tell them that they are not correct. Some of the same people may tell you that increases in the Senate version of House Bill 2510 are too fast and should be more gradual. Most of these same people have been fighting any increase in the minimum wage for years. They have successfully delayed efforts to raise the wage twice in the last three years, with the pandemic stopping efforts in 2020.

“A DBEDT study in 2019 indicated that \$18 per hour was what a person would need to survive in Hawai‘i. If this bill passes, it will still take seven years since that study to reach \$18 per hour, and things have definitely gotten even worse for our lowest-paid workers with the pandemic. We really must act now. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of House Bill 2510, Senate Draft 1. Thank you.”

Many deep-water coral native to Hawai'i grow very slowly and are facing unprecedented stressors, including acidification, warming oceans, overfishing, and pollution. The prohibition of the sale, import, harvest, and export of coral products will put an end to this archaic trade in coral. Without the prohibitions in House Bill 1988, Senate Draft 3, Hawai'i's black coral is subject to commercial harvesting by any person with a \$100 commercial marine license and relies on self-reporting without any verification. This measure will further efforts to protect Hawai'i's coral reefs, and I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"While I fully support the need to protect our coral reefs, I want our body to understand the consequences of what has passed previously. When I was growing up, the law was, and it still is, that black coral is the Hawai'i state gem, and it was promoted as such to all the tourists in Waikiki. And so a number of us, myself included, inherited black coral jewelry, which we have now, because of our promotion, have made endangered. As this bill progresses, I request our colleagues to understand that maybe it's about time we recant making the black coral as the Hawai'i state official gem so that we don't promote it, and we

preserve it. And secondly, that we look into the fact that a number of us have inherited coral because it was promoted as such, and there should be some kind of exclusion for those of us who went on the bandwagon at a time when we were promoting Hawai'i. Thank you very much."

Senator Chang rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Chang's remarks read as follows:

"I vote to advance this measure with reservations because I am concerned about impacts this bill will have on existing owners and retailers of corals harvested legally prior to this bill taking effect.

"In particular, I am concerned about locally owned shops which harvested or acquired coral in compliance with all legal requirements at the time. It would be unfair to change the rules on them when they bore the burden of legal compliance at the time. Additionally, nonprofit organizations and individuals own corals they acquired legally, and they would no longer be able to sell them. One possible solution would be to extend the effective date to give owners and retailers of corals time to lawfully sell their products. Another possible solution would be to exempt the sale of corals that were legally harvested before Endangered Species Act restrictions took effect."

Senator Acasio rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"Colleagues, when the state declared a climate emergency, it gave many people devoted to this issue hope that the state and we, as legislators, would be taking meaningful action to mitigate the impacts of climate change. As originally written, H.B. 1800 represented meaningful action—it was co-introduced

by 23 of our House colleagues and drew widespread support from climate focus groups. The current language, while it continues to have meaningful input, removes details on specific targets and goals, which I believe are imperative in this climate emergency. The time for action is now. Thank you."

No. 2336, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PHOTO RED LIGHT IMAGING DETECTOR SYSTEMS PROGRAM,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim). Noes, 1 (Fevella).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 (H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 be adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Astronomy is on my island and in my district. I share these comments as chair of the Committee on Water and Land. We all know that humankind has been fascinated by the heavens and the study of the universe since the earliest of times. We know that Hawai‘i is one of the best places in the world for the study of astronomy. After years of study and proposals in the early to mid-20th century, it came to pass that Mauna Kea was chosen as the ideal location for large-scale and world-class astronomy. Over the course of more than 60 years, the observatories have made Mauna Kea the most scientifically productive site for astronomy worldwide. We should relish in the fact that our astronomical facilities are a world-class center of study and research supported by numerous international partners and research facilities all over the world. The research conducted on Mauna Kea is purely scientific in nature and dedicated to better

understand the universe around us. Mauna Kea has the best combination of topography, climate, minimal light pollution, and a clear elevation in which to conduct astronomical research and observation.

“We cannot let our world-class status in the scientific community be compromised by a poorly crafted bill such as H.B. 2024, House Draft 1; it may cripple, if not end, our very prestigious and productive astronomy industry. While the present draft of H.B. 2024, Senate Draft 2, does a better job than the H.D. 1 version by including language like declaring that astronomy is a policy of the state and allowing the University of Hawai‘i to have jurisdiction over 550 acres of land surrounding the observatories, managing the summit, Summit Access Road, and the Hale Pōhaku facility, this bill still needs more work. The State of Hawai‘i needs to do everything possible to keep our world-class astronomy industry firmly grounded on the top of Mauna Kea. A few suggestions that need to be made in order to assure the long-term survival of astronomy on Mauna Kea is to change the governance model so that each and every observatory has a vote at the table along with the other members of the commission as outlined. The governance model will also need to be amended to fix the timeline of land transfer and extend that out to at least 2026 or longer if required. Issues requiring the powers of authority need to also be addressed as well as the revenue requirements for the self-sustaining clause in the bill. We need to remind ourselves that astronomy in Hawai‘i supports the employment of at least 1,313 residents and had a total impact of \$221 million in 2019.

“Astronomy is far-reaching not only to the stars but also on the ground. Just this past weekend, I was thrilled to see children, teens, and adults become excited about astronomy on a TV news report showcasing the open house of the University of Hawai‘i’s Institute for Astronomy in Mānoa. Some of these children and teens may grow up to be astronomers, and also, some are already in colleges throughout our country and the University of Hawai‘i. And, indeed, Ms. Onodera, in my district, graduated in astronomy, moved to Mauna Kea, and is now employed in the prestigious level on Haleakalā. We cannot and should not cheat them out of a possible future in Hawai‘i if we cannot continue having a world-class center of astronomy as we do now on Mauna Kea.

“Mr. President, I am convinced that the people of Hawai‘i support astronomy in a huge way. The bottom line is that astronomy needs to be saved—the successful implementation of this governance model will require resolution of several outstanding issues. These include Part II, Section 5, Senate Draft 2 calls for the transfer of all rights, powers, functions, and duties of the University of Hawai‘i with respect to the non-astronomy lands transferring to July 1, 2023, to the new authority. This transfer in July 2023 is not feasible given that the new authority will not yet be stood up or independent. Plus, UH still has obligations under its CDUPs, the master plan, CMP, and rules with respect to the 10,000 acres, which are non-astronomy lands that need to be worked out with DLNR and the authority. This should be changed to ‘July 1, 2026,’ to align with the three-year transition period. Section 3(b)(1) of S.D. 2 provides that the authority will be the principal authority in conjunction with the DLNR for the management of the state-managed lands within the Mauna Kea conservation lands. Clarification is needed regarding the powers of the authority as principal authority versus the statutory and regulatory powers of DLNR and the Board of Land and Natural Resources. For example, DLNR is the entity that would approve the sublease from UH to the new authority as well as UH’s comprehensive management plan (which is the CMP), which is currently in the process of being updated, and any subleases issued by the authority. How does this legislation impact DLNR’s role and jurisdiction? Also, S.D. 2 does not address the applicability of

DLNR's sublease requirements, such as whether the authority will be required to have a management plan similar to UH's.

"I make my support known for H.B. 2024, S.D. 2, Mr. President, with the hope that the bill can be further amended in conference to create a better bill for our world-class astronomy industry and for the people, our children, in Hawai'i. Therefore, Mr. President, I will support H.B. 2024, S.D. 2. Mahalo."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I have very mixed emotions, colleagues, because we're talking about astronomy, but we're also talking about desecration and mismanagement. This is a bill that is trying to level the playing fields on both sides.

"I am against TMT and I'm always going to be against TMT. Whatever telescopes for astronomy is on the mountain, we will review the extension of their leases. But having so many people oppose the construction of TMT, approximately 1,600 people, and due to nearly 50 to 60 years of desecration on that mountain, the protection of Mauna Kea means more to the people than looking into the stars, depending on who you talk to. But I am for this bill. My colleague worked very hard on it, but I don't agree on everything. But if this goes to conference and there is an attempt to push for the construction of TMT, I am voting against this in conference. I just wanted to let you know I support the bill in its current form, but if it changes in any way, I'll vote it down in conference."

Senator Kim rose to request that remarks regarding the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kim's remarks read as follows:

"Rise in Support.

"The Senate is continuing to refine and develop HB 2024 to balance the interests and concerns of our Native Hawaiian community to properly steward a cultural treasure with the interests of the State through the University of Hawaii ('University') to continue its world class science-based education and academic research unit in astronomy at Mauna Kea. In collaboration with the Higher Ed Chair, these proposed amendments are reflective of the discussions that we've had with various community groups, stakeholders, and from the testimonies submitted.

"Thus, Senate Draft 2, is a significant improvement over Senate Draft 1. Senate Draft 1 addressed very real concerns regarding the potential demise of astronomy at Mauna Kea caused by the whole sale replacement of the University with the newly created Mauna Kea Stewardship Authority. But as noted, it was still a work in progress."

"We have listened to reasonable suggestions expressed on many sides of the current controversy regarding this potential demise. The proper care and management of the mountain involves many agreements and contracts with several organizations, employees, contractors, and funding from the National Science Foundation, as well as, arrangements with foreign countries. As a premier world class academic research center, we were faced with how the newly created authority could quickly jump in to manage these agreements and contracts and prevent uncertainty and disruptions from arising that could place in jeopardy the relationships developed since the 1960's with the University's scientific and research partners.

"Senate Draft 2 is an improvement over Senate Draft 1 in that the new draft creates 'joint oversight' of Mauna Kea between the University and the newly created authority. The responsibilities to manage the mountain will be bifurcated or

split between the two entities. The new authority will manage approximately 9,450 acres on the mountain, while the University will manage the Astronomy Research Lands comprised of the Astronomy Precinct, Halepohaku complex and the Mauna Kea access road, or approximately 550 acres. The existing 1968 and 1999 State Leases between the State Board of Land and Natural Resources and University (expiring in 2033) will be kept in place. The University, as Lessee under the State Leases, will sublease to the authority within a year of its operational formation lands totaling approximately 9,450 acres, which we have labeled as the Mauna Kea Conservation Lands. The authority will be charged to properly conserve, protect, and manage the public uses of the Mauna Kea Conservation Lands. At the same time, the University will be solely responsible to care for and manage the Astronomy Research Lands.

"The 'joint oversight' structure addresses the perceived threat to the future of astronomy in our State, through a collaborative sharing of management duties and responsibilities between the authority and the University of Hawaii.

"The current administrative organization under the aegis of the University of Hawaii at Hilo will be kept in place, and will continue to service the operational and staff needs of both the new authority and the University thereby, avoiding any additional costs associated with creating a new organizational structure or two separate administrative structures.

"Our goal in Senate Draft 2 was to develop a management structure from a practical standpoint that would be workable while balancing the diverse interests in the conservation, protection, and regulating of current and future uses of Mauna Kea. Senate Draft 2, like Senate Draft 1, provides for an audit to be done in 2029.

"The refinement of Senate Draft 2 continues to strive for the best balance of interests on Mauna Kea. We realize that each side may not be satisfied with the joint oversight model we are proposing, but unfortunately there is no perfect solution to this controversy. Each side must be willing to compromise. A shared responsibility model accomplishes that."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3963 was adopted and H.B. No. 2024, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MAUNA KEA." having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Acasio, Ihara, Rhoads, San Buenaventura). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 (H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 be adopted and H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Baker rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"As my colleagues well know, digital currency is growing in popularity and acceptance worldwide; however, there is very little regulation of the industry here in the United States. The Division of Financial Institutions of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation are currently conducting a two-year sandbox program to study digital currency transactions that allow companies to conduct digital currency transactions without obtaining a money transmitters license. House Bill 2108, Senate Draft 2, establishes a licensing program that will replace the Digital Currency Innovation Lab. This measure will establish a program for licensure, regulation, and oversight of digital currency companies to ensure that the necessary



consumer protections are adhered to. Please join me in supporting this measure. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3964 was adopted and H.B. No. 2108, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE DIGITAL CURRENCY LICENSURE,” having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Acasio). Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3965 (H.B. No. 2171, H.D. 2, S.D. 1):

“Our system is broken regarding how we deal with child abuse. Hopefully, this is a step further to empower our child welfare service workers to be able to investigate when necessary and provide funding for the amount of hours that they go and basically investigate abuse. And, hopefully, with this passage, we can fix the system and prevent child abuse in the future. Thank you.”

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

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

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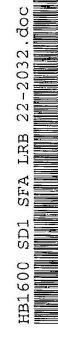
