FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 18, 2023

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, was called to order at 10:04 a.m., by the Honorable Lorraine R. Inouye, Temporary Chair of the Senate.

The Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Hawaiian Ensemble sounded the pū kani, chanted an oli, and performed hula pahu.

The Chair thanked the Hawaiian Ensemble from the Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Campus under the direction of Kumu Kaleo Trinidad.

The Chair introduced Ms. Leina'ala Wong, an 11th grader at Kamehameha Schools Kapālama from Ahuimanu, Kāne'ohe. Ms. Wong then offered a moment of contemplation.

The Chair thanked Ms. Wong.

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose for the singing of the Doxology by members of the Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Concert Glee Club, under the direction of Justin Kaupu and Kalua Leong, followed by the singing of the National Anthem by Ms. Nalani Brun, Director of the County of Kaua'i Office of Economic Development, and "Hawai'i Pono'i" by the Concert Glee Club.

Nominations now being in order for a temporary clerk, Senator Keith-Agaran nominated Carol Taniguchi, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator McKelvey moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Fukunaga and carried.

The Chair declared Carol Taniguchi as Temporary Clerk of the Senate.

On motion by Senator Kidani, seconded by Senator Kanuha and carried, Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1 was adopted.

The Committee on Credentials was thereupon discharged with thanks.

The Chair then called upon Chief Justice Mark E. Recktenwald of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i, to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate.

Chief Justice Recktenwald administered the oath of office to the newly elected members of the Senate, who were standing at their respective desks.

The Roll was then called by the Temporary Clerk showing all Senators present.

Nominations for officers of the Senate being next in order, Senator Dela Cruz placed in nomination the name of Senator Ronald D. Kouchi for President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Lee.

Senator Chang moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator Richards.

The motion to close the nominations was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Ronald D. Kouchi as President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Ronald D. Kouchi was declared elected President of the Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2023.

The Temporary Clerk then proceeded to introduce the following distinguished guests to the members of the Senate:

The Honorable Josh Green, Governor of the State of Hawai‘i, and Mrs. Jaime Green;

Members of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai‘i;

Ms. Carmen Hulu Lindsey, Chair of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs;

The Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, former Governor of the State of Hawai‘i, and Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi;

The Honorable John D. Waihe‘e III, former Governor of the State of Hawai‘i, and Mrs. Lynn Waihe‘e;

The Honorable Linda Lingle, former Governor of the State of Hawai‘i;

The Honorable Neil Abercrombie, former Governor of the State of Hawai‘i;

The Honorable Rick Blangiardi, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu;

Distinguished members of our military and consular corps;

The Honorable Kazuhisa Kiriake, Chair of the Fukuoka Prefectural Assembly, and members of the Fukuoka delegation, who were seated in the gallery; and

The Honorable Sumio Fujisawa and members of the Hokkaido Legislative Assembly delegation, who were also seated in the gallery.

Senator Kidani introduced the Honorable Colleen Hanabusa, former congresswoman and former Hawai‘i State Senate president.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

“Aloha, and wow. This is a tough morning when I’m going to have to start with an apology. As COVID has dominated all of our lives for the last several years, and we faced the task of deciding how do we open, I chose to take a path down the middle and be somewhat cautious and limit us to 60 percent capacity on the floor. As I look out at the full gallery and everyone who has come here, I apologize to all of those who could have been added if we had had 100 percent and couldn’t make it. I hope that we continue the progress that we are making in a safer, healthy community to be fully reopened again. Not everyone gets to speak today, so every Opening Day since I’ve been president, I have been sure to say on behalf of each member of the Senate to our families, who have been so patient in supporting us as we pursue public office and serving, for the sacrifices that you have made; to all of the wonderful friends and family who have come forward to help us get to this day: There aren’t enough words to say how grateful we are for the sacrifice and commitment that you have made to help us all try to make Hawai‘i a better place. So, to all of the families and friends, how about a big hand?”

“So how does a Waimea High School alum from the beautiful island of Kaua‘i wind up with such an amazing protocol from the Kamehameha School students? Well, the program planner in my office happens to be an alumnus of

Kamehameha Schools. But as we talked about the theme, ‘Mālama Hawai‘i’ was an important aspect of where we see ourselves going forward and being guided by those principles in the decisions that we make. Most of the politicians, when we’re out there promising the world on the campaign trail, talk about creating a better, brighter future for the young people of Hawai‘i and to empower them to be the next generation of leaders. But if we leave them on the sidelines and we never put them in the game, then how do they get the opportunity? How do they acquire the skills to take over? And so this was a great opportunity for them to participate in their government, to have a voice, and to get comfortable appearing here. Now, as I sat and listened to Ms. Wong’s contemplation, I could not imagine 15-year-old Ron Kouchi standing here like she did and delivering the message that she did today, and it certainly gives me great hope for the future of Hawai‘i.

“We all talked immediately when we shut the airport down—how we needed to diversify off of tourism and how we couldn’t be so dependent on tourism, but the stark realities of our distance from market, cost of shipping, and then with the war in Ukraine and events worldwide and fuel costs rising dramatically overnight, we are at the mercy of so many external forces that the main product we have is the beauty of our islands, the beauty of our people, and tourism. But when we’ve surveyed, our residents have been clear: Visitors should be paying for their impact on our natural resources; and visitors should take the time to learn about the Hawaiian culture, the Hawaiian people; and when they are a guest in our house, they should treat our home like they would hope we would treat their home when we visit; and, last, all of the profits being made by visitors coming to our islands should not be shipped off to other shores. And so to the Mālama Hawai‘i program—I don’t want to sell newspapers, and I’ll begin with that.

“So Governor Green talks about the green fee (pun intended) and how to tax tourists to get them to pay for these impacts, but other areas who are doing this are nations and it’s a national program going into national coffers. We are a state and, under federal law, any money collected at our airport—where most of the green fees are collected in other areas—needs to be spent on the airport, and it’s not getting to the natural resources that we want to help. I suggested that we expand on the current park reservation fee system that we have. Ke’e Beach at the end of the road on the North Shore of Kaua‘i generates about a million dollars a year in entrance fees and parking fees. Wai‘ānapanapa on Maui generates about \$3.5 million in reservation and parking fees. And Diamond Head, which I believe went live in May of last year, in the month of October, collected \$900,000. In those three parks alone, we can generate almost \$15 million. There are other parks that would be appropriate—not all lend themselves to this reservation fee—but I believe we could be generating between 20 and 40 million dollars a year from the visitor. And I’ve shared these ideas with Governor Green, and we’re trying to tax the same person, so I don’t get why I’m supposed to be fighting with him because I didn’t agree, like, let’s maybe charge them at the airport, so I’m committed to work with him to get the resources we need from the people we agree should be paying it to take care of our natural resources and, in some of these parks, to have the lifeguards necessary to be sure that residents and visitors alike can go there safely.

“The second thing is, DLNR runs parks, so I think they’re focused on their mission in that way. But if they’re online, doing the reservation system, then I believe we should have links so that people making those reservations can buy Hawai‘i-made products, and we can have small mom-and-pops be exposed to the millions of people who are making these reservations. During COVID, almost all of these businesses have created websites and online sales techniques to get their products out because you didn’t have brick and mortar and people coming in. This way, we can ensure that as the visitors

come and enjoy Hawai‘i, that we can share in the visitor dollar with all of the residents of Hawai‘i, and we can see small businesses flourish and succeed. I know when I’ve talked to the governor, he agrees 100 percent with that as well. And so maybe we need to get DBEDT involved with this system to get the links because that’s not a DLNR thing; maybe we need to get IT involved in this to make it work. Or maybe we need to call the Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Middle School computer class and have them come here and help create the links. I don’t know how we’re going to do it, but I know we are going to do it and it can be done.

“I was with the lieutenant governor yesterday with a host of legislators, and it reminded me, before we started the 2020 session, the Legislature and Governor Ige held a big press conference to talk about four major pillars that we hoped to address during the 2020 session: universal pre-K, creation of a new school facilities department to get school facilities constructed better, affordable housing, and to increase the minimum wage and pass an earned income tax credit that was refundable. And then COVID hit and a lot of that got put on the back burner because of the economic uncertainty. But we continued to meet, we continued to work, and even as we dealt with COVID, these four issues remained at the forefront. I am pleased to report that, last session, we spent over a billion dollars in an investment for affordable housing, including the \$600 million for those on the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands list. And we passed a minimum wage that will get to \$18 and an earned income tax credit. As we started to see more financial success but greater burden in our community, we also wound up giving a \$300 credit per individual in families that earned under a hundred thousand dollars. You can look for more of those kinds of solutions in the upcoming session as we continue to try to help those in our community who are in great need, living paycheck to paycheck, identified in the ALICE report.

“What the lieutenant governor is spearheading and talked about yesterday is great educational outcomes for children who attend pre-K. And we know that there are those who may not want their children there yet, and we respect that, but for those who want to go, the price should not be an obstacle to giving your child a fair start, an ability to compete on equal ground. And while we’re most focused on giving the children of Hawai‘i that education, the added benefit is relieving those families of the cost of child care and, with that, we want to make sure that we can put more money into the pockets of our working men and women of Hawai‘i. And I publicly said at the press conference yesterday that I’m fully supportive of the lieutenant governor’s plan and she can count on my support, and by the amount of legislators that were there, this is going to be great for the kids of Hawai‘i. So how about a big hand for the lieutenant governor?

“Before I get to the end of the report and the governor thinks that I’m only kissing up to the lieutenant governor because I don’t want her to make fun of me, we’ve seen too often where there’s been tension just within the executive branch and, as a newly elected governor and lieutenant governor, the concern that she may be running against him. And I want to publicly say to Governor Green: I admire your confidence. I admire the self-esteem you have to be confident enough to empower the lieutenant governor to undertake such an important task—to give her your full support because you want every member of your team working at an optimum level, and it’s going to take that kind of commitment if we’re going to succeed in solving the problems we face, so thank you, Governor Green.

“We’ve had two issues that the press is asking a lot of questions about. First, with the recent Supreme Court decision on reproductive rights: Who would be leading the Senate in dealing with these issues? And I’m pleased to report that

Senator San Buenaventura is now doing not just human services, but the health committee, and so you will have a strong advocate in Senator San Buenaventura. Thank you for stepping up, Senator San Buenaventura.

“The second thing that they’ve been asking is, with the recent court rulings, what are we going to do with gun legislation? Here in Hawai‘i, we have some of the strictest gun laws in the nation today. The one thing that is an undeniable fact: Bad people do bad things, and you can’t just legislate out bad behavior because people routinely break the law. As I was coming here to appear on TV before 5:00, I may have gone 38 miles an hour in the 35-mile-an-hour zone. But what nobody’s talking about is, when the bad thing happens, what do we do to try and make sure that we can stop it as quickly as possible with as little damage as possible? And I believe Vice President Kidani and Ways and Means Chair Dela Cruz have come up with an amazing idea of how to protect our children and the residents of Hawai‘i. They have been pushing for a first responders park in the Mililani area where we are not looking at housing state law enforcement—we are looking at county and federal law enforcement as well. We want them training together; we want them working together. And when they did a recap in Uvalde, Texas, one of the findings about the delayed response is the multi-layer jurisdictional authority that was on-site and nobody knowing who or what should be taking command and giving what order and who was in charge. And I believe in what Senator Kidani and Senator Dela Cruz are trying to do is make sure that doesn’t happen to us here in Hawai‘i—that we keep our children safe and our people safe.

“Okay, I’ve looked at my notes and I’ve talked about how I love the governor and the lieutenant governor. (Joy, he didn’t really mean it—don’t hit him.) In working toward the end, and I opened with about young people’s voices being heard, I met an incredible woman last year, and she’s known as Ms. Sarah ‘Mili.’ She is a middle school teacher at ‘Ilima Intermediate School, and she has led or been part of the leadership of the Ma‘i Movement here in Hawai‘i. For those of you who don’t know what that is, it’s ending period poverty. Former senator Acasio had identified that in her priorities last year as we talked about the Senate’s priorities. I started seeing Facebook posts from my daughter-in-law Sarah Kern, who’s a middle school teacher at Chiefess Kamakahelei Middle School on Kaua‘i, and found out that Sarah ‘Mili’ and her students had submitted legislation two years prior and, with COVID and no money, never got a hearing on their bill. Reintroduced it again the next year and, with the financial uncertainty of COVID, never got a hearing on their bill. So, they decided in the third year to introduce their bill again, but this time, with the money, and they got smarter in how they were doing their work. They were featured in *Civil Beat* and they got picked up in all of the news stories, and as the hearings were held, they came out with students to the Capitol and testified, and at the end of the day: \$2 million dollars so that we would have period products available in all of the schools in the state of Hawai‘i. But the more important thing was that they were having the young boys and girls having the conversation in school about biology and normal human functions of both males and females. You had several of the young guys who were actively involved, and they have dispensers that are out in the open so that there’s no shame in coming to get any period products if you need them, and a key mission was to normalize the conversation. And it was amazing to me how they hit the tipping point and became the buzz of the last legislature, so join me in giving a big hand to Sarah ‘Mili.’ So, as a typical guy, I immediately pigeonholed her as the Ma‘i Movement champion and left it at that, and as I followed her on social media, she is a nationally recognized teacher and leader for so many other things besides the Ma‘i Movement. But when we talk about the public school education that our children are getting here in Hawai‘i, I just want to say,

it’s people like Sarah who are making the difference in the lives of our children, so one more time.

“And, in closing, I started in the 1982 election; I was 25, I was single. I had a lot of my friends not coming home—staying where they went to school or repping in the military because the mid-’80s was a difficult economic time in Hawai‘i, and West Kaua‘i, where I grew up, had a negative population growth, so I wanted to create jobs and, in the process, I eventually met my wife, Joy, who I married, and then I had to change my priorities. Then in 1990, our son Dan was born, and in 1991, our son Egan was born and, again, my priorities changed. So by the time I get to the Hawai‘i State Legislature in 2010, I’m focused on trying to create a Hawai‘i where our children would choose to come back to because they have choices, and I’m so pleased to be here this morning, at least having accomplished the goal for me, as both sons are now back here in Hawai‘i and working. They have met wonderful women and they are now married. We’re looking forward to the families someday that they will have, and I am committed to each and every one of you to continue to work toward that goal because I know how good it feels to have our children home. I would like to thank Senators Akaka and Inouye, who gave our eldest son, Dan, an opportunity to work in Washington, D.C.; to Senator Hirono, who hired not only our son Dan but his wife, Katie, and they both worked for her. And then in having a more appropriate workplace, Dan was able to work for Congresswoman Hanabusa and be in a different office from his wife. And so for the mentoring and everything you’ve poured into helping make our son Dan the person he is today with his wife, Katie: Thank you very much. To my brother Scott, who doesn’t like these crowds and is sitting in my office watching—he is my younger son’s, Egan’s, boss. When I’m here and doing this work and not on Kaua‘i, he has provided so much mentorship and guidance for Egan. I appreciate everything he’s done to help us in raising Egan. His wife, Sarah, needs, well, all the congratulations to the people in the world for her. She did Teach for America in Wai‘anae, and after she finished, she stayed there for a total of five years, and what’s significant about that is, she lives in Hawai‘i Kai. And so she drove over an hour each way because she loved the students in Wai‘anae, she loved the people of Wai‘anae, and it took a great guy like Egan to entice her to Kaua‘i to come and teach the students on Kaua‘i, so we’ve been blessed to have great mentors and help. I know each of you would like to stand up and thank the people who have done that, but I hope, in sharing a little bit of our family’s personal story, I’m saying thank you on behalf of all of the Senate members for all of you who have contributed so much in making us who we are today. It’s been a real pleasure to resume in front of people; it’s been lonely with the gallery and the floor empty or the impersonal meetings of Zoom. And so thank you very much—aloha.”

At 11:02 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:14 a.m.

At this time, the President remarked:

“Before I ask the Clerk to introduce our musical guest for this morning, I did omit that, in December, we hosted a Council of State Governments conference in Honolulu. They normally have 500 to 700 participants—we had almost 1,200. And our entertainer this morning graciously entertained the crowd at the lū‘au with several songs, was a big hit. And on the last day of the conference, staying with the climate change and Mālama Hawai‘i, Senator DeCoite led a community event where we invited participants to plant something in a potted plant, and we distributed vegetable plants around the state. For the members, we selected chili pepper plants so that you would get off to a hot start, but if you were wondering where the gift came from, the Council of State Governments had sponsored the

community activity and they were presenting the chili pepper plants to your offices under the supervision of Senator DeCoite.”

The Temporary Clerk introduced Amy Hānaiali‘i, who, along with her guitarist, Josh Hearl, performed several popular songs for members of the Senate and guests.

The President thanked Ms. Hānaiali‘i, then announced that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President of the Senate.

Senator Moriwaki placed in nomination the name of Senator Michelle N. Kidani for Vice President of the Senate, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Kim moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Senator San Buenaventura.

The motion was then put by the Chair and carried unanimously, and the Temporary Clerk was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Michelle N. Kidani as Vice President of the Senate.

The ballot having been so cast, Senator Michelle N. Kidani was declared elected as Vice President of the Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2023.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Nadine K. Nakamura and Lauren Matsumoto, on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Michelle N. Kidani and Dru Mamo Kanuha, on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Josh Green, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Representative Dee Morikawa and Senator Donna Mercado Kim presented Governor Green with lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Thirty-Second Legislature and guests the Honorable Josh Green, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Green presented the State of the State Address as follows:

"Aloha. Thank you for that welcome; it warms my heart. Good people of Hawai'i, Jaime, Speaker Saiki, Senate President Kouchi, Chief Justice Recktenwald, OHA Chairwoman Carmen Lindsey, Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, honorable members of our legislature, colleagues and friends, former governors of our state—I respect you so much—mayors and your

representatives, our congressional delegation, foreign dignitaries, and leaders from our public sector and private sectors: Mahalo for being here—I appreciate you. It's a great honor to stand before you here and address you as your governor. This is more than just an update; this is more than an update just on our progress as a state. This is our beginning, our huliau—a moment to share our vision and values.

"Over the past few years, we have come through enormous challenges together. We endured a once-in-a-century pandemic that impacted our way of life, threatened our economy, and robbed us of too many precious lives. We wrestled with a housing crisis. This housing crisis forced too many of our people out of our state in search of economic opportunity or, more importantly, affordable homes. We witnessed the risks and the consequences of an economy that's simply too dependent on tourism alone. And we suffered environmental threats from both pollution and the effects of global climate change. But even in our darkest hours, Hawai'i's values shone through, the character and soul of our people has prevailed, and we found a new dawn of hope—a new dawn of hope together. Through these difficult times, we showed that when we stand together, when we put our values into action, we can meet almost any challenge and overcome any problem, no matter how large or difficult it may seem. People of Hawai'i have elected us to lead, and they've given us a clear mandate—and I say 'us a clear mandate,' not me—to act on their behalf following our common values. It's time for us to move Hawai'i forward, and we'll do that by taking bold action rooted in these values that we share.

"Unity: Governor John A. Burns said it best: 'In diversity, there can be unity. In division, there is schism.' Hawai'i is one 'ohana—one family—and this is one of our most important values and greatest strengths. In its essence, 'ohana is a commitment to each other with aloha, respect and appreciation for our diversity, and tolerance of our differences—all in service for the greater good. I know we share that value. It allows all of us to benefit from our different cultures, our perspectives, our lived experiences—and that is a different lived experience all across our state. Through this, we forge a single unity of purpose out of the most diverse population imaginable. Look at us—look how diverse. We will unite and bring all of our strengths to bear on the urgent issues we face with this diversity. This will be one of my most important responsibilities as governor, honestly: to bring people together. I'll unite us as one 'ohana, and always remind us that we're stronger together and that we can accomplish anything when we share a common purpose.

"A mandate for bold action: The preamble of our constitution of Hawai'i holds that 'we reserve the right to control our destiny, to nurture the integrity of our people and culture, and to preserve the quality of life that we desire.' It's not only our right, but our kuleana, our responsibility, to take action to control that destiny and preserve the quality of life for our people. Our constitution gives us this right, and the people of Hawai'i have given us—again, us—the mandate and imperative as their elected leaders to do it. So today we need new ideas. We need new solutions and bold action rooted in these shared values once again. You know me—business as usual won't work anymore; there is simply too much on the line to accept the status quo. Each day without action means another family is forced to leave to the mainland, another child is sleeping on the street, another local business closes, or another precious natural resource is put at risk. Each day without action means we miss another opportunity to heal Hawai'i, do what's right and just, and preserve our islands for the future generations. So our administration has already begun to act with urgency since day one. Our state motto says so powerfully, 'The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness,' and this is the moment for righteous, bold action rooted in our common values. So I ask

everyone here to say yes to the wisdom guiding us in our constitution, our motto, and in that mandate the people have given us. Say yes to new ideas and solutions, and to putting our values into action. Say yes to achieving goals, yes to overcoming challenges. Yes, we can make a difference in our communities and in the lives of our most vulnerable. And yes to more housing as we all believe. Yes to more jobs and opportunities for our young residents. Yes to building and leading the world on renewable energy. Yes to lowering the cost of living, which we know is the most important thing that our families wrestle with. And yes to governing ethically together. We owe the people of Hawai'i an effective government that takes action. If we accept our kuleana, and we follow the mandate we have been given and take action rooted in our common values, we will show the people of our state that we're working for them, and they can believe in government once again.

“So what have we done so far? Today is day 49—day 49 of our administration. We've had a little more than a thousand hours on the job. We've already accomplished a great deal together in this short time: we nominated a cabinet of qualified public servants, led by my chief of staff, Brooke Wilson—thank you, Brooke, for that; I appreciate you. We showed respect to our public workers with administrative leave during the holiday season, a move which also supported local spending in our local businesses. We announced a new educator tax credit, which I hope that you guys will believe in so that our teachers can receive a \$500 credit to support the work and investment they put into students in the classroom. Because of your work—your work—we released \$50 million in grants-in-aid to directly support our nonprofits across our state and the service providers for the critical work that they do in our communities—that's credit to you. Thank you for giving us those resources for people who need it. We've proposed a climate impact fund of \$100 million right out of the gate to fight climate change. We've announced the return of over 363 acres to the Hawaiian Homes Commission on Moloka'i for beneficiaries, and we've signed an agreement with Haneda Airport to streamline travel and promote made-in-Hawai'i products, and even improve Daniel K. Inouye Airport. We took immediate action to prevent disruption in a healthcare crisis when the service to our rural islands, our rural communities, was threatened when the plane crashed from Hawaii Life Flight—this saved lives along the way. We've been active: Our administration attacks problems. Now is the time to invest in our people and our communities. With this in mind, I'll identify right now several of the priorities our legislature and administration must act on to move Hawai'i forward. I take to heart what you are saying.

“Budget and bill priorities: The Legislature on Opening Day already advanced extraordinary ideas. Our budget will reflect those priorities. We're adding and emphasizing several high-priority items related to housing, homelessness, the cost of living, climate, environment, and mental health. Some important specifics that you'll see right now:

- Additional 'ohana zone funding, which puts homeless individuals into permanent housing right away to give them the chance to thrive—you already have supported that, mahalo;
- More resources for the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment Program to help pay off educational loans for primary care providers and behavioral health providers so that Hawai'i remains the health state for generations to come. This investment once and for all addresses our healthcare provider shortage—once and for all we can not have shortages in our neighbor islands; thank you for supporting these initiatives;
- In the health theme, our budget also adds 60 new positions to expand nursing and medical programs across all of the UH campuses, with a special emphasis on

behavioral health, which the freshman legislators made very clear was a priority for them; mahalo, early legislators;

- And we also know that there has to be more service in certain parts of our state, so we'll expand the intensive care unit and medical surgical units at Hilo Hospital with a \$50 million request for CIP funds. They have great needs on the Big Island, and we saw that during the pandemic—thank you for that recommendation, Big Island;
- In your wisdom, you created an Office of Wellness and Resilience within the governor's office to focus on trauma-informed care. We have put resources in there to make that permanent;
- And we will have a concerted push to protect our natural environment in partnership with all of the great work that you always have done;
- We're adding critical mental health resources in our budget for schools and our communities because that's where kids get care;
- And, finally, we'll be supporting our state's priority to make pre-K universally available to Hawai'i's families, led by my lieutenant governor, whom I think some of you know.

“Since our inauguration last month, I've been meeting with departments and agencies to insist we break barriers and open doors in the halls of government. I tell them constantly, 'Care for people'—that's my message—so here's how we're going to start caring for people.

“Affordable housing: The biggest factor affecting the cost of living in our state, the biggest, is affordable housing. Safe, affordable, and stable housing is a human right, and it's more than just a place to live: It impacts our health, our identity, our sense of belonging. Housing crises are not new. All the way back—May 15, 1935—the Eighteenth Territorial Legislature created the Hawaii Housing Authority. This basically was the first body in our islands' history dedicated to addressing the housing needs of our state as a priority. But nearly nine decades later, we're still working to provide housing for our people. When Governor Burns signed Act 105 into law on June 19, 1970, which was five months after I was born, state government initiated housing and community development on a scale unprecedented in our state. So I suggest we return now to an era of bold housing initiatives. I'm completely aware that you've already begun this fight, but we need a comprehensive approach—it has to continue—to housing on all segments of our population, from renters to low- to moderate-income individuals, to families, to those experiencing homelessness. That's why our administration is making housing the top priority and committing a comprehensive housing agenda to you. You'll see the details right now.

“Developing infrastructure from the resources we appropriate for the state is crucial in every way to create adequate housing, but we need to start from the ground to make sure that our infrastructure is built and affordable housing actually gets expedited. We'll also address and improve policies and processes that impede the development of housing; this has become a very big problem. And we can't do this alone: We need a coordinated approach with the counties and our stakeholders—that's why I'm glad they're here today. We need to also make these big investments, but we have to coordinate getting rid of the red tape, so we're proposing over a billion dollars of new investment in housing, and I've already heard some of that from you as leaders. To be specific, these funds will be used to support major investments in the Hawaii Public Housing Authority to renovate and upgrade public housing units, to provide state rental subsidies for the low-income families we have, and to boost financing for more affordable units through the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development

Corporation (HHFDC). You're all familiar with these approaches, but we'll also deliver on the Legislature's commitment to fund the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands: It's a priority for our administration. I know you want answers; we will work with you to get this done.

"In addition, new ideas: We propose a state match for the city affordable housing program, which incentivizes the development of more affordable housing rental units in urban Honolulu. Mayor Blangiardi and I are already partnering on our approach day and night to this housing initiative because the crisis is felt most intensely on O'ahu—but, of course, all across our state—so I'll partner with all of our mayors and regularly convene stakeholders across all sectors so we can troubleshoot and streamline the processes to speed up housing. These projects have to go faster. So what you'll see is, you'll see us cutting red tape so we can provide housing as soon as possible, and it will likely require additional action from you and from the executive branch. Please don't doubt the scope of this problem requires both.

"Now I'd like to talk about housing communities that are homeless-based. We can't forget about our unhoused communities; they're struggling. In the past, efforts to address homelessness have often emphasized enforcement and triage, pushing people from one neighborhood to another, moving people from street or shelter to temporary housing, with many, frankly, finding themselves back right where they started. We've made progress at getting people into homes in recent years, but the number of people on the street—those experiencing unsheltered homelessness—continues to rise. We see it every day. We need to shift our efforts from temporary fixes to a permanent solution. We need these places immediately. Homelessness should not be accepted as a normal part of our society. It shouldn't be normal to avert our eyes from the suffering of another human being, ever. We shouldn't ever need to avoid our public places because homeless citizens have overwhelmed a park or street or sidewalk. We have come to accept the silent suffering that goes on for thousands of our people in our parks, along our beaches, even here on the grounds of the State Capitol. Our homeless crisis is a strain on our aloha and a threat to our spirit. That's why we're committed to the development of 12 *kauhale* across our state—12 *kauhale*. As you know, *kauhale* are tiny villages; they're communities where people can thrive. And we send our special respect and appreciation to Twinkle, to Aunty Blanche, to others who have been pioneers in this area—thank you, for them, please. Soon, Hawai'i will break ground on a new neighbor island *kauhale*, perhaps in the next two or three days. This will be at the Kukuioia Emergency Shelter and Assessment Center in Kona. With 64 units, this new *kauhale* will meet the housing, social, and healthcare needs of our people there on the street. It will help future residents for years to come, and it will only cost \$8,000 per unit—that's about \$500,000 in total. Now, for perspective, it costs \$322,000 a year to support a person who's suffering with schizophrenia or other mental illnesses at our Hawai'i State Hospital—\$322,000 per person per year. So for less than the cost of keeping two such people out of the hospital for one year, we can build an entire community of low-cost, permanent housing at *kauhale*—just two people. Building *kauhale* communities takes time, it takes energy, it takes planning, it takes people, it takes passion. It also takes conviction: a commitment to breaking from the status quo. So, again, Twinkle Borge and Blanche McMillan—just two names among many—are showing what it takes to embrace this village concept to help our people find a permanent home. So, to be specific, our enhanced *Kauhale Initiative* will follow their example: It will create low-footprint, low-cost housing with a village environment designed for community support, healing, and progress. As long as we are in a housing crisis, we'll treat it like an emergency. So I'm going to do something a little

untraditional: I'm going to take action right now with all of you. I've spoken with many of you as leaders. As of this moment, because this is a crisis, in my hands is an emergency proclamation, and I'm signing it for you [*signs proclamation*], for all of us. It goes into effect today. This emergency proclamation will streamline the construction and processes for housing—low-impact housing. It removes unnecessary barriers; it removes red tape. We've done this before together and it worked. It enables our partners, our community leaders, to tackle homelessness head-on, right quick, affordably. A copy of this proclamation will be delivered to your offices right now. Thank you for working with me on this.

"Cost of living: Two weeks ago, I testified in person before the House Finance committee on the meaning of ALICE—Asset Limited, Income Constrained, and Employed people. These are families that are struggling to afford very basic household necessities such as child care, healthcare, and transportation; families who have to choose between buying food or medicine for their families one paycheck—one paycheck—away from a healthcare crisis which would bankrupt them, slipping them deeper into poverty or facing eviction. Our cost of living is the highest in the country at nearly twice the national average—we all know this. In Hawai'i, we should not teeter; none of our people should teeter on the brink of poverty in order to simply provide for their 'ohana. Our job should be enough to support our families with just one employed person in our family. So here's what we're going to do: Our plan takes the necessary steps to strengthen the health of ALICE families in our communities. The Green Affordability Plan (GAP)—G-A-P—it cuts taxes significantly and provides tax relief for people that need it the most, and I was so grateful to hear that in the speech of Speaker Saiki and alluded to by Senate President very passionately just one week ago. Give them a round of applause; they're incredible people. If adopted fully, this package, by the Legislature, it will provide just over \$300 million in tax relief annually to the people who need it the most. This tax break will help us get money into the pockets of the working families that I referenced so they can purchase essential goods and services like food, medicine, and housing, as we discussed, and it will, in turn, stimulate our economy because every single dollar that goes back to an ALICE family will be spent immediately in the economy—immediately.

"So this proposal follows very specifically the recommendations of the 2020 Tax Commission, so we'll reform our tax code. We do this to provide for a cost-of-living adjustment in response to recent inflammatory pressures. (They were inflammatory, but they're also inflationary, which is really what I meant to say.) This plan provides universal tax relief, and let me break it out for you:

- We shift the tax brackets slightly to ensure that working families aren't burdened by inflation;
- More than double the standard deduction from \$2,200 to \$5,000;
- We double the personal exemption from \$1,144 to \$2,288.

Now, it may sound complicated, but it's not. Our current tax structure misses support in many cases for ALICE families. It helps people who are in deep, deep, deep trouble, but in the ALICE family sense, it doesn't. I'm just going to show you just a little bit of what it looks like without dwelling on this. Right now, ALICE families are in the middle here [*holds up chart*]: These are people that make between \$41,000 and \$129,000, depending on how many kids they have. They really struggle to pay their rent, their mortgages, for food. We have a lot of tax breaks for people who are deeply, deeply impoverished, so you can get an idea of what that looks like. If we implement this plan together, this is what it looks like [*holds up chart*]: These are those ALICE families and these are the tax breaks that they would see. It would be tax breaks for every single income

bracket in our state. They'd be paying less taxes under this plan. This is where we are focusing our energies. So I reiterate: The Green Affordability Plan directly supports ALICE families. This plan makes sure every income bracket does a little better, and it directly lowers—directly lowers—Hawai'i's cost of living for every single resident by keeping more money in our pockets for each taxpayer, especially those who are wrestling with survival. This proposal means that a family of four in every income bracket can anticipate \$2,000 in savings right off the bat for reduced taxes, and lower-income families will see even more savings significantly. For many, this is the equivalent of a full extra paycheck every year.

“In the spirit of what you've been proposing and working on for years—sometimes with me, sometimes with other leaders—the Green Affordability Plan also intentionally rewards families who take care of others: the caretakers, the caregivers, and educators. As I mentioned, it creates a new educator tax credit of \$500 per teacher—they can help their students. It provides our hardest-hit residents a renter's credit of \$350. It also makes the food excise tax credit available to a full third of all taxpayers and expands the earned income tax credit from 20 percent to 30 percent of the federal amount. We will also take bold action to expand something important: the child and dependent care tax credit. Now, under this proposal—under this proposal—working families paying for day care, babysitters, summer camps, afterschool care, care for support that is needed when families are working, and people who have adult day care—individuals in their family—they'll be eligible for up to \$10,000 to offset the costs of the fees that are going into all of that care. This will provide a huge relief for working families and help reduce the choice that they face: They have to face the choice of whether to start a family or invest in a career. That choice won't be before them if they're able to have this tax credit.

“Now, how can we afford this? Well, this plan doesn't just make it easier for ALICE families; this plan goes to the core of what economic growth has to be. This plan will grow our economy, it ensures healthier kūpuna, our keiki are healthier—they have more care, it reduces the burden placed on family caretakers all across our state. This way, they don't have to choose between a job, child care, rent, or health care, or even between school supplies and dinner. The Green Affordability Plan, our plan, is essentially relief from the economic burdens faced by all of the families who are right now choosing to leave our islands. We thought long and hard about this—how resources should be allocated and invested—and these are our state priorities. So when we invest in families, we invest in our future, and our return on investment is unlimited as it will come back to us tenfold. As you can see, I feel that the people of Hawai'i deserve generational tax reform, and I think this is the time to do it: with a new legislature, a new governor, coming out of the pandemic. All the stars have aligned for us to take action for people. And what this will do is, it will help us build a more equitable future, where our people can be productive and secure; a future where residents are not one paycheck away from crisis; a future where our priorities reflect actually our values, and we can all rise together as one 'ohana. That's what this plan is about.

“Our climate crisis: Tax relief provides immediate support to our families across the state, but we also need to take action to protect our environment and our planet, which is why we have direct and long-term effects constantly on the horizon. Even as our economy is struggling, we have to look to the future for climate response. This is why addressing climate change today is most important. The impact of climate change is wide-ranging. As an island state, climate change does so many things: It threatens our economy, our culture, our environment, and, really, the sustainability of our way of life. So you heard me commit \$100 million for climate impact funds steered by the

Climate Change Mitigation and Adaption Commission, so it's not just my ideas; it's the ideas of those who know about the environment. But we're committed to broader strategies on climate change—strategies that are equitable, culturally responsive to a resilient future. This includes looking at the resiliency of the power grid, renewable energy, sustainable transportation, land use planning, sea level rise, the health and how it's impacted by the environment, natural and cultural resource impacts, and, frankly, much more. So we've dedicated these resources in a vital effort, but we can't do this alone at all. This fund, which I do believe is a necessity, will be open to contributions from anyone, whether they are local or from around the globe. This is our opportunity to seek resources on the impact of tourism. Now, let's break this out a little bit. The revenues generated from visitor impact fees should fortify all of our efforts to protect Hawai'i's people and our way of life, and we'll continue to take the impacts of climate change seriously. I support any plan—any plan—that gets us to a place where resources come from the impact of travelers to protect our environment. Thank you, Senate President, for expressing those good ideas.

“Economic development: Our administration will work to ensure that our economy does several things: fosters prosperity for all of our people, creates opportunities for our keiki, protects the unique character of Hawai'i, and, finally, strengthens and supports all of our shared values. We're not going to sit passively on the sidelines any longer when it comes to our economic development. We'll reach out to beyond our shores and seek opportunities for our people. In doing so, we'll fulfill the promise that Governor Burns saw for our state, and, in his words, Hawai'i 'will finally assume our rightful place in the Pacific sun.' We're the center of the Pacific, linking Australia, New Zealand, Taiwan, Japan, Korea, and the broader United States. In the coming years, I hope to reposition our economy to pursue global opportunities—we'll retool tourism, develop green technologies, and expand our reach into international markets better than ever for our small businesses and also our world-class professional sector. Now, how do we do this? We do this by being bold. We'll have to move beyond an economy of pure tourism, and we have to become energy independent, as you all know. We'll fulfill this potential as an economic and renewable energy leader in the Pacific. We have already, in the first 49 days, been doing something. We've been working with partners across the globe—Japan, local businesses, and key sectors for Hawai'i's economy, like the international wedding industry, which also brings in 20 percent of all the visitors from Japan. We're working with them to change the way we view our traditional economy. And welcoming more visitors like our Japanese neighbors means we can generate much more revenue for local businesses while taking in fewer tourists overall; that's tourism management. But we're also working on new plans—new plans to increase the export of locally made and locally grown products with our regional partners. Despite being the 41st largest state by population, we rank last of all U.S. states in overall economic exports, a statistic that has to change. So our economy—our economy—is rife with untapped potential. We'll encourage small businesses and professional service sectors to seek new markets beyond our islands; health tourism should be among that. But we'll strengthen, most importantly, Native Hawaiian-owned businesses. By supporting Native Hawaiian-owned businesses, we support Hawaiian agricultural food products like taro, breadfruit, sweet potatoes, and we promote indigenous farming practices to keep our people physically, mentally, and spiritually nourished. Diversifying our crops, expanding on ag with food systems that actually help us connect with the land and each other helps us grow in ways that we haven't done before. We eat together, we grow foods together, we deepen our connection to our 'āina—this is critical for our state. By advocating for our local interests and through dialogue

with our partners, we can create many more opportunities for Hawai'i.

"I'm pleased to share that we're doing something right now: It's an initiative with the federal government, our community, and international partners to pursue investments in cutting-edge hydrogen technologies for Hawai'i. Through cooperation with partners in Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and Congress, this technology can help stabilize the Pacific energy resilience that we need; it promotes our defense infrastructure and reduces our reliance on fossil fuels. To that end—to that end—we're preparing right now a historic application to potentially bring in over a billion dollars—\$1 billion—in federal and private sector investments to our state through a regional Hydrogen Hub. The integration of hydrogen technology into our grid, along with the continued expansion of traditional renewables—solar, wind, all of the infrastructure—will give utilities, businesses, and local talent an international advantage. With the potential to turn our state into a regional energy exporter, we change the whole model of our economy. Through proactive efforts like these (these are just a few examples), Hawai'i can lead our Pacific neighbors into the future. This is not just through defense initiatives, which are critical to us, but through greater economic, energy, and cultural integration; this is our future. So, as you see, what we'll be doing is leveraging climate investments, renewable energy and environmental expertise, and our unique geographic position—our location—to achieve even greater economic diversification. This is one of the ways we escape from a full reliance on tourism.

"Now, please indulge me as I talk about major projects. We also need to address two major projects, at least: the stadium and a new correctional facility. We all want a stadium, a place where we can be proud of our sports teams. We want a stadium for our university, our families, our keiki, and our broader community. Now, when the Aloha Stadium first opened in Central O'ahu in September of 1975, it was a great triumph—we won six of our last eight games that season. We had a new coach. I'll tell you this: We had 40,585 people in the stands in that last game against Tennessee. (And the Pittsburgh Steelers that year won their first of their six titles.) But for a project of this size, we have to be thoughtful, thorough, and analytical. We've already addressed the benefits of a public-private partnership in the future development of the Aloha Stadium, but such a partnership will only work if the state gets a fair deal. We're carefully reviewing our options; we're working with colleagues because we know that there is some conflict, and we'll find the best option to go forward to make this a reality for our people. We can't afford to wait—it's been pointed out by dear friends—we can't afford to wait because the longer the delay, the higher the cost. We have to support this stadium with economic activity all around it. The same goes for replacing the obsolete OCCC. To replace the OCCC, we need to build a modern, new correctional facility that's safe, secure, and humane. It has to have the capacity to provide rehabilitation, counseling, education, job training opportunities to inmates, and, at the same time, protect us, protect our kids. Almost all of those convicted of nonviolent crimes and held in our correctional facilities will someday return to our communities and will be living alongside us as our neighbors. We must move forward with restorative approaches to justice rather than strictly punitive ones. As my administration reviewed the details of these projects, we saw that previous legislatures provided general fund moneys to begin the construction of a new stadium and plan the construction of the new jail. We'll work with you on projects of this size hand in hand. We have to work together to reach consensus because these two projects will have to be debated seamlessly between us—we have to get it right. Again, our goal will be to secure the best deals for our state and get these projects moving forward as quickly as possible. I am there with you 100 percent of the way.

"Just a little more to share: accountable government. Our state deserves transparent and accountable government—we agree on this. Without good governance, without trust, without ethical standards, how can we truly serve the people and make progress for our state? Corruption from the past must be taken seriously and rooted out. The abuse of power is an affront to all the people of Hawai'i. They tell us that day in and day out. Corruption was the basis of widespread pessimism, which people expressed openly across our state. To be a public servant is to be responsible. It's a privilege, and we carry with this privilege a full responsibility for everyone around us. So I've directed our new attorney general to take seriously corruption and ethics reform in our state and county government. What does this mean? I agree with the recommendations of the House Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct, and it's time to, as they said, 'rebuild integrity and trust in government.' I look forward to working with the Legislature in every way on taking a course of action, and I will sign any common-sense legislation that achieves anything meaningful from ethics reform standards in our state government. I am there, again, with you 100 percent of the way.

"So, as you can see, we'll hold everyone in Hawai'i to this high standard of ethics and accountability, and the federal government also and its institutions are no exception. We must hold the U.S. Navy accountable for the environmental disaster at Red Hill and shut it down for good. To be blunt, Hawai'i must never again risk any leaks or spills of any toxic substance into our water supply. This means that any entity or organization that wants to operate in our state must fully understand, respect, and comply with the absolute commitment that Hawai'i will not tolerate pollution of our water. The current oversight of Red Hill is not strong enough; I just need to be direct about this. Like so many citizens, I was not satisfied with last week's presentation from the Navy and the EPA, and I say that with respect. The Navy needs to be 100 percent transparent with us and open with the public and their elected leaders, which is all of us in this room. To be specific on how we'll approach this, our administration intends to approach Red Hill like we dealt with the pandemic: with continued monitoring, continued updates, continued analysis, and transparent updates so people can see what is actually happening. Enhanced oversight, these frequent updates, and constant communication about the draining of the tanks, the quality of our water around them in the community, and the progress to permanently close Red Hill will all be led by our deputy director of Health in partnership—in partnership—with the Board of Water Supply's leadership, and I will be there every step of the way beside them. So, forgive me, get used to some more white boards on these matters.

"Finally, I tasked our attorney general with a real problem: to address a chilling reality that was described in the Missing and Murdered Native Hawaiian Women and Girls Task Force report, which found that Native Hawaiian girls and women were experiencing gender-based violence at rates disproportionate to any other population. The very recognition of this matter is a critical first step toward reckoning with the depth of this horrifying issue, and we're committed in our attorney general's office to providing the resources to end these crimes against Native Hawaiian women—thank you, Anne, for leading this charge.

"When it comes to governance, sunlight, open windows, and plenty of fresh air are the best disinfectants we have. (Don't freak out here.) This is why I agree with the call from the Civil Beat Law Center for our administration and their partners: Our government documents have to be easily accessible and available and virtually cost-free to obtain. We're going to make that happen in our administration. We need to build trust and to do what we can to be open and transparent all the time and

accountable to the public; that's a commitment I give from our administration.

"A culture of public service: Over the last few weeks, the Legislature has conducted many important informational briefings with our new cabinet and nominees. As we lean into our first legislative session together, this administration comes to you in a spirit of full collaboration—you have my cell phone. Our nominees are stepping forward in a time of great adversity. Times are tough; you know that as elected officials. They are willing to dedicate themselves heart and soul to the work of the people of Hawai'i. Several critical members of our cabinet and our government will require, absolutely, confirmation by the Senate in the coming weeks; thank you, colleagues, for that work. But government in Hawai'i cannot function without these people, without qualified and dedicated people—a corps of public servants to administer all that we come up with together, to implement our mandates and priorities, all the work that you will do in these next hundred days. So I extend my gratitude to our cabinet nominees, who have stepped up to serve; they are leaders in their fields; they have great experience. They are often willing to sacrifice enormous time with their families and other professional opportunities for a life now of public service. So I'd like to especially congratulate and welcome our many new women and Native Hawaiian leaders. They will smash the remaining glass ceilings of public service, and I am honored to sweep up the debris behind them. I want you to know I've set a high standard for all of our nominees. None of us—none of us—can actually meet all of the expectations of us as legislators, but they're already meeting with you; they're exceeding my expectations as a new governor because of how hard they work and how much they care. The Senate will now vet them and confirm them on their ability to do the job, I hope. There are moments when nominees can become collateral damage from potential disputes that have gone way back for us politically, though we've done what we can to heal any rifts that we ever had. But their ability to work and their commitment to getting things done in Hawai'i is critical. I would say this: Any conflict, chronic or acute, and dysfunction amongst branches of government is not going to be good for any of us, especially when it doesn't serve the interest of the people. I need these folks working. I nominated them because they can get the job done in their disciplines, and we will work together to make sure that happens, so I ask you to let them do just that. Mahalo for considering all of these nominees. Now, with due diligence, I ask that you confirm them, but I will work with you day and night to make sure we are a responsive, powerful, impactful government. They will make Hawai'i proud, they're making me proud, and they, like you—they, like you—are public servants. So we ask each other to respect our team, your teams as they step forward into these roles. This is Hawai'i's team. Thank you for this consideration.

"Our dream and our destiny: Today we find ourselves at a crossroads, a turning point in our history. We face enormous challenges as a state, and the strain of these challenges is slowly eroding the hopes and the dreams of our people. Thousands of families are voting with their feet, choosing to leave our islands in search of affordable housing and economic opportunity. Thousands more live in our streets, suffering without help, without hope, despairing for a better tomorrow. Climate change and industrial pollution threaten to permanently degrade our land and resources. These are tragedies which must not stand by and be witnessed idly without doing everything in our power to change. Ultimately, we're not going to be judged by our words or our rhetoric; we're going to be judged by our actions and our accomplishments. How will we secure the health of our state? How will we nurture the integrity of our people and culture? How will we create the quality of life that we desire? We will do it together, as one 'ohana united by our shared values. We must provide economic relief that I described and restore hope

to our people. We must restore the health of our land and our water. We must redeem the promise of Hawai'i. In pursuit of these goals, here and now, we commit ourselves to four years of decisive action, making progress every single day, and never giving up. Hawai'i's people deserve ambitious goals, big dreams, and bold action. 'The less foresighted may label us dreamers for expressing what may be regarded as overly grandiose thoughts.' Governor Burns said that. 'But dream we must, as we must pursue these dreams with vigor and energy, if we are to attain the greatness that is so patently the destiny of Hawai'i and its people.' Governor Burns was right. Hawai'i's destiny is greatness: a greatness born of shared values; a greatness of family, community, and love; of rich diversity, tolerance, and unity; of commitment, responsibility, and hope; of reverence for our natural and cultural heritage and our shared history. We are the inheritors of this dream and this destiny. Together, we will fulfill our destiny. Together, we will realize our dreams. And together, we will live up to the promise of Hawai'i. Mahalo, and thank you for the honor to serve."

Senate President Ronald D. Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Green. I would like to cite two specific examples of how I will commit my personal support in working with you going forward. I have never made the top 10 best dressed list in any kind of fashion competition, but I want you to know that I chose the tie with intentionality this morning, and it's buried in the leis, but it's a green tie for Governor Green and the Green Plan going forward as showing a sign of my support.

"The second is when the governor talks about 100 percent renewable as the goal. Currently, in my district, the islands of Kaua'i and Ni'ihau, they are in for a permit for a pumped storage energy plan out in West Kaua'i. If approved, by 2025, Kaua'i will have achieved the 90 percent renewable energy provision to the grid on Kaua'i. The goal is attainable, and my personal commitment is not to stop to take care of my district, Governor Green, but to continue to have Kaua'i work with you and your team to bring those kinds of numbers to the rest of the state.

"Last Wednesday, when we convened in the Senate, I wanted to be cautious, and we opened at 60 percent and invited cabinet members, the military, and the consular corps, but we had no one from the private sector on our floor. So, in closing, I would like to look to the private sector people who are here today. When the pandemic hit and we were faced with what seemed like an insurmountable challenge, you responded in such an incredible way and so quickly, with nonprofit leadership from Hawai'i Community Foundation, all of the banks putting aside the competition for customers and pooling their resources to help us, the hospitals putting aside their competitive issues and working together for all of the people of Hawai'i, and I appreciate that I have a chance to say to all of the private sector businesses, the nonprofits, and, most importantly, each of you have stories of the unsung heroes in your communities—individuals who stepped forward during the pandemic and helped others in their community to make sure that nobody was left behind: a big thank you.

"And I commit on behalf of the Senate, and I am confident of the commitment of the House, that we will replicate what we did together in collaboration during the pandemic. The challenges that the governor has outlined are greater than any one of us individually could overcome by ourself, and it's only in that collaboration that we will succeed. So, Governor, you have the full support of the Senate as we go forward."

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 9:00 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fourth Day.

At this time, Senator Kanuha welcomed Martha Saenz, National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) state liaison for Hawai'i, who was seated in the gallery.

The Chair added that Senator Lee had taken over the latter and that he would also serve as the Senate's liaison to NCSL. JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2023, was called to order at 10:05 a.m. by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

Tarnas and Lauren Matsumoto, on behalf of the House of Representatives, to escort the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Senator Michelle N. Kidani and Representative Linda Ichiyama presented Chief Justice Recktenwald with lei.

The President then presented to the members of the Thirty-Second Legislature and guests the Honorable Mark E. Recktenwald, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i.

Chief Justice Recktenwald addressed the Joint Session as follows:

“President Kouchi, Speaker Saiki, Governor Green and First Lady Jaime Green, Lieutenant Governor Luke and Second

Gentleman Michael Luke, members of the Senate and House, former governor John Waihe'e and Ms. Lynn Waihe'e, former governor Linda Lingle, members of the Consular Corps and the Royal Order of Kamehameha, distinguished guests, family, and friends: Good morning and aloha. After all the challenges of the pandemic, it's indeed a blessing to be back here in person. Mahalo to President Kouchi and his team—the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Clerk's office, everyone who makes this event happen—for welcoming us into this beautiful chamber. An event was held this past Sunday that brought such pride and joy to our state: the running of the Eddie Aikau Big Wave Invitational. I am honored that we are joined here today by Eddie's brother, Clyde Aikau, who organized this epic event, and I'd like to ask him to please stand and be recognized.

“The Judiciary 'ohana is made up of 1,700 dedicated and hard-working members. As chief justice, I am proud to be one of them. I thank the Legislature for this opportunity to tell our story, to explain how we are advancing the cause of justice and serving our community. To Governor Green: We are eager to collaborate with your administration and are encouraged by your focus on homelessness and mental illness in our community. I wish to recognize my two friends and colleagues Justice Paula Nakayama and Justice Michael Wilson. They are retiring this year after serving a combined total of over 50 years in the Judiciary. Would they please stand so we can recognize their outstanding contributions to our state? On a sad note, I wish to acknowledge the recent passing of two beloved members of the Judiciary 'ohana: my predecessor, Chief Justice Ronald T.Y. Moon, and Judge Darolyn Lendio Heim. As the first person of Korean ancestry to serve as chief justice on any American court, CJ Moon helped shape the Judiciary into the institution it is today. Judge Lendio Heim made her mark in district court by taking the court out into the community to reach those in need. We dearly miss them both.

“Public service is the lifeblood of the Judiciary. It defines who we are as an institution. The Judiciary's role in our democracy is different from the other branches of government, but we share the common goal of serving the public. Our core mission is to decide cases fairly and impartially in accordance with the law, but our work doesn't end when the gavel falls. We implement programs to address the root causes of recidivism, such as drug use and mental illness, and to respond to other urgent community needs. We embrace this expanded role. Like everyone else, the pandemic tested us, but we have emerged as a stronger, more resilient institution. We have harnessed new technologies to make us more accessible. We're forging new partnerships to make our community safer. We're expanding programs to support vulnerable children and families. And we're improving access to justice, nurturing diversity, and promoting civic engagement. I look forward to sharing these priorities with you today.

“The pandemic created immense challenges to a court system accustomed to conducting business in person. Despite personal hardships, our judges and staff have always met those challenges and kept providing justice to our community. I want to thank our chief judges—Lisa Ginoza, Mark Browning, Peter Cahill, Bob Kim, and Randal Valenciano—for their leadership. But it is truly a team effort, and I would ask all the members of the Judiciary 'ohana here in attendance today to stand and be recognized for keeping the Judiciary strong; please stand. We learned from the pandemic. We could not meet in person, so we harnessed new technologies to conduct proceedings remotely. Instead of having to miss work, people can now appear in a traffic infraction case by simply using their phone. Since the pandemic began, we've held more than half a million remote hearings, and this number is rapidly climbing. We also started an eReminder service and have sent more than 24,000 texts and emails to notify parties of upcoming court dates. Guess what happened? The appearance rate has significantly increased and

is now almost 90 percent in O'ahu District Court. We are also more transparent. The Hawai'i Supreme Court now livestreams all of our oral arguments, and more than 17,000 people have tuned in. And last April, we made electronic filing available 24/7 for all courts throughout our system—a huge milestone—by adding family court civil cases. In short, we have created modern courts that use new technologies to meet the needs of a community accustomed to doing business online.

“In his Opening Day speech, Speaker Saiki said the *Sesame Street* word of the day was ‘cooperation.’ Indeed, the pandemic demonstrated the importance of partnerships—working together with others—to achieve far more than we could do on our own. When the pandemic hit, there were predictions that there would be thousands of evictions, a literal tsunami, but that didn't happen. One big reason why is because the Legislature enacted Act 57, which required eviction cases to go to mediation. It was a win-win for both landlords and tenants. It kept people in their homes while treating landlords fairly. Statewide, over 85 percent of the 1,600 cases mediated were settled without going to court. And, here on O'ahu, 85 percent of the settlements resulted in tenants remaining in their homes. Mahalo to Representatives Troy Hashimoto and Nadine Nakamura for crafting Act 57, and our district court judges, the bar, and mediation providers for implementing it. Act 57 expired last year, but we look forward to working with the Legislature to establish a similar program going forward.

“Hale Hilina'i is another example of a successful partnership. If you've driven up Piikoi Street recently, you've seen it: a gleaming, new 20-story tower. It provides both 200 affordable rental units and critical resources for juveniles. We could not have completed this innovative project without the Legislature's cooperation, and particularly that of Speaker Saiki, and our partner, the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation. This new facility symbolizes the Judiciary's commitment to prevention and healing for at-risk youth. It enables us to intervene earlier and connect youth and their families with meaningful, culturally responsive services. In short, it will empower at-risk youth to forge a better future. The new Wahiawā Civic Center, which will house the Wahiawā District Court and probation offices, is another multi-use project that will provide much-needed benefits to the community. Mahalo to Senator Donovan Dela Cruz for having the vision for this project.

“Our core mission is deciding cases. Last year, we resolved more than 92,000 criminal cases, 35,000 civil cases, and 13,000 family court cases, not to mention several hundred thousand traffic and parking infractions. Deciding that many cases gives us unique insights into the challenges facing the community, and we use these insights to find ways to help people and identify broader solutions. We can keep our community safer by addressing the root causes that bring people into the criminal justice system. The rates of serious mental illness and substance use disorders are four to seven times higher for those in jail than the general population, and many inmates suffer from both conditions. Yet these individuals often cycle repeatedly in and out of incarceration without access to needed services and treatment. We must stop that revolving door.

“One answer is treatment courts. They use intense supervision and a team approach to break the cycle of recidivism. From our groundbreaking Girls Court to our Drug, Mental Health, and Veterans Treatment Courts, we have developed specialized programs that enable participants to overcome deep-seated challenges and lead productive lives. Building on this success, the Legislature last session approved funding for Women's Court. It recognizes the simple fact that women experience very different pathways to criminal involvement than men. Women in prison are 80 to 90 percent more likely to have extensive histories of trauma, such as sexual

or physical abuse. In just six months, our Women's Court team, led by Judge Trish Morikawa, has developed programs tailored to address women's needs, collaborated with treatment providers, and selected participants. We are excited to announce that Women's Court will officially go live later this afternoon. Mahalo to Judge Mark Browning for having the vision for Women's Court, and to the Women's Legislative Caucus for its support, and, in particular, Representative Linda Ichiyama and Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke. Mahalo also to the Women's Prison Project, a grassroots group organized by former governor Linda Lingle, that supported Women's Court and other legislation focusing on the special needs of women in the criminal justice system.

“Homelessness. We see it around us every day: people in makeshift tents lining the sidewalk, in parks, and at beaches—indeed, right outside this building. I'd bet that for many legislators here, it is the number one concern voiced by your constituents. We know there are no simple solutions, and no branch of government can hope to address homelessness on its own. But the Judiciary is committed to doing our part to find more effective solutions. Our Community Outreach Court represents a novel approach that has achieved positive results. The court focuses on nonviolent individuals who are houseless or on the verge of becoming houseless and who have pending matters for minor offenses. Participants agree to perform community service to resolve those matters and are matched with service providers who assist them in obtaining housing, mental health and drug treatment, and other services. Community Outreach Court is unique in that teams go out into the community, sometimes tent to tent, to find participants to enroll, and the court itself travels to convene where those in need live. More than 465 individuals have completed the outreach court program, 7,600 cases have been cleared, and 5,600 hours of community service have been completed. We are holding Community Outreach Court on O'ahu in Wai'anae, Kāne'ohe, and Kaka'ako; and on Maui in Kihei; and we plan to expand the court to Waikīkī.

“In 2019, we held a summit that identified major shortcomings in how people suffering from mental illness are treated in the criminal justice system. It simply makes no sense to hold in custody for months nonviolent petty misdemeanor defendants who are incompetent only to release them back to the streets with no ongoing treatment or services. The Legislature responded by passing Act 26, giving those offenders the chance to obtain treatment, rather than having them languish in custody, and I appreciate Representative Della Au Belatti and Senator Joy San Buenaventura for their work on Act 26. In the short time since it was enacted, the state has saved over \$8.5 million due to reduced incarceration and state hospital costs, over 70 defendants have been discharged and linked to services, and more than 25 have received an extended commitment for treatment. We should build on that success and consider diverting other nonviolent individuals with mental illness.

“All of us—the Legislature, the executive branch, and the Judiciary—are strongly committed to resolving the mental health emergency afflicting our community. Let's seize the opportunity and work together. Let's invest in resources such as mental health drop-off centers and crisis stabilization units successfully used in Arizona and Miami to get people appropriate treatment away from the criminal justice system. Let's explore all options to get treatment for those who need it. Let's join forces to find more effective solutions.

“Family court is where hope, healing, and new beginnings occur. It's where the profound impact of our expanding role in providing essential services can most clearly be seen. Reducing the detention of minors has been a critical focus of the family courts. Almost all of the minors in the juvenile justice system

are themselves victims of abuse and trauma. Research shows that placing them in detention often inflicts additional harm, which can spiral into more serious offenses. Our reforms, which have been underway for more than a decade, focus on detaining youth only when necessary for public safety, and diverting the others into appropriate supervision and treatment. These efforts have been a resounding success. We have drastically reduced the number of juveniles held in detention while enhancing public safety. In the last 15 years, the number of juveniles admitted to secure detention or committed to the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility has dropped by more than 80 percent. But juvenile crime did not go up—quite the opposite; there’s been an 85 percent reduction in juvenile felony petitions. But there is one statistic that exemplifies the tremendous progress we’ve made: Last June, for the first time ever, there were no girls detained at the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility. You cannot do better than zero.

“The pandemic was particularly hard on our state’s students. Many faced obstacles to participating meaningfully in classes. Our Truancy Court program is helping students who aren’t attending school to get back on track. The key is early intervention. Our juvenile probation officers engage with students, parents, and counselors to resolve the issues causing students to miss school. These early interventions are highly successful in getting students back to attending classes, and only rarely are formal court proceedings required. From its start at Wai’anae Intermediate, the Truancy Court program has expanded to other middle schools with the goal of spreading further as resources allow. Family court is also targeting absenteeism in elementary schools and is currently working with the families of 88 students at eight schools. I thank Judges Matthew Viola, Rebecca Copeland, Jessi Hall, and Darien Nagata for all those efforts on these initiatives.

“To ensure the public’s trust, courts must be transparent and accessible, judges should reflect the diversity of the communities they serve, and the public must understand the Judiciary’s role in our democracy. So how are we building trust? First, we must ensure that everyone’s voice is heard. We’ve established self-help centers across the state where volunteer attorneys provide free legal information or assistance to people in civil cases who otherwise would have to navigate the system alone. Over the past decade, there have been more than 35,000 self-help consultations at little or no cost to the public, and remote consultations added during the pandemic have expanded the centers’ reach. We could not provide this critical resource without the steadfast support of the Access to Justice Commission, the Hawaii State Bar Association, the Legal Aid Society of Hawai’i, the county bar associations, and the hundreds of attorneys who have donated their time. We have an absolutely amazing Access to Justice movement in Hawai’i, and that’s because of passion of so many people who are dedicated to supporting that effort, and I want to ask all of them in the audience here today that I just mentioned to please stand to be recognized.

“We must ensure that ‘ōlelo Hawai’i can flourish in our courts. We recently hired a Hawaiian language coordinator, and I thank Senator Karl Rhoads for his support of that position. One of the first projects she will tackle is to make foundational legal documents, our constitution, key cases, and statutes, readily available in ‘ōlelo Hawai’i.

“Public trust is also bolstered by a judiciary that reflects the diversity of the communities we serve. Here in Hawai’i, our merit-based judicial selection system has enabled us to secure highly qualified judges from many different backgrounds. The Senate is a crucial component of the selection process, and I thank President Kouchi and the members of the Senate for their commitment to that process. Here’s one important sign of the progress we’ve made on diversity: I am pleased to report that,

as of today, 49 percent of our full-time judges are women. And our judges reflect Hawai’i’s rich diversity of races, ethnicities, and backgrounds. In cultivating the values of diversity and inclusion, we post demographic information about our judges and mandate implicit bias training for all judges and staff.

“Finally, trust requires public understanding of the importance of a strong and independent judiciary. Our Courts in the Community program promotes that awareness by holding supreme court oral arguments live, in actual cases, at high schools across the state. Over the past decade, more than 5,000 students have participated. Just last month, we convened at Lahainaluna High School with over 300 enthusiastic high school students from Maui, Moloka’i, and Lāna’i. The energy in that gym was amazing! We’re so grateful to the lawyers who volunteered their time to teach the students about the case, and I want to thank each and every one of them for their commitment—thank you very much.

“Courts in the Community is part of a much broader effort. The Supreme Court has created the PACE Commission to ‘promote and advance civic education for students and citizens throughout Hawai’i.’ The Commission, led by Chief Judge Lisa Ginoza and Representative Amy Perruso, recently hosted a free, three-day academy for high school students on Maui. They learned about the legal system, community involvement, and law-related careers. Mahalo to the American Judicature Society and its chair, Larry Okinaga, for supporting the PACE Commission, and to the William S. Richardson School of Law, the University of Hawai’i Maui College, and the Maui County Bar Association for making the Academy such a success.

“Although we are proud of what we have accomplished, much remains to be done. We thank the Legislature for your past funding support. As we move forward, we respectfully ask for funding that will enable the Judiciary to provide justice and meet our community’s needs. For our operating budget, we are requesting a modest increase of 4.4 percent in the coming fiscal year, and 4 percent the year after. Most critically, we are seeking restoration of funding for more than 30 positions statewide that were defunded early in the pandemic. We curtailed our budget requests during the pandemic and did everything we could to stretch our limited resources, but without restoration of funding, our ability to provide needed services is severely compromised.

“We’re also seeking a new district court judge in the First Circuit to provide stability and continuity for rural courts on O’ahu; funding for our programs in the community, including our new juvenile resource center at Hale Hilina’i; and funding for court-appointed counsel, guardians ad litem, and to permit children to stay with their mothers undergoing residential treatment. Our capital improvement requests total \$16 million, and they include fixtures and equipment for the new Wahiawā District Court and funds for essential repair and maintenance for our aging courthouses to keep the roofs from leaking and the elevators working. These requests reflect what we need to restore the services impaired by the pandemic and to forge ahead with new initiatives to serve the community. We sincerely appreciate the Legislature’s consideration.

“In sum, the Judiciary is moving forward from the pandemic a stronger and more resilient institution, applying the lessons we learned and building on the partnerships we formed. We have harnessed new technologies to make us more accessible. We are expanding programs to reach and assist vulnerable children and families. And we are raising awareness of the Judiciary’s critical role in our democracy. We are doing everything in our power to provide justice and serve our community.

“This past Sunday, in monster waves with 50-foot faces, the Eddie Aikau Big Wave Invitational was held at Waimea Bay. The contest honors Eddie Aikau, the legendary lifeguard and

waterman, who risked, and ultimately gave, his life to help others. Eddie’s legacy is captured in the simple phrase ‘Eddie would go.’ Just as Eddie would go, the three branches of government must also be bold and courageous in finding solutions to the daunting challenges facing our community. Each branch must, of course, be faithful to the separate roles we play in our democracy, but we can still collaborate to find solutions. On issues such as homelessness and mental illness, the ideas are out there, the resources are out there, the will is out there. Let’s dive in and find the way forward, together.

“Once again, mahalo to the Legislature for inviting me to be here today, and best wishes for a productive session. Mahalo and aloha.”

House of Representatives Speaker Scott K. Saiki then rose and stated:

“Thank you, Chief Justice Recktenwald. I just told the chief justice that his speech was better than my Opening Day speech and certainly better than the Senate President’s Opening Day speech.

“Before adjourning this session, I’d just like to make three brief shoutouts. First, to Chief Justice Recktenwald: I just want to let everybody know that we really respect the chief justice, his leadership, and his advocacy for the Judiciary, and we look forward to working with him this year and next year, so thank you, Chief Justice. As the CJ mentioned, we’d like to also do a shoutout to all of the judges and judiciary staff and community partners who we know have worked so hard throughout the pandemic. We know that you worked under severe constraints and limitations that were exacerbated by the need to balance due process, so thank you for all of your work throughout the pandemic. And, finally, we’d like to do a shoutout and thank you to our retiring justices, Justice Wilson and Justice Nakayama. In particular, I’d like to just mention something about Justice Nakayama because, from afar, I have developed so much respect for her, and I know that, after 30 years, she leaves a body of work that will endure because it is reasoned and practical, and leaves us with a framework to solve problems in our state. So thank you to both Justice Wilson and Justice Nakayama.”

At 10:41 a.m., Speaker Saiki declared the Joint Session adjourned.

Friday, January 27, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senator Fevella who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifth Day.

At this time, Senator Dela Cruz welcomed Maksim Yervandyan, who is from Armenia and currently a junior attending Kailua High School. TWENTY-SECOND DAY

Tuesday, February 21, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai‘i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:32 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Ihara introduced legislative process participant and national committeeman for the majority party, Mr. Bart Dame, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Gabbard introduced students and teachers from DreamHouse ‘Ewa Beach Charter School, located in Kalaeloa. Seated in the gallery were seventh-grade student leaders Alinna, Zion, Alizay, Ronson, Genesis, Miah, Hennessy, Reef, Pookela, Anaiah, Kiersten, Jaedin, Isaias, Layton, Tala, Rev, Dakota, and Kamryn, and their two teachers, Bianca Mina and Chayanne Koko.

Senator Kanuha, on behalf of the Senate, welcomed the parents of Tate Cadang, Mike and Vanessa Cadang, who were present in the gallery with their daughter. Senator Kanuha thanked Tate Cadang, a staff member of Senate President’s office, for the moment of contemplation she had offered prior to the Senate’s floor session.

Senator Keohokalole introduced UH journalism intern Keya Rivera, who was joined in the gallery by legislative attorney Randall Wat.

Senator Keohokalole then honored and celebrated ‘Aha Pūnana Leo, and presented the following remarks:

“In 1983, ‘Aha Pūnana Leo was created as a grassroots effort with the sole purpose of reviving ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i. Now, ‘Aha Pūnana Leo serves as a local, national, and international model for language revitalization.

“Over the past decades, ‘Aha Pūnana Leo established and built numerous programs throughout the islands, helped to lift a 90-year ban on teaching Hawaiian language in public and private schools, advocated for other indigenous people, and raised awareness about the consequences of the loss of indigenous languages. Today, we honor 40 years of revitalizing ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i.

“Mr. President, I yield my time to my colleague from Kona.”

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues, it is my honor to introduce Dr. Kauano Kamanā, if you could please rise, and hold your applause till the end of this presentation. Born in Honolulu and raised in Kalihi on O‘ahu and Kalama‘ula on Moloka‘i, she attended Kamehameha Schools in Kapālama and studied Hawaiian language under Larry Kimura at the University of Hawai‘i. In 2010, she earned a PhD in Hawaiian and indigenous language and culture revitalization from the University of Hawai‘i at Hilo. She was the first person of Native Hawaiian ancestry to receive a PhD from the College of Hawaiian Language.

“At the University of Hawai‘i at Hilo, Dr. Kamanā is an associate professor in the College of Hawaiian Language and program coordinator for Kula Maui Ola, the Hawaiian Medium Laboratory Schools, and serves as the president for Ke Kula ‘o Nāwahīokalani‘ōpu‘u, a Hawaiian immersion laboratory school for pre-kindergarten to grade 12 students in Kea‘au. Please help me welcome Dr. Kauano Kamanā to the Hawai‘i State Senate.

“Mr. President, may I now yield my time to my colleague from Hilo?”

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues, it is my honor to introduce Larry Lindsey Kimura—may you please rise? Aloha, Larry.

“Mr. Kimura grew up in Waimea, South Kohala, during the 1940s with his grandparents being among the last Native Hawaiian speakers of their community. He has taught Hawaiian language for over 40 years at the University of Hawai‘i and continues his work at Ka Haka ‘Ula o Ke‘elikōlani College of Hawaiian Language at UH Hilo. He is a co-founder and current board member at the ‘Aha Pūnana Leo. Often described as the grandfather of Hawaiian language, Kimura’s work can be traced back to the conception of core foundational educational programs in the 1980s that launched the rebirth of the Hawaiian language. Please help me welcome Larry Lindsey Kimura to the Hawai‘i State Senate.

“Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Kailua?”

Senator Lee rose to present the following remarks:

“Today, I have the distinct honor and privilege of introducing the next honoree, Aunty Lolena Nicholas—please rise and be recognized. Aunty Lolena is a mānaleo (first-language Hawaiian speaker—one of the rarest of all) from the island of Ni‘ihau who has dedicated her life to perpetuating ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i and was one of the original mānaleo to teach at ‘Aha Pūnana Leo.

“Throughout her 30-year career, she has had a hand in teaching ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i to thousands of students. Many of her students have moved on to be leaders in their own communities and places of work. As ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i continues to grow, there are more and more people who have been influenced positively by Aunty Lolena’s life work of keeping the Hawaiian language alive and thriving. She recently retired but is here with us today, so please help me welcome Aunty Lolena Nicholas to the Hawai‘i State Senate.

“Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Pearl City?”

Senator Aquino rose to present the following remarks:

“Today, I have the honor in introducing Nāmaka Rawlins. As she is unavailable to be here today, in her stead is Kanoe Fujiwara. She is here to represent Nāmaka Rawlins.

“Nāmaka is the former executive director of ‘Aha Pūnana Leo, serving nearly 20 years in that capacity, and the past chair of the Native Hawaiian Education Council. She is currently the director of strategic collaborations and serves on the senior leadership team.

“Throughout her career, Nāmaka has been at the forefront of the language revitalization movement on many levels: teaching, coordinating programs on five islands, and advocating for public policy that supports the preservation of indigenous languages. Nāmaka believes it is important that a representative of the comprehensive indigenous system of education is on the Education Council to express the needs of our Hawaiian-speaking children and families at the local and national levels. Colleagues, please help me welcome Nāmaka Rawlins, represented by Kanoe Fujiwara—please give her a hand, everyone.

“Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Wai‘anae?”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

“Our next honoree, Dr. Keawe Lopes, has been a member at ‘Aha Pūnana Leo since 2011. He is unavailable to be here today; however, Ka‘iulani Laehā will be representing him—may you please rise?”

“Dr. Keawe Lopes is a professor at Kawaihuelani Center for Hawaiian Language at UH Mānoa and the coordinator of Ka Waihona A Ke Aloha, Ka Papahana Ho‘ohenomele. His intimacy with the Hawaiian language serves as a foundation in his hālau, Ka Lā ‘Ōnohi Mai o Ha‘eha‘e, which he opened with his wife in 2005. Dr. Lopes is also a recording artist and Nā Hōkū Hanohano nominee in both the Hawaiian Language Album and Haku Mele Song Composer categories. Colleagues, please help me welcome Dr. Keawe Lopes and his ‘ohana to the Hawai‘i State Senate.

“Mr. President, may I yield my time to my colleague from Mililani?”

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

“Our last honoree seated in the gallery, I would like to introduce Ka‘iulani Laehā—may you please rise? She is the current chief executive officer of ‘Aha Pūnana Leo.

“She is a graduate of Kamehameha Schools and holds a bachelor of science in business administration with a major in finance as well as a master of business administration. Ka‘iulani was fortunate to grow up at a time when ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i was once again being used and heard in pockets of Hawai‘i, greatly attributed to the efforts of the ‘Aha Pūnana Leo founders and pioneers of the Hawaiian language movement. Ka‘iulani was drawn by the continued relevance of our language and is now engaged in ensuring the legacy of our ‘ōlelo Hawai‘i, the core of what makes Hawai‘i special to us all.

“Senate President, I would like to ask permission to acknowledge our honorees with their lei and certificates, and may we have a hand for Ka‘iulani Laehā?”

The Chair commented to Dr. Kimura that the members were thrilled he had been blessed with great health and had been able to witness in person the recognition of his life’s work. The Chair then thanked Dr. Kimura.

As we were about to issue our advice in response to your memorandum, your office contacted us on August 23, 2022 and informed us there were other statutes similar to section 304A-2101, HRS in that they also imposed budgetary appropriation requirements on the Legislature. Your office then requested we include in our advice, consideration of these other statutes.

I. Section 304A-2101, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

We first focus on the original subject of the advice request, section 304A-2101, HRS. Section 304A-2101(a) provides that the Legislature shall appropriate to the University general fund budget appropriations in an amount "not less than three times and not greater than five times the amount of regular tuition and related fee revenues estimated for that fiscal year."

In applying this budgetary formula to fiscal year 2022-2023, we note that the University estimated its regular tuition and related fee revenues to be \$218,970,107.² Consequently, under the section 304A-2101(a)'s budget formula, the University's share should be at least \$656,910,321 and not more than \$1,094,850,535. However, the Legislature only appropriated \$567,098,868.³

Nonetheless, we conclude the Legislature did not violate the statute when it underfunded the University because adherence to the formula is not a requirement. Section 304A-2101 and other similar statutes directing specific appropriations do not require the Legislature to appropriate general funds according to the statutory provisions. There is no effect in the Legislature's failure to comply with statutory mandates such as section 304A-2101 because such sections: (1) require further legislative action to actually appropriate moneys; (2) cannot bind successive Legislatures to make particular appropriations; (3) does not require the Legislature to appropriate a specific amount; and (4) serves only as an intention by the Legislature to appropriate moneys in the future.

A. Section 304A-2101 is not an appropriation.

First, section 304A-2101 does not make an appropriation of general funds. Appropriations are made, not in general law⁴ such as section 304A-2101, but through the

Re: Statutorily Mandated Budget Appropriations

This is in response to your August 1, 2022 memorandum requesting our advice regarding statutes that impose budgetary appropriation requirements on the Legislature. We understand your concern is what happens when such statutory mandates are not met. In particular, you cited section 304A-2101,¹ Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS"), which requires the Legislature to appropriate general funds to the University of Hawaii ("University") based

¹ Section 304A-2101 states:

§304A-2101. General fund budget appropriations; formulation. (a) The general fund budget appropriations for the university shall be an amount not less than three times and not greater than five times the amount of regular tuition and related fee revenues estimated for that fiscal year.

(b) Any general fund budget appropriation for the university for operating purposes for any fiscal year shall include the consideration of:

- (1) The fiscal condition of the State;
- (2) Enrollment;
- (3) Access to educational opportunity;
- (4) The mix of resident and nonresident students; and
- (5) Community service and noninstruction programs.

(c) No revenue received by the university pursuant to the University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund established under section [304A-2153] may be used by the governor or the director of finance as a justification for reducing any budget request or allotment to the university unless the university requests such a reduction.

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Section 304A-2101 does not authorize the expenditure of moneys for the University. It merely provides a formula for the general fund budget appropriation for the University. While section 304A-2101 describes the components of the budget formula, it is not an expenditure authority. The general fund appropriation for the University for fiscal year 2022-2023 was made by the Legislature through the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2022.

Thus, a general law like section 304A-2101 is not the vehicle by which general funds are appropriated to the University. section 304A-2101 merely provides guidance to the Legislature regarding the general fund appropriations to the University based on its formula components. It still requires an appropriation by the Legislature in order to be implemented.

B. One Legislature Cannot Bind Another.

Second, section 304A-2101 is not a mandate which requires the appropriation of moneys at the designated levels because "one Legislature may not bind a successor Legislature (or even itself) to make an appropriation."⁶ Town of Milton, 623 N.E.2d at 484. Article III, section 1 of the Hawaii State Constitution states:

⁶ The issue of whether one Legislature may bind another Legislature to appropriate funds has been addressed in other jurisdictions. For example:

1. "[A]bsent a constitutional restriction on the legislative power, one legislature cannot restrict or limit the right of a succeeding legislature to exercise the power of legislation." State ex. rel. Stenberger v. Menge, 344 N.W. 2d 344, 349 (Neb. 1996).
2. "The Legislature cannot, through enactment of an act or statute, bind itself or its successor to make a particular appropriation." Associated Industries v. Secretary of Com., 395 N.E. 2d 262, 286-287 (Mass. 1992) (citations omitted).
3. "One legislature cannot limit the power of successor legislatures to appropriate funds." Fredrick v. Presque Isle Cty. Cir. Judge, 476 N.W. 2d 142, 148 (Mich. 1991) (citations omitted).
4. "One legislature cannot impose a legal obligation to appropriate money upon succeeding legislatures." Maine State Housing Authority v. Depositors Trust Co., 278 A. 2d 699, 707 (Me. 1971) (citation omitted).
5. "The authority of a legislature is limited to the period of its own existence. One general assembly cannot bind a future one." Frost v. State, 172 N.W.2d 575, 583 (Iowa 1969) (citations omitted).
6. One Legislature "cannot tie the hands of its successors, or impose upon them conditions with reference to subjects upon which they have equal power to legislate." Village of North Atlanta v. Cook, 133 S.E. 2d 585, 589 (Ga. 1963) (citations omitted).
7. "One Legislature cannot obligate succeeding Legislatures to make appropriations." Opinion of the Justices, 79 A.2d 753, 756 (Me. 1951).

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budget and appropriation process. Town of Milton v. Commonwealth, 623 N.E.2d 482, 484 (Mass. 1993). Article VII, section 5 of the Hawaii State Constitution provides that "[n]o public money shall be expended except pursuant to appropriations made by law." In addition, article VII, section 9 of the Hawaii State Constitution prescribes the appropriation process.⁵ Among other things, article VII, section 9 of the Hawaii State Constitution requires appropriation measures to be submitted to the Governor by bill.

An appropriation is the setting "apart from the public revenue a certain sum of money for a specified object, in such manner that the executive officers of the government are authorized to use that money, and no more, for that object, and for no other." Opinion of Justices, 79 N.E.2d 881, 882 (Mass. 1948) (citations omitted). See also Op. Att'y Gen. 72-6 (1972) (a bill constituted an appropriations bill if it authorized the expenditure of money and stipulated the amount, manner and purpose of the various items of expenditure).

⁵ Article VII, section 9 of the Hawaii State Constitution provides:

LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS; PROCEDURES; EXPENDITURE CEILING

Section 9. In each regular session in an odd-numbered year, the legislature shall transmit to the governor an appropriation bill or bills providing for the anticipated total expenditures of the State for the ensuing fiscal biennium. In such session, no appropriation bill, except bills recommended by the governor for immediate passage, or to cover the expenses of the legislature, shall be passed on final reading until the bill authorizing operating expenditures for the ensuing fiscal biennium, to be known as the general appropriations bill, shall have been transmitted to the governor.

In each regular session in an even-numbered year, at such time as may be provided by law, the governor may submit to the legislature a bill to amend any appropriation for operating expenditures of the current fiscal biennium, to be known as a supplemental appropriations bill, and bills to amend any appropriations for capital expenditures for the current fiscal biennium, and at the same time the governor shall submit bills or bills providing for any added or changed expenditures that may be required. In each regular session in an even-numbered year, bills may be introduced in the legislature to amend any appropriation or bond authorization act of the current fiscal biennium or prior fiscal periods. In any such session in which the legislature submits to the governor a supplemental appropriations bill, no other appropriation bill, except bills recommended by the governor for immediate passage, or to cover the expenses of the legislature, shall be passed on final reading until such supplemental appropriations bill shall have been transmitted to the governor.

GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURE CEILING

Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, the legislature shall establish a general fund expenditure ceiling which shall limit the rate of growth of general fund appropriations, excluding federal funds received by the general fund, to the estimated rate of growth of the State's economy as provided by law. No appropriations in excess of such ceiling shall be authorized during any legislative session unless the legislature shall, by a two-thirds vote of the members to which each house of the legislature is entitled, set forth the dollar amount and the rate by which the ceiling will be exceeded and the reasons therefor.

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The legislative power of the State shall be vested in a legislature, which shall consist of two houses, a senate and a house of representatives. Such power shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with this constitution or the Constitution of the United States.

Thus, the Legislature has complete legislative authority and may enact legislation as it determines except as limited by the Hawaii State Constitution or the Constitution of the United States. See, e.g., *State ex. rel. Stenbjerg*, 544 N.W.2d at 349; *Opinion of the Justices*, 623 A.2d 1258, 1262 (Me. 1993). Consequently, to read HRS section 304A-2101 as requiring the Legislature to appropriate funds as specified in its provisions would violate article III, section 1 of the Hawaii State Constitution by attempting to restrict the power of a subsequent Legislature to legislate.

The issue of restricting a subsequent Legislature's right to legislate was addressed in the *Opinion of the Justices*, 673 A.2d 693 (Me. 1996). The Supreme Judicial Court of Maine, when asked by the House of Representatives of Maine if the courts would enforce a bill which becomes law, but that law is not followed by subsequent Legislatures, stated:

The answer to this question is clearly in the negative. This bill, if enacted, will be on equal footing with every other law passed by the Legislature: subsequent sessions of the Legislature may choose to follow it, or they may choose to repeal it, either expressly or by implication. See *Manigault v. Springs*, 199 U.S. 473, 487, 26 S.Ct. 127, 133, 50 L.Ed. 274 (1905) (bill requiring Legislature to give direct notice to all interested parties and to publish the notice in a major newspaper, prior to the granting of a private right or privilege by special bill, could be "repealed, amended, or disregarded by the Legislature" and was "not binding upon any subsequent legislature."), cited by *Sierra Club v. Froehlike*, 816 F.2d 205, 215 (5th Cir. 1987) ("courts cannot set aside legislation because it is inconsistent with prior legislation"), cited also in *Peterson v. United States Department of the Interior*, 899 F.2d 799, 808 (9th Cir. 1990) (upholding Congressional alteration of a previously enacted government contract, recognizing "the fundamental principle that Congress always has the power to amend, repeal or ignore legislation passed by earlier congresses"). To read this statute as binding upon future Legislatures is to read it as an attempt to amend the Constitution of the State of Maine through improper means. Such a bill would not be enforced by the courts against future Legislatures.

Id. at 696.

Further, as a matter of statutory construction, we should avoid construing a statute in a manner which would render it unconstitutional when an alternative construction is reasonably presented. *Maine State Housing Authority*, 278 A.2d at 707-708. In this instance, by

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construing section 304A-2101 as advisory in nature, we avoid the constitutional conflict with article III, section 1 of the Hawaii State Constitution, and are able to harmonize the statute with the constitution.

C. Reading Section 304A-2101 as an Appropriation is an Absurd Result.

Third, the Legislature is presumed not to intend an absurd result, and legislation will be construed to avoid, if possible, inconsistency, contradiction, and illogicality. *State v. Malufai*, 80 Hawai'i 126, 137, 906 P.2d 612, 623 (1995) (citation and internal quotation marks omitted). In interpreting a statute, the foremost obligation of the court is to ascertain and give effect to the intention of the Legislature, which is to be obtained primarily from the language contained in the statute itself. *State v. Toyomura*, 80 Hawai'i 8, 18, 904 P.2d 893, 904 (1995) (citation and internal quotation marks omitted). The court may resort to extrinsic aids in determining the legislative intent. One avenue is the use of legislative history as an interpretive tool. 80 Hawai'i at 19, 904 P.2d at 904 (citation and internal quotations marks omitted).

While section 304A-2101 uses the word "shall," it is a directory statute, not a mandatory statute. A statute is directory if the observance of the provision is not necessary to the validity of the proceedings. A statute is mandatory if the failure to follow it will render the proceedings to which it relates illegal and void. *Jack Endo Electric, Inc. v. Lear Siegler, Inc.*, 59 Haw. 612, 585 P.2d 1265, 1269 (1978).

The use of the word "shall" in the statute is not dispositive of the issue of whether the statute is mandatory rather than directory. While the word "shall" is generally regarded as mandatory, in certain situations it may properly be given a directory meaning. In determining whether a statute is mandatory or directory the intention of the legislature must be ascertained. The legislative intent may be determined from a consideration of the entire act, its nature, its object, and the consequences that would result from construing it one way or the other. In general, a statute is directory rather than mandatory if the provisions of the statute do not relate to the essence of the thing to be done or where no substantial rights depend on compliance with the particular provisions and no injury can result from ignoring them.

Id. (citations, internal quotation marks, and ellipsis points omitted).

To determine the Legislature's intent of section 304A-2101, we may look to "the consequences that would result from construing it one way or the other." We conclude that section 304A-2101 is a directory statute because this construction will not render the regular general fund appropriation made to the University illegal and void, the outcome if section 304A-2101 were construed as a mandatory statute.

We have reviewed the list of these statutes and note they appear to be facially similar to section 304A-2101 in that they appear to require the Legislature to appropriate funds to a particular entity and/or for a particular purpose. However, we are reluctant to automatically consider them as having the same effect as section 304A-2101, that is, that they are serve only as expressions of legislative intent and require further legislation to actually appropriate moneys. To reach a determination of each statute would require the same degree of review as was done of section 304A-2101, which included research of the statute's legislative history and of the particular facts and historical treatment of the statute since its enactment.

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D. Section 304A-2101 Represents an Intention of the Legislature.

Fourth, consistent with our reading that section 304A-2101 is a directory statute, we conclude it acts only as an intention by the Legislature to appropriate funds in the future.

In a case similar to our situation, the Michigan Supreme Court determined that statutory language which purported to fiscally bind successive Legislatures only acted as an intention to appropriate, rather than a mandate to do so. *Board of Education of Oakland Schools v. Porter*, 221 N.W.2d 345, 349 (Mich. 1974).

At issue in *Oakland Schools* was a statutory provision which purportedly required the appropriation of moneys in future years to school districts. A year after the statute was enacted, the Michigan Legislature attempted to effectuate this statutory provision by making an appropriation for it. However, the Governor exercised his item veto power and disapproved the appropriation. The Oakland schools then filed suit arguing that the Governor's veto of the subsequent bill did not affect the validity of the existing statute, which, they contended, required the Legislature to appropriate the moneys pursuant to the terms of the statute. *Id.* at 345-346.

The Michigan Supreme Court concluded that the statute at issue expressed only a desire to appropriate in the future. This construction avoids any conflict with the constitutional requirements binding upon both the Legislature and the Governor, and, in our opinion, furthers the comity between these two branches that is necessary for the responsible functioning of the State government.

Id. (emphasis in original).

In summary, to read section 304A-2101 as requiring the Legislature to appropriate funds pursuant to its budget formula would cause the Legislature to be in conflict with the Hawaii State Constitution, render a portion of the general appropriation bill superfluous, create an absurd result, and allow one Legislature to bind a successor Legislature. Thus, section 304A-2101 has no effect to bind the Legislature to a particular level of appropriations and acts only as an intention by the Legislature to appropriate funds in the future.

II. Statutes Similar to Section 304A-2101, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

In addition to section 304A-2101, the Senate Majority Research Office has identified the following HRS sections that require the Legislature to make appropriations for a particular amount (attached):


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As such, while we can agree the other statutes listed above appear to be functionally similar to section 304A-2101, we cannot conclude their effects to be the same without a more in depth analysis of each statute; such a review of almost thirty statutes would exceed the time allowed for this response. We suggest that if there is a continuing concern about these statutes, the Legislature could take action to repeal them.

TWENTY-FOURTH DAY

Thursday, March 2, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:39 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads introduced an old friend, Blane Sardinha, who was joined in the gallery by his friend Lei.

Senator Gabbard noted that Goodwill has been serving people of Hawai'i for more than 60 years and that its mission is to help people reach their full potential and become self-sufficient. Senator Gabbard then acknowledged participants and staff from Goodwill's Ho'olana program, including his baby sister Barbara, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator DeCoite, on behalf of the Maui delegation, welcomed guests from the Self-Advocacy Advisory Council. But they’re far from an outlier—there’s many countries that already have this: Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, Israel, Italy, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, Thailand, Taiwan, Turkey all have 0.05. And then a number of countries have gone even farther: China, Estonia, Poland, Sweden have a 0.02 limit, and Serbia, Japan, and Uruguay have 0.03, so this is far from being an outlier in the broad scheme of things. It will save lives. Mahalo.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Mr. President, I’ve voted consistently in opposition to this, not because I think that people should be driving under the influence—however, I don’t think that by putting a point number is equality for those of us who happen to be less in weight, and I think I’ve made this argument on the floor before. For me, drinking a glass of wine or two glasses of wine will give me probably over 0.05, whereas you, Mr. President, could probably drink six glasses of wine and still not hit the 0.05.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I fully understand Judiciary chair’s concern that this would actually save lives. However, I’d like to also point out that 0.05 is such a low threshold, especially for the young people as the prior speaker has spoken, that we really should consider an intermediary step because people have lost jobs—have lost careers—just for one DUI. And I request that the body consider as this bill moves forward that we don’t have this draconian penalty for such a low threshold. Thank you very much.”

"Thank you Mr. President. I rise in support of S.B. No. 1016 S.D.1 which provides more certainty in maintaining the quality of acute care services at the three state-owned healthcare facilities in Maui County. Act 103, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015 (Act 103), codified at part IV of chapter 323F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, allowed the transfer of the operations and management of the Maui Regional System facilities from the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to one or more private entities or their nonprofit management entities. Since Act 103 required these private entities to be hospitals licensed in the State, the options for possible partners were extremely limited. Ultimately, on January 14, 2016, Maui Health System, A Kaiser Foundation Hospitals LLC, entered into a transfer agreement with the State of Hawaii. In practice, however, certain representations made by Maui Health System to the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation and the Maui Regional System board during the negotiations were not conveyed to the Governor during the process and therefore not reflected in the transfer agreement. This measure expands the choice of private entities to which the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation may

transfer its Maui Regional System facilities and ensures that any representations made by the chosen private entity to the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation is conveyed to the Governor during the negotiation process. I ask my colleagues to vote in support of this measure."

This program enabled an 'earn and learn' glidepath model that delivers online didactic curriculum and hands-on clinical education at a student's place of work. The program is one year long, and CNAs can double their salary if they successfully complete the program.

"This pilot program was launched in January 2023, and serves students through UH Maui College on Maui, Oahu, and Kauai who are employed by Ohana Pacific Health and Kaiser Permanente. There was a huge demand for participation in the program, which ultimately included 40 students. This funding will enable the program to continue and, hopefully, expand to all islands and include more students to meet the demonstrated interest in this expanded opportunity. We always visit Zippy's a lot, but we noticed on the receipt (I don't know if you guys go restaurants a lot, but I do), so, if you guys look on your guys' receipt, there is a kitchen charge. They've been putting this on the bill for a while already, but not everybody checks their bill—they just pay the regular 20 percent, 15 percent, 3 percent, whatever the percent they like pay—but they also charge that penalty while the employees who get their deductions from their minimum wage and the kitchen staff.

"Mr. President, I'm asking my colleagues today to vote 'no' on this bill even though I'm the introducer of the bill because they're already charging us: If you guys look at your guys' bill next time you guys go, there is a percentage of a kitchen charge. They're already taking away money from us while we tipping them, and they're taking money from the servers, and I think that is a misjustice for the servers who serve our community and especially on minimum wages. Thank you, Senate President and colleagues."

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1047 be adopted and S.B. No. 426, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“My district has a number of cesspools that would be affected by this, with no sewer system in sight for the foreseeable future, and without the details as to how my poor district will be able to afford the conversion, I have strong reservations with passing this bill. Thank you very much.”

Senator Richards rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“I echo the sentiments previously. Though I support the concept, I’m concerned about how we’ll actually get this done. Thank you.”

Senator DeCoite rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator DeCoite’s remarks read as follows:

“I am voting with reservations on this bill because it shortens the time for cesspool owners to upgrade, convert, or connect their cesspools.

“With over 80,000 cesspools in the State that need to convert, upgrade, or connect to a sewerage system, we need to give owners the time and support to enable them to make these conversions, and upgrades. The costs for these upgrades can range from \$10,000 up to \$50,000 or even more depending on where the cesspool is located. This will certainly have a huge cost impact on those communities on the neighbor islands and in rural areas. People may simply not have the money to afford these conversions and upgrades.

“The working group should have provided us with the types of assistance we could provide and any alternatives that may be available, instead of just saying we needed to expedite conversions, upgrades, or connections.

“Mahalo”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“It’s going to really affect my community. Most of my community do have cesspools, and there is no near, miles away, tie-in to any sewer system, so that’s going to really affect my community, so at this time, I’m voting ‘no’ on this bill. Thank you, Senate President.”

"Three years before *Roe v. Wade*, in 1970, Hawai'i became the first state to legalize abortion in a bipartisan effort led by Representative Pat Saiki. Today, with an affirmative vote for S.B. 1, the Hawai'i Senate has an opportunity to reaffirm that right. Like our colleagues did 53 years ago, the Hawai'i Senate can stand behind and protect our medical providers from being arrested, subpoenaed, and prosecuted simply for providing safe abortions. By passing S.B. 1, the Hawai'i Senate can vote firmly that we stand by a person's right of privacy and a right of choice. Thank you, and I urge my colleagues to vote affirmatively for S.B. 1."

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"I would just like the words of the previous speaker entered in the Journal as if they were my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) And just glad that we're doubling down on the executive order that was issued by the previous governor to protect our providers. Thank you."

Senator Moriwiki rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Senate Bill 669 proposes to decriminalize the personal use of cannabis. It's premature. Much more work is needed to address the concerns raised by our regulatory agencies. The Legislature decriminalized medical use of marijuana to help those suffering from pain. We acted with compassion and with medical parameters to protect persons from misuse of this drug. But crossing the threshold to personal use of this increasingly potent drug, even for a small amount, is premature. This bill doesn't have the regulatory safeguards for the health and safety of our community. We know the widespread adverse impacts of substance abuse—we struggle to help our homeless, domestically abused because of addiction. This session, we're making more stringent our drunk driving laws and controlling vaping. How does decriminalizing cannabis for personal use fit in with these values? We must ask ourselves if we are enabling the abuse should this bill pass. It makes little sense to use increased tax revenues to justify more drug use. This bill contains serious technical errors and omissions, including the lack of funding. I have other concerns from the attorney general, the prosecutor, the Department of Health, and the Department of Transportation, who testified on this bill in opposition, and I ask that those be entered as part of my remarks in the Senate Journal. I ask my colleagues to vote 'no' on Senate Bill 669. Thank you."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Moriwiki's additional remarks read as follows:

"Advocates say we will increase tax revenues and grow our economy. But at what cost?"

- The Attorney General said it would require significant additional resources just to clear the criminal histories of offenders—currently at 288,000.
- The Honolulu Prosecutor points out that commercially-produced items are now reaching historically high levels of THC – prior to the 1990s, it was less than 2%. Today, popular strains reach as high as concentrated products reaching upwards of 95%. The higher the levels, even a 'small amount' can impair one's thinking and actions.
- The Department of Health said, that even though legalized adult use will be restricted to those aged 21 and older, the human brain continues to develop into the mid-20s and remains vulnerable to detrimental effects, with evidence that adolescents and young adults who use cannabis are more likely than non-users to have suicidal thoughts or

attempt suicide. DOH also raised several concerns regarding fetal development under the influence of THC during pregnancy.

- DOT testified that legalization of cannabis for adult use is associated with a 4.8% increase in traffic fatalities, 5.8% increase in traffic injuries, and increases the odds of being in a traffic collision by 32%. And, among all emergency room visits attributed to specific drugs in 2021, cannabis accounted for more emergency room visits than heroin and fentanyl combined.
- And as for growing our economy, the DCCA points out that Hawaii banks have not provided banking services to cannabis producers because several federal banking laws prohibit banks from engaging in activity with businesses deemed illegal. Additionally, the state's former tax director warned that the department does not have expertise to regulate cannabis and warned that dispensaries would need to pay out taxes in cash because of banking regulations.

Finally, advocates use Colorado's revenues generated from taxes and fees as a model for our legalizing marijuana, but it has also been reported that for every dollar of tax revenue generated, Colorado spends \$4.50 counteracting the legalization effects. So I ask, shouldn't we do a cost/benefit analysis before we plunge into decriminalizing marijuana?"

Senator Inouye rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"The CDC has provided a lot of reasons to say no to recreational marijuana, and here is one: People who are addicted to marijuana may also be at a higher risk of other negative consequences of using the drug, such as problems with attention, memory, and learning. Some people who are addicted need to smoke more and more marijuana to get the same high. It is also important to be aware that the amount of THC in marijuana, such as the marijuana potency or strength, has increased over the past few decades. The higher the THC content, the stronger the effects on the brain. In addition, some methods of using marijuana—dabbing or edibles—may deliver very high levels of THC to the user. Researchers do not yet know the full extent of the consequences when the body and the brain, especially the developing brain, are exposed to high concentrations of THC or how recent increases in potency affect the risk of someone becoming addicted. I have received many oppositions in my district from my constituents, and I urge my colleagues to vote 'no' on this measure. Mahalo."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"We were the first state to legalize marijuana for medical use, yet we are one of the later states to legalize it for recreational use. This bill is a very small step. It decriminalizes a small amount: one ounce—less than a quarter of what we are allowing for medical use. And not only that, we are allowing licensed dispensaries, which are overregulated if you listen to them, and actually have the more stringent standards than any of the other states. Our labs—Department of Health labs—inspect the cannabis for multiple toxins, for multiple pesticides, multiple molds that other states do not inspect. So this bill is a very small step. It allows us to cut back on the illicit market by allowing free access for only one ounce of recreational use, and it allows for the dispensing of a safer form of marijuana for those who need to use it, and for those reasons, I urge my colleagues to pass this bill. Thank you."

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“With all due respect to my fellow colleagues, prohibition on alcohol ended in this country 90 years ago because it was an unsuccessful policy—it just does not work. It does not allow us to focus from a public health standpoint on the segments of our population that really need help and support. That’s why we got rid of a complete ban on alcohol, and that’s why that policy does not work, as well, for cannabis. When it comes to cannabis versus alcohol, there’s a plethora of public health information that shows that alcohol is as dangerous if not more. There is a strict regulatory regime to ensure that products are safe. That is the proposal that we are pursuing here in the Senate. It is time to take these products off of the black market, to regulate them effectively, to bring in the segments of the community that have been operating in the shadow, and to recognize that there are broad potential benefits economically but also from a healthcare standpoint to providing more access to cannabis to our community. And, again, to address the correlation to the regulatory actions that we take on vaping and tobacco: To me, those are arguments in favor of bringing this industry into the light—regulating them effectively so that we can make sure we are managing for the predatory aspects of any commercial industry, cannabis included, to protect the health and safety of our children, but also, again, to focus on the segments of our population that really do need help and support, not the rest of the community who are grown adults who can make decisions for themselves. I ask my colleagues to join me in support. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’m probably one of the few in here who was against it when I was a young child. As I got a little bit more older, I learned a little bit more about it. You put it in the ground, you plant it, it grows. Alcohol and tobacco is manipulated into what it is. What we drink: diet sodas, Coca Cola, everything else—manipulated for our consumption that is not good for us, either. Reason why I say this is because I had a cousin; he’s a couple years older than me. I used to call him a druggie—don’t get me wrong. But I realized, if he did not have marijuana in the morning and marijuana at night, he won’t be able to concentrate, he wouldn’t be able to work, he wouldn’t have been graduated. He working almost 35 years in operating engineers union; he’s going to retire. But he never used it in overuse—it’s in moderation just like anything else. If we use too much alcohol, it also can cause brain damage. If we can drink too much water, we also can kill ourself by drinking too much water. Everything’s in moderation, but I agree with my colleague from Kāne’ohe that we need to get them off the streets because the drugs that are being sold on the streets, you not knowing if it’s safe or it’s laced with something, and people think it’s funny when they lace it with something, and somebody goes into a medical problem and have brain damage. So, I’m in support. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“First of all, I want to thank the work of the chair of CPN that he’s done on this measure. I mean, he did a lot of hard work on improving it, addressing the concerns of the numerous stakeholders, particularly addressing the concerns of the monopolization of the potential recreational industry that has occurred in other states. You know, it’s funny: We were the first state, as the speaker from Puna said, to adopt medical marijuana, and yet we’re one of the last to look at recreational marijuana. You have purple and red states like Oklahoma who have gone in this direction to bring it above ground and to tax the revenue. Right now, the revenue that’s generated—and it’s happening everywhere—goes to organized crime. It goes to off-world figures. It doesn’t go to fund our schools; it doesn’t go to fund our communities; it doesn’t even go to fund addiction

programs. It goes into the hands of criminals. As my good colleague from Hilo noted, you go to the fourth floor of the airport and it’s full of smoke right now, so it’s happening all around us. It’s only by bringing it up and regulating it and taxing it and then providing the revenue for support for those who do struggle for addiction problems that we can truly have this work for our communities instead of against it. So I understand the concerns that many members have risen. However, I think the work that’s being done on the bill is remarkable, and I think it deserves further conversation, so I, too, hopefully will see this bill progress, and I stand in strong support. Thank you.”

We are facing a medical shortage of medical providers as you could see by the multiple bills asking for compacts, too. Medical providers who are willing to accept Medicare, Medicaid, or TRICARE are not only accepting those cases, but they are accepting the poorest of the poor, and they are unable, unlike other retailers, to pass on the general excise

tax to their patients. So if we want our medical providers to provide help and health and care for the poorest of the poor, we should at least give them a break, and this is the one bill that gives them a break, and this is the one bill that recognizes their selflessness in doing so. Thank you. I urge my colleagues to support this all the way.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“This is a simple bill which clarifies that the DLNR authority shall supersede the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority for all lands designated under the state conservation district. This clarification is necessary as the Department of Land and Natural Resources is responsible for overseeing conservation lands statewide. When the Mauna Kea authority was created, the jurisdictional status of conservation land management on Mauna Kea remained ambiguous. All this bill does is clear up the ambiguity.

“Mr. President, I find it hard to believe that the new Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority would be given authorization over conservation lands over the DLNR, whose mandate is to be responsible for all conservation lands belonging to the State of Hawai‘i. Mauna Kea is home to incredible flora, fauna, land formations, and several endangered native and endemic species. The Department of Land and Natural Resources is the best-suited state agency to manage the delicate ecosystems of Mauna Kea. For this reason, Mr. President and members, I ask for your support of this bill. Thank you, Mr. President, colleagues. Mahalo.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

“Mr. President, this is more than a clarification. As you know, I’ve worked very hard to pass the Mauna Kea authority bill. Many hours, many drafts, we’ve gone into it, and so I’m going to read from the bill: ‘Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, all powers and duties of the board of land and natural resources pursuant to chapter 171, and the land use commission pursuant to chapter 205, concerning permits, dispositions, land use approvals, and any other approvals pertaining to the Mauna

Kea lands are transferred to the authority upon the expiration of the transition period.’ That is clear in the bill, so it’s not a clarification: That was the intent. And so this bill takes that portion away, and so with that—I know it has a defective date, and so I am voting ‘with reservations.’ Thank you.”

Friday, March 10, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:35 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Lee who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Kanuha recognized Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke and her staff, who were seated in the gallery. Senator Kanuha noted that Lieutenant Governor Luke was chairing that year's state employees food drive to support the Hawaii Foodbank and communities across the state, which would be kicking off that evening at UH's baseball, softball, and men's volleyball games. Monday, March 13, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fevella, Fukunaga, Ihara, and Kanuha who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Shimabukuro noted that members of the Wai'anae Moku Kupuna Council possess historical and cultural knowledge about the Wai'anae Moku, otherwise known as the Wai'anae Coast. Senator Shimabukuro added that the 2022 Legislature, through a concurrent resolution, had designated the Wai'anae Moku Kupuna Council an advisory resource to the members of the Legislature. Senator Shimabukuro then introduced members of the Wai'anae Moku Kupuna Council who were seated in the gallery: Aunty Georgie Navarro, Uncle Ed Werner, Lena Suzuki, Heather Greaber, Aunty Kapua Medeiros, Aunty Pam Aio, Aunty Zee Nahooikaikaholohokulani, Aunty Juanita Brown-Kawamoto, Aunty Kaiulani Apostadiro, Uncle Mel Kahele, Uncle George Paris, Patrice Tanna, Uncle Paul Aio, Aunty Lovely Aona, Greg Tapaan, Uncle Kaili Keliikoa-Kamai, and Kapua Keliikoa-Kamai.

Senator Shimabukuro then welcomed guests from Kamaile Academy, a public charter school on the Wai'anae Coast established in 2008. Senator Shimabukuro noted that the school's pre-K program, begun in 2016, had swelled its population to over 1,000 students. Present in the gallery were principal Paul Kepka; teachers Diane Arakaki, Kari Arakaki, Darlene Kay, and Chikyra Crabbe; and pre-K students and parents.

Senator Shimabukuro then introduced members of her staff who were seated in the gallery: Keahi Renaud, Patrice Tanna, Louis Galdeira, and Clare-Ann Ronquillo.

Senator Inouye, on behalf the Hawai'i island delegation, acknowledged members of the Hawaii Cattlemen's Council from the Big Island who were visiting to share their vision for a Hawai'i that values agriculture and those who produce food while taking care of the land. Senator Inouye observed that looking into the history of the paniolo's contributions to keeping cultural values and work ethics was also important. Present in the gallery were Paniolo Hall of Fame inductee Jimmy Greenwell, whose birthday was that day; Jeri Moniz; Jason Moniz; Jacob Tavares; Whitney Boteilho; Deedee Bertelmann; Keith Unger; Nicole Galase; Randy Cabral; and Doug Beaton.

Senator DeCoite, on behalf of the Maui and O'ahu delegations, introduced cattlemen from Maui and O'ahu. Seated in the gallery, from Maui, were 2019 Paniolo Hall of Fame inductee Jimmy Gomes, Janet Ashman, Alex Redeker, and Christy Gusman. Also present in the gallery, from O'ahu, were Alan Gottlieb, George Pritchard, and Brian Miyamoto.

Senator Kidani thanked Deborah Zysman, Ke'ōpū Reelitz, and the Hawai'i Children's Action Network Speaks! for organizing the Early Childhood Care & Education Day festivities of that morning, as well as the Hawai'i Early Childhood Advocacy Alliance, Hawai'i Association for the Education of Young Children, and Holomua Collaborative for supporting the event. Senator Kidani also thanked the

organizers, schools, students, and families who participated in the celebration.

Senator Kidani then congratulated the 2023 State Teacher of the Year and District Teachers of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, each spring, the chairs of the Senate and House Education committees designate a week during which we invite teachers, students, and education professionals to the Capitol to be recognized through floor presentations and education-related events. Our annual Education Week celebration is an event that I look forward to each year.

"This year, we are particularly excited as it is the first time in three years that we are inviting honorees back to the Capitol to receive their congratulatory Senate certificates which detail their extraordinary accomplishments. Awardees will also receive a program booklet and a Senate pin to further express our recognition and admiration for their achievements as well as their contributions to educational excellence in our schools.

"Today, we recognize individuals who have demonstrated teaching excellence, student achievement, and campus leadership. Those whose names are entered into the official record in each of these categories are just a few of the thousands whose contributions comprise the collective educational efforts in our state. As Board of Education Chair Bruce Voss reminded us in his moving moment of contemplation speech, education is a tremendous responsibility and requires the support of the community to foster student success. As chair of your Committee on Education, I am deeply moved and inspired by the hard work of each of these awardees, and the determination and resilience of our education system.

"Mr. President and colleagues, you have each received a program booklet for this year's Education Week. I urge you to read about the remarkable individuals we are recognizing this year. These deserving students, teachers, and campus leaders represent the broad spectrum of excellence in our education system.

"Mr. President, I also request that names and accomplishments on all of our honorees be entered into the Senate Journal each day to ensure that the 2023 Education Week recipients are rightfully recognized. (The Chair so ordered.) Thank you.

"To start with, our state Department of Education each year solicits nominations for classroom educators to be honored as Teachers of the Year. One teacher is selected by a committee from each of our DOE school complex areas and one from public charter school campuses. Our guests this morning include several of our deserving district Teachers of the Year.

"I am proud and honored to open Education Week 2023 by recognizing our 2023 State Teacher of the Year honoree, Michael Ida. Michael is a National Board Certified teacher and the O'ahu District's Farrington-Kaiser-Kalani Complex Teacher of the Year (go, Govs). Mr. Ida has been a lifelong learner and veteran teacher at Kalani High School for nearly three decades. Currently a math and computer science teacher, he serves as the mathematics department chairperson, Academic Review team member, computer science club advisor, and coach for student math competitions. Mr. Ida also helped launch the computer science program at Kalani, which included project-based learning with real-world applications for students.

"He is on the leadership teams of the Hawaii Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the Hawai'i chapter of the Computer Science Teachers Association, and the Hawai'i National Board

Certified Teachers Collective. In addition to his work with students, Mr. Ida also provides innovative tech-related professional development sessions for Kalani faculty. The impact of his efforts is a testament to his passion for teaching, the enthusiasm he shares with his students, and his tremendous subject-matter expertise.

“Please join me in congratulating the O’ahu District’s Farrington–Kaiser–Kalani Complex Area awardee and our State Teacher of the Year, Michael Ida. Thank you, and I now yield the floor to Senator Shimabukuro.”

The Chair having so ordered, the names and accomplishments on the honorees read as follows:

“Awardees on the Floor: Michael Ida (2023 State Teacher of the Year), Nuikalā Koerte (2023 Nānākuli–Wai’anae Complex Teacher of the Year), Leeann Manuel (2023 Campbell–Kapolei Complex Teacher of the Year), Keevan Matsumoto (2023 Kaimukī–McKinley–Roosevelt Complex Teacher of the Year), and Daphne Okunaga (2023 Pearl City–Waipahu Complex Teacher of the Year).

“Guests in the Gallery: Aven Okunaga, Darin Okunaga, Grant Okunaga, Leolani Leao, Pitone Leao, Uahiapele Koerte, Kuulei Lum, Iwalani Lum, Jersey Standing–Soares, Lisa De Ponte, Iris Kajikawa, Dennis Kajikawa, Kim Sanders, and Dennis Lum.”

Senator Shimabukuro rose to present the following remarks:

“In addition to Mr. Ida, the Senate would like to recognize all the inspiring teachers leading their districts and the education industry. The following recipients are all deserving of thanks and praise for the extraordinary work they do. As the residential district senator for this inspiring honoree, I am proud to acknowledge Nuikalā Koerte as the Leeward District’s Nānākuli–Wai’anae Complex Teacher of the Year.

“Ms. Koerte has been an early educator for over 20 years, 8 of which she’s served as a kindergarten and first-grade teacher at my alma mater, Wai’anae Elementary. A proud Native Hawaiian educator, Ms. Koerte approaches education with a child-first focus, looking to indigenous knowledge to guide her teachings. While she has achieved many professional goals throughout her career, Ms. Koerte is most proud of the hands-on learning experiences she established with community partners Papahana Kuaola and Mālama Loko Ea. Their support allowed her students the immersive experiences of āina-based learning, working firsthand in lo’i kalo and loko i’a. She cites the ‘ōlelo no‘eau “A’ohe pau ka ‘ike i ka hālua ho‘okahi” as an invaluable cultural principle which acknowledges that one can learn from many sources. As such, her methods are steeped in cultural traditions and methods that turn to nature and community as resources from which both she and her students can yield valuable lessons.

“Colleagues, please join me in congratulating the Leeward District’s Nānākuli–Wai’anae Complex Teacher of the Year, Nuikalā Koerte. I now yield the floor to Senator Gabbard.”

Senator Gabbard rose to present the following remarks:

“As the senator for District 21, I’m honored to recognize Leeann Manuel as the Leeward District’s 2023 Campbell–Kapolei Complex Teacher of the Year.

“Licensed as a math and TESOL instructor (that’s ‘teaching English to speakers of other languages’), Leeann transitioned to ‘Ewa Makai Middle School in 2016, where she’s been for the past seven years. She has been the induction and mentoring lead for the past six years and currently serves as the school’s curriculum coach for math, English language arts, and social studies. Beyond the classroom, Leeann’s commitment to education extends to her colleagues and the work she’s done to

further educational resources within ‘Ewa Makai. She has been the AVID program staff developer—that’s Advancement Via Individual Determination. Leeann is highly active with the Smarter Balanced Assessments (SBA) math, and creates lessons and activities for Tools for Teachers as a special needs education Smarter Balanced teacher.

“It is my pleasure and distinct honor to recognize Leeann Manuel and offer aloha congratulations to Leeann as the Leeward District’s 2023 Campbell–Kapolei Complex Teacher of the Year. Colleagues, please join me in honoring her. And now, I turn the floor over to Senator Chang.”

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

“It is my privilege as the residential district senator for this outstanding awardee to recognize Keevan Matsumoto as the Honolulu District’s 2023 Kaimukī–McKinley–Roosevelt Complex Teacher of the Year.

“A second-generation special education (SPED) teacher following in the footsteps of his mother, Mr. Matsumoto currently serves as the student services coordinator (SSC) at Kaimukī High School. Prior to this appointment, he was a SPED teacher at Kaimukī who specialized in students with moderate to profound learning disabilities as well as the SPED department head. Dedicated to supporting students beyond the classroom, he is also the school’s head of delegation and the head coach for the Special Olympics team, where he was awarded the Outstanding School Delegation award by Special Olympics Hawai’i. In addition to these remarkable efforts, Mr. Matsumoto is also the founder and president of the nonprofit Kaimuki Youth Development Organization, which is dedicated to providing prevocational, vocational, and community engagement opportunities for children with disabilities.

“Colleagues, please join me in congratulating the Honolulu District’s 2023 Kaimukī–McKinley–Roosevelt Complex Teacher of the Year, Keevan Matsumoto. I now yield the floor to Senator Dela Cruz.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

“I’m honored to recognize Daphne Okunaga as the Leeward District’s Pearl City–Waipahu Complex Teacher of the Year.

“Ms. Okunaga is a Pearl City High alumna, where she has been a dedicated educator for 18 years. Throughout her tenure, she has served as a math and business teacher, math department chairperson, International Business and Design Academy lead, introduction to college mathematics state trainer, and more. A former Hawai’i State Teacher Fellow, she is a Smarter Balanced Performance and Practice Committee rep and a member of the Patsy T. Mink Leadership Alliance. Ms. Okunaga received the 2017 Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching, and in 2022, she was awarded the Hawaii Education Association’s Centennial Award as well as the National Career Academy Coalition’s 2022 Career Academy Teacher of the Year award. She is truly an exceptional educator who is deserving of this recognition.

“Please join me in recognizing our final honoree today, the Leeward District’s Pearl City–Waipahu Complex Teacher of the Year, Daphne Okunaga. I now yield the floor to Senator Kidani.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Colleagues, as you can see, we have a wealth of educational excellence in our midst that I am thrilled to celebrate. These outstanding teachers represent the tremendous talent, dedication, and accomplishments of our educators here in Hawai’i, and I am grateful to have this opportunity to honor them. Senate President, I now yield the floor back to you.”

THIRTIETH DAY

Tuesday, March 14, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Gabbard who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Ninth Day.

At this time, Senator Richards introduced his wife, Terri Impson, and twins A.R. and Ruby, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Wakai introduced Kina Mahi from Hawaii Foodbank and Melissa Pavlicek, a well-known figure around the Capitol, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Awa acknowledged his kids, Orion Awa, Jayton Page, and Aurora Awa, and girlfriend, Jaime Tenorio, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Kidani congratulated the 2023 District Teachers of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"We continue our celebration of Education Week with our next group of incredible educators. The State of Hawai'i acknowledges teachers as the unsung heroes of our state and county. On local and state levels, educators are those tasked with the immense responsibility of cultivating young minds and impressing upon them not only the knowledge necessary to become successful, but important values and life skills needed to adapt to the changes of the modern world.

"I would like to call upon the senator from District 19 to introduce their constituent."

Senator Aquino rose to present the following remarks:

"On the second day of Education Week, I would like to recognize our 2023 Charter Schools Teacher of the Year honoree, Cerina Livaudais—please stand.

"Ms. Livaudais joined DreamHouse 'Ewa Beach Public Charter School in 2020 as a seventh-grade science coach. She started the first computer science program grounded in identity, leadership, and diversity. Her efforts aim to decolonize STEM education by incorporating guest speakers from local organizations such as the Purple Mai'a Foundation to indigenize the way computer science is taught. Ms. Livaudais guided her students through the Samsung Solve for Tomorrow competition and the Congressional App Challenge's national coding competition. Her students won the Congressional App Challenge competition for the second year in a row, programming award-winning apps aimed at increasing Hawaiian representation in children's video games. In 2021, she was awarded the Cognizant Innovation in Computer Science Education Award for her tremendous efforts and impact, expanding access to and advocating for computer science education.

"She is truly a remarkable educator who is deserving of recognition. Colleagues, please join me in congratulating the 2023 Charter Schools Teacher of the Year honoree, Cerina Livaudais.

"Colleagues, in addition to celebrating Ms. Livaudais, I would also like to take a moment to acknowledge her amazing students who have joined her here to support their teacher on this special occasion. We are thrilled to welcome them here to

the State Capitol. Will the students and chaperones of DreamHouse 'Ewa Beach please stand to be recognized? Senate President, may I request their names be entered into the Journal?" (The Chair so ordered.)

The Chair having so ordered, the names of the students and chaperones read as follows:

"Ha'ō Sarmiento, Cherise Duyag, Trez Cadiente, Kainui Cadiente, Jordan Rodriguez, Leodegario Yoshioka-Ramirez, Cailyn Castaño, Chloe Castano, Zailah Thompson, Legend Kauakahi, Titan Kane, Kayj Roughton, Elijah Idica, Levi Cruz Thompson, Aiden Abes, Alizay Iwamoto-Capenia, Lea Leao, Sophia Wallace, Xyiah Branco-Santiago, Chaney Lopez, Chyanne Koko, Darlene Flores, Mike Sarmiento, Sarah Haiola, Flaviana Ancheta, David Brooks, Crisann Leao, Pamela Goodwin, and Crissy Leao."

The Chair remarked that Ms. Livaudais had taught at Wai'anae with his daughter-in-law Sarah and that it had been nice to meet her earlier that morning.

Senator McKelvey rose to present the following remarks:

"It's my honor and privilege on behalf of myself and Senator Lynn DeCoite to go ahead and acknowledge Maui District's 2023 Hāna–Lahainaluna–Lāna'i–Moloka'i Complex Teacher of the Year recipient, Cornelio 'CJ' Ancheta. CJ, can you please rise?"

"Currently in his fifth year of teaching at Lahainaluna High School, CJ serves as a secondary math teacher. In 2018, he completed a professional development course on problem-based learning at the University of Hawai'i Maui College followed by a summer workshop on project-based learning (PBL) with the Kupu Hou Academy in his second year of teaching. The experience prompted his passion for PBL and helped him to realize PBL as a teaching strategy that can enhance student learning by improving their communication, creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking skills. In 2020, CJ was selected as a Hawai'i State Teacher Fellow, as well as the HIDOE Innovation Grant awardee.

"And in his previous life, Mr. President, he was also a publisher of one of Maui's largest Filipino-language newspapers, so I'd like to mention that as well.

"Please join me, everybody, in recognizing Maui District's 2023 Hāna–Lahainaluna–Lāna'i–Moloka'i Complex Teacher of the Year recipient, Cornelio 'CJ' Ancheta. I now turn the floor over to Senator Kanuha."

Senator Kanuha rose to present the following remarks:

"It is with great pride and aloha that I acknowledge the Hawai'i District's 2023 Ka'ū–Kea'au–Pāhoa Complex Teacher of the Year, Chyanee Brooks—could you please stand? (I knew I was going to get your name wrong. I even called the school this morning to make sure I pronounced it right, and I still got it wrong, so I apologize for that—Chyanee Brooks.)

"A National Board Certified Teacher, Brooks currently serves as a high school English teacher at Ka'ū High & Pahala Elementary School, where she has taught for the past nine years. An accomplished academic and educator, she has been recognized as a Hawai'i State Teacher Fellow and a Pulitzer Center Teacher Fellow, and is pursuing her PhD in neuroscience at Mahidol University's Research Center for Neuroscience Institute of Molecular Biosciences. (Wow!) Brooks is a strong advocate for assessments that empower student learning and success. She has led professional development trainings for teachers throughout the state as well

as authored various articles on educational assessments, feedback, and student voice. She is a tremendous academic and educator who is truly deserving of this recognition.

“Colleagues, please join me in celebrating the Hawai‘i District’s 2023 Ka‘ū–Kea‘au–Pāhoa Complex Teacher of the Year, Chyanee Brooks. Mr. President, I now yield the floor to Senator Awa.”

Senator Awa rose to present the following remarks:

“Finally, today, we recognize one of the North Shore’s very own: Jared Haiola, Teacher of the Year for our Central District’s Leilehua–Mililani–Waiālua Complex. Mr. Haiola has been a special education teacher for the past 22 years at Hale‘iwa Elementary School. He founded the school’s robotics team back in 2016. Since then, and with the help of Waiālua High School, students at Hale‘iwa Elementary picked up top honors twice at the Vex IQ Robotics Hawai‘i state championships. Mr. Haiola also picked up the Vex IQ Robotics Teacher of the Year award in 2021. His career highlights include watching his students win those two state titles while developing their STEM education. He’s a second-generation teacher, an advisor, a coach, and it’s my honor to recognize our Leilehua–Mililani–Waiālua Complex Teacher of the Year, Jared Haiola.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Colleagues, it is with great pride and aloha that we celebrate these exemplary district teachers. Their commitment to education and investment in Hawai‘i’s keiki ensures the future of our state, and I know I am not alone in expressing my gratitude to each and every one of our teachers for the profound work they do. Though not all of our amazing educators were able to join us here this week, I would also like to recognize the other District Teachers of the Year who are not here today but will also be receiving Senate certificates to honor them for their tireless work: Malia Draper, Cherie Teraoka, Joel Matsunaga, Shelby-Ann Erdmann, Deanne Takeno, Kristy Taise, and Makena Ale. Senate President, may I request that these names be entered into the Senate Journal? (The Chair so ordered.)

“I would also like to take a moment to recognize our amazing long-time community partner, Friends of the Library, for their continued support of Education Week. Many of us look forward to their annual book fair at the Capitol during this exciting week of celebrations. They started this morning in Room 224. The Chair then made the following comments:

"I want to thank the members and the committee chairs: In the last two weeks, you have gone through several cabinet nominations and have made recommendations that will soon be coming to the full Senate. I was troubled when the governor said that we should just give him a chance and let everybody he nominates get confirmed just because. If that were the case, the law would simply be written that the governor appoints who he wants to have on his team, but instead, the law says we have the duty and responsibility of advise and consent, one that we take seriously, not just for cabinet members—members who serve on boards and commissions and the Judiciary.

"I think what is noteworthy in what happened yesterday is that the nominee to chair the Department of Agriculture had some struggles in expressing a vision for her department in the initial meetings with the Senate, but in subsequent meetings has been able to rise and meet the challenge and, in the course of carrying out her duties, has shown that the committee unanimously supported her. And so I urge you to continue to do your job, to continue to take your responsibility seriously, and we will continue to go through the process and treat people fairly. And for those who are able to articulate the vision and give us the confidence that they are going to come out with the best product for the people of Hawai'i, we will continue to advance those candidates. So thank you for your hard work."

THIRTY-FIRST DAY

Wednesday, March 15, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Fukunaga and Ihara who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirtieth Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads noted that the day marked Take Down Tobacco Day and that students from various schools and universities were visiting to observe the event. Seated in the gallery were students from Damien Memorial School, Highlands Intermediate School, Honoka'a High School, Kahuku High School, Kamehameha Schools Kapālama campus, Kamehameha Schools Hawai'i campus, Kaua'i High School, Leilehua High School, Mililani High School, Seabury Hall, and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Senator Gabbard introduced Fale Andrew Lesā, a city councilor for Auckland, New Zealand, who was present in the gallery. Senator Gabbard noted that Mr. Lesā had previously been a policy consultant for the Asian Development Bank and climate change specialist for UNESCO, and that his research on climate change had been published recently by Georgetown University. Senator Gabbard observed that Mr. Lesā is indigenous to Samoa.

Senator Chang introduced members of his staff who were seated in the gallery: intern Ella Matsui of the 9th Senatorial District, Kalani High School, and the Honolulu Youth Commission; and office manager Theresa Ng.

Senator Lee introduced Jen Wilbur, state director of Planned Parenthood and former longtime Capitol staffer, and other visitors from Planned Parenthood, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Kidani congratulated the Distinguished Principal, Outstanding Assistant Principal, Golden Key Librarian, Outstanding Library Services, and Counselor of the Year, and presented the following remarks:

"It is day three of our 2023 Education Week program, and I am eager to welcome our inspiring guests. The success of our students is a testament to the support they receive from their collective school community, and the awardees we are recognizing today demonstrate educational leadership in various capacities. From principals and assistant principals to librarians and counselors, their collective efforts are essential to establishing a healthy educational environment for students to thrive. To begin today's program, I would like to call upon the senator from District 17."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to present the following remarks:

"For our first Education Week presentation of the day, I would like to introduce the National Association of Elementary School Principals 2022 Hawai'i National Distinguished Principal, Aaron Tominaga.

"Each year, the District of Columbia Office of Overseas Schools and the U.S. Department of Defense Education Activity honors one principal from each state as the National Association of Elementary School Principals Principal of the Year winner. These educators are distinguished by their tremendous leadership, innovation, and dedication to their students, staff, and colleagues. Their guidance sets a foundation

of respect, inclusivity, safety, and kindness from which their community can thrive, making them invaluable in our schools.

"A dedicated Hawai'i DOE educator for 25 years, Principal Tominaga is currently in his fifth year as principal of Waipahu Elementary. In his role, he oversees a student body of 950 students; 95 percent are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, and nearly 50 percent of students are English-language learners. Principal Tominaga is credited with developing a comprehensive system to track and monitor English language arts and math progress to accelerate support for students. These needs are met through regular meetings between teachers and curriculum coaches, differentiated professional development for teachers, and classroom data sharing to track students' academic progress. This resulted in a significant decrease in at-risk students in both English language arts and math. In 2018, Principal Tominaga was a nominee for the Masayuki Tokioka Distinguished Principal Award. He is a passionate leader and a catalyst for change. His ability to unite students, staff, and teachers is truly remarkable and deserving of recognition.

"Colleagues, please join me in honoring the National Association of Elementary School Principals' 2022 Hawai'i National Distinguished Principal, Aaron Tominaga. I now return the floor back to the senator from Mililani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"Each year, the National Association of Elementary School Principals selects a cohort of assistant principals throughout the country to recognize in their National Outstanding Assistant Principal Program. The program is dedicated to promoting extraordinary educational leadership through their role as assistant principal. These educators are distinguished by their tremendous leadership, innovation, and dedication to their students, staff, and colleagues. I am honored to recognize, from my own district, the 2022 winner of the National Association of Elementary School Principals' National Outstanding Assistant Principal award, Stacy Kawamura.

"An educator of nearly 20 years, Ms. Kawamura served as vice principal of Waikele Elementary for 7 years. She was instrumental in developing the school's national distinguished academy pathway, which began as an arts academy before expanding to include age-appropriate career and technical education courses aligned with Waipahu Complex's career readiness and establishing pathways to college. Ms. Kawamura helped establish Waikele as the nation's first elementary academy pathway program, exposing primary school students to a variety of career opportunities and easing their transition to secondary schools. Ms. Kawamura now serves as the principal at Honowai Elementary, where she has led the school since May 2022.

"It is with great pride that we celebrate the National Association of Elementary School Principals' National Outstanding Assistant Principal awardee, Stacy Kawamura. I now yield the floor to the senator from District 13."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"It is my pleasure to recognize Shelley Lau, the winner of the 2022 Hawai'i Association of School Librarians Golden Key Award. The Golden Key Award was established in 1979 to recognize a school librarian who has made significant professional contributions to the profession in Hawai'i and given notable service to the organization. Their mission aims to advocate excellence, facilitate change, develop and provide leaders in the school library media field through collaborative efforts, and to provide leaders and students with educational support and use of information technologies.

“The dedicated librarian of Aina Haina School since 2010, Ms. Lau previously served as the webmaster for Hawai‘i Association of School Librarians, and taught online professional development courses on eBooks for Department of Education educators. Ms. Lau led numerous conferences, elevating the profession and uplifting her colleagues in the pursuit of educational excellence. She has been an invaluable resource who is committed to the profession, and is credited with nurturing and inspiring many school librarians throughout her illustrious career. An alumna of the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa Library & Information Science Program, she has also attended many of their courses to share insights about her role as an elementary school librarian and has offered her expertise as a cooperating librarian for students completing their school library practicum.

“It is a privilege to recognize Shelley Lau as the winner of the 2022 Hawai‘i Association of School Librarians Golden Key Award. I now yield the floor to the senator from District 9. Mahalo.”

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

“I am honored to acknowledge another exceptional librarian whose commitment to education and remarkable leadership are deserving of recognition: the 2022 Outstanding Library Service awardee, Joanna Dunn—please stand.

“Formerly known as the Outstanding School Administrator Award, the Hawai‘i Association of School Librarians’ Outstanding Library Service Award recognizes an individual’s role in developing successful school library programs in Hawai‘i. Individuals may be legislators, community leaders, parent volunteers, teachers, business leaders, or retired educators in addition to school administrators. This award aims to broaden the spectrum of awardees who have made significant contributions to Hawai‘i library services, literacy, and education.

“A public school educator of over 30 years, Dunn has dedicated her life to education. She has served Hawai‘i’s keiki for over three decades as a teacher, technology coordinator, and resource teacher. Throughout her teaching career, she has touched the lives of countless students at ‘Aiea and Waipahu High Schools, Pope Elementary School, as well as the Office of Curriculum and Instructional Design. Committed to educational excellence and providing students with the best learning environment possible, Dunn has been the educational specialist for Library Media Services in the Office of Curriculum and Instructional Design for the past eight years. As such, she works to promote and support innovative school library media programs and services as a valuable resource for students and teachers.

“Colleagues, please join me in celebrating the 2022 Outstanding Library Service awardee, Joanna Dunn. I now turn the floor over to the senator from District 19.”

Senator Aquino rose to present the following remarks:

“It is with great pride that I acknowledge an individual whose support for students is paramount: the American School Counselor Association’s 2023 School Counselor of the Year, Shely Chang.

“The American School Counselor Association’s School Counselor of the Year award recognizes counseling professionals in elementary, middle, and high schools throughout the United States for their devotion to the academic and career success of their students, as well as their social-emotional well-being. Honorees are selected on the basis of extensive criteria including the development of creative counseling innovations and programs, leadership skills, and contributions to academic improvement.

“Ms. Chang has been a dedicated school counselor at Ka‘imiloa for the past 18 years. She is committed to promoting programs and activities focused on students’ health and wellness, as well as the collective school community. She is a former Peer Mediator Advisory member and serves on the Ka‘imiloa Student Council Advisory and Ho‘okui after-school enrichment program. Ms. Chang is a member of both the American School Counselor Association and the Hawaii School Counselor Association, and her tremendous efforts helped Ka‘imiloa receive RAMP recognition as a school who is committed to delivering comprehensive, data-informed school counseling programs aligned with the American School Counselor Association’s National Model framework. Beyond the classroom, Ms. Chang helps to plan many school activities and events, gathering faculty, students, and their families for assemblies, career days, parent nights, and fall carnivals. She cares deeply about her school community and is passionate about nurturing and supporting her students.

“Please help me recognize our deserving School Counselor of the Year, Shely Chang. I now return the floor back to Senator Kidani.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“In addition to these extraordinary awardees, I would also like to recognize Principal Laura Ahn of Niu Valley Middle School, who was unable to join us here today. Principal Ahn received the prestigious Hawai‘i Association of Secondary School Administrators’ 2022 Hawai‘i State Principal of the Year award. She helped to reset the culture at Niu Valley Middle School with a focus on professional development and systems dedicated to student success. Her efforts have uplifted the students, faculty, and staff, allowing the school community to truly thrive. Senate President, may I request that her name be entered into the Senate Journal along with the other awardees today? (The Chair so ordered.)

“Colleagues, today’s honorees demonstrate the transformative power of leadership in our educational community. Their support nurtures and empowers our young people, inspiring them to strive not only in their academic efforts, but to care for their mental and emotional health as well. THIRTY-SECOND DAY

Thursday, March 16, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-First Day.

At this time, on behalf of Senate President Kouchi, Senator Kanuha acknowledged two visitors from Kaua'i: Michelle Emura from the American Cancer Society and Rainier Fernandez from Waimea High School.

The Chair shared his belief that the visitors from Kaua'i were at an appointment, and explained that he had met with them earlier that morning.

Senator San Buenaventura noted that the day marked the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACSCAN) Cancer Action Day at the Capitol. Senator San Buenaventura explained that ACSCAN is a nonprofit, nonpartisan advocacy affiliate of the American Cancer Society that supports evidence-based policy and legislative solutions designed to eliminate cancer as a major health problem, and gives people power to fight cancer with the training and tools needed to make their voices heard. Senator Kidani congratulated the U.S. Senate Youth Program delegates, Phi Theta Kappa co-president, and LifeSmarts winners, and presented the following remarks:

"Colleagues, I would like to begin our Education Week program today by taking a moment to acknowledge the awesome students and staff at Waipahu High School, who have 10 Presidential Scholar nominees this year. There are only 74 nominations statewide, 29 of whom hail from public schools. It is an amazing accomplishment, as these Waipahu nominees represent one-third of all public school nominations this year. I would like to congratulate Principal Zachary Sheets, the faculty and staff of Waipahu High School, and these deserving nominees: Rovialyn Arciaga, Harold Jay Cacal, Audrey Dagdagan, Ciara Mae Francisco, Mya Habon-Godding, Danica Regine Ilaga, Janine Lei Lopez, Sean Michael Valencia Monte, Hunter Von Tungaln, and Maverick Yasuda. Senate President, may I request that their names be entered into the Senate Journal? (The Chair so ordered.)

"Today marks day four of Education Week, and we have the pleasure of welcoming student guests to the Senate floor who represent some of the brightest young minds of their generation and the future of our community here in Hawai'i. I would like to welcome the student awardees, their families, teachers, and peers who have gathered here to recognize them. I would like to open with the Hawai'i delegates of the 2023 U.S. Senate Youth Program. I call upon the honoree's residential district senator from District 10."

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

"The U.S. Senate Youth Program was created by a Senate resolution in 1962 and has been sponsored by the U.S. Senate and funded by the Hearst Foundations. This merit-based program was established to further national youth education on the three branches of government, the responsibilities of elected officials, and to emphasize the importance of democratic decisions and relationships throughout the world. Each year, only two delegates from each state are selected. It is my privilege now to recognize one of the 2023 Hawai'i delegates who happens to come from my District 10, Daniel Pruder.

"Daniel is a senior at Punahou School and leader of the school's Model UN, civic engagement programs, and theater program. He has served on the Honolulu Youth Commission since 2021 as vice-chair and currently as chair. Daniel has also volunteered with the first legislative committee of Vote16HI, which seeks to lower the statewide voting age to 16. He was awarded Outstanding Advocate for Children and Youth during the 2022 Hawai'i Children and Youth Day celebration, and received the Mayor's Award of Recognition for his appointment to the Honolulu Youth Commission.

"I am honored to recognize Daniel Pruder as one of the deserving Hawai'i delegates of the 2023 U.S. Senate Youth Program. Thank you, Daniel; congratulations. Mr. President, I yield this floor back to Senator Kidani."

Senator Kidani rose to present the following remarks:

"The U.S. Senate Youth Program delegates are nominated by teachers and principals, and selected by state departments of education as well as the District of Columbia and Department of Defense Education Activity based upon outstanding leadership abilities, extraordinary volunteerism, and academic rank within the top one percent of their state. The program mission aims to instill knowledge and interest of the American political process in student delegates and affirm their lifelong commitment to public service. It is with great pride that I acknowledge our second student delegate, who is from my district, Mr. Maverick Yasuda.

"Mr. Yasuda is a senior at Waipahu High and a member of student government, Phi Theta Kappa collegiate honor society, Ivy League club, and serves as the vice president of the school's Academy of Natural Resources. He will receive an associate's degree in liberal arts upon graduation. Mr. Yasuda is also the current student member on the Hawai'i State Board of Education, representing the voices of 168,000 public school students. He was named Outstanding Advocate for Children and Youth during the 2022 Hawai'i Children and Youth Day celebration. His participation in the U.S. Senate Youth Program is a testament to his outstanding commitment to his academic and extracurricular pursuits as well as his admirable service contributions.

"Please join me in recognizing Maverick Yasuda as one of Hawai'i's 2023 U.S. Senate Youth program delegates. I now yield the floor to the senator from 'Ewa Beach."

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the great honor of recognizing an outstanding individual from my District 20 who is not only an extraordinary student but an extraordinary leader as well. Please help me welcome international co-president of Phi Theta Kappa, Keziah Christie Unciano Ancheta.

"Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society (otherwise known as PTK) is an internationally recognized honor society that provides

scholarship and leadership opportunities for its members. PTK was established in 1918, and by 1929, it was recognized as the official national honor society for junior colleges with a focus on academic excellence and enrichment. Now in its 105th year, PTK has grown to include more than 3.8 million members in the U.S. and 11 nations, with a presence on nearly 1,300 campuses. In 2018, Waipahu High School made PTK history when it became the first high school in the nation to charter a chapter of Phi Theta Kappa.

“Ms. Ancheta has been a proud member of Waipahu’s PTK Beta Chi Omega Chapter since 2021, serving as the 2021–2022 PTK Pacific Region president before making PTK history for the second time when she was elected as PTK’s 2022–2023 international co-president while a senior at Waipahu High. In this role, she is the first and youngest dually enrolled student to serve as an international officer.

“Ms. Ancheta is a dually enrolled student in her senior year at Waipahu High School and the University of Hawai‘i. Upon graduation, she will receive an associate in arts degree with a certificate in business management from Leeward Community College. She was an inductee for the Phi Theta Kappa’s Beta Chi Omega Chapter, the National Honor Society, National Technical Honor Society, and has also received career technical engineering (CTE) honors. Beyond the classroom, Ms. Ancheta was recognized as a mayoral appointee for the Honolulu Youth Commission, serving as secretary. Her historic leadership appointment is a testament to her outstanding commitment to her academic and extracurricular pursuits as well as her admirable service contributions.

“Please join me in celebrating Keziah Christie Unciano Ancheta for her historic appointment as Phi Theta Kappa’s 2022–2023 international co-president. I now yield the floor to Senator Fukunaga. Mahalo.”

Senator Fukunaga rose to present the following remarks:

“For our final Education Week presentation of the day, I am delighted to acknowledge the winners of the 2023 LifeSmarts competition. With us on the floor this morning is Maryknoll School team captain Chris Ho—please stand to be recognized.

“Four teams from O‘ahu schools took top honors in the 19th annual statewide competition, with Waipahu High School’s Team 2 taking fourth place, Kalani High School’s team taking third place, Waipahu High School’s Team 1 earning second place, and Maryknoll School winning first-place honors. Joining us here today are the deserving District 11 team members of Maryknoll School, our 2023 LifeSmarts competition winners. I guess we should ask all of them to stand and be recognized: Adam Nelson, Maddy Agustin, Benson Leung, Kaitlyn McLeod-Asahan, and their coach, Kit-U Wong.

“The annual LifeSmarts consumer education competition is a game show-style contest that tests students on their knowledge of personal finance, health and safety, the environment, technology, and consumer rights and responsibilities. It is sponsored in Hawai‘i by the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and the Office of the Securities Commissioner in partnership with the Hawaii Credit Union League. It is a free educational program that prepares students to enter the real world as smart consumers by teaching them the skills they need to succeed in a modern global marketplace.

“In the statewide final hosted at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa’s Campus Center Ballroom, Maryknoll School emerged victorious, and so we’d like to welcome them to the Capitol today and to congratulate them on winning this award. Thank you very much. I now yield the floor to Senator Kidani.”

Senator Kidani rose and stated:

“Before we close our program today, I wanted to also recognize the 2022 Hawai‘i delegates of the U.S. Senate Youth program, Enjl Himoya, who graduated from Hilo High School, and Joshua Ching, who graduated from Kamehameha Schools Kapālama. These extraordinary young men represented Hawai‘i last year and have since gone on to further their studies. Mr. Himoya is currently attending the University of California, Berkeley, where he is studying business administration and legal studies, data science. Mr. Ching is currently attending Yale University, where he is studying political science and ethnicity, race, and migration studies.

“I would also like to take a moment to recognize the third-place winners of the 2023 LifeSmarts competition from Kalani High School, who have joined us here today in the gallery—please stand.

“Colleagues, today’s deserving honorees are an important reminder of the profound kuleana we have to nurture our keiki as the future of our state. As your Education chair, I am especially moved and proud to recognize the accomplishments of our students as they make strides on their academic journey. They may very well be sitting in these seats one day (not too soon for some of us, I hope), reflecting upon this moment of recognition which affirmed their commitment to community. Tomorrow is our final day of Education Week 2023, and I am eager to acknowledge the dedicated educators joining us on the Senate floor to be honored for their extraordinary contributions. Senate President, I now yield the floor.”

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:38 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator Shimabukuro recognized University of Hawai'i-West O'ahu vice chancellor David McDonald.

Senator Kim congratulated National Blue Ribbon Schools, Milken State Educator of the Year, and Milken Teacher of Promise, and presented the following remarks:

“Mr. President, today is our fifth and final day of Education Week 2023, and I am pinch-hitting for our Education chair, so I take this opportunity to thank the many hands who have contributed to making this week's program a tremendous success, from our Senate and House staff and community partners to our distinguished guests and their supportive schools and families.

“So we start our final day of presentations with our exemplary National Blue Ribbon Schools. The National Blue Ribbon School program was established back in 1982 to recognize the state's top performing public and non-public schools across the country who have successfully closed subgroup achievement gaps in English and mathematics as measured by state assessments.

“Three Hawai'i campuses earned distinction as Blue Ribbon Schools this year: Kahala Elementary, Nu'uuanu Elementary, and Hōkūlani Elementary. Joining us on the Senate floor are two of the three dedicated principals of our amazing National Blue Ribbon Schools. I call upon the senator from District 10 to recognize our first school.”

Senator Ihara rose to present the following remarks:

“Mr. President, I am proud to acknowledge our first exemplary recipient, Principal Ervin Pasalo and Hōkūlani School—could you stand and be recognized? Thank you. Hōkūlani Elementary School is located in my Senate district at the foot of St. Louis Heights and is one of only three schools in Honolulu to have received the National Blue Ribbon award for 2022. This is the school's third Blue Ribbon School award; previous awards were in 2005 and 2012. Hōkūlani School is an Exemplary High-Performing School and is ranked in the top 15 percent of Hawai'i's schools for achievement in English and math. Mr. President, Ms. Laurie Luczak, Hōkūlani principal at the time, is in the gallery, and I'd like to ask her to stand and be recognized. Hōkūlani performed 12 percentage points above average in English and 30 percentage points higher in math.

The school has a balanced approach to education by offering specialized learning experiences such as social-emotional learning, coding, Spanish, and Hawaiian. Hōkūlani is also an art integration school, leveraging grant initiatives with programs like ArtBento and Artists in the Schools to embed creative and expressive opportunities for students to engage in core curricular standards.

“Please join me in congratulating again Principal Ervin Pasalo and Hōkūlani Elementary School as a 2022 National Blue Ribbon School. I now yield the floor to Senator Rhoads.”

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

“It is with great pride that I recognize Principal Ned Uemae and Nu‘uanu Elementary School as our second recipient. A former National Blue Ribbon School awardee in 1986, 2003, and 2006, Nu‘uanu Elementary affirmed its position as a top school for a fourth time as a 2022 awardee. In doing so, it met the performance award criteria for Exemplary High-Performing Schools, and it ranked in the top 15 percent in achievement in math and English. Nu‘uanu’s performance outpaced other performance averages statewide in English language arts (ELA) (12 points higher) and math (14 points higher).

“Nu‘uanu offers specialized learning experiences such as performing arts, technology, social-emotional learning, as well as a variety of extracurricular activities established through partnerships with community organizations. All Nu‘uanu educators are fully licensed, have an average of 16 years of teaching experience, or have been at the school for an average of 16.5 years. The school’s parent organization, ‘Aikane o Nu‘uanu, is credited with fostering a strong school community culture, coordinating school-wide events like campus beautifications, pumpkin-carving nights—which I’ve had the honor of judging—movie nights, and family fun nights.

“It’s an honor and privilege to acknowledge Principal Ned Uemae and Nu‘uanu Elementary School as a 2022 National Blue Ribbon School. I yield the floor to the senator from District 12. Mahalo.”

Senator Moriwaki rose to present the following remarks:

“I have the honor of introducing Hawai‘i’s 2023 Milken Educator Award winner, Esther Kwon. Esther is a Waikīkī resident and assistant principal of Wahiawā’s Daniel K. Inouye Elementary School. This is the Oscar award of teaching excellence. It was launched by the Milken Family Foundation in 1987 to reward and inspire excellence in the world of education by honoring top educators across the nation. Milken honorees are selected by a blue ribbon panel of educators who seek outstanding elementary and secondary school teachers, principals, and other education professionals who meet the criteria for excellence.

“Ms. Kwon has been dedicated to the Wahiawā school community as a teacher and tutor for 10 years and now as its assistant principal. She is a former fifth-grade and gifted and talented enrichment teacher and contributed many hours in after-school tutoring and in the Korean language. She also served on the school’s community council, as student council advisor, and leads the Pineapple Academy’s distance learning program, overseeing 12 elementary schools in the Leilehua–Mililani–Waialua Complex Area. Ms. Kwon was a 2016 Hawai‘i State Teaching Fellow. She understands firsthand the importance of student belonging and social-emotional well-being as Daniel K. Inouye Elementary serves a student population almost entirely composed of military dependents. She has been dedicated to helping these students to overcome challenges of family relocation due to military service and to strive for academic success. She is a passionate leader and exceptional educator who is truly deserving of the Milken national recognition.

“Colleagues, please join me in congratulating our 2023 Milken Educator awardee, Esther Kwon from the Daniel K. Inouye Elementary School. I now yield the floor to Senator San Buenaventura.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to present the following remarks:

“The Milken Teacher of Promise award is granted by the Milken Family Foundation and recognizes teachers who showcase educational excellence during their first years in the classroom, demonstrating tremendous promise at the onset of their career. It is with great pride that I present the Hawai‘i District’s Hilo–Waiākea Milken Teacher of Promise recipient, Hippolyte Assi.

“Mr. Assi’s transition into teaching combines his passion for healthcare and education. Having worked in the healthcare industry for a decade with a doctor of pharmacy degree, he began teaching as a substitute teacher at Hilo High in 2018. He completed the UH Leeward Community College teacher certification program, became a provisional licensed teacher, and joined the Hilo High staff in 2019. Mr. Assi is currently a health services teacher who provides career and technical education training for students. His efforts focus on providing students with hands-on health services learning opportunities, particularly in the fields of nursing and clinical care. In addition to his work at Hilo High, Mr. Assi has also taught at Sweetwater Health Services, a post-secondary vocational school for nursing and pharmacy technician students.

“It is our honor to recognize Hippolyte Assi as the Hawai‘i District’s 2022 Hilo–Waiākea Milken Teacher of Promise awardee.

“I also have the great privilege of recognizing the Hawai‘i District’s 2022 Milken Teacher of Promise honoree, Annie Henbest. Ms. Henbest is from the Ka‘ū–Kea‘au–Pāhoa Complex Area.

“A proud educator of 10 years, Ms. Henbest has invaluable experience in elementary, middle, and high school grades. She began teaching as a literacy and technology coach at Pāhoa High & Intermediate School before transitioning to vice principal in 2022. In this role, she has enjoyed supporting teachers and addressing a variety of learning challenges they experienced in the classroom through open communication and collaboration. Ms. Henbest believes that her greatest strength as an educator is her ability to foster and maintain meaningful relationships with students and colleagues, which is also her favorite aspect of her job. She has been able to positively impact the Pāhoa school community by striving to guide, empower, and encourage fellow educators in their efforts to support the best interests of their students. She is truly an exceptional educator who is deserving of recognition.

“I am thrilled to celebrate Annie Henbest as the Hawai‘i District’s 2022 Ka‘ū–Kea‘au–Pāhoa Milken Teacher of Promise honoree. I now yield the floor to Senator Chang.”

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

“I’m thrilled to acknowledge another deserving educator, Jessica Lobo Atnip. She is the Central District’s ‘Aiea–Moanalua–Radford Milken Teacher of Promise recipient.

“Ms. Atnip is in her third year of teaching at ‘Aiea Intermediate, her Teach for America placement school. When she joined the community in 2020, she taught general education classes for seventh- and eighth-grade English. Now in her third year, she is currently the department head of ‘Aiea’s newly established English language department, serving as the eighth-grade English language arts teacher and coordinator. Please join me in welcoming our final awardee, the Leeward District’s 2022 Pearl City–Waipahu Complex Milken Teacher of Promise recipient, Kisa Matlin.

“Ms. Matlin is currently in her third year of teaching at Waipahu High School, where she works with the Academy of Natural Resources as a science and career and technical education teacher. She also serves as a co-advisor of the Academy of Natural Resources ambassadors program and the Waipahu High School chapter of Future Farmers of America. Throughout her tenure at Waipahu, Ms. Matlin has advised students in their entrepreneurial pursuits, coaching them in the design, creation, and marketing of locally produced, value-added products. She and her students were also featured on OluKai Hawai‘i’s Anywhere Aloha Fridays online video series, demonstrating how to tie-dye tote bags for the Made in Hawai‘i marketplace using turmeric. Ms. Matlin acknowledges this recognition as a testament to her role model and grandmother, Lillian Shigeko Hatate, who was a Hawai‘i DOE educator for 30 years. She hopes to pay the gift of educational excellence forward and is proud to have a hand in growing future stewards of Hawai‘i.

Monday, March 20, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senator Keith-Agaran who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator DeCoite introduced members of his staff who were seated in the gallery: office manager Rebecca Crall, who had offered a moment of contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session; Richard Oshiro; and Javen Alania.

Senator Awa introduced students and teachers from Kahuku Elementary School. Present in the gallery were Anela Manu, Leilani Lauaki, Maile Fotu, Talia Tipoti, Lolohea Sulunga, and Malia Plunkett.

Senator Lee introduced Mr. Andrew McClean, a good friend and recovering former legislator who had served as chair of the transportation committee in Maine.

Senator Wakai honored and recognized Carissa Moore, and presented the following remarks:

"Surf's up in the Senate. Colleagues, we are in the presence of greatness. Carissa Moore is the most accomplished female surfer to walk the Earth or carve up waves. She represented Hawai'i with grace and power by becoming the first female gold medalist in Olympic surfing history. She left her indelible mark at the Tokyo Games in the summer of 2021. Due to the pandemic, the Senate finally has an opportunity to acknowledge her immense contributions to surfing and the state.

"Carissa Moore began surfing in Waikīkī at age five. She went on to win a record 11 National Scholastic Surfing Association amateur titles. In 2010, she turned pro and was named Rookie of the Year. By the ripe old age of 18, she became the youngest person, male or female, to win a surfing world title. She would go on to win five—five—world championships. Carissa is in the Surfers' Hall of Fame. A few other accomplishments include being named Adventurer of the Year by *National Geographic*, Woman of the Year by *Glamour* magazine, and James E. Sullivan Award recipient, which recognizes an outstanding athlete whose athletic accomplishments are complemented by qualities of leadership and sportsmanship. She's the first surfer and first Native Hawaiian to win that award.

"Carissa is an unrivaled surfer and an advocate for others. In 2018, she launched the Moore Aloha Charitable Foundation, where she gives back to the community by donating to local surf clubs and speaking out against sexism, binge eating, and body shaming to help young girls develop confidence.

"Carissa was born in Honolulu and graduated from Punahou, where she also met her husband, Luke. Together, they have two dogs: Maya and Tuffy. When she is not surfing, Carissa enjoys scrapbooking and spending quality time with her family.

"After claiming the gold medal in Tokyo, Carissa was interviewed about her connection to the sport. She said, 'The ocean has changed my life and I can't imagine my life without it. I'll be surfing until I'm in the ground. Riding waves makes you feel free, it makes you feel present, it makes you feel more in love with yourself and the ocean and the environment.' Those words capture the power of the ocean and Carissa Moore's connection to it. As she has redefined surfing, she has

never forgotten her roots. Thank you, Carissa Moore, for all you have done for the sport and the state of Hawai'i.

"Carissa is joined in the gallery with her family: her mother, Carol Moore, and her husband, David Yamada—if you could please stand to be recognized. And both of them are accompanied by Keith Amemiya and my staffers, Lori McKeown as well as Richard Mizusawa. Thank you all for being a part of this momentous occasion."

We should all be a bit wary of a 570-page report in which the fifth word is spelled ‘Monoa,’ as in the ‘University of Hawaii at Monoa.’ Apparently, the \$59,000 invoice for an independent investigation about a year in the making by College Sports Solutions doesn’t include springing for spellcheck. . . .

For the most part, it’s the same old, same old, we heard at the time of (and before and after) the crisis that resulted in most of the best and most experienced UH football players leaving the program. Basically, its bosses (coaches, administrators) telling unhappy underlings (student-athletes), ‘Hey, we’ve got to communicate better.’

Now it’s official, because an outside source—contracted by some of the bosses—says so. . . .

The CSS report tells us that no NCAA rules and no laws were broken, and all those communication problems seem to have vanished with the hiring of Timmy Chang as the new football coach. This was such a good thing for UH that the athletic department has been reported as having ‘embraced’ the report.

The report also came to the stunning conclusion that building a new football stadium might be good for morale.

You can’t pay for advice like that. Hey, wait ... we just did.

I hope you all read the article. Thank you.”

At this time, Senator Lee, Chair of the Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts, requested a waiver of the public notice requirement pursuant to Senate Rule 21 for H.B. No. 110, H.D. 1.

Senator Lee noted:

“There have been a few developments late in the process we’d like to consider but also want to make sure the public has an opportunity to comment and provide testimony.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Lee announced that the Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts would be holding a public hearing on the measure on Thursday, March 23, 2023, at 3:00 p.m. in Conference Room 224.

Senator DeCoite encouraged the members to check out Manufacturing Day, which was taking place on the fourth floor of the Capitol until 1:00 p.m.

The Chair remarked that Kauai Kookies were among the items featured on the Manufacturing Day tables.

Senator Fevella rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Governor continues to criticize and condemn my colleagues and I for doing our jobs and our constitutional duties. To quote you, Senate President, last Tuesday, you said you were troubled when the governor said we should just give him a chance and let everyone that he nominates be confirmed just because. I agree with you, Mr. President. If that were the case, the law would simply be written that the governor appoints who he wants to have on his team. But the law instead says that the Senate has a duty and responsibility to advise and consent. It is the responsibility that everyone in this chamber takes very seriously. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I should be getting a royalty for the amount of times *Civil Beat* insists on featuring me in their mostly interesting but fictional stories. I get it—like the senator from Ka’a’awa mentioned in his moment of contemplation, there are heroes and villains. That storyline sells. But, really, what we should be after are the facts and the truth. I don’t get the fact that the Senate is in chaos, and if that’s a member’s reality, well, bills are moving, committees are meeting, the budget is getting crafted. Those who feel that there is chaos should probably get more organized and focus on their work instead of the hype.

“Going back to the facts and the truth, the truth is, several of us had voiced concerns about a nomination that was referred to the Water and Land committee. Fact one: Concerns are based on past performance, lack of outcomes, and issues brought up by current staff overseen by the nominee. Fact two: In a leadership meeting, when these concerns were being discussed, the subject-matter chair did not dispute them. The subject-matter chair’s response was to ‘vote your conscience.’ Other colleagues also had mentioned that they had been approached by Office of Planning staff with concerns.

“When people get frustrated, they start calling others names, creating the narrative of heroes, villains, and bullies. We need to stick to the facts and focus on the people’s work, solve our state’s most challenging problems. We have a responsibility to vote and vet the nominees. As a member of the COVID committee, I saw firsthand many instances where the administration froze, were not up to the challenge, and responded slowly. We have to do our job. We have to feel

confident that these nominees are up to the challenge. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Mr. President, I think it should be made known to the public that, as a member of this body, we are all entitled to sit in on any committee. That is the only time that a member has the opportunity to ask questions because if you wait till we get to the floor, we cannot ask the nominee questions or ask about a bill. So to be chastised, as I was by the governor, that I went into a committee that I was not a member, we have every right to do that. And I invite any member to sit in on my committee—if you have questions, you are so welcome to come in—and I’ve always had that opportunity, and I know many of you have invited me to sit in your committees. And so I think we should go on the record to let the public know that that is our right. We may not vote in those committees, but we have every right to be in the committee, to know what’s going on. Otherwise, how can you vote on this floor if you’re not part of the discussion? And that is what we also get criticized for: that we make our decisions before we even hear what the public has to say. So I think that we should go on record and that should be well known to everyone. Thank you.”

The Chair emphasized that any member could attend another committee meeting. The Chair requested that any member planning to attend a meeting of a committee the member was not part of to notify the committee chair of the member’s intent, which would ensure that proper arrangements, including a seat at the table, nameplate, and microphone, would be made for the member’s effective participation.

The Chair then announced that there would be a leadership meeting in his office immediately following adjournment.

The Chair invited Ms. Moritsugu and Ms. Furukawa to the floor for picture-taking following adjournment. The Chair noted that Ms. Moritsugu’s father, former acting U.S. surgeon general, and Norman Mineta, former Transportation secretary, had been two Asian Americans who had broken through the glass ceiling in holding those federal government positions.

“I have talked to all of the members in the caucus, and there isn’t a member who has come forward to tell me that they felt coerced in any way by Senator Dela Cruz or Senator Kidani on how to cast a vote, but they did feel some pressure from the Water-Land chair in how they were going to vote. It is routine for Senator Kidani as the vice president, Senator Kanuha as the majority leader, and other members of the leadership team to continually take the temperature of where members of the caucus are leaning. And so, with that request, with the attention that has been brought onto this nominee’s vote, I will ask, if there are no objections, that we defer this item to Friday.”

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1226 (Gov. Msg. No. 528):

Senator Inouye moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1226 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

Senator Inouye then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of LAURA KAAKUA as Deputy to the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Laura Kaakua has a long history of legal, land use, and conservation experience through the years. Ms. Kaakua is a member of the Hawaii State Bar Association and a graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai‘i. She earned her bachelor of arts degree at Boston College and is the recipient of certificates and awards from several organizations. Most recently, she has been the president and chief executive officer of the Hawai‘i Land Trust. She has held that position since March 2019 to the present. Prior to that, she enjoyed a brief stint as a lecturer at the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai‘i in 2017.

“From April 2010 to March 2019, Laura Kaakua was the native lands program manager for the Trust for Public Land in Honolulu, Hawai‘i. She enjoyed a six-month contract working on the annual Envision Hawai‘i conference from October 2009 to March 2010. She also worked in various capacities within the legal realm for the Third Circuit Court, the United States District Court, and Earthjustice. She also worked at the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and as a team leader for the Hawai‘i Youth Conservation Corps. Her recent community service includes leadership council member for the Land Trust Alliance, Nā Pualei o Līkolehua hula hālau, Protect Kaho‘olawe ‘Ohana, and the Access to Justice Commission.

“Ms. Kaakua will be bringing her legal understanding, conservation background, and management experience to serve the Department of Land and Natural Resources as the deputy to the chairperson. As deputy, she will be accountable as part of DLNR’s leadership team to the people of Hawai‘i. She plans to work with legislators during the legislative sessions and work with the various divisions within DLNR to improve the DLNR’s capacity to fulfill its mission.

“Over her term of service, Laura Kaakua will work every day to accomplish the following goals:

- Support community stewardship and responsibility of DLNR’s lands and waters through legal agreements that make practical sense and allow community and DLNR stewards to focus their limited time and resources on actively caring for the lands and sea;
- Partner with landowners, stewards, farmers, ranchers, and watershed partnerships where DLNR has land to cohesively manage at the ahupua‘a and moku levels;
- Work closely with the Legislature to ensure DLNR has the resources and legal authority needed to accomplish its mission and increase the amount of private and federal funds that go toward conserving and enhancing Hawai‘i’s natural, cultural, and historic resources;
- Work with educational and nonprofit partners to build a pipeline of local stewards and scientists who will become DLNR’s future leaders and diversify the economy through green jobs and innovation;

- Increase transparency and build public trust through open communication, physically going into communities—especially on the neighbor islands—to find common a path toward and managing and supporting DLNR’s 10 divisions.

“Mr. President and members, Ms. Laura Kaakua is highly qualified for the position, and offers the DLNR continuity and enhancement in its mission to nurture Hawai‘i’s land and ocean resources. I strongly ask that you advise and consent in her favor. Mahalo.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“You know, Mr. President, productivity, metrics, and walking the walk: Those are the bars by which I believe this body tries to judge the nominees. In this situation, the deputy director has proven to my community that she has done that. She got handed quite a storm with the wrecking of the luxury yacht on Honolua Bay. She flew out on her weekend and was there working with both community advocates, the environmental community, Native Hawaiian community, and others on taking swift action to rectify the situation. Only recently, after a Kona storm, when more vessels ran aground, she made sure the Department responded readily and prevented damage to the Hauola stone, a cherished mark of the Native Hawaiian community and history. She has walked the walk—she’s been the first deputy director that I can recall who’s been out in our community—and so I’d just like to say a few words in support of the nomination. Thank you for letting me do so.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Inouye introduced Deputy Laura Hokunani Edmunds Kaakua, who was present in the gallery with her husband, Josh Kaakua; children Pono and Melia Kaakua; parents, John and Ginny Edmunds; in-laws Joe and Girlie Kaakua; extended family Uncle Muddy Hashimoto and Krislyn Hashimoto; and Department of Land and Natural Resources support staff.

Senator Wakai explained that the jewelry on each member’s desk was a promotional item for a locally produced film about the shaka, which has its origins in Kahuku and has become a global symbol of the aloha that lives in everyone. Senator Wakai expressed his hope that the members would enjoy the item and promote the movie, which was scheduled to come out later in the year.

The Chair made the following announcement:

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

MATTER DEFERRED FROM WEDNESDAY, MARCH 22, 2023

The Chair made the following observation:

"All motions for advise and consent will be in the affirmative, even in the case of Director Sadayasu, who was a negative recommendation, so anyone voting 'yes' on any of the four advise and consent matters is voting 'yes' to confirm; anybody voting 'no' would be in opposition to the confirmation."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1225 (Gov. Msg. No. 506):

Senator Inouye moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of SCOTT GLENN as Director of the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. Glenn has already been serving as the director of OPSD since December 2022 and has adeptly navigated through the duties and responsibilities of the position.

"Prior to his appointment to the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, Scott Glenn demonstrated his leadership ability by reinvigorating the Hawai'i State Energy Office after the Legislature reestablished the agency as part of its efforts to help the state achieve a more resilient, clean-energy economy. Before that, Mr. Glenn served as the director of the Office of Environmental Quality Control, where he was responsible for the modernization of the state's environmental review process. Before coming into public service, Scott Glenn worked in the private sector, where he focused on planning, asset management, and risk analysis and led or held key roles on multiple multi-million dollar projects for both public- and private-sector clients.

"As director, Mr. Glenn will bring an innovative, data-driven, collaborative cross-sector approach to today's challenges. Mr. Glenn will be supporting OPSD's mission and statutory activities. He outlines 11 specific activities pursuant to HRS Section 225M-2, which includes the following:

- State comprehensive planning and program coordination via state functional plans;
- Strategic planning of significant issues and formulating alternatives and opportunities;
- Planning coordination among state agencies and the state, county, and federal governments;
- Statewide planning and geographic information system through the gathering of various forms of data and information;
- Land use planning by developing and presenting the state in all boundary change petitions and proceedings before the Land Use Commission;
- Coastal and ocean property policy management and sea level rise adaptation coordination by administering the Hawai'i Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Program;
- Regional planning and studies to determine carrying capacity and impacts;
- Regional, national, and international planning by participating in and ensuring consistency to the extent practicable with regional, national, and international planning efforts;
- Climate adaptation and sustainability planning and coordination;
- Smart growth and transit-oriented development (TOD) by acting as the lead agency to coordinate and advance smart growth and TOD planning within the state;
- Environmental review by performing the duties set forth under HRS Chapter 343.

“One hundred twelve testifiers submitted testimony in support of Mr. Glenn, and seven opposed. Many of his colleagues and distinguished government officials have spoken very highly of Mr. Glenn. For these and many other reasons, Mr. President and colleagues, I ask you for your support of Scott Glenn in his nomination as director of the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development. Mahalo, Mr. President.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, I have grave concerns about this nominee. As a leader, he failed to take care of his staff. At the State Energy Office, he promised to build energy projects, and he failed to deliver. And the most important concern I have is, he has failed to be a man of his word.

“At his confirmation hearing in Water and Land on March 8, 2023, I specifically asked him, knowing the deadline of the AES plant, I approached him and asked him if he came to legislators to request a deadline extension. In the hearing, he said he did. I spoke to my colleagues and my colleague from the energy subject matter, and he said, ‘No, the G.M. did not talk to me about an extension legislation.’ Then, again, I got reports from AES workers on G.M. 506 that he did not reach out to them, either. After the March 8 hearing, he came up to me in the hallway area, and he said, ‘Oh, Senator, I misspoke in the hearing.’ As why today I wanted to put on the following worker in the evidence of the coal plant that was going to meet the deadline in 2020. He had an opportunity to take action—failed to take action in 2020, 2021, and 2022. He did not misspeak to me in the hallway: He lied. I oppose G.M. 506 strongly because not only in his previous position as the energy chair, but environmentally, he failed our communities in environmental, not taking the steps that he needed to do when it came to the windmills and informing the communities of energy that wasn’t so clean and wasn’t so firm, and when they were trying to build on Camp Pālehua windmills that we got wind of it—pardon my joke—and we stopped it. The community got together and stopped it. He told me, when I was in the energy, when Senator Kai Kahele was there, in the committee when I first got here: No more windmills. Soon after that—reason why I remember

this, I don’t need write um down, because I take it seriously when somebody like to use the word ‘mislead.’

“Colleagues, when I spoke yesterday from my heart, I was truly troubled in this chamber because I was taught, and I was taught right, by the leadership of this body that all we have is our word. So when we give each other our word here, we’re family. And what had happened: He tried to convince for opportunities to have windmills in Camp Pālehua, offshore windmills—in my community, both of them. When he said in the hearing, he gave me his word: No more windmills. Trying to help the community of Kahuku on the setbacks—no cooperation. You have to have a backbone to lead, and he did not; he failed. And this is the person that we’re going to put forward of this body leading our department? I urge my colleagues to vote with me in opposition to Scott Glenn, G.M. 506. Thank you, Senate President and colleagues; God bless.”

Senator Wakai rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President and colleagues, the state made a grave mistake by passing a law in the summer of 2020 to shut down O’ahu’s coal plant, largely based on assurances by the State Energy Office that there would be plenty of solar projects coming online. Its closure two years later, which was last September, coupled with rising oil prices have left residents paying for that mistake. Today, energy bills are 25 percent higher than a year ago.

“I didn’t watch the Water and Land confirmation hearing on March 8 because I was preparing for my own confirmation hearing for nominees to the Department of Law Enforcement as well as the Department of Defense. As I headed to that hearing, Mr. Glenn stopped me near the rail. He looked frazzled, and he wanted to alert me that he just made a misstatement to the committee about meeting with me on the coal plant closure. I agreed: We never discussed options prior to that coal plant being shut down. Mr. Glenn went on to convey to the senator from ‘Ewa that he had misled the committee as well and admitted to never conveying a plan. Instead of accepting his mistake, Mr. Glenn tried to cover it up. On March 18th, he sent a letter to the Water and Land chair claiming that he met with me in the Powering Past Coal Task Force meetings that began in 2021. This was a group of 20 people Zooming in online. There was no one-on-one meeting to, again, talk about any kind of mitigation plans for the shutdown of the coal plant when our renewable energy projects were obviously not going to come online soon enough.

“Members, we all make mistakes—that is forgivable. Trying to cover it up is not. I encourage you to vote ‘no’ on this nominee.”

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“We vote today on whether the nominee can lead the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD). I cannot vote ‘yes’ on Scott Glenn. I’ve known Scott—appreciate his work on the Office of Environmental Quality Control in its update of the environmental impact statement rules and at the State Energy Office. However, effective leadership is more than working with stakeholders to achieve initiatives. Leadership also requires inspiring and bringing employees along, including those who may disagree and take issue with our actions—all this to achieve the joint mission of the office. I’ve heard some very serious concerns from OPSD employees. They feel unsupported in their work—subject-matter experts with their opinions disregarded. Some have already left; others say they will leave if Scott is confirmed. As labor committee chair, I know that the state faces a significant workforce shortage. We

cannot afford to lose qualified staff and, in particular, in this very important office that plans for our future. We need leaders who can inspire and support employees to change government to make sure we serve the public. Thank you, Mr. Chair.”

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“The descriptions I’ve heard of Mr. Glenn are ones that I just don’t even recognize the individual that I thought I knew a little bit. He and his wife live in the building I live in in Chinatown, and my experience with him has always been he’s very straightforward, almost to the point of, sometimes he tells you things you don’t want to hear because he thinks it’s the truth, and sometimes we don’t always want to hear exactly what the situation is. He understands very clearly what’s going to happen to the state of Hawai‘i as global warming progresses, and he’s a capable enough person that he’ll make great contributions in helping the state deal with the many things that we’re going to have to deal with as global warming gets worse. I think he’ll do a great job in this position, and I hope that my colleagues will agree with me. Mahalo.”

Senator Kidani rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“My concerns with the nominee have to do with his past performance, which lacked outcomes in his role as the chief energy officer and issues that have surfaced in his role as director of Office of Planning and Sustainable Development. Statute 196-71 established the Energy Office to do this:

- Provide analysis and planning to actively develop and inform policies to achieve energy efficiency, renewable energy, energy resiliency, and clean transportation goals with the Legislature, Public Utilities Commission, state agencies, and other relevant stakeholders;
- Number two, lead efforts to incorporate;
- And three, provide energy efficiency, renewable energy, energy resiliency, and clean transportation to reduce costs and achieve clean energy goals across all public facilities;
- Number four, engage the private sector to help lead efforts to achieve renewable energy and clean transportation goals through the Hawai‘i Clean Energy Initiative.

He did not do these things.

“We are all suffering from the high cost of living, especially high cost of energy. The nominee was in charge of the Energy Office and should have played a significant role in planning to keep our cost of energy down. He had a very significant voice in shutting down the lowest cost of energy for O‘ahu, and during the session of 2020, he did not talk to our subject-matter chair, even though he lied during his confirmation hearing, saying that he did. His lie was that he informed us—this body—that the retirement of the coal plant was going to increase the cost significantly. He also was informed that the solar farms forecasted to make up for the loss of 20 percent of O‘ahu’s energy would be delayed but did not recommend to this body that we hold off on that legislation or make a contingency plan. He had full opportunity to come back to the legislators in 2021 and 2022 before the shutdown of the coal plant to let us know of the further delays in the solar projects and could have put in a bill to mitigate this issue, but nothing was done. For this reason, Mr. President, I cannot support this nominee.”

At 12:02 p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:06 p.m.

The Chair called for a Roll Call vote, and clarified the voting procedures.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 12; Ayes with Reservations (Shimabukuro). Noes, 12 (Aquino, Awa, Chang, DeCoite, Dela Cruz, Fevella, Keith-Agaran, Kidani, Kim, McKelvey, Moriwaki, Wakai). Excused, 1 (San Buenaventura).

By unanimous consent, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1225 was received and placed on file.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1336 (Gov. Msg. No. 505):

At this time, the Chair made the following observation:

“Members, pursuant to Senate Rule 37, the final question on nominations made by the governor must be stated in the affirmative. So, again, a ‘yes’ vote is to confirm; a ‘no’ vote is against confirmation.”

Senator Kanuha moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1336 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Richards and carried.

Pursuant to Senate Rule 37, Senator Kanuha moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CHRIS SADAYASU as Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Richards.

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“As the chair of your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism, I took my responsibility in vetting the G.M. nomination very seriously. I want to make sure that the next director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism is ready for the task and can help the department, its divisions, and attached agencies succeed in their missions. I did not come to my recommendation to not advise and consent lightly. I’m a fan and a supporter of our current governor, and I want to support the administration, and the best way I can do this is to be honest—to be honest and to make my recommendations based on the information in front of me and based on the performance we have seen so far.

“It was my task and the task of the EET committee members to vet this nominee. These are the concerns shared by the majority of the EET committee members as well: concerns over his understanding of the Sunshine Law, serious concerns over his ability to manage all of the staff under his jurisdiction at DBEDT and attached agencies. His résumé mentions that he previously supervised four employees. DBEDT and its attached agencies has 330 employees. His inexperience in managing and communicating with staff became apparent during our WAM briefings. It was clear to committee members that there was a lack of communication, which led to the nominee making announcements about pending actions before his attached agencies were notified. A director cannot blindsides staff like that. A director has to have a clear communication plan. They need to know how to get updates and reports from their employees, and give clear instructions and deadlines. A healthy communication plan fosters a productive and healthy work environment. Another point that became evident during the WAM briefings was a lack of familiarity with his own department’s budget, and when questioned by the chair of WAM on certain line items, he was willing just to let them be taken out instead of backing up the planned budget put together. He didn’t take ownership of his department’s budget and, by not doing so, he also failed to back up his staff. He had a lot of supportive testimony, but most was boilerplate, where they were just relisting items from his résumé without any actual

examples of the leadership accomplishments of community involvement.

“As members of the Senate, we must take responsibility to advise and consent seriously. This is the business of the state; people’s livelihoods depend on this. It’s not about who we like or who we are friends with. The question is: Can the person do the lead and do the job well? Clearly, he cannot. All of us have an obligation to our constituents to confirm department heads who will operate our departments effectively and efficiently. Mr. President, this is not a personal decision for me. This vote is about process and the ability to get the job done. I don’t feel Mr. Sadayasu has the capacity to do what is being asked of him at this time. I ask for you to support the decision made by your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism to not advise and consent on this nominee. Mahalo.”

Senator Fukunaga rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“During the past 20-plus years, more than almost any other department within the state cabinet, Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism has been the product of multiple changes that the State Legislature and the executive branch have agreed upon. Its policies and procedures have been driven by legislative priorities to diversify Hawai‘i’s economy while determining how to strike the appropriate balance between Hawai‘i’s traditional reliance on tourism, military spending, and construction against future-oriented industries that build upon local residents’ creative strengths. Where conditions have fallen short, as was recently pointed out in the *Star-Advertiser’s* coverage of the leaking roof and structural issues associated with the Convention Center or with Aloha Stadium’s rust problems, I believe that the Legislature is just as responsible as our other executive agencies for delayed corrective action. As such, Chris Sadayasu’s long-term experience within a variety of DBEDT agencies and in county government gives him a unique perspective that few other candidates have. The fact that he is well respected within the department and among those who interact with the department demonstrates his strengths of being hard-working, analytical, and demanding as well as being fair and inclusive. I therefore urge my colleagues to join in confirming Mr. Sadayasu as director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, Chris Sadayasu appeared before several WAM and EET hearings. These hearings were the opportunity for Mr. Sadayasu to demonstrate his ability to lead, to present new ideas and innovation, and display strong decision-making skills, but the nominee missed the mark. He appeared before the committee unprepared. Mr. President, like any sports team, the DBEDT needs a head coach, someone who will show strong understanding of the fundamentals, someone who will be visionary with skills to advance the strategies, but what Mr. Sadayasu showed us, his experience that we all talk about in a different department, was all mid-level management. He never took a lead role in those positions. Even in HTA, he was behind the scenes. I oppose this nominee and wish my colleagues will support me in not recommending, and opposing G.M. 505. Thank you, Mr. President and colleagues; God bless and aloha.”

Senator Kim rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, it does not give me any pleasure to stand up and explain my vote in opposition, but we have been accused that our votes are political rather than based on job performance. So, as a member of the EET committee, my vote

was and is based on the nominee’s résumé of his experience and his job performance before the Ways and Means committee budget briefings and his performance at the confirmation hearing. Here are the specifics: The DBEDT director’s job description is to manage the development and implementation of economic change through retention, expansion, attraction of commerce and light industry, and the creation of incentive zone programs, business growth, and expansion. The nominee’s résumé lacks experience in these areas and does not exhibit the skills needed to manage and oversee a department of six divisions and ten attached agencies. He has never managed more than five employees throughout his whole work history. This lack of management skills and collaboration showed itself when he, on January 25th, during the budget briefing, announced, unrelated to the day’s agenda, that he was taking over the USA marketing RFP and not the destination RFP, which I thought was baseless since it was not consistent with his reasoning. I quote the nominee: ‘The director’s office is going to take on the USA marketing RFP and we’re going to issue it ourselves. We’ll take it on, and we’ll manage it. I haven’t even informed them—HTA—and I’m going to inform the board tomorrow.’ It is troubling that he did not collaborate or inform HTA before making this announcement publicly that he, as the HOA, was taking over just half of the RFP. Then, the next day, when he met with HTA, he changed his mind. Mr. President, a thoughtful, experienced director would not have jumped the gun and be so erratic.

“Further, during the Ways and Means budget briefings, the nominee was not prepared. He did not display the ability to identify and prioritize DBEDT’s budget, adds of hundreds of thousands of dollars. He did not exhibit fiscal restraint, and approved all 60 new adds that was asked for; he did not reject any one of them. Of the 60 new adds, 50 were identified by him as the number one priority, while 9 were number two, and just 1 as number three. And, during that budget briefing, several DBEDT division heads responded that they would not be pursuing some of the new asks and did not need them, which reflected the director’s lack of vetting his division budget request.

“Finally, on the DBEDT’s webpage, ‘About the Director’ states, ‘Sadayasu has over 17 years of experience as an expert in economic development in DBEDT’s various attached agencies, including HTA.’ Mr. President, my research, along with reviewing all of the HTA’s board meeting minutes as well as the standing marketing committee minutes during his time at HTA and other attached agencies: The record does not reach the level of ‘expert’ in economic development. At HTA, he was a mid-level manager with no decision-making responsibilities. These minutes also show that:

- In 2016, his first year that he was at DBEDT, he was absent from seven out of eleven regular board meetings;
- In 2018, absent from eight of twelve regular board meetings, and the same year, 2018, absent from four out of nine standing marketing committee meetings;
- In 2020, absent from eight of the nine regular board meetings, and the same year, 2020, absent from seven out of the eight standing marketing committee meetings;
- In 2021, absent from all regular board meetings and all marketing committee meetings until August 2021, when he left HTA.

In the meetings he did attend, he did not have any role in the discussions of his assigned areas of marketing or sports. So this is far from being an expert as described on the DBEDT’s webpage.

“Mr. President, Mr. Sadayasu is an enthusiastic young man and deserves a chance, but my research and all that I’ve seen, read, and heard, he is not ready to lead one of the most important departments in the state during this time of economic

uncertainty. Therefore, Mr. President, I cannot support Governor's Message 505. Thank you."

The Chair called for a Roll Call vote, and clarified the voting procedures.

The motion was put by the Chair and, Roll Call vote having been requested, failed to carry on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 8; Ayes with Reservations (Chang). Noes, 15 (Aquino, Awa, DeCoite, Dela Cruz, Fevella, Gabbard, Keith-Agaran, Keohokalole, Kidani, Kim, Kouchi, Lee, McKelvey, Moriwaki, Shimabukuro). Excused, 2 (San Buenaventura, Wakai).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1337 (Gov. Msg. No. 520):

Senator McKelvey moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1337 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Gabbard and carried.

Senator McKelvey then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KEITH REGAN as Comptroller of the Department of Accounting and General Services, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"During the hearing for the deputy, we brought up several issues. Mr. President, your Committee on Government Operations—we went ahead and put the nominee through a grilling process. As I like to say, it was like a Redondo dog on a hibachi at a UH game. We saw, during the WAM info briefings, there were a lot of questions raised about the nominee and his grasp of the area and his relationship with the subject matters. I met with him and explained to him of these areas, and I also talked to him about the fact that you are the acting comptroller now; it's time to walk and do things and not discuss it.

"We brought up issues during the hearing of the deputy, Mr. President, and during his hearing, he went ahead and he described the fixes to which we were seeking, like deficiencies in paying out vouchers: vouchers for Department of Health and Human Services that go to our nonprofits to take care of our needy community. He came forward with the fix for these issues. He's found creative ways to fill other vacancies that are much needed and develop a recruitment pipeline using our colleges, our high schools, and even appearing himself personally at job fairs which DAGS has been holding. He's addressing the mold situation at DOE and facilities on Hawai'i island, and didn't shrink away from the criticism that came up about the situation during the committee hearing. Mr. Regan has a detailed, intricate knowledge of all of the divisions in DAGS, from Public Works all the way to Central Services, and many of them have formally and informally vouched for his involvement and team-building spirit for this agency. He has created a 'DAGS in your district' bulletin to update us lawmakers on specific DAGS-related projects, incidents, and issues, as well as response plans to help us better communicate projects to our constituents. He has done a deep dive with the support of administrators like Public Works on how we can address the big issues in project delivery that are being overlooked. He has encouraged current measures and initiatives. He has identified the need for provided immediate office space and support for the School Facilities Authority so they can grow into what we envision them to be. He has met with your committee chair and given us detailed metric reports and updates on the different divisions in DAGS, and he's even identified how we can truly introduce new policies next year to address what is the slowdown in the construction delivery process that goes far beyond procurement. He has worked with risk assessment division on emulating creative solutions that

other states have done to address the spiraling costs of insurance for our state facilities. And, finally, he has implemented the job program in DAGS and looks to expand it to the neighbor islands, a program that will be visiting all of our schools in my district. The principals and teachers are happy to finally see jobs being done and permitting being bundled.

"We started the relationship with Mr. Regan, we challenged him, and he has grown and he has delivered. He has worked with your office on addressing issues within the central campus itself. So, through this exact process, Mr. President, I think he has responded well. He has the support and camaraderie of his agency, he knows his program areas, and he's willing to work hard for the people of Hawai'i, and for that I'd like to go ahead and ask your support for the advise and consent for Mr. Regan as the comptroller."

The Chair reminded visitors in the gallery to silence or turn off their cell phones.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Keith Regan is one of the leading examples of a qualified candidate to lead a state department. He has constantly shown the Senate his leadership through his preparation. Prior to his meeting with me, we had discussed and has knowledge of the functions of his department. I had a chance to meet with Keith Regan prior to his nomination, and we easily came to an agreement about possibly creating a state permitting office. His leadership role in and at the County of Maui, HTA, and DCCA as a front-row player, not a backseat driver, and prove his qualification and have no doubt that this nominee, Keith Regan, will be able to lead the department successfully. I ask my colleagues to please support G.M. 520, Keith Regan. Mahalo and God bless."

Senator Wakai rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Keith Regan is aspiring to be the state's comptroller. He has proven himself to be a state collaborator: He comes to us with 16 years of government experience, first at Maui County and more recently with the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. During his tenure at HTA, I worked closely with Mr. Regan, who was the chief administrative officer. Whenever I asked for data or documents, he was always forthcoming and always responsive. We didn't always agree on tourism policy, but we always interacted respectfully. DAGS faces significant vacancies, a substantial deferred maintenance backlog, and reducing the state's dependency on leased office space. Over the past few months, I've seen improvements to modernize operational efficiency, innovative approaches to overcoming these lingering challenges, and supporting his team through improved communication and personal development growth opportunities. Mr. Regan has the ability to bring people together to overcome challenges that may seem insurmountable at first. Maintaining the state's infrastructure is vitally important; it's not super exciting, but Mr. Regan provides a sense of excitement and an expectation that we will see much better outcomes in the years ahead. I encourage all of you to support this exemplary collaborator to be our next comptroller."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, none. Excused, 1 (San Buenaventura).

Senator McKelvey introduced Comptroller Keith Regan, who was present in the gallery with his wife, Lynn Araki-Regan; son Riley Regan; in-laws Ann and Fred Araki; uncle George Shimada; and friends and colleagues from the Department of Accounting and General Services.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1338 (Gov. Msg. No. 524):

Senator Shimabukuro moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1338 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Ihara and carried.

Senator Shimabukuro then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KALI WATSON as Chairperson of the Department of Hawaiian Homelands, term to expire December 31, 2026, seconded by Senator Ihara.

Senator Shimabukuro rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President, your Committee believes that Mr. Watson’s extensive project development and legal background, combined with his lifelong service on behalf of Native Hawaiian housing and cultural issues, qualifies him to serve as chairperson of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. Your Committee finds that Mr. Watson is an established and sophisticated project developer with a proven track record of success, and that his subject-matter expertise and fluency in the complex field of housing development, which encompasses bond financing, housing tax credits, project management, and land use and zoning laws, will allow him to immediately take the helm and begin putting plans into action for the benefit of Native Hawaiian people.

“Your Committee finds that one of the chief concerns for many who testified was the need to quickly and efficiently encumber the \$600 million appropriated by the Legislature through Act 279, Session Laws of 2022, before the funds lapse, and your Committee appreciates Mr. Watson’s express intent to aggressively pursue the 20 projects identified in the strategic plan approved by the Hawaiian Homes Commission.

“Members, we’ve received some recent concerns from the Ahupua’a o Nānākuli Homestead; Mr. Watson will be reaching out to this important group of beneficiaries to discuss their concerns.

“Mr. President, your Committee, after full consideration of the background, experience, and qualifications of the nominee, has found him to be qualified for the position to which nominated and recommends the Senate advise and consent to his nomination. Mahalo.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

“Beneficiaries, constituents, and our Hawaiian community asked me to share my deepest concerns about G.M. 524. Nineteen years of dealing with DHHL and his nonprofit. He was asked over 10 times at his confirmation hearing about his many conflicts of interest. Just imagine, three out of the five of my colleagues in the Hawaiian committee are attorneys. None of them could get a clear answer about how he was to avoid his many conflicts of interest. One of my colleagues even asked him, ‘Why did you send in your answers to the committee’s questionnaire on your Hawaiian Community Development Board (HCDB) letterhead?’ The G.M. 524 did not and could not see that there was a problem with his using HCDB letterhead. Most ethical people will see that there should be a clear separation, but no: This G.M. said he would encourage his nonprofit to stay engaged with DHHL.

“My colleagues, we already know these delinquent lease rent payments over \$130,000, cause of hazardous material costing over \$2 million to clean up on his license on the parcel of Kalaeloa, and conflict upon conflict upon conflict of interest and blindness. What disturbs me in the committee was that he said his son, on one of the properties off in Mā’ili, he pays him \$4,500 a month to clean that property. I urge you, colleagues, go check out the property: no maintenance. So these are the

things, because of his attorney and his intelligence and engagement since he has left DHHL—he knows how to work the system, and Kali been working the system for a long, long time.

“I’ve had opposition to this man for decades. Mililani Trask testified in favor of this man—hmm, why? Geothermal on Hawaiian home lands, family and friends. Patty Kahanamoku-Teruya wants to be back a commissioner. These are the things you gotta look on who came. Crabbe from Moloka’i, the largest contaminator on Moloka’i, came—not only came, but also threatened my staff member. These are the people that he deals with. These are the people that’s willing to go against their Hawaiian community to get what they special interest conflicts that he has. What disturbs me is what Crabbe told my staff, and I don’t need this for that [*puts down paper*]. He was outside there supporting the opposition of Kali Watson’s nomination. This guy, Crabbe, comes up to my staff talking story, then he realized that he works for me. This is what he told my staff: ‘Wow, back in the day, politicians would get assassinated.’ That’s us. And I know I don’t call myself a politician—I’m an elected official—but I wasn’t afraid for myself, colleagues. I was afraid for my staff and my fellow colleagues. But this is the kind of people thinking that this is the kind of decade we’re living in. This is not 1976. We have to stop the insanity and stop recycling people that’s not pono for our people to go forward and prosper. I ask you, colleagues in this chamber: Do the right thing and vote ‘no’ on this nominee. Thank you, God bless, and aloha.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Tuesday, March 28, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:37 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

commission's order,' and goes on to, 'Provided that there shall be no appeal from the judgment.' This is very troubling, especially since the last bill that we passed upon third reading allowed the Campaign Spending Commission to mail us these proceedings without certified mail but presumed that, upon their mailing of the proceedings, within seven days, that we have received it. The more common people who are violated are first-time campaigners. My concern is, when this came to hearing, the deputy attorney general at the last hearing, I requested her opinion as to whether or not this passes due process. She said she did not study it. She said she was there for the Campaign Spending Commission and not to advise us, and, for those reasons, since I have concerns about the due process, constitutional right of somebody who may be adjudged to be punished for contempt—a criminal case—I stand in opposition. Thank you."

ADVISE AND CONSENT**

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1428 (Gov. Msg. No. 512):

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1428 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Aquino and carried.

Senator San Buenaventura then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of CATHERINE BETTS as Director of the Department of Human Services, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Aquino.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Colleagues, two years ago, I asked you to confirm Director Betts, and I mentioned her strong history of working as a deputy attorney general, Status of Women advisor, and her heart. Colleagues, I again ask you to join me and support her nomination to continue as director of the Department of Human Services.

“Cathy Betts has led the DHS through the waning days of the pandemic after Director Bhanot’s resignation. At a time when the public increasingly relied on the Department of Human Services for food, SNAP benefits, and health Medicaid benefits, Director Betts did not shirk from the huge responsibility, and led the agency well. During her term, Hawai‘i was the first in the country to implement pandemic EBT programs for schoolchildren who were not able to acquire school meals due to stay-at-home orders. Over 127,705 families were served. Hawai‘i’s Med-QUEST was the first in the country to implement Medicaid eligibility for COFA residents. As I said, it shows her heart.

“When the child-care industry was dying and did not look like there were enough child-care workers to be able to serve the working parents when they were able to get back to work, Director Betts again stepped up to the plate. She led DHS in distributing over \$165 million in federal child-care relief funds and child-care stabilization grants to prop up a child-care industry decimated during the stay-at-home orders. It is not easy to create a fair distribution process at a drop of a hat with spending deadlines, but Director Betts did so and provided child-care subsidies so that there will be a child-care workforce ready for parents eager to get back to work.

“There is more work to be done, and Director Betts, if confirmed, will step up to the challenge. During her tenure, DHS-attached agencies, like the Office of Youth Services, was heralded nationwide for having zero girls incarcerated for a period of almost three months. No one else in the country was able to achieve this feat. Department of Human Services has the biggest budget of all the state agencies because the agency affects every one of us, and Director Betts has stepped up to the plate, ran the agency well during crisis, and she deserves a reappointment, and I ask my colleagues to join me in confirming her nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Since my time in office, I’ve had some time working with Ms. Betts and the Department. Adult protective services, our community service branch—we needed to have some individuals, some people, place in in taking care of suspect of adult abuse. She supported the enforcement and the protections for kūpuna and valuable adult services that she provides—just her ongoing compassion. I got to meet with her. A lot of stuff, when we do these things, are confidential, but she assured me that the individual in my community was going to be taken care of, and he was. So, again, colleagues, one of the things that I

really, really like what she does in her efforts is the involvement of missing and murdered Native Hawaiian women and girls. Going forward, we’ve just got to continue to keep the momentum going. Colleagues, I ask you guys to join me in highly supporting G.M. 512, Cathy Betts. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senator Kidani explained that FFA is a dynamic youth organization that changes lives and prepares members for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through agricultural education. Senator Kidani noted that she was especially proud of the students in her and Senator Aquino's districts who attend Waipahu schools and go on to find success in many career fields. Senator Kidani introduced the students and advisors of the Waipahu High School FFA who were present in the gallery: advisors Sherry Tenn and Kisa Matlin, and students Angelo Agarano, Rovialyn Arciaga, Dalen Calistro, Alexis Chong, Samantha Enciso, Ciara Mae Francisco, Michaela Hernandez, Jhanella Gerardo, Sean Monte, Mariah Quibol, and Ken Tungpalan.

The Chair asked Senator Kidani if that was the Future Farmers group that had had someone elected as a national officer a few years ago.

Senator Kidani responded that she believed it was.

Senator Fevella recognized Campbell High School FFA advisor Jessica Watarai and her 14 students who were seated in the gallery. Senator Fevella requested that the names of the students be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

Senator Keith-Agaran welcomed the FFA delegation from his alma mater, Maui High School, in God's country. Present in the gallery were advisor Caitlyn Madrid and students Kawaileihoa Duldalao Kahooahano and Makoa Keuma.

The Chair acknowledged David Fuertes, an active supporter of FFA who was seated in the gallery. The Chair noted that Mr. Fuertes had attended his alma mater, Waimea High School, but now resides in Kohala.

Senator San Buenaventura recognized the Healthcare Association of Hawaii Healthcare Heroes, and presented the following remarks:

"The Healthcare Association of Hawaii is a leading voice for healthcare providers in the state. The organization works to positively influence state and federal policy to provide quality and accessible healthcare to the people of Hawai'i. Through HAH's Healthcare Heroes awards, patients are given the opportunity to acknowledge the service of outstanding healthcare providers. These providers are honored for the exemplary care they deliver to patients and their loved ones across the state. They truly are the epitome of selfless service for the betterment of our community, and are more than worthy as honorees of the 2022 Healthcare Hero award. I would now like to yield the floor to Senator Chang to say a few words about our first honoree, Dr. Andrew Baldwin, who, unfortunately, is unable to be here today."

Senator Chang rose to present the following remarks:

"Kaua'i resident Alana Fujikawa is sure she would not be alive today if not for the skill and compassion of her Hawaii Healthcare Hero, Dr. Andrew Baldwin. Alana suffered a stroke, and there was also a tear in her aorta. The team at Wilcox Medical Center on Kaua'i was able to treat her stroke but did not have the expertise to repair her aorta. After various inquiries, Straub Medical Center agreed to have her flown to O'ahu to have the procedure. Dr. Baldwin explained the risks and benefits of the surgery to her. His calm demeanor made the complicated procedure seem less terrifying, and he explained her options in clear and simple terms. Alana says that she was touched by his humility, that she believes her case inspired him, and that it was a privilege to be cared for by him. Thank you, and I now yield the floor to Senator Rhoads."

Senator Rhoads rose to present the following remarks:

"I am happy to recognize the next honoree, physician assistant Lindsey Hayes of Kaiser Permanente. Lindsey's patient, Betty, was hanging curtains in her bedroom and accidentally fell on her back onto a concrete floor. She was in pain, and she knew she needed to get help. Betty didn't have anyone around to help her, so she struggled to get up and drove to Kaiser's Waipio Clinic's same-day care. Lindsey and the nurses were surprised that Betty was able to drive herself and sit normally after this fall. The team took several x-rays, and Lindsey checked back in on her every 10 minutes while she was waiting for the results. After a full analysis, Lindsey advised Betty that her lower spine had been broken in two places. Betty credited Lindsey Hayes for putting her at ease. Betty states, 'Lindsey was so kind, caring, and thoughtful. He showed so much sympathy, professionalism, and patience. He is excellent in every way.'

"How about a nice round of applause for physician assistant Lindsey Hayes? I would like to yield the floor to my colleague from Senate District 25. Mahalo."

Senator Lee rose to present the following remarks:

"I'd like to introduce our next Healthcare Hero, Shelley Johnstone, who's also from Kaiser Permanente. While there, a young woman, Andrea Farm's mother had her health severely decline in 2020, and due to the COVID-19 lockdowns, Andrea was no longer able to visit her mother, who was in a care home facility. Shelley Johnstone worked miracles with her mother. Shelley knew how to make Andrea's mom feel comfortable and smile, and she did a tremendous job facilitating communication between Andrea, her mother, and her mother's healthcare providers. Shelley would explain why Andrea wasn't able to visit after the lockdowns started, and although her mother couldn't speak, Shelley was able to read her expressions in order to communicate with her.

"Andrea's mother eventually passed, but it would not be the end of Shelley's help to the Farm family. In November of 2021, Andrea's father had minor surgery and was sent to recover at a rehab facility. To Andrea's surprise, Shelley was at that facility to care for her father. Andrea knew at that point that with Shelley's care and compassion, her father would be in good hands.

"Congratulations again. I would now like to yield the floor to Senator Keohokalole."

Senator Keohokalole rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the distinguished honor of presenting the next Healthcare Hero, Lillian Lau, a registered nurse case manager at Oahu Home Healthcare. O'ahu resident Mark Kramer was told he might die if he did not receive treatment for his infected foot. He was urged to undergo a partial amputation in order to treat a severe infection. Mark wasn't willing to accept Civil War-era medicine in the 21st century, and insisted on antibiotic therapy instead.

"Mark met Lillian Lau after he was released from the hospital and qualified for nursing visits at home. Lillian made regular visits to help him recover and regain his strength. She provided all the right follow-up medical attention and treated him as a whole person, which he says made a huge difference in his recovery. Many months after his release, Kramer's feet are healed, and the infection has subsided. Mark said his ability to utilize Lillian's medical knowledge and lean on her emotionally took a big burden off of him during his recovery.

"Thank you very much for your work, and congratulations. I would now like to return the floor to the senator from Puna."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to present the following remarks:

"The final honoree to be recognized is Dr. Bernard Riola from the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation, who was nominated for this award by Amber Ramsey of Kaua'i.

"As a single mother of a three-year-old, Amber had a particularly challenging situation during the pandemic. Dr. Riola's compassion, bedside manner, generosity, and patience should be commended. Dr. Riola took the time out of his busy schedule to answer all of Amber's questions and give guidance on what she needed to care for her toddler. As a result, when her son contracted COVID-19, she was incredibly prepared. Today, her son is healthy, and Amber feels empowered to handle whatever may come next. Amber says that 'Dr. Riola's compassion saved a three-year-old boy and his mother from feeling helpless during the pandemic.'

“Colleagues, I would like to again wholeheartedly thank all of our honorees for their significant contributions and care for their patients. It is truly an honor and privilege to acknowledge and recognize these Healthcare Heroes.

“Mr. President, I’d also like to acknowledge Hilton Raethel and the rest of the staff from the Healthcare Association of Hawaii who are in the gallery this morning. Please stand to be recognized.

“Mr. President, at the appropriate time, may we have a recess to greet our honored guests? And I now yield the floor back to you. Thank you.”

Senator McKelvey then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of MEOH-LENG SILLIMAN as Deputy Comptroller of the Department of Accounting and General Services, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Gabbard.

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Everybody, Ms. Silliman has committed a lifetime of service work in government. Prior to relocating to Hawai'i, a 10-year tenure at Manhattan District Attorney's Office was where she worked, including positions of deputy director of fiscal affairs and deputy director of operations. Her areas of responsibilities included program initiatives, fiscal management, automation, procurement, telecommunication, space planning, and facilities management. She has over 15 years of employment with the State of Hawai'i, over 12 years serving in the capacity of business management officer at both DCCA and DAGS, and over 2 years as a branch chief at the Department of Budget and Finance. Due to her comprehensive operational knowledge of the state processes and aspects of state government, businesses, and accounting processes, she has played an integral and critical role in ensuring that the transfer of knowledge from one administration to the next goes as smoothly as possible.

"She has a proven record of leadership as evidenced by the testimonials noting her leadership and mentoring skills. DAGS, being a central support agency, needs to be able to provide quality and consistency in the delivery of essential support services to other state departments and agencies. Ms. Silliman has acquired the technical knowledge and expertise about the operations and management of DAGS, and is therefore well qualified to support the comptroller in fulfilling the DAGS mission. Mr. President, she and the comptroller have worked well together as a team, and it's because of this teamwork I feel that she is qualified to serve in this capacity. Thank you."

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 31, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:31 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

At this time, Senator Fukunaga honored the life and legacy of Dr. Franklin S. Odo, and presented the following remarks:

"I'd like to start this morning's introductions with a brief quote from Dr. Franklin Odo: 'If you don't control your own culture and your own vision of life, and your own participation in life, then you don't control anything. And that's what we're about. The true spirit of any kind of democracy is to have people be autonomous at the same time that they know that they're dependent on the community around them.' These comments were from a 1990 oral history interview with the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Center for Oral History. Thirty-three years later, this statement rings true even more for us and for Hawai'i's future generations.

"Today, we're honoring the life and legacy of Dr. Franklin Odo, or Franklin, as he was known fondly by those he mentored, passed away at the end of 2022 after a lifetime dedicated to the community and public service. We're very honored to have with us this morning, as we remember his life and legacy, some of his family and colleagues. I'm going to introduce those of his family and colleagues who are on the floor with us, and I'd like to ask all of you to please rise and then remain standing. Thank you. First, we have David Odo, Franklin's son, who is director of academic and public programs at Harvard Art Museums. Next, we have Alan Odo, Franklin's brother, who has joined us from the island of Kaua'i. Next, we have Sarah Odo, Franklin's niece, who lives in Mililani. Next, we have Dr. Rod Labrador, Franklin's colleague, who is the professor and chair of the UH Ethnic Studies Department at the University of Hawai'i. And, finally, Dr. Davianna McGregor, Franklin's colleague, who is the professor and director of the UH Ethnic Studies Center for Oral History. I will now yield the floor to Senator Lee to introduce some of Franklin's colleagues and community leaders in the gallery with us today."

Senator Lee rose and stated:

"Thank you to all who are joining us this morning. Please stand to be recognized as I call out your names: Ty Tengan, professor at UH, ethnic studies; Noel Kent, retired professor of ethnic studies at UH; Ibrahim Aoude, professor, also at UH in ethnic studies; Bill Kaneko, Franklin's student and past president of JACL Honolulu; Reyna Kaneko, community leader and president, Japan-America Society of Hawaii; Mariko Miho, community leader and director, Sons and Daughters of the 442nd; Nate Gyotaku, community leader and president and executive director of the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i; Liann Ebesugawa, community leader and past president of JACL; Minda Yamaga, community leader and president, JACL; Hanako Wakatsuki-Chong, community leader and superintendent of the National Park Service – Honouliuli National Historic Site. We appreciate your longtime commitment to social justice and your presence today. Congratulations, and thank you so much for joining us this morning. I yield the floor to Senator Inouye."

Senator Inouye rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, for over 50 years, Dr. Franklin Odo was a nationally recognized scholar and professor of Asian American and ethnic studies. In the 1960s and the 1970s, Dr. Odo taught at Occidental College; the University of California, Los Angeles; and California State University, Long Beach.

"Dr. Odo returned to Hawai'i in 1978 to serve as director of the Ethnic Studies Program at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, where he was instrumental in elevating the program to department-level status. He lobbied the Hawai'i State Legislature and the University administration for faculty positions and resources to elevate the status and capacity for the program to fully teach, research, and explore race relations in Hawai'i in offering its first bachelor of arts degree. I yield the floor back to Senator Lee."

Senator Lee rose to present the following remarks:

"Franklin left academia in 1997 to serve as director of the Smithsonian Institute's Asian Pacific American Center. Between 1997 and 2010, he brought national attention and awareness of Pacific Asian American history, culture, and arts to the Smithsonian Institute and organized numerous exhibits, studies, and projects featuring the histories and experiences of Asian and Pacific Islander immigration, culture, and experiences in the United States. Franklin helped found the Honolulu chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League, and led a delegation of panelists to testify before the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians. Franklin's efforts led to consideration and documentation of the wartime experiences of Japanese Americans interned in Hawai'i as part of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. The act provided for \$1.8 billion in appropriations and a presidential apology for the unlawful internment of Japanese Americans on the West Coast and in Hawai'i. I now yield the floor to Senator Fukunaga."

Senator Fukunaga rose to present the following remarks:

"Franklin's greatest legacy, however, will forever be embodied in his students. Over the years, he was a teacher, mentor, and friend to thousands of college students who were awakened and inspired by his experiential and activist teaching style. He challenged their way of thinking in evaluating events of the past and how those events were relevant to current-day events. He instilled in all of his students the need to create their own history in their own way.

"Members, we also have provided a copy of a recent *Hawai'i Herald* article that chronicles some of Franklin's legacy, and hope that you'll be able to enjoy many of the stories about Hawai'i's past. At the appropriate time, Mr. President, we will request a brief recess so that we might honor the Odo family and Franklin's colleagues who are here with us today. Thank you."

Senator Keohokalole rose and stated:

"In 2004, in the fall, I was heartbroken to find that my wife, who was my girlfriend at the time, elected to take on a lucrative and amazing opportunity to spend the semester in Washington, D.C., at the Smithsonian, and she worked for Dr. Odo during that time—eventually returned (I chased her) and we got together, but she was profoundly impacted by that experience. It shaped our family going forward. I'm really grateful to have all of you here today from ethnic studies and also the family to honor Dr. Odo, so thank you so much for joining us. Mahalo, Mr. President."

At 11:41 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator DeCoite, for the Committee on Energy, Economic Development and Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1482) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of MARK GLICK as Chief Energy Officer of the Hawai'i State Energy Office, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 504.

In accordance with Senate Rule 37(6), action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1482 and Gov. Msg. No. 504 was deferred until Monday, April 3, 2023.

Senator DeCoite, for the Committee on Energy, Economic Development and Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1483) recommending that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DANE WICKER as Deputy Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 534.

In accordance with Senate Rule 37(6), action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1483 and Gov. Msg. No. 534 was deferred until Monday, April 3, 2023.

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1435 (Gov. Msg. No. 509):

Senator Wakai moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1435 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

Senator Wakai then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KENNETH HARA as Adjutant General of the Department of Defense, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Wakai rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Kenneth Hara is battle-tested and deserves to continue to be our state adjutant general. When the state was trying to figure out how to deal with the onset of COVID, the state was blessed to have General Hara steering us through uncharted territory. Kenneth Hara assumed his duties as Hawai'i's adjutant general in December of 2019. Within months, COVID enveloped the planet, and General Hara was thrust into being incident commander. He oversaw a multi-agency effort to coordinate testing, contact tracing, and vaccination efforts across our islands. Under his leadership, Hawai'i was able to keep its infection rate well below nearly every other state in America. His leadership and understanding of the constantly evolving situation kept all of us safe. General Hara's leadership during the COVID crisis earned him widespread praise and recognition. In 2021, the U.S. military bestowed upon him its Legion of Merit for his exceptionally meritorious performance. Remember back in 2018, General Hara was appointed dual status commander for the Kilauea volcanic eruption and Hurricane Lane. He juggled those two natural disasters with ease. His track record is impeccable.

"General Hara joined the Hawaii Army National Guard in May of 1984. He has served active-duty assignments in Korea, Iraq, Kuwait, and Afghanistan. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his heroic service. Throughout his 38 years of military service, General Hara has contributed to improving essential mission services throughout the state of Hawai'i's National Guard, implemented new initiatives and programs, developed innovative strategies to address various civil challenges. Like many department heads, General Hara is facing increased public demands with inadequate staffing. He is currently assessing the entire organization and position descriptions to better align with the department's functions.

"Government needs to be prepared for catastrophic or man-made disasters. Major General Hara is a proven leader with a calm and steady leadership style. The best man for the job is already on the job. Colleagues, I ask that you support Kenneth Hara's nomination to continue as Hawai'i's adjutant general."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"I do have comments that I'd like to enter into the Journal in totally great support and proud of our Hilo-born young man, and we're all pleased that he's come a long way and still extending his service to the people of Hawai'i. Mahalo."

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye's additional remarks read as follows:

"I have worked with Major General Kenneth Hara during the past administration and have always found him to be dedicated and passionate in his service to the State of Hawaii. Major General Hara has plenty of experience responding to several crises in Hawaii including the 2006 earthquake that struck Hawaii Island, the Kilauea volcanic eruption and Hurricane Lane responses in 2018, and he deftly navigated the COVID-19 pandemic by creating a roadmap for Hawaii's response plan to the pandemic. I am confident that Hawaii will be in safe hands with Major General Kenneth Hara leading the Hawaii Department of Defense."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I would say the words of Senator Wakai but too big, the words. General Hara was always willing not only to serve—I mean, I got here; I was pretty new. But whenever time I called him and I needed something in my district when it comes to the helicopters that is flying over Kapolei or 'Ewa Beach or

blowing up something in Hale'iwa, up in that area, he would always have an answer, and he would always be able to answer the questions and the concerns of my community, so, again, colleagues, I totally support him. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I would just like to say that, living on a neighbor island like Moloka'i, our challenges has always been having access to air support, whether it was to bring over the Black Hawk chopper to have our communities understand how important they are to us as well as the commitment of the National Guard. He is that individual. I've had the opportunity to work with General Hara and his team, and I can tell you that he is always there to rise to the occasion. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"General Hara, at a time when everyone was stressed, held his composure and, like Senator Fevella and Senator DeCoite have said, has reached out and was always willing to attend town halls to ease the kinds of concerns we had during the pandemic. At a time when a lot of leaders have shown their stress and have been short with us, General Hara had held his composure and his patience, and for those reasons, I am in gratitude, and I strongly support him."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I don't support General Hara just because he lives in my district. During COVID, the COVID committee met with many directors, and we often felt that General Hara was almost held back from doing the best that he could do to help Hawai'i, but he really helped make sure that we could steer the ship during COVID. We really appreciate all of his time and effort. I go walking every Saturday in Mililani Mauka, and I see him running. And now I know why he had to run: because he had to work to fit into that suit. But strong support. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

The Chair made the following comments:

"I thought, when Senator Dela Cruz rose, he was going to terminate my feeling the need to speak, but I want it entered into the record that Senator Dela Cruz called every department head into the Ways and Means conference room at the onset of the pandemic, and I, like many others, thought that maybe this would be a month, perhaps two, and we would be past this like other disasters, weather-related, that have hit us. And when Senator Dela Cruz asked, 'Who has a plan?', General Hara was one of only two cabinet members who stepped forward, and he had modified the Washington state plan to fit Hawai'i, and he was prepared. He clearly understood the severity of the situation we were about to face, and he was ready to serve, and I think it's important that this be in the Senate Journal as to acknowledge your action and our gratitude for you being prepared and, as others have said, seeing us through an incredibly difficult time."

Senator Wakai introduced Adjutant General Kenneth Hara, who was present in the gallery with his wife, Myoung; son Justin; brother, retired major general Gary Hara, and his wife, Dianne; and General Stephen Logan.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1436 (Gov. Msg. No. 510):

Senator Wakai moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1436 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

Senator Wakai then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of JORDAN LOWE as Director of the Department of Law Enforcement, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Wakai rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Senators, we go from the Department of Defense that benefits from continuity in leadership to one just being established. Jordan Lowe will be an outstanding founding father of the new Department of Law Enforcement. During his confirmation hearing, I referred to him as the George Washington of DLE, and, in fact, look: There's an effort to put his face on a dollar bill. That'll be for another confirmation. He has four decades of law enforcement experience with the feds, state, and county. If you scoured the Earth, you would not find a person better to lead this new agency.

"Mr. Lowe is uniquely qualified to do everything: to find criminals, chase them down, and bring them to justice. He has a degree in accounting with skills to conduct high-risk audits within the Internal Revenue Service. He was also responsible for conducting U.S. congressional inquiries within the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. Jordan Lowe has conducted hundreds of complex investigations relating to narcotics and organized crime. Those experiences included the state Department of Taxation, Department of Public Safety, and the Honolulu prosecutor's office. His array of assignments required him to work closely with other law enforcement agencies, where he established close relationships with their departments' leadership.

"That's his illustrious past, but what does he have for us for the future? Mr. Lowe is already working on lease agreements for department headquarters, increasing pay for sheriffs, updating outdated equipment and technology, and embarked on an intensive recruiting plan to fill vacancies. He is widely hailed as a respected leader. The Sheriffs Division has been moved from the Department of Public Safety to DLE. In the past, some of us may know this was kind of a dysfunctional group of officers, but in the past two years, Mr. Lowe has dramatically reduced the number of grievances filed by sheriffs against the administrators.

"In life, we are told to aim high. Colleagues, in this case, I ask you to set your sights low—on Jordan Lowe. He has a bulletproof résumé that will contribute to a safer and more secure Hawai'i. Let's vote in favor of Jordan 'George Washington' Lowe to be the first director of the Department of Law Enforcement."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Wakai introduced Director Jordan Lowe, who was present in the gallery with his wife, Lynne, and son Ryan.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1437 (Gov. Msg. No. 501):

Senator Gabbard moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1437 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Richards and carried.

Senator Gabbard then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of SHARON HURD as Chairperson of the Department of Agriculture, term to expire at noon on December 31, 2026, seconded by Senator Richards.

Senator Gabbard rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, Sharon Hurd has 16 years of experience with the Department of Agriculture and recently as business

development program manager. She has a keen knowledge of state and federal agricultural policy, administration, and a strong passion for improving Hawai'i state agriculture. I find her to be intelligent, caring, capable, and committed to doing what's best for our state in the agriculture arena. And, by the way, colleagues, I was glad to see so much support for our agriculture bills last session here at the Leg, but, obviously, there's still much more work we can do if we're ever going to decrease our dependence on imported food.

"I believe that Sharon's vision and leadership will help take us there. While testifying on bills and during her Senate committee hearing, Sharon listed among her priorities implementing Act 90 and working with the Department of Land and Natural Resources and the Agribusiness Development Corporation on securing and upgrading the Wahiawa Dam. As chairperson for the state Department of Ag, Sharon has said that she will work with each senator and representative to seek support for these priorities to move Hawai'i agriculture operations into commercial production. There were more than 186 supporting testimonies, including every major agriculture, livestock, and floriculture association. I've been truly impressed with Sharon's enthusiasm and her vision for the future of ag in Hawai'i. And here's a brief quote from her personal statement that encapsulates her positive attitude. Sharon wrote, 'There is nothing that is wrong with the Department of Agriculture that cannot be remedied by what is right with the Department of Agriculture.' So, colleagues, I ask you to join me in supporting Governor's Message 501. Mahalo."

Senator Richards rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"I wanted to compliment the director of Department of Agriculture, Sharon Hurd, the nominee. She started out slow from the blocks, as we all know, but she has pushed hard and gleaned the support of cross industries in the agriculture world. Her efforts are exemplary. She's reached out, built bridges with DLNR, and I fully support her going forward because we're going to make a difference with this director. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I'd just like to say, when many had refused to acknowledge that Sharon Hurd would have even had a chance to become the director or put forward, she took the time to go out to the different ranches and the different farms, and, as she came before WAM and she was questioned, I thought she had the most dirty lickings I've ever seen, and she rebounded from that. She has put Act 90 on the front burner and the transfer of those lands and to work directly with the DLNR nominee. I look forward to working with her, and she has literally peeled many of those fires that were brewing for many, many years, and I think she'll make an excellent director. For that reason, I'm in strong support, Mr. President."

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

"I would like to echo the words of the previous speaker, very much so, and I think it's a message that should be perhaps taken to heart by others that are going to come before this body. Despite the rough start and everything, she's really stepped up to the challenge, gotten to know her department, gotten to know the issues, and has set a direction of policy. She understands that she is the director as of the here and now, and has gone forward beyond just having dialogue and actually implementing things. And to see these parties who were often at each other's crossroads, if you will, in opposite views, coming together to support her also speaks volumes, so thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1510 and H.B. No. 1426, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTS," was deferred until Wednesday, April 5, 2023.

Senator Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1511) recommending that H.B. No. 494, H.D. 1, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Senator Wakai, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 494, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Wednesday, April 5, 2023.

Senator Rhoads, for the majority of the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1512) recommending that H.B. No. 732, H.D. 1, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Senator Wakai, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 732, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPLAINTS ALLEGING VIOLATIONS OF CAMPAIGN SPENDING LAWS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Wednesday, April 5, 2023.

ORDER OF THE DAY

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1482 (Gov. Msg. No. 504):

Senator DeCoite moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1482 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried.

Senator DeCoite then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of MARK GLICK as Chief Energy Officer of the Hawai'i State Energy Office, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the nominee as follows:

"Colleagues, the nominee came before the committee, and I had concerns of the ongoing pursuit of offshore wind turbines and the need for more solar farms on ag land and not having an opportunity to close down our landfills in our community and not having the opportunity of having the energy chair to look into another alternative of having a waste-to-energy plant. We continue to kick the can down the road, and I don't want to use the word 'impressed,' but I continue to look in my community, where I'm very in tune in my community, how, when they tell me they're in opposition to something, I try to be the voice in their chamber. Having these solar farms on Makakilo mountain, trying to put windmills on top of Camp Pālehua—all of these

things that is trying to be put in into our community is not pono. There should be a better solution. We should be holding the City and County of Honolulu more accountable because they pick and choose how to burn their rubbish, and they never, ever found a new area for a new landfill. So, again, we need somebody that's going to come and give more innovations and not same creations of windmills and solar farms that are not helping nobody because none of that is firm energy; my colleague, Senator Dela Cruz, always talks about firm energy. Now the Hawaiian Electric is putting out a proposal for firm energy. Before that, we never had that, and I didn't see anything in his plan or his comprehensive plan that he's going to be pursuing any of that, and that's the reason why I'm in opposition. Thank you, Senate President."

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"As chair of your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism, I carefully reviewed Mr. Glick's personal history, résumé, and statement along with my EET committee members. He received 53 pieces of testimony, all in support, which specified his various skills and strengths. Upon review of the testimony, your Committee finds that Mr. Glick's professional background, knowledge of energy policy, and experience in the development of projects for the private and public sectors qualify him for appointment as the chief energy officer of the Hawai'i State Energy Office.

"His experience in public service in the state spans nearly two decades. Having served in several capacities and multiple state agencies, most recently, he served as a specialist on energy policy and innovation at the University of Hawai'i's Hawai'i Natural Energy Institute, where he led the Hawai'i Energy Policy Forum and Hawai'i Natural Energy Institute's energy policy practice in support of energy transitions and decarbonization efforts in the state through projects, publications, technical assistance, and consulting. Furthermore, Mr. Glick previously served as the Hawai'i State Energy Office's energy administrator and as an energy project manager and senior advisor. During his previous roles with the Hawai'i State Energy Office, he contributed to the drafting of Hawai'i's 100 percent renewable portfolio standard goal and helped the state exceed its 2015 interim renewable portfolio and energy-efficiency portfolio standards by nearly 10 percent. He also managed over \$9 million in federally funded projects to increase the number of renewable energy and energy-efficiency installations in the state.

"Prior to his work in the public sector in Hawai'i, he co-founded and led a business system integration and consulting firm in Austin, Texas, that was dedicated to establishing alternative fuel transportation and pioneered efforts. Your Committee believes that Mr. Glick's work experience in both the public and private sectors demonstrate his ability to be an effective leader and provide guidance on clean energy infrastructure as a catalyst for economic growth and energy security. He brings more than 40 years of experience working with energy issues and has published exclusively on the topic. He holds a bachelor of arts in mathematics from Lamar University and a master of science in public management and policy from Carnegie Mellon University and has authored more than 10 publications on energy issues since 2000. Additionally, Mr. Glick has testified before the Hawai'i Legislature on more than 200 legislative proposals relating to energy, economic development, and the environment, and was the Hawai'i state energy administrator before the United States Senate Energy Subcommittee on issues such as energy and infrastructure challenges in the state and suggested actions the federal government could take to support job creation and innovation at the state and local level. His wealth of subject-matter expertise gives your Committee great confidence that he will serve the

state well as chief energy officer and provide the Hawai'i State Energy Office excellent policy guidance on clean energy infrastructure to help the state reach its renewable energy goals.

"I would also like to add that Mr. Glick personally attended the second annual Molokai Community Resource Fair and met with many residents on the Friendly Isle who were very friendly to him, and he actually engaged them. I deeply appreciate the time he took to fly over for the day. It made a big impact on a rural community, and I am very thankful. Based on this information, Mr. President, I ask for your support on the decision made by your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism to advise and consent on this nominee. I ask that my colleagues support. Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator DeCoite introduced Chief Energy Officer Mark Glick, who was present in the gallery.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1483 (Gov. Msg. No. 534):

Senator DeCoite moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1483 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Wakai and carried.

Senator DeCoite then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DANE WICKER as Deputy Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, term to expire December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Wakai.

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"As chair of your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism, I carefully reviewed Mr. Wicker's personal history, résumé, and statement along with my EET committee members. He received 93 pieces of testimony, all in support, which specified his various skills and strengths. Upon review of the testimony, your Committee finds that Mr. Wicker's background, government work experience, and business knowledge qualify him for appointment as the deputy director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism.

"Mr. Wicker has over a decade of experience and understanding of government and its processes, budgeting, and public policy. He previously served as chief of staff and committee clerk to the chairperson of the Senate's Committee on Ways and Means for 11 years, where he gained valuable experience with budgets, economic development, office management, and governmental administrative procedures. Mr. Wicker further directed the operating and capital improvement projects and oversaw the review of the governor's executive operating budget of approximately \$16 billion. Your Committee believes that Mr. Wicker's understanding of departmental operations, the budgeting process, and financial impact analysis will be invaluable to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and its attached agencies to prepare for their budget briefings, and will be crucial to assist the department in revitalizing and diversifying the state's economy.

"Your Committee further finds that, most recently, Mr. Wicker served as an executive assistant at the Department of Planning and Permitting for the City and County of Honolulu, where he coordinated and communicated administrative decisions, work programs, budgets, and objectives to all stakeholders. Mr. Wicker also previously served as assistant to the director of Pacific Asian studies at the University of Hawai'i's East-West Center, where he pursued

federal grants and supported the creation of programs in schools to spread awareness of climate change. Having worked at both the state and county levels of government, your Committee believes that Mr. Wicker has acquired the necessary leadership and professional attributes that will enable him to serve the state and community well at the departmental level.

“Mr. Wicker also holds a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Hawai‘i at West O‘ahu and is currently pursuing a master’s in urban and regional planning from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa. Additionally, he is a small business owner and operates businesses in retail and farming. Your Committee believes that Mr. Wicker’s business experience and his current efforts to further his education by attaining a master’s degree are indicative of his desire to continually challenge and improve himself. These qualities demonstrate that Mr. Wicker will make an excellent leader at the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, where he will be required to think productively and innovate to move the department forward in a positive manner. Based on this information, Mr. President, I ask for your support as well as my colleagues’ in the decision made by your Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism to advise and consent on this nominee. Mahalo.”

Senator Dela Cruz rose to seek a ruling on a potential conflict of interest as follows:

“The nominee and I own a māmaki tea farm.”

The Chair responded:

“Since there is no direct appropriation related to this that would be of a direct financial benefit to you or Mr. Wicker, there would be no conflict on this vote. If it’s about the 11-year relationship, he’s worked for me, as the president, a majority of those years, and I don’t feel I have any conflict in voting on Mr. Wicker’s nomination.”

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“As someone who the nominee has never worked for, I would like to just voice my strong support for the confirmation of Dane Wicker as deputy director. Having come to know and work with him over my five years in the Senate—not as a member in any of those years of the Ways and Means committee, I don’t own any businesses, he doesn’t live in my district—there’s no personal connection other than the one that I’ve gained through working with him as a member of the Senate, and I can tell you that we have a desperate shortage of leaders with energy who are responsive and can help us get things done. That’s all I’ve known him to do, especially during our tenure as members of the Special Committee on COVID-19, where he was a fundamental part of making sure we were organized and doing the people’s business. I’m really happy that he stepped forward. I thought it was a loss for us in the Senate when he left the Ways and Means committee, and I enthusiastically support his nomination. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“In the short time that I’ve been here, he’s just a breath of fresh air. I’ve never seen anybody so prepared in coming to a committee hearing or info briefing and giving us his full scope of, not only his job, but the job that he wants to accomplish in his position. Knowing him through the task force and through Ways and Means and pretty much no other connection because I’m still new here, but he was just always professional and always willing to do the job and get the job done. And I’m very happy for him that he is moving on, but also I was one of the other ones that was very sad that he did leave because of his great works and great into detailing and always having an ear

when you have questions on certain CIPs or certain bills; he was always there to guide us and keep us informed, so I’m in strong support, Senate President. Thank you.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator DeCoite introduced Deputy Director Dane Wicker, who was present in the gallery.

Senator Keohokalole noted:

“The reason is, after reconsidering scheduling, I think it is necessary that we keep the conversation on this measure going and move on into conference.”

The Chair granted the waiver.

Senator Keohokalole announced that the Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection would be holding a public hearing on the measure on Wednesday, April 5, 2023, at 10:15 a.m. in Conference Room 229.

The Chair extended his congratulations to the LSU women’s basketball team, which had won the national championship over Iowa by 17 points the day before. The Chair noted that the Rainbow Wahine basketball team had opened the tournament by traveling to LSU and losing by about 20 points. The Chair stated that, in light of what LSU had accomplished, Coach Beeman and the Rainbow Wahine, with their injury-shortened lineup, had represented Hawai‘i well.

FORTY-FOURTH DAY

Tuesday, April 4, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:33 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Gabbard noted that representatives from public agencies and nonprofit organizations who are raising awareness about the ocean were present in the gallery. Senator Gabbard urged the members to visit their exhibits out on the Rotunda to learn about coral reefs, sea level rise, limu, and more. Senator Gabbard then thanked the organizations and agencies for their work. Present in the gallery were representatives from Brigham Young University–Hawaii; the Conservationist Collective; the Coral Reef Alliance; Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of Aquatic Resources, Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation, and Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement; For the Fishes; Friends of Hanauma Bay; Hawai'i Coral Reef Rights; Hawai'i Fisheries Extension program under National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Fisheries; Hawai'i Green Fee Coalition; Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology; Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology's Coral Resilience Lab and the He'eia National Estuarine Research Reserve; Kai Palaoa; Kalanihale; Kuleana Coral Restoration; Mālama Manō; Mālama Maunaloa; Mālama Pūpūkea-Waimea; Maui Nui Makai Network; Miloli'i Community-Based Subsistence Fishing Area; Moana 'Ohana; Office of Hawaiian Affairs; Papahānaumokuākea Marine Debris Project; Resources Legacy Fund; Surfriider Foundation; the Nature Conservancy, Hawai'i and Palmyra; UH Mānoa School of Life Sciences; Wastewater Alternatives and Innovations; and Wild Kids and World Ocean Day.

Senator Keohokalole introduced members of his staff who were seated in the gallery: UH Mānoa legislative interns Joey Brown and Keya Rivera; committee staff Jaymee Weisberg, who had offered a moment of contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session, Jaren Tengan, Randall Wat, and Kaila Kaawaloa; and office manager Jules Peleiholani.

Senator Chang, on behalf of Senator Lee and himself, introduced teachers and students from the International Baccalaureate global politics class of Kaiser High School, located in District 25. Present in the gallery were teachers Riker Kasamoto and Paul Balazs, and students Melania Ali Heron, Maxwell R. Calandra, Sacha Alialani R. Des Pres, Beckett C. Dompe, Larissa C. Goloveyko, Matthew Iwamasa, Justin T. Laxamana, Macy Matsushima, Dylan H. Miyamoto, Kai Paar, Santiago Wolfe, and Kellie Wu. Senator Chang stated that he and Senator Lee had had a great conversation with the students that morning, and that some of them may be sitting in Senate seats before too long.

The Chair commented, in good humor, that hopefully the students would choose to reside in Senate District 24 or 25 and not branch out.

On behalf of Senate President Kouchi, Senator DeCoite introduced constituents who were involved with Boys & Girls Club. Seated in the galley were Kaua'i High School ninth grader David Braman; Kaua'i High School tenth grader Nainoa Hirokane; Kaua'i High School tenth grader Michaela Alcaraz; staff member Dallas Albao; and clubhouse director Asaka Herman.

Senator DeCoite then welcomed Maximo Melgar Martich, a constituent from the Boys & Girls Club Haiku clubhouse who was present in the gallery.

Senator Keohokalole recognized Dr. Beth England, a volunteer in his office for the last two years, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Shimabukuro welcomed member Shysen Lopes and clubhouse director Kekoa Tupua of the Boys & Girls Club Nanakuli Teen Center, who were present in the gallery.

Senator Kanuha recognized and honored 2023 Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii Youth of the Year honorees, and presented the following remarks:

“Colleagues, today we are pleased to acknowledge the finalists for the 2023 Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii State Youth of the Year. The Youth of the Year program, which takes place annually, recognizes exceptional teenagers for their commendable choices and positive behavior. This distinguished program emphasizes the development of character and leadership skills while celebrating the service of club members to their club, community, and family. It also highlights academic performance, ethical values, life goals, poise, and public-speaking ability. The program's primary objective is to cultivate the personal growth and leadership abilities of young people. By recognizing their service and leadership qualities, the Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii Youth of the Year program encourages teens to continue making positive contributions to their communities. It's an opportunity for outstanding teens to be recognized for their achievements and inspire others to strive for excellence. To start off today's recognition, I would like to yield the floor to our colleague from 'Ewa Beach, who will introduce our first Youth of the Year finalist.”

Senator Fevella rose to present the following remarks:

“Colleagues, I have the great pleasure of introducing our first Youth of the Year finalist, hails from 96706—south 'Ewa Beach—Melanie McLean. As a sophomore at James Campbell High School and a representative of Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii Hale Pono Clubhouse, Melanie is very involved in our 'Ewa Beach community and assisting with various volunteers such as parking lot detail, which is very important in our community because we have no parking—not yet, though, not yet—volunteering at the parking lot for James Campbell High School football games, organizing food drives with her church, helping with renovations and upkeep and cleaning up of the Boys & Girls Club, and participating in the junior leader intercession programs. She's a bright young woman with a grade point average of 3.6 who participates in the Navy Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (Navy JROTC) and advancement via individual determination (or AVID) programs, both of which are designed to prepare students for college life beyond high school. Melanie is also an active member of various clubs, including leadership training, and, again, I just wanted to thank her for being one of the finalists for Youth of the Year. I now yield the floor to Senator McKelvey.”

Senator McKelvey rose to present the following remarks:

“I am pleased to introduce to you and the members our second Youth of the Year finalist. Hailing from West Maui and representing the Boys & Girls Club of Maui Lahaina Clubhouse is Arissa Kahaiali'i of the esteemed Kaiali'i 'ohana—please stand. Arissa actively participates in various community service activities, including the Maui Teen Expo planning committee, the Lā 'Ohana Thank You First Responders Event, and several events as a member of the Boys & Girls Club of Lahaina Clubhouse. Not only are Arissa's academic achievements

impressive with a 3.4 GPA, but she also serves as the trombone section leader in the Kamehameha Schools Maui band. She is a Maui Interscholastic League athlete in swimming, water polo, and volleyball as well, and Arissa's dedication and commitment extend beyond her community service and academic pursuits. She's an active member of the Boys & Girls Club of Maui, participating in Torch Club, Keystone, SMART Girls, Power Hour, Project Learn, UPS Road Code, and Leaders in Training. She was also recognized as Lahaina Clubhouse Youth of the Month for August in 2022, and was named 2023 Boys & Girls Club of Maui Youth of the Year.

"Arissa, your accomplishments and achievements serve as a shining example to those in Maui community and across Hawai'i, and I wish you best of luck in this competition. Mr. President, I now yield the floor to my colleague from Kalihi and Moanalua."

Senator Kim rose to present the following remarks:

"I have the pleasure of recognizing another one of our Youth of the Year finalists. Representing the United States Army Garrison Fort Shafter Youth Center is Alia Fatty—Alia, if you would rise. Mr. President, Alia is a high school senior at Moanalua High School who is committed to serving her community and peers. Alia currently holds multiple leadership roles in the Torch Club, the youth center, and is the president of the Keystone Club. Furthermore, Alia serves as an ambassador for the World Language Learning Center, and played an instrumental role in launching the Be a Star program at Fort Shafter. Her passion for volunteering is evident through her 165 hours of community service at the teen center, where she, through her 165 hours, enjoys participating in art and cooking projects. Alia is an exemplary student leader, and I wish her the best of luck in this year's Youth of the Year competition. Now, I'd like to yield the floor to my neighbor from Senate District 15."

Senator Wakai rose to present the following remarks:

"Colleagues, our last finalist competing in the Youth of the Year competition is Madeline Myers—Madeline, if you could please stand? Madeline is representing the Joint Base Pearl Harbor—Hickam Teen Center. She actively participates in her community and holds the position of vice president in the Keystone Club, where she collaborates with her peers to organize community events and other activities at the teen center. Apart from her exceptional volunteer work, Madeline has also showcased her talents by competing and winning in two categories at the local level of the Boys & Girls Club of America National Arts competition. Additionally, she is a member of various clubs, such as the cooking club and the Dungeons & Dragons club. Colleagues, please join me in congratulating our last Youth of the Year finalist, Madeline Myers. Mr. President, I now yield the floor back to our esteemed majority leader."

Senator Kanuha rose and stated:

"Mr. President, before we end, I would like to draw attention to some esteemed guests who have joined us in the gallery. These are students who participated in the Youth of the Year competition on their own respective islands, and I know some of them have already been recognized. As you are well aware, this is a highly competitive event, and all of the students who competed are exceptional in their own right. Could I ask that all of our Youth of the Year honorees who are present in the chamber today please stand and be recognized? Mahalo for being here, and mahalo to the finalists that we have on the floor. Mr. President, I request a recess at the appropriate time so that we can have the privilege of meeting our distinguished guests."

The Chair made the following comments:

"Before calling for the recess, I had the opportunity and pleasure of going to the Auditorium this morning and hearing the finalists make their presentations from the Auditorium stage. Ms. Myers was first, and we ended with Ms. McLean. The first three used the microphone, like most of us are doing here this morning, but Ms. McLean announced to the audience that she had a powerful voice and a microphone was not needed, which, based on my experience with Senator Fevella, seems to be a trait of the 'Ewa Beach area. They were all excellent in their presentations, and I do not envy the judges in having to determine which is going to be the ultimate winner."

I know you all know this because this problem is island-wide. Many bills were introduced last year and this year only to die in committee, which is why this resolution is important. I want to thank the Ways and Means committee for including \$5 million in the budget for feral chickens early on in the budget process.

"Mr. President, you know, I will continue, as I have in my tenure as an elected official, to advocate for my district and do all that I can to help the people no matter what district they reside in when they are crying out for help on state issues that we have jurisdiction. Unions, nonprofits, business, the general public call our offices, send in testimony, ask to meet with us, all trying to inform, educate, and influence our vote. Whenever any of you stand up on this floor and make a speech for or against a measure, you have a purpose. You often end your remarks by urging the body to vote for or against. Thus, you are guilty of using your influence (what little you may have) to sway members with your arguments and with your reasoning.

“According to the Internet, influential people move through life with a purpose; they focus on ways to create the impact they wish to have and achieve the outcomes they are aiming for. They give constructive feedback and show appreciation for hard work. So, Mr. President, I have been accused of using my influence, but according to my data, I have had more bills die and don’t get heard or passed, so so much for using what little influence I have. Thank you, Mr. President.”

“§84- Nepotism; prohibition. (a) No employee shall: (1) Appoint, hire, promote, or retain a relative or household member to, or demote, discharge, or terminate a relative or household member from; or”

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by amending page 2, lines 1 to 2, to read as follows:

“(b) No employee shall supervise a relative or household member unless the employee:”

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by amending page 4, line 8 to 11, to read as follows:

“(h) This section shall not prohibit a state agency from appointing, hiring, promoting, retaining, discharging, firing, or demoting a relative or household member of an employee employed by the agency.”

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by deleting section 2.

SECTION 5. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering section 3 as section 2.

SECTION 6. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by renumbering section 4 as section 3.

SECTION 7. House Bill No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, is amended by amending page 5, line 13, to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.”

Senator Moriwaki moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Senator Lee.

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the floor amendment as follows:

“The amendment is being proposed to clearly achieve the bright-line prohibition against nepotism that the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct sought. The bill as drafted appears to validate existing nepotism; thus, the amendment makes clear that all nepotism in public employment is prohibited and is effective upon approval.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Moriwaki then moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1503 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Lee and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 717, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NEPOTISM,” was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Tuesday, April 11, 2023.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1708 (Gov. Msg. No. 516):

Senator Inouye moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1708 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

Senator Inouye then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of DAWN CHANG as Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, term to expire December 31, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Dawn Chang has demonstrated extraordinary leadership skills during her brief time as DLNR chairperson. She has shown a willingness to work with others, including the Legislature, other departments, and community stakeholders—even those who do not agree with her positions. Dawn has repeatedly emphasized that her process will always include making sure others are heard.

“Chairperson Chang is highly qualified for the position she has been nominated to. For slightly more than 10 years, Dawn was the principal of her own consulting company, Ku’iwalu, a firm that worked on strategic planning and facilitating culturally sensitive issues for public- and private-sector projects. Dawn was also a ‘seasoned team’ member of Accord3.0, which provided strategic consulting services to ‘engage in complex, multi-party problem-solving’ tackling difficult problems in areas such as partnership development, facilitation, planning, conflict assessment, and management strategies.

“She gained her knowledge and experience by also serving as the state land use commissioner from 2016 to 2022. A graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai’i, she has had numerous opportunities to apply her legal knowledge and experience to her professional résumé through the years. This included her years serving as a deputy attorney general for the State of Hawai’i and a law clerk for the Honorable Judge Walter M. Heen. Today, with her legal background, Dawn is able to use that knowledge when making decisions in both her private- and public-sector occupations.

“Dawn has a passion for working on hard issues. She stated, ‘As a Native Hawaiian woman, lawyer, community organizer, and someone who is working on “hard issues” involving the Native Hawaiian community, the time is right for healing.’

“It has been a privilege to work with Dawn Chang as chair and member of the Water and Land committee over these four months to help improve the state’s natural and cultural resources. Whether it be advocating for the preservation of Hawai’i’s precious marine ecosystems; managing water and land resources; or preserving the island’s fragile forests, fauna, and native wildlife, Dawn is there to listen to and engage with the community and all stakeholders before making decisions that impact the future of our communities and the Hawaiian islands. She is known for engaging with local communities and stakeholders by visiting them at their locations to understand the issues that concern them; whether it be in Hilo, Līhū’e, Maui, or Wai’anae, Dawn is there!

“I look forward to working with Dawn Chang in the coming weeks and months. She is an excellent fit for the Department of Land and Natural Resources as its chair and leader. Mr. President and members, my strong recommendation to the Senate is to support and vote in favor of our nominee, Dawn Chang (G.M. 516) to be the chairperson for the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, colleagues.”

Senator Richards rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“I wanted to extend my strong support for Dawn Chang as being the DLNR chair. In the last several months, we’ve been working together, and this is the first time in my business career here within the state I’ve seen a cohesiveness between DLNR and DOA trying to work forward to establish and reestablish and promote agriculture going forward. Because of that and her word given she’ll be working hard to promote this, I’m supporting her. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“I’ve had the opportunity to work with Dawn many years back when she also came into our communities on the restoration of East Maui water and she met with many of our Native Hawaiian communities. I have known her to be upfront and honest and to work diligently on many of the subject matters between agriculture and aquaculture and forestry and environmental issues. I look forward to working with her, and I look forward to her being the first Native Hawaiian woman to serve in this capacity. Thank you, Mr. President.”

Senator Kanuha rose to request that remarks in support of the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Kanuha’s remarks read as follows:

“I am proud to stand in strong support of Dawn Chang’s nomination to serve as Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Ms. Chang is a Native Hawaiian, born and raised in Hawai’i, that truly understands the unique historical, cultural, and contemporary value of our State’s land and ocean resources. Through her extensive experience, Ms. Chang has proven, time and time again, her ability to empower local communities to steward the preservation of their own communities.

“Throughout this process, I have found Ms. Chang’s tenacity and grit admirable in the face of adversity. Her commitment to expediently facilitate the transfer of non-agricultural park lands from the Department of Land and Natural Resources to the Department of Agriculture, pursuant to Act 90, Session Laws of Hawaii 2003, is especially compelling, as I believe her strong ability to connect with people from all walks of life will greatly improve collaboration between the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Department of Agriculture, and lessees.

“For these reasons, colleagues, I firmly believe Dawn Chang will be an important asset to the State of Hawai‘i in the coming years, and I urge you to join me in voting for her confirmation to serve as Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.”

Senator Awa rose to seek a ruling on a potential conflict of interest as follows:

“Dawn Chang and I are cousins.”

The Chair asked Senator Awa if he had any direct business dealings that would result in any financial benefit, and Senator Awa replied that he did not.

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict. The Chair added that, in the future, any individual situation that may arise would be looked at, but for now, there was no conflict.

Senator Awa continued, speaking in support of the nominee as follows:

“Even in our family, there’s people with reservations. In our communities, people with reservations, but for the past four months, like the other senator said, Dawn’s been nothing but helpful in our community and working with us and our problems. She’s been out couple times to District 23 and we’re getting stuff done, so look forward to what she can do in the role coming up. Mahalo.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I’m rising because I did go with reservations on the committee of the nomination, not because of qualifications of the nominee whatsoever. I am going to stand in support, but it’s important that the record and everybody know that what I brought up in that committee hearing still stands. I’m trusting on her—when she first came into this role, there was a lot of opposition (I think I noted that), and in the time, she’s taken it head on. But there’s more work to be done, and I’m relying on her to reestablish a safe working environment and much-needed change in the different divisions within the DLNR. I’m hopeful that she will continue with her deputy to take these issues head on, but they remain, Mr. President, and so I think I have to note them for the public and for the record, and I’m hopeful that she will continue to do what she did—is doing—and will take this head on and not let the status quo remain. So thank you, and congratulations again.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Inouye introduced Chairperson Dawn Chang, the first Native Hawaiian woman to lead the Department of Land and Natural Resources, who was present in the gallery with her daughter Dayna Williams, Dayna’s husband, Kahea, and their children Olivia and Harry; her sons Kaulana Chang and Kapono Chang, and Kapono’s wife, Monica; and her assistant Kanani Kealalio. Senator Inouye then acknowledged members of her staff: Tammie Kotani and Brad Knowlton.

Senator Inouye requested that, at the appropriate time, the members visit with the newly confirmed chairperson.

The Chair replied that he did not believe it would be long and that they would greet the new chair after adjournment.

The Chair then recognized supporters of Chairperson Chang from the Department of Land and Natural Resources who were present in the gallery.

"Senator Mike Gabbard's Journal Remarks on HB308 HD1 SD2

"(Sustainable Food Systems Working Group) – June 12, 2023

"Colleagues, we keep complaining ad nauseam about how we import 85-90% of our food at cost of \$3 billion annually, and why aren't we doing more to fix the problem. We know there's plenty of agriculture land available...we know about the importance of supporting local agriculture... and we want to do so in a way that's sustainable.

"But where's the plan? We've got to have a plan.

"In my seven years as Agriculture and Environment Chair, House Bill 308 is the best opportunity I've seen to solve this nagging problem in local agriculture. I'd like to give a strong shout out and mahalo to Dr. Albie Miles for bringing this idea to me and the countless hours of work he's put into it.

"HB308 would establish a sustainable food systems 'working group' within the Department of Agriculture. The purpose of this working group would be to develop an interagency food systems plan linked to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals for a more sustainable, resilient local food economy that enhances and sustains the environmental, economic, and social health of the community.

"What Is a sustainable food system, you may ask?

"A sustainable food system is defined as one in which producers, retailers, members of the community, non-governmental organizations, and government agencies partner to create a vibrant and resilient local food economy that enhances and sustains the environmental, economic, and social health of the community.

"HB308 would require a working group to come up with and submit a plan with recommendations for implementation,

including any proposed legislation to the legislature. As mentioned, the plan would be aligned with the 2015 United Nations 17 SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals.)

"HB308 would appropriate funds to establish the working group and develop the plan and for an unspecified number of sustainability specialist positions to be employed by the Department of Agriculture, along with \$100K-\$120K /year for a Professional Facilitator to facilitate the group. This bill is my number one priority this session, and I'm asking for your support. Unfortunately, the companion bill, SB420 did not pass. With HB308, we have another opportunity to move local agriculture forward in Hawai'i nei.

"HB308 received strong support from members of the community, along with numerous stakeholders and individuals; including Anna Wiczorek, Interim Dean College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources and Michael Bruno, Provost University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, who recognized the value of such a plan. Like other island states, we know Hawai'i is particularly vulnerable to natural and human disasters that stand to seriously threaten our food security. Creating a plan to ensure a more sustainable food system is more important now than ever.

"Please join me in supporting this important bill. Mahalo."

- (5) Section 6 of this Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.”

Senator DeCoite moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the floor amendment as follows:

“Mr. President, these floor amendments are revisions to the S.D. 1 to have a clean bill to send back to the House. These amendments are in consultation with the WAM chair; deputy director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; director of the Department of Taxation; and the director of the Department of Business and Finance. In this floor amendment, we have a few changes to address from the S.D. 1 approved last week. In this proposed S.D. 2, we address some percentages and amounts that were inadvertently left blank in the S.D. 1. The percentage blank in section 3 is now ‘25 percent’ in concurrence with the WAM chair. The dollar amount and percentage blanks for the workforce development incentive program were filled in from the original H.B. 1373 amounts as proposed by the introducer. Additional staff position: After conferring with DBEDT, leadership, and the WAM chair, it was determined that a staff position to carry out the workforce development incentive program was needed; this floor amendment includes funding for a program specialist IV for the purpose of administering the workforce development incentive program. Clean up language: The other changes in this floor amendment are revisions for clarity and consistency provided by DOTAX, B&F, and SMA. Mr. President, this has been an all-hands-on and around-the-clock effort these past few days, working to get this bill clean and effective. I ask that you join the WAM chair and myself in supporting the floor amendment. Thank you.”

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1049, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, section 1, is amended by amending page 1, lines 4 to 12, to read as follows:

The tax credit, for the appropriate taxable year, shall be ~~twenty~~ forty per cent of the federal earned income tax credit allowed and properly claimed under section 32 of the Internal Revenue Code and reported as such on the individual's federal income tax return.”

2. By amending subsection (g) to read:

“(g) If nonrefundable credits claimed under this section for any of the four consecutive taxable years beginning after December 31, 2017, exceed the taxpayer’s income tax liability for the original claim year, the excess of the tax credits over liability may be used as a credit against the taxpayer’s net income tax liability in subsequent years until exhausted; provided that no credit carried forward under this subsection shall be used as a credit for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2024. This section shall not apply to taxable years after December 31, 2028.””

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 1049, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, section 4, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 4. Section 235-55.85, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

“§235-55.85 Refundable food/excise tax credit. (a) Each individual taxpayer, who files an individual income tax return for a taxable year, and who is not claimed or is not otherwise eligible to be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer for federal or Hawaii state individual income tax purposes, may claim a refundable food/excise tax credit against the taxpayer’s individual income tax liability for the taxable year for which the individual income tax return is being filed; provided that an individual who has no income or no income taxable under this chapter and who is not claimed or is not otherwise eligible to be claimed as a dependent by a taxpayer for federal or Hawaii state individual income tax purposes may claim this credit.

(b) Each individual taxpayer may claim a refundable food/excise tax credit multiplied by the number of qualified

exemptions to which the taxpayer is entitled in accordance with the table below; provided that ~~a husband and wife~~ spouses filing separate tax returns for a taxable year for which a joint return could have been filed by them shall claim only the tax credit to which they would have been entitled had a joint return been filed.

(c) For the purposes of this section, a qualified exemption is defined to include those exemptions permitted under this chapter; provided that no additional exemption may be claimed by a taxpayer who is sixty-five years of age or older; provided that a person for whom exemption is claimed has been physically present in the State for more than nine months during the taxable year; and provided further that multiple exemptions shall not be granted because of deficiencies in vision or hearing, or other disability. For purposes of claiming this credit only, a minor child receiving support from the department of human services of the State, social security survivor’s benefits, and the like, may be considered a dependent and a qualified exemption of the parent or guardian.

(d) The tax credit under this section shall not be available to:

(1) Any person who has been convicted of a felony and who has been committed to prison and has been physically confined for the full taxable year;

(2) Any person who would otherwise be eligible to be claimed as a dependent but who has been committed to a youth correctional facility and has resided at the facility for the full taxable year; or

(3) Any misdemeanant who has been committed to jail and has been physically confined for the full taxable year.

(e) The tax credits claimed by a taxpayer pursuant to this section shall be deductible from the taxpayer's individual income tax liability, if any, for the tax year in which they are properly claimed. If the tax credits claimed by a taxpayer exceed the amount of income tax payment due from the taxpayer, the excess of credits over payments due shall be refunded to the taxpayer; provided that tax credits properly claimed by [an] individual who has no income tax liability shall be paid to the individual; and provided further that no refunds or payment on account of the tax credits allowed by this section shall be made for amounts less than \$1.

(f) All claims for tax credits under this section, including any amended claims, shall be filed on or before the end of the twelfth month following the close of the taxable year for which the credits may be claimed. Failure to comply with the foregoing provision shall constitute a waiver of the right to claim the credit.

(g) This section shall not apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2028.

~~(e)~~ (h) For the purposes of this section, "adjusted gross income" means adjusted gross income as defined by the Internal Revenue Code."

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“Because this bill has a clean date, it won’t be going to conference; it’s my last chance to vote on the record, so I’ll be going ‘no.’”

Senator Gabbard rose to request that remarks in opposition to the measure be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Gabbard’s remarks read as follows:

“Senator Mike Gabbard’s Journal Remarks on HB525 HD2 SD2

“(Implements the 2022 Uniform Commercial Code Amendments) – June 12, 2023

“Mr. President. I rise in opposition of House Bill 525 and would like to have remarks inserted into the journal.

“In my humble opinion, it’s too early in the process of creating a digital currency to vote ‘yes’ on HB525.

“Much still remains unknown about the future of cryptocurrencies and CBDCs (Central Bank Digital Currency.)

“This bill would update the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) so that only CBDC is ‘money’ – which could potentially create a monopoly of CBDCs over all existing cryptocurrencies, including Bitcoin.... the amendments in HB525 would help lay the foundation for a CBDC.

“Until we have a better understanding of how a CBDC will operate, as well as all of the relevant costs and benefits related to cryptocurrencies being classified as ‘controllable electronic records’ instead of ‘money,’ it would be unwise to rush to prohibit cryptocurrencies from being considered ‘money’ under the UCC. The UCC shouldn’t be altered until revisions include protections against the use of CBDCs.

“Unfortunately, this bill is not ready for prime time.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“The Uniform Commercial Code deals with our business transactions interstate. Digital currency, as the commenters have stated in the last committee, is only dealt with by Congress. If you look at what H.B. 525 says, basically, it deals with what we have already taken into account: how we use Zelle, how we use Venmo, how we use all these e-signatures

regarding real estate transactions. If, for some instance, we want to deal with real estate transactions with another bank to get them to transfer moneys over—if we want those transactions to be valid, we need to pass the Uniform Commercial Code in order for the interstate types of transactions we deal with every day. It is the 21st century; we do a lot of e-banking. If we don’t pass this, we’re basically telling interstate banks that Hawai’i is not open for e-banking; we are not open for the kind of 21st-century transactions that we deal with now on everything. And for those reasons, I am in favor, and I support H.B. 525.”

not been successful in reducing gun violence, so we all need to do a better job in finding solutions to this problem."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I'd like to begin by thanking you, the Senate leadership, and the Senate subject-matter committee chairs for their leadership and for assisting the Ways and Means committee in crafting a budget that closely aligns with Governor Green's statewide priorities that addresses long-standing challenges, such as homelessness, threats to our fragile ecosystem, and replacing or modernizing our aging government infrastructure, just to name a few.

"The biennium budget was unique and challenging. First, the steady state budget was lean and scaled back, followed by Governor's Messages 2, 3, and 5, which comprised a host of requests ranging from new positions, millions for programs and services, vehicle replacements, and overdue electricity payments. With a carryover of \$2.2 billion from fiscal year '23, we made prudent and strategic economic decisions that we believe will ensure that Hawai'i can be affordable and livable for every resident of our state. Many hours were dedicated to identifying specific ready-to-go projects to help realize the administration's ambitious statewide goals. The Ways and Means committee shares the administration's urgency and commitment to appropriating funds to areas in government that

have been resource-strapped but now can be addressed because of the \$2.2 billion in carryover funds.

“We are presenting a solution-oriented biennium budget that is both bold and financially sustainable. For fiscal year ’24, we appropriated funds that many one-time, non-recurring, large expenditures for infrastructure repairs; maintenance or replacements; construction projects; land acquisitions; climate change initiatives; and paying down the state’s unfunded liabilities, including debt service, the Employees’ Retirement System, and replenishing the rainy day fund. We invested strategically in programs that will assist thousands of low- and middle-income individuals and families through rental and child-care subsidies, increases in payments to nursing facilities, Medicaid, and state-contracted service providers who have not been provided an increase in over five years, therefore impacting their ability to continue providing essential programs and services across the state.

“In an effort to recruit and retain a qualified, skilled workforce for state government, funding was appropriated for the department, high school, and college internships; retention incentives for education loan forgiveness; and salary repricing for hard-to-fill positions in various departments, such as Law Enforcement, the Office of the Attorney General, Education, Health, and Human Services. There are many more noteworthy priorities that are addressed in the Senate’s biennium budget, but with our limited time, I’ll end with sharing a couple more critical budget priorities, and the remaining can be found in the Senate budget worksheets.

“First, funding is being provided for long-overdue technology modernization projects for various departments and agencies, including the Office of the Attorney General, Department of Taxation, Department of Law Enforcement, Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, Department of Human Resources Development, and the Department of Accounting and General Services.

“Also important to note is that our education institutions are experiencing a growing demand for specialized intensive and more expansive student support services. As a result, appropriations have been earmarked for workforce development for our special-education students, after-school care for students with disabilities, contracted skilled nursing services, applied behavior analysis, and bilingual school-home assistance.

“With increasing operating costs and greater demands for state-funded programs and services, the Senate’s approach to balancing the budget included considering the costs of the administration and the Senate priorities, the Council on Revenues’ general fund forecast, and, for the next two years, while ensuring the base budget was one that could be sustained in the outyears. Leveraging federal dollars through state-matching funds and increased expectations for select departments and agencies to be more entrepreneurial should result in additional sources of funding. Additionally, department vacancies were reduced to offset new positions requested so that we can continue to limit the growth of government.

“In conclusion, I’d like to thank the Senate subject-matter chairs for their countless hours spent with the departments and the Ways and Means team as well as scrutinizing and asking critical questions on hundreds of budget requests. Your good work is reflected in this Senate draft. I’d like to thank the Ways and Means committee members for their hard work, time, and dedication in putting forth a budget that is reflective of action-oriented leadership and a spirit of collaboration between the legislative and executive branch. As always, thank you to the vice chair and his team for putting together the CIP budget. And, lastly, thank you to the Ways and Means budget staff for their commitment, diligence, and extended hours they have put in to help shape the Senate draft.”

Senator Dela Cruz acknowledged members of the Ways and Means budget staff and his office staff who were present in the gallery: committee clerk Chung Chang; budget chief Stacy Ferreira; budget analysts Colin Peros, Parker Spencer, Shirley Kan, and Alex Ozawa; advisors Kathy Sokugawa and Ford Fuchigami; legislative assistants David Cho and Makoa Nakamura; and office manager Dot Fujinaga. Senator Dela Cruz then introduced members of the Ways and Means bills section, who had assisted the budget team. Seated in the gallery were bills chief Duncan Osorio; bills researchers Cody Rex, Malcolm Iwami, and Nathaniel Isei; and legislative aides Mary Deneen and Carey Price.

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“The capital improvement portion of the Senate draft reflects the priorities of the communities and people we represent, including \$203.5 million for harbors on all islands, \$1.03 billion for our airports, and \$1.03 billion for our highways. We also dedicated \$381 million for our community colleges and university campuses, \$156.2 million for public hospitals throughout the islands, including important projects for Kona and Hilo. We also provided additional funds for modernizing our state laboratories in preparing for the next pandemic as well as investing in our state parks and our watersheds and trails. We’re providing \$10 million in help to the Honolulu Board of Water Supply to monitor key aquifers providing fresh water for Central O’ahu, including residents affected by the Red Hill leak. The Senate draft also makes an investment of \$175 million in our public schools for new schools and classrooms, \$265 million in additional resources for repair and maintenance in addressing ADA and athletic equity.

“I would like to thank my colleagues for identifying the priorities and public-works projects that may provide value to the lives of their friends, neighbors, and communities. I would also express my appreciation to the hard work of the Ways and Means chair and his operating budget staff for their assistance since this Senate draft, like last session, continues the effort to address the backlog of repairs and maintenance for public facilities in our schools or in our campuses or community colleges and other public buildings through the appropriate use of general funds. I’m also grateful to our various partners in the various departments and state agencies for their work in responding in a timely way to our questions and requests for information. I finally want to thank my own staff: my office manager, Susan Wong; my session staffers, Moya Gray and Jimmy Nelson; and the two staffers who worked on the CIP portion of this draft, Danielle Evangelista and Robert Nishimoto. I think they’re upstairs still working on the bill. With that, I also have some written remarks I’d like to submit in support of the bill.” (The Chair so ordered.)

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Thank you Mr. President. I rise in support of H.B. No. 300, S.D. 1, and specifically on the capital improvement projects portion of the measure. With a general fund surplus, we have an opportunity to continue what was started last session in using general funds for repair and maintenance projects that would be difficult and impractical to finance with general obligation bonds— projects that need to be done, can be accomplished without a lot of design or planning work, but are not the kind of improvements that align well with the twenty to thirty year life of a bond issuance. A good portion of our backlog of deferred maintenance can be characterized in this way— painting, small repairs, and roof replacements. Also, we can purchase alarm and bell systems at our schools, and even fund the security cameras and newer equipment, carpeting and furniture that many of our aging public school campuses would like. I support

the prudent approach of the Ways and Means Chair in strategically investing general funds for these types of projects.

"I urge my colleagues to support the Senate Draft of the State Budget."

THIRD READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1878 (H.B. No. 1375, H.D. 3, S.D. 2):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that H.B. No. 1375, H.D. 3, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator DeCoite then offered the following floor amendment (Floor Amendment No. 7) to H.B. No. 1375, H.D. 3, S.D. 2:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1375, H.D. 3, S.D.2, section 2, is amended by amending page 7, line 8, through page 8, line 13, to read as follows:

“(c) The office shall be headed by a board of directors that shall consist of nine members who shall be appointed by the governor as provided in section 26-34; provided that:

- (1) One member shall represent the hospitality industry;
- (2) One member shall represent the airline industry;
- (3) One member shall represent the retail industry;
- (4) One member shall have a background in Hawaiian culture;
- (5) One member shall have a background in agriculture;
- (6) One member shall reside in the county of Maui and be appointed from a list of three names submitted by the senate president;
- (7) One member shall reside in the county of Kauai and be appointed from a list of three names submitted by the senate president;
- (8) One member shall reside in the county of Hawaii and be appointed from a list of three names submitted by the speaker of the house of representatives; and
- (9) One member shall reside in the city and county of Honolulu and be appointed from a list of three names submitted by the speaker of the house of representatives.

All appointed members of the board of directors may continue in office until their respective successors have been appointed; provided that a holdover member shall not hold office beyond the end of the second regular legislative session following the expiration of the member’s term of office. The board of directors shall elect a chairperson from among its members; provided that the director of business, economic development, and tourism shall serve as the chairperson until a chairperson is

elected by the members of the board. The members shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including traveling expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties.”

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 1375, H.D. 3, S.D.2, section 25, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 25. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023; provided that amendments made to section 237D-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by section 11 of this Act, shall not be repealed when that section is repealed and reenacted on June 30, 2023, pursuant to section 9 of Act 229, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021.”

Senator DeCoite moved that Floor Amendment No. 7 be adopted, seconded by Senator Dela Cruz.

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in support of the floor amendment as follows:

“Mr. President, these floor amendments are revisions to the S.D. 2 to have a clean bill to send back to the House. These amendments are in concurrence with the WAM chair with input from DBEDT, leadership, and SMA. This amendment clarifies how incoming board members are to be selected and appointed. I would like to thank the majority policy leader and the WAM vice chair for helping us with the language to make the appointment process consistent with other boards and commissions. Also included is an effective date of July 1, 2023. Mr. President, this is another all-hands-on and around-the-clock effort these past few days working to get this bill clean and effective. Mahalo to all the staff that worked on this for us to have to vote on today. I ask that you join the WAM chair and myself in supporting this floor amendment. Mahalo.”

At 10:52 a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 10:53 a.m.

Thursday, April 13, 2023

ADVISE AND CONSENT**

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1892 (Gov. Msg. No. 517):

Senator Wakai moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1892 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

Senator Wakai then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of TOMMY JOHNSON as Director of the Department of Public Safety, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Wakai rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Mr. President and colleagues, watching over criminals and straightening them out is a daunting task; very few of us would want this job. Thank goodness we have Tommy Johnson, because he wants it, and he thrives in this environment. He’s the right man to guide the department to successfully transition from the Department of Public Safety to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation: agencies undergoing a paradigm shift under his guidance from a punitive model (lock ‘em up and toss out the keys) to a more treatment- and program-oriented approach. During his confirmation hearing, a couple of former inmates testified in favor of Mr. Johnson. They said he was strict, but he was always fair. This is the kind of leadership necessary to turn lives around: tough love for tough dudes. In the past, inmates walked out of jail with no identification and had to reintegrate into society somehow on their own. A small but significant change was to provide inmates with proper documentation upon their release so they could apply for jobs and safety net programs—small, but significant.

“Mr. Johnson has his detractors: About six guards showed up at his confirmation hearing to talk about how they believed he was unfair and played favorites. For years, staffing and morale have been significant challenges at DPS, and the correctional system has about 300 vacancies out of their 1,500 officer positions. The situation is aggravated by corrections officers who repeatedly fail to show up to work. This forces others to work longer shifts to cover absent staff. Guards complain about working 16- or even 24-hour shifts. In a few months on the job, Mr. Johnson has already increased recruitment hirings by 50 percent to address part of this issue. But the bigger issue is ACOs often out sick, on family leave, vacation; many game the system so they really only work seven months out of the year and pocket loads of overtime pay. Last year, overtime cost taxpayers \$34 million. Mr. Johnson has assembled a management team to address this lingering issue. If you benefited from the old way of getting more by doing less, you are not going to welcome Mr. Johnson’s style, but the public deserves better, and he’s delivering.

“Changing the work ethic in any environment is not easy. Mr. Johnson assured the PSM committee that he would reach out and build bridges with the union, and he met with those union leaders this past week to iron out those differences. They discussed several issues, including joint recruitment efforts and employee incentives for those who actually show up to work. I admire Mr. Johnson’s willingness to make peace with his adversaries. His word is good.

“Tommy Johnson has been a deputy director of corrections at the Department of Public Safety since 2017. He has more than 25 years of experience in corrections: 10 years in Hawai‘i, 15 years with the military. He understands corrections on many different levels. He’s a graduate of the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa with a bachelor’s degree in criminal justice.

“Under Mr. Johnson’s stewardship, we can expect to see a number of improvements, including continued advancements in public safety initiatives, reduced recidivism, lowering of overtime costs, betterment of morale, improvements to correctional facilities across the state. Mr. Johnson’s outstanding accomplishments coupled with his unyielding dedication to the betterment of our community make him a beacon of hope for a safer Hawai‘i. I encourage you, colleagues, to join me in voting in favor of Tommy Johnson’s confirmation to be the director of the Department of Public Safety.”

Your Committee believes that Ms. Ducatt’s legal expertise and knowledge of the Department is a tremendous asset and will help Ms. Ducatt carry out her expressed intent to implement formal training, internal policies, and workflows to minimize gaps in current processes to ultimately help reduce the number of beneficiaries on the waiting list. Your Committee believes that Ms. Ducatt, with a reputation as a trustworthy, highly organized, and detail-oriented public servant, will greatly complement Chairperson Watson as he seeks to take immediate action on the 20 projects identified in the strategic plan approved by the Hawaiian Homes Commission. And, therefore, your Hawaiian Affairs committee recommends that Katie Ducatt be appointed as the deputy to the chairperson of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands based on her knowledge, experience, and commitment to public service. Mahalo.”

She was a named partner in the firm Ranken & Drewyer, LLC, and later served in her own solo practice.

“Judge Drewyer additionally has experience as a per diem judge in the family and district courts of the Second Circuit. She has presided over various calendars and cases including child protective services, criminal juvenile matters, family court drug court, adoptions, guardianships, temporary restraining orders and protective orders, divorce, and landlord-tenant issues as well. She has also traveled around the circuit as a per diem judge including sitting on Moloka’i and Lāna’i.

“Judge Drewyer received her bachelor of arts degree from Western Michigan University in 1986 and her juris doctor degree from Thomas M. Cooley Law School in Lansing, Michigan, in 1991.

“After having reviewed the testimony, which was overwhelmingly in support of her confirmation, and other materials submitted to the committee and having examined the

appointee in a hearing, your Judiciary committee finds that Michelle L. Drewyer is qualified to serve as a circuit court judge of the Second Circuit, and recommends that the Senate consent to the appointment. Mahalo.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Rhoads introduced Judge Michelle L. Senator Rhoads then acknowledged his staff attorneys Dave Nagaji and Jessica Faige, who were accompanying the nominee.

Senator Rhoads continued, speaking on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Members, I would like to share the following about the composition of our state judges and justices: With this confirmation, the Maui Circuit Court achieves gender parity with two female and two male judges. The number of state court judges and justices overall will also be equally split, with 40 sitting female judges and justices and 40 sitting male judges and justices. Should the governor’s recent appointment of Kimberly Tsumoto Guidry to the Intermediate Court of Appeals also be confirmed by the Senate, it would be the first time in Hawai‘i history that more than 50 percent of sitting judges and justices are female. Mahalo.”

"Colleagues, we're having a difficult time hiring and retaining talent in state jobs. It is a well-known fact that we may not offer the best pay in some of our jobs that we have here in the state, but the state is among the best for employing and having and offering attractive benefits. The Department of Human Services report that there is a rate of 23 percent of vacancies for nearly 4,000 vacancy positions. How are we supposed to appeal to the new hires when we're cutting back the very benefits that makes us appealing and attractive for work? I ask my colleagues to strongly oppose Senate Bill 1314, and thank you, Senate President. Mahalo and God bless."

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"I understand the concerns and the vacancies we have and incentives, but this bill addresses spousal Medicare reimbursement of future retired employees. I ask my colleagues to support this."

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"What this does is clean up what was originally passed when we did civil service reform quite some time ago. This is for the Part B section of the spouse benefit. Currently, when you retire, for new employees, their spouse is not covered with health benefits, so this tries to clean this up.

"If we're really trying to get better employees and more employees, what we should be focusing on is pay differentials, reclassifications—not necessarily this. I don't think this actually solves the problem of trying to attract new employees. Thank you."

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY

Friday, April 21, 2023

The Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 11:41 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senators Keohokalole and Shimabukuro who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Third Day.

At this time, Senator Inouye introduced her youngest intern, Hope Matsuura, the daughter of late state senator David Matsuura and granddaughter of state senator Richard "Dick" Matsuura, who had been a big supporter of agriculture. Senator Inouye explained that Ms. Matsuura was on O'ahu attending Hawaiian Mission Academy as a sophomore. Senator Inouye then recognized her Hilo liaison, Rhea Lee-Moku, who handles her district work while she is at the Capitol and was accompanying Ms. Matsuura in the gallery.

Senator Lee welcomed President Surangel Whipps Jr. of the Republic of Palau, who was seated in the gallery with his delegation.

Senator Fevella recognized a group of students from Papahana 'o Kaiona on the Wai'anae Coast who were involved in a statewide effort to speak up for Hawai'i's birds by advocating for H.C.R. No. 81, which would establish Hawaiian Honeycreepers Celebration Day. Senator Fevella explained that, over the past four months, these students, along with about 2,000 others across the state, had learned about the Hawaiian honeycreeper and the legislative process in advocating for the resolution, with over 1,500 pieces of testimony submitted by students. Senator Fevella noted that the courageous students who had stepped forward to share their stories, knowledge, and art looked forward to the day the honeycreeper would be celebrated by highlighting conservation efforts to protect them. Present in the gallery were Vice Principal Ryan Oshita; Kumu Shannon Bucasas; students Abigail Asuega, Brianna Joshua, Precious Noble, Akena Talley, and Travis Kahaloa; Kumu Kailee Lefebvre; and Kumu Yumi Miyata.

On behalf of Senator Shimabukuro, Senator Kidani introduced students from Nānākuli High & Intermediate School who have been developing a prototype environmental business plan for the recycling and repurposing of community cardboard waste. Senator Kidani noted that the students, a team known as Scrappahz Union 96792, had entered their business plan in a competition with hundreds of other students from various schools and had come in first place, winning \$25,000. Senator Kidani clarified that the students had decided to donate the money so that other schools could purchase their own shredders. Seated in the gallery were teachers Kumu Michelle Pieper, Kumu Mikes, and Ms. Helena Bakutis-Kekaula; students Tilionapuanani Keohuhu, Keola Mahoe, Kanoe Torres, Nahe Ka'awa-Kawai, Brensen Yuen, and Jeanna Lei; and members Jeremiah Magalones and Paul Nahulu. Senator Kidani then reminded the members that the students had invited them to join them for lunch in Conference Room 016 following session that day.

Senator Wakai introduced three UH students who were supporters of equity in criminal justice reform in Hawai'i and who were interns at Opportunity Youth Action Hawai'i: Haumea Velasco, Sydney Story, and Leah Delos Santos. Accompanying them in the gallery was Melissa Pavlicek.

Prior to joining the Department of Health, Dr. Fink worked as a vice president for Medicare & Medicaid Programs at HMSA before he was a director of Student Health Services for Kamehameha Schools. His government work includes serving as a state Med-QUEST director for Hawai‘i under Governors Lingle and Abercrombie; the chief medical officer for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, Region 10; and director of the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force and the Evidence-Based Practice Centers Programs at the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.

“It is not presumptuous to say that Kenny Fink—he does like to be called Kenny—is supremely qualified for this position. I have over two pages in small type of the many awards and commendations he has, yet he is so humble that even after decades of being an administrator, he thinks of himself as a family doctor first. His work with Native Americans in Juneau, Alaska, and as a family doctor in Seattle, Washington, and other states prior to government experience shows that he is able to work with people. Indeed, he is board certified in both family medicine and preventive medicine.

“Like our governor doctor, Kenny Fink also holds many titles: professor for the many classes he has taught in universities, and colonel. He’s a retired flight surgeon for the U.S. Air Force and has served with the Air National Guard for the past seven years. He earned numerous medals, such as a Defense Meritorious Service Medal and an Air Force Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster. It would be an honor to have a veteran serve the state of Hawai‘i as he has served our country. His experience as an Air Force colonel will be invaluable in working with the military on the current Red Hill water crisis and to lead us out of this pandemic. I trust that he will meet the high expectations set by his team and the public, and, frankly, in working with him, it appears that he has already been made a family of Department of Health. So I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting his nomination. Thank you.”

“Colleagues, I urge you to join me and support the nomination of Susan Fernandez to continue as deputy director of the Department of Health. Deputy Director Fernandez has over a decade of experience in various administrative and managerial government positions. As a former resident of the Puna district, Deputy Director Fernandez has an intimate understanding of the healthcare challenges unique to our neighbor island ‘ohana and rural communities of O‘ahu. She’s a good support for Dr. Fink.

“She has earned a bachelor of business administration and master’s of business administration from the UH at Mānoa. Prior to her appointment, Ms. Fernandez served as deputy director of the Department of Community Services for the City and County of Honolulu; assistant hospital administrator at Hilo Medical Center; chief budget, planning and management officer with the Department of Human Services; budget chief and analyst at the Hawai‘i State House of Representatives for the Standing Committee on Finance—don’t hold that against her, please—and operations senior manager of the New Ventures/Optical Department at Kaiser Permanente.

“During Deputy Director Fernandez’s advise and consent hearing, your Committee on Health and Human Services received an overwhelming number of testimonies affirming that

Ms. Fernandez possesses the commitment, experience, and work ethic to achieve the Department's goals and ensure that all Hawai'i residents have a fair and just opportunity to achieve optimum health and well-being.

"In closing, I'm confident that, if given the opportunity, Deputy Director Fernandez will exceed the high expectations set by those before her, and I urge my colleagues to join me and support her nomination."

The Chair commented:

"So that you don't have to worry, Senator San Buenaventura, nobody's going to hold the House service against her. We have 12 members of this body who unfortunately served in the House before they came here, so I'm sure that half the caucus understands."

Before being appointed as first deputy director, Tammy served as the administrative services officer at the Department's Highways Division. She also held management roles within the Department's administration program as the business management officer and contracting officer.

"Some of her most notable accomplishments include upgrading the Department's financial management system, H4, which is set to launch next fall; the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program; and the Hawaii Road Usage Charge Demonstration. Throughout her career, Tammy has made meaningful strides to modernize the Department by streamlining internal processes for hiring, contracting, and

fiscal management. She has reorganized outdated departmental structures and practices to better meet Hawai'i's changing transportation needs. Tammy was the architect of the Highways Division Engineer Wiki Wiki Hire pilot program, an innovative response to pervasive vacancies, and in just nine months, she onboarded an impressive 46 highly skilled engineers. As deputy director, she will expand the Wiki Wiki Hire Program to fill even more vacancies throughout DOT. She has led the Highways Division through the pandemic with grace, developing telework policies that strengthen her team in the face of chaos and uncertainty. And she also has an extensive experience managing the Department's finances. As the Highways Division ASO, she led the acquisition of \$300 million worth of bond proceeds. She has overseen many aspects of the Department's budget, ensuring that taxpayer money is used ethically and productively.

"In my interactions with her, I found Tammy to be a humble team player and a dedicated civil servant. She is passionate, goal-oriented, and ready to work with the Legislature to get things done. I'm confident that Tammy will be successful as the first deputy director. Her depth of experience, problem-solving skills, and organizational expertise are just what the Department needs as we work together to modernize transportation in Hawai'i. I urge you all to vote to advise and consent on G.M. 530, Tammy Lee, for first deputy director of the Department of Transportation. Thank you."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 921, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Limitations of Actions."

The purpose of this bill is to extend the deadline to clarify and expressly state that the tolling provision in section 514B-141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, applies to protect the rights of condominium associations to assert legal claims for construction defects against developers until two years after the developer's control of the condominium development is terminated.

This bill is objectionable because it appears to have the unintended consequence of increasing the costs of housing. The bill creates the potential for increased liability which results in the need for additional insurance coverage, which costs are ultimately borne and paid for by the buyers. Our administration is focused on alleviating our critical housing shortage in Hawai'i and we are reluctant to enact any new law that could add costs to housing or delays in construction. While this bill has merit and I commend its sponsors for their work, I am concerned that it will only add costs on future projects, and therefore, have decided to veto this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 921 without my approval.

“Your Committee on Labor and Technology reviewed Mr. Kunstman’s background and performance and found that he has shown his commitment to the Department, serving over 12 years with five directors in a number of different capacities as program evaluation analyst, public information officer, assistant to the director, legislative coordinator, and administrative rules coordinator. He also served as Labor committee clerk for Senator Dwight Takamine, assisting and overseeing measures relating to the Department. Bill received a master’s degree in public administration and in library & information science from the UH Mānoa and a bachelor of arts degree in history from the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

“During hearings, Bill demonstrated his knowledge of the needs of the Department and the challenges that it currently faces. As deputy, he will be updating the Department’s policies and procedures, increasing its resources and capacity through modernization, re-engaging stakeholders, and ensuring a collaborative culture among the various divisions of the Department. With his broad knowledge and practical experience with labor policies and issues in Hawai’i, his demonstrated understanding of the Department’s mission, his institutional knowledge and working relations with staff and stakeholders—both management and labor—and his dedication to public service, Bill is eminently qualified to assist the director and the Department in meeting the challenges facing our state’s workers and employers. I strongly urge the Senate to advise and consent Bill Kunstman as deputy director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.”

Senator Moriwaki introduced Deputy Director Bill Kunstman, who was present in the gallery with his wife and family and staff of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“Anne Lopez is well known for her work as vice president and general counsel of the Hawai‘i Health System Corporation. Her role at HHSC included facilitation of the complex transfer of three Maui hospitals from HHSC to Maui Health Systems and leading the in-house legal department that encompassed attorneys, legal support staff, and the corporate director of risk management. She was with HHSC for seven years before being selected by the governor to return to the Department of the Attorney General. Immediately prior to her work at HHSC, Ms. Lopez was the special assistant to the attorney general, an important role which provided her with a strong understanding of the workings of the department.

“Ms. Lopez brings with her 10 years of litigation experience in the private sector, with the firms of Kobayashi Sugita & Goda and Chun Kerr Dodd Beaman & Wong. She was also a law clerk for former justice Paula Nakayama, who recently retired from the Hawai‘i Supreme Court. Ms. Lopez received her law degree in 2001 from the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa, where she was the co-editor in chief for the *University of Hawai‘i Law Review* and graduated summa cum laude. Her legal career followed an earlier career as an occupational therapist for more than a decade, and she received her undergraduate bachelor of science degree from San Jose State University.

“The committee received voluminous testimony on Ms. Lopez’s nomination from a wide range of current and past colleagues as well as government and nonprofit leaders and two former attorneys general. She has been serving as attorney general since December and seeks to bring a new style of leadership to the department.

“After having reviewed the testimony on the nomination, which was overwhelmingly in support of her confirmation, and other materials submitted to the committee and having examined the nominee in a hearing, your Judiciary committee finds that Anne Lopez is qualified to serve as Hawai‘i attorney general and recommends that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination. Mahalo.”






“Based on my experience in working with the nominee, I believe that he is a very qualified candidate. He has held many leadership roles and has experience in managing a department which will have a positive impact on the State of Hawaii.

“We look forward to working with Mr. Salaveria in the coming years.

“Colleagues, I ask that you join me in supporting his nomination.

“Thank you, Mr. President.”

“Ms. Sabrina Nasir has been appointed as the Deputy Director of the Department of Budget and Finance. Prior to being named as the interim Deputy Director, Ms. Nasir served as a Senior Special Assistant in the Governor’s Office and has experience as the Senate Committee Ways and Means Budget Chief.

“Your Committee on Ways and Means met with Ms. Nasir and believes she is capable and qualified in assisting the Director in leading the Department of Budget and Finance. She has a thorough understanding of the budget and the budget process and will be an asset to the department.

“However, I am voting with reservations based on her decisions made during her time as the Ways and Means Budget Chief and the role she played during the transition between Ways and Means Chairs. Based on our conversations during the Ways and Means Committee hearing, Ms. Nasir has apologized to the Committee, and we recommended that the Senate advise and consent to her nomination.

“I look forward to working with Ms. Nasir and the Director in the coming years.

“Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Dela Cruz introduced Deputy Director Sabrina Nasir, who was present in the gallery with her family, friends, and supporters.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2009 (Gov. Msg. No. 518):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2009 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of GARY SUGANUMA as Director of the Department of Taxation, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz’s remarks read as follows:

“Mr. President, I rise in support of Governor’s Message 518.

“Mr. Gary Suganuma has been appointed as the Director of the Department of Taxation. Prior to being named as the interim Director, Mr. Suganuma served as the Supervising Deputy Attorney General, Tax & Charities Division.

“Your Committee on Ways and Means met with Mr. Suganuma and believe he is capable and qualified in leading the Department of Taxation. Mr. Suganuma understands that the Department of Taxation’s core responsibility is to administer the tax laws of the State of Hawaii in a consistent, uniform, and fair manner.

“His experience and knowledge from his previous positions held provides him with a good understanding of the Department’s goals.

“His abilities and qualities are an asset in which we look forward to having him lead the Department of Taxation.

“Colleagues, I ask that you join me in supporting his nomination.

“Thank you, Mr. President.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Dela Cruz introduced Director Gary Suganuma, who was present in the gallery with his family, supporters, and friends.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2010 (Gov. Msg. No. 532):

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2010 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran and carried.

Senator Dela Cruz then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of KRISTEN SAKAMOTO as Deputy Director of the Department of Taxation, term to expire December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to request that remarks in support of the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Dela Cruz's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of Governor's Message 532.

"Ms. Kristen Sakamoto has been appointed as the Deputy Director of the Department of Taxation. Prior to being named as the interim Deputy Director, Ms. Sakamoto served as the Deputy Corporation Counsel, Finance Section, for the City and County of Honolulu as well as the Deputy Attorney General, Tax and Charities Division.

"Your Committee on Ways and Means met with Ms. Sakamoto and believe she is capable and qualified in assisting the Director in leading the Department of Taxation. Ms. Sakamoto understands that the Department of Taxation's core responsibility is to collect revenues so Hawaii can meet its obligations and support critical safety net programs.

"Her experience as an administrative rules specialist within this department has provided a good understanding of state tax laws and policies. Her abilities, qualities, and potential are necessary qualifications that are needed to help accomplish the goals that are set forth within the Department of Taxation.

"Together with the Director, we look forward to seeing changes and initiatives to improve tax administration.

"Colleagues, I ask that you join me in supporting her nomination.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Senator Dela Cruz introduced Deputy Director Kristen Sakamoto, who was present in the gallery with her family, friends, and supporters from the Department of Taxation.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2011 (Gov. Msg. No. 519):

Senator Lee moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2011 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Inouye and carried.

Senator Lee then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of EDWIN SNIFFEN as Director of the Department of Transportation, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Inouye.

Senator Lee rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"After reviewing Ed's résumé, qualifications, and experience, your Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts voted to advise and consent on his nomination. As a graduate of Kamehameha Schools and Santa Clara University, Ed has been a professional licensed engineer with almost 30 years of experience in transportation. For the past eight years, he served as the DOT deputy director for Highways where, in this role, he was responsible for 780 employees, \$500 million in capital improvement projects, special maintenance projects, and operational funding. He's championed safety for all users, modernization of the highway system, and among many things Ed's worked on were upgrading highway roads and bridges; expediting conversion to clean energy fleets; reducing environmental impacts from construction; and leveraging federal dollars to effect the overall priorities of the state, including broadband, housing, homelessness, and education.

"As Highways director, Ed leveraged resources and key partnerships to tackle our state's highest priorities. He incentivized affordable housing development with strategic

infrastructure projects, collaborating with the counties, developers, and community members to increase access to low-cost housing. He also directed \$25 million of federal highway funds toward broadband pilot programs in eight underserved communities. And when the pandemic struck, Ed responded proactively, authorizing the use of Highways facilities, notably the H-3, for COVID reporting, awareness, and testing, which I think has been a first in the state for use of those kinds of facilities.

"Throughout his time at DOT, Ed has overseen innovative responses to vacancies in the department, like the Wiki Wiki Hire pilot program, which hired 46 highly skilled engineers in just over nine months. As director of Highways Division, he worked hard to bring federal money to the state, finding creative solutions to fund projects by thinking outside the box. He's pledged to collaborate with the Legislature, increase transparency and accountability, work with communities that we serve to continue addressing Hawai'i's most critical needs through a connected and modernized transportation system. Given his depth of experience, I believe Ed is well qualified to lead the Department of Transportation, and I recommend we advise and consent on G.M. 519, Edwin Sniffen, for the director of the Department of Transportation."

Senator Rhoads rose to request that remarks in opposition to the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Rhoads's remarks read as follows:

"Mr. President: I rise in opposition to Governor's Message 519 nominating Ed Sniffen as Director of the Department of Transportation.

"I genuinely hope I am wrong about Mr. Sniffen and that, if confirmed, he will have a successful tenure in office.

"However, I have several concerns which lead me to vote no.

"1. He appears to believe that the federal money that the Department receives is 'his' money. Of course, it is taxpayers' money like any other source of funding and the Legislature must appropriate it, just like any other source of State income.

"2. I am not convinced he will lead the Department out of the 1970's. Cars are still the highest priority to the Department and seemingly to Mr. Sniffen as well. Pedestrian and bicycle safety consistently takes a backseat to the flow of vehicular traffic. In the district I represent, there are dangerous crosswalks that he refuses to take the necessary steps to make safer despite being handed funding to do so on a silver platter.

"3. Finally, he apparently believes that the Legislature has no role in transportation policy. He seems to believe that transportation policy should be left to the Department. This is of course nonsense. The Legislature is constitutionally granted policymaking authority and is the body that gets to decide what transportation priorities should be.

"Despite my no vote, if confirmed, I will continue to work with him in areas where we agree. We both owe the people of the State of Hawaii our best efforts regardless of our differences."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"May I have the remarks from the previous speaker, the chair of the transportation committee, be entered into the Journal as if it was mine? Mahalo." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Since I’ve been here (a very short time), Ed Sniffen and the Department of Transportation, everything that he did, everything that he had accomplished and he said he was going to do, he really put his mouth to the pavement, literally. When we were in dire need of information on what was going on with our money from our communities, he was very much so that he was okay to explain to the community. Same thing as what Senator Lee said: He really knows how to work with the community and convince them, because I was very much in my community, as you guys know—was very against teacher housing because of our traffic situation. He sat me down, and he convinced me that if we work together with teacher housing, that he can work with my community in getting better ways of transportation in and out of ‘Ewa Beach. And that’s the reasons why, colleagues, I ask you guys for your guys’ support for Ed Sniffen for director of DOT because he put his mouth where our money is, or something like that. Thank you again, God bless.”

The Chair commented that he liked Senator Fevella’s “mouth to the pavement” example.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Rhoads).

Senator Lee introduced Director Edwin Sniffen, who was present in the gallery with his mother, Lynette Sniffen; father-in-law and mother-in-law, Randy and Bev Kim; wife, Heidi Kim; sons Sam, Simon, and Eli; and friends, supporters, and ‘ohana from the Department of Transportation.

The Chair requested that Director Sniffen stand above the nearby descending steps, and Director Sniffen did so. The Chair then explained that much had been made of the orange slippers Director Sniffen had apparently worn the previous Tuesday night for the budget hearing. The Chair then noted that Director Sniffen had chosen to wear shoes to his confirmation that evening, and thanked Director Sniffen.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2012 (Gov. Msg. No. 515):

Senator Moriwaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2012 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Lee and carried.

Senator Moriwaki then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of JADE BUTAY as Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, term to expire at noon on December 7, 2026, seconded by Senator Lee.

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

“I believe it is a solemn responsibility of the Senate to evaluate whether the governor’s nominees are qualified to lead their departments. We look at the nominee’s vision and goals, ability to inspire and lead staff, and integrity. We look at past performance, performance during committee hearings, and testimony from those with direct knowledge of the nominee.

“Jade Butay served for almost 11 years as deputy director of Labor and Industrial Relations, and as director of Transportation. He holds a bachelor’s degree in business administration from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa and also a master’s from Babson College.

“Supportive testimony spoke of Jade as personable, collaborative, a good listener. Those who have worked with him agree that he is nice and friendly but state that he did not lead or inspire. Several staff called him a ceremonial director. One said he was unsuccessful in gaining Jade’s support to improve the agency. Instead, Jade told him their job was to be caretakers, ensuring nothing went wrong. Another complained he returned \$2 million in federal funds that was to address helicopter noise

without a good explanation. We also heard about the lost opportunity to get federal funds to help modernize our harbors when it became the Akaka Marine Harbor 1. And he reclassified civil service positions into excluded managerial positions by bypassing the state’s required review and approval, then filled the position without open recruitment, an act that lacked integrity. During labor committee hearings, he read written testimony but was unable to answer questions. He lacks vision beyond caring for our workers and having a thriving workforce by enhancing current department programs.

“I believe the state needs a leader who is proactive and who will inspire staff to solve our post-COVID labor challenges. I have had discussions with Jade and the governor to address his performance. Jade has agreed to work together with us, his department managers, staff, and stakeholders on workforce shortage and incentives to retain talent, unemployment insurance modernization, enforcement of wage standards, worker health and family leave benefits, occupational safety and health in the workplace, support for small businesses, and addressing the need to balance labor and management concerns, and to be fair and transparent in staffing his department. Yes, I have concerns, but with others testifying to his professionalism and good character, and with his promise to hold himself accountable to lead the Department jointly with his administrators—not ceremonially—and to meet specific performance outcomes, I ask my colleagues to recommend (with reservations) Jade Butay as director of the Labor and Industrial Relations Department. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

“I respect and I love my colleague, Senator Sharon Moriwaki. I don’t have all the intel that she has. The only thing that I have, Senate President and colleagues, is the experience that I had personally. In my heart, when I had asked him very kindly—not everybody maybe remember this—he was going to let go our own Ed Sniffen when I first got into this building, and I reached out to him, and I begged and plead to him to reconsider, and giving him, Ed Sniffen, the position that he deserved, and now look where he’s at today. And he took my words seriously, came in to me, and I know I made mistakes here, colleagues, before—I did, and I know I did and I regret it. There was one that I did that I voted for that I thought he was going to be doing good in DBEDT, and he turned around and flipped this up on all of us and stabbed most of us in the back. But this time, I really believe that Jade Butay, going forward, is going to be able to do the job because, not only with Senator Sharon Moriwaki, myself—and I told you this, Jade—that we’re going to hold your foot to the fire. But I support him because of his opening his heart, mind, and soul and gave my good braddah—my good friend, Ed Sniffen—another chance to serve this community and this state that he did a great job in, and now he’s director. Thank you, Senate President.”

Senator Inouye rose to request that remarks in support of the nominee be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Inouye’s remarks read as follows:

“I have known Director Jade Butay for a long time during my time in public office. He has always shown a willingness to collaborate with others and find solutions that are best for the people of Hawaii. His track record and substantial experience in Hawaii State Government more than qualifies him for the position of Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. I am pleased that Governor Josh Green has decided to leave a critically important department such as the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations in the hands of Jade Butay.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Dela Cruz, Keohokalole, Lee, Moriwaki). Noes, none.

Senator Moriwaki introduced Director Jade Butay, who was present in the gallery with Department of Labor and Industrial Relations deputy director Bill Kunstman, executive assistant Grace Ichikawa, state equal opportunity officer David Rodriguez, Bobby Ichikawa, Jovanie Dela Cruz, Amy Agbayani, Agnes Malate, Deanna Espinas, Brian Lee, and Pane Meatoga.

What I'm saying here is very small to whatever that she had contributed to this state; I mean, she worked with a lot of people here in this chamber, in the city and state. And she contributed that she did to making us successful and being great in what we do, from not only with the senators and representatives and councilmembers—you guys know that she also used to work for the mayor and the rail, and she did a great job when she was there. So, again, I just want to give a round of applause to Joyce Oliveira on her retirement, and best wishes."

Senator Gabbard reminded the members that he had encouraged them to go out and hug a tree on Earth Day the previous week. Senator Gabbard noted that it was Arbor Day that day, when appreciation is shown for trees. Senator Gabbard then encouraged the members to go out and plant a tree the following day.

Senator Kim rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"I like to think that I taught Joyce Oliveira everything she knows. She first worked for me my first session in 1982 in the House of Representatives, and then later on worked for me for, I don't know how many years in the Honolulu City Council. And then, when I came over here, we couldn't pay her enough to bring her over here, so she stayed over there at the Council and worked there until she finally came back over here. I'm saddened that she is retiring, but I'm sure we're going to have her come back in some other way, so thank you."

Senator Shimabukuro invited members, staff, and guests to a free public showing of aloha 'āina films *Hawaiian Soul*, *Like a Mighty Wave*, and *Standing Above the Clouds* in the Auditorium immediately following floor session. Senator Shimabukuro explained that the short films were about the Hawaiian movement and that the showing would be hosted by Lanakila Mangauli, a newly appointed member of the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority.

Senator Kidani invited members and guests to an exclusive screening of the film *Beyond Bars: Prison Women Speak* on Monday, May 1st, at 2:30 p.m. in the Auditorium. Senator Kidani noted that the locally made film was produced by Kailua resident Tadia Rice and featured the poignant stories of five currently and formerly incarcerated women from the Women's Community Correctional Center who allowed profound insight into their experiences in the prison system and who they are today. Senator Kidani explained that the screening would be followed by a question-and-answer panel discussion with *Beyond Bars* participants, including entrepreneur Zoe O'Brien and Paipai o Ko'olau peer mentor Momilani Cody from Windward Community College.

Senator San Buenaventura introduced members of the Hawai'i State Teachers Association who were seated in the gallery. Senator San Buenaventura noted that they had just ratified their agreement.

"Mr. President, your Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection finds that Ms. Ando's abilities, professional experience, and career accomplishments will be valuable assets to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, the state, and its consumers and businesses. Ms. Ando has extensive background in commercial and real estate litigation, professional liability law, insurance coverage,

products liability, and employment litigation, having been a partner with some of the state's most highly respected law firms over the course of her 40-year career as an attorney. Ms. Ando has also received consistent professional recognition for her work, having been listed in Best Lawyers of America and Super Lawyers for her commercial litigation practice since 2006 and 2008, respectively. At the time of her appointment as interim director in December, Ms. Ando was working as litigation counsel with the law firm of Fukunaga Matayoshi Ching & Kon-Herrera LLP. Ms. Ando serves on the advisory committee of the Bar Leadership Institute; is the lawyer-delegate for the United State District Court, Hawaii Judicial Conference; and previously served in multiple positions on the Hawaii State Bar Association Board of Directors, including as president, and now as the elected representative to and chair of the Hawai'i State Judicial Selection Commission. Upon review of the testimony, your Committee finds that Ms. Ando's background, experience, and commitment to public service qualify her for appointment as director of the DCCA.

"And, Mr. President, perhaps the best thing I can say about the nominee is that she has shown a commitment to working with us in the Legislature through the often-bumpy legislative process to get to a point where we can communicate and work together in the public interest while also acknowledging that we are going to have disagreements and that those disagreements cannot disrupt the need for us to keep open lines of communication and to maintain a collaborative working relationship. I think the Department and the people of Hawai'i will be better for it. Thank you very much, and I ask my colleagues to support her confirmation."

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the nominee with reservations as follows:

"I understand that Ms. Ando has a lot of litigation experience, but I see no experience in the regulatory matters. At a time that we are coming out of a pandemic, we need DCCA more than ever. We need those permits to be issued timely; we need those licenses, those certifications to proceed efficiently. I understand that Ms. Ando is inheriting the problems with DCCA, and that is the reason why I will support her. And I am hopeful that our CPN chair's recognition of her commitment to the Legislature will be followed through because it is with DCCA that our shortage of nursing staff has been exacerbated with the delay in processing their permits. It is with DCCA that our constituents who are having problems with getting their licenses through because now they really want to go to work is meeting one-hour-long delays when calling DCCA. So I'm hopeful that Ms. Ando will follow through with her promises to us, and that's the reason I will support her, but at this time, it's with reservations."

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"It's pretty well known to everybody I did not come to this at all—in fact, I was in strong opposition for a good chunk of the session. I shared many of the concerns that were echoed by my colleague from Puna as well as the chair of CPN, but, you know, he did his due diligence and had numerous hearings on the nominee, asking numerous questions across all the spectrums. However, I think, during that time, she has risen to the challenge and shown us that she can, in the words of the CPN chair, do the job. It was in a meeting with her about an unrelated bill that she brought up the process of the nurse licensing and the inequities that have been basically digitized, for lack of a better word, and her belief that to take an affirmative role and going out and looking at what other states have done and working with other vendors to create a more streamlined and responsive system—I think that, to me, having that outside perspective and that now-new willingness. Also, she's done is, she's surrounding herself with people to advise

her and work with her who have a deep, rich knowledge of the DCCA, and there's a lot of problems, as you've heard earlier, that are going on. We have numerous other problems that DCCA will be the point entity for our constituents, but I am hopeful that she will continue the growth pattern that she's been on, and I share the confidence of the CPN chair in supporting him and the others in the nomination today. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Moriwaki, San Buenaventura). Noes, none.

Senator Keohokalole introduced Director Nadine Ando, who was present in the gallery with Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs deputy director Dean Hazama and supporters and members of the Department.

The Chair stated that the Senate would take up several time-sensitive floor amendments before recessing and having Director Ando escorted to the floor to be greeted by the members.

"SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the public utilities commission special fund the sum of \$150,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to provide free telecommunications access to certain information for persons with a print disability.

The sums appropriated shall be expended by the public utilities commission for the purposes of this Act."

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 933, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting section 3 and renumbering section 4 as section 3.

Senator Keohokalole moved that Floor Amendment No. 14 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kanuha.

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

"Upon review of the final conference committee report, clarifications to the funding mechanism on this bill were necessary, justifying the floor amendment. Thank you."

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 14 was then put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Keohokalole then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 108 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kanuha and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 933, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS ACCESS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH PRINT DISABILITIES," was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 137 (H.B. No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Moriwaki moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 137 be adopted and H.B. No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Lee.

Senator San Buenaventura then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 8) to H.B. No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 3, is amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for implementation of the return-to-home pilot program, including all program costs.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of human services for the purposes of this Act.”

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Floor Amendment No. 8 be adopted, seconded by Senator Moriwaki.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“The floor amendment is made necessary to ensure that the funding clarification issued by our money committees is clarified in the amendment. Thank you.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 8 was then put by the Chair and carried.

Senator San Buenaventura then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 137 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Moriwaki and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138 (H.B. No. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1):

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138 be adopted and H.B. No. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator San Buenaventura then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 9) to H.B. No. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by amending section 3 to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$93,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 to fund the establishment and operation of the neighbor islands blind and visually impaired service pilot program and working group, including the contracting of services to coordinate the convening of the working group and implementation of the pilot program; provided that:

- (1) The department of human services shall include funding for the pilot program in its regular budget request submitted in 2024; and
- (2) Any funds appropriated pursuant to this section shall be in addition to and shall not supplant any portion of the base budget for any state or county agency providing services for blind or visually impaired persons.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of human services for the purposes of this Act.”

Senator San Buenaventura moved that Floor Amendment No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Senator DeCoite.

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Like the previous amendment, this amendment’s being offered to clarify the financial figures that is in H.B. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 1.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 9 was then put by the Chair and carried.

Senator San Buenaventura then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator DeCoite and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 870, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE NEIGHBOR ISLANDS BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED SERVICE PILOT PROGRAM,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 143 (H.B. No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Inouye moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 143 be adopted and H.B. No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Rhoads.

Senator Inouye then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 10) to H.B. No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting Sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new Section 2 to read as follows:

“SECTION 2. Section 205-3.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

“**§205-3.1 Amendments to district boundaries.** (a) District boundary amendments involving lands in the conservation district, land areas greater than fifteen acres, or lands delineated as important agricultural lands shall be processed by the land use commission pursuant to section 205-4[-], except as otherwise provided in this section.

(b) Any department or agency of the State, and department or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any person with a property interest in the land sought to be reclassified may petition the appropriate county land use decision-making authority of the county in which the land is situated for a change in the boundary of a district involving lands less than fifteen acres presently in the rural and urban districts and lands less than fifteen acres in the agricultural district that are not designated as important agricultural lands.

(c) District boundary amendments involving land areas of fifteen acres or less, except as provided in subsection (b), shall be determined by the appropriate county land use decision-making authority for the district and shall not require consideration by the land use commission pursuant to section 205-4; provided that ~~such~~ the boundary amendments and approved uses are consistent with this chapter. The appropriate county land use decision-making authority may consolidate proceedings to amend state land use district boundaries pursuant to this subsection, with county proceedings to amend the general plan, development plan, zoning of the affected land, or ~~such~~ other proceedings. Appropriate ordinances and rules to allow consolidation of ~~such~~ proceedings may be developed by the county land use decision-making authority.

(d) An application for a district boundary amendment involving a land area greater than fifteen acres but not greater than one hundred acres, except for lands that are designated as important agricultural lands or lands where the soil is classified

by the land study bureau's detailed land classification as overall (master) productivity class A or B, shall be determined by the appropriate county land use decision-making authority for the district and shall not require consideration by the land use commission if, by the date of the application, the county has adopted an ordinance that:

- (1) Establishes a procedure for determining the district boundary amendments;
- (2) Requires the county to own and retain ownership of the land area for at least ninety-nine years;
- (3) Requires that one hundred per cent of the land area be used for affordable housing as defined by county ordinance;
- (4) Requires that at least seventy-five per cent of the housing units on the land be set aside for persons and families with incomes at or below one hundred per cent of the area median income;
- (5) Requires the district boundary amendment and approved uses to be consistent with the applicable county general plan or community development plan;
- (6) Requires the county to complete and incorporate mitigation of the impact on county and state resources, including schools and highways; provided that mitigation efforts under this paragraph shall be approved by the appropriate state department;
- (7) Incorporates due process into the procedure for determining district boundary amendments pursuant to paragraph (1) in accordance with all state laws and the public trust doctrine; and
- (8) Requires the appropriate county land use decision-making authority to issue a finding that it has considered all impacts of the proposed amendment that the land use commission would have considered under a petition submitted to the land use commission pursuant to this chapter for a district boundary amendment involving the same or similar land use classifications and land area.

~~(4)~~ (e) The county land use decision-making authority shall serve a copy of the application for a district boundary amendment to the land use commission and the department of business, economic development, and tourism and shall notify the commission and the department of the time and place of the hearing and the proposed amendments scheduled to be heard at the hearing. A change in the state land use district boundaries pursuant to this subsection shall become effective on the day designated by the county land use decision-making authority in its decision. Within sixty days of the effective date of any decision to amend state land use district boundaries by the county land use decision-making authority, the decision and the description and map of the affected property shall be transmitted to the land use commission and the department of business, economic development, and tourism by the county planning director."

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new Section 3 to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. Section 205-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending its title and subsection (a) to read as follows:

~~"§205-4 Amendments to district boundaries [involving land areas greater than fifteen acres]; proceedings before the land use commission.~~ (a) Any department or agency of the State, any department or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any person with a property interest in the land sought to be reclassified, may petition the land use commission for a change in the boundary of a district. This section applies to all petitions for changes in district boundaries of lands within conservation districts, lands designated or sought to be designated as important agricultural lands, and lands greater than fifteen acres in the agricultural, rural, and

urban districts, except as provided in ~~[section]~~ sections 201H-38[-] and 205-3.1(d). The land use commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to implement section 201H-38."

Senator Inouye moved that Floor Amendment No. 10 be adopted, seconded by Senator Elefante.

Senator Inouye rose to speak in strong support of the amendment as follows:

"H.B. 676 was introduced to incentivize each county to entitle and to invest infrastructure on county-owned lands for the purpose of creating affordable housing.

"During the drafting of the latest conference draft, a provision was added to ensure counties addressed state impacts if they were given the power to bypass the Land Use Commission, in addition to all the other requirements that were already included in the bill, which is for affordable housing. This was added as an additional section and not a subsection. This request to amend the conference draft came from the Land Use Commission. While there might be confusion now with the current language, I believe this amendment makes clear the legislative intent of the conference committee to have the counties take on more accountability, not less. It was never the intent to make the process less transparent, and I believe this amendment makes this clear. This amendment will now ensure that the counties issue a finding that it considered all impacts that the Land Use Commission would have considered under a petition to the Land Use Commission for a district boundary amendment, in addition to the seven other requirements as included in the bill.

"Mr. President, I humbly ask for the support of my colleagues."

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"While I appreciate the work that's being done on the measure, I have not read the floor amendment yet, so I don't feel comfortable in supporting it at this time. I think, however, that the Senate Draft 1 of this measure is something that everybody seemed to agree upon, and I think it's something that should be, perhaps, looked at again. I also think that there's a lot of things that have been put into this measure now, both in conference and in the floor amendment, that the public hasn't had a chance to weigh in on, so at this time, I'm just going to have to regretfully not be able to support it. Thank you."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"May I have the remarks of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as my own?" (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator DeCoite rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

"Likewise, can I have the remarks of the senator from the West side be inserted into the Journal as if it was my own, and I'd like to also add that, you know, we're talking about 100 acres, and while I am in full support of housing and affordable housing, we've had many challenges, as you know, within the past years of encroaching on those ag lands. There's farms that exist, we have housing that come up, and we have tenants or people that continue to make those complaints in a time when we are trying to grow food for food sustainability and to do what we have to do to feed the people of Hawai'i. I think, at this time, there are several challenges here that, not just myself, but many of my constituents have been faced with. For those reasons, I am in opposition."

Senator Fevella rose to speak in opposition to the amendment as follows:

“We’re so fast to criticize on our moving and having affordable homes, and we just want to just go into stuff, to the hundred acres and then going that way. In my community, I wasn’t the leader at the time, but if I was the leader, we would have been a little bit more overlook on how we’re just destroying and taking away a lot of our ag land, and it’s also for affordable housing when there’s a lot of opportunities in a lot of places on Barbers Point and other places in the community that is empty. It stays there stagnant, but then we’re going to go and try to get a hundred acres or so of ag land because we need affordable homes. We should do a little bit more homework in the places that are abandoned, places that don’t even have people living in the homes, and apartment buildings that are abandoned, and let’s go for that first before we start going to our precious ag land.

“Every year that I’ve been here, been saying from the WAM chair, ‘How much ag land do we need to develop so that we can be sustainable?’ In this building, we talk about being sustainable with agriculture and trying to compete with not having overseas products. But where do we put our mouth there? Zero. We talk about it in this building, but every single year, I listen to the WAM chair ask the agriculture people how much land we need to sustain our islands, sustain our community, sustain Hawai’i for ag, and nothing has ever been really going forward. By doing this and not relying on the community and other people to weigh in on this, I think it’s going to be a travesty to our community and to our ag lands. Thank you, Senate President.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 10 was put by the Chair and carried, with Senator Dela Cruz voting “Aye with Reservations” and Senators Awa, DeCoite, Fevella, Kidani, Kim, McKelvey, and Shimabukuro voting “No.”

Senator Inouye then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 143 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Elefante and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRICT BOUNDARY AMENDMENTS,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 145 (H.B. No. 600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Lee moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 145 be adopted and H.B. No. 600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Lee then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 11) to H.B. No. 600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 600, H.D.1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 2, is amended by amending page 6, line 14 to page 7, line 2, to read as follows:

- “(2) Beginning July 1, 2024, ensure distribution of moneys accrued in the safe routes to school special fund, prioritizing continuity of existing programming;
- (3) Beginning July 1, 2024, review project proposals and select priority projects within one mile of any school or place of learning pursuant to sections 286-7.5, 264-142, and 291C-3 to be funded through the safe routes to school program or otherwise be prioritized and implemented by the department;”

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 600, H.D.1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 3, is amended as follows:

1. By amending page 10, lines 6 to 17, to read:

“**“§291C-3 State and county safe routes to school programs; coordinators; grants; reports.** (a) There is established, within the department of transportation, a safe routes to school program that shall, among other things, enhance traffic safety around Hawaii’s schools, enable and encourage children to walk and bicycle to school, and make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative. Beginning July 1, 2024, the program shall be responsible for developing and publishing goals and performance measures in coordination with the safe routes to school advisory committee and providing technical assistance to counties and community organizations in support of projects and programs that advance state and county goals.”

2. By amending page 11, lines 12 to 20, to read:

“(d) The ~~[legislature shall appropriate]~~ department of transportation shall expend funds from the safe routes to school program special fund ~~[to the counties]~~ in coordination with the safe routes to school advisory committee to be used for the implementation of ~~[county]~~ the safe routes to school program plan and projects[-] pursuant to section 291C- (b)(2) and (3). No later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, each county shall submit to the legislature an annual report on the status and progress of its county safe routes to school program, including an accounting of all grants provided through the program and a timeline for future grant awards.”

Senator Lee moved that Floor Amendment No. 11 be adopted, seconded by Senator Inouye.

Senator Lee rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“This floor amendment will make clarifying technical amendments to the measure as well. Department of Transportation did ask for a little bit of flexibility in the transition, so the floor amendment would also provide a delayed effective date for one portion of the measure.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 11 was then put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Lee then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 145 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Inouye and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 600, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148 (H.B. No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Kim moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148 be adopted and H.B. No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Kim then offered the following amendment (Floor Amendment No. 12) to H.B. No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by amending section 3 to read as follows:

“SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the establishment of four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE) administrative, professional, and technical positions to enable the University of Hawaii to fulfill the requirements of this Act.

The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.”

Senator Kim moved that Floor Amendment No. 12 be adopted, seconded by Senator Kidani.

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the amendment as follows:

“Mr. President, this floor amendment is to ensure the proper MOF, or mode of funding, is reflected in the final version of the measure respective to the WAM/FIN release memo. The financial release memo stated B funds to be used, but the use of general funds was what was being reflected.”

The motion to adopt Floor Amendment No. 12 was then put by the Chair and carried.

Senator Kim then moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Kidani and carried.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: “A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPUS SAFETY,” was placed on the calendar for Final Reading on Thursday, May 4, 2023.

"Mr. President, I rise in support of this measure.

"S.B. No. 1437, S.D.1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1 revises the state tax code to allow local so-called 'pass-through entities' such as partnerships, S corporations and limited liability companies (LLCs), which in many instances are not taxed at the entity level, to instead elect to pay state income taxes at the entity and thereby possibly avail themselves and their members of a deduction for state and local taxes (SALT) from taxable federal income.

"The federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 limited the SALT deduction by individuals to \$10,000 per year. Before 2018, the SALT deduction was unlimited. Since then, approximately 30 other states have enacted legislation such as that proposed by this measure to allow pass-through entities to elect to be taxed at the entity level.

"This measure requires eligible entities to make an annual election to file for state-level taxation for each taxable year. The

measure allows for individuals who are members of eligible entities to take a pro-rata non-refundable tax credit for state taxes paid. Although the effective date of the measure is January 1, 2024, the first taxable year for which a pass-through entity may choose to be taxed at the entity level will be 2023.

"This bill will provide a new option and potential federal tax relief to many local businesses, and for that reason I urge my colleagues to extend their support."

A 0.01 percent tax on technology that they have no ability to control, I don’t think rises to the purpose of the Employment Security Law, and, as such, I’m in opposition.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

“I would like the comments of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) And I think if we’re going to modernize IT in different departments, we should be doing it through general appropriations and other ways that will give us the legislative oversight necessary to ensure it’s being done properly. Thank you.”

As we saw during the pandemic, the Department could not handle the extraordinary increase in Unemployment claims due to their antiquated computerized systems used to process Unemployment claims.

"Instead of creating this new Fund to be paid for by employers, I believe that the Legislature needs to be able to scrutinize such expenditures with legislative requests for funding from the Department. We should continue to have oversight for such an important function that the Department failed to meet when it was challenged by the pandemic and could not pay the claims to our constituents when their livelihoods depended on the Department. If this bill passes, the Legislature will give up its oversight responsibilities.

"For these reasons I cannot support this bill."

Senator Inouye rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"May I have the comments from the senator from Puna be introduced into the Journal as if my own? It's just not the right time as well to raise taxes. Thank you." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

"As you know, we came through the pandemic with a very old legacy system. The federal government does provide grants to the states for technology for nonpersonal services, but that money, all of it, that we collect from employers for their employees, goes to pay for employees when they are unemployed. There is very little that is for the infrastructure that we need to stand up our technology systems so we can help claimants who came through the pandemic and could not get their claims processed because of an old system. We also helped with the technology the employers who have to quarterly report the wages and the benefits that are charged to their employees. Without the state support of this kind of program, we are going to always be behind and not serving our people, so I ask my colleagues to join me in voting for this measure. Thank you."

"Yeah, I think that the reasons have been echoed, and I agree with my colleague from Puna. Thank you."

MOTION TO OVERRIDE VETO

S.B. No. 921:

In accordance with Article III, Section 17 of the Hawai‘i State Constitution, Senator Kanuha moved that the Senate override the veto of S.B. No. 921, as contained in Gov. Msg. No. 1128, seconded by Senator Wakai.

The Chair clarified the voting procedures.

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

“The veto hurts a very narrow group of condominium purchasers, but it can hurt them pretty badly because it transfers liability for construction mistakes to them, and they may end up having to pay large special assessments. Any cost savings to the developer is because the developers have transferred liability for defective construction to the purchasers—the very people the developers are saying that they’re trying to help—so I hope everyone will vote for the override. Mahalo.”

Senator Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

“To echo the sentiments of the Judiciary chair, these are, again, very narrow circumstances in which case the result is really, really unjust in terms of outcome. These are situations where, six, seven, eight years later, there is an obvious construction defect that was caused by the developer, and the developer in these situations is able to avoid responsibility for it, in which case all of the residents of these condominiums are going to be required to foot the bill and provide some accountability where it’s not due, and it only takes place in these situations where these unfortunate individuals fall into this category. So, for those reasons, I agree and ask you to support overriding the veto. Thank you.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

“I would like the words of the previous speakers entered into the Journal as if they were my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) After the veto was issued, I got contacts and communications, as my friend from the Big Island says, from several condo owners who are now stuck with huge construction defects: unshielded coaxial cables, cracks in swimming pools, foundation work, parking lots that don’t drain properly—expenses and costs that are going to absolutely crush them and eliminate their reserves. Now, on top of that, you have the increase of insurance rates upon all the condominium owners, including them, which only makes a bad situation worse. I’m proud of the work that we do for consumer protection—this measure is a consumer protection issue; it’s a justice issue and a responsibility issue. So, with that, I stand in support of the override. Thank you.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in strong support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

“I’d like to echo Judiciary chair’s and CPN chair’s remarks, but I’d also like to add that the narrow group of individuals, the reason why we need to override the veto, is because the statute of repose—which is the statute of repose versus the statute of limitations—is because the developers had retained majority control on the board, so even when the condo owners know that there is a defect during the six to seven years, because the developer remained in the board, they were able to prevent the kind of actions against themselves, and that’s the reason that this bill is necessary, and it is a justice measure. Thank you very much.”

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

"I, too, would like to echo the CPN and the Judiciary chairs' remarks as my own. (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.) We have seen situations in which new owners, not knowing the defects, have learned of it later and have not been able to do anything about it, so we really would like to support our condo owners. Thank you."

Senator Kidani rose to speak in strong support of the motion to override the veto as follows:

"I'd like to have the remarks of the CPN chair and Jud chair entered into the Journal as if they were my own." (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

The Chair then called for a Roll Call vote.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the veto of S.B. No. 921, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIMITATIONS OF ACTIONS," was overridden by not less than two-thirds vote of all members to which the Senate is entitled, on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Kim).

At this time, Senator Gabbard rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, colleagues, I just want to say mahalo for passing the five hemp bills today. You're helping a blossoming local industry that's experienced some struggles in the past few years. You may not recall, but it was December 14, 1999, when Governor Cayetano proclaimed that day as Hawai'i Hemp Day, and then the government fell asleep for 15 years as it tends to do sometimes. So, in 2014, at the request of a dear friend of mine, John Rogers, who recently passed away from cancer, I was honored to introduce S.B. 2175, which became Act 56, setting up a two-year UH industrial hemp research program, and then more hemp-friendly bills passed in the ensuing years. So my hope then and now is to have Hawai'i nei become the hemp capital of the world based on our one-of-a-kind Hawai'i branding and 365-day-a-year growing season. And while we've yet to reach that goal, today increases my optimism that we will get there. So again, mahalo nui loa, and, by the way, I proclaim you all to be official hempsters, and hemp hemp hooray. Mahalo."

The Chair responded with a "hemp hemp hooray" for Senator Gabbard.

The Chair then addressed Senator Wakai, stating that he had been informed that all floor amendments had been registered by 10:30 a.m. that morning, and so the Senate would reconvene at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, given the number of floor amendments and fiscal bills the members would need to consider.

Senator Dela Cruz moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 190 be adopted and H.B. No. 300, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Keith-Agaran.

Senator Dela Cruz rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“Over the last four months, the Senate Ways and Means committee worked diligently with Senate leadership and Senate members, the governor and executive branch leaders, constituents, stakeholders, and House Finance to deliver a state budget bill that answers the call to address a myriad of persistent and challenging issues for the state.

“With projected state revenues of \$10.35 billion in fiscal year '24 and \$2.2 billion in carryover from fiscal year '23, and projected state revenues of \$10.73 billion in fiscal year '25 and \$500 million in carryover from fiscal year '24, the conference draft of House Bill 300 appropriates in general funds for fiscal year '24 \$11.3 billion, for fiscal year '25, \$10.4 billion; and in all means of financing, fiscal year '24 is \$19.6 billion, and fiscal year '25, \$18.7 billion.

“There were key Senate priorities that did not make it out of conference, such as broader tax relief to help the middle class; cost-of-living increases for the nonprofit sector providing critical programs and services for the Departments of Health and Human Services; the Department of Agriculture’s Da Bux program; cesspool conversion resources to assist hundreds of DHHL homesteaders, residents in most of our rural areas, and protection of our islands’ water resources; various K–12 education initiatives; the Banyan Drive Master Plan; and, lastly, significant funding increases for senior housing and middle-income family rental supplement payments.

“These vital programs, services, and resources remained important Senate priorities, and they reinforce our resolve and commitment to the work ahead.

“I encourage you to compare the Senate draft and the conference draft to see the various Senate adds and funding measures we were unable to get House agreement on, resulting in the \$500 million carryover left on the table.

“There were, however, many points of agreement in the C.D. prioritized for the biennium to serve our great state. They include but are not limited to:

- Homeless and housing programs and services;
- Additional funds to be deposited into the rainy day fund;
- Early childhood classrooms and the expansion of the Preschool Open Doors Program for three-year-olds;
- Critical state infrastructure repairs and maintenance and replacements;
- Climate change mitigation and abatement programs;
- Health and wellness programs and services across the state;
- Promotion and perpetuation of arts and culture, including funding for ‘Iolani Palace and Bishop Museum;
- Pay differentials and loan forgiveness for hard-to-recruit-and -retain state positions and in-demand industries such as education and healthcare workers;
- IT system modernizations for numerous state departments to replace outdated systems and aging equipment and infrastructure;
- Increased agriculture biosecurity and funding for agricultural development;
- The state match for broadband implementation;
- Additional funds for increased electricity and security costs for various state departments;
- Funding for K–12 career technical education, distance learning, special education, after-school care, summer learning, digital literacy, mental and behavioral health supports;
- Land conservation, acquisition, watershed, and ecosystems protection and restoration;
- Funding for KIRC and the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority;
- Positions, funds, and safety equipment for the newly established Department of Law Enforcement;
- Funding to support new housing units for various community correctional centers across the state, 24-hour health care at correctional facilities on the neighbor islands and O‘ahu, and expansion of the community work furlough program from O‘ahu to statewide;
- Also including routine maintenance and repairs for the Department of Transportation airports, harbors, and highways, and traffic control on O‘ahu;
- And the restoration of University of Hawai‘i funds reduced during the COVID, UH Mānoa and Hilo athletics, Promise Program funding for community colleges, and non-credit workforce development and early college programs.

“In conclusion, I’d like to thank the House Finance chair, Kyle Yamashita, and Vice Chair Lisa Kitagawa and, from the Senate, yourself, Mr. President, and the vice chair of Ways and Means and his team for putting together the CIP budget. I’d also like to thank the subject-matter chairs and the members of Ways and Means and the Finance committees. And, lastly, thank you to the Ways and Means budget staff for their commitment, diligence, and extended hours they put in to help shape the conference draft: committee clerk Chung Chang; budget chief Stacy Ferreira; budget analysts Colin, Parker, Shirley, and Alex; advisors Kathy and Ford; legislative assistants David and Makoia; and our office manager, Dot. Also assisting our budget team from the bills section is bills chief Duncan Osorio;

researchers Cody, Malcolm, and Nathaniel; and legislative aides Mary and Carey. Thank you.”

Senator Keith-Agaran rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I echo the words of the Ways and Means chair. What’s reflected in the budget is the priorities of this body but also, I think, for the communities that we represent. I’d like to thank the Ways and Means chair for all the coordination that he provided to make sure that we could find the funding for your priorities and the priorities that you identified from your communities. I also would like to express my thanks to my counterpart in the House, Representative Scott Nishimoto, who did a yeoman’s job in his first year as their CIP negotiator. I think that we come out with a product I believe that all of us can bring back to our communities to tell them that we were listening to what they said they needed. Finally, I would like to thank the Ways and Means staff for all the help that they provided to us, and especially to my own staff, especially Robert Nishimoto, who was our CIP specialist, and Danielle Evangelista, who, in the negotiations, worked with us in working not just on the CIP itself but also on the grants-in-aid, making sure that we reviewed all the grant-in-aid applications very carefully. I know that on the CIP side, there were at least 117 applications asking for approximately \$124 million when we had about \$20 million to distribute. With that, Mr. President, I also would have some written remarks I would like to enter into the Journal.”

The Chair having so ordered, Senator Keith-Agaran’s additional remarks read as follows:

“Thank you Mr. President. I want to highlight a number of key provisions in H.B. 300, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1 which will have long term implications for our communities. If budgets reflect what we value as a legislature and as a community, this State Budget is easily a banner year for public health care in terms of public works projects. Along with needed improvements for Hilo Medical Center (\$50M) and Kona Community Hospital (\$18.547M), and Kauai Veterans Memorial (\$3M), Wilcox Medical Center and Samuel Mahelona Memorial (\$20.2M) on Kauai, and Kahuku Medical Center (\$6M), this budget also includes \$39.7M for Maui Health Systems for capital improvement projects over the two years and a \$22M operating subsidy. These investments will have long-term consequences for better health care outcomes, especially in our rural communities and neighbor islands. The State Budget also allocates \$30M in FY24 and FY25 towards increased reimbursements for medical service providers for Medicaid patients, a number of bills sent to the Governor for his consideration will complement the budget provisions I’ve mentioned today.

“Housing for local working families is also supported strongly in this budget. We add financial support for our public housing agencies, and invest \$280million to the rental housing trust fund and providing \$50million into the dwelling unit revolving fund.

“I also would commend the Ways and Means chair for including approximately \$100million for infrastructure along the Honolulu rail line and to support other government lands in the Kalaheo, Kapolei and West Oahu region which, if implemented by the State agencies hold those lands or managing those properties, can accelerate the development of those parcels for additional housing and expanded business opportunities. I hope that all agencies provided general fund appropriations for these strategic interment projects will do their best to meet the challenge in implementing them or encumbering the funds before the lapsing dates on these financial resources.

“I urge my colleagues to support this State Budget.”

Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’d just like to point out that although key Senate bills—behavioral health bills—did not pass, it did make it into the budget. For that, I thank the Ways and Means committee and the Ways and Means chair. And I just want to point out, over \$73 million specifically for crisis intervention, behavioral health services was in the budget, and we intend to hold Department of Health accountable for their use. Thank you.”

Senator Fevella rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“I’ve been here only about five years, and every year I’ve been here, I’m very impressed with the WAM chair and vice chair, Senator Dela Cruz and Senator Keith-Agaran—their leadership and how they balance and move the budget with CIPs and grants, and especially trying to balance the budget when we’re having a WAM hearing is always difficult, and everybody always think they’re on the hot seat. But one thing that I know about the WAM chair since I’ve been here: He’s always been consistent, and every question that he asks, the passion that he asks it, and he teaches us, and we get to learn how to go with the process. Sometimes it’s not easy with the directors and the different divisions that come before us, but at the end of the day, he just wants the best for our communities and our state of Hawai‘i. I want to thank you, Senate President Kouchi, and Senate Vice President Michelle Kidani for your guys’ leadership and always encouraging us to do the best we can in this building. But again, my hat goes off to WAM chair and vice chair and their staff because what they do—I mean, I don’t know how they do it every year. This year was the most difficult year that I have been a part of the process and a process that was not very easy, but it was accomplished, and I just thank them very much on the sleepless nights and the overnights that they had to be here to do good for all of us in this chamber and in the state of Hawai‘i. Thank you. Thank you, Senate President.”

The Chair stated:

“I’d briefly say, with the exchange of text messages, the WAM staff was here till 1:40 Saturday morning, working through the midnight deadline on Friday to get the budget details put together, and returned by 9:00 a.m. to hand-deliver it to House Finance, so to the WAM chair, vice chair, and the staff who put in incredible hours and produced a really fantastic document, I want to extend my personal thanks as well.”

Senator Moriwaki rose to speak in strong support of the nominee as follows:

“Your Committee on Labor and Technology reviewed Brenna Hashimoto’s background and her past and current performance, and find that she’s eminently qualified to lead the Department of Human Resources Development and the state government in meeting our human resources challenges.

“Ms. Hashimoto served over 30 years in state government, specializing in nearly every aspect of human resources: 11 years in the Department of Health, 13 years at the University of Hawai‘i, and, more recently, 7 years in the Human Services Department, managing recruitment, classification, employee benefits, training, records management, labor relations, and civil rights compliance. She also served in the employer’s bargaining unit 9 and 10 negotiating teams and chaired the state’s Human Resources Council.

“Since her appointment in December, Brenna has provided a vision for the Department: modernization, efficiencies, and accountability. Knowing that filling the state’s over-4,000 vacancies is the biggest challenge, she has already begun working with her managers on modernization initiatives. She is creating teams to assist departments in filling the most-needed vacant positions. She also began training managers and employees on the new telework policy that we want to emphasize for our employees as incentives. And she already began working on conducting a job fair, which we already saw, to encourage recruitment and has engage department human resource officers of each of the departments to regularly meet to share information and plans.

“Appearing before our committee, she demonstrated her grasp of personnel laws and policies as she provided accurate and detailed responses to our questions. Those who work directly with Brenna spoke of her extensive knowledge and distinguished track record of providing creative and practical solutions to human resources issues. Others spoke of her proactive leadership and interpersonal skills. The department senior management team said this: ‘From the moment she started on December 5, Brenna’s transition was seamless thanks to her familiarity with many of the department’s programs and functions. Many of us have also worked with Brenna over the years, and we know she is dedicated, hard-working, and

responsive, and her approach to human resources matters is inspired by her creativity and innovation.’

“I believe Brenna Hashimoto is the best person to lead the state in recruiting and retaining the best and brightest employees to serve Hawai‘i. I urge my colleagues to advise and consent to Brenna Hashimoto as the director of the Department of Human Resources Development.”

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Rhoads rose to speak in support of the appointee as follows:

“The appointment of Kimberly Guidry provides the Senate with a unique opportunity. First, we have the option to confirm to the Intermediate Court of Appeals an appellate specialist with 20 years of state court experience working for the state’s largest law firm, the Department of the Attorney General. Second, her confirmation will fulfill the goal of the Legislature in passing Act 90 last session to expand the Intermediate Court of Appeals to a total of seven judges comprised of six associate judges and one chief judge.

“Ms. Guidry is a proud product of Hawai‘i’s public education system, having graduated from Kalani High School with honors, the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa undergraduate history program with highest honors, and the William S. Richardson School of Law. She has been licensed to practice law in the state since 2002 and has worked exclusively at the Department of the Attorney General.

“Ms. Guidry currently serves as solicitor general and supervising deputy attorney of the Appellate Division, where she oversees most state and federal appeals and appears and argues in civil and criminal cases before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, the Hawai‘i Supreme Court, and the Hawai‘i Intermediate Court of Appeals. Her work at the Department has been recognized individually and as a member of a team, including the 2021 Attorney General’s Team of the Year Award and the 2015 Department of the Attorney General Employee of the Year Award.

“Ms. Guidry also serves on the Department of the Attorney General’s Appeal and Opinions Review Committee and the Judiciary’s Hawai‘i Rules of Appellate Procedures Standing Committee, and is a bar examiner for the Hawai‘i State Board of Bar Examiners.

“After having reviewed the testimony, which was overwhelmingly in support of her confirmation, and other materials submitted to the Committee and having examined the appointee in a hearing, your Judiciary committee finds that Kimberly Tsumoto Guidry is qualified to serve as an associate judge on the Intermediate Court of Appeals, and recommends that the Senate consent to the appointment. Mahalo.”

The Chair stated:

“Senator Rhoads, I have a quick question for you if you’d remain standing. I know from everything you read, she was selected, and your recommendation is solely based on her qualifications, but if you could enlighten the gallery, she is, gender-wise, significant in her confirmation today as well.”

Senator Rhoads stated:

“Thank you, Mr. President. I was going to bring that up later, but I’m happy to do it now. I would like to share the following update about the composition of our state court: I announced after the recent confirmation of Maui Circuit Court Judge Michelle Drewyer that the overall composition of our state court judges and justices was equally split between males and females and that the confirmation of Ms. Guidry to the ICA would reach a milestone with a greater number of female judges and justices in Hawai‘i’s courts. I’m sorry, Ms. Guidry; it slipped my mind that Justice Nakayama was about to retire, so with Judge Guidry’s confirmation today, we are back to a 50–50 split, but this does keep Hawai‘i as one of the leaders in judicial gender equality in the United States and, really, all around the world. Mahalo.”

The Chair thanked Senator Rhoads, then acknowledged that he had been right: It would have been nice to confirm Ms. Guidry first.

Senator Fevella rose to speak in strong support of the measure as follows:

“Pu‘uloa Gun Range has been in my community for over a hundred years. During the live fire training hundred years ago, ‘Ewa Beach was a plantation area and not as densely populated community like it is now. I have received numerous and numerous complaints of noise pollution and the risk of being hit accidentally, strays of bullets. The environment study shows that lead contamination more than 70 times the legal limit. Although I support the training of military to protect us, but I cannot support when it jeopardizes the quality of life and harming my community that they cannot rest and they cannot have peace of mind and not worrying about getting hurt. There are other locations sustainable in this state for training, such as

Kāne‘ohe Marine Base. Pu‘uloa Range has outlived its place in its growing community like ‘Ewa Beach. I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this resolution to urge the relocation of the live fire and aviation away from my community. Mahalo, and God bless.”

Senator McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

“In the spirit of bipartisan and cross-island support, I’d like to stand in support of the reso and adopt the words of the previous speaker as if they were my own. Thank you.” (The Chair so ordered, by reference only.)

There is a great need for more LPNs in the state—the 2022 Healthcare Workforce report noted a statewide demand for 211 additional LPNs. Unfortunately, there were not enough opportunities to educate and train for this particular type of clinicians. The Health Care Association of Hawaii (HAH), partnering with Ohana Pacific Health/Hale Makua and UH Maui College, created an innovative, first of its kind CNA to LPN Glidepath pilot program. This program enabled an ‘earn and learn’ glidepath model that delivers online didactic curriculum and hands-on clinical education at a student’s place of work. The program is one year long, and CNAs can double their salary if they successfully complete the program.

“This pilot program was launched in January 2023, and serves students through UH Maui College on Maui, Oahu, and Kauai who are employed by Ohana Pacific Health and Kaiser Permanente. There was a huge demand for participation in the program, which ultimately included 40 students. This funding will enable the program to continue and, hopefully, expand to all islands and include more students to meet the demonstrated interest in this expanded opportunity. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this measure.”

“Senator Mike Gabbard’s Journal Remarks on HB1359 HD2 SD2 CD1

“(Relating to Hemp) – June 12, 2023

“I’m hempy to report that 5 of the 13 bills we introduced to propel our hemp industry in Hawai’i forward made it to the Senate chamber floor. (SB516, SB655, SB637, SB973, HB1359.) Hemp, Hemp Hooray.

“Colleagues, in 2016 the hemp industry was worth \$400M, with projections to grow to \$1.5B by 2020. Talk about an opportunity to boost our economy! (via growing and selling hemp products with the Hawaiian branding.) Check out my hemp aloha shirt...just one of over 50K uses for this amazing plant.

“I’ve talked about the Hawai’i hemp history numerous times over the years, so I won’t belabor the point. But it was Dec.14, 1999 when Governor Cayetano proclaimed it Industrial Hemp Day in Hawai’i, since we were the first state to plant hemp since WWII. Then, government fell asleep, as it tends to do sometimes. Fifteen years later, in 2014, I introduced a hemp bill that passed into law. Additional bills were passed in the years following and I was thinking we’re on our way!

“Then the pandemic hit, causing a complete standstill in 2020... with many unhemp hemp farmers....

“Enter 2023 and wow! Things started moving again. While five bills actually made it to the Senate floor for final reading; unfortunately, I just got word that they were recommitted by the House at the last minute....

“However, fortunately, one survived: HB1359.

“HB1359 implements a much-needed hemp task force under the purview of DOA, to assess the viability of hemp farming and production statewide. It also reduces buffer zones (the area that limits where hemp can be grown) from 500 to 300 feet for playgrounds, daycares and schools, and 100 feet for residential areas. This allows for more farmland for growing, increases harvest size, and improves the livelihood of hemp farmers, (and theirs’ is no easy job!)

“HB1359 also repeals duplicate regulations, requires transparency in labeling, provides funds for the Department of Agriculture to hire a hemp consultant; moneys for the Department of Health to hire or consult a toxicologist; and extends the State’s hemp processor law through 7/1/2027. This

is a comprehensive bill that would be good to pass. Mahalo to all who helped provide input. Please join me in voting 'yes' on this important bill. Mahalo.”

Senator DeCoite rose to request that remarks in support of the measure with reservations be entered into the Journal, and the Chair so ordered.

“I am voting with reservations on this bill because we needed more time to review the many changes that were made to the bill however, I recognized the importance this bill had to the hemp industry. I also look forward to the work that will be done by the Hemp Task Force that will be established with the passage of this bill. It will gather information to help us to better understand the needs of the hemp industry. Hemp regulation is a work in progress and one that we will continue to address in the next legislative session.”

"Many who have been concerned about recruitment of quality physicians into our State have been active supporters of the Compact, including local hospitals and doctors, health plans and management organizations, and our local medical board. They support the Compact as it will increase access to quality health care – particularly for patients in underserved or rural areas. The Compact will increase the ability for physicians to practice across participating jurisdictions, but also ensure that our local medical Board is still able to meet its legal responsibility to issue licenses to qualified, safe, and competent physicians only.

"I urge my colleagues to support his measure."

"I rise in strong support for SB865, which establishes a ninety-nine year leasehold program to make low-cost leasehold condominium units available for Hawaii residents.

"Hawaii's severe housing shortage is our most urgent public policy priority. Because the market has been undersupplied for decades, housing prices are out of reach for all but the very wealthy. As a result, we have now experienced seven straight years of population decline. There are more Hawaii-born college graduates residing outside Hawaii than in Hawaii, and more Native Hawaiians living outside Hawaii than in Hawaii. My father, an immigrant from China who came to the U.S. with nothing, was able to buy a house with one state salary as a UH professor in 1983. Today, for me to buy that same house would take over 40 years of my entire salary.

"I have been fighting for this bill since 2018 because I believe that one job should be enough. Every Hawaii resident should be able to buy a home, raise a family, and retire comfortably, all with one job. That's the social compact that generations of local people have had, and which young people today deserve.

"The housing model in this bill is based on Singapore's successful housing system and is often referred to as social housing. Two features of this model are revolutionary for government-built housing in this country: income blindness and revenue neutrality. Income blindness means people across the socioeconomic spectrum will live side by side, instead of in concentrated poverty. With revenue neutrality, the program need not be heavily subsidized by taxpayers, ensuring that it is scalable regardless of the state's ability or willingness to pay for more. This is housing for all, like public school for housing: a low cost, mass option that will enable most people to achieve home ownership, the American dream. It's essentially the method that Singapore and Vienna use to house 82 and 60 percent of their populations, respectively, in attractive, desirable, well maintained public housing.

"This bill will create a pilot project on one site in urban Honolulu to test the viability of this model. If it is successful, as I believe it will be, that will create the momentum for many more projects on state lands along the rail line, eventually creating the critical mass of inexpensive housing that will house our state's future population growth.

"I am truly grateful for the many people who have contributed to this bill's passage. In particular, I want to thank my counterpart in the House, the House Housing Chair, for his hard work in shepherding this measure through his chamber, the Ways and Means Chair for delivering the funding in this bill, and you, Mr. President, for reviving this measure from the dead on no less than three separate occasions this session alone.

"Mr. President, I believe we will look back to today as a historic day. It is the day that the State finally took action to ensure that every single one of our residents has the opportunity to thrive and prosper in this unique place we call home."

Offered by: Senator Kanuha.

On motion by Senator Wakai, seconded by Senator DeCoite, S.R. No. 223 was adopted.

At this time, Senator San Buenaventura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Last year, I spoke about how well we did in passing laws to protect our children, and I just want our colleagues to realize how much we have done to end this session with. I mean, we have realized, and despite the veto of the governor, we have passed a Mālama ‘Ohana working group, we increased the pay differential of our social workers, we fulfilled our promises of last session to protect our children, and we continue to do more. In the health committee, we passed landmark Senate bills: S.B. 1, reproductive rights; S.B. 975, taxation of vape products (hopefully we can end the kind of vaping that our children are being exposed to); and even the last-minute S.B. 674, physician interstate compact (because, believe me, Queen’s, Kaiser, the military—all of these people who are having trouble filling physician vacancies in states have told me that this innocuous bill is a game changer). And I want to thank our money committees for putting over \$100 million in our behavioral health.

“But I want my colleagues to understand that we have a lot more to do because yesterday was the fifth anniversary of the beginning of the 2018 lava flow disaster that did not officially end until seven months later. Over 700 homes were destroyed, but in reality, over 1,839 structures were severely damaged, including the Jaggar Museum at the precipice of the Kilauea Caldera. I remember how hopeless and helpless I felt when my community looked to me for answers that I did not have. How was I supposed to stop the turtles from being boiled alive? There were many of them. We didn’t understand that. And how the passage of the-then landmark ‘ohana zones bill that we had previously passed at Sine Die in 2018 was going to be the lifeline I was hoping for, but the governor held it up. And Pohoiki, which is still not available, is still not available to our fishing industry. Thankfully, the ‘ohana zones bill is being realized to its potential.

“The lessons learned was that if we give the tools to the community, the community will pull together. Grants from the Hawai‘i Community Foundation, United Way, and others helped build the first kauhale, really—the first tiny homes—out of necessity because the ‘ohana zones bill was not signed by the governor. That is why the GIAs and the fundings we received to our nonprofits cannot be overlooked because, at times of disaster when there is no session, they come through for us. When the community did not get answers fast enough from officials, the community held Internet sessions abuzz with the Hawaii Tracker. They told us where it was dangerous; they told

us where the evacuations were. And it is this kind of community getting together—the nonprofits, the volunteers—that provided temporary shelter, food, and guidance that I am so most grateful for. And to all those who donated and helped in 2018: You are not forgotten. Mahalo.”

Senator Inouye rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“I’d like to share with you and congratulate Waiākea High School students Taylor Aburamen, Paul Brillhante, Madison Manguso, Gavin Nishida, Jaelee Picar-Cabal, Maya Polloi, and Alexander Tuson and their AP environmental sciences teacher, Whitney Aragaki. They were selected from a pool of 300 state finalists as the Hawai‘i state winners of the 2023 Samsung Solve for Tomorrow STEM competition. As the Hawai‘i state winner, Waiākea High School was awarded a prize package worth \$12,000 in Samsung technology and supplies. Understanding that coral bleaching of the reefs surrounding the Hawaiian islands is caused, in part, by sunscreen, this team of students is developing an environmentally friendly sunscreen that can be produced locally with natural ingredients that will also reduce pollution. At least the Senate congratulates Waiākea High School for their accomplishments and their success in using STEM education to improve the future of our Hawai‘i communities. Mahalo.”

Senator Awa rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“The rivalry between Kahuku Red Raiders and Farrington Governors has been going on forever, so I wasn’t surprised this session when myself and the senator from Kalihi got into a disagreement over one of the bills. We’re never going to agree about chickens, but one thing we do agree on . . . Real quick, if you can bear with me, for the biggest fan in the State Senate, Iam Tongi is in the top eight, and he shot this message [*holds up tablet playing a video in which Iam Tongi says, ‘Aloha, this Iam Tongi. I want to dedicate this song to Donna Kim in the Hawai‘i Senate.’*]. I’ll let it run for a minute [*continues to display tablet with video of Iam Tongi performing the song ‘Waimanalo Blues’*]. So he shot that for us, and then today I got a call from *American Idol*’s producers. If he makes it to the top three (we’ll know on Sunday, the 14th)—if he makes it top three, and all you guys should vote, they’re going to fly back over here, we’re going to hold a concert on the 16th and a parade in Kahuku. Trying to find a venue; I’ll let you guys all know the details—we’ll send it out. But we really hope he gets to the top three because he’s been representing, as you know, Senator Kim, not just Kahuku, but the state of Hawai‘i. Aloha.”

The Chair noted that, with Senator McKelvey’s and now Senator Awa’s remarks, bipartisanship was springing up all over the place that day.

Senator Kidani rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“Colleagues, today it is my pleasure to recognize an outstanding individual who has dedicated many years serving our Senate, his community, and the people of Hawai‘i: Jacob Aki.

“Jacob has been an exceptional leader and contributor to the Hawai‘i State Senate. He has been committed to uplifting our culture, his community, and his commitment is evident in his educational background and professional career. He is a graduate of Kamehameha Schools and holds a BA in Hawaiian studies from the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa. He also received an MA in political management from George Washington University, where he honed his leadership skills.

“Jacob joined our Hawai‘i State Legislature as a legislative staffer in 2016 and has been an integral part of the Senate ever

since. He has served as the Communications director for the Hawai'i State Senate, demonstrating tremendous leadership and communication prowess, particularly throughout the challenges of the pandemic. Under his direction, the Communications team established impactful digital media efforts to elevate the public platforms of the Hawai'i State Senate as well as our senators. Jacob has been a key figure in communicating legislative initiatives and policy issues, and his work has been vital to the success of the Senate.

"In addition to his work at the Legislature, Jacob has also been an active leader in the Native Hawaiian community, holding various positions in organizations and on boards dedicated to perpetuating Hawaiian culture and supporting the Hawaiian community. He is a former member of the Kalihi-Pālana Neighborhood Board and former director of the Kamehameha Schools Alumni Association for the O'ahu region. Jacob is a board member of 'Ahahui 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, a member of Pā Ku'i a Lua, and a member of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs and Hale O Nā Ali'i O Hawai'i. He also serves as president of Ke One o Kākuhihewa—the O'ahu Council (Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs) and holds the position of ikū ha'i (president) for Hālau 'O Wahīka'ahu'ula, a benevolent royal society founded by King David Kalākaua.

"On behalf of the Senate, I extend my sincere mahalo to Jacob Aki for his profound commitment to community, his exemplary contributions to the Hawai'i State Senate, and his dedication to perpetuating Hawaiian culture and supporting the Hawaiian community. We are proud to honor and recognize Jacob for his outstanding leadership and contributions to our great state, and we wish him great success in his future endeavors. Mahalo."

Senator Kidani then presented a lei and certificate to Senate Communications Director Jacob Aki.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"It was a year ago that I stood here and said, for the first time ever, we were able to accomplish everything I talked about on Opening Day and then some. This year, I indicated that we would be welcoming six new members to our chamber, we would be losing 90 years of legislative experience through retirements, we would be working with a new governor and 18 new members of the House and many new chairs, and that finding our way through these relationships would provide its own challenges, like any new relationship that you undertake. With the governor, we took our advise and consent role seriously, and when we found nominees that we thought could not stand up to the standard we set, we indicated that by voting 'no,' and there were three of those instances. But everyone was given more than one opportunity to appear before the respective committees and to show that they would eventually have the ability to succeed. Several who had tough starts were able to utilize the opportunity to get better, work on their communication and their relationship with the committee chairs, and ultimately won confirmation to the jobs that they now are fulfilling. And so, to the members: I commend you for taking the job seriously, not worrying about what public opinion or the press was saying about what was happening but continue to go about doing your job.

"As we've gone through conference, there are certain bills that I wish maybe had passed, but with the new people on both sides, we could not come to an agreement. And, you know, I look at it as a first step in building a better relationship, having a better understanding so that we can come back and be more successful next year.

"But when I look at what we passed, wow. Senator San Buenaventura has mentioned S.B. 1. There was much made

during the interim that the *Obrero* decision was going to result in a crime wave upon our community. Fortunately, that did not happen, but we also said we'd come back and put a fix to it right away, which, with the leadership of Senator Rhoads, we did. And with the surplus we had, Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Keith-Agaran, the members of Ways and Means, and the staff did a tremendous job. And people somehow wanted to create division because I guess that sells more media, but when you look at the budget crafted by the Ways and Means chair and the committee that the Senate unanimously approved today, there are so many elements of what the governor talked about in his State of the State that we truly came together to work on the best product for the people of Hawai'i, and we weren't here arguing about personalities, and we weren't getting offended if something didn't work our way earlier. Instead, we found where do we agree, how do we go forward. A key area, and the Speaker and I had been clear from the beginning, is that we were not very excited about overhauling the tax system, which may have required those that we wanted to help to keep detailed records to file to get the money back, but we were looking for mechanisms that would be simpler and that would ensure that the ALICE community that we are trying to help would get the money into their pockets. With what Senator Dela Cruz and the Ways and Means staff have put together, we have met that challenge. The lieutenant governor at the beginning said she was tackling universal pre-K. There has been tremendous progress made in that area, including the exciting announcement of the scholarships to try and make sure that we have the employees to staff the classrooms and the seats that we are building. Tremendous investment in homelessness—Senator San Buenaventura, again, talked about the mental health services, affordable housing, and everything else.

"And I'm the person standing between you and lunch, so, in conclusion, the one thing I didn't talk about on Opening Day that I have talked about in the past was looking forward to the opportunity to be a grandfather. And so I am so thrilled to be before you today to let you know that, within the past week, I am now able to stand before you as Papa Kouchi. We have a new grandson in our family, and when I hit the gavel, I'm excited to return back to Kaua'i and spend some time with my grandson."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 300, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purpose of this bill, the General Appropriations Act of 2023, is to adjust and request appropriations for the fiscal

biennium 2023-2025 to fund the operations and capital improvement projects of Executive Branch agencies and programs.

While the bill as a whole has merit, the use of general fund moneys must be reprioritized due to: (a) the change in the Council on Revenues' general fund tax revenue projection in May 2023 that necessitates that the State's financial plan be rebalanced through line-item vetoes and reductions to the budget; and (b) the need to maintain healthy financial reserves so that the State can meet its reserve policy requirements. Because of this, the following general fund appropriations were subject to: (a) an assessment of items that require additional planning, public input, and clarity on the use of moneys; and (b) an evaluation of each expending agency's ability and capacity to spend down the moneys efficiently within the authorized appropriation period.

Consequently, I object to the expenditure of the following appropriations for the reasons indicated:

A. For the following thirteen general fund appropriations, I object to their expenditure due to the need for additional planning, public input, or clarity on the use of moneys; or concerns regarding each expending agency's ability and capacity to spend down the moneys efficiently within the authorized appropriation period.

1. The \$5,000,000 appropriation of the total \$28,735,463 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR172 - Forestry - Resource Management and Development, designated in section 3, item A-11, page 7, line 19, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 699, seq. # 3000-001, may have been intended to be used for operating and renovation; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances.

2. The \$5,000,000 appropriation of the total \$8,974,146 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGR192 - General Administration for Agriculture, designated in section 3, item A-15, page 8, line 16, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 30, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for the mitigation and population control of feral animals. I will be allotting funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources from that department's appropriation in this bill to help with this need because that department has the appropriate staff and capacity to undertake this task.

3. The \$50,000,000 appropriation of the total \$100,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED138 - Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority, designated in section 3, item A-21, page 9, line 17, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 144, seq. # 1000-001, may have been intended to be used for the solar energy storage loan program.

4. Four appropriations totaling \$123,000,000 of the total \$201,814,260 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED150 - Hawaii Community Development Authority, designated in section 3, item A-23, page 9, line 33, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically, \$1,500,000 of those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 164, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for East Kapolei infrastructure implementation master plan and programmatic environmental impact statement; \$18,500,000 of those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 165, seq. # 2104-001, may have been intended to be used for Kakaako Street

upgrades; \$42,000,000 of those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 165, seq. # 2106-001, may have been intended to be used for Kalaheo electrical improvements-districtwide; and \$61,000,000 of those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 166, seq. # 2108-001, may have been intended to be used for the Iwilei-Kapalama TOD infrastructure design and construction.

5. The \$25,000,000 appropriation of the total \$62,545,402 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR806 - Parks Administration and Operation, designated in section 3, item H-5, page 36, line 8, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 745, seq. # 3000-001, may have been intended to be used for state parks-renovations; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances.

6. The \$60,225,000 appropriation of the total \$60,690,440 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR801 - Ocean Based Recreation, designated in section 3, item H-6, page 36, line 16, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 726, seq. # 3000-001, may have been intended to be used for Boating and Ocean Resources - Renovations, Improvements, Acquisition, Motor Vehicles, Equipment, and Appurtenances, and the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor Education Center.

7. The \$5,000,000 appropriation of the total \$61,022,542 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LAW900 - General Administration, designated in section 3, item I-20, page 39, line 20, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 650, seq. # 2101-001, may have been intended to be used for plans, design, construction, and equipment for new building.

8. The \$12,000,000 appropriation of the total \$26,362,784 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for DEF118 - Hawaii Emergency Management Agency, designated in section 3, item I-30, page 41, line 11, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 295, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for plans, design, construction, and equipment for new headquarters for the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency.

9. The \$4,000,000 appropriation of the total \$49,233,054 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS131 - Enterprise Technology Services, designated in section 3, item K-20, page 46, line 38, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 54, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for planning for the relocation of the Data Center.

10. The \$3,000,000 appropriation of the total \$7,786,554 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for HRD191 - Supporting Services - Human Resources Development, designated in section 3, item K-24, page 47, line 25, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 459, seq. # 2101-001, may have been intended to be used for information technology support and computer equipment and infrastructure.

11. The \$100,000 appropriation of the total \$274,977 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR101 - Public Lands Management, for operating costs, designated in section 3, item K-30, page 48, line 7, of the bill,

specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 685, seq. # 2101-001, may have been intended to be used for the Kawehewehe Waikiki Boardwalk.

12. The \$1,050,000 appropriation of the total \$15,380,669 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS221 - Public Works - Planning, Design, and Construction, designated in section 3, item K-35, page 48, line 35, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 61, seq. # 2103-001, may have been intended to be used for proof of concept and master planning.

13. The \$500,000 appropriation of the total \$4,091,600 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS233 - Central Services - Building Repairs and Alterations, designated in section 3, item K-38, page 49, line 10, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 69, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for planning for the relocation of the Mapunapuna baseyard.

B. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$50,000,000 for the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development for the First Responder Technology Campus. I understand that planning for the Campus is still in its initial stages. Given that the timing of construction will be subject to the approval of necessary land use entitlements and permits, it would not be fiscally prudent to commit such a large amount to this project without having secured such authorizations. Further, it appears highly unlikely that the contracts and encumbrances for this project can be completed before funding for the project lapses on June 30, 2024. I also object to the expenditure of \$2,000,000 of the \$4,000,000 appropriation for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, as this program is in its early stages of development, and I will be allotting \$2,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support this program.

The \$50,000,000 appropriation of the total \$60,624,444 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, designated in section 3, item A-19, page 9, line 4, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 153, seq. # 2102-001, may have been intended to be used for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development, and the \$2,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 151, seq. # 1002-001, may have been intended for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, microgrid, and other related programs.

C. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$88,800,000 to the Agribusiness Development Corporation for the Wahiawa Irrigation System because this is a major policy decision for the State that requires thorough review and planning that would exceed the one-year timeline of the appropriation. This decision involves more than the preservation of the system for irrigation purposes. It is unclear if sufficient funding is provided for the operation and maintenance of the irrigation system. I understand that a report is being prepared evaluating the cost of repairs and other operating expenses needed to maintain the irrigation system. Further, a clear framework as to the responsibilities of the Agribusiness Development Corporation, the Department of Agriculture, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources

with respect to operating and maintaining the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson needs to be developed. However, I am committed to the development of diversified agriculture in Central Oahu and I will be allotting \$5,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support the initial planning and design to improve or further develop the irrigation system.

The \$88,800,000 appropriation of the total \$106,160,761 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED170 - Agribusiness Development and Research, designated in section 3, item A-16, page 8, line 23, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 181, seq. # 2100-001, may have been intended to be used for water infrastructure, land acquisition, and irrigation system management.

D. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$120,000,000 of the \$170,000,000 appropriation to the School Facilities Authority for teacher housing. I support the need to provide housing for our teachers and I will be allotting \$50,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support the State's commitment to this endeavor. This funding will assist in the initial phases of providing much-needed teacher housing.

The \$120,000,000 appropriation of the total \$171,761,193 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for EDN450 - School Facilities Authority, designated in section 3, item G-6, page 31, line 33, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 365, seq. # 3000-001, may have been intended to be used for teacher housing.

E. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$500,000,000 for deposit into the emergency and budget reserve fund for fiscal year 2024-2025. With the deposit of \$500,000,000 into the emergency and budget reserve fund in fiscal year 2023-2024, the State will meet its financial reserve policy requirements for the fiscal biennium 2023-2025. By line item vetoing this amount for fiscal year 2024-2025, the negative impact of reducing funding needed for public services will be mitigated. In addition, I object to the expenditure of \$33,000,000 for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants for fiscal year 2024-2025. I believe that the \$33,000,000 appropriated in fiscal year 2023-2024 for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants will be sufficient to meet the federal matching requirements at this time and that state match requirements can be revisited when additional federal funds are secured.

The \$500,000,000 appropriation of the total \$545,351,873 appropriation for fiscal year 2024-2025 funded by general funds for BUF101 - Departmental Administration and Budget Division, designated in section 3, item K-5, page 44, line 31, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 196, seq. # 3001-001, may have been intended to be used for deposit into the emergency and budget reserve fund, and the \$500,000,000 amount in the proviso in part III, page 51, section 4, line 5, of this bill, and the \$33,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 195 seq. # 3000-001, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants.

Specific Items Vetoed

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the

judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, I have taken the following actions pursuant to my appropriation item veto authority:

1. Reduced by \$5,000,000 the total \$28,735,463 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR172 - Forestry - Resource Management and Development, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for operating costs and renovation; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances; designated in section 3, item A-11, page 7, line 19, of the bill, and changed it to \$23,735,463.

2. Reduced by \$5,000,000 the total \$8,974,146 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGR192 - General Administration for Agriculture, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the mitigation and population control of feral animals, designated in section 3, item A-15, page 8, line 16, of the bill, and changed it to \$3,974,146.

3. Reduced by \$88,800,000 the total \$106,160,761 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED170 - Agribusiness Development and Research, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for water infrastructure, land acquisition, and irrigation system management, designated in section 3, item A-16, page 8, line 23, of the bill, and changed it to \$17,360,761.

4. Reduced by \$50,000,000 the total \$60,624,444 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development, and the \$2,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, microgrid, and other related programs, designated in section 3, item A-19, page 9, line 4, of the bill, and changed it to \$8,624,444.

5. Reduced by \$50,000,000 the total \$100,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED138 - Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the solar energy storage loan program, designated in section 3, item A-21, page 9, line 17, of the bill, and changed it to \$50,000,000.

6. Reduced by \$1,500,000 the total \$201,814,260 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED150 - Hawaii Community Development Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for East Kapolei infrastructure implementation master plan and programmatic environmental impact statement; the \$18,500,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Kakaako Street upgrades; the \$42,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Kalaeloa electrical upgrades-districtwide; and the \$61,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the Iwilei-Kapalama TOD infrastructure design and construction, designated in section 3, item A-23, page 9, line 33, of the bill, and changed it to \$78,814,260.

7. Reduced by \$120,000,000 the total \$171,761,193 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for EDN450 - School Facilities Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for teacher housing, designated in section 3, item G-6, page 31, line 33, of the bill, and changed it to \$51,761,193.

8. Reduced by \$25,000,000 the total \$62,545,402 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR806 - Parks Administration and Operation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for state parks-renovations; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances; designated in section 3, item H-5, page 36, line 8, of the bill, and changed it to \$37,545,402.

9. Reduced by \$60,225,000 the total \$60,690,440 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR801 - Ocean- Based Recreation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Boating and Ocean Resources - Renovations, Improvements, Acquisition, Motor Vehicles, Equipment, and Appurtenances, and the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor Education Center, designated in section 3, item H-6, page 36, line 16, of the bill and changed it to \$465,440.

10. The cost and effort required also would have a chilling effect on the modernization of State IT systems. State agencies already provide language access support for the State's public-facing systems and should be given the discretion to provide cost effective language access, such as providing access by using multilingual staff or written publications.

This bill is objectionable because the intent of the works of art program is to provide works of art for new and renovated State buildings funded from one percent of the amount appropriated for the project's construction cost element. Using State-purchased works of art for non-State individuals, businesses, or entities does not fulfill the intent of the works of art program and denies the public the opportunity to enjoy works of art in public buildings. It may result in public property being used for a non-public purpose in violation of Section 4 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

Further, given that some of the art pieces may have been purchased using tax-exempt bond proceeds, there could be adverse tax consequences to the State if the amount of revenues generated from the loan program are significant when compared to the amount of tax-exempt bond proceeds used to acquire the works of art. Also, this bill would have a negative impact on Hawai'i's creative economy as businesses and individuals could rent works of art from the State rather than purchase art pieces from the artists.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) amend the composition of the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) Board of Directors; (2) establish a public policy framework that addresses state goals in the area of economic diversification; (3) appropriate \$6,000,000 to HTDC for economic diversification for fiscal year 2023-2024 and fiscal year 2024-2025, respectively; and (4) require HTDC to submit annual reports to the Legislature.

This bill is objectionable because, although it provides much needed funding that supports HTDC core programs, it also proposes a new composition of the HTDC Board of Directors that targets a current sitting member and removes this member from serving. The bill requires the University of Hawai'i (UH) to designate a UH Regent to serve on the HTDC Board and eliminates UH's ability to decide and designate the most appropriate representative within its organization. UH Regents devote a significant amount of time and effort to ensure the higher education needs of the State are met through their duties as Regents; adding further duties, unrelated to higher education, would detract from this.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 999 without my approval.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1088, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Declaration of Water Shortage and Emergency."

The purpose of this bill is to amend the conditions, manner, and areas in which the Commission on Water Resource Management (CWRM) of the Department of Land and Natural Resources can declare and provide notice of water shortages and emergencies.

This bill is objectionable because the current provisions of the State Water Code, found in chapter 174C, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), sufficiently protect our water resources in an emergency. The CWRM is tasked in section 174C-62, HRS, with formulating a plan for implementation during periods of water shortage and is already authorized by statute to declare water shortages and impose restrictions. I share some of the concerns raised by the Board of Water Supply of the City and County of Honolulu about the amendments to the State Water Code made in this bill, and I have concluded that until the CWRM completes its plan, thereby establishing a foundation for emergency actions, it is premature to substantively amend the State Water Code.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1090, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Ocean Recreation Commercial Permits."

The purposes of this bill are to (1) allow the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to designate moorage

space within State small boat harbors to accommodate commercial fishing vessels and transient vessels, (2) specify the method by which the DLNR may issue new ocean recreation commercial permits to owners of vessels, and (3) require the DLNR to determine which permittees will be allowed to continue to renew their commercial use permits when the permit limit established by law is exceeded. In the event of an exceeded limit, issuance of new and renewal of existing permits will be based on seniority.

This bill is objectionable because, while I understand and respect the need to limit commercial uses in our shared oceans for the safety and protection of our natural and cultural resources, determining the issuance of new commercial use permits and the renewal of existing permits solely based on seniority may not be the singular metric to adequately achieve the necessary limits. Our laws provide the DLNR an objective means to issue new permits—by lottery. This lottery system will continue to allow the DLNR to issue new permits while the DLNR may seek a more balanced approach to prioritizing applications. Additionally, the law already provides that DLNR may refrain from renewing permits to permittees who fail to comply with permit terms and conditions.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII**

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PREAMBLE

The members of the Senate do hereby reaffirm the Senate's dedication to upholding the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Hawai'i, to providing for openness and fairness in all of its proceedings, and to promoting collaboration and consultation in its committee work.

The Senate stands as a people-oriented institution that serves all of the people, whatever their background or persuasion. The Senate works for the public good and strives to give every person an equal opportunity to realize his or her highest potential. The Senate's organized debate and deliberative consideration of issues shall be open to the public.

**RULES OF THE SENATE
OF THE
THIRTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAI'I**

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES**Rule 1 Organization.**

(1) When the Senate convenes in the first Regular Session of each Legislature, the member from the First Senatorial District shall act as temporary chair, call the Senate to order, appoint a temporary Clerk and a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If, from the report of the Committee, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the temporary Clerk shall call the roll.

(2) The temporary Chair shall then appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court Judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Hawai'i State Constitution. After the oath has been duly administered, the Senate shall organize.

(3) When the Senate convenes in any succeeding Sessions of the Legislature, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order.

Rule 2 Officers and Employees.

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3 The President.

It shall be the duty of the President:

(1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair.

(2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.

(3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.

(4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.

(5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, call for votes upon the same and announce the results.

(6) To receive all communications, including but not limited to, Governor's messages, budget messages, and Judiciary communications, present them to the Senate and, unless otherwise provided in these Rules, refer these and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.

(7) To appoint all members of committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.

(8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.

(9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.

(10) To issue warrants and when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the issuance of subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses and subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production of books, documents, or other evidence, in any manner pending before the Senate, or committee, as the case may be, or other orders of the Senate.

(11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.

(12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.

(13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.

(14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, and balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate, and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

(17) To administer oaths to elected officers of the Senate who are not Senators and to witnesses who are compelled to testify under oath before the Senate or a committee thereof; provided that the President may appoint a designee to administer oaths as the President deems necessary.

(18) To disperse information to all members relating to the President's nominations and appointments to boards and commissions on a monthly basis.

Rule 4 The Vice-President.

(1) The Vice-President and the President shall prepare and administer a budget for the Senate.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules, the President and Vice-President shall oversee permanent support staff of the Senate who are not directly employed or supervised by an individual Senator.

(3) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5 President Pro Tempore.

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore is chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6 The Clerk.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chair of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the President.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the President or the President's designees, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon, collect the same, and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7 Assistant Clerk.

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the Senate. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8 Sergeant-at-Arms.

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders or process as directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; to refurbish furniture; to oversee and conduct office and building maintenance; and generally to execute all of the requirements of and be answerable to the President of the Senate.

Rule 9 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of all duties and attend to such duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall perform all duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rule 10 Responsibilities of Officers and Employees.

The employees of the Senate shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President and, upon the President's consultation with the Vice President, shall perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate and to confidentiality guided by standards of professional conduct. Employees under the supervision of a Senate member shall be directly answerable to the Senate member.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer by the President.

Rule 11 Majority and Minority Party Organization and Staff.

(1) Members of the majority and minority parties may adopt rules of procedure and administration for their respective caucuses. The rules shall not be inconsistent with the Rules of the Senate, and any such rule of procedure for the caucus shall not be enforceable on the floor of the Senate.

(2) The establishment and staffing of the majority and minority staff offices shall be subject to budgetary constraints in the budget for the Senate that is prepared and administered under Rule 4.

Rule 12 Pay of Members, Officers and Employees.

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES

Rule 13 Committees: Types and Composition.

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President subject to action by the Senate. The respective Chairs and Vice Chairs of each Standing Committee shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall to the extent practicable be represented on all Standing Committees on a proportional basis or on such basis as may be prescribed by the Senate.

(2) Leadership Committees shall include majority and minority members drawn from the ranks of the Senate leadership.

(3) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or provided by these Rules, include a member or members of the minority party, and upon consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders, shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to Chapter 21, Hawai'i Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(4) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each and be managed by the Chair of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate. The members of the Conference Committee shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred. The President may discharge a Conference Committee only upon concurrence with the Majority Leader.

- (5) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 14 Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs.

The first person named on the committee shall be the Chair, and the second member named shall be Vice-Chair. The Chair of committees shall call meetings and preside. If a chair so requests, the vice chair shall call the meeting and preside.

The purview of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means includes the Capital Improvement Project Program Budget for the State of Hawai'i.

Rule 15 Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership.

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if already a member of four other committees.

Rule 16 Standing Committees.

Standing Committees shall be appointed for major subject matter areas at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible. The Standing Committees and their areas of jurisdiction shall be as follows:

(1) Committee on Agriculture and Environment (AEN). The purview of this committee includes agriculture and aquaculture, including mariculture; population; environmental quality control and protection, including litter control, recycling, wastewater treatment, endangered species, invasive species, and hazardous waste.

(2) Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection (CPN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to business regulation, professional and vocational licensing, consumer protection, financial institutions, insurance regulation, public utility regulation, telecommunications regulations, the landlord tenant code, condominium property regimes, and leaseholds.

(3) Committee on Education (EDU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to early childhood learning; early education, including the Hawaii P-20 Initiative; public schools; continuing education; and the public libraries.

(4) Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism (EET). The purview of this committee includes programs relating to energy and energy resources, including the development of alternative energy resources; programs related to economic development, including but not limited to authorities and corporations administratively attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism unless the authority or corporation is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule; other emerging industries development, financial and technical assistance to business, film and digital media production, astronomy, space exploration and aerospace development, biochemistry, biomedicine, biotechnology, other scientific research and development activities, recreation, including commercial ocean recreation activities, sports and athletics, and the Aloha Stadium; and those programs relating to tourism, including but not limited to the Hawaii Convention Center, Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau, and the Hawaii Tourism Authority.

(5) Committee on Government Operations (GVO). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state government operations policy, including government efficiency, The Procurement Code, and state facilities, unless the state government operations policy, including government efficiency, departmental procurement, and state facilities is within the purview of another Standing Committee pursuant to this Rule.

(6) Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to Hawaiian affairs, including but not limited to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Hawaiian home lands, sovereignty, and burial councils.

(7) Committee on Health and Human Services (HHS). The purview of this committee includes general health, mental health, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, developmental disabilities, hospitals; public assistance, Medquest, youth services, day care programs under the Department of Human Services, vocational rehabilitation, long term care; promotion of the general well-being of Hawaii's youth, families, elderly population; and issues, services, and programs relating to homelessness.

(8) Committee on Higher Education (HRE). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the University of Hawaii, the community college system, private higher education bond financing, and other education matters relevant to higher education, but excluding the Hawaii P-20 Initiative.

(9) Committee on Housing (HOU). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to affordable and public housing; urban renewal; community development; housing development; and the housing of, or sheltering of, the homeless.

(10) Committee on Judiciary (JDC). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to the courts, crime prevention and control, including juvenile justice matters; criminal code revision; statutory revision; campaign spending and elections; ethics; constitutional matters; the Attorney General, Public Defender, and Judiciary; and individual rights and civil liberties.

(11) Committee on Labor and Technology (LBT). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to public officers and employees, labor, employment opportunities and training, labor-management relations, collective bargaining, the Employees' Retirement System, and the Hawaii Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund; implementation and innovation of technology, including but not limited to information storage, transmission, processing, and telecommunications; and programs and issues addressed by the State's Chief Information Officer and the Office of Enterprise Technology Services, including any boards, commissions, committees, and councils addressing technology issues.

(12) Committee on Public Safety and Intergovernmental and Military Affairs (PSM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to law enforcement, including but not limited to the narcotics division, the sheriffs division, county and state law

enforcement officers; public safety; corrections and rehabilitation; civil defense; disaster readiness; state building code; county and federal relations; matters of concern to the counties; and military and veterans' affairs.

(13) Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts (TCA). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to air, water, and surface transportation, and transit-oriented development as it relates to transportation projects; programs relating to international affairs, international relations, foreign policy issues, and foreign relations; and culture and the arts and matters of concern to culture and the arts in the State.

(14) Committee on Water and Land (WTL). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to state planning; historic preservation; sustainability; land and water management; forest management and reserve; coastal zone management; land reclamation; naturally occurring fisheries; ocean resources; state parks and beaches; management areas, including ocean recreation management areas and small boat harbors; and transit-oriented development as it relates to land use.

(15) Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). The purview of this committee includes those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including revenue enhancement, taxation, other revenues, and cash and debt management; statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation; and government structure and finance.

Rule 17 Standing Committees: General Responsibility.

(1) General Responsibility. On the bills referred to it, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

(2) Subsequent referral committees; prior concurrence. On bills that have been referred to more than one committee, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, the subsequent referral committee shall make no substantive change, except changes which affect the subject matter over which the subsequent referral committee has primary jurisdiction, without prior written approval of the preceding referral committee chair having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter affected by the change.

Rule 18 Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall make available to members of the Senate the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

Concerning all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the recommendation of the chair of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 19 Leadership Committees.

Leadership Committees, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as necessary. A leadership Committee on Legislative Management, upon consultation and agreement with the Majority and Minority Leaders, may be appointed by the President to perform the duties and responsibilities of the Committee as may be provided by law, or to make recommendations to the President on issues of Senate policy. Because Leadership Committees have jurisdiction over issues of organizational and institutional interest to the Senate, their membership shall include members drawn from the ranks of the Senate Leadership, thus assuring high-level consideration of these issues.

Rule 20 Special Committees on Accountability.

The President may appoint a Special Committee on Accountability which shall conduct informational briefing on matters referred to it by Senate Leadership or investigate matters referred to it by single house or concurrent resolutions. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and include a member or members of the minority party. The President shall appoint the committee's vice chair, who may change from time to time, to represent the standing committee having primary jurisdiction over the subject matter referred to the special committee.

Each Special Committee on Accountability shall terminate at the end of the calendar year in which it was appointed, unless otherwise specified. All requirements of standing committees shall apply to the committee.

Rule 21 Meetings of Committees.

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill.

Notice of meetings shall include the number and title of the bills or resolutions, and brief descriptions and committee referrals of each of the subject matters to be covered. The notice for the first Senate meeting on a measure shall be filed at least 72 hours before the meeting and at least 48 hours before any subsequent meeting. The notice for any meeting to be held on the first work day of the week shall be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the last work day of the prior week.

These notice requirements may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown. The 72 hour notice requirement is waived for the initial decision-making meeting for short form bills and informational briefings.

To the extent practicable, meetings, including decision making sessions, of leadership committees appointed by the President, and Standing Committees shall be livestreamed via the Internet in real time and archived for later viewing on a publicly available platform.

To the extent practicable, for any meeting where public testimony will be received at the meeting, testifiers shall be allowed the option to testify remotely via Senate provided telecommunications, digital, or video-conferencing technology.

Instructions to access the livestream, archive, or to testify remotely, shall be included on the notice of the meeting.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees that may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of a Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 22 Decision-Making by Committee.

(1) The chair of a standing committee may commence a decision-making meeting and open discussion on matters referred to the committee without a quorum; provided that the decision-making by the committee on matters that are referred to it shall be conducted with a quorum of the committee present. A quorum shall be a majority of the membership of the committee.

(2) A favorable vote of a majority of the members present at a decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is required to report a matter out of committee. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote.

(3) The presence of a quorum and the final vote of each member who is present at the decision-making meeting of a standing committee shall be recorded by the chair or by a member of the committee designated by the chair. This record shall be attached to and shall be a part of the report of the standing committee.

Rule 23 Public Hearings on Bills.

(1) Subject to this rule, the selection and scheduling of a bill for public hearing shall be at the discretion of the chair of the committee having jurisdiction over the bill.

(2) The chair's determination that a bill will have a public hearing shall be final notwithstanding the opposition of a majority of the members of the committee.

(3) At the written request of a majority of the members of the committee, the chair shall schedule a bill for public hearing.

(4) If a bill:

(A) Has been referred to more than one standing committee and at least one committee hearing is required for passage of the bill out of the Senate;

(B) Contains any significant or substantial amendment made by a committee other than the last standing committee to which the bill has been referred; and

(C) The public has not been provided with an opportunity to submit testimony on the significant or substantial amendment;

then, prior to reporting the bill out of the last standing committee, the last standing committee to which the bill was referred shall hold a public hearing to provide the public with the opportunity to testify on the bill.

Rule 24 Committee Reports.

(1) The leadership committees as may be appointed by the President and Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.

(2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.

(3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members of each house appointed by their respective presiding officer have concurred in the report.

Rule 25 Committees: Fact-finding and Content of Reports.

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall

be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chair and other duly delegated members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter. A report recommending a measure for passage shall clearly state the legislative intent and purpose of the measure.

(3) The report shall also include the identity of organizations or titles of individuals representing organizations who submitted testimony on legislation for, against or comments only on the measure. A summary of any individual or individuals who submit testimony as private citizens shall also be provided.

(4) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills referred to the committee.

(5) The committee shall report whenever a majority of the members present at the decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum is in favor of reporting the bill or resolution out of the committee. The report, after being made available, for review by the members of the committee, and after subsequent revisions thereto, if any, shall be the final report of the committee. The final report of the committee shall be attested to by the signature of the chair on behalf of the members of the committee. The action of the committee on the bill or resolution or any amendments thereto, if any, and the final vote of each member of the committee recorded by the chair or the chair's designee at a decision-making meeting shall not be changed in the review of the report, unless the change is made at an open decision-making meeting conducted with a quorum of the committee present. The minority of the members present at any decision-making meeting duly constituted with a quorum may report.

Rule 26 Committee of the Whole.

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chair), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The Committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last. All amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 27 Meetings.

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

(3) To the extent practicable, all meetings of the Senate that are open to the public shall be livestreamed via the Internet in real time and archived for later viewing on a publicly available platform. Instructions to access the livestream or archive shall be included on the applicable Order of the Day.

Rule 28 Attendance.

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 29 Extension of Session.

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

“To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 30 Recessed Session.

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Hawai'i State Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 31 Special Sessions.

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(3) A meeting of the Senate may be convened at any time for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution, by a petition submitted to the Clerk of the Senate signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled. In such meeting, the Senate may organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration. The petition shall read:

"To the Clerk of the Senate

The petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, shall convene a meeting of the Senate of the State of Hawai'i at _____.

The meeting of the Senate shall be held for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities under Article III, Section 12, of the Hawai'i State Constitution to organize itself, choose its officers, and adopt rules for its administration.

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the Clerk of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the Clerk of the Senate shall issue a notice of the meeting for the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 32 Adjournments.

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 33 Motion to Adjourn.

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

Rule 34 Quorum.

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 35 Executive Session.

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 36 Clearing of the Senate.

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 37 Nominations; Appointments.

(1) Nominations made by the Governor and removal of the chief legal officer of the State which require the advice and consent of the Senate, and appointments which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be referred to the standing committee having jurisdiction within five legislative days of receipt of the nomination or appointment. The standing committee to which a nomination, removal of the chief legal officer or appointment is referred, shall report to the Senate with a recommendation to advise and consent, confirm, or reject on or before the fifty-ninth day of the session.

(2) Except for the appointment of a justice or judge, a nomination or appointment made by the Governor which is received by the Senate after the forty-first day of the session of the Legislature shall be returned to the Governor without action, unless a confirmation or consent is required to further a public purpose which cannot be satisfied by an interim appointment. Notice of this rule shall be given to the Governor not later than the twentieth day of the session of the Legislature.

(3) The final question on nominations made by the Governor shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"

(4) The final question on the removal of the chief legal officer of the State shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to the removal of the chief legal officer of the State?"

(5) The final question on appointments made by the Governor which require the confirmation or consent of the Senate shall be: "Will the Senate confirm (or consent) to this appointment?"

(6) The final question on nominations, removal of the chief legal officer or on appointments shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination or appointment is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.

(7) Public hearings shall be held for all nominees, for the removal of the chief legal officer of the State, and for all appointees prior to confirmation or consent by the Senate.

(8) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawai'i State Constitution.

Rule 38 Meeting at a Place Other than the Capitol.

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

Rule 38.5 Virtual Attendance During Catastrophic Disasters.

(1) During a period of catastrophic disaster, the President may authorize, for good cause, any meeting of members of the Senate to be conducted at which one or more members participate through virtual attendance.

(2) A member participating through virtual attendance shall be considered present and in attendance as if the member were physically present, including but not limited to, for determining a quorum pursuant to Senate Rule 22 and Senate Rule 34.

(3) In ascertaining whether a quorum is present, the presiding officer or chair shall count the number of members in physical attendance and those members, including the presiding officer or chair, participating by means of virtual attendance.

(4) "Catastrophic disaster" means a severe or prolonged natural or human caused occurrence including, but not limited to, world conflicts, terrorist threat, national or global economic crisis, natural disaster, outbreak of disease, or any other event or occurrence that severely threatens or negatively impacts life, health, welfare, property, infrastructure, the environment, and financial security of the State.

(5) "Virtual attendance" means participation in a meeting of members of the Senate using telecommunications technology, video-conferencing technology, or other electronic or digital means of communication that allows any member who is authorized or required to be at the meeting to:

- (A) Authenticate and verify each participating member and the vote made by each member;
- (B) Simultaneously hear or read the comments of every member who is duly recognized by the presiding officer or chair;
- (C) Vigorously participate in debate with other members as if they were physically present; and
- (D) Send and receive documents and other material that are used or referred to in the meeting;

provided that if equal access of a member via virtual attendance is interrupted, the meeting shall be recessed until such time as equal access by all members is restored.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 39 Order of Business: General.

After roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of the Leadership Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of Standing Committees.
- (8) Reports of other Leadership Committees.
- (9) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (10) The Order of the Day.
- (11) Miscellaneous communications.
- (12) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 40 Order of Business: Special.

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 41 Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages.

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from Leadership Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 42 Order of Business: Order of the Day.

- (1) All floor votes on legislation will be posted on the order of the day.
- (2) After the first seven orders of business set forth in Rule 39, it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 43 Order of Business: Unfinished Business.

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 44 Order of Business: Questions on Priority.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS**Rule 45 Bills: Introduction.**

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph, and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority leader or the minority leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairs and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the President. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority leaders and the minority leader shall develop a policy governing introduction by individual members of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

Bills, which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session, shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawai'i, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and stricken and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule, nor an amending bill where the intent and effect of the amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

Rule 46 Bills: Referral to Committee.

(1) Upon introduction, all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and shall pass first reading.

(2) The majority research office shall make recommendations to the majority leadership on the referral of each such bill to appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees.

(3) Each such bill shall be referred by members of the majority leadership appointed by the President, to one or more appropriate Leadership or Standing Committees for consideration.

(4) Any referral may be reconsidered by the President upon written request of any chair who is aggrieved by the referral made within three working days. The President shall decide the request for reconsideration within a reasonable time, which decision shall be final. No request for reconsideration shall be considered if the timing of the request would have the effect of killing a bill or resolution.

(5) Any proposed senate draft that makes major amendments or wholesale changes that could affect the referral of the bill shall be submitted to the President for review and if the President deems it appropriate, the bill may be re-referred as determined by the President. The President's determination of any proposed re-referral shall be made within twenty-four hours of receipt of the proposed senate draft.

(6) Each Leadership and Standing Committee shall consider the bills and other matters referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

Rule 47 Bills: Required Readings.

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 48 Bills: First Reading.

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 49 Bills: Second Reading.

A bill upon its second reading may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Leadership Committee, Standing Committee, or Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chair of such committee. When the bill is reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 50 Bills: Third Reading.

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

(3) All bills, except on first reading, shall be identified by title on the Order of the Day before consideration by the members unless waived by the President.

Rule 51 Bills: Property of Senate.

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, subject however to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 52 Bills: Recall from Committee.

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 53 Matters Tabled.

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 54 Bills: Amendments.

(1) All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

(2) The fundamental purpose of any amendment to a bill shall be germane to the fundamental purpose of the bill.

(3) The Clerk shall prepare and distribute copies of any proposed floor amendment to each member of the Senate present.

(4) A floor amendment shall be deemed pending only after its proponent has been recognized by the President and its adoption has been properly moved and seconded.

(5) A floor amendment that relates to a different subject, is intended to accomplish a different purpose, incorporates any other bill pending before the Senate, or would alter the nature of the bill as reported, is not germane and shall not be considered by the Senate.

(6) An amendment to a floor amendment that is not germane to both the floor amendment and the bill as reported shall not be considered by the Senate.

Rule 55 Bills: Certification.

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage in the journal along with a record of the ayes and noes.

Rule 56 Bills: Received from House of Representatives.

Whenever a House bill which has passed Third Reading in the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 57 Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives.

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 58 Bills: Correction of Errors.

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the house last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 59 Bills: Order of Consideration.

(1) The Clerk shall ensure that bills that have passed first reading are made immediately available. When the bills have been made available to the members of the Senate, the Majority Leadership, appointed by the President, shall refer the bills to the various committees. When the committees have considered the bills and reported on them, the committees shall return the bills to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place the bills in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider the bills in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 60 Bills: Special Order of Consideration.

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS**Rule 61 Resolutions and Motions: Form.**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 62 Motions: Disposition.

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 63 Motions Applicable to Pending Matters.

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit or recommit, and
- (5) To amend, which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

A motion to recommit will require a floor vote.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 64 Matters Postponed Indefinitely.

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 65 Motion for Previous Question.

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 63, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 66 Motion for Reconsideration.

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted on the side that did not prevail to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted on the prevailing side may

move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Rule 67 Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications.

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 61, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING

Rule 68 Questions of Order.

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 69 Debate: General Limitation.

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the mover of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 70 Voting: Methods.

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice; Second, by raising of hands; Third, by rising; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote either by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, or by raising their hands and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The President shall, when one-fifth of the members present so request, and may, when one member so requests, allow a roll-call vote. Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(5) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 71 Voting: Rights of Members.

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member voting "with reservations" shall be counted as a favorable vote. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

- (3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.
- (4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PEER REVIEW; PUNISHMENT

Rule 72 Misconduct; Procedure; Peer Review.

No member of the Senate shall be subject to a charge for misconduct, disorderly behavior, or neglect of duty unless the person making the charge shall have first given notice of the charge to the President and to the member being charged.

Upon receipt of the charge, the President shall attempt to resolve the matter in an administrative proceeding. If the matter cannot be resolved administratively, the President may appoint a Special Committee to be chaired by the Vice-President or such other member as the President may designate to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of the member charged for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense before the Special Committee. Following its investigation and hearing, the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

If the committee recommends dismissal of the charge or charges, the President may dismiss the charges without further hearing, or the President may present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges against the member without a hearing.

If there is no dismissal of the charge or charges, or if the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The member who is charged, shall be informed in writing of the presentation of the charge or charges of the committee report to the Senate and be given an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense. The Senate, by a majority vote, may dismiss the charge or charges without a hearing, or with notice and an opportunity to be heard in the member's own defense, censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

At any stage of the charge against a member, the member shall have a right to be represented by a person or persons of the member's own choosing.

Rule 73 Decorum: Transgression of Rules.

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, the member immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 74 Decorum: Address.

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the _____ District"; "The Chair of the Committee on _____"; "The Majority Leader;") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 75 Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking.

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 76 Decorum: Presence in Senate.

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 77 Decorum: Conduct in Session.

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

No one shall cause any annoyance or disturbance on the Senate floor by use of sound-emitting electronic devices such as cell phones or pagers.

Rule 78 Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session.

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

Rule 79 Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order.

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 80 Decorum: Smoking.

No member or other officer shall smoke anywhere within the capitol.

Rule 81 Standards of Conduct.

(1) Members should conduct themselves in a respectful manner befitting the office with which they as elected officials have been entrusted, respecting and complying with the law and acting at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

(2) Members should not lend the prestige of public office to advance the private interests of themselves or others; nor should members convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to unduly influence pending public business before them.

(3) Members should treat their fellow Senate members, staff, and the general public with respect and courtesy, regardless of political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability.

(4) The legislative duties of members as prescribed by law and these Rules should take precedence over all of their other business or professional activities. Members should freely and willingly accept certain restrictions on their business activities and professional conduct that might be considered burdensome by an ordinary private citizen, and should perform the duties of elected office impartially and diligently. To the greatest extent reasonably possible, members should:

- (A) Refrain from allowing family, social, business, or other relationships to unduly influence the member's legislative conduct or judgment.
- (B) Refrain from showing bias or prejudice, including but not limited to bias or prejudice based on political or religious beliefs, race, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, or physical disability, in the performance of their official duties.
- (C) Exercise patience, tolerance and courtesy to all those with whom they deal with in an official capacity, and require staff and others subject to their direction and control to maintain similar standards of conduct, fidelity, and diligence inherent in public service.
- (D) Exercise the power of appointment impartially and on the basis of merit, refraining from making unnecessary appointments and approving compensation of appointees beyond the fair value of services rendered.
- (E) Afford to every person who wishes to participate in the legislative process the opportunity to be heard according to established procedures.
- (F) Consider at all times whether their conduct would create in reasonable minds the perception that their ability to carry out legislative responsibilities with integrity and independence is either questionable or impaired.
- (G) Refrain from using, or permitting the use of, the privileges and prestige of their public office to derive undue personal, professional, or financial benefits for themselves, members of their families, or others with whom they maintain personal, business, or professional relationships.
- (H) Refrain from engaging in financial and business dealings that involve them in frequent transactions, or continuing business or professional relationships, with those persons likely to derive benefits from public financial matters either pending or already deliberated and voted upon by the Senate, to the extent that such conduct may reasonably be perceived as personal exploitation of their public office.

Rule 82 Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited.

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 83 Disclosures.

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawai'i, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 84 Violating Confidence.

If any matter covered in Rule 35 or 36 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter,

such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Article III, Section 18 of the Hawai'i State Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

Rule 85 Conflicts of Interest.

(1) No member shall vote on any legislation if the member has a direct financial interest in the legislation, unless the member is part of the class of people affected by the official action based upon the member's profession, trade or business; provided that this rule shall not apply to votes on the recommendations of a committee when a member has disclosed a potential conflict. For the purposes of this rule, a "direct financial interest" means that the legislation affects the legislator's personal business, property, or financial interest.

(2) If a member is uncertain as to whether a conflict of interest exists, the member may request a ruling from the President by giving notice and disclosing the direct financial interest to the President prior to voting. When making a determination in cases where a portion of a measure may place a member in a conflict of interest, the President shall give due consideration to the context of that portion as it relates to the overall purpose of the measure. If the President determines that a conflict exists, the President shall excuse the member from voting.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS

Rule 86 Questions to State Officers.

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department by reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND INTERPRETATION OF RULES

Rule 87 Amendments; Suspension; Violations.

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose upon a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(3) Any violation of these Rules shall be referred to the President for appropriate action.

Rule 88 Parliamentary Procedure.

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 2010 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.

PART XII. MISCELLANEOUS POWER

Rule 89 Legal Action.

Except in legal proceedings where the Senate of the State of Hawaii is named as a defendant, the President shall obtain written consent of a majority of the members to which the Senate is entitled prior to undertaking any affirmative legal action taken on behalf of the Senate, such as the filing of a lawsuit or amicus curiae brief or intervening as a party to a lawsuit.

Rule 90 Administrative and Financial Manuals.

The Senate shall adopt by majority vote an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate policies.

Rule 91 Decorum; Disrespectful Conduct During Session by Non-member.

If, during any session of the Senate, any non-member should behave in a disrespectful or disorderly manner the non-member shall be subject to arrest and removal from the Senate Chamber by the Sergeant-at-Arms or by any other law enforcement officer of the State, as directed by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Any removal of a non-member by the Sergeant-at-Arms and its personnel shall be restricted to removal of the non-member from the Senate Chamber and through non-physical means, whenever possible. Once a non-member is removed from the Senate Chamber, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall relinquish control of the non-member to the Department of Public Safety or other law enforcement officers of the State.

For the punishment of a non-member, the provisions of Article III, Section 18, of the Hawai'i State Constitution or section 710-1078, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, pursuant to Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, shall govern.

Rule 92 Issuance of the Senate Pin.

(1) The Senate pin is a symbol of service in the Senate and provides a common bond among current and past members.

(2) The President may choose to commission and present the Senate pin to current or past members.

(3) The Senate pin presented under this Rule shall only be worn by current or past members to whom it was presented.

(4) The Senate pin shall not be presented to an individual or representative acting on behalf of any current or past member.

(5) If the Senate pin presented under this Rule is lost, destroyed, or rendered unfit for use without fault or neglect on the part of the current or past member to whom it was furnished, the President may replace the Senate pin upon request.

Rule 93 Committee on the Declared State of Emergency.

When a state of emergency has been declared by the Governor, the President may appoint a Committee on the Declared State of Emergency which shall investigate or conduct informational briefings on matters relating to the State’s emergency response. The committee shall be composed of not less than five members, unless otherwise ordered by the President, who shall appoint a chairperson from among the members. The committee shall include a member or members of the minority party.

Any member of the committee may ask any question of any state officer appearing before the committee relating to the officer’s respective department, the department’s role in the emergency, and its emergency response. Any member of the committee may also submit written inquiries by reducing the member’s questions to writing, over the member’s signature, reading the same before the committee, and providing the officer with a copy of such written questions. Any officer questioned in writing shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless granted an extension of time in which to reply by the committee.

**32nd LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2023
JOINT HOUSE and SENATE
COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES**

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2023 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 17, 2023, until 11:59 p.m. on Friday, April 28, 2023.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

“Chairs” refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

“Conference Committee” refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

“Lead chair” refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

“Lead committee staff” refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

“Managers” refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure.

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Conference Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The electronic signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice.

Chairs shall provide at least 24-hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24-hours notice whenever possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature’s website and distribution. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before 9:00 pm on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. A new meeting notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required. However, a marked-up copy of the notice indicating the time and place of the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms as soon as possible for updating individual bill status on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post a copy of this marked-up notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the subsequent meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed electronically by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or a co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a fiscal measure, the chair or co-chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee must be present during decision-making and give their approval.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall contact the absent chair.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).

- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by physically signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the physical signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.
