

FORTY-FIRST DAY

Friday, March 28, 2025

The Senate of the Thirty-Third Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2025, convened at 11:34 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senator Lee who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

At this time, Senator Hashimoto acknowledged Rachele Ouye, who had offered a moment of contemplation prior to the Senate's floor session and was seated in the gallery. Senator Hashimoto noted that Ms. Ouye was part of the Ka Ipu Kukui Fellows program, a leadership development program for the County of Maui. Senator Hashimoto then introduced the rest of the program's cohort, who were on a visit to O'ahu regarding the topic of governance: Naomi Cooper, Daniel Goodfellow, Mike Gurat, Kaulana Kilo, Lauren Loor, Kylee Okazaki, Donna Paz, Kelly Potts, Jade Rojas-Letisi, Jill Senter, Bri Simon, Stacey Sueoka, Drew Sulock, and Dani Waring. Accompanying them in the gallery were program executive director Charen Kepler and board of directors member Scott Nunokawa.

Senator Awa introduced Auntie Renee Fonoimoana and Dotty Kelly-Paddock, guests from Hau'ula who were trying to bring a resiliency hub to Ko'olauloa, who were present in the gallery. Senator Awa explained that Ms. Fonoimoana and Ms. Kelly-Paddock had come into Honolulu that day to appear before the Board of Land and Natural Resources to seek a 10-year lease of the land they had been working on through the Department of Land and Natural Resources and had come away with a 65-year lease to continue with their project.

Senator Chang honored the life and legacy of the late professor Daniel W. Y. Kwok and presented the following remarks:

"Today, I take great pleasure in honoring the life of the late University of Hawai'i professor Dr. Daniel W. Y. Kwok. For nearly 60 years, Professor Kwok made profound contributions to the discipline of Asian studies, to the education of thousands of students at UH, to the American understanding of China, and to cultural exchange around the world.

"Daniel W. Y. Kwok was born in Shanghai, China, on September 3, 1932, to two American-educated parents. His father, Tak-Wah Kwok, had studied political science at the University of Washington, Harvard, and Cambridge and worked as an official in the Shanghai foreign office. His mother, Grace Wong, attended Oberlin College and was a concert pianist.

"After the family left China, Kwok earned his bachelor of arts degree in history from Brown University in 1954. He went on to earn his master of arts degree in Far Eastern studies in 1956 and a PhD in history from Yale University in 1959.

"Dr. Kwok was a lecturer at Yale University from 1957 to 1959 and at Knox College from 1959 to 1961, where he introduced new courses on Asia. In 1961, Professor Kwok joined the faculty at the University of Hawai'i, where he focused his teaching and research on the history of Chinese thought. His teaching, influence, and scholarship allowed him to shape the curriculum in the history and humanities departments at UH Mānoa, which led to the inclusion of Asia-Pacific historical realities.

"Throughout his prolific academic career, he advised and helped a large number of students graduate from the University of Hawai'i with their master's and doctoral degrees in Chinese

history. As a strong believer in undergraduate and graduate education, he regularly taught seminars and core curriculum courses.

"Recognizing the vital role of journalists in shaping public understanding of Asia, Professor Kwok established a mid-career journalism fellowship at the University of Hawai'i in 1974. The fellowship program was founded on the belief that Asia's influence in global affairs would expand in the 21st century. This program has trained 160 journalists, many of whom now work for major U.S. newspapers and news bureaus across East Asia. Over its 26 years, the program was the nation's first and only program focused on Asia.

"To help expand knowledge and interests in China, he founded the China Seminar in 1978. The China Seminar was a platform for in-depth discussions on diverse topics always accompanied by excellent food. Community members gathered at Maple Garden Restaurant on Isenberg Street, Honolulu, to listen to scholars, diplomats, journalists, researchers, doctors, attorneys, artists, and other professionals share their thoughts and expertise on China. Over four decades, the seminar has hosted over 250 speakers and 350 presentations covering history, culture, politics, economics, art, technology, law, and more. In 2009, it became a forum of the Friends of the East-West Center. In August 2020, Professor Kwok stepped down from leading the China Seminar, and it was relaunched virtually by the East-West Center later that year. This new format has expanded its reach, bringing in speakers and participants from around the world.

"We are honored to celebrate the life and contributions of Professor Kwok, and today, we welcome his daughter, Alison (please stand and be recognized), who followed her father's footsteps into the academy and now teaches architecture at the University of Oregon; and his son, Theodore (please stand), and the apple didn't fall far from the tree: He's in charge of the map collection at the University of Hawai'i Library. Professor Kwok was the beloved husband of Nancy Campbell, father to Alison and Theodore, and grandfather to Anne and Alisa Kwok. Joining us in the gallery is Professor Kieko Matteson (please stand), Professor Marcus Daniel, Professor Vina Lanzona, and Professor Shana Brown with the University of Hawai'i Department of History.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

The Chair announced that the honorees would be greeted on the Senate floor immediately following adjournment.

The Chair observed that, for many employees, their employment at the Senate would end with the legislative session and that the job fair, which was an occasion for them to examine potential post-session opportunities, was a way to thank them for their hard work.
