

## FORTY-EIGHTH DAY

Thursday, April 10, 2025

The Senate of the Thirty-Third Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2025, convened at 11:36 a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Roll was called showing all Senators present, with the exception of Senator Fevella who was excused.

The Chair announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Seventh Day.

At this time, Senator Rhoads introduced Tavian Saffery and Sarah Fowler, students from Kanu o ka 'Āina New Century Public Charter School. Also in the gallery were Stephanie Kendrick and Brandy Shimabukuro, community engagement staff members with the Hawaiian Humane Society; community advocate Marla Higgins-Bee; and Senator Rhoads's longtime attorney, Jessica Faige.

Senator San Buenaventura welcomed Hayden Konanui, a Hilo resident and former constituent who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Aquino noted that the Senate had joined the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii and Hawai'i Women in Tech in organizing the Empowering Women in Tech panel, which had taken place at 10:00 a.m. in Conference Room 309; and Capitol Connect: Hawaii's Tech Ecosystem, which would take place that afternoon from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the fourth floor of the Capitol. Senator Aquino explained that the new events highlighted female leaders, Hawai'i's rising stars, in the tech community and showcased IT Sector Partnerships and their contributions to the state's economy and broader community. Senator Aquino acknowledged the following members of IT Sector Partnerships: Trung Lam, head of community at ThriveHI; Kai Sunahara and Amberlene Thompson, from Pacxa; Vincent Brathwaite, CEO and founder of Gidens; Sandi Kanemori, from Hawai'i Technology Development Corporation; Kat Duran-Higa and Bhanu Tanaka, from Terraknox; Benson Choo, from the CIO Council of Hawai'i; and Samantha Larson, from AE Consulting. Senator Aquino then recognized Margaret Schmitt, director Sandra von Doetinchem, founder Jennifer De Rose, Vice President Kia Yang, director Meeta Vu, director Cindy Madden, Rani Naidu, and Jennifer Moura from Hawai'i Women in Tech. Senator Aquino also introduced, from the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii, president and CEO Sherry Menor; Tonga Hopoi, vice president of economic development, government & community relations; Nadia Holt, manager of economic development, government & community relations; McKenna Dale, workforce development manager; and Lord Ryan Lizardo. Senator Aquino then welcomed the Empowering Women in Tech panelists who were present in the gallery: Joelle Simonpietri, owner of Simonpietri Enterprises; state Chief Information Officer Christine Sakuda; Dr. Olga Boric-Lubecke, of UH; and Nicole Cacal, executive director of TRUE Initiative and Oahu Workforce Development Board member.

Senator Inouye recognized visitors from Ka 'Umeke Kā'eo Public Charter School, located in Keaukaha in Hilo: student body government advisor and special education teacher Kumu Melissa Akoni; twelfth grader Ke'alohi Holomalia; tenth graders Kauila Benz-Marrs and Kamamalu Killon; and eighth graders Keoua Poepoe and Kilolani Smith. Senator Inouye then welcomed Sherry Menor of the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii, a former resident of Hilo.

Senator Lee explained that the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL), a trade group of legislators that bridged the divide between states and helped connect legislators to have

conversations around policy and collaboration to address the issues they faced, had been created by state legislators and staff in 1975. Senator Lee acknowledged Martha Saenz, associate director of the Women's Legislative Network and the Quad Caucus of NCSL. Senator Lee observed that Ms. Saenz was Hawai'i's liaison to the legislative connections around the country and that she also led strategic programs and events designed to serve targeted members. Accompanying her in the gallery were her sister and niece.

Senator Richards introduced visitors from Waimea who were seated in the gallery: students Ella Tanimoto, Rylee Erwin, Diego Santiago, Olivia Hodges, and Louis Walton from Waimea Middle Public Conversion Charter School and Maile Mangauil, Keala Campbell, Laua'e Silva, Kalae Dos Remedios, Marques Wilkins, and Marlie Kaho'opi'i from Kanu o ka 'Āina New Century Public Charter School.

Senator Keohokalole recognized students from windward charter schools who had joined visitors from other charter schools across the state in visiting the Capitol to learn about state government, the legislative process, and the role civic engagement played in shaping island communities. Present in the gallery were Alexa Lum, Arielle Lum, and Cynthia Willhite.

At this time, Senator DeCoite, on behalf of Senator Kidani and herself, reminded the members to join the Women's Legislative Caucus for their 26th annual Easter basket drive the following day, immediately following the House of Representatives floor session, on the Rotunda level. Senator DeCoite thanked those who had already donated baskets and noted that there was still time to drop off donations the following day or donate online.

Senator Awa rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

“If I can have your indulgence, members, for a minute. As some of you may already know, earlier this month, the state Department of Education abruptly fired our community’s beloved coach: a coach who led the Kahuku Red Raider football program to three consecutive state titles; a coach who took our team to a level no Hawai’i high school had ever been before by beating a defending national champion; and a coach who helped kids from the country go after their dreams at powerhouse universities like Texas, Arizona State, and Utah, among others.

“The state’s decision to get rid of our coach, Sterling Carvalho, stemmed from a complaint about conduct violations filed by the father of a former player more than a year ago. That complaint led to a DOE investigation, one that did not include players, coaches, or community. The report alleges our coach created a hostile environment, but, earlier this week, many of the team’s players went public, shocked over the allegations because they’ve never even heard their coach swear. Meanwhile, Carvalho’s lawyer, Michael Green, said this complaint had to do with playing time.

“We called DOE Superintendent Keith Hayashi to get to the bottom of this, and while he couldn’t give us specific details, he did clarify who makes these decisions, and, in this case, it came down to one decision-maker. Currently, we have an outraged community on the North Shore, and they’re calling for the firing of Kahuku’s principal and staff. While I know our principal has made numerous bad decisions, this was not hers. The DOE has chosen to restrict information to the public, and while they hide behind policy, we don’t have to. According to their boss, the decision came down to a single person (these do, anyway): the complex area superintendent. So, for my community wondering who’s to blame, the person’s name is Sam Izumi. He could have chosen other disciplinary action but instead used the DOE’s flawed process to tarnish the name of a man who helped hundreds of kids become better people.

“Our governor’s office is now looking into this matter, and we’re waiting for them to guide us on how we can appeal the DOE’s decision; we look forward to clearing our coach’s name and reuniting our community. And, you know, for any of the members: I know, Senator Aquino, you guys would love to have him at Waipahu; maybe Farrington would love to have him, maybe even Nānākuli. But he can’t coach at any public school currently because of what’s on his record. So, you know, we hope to clear his name. Mahalo.”

Senator Aquino invited the members to the fourth floor from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. for the Capitol Connect event.

Senator Dela Cruz reminded committee chairs and Ways and Means committee members to meet in Conference Room 211 following the conclusion of the Senate floor session.

At 11:55 a.m., on motion by Senator Wakai, seconded by Senator DeCorte and carried unanimously, the Senate stood in recess, and the Clerk was authorized to receive Senate bills that had passed Third Reading in an amended form in the House of Representatives.
