A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROTECTION FOR VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that existing legislation 1 and law enforcement activities in Hawaii are inadequate to deter 2 human trafficking and bring traffickers to justice. Hawaii law 3 does not penalize the full range of offenses involved in the 4 trafficking scheme. Instead, even the most brutal instances of 5 trafficking are punished under laws that also apply to lesser 6 offenses, allowing traffickers to escape deserved punishment. 7 The legislature also finds that the United States Congress 8 passed the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act, 9 the first comprehensive piece of legislation aimed at addressing 10 the range of injustices perpetrated by traffickers. Likewise, 11 to deter human trafficking, Hawaii must recognize that 12 trafficking is a serious offense. This is done, in the first 13 instance, by prescribing appropriate punishment and ensuring 14 that state anti-trafficking laws are compatible with the Victims 15 of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act. 16 The purpose of this Act is to establish a task force to 17

trafficking, which is a contemporary manifestation of slavery, 1 to ensure just and effective punishment of traffickers, prevent 2 or reduce human trafficking, and protect the rights of 3 trafficked persons. 4 SECTION 2. (a) There is established the Hawaii anti-5 trafficking task force. The anti-trafficking task force shall 6 be comprised of the following: The attorney general, or the attorney general's (1)8 designees; 9 The directors of health, human services, and labor, or (2) 10 11 their designees; The chief of police of each county or the chief's 12 (3) designee; 13 The prosecuting attorney of each county, or the 14 (4)prosecutor's designee; 15 The director of the victim and witness assistance 16 (5) program of the department of the prosecuting attorney, 17 city and county of Honolulu; 18 (6) The Salvation Army; 19 Sisters Offering Support; 20 (7)The Sex Abuse Treatment Center; 21 (8)

12	programs	that are related to the task force's activities.
13	(d)	Not less than twenty days prior to the convening of
14	the regul	ar sessions of 2007 and 2008, the task force shall
15	provide t	o the legislature a report on its activities.
16	(e)	The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2008.
17	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$5,000 or so much
19	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the
20	purpose o	f supporting the work of the anti-trafficking task
21	force est	ablished by section 2, including the payment of

- reasonable travel expenses for task force members to attend 1
- 2 meetings.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 3
- the attorney general for the purposes of this Act. 4
- SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006. 5
