A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The public utilities commission and the 1 division of consumer advocacy of the department of commerce and 2 consumer affairs serve indispensable functions that are 3 necessary to implement sound energy policies for the State of 4 5 Hawaii. However, both agencies face difficulties that diminish 6 their ability to perform effectively. These include: 7 Difficulty attracting and retaining qualified staff to 8 (1)perform the specialized duties entailed in utility 9 10 regulation; Specialized job requirements that do not correspond (2) 11 with existing job descriptions and classifications and 12 bureaucratic obstacles in changing job descriptions 13 14 and classifications;
- 15 (3) Salaries that are substantially below mainland agency
 16 or private-sector equivalents; and

1	(4) Agency organizational structures that are archaic and
2	do not support efficient work flow or the matching of
3	human resources to the required tasks.
4	Further, although both agencies purportedly have an
5	independent source of funding, that is, the public utilities
6	commission special fund and the compliance resolution fund,
7	because excess balances in the funds lapse into the general
8	fund, the result is restrictive oversight of the funds by the
9	department of budget and finance, the administration, and the
10	legislature.
11	Additionally, public utility commission staff salaries, in
12	addition to being limited by state job classification pay
13	scales, are limited by the "glass ceiling" established by the
14	commissioners' disproportionately low salaries.
15	The purpose of this Act is to adopt policies and reforms to
16	support the public utilities commission and the division of
17	consumer advocacy in their progressive and aggressive efforts to
18	protect ratepayers and the public and implement the State's
19	energy strategy. This Act also ensures that the public
20	utilities commission and the division of consumer advocacy have
21	the resources to timely and fairly address regulatory issues
22	regarding technological advances and operational efficiencies

- 1 that encourage balanced growth and investment and ensure system
- 2 reliability.
- 3 SECTION 2. Section 269-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 5 "(b) Effective July 1, $[\frac{2005}{7}]$ $\underline{2006}$, the chairperson of
- 6 the commission shall be paid a salary set at [eighty-seven] one
- 7 hundred per cent of the salary of the director of [human
- 8 resources development, commerce and consumer affairs, and each
- 9 of the other commissioners shall be paid a salary equal to
- 10 ninety-five per cent of the chairperson's salary. The
- 11 commissioners shall be exempt from chapters 76 and 89 but shall
- 12 be members of the state employees retirement system and shall be
- 13 eligible to receive the benefits of any state or federal
- 14 employee benefit program generally applicable to officers and
- 15 employees of the State, including those under chapter 87A.
- 16 The commission is placed within the department of budget
- 17 and finance for administrative purposes."
- 18 SECTION 3. Section 269-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 20 "(a) The chairperson of the public utilities commission
- 21 may appoint and employ [such] clerks, stenographers, agents,
- 22 engineers, accountants, and other assistants for the public

- 1 utilities commission as the chairperson finds necessary for the
- 2 performance of the commission's functions and define their
- 3 powers and duties. The chairperson may appoint, and at
- 4 pleasure, dismiss a chief administrator, research assistants,
- 5 economists, legal secretaries, enforcement officers, utility
- 6 analysts, legal assistants, and [such] hearings officers as may
- 7 be necessary. Notwithstanding section 103D-209(b), the
- 8 chairperson shall appoint one or more attorneys independent of
- 9 the attorney general who shall act as attorneys for the
- 10 commission and define their powers and duties and fix their
- 11 compensation. The chief administrator, research assistants,
- 12 economists, legal secretaries, enforcement officers, hearings
- 13 officers, utility analysts, legal assistants, and attorneys
- 14 shall be exempt from chapter 76. Other employees shall be
- 15 appointed as may be needed by the chairperson in accordance with
- 16 chapter 76."
- 17 SECTION 4. Section 269-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 18 amended as follows:
- 1. By amending its title to read:
- 20 "\$269-33 Public utilities commission special fund [-]:
- 21 suspension of public utility fees."
- 22 2. By amending subsection (d) to read:
