# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LITTER CONTROL.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that even though Hawaii
2	is known for its natural beauty, many communities in Hawaii
3	still suffer from rampant littering problems. One cause of the
4	problem is a lack of enforcement. Hawaii prohibits people from
5	littering from an automobile and in public. The State has even
6	made certain acts of littering a criminal offense. Although
7	Hawaii's population is approximately one million two hundred
8	thousand residents, the State prosecuted just over four hundred
9	violations of criminal littering or littering from a vehicle.
10	With enforcement lacking, a greater deterrent is necessary
11	to prevent people who live in and visit Hawaii from littering
12	the state's beautiful 'aina. Presently, the maximum allowable
13	fine assessed against any person who litters is \$500. As is
14	evidenced by the amount of litter seen strewn about the streets
15	in Hawaii, the present fine schedule is not serving its
16	deterrent purpose. This Act seeks to update the current fine
17	schedule to serve as a stronger deterrent to keep Hawaii
18	beautiful and clean.

1 SECTION 2. Section 291C-132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows: 3 The court shall fine the person convicted of 4 committing the offense of littering at least \$25, but not more than [\$500.] \$1,000." 5 SECTION 3. Section 339-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 7 amended to read as follows: 8 "§339-8 Penalties. Except as otherwise provided by this 9 chapter, any person violating any provision of this chapter or 10 any rule adopted [hereunder] under this chapter shall be guilty of a violation, and shall be fined not less than \$25, [and] but 11 not more than [\$500] \$1,000 for each offense, and ordered to 12 13 pick up and remove litter from a public place under the 14 supervision of the director as follows: 15  $(1)^{-1}$ For the first offense, [defendant] the violator shall 16 spend four hours of either picking up litter or 17 performing community service. 18 For any subsequent offense, [defendant] the violator (2) 19 shall spend eight hours of either picking up litter or 20 performing community service.

If the court judges the violator to be incapable of litter

removal and pick up, the court may provide some other community

- 1 work as it deems appropriate. All persons who are caught
- 2 littering shall be required to remove the litter that they
- 3 caused or shall be liable for the costs of removing that
- 4 litter."
- 5 SECTION 4. Section 708-829, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended as follows:
- 7 1. By amending subsection (1) to read:
- 8 "(1) A person commits the offense of criminal littering if
- 9 that person knowingly places, throws, or drops litter on any
- 10 public or private property or in any public or private waters,
- 11 except:
- 12 (a) In a place [which] that is designated by the
- department of health or the county for the disposal of
- 14 garbage and refuse;
- (b) Into a litter receptacle;
- 16 (c) Into a litter  $bag[\tau]$ ; provided that the bag is
- disposed of properly into a litter receptacle or in a
- place [which] that is designated by the department of
- health or the county for the disposal of garbage and
- refuse."
- 21 2. By amending subsection (4) to read:

3	(a)	For the first offense, [defendant] the person shall

10	(C)	The court shall fine the person convicted of	
11		committing the offense of criminal littering at least	
12		\$25, but not more than [\$500.] \$1,000."	
13	SECT	ION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that	
14	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were	
15	begun, before its effective date.		
16	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed		
17	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.		
18	SECT	ION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2096.
