A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the foundation of a 2 child's life is developed within the first eight years, and any 3 interruption in a child's development trajectory can require 4 expensive intervention in later years. There is a great need in 5 Hawaii for varied, high-quality care and learning options that 6 support the whole child with regard to health, special needs, 7 nutrition, physical development, safety, and early learning. 8 Interagency coordination and collaboration are essential to 9 ensure children's optimal development in all domains and the 10 most effective use of resources. Successful transition to 11 elementary school requires effective collaboration, 12 communication, and continuity between early learning sites and 13 elementary schools. 14 The purpose of this Act is to build upon the 2005 15 recommendations of the Early Childhood Education Task Force and by creating the framework for an early learning system which 16

will include an early learning authority, a public/private

- 3 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 5 to read as follows:

- 7 EARLY LEARNING SYSTEM
- 8 -1 Declaration of intent. The early learning system
- 9 will provide equal opportunities for early learning, health,
- 10 social, and family resources that are responsive to families.
- 11 The system is focused on providing quality early learning
- 12 experiences for children, recognizes families as children's
- 13 first and most important teachers, and provides for parental
- 14 choice among high quality learning settings that ensure
- 15 successful transition of all children to elementary school. The
- 16 system will provide for children's care and educational needs,
- 17 prenatal to age eight, through a seamless, coordinated, and
- 18 integrated system. Early learning districts, through their
- 19 respective community councils, would assess needs, find gaps,
- 20 and develop a plan to make use of the variety of early childhood
- 21 programs and services offered at an affordable price.

- 3 (b) The governor shall appoint an institute director, who
- 4 may be appointed without regard to chapters 76 and 77, who shall
- 5 be responsible for the institute. The institute director, in
- 6 collaboration with the institute advisory board and the
- 7 authority advisory board, shall:
- 8 (1) Develop and implement a compensation plan for the
 9 State to include incremental pay increases for all
 10 early learning childcare providers who meet plan
 11 requirements;
- 12 (2) Develop and implement a plan to support the

 13 recruitment and retention of the early childhood

 14 workforce for all early learning settings; and
- 15 (3) Develop and implement a plan to increase access to16 higher education and community-based training.

 18 appointed by the governor pursuant to section 26-34, whose
 19 members shall include representatives from center-based, family
 20 childcare, play and learn, and home visiting/parent education

- 5 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$3,500,000, or so
- 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, to
- 8 carry out the purposes of this Act, including the hiring of
- 9 necessary staff. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
- 10 department of education.

11 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.

Description:

Creates early childhood system including early learning authority, workforce and professional development institute; and early learning districts; establishes early childhood education task force as transitional board for early learning authority for one year. Appropriates \$3.5 million to support new system.
