A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WAGES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that a tip credit is
- 2 applied to the wages of employees who receive tips not dictated
- 3 by employer policy for services rendered. The current state tip
- 4 credit is 25 cents, which means employers can pay their
- 5 employees 25 cents less than the State's minimum wage and assume
- 6 that the employee will make up the difference in the amount of
- 7 tips received.
- 8 The legislature further finds that the tip credit has
- 9 remained generally unchanged since it was enacted in 1969 when
- 10 the minimum wage was \$1.60.
- 11 Furthermore, Hawaii's current tip credit of 25 cents is
- 12 significantly lower than the federal tip credit of \$3.02 and the
- 13 tip credit in the majority of other states. In twenty-one
- 14 states that allow tip credits, the average tip credit employers
- 15 can withhold is \$3.20, which is \$2.95 more than what Hawaii
- 16 employers withhold from their tipped employees.
- 17 As prices of utilities, other overhead costs, and the
- 18 State's minimum wage continue to rise, it is imperative that

- 1 employers find another means of reducing loss without having to
- 2 raise prices or cut jobs, which further impacts local families.
- 3 An increase to the current tip credit would allow employers to
- 4 continue to remain in profitable business and still allow tipped
- 5 employees to earn wages that are equivalent to or more than the
- 6 State's minimum wage. The purpose of this Act is to increase
- 7 the tip credit by 50 cents in 2006 and 50 cents in 2007.
- 8 SECTION 2. Section 387-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 "\$387-2 Minimum wages. Except as provided in section
- 11 387-9 and this section, every employer shall pay to each
- 12 employee employed by the employer, wages at the rate of not less
- 13 than:
- 14 (1) \$6.25 per hour beginning January 1, 2003;
- 15 (2) \$6.75 per hour beginning January 1, 2006; and
- 16 (3) \$7.25 per hour beginning January 1, 2007.
- 17 The hourly wage of a tipped employee may be deemed to be
- 18 increased on account of tips if the employee is paid not less
- 19 than $[\frac{25}{2}]$:
- 20 (1) 75 cents below the applicable minimum wage in 2006;
- 21 and
- (2) \$1.25 below the applicable minimum wage in 2007

- 1 by the employee's employer and the combined amount the employee
- 2 receives from the employee's employer and in tips is at least 50
- 3 cents more than the applicable minimum wage."
- 4 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

6 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
