## A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION FOR THE HAWAII YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITY.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act is recommended by the governor for
- 2 immediate passage in accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 3 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.
- 4 SECTION 2. Act 178, Session Laws of Hawaii 2005,
- 5 appropriated \$6,278,187 to the department of human services
- 6 (DHS), office of youth services (OYS) to operate the Hawaii
- 7 youth correctional facility (HYCF) for fiscal year 2005-2006. A
- 8 critical funding emergency exists regarding the on-going
- 9 operations of HYCF.
- On August 4, 2005, the United States Department of Justice
- 11 (DOJ) issued a findings letter concerning its investigation of
- 12 the conditions at HYCF. In the findings letter, DOJ concluded
- 13 that the State failed to protect confined juveniles from harm,
- 14 provided inadequate access to mental health and medical care,
- 15 and provided inadequate access to education instruction for
- 16 youth with disabilities.

Effective on February 9, 2006, DOJ and the State entered
1
    into a memorandum of agreement to settle the issues identified
2
    in the August 4, 2005, findings letter. The State agreed to
3
    take substantive remedial measures in the areas of protecting
4
    confined juveniles from harm, training HYCF staff, providing
5
    confined juveniles with access to medical and mental health
6
    care, and providing confined juveniles with access to special
7
    education services. The State also agreed to document its
8
    compliance with the provisions of the memorandum of agreement,
9
    to implement a quality improvement program, and to engage a
10
    federal monitor.
11
         To comply with the memorandum of agreement, OYS must reform
12
    HYCF's policies and procedures to ensure that daily practices,
13
    reporting, and monitoring by direct care and support staff
14
    reduce the likelihood of suicide, self harm, staff abuse, and
15
    juvenile-on-juvenile assaults. OYS must also develop and
16
    implement a training program for HYCF staff on the reformed
17
    policies and procedures. To improve access of confined
18
    juveniles to medical and mental health care, OYS must improve
19
    interdisciplinary communication among medical and mental health
20
    staff, including department of health (DOH) staff, and develop a
21
    centralized management system to make key information on
22

- 1 confined juveniles reasonably available to medical and mental
- 2 health care staff. To improve access of confined juveniles to
- 3 special education services, OYS must collaborate with the
- 4 department of education (DOE) to provide special education,
- 5 vocational education, and section 504 educational services
- 6 within a reasonable time following intake at HYCF. As part of
- 7 the memorandum of agreement, OYS must document and report on
- 8 improvement efforts to DOJ and to the federal monitor.
- 9 To make the required improvements, OYS has, through an
- 10 interagency personnel act exchange with the juvenile justice
- 11 division of the federal Bureau of Prisons, engaged a chief
- 12 technical advisor to the HYCF administrator. In addition, OYS
- 13 has procured one consultant and seeks to procure the services of
- 14 a team of four other consultants with expertise in key areas to
- 15 work with HYCF project teams on memorandum-required
- 16 improvements. OYS will seek to engage a clinical director to
- 17 assist with interdepartmental program coordination and in-
- 18 facility service improvement, as well as a training specialist
- 19 to develop and implement the required training plan for HYCF
- 20 staff, volunteers, HYCF contractual employees, and appropriate
- 21 OYS employees. To satisfy the requirements of the memorandum of

         DOH provides mental health services at HYCF. For the State
11
    to meet its commitments under the memorandum of agreement, DOH
12
    will require additional personnel to provide timely suicide risk
13
    assessments and evaluations, improved mental health care plans,
14
    monitoring of all confined juveniles for need for mental health
15
    services, training of HYCF staff on identifying juveniles at
16
    risk of suicide and suicide precautions, substance abuse
17
    counseling, quality assurance, and compliance monitoring.

         Likewise, DOE provides educational services at HYCF.

    the State to meet its commitments under the memorandum of

agreement, DOE will require additional funding and personnel.

21

The purpose of this Act is to appropriate additional 1 general fund moneys and authorize additional permanent and 2 temporary positions to permit HYCF to carry on its ongoing 3 operations and to allow DHS, OYS, DOH, and DOE to comply with 4 the State's obligations under the memorandum of agreement with 5 6 DOJ. SECTION 3. Act 178, Session Laws of Hawaii 2005, is 7 amended by adding a new section to part III to read as follows: 8 "SECTION 40.1. Provided that of the temporary youth 9 correctional officer positions authorized to be funded by the 10 general fund appropriation for youth residential programs (HMS 11 503), nineteen positions shall be made permanent." 12 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1 or so much thereof 14 as may be necessary for fiscal year 2005-2006 for the department 15 of human services to carry out the purposes of this Act, 16 including the addition of nine permanent and seven temporary 17 positions (HMS503 - youth residential programs) and other 18 19 expenses. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 20

human services for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
1
    revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of $1 or so much thereof
2
    as may be necessary for fiscal year 2005-2006 for the department
3
    of health to carry out the purposes of this Act, including the
4
    addition of seven temporary positions (HTH460 - child and
5
    adolescent mental health) and other expenses.

         The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
7
    health for the purposes of this Act.
8
         SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
9
    revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of $1 or so much thereof
10
    as may be necessary for fiscal year 2005-2006 for the department
11
    of education to carry out the purposes of this Act, including
12
    the addition of permanent and temporary positions (EDN
13
                   ) and other expenses.
14
         The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
15
    education for the purposes of this Act.
16
         SECTION 7. Any provision of this Act to the contrary
17
    notwithstanding, the appropriations authorized under this Act
18
    shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the
19
    appropriations were made. All unexpended and unencumbered
20
   balances of the appropriations made in this Act as of the close
21
    of business on June 30, 2007, shall lapse.
