# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that citizen		
2	participation in elections is vital to the health and well-being		
3	of a democracy and representative form of government. When the		
4	citizenry opts out of their responsibility to vote, public		
5	confidence and support of government is undermined, as is the		
6	government's effectiveness in serving the people of the State.		
7	In 2004, Hawaii had the lowest voter turnout in the United		
8	States, with a showing of 48.9 per cent of eligible voters		
9	actually voting. To combat voter apathy, community-based		
10	efforts aimed at: increasing the percentage of voting age		
11	citizens who are registered; educating voters on the candidates		
12	and ballot questions; and informing voters of their polling		
13	locations and methods of voting must be implemented. The		
14	legislature further finds that the low voter turnout is a		
15	significant concern that must be addressed.		
16	The purpose of this Act is to establish a task force to		
17	study reasons for low voter turnout in the State and make
