A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that recent neuroscience
2	research demonstrates that a child's early years are the most
3	crucial in the child's cognitive, emotional, social, and
4	physical development. The legislature affirms that there are
5	tremendous opportunities for preventive work with children and
6	families as well as the predictable, costly consequences of not
7	doing so. The legislature further finds that quality early
8	childhood education and child care that support all aspects of
9	early development are crucial to ensuring that every child
10	starts their formal education healthy, safe, and ready to learn
11	and succeed. A child's ability to function in the classroom is
12	essential. This can be achieved by assuring that each child can
13	hear, see, and speak at a minimal level prior to starting
14	school.
15	The legislature further finds that early screening,
16	identification, and intervention for developmental delays and
17	psychosocial problems improve children's outcomes and have a
18	critical influence on school success and family functioning.

- 1 The ideal is for each child to have ongoing access to quality
- 2 primary health care and, to the greatest extent possible, a safe
- 3 home and community environment. However, not all children have
- 4 access to quality primary health care prior to the start of
- 5 school. It is in the state's interest to provide developmental
- 6 screening and assessment that will detect deficiencies and
- 7 provide corrections before they hinder a child's ability to
- 8 function in school.
- 9 The departments of health, education, and human services
- 10 currently provide families access to various community health
- 11 services. However, parents are often unaware of or choose not
- 12 to avail themselves of these services. Meanwhile, their
- 13 children do not receive proper screening, evaluation, and
- 14 referrals for correction or treatment.
- The purpose of this Act is to provide a means for a child
- 16 to be screened prior to the start of the child's education, at
- 17 the child's first entry into preschool and or elementary school,
- 18 to provide for diagnosis, referral, correction or treatment, and
- 19 to integrate the efforts of community and state organizations
- 20 related to screening under this, Hawaii childhood screening
- 21 initiative.

SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 2 and to read as follows: 3 Early childhood screenings. (a) Prior to the 4 "§321start of a child's entry into either preschool or kindergarten, 5 the parents or guardians of a child shall have the child 6 screened for vision, hearing, and development. Screening 7 certification of the child may be provided by: 8 (1) The child's pediatrician; or 9 (2) Any primary healthcare provider. 10 If the child does not have a pediatrician or primary healthcare 11 provider, the department may provide the screening or refer the 12 child to a primary health care provider at no cost to the child 13 14 or family. Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, a certificate of 15 screening shall be presented to the school where the student 16 enters preschool; and at kindergarten or first grade, whichever 17 is the entry grade level for elementary school. 18 The department of health shall be the lead department in 19 the development of screening guidelines, and shall administer **20** the screening and certification process in collaboration with 21 the departments of education and human services within the 22

         SECTION 3. There is established the Hawaii childhood

15	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general		
16	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000 or so much		
17	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the		
18	planning, implementation, and evaluation of early childhood		
19	screenings.		
20	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
21	health for the purposes of this Act.
