A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that recent neuroscience
2	research demonstrates that a child's early years are the most
3	crucial in the child's cognitive, emotional, social, and
4	physical development. The legislature affirms that there are
5	tremendous opportunities for preventive work with children and
6	families as well as the predictable, costly consequences of not
7	doing so. The legislature further finds that quality early
8	childhood education and child care that support all aspects of
9	early development are crucial to ensuring that every child
10	starts his or her formal education healthy, safe, and ready to
11	learn and succeed. A child's ability to function in the
12	classroom is essential. This goal can be achieved by assuring
13	that each child can hear, see, and speak at a minimal level
14	prior to starting school.
15	The legislature further finds that early screening,
16	identification, and intervention for developmental delays and
17	psychosocial problems improve children's outcomes and have a
18	critical influence on school success and family functioning.

- 1 The ideal is to provide each child with ongoing access to
- 2 quality primary health care and, to the greatest extent
- 3 possible, a safe home and community environment. However, not
- 4 all children have access to quality primary health care prior to
- 5 the start of school. It is in the state's interest to provide
- 6 developmental screening and assessment that will detect
- 7 deficiencies and provide corrections before they hinder a
- 8 child's ability to function in school.
- 9 The departments of health, education, and human services
- 10 currently provide families access to various community health
- 11 services. However, parents are often unaware of or choose not
- 12 to avail themselves of these services. Meanwhile, their
- 13 children do not receive proper screening, evaluation, and
- 14 referrals for correction or treatment.
- The purpose of this Act is to provide a means for a child
- 16 to be screened prior to the start of the child's education, at
- 17 the child's first entry into preschool and elementary school, to
- 18 provide for diagnosis, referral, correction or treatment, and to
- 19 integrate the efforts of community and state organizations
- 20 related to screening under this Hawaii childhood screening
- 21 initiative.

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SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
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    and to read as follows:
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                     Early childhood screenings. (a) Prior to the

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    the parents or guardians of a child shall have the child

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(e) A waiver signed by a child's parents or guardian
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    indicating that they do not want to have the child screened
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    based on their religious beliefs shall be accepted by the school

12	(4) Address issues related to physician participation; and		
13	(5) Evaluate compliance and appropriateness of referrals.		
14	(f) The task force shall submit to the legislature an		
15	annual report no later than twenty days prior the start of each		
16	regular session, beginning with the regular session of 2007, on		
17	the status of the early childhood screenings program and any		
18	recommended legislation necessary to improve the program.		
19	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general		
20	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1 or so much thereof		
21	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the planning,		
22	implementation, and evaluation of early childhood screenings.		

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- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 2 health for the purposes of this Act.

- 4 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.

Description:

Provides a means for childhood screening required for entry into school, from birth to eight years of age, and establishes a childhood screening taskforce. (HB3139 HD3)
