## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE JUDICIARY TO ESTABLISH AN APPROPRIATE FEE FOR COURT-ORDERED FORENSIC EVALUATIONS AND TO PROVIDE COPIES OF THE EXAMINATION REPORTS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Disability Rights Center studied a random sample of sixty-seven pretrial detainees who were the subject of court-ordered forensic examinations in 2001 and 2002; and

WHEREAS, each person's criminal justice proceeding was examined in depth to construct individual timelines for the mental health evaluation process provided under section 704-404, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the mental examination process averaged eightyfour days from the date of the issuance of the court's order for a mental health examination to the judicial ruling on the fitness to proceed; and

WHEREAS, during the forensic evaluation process, persons suspected of mental illness may remain in prison for weeks or months without appropriate mental health treatment; and

WHEREAS, thirty-five percent of all persons who undergo a forensic evaluation examination are declared unfit to proceed or are acquitted or conditionally released; and

WHEREAS, the initial period of evaluation was extended by the court for additional periods of thirty to one hundred and eighty days in 31.4 percent of the cases reviewed; and

WHEREAS, generally, pretrial detainees for misdemeanors who undergo one-panel forensic examinations are incarcerated far longer than the possible length of incarceration for conviction of the crime for which they are charged; and

34 35 WHEREAS, in response to concerns raised in this study, the Legislature has considered various measures aimed at streamlining the forensic evaluation process; and

WHEREAS, one particular source of delay which has been acknowledged is the inadequate compensation paid to the psychiatrists and psychologists who conduct the forensic evaluations; and

WHEREAS, this results in a lack of available professionals willing to undertake this function, thereby contributing substantially to the lengthy evaluation process; and

WHEREAS, the fee for forensic evaluations is currently set by Circuit Court Part D Criminal Administrative Order No. 4.1 at \$500; and

WHEREAS, this fee is a flat fee which does not take into account the number of hours devoted to conducting the evaluation; and

WHEREAS, this fee has not been raised by the Judiciary since 1992; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that if the fee were increased to an appropriate level of compensation, more professionals would be willing to conduct these evaluations, thereby expediting the process;

WHEREAS, while the Adult Mental Health Division of the Department of Health currently certifies those psychiatrists or psychologists who are appointed by the court to conduct forensic evaluations, the Department of Health has no statutory authority to monitor the quality or consistency of the reports; and

WHEREAS, this lack of a formal mechanism for the Department of Health to receive or review the examination reports further hinders the identification of the causes of delays in the evaluation process; and

WHEREAS, if the Department of Health could review the forensic reports, it could better monitor the overall system of mental health examinations, provide quality control oversight, and ensure that the reports are thorough, more consistent, and timely; and

WHEREAS, while there is no statutory mandate for the court to provide copies of the forensic reports to the Department of

Health, neither is there a statutory prohibition; now, therefore,
