## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 78, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 2 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated to read
- 3 as follows:
- 4 "§78- Department of transportation; civil engineering
- 5 scholarship program. (a) The department of transportation may
- 6 establish a civil engineering scholarship program open to high
- 7 school graduates of accredited high schools in Hawaii, or high
- 8 school graduates who are residents of Hawaii and who have
- 9 successfully completed a high school pre-college curriculum.
- 10 The department of transportation, highways division, shall
- establish, without regard to chapter 91, the criteria and
- 12 guidelines for the scholarship program that shall include but
- 13 not be limited to the qualification requirements, conditions for
- 14 the scholarship, reimbursement provisions, and alternate options
- 15 in which a scholarship participant may participate to otherwise
- 16 fulfill their employment obligation under a scholarship
- 17 agreement, if the participant is not hired by the department of
- 18 transportation, highways division.

1	(b) The tuition component amount of a civil engineering
2	scholarship award shall be limited to the resident tuition cost
3	of the University of Hawaii at Manoa.
4	(c) Students awarded scholarships shall agree by contract,
5	with the written approval of a parent or guardian when the
6	applicant is under eighteen years of age, to apply for full-time
7	civil service employment with the department of transportation,
8	highways division, immediately after graduation from an
9	accredited civil engineering program at the University of Hawai:
10	and, accept any position offered, and if hired, complete one
11	year of full-time employment with the department of
12	transportation, highways division, for each school year in the
13	scholarship program. A participant who fails to:
14	(1) Graduate from an accredited civil engineering program
15	at the University of Hawaii; or
16	(2) Apply for employment with the department of
17	transportation, highways division, immediately upon
18	graduation as provided in this subsection or in
19	subsection (f); or
20	(3) Accept any position offered by the department of
21	transportation, highways division,

shall reimburse the department of transportation, highways 1 division, the full amount of moneys received. 2 (d) A participant who leaves the department of 3 transportation, highways division, before completing the 4 required number of years of employment shall reimburse the 5 department of transportation, highways division, the full amount 6 of scholarship moneys received by the participant for each year 7 of scholarship that corresponds to each year for which the 8 participant fails to complete the employment requirement. 9 (e) Summer employment may be offered by the department of 10 transportation, highways division, to scholarship students. The 11 department of transportation, highways division, shall establish 12 guidelines to effectuate this subsection. 13 (f) The department of transportation's guidelines for this 14 program will address situations where participants may wish to 15 postpone their work commitment to pursue a masters degree in 16 17 civil engineering." SECTION 2. Chapter 304, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 19 and to read as follows: 20 "§304- Hawaii state scholars program. (a) There is 21

1	by the University of Hawaii. This program shall be used to
2	provide financial assistance in the form of scholarships for up
3	to four years to any qualified student enrolled at any campus of
4	the University of Hawaii with the possibility of renewal for a
5	fifth year in exceptional circumstances.
6	(b) Appropriations for the state scholars program shall be
7	deposited into the University of Hawaii student scholarship and
8	assistance special fund established pursuant to section
9	304-16.6. The number of scholarships awarded and amount of each
10	scholarship shall be determined by the university and subject to
11	the availability of funds.
12	The University of Hawaii shall offer scholarships to pay
13	for educational costs, such as tuition, fees, books, housing,
14	and other educational costs; provided that the scholarship
15	applicant:
16	(1) Is a bona fide resident of the State of Hawaii, for
17	tuition purposes, at the time of admission to the
18	university;
19	(2) Presents evidence of academic excellence by meeting
20	one or more of the following:

3	by a combination of state and private funds. The board of

6	be expended unless matched by private funds on a dollar-for-
7	dollar basis.
8	(b) To be eligible for state matching funds, a University
9	of Hawaii campus chancellor shall submit a proposal for each
10	proposed endowed chair to the president of the University of
11	Hawaii for review and consideration. The president of the
12	University of Hawaii shall take into account the following
13	criteria before approving state matching funds to establish a
14	position and recruit candidates:
15	(1) The ability for the position to contribute to Hawaii's
16	economic development;
17	(2) The ability for the position to make a significant
18	contribution to the university's academic quality; and
19	(3) The ability for the position to obtain significant
20	amounts of annual research from highly competitive
21	grant sources.

1	(c) The review process shall consider the field and its
2	potential funding sources, relationship to existing research at
3	the University of Hawaii and in the State of Hawaii, size and
4	scope of related industries, and other relevant factors.
5	(d) The University of Hawaii shall prepare and submit an
6	annual report on the status of the eminent scholars special fund
7	to the legislature at least twenty days before the convening of
8	each regular session."
9	SECTION 4. Chapter 304, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
11	and to read as follows:

19	(1)	Have graduated from the William S. Richardson school
20		of law of the University of Hawaii;
21	(2)	Be licensed to practice law in the state under chapte:
22		605; and

1	(3)	Practice law in the public interest in the state, as
2		determined by the administrator in consultation with
3		the advisory committee, including but not limited to
4		providing direct legal services through:
5		(A) A legal services organization that serves clients
6		more than seventy per cent of whom are low-income
7		persons according to applicable federal income
8		guidelines;
9		(B) The department of the prosecuting attorney of any
10		county;
11		(C) The child support enforcement agency of the
12		state;
13		(D) The office of the state public defender; and
14		(E) A non-profit organization under Section 501(c)(3)
15		of the Internal Revenue Code.
16	(d)	The administrator shall make loan repayment assistance
17	available	to eligible attorneys on a biannual basis. As a
18	condition	of receiving such assistance, the attorney shall sign
19	a written	commitment with the public interest law loan repayment
20	program i	n which the attorney shall agree to practice in a
21	qualifyin	g organization for a minimum of three years. In

1	addition,	the attorney shall notify the administrator in writing
2	within th	irty days of the date the attorney:
3	(1)	Leaves employment with the qualifying organization; or
4	(2)	Takes a leave of absence from the qualifying
5		organization.
6	(e)	In consultation with the advisory committee, the
7	administr	ator shall:
8	(1)	Determine the total amount of annual loan repayment
9		assistance available under the public interest law
10		loan repayment program; and
11	(2)	Establish selection criteria for eligibility for the
12		program based upon need and merit.
13	<u>The</u>	administrator shall use the following two-tiered
14	approach	in determining the priority of applicants and amount of
15	loan repa	yment assistance provided:
16	(1)	First, the demonstrated need of the applicant, which
17		shall be based on the applicant's salary, personal
18		resources, and amount of law school debt; and
19	(2)	Second, the legal practice in areas where the need for
20		public interest attorneys in the state is high.

1	After usi	ng the two-tiered approach, the administrator shall
2	use, but	is not limited to, the following criteria for selecting
3	among the	applicants for the program:
4	(1)	The applicant's commitment to public interest law, to
5		be determined by reviewing the applicant's record of
6		employment and volunteer services, taking into
7		consideration an applicant's need for remunerative
8		employment while attending law school; and
9	(2)	The applicant's record of academic achievement.
10	The a	applicant shall provide to the public interest law loan
11	repayment	program the information listed above and other
12	informatio	on as required, in an application form to be prepared
13	by the pro	ogram.
14	<u>(f)</u>	The advisory committee shall comprise nine members
15	appointed	by the administrator, including but not limited to:
16	(1)	Attorneys licensed to practice law in the state,
17		particularly those practicing law in the public
18		<pre>interest;</pre>
19	(2)	Faculty members of the William S. Richardson school of
20		law of the University of Hawaii;
21	(3)	Members of the general public; and

1	(4) A student representative of the William S. Richardson
2	school of law of the University of Hawaii.
3	(g) Nothing in this section shall be construed to create
4	in any attorney a right to any loan repayment assistance or any
5	specific amount of assistance offered under the public interest
6	law loan repayment program.
7	(h) There shall be established a special fund to be known
8	as the William S. Richardson school of law public interest law
9	loan repayment program special fund, into which all
10	appropriations, donations, and gifts shall be deposited. The
11	administrator may use any amount of the moneys in the fund to
12	provide eligible attorneys with loan repayment assistance. Upon
13	determination by the administrator, the fiscal officer of the
14	William S. Richardson school of law of the University of Hawaii
15	shall disburse payments to eligible attorneys. The
16	administrator shall submit an annual report to the legislature
17	of an accounting of the program and the fund at least twenty
18	days prior to the convening of each regular session."
19	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the highways
20	special fund, highways administration, (TRN 595) the sum of
21	\$100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year

- 1 2006-2007 to implement the department of transportation's
- 2 engineering scholarship program.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 transportation, highways division, for the purposes of section 1
- 5 of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1 or so much thereof
- 8 as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the purposes
- 9 of section 2 of this Act.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be deposited into the student
- 11 scholarship and assistance special fund established pursuant to
- 12 section 304-16.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and shall be expended
- 13 by the University of Hawaii for scholarships for the Hawaii
- 14 state scholars program.
- 15 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much
- 17 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the
- 18 state eminent scholars special fund.
- 19 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 20 Hawaii for the purposes of section 3 of this Act.
- 21 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$200,000 or so much

- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the
- 2 William S. Richardson school of law public interest law loan
- 3 repayment program.
- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the William S.
- 5 Richardson school of law public interest law loan repayment
- 6 program for the purpose of section 4 of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 9. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
