A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VETERINARIANS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The legislature finds that there are not enough 1 SECTION 1. 2 homes to accommodate the seventy thousand puppies and kittens born every day across the nation. In six years, one fertile 3 female and male dog and their offspring could produce sixty-4 seven thousand puppies. In seven years, a pair of male and 5 6 female cats and their offspring could produce four hundred 7 twenty thousand kittens. In Hawaii, the problem of unwanted animals is widespread. 8 9 Some animals are abandoned and appear in shopping centers, 10 hotels, small businesses, subdivisions, and residents' 11 backyards. Many of these abandoned animals are unable to survive and die from starvation, disease, abuse, or when struck 12 13 by cars. Each year in Hawaii, thousands of healthy, unwanted 14 animals are euthanized because there are not enough homes for 15 them. Studies show that spaying and neutering are the most 16 17 effective and efficient means to control animal overpopulation,

as well as to prevent abandonment and animal cruelty. However,

- 1 there is a lack of qualified veterinarians to perform these
- 2 services. The problem is especially acute in the county of
- 3 Hawaii. The surgery facility at Keaau and Kona Humane Society
- 4 has been without a veterinarian for over two years. As a
- 5 result, adoption periods are delayed because private
- 6 veterinarians are overwhelmed with sterilizations. In efforts
- 7 to help control animal overpopulation, local veterinarians have
- 8 contributed nearly one thousand low-cost spay and neuter
- 9 services each year. Although helpful, it is not enough to cover
- 10 the additional five thousand spay and neuter surgeries needed
- 11 annually for the Hawaii Humane Society. More veterinarians are
- 12 needed to help control animal overpopulation.
- 13 Veterinarians from other states who are vacationing in
- 14 Hawaii have demonstrated an interest in assisting the State by
- 15 volunteering to spay and neuter animals. However, Hawaii law
- 16 only authorizes veterinarians licensed in the State of Hawaii to
- 17 perform these services.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to allow out-of-state
- 19 veterinarians who are licensed in good standing by another
- 20 state, to obtain a temporary veterinary license to perform
- 21 veterinary services in Hawaii.

1	SECTION 2. Chapter 471, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
3	and to read as follows:

7	ninety days to an applicant who has not fulfilled the

9	section a	nd is	found by the board to be fit for licensure.
10	<u>(b)</u>	The	applicant shall:
11	(1)	Pay	all required fees;
12	(2)	Subm	it a completed application;
13	(3)	<u>Veri</u>	fy that the applicant:
14		(A)	Has graduated from a general veterinarian
15			education program accredited by the American
16			Veterinary Medical Association;
17		(B)	Holds a current active license issued by another
18			state with licensing standards at least
19			equivalent to Hawaii's standards that is not
20			revoked, suspended, or otherwise restricted;
21		<u>(C)</u>	Has not been subject to disciplinary action by
22			any jurisdiction in which the applicant is or has

1		been previously licensed to practice veterinary

4		review that action to determine if it warrants	
5		refusal to issue a temporary license to the	
6		applicant; and	
7		(D) Has no felony convictions of any kind and no	
8		other criminal convictions that may affect the	
9		applicant's ability to render competent	
10		<pre>veterinary care;</pre>	
11	(4)	Submit a self-query report from the National	
12		Practitioner Data Bank and verification of	
13		registration status with the federal Drug Enforcement	
14		Administration. The board shall review this	
15		information to determine if it warrants refusal to	
16		issue a license to the applicant; and	
17	(5)	Submit any other information required by the board to	
18		determine the applicant's fitness for licensure."	
19	SECT	ION 3. Section 471-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
20	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:		
21	"(a)	[No] Except as provided under section 471- , no	
22	person shall be licensed to practice veterinary medicine unless		

- 1 the person has passed an examination of the qualifications and
- 2 fitness to engage in the practice of veterinary medicine given
- 3 by the board of veterinary examiners. Before any applicant
- 4 shall be eligible for examination under this chapter the
- 5 applicant, at least sixty days before the date set for
- 6 examination, shall file an application in the form as shall be
- 7 prescribed by the board, pay to the department of commerce and
- 8 consumer affairs application and examination fees, and furnish
- 9 proof satisfactory to the board that the applicant:
- 10 (1) Is eighteen or more years of age; and
- 11 (2) Is a graduate of a veterinary college meeting all the
- standards established by the American Veterinary
- 13 Medical Association, or, in lieu thereof, has actively
- 14 practiced for ten out of twelve years immediately
- preceding the date of application in a state having
- 16 standards for licensing comparable to those in this
- 17 State."
- 18 SECTION 4. Section 471-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- "(b) [All] Except as provided in section 471- , all
- 21 licenses issued by the board shall expire on June 30 of each
- 22 even-numbered year next following the date of issuance."

- 1 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 4 provided that the board of veterinary examiners shall begin to
- 5 accept applications for licensure under section 2 no later than

6 September 1, 2006.

Description:

Authorizes, upon certain conditions and without examination, temporary licensure of veterinarians who are licensed in good standing in another state that has licensing standards equivalent to or higher than Hawaii's.
