### A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SALARY COMMISSION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to propose an 2 amendment to the Constitution of the State of Hawaii to 3 establish a salary commission responsible for reviewing and 4 recommending changes to salaries for justices and judges, 5 members of the state legislature, the governor and lieutenant 6 governor, and heads of state departments and their assistants, 7 excluding the University of Hawaii and the department of 8 education. 9 SECTION 2. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of 10 Hawaii is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately 11 designated and to read as follows: 12 "SALARY COMMISSION 13 **Section** . There shall be a commission on salaries as 14 provided by law, which shall review and recommend salaries for the justices and judges of all state courts, members of the 15 legislature, department heads, executive officers and the 16 17 deputies or assistants to department heads of the departments

1	provided by law, excluding the University of Hawaii and the
2	department of education. The commission shall also review and
3	make recommendations for the salary of the administrative
4	director of the State or equivalent position and the
5	compensation of the governor and the lieutenant governor.
6	Any compensation established pursuant to this section shall
7	not be decreased during a term of office, unless by general law
8	applying to all salaried officers of the State.
9	Not later than the fortieth legislative day of the 2007
10	regular legislative session and every eight years thereafter,
11	the commission shall submit to the legislature its
12	recommendations and then dissolve.
13	The recommended salaries submitted shall become effective
14	as provided in the recommendation, unless the legislature
15	disapproves the entire recommendation as a whole by adoption of
16	a concurrent resolution prior to adjournment sine die of the
17	legislative session in which the recommendation is submitted."
18	SECTION 3. Article III, section 9, of the Constitution of
19	the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows:
20	"[SALARY;] LEGISLATIVE ALLOWANCES[; COMMISSION ON
21	LEGISLATIVE SALARY]

1	Section 9. The members of the legislature shall receive
2	allowances reasonably related to expenses as provided by law[ $ au$
3	and a salary prescribed by the commission on legislative
4	salaries pursuant to this section which shall be payable in
5	installments and at such times as provided by law.
6	There shall be a commission on legislative salary, which
7	shall be appointed by the governor on or before November 30,
8	1978, and every eight years thereafter. Not later than the
9	fortieth legislative day of the 1979 regular legislative session
10	and every eight years thereafter, the commission shall submit to
11	the legislature and the governor recommendations for a salary
12	for members of the legislature, and then dissolve. The
13	recommended salary submitted shall become effective as provided
14	in the recommendation unless the legislature disapproves the
15	recommendation by adoption of a concurrent resolution prior to
16	adjournment sine die of the legislative session in which the
17	recommendation is submitted or the governor disapproves the
18	recommendation by a message of disapproval transmitted to the
19	legislature prior to such adjournment. Any change in salary
20	which becomes effective shall not apply to the legislature to
21	which the recommendation for the change in salary was
22	submitted]."

SECTION 4. Article VI, section 3, of the Constitution of 1 2 the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows: "APPOINTMENT OF JUSTICES AND JUDGES 3 Section 3. The governor, with the consent of the senate, 4 shall fill a vacancy in the office of the chief justice, supreme 5 court, intermediate appellate court and circuit courts, by 6 appointing a person from a list of not less than four, and not 7 8 more than six, nominees for the vacancy, presented to the 9 governor by the judicial selection commission. If the governor fails to make any appointment within thirty 10 11 days of presentation, or within ten days of the senate's rejection of any previous appointment, the appointment shall be 12 made by the judicial selection commission from the list with the 13 consent of the senate. If the senate fails to reject any 14 15 appointment within thirty days thereof, it shall be deemed to have given its consent to such appointment. If the senate shall 16 17 reject any appointment, the governor shall make another 18 appointment from the list within ten days thereof. The same 19 appointment and consent procedure shall be followed until a valid appointment has been made, or failing this, the commission 20 21 shall make the appointment from the list, without senate

consent.

1	The chief justice, with the consent of the senate, shall
2	fill a vacancy in the district courts by appointing a person
3	from a list of not less than six nominees for the vacancy
4	presented by the judicial <u>selection</u> commission. If the chief
5	justice fails to make the appointment within thirty days of
6	presentation, or within ten days of the senate's rejection of
7	any previous appointment, the appointment shall be made by the
8	judicial selection commission from the list with the consent of
9	the senate. The senate must hold a public hearing and vote on
10	each appointment within thirty days of any appointment. If the
11	senate fails to do so, the nomination shall be returned to the
12	commission and the commission shall make the appointment from
13	the list without senate consent. The chief justice shall
14	appoint per diem district court judges as provided by law.
15	QUALIFICATIONS FOR APPOINTMENT
16	Justices and judges shall be residents and citizens of the
17	State and of the United States, and licensed to practice law by
18	the supreme court. A justice of the supreme court, a judge of
19	the intermediate appellate court and a judge of the circuit
20	court shall have been so licensed for a period of not less than
21	ten years preceding nomination. A judge of the district court

- shall have been so licensed for a period of not less than five 1 years preceding nomination. 2 No justice or judge shall, during the term of office, 3 engage in the practice of law, or run for or hold any other 4 office or position of profit under the United States, the State 5 6 or its political subdivisions. TENURE; [COMPENSATION;] RETIREMENT 7 The term of office of justices and judges of the supreme 8 court, intermediate appellate court and circuit courts shall be 9 ten years. Judges of district courts shall hold office for the 10 11 periods as provided by law. At least six months prior to the expiration of a justice's or judge's term of office, every 12 justice and judge shall petition the judicial selection 13 commission to be retained in office or shall inform the 14
- 15 commission of an intention to retire. If the judicial selection
  16 commission determines that the justice or judge should be
  17 retained in office, the commission shall renew the term of
  18 office of such justice or judge for the period provided by this
  19 section or by law.
- 20 [There shall be a salary commission to review and recommend
  21 salaries for justices and judges of all state courts. Justices
  22 and judges shall have salaries as provided by law. Their

1 compensation shall not be decreased during their respective 2 terms of office, unless by general law applying to all salaried officers of the State. They ] Justices and judges shall be 3 4 retired upon attaining the age of seventy years. They shall be 5 included in any retirement law of the State." 6 SECTION 5. Article V, section 3, of the Constitution of 7 the State of Hawaii is repealed. ["COMPENSATION: GOVERNOR, LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR 8 9 Section 3. The compensation of the governor and of the 10 licutenant governor shall be as provided by law, but shall not 11 be less than thirty-three thousand five hundred dollars, and 12 twenty-seven thousand five hundred dollars, respectively, a year. Such compensation shall not be increased or decreased for 13 14 their respective terms, unless by general law applying to all salaried officers of the State. When the lieutenant governor 15 succeeds to the office of the governor, the lieutenant governor 16 17 shall receive the compensation for that office."] SECTION 6. Article XVIII, section 3, of the Constitution 18 of the State of Hawaii is repealed. 19

#### 1 ["SALARIES OF LEGISLATORS Section 3. Until otherwise provided by law in accordance 2 with Section 9 of Article III, the salary of each member of the 3 4 legislature shall be twelve thousand dollars a year."] 5 SECTION 7. The question to be printed on the ballot shall be as follows: "Shall the Constitution be amended to provide for a 7 commission to review and recommend salaries for justices, 8 judges, state legislators, the governor, the lieutenant 9 10 governor, and state executive department heads and their assistants?" 11 SECTION 8. Constitutional material to be repealed is 12 bracketed and stricken. New constitutional material is 13 14 underscored. SECTION 9. This amendment shall take effect upon **15** compliance with article XVII, section 3, of the Constitution of 16 the State of Hawaii. 17 18 INTRODUCED BY:
