A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATED TO FIREWORKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that fires, injuries, and
- 2 property damage from fireworks increase during New Year's Eve
- 3 and Fourth of July celebrations, creating health and safety
- 4 concerns for the public and straining the resources of fire,
- 5 police, and emergency medical services. The safety and welfare
- 6 of the public will be better served by imposing stricter rules
- 7 on the sale and use of fireworks.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to allow the various counties to
- 9 enact more stringent laws than those imposed by the Hawaii
- 10 Revised Statutes and to restrict the sale and use of non-aerial
- 11 common fireworks on the Fourth of July in counties with
- 12 populations of over five hundred thousand.
- 13 SECTION 2. Section 132D-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended to read as follows:
- 15 "\$132D-3 Permissible uses of non-aerial common fireworks.
- 16 (a) Non-aerial common fireworks may be set off, ignited,
- 17 discharged, or otherwise caused to explode within the [State]
