A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PARKING FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 291, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 3 and to read as follows:
- 4 "\$291- Reimbursement to counties. The State shall
- 5 reimburse the counties for the unit cost of issuing the
- 6 removable and temporary removable windshield placards on behalf
- 7 of the State.
- 8 Beginning July 1, 2006, the rate of the per unit cost
- 9 reimbursement shall be \$12; provided that the rate shall be
- 10 adjusted for inflation, rounded up to the next whole dollar,
- 11 beginning July 1 of every even numbered year. The rate of
- 12 inflation shall be determined by the disability and
- 13 communication access board."
- 14 SECTION 2. Section 291-51.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended to read as follows:
- 16 "\$291-51.6 Issuance of temporary removable windshield
- 17 parking placards. Each county [may] shall issue one temporary
- 18 removable windshield placard and a second temporary removable

- 1 windshield placard to each applicant who requests and presents a
- 2 certificate of disability that verifies the duration of the
- 3 applicant's disability in monthly increments, which shall not
- 4 exceed six months, and upon payment of a fee to the issuing
- 5 agency. The temporary removable windshield placard shall be
- 6 designed, fabricated, and sold to the counties at a rate
- 7 negotiated by the disability and communication access board."
- 8 SECTION 3. Section 291-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 "§291-52 Issuance of removable windshield placard. Each
- 11 county [may] shall issue one removable windshield placard and a
- 12 second removable windshield placard to each applicant who so
- 13 requests and presents a certificate of disability that verifies
- 14 that the applicant's disability is expected to last for at least
- 15 four years. The removable windshield placard shall expire four
- 16 years after the date of its issuance. The removable windshield
- 17 placard shall be designed, fabricated, and sold to the counties
- 18 at a rate negotiated by the disability and communication access
- 19 board."
- 20 SECTION 4. Section 291-52.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

"§291-52.6 Replacement of a lost, stolen, or mutilated 1 2 placard or identification card. A removable windshield placard, temporary removable windshield placard, or identification card 3 that is reported lost, stolen, or mutilated [may] shall be 4 5 replaced upon the submittal of a written statement by a person with a disability that the placard or identification card was 6 either lost, stolen, or mutilated and a completed application 7 for a removable windshield placard, temporary removable 8 windshield placard, or identification card to the issuing 9 10 agency." SECTION 5. Section 291-56, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 11 12 amended to read as follows: 13 "§291-56 Rules. The disability and communication access board [may] shall adopt rules under chapter 91 to carry out the 14 purposes of this part, including rules for: 15 16 (1) The issuance, renewal, confiscation, revocation, and suspension of removable windshield placards, temporary 17 removable windshield placards, and special license 18 19 plates; Decertification, reciprocity, and the replacement of 20 (2) 21 placards and identification cards;

1	(3)	The design of the placard, identification card, and
2		special license plates;
3	(4)	The establishment of fees for placards;
4	(5)	Signage and marking of parking spaces; and

5 (6) Penalties.

6 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed

7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

8 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
