# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Throughout history, victims of emergencies or
- 2 disasters have often become victimized a second time by
- 3 opportunists who engage in civil unrest, looting, and other
- 4 crimes. Most recently, the world had a front-row seat to wide
- 5 spread criminal activity and looting following Hurricane
- 6 Katrina.
- 7 The legislature recognizes that if strong measures to
- 8 control law and order are not in place before a disaster or
- 9 emergency, civil unrest and looting and other crimes are likely
- 10 to increase after a disaster or emergency. The legislature also
- 11 recognizes that preventive measures require fewer resources than
- 12 those required to restore and rebuild.
- 13 The legislature also finds that when resources are needed
- 14 to restore law and order, emergency response aid to victims is
- 15 hampered and delayed, leaving victims at an increased risk of
- 16 bodily injury or death.
- 17 The legislature finds that every effort should be made to
- 18 protect the health and safety of the public by preventing civil

- 1 unrest and looting and other crimes before they occur and that
- 2 severe penalties will deter the majority of these crimes of
- 3 opportunity.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to significantly increase the
- 5 criminal penalties for the commission of certain crimes during a
- 6 time of civil defense emergency proclaimed by the governor under
- 7 chapter 128, Hawaii Revised Statutes, or during the period of
- 8 disaster relief under chapter 127, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 9 SECTION 2. Chapter 707, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 11 and to read as follows:
- 12 "\$707- Assault against an emergency worker. (1) A
- 13 person commits the offense of assault against an emergency
- 14 worker if the person, during the time of a civil defense
- 15 emergency proclaimed by the governor pursuant to chapter 128,
- 16 within the area covered by the civil defense emergency or during
- 17 the period of disaster relief under chapter 127:
- 18 (a) Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes serious
- or substantial bodily injury to an emergency worker;

2		injury to an emergency worker with a dangerous
3		<u>instrument.</u>
4	(2)	Assault against an emergency worker is a class B
5	felony."	
6	SECT	ION 3. Chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended b	y adding two new sections to be appropriately
8	designate	d and to read as follows:
9	" <u>§</u> 70	8- Burglary of a dwelling during a civil defense
10	emergency	or disaster relief period. (1) A person commits the
11	oftense o	f burglary of a dwelling during a civil defense
12	emergency	or disaster relief period if the person:
13	<u>(a)</u>	Intentionally enters or remains unlawfully in a
14		dwelling with intent to commit therein a crime against
15		a person or against property rights; and
16	<u>(b)</u>	Recklessly disregards a risk that the building is the
17		dwelling of another, and the building is such a
18		dwelling,
19	during th	e time of a civil defense emergency proclaimed by the
20	governor	pursuant to chapter 128, within the area covered by the
21	civil def	ense emergency or during the period of disaster relief
22	under cha	pter 127.

3	§708- Burglary of a building during a civil defense
4	emergency or disaster relief period. (1) A person commits the

6	emergency or disaster relief period if the person intentionally
7	enters or remains unlawfully in a building other than a dwelling
8	with intent to commit therein a crime against a person or
9	against property rights during the time of a civil defense
10	emergency proclaimed by the governor pursuant to chapter 128,
11	within the area covered by the civil defense emergency or during
12	the period of disaster relief under chapter 127.
13	(2) Burglary of a building during a civil defense
14	emergency or disaster relief period is a class B felony."
15	SECTION 4. Section 707-700, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
17	and to read as follows:
18	"Emergency worker" means any:
19	(1) Law enforcement officer, including but not limited to
20	any police officer, public safety officer, parole or
21	probation officer, or any other officer of any county,

1		state, federal, or military agency authorized to
2		exercise law enforcement or police powers;
3	(2)	Firefighter, emergency medical services personnel,
4		emergency medical technician, ambulance crewmember, or
5		any other emergency response personnel;
6	(3)	Member of the Hawaii national guard on any duty or
7		service done under or in pursuance of an order or call
8		of the governor or the President of the United States
9		or any proper authority;
10	(4)	Member of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy,
11		Marines, or Coast Guard on any duty or service done
12		under or in pursuance of an order or call of the
13		President of the United States or any proper
14		authority;
15	(5)	Member of the national guard from any other state
16		ordered into service by any proper authority;
17	(6)	Person engaged in civil defense functions as
18		authorized by the director of civil defense or as
19		otherwise authorized under chapter 128; or
20	<u>(7)</u>	Person engaged in disaster relief by authorization of
21		the director of disaster relief or as otherwise
22		authorized under chapter 127."

19		person's physical resistance or physical power of
20		resistance; or

17		or during the period of disaster relief under chapter
18		<u>127.</u> "
19	SECT	ION 8. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
20	were matu	red, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
21	were begur	n, before its effective date.

- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

#### Report Title:

Civil Defense Personnel; Crimes

#### Description:

Increases the criminal penalties for the commission of certain crimes during a time of civil defense emergency proclaimed by the Governor or during the period of disaster relief. Effective upon approval. (HB2343 CD1)
