JUSTIFICATION SHEET

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROTECTION OF

FOREST RESERVES.

PURPOSE:

To establish general administrative

penalties for violations under chapter 183,

Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS); and to increase fines for timber trespass.

MEANS:

Add a new section to chapter 183 and amend

section 183-18, HRS.

JUSTIFICATION:

The current language within chapter 183, HRS, creates a situation whereby certain violations, particularly large-scale timber theft, cannot be effectively prosecuted due to value of the resources taken far exceeding the cost and deterrent fine amount for the actual violation. For example, funds generated from theft and sale of just one Koa log can exceed \$10,000. The bill would establish administrative penalties as an alternative to prosecuting violations of chapter 183, HRS, and associated rules, strictly through the Courts. This bill would also increase the general fine amount for timber trespass, including the removal of any timber within the State Forest Reserves, and add a fine for each tree illegally taken.

Impact on the public: None.

Impact on the department and other agencies: Establishing administrative penalties within chapter 183, HRS, would speed up enforcement actions thereby freeing the Courts to address more serious transgressions, as well as bring the chapter in line with other departmental statutes relating to penalties.
