### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LABOR.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Section 89-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"\$89-9 Scope of negotiations; consultation. (a) The
4	employer and the exclusive representative shall meet at
5	reasonable times, including meetings sufficiently in advance of
6	the February 1 impasse date under section 89-11, and shall
7	negotiate in good faith with respect to wages, hours, the
8	amounts of contributions by the State and respective counties to
9	the Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust fund or a
10	voluntary employees' beneficiary association trust to the extent
11	allowed in subsection (e), and other terms and conditions of
12	employment that are subject to collective bargaining and that
13	are to be embodied in a written agreement as specified in
14	section 89-10, but the obligation does not compel either party
15	to agree to a proposal or make a concession; provided that the
16	parties may not negotiate with respect to cost items as defined
17	by section 89-2 for the biennium 1999 to 2001, and the cost
18	items of employees in bargaining units under section 89-6 in

13	the bargaining unit. Violations of the procedures so negotiated
14	may be subject to the grievance procedure in the collective
15	bargaining agreement.
16	(e) (f) Negotiations relating to contributions to the
17	Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust fund or a voluntary
18	employees' beneficiary association trust shall be for the
19	purpose of agreeing upon the amounts that the State and counties
20	shall contribute under sections 87A-32 through 87A-37, toward
21	the payment of the costs for a health benefits plan, as defined
22	in section 87A-1 and group life insurance benefits, and the

5	SECTION 2. Section 89-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended to read as follows:
7	"89-19 Chapter takes precedence, when. This chapter shall
8	take precedence over all conflicting statutes or acts concerning
9	this subject matter and shall preempt and supercede all contrary
10	local ordinances, executive orders, legislation, or rules
11	adopted by the State, a county, or any department or agency
12	thereof, including the departments of human resources
13	development or of personnel services or the civil service
14	commission."
15	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Public Employees; Collective Bargaining

#### Description:
