A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC WORKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the lack of housing,
- 2 especially affordable housing, continues to be a critical
- 3 problem in Hawaii. The problem is exacerbated by record housing
- 4 prices that have caused a shrinking rental market and a growing
- 5 homeless population.
- 6 Government housing agencies have been unable to meet the
- 7 growing demand for affordable housing due primarily to
- 8 exorbitant costs for land, building materials, labor, and other
- 9 construction related expenses.
- 10 A University of California at Berkeley study reviewed the
- 11 costs associated with building government-subsidized housing.
- 12 The study, first released in September 2003 and updated in
- 13 January 2004, discovered subsidized housing costs more to build
- 14 than similar housing built by the private sector.
- The University of California at Berkeley's center on real
- 16 estate and urban economics has taken a look at the costs of
- 17 building low-income housing and found that state-subsidized
- 18 housing costs between ten to thirty-two per cent more to build

Foundation found that "... state subsidies come with politics, 2 and from politics come requirements that drive up costs." 3 The Berkeley study also suggests that taxpayers would save 4 between \$100,000,000 and \$320,000,000 if multifamily housing 5 were built by the private sector. 6 The Berkeley study offers three explanations for why public 7 housing costs are higher than in the private sector: 8 Higher design standards, to "blend in and temper 9 (1)neighborhood opposition to lower-income projects; 10 Longer turnaround times, because "nonprofit developers 11 (2) spend more time chasing other financial sources to put 12 deals together; and 13 State laws, especially those that "require the highest 14 (3) wages on projects built with public funds. 15
