## A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT SERVICES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that families, rather than institutions, are the primary providers of long-term care 2 3 for older adults in the State. According to the executive 4 office on aging, in 2003 approximately twenty-one per cent of Hawaii's adult population were providing care or assistance to a 5 person age sixty or older, with twenty-nine per cent caring for 6 7 a parent. Caregivers are motivated to provide care to family 8 members because of their values, the preference of the elderly 9 to remain at home with their families, and the high cost of 10 institutional long-term care. 11 In Hawaii, the likelihood of becoming a caregiver is 12 similar across different demographic groups and among persons
- 13 with varied socioeconomic characteristics. Adults of any
- 14 household income have a similar likelihood of providing care to
- 15 an elderly person. Married persons in Hawaii are just as likely
- 16 to provide care to an older adult as their unmarried
- 17 counterparts.



1 Among the different ethnic groups in Hawaii, native 2 Hawaiians are most likely to provide regular care to an older adult, followed by Filipinos, Japanese, and Caucasians. Twelve 3 4 per cent of men and sixteen per cent of women provide care or 5 assistance to someone age sixty or older, according to the executive office on aging. In national studies, women are more 6 7 likely than men to be primary caregivers, providing higher 8 intensity and frequency of care. 9 According to the executive office on aging, sixty-five per 10 cent of Hawaii's caregivers are employed. To balance their 11 employment and eldercare roles, working caregivers take leaves 12 of absence, report to work late or leave early, change from 13 full-time to part-time employment, change to less demanding 14 jobs, retire early, or give up work completely. As a 15 consequence, caregiving may reduce a caregiver's retirement 16 income since reduced hours on the job or fewer years in the 17 workforce may mean fewer contributions to pensions, social 18 security, and other retirement savings. 19 By 2020, more than one in four individuals will be sixty 20 years old or older. The need for personal care due to physical, 21 sensory, cognitive, and self-care disabilities increase with 22 age. As Hawaii's population ages, many more families will be
