A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTRONIC COMMERCE AND IDENTITY THEFT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 In 2005, the Hawaii anti-phishing task force SECTION 1.

was established in the department of the attorney general to

develop state policy on how best to prevent further occurrences 3

of phishing and other forms of electronic commerce-based crimes

in the State. The task force focused on: 5

- (1)Examining state agencies charged with the
- responsibility of developing policies, procedures and 7

operations to prevent, monitor, and enforce electronic 8

commerce-based criminal activities and sanctions;

- Deriving best practice models from the review of other 10 (2)
 - jurisdictions' activities, policies, and laws related

to the prevention of electronic commerce-based crimes; 12

Exploring other options available to the task force to (3)

14 deter electronic commerce-based crimes from occurring

15 in the State; and

- Establishing findings and recommendations on 16 (4)
- 17 electronic commerce-based crime prevention.

1 The task force submitted to the legislature findings and recommendations on deterring electronic commerce-based crime. 2 The purpose of this bill is to implement the 3 recommendations of the task force on identity theft. 4 5 PART I SECTION 2. Numerous law enforcement agencies in the State 6 have adopted and implemented strategies to address and combat 7 the increasing problem of identity theft. In particular, the 8 department of the attorney general has committed a substantial 9 10 amount of its resources and has worked closely with almost every criminal enforcement authority in the State in an effort to 11 12 thwart identity theft. In 2002, the department created the 13 Hawaii high technology crime unit to increase the number of investigations and prosecutions of computer-related crimes. 14 unit focuses on prosecuting crimes involving internet fraud and 15 recovering money for victims. The unit also creates and 16 administers task forces which are composed of federal, state, 17 and county law enforcement agencies. The task forces coordinate 18 investigations, share resources, and provide community outreach. 19 Despite current participation from various departments and 20 agencies, more effort is needed to effectively combat the 21 22 occurrence of identity theft, prosecute criminals, and enforce

- 1 penalties. Law enforcement authorities track identity theft
- 2 crimes in various ways; the current tracking methods do not
- 3 provide accurate statistical information about identity theft in
- 4 the State. A uniform system of tracking will provide law
- 5 enforcement authorities with a better understanding of the depth
- 6 and pervasiveness of the problem in Hawaii.
- 7 Once adopted and implemented by law enforcement
- 8 authorities, the uniform tracking and reporting system will
- 9 yield better statistics on the range and breadth of identity
- 10 theft and electronic crimes. The compiled data is intended to
- 11 be used to support a future U.S. Secret Service application for
- 12 designation of Hawaii as one of its regional centers for the
- 13 Electronic Crimes Task Force.
- 14 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
- 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for
- 17 the high technology crime unit and the crime prevention and
- 18 justice assistance division of the department of the attorney
- 19 general to develop a uniform system of tracking identity theft
- 20 crimes.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 22 the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.

2	SECTION 4. The law enforcement coalition, including the
3	department of the attorney general, the United States Attorney,
4	and the Honolulu police department, as well as the department of
5	commerce and consumer affairs, educate the public about identity
6	theft through community outreach programs and initiatives.
7	Speeches, press releases, guest columns, education and training
8	programs, and public service announcements are all effective
9	methods of educating consumers and businesses about identity
10	theft prevention and recourse.
11	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
12	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
13	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for
14	the department of the attorney general to fund existing
15	community outreach programs about identity theft and to develop
16	new programs and methods to increase public awareness of
17	identity theft.
18	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
19	the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.
20	PART III
21	SECTION 6. Law enforcement authorities have seen a recent
22	trend with crystal methamphetamine users relying more and more

- 1 heavily on identity theft crimes to fund their drug habits. A
- 2 study on the nexus between crystal methamphetamine use and
- 3 identity theft will provide a better idea of the financial
- 4 impact of both crimes on the public. The study will also help
- 5 train drug informants to identify fraud factories, and assist
- 6 law enforcement officials investigate and prosecute identity
- 7 theft cases.
- **8** SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for
- 11 the crime prevention and justice assistance division of the
- 12 department of the attorney general to conduct a study on the
- 13 nexus between methamphetamine use and identity theft.
- 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 15 the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
