TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH COUNSELORS.

PURPOSE:

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) amend the definition "practice of mental health counseling" to clarify that professional counseling services are determined by the specialized education, training, and experience that a practitioner completed; (2) specify that "registered rehabilitation specialists" who are regulated by the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR) are not subject to the provisions in chapter 453D, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS); (3) amend the internship and post-graduate experience requirements to specify these experiences must be completed with a specialty in mental health counseling, and supervised by a licensed mental health professional; and (4) specify that the postgraduate experience must be completed within a period of no less than two years and in no more than four years.

MEANS:

Amend sections 453D-1, 453D-6, and 453D-7, HRS.

JUSTIFICATION:

The department finds that the current scope of practice for mental health counselors inadvertently fails to specify that the licensee is to render professional counseling services based on the individual's specialized education, training, and experience. The impact of this is that a licensed mental health counselor could construe this to mean they have the authority to provide services when the person has not acquired the necessary expertise. The department needs to remove any doubt on this matter. As a result, this bill proposes to amend the definition "practicing mental health counseling" in

section 453D-1, HRS, to clarify that the rendering of professional counseling services are based on specialized education, training, and experience.

This bill also amends section 453D-6, HRS, to provide a clear exemption for "rehabilitation specialists" who are currently registered with the DLIR. This is a means to codify the department's practice that, while rehabilitation counselors can qualify for licensure as mental health counselors, they are not required to obtain such licensure if they are not going to use the title stating or implying that they are licensed mental health counselors.

The department also finds that the internship and post-graduate experiences in section 453D-7, HRS, do not specify that these experiences must be completed in the specialty area of "mental health" counseling. As a result, both the department and applicants lack clear direction that, consistent with the purpose of chapter 453D, mental health internship and post-graduate experiences are requisites for licensure. Because a licensed mental health counselor provides mental health counseling services, such as assessment, diagnosis, treatment, and counseling for conduct disorders defined in the approved diagnostic and statistical manual for mental disorders, the department finds it is necessary that the internship and postgraduate training be in the area of mental health counseling as opposed to other counseling specialties.

In addition, the department finds that the internship and post-graduate requirements lack specificity as to who is to supervise such training. To ensure that the internship and post-graduate experiences are supervised by individuals who are qualified and trained in mental health, appropriate supervisors are listed, which include

licensed mental health counselors, clinical social workers, psychologists, advanced practice registered nurses with a specialty in mental health, marriage and family therapists, or physicians with a specialty in psychiatry.

Currently, the law states that the postgraduate experience is to consist of three thousand hours which must be completed This was modeled within a two year period. after national licensing standards for mental health counselors. A recent inquiry is causing us to amend the language for further consistency with the national licensing standards, by stating that the post-graduate experience is to be completed in no less than two years. This amendment sets a minimum floor and a maximum ceiling for recognition of the post-graduate experience. While national licensing standards had no definitive maximum period, we decided upon four years based on similar mental health professions (clinical social workers and marriage and family therapists) which also require three thousand hours of supervised post-graduate experience obtained in no fewer than two years and no more than four years. In addition, although marriage and family therapists have no established national maximum threshold for the postgraduate experience, the Association of Social Work Boards (ASWB) model act recommends that the supervised clinical social worker experience be completed within no more than four years. Because the scope of practice for clinical social workers and mental health counselors are similar, the department finds that adopting maximum threshold of four years is reasonable.

Impact on the public: This bill will enhance consumer safety by ensuring that licensed mental health counselors have the appropriate specialized education, training, and experience and that they practice accordingly based on their expertise.

Impact on the department and other agencies: No impact on the department. While the DLIR is named in the bill, we are simply memorializing a policy position on an exemption to chapter 453D, which currently exists and has no impact on DLIR.
