## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Hawaii's construction industry is currently 2 experiencing a boom with recent reports indicating that it will 3 continue expanding, adding more jobs and money into the local economy over the next several years. Statewide construction 4 5 jobs grew 4.9 per cent in 2004 to roughly twenty-nine thousand 6 three hundred jobs with expected increases of 6.5 per cent in 7 2005 and 3.1 per cent in 2006. Experts believe that this gain in the construction industry has been fueled by moderate but 8 9 steady local economic expansion, stronger population growth, 10 out-of-state second-home buyers for resort properties, low 11 interest rates, and increases in the privatization of military 12 construction projects. However, while the expansion of the 13 construction industry continues, the industry still faces a 14 number of unanswered questions, such as the adequacy of the 15 workforce, and complaints such as the bureaucracy and redundancy 16 faced when developing properties.
- 17 The purpose of this Act is to convene a task force in the
- 18 department of labor and industrial relations to study the

- 1 feasibility of establishing a Hawaii construction authority to
- 2 develop and implement a strategic, long-range, construction
- 3 development plan for the State of Hawaii and streamline the
- 4 construction process.
- 5 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a Hawaii construction
- 6 authority task force within the department of labor and
- 7 industrial relations for administrative purposes which shall
- 8 consist of the following members:
- 9 (1) The director of labor and industrial relations, or a designated representative;
- 11 (2) The director of commerce and consumer affairs, or a
  12 designated representative;
- 13 (3) The director of business, economic development, and tourism, or a designated representative;
- 15 (4) The chairperson of the board of land and natural resources, or a designated representative;
- 17 (5) A member of the workforce development councils from
  18 each county;
- 19 (6) A representative of each county to be appointed by
  20 their respective mayors;
- (7) A representative from the board of water supply of thecity and county of Honolulu, or a designee, who shall

1		also serve as the liaison of the task force to the
2		directors of the boards of water supply of the other
3		counties;
4	(8)	A representative of Hawaiian Electric Company, or a
5		designee;
6	(9)	A representative of Hawaiian Telcom, or a designee;
7	(10)	A representative of the Building Industry Association
8		of Hawaii, or a designee;
9	(11)	A representative of the Hawaii Building and
10		Construction Trades Council, or a designee;
11	(12)	A member of the Sierra Club, or other similar
12		environmental organization, or a designee;
13	(13)	An individual having knowledge, experience, and
14		expertise in the area of construction, architecture,
15		and engineering;
16	(14)	An individual having knowledge, experience, and
17		expertise with labor organizations representing the
18		construction trades;
19	(15)	An individual having knowledge, experience, and
20		expertise in the area of Hawaiian cultural practices;
21		and

(16)	Any other agency or designee deemed appropriate by the
	director of labor and industrial relations.
(b)	The task force shall conduct a study of the state's
construct	ion industry to determine the feasibility of
establish	ing a Hawaii construction authority that will create
and devel	op a long-range strategic plan for construction in
Hawaii, i	ncluding the development, coordination, and
implement	ation of state policies for the construction industry
and relat	ed activities taking into account the economic, social,
and physi	cal effects of construction on the state and its
natural r	esources and infrastructure. The study shall include
but not b	e limited to:
(1)	An analysis of the number and types of government
	agencies involved in the construction industry
	permitting process;
(2)	An overview of the permitting process for new
	developments;
(3)	A review and analysis of the licensing requirements
	for construction trades;
(4)	A review and listing of construction projects already

1	(5)	A review and listing of construction projects targeted
2		to begin during the current calendar year;
3	(6)	A review and listing of construction projects
4		projected to begin during the next five calendar
5		years;
6	(7)	A review of all federal, state, and county laws that
7		will affect the construction industry in the state;
8	(8)	Efforts to improve the construction industry through
9		coordination among agencies that provide oversight or
10		have jurisdiction over construction projects;
11	(9)	Projections on the labor needs of the construction
12		industry and the capabilities of the construction
13		industry to meet these demands;
14	(10)	Efforts to improve the education and training of the
15		building trades;
16	(11)	A review of all state and county laws to determine
17		whether there is redundancy, and if so, whether
18		elimination of this redundancy will improve the
19		construction industry in the state;
20	(12)	An analysis of the finite resources, such as land and
21		drinking water, affected by increased development and

1		whether the development of a construction authority
2		would assist in the protection of these resources;
3	(13)	The environmental impact of increased development;
4	(14)	The benefits, as well as the drawbacks of establishing
5		a Hawaii construction authority;
6	(15)	The costs of establishing a Hawaii construction
7		authority;
8	(16)	The impact the establishment of a Hawaii construction
9		authority would have on public employees and
10		departments currently administering programs that
11		would be incorporated into a Hawaii construction
12		authority; and
13	(17)	Any other objective deemed necessary by the director
14		of labor and industrial relations.
15	SECT	ION 3. The director of labor and industrial relations,
16	in consultation with the task force, shall submit a report to	
17	the legislature, including findings, recommendations, and draft	
18	legislatio	on, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
19	the regula	ar session of 2008.
20	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
21	revenues o	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much

- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007 for the
- 2 establishment of a Hawaii construction authority task force.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
