A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Although the State has established statewide 1 standards and benchmarks, learner outcomes, assessments, 2 promotion requirements, and graduation requirements, the 3 legislature finds that Hawaii's public school system does not have a model curriculum to meet its goals. Because the present 5 curriculum is not standardized, individual teachers, grade 6 levels, schools, complexes, districts, vendors, and school 7 8 reform and reinvention teams make curriculum decisions. When a curriculum is not aligned across grade levels, 9 students have difficulty in meeting standards that require skill 10 levels of increasing complexity and ability. This piecemeal 11 12 approach must not be allowed to continue if the public schools system is to efficiently achieve its goals. 13 If instruction is not aligned with content standards, 14 standards-based reform is not going to succeed. In "The Link 15 16 Between High School Reform and College Success for Low-Income and Minority Youth", a publication of the American Youth Policy 17

1 in the four key practices most commonly cited for the success of low-income and minority high school students in college: 2 Access to a rigorous academic common core curriculum 3 (1)for all students; and 4 (2) Alignment of the curriculum between various levels, 5 such as high school and post-secondary, and between 6 levels within the kindergarten through twelfth grade 7 8 system. 9 The purpose of this Act is to establish and maintain a model curriculum for teachers to meet the Hawaii performance 10 standards as required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 11 12 2001. SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, part II, subpart B, Hawaii 13 14 Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 15 16 "§302A- Model curriculum. (a) The department shall 17 establish a model curriculum adapted from a research-based model 18 that has proven to be successful. The curriculum shall be specific in its scope and sequence over a school year for each 19 20 grade level, be consistent in course content, and be aligned across all grade levels. The curriculum shall meet the state 21

3	(b) The model curriculum may be developed in separate
4	parts to target specific needs or populations. The curriculum
5	may adapt national program curricula to meet Hawaii standards,
6	and may include the subject areas of:
7	(1) Information technology education;
8	(2) <u>Hawaiian education;</u>
9	(3) Career pathway education; and
10	(4) Program curricula from America's choice, success for
11	all, core knowledge, direct instruction, or other
12	similar nationally-implemented programs.
13	The department shall provide each teacher with standards-
14	<pre>based model curriculum assessment tools to assess students</pre>
15	multiple times during the school year.
16	(c) The department shall establish and maintain the
17	curriculum and shall provide teachers with support resources,
18	that shall include:
19	(1) Professional development, which may be in the form of
20	school release days or professional development
