## A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE SHERIFF DIVISION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The sheriff division of the department of
- 2 public safety is vested by law with critical responsibilities to
- 3 protect the public. Section 353C-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 4 defines the responsibilities of the director of public safety.
- 5 Section 353C-2 states in relevant part:
- 6 "[T]he director may:
- Preserve the public peace, prevent crime, detect and 7 arrest offenders against the law, protect the rights 8 of persons and property, and enforce and prevent violation of all laws and administrative rules of the 10 State as the director deems to be necessary or 11 12 desirable or upon request, to assist other state officers or agencies that have primary administrative 13 responsibility over specific subject matters or 14 15 programs;
  - (2) Train, equip, maintain, and supervise the force of public safety officers, including law enforcement and

3	The sheriff division's mission is to provide law		
4	enforcement services at state courts, the state capitol, the		
5	governor's residence, state buildings and offices, the Honolulu		
6	International Airport; serve warrants; and transport persons in		
7	custody to the courts.		
8	The legislature finds that the sheriff division has		
9	increased its workload and obligations in the interests of		
10	protecting the public safety, which requires more staffing and		
11	motor vehicles		
12	The purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation to the		
13	sheriff division.		
14	PART I		
15	ADDITIONAL POSITIONS		
16	SECTION 2. The Honolulu Police Department has recently		
17	instituted a policy of not responding to incidences occurring on		
18	certain state property within the jurisdiction of the department		
19	of public safety, which has resulted in increased		
20	responsibilities for the department. The sheriff division has		
21	requested additional permanent positions for the island of Oahu,		
22	as follows:		

1 (1)	Five clerk-dispatcher I positions for the
2	communications unit. The current staffing consists of
3	two clerk dispatchers. The dispatchers are
4	responsible for prioritizing calls and for dispatching
5	deputy sheriffs. They provide a critical information
6	link to deputies in the field. The Honolulu Police
7	Department refers these calls to the sheriff division
8	for response. The unexpected change in circumstances
9	requires the sheriff division to maintain clerk-
10	dispatcher staffing on a 24/7 basis;

- (2) Six deputy sheriff II positions for capitol patrol.

  The capitol patrol section is primarily responsible for law enforcement and protecting life and property at the state capitol and governor's residence, including responding to calls for service, conducting criminal investigations, handling citizen complaints, and being on call for possible disturbances on the property; and
- (3) Five deputy sheriff II positions for the district patrol section. The district patrol section includes the judiciary buildings and other state facilities assigned to the department of public safety's

1	jurisdiction, including the functions of providing		
2	escort and security to state officials, visiting		
3	dignitaries, and prisoners.		
4	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ , or so		
6	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for		
7	additional permanent positions for the sheriff division for the		
8	Island of Oahu, as specified in section 2 of this Act.		
9	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the sheriff		
10	division of the department of public safety for purposes of this		
11	Act.		
12	PART II		
13	ADDITIONAL VEHICLES		
14	SECTION 4. The average age of the vehicles in the sheriff		
15	division fleet is seven to ten years, and many have in excess of		
16	100,000 miles. Due to age, wear, and tear, major mechanical		
17	break downs occur frequently. Over the past year, about \$9,000		
18	was spent on repairs. While this figure does not appear		
19	excessive, it is a sign of increased maintenance demands. Of		
20	particular concern is the breakdown on the highway of a vehicle		
21	while en route transporting a felon. More importantly,		
22	deferring small maintenance repairs inevitably leads to major		

1	mechanica	l fai	lures. The sheriff division has requested the
2	following	addi	tional vehicles:
3	(1)	Twen	ty-six replacement vehicles, as follows:
4		(A)	Six police package sedans for the district court
5			section;
6		(B)	Two police package, twelve passenger vans for the
7			district court section;
8		(C)	Two police package sedans for the circuit court
9			section;
10		(D)	Seven police package sedans for the warrants
11			section;
12		(E)	Six police package sport utility vehicles for the
13			canine section; and
14		(F)	Three police package sedans for the capitol
15			patrol section.
16	SECT	ION 5	. There is appropriated out of the general
17	revenues o	of th	e State of Hawaii the sum of \$ , or so
18	much there	eof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for
19	additional	l veh	icles for the sheriff division, as specified in
20	section 4	of t	his Act.

1	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the sheriff			
2	division of the department of public safety for the purposes of			
3	this Act.			
4	SECTION III			
5	EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS			
6	SECTION 6. (a) Current radios assigned to the capitol			
7	patrol section are a VHF system, which is only operable for a			
8	short distance within the downtown area. Without the Honolulu			
9	Police Department's assistance, the span of communication of the			
10	sheriff division needs to be island-wide to ensure timely			
11	response, particularly for criminal matters. Efficient radio			
12	communications provide constant updated information on the			
13	location of the officer, the situation at the scene of the			
14	service call or crime scene, and the ability to call for back-up			
15	in dangerous or life-threatening situations. The sheriff			
16	division has requested fourteen Motorola UHF portable radios.			
17	(b) Without assistance from the Honolulu Police			
18	Department, the sheriff division is forced to become crime scene			
19	investigators. Evidence recovery kits are critical to detect,			
20	gather, and preserve evidence, including photos, fingerprints,			
21	DNA, weapons, and other evidence. The sheriff division has			
22	requested three evidence recovery kits.			

- 1 (c) As a major component of the state capitol's security
- 2 system, it is vital that the cameras operate properly. The
- 3 current two cameras, one located at the chamber level access
- 4 door and the other near the governor's office, need to be
- 5 replaced. The sheriff division has requested two PTZ closed
- 6 circuit television cameras for security surveillance monitoring
- 7 within the state capitol building.
- 8 (d) The department of accounting and general services
- 9 recently installed a digital closed circuit television system at
- 10 the governor's residence and Washington Place. A computer is
- 11 necessary to provide remote monitoring of these cameras. The
- 12 sheriff division has requested one Pentium III class desktop
- 13 computer.
- 14 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ , or so
- 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for
- 17 new equipment for the sheriff division, as specified in section
- 18 6 of this Act.
- 19 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the sheriff
- 20 division of the department of public safety for the purposes of
- 21 this Act.

1 PART IV

- 2 SECTION 8. The sums appropriated by this Act shall not be
- 3 allocated to any division of the department of public safety
- 4 other than the sheriff division.
- 5 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
