A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKES AN APPROPRIATION FOR A GRANT TO GLOBAL MEDILINK TECHNOLOGY INC. FOR THE ORAL HEALTH INSTITUTE OF THE PACIFIC PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Oral Health
- 2 Institute of the Pacific program was opened in 2004 to increase
- 3 access to oral health services by providing clinical dental
- 4 services and case management to special needs patients, and
- 5 underserved children and adults. These underserved children and
- 6 adults are medicaid, QUEST, or SCHIP recipients or are uninsured
- 7 and have not had access to oral health services in many years.
- 8 The underserved population includes geriatric patients, children
- 9 with special needs, adult mental health patients, renal dialysis
- 10 patients, heart transplant patients, persons with HIV/AIDS,
- 11 former inmates, and the homeless.
- 12 The underserved population by and large cannot access
- 13 dental services in their communities. This is due to dentist
- 14 non-participation with Med-QUEST, low medicaid program
- 15 reimbursement rates for dental services at only twenty-five per
- 16 cent of the cost of treatment, and excessive paperwork for
- 17 billing medicaid. Accordingly, the number of dental providers

- 1 who actively treat these patients is alarmingly small. On Maui,
- 2 there are fewer than five dentists who see these 14,765
- 3 patients. Approximately half are children under age twenty-one.
- 4 One pediatric dentist who practices on Maui participates with
- 5 Med-QUEST. Sometimes, children are flown to Oahu, accompanied
- 6 by a parent or guardian, for dental treatment. This requires
- 7 extensive coordination and case management and can be very
- 8 traumatic for the patient, and costly to the State.
- 9 The Oral Health Institute of the Pacific program is
- 10 addressing the serious challenges of access to oral health
- 11 services for the underserved that are not being addressed in the
- 12 private sector. Residents of Maui county, in particular
- 13 children under age twenty-one, as well as adults who are
- 14 returning to the workforce, will be able to have a "dental
- 15 home, " resulting in decreased pain and infection, and an
- 16 increased ability to concentrate on school and work, eliminating
- 17 numerous absences. The Oral Health Institute of the Pacific's
- 18 oral health team provides the clinical expertise and critical
- 19 link between the medical and dental communities and the
- 20 underserved people of Maui county.
- 21 The purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation for a
- 22 grant to Global Medilink Technology Inc. for the Oral Health

- 1 Institute of the Pacific program so it can continue to operate
- 2 dental clinics and provide dental services for QUEST, SCHIP, and
- 3 Medicaid recipients, and the uninsured who cannot find dental
- 4 services in the private sector on Maui.
- 5 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$350,000, or so much
- 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, as grants
- pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to Global 8
- 9 Medilink Technology Inc. for the Oral Health Institute of the
- 10 Pacific program, for continued operations of dental clinics for
- 11 direct dental services for QUEST, SCHIP, and Medicaid
- 12 recipients, and the uninsured on the island of Maui.
- 13 SECTION 3. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the
- 14 department of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 15 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
