## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. During the regular session of 2003, the 1
- legislature passed and the governor vetoed S.B. No. 1426, 2
- S.D. 1, relating to collective bargaining for substitute 3
- teachers and part-time substitute teachers in the department of 4
- education. The legislature finds that substitute teachers have 5
- long been neglected in terms of collective bargaining rights. 6
- Substitute teachers are a necessary and integral part of the 7
- cadre of teachers. Although substitute teachers are usually 8
- hired on a day-to-day basis, some fill in for regular teachers 9
- on longer term assignments, which effectively results in putting 10
- substitute teachers into full-time teaching positions for 11
- indefinite periods. 12
- The legislature finds that substitute teachers should be 13
- conferred the right to bargaining collective regarding salaries, 14
- 15 benefits, and other working conditions.
- This Act addresses the governor's reasons for the veto of 16
- S.B. No. 1426, S.D. 1 (2003), which concerned issues of clarity 17
- 18 and expression of legislative intent.

- Voluntary mediation. During the first twenty days of the date of impasse, either party may request the board to assist in a voluntary resolution of the impasse by appointing a mediator or mediators, representative of the public from a list of qualified

persons maintained by the board;

- days, the board shall appoint a mediator or mediators representative of the public from a list of qualified persons maintained by the board, to assist the parties in a voluntary resolution of the impasse. The board may compel the parties to attend mediation, reasonable in time and frequency, until the fiftieth day of impasse. Thereafter, mediation shall be elective with the parties, subject to the approval of the board;
- (3) Report of the board. The board shall promptly report to the appropriate legislative body or bodies the following circumstances as each occurs:

1	(A)	The date of a tentative agreement and whether the			
2		terms thereof are confidential between the

4	(B)	The ratification or failure of ratification of a			
5		tentative agreement;			
6	(C)	The signing of a tentative agreement;			
7	(D)	The terms of a tentative agreement; or

12	(4) Afte	r the fiftieth day of impasse, the parties may

16	SECTION 4	. This Act does not affect rights and duties that			
17	matured, penal	ties that were incurred, and proceedings that were			
18	begun, before	its effective date.

20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.				
21	SECTION 6	. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
