HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

DECLARING SEPTEMBER 28 AS CONFUCIUS DAY IN HAWAII.

WHEREAS, citizens of Chinese heritage have made and 1 continue to make significant contributions to the state and to 2 the rest of the world in culture, education, agriculture, and 3 business and industry; and 4 5 WHEREAS, one such individual is Confucius (ca. 551-479), 6 who is acknowledged to be one of the world's greatest thinkers 7 and teachers, and who began a philosophy and way of life in 8 China that spread through many countries of Asia, including 9 China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Japan, Korea, and Vietnam, 10 deeply influencing life and thought; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Confucius' philosophy emphasized personal and 13 governmental morality, correctness of social relationships, 14 justice, and sincerity, values which gained prominence in China 15 over other doctrines such as Legalism or Taoism during the Han 16 Dynasty; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Confucius championed the principles of strong 19 familial loyalty, ancestor worship, respect of elders by their 20 children and of husbands by their wives, and the family as a 21 basis for an ideal government; and 22 23 WHEREAS, Confucius also preached not doing to others what 24 you would not do to yourself, encouraged politicians to model 25 themselves on the ways of honorable politicians of the past, and 26 reminded us, "What the superior man seeks is in himself. What 27 the mean man seeks is in others"; and 28 29 WHEREAS, although Confucianism is often followed in a 30 religious manner, rather than building a systematic theory of 31 32 life and society or establishing a formalism of rites, Confucius


wanted his disciples to think deeply for themselves and study 1 the outside world; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the Center for Chinese Studies at the University 4 5 of Hawaii (UH) at Manoa, has been educating students about and expanding scholarship of this and many other aspects of China, 6 the Chinese, and Chinese culture since 1977, publishes the 7 journal Chinese Review International, and has become one of the 8 largest centers for Chinese studies in the United States (U.S.) 9 with 47 faculty and staff who teach over 150 courses; and 10 11 WHEREAS, Hawaii's ties to Confucius were further 12 strengthened by the establishment of the Confucius Institute at 13 UH-Manoa, which was one of 100 Confucius Institutes across the 14 globe created to strengthen cultural awareness and offer more 15 educational opportunities to learn and understand the Chinese 16 language and Chinese culture; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the Confucius Institute, with funds from UH, the 19 U.S. government, and Ministry of Education of the People's 20 Republic of China, conducts numerous community and child 21 outreach programs, including Chinese language instruction, and a 22 summer sports camp that involves learning traditional martial 23 24 arts, table tennis, and swimming; and 25 WHEREAS, these efforts complement the work of the Office of 26 International Affairs of the Department of Business, Economic 27 Development, and Tourism to expand Hawaii's reach into China 28 through various programs and a Beijing office; now, therefore, 29 30 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 31 32 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the Senate concurring, that September 28 be 33 designated as Confucius Day in Hawaii; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 36 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the 37 Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, 38 President of the University of Hawaii, Director of the UH Center 39 40 for Chinese Studies, and Director of the Confucius Institute at 41 UH.
