A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Seventy per cent of the State of Hawaii's 1 population resides on Oahu and is served by the first judicial 2 circuit, which consists of twenty-five circuit court judges. 3 The remaining thirty per cent of Hawaii's population is served by the second judicial circuit on Maui with four circuit court 5 judges; the third judicial circuit on Hawaii with four circuit 6 court judges; and the fifth judicial circuit on Kauai with two 7 circuit court judges. The citizens of central and leeward Oahu, 8 9 representing twenty-two per cent of the State's population, and thirty per cent of Oahu's population, have no dedicated circuit 10 11 court. The legislature is committed to support the anticipated 12 13 continued growth of central and leeward Oahu with the creation 14 of a "second city" in Kapolei. Consistent with that vision, the legislature, during the 2005 regular session, supported the 15 judiciary's request for the construction of a courthouse complex 16 17 in Kapolei. The legislature's concern over the most efficient 18 way to provide equal access to justice, promote the most

effective delivery of legal services, and better serve the needs 1 2 of the entire population of Oahu leads to the inevitable conclusion that the creation of an additional circuit, to be 3 designated the fourth judicial circuit, located in the Kapolei 4 court complex, will best accomplish those goals. 5 6 SECTION 2. Section 571-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 7 8 "§571-3 Family courts, divisions of circuit courts. family courts shall be divisions of the circuit courts of the 9 10 State and shall not be deemed to be other courts as that term is used in the State Constitution. A family court shall be held at 11 the courthouse in each circuit, or other duly designated place, 12 by the judge or judges of the respective family courts as herein 13 defined. The chief justice of the supreme court may temporarily 14 assign a family court judge to preside in another circuit when 15 the urgency of one or more cases requires the chief justice to 16 do so. The first circuit shall retain all matters in the 17 present location within the jurisdiction of the family court as 18 provided in chapters 571, 580, 586, and 587, except proceedings 19

under section 571-11(1), which may be held exclusively in the

fourth circuit. In any case in which it has jurisdiction the

- 1 court shall exercise general equity powers as authorized by 2 law." 3 SECTION 3. Section 571-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended to read as follows: 5 "§571-4 Family courts, circuits. In the first circuit any 6 judge or judges so designated by the chief justice of the 7 supreme court shall be the judge or judges of the family court 8 of the first circuit. The several judges of the second, third, 9 fourth, and fifth circuits, and of any other circuits hereafter 10 created by the legislature, [shall,] when exercising 11 jurisdiction under this chapter, shall be judges of the family 12 courts of their respective circuits. In any circuit in which 13 more than one judge is authorized to exercise jurisdiction as 14 judge of the family court, the chief justice of the supreme court shall designate one of the judges as senior judge. 15 16 Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to limit the 17 jurisdiction and authority of any circuit judge, designated as 18 judge of a family court, to matters within the scope of this

9	the island of Oahu.
10	SECTION 10. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the
11	judiciary for the purposes of this Act.
12	SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect upon:
13	(1) The formal opening of the Kapolei court complex; and
14	(2) Publication of a notice statewide as provided by
15	section 1-28.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes that Kapolei
16	court complex has opened;
17	provided that sections 9 and 10 shall take effect on July 1,
