STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 2704

Honorable Members Twenty-Fourth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2704, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Ha`iku Valley."

The purpose of this bill is to establish a 9-member Ha`iku Valley Commission to establish policy and management oversight of an area referred to as the Ha`iku Valley Preserve.

This Administration supports cultural preservation of the valley and the many unique sites and artifacts that currently are located in this area. We understand and appreciate the concerns of the community in ensuring these sites are properly protected.

However, this bill is objectionable for several reasons. First, the measure fails to define the boundaries of the preserve. The bill proposes to purchase lands in the preserve area in fee simple, but fails to provide appropriations or other funding mechanisms to make purchases. It should be noted that most of the lands are privately held. The balance of the lands are held by the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands on behalf of their beneficiaries.

Further, it is unclear what would be gained from the fee simple purchase by the State of said lands. It should be noted that much of the mauka portion of the valley is already classified as conservation land. There are a number of laws already in place that control what can be done on conservation STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS HOUSE BILL NO. 2704 Page 2

land, including fines and penalties against those who improperly use or trespass on these lands. The fines proposed in this bill appear to be unduly punitive.

This Administration believes that it is possible to address many of the issues raised by persons within the Hawaiian community and others who want to ensure that this unique area is properly maintained. I have already asked my Departments of Hawaiian Home Lands and Land and Natural Resources and Transportation to work with community members and federal officials to develop a long term approach that avoids the need for legislation and ensures access for all, while preserving the beauty and cultural significance of the valley.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2704 without my approval.

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RELATING TO HA'IKU VALLEY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Ha'iku valley on 2 Oahu has significant cultural and historic importance to the native people of Hawai'i. Ha'iku valley is renowned for its 3 archaeological and other cultural and historic sites, including 4 5 lo'i, sacred sites, and burial sites, and for the presence of 6 native and endangered flora and fauna. Preserving the valley's 7 cultural and historic resources and educating the public about 8 these resources are of paramount importance.

9 The legislature further finds that ownership of the valley 10 is segmented among several entities. The valley's segmented 11 ownership and limited stewardship have placed its cultural and 12 historic resources at high risk. Adequate management and 13 appropriate access to the valley have proven elusive.

14 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Ha'iku Valley 15 cultural preserve commission, which shall have policy and 16 management oversight of the Ha'iku Valley cultural preserve. 17 The establishment of the commission will provide a system that 18 recognizes the valley's unique challenges and preserves in HB2704 CD1 HMS 2008-4048

3	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by	
4	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read	
5	as follows:	
6	"CHAPTER	
7	HA'IKU VALLEY CULTURAL PRESERVE	
8	§ -1 Administration of chapter. The Ha'iku valley	
9	cultural preserve commission and the department of land and	
10	natural resources shall administer this chapter.	
11	\$ -2 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the	
12	context otherwise requires:	
13	"Commission" means the Ha`iku valley cultural preserve	
14	commission.	
15	"Department" means the department of land and natural	
16	resources.	
17	"Valley cultural preserve" means the area designated as	
18	Ha`iku valley.	
19	§ -3 Reservation of uses. (a) The Ha'iku valley	
20	cultural preserve shall be used solely and exclusively for the	
21	following purposes:	



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(1)	Preservation and practice of all rights customarily
	and traditionally exercised by native Hawaiians for
	cultural, spiritual, and subsistence purposes;
(2)	Preservation and protection of the area's cultural,
	archaeological, historical, and environmental
	resources;
(3)	Rehabilitation, revegetation, habitat restoration, and
	preservation;
(4)	Education; and
(5)	Other purposes as determined by the commission.
(b)	The valley cultural preserve shall be reserved in
perpetuit	y for the uses enumerated in this section. Commercial
uses shal	l be strictly prohibited.
Ş	-4 Powers and duties of the department. The

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15 department and other departments and agencies of the State shall 16 be subject to the oversight of the commission with regard to the 17 control and management of the valley cultural preserve. Subject 18 to section -6, the department shall:

- 19 (1) Implement controls and permitted uses for the valley20 cultural preserve;
- 21 (2) Enforce this chapter;

15	by a simp	le majority of its members. Five members shall
16	constitute	e a quorum to conduct business.
17	(e)	The commission, without regard to the requirements of
18	chapter 70	6, may hire employees necessary to perform its duties.
19	\$ ·	-6 Powers and duties of the commission. The general
20	administra	ation of the valley cultural preserve shall rest with
21	the commis	ssion. The commission:

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1	(1)	Shall establish criteria, policies, and controls for
2		permissible uses within the valley cultural preserve;
3	(2)	Shall approve all contracts for services and rules
4		pertaining to the valley cultural preserve;
5	(3)	Shall provide advice to the office of Hawaiian
6		affairs, the governor, the department, and other
7		departments and agencies on any matter relating to the
8		valley cultural preserve;
9	(4)	Shall provide advice to the office of planning and the
10		department of the attorney general on any matter
11		relating to the conveyance of the valley cultural
12		preserve to the department;
13	(5)	May enter into curator or stewardship agreements with
14		appropriate Hawaiian cultural and spiritual community
15		organizations for the perpetuation of native Hawaiian
16		cultural, religious, and subsistence customs, beliefs,
17		and practices;
18	(6)	Shall have those powers and duties concerning the
19		valley cultural preserve otherwise conferred upon the
20		city and county of Honolulu by chapter 205A;

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1 Shall adopt rules in accordance with chapter 91 that (7)are necessary to administer this chapter and shall 2 3 maintain a record of its proceedings and actions; 4 (8) May delegate to any executive director or employees of the commission, by formal commission action, such 5 power and authority vested in the commission by this 6 7 chapter as the commission deems reasonable and proper for the effective administration of this chapter; and 8 May solicit and accept grants, donations, and (9) 9 10 contributions for deposit into the Ha'iku valley 11 cultural preserve trust fund to support the purposes 12 of this chapter.

13 § -7 Farming. Notwithstanding section -3, the 14 commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to permit 15 farming activities in the valley cultural preserve that are 16 consistent with the purposes of this chapter and that take into 17 consideration the health and safety of the general public.

18 § -8 Penalty. Any person who violates any of the laws
19 or rules applicable to the valley cultural preserve shall be
20 guilty of a petty misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than
21 \$1,000, imprisoned not more than thirty days, or both, for each

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offense. Each day of each violation shall be deemed a separate
 offense.

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-9 General administrative penalties. (a) Except as 3 S 4 otherwise provided by law, the commission is authorized to set, 5 charge, and collect administrative fines, or bring legal action 6 to recover administrative costs of the commission or the 7 department, or collect payment for damages or for the cost of 8 correcting damages resulting from a violation of this chapter or 9 any rule adopted hereunder. The administrative fines shall be 10 as follows: 11 (1) For a first violation, a fine of not more than 12 \$10,000; For a second violation within five years of a previous 13 (2) 14 violation, a fine of not more than \$15,000; and (3) For a third or subsequent violation within five years 15 16 of the last violation, a fine of not more than 17 \$25,000. In addition, an administrative fine of up to \$5,000 18 (b)

19 may be levied for each specimen of natural resource or any 20 historic property taken, killed, injured, broken, or damaged in 21 violation of any rule adopted under this chapter.

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1 (c) The remedies or penalties provided by this chapter are cumulative to each other and to the remedies and penalties 2 3 provided by any other law. 4 (d) In any judicial proceeding to recover an 5 administrative penalty imposed, the commission need only show 6 that: 7 Notice was given; (1)(2)A hearing was held or the time granted for requesting 8 9 a hearing has run without such a request; 10 (3) An administrative penalty was imposed; and 11 (4) The administrative penalty remains unpaid. 12 (e) For purposes of this section: 13 "Historic property" means any building, structure, object, 14 district, landscape, area, or site, including a heiau and an 15 underwater site, that is over fifty years old. 16 "Natural resource" includes any archaeological artifacts, 17 minerals, any aquatic life or wildlife or parts thereof, 18 including their eggs, and any land plants or parts thereof, 19 including seeds.


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20 § -10 Transfer. Upon the conveyance of the valley
21 cultural preserve to the department, all terms, conditions,



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(c) Moneys deposited into or appropriated to the trust
 fund shall remain available until they are obligated or until
 the trust fund is terminated.

4 (d) If the trust fund is terminated, all funds shall be
5 transferred to the general fund; provided that all unexpended or
6 unencumbered balances shall be disbursed in accordance with any
7 requirements set by funding sources and for purposes consistent
8 with this chapter.

9 (e) The commission shall submit an annual report on the 10 status of the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve trust fund to the 11 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 12 each regular session of the legislature. The annual report 13 shall include the total number of and amount of grants, 14 donations, and contributions received and balances remaining on 15 June 30 of each year.

16 § -12 Severability. If any provision of this chapter or 17 the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held 18 invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or 19 applications of this chapter that can be given effect without 20 the invalid provision or application, and to this end the 21 provisions of this chapter are severable."

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1 SECTION 3. The office of planning and the department of 2 the attorney general, after consulting with the Ha'iku valley 3 cultural preserve commission, are authorized to initiate the 4 acquisition in fee simple of all lands in the Ha'iku valley 5 cultural preserve that are not state lands; provided that before 6 the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve is acquired, agreements shall be executed with respect to liability, monetary resources, 7 and removal of hazardous wastes. The acquired lands in the 8 9 Ha'iku valley cultural preserve shall be managed as public lands 10 subject to chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

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SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
