A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FERAL PIGS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that feral pigs are an 2 invasive species that cause considerable damage to the 3 environment by consuming ground-cover plants; destroying 4 understory vegetation; churning and wallowing in the ground 5 causing erosion, and creating mosquito breeding areas. pigs also directly impact the survival of native forest birds 6 7 and other species. Feral pigs have migrated in increasing numbers from state land to residential areas, causing property 8 9 damage and disturbances that affect the health, safety, and 10 welfare of area residents. 11 The department of land and natural resources has the duty and responsibility under section 171-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 12 13 to "manage and administer...forests, forest reserves,...public 14 hunting areas, [and] natural area reserves." The most common 15 method of controlling feral pig populations has been by 16 scheduled hunting sessions sanctioned by the department of land and natural resources. 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- 1 such as Manoa and Tantalus, the department of land and natural
- 2 resources has shortened the length of the feral pig hunting
- 3 season, allowing feral pigs to maintain their population size.
- 4 In 2006, the legislature adopted House Concurrent
- 5 Resolution No. 98, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, which requested the
- 6 department of land and natural resources to submit to the 2007
- 7 legislature, a plan, including findings and recommendations, to
- 8 identify areas where feral pigs were a problem and to reduce the
- 9 feral pig population.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to direct the department of land
- 11 and natural resources to implement the plan to identify and
- 12 reduce problem feral pig populations as requested pursuant to
- 13 House Concurrent Resolution No. 98, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, by the
- 14 legislature in 2006 by establishing and maintaining a temporary
- 15 pilot program to identify and reduce the feral pig population
- 16 and the resulting damage and disturbance to public health,
- 17 safety, and welfare.
- 18 SECTION 2. The department of land and natural resources
- 19 shall establish, implement, and maintain a pilot program to
- 20 identify and reduce problem feral pig populations pursuant to
- 21 the plan requested in House Concurrent Resolution No. 98, S.D.
- 22 1, H.D. 1, by the legislature in 2006. In establishing and
